Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this bill. The Campaign Spending Commission ("Commission") supports the intent of this bill.

This bill establishes a comprehensive system of public financing for all candidates seeking election to state and county public offices, appropriates \$30,000,000¹ to the Hawaii Election Campaign Fund, and appropriates \$200,000 to the Commission for two full-time temporary positions. The effective date of the bill has been changed to March 22, 2075, by the Senate Committee on Judiciary. However, the intent of the bill is to have the comprehensive system of public financing in place for the 2024 general election year. S.B. No. 1543, SD1 at page 4, lines 1-2.

The bill establishes the maximum amount of comprehensive public funds ("CPF Max") for each office. The CPF Max ranges from a low of \$20,000 for candidates for the Board of Trustees for the Office of Hawaiian Affairs ("OHA") to a high of \$2,500,000 for candidates for Governor. However, as a percentage of the amounts spent by winners, or an average spent by winners, for office in recent elections, these amounts range from a very low of 49% (\$20,000/\$41,013.45) for candidates for OHA to a high of 133% (\$20,000/\$15,062.42) for

candidates for Hawaii County Council. The Commission urges this Committee to increase the CPF Max for candidates for OHA to \$40,000 (97.5%).²

In order to qualify for comprehensive public funding, the bill establishes the minimum number of qualifying contributions each candidate must receive from registered voters residing within the respective district from which the candidate seeks nomination or election to office. It appears that the minimum number of qualifying contributions is equal to .25 percent of the CPF Max for each office. The Commission is still considering whether the minimum number of qualifying contributions for all offices is sufficient.

§11-H³ describes the obligations of certified candidates. In regard to the disposition of unexpended public funds, it appears that the bill does not address the return of unexpended funds for a certified candidate who is successful in the primary **and** general election. The Commission recommends that subsection (f) on page 24 of the bill be amended by adding the following sentence immediately after the first sentence of the subsection:

"If the certified candidate is successful in the general election, the certified candidate shall return all unexpended public funds received by the certified candidate under this subpart to the Hawaii election campaign fund within thirty days after the general election."

Finally, section 4 of this measure requires the Commission to submit a report to the Legislature in the 2024 session of the Commission's findings and recommendations, including any proposed statutory amendments that may be necessary to implement the comprehensive public funding program. Because of this mandate and because the Commission will have to work on forms, make modifications of its electronic filing system, and train candidates, the Commission urges this Committee to begin the comprehensive public funding program with the 2026 general election. Consequently, on page 31, line 1 of the bill, "2024" needs to re[laced by"2026," on page 32, line 15, "2024" needs to re[laced by"2026," and on page 32, line 21, "2026" needs to be replaced by "2028."

The Commission requests that this committee pass this measure with the described amendments.

Aloha Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Keith-Agaran, and Committee Members,

I am testifying in strong support of SB 1543 to establish a comprehensive system of public financing for all candidates running for office in Hawai'i. Publicly funded elections are one of the best reforms we can make to our current election system to level the playing field for all candidates and get special interest money out of our campaigns.

SB 1543 would set up a system of fully publicly financed elections, a.k.a. clean elections. It would provide participating candidates with competitive amounts of funding they need to run an effective campaign and would ban them from receiving private donations. A partial public funding pilot system worked very well for Hawai'i County Council races in 2010 and 2012, and fully publicly funded elections programs currently work very well statewide in places like Connecticut and Maine.

We'd like to offer an additional amendment encouraging ALL candidates be subject to the same Campaign Spending Limits regardless of whether they opt in to participate in this program or not. As long as some candidates are subject to additional rules or restrictions regarding partial public funding and spending limits while other candidates are accepting large private donations with no spending limits, there will always be an imbalance that leaves the election process open to corruption and inequities.

SB 1543 is an opportunity to lessen the influence of money in politics, give political power to the people, and restore the people's trust in elections and the legislative process. 74% of the Hawai'i voting public favors enacting public financed elections and ending the influence of corporate and private donations. Public funding for elections is an effective way to engage voters and create participation for a greater diversity of new candidates to run for office. Please pass SB 1543. Mahalo for the opportunity to testify in support of this bill.

In strong support of SB1543

A reform like public financing has been due in Hawaii for many years. With last year's convictions of Senator J. Kalani English and Representative Ty Cullen for cash bribes, ethics in our state government has leapt to the front of the public's collective mind.

Some incumbents dislike public financing because they see it as a threat to their reelection. This is not necessarily the case. The 2012 Maine Policy Review found that "challengers are only more likely to win if they participate in MCEA [the 1996 Maine Clean Elections Act] and the incumbent does not. When incumbents accept public funding, they are actually more likely to win reelection" [1].

SB1543 is a fair bill. It includes every major state and county office, not singling out any one group for a trial, as some previous bills have done. After qualifying, candidates are "barred from soliciting, accepting, or using contributions from" anyone but voters in their districts. Violating the rules brings appropriate penalties, and thorough, regular reporting requirements should prevent abuse.

SB1543 is fiscally responsible. This year the state has plenty of money to fund the 2024 general election cycle. In the future, if funds are insufficient, the program will not be run for that cycle. Amounts will be adjusted with any change in the consumer price index.

Publicly-funded elections will make you and future elected officials better at your jobs. You can spend your time meeting with many constituents, not just a few large donors. Owing only your voters lets you take a principled stand on every issue. You can work on the needs of all voters, not just a few moneyed interests. And you can spend more time doing your real job.

To qualify for public financing, candidates must show a broad base of support in their community (something incumbents already have). That makes any lawmaker more effective and more respected.

Public financing will make your campaign easier. No one likes asking individuals for large sums of money. Public financing will free you from fundraisers and countless phone calls. And the steps required to qualify will help you get to know your constituents better, so you can better speak to their concerns.

It will improve the state legislature overall. Public financing has been shown to increase the diversity

of candidates, including women and people of color, and to encourage interaction between candidates and low- and moderate-income communities. Our elected officials will no longer be just career politicians or people who know the right people, but regular folks from all walks of life—nurses, veterans, small business owners, teachers. Candidates can spend more time on ideas and less time raising money that tends to commit them to special interests.

SB1543 will serve the people who elected you far better than the current system. One of the primary reasons for public funding is to avoid situations like Oahu's rail boondoggle, and the myriad more subtle ways voters' money is wasted. The role of special interests in government decision making will be greatly reduced; the voices of regular people amplified. This is one reason that rates of participation in Clean Election systems are high. They decrease real or apparent conflicts of interest for elected officials.

Public financing will restore faith in our elections and political system. After six years of questions about the integrity of our elections, Americans' confidence in voting needs a boost. Fraud in elections has always been extremely rare, but the corrupting influence of money in politics—real and perceived—continues to erode our confidence in the system.

Finally, it will improve Hawaii's political reputation. Thirteen states use some form of publicly-funded elections, as do 20 local governments [2]. Hawaii's partial public funding program is woefully out of date and underused. With Supreme Court decisions like *Citizens United* deforming our campaigns, a robust public funding system is long overdue. Following our recent passage of reforms like Vote by Mail and Automatic Voter Registration, passing public funding will arguably make Hawaii the most forward-looking state in the union in terms of elections.

SB1543 is a thorough, well-conceived bill with an array of benefits. Common Cause Hawaii strongly urges the Ways and Means Committee to pass it. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.

Aloha Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Keith-Agaran and Members of the Committee,

We support SB1543 SD1 which establishes a comprehensive system of public financing for all candidates seeking election to state and county public offices in the State of Hawai'i, to begin with the 2024 general election year.

It's crucially important that the legislature does everything in its power to remove the influence money has on politics. Candidates work for donations that create relationships that can cause corruption or the perception of it. Money is crucial to winning, for example 91% of candidates who outspend their opponent go on to win. Many elections are uncontested because potential candidates can't afford the high price tag. Furthermore the average house winner spends \$40,000 compared to only \$16,000 for the loser. Over half of all campaign donations in 2022 came from just 980 donors who each gave at least \$6,000.

Clean Elections will create a fairer system. Publicly financed elections will allow candidates to get support from their constituents rather than wealthy donors. As a result, elections will become more competitive with a more diverse set of candidates. Legislators will be free to act on behalf of voters without being concerned about what their donors think. Candidates will also be able to spend more time with constituents rather than fundraising. Furthermore, a system of fully publicly financed elections is supported by 74% of Hawai'i voters.

In addition to being good for our local democracy, the cost of this program is very small. At less than \$25 million, the program will cost less than 0.2% of the state budget. In fact, the state's current general funds balance of \$2.6 billion could pay for over 100 years of clean elections.

Publicly funded elections are already being successfully implemented locally and in other jurisdictions. Hawai'i Island County Council races had this program in 2010 and 2012. Connecticut and Maine have clean elections statewide which are both very popular and successful. Over 70% of Democratic legislators use this program in Maine. Connecticut's program was established to get money out of politics following large corruption scandals.



SB1543 SD1 would set up a system of fully publicly financed elections, a.k.a. clean elections. It would provide participating candidates with competitive amounts of funding they need to run an effective campaign, and would ban them from receiving any private donations at all. This system worked very well for Hawai'i County Council races in 2010 and 2012, and currently works very well statewide in places like Connecticut and Maine.

Chamber of Sustainable Commerce testifies in support of SB1543 SD1, which establishes a comprehensive system of public financing for all candidates seeking election to state and county public offices in the State of Hawai'i and appropriates funds.

As small business owners who believe we can strengthen our economy without hurting employees, consumers, communities or the environment, we urge this committee to vote in favor of passing SB1543 SD1, because this bill brings us one step closer towards a democracy that serves small business owners, workers, and consumers – and one step away from the corrupt corporatocracy in which one must pay to play.

Luxury developers, defense contractors, big pharma, agri-chemical corporations and others give incumbent candidates who do their bidding the max allowable contributions; then they hire lobbyists who give max contributions to these same candidates; and then some of those unchallenged incumbents buy tickets to fundraisers for incumbents who have contested races. These max contributions quickly add up to a campaign war chest that is almost impossible to challenge.

Committee members,

Mahalo for the opportunity to speak before you today. On behalf of the 8,000+ supporters of Our Hawai'i, I stand in strong support for Senate Bill 1543, relating to public financing of candidates to elected office. Our supporters are local people — kama'āina and kānaka maoli, keiki and kūpuna, from Kailua to Kapolei to Kaua'i, Kohala, and every corner of our islands. They have joined our movement to fight for a Hawai'i that puts local people — not big money interests — first, because they are deeply worried about the direction of our islands and believe now is the time for change.

I, too, am worried. At 31, growing up here I was told that things would change if young people "just voted." My whole life I have voted. The first opportunity I got. I have seen new governors, new legislators, new council-members, and what has happened in those 31 years? Median home prices are now over \$1 million, our rent is the highest in the nation, our water is poisoned, our islands are sinking, we are still dangerously dependent on imports of food and other goods, many of my friends can't afford to live here anymore, our teachers and schools are chronically under-funded, and there are more Native Hawaiians now living outside of Hawai'i than in our islands. As crisis after crisis mounts up, transformational action, frankly, fails to come from these halls. Why would my peers and people younger than me believe voting would make things change? We haven't seen it. Not in my lifetime.

Young people and working people aren't voting at higher rates because we're apathetic or don't care. It's because we're akamai; we're actually paying attention. We know that for too long, big money interests: luxury developers, big tourism, big agriculture, energy monopolies, military contractors, and the who's who of the wealthy and well-connected have held a stranglehold over our politics, drowning out the voices, values, and desires of the maka'āinana — the every day working people. Over half of all campaign donations in 2022 came from just 980 donors who gave at least \$6,000. This is a small group of people, maxing out to candidates and committee chairs during elections, to cash in on favors during legislative session and determine what bills live or die.

Our corruption and public trust in government crisis has reached a tipping point, too. After years of the FBI putting our officials in handcuffs, resignations, and scandals, <u>Hawai'i voters as a whole in this past election ranked government corruption as their number 3 top issue, only behind inflation and affordable housing, and 74% favor the adoption of a policy like SB1543 which would provide full public financing of elections and ban corporate and private donations. Public trust is at an all time low. It's not time for band-aids, it's time for real solutions.</u>

SB1543 is that. It's a historic opportunity to get big money out of our politics where it begins, in our elections, allow every day people an equal voice with the rich and powerful, and allow candidates to be beholden only to their voters, their constituents, their values, and their conscience. We know it works, we've seen it in places like Connecticut, Maine, and now Seattle. We know it's popular. In addition to the strong public support, the bill has the backing already of the state Democratic Party,

current and former legislators from both the Republican and Democratic Parties, and was introduced by a historic 40% of legislators in both chambers. We know we have the resources: the program would cost around %.2 of the general budget and with our current surplus alone, could be funded for 100 years.

We have the policy. We have the resources. We have the public desire for change. The only question is do we have the political will? That will be up to you to make it so. As you deliberate, know the public is watching.

Lastly, on a technical policy point, I'd like to attach for the record the request for an amendment to increase the amount of funding allotted in the legislation for Maui County Council Races. This past cycle on Maui County saw out of control spending by corporate, out of county, and even out of Hawai'i interests. Due to the <u>now very competitive nature</u> of the Maui County Council races, the costs of campaigning has increased in recent cycles. This cycle (see attached chart), the average winning amount was over \$58,000, with some candidates spending north of \$100,000. This, of course, does not even include the very robust and expensive <u>independent expenditures</u>.

For all of these reasons, I want to advocate strongly for increasing the Maui Council allocation to at least \$60,000, if not more, for these county-wide races.

In the 2010 and 2012 election cycles, the Hawai'i Island County Council ran a pilot program for comprehensive public funding. Similarly, Connecticut and Maine have instituted statewide clean elections programs, which have proven successful at increasing electoral participation and reducing candidates' reliance on private donations. Over 70 percent of Democratic legislators use public financing to fund their campaigns in Maine.

Hawai'i continues to be embroiled in public corruption scandals, following the bribery allegations that were levied against former Senate Majority Leader Kalani English and former State Representative Ty Cullen. Other public officials, such as employees at local permitting offices,

have also recently been ensnared in bribery scandals, in some cases with connections to Milton Choy, the lobbyist who was responsible for coordinating the bribery scheme that Sen. English and Rep. Chair DelaCruz, Vice Chair Keith-Agaran, and Committee Members:

The League of Women Voters of Hawaii strongly supports SB1543 SD1, which establishes a comprehensive system of public financing for all candidates seeking election to state and county public offices in Hawaii, beginning with the 2024 general election year; requires the Campaign Spending Commission (CSC) to submit progress and final reports to the Legislature; and appropriates funds.

The League of Women Voters of the United States believes that methods of financing political campaigns should enhance political equality for all citizens; protect representative democracy from being distorted by big spending in election campaigns; ensure the public's right to know who is using money to influence elections; enable candidates to compete equitably for public office; ensure that candidates have sufficient funds to communicate their messages to the public; and combat corruption and undue influence in government.

Delegates and voters in the 1978 Constitutional Convention in Hawaii realized the importance of this concept, resulting in the creation of the Hawaii Election Campaign Fund and Hawaii's partial public funding option. Below is a quote from the Convention during the discussion of the HECF:

"... if we think these tremendous sums being spent [on elections], these tremendous sums being contributed, are not sums for which we are going to ultimately pay because of poor government... and because of undue influence... we are fooling ourselves." -Delegate Naomi Campbell during the 1978 Constitutional Convention.

Who funds privately funded elections? Wealthy businesses and individuals. Over half of all Hawaii campaign donations in 2022 came from just 980 donors who each gave at least \$6,000¹. (The sources of campaign contributions changed markedly in Connecticut legislative races after implementation of full public funding. In 2018, 99% of campaign funds used by legislative candidates came from individuals, in sharp contrast to preprogram practices when less than half of the contributions made to political candidates came from individuals.²)

Why could this be a problem? **The affluent have different priorities:** 68 percent of the general public believes politicians ought to see to it that everyone who wants to work can find a job, while only 19 percent of the wealthy believe the same; the general public is twice as likely to support raising the minimum wage high enough to keep families out of poverty as affluent respondents; a majority of Americans think that wealth should be taxed at the same rate as work, but the wealthiest 20% of Americans, who are most likely to make substantial contributions to political campaigns, are those most likely to profit from low taxes on capital gains.³

The broader public is short-changed by policies which may be influenced by wealthy business interests. Publicly funded elections let the voting public have more influence on political decisions, as is widely appreciated by voters. A survey of Hawaii voters in 2022 showed that 74% of the Hawai'i voting public would be more likely to support a candidate who refused campaign donations from out-of-state developers, major landowners, hotel conglomerates, and energy companies and 70 percent of voters were more likely to support a candidate who refused donations from lobbyists and corporate PACs.⁴ When large contributions are made by business interests, it's likely that the customers of those businesses indirectly pay, in higher prices, for these contributions. Again, the public pays for the costs of privately funded

election campaigns. When candidates are funded by the public, politicians are free to make decisions based on the merit of ideas, not biased, consciously or not, by consideration of who gave or will give money to their election campaigns.

Connecticut's Citizen's Elections program (CEP) shows how **full public funding can repay its cost:** "For many years, environmentalists tried to expand the bottle bill recycling program..., but the powerful beverage industry and its paid lobbyists were able to stop every effort at reform because they gave thousands of dollars to legislators. This year (2016), the legislature—with three-quarters of members having participated in the CEP—voted to expand the bottle bill. We also voted to reclaim millions of dollars' worth of unclaimed bottle deposits, which takes approximately \$25 million a year out of the pockets of the beverage industry and puts that money into the general fund where it belongs. This alone recoups more money than the CEP costs".²

Instead of fundraising, candidates can spend more time talking to their constituents or analyzing and discussing solutions to Hawaii's problems as quoted by CT state legislators.²

SB1543 SD1 will support a more diverse field of candidates. Currently people without wealth or wealthy families and friends, who may be politically akamai and interested in running for office, often feel (probably rightly) that they will not be able to conduct winning campaigns, since 90% of races in nationally and in Hawaii are won by the candidate who spends most in an election contest.

These campaign finance objectives, which I believe are widely shared, lead directly to recommending full and realistic public financing of election campaigns and supporting SB1543 SD1.

We Need Money Out of Politics Currently all legislators depend on private donors to fund their election campaigns. These private donors have their own interests and oftentimes those interests are at odds with what's best for Hawai'i and its people. Of the more than \$20 million of campaign money that was donated in Hawai'i during the 2022 election cycle, over half of it came from less than 1,000 donors. This is an extreme consolidation of political power and it is why you see policies like raising the minimum wage and affordable housing that have over 80% support from the public die year after year.

I am writing on behalf of Global HOPE (Hawaii Organization for Peace and the Environment), a registered independent student organization at UH Hilo, in favor of comprehensive public funding for candidates for political office (SB 1543). Global HOPE students supported Hawaii County's Clean Elections Pilot Program of 2010-2012. Based on the experience of the pilot program, we believe that if SB 1543 becomes law, elected officials who may be skeptical of publicly funded elections will realize that they would rather spend their time meeting with their constituents and discussing community issues than hustling for donations.

By passing SB 1543, not only will the playing field for political candidates be leveled, but a more secure trust between voters and representatives can be fostered. There is a responsibility for candidates to abide by the terms set by the people, which is often muddled by the interests of wealthy lobbyists who shift priorities from creating effective policies to having their favors granted. If Hawaii transitioned to public funding, which would alleviate this issue, candidates would no longer have to rely on or act according to outside, greedy influences.

As college students, it often feels as if we are not heard or taken seriously. A recent statistical analysis of US government policy by political scientists Martin Gilens and Benjamin Page confirmed that while the policy preferences of economics and organized groups representing business interests have a substantial impact on what bills become law, the policy preferences of ordinary American citizens have no measurable influence. We hope that our political participation can push the collective voice, but the privatization of elections makes this nearly impossible. The youth's faith in the current political system has eroded and measures need to be taken to reach a state of true democratic process. Gilens and Page have argued that public funding is an excellent way to reduce the corrupting effect of private money. We believe that the cost of clean elections is a small price to pay for the larger humanitarian, environmental, and social problems that result when candidates are sold to the highest bidder. It is necessary for the protection of our planet and the next generation that are forced to live in the less than favorable conditions set by lawmakers.

Good Day, my name is David McCluskey, a former 6 term Connecticut State Representative and one of the members of then-Governor Rell's Campaign Finance Reform Working Group. I am honored to testify in support of your Senate Bill 1543 concerning Public Financing For Candidates To Elected Office.

In 2005, Connecticut became the first state in the nation where legislative incumbents passed a full public financing law that applies to their own political campaigns. Every state has unique legislative and political environments and I am not here to tell you to simply adopt Connecticut's Public Financing law. However, I am testifying that our system works. It has significantly reduced the influence of large moneyed interests in our legislative deliberations and it has made our elections more democratic by having more competition in our primaries and elections.

Since the 1800s, Connecticut has been called the land of steady habits. Change continues to be very hard in my state and asking legislators who know how to get reelected under the existing rules to adopt new campaign financing rules was particularly tough. But we were successful after a lot of struggle both inside and outside our State Capitol. Hawai'i can and should enact public financing of elections to improve the credibility of the legislative process for your state residents and to free legislators from the increasingly chaotic and escalating rush to raise funds.

In Connecticut, candidates must raise small to moderate amounts from residents in the towns they represent. Once they reach the necessary number of in-district contributions and the necessary dollar amount, the state provides them with a reasonable amount to campaign. This process is heavily regulated by the State Elections Enforcement Commission to prevent fraud and abuse. Asking your family, friends and neighbors for reasonable contributions is actually very liberating. I am not burdening them multiple times in a campaign for more and more money. Instead of spending an enormous amount of time raising dollars, I can spend it talking to voters.

Since Public Financing has been adopted, there has not been wholescale ouster of incumbents as was feared. Yes, some incumbents do lose in primaries and general elections, but mostly because they are no longer in touch with their voters, a policy issue or an economic situation, NOT because their opponent was publically funded. Yes, our system can punish incumbent complacency, but their opponent is equally funded, no more, no less. Incumbents still have the advantage in elections if they are doing their job and are talking to their constituents.

In terms of legislative deliberations, incumbents can now vote their convictions and without having to worry about being punished in re-election campaigns by well-healed lobbyists and interest groups who used to provide the lion's share of campaign dollars. Again, this is very liberating to most incumbents and has, in my opinion, significantly improved policy outcomes for Connecticut residents.

In conclusion, I strongly urge Hawai'i to adopt public financing for its state legislative races.

I am Colin Moore, a political scientist and professor at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa. I strongly support SB 1543, SD1. It follows the successful "clean elections" model of public campaign financing currently used in the states of Arizona, Maine, and Connecticut.

In the United States, politics costs money. To raise sufficient funds, candidates rely on wealthy donors and organized interests for support – and this can invite corruption and distort public policy. Challengers often struggle to raise funds because they lack the name recognition and access to networks that benefit incumbents. Over the past decade, an average of 90% of incumbents were reelected during each election cycle in Hawai'i.

Public financing can solve this problem by providing challengers with sufficient resources to run competitive campaigns. More competitive elections often lead to stronger voter mobilization and communication efforts – and this reduces ballot "roll off," which is the tendency of voters to leave ballots blank for less-visible legislative and municipal races. Furthermore, public financing eliminates the need to raise private funds, allowing candidates to spend more time connecting with voters and discussing public policy. This is good for candidates and good for citizens.

A large body of research in political science indicates that generous public campaign financing programs can increase electoral competition, contribute to greater diversity among candidates and donors, and encourage more contact between office-seekers and voters.

For these reasons, I urge you to support SB 1543, SD1.

It affects mailings and the production of print materials--letters, brochures, postcards, etc. it clearly helps decide who gets more votes and is elected. - 4. Correct the Typo? §11-N Section 10. "This Act shall take effect on **March 22, 2075"??** Surely this is a typo or a formality of the process I am not familiar with? Effective start date must be well prior to the 2024 election cycle.

Chair Dela Cruz, Vice-Chair Keith-Agaran and Committee Members:

I strongly support this measure, which would **establish a comprehensive system of public financing for all candidates seeking election to state and county public offices in the State of Hawaii, beginning with h the 2024 general election year.**

Public funding for candidates, not political parties, should be available for all State and County elective offices in both the primary and general elections. This is probably the most important step Hawaii could take to restore the public's trust that elected officials are making decisions without undue influence from the private sector.

The measure does require that candidates receive tangible financial support from voters in their district, which is an appropriate check on the viability of the person's candidacy. Nevertheless, an appropriation of \$30 million deposited into the Hawaii election campaign fund is called for in fiscal year 2023-2024. The measure then appropriates \$200 thousand from this fund for fiscal year 2023-24 and \$200 thousand for fiscal year 2024-25 to prepare for elections taking place in 2024. I defer to the Campaign Spending Commission on the adequacy of these amounts.

It is my sincere hope that the spending limits for elective offices described in the bill will be accepted by potential candidates. Hawaii is searching for a "sweet spot," where candidates find the limits adequate, but taxpayers are not overly burdened. Other states like Maine have successfully taken the plunge, so Hawaii can learn from their success.

The U.S. Supreme Court in its "Citizens United," ruling has already decided that spending limits are unconstitutional unless candidates accept public funding. Let's try a different path here in Hawaii - a public financing program that helps reduce the escalating cost of campaigns, eliminating the reliance on big contributions from wealthy donors. Let's also make it likely that qualified first-time candidates without wealth or access to wealth could be more confident about paying for campaign expenses.

Members of the Judiciary Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this important issue. It's crucially important that we remove the impact money has on our elections. We instead need a robust clean elections system that SB1543 would provide.

We Need Money Out Of Politics Now

The influence that money has on our elections needs to end. A system that requires candidates to raise private funds is simply legal bribery. If we want our government officials to act on behalf of its residents rather than those who fund their campaigns, we need to end the current system.

Money is incredibly crucial in our elections, as candidates who outspend their opponents win at a 91% rate. Of all campaign donations candidates received in the 2022 election cycle, over half of the money was given by just 980 donors who gave at least \$6,000 each. This massive political power by a small group is not democratic.

Too many candidates are reliant on their donors to stay in office and an even larger number of potential candidates don't have the wealthy donor connections that are needed to win. This is a formula for uncompetitive elections and elected officials that respond to a few private interests rather than the public at large.

It's Well Past Time for Clean Elections

In order to get money out of politics, we need to provide a pathway for candidates to win without private campaign donations. SB1543 would do just that. SB1543 would establish a clean elections program that would allow participating candidates to receive enough public funds to win their elections and ban them from receiving any private donations.

Hawai'i County Council races had a very successful clean elections program in 2010 and 2012. Both Connecticut and Maine have statewide clean elections programs that are hugely popular. Over 60% of all legislators in Maine participate in their clean elections program and receive no private donations. Connecticut's system was established as a response to their huge corruption scandals.

If we are serious about ending the corruptive practices that plague our state we need to establish a clean elections program now.

Money in politics holds back progress on all the issues important to local working families: from affordable housing, to cost of living, to protecting our environment, and more. SB1543 would set up a system of fully publicly financed elections, a.k.a. clean elections. It would provide participating candidates with competitive amounts of funding they need to run an effective campaign, and would ban them from receiving any private donations at all. This system worked very well for Hawai'i County Council races in 2010 and 2012, and currently works very well statewide in places like Connecticut and Maine. Partial public financing is not enough. As long as candidates need to rely on private donations to get elected, there will always be the risk of corruption or the perception of it.
