HULI PAC STRONGLY SUPPORTS SB505!

We must prohibit the collection of aquatic life for commercial aquarium pet trade purposes (with exemptions for the continued issuance of Special Activity Permits for public aquariums, research, education, recreational collection, and aquaculture).

It also allows us to further align with our native subsistence fishing practices. It follows the Hawai'i State Constitution by King Kamehameha III, a law that protects the Native Hawaiian Traditions and Customary Rights. Under Hawai'i law, the State and its agencies are obligated to preserve and protect the exercise of traditional and customary Native Hawaiian rights.

The aquarium trade poses a significant threat to marine ecosystems and biodiversity. Removing large numbers of fish and other species from their natural habitats can disrupt the delicate balance of these ecosystems, lead to declines in population numbers, and impact the health of our coral with the lack of healthy symbiotic relationships.

Furthermore, the university of Manoa's study is grossly misrepresentative in data because it begins in the 1990s. In contrast, the aquarium trade desecrated our fish species from the late 1960s before I was born.

- There is no aquarium collecting jobs to lose in Hawai'i
- Aquaculture breakthroughs by O`ahu researchers and businesses mean that Hawai`i's
 most desired and beautiful fishes are now captive-bred and available to consumers
 worldwide
- Hawaii's reefs, residents, taxpayers, and fishers no longer have to lose, so the mainland aquarium pet trade can profit

Given these impacts, which do not benefit our financial economy as well, it is crucial to ban the aquarium trade to protect our oceans and preserve their biodiversity for future generations.

Growing up here as a multi-generational kama'aina, I am a direct witness and observer of the impact of this extractive behavior that has placed our reef's ecosystems into imbalance for many generations. Now we are faced with plankton and food collapse on the table for our near future. We must remember that plankton is responsible for 50% of the oxygen with every breath we take, that our coral reef is the foundation for biodiversity in the food chain, and that these herbivore fish are the protectors of this reef's health and ability to thrive.

Hawai'i County has removed chemical sunscreen on our store shelves to support the regenerative possibilities for the coral in our bays. Our kupunas told stories of identifying large—schools of yellow tang from elevation 1,400 along our bays in Kona. Kona Gold was the original phrase for our plentiful yellow tang that is more often in small schools of 5-10 now when I go snorkeling in areas that continue to be impacted by the aquarium trade. Imagine what we can do if we allow our herbivore fish to regenerate at the plentifulness it needs to be...like they used to.

Please pass SB505 to provide space for rehabilitating our ecosystems and ban this Statewide.

Tropical Marine Centre was a founding supporter, data provider and financial sponsor of UNEP –WCMC's Global Marine Aquarium Database (GMAD) as well as being a founding member of the Marine Aquarium Council (MAC) and became one of the first certified livestock operations in Europe. Tropical Marine Centre maintains a close relationship with our own Government's Department of the Environment and Rural Affairs and assists with the training of CITES Wildlife Inspectors in Europe in respect of identification and handling of CITES listed corals species.

Through the collecting operations in particular in West Hawaii which supplied Tropical Marine Centre, we strongly support the implementation of this initiative. The additional limits on collectors, species and collecting numbers ensure and promote a sustainable fishery in Hawaii and one that benefits and supports the livelihoods of people of Hawaiian descent.

Our industry further supports all efforts by the Hawaiian Ornamental Aquarium Industry to provide supporting evidence for continuing this sustainable and responsible trade in Hawaii, through Environmental impact studies and cultural assessments. The solution provided is well balanced and addresses any environmental concerns given in the past whilst still allowing the fishery to operate and held accountable.

It is important for all stakeholders to note that the Hawaiian marine collecting businesses supplying Tropical Marine Centre already conform to the highest standards of best practice in our industry, this is reflected in the very high quality and condition of collected Hawaiian fish and the low mortality both during transport and post transport to the UK. These mortalities are typically less than 0.3% for the long journey from the Pacific, the onward longevity in our aquariums, with our retailers, public institutes, researchers and with the hobbyist is very high.

We have supported many breeding initiatives throughout the world on over 200 different species being not only responsible for many world firsts in our hatchery but also supportive to various projects in various institutes and nurseries including species typically observed in Hawaii. Captive breeding is seen like a replacement to wild collection and a more sustainable approach, but we do firmly believe through empirical evidence over the last 5 decades that these must go hand in hand with short supply chain fisheries. The species this study targets are unique to Hawaii and should therefore be responsibly managed and any economic benefit as such should be retained by the people of Hawaii. Breeding initiatives are rarely commercially done at source and usually closer to where the market operates for logistical reasons. We truly believe it is important to respect local heritage and sustainable short supply chain establishment that offers a viable and ecologically responsible method of supplying our industry for decades and centuries to come in hand with development of science and aquaculture

I am a scientist and kama'aina community member who has worked in Hawai'i's forests and oceans and with its people for the last 20 years. I work closely with County, State, and federal agencies, the University of Hawai'i, and several other universities, as well as numerous non-profit (including native Hawaiian) organizations across the State to support natural resource management and community involvement. Today, I submit this testimony as a private citizen, but also as the president of the Hawaii Marine Education and Research Center, which was created to support communities and their natural resources.

I submit this testimony in strong support of SB505. Specifically, I support prohibiting the commercial collection of reef wildlife for the aquarium pet trade from Hawaiian reefs for the following reasons:

- 1. Hawaii's reefs are invaluable to native Hawaiian culture, the environment, and the entire way of life in Hawai'i. Commercial collection of reef wildlife for the aquarium pet trade goes against traditional and customary rights in Hawaiian culture which date back more than 1200 years. Yet, this harvesting has occurred for years with substantial reductions in species diversity, abundance, and biomass of herbivorous reef fish, directly impacting food fishers.
- 2. From an ecosystem perspective, harvesting reef wildlife for commercial purposes for the aquarium pet trade by any method will not allow for the recovery of herbivorous fish populations, some of which have experienced nearly eighty percent removal for the pet trade. These drastic reductions take time for the final impacts to be fully realized ecologically and may have yet unknown consequences as Hawai'i's reefs face increasing pressures from climate change.
- 3. From a governance perspective, prohibiting the commercial collection of reef wildlife for the aquarium pet trade is consistent with other Hawaii state constitutional laws upheld by the Department of Land and Natural Resources to protect the environment and preserve its natural resources such as the prohibition on taking coral, sand, rocks, soil, and others.
- 4. The proposed act substantially clarifies and upholds the rules and regulations that when followed will restore and protect Hawai'i's reefs and the natural resources for future generations.

We refer to <u>SB505</u> Relating To Environmental Protection, the subject of a decision- making hearing by the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Environment on Feb. 10.

We understand that Hawai'i's reef fish are threatened by U.S. mainland consumer demand for aquarium fish. Companies outside of the state have outrageously blocked attempts to halt the harvesting of Hawai'i's wild animals so that they can continue to profit off the fish who manage to survive the journey from your reefs to their tanks.

This bill, which has the excellent Hawaiian Humane Society's support, prohibits the harvesting of aquatic life for commercial aquarium purposes, regardless of the method of collection.

We would endorse HH's serious concerns on this trade: capturing wild animals and transporting them thousands of miles in conditions that are often fatal is totally inhumane.

Viz:

Upwards of 40 percent of wild-caught fish bound for pet stores perish before they arrive on the sales floor.

Collection methods include cruel practices such as puncturing swim bladders to bring fish to the surface more quickly.

Fins and spines are cut before transport to enable the use of cheaper, thinner bags.

Fish are starved before shipment so they don't foul the water in the bags.

Animal Interfaith Alliance wrote on several occasions to your previous Governor, Mr. David Ige, on the depredations allowed on your precious reefs.

In Britain, in April 2022, we at last achieved formal recognition of the sentience of fishes, though we still have to see proper implementation of this decision.

We hope that action against the suffering inflicted on fishes will be minimised everywhere in due course.

We are therefore very relieved that you will be debating this Bill and we beg to endorse it.

SB 505 is a job-killing and completely unnecessary bill. Sound science, sound safety practices, and common sense all dictate that SB 505 is nothing more than a renewed attack by environmental extremists on a small and easily targeted segment of the Hawaiian population; aquarium fishermen.

The Pet Advocacy Network appreciates the opportunity to offer our views regarding SB 505, a bill that would enact a complete ban on aquarium fishing without any scientific rationale for doing so. As the country's largest pet trade association, representing the interests of all segments of the pet trade throughout the United States, the Pet Advocacy Network counts among its members national associations, organizations, corporations and individuals involved in the commercial pet trade. More specifically, PIJAC represents the interests of fishers, pet stores, suppliers, distributors, pet supply manufacturers, breeders, retailers and pet owners throughout the state of Hawaii and across the country.

Our association has long been recognized as the voice for a responsible pet trade, and we routinely advocate legislative and regulatory proposals establishing governmental mandates where appropriate to advance the public interest and welfare of pets and the environment. We work closely with US Department of Agriculture and Department of the Interior to ensure effective enforcement of the federal Animal Welfare Act, management of threatened or endangered species and control of invasive species, and have since its inception. We regularly work with federal and state agencies as well as local governments to advance animal welfare and environmental interests.

The idea that the state of Hawaii would kill an entire trade and shut down Hawaiian businesses that have been responsibly operating for decades is unfathomable. To justify the killing of an entire industry, supporters of this legislation have abandoned even the attempts to cherry pick data to support an argument that the aquarium fishing is adversely impacting the environment. Advocates for a ban have realized that the data collected by the State over a period of 20 years, and is widely supported by the



scientific community, overwhelmingly supports the fact that the fishery is sustainable and are making one last, desperate, attempt to shut it down.

SB 505 asserts that the existence of the aquarium fishery is not in harmony with nature or sustainability. As several Hawaiian organizations have pointed out, and a mountain of scientific data demonstrates, this is not the case (see http://www.huntfarmfish.com/blog/). Science has shown that the fishery operates in harmony with nature, and consistent with cultural values. The fishery operates sustainably and in close cooperation with state regulators to ensure that resources are not taken in a way that negatively impacts the ecosystem. Isn't this exactly what every industry in Hawaii should be doing?

We are also greatly concerned that the legislature is being encouraged to take this action at this time. Opponents of the aquarium fishery are well aware that in-depth environmental impact statement and cultural assessment have recently been completed for West Hawaii strongly demonstrating its sustainability and are being conducted for Oahu at this time to identify any bonified cultural issues arising from the fishery. They are concerned that, as with fish population data, the facts will not support their argument, and they are desperate to legislate this sustainable fishery out of business before those facts come out.

The responsible course of action is to withhold judgement of the impact of the Aquarium fishery until the studies have been completed. If there are legitimate conflicts between the fishery and Hawaii's practices, then the fishery is committed to addressing them and finding solutions.

Hawaii's aquarium industry is considered one of the best regulated near-shore fisheries in the world. The DLNR, pursuant to State law, submits a report every five years to the legislature entitled "Relating to the West Hawaii Regional Fishery Management Area." The 2015 Report found that the "The Hawaii marine aquarium fishery is currently the most economically valuable commercial inshore fishery in the State with FY 2014 reported landings greater than \$2.3 million." The regulatory mechanisms covering the Hawaiian aquarium fishery supports the tenets of the sustainable use of renewable natural resources supported in the IUCN's Policy Statement on sustainable use. The Pet Advocacy Network strongly opposes SB 505 and asks the Hawaii Legislature to side with science over unfounded accusations. We ask that you vote NO on SB 505.

With over one thousand members and supporters, the Hawai'i Island Group of the Sierra Club of Hawai'i strongly supports SB505 which seeks to end the commercial taking of reef wildlife for ornamental uses.

As depicted in the photo above, the essential services that fish, such as the yellow tang (Lau'ipala) and gold ring surgeonfish (Kole), provide are part of nature's way of keeping an entire ecosystem healthy. Hawai'i's sea turtles aren't covered with barnacles and other parasites as in other places in the world where coral reefs have collapsed because coral reefs are the deep oceans' "cleaning stations".

In light of the many stressors and impending impacts due to climate change, the value of fish and other marine organisms on our coral reefs, both ecologically and economically, far exceeds any monetary gains that accrue to the few remaining collectors in the state. These fish are indeed, nature's own invaluable "tools" for reef health and recovery!

SB505 thoughtfully carves out reasonable exceptions for select 'takings' at the research, education, subsistence and even recreational levels. These user classes are made distinct and yet protected against the outsized impact of wholesale industrial style collecting operations that seek only to maintain a special profit-making privilege.

SB505 actually helps local fishers and their families. Current history supports this contention along with evidence that since the time that a de facto commercial ban was put in place, a return in abundance of heretofore targeted fish for the aquarium trade, such as the yellow tang, has taken place in areas previously depleted by collecting. Such dramatic improvement in numbers in the last five years puts a lie to the industry's claims that fewer fish were not a result of aquarium collecting in years past, because a similar increase has not occurred in areas long protected from collecting.

It's time to support nature's potential for resiliency. It's time to give reef wildlife the chance it desperately needs, and that we, the majority of Hawai'i's residents, have been asking for. It's time to end the commercial trade of our reef fish merely for ornamental purposes.

With climate change already causing harm to our essential and irreplaceable coral reefs, the rainforests of the oceans, we must take action now. Too much is at stake for the future health of our planet and children.

Please pass and support this long overdue measure.

Dear Chairs Gabbard and Inouye, Vice Chairs Richards and Elefante, and members of the Committee on Agriculture and Environment and the Committee on Water and Land:

Earthjustice is a public interest environmental law firm, with a Mid-Pacific office in Honolulu, that for more than a decade has represented Native Hawaiian fishers and other reef advocates in lawsuits seeking legally valid environmental review of the aquarium pet trade. We hereby submit testimony in <u>strong support</u> of Senate Bill 505. Please note that we attempted to submit this written testimony in advance of the January 30 hearing but were unsuccessful due to technical issues with the capitol.hawaii.gov website.

Commercial aquarium collection has been damaging Hawai'i's reef ecosystems for decades, and the failure to openly declare and analyze those significant environmental impacts has been the subject of four separate lawsuits over the last eleven years. In 2017, the courts prohibited the state Department of Land and Natural Resources from issuing aquarium permits to commercial collectors until the environmental impacts have been fully vetted under Hawai'i Revised Statutes chapter 343, also known as the Hawai'i Environmental Policy Act, or "HEPA."

The courts' early rulings brought promise that the trade, with public and government input, would develop a science-based plan for future extraction that would allow fish populations and the communities that rely upon healthy reefs to thrive. But the HEPA review processes for West Hawai'i and O'ahu quickly devolved into paper exercises that continually ignore commercial extraction's environmental damage and instead propose levels of catch that would maintain the status quo or, in some instances, would dramatically increase take.

For example, for the West Hawai'i revised environmental impact statement ("EIS"), which is currently under review on appeal:

- The proposed take of nearly a *quarter million fish annually* from West Hawai'i reefs, totaling **1.23** *million fish over the five-year period* covered under the revised EIS, rivals historical reported take;
- For seven of the eight proposed catch quotas, take levels are *higher than in most of the last 20 years*; and
- For Potter's angelfish and Thompson's surgeonfish, in particular, the proposed catch quotas represent *three and ten times* the average reported historical catch, respectively.

For the O'ahu EIS, which is currently being revised by the trade after having been rejected by the Board of Land and Natural Resources in October of 2021:

- The proposed take of more than 92,000 fish annually from O'ahu's reefs (totaling more than 460,000 fish over the five-year period covered under the EIS), is more than 20% greater than the average reported historical take of less than 72,000 fish annually;
- For 28 of the 31 proposed catch quotas, take levels are *higher than the average reported historical* levels, including for Yellow tang (35% higher) and Kole (18% higher); and
- The proposed take of more than 200,000 invertebrates, e.g., hermit crabs, annually (totaling more than 1 million invertebrates over the five-year period covered under the EIS), substantially exceeds the average reported historical take of around 165,000 invertebrates annually.

Thus, the trade has continually put forth extraction plans that would conserve and protect the aquarium pet trade instead of Hawai'i's public trust reef resources. Even after more than a decade of litigation and agency proceedings, there is still no environmentally sound plan in place to resume commercial extraction anywhere in the state. And with the trade driving the HEPA review processes, it is doubtful that any such plan will materialize, since the collectors that are financially backing environmental review are incentivized to maximize profits by maximizing extraction levels.

As trustee of public resources, the Legislature should step in and apply a precautionary approach by banning commercial aquarium collection now, before the courts and agencies reopen the trade for business as usual, and before it is too late for Hawai'i's reefs. A statutory ban would proactively protect marine life from overextraction, and conserve limited administrative and judicial resources that would otherwise be expended further scrutinizing the trade's perpetually flawed and environmentally destructive proposals.

For these reasons, Earthjustice strongly supports Senate Bill 505.



I submit the following testimony pursuant to Senate Bill 505, "Relating to Environmental Protection." I offer a comparative assessment of the regulatory landscape of Hawaii's marine aquarium fishery under the Department of Land and Natural Resource (**DLNR**)'s management, and recommend a Vote of NO.

I am Dr. Paul Anderson, a Fisheries Scientist with the Coral Reef Aquarium Fisheries Campaign. The Campaign empowers sustainable coral reef aquarium fisheries that support biodiversity conservation, healthy coral reefs, and the livelihoods of fishers, traders, and others who depend on them across the global value chain.

As you know, judicial proceedings began in Hawai'i over 10 years ago that ultimately resulted in the closure of the commercial of the commercial marine aquarium fishery in West Hawai'i in 2018, forcing fishers and traders to find other means to support their livelihoods. These developments prompted stakeholders in Florida's marine aquarium fishery to engage with The Campaign to conduct a comparative assessment of the regulatory landscape of Florida's fishery and proactively offer this information to stakeholders. This work has been peer-reviewed and published in the journal Marine Policy (Anderson and Pomeroy, 2023).

In it, my colleague Fisheries Economist Dr. Bob Pomeroy and I offer a comparative assessment of regulatory frameworks for marine aquarium fisheries from around the world, including Hawai'i and West Hawai'i. Our assessment reveals that during its operation, West Hawai'i's fishery was regulated under a comprehensive fisheries management plan (**FMP**) for the fishery. An FMP is the cornerstone of a well-managed fishery. Of the 11 locales that we compared around the world, only Australia and Puerto Rico also operate their marine aquarium fisheries under the guidance of an FMP. Furthermore, the DLNR has conducted routine fisheries data analyses of the West Hawai'i fishery over more than a decade to monitor the fishery and understand the effects that its regulations have produced on the densities of species fished over time.

During its operation, the fishery imposed a broad array of conventional fisheries management measures to conserve the fishery. These included input controls: Regulating actors in the fishery by issuing permits to aquarium fishers, imposing gear restrictions and also anti-cyanide regulation (cyanide is a poison sometimes used to stun aquarium fish for easy capture). It also imposed a series of output controls: catch quotas, size limits, and prohibited the catch of certain species. It imposed spatial controls, including Marine Protected Areas (MPAs). Finally, trade regulations in place regulated wildlife import, export, and handling practices pertaining to the fishery.



Thanks to the comprehensive regulatory structure of West Hawai'i's aquarium fishery during its operation, the DLNR's routine fisheries data analyses of the fishery conducted over more than a decade demonstrated robust upward trends of densities for many of the most popular species fished in the fishery (Walsh et al., 2019).

In many ways, West Hawai'i's marine aquarium fishery policy serves as a model for how other fisheries management agencies around the world can establish or build upon their own regulatory constructs for the marine aquarium trade, toward the goals of conserving coral reefs across the globe while simultaneously offering a means for fishers and traders who depend on the natural resources of their land to provide for their livelihoods.

We recommend the Senate vote NO on Senate Bill 505, and once again, offer this pathway for Hawai'i's people to make a living off the land under the guidance of the DLNR's sound fisheries management practices.

I oppose SB 505. I am submitting a 2009 testimonial letter below co-signed with 20 of my colleagues in the Hawai'i science community who recognize the West Hawaii Aquarium Fishery as one of the most thoroughly monitored and managed coral reef fisheries in the world, and with significant published evidence that the fishery is not having any detectable adverse environmental effects. By contrast, opponents to the fishery offer only anecdotal evidence with no long-term rigorous monitoring data comparable to that produced by DLNR biologists.

The 1998 law which established the West Hawai'i Regional Fishery Management Area (WHRFMA) required the DLNR/DAR to present a report to the Legislature every five years on the effectiveness of the WHRFMA. To do so it was necessary to study how the new regulations were working. To accomplish this, DAR in association with the University of Hawai'i Hilo, established a rigorous, scientific monitoring program in 1999 to track changes in reef fish populations and coral reef benthic communities. Over the past 20 years, 82 survey divers have conducted over 2,100 underwater surveys for this monitoring project. Additionally, a number of other scientists have conducted research in West Hawai'i relating to aquarium issues and/or targeted species.

The monitoring data show that the regulations put in place have been very effective in managing aquarium collecting in West Hawai'i. The West Hawai'i Regional Fishery Management Area is among the best studied and most effective fishery management efforts to date, and scientific data clearly show that management is working with population increases of the primary targets. For example, as noted in the 2019 DLNR/DAR legislative report, the populations of the two most heavily collected species of West Hawai'i aquarium fish, Yellow Tang and Kole, which collectively made up 92% of total aquarium catch in (FY17/I8), more than doubled over the past two decades. Their populations even increased in the areas open to collecting likely due to spillover from protected areas.

Concern expressed about the threat of climate changes such as coral bleaching on reefs warrants extreme caution in reviewing activities such as aquarium collecting. This concern over coral bleaching is certainly warranted but somewhat surprising given that the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) leadership has not implemented the 2017 Coral Bleaching Recovery Plan which was developed by DAR and the University of Hawai'i based on the input of over 100 scientists and resource managers from around the world. The goal of the Recovery Plan was to implement management actions to promote coral recovery after bleaching in Hawai'i and the scope of the Plan was much more comprehensive than just focusing on aquarium collecting.

As experienced Hawai'i marine science researchers with a direct/intimate understanding of this issue, we want to re-emphasize that the strong support we are expressing for the fishery is due entirely to the survey efforts and results of the DAR research team. There is a huge amount of data and other information showing that the aquarium fishery is sustainably managed and that

the system works. This type of science-based management should be a model for other fisheries in Hawaii.

This report was published in the peer-reviewed Marine Policy journal, and is entitled "The Future For Hawai'i's Marine Aquarium Fishery: A Cost Benefit Analysis Compared to an Environmental Impact Assessment" (2021).

Properly conducted CBAs are used in environmental impact studies to provide decision-makers the balance required in complex regulatory decisions. Our independently conducted CBA was undertaken to analyze the costs and benefits of Hawai'i's marine aquarium industry for various scenarios and their distribution across stakeholder groups. Four past, (then) current, and proposed management scenarios were explored and the CBA results were compared to the recommendations and conclusions of the FEIS published by the Pet Industry Joint Advisory Council, for the WHRFMA aquarium fishery (before its revision).

Our CBA of the Hawai'i aquarium trade determined that ending the trade was the only option that yielded positive annual benefits, and negatively impacted the fewest stakeholders.

We found that the <u>annual net positive benefit of banning the aquarium trade was upwards of \$440,294,770</u> – factoring in potential costs, including on-reef tourism impacts to Big Island and O'ahu.

Proponents of Hawai'i's marine aquarium industry often site to its potential job creation and tax revenue incentives, however, our study discovered that the comparatively low market benefit of the aquarium trade in Hawai'i accrues only to a small group of collectors, wholesalers and dealers, whereas the majority of the population is subject to the lion's share of costs. Specifically (at the time of our study), 1,415,872 residents, 83% of whom want to see an end to the trade due to environmental, cultural, and ethical concerns with capturing marine life for the pet trade outside Hawai'i bore the losses.

Proponents who support the fishery also ignore the reality of the nature of its **export dynamics** and who is actually realizing the large market benefits of its perpetuation. At least 95% of the fish caught from our public trust resources are being exported and sold to mainland

dealers who mark up the prices before selling the fish again to a retailer or a final consumer. This market supply chain was analyzed in our CBA and we found that U.S. mainland dealers may have a 500% mark-up or higher. In the case of the Yellow Tang, a survey of online U.S. aquaria retailers revealed that Hawaiian Yellow Tangs are being sold for an average price of \$74.41 – a 1,374% mark-up from the \$4.29 base price that Hawai'i sellers retail them for. Even if Hawai'i fishers sell their Yellow Tang to the mainland for \$16, the number we used in our CBA, the mainland retailers may sell that same fish for \$74.41 - which still is a 465.1% mark-up.

This larger market benefit never reaches Hawai'i's economy and accrues in the U.S. mainland states where the fish are resold. Thus, outside stakeholder groups, such as the national and international pet industry retailers, are realizing the largest market benefits of all stakeholder groups. Again, the stakeholder groups who are losing the most are Native Hawaiians, residents of Hawai'i, and Hawai'i's tourist industry. The bottom line is that this fishery is not equitable. Furthermore, the inherent inequity of this fishery has been largely purposefully omitted by industry-led HEPA review.

For the aforementioned reasons, I strongly support SB505 and I urge all members of the legislature who consider this bill for passage to think about the inherent inequities that this fishery poses.

I am writing to urge the BLNR and the state of Hawaii to adopt legislation and rules that allow for the harvesting of aquarium fish when done in a permitted, humane, sustainable, and accountable manner. I oppose SB 505.

My family and I have deep roots in Hawaii and the ocean that surrounds our island home. My father was born and raised in Honoka'a and went on to serve as an officer in the US Navy (serving as security chief at Pearl Harbor) and as a manager in the Hawai'i Health Department after his retirement. My six siblings were all raised and schooled in our hometown of Wahiawa. While some of us have since moved away, we will always call Hawai'i home.

I now live less than a mile from the Pacific Ocean in Fort Bragg, California, but I grew up on O'ahu and graduated from Leilehua High School and the University of Hawai'i at Manoa. While completing my degree in Speech Pathology and Audiology at UH in 1977, I became acquainted with the late Dr. John Craven in the oceanography department and was inspired by his pioneering research and conservation efforts. Recently, I was lucky enough to travel to the Mediterranean in the company of Jean Michel Cousteau. We spent hours talking story about the future of our oceans and the life they support. He convinced me to get my PADI diver certification in Hawai'i a few years later so I could experience our amazing underwater environment firsthand.

One of my first diving experiences in Hawai'i was watching local divers catch aquarium fish individually using humane methods that preserve the coral and ocean floor habitat. It's old-school for sure, and not without inherent risks to the divers. It is not for the faint of heart, the careless or the lazy. Fishing in this manner, with reasonable regulatory oversight, is what keeps the practice sustainable.

Over here, the Mendocino coast and Fort Bragg have relied on the bounty of the ocean for generations - from the native Pomo (and other) tribes to the small-vessel fishing operations that are run out of Noyo Harbor. We know that we can fish sustainably by applying sensible rules regarding the size of catch, the methods of fishing, locations for harvest and so forth. It is anything but a free-for-all. We can do this in Hawai'i as well, through research-based regulations that protect the environment while maintaining the ability of a managed number of fishermen/women to make their living fishing this way. We do not need a total ban to do the right thing, and to do things right

I am a kama'aina science veteran of Hawai'i, with more than 800 scientific publications and a CV indicating decades of focused research on Hawai'i's land and ocean resources and its people. I work closely with County, State, and federal agencies, the University of Hawai'i and several other universities, as well as numerous non-profit (including native Hawaiian) organizations across the State. I submit this testimony as a private citizen, but also as someone well-known for our detailed, long-term monitoring and research across the eight main Hawaiian islands. I submit this testimony in support of SB505. Specifically, I support a permanent ban on commercial collection for aquarium use for the following reasons:

- 1. Fish populations in areas formerly open to collection, in general, remain less abundant than in areas that have been protected from the aquarium trade. So we can say that the recovery of a reef, even after nearly six years of the current moratorium (since 2017), is slow.
- 2. Commercial aquarium activity reduces the number of herbivorous fish in areas that are targeted for collection. Herbivores are critically important to resisting coral-to-algal regime shifts, and scientific data shows that appropriate herbivore management helps to retain reef resiliency during coral bleaching events, which have become much more common in our changed climate.
- 3. Removal of reef herbivore fish in the quantities proposed by the continuing aquarium collection industry threatens to harm the ability of Hawaii's reefs to withstand increases in algal cover, which in turn, diminishes reef biodiversity and reduces the food source that subsistence fisherman rely upon.
- 4. I have personally conducted thousands of dives monitoring coral reefs and reef fish in Hawai'i. At certain sites, I have observed what are known as aquarium collection "corrals," which are formed when collectors crush coral to create flat areas which make it easier for collectors to set their nets to extract greater quantities of fish. Creation of aquarium collection "corrals" has caused significant damage to coral reefs that remains visible for many years.

Constitutional Problems with SB 505 and HB 910

These bills would eliminate Hawai'i's near-shore aquarium fishery. The bill is a significant overreach, has several constitutional deficiencies, and should be returned to the Legislature. Fundamentally, the closure is a hasty response to intense lobbying by outside tourist groups. It is not grounded in scientific consensus, Hawaii Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) previously objected to similar bills based on the lack of any scientific basis, and the bill was introduced again in this form after pervious Legislative and Governor rejection. As a result, it is not well thought out and would create many constitutional headaches for the State, and potential litigation risk, as explained below.

States Role in Public Trust Fishery Management

The State of Hawaii public officers' oath is to uphold the state's constitution. If decisions are made that are biased and not based in legal constitutional means, it violates that oath. It is unconstitutional (State, Federal and International Laws, UN resolution 2749) to shut out any ocean user group. Fishery management for sustainability, not closure is the government's role in fisheries. No one group can lay claim to any part of the ocean, it is a public trust. The court's decision for the aquarium fishery to do an environmental review was not based at all in science

but on legal interpretation. Now that <u>the fishery has completed its</u> <u>environmental review with approval makes it even more legally protected under the law, shut down Bills like SB 505 and HB 910 will more than likely be appealed on these grounds.</u>

Protections for Native Hawaiians

The bill makes no carve-outs or provisions to protect native Hawaiians. The Hawai'l Constitution guarantees that the State will "protect all rights, customarily and traditionally exercised for subsistence, cultural and religious purposes and possessed by ahupua'a tenants who are descendants of native Hawaiians who inhabited the Hawaiian Islands prior to 1778...." Hawai'i Const. Art. XII, § 7. Hawaiians have relied on the islands' near-shore fisheries for centuries, and this bill does not take into account the impacts that a moratorium may have on native Hawaiian livelihood, culture, and way of life.

Public Access to Fisheries

The bill also impermissibly restricts public fishing access. Under the Hawai'l Constitution, "[a]II fisheries in the sea waters of the State . . . shall be free to the public, subject to . . . the right of the State to regulate the same" Hawai'i Const. Art. XI, § 6. The Bills would eliminate an entire fishery, completely denying public access. This goes far beyond mere "regulation" of fisheries and would therefore violate the Constitution.1

Equal Protection and Due Process

The bill also raises significant concerns under the equal protection and due process clauses of the United States Constitution, which are designed to protect against exactly this kind of arbitrary, unsupported government action. Even assuming the bill would be subject to only rational basis review (and setting aside for now the possibility that it would disproportionately impact native Hawaiians), there appears to be no rational basis for the proposed law. In fact, DLNR filed comments objecting to the bill because there is no scientific basis for it at all. The supposed benefits have not been studied, and there is no evidence that the moratorium will do anything to advance the State's purported interests. *See, e.g., Nehring v. Ariyoshi,* 443 F. Supp. 228, 239 (D. Haw. 1977) (concluding that there would be an equal protection violation under rational basis review where the State had not studied alleged environmental benefits and could produce no evidence to support their existence).

Dormant Commerce Clause

SB 505, HB 910 also raises concerns under the Dormant Commerce Clause, which prohibits laws that unduly burden interstate commerce. The moratorium would severely disrupt the interstate aquarium trade supply chain. If the bill halted Hawaiian aquarium fish supply, industry would go to other countries for supply, some of which may tolerate environmentally destructive fishing practices like cyanide fishing. As such, the bill may violate the dormant commerce clause because it would burden interstate commerce in a manner that is clearly excessive in light of the purported (and highly dubious) environmental benefits. See Hughes v. Oklahoma, 441 U.S. 322, 337 (1979) (A state cannot "force those outside the State to bear the full costs of 'conserving' the wild animals within its borders").

Public Trust Doctrine and Takings

The bill could also create legal complications related to the public trust doctrine (under which the State holds water bodies in trust for the people) and the takings clause (under which the State may not take property without just compensation). At this stage, it is not clear that the moratorium is consistent with Hawai'i's public trust obligations. Likewise, it is not clear to what extent compensation would be required for the "taking" of the right to transfer permits. Both of these issues could eventually cause significant hassles.

Conclusion

I think this bill has enough constitutional deficiencies that it should be returned to the Legislature. It is in everyone's interest to pass a law that is based on sound science—not guesswork or lobbying pressure—and that is not vulnerable to constitutional attack. Indeed, if the State could simply prohibit public access to an entire fishery with no scientific basis (as it is doing here), the constitutional right to access public fisheries would have no meaning at all.

Native Hawaiian, environmental, marine and animal protection organizations and businesses are in strong support of SB505, to prohibit the commercial capture of Hawai'ian marine life for aquarium pet trade purposes. Important exemptions should be included for public aquariums, research, education and aquaculture.

This measure is urgently needed now because:

- Herbivores are critical to the survival of Hawai'i's coral reefs in the face of climate change, which, beginning in 2014, destroyed parts of our important reef ecosystems through a series of unprecedented ocean heat waves, and which is forecast to drive annual ocean heat waves as soon as 2030
- Polling has shown 83 percent of residents support a complete ban of the aquarium pet trade.
- The aquarium pet trade has taken millions of culturally significant and ecologically critical reef animals, primarily herbivores, from our reefs for sale to mainland pet stores and for home aquariums outside Hawai'i. This "pet trade" in our reef wildlife yields astronomical mortality rates that would never be tolerated for any other animals sold as pets
- Scientists agree that 70% of Hawai'i's coral reefs could be lost by mid-century from these increasing ocean temperature. Reef herbivores are key to keeping algae over growth under control on our coral reefs
- Hawai'i's food fishers are suffering impacts of the aquarium trade due to poor regulation See: DLNR 2020 report to the legislature and DLNR grant report to NOAA.
- The most heavily targeted species (mostly reef herbivores) on O'ahu reefs have been depleted by the aquarium pet trade by 90%, See; Grabowsky and Thornhill 2020

DLNR data show:

Herbivore abundance significantly increases once aquarium collecting stops. Aquarium collecting has been prohibited under court order in West Hawai'i since 2018, and statewide since January 12, 2021, given the decades long illegal issuance of permits and licenses for aquarium collecting without first requiring environmental review under Hawai'i's Environmental Policy Act (HEPA)

- The 2018 West Hawai'i aquarium collecting ban resulted in the largest increase in yellow tang herbivore abundance ever documented on those reefs (DAR data)
- Without aquarium collection, O'ahu's reefs stand to benefit with a gain at least 81,000 herbivorous and other fishes each year (based on historical catch reports)

Additional Benefits of SB505

- · SB505 Saves the public money:
 - DLNR estimates it costs taxpayers upwards of \$500,000 annually to administer and manage the aquarium trade, not including enforcement costs, yet it only receives a mere \$23,480 in permit fees and taxes. Ending the trade would save taxpayers hundreds of thousands of dollars annually
 - Independent peer-reviewed cost-benefit analysis shows ending the trade would yield both direct and indirect market value in reef tourism in the amount \$440,000,000 annually.

The 1998 law which established the West Hawai'i Regional Fishery Management Area (WHRFMA) required the DLNR/DAR to present a report to the Legislature every five years on the effectiveness of the WHRFMA. To do so it was necessary to study how the new regulations were working. To accomplish this, DAR in association with the University of Hawai'i Hilo, established a rigorous, scientific monitoring program in 1999 to track changes in reef fish populations and coral reef benthic communities. Over the past 20 years, 82 survey divers have conducted over 2,100 underwater surveys for this monitoring project. Additionally, a number of other scientists have conducted research in West Hawai'i relating toaquarium issues and/or targeted species.

The monitoring data show that the regulations put in place have been very effective in managing aquarium collecting in West Hawai'i. The West Hawai'i Regional Fishery Management Area is among the best studied and most effective fishery management efforts to date, and scientific data clearly show that management is working with population increases of the primary targets. For example, as noted in the 2019 DLNR/DAR legislative report, the populations of the two most heavily collected species of West Hawai'i aquarium fish, Yellow Tang and Kole, which collectively made up 92% of total aquarium catch in (FY17/18), more than doubled over the past two decades. Their populations even increased in the areas open to collecting likely due to spillover from protected areas.

Concern expressed about the threat of climate changes such as coral bleaching on reefs warrants extreme caution in reviewing activities such as aquarium collecting. This concern over coral bleaching is certainly warranted but somewhat surprising given that the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) leadership has not implemented the 2017 Coral Bleaching Recovery Plan which was developed by DAR and the University of Hawai'i based on the input of over 100 scientists and resource managers from around the world. The goal of the Recovery Plan was to implement management actions to promote coral recovery after bleaching in Hawai'i and the scope of the Plan was much more comprehensive than just focusing on aquarium collecting.

As experienced Hawai'i marine science researchers with adirect/intimate understanding of this issue, we want to re-emphasize that the strong support we are expressing for the fishery is due entirely to the survey efforts and results of the DAR research team. There is a huge amount of data and other information showing that the aquarium fishery is sustainably managed and that the system works. This type of science-based management should be a model for other fisheries in Hawaii.

The agency tasked with managing this fishery has done an exemplary job, employing sound scientific management practices with positive results. There is now a documented history of endless attempts to close Hawaii's Aquarium Fishery with year after year of ban bills, yet every last one has failed when coming up against the test of science and logic. We're talking over a decade at this point. I would ask all who are considering this bill to look back to all the prior attempts to close this fishery, and all the commentary and evidence submitted at that time. The fishery and those who manage it have endlessly proven their side, while those opposed have failed to do so.

However, when years of attempts to legislate the aquarium fishery out of existence failed, those looking to scapegoat the trade turned to the courts, arguing successfully that the fishery was somehow subject to laws requiring environmental impact statements. As a result, the fishery was hampered and then closed, while fishermen did the required homework to meet this latest challenge and obstacle to their livelihoods. Meanwhile, no other comparable fishery in the state has been held to this high standard. Other fisheries that target the same fishes, such as spearfishing, were allowed to continue uninterrupted. And during all this the Marine Ornamental Aquarium Fishery actually successfully passed the test, and is slated to reopen, while confronted with endless attempts to stop it.

And now, with fishermen ready to return to their livelihoods, the judicial backdoor ultimately proving ineffective, those opposed have just returned to the same annual parade of trying to legislate a proven-sustainable, "gold standard" fishery out of existence. Why?

I can only presume at this point that it's easier to scapegoat a small, well-managed fishery, for all the problems one might find on Hawaii's coastal waters, rather than examining anyone else. Hawaii's fishermen were simply an easy target...particularly if you need to turn a blind eye to coastal pollution and development.

I'd ask everyone tasked with considering this bill to ask one simple question. If Hawaii's fishermen must successfully defend their trade year after year, with no end in sight, while those opposed must only win once to enforce their will on the little guy, is this a remotely fair fight? At what point do we say "enough is enough" and end the relentless attempts to close a fishery and put fishermen out of work, when the science and data say there is no reason to do so?

I am all for a well-managed, sustainable fishery. Some point to the idea of captive propagation and aquaculture as suitable alternatives, but we seldom ask whether these practices are actually truly BETTER than the sustainable, managed harvest of what is naturally produced on the reef. In some cases, aquaculture may actually have a larger, negative impact on the environment, particularly if contrasted against a small-scale, well-managed, sustainable fishery.

If Hawaiii's marine aquarium fishery is to be legislated out of existence, it will be abundantly clear that sound science and logic are being thrown out as well. Hawaii's legislators ought to put a moratorium on the re-raising of this issue, and focus on dealing with actual problems, not on the scientifically proven, well-managed fishery that is controlled by the states DLNR / DAR.

It is high time that legislators ask the hard questions of those who oppose this fishery, yet turn a blind eye to all the other LARGER impacts that actually may be negatively affecting Hawaii's reefs? This endless debate is clearly one of ulterior motives and scapegoating, as one must ignore all the science and data to make the argument that the fishery on the whole is being mismanaged or is detrimental.

Aloha,

To whom it may concern. I am strongly opposed to SB505.

I have been fascinated with and have kept marine organisms for nearly 50 years. I'm also very interested in aquaculture and have spent many years learning fish behavior and how to get them to pair up. I would like to work with Hawaiian fish which would help to ease some of the "pressure" of collecting wild specimens. A good example of that is the Yellow Tang, which Hawaii is known for. They are now being captive bred at Oceanic Institute of Hawaii in partnership with the Biota Group.

Page 2, lines 6-10 does not tell the whole story. It says that DLNR estimates that it costs the taxpayers \$500,000 a year to manage, yet it generates only \$25,000 in revenue for the State. That \$25,000 is probably just General Excise taxes paid by fish collectors. But for the economy it creates much more through the fishing industry infrastructure (e.g. Fish Collectors, Pet stores, Wholesalers, Shippers, Airlines, Aquarium Maintenance Services, etc.). The fish exports also brought in out-of-State money. We need other industries in Hawaii besides tourism.

I disagree with page 2, lines 11-17 saying that prohibiting commercial fish collecting would be consistent with prohibiting the taking of sand, rocks, etc. The sand comes from the eroding corals, coral rubble, etc. Fish propagate every year. When fish are collected that opens space for the next generation. I believe fish can be a manageable renewable resource.

Page 3, lines 3-14 allows for permits for non-commercial use. However, this does not really help me get the specimens that I need. I would have to become SCUBA certified, buy or rent SCUBA gear, buy fish collecting gear, buy or rent a boat, find a dive partner, etc. It is not very practical. Fish collecting is a skill that is learned over years. I don't want to spend years of my time learning that, just to get the fish that I want. Then I would have to find out where and when to collect them. Having people collect their own fish will most likely create more diving accidents and deaths with novice divers. I would want someone skilled in fish collecting to be able to safely collect and deliver healthy specimens. I wouldn't know how to decompress a fish when bringing them up from deeper waters.

Banning fish collecting is not a good answer. We need to compromise, I believe this can be a well managed industry.

Please vote to oppose this measure.

I am also someone who has been involved with every aspect of the Aquarium Trade for almost 4 decades. I have seen fisheries come and go. I have seen millions of fish shipped into the United States. To this day I weekly see the import of multiple shipments of fish and corals from around the world.

In reading some of the support of this bill I was absolutely stunned by how people threw statistics into their writings, without any support or proof. Decimation, Annihilation, Extinction - All words that were used by one person or another - Against one of the best regulated and monitored fishing industries in the world.

Statistics about how much of the catch dies before reaching the mainland are absolutely false. Hawaii is the shortest and easiest flight to the mainland. This makes it the easiest trip for fish to make to the United States. The least amount of places for fish to get mishandled. And the shortest time any Pacific tropical fish spends in a bag to be transported. The numbers being reported from annonymous sources are just not fact.

I personally keep an aquarium with Hawaiian fish in it. I have 4 fish that are going on 14 years of living with me. And they seem quite happy (and very much alive).

The aquarium hobby is not just a box of water with ornamental fish. Caring for these fish takes an education. And teaching children how to maintain such environments within their own control is one of the best means of educating them as to how they can control what happens within their own environment they live in. How critical maintaining an environment is within an aquarium is only a window as to what it takes to maintain an environment for human life to thrive.

Post pandemic the cost of the livestock for the aquarium industry has almost tripled due to transportation costs and supply chain issues. Hawaii being the closest location for Pacific Tropical fish to the mainland makes it one of the least expensive to ship from there by making the costs of the livestock more affordable. Now, I fully understand that the arguement for this bill - Having less expensive livestock is pretty low. But as for making the aquarium hobby available to this generation and the next it provides a reasonable means of acquiring and caring for livestock to maintain their own private eco systems.

Natural Resources (DLNR) – Suzanne Case, stated Hawaii's Aquarium Fishery is a "Model Fishery". She later recanted this statement in favor of tourism. With many reef fish populations on the rise overall, Hawaii's Aquarium Fishery is the true definition of "Sustainability." Abundant small fish are taken leaving breeders to repopulate making the aquarium fishery a "Model Fishery".

Hawaii's <u>leading scientists speak</u> out in opposition to the DLNR Land Boards' decision not to approve the environmental review of the West Hawaii Aquarium fishery. This review was based on much of this scientific research and then they were not even questioned or consulted about the board decision. It was like science did not matter.

Hawaii's top marine biologists William Walsh Ph.D., Ivor Williams Ph.D., Brian Tissot Ph.D.; Leon Hallacher Ph.D.; Bruce Carlson Ph.D.; Charles Birkeland Ph.D.; Jeremy Claisse Ph.D.; Mark Christie Ph.D.; Richard Pyle Ph.D.; Leighton Taylor Ph.D.; Randy Kosaki Ph.D.; Cynthia Hunter Ph.D.; Brian Bowen Ph.D.; Brian Zgliczynski Ph.D.; Jeff Ebel Ph.D.; Alan Friedlander Ph.D.; Kosta Stamoulis Ph.D.; Delisse Ortiz Ph.D.; Jan Dierking Ph.D.; Rob Toonen Ph.D.; and Jim Beets Ph.D. Thursday, June 25, 2020, all signed the letter condemning the BLNR land board's decision not to approve fisheries environmental review. Why? Because the fishery is sustainable.

Since Honolulu is the most remote city in the world and our economy is <u>Hawaii imported</u> 179 million dollars in goods and exported only 24 million in goods. Hawaii is too dependent on tourism, imports, overseas food supplies, and nonrenewable resources.

Hawaii's leading exports are Iron steel scrap, aircraft parts, aluminum waste, and copper waste from goods that were imported. Only one renewable export made the top ten export list, shrimp aquaculture. Aquarium aquaculture is a must for a sustainable Hawaii. Aquaculture and many other businesses depend on the aquarium fishery.

Hawaii's major problem we face is that "Every day 30,000 tourist flying to Hawaii creates more Global Warming CO2 gas emissions than if you drove your car for 13,000 years".

1. Tourism is the most unsustainable business activity with the highest carbon footprint produced. 80% of tourists also do ocean activities and create huge ocean impacts much more so than any Hawaii fishery. Tourism is also too vulnerable to be depended on, just look at what happened during covid and 911. Tourism crashes will happen again and may take many years to recover.

For Hawaii to become sustainable we must change to sustainable, low-carbon footprints, and concentrate on renewable resources used for Hawaii's major exports and businesses.

In ancient Hawaiian culture in order to survive with the only resources available on these tiny islands you had to be sustainable, or you were dead. A major part of that renewable resource survival was fishing! Sustainable fishing is historically an important Hawaiian resource! Many Hawaiians and their families are supported by the aquarium fishery.

Ocean tourist groups have complained that there are no more fish at their dive and snorkeling sites. News article discusses the loss of fish in tourist areas. Recent studies showed the return of fish to Hanauma bay when tourism stopped due to covid. Now that tourism has returned to the bay, more research showed fish are disappearing again! The large groups of tourists have scared the fish out of these areas. Huge tourist snorkel and dive groups greatly impact fish feeding and reproduction behavior affecting fish populations. Unlike tourists, Fishermen do not go to the same areas day in and day out in large numbers, fishermen rotate their sites to prevent overfishing. Are tourism impacts being used to blame the aquarium fishery? Aquarium fishermen do not go to tourist areas, but more and more tourists are coming into and taking aquarium fishing areas away from fishermen. The 20 years of FRA fish replenishment aquarium fish fish counts off West Hawaii show an increase in overall fish populations so why are tourist areas having fewer fish and why is the proven sustainable fishery closed?

The juvenile fish come in massive waves continually throughout the year and they come in numbers that overload the reefs...we are talking about millions upon millions arriving constantly. As they drop in on the reefs they are being consumed, displaced and overflow into places they will not even make it. Taking a small amount from these massive recruitments is inconsequential to say the least and the science reflects that. Other fisheries catch the largest fish, the lucky ones that made it though the struggle of life. These mature fish are in much smaller numbers. Conventional fishing and aquarium fishing have totally different approaches but AQ fishing truly is unique, and has a natural resiliency factor built in unlike any other fishery

My family and my fellow fishers have been through Hell these last few years. Our fishery was forced into an environmental review which we did. We got put under a spotlight and scrutinized like no other fishery EVER has. We've spent all of our savings to pay legal fees because we believe in this fishery, we believe in the truth. Our families and our lives have been seriously impacted by all of this .For years this has been going on and we haven't even been allowed to fish....it's been kapu. Now that the land board and the courts have confirmed that what we claim to be true actually is, the legislature is going to ban us? Make this make sense. This is the most sustainable and well managed fishery in the state of hawaii bar none. Our opposition is misguided and unwilling to listen to opinions that differ from theirs. They will not accept the facts or what is right. They will not listen to the scientists and experts that oversee this fishery and study it. Hopefully the legislature will. Please do not ban us, listen to the scientists and allow this long process to play out.

The marine aquarium fishery in Hawai'i is one of the best-regulated and most sustainable fisheries on the planet, and by far the best-regulated and most sustainable fishery within the state. This fishery has little to no effect on our reefs, and banning the collection of marine organisms for aquariums will have essentially no positive effect on the health or condition of reefs in Hawai'i.

Instead, I belive that this bill would ultimately be seriously detrimental to our reefs, and to the people who depend on them. A substantial fraction of the marine scientists that I know and work with (myself included) became inertersted in the ocean because we kept marine aquariums when we were younger. Many of us would not be working on ocean conservation, sustainability, and other issues critical to the people of Hawai'i if we did not have the experience of keeping aquariums. Hence, a well-regulated and sustainable aquarium fishery in Hawai'i, like the one that we have had for decades, is critical for training the next generation of scientists.

I oppose this bill because it would only cause harm and no tangible benefit. The aquarium fishery in Hawai'i is already exceptionally well-regulated and sustainable (indeed, it is a model for the world about how to do things well). Beyond that, it would take away the educational opportunities that I enjoyed when I was younger by keeping marine aquariums from the next generation. These interests led me to complete a PhD in oceanography at UH Manoa, and I have been working on issues related to coral reef health for the last 14 years. We should not stifle the capacity of our keiki by removing these opportunities.

I urge you, do not infringe upon coming generations by removing their ability to keep Hawaiian reef fish in an aquarium. Do not destroy their inspiration to study marine science. Do not let a vocal minority outweigh the science which shows the sustainability of this fishery. Supporting this bill would be to the detriment of all of us.

The bill you are hearing today (SB 505) to ban the aquarium industry from the State of Hawaii, would have been appropriate 25 years ago. At that time there were virtually no rules or regulations from DLNR and local citizens were seeing dive sites crushed and mangled, barren of fish. There was a dumpster of dead yellow tangs and other ocean creatures, the sight of which infuriated the local people. Threats were made on both sides. I myself was threatened.

However, this bill is totally uncalled for now. The problems and issues that made the topic so controversial then have almost totally been remedied.

In those 25-ish years good people from many different ocean interests worked together as the West Hawai'i Fisheries Council, an advisory body to DLNR. We would listen to concerns that came up and try to find a reasonable solution. We would then vet the proposal throughout various communities to see if there was enough support that DLNR would take it into their rule-making process. Everything that we proposed ended up being put in Hawai'i Administrative Rules. Some things that were accomplished:

- Establishment of nine Fish Replenishment Areas (FRAs), comprising more than 35% of the shoreline along the Kona Coast, where aquarium collecting was forbidden.
- Appropriate markings for AQ boats; gear restrictions when in an FRA, etc.
- Brokered a deal between a local community and the aquarium collectors to swap FRAs due to public antagonism. In the long run the aquarium collectors graciously gave up their section
- No spearfishing at night anywhere along the Kona Coast.
- Net size restrictions on lay gill nets. This proposal went on to become effective statewide.

• Assistance to the Ka'upulehu Marine Life Advisory Council as they put together a proposal to present to DLNR for a no-take zone in their ahupua'a. Help with drawing up the document and taking it out to local communities for input.

There are many more. The scientific data taken and compiled for these long years show that the populations of the most heavily collected fish are rising and the management plan is working. This is one of the most highly regulated fisheries in the state and the most successful.

It is safe to say that the AQ industry today is not the same industry it was 25 years ago.

Please don't waste the legislature's time and effort. The problem has already been resolved.

I am against this bill for the following reasons:

- It is not scientifically based. Well-respected, environmentally responsible, and prominent marine scientists such as Dr. Bruce Carlson, Dr. John Randall, and Dr. Howard Pyle have written and spoken in support of commercial aquarium fish collecting in Hawaii. They found it to be the best studied fishery in the world, sustainable in the long-term, and of low impact to the bigger marine environment.
- The marine aquarium hobby provides a direct way for citizens of all demographics to learn what is needed to maintain the health of marine life and to advocate for reasonable measures to protect the larger marine environment.
- "Out of sight is out of mind," as the adage goes. With a reduced presence of marine life in home aquaria for people to enjoy and learn from, concern for the health of our marine environment would likely diminish.
- Keeping aquarium fish encourage young people to pursue science. It happened in my case and has greatly enriched my life. I now work to educate others on marine science and do scientific work on marine biodiversity.
- A lack of presence of aquarium fishes from Hawaii, which have been, in general, collected using very high standards, will result in collecting in areas of the world where collecting practices are very poor, to include use of such poisons as bleach and cyanide. This would cause greater harm on fish populations and the greater marine environment worldwide.
- Commercial tropical fish collecting focuses on younger animals because they are more adaptable to an aquarium setting and hobbyists want animals that can live for more years in their tanks. Most of these young fishes would not survive in the wild due to predation and disease, so the relatively few that are taken for the aquarium hobby make little impact on wild populations. What needs greater protection are large adult individuals with high reproductive capacity and these are the specimens not targeted by tropical aquarium fishermen.
- Many reef species are incredibly fecund and breed regularly, some almost daily, so population replacement rate is high, as long as large, mature fish are protected.

- There have been examples of fish handling abuse in Hawaii, but those have been rare and blown out of proportion in terms of prevalence. Regulations need to be in place to penalize abusers, but responsible tropical fish collecting needs to be sustained.
- I implore decision makers not to be swayed by purely emotional appeals to ban commercial tropical fish collection and trade from Hawaii. This decision must be done with objectivity and a balanced perspective.
