FIRST DAY

Wednesday, January 21, 1970

In accordance with Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, the House of Representatives of the Fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1970, convened at 10:00 o'clock a.m.

The Honorable Tadao Beppu, Speaker of the House of Representatives, presided.

The Chair appointed Representatives Alcon, Duponte, Baptiste, Kimura, Kato and Oda to escort the Very Reverend Robert R. Mackey, Chancellor, St. Louis-Chaminade Education Center to the rostrum.

The Chair declared a recess at 10:03 o'clock a.m., subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 10:06 o'clock a.m.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Very Reverend Robert R. Mackey.

The Chair appointed Shigeto Kanemoto as Temporary Clerk.

The Chair appointed Representatives Oshiro, Chairman, de la Cruz, Garcia, Iha, Kunimura, Lee, Menor, Soares and Suwa as a Committee on Credentials.

MISCELLANEOUS COMMUNICATION

A communication from the Honorable Akoni Pule (Misc. Com. No. 1) submitting his resignation from the House of Representatives from the Fifth

Representative District was read by the Temporary Clerk and was referred to the Committee on Credentials.

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

“A P P O I N T M E N T

WHEREAS, the Honorable Akoni Pule, a member of the House of Representatives of the State of Hawaii from the Fifth Representative District and a member of the Democratic Party, whose term ends at the next general election, resigned from the House of Representatives of the State of Hawaii on October 31, 1969; and

WHEREAS, Section 17-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, enacted pursuant to Article III, Section 6 of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, provides that whenever any vacancy in the membership of the House of Representatives occurs, the Governor shall make an appointment to fill the vacancy for the unexpired term, and such appointee shall be of the same political party as the person he succeeds; and

NOW, THEREFORE, I, JOHN A. BURNS, Governor of the State of Hawaii, pursuant to the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of the State of Hawaii, do hereby appoint MRS. SARAH PULE as of this date as Representative of the Fifth Representative District to fill the remainder of the unexpired term of the Honorable Akoni Pule.

The Chair declared a recess at 10:11 o'clock a.m., subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 10:56 o'clock a.m.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE REPORT

Representative Oshiro, Chairman of the Committee on Credentials, presented a report (Spec. Com. Rep. No. 1) stating that the Committee on Credentials had examined the letter of resignation of Representative Akoni Pule from the Fifth Representative District and Governor's Message No. 1 appointing Sarah K. Pule to fill the vacancy created by the resignation, and Departmental Communication No. 1 regarding the certificate of election of Hiram L. Fong, Jr. from the Fifteenth District, and recommending that Sarah K. Pule and Hiram L. Fong, Jr. be seated as members of the House of Representatives.

On motion by Representative Oshiro, seconded by Representative Garcia and carried, the report of the Committee on Credentials was adopted.

The Chair thereupon directed the Temporary Clerk to call the roll which, being done, disclosed the following were

The Chair appointed Representatives Shigemura, Heen, Roehrig, Ajifu, de la Cruz and Wakatsuki to wait upon the Honorable Benjamin Menor, Judge of the Third Judicial Circuit, to request him to administer the oath of office to Representatives Fong and Pule.

The Chair declared a recess at 10:59 o'clock a.m., subject to the call of the Chair.

At 11:00 o'clock a.m., the House of Representatives having reconvened, the said Committee reported to the Chair that the Honorable Benjamin Menor was in attendance.

The Chair then appointed Representatives Inaba, Takamine, Minn, Loo, Devereux and Lum to escort Representatives Pule and Fong to the rostrum.

OATH OF OFFICE

The oath of office was administered by the Honorable Benjamin Menor, in

accordance with the provisions of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, to Sarah K. Pule and Hiram L. Fong, Jr., as members of the Fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii.

At this time, the Speaker congratulated the two new members and addressed the members of the House as follows:

"This morning we begin not just a new session, but the first session of a new decade. We know, of course, as Thomas Mann said, 'Time has no divisions to mark its passage, there is never a thunderstorm or blare of trumpets to announce the beginning of a new month or year.' And yet, caught up as we are by our own arbitrary clock and calendar, it would be difficult not to feel a special zest, a fresh breath, a new surge of hope, rising from this beginning.

You are as aware of the problems confronting us as I am and it is not my intention this morning to try and summarize them. I will touch briefly on the direction some basic legislation must take if we are to cope with some of our problems. These haven't really changed much in the past year in sum or substance and neither have our commitments.

We have always held that education is the major means of preparing each individual for a more productive life and pledged our support of programs that will improve the quality of education from grade school through the university. This we did last year and we will continue to do so this year. We are aware that merely pouring more money into our educational system does not automatically improve the quality of education. We must, and do monitor the manner in which funds are utilized to insure their optimum use in terms of benefits received for each dollar spent.

Taking a paragraph from my opening address last year, I stated: 'We must continue our efforts to improve the physical and social well-being of the individual. We have reached a stage of development where urban problems, and

the concomitant problems that they create, are fast creeping upon us and casting an ominous shadow over our land. We must find a means to provide adequate housing at a reasonable price for all. We must seek to reduce the cost of living through better planning and greater efficiency in our operations in both the public and private sectors. We must explore ways in which to provide for the fast and efficient transport of persons and goods to, and within, the urban complex. We must ensure the security and safety of the individual in his home and in the street much as we must preserve the sanctity of his right to express freely his thoughts and dissent. We must pay increasing attention to the right of the individual to expect honest and fair treatment in the conduct of his normal daily transactions, and to seek to provide him with some measure of protection against unconscionable requirements, private or public. And while we are busily engaged in attempting all this, we must also promote the preservation of our natural beauty, our open space, our recreational areas, and our cultural heritages for these are just as essential to a good life for all the people of Hawaii.' This is a part of the speech that I made last year.

We did exceedingly well in most areas during the year 1969, but we still have more to accomplish. But overall, we did much to improve the well-being of the individual. This year, there may be some changes in emphasis as to our most pressing needs but our goals remain basically the same.

There is an audible concern about our natural environment and increasing demands for immediate action of one kind or another to same one part of another. But this is only one face of the coin. The problems of environment encompass both our natural and social environment. They are perforce, interrelated. We cannot divorce one from the other and attempt to apply specific treatment to alleviate the problems in one without affecting the other.

A lot of people, without really considering it in depth, think they know what their environment is like. As legislators, we must grasp what it is — what our natural and social environments are, how intricately they are linked. This does not require a detailed knowledge of any one discipline but a firm understanding of the interrelatedness of all things in this closed system we call Earth. Their interaction and the chain of consequences flowing from it will take place whether we think ahead about it or not. By being aware and planning ahead, we can attempt to channel and cope with the direction of the flow so that we are not suddenly surprised when we are swamped with the consequence. We must be constantly alert so that we can recognize the forces operating to change our natural and social environment. We must respond to the challenges and the problems of developments generated by these forces and the opportunity they present for constructive action. We need to design legislation which will make maximum use of our technology and our resources to bring our natural and social environments into harmony — to have them complement one another in order to improve the quality of our lives. I believe this to be a prime consideration that must underlie basic legislation to be enacted this year.

In dealing with our housing problems, for example, it is essential not only that we come up with more houses within the economic reach of our people, but that we take positive steps to cope with the way such additional housing in a given area will affect the natural and social environment.

Conversely, in dealing with pollution of our natural resources, it is not enough to say that all activities which endanger our resources should suddenly stop. Our social institutions are involved in many legitimate activities which contribute to our pollution problems, directly or indirectly, and ways must first be provided to allow them to continue their activities without adversely affecting our

natural resources. To do otherwise may create chaos in our social environment.

It is often easier to bemoan the negative, for the bad tends to loom more dramatically and vividly. We need to see the bad but, more importantly, we must have sufficient vision to appreciate the positive so that we can work to bring about a suitable accommodation within the confines of a healthier environment. This holds true whether the area of concern is housing, pollution, education or tourism.

I am looking forward to working for — and achieving — further improvements in the legislative process this session and in the near future. I am confident that we can accomplish this because in recent years, the Hawaii legislature has in fact become a model for many states which have sought to emulate the progressive methods and ideals initiated by you as legislators. This kind of recognition has come about only through your diligence to your task as well as your responsiveness to the needs of our society and the concerns of your constituents. I frequently receive many fine comments from legislators of other states on the quality of our work and the high caliber of our legislators. That they look to us for guidance in improving their legislation processes and their laws reflect great credit to you as legislators, especially as members of this House of Representatives.

My basic philosophy has always been toward a more open legislative process where all legislators and the public may participate rather than one governed by the dictates of one man or a few mortal men. As Justice Holmes pointed out, 'the ultimate good is better reached by free trade in ideas.' Arbitrarily preventing that free trade may make for efficiency but not necessarily for the ultimate good. The delicate balance must be kept. Authority in its truest sense is not dispensed from the top. Acceptance from below is the cornerstone. But this acceptance, this accord, must be meaningful, not simply mechanical. I believe that it must spring

from enlightened will. For, in the words of President Franklin D. Roosevelt, 'Democracy alone, of all forms of government, enlists the full force of men's enlightened will ——. ' I view the legislative process as one where responses must be meaningful, not mechanical. Power is not the name of the game for we are not playing games. We hold in our hands the key to the future, and the turn of the key, I submit, should not be the province of one man or a few men, but the will of the majority of this body as a whole.

The people of Hawaii have accorded us high honor and an awesome responsibility. Let us now, as we begin, shoulder the responsibility and with the help of all, grasp for ourselves and our posterity that which we determine to be the best for Hawaii.

Thank you and Mahalo!"

At this time, Representative Soares, on behalf of the Minority, stated as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, with a sense of pride and determination, the House Republicans begin this session. We have spent hours and days preparing ourselves to work on programs that will assist this body in preparing for a better Hawaii. It is our sincere desire, Mr. Speaker, that we play the role with a very meaningful objective and a pride of men in the Minority to work as hard as we possibly can for the State of Hawaii.

I am sure that my colleagues join me in saying, Let's begin the work and do the best we possibly can.

The Chair declared a recess at 11:17 o'clock a.m., subject to the call of the Chair.

At 11:25 o'clock a.m., the House of Representatives reconvened.

On motion by Representative R. Wong, seconded by Representative Takitani and unanimously carried, H. R. No. 3 was adopted.

The Chair appointed Representatives Kondo, Ushijima, Kawakami, Aduja and Miho as a committee to inform the Senate that the House is duly organized and ready to transact business.

Representatives Sakima, Serizawa, Pacarro, Taira, Lee and Judd were appointed by the Chair to inform the Governor that the House is duly organized and ready to transact business.

At 11:29 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:34 o'clock a.m.

No. 2) honoring the former state Representative Akoni Pule for his twenty-one years of distinguished service in the House of Representatives was jointly offered by Representatives Beppu, Aduja, Ajifu, Alcon, Baptiste, Bicoy, de la Cruz, Devereux, Duponte, Fong, Garcia, Heen, Ho, Iha, Inaba, Judd, Kato, Kawakami, Kimura, Kondo, Kunimura, Lee, Loo, Lum, Menor, Meyer, Miho, Minn, Miyake, Morioka, Nakama, Oda, Oshiro, Pacarro, Poepoe, Roehrig, Saiki, Sakima, Serizawa, Shigemura, Soares, Suwa, Taira, Takamine, Takitani, Uechi, Ushijima, Wakatsuki, F. Wong and R. Wong and was read by the Clerk.

It was moved by Representative Takamine, seconded by Representative Inaba that H. C. R. No. 2 be adopted.

Representative Takamine then spoke in favor of the adoption of H. C. R. No. 2 as follows:

“Mr. Speaker, I would like to say a few words for the adoption of this House Concurrent Resolution.

This resolution is clear, complete and needs no elaboration, but I feel compelled to stand and say a few words in behalf of this resolution — a resolution honoring a man who has served his constituents and this state very well for many years — honorably, unselfishly and with distinction. I feel very privileged to speak for the members of this House.

Having served together with Representative Akoni Pule, with you, Mr. Speaker, and many members of this honorable body, I feel I can speak for the members of this body to say that we have had good counsel from this calm, cool and collected person, who gained much wisdom from his long experience with this House.

It has been my experience to note that some show leadership in the grand old-fashioned manner with powerful speeches and press releases while others, like Representative Pule, go about their duties in a quiet manner, but which shows in the accomplishment at the end of each session for the constituents whom he represents.

Mr. Speaker, today we talk of our five years of accomplishment, the ten years of accomplishment, which everyone must agree have been tremendous, in Education, Higher Education, Labor Laws, Health and Welfare, in every facet of our State.

I feel very deeply, Mr. Speaker and members of this honorable body, that the foundation for the accomplishments that we are enjoying today have been laid by people like Representative Akoni Pule.

If I may be a little bold to go further, I would say that the foundations, that cornerstone of our growth and economic

prosperity on which we have been able to build for the benefit of the people of this State is the overriding of the veto of the tax measure in the 1957 Session of the Territorial Legislature and the philosophy of taxing according to ones ability to pay and the taxing of lands for its best use.

Of course, without the sincere, dedicated and courageous applications of these tools by Governor Burns' administration, we could not have progressed this far.

Suffice to say here that Representative Akoni Pule played an important role in passing these measures. That Akoni had the courage and foresight to fight for the overriding of the veto so that today we can all look back and take credit for the many advancements which have taken place.

Our school system and our capital improvements program of the DOE (one-fourth of all the present classrooms on the island of Hawaii has been built in the last five years), our university and community college system, our expanded health and welfare programs and its facilities, from one end of our state to the other, we see jobs, prosperity, opportunities which has stimulated the public appetite for more and better education, increased opportunities in skilled and professional work and today raises the expectation for pollution control of environmental preservation, the arts and culture.

These are the kind of things that we can talk of today and be proud of today for which Representative Akoni Pule is deserving of much credit.

Mr. Speaker, and members of this body, I hope that retirement won't mean complete disappearance of Akoni although he richly deserves and has earned his retirement but that he would continue to be around us for continued counsel and guidance.

I'm sure Representative Sarah Pule who will grace this hall will make sure of this.

I know I speak for everyone in this House, Representative Akoni Pule can be proud of his record.

I join you, Mr. Speaker, and all the members of this honorable body in wishing Akoni lots of luck and Aloha, and a very fruitful retirement.

May I ask the members of the House to rise in honor of Akoni Pule in adopting this resolution. Thank you."

The motion to adopt H. C. R. No. 2 was put by the Chair and was unanimously carried by a rising vote.

The Chair appointed Representatives Suwa, de la Cruz, Baptiste and Poepoe to escort the Honorable Akoni Pule to the rostrum.

The Chair thereupon presented Mr. Pule with an enrolled copy of House Concurrent Resolution No. 2.

Representative Garcia then spoke in favor of the adoption of S. C. R. No. 1 as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of the Senate Concurrent Resolution.

I first became acquainted with Senator Doc Hill in 1948 when I first ran for political office and I shall never forget that particular incident or that particular year because that was the year when I began to lose my hair, I possessed a very beautiful head of hair up until the time that I ran into Doc Hill. I had the misfortune of borrowing his comb and, as a consequence, I now comb my hair the same way he does.

Doc Hill has thrilled audiences throughout the entire State of Hawaii by the way he started his speeches. He always told the voters and, I quote, 'You need Doc Hill more today than you ever needed Doc Hill before', unquote, and with that very, very simple statement, the house would come down and everybody would immediately begin to applaud.

Doc Hill has served the people of Hawaii for 40 years, a record unequalled in this State; a record he can justly be proud of because he was a man who introduced, a man who worked for and supported progressive legislation. Senator Doc Hill has been a philanthropist in a very quiet anonymous sort of a way. He has never let people know how much he has donated but the Island of Hawaii and the State itself has benefitted from this man's great philosophy of giving away what he has.

Senator Doc Hill caused quite a bit of commotion when he had his office in the basement of Iolani Palace. He brought with him his favorite mynah bird and he had this bird strategically located where good-looking girls had to pass by every day, almost every hour, and the bird whistled.

Many a man almost got his face slapped because the girls thought the men were the ones whistling at them when, in reality, it was Doc Hill's bird. But more

than that, the bird reminded everyone of who Doc Hill was, for without reservation, the bird constantly said, 'Vote for Doc Hill.'

Doc Hill was a man who, whenever he took the floor of the Senate, even his bitterest opponents sat and listened. He possessed humor, he possessed wit. He could be critical, he could be biting, he could be sarcastic, he could be philosophical, but at the same time he could be very complimentary. When he was President of the Senate, despite the fact that he did not learn his parliamentary procedure at Yale, he withstood the challenges of the best attorneys that have ever been produced in the Territory or State of Hawaii.

Ladies and Gentlemen, I ask you to vote for this resolution by a standing vote because never in the history of these islands has one man done so much to help make and keep Hawaii a better place in which to work and live, not only for today but tomorrow and always.

Aloha, Doc Hill!

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At 11:14 o'clock a.m., the House of Representatives met in joint session with the Senate, pursuant to Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 1, to receive the Governor's message.

The Chair appointed Representatives Menor, Ho, Garcia and Soares and Senators Ariyoshi and Anderson as a committee to escort the Honorable John A. Burns, Governor of the State of Hawaii, to the rostrum.

The following is the address of Governor John A. Burns (Gov. Mess. No. 2):

"Mr. Speaker, Mr. President, Honorable Members of the Legislature, Distinguished Guests and Friends:

Once again, we are assembled to join our thoughts, our efforts and our energies in the continuing creative endeavor that is the hallmark of our democratic system. Together, we have toiled in yesterday's vineyards and met the challenges of the Sixties with incomparable success.

It is to your everlasting credit that our State today is regarded with so much envy by so many from without. It is with a sense of great pride, too, that we acknowledge the wider recognition we have gained as something more than a Pacific extension of the sovereign sisterhood of states with whom we share a common national allegiance.

In our previous annual meetings, I have discussed with you those concepts and programs which we subsequently developed together, with a sense of common purpose, to mold all and shape that we have today—our New Hawaii. That we have a New Hawaii entering the decade of the Seventies is clear testimony to the soundness of those policies we have pursued and those programs we have executed to provide a better life for all our citizens. But this is no occasion to dwell on the past. Nor is this a time to

merely recite a litany of budgetary details, the sum total of which represents our concepts for the further development of our State and our people. Without demeaning or relegating to lesser importance those matters of finance and budgeting, I will again, with your kind indulgence, forego a detailed discussion of the executive proposals in this field.

Our budget recommendations have already been submitted to you, as prescribed by law. Moreover, I know that in the days and weeks ahead much of your deliberations will be occupied in the consideration of matters of finance, of allotting our budgetary dollars for the many services and operations for which the State is responsible, for our continuing program of grants of assistance to our counties, for our building blocks of the future as represented in our public works proposals and for a multitude of other considerations impinging upon our tax dollar. To be sure, these are vital matters that concern all our citizens.

Today, however, I would like to take this occasion to review with you our directions for the future in light of our progress to date. On past occasions, I have shared with you my thoughts on our 'Open Society,' on the need to preserve our special cultural and historical qualities and on our efforts to build up and strengthen our basic social, political, economic and educational institutions—those institutions through which the broadest possible set of opportunities can be made more readily accessible to our people. Our goal has been and remains the fullest enrichment of our total society.

Our common objective has been to achieve excellence in the total quality of life in Hawaii—to nurture and bring to flower a society in which each individual can grow and develop to his fullest capacity, with unbridled confidence in the dignity and value of his own person and his own heritage.

Symbolically, what we have looked to

was not the dark, Orwellian concept of 1984. Rather, we have strived for the most Utopian ideal we can envision for the year 2000. The decade past has been rich in production of those stepping stones necessary to move toward that ideal. We now have the solid foundations upon which to continue building and to further enrich the quality of life of our people.

What then of tomorrow?

Where do we go in the Seventies?

Will the next decade be labeled by future historians as Hawaii's Super or Soaring Seventies?

Or will they be described as our Seething Seventies?

In a recent address, I noted the disturbing quality of the over-riding note of pessimism which seems to prevail in many current public discussions. I noted further that neither you nor I can afford the luxury of indulging in flaw-finding, an arm-chair preoccupation that seems to be a byproduct of affluence. Let me emphasize that I do not eschew the need for the 'devil's advocate' in our system—I have been there myself—or for the sober view that is necessary to keep balance in our collective thoughts.

Nor am I suggesting that dissent—a currently popular pastime—serves no purpose. On the contrary, responsible dissent and constructive expressions of concern have been important factors in making it possible for this Administration and for you of the Legislature to develop, approve, fund and implement some of our more far-reaching programs for the betterment of Hawaii.

Open public discussion has always been an instrument for progress in our system of government. It has been an effective tool in nurturing public acceptance that is necessary before we, as public officials, can spend the time and the dollars required for carrying out programs envisioned in an earlier time

and under less publicized circumstances.

Does it really matter who gets the credit for good works, so long as they are achieved? So, today, Hawaii is prosperous, and more so than at any other time in her history. Moreover, Hawaii is still the most beautiful State in the Union. And it is going to be kept that way by our vigorous and expanding programs for environmental quality—programs we began many years ago and which are now gaining mounting support.

Our past efforts and our continuing efforts today have been most effective in creating wider public awareness of the fragile nature of our environment. Most of you will recall it was four years ago that this Administration, with your support and endorsement, convened a Conference on Natural Beauty and Community Appearance as a means of focusing greater public attention on this vital matter. The long-range effectiveness of that conference seems clear today. It would be ironic indeed for us to be the victims of our own successes in our expressed concern for and deeds in behalf of environmental quality—a concern in which no one individual or element in our society has a monopoly.

While you have demonstrated no need for assistance in your defense, I am constrained to describe as the height of presumption any allegation that you of the legislature have ignored environmental concerns in the past.

From the outset of this Administration, I have found the legislative branch completely receptive and understanding of our total environmental needs. How else could we, for instance, have achieved acquisition of Kahana Valley for a regional park at a cost in excess of \$5 million? How else could we have established Hanauma Bay as a marine conservation area? How else the countless number of other projects in our environmental program of recent years?

We need make no apology for the past. And it continues to be my firm conviction that we cannot give too much attention to the preservation and enhancement of our environment—a view I know you share. Let me emphasize, too, that 'quality total environment' is more than natural beauty, or man-made beauty, or clean air or clean water, although these and other environmental concerns are of vital importance.

It should be remembered that the key ingredient in any environment is man himself: he is part and parcel of and the key to the value of our total system of symbiotic relationships on this Earth. Being a part of the environment, our system demands that we consider human economics together with biological ecology. If man is hungry, ill-housed, undereducated or poorly treated in his society, what service is it to him that his environment remains in its pristine, natural state?

Your Distinguished Speaker of the House addressed himself to this question in most succinct fashion yesterday, in his observations on the interrelated nature of the problems of our natural environment and of our social environment.

So, too, did your Distinguished President of the Senate, who observed that much of the work ahead of you will demand a clearer understanding of changing times and changing needs and of how these basic problems with which we are all confronted impinge upon each other.

It has been and continues to be my belief that we can have quality total environment with balanced progress on ALL fronts. We must, if we are to survive. We have had the lessons of Appalachia, of mainland ghetto areas, of underdeveloped foreign economies, which should teach us that economic prosperity and environmental excellence are the twin pillars supporting the ideal society. We cannot have one without the other.

The Office of Environmental Quality Control which we propose is a means of striking a better balance in these dual efforts.

And it strikes me that the keynote underscoring all our efforts together has been 'balance.' This is also a unique characteristic of our society. We are a 'balanced' people, in that each element, each of the diverse groups that makes up our total community, contributes to the quality of life that is uniquely Hawaii's.

Accordingly, we have stressed in our programs and our projects the expansion and diversification of Hawaii's economy in a balanced approach. We have stressed the principle of the 'open society' and have rejected those concepts which would curb the free flow of people and commerce in Hawaii. We have sought new businesses compatible with Hawaii's culture and natural beauty. We have sought to provide a great variety in Island enterprises so that our young people need not leave their Island homes permanently to seek the specialized positions our expanding educational advantages have prepared them for.

In considering our social and natural environmental needs as interrelated matters, I should point out to you one area in which this is evident in a most dramatic fashion. This relates to the abundant ocean surrounding us. Marine science offers a timely challenge to us to act now so that we may pre-empt a future position as one of our nation's, nay, the world's leading ocean-science states.

I am, therefore, submitting to you a special message on marine affairs, entitled: 'Using our Pacific Treasure.' It offers a magnificent opportunity to greatly strengthen, today, what I have referred to as the twin pillars of the ideal society: economic prosperity and environmental excellence.

The Seventies will be a critical decade for oceanographic development. While much will depend on Federal leadership,

we must take the initiative while we can. Our Hawaiian heritage demands that our Island state lead in ocean-oriented affairs.

Also related to our socio-environmental concerns is the continued need for housing, a matter which nationally presents but a bleak picture. We certainly have major housing needs on all our Islands. But despite the many, complex and overlapping problems that face us in our efforts to make decent housing available to all our citizens, I am convinced there are solutions. Some of the means by which these solutions are to be reached will require legislation, and I will submit to you a housing package for your consideration. Many of the ideas to be contained in this package have been developed and refined by the Housing Committee which I assembled last year to make a total-front assault on this critical problem.

There are then many challenges including some of which I have not enumerated still before us. But I have every confidence that we will meet them successfully, as we have those of the past. Today, Hawaii is well prepared for the Seventies—prepared even for an expanding role in world affairs.

You will share my satisfaction, I am sure, over a recent letter I received from an official of the State Department. The letter said, in part: 'Secretary Rogers has asked me to write to you on his behalf requesting assistance in a matter which, while specifically related to our activities in the United Nations, has considerable significance from the standpoint of broad U. S. interests in the Pacific.

The program referred to involves U. N. responsibility over the Trust Territory of the Pacific, and I know that you will endorse our participation in this as you have in all our past endeavors to gain wider recognition for the special role that Hawaii is so aptly suited for in Pacific affairs.

This is a welcome sign indeed of the

opportunities to come in Hawaii's partnership in progress in the Pacific Community of Nations, and in this you have made a most substantial contribution in the past, while you're having the members of the legislature of the Congress of the Trust Territories here with you and by having also members of the Samoan Legislature here with you during your legislative session.

In this Pacific Community of Nations lies our future. We shall continue to cherish our heritage, but we must not permit the past to be the only guide post to the future. Times change, and the changes today are occurring with greater and greater speed. Nevertheless, I remain convinced, as I know you do, that our system of government is the best yet devised for meeting the needs of changing times. We must, however, continue to apply our best efforts and to marshal all our resources in plotting our course for tomorrow.

As you know, the Committee on the Year 2000 is deeply involved in this effort. It is my hope that the committee's deliberations and recommendations will further underscore the theme that balance is the key to achieving a healthy, happy society.

Finally, I believe it timely, in these days when the demands on government are so pressing, to remember the advice of the great humanist John Stuart Mill. More than a century ago, Mill said:

'A government cannot have too much of the kind of activity which...aids and stimulates individual exertion and development...The worth of a State, in the long run, is the worth of the individuals composing it; and a State which postpones the interest of their mental expansion and elevation...a State

which dwarfs its men, in order that they may be more docile instruments in its hands even for beneficial purposes, will find that with small men no great thing can really be accomplished; and that the perfection of machinery to which it has sacrificed everything will in the end avail it nothing, for want of the vital power, which in order that the machine might work more smoothly, it has preferred to banish.'

I know you share my conviction that the people of Hawaii will not be dwarfed; they stand as giants in all that is good and excellent in this world.

Mahalo and Aloha!"

At 11:36 o'clock a.m., the joint session with the Senate adjourned and the House stood in recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

FOURTH DAY

Monday, January 26, 1970

The House of Representatives of the Fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1970, was called to order at 9:30 o'clock a.m.

The Speaker presided.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Jack Hedges, Pastor of Aldersgate United Methodist Church.

Roll call of the members of the House of Representatives showed that all members were present with the exception of Representatives Baptiste, Fong, Iha, Kondo, Miho, Roehrig, Serizawa, Suwa, Takitani, Uechi and Wakatsuki, who were excused.

The Chair here directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives Serizawa and Kondo.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Third Day.

On motion by Representative Ho, seconded by Representative Garcia and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Third Day was approved.

The Chair here directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives Baptiste, Fong, Iha, Kato, Kawakami, Kimura, Miho, Roehrig, Suwa, Takitani, Uechi and Wakatsuki.

At 9:35 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

At 9:48 o'clock a.m., the House of Representatives met in joint session with the Senate, pursuant to Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 3, for the purpose of hearing the views of and engage in discussion with two distinguished futuristic scholars from the University of Hawaii, Dr. James Dator and Dr. Glenn Paige.

Representative Sakima here introduced to the members of the House and Senate three Okinawan legislators, the Honorable Zenpei Miyagi, the Honorable Kosho Kokuba and the Honorable Choko Kuwae.

House Speaker Beppu then introduced to the members of the House and Senate Mr. George Chaplin, Chairman of the Committee on Hawaii 2000, and Dr. James Allen Dator, Associate Professor of Political Science at the University of Hawaii.

Dr. James Allen Dator then addressed the members of the House and Senate as follows:

“I very much appreciate this extraordinary—indeed, unique, and, I suspect, ground—breaking opportunity to address this joint session of the Legislature of the State of Hawaii. Not only has your invitation to me been a great source of personal satisfaction, but it further reinforces my frequently—voiced contention that the leaders and citizens of this State are eager and able to show to the world how better to live humanly in a multiplistic society. This State, through its leaders, is, I believe, bravely opening the doors to a new, faith—affirming era, that faith being that man can and must rise above the petty jealousies and fears of his near and distant past, and daringly face the necessity of creating a profoundly new, more human, and freer world.

Now, I have been asked by the leaders of this body to present to you my understanding of the necessity and the possibility of this legislature's taking a more specifically 'futuristic' approach to its constitutional tasks. They have heard me make my presentation before, and I presume they wish me to bring to you here essentially the same message that they have heard, presented in much the same style as before, but a bit more formal for this occasion, but in any event, urgently, fervently, candidly, and (I hope you will see), honestly; with the full

recognition that the opportunity and responsibility of acting to create a better Hawaii lies with you and with all the citizens of Hawaii. I stand before you today, however, to pledge to you all of my time and abilities, most certainly feeble though my talents are, to seek with you how we might undertake this task, then which there is none more important.

I will tell you what I know and what I believe and some of the things which I will say in this talk will be common knowledge; and I am sure others may strike you as being absurd flights of irresponsible fancy, spun by a dweller in an ivory tower. Whichever, I hope that I can convince you of the essential validity of my position.

What I wish to do here is simply this:

First, I will explain briefly what I mean by 'futuristics', a term that may be new to some of you, and slightly odd to all of you.

Secondly, I will attempt to show why I believe that some kind of a futuristic perspective whether precisely my own or not, is a necessity, and not merely an option, for our public decision-makers today. The reason, to anticipate the point I will develop in moment, is that mankind very literally is on the verge of extinction, and that we must act promptly if we wish to prevent this.

Thirdly, I will try to outline what I believe we can do to prevent these disasters, and indeed, to do more: to create a better, more human, and freer world—while we have the chance.

And finally, and throughout with your indulgence, I will attempt to suggest some of the immediate, and intermediate steps this legislature might take to act on the imperatives that I believe are before us.

FUTURISTICS as I define it, is the study, forecasting, design, and realization of alternative social values, environments, and organisms for the immediate, intermediate, and distant future. And I

believe that covers just about everything.

(By the way, many labels to identify this area are in current use—in more or less declining order of popularity, are the ones the speaker uses—futurology, futures research, futuribles, delphology, fustory or futury (both are contractions of the word 'future history'), futurontology, and mellontology, the last being Greek for 'the study of the being of the future.') I can imagine the first song for the future being something like 'Come to me my Mellontology Baby' but we won't worry about these songs at present.

Some people who call themselves 'futurists'—and the numbers are rapidly growing; for example, the World Future Society, of which I am a member, began in 1966 and now has well over 4,000 members in 50 countries. There will be a major world conference of Futurists this April as a matter of fact. Now, some futurists may state their area of concern somewhat differently from the definition I just gave you but whatever the precise definition may be, the fact is that a unique combination of dire necessity and new understandings and capabilities have occurred within the last few years giving birth to what George Chaplain likes to call 'a new breed of men.'

The 'dire necessities,' the impending disasters, I'll get to in a minute—if they don't overtake us before I get to them—but among the new awareness and 'new capabilities' that have given rise to 'futuristics' are these:

First, there is the recognition that it is present actions and present expectations that determine the future. As Robert Kennedy said, 'Our future may lie beyond our vision, but it is not...beyond our control.' That is, we are coming to understand that we are now creating our future, and if that is the case, we should try to do a better job: to design more consciously and purposefully, than we are at the present.

Secondly, we are coming to recognize that not only is everything in the world

changing around us, but that the rates of change are changing too. I have formulated a little rule for this which some of you may have heard before, and I have pompously named it 'Dator's rule.' Here are several versions of it: 'The present is more like the past than like the future.' In other words, 'Today is more like yesterday than like tomorrow.' Or, if you prefer a longer time span, 'The 20th Century is more like the 19th Century than like the 21st Century.'

The point is, many of us are coming to see that change is so much a part of all aspects of life—and that change itself is changing too—that not only is the past an increasingly poor guide for living in (much less designing) the future, but that even the present is a pretty poor guide as well. Thus, we are faced with the positively unique situation of having not only to plan for a shifting future, but also to re—think most of our basic values and their current institutional manifestations: seriously, courageously, thoroughly, and honestly to examine everything we believe and everything we do.

Thirdly, and I believe following directly from that last point, some of us feel that a great deal of the anomie, alienation, and apathy that we see around us—manifested, for example, in seemingly 'senseless' rioting, violence, and disorder, or bedrugged withdrawal—is very simply 'future shock.' That is, many of us are familiar with both the concept and the experience of 'culture shock,' that sense of frustration, confusion, and perhaps rage that comes from living for a time in a bewildering foreign culture. 'The world just isn't right. People don't behave as they should. These foreigners are shifty and devious, and taking advantage of us. I want to go home where people do things properly.'

You know, we understand this phenomena of culture shock, and our Peace Corps training centers, for example, try to prepare their people for it. But I understand that even though the volunteers comprehend intellectually what is happening to them, they still suffer to some extent from culture shock

anyway when they move to their assigned foreign country.

What I am suggesting, then, is that many people today are suffering from a phenomena similar to culture shock because they are not adequately prepared to cope with the enormous changes going on around them. They are suffering from future shock, and as the rates of change continue themselves to change—and if our socializing methods and contents do not—then we can expect this problem to increase in numbers, severity, and danger.

An alternate designation for 'future shock' is 'neophobia'—'fear of new things.' But whatever its label, it is a fact of the present, and, if unplanned for, an enormous problem for the future.

Now, I have listed above three 'awarenesses'; three things that futurists have come to see demand that someone needs to anticipate and plan for the future.

In a way, there's nothing new about this need. Man always wants to know what the future is going to be like, and he certainly has always had an interest in seeing that the future would be favorable to him. So what's new? Essentially this:

We have developed, and are perfecting, theories, methods, and hardware which enable us to do a better job of predicting, forecasting, and designing social events. We are all familiar with the physical scientific revolution which has given man such fantastic (though, of course, still not complete) control over his environment. We know that, but many of us may not realize that we are also in the early stages of an even more profoundly revolutionary development in the biological sciences—I'll go into that in a few minutes. But perhaps only a few of us recognize that we may also be about to witness the takeoff of the social sciences and they've certainly been taxiing around the runway long enough—due to the development of new theories of human behavior, and new equipment—especially the

computer—for understanding, predicting, and influencing human behavior.

Both business and government—especially the military branch of government—have discovered that there are social scientists around who can help them to understand what people are doing, why they are doing it, and how to get them to continue doing it, or to do something else. By no means are these techniques or theories complete or even wholly adequate yet. But I don't see how anyone can deny the relative increase in power which these developments have brought, nor the fantastic increase in precision and specificity that we can reasonably expect to see as social science research continues and social scientific recommendations are incorporated into public and private decision-making.

But all of this is really prologue to the urgent message that I want to bring to you today. What I've tried to suggest so far is simply the desirability of planning for the future and that we possess some of the information, theories, equipment, and personnel to do it.

But now I want to lay before you the reasons why you must reorient our public and private decision-making processes around some kind of a futuristic perspective, and the reason can be summarized very succinctly:

THE 'UNINTENDED CONSEQUENCE' OF MAN'S MANIPULATION OF HIS ENVIRONMENT HAS BROUGHT THE WORLD TO THE BRINK OF TOTAL DISASTER. UNLESS DRASTIC ACTION IS TAKEN IMMEDIATELY, THE PROBABILITY IS VERY GREAT THAT ALL LIFE WILL CEASE ON THIS PLANET; THAT YOU NOW HEARING THESE WORDS, AND ALL YOUR FRIENDS AND ENEMIES—INDEED, ALL BEINGS, HUMAN AND NON-HUMAN—WILL BE MURDERED BY AN 'UNFORTUNATE' COMBINATION OF MAN'S UNREGULATED TECHNOLOGICAL ABILITIES AND HIS OBSOLETE SOCIAL VALUES AND INSTITUTIONS

Now some people who know and believe this statement think that it is already too late for man to do anything about his impending demise. There are simply too many ways the world may immediately come to an end, and whether alone or in combination, the probability is greater that they will occur, many people feel, than that they will not occur. Well, what are the ways the world will end?

We might squeeze ourselves to death. The population of the world at the dawn of human life was very small indeed, and it was not until the advent of 'civilization,' that is, the establishment of cities (which itself was made possible by man's very gradual control over his food supply) the population increased drastically. But even then, life remained short and precarious, and the total population of the world in essence levelled off, or, more accurately, very slowly and imperceptibly drifted upward, dipping down during the plagues in the Middle Ages, until about 1650 and the advent of the Industrial Revolution, when population began to rise. And then things really happened. The population of the world in about 1830 (only 140 years ago) for the first time reached roughly one billion people. By 1930 (a 100 years, and only 40 years ago), it had doubled to two billion people. It then jumped to three billion in only thirty years (by 1960), and it will add another billion people between 1975 and 1980.

But things are rapidly getting utterly out of hand—there will be over seven billion people by the end of this century! That is, the population is going to double again from its present size in only thirty years! For every 'thing' we have at present—and who thinks we have enough—there will have to be another 'thing' in only thirty years. But wait. In only 60 more years from now, the population will double again; by the year 2030, to 16 billion, and again by the year 2060 (90 years from now) to 29 billion, and so on.

And so on! I've got to be kidding? To increase from 3.5 billion now to 29 billion people in 90 years! That's absurd. And of course it is. Many scientists are

now arguing about the precise date of 'Doomsday'—the day we literally squeeze ourselves to death—and it's not a hundred years from now. It's within the lifetimes of many people living today; one date very specifically given: 'Friday, November 13, 2026.'

But surely something will happen to prevent Doomsday. Yes, indeed, something probably will. Let me continue down the list of the ways the world may come to an end.

Worldwide famine is imminent. The population is already too great for the food supply no matter what new developments in agricultural technology occur, many people feel. The United States now is living off of its agricultural surpluses of the past. It can't produce enough to live on now. I suppose it's nothing new that one half of the world is starving to death, but it might be some concern if I point out that it will be new if all the world starves to death, or dies in the struggle for an insufficient food supply.

In spite of the very important Green Revolution, population increases seem about to wipe out the advantage gained through new food-producing technologies, and world-wide famine is predicted by 1975—some people including myself would add, 'if we don't do something about it.' Others would say, 'no matter what we do.' Which leads to the third way the world may end.

Man may already have poisoned himself beyond redemption. As you all know, the level of DDT in the human body alone is so great that mother's milk has been declared unfit for human consumption, and the amount of slowly decaying DDT (and detergents and other chemicals) moving down the food chain to the phytoplankton has been estimated by Stanford University biologist, Paul Ehrlich, as leading to the death of the oceans, and hence to the extinction of all life, as he says, 'late in the summer of 1979.'

(By the way, I hope you won't be put off by my giving specific dates life that. They are simply mathematical projections of the exponential lines of development, and I use them to try to get you to see that these problems are very much within our own political time, and that our own lives, politically and personally, will be affected if these developments are unchecked.)

We may shortly smother ourselves to death in our own wastes. The level of man-produced carbon monoxide, carbon dioxide, nitrogens, and lead in our atmosphere, for only one of the many examples, is so great that a moderately lengthy air inversion over any major city (which inversion is highly probable) would result in the deaths of most organisms—including man—in the area, and if local inversions do not occur as warnings before the total global toxic level in the atmosphere exceeds tolerable limits, all life may be suffocated. The current serious prediction is that within ten to fifteen years, all people will be wearing gas masks, and many plants and animals will be dead.

But we may also drown ourselves in our own human organic and inorganic wastes, especially as population increases so drastically. Where are we going to put all the manure and paper cups and beer bottles, and the rest, when there are 7 billion, or 16 billion, or 29 billion of us around?

In addition, the problem is further compounded by considering how to dispose of industrial wastes, and matters become perplexing indeed when we consider the waste disposal dilemmas posed by our newer industrial technologies—for example, the very great problem of disposing of the waste of nuclear fission plants, or the wastes of biological warfare testing.

But of course, we may simply boil ourselves well done. A further consequence of nuclear fission plants which utilize water is that of thermal

pollution. The temperature of the water coming out of the plant is so much greater than that going in, so that the 'natural' organisms in the water are killed. Indeed, thermal pollution, as much as DDT and detergents, is responsible for the death of our lakes and rivers and oceans now.

But why worry about that anyway? We may blast ourselves or bug ourselves out of existence before that anyway. In the pursuit of the incredible stupidity called 'national defense,' any nation or nut among us may purposely or (more likely, and also of sufficiently high probability) accidentally commence nuclear or (also, more probably) bacteriological warfare, which may end all life.

We may revolt ourselves to oblivion, to the Stone Age, or to 1984. Various marginal persons (blacks, students, the poor, lower middle-class white, and others) in our society, sufficiently turned on by our technologies to understand that something must be done, yet also sufficiently creatures of our culture to imagine that it can best be done through violence, direct confrontation, and self-righteousness, counsel ever-increasingly fragmented brands of violent action, which are simply met violently in return. Other persons, knowing essentially nothing, but keenly feeling the anguish of their powerlessness, engage in 'senseless' acts of expressive violence—and too receive more violence from those who, 'legitimately' possessing power, would prefer to ignore the grievances of the dispossessed, but if that is not possible choose simply and swiftly to repress them, which actions will culminate ultimately in the destruction of all—activists, apathetics, and establishment alike.

But the problem of 'marginal' man to oneself, if you will (we've certainly done that before). What do you suppose will be the response of the good, law-abiding middle class man as he watches his children starve to death, or smother to death, or die of thirst? In a democracy, politicians only act on what the people

demand, and since I didn't demand real solutions, it's no surprise that the politicians didn't act.' Do you really believe that everyone will be forgiving as they die?

Truly, it is more likely that men, in their rage, will destroy this world, than that they will let nature do it for them.

So, the list of the ways the world may soon end is very long, and the probabilities of any one or combination of them occurring is so great that many persons feel the future is utterly beyond our control. The best we can do is die with a brave smile on our lips.

Other people, however, feel that we still possess the time and the knowledge to prevent any and all of these calamities. Nonetheless, they are as profoundly pessimistic as the first group. The reason for this is that though they believe we can prevent disaster, we are not likely to do so. Politicians and businessmen will not act, ultimately because the population does not believe the predictions, and thus will not demand or support the drastic changes that are needed.

'Common sense' suggests that since the world hasn't ended yet—and many false prophets have predicted its demise before—it's not going to end now. Therefore, anything we do to prevent disaster will itself so profoundly disrupt existing patterns of thought and behavior that most men will not tolerate it. And so nothing will be done.

That is, the previous recital of the 'ways the world will end' is nothing new, many people say. Many men among us have been harping on them for years. Wasn't there Malthus, and haven't we survived? People earlier expressed fears about DDT, but how could we have kept as many people alive for as long as we have if we hadn't used DDT as pest control? How long must one listen to cries about smog and air pollution? London has had it for centuries, Los Angeles for generations, yet London and Los Angeles continue to grow and to serve as great centers of our civilization.

So why worry? As for nuclear and biological warfare, we haven't had either yet, and, anyway, though billions of people may be destroyed, I'll probably survive. Moreover, as every year passes with no nuclear or biological war, the likelihood of such a war seems to lessen—these pacifist sob-sisters have been weeping for years, and we're all right. And if those black (or young, or lazy long-haired) punks want to fight—then let them come on! We outnumber them, and we'll beat the hell out of them. That's exactly what they need!

Now, I am of a third opinion. First, I agree that something must be done. Secondly, I recognize that though resistance against change is massive (and sometime conscious and sophisticated, though more often unconscious and naive), apparently we have manipulated people so successfully in the past that now, somehow, they seem to be content to face impending doom without any apparent concern or action. Thus, through the operation of many of the same methods that have produced the calm, we can, I believe, change men's minds and behavior. And thirdly, I believe that I have a general plan, articulated through a reasonable theory, which, though perhaps to some person's minds, is wildly absurd, utterly impractical, or dangerously subversive, any or all three seems to me to be at least one of a class of actions that must be undertaken: nothing less will do than a complete modification of man and his environment. Whether or not the specific details that I suggest are actually followed is far less important than that we recognize that all of our past beliefs and practices must be radically tested, and many of them completely supplanted. We cannot start with any assumption except this: we got ourselves into this mess, and we must and can get ourselves out of it.

Yet even if we act to prevent ecological disaster—and I am convinced that we can and will act to prevent it—two new technologies are rapidly rendering obsolete almost all of our

current institutions and values, and much of the conventional wisdom of the past.

The first technology is at base not new; it's been with us since the real meanings of the industrial revolution became apparent. I refer of course to advances in automation and cybernation which are eroding our time-honored notions about the priority of production problems over the distribution of goods, and the relative value of work vs. leisure, discipline vs. freedom, responsibility vs. non-responsibility, and, in sum, those values and institutions in our present society which make the worth of a human being depend upon the social significance of that person's labor.

We are moving very rapidly towards a situation where it will be a privilege to work, not an obligation; where indeed only a very small proportion of the population will be allowed to engage in labor. How rapidly we get to that state, and with what upheaval, depends largely on what we do, or don't do, now. Factories have already discovered that by automating, they are not only relieving themselves of laborers, but also of purchasers of their products as well. Yet, our obsolete economic structures, and their supporting value systems, assume that goods are scarce, and that the only labor available is human labor. Thus we feel that goods can only be distributed on the basis of the social value of each person's labor. But what happens when most goods are produced by machines alone, and there is virtually no one 'employed? How are goods to be distributed then? Traditional economic arguments to the contrary notwithstanding, this is our basic economic difficulty now and yet few people acknowledge it.

In addition, if human value (and supporting institutions) are based on the assumption that since human work is necessary for survival, all institutions must be geared to forcing people to work and to derive ultimate satisfaction from their work, what is going to happen when

mechanical labor replaces human labor? What will be the purpose of life then? This also is not really some potential problem for the future. It is a major factor in the crisis of the present and must be dealt with rapidly and courageously.

The problems attendant to the replacement of manual labor by machines are the 'easy' part of the cybernetic revolution. The 'hard' part is that which faces you when you come to realize that all other functions which man performs now can, and probably will, be taken over by machines.

The older generation of computers, for example, were correctly characterized as being 'very fast morons.' 'Garbage in, garbage out' was true of the older computers, signifying that a computer could do only what you told it to do, and if you made a programming error, or if you asked it a ridiculous question, then you would get a ridiculous answer. The advantage a computer had over man was simply that it could handle a larger mass of data more rapidly than man. But it couldn't think or create. Only man could do that.

Well, not any more. The next generation of computers can think, and create, and repair, and reproduce themselves. They can, in fact, improve upon themselves. Anything you or any person can do, a computer will soon be able to do better, and faster, and with more patience.

If there be any who think their job is such that no machine can do it—or should do it—then he had better either start readjusting himself and this world, or else start pulling the plug, because the next generation of computers might be able to put the plug back in, and slap your hand as well.

But I'm still talking about the easy problems. And assuming that we prevent ecological disaster, and learn to live with machines, we are already past the

speculation and theorizing stage and into the development stage in an arena that man has only dreamed about and generally feared before: I said earlier that the physical sciences pretty much had matter under control (though of course many scientists will choose modestly to point out their deficiencies). The biological sciences are on the way towards doing the same thing for life! The 'really big' revolution of the present is nothing I've mentioned before; it is that life scientists have unlocked many of the so-called 'secrets of life,' and are everyday unlocking more.

Discoveries concerning the makeup and actions of chromosomes and genes as the determiners and regulators of the individual lives of all organisms, coupled with the growing ability of scientists to intervene in and direct their make-up and action, means that man possesses the power to control life as he never has before.

Strides are being made in reversing the aging process in organisms, so that individual life spans may lengthen so enormously that, in effect, immortality can be achieved. Now, couple that potentiality with the population and food problem I've mentioned before.

Just as now doctors can help a couple conceive a child of the sex that they desire, or, through contraception or abortion, sever the connection between the sexual act and reproduction, so it is highly likely that within the lifetimes of most persons living today, we will be faced with this problem relative to having human reproduction be an artificial operation, carried on by scientists in laboratories, acting to implement politically-determined decisions about the make-up of the population. That is to say, not only will we be able to determine the ratio of men to women in the population, but also all of the physiological and psychological characteristics of its members as well.

It may be that human reproduction will be socially determined, and

scientifically performed, and (perhaps) the sex act be only for pleasure or for interpersonal communion.

However, it is equally possible that there will be no sex act at all.

Couple the power and implications of automation and cybernation with those of genetic engineering, and you come up with a new possibility and perplexity—the destruction of the distinction between life and non-life, between the organic and the inorganic.

Man can create a Cyborg—a cybernetic organism—as much alive as it is a machine; a machine-augmented being; an organic computer; a self-loading and unloading, oil-bearing whale; a jet-assisted, cargo-carrying bird; a man with eyes in the back of his head and his brain attached to a computer; a man who, genetically, cannot be violent; a world composed of people one-half or one-third the size of present persons as a solution to the over-population problem; men with modified lungs which can breathe in the wastes of the internal combustion engine, and breathe out oxygen—remember that one organism's waste is another's food.

Please don't misunderstand me at this point. I'm not necessarily advocating any of these things here. I am just illustrating some of the aspects of the biological revolution that will be with us very shortly, and that we are not morally or institutionally equipped to handle these problems very well at the present.

Do you see what I'm getting at? For the first time, directly and purposely, man will be able to determine his own nature. There will no longer be such a thing as a fixed, given, human nature.

Between now and then, we are faced with the necessity of developing values and institutions to cope with these problems and their precursors—for example, the use of electronic and chemical means of enhancing learning, or

of altering behavior and physiology.

Can you see why I say that the biological revolution is the greatest challenge we face—if we manage to live so long? Can you see why I insist so urgently that we come to grips with these problems? Can you see why I contend that radical change in all existing values and institutions is itself not radical? The real radical, who is willing to let this world rip itself apart, is the one who tells you everything is OK; that nothing's new; that the old tried and true ways of the past are sufficient for the troubles of the present and the future; that all we need to do is really believe in and apply the old moralities.

Does it take a conservative like myself to convince you that the only way even to stay in one place is to run like hell? And that to preserve the quality of life is going to require the greatest concentrated act of courage and intelligence this world has ever seen?

Well, I think we can do it.

First, we've got to be convinced of the reality and the urgency of our problem and I hope to God I've done that for you by now.

Secondly, we've got to take a systemic approach to our problems, and not an analytic approach. What I mean by that distinction can be explained this way.

The style of modern decision-making—say, since the creation of the British Parliament, but at least since the establishment of the United States Congress and state legislatures—typically has been to seek solutions only to those problems that have been brought before the decision-makers through the operation of certain political (and frequently, economic) pressures and then, optimal solutions have seldom been sought. Instead, most legislators simply tried to do whatever was necessary to quiet the protest. I call this the 'squeaky wheel'

approach, in that whatever grease was conveniently available is slapped on whatever legitimate wheel squeaked the loudest.

I won't go into the whole story of how public decision-making came to have this particular characteristic, but public decision-making was not always this way. Parliaments and legislatures—indeed, the very nation of law-making rather than law-discovering is relatively new (only a couple of hundred years old) and reflects the need for a society to develop a satisfactory social decision-making process when its population has grown well beyond the face-to-face size, and when the society has discovered that it is facing many problems that cannot be settled on the basis of precedence alone; where, in short, 'reason' has to be applied to solve new problems.

Unfortunately, our piecemeal 'squeaky wheel' approach to legislation, probably worked pretty well two hundred years ago, has tended to contribute in part to our being on the brink of ecological and environmental disaster, because we legislate to solve specific problems without taking, I believe, adequate consideration of the interlocking aspects of all of life. So really, our solutions frequently tend to make matters worse.

(In our natural environment alone and I think this point is especially clear, the 'ecological' viewpoint is a systems viewpoint—as, I might add, so also is the viewpoint of the electronic engineer when he makes his computer.) 'Ecology' means the study of the interacting, and mutually interdependent, units of nature. We speak of a 'balance of nature' and an 'ecosystem.'

Well, unfortunately, in my opinion, man has so interfered with nature through science and technology, that is, through the application of his reasons, that I'm afraid we don't have an ecosystem anymore, we have an 'ecomess'. We have a system so out of equilibrium that it is beyond recapture.

That's why I maintain that we can't 'go back' to some earlier state of nature, we must use our scientific knowledge to establish a new balance, which may in fact be quite different from the old.

Now, I believe that we should restructure our public decision-making processes around some kind of a systems approach, and that we should further incorporate the following considerations as well:

First, I believe that we must take a futuristic perspective. By that I mean that in order to utilize a systems approach properly, we must be able to state clearly what we want the outcome to be. We must be able to describe the end product in some detail.

We can't do this very well if we only look at the present problem. They are so vast and overwhelming and interlarded with multiple vested interests. The solution? Well, I think that we can move out in time twenty or thirty years, and design in detail the type of world we want it to be. We must think boldly and grandly (this will really be the hardest part) and then, when we are clear on your systems goals (though they will of course be kept flexible) we can move back to the present, and legislate more competently.

Secondly, I believe that we need to legislate experimentally and scientifically. Our present political system is both a product of and a response to mass, industrializing society, like most every other dominant institution in our society today. We can see the importance of this observation by reflecting on what it means in our goods-producing sector. Before industrialization, goods were mostly custom-made: your shoes, your shirt, your house, your bow and arrow were either made by you or for you. Industrialization changed all that. Now goods are made on the average—large, medium and small—so that nothing really fits anybody anymore. They are made for some mythical average people.

And so also our morals. In tribal

societies, where everybody knew everybody else, you had a precise and individually-tailored code of behavior for every person in your tribe; not a simple conduct for all, but a rule for each person. In 19th and 20th Century mass society, there are too many people for custom-made rules, so we have developed an abstract, though still absolute, ethical code.

Finally, so also with our rule-making, rule-administering, and conflict adjudicating. In the really old days, tribal laws, and their administration, and tribal justice, were usually specific for the individual involved. Laws were made for individuals, and applied differentially, depending on who you were.

By the late 18th and 19th Centuries, we had become a 'government of laws' and not of men.' We developed a professional, objective bureaucracy that went by the rule books, and not, supposedly, on the basis of who you were and who you know. Similarly with the courts, who applied the broad legislative and constitutional principles to individual cases.

Well, modern technology is making it possible for us to personalize goods, and morals, and laws, as well as administrative and judicial decisions, once again. This is the essential difference between the new, cybernated technology and the old, 19th Century industrial technology: cybernated technology, such as the computer, makes individuality possible in a densely-populated society.

Thus, I conclude from this:

1. We must use technology to help solve our problems, and this includes, I believe, thinking seriously about how we can use existing, or help develop new, technologies to solve the crisis in legitimacy that the conflict between 18th and 19th Century-based political institutions and 20th and 21st Century-based popular expectations is provoking.

2. And secondly, we should take a more experimental approach to our legislation. This means, among other things that:

a. It seems to me that we should regulate only those actions that have clearly dysfunctional social consequences--at this time, especially those acts which genuinely contribute to environmental pollution--and I think we should abolish those laws regulating private thought and behavior which are carryovers from our pre-industrial and industrializing periods. Just because we don't like something is no reason to outlaw it in a multiplistic society, though it might have been reason enough in a tribal or industrializing society.

b. I think that we should reward non-violent social deviants and non-conformists. The need for mindless conformity to a single, poorly-fitting, mass-based code of behavior is over. What society needs now, and needs urgently, is to encourage people to try to do things differently, to experiment with new, non-dominant life-styles, for example. Instead of harassing people who don't conform, as long as their deviance is non-violent, we should encourage, applaud, and reward them for their bravery. I seriously propose a state award for persons who are deemed to be most different every year, and that we cease rewarding conformity and conventionality.

c. Because we have or can develop the technological capability, we should try to regulate as much as possible on an individual, personalized basis. Consider laws which use the level of alcohol in a person's blood to determine his drunkenness. On face appearance, this is a very scientific law, but generally (I have no idea that this is

actually the case in Hawaii), the amount of alcohol in a person's blood that makes him legally drunk is determined by using the average of a highly-biased sample of persons in some other part of the world. Thus, you are subject to arrest, loss of license, liberty, and treasure, not to mention public disgrace, not on the basis of whether you were in fact drunk in terms of your body, but on the basis of some impersonal average. Once again, the obsolete notions of mass society, ignoring the technological potentialities of a cybernetic society. The point here is that the amount of alcohol that makes you drunk or me drunk, if you prefer, is as unique to your body as your fingerprints, though even within your body, that point fluctuates in dependence on other factors—how tired you are, how healthy you are, what and when you had eaten, and many, many other things—all of which are personal, and all of which are susceptible of scientific determination.

Now, I'm not arguing about the drunken driving laws. That's just an example. What I'm trying to ask is, why penalize people—why literally ruin their lives—on such essentially arbitrary, impersonal, mass-produced bases? It's a hard job, but it is much more humane, and certainly possible, to legislate personally, and to legislate less.

In conclusion, I press upon this legislature a message of urgent hope. This state is fortunate in having already on its payrolls, at the University of Hawaii, some of the persons best informed about the scope and nature of Hawaii's ecological and environmental problems, and also who are very able and willing to offer effective and imaginative solutions.

I hope you will call upon these people immediately to work with you to create a New Hawaii, both for its own sake, and as a model and example for a better world.

I thank you."

Senate President McClung then introduced to the members of the House and Senate, Dr. Glenn Paige, Professor of Political Science at the University of Hawaii, who addressed the members of the House and Senate as follows:

"The task that I have been given is to report back to you on the responses to the questionnaire that you received last week and so kindly agreed to answer. I know it was a very busy week and I appreciate very much the members of the Senate and the House who took the time to reply. Before I start, I want to say right away that there is no scientific basis whatsoever to generalize to the whole legislature from anything that I am going to say in the next few minutes. We are only talking about 9 senators and 21 representatives, that is, 30 people who found it possible to help us do this kind of thinking. Now, I want to explain generally to those who have not seen the questionnaire just what is going on; otherwise, you won't understand me.

Our questionnaire asks these questions:

First, what is the best possible future for Hawaii in the year 2000. It was a completely open question and they could say anything they wanted to.

Second, what are the worst possible conditions for Hawaii in the year 2000 that you can envision. Again, a completely open question.

Our third question presented a ladder with ten steps and at the top of the ladder was the best possible world and at the bottom of the ladder was the worst possible world, each person defining his own best Hawaii and his worst Hawaii.

Then, we ask these questions—where on this ladder from the top to bottom was Hawaii at the time of Statehood in 1959. Where is Hawaii today, 1970. Where will Hawaii be in 1980 and in the year 2000, where will our State be. So, we had four questions. A further question asked—what do you consider to be the worst obstacle preventing the achievement of the best possible future for Hawaii.

Another question asked—what are the main assets or aids that you think will help Hawaii get to its best possible situation. And then, what are the top priority things that you think should be done now or in the near future in order to bring about the best possible future for Hawaii 2000, and finally, we ask if Hawaii 2000 seems too distant a time to consider; how far ahead a time do you think it is reasonable to think about in practical governmental affairs. This questionnaire format is called technically a self-anchoring scale of individual values. It is called self-anchoring because the researcher does not impose anything on you from outside.

The research design does not tell you what is your heaven or what is your hell. You define this for yourself and you locate yourself in your own term. With this background, we can speed on in this report to you.

Now, in your answers to the best possible condition for Hawaii, you mentioned six things:

1. Economic well-being. I am going to mention some numbers here. The numbers have no magic but they do sometimes indicate relatively on one thing or another. There were 23 responses on this item. They may not be people because people can make more than one response.
2. Environmental quality. 22 responses.
3. Social harmony and the quality of life. 22 responses.
4. Educational opportunity. 11 responses.
5. Peace. 3 responses.
6. Hawaii and the Pacific Community. 1 response.

I should say one more thing here. On the questionnaire, there were only three

spaces; a, b, c, and the people felt constrained to pick the top three so you were really discouraged to make a very long list of your concerns.

Let us look at economic well-being. Economic considerations are high in your thoughts as you think about the year 2000. Over and over again, concern for full employment appears in your responses. You have not yet decided whether computers do everything and people don't need jobs as Jim Dator was talking about. Throughout your responses also run this strong concern for people and the quality of life. You want to eliminate poverty and to insure a comfortable life for all. Perhaps jobs for all sums up your economic aspirations of Hawaii 2000, but not just any job but jobs that are accompanied by comfortable homes, good health, pleasure, good education and cultural opportunities. In a sense, with this concern for the quality of life you are already prepared for the computerized society that Jim Dator was talking about. You are also concerned with distributing the economic benefits of the cities throughout the neighbor islands. I liked your phrase: 'Big town economic opportunities in a small town environment.'

Environmental quality. The environment matched equally with the quality of the economy and was an object of your expressed concern for the year 2000. You seek environmental excellence, preservation and enhancement of natural beauty—free from pollution—air, water and noise and so forth. You hope to see progress and development worked into Hawaii's natural environment. You want open spaces, ample parks and playgrounds, clean beaches, clean air, clean seas, pure water and quiet surroundings. In Hawaii 2000, you want to see the retention of Hawaii's natural beauty.

Social harmony and quality of life. Concern for the economy and environment is concern for Hawaii's

people and their way of life. You are concerned with the size, composition, and harmonious quality of relationship among Hawaii's people. You are concerned with them at work as well as at leisure. You aspire toward a population of healthy, happy, cultured people where the aloha spirit flourishes and from which the name of Hawaii flows as an inspiration to the people of the whole world. You seek to end discrimination in all forms. You aspire to a flourishing state of culture and the arts and you hope to see the successful pursuit of long range planning as an expression of general social harmony.

Education. You clearly aspire to the development of a first-rate educational opportunity at all levels, fully available to Hawaii's people. You are concerned that the educational systems providing not only technical excellence but also that it should be endowed with enthusiasm for learning, and the warmth of the aloha spirit. Some of you aspire to a free education for all—to graduate and professional school levels. You aspire for Hawaii's people to be educated, well-informed and peace loving.

Peace. Peace is also a clear theme in your assets for the year 2000. You want to see a world in which the citizens of Hawaii are not sent off to war.

Pacific basin leadership. One legislator responded that he wished to see Hawaii play a tidalistic leadership role in Pacific basin affairs.

Your aspirations for Hawaii 2000 might be summed up in what might be called the six P's:

1. Prosperity.
2. Pollution—the avoidance thereof.
3. People. Their numbers and the quality of their relationship.
4. Progressive education. In terms of widening opportunities and higher education for all.

5. Peace.

6. Pacific basin leadership.

Let us look at the worst possible conditions for Hawaii 2000. Four strong themes and one minor one emerged:

1. Economic breakdown. 20 responses.
2. Environmental pollution. 21 responses.
3. Overpopulation and overcrowding. 23 responses.
4. Social disintegration. 16 responses.
5. War. 3 responses.

Economic breakdown. You hope to avoid poverty, unemployment, business depression and economic failure. Several legislators expressed fear that the economy will become distorted and imbalanced, dominated by tourism, subjected to typical fluctuations over filth, and over-burdened by taxation, neglecting Hawaiiana. Another legislator expressed fear that the discrimination against the State of Hawaii rooted as he sees it in Federal legislation, by water and air transportation companies, and oil companies will continue to grow.

Environmental pollution. A polluted environment looms large in your picture of the worst possible Hawaii 2000. You describe clearly your dislike of the dirty, unhealthy, blighted, polluted and decayed ecological setting. In your nightmares, you see visions of smog covering all the islands, and continued pollution of the ocean by local industry and government and destruction of Hawaii's natural beauty. You do not want Hawaii to become the smog center of the Pacific.

Over-population and over-crowding. In your vision of Hawaii 2000, the fear of over-population, over-congestion, over-crowding and over-building is strikingly apparent. You dislike the vision

of Hawaii as the 'Manhattan of the Pacific.' Over-population with all of its ramifications looms large among the most undesirable aspects of the future. There is an underlined fear also of local people being crowded out by immigrants.

Social disintegration. General societal disintegration is also strongly portrayed in your picture of the undesirable. You mention such things as crime, juvenile delinquency, drug addictions and lawlessness. You do not want Hawaii to become a mecca for gamblers, thugs and hoodlums. Socially, you are trying to avoid possible conflicts among various groups. As one legislator phrased it, his worst Hawaii would be one in which there is a failure to reconcile differences between kamaainas and the anticipated immigration of the democratic form of government. The failure of planning efforts and the loss of State goals.

War. Three legislators mentioned war as part of their picture of Hawaii 2000 at its worst. Thus, it seems to appear markedly less valiant in your thoughts of the future than economic breakdown, environmental pollution, over-population and overcrowding, and social disintegration.

Changes perceived from Statehood to year 2000. Responses to questionnaire:

1. Lack of diversity among you as to how good or bad Hawaii's conditions are at the time of Statehood. Responses are rather evenly distributed. Some people thought conditions in Hawaii good; others not.
2. Evenly divided in judgment on whether Hawaii today is better off or worse off than it was at the time of Statehood.

15 legislators — better off.

13 legislators — conditions became worse.

3. There was a good deal of consensus among you that Hawaii today is in

a better general condition. Twenty-six out of 29 rated step 5 or higher. There is a notable convergence of judgment at step 6. There seems to be a rising curve.

4. You expect to see an upswing by 1980. Probably substantial but not too spectacular. Some anticipate deteriorated conditions but weight of opinion is decidedly optimistic. Twenty-one out of 28 legislators expect improvement by 1980. The scale looks just like Diamond Head.

5 of you were very very optimistic in 2000.

19 of you think 2000 will be better than 1970.

7 of you thought it would be worse than 1970.

1 felt it would remain the same — the status quo.

2 of you were not decided.

Some legislators envision increasingly pessimistic conditions by 1980; 1970, Hawaii not bad; 1980, bad; in the year 2000, four of you think Hawaii will be in very difficult conditions. Twenty out of 29 were very optimistic that Hawaii 2000 will be better than or equal to Hawaii today. Each of you is absolutely unique in the pattern of individual judgment. No two see Hawaii—past, present or future—in the same way. Four legislators rank Hawaii at the worst end of the scale except one or two.

As a group, you are an optimistic body. Twenty out of 29 think that Hawaii will be better than or equal to Hawaii today. Eight legislators rank Hawaii 2000 on top of their reference scale.

Types of response patterns — 1980–2000:

1. Utopian. One legislator expressed that Hawaii in 1980 would hit the

top of his value scale and remain there until the year 2000.

2. Optimist. Sixteen out of 20 of you thought 1980 will be better than 1970; 2000 will be better than 1980. They seem to be saying things are going to get better.
3. Pessimist. Everything is going down hill. Things will get worse and worse.
4. Short-range pessimist or the long-range pessimist. Hawaii will slump by 1980 but to rise again to a higher level by the year 2000. Things are going to get worse before they get better, they tell us.
5. Pessimistic moderate. Two legislators expect that Hawaii will decline from its present position in 1980 and then remain in a position close to the midpoint in their scale so things will decline but will remain stable at midpoint. Things will get worse in the short run and then they are going to remain so. Not too bad and not too good.
6. The puzzled ones:
 - a. Positive puzzlement. Things will get better by 1980 and does not know what year 2000 will be like.
 - b. Negative puzzlement. Conditions will go down by 1980 and not sure after that.

Obstacles which prevent Hawaii from achieving the best possible world in 2000. You see both candor and sensitivity to the problem areas. There is no high degree of consensus. They are hypothetical and not descriptions of present realities, but some refer to concrete aspects of the present.

There are 5 themes:

1. Obstacles in Hawaii's community in decision-making and planning processes. 23 responses.

2. Obstacles in Hawaii's socio-economic structure. 23 responses.
3. Emotional and value obstacles. 16 responses.
4. Leadership obstacles. 5 responses.
5. External obstacles. 4 responses. These are things Hawaii has no control over.

Problem Areas:

1. Lack of initiative, short sightedness, lack of intelligent planning and coordination, lack of unified action, concentration of power, inefficiency, waste, breakdown of communications and the obstructive dual of the apathy of the many and the greed of the few. Two legislators referred to the greed of the big real estate developers and one called attention to the increasing influence of labor organizations as obstacles to Hawaii's future development. Another referred to an imbalance of power and pressure groups with a resultant closed society. Still another mentioned the refusal to take steps necessary to build for the future and to shoulder the resultant cost. Another referred to the fear of radical planning and program which may upset antiquated preservations of the status quo. And another suggested the longer one party controls any government, the process of deterioration takes place. Still another legislator referred to internal inability to forecast, analyze and change.
2. Obstacles in Hawaii's socio-economic structure. Regarding Hawaii's socio-economic structure, you have made many comments concerning obstacles inherent in the pattern of land ownership, such as an improper distribution of land ownership and economic power. An

even concentration of land ownership, lack of individual ownership and land tenure, big land owners not releasing their land and so forth. Again, you point to over-population, and to economic constraint, lack of additional revenue sources to meet the high cost of restoring the quality of life we seek.

3. Emotional and value obstacles. You locate a third step of obstacles to a better Hawaii in the year 2000 in the realm of human emotions and values. These are fitting insights in view of your role as political leaders where the chief people you work with are men and women in all their multifarious richness as human beings. In your responses, you have referred to such things as fear, greed, stubbornness, inflexibility, hatred and selfishness. One response referred to past ethnic political and social conceptions as hang-ups. Another mentioned stubborn, inflexible minds of public officials. Still another response mentioned the fear of radical planning and program that may upset the status quo. Another identified inflexibility in accepting opposition thinking and the dependence upon emotional rather than rational modes of thinking. You have also pointed to looseness of the aloha spirit, a certain disrespect for others and retrogression of age-old moral values as further obstacles to achieving the most desirable 2000.
4. Leadership obstacles. You have pointed to inadequacies in public leadership itself as an obstacle to Hawaii's better future. But only five responses were made in this connection and they are all reported here:
 - a. Inaction of people, including governmental leaders.
 - b. Lack of leadership, particularly in the executive.

- c. An ignorant society with ignorant leaders and the inability to develop and maintain intelligent and progressive governmental and political leadership. As leaders, you have expressed a proper and professionally interested concern with the quality of Hawaii's leaders.

5. External obstacles. Finally, you identify obstacles in things beyond Hawaii's own capacity to control. You mentioned generally political, social and economic influences originating outside Hawaii. More specifically, you mention Federal-Supreme Court decisions and international strife.

We move from obstacles to assets that will aid Hawaii to get to a better future:

1. The unique quality of Hawaii's people. A growing awakening to public action and their rising levels in education. 25 responses.
2. Geography, its quality and location in the Islands. 12 responses.
3. Progressive public leadership. 12 responses.
4. The young people of Hawaii.

By far, the greatest asset for the attainment of your highest aspirations for Hawaii in the year 2000 is Hawaii's people. Their unique quality, their greater awareness and activity in public affairs and their rising levels of higher quality of education. You draw inspiration from the general goodwill and cosmopolitan nature of most of Hawaii's people. One legislator points out the soundest guarantee of the best possible future for Hawaii is the determination of the majority of the people to see that this is attained.

The geography, quality and location. The second most important asset which you call attention to is Hawaii itself, its natural beauty and its favorable sign, its relative isolation which gives hope that

overlapping problems of other states can be partially avoided and that control of conditions is highly probable and favorable. Its central location in the Pacific basin gives it an opportunity to become an educational, commercial, agricultural and artistic center. One legislator referred as an asset to the most harmonious relationship between man and nature that exist in the world. Another referred to 'room on the other islands for development.'

Progressive public leadership. You see actual progress or potential progressive leadership in the State at every level from the counties to the highest public officials as an asset for Hawaii's future. You consider the opportunity to change leaders periodically an asset to prevent stagnation. You consider Hawaii fortunate to have community and public leaders who recognize problems early. You look to leaders of vision and action. Overall, you see a contribution to Hawaii's future if leaders in our community and men in government practice what they preach.

The young people of Hawaii. In the young people of Hawaii, you see a vigorous new generation who show interest and concern to make Hawaii and the world a better place to live in. You consider them to be an asset in achieving your own aspirations for Hawaii 2000. Thus, paradoxically, while youth may regard you as one of the biggest obstacles to Hawaii's development, from their point of view, you regard them as one of Hawaii's greatest assets.

We turn now to the specifications of the priority tasks and then we will be almost finished. The question is what are the top priority things that must be done now in order to get moving for the best possible future of Hawaii:

1. Improved processes of planning and research related to planning. 16 responses.
2. Development of planning personnel and improvement of participation

in decision-making by other community leaders and the public. 6 responses.

3. Economic tasks. 16 responses.
4. Pollution control. 12 responses.
5. Continued improvement over education. 12 responses.

With five responses each, pollution control measures and housing measures are also on your list of high priorities. Under other recommendations are included other items such as transportation, mass transportation system, truck rules, bicycle rules and a monorail system and long-range transportation planning. In addition, you recommended placing top priority in such areas as land, crime and drugs, tourism, urban problems, humanitarian laws and uplifting all segments of the society and true peace in the world.

Planning and research. Through your answers to the question of top priorities run a strong concern for improved processes of planning and research related to planning. One legislator advised the executive branch must become visionary. Thus, one of your answers to the most desirable Hawaii 2000 is more long-range planning, better coordination of all levels of government throughout the State and between the public and private sectors. You are interested in the implementation of a system that permits active analysis and evaluation in all State programs. In research, you have suggested the establishment of multi-disciplinary teams in order to conduct more extensive research on State problems. Your basic pattern of approach seems to be to study to decide on the set plan to implement and then to revise as needed in a continuous and comprehensive way as appears to be required.

The response of one legislator suggested another aspect of planning—planning to remove certain social restrictions geared by the abolition of all laws, rules and regulations that

discriminate against people. This is very much in the spirit of Jim Dator's suggestion about not surmising intimacies of human potentials in the community.

Personnel development and changes in participation in decision-making. As a complement success on planning, you also see a need for excellence at all levels for persons involved in planning. Also, as a companion to increase on planning, some legislators see that this should also be accompanied by increased participation by other members of the community. Popular participation is a counterpart of increasing professional planning. One legislator sees a need for rather wide changes in decision-making, personnel and planning as a priority item. He calls for a realignment of political parties and a new vocal leadership for human achievement.

Economic tasks. The main theme running through your priority recommendations of economic needs is a desire to a changed and diversified and balanced economy. In addition, you seek more employment, lower cost of living and the cooperation of both business and labor in what one legislator termed a balanced and controlled economic program. Another legislator calls for a real honest program unaffected by special interests for a balanced economy for our State. Still another would seek to obtain the proper balance and specialization between the public and private sectors of the State in order to achieve the most efficient economic growth. One legislator placed top priority on the abolition of ways regarding duplication in government so that more can be spent on education and the humanities. Another lawmaker advocated a guaranteed annual income.

Pollution control. Compared with the emphasis placed upon environmental qualities as part of the desired vision of Hawaii 2000, only 12 responses explicitly contained references to pollution control items as measures for priority action. One of the most specific suggestions was to use our newly discovered technologies to eliminate the environmental pollution

problem wherever possible. Another called for preventing the plantation and the manufacturer from polluting the air and water. With respect to open spaces, one legislator called for requiring that large developers set aside green areas on all developments.

Education. Education rank with pollution in number of suggestions and responses that you have made for priority actions. You seem in favor of continuing to upgrade the educational system, developing flexibility in accordance with need. You show an interest in all levels of education, not just higher education and as for the University, one legislator recommends examination of our present University program so they are more relevant and meaningful to our needs.

Population limitation. Five responses suggested various measures to control the growth of population. For example, stop all immigration to the islands, both from the mainland and foreign countries or restrict the migration to Hawaii. Others speak of controlling tourism and supporting planned parenthood.

Housing. Housing ranked with population—5 responses each—as a subject for priority recommendation. You want a sound housing program to take care of the needs of the people.

I want to report the answer to just one more question and then we're done. This was the question—if Hawaii 2000 seems too distant a time to consider, how far ahead do you think it is reasonable to think about in terms of practical governmental affairs. This is to put it to the most reasonable and practical language possible. And here are the answers we received from 29 legislators:

 5-10-15 years — 1
 10 years — 9
 15 years — 11
 20 years — 3
 25 years — 1
 Year 2000 is not too distant — 5
 No response — 4

There was one unique response to this. He did not put down 5, 10, 15, 20, 25, 2000. One legislator said:

1975 — Paddock
1979 — Ehrlich
1984 — Orwell

Now, surely he means for us to understand the W & P Paddock's book 'Famine 1975', Ehrlich, 'The Population Bomb' and George Orwell—you all know that. This response deserves special attention from us since he broke out from the metric system of 5, 10, 15, 20 and suggests to us that maybe we can think about the future in terms of certain anticipations about the future. From this point of view, a leadership willing to work with odd numbers might be capable of facing and coping with the future. Now, if you sum all of the visions of the future, in terms of how far ahead we can think, you will find that only one out of 29 picked a period of less than 5 years. Five thought it possible to think ahead 30 years; 18 legislators thought in terms of 10 to 25 years and more than 20 thought that you could easily think from 10 to 30 years in the future practically and reasonably. Our single conclusion is inescapable—you are a forward-looking body, willing to look beyond the next generation. Contrary to popular mythology about political leaders in a democratic society, I think this is a significant finding. You must have responded affirmatively when Jim Dator invited you to think in terms of futuristics or to think ahead because you are already ready to think in terms of from 10 to 30 years. If an additional behavioral science may be presented here, these creative persons would often be found to have strong future time orientation and can necessarily bring into existence something presently non-existing at some future time. If this is so, then this proves that legislators have a strong potential for creative actions.

By the answers you have so freely given here, the people of Hawaii have an unusual number of fine leaders worthy of

their support and highest aspirations. I realize that in such a brief period of time, I could not adequately do justice to your aspirations for Hawaii.

I was given half an hour and I have taken 45 minutes.

By word and action, you will have to correct any misleading impressions that inadvertently I may have given. I must say in conclusion that it is a very great honor that you have bestowed upon me in asking me to join you here. To Senate President McClung, to House Speaker Beppu, to the majority and minority leaders of both houses, I express special appreciation and I join all the people of Hawaii in wishing you well as you continue to create Hawaii 2000.

Thank you."

At 11:23 o'clock a.m., House Speaker Beppu declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair, for the purpose of a question and answer period with Dr. Glenn Paige.

At 11:33 o'clock a.m., the joint session with the Senate reconvened at which time Senate President McClung thanked Dr. James Dator and Dr. Glenn Paige for addressing the joint session.

At 11:35 o'clock a.m., the joint session adjourned and the House stood in recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

“HOUSE RESOLUTION AMENDING THE RULES OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE FIFTH LEGISLATURE, REGULAR SESSION OF 1970.

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1970, that the Rules of the House be and the same are hereby amended in the following respects:

RULE 24. FORMS OF BILLS, RESOLUTIONS, MOTIONS AND AMENDMENTS.

Rule 24 is amended to read as follows:

(1) All bills and resolutions shall be typewritten with black ribbon in single space, or legibly duplicated in black ink upon paper which is 8½ inches wide by 11 inches long, and leaving a left margin of 1½ inches. Short form bills may be introduced. All bills and resolutions shall be dated and signed by the introducer in black ink.

(2) Every bill introduced or reported out of any committee, including

but not limited to any standing, special or conference committee, which amends an existing section or subsection of the Hawaii Revised Statutes or Session Laws of Hawaii, shall set forth the section or subsection in full, and the matter to be deleted shall be enclosed in brackets and any new matter added to the section or subsection shall be underscored.

(3) The Speaker may allow exceptions to Rule 24 (2) at his discretion. No floor amendment to a bill shall be adopted unless a typewritten or printed copy of such amendment shall have been received by each member of the House present for consideration of such amendment.'

RULE 29. RECONSIDERATION.

Rule 29 (4) is deleted.

RULE 31. SECOND READING.

Rule 31 is amended to read as follows:

'On second reading, a bill may be read throughout or may, on motion, be read by title only. It shall then be subject to a motion to commit. If it is not referred to a Standing Committee, or to a Special Committee, but is ordered to be considered in Committee of the Whole, a day for such consideration shall be determined by the Chairman of such committee. When the bill shall be reported from Committee, it shall take its place in the order of business for future consideration.'

RULE 32. THIRD READING.

Rule 32 is amended to read as follows:

'(1) No bill shall pass third or final reading in the House unless printed copies of the bill in the form to be passed have been made available to the members of the House for at least twenty-four hours. 'Form to be passed' means the form in which a bill is (a) passed on third reading in the House, (b) concurred with by the House after amendments have been made by the Senate, or (c) passed by the House

after a conference committee has agreed to it. The twenty-four hour period for a bill shall commence from the time that a printed copy of the bill in the form to be passed is placed upon the desk of each member of the House upon the convening of, or during, each day's session, and in case of a recess thereof, then upon the reconvening of, or during, such day's session as reconvened, and the time that a bill shall be made available as aforesaid shall be duly entered in the House Journal by the Clerk.

(2) A Bill on its third or final reading may be read by its title only and the Speaker shall then ask the House: 'Shall this Bill pass its third reading?' or 'Shall this bill pass its final reading?' as the case may be. Such bill may be amended or recommended on its third reading. Upon the final passage of any bill, the Ayes and Noes shall be called and such passage shall require the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members to which the House is entitled. The vote upon final reading shall be upon a motion that the bill pass third reading, rather than upon adoption of a committee report, so that amendments to the bill may be offered at third reading and voted upon.' "

On motion by Representative Ho, seconded by Representative Garcia and carried, H. R. No. 38 was adopted.

THIRTEENTH DAY

Friday, February 6, 1970

The House of Representatives of the Fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1970, was called to order at 11:00 o'clock a.m.

The Speaker presided.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Francis J. Phillips of Our Lady of Peace Cathedral.

Roll call of the members of the House of Representatives showed that all members were present with the exception of Representatives Bicoy, Heen, Iha, Oshiro, Pacarro and Saiki, who were excused.

At 11:05 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

At 11:19 o'clock a.m., the House of Representatives reconvened.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Twelfth Day.

On motion by Representative Ho, seconded by Representative Garcia and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Twelfth Day was approved.

SENATE COMMUNICATION

A communication from the Senate (Sen. Com. No. 9) returning House Bill No. 1262-70 which passed Third Reading in the Senate on February 5, 1970 in an amended form was read by the Clerk and was placed on file.

On motion by Representative Wakatsuki, seconded by Representative Minn and carried, the House disagreed to the amendments proposed by the Senate to H. B. No. 1262-70 and requested a conference on the subject matter of said amendments.

In accordance therewith, the Chair appointed Representatives Wakatsuki,

Chairman, Pacarro, Kunimura and Ajifu as Managers on the part of the House for the consideration of said amendments.
