Consideration of Stand, Com. Rep. No. 683-70 on S. B. No. 1981-70 which had been deferred to this day.

On motion by Representative Wakatsuki, seconded by Representative Minn and carried, the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and S. B. No. 1981-70, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Consideration of Stand. Com. Rep. No. 757-70 on S. B. No. 1577-70 which had been deferred to this day.

On motion by Representative

Wakatsuki, seconded by Representative Minn and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S. B. No. 1577-70, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Consideration of Stand. Com. Rep. No. 758-70 on S. B. No. 1982-70 which had been deferred to this day.

On motion by Representative Wakatsuki, seconded by Representative Minn and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S. B. No. 1982-70, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair here directed the Clerk to note that S. B. Nos. 1981-70, 1577-70 and 1982-70 had passed Third Reading no earlier than 11:20 o'clock p.m.

At 11:21 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

At 11:34 o'clock p.m., the House of Representatives reconvened.

Consideration of Stand, Com. Rep. No. 798-70 on H. R. No. 353 which had been deferred to this day.

On motion by Representative Heen, seconded by Representative Kunimura and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H. R. No. 353 was adopted.

Consideration of Conf. Com. Rep. No. 9 on H. B. No. 397, as amended, which had been deferred to this day.

Representative Uechi moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and that H. B. No. 397, as amended, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Kondo.

Representative Bicoy then spoke in favor of the bill, as follows:

"I will vote for this bill because it is a step in a definitive direction towards doing something about our housing crisis.

But in reviewing the language of this bill, I have become increasingly apprehensive over certain portions of it.

And rather than remain silent and to cast an aye vote only, I feel my constituents would want me to communicate my apprehension and to have it inserted in the record of proceedings of this House on this bill.

The purpose clause of this bill speaks of 'providing reasonable—priced housing in Hawaii.' But I am not able to reconcile how, under this bill, we can provide reasonable—priced housing when there is language in the bill which can only be interpreted as an open invitation to the pricing of these housing units beyond the range of reasonableness. Let me explain that.

Firstly, in the construction and sponsorship of housing projects, the Housing Authority is not subject to the competitive bidding laws in its selection of developers and contractors, or in the contracting for any services or materials. I submit that the essence and spirit of our competitive bidding requirements on public projects is on the theory of getting the most mileage for the least cost to the taxpayers. If it is accepted that competitive bidding will tend to serve as a damper on spiraling and pyramiding prices in the housing industry, I submit, then, that this cavalier discarding in this bill of our competitive bidding requirements for housing projects is, I believe, not only unwise but self-defeating in its operational effect. We should give this a second look.

Secondly, the developers and contractors who are chosen to be the partners with the Housing Authority in any housing project will, under this bill, be reimbursed for all costs, including administrative and overhead costs. By that language, are we not in effect giving

those developers and contractors a blank check at the taxpayers' expense. We have recently heard how Congress discovered that the design and construction of the C-5A military transport aircraft cost us, the taxpayers, some \$2 billion in cost over-runs. I would imagine we would have learned a valuable lesson from that.

Unquestionably, these overhead costs will not be negligible. And it is also unquestionable that all cost over—runs will be borne by the taxpaying public, for who else?

Thirdly, this bill provides that these developers and contractors shall be entitled to a guaranteed gross share of not more than 15% of the actual cost of the housing project, less any State subsidies.

Picture this, if you will: the developer would subcontract to the electrician, who will add his 15%, to the plumber, who will add his 15%, to the painter, who will add his 15%, to the cabinet maker, who will add his 15%, to name but a few subs. Then, the developer or contractor would then add his 15% on top of the collective total of the various subcontractors' 15% add on. What have we suggested here but a built—in pyramiding of a cost factor ultimately to reflect an increased price for each unit in the housing project.

In passing, I wish to point out that this guaranteed profit of 15%—and it is guaranteed profit since all overhead costs will be reimbursed to the developer or contractor—seems like a juicy way of milking the public cow. I believe this 15% profit margin ought to be reduced to a figure with less fat in it, and let the taxpaying public enjoy some of that fat.

And speaking of milking the public cow, there is language in this bill in another area which would appear that the proceeds received from housing projects built under this bill would give tax relief to these developers and contractors as the language seems to allow that they may be exempt from payment of general excise or gross income taxes by filing for such exemption with the tax director. If I have

construed that language correctly, we will have lost a revenue—producing base through these housing projects. Might I suggest that it seems only fair and just to exact a quid pro quo exchange, that is, the payment of the general excise tax by the developer or contractor for the privilege of being awarded such guaranteed fat government housing contracts.

In another area in this bill, there is language which expressly calls for the owner to occupy the dwelling unit purchased. It also provides that should the owner die, title to the dwelling unit or the lease may pass to a family member as provided under our laws of descent and distribution of property, provided, of course, as the bill states, such family member would otherwise qualify under the rules and regulations to be established by the Housing Authority. But we know that such rules and regulations would be proscribed by the language of this bill. Therefore, it would seem a surviving wife who is not a declarant alien, at least, could be disqualified and ousted from her dwelling unit--at a time when her housing need would be most critical. This, too, should be looked into.

And this brings me to another point.

To be eligible to participate as a 'qualified resident' and a 'qualified borrower,' that person must either be a U. S. citizen or a declarant alien who has resided in Hawaii for at least five years. I say this is patently discriminatory in its application.

We have amongst us, at our invitation, some 28,000 aliens. Many of these aliens have not declared their intention to become naturalized citizens, for one reason or another, but for whatever reason, we must respect. These are not declarant aliens. But these very aliens have contributed their talents, energies, and labors for the betterment of this community in the many, many years they have lived with us here; and by the inappropriate and injudicious use of the term 'declarant alien,' we will have shut

them out. That borders on ingratitude.

And this brings me to my final point.

From front to back of this bill, there is replete within its pages the explicit direction to the Housing Authority to promulgate rules and regulations for the implementation of this bill.

I shudder to imagine the inevitable morass of such rules and regulations needed to cover a complex housing industry and its supporting complex financial structure behind it—and all without immediate safeguards by the Legislature to inject its constitutional role for the responsibility and obligation to use prudently the public funds for public use.

This permissiveness smacks to me of legislation by rules and regulations in this vast field by the Housing Authority. I wonder aloud if we really intended in this bill for us to abdicate our legislative prerogatives, and whether we are not leaving ourselves open to a taxpayer's challenge on its validity.

In making these comments, I may have risked the silent censure of my distinguished colleagues. But I have done so in the name of my constituents.

And it is hoped that the next session of the Legislature will perform the necessary legislative surgery to refine the language to tighten up those loose ends in those areas I have cited."

Representative F. Wong then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of H. B. No. 397.

During the recent statewide Conference on Housing, guest speaker Vic Palmieri kiddingly remarked: 'Hawaii is the only place where they talk about low—cost housing and you find out they mean housing of \$30,000 and up'.

Unfortunately, this is no laughing matter.

We, as legislators, are here today with the express purpose of gearing up the State to produce, or provide the incentive for the production of less costly housing at a rate of one unit for every two produced by private industry. That represents more than 20,000 units that must be constructed in less than 5 years.

During the housing conference, mainland speakers were enthusiastic about the potential of Operation BREAKTHROUGH. They said that BREAKTHROUGH is not the only answer, but that the project has promise because it addresses itself to all phases that represent costly additions to the production of housing—land, land development, construction, labor, zoning codes and ordinances, and financing.

I have applied this 'comprehensive yardstick' to Conference Draft 1, and find that it represents just this: a multi-pronged attack on the housing crisis.

We know, for example, that land and land development represent 40 to 45 per cent of the total cost of a house/lot package in Hawaii; we know that construction represents 35 to 40 per cent of the total cost; and we know that financing and other 'barriers,' including government created costs such as the 4 per cent general excise tax, represent the final 10 to 20 per cent. And somewhere, buried in those figures, is profit.

I am not saying—nor does the bill suggest—that all constraints on the housing industry should be done away with—that we should allow 'instant slums' to be built for 'second class citizens'.

Nor am I suggesting that the developer or money lender should not receive a fair return on his investment.

Rather, I believe—and the bill allows—that those costs in the total house/lot package, unnecessary to safe, desirable housing, should be reduced, or, when possible, eliminated.

I did not rise, however, to expound on the details of House Bill 397 as I'm sure you are all familiar with its contents.

Rather, I believe it is more appropriate here to step back and look at what this bill represents.

There has been a great deal of discussion of late, that, for the first time in the history of America—Hawaii inclusive—the time is ripe for a coalition of the poor with the middle class that would provide a power base to make the political system more responsive to their needs. The idea has merit. However, it suggests that the 'system,' as we know it today, cannot now be responsive. This bill is visible evidence that the 'system' can be at times responsive to the community it serves.

It is significant to note that Conference Draft 1 of H. B. No. 397 represents a unique kind of coalition that has never before been explored in Hawaii when trying to solve a critical problem. It includes the poor and the middle class who can't afford housing. But it also draws upon the tremendous resources of private industry and government.

We owe a debt of gratitude to the members of the State Housing Committee who recommended many of the programs in this bill. Chairman Gibson Rietow and members Franklin Sunn, Charles Wade, Bob Niu, Bob Kaya, Walter Kupau, Jack Palk, Blackie Yanagawa, Bill Cooke and the chief executives of each county are all experts in their fields and we are fortunate to have had men of this caliber to give so generously of their time and talents.

These men represent a resource of practical and technical knowledge available only from the industry itself.

If we are serious about improving our environment—upgrading the total quality of life in the Hawaiian Islands—through cleaning up the air, and waters, or whatever other problems we face in, say, agriculture, tourism or

education—I'd like to suggest that we may have initiated a very practical—and successful method of dealing with crisis through this kind of coalition.

I fear, though, that we may spend too much time patting ourselves on the back. We have not yet built house one; not a single laborer who hasn't been able to afford to buy the house can yet buy a home.

The bill addresses itself to these problems. It provides the authority and money to do the job well—including meeting emergency housing needs for students.

But these problems will not be solved in one month; or in a year. It will require the continued commitment of the legislature to meet Hawaii's housing needs in years to come, just as much, if not more so, than is needed today.

I urge fellow members of this body to support this bill acknowledging that the housing problem won't vanish overnight—or, for that matter, over the course of several years; and that we will be doing a great disservice to the people of Hawaii if we lead them to believe that this bill is the panacea of all of our housing problems. For we have, in fact, just begun."

The motion to adopt the report of the Committee and to pass H. B. No. 397, as amended, on Final Reading was put by the Chair and carried and H. B. No. 397, as amended, passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Consideration of Conf. Com. Rep. No. 16 on H. B. No. 1370-70, as amended, which had been deferred to this day.

Representative Taira moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H. B. No. 1370-70, as amended, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Kawakami.

Representative Miyake then spoke against the bill as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in opposition of this bill.

I think this bill represents such a travesty of the legislative process that it might be laughable if it did not also constitute a serious threat to the competitive bidding statute, a fundamental safeguard on the expenditure of public moneys.

Mr. Speaker, in all good faith and with no malice or deception in our hearts, this honorable body, on March 19 of this year, sent winging on its way across the hall an innocuous bill which would have repealed a \$25 fine for teaching without a certificate. This bill wended its way through the legislative process in the Senate and passed a total of five readings in substantially the same form. On April 16, the Senate Committee on Education, in a laudable exhibition of good sense, recommended that it be placed on the calendar for Third Reading in an unaltered form. However, it was an ill wind which whistled through the Capitol on that night, for the very next day, that same Senate Committee on Education reported the bill out a second time, but this time in a completely unrecognizable form--only the bill number, title, and effective date were unchanged.

Now, Mr. Speaker, earlier this session, we passed a bill which repealed the existing criminal sanctions against the performance of abortions. But there were some safeguards wisely included in that bill by this body: Abortions could only be performed by licensed doctors in accredited hospitals and only upon a non-viable fetus. I would submit that the conduct of our erstwhile colleagues in the Senate on this bill violates all of those safeguards.

First, I know of no medical doctors in the Senate;

Secondly, if the Senate chambers have been accredited as a hospital, I am unaware of it; and

Thirdly, I would submit that H. B. No.

1370-70, H. D. 1, having passed five of the required six readings and having been assured of the Governor's good graces as midwife since it was an Administrative bill, was a most viable fetus. Thus, Mr. Speaker, I must conclude that, not only did the Senate abort this bill, but they did it in an illegal manner.

But we should not be surprised, for such illegal behavior is most appropriate for a bill which would have the legislature sanction contracts which are patently and admittedly illegal. And, Mr. Speaker, there should be no mistake about this. We know the contracts in question are illegal; the Attorney General has said so. This bill does not attempt to change the general laws so as to make legal, conduct which was once illegal. No sir, Mr. Speaker, this bill recognizes the illegality of the contracts but would have the legislature validate them; the contracts were illegal yesterday and they would still be illegal tomorrow, but for the legislature's special and magic seal of approval. If laws are to be changed, they should be changed to apply equally to all and not only for a special group.

People talk about law and order. Laws, they say, are made to be obeyed by everyone. But this law must be different—it apparently was made to be broken. What other conclusion can be drawn from a legislature's violation of its own laws? The young and the minorities should obey laws. Only the lawmakers can break laws.

Mr. Speaker, not only would this bill put the legislature in the untenable position of breaking its own laws, but the law which it would have us break is one which is essential to the orderly and honest conduct of government—the competitive bidding statute. The purpose of requiring competitive bidding on public contracts is to guarantee that public contracts are not used as a means of discharging private obligations. Because the bidding statute serves such a vital function, exceptions should be permitted only in cases of compelling necessity.

Mr. Speaker, there is no such necessity in the case at hand. Both the Senate Education Committee and the House-Senate Conference Committee Reports on this bill describe it as necessary to protect the interests of school bus system operators who, in reliance upon long term contracts for the transportation of school children, 'incurred a substantial expenditure of capital' for 'modernizing or expanding their fleets. . . And extreme hardship and inequity would result were the said contracts put out to bid.' The first question, of course, is whether the legislature should be more concerned with protecting the interests of the bus operators than the interests of the people. But, even assuming in this case that the former should be given priority over the latter, it is not necessary to make exceptions to the competitive bidding statute in order to protect the legitimate interests of the operators.

It would be simple for the State to specify in its bidding requirements that the bus fleets of potential carriers must be of such size and in such state of modernization that the only carriers eligible to bid would be those who did in fact expand and modernize their fleets. The only current carriers who would be disadvantaged would be those whose bus fleets are older and whose charges are higher than those of a competing operator. These are the only interests which would really benefit from this bill. Thus, the result of this bill would be to compel the State to continue expending more money than is necessary for service which is less than the best that is available.

Mr. Speaker, I would submit that these interests are not deserving of the special protection afforded by this bill and do not warrant a special exemption from the bidding statute. In effect, the legislature is being asked to validate the very type of contract that the bidding statute was designed to prevent.

Mr. Speaker, I am offended by the method by which this bill came to the

floor. I resent being asked to 'validate' an illegal contract. And, Mr. Speaker, I am deeply disturbed by the attempt to make an unnecessary and unwarranted exception to the competitive bidding statute. Mr. Speaker, I will vote against this bill and I urge my colleagues to do likewise."

Representative Taira then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this Conference Committee Report and H. B. No. 1370-70, as amended.

Whether the present contracts are legal or illegal is not something for any one individual to decide. I think this is something which, in time, should be left to the courts of the State of Hawaii to decide. Why this came up in the form that we have now is that we have a problem.

Back in 1965, when Act 97 was first passed, the State, as you recall, took over school construction, school repair and maintenance and also school bus transportation. At that time, the counties had their own diverse methods of contracting with the carriers of students going to and from school. It has taken the State of Hawaii many years to stabilize this situation and in the process, it became necessary to take care of this problem by working on it directly on a negotiation basis because it was felt and, this was through an informal decision of the Attorney General, that payments for school bus transportation should be considered a subsidy and if we amend the section that has been quoted 'exceptions to the contract by law can be made if these are subsidy payments made for service by public carriers.'

Mr. Speaker, in order to take care of a problem, we have made it so that all of these contracts which are now existing will be validated and any contracts to be made in the future will definitely be under the bidding procedure.

Thank-you very much."

Representative Duponte then rose and stated that he has a contract for the transportation of school children and asked the Chair for a ruling as to whether or not there was a conflict of interest.

The Chair ruled that there was a conflict of interest and Representative Duponte was excused from voting on this measure.

The motion to adopt the report of the Committee and to pass H. B. No. 1370-70, as amended, on Final Reading was put by the Chair and carried, and H. B. No. 1370-70, as amended, passed Final Reading by a vote of 40 ayes to 10 noes, with Representatives Devereux, Heen, Lee, Loo, Menor, Miyake, Serizawa, Wakatsuki, R. Wong and Beppu voting no and Representative Duponte being excused.

Consideration of Conf. Com. Rep. No. 21 on H. B. No. 1267-70, as amended, which had been deferred to this day.

On motion by Representative Wakatsuki, seconded by Representative Minn and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H. B. No. 1267-70, as amended, passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Consideration of Conf. Com. Rep. No. 22 on S. B. No. 1131-70, as amended, which had been deferred to this day.

By unanimous consent, consideration of Conf. Com. Rep. No. 22 on S. B. No. 1131-70, as amended, was deferred until tomorrow, May 7, 1970.

Consideration of Conf. Com. Rep. No. 23 on H. B. No. 1922-70, as amended, which had been deferred to this day.

On motion by Representative Baptiste, seconded by Representative Judd and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H. B. No. 1922-70, as amended, passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Consideration of Conf. Com. Rep. No. 24 on S. B. No. 1696-70, as amended,

which had been deferred to this day.

On motion by Representative Morioka, seconded by Representative Ho and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S. B. No. 1696-70, as amended, passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Ajifu and Devereux voting no.

Representative Devereux, on a point of personal privilege, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, in twelve years in office, I have consistently sought to champion the rights, the welfare and the programs of the people of this State. It is inconceivable to me to think that anyone can believe that what we have witnessed in this Capitol today represents either mature or responsible behavior.

I have never subscribed to the old, flea-ridden adage that the 'squeakiest wheel will get the grease.' That is apparently the theory behind demonstrations here and elsewhere by students, faculty members—and even by our public employees.

Charles Sumner once said: 'There is the National flag. He must be cold, indeed, who can look upon its folds rippling in the breeze without pride of country.' This State Capitol building and public buildings throughout the land symbolize—as does our flag—the years of efforts and struggles our forefathers endured to create a land of freedom and opportunity. It would seem to me that our public employees should have a special respect for, and pride in, the premises which house the elected Representatives, Senators and Governor of their State. We must be 'cold' indeed, if we have reached an era where such pride and respect is too clearly lacking.

Now, Mr. Speaker, in my opinion, employment in government service is a privilege, not a right. Every employee who applies for a government position has a clear understanding that he or she will be responsible for service to the people in a non-profit

business--also-- that he or she must abide by the rules and regulations established by the government. As legislators, we, or at least I, am aware of the fact that we only approve positions in any department which we feel are really needed. After viewing the many public employees visiting the Capitol today, it is apparent that they feel they are not really needed. I believe it is time for us to re-evaluate the present positions we have and reduce them substantially. What we need are competent, loyal, dedicated employees. We have already proven our concern about their welfare, and I'm certain we will continue to do so.

Because of the failure of the public employee organization—and its members—represented in this demonstration here today to exhibit traits of maturity, judgment or responsibility, I feel that this has been a sample of more of the same to come in the future. For this I wish to express my deep concern and sorrow.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Consideration of Stand. Com. Rep. No. 834-70 on H. R. No. 369, as amended, which had been deferred to this day.

By unanimous consent, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 834-70 and H. R. No. 369, as amended, were recommitted to the Select Committee of Oahu Representatives.

Representative Wakatsuki moved that the House agree to the amendments proposed by the Senate to H. B. No. 2092–70 and that H. B. No. 2092–70, as amended, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Minn.

At 11:51 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

At 11:53 o'clock p.m., the House of Representatives reconvened.

The motion to agree to the amendments proposed by the Senate to H. B. No. 2092-70 and to pass H. B. No. 2092-70, as amended, on Final Reading was put by the Chair and carried by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair here directed the Clerk to note that H. B. Nos. 397, 1370-70, 1267-70, 1922-70 and 2092-70 and S. B. No. 1696-70 had passed Final Reading at 11:54 o'clock p.m.

Representative Wakatsuki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S. B. No. 1131-70, as amended, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Minn.

Representative Takamine then spoke in favor of the bill, as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I think that it is important for members of this body to remember that this bill, together with several other projects bills, is truly representative of the needs and programs of the people of this State. Also, this bill, together with several of those key bills of this session, would have been aborted except for the patience and understanding of one great man, our Governor. I feel it would not be fitting to speak of this bill without recognizing the

debt we all owe him.

The bill is before us now. But a few days ago, it seemed as if this would not happen. It seemed as if we were going to waste approximately four months of hard work by this legislative session. More important, the time and effort that went into the formulation of proposals and projects in this bill, the time given by hundreds of individuals and organizations in communities throughout the State, might have been sacrificed. The past few days have meant the difference of \$12,000,000 for projects on the Island of Hawaii alone.

I believe almost everyone here tonight feels much more satisfied, that these last few trying days made the difference between a successful, if not monumental session, and a dismal failure. I feel also that the majority party members have been satisfied; and that even the minority party members would admit that together we have accomplished much, and they have played an important role in our session's accomplishments.

Yes, Mr. Speaker, this is an enlarged bill. I know that there are millions of dollars in projects that cannot be floated in one year, perhaps even two. But we all know that we have a responsive and responsible Governor who is authorized to implement immediately projects he considers of high priority and meaningful to the State. I am satisfied that the will of the people will be served by the administration. I believe that this bill contains measures representative of the goals enumerated by you, Mr. Speaker, by the President of the Senate, and by our Governor himself at the opening of this session.

Although I do not frequently agree with the representative from Kauai, Representative Kunimura, I must agree this time with him that we have kept the Governor 'waiting in the wings,' night after night. It is to his everlasting credit that he has had the patience, the courage, the foresight, the dedication to the people of this State and to each member

of this legislature to have kept this session together. It is because of him that we are bringing this session to a successful end. We are ending on a bright note, for we have helped plant the seeds for the beginning of a new decade of challenge for the people of this State.

I should also like to insert in the record that there was another individual who played a major role in bringing out these bills. I know this because he sometimes drops in to my office—I don't have to introduce him to you—you know him as Mr. DeMello.

Mr. Speaker, I have checked your opening day speech as well as those of the President of the Senate and the Governor. I have also checked the statements of the dailies regarding their expectations and those of our people on January 21, 1970. I believe we have lived up to these expectations.

I thank you, Mr. Speaker, for your patience during this session. And to you, my colleagues in the House, may the voters agree that we have done a good job and may those of us not aspiring to higher office meet again next January.

Thank you very much."

Representative Soares then spoke in support of the bill as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to agree with the previous speaker that the minority had played a very important part in this session. I would like to mention here and be consistent with my statement when the House CIP passed this House, Mr. Speaker, and that is with regards to the purchase of the Kaiser Estate by the State. Although we changed the wording somewhat, I am still very concerned and very suspicious that this purchase of the Kaiser Estate is a worthy one for the State, I have talked to a lot of people, both in the executive, as well as the trustees, and I am not convinced by no matter or means that the State is buying a building in a site that will be adequate for conventions.

As far as I am concerned, I will vote for the CIP because of the part we have in it, the work it has taken to do the job, but I am very concerned and I want it in the record that this is, I think, a real bad purchase.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Wakatsuki, in speaking in favor of the bill, pointed out that there was a typographical error in Paragraph 2 of Page 2 of Conference Committee Report No. 29 and that the paragraph should read as follows:

"Conference Center. In authorizing funds for the purchase of the Conference Center as reflected on Page 69, it is our intent that the University of Hawaii may utilize either operating budget funds or indirect funds received in order to provide maintenance on the property."

The Chair here directed the Clerk to have the record reflect the proper language.

The motion to adopt the report of the Committee and to pass S. B. No. 1131-70, as amended, on Final Reading was put by the Chair and carried, and S. B. No. 1131-70, as amended, passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes which is not less than two-thirds vote of all the members to which the House is entitled.

The Chair here directed the Clerk to note that S. B. Nos. 174, 1342-70, 1405-70 and 1131-70 had passed Final Reading at 9:17 o'clock p.m.

At 9:18 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

At 9:21 o'clock p.m., the House of Representatives reconvened.

Representative Serizawa, for the Committee on Conference on the disagreeing vote of the Senate to the amendments proposed by the House to S. C. R. No. 56, presented a report (Conf. Com. Rep. No. 30) recommending to their respective Houses the final adoption of the resolution with certain amendments.

Representative Serizawa moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S. C. R. No. 56, as amended, be adopted, seconded by Representative Kawakami.

Representative Garcia then spoke in favor of the adoption of the resolution.

The motion to adopt the report of the Committee and S. C. R. No. 56, as amended, was put by the Chair and carried and the report of the Committee was adopted and S. C. R. No. 56, as amended, was Finally adopted.

DISPOSITION OF MATTERS PLACED ON THE CLERK'S DESK

By unanimous consent, H. B. No. 1265-70, as amended by the Senate, was taken from the Clerk's desk.

Representative Wakatsuki moved that the House agree to the amendments proposed by the Senate to H. B. No. 1265-70, and that H. B. No. 1265-70, as amended by the Senate, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Minn.

Representative Wakatsuki then explained the changes made by the Senate.

The motion to pass H. B. No. 1265-70, as amended by the Senate, on Final Reading was put by the Chair and carried by a vote of 51 ayes.

By unanimous consent, H. B. No. 1870-70, as amended by the Senate, was taken from the Clerk's desk.

Representative Wakatsuki moved that the House agree to the amendments proposed by the Senate to H. B. No. 1870-70, and that H. B. No. 1870-70, as amended by the Senate, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Minn.

Representative Devereux then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of House Bill No. 1870-70, H.D. 1, S.D. 3, but I have grave reservations about what portions of this bill will do. For example, on Page 2, Paragraph 1, this bill provides that if prevailing wages in this State for a class is insufficient, reasonable wage data of other areas which has pertinency to this State may be used. This, in effect, means that wage data obtained from the State of California with respect to, for example, cafeteria managers, helpers and others, may be presumed to be applicable as 'pertinent wage data' to the State of Hawaii.

This bill does not prescribe the manner in which the judgment for 'pertinency' shall be attained, nor the criteria to be used, by whom it is to be judged, and above all, the interest to be served by such judgment. In short, how is 'pertinency' to be determined?

Mr. Speaker, I also bring to your attention, Page 3, subparagraph 3(a), where this bill provides that the implementation of the Wage Board salary schedule, shall be through the Public Employees Compensation Appeals Board.

I respectfully ask this body to consider

how the Public Employees Compensation Appeals Board is to remain in existence, the Civil Service Commission to remain in existence, when responsibilities of these two appointive boards are in direct conflict with the responsibilities of the newly created Hawaii Public Employees Relations Board provided for in the collective bargaining bill, Section 5, Page 9 of Senate Bill No. 1696–70, S.D. 1, H.D. 3, C.D. 1.

I am voting for this bill, Mr. Speaker, because I believe in the rights of all public employees to have an adequate wage base and I have long championed various efforts designed towards this end. I must caution you all, however, that this bill we are voting on tonight may have extremely serious and long lasting implications to our system of public employment.

I believe that Hawaii as a young State, young not only in terms of statehood, but in terms of sophistication in public management affairs, may take the leadership throughout the nation in issues such as abortion, but should wait for leadership from mature counsel from other states before destroying the merit system of our State and, in effect, returning to the spoils system.

Mr. Speaker, my heart is full at this moment, with pride in the majority of our public employees, and because of this pride, I cannot refrain from pointing out the dangers to our merit system which has served and protected our public employees well in the past.

Mr. Speaker, in the light of what I have said, I do believe a serious analysis of the entire method by which we are now granting legislative pay approval without adequate knowledge, adequate preparation and adequate forethought of what it will mean to the future of this State is vitally needed.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At 9:29 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

At 9:35 o'clock p.m., the House of Representatives reconvened.

Representative Baptiste then spoke in favor of the bill as follows:

"With all of the work both the House and Senate has done to this measure, to all the conferees who worked so hard in finalizing this measure, I speak individually congratulating them and thanking them for the work well done.

In speaking in favor of this bill, the most important and primary reason why I would vote for this bill is because in my life as a legislator and an official in other branches of government, I have found today that the segments of labor, made up of leaders and their members, the segments of management and their understudy, have proved to me that they are very very much more responsible than ever today than in the past and I am confident that all concerned shall take care of all the problems in the future. I think the guidelines that brought about this measure have come from many many sources.

This is a piece of landmark legislation that is well needed and I ask that every member of this House vote for this bill.

Thank you,"

The motion to pass H. B. No. 1870-70, as amended by the Senate, on Final Reading was put by the Chair and carried by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair here directed the Clerk to note that H. B. Nos. 1265-70 and 1870-70 had passed Final Reading at 9:37 o'clock p.m.

Representative Pule, for the Committee on Printing and Revisions, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 862-70) informing the House that House Resolution Nos. 410 to 412, Standing Committee Report No. 861-70, and Conference Committee Report No. 30, Re: S.C.R. No. 56, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, have been printed and distributed.

On motion by Representative Pule, seconded by Representative Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted.

At this time, Representative Taira, on a point of personal privilege, stated:

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House. Tonight, I am finishing 8 years of service in this House and in all probability, I shall not be back to join the good company and gain the friendship and your assistance and cooperation. I would like, therefore, before we adjourn, to tell you, Mr. Speaker, and to you of the majority and the minority, that I appreciate very much and I am very thankful for the very fine assistance, cooperation and your mature fellowship that I have received from you all these years.

I have benefitted greatly from our association and I hope that in some way I have contributed to your gaining a little knowledge of legislative work and work among friends and as I make this short speech, Mr. Speaker, I would just like to

say to all of you, good luck and best wishes in your future endeavors, whatever they may be.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair then replied:

"I am sure the Chair expresses the sentiment of the members of this House, Representative Taira, that we appreciate your work as Vice Chairman of the Finance Committee and Chairman of the Education Committee. The Chair expresses good luck to you in your future endeavors."

Representative Miho, on a point of personal privilege, stated:

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House. I too, would like to rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

I would like to say that May 12 has a special significance in my life for some 14 years ago tonight, I entered into a new chapter of my life which made Mr. Koichi lida, whose resolution we passed earlier this evening the future grandfather of my children. So, May 12 has great significance in my life and tonight, I also terminate 11 years of service in the House of Representatives since Statehood, and, as a minority member, I feel that these 11 years have been part of my most important period of my life. Although I may be withdrawing from the House of Representatives, that does not necessarily mean that I do intend to retire from politics, as such, because as most of you recall, there is an announcement coming forth from the hallway across that one of the Senators who happens to come from my Senatorial district is aspiring for higher office, which leaves a vacancy in the Sixth Senatorial district as well as the recently created single-member council which has some significance and interest

Before the night is over, I would be remiss if I did not get up and say that these 11 years have been meaningful years for me and that I have enjoyed every minute of it, not because of the trials and tribulations of a minority member, but I think I should give the majority members forewarning and all of you realize that this year particularly, under the leadership of our minority leader and the majority floor leader, the group effort of the minority has been something to behold and which should be a warning to the majority members that the House will not continue to remain, say 13 minority members.

Before I leave, I do want to say and express my personal gratitude to all thy members of the House, especially to the members of the majority who have been tolerant in my individual activities as a minority member, and to all the staff members for all the courtesies extended to me all these years and I do want to express to each and every one of you, the best of everything in the years to come.

Thank you."

The Chair replied:

"Representative Miho, in behalf of the members of the House, the Chair thanks you as a member of the loyal opposition, especially from the majority side, and wish you well."

Representative Bicoy then stated:

"I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege.

To adjourn Sine Die—to this day have we looked forward—and yet, these words carry a ring of sadness about them...

Sine Die, for we have now concluded the transaction of the public business.

But it is most difficult to ignore the fact that in the stresses and strains of conducting the public business, I have been most moved and persuaded by the many strong personalities amongst my distinguished colleagues.

We have had our many differences.

But then, it has been through these differences that the public has derived their most benefit. But when strong personalities achieve the reconciliation of differences, I am humbled by admiration for their ability to rise above the mediocre.

During the course of these past two sessions, through my own ignorance, I have had to turn to many of my colleages for counsel and assistance. These were given to me without reservation and with a great deal of understanding. And to those of my colleagues whom I had not sought personal counsel, they, too, have influenced my personal development. For whatever I may be, both as a legislator and as a person, I certainly owe much to my distinguished colleagues.

They have indulged me over my characteristically long-windedness; they have given me personal counsel; they have given me personal encouragement.

Indeed, it is not often in the course of a man's life when, in retrospect, he can honestly say to himself that he has given less of himself than he has received. And this has been the case of my personal relationship with my respected colleagues, and for which I can only give my pitifully inadequate but a profoundly sincere THANK YOU."

Representative Ho then stated:

"It has been a custom on the final day of a session that members attempt to summarize the events and accomplishments of the long days preceding. This is fitting. The American legislative process requires that ideas be examined in parts before being welded onto the whole of a legislature's accomplishment. So it is that while this legislature has busied itself with the task of marshalling literally thousands of ideas into a legislative program, it has not been until the past few days that the product of our efforts, for better or for worse, has begun to assume definite shape and form.

It has become fashionable to describe

political programs as being 'meaningful' or 'progressive'. Perhaps some programs are; these words mean many things to many people. However, I prefer simply to think and hope that what we have done during the last four months will, in some lasting way, relieve the human condition from the stresses which come from living in an increasingly over-crowded and increasingly impersonal community. Whether as a state or as a nation, our people are looking more and more to their governmental institutions to balance the relationship between the individual citizen and a collectivized society in which the average citizen's dignity and desires frequently become a side issue.

Mr. Speaker, I believe that this legislature has helped to balance the scales.

We have done this in ways too numerous to mention in these brief remarks, but I think that several bills can be given as illustrative examples.

At the outset of the session we knew that adequate and decent housing was unavailable to the greater number of lower and average—income families for lack of reasonable financing. We have made a start in meeting this need through the \$60 million housing bill, which will provide low—interest financing to these families and allow government to initiate residential development in the absence of private developer interest.

Recognizing that the high cost of materials and labor was also an element contributing to the housing gap, we also passed factory—built housing and demonstration housing legislation to promote more efficient building methods in light of the most recent technological advances in materials and construction technique.

Recognizing also that we must come to terms with the environment about us if we are to survive, we have tightened our air pollution laws, established a State—wide waste management program, and taken steps to abate the noise

problem. Recognizing further that disorderly urban development threatens the integrity of our limited open spaces we have provided money to both develop a State—wide open space plan and develop four new State parks.

The list of major items goes on and on: a more humane abortion law; planning money for mass transit system on Oahu; a tax reform law which increases personal exemptions, grants tax credits to renters, and eliminates tax-pyramiding to a substantial extent; a law which modernizes the organization of our district courts; a new collective bargaining bill for public employees; a stricter ethics law for legislators and public employees; a law aimed at rehabilitation of narcotics users and a law authorizing a methadone program; an election reform law; and a \$16 million building program for our community college system. And, yes, the House got tired of everyone playing games with the stadium issue and pushed through a \$10 million authorization to build it.

This session has been a long and difficult one. But in terms of solid accomplishment, it has also been a good one. We can, not only look upon it with a sense of satisfaction but also, I believe, with a sense of curiosity. Many of the measures which we adopted are novel and untested by any national standard or experience. But then so were the problems they were designed to resolve difficult and wanting of imaginative and forceful decision.

In short, Mr. Speaker, we came to do a job and we can go home knowing that we did it.

And now, Mr. Speaker, I ask the indulgence of the Chair to allow me to use my time for a personal aside. For the past two years, it has been my privilege to serve the Chair and the majority members of the House as floor leader. I will not be returning to the House next year, and I want to take this opportunity to express my farewell and thanks to each member of the House. I shall remember each of

you and the days and years we have spent together with fondness and deep affection."

The Chair replied:

"Representative Ho, in behalf of the members of the House, the Chair bids you farewell and I am sure I express the sentiments of all the members in wishing you well and success. The Chair personally appreciates your work as the majority floor leader, especially in the areas of major legislation.

Thank you very much."

Representative Garcia, on a point of personal privilege, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, the ending of this legislative session, compared to one year ago, is as different as day is from night. I recall last year when the majority members presented me with a toupee. They wanted to hide the glare from my bald head and I must confess quite candidly, they made a tremendous mistake. The toupee was defective because it has dandruff. I sent it to a hairdresser and it suffered from falling hair. As a consequence, I could not use it tonight. But I would like to say, Mr. Speaker, that the marked contrast between tonight and a year ago is so tremendous that I could not resist the temptation of speaking in behalf of the minority members and telling you what we think the session has been about and what has happened.

If we had permitted the CIP to pass as the Governor intended, the collective bargaining bill would have been dead, the housing measure would have been dead, the government employees measure would have died and all of the significant legislation that have passed this legislative body would have been for naught. As Representative Takamine earlier pointed out, we would have wasted 66 days here on the floor of this chamber. But, all good things come to an end. And, I say all good things come to an end because this legislative session has been productive

and I believe the majority members concede that the 13 minority members on this side of the aisle contributed their share, not only as the loyal opposition, and they could have been more vociferous had they so desired, but they were vociferous only to contribute to the passage of many of the measures that have passed this session.

I want to say on behalf of the minority members that it has been a great deal of fun working with all of you. It has been a great deal of fun for us to have done our best to help keep Hawaii a better place in which to work and to live.

To you, Representative Ho, I say in behalf of all the minority members, that we extend to you our sincerest congratulations for the dignified manner in which you served as the majority floor leader. You are a young man who has served with dignity and you are the kind of an individual who has made politics in Hawaii the thing that it is today—a distinguished and an honorable profession. Wherever you go, the minority members join me in extending to you our best wishes for your future undertaking.

To you, Mr. Speaker, in behalf of the minority members, congratulations for a job well done.

And I say to all of you, it has been a lot of fun working with you and when you meet here in 1971, may the future of Hawaii again rest in capable hands.

Thank you."

Representative Judd then requested Representative Pule to lead the House in the singing of Aloha Oe upon the final fall of the gavel on adjournment on Sine Die.

The Chair then stated:

"I guess all the speeches signify that the smoking lamp is almost out for the 1970 session. We may not have succeeded in all that we set out to do but at least we have made a start in the right direction in those areas we considered 'Unfinished Business.'

Walter Lippmann once said, 'Where all think alike, no one thinks very much'. I do not have to tell you 50 members of the House that you do not think alike but we have worked together to try to achieve a common goal where we have enacted major legislation to cope with some of our urgent and basic problems. I will not go into the areas of legislation enacted because most of your speeches have covered these areas but I would like to point out that I think we have benefitted from the committee work during the interim and I hope that between now and the 1971 session that even more work will be done in this area.

Midway during the session, I said that this was a heavyweight session with all the issues and problems before us, but in the process, we discovered amongst our midst potential candidates to the State Senate and some candidates for the City Council. The Chair could go on and on with regard to what you have done and, at this time, the Chair would like to simply express his personal appreciation to all of you for your sustained effort, particularly during the trying closing days of this session.

The Chair appreciates the cooperation of the minority and the minority leadership. Our relationship has always been above board and where we can see the grain. Also, the Chair would like to thank all of the staff members on behalf of the 51 members-the attorneys, clerks, secretaries, the printshop personnel and the floor staff. I think it is only proper that the Chair will take the time to single out one individual staff member who did, I believe, a marvelous job. That person is Mr. George Takane, who filled in temporarily as the Chief Clerk of the House when the Chief Clerk was taken ill, And to you, George, our sincere thanks, and to all of you, thanks again.

Mahalo."

Representative Soares, on a point of personal privilege, stated:

"As the leader of the minority, it would be remiss on my part if I did not have a few words to say in closing here this evening. I believe that the minority floor leader covered it well, however, I thought I would mention that on opening day, I stated that the minority would provide meaningful alternatives, will cooperate whenever necessary and would rebuke and argue whenever that was necessary. I think we have done that. We have spent hours during the interim providing alternatives in housing and mass transit and the tax program. We finally passed the 4% tax relief on drugs. We also had crimes and other matters, Mr. Speaker. But, I believe in calling a spade a spade--we could have done the job a lot sooner. We cannot go on in the future with the kind of bickering between both houses. I feel that it has to be solved somehow in the next session and I am confident that it can be solved because I will see, not only 13 minority members, but I will see 20 and plus. But in saying that, Mr. Speaker, I do want to say that my minority members are grateful to the Chairmen of the various Committees for the courtesies extended to them. The dialogue allowed in the Committee hearings made them feel that they were a part and parcel of the Committee.

I do want to say also as minority leader that I feel that Representative Ho has done an outstanding job as your floor leader. I have known him a long time. I think very highly of him. Between you, Mr. Speaker, your leadership and Representative Ho, I feel that we have been able to communicate and illustrate the kind of relationship that is so necessary in this body.

Mr. Speaker, I think we leave tonight with a feeling of accomplishment—a feeling for one another that although we can fight and argue on the floor of the House, we are all individually here for the purpose of doing the best we possibly can,

Mr. Speaker, on behalf of the minority, I thank you very much for our association."

The Chair then thanked Representative Soares.

The Chair appointed Representatives Ho, Pule, Taira and Miho as a committee to inform the Senate that the House had completed its business and is ready to adjourn sine dine.

At 10:01 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

At 10:09 o'clock p.m., the House of Representatives reconvened.

At this time, the committee reported that the Senate had been duly informed that the House had completed its business and is ready to adjourn sine die and that the Senate had informed the committee that they are ready to do likewise.

At 10:10 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative Ho, seconded by Representative Garcia and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned sine die.

Pursuant to Section 17, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith without my approval, House Bill No. 1930-70, entitled 'A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO IMPROVEMENTS BY ASSESS-MENTS.'

This bill was intended to amend Chapter

67, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to correct deficiencies in the existing laws relating to improvements by assessments, and to grant discretionary powers to the county councils which, if utilized, can increase the marketability of improvement district bonds. The bill, however, is constitutionally defective as it is in violation of Section 1, Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii.

Section 1, Article VII of the Hawaii Constitution provides, in pertinent part, that: 'Each political subdivision shall have and exercise such powers as shall be conferred under general laws.'

This bill relates to improvements by assessments in the Counties of Hawaii, Maui, and Kauai. However, the bill does not apply to the City and County of Honolulu. Legislation which purports to confer powers on a particular county or counties, but not to all, is a special law and would be in violation of Section 1, Article VII of the Hawaii Constitution.

Furthermore, this bill affects the issuance and marketability of improvement district bonds. Any question concerning the legality of the issuance of such bonds will adversely affect their marketability. Hence, the validity of a bill authorizing their issuance should be clear and unquestioned.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 1930-70 without my approval.

However, it is my view that the purpose of the bill has merit and therefore suggest further consideration thereof during the next legislative session to insure the enactment of a valid bill relating to improvements by assessments undertaken by the counties.

I have been informed by the Attorney General that since House Bill No. 2023-70 specifically applies only to the County of Hawaii, it is a special or local law in violation of the general laws provision of Section I of Article VII of the State Constitution, which provides that:

'The legislature shall create counties, and may create other political subdivisions within the State, and provide for the government thereof. Each political subdivision shall have and exercise such powers as shall be conferred under general laws.'

The legislative committee reports indicate that a purpose of the bill was to conform the Hawaii Revised Statutes to conflicting provisions in the Hawaii County Charter. However, pursuant to section 50-10, Hawaii Revised Statutes, provisions in the Hawaii County Charter supersede conflicting statutory provisions such as Chapter 64, Hawaii Revised Statutes. Therefore, repeal of such statutory provisions is not legally necessary.

Honorable Members Fifth Legislature State of Hawaii Pursuant to Section 17, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith without my approval, Senate Bill No. 1217-70, entitled 'A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NONRESIDENT TUITION AT THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII.'

This bill amends the law relating to tuition fees at the University of Hawaii. The nonresident tuition law enacted during the 1969 session exempts employees of the University, their spouses and dependents from the nonresident tuition. This bill would grant, in addition, an exemption to all full-time State employees.

This bill originated as an Administration measure and as originally drafted exempted all State employees and their spouses and dependents from the nonresident tuition.

I am unable to approve this bill as amended for the following reasons:

a. The bill would not fully accomplish the result for which it was intended. The nonresident tuition law enacted a year ago has the effect of discouraging a prospective nonresident employee from accepting a job with the State because he, his spouse, and dependents will have to pay the nonresident tuition at the University of Hawaii. Granting an exemption only to the employee, as this bill does, would not solve the situation, since in many instances it is the employee's spouse or dependent who would be attending the University and they would be subject to the nonresident tuition.

b. The bill would continue the discriminatory practice wherein the resident tuition would be applied to the spouse and dependents of Employee A who works for the University and the nonresident tuition would be applied to the spouse and dependents of Employee B who works for any other State department, even though both employees do not satisfy the one-year residency requirement. I can see no justification for the difference in treatment in the examples cited above. Eliminating the discrimination as it applies to the employee himself does not, in my mind, go far enough.

The purpose of said bill is to require

drivers of taxicabs in counties with a population in excess of 100,000 to deliver to any person, who sustains or complains of injury to his person or property while a passenger, a written statement setting forth the names and addresses of the driver and the registered owner of the taxicab. If the driver fails to provide such written statement, this bill imposes criminal sanctions of a \$1.000 fine and/or imprisonment of not more than one year, on both the driver and the registered owner. Administration and enforcement of the bill are made the responsibility of the Public Utilities Commission.

Presently, the Taxi Con.rol Bureau of the Honolulu Police Department administers and regulates taxicab operations. Under such regulation, a taxicab operator must display an identification card, clearly visible, in the vehicle naming the driver and owner. This information is also readily available at the Honolulu Police Department through license plate numbers, cab identification numbers, etc.

Furthermore, I am advised that the civil doctrine that a principal is bound by the acts of his agent has no application to criminal law because the requisite criminal intent cannot be imputed to a principal through an agent unless directed or authorized by the principal. This bill, however, would impute such intent to the owner regardle 3 of whether the driver acted under his direction or not.

Inasmuch as enactment of this bill (1) would result in a duplication of services by the Honolulu Police Department and the Public Utilities Commission and impose administrative burdens without corresponding public benefits, and (2) would impute criminal intent under circumstances which cannot be legally sustained. Statement of Objections to House Bill No. 111

Honorable Members Fifth Legislature State of Hawaii Pursuant to Section 17, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii. I am returning herewith without my approval, House Bill No. 111, entitled 'A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STANDARDS OF CONDUCT FOR STATE LEGISLATORS AND EMPLOYEES.'

This bill seeks to strengthen the State Ethics law, enacted in 1967, regarding transactions involving the State and, in particular, with respect to appearances by employees and legislators acting on behalf of private interests before State agencies.

Under the present law, only employees are prohibited from appearing on behalf of private interests before State agencies, and only where such employees would receive compensation that is contingent upon action of the State agency.

House Bill No. 111 expands the standards of conduct to include legislators and their associates with reference to appearances before State agencies. The bill also prohibits an employee from assisting any person on matters in which he participated as an employee, or from assisting any person in a representative capacity for a fee or other consideration on any matter before the State agency of which he is an employee where it can be reasonably inferred that his status as an employee would give him an undue advantage. Further, appearances by a former employee or legislator before agencies with which such employee or legislator had served, within one year subsequent to the termination of service, on behalf of a private interest for a fee or other consideration, would be prohibited where it can be inferred that the former status would give him an undue advantage. Violation of this latter provision is made a misdemeanor.

Under House Bill No. 111 what constitutes an 'undue advantage' is not defined. I have been informed by the Attorney General that generally to meet the due process requirements of the Constitution, a criminal statute must be sufficiently definite and certain to inform the citizen of the acts prohibited. In the instant case the lack of standards in determining

'undue advantage' under House Bill No. 111 objectionable on the ground of vagueness.

Moreover, it is noted that under Chapter 84, Hawaii Revised Statutes, an employee is defined as:

'... any nominated, appointed, or elected officer or employee of the State, including members of boards, commissions, and committees, and employees under contract to the State, but excluding legislators, justices, judges, and magistrates.'

I feel that all employees whether members of boards and commissions, contractual employees or otherwise are entitled to know specifically what acts are prohibited under House Bill No. 111, without the necessity of having to guess at the prohibited acts and taking the chance that they could have been wrong.

In addition, the prohibition against appearing before the State agency with which they had served seems to apply even to employees and legislators who may have left government service prior to the enactment of H. B. No. 111. If that is the intent, not only would H. B. No. 111 be patently unfair to such individuals but there would be serious questions regarding the validity of the bill.

Pursuant to Section 17, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith without my approval, H. B. No. 1944-70, entitled 'A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO A CLASSIFICATION COMMITTEE FOR HAWAII STATE CORREC-TIONAL FACILITIES.'

The purpose of this bill is to provide for the establishment and composition of a classification committee for the Hawaii State correctional facilities to classify inmates for purposes of the various correctional programs.

It is my belief that the establishment of a classification committee for the purpose of classifying inmates within the State's correctional system is basically an administrative function. This view is borne out by the fact that the Department of Social Services and Housing has had such a committee in each of the facilities in the Correction Division for a number of years. Moreover, these committees have been effectively performing the very function contemplated by H. B. No. 1944-70.

In establishing the classification committee, H. B. No. 1944-70 provides for a fixed composition of membership and that the committee's classification of inmates shall be final. However, it is noted that the responsibility and accountability for the correctional program is vested in the Director of the Department of Social Services and Housing. Making the committee's classification final is contrary to the concept of responsibility and accountability vested in the Director and undermines the administration of the correctional program. Furthermore, changing correctional philosophy and diverse needs of inmates make it imperative that there be administrative flexibility in this area of discipline and rehabilitation of inmates.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning H. B. No. 1944-70 without my approval.

Statement of Objections to House Bill No. 2162-70

Honorable Members Fifth Legislature State of Hawaii Pursuant to Section 17, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 2162-70, entitled 'A BILL FOR AN ACT AMENDING CHAPTER 46, HAWAII REVISED STATUTES, BY PROVIDING PROCEDURES FOR THE AMENDMENT OF THE GENERAL PLAN AND ZONING ORDINANCES OF ALL COUNTIES AND DISSEMINATION OF INFORMATION IN RESPECT THERETO.'

The primary purpose of this bill is to provide a uniform statutory procedure by which amendments to the general plans and zoning ordinances of the several counties may be validly made. As you are well aware, confusion exists as to the precise procedures necessary to assure the validity of amendments made to county general plans as a result of a recent Supreme Court decision, commonly known as the Dalton case. House Bill No. 2162-70 sets out in detail these necessary precise procedures.

Among other matters, the bill provides that either the planning director, the council or any interested person may initiate a proposed amendment to a county general plan. Council initiated amendments are to be referred to the planning commission which is then required to hold a public hearing upon the matter and to submit its written recommendations through the mayor to the council within 30 days after the close of the public hearing. If the council desires any change or addition to the proposed amendment, it is required to refer the matter back to the planning commission which is then required to submit its further recommendations thereon within a period of 30 days following reference. As to amendments submitted by any interested person, the planning director is required to refer the same with his recommendations to the planning commission for consideration within 60 days following the receipt of the proposed amendment.

I have received many communications both for and against the enactment of House Bill No. 2162-70. A major criticism of the bill from many sources, including the mayors and planning directors of all counties, is that the 30-day and 60-day periods for the planning commission and the planning director to gather data, to prepare necessary studies, to obtain public reactions, and to submit their respective recommendations as required by the bill, will be unreasonably burdensome in many cases where large and complicated amendments to the general plan are under consideration.

Although the 30-day and 60-day periods within which action must be taken by the planning commission and the planning director might be burdensome in certain cases, I do believe that the imposition of time limits within which a governmental agency should take action on matters pending before it has merit.

The bill and the committee reports suggest that there is frustration and dissatisfaction with the time required in processing general plan amendments and in the disposition by the planning director of requests made to him for initiation of general plan amendments. This bill appears in part to be a reaction thereto. These frustrations and dissatisfactions might be met by imposing reasonable time limits on actions by the director and commission and by requiring full and periodic disclosures by the planning director of disposition of requests made to him and the reasons therefor.

Another complaint about H. B. No. 2162-70 which I believe merits the reconsideration of the Legislature is the inclusion of landowners and lessees among those having the legal right to initiate general plan amendments. It may be that this is contrary to a point implicit in the county charters that planning is a professional discipline requiring knowledge and application of physical, economic, social, cultural, aesthetic and other factors, and may allow political and other pressures to play too heavy a role in planning the future of our communities.

In spite of the criticisms stated above and other minor apparent imperfections in H. B. No. 2162-70, I might have been persuaded to allow the bill to be enacted into law in view of the considerable distress currently existing among those seeking to build because of the confusion in the precise procedures necessary for the valid adoption of amendments to county general plans.

I appreciate the intent of this particular piece of legislation as it affects our many thousands of small landowners. It is most regrettable that this measure has been misnamed the 'developer's bill' by the press.

The so-called 'big developers' have less to gain from this measure than the many owners of small parcels of land who do not have the economic resources for a comprehensive review of their holdings. They are the ones who really suffer from delays in getting approval for county general plan amendments. They cannot afford heavy legal fees to cut through the mass of red tape that so frequently frustrates the small landowner.

However, I have been assured by the mayors of all the counties within the State that they will expeditiously initiate action to formulate procedures at the county level to alleviate the existing confusion.

It may be that in attempting to meet current dissatisfaction with the situation existing on Oahu as a result of the Dalton decision, H. B. No. 2162-70 may constitute an over-reaction to Oahu's problem, as to which reconsideration by the Legislature may be in order.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 2162-70 without my approval.
