The House of Representatives of the Sixth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1971, was called to order at 11:00 o'clock a.m.

Representative Poepoe then rose and stated that he is employed as an engineer and serves on the Pollution Committee and asked the Chair for a ruling as to whether or not there was a conflict of interest.

The Chair ruled that there was no conflict of interest and Representative Poepoe was not excused from voting on this measure.

Representative Kimura then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of the bill.

Pollution control and the preservation of our environment is probably the most important single issue facing our State and our nation. The concern expressed by many on the need to preserve the purity of our air, water and environment is indeed real. The passage of this bill signifies that the House of Representatives shares in this real concern.

House Bill 69, HD 2 clearly spells out the policy of this State that the protection of our environment and the furtherance of the quality of life of our citizens are paramount. The bill provides guidelines, not now existing, for the establishment of rules and standards to control emissions which pollute our air and water and which cause excessive noise. It provides for the enforcement of ambient quality and emission standards in a meaningful, practicable and feasible fashion. It provides for the right of citizens to initiate action to prevent and abate damage to our very important environment.

This bill is the product of many hours of labor and deliberation on the part of your Committee on Judiciary. In the development of HD 2, your Committee took into account the many divergent views on how best to prevent, control, and abate pollution, to preserve our environment, and to protect the health, safety and welfare of our people.

Probably not everyone will be entirely happy with the various aspects of the bill. There are those who would have preferred more stringent provisions in the bill. On the other hand, there are those who would have chosen a more liberal and looser approach than that exhibited here. Your Committee, in formulating HD 2, sought that approach which would do the job envisioned by environmentalists but which, at the same time, would rationally take into account the economic well being of our State and the honest concerns of industry.

Mr. Speaker, it is my belief that the bill, as presented in HD 2, offers a reasonable, feasible, and practicable way by which the ends we are all seeking may be accomplished. I am convinced that the bill, as drafted, is workable, and I urge its passage.

Thank you,"

Representatives Carroll, Judd, Roehrig, Aduja, Hansen and R. Garcia then spoke in favor of H. B. No. 69, HD

Roll call having been requested, the motion to adopt the report of the Committee and to pass H. B. No. 69, as amended, having been read throughout, on Third Reading was put by the Chair and carried by a vote of 39 ayes to 10 noes, with Representatives Aki, Chong, Duponte, J. Garcia, Iha, Kato, Lunasco, Oda, Takamine and Unemori voting no and Representatives O'Connor and Soares being excused.

At 1:23 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

At 1:24 o'clock p.m., the House of Representatives reconvened.

Consideration of Stand. Com. Rep. No. 650 on H. B. No. 133, as amended, which had been deferred to this day.

On motion by Representative O'Connor, seconded by Representative Kimura and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H. B. No. 133, as amended, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Consideration of Stand. Com. Rep. No. 651 on H. B. No. 371 which had been deferred to this day.

On motion by Representative O'Connor, seconded by Representative Kimura and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H. B. No. 371, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Consideration of Stand. Com. Rep. No. 652 on H. B. No. 489 which had been deferred to this day.

By unanimous consent, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 652 and H. B. No. 489 were recommitted to the Committee on Judiciary.

Consideration of Stand. Com. Rep. No. 653 on H. B. No. 490 which had been deferred to this day.

On motion by Representative O'Connor, seconded by Representative

Kimura and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H. B. No. 490, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes, with Representatives Kihano, Kuroda, Morioka, Roehrig and Saiki being excused.

Consideration of Stand. Com. Rep. No. 654 on H. B. No. 1437, as amended, which had been deferred to this day.

Representative O'Connor moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and that H. B. No. 1437, as amended, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Kimura.

Representative Devereux then spoke against the passage of the bill.

Representative O'Connor, in speaking for the bill, stated:

"This Board will consist of 5 members, 3 of whom are designated as licensed elevator mechanics and the remaining 2 members will be lay members.

Mr. Speaker, in arranging the composition of any licensing board, it is always wise to remember that spreading the expertise required for exercising decent judgment, together with the input necessary from the outside community, insure that proper licensing procedures are followed and that decent decisions are made. In areas where expertise may not be required, the final criteria required in every licensing procedure are sufficient groupings of people from different backgrounds to insure that there is proper decision and proper rule and regulation following in arriving at certain decisions. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, because it is extremely important in this community today for the safety of our families and our citizens, we must insure that our elevators, escalators and other moving equipment on which the public rides, operate safely and correctly.

I urge, Mr. Speaker, that this piece of legislation pass.

Thank you."

At 1:27 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

At 1:31 o'clock p.m., the House of Representatives reconvened.

By unanimous consent, action on Stand. Com. Rep. No. 654 on H. B. No. 1437, as amended, was deferred until the end of the calendar.

Consideration of Stand. Com. Rep. No. 658 on H. B. No. 434, as amended, which had been deferred to this day.

On motion by Representative O'Connor, seconded by Representative Kimura and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H. B. No. 434, as amended, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Consideration of H. B. No. 1514 on Third Reading which had been deferred to this day.

By unanimous consent, H. B. No. 1514 was recommitted to the Committee on Judiciary.

Consideration of H. B. No. 29 on Third Reading which had been deferred to this day.

By unanimous consent, H. B. No. 29 was recommitted to the Committee on Finance.

Consideration of H. B. No. 235 on Third Reading which had been deferred to this day.

Representative O'Connor moved that H. B. No. 235, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Kimura.

Representatives Leopold and Oda then spoke against the passage of this bill.

Representative O'Connor then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, Hawaii, unlike the majority of the states in this union, has a one—man government in the administrative branch of the government. This was done by design in the Constitutional Convention of 1950. Hawaii's government was designed with a strong executive as its key note. This is an excellent mode of government, probably one of the finest mode of State government in the union, because it

provides for swift and efficient executive action in areas demanded by the citizens of the State.

However, there is one vice in this type of government and that vice is his appointed cabinet members, his appointed executives, his appointees right down the line becoming a sconce in government and not being responsive to the people in any way.

Many other states have faced this situation. The United States itself, with the same kind of government, has faced up to this problem. In the United States, we have amended our constitution to deny to the President of the United States the right to serve for more than 8 years, and in this State, I would suggest that we deny to any executive the right to serve for more than 8 years.

One of the previous speakers' memory is short when he refers to the Constitutional Convention of 1968, and I would suggest that it is short because the political climate in 1968 was not the political climate of 1970 or 1971, and a measure such as this is today something which should be looked at by every member of this Body in an objective, affirmative manner.

Mr. Speaker, I urge strongly that this legislation pass.

Thank you."

Representative Suwa then stated that he has mixed feelings about the passage of this bill and was not sure as to how he should vote on this measure.

Roll call having been requested, the motion to pass H. B. No. 235, having been read throughout, on Third Reading, was put by the Chair and carried by a vote of 32 ayes to 19 noes, which was not less than two—thirds of all the members to which the House is entitled, with Representatives de la Cruz, Devereux, Fong, J. Garcia, Iha, Inaba, Kato, Kihano, Lee, Leopold, Lunasco, Nakama, Oda, Saiki, Soares, Suwa, Takamine, Uechi and Unemori voting no.

Consideration of Stand. Com. Rep. No. 672 on H. B. No. 397 which had been deferred to this day.

On motion by Representative

O'Connor, seconded by Representative Kimura and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H. B. No. 397, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Consideration of Stand. Com. Rep. No. 673 on H. B. No. 429, as amended, which had been deferred to this day.

On motion by Representative O'Connor, seconded by Representative Kimura and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H. B. No. 429, as amended, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair here directed the Clerk to note that H. B. Nos. 69, 133, 371, 490, 434, 235, 397 and 429 and S. B. Nos. 552 and 104 had passed Third Reading not earlier than 1:45 o'clock p.m.

At 1:48 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative Ushijima, seconded by Representative J. Garcia and carried, the House of Representatives stood in recess until 6:30 o'clock p.m. this evening.

Representative O'Connor, for the majority of the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 740) approving the intent and purpose of H. B. No. 796 and recommending its passage on Third Reading.

By unanimous consent, consideration of Stand. Com. Rep. No. 740 on H. B. No. 796 was deferred until tomorrow, April 8, 1971.

The Chair here directed the Clerk to note that printed copies of H. B. No. 796, HD 1, were made available to the

members of the House at 5:30 o'clock p.m., in accordance with Article III, Section 16, of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii.

At 6:52 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

At 6:53 o'clock p.m., the House of Representatives reconvened.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Consideration of Stand. Com. Rep. No. 675 on H. B. No. 65, as amended, which had been deferred to this day.

Representative O'Connor moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and that H. B. No. 65, as amended, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Roehrig.

Representative Kawakami then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill.

The basic intent of House Bill 65 is to strengthen our State Land Use Law, and the various amendments to it have served only to refine and clarify further this basic intent. The need for the careful regulation of the use of the lands in our State is self—evident, and the various proposals contained in House Bill 65, HD 2, will hopefully bring us closer to this objective.

For one thing, the bill expands the membership of the State Land Use Commission to involve other responsible public officials, including the executive heads of the various county planning departments as exofficio nonvoting members. Further, a restriction is placed on commission members preventing them from engaging in the development of land for a profit while serving as a member of the Land Use Commission.

This bill would also require the Commission to send notices of public hearings relating to changes in district boundaries by certified or registered mail to owners of property located within 400 feet of the boundaries of the land being petitioned for change. Such a provision will work to promote greater public involvement in decisions affecting land

use. It would insure proper notice to those who would be affected or otherwise interested in the proposed district boundary change.

The bill further requires that the substance of a public hearing be published by the Commission, and in the event that there appears to be a substantial difference between the subject matter advertised in the public hearing notice and the subsequent action of the Land Use Commission, the action of the Commission is voidable.

And finally, Mr. Speaker, the bill provides for the reversion of reclassified land when the person seeking the reclassification does not use the land in the way he had indicated at the time the petition was brought.

Mr. Speaker, these major points of House Bill 65, HD 2, which I have just outlined, collectively do one thing—they provide for public involvement and promote public awareness whenever the question arises as to how our public lands should be used. As land is among our State's most important and most limited natural resource, maximum public participation in the planning and use of this resource must be insured and promoted.

Therefore, Mr. Speaker, may I urge all the members of this Honorable Body to vote in favor of House Bill 65, HD 2.

Thank you."

Representative Unemori rose to speak against the bill and stated that although the counties of Hawaii, Maui and Kauai comprise the bulk of the land in the State, nearly two—thirds of the voting membership of the commission are from the island of Oahu; that under this unbalanced commission makeup, the fundamental purpose and function this bill was designed to serve are for nil and urged the members to vote against the measure.

Representative Ushijima then spoke in favor of the bill as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, land is one of our scarcest and most coveted resources. There is a good deal of wealth to be made in land ownership and speculation, and a good deal to be lost to the people of the

State through its misuse.

In many ways, land should not be regarded a private commodity at all but as a public trust. Land value is something that originates, not in the actions of its owners, but which accrues from population growth, economic growth, and the natural features of the land itself. The way in which land is used affects all of us for generations to come. It is good that decisions affecting the use and the value of land be made in a manner which allows for broad public participation.

House Bill 65, HD 2, greatly increases the possibilities for such broad participation, first by increasing the size of the Land Use Commission, and secondly, by requiring full and careful notice to be given, both to the public at large and to the surrounding landowners, whenever a change in land use is proposed. Some may argue that the larger size of the Commission will produce inefficiency, and they may be right; but in exchange, we hope to receive the benefit of a more democratic, more deliberative process which will help insure good judgments concerning the use of our land. In addition, H. B. 65, HD 2, would prevent Commissioners from receiving financial gain as a result of their own decisions, insuring us that they will be free to act in the public, not private, interest.

Mr. Speaker, I urge all members of this Honorable Body to vote for this measure."

Roll call having been requested, the motion to adopt the report of the majority of the Committee and to pass H. B. No. 65, as amended, having been read throughout, on Third Reading was put by the Chair and carried by a vote of 38 ayes to 13 noes, with Representatives de la Cruz, Duponte, Iha, Inaba, Kato, Lee, Poepoe, Saiki, Suwa, Takamine, Uechi, Unemori and Wasai voting no.

Consideration of Stand. Com. Rep. No. 67.6 on H. B. No. 51 which had been deferred to this day.

On motion by Representative Suwa, seconded by Representative Akizaki and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H. B. No. 51, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Kimura then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of House Bill 937, HD 1.

Hawaii is respected throughout the United States as having a Legislature not bound and tied by tradition, but by a Legislature bound to tackle the challenge of new developments.

The new institution of law at the University of Hawaii will bring a much needed solution to a problem existing in Hawaii for too long.

Hawaii students have had to travel to the mainland to obtain a law degree. This, as a concept, is not crushing for a varied social and educational exposure adheres to a broadened perspective in the healthy growth of a young community.

Crushing, for too long, however, is the situation faced by students who are unable to finance the travel, tuition and living costs away from home.

Now, the opportunity of equal education for all students, despite economic background, illuminates as a vision fulfilled—the fulfillment that each individual can contribute to his society in a way that satisfies his own self esteem.

It is becoming alarmingly difficult for Hawaii students to gain admission to mainland law schools and, therefore, limiting the vision of acquiring a legal education to a dim light.

The need for a law school is not uniquely a Hawaii dilemma. The rapid population growth, a sharp rise for legal assistance, a booming increase of law school applicants have awakened the Association of American Law Schools in projecting the need for more law institutions throughout the United States.

Hawaii remains isolated in being one out of seven states that has no tax-supported law school. We hope that this isolation in the very near future will not include our Pacific State.

The University complex, as well as our community, will be enriched by the intellectual discipline of law in generating

a deeper understanding and appreciation of law, its process and its consequences. Other related fields of discipline will profit through the research and academic activity of solving social and economic problems through cooperative adventures. Practicing attorneys will be enlightened through the offering of special and advanced courses through a continuing education program. The illuminating presence of a body of legal scholars will radiate in fact throughout the island wide community.

Mr. Speaker, Hawaii's reservoir of talent will therefore be employed to the pressing problems of our changing technological society by the establishment of a law school at the University of Hawaii.

Thank you."

For that reason, Mr. Speaker, your Committee on Judiciary urges that H. B. No. 70, HD 1, pass.

Thank you."

Representative Aduja then requested the following be inserted in the Journal:

"GENERAL MONCADO'S MAN'S MORAL CONCEPT

Moral is but man's great divine power to achieve all things on earth — because it is life. Life is but humility and meekness of man's great virtue in order to inherit the wealth of the earth. Man is God's human mechanism in His wisdom. Because without man on earth, there is no God on earth. Man's moral is God's human virtue. Moral is but man's divine guidance to achieve all earthly things — the material of life. The moral of a man is against all earthly vices. All vices are destructive to man's physical fitness — and, therefore, man should fight against all vices.

By nature and its divinity, and its creation, man's moral is God. God is moral. Moral is man, and man is God. Therefore, let us achieve material success based upon man's moral concept in life in order to be happy to live with man's neighbor.

All men should strictly, literally, divinely follow the moral concept of man, and should fight against all forms of vices which are destructive to humanity, for it is the paramount duty of every man to serve humanity. Morality is but man's divine service for humanity. Humanity be served is a moral virtue of every man to achieve in life. Life is but service and suffering for the love of humanity. Humanity is God's Creation. God's creation of the universe is but the divine pronouncement of Peace on earth and Good Will to all men."

Representative Aduja then stated that the Filipino Federation of America, founded on December 27, 1925, favored and worked in support of Statehood for Hawaii and adopted a resolution in this regard. A letter was received from Samuel Wilder King, Governor of Hawaii at that time, relative to this resolution and Representative Aduja requested that said letter be inserted in the Journal as follows:

Representative Suwa, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 764) approving the intent and purpose of S. C. R. No. 44 and recommending its adoption.

On motion by Representative Suwa, seconded by Representative Akizaki and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S. C. R. No. 44 was adopted.

Representative R. Garcia, for the Committee on Public Health, Youth and General Welfare, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 765) approving the intent and purpose of S. C. R. No. 14 and recommending its adoption, with certain amendments.

On motion by Representative R. Garcia, seconded by Representative Uechi and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S. C. R. No. 14, as amended, was adopted.

On motion by Representative Suwa, seconded by Representative Akizaki and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H. R. No. 74 was adopted.

On motion by Representative Wedemeyer, seconded by Representative Suwa and carried, H. R. No. 370 was adopted.

By unanimous consent, the following resolutions (H. R. Nos. 371 and 372) and concurrent resolution (H. C. R. No. 92) were referred to the Committee on Legislative Management and further action deferred until Monday, April 12, 1971:

SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Ushijima, seconded by Representative J. Garcia and unanimously carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering bills on Final Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Consideration of Conf. Com. Rep. No. 1 on S. B. No. 1, as amended, which had been deferred to this day.

Representative Suwa moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S. B. No. 1, as amended, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Akizaki

Representative Suwa then stated that the item "K-2" appearing on Page 23, line 17, of the Conference Committee Report should be deleted inasmuch as the conferees had inadvertently made this insertion and it was not the intention of said conferees to hold the department to the 99 K-2 three-on-two classes.

Representative Suwa then spoke in favor of S. B. No. 1, as amended, as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of S. B. No. 1, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1, the general appropriation bill of 1971.

I urge that all 51 members of this House fully support this historic bill.

Let me mention a number of 'firsts' that characterize it:

- it is the first appropriations act prepared in the planning-programming-budgeting format,
- it is the first biennial act since statehood,
- it is the first Hawaii State legislative action which concerns an amount in excess of one billion dollars.

This bill authorizes the expenditure of \$1,777,000,000 for state government operations and capital investments over the next two years. General fund cash will finance \$904 million of this sum. The conferees concluded that many increased public needs could not be deferred, and therefore recommended an appropriation of \$12-1/2 million above the Governor's budget. We are convinced that the continued growth of Hawaii's economy will produce general fund revenues sufficient to support the recommended budget.

We do expect the Governor and the Director of Finance, by the authority and responsibility given to them, to continually review expenditures and make any adjustments necessary to ensure fiscal solvency for the State over the next two years.

Before closing my remarks, Mr. Speaker, I would like to make some personal observations. Since I first entered the Legislature in 1958, the annual State budget has increased six-fold. It is four times as large as when Hawaii first became a State. Yet, the formulation of this large and complex budget was accomplished faster and more efficiently than in any session I have attended. I would like to publicly attribute this to the 51 members of the House; and especially the members of the Finance Committee, who spent many days and nights hammering out the budget; and to the Senate conferees who entered the conference in a spirit of reasonableness and cooperation; to the Back Room staff and the Printshop and to my dedicated staff,

At this time, I would like to invite subject matter chairmen, and other members of this House to contribute their comments on this bill.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kato then inquired if the Chairman of the Finance Committee would yield to a question, to which Representative Suwa replied in the affirmative.

Representative Kato questioned if the appropriation for a full-time Public Utilities position was included in this bill.

Representative Suwa replied that the conferees had deleted the dollar amount for the full-time position as there is a bill in the Senate covering that item and said bill is expected to come over to the House.

Representative Poepoe then spoke in favor of the bill,

Representative Ushijima then rose to speak in favor of the bill as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of the important measure before us.

The general appropriations bill has received the most intensive review. In its final form before us, it represents many compromises, because there are never enough resources to do all of the things we wish to do. But I believe, Mr. Speaker, in this uncertain economic climate, we have provided for the more pressing needs of the State while acknowledging that our financial position must be preserved.

As indicated earlier, Mr. Speaker, there are two aspects of this bill which make it particularly unique.

For the first time since territorial days, we are enacting a biennial appropriations bill. This made the job all the more difficult

In addition, Mr. Speaker, we have taken the transitional steps towards i m p l e m e n t i n g planning-programming-budgeting. The appropriations bill emphasizes programs rather than organizations, and for the first time, we are able to look at the full cost of programs by integrating capital investments and operating costs.

Mr. Speaker, the accommodation of the biennial cycle and the PPB approach was a monumental task. That is why it is all the more significant that this bill has been reported out as early as it has. Not in many years have we had the appropriations bill as early as this date. This is certainly a tribute to the work of our conference managers and particularly, the effective leadership of our Chairman on conference.

They dealt with the issues, they ironed out the differences with the other house and the result is a bill which we can all support. I commend them for their efficient performance, and ask all members of this Honorable Body to support their work by voting for this measure.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion to adopt the report of the Committee and to pass S. B. No. 1, as amended, on Final Reading was put by the Chair and carried, and S. B. No. 1, as amended, passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes which is not less than two-thirds vote of all the members to which the House is entitled.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S. B. No. 1 had passed Final Reading at 6:27 o'clock p.m.

Consideration of Conf. Com. Rep. No. 2 on H. B. No. 4, as amended, which had been deferred to this day.

Representative Suwa moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H. B. No. 4, as amended, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Akizaki.

Representative Suwa then spoke in favor of the bill as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of H. B. No. 4, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1, the general improvements bill of 1971.

I wish to assure this House that passage of this bill will leave the State comfortably within the debt limit. Let me show you why.

The debt margin available to us at the start of this session was \$298 million. We increased this \$7 million by lapsing obsolete projects. Enactment of the general appropriations bill of 1971 and H. B. No. 365 on housing loan guarantees reduced the available margin to \$124 million.

The bill before this body, House Bill

No. 4, authorizes the issuance of \$95.6 million in general obligation bonds. This is prudently within the available debt margin.

Now, let's look to the future. When the State Legislature convenes next January, the State will have available to it even greater borrowing capacity. This is attributed to the State's growing economy. Even if we authorize every dollar available to us this year, which I hope we don't, I predict that next year's debt margin will exceed \$180 million.

I am convinced that the public improvements appropriated by this bill are essential to the complete and comprehensive implementation of State programs. It will permit the continuation of our substantial commitment to projects which contribute to the educational, economic development, health, and transportation goals of the State.

I urge that all 51 members of this House support this measure.

Mr. Speaker, thank you."

Representative Leopold spoke in favor of the bill and expressed some reservations regarding whether or not the improvement district approach is the proper and most equitable way to help finance improvements in Waikiki and stating further that he felt that a tax on occupied hotel rooms was a more equitable means for financing Waikiki improvements.

Representative Carroll spoke in favor of the bill but expressed his concern over Line 67, Waikiki Improvements, Oahu in that he owned two condominiums in this area and requested a ruling on conflict of interest in this regard.

The Chair ruled that there was no conflict of interest and he was not excused from voting on the measure.

Representative Suwa, in explaining the Waikiki Improvements item, stated as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, the intent of this proposal is to clean up the Waikiki area, provide for necessary improvements and generally, make it an attractive place for residents and visitors. Conditions now are

deteriorating – we dare not allow it to continue.

Hawaii's visitor industry is an integral part of our economy. About one quarter of Hawaii's income is generated through this industry, resulting in thousands of jobs and millions of dollars in wages. In this way, the visitor industry provides an enormous tax base which provides revenues for improvements and services throughout the State.

Basically, I would like to make three points.

First, Waikiki is not simply a Twelfth District problem. It is not simply an Oahu problem. It is a Statewide problem. You will recall that Mayor Shunichi Kimura of the Big Island recently made a statement in support of this concept.

Second, we are merely presenting the City and County of Honolulu with financial help based on new concepts. The City Council and the Mayor would have ample opportunity to study the scope of the problem, to review the improvement district laws, to compute the total financial needs, and to attract citizen involvement through extensive public hearings. The City would then have the information necessary to come up with a comprehensive, rational and financially responsible program for Waikiki.

My third point, Mr. Speaker, and possibly the most important, is that this is not simply a tourist measure. These improvements are needed to insure local residents the full use and enjoyment of Waikiki, as well as to maintain the well-being of Hawaii's economy.

We are attempting through this plan to provide a means by which the City and County may solve its problems in Waikiki. It has a flexible framework which extends autonomy to the City and County in establishing needed improvements and implementing programs to solve the problems. Mr. Speaker, it allows the Mayor and the City Council to work out with the property owners the actual share of the improvements which the property owners will have to contribute.

Never before has Waikiki received such attention. I believe that for the good of

the City and County and for the State as well, we must get moving.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representatives O'Connor and Poepoe spoke in favor of the bill.

The motion to adopt the report of the Committee and to pass H. B. No. 4, as amended, on Final Reading was put by the Chair and carried, and H. B. No. 4, as amended, passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes which is not less than two-thirds vote of all the members to which the House is entitled.

The Chair here directed the Clerk to note that H. B. No. 4 had passed Final Reading at 6:35 o'clock p.m.

Consideration of Stand. Com. Rep. No. 740 on H. B. No. 796, which had been deferred to this day.

On motion by Representative O'Connor, seconded by Representative Kimura and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H. B. No. 796, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H. B. No. 796 had passed Third Reading at 6:36 o'clock p.m.

The Chair declared a recess at 6:37 o'clock p.m., subject to the call of the Chair.

At 6:47 o'clock p.m., the House of Representatives reconvened.

At 6:50 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative Ushijima, seconded by Representative J. Garcia and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned to 11:00 o'clock a.m., Monday, April 12, 1971.

Upon reconvening at 11:47 o'clock a.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives Kato and Kimura.

SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Ushijima, seconded by Representative J. Garcia and carried unanimously, the rules were suspended for the purpose of taking up bills on Third Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar.

THIRD READING

The following bills, which were on the calendar for Third Reading, were read throughout and the following actions were taken:

Third Reading of S. B. No. 1127.

On motion by Representative R. Garcia, seconded by Representative Uechi, S. B. No. 1127 passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Third Reading of S. B. No. 894.

On motion by Representative Suwa, seconded by Representative Akizaki, S. B. No. 894 passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Third Reading of S. B. No. 20.

Representative Suwa moved that S. B. No. 20 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Akizaki.

Representative Wong then spoke against the passage of the bill as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, there is no question that a stadium is needed for Honolulu. The question is, at what cost?

In 1970, this Legislature authorized the spending of 11.4 million dollars for a 34,000 seat stadium which could be expanded to 50,000, should the need arise. One year later, we are talking about spending 26 million dollars for a 50,000 seat stadium.

Let us look at the cost escalation since 1970. With reference to the 34,000 seat

stadium, the original proposal was 11.4 million dollars. Several months later, we hear the figure of 17.4 million dollars for a 34,000 seat stadium and a little time later, we hear the figure set at 20.3 million dollars for a 34,000 seat stadium.

Then, we began talking about a 50,000 seat stadium. The original cost was estimated at 27.2 million dollars and a few months later, we heard the figure of 34.6 million dollars. This would appear to me excessive, Mr. Speaker, for the reason that we are being sold a bill of goods by the Luckman and Associates people. There has been talk, Mr. Speaker, about the need for a 50,000 seat stadium now.

The argument being advanced is that a 50,000 seat stadium would qualify us to be in competition for a National Football franchise. I do agree to a point, Mr. Speaker, that this is valid. However, even if a 50,000 seat stadium were built, we would have no guarantee that a National Football franchise would come to Hawaii. I think we would have to look at it from the football owner's standpoint. Of course, they would like to have us have a 50,000 seat stadium. So would they like to have other cities throughout the United States build a 50,000 seat stadium, thereby making their choice a very selected one.

The thing that amazes me, Mr. Speaker, is that no one in the State Administration has any idea as to what the operating cost of the stadium would be. It appears to me, Mr. Speaker, that this is the most basic question which has to be answered before we proceed with consideration of the building of a stadium at such a high cost.

As an example, I would like to state that in the city of New York, which has been considered a very sports-minded town, we have two large stadiums; that is the Yankee Stadium and the Shea Stadium. They have two National Football franchises and one baseball franchise in that particular area-the New York Giants and the New York Jets for football and the New York Yankees for National League baseball. In addition to this, Mr. Speaker, they can draw from a population within a radius of 150 miles of 10 million people, and yet these two stadiums operate at a deficit of \$300,000 a year.

What about the 'new concept' being used for the stadium as proposed by Luckman and Associates—the concept of air flow. I personally feel that the people of this State are being asked to put their money on the line to experiment with a new concept. If this fails, obviously, the concept will not be used for other stadiums in the future.

We have been assured by our Comptroller and Luckman and Associates that the air flow concept works and that Luckman and Associates has given us a one—year guarantee for this particular concept. I submit, Mr. Speaker, that if the concept is so good as they tell us, there should be no reason why a five—year guarantee cannot be obtained from Luckman and Associates.

For these reasons, Mr. Speaker, I feel compelled to ask my colleagues to vote this measure down.

Thank you."

Representative Suwa then spoke in favor of the bill as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, there is nothing in this bill nor in the Committee Report which-commits the House to the Luckman Plan. All I know is we are committing ourselves to around a 50,000 seat stadium.

The projection of population on Oahu will tend to support a 50,000 seat stadium. However, at the same time, Mr. Speaker, may I caution the Administration that the House is taking a position that at no time are we committed to the Luckman Plan and that the amount appropriated is sufficient to build a 50,000 seat stadium whether it be the Luckman Plan or any other plan. I intend the Administration to save some money in this area wherever possible.

What we are saying is for the Administration to go ahead and start appointing the Board so that they can work into the area of cost—benefit ratio. I honestly believe, Mr. Speaker, if PPB were applied on this figure, the Finance Committee would not report this measure out at this time. But our appropriation of 11 million dollars is in the books. For this reason, Mr. Speaker, I ask the members to support this measure.

Thank you."

Representative Ajifu then asked the Finance Chairman if he would yield to a question to which Representative Suwa replied in the affirmative.

Representative Ajifu then inquired:

"Mr. Chairman, you say that the House is not locked in to this Luckman Plan. I would like to ask if the State Administration is locked into this Luckman Plan."

Representative Suwa replied that the State is not locked in because the contract the House had was on the 11 million dollars and not on the 34-39 million that is being talked about and this amount can always be resolved at conference.

Representative Poepoe then spoke in favor of Senate Bill No. 20.

The motion to pass S. B. No. 20 on Third Reading was put by the Chair and carried by a vote of 47 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives Wong, R. Garcia, Fong and Hansen voting no.

Third Reading of S. B. No. 201.

On motion by Representative Suwa, seconded by Representative Akizaki, S. B. No. 201 passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Third Reading of S. B. No. 392.

On motion by Representative Suwa, seconded by Representative Akizaki, S. B. No. 392 passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

On motion by Representative Suwa, seconded by Representative Akizaki and carried, consideration of Stand. Com. Rep. No. 805 on S. B. No. 99 was deferred until tomorrow, April 14, 1971.

The Chair here directed the Clerk to note that S. B. Nos. 975, 1075 and 1232 had passed Third Reading not earlier than 11:32 o'clock p.m.

DEFERRED MATTER

Consideration of Stand. Com. Rep. No. 847 on H. R. No. 365 which had been deferred to this time.

Representative R. Garcia moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and that H. R. No. 365 be adopted, seconded by Representative Lunasco.

Representative Devereux spoke against the resolution by stating that the study on the establishment of a Hawaii Health Facilities Authority was premature and that the Department of Health should be allowed adequate time and sufficient staff in order to resolve its problems and carry out their programs.

Representative R. Garcia then rose and spoke in favor of the resolution as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak for the resolution.

The resolution under consideration costs the State \$65,000 to look into the problems of the Department of Health in relation to the county-state hospitals. In no way does it commit this House or this Body to take up the recommendations within the Haldi report. On the contrary, recommendations in the Haldi report are to be scrutinized by the interim committee to study the problems associated with the county-state hospitals.

There are many recommendations that the Haldi report came out with which can be implemented immediately, without the use of the Authority and, secondly, the Authority has many advantages over the present system. These are the things that the Committee would like to look into.

I think one of the examples that have been proven throughout the session is that the Department of Health is greatly overworked in terms of the amount of personnel it has and the kind of budget it is working with.

For this reason, we would like to go into it during the interim session to study the Haldi report and its recommendations.

I therefore urge this Honorable Body to adopt the resolution.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair declared a recess at 11:36 o'clock p.m., subject to the call of the Chair.

This bill establishes a policy to move in the direction of expanding the present two-year medical program at our University. After hearing testimonies and carefully studying the matter, the majority of your Committee on Higher Education are convinced that Hawaii needs a four-year medical school. The University's plan of utilizing community hospitals for clinical training of students, which plan has been adopted in the committee report, makes sense in that it will foster closer 'town-gown' relationships and avoid duplication of facilities. The four-year medical school will certainly open the door for many of our youngsters who would otherwise be unable to pursue a medical career; and, ultimately, the program will materially contribute to better health care for the people of our State.

Some of our members still harbor doubts about the feasibility of implementing the expansion. One question is whether the State can afford

the high cost of the expansion program; and another is whether mutually satisfactory working agreements between the University and community private practitioners and the hospitals can be established.

For these reasons, this bill, as amended, endorses the concept of a four—year medical school, and provides funds for the initial research and development phase under the concepts of PPB which will result in detailed financial and implementation plans. Armed with adequate plans, we should be able to develop the kind of medical school that will really serve the needs of our people.

Although the cost of the program must be considered, and there are some initial difficulties needed to be hurdled, we must also realize the consequences of not moving ahead at this time. Mr. Speaker, your Committee strongly believes the necessity and the advisability for taking this major step toward maintaining a healthful citizenry, for that is basic to achieving a good and full life for our people.

Mr. Speaker, I urge the passage of S. B. No. 747."

Representatives Saiki and Leopold then spoke in favor of the bill.

This bill contains provisions for fresh voices on the University of Hawaii Board of Regents and also a membership increase from 9 to 11 appointed individuals. Mr. Speaker, traditionally, this policy-making Body has excluded a realistic viewpoint...one recently experiencing the University atmosphere.

Ironically, the structure of Higher Education encourages open and diverse views in achieving high intellectual and creative levels. However, the same voices are subdued and suppressed from actively engaging the decision process controlling their community.

Such a situation is at best a paradox. These voices with questions to ask and ideas to express are ultimately insulted by exclusion. The waste of valuable contributions will continue unless the issue of timely representation on the Board of Regents is settled with an affirmative avenue of communication.

A by-product in blockage of this avenue could and does cause departure from legitimate courses of cooperation, sometimes channeling behavior to the brink of civil disobedience.

An expression for women representation on the Board is suggested in the committee reports of the House and Senate. A fairer and feminine expression would add not only delightful scenery but unique and enlightening points of view.

So much is said about a young viewpoint. This is not intended to offend those with many years of experience. Experience is much appreciated and valued. But what is being said is that other expressions can only be a healthy exposure to contemporary values and ideas assigned to rapid technological, societal and individual changes.

By the favorable action of this body on this bill, the latch to the flowing passage of ideas will be lifted.

Accusation and alienation will be hopefully replaced with a media of the productive exchange of ideas and mutual understanding that arises, when men steeped in experience and tradition may reason together with those abundantly endowed with refreshing enthusiasm and shining idealism.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Representative Kimura, for the Committee on Higher Education, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 925) approving the intent and purpose of

H. C. R. No. 100 and recommending its adoption, with certain amendments.

Representative Kimura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and that H. C. R. No. 100, as amended, be adopted, seconded by Representative Kishinami.

Representative Kimura then spoke in favor of the resolution as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of H. C. R. No. 100, HD 1.

The protuberant costs of higher education as reflected in the State's budgets over the past several years is a matter of growing concern to all taxpayers. On the other hand, keeping open the options to higher education in our State is a real and perplexing problem.

With the number of students burgeoning into mass proportions at the University of Hawaii, there is a pressing need for additional facilities of higher education. Today, the Manoa campus is a mere 2,000 students short of being filled to the brim of 23,000, and, lest something is done now, our children will be overflowing into less desirous forms of post high school education.

With the existence of only one other baccalaureate degree granting institution, located on the big island, a new campus is sorely needed.

Many observers may interject that since this cloud of conflict of the second campus has been spiced with heated controversy, the easiest solution is to enact legislation or pass resolutions to cool enraged tempers. This concurrent resolution is not this kind of legislative move. This concurrent resolution instead, is the product of extensive study, work, and concern as how to best not burn in the numbers crisis at the University.

Not everyone will be entirely happy with the provisions of this concurrent resolution. There are those who would have preferred that academic plans for the second campus be held up until all possible alternatives could be studied comprehensively. Your Committee has realized that some of these alternatives are not feasible while others are being implemented at the present time.

On the other hand, there are those who would have preferred that this concurrent resolution mandate the construction of the second campus in the Leeward-Central Oahu area. Your Committee realizes that present statistics as to population growth and high school population are highest in this area. Present figures reveal undisputable impetus for placing such a campus on Oahu—yet as to specific site selection, this is in the hands of the Board of Regents whose job includes taking such action.

Mr. Speaker, too many of our students have had to traverse from wide expanses of land that separate remote areas of this island to the Manoa campus.

Too many of our children have failed to seek and attain a baccalaureate degree merely because such a degree-granting campus was not located in easy access of their homes.

And, too many of our University students have had only the choices allotted by present programs at the Manoa campus to select from.

With the construction of a new baccalaureate campus on Oahu, the people who live in this State will not have to continue to only have the present options provided by the University system to choose from. New programs and alternatives can provide satisfaction for not only their needs but their desires.

It is becoming alarmingly real today that our society is demanding more of its people. More people therefore, are desirous of some form of higher education.

A new four-year campus on Oahu will lend itself towards growing with this demand and also continuing to provide our State with citizens who can contribute more on the basis of sound knowledge and truth which is a by-product of institutions of higher learning.

Where there has been concern and dismay as to the objectives and direction of higher education in this state will be replaced with freshly cut goals which coordinate all campuses in the University of Hawaii system.

Where there existed queries and

qualms over how site selection turned the second campus into clouds of controversy will soon become part of the forgotten past as plans for the second campus on Oahu are developed and the necessary and proper channels are utilized.

And with these experiences of the second campus controversy completed, which uncovered much that was hidden for eyes not to see and for ears not to hear, we shall once again renew our hope and conviction that men in this State are striving for the enrichment of our people.

Mr. Speaker, H. C. R. No. 100, HD 1, offers the most viable and practical solution of dealing with the increased student enrollment at the University of Hawaii. I urge its passage.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kuroda then rose and spoke in favor of the adoption of the concurrent resolution.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H. C. R. No. 100, as amended, was adopted.

I am comforted that the facts before us indicate that this amount is a realistic figure for which a well designed, complete facility will be built.

Thank you."

Representative Wong then spoke in favor of the bill stating that the Conference Committee has done a good job in assuring us that there will be fairness in the approach towards maintaining the dollar ceiling that we have set.

This bill will render moot the issues before the court and will provide a means by which the people of the Fourth District may choose their representatives.

Much of the credit for the appearance of this bill must go to the many people in the Fourth District, and those in my own 21st Representative District, who made their voices heard in a firm, but responsible, manner. I received, as did other legislators, petitions signed by members of all political leanings calling for an election rather than an appointment. It would seem that the voice of the electorate has been heard.

I urge your support for this bill.

At 10:56 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

At 11:02 o'clock p.m., the House of Representatives reconvened.

At this time, Representative Ushijima, on a point of personal privilege, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, the accomplishments of

this legislative session I need not outline, for all of us are fully aware of what we have done. Important as our record of accomplishments may be, I believe it equally important to focus some attention on where we shall be going.

The record of this House is not to be written in a single session. Indeed, I would characterize this House as being in mid-passage. We have done some of the things which we have wanted to do; we have not yet done some of the things which should be done.

I believe we should make it clear to the public that this House intends to persevere in getting through the major pieces of legislation which we have developed but which we have not yet enacted.

The measures which this House has supported, and which we believe to be important to the welfare of this State, should be regarded as being very much alive. When we return next session they will be where they are today. I see as one of our major responsibilities during the interim period the formulation of ways by which these measures can be enacted in 1972.

As a House in mid-passage with a record not yet finally written, we should look therefore to the specific accomplishments which we expect the Sixth Legislature finally to achieve. If our priorities are clear and if we do our legislative homework during the interim period, there is no doubt in my mind that we shall have established a record worthy of this Body and the people we represent.

I would urge also that we begin to structure our legislative review of State programs. Next session, for the first time since territorial days, there will be no budget before us. The Constitution intends that legislative sessions in even numbered years be used for intensive review of the performance of government agencies and their programs.

By exercising our legislative review responsibilities effectively, we shall be holding government accountable to the people in providing the services they deserve, just as we, as legislators, are held accountable to the people by the policies which we formulate.

Mr. Speaker, the course of the House of Representatives has been set, and although we have suffered some disappointments, we pledge to move further along this course, for this is not the end.

A year from now, when the full record is in, it will be a better time for us to assess our accomplishments. For now, this is the end of a session but not the end of our work. Tomorrow, we shall begin again.

On behalf of the leadership of the House of Representatives, I would like to take this opportunity to extend our sincere thanks to all of the fine outstanding Committee Chairmen who have undoubtedly given their heart and souls to fulfill their responsibilities.

To you, Mr. Speaker, we extend our sincerest thanks for the fine leadership exemplified.

To the minority, our thanks for the great privilege of working together as members of the House of Representatives.

Undoubtedly, the people of Hawaii have spoken well when they elected all of you to serve as my colleagues.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Soares, on a point of personal privilege, made the following observation:

"Mr. Speaker, your House Republicans took the responsibility during the earlier part of this session in organizing this House. We said then that we were determined to face this session and make a productive and a strong program to evolve in 60 days. We realized that we had started late. However, the Committee Chairmen and our members put their shoulders to the wheel and worked long and hard 7 days a week, around the clock, in order to get this legislation across to the Senate.

We are particularly proud that our bills were heard this year and many bills were passed for the first time in many years. We are disappointed, however, that the majority in the Senate has not done the job. We passed pollution controls, campaign reforms, land use commission reforms, strong ethic codes, control on

lobbyists, appointed Board of Education, two year moratorium on land rezoning and many other bills that still sit and, in effect, have gone down in flames.

Your Chairmen have done a great job and worked very hard but it is very disheartening to see this hard work go in vain.

Mr. Speaker, we have pledged to be a strong voice in this House; a strong minority, doing our share in every way possible and I am sure we have proven it. We look forward to working in the interim to further our cause and be a strong voice in this State Capitol.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kato, on a point of personal privilege, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, the end of this session is in sight and I would be remiss if I did not make a few observations at this time. I shall direct my remarks to the overall legislative philosophy and accomplishments of this House. Mr. Speaker, even if we have no quarrel with the bills that have passed this House, the question as to how they have fared in the Senate is in order. All we know is that the House has passed many bills that will die or have died in the Senate. I will grant you we have outscored the Senate in the number of major measures that have passed. But if that is all that we have accomplished without Senate concurrence, we have really done very

Mr. Speaker, history is repeating itself here. We are again 'hung up' with the Senate as we were last year, and it is again the people of the State that will be suffering for it. I will submit, Mr. Speaker, we need a different outlook on the legislative process. Let's direct our attention hereafter to something more basic, that is, to pass legislation. It takes two houses to pass legislation. It think it is time we submerged our individual pride in bills or ideas when we work with the Senate in the future, for killing each other's bills or threatening to do so really can accomplish very little.

Mr. Speaker, I speak not within the framework of criticism at this juncture, but to establish the idea that foremost in our thoughts should always be what is best for the people, given any set of

circumstances.

Thank you."

Representative J. Garcia, on a point of personal privilege, made the following observation:

"Mr. Speaker, at the outset of this session, there was an air of gloom over this legislative Body. Statements were made that perhaps the system under which we live, and it is a Republican system, was doomed to failure because the House Republicans assisted in the organization of this Body. But I believe, as we come to an adjournment tonight, that organization can materialize and a minority can retain its status by fighting for the things in which it believes to be true and in the best interest of the people of Hawaii. This Honorable Body has demonstrated time and again that we can work within the framework of our government and secure the things that our people need and want to help keep, not only in Hawaii, but to help keep this great nation of ours a land of the free and the home of the brave, not only for today, but tomorrow and always.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At 11:13 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

At 11:15 o'clock p.m., the House of Representatives reconvened.

At this time, the Chair stated:

"We have now come to the end of the First Regular Session of the Sixth State Legislature, and I would like to remind all of you that while we may well be satisfied with what we have done, and what we have tried to do, our work as members of the Sixth State Legislature is not ended. We had an unusual start, and many observers predicted that dire consequences would result from some of our in-house differences. But, ladies and gentlemen, I am most pleased to observe that the members of this House were able to work together when necessary, despite individual differences, to enable the House to act on meaningful and needed legislation. I am especially pleased with the conduct and the work of the new members of the House who performed in a manner befitting seasoned legislators.

It has been said that 'If a man does not keep pace with his companions, perhaps it is because he hears a different drummer. Let him step to the music he hears, however measured or far away.' This thought most appropriately describes a duly elected legislative body-for we are all here reflecting different interests, different constituencies, different drummers. But despite our differences, all of us here have put in long hours, worked hard, and argued earnestly--and in the final analysis, rallied behind those measures which we considered important and necessary to improve the well-being of the people of Hawaii. I truly believe that the members of this House have consistently tried to take a statesmanlike posture, and for this I would like to commend all of you. You acted admirably, and the voters of your respective districts have good reason to be proud of you.

We have introduced in the House this session, a record total of over 1600 bills. Some considered this a ridiculous and unwieldy number of bills for any legislative body to consider in 60 days. There are several other things, however, that our critics overlook. We are not here to outdo others; we are not here to outdo the Senate because this is a bipartisan and bicameral system of government where we have two bodies to work with. The members of the Constitutional Convention of 1968 labored hard on this basis, on this question of whether this legislature should be unicameral or bicameral, and overwhelmingly, it was decided to be bicameral. We have conference committees to work on the differences between the two houses, and these conference committees are one of the means of settling our differences. We actually do have more than the officially allotted time, since we now actively engage in interim committee work and more pre-session work. Furthermore, we cannot infringe on the right of any duly elected legislator to introduce those measures he considers are necessary and important. The number of bills provides us with the widest spectrum of ideas and proposals from which to select or combine those which are good, and it provides us with the basis from which to determine which problems can be resolved by immediate or incremental action. It provides us with the necessary guidelines with which we can set the parameters for session and interim work.

Observations earlier this session noted the necessity for lawmakers to stop and assess our current State programs, to stop and take deliberate steps in determining our future directions, our future goals. To ask ourselves the question, where do we want to be, or should be, in the next ten or twenty years, and whether current government programs are moving in this direction. This I think we have done.

We have the distinction of being the first legislative body in many years to have passed both the State operating and CIP budgets in record time. In these documents, we have again provided emphasis on the educational needs of the people of Hawaii, as well as on our welfare programs. We have strengthened our economic development, particularly in the promotion of Hawaiian agricultural products and tourism, small business loans, and fishing vessel construction

loans. In other measures, we have concentrated our efforts on ensuring a quality environment and adequate housing for the residents of our State. We have focused on the strengthening and improvement of our land use laws in order to provide for the more judicious use of our most precious resources. We have tried to provide for a more representative, responsible, and visible government by directing our efforts toward election reform and ethics in government.

Some of the major measures which appeared before us this session were in the areas where we lacked sufficient information to act with full confidence. It was the consensus of the members of this House that to make such decisions would not only be premature, but would also constitute a disservice to the people of our State. These measures, we decided, needed to be looked into in greater depth during the interim.

And so, there is much work ahead of us in terms of interim study and analysis, but this kind of activity will only serve to better prepare and inform all of us for the 1972 session. I personally like to think of interim work as an extension of our regular legislative session, where legislative committees are able to conduct in-depth studies on those issues and problems which are in need of further deliberation. To be able to engage in interim activities is a distinct advantage the Hawaii State Legislature has, as compared to many other state legislatures. Interim work allows us to move that much closer to realizing the concept that legislative work is full-time work. All of us here know and believe that our job as legislators is a year-round one. The enactment of our first fully biennial budget pursuant to our constitutional requirement further reinforces the concept of year-round legislative work. We must, therefore, look at our progress in terms of two years, and not only one session.

This is why, at the beginning, I said that the work of this Body does not stop with the close of the session. As Representative Ushijima previously said, let us continue to work together during the interim and to prepare ourselves for the next session.

I would like to thank the staff

members of this House for the long hours and for the long evenings they spent working together with us. I would also like to thank all the members of this House, both the majority and the minority, the majority leadership and the minority leadership, for a job well done and commend you on the manner in which you performed your respective tasks.

Pursuant to section 17, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 70, entitled 'A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONTESTED ELECTIONS'.

While I appreciate the fact that the legislative power under the Constitution of the State of Hawaii is vested in the legislature, and that this power extends to all rightful subjects of legislation not inconsistent with the Constitution of the State or the Constitution of the United States, I am unable

to approve this bill for the reasons indicated below.

House Bill No. 70 would vest original jurisdiction to hear and determine all factual and legal issues in contested election cases in the Supreme Court of Hawaii. Original jurisdiction over such cases if presently vested in the circuit courts, with appellate jurisdiction on the record vested in the Supreme Court.

The apparent purpose of the change in jurisdiction is to expedite judicial disposition of contested election cases. I concur in this purpose. However, this bill does not insure that such result will be obtained. An election dispute invariably requires an evidentiary hearing. If the Supreme Court is given the responsibility to hear and decide a contested proceeding, the court would have to appoint a special master to conduct the evidentiary hearing and make the necessary findings of fact. These findings would then be referred to the Supreme Court for its consideration and decision. This procedure conceivably might require more time for a final determination than the present method of filing a complaint in the circuit court, then appealing to the Supreme Court. Not infrequently no appeal is taken from the circuit court's decision.

It may be noted that formerly, the Legislature had placed original jurisdiction over election cases in the Supreme Court (In re Contested Senatorial Election, 10 Haw. 216 (1896); Lane v. Fern, 20 Haw. 290 (1910) but later amended the law to place trial jurisdiction in the circuit courts. (Act 226, Session Laws of Hawaii 1925; Act 233, Session Laws of Hawaii 1953). This experience suggests that the five-member Supreme Court, whose function is basically appellate is not as appropriate a forum for litigation of factual disputes as the circuit courts.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 70 without my approval.

While I appreciate the fact that the legislative power under the Constitution of the State of Hawaii is vested in the legislature, and that this power extends to all rightful subjects of legislation not inconsistent with the Constitution of the State or the Constitution of the United States, I am unable to approve this bill for the reasons indicated below.

The purpose of this bill is to authorize a school principal to grant emergency leave with pay to school personnel, whether certificated (generally the instructional staff) or classified (non-instructional employees), not to exceed three days, if he determines that a personal emergency exists.

Presently, leaves of absence for certificated employees are provided for by the rules and regulations of the Board of Education, and leaves for classified employees are provided for by Chapter 79, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and the rules and regulations prescribed by the Director of Personnel Services. In view thereof, this bill would tend to duplicate existing policies on leaves of absence.

Moreover, this bill would create inequities among classified employees. Classified employees employed in schools would have the benefit of the emergency leave authorized by this bill but classified employees not employed in schools would not be entitled to such emergency leave.

Also, the lack of a definition of 'personal emergency' may give rise to different treatment by the various school principals and the failure to limit the number of emergency leaves may create other administrative and budgetary problems. It may also be noted that the bill does not contain any appropriation of additional funds that may be required if this bill becomes law.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 128 without my approval.

While I appreciate the fact that the legislative power under the Constitution of the State of Hawaii is vested in the legislature, and that this power extends to all rightful subjects of legislation not inconsistent with the Constitution of the State or the Constitution of the United States, I am unable to approve this bill for the reasons indicated below.

The purpose of this bill is to allow a member of the Employees' Retirement System of the State of Hawaii to buy back previous service credit by contributing at the rate of one and one-half times his normal contributions to the Employees' Retirement System.

At present, Section 88-59, Hawaii Revised Statutes, allows a member of the Employees' Retirement System in purchasing previous service credit to have twice the normal deductions made for retirement for a period equal to the period for which service credit is allowable or to pay the same amount in a lump sum. This bill purportedly allows a third option by having a deduction of one and one-half times the normal deduction made.

The pertinent portion of House Bill No. 140 provides:

'For a period equal to the period for which membership service credit is allowable, the deductions from the member's compensation shall be either one and one-half times or twice the proportion provided for in section 88-45....'1

¹Section 88-45, Hawaii Revised Statutes, provides:

'After June 30, 1965, the normal contribution by each member to the annuity savings fund shall be six per cent of his compensation, provided that after June 30, 1967, all firemen and policemen shall contribute ten and four-tenths per cent of their compensation.

'In addition to the foregoing, all members including firemen and policemen, shall contribute one and eight-tenths per cent of compensation to the post retirement fund.'

According to the committee reports, the intent of the Legislature apparently was to allow a member of the Employees' Retirement System to purchase previous service credit by the deduction of contributions in smaller incremental amounts than the double deduction presently provided. However, the bill allows a member to purchase at a rate of one and one-half times the normal contribution for a period of time equal to the period for which prior service credit is allowable. The rate is reduced but the duration of payment remains unchanged. Consequently, the cost of repurchase to a member who purchases either by a lump sum or at a rate of twice his normal contributions will substantially exceed that or a member using the new option of one and one-half times the normal contribution.

The bill would create an inequity between employees who are now purchasing previous service credit at the existing rate of twice the normal contribution and those employees who purchase previous credit after the bill becomes law at the lesser rate of one and one-half times the normal contribution. The proposal is also actuarially unsound and may jeopardize the fiscal health of the Employees' Retirement System.

I appreciate the desire of the Legislature to afford the members of the Employees' Retirement System a more inexpensive way of purchasing previous service credit. However, it is obvious that the legislative intent is not achieved by this bill, as presently drafted.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 140 without my approval.

Sirs:

House Bill No. 491 entitled, 'A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE RELIEF OF CERTAIN PERSONS' CLAIMS AGAINST THE STATE AND PROVIDING APPROPRIATIONS THEREFOR', appropriates moneys out of the general revenue of the State to reimburse various persons, firms and agencies on account of claims against the State.

Among other appropriations, this bill appropriates the sum of \$237.77 to pay the claim of Quan Yuen and Pauline L. C. Ching for refund of real property taxes, more specifically, the sum equivalent to the amount of taxes that would have been exempted, if Mr. and Mrs. Ching had been allowed home exemption for the period of January 1, 1968 to June 30, 1970.

Mr. and Mrs. Ching failed to comply with the statutory provisions of section 246-23, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and the procedures prescribed by the Department of Taxation, which state in essence, that all claims for home exemption must be filed with the Department of Taxation, on or before a specified date preceding the tax year for which the exemption is claimed. Therefore, their claim was properly denied by the Department of Taxation. The legislative intent behind the statutory provisions and procedures prescribed by the Department of Taxation is to grant all home owners equal opportunity and privilege in obtaining tax savings through home exemptions. Accordingly, to grant Mr. and Mrs. Ching a real property tax refund for home exemption for the aforementioned years after they had failed to comply with the applicable laws will be in circumvention of the legislative intent and will be against public policy because other home owners in similar situations are not so favored.

For the foregoing reasons, while I am not without sympathy for Mr. and Mrs. Ching's plight, I am constrained to disapprove and veto the item of appropriation in the sum of \$237.77 to pay the claim of Quan Yuen and Pauline L. C. Ching which is listed under the category of 'Refund of Taxes' on page 1 of House Bill No. 491.

Although I have approved House Bill No. 491, with the exception of the claim of Quan Yuen and Pauline L. C. Ching, I am returning the bill to enable the legislature to act on the veto as provided by section 17 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii.

Pursuant to section 17, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 639, entitled 'A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COMPULSORY SCHOOL ATTENDANCE'.

While I appreciate the fact that the legislative power under the Constitution of the State of Hawaii is vested in the legislature, and that this power extends to all rightful subjects of legislation not inconsistent with the Constitution of the State or the Constitution of the United States, I am unable to approve this bill for the reasons indicated below.

The purpose of this bill is to lower the upper limit of the compulsory school attendance age from 18 years to 16 years.

Existing law allows sufficient flexibility so as to permit a child over 16 years of age to be excused from school attendance if valid reasons exist.

House Bill No. 639, however, would provide a blanket exemption of all students over 16 years from the compulsory attendance requirement. Estimates by the Department of Education reflect approximately 5,000 dropouts or potential dropouts within the State's secondary school age population.

The apparent purpose of the bill is to allow students who do not fit into an academic environment to seek other training or activities more suitable to their needs. There is a serious question as to whether or not other options are truly available to these students. I am informed that community colleges require students to be at least 18 years of age if without a high school diploma, and that their programs are not currently suitable to students below age 18. In addition, there is a question as to whether local industries would be amenable to employing these students and, if so, whether they can provide sufficient employment opportunities for them. Accordingly, enactment of this bill may have an adverse, rather than a beneficial, effect upon these students under present circumstances.

The compulsory school attendance age was raised from 16 to 18 in 1965 by the Omnibus Education Law under the New Hawaii program (Act 175, Session Laws of Hawaii 1965). In my judgment, reduction of the compulsory school attendance age is an illusory palliative. What are needed are programs which will provide meaningful alternatives whereby our children may acquire skills and attitudes which will enable them to become productive citizens.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 639 without my approval.

Sirs:

Pursuant to section 17, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 642, entitled 'A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE SAFETY OF SLOW-MOVING VEHICLES'.

While I appreciate the fact that the legislative power under the Constitution of the State of Hawaii is vested in the legislature, and that this power extends to all rightful subjects of legislation not inconsistent with the Constitution of the State or the Constitution of the United States, I am unable to approve this bill for the reasons indicated below.

The purpose of this bill is to require that any slow-moving vehicle or equipment designed for use or normally used at a maximum speed of less than 25 miles per hour be equipped with a standardized emblem, when operated on State highways in any county with a population of 100,000 or more. In addition this bill regulates the sale, registration and transfer of bicycles; makes it unlawful to deface the serial number or other identification mark of a bicycle; and authorizes the expenditure of county highway funds for the design and construction of bikeways.

The requirement that slow-moving vehicles be equipped with a standardized emblem, is restricted to counties with a population of 100,000 or more, i.e. the City and County of Honolulu. I am advised that the problem with respect to slow-moving vehicles is more acute in the neighbor islands. Accordingly, the bill will not accomplish the desired result.

In addition to the foregoing the bill purports to regulate the sale, registration and

transfer of bicycles. It also makes unlawful the defacing of the serial number or other identification mark of a bicycle. However, the title of the bill is 'A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE SAFETY OF SLOW-MOVING VEHICLES'. It appears that these provisions fall outside the scope of the title and violate Article III, section 15 of the State Constitution which provides that 'each law shall embrace but one subject, which shall be expressed in its title.' The provisions regulating the sale, registration and transfer of bicycles and making the defacing of serial numbers and other identification marks of bicycles unlawful are not germane to the safety of slow-moving vehicles.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 642 without my approval.

Sirs:

Pursuant to Section 17, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith without my approval, House Bill No. 668, entitled 'A BILL FOR AN ACT DETERMINING TITLE TO LANDS CREATED BY VOLCANIC ERUPTIONS'.

The purpose of this bill is to vest title to land created prior to or after the effective date of this bill by the flow of volcanic material from volcanic eruptions when such new land is added to existing land bordering the ocean. The State survey department is to determine and describe the boundaries of the newly created lava land. After such determination, the survey department is to file the description and a statement of ownership in the Bureau of Conveyances or in the Office of the Assistant Registrar of the Land Court, as the case may be. There is no provision for notice to owners or for a hearing. The bill is to have retroactive effect and does not provide for the saving of existing rights.

While I appreciate the fact that the legislative power under the Constitution of the State of Hawaii is vested in the legislature, and that this power extends to all rightful subjects of legislation not inconsistent with the Constitution of the State or the Constitution of the United States, I am unable

to approve this bill for the reasons indicated below.

This bill may violate the due process clauses of both the United States Constitution and the Hawaii Constitution as to certain property owners in that it may divest property owners of their land without notice or hearing and without compensation. See Ochoa v. Hernandez Y. Morales, 230 U. S. 139.

As long as only the State is adversely affected by the State survey department's determination of boundaries and ownership, there probably would be no problem, but should the rights of other property owners be adversely affected by such determination, this latter situation would raise questions of constitutionality, since such rights would under this bill be determined without notice to owners and without a hearing.

Moreover, there are two actions relating to land created by a lava flow presently pending in the Third Circuit Court in Hilo.

The first action is State v. Zimring, 52 Haw. 472, filed by the State against Mr. and Mrs. Zimring to quiet title to land created by a lava flow in which the State claimed title. The second action consists of two counterclaims filed in State v. Zimring, 52 Haw. 477. The first counterclaim sets forth the claim of the Zimrings to title to the land created by lava flow by adverse possession. The second counterclaim sets forth the claim of the Zimrings against the State for damages for One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) resulting from trespass committed by the State on the lava land, disparagement of title caused by the State's claim of title to the land created by the lava flow, and interference with contract.

In State v. Zimring, 52 Haw. 472, the Circuit Court entered summary judgment in favor of the Zimrings. The Hawaii Supreme Court reversed on the grounds that the affidavit on which the summary judgment was based did not conform with Rule 56(e) of the Hawaii Rules of Civil Procedure; that the affidavit did not clearly establish the existence of Hawaiian usage before November 25, 1892 '... which gave, to the owner of land along a seashore, title to land created by volcanic eruption when the eruption destroyed the pre-existing seashore boundary and formed a new boundary along the sea;' and that this was

'a case of first impression on a question of vast public importance. The impact of this decision will not be limited to the case at hand but will count for the future. We do not think that the decision in such a case should depend solely on the kind of affidavit submitted by the Zimrings.'

In State v. Zimring, 52 Haw. 477, the Circuit Court dismissed the first counterclaim on the ground that there can be no adverse possession against the State. The Supreme Court affirmed the dismissal. The Circuit Court also dismissed the second counterclaim. The Hawaii Supreme Court reversed. The Court stated '... we think that the Circuit Court erred in granting the motion to dismiss. This dismissal will foreclose the Zimrings from asserting this counterclaim in case they prevail on the issue of ownership.'

The State's claim to the lava land and the second counterclaim filed by the Zimrings for damages are now pending in the Third Circuit Court to which they were remanded by the Supreme Court.

If this bill is enacted into law, the State's claim to the lava land set forth in State v. Zimring, 52 Haw. 472, will probably be dismissed because title to the lava land will by this bill be vested in the Zimrings. However, the second counterclaim filed by the Zimrings in State v. Zimring, 52 Haw. 477, against the State for One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) for trespassing, disparagement of title and interference with contract will still be pending. The outcome of this latter action will depend on the courts, but approval of this bill might adversely affect the State.

I note that geologically the island of Hawaii is a 'young' island, with a potential for further growth through future volcanic action. Untold and substantial acreage can be so created. I have serious doubts as to whether it is in the best interest of the public to vest title to such lands in the private landowners.

As pointed out by the Hawaii Supreme Court in State v. Zimring, 52 Haw. 472, on page 475, the existence or absence before November 25, 1892, of Hawaiian usage giving to the owner of land abutting the sea, title to land created by a lava flow when the flow destroyed the existing sea boundary and formed a new boundary along the sea is a case of first impression dealing with a

question of such great public importance and the impact of the decision will not be limited to this case but will count for the future. Therefore, this question should properly be determined by the court since the contentions by all parties can better be presented and examined in the dispassionate atmosphere of a courtroom. The court has worked on the subject for a considerable period, is familiar with the matter, has jurisdiction and should be afforded the opportunity to hear and rule on the question.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 668 without my approval.

Pursuant to section 17, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 1568, entitled 'A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EXEMPTIONS FOR CERTAIN LABOR UNION WELFARE AND PENSION PLANS'.

While I appreciate the fact that the legislative power under the Constitution of the State of Hawaii is vested in the legislature, and that this power extends to all rightful subjects of legislation not inconsistent with the Constitution of the State or the Constitution of the United States, I am unable to approve this bill for the reasons indicated below.

The purpose of this bill is to exempt any labor union welfare and pension plan from the registration requirements under Chapter 433, Hawaii Revised Statutes, if such labor union welfare and pension plan is subject to P. L. 85-836, 'Disclosure of Welfare and Pension Plans', (29 U.S.C.A. 301-309 which requires the reporting and disclosure of welfare and pension plans to the Secretary of Labor), if a copy of the report which has been filed with the Secretary of Labor is also filed with the State Insurance Commissioner. This bill further exempts any labor union welfare and pension plan which is subject to P. L. 85-836 from the provisions of Section 433-4 through 433-9, Hawaii Revised Statutes, which regulate and control the operation and investment of funds of such plans.

Public Law 85-836, more particularly Sec. 309(a), 29 U.S.C.A., entitled 'Effect of other laws — State laws', states:

'In the case of an employee welfare or pension benefit plan providing benefits to employees employed in two or more States, no person shall be required by reason of any law of any such State to file with any State agency (other than an agency of the State in which such plan has its principal office) any information included within a description of the plan or an annual report published and filed pursuant to the provisions of this chapter if copies of such description of the plan and of such annual report are filed with the State agency, and if copies of such portion of the description of the plan and annual report, as may be required by the State agency, are distributed to participants and beneficiaries in accordance with the requirements of such State law with respect to scope of distribution. Nothing contained in this subsection shall be construed to prevent any State from obtaining such additional information relating to any such plan as it may desire, or from otherwise regulating such plan.' (Emphasis added.)

Congressional intent in enacting P. L. 85-836 was held to be confined to a disclosure and reporting function. Moyer v. Kirkpatrick, 265 F. Supp. 348 (D. C. Pa. 1967), affd. 387 F.2d 955.

Federal law thus clearly permits a state to regulate labor union welfare and pension plans, notwithstanding P. L. 85-836.

A labor union operating a welfare and pension plan is considered a mutual benefit society and comes within the scope of Chapter 433 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes. The insurance commissioner is empowered to regulate mutual benefit societies in the following pertinent areas:

Before a mutual benefit society can conduct business or engage in any act, it must first file with the insurance commissioner duly certified copies of its constitution or organic instrument under which it purports to operate, and the by-laws, rules and regulations, if any. If the society is offering to pay death, sickness, disability, or other

benefits it must file copies of all proposed forms of benefit certificates, applications and circulars to be issued by the society. A bond in the sum of \$5,000 must be posted with the insurance commissioner.

If the insurance commissioner is satisfied with the purposes of the society, he may then authorize the society to conduct its benefit plan.

Restriction is placed upon the use of the funds collected by the society for the management or operation of the benefit plan.

The insurance commissioner is empowered to conduct an examination of the society from time to time and when satisfied issue compliance certificate. Each society is required to maintain adequate benefit funds for its plans. Before a certificate of compliance with law is granted by the insurance commissioner, the society must deposit or post a bond adequate to maintain the benefit plans. An annual report listing the financial condition of the society must be filed with the insurance commissioner on or before January 31 of each year.

A domestic mutual benefit society which offers benefit plans must follow the same restrictive guidelines in its investment practices as those followed by the domestic insurance companies. For example, a society may not purchase security or other investment which is not interest bearing or interest accruing or dividend or income paying.

By exempting labor union welfare and pension plans, which are subject to P. L. 85-836, from the requirements of Sections 433-4 through 433-9, this bill in effect removes such labor union welfare and pension funds from the supervision and control of the State. Since federal law does not regulate said plans, aside from requiring reporting and disclosure this means that the administration of such sickness, disability, death or other benefit plans would only be subject to the laws of contracts and of fiduciary responsibility.

The regulatory powers of the insurance commissioner under Chapter 433 are broad and are to be exercised for the protection of the members of mutual benefit societies. In view thereof, the removal of the above powers from the insurance commissioner, as this bill proposes to do, would be contrary to the public interest and detrimental

to the welfare of our people.

Pursuant to section 17, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill No. 541, entitled 'A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INSURANCE'.

While I appreciate the fact that the legislative power under the Constitution of the State of Hawaii is vested in the legislature, and that this power extends to all rightful subjects of legislation not inconsistent with the Constitution of the State or the Constitution of the United States, I am unable to approve this bill for the reasons indicated below.

The primary purpose of this bill is to permit the sale of property and casualty insurance, such as automobile, property, fire, personal liability and other property and casualty insurance, on a group basis. Under present law, only life and health insurance can be sold on a group basis.

I concur in the apparent purpose of the bill to lower premiums, aid certain persons who are not now able to obtain insurance because they are deemed high risks, produce better service to policyholders and to equalize the bargaining strength of the groups purchasing insurance. The problem is particularly acute with respect to automobile insurance. However, Senate Bill No. 541, which combined the provisions of two other bills, extends beyond automobile insurance and covers the broad field of non-automobile property and casualty insurance. The bill was passed without a hearing in its final form, and it appears that legislators and interested persons may not have had an adequate opportunity to consider fully and to express their views on the full impact and ramifications of the bill as finally passed.

The problem of insurance costs is most serious, if not critical, in automobile insurance. Under the administration's sponsorship, the modified no-fault automobile insurance bill was submitted for consideration to the Legislature. The Legislature determined that it was not ready to act definitively upon the measure that we offered. It adopted HCR 93 calling on the Legislative Auditor to examine no-fault insurance in conjunction with a state-funded approach to auto insurance. In short, its adoption of this resolution reflects a desire to approach automobile insurance on a comprehensive basis. Inasmuch as mass marketing gained most of the impetus and support because of the automobile insurance problem, it would appear that the postponement of enactment of the bill on mass marketing would be in order. It should be considered as one element in the overall automobile insurance problem. I am hopeful that together with the findings of the Legislative Auditor's study, the Legislature and all interested persons will give this urgent problem and the other matters included in Senate Bill No. 541 the serious consideration that they deserve.

While I appreciate the fact that the legislative power under the Constitution of the State of Hawaii is vested in the legislature, and that this power extends to all rightful subjects of legislation not inconsistent with the Constitution of the State or the Constitution of the United States, I am unable to approve this bill for the reason indicated below.

The purpose of this bill is two-fold: First, to establish a procedure whereby both prosecution and defense witnesses who may be unavailable to testify in a later criminal trial can be required to testify promptly at a

conditional witness examination before a judge, and to preserve such testimony for later presentation at the trial; and second, to provide for the use of testimony previously given (a) at a trial, (b) at a preliminary examination before a magistrate on a felony complaint, or (c) at a conditional witness examination, in later criminal actions.

I concur in the purpose of the bill. However, I am concerned that it may conflict with Article V, section 6 of the Hawaii State Constitution, which provides:

'The supreme court shall have power to promulgate rules and regulations in all civil and criminal cases for all courts relating to process, practice, procedure and appeals, which shall have the force and effect of law.'

Rule 15 of the Hawaii Rules of Criminal Procedure already provides for preservation of testimony of defense witnesses. The possibility is raised of reversal of a conviction obtained by use of the procedure provided by Senate Bill No. 1159, should it become law.

In my judgment to avoid such conflict and to give due recognition to the competence and constitutional authority of the Supreme Court in this field, the proper procedure would be to submit proposed changes in criminal rules of procedure to the Criminal Procedural Rules Committee of the Supreme Court for review and recommendation to the Supreme Court. Should the Court promulgate the substance of the rules set forth in Senate Bill No. 1159, there would then be no possibility of a reversal of a criminal conviction simply because prosecution testimony obtained under the scheme proposed in Senate Bill 1159 was obtained under rules adopted by the legislature, instead of under rules adopted by the Supreme Court.
