JOURNAL OF THE HOUSE

FIRST DAY

Wednesday, January 17, 1973

In accordance with Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, the House of Representatives convened in Regular Session on Wednesday, January 17, 1973. The Honorable Jack K. Suwa, being the Representative at the time present who was elected from the First Representative District of the State of Hawaii, called the House to order at 10:00 o'clock a.m.

The National Anthem was sung by Mr. Jimmy Borges.

Representative Suwa appointed the Honorable Tatsuaki Kishinami, Steve Cobb, T. C. Yim, Wing Kong Chong and Archie Hapai, III to escort the Reverend James Merseberg, Pastor, Pearl City Community Church, to the rostrum.

Reverend James Merseberg invoked the Divine Blessing as follows:

"E pule kakou. Let us pray.

Eka Haku (Maikai) he puuhonua no oe no makou i kela hanauna i keia hanauna. Mamua aku o ka hanau ana o na mauna, ame kou hoomaka ana i ka honua ame ke ao nei, O oe no ke Akua; mai kahiko loa mai, a mau loa aku no. (Ke nonoi aku nei makou i kou oluolu) E hoonoho mai maluna o makou i ke aloha o Iehova ko makou Akua; e hoopaa mai oe i ka hana a ko makou lima me makou; Oia, oka hana a ko makou mau lima, e hoopaa mai oe ia. (Psalm 90:1,17)

O Lord our God, with rainbow colored spendor and fragrant blossoms, with authentic pageantry and ordered

ceremony, we gather in this beautiful chamber to celebrate the opening of Hawaii's Seventh Legislature, to reaffirm our trust in our democratic legislative system, and to encourage our legislators in the tasks they must undertake.

O Lord, let this moment be not merely a festive gesture to custom, but make it a real experience of dedication, for each of us, to perpetuate the life of the land in righteousness-- (I) '...mau ka ea o ka aina i ka pono.'

O Lord, we know that in no point of Hawaii's history has this ever been an easy task. And it is no different today. For even now before the gavel strikes we find ourselves on the threshold of a new year fraught with taxing concerns requiring immediate attention and action. And, these matters touch all aspects of our life: economic, educational, political, religious and social. But while the tasks may be demanding, let us also be assured that Thou has provided resources out of the same aspects of our life to meet our needs.

O Lord, we pray for our Governor, his administration, our legislators and their staffs that with Thy help they will tackle the issues head on and take legislative action that will serve the people with justice and aloha. Let them feel Thy nearness in the business of the day. Here in these chambers, be the Unseen Delegate, present and seeking our highest good. Vote and work through these chosen persons that what they say and what they do may be pleasing to Thee, commendable to themselves and praiseworthy of this land we love so much.

Bless their families and loved ones who will share the strain they must bear. And, make their homes sanctuaries of love and peace where they may find helpful resources to withstand the pressure of duties here.

We thank Thee, Lord, for all the resources at our command. And, as we use them to shape Hawaii's future in the unfolding new year, let the beauty of the Lord our God be upon us. And, establish Thou the work of our hands upon us.

## INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 1 to 6) were disposed of as follows:

A resolution (H.R. No. 1) relating to the temporary chairman of the House of Representatives of the Seventh Legislature was jointly offered by Representatives Beppu, Akizaki, A. Chong, de la Cruz, Iha, Kawakami, Kihano, Kimura, King, Kishinami, Kondo, Kunimura, Lee, Medina, Morioka, Nakama, O'Connor, Roehrig, Sakima, Takamine, Ushijima, Wakatsuki, Yap, Young and Yuen.

On motion by Representative Ushijima, seconded by Representative Wakatsuki and carried, H.R. No. 1 was adopted.

A resolution (H.R. No. 2) providing rules for the House of Representatives was offered by Representative O'Connor and was read by the Temporary Clerk.

Representative O'Connor moved for the adoption of H.R. No. 2, seconded by Representative Kihano.

Representative Wong, on a point of information, inquired if there are any rules in effect at the present time.

The Chair replied that he is guided by the Constitution of the State of Hawaii and from time to time he will be referring to Cushings' Manual.

At this point, Representative Wong inquired if the House is operating under the Sixth Legislature 1971-72 Rules.

The Chair replied that the Sixth State Legislature's Rules do not carry over to the Seventh State Legislature and that the Rules that are presently under consideration are the proposed Rules for the Seventh State Legislature.

Representative Kato inquired if we had any temporary Rules.

The Chair replied that he will be guided by the Constitution and by

Cushings' Manual.

The Chair declared a recess at 10:57 o'clock a.m., subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:02 o'clock a.m.

Representative Uechi offered an amendment to adopt the House Rules as proposed under H.R. No. 2 by adopting Part I only as temporary House Rules.

On motion by Representative Uechi, seconded by Representative Wong, and roll call being requested, the amendment failed to carry by a vote of 27 noes to 24 ayes, with Representatives Aduja, Ajifu, Aki, Amaral, Carroll, W.K. Chong, Cobb, Fong, J. Garcia, R. Garcia, Hapai, Kato, Leopold, Lunasco, Medeiros, Oda, Poepoe, Saiki, Soares, Uechi, Wasai, Wong, Yamada and Yim voting aye.

Representative R. Garcia spoke against the adoption of H.R. No. 2.

The Chair declared a recess at 11:12 o'clock a.m., subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:15 o'clock a.m.

Representative Wong offered the following amendment to H.R. No. 2:

"Section 1. The Official Rules of Procedure Adopted by the House of Representatives, State of Hawaii, Seventh State Legislature, attached to House Resolution No. 2 are amended by amending Rule 51 as follows:

1. By renumbering paragraph (7) as paragraph (8), and renumbering each subsequent paragraph.

2. By inserting a new paragraph (7) to read as follows:

'(7) Committee on Hawaiian Homes Land, whose scope shall be those programs relating to the Hawaiian Homes Land.'"

Representative Wong moved that the amendment be adopted, seconded by Representative Uechi.

Representatives Wong and Yim then spoke in favor of the proposed amendment.

Representatives O'Connor, Beppu and

Roehrig spoke against the proposed amendment.

The motion to adopt the amendment was put by the Chair and, roll call having been requested, the amendment failed to carry by a vote of 40 noes to 11 ayes, with Representatives Aduja, Aki, Cobb, Fong, R. Garcia, Kato, Lunasco, Uechi, Wasai, Wong and Yim voting aye.

Representative Yim offered the following amendment to H.R. No. 2:

"Amendment to Proposed Official Rules of Procedures of the House of Representatives.

Amend Proposed Rule 51, paragraph (25) to read as follows:

'(25) Committee on Legislative Management, whose scope shall be those programs relating to supervision of accounting and printing services, control of the expenses of the House in accordance with the appropriations acts providing for such expenses, and auditing and settling of all accounts which may be charged to the expenses of the House. The Committee shall submit to each member of the House detailed monthly and quarterly reports of all expenditures made by the House.'"

Representative Yim moved that the amendment be adopted, seconded by Representative Wong.

Representative Yim spoke in favor of the proposed amendment.

The motion to adopt the amendment was put by the Chair and, roll call having been requested, the amendment failed to carry by a vote of 43 noes to 8 ayes, with Representatives Cobb, R. Garcia, Kato, Lunasco, Uechi, Wasai, Wong and Yim voting aye.

Representative Kato offered the following amendment:

"Amendment to Proposed Official Rules of the House of Representatives.

Amend Rule 6 as follows:

1. Amend paragraph (16) to read as follows:

(16) The Speaker shall refer all bills to Committees subject to an appeal to the House. In referring bills to one or more standing committees, the first referral

shall be to the standing committee whose primary area of responsibility as described in Part II of these rules is most closely related to the subject matter contained in the bill being referred. In the case of multiple committee referrals, the Speaker shall name the standing committee referred to in the sentence immediately preceding as the committee having primary responsibility for the drafting of, and to make recommendations for action on, the bill so referred. However, where more than one standing committee could qualify as the committee having primary responsibility, preference shall be given to the committee having jurisdiction on a statewide, rather than a local basis.

2. Delete paragraph (17).”

Representative Kato moved that the amendment be adopted, seconded by Representative Yim.

Representative Kato spoke in favor of the proposed amendment.

At 11:47 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

At 11:50 o'clock a.m., the House of Representatives reconvened.

The motion to adopt the amendment was put by the Chair and failed to carry by a voice vote.

Representative J. Garcia, on behalf of the Minority, offered an amendment proposing a new set of Rules in substitution of the Rules proposed under H.R. No. 2 and spoke in favor of its adoption.

Representative Ajifu spoke in favor of the proposed amendment.

Representative Wakatsuki spoke against the proposed amendment.

Representative R. Garcia spoke in favor of the proposed amendment.

On motion by Representative J. Garcia, seconded by Representative Ajifu and, roll call having been requested, the amendment failed to carry by a vote of 27 noes to 24 ayes, with Representatives Aduja, Ajifu, Aki, Amaral, Carroll, W. Chong, Cobb, Fong, R. Garcia, J. Garcia,

Hapai, Kato, Leopold, Lunasco, Medeiros, Oda, Poepoe, Saiki, Soares, Uechi, Wasai, Wong, Yamada and Yim voting aye.

Representative Ushijima spoke in favor of adopting H.R. No. 2.

The motion to adopt H.R. No. 2 was put by the Chair and carried by a roll call vote of 40 ayes to 11 noes, with Representatives Cobb, Fong, R. Garcia, Kato, Leopold, Lunasco, Oda, Uechi, Wasai, Wong and Yim voting no.

A resolution (H.R. No. 3) declaring the Honorable Tadao Beppu, Representative from the Tenth District, and the Honorable Pedro de la Cruz, Representative from the Sixth District, to be duly elected Speaker and Vice-Speaker of the House of Representatives of the Seventh Legislature, respectively was offered by Representative Wakatsuki and was read by the Temporary Clerk.

On motion by Representative Wakatsuki, seconded by Representative Takamine and unanimously carried, H.R. No. 3 was adopted.

The Chair then appointed Representatives Takamine, Medina, Kawakami, King, Kihano, Soares and J. Garcia as a Committee to escort the newly elected Speaker to the rostrum.

The Speaker then addressed the members of the House as follows:

“Members of the House, honored guests, and fellow citizens:

I want to welcome the new members to the House. You have joined a great institution of learning—hard work and innovation, if you so desire. Regardless of what has been said this morning about the State Legislature, it must be a fine place because you 51 members were elected from a field of 250 candidates for these offices.

You are all aware that we face a difficult two years ahead. We will be called upon to fund our government operations which have increasing costs each year, with revenues that are expected to fall far short of our needs. This will require that both the Legislature and the Administration exert every effort

to achieve greater efficiency and economies in government operations.

For us here at the Legislature, it is a time of budgetary constraints, of limited resources and unlimited demands. Improvements in our economy are foreseen, but these improvements are not expected to parallel the growth and economic expansion of the '60's.

This economic picture then necessitates a more cautionary approach in government spending. Hawaii's long period of great economic growth which produced substantial gains in tax revenues has conditioned the State to a very high scale of living. We have many expensive government programs, created during times of higher tax revenues. The realities of having to return to more normal times forces us to seriously reconsider the role of government—to make a new evaluation regarding the extent and the types of services which government should offer.

We, in Hawaii, are not alone in this dilemma. Over the past 20 or 30 years, there has been unprecedented growth in the problems, responsibilities, and activities of state governments throughout the United States. The sharp acceleration in expenditures of public funds reflects the extraordinary growth in the scope and importance of matters dealt with by state governments today.

I, for one, view our present constraints as a positive factor rather than a negative one. It will force us to take a good look at existing government programs and to determine whether the nature and extent of such programs are truly in proportion to our State's resources and its needs. An alternative would be to increase taxes to meet the rising costs of government programs, but to raise taxes would be the easy way out. In the long run, this would not really solve our financial problems. We must instead seek to establish a sound fiscal base. The fiscal dilemma we are in should be viewed as a challenge, a challenge to grapple with the real problems of the '70's.

Such items as housing, transportation, education, health and welfare will soon require sums beyond our capacity to raise, unless ground rules are updated and more efficient delivery systems are devised. This is no easy task, for these are

areas noted for their complexities and recurring operational expenses.

Because we do not have enough resources to meet all of our needs at the same time, we must use what resources we have wisely. We will have to make some hard decisions in terms of how much can be done, how it can best be done, at what rate, and at what cost.

If past history is any indication, we will again hear many calls to have government take action whenever the private sector appears to be inert or slow in responding to society's needs or problems. Loud cries are sure to be heard to 'let the government do it' as an apparent quick, easy solution to the problem. Yet, on the other hand, as government steps in more and more, as agencies spring up and the number of government workers mushroom, we hear agonizing protests about the increase in government employment and payrolls—about the huge and ever-increasing cost of government and the subsequent need for increasing revenues to cope with increased government spending.

During the coming years, I, for one, would like to first see all avenues of cooperative action between the private and public sectors thoroughly explored before government steps in. I would rather have government work with the private sector to solve the mutual problems we have confronting us. I would rather have government assist the private sector when necessary with non-financial means, or, at the most, on a cost sharing basis.

We will also hear, in the days ahead, increasingly intense and passionate exhortations to have government embark on a whole series of 'reforms'—land reform, agricultural reform, house reform, welfare reform, tax reform, and so forth. Often, these are accompanied by heated arguments for quick action to avoid certain and dire consequences. These are based on the earnest conviction that something has to be done immediately to cope with a situation and that any kind of action is better than no action. We are assured that if the action demanded doesn't work, we will be no worse off than we were before.

I have no doubts about the good

intentions of those who rally behind the banner of reform. But good intentions are not enough. And regardless of how appealing the word 'reform' may be, we cannot equate it with 'good' or with 'justice.' Reform is often accompanied by an overemphasis on the rights of those who demand it with little regard for the rights of others, or the responsibilities that accompany the exercise of rights. To those who want instant reform, the Legislature may appear too deliberate in its actions. But then, we are aware that it is easier to be critical than to be correct—that it is often in the nature of man, regardless of his good intentions, to mistake the strength of his feeling for the strength of his argument. In seeking just and equitable solutions to our problems, an ounce of truth far outweighs all the good intentions ever conceived.

The Hawaii State Legislature has been ranked among the tops in the nation. We have gained wide recognition as a liberal and progressive body because of the modern and far reaching legislation we have enacted. And this is not because of the quantity of our laws. As we enter into a new session, I ask that you all join me in continuing our quest for quality—for quality in the government operations we approve—for quality in our relations with others and among ourselves. I ask that you join me in a cooperative effort to earnestly seek achievement of a high level of quality in every aspect of what we will be undertaking in the next few years. Thank you."

At this point, the Chair appointed Representatives Kondo, Medina, Amaral, Lunasco, Oda and Poepoe to escort Vice-Speaker Pedro de la Cruz to the rostrum. The Chair here introduced Vice-Speaker de la Cruz.

A resolution (H.R. No. 4) providing for the election of George M. Takane as Chief Clerk, Charles Y. Tomisato as Assistant Clerk, Richard K. Sugita as Sergeant-at-Arms and Edward L. Correa, Jr. as Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms was offered by Representative Morioka and was read by the Temporary Clerk.

On motion by Representative Morioka, seconded by Representative Nakama and unanimously carried, H.R. No. 4 was adopted.

The Speaker thereupon administered the oath of office to the newly elected officers.

A resolution (H.R. No. 5) naming the membership, chairmanship and vice chairmanship of the Standing Committees of the House of Representatives of the Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1973, as listed below was offered by Representative Wakatsuki and was read by the Clerk:

'No man knows but that today's setting of the sun may be the last here on Earth. Tomorrow when he stands in the presence of his Creator, when in a flash he sees the purpose of life, when he is asked what progress he has made, happy he will be who has exercised the principles of virtue, for he will reap the seeds he has sown during the fruitful years of his visit to Earth.'

Thank you."

### THIRD READING

The following bill, which was on the calendar for Third Reading, was read throughout and the following action taken:

Third Reading of H.B. No. 3.

Representative Suwa moved that H.B. No. 3, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Akizaki.

Representative Suwa then rose to speak in favor of the bill stating that after reviewing the allocation of the House amounting to \$995,000, he has found that the pay of officers and employees amounts to \$513,014.35; pay of regular employees \$211,921.73; annual allowance \$38,250; per diem \$42,142.73; travel and mileage \$27,974.09; stationery, office and other supplies \$16,382.88; communications \$22,502.12; delivery and hauling \$21.61; legal ads \$399.50; rentals (equipment) \$34,809.88; repairs (equipment) \$10,196.08; equipment \$6,890.00 and miscellaneous expenses \$7,599.45 which gives total expenditures of \$932,104.42, the cash balance as of December 31, 1972 being \$62,895.58; less reserves which includes the printing of the journal \$30,000; contingency fund \$11,652.57 and withholding taxes \$341.12, leaving a balance after deduction of reserves of \$20,901.89. The Committee feels that the House will be able to operate within the allocated \$995,000.

Representative Yim then offered the following amendment to H.B. No. 3, HD 1:

“SECTION 1. House Bill 3, House Draft 1, is amended by amending Section 4 to read as follows:

‘SECTION 4. The Senate and the House of Representatives shall have their accounts audited and a full report of such audit shall be presented to each member of the Senate and to each member of the House of Representatives of the Legislature on or before January 16, 1974.’”

Representative Yim moved that the amendment be adopted, seconded by Representative Wong.

Representative Yim then spoke in favor of the amendment stating that the purpose of this amendment is to require that a full report of the accounts be presented to both Houses of the legislature before January 16, 1974.

Representative Suwa spoke against the amendment stating that Section 4 of House Bill No. 3 contains the necessary language for the submission of an audit of the accounts but the amendment which would require the submission of a full audit to the House prior to its convening

is impossible and asked that the amendment be defeated.

Representative Wong spoke in favor of the amendment as follows:

“I think it is most gratifying, Mr. Speaker, to hear the figures for the operation of the legislature. This is the first time that an accounting has been made public and the Finance Committee Chairman should be congratulated.

However, Mr. Speaker, I think that the purpose of the amendment has two reasons: One is that the language as presented in House Bill No. 3 before us makes some reference of a report presented to the Senate and the House of Representatives. This amendment attempts to clarify the ambiguity, specifically stating that copies of this particular audit will be presented to each member of the Senate and the House. Secondly, Mr. Speaker, I am pleased to see that a breakdown was provided to the members of the House which explains in general categories the cost of running the legislature and I am sure one need not be an accountant to close your books on December 31st of the preceding year. I think any kind of an audit presented to members prior to them voting on a particular funding for the next legislative session is public business and this is the first time in my three terms here as a legislator that an accounting has been made public relative to the spending of public money. For that I thank you very much and I urge my colleagues to support the amendment which basically does two things—one to clarify existing language under the bill and, secondly, that as a legislator, we should demand that before making any decisions of moneys of this magnitude, that we be given all the information available to make a good decision.”

Representative Cobb also spoke in favor of the amendment.

Representative Wakatsuki then rose and spoke against the amendment as follows:

“I think, Mr. Speaker, if one would look at the amendment, the purpose sounds good, the words even look good, but if one will search his mind, he will find that it is totally unworkable. It demands that the audit be presented to

each member by January 16th. As explained by the Chairman of the Finance Committee, in no way can this be accomplished. We all know that an audit takes from three to four months and very often six months.

I think the Speaker has made it very clear to all of the members of this House that if the particular person is interested in finding out further details, any of us here are welcome to sit down with the Speaker to go over the account. I think that what we see here is something that may look and sound good but I don't think we are here to vote on something that is totally unworkable."

Representative R. Garcia then spoke for the amendment, as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, in the short time that I have listened to the previous speaker, I have searched my own mind and not only does the purpose sound good, it is good. I would like to go over two specific areas which I think this particular amendment will open up the process of government and make available to the public some of the internal functionings of the House of Representatives.

One of the primary arguments raised by Representative Wakatsuki and Representative Suwa is that it will be impossible to submit a full audit to this particular House within a period of two weeks—from December 31st to January 16th. Mr. Speaker, I am not a professional auditor nor am I a CPA, but I think we can see methods where different people and different organizations can run a continuous audit on a month to month basis. We feel that by running a continuous audit, we have different kinds of advantages by letting the House and the leadership know how much is being spent and possibly to make some projections so that when the books are closed on December 31st, the audit will be made only for that particular month—that of December. I can see no type of difficulty in terms of making this audit available to the members within that time simply because we can run a continuous audit.

For this reason, I ask the members of this House to vote in favor of this particular amendment to show indeed the House of Representatives stands firm as far as commitments and openness in

government are concerned."

The Chair then made the following observations:

"I hope some of the members are not impugning the character of the Chairman of the Legislative Committee or the Speaker of the House. I want to make it very clear that in my tenure as Speaker, I have been very tight with the taxpayers' money. I am very careful about people using House postage for personal purposes. I have been very careful about the use of House stationery and House material for political purposes. I have been very careful about using the printshop for personal purposes.

I want to make it very clear that we have worked with a budget under which we have been solvent for years and the \$995,000 we are talking about is a figure that we have worked with for three or four years. I am sure we can operate under it.

I want to make it very clear here, too, that under Section 4, we are talking about a full report that shall be made to the Senate and the House of Representatives which means that the presiding officer of the Senate and the presiding officer of the House are responsible as recipients of all testimonies, communications, petitions and requests and any member of the House who cares to find out any details of any operation is welcome to come to my office and ask for it. We have a system of full financial disclosure. You are always welcome to come to my office and see the figures. I just want to make these things clear so that there is no doubt that we are not impugning the character of any member of the House."

The motion to adopt the amendment was put by the Chair and failed to carry by a voice vote.

Representative Yim then rose and spoke against House Bill No. 3 stating that he had certain reservations about Section 2 of House Bill No. 3, H.D. 1.

He further stated: "Section 2 has an appropriation of \$995,000 to cover the expenses of the House of Representatives. We are all aware of the State's financial difficulty which may force this Body to initiate a substantial tax increase before

the session is through. At such a time, we have a special obligation to make more than just a cursory examination of the State's spending and we can start by being especially critical of our own spending in the legislature.

Mr. Speaker, up to about two hours ago, we had no detailed information on the House budget to justify the expenditure of \$995,000. In spite of the law, a full audit report on all legislative expenses for the years 1970, 1971 and 1972 have not yet been made available to the Body as of this morning. Further, the budget breakdown on the House expenses was made available only this morning with no comparison—breakdown for the years 1970 and 1971.

The budget breakdown as cited by the Chairman of the Finance Committee includes a surplus of over \$20,000 which means the proposed appropriation amount of \$995,000 has a fat of at least \$20,000. Mr. Speaker, because of the lack of information and the lack of time to understand the proposed spending, it is impossible for me to decide on the rationale and the justification for

spending \$995,000 for House expenses.”

The Chair then replied that the \$20,000 was not a surplus, but the balance as of December 31, 1972, and that there cannot be a full report until the books are closed and ready to be printed. He further stated that the final report is contained in the House Journal.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried and H. B. No. 3 passed Third Reading by a vote of 43 ayes to 7 noes, with Representatives Cobb, R. Garcia, Kato, Lunasco, Uechi, Wong and Yim voting no and Representative Wedemeyer being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 3 has passed Third Reading at 2:00 o'clock p.m.

At 2:05 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative Ushijima, seconded by Representative J. Garcia and carried by a rising vote, the House of Representatives adjourned to 11:30 o'clock a.m. Friday, January 26, 1973, in memory of the late President of the United States, Lyndon Baines Johnson.

The Speaker presided.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Reverend Joseph E. Avery, M.M., Associate, of Saint Anthony Church.

Roll call of the members of the House of Representatives showed that all members were present with the exception of Representatives Kato, Kimura and Wedemeyer, who were excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Seventh Day.

On motion by Representative Ushijima, seconded by Representative J. Garcia and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Seventh Day was approved.

At this time, Representative Roehrig introduced to the members of the House a colleague of his at the George Washington Law School, Mr. John Stanford, who was present in the audience.

## 10TH DAY

Tuesday, January 30, 1973

The House of Representatives of the Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1973, was called to order at 11:00 o'clock a.m.

The Speaker presided.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by The Reverend Charles Sundry of Gloria Dei Lutheran Church.

Roll call of the members of the House of Representatives showed that all members were present with the exception of Representatives de la Cruz and Wedemeyer, who were excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Ninth Day.

On motion by Representative Ushijima, seconded by Representative J. Garcia and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Ninth Day was approved.

### SENATE COMMUNICATION

A communication from the Senate (Sen. Com. No. 5) returning House Concurrent Resolution No. 25 which was adopted by the Senate on January 30, 1973 was read by the Clerk and was placed on file.

At this time, Representative Iha introduced to the members of the House a group of students from the School of Nursing, University of Hawaii, who were accompanied by Mrs. Yukio Gass and Mrs. Mary Koss.

Representative Carroll introduced 17 students from Kapiolani Community College and their instructor, Dr. Weller.

Representative Aki then introduced a group of students from Nanakuli High School and their adviser, Mrs. Ponce.

At 11:06 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

At 11:15 o'clock a.m., the House of Representatives met in joint session with the Senate, pursuant to House Concurrent Resolution No. 25, to receive the Governor's message.

At this time, the Chair introduced to the members of the Senate and the House the Honorable C.K. Yen, Vice President of the Republic of China, who was returning home from Washington, D.C. where he had attended funeral services for the late Lyndon B. Johnson.

The Honorable C.K. Yen then addressed the members of the Senate and the House, expressing that it was indeed a rare privilege and an honor for him to sepak before the Hawaii State Legislature. He has always been a great admirer of the United States, but more particularly of Hawaii because of the friendliness of the people. He has noticed that many changes have been made since his last official visit in 1967. He then stated that the people of Taiwan are working hard, and will work even harder, if necessary, to meet the challenges confronting them.

The Chair then introduced to the members of the Senate and the House the Honorable Te-Chieh Poo, Consul General of the Republic of China, and the Honorable S.K. Chow, Special Envoy of the Republic of China, and former Ambassador from Taiwan to the United States and former Foreign Minister.

The Chair then appointed Representatives Wakatsuki and Soares and Senators Taira and Anderson as a committee to escort the Honorable John A. Burns, Governor of the State of Hawaii, to the rostrum.

The Chair then presented the Governor of the State of Hawaii, the Honorable John A. Burns.

The Governor addressed the Joint Session as follows:

“Mr. Speaker, Mr. President, Honorable Members of the Seventh State Legislature, Distinguished Guests, My Fellow Citizens:

I am indeed delighted to join you in welcoming the Vice President of the Republic of China, our neighbor in this Pacific, and in extending to him and the people of China our warmest Aloha.

It is, as always, a genuine pleasure and a high privilege to meet with your Honorable Bodies on this time—tested annual occasion bringing together the Executive and Legislative Branches of our

State Government.

May I first take advantage of this welcome opportunity to extend my personal heartfelt congratulations to all who are new to these chambers, as well as to those who have been happily reelected. That our Legislature continues to be so broadly representative of our citizenry again bodes well for the ultimate success of this session.

The track record established by your predecessor bodies is an outstanding one, unduplicated by any legislature anywhere in these United States. We have every reason to look forward to equally outstanding productivity from this Legislature.

We, who are assembled here today, are called upon to worthy accomplishment by the urgencies of our time, by the desires and needs of our people, and by our own consciences. A standard of excellence must always be in our minds, our hearts and our actions.

It is difficult to realize that ten years have elapsed since I was first privileged to speak in this setting.

Your accomplishments over the past decade have been great, and it has been a distinct privilege to work with a Legislature that I regard as the most outstanding one in our Nation.

Nonetheless, we cannot rest on past laurels. Today's needs require fresh creativity and further endeavor.

We can, however, properly place our faith where such trust has been proven to be well-placed in the past—that is, in the people whom we have been elected to serve. We can exercise our best judgment in all honesty and with confidence in the people's understanding that the deeds done here are done in their best interest. We can proceed from this point with a sense of justified optimism and secure hope for success in meeting the most difficult of challenges—challenges compounded by the Federal Government, whose undertakings affect your ability to legislate effectively and to decide what is good for the people of Hawaii.

Inasmuch as the Executive Budget, with my message, is already before you, with attendant discussion on the

alternatives for shaping it as a viable document for the pursuit of continued progress for all Hawaii, I will forego any detailed analysis of this subject.

This is not to minimize its importance, but rather to dwell on more fundamental and basic issues. What is of greater significance than the mountain of statistics or the volumes of reports presented for your deliberations is somewhat less tangible, and I will say more on this later.

Many of you will recall my recommendation at the outset of the current biennium in 1971. I suggested then that we adopt a policy of 'consolidation and conservation'.

We have, on the basis of your policy guidelines and through the executive latitude you have placed in our hands, adopted just this course.

The consequences of our actions and the extent of anticipated future accruals have already been discussed with your appropriate committees by budgetary and fiscal representatives of this Administration.

Substantial savings have been made. I share the views expressed by your Speaker and your President that our fiscal constraints provide us an opportunity for timely, positive decisions to further improve delivery of government services. It is indeed prudent that we now take an even closer and harder look at the many programs previously authorized, with a view toward improvement of outmoded systems and consolidation of programs where such steps can lead to effective government.

We can regard this process to that of an athlete methodically conditioning himself for the long haul ahead.

In accordance with the policy you have adopted, the job security of personnel in authorized positions has not been jeopardized in the economies made. Additional future savings can be achieved on this same basis in executive implementation of any program adjustments you may deem desirable.

While prudence is a wise policy to follow in public spending even under the most affluent conditions, today it is even

more imperative than ever that we make maximum use of our resources and our manpower if we are to continue delivering those services which are the State's obligations.

We should seek this objective even though our economy is basically a sound one and a healthy one. The outlook for an even broader, more diversified base is promising. Many heads are being put together, not only in government but in the private sector as well, to develop the best means for attracting new activities to match the rich talents inherent in our people and our unique natural resources.

We seek new opportunities for our people, expansion of those with greater potential and the preservation of such activities that are special to Hawaii.

We seek those goals that are consonant with our continued concern for the kind of quality growth that all of us desire for our State.

Some have observed that 'quality growth' is a relatively new element in government planning. Perhaps it is new to those observers, but I have always understood this to be the objective in all those works that you have authorized or devised for the public good.

It has been observed, too, that 'quality growth' defies precise definition. Perhaps this is a consequence of a narrower perspective of physical dimensions, or of urban design; of the placement of buildings and preservation of open space; of the construction of capital improvements; of city plans and economic plans and master plans and general plans—in short, a vision limited to the physical and economic elements in 'quality growth'.

These matters are meritorious, and they are part of our total consideration. 'Quality growth' includes all of these, and it includes more. The heart of it, the central element in 'quality growth' is a social one: It involves people. It means the creating and improving of Hawaii's economic and social conditions so that all men, women and children in our Islands can retain the full sense of their human dignity and proper pride, through meaningful employment of their God—given talents and the pursuit of worthy personal objectives.

Why, then, cannot 'quality growth' be defined as 'the continuing improvement in the climate of freedom to achieve'. Fundamental political and social principles are inherent in such definition. Such an ideal of quality growth applies to all our citizens.

There can be no selectivity. It must apply to the banker and the merchant, to the millhand and the corporate executive, to the teacher and the school child, to the blue-collar and the white-collar worker, to doctors, lawyers, housewives, truck drivers, retail clerks, construction workers, to every citizen in this State...yes, even to legislators and to executive administrators.

All of our people need the opportunity to grow and to expand and to advance themselves, whatever their station in life.

Moreover, all that we plan and do must be done in a spirit of constructive and cooperative optimism. We must, in this effort, have a positive attitude that nothing is unattainable, rather than submit to a perverse negativism and anxiety, an attitude that serves only to debilitate and weaken a society's spirit.

In considering and allocating our limited resources, then, we must be ever mindful of the degree to which all such allocations will increase the 'freedom to achieve' of Hawaii's people.

In sum, I repeat, I share the views and concerns expressed by your Speaker and your President in their opening day remarks. There is much that can be done in a positive and constructive manner without further straining the public's forbearance. This is, indeed, a challenge, but then that is why we are here.

Mindful of our individual and collective obligations, we have every reason to anticipate another session of productive, imaginative and creative endeavor on the part of Hawaii's great State Legislature.

Having departed from tradition on past occasions when I have been privileged to address you, I would, with your kind indulgence, make yet another departure.

I appreciate very much your patience

in delaying this occasion pending my return from the Nation's Capitol, a journey I began with the pleasant thought of representing our State at the Presidential inauguration and from which I return with a saddened heart over the loss of a dear and personal friend, mine and yours.

We are, of course, grateful to God that the President has succeeded in ending hostilities in Southeast Asia. We are mindful of Hawaii's own heavy losses in that war. We pray that the peace at hand will be a lasting one.

All of us can now join with the President and Congress in pledging to do what we can to promote reconciliation—abroad and domestically—and an 'escalation of peace'.

During the past weeks, we were saddened by the loss of two great leaders in America's history—Presidents Truman and Johnson. Each was a special friend of Hawaii; both had visited here. Our Islands today have important programs and institutions which their work made possible.

President Johnson particularly was responsible for making straight the pathway to Statehood and for the foundation of the East-West Center. For Hawaii, Lyndon Baines Johnson will always be a very special President.

The passing of these two men is an additional reminder to all of us that our success in life will be measured by the selfless service we render to our fellowman.

In all the eulogies offered in memory of Presidents Truman and Johnson, I find it particularly timely to remember the words of Lyndon Johnson himself, in one of his last public addresses in September.

As you know, I had only the highest admiration and the deepest personal affection for President Johnson. I will not belabor you with the reasons for the esteem in which I held him. Let me say only that among the great American leaders it has been my privilege to know, none demonstrated as much love for people—for people as human beings—than did Lyndon Johnson.

To him, people bore no labels. He viewed them not as liberals or conservatives, Democrats or Republicans, northerners or southerners, whites or blacks. He viewed each man as an individual, whatever his calling, whatever his immediate concern.

It was this warm compassion for people, for humanity, and his desire to uplift people that was the most impressive characteristic of Lyndon Johnson.

What I had thought to say today...and what I had thought about in trying to say to you today...President Johnson stated most eloquently in his own reaffirmation of faith that I find especially worthy of repeating on this occasion. Bearing in mind my close relationship with him, you will, I am sure, understand my quoting him at length, because I think what he said is most appropriate to us in Hawaii, changing perhaps his thought of America to ours of Hawaii.

He said: 'Over the course of a long, full and gratifying life, I have seen many Septembers and have known many autumns. In public service—and in private life—I have experienced a full measure of unwelcome winters. Yet melancholy is not a mood which I have ever allowed to weigh for long upon my spirits.

I live—as I have always worked—by the faith that with each passing day, we are always approaching nearer to the beginning of a new springtime. It is by that perspective that I see our country now.

If I believe anything of this land—if I know anything of its people and their character—I believe and I know that we have not come to and are not approaching America's September.

On the contrary, it is my conviction—a conviction which deepens every day—that this land and its people are quickening with new life and new potential of what will become the springtime of a new America.

I do not say this to merely offer reassurance in anxious times. Far from it, I intend what I say to be taken as a challenge—a challenge to every citizen

of every age.

No nation can be more than the vision of its people. Americans cannot be more than we believe ourselves capable of becoming. Thus, we are directly challenged to choose between two very different perceptions of what we are and what we can make of America itself.

On the one hand, we can choose to guide our course by light of bright perceptions—of America the beautiful, America the just, America the land of the free and the home of the brave.

Or, on the other hand, we can choose to move toward the shadows of what some have called the 'dark perception' of America the unclean, America the unjust, and America the unworthy.

For myself—as, I am sure, for many of you—there is no real choice. I want to open the soul of America to the warm sunlight of faith in itself, faith in the principles and precepts of its birth, faith in the promise and potential of its resources and skills and people. Yet I know that, in these times, this is not easy.

For too long, we have permitted the dark perception to pervade our midst. Day after day, month after month, the portrayal of America as unclean, unjust and unworthy has been ground into the consciousness of our people.

We no longer see the blooming flowers for we are searching for the litter. We no longer celebrate the many fresh triumphs of justice for we are lingering over the residue of yesterday's shortcomings. We no longer measure the miles we have come to a more humane, civil and peaceful world for we are too busy calibrating the remaining inches of times we are trying to escape and leave behind.

This is our clear and present challenge.

When we permit these dark perceptions to dominate us, we are allowing our future to be shaped by visions that are small and mean and diminishing to our potential. We are, in simple terms, dooming those who come after us to know what could only be a second-rate America.

This is a future which I am unwilling to accept.

I have devoted my time on this earth to working toward the day when there would be no second-class citizenship in America, no second-class quality opportunity, no second-class justice at home, no second-class status in the world for our ideals and benefits.

I do not intend now that second-rate visions shall set our course toward settling for a second-rate America. That is why I speak as I do now.

All through the pages of history we read the heartrending stories of those who set out in quest of great goals and discoveries, yet when they were almost to the edge of success, they hesitated—not knowing or understanding how near they were to their aims. Out of that moment of hesitation, all too often they lost forever their opportunity to succeed.

In many respects, that seems to be a pattern we ourselves are in danger of repeating.

Over all the years of our Nation's existence, we have been setting goals for ourselves and striving tirelessly to reach them. These goals have been both the slogans and the substance of national affairs for generation after generation.

Full employment. Decent wages. Adequate housing. Education for everyone. Opportunity for everyone. Good health, good medical care, good hospitals for even the least among us. Above all, equal justice under the law for our fellow men. America's goals have been basic and simple.

They have permeated and motivated all our institutions—churches and schools, professions and labor unions and corporations and foundations—as well as government at every level.

All our American resources and strengths—private and public—have been committed to the effort, and we have come very close to success.

Nowhere—over all the globe—have any people, under any other system, come nearer to fulfillment of such aspirations than we have under our system.

Yet, at the very moment we are near to realization, we have allowed our effort

to go slack, our momentum to slow, and we have entered a season of hesitation.

Why?

Basically, I believe, it is because we have not understood—and still do not fully comprehend—where we are or what we are about.

Whatever may be your own perception of where we are and where we are heading, let me say for myself that I see little today suggesting that our system is failing—but I see all too much which convincingly argues that by our doubts and hesitation we may be failing the promise and potential of our system.

We are not living in times of collapse. The old is not coming down. Rather, the troubling and torment these days stem from the new trying to rise into place.

With our Nation's past efforts, with our long and faithfully kept commitments, with our infinite successes in so many fields, we have brought into being the materials, as it were, with which to construct a new America.

Faced with the task of such great dimensions, we have no time for melancholy. We have no cause for moroseness. We have work to be done—the greatest work any generation of Americans has ever faced. Believing that, I say—let's be on with our labors.

The essentials of a new America—a better America—are all on hand and within our reach. It is our destiny—and, I believe, our duty—to take up our appointed positions and commence the labors that will change what needs to be changed among us.

Our real challenge lies not in suppressing change but in utilizing it to vitalize and energize our society. Change is not our enemy. On the contrary, this society has no deadlier danger than refusal to change.

This is what I believe our young Americans are trying to say—and have been trying to communicate to us. With their fine young minds, fresh new learning and clear new vision, they are seeing many segments of society as it needs to be seen and understood.

The most frightening thing that could happen to us today would be for us to close our eyes to new ideas, to close our ears to those—particularly the young, in whom we have invested so much hope and effort through the years of our existence—who are trying to tell us how they would go about perfecting the visions of America.

It is just such spirit that we honor on this occasion. It is by restoring that spirit to our lives and our Nation's life that we can honor our trust as Americans.'

Those were the words of Lyndon Johnson but a few months before his passing. The thoughts he expressed then describe the real legacy he left our country—a legacy of faith in America, faith in the American people and faith in the future, faith in Hawaii and faith in Hawaii's people.

It is this faith I share in Hawaii, the people of Hawaii and our future, and I know that this faith I share with you.

I have every confidence that your deliberations will also lead to a 'reaffirmation of faith'.

Mahalo and God bless you."

At the conclusion of the message, the Honorable David C. McClung, President of the Senate, thanked the Governor, on behalf of the members of the Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawaii, for his presentation of the State of the State message.

At this time, the President introduced to the members of the Senate and the House the First Lady of the State, Mrs. John A. Burns, and the Honorable William S. Richardson, Chief Justice, Supreme Court of the State of Hawaii.

At 11:50 o'clock a.m., the joint session with the Senate adjourned and the House stood in recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

At 12:06 o'clock p.m., the House of Representatives reconvened.

At 12:05 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative Ushijima, seconded by Representative J. Garcia and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned to 11:30 o'clock a.m., tomorrow, February 1, 1973.

## 12TH DAY

Thursday, February 1, 1973

The House of Representatives of the Seventh Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1973, was called to order at 11:30 o'clock a.m.

The Speaker presided.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by The Reverend T. Samuel Lee of Parker United Methodist Church.

Roll call of the members of the House of Representatives showed that all members were present with the exception of Representatives W. Chong, de la Cruz, Kato, Kawakami, Kimura, King, Medina, Morioka, Roehrig, Wedemeyer and Yamada, who were excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Eleventh Day.

On motion by Representative Ushijima, seconded by Representative J. Garcia and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Eleventh Day was approved.

### GOVERNOR'S MESSAGES

The following messages from the Governor (Gov. Mess. Nos. 10 and 11) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

A message from the Governor (Gov. Mess. No. 10) requesting consideration of changes to previously enacted appropriations, was placed on file.

A message from the Governor (Gov. Mess. No. 11) transmitting copies of a report entitled: "Economic Feasibility of Fresh Water Prawn Farming in Hawaii" by Yung Cheng Shang, which had been reprinted by the Department of Land and Natural Resources with permission of the University of Hawaii, was placed on file.

### MISCELLANEOUS COMMUNICATION

A communication from Robert D. Wiemer, President, Hawaii Association of Conservation Districts (Misc. Com. No. 8) transmitting a Resolution which was adopted on January 11, 1973, relating to legislative appropriations for soil and water conservation work, was read by the Clerk and was placed on file.

At this time, the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives Kato, Kawakami, Kimura, King, Medina, Morioka, Roehrig and Yamada.

The Chair then introduced to the members of the House the Honorable Thomas McCall, Governor of the State of Oregon.

The Chair appointed Representatives J. Garcia and Soares to escort Governor McCall to the rostrum whereupon he addressed the members of the House as follows:

"Members of the House, Ladies and Gentlemen:

Oregon and Hawaii are renowned in the Nation for putting so sharply into focus the suggestion that we might have to put the brakes on tourism.

Early in 1971, I made a statement that was widely quoted. I said on national television: 'Come visit Oregon again and again. This IS a state of excitement. But for Heaven's sake don't come here to live.'

Then in 1972, I said at a national anti-pollution conference that we might even have to withdraw the invitation to visit.

With this kind of concern about tourism, you well might ask: 'What is this tourist Governor doing in Hawaii?' If you raise an objection, the point is well taken. But I should say, in defense, that I came for the golf tournament, and only after receiving assurances from my fellow duffer, Governor Jack Burns, that all golf players have an automatic and renewable visa.

Statements reflecting the view that tourism might be getting out of hand in such sublime recreational playgrounds as Hawaii and Oregon are easily misunderstood. We see dramatic increases in tourism in our State, and we ask: 'What's happening here?' Simply raising the question causes widespread apoplexy.

The initial reaction of many people is to claim that I'm trying to keep visitors out of Oregon, a statement I've never made. But I was trying to make the point that over-population and

over-industrialization might throw Oregon into the situation so many other states face today—their overcrowding, population, lack of breathing space and overtaxed recreational facilities take the zest out of life.

And I was trying my best to get across the idea that it might be a great mistake to purposely attract more tourists to trample our environment into oblivion. A recent independent study indicates that we have the capacity to handle more tourists, and we will continue the invitation, at least for awhile. But our total effort will be directed toward spreading the 10 million visitors we get annually more widely throughout the state. We want to downplay summer tourism and emphasize winter tourism.

Even so, I have recommended a \$400,000 cut in tourism promotion advertising. The flak flew again when that news came out, but I have learned to be stoic and I face the continuing crisis in a manner described by Mark Twain as 'the calm confidence of a Christian holding four aces.'

Last week, consequently, I calmly recommended creation of a Division of Tourism within the Department of Commerce. At first blush this was taken in some quarters to mean that I had reversed field. But I had anticipated the reaction, and in a special message accompanying the proposal I made it clear what the division was expected to do—to correlate state programs toward the goal of a more rational tourist policy.

I added: 'Our present non-policy permits insensitivity to nature's amenities and does not relate to Oregon's capacity as a host to more than 10 million out-of-staters a year.'

The concept that a State might reach an upper limit on tourism is terribly difficult to sell, but it appears to me that at least Hawaii is having some success. There is no snideness or rudeness in what we are trying to do. We're approaching this with great care, trying to make a scientific determination of how many tourists we can host without environmental-traffic breakdowns.

As tough as this job is, it has to be faced. Wildly luring masses of tourists to Oregon or Hawaii is self-defeating, in

that there is a very real danger the visitors will harm the vacationland they came to enjoy.

Some of our resources are non-renewable. If they are destroyed there is nothing to take their place. We should be considering how to save what we have for future tourists and future residents to enjoy, and not decimate our resources in this generation.

We can fit some humor into the struggle to insure livability. An Oregon desert philosopher claims he discourages tourism by describing the time he sent a sample of his soil to a state university. The report came back, he says, advising that the soil needed everything but sand.

A report he sought on a water sample came back with the notation: 'This water has 40 per cent moisture content.'

It is truly wonderful to be in Hawaii, where I find ready understanding of someone with a hot-blooded concern for the environment. Your state land-use planning efforts have outstripped our own, but hopefully we will be right on your heels.

In my address to the opening-day session of the Oregon Legislature, I expressed the thought that we are facing a shameless threat to our environment and to the whole quality of life—unfettered despoiling of the land. We find speculators subdividing the waterless desert, and embarking upon shoreline construction projects in a process we now call coastal 'condomania.'

Subdividers are chopping and thrashing away, making hamburger out of the magnificent landscape of Oregon—and of Hawaii, too.

We are in dire need of National and State land-use policies. I have recommended to the Legislature new subdivision laws and new standards for planning and zoning that must be met by cities and counties.

There is a new mood widely expressed by our citizens that our land resource is finite. There is a valid public interest in directing growth and development, and in preventing mis-use of land, the sprawl of suburbia, knowing that unlimited and unregulated growth leads inexorably to a

lowered quality of life.

When we consider these mutual interests of Oregon and Hawaii, we are given pause to reflect on others. We don't have the tropical ocean waters of Hawaii, but both of our states have inviting beaches. When there is a dock strike, Oregon and Hawaii are desperately affected.

There is a possibility we may become formally associated. I have discussed with Governor Burns whether Hawaii might like to become a part of the Pacific Northwest Economic Development Region. As an aside, I should report that I have volunteered to change the name to something more in keeping with an across-the-waters partnership.

Designation by the Federal Department of Commerce of this Economic Development Region—now comprised of Oregon, Washington and Idaho—gives us a new opportunity to coordinate activities in joint fields of interest, including tourism, international trade and agriculture. We of the Northwest have found a great need to deal with the rest of the Nation and the World as a unit. We can and will maintain competition among ourselves, but we believe that our chief concern is with competition outside of our region. More important, we are together in our determination to achieve balanced growth.

Growth simply for the sake of getting bigger is anathema to us. Our goal is to enhance the quality of life with a policy of planned growth that will protect the environment, provide financial support for education and other essential public services, and ensure a level of economic activity calculated to steadily improve per capita income.

Judging by Hawaii's attitude toward growth, I would think those also are your goals.

I am convinced that a vast majority of Hawaiians and Oregonians are determined to have a planning process that will allow for orderly development, based upon our views of what will be the greatest lasting benefit to the public as a whole.

Hawaii, like Oregon, is a progressive state, and that is a credit to the foresight

of this citizen Legislature and your Governor.

Frankly, you've made even more progress than we have in certain areas, and so I'm not going to spend all of my time here on the golf course.

I expect to learn something of your achievements to be able to return to my State with my batteries recharged by Hawaiian vitality.

And please note that I intend to return to Oregon. Surely Hawaii is a state of excitement, but you wouldn't want me to come here to live."

At 11:51 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.
