FIRST DAY

Wednesday, January 19, 1977

In accordance with the provisions of Section 11 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, the House of Representatives of the Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii convened in Regular Session on Wednesday, January 19, 1977. The Honorable Jack K. Suwa being the Representative at the time present who was elected from the First Representative District of the State of Hawaii, called the House to order at 10:00 o'clock a.m.

The National Anthem was sung by Mr. Charles K. L. Davis.

Representative Suwa then appointed the Honorable Neil Abercrombie, James Aki, Charles M. Campbell, Steve Cobb and Faith P. Evans to escort Reverend Abraham K. Akaka to the rostrum.

Reverend Abraham K. Akaka then invoked the Divine Blessing.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION

A resolution (H.R. No. 1) declaring the Honorable Jack K. Suwa, Representative from the First District, as the duly elected Temporary Chairman of the House of Representatives of the Ninth Legislature was offered by Representatives Peters and Inaba and was read by the Temporary Clerk.

On motion by Representative Peters, seconded by Representative Inaba and carried, H.R. No. 1 was adopted.

The Temporary Chairman then appointed George M. Takane as Temporary Clerk of the House of Representatives.

Representative Suwa then addressed the members of the House as follows:

"Senator Fong, distinguished guests, ladies and gentlemen:

On behalf of my colleagues, I welcome you to the beginning of the Ninth State Legislature of the State of Hawaii. The people of Hawaii have instructed all of us elected members to sit here today to assume the task of considering the needs of the State and the shaping of the future of Hawaii. In the weeks and months to come my colleagues and I hope to demonstrate ourselves worthy of the trust placed in us.

As I look upon my colleagues on the floor this morning, I cannot help but notice that several familiar faces are missing. In their place are newcomers to the State Legislature; many of whom will bring fresh outlook and new ideas. It is my sincere desire that together we'll be able to work towards a goal that will serve the best interests of the people of this State.

With these remarks, I welcome you once again. And, now, let us commence with the order of the day."

The Temporary Chairman then appointed the Honorable Ronald Y. Kondo, Chairman; Benjamin J. Cayetano, Vice Chairman; Russell Blair, Ken Kiyabu, Ted T. Morioka, Lisa Naito, Tony Narvaes and Andrew K. Poepoe to the Committee on Credentials.

At 10: 12 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 10:45 o'clock a.m.

The Temporary Chairman then appointed Representatives Daniel J. Kihano, Norman Mizuguchi, Katsuya Yamada and Donna R. Ikeda to escort the Honorable William S. Richardson from the rostrum.

Representative Kamalii, upon being recognized by the Temporary Chairman, stated: "I have a resolution to offer."

At 10:50 o'clock a.m., the Temporary Chairman declared a recess.

Upon reconvening at 10:51 o'clock a.m., the Chair stated:

"Representative Kamalii, at the proper time, the Chair will recognize you for the submittal of the resolution; so, shall we proceed."

At this time, the Temporary Chairman introduced the Honorable George R. Ariyoshi, Governor of the State of Hawaii, and Lieutenant Governor Nelson K. Doi to the members of the House and their guests.

At 10:54 o'clock a.m., the Temporary Chairman declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:04 o'clock a.m.

Upon being recognized by the Temporary Chairman, Representative Kamalii moved for the adoption of the resolution, seconded by Representative Ajifu.

The Temporary Clerk, upon receiving a copy, was instructed by the Chair to read the resolution to the members of the House.

The Temporary Chairman then stated:

"Representative Kamalii, the Chair, at this time, would like to, after looking at the resolution, request that this be submitted at the end of the calendar. I think that will be the proper place."

Representative Kamalii, on a point of information, asked:

"Then, am I to assume that the election of the Speaker will come after the adoption of the temporary rules?"

The Temporary Chairman then replied:

"As far as the Chair is concerned, the Chair rules that we will follow the agenda of the day and elect the Speaker, and then at the time of 'New Business' area I'm sure that the Speaker will consider your resolution."

Representative Kamalii then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of the resolution."

The Temporary Chairman then stated:

"At this time, I would like to rule you out of order. The Chair has already ruled that this resolution be placed at the end of the calendar."

Representative Ajifu then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to speak to the resolution because you're making an arbitrary decision."

The Temporary Chair then stated:

"Representative Ajifu, the Chair had requested that this be placed at the end of the agenda and you are insisting that we take it up now. The Chair has ruled that this be placed at the end of the agenda."

Representative Ajifu then remarked:

"Mr. Speaker, the reason why I say this. "

The Temporary Chairman then stated:

"All right, shall we proceed. We are here to do some business as our taxpayers have voted us in office. We should proceed with our order of business. So, at this time, the Chair will recognize Representative Shito.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION

A resolution (H.R. No. 2) declaring the Honorable James H. Wakatsuki, Representative from the Eighteenth District, and Daniel J. Kihano, Representative from the Twentieth District, as Speaker and Vice Speaker, respectively, of the House of Representatives of the Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii was offered by Representatives Shito and Mina.

Representative Shito moved that the resolution be adopted, seconded by Representative Mina.

Representative Sutton, on a point of information, asked:

"Mr. Speaker, did we ever adopt the agenda?"

On a point of order, Representative Kunimura stated:

"We do not have a Speaker as yet elected."

Representative Sutton then asked:

"Mr. Acting Speaker, do we have an agenda that has been adopted?"

The Temporary Chairman replied:

"As far as the agenda, the order of business is the election of the Speaker of the House."

Representative Ajifu then rose on a point of information, asking:

"Mr. Speaker, I am trying to find, in my mind, as to under what rules or what policy that we take this action at this stage? I'm trying to find the way that we are operating; what guidelines are we using as to the Speaker and Vice Speaker? I recall last session there was a Speaker, a Vice Speaker and an Assistant Vice Speaker, and I would like to know as to what the procedures are? Who are we electing? And so, our original resolution was to really state that clearly as to who the officers are and who to elect. I have no objection; I will support the nominees that have been announced, Mr. Chairman, but I would like to know under what rules are we following? If there are any rules."

Representative Evans then rose on a point of information and asked:

"Does this House operate under Cushing's Manual?"

The Temporary Chairman replied:

"Fine, as far as that. At that certain point of time, the Chair, from time to time, refers to our parliamentarian within the House for establishing the Chair's out of order, in terms of ruling or likewise. Your suggestion is well taken, but, at this time, the motion on the floor is the adoption of the resolution electing the Speaker and the Vice Speaker."

Representative Evans, on a point of information, asked:

"If we are indeed, and you've not quite answered whether we are using Cushing's or not, I'd like you to give us the name of the manual that we are using today? Then, if we are using Cushing's, Cushing's says we must adopt rules before people are elected."

Representative Cobb then rose on a point of order and stated:

"Unfortunately, until such time as we adopt the rules of the House for the Ninth Legislature and thereby incorporate Cushing's, which would take priority over anything not stated in writing in this House, we are in effect operating without rules since this is a new legislature and the Eighth Legislature did not make rules binding a future legislature. Therefore, Mr. Chairman, the only rules we are in fact operating under is the ruling of the Chair, subject to the appeal on the floor of this House."

The Temporary Chairman then stated:

"Point is well taken. All right, Mr. Clerk, are we ready to proceed in the area of the motion? And, the motion before the House, that has been moved and seconded, is for the adoption of the resolution electing the Speaker and the Vice Speaker. All those in favor will say 'aye' and those voting contrary 'no!."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried and H.R. No. 2 was adopted, with Representative Sutton voting no.

The Temporary Chairman then appointed Representatives Robert D. Dods, Tony T. Kunimura, Gerald K. Machida, Ted Mina, Henry Haalilio Peters, Yoshito Takamine, Mitsuo Uechi, Jann L. Yuen and Kinau Boyd Kamalii as a Committee to escort the newly elected Speaker to the rostrum.

Escorted by the aforesaid Committee, the Speaker took the Chair and thereupon addressed the members of the House and their guests as follows:

"Governor Ariyoshi, Lieutenant Governor Doi, Chief Justice Richardson, Senator and Mrs. Fong, Reverend Akaka and other distinguished guests, my fellow colleagues, friends and fellow citizens:

On behalf of the members of the House of Representatives, I extend to all greetings and a warm welcome to the inauguration of the House of Representatives of the Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii.

I am deeply grateful to my colleagues for the honor they have bestowed upon me to serve as Speaker of this illustrious body. I have, in the past, pledged to maintain the integrity of the Speakership of this House, and I have also pledged my full support and cooperation to all. I now pledge to continue to do the same.

There is no doubt in my mind that the days and weeks ahead will be extremely hectic and trying.
We, as the lawmakers, and the public as well, must then exercise patience, understanding and cooperation in order to achieve our common objectives and goals.

One of our most immediate and urgent priorities is to find ways to promote and strengthen our economy in order to provide the jobs that are needed now and in the future. If we are to realize a strong and healthy Hawaii, employment opportunities, a stable labor force, and a useful and productive job for every citizen who desires to work are indeed essential. I am under no illusion, however, that our State government alone can dramatically reverse the present economic and unemployment trend. In an effort to stimulate job activities, we must bring together the forces that turn the wheels of our economy. Labor, management and government must jointly commit their talents and resources toward this realization.

The problem of a high rate of unemployment is not unique to our State. It is a national problem as well. Hawaii's economic well being is greatly dependent upon the health of our national economy. In spite of this fact, we can and we must explore all possible avenues of creating jobs, even if it means creating jobs only on a temporary basis.

One such avenue is the concept of job sharing which, in my opinion, needs serious consideration and analysis. This concept is not new. It has been practiced elsewhere, where one will share with another the same job during a given period. When we have a strong economy with a high rate of employment, it is quite obvious that there is no need to consider job sharing. When the reverse is true, however, the need to share jobs with fellow citizens becomes more and more meaningful.

I am of the opinion that some government jobs could be shared on a limited and contractual basis, such as our teaching jobs, and jobs carried on by those who are ready to retire from government service within a year.

Another avenue for serious consideration is the implementation of immediate and short term tax credits for private employers. Income as well as investment tax credits can be used to revitalize the economic activities in our State. However, such tax credits must be significant and meaningful. They must be systems of incentives graduated on the basis of the number of new hires for new jobs created by an employer. We must become, if necessary, a provider of cheaper money to our major employers who wish to expand their operations through investments in capital goods and facilities, and thereby creating additional jobs.

Most of us are also aware that a healthy and viable tourist industry is a "must" for the survival of our economy. To think otherwise is to be foolhardy, for what else do we have, or what else can we turn to, as an alternative source for new jobs and resources. Our tourist industry infuses approximately 1.2 billion dollars a year into our economy and creates direct employment to approximately 79,800 residents. Now let us say, for a moment, that we are able to generate an increase of 50 million dollars a year of visitor spending. This kind of spending will create a total of between 950 to 1,200 jobs in the hotel industry alone, and between 765 and 950 jobs in the food and beverage industry, while the total employment impact will be the creation of between 3,500 and 4,500 jobs in all visitor-related industries.

Reliance on our tourist industry as the major source for a stronger economy, and for more jobs, does not mean that we should pursue the growth of this industry at all costs. I am concerned over the effects of tourism on our cultural heritage, our environment, and our "aloha" spirit. This means that government, industry and our people must join hands to properly plan, direct and nurture the growth of our tourist industry. We must not only ensure a continous flow of visitors to our shores, but through appropriate public policies, we must foster and continue the friendly attitude of welcoming visitors as evidenced in such places as Bermuda, Canada and other resorts. And too, we must ensure our visitors a safe and friendly State filled with the spirit of "aloha".

We must, within our means and ability, take the necessary steps to alleviate the plight of our sugar industry, particularly as it faces the crisis of being without the protection of a National Sugar Act. This industry employs more than 9,000 workers, carries a payroll of over 85 million dollars a year and generates approximately 300 million dollars into our economy. From a national perspective, these figures may seem unimposing, but from the perspective of a small state such as ours, they assume over-riding importance in measuring the health of our economy and of our State.

In the area of transportation, we must seriously re-assess our State's immediate and long-term financial commitments. I am of the opinion that the commitment of millions of tax dollars for the construction and the operation of a fixed guideway system on Oahu should now be withheld until all possible avenues of alleviating our congested highways are explored. One such avenue would be to mandatorily begin the public schools on Oahu between the hours of 8:30 and 8:45 a.m. and mandatorily require all State and county employees on Oahu to begin their work day between the hours of 8:30 and 9:00 a.m. This would then greatly reduce peak hour traffic congestion and would allow, in my opinion, the implementation of a more flexible and useful transit system of express buses.

I believe that our State's financial commitments for a ferry system should now be re-defined on a priority basis. Do we spend dollars on a ferry system for the transportation of people, or for the transportation of commodities, or for both? I favor the commitment of our dollars to a system that would meet the agricultural objectives and goals of our neighbor islands. I realize that our sister counties desire more tourists, but I also recognize the significant role they can play as our State's food-producing islands. I therefore believe that finding ways and means of moving agricultural as well as other consumer products and commodities, efficiently and cheaply, should be given top consideration by this Legislature.

I would like to discuss at length other issues and concerns which are also of immediate urgency, but time will not allow me to do so. However, let me assure all that the health, education and welfare of our people will not be ignored. Nor will there be neglect of other issues and concerns in areas such as business, crime, the efficient management and use of our State's financial and natural resources, and the planning and growth of our State. We will not minimize the importance of these areas, and we intend to give them equal consideration. We also intend to search for new ideas, new solutions, and meaningful answers to many of our problems.

I believe that government can and must be the instrument of our people through which their aspirations, hopes and self-fulfillment can be achieved, not only for today and tomorrow, but certainly for the future.

With this in mind, let us now begin our task.

Thank you."

The Chair, at this time, appointed Representatives Richard Garcia, Mitsuo Shito, Calvin K. Y. Say, Charles T. Toguchi, Charles T. Ushijima, Clifford T. Uwaine, Hiram L. Fong, Jr., and Richard Ike Sutton as a Committee to escort the newly elected Vice Speaker to the rostrum.

The Chair then stated:

"It gives me indeed a personal honor and privilege to introduce, not only to my colleagues, but to all of you present and to the citizens and people of the State of Hawaii the Vice Speaker of the House of Representatives, Vice Speaker Daniel Kihano."

At this time, Representative Ajifu addressed the members of the House and their guests as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, Mr. Governor, Mr. Lieutenant Governor, Chief Justice, Senator and Mrs. Fong, honored guests, Mr. Speaker, my fellow House members, ladies and gentlemen:

All of the members of the 1977 Hawaii Legislature face this session with a great deal of hope. Hope that the many serious problems facing Hawaii today can be solved. The fiscal and social responsibilities of this House are great indeed. The people of Hawaii look to us to find the 'right' solutions and

take the actions necessary to insure that this State continues to prosper. The issues of this legislative session must be approached with calm wisdom and with an understanding of the needs, hopes and desires of all Hawaii's people. I hope that those issues will also be approached on a non-partisan basis and that the "across-the-aisle" bickering which has marked some of the past sessions can be avoided. To this end, I feel it is unfortunately necessary to remind the Speaker and my colleagues of the Democrat Party that all of the members of this House were elected to serve the people of the individual House districts as well as the State as a whole. Each representative is equal to the other. The individual voter who cast his ballot for a legislator is granted the right to be heard in this House through the voice of that legislator. And each legislator's voice must be heard. It is unacceptable for even one representative to be muffled on the floor of this House, and in the committees of this House, all of the people's representatives have the right to be heard equally. The people of this State cannot and will not allow one group in this House to deny those people the rights guaranteed under the Constitution. No segment of Hawaii's society should be 'ripped off' simply because of the party affiliation of their elected representatives. We Americans have prided ourselves on giving everyone a fair shake. It is the responsibility of every person sitting here to insure that no portion of Hawaii's society is denied their equal representation. By working together, this House can make an honest attempt to solve the problems facing the State. Continued denial by the majority of the rights of the minority will not help in solving these problems but, rather, will unnecessarily be an obstacle in our path.

We view the major issues facing this legislative session as crossing a broad range of the State's social and fiscal future. First of all, the question of the State's budget and future spending patterns are of high concern. The people of Hawaii bear the third highest per capita State debt of all the 50 states. This is not a reputation of which to be proud. Hawaii ranks fourth in the nation in tax burden on its people. Again, this is not something to be proud of. Fiscal responsibility, through carefully planned spending and a concern for lowering the burden of our people, must be a major goal

of this House.

- * We will not support any increase in the State's general excise tax.
- * As in the past, we call for a removal of food and drugs from the general tax base to benefit all our citizens and especially our senior citizens.
- * We demand a thorough review of all proposed land and sea transportation alternatives to insure that the benefits expected to be derived are real and not just a 'maybe'. We also must know that the cost for these can be borne by the people.

Hand in hand with the State's future spending patterns is the economic well being of the State. Programs to reduce the number of unemployed, to help those on welfare find work and to attract new business to the State are of paramount importance: To this end we propose:

- * The provision of incentives to private industry for the employment of those persons on the welfare rolls.
- * Incentives to firms to establish or expand operations in Hawaii.

In addition, we believe it is vitally important that every proposed spending program be examined in the light of that program's impact upon the economy of the State. It is not enough to embrace short term programs to give our economy a fast jolt. It is just as important to look to the future, to the long range impact of spending and to the overall effect upon the State's spiraling indebtedness. There is a tradeoff here, which for the benefit of Hawaii's future, cannot be ignored.

Another issue of importance to this legislature and to the people of Hawaii is the constitutional convention. This coming convention should be the people's constitutional convention and not just a convention of the State's politically powerful. In order to do this, it is of the utmost importance that the people have a say in developing the structure that will be the convention. That is, where the con-con will be held, how long it will be convened, how large and how many districts there will be, etc. It is our responsibility to follow the people's lead on these matters.

We already know what they want in some areas. The convention should be held at least six months before the next general election. The delegate districts should not be large, and the politically powerful should not dominate it.

Although we realize that we cannot prohibit anyone from running as a convention delegate, we believe it is best if presently elected legislators not be members of the convention. To this end, we propose that each legislator publicly and voluntarily announce his or her decision to not be a delegate to the con-con. To start the ball rolling, I here and now declare that I will not be a candidate for the constitutional convention. I urge that all members of the House do the same. The confidence of the people of Hawaii in their elected leaders will be strengthened if those leaders publicly affirm their intention that the con-con be for the people, not for the powerful. The con-con must be free from any accusations that its deliberations and decisions were politically motivated. The purpose of the con-con is to strengthen the structure of the State government and to create the mechanisms by which we approach the future.

As we approach the major issues facing the State, I believe we must apply some rather rigid rules against which to measure proposed solutions. We must look at the ways to measure the effectiveness and costs of these solutions. And, I do not mean just money costs. There are other costs as well - social, environmental and economic. These costs are just as real, and sometimes more important, than dollar figures. These figures of effectiveness and measures of cost will vary from solution to solution; nevertheless, using such a systematic problem solving approach is the only way to insure that our actions are the best possible ones.

Mr. Speaker, ours is a government based upon the principle that government serves the people and does not create a situation wherein the people serve the government. It is the aim of the Republican caucus of this House to take every step necessary to insure that this principle is not violated by this body. To the newly elected members of this House I offer a warm welcome and a challenge: show all the people that their welfare is uppermost in your minds. To the reelected members of this House

I say, use your knowledge and experience to strengthen the confidence of the people in their government. To all of the members of this House I say, let us not betray the trust placed in us by our constituents.

And, to all of Hawaii's people, I offer the following: this nation was founded and has grown on the basis of a viable two-party system. This system provides the checks and balances that are necessary to insure that policies and programs are not forced down the throats of the people. A strong, vocal watchdog is required to keep government honest in its role of doing what is best for all the people. The Republican members of this House intend to protect the welfare of this State. This is our promise.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

A resolution (H.R. No. 4) to inform the Governor and the Senate that the House of Representatives of the Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii was duly organized and ready to transact business was offered by Representatives Dennis R. Yamada and Ueoka and was read by the Clerk.

On motion by Representative Yamada, seconded by Representative Ueoka and carried, H.R. No. 4 was adopted.

The Speaker then appointed Representatives Ken Kiyabu, Jack Larsen, Ted Mina, Yoshiro Nakamura, Kathleen Stanley, Jack K. Suwa, Carl T.

Takamura, John S. Carroll and Andrew K. Poepoe as a Committee to advise the Senate that the House was duly organized and ready to transact business.

The Speaker then appointed Representatives Minoru Inaba, Daniel J. Kihano, Oliver Lunasco, Norman Mizuguchi, Mitsuo Uechi and Ralph K. Ajifu as a Committee to advise the Governor that the House was duly organized and ready to transact business.

At 11:50 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12: 01 o'clock p.m.

The Chair then stated:

"The Chair, at this time, would like to thank Mr. Charles Davis for his fine renditions. We certainly appreciate his musical talents."

A concurrent resolution (H.C.R. No. 1) requesting the Governor to address the Legislature assembled in joint session was offered by Representatives Jann L. Yuen and Kamalii.

On motion by Representative Yuen, seconded by Representative Kamalii and carried, H.C.R. No. 1 was adopted.

At 12:02 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:03 o'clock p.m.

At this time, Representative Kamalii rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to move that the resolution I offered be deferred until tomorrow's calendar."

Representative Ajifu seconded the motion.

The Chair, noting that there were no objections, so ordered.

The Speaker then appointed Representatives Byron W. Baker, Robert D. Dods, Lisa Naito, Charles T. Ushijima and Donna R. Ikeda to escort Mr. John Topolinski to the rostrum.

Mr. Topolinski thereupon offered the benediction.

The Chair then said:

"The Chair requests that immediately after the adjournment that we all join Ms. Myra English in singing our Hawaii Ponoi."

ADJOURNMENT

At 12:10 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative Yuen, seconded by Representative Kamalii and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned to 11:00 o'clock a.m. tomorrow, Thursday, January 20, 1977.

SECOND DAY

Thursday, January 20, 1977

The House of Representatives of the Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1977, convened at 11:00 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Paul Peachey of the Metropolitan Community Church, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Kiyabu, Mina and Mizuguchi, who were excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the First Day.

On motion by Representative Yuen, seconded by Representative Kamalii and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the First Day was approved.

At 5:30 o'clock p.m., on request by Representative Kunimura, the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 5:31 o'clock p.m.

The Chair then stated:

"In the absence of any House Rules giving any standing committee formal status, the Chair, at this time, appoints all of those members to these various committees and to proceed with the hearings. All of you know what committees you have been appointed to and that applies to the minority party."

ADJOURNMENT

At 5:32 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative Yuen, seconded by Representative Kamalii and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned to 11:00 o'clock a.m. tomorrow, Friday, January 21, 1977.

THIRD DAY

Friday, January 21, 1977

The House of Representatives of the Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1977, convened at 11:00 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 5 to 7) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

A resolution (H.R. No. 5) providing Rules for the House of Representatives was offered by Representatives Garcia and K. Yamada.

Representative Garcia moved for the adoption of the resolution, seconded by Representative K. Yamada.

At this time, Representative Abercrombie,

on a point of order, asked:

"Is there an actual resolution? If so, I don't have a copy in front of me. $^{\shortparallel}$

At 11:43 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 11:45 o'clock a.m., Representative Ajifu rose and asked:

"Mr. Speaker, just for the records, a point of information. On page 7, Standing Committee Rule 11.2., there was a change made from proportional representation to proportional basis. Is there a difference between these two words? Is there a substantive change?"

The Chair replied:

"Representative Ajifu, there was no change made. This is the original House Rules to be adopted by this Legislature. The representation basis is synonymous to proportional representation as submitted by your leadership assigning the members of your party to committee assignments."

Representative Ajifu then continued, stating:

"I would also like to say a few words in regards to another part of the Rules. This is Rule 11.9. on page 13. I would like to just ask as to the question; you have inserted a short phrase there 'or announced on the House floor during the session day'. I understand that you do have the right to waive. You have informed us that this is just a housekeeping action, and, to make it legal, what the House has been doing at the end of the session. We have been going on with this practice anyway. There is a danger in it, Mr. Speaker, and I would like to remind the members of this House that we have committed ourselves to be more open and that I hope that there will not be any abuse in this section as the Rules are adopted."

The Chair then replied: "There is no intent to abuse the Rules. This is merely to conform the practice that we have been following - that the publication notice, as expressed in the House Rules, will be followed."

Representative Narvaes then rose on a point of information and asked:

"On this same point, looking at proportional basis versus proportional representation, what is the denominator we are presently using?"

The Chair replied:

"The denominator arrives to the point where your representation is reflected by the submission of your leadership assigning your members to the various committees."

Representative Narvaes then asked:

"Is the denominator 41 or is the denominator 51?"

The Chair answered:

"Fifty-one."

We will continue to maintain this principle and you can be assured that we will cooperate with all groups of people in the State of Hawaii to develop meaningful legislation for the State of Hawaii. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair then stated:

"If there is no objection, the Chair will rule that the pending resolution be withdrawn at this time."

The House of Representatives of the Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1976, convened at 10:45 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Kim On Chong, Chaplain (Retired) of the Mid-Pacific Institute, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representative Lunasco, who was excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Fourth Day.

On motion by Representative Yuen, seconded by Representative Kamalii and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Fourth Day was approved.

SENATE COMMUNICATION

A communication from the Senate (Sen. Com. No. 2) transmitting Senate Concurrent Resolution No.1 commending the Indiana Legislature for becoming the thirty-fifth state to ratify the equal rights amendment which was adopted by the Senate on January 24, 1977, was read by the Clerk and was placed on file.

On motion by Representative Stanley, seconded by Representative K. Yamada and carried, S.C.R. No. 1 was adopted.

Representative Kunimura introduced the Honorable Eduardo Malapit, Mayor of Kauai, and Mr. James Kurita, Director of Economic Development on Kauai.

At 10:51 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 11:07 o'clock a.m., the House of Representatives met in joint session with the Senate, pursuant to House Concurrent Resolution No. 1, to receive the Governor's message.

The Chair, at this time, introduced the following to the members of the joint session: the First Lady of Hawaii, Mrs. George R. Ariyoshi, who was presented with a white carnation lei by Representative Peters on behalf of the Senate and the House of Representatives; Lieutenant Governor Nelson K. Doi; and Chief Justice William S. Richardson.

The Chair then appointed Senators Kawasaki, Ching, Taira, Anderson and Yee and Representatives Kihano, Yuen, Kondo, Ajifu and Stanley, as a Committee, to escort the Honorable George R. Ariyoshi, Governor of the State of Hawaii, to the rostrum.

Representative Kathleen Stanley presented Governor Ariyoshi with a red carnation lei on behalf of the Senate and the House of Representa-

At this time, the Speaker introduced to the members of the Ninth Legislature the Honorable George R. Ariyoshi:

"Members, ladies and gentlemen, it is indeed my honor and privilege to introduce to all of you, our Governor, the Honorable George R. Ariyoshi."

The following is the address of Governor George R. Ariyoshi:

"While I was waiting for the session to convene here this morning, I was escorted to the office of the Clerk where I saw some of the old photographs going back to the Second Legislature of the State of Hawaii; I had a chance to reminisce a little bit. And as I stand here before you this morning, looking out, I must confess that many of you have changed considerably over the years.

Mr. Speaker, Mr. President, Mr. Chief Justice, Mr. Lieutenant Governor, members of the State Legislature, very distinguished ladies and gentlemen and my fellow Hawaiians:

I am indeed very happy to be here this morning to discuss the state of our State and to give my assessment of where we are now and where we are going in this new year - a year that although only twenty-five days old has seen a new national administration come to office in Washington carrying hope and promise for our nation.

I have just returned from the inauguration of Jimmy Carter as our 39th President, full of hope and expectation for the months that lie ahead.

Twelve months ago, I stood before you in this chamber and enumerated some of our hopes and our dreams for Hawaii. At the same time, I offered a catalogue of some of our problems and our shortcomings.

I am glad to report today that a significant number of our hopes and our dreams are coming to pass. I am not happy to report that some of our problems and our shortcomings remain, in some cases aggravated since we last met.

By almost unanimous agreement, our number one problem area as we begin 1977 is the economy, our heartbreakingly high unemployment rate and the lack of tax revenues to allow us to fund all the programs that you and I would like to see come to fruition.

Our economy was our number one problem a year ago, and despite extensive and persistent efforts, I must candidly acknowledge we have made precious little headway, at least statistically.

Our efforts to maintain and stimulate the economy in the past year have been many and varied.

They range from SCET and CETA programs to tourism promotion; from major capital improvement projects to new farmer loans; from marine research to low-interest loans and subsidies to private employers who hire unemployed and underemployed individuals; from unemployment insurance to a product promotion program; from providing support to the local military commands in their pursuit of a more realistic construction budget to water development programs.

In other words, we have been all over the lot in guiding, prodding and shaping our economy. State bond issuances have increased markedly over previous years and represent a substantial investment in our economy. By way of illustration, bond issuances in 1975-76 were \$225 million, compared to \$125 million the year before and \$110 million the year before that. In two years, we have doubled the annual figure.

CIP spending correspondingly has been on the rise as we attempt to stimulate a construction industry that has dragged our economy deeper and deeper into unemployment.

We intend to continue borrowing money on a prudent basis to put into construction projects to create jobs.

But as the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House observed here last week, government cannot do it all.

As President Ushijima said, 'The government alone cannot become a major hiring hall.' And Speaker Wakatsuki noted, 'I am under no illusion that our State Government alone can dramatically reverse the present economic and unemployment trend.'

I agree with both the President and the Speaker. In our form of society, the ultimate and enduring solutions must be found in the private sector, and it is up to us to give direction, to give support, and at times, to give guidance in this area.

Government and private business must work together for the common good. In the past, particularly in times of stress, I feel there has been too little communication between these two basic elements of our society. With that deficiency in mind, I convened last September the Hawaii State Conference on Employment.

The conclusions reached at this conference were neither startling nor unexpected, but they did give a thorough insight into some of our problems.

One of the recommendations coming from the conference was that government must explore methods of improving the coordination of job placement services and must encourage the listing of all job openings with the State Employment Service.

I am disturbed, for instance, that during a period of high unemployment, many job vacancies in the private sector in our State are not listed with the State agency which is designed to get employers and the employees together.

I am disturbed, too, just as many of you must be, when I read stories that the Federal Government has to bring in auto mechanics from a foreign country to work in a State with our unemployment rate. I am convinced that in this case, there are extenuating circumstances, but that cannot make those in the unemployment lines feel any better.

I feel that it is absolutely essential that Hawaii's jobs be reserved for Hawaii's residents and I intend to address myself to this area in the months to come.

Toward that end, I am going to ask for help from our leading business establishments and labor unions in the very near future. I might add that the offer to assist the State came from management and labor representatives during meetings with them at which the plight of the construction industry was being discussed.

I am also very confident that you members of the Legislature, in this session, will address yourselves creatively and effectively to this problem. We all know there are no easy solutions. But working together, you and I, and with the added dimensions of business and labor, we will bring to bear all our forces to seek solutions and answers.

Another area of very, very deep concern to us all is the crisis in the sugar industry.

With the death of the Sugar Act in Congress in 1974, forces were set in motion that sent prices on a dizzy roller coaster ride, first to the heights and then down to the depths.

In 1974, prices soared outlandishly and unrealistically in grocery stores around the country. Our sugar producers were reaping profits that they themselves admitted were excessive and that they knew could not last. They didn't for long.

Suddenly, as foreign sugar entered the market because of the absence

of effective quota restraints, the prices began to drop, plunging in less than 24 months from \$1,200 a ton to \$180 a ton, which was far below production costs.

Obviously, no industry, particularly one that has to make growing commitments several years in advance of harvest, can long endure such fluctuations and such depressed prices.

Immediate action is needed and I am confident that help is on the way.

We have testified before the U. S. International Trade Commission, and we have had supportive resolutions adopted by the Governors' Conference, by State Agriculture Directors' Conference, and by the American Farm Bureau.

We have a new Carter Adminstration sympathetic to our plight, and a new Secretary of Agriculture who, in a recent meeting in Washington, expressed strong concern for our sugar industry.

Another concern that I have is the unjustifiably negative image Hawaii has in certain areas of the investment market.

In a recent article in Forbes Magazine, Hawaii was rated as the poorest State - number 50 out of 50 - in which to invest.

Many of us feel that the article was unfair and untrue in certain respects, resulting in some erroneous conclusions. But however we feel, the article, I fear, does represent a widespread misunderstanding.

We need to take countermeasures.

We need to tell the story of Hawaii, and tell it more effectively, and we need to demonstrate in deeds, as well as words, that Hawaii is in truth an attractive investment market.

I am calling upon the Legislature, and upon our business and labor communities again to join me in this effort. It is important for the future of this State.

It comes as no secret, that we do not have all the money that we need to fund all the programs that we want.

Some have suggested that we raise taxes, or impose new taxes,

to alleviate our financial problems.

I am definitely opposed to that except in the area of transportation.

I feel that our citizens already are heavily enough burdened and should not be called upon to provide more money.

This financial crunch is not just the Governor's problem or the Legislature's problem. It is everyone's problem.

That means, therefore, that it is incumbent upon all of us to make the best possible use of the monies that we do have available, to further efficiency, and to establish priorities on programs. I ask for the cooperation and the understanding of everyone, from those of you in the Legislature, to the members of our public employment unions, to the public at large. I want to stress the public at large because no matter what we attempt to do, it is the demand for services by the public that results in the mushrooming of and the growing obligations of government.

I would like to also take a minute to explain what might appear to be a certain contradiction in my fiscal policies.

On the one hand, we are being very hard-nosed on operating expenses, making every division of government and every agency justify their expenditures.

On the other hand, we are borrowing substantial sums of money for capital improvements in this State.

Actually, there is no contradiction. The money we spend on day-to-day operations is for direct and immediate benefits for our present day citizens. It is, therefore, appropriate that only revenues that are currently available be expended for operating purposes. Capital improvement projects, on the other hand, will be available for the benefit of present and future citizens. Thus, there is basis to prudently borrow funds to finance capital projects with the repayment cost being absorbed by present and future beneficiaries.

We are a young State and as such have a need for many new facilities. If we can provide these facilities now, we are not only creating needed jobs but also constructing needed facilities at a much lower cost.

That, to me, is a desirable course

to pursue and I plan to continue this fiscal policy in 1977.

This year, our society faces, as possibly never before, basic and fundamental challenges to established land uses and control, ranging in scope and diversity from Waiahole-Waikane Valley, to Kahala to Kilauea.

The issues are complex, the answers will not come easily, and the decisions that are made will have a profound impact on this State for years to come. We must try and do everything possible to find the solutions to these problems.

The vexing leasehold problem needs to be continually reviewed and evaluated within the framework of reasonable balancing of equities of both sides.

Long and expensive litigation does not seem to be the answer. By the recent enactment of leasehold reform legislation, we seem to be coming to a reasonable consensus of accommodation in resolving this problem by good faith negotiation. This Administration will assist with persuasion and cooperation, and the force of law, if necessary, to effectuate conversion from leasehold to fee ownership.

To this point, I have dwelled on some of our problems and some of our inadequacies. We have our share of them. But at the same time, since I last reported to you, our State Government has had many good days, moving ahead impressively on a broad front.

I will not dwell on the accomplishments here today, but reports being submitted to you by my cabinet officers will give a more detailed look at the progress we have made.

These include the acquisition of irreplaceable acres of lands for parks and improvements to others, cheaper telecommunication rates, a full-time PUC, welfare reform, a successful campaign for the retention of the Federal Cost of Living Allowance for a majority of Federal workers in Hawaii, a Hawaiian Home Lands building program, an improved tsunami warning system, significant improvements in our schools, establishment of an affirmative action office, and many, many more.

And now, just briefly, I would like to share with you still another side of the equation - our hopes,

our plans and, in some cases, our dreams for this beautiful land of ours.

For the first time last year, Hawaii's visitor total exceeded three million persons. This is a significant milestone for our economy.

Recent studies and reports, including the findings of my Economic Advisory Task Force, have indicated that the careful expansion of the tourist industry promises the greatest potential for more employment and economic stability. If tourism continues to flourish, there will be a commensurate increase in related benefits to our community.

Therefore, I cannot emphasize too strongly the importance of this industry to our State and the need to protect it from any damaging influences.

In another area, the diversification of our economy, including agriculture, occupies a prime priority with me. We need to diversify in many areas but agriculture offers our most immediate hope.

I want to see us develop a diversification of agriculture that in years to come will enable our State not only to be more self-sufficient in many of the farm products we now import but also to develop export potential in a number of commodities. As I met, on my recent appearance in Washington, with some of my colleagues from the other states, and as they talked to me about the terrible weather problems that they were facing this year, crops being eliminated, it brought to me the concern that we ought to have in Hawaii of trying to produce more and more of the things that we consume and to export more of the things that we can produce.

No one wants or expects diversified agriculture to replace the two main agricultural pursuits of our State - sugar and pineapple. It is not an either/or situation, but rather in addition to. We have only begun to contemplate our potential in diversified agriculture, let alone realize it.

I also foresee a tremendous economic future in Hawaii's aquaculture industry, where we will grow prawns and clams and oysters much as today's farmers raise pigs and cattle, and market them throughout the world.

.During my first two years in office,

I have put great emphasis on the development in Hawaii of alternate energy resources - renewable energy resources.

Last spring, a geothermal well was drilled in the Puna district of the Big Island, reaching a depth of more than 6,000 feet. It turned out to be one of the hottest in the United States, and if present indications hold up, this one well will be capable of producing 10 per cent of the Big Island's electrical needs - a startling figure and an exciting prospect for all our islands where scientists feel that geothermal potential exists.

Imagine for a moment what abundant and cheap power would mean to these islands. On the Big Island, for instance, there are miles and miles of seaside lava lands, unfit for any kind of agriculture. But with cheap power, ponds could be scooped out, rich water from the sea could be pumped in, and an aquaculture industry could flourish where now there is only jagged lava.

With our abundant sunshine and reliable tradewinds, Hawaii offers great potential in solar and wind energy as well. I truly feel that Hawaii can take the lead among the States in striving for renewable energy resources.

Movie and television shows for national showing continue to increase with resulting exposure for Hawaii and a boost for our economy.

Forestry offers hope for a new industry within our State and my Administration is pursuing these possibilities.

I envision an International Trade Center in Hawaii where goods from the world would be offered for sale to our residents and visitors, but more importantly where our State becomes the logistic, information, finance and contact point for this trade.

I believe also that the time has come for us to consider the feasibility of Major League sports teams occupying our Major League sports stadium. To that end, I am going to name a Governor's Committee on Major Leagues to consider its feasibility and to actively pursue such franchises as may be deemed desirable. The competition will be sharp but I am convinced that we offer an unbeatable

combination of climate, glamour and facilities.

There are many more plans and dreams for Hawaii. I have enumerated just a few.

We have looked at our problems, we have looked at our dreams, now let me focus on some of the legislation which I will be proposing. Although I am submitting for your consideration a wide-ranging portfolio of legislation, my presentation to you today will be very brief. You will be hearing more from us as the session continues.

As you are already aware, we will propose legislation this session to provide limited protection to public investors in industrial loan companies.

The legislation will call for an industry-financed insurance program, guaranteeing individual deposits up to \$10,000.

We feel that this legislation is vital to preserve the integrity, vitality and public confidence in a financial industry in which the public has invested \$450 million, or about 13 per cent of the total public savings in all financial institutions in this State.

A special message on this proposal will accompany the legislation.

We have recently completed a statewide housing study whose objectives were to address housing problems, trends, and future housing needs.

Not surprisingly, the study finds that adequate and affordable housing continues to be out of reach for too many of our people - particularly the young and the old.

However, it also indicates that the public sector objectives, identified six years ago in a similar study, have been met and surpassed.

The study suggests a continuing commitment to and improvements on our housing delivery system. It also recommends specific program activities that might be implemented. We are prepared to make several proposals to you shortly in this regard.

In the area of Hawaiian Home Lands, we are going to offer you legislation that will overhaul the present Act, providing for a consolidation of funds and accounts for the Department,

increasing the allowable interest rates on the loan fund, and lowering the percentage of Hawaiian blood needed for successors and transferees of Homestead land from 50 per cent to 25 per cent.

We will submit a proposal to lower the development costs of agricultural park projects by exempting them from existing zoning and subdivision standards. This proposal provides for county input and approval in order that a project will have the concurrence of both the State and the County.

We are going to submit 'sunset' legislation that will call for the periodic in-depth review of numerous licensing laws now on the books. It will also provide for the automatic repeal of licensing laws which cannot be satisfactorily justified.

We are going to offer an anti-litter bill in this session which I believe, if enacted, will be a turning point in our fight against the despoilment of our environment.

I am convinced that the legislation will provide us with the vehicle for a cleaner Hawaii. But, at the same time, we need to launch a massive anti-litter educational campaign. Laws can go only so far in reducing litter. We must also instill a 'Clean Hawaii' ethic among our people and our visitors, and make it an anti-social act, as well as an unlawful one, to litter.

Another important piece of legislation we are sending to you is a proposal to authorize the implementation of a Hawaii Coastal Zone Management program.

Citizen committees from all the islands, as well as Federal, State, and County agency representatives, have worked diligently during the past year and a half to explore coastal resources, problems, and issues; they have studied alternative arrangements for better management, policies to protect and wisely use coastal resources, and the necessary legal authorizations to achieve coastal zone management objectives. I am proposing that the legal boundaries as designated in the legislation be limited and should not encompass the entire State.

The legislation is being sent to you for action this session prior to submitting it to the U.S. Secretary of Commerce for approval. Such approval will make Hawaii eligible for Federal grants to implement this important

program.

There are several plans and studies that we either will submit to you this session or give you progress reports on.

As you may recall, we have been preparing a regional plan for Windward Oahu during the past year. The report will be completed shortly and will contain policy recommendations to guide urban and rural settlement patterns for the Windward side.

The study also explores preliminary options for State regional planning policies and should serve as a prototype document for other areas throughout the State. I want to add here that our efforts in the preparation of this plan is our desire to get a preferred future on the Windward area. The Windward coast happens to be the last relatively undeveloped coast on this Island. We are beginning to feel that we ought to get the kind of Windward coast that we prefer rather than a coast that is going to be developed valley by valley because we didn't take the time to make the plans for the entire Windward area. Hence, the development of this policy.

We have submitted to you a progress report on the Hawaii State Plan. As you know, the enabling legislation calls for the final product to be submitted to you in 1978.

The report contains draft goals, objectives and policy statements which address statewide concerns and more specifically, the needs and aspirations of our people. We are looking forward to working with you in refining the plan which, once adopted, will serve as the primary policy document for this State.

The Department of Planning and Economic Development is in the process of developing a 10-year master plan for the growth of the tourist industry in Hawaii. A progress report will be submitted to you shortly and the final product will be ready for presentation during the 1978 session.

I have previously mentioned the importance of aquaculture and you will receive an interim report which will bring you up to date on potential sites, on permit procedures and the kinds of support facilities needed to make this economic potential a reality. I want to add that I am

extremely pleased with some of the work that I see coming out of the Legislature in this area.

The time I spent in Washington last week convinced me more than ever that our State Government needs to build an even closer working relationship with the Federal Government and with our Congressional delegation.

With this in mind, I am very seriously considering filling the position of Federal Coordinator for this State. The Coordinator, if filled, would be headquartered in Washington and would be responsible for keeping a close watch on programs affecting Hawaii.

In these days of tight finances, we must make sure that we receive all of the benefits that we are entitled to in the way of Federal funding for construction projects and for other programs of benefit to our citizens.

This has been a quick run through of some of the legislation and materials that we plan to submit to you this session. It by no means is complete. As I said, you will be hearing many more details of our legislative package as the session continues.

And now, I would like to discuss with you what I consider to be Hawaii's single most important issue - our future. To my thinking, there is no subject of more transcending importance.

I realize that I am not unique in expressing my concern about our future. Many of our best thinkers have addressed themselves to it in a variety of ways in recent years. Thousands of words have been written about it, hundreds of meetings have been held on it, and many studies have been made

The conclusions have been many and varied, but they can be distilled into one principal concern: If we are not careful, over-population, over-building and over-development will destroy the Hawaii that we know.

Until now, our concern for the future of these Islands has been expressed mostly in words.

From this day forward, the concern of my Administration is going to be expressed in action, involving you members of this Legislature and continuing into the Congress of the United States and undoubtedly into the courts of this nation.

The problem of excessive population seems to be central to nearly every problem in our State.

Too many people means too few jobs and too much competition for them; too many people means too little land for agriculture and parks and scenic vistas; too many people means too much crime and too much erosion of possibly our single most important commodity, the Aloha Spirit; too many people means too much pressure on all our governmental and private institutions.

In short, too many people can spell disaster for this State.

Hawaii is a national treasure, but it is a very fragile treasure, one which can be easily destroyed by over-population and excessive demands on its resources.

There is no reason why we must endure what an uncontrolled and an unregulated future holds for us. We must shape our own future, not have it thrust upon us by forces over which we have little or no control.

I am of the belief that we truly can and must be the masters of our own destiny, rather than the victims.

What I am going to propose here today may sound radical to some, and unworkable to others. But I am convinced that we need bold and innovative ideas and actions now if we are to achieve what we must achieve.

The course I am charting for this Administration and this State is not an easy one. It will require years of effort. At times the programs I am proposing will put this State in direct confrontation with the present laws of this land and possibly even the Constitution of the United States.

But I have every confidence of eventual success. I am ready this day to join the fight, with whatever forces may oppose us, for the survival of our Hawaii.

I am sure that our program will become a landmark effort amongst the States, that it will attract national attention, and I hope will obtain the support of other States facing similar problems.

I have not embarked on this program lightly or with the expectation that it will be easy. There will be long and protracted legal challenges. There will be long and sometimes discouraging works in the Congress. Without question we will receive setbacks along the way.

But succeed we will. Succeed

For years now, we have been standing helplessly on the sidelines whenever the question of in-migration from the rest of the United States or immigration from the rest of the world has been mentioned.

We are going to stand on the sidelines no longer. At least $I^{\prime}m$ not.

I intend to propose:

- 1. Federal legislation that will achieve a more equitable distribution of immigrants amongst our States.
- 2. Federal assistance programs for those States with a disproportionate number of immigrants in relationship to total population.
- 3. A Constitutional amendment permitting States to establish residency requirements for new arrivals for publicly supported programs such as welfare assistance, public employment, housing and many more.

I want to emphasize that I am not trying to separate families, and I am not trying to shut out all immigration to Hawaii.

It has been immigration, the blending together of people of various ethnic backgrounds and cultures, that has set Hawaii apart from all the other States and made it a beacon for the world in areas of human dignity, opportunity and justice.

We must continue our immigration - whether it be from the mainland or foreign countries - because it has been and continues to be our life blood and our source of uniqueness. But at the same time we must be given the tools to manage our future and shape it for the benefit of our present residents.

I would hope some of our sister states such as California, New York and Florida which attract a large number of migrants would join us in this effort. I feel that other steps can and must be taken with respect to our needs.

We need to discourage the continued concentration of population on Oahu by providing the right kinds of housing, jobs and economy for our Neighbor Islanders and their offsprings. Unless I be misunderstood here, I want to reiterate that I'm not talking about lock, stock and barrel moving large numbers of people from Oahu to the Neighbor Islands. What I am talking about is the opportunity for a person who grows up on the Neighbor Islands to begin to feel that they have a right and they have a chance to live on the Neighbor Islands. It hurts me very much when I hear a young person saying that they are moving to Hawaii, or have moved to Oahu, not because they wanted to but because they felt there were no job opportunities on each of the Neighbor Islands. This is what we are talking about when we speak of the equal opportunities that we now have for education, health services, social services, and we ought to have for employment opportunities also.

We must direct and encourage compact urban growth patterns to preserve existing open space, conservation areas and agricultural lands for the future.

None of what I have just said should be construed to mean that this Administration is anti-growth or that we intend to put clamps on economic expansion that will have a chilling effect on our economy.

I feel the result of what I am proposing here today will have just the opposite effect.

If we truly become masters of our future, as regards population control, population and density regulation, and a slowdown in the draining away of our public assistance money, I feel we will have created a climate in this State that will attract expansion capital and cause businesses to move ahead with far greater confidence in the future than they now have.

I fully realize that our economy cannot stagnate as a result of the policies I have outlined today. I fully realize, too, that there is a thin line to be walked between selective growth and no growth. Selective growth is essential. No growth is intolerable.

I have to believe that a well-run State, on top of its future and in control of its destiny, in an infinitely more attractive investment market than one which is buffeted about by economic and social forces over which it has no control.

If we have no say over who comes here and in what numbers, we might as well abandon any thoughts of a Hawaiian tomorrow. Of course, Hawaii will continue to exist, and will still be called Hawaii, but it will have ceased to be the Hawaii that we know.

So it is imperative that we move now, boldly and decisively along the course that I have outlined.

I am convinced it is not yet too late.
But I am convinced also that we cannot tarry, we cannot allow ourselves to be bogged down in endless discussions leading nowhere. We must begin now the admittedly long struggle to become masters of our own destiny.

I do not promise early or easy success. But I do promise that we will devote great energy and total dedication to the program that I have spelled out today. I feel that we have no other choice.

I want our people to speak to us on this very vital issue. I think our people need to become involved in decisions that will affect them so profoundly in the future.

And certainly I need your help and your wise counsel. I think we share a common dream for Hawaii, a dream of programmed expansion and a better life for all.

To do this, we must be masters of our fate. Then, we can forge ahead, with the confidence of success that is so essential to achieving the dream all of us have for our beloved Hawaii.

This, then, brings us to the end of this report on the state of the State, the third that I have delivered to this Legislature.

Despite our problems, some of them very vexing, some very frustrating, some very heartbreaking, we - you and I - have compiled an enviable record.

We have moved this State forward on the guidelines of the goodness of man and of opportunities and justice for all. We have made many decisions, most of them right, I feel, but some of them wrong. We have not eliminated all of our problems and probably never will. There always will be problems to tax our courage and our determination to move this State forward along prudent paths, to reject the simple and the expedient solutions, in favor of what will be best for our people in the years to come.

We have come so far, my friends, in such a short time that sometimes we lose sight of our progress and tend too much to dwell on our problems. Problems we have. Of that there can be no doubt.

But none of them are unsolvable. Working together, we will arrive at the solutions. Of that, I have no doubt.

The first two years of this Administration have been a time of planning and programming, laying the foundation for a new structure.

We have a solid structure abuilding, and I anticipate and predict considerable progress in many areas as we start 1977.

I am deeply appreciative of your help, your guidance and your cooperation in the past two years. I look forward to working with you in the years to come as we move rapidly, but with sure steps, toward a better Hawaii.

Aloha and Mahalo."

President Ushijima then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Mr. Governor, for your fine message. Admittedly, the problems facing Hawaii are many, grave, varied and very complex. They can be solved only by working together - the executive and the legislative branches. You have offered the cooperation of the executive branch and we offer the cooperation from the legislative branch to solve all of these problems for a better Hawaii.

Again, thank you, Mr. Governor."

At 11:54 o'clock a.m., the joint session with the Senate adjourned and the House stood in recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

I think it is very important that when we adopt this resolution, and the one we just adopted, that we know, that we fully understand in our hearts, that these two men came not from Hawaii - one from Australia, I believe, and the other from California - to come and save us and help us save ourselves.

Because, there are a few of us who have gone through these periods of semi-feudalistic existence, I would like for the younger generation of Hawaii, through our educational system, to be taught the history of Hawaii - what it was, what it is, and what we hope to see in Hawaii and continue to see. Because if it wasn't for Harry Bridges and Louis Goldblatt, and many others, some of them already passed to the happy beyond, that many of us would not be here today and many of our children and our friend's children wouldn't be at the University of Hawaii.

I would like, Mr. Speaker, again, to request that this resolution be adopted this morning with a rising vote."

Representative Katsuya Yamada then rose and stated:

"I suppose among all of us here today, that perhaps I would consider myself to be the greatest beneficiary of what these two men have done; having been brought up in an era when there was a tremendous labor struggle among the plantation workers and management; and also having come from a plantation - having been raised in a plantation out in the sugar cane fields.

Despite the manner in which we vote here today, I'm in full concurrence with Representative Kunimura. But, I wanted this House to know that regardless of how we voted, as long as we vote from the heart - at least I'll be voting from my heart - that's the thing that counts.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Sutton, upon being recognized, stated:

"I had the privilege of signing contracts, representing the employers, with both these gentlemen, and I said 'no' to both of them. They were really more polite to me than this body sometimes."

The Chair then stated:

"Time changes, depending on the circumstances."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried and H.R. No. 186 was adopted by a rising vote.

The following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 190 and 191) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

A resolution (H.R. No. 190) congratulating Dr. Mary Bitterman upon being named an outstanding young person was jointly offered by Representatives Say, Ajifu, Blair, Caldito, Cayetano, Cobb, Dods, Evans, Fong, Ikeda, Kamalii, Kiyabu, Kondo, Kunimura, Larsen, Medeiros, Mina, Mizuguchi, Morioka, Naito, Peters, Poepoe, Segawa, Sutton, Suwa, Takamine, Takamura, Toguchi, Uechi, Ueoka, Ushijima, D. Yamada and Yuen.

On motion by Representative Say, seconded by Representative Morioka and carried, H.R. No. 190 was adopted.

At this time, Representative Say introduced the honoree, Dr. Mary Bitterman, to the members of the House, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, on behalf of Represen-

tative Morioka and myself, I would like to extend our support and our best wishes to Mary in her candidacy for the 1976 Outstanding Women of America award. The success and growth of the Hawaii Public Broadcasting Authority, to me, is a positive reflection of what each of the House members and ourselves have done to further the communication between all islands--from the island of Kauai and all the way to Hawaii. Not only is Mary's commitment to education, public broadcasting and community service, but her sensitivity to the character and diversity of the interests of Hawaii has made her, what I feel, as one of the outstanding young women in Hawaii.

Mary, congratulations and the very best wishes from the House members. Thank you."

A certified copy of the resolution was then presented to Dr. Bitterman by Representative Say and Representative Morioka presented her with a pikake lei.

At 11:41 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair, for the purpose of meeting the honoree.

Upon reconvening at 11:50 o'clock a.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives Aki, Blair, Cobb, Kawakami and Machida.

A resolution (H.R. No. 191) congratulating Ann Suetsugu on winning the Third Annual Executives' Secretaries, Incorporated Award at Pearl City High School and extending best wishes to her in the upcoming statewide competition was jointly offered by Representatives Mizuguchi, Ajifu, Aki, Campbell, Cayetano, Inaba, Kihano, Kiyabu, Kondo, Kunimura, Medeiros, Mina, Morioka, Narvaes, Segawa, Stanley, Sutton, Uwaine and Yuen.

On motion by Representative Mizuguchi, seconded by Representative Cayetano and carried, H.R. No. 191 was adopted.

By unanimous consent, the following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 192 to 199) and concurrent resolution (H.C.R. No. 12) were referred to the Committee on Legislative Management and further action was deferred until Monday, January 31, 1977:

A resolution (H.R. No. 194) requesting the Committee on Higher Education to review the use of recent appropriations made to the College of Business Administration of the University of Hawaii and the impact of such use upon student admissions, class enrollments, and faculty resources utilization at the College of Business Administration was offered by Representative Ushijima.

A resolution (H.R. No. 195) requesting a review of all provisions of the Hawaii Revised Statutes relating to counties was jointly offered by Representatives Garcia and K. Yamada.

A resolution (H.R. No. 196) requesting congressional action was jointly offered by Representatives Blair, Aki, Garcia, Inaba, Kawakami, Kihano, Kiyabu, Suwa and Uechi.

A resolution (H.R. No. 199) requesting a study on extending the school day was jointly offered by Representatives Takamine, Blair, Caldito, Dods, Inaba, Kiyabu, Lunasco, Machida, Mina, Mizuguchi, Morioka, Peters, Segawa, Suwa, Takamura, Uechi, Ueoka, Ushijima, D. Yamada and K. Yamada.

A concurrent resolution (H.C.R.

No. 12) requesting congressional action was jointly offered by Representatives Blair, Aki, Garcia, Inaba, Kawakami, Kihano, Kiyabu, Suwa and Uechi.

THIRD READING

H.B. No. 3, HD 1:

Representative Suwa moved that H.B. No. 3, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Peters.

Representative Narvaes then rose, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to call your attention to the proposed budget of the House of Representatives. I would like to speak against the bill."

Directed by the Chair to "proceed", Representative Narvaes remarked:

"This is a difficult budget year. In the weeks to come, we will be making some very difficult budget decisions for our people. Our people want us to reduce the cost of government and to do this, we should first start at home. Much of the State is being asked to tighten its budget and we, as elected officials of our constituents, should be the leaders in this attempt. I ask you, how much more are necessary expenses will this proposal in reality allow? Do we really need an increase of \$94,000 for the operations of this honorable body?

As a closing statement, one of the reasons why a peanut farmer named Jimmy Carter was elected to the presidency was because he told the people of our great nation that he would reduce much of the excess expenses in Washington.

Honorable friends in our House, we should do the same. Therefore, honorable friends, I am voting no."

Representative Abercrombie then rose, stating:

"I am rising to speak in favor of the bill."

Directed by the Chair to "proceed", Representative Abercrombie stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I hadn't intended to make these particular remarks but Representative Narvaes has brought a point forward that I think needs to be addressed before I make the remarks that I had originally intended to do .

It may be that some of us think that when it comes to running the Legislature as such that this money represents an untoward sum. I have discovered in the first two years that I have been in this body that this is not the case. This budget does not represent a budget which has a lot of fat in it. On the contrary, I think it is too lean and as my friends know in the majority, and I have expressed this well to my friends in the minority party, that I think that the budget should be larger. I think that the \$94,000, as a matter of fact, that the Finance Committee has put forward for us perhaps is not quite enough because I would like to see that we have the opportunity to have full time staffing and perhaps the \$94,000 will allow us to have sufficient negotiating room with one another to do just that. I don't know. But, I can assure the Representative that this bill does not have something in it in terms of excess, that on the contrary, it is quite necessary to run the affairs of the House and I, for one, do not want to find myself put in the position of having to have an inadequate budget before us because of possible fear of public retribution. I think it is up to us in this House to educate the members of the public to the reality. I think in this morning's open caucus, the Chairman of the Finance Committee made it very clear that if you want more accessibility to government, if you want more responsiveness on the part of elected officials, then we are going to have to pay the bill for that. And paying the bill for that means having the kind of personnel available to us that not only can represent to the public an adequate picture of what is going on in the Legislature, but to provide the legislators with the kind of aid and assistance that will enable them to do their jobs correctly; enable them to do the job in such a way that the public feels their money is well spent. It is not the initial amount that is the point in question in my mind. It is whether we are doing the job correctly with the money that we have.

I feel, as I say, that the addition of full time staff for the legislators would serve the public, not only well, but extremely well. So, for that reason, Mr. Speaker, I urge a reconsideration of the previous speaker as far as voting on the bill

with the idea in mind that we are trying to serve the public, and that is always foremost in our minds, and that this bill, in fact, does represent that, and that if we look a little further into it, we might find that the addition of perhaps \$100,000 to \$200,000 would pay tremendous benefits in terms of public information, accessibility and responsibility of the legislators here assembled.

Thank you."

Representative Narvaes rose and asked:

"Mr. Speaker, will the Honorable Neil Abercrombie yield to a question?"

Representative Abercrombie replied: "Of course."

Representative Narvaes asked:

"How much do you feel you will be receiving for your staff in this upcoming session per month?"

At this point, Representative Cobb rose on a point of order and stated:

"First of all, a Representative's name should not be mentioned on the floor but a district designation should be used and, secondly, that all questions should be addressed to the Chair."

The Chair then said:

"Representative Narvaes, will you address your questions to the Chair in the third person."

Representative Narvaes continued, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, let me put it this way. I will be receiving, as I now know, \$1,500 for the operations of my office staff per month in this upcoming session. I challenge any one of the other members here to compare their staff funds to what I will be receiving."

Representative Abercrombie then rose, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I maybe did not make myself clear; perhaps I misspoke myself and if I did, I would like to correct it at this time.

What I am referring to in the budget bill now before us is the addition of staff after the session is over which would be divided equally among all the members of this House. There would be no discrimination on the basis of party or on the basis of district or anything else, but rather, each of us in this assemblage would be able to serve our constituents and that the amount of money involved would be equal from the very beginning."

Representative Sutton then rose, stating:

"Sir, I rise to speak against Standing Committee Report No. 3.

I am, as you know, a member of the Finance Committee. This Finance Committee is somewhat like a cable car in San Francisco. You get on it but it continues to go; it never stops."

At this point, Representative Kunimura rose on a point of order and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, will you ask the gentleman from I don't know which district he is representing to stick to the subject."

The Chair asked Representative Sutton to "please stick to the subject" and Representative Sutton continued, stating:

"I am sticking to the subject.

We are looking at a bill which comprises five components and yet does not tell the full story. We are looking at a bill that does not show our own salaries. We are looking at a bill that does not in any way, shape or manner give the complete cost of government. I think that we are also looking at four different components and I will draw your attention, sir, to each one of those.

First of all, you have \$1,526,400 appropriated for the Senate and \$1,974,000 to the House. These represent a five percent inflationary factor. This five percent inflationary factor is a wild card, sir. It is not an exact figure; therefore, it is only appropriate that we eliminate that five percent factor.

Mr. Speaker, we are talking about \$6 million or very roughly \$6.00 for each man, woman and child for the legislative process for one year. A comparison is made with last year as if that were the norm

when it in turn was excessive. We are a small State, Mr. Speaker, with limited resources and our sugar industry is in very deep trouble, being tied in with competition throughout the world. The first thought should be--is the taxpayer getting his money's worth? Instead, we add this five percent inflationary / factor. This in the face of restrictions and reductions by the Governor of this State on most of our higher education programs.

My pity is out to the Representative from Manoa, Representative. . .I can't mention his name, who is Chairman of that Committee on Higher Education.

Representative Abercrombie, on a point of order, stated:

"I don't know which Representative from Manoa he is referring to."

Representative Sutton replied:

"I will define him a little more carefully. This Representative also works for a very fine bank."

Representative Abercrombie then rose on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"I know it isn't me."

Representative Sutton continued his remarks, stating:

"I will assure Mr. Abercrombie that my reference is not to him. I will also assure Mr. Abercrombie that he will have a chance to answer me but let us get on further, Mr. Speaker; that clock is moving very fast.

Look at the Legislative Auditor. We are spending almost a million dollars for the Legislative Auditor I was on the interim committee that you appointed me to on consumer protection. We were studying a full-time Public Utilities Commission and we were told from the Legislative Auditor's office that we would have a certain report ready for our deliberations. It was three weeks late and then it had five words misspelled and very, very poor use of the facilities that they had, and we had to make additional research and go between the islands and then practically hire, contractually, additional help to get a study of other public utilities. It was an inadequate report.

Now, let us look at the Legislative Reference Bureau. I think the Legislative Reference Bureau, very frankly, does an excellent job and I want to pass that on because I see them do wonderful work and I personally do not understand how they do as well as they do, and I think they deserve every penny of the \$620,000.

Now, come to the Revisor of Statutes. I don't know why that is in our budget at all. The head of the Revisor of Statutes is appointed by the Chief Justice as you know. Being appointed by the Chief Justice, isn't it appropriate that this be in the Judiciary budget? Why do we include it here? When you and I were young lawyers, Mr. Speaker, we used to see the Revisor of Statutes right next to the Law Library there and we would go in there because it was a quiet place to study and the man did it all by hand. Now he needs a half million dollars to do what he did by hand for \$20,000.

Now, may I come to the Ombudsman. Now, Mr. Speaker, can I just draw your attention to one of the great tragedies that ever happened. You know, we have been on this legislative session for almost a week and we have never talked about it. Fifteen thousand people have lost \$50 million and we have not even heard from the Governor about it here. We heard about how he can circumvent the Constitution to bring people down here but.

At this point, the Chair interrupted:

"Representative Sutton, will you please confine your remarks to the subject at hand."

Representative Sutton continued, stating:

"The subject, sir, is the Ombudsman. I have taken Latin; I have taken Greek, but I really don't know what that word means if the Ombudsman will not take care of people like the depositors in THC. I have, in my office, subscribed statements which you are very welcome to see, Mr. Speaker, where people called the Ombudsman about the THC both before it was seized, before it went into Chapter 10, before the parent company went into Chapter 11, bankruptcy, and these people did not get any service. They were given the runaround. Now the Ombudsman should serve a purpose or we should eliminate

it because there is a sense of false reliance. You know the Doctrine of Estoppel, Mr. Speaker -- a reliance on something which is quick sand and that's what happened with these THC depositors who relied on the Ombudsman and, Mr. Speaker, we have a serious situation when 15,000 poor people whose life savings have gone down the drain and yet we are not taking attention to it and we are putting in our budget the same figure for the same group, and how can we be sure that our constituents are going to be properly taken care of in the future? This Ombudsman should be eliminated.

Now, Mr. Speaker, I have about two minutes left. I would like to make a summation if I can. I feel and I am mindful of all the overall responsibility and I have never seen a finer Chairman than I am working with in this Committee and never a harder working one and I have never seen anybody who is able to stay in a chair that longmuch, much longer than me--and occasionally I have to leave and I come back and I grab some of his cookies and as they see me taking those cookies, why, I see his secretary saying to me, by golly, why doesn't this rich haole buy his own cookies, and he is a lovely Chairman and a wonderful person. I don't like to fight him here on the floor but my brother from Kalihi Valley--we both played for the Kalihi thundering herd, and we come from a poor section-we gotta go back and tell them, listen you're getting your buck's worth, and we've got to tell them, alright fine, what this peanut farmer, Jimmy Carter told them is true that we are going to cut government, and I say, Mr. Speaker, that we table this and that in turn we come back with a budget of ten percent less and not include the Revisor of Statutes-let Mr. Richardson in the Judiciary have that -- and let us eliminate the Ombudsman and get somebody who will service these poor people that are hurt like the THC depositors.

Thank you."

Representative Suwa was recognized by the Chair and he stated:

"Mr. Speaker, this afternoon, I would like to talk in behalf of the bill--speaking for the bill.

Remarks were made as to that the State should, under the economic constraint, that we should be reducing but, Mr. Speaker, in order to be effective as the three branches of government--if you were to look over some of the administration budget and if you were looking over the Judiciary function -- it is incumbent upon the Legislature to be self-sufficient in the area of staffing, in the area of professionalism, and in that area, Mr. Speaker, all of the legislative branch plays an important role in our State government to see that it is in check and balance, and for that reason, Mr. Speaker, I feel that the increase is a reasonable one at this time and that, although it is appropriated, in the wise judgment of Mr. Speaker, that where prudency is necessary, I am sure you will exercise, and where spending is necessary to improve the operations of the House, you will do so.

Let me set an example as to last year's appropriation. Although it was appropriated, the December 31st figure does not seem to give a true figure and many of you may have questions as to the remaining amount. But as to the integrity of the operation of the House, the Legislature has lapsed \$12,233 back into our treasury for the fund that was in surplus in the operation of the 1975 session and, Mr. Speaker, your contingency fund, you have returned to the treasury \$6,883. I am sure with your leadership, I know we will be exercising prudency where necessary and once again, if I may repeat, that where spending is necessary to improve the House operations and to be effective in the areas that we do exercise our legislative policymaking role and that to check the administration branch and that of the Judiciary, it is necessary an amount; as one of the Representatives said, it should be more. But this is where we are exercising prudency and that a reasonable material increase and other expenses have risen more than five percent, but what the Finance Committee is saying, Mr. Speaker, is that you are authorized this five percent increase to do the job; probably in your wish, you should be having another 25 percent increase but the Finance Committee is reducing that request as far as having more money to run the House.

I don't think House Bill No. 3, House Draft 1, is out of line and I feel it is a bill that we all can be proud of; that we will be doing a good job; and with this investment, I am sure we will be saving lots, lots more. So, Mr. Speaker, I ask the members of the House to support this bill."

Representative Kunimura was recognized and he stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of the bill.

First of all, I would like to say that I hope all these words against the proposition is said also in Committee so the Committee would have an opportunity to have all the input necessary to make decisions. You know, we still remember December the 7th, and I shall remember this day until the end of the next two years.

Mr. Speaker, in defense of this appropriation measure, I would like to say that the founding fathers of our nation clearly separated the legislative, the executive, and the judicial branches of government so that the peoples aspiration of the nation can be well preserved. And our Constitution also, Mr. Speaker, is patterned after the national Constitution and I am not going to sit here as a member of this Legislature to see that one branch of the government, especially the legislative arm of the government, which belongs to the people-closest to the people because we are all elected--that because of unreasonable or gutless character of the Legislature, short-change our operation and stymie our ability to go into our departments to make necessary trips to our respective districts, to go and investigate and come back and legislate with proper information, not only from the lobbyists, but go down to the grassroots; and the appropriation is only moneys appropriated to afford us this type of ability if we so desire.

I am sure many of us will be introducing resolutions for interim work--and nobody gives us a ride on the airplane free; nobody lets us eat at the restaurants or stay at the hotels free because we are legislators; and even if they did, we shouldn't accept it. We should pay for what we use and pay for what we consume so that we can really be independent and what we are doing today is to afford each and every member of this Legislature this independence by having the necessary moneys appropriated. If we need it, we have it. If we don't need it, we will lapse it, and that is the only way it goes--and the Legislative Management Committee is made up of the leadership of the minority as well as the majority and the actual spending will be by the Committee with the approval of the Speaker. We have safeguards. Appropriation of any amounts of money does not mean that it will be spent, but you

cannot appropriate any money when the session adjourns and this is what I call future insurance.

Thank you."

Representative Suwa then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker', reference was made to some of the legislative branches here. I cannot, at this time, sit idle; and in defense of that department of the legislative branch, Mr. Speaker, I think they deserve an outstanding applause or commendation for the work in the past years.

I think the Legislative Auditor's Office has been noted and cited for their excellency, and as to the workings of the rest of the legislative arm of the Legislature, I think they are independent in criticizing the Legislature where criticism is due, and I am sure they are a part of the system that is necessary to operate our State government in an honest way.

Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I think the remarks were somewhat out of order, and I hope that the House doesn't feel that the statement made is a correct one, and I think some of the legislative branch is a very effective arm of the Legislature; so therefore, Mr. Speaker, I would like the members to know that we have a wonderful legislative branch."

At this time, Representative Kamalii rose and asked for a roll call vote on House Bill No. 3, House Draft 1.

Representative Kunimura then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, one more thing. A severe criticism was made of the Ombudsman's Office. Mr. Speaker, if it was an ordinary layman who made that accusation, I can let it pass but when a member of the Bar Association, an officer of the Court, who should know the proper procedure as far as the law is concerned in this State, I must take exception to what was said.

The Ombudsman is not an Attorney General nor a prosecutor. An Ombudsman's Office was created so that people can bring complaints against people in government and the Ombudsman has no power to take or even go

and discuss matters with a private enterprise like THC Financial.

I hope the gentleman would read the law and truly understand the proper function of the Ombudsman's Office."

Representative Sutton then rose and remarked:

"Sir, I make a living reading the law. Thank you."

Representative Narvaes then rose, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, there is one aspect that we are overlooking and I have issued a challenge—do I have any opposition?"

Representative Suwa, upon being recognized, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, if he is making the remark of the \$1,500 that is applied to each office, is he saying that because of the lack of responsibility that it is too much for him? Is he saying that? Is that the challenge?"

Representative Narvaes replied:

"Mr. Speaker, I think that answer is obvious. I am not looking at that."

Representative Blair then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I will accept the challenge but with one provision. I think we should wait until the end of the session when we can judge, not only the amount of funds given to each office, but the work product that comes out. And at the proper time, I will accept the challenge."

Representative Kunimura then rose and stated:

"In answer to one of the officers of the court of the State of Hawaii, I would like to say one thing that I learned a long time ago--people can read but doesn't mean they understand."

The motion to pass H.B. No. 3, HD 1, on Third Reading was put

by the Chair, and roll call having been requested, H.B. No. 3, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS TO PROVIDE FOR THE EXPENSES OF THE LEGISLATURE, THE LEGISLATIVE AUDITOR, THE LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU, AND THE OMBUDSMAN", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Ajifu, Narvaes and Sutton voting no, and Representative Shito being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 3 had passed Third Reading at 12: 20 o'clock p.m.

At this time, Representative Abercrombie rose on a point of order and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, perhaps it is just inadvertent but the whole idea behind the bracketing system is to avoid conflict in Committee hearings and, with all due respect to the Chairman of the Higher Education Committee and the Chairman of the Culture and Arts, I understand there are two hearings at the same time today, and the Committee members are the same and I am torn between it. I want to go to the proposed West Oahu College situation, but I don't want to ignore the Culture and the Arts circumstance either.

Now, perhaps this isn't the way or time to bring it up, but I think it is the time. I don't want to see it occur in the future, if at all possible, and I don't know what the hell I am going to do now."

The Chair replied:

"I think the matter has been under consideration, Representative Abercrombie, and we all must realize there is just not enough hours and days in a week, and there are x number of committees and work must be done, and some members must make the decision based on priority. But the Vice Speaker is looking into the scheduling matter."

Representative Abercrombie then stated:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, but I would like to make this comment. As far as I am concerned, when it comes to officials of the State, if they have to come here at midnight and we have to come here at midnight

in order to avoid this kind of thing, it is okay with me. They get paid plenty."

Representative Kamalii rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I am absolutely delighted that this has been brought to the attention of you, Mr. Speaker, as well as the members of this House. This has been our minority stand since November 4th that the bracketing was not going to work. And I hope that you gentlemen and you chairmen will sometimes recognize the minority for their intelligence and awareness, and I also hope this doesn't happen again."

Representative Kihano then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, it is not that the bracketing system is not going to work or is not working. I think the problem is that a Committee is having a Committee hearing and one of the other committees is going on a field trip. It is not another hearing.

I might warn the members of the House and the Committee Chairmen that if a field trip is being made, I would like them to clear it with my office so that this won't happen in the future.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At 12:25 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:27 o'clock p.m.

Representative Garcia then rose and made a late introduction, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I am sure many of you already know who this person is-but in the past two years, we passed a bill relating to the adoption of adults and I have made a decision that I wanted to adopt this particular individual as my adopted son.

Many of us know him as a former Representative, former Minority Floor Leader and now a Councilman-former Representative Joseph Garcia."

ADJOURNMENT

At 12:38 o'clock p.m., on motion by

Representative Yuen, seconded by Representative Kamalii and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned to 11:30 o'clock a.m. on Monday, January 31, 1977.

Monday, January 31, 1977

The House of Representatives of the Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1977, convened at 11:30 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Mrs. Lois Takata, Chairperson, Nurture Division of the Hawaii Council of Churches, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representative Evans, who was excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Eighth Day.

On motion by Representative Yuen, seconded by Representative Kamalii and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Eighth Day was approved.

SENATE COMMUNICATION

A communication from the Senate (Sen. Com. No. 4) transmitting Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 46 expressing appreciation to the Hawaiian Open Golf Tournament for its meaningful and ongoing contribution to the people of Hawaii which was adopted by the Senate of January 31, 1977, was read by the Clerk and was placed on file.

On motion by Representative Yuen, seconded by Representative Kamalii and carried, S.C.R. No. 46 was adopted.

At this time, the following introductions were made to the members of the House:

Representative Sutton introduced two retired nurses, Linea A. Danielson and Evelyn Leen.

Representative Kamalii introduced her friend from Minneapolis, Minnesota, Jill Williams.

The Chair then made the following introduction:

"The Chair, at this time, would like to recognize the presence of a very important individual to the Legislature and our great State of Hawaii and its people, Congressman Daniel K. Akaka, who is here this

morning to give us the benefit of his short experience in Washington, D. C."

The Chair then appointed Representatives Takamine, Caldito, Kawakami, Naito, Cayetano, Kihano and Ajifu to escort the Honorable Congressman Daniel K. Akaka to the rostrum.

Representative Naito presented him with a red carnation lei.

Congressman Akaka then addressed the members of the House of Representatives as follows:

"Mahalo nui na hoaloha, my friends.

Honorable James Wakatsuki, Speaker; Honorable Daniel Kihano, Vice Speaker; Honorable Ronald Kondo, Majority Leader; Honorable Jann Yuen, Majority Floor Leader; Honorable Ralph Ajifu, Minority Leader; Honorable Kinau Kamalii, Minority Floor Leader; members of this great State House of Representatives, I say Aloha once again.

I am really proud to be an American. I am proud to be an ethnic Hawaiian serving all of the people of Hawaii in Congress. I am proud to have the distinction of being the first Hawaiian to be elected to Congress and to have a vote in Congress. I am proud to represent the rainbow people of Hawaii. You know, it's so easy to go to a cold place, at this time, like Washington, D. C., and to represent the rainbow people of Hawaii. I look upon Hawaii, as you do, of people who represent a beautiful image to our country and to the world - like the rainbow. The image of the rainbow is beauty; it's beautiful; it's intangible; and it's only when its separate colors are put and blended together that the beauty emerges. And, to me, this is our beautiful people of Hawaii. We belong to many ethnic groups. As we are proud of our ethnicity, as we do our best to add to the total community of Hawaii, the beauty of the rainbow emerges, and so it's very easy for me to represent such people.

I want to tell you that I've had the pleasure of visiting and talking to our President on four occasions and I thought I would pass some of my feelings on to you. I look upon our President as a simple, humble man; a determined man.

I would like to share with you an

anecdote that came by way of Speaker of the House O'Neill when he told us a story about this man. He said when Governor George McGovern was running for President, a man came in, that nobody knew, and he said he wanted to help. And so they looked at him and said, okay, travel over all the States and speak for McGovern. He did. And he did a terrific job.

The next time Tip O'Neill saw him, because Tip has always been with the leadership, was when this same man walked in two years ago and said, 'I want to run for the Presidency'. They looked at him and said okay, fine, come here and sit down. He said, you know this man is now our President. And, he said, I'm telling you this only to tell you that any time this man tells me he's going to do something, I'm going to believe him, because he is now our President.

But Carter is such a man - humble man. He's said things to us in a small group that was difficult for me to believe, but he's doing it. After the inauguration he said he was going to meet as many people as he could. Well, he did. He spent four days meeting people at the White House. And you know he walked down Pennsylvania Avenue. He is doing things that is surprising to the people on the Hill. But he is a determined man.

Also, I want to say of our leadership: Tip O'Neill, our Speaker, is a great man, with a great heart, a fair man, and is looking forward to working with our President as much as he can in the Congress; our Majority Leader, Jim Wright of Texas, never fails to remind me that he voted for Statehood. But, I've met so many oldtimers in the Congress that have spoken well of Hawaii, and so I look forward to my tenure there and my work in Congress.

There are several things that I think are now history in the Congress and in the United States. One is what our class did at the opening of the session - when I say our class, I mean the 95th class, and we're considered the freshmen - when we passed the Rules to allow the press and the public into the gallery during the caucuses. This was never done before, but through speedy action, it was done by the freshman class. So now it's good to turn around and see all the people in the gallery. But there are other

demonstrations of opening Congress, of opening the Committees, so that staff people as well as the press and the public may be able to benefit from the discussions.

As you probably know now, I am a member of the Agriculture Committee. I'm serving on three sub-committees in the Agriculture Committee - my major Committee. In my non-major Committee, I'm in the Merchant Marine and the Fisheries. I am looking forward to, and I've asked to be assigned to the Oceanography sub-committee and the Fisheries sub-committee. I feel that these committees will be able to help you and help Hawaii and I will do the best I can in doing that.

We do have problems here in Hawaii that we want to take care of, and one, of course, is sugar legislation. I am in the right committee for that. I've talked to the chairman, Tom Foley, and he has announced that sugar will be one of our major issues in the full Committee this year.

I am also concerned, and so are you, and so is the President, with the reduction of unemployment. I want to tell you that I am co-sponsoring a bill that will add \$4 billion to the Public Works Employment Act. This will raise the total to \$6 billion. Should this pass, there will be more opportunity for those who want to work, not only in Hawaii, but in the United States.

But I would like to close by saying that I look forward to a kind of relationship with Hawaii that will be one of coordination and cooperation. I felt that my experience in Hawaii has been one where I've had good relationship with the Legislature, with our Governor, with the Mayors of all Counties, and also with members of the Councils of the Counties, and I would like to take advantage of this and to continue this good relationship in trying to work out services that can help the people of Hawaii.

As you know, for the first time, the Congressional delegation is getting together. We have had one meeting in Washington and we are planning to come back in the middle of February to Hawaii, as a congressional delegation, to meet with you, meet with the Governor, meet with the mayors and also council members of the counties. We hope this will bring together more unity, new ideas and good exchange of ideas so that what we do may be expeditious

THIRD READING

H.B. No. 10, HD 1:

Representative Suwa moved that H.B. No. 10, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Peters.

At 12:04 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:09 o'clock p.m., Representative Katsuya Yamada rose and asked:

"Having been directly involved in the negotiations of one of those cases, I ask that I be excused from voting on it."

The Chair then made the following ruling:

"The Chair rules that there is a probable conflict; therefore, the Chair rules that you may be excused from voting."

Representative Carroll then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would ask the same. I'm not certain that I've been involved with one of those. I haven't had a chance to see. But there is a strong possibility that I may have been. I'll abstain on that basis."

The Chair then replied:

"That was one of the purposes for the caucus, Representative Carroll. The Chair excuses Representative Carroll on the point of personal conflict."

At this point, Representative Cayetano rose and asked:

"Mr. Speaker, question for the Chair, please?"

Upon being directed to "proceed", Representative Cayetano asked:

"Is the Chair embarking on a new policy on conflict?"

The Chair answered:

"No, I'm not. As I understand, Representative Kats Yamada's point of conflict is that he advised the County of Hawaii in the negotiation on a settlement in one of the claims."

Representative Cayetano then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I am not questioning the Chair's ruling. I'm just questioning the policy the Chair seems to be following. It is my recollection that, over the past two years, the Chair has never ruled any person in conflict."

The Chair replied:

"There's always the first time, and more to come."

Representative Kunimura, at this time, rose and stated:

"Will you consider all attorneys be disqualified hereafter. Even in enactment of general laws . .

Representative Sutton, on a point of order, stated:

"Sir, he is making a classification

that does not fit the category."

The Chair then directed "Representative Kunimura" to "proceed with your statement".

Representative Kunimura continued, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I thank the good Lord that he is not the Supreme Court Justice.

But, anyway, you know, we may have to seriously consider that all lawyers - it's going to be on the statute book - because some day they are going to be practicing law and, therefore, I think all attorneys should be disqualified immediately. They may serve, but they cannot vote."

The Chair then stated:

"The Chair rules you out of order. If that is the case, other laymen could be ruled in conflict."

Representative Suwa, upon being recognized, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I thought that this was an innocent bill, but it seems to have some problem, so, at this time, I would like to speak in behalf of the bill.

House Bill Number 10, as amended, appropriates \$151,625.01, representing twenty-four individual claims for the legislative relief pursuant to Section 37-77 and Chapter 662 of the Hawaii Revised Statues.

Your Committee has reviewed the claims set forth in the testimony that has been verified by the Budget and Finance and Tax Departments and the Attorney General's office. Therefore, I ask the members to support this measure."

The motion to pass H.B. No. 10, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE RELIEF OF CERTAIN PERSONS' CLAIMS AGAINST THE STATE AND PROVIDING APPROPRIATIONS THEREFOR", on Third Reading was put by the Chair and carried by a roll call vote of 48 ayes, with Representatives Carroll, Evans and K. Yamada being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 10, HD 1, passed Third Reading at 12:15 o'clock p.m.

ADJOURNMENT

At 12:17 o'clock.p.m., on motion by Representative Yuen, seconded by Representative Kamalii and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned to 11:30 o'clock a.m. on Tuesday, February 1, 1977.

"I passed out an article that came out in the 'Fortune' magazine about the reasons for this congratulation that is self-explanatory, so I would like to request of the Speaker that this article be put in the Journal."

The Chair, noting that there were no objections, so ordered.

"A MARKETING MAN GOES TO WORK ON THE MACADAMIA NUT

Around the middle of the last century, a pair of Australian botanists, exploring the forested mountains of Queensland, discovered the edible qualities of the indigenous 'bush nut,' whose husk is about the size, shape, and color of a muddy golf ball. They proclaimed it delicious, a verdict met with profound apathy by the world at large, and dubbed it the Macadamia in honor of a friend and fellow scientist, Dr. John Macadam.

In Australia the name is still capitalized, and the nut is only now beginning to attract the attention of farmers. But in major U.S. cities, where it ranks with the pine nut and Sicilian pistachio as the most expensive nut sold in gourmet stores, and in Hawaii, where it has been grown

commercially for years, macadamia has become a common noun. It also is beginning to be seen as a neglected treasure—an important supplement to Hawaii's declining sugar and pineapple industries and, conceivably, an eventual partial replacement for them.

The macadamia was introduced to Hawaii in 1881 as an ornamental (the tree has low-gloss leaves that somewhat resemble those of a spineless holly). Epicures, eager to sample the nuts, soon found out why the macadamia had languished in Australia. While the thick husk was easily removed, the kernel inside was protected by a steely brown shell that a different McAdam might well have found suitable for surfacing roads. Hawaiians persistent enough to hammer the nuts open, pry the fragmented kernels loose from the broken shells, and roast and salt them could be identified by bruised fingers and happy smiles. The macadamia was like no other nut, either in taste or consistency. Its meat was at once creamy and crunchy, and when its elusive sweetness was countered by salt it achieved an almost Oriental balance.

During its first forty years in Hawaii the macadamia was never considered as a possible cash crop. Planters had dedicated every bit of arable land either to sugar or pineapple, and they had no interest in sacrificing even a square foot to an alien tree that took seven years to bear, then produced nuts that could not be cracked commercially by any existing machine. That much, and not much more, was known about the macadamia in 1920 when the territorial government decided the tree might be useful for reforestation and the control of soil erosion where nothing valuable would grow. The territorial interest triggered a pilot investigation into macadamia culture by the University of Hawaii's College of Tropical Agriculture. It also triggered two very dissimilar men whose only attribute in common was a gourmet palate.

UNHINGED BY AMBROSIAL FLAVOR

One was Ernest Van Tassel, a newcomer to the islands who knew nothing about agriculture but was unhinged by the macadamia's ambrosial flavor. The other was Walter Pierre Naquin, the Louisiana-born manager of the Honokaa sugar plantation on the seaside slopes of the great

volcano, Mauna Kea, on the island of Hawaii. Naquin shared Van Tassel's passion for the nut, but he tempered his enthusiasm with French frugality and caution. Naquin was also lucky, which Van Tassel was not. Van Tassel spent twenty years and his modest fortune trying to 'reforest' an arid, lifeless cinder cone and a rain-drenched highland. When he finally got a crop, he was able to crack out only a few salable nuts. Naquin cannily persuaded the territory to plant 250 acres of macadamias in ravines above his sugarlands, ostensibly to control erosion but actually to appease his own epicurian cravings.

Naquin's luck lay in his location. Honokaa got just about the right amount of rain--some fifty to seventy inches a year--to keep the trees alive if not well. Throughout most of the period of Van Tassel's torment, Naquin harvested plenty of nuts for his own household needs--and that was all he cared about.

By 1938, however, the university's researchers had learned quite a lot about macadamia culture. They had established that macadamias needed nutrients, that grafted trees were more productive than originals, and that kernels would separate intact from cracked shells if the nuts were preshrunk in drying bins. So Naquin suddenly instructed his Honokaa agronomist, Leon Thevenin, to exploit the discoveries by planting 250 additional acres of macadamias. He also ordered him to invent a workable cracker. Thevenin, now in retirement, remembers a year of seven-day weeks and eighteenhour days. He cleared and fed the brushchoked orchard, 'top-worked' (pruned) the old trees, grafted the new seedlings, built the drying bins, and set up a makeshift production line. In his spare time he and plantation engineer Otto Hermann actually did invent a primitive cracker--as ordered--and in 1939 Honokaa processed its first cash crop, which it sold for a total of \$19.62.

The following year sales totaled \$5,000, and they climbed slowly but steadily during the war years, when a good many soldiers and marines were trained on the big island. By 1973, Honokaa, now a division of Theo. H. Davies & Co. Ltd., one of the big-five companies that have dominated the Hawaiian economy for 100 years, was selling more than a million dollars' worth of the nuts each year. But

it had fallen far behind a big-five rival, C. Brewer and Co. Ltd., which controlled 80 percent of the macadamia-nut production. Brewer had captured the gournet market on the mainland and supplied all those nuts (1.5 million pounds so far) that United Air Lines gives away to its passengers. Moreover, Brewer, with ownership or control of nearly 300,000 trees, grouped in two large orchards, was showing increased earnings from macadamias, while Honokaa had slipped into the red.

Davies decided to sell out, but it found no takers until a June day in 1974 when Paul and Anita DeDomenico called at the Honokaa factory. Then thirty-nine, DeDomenico was president of Ghirardelli Chocolate Co., a subsidiary of Golden Grain Macaroni Co. of San Leandro, a suburb of San Francisco. He had been buying around 50,000 pounds of nuts a year for Ghirardelli's macadamia chocolate bar, and he was merely looking for a supplier to back up Brewer. He was startled but intrigued when Davies's manager, Tom Unger, asked: 'Why don't you buy the factory?' Two months later DeDomenico did just that.

For 'something under \$1 million' he got Davies's brand name, Hawaiian Holiday, its equipment, its inventory, its accounts receivable, and a long-term lease on the factory building and five and a half acres of land. He also was promised first call on nuts produced by Naquin's old Honokaa orchard, and was provided with a list of the area's 400 independent (and by now gloomy) growers--some of them hobbyists and few with more than fifteen acres of trees--who had relied on Hawaiian Holiday as a market. DeDomenico resigned from Ghirardelli and Golden Grain, and on October 1, 1974, he became president of the Hawaiian Holiday Macadamia Nut Co., with Anita as his executive vice president and sole partner.

The DeDomenicos' sudden departure for the Hawaiian backlands took the West Coast food industry by surprise. The son of Pasqualino (Paskey) DeDomenico, Paul had become Golden Grain's national sales manager at twenty-four when it was a small, family-held pasta manufacturer with annual sales of only \$8 million, all west of Denver. In 1959, over family opposition, he had taken Golden Grain's first venture into convenience foods, a vermicelli and rice concoction

called Rice-A-Roni, straight into New York despite a test-market flop in Eugene, Oregon.

A RICH PAYOFF

The Roni line had burgeoned to a dozen items and sales had risen to more than \$50 million by 1968, but young DeDomenico was increasingly unhappy with family second-guessing of his decisions. He was about to quit when his uncle, Vincent DeDomenico, offered him the presidency of Ghirardelli, which the family had saved from bankruptcy in 1963. Ghirardelli was still losing half a million dollars a year. 'Turn it around and take home 20 percent of the profits,' Vince told Paul.

Young DeDomenico agreed, on condition he be given a free hand. He was--until 1972, when Ghirardelli profits reached \$500,000. 'As soon as Golden Grain realized I was taking home an extra hundred grand a year, everybody suddenly knew more about buying cocoa beans than I did,' DeDomenico said recently. His executive vice president interjected: 'That's when we knew we had to get out.'

In Hawaii the few people who knew of DeDomenico's purchase of 'a sure loser' thought he was either (1) a playboy or (2) crazy. The independent growers, most of them of Japanese, Filipino, or Portuguese ancestry, could only believe that this soft-spoken, almost diffident man with his mod haircut and thoughtful (even owlish) look was a 'supersalesman.' They were doubly doubtful that Anita, a beautiful brunette who looked like (and had been) a ballet dancer, was any kind of vice president. In more elevated agricultural circles, DeDomenico's sales, promotion, and marketing experience was discountedthose functions had always been performed by mainland subsidiaries or agents of the sugar and pineapple industries. 'What's he ever grown?' one skeptic asked.

'THE WORLD'S NUTTIEST FACTORY'

DeDomenico was undismayed by his cool reception. 'I was convinced the macadamia was the perfect nut,' he says, 'and I knew it was being marketed in areas that comprise only 15 percent of total U.S. fruit and nut sales. I was aware that there were problems with growing

and processing, but I was pretty sure I knew a way to solve them. My whole strategy was to upgrade and promote the product and increase both prices and demand, even if it could not be supplied immediately.

Furthermore, DeDomenico was aware that the macadamia had rarely been advertised and had been promoted only by the airplane packets, and that even at 55 cents an ounce macadamias had never met price resistance. 'As for the 'sure loser,' he says, 'well--the situation was almost identical with Ghirardelli's. Hawaiian Holiday was assigning about 95 percent of its production to bulk sales to Japan, and its retail label had almost disappeared. In consumer goods these days, if you're not selling your own brand, you're out of luck.'

The four-wheel drive beneath DeDomenico's deceptive exterior became evident the moment he took over. He cut bulk packaging to 15 percent of production and immediately began improvising new retail products. He kept Tom Unger on to reassure the growers and hired Eddie Fukunaga, a world authority on macadamia culture, to help them increase their harvests. DeDomenico spent \$60,000 on advertising in Honolulu tourist guides to lure buyers to 'the world's nuttiest factory.' He started a bed for seedlings (there are now 200,000) and offered them at cost, along with soil nutrients, to any grower willing either to extend or improve his orchard. By the end of his first year, DeDomenico had processed and sold (for about \$2 million) 750,000 pounds of nuts, an increase of 30 percent over the crop in Davies's last year.

This tiny success hardly put him in competition with Brewer, but it made possible a radical move in November of 1975. DeDomenico leased 7,500 acres of Castle & Cooke's recently abandoned sugar plantation in North Kohala, an hour away. He had two purposes in mind. First, he wanted access to some 15,000 blighted macadamia trees scattered through its lava uplands (Brewer had rejected them as not worth salvaging). Second, he proposed to begin planting a 1,000-acre orchard in one of the dying cane fields, starting in 1977 with 200 acres.

Curious as it may seem, this was big news in Honolulu. Because of high labor costs and declining yields, the islands' two main cash crops, sugar and pineapple, are both in a process of slow but steady decline. North Kohala was the third sugar plantation to shut down in a decade. The State of Hawaii--unable, despite frantic efforts, to find a successful alternative crop--had never considered macadamias. The trees had been limited to submarginal land for so long that everybody--even scientists--had come to believe they preferred it. Do they? In Kohala, DeDomenico will be running a pilot project that could be of prime importance to the State's agricultural future.

READY TO INVADE THE MAINLAND

Early this year the revived Hawaiian Holiday label began to crowd Brewer's nuts for shelf space in Honolulu supermarkets, and in the spring some of the company's new products appeared -- among them onion-flavored and hickory-smoked macadamias. Last month DeDomenico predicted that his second-year production would exceed a million pounds, necessitating an increase in the factory work force to nearly 200 persons (there were seventy when he arrived). He anticipates sales of \$4 million. His new products, survivors of limited test marketing at Honokaa, now number more than fifty, in 100 sizes, and range all the way from traditional kernels to macadamia-coconut brittle and a macadamia-granola bar.

All are now on sale in a new Waikiki boutique calculated to give them maximum exposure to the nearly three million tourists who annually visit the resort. To attract the tourists' attention DeDomenico has increased his 1975 advertising budget to \$200,000, all spent in tourist-oriented media. He sees this expenditure as a necessary preliminary to a quarter-million-dollar West Coast media campaign that will spearhead his invasion of the mainland early next year. He believes he has a weapon, by no means secret, in the network of over 100 food brokers he used to take Golden Grain into national markets.

In short, DeDomenico is plunging ahead just like the aggressive marketing man he is. If he creates more demand than he can supply, well, he can always raise prices. And a few nuts will go a long way in his brand-named candy bars.

A ROLLS WITH A VOLKSWAGEN HOOD

All this sounds pretty revolutionary to DeDomenico's production- oriented

competitors at C. Brewer & Co. They rely on Castle & Cooke to handle their marketing and, to DeDomenico's astonishment, don't plan any extensive promotion effort this fall when they change their brand name (from 'Royal Hawaiian' to 'Mauna Loa').

'We're pretty good at growing things, 'says John W. A. ('Doc') Buyers, president of the company and a former vice president of IU International, the Philadelphia-based conglomerate that owns 54 percent of Brewer's stock. 'But we're not out to stimulate demand we can't fulfill. Brewer plans to put 5,000 more acres into macadamias over the next five years (not, company officials insist, in reaction to DeDomenico's planting program), and both Buyers and DeDomenico are counting on greater yields. Brewer has access to seed nuts from a new hybrid that will permit more intensive planting, and DeDomenico is providing incentives for his independents to harvest all year long instead of just during the prime harvest months. The yields per acre might go as high as 10,000 pounds, worth \$7,000. That kind of crop could make macadamias more profitable than sugar. And Brewer, as the largest producer, will benefit from any new demand that DeDomenico manages to stir up. But that doesn't mean that a traditionalist like Buyers has to be happy about the wild new things that are happening to his favorite nut. Onion-flavored macadamias? 'I guess I'd have to say we think it's kind of tacky, ' he says. 'The nut has such a super taste it's a shame to interfere with it. Let me give you a crazy analogy: every now and then you see a Volkswagen with a Rolls-Royce hood--but did you ever see a Rolls-Royce with a Volkswagen hood?'

That kind of attitude reminds DeDomenico of his grandmother Maria. 'She never wanted us to make Rice-A-Roni,' he says, 'and its success didn't change her mind. When she seemed near death, she sat up in bed and yelled: 'Maka da mac! Forgetta da rice!' Well, she didn't die until sometime later, Golden Grain still makes good macaroni, and Hawaiian Holiday will always provide pristine nuts for those who prefer them."

Yamada.

A concurrent resolution (H.C.R. No. 21) encouraging efforts to save the whales was jointly offered by Representatives Blair, Toguchi, Aki, Campbell, Kunimura, Nakamura, Say, Stanley and Ueoka.

A concurrent resolution (H.C.R. No. 22) requesting a study of the impact of the Hawaii No-Fault Automobile Insurance Law on the public was offered by Representative Carroll.

A concurrent resolution (H.C.R. No. 23) urging the Federal government to permit civilian use of Pearl Harbor for recreational purposes was jointly offered by Representatives Cayetano, Baker, Blair, Kamalii, Nakamura, Narvaes, Say, Shito, Takamura, Ueoka, Uwaine and Yuen.

A concurrent resolution (H.C.R. No. 24) requesting the Legislative Reference Bureau to undertake a study on early retirement for teachers was jointly offered by Representatives Cayetano, Mizuguchi, Baker, Blair, Kamalii, Nakamura, Narvaes, Say, Shito, Takamura, Ueoka, Uwaine and Yuen.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT

Representative Kawakami, for the Committee on Water, Land Use, Development and Hawaiian Homes, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 11) recommending that H.R. No. 163, as amended in HD 1, be adopted.

Representative Larsen moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.R. No. 163, HD 1, be adopted, seconded by Representative Caldito.

Representative Sutton then rose to speak against the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the purpose of this resolution is to direct the appropriate State agencies including the Department of the Attorney General, and requests the cooperation of the appropriate Federal agencies to provide the necessary and appropriate technical data and legal assistance for community groups preparing appeals against the provisions of the Flood Disaster Protection Act.

May I direct your attention, Mr. Speaker, to the first part. If we carry this precedence to an additional level, we would find ourselves writing many resolutions directing the appropriate State agencies and the Attorney General to act as legal counsel for various eccentric groups that wish to work out some scheme on their building permits, of some scheme on their site development, and we would go audit later. Mr. Speaker, you know we have a means of speaking legally where we go and use what we call ad absurdum, and I could give you examples of ad absurdum if we carry this thing too far. The precedent is very dangerous.

Now, Mr. Speaker, if I can address your attention to the second part. We request the cooperation of the appropriate Federal agency. We do not have the proper forum for that, Mr. Speaker. We are a State agency; we are a lateral government. The appropriate place for that is the Congress of the United States, not this body, sir. Therefore, on the basis of (a), I think it is a poor precedent and (b), that I think we are in an inappropriate forum.

I wish to vote 'no' on this, sir, and I urge my colleagues to do so."

Representative Larsen was recognized and he stated:

"I would like to say a few words in favor of this resolution.

Mr. Speaker, the purpose of the resolution is to give the community groups who are adversely affected by this Federal legislation a means to respond to the force of Federal law which mandates very stringent code requirements on buildings, and also I would like to call on the sewer systems which they are not capable of analyzing whether the technical data is correct or not.

We are asking the Governor in this resolution to help these community groups in whichever way he can. It has been suggested that he can help them through technical assistance and through legal authorities, and we are also asking the Governor to request that the proper Federal agencies lend their assistance to these community groups in answering technical questions that come up in regard to this Act.

I urge that the members vote for this resolution and assist their communities which, in many cases, are adversely affected by it.

Thank you."

Representative Cobb then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of the adoption of this resolution.

Mr. Speaker, the history of this situation goes back to 1973, but the immediacy of the problem comes with the adoption of the Federal rules and regulations granted under the authority of Federal law and, once these rules and regulations are adopted, the residents therein will have only a period of 90 days in which to effect a technical appeal to the Federal government concerning the findings in flood control districts in Waialae/Kahala and in Aina Haina. However, this is a precedence in the sense that more flood control districts are going to be coming in other areas of our State. The immediate result of this is a threefold increase in the cost of home insurance as well as the requirement that any new house that they build in one of these flood control districts be built on high lands not less than six feet high. So, Mr. Speaker, I think the residents, as a community, not as individuals, which has been deleted in this resolution, but as a community, have both the right and an obligation to carry this appeal forward.

I would further remind the individual who spoke against this resolution that the only grounds for appeal can be on a technical basis, not the emotional fact or the cost of insurance, not the aesthetic fact of what a six feet high piling would look on Diamond Head, but the simple,

yet very complex technical grounds of what is involved in a flood control district.

The engineering data on this extends to over 300 pages and this is not something that an individual or a community can comment about without expert help. In addition, Mr. Speaker, I would like to remind the members of this House that in the case of Waiahole/Waikane, in the case of the Hawaii Housing Authority, in the case of Act 105, in the case of the Land Use Commission, in the case of any State Boards and Commissions, that the help of the government is there for the people who seek it and address a particular problem. In fact, the Governor has been available concerning Waiahole/

Furthermore, Mr. Speaker, it is not a new precedent at all for us to ask the Federal government for help. We have done so on many resolutions in the past and I am sure when the economic situation faces us, we are going to do so on many in the future. So, Mr. Speaker, not as a precedent, but it is a simple matter of help, and I would ask my colleagues to support this resolution."

Representative Abercrombie then rose and remarked:

"Mr. Speaker, Representative Cobb covered my comments on this resolution."

Representative Sutton then rose and asked:

"Mr. Speaker, how much rebut time do we get, sir?"

The Chair replied: "Two sentences."

Representative Sutton then stated:

"These are the very Rules you promulgated and it says, 'ten minutes.' Either I can't read what you said, Mr. Speaker, or I'm getting the wrong thing from your office, but it says 'ten minutes.'

Sir, let me address your attention to two things that have been brought up by the prior speaker speaking immediately preceding the speaker from Manoa. I would like to point out the basic concept that was enunciated by your late Governor Burns. He said, 'Do not do by resolution

what you would not do by bill.'
If we were doing this by bill, we would be making special legislation. You have heard the admission by the gentleman from the Waialae/Kahala area that this is separate from one geographical area. Once we show a preference for one geographical area, we are not abiding by the State Constitution.

As you know, sir, we have the evil of equal protection and the concept of equal pay, and the concept that we have counties of different sizes. We have to have a reasonable classification. This does not have that reasonable classification so by the arguments that have been presented, we have an unconstitutional thing which is not constitutional per se because we have merely a resolution.

Then, the gentleman says, 'we have done this before; we have asked the Federal government! but this is not what this resolution says. I would direct him to read and the English of it states the antecedent and I would have him read the fact that it says, 'The Governor, George Ariyoshi, is requested to and that (1)--we will skip that for a minute--and come to (2). The Governor is the antecedent and we have the verb 'request.' The Governor, therefore, requests the cooperation of the appropriate Federal agencies.

This is not something that is directed to the Federal agencies the way this resolution is worded. We are asking the Governor to request it. Now, we are a perennial body; we have the separation of powers—the executive, the legislative, and the judicial. If we want to talk to the Federal government by way of resolution, we do it directly. We don't have to ask the Governor to do it for us. This violates the separation of powers.

This resolution, sir, should be recommitted, reworded, and should come back so that we take care of the Constitutional inhibitions so that this body has something that follows former precedence, and so, I make a motion for reconsideration or, in lieu thereof, can we have a roll call."

Representative Kunimura then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I did not go to law school, but I understand this resolution. It is not directed to any particular area of the State. I represent a county that has lots of potential flood plain areas. I believe it is also true of Maui and also on Hawaii.

This resolution only tells us that should the Federal government declare flood plain areas and it adversely affects the citizens of that particular area, that this resolution requests State help and all the necessary help be provided. It could happen in the Windward side of this island, or even on the Leeward side, so I hope that the good attorney won't read into the resolution anything that is not there."

The Chair, at this time, put the motion to a vote, and roll call having been requested, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. No. 163, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION RELATING TO APPEALS OF PUBLIC LAW 93-234, THE FLOOD DISASTER PROTECTION ACT OF 1973", was adopted by a vote of 48 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Sutton voting no, and Representatives Mina and Segawa being excused.

At 12:15 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:17 o'clock p.m.

SENATE COMMUNICATION

A communication from the Senate (Sen. Com. No. 6) returning House Bill No. 3, HD 1, which passed Third Reading in the Senate this day, February 3, 1977, was read by the Clerk and was placed on file.

At this time, Representative Carroll rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, with respect to the invitation the Representatives received to come to the Harbor on Sunday, I would like to also announce that the 'Tatoosh' which is the boat owned by the famous motorcycle rider, Peter Fonda -- Peter Honda -- is also going to be open that morning for the people who would like to go to that boat and yet not go out sailing. If anybody is interested in that tour, they are welcome to come."

The Chair then remarked:

"Representative Carroll, it is my understanding that Representatives Blair and Cayetano are still waiting for their invitations."

Representative Carroll replied:

"I mentioned yesterday that they removed the leg irons off the anchor which they have. One said 'Cayetano' and the other 'Blair'. I want to make it clear -- they are invited."

Representative Narvaes, at this time, rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Tonight, the freshmen legislators are having a get-together and I would like to take this occasion to specifically wish these freshmen of the majority a year full of quality accomplishments. Only next time, I hope that they don't give off the impression that this thing is non-partisan. It says, 'Freshmen Get-Together'."

The Chair then stated:

"The Chair would like to again remind everyone and request everyone to be on time when the session begins. We owe the Council of Churches and the audience the courtesy to be on time."

ADJOURNMENT

At 12:22 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative Yuen, seconded by Representative Kamalii and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned to 11:30 o'clock a.m. tomorrow, Friday, February 4, 1977.

THIRTEENTH DAY

Friday, February 4, 1977

The House of Representatives of the Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1977, convened at 11:30 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Alfred Rebuldela of Our Lady of the Mount Church, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Mina, Poepoe, Segawa and Uechi, who were excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Twelfth Day.

On motion by Representative Yuen, seconded by Representative Kamalii and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Twelfth Day was approved.

SENATE COMMUNICATION

A communication from the Senate (Sen. Com. No. 7) returning House Concurrent Resolution No. 15, which was adopted by the Senate on February 3, 1977, was read by the Clerk and was placed on file.

The following introductions were made to the members of the House:

They serve as a model for our young people -- a good model which will help to mold the character of our youngsters. They were strong enough to know their weaknesses and bold enough to face themselves when afraid. And they were well able to fare the stress and spur of difficulty and challenge.

The blood, sweat, and tears of this crew will continue to serve as a model for our children -- a model, a symbol of honor, strength, achievement, and the ability to meet the challenges of today and tomorrow.

The journey of the Hokule'a will long be remembered as the beginning of a new recognition, a new tribute to people of both old and new Hawaii. To these members of the crew, we express a deep Mahalo Nui Loa."
