"Mr. Speaker, I had the honor and pleasure of traveling with the Castle High School band and pageant group on this occasion and I had observed them from the press box. They did an outstanding performance there.

In spite of the rain and cold weather, the students had done a marvelous job. As I left the place, there were so many good comments.

Following that, I received many letters commending the performance of the students of Castle High School.

I would just like to read one short paragraph of a letter I received, and this is from Mr. John Pecorino who was the pageant director, and he states: 'I've been involved with many high school groups during my tenure as Pageant Director and can honestly and candidly report that your young people top the list! As ambassadors from, and for, the State of Hawaii, their conduct was most complimentary and reflected great honour of J.B. Castle High School.' These were the words of the pageant director, Mr. John Pecorino.

I would like to again congratulate the group, and Representative Evans has the other presentations to offer."

Representative Evans then made the following statement:

"There are many things that cannot be included in a resolution; otherwise, if we included everything about the Castle High School band and pageant program, their resolution would be almost as voluminous as our budget.

Back in the summer of '76, the kids embarked on a fund raising project along with their parents, their teachers and members of the community. They had hopes to raise \$110,000 to \$150,000. Well, the dream did not really pan out, but they did raise, with contributions and fund raisers, \$40,000. It was

a very short time, really, that they had put this money together.

On one occasion there was a huli huli chicken sale where they had sold thousands and thousands of chicken. And on that terrible day, it rained heavily in Kaneohe. So you can imagine what happened to some of those chicken. I don't know if some of them ever got delivered. But these kids were really bent on going and performing at that Shrine game.

Along with that, what many people did not realize, on T.V., those of us that viewed bits and pieces of it, was that it had rained heavy that day and the kids were wet and soaking and they were cold besides and they had been told that if any of the spectators left the bleachers then that meant they weren't doing so well. Well, we want to inform the people of Hawaii and this honorable body that very few spectators left their bleachers. They stayed through the whole thing - whether they were wet and cold, they stayed to watch our kids from Hawaii.

In Chicago, they got a call from Chicago saying that they had played the whole thing on T.V. The whole half hour had been viewed by the people in Chicago. Who were those kids from Hawaii? Where did they come from? So, the kids from Kaneohe put us on the map for the whole world, for the whole nation to see, and I am really proud to have them honored today.

And there have to be adults and people that make a lot of this possible. Today we have with us, Paul McCauley, student drum major; Gerald Nichols and Earl Imada, band directors; Ron Bright, drama instructor who put the pageant together; Harold Chong, principal of Castle High School; Ichiro Matsunaga, president of the Castle Band Aid Association; Helen Sakamoto, registrar of Castle High School; members of the Castle High School band and pageant group; and chaperones who kept all the kids together and out of trouble.

At this time, Representatives Stanley, Naito, Kamalii, Ikeda and Narvaes presented leis to Mr. McCauley, Mr. Nichols, Mr. Imada, Mr. Bright, Mr. Chong, Mr. Matsunaga and Mrs. Sakamoto. Representative Evans presented them with certified copies of the resolution.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 185, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SHORT-TERM INVESTMENT OF STATE MONEYS", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes, with Representatives Fong, Kawakami, Machida, Mina and Poepoe being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 185 had passed Third Reading at 11:59 o'clock a.m.

A resolution (H.R. No. 303) requesting the Department of Education to foster the development of a mechanism to systematically afford recognition and encouragement to teacher-student initiatives was jointly offered by Representatives Baker and Mizuguchi.

A resolution (H.R. No. 304) requesting the Department of Education to study the feasibility of establishing teacher centers was jointly offered by Representatives Baker and Mizuguchi.

A resolution (H.R. No. 305) requesting the Department of Education to study the feasibility of a school caretaker program was offered by Representative Medeiros.

A concurrent resolution (H.C.R. No. 33) requesting a study of grant effort and administration by State departments and agencies was jointly offered by Representatives Peters and Suwa.

At this time, Representative Suwa rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, looking at my order of business--the calendar--today is the Sixteenth Day and I have yet to come across the Administration's introduction of the budget bill. I know, as far as under the Statutes, the Administration had compiled the budget document. I think dollars and cents are one thing, but we are coming to a close of the Committee's responsibility on the subject matter area and we need to have the Administration's proviso. Certainly, they have had sufficient time to prepare the budget bill; therefore, I request, Mr. Speaker, that you use your good office to hasten the Administration in introducing the Executive budget bill.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair responded:

"The Chair will make proper inquiries."

The Chair then stated:

"The Chair would like to remind everyone here that this is the sixteenth legislative day; especially to the Chairmen; get your agendas prepared; get your hearings, so that decisions can be made on the bills."

It is a book of marvels and terrors and utterly unexpected revelation of life lived in present day America and haunted by China and its past, making us know a strange and hitherto impenetrable world; letting us experience the author's own battles and understand the challenges borne by millions of immigrants in a society pitilessly alien to them.

The 'Woman Warrior' startles and enthrals us. It is an electrifying book, an emotional truth, a literary achievement.

And if I may, Mr. Vice Speaker, just mention, very briefly, several comments from some of our leading literary critics.

From Kay Voil - Thank God for a woman's book that has the vitality to take one far, far away from the domestic grievances of America today - wooing one into the wit and the love and the grief of another place entirely. I love this book for all the contemporary, modest things it is not. I am so moved by it.

Morrison stated: A powerful, terrifying avocation of a Chinese family and village life totally unsentimental and devoid of false nostalgia and endearing directness.

Diana Johnson has stated: It is so absolutely wonderful, so fierce and strong and strange and clear and so vividly and passionately written.

And, Jonathan Spence has stated: A fascinating, savagely beautiful book. It conveys better than anything I have ever seen of the jumble of inheritance and antagonisms of folk myth and fear of the poet lyricism that have shaped the Chinese American experience.

Mr. Vice Speaker, the State of Hawaii is blessed to have Maxine Kingston with us. I would hope that she will rise now, with her son, Joseph, and receive from the House of Representatives its recognition."

At this time, Representative Evans presented Joseph with a red carnation lei and Representatives Ushijima and Say presented the honoree with red and white carnation leis.

## EIGHTEENTH DAY

Friday, February 11, 1977

The House of Representatives of the Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1977, convened at 11:30 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

"Before going into the matter of resolutions, if there is no objection, the Chair, at this time, would like to introduce to the members and the audience here a person who has just returned from Washington, D.C., representing our great State in the Congress of the United States, Congressman Cec Heftel."

Representative Stanley then presented the honoree with a red carnation lei.

The Chair then stated:

"Congressman Heftel has graciously consented to give us some of his impressions of Washington, D.C., and his ideas for the short time he has been there. Ladies and gentlemen, may I present Congressman Heftel."

Congressman Heftel addressed the members of the House, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I think I heard our Speaker say something to the effect that I had consented to share my views or

impressions with you. I think, rather, that I am very appreciative of the fact that he has extended this opportunity to me. This is the first time that I have spoken in this chamber and it reminds me a little bit of the first moments in Congress where you suddenly have an emotional reaction to something that you have never been a part of -- you've esteemed; you've read about; you've thought about.

I suppose, in many ways, there is more similarity between the State Legislature and the United States Congress than we might think, and if there is a thought I would like to share with you today, it is simply how you find effectiveness in a legislative body, and many of you, of course, have spent years recognizing what ultimately is the method whereby you operate effectively to the people. In Washington, in relation to Hawaii, we are but two Representatives in the House of Representatives. There are states with forty, fifty Representatives so we immediately recognize the difference of impact between the state of our size and the states with five, ten, fifteen and twenty million population, and so it is imperative that the two Congressmen from Hawaii and the two Senators from Hawaii become, hopefully, a delegation of four -- four voices who then extend themselves to you, the House of Representatives, to the State Senate, and to the State Administration and the Governor, and recognize that we can't afford the often different directions if we expect to get anything that makes sense to the people of Hawaii through our ability to effect legislation in Congress in Washington. My very first important step in that direction will occur on Tuesday when the delegation of four will meet with you, will meet with the Senate, the Governor, the Mayor and the City Council, and then meet with each of the Mayors and Councils of each of our neighbor islands.

I am not going to discuss the problems that confront us at this moment; only to say I'm certainly aware of the problems and our best opportunity for solutions will be in the manner in which we join together to compromise, to come up with viable solutions, and then to have us, as a delegation, go forward to try and bring about those desired results through the Congress itself. There are no heroes; there are no singular personalities; it is self-defeating to try to operate this way within a legislative body so I hope that my office, those who work with me, will similarly be working with you, both in terms of our local personnel and our Washington staff, that we, in turn,

will be working with the delegation of Congressman Akaka, Senators Matsunaga and Inouye.

Hawaii is a small State with a wonderful aloha 6,000 miles from the seat of government and we can't afford to dissipate our time and our energies except as we constructively determine what our problems are and what those potential solutions may be that we can agree upon. I have colleagues who leave Friday night and have dinner at home, who have breakfast at home Monday morning and are in the House to work on Monday. There is no such luxury for those of us who travel from Hawaii to Washington and so we have to operate in a somewhat different way. We almost have to develop a rapport in a way of knowing what is happening within our State through the bodies of government already here and so it is important if we are going to be effective, that we have dialogue; we learn to talk with each other about our problems, and this is a beginning.

From a personal standpoint, I went back after the ripe old age of fifty and said, 'Gee, I am a freshman again; a whole new experience of life; a whole learning process', and I would like to do it effectively. Part of that effectiveness will come from the ability to work with and communicate with you, with our State Administration, with all of the units of government in our State. Somebody was suggesting that a given problem shouldn't concern me because I was in the half of the island that wasn't worried about it and I said, 'That's like telling me I only have to feed the top half of my body.' There is just one Hawaii and this little Hawaii can't be split up into anything because it won't work, and as far as my impressions of Washington, I am going to quote my colleague, Danny Akaka -- 'I love the work but oh, that climate!'

My Mahalo to you and I look forward to seeing you again on Tuesday. Thank you."

At 12:50 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair, for the purpose of meeting the honoree, Congressman Cec Heftel.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:59 o'clock p.m.

#### INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

On motion by Representative Kihano, seconded by Representative Shito and carried, H.R. No. 320 was adopted.

At this time, Representative Kihano introduced the Queen and her court to the members of the House, as follows: Miss Kurumi Kaapana, Miss Leeward Oahu 1977; Delphia Walsh, first runner-up and Miss Congeniality; Karen Ushigusa, second runner-up; and Geraldine Banglos, Miss Popularity. Accompanying the Queen and her court were Dr. Stanley Yamane, General Chairman of the Pageant, and Dr. Dennis Kuwabara, Chapter President of the Leeward Oahu Jaycees.

A bouquet of red roses was presented to Miss Kaapana by Representative Shito. Bouquets of carnations were presented to Miss Walsh, Miss Ushigusa and Miss Banglos by Representatives Cayetano, Lunasco and Peters, respectively.

Representative Kihano then presented the honorees with certified copies of the resolution.

At 1:05 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair, for the purpose

of meeting the Queen and her court.

Upon reconvening at 1:13 o'clock p.m., Representative Kunimura introduced Mr. George Pascua, a Board of Water Supply Board member, from Kauai who was seated in the gallery.

At 1:15 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 1:17 o'clock p.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representative Sutton.

#### SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Yuen, seconded by Representative Kamalii and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering a resolution

A resolution (H.R. No. 321) requesting a solution to the problems of Kahoolawe was jointly offered by Representatives Peters, Abercrombie, Aki, Baker, Blair, Caldito, Campbell, Carroll, Cayetano, Dods, Evans, Fong, Garcia, Ikeda, Inaba, Kamalii, Kawakami, Kihano, Kiyabu, Kondo, Kunimura, Machida, Medeiros, Mina, Morioka, Naito, Narvaes, Say, Segawa, Shito, Stanley, Sutton, Suwa, Takamine, Takamura, Toguchi, Uechi, Ueoka, Ushijima, Uwaine, D. Yamada, K. Yamada, Yuen and Wakatsuki.

On motion by Representative Peters, seconded by Representative Machida and carried, H.R. No. 321 was adopted.

At this time, Representative Peters introduced the members of the Kahoolawe Aloha 'Aina 'Ohana, as follows: Brother George Helms, Billy Mitchell, Brother Dexter Gomes, Randy Kalahiki, and Brother Mel Kalahiki.

Representative Peters then requested "that the Speaker allow Mr. George Helms to address this honorable body."

The Chair replied: "Permission is granted" and asked, "Mr. Helm, will you please step forward to the rostrum."

The Chair then presented Mr. George Helms to the members of the House.

Mr. George Helms addressed the

members of the House, stating:

"Mahalo nui. Thank you for this opportunity. Forgive me while I need time to gather my thoughts. The privilege to speak to you folks comes about by invitation. I was invited here to speak by Mr. Peters and Mr. Yuen.

Yesterday, after the arraignment of two of the trespassers arrested on Kahoolawe, the 'Ohana who supported the movement marched to the rotunda here and we prayed and made statements to the media and said, 'Akua kokua Walter Ridley and Richard Sawyer whose lives are endangered by the possibility of bombs.' But moreso by the negligence of the politicians. If God can hear us, why cannot the politicians. That was the statement we made. That's all. I was walking away from the Capitol; I had nothing to say and I was asked to come here and I came. Mr. Peters asked me if I wanted to speak, or I was told that I could speak. I don't know; there was some confusion. When I found out I couldn't, I was ready to leave so I could do my work -- I have plenty of work outside of this arena. So he said, 'If there is anything I can do to speak for you', so I said, 'Well, we're coming up with a court order at two o'clock in Sam King's court to come up with a temporary restraining order and I only want is some reaction from the politicians.' Somebody, I don't know who. I am not going to point finger to no one, and I want somebody to intervene. We are arrested for trespassing and we are considered criminals.

We are motivated to pursue the action of protecting whatever is left of our culture and very basically, it is simple. The culture exists only if the life of the land is perpetuated in righteousness; that belongs to my ancestors. You folks are using this to get paid, to build your homes, to give your kids an education, to bring kids over here and listen to you give a political rhetoric. I came here to ask; to help some peoples' lives, and I am talking about possibility or probability and the science of mathematics help us guys figure out the odds and averages. Regardless of that fact, we are supposed to respond with a sensitivity to this emergency and we had no response from anybody except Mr. Peters, Mr. Yuen, Kinau Kamalii, Dan Akaka.

Our organization is one year old

and sitting in an office for a long time, I am sure everybody behind the powers of the political pedestal know my name. I come just to support the resolution and very grateful for having this opportunity upon invitation. This is a step forward in helping to bridge the gap between the politicians and the people who elect you here.

The bombs over there, for me, is not the danger; it's the negligence. For one year, my commitment is to Walter Ridley, Richard Sawyer and their wives who are on that aina, to make a meeting with the President of the United States, with Congressman Akaka and the Council of Hawaiian Organization, and I would put my life out for that meeting and six other people have done so. A potential lawyer has given his sacrifice. He could have been convicted for felony. The social worker could have lost his job and you should listen to what I have to say because you are being paid. We never had a chance to talk. This is the first time something like this is happening -- you guys are going to hear it. Please kokua; do something -- some reaction. Every county made a resolution -- County of Hawaii -- every county did. Bills have been passed and when something like this is happening, nothing is being done. All I'm asking for is a reaction, positive or negative, but please support us if you can, and we are talking about Aloha 'Aina 'Ohana and if you cannot understand it, go do your homework.

Mahalo."

Representative Peters then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, you know, yesterday, I stood up here and I made some allegations to this body about being complacent. I want to thank you today, everyone of you. I cannot express enough how I feel and how I have so much aloha for everyone of you for enduring what Brother Helms had to say; for enduring what he had to say yesterday. More importantly, we are breaking the rules of the House for the purpose of listening and being sensitive to what Brother Helms had to say, and if he is not going to thank you, I will from the bottom of my heart.

Ua mau ke ea o ka aina i ka pono -- 'The life of the land is perpetuated in righteousness.' And what is righteousness? Is it not righteous to prevent

the terrible destruction of a wonderful creation -- the soil and green of nature versus the fire the devastation of man? Is it not righteous to honor and preserve the culture of a people and prevent the further desecration of the remnants of that culture? Who is righteous? What is righteous? By whose standards do we judge the Kahoolawe Aloha 'Aina 'Ohana? They have been called criminals, the breakers of the law, because they, as Hawaiians, touched the soil of their ancestors. They have roots in the aina. Their ancestors lived and loved the aina. They lived by different laws, laws of a different culture. The laws that were broken were that of trespassing; a law imposed by men of one culture upon another; a law foreign to the people of Hawaii whose whole culture was based on the loving spirit of the land. Who is righteous? Who is the criminal and how do we perpetuate the life of our land, the life of Hawaii?

I believe the answer to that is by supporting Kahoolawe Aloha 'Aina 'Ohana in their efforts to preserve Kahoolawe; to save it from any further destruction and, moreso, to prevent Hawaiians from again becoming strangers in their own land.

Mr. Speaker, again, thank you, and to all of my colleagues, I thank you very much for having one of our brothers express his aina, his mana, his manao, on this problem.

Ua mau ke ea o ka aina i ka pono. Aloha."

At this time, Representative Kunimura rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Reference is made and truly made about trespassers and may I, at this time, clarify my position on trespassers or so-called trespassers.

Until the resolution was read through-out, Mr. Speaker, and listening to Brother Henry and carefully reflecting every word spoken by Brother Henry Peters, I felt until a few moments ago that the people who went to Kahoolawe were trespassers and in that sense, if they were convicted, they would be criminals. At this point, Mr. Speaker, may I say that how can the Hawaiians be trespassing in their own land because under the old Hawaiian law of the kuleanas and under Kamehameha's Law of the Broken Paddle, if these laws are respected today instead of some

foreign law, then these people would not be trespassers.

I totally agree, Mr. Speaker, that the very birth of this nation was through a violent revolution to overthrow tyranny and, if necessary, if Washington cannot be sensitive to the needs of Hawaii and respect its culture, then maybe Mr. Baker is correct. It is not too late; we can petition. I am against forcing violence but if need be, we can follow the founding fathers of this great country and exercise our rights, not only to protest, not only to petition, but rise up and face our oppressors.

Thank you."

Representative Takamura then rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would just like to express my thanks and mahalo to Representative Peters and the members of the 'Ohana for coming down today. I think, for myself, what struck me in this, my second term here, is that it gets quite easy, I think, a lot of times for us to get caught up in our own trips and procedures and processes and, I think, the thing that I felt today was a serve to remind me again that the things we do here and the things we don't do here do have an impact upon the people, upon the State, and upon the land and, I think, it is a good reminder and I think all of us have profitted from this experience and 'Mahalo' for coming down."

Representative Narvaes then rose on a point of privilege and stated:

"My family has been here for four generations; I have younger ones under me, and I have a friend sitting here and I have a friend sitting over there and I would really like to express my gratitude. I feel that the people of Hawaii feel the same way.

We have individuals that are willing to take sacrifices beyond what other people will do. It is their only way they can show the true feelings, their opposition to what is being done to Kahoolawe. These people should not be prosecuted. They are doing the thing that the only way they can get something done, that they can bring out visibility. I really want to express my gratitude

to these individuals.

Thank you."

At 1:40 o'clock p.m., on request by Representative Kamalii, the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representative reconvened at 1:41 o'clock p.m.

A resolution (H.R. No. 322) congratulating Celia Ueoka, 1977 Cornell College Sled Queen was jointly offered by Representatives Kondo, Baker, Blair, Caldito, Cayetano, Cobb, Garcia, Kihano, Kunimura, Larsen, Lunasco, Machida, Mina, Nakamura, Sutton, Toguchi, Ushijima, K. Yamada and Wakatsuki.

On motion by Representative Kondo, seconded by Representative Machida and carried, H.R. No. 322 was adopted.

Representative Ueoka, in response, stated:

"Mr. Speaker and members of this honorable body, I would like to express my appreciation for the resolution which was adopted. I would like to state that my daughter is an ordinary girl representing the youngsters from the great State of Hawaii.

Thank you very much to all of you."

The Chair replied:

"That is correct."

Representative Sutton then said:

"That might be conceived of as a bribe, sir, so I don't want to be a party to giving you a shirt."

The Chair replied: "I am not asking of you."

## NINETEENTH DAY

Monday, February 14, 1977

The House of Representatives of the Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1977, convened at 11:30 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

Representative Shito moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.R. No. 114 be adopted, seconded by Representative Ueoka.

Representative Sutton then rose, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against Standing Committee Report No. 33, House Resolution No. 114.

Mr. Speaker, we live on a very small island and we have just so much land, and we do need housing. I recognize that. But, you know in the Committee meetings, we had three beautiful spots within a radius

of three miles from where you stand. Now, if we're not careful, one of these days, we are going back and take these cane lands at Ewa, cane lands at Waipahu, and convert them into housing. They are already zoned urban. This is a very tricky thing.

Mr. Blackfield appeared before us last session and he practically put cane lands into housing. I do not wish to see that, sir. I want to preserve our cane lands and I feel that our Committee Report did not adequately present this picture.

When you make the referral, would you please tell them my objections, sir. Thank you."

The Chair replied:

"This is for adoption, not for referral, Representative Sutton."

Representative Shito was recognized and he stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I just want to say something about the resolution. We don't address the question of taking cane land; we are talking in terms of the current urban land that is already zoned urban; that the Hawaii Housing Authority work in conjunction with DLNR and define where this land area is. There is no intention as far as going into conservation or agricultural land, and I am very surprised that a member of the Committee would speak against the report when he signed the report free and clear."

Representative Sutton, in rebuttal, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, we have certain cane lands that have been zoned urban. That is the point, and the Committee Report does not reflect this temptation. There is a tremendous temptation to convert something that is agricultural into something that has a tremendous potential in housing, and it is that very temptation that I want to stop, and these lands are presently zoned in such a way that they can immediately be converted into housing and this is the testimony of Mr. Blackfield.

Thank you, sir."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. No. 114, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION URGING THE HAWAII HOUSING AUTHORITY TO MAKE GREATER USE OF URBAN

LANDS NEAR POPULATION CENTERS", was adopted, with Representatives Ikeda, Narvaes and Sutton voting no.

Representative Shito, for the Committee on Housing, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 34) recommending that H.R. No. 112 be adopted.

"Mr. Speaker, I consider it the obligation and responsibility of this body to set the direction for many of our State departments and assuring that they are supplementing our State efforts. . . State resources, in trying to secure as much outside sources of funds as possible in the implementation

of programs such as this. I consider it a derelict on our part not to have a resolution of this nature passed; not to initiate some very positive efforts on our part to secure money that is basically in the Federal system that is earmarked for this purpose. If we are not taking the initiative to secure these monies, then I think that our action is not in the best interest of the welfare of our constituency.

Thank you."

### THIRD READING

#### H.B. No. 326, HD 1:

Representative Suwa moved that H.B. No. 326, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Peters.

Representative Abercrombie then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill.

Mr. Speaker, I am speaking in favor of this bill with the greatest reluctance and the reason is that I can add -- \$803,000 is \$803,000 more than nothing. We don't take this \$803,000. As I expressed to the Chairman of the Finance Committee a few moments ago, I might be short, but I am not dumb. \$803,000 is all the Governor of the State is going to allow us to have on the island of Oahu.

You may recall, Mr. Speaker, that the recent President of the United States--not the most recent but former President of the United States, Mr. Ford--when discussing the financial circumstances in New York City, indicated at great length what it was that he intended for New York City. In his analysis of their economic and tax plight, New York Daily News summed up ex-President Ford's attitude towards New York City by saying: 'Ford says to New York, drop dead.' I think it contributed to his defeat in the last election.

I am maintaining to you, Mr. Speaker, that Governor Ariyoshi, by indicating to this body that he will release no more than \$803,000 to the island of Oahu is saying to the people of Oahu, 'drop dead', and he would have to answer for that in 1978.

Mr. Speaker, we passed an act, Act 226, last year and we passed it for good reason because this House, in another piece of legislation, had tried to make more equitable the costs of the taxpayers as a result of having to pay the property taxes on the certified real property tax valuation. We realize there might be some loss in moving that figure from 70 percent to 60 percent. We tried as best we could to anticipate it. We thought, at that time, that

the island of Oahu would be able to escape economic loss as a result and so we provided for our neighbor island counties who might be adversely affected, and rightly so. Unfortunately, Mr. Speaker, the Governor has chosen to have one standard for the neighbor island counties and another standard for the people of Oahu. Why he has done this, I cannot say. He will have to answer for it.

Mr. Speaker, I suggest that the letter that was delivered to you from the Governor which indicated the amounts of money that were given to the counties of Kauai, Hawaii and Maui utilize the formula which is not being applied to the island of Oahu; utilize the formula for the three neighbor island counties in concurrence with the intent of the legislation. He acted correctly toward those counties. Those counties suffered a loss of revenue as a result of the movement of the 70 percent to the 60 percent figure.

It is interesting to note that our bill, as originally before us, 226, indicated that the \$3,500,000 figure, approximately, was due to the loss of real property tax revenues due to the establishment of the 60 percent real property tax assessment ratio. Mr. Speaker, I suggest that that bill was worded correctly and that reflects the intent of this Legislature in passing Act 226. Unfortunately for the people of Oahu, the bill, in House Draft 1, now leaves out that phraseology I just read and substitutes, 'Due to the establishment of the 60 percent real property tax assessment ratio.' Why is it necessary to change that language? Why is it necessary to change \$3,529,088 that is due the people of the island of Oahu? Why is it necessary to substitute instead, in House Draft 1, the \$803,000 figure? It is because the Governor has made very clear to the Legislature, to you, in a letter to you, which you passed on to the Finance Committee, that \$803,000 is all he is going to allow. And yet, Mr. Speaker--I believe the members have before them a memo from me--you will find that the sum of \$3,529,088, not \$803,000, needs to be appropriated in order to make up the loss in revenue to the City and County of Honolulu which resulted from the change in the real property tax assessment ratio.

I cite for your attention, Mr. Speaker, that the certified real property tax valuation by the State Tax Director

for 1975-1976 was \$7,798,000,000; and that for 1976-1977, it is \$7,568,000,000, a difference of \$230 million. The tax rate for both years is \$15.37 for \$1,000. Therefore, in 1975-1976, the real property tax revenue to which the City and County is entitled is \$119,849,603; for 1976-1977, it is \$116,320,515. The difference is \$3,529,088.

Mr. Speaker, I can assure you, that number will be burned in my memory, and that I intend to cite that figure as often as anyone asks me why services may not be up to par in the City and County of Honolulu to the extent of \$3,529,088.

Mr. Speaker, the \$3,529,088 that I derived is the exact same formula that was utilized by the Governor in arriving at the amounts of money that will be given to the various neighbor counties. By utilizing that exact formula, the figure that I come up with for the County of Maui is \$397,925. The figure the Governor gave to Maui was \$397,928, a difference of \$3. For the County of Hawaii, my figures indicate that the sum should be \$2,471,130. The figure given to the County of Hawaii is \$2,471,145, a difference of only \$15, and for the County of Kauai, my figures indicate \$443,845, and the Governor gave Kauai \$443,838. He is doing the County of Kauai out of \$7. I wish the same could be said for the County of Oahu--the City and County of Honolulu on the island of Oahu. I will happily accept the difference in figures of \$7, but I will not accept \$3.5 million in difference.

What he has done and what he has indicated to this Legislature and to you in his letter dated February 3, 1977, is that he has taken the net collection of the City in 1975-1976 of some \$117 million against the certified real property tax valuation of 1976-1977 of \$116.3 million; subtracted that 1976 figure from that 1975 figure and come up with \$803,000. This is the only county in which that formula is being applied. In every other county, he took the 1976 figure against the 1975 figure and paid those counties the difference as was intended in our legislation last year. But where Oahu is concerned, he has taken the net collection rather than what we are entitled and made the difference \$803,000. It is unconscionable. If the Governor wants to say to the State that where Oahu is concerned, the people can 'drop dead', that is his business. If the Governor

wants to dictate to the Legislature as to what our intent should be as opposed to what he will do in terms of the powers now granted to him under Chapter 37 and other various provisions of the State law, he may do so. . ."

At this point, the Chair interrupted:

"Representative Abercrombie, will you confine your remarks to the bill. I think the Chair has been very tolerant in your discussion of this bill."

Representative Abercrombie replied:

"And rightly so, I might add, Mr. Speaker. Rightly so, because this bill would not be presented to us in this form this morning had we not been in the position, trying to act responsibly as legislators, of having the Executive tell us what he will allow and what he will not allow and trying to force on us, as a Legislature, the approbium, the blame, for what happens in the financial and fiscal circumstances in the State.

We acted correctly in the passage of Act 226. We would act correctly if this bill, as originally introduced, would be passed, but the Finance Chairman and the Legislature, in its wisdom--I take it now--is going to act realistically and say, 'Yes, we will accept the \$803,000 here in the City and County of Honolulu.' We need those funds and my answer to the rest of it is where your neighbor counties are concerned, 'Good luck; take the money and run; no question in my mind', if I was a member of the county government in those counties that will accept those figures and gladly so. Not only is it deserved, but we have it.

But what of the people of Oahu? What are we to do? We are to take the lower figure and so I will vote 'yes', but I do so making it very clear that I, for one, resent the fact that the Legislature is being put into the position of having to deal with the Executive in a manner which says as follows: 'You may try to legislate; you may try to set policy; but I will tell you what is acceptable to me and if it is unacceptable to you, that is too bad.' My attitude is this, Mr. Speaker, that we should legislate in a manner which we think appropriate to serving the public interest, not only on the island of Oahu, but all the neighbor island counties as well throughout the State.

If the Governor, in his or her wisdom, choses subsequently to say that programs or acts of the Legislature involving appropriations must be less, then, let that Governor take the responsibility as the Chief Executive for promulgating such a view. But to come to us and say ahead of time before the legislation is passed, this is what I will do and this you must react to, I think, is a breach of the separation of powers in government and what I say in conclusion then is this: That this is something this Legislature must address regardless of how you feel on this particular issue, my friends, regardless of whether you agree or disagree with me on this particular issue. There is no question in my mind that we must come to grips with the proper role of the Legislature and the Executive in guiding the destiny of this State.

If it is not this issue, it will be another issue, especially in circumstances of financial crisis. We must resolve as to whether or not we are indeed the policymakers of this State; whether our election here, the sacrifices and suffering that not only we, ourselves, may have gone through, but of all our supporters and all their beliefs in us are well justified and well deserved.

At this time, I think we are in a drift. This particular bill brings it into focus. But on the wider issues, we are in a drift as to exactly what our role is in the Legislature. Perhaps it will be addressed in the Constitutional Convention. I don't know; I can't say at this time, but I urge all of us here when you vote for this bill. . ."

At this point, the Chair called "Representative Abercrombie. . ."

Representative Abercrombie replied:

"Will you indulge me thirty seconds, Mr. Speaker? It is \$3.5 million; you can indulge me thirty seconds."

The Chair then said:

"Well, we have rules that apply to everybody."

At this point, Representative Garcia yielded his time to Representative Abercrombie and directed by the Chair to "proceed", Representative Abercrombie continued, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, quite right, we do have rules and what I am saying here is that the rules we operate under are only as good as our commitment

and understanding of how those rules are applied to the legislative process. And what I am indicating is, I hope, in a positive way, is that all of us here assembled have the obligation, I believe, at this time, not just as a result of this bill, but of the discussions that we are having in virtually every committee that I attend now, to examine what our role will be. This will be in the Executive and our obligations to the people of the State of Hawaii.

In that light, Mr. Speaker, I ask my colleagues to vote 'yes' on this bill and I ask them to carry with them, after we leave the Chamber today, within the conversations that we have in the committee sessions and legislation, they will come before us afterwards, a cognizance of what it is that we intend and what our relationship to the Executive shall be and whether we shall report at the end of this session, we carried out the peoples' will.

Thank you."

At 12:29 o'clock p.m., on request by Representative Kamalii, the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:40 o'clock p.m.

At this time, Representative Suwa was recognized and he stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of House Bill No. 326, House Draft 1, that is before the House at the present time.

Mr. Speaker, the previous speaker has eloquently expressed as to the administrative power and that of the legislative policymaking role of appropriating funds, but that is another issue at this time. At some other time, we can discuss the role relating to the estimated revenue falling short, where the Governor has the power to restrict.

In light of that, Mr. Speaker, Act 226 appropriated \$990,000 for the County of Kauai, but the Governor is releasing \$423,000 plus; and for the County of Hawaii, the Legislature appropriated \$3,010,000, the Governor allotted \$2,471,000 plus; and for the County of Maui, the Legislature appropriated \$1,900,000, the Governor intends to release \$397,928.

Mr. Speaker, likewise, the previous speaker, as to the role of legislative appropriation, I am not happy also, Mr. Speaker, but under the circumstances, regarding the projection made by the Administration that he is allotting and restricting certain amounts based on the fact that the allotment will be no more than that of the previous revenue but, Mr. Speaker, the basis here is that the Committee had gone over these areas and have concluded that based on the revenue estimate made by the Administration, that when the fiscal year ends on June 30, 1977, there will be a 7 percent increase from that of the previous years. By doing so, it will give the Governor full authority in restricting funds.

Regarding that section, whether I agree with that estimate or not, Mr. Speaker, it is immaterial at this time because, likewise, I have the same finding as that of the previous speaker and we are to address that at some other time and in a different section of the law. But on this appropriated amount and the intention of the Governor to allot this amount, will leave a net balance of about \$1.5 million that will be used back within the Financial Plan.

The Committee had deliberated that in allotting \$3.5 million at this time, and the Legislature appropriating \$3.5 million, and the Governor allotting \$803,000 will leave about \$2,697,000 committed which the Legislature, at this time, can better spend that money in some program area that we would like to see to stir the economy of the State of Hawaii. Therefore, whether we agree as to the amount or what we would have done on Act 226, we have some misgivings as to the allotment made to the counties, but in light of the financial condition as projected by the Administration, the Committee has decided to go into a better route that we shall preserve the \$2.6 million and probably disburse in this coming biennial budget.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Abercrombie was recognized and he stated:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would not have risen again had it not been that many members asked me during the recess why, if I felt the way I did, that I did not enter an amendment, but the reason had

just been stated by the Finance Chairman.

Mr. Speaker, I think he has stated the situation exactly as he explained it to me personally in caucus and now explained it on the floor. This is a circumstance in which the Financial Plan of the House of Representatives will suffer over \$2 million if we put the figure in now, knowing that the Governor will only release \$803,000. If we did that, it would be almost a capricious act on our part to do so, and I don't think that we should. The issue has been raised now, I think adequately, and to do otherwise would tpe up those millions of dollars; get us into an argument over it; and I think it would be a disservice to the people of the City and County of Honolulu.

I respect the Finance Chairman's reasoning on that; otherwise, I wouldn't blame him if he did not vote now for wanting simply to recommit the bill because if we are going to have an argument over that amount of money and subtract it from the Financial Plan that we have before us now, it will only inhibit the Finance Committee and the rest of the committees from understanding what it is. In fact, we will have available to us to legislate with so that is the reason why I am not entering an amendment and that is the reason why I urge very much that we vote this bill through now and just keep in mind, I hope, some of the remarks to the extent they were appropriate."

Representative Sutton then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to indicate the veracity of the Finance Chairman.

Mr. Speaker, we have a bill before us and I believe that the intentional part of all legislation is what the court looks to. If the court were to interpret the legislation that we have, it would read Section 1 and Section 1 reads as follows: 'The purpose of this Act is to provide an additional. . .'"

The Chair interrupted:

"Representative Sutton, are you speaking for the bill?"

Representative Sutton replied:

"I can't hear."

The Chair asked:

"Are you speaking in favor of the bill?"

Receiving an affirmative reply, the Chair directed Representative Sutton to "proceed" and Representative Sutton continued, stating:

"The purpose of this Act is to provide an additional one time grant-in-aid to the City and County of Honolulu as an adjustment due to the establishment of the 60 percent real property tax assessment."

Mr. Speaker, we have four counties. We worked out a formula. The formula was worked out in the Finance Committee on the basis of the fact of net figures. Forget the restrictions; forget the appropriations. Kauai got \$443,000; Hawaii \$2,471,000; and Maui, \$397,000. Those were the figures upon which a formula was based. There was no coercion that we had to submit to from the Executive. He is of a different party than me, sir, and I think that is well known. I don't think there was any coercion that I would submit to on the part of the City and County of Honolulu or any other counties. I sat down and I took a calculating machine. I figured these net figures for the other counties and then I addressed my mind to what the actual collections were for the City and County of Honolulu for the current fiscal year because the whole point of our bill was to make up that deficit. We are not talking about anything else but making up that deficit and the Finance Chairman, in my opinion, has acted with complete integrity and I, as a member of the other party, support him one hundred percent.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Abercrombie then rose on a point of order and stated:

"There has been no suggestion by anybody in this Chamber at any time that the integrity of the Finance Chairman is at question. I resent that implication."

Representative Kunimura was recognized and he stated:

"If you would like for me to be quiet, I will accede to your wishes. I thought I read in your face a sense

of disgust seeing me stand up so often today, but I would like to beseech you to give me an opportunity to express my innermost feeling on this particular bill."

Directed by the Chair to "proceed", Representative Kunimura continued:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill with firm reservations because I personally feel that \$803,000 is more than what the City Administration deserves and I would like to construct a case with moral support of the good counsel from Manoa. . . I mean Nuuanu. I do not have the kind of vocabulary that would permit me to give a flowery speech, but I would like to delve in the area of bonds.

Mr. Speaker, from my personal investigation, the City and County of Honolulu has leeway in the bonded indebtedness ceiling of a little over a billion dollars that they can go out and sell bonds for, and if you take this into consideration, the other neighbor island counties are very heavily indebted bondwise.

I remember very, very clearly, Mr. Speaker, that the State of Hawaii has been very generous, especially to our adversary from the City Administration. I remember in 1974 when we were already starting to decline in our financial capabilities, we were still providing grants-in-aid and the Administration, whether he is right or wrong, let the people decide--he has refused to go into general obligation bonds for the City and County of Honolulu but rather to put long-term capital investment by cash. I remember in 1974, a direct challenge was made to, not only the then acting Governor, but to all of us that we were a bunch of nincompoops; that we didn't know how to run the State's financial business and he offered to make a loan to the State of Hawaii if we would pay him a reasonable interest. This man, Mr. Speaker, has not even had the guts to appear before the Finance Committee to testify his case.

I remember the few weeks back when the Managing Director of the City and County of Honolulu appeared before the Finance Committee and I queried him as to which position--Oahu versus neighbor island--and as I tried to, in my very feeble way, explain and exploit the history of Hawaii, that in the past the neighbor islands, through their blood and

sweat, raised practically all the pineapples and all the sugar cane, and the general excise tax was paid in Honolulu. Most of the development that were then constructed on Oahu were paid for by heavy neighbor island efforts and I asked him if he begrudged us if now we would like to have some help from the State government to build up our economic base so we too can be emancipated from this heavy yoke and he agreed with me. In essence, he disagreed with the City Administration.

Now, if the City and County of Honolulu had a policy of building CIP projects on bonds on projects that have long standing life, I would be more than sympathetic but believe me, Mr. Speaker, and members of this House, that 'animal' that sits in the head of the City and County government is a 'political animal' and he is going to take the people of this State or the people of this particular county to destroy him or he is going to gobble you up, and I would like to serve this as a warning that I have never seen anybody that can pull a cheaper political stunt than that man that heads the City Administration.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Peters was recognized and he stated:

"I realize that this body, after working in this profession, has something like two years now. . . by the way, I speak in favor of the bill. . . bend over backwards to earmark monies for the City and County of Honolulu. Just by way of an example, Mr. Speaker, there has been allegations made, pressures placed on us from across the way in the City and County level, that we are not being responsible to the City and County of Honolulu.

I would like to go on record as saying that that's a lie and, just by way of an example, citing some specific activities and specific instances; in the 1973-1974 fiscal year, we gave the City and County of Honolulu \$8.7 million--just by way of grants-in-aid; \$8.7 million in 1974-1975; \$7.5 million in 1975-1976, and that is only grants-in-aid.

This talk about CIP activities--this is a very sensitive point to me because in the area that I represent out in Waianae, being an older community, having been in existence for a number

of years now, they came in under the comprehensive zoning code, the building code, and the other codes that you now find by way of ordinances on the City and County level and, as a consequence, the roads, our water lines, our sewer system, are below standard. I consider it highly contradictory on the part of the City and County of Honolulu. On one hand, tell the State, all of us here, to float bonds and incur the cost and incur the debt of providing services like this, services that are clearly the function and responsibility of the City and County of Honolulu. And when we look across the street seeking cooperation, we find that the Administrator there has maintained a posture of not wanting to assist; not wanting to cooperate with us in terms of floating bonds.

It is communities like Waianae, like Waialua--the fringes, the peripheral edges of Oahu--that are affected; Waimanalo, you name it. We are the ones being affected. We are the ones being prejudiced against. Many of you who are legislators from Oahu, residing in Honolulu proper, who enjoy all those amenities, but not us.

I think it is time that the City and County of Honolulu face up to its responsibilities to all of its constituencies, and not to only a few favored ones who reside here in Honolulu proper. We demand, Mr. Speaker, equal treatment. We pay the same taxes and, just by way of an example, there are a number of areas out there in Waianae that are zoned residential; as a consequence, the tax rates are on the residential basis but they can't subdivide. They have to pay higher taxes for the use of their property but, yet, they cannot enjoy the same amenities. Now, how inconsistent can you get?

I think the facts had better be laid down very clearly and let me cite another example here too. You talk about bonds that we are floating--okay? This is only in terms of interest that the State is now paying on those bonds that have been given; on those monies that have been given to the City and County of Honolulu. In fiscal year 1973-1974, we paid interest to the tune of \$3.9 million; 1974-1975, \$6.7 million; 1975-1976, \$5.8 million. This is only interest. Approximately 5 percent of the total amount that is basically given over

and beyond the principal, the actual amount given to the City and County of Honolulu. I am not going to stand here and have someone across the street dictate to us that we gotta do all these different things that are clearly the responsibility of the City and County of Honolulu. They don't administer education; they don't administer health activities like many other counties throughout the continental United States. We gotta incur the debt; we gotta incur the liability and the responsibility for servicing people and, yet, in addition to that, we still gotta reach out and help and help and help.

The people out in Waianae and the people residing in the peripheral edges of Honolulu are being affected; are not being serviced properly. I think it is about time that the record be set straight.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 326, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION TO THE CITY AND COUNTY OF HONOLULU", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes, with Representatives Nakamura, Segawa and Takamine being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 326 had passed Third Reading at 1:01 o'clock p.m.

At 1:02 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:03 o'clock p.m.

Representative Kunimura, at this time, rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, on the introduction of bills, the Legislative Management Committee would like to request all members of the House when they sign the bills, sign it with a Marsh pen because it is causing some difficulty in the reproduction of the signature page. So that we don't have to go through the more expensive process of trying to darken the signatures with the Xerox machine and then have a photograph made, if everybody would use the Marsh pen. Thank you."

The Chair then stated:

"The Chair, at this time, would like to remind all members to check your schedules, attend your Committee hearings and meetings. It is my understanding that the attendance has been very spotty."

ADJOURNMENT

At 1:05 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative Yuen, seconded by Representative Kamalii and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned to 11:30 o'clock a.m. tomorrow, Wednesday, February 16, 1977.

## TWENTY-SECOND DAY

Thursday, February 17, 1977

The House of Representatives of the Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1977, convened at 11:30 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Mel Walter of the First Baptist Church (Windward), after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Dods and D. Yamada, who were excused.

"A man who has contributed much to the progress of Hawaii's social evolution; a man that has stood by his guns and the ammunition was the ballot. There are many countries around the world, Mr. Speaker and members of this House, and social changes are made by violent revolution and civil war, but this man chose to change by way of the ballot; a man who has contributed to the growth of the labor organization in Hawaii; thereby, building the labor's right, contributed to spilling over the rights of all the citizens of Hawaii."

On motion by Representative Say, seconded by Representative Yuen and carried, H.R. No. 367 was adopted.

Representative Say, upon being recognized, stated:

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, it is an honor being here in front of you all this morning in addressing the Narcissus Queen and her princesses.

The annual Narcissus Festival is a tradition that I believe is part of our unique multi-cultural festivals in this State. Being the Chairman of the Cultural and the Arts Committee, I've learned a lot. I've learned to respect the Chinese, Japanese, Hawaiian, Samoan, Filipino, Portugese and all of them.

With the observance of this festival, each of us can actively enjoy the reflections of the past which has been retained in Hawaii for many years. In Hawaii, we are especially proud of our multi-cultural education for the enjoyment of all.

In this year of the snake, I would like to congratulate the Queen and her princesses."

At this time, Representative Say introduced the Queen and her princesses who were presented with bouquets of red roses by the following: Representative Kiyabu to Queen Deborah Lin Heong Chun; Representative Mina to 1st princess, Lorraine Ngit Inn Ching; Representative Uwaine to 2nd princess, Muriel Wai Sin Goo; and Representative Fong to 3rd princess, Cindy Soi Jun Loui.

Representative Kunimura presented them with certified copies of the resolution.

Representative Say then introduced Mr. Anthony Ching, past president of the Chinese Chamber of Commerce, and Warren Yee, president-elect of the Chinese Chamber of Commerce. Representative Yuen, at this time, presented the bouquet for the fourth princess, Joanne Yuk Lin Yee, to Mr. Ching.

The Chair then appointed Representatives Say, Kondo, Yuen, Blair, Dods and Fong to "escort Queen Deborah Chun to the rostrum in order that she may share with us some of her experiences and thoughts."

The Chair then introduced Queen Deborah, stating:

"Members of the House and ladies and gentlemen, it is my distinct honor and privilege to present to you, Queen Deborah Chun."

Queen Deborah then addressed

the members of the House as follows:

"Thank you for the kind words - all of them. At this time, I would like to say that we are very happy and delighted to be here and we are very honored by this resolution that you have presented to us.

I would like to wish you, on behalf of the entire Chinese Chamber, Kung Hee Fat Choy. Today, this is the first day of the year of the snake.

Thank you."

At 11:52 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:57 o'clock a.m.

A resolution (H.R. No. 368) congratulating the Hilo Vulcan basketball team was jointly offered by Representatives K. Yamada, Segawa, Abercrombie, Ajifu, Aki, Baker, Blair, Caldito, Campbell, Carroll, Cayetano, Cobb, Dods, Evans, Garcia, Ikeda, Inaba, Kamalii, Kawakami, Kihano, Kiyabu, Kondo, Kunimura, Larsen, Machida, Medeiros, Mina, Mizuguchi, Naito, Nakamura, Narvaes, Peters, Poepoe, Shito, Sutton, Suwa, Takamine, Takamura, Uechi, Ueoka, Ushijima, Uwaine, D. Yamada, Yuen and Wakatsuki.

On motion by Representative K. Yamada, seconded by Representative Segawa and carried, H.R. No. 368 was adopted.

Representative K. Yamada then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I am proud to present to this honorable body a young, handsome man from Hilo, who is perhaps the talk of the town. And, Mr. Speaker, I'm not referring to myself.

Mr. Speaker, as the head coach of the University of Hawaii at Hilo Vulcans basketball team, Mr. Jimmy Yagi has compiled an enviable record of sixteen wins and two losses for seeding in the NAIA District II playoffs. His record included wins over the University of Nebraska, University of New Mexico, and the latest tromp over the University of Alaska of Anchorage by the score of 83-47.

The Vulcans are now contending for a berth in the NAIA playoffs and the possibility of even hosting the playoffs in Hilo.

Jimmy's record is especially enviable, Mr. Speaker, considering that he is a part-time coach in pay, but he expends a great deal of time in actuality in training for the games.

At this time, Mr. Speaker, with your permission, I would like to have Representative Stanley present the lei to Mr. Yagi and call on Representative Segawa to present the resolution congratulating the Vulcans. I would also like to call on Representative Suwa to present the resolution congratulating Mr. Yagi for being selected as 'Man of the Year'. That resolution was acted upon some weeks ago, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Stanley proceeded to present the honoree with a red carnation lei and Representatives Segawa and Suwa presented him with certified copies of the resolutions.

The Chair then stated:

Representative Ikeda then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, recently I was honored to address the Hawaii Science Career Workshop held at the University of Hawaii, which was funded by a grant from the National Science

Foundation. The purpose of that workshop was to encourage women, incidentally, it was a workshop for women, to pursue careers in science.

I am deeply honored, this morning, to introduce to this body a young lady who is living proof that potential does exist in this field of endeavor for young ladies. May I introduce to this honorable body, Ms. Katherine Takaki, her grandmother, Mrs. Uchida (seated in the gallery), and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Takaki."

Representative Dods then presented the honoree with a red and white carnation lei and Representative Ikeda presented her with certified copies of the resolution.

A resolution (H.R. No. 370) honoring Kazu Komura was jointly offered by Representatives Takamine, Abercrombie, Ajifu, Aki, Baker, Blair, Caldito, Campbell, Carroll, Cayetano, Cobb, Dods, Evans, Fong, Garcia, Ikeda, Inaba, Kamalii, Kawakami, Kihano, Kiyabu, Kondo, Kunimura, Larsen, Lunasco, Machida, Medeiros, Mina, Mizuguchi, Morioka, Naito, Nakamura, Narvaes, Peters, Poepoe, Say, Segawa, Shito, Stanley, Sutton, Suwa, Takamura, Toguchi, Uechi, Ueoka, Ushijima, Uwaine, D. On motion by Representative K. Yamada, seconded by Representative Segawa, H.R. No. 371 was adopted.

By unanimous consent, the following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 372 to 377) and concurrent resolutions (H.C.R. Nos. 55 and 56) were referred to the Committee on Legislative Management and further action was deferred until February 22, 1977:

A resolution (H.R. No. 372) requesting the Department of Health to submit

a progress report on its '208' water quality planning program was jointly offered by Representatives Kawakami and Blair.

A concurrent resolution (H.C.R. No. 55) requesting an audit of the Department of Land and Natural Resources was jointly offered by Representatives K. Yamada, Aki, Baker, Blair, Caldito, Dods, Evans, Garcia, Ikeda, Inaba, Kawakami, Kihano, Kondo, Lunasco, Mina, Nakamura, Narvaes, Peters, Poepoe, Say, Segawa, Shito, Suwa, Takamine, Takamura, Toguchi, Uechi, Yuen and Wakatsuki.

A concurrent resolution (H.C.R. No. 56) requesting the U.S. Congress to enact legislation to compensate or to make reparation to Hawaiians for damages suffered by them at the time of annexation. was jointly

offered by Representatives Peters and Kunimura.

At 12:10 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:38 o'clock p.m.

#### SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Yuen, seconded by Representative Kamalii and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of taking up bills on Third Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar.

#### THIRD READING

The following bills, which were on the calendar for Third Reading, were read throughout and the following actions taken:

##### H.B. No. 372, HD 1:

Representative D. Yamada moved that H.B. No. 372, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Cobb.

Representative Abercrombie, upon being recognized, spoke in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the word 'saloon' is derived from the word 'salon'.

In times past, the salon was a large room for a formal reception populated by a fashionable assembly. It was an aristocratic privilege. The common people had no place in it.

With the advance of democracy, those of us who probably trace their ancestry to those common people who took the fashionable out of the assembly and added informality to the gathering, saw the establishment of that worthy institution, the saloon.

The word 'saloon', Mr. Speaker, is defined in Webster's as a bar for alcoholic drinks. A bar, I might note, Mr. Speaker, is defined as a counter or a room containing it where alcohol is served. I think it is also important to note that it is a railing enclosing a space occupied by lawyers. I have been in bars, Mr. Speaker, where it is difficult to separate the counter from the railing when the lawyers were involved.

It is, likewise, noted, Mr. Speaker, as the large reception room. Both designations, it seems to me, are appropriate, although I have spent a good deal of time in small saloons. However, my reception was always excellent, especially when I was buying. And if the room wasn't large, the crowd was - at least when the House was buying.

And, so, Mr. Speaker, let us amend this section in favor of the saloon, an institution associated with high spirits and, above all, bring back the saloon with all of its nostalgic connotations of that gone, but not forgotten symbol of simpler days - the free lunch. Who knows, maybe some saloon will open up and offer us one for old times sake."

The motion was put by the Chair and H.B. No. 372, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ADVERTISING UPON LICENSED PREMISES", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes, with Representatives Kihano, Machida and Takamine being excused.

##### H.B. No. 228, HD 1:

On motion by Representative D. Yamada, seconded by Representative Cobb, H.B. No. 228, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FOREIGN CORPORATIONS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes, with Representatives Kihano, Machida and Takamine being excused.

##### H.B. No. 259:

Representative D. Yamada moved that H.B. No. 259, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Cobb.

At this time, Representative Cayetano rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, as I understand it, from the Committee report, the purpose of this bill is to amend the real estate licensing law to conform with the real estate trade practice of engaging licensees as independent contractors.

It is my understanding, Mr. Speaker, that the primary objective of this law is to deal with some internal revenue problems real estate people have been experiencing.

I am voting for this bill with the understanding that this bill does not mandate that all persons who are 'real estate salesmen' shall upon adoption of this law be considered as independent contractors. It is my understanding that this bill merely reaffirms the existing practice of determining independent contractors on a case by case basis, taking into account factors such as who controls the salesmen, method in which wages are paid, etc.

I state my reservation, Mr. Speaker, because if my understanding of this bill is incorrect and real estate salesmen are now going to be considered independent contractors, then the ramifications of this bill go far beyond internal revenue problems. They will pose policy questions which we must consider. I hope the real estate industry, if this bill is ever passed, takes that into account.

With that understanding of this bill, Mr. Speaker, I urge everyone to vote for it."

Representative D. Yamada then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I would just like to state that Representative Cayetano's understanding of the bill is correct."

Representative Kunimura then asked the Chair the following:

"I would like to have you rule on a conflict of interest. I have a real estate brokers license which I have never used and I would like for you to rule."

The Chair ruled "no conflict", which was also applicable to the following for the same reason: Representatives Sutton, Kondo and Dods.

The motion was put by the Chair and H.B. No. 259, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO REAL ESTATE BROKERS AND SALESMEN", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes, with Representatives Kihano, Machida and Takamine being excused.

H.B. No. 685, HD 1:

Representative Suwa moved that H.B. No. 685, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Peters.

Representative Sutton then rose

to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the purpose of this bill is to increase the rate of interest from a penalty of one-half percent to one full percent. That will be applicable to late payments. Now late payments is defined as something that is 60 days overdue from the receipt of the bill.

Mr. Speaker, I have had the privilege of talking to various department heads and they have said to me that this is what happens. At the end of the month the obligee, who has rendered his services, submits a bill. That is the usual practice in business. They don't submit it at the time. They wait till the end of the month. Then the bill comes into the department. Then the department has to check it with an invoice, or if it was a bid, to check it with the contract. The invoice and, if there is, a contract are then sent to B & F. It's at B & F that the log jam occurs. And yet in this bill, you will find that the party responsible for any late payment must bear the cost of the interest. And you will also find that that particular obligation rests with B & F for the delay.

Now, looking at the other side of the coin, I hold in my hand the latest issue of TIME magazine. I will read from the President of the United States, who happens to be of the same party, Mr. Speaker, as you, Mr. Jimmy Carter, and he said: 'I have asked each and every department of government, including the White House, to cut all unnecessary expenses and I hope the state and municipal governments will do likewise'. And that was Mr. Jimmy Carter.

Now, Mr. Speaker, at the present time we look at the history, we put in one-half percent penalty if we are late - that adds up to 6% a year. And if we put this bill into effect, it will be 12% a year.

Now, Mr. Speaker, there is a very good customer in the government. Lots of us would love to have the government as somebody that owes us money. You know, and I know, and the other attorneys in this House know, that it is very difficult, sometimes we don't collect our bills for six years.

We also know that in economically troubled situations, it is very often that they put a reserve for bad debts,

and that reserve for bad debts means that something hasn't been collected for a year.

Now, why should we put the State of Hawaii in a position where it has to put out an additional half a percent because of a log jam up in B & F, and we charge responsibility to a department that did not have that responsibility.

Mr. Speaker, I submit to you that we should follow the basic concept of cutting the cost of government. This will mean additional staffing in each and every department to make sure that they are paying their bills on time. This is a waste of bureaucratic inefficiency we do not wish to have, Mr. Speaker.

And, Mr. Speaker, this bill, therefore, does not accomplish the mission but does something counter-productive - and, that is, increase the cost of government.

I would ask my colleagues to think this over in their minds and then vote 'no'."

Representative Suwa then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the previous speaker seems to substantiate, in some of his analogy used, that this bill is required. The purpose of this bill is to raise the interest rate from one-half percent to one percent, and that the agency that is going to be penalized is where the delay occurs.

Mr. Speaker, perennial complaints from businessmen is that the government is somewhat reneging or delaying payment of the bill. Therefore, it is more than natural that government should act like business - where the bill is supposed to be paid, it should be paid.

The previous speaker says we need additional staff. I don't think additional staffing is required. The primary reason for putting the penalty on the front line agency is that the method used is not to the best performance. For example, one goes on vacation and the bills or statements pile up until he comes back. I think during that time some accountant should be taking over this particular responsibility. There are many, many more areas and methods that the government should streamline. The previous speaker blames B & F, but primarily

it should have been DAGS, where the final payment is made. The government has a system set up, but none of their front line agencies follow the schedule. Therefore, what this bill is trying to do is penalize the department that is neglecting to meet the good accounting standards for the government.

Therefore, I ask the members to support this bill."

Representative Kunimura, speaking in favor of the bill, stated:

"I am rather flabbergasted today to hear from such a learned person the misinterpretation of our President's message to cut the cost in government. Mr. Speaker, what Mr. Carter said was to cut out the bureaucratic red tape, to cut out the unnecessary spending of government.

I would like to say that this bill is not going to help only the businessmen, but it is going to help the entire general public of this State because when the State government or the County government fails to pay on time, the vendor must go to the bank and borrow the money to pay all his costs. And then the cost of borrowing the money is going to be reflected on what he charges for whatever he sells to other people.

Mr. Speaker, I have seen over and over again when people slap on the interest rate, the bill gets paid. And I don't think the State of Hawaii or the County governments should renege on their obligations.

It has also been told to us that many of the people that do business with the State of Hawaii or the County governments are afraid to slap on the interest because of retaliation. This bill, Mr. Speaker, makes it positive that by law they shall pay the interest, and no longer the people who do business with the State of Hawaii will have to be afraid of any sort of retaliation, because it is going to be the law that the department is going to be compelled to pay the interest.

So, therefore, Mr. Speaker, I feel that this bill, although it looks innocuous, is the very beginning of a better relationship of our government with the people.

Thank you."

Representative Sutton then rose and, upon being recognized, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, first of all, I would like to correct the statement of the last speaker and then I would like to rebut the statements of the previous speaker.

Mr. Speaker, if we read this bill, it says: 'Any person who renders a proper statement for goods delivered or services performed, pursuant to contract, to any agency of the State or county. . . ' We are not just a State here. We are talking about counties. This means the entire government. And we are telling the counties that they are going to have to pay this interest too. This specifically includes them in, sir. We are not just talking about the State of Hawaii. So we are doubly violating the precept announced by Jimmy Carter, whose picture, incidentally, is in my room, sir, with an autograph and an autograph of his wife, if you want to see it.

Now, Mr. Speaker, going back to the first speaker, he gave a very good example. He said a man is on vacation and the bill isn't paid. Now, this means that when your man is on vacation, you're so scared of having this excessive interest rate occur, that you gotta staff an additional man to take that man's place during his vacation to make sure that the bills are paid. The very type of bureaucratic increase, sir, that you in your inaugural address here told us we should try to stop. So, we are violating not only Jimmy Carter, but James Wakatsuki."

The Chair remarked:

"Representative Sutton, I think you ought to read the Journal again."

Representative Abercrombie, speaking "in favor of the bill and to rebut the last speaker", stated:

"I could only wish, Mr. Speaker, that the last speaker's attitude had been prevalent at the time he was my landlord. If it had been that way, perhaps I could have avoided the payment of my rent on time. But, as I noted, every month when I went down to the Malihini Hotel to see the previous speaker, he was always happy to receive it on time."

Representative Takamura then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I think we should remember

that government has the responsibility to be efficient but we also have the responsibility to be consistent and to make sure our credit is good.

You know, I remember in a discussion in the Finance Committee, one of the previous speakers raised a strong point to the members of the Tax Department about delinquent tax payments. I think that if we are going to be consistent, if we are going to be demanding that the people who owe us money pay up on time, we should also pay our debts on time, too. I think this is what we are trying to do with this bill.

I also think, as we discussed this particular proposal as it relates to rendering payments in the Public Employment Committee, it was brought out that when the government doesn't pay their bill on time, many times we force, especially small independent businessmen, in a situation where they sometimes have been forced to close. I think because of this we have to, one, better pin point the responsibility where these kinds of things are happening in our system and, secondly, I think we have to make sure that we make adequate payments back to these people for any kind of suffering or loss that have incurred.

So, if we are going to demand from the people of the State of Hawaii that they pay their debts to us on time, I think we should also do the same to the people."

Representative Sutton then rose and when asked to state his point by the Chair, he said:

"I rise, sir, in the rules here that says that it is a right of rebuttal if a different point has been brought out."

The Chair then answered:

"The Chair does not share that view. The House Rules indicate that a person shall have the right to speak on the same subject matter two times, and if he wants to speak more than twice, he must have the consent of the House."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 685, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC PURCHASE", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 42 ayes to 6 noes, with Representatives Carroll, Evans, Fong, Narvaes,

Poepoe and Sutton voting no, and Representatives Kihano, Machida and Takamine being excused.

H.B. No. 16, HD 1:

Representative Suwa moved that H.B. No. 16, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Peters.

Upon being recognized, Representative Sutton rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the purpose of this bill was to provide specific authorization for the publication of replacement volumes of the Hawaii Revised Statutes and then to set a minimum sale price thereof.

Now, Mr. Speaker, we are going to publish 5,000 sets of this replacement volume. This will allow the public to know what we're doing. We're a law factory here, Mr. Speaker, and we're manufacturing laws and we're legislating. And these laws, in turn, affect the rights and the duties and privileges of all the citizenry. It is important, Mr. Speaker, that the citizenry be aware. We live in a day and age of awareness; this is one of the basic concepts of awareness; one of the laws of the jurisdiction I live in.

And, therefore, it is exceedingly important that nobody live in a vacuum and not know these laws, because as you so well know, Mr. Speaker, ignorance of the law is no excuse of the violation of the law. And, therefore, Mr. Speaker, it would be very wise to make a dissemination of these laws, something that would be easily feasible. But what do they do? On one hand they publish 5,000 volumes. That's fine. But then, they put a price of \$150.00. Mr. Speaker, that is very, very high. Seventy-five dollars would be much more in line. In the State of California, the State of Oregon, the State of Washington and the State of Utah you can purchase, for \$75.00 or less, something comparable. Why do we need to make it so high for somebody who wants to get these statutes.

You and I know that they are available in certain spots. You and I know, privileged info, and we have access to them. We have access with special keys to the Law Library and we can stay there all night. But I want the public to get these, Mr. Speaker. If you go off to the

Island of Kauai, try get a copy now. You can't find it.

Mr. Speaker, if we cut this price to \$75.00, then we would accomplish the dissemination of the work you and I are doing here.

Thank you."

The Chair then remarked:

"The Chair would like to state, for the record, that the Chair does not have any special keys to the Law Library."

Representative Suwa then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, likewise, sometimes I do not like to argue with my colleague across the street, and my standing here is not intended to argue with him, but sometimes he gives the impression that we are charging to the entire citizenry.

But, Mr. Speaker, as you know, some of the volumes are given free of charge to all the government facilities such as libraries, courts and also reciprocal agreements with other states, businesses that require a copy of the statutes, etc.

Last time they charged \$50.00 for the set and we went into a \$67,000 deficit, Mr. Speaker. What the Committee is trying to recommend to the House is that initial printing will cost \$147.00. Therefore, it is reasonable to charge \$150.00.

Likewise, the lawyers, through their tax system, will get business exemption on such a purchase.

So therefore, Mr. Speaker, I ask the members of the House to support this measure."

Representative Kunimura, upon being recognized, stated:

"Just for the record, we may be a hundred miles from Honolulu, but we have adequate numbers of volumes available on Kauai, and the people of Kauai know where they are. They also know where the good lawyers are on Kauai. So, have no fear."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 16, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII REVISED STATUTES", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by

a vote of 47 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Sutton voting no, and Representatives Kihano, Machida and Takamine being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 372, HD 1, had passed Third Reading at 12:40 o'clock p.m.; 228, HD 1, at 12:41 o'clock p.m.; 259 at 12:43 o'clock p.m.; 685, HD 1, at 12:56 o'clock p.m.; and 16, HD 1, at 1:01 o'clock p.m.

H.B. No. 7, HD 1:

Representative Suwa moved that H.B. No. 7, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Peters.

Representative Suwa then offered the following amendment to H.B. No. 7, HD 1:

"SECTION 1. House Bill 7, H.D. 1 is amended by amending line 24 on page 2 to read:

'joint request of the president of the senate and the speaker'

At 1:03 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 1:07 o'clock p.m., Representative Suwa moved that the amendment be adopted, seconded by Representative Peters.

Representative Suwa then explained that "H.B. No. 7, HD 1, is amended by changing 'or' to 'and' in line 24, page 2."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried and the amendment was adopted.

By unanimous consent, further action on H.B. No. 7, as amended, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A LEGISLATIVE ECONOMIC ADVISORY COUNCIL", was deferred until Tuesday, February 22, 1977, and in accordance with Article III, Section 16, of the

Constitution of the State of Hawaii, printed copies of H.B. No. 7, HD 2, were made available to the members of the House at 1:10 o'clock p.m.

At this time, Representative Stanley rose and extended birthday greetings to the Majority Leader, Representative Kondo, and presented him with a red carnation lei on behalf of the members of the House.

Representative Kondo then responded by saying:

"Mr. Speaker, just wanted to say thank you very much on my twenty-ninth birthday."

Representative Garcia then rose and stated:

"I think we would do justice if we said a few things about our Majority Leader.

Of course, many of us have heard many stories about our Majority Leader, and I would like the record to reflect that they are all true.

Secondly, besides being very kind, considerate and understanding, he has demonstrated many times, especially with me, his own way of quiet persuasiveness in influencing others.

So, I would just like to thank you and hope we'll be seeing less of him in the future."

The Chair then remarked:

"Did you say 'less' of him?"

Tuesday, February 22, 1977

Mr. Speaker, this bill now before us also gives to the Speaker of the House and the President of the Senate the power to jointly appoint the members and Chairman of this Council. Mr. Speaker, I trust and hope that this privilege will not be abused and used to make political appointments.

Mr. Speaker, with these reservations, I urge for the passage of House Bill No. 7, House Draft 2. Thank you."

Representative Sutton then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I voiced, on Second Reading, my objections to this bill. My good friend, the Chairman of the Finance Committee from the sovereign province of Puna, has changed the language; he has changed the syntax so we no longer have wrong syntax. Jimmy Carter says, 'we must not live in sin', and the Chairman says, 'we will not live in bad syntax.'

Thank you."

The Chair asked:

"You spoke in favor of the bill, Representative Sutton?"

Representative Sutton replied:

"In favor thereof, sir, and withdrawing my objection that I had on Second Reading, sir, and acknowledging the very fine amendment that the Chairman has put in."

Representative Mizuguchi, for the majority of the Committee on Education, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 84) recommending that H.B. No. 77, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and

be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Mizuguchi moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and that H.B. No. 77, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Campbell.

At this time, Representatives Evans and Carroll presented a Minority Report on Stand. Com. Rep. No. 84 on H.B. No. 77, HD 1, which was received and placed on file.

Representative Evans then rose and stated:

"I rise to speak against H.B. No. 77, HD 1, and in doing so, we have filed a Minority Report with the Clerk and it has been distributed.

Mr. Speaker, I have long been in favor of grass roots involvement in the governance of our schools. I sincerely believe that the best way to control the schools is through the involvement of the community. But this has to be done in an organized manner and with reasonable expectations on the part of the Legislature.

I have submitted this Minority Report because I believe that H.B. No. 77, as amended by the House Committee on Education, is ill-conceived, poorly timed and simply asks too much of the councils it proposes.

The Minority Report lists weak points of H.B. No. 77. An orderly election process for the councils has not been determined and a requirement for the councils to do annual reports that are the domain of the school principals and not the councils. The Superintendent of Schools has already started setting up these councils as a result of mandate of last year's Legislature. For the Legislature to go over the Superintendent's head now, while he is doing legislative bidding, would be poorly advised. While I am for this type of council, I feel it is absolutely essential that they are properly developed and not loaded down with work that is not theirs to do in the first place. To do otherwise is to undermine the whole concept.

I ask the members of this House to vote against it."

At 12:15 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:25 o'clock

p.m., Representative Mizuguchi rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, just a few short statements in support of H.B. No. 77, HD 1.

I believe the House Education Committee, along with the majority of the House, has taken the position that in order to improve our public school system, there has to be a joint effort in terms of teachers, students and the community. And this particular bill legally recognizes citizens of our community as being part of the school system.

Superintendent Clark has gone on record and has mandated school principals to establish school councils at each of the respective schools. This particular bill legally recognizes these councils so that there shall be a legal framework by which these councils could be guided.

So I think this is a step to bring about meaningful participation in our schools from students, teachers and the other members of the community.

It is with this purpose and intent that I ask members to support this particular bill.

Thank you."

Representative Carroll then rose and stated:

"I rise to speak against this measure.

Mr. Speaker, the concept behind the House bill is certainly a fine one - and that is that our citizenry have an input into our educative process. But, I think, Mr. Speaker, that we have come a long way down hill if we have to now set up a bureaucracy to handle citizens' input into the involvements that parents wish to have with their local schools.

I'm frankly appalled to think that we're considering spending upwards of \$44,000 at a time when this State is faced with financial crisis. In effect, to pay our citizens who wish to participate, to go to the schools and act in an advisory capacity, which they do at the present time, without any such fanfare, pay or bureaucratic arrangements.

This bill requires reports; it requires payments; it requires bookkeeping; it requires a selection process through an election which

is not clearly defined.

Frankly, Mr. Speaker, I'm impressed very much by many of the things that have happened in the House Education Committee over the past years, but this leaves me flabbergasted and I would ask that we stop this measure right here before it gets on the fast track to becoming a fait accompli. I ask everyone to vote no on this measure.

Thank you."

Representative Abercrombie then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to indicate to you and to the members here that there are few people I have met since coming to the Legislature for whom I have more respect than Representative Evans - I respect her integrity; I respect her sense of dedication; I respect her intelligence; I respect her passion, if you will, when it comes to the well-being of the children of the State in terms of the education system.

In this particular instance, I feel that it is imperative that we move forward with the passage of the bill. And I say this, recognizing as I do, that I opposed this kind of approach in the first place when I first came to this Legislature.

While the previous speakers have made mention that this is a fine concept and have indicated so in the preamble to the Minority Report, when I first came to the Legislature I did not think it was such. I felt that it was a fragmentation kind of process; perhaps that it might encourage some schools who have more vocal, articulate people, with time and financial circumstances which permit more activity around the school, to become dominant. I was afraid that it might be the first step towards the destruction of a centralized funding system for the schools. That is to say, the establishment of districts on a formal funding basis such as now exists on the mainland and has proved so disastrous not only in terms of the CIP necessary but such as now exists on the mainland of the actual funding of programs in the schools.

Since that time, as a result of my membership on the Education Committee - first under the chairmanship of Representative Yuen, who is now the Majority Floor Leader,

and now under Representative Mizuguchi, whom I feel is carrying on with a sense of continuity with the work begun here two years under Chairman Yuen - carrying on with a sense of continuity of all of us in the State-- that this adverse feeling that I had is no longer an adequate view.

I feel that given the thrust of the Committee, the quality of the Committee members and leadership of the Committee, and the two chairmen I have mentioned, that this will in fact provide us a way of carrying through on the legislative mandate that I feel we have and to which I have addressed myself on previous occasions in this chamber.

I feel very strongly, now, that these advisory groups may be the only way that we, as members of the Education Committee, can have an insight, a flesh and blood contact with people whose concern is less than that of a professional, in a sense that they make their living at it, but vital and real in terms of their commitment because their children are involved or that they are students or that as professionals they have no need to be in such a committee but their commitment is such that they wish to serve in any event.

That's why I think that the objection concerning the numbers of people to be elected, or rather the make-up of those to be elected, should remain as it is in the bill. That is to say that those who are interested should be elected. It may be that all teachers will be elected. I would find that a very happy event. It may be that all students would be elected. That would please me. Maybe that it would be all parents. I don't think so. What I think is that the PTAs, and this is a point I will address in a moment, will probably now have the formal sanction and recognition that they previously lacked.

But I do say, in respect to this particular provision, that those who are interested will be elected and it will give an opportunity for those who previously felt that the input was only symbolic, give them a: opportunity now to formalize that input and they'll know that there is a body available to them who not only can use the information that they've developed but is actively seeking their opinions and judgments concerning the school situation.

Secondly, Mr. Speaker, I would say that in terms of the formalization of the election process itself, that that is not necessary. In other words, I am stating that we want to formalize the capacities of the advisory committees to be a real and vital part, a visceral part, if you will, of our existence as legislators. But as for the process itself, I think it should be school specific. Some schools will be more prepared than others to operate under the Robert's Rules, or whatever rules might be adopted, and that might be appropriate in some circumstances and inappropriate in other circumstances if we are to truly have the feelings and judgments of that community as it exists today.

We do not want to preclude people from participation by virtue of setting up a process of election which would discourage them in the first place. I think these things will develop naturally as these councils become more and more a vital part of the school process.

Lastly, Mr. Speaker, in respect to the call for a report from these advisory committees on the adequacy of facilities, equipment, support services, instructional resources, etc., it is quite true that this will be an extreme difficulty for the people involved. On the other hand, this offers an opportunity for these folks to find out how truly cooperative the school system is going to be with them, how truly desirous the principal and his or her staff will be in aiding and assisting them. We will be getting a report, a feed back, from these people as to what they really think and feel about the school system as it operates on a day to day basis in their lives - whether there is, in fact, a responsiveness on the part of the DOE, which is often mentioned in the rhetorical commentary that goes, but may be left far, far behind in terms of the psychological reality that people experience when they think about the DOE as parents, teachers and students.

We, in turn, as legislators, can benefit from this. And we should be intelligent enough, and I think if we are diligent enough, to recognize when emotion has taken over and has replaced reason and good sense when it comes to a report of this nature. That's our responsibility. And when it's made on a reason basis, on a rational basis, then I think that this aid can assist us.

And so I think, in conclusion, that in many respects what will happen is that those school districts in which the PTA, for example, is already very active, it will probably formalize that leadership and give it a new impetus, a new basis for input that will take it far along the road towards the kind of interaction that the two committees that I have been associated with have sought.

And lastly, in this respect, that if the sum of money is too small, that can be adjusted as we go along. We are passing the bill today with a figure, and my experience has been in this chamber, that figures change - sometimes so fast that I can scarcely comprehend the speed with which they have changed. And, so, if there is a problem in that respect, I would submit to you, as I urge you to pass the bill today, ladies and gentlemen, that we can adjust that, that we can address that further down the line.

Thank you very much."

Representative Evans then rose and stated:

"I would like to rebut what the learned colleague from Manoa has said.

Mr. Speaker, I want to make it quite clear that I'm very much for grass roots involvement. If anyone has been more involved in PTA, etc., it has been me.

I am tired of passing through piecemeal legislation, hoping another committee will correct it. I believe the amendment that we talked about in the committee that day should have been made there.

I would like to say that this bill does not provide for the formula that we have been talking about, or the elements of the schools, the community, the parents, the teachers and the principals. What we are, in essence doing, is separating these groups of people. We are suggesting that the council be made up of at least one teacher, not more than three; to make the principal an ex officio member of the council; to include students on the high school and intermediate level; and where student councils exist in the elementary schools, that they be reserved one slot for a student.

We see a danger in the fact that it could be all parents, and that

it could be all teachers. We went through a teachers' strike a few years ago, and the bridges are still being mended so that we have good working relationships with parents and teachers.

We have suggested that there be a mechanism for elections. I realize that Robert's Rules of Order may be hard for some people to adhere to, but we need rules in establishing councils. Also, if you're going to have community input, the election meeting must be widely publicized for maximum possible attendance and this bill does not address itself to that.

I am saying, again, that I am tired of piecemeal legislation, and therefore, request you to vote no on it."

Representative Kunimura then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I have seen the whole gamut of participation in the educational policies of this State - from the territorial days.

I still remember when I was a member of the PTA, when the PTA was only good for raising funds to buy pianos, phonograph records, books that the territory did not afford monies for the schools to have in their libraries and everything else except the rights to participate in the policy decision, or the beginning of the policy decision for our educational system in this State.

Mr. Speaker and members of this House, remember, we the Democrats, have been accused for many, many years of big government. I think we are making the turn now to return the government to the people. And when we do this, under this bill, we are not riding the strict perimeters of how people are going to elect their representatives on this council. Because today, unlike the old days, when our parents could not read or write the English language, and they did not understand political processes, but more so they were under a very feudalistic system when they were told to do many of the things that affected their lives; they had no choice.

But let us not insult our citizens today - they have the intelligence; they have the communications to know who is doing what, and, I think, this election process, left up to the people, would be almost the very same way the founding fathers of our country started. They didn't have parliamentary procedures prescribed for them - they were patriots that got together

for one common cause - for freedom. Well, why not this Legislature return the right for public participation, and the parents especially, to decide who, when, where and how these advisory councils shall be elected, and how they should be operated.

I think the day has come when the PTA, they have done a good job, but in many areas they have served their usefulness, and if there are areas in this State that have strong PTAs, I am pretty sure they will be participating and they will be elected. But let us not prescribe, like in some other countries, how the citizens shall behave, how they shall elect their representatives. I don't see any prescription in our constitution that says so many businessmen, so many doctors, so many surfers, or so many meatcutters. We are all given the right to submit our names to be elected by the people. I think our State, especially, is well known for a very well informed electorate; therefore, Mr. Speaker, I strongly urge that this House pass this bill over to the Finance Committee, and let us not say, in these days of austerity, that we are going to be cutting down the monies that would afford our public participation.

Thank you."

Representative Suwa, speaking in favor of the bill, stated:

"I do not want to preempt any committee's decision as to what to say this morning, but primarily that I'll give it a fair hearing in the Finance Committee. But on the surface, I am supporting this bill primarily because of a different perspective.

I have seen many headlines in the County of Hawaii as to the unrest in such schools as Honokaa, Pahoa and Hilo High. In every instance, they seem to want to take the action of removing the principal or transferring the principal out. But I think when they do that, upon looking at some of the success in Pahoa, Honokaa and Hilo, it primarily is that of the community participation, is that of parental responsibility and that of the community leaders getting into the act also.

In this way, Mr. Speaker, I am sure that some of the unrest of our students can be resolved, and, therefore, we are for a better educational system.

In that light, at this time, I am supporting this bill to move over to the Finance Committee.

Thank you."

Representative Campbell then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I think the points, or at least the major point which I would like to make in favor of the bill has been made, but let me underscore that point.

I look at the principal, the teacher, the student and the parents in any given school location as a team whose job is to effectively educate our children. And when any segment of that team undercuts any other segment of that team and the Superintendent of Schools permits this to happen, in my judgment this becomes serious subject matter for this Legislature. Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I strongly urge the passage of this bill."

At 12:45 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:48 o'clock p.m., Representative Carroll rose to "rebut previous comments made on this measure", stating:

"Mr. Speaker, it's a well known technique in debate to obfuscate the issues by mudding the water, moving off in different directions. This has been done admirably by members of your party who have spoken previously to this time.

We agree with virtually everything that has been said, but one point that has been totally avoided here is the question of the expenditure of the money and the need to pass this kind of bill. Everything here, minus the appropriation measure, can do what all of the grand rhetoric has talked to, and I submit, Mr. Speaker, that we have apparently successfully . . . ."

Representative Kondo, on a point of order, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I think the bill is being referred to the Finance Committee for that very purpose."

The Chair then stated:

"Point is well taken, Representative Kondo."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 77, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MEANINGFUL PUBLIC PARTICIPATION IN THE SCHOOL SYSTEM THROUGH THE ESTABLISHMENT OF SCHOOL COUNCILS", passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Ajifu, Carroll, Evans, Narvaes and Sutton voting no.

Representative Mizuguchi, for the majority of the Committee on Education, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 85) recommending that H.B. No. 78, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Mizuguchi moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and that H.B. No. 78, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Campbell.

At this time, Representative Evans rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"My specific reason for voting against this measure is on page 2 of the bill: 'The Committee shall be composed of nine members appointed by the chairmen of the education committees of the senate and the house of representatives'. It does not give me, as a minority member of this House, as a Republican, any indication that this will be a non-partisan council. And, I do not believe that \$3,000, even if it is a small amount, is necessary for this. I urge all members to vote no."

Representative Abercrombie then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I have made mention on this floor, this morning, and at previous times, the significance of various bills for me, personally, and, I think, in terms of the State, and I must say that this bill, H.B. No. 78, HD 1, may, in fact, be the most important bill that this committee will deal with in the life of this particular Legislature.

I think it is an outgrowth of the work that was done by the previous committees, as exemplified in the now famous 350 or 4,050 page resolution, whatever it was. I know it was big enough to cause, I think, Representative Kunimura to have a hernia at that time and had to retreat for a moment

there, not by just lifting it, but it was not only heavy in actual weight but it was very heavy in terms of what it reported.

This is our step towards establishing, again, in cooperation with the citizenry of the State, competency in the schools in the basic skills not only in daily life but in the intellectual life and capacity of the citizens to act as mature individuals in democracy.

The nine member committee, I have no doubt, is going to be composed of people for their competence, for their capacity to aid and assist us in coming forward with a bill in 1978 that will do this Legislature proud and leave a mark upon the educational landscape of this State for which we may be truly proud in the years to come.

I don't think there's going to be the slightest inclination on the part of anybody where this committee is concerned, especially when the results of it will be so closely tied to the bill that will be presented to this Legislature next year.

There's no question in my mind that the party designation of the people to be named will be absolutely no consideration whatsoever. We're looking for people that are going to help us, aid us in our task, so that we can do the job necessary to do in 1978".

In rebuttal, Representative Evans stated:

"Mr. Speaker, the challenges that he refers to were in a resolution that was done last year. The Superintendent has answered those challenges in a document that was released September 6, 1976 and was never distributed to the members of this House. If they had been distributed and read by the members of this House, you would say there is no need to form this kind of council. Thank you."

Representative Mizuguchi then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Yesterday this honorable body passed on Third Reading a bill to establish a council of economic advisors to assist the Legislature in its deliberation on financial revenues, financial implications of this particular State.

The questions of levels of competency, real life skills, are, I think, one of the most important decisions that the Department of Education will be

making during this coming year. What this bill does is it sets up a blue ribbon committee of citizens from this State to assist the Legislature in its deliberation of minimum levels of competency for not only graduation requirements but levels of proficiency as it relates to grade promotions. It's a real issue, a very emotional issue. It deals with the students - our young citizens of this State.

This is why the House Education Committee is calling for this blue ribbon committee to assist us in this most monumental task and decision that we'll be making in 1978.

Thank you."

Representative Kunimura then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I'd just like to make a point that I don't find anything in this bill that makes reference to partisanism - it says only nine members. I'm pretty sure the wisdom of the committee is not assuring any political party any number of membership on the committee. It's pure and simple that we should keep politics out of education."

Representative Narvaes, upon being recognized, asked:

"As I look at H.B. No. 78, HD 1, and I see that we are, under this bill, establishing a citizen's advisory committee. I wonder what the Board of Education members are? Aren't they citizens? What is their function?"

Representative Uwaine, on a point of order, asked:

"Is the speaker speaking in favor or against the motion?"

Representative Narvaes replied:

"I speak against the motion. I wonder what is the function of the Board of Education? Are they supposed to be doing any advising to this legislative body? Are we just expanding the bureaucratic red tape that we already have in the government? For these questions I have, I urge all members to vote no."

Representative Kunimura then rose and stated:

"That's some very good questions to ask. I would like to refer the

member from across the hall that he read the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, and therein lie your answers."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 78, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO BASIC SKILLS AND REAL-LIFE SKILLS IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS", passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Carroll, Evans, Narvaes and Sutton voting no.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Representative Kunimura, for the Committee on Legislative Management, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 88) informing the House that House Bill Nos. 1242 to 1541, House Resolution No. 397, and Standing Committee Report Nos. 89 to 95, have been printed and distributed.

On motion by Representative Kunimura, seconded by Representative Lunasco and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted.

Representative Suwa, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 89) recommending that H.B. No. 13, as amended in HD 1, be recommitted to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Suwa moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 13, HD 1, be recommitted to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Peters.

Representative Suwa then rose to explain the recommitment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, to make it clear, the intent of this bill is that the Committee introduced a short form bill, but in reply to the short form bill, we have requested in the communication to the Governor that we would appreciate his advising my Committee of those prior CIP appropriations which may no longer be required due to changed conditions and needs and which have been excluded from consideration in formulating the current six-year CIP budget expenditure plan and bond issue plan.

Primarily, this bill has been changed from the short to the long form which

includes a number of projects that the Governor is no longer contemplating to fund. Therefore, it is important that the members go through this and if you have some concerns in certain areas, make your objections known to me or the Committee staff, or any member of the Finance Committee, so that when we have a hearing, we will be asking the respective agencies why it is no longer necessary or why it is not included in the expenditure plan.

Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Abercrombie then rose and asked whether or not the Chairman of the Finance Committee would yield to a question to which Representative Suwa replied in the affirmative.

Representative Abercrombie then asked:

"Mr. Speaker, I just want to make sure that I understand. There is at least one appropriation in here I was under the impression that is not very old and was something that we did the last time.

Is the Chairman suggesting to us that we consult with the Finance Committee if we have some confusion or concern and that if we pass it now, it is not a final determination as to the will of the House?"

Representative Suwa replied:

"Mr. Speaker, that is right, so you will notice that I am not passing this bill on Second Reading as yet, primarily to give the Committee the chance and opportunity to ask some questions."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 13, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE LAPSING OF CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT FUNDS", was recommitted to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Naito, for the Committee on Corrections and Rehabilitation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 90) recommending that H.B. No. 66, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Naito, seconded by Representative Ueoka and carried, the report of the Committee

was adopted and H.B. No. 66, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR SECURITY FACILITIES AT THE HAWAII YOUTH CORRECTIONAL FACILITY", passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Naito, for the Committee on Corrections and Rehabilitation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 91) recommending that H.B. No. 65, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Naito, seconded by Representative Ueoka and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 65, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO VOCATIONAL TRAINING", passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Machida, for the majority of the Committee on Tourism, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 92) recommending that H.B. No. 138, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Machida moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 138, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Dods.

Representative Abercrombie then rose and stated:

"I rise to speak against this bill being passed on Second Reading and referred to Finance. The reason I do so, Mr. Speaker, is that if you will look at the first page of the Standing Committee Report, you will find in the fourth paragraph, the last sentence, 'This Committee feels that we are in a period when the need for participation and establishing guidelines for orderly future growth is recognized by all levels of government and sectors of the visitor industry.'

Mr. Speaker, I would maintain that the visitor industry is not recognized, that it must participate in a fashion that is required by the association of public funding with the private interests of the visitor industry and that is because they do not and will not, unless and until this Legislature passes a hotel room tax, participate in a way that is meaningful

in terms of the funding available by the State either for this particular item as outlined in this bill or in any other items, programs and operations with which the State might cooperate with the visitor industry in the future.

If you will look on page 2 of the Standing Committee Report, the second paragraph: 'Under the provisions of this chapter, the Director of Tourism will be assisted by the Visitor Industry Council who shall serve in an advisory capacity and shall include, but not be limited to, et cetera, et cetera.' Going on from that, you will find that the Director of Tourism on page 3, the fourth paragraph down, 'will provide with authority to contract for services with the Hawaii Visitors Bureau', another tourist related organization. If you will proceed further, you will find on page 4 that under item 2, in Section 4, 'The Visitor Industry Council. Four representatives of the visitor industry shall be appointed by the Governor. Your Committee feels that to have proper input from the industry, there must be adequate representation on the Advisory Council and has amended the number of representatives from the visitor industry from 3 to 4. The representation should include the hotels, the airlines, ground transportation organizations, tour operator companies.

At least two of those components of the tourist industry--the hotels and the airlines--are, in my opinion, not contributing their fair share to the revenues of the State of Hawaii; have no intentions of doing so; are, in fact, actively engaged in a campaign against the establishment of a procedure whether by way of a hotel room tax or in seeing that they do not get rebates at the airport; actively engaged, I say, in a campaign to see that their fair share is not paid. They are actively engaged in a campaign of vilification and character assassination of certain members of this Legislature, including myself, who have advocated such attacks, who advocate the ending of the rebate procedures at the airport for the airlines on the basis that it is not in the public interest to have the latter going on and is in the public interest to have the passage of the former instance with the hotel room tax, the propagandizing members of the . . ."

At this point, the Chair interrupted:

"Representative Abercrombie, I think you are reaching far afield. Will you try to confine your remarks to the . . ."

Representative Abercrombie interrupted:

"Excuse me, Mr. Speaker, I didn't hear it--the last part of your sentence."

The Chair reiterated:

"I think you are going far afield from the subject before the House. Will you confine your remarks to the bill before the House which is the establishment of the Office of Tourism."

Representative Abercrombie continued, stating:

"Yes, I am saddened to think, Mr. Speaker, that you would feel that I am going far afield from the substance of the bill. My impression was that the Legislature is saying in this bill that it will provide public funds for the establishment of the Visitor Industry Council, and the basis for this council is certain representations made in the Committee report that there is a propensity on the part of the visitor industry; in particular, the hotels and airlines, to cooperate with the State in this area and that it is deserving, therefore, of public funds; and the case I am trying to make, Mr. Speaker, is that they are not, at the present time, deserving of such public funds, that they have not made a case that they are acting in the public interest but, rather, in their private interest and, therefore, have us to commit public funds to such an industry and to such components of the visitor industry who are acting against the public interest of this State, is not, in turn, in the public interest of this State. And that is why I am making the remarks that I am making. I shall repeat them in order to keep the threat of my argument such that it can be remembered, that the hotels, that the airlines who are mentioned specifically in having places on the Visitor Industry Council be appointed by the Governor, have not shown in any manner that is discernible to me, any interest other than that which covers those of private profiteers, speculators, of people who are using the State of Hawaii, its people, its resources, for their own interests; who will continue to do so; who have manifested an attitude that those people who oppose this, who expose it, are to be vilified, publicly and privately; that such people have no place on a council supported by public funds and unless and until those components of the

tourist industry who presently take such an attitude alter their attitude, I see no reason why the taxpayers of the State of Hawaii should fund an organization, be it the advisory council or some other aspect of aid and assistance to the tourist industry, when it is not their interest being served but the private interests of the people and organizations that I have just mentioned.

Thank you."

Representative Sutton then rose and stated:

"I rise to speak in favor of this resolution. Mr. Speaker, I have a . . ."

At this point, Representative Abercrombie rose on a point of order and stated:

"This is not a resolution; it is a bill."

Representative Sutton corrected himself, stating:

"I rise to speak in favor of the bill, sir, and of the Committee report on House Bill No. 138, but first of all, Mr. Speaker, can you resolve if I have any conflict?"

Asked by the Chair to "state your conflict", Representative Sutton answered, "I own a hotel."

The Chair ruled that there was no conflict.

Representative Sutton asked:

"No conflict, sir?"

The Chair replied:

"That is correct."

Representative Sutton continued, stating:

"Thank you, sir. Very nice ruling.

Mr. Speaker, the real hope of Hawaii, economically, socially and spiritually, lies in our having the Aloha spirit for the visitors who are our brothers now in statehood from the mainland and also from our friends throughout the Orient and throughout the civilized world. We are considered one of the prime places to come to for rest, relaxation and getting some of the culture that we have heard from the distinguished Representative from Waianae.

Mr. Speaker, we have, in this bill, an opportunity for a ten-year plan.

We have an opportunity to provide employment for our people of a very gracious nature. It does not just extend, Mr. Speaker, to the hotel industry. It extends to all facets of the visitor industry and this is a very important thing for government because government should come in where private industry does not have the resources to do the job. This will provide a tourism director who can coordinate, who can set goals, who can make sure that we remain the prime destination area of the world.

Mr. Speaker, if you do not believe that, please try to get a room at Waikiki tonight. Thank you."

Representative Machida then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to make a few short statements in support of House Bill No. 138, House Draft 1.

This bill creates a vehicle for the State to coordinate and work with the industry and also all levels of government in order to plan for a controlled quality growth for the tourism industry. And just a few statistics, Mr. Speaker. This is an industry that generates \$1.3 billion a year in Hawaii's economy. It is the largest industry in Hawaii. It is also the second largest industry in the world. It generates about \$270 million into the general revenues of the State. It directly employs about 67,000 people which is approximately 20 percent of our civilian work force. This is an industry which has not had any coordination in the past. With this vehicle, we are trying to create an Office of Tourism which will give the State an opportunity to do all within its power and resources to enhance the industry for Hawaii.

I think with the adverse kinds of conditions with agriculture and military spending, I think it is incumbent upon the State to do all within its power to try and assist this industry.

Mr. Speaker, this vehicle will create an opportunity for us to plan for a ten-year controlled growth for tourism and with these few statistics, Mr. Speaker, I feel this piece of legislation is very, very important for the economy of Hawaii.

For these few remarks, I urge everyone to vote for the passage of this bill. Thank you."

Representative Cobb then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill; however, I do indicate a reservation expressed on the Committee report that until we have the willing cooperation of the entire industry that any office of tourism coordinator will not work in and of itself, and to regulate or to coordinate an industry so large requires the participation, the willing participation, of those in the industry as well as those of us in government.

I note also, Mr. Speaker, that since we have two houses, this bill will be going to the other house, the Finance Committee of the other house, and with that, I would like to ask that we consider an approach, perhaps different from the past, but remembering the words of the past when it comes to this bill, let us not negotiate out of fear, but let us never fear to negotiate.

Thank you."

Representative Abercrombie then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, just an addendum to my remarks.

I would agree with the Chairman's analysis, rather, I would agree to the Chairman's factual presentation as to the statistics but as to the analysis of what those statistics mean in terms of the expenditure of public funds in this Office of Tourism, that I cannot do because, Mr. Speaker, I am saying that while we are expected and while the thrust of this bill is aimed at doing all within the State's power and resources, and while the Chairman says that it is incumbent upon the State to do all these within its power to aid and assist the tourist industry--what about the other side? Isn't it equally incumbent upon the tourist industry to do all that it can to aid and assist us so that we can cooperate together? Isn't it incumbent upon the tourist industry to do all that it can within its power and its resources which are considerable, Mr. Speaker? Our resources, our financial resources, at this very moment, are under the most severest strain in the history of the State and that is not an overstatement. That is also a statistical fact.

Any member in this Legislature who has sat in any Committee in which money bills are being considered understands only too well, especially under the instructions from our own Finance Committee, as to what is necessary

for us to act in a responsible manner, understands only too well the financial crisis, the financial restraints under which we must operate.

The resources of the tourist industry, the second largest industry in the world, are much greater than those of the State of Hawaii. The benighted taxpayer in the State of Hawaii, Sheraton International, the Osano Corporation, the Kuilima Organization, the resources available in Chicago, in Tokyo, Phoenix, Arizona, New York City, Los Angeles, San Francisco, billions upon billions of corporate dollars--those resources are available. Part of the reason those billions of dollars are there and part of the reason they have those resources is the profits that they take out of Hawaii; that they invest in other tourist destination areas in other parts of the world. Money made here in the State of Hawaii invested in areas that compete with us for the tourist dollar. This is not a benign participation on the part of the tourist industry. They are not here to do us a favor. Yes, there are 67,000 people employed. We provide the labor; we have only our labor to sell. We don't have the capital; we don't have the necessary capital to take care of our own projects right here in the University of Hawaii and in the schools of the Department of Education. We tell our teachers; we tell our students; we tell our parents there is not enough for us, but you can't do too much for the hotels and the airlines. We tell our own people, take less while they take more. We tell our own people, be satisfied, while the corporations are endlessly unsatisfied for their profit taking.

All we ask, if we are to provide this advisory council on tourism, this Office of Tourism, is to share the burden with us. That is all that is being asked, and that is not the answer that is coming forward when that question is asked. It is, 'No, you people in the State of Hawaii, you provide everything and we will take the benefits.'

Room rates have been raised and the visitors come in still greater numbers. The profits are taken and not returned to the visitors but appear on the profit sheet of the corporation. Tourism was up 14.6 percent in January alone. I, too, have statistics. I, too, pay attention to them, and the statistics that I would like to present to you this morning when I asked you to vote against this. Now, as an expression to that industry that they are going to have to come across for us too is

that we do not have sufficient funds right now to meet the bare minimum necessity of the welfare of the people of the State of Hawaii and we have the responsibility in this Legislature to take care of that.

I am saying you folks come in with us. What resources do we have besides our labor? We have our sky, we have our water, we have our air and we have our land. Now, in any other state in which you have a resource--oil, let us say--there is a severance tax. When that leaves, it can't be gotten back again. When a hotel is built on a piece of land in Hawaii, we don't have that land any more. That's it; it's gone. If we pollute the bay, if we pollute the water, we can't get that back. It will cost money to change that back to a pristine state. If the sewers break in Waikiki, we must foot the bill, and how many visitors will come if pollution is running in the streets of Kalakaua and Kapahulu into the waters of Waikiki and Kuhio?

This is the kind of thing I am talking about--the practical, everyday reality of sharing it both ways, and so I am asking that you defeat this bill now, not move it. Passing it on Second Reading is a clear indication to the tourist industry that you, too, must participate in more than taking profits out of the State of Hawaii. You, too, must invest, not just in your hotels and in your airlines, and in your other capital facilities for your own private profit, but in the facilities that we need to provide, not only for the tourist themselves, but for our own people and we will gladly share with you. We will gladly ask you to come to Hawaii; be a part of our life for some brief part of your life, but in that process, have the courtesy, please, to share with us the costs, the financial burdens, that enable us to make this paradise, and to keep it the adventure that it is for all of our visitors.

Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 138, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TOURISM", passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Abercrombie voting no.

Representative Garcia, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 93) recommending that H.B. No. 251, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Youth and Elderly Affairs.

On motion by Representative Garcia, seconded by Representative K. Yamada and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 251, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE EXTRADITION OF JUVENILE FUGITIVES", passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Youth and Elderly Affairs.

Representative Garcia, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 94) recommending that H.B. No. 455, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Youth and Elderly Affairs.

On motion by Representative Garcia, seconded by Representative K. Yamada and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 455, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE CONFIDENTIALITY OF POLICE RECORDS CONCERNING JUVENILES", passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Youth and Elderly Affairs.

Representative Cayetano, for the majority of the Committee on Energy and Transportation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 95) recommending that H.B. No. 700, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative Cayetano, seconded by Representative Takamura and carried, the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 700, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR A PLEBISCITE AT THE GENERAL ELECTION OF 1978 UPON THE QUESTION OF A FIXED GUIDEWAY SYSTEM FOR THE ISLAND OF OAHU, TO PRESCRIBE THE QUALIFICATIONS FOR VOTING, THE ADMINISTRATION AND CONDUCT OF THE PLEBISCITE, THE METHOD AND MANNER OF DECLARING AND CERTIFYING THE RESULTS AND MAKING AN APPROPRIATION THEREFOR", passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary, with Representative Dods voting no.

Representative Machida, for the
