Wednesday, January 18, 1978

In accordance with Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, the Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1978, convened at 10:00 o'clock a.m.

The Honorable James H. Wakatsuki, Speaker of the House of Representatives, presided.

The National Anthem was sung by Daniel Kaleikini.

The Chair appointed Representatives Garcia, Inaba, Machida, Morioka, Yuen, Evans and Poepoe to escort Reverend Hiro Higuchi to the rostrum.

The Divine Blessing was then invoked by Reverend Higuchi.

The Chair appointed George M. Takane as Temporary Clerk.

At 10:22 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair, to allow the members of the House and their guests to enjoy the entertainment of Mr. Palani Vaughn.

Upon reconvening at 10:31 o'clock a.m., the Chair delivered the following address:

"Governor and Mrs. Ariyoshi, Lt. Governor and Mrs. Doi, Chief Justice Richardson, Congressman Akaka, distinguished guests, my fellow colleagues, friends, ladies and gentlemen:

As Speaker of the House of Representatives, it is my privilege and distinct honor to extend to you warm greetings and welcome to the reconvening of the Ninth Legislature.

I am certain that this day brings

to all of us a sense of renewed purpose, a recognition that there still remains much work to be accomplished, and a strong determination to move our state to become a greater Hawaii, a state which can be the envy of all of our sister states and of the world.

Our legislature has accomplished much in the previous sessions and we will resolve to do more.

We are all aware that this will be a very unusual political year for the public-at-large and for elected officials as well. There will be an election for constitutional convention delegates in May and the convening of the convention in July. All elective offices in our state government will be open for election in the fall. This does not mean, however, that we will not tend to the legislative business at hand.

This session, we will review the supplemental budget requests of the Administration. In so doing, the interests of the public-at-large will be paramount. We are determined that government programs must be funded from existing financial resources without turning to the use of our taxing powers to obtain additional revenues. Let us, for this period of uncertain economy, live within our means.

In conducting this review, the standing committees of this House are prepared to question whether the program decisions previously made were correct, whether programs are being implemented in the manner intended by the legislature, and whether new or different decisions should now be made. The committees will also examine closely whether our state programs include incentives to make government more effective and efficient, or whether the converse is true. Underlying all of this should be our concern that government, often criticized as being wasteful and inefficient, should have in its programs realistic provisions that will in fact motivate our employees to greater productivity and efficiency. We also invite all of our citizens to help us identify those programs that impede the attainment of our goals and to offer meaningful suggestions.

The state of our economy is sluggish. This has created the problem of unemployment which has weighed heavily on all of our minds.

Even as we await new economic policies from our national government, even as the actions of our state government are being severely curtailed by

the lack of unlimited cash, we must consider what more can be done to reduce the number of persons on the unemployment roll.

The legislature has appropriated millions of dollars to accelerate the repair and maintenance of government facilities so as to aid our construction industry. We have complemented federal job programs through our state program for the unemployed. We have also provided incentives for employers to hire and train the unemployed. Yet, we need to consider still other incentives in order to create more jobs. We can expand our business investment tax credits geared to new hires. We can also consider an incentive for a homeowner to undertake major improvements to his home. This incentive could be in the form of a tax credit based on the cost of the improvements. This credit could be applied against the personal income tax, or alternatively, against the real property tax. We can also consider the rebate of taxes paid on such improvements.

The concept of job sharing has not been forgotten. This session, we will work to implement a pilot project within the state government to determine the costs and the effectiveness of such a concept. I am confident that the results will be positive.

Let us now focus our attention on the state general plan submitted by the Administration. The plan has been submitted in compliance with Act 189 of the 1975 legislative session. That session mandated the Administration to submit to this legislature a state general plan which takes into consideration the social, economic, environmental, physical and design objectives to be achieved for the general welfare and prosperity of our people.

It is ironic that those who strongly oppose the plan today were in favor of Act 189. The majority of them, if not all, agreed with the legislature then that our state sorely needed a general plan. The issue is not home rule, nor is the issue unreasonable interference with county management and planning. The issue is whether we will succeed or fail in keeping our commitment to give our people a plan which would enunciate policy directions and guidelines for the future growth of our state. The conference committee report on the act, unanimously adopted by this House and by the Senate, states in part, and I quote: 'The future of this state is too important for the legislature, as the policy makers of the state, to once again abrogate

its responsibilities. It must provide the direction for the future of the state'; unquote. The pressure from each county to have the adoption of the plan delayed and postponed has already begun, but I am confident that our elected officials in this House and in the Senate will keep the commitment made in Act 189.

In the field of transportation, we are still faced with the decision as to whether a fixed guideway system should be built on Oahu. A year ago, I advocated that we defer making that commitment until all alternatives in relieving highway congestion are explored. I also urged for the staggering of work hours for schools and government offices. Through legislation passed last session, the governor has been accorded the authority to establish staggered or variable hours for state offices and schools. We now need to test its full implementation.

The City and County of Honolulu, in the meanwhile, continues to proceed with the planning for a fixed guideway system, a system which the City alone cannot fund due to the tremendous financial requirements. The City now looks to the state for a blanket commitment of taxpayer dollars without the benefit of presenting to us a fair, objective and balanced review of alternatives including the cost benefits, the rider projections, the projected costs of maintenance and operation, and the ultimate cost to the taxpayers. Too much emphasis has been given to our federal government's possible subsidy towards the cost of building the system to the tune of eighty per cent of the total cost, a cost that can very well exceed 800 million dollars. Not enough emphasis and attention have been given to the costs of operation and maintenance of the system. The city projects an annual operating and maintenance cost of 40 million dollars. And where are these dollars expected to come from? None other than you, the taxpayers.

This is why the House and the Senate have requested the legislative auditor to sponsor a seminar on urban mass transit to be held at the end of this month. For that seminar, the City has been asked to present its case for a fixed guideway system, and a panel of transportation experts will review the City's proposal and will present an objective assessment of such proposal. I believe that this seminar will bring to us

in the legislature and to the public a clearer understanding of the issues and of the cost implications of a fixed guideway proposal.

Crime has been a source of deep concern to us all. Our citizens as well as visiting tourists no longer feel free and safe to walk our streets and our beaches. Even to shop, or to sit alone at home has indeed become a heavy risk. Businesses are no longer safe. In light of these happenings, we will review our minimum sentencing procedures and take into consideration seriously the recommendations to be made by the Crime Commission. We shall urge our county councils and administrations to step up and increase their crime fighting capacity to a level of greater effectiveness. To fault the judiciary or the laws is certainly not the answer to this serious problem.

In education, we will continue to develop a public school system which encourages our young people to master the basic skills and to prepare them for adulthood. Our schools must be responsive to the needs of our students and to our communities if they are to remain viable. This House will continue the push to give our individual schools greater authority and resources to meet the special needs of their students. We will continue to push for greater involvement of the parents and the community in our educational system.

Our school department must not be complacent. It must continually assess and re-assess the effectiveness of its programs, its teachers and its administrators, and it must be flexible to adjust and change as the times dictate. We shall be partners with the department in this endeavor.

I would like to discuss other issues and programs in more detail this morning, but time has its limitations. Let me cite a few of the many issues and programs that will be examined by our standing committees:

- * Our university system, its programs and its effectiveness;

- * The costs of public welfare and, particularly, the costs of medical assistance;

- * Our health delivery systems;

- * Our efforts to expand and strengthen the agricultural programs with emphasis on exportable products;

* Aquaculture as an emerging industry;

* Energy resources, its use and its conservation;

* The preservation of our state's natural beauty, its historical sites and cultural history.

No legislative session is easy, and certainly, this session will not be an exception. There will be conflicts to be resolved and differences to be reconciled in reaching consensus.

I, therefore, ask of each of my colleagues and the public, patience, understanding and cooperation as we now proceed to undertake our heavy task.

Thank you."

Representative Ajifu, on behalf of the minority, responded as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, Governor and Mrs. Ariyoshi, Lt. Governor Doi, Congressman Akaka, members of the House, guests and friends:

On behalf of the Republican caucus, Aloha.

It has become tradition for the Republicans of the House to rise on opening day to pledge both its cooperation and readiness to serve as the loyal opposition when occasions demand. It is my singular honor to once again fulfill tradition and pledge our continued devotion to good government and the well-being of Hawaii.

If all gathered here will look upon this day in historical perspective, they will know that the Republican caucus honors yet another tradition today. Once again, we commit ourselves to share in the leadership of the House of Representatives as it faces the difficult tasks awaiting.

Gone are the years when ever-increasing economic growth and political solidarity stood as the rightful pride and unequalled power of the Democrat majority. With the seventies came uncertain times and a critical need for strong leadership from both sides of the aisle.

We in the Republican caucus believe that this session is the time for all of us to take a lesson from the Hawaiians of old. It is a pivotal year, a time to examine our plans and actions in view of seeking harmony between ourselves and the land and sea around us. It is a time when we must look

to the creation of an economy based as much as possible on self-renewal and self-sufficiency, as did the ancient Hawaiians. It is a time to learn our limitations and make the wisest use of our resources.

When we speak of self-sufficiency, we mean an economy in which local people supply local demand to the greatest degree possible. Hawaii will always need imports, but the potential for commerce between our island is largely untapped. In the same breath, we speak of self-renewal, a society which renews the environment as it takes from the environment, establishing a self-perpetuating balance.

In this coming session, we must look to regaining for Hawaii a path which leads to the state's economic security without the destruction of our unparalleled quality of life. Some path-clearing has started, and we gratefully acknowledge those members of this House who have worked to this end.

For direction, we need only look to the past in order to protect our future. We need only to return to the fundamental principles of the first people of our islands, the Hawaiians. The Hawaiian culture existed in harmony with the environment. Theirs was a perpetual balance with nature. The essence of this balance can be found in the two principles of self-renewal and self-sufficiency.

Perhaps some present today believe that we are all in agreement as to the correct path for Hawaii's future. Perhaps some feel that our state government has already embraced the principles of renewal and self-sufficiency. The Republican caucus fears that these principles are expressed in oratory, not in actions. The caucus fears that the strong leadership so essential to achievement of self-renewal and self-sufficiency has not emerged and that a commitment to these goals is yet to be made in these chambers.

Essential to a renewing and self-sufficient society is a superior educational system; yet with the millions of dollars we pour into it, our schools and university are still graduating students who do not possess marketable skills.

Hawaii desperately needs greatly expanded agricultural production, yet the funding essential to programs such as agricultural research and cooperative organization has been restricted.

Hawaii is hamstrung by an obsolete

transportation network, yet the answers grow more elusive.

Our state must have the technical capability to find its own answers to its own problems, yet a real commitment to increasing research capabilities exists only on paper.

The paralyzing burden of increased population and welfare costs grows geometrically, yet hard decisions are left unmade.

The importance of a more economical and efficient government is often expressed, yet substantive reorganization has been continually thwarted.

We, the elected members of the House, cannot stand in these chambers and claim a commitment to the principles of self-renewal and self-sufficiency until we pass the legislation which makes these principles a reality. We cannot claim such a commitment until we respectfully demand that the executive carry out the mandate of our laws.

The Republican caucus believes the cornerstone of social and economic stability for our state rests in assuring employment opportunities for all our citizens. Only with high employment comes the public revenue needed to provide quality public education, research institutions, a growing agricultural industry, advanced transportation and communications systems, and additional progress underpinning self-renewal and self-sufficiency.

Believing employment opportunities to be the key to Hawaii's future, tied in with an understanding of our limited resources, the Republican caucus has prepared a package of legislative measures which it feels will contribute directly and indirectly to increased employment for Hawaii's people. While there is not sufficient time to announce all of these measures on this occasion, allow me to mention a few.

The people of Hawaii look toward the agriculture and aquaculture industries to help in broadening our economic base, to provide farming jobs as well as a substantial number of indirect, supportive jobs, and to lower consumer costs and promote greater self-sufficiency.

At the opening of last session, Mr. Speaker, you promised that the House would give top priority to a transportation system capable

of efficiently and cheaply moving agricultural goods as well as other locally-made consumer products. Not one piece of legislation aimed at this goal became law last session. We recommend the following measures:

* That the State Board of Vocational Education give highest priority to the offering of agriculture and aquaculture courses within our community colleges;

* That the Department of Transportation identify feasible sites, either on private land or public, for the construction of cargo handling and storage facilities for diversified agricultural products. In addition, the state should support commercial loans for the construction facilities and help provide necessary improvements and utilities;

* This legislature should clearly express its commitment to protection of adequate open spaces and water resources for agriculture and aquaculture.

For many years we have realized the potential worth of increased research activity in Hawaii. Growth in this information industry will mean jobs, attract investment money, and provide an opportunity for us to internally solve our present and future problems.

Unfortunately, state government has done little to promote a local information industry. The Republican caucus recommends the following:

* That the state establish a research park, much along the lines of an industrial or agricultural park. With state support and promotion, such a park will mean greatly reduced capital investment costs for private research organizations;

* We further propose that the core of the research park be technologically advanced research data bank capable of storing, evaluating, and organizing information generated from a multitude of sources both public and private;

* Our state government should take a much more aggressive role in attracting research companies under the auspices of the research and development industry promotion program.

Mr. Speaker, I respectfully remind you that your opening day speech of last session failed to touch on

the importance of education regarding employment opportunities.

Our caucus feels that no single element of society is as important to high employment as quality educational opportunities. If we are to have a highest priority, this priority should be quality education in Hawaii. We Republicans offer, in part, these measures:

* The creation of an extensive vocational education system, with faculties and instructors capable of delivering advanced technical training to high school students. We envision a system with the capability of providing students upon graduation with truly marketable skills and the background necessary to produce a college education if desired.

As suggested earlier, a basic element of self-sufficiency is found in adequate transportation and communication facilities. People, products and information must move quickly and cheaply within our state if consumer costs are to be kept down. We Republicans recommend the following:

* That the state initiate a telecommunication demonstration project. If intrastate commerce can be carried on without our habitual dependence on physical travel, then a significant portion of the transportation and energy crunch can be eased. Inter-island travel costs can be reduced, with direct savings to businesses and ultimately to consumers;

* We propose tax credits against shipping costs for all types of business people attempting to reach statewide markets. We intend to give island people a fair chance to compete with mainland companies in the statewide marketplace. Passage of such legislation would bring life to your last year's promise, Mr. Speaker, to create and improve cargo shipping system for intrastate agriculture and other forms of commerce.

Along with the visitor industry and agriculture, federal spending represents the base of our state economy. Our local ship repair industry stands in a position ripe for expansion, needing only the stability of federal contracts to begin its growth.

We recommend that the legislature strongly urge the United States Department of Defense to enter into long-term business arrangements with our local ship repair industry.

Let us admit to the fact that welfare costs are draining revenues rapidly from the public fund and will soon be totally unbearable. We propose to limit general assistance benefits to able-bodied recipients to a twenty-six week period, unless the recipient establishes a clear record of actual effort in obtaining employment.

The central theme of my statement today concerns not only self-sufficiency, but also self-renewal, the promulgation of a society which replenishes the earth and sea as it takes from the earth and sea. The Republican believes such a society can be established with plentiful job opportunities for all. With this in mind we recommend:

* Legislation which would provide state aide to the developers of natural attractions, those projects which would be a boon to the visitor industry while preserving our beautiful environment. If we are to build new visitor attractions, let these be opportunities to see Hawaii in its natural splendor;

* We further advocate that trained environmentalists sit on the Tourism Advisory Council so that industry planning have equal input from those who seek to perpetuate the land. If trade-offs must be made, let them be informed trade-offs.

Our caucus fully realizes that several of the measures we will be calling for involve significant capital investment of public revenues. We also realize that we call for these significant expenditures at a time when past government spending has produced a deficit. Despite these facts, state government will continue to affect a monetary policy in order to direct the state's economy.

We believe the spending priorities reflected in our package are the correct priorities and essential to the future of Hawaii. We offer, however, several proposals to offset the expenditures called for in our package:

* Fundamental constitutional changes which would establish needed revenue and expenditure controls;

* Cost estimates for legislation and more accurate follow-ups by the Legislative Auditor;

* Once again, the greatest savings available to this state are present in reform of our welfare laws. The President of the United States

realizes the necessity of such reform on the federal level. We call on this legislature to consider reform on the state level.

Mr. Speaker, members and guests, the Republican caucus is proud of this package and trusts these measures will receive a fair hearing. We are mindful that a change in path is difficult. We know such a change is made by many little steps, not by dramatic leaps. Many of our proposals are modest ones, but we feel they lead the right way nevertheless. As for our more major proposals, the Republican caucus trusts that eventually they will come to fruition just as the State Plan, a Republican concept, came to be accepted by the majority as the true and desirable path to a secure future of all Hawaii.

Representative Kihano then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this resolution.

In the course of our nation, there comes a person who is destined to become a leader among leaders - a man who, because of his ideas and commitments, makes a great impact on the lives of all of us and of generations to come. Hubert Horatio Humphrey was just such a man.

In 1967, Hubert Horatio Humphrey told a crowd in Honolulu that 'Hawaii

is where people seem to know how to live together in harmony.¹ And that harmony is due in part to the ideas he advanced to help the downtrodden, the handicapped, the retarded, the elderly, and other minorities in America. Throughout his career, he stood for human rights and dignity.

Hubert Horatio Humphrey earned himself a place in America's history as one of her greatest lawmakers and a place in our hearts as a man of dedication, compassion and concern for his fellowman.

We will all miss him, but we are thankful for his visions and for the time he has graced us by his presence.

To Hubert Horatio Humphrey,
our warmest mahalo - Aloha Pumehana.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Cobb then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of the resolution very briefly because many facets of this great man have been touched upon.

I noted during a recent trip to Washington, within the waiting room of the United States Senate, there are pictures of five individuals - men who have devoted their lives to the Senate as truly outstanding Senators - and for an individual Senator to receive such an accolade requires the unanimous consent of the Senate by secret ballot. The five whose pictures are there are Henry Clay, Daniel Webster, John C. Calhoun, Robert Taft and Robert La Follette.

Mr. Speaker, I am both hopeful and confident that soon a sixth picture will be added, that of Hubert Humphrey, who has touched all of our lives and who has left us better off than before he was born.

I would ask that we adopt this resolution by a rising vote and that we adjourn today's session in his memory.

Thank you."

Representative Ajifu then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I, too, rise to speak in favor of this resolution.

It is proper and fitting that the State of Hawaii join the nation in mourning the loss of Hubert Humphrey, a leader of rare quality.

In passing this resolution, let us understand the lessons that Hubert Humphrey taught us: to be modest of our accomplishments; to remain serene when facing defeat; to be loyal to our friends; to forgive our enemies; to be optimistic about the future; and perhaps most important of all, to face death without fear, for to be fearless of death is to be free of all fear.

It was typical of the man that he asked that his services be a celebration of life. He lived his life to the fullest. He loved his family, his friends, and his country, and gave to all the fullest measure of his energy and devotion.

He will always be remembered when others are forgotten."

Representative Ueoka then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of this resolution in memory of Senator Hubert Humphrey. His name will go down in history as one of the greatest men, and I would like to illustrate by the following. Many of you, no doubt, have been to the island of Maui and traveled along the West side, down Olowalu, where the water is calm. I mention the log at Olowalu. You will see the wood embedded. Where this wood or log came from, no one knows. Yet, it has the elements of the wind, sun, the rains. In time, this particular log will disappear into nothing.

On the other hand, when you go to the island of Maui, you will see the rising mountain of Haleakala, rising from the shore to the sky. This mountain, Haleakala, will be there a long, long time, and I would like to remember Senator Hubert Horatio Humphrey as Mount Haleakala, and not the log which is embedded on the shores of Olowalu.

There is much that each one of us in this chamber, as well as in the community, could so much learn from his deeds. I thank Senator Hubert Humphrey that America is great because Hubert Humphrey was there.

Thank you very much."

Representative Nakamura then rose

and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of the resolution.

As a one-time native of Minneapolis, Minnesota, where the former Vice-President started his ascendancy in public service as Mayor of the City, it is with a deep sense of duty that I remind the people of Hawaii that it was Hubert Humphrey, more than any single or group of Americans, who made the poor and the neglected feel like they are Americans.

He was the chief architect of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. No American will ever be able to truly measure the extent of economic poverty, human degradation, and social devastation that he headed off in the cities of America by his Civil Rights Act.

All America should be eternally grateful to this great American for his far-reaching foresight and courageous fight for civil rights.

I join each one of you today to honor a truly great American who may be gone in body but whose spirit will continue to live in the halls of government throughout the United States.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ikeda then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, as a member of the House Republican caucus, I rise also to speak in favor of this resolution in tribute to Senator Humphrey.

We share in the sorrow of millions of Americans at the passing of a truly great man. He made his mark on history with his zeal for human rights and for the dignity of mankind. It was remarkable and even inspiring to observe the boundless energy he possessed in his never-ending crusade to raise the consciousness of Americans for their fellow human beings.

While we were not on the same side of the political fence, I can say that there is no doubt he was a man of high ideals and great integrity.

Hubert H. Humphrey will be missed by many of us, not just by those who agreed with his liberal philosophies, but equally by those who knew the challenges he presented and who benefitted from the lively debates

at Capitol Hill.

This was what the Democratic process was all about.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Sutton then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, as a former President of the Federal Bar Association, I rise in memory of Hubert Humphrey and to support this resolution.

Mr. Speaker, in 1969, Hubert Humphrey came to Hawaii as the principal speaker of the American Bar Association, and he arrived at what today is the Blaisdell Memorial Center and was then known as the HIC. There were one thousand delegates who, it was apparent, would not be able to hear his speech. He said he would not talk until such time as all of the delegates would have an equal opportunity to hear his speech.

He was a man who was born in the upper parts of Minnesota, and went through the Great Depression and saw many of the opportunities which he wished to have not given to him. He wished to be an attorney himself. Finally, by night study, he became a pharmacist, but always, he identified with our great profession and, in 1969, when he was the principal speaker of the American Bar Association, he used those two concepts - equality for all delegates and the basic concept, let each individual in America have the same right - and as Hubert Humphrey gave this speech, he so moved that body that the American Bar Association the next day adopted a resolution on civil rights which they never had done before. He spoke effectively and compulsively.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Aki then rose and stated:

"I, too, wish to rise and speak in support of this resolution.

A few years ago, as a freshman legislator, I was privileged to attend the National Legislative Conference in the twin cities of Minneapolis, St. Paul, and the guest speaker for that afternoon was none other than the late Senator from Minnesota, and I must say it was the most inspiring speech.

Much has been written and said in praise of Hubert Horatio Humphrey - of his words and deeds - in the service of his country. If ever there was an individual truly deserving of this praise, it was certainly this man.

From time to time, our nation has been blessed by the presence of men and women who have been the mark of greatness, who have helped us to see a better vision of what we can become.

Hubert Humphrey was such a man.

His greatest ambition was not to be president, or vice-president, or secretary of state, or even majority leader. Rather, his greatest desire was that people would think of him as a man that really gave himself to his country and did something truly meaningful in the service of the people.

Shortly before his death, Senator Humphrey stated: 'What I want to become known for. . . is that I was an effective man in government. That I was a decent man, and that I knew my job. That I knew how to get things done and what was important things in government.'

I can think of no greater tribute or measure of respect that each of us can pay to this great man than to take his ideals to heart and dedicate and commit ourselves to the service of the people of this State of Hawaii and the United States.

Let us not linger over the loss of this great and compassionate man, but rather, let us rejoice in the fact that he lived among us, and let us appreciate our good fortune to have known such a great individual.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Takamine then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I have a statement that I would like to put in the Journal and I would like to read a portion of that."

The Chair "so ordered" and Representative Takamine stated:

"He wanted Congress to commit our nation to full employment. This would get at the root of most of our social problems. Most of them are related to the fact that

millions of people are not able to find jobs which pay a living wage. He introduced a bill - the Humphrey-Hawkins Full Employment Bill. It has not passed Congress yet. There has been resistance by those with narrower interests or less humane concern. The bill has been watered down, but Hubert Humphrey kept on working for a national commitment.

No tribute we could make to Hubert Humphrey would please him as much as if we were to encourage Congress to commit itself to a policy of full employment and to adopt a strong Humphrey-Hawkins Bill.

In our own state, we can do the same - by State Plan and by other measures. We can make a commitment to full employment for residents and commit ourselves to such planning and policies for guiding development, and control of in-migration as may be necessary.

It would be a fitting tribute to a man who believed in the American people. It would be the best way to show our children that we truly care for them."

The remaining remarks are herewith inserted as follows:

"An outstanding Senator and former Vice-President died of cancer last week.

Hubert Humphrey set an example of courage and grace as he carried on with his work and leadership, right to the end.

There were times when some of us disagreed strongly with Hubert Humphrey. We disagreed during the Cold War years when he joined in the attack of some of our most democratic and progressive trade unions.

We disagreed again, as our country moved into the Vietnam war.

Despite these differences, we want to give credit to Hubert Humphrey for the many fine things that he did, which made life better for all Americans. He was an untiring, cheerful, resourceful champion of progressive social legislation.

He worked brilliantly and effectively for civil rights and fair employment practices, for Medicare and Head Start, for the Federal Scholarship Program, and for many other measures for equality, for meeting human needs, and for creating opportunities for our young people to develop their abilities. Hubert Humphrey understood that the true wealth and greatness of a

country is not measured by the fortunes of its high-paid big shots or millionaires, but by the condition of its millions of common people.

He knew that if every one of our people has a chance to grow up healthy, get an education, develop and use his abilities in a productive job, that this would make America stronger, richer and a better, safer and happier place for all of us to live.

He understood, too, that no matter how well off some of us may be, we cannot afford to ignore the fact that millions of our people are poor, deprived and unemployed. We cannot afford it, not just because it is wrong, but because the neglect of these problems is poisoning our society and is a threat to our future. The worst is unemployment and discouragement for our young people.

Hubert Humphrey believed in this country. He was confident that America has what it takes - the resources, the democracy, the intelligence - to face these problems honestly and to find the answers, if only we have the will to try. His great gift of leadership was his own inspiring, cheerful will to try and to keep on trying."

Representative Dods then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to also rise to speak in favor of this resolution.

Perhaps one should keep a respectful silence when faced with the death of Hubert Humphrey. He is so great and so much has been said by so many already. However, on behalf of my constituents and my family, I would offer just a few words, not about him, but to him.

Senator Humphrey, you taught all of us in government a great deal. You uplifted the common man. You stood alone on issues of enormous importance to this country, like civil rights for everyone, and decent educational opportunities for all. You taught us that if we are going to have the social services that the people deserve, we will have to pay for them with taxes, and that we should be proud of that for it is the business of government to provide services to the people and, most of all, Senator, you taught us to be proud of our calling as legislators because your wisdom, honesty, compassion, and good judgment reflect a little on all of us. We will try to be worthy of your example.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kunimura then rose and stated:

"May I rise this morning to share what I feel about this great man I met in Hawaii, a man who launched the Democratic landslide in the state government, inspired us to do this. The inspiration we gained was because of his record. Upon examination, we found out that this man was not only a man of word, but a man of deed and many deeds.

I would like to look upon this great American, who has left us now, as an American who went around, not like Johnny Appleseed spreading goodness only, but a man who finished the many, many jobs started by many great Americans.

We heard presidents upon presidents, senators upon senators, and congressmen upon congressmen, come in with good programs. They were all good Americans, but they were specialists in their particular fields. I would like to remember this man, Hubert Horatio Humphrey, as a man who came to finish all of the good things that many of the good people started. I would like to see America deliver the dream of this great American with programs like CETA, SCET, NRA, the whole gamut. Without these programs, we are training Americans for a job that does not exist. His program on full employment is the ultimate answer.

I see today that the people of America are getting tired - tired of all these fancy titles that end and leads to an end as all dead-ends. Senator Humphrey's dream of full employment will make these promises come true. His compassion for the youngsters of America - what do the children of America need? Meaningful education and meaningful education with financial commitment. This he has brought about.

He has also finished the great dream of Franklin Delano Roosevelt in social security. What are the few pittance social security gives every month to our elderly when we can't even pay for their medical bill. He not only supported, but he gave birth to Medicare. And the great dream of Abraham Lincoln, so long ago, to fight a war to emancipate the slaves. But emancipation was not the answer he found, but emancipation was almost a path to oblivion, because if you do not give the people you emancipate the tools to be free. And he came about with the Civil Rights Act so

that, not only to be free from the chains of slavery, but to be respected and to be treated like a total man. This, Hubert Humphrey delivered.

And all the dreams of America about peace. Peace with what? Peace with armament. That has been the symphony of this great nation. But Hubert Humphrey felt, and he delivered peace with disarmament.

And all of these things, Mr. Speaker, if we can only but commit ourselves to ten percent of this great man's dreams and aspirations, and if honesty we, too, will be contributing, not only to the welfare of this State and our great nation, but the welfare of the world.

Thank you."

On motion by Representative Kihano, seconded by Representative Kondo and carried, H.R. No. 6 was unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

A resolution (H.R. No. 7) extending condolences and deepest sympathy to the family of Mrs. Iwa Machida was jointly offered by Representatives Caldito, Abercrombie, Ajifu, Aki, Baker, Blair, Campbell, Carroll, Cayetano, Cobb, Dods, Evans, Fong, Garcia, Ikeda, Inaba, Kamalii, Kawakami, Kihano, Kiyabu, Kondo, Kunimura, Larsen, Lunasco, Medeiros, Mina, Mizuguchi, Morioka, Naito, Nakamura, Narvaes, Peters, Say, Segawa, Shito, Sutton, Suwa, Takamine, Uechi, Ueoka, Ushijima, Uwayne, K. Yamada, Yuen and Wakatsuki.

On motion by Representative Caldito, seconded by Representative Kondo and carried, H.R. No. 7 was unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

Representative Machida then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, may I, in behalf of my family, the family of the late Iwa Machida, my grandmother, express to each and every one of you, many, many thanks for your fine words of sympathy, and also for your floral wreath that was sent to the ceremonies held on Maui last evening. It really graced the ceremonies.

Thank you very much to all of my colleagues."

A concurrent resolution (H.C.R. No. 2) relating to the Seventy-Fifth Anniversary of Korean immigration to Hawaii was jointly offered by Representatives Cobb, Ajifu, Aki, Caldito, Cayetano, Dods, Garcia, Kawakami, Kihano, Kondo, Kunimura, Larsen, Lunasco, Medeiros, Mina, Mizuguchi, Morioka, Naito, Nakamura, Peters, Say, Shito, Stanley, Takamine, Ueoka, Ushijima, Uwayne, D. Yamada, K. Yamada, Yuen and Wakatsuki.

On motion by Representative Cobb, seconded by Representative Larsen and carried, H.C.R. No. 2 was adopted.

At 12:36 o'clock p.m., on request by Representative Kunimura, the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:40 o'clock p.m.

ADJOURNMENT

At 12:41 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative Yuen, seconded by Representative Kamalii and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned to 11:30 o'clock a.m. tomorrow, Friday, January 20, 1978, by a rising vote, in memory of the late Senator Hubert Horatio Humphrey.

THIRD DAY

Friday, January 20, 1978

The House of Representatives of the Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1978, convened at 11:30 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Guillermo Gorospe of St. Theresa Church, after which the Roll was called showing all members present.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Second Day.

On motion by Representative Yuen, seconded by Representative Kamalii and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Second Day was approved.

SENATE COMMUNICATION

A communication from the Senate (Sen. Com. No. 2) returning House Concurrent Resolution No. 1 which was adopted by the Senate on January 19, 1978, was read by the Clerk and was placed on file.

At this time, the following introductions were made to the members of the House:

Representative Sutton introduced Mr. and Mrs. Hamblin from Alberta, Canada.

Ninety-seven students from Mililani High School's social studies, student government and government leaders classes, were introduced by Representative Shito. They were accompanied by their instructor, Sharon Yamashita; counselor, Glenn Nitta; and campus counselor, Ed Tomita.

Representative Mina introduced twenty-six third grade students from Fern Elementary School, who were accompanied by their teacher, Mary Balmores, and principal, Stanley Kau.

Upon reconvening at 11:45 o'clock a.m., Representative Kunimura introduced Mrs. Bea Shimooka.

At 11:50 o'clock a.m., on motion by Representative Yuen, seconded by Representative Kamalii and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned to 11:00 o'clock a.m. on Monday, January 23, 1978.

FOURTH DAY

Monday, January 23, 1978

Pursuant to House Concurrent Resolution No. 1, the House of Representatives met in joint session with the Senate, to receive the Governor's message.

The Speaker of the House called the joint session to order at 10:05 o'clock a.m.

The Chair then introduced the honored guests, stating:

"This morning, the Chair would like to acknowledge the presence of our First Lady, Mrs. Jean Ariyoshi. The Chair would also like to acknowledge the presence of our Lieutenant Governor, Nelson Doi."

The Chair then appointed Senators Kawasaki, Ching, Taira and Yee and Representatives Kondo, Kihano, Yuen and Ajifu to escort the Honorable George R. Ariyoshi, Governor of the State of Hawaii, to the rostrum.

Representative Naito then presented Governor Ariyoshi with a red carnation lei on behalf of the Senate and the House of Representatives.

The Chair presented to the members of the Ninth Legislature, Second Session, the Honorable George R. Ariyoshi, stating:

"Members of the Senate, members of the House of Representatives, ladies and gentlemen, it is my high honor and distinct privilege to present to you our Governor, Governor George R. Ariyoshi."

The following is the address of Governor George R. Ariyoshi (Gov. Msg. No. 42):

"Mr. Speaker, Mr. President, Mr. Chief Justice, Mr. Lieutenant Governor, members of the Ninth State Legislature, distinguished ladies and gentlemen, my fellow citizens:

It is a high privilege to address this august body -- you who are charged under our Constitution with determining the policies of our State. All of you have diligently and conscientiously tackled the many problems and challenges facing our community. I am very, very grateful for the cooperative spirit with which you have worked with me.

Twelve months ago, I stood before you at this very same podium and told you that we must become masters of our future and that if we have no say over who comes here, and in what numbers, we might as well abandon any thoughts of a Hawaiian future.

As I said then, and I repeat now, the fundamental question underlying everything we do is whether we have spiritual determination to be masters of our destiny.

These Islands -- through the days of the Monarchy, the Republic, the Territory, and the State -- have reached many turning points which have shaped the destiny of all those who live here now and those who will live here in the future.

This year, we will once again reach a turning point in our history. People of every age, of every era, tend to feel that the decisions facing them are the most crucial and the most important of all of history.

I would say that our age, our era, certainly is no different.

Most of us are convinced that the decisions we make in the next few months and years -- or the decisions that we decline to make -- very well can be the difference between success and failure in our State.

Time, since its beginning, seemingly has accelerated, demanding more and more of each generation and giving fewer moments in which to accomplish objectives.

1978 is a year of decision for Hawaii, and indeed for our style of life.

We are serious when we talk about a preferred future for our Islands and for all of our citizens -- those who live here now and those who will live here after we are all long gone.

If we do not seize the opportunities now present to assert ourselves and to implement our wishes, then we will have only ourselves to blame. It will be tragic if, in the year 2000, the leaders at that time look back a quarter of a century on the lost opportunities and with great remorse for what might have been -- but wasn't.

We have been told that possibly nothing of significance will come out of this legislative session, that because 1978 is an election year, all of us will be too cautious and too concerned about our images to propose and act upon anything controversial and to this, I say, nonsense! The needs and the concerns of the people know no political seasons, and I trust that we will answer any such notions that we will have a 'non controversial' session by enacting significant legislation and spelling out clearly and boldly for all to see the directions toward which we feel this State should move.

Today, I would like to report to you briefly on how we have perceived our commitment to the future of Hawaii and what we have been doing to implement that commitment.

Early last summer, I assembled a group of State workers, expert in a variety of disciplines --land use, health, planning, agriculture -- to join with me in an effort to begin to address our concerns over the rate of growth in Hawaii.

I asked them to let their minds run free, not to be constrained by negative thinkers or by past defeats, and to identify for us possible strategies by which we might reasonably expect to gain some control over our future.

I told them, as I have told others, that I am not advocating a no-growth policy, but that I am seeking the right amount of growth, the right kind of growth, and in the right places.

They have responded to this difficult task by identifying a variety of potential legislative and administrative actions which I will ask you, and the citizens of Hawaii, to consider in the days which lie ahead. Many of these ideas remain conceptual in nature.

Many will require further review and analysis. As we delve into them more thoroughly, some may fall by the wayside. But it is my hope that you will allow these legislative halls to become a forum for discussion and for dialogue on these and other ideas which will be put forward as we, together, seek a direction for tomorrow.

We are submitting these proposals without the benefit of public hearings. We want the Legislature to provide the forum which so far has been

lacking. We want you and our citizens to be very frank in expressing opinions on these proposals, to articulate your hopes and desires for the future of these islands, and to become partners with the Executive Branch of this government in shaping our future.

Let me briefly share some of the major areas of thought which will be presented to you.

First, we believe that we must seek the kind of growth for our economy -- in tourism, agriculture and other commerce -- which will not encourage in-migration, but rather will provide jobs for our own people, at decent wages, and in an atmosphere which enhances their sense of well-being and dignity.

In this regard, we will propose legislation appropriating funds which will again make the State a partner with the City and County of Honolulu in providing much needed capital improvements in Waikiki and to encourage the renovation and redevelopment of the existing visitor facilities.

In addition, we will propose the implementation of a program to encourage intra-state tourism and recommend legislation relating to managing the rate and nature of tourism growth. We will also propose legislation which will encourage the employment of Hawaii residents in the public and private sector and continue on-going efforts to match available jobs with the talents of resident job-seekers.

Secondly, we will continue our efforts to seek greater self-sufficiency for Hawaii by increasing our agricultural diversity and preserving our agricultural lands. To me, this is vital if Hawaii is to remain economically viable and environmentally attractive.

We will therefore propose legislation which will allow the State to purchase the development rights for agricultural land. We will propose that leases of public lands for agriculture be allowed on a negotiated basis in order that agricultural enterprises are not left out of the process of obtaining viable acreage. We will propose, also, that agricultural lot sizes be a minimum of two acres and that the penalty of failure to retain land dedicated to agriculture be raised from 10 percent to 25 percent of the maximum taxes due.

Next, we will propose actions which the State can take to directly discourage in-migration and immigration.

These will include the use of the survey technique to identify more specifically why people come to Hawaii and why they leave. We will recommend that you consider statutory amendments that exclude able-bodied adults, without minor children, and below a certain age, from receiving State-funded welfare payments. And, we will ask that you consider authorizing a study of the impact of a system of taxation which would impose higher tax rates on future new residents on the basis that their presence directly and immediately places new costs upon the public sector for services.

Also, we will seek to improve the availability and accessibility of family planning services so that our own resident population will have a choice in the matter of family size.

As I stated to you in my message last year, we also believe it is necessary to pursue with the Federal government remedies to current immigration laws which unfairly impact Hawaii and threaten certain other states and cities.

We will work with our Congressional delegation to explore the avenues available to us in amending present statutes so that immigrants may be more equitably apportioned among the states and so that states receive Federal funds proportionate to the number of immigrants choosing to reside within their boundaries.

I intend to pursue several other programs which I feel are vitally needed for the integrity and the stability and the well-being of certain of the states, including Hawaii, in regard to immigration.

On the one hand, Congress establishes quotas for the number of immigrants that are admitted annually to the United States, reasoning, quite correctly, that our society can absorb just so many persons who may put special burdens on our institutions. But the same Federal government that recognizes that the entire nation can absorb only so many immigrants fails to recognize that individual states have identical concerns, often magnified because of lack of resources.

To me, it is terribly inconsistent for the U.S. government to say that only so many immigrants can enter the United States in any given period, but then fail to take into account

the special needs of the individual states.

In connection with this, I am exploring proposing congressional action which will establish state-by-state quotas for immigrants, based on population and ability to provide services.

Also, I am going to explore Federal legislation that would require each immigrant to remain a minimum period of time in the state to which he or she first settles before moving to another state. The theory here is that once immigrants establish roots and lifestyles in certain areas, they are less likely to resettle in such target areas as Hawaii, which presently are bearing a disproportional burden for a Federal policy in which they have no voice.

Also, I feel the Federal government must take measures to make sponsors of aliens entering this country more responsible for their economic well being. I am suggesting that Federal action be taken to hold sponsors financially responsible if public assistance is needed to support an immigrant during a specified period of time after entrance into the United States.

I emphasize, as I did in my previous State of the State message, that my actions in the field of immigration are not designed to separate families. Far from it. I feel that the reuniting of families must receive the highest priority possible in determining who may enter this country. But at the same time, we must also be realistic. This State cannot accommodate every person who may wish to live here. To me, it is that simple.

We must find solutions here in Hawaii, and working in concert with the Federal government, to this growing and encompassing problem. No longer can we shrug off the problem with the easy remark that this is a Federal matter. Yes, it certainly is a Federal matter, but at the same time, the Federal government is a creature of the 50 states and it simply must be responsive to the needs of the member states of this and other areas.

It is with this in mind that I intend to pursue this issue vigorously in the months ahead until we achieve an equitable balance between human needs on the one hand and our State's needs on the other. I am confident that this balance can be achieved.

And finally, we need ways to control both the timing and the location of growth in this State.

In this regard, we will send legislation to you which would require the adoption of specific criteria by the Land Use Commission for deciding whether lands should be made available for development. These criteria would include consideration of the need, location, environmental effects and public costs of future urban development. In addition, we will propose that a study be undertaken of whether the Land Use Commission should become a full-time body.

This is part of the package of proposals that we will offer for your consideration this session in the areas of growth and the future of these Islands.

We need these tools, and others, with which to shape and direct the future of this State. You members of the Legislature are the only ones who can provide them.

Without these tools, we will lose, and continue to lose, precious opportunities. With them, we can begin to move in the directions that we all desire and that are so necessary for all the citizens of this State.

Because I feel that action is so vitally needed not only in the areas of our future but also in the areas of our present, I wish to discuss with you for a few minutes some of the issues that will come before you this session.

The continuing escalation of our welfare costs is of great concern to us all. Last year, I proposed a number of measures to curb the rapid increases in general and medical assistance payments. These measures are not intended to cut off assistance from the needy. However, we cannot endure these increases year after year at the expense of the curtailment of other programs, and I urge your favorable consideration and action of the proposals now before you.

In this case, perhaps money speaks louder than words. When year after year, we find it necessary to provide huge unanticipated additional appropriations for a single State program -- \$8 million this year and \$17 million for next year -- then we must take action.

Another nagging concern in this area is welfare fraud. Last year, with limited support, we successfully prosecuted 65 offenders and recovered \$150,000. This year, I am requesting

more funds and positions to continue this crackdown on welfare abusers. These offenders are an unnecessary burden on our taxpayers and they bring the entire program into public disrepute.

In the same area, we are asking for funds this session to set up within the Attorney General's office a special unit to investigate and prosecute those providers who abuse the Medicare-Medicaid programs.

On transit, this Administration addressed itself to the enormous and growing problems of traffic congestion, particularly on the island of Oahu. We have added new highways and we have widened and expanded existing ones. While these measures have helped, other alternatives must also be pursued. Obviously, we cannot forever endure an increasing and worsening congestion of automobiles. There has to be a turn-around and we must decide soon what that is to be.

I feel that we must come to grips with this issue this session. It is my feeling that not all of the answers are yet at hand, despite what some persons would lead us to believe. We are told, for instance, that a fixed guideway system, linking this city along a narrow corridor, is the only answer. It may be the ultimate answer or it may not. Frankly, I do not think anyone in this State yet has the answers to who is going to pay for such a system, not only to construct it, but even more importantly, to operate it. The costs of such a system would be enormous for every tax-paying citizen in this State.

The questions on mass transit are vital to this State, and I am happy that you are attempting to get all the facts to seek the best possible solutions.

In another area, we have underway a plan to redevelop the Honolulu waterfront area, to make it a people-place, and to link it with the downtown Honolulu business area. I find the plans exciting for this old, but ever new, area of our city. I urge your support on this project.

The State has long sought a system of integrated inter-island transportation to accommodate both the passenger and cargo needs of our State. We continue to pursue this goal and are prepared to continue jointly with private enterprise the development

of semi-submersible vessels as a possible answer to one of the major gaps in available systems, and in this regard, I am asking for \$160,000 for developmental planning funds to be used in a joint effort with interested parties in the private sector.

Also, we are studying very carefully the consequences of the termination of Sea Flite operations and the announced curtailment of inter-Island cargo service by Hawaiian Air.

I want to report to you also that this Administration intends to pursue vigorously a joint operation of Barber's Point Airfield as a general aviation airport for Oahu.

I am totally in support of moving general aviation from Honolulu International Airport as a matter of safety for all of our traveling public. At the same time, I am reluctant to locate a new airport in any of our rural residential areas. It has long been my feeling that if persons decided to live near existing airports, they at least knew what they were getting into. Only as a last resort should we impose a new airport facility in an area where none has existed before and, for that reason, I am going to pursue very vigorously a joint sharing of the military facilities at Barber's Point. I will enlist the help of our Congressional delegation and I will keep you informed of the progress on this.

Last year, we submitted for your consideration a bill which would have provided for a merging of our employees' retirement system with the social security system. We viewed this as an urgent matter because of the increasing costs of our present system to both the government as an employer and our employees. I reiterate the urgency of this legislation now because of recent increases in social security taxes which serve to compound an already serious problem.

In the area of crime, I urge you to give serious attention to the findings and recommendations of the Hawaii Commission on Crime which is operating under the able leadership of Lieutenant Governor Nelson K. Doi.

This commission has embarked on a very ambitious and very much needed undertaking to identify problem areas and to offer solutions for the protection of our citizens.

In another area, aquaculture is

proving to be one of the fastest growing industries in Hawaii. Sales of aquaculture products in 1978 are expected to increase 500 percent over 1977. Conservative forecasts for this industry indicate that wholesale receipts may reach \$84 million in 1990 and create thousands of new jobs.

As the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House pointed out in their addresses at the opening of this session last week, aquaculture offers tremendous potentials for this State. Therefore, I am requesting \$750,000 for research and development, and \$1.25 million to match \$3.75 million in Federal funds for the construction of a Tropical Aquaculture Center in Hawaii. I am convinced that these dollars will be repaid with great interest in the years ahead as the aquaculture industry flourishes and provides thousands of productive jobs for our citizens.

The Federal government, in conjunction with the University of Hawaii, is very seriously considering the establishment of a Tropical Agricultural Center in Hawaii. This Center, supported by Federal and State dollars, would create programs covering agricultural education and research and development needs relevant to the Pacific and Asian regions. The establishment of the Center would undoubtedly attract research activities of many private sector firms involved in tropical agriculture; further expand employment opportunities for University graduates; and draw needed capital into Hawaii. I will communicate with you further on this project.

For many years, we have expressed the desire and the need to develop Kakaako to its fullest potential. I am happy to report today that we are ready to begin the first of three critical planning phases to make the development of residential, recreational, commercial and light industrial uses in this area a reality. This year, we are requesting nearly \$2 million to fund the first phase. The total planning cost will be \$6 million and will pave the way for a development program that will help our construction industry, provide new job opportunities, new homes, and recreational areas for our residents.

I know that the private sector has been patiently awaiting government action for many years and I urge its cooperation and understanding as we work together on this landmark project. Kakaako may not be the answer to all our urban problems, but it is a welcome and long-awaited start.

With your strong support, the State has made great progress in energy

management and conservation and in the research and development of alternate energy resources. Federal recognition of Hawaii's progress is evidenced by the growing commitments of Federal funds for our energy programs. In order to step up research and application of our natural energy resources, I am requesting authorization to spend \$5 million on promising projects. Our funds will be used to match Federal dollars whenever and wherever possible. In addition, with the support of Hawaii's Congressional delegation, we will continue to press the United States Department of Energy for a strategic petroleum reserve to be located here. I am sure that all of us are aware of our almost total dependence on oil and certainly we all vividly recall the 1974 energy crisis and the gas plan. Action this year is vital and will move us toward achieving our goal of reducing our dependence on oil imports wherever possible.

I want to reaffirm my total commitment to the University of Hawaii and to higher education in this State. Despite a lack of all of the dollars we would like to spend in the UH system, I feel that tremendous progress has resulted in the past year and I am confident that this progress will continue, under enlightened administration and programs. Just as I am asking for planning in all aspects of our future, I am asking, too, that this legislative body address itself decisively this session to a West Oahu campus.

My feeling is that we vitally need another four-year undergraduate program on the island of Oahu other than the Manoa campus. We need it not only to relieve physical pressures on the Manoa facilities, but also to provide a more relaxed atmosphere for those of our students who would benefit from such an environment.

But while favoring another undergraduate college, I do not favor spending enormous, or unneeded, sums of money to create one. I am of the opinion that we should attempt to acquire a 44-acre parcel of Federal land now being used by the Navy as a drum-storage area which is adjacent to Leeward Community College. This land would provide space for expansion while at the same time permitting a sharing of existing and new facilities. I think it would be the height of folly for us to spend enormous sums of money on creating a totally new campus

when we can mesh with already existing facilities and thereby serve the people for less money.

I urge your earnest consideration of such a plan.

I want, also, to take notice today of what I perceive to be a new spirit and a new dedication in the operation of our public school system. I am tremendously encouraged by the accomplishments of the past several years in the education of our young, and in the plans for the future. I am impressed with the efforts to bring a greater involvement on the part of all of our citizens to the process of education, and also to provide for greater flexibility in the educational process, extending down to the district and school levels. We are intensifying efforts to involve the total community in making a commitment to quality education in this State and I feel we definitely are moving in the right direction.

I was tremendously encouraged, incidentally, by the results of the first Governor's conference on education held three weeks ago. The conference focused on our problems as well as our achievements and set a direction which I hope we will pursue with success in the years to come.

The Department of Accounting and General Services and the Stadium Authority have begun to explore the possibilities of expanding our Aloha Stadium site at Halawa into a complete sports and convention complex consisting of a multi-purpose arena accommodating perhaps 20,000 persons for a variety of events. Such exploration will necessarily take into consideration the plans being developed by the City and County of Honolulu.

This Island needs such a complex, not only to complement existing facilities and satisfy existing needs, but also to attract major league basketball and hockey teams and to provide adequate facilities for even the largest conventions, including, perhaps, the nominating conventions of our two major political parties.

And now, I would like to discuss with you very briefly a document in which I put a great deal of hope for the future -- the State Plan.

In your wisdom, you ordered that such a document be assembled. The Plan brings together the collective thinking of the State on the needs and desires of our people. It represents our objectives and details the machinery

needed to achieve them. It spells out our priorities and calls for a statewide planning framework. What is being proposed is a mechanism whereby State and County activities can be integrated in a framework which recognizes the distinct roles and responsibilities of each level of government.

All this has been accomplished in the State Plan which, if adopted this session, will be the first such document in any of the fifty states.

Once again, Hawaii will have led the nation in innovation and good government but obviously, we should not adopt this document just to be first. We should adopt it because it will lead to a better Hawaiian tomorrow.

I will be sending you several of the State Plan's working tools for your consideration and approval this session.

The first of these tools is what we call the priority directions. While the State Plan articulates the long-range aspirations of our people, the priority directions list detailed challenges for immediate attention and action by this Administration and this Legislature. Priority directions, once adopted by you through concurrent resolution, will provide the necessary direction for State and County agencies as well as the private sector over the next years. I wish to note that our legislative packages reflect the directions detailed in this document.

A second tool of the State Plan is the State functional plans. The first of these plans -- tourism, housing, agriculture, and transportation, are being prepared for your consideration. These plans assess our needs on a statewide basis and play the vital roles of guiding the allocation of public resources in the future. This role is exceedingly important, given the limitations of our resources and the need to manage them in the best possible manner in order to achieve the goals and objectives listed in the State Plan.

I urge you, then, to study the State Plan and its accompanying legislation, to offer us your input on it, and ultimately to adopt it, if you agree with us on its importance.

The Hawaii State Plan is not the end, it is a beginning. It is the beginning of us finally taking control of our destiny. It will serve notice

that we know what is good for this State, what is proper, and what is achievable.

Thus far today, I have concentrated on the future of these Islands, properly, I feel, because there is no more important subject.

But for a few minutes, I would like to share with you some of my thoughts on the immediate past, and what we have achieved, working together, for the good of this State.

I am sure that we are all mindful of a recent survey that shows a discouragingly low public regard for the functions of government and how those functions address themselves to the needs of the people.

This disenchantment with government certainly is not restricted to Hawaii. Our figures were about the same as those recorded nationally, but this is of little comfort to those of us in government. I find it disturbing and disconcerting, particularly when this public perception of government is measured against the concern and the effort that are expended in all branches of government for the benefit of our people. That these efforts are not perceived and appreciated is a genuine sorrow to me, and I assume to you also, and I feel this disenchantment with government is composed of many parts.

For one thing, there is a general malaise throughout this country on the part of the governed toward those who govern. Some of this is understandable since in these days of financial and social complexities, the expectations of citizens often exceed the abilities of government to perform.

But at the same time, I think all of us have been remiss in not telling our constituents just what we have been doing -- and why. We have not made them equal enough partners, certainly in information, in the governing process. We have tended too much, possibly, to feel that doing a good job was tantamount to being perceived as doing a good job.

So possibly it would be a worthwhile exercise for the next few minutes to note briefly what we have achieved -- working together, you and I, for the common good -- in the past few years.

Certainly the accomplishments have been many and varied. They have touched on every conceivable aspect of life in these Islands.

They range from the acquisition of hundreds of acres of park lands to be held in public trust, to helping the elderly; from putting more of our citizens onto the land through the Hawaiian Homes program, to striving to alleviate traffic congestion on Oahu; from bold and aggressive steps to secure alternate energy sources for this State, to fiscal responsibility; from a more progressive and humane treatment of our mentally incompetent and disturbed, to the successful operation of Aloha Stadium; from welfare reform, to home ownership for low and moderate income families; from the preservation of a major part of the Cost of Living Allowance for our Federal workers, to the development of water resources; from the promotion of Hawaii's products, to the preservation of our agricultural lands; from the protection and preservation of our Hawaiian sugar industry, to planning for an International Trade Center; from the start of a new prison, to extensive capital improvement funds to stimulate a lagging economy; from vans for the handicapped, to a new look and a new spirit in our educational system; from a coastal zone management law, to planning for a new and revitalized waterfront in downtown Honolulu; from a tourism study, to the Windward Regional plan which is designed to preserve and protect a unique area and lifestyle; from a full-time Public Utilities Commission, to inexpensive meals for the elderly; from the spurring of the aquaculture industry, to sunset laws to weed out those governmental functions and programs that either don't work or are not needed; from programs to find absent parents and make them participate in the support of their children, to new hospitals and health centers for the care of our people; from a plan for Kakaako, to a reef runway for the convenience and safety of our citizens; from a new highway in Kona, to a new airport in Hilo; from the Kohala Task Force, to the Kauai Task Force; from assisting 'Hawaii 5-0', to placing a telescope atop Mauna Kea through which we can study the mysteries of the universe.

The list of accomplishments and achievements goes on and on, too long, too diverse, and too voluminous for this address.

But because I am so proud of the accomplishments that you and I have forged in moving this State forward, ever forward, toward its destiny, I will be making available to you, and the rest of our citizens,

a more detailed report in printed form of our stewardship in the past three years.

These years have not been easy ones, make no mistake about that. They have not been blessed with abundant revenues. They have witnessed a national recession and local construction problems, which had a chilling effect on our economy. They were years in which the demands on government became ever more compelling, while the abilities and the willingness of our citizens to pay for these services did not rise commensurately. They were years of inflated dollars and reduced purchasing power.

But if these were lean years for revenues, they were at the same time rich years for accomplishments. They were rich in services offered to our citizens. They were rich in our abilities to move ahead in our educational systems on all levels despite money restrictions. They were years in which the Hawaii dream of equality and justice for all moved many steps forward toward total reality. They were years in which the State government accepted every problem and every challenge as an opportunity to create a better State. They were years in which Hawaii moved to the forefront in international trade and in the furthering of peace and understanding amongst all nations. They were years in which we moved aggressively in our efforts to attract regional headquarters for multi-national firms, and I may say here that in the next few days, I will make an announcement for the location of a regional headquarters of a large American corporation in our State. They were years during which we made many decisions -- many right, some wrong -- which will affect the lives of all of our citizens for decades to come. And they were years in which the government of this State said loudly and clearly that we will be the masters of our fate and the shapers of our destiny.

Working with you, this is my legacy my first Administration will leave for the people of this State. Not just accomplishments that can be measured, many as they may be, but a new spirit and a new will to succeed and to achieve.

No leader can ask for more than that, and I am well satisfied.

And now, my friends, we come to the end of another State of the State message. I appreciate your attention to what I have had to say.

We share an awesome responsibility, you and I, a responsibility that transcends this time and this place.

It is, after all, you and I, as representatives of the people of this State, who must find the right direction, the direction which will leave Hawaii a better place than we found it.

It is not easy to find that direction. We know that it does not come just from taking care of today's problems and today's needs. Putting our priorities on finding immediate solutions to immediate concerns leads us nowhere. Direction comes only from an awareness of future problems and future needs and a willingness to step forward and address that future -- as difficult and overwhelming as that may sometimes be. And, as politically unrewarding, too.

That has been my approach to the job of governing because I believe that while there are many who can accomplish the daily work, there are few who can lay the foundation for a preferred future. I believe that you and I, working together, have made great strides in laying that foundation. But much more needs to be done, and, God willing, you and I will be called upon to continue our efforts to bring rich rewards to all who have found their place in Hawaii.

Aloha, mahalo, and God bless you all."

Senate President Ushijima then stated:

"Thank you, Mr. Governor, for your very comprehensive speech that imparts your policies, your thoughts and programs for Hawaii. We certainly appreciate the concerns that you have expressed. The concerns are ours also and again, we offer to you our hand of cooperation to move Hawaii forward to solve many of the problems that confront us for a great and better Hawaii.

If there is no further business before this body, this joint session with the Senate and the House, Second Session, Ninth State Legislature, is hereby declared adjourned."

At 10:50 o'clock a.m., the joint session with the Senate adjourned.

At 11:05 o'clock a.m., the House

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION

A resolution (H.R. No. 9) congratulating Captain Ellison S. Onizuka of Kealahou, Hawaii, on being selected as an astronaut by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration was jointly offered by Representatives Inaba, Abercrombie, Ajifu, Aki, Blair, Caldito, Campbell, Carroll, Cayetano, Cobb, Dods, Evans, Fong, Ikeda, Kamalii, Kihano, Kiyabu, Kondo, Larsen, Lunasco, Machida, Medeiros, Mina, Mizuguchi, Morioka, Peters, Say, Segawa, Shito, Stanley, Sutton, Suwa, Takamine, Toguchi, Uechi, D. Yamada, K. Yamada, Yuen and Wakatsuki and was read by the Clerk.

On motion by Representative Inaba, seconded by Representative Takamine and carried, H.R. No. 9 was adopted.

At this time, Representative Inaba proceeded to introduce the guests, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and members of this House, we have with us this morning Mrs. Mitsue Onizuka, mother of Captain Ellison Onizuka, the honoree. She has come all the way from Kona this morning, on this morning's flight, at our request, to join us in honoring Captain Onizuka, her son.

Mr. Speaker and members of this House, it is with great pleasure that I introduce to you Mrs. Mitsue Onizuka."

Representative Takamine then presented Mrs. Onizuka with a red carnation lei.

Accompanying Mrs. Onizuka were her daughter, Mrs. Norma Sakamoto, and her son, Mr. Claude Onizuka.

Representative Inaba continued his remarks, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, on behalf of yourself and the members of this House, I would like to thank Mrs. Onizuka

for coming all the way this morning to join us in this ceremony."

Representative Inaba then presented Mrs. Onizuka with a certified copy of the resolution.

At 11:45 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair, for the purpose of allowing the members to extend their personal welcome and congratulations to the guests.

Upon reconvening at 11:50 o'clock a.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representative D. Yamada.

Representative Abercrombie then introduced to the members of the House Miss Karen Burnett, a student at Mid-Pacific Institute, and two of her fellow students.

Representative Abercrombie then rose on a point of personal privilege and asked by the Chair to "state your point on what grounds, or what's your point of personal privilege", Representative Abercrombie replied:

"Mr. Speaker, this morning, in the courtroom of Judge Shintaku, I witnessed the most abusive display of injudicious attempt that I have ever seen. . ."

At this point, Representative Sutton rose on a point of order and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, we are a legislative body. Under the separation of powers, we have a judiciary, we have a legislature, we have an executive. It is not our province to criticize the judiciary, sir."

The Chair stated:

"Representative Abercrombie, I think the Chair has ruled in previous sessions that the question of personal privilege is rather limited."

Representative Abercrombie interrupted:

"It is. That is why I am rising on this particular point. The legislature was brought into Judge Shintaku's discussion this morning."

The Chair stated:

"The Chair would rule you out of order at this time."

Representative Abercrombie continued,

stating:

"I would like to appeal the rule, Mr. Speaker. I think that I am entitled, as a matter of privilege. If you will refer to Cushing's 'Questions of Privilege' and 'Nature of the Questions', I am entitled to rise and speak when my function as a legislator has been brought into question and when the law, as passed by the legislature, is brought into question, whether by the judiciary or anyone else. If the time arises when a legislator is prevented from speaking on the floor of the House, addressing questions, especially of law that the legislature has passed and questioning the opportunity to do so, and then we have effectively cut off this body as a forum, not just on motions per se, but on questions of privilege which has an ancient and honorable history, and which are necessary for the proper conduct and information of the public.

You cannot, Mr. Speaker, rise in a court of law and argue with the Judge, or be found in contempt. If, however, a Judge acts contemptuously towards attorneys or anyone in his courtroom, I think it is incumbent upon such institutions as the legislature, to provide the opportunity for people to bring that to the attention of the public in a circumstance and in a context and in a body in which contemptuous behavior can be cited without fear that that will put you into contempt of another branch of government."

The Chair replied:

"Representative Abercrombie, the Chair has ruled in the past and the Chair now rules that the question of personal privilege extends to the question of whether someone questions the right of the Representative to sit as a member here or on a personal affront from a fellow legislator happening on this floor."

Representative Abercrombie stated:

"Mr. Speaker, the rules of parliamentary practice, beginning on page 128 of Cushing's, fail to substantiate that point of view. Could you cite to me under questions of privilege, the nature of the questions any point in Cushing's which I believe is the rule book for this House which will substantiate that view."

The Chair replied:

"The Chair has ruled based on Mason's. You have appealed the Chair's ruling. . ."

Representative Abercrombie interrupted:

"Mr. Speaker, am I to understand that you will not cite Cushing's to substantiate your ruling?"

The Chair replied:

"I believe the Chair, in past sessions, cited Mason's, and if you will look through the Journal, it is quite explicit. . ."

Representative Abercrombie interrupted on a point of order, at which time Representative Peters asked for a recess.

The Chair asked:

"Will you allow a recess? You have the floor."

Representative Abercrombie answered:

"Of course."

At 11:55 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:01 o'clock p.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representative Cayetano.

Representative Abercrombie then rose and asked:

"May I have permission to withdraw my appeal on the question of personal privilege?"

The Chair replied:

"If there are no objections, so ordered."

Representative Abercrombie then asked:

"May I then, Mr. Speaker, rise on a point of information with you?"

Directed by the Chair to "proceed", Representative Abercrombie thanked the Chair and asked:

"Mr. Speaker, the rules of the House of Representatives of the State of Hawaii, to my understanding, when a problem arises concerning an interpretation of the rules, we are to refer to Cushing's Manual.

Cushing's Manual of Parliamentary Practice, under the questions of privilege, has a more general nature than Mason's, as you cited, for two points are here. If you desire

to have a more explicit definition of 'privilege', Mason's obviously provides it, but Mason's is not our rule. Our rule is more general, giving you the opportunity, as Speaker, when someone rises on a point of personal privilege, to determine at that time whether or not you will allow that point of personal privilege to be rendered to the body irrespective of Mason's particular point on privilege.

My point of information then is that my question is to you: Should we not then use Cushing's which is more general, and if you determine at some point that a question of personal privilege is not relevant, or is out of order, you may rule so, and an appeal will be made? But to refer to Mason's rather than Cushing's is to undercut or undermine the nature of the rules of the House of Representatives.

So my question is this: Is it not in order to refer to Cushing's rather than to Mason's, and then for you to make a decision on the point of personal privilege based on the more general nature of Cushing's?"

The Chair replied:

"I believe the Chair is not way out of line in this ruling. The Chair has studied the Cushing's Manual on the question of personal privilege. I believe Cushing's says that the person must be aggrieved. The question as to clarify what 'grievance' means is the fact that we then turned to Mason's which the Congress of the United States follows, and to get this clarification, I have used the Mason's Legislative Manual. . ."

Representative Kunimura, on a point of order, interrupted and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I will refuse to accept any suggestion at this time practices of the Congress of the United States because this is the State legislature. As far as the Congress, they can practice what the hell they want to, but I certainly feel, Mr. Speaker, that we have adopted the House Rules and, therefore, we should abide by the House Rules, and if the House Rules refer to Cushing's as our cornerstone and benchmark for our decision-making and an orderly progress of our body here, then let us do it."

The Chair replied:

"The Chair stated that the Chair believes the Chair is following the Cushing's Manual and in order to clarify in the Chair's mind what personal grievance should mean, the Chair has turned to Mason's."

Representative Abercrombie then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, in pursuit of further clarification, with all due respect, I do not see in the question of privilege the nature of the questions the word 'grievance' or 'personal grievance'. If I may quote: 'These questions are such, that although they do not relate to the pending question, are of such importance that they take precedence over all other questions and because of that privilege are not debatable.' That was what I was referring to and what I am asking.

My question is: Is it not preferable for you to rule, as Speaker, under Cushing's as to whether the point I raised is one that is in order or not, and that if you rule that it is, I state it, and if you rule that it is not, that I may, if I wish, or any other member, appeal it, and if sustained by the body, carry through with it, and if defeated, sit down and keep my counsel."

The Chair responded:

"Well, however way you want to interpret the Chair's ruling, the Chair rules that you are out of order on this particular privilege."

Representative Abercrombie stated:

"I want to make sure I understand. Are you ruling me out of order on the basis of Cushing's or on the basis of Mason's?"

The Chair replied:

"I believe I have stated it. I have reviewed the question of personal privilege reading the Cushing's Manual, and trying to interpret it, get a clarification in my mind how extensive this privilege question should be. I have said that I have referred to the Mason's Manual for my clarification and I have ruled in the past on this question based on that. I will continue to rule on that basis."

Representative Abercrombie then said:

"Thank you. That makes it clear.

I would like to appeal your ruling then, on the basis that reference to Mason's restricts members of this House in such a fashion that it obviates the parliamentary practice rules of Cushing's under which we operate, and that the Cushing's

Manual puts it in more general terms, precisely to allow parliamentary bodies to bring points. . . I should say individual members of this parliamentary body to bring points. . ."

Representative Sutton interrupted on a point of order and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, this particular bit of information which he has now labeled it 'personal privilege.' Now he is on the floor and it is not debatable and he is carrying on a debate on a non-debatable subject. . ."

Representative Abercrombie interrupted:

"I am not carrying on a debate, Mr. Speaker. I am trying to clear the nature of my appeal."

Representative Cobb then rose on a point of order and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, in reference to the discussion taking place on Cushing's which is incorporated in our rules, on page 128, it states that, 'These questions are such, that although they do not relate to the pending question, are of such importance that they take precedence over all other questions and because of that privilege are not debatable.'

In the interpretation of your ruling, it is merely a matter of whether or not the question raised of privilege is of such importance that it would take precedence over the other business of the House. If in fact you ruled that it is not, then the question of privilege is out of order. If you rule that it is, then the question of privilege is held to be in order.

That is my position, Mr. Speaker. It need go no further than that, Mr. Speaker. It simply. . ."

The Chair interrupted:

"You are correct, Representative Cobb.

The Chair's ruling has been appealed. The question is: Shall the Chair's ruling be sustained?"

Representative Abercrombie, on a point of order, stated:

"I have not received an answer, and with all due respect, Mr. Speaker, I am not trying to be obstinate on this. I am trying to get it on the record. Are you over-ruling me on the basis of Cushing's or on the basis of Mason's?"

The reason I am asking this question is that if you wish to state in your

mind Mason's gives you the basis upon which you will make your decision in relation to this, fine. That is alright with me provided everybody in here understands that, but that is not what Cushing's says, and I think that unless this body wants to operate on Cushing's Manual with the exception of Mason's, that we are involved now in two separate questions. One is the question of personal privilege for which I rose and which you overruled and, second, is whether or not Mason's, by your own interpretation, will become the exception to the rule."

The Chair responded:

"I believe Representative Cobb stated the section quite apropos. The Chair has indicated that the Chair is not disregarding Cushing's. The Chair has taken into consideration Cushing's."

Representative Kunimura was recognized and he stated:

"I am not satisfied; therefore, I rise on a point of information."

Directed by the Chair to "state your point", Representative Kunimura asked:

"You have considered, then, Cushing's?"

The Chair answered:

"That is correct."

Representative Kunimura asked:

"And you are considering some other document in conjunction with Cushing's - is that correct?"

The Chair replied:

"In determining and to clarify in the Chair's mind the Cushing's Manual on the question of personal privilege, I have consulted with the Mason's Legislative Manual to clarify in my own mind the application of the Cushing's Manual."

Representative Kunimura then said:

"I would like to know just as much as Mr. Abercrombie that if your ruling is based on Cushing's and Cushing's alone because that's our benchmark, then I would accept your ruling and I shall make my mind up on the appeal accordingly,

but if it is based on something other than Cushing's, then I would rise on a point of order because we have only Cushing's referred to in our House Rules and we have got to play the rules of the House according to the way it is written, even if it is defective. Maybe this House did not consider, and maybe we should have considered, a more definitive interpretation and clarification on point of order.

I've seen point of order violated so often. I remember just before I was hammered down last year, and it is up to you, but some people can talk about their childhood in Buffalo, New York, and he wasn't ruled out of order. All of a sudden, my family name was involved and I was smashed. . ."

The Chair interrupted:

"That was a grievance. . ."

Representative Kunimura interrupted:

"I am not bringing that matter up, Mr. Speaker. What I was quoting was right, but I think, in all fairness, I believe this body should be given an opportunity. If we are going to vote on the question of the appeal, then we must know the genesis of your ruling, whether it is by Cushing's or Cushing's adulterated with some other document."

The Chair stated:

"The Chair rules, based on Cushing's."

Representative Abercrombie stated:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

I am pleased to know that Cushing's which provides for a more general interpretation and thus a specific announcement each time the question of privilege is raised based on the merits of that point of personal privilege."

The Chair stated:

"The Chair would like to remind you that the question of appeal is undebatable."

Representative Abercrombie replied:

"I have not appealed yet."

The Chair answered:

"I believe you have."

Representative Abercrombie then said:

"No, I'm on my way. I would like to appeal your ruling, Mr. Speaker, that my rising on a point of personal privilege was out of order under our rule."

Representative Sutton then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to . . ."

Representative Kunimura interrupted on a point of order and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I hope the gentleman from Nuuanu Valley would give proper decorum to this body. There is a valid motion offered and time must be given for a second."

Representative Sutton then stated:

"I make a motion for laying on the table of the appeal. It is not debatable."

At 12:14 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair, "so that we can all come to our reasonable senses."

Upon reconvening at 12:46 o'clock p.m., the Chair recognized Representative Abercrombie and asked:

"I believe Representative Abercrombie has the floor. Will you yield to Representative Kunimura?"

Representative Abercrombie replied in the affirmative.

Representative Kunimura then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, may I, at this time, apologize for my misinterpretation of the House Rules. In my zealous effort to sustain and protect the individual rights of the members of this House, I misinterpreted, but now I stand corrected that an appeal does not require a second."

Representative Abercrombie then asked:

"Would you kindly state for me the present situation? Has my appeal to you been recognized?"

The Chair replied:

"Your appeal of the Chair's ruling has been recognized. The Chair will put the question to the floor. The question is: Shall the Chair's ruling be sustained?"

All those voting 'aye' will sustain the Chair's ruling. All those voting 'no' will not sustain the Chair's ruling."

The motion was put to a vote and carried, and the Chair's ruling was sustained by voice vote.

Representative Abercrombie then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I will have to ask for a revote on that. The 'ayes' clearly, in my ears, took precedence over the 'noes'. I guess I will have to ask for a roll call vote."

The Chair stated:

"Roll call has been requested. Clerk, call the roll."

The Clerk proceeded to call the roll and recorded an "aye" vote for Representative Abercrombie.

The Chair interrupted and asked:

"Are you sustaining the Chair's ruling, Representative Abercrombie?"

Representative Abercrombie replied:

"I am sorry, Mr. Speaker, I misunderstood. I thought that in voting 'aye', I was voting to sustain my appeal. I apologize to the House and I ask to withdraw the roll call vote because if the 'aye' sustained your position, then I clearly was wrong."

The Chair remarked:

"The Chair appreciates your recognition of that."

Representative Abercrombie stated:

"I would wish to have a 'no' vote recorded for me if possible."

The Chair "so noted" and Representative Abercrombie thanked the Chair.

At 12:50 o'clock p.m., on request by Representative Cobb, the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:51 o'clock p.m.

At 12:52 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative Yuen, seconded

by Representative Kamalii and carried,
the House of Representatives adjourned
to 8:00 o'clock a.m. tomorrow,

I would like them both to rise - Dan McGuire and Margaret Keene McGuire. Let's give them a nice hand.

Dan, I'm going to say a few words in an impromptu way and then I'm going to ask my colleague who seconded this resolution, Charles Ushijima, to say a few words. I believe that nobody is more knowledgeable than our own Charles Ushijima of the whole athletic program of this entire State, and is one that we can be very proud of.

We have more great swimmers - Duke Kahanamoku and Buster Crabbe - and the great names that are going to follow.

We have had Olympic championships - Pat O'Sullivan who did the dive and won in Mexico City and today is being honored at the University of Hawaii.

We have had magnificent teams - the University of Hawaii 1924 wonder team and basketball teams. And, like everything else, we have our ups and our downs.

Today we have a beautiful sports arena, almost entirely due to the efforts of a great governor, former Governor John Anthony Burns. I think he almost single handedly . . . but if you talked to him, as I had the privilege of doing, he said, 'I really got the idea it could be a success here from Dan McGuire.' And there are many things like this that Dan has done for sports. He has never tolerated anything in the way of infraction of the NCAA rules. He is the first one to blow the whistle in those cases. But, he is also the first one to blow the horn and do the boosting.

I think it is a great thing we do today to have before us a man whose pen is mightier than the sword."

Representative Ushijima then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, there are many newspapers in the nation that are fortunate in having reporters on their staff with great talent. But reporters covering sport activities, and certainly the Honolulu Advertiser is no exception for that to have the talents of one Dan McGuire.

Mr. McGuire, through the years, has reported most outstandingly, as the resolution indicated, on the great feats and accomplishments of the Hawaiian athletes. But more importantly, he has contributed through these years to the people of this State a sense of good reporting, making the people of this State true sport lovers as they are.

I know that all of my colleagues certainly join me in wishing Dan McGuire continued success and certainly wish him all the best in the rest of his life."

Yamada being excused.

S.B. No. 1736-78:

Representative Suwa moved that S.B. No. 1736-78, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Peters.

Representative Abercrombie then rose to "speak in favor of the bill with some reservations", stating:

"Mr. Speaker, you will notice on page 2 of the committee report, dated January 31, 1978, 'State Ethics Commission', \$93,000, as approved and appropriated for the purpose of the State Ethics Commission. This would be located in Section 6 of Senate Bill No. 1736-78.

Mr. Speaker, I will vote for this bill, with reservations, that the \$93,000 for the State Ethics Commission, for all intents and purposes, in my mind, is wasted money.

We have yet to arrive at an analogy whereby an ethical standard, to be publicly enunciated and accepted by the public, is available to us. The present circumstances of the law of the activities of the commission, in my estimation, do not warrant the public confidence which I think has been given to it too automatically to this point. That is not a reflection on the people who make up the commission. It is a question of the methodology of the law under which they are constituted.

I feel that circumstances such as the veterinarian situation which we face, circumstances under which legislators must submit themselves to the Ethics Commission for a ruling

as to whether they are in conflict, are not fair either to the commissioner in having to make the delineation or to the legislator who must suffer the public opprobrium if the commission should rule against them.

I believe, therefore, that there is a contradiction between the approval of the public for public officials who have made well known to their constituents their various activities and have been approved by them by virtue of receiving a vote which puts them into this Legislature, and in turn having their ethical standards questioned by virtue of having to commit themselves to a private body, not connected to this body, but a political appointee, regardless of what their good intention may be in terms of carrying out the law, so, therefore, I request of the appropriate members and chairman of this body that they look into the foundation of the State Ethics Commission with the idea that perhaps the law surrounding it can be improved to better serve the public and better serve the individuals who must come before it.

Thank you."

The motion to pass S.B. No. 1736-78 on Third Reading was put by the Chair and carried by a vote of 45 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Narvaes and Sutton voting no, and Representatives Garcia, Kamalii, Wakatsuki and D. Yamada being excused.

Mr. Speaker, Mr. Caldito was born on February 1, 1913. It was far before you and me. By the time I am born in 1923, Mr. Caldito will arrive here from the Philippines as a young man of ten years old. And this man, Mr. Speaker, he will not wait until you know the welfare will come to help him, because those days welfare is help yourself.

So, Mr. Speaker, Mr. Caldito, at the age of 12, with or without the consent of the territorial government, came to work in the plantation. And, he is not satisfied with the plantation life so he tried the pineapple fields. So, he worked for sixteen years in the pineapple company, but yet he is not satisfied, so he continue his own self-education and he work so hard and he take up the . . . in those days no need pass test to sell insurance like you had to pass, Mr. Speaker. So, he just tell, 'I like sell insurance' and they tell, 'Okay' and he go sell insurance. But this man is still not satisfied, so he work twenty-eight years in the insurance business before retirement as the manager of the branch of Hawaiian Life Insurance Company on Maui.

So it will show the track record of this man that he is not satisfied. Well, I met him in between because

when he is elected to the Board of Supervisors of Maui, I am also elected to the Board of Supervisors of Kauai and we get along very good because we understand each other and the language.

And yet, this man is not satisfied with all the contribution he make, what is said in the resolution. He said to himself I must give some more, so he give us the only . . . Richard Caldito, Jr., the only elected official in this House of Filipino extraction, and I think of other extraction, who follow the footsteps of the father.

So, I don't know yet, maybe some day he will not be satisfied, he going give us one president or one governor. So, I hope Mr. Caldito, you will have many years of contribution to this great State and I would like, at this time, Mr. Speaker, if somebody get the lei here, the most beautiful Democrat lady here, that will give you the lei, and no forget you give the kiss, eh."
