At this time, Representative Sutton rose to speak against the passage of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the concept in this bill is to reduce the amount of compensation that is awarded under criminal injuries compensation. We have discussed this and Mr. Suwa has put in a resolution that in criminal injuries we are not going to have large attorneys' fees for the compensation and the Commission itself is supposed to be able to have a complete evidentiary record from the police department and that is sent over so that the compensation can be conceived as being non-adversary. All of a sudden we stick in here the statement that if the Commission finds that a dead or injured victim was partially responsible for such death or injury then using a comparative negligence standard, now a comparative negligence standard is a very difficult thing, and here we're trying to make the whole thing a non-adversary proposition and we stick a very difficult concept, comparative negligence, and here's the individual who has been the victim of the crime, they are either dead or they've suffered a severe injury and they've got the burden of proof on a comparative negligence standard.

Comparative negligence standard takes sometimes two or three weeks in a trial, as you know, Mr. Speaker, and to put this type of burden in here destroys the whole concept of what we were trying to do, and that is to have something where the evidence came from the police department, we did not have a formal proceeding, and we did not want to insert something like a difficult legal concept of negligence, and negligence comparatively figured out who was more guilty.

The other day, Mr. Speaker, you were coming down the highway with Mr. Kawakami, I yielded to you and let you come in the highway, but I was comparatively negligent to the person behind. This concept of comparative negligence is in all tort action, and all of a sudden we stick it in where we don't want it. And so, Mr. Speaker, I would ask that you and the majority, including

the wisdom of those that come from Waianae, and my own minority, vote against this."

The motion to pass S.B. No. 481, SD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CRIMINAL INJURIES COMPENSATION", on Third Reading was put by the Chair and carried by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Sutton voting no.

At 9:35 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 9:38 o'clock a.m.

S.B. No. 578

Representative D. Yamada moved that S.B. No. 578 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Honda.

At this time, Representative Fukunaga rose to speak against the passage of S.B. No. 578:

"Mr. Speaker, I speak against S.B. No. 578 which will increase the percentage of voters required to approve an amendment to the State Constitution from 35% to 50% of the votes cast in that election.

Our Constitution is a living document. It forms the foundation of our laws and regulations. It is the source of authority for our actions in this House and other government agencies. The Constitution also limits our powers, vesting a higher authority in the people. Accordingly, our Constitution provides for change, for revision and renewal of that power. Article 17, Section 2, insures that citizens may call for a Constitutional Convention every ten years, or more often, if they so desire with their vote. They may exercise this option through their elected representatives in the legislature or through the Lieutenant Governor's Office.

Mr. Speaker, we now seek to effectively eliminate the power of that vote. Presently, a majority of 35% of those voting in the election must vote in favor of an amendment. If S.B. No. 578 is approved by the legislature and by a majority of the public equivalent to 35% of those who vote in the next election, a majority equalling 50% of the voters in future elections will be required to ratify every Constitutional amendment.

This means that it will become practically impossible for the people to ratify Constitutional amendments. I believe that the legislative process in Hawaii is open and accessible. This is precisely the reason that the legislature and the recent Constitutional Convention have not enacted provisions for Initiative and Referendum. Our present system actively solicits input from citizens and organizations. The size of our representative districts is particularly suited to encourage personal contact with our constituents. This openness and accessibility will be removed by the provisions of the bill before us, today.

Accordingly, I urge the members of this House to vote against S.B. No. 578. If this proposal passes this body and is placed on the ballot at the next general election, I shall urge my constituents to vote against it for the same reason. Thank you."

Representative D. Yamada then rose to speak in favor of S.B. No. 578:

"Mr. Speaker, basically all this bill does is recognize the fact that our Constitution in which everything we do is based on, should be difficult to amend, and that when we do amend our Constitution, that a majority of people affirmatively vote in favor of it. For that reason, Mr. Speaker, I urge all members to vote for it."

The motion to pass S.B. No. 578, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE XVII, SECTION 2 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF HAWAII TO CHANGE AMENDMENT APPROVAL REQUIREMENT", on Third Reading was put by the Chair and carried by a vote of 46 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Fukunaga, Hagino, Marumoto, Sutton and Takitani voting no.

S.B. No. 176, SD 1

On motion by Representative D. Yamada, seconded by Representative Honda, S.B. No. 176, SD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ASSISTANCE TO DISPLACED PERSONS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 6

On motion by Representative D. Yamada, seconded by Representative

Honda, S.B. No. 6, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO JURY TRIAL IN CIVIL MATTERS (CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS OF ARTICLE 1, SECTION 13)", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Say then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the resolution, be inserted into the Journal, and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Say's remarks are hereby inserted:

"This resolution addresses two crucial issues facing our State: Protecting the environment and increasing our energy capacity.

I have studied the 138 KV project's EIS and it is clear that all solutions offered to increase HECO's electrical capacity; for example, underground lines, the building of a new energy producing plant or running lines through Manoa, Saint Louis Heights or Palolo, will all lead to the disruption of people's lives and the destruction of the city's landscape.

I have never before been so concerned in the political, social and economic stability of oil exporting countries.

I am constantly reminded with every electrical, gasoline and telephone bill I pay, of our heavy dependence on foreign oil.

A recent article in the HONOLULU STAR-BULLETIN, dated March 14, 1979, 'ISLE RESIDENTS GETTING A SHOCK OUT OF ELECTRICITY BILLS', revealed that since 1970, the cost of oil has skyrocketed from \$2.33 to \$15.72 a barrel, with no relief in sight and that this high cost of oil accounts for one half of our electricity bill.

This brings me back to the problem of the environment versus energy. It seems to me that the environment and energy can go hand in hand. Do we have to sacrifice one for the

other? I would hope not. Presently, there are projects studying biomass such as natural resources, bagasse, wind, wave, and geothermal energy. It is my understanding, after consulting the HNEI that the geothermal energy project on the Big Island is especially encouraging. Plans are being drawn to transmit their geothermal energy via underwater cable to the present system on Oahu. This cable could conceivably diverge in the ocean and energize from the sea coast various points on Oahu, thus eliminating the need for gigantic transmission lines traversing the land. Dr. Paul Yuen of the HNEI has said that this project, if given a commitment by the State and HECO, could become a reality in five to ten years.

The above is only one of several possibilities this resolution affords us the time and opportunity to re-examine our priorities and broaden our perspective before making a final decision on an issue of such magnitude. In the words of the recently amended State Preamble: 'We dedicate our efforts to fulfill the philosophy decreed by the Hawaii State motto, 'Ua mau ke ea o ka aina ika pono' . . . We reserve the right to control our destiny. . . and to preserve the quality of life that we deserve.' "

On motion by Representative Shito, seconded by Representative K. Yamada and carried, H.R. No. 789 was adopted.

At 9:22 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 9:24 o'clock a.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representative Crozier.

At this time, the following introductions were made to the members of the House:

Representative Lunasco introduced 55 eighth grade students from Waialua Intermediate School. They were

accompanied by their teacher, Mrs. Florence Ishii.

Representative Aki introduced 27 students from Nanakuli High and Intermediate School. They were accompanied by their teacher, Ms. Clarke, and parents, Mrs. Brown and Mrs. Domingo.

At 9:25 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 10:47 o'clock a.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives de Heer, Ushijima and D. Yamada.

DEFERRED MATTER FROM EARLIER ON THE CALENDAR

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1139 on H.R. No. 270, HD 1:

Representative Kawakami moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and H.R. No. 270, HD 1, be adopted, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Crozier then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of House Resolution 270, House draft 1, with reservations.

Mr. Speaker, most of the House members here know that I was going to speak against House Resolution 270, House draft 1, this morning, but due to the fact that there were some communications with the Governor of our State of Hawaii, that he had informed me in the past that he was not going to purchase the property; this morning, I had the opportunity to talk to the Governor and he said that he was going to work in conjunction with the County of Maui in going into a joint venture and purchasing the property.

Due to this fact, Mr. Speaker, I am speaking in favor of House Resolution 270, House draft 1, with reservations.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Machida then rose to speak in support of House Resolution No. 270, House draft 1, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the land exchange has been of tremendous controversy in the past few weeks. 852.90 acres that the State was to have exchanged for 125 acres of Haleakala Ranch land has been a tremendous problem for

us to consider here in this House.

Just yesterday, Mr. Speaker, the Council chairman, Bob Nakasone, made a proposal from the County Council to go into a joint purchase agreement for this parcel of land which is presently owned by Haleakala Ranch. This is the first time that the County has come up with such a joint proposal.

Mr. Speaker, Governor Ariyoshi has stated publicly that he is against the purchase of land for agricultural park development. But, this is a recommendation which he pondered over last night and, this morning, stated to us that he is willing to take it under consideration. I think this is a viable solution to the problem we have before us.

Nobody in this House is against the agricultural park program. I think we are all towards supporting the goal that Governor Ariyoshi has stated so many times in the past, of diversifying our base for agriculture, and also reaching a self-sufficiency for this State. The development of this agricultural park from now will bring us closer to these goals.

I urge all my members to support House Resolution 270, House draft 1, which would, in effect, kill the land exchange but will give us the viable alternative in terms of going into a joint purchase agreement for this 125 acres. On this basis, Mr. Speaker, I ask all the members to support this resolution.

Thank you."

Representative Sutton then rose to speak in opposition to House Resolution No. 270, House draft 1, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the entire concept of land exchanges have been used throughout the Western states for many years. It is a viable means of pleasing both parties. By the way, Mr. Speaker, I have a conflict."

Directed by the Chair to "state your potential conflict", Representative Sutton answered:

"I have a house adjoining the property."

The Chair ruled "no conflict."

Representative Sutton continued, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this whole concept of land exchange was enunciated both by Governor Quinn, Governor Burns and Governor Ariyoshi in an address at Wailuku Park. Governor Ariyoshi said he favored agricultural parks -- we need agricultural parks; we must have them; we must bring produce to the market; we must take care of the Kula farmers; we must take care of the farmers everywhere. All three men also favored the basic concept of not using the powers of eminent domain, if possible.

Eminent domain is very arbitrary. It comes from Roman law and not our Anglo-Saxon law. And we have engrafted this bit of Roman law which is a very arbitrary thing where the sovereign comes in and takes, and therefore, a land exchange is a very important part of the concept of land management and there are many, many ways of making sure of that land exchange, and one, is to hire a man with the ability of Mr. Charles Conboy who knows that land. His wife was an Abbey and Commander Abbey was a great expert on Maui land.

In this proposed land exchange, Mr. Speaker, we cannot talk about it being 8 to 1 because you are mixing apples and oranges and lemons, and the lemon I refer to is the Kaupo land. Kaupo land will not even sustain goats and, therefore, you can't talk in terms of the fact of 8 to 1 with any significance because the Kaupo land is totally without value.

Now, Mr. Speaker, this basic concept that we have learned already -- we had a housing act on the books and we went in and we put just Waikane. I submit that the Waikane purchase was not a good purchase. We find ourselves with a lemon there.

Mr. Speaker, the whole concept of purchase is inappropriate here. What we want to do is get agricultural parks for these farmers. What we want to do is expedite it. We have already seen, Mr. Speaker, a detailed analyses. No man, in the history of Hawaii, and I say this without reservation, has ever shown his capacity to manage and shown his knowledge of government such as Elmer Cravalho. I am a Republican, but I will tell you this -- that man has such immense abilities. I sat on the plane with him and flew in, and I just couldn't believe, the other day, what the immensity of his knowledge was. And he does not have one-half the advantages in education that I have had.

Now, Mr. Speaker, when we come to a concept such as this -- agricultural parks -- it is our duty and yours to refrain from our veto power. This is our veto power that we are exercising -- a veto power whereby two-thirds are able to reverse the work of two years, three years of knowledgeable public servants. And I say to you that we should use our veto power in restraint and use our veto power so that it does not reverse. . . we are separated, it is very true, but we must work in conjunction with the executive. We have just gone in the extra room and signed a document which is the purse power of this body. The purse, however, is being opened just about exactly as the executive is told to open it, and we must work with the executive; we must work with our Land Board. This Land Board is a Board that has shown great familiarity with the basic concept of our parks. They have established more and have received national recognition. When they, in turn, advised us to have a land exchange that has validity, let us not recklessly use our veto power in this body.

Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I would urge you and those on your side of the aisle, including those that come in from Waianae, one of whom is a great authority on land, and our own side of the aisle, to please concur with me.

Thank you."

Representative Kunimura then rose and inquired whether or not the Representative from Nuuanu will yield to a question to which Representative Sutton answered:

"I will yield, but I don't know many answers."

Representative Kunimura asked:

"Mr. Speaker, I wonder if you will ask the gentleman from Nuuanu if Waiahole would have been a good acquisition if it was by exchange."

Representative Sutton answered: "Yes."

Representative Kunimura thanked the Chair and said, "That's on the record."

Representative Kunimura then said:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this resolution.

"Mr. Speaker, the gentleman from Nuuanu made reference to three governors supporting land exchange. I question the authenticity of that fact, and I would like to insert the name of another great Governor and a lady who set up the policy because I was also in government at that time, and that was Ms. Margaret Ashford, Land Commissioner under our great Governor, Samuel Wilder King. And I can still remember the policy that was enunciated at that time and supported by the Governor at that time and that was: No land exchange shall be effectuated in the Territory of Hawaii with land owners owning more than 80 acres of land, and the reason for this ceiling of 80 acres was because the Territory, prior to that, always got the short end of the stick whenever there was any land exchange. And I can see now why Margaret Ashford and Governor King made such a policy because of their inherent love for the ohana system and they knew that eventually the State would end up with all the mauka mountainous land and the private sector would be owning all the good land.

During my tenure of office, Mr. Speaker, in this House, we almost lost 100 acres of prime land in Waimanalo just turned over by the President of the United States to the State of Hawaii because there was an exchange proposed by the Dillingham peers, and part of that proposal, Mr. Speaker, also again, that very valuable piece of property on the corner of McCully and Kapiolani, once the American Legion Clubhouse, and the Clubhouse for the Veterans of Foreign Wars, next to Coco's, and the tidal lands in Keehi Lagoon. All these things, Mr. Speaker, are facts.

There was another land exchange proposed earlier for Maui, for the acquisition of the Maui Community College site of some 79 acres plus the balance of the sandhill between Kahului and Wailuku. And that one would have cost the State of Hawaii some 1,879 acres of land for 300-plus acres of sand dunes in Kahului.

When you talk about land exchange, Mr. Speaker, I don't know why but it is always the State getting the short end of the stick. I would rather go through land exchange, if necessary, to straighten out boundaries and to make access available to landmark situations, but not beyond that because whenever and wherever land exchange takes place, especially in a small state like Hawaii where land is such a premium, that we do not have the

millions of acres like some of our sister states are enjoying, that we are dealing with the future generation and their ability to have public lands available when needs arise, and we will be jeopardizing the needs of the unborn.

Mr. Speaker, if we are to subscribe to the ohana system and the love for our aina, then we should stop land exchanges, not in total, but only for small situations; that land exchanges should be prohibited under law and under the Constitution, and I shall work toward that, Mr. Speaker, and I feel, this morning again, our vote to pass this resolution will be a vote to sustain the future generation of the unborn.

Thank you."

Representative Honda then rose to speak in favor of the resolution, with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, for the record, I have been in favor of the land exchange from the very beginning to provide sufficient land for our farmers to utilize. Now, because of this new alternative that came to light of the proposal to purchase the agricultural park jointly by the State and the County of Maui, and either through a swap or through land purchase, I think we will be accomplishing the same purpose, and that is to provide sufficient land to enhance our agriculture in our State.

Thank you very much."

Representative Sutton, in rebuttal, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, the last gentleman that just rose, I will try to rebut first. He spoke with reservations and then he introduced into this honorable assembly hearsay evidence. We have no evidence -- there is no evidence at all of this joint proposal; there is no evidence at all of the reversal of the Governor's concept. The Mayor of Maui is either in the Philippines or Japan -- nobody knows where. And yet, we, this body, is supposed to accept hearsay evidence of some reversal that has occurred. Now, these are competent executives, both the Governor of Hawaii and the Mayor, they know how to communicate with us in the morning agenda. Every morning, we start off, Mr. Speaker, and George Takane reads it to us -- communications from the Governor. But, this morning,

he read no communication. And so, we are talking about hearsay evidence.

Secondly, we go back to the learned gentleman from Kauai. The learned gentleman from Kauai started to talk in terms of an exchange of Waimanalo land for the Dillingham peers. As you know, Mr. Speaker, they ended up spending \$40 million for land which had only a quitclaim title which had been filled by dredging that had been taken from the Kapalama Canal. Had they made a land exchange instead of the \$40 million, and \$40 million then, Mr. Speaker, is the equivalent of about \$160 million now with the inflation, they would have had an exchange that, for all intents and purposes, would have accomplished the mission without the expenditure of \$40 million at a time that we had to go out on the market and float bonds at seven or eight percent. Purchases by the State of Hawaii are an expensive way to do it; we are almost up to our bonded indebtedness. And many, many times, as you know, as an attorney, you work a 1031 tax free exchange.

The basic concept of land exchange is as old as land and it is a basic thing that is embodied in our law. Mr. Speaker, if I may read you the law. . . Mr. Speaker, what we are doing now is legislative disapproval -- that's 171-50: 'Any exchange of public land for private land shall be subject to disapproval by the Legislature by a two-thirds vote of either the Senate or the House' -- now, we are acting alone here; they are busy over there non-confirming people -- 'or by a majority of vote in a Regular Session.' We are not going to get a majority vote so we are talking about two-thirds.

So, all I am appealing to is enough to knock this thing down -- two-thirds, that means eight of you, or some of you guys leave the room.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kunimura then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, in answer, yes, we paid \$40 million for Dillingham peers and we still have the 100 acres in Waimanalo; we still now have a mini-park on the corner of McCully and Kapiolani; the Veterans of Foreign Wars still has that piece of property next to Coco's; and we still have the tidal lands. We haven't lost a square foot of land. We paid \$40 million, yes, Mr. Speaker, and we are almost paying up for that with revenue bonds, income, not from the general fund, but from revenues derived from the special fund -- the revenues from the operation of the waterfront.

Mr. Speaker, I am more than happy that the gentleman from Nuuanu has advanced our point why this resolution should prevail this morning. Mr. Speaker, it is a sad day when we can argue on the floor of this House that \$40 million is more important than all the lands involved because if we use the land, it would have been irreparable. We would never have those lands again for our future generations. We still have the lands; \$40 million, yes -- money you can earn but land gone is gone forever.

Thank you."

Representative Takitani then rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this new proposal accomplishes what we originally set out for. As far as the Maui County agricultural park goes, the ball is now in the County's hands. They can either go ahead with the plan or disapprove it. It is their decision now and whatever they do, they have to live with. And, the best part of all of this is that the State still owns that 853 acres.

Thank you."

Representative Holt then requested that his remarks, in favor of the resolution, be inserted into the Journal, and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Holt's remarks are hereby inserted:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of House Resolution 270, House draft 1.

Mr. Speaker, I find it strange to ask my colleagues to vote 'yes' on a resolution that says 'no'. This resolution, as amended by your Committee on Water, Land Use, Development and Hawaiian Affairs, says 'no' to a proposed land exchange between the State of Hawaii and Haleakala Ranch Company for the purpose of creating an agricultural park at Kula, Maui. The Board of Land and Natural Resources is empowered by law to enter into such exchanges of public land for private land, and the State Legislature is empowered by law to disapprove such exchanges.

Mr. Speaker, I think it is very important that everyone understand that disapproval of this exchange

is NOT a disapproval of the concept of agricultural parks. This exchange involves 852.9 acres of State land at Kaupo and Kahikinui on Maui, for 125 acres of Haleakala Ranch lands at Pulehunui in the Kula area of Maui. This 125 acres is designated for a proposed agricultural park to be developed by Maui county and consists of prime agricultural lands.

There is no doubt in my mind that the independent farmers of Maui definitely need this prime agriculture land, because the existing lands that they farm are becoming too expensive for them to hold on to and will be soon swallowed up by urban development. So rather than go along with what looks like a disproportionate exchange of State land for private, where we come out on the short end, I think we should pursue other methods to acquire this 125-acre parcel. Under the law, the Board of Land and Natural Resources is authorized to acquire the 125 acres needed for the agricultural park through lease, direct purchase or by eminent domain as well as by land exchange. This 125 acres for the park is valued at slightly more than \$1,000,000, or approximately \$8,000 per acre, which looks like a bargain to me.

Furthermore, the Legislature has already appropriated \$4 million for statewide agriculture park development in 1974. This year, your Committee on Finance has inserted an additional \$4 million for agriculture park development in this year's State budget for each of the upcoming fiscal years.

So you see, Mr. Speaker, we already have authorized funding for the outright purchase of this privately owned prime agriculture land -- money which can be used to develop the Kula Agriculture Park. I would like to see this 125 acres added on to our existing inventory of public land, rather than trade away some 850 acres in exchange for it.

Mr. Speaker, my point is a very simple one. It's a question of method, and the law allows for several methods of private land acquisition. And in this case, the method being used is not, in my opinion, the best one. The very purpose of the law is to allow the Legislature to review the method proposed by the administration, and then exercise our best judgment on whether or not it serves the interest of the State and the public. By using the method of outright purchase, we can get the 125 acres and keep the 850 acres of State land as well. We

can pay for it. We should pay for it. It's worth it.

Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I would like to urge my colleagues here in the House to vote 'yes' on this resolution that says 'no'.

Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.R. No. 270, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION SUBMITTING TO THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF HAWAII FOR REVIEW OF ACTION TAKEN BY THE BOARD OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES ON EXCHANGES", was adopted by a roll call vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Sutton voting no, and Representative Garcia being excused.

The Chair then stated:

"The Chair would like to state that we will follow the same procedure as used yesterday. We will recess, subject to the call of the Chair, for the purpose of having conference drafts made available to the members on this floor up to midnight."

Representative Uwaine then rose on a point of information and asked:

"Mr. Speaker, on our desk is Supplemental Calendar No. 2 awaiting the 48-hour notice. I just wanted to find out when was it clocked, or when was it put on our desks?"

The Chair replied:

"The clocking is noted at the end of your calendar, on the addendum attached to the calendar."

The Chair then said:

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, I am truly honored today to introduce Auntie Agnes Cope who is really my aunt as well as Henry Peters'. She is one of the finest people I know.

Her work on the Waianae coast and throughout the State of Hawaii serves as an example of the power of the individual to inspire and effectuate change. For too long, Nanakuli, Waianae and Makaha were seen only as Hawaiian ghettos. Auntie Agie re-woke the sense of pride and forced public acknowledgment of the immense body of knowledge and beauty which is the profound strength of Waianae.

Historically, it was always said that when the old kapu system was overthrown, the Hawaiians who still wanted to follow the ancient ways fled to Waianae. Although it has taken more than one hundred years, the treasure which was hidden on that coast has been re-discovered and now enriches all of us; and Auntie Agie is one of those who knows and teaches that it is only in the sharing that such wealth will continue to grow.

Thank you Auntie Agie for the truth which you have always known and that so many of us are only beginning to learn."

Representative Say also rose to speak on H.R. No. 790:

"Mahalo and Aloha to Auntie Agie. I have known her for three years being the Executive Director of the Waianae Coast Culture and Art Society.

I hope she will forgive me for telling her a white lie to get her down here this morning."

Representative Holt then informed the members of the House that the honoree is also his aunt.

Representative Aki rose to express his Aloha and Mahalo to Auntie Agie:

"She has brought great honor to the people of the Waianae coast through all her activities and we are really grateful to Auntie Agie. She is really deserving of the resolution. Thank you."

Representative Evans then stated:

"She might be their aunt in blood

line, but she's the aunt to everybody here."

Representative Say then presented Auntie Agie with a beautiful flower lei while Representative Kamalii presented her with the resolution.

"Mr. Speaker, I speak in favor of H.B. No. 189, HD 1, SD 1. This bill gives the Director of Transportation statutory power to enter into a contract with corporations authorized to engage in business in the State to aid in enforcing the provisions of Chapter 267, HRS, providing that the corporations agree to undertake this activity at no expense to the

State. This bill confers upon such officers the powers of police officers including the power to serve and execute warrants, arrest offenders, serve notices and orders, and stop, board, investigate and inspect vessels.

Boating activities for sport and recreational purposes have increased significantly during the past ten years and the enforcement staff is insufficient to effectively enforce the boating safety and small boat harbor laws and regulations throughout the State. In the seventh district, for example, the Department of Transportation and the United States Coast Guard currently have joint jurisdiction over the Hawaii Kai Marina's boating activities. The boating branch of the Department of Transportation is not policing violations because of a lack of manpower and funds. The Coast Guard patrols the area only about twice a month. The Kacor Marina Patrol reports violations to the State Harbors Division, but they are unable to issue violations.

There have been numerous incidents of speeding boats, swampings and burglary attempts from boaters since the waterway was declared public by a Federal Appeals Court in August. This ruling is now under appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court.

This bill provides for no more than ten volunteer boating enforcement officers. The Department of Transportation may adopt rules to insure that these enforcement officers are properly trained in law enforcement procedures and are knowledgeable in the State Boating Law. This bill will offer the marina some protection from speeders and law breakers, and it will also protect other State waters. Therefore, I move to agree on this bill."

up there of trying to prove we can and we can't grow feed in Kohala. I think, to date, we have spent several hundreds of thousands of dollars in this issue and, at this moment, or moments over the last several years, we have never come to a firm conclusion whether this is a practical matter or whether we can even grow feed at Kohala in an economic way. And I think, by this time, after all the hundreds of thousands that we have spent, that we should terminate this project and not continue to fund this type of experiment in that area.

Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 162, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION URGING THE CONTINUING OPERATION OF THE KOHALA FEED AND FORAGE RESEARCH PROJECT OF THE COLLEGE OF TROPICAL AGRICULTURE AND HUMAN RESOURCES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII", was adopted.

Representative Sutton then rose to speak in support of the concurrent resolution, with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, we are talking about the most serious thing that faces us and we have done nothing about it. We come forth, we labor and labor and labor, and we come forth with nothing. We should have bitten the bullet and had a bill, started the money, and started construction on an alternate spot for general aviation. We have a mix which the law of averages means we are bound to have a small plane run into a big plane at Honolulu International Airport. I have been an FAA judge and I can tell you you've got a mix there where the probabilities will not let you, Mr. Speaker, wait four years to do this.

Mr. Speaker, there is only one alternative -- a crash program -- a crash program to get an alternate and we have the Congressional delegation down here this week. Why can't they get us something at one of these military airports for interim use? Wheeler Field is only used now for helicopters. It is a very nice spot and very adequately staffed and it has

lighting, it has a long runway, and there are no mountains adjacent to it. Why can't interim use of Wheeler be arranged immediately by your Congressional delegation? They are all the same party as you, Mr. Speaker, and they are down here this week.

What are we doing? Must we forever wait for the inevitable accident and then do something like what happened at the Charles Lindbergh Memorial in San Diego?

Mr. Speaker, their mix is not as bad as ours. And the law of average is against this -- this will take four years out of this resolution before we get anyplace. Four years! What is going to happen in that four years? Some 747 will come in and get hit by a small plane and then where are we, Mr. Speaker? It will be in every newspaper in the country. People don't automatically come to Hawaii. It's got to be a selling job; we've got to have the spirit of aloha; we've got to have nice facilities; we've got to have an airport, Mr. Speaker, where we can land.

Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I will say to you that we have not done our job here this session -- we have not gotten an alternate airport. We have not started the ball really rolling. What do we do? We labor and labor and labor and then we just come out with a little resolution. Mr. Speaker, we have failed. I am just as guilty as you are, but we haven't done our task. I think we ought to ask the Governor to keep us in session so we can get a new airport, get these planes out of there, and have a situation, Mr. Speaker, where we do not have the contingent liability and where the law of average is creeping up on us with 2,000 near misses in one year. We are now a red airport. Do you know what that means, Mr. Speaker? It means that the top ten most dangerous airports in the United States of America. The pilots have labeled us as a red airport.

Now, Mr. Speaker, it is so necessary that we proceed and so I do hope that these remarks will get over to the Senate and they will recognize it. They, too, should move and move fast, and see that we do not waste four years. And this is not a new issue, Mr. Speaker, we've had it with us ever since you've been in here, and you got here a little sooner although I tried sooner than you to get here.

Mr. Speaker, this issue will not

run away, and we must solve it. I do hope that I am reaching, not only you, Mr. Speaker, but people on that side -- the gentleman that comes all the way from Waianae, and I do hope, Mr. Speaker, that my remarks will reach the head of our Transportation Committee here and head of the Transportation Committee on the other side, and the Governor, because this is an issue which we cannot play ostrich and put our heads in the sand. It will not disappear and it is being a greater and greater risk each day, Mr. Speaker.

So, I will ask that these remarks go in with reservations on this resolution.

Thank you."

Representative Lunasco then rose to speak against the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, while it is commendable that the Finance Committee amended the resolution to include, '...to pursue the joint use of Wheeler Air Force Base. . .', Mr. Speaker, the fact still remains, unless it is written in the law, that we will not use Poamoho as a site. And using Bellows as an example, Mr. Speaker, for years we had a seesaw battle with Bellows Air Force Base for the use of it as a general aviation airport. Only until we wrote a law stating that Bellows will not be considered as a general aviation airport, only then the State decided to look elsewhere. And so, Mr. Speaker, as long as Poamoho remains on this resolution, I can assure you my experiences then, that the State will pursue that area for the use of the airport.

What really concerns me, Mr. Speaker, is not inasmuch as whether we need an airport or not, but the fact that whether we have an airport is immaterial because still the planes at Honolulu International Airport can still remain there. And if we are really trying to solve the problem, Mr. Speaker, by building an airport and not forcing the small aircrafts to relocate at those airports or small airfields, we are not really accomplishing anything at Honolulu International Airport.

So, who are we trying to kid, Mr. Speaker? If we are really sincere, then we should write a law banning all small airplanes from the Honolulu International Airport once this airfield -- whether it is Wheeler or Poamoho, or anywhere in this State -- ban them from the Honolulu International Airport and relocate them. But, so far, we are not even talking in that direction.

So, Mr. Speaker, I strongly urge my colleagues to vote against this resolution."

Representative Hagino then rose to speak against the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, there has been changes made since the Transportation Committee originally passed it out, but I still cannot go along with the resolution. . . House draft 2.

I would like to make one comment about public safety. There is still going to be a dangerous mix at Honolulu International Airport. You will still have your commuter airlines using the airport; you know, airlines like Royal Hawaiian, Air Hawaii. There will still be that dangerous mix and still be that possibility of an accident, so the solution that has been proposed is not a very adequate solution from the very beginning. All Poamoho is going to be is a training field and that is all that it is going to be. And to build a training field out there for pilots and to cause the possible destruction of agriculture land and plantation communities, I think does not balance out.

I would like to, rather than going over some of the comments I made earlier in the session about the use of Poamoho as a general aviation airport, I would like to enter into the Journal comments that were made at the House Transportation hearing earlier this session. These are comments and testimonies by Valentine Guiala, a young man from the Wahiawa area. His testimony are my comments. Both of us were born on the plantations and both of us have the same feelings to that kind of lifestyle, so I would like to enter into the Journal. . . I would just like to mention one paragraph. He states: 'I believe that the plantation lifestyle as it now exists in places like Whitmore Village, Poamoho Village, Kunia Village on Oahu, as well as on other islands throughout the State, can also pass on their unique social and cultural institutions to a number of Hawaii's children and provide them with the skills necessary to adapt to Hawaii's changes.'

You know, we found that Hawaiian villages and Hawaiian communities are very important to the way of life in Hawaii. I hope before it is too late, that we can save some of these plantation villages, rather than thirty or forty years from now find out that they were very important forces in the creation of Hawaii.

Thank you very much."

The following is the testimony of Valentine Guiala:

"My name is Valentine Guiala. I am a teacher by profession. In my job, I have come in contact with many young people in the Wahiawa-Haleiwa-Waialua area. I would like to go on record as opposing the building of a general aviation airport at the Poamoho site or any other site located on prime agricultural lands.

I am 29 years old and have lived in Whitmore Village 26 years of my life. My first three years were spent on Lanai at Lanai City. Lanai City, Whitmore Village, Poamoho, and Kunia Village are all plantation camps. They were designed to house the plantation workers who were brought over to work in the fields.

As I grew up in the plantation village around Wahiawa, I found that the open spaces, the closeness my parents and neighbors had with each other, and their close ties with the land, as evidenced in every family having a family garden behind the house, and the sharing of common plantation camp experiences among the many ethnic groups in Whitmore contributed greatly to my upbringing and had instilled in me a respect and love for working with the land.

Most of my close friends who grew up with me are now successful in various areas of the trades industry, business, education, politics, law, medicine, clergy, as well as other areas in our community on the local and State level. They and I shared the same experiences growing up in one of the several plantation villages around Wahiawa.

In the course of my formal and informal education, I have had the opportunity to live in the city, visit the mainland, and spend time in the Philippines. I was able to leave the plantation for a time and have seen how other communities operate with their own set of cultural values and institutions.

Each community had its unique one-of-a-kind cultural institution that facilitates the development of fine, upstanding contributing members to the broader community.

I think all of us here today can agree with the statement that various lifestyles have unique social institutions which can prepare people to adapt to new situations.

On a higher level, we can interpret the State's intervention in the Waiahole-Waikane matter, its efforts to help the people preserve their unique lifestyle on Sand Island, as an affirmation of the idea that these unique links with Hawaii's past have something of value to offer our children and future generations

in terms of learning to adapt to a new and changing Hawaii.

I believe that the plantation lifestyle as it now exists in places like Whitmore Village, Poamoho Village, Kunia Village on Oahu, as well as on other islands throughout the State, can also pass on their unique social and cultural institutions to a number of Hawaii's children and provide them with the skills necessary to adapt to Hawaii's changes.

I believe it is important to preserve these live-functioning links with Hawaii's past. From pre-white early Hawaiian times, through the early missionary-trading-whaling times, on to the plantation period, through post World War II, and on to the statehood period, these life-functioning links are important in order for us and our children to better handle the new problems and decisions Hawaii will need to address as we all move into the future.

I am convinced that the building of a general aviation airport at the Poamoho site or any prime agricultural land will destroy the unique plantation lifestyles which are common to the villages in the area.

With the destruction of these last living-functional links with an era in Hawaii's history, I and others who believe in the benefits of utilizing social and cultural institutions unique to plantation camp lifestyles, to teach our children to learn to adapt to a changing Hawaii would be at a loss. Thus, our children will lose out. And in the end, the State of Hawaii will lose out. Hawaii's loss would be translated in the cost it would incur in dealing with increase in crime, juvenile delinquency, drug-alcohol abuse, school alienation, and the cost of dealing with mental health problems of people suffering from alienation from their present society due to not being able to find comfort with a link of their past that could tie them in with the present. Disintegration of close familial bonds and general alienation as usually found in urban areas like Honolulu would result.

Therefore, I would like to go on record as opposing the building of a general aviation airport at the Poamoho site and any other site located on prime agricultural lands on the basis that the destruction of prime agricultural land, urbanization of open agricultural land, and danger of noise to nearby communities would bring the end to a type of lifestyle which I and others feel has a lot to offer in terms of passing

on adaptive skills to our children in the coming generations.

Thank you."

At this time, Representative Uwaine rose on a parliamentary inquiry and asked:

"Mr. Speaker, where individual members vote, pointed out in the Journal on the adoption of a resolution. . ."

The Chair interrupted and asked Representative Uwaine to "state your point of inquiry again."

Representative Uwaine asked:

"Mr. Speaker, on a voice vote for the adoption of a resolution, individual Representatives stand up and request that a negative vote be cast. Will his vote be recorded in the Journal as a negative vote?"

The Chair answered:

"The Chair has always ruled, on a voice vote, if the 'ayes' prevail, the Chair will so note or so rule; that if the 'nays' prevail, the Chair would so note."

Representative Uwaine then said:

"I beg your pardon, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair reiterated:

"The Chair rules on a voice vote, that if the Chair determines the 'ayes' have it, the Chair will rule as such, and so with the 'nays', and the Chair has always stated that if any individual would like to record an objection, the Chair would allow him to insert into the record comments to that effect and that no 'ayes' or 'noes' individually be recorded."

Representative Uwaine then said:

"Then, Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against this resolution."

Directed by the Chair to "proceed", Representative Uwaine stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I will be voting 'no' on this resolution for the reasons stated by the Representative from Wahiawa and McCully, from the 12th District, Representatives Lunasco and Hagino.

Thank you."

Representative Nakamura then rose to speak against the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I have made remarks against siting a reliever airport at Poamoho on a previous occasion. I do not find it necessary to repeat the remarks; however, I would like to add that I am opposed to this resolution because it does not resolve the question of whether Poamoho will be further considered as a reliever airport. Even if we do get Wheeler Air Force Base as a reliever airport, I think the Department of Transportation still intends to pursue Poamoho as a second reliever airport so any effort to secure Wheeler as a joint use reliever airport appears to be just a subterfuge, to cover up the State's intention to still proceed with Poamoho as the reliever airport.

However, I do agree with the remarks made by the irrepressible, inextinguishable gentlemen from Nuuanu about the Congressional delegation looking to Congress and the Department of Defense to permit the joint use of Wheeler because, to some extent, this will relieve the congestion that presently exists at Honolulu International Airport. I would be only satisfied if the State would, in no uncertain terms, drop Poamoho as a possible site. Until that time, Mr. Speaker, I will have to continue the fight against Poamoho.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Suwa then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, in rising to speak in behalf of the resolution, I strongly urge the Department of Transportation and the State administration to pursue the aid of the Congressional delegation to make Wheeler the alternative site to relieve the Honolulu International Airport.

As the previous speaker stated, even though we got Wheeler Field, the State will be looking for another field, it is negative. The Director of Transportation has stated that if Wheeler Field could be obtained, that's all that is necessary.

In some of the deliberations, we came to some conclusions that in any area of national defense, when Congress does its budgetary reduction, they look for under-utilized military facilities.

Mr. Speaker, this is a time now for the State to work with the federal so that we may best utilize our tax dollars at Wheeler Field. Everytime, Mr. Speaker, when the Congressional action does reduce the military expendi-

ture or the national defense, then we start jumping. It is now the time for this State and the federal, in order to make the Schofield area, or the 25th Division a viable one, to continue the use of Wheeler Field in a joint use which will strengthen the national defense expenditure.

Up until now, we were looking in the wrong direction. Barber's Point is a vital defense necessity and no way will they give up that and the State was pursuing that direction. I think the Congressional delegation owe it to the State to correct that and to pursue the area of Wheeler Field.

Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I urge the members to support this resolution."

Representative Dods then rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the bulk of my comments, I would like to just have inserted into the records, going over the basic reasons why I think there is an urgency for us to pick a site. But, I would like to rebut some of the comments that some of the other speakers had made.

One, I don't think this resolution, by picking Wheeler and Poamoho, if we get one or the other. . . if we get Wheeler, Poamoho will be dropped. And I don't think we are trying to hide anything from anyone, and I don't think we are playing games because the situation at Honolulu International Airport is probably the single biggest transportation problem that the State now faces. And I think the safety of everyone coming in should be our number one priority for all of us, and to those who think we are not working on the relocation of the planes from general aviation to Honolulu International Airport to a general aviation site are badly mistaken.

Right now, we cannot tell anyone to leave Honolulu International Airport since it was paid for by federal funds and we cannot discriminate against anyone. But let me assure you, Mr. Speaker, we do have plans to move these people out and I think the plans that we do have are very viable and we will get these people out of Honolulu International Airport.

Talking about the difference between training airplanes, the ones we are trying to get out -- I have a list of about 330 aircrafts that we are trying to move out -- that comprises about 20,000 landings at Honolulu International Airport. And, Mr. Speaker, these are the most dangerous types of aircraft that we have there --

the training ones.

As far as the commuter airlines, most of them, Mr. Speaker, are very knowledgeable pilots and experienced pilots, and these aren't the ones that we are trying to move. It's the other ones that don't know how to handle the aircraft, and I think if you go through the near misses that Representative Sutton talked about, you will find out that most of the near misses involved the training pilots, and these are the types that we have to get out of Honolulu International Airport.

I think we have to move now, and I urge all of you to vote for this resolution.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Per Representative Dod's request, his remarks, outlining the reasons for the urgency of the Poamoho site selection, is hereby inserted:

"Reasons for the urgency of the Poamoho site selection:

(1) Safety of the people of Hawaii. There are many people in jeopardy because of the present situation. (Safety should be our number one consideration).

(2) The Department of Agriculture's view on the Poamoho site is that safety is the overriding consideration -- they support the selected site.

(3) There is a dangerous mix of air traffic at Honolulu International Airport. (Large jets, small planes, military planes and training planes all fly out and land in the same area.)

(4) Congestion is causing costly delays, public inconvenience, and a waste of fuel.

(5) Our airport is one of the ten busiest airports in the nation.

(6) We've been assured that no jobs will be lost by the use of the 75 acres in Poamoho as an airport instead of agriculture land.

(7) The site would also serve as a buffer for the mushrooming development at Mililani."

Representative Shito was recognized and he stated:

"Mr. Speaker, just for the record, I would like to state that I am in opposition to the adoption of this

resolution."

Representative Uwaine then rose on a point of information and inquired whether or not the chairman of the Transportation Committee would yield to questions, to which Representative Dods replied:

"After I hear the question."

Representative Uwaine asked:

"Mr. Speaker, in his remarks, he mentioned the fact that he has various plans as far as moving the small aircrafts from Honolulu International Airport, and yet, he mentions the fact that because of federal funding, we cannot discriminate against small aircrafts. I am just curious as to what the plans are."

Representative Dods answered:

"I will be happy to discuss it with him in private."

Representative Kamalii then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I think that that should be discussed on the floor. If he's got plans and if that question is to the point, Mr. Speaker, I just can't go along with that being in private."

Representative Dods then requested a recess, and at 11:19 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 11:21 o'clock a.m., Representative Dods was recognized and he stated:

"Mr. Speaker, in response to the previous questions, the plans are being developed on a preliminary basis right now and until the Department of Transportation is ready to discuss it openly with everyone concerned so that everyone can have their input into the preliminary discussions, I would rather wait until they are ready to release the data that they have available."

Representative Masutani then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to state my opposition to this resolution.

I believe it does not address the long-range solutions to the problem, and it is contrary to the intentions of the State General Plan to preserve and protect our natural resources.

Thank you."

Representative Narvaes then rose

and requested a roll call vote on this resolution.

The Chair then asked for a show of hands on whether or not to have a roll call vote.

The Chair ruled that a sufficient number called for a roll call vote.

Roll call having been requested, the motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 102, HD 2, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION TO CONSIDER A GENERAL AVIATION AIRPORT AT POAMOHO, OAHU", was adopted by a vote of 34 ayes to 15 noes, with Representatives Evans, Fukunaga, Hagino, Kamalii, Kiyabu, Lunasco, Masutani, Nakamura, Narvaes, Shito, Takamine, Takitani, Toguchi, Uechi and Uwaine voting no, and Representatives Crozier and Garcia being excused.

Representative Suwa, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1208) recommending that H.C.R. No. 133 be adopted.

On motion by Representative Suwa, seconded by Representative Morioka and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 133, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING A REPORT ON THE FEASIBILITY OF ESTABLISHING A HEALTH INFORMATION SYSTEM", was adopted.

Representative D. Yamada, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1209) recommending that H.C.R. No. 179 be adopted.

On motion by Representative D. Yamada, seconded by Representative Honda and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 179, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION COMMEMORATING MAY 1, 1979, AS LAW DAY U.S.A.", was adopted.

Representative D. Yamada, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1210) recommending that H.C.R. No. 138, as amended in HD 1, be referred to the Committee on Legislative Management.

On motion by Representative D. Yamada, seconded by Representative Honda and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 138, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE

CONCURRENT RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR THE OPERATION OF A COMMITTEE TO STUDY GOVERNMENTAL TORT LIABILITY DURING THE INTERIM BETWEEN THE ADJOURNMENT OF THE REGULAR SESSION OF 1979 AND THE CONVENING OF THE REGULAR SESSION OF 1980", was referred to the Committee on Legislative Management.

The Chair then stated:

"The Chair would like to state that we shall reconvene at 7:00 o'clock p.m. this evening and, hopefully, finish up the calendar. We will have other resolutions for action."

At 11:26 o'clock a.m., on motion by Representative K. Yamada, seconded by Representative Evans and carried, the House of Representatives stood in recess until 7:00 o'clock p.m. tonight.

NIGHT SESSION

The House of Representatives reconvened at 7:15 o'clock p.m.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Representatives Segawa and Aki, for the Committees on Health and Youth and Elderly Affairs, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1211) recommending that H.R. No. 736, as amended in HD 1, be adopted.

On motion by Representative Aki, seconded by Representative Kobayashi and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.R. No. 736, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING THE RECENTLY FORMED CONSORTIUM OF PRIVATE ORGANIZATIONS CONCERNED WITH THE HEALTH, WELL-BEING, AND SOCIAL WELFARE OF CHILDREN AND YOUTH AND REQUESTING STATE AND COUNTY AGENCIES TO WORK COOPERATIVELY WITH THE CONSORTIUM FOR THE PLANNING AND DELIVERY OF SERVICES FOR CHILDREN AND YOUTH", was adopted.

Representative Aki, for the Committee on Youth and Elderly Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1212) recommending that S.C.R. No. 53, SD 1, be adopted.

On motion by Representative Aki, seconded by Representative Kobayashi and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.C.R. No. 53, SD 1, entitled: "SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE COUNTY

AREA AGENCIES ON AGING TO COOPERATE WITH THE EXECUTIVE OFFICE ON AGING, OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR OF HAWAII, IN THE DEVELOPMENT OF THEIR AREA PLANS ON AGING", was adopted.

Representatives Larsen and Dods, for the Committees on Ecology and Environmental Protection and Transportation, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1213) recommending that S.C.R. No. 43, SD 1, be adopted.

On motion by Representative Fukunaga, seconded by Representative Dods and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and S.C.R. No. 43, SD 1, entitled: "SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE FEDERAL AVIATION ADMINISTRATION TO ADOPT A REGULATION GOVERNING THE PROMULGATION OF AIRPORT NOISE ABATEMENT PLANS", was adopted.

Representative Dods, for the Committee on Transportation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1214) recommending that H.R. No. 755 be adopted.

Representative Dods moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.R. No. 755 be adopted, seconded by Representative Masutani.

At 7:20 o'clock p.m., upon request by Representative Dods, the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 7:20 o'clock p.m., Representative Dods rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this resolution requests the City Council to report to the 1980 State Legislature the means by which it proposes to finance the cost of constructing, operating and maintaining the proposed fixed guideway system. The preparation of this report on fixed guideway financing is meant to be part of the City Council's ongoing review of the City's proposed 1979-1980 operating and capital improvements budget. I think that the Council is the proper body to develop a means of financing fixed guideway costs since it determines the type and level of public service programs, including mass transit, which the City is able to fund while maintaining a statutorily required balanced City budget.

Mr. Speaker, in 1975, the State Legislature appropriated \$6 million for some form of a municipal mass transit system. The City has since determined that these monies should

be used only for a fixed guideway system. I find it hard to believe that a very costly fixed guideway is the only form of mass transit that can serve Honolulu's future transportation needs, especially when basic fixed guideway studies dealing with the guideway's projected ridership, operations and maintenance costs and means of financing will not be completed until next year. Since it has taken the City over four years to start work on these basic studies, I have extreme doubts that they will be completed before the 1980 session adjourns. In order to encourage the City to complete its work, this Legislature has reduced the original \$6 million appropriated to slightly more than \$3 million which I feel the most important part will lapse at the end of June, 1980. I personally feel that these funds should lapse at the end of June of this year.

Mr. Speaker, through all the numerous and heated discussions regarding the fixed guideway, the City Council has never formally supported the fixed guideway. I find it extremely puzzling that the City Council has been so restrained in supporting a City project. Council members may feel no need to match the State's \$6 million appropriation or they may feel that other projects are in greater need of City funds.

Whatever the reasons may be, Mr. Speaker, I think it is time for the Council to shoulder its responsibility by determining how the Council will raise sufficient revenue to meet fixed guideway costs without adversely affecting the public services currently provided by the City. Last year, the municipal bus system cost \$19 million more to run than it brought in. If the City is having problems meeting its current financial responsibilities, how will it finance a fixed guideway system? As a State Legislator, I want to know how large the fixed guideway debt service and operating deficit will be. I think this is important because I feel that the State will be asked to help defray these fixed guideway expenses.

Mr. Speaker, unless the City Council can show us how they will finance fixed guideway costs and indicate the amount and type of State assistance that may be needed to operate and maintain the fixed guideway system, I don't see how any responsible legislator can support the fixed guideway. The City has asked for yet another year to complete their fixed guideway studies, including a proposed means of financing, which has been developed by a consultant and not by the City Council. I will not accept a consultant's suggestion on how to finance fixed guideway costs as a substitute for a financial plan for

fixed guideway costs approved by the City Council before this body meets again next year.

I urge all of my colleagues to support this resolution by voting 'aye'.

Thank you."

Representative Sutton then rose to speak against the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, it is my belief that the prior speaker has stated two erroneous assumptions. Assumption one that was wrong is that we, the State Legislature, have four counties to deal with. We don't tell them what to do; we tell them how to get some teamwork and work with us.

He also made another erroneous statement. He said this should lapse this year. Now, the budget committee has determined it's going to lapse June 30, 1980 and the subject is no longer debatable -- it is in the budget and it is going to lapse in 1980, and they will be given this additional \$3.3 million which is an indication of good will, good faith.

Let us not start this thing all over again. We've taken sixteen years to try and find an alternate airport and we haven't done it. And they have a more complex problem in solving the bus, mass transit, fixed guideway, whatever you want to call it, and many cities have taken as many as ten years. BART took them fifteen years and BART is now a success.

So, I would urge my colleagues not to ask the City Council, under threat of coercion, but write them a nice letter from your desk and say, please kokua. Half of them used to be with us here.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At 7:28 o'clock p.m., upon request by Representative Larsen, the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 7:35 o'clock p.m., Representative Larsen was recognized and he stated:

"Mr. Speaker, after discussing the merits and demerits of this with the chairman of Transportation the resolution here, I will support it with reservations because what I don't want to do is give the idea that I am supporting anything that will lock us in to a fixed guideway system, irrespective of whether the City Council

can figure out a way to finance it or not. I don't believe that would be the best thing for us and he assures me that this is not locking us in on an analyses of only the fixed guideway, but we will consider alternatives to mass transit.

With those reservations in mind, I will go along with it.

Thank you."

Representative Suwa then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of House Resolution No. 755 in a different light.

For many, many years now, and especially in the last session, this session, fingers were pointed at the State that if the State removes that, or lapse that fund, that the federal is going to look upon us that we are against fixed guideway. Although the fingers were pointed to the State to say that the federal will look upon the State action, but at the same time, the City's share of ten percent is missing. Nowhere in the budget can we find their share of ten percent. So, why are they pointing their finger and blaming the State for not having their share of ten percent?

Now, the reason that the conferees agreed to the \$3.3 million is that, now the City -- where is your ten percent?"

For that reason, I support this resolution."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. Representative Suwa, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1252) recommending that H.R. No. 511, HD 1, be adopted.

On motion by Representative Suwa, seconded by Representative Morioka and carried, the report of the Committee

was adopted and H.R. No. 511, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION REQUESTING THAT ASBESTOS BUILDING MATERIALS IN PUBLIC SCHOOL CLASSROOMS BE IDENTIFIED", was adopted.

Representative Suwa, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1253) recommending that H.R. No. 499 be adopted.

On motion by Representative Suwa, seconded by Representative Morioka and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. No. 499, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE SELECTION OF HEEIA-KEA FISHPOND AS ONE OF THE REPRESENTATIVE ANCIENT HAWAIIAN FISHPONDS TO BE RENOVATED FOR THE CULTURE OF LIMU", was adopted.

Representative Suwa, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1254) recommending that H.R. No. 554, as amended in HD 1, be adopted.

On motion by Representative Suwa, seconded by Representative Morioka and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. No. 554, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION RELATING TO THE CREATION OF A FILM-MAKING AND TELEVISION DEGREE PROGRAM AT THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII AND THE COMMUNITY COLLEGES", was adopted.

Representative Suwa, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1255) recommending that H.R. No. 547 be adopted.

On motion by Representative Suwa, seconded by Representative Morioka and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. No. 547, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION REQUESTING A REPORT ON THE FEASIBILITY OF ESTABLISHING A HEALTH INFORMATION SYSTEM", was adopted.

At 7:55 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 8:00 o'clock p.m.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 20 on H.B. No. 1, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1 (Deferred from April 17, 1979):

Representative Suwa moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 1, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1,

having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morioka.

Representative Suwa then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of House Bill 1, House draft 1, Senate draft 1, Conference draft 1, which relates to the State budget.

First of all, I want to thank all the members of this body who contributed to this bill -- especially the chairpersons of the subject matter committees who carefully reviewed their program areas and made recommendations to the Finance Committee. I also wish to express my appreciation to the Finance Committee members who put in long hours to develop this bill. And lastly, I wish to recognize and express my gratitude for the fine work accomplished by the Finance Committee staff. The result of all these weeks of work is a bill I believe all members of this House can support.

Not since statehood have we had to so dramatically alter our perspective in the shaping of a budget document. Perhaps the most significant consideration was the general fund appropriations ceiling approved by the voters last November. Even though the Legislature did not enact such a ceiling this session, I foresee the formal execution and application of a limitation to all phases of the very next executive budget and appropriation cycle.

Nevertheless, in the meantime, this budget for the 1979-81 biennium complies with the spirit of the Hawaii State Constitution. The increase in general fund appropriations in this bill -- and all other bills providing for general fund appropriations -- has been kept below the growth of total State personal income over the last three years, in anticipation that total State personal income will be the future measure for fiscal planning ultimately enacted into law.

In shaping this budget, we were fully aware of the potential loophole in the constitutional spending limitation because the Constitution applied the ceiling only to general fund appropriations. There was that possibility efforts would be made to earmark additional special funds to bypass this limitation, but I am pleased to report that the spending limitation envisioned by the Constitutional Convention has been adhered to.

Furthermore, there is consensus

that if any special funds are created in the future, or if special revenues are substantially increased, they will be for a legitimate purpose, and not for the purpose of undermining a policy approved by the people.

The general approach taken in developing this budget was to review the recommendations of the subject matter committees; assess the accuracy of the cost estimates for the various programs; consider alternative means of funding certain programs, and in some cases, hold appropriations to a lower level than that requested by the Administration.

In addition, where program direction was unclear and where other uncertainties existed, funding was appropriated only for the first year -- with the expectation that firmer justifications will be provided in the 1980 session.

In closing, Mr. Speaker, I urge all members of the House to support this measure. This budget is within our fiscal capacity, and when executed, will make for a stronger and better Hawaii.

Thank you."

Representative Ushijima then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in support of House Bill 1, House draft 1, Senate draft 1, Conference draft 1, and more specifically, Mr. Speaker, to that portion relating to higher education.

Mr. Speaker, in giving my support, I wish to express my thanks and congratulations to Chairman Suwa, the members and staff of the Finance Committee for a job well done in preserving the integrity of the State's total operating budget.

Mr. Speaker, House Bill 1, House draft 1, Senate draft 1, Conference draft 1, was initiated, first of all, as an attempt to realize the goals of higher education set by this State's Legislature many years ago by redressing some of the imbalances caused by the fiscal leveling of the past eight years. It would have provided moneys for vitally-needed support services, repair and maintenance requirements, and compliance with State and federal regulations.

House Bill 1, House draft 1, Senate draft 1, Conference draft 1, in its final form now before this body, is a realistic and practical solution to a situation marked by differences in philosophy and approach.

Mr. Speaker, while I realize the vital responsibility we have as a legislative body, I am nonetheless concerned over the potential dangers that exist when excessive external influences begin shaping and re-directing our educational curriculum.

State legislators should be sensitive to the possibility that legislation affecting University budgets and personnel policies may also impose undesirable restrictions on the development of our educational curricula.

It is imperative, therefore, Mr. Speaker, that an open and fair working relationship exist between University administrators and policy makers to avoid impairing curricular flexibility through excess regulation or inadequate funding.

When our educational goals are realized, Mr. Speaker, it should be the result of a willingness to acknowledge the roles and responsibilities and the authority of all parties involved in shaping higher education in the State of Hawaii.

Thank you very much."

Representative Sutton was recognized and he stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of House Bill 1, House draft 1, Senate draft 1, Conference draft 1.

Mr. Speaker, it has been my great privilege to serve with Chairman Suwa, the hardest working man I have ever seen or ever known, and I think that this body would be remiss if it did not acknowledge the immense industry of this gentleman, immense intelligence and immense application and devotion; his devotion to duty way beyond anything that duty would call for in this body -- 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

Mr. Speaker, having given my accolades to the Chairman of the Finance Committee, Chairman Jack Suwa, I would like to proceed on one small point which I think is highly significant. If they will notice in this budget, for the first time, they will see a type of mechanism that declares a consensus of priorities to the executive branch. And this is by the division of Part A and Part B. Part B will be the first to be cut if there is a revenue shortfall, and Part B is where the adjustments will be made.

And by the same token, coming in within the inhibitions on spending

put by the last Constitutional Convention, this budget now has a basic concept of coming within the total revenues, so that the total that we have here is for the first biennium just a little bit below what the Governor's Executive Budget was, and for the second year of the biennium, above.

But with this division showing priorities and with the immense amount of meticulous work whereby an evaluation was made in what went in Part A and what went in Part B, the net result is that this Legislature, for the first time, is asserting the basic fact, a fact that goes back to the Magna Carta. We, the Legislature of the State of Hawaii, control the purse strings of this State and we are now saying that we have two parts -- one purse says we want to be spent first, then the second purse.

And by this division, between A and B, we have made a very significant concept of priorities and, therefore, I would applaud the Chairman for incorporating this new concept. And I think it will be a concept that other Legislatures will follow. It's one I think that would have been beneficial if we had started at statehood. It is late but never too late.

Thank you very much."

Representative Segawa then rose to speak in favor of House Bill 1, House draft 1, Senate draft 1, Conference draft 1, stating:

"First of all, Mr. Speaker, I wish to give praise to Chairman Suwa and the Finance Committee and their staff for the many hours that they have put in into putting this budget together and I believe it has been reported that this year's Conference Committee meeting was the shortest in history for a long time. While I believe the conference itself may appear to have been short, I believe this speaks very well for our Chairman of the Finance Committee and the members of this House in the way that they had given input to the budget when it was first formulated.

Mr. Speaker, I would like to speak specifically to the health budget and at the time that it entered into conference, the health budget had returned from the Senate with a cut of approximately \$5,100,000. I believe that in a period of fiscal frugality, some of these cuts may appear to have been necessary but some of these cuts were over and above those necessary. I think in the time of frugality, I am very happy to see that the health area has come

out very well in the budget; more so, specifically in the areas of our hospitals.

The neighbor island hospitals have long been subject of critical concerns on the neighbor islands by doctors, nurses and the public itself. This year, I am happy to say, for the first time, the neighbor island hospitals are being provided 157 positions to bring their staffing to a minimal staffing satisfactory to provide for the adequate staffing of the hospitals. The budget also includes \$1,475,000 to improve these hospital facilities.

In addition to over \$26 million that we are spending in the Department of Health for mental health, we are also providing an additional \$1,900,000 for mental health problems that we have throughout the State.

In addition, I am very happy to see that we have allocated 20 new positions to take care of special education students in the schools for therapy and the attention that they need.

We will be placing a lot of emphasis for emergency medical services on the islands of Kauai, Hawaii, Maui and Oahu. Through the present system that we have, we would probably have one of the best emergency medical services in the nation.

Also included in the budget, I am very happy to say, is a big CIP appropriation of \$50,000,000 for a long needed Hilo Hospital.

So, in this time of fiscal frugality, I am very happy to say that the areas of health are really being taken care of, and I want to thank the Finance Committee for their work and the members of this House to really look at the needs of the people as we act on the budget, and I ask all members to please vote 'aye' on this budget.

Thank you."

Representative Narvaes then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, words alone cannot express my admiration for the spirit of cooperation that has existed between the House and Senate conferees in regards to this budget. It was amazing that it went so fast.

This budget was a very big task, an effort which many were so sure that we, legislators, would not measure up to. Much commendation is in store, especially for the two chairmen who,

though differing completely in styles, shared the same concern for fiscal responsibility in determining the course of the taxpayers' dollar.

Mr. Speaker, there are only two areas relating to State finances where I still have some reservations.

One is the subject of special funds. The Committee report itself talks about a large loophole in the constitutional spending limitation which allows special funds to escape this restriction. I can foresee all kinds of problems in this area in the future, where we might be using the special fund approach to finance programs in a manner that would not apply to the State spending limitations.

Mr. Speaker, there is also the area of trust funds, such as those in the University of Hawaii's budget. I believe that the University's administration has too much freedom at present with these funds.

Mr. Speaker, I believe that the Committee should have seriously looked into the use of those special funds and trust funds which exist already and see just how these funds were used and how they operate.

The Finance Committee would find this kind of inquiry and review very important and helpful in clarifying the role and purpose of special funds and trust funds. I can only urge that interim work, or future work, be done in these two areas.

Mr. Speaker, other than that, this is an excellent piece of legislation. I have been honored to serve here for a couple of years now -- my third -- and I sat on the Finance Committee with Jack and many of the other members for now three years, and I must say that this is seriously an excellent piece of legislation. The staff has done a great job, and my commendation again to the Chairman of the Finance Committee.

Mr. Speaker, with those words, I would like to ask and urge everybody to vote unanimously in favor of the State budget."

Representative Suwa was recognized and he stated:

"Just for the members' information, this budget includes incremental raises as prescribed by law. For the first year, there is \$7 million or so and the second year includes \$13 million. And also set aside in the Financial

Plan only, the remaining portion is 7 percent wage increase were applied, that first year, \$21,600,000 or so dollars and the second year, \$45,411,000 is set aside in the Financial Plan, setting aside all of the future costs, year end balance for the first year is about \$5 million and the year ending balance for the second year is about \$17 million.

So, this will slow down the economy also and let me say, Mr. Speaker, if we are talking about a 7 percent raise for the entire government employees, it is \$28 million for the first year and \$58 million for the second year. So, when you apply the 7 percent for the first year and another 7 percent raise in the second year, it amounts to \$86 million, Mr. Speaker. So, included in the budget, once again, is only the incremental raise of \$7 million and \$13 million, and the rest is kept in the Financial Plan.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lunasco then rose to speak in favor of House Bill 1, House draft 1, Senate draft 1, Conference draft 1, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I address my remarks to the lower education portion of the State budget.

First of all, Mr. Speaker, on behalf of the Committee on Education, I want to personally thank the Chairman of Finance, Jack Suwa, and his staff and also the members of the Finance Committee. Mr. Speaker, the budget before you, I think personally, ever since it was decked, I have never heard so much good comments on the work that the House had done.

Mr. Speaker, the budget before you lays the groundwork and, hopefully, in the years to come, will solve many of the problems facing us in education. Although we did not address some of the problems in education, most of the major problems in education was addressed and if we continue to proceed in a route that your Education Committee took, Mr. Speaker, I can honestly tell you that we can see the light down the road in solving all of the problems in education.

In closing, Mr. Speaker, I want to personally thank the members of the Education Committee for their hard work and cooperation, and also, to my two chief researchers, Jeannie Sakai and Daryl Higashi, who did all the leg work in making the Education Committee's job that much easier,

and I urge all of my colleagues to vote in favor of this bill.

Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted, and H.B. No. 1, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET", having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Garcia being excused.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 21 on H.B. No. 2, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1 (Deferred from April 17, 1979):

Representative Suwa moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morioka.

Representative Sutton then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, first of all, this Judiciary budget includes money for far too many personnel. If you will look, Mr. Speaker, at the breakdown, you will find a very brief breakdown -- page 3, Mr. Speaker. And this breakdown is less than any department, any operation, any program that we have in the evaluated program of our main budget. One page is all you have to survey and you have here some 905 positions and, Mr. Speaker, this is a budget of \$28.6 million. And that is an enormous amount of money. There is another \$5.3 million on top of \$30 million previously expended for CIP.

Mr. Speaker, I get the feeling of inadequacy because we are constrained by the doctrine of separation of powers. The budget from the Governor comes down and goes to the Budget and Finance Department. Eileen Anderson, a highly competent person, makes a study of it; subsequently breaks it down into programs and gives us a booklet with 486 pages and we carefully probe over a four months' period, every dollar, every position that is expended.

But the Judiciary budget, because of the concept of the separation of powers, does not go through that screening process. It, Mr. Speaker, comes directly over. And we have a feeling of gross inadequacy. I, myself, have taken the CPA exam; I have not practiced as a CPA because I am an attorney, but I get the feeling of great inadequacy of having properly

probed into the Judiciary budget. I get the feeling that there is excessive positions; I get the feeling, Mr. Speaker, for example, on this new Appellate Court and Supreme Court, we have a law clerk for everybody. And, Mr. Speaker, this is an unfortunate situation. I, myself, served as a law clerk for two federal judges right after getting out of law school -- Judge McLachlin and Judge Metzger -- and yet, we have here nine law clerks -- way too many. And that is indicative of how they have used their personnel. It is overstaffed.

And so, Mr. Speaker, I would ask if you would consider the inconsistency with what this Legislature was asked in your Opening Day address. You said we had to have fiscal restraint; you said that our whole responsibility was responsible government management. This was your address which you gave to us just two-and-a-half short months ago.

Mr. Speaker, the Judiciary budget is one that should have a far greater scrutiny. We can work that scrutiny by the use of. . . I am changing horses in the middle of the stream. Mr. Speaker, I feel that we need to establish what twenty-nine other states have established; to come around that encumbrance of separation of powers, and that, Mr. Speaker, is to have the Senate and the House establish a finance committee that would provide a complete probing of all costs of the Judiciary, and that would mean that the Senate and the House would have special staff working directly with the Judiciary so that this Judiciary budget would have the same scrutiny as the budget that comes down from the executive.

Now, Mr. Speaker, I am an attorney-at-law and you are an attorney-at-law. In fact, we learned our trial work together and we recognize the importance of an independent and vigorous judicial branch of government. However, this does not mean that the Judiciary and every phase of its operation should be allowed to proceed unfettered with no review. This does not mean, Mr. Speaker, that the premises of checks and balances provided by our form of government must somehow be forgotten in the case of the Judiciary budget. This does not mean, Mr. Speaker, that the people of this State can be assured that without adequate legislative review, our judges will create a responsible budget. Anybody who is making a budget that isn't properly reviewed is going to pad it. Now, Mr. Speaker, judges are human; judges are subject

to whim -- good judges may not make good budget policymakers.

I have already mentioned the CIP appropriations; the large number of new personnel -- ninety new personnel; the Intermediate Appellate Court, of course, was put on because of the Constitutional Convention. I have mentioned, however, that the cost of this will now go up to \$2 million and will be creating a whole new bureaucracy.

Now, my family has had more lawyers than any family in Hawaii, starting with Judge Whitney; and my father, the second Attorney General; two of us now practicing -- my son and myself.

Mr. Speaker, I am the last one to be critical of the Judiciary when they are doing a good job. All I am saying here is not an inquiry into their job on justice, but into an inquiry of how they establish their Judiciary budget -- the mechanism. I have suggested the mechanism for you, Mr. Speaker, and I will submit appropriate legislation to you the next time that we meet, and that will be in 1980.

In the final analysis, Mr. Speaker, the question does not become one of just principles, but it must be a comparison with other State agencies that have to go through a process of program evaluation as to whether their programs are succeeding. There is no program evaluation here. We have had classes; we all start up at the University of Hawaii with top men from the country who come down and tell us how to evaluate programs, and yet, in the Judiciary budget, nobody's applicable and none of that is given.

Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I think it is time for us to forget the restraints of separation of powers and to proceed. We, the Legislature, that has the power of the purse strings must also have the power to properly probe the Judiciary budget. Mr. Speaker, I speak with considerable hesitation and humbleness because I don't want my remarks misconstrued. All I am saying, really, is my own deficiency, and that is that I did not demand soon enough an adequate probe of the expenditures of the Judiciary budget and putting them through the same scrutiny that we have put on the rest of the budget.

I would, therefore, urge you, Mr. Speaker, to vote 'no' as I am going to.

Thank you."

Representative Suwa then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, as the previous speaker has stated, if he goes back to the Journal of last year's budget, he had made the same statement -- not exactly word for word -- but the same statement.

In light of the recommendation that the member of the Finance Committee talked about, the Judiciary Department set up a group in the Judiciary, exactly what a member of the Finance from the Minority has stated, and it goes exactly like the administration review. In other words, all the courts submit their budget, the Budget Review Committee in the Judiciary reviews it, cuts it down and talks it over with the Chief Justice and only then is it submitted to the Legislature.

So, let me assure you that I will sit down with my members in the Finance Committee how the new setup is and you will find out that it has been improved for the first time as it was submitted, a budget document that speaks for itself. So, let me assure you that it had the proper review as the administration.

Therefore, I ask my gentleman colleague that spoke earlier to come along and vote with us on this Judiciary budget because your problem has been taken care of.

Thank you."

Representative Kunimura then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"If you will look at House Bill 2 and the conference draft, you will notice, Mr. Speaker, that if you listen to the gentleman from Nuuanu, you will come to the conclusion that all of a sudden, the Conference Committee ran amok and added on millions of dollars and hundreds of positions. But after a very careful review, you don't even have to make a careful review, because they are both on page 3. And Judiciary 101, we have 39 positions, both same in House Bill 2, House draft 1, and, of course, this particular bill was passed out of this House on March 12, 1979, and the gentleman from Nuuanu signed his signature free and clear.

You have Item 2, three positions, same three positions.

Item 4, Judiciary 111, 228 positions, and in the Conference draft, it is 224 -- minus four positions in the Conference

draft.

Next item, Judiciary 112, 207 -- this one gained four positions.

In Judiciary 121, we had 337 positions in House draft 1 -- Conference draft 1 was reduced to 325 -- minus 12 positions.

And the rest, all same, except for Judiciary 221, which is plus one position.

I like the gentleman from Nuuanu, but I hope when he makes a speech on the floor of this House, because we are privileged to serve on the Finance Committee, that whatever we say here and those who have not had the opportunity to spend the many hours that we have had the privilege of spending with a very capable and honest and hardworking gentleman, Mr. Suwa, that I must say that it is unreasonable, unfair, to cast such aspersions as directed to the Judiciary budget by the gentleman from Nuuanu. And I hope that he will, in private, if necessary, apologize to the chairman of the Finance Committee for doing so. Otherwise, Mr. Speaker, I must say that both the budget and the Judiciary budget, although the troops of the House conferees on the part of the budget were ready, willing and able to work the wise decision of our Chairman, not to go into full conference because of the kinds of volatile characters that were going to meet, decided if we could work it out with the Chairman, and this is why we have the budget tonight. Otherwise, May 20th would be the earliest date we would be out of this Capitol.

Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE JUDICIARY BUDGET", having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Sutton voting no, and Representative Garcia being excused.

At 8:36 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Representative Sutton then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, we have before us something that violates the basic concept of the relationship of parent to a child, or the guardian to the person they are the guardian for.

Now, Mr. Speaker, it has long been known that there is no better communication than the communication between a parent and a child. That relationship starts at birth; it continues through education; the parent is the logical one to be the subject of communication. In the United States Navy, one-third of the budget is spent for communication. Each and every day we begin our day by reading papers, watching the TV -- communication. The communication between a parent and a child is, therefore, part of our basic concept of life of communication. All of a sudden, we put a short

circuit in here. We say in so many words that the doctor comes in and the doctor becomes the determinant of whether or not there shall be communication -- communication on VD, communication on pregnancy. Nothing is said in this bill about rape or incest. I don't know whether the doctor has discretion on rape and incest -- two things which no state in the union has ever done. This bill is silent on rape and incest.

We have a very strange wording, Mr. Speaker, if you will look to page 3 and start at the line 18: 'If the minor patient is not diagnosed as being pregnant or afflicted with venereal disease, such information as well as the application for diagnosis may be disclosed, at the discretion of the treating physician after consulting with the minor patient.' This is the strangest thing that I have ever read. In the first place, it is very poor draftsmanship, Mr. Speaker, as you and I know, and they have the antecedents referring to wrong antecedents; they split their infinitives; they have not proper punctuation, but forget that. Let's look at what they are trying to say.

They are trying to say that this doctor, and he has, in modern medicine, all sorts of specialties; you don't have the old family doctor that motors out to the house. There is no relationship between a physician and an individual. You go in there and whoever is not busy takes you. Why, during this session, I cut my left toe and I went to a doctor and I never saw him before. And he said, 'what's the matter with that left toe, it is broken', and I said, 'I played a little football.' He didn't even have my history, didn't know anything about it. And so he fixes this toe without even a background that I had a broken toe in football, and that is the type of relationship that you have today with a doctor. Then, all of a sudden, we are saying this doctor is going to be all powerful; he is going to engage in family counseling; he is going to determine whether the parent hears about the minor having come. He is going to be the one that will make the final decision of breaking this communication that we defined as being such an essential part of life. Mr. Speaker, we do not accomplish the mission here if we, all of a sudden, break the parental relationship of the child.

Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I am going to ask you and the members of the Minority, and the members of the Majority, if they would be kind enough to please try to conceive of your own family and a third party intervening,

a third party who does not have a personal relationship with your child, and he becomes the all-powerful determinant of whether or not you are going to hear anything about it. And how can you make intelligent decisions on how to handle your child who is a minor if you lack that basic information.

And so, Mr. Speaker, on the basic ground that it violates the parental-child concept, on the basic ground that the parent is now found in a position where they cannot adequately guide the child, on the third proposition that a guardian. . . let me give you an example of a guardian. My father was guardian to Red McQueen and Red was a hard person to be guardian for -- believe me. And what was the biggest basis there was? Red McQueen everyday reported to my father and they had breakfast together, and they could have consultation. This guardianship is a very important thing. We have many guardians in Hawaii and the relationship there is broken -- not just the parents. Let us not conceive of something where we, the State of Hawaii, the Legislature, all of a sudden come in and destroy the family relationship, or guardian relationship, both of which are sacred.

So, Mr. Speaker, I am going to ask you and the Majority, and the people from the Majority that come in all the way from the far ends of the county, and also the Minority, to please register a 'no' and a strong 'no'.

Thank you."

Representative Medeiros then rose and requested that his remarks, in opposition to House Bill No. 520, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1, be inserted into the Journal, and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Medeiros' remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in opposition to this bill.

This bill allows children under the age of 18 to obtain medical treatment and services for birth control or venereal disease without the knowledge or consent of their parents.

It even allows a child under 18 having such medical services for birth control, pregnancy or VD to undertake financial responsibility without the parents' consent or knowledge.

Mr. Speaker, plain and simply,

this bill is outrageous. It sets into motion some very dangerous changes in society that I know we are going to regret in the future.

First of all, it undermines the basic role of the parent in every family. It tells a child that he or she can play with fire, act irresponsibly and without fear of parental intervention, even if such assistance would be given to protect the child in the first place.

Government has no right to interfere in the family itself unless there is danger presented to any member of that family. Mr. Speaker, rather than protect any member of a family, this bill allows for even greater dangers to occur, tearing apart the basic family unit and promoting a lifestyle that is not desirable, that is destructive, and that encourages children to enter into dangerous conduct because they believe they can now 'get away with it'; and 'Big Brother' or the State government, is going to make everything all right.

That's one of the basic problems with this bill. It brings on the idea that we are acting like 'Big Brother', isolating children from their parents by encouraging them to conceal very important health information.

We are taking it for granted that parents don't care about their children's welfare, that parents won't do what is necessary to help the child out when he or she needs it, that parents won't deal reasonably or responsibly with the child.

We are, in this bill, telling the children that their parents can't be trusted, that they ought to keep this kind of information secret, that it's some kind of right children have to receive care for VD or pregnancy or birth control, that it doesn't matter how their parents may feel about it.

This is wrong -- dead wrong. Let's talk straight about it -- 'family planning' is just a fancy word for birth control, and birth control is something that's very serious when you're talking about young children aged 13 and 14 years old.

And when we're talking about prescriptions for birth control pills, I say that we're talking about some very effects this could have on the parents. It is a fact that birth control pills have been shown to have some negative side effects on the individual who uses them, side effects that may someday require greater medical attention. Is

the parent going to have to foot the bill for medical care for side effects caused by their child taking a pill that was not even approved of by the parent?

I say we should not pass this bill. It's unnecessary and sets dangerous social changes into motion. It is highly questionable in the area of financial responsibility.

I urge my colleagues to defeat this bill. It won't solve the problem, but it will certainly cause new problems.

Thank you."

Representative Lunasco then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, my colleague from Nuuanu mentioned many things in communications between parents and teenagers. Mr. Speaker, I must say that if the line of communication was open, this bill presently before us wouldn't be here today. Mr. Speaker, to talk about communicating with your children is a great thing on this House floor, but yet, Mr. Speaker, in reality, it does not exist in our community today in most cases. Are we to penalize the young people because this line of communication does not exist?

Mr. Speaker, we are here to protect everyone in this State and give them options, and this is all what this bill is doing. Mr. Speaker, in the event that this line of communication is open, then, I would be the first one to say, well, let's repeal this bill. But until that happens, Mr. Speaker and members of this House, I urge all of you to vote in favor of this because, let's face it, Mr. Speaker, our young people are going to be the leaders of tomorrow and only by providing these kinds of services to them, we can assist them in being better citizens in this State.

Thank you."

Representative Segawa then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill amends the sections in the Hawaii Revised Statutes -- Section 577A-1 through Section 577A-4. It expands the definition of medical care and services to include family planning services and it also amends the statutes: 'The physician shall inform the spouse, parent, custodian, or guardian' to 'may inform' at the discretion of the treating physician of the provision of medical care and services to the minor.'

The reason for this change was to expand the services that the physician could provide to minors, as well as to protect the confidentiality of the minor.

This bill does not say anything to cut off communication between the parent and the child.

Also, this statute is in consort with the U.S. Supreme Court which has held the right to privacy which is protected by the Fourteenth Amendment, includes the right for family planning. It also says that the right of access to contraceptives and unwanted pregnancy; it also held that the right of privacy applies to minors as well as adults. These are the rights of the individual.

However, we need to address constitutional rights but there is also another side of concern, and that is the high rate of teenage pregnancy nationally as well as in Hawaii. I would like to quote from the testimony of Dr. Roy Smith, Professor of Maternal and Child Health and Pediatrics, Schools of Public Health and Medicine, University of Hawaii. He says: 'There are many statistics nationally that support the view and provide evidence that teenagers are sexually active. Teenagers in Hawaii are no exception. Nine percent of Hawaii's teenage girls, age 15-19 years, become pregnant each year. In terms of numbers, that represents more than 3 1/2 thousand girls; more than 65 percent are unwed. The outcomes of many of these pregnancies are frequently disastrous.'

Mr. Speaker, we are all concerned about the integrity of the family unit. Nothing can be more disruptive to that important foundation of our society than a teenager's pregnancy. Because most teenagers do not have the consent of their parents for becoming involved in sexual activity, the doctor is in a position to facilitate prevention of teenage pregnancy only when the teenager seeks his or her advice.

There are two problems which prevent this constructive and preventive coalition: (1) The teenager knows she does not have the legal indisputable right of physician-patient confidentiality; and (2) The physician lacks assurance that he can, without permission from parents or guardians, provide contraceptive advice and services with impunity.

Many, if not most, teenagers will not seek advice, counseling or medical services relating to sexual activities unless they are assured of confidentiality. While physicians see their role as

including counseling teenagers to confide in their parents, without the protection offered by this, they will lack the opportunity to do so.

Many opponents to this bill staunchly stand for celibacy, not for themselves, but for the teenager. While I do not advocate or encourage teenage sexuality, I cannot condemn them for it. It is part of the developing process -- intellectually, emotionally and physiologically. It is important for parents and health professionals to help our teenagers develop responsible sexuality.

Twenty-six states and the District of Columbia have already enacted laws such as this affirming the right of young people to consent for their own contraceptive care and are attempting to stem the tide of the epidemic of unplanned and unwanted teenage pregnancies. Our data and experience are strong statements which we can no longer afford to deny -- teenage sexual activity is here to stay. Until we provide young people with their right to privacy and the right to make responsible decisions regarding their reproductive lives, and until physicians are protected by law, such as this bill provides, many minors will continue to be deprived of ready access to reproductive health care services and will continue to have unwanted pregnancies.

I urge all my colleagues to vote 'aye' on this bill."

Representative Sutton, in rebuttal, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, the prior gentleman, the head of the Health Committee, has indicated that the United States Supreme Court has defined this right of privacy. I would submit to him that if he would study that case, it was not a direct holding of the type of bill that we have in 520.

This type of language also, Mr. Speaker, is not in twenty-six states. This type of language that we have in this Committee report is something that I can't find duplicated in any other state. I can't find anything similar to, 'If the minor patient is not diagnosed as being pregnant or afflicted with venereal disease, such information, as well as the application for diagnosis, may be disclosed at the discretion of the treating physician after consulting with the minor patient.' In fact, I don't even know what 'after consulting with the minor patient' means. Does that mean with the approval of the minor patient? What does it mean? It means that, all of a sudden,

you are saying to the doctors. . . doctors study medicine, they don't study family counseling. This is the wrong person that you are talking about; maybe a social worker who has the expertise in dealing with this field. By the time a person goes through seven years of medical school and takes an internship, they are not experts on this concept. And, all of a sudden, we are saying that he is the one to short circuit the family relationship -- break the communication.

Now, going back to again what the learned gentleman, the head of the Health Committee, said, he seems to indicate that, somehow or other, because we have a problem, I admit the problem -- we do have a problem. But that problem can be solved in three spots that he doesn't even talk about. He doesn't talk about the schools; he doesn't talk about the church; and he doesn't talk about the peer-approval situation that forces the child to get into something of that nature. He completely disregards the social environment of the child and, all of a sudden, wants to insert as the all powerful individual some physician that has no real background at all.

Therefore, we have before us a bill which is not to the best interest of this State, not to the best interest of the family, and I submit, not to the best interest of the children.

So, Mr. Speaker, I would ask you not to be, in any way, shape or manner, influenced by the head of the Health Committee and to come along with me and vote 'no'."

At 9:15 o'clock p.m., upon request by Representative Larsen, the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 9:20 o'clock p.m.

Representative Aki then requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Aki's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, House Bill No. 520, HD 1, SD 2, is not an abortion bill as some are led to believe. Also, it is not a bill designed to break up the child-parent relationship. Where there is good communication, this bill will not change it at all. This bill addresses the real problem of teenage pregnancies. We cannot overlook

the rise that has taken place the past few years. This bill, in fact, mandates that counseling be provided that will seek to open and increase family communication.

We are all concerned about the integrity of the family unit. Nothing can be more disruptive to that important foundation of our society than a teenager's pregnancy.

The proposed bill is good for a number of reasons. First, it is clearly established that a sexually active minor should be able to receive contraceptives without endangering their confidentiality unless the physician or counselor feels that there is a need to involve another party. This bill does not let minors have abortions without the parents' consent. The U.S. Supreme Court has ruled that minors can, so nothing in this bill is in conflict with the rulings of the high court.

Second, it clearly gives the physician or clinic a clear-cut authority to disclose certain information regarding a patient when it is deemed to be in their best interest.

Third, it clearly relieves the parent or spouse of a minor patient from any financial obligation in regard to the cost of their medical care and services if they have not been involved in the consent process.

Finally, one of the most important points of this bill is that it directs that the physician or counselor provide counseling for each minor patient treated and that such counseling shall seek to open the line of communication between parent and child.

During the last five years, there has been a clear trend toward liberalizing laws regarding the right of minors to consent to their own medical care. Currently, twenty-six states and the District of Columbia specifically affirm the right of the minor to consent to contraceptive care. In 1976, the Supreme Court ruled that the right of privacy applies to minors as well as adults. More recently, the Supreme Court has ruled that minors also have a constitutional right to obtain contraceptives to prevent pregnancy without parental consent.

The problems of adolescent pregnancy in the State of Hawaii is not an imaginary one. Teenage pregnancy has increased dramatically. Nine percent of Hawaii's teenage girls, ages 15 to 19 years, become pregnant each year. In terms of numbers, that represents more

than 3,500. Early childbearing poses serious health, social, and economic consequences for teenage mothers and their children. In addition to facing higher health risk, both for themselves and their children, teenage mothers are often forced to leave school and to forego job training and other opportunities for economic advancement.

Teenage pregnancy is a complicated problem which will be with us for some time to come. House Bill No. 520, HD 1, SD 2, addresses that problem in an approach that is reasonable, humane, and above all, an approach which does not violate the trust of the patient but provides careful consideration of their needs. Failing to act today only compounds the high human, social and economic costs to be borne by teenage mothers, their children, and society in general.

I urge your support of the proposed bill."

Representative Anderson then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I was going to sit here and not say anything, but when you listen to people saying that the laws that we pass here are because the children of today are so much different than the children of yesterday, it is a lot of baloney. We're passing laws and making kids think that they can do what they want to and we're letting the families forget that they're responsible.

Now, just because there are parents that can't handle their kids, that's not for you and I to decide. We sit around and we make laws and, all of a sudden, the kids can quote laws better than you and I -- half of the parents can't. And I think that's wrong.

I think that when you turn around and you allow the kids of today to rule the adults, you are setting a precedence that is just bad. They rule the schools, they rule the judiciary system; they laugh at all of us.

And for that reason, I speak against this bill because I don't want anybody telling me what's good for my kid. I don't speak as well as the rest of them because I get emotionally upset and that's what bothers me about standing up on this floor, but I thank you very much."

Representative Kunimura then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I was for the other way but after hearing my very dear

friend and able counsel from Nuuanu, I am more than convinced that I should vote against this bill and, therefore, I announce that I have changed my position and I shall vote against this measure."

Representative Sutton then requested a roll call vote on this measure.

At 9:22 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 9:23 o'clock p.m., Representative Sutton was recognized and he said:

"Mr. Speaker, I withdraw my request for a roll call."

The Chair remarked:

"The Chair and all members appreciate your withdrawal."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. And I see nowhere in the Conference Committee report, our own House draft, or the Senate draft, anything which follow the original recommendations of the Federal Trade Commission which came down here to help us on this.

The original concept was to have this saving between a brand-name drug and a generic drug passed on to the consumer as a mandated saving, and I am very disturbed that that is not in this bill.

So, Mr. Speaker, with those reservations, I shall urge you to vote for the bill, but keep those reservations in mind."

Representative Blair then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, very gratefully, I would like to correct the record. The Federal Trade Commission's recommendation was that the pass-through of the savings be discretionary and not mandatory. We are consistent with the Federal Trade Commission's report."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. Representative Sutton then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, like all other citizens, I am very anxious about law and order. However, in passing legislation to accomplish law and order, we must be careful that in our zealous effort to achieve law and order, we do not create a dictatorial and prosecutorial system somewhat comparable to what Adolph Hitler put in Germany.

Mr. Speaker, the bill delegates to the Attorney General the law-making powers which traditionally and constitutionally belong to this Legislature, pursuant to the separation of powers doctrine. Senate Bill 181, as it appears before you, Mr. Speaker, allows the Attorney General to impose his will on the whole of the State as to who he considers a habitual or career criminal. And you, Mr. Speaker, and I have engaged in defending people charged with crimes and we know that we have defended many innocent people, and we've also defended many partially innocent people. And you and I know that our system of justice requires that we not use a blanket of saying, this is a career criminal per se.

Subsection 3 of the bill provides some legislative guidelines as to who shall be subject to the career criminal prosecution effort. However, Mr. Speaker, the criterias provided in this section is loose, broad, vague and violates the fundamental constitutional rights.

Take more specifically, Mr. Speaker, sections 8, 9, 10 and 11 of subsection 3 of this bill. These sections would make persons who are presumably innocent until proven guilty, which you know is our basic common law, subject to the career criminal prosecution program.

Now, Mr. Speaker, if you would address your mind, please, to section 11 of subsection 3. This is so broad that it does not follow the constitutional inhibition that all criminal laws shall be specific and here it substitutes a violation of our constitutional First Amendment rights of association. We have a right of association; we do not have guilt by association, and there is nothing in our Constitution that is more sacred and we do not have guilt by association. And yet, here in 10 and 11, that very thing appears. These sections read specifically: '(10) Is known or suspected to be an associated of organized crime; and (11) Is known or suspected of criminal activity', subject to the criminal prosecution efforts. I am the first one to want to defeat both of those -- organized crime and the criminal element.

But guilt by association is another unfortunate thing that they have brought into this bill. It is a very insidious thing -- very, very insidious -- guilt by association.

Now, Mr. Speaker, I put these questions to you and to all my colleagues: Do you want to find yourselves, your families, your relatives, your friends, subject to the career criminal prosecution efforts? It can happen to any of us -- any of us -- once we put something on the books.

Now, Mr. Speaker, this is what, in effect, you will be doing by voting for this bill. The program, as drafted, is so broad and authorizes and encourages prosecution efforts be directed at persons who very possibly are innocent as well as those who are guilty. We have mixed the innocent and guilty.

Mr. Speaker, in conclusion, if you vote for this bill, you will essentially be giving one person -- the Attorney General -- a blanket law making power in this area, coupled with a defective criteria, which in reality is no criteria at all, of which the end result will be emergence of a dictatorial and prosecutorial system of justice.

So, Mr. Speaker, I would ask that you vote against this bill, and I would ask my colleagues, particularly those

that come in from the other ends of this county, and my own Minority members to please vote 'no'.

Thank you."
