# OATH OF OFFICE

The Chair thereupon called upon the two newly appointed members of the House of Representatives of the Tenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii to remain standing, and the oath of office was administered by the Honorable William S. Richardson, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Hawaii, in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii to the following members of the House:

Gil C. Silva

FIFTH DISTRICT:

Mark J. Andrews

The Chair then appointed Representatives Hagino, Sakamoto and Marumoto to escort the Honorable William S. Richardson from the rostrum after which the Speaker delivered the following address:

"Governor and Mrs. Ariyoshi, Chief Justice Richardson, Congressman Akaka, distinguished guests, my fellow colleagues, friends, ladies and gentlemen:

As Speaker of this illustrious body, I have the pleasure and distinct honor of extending to each of you our warm welcome to the reconvening of the House of Representatives of the Tenth Legislature.

I am deeply honored to again assume this rostrum as Speaker. As in the past, I shall continue to maintain the integrity of this high office.

As we step forward into the eighties, I sense that in view of what is happening in Iran, Afghanistan and other parts of the Third World; in view of the energy crises; in view of the downtrend of our national economy, its rising inflation, and an up-trend in unemployment, our immediate future will be filled with uncertainties.

I believe that these uncertainties can be dealt with as new challenges and can only be resolved by the united effort and great determination of our government and its people. We must be willing to sacrifice our selfish interests for the good of the whole. We must be willing to yield to reason, and to compromise. We must be prepared to make new sacrifices in the years ahead, sacrifices that you and I, and especially the young, may not fully comprehend. We must surely realize that the strength of our state and of our country comes from within its people and those who run the executive, judicial and legislative branches of government.

One of the uncertainties appearing on the horizon relates to the legislature. There is a growing concern that the legislature, as an institution, may be weakening, and I submit to you that we need to guard against this danger. In this effort, let us, as legislators, as lobbyists, as representatives of the newspaper, television, radio, and the other forms of media, as voters, and as members of the public, join hands in an effort to keep our legislature a strong, viable and progressive institution.

Alan Rosenthal, Director of the Eagleton Institute of Politics at Rutgers University, believes that a growing imbalance is taking place between the legislator, as an individual, and the legislature, as an institution. He believes that this imbalance threatens to undo the remarkable progress made to date by state legislatures as institutions.

In the sixties and in the seventies, state legislatures across our country asserted themselves as institutions as never before. Broad and far reaching social reforms and programs were enacted; new facilities were built and old ones were improved; procedures became more and more open; information became more readily available; and legislators became more accessible. This kind of progress, however, may be in danger of diminishing; and why, one might ask. Rosenthal cites several significant reasons.

First: The individual legislator seems to be more interested in seeking opportunities to acquire power, prestige and adulation, for his personal satisfaction and for his own political advancement, rather than seek political achievement by the legislature as an institution. Re-election to the same, or to a higher office, becomes an overriding concern which works to the detriment of what the legislature as an institution should and can achieve for its people.

Second: The legislator, as an individual, seems to want more and more autonomy, often described by the media as being "independent", when the legislature as an institution is in need of more teamwork and dedication. It is said that in the legislature, as well as in the private and other public sectors of our community, too many have little or no appreciation, nor the patience, for apprenticeship and learning. For those who participate

in the legislative process whether as a member of the legislature, a member of a lobbying organization, as a member of the media or the public, meaningful discussion and consideration of issues can only be accomplished by those who pay attention and take the time to learn and understand before prescribing solutions and deciding the fate of each issue. In this regard, I caution our legislature to thoroughly examine and understand the complex issues being proposed, including those proposals relating to each constitutional mandate. We must search for, weigh and carefully consider and deliberate all possible alternatives before deciding on a course of action, despite the fact that such deliberation and consideration may take up all of this session as well as the next.

Third: Rosenthal sees a danger in legislators as individuals insisting on seeking more of the powers of leadership, while the legislature as an institution is in need of more "Teamplayers." The individual legislator seems to be ignoring the role he should play as a committeeman or chairman in relation to a leader's role. Instead, the legislator wants more and more to exercise the powers and authority of leadership without assuming the responsibility, nor the accountability of such a role. If there are only leaders and no teamplayers, then there are no leaders, and in effect, no leadership at the legislature. What is needed are both, leaders as well as teamplayers, for the legislature as an institution must be able to exert leadership as a policy maker.

Fourth: The individual legislator seems to say "Yes" to too many demands, while the legislature, as an institution, increasingly needs to say "No." Every legislator likes to be loved and voted for, and therefore, to say "Yes" to all the demands made upon him becomes easy. Yet, if every legislator or even a bare majority continually say "Yes", then when can the institution say "No." In this era of openness, accessibility, and unlimited demands from all walks of life, and also in light of the limited resources of the State, priority setting becomes increasingly important. Yet, such a task becomes more difficult to achieve. Each individual or group making demands on the legislator acts for his own interest and benefit, while the legislature, acting as an institution, must consider each demand on behalf of the State and all of its people.

Fifth: The individual legislator seems to want more and more to take

credit for the number of bills he introduces, and the number of laws that he can pass, while the legislature as an institution should be more concerned with the passing of laws that are workable, equitable and enforceable. The capacity of our society to absorb laws upon laws, regulations upon regulations, and rules upon rules is reaching its limit. Yet, before each session convenes, the public, the media, the vested interest and lobbying groups expect more and more laws to be passed by the legislature.

The media, as well as other groups, too often grade the legislature by the number of bills enacted, rather than the number of bills withheld. Consequently, the voter is influenced in measuring his or her legislator by this same yardstick. For those who make demands of the legislature, no matter how small, insignificant or unnecessary such demands, the individual legislator and the legislature as an institution are measured by whether those demands have been passed and enacted.

Too often, the media is guilty of giving undue attention and coverage to the reasons and the causes cited by Rosenthal, and thereby contributes to the weakening of the legislature as an institution.

The conflicts are many. How then can we prevent the weakening of our legislature as an institution?

There are no quick answers or solutions, for we are dealing with human frailties, we are dealing with human ambitions, human desires and egos, and the forces of human nature.

There are, however, certain things we should keep in mind. We need to remember that what is good for the legislator as an individual is not necessarily good for the legislature as an institution. We must recognize not only our own interests, but the interests of the institution which we have the rare privilege of serving. Let us look to political achievement rather than political advancement. Let us not dilute leadership, but strive to strengthen and support its role. Let us learn to say "No" to most, and "Yes" to the few but important demands. Let us not work so hard at making many laws, but rather let us make meaningful laws that work.

As an institution, our legislature is a policy-making body. It has to make choices; it has to decide

what government can and cannot do; what is important and what is less important; what has to be done now, and what can wait until later. The task is indeed awesome, but nothing is insoluble if our legislature, as an institution, gains support from within as well as from those who follow and participate in its process.

Rosenthal has said that to ask individuals to be as concerned with an institution as they are of themselves is indeed a tall order. While some may prefer individual satisfactions, I submit to all of you that a greater satisfaction comes from strengthening the institution which is a part of each and every citizen of Hawaii, and which our people will look upon for guidance and leadership in the trying days ahead.

Thank you."

At this time, Representative Kamalii, on behalf of the minority, responded as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, Governor and Mrs. Ariyoshi, Lt. Governor Jean King, family and guests -- Aloha Kakahiaka.

There is a traditional tendency to be excited by the prospect and promise of a new decade — to call on the best in ourselves and make personal resolutions to be kinder, more generous and more aware of our health. As a people, we also call on ourselves to seek renewal through change for the better.

All of these impulses are really more of a dedication to stop doing things in the old way. However, I do not see that dedication in the elected officials of Hawaii as we begin 1980.

Instead, government is now locked in patterns of repetition. Honestly look at what have been described as major issues of this session, and convince me that there is something new, something which can be identified as different from the past.

Many cite the functional elements of the State Plan as a possible contribution by this session.

In 1960 the State General Plan of Hawaii was the first in the nation. This planning innovation was endorsed and applauded across the country.

This year we seem determined to recapture that feeling of accomplishment by reworking this plan. A needed revision? Yes. A major achievement?

The same can be said of needed changes in the State Collective Bargaining Laws. During the recent Public Employee strike, many suggestions were made. The Republican Caucus offered what I considered the most responsible proposals for amendment. But again, we are talking about necessary adjustments to correct abuses. And, certainly, we never endorsed repeal of the "Right to Strike" law, as irresponsibly reported yesterday in the Star Bulletin.

The public has also heard that transportation is a major concern this year. However, ladies and gentlemen, the continuing hurtful fight between the administration of the City and County of Honolulu and the State administration of this legislature must no longer be permitted to interfere with our coming to grips with our transportation problems.

Further, we should give the counties greater taxing discretion, permit the residents of the counties -- and their year-round councils -- to have the responsibility and tools to do their jobs. We should make "Home Rule" a reality, not another broken promise.

Even proposals to eliminate the 4% excise tax on food and drugs, ladies and gentlemen, is a return to the ideas of twenty years ago. As Republicans we have urged repeal year after year and I strongly endorse the efforts of Senator Cayetano to give this tax relief to the people of Hawaii.

But here again Senator Cayetano has fallen back on historical and possibly out-dated approaches to significant tax reform. His proposal for a non-taxation of the first \$6,000 of income is subject to the inflationary erosion.

Why can't we accept the "indexing" of income tax brackets as a better and more lasting approach to the unauthorized tax increases created by inflation? Why not? I'll tell you why not. It is because we persist in approaching taxation as we always have -- by playing the political fallacy that repeating the past is the same as solving the problem.

The people of Hawaii are troubled. The issues I have mentioned are largely mechanical - problems which we can all agree are capable of solution. There are, however, other larger concerns which must be addressed -- questions of justice

and compassion through law. Questions whose answers define our humanity and the character of our community.

Are we becoming a racist society? And if so, what can we do?

Do our educational institutions fulfill their responsibilities?

Is our Justice System failing to protect our community?

Has the Office of Hawaiian Affairs been properly implemented?

Do women truly enjoy equality in this society?

When these questions are ignored, then we risk more than just a barrenness of ideas -- we begin to sense a spiritual exhaustion as well. We must show a willingness to experiment, a willingness to be wrong, then to admit our error and try again.

It is only when we fall into a trap of sentimental apathy — the unwillingness to leave the false security of the past — that we truly fail the people of Hawaii.

Mahalo and God bless you all."

Representative Peters, on behalf of the Majority, rose and stated:

"Governor Ariyoshi, Mrs, Ariyoshi, Lieutenant Governor King, Chief Justice Richardson, Congressman Akaka, my fellow members of the House, honored guests and friends:

It is my honor to once again bid you welcome on behalf of our 42 member Democratic Caucus -- komo mai -- our House is yours.

We in the Majority know that we carry the responsibility for most, if not all, of what happens here in this House. We know that the public holds us accountable for the bills that get enacted by this legislature, and those that don't, through our committee chairmen, committee members and Majority leadership of this legislature.

This, as you know Mr. Speaker, is not an easy task. It is always easy, very easy, to criticize and find fault than feel the obligation of finding workable, satisfactory solutions. It's nice to have the freedom to pick and choose, rather than be bound by the responsibility of trying to put ideas together carefully and meaningfully. However, we

all know to accomplish our programs will require a commitment to interests larger than our own. Much of what we do, we must do together.

We have a number of complex constitutional amendments to deal with. We must review the several functional plans as the Minority Leader has enumerated. And why? Very simple. We do prefer a preferred future for our children and our children's children, for this generation and generations to come.

We will face funding of several collective bargaining contracts for our government employees, not to mention new questions regarding our State Collective Bargaining Law. We need to examine the State's efforts to reduce our dependence on expensive, imported oil, and we must consider the question of a tax rebate.

The Minority Leader talked about a tax reform. As enumerated by the Ways and Means Chairman across the way, this is not new. You have never heard the House take a position on that matter, Mr. Speaker, because I feel it's a responsible way to look at a situation that is rather adverse today. If you check the tourist industry today, you'd find that they're hurting. It's our major economic activity in this State and it's going to have an adverse impact on our tax revenues and to say that we will give a tax rebate and to say that we will come up with a tax reform that will in fact give back revenues to the people may be a mistake. We must approach this issue with a lot of caution because it is, in fact, a responsible way you wish to look at this issue.

Some all too familiar issues still await us, such as a reliever general aviation airport for Oahu; the cost and necessity, and I emphasize necessity, of a fixed guideway in Honolulu; and I don't agree, we don't agree, in giving the counties extra taxing powers. As I review and compare the counties in this State with any other state in the Union you would find that they fall short of the kind of responsibilities and functions that other counties in this country now have and they do it all with the similar taxing power that the counties here in this State presently enjoy -- your property taxes. And to give them more than that is totally irresponsible. Regulation of Hawaii's water resources; hospital and health care costs; the teaching

of basic skills in education and I must admit, Mr. Speaker, the list goes on and on.

Therefore, Mr. Speaker, if I may paraphrase your message, we should set out to work together toward a larger loyalty, one that embraces the interests of all of Hawaii. Let us work toward more than the satisfaction of our own individual interests. Let us not be so fearful of the uncertainties of the future. Let us instead be prepared for those challenges with a united effort.

I believe that we can work together in facing public pressure with calmness and deliberation, rather than add our own voices to it or seek quick and hasty solutions. I believe that we can exercise patience and understanding with each other, rather than be preoccupied with fault finding and blame. I believe that together we can deal with the many competing, individual demands we will face in the weeks ahead by keeping our limited resources in mind, and our sights on the larger statewide interests.

Therefore, Mr. Speaker, we of the House Majority open, and I mean really open, our arms to our colleagues across the aisle and invite all who participate in this process to join with us in strengthening this institution we call the Legislature, for in doing so, we strengthen not only ourselves but we strengthen the Hawaii, the beautiful Hawaii that we all love.

Aloha."

The Chair then appointed Representatives Holt, Segawa, Shito, Silva, Uwaine and Medeiros as a Committee to inform the Governor that the House was duly organized and ready to transact business.

At 11: 34 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair, during which time the members of the House and their guests were entertained with a cultural presentation by the East-West Center.

Upon reconvening at 11:56 o'clock a.m., the Committees reported that the Senate and the Governor had been duly informed that the House is organized and ready to transact business.

A concurrent resolution (H.C.R. No. 1) requesting the Governor to address the Legislature assembled in joint session was jointly offered by Representatives Peters and Kamalii.

On motion by Representative Peters, seconded by Representative Kamalii and carried, H.C.R. No. 1 was adopted.

The Chair, at this time, appointed Representatives Garcia, Masutani, Nakamura and Narvaes to escort Rev. Jerry H. Terui to the rostrum.

Rev. Jerry H. Terui thereupon

offered the benediction.

#### SECOND DAY

Thursday, January 17, 1980

The House of Representatives of the Tenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1980, convened at 11:30 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

## SENATE COMMUNICATION

A communication from the Senate (Sen. Com. No. 1) returning House Concurrent Resolution No. 1 calling for a joint session with the Senate on Monday, January 21, 1980, to hear the Governor's address, which was adopted by the Senate on January 17, 1980, was read by the Clerk and was placed on file.

At this time, the following introductions were made to the members of the House:

Representative Sutton introduced Representative Dick Castovitch, a member of the Minnesota State Legislature, and his wife, Rosemarie.

At 11:37 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair, "to extend our personal welcome and aloha to our guests."

Upon reconvening at 11:43 o'clock a.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representative Nakamura.

Representative K. Yamada then introduced two individuals from the Hilo Interim Home, a non-profit organization working with disadvantaged youths, Pauline Shinno and Gilbert Mills.

Representative Takitani introduced James Sone, a classmate of his from Maui and presently an engineer with the Hawaiian Telephone Company.

At this time, Representative Peters, on behalf of the members of the House, extended belated birthday greetings to Representative Takitani.

"The Chair would like to add that he is now a shackled individual of this body like the rest of us."

Representative Takitani responded:

"Thank you very much. Being 25 and being married is pretty good. I enjoy it. I would just like to serve notice to Representative Inaba that I am catching up with him. I am only 50 years behind now, so watch out."

## Friday, January 18, 1980

The House of Representatives of the Tenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1980, convened at 11:30 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Guillermo Gorospe of St. Philomena Church, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Ikeda and Kawakami, who were excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journals of the House of Representatives of the First and Second Days.

On motion by Representative K. Yamada, seconded by Representative Evans and carried, reading of the Journals was dispensed with and the Journals of the First and Second Days were approved.

At this time, the following introductions were made to the members of the House:

Representative de Heer introduced one of his constituents, Mr. Sandy Rosenthal and his guide dog, Bud.

Representative Lunasco introduced the following members of the HSTA Political Action Committee: Sheila Ellis from Pearl City, Helen Gokan from Kaneohe, Donald Matsui from Lanai, Lillian Miyaki from Molokai, Ruth Watanabe from Honolulu and Virginia Payton from Kona. Accompanying the group is their president, Marvin Nogoy.

Representative Kihano then introduced a boyhood friend who is now a plastic surgeon from San Francisco, Dr. Edward Falces.

Representative K. Yamada introduced another constituent who is also a reporter for the Hilo Tribune Harold, Marsha Reynolds.

Representative Ige then introduced a person who has been very active in the Windward district, Mr. Choki Kanetake.

Representative Holt introduced the father of one of our representatives, Mr. Ige.

#### ORDER OF THE DAY

#### INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 4, 5, 6 and 7) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

A resolution (H.R. No. 4) extending aloha to Governor Junji Nishime of Okinawa was jointly offered by Representatives Takamine, Kiyabu, Uechi, Toguchi, Ige, Anderson, Andrews, Blair, Crozier, de Heer, Dods, Evans, Fukunaga, Garcia, Hagino, Hashimoto, Holt, Honda, Ikeda, Inaba, Kihano, Kobayashi, Kunimura, Lacy, Larsen, Lee, Marumoto, Masutani, Morioka, Nakamura, Peters, Sakamoto, Say, Segawa, Shito, Silva, Stanley, Takitani, Ushijima, Uwaine, D. Yamada, K. Yamada and Wakatsuki.

On motion ee on Transportation, then to Committee on Finance

On motion by Representative Takamine, seconded by Representative Kiyabu and carried, H.R. No. 4 was adopted.

At this time, Representative Kiyabu rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker and members of this honorable body, this morning we are indeed honored to have such an important person from Okinawa to come and help celebrate our 80th celebration, and, as you know, the celebration will be kicked off on Sunday, the 20th, at 9:30 on the Iolani Palace grounds. This comes through because of the generous appropriation that the Tenth Legislature made in the last session and the governor has appointed the commission of 25 members. This morning I would like to introduce the members of the governor's delegation and also, some of the commission members. At this time I would like to introduce Governor Junji Nishime and his wife Setsuko Nishime."

Representative Kiyabu also introduced the other members of the delegation: Mr. Ryosho Taira, Mayor of Naha; Mr. Masaharu Minei, Director of the General Affairs Department and his wife, Chizuko Minei; Mr. Junshiro Nishime, Secretary to the Governor; Mr. Ken Shinsato,

the Governor's Aide; Mr. Jussei Kenjo, Chairman of the City Council; Mr. Yoshio Kenjo, Secretary to the Mayor; Mr. Albert Teruya, President of the Okinawan 80th Celebration Commission; Mr. Stanley Takamine, President of the United Okinawan Association; and Mr. Peter Iha, General Chairman of the Celebration; and a Commission member from the Kohala District, Mrs. Jean Matsuda; and another Commission member from Oahu, Mr. Steven Nagamine; and Ms. Yasuko Kawakami, the interpreter.

At this time leis and copies of the resolution were presented to Governor and Mrs. Nishime and members of their delegation.

The Speaker then appointed Representatives Kihano, Peters, Kamalii, Kiyabu, Takamine, Ige, Uechi and Toguchi to escort the Honorable Governor Junji Nishime to the rostrum.

Governor Nishime addressed the members of the House of Representatives in his native tongue which was translated as follows:

"I am heartily grateful for having such a wonderful opportunity of meeting you today. I also thank you very much for taking precious time off your busy work. I am Junji Nishime, Governor of Okinawa Prefecture.

I have come to this island at the invitation of Mr. Peter Iha, Chairman of the United Okinawan Association of Hawaii's 80th Anniversary Celebration Steering Committee to attend the memorial services for the pioneer emigrants, to appreciate their labor and their children's services, and also to express my heartfelt gratitude in person to the Governor of the State and to the members of the State Legislature for their many years' kind assistance and cooperation on behalf of the Okinawa prefectural people.

As you are aware, Hawaii and Okinawa are alike in not a few points such as the natural conditions and industrial structure, and a great number of prefectural people did emigrate to Hawaii. Thus, our Okinawan people feel strong affinities with the State of Hawaii.

This year is marked by the 80th anniversary of Okinawan emigration to Hawaii, and I understand that

the United Okinawan Association has been able to make plans for various events and activities, really thanks to the full cooperation extended by the State Governor, the legislative members and the Hawaiian people at large.

It is strongly hoped that a better understanding and combined efforts will further promote the friendly relations between the State of Hawaii and Okinawa Prefecture. I would like to thank you especially for the resolution just given.

Lastly, I wish you continued health and prosperity. Thank you."

The Speaker then responded:

"Governor Nishime, Mrs. Nishime, other distinguished guests sitting on the floor this morning, I would like to extend to all of you on behalf of the members of this body a warm welcome to Hawaii. We hope that your stay will be long enough for you to visit other parts of our State and our people.

We in Hawaii are very proud of the people who came from Okinawa. They have contributed much to the greatness of our State. We wish you well in your future endeavors.

Thank you very much."

The Speaker's remarks were then translated by Governor's Nishime's interpreter into his native language.

At 12:00 o'clock noon, the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:25 o'clock p.m., at which time Representative Takamine requested that an article from the Sunday Star Bulletin dated January 13, 1980, be inserted into the journal as part of the extension of the remarks made by Representative Kiyabu. There being no objections, the article by Dr. Mitsugu Sakihara, Associate Professor of History, University of Hawaii is inserted in its entirety:

"Of the original 30 Okinawans who left Naha for Hawaii, only 26 finally made it. Three failed to pass a physical exam in Yokohama, and a fourth failed yet another exam in Honolulu after they arrived on January 8, 1900. The 26 workers

were assigned to the Ewa Plantation.

Work in the cane fields of Ewa was much harder than anything they had expected -- cutting cane and loading it on a train all day from early morning, always under the constant eyes and whips of the lunas.

Living conditions were no better. But what was more intolerable was the prejudice and discrimination from other Japanese they thought were their own countrymen. Fighting was often the only way to assert themselves.

They were on the verge of sending a petition to Okinawa prefecture to have their three-year contracts cancelled and let them return home, when news arrived that as of April, 1900, they were free to go where they pleased. Contract labor became illegal following the annexation of Hawaii by the United States.

Two of the original group went to the mainland in 1901. The majority, though, saved some money and returned to Okinawa in a few years. By 1935, only Nakama Tohachi and Kinjo Chinzen were left in Hawaii.

In Okinawa following the departure of the first group, Toyama Kyuzo (who was instrumental in sending Okinawans to Hawaii) was having difficulty recruiting more immigrants. No one in the first group had written, and people (including Toyama) were unsure what conditions were like.

Then suddenly, six of the men returned and while they complained about the harsh working conditions, they began buying large tracts of good rice paddies and built new tiled roof homes -- an extravagance for peasants.

When others saw this the immigration fever was on. In 1903, 40 Okinawans arrived in Hawaii. The number jumped to 262 in 1904, and went up to 1,233 in 1905. It again jumped to 4,467 in 1906, the largest number for any year.

Following the 1907 anti-Japanese immigration act, immigration declined. But even then, spouses (many picture brides) and immediate family members continued to come to Hawaii.

In 1925, there were about 4,000 Okinawan households with a population of 18,000 to 20,000. Today, it is estimated there are about 40,000 Okinawans in Hawaii, including niseis, sanseis and newcomers after the war.

Since Okinawans were relative late comers they had to start at the bottom rung of the social ladder. Many were still on plantations during the 1920's. But because almost no time was wasted being bound to plantations, they went on to other occupations in a relatively short time after arriving.

By the mid-20's, there were Okinawan doctors, dentists, missionaries, bank employees, store keepers, reporters, publishers, restaurant owners, pig farmers, and more. By this time, too, most had decided to remain in Hawaii rather than return home.

This changed attitude was also reflected in the attention they paid to their children's education. By about 1930, the first Okinawan students were beginning to graduate from the University of Hawaii and Mainland colleges to pursue careers in the English-speaking community.

However, it was World War II which brought the biggest changes in the lifestyle of Hawaii's Okinawans. Some of these changes were not desirable, such as forced separation and even the death of loved ones.

But there were many positive effects. An acute manpower shortage opened up many new opportunities. Producers of almost everything could not produce fast enough to meet demands. But above all, the wartime emergency situation worked to destroy many of the old social barriers and discrimination. In a sense, it brought Okinawan and Japanese communities closer together.

There were also experiences unique to the Okinawan community which helped unite it. When the news of the devastation caused during the battle for Okinawa in 1945 reached Hawaii, Okinawan clubs and organizations began sending relief goods and money.

But the magnitude of the undertaking forced the different groups to coordinate their efforts. The result was the birth of several large organizations, such as the Okinawa Fukko Kyusai Domei (League for the Relief and Reconstruction of Okinawa). Though there is no accurate accounting, altogether they sent many tons of relief goods worth hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Working together demonstrated

the need and practicality of a united body to represent Okinawan interests in Hawaii. It culminated in the formation of the United Okinawan Association of Hawaii in September, 1951.

Because the U.S. administered Okinawa after the war, many Okinawans came to Hawaii and the Mainland for education and training and on goodwill missions. At one time there were more than 100 Okinawan students at the University of Hawaii.

Post-war changes in the Okinawan community, in addition to the organization of the United Okinawan Association, also took place as isseis gave up leadership roles to niseis. But because of close ties with Okinawa after the war, isseis felt needed and useful as they were the ones who had maintained close ties with the old country.

Also, a constant stream of visitors from Okinawa -- largely intellectuals and the elite who were in the news -- gave the Okinawan community here a sense of satisfaction of having finally received due recognition.

The end result of this massive contact was a revival of interest in Okinawan culture and heritage. Even after Okinawa's reversion to Japan in 1972, the momentum built during the past decades still seems strong.

For instance, the Okinawan Cultural Jubilees, sponsored by Hui O Lau Lima and the United Okinawan Association, continue to enjoy wide community support. And there is much interest in the activities of the 80th anniversary of Okinawan immigration to Hawaii, including the compilation of the history of Okinawans in Hawaii."

# SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative K. Yamada, seconded by Representative Evans and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering House Resolution No. 5.

A resolution (H.R. No. 5) relating to designating the membership of Representatives Andrews and Silva to various House Standing Committees was jointly offered by Representatives Peters, Kihano and K. Yamada.

Representative Peters moved for the adoption of H.R. No. 5, seconded by Representative K. Yamada. Representative Sutton then rose to speak on H.R. No. 5:

"Mr. Speaker, I am somewhat bothered by House Resolution No. 5 because, if you'll excuse me, as you know, sometimes we attorneys are educated a little beyond our own intelligence and I am bothered by the fact that we are amending H.R. No. 4 without making provisions for two Vice Chairmen to be appointed.

Mr. Speaker, I have before me House Rules 11.2 Standing Committee, 'the membership of each standing committee including the designation of the chairman and vice chairman shall be provided for by resolution'. Mr. Speaker, I also have before me the duties defined for chairmen and vice chairmen of standing committees. 11.3 defines the duties of the chairman. They are very inclusive and then, Mr. Speaker, the duties of the vice chairman are stated as follows: 'the vice chairman shall perform the duties of the chairman in his absence!. Now, by not providing for vice chairmen in this resolution, we have had an automatic elevation of the vice chairman to chairman. That is perfectly in accordance with our rules and House Resolution No. 4, but we leave a void which, according to Cushing, should be

A Vice Chairman of Finance and Tourism must be appointed. We are leaving a void, Mr. Speaker, by not appointing a vice chairman to these committees and are violating the rules of the House.

That violation can become very serious. I would refer, and not to be demeaning in your presence, sir, and very humbly, in the case of Sutton vs. Ariyoshi and Wakatsuki. In that case, the court considered any violation of the House rules as very serious.

What if the chairman were absent? Who would legally preside? What if the chairman was on another island and couldn't get back? Who would your vice chairman be? And who would be the vice chairman with authority to sign the committee report as it came out onto this floor? That was exactly what happened in the middle of the night in the case that I brought and the courts look with great scrutiny on how anything, particularly a budget, comes out, and we have no vice chairman of Finance.

And a budget is so terribly important in this State because the power and the power of the purse strings all lie with us, Mr. Speaker. And, therefore, I shall vote against this resolution because it fails to have a vice chairman appointed at the same time and no provision is made for the ascendency of that particular individual in the absence of the chairman who now exists who will go up to chairman who could be absent. So, with all respect and probably being a very distinct minority, I thank you for your tolerance, Mr. Speaker."

The motion to adopt H.R. No. 5 was put by the Chair and carried.

A resolution (H.R. No. 6) recognizing George Palakiko William Hookano for his outstanding contribution to Hawaiian music was jointly offered by Representatives Holt, Anderson, de Heer, Evans, Hashimoto, Inaba, Kiyabu, Kunimura, Lacy, Lunasco, Morioka, Nakamura, Narvaes, Peters, Sakamoto, Say, Shito, Silva, Stanley, Sutton, Takitani, Toguchi, Uechi and Wakatsuki.

On motion by Representative Holt, seconded by Representative Takitani and carried, H.R. No. 6 was adopted.

A resolution (H.R. No. 7) congratulating the University of Hawaii at Hilo women's volleyball team was jointly offered by Representatives Inaba, Segawa, Silva, Takamine, K. Yamada, Aki, Andrews, Blair,

Crozier, de Heer, Dods, Fukunaga, Hashimoto, Holt, Kamalii, Kobayashi, Kunimura, Lee, Marumoto, Masutani, Morioka, Nakamura, Narvaes, Sakamoto, Shito, Stanley, Takitani, Toguchi and Ushijima.

On motion by Representative Silva, seconded by Representative Takamine and carried, H.R. No. 7 was adopted.

At this time Representative Evans, on behalf of the Minority, rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, on behalf of the Republican Caucus we would like to welcome Representative Silva and Representative Andrews. It's a pleasure to have them on board and, on a personal note, I'm sure glad they're increasing the height on this floor. Thank you."

At 12:35 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:37 o'clock p.m.

#### ADJOURNMENT

At 12:38 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative K. Yamada, seconded by Representative Evans and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned until Monday, January 21, 1980, immediately following the 10:00 o'clock a.m. joint session scheduled with the Senate.

#### FOURTH DAY

Monday, January 21, 1980

Pursuant to House Concurrent Resolution No. 1, the House of Representatives met in joint session with the Senate, to receive the Governor's message.

The Speaker of the House called the joint session to order at 10:00 o'clock a.m.

The Chair then introduced the honored guests, stating:

"This morning, we are assembled here to receive Governor Ariyoshi's State-of-the-State message.

The Chair, at this time, would like to recognize a few individuals seated on the chamber floor. We have with us the First Lady of our State, the gracious Mrs. Jean Ariyoshi. With her also the son of Governor and Mrs. Ariyoshi, Donn Ariyoshi. Seated next to him is our Lieutenant Governor, Lieutenant Governor Jean King. Seated on her left is our Chief Justice, Chief Justice William Richardson."

The Chair then appointed Senators Kawasaki, Kuroda and Yee and Representatives Fukunaga, Kihano, Peters and Kamalii to escort the Honorable George R. Ariyoshi, Governor of the State of Hawaii, to the rostrum.

Representative Fukunaga presented the Governor with a red carnation lei.

The Chair presented to the members of the Tenth Legislature, Regular Session of 1980, the Honorable George R. Ariyoshi, stating:

"Members of the Tenth Legislature, distinguished guests, visitors, ladies and gentlemen, it is my high privilege and honor to present to you our Governor, Governor George R. Ariyoshi."

The following is the address of Governor George R. Ariyoshi (Gov. Msg. No. 3):

"Mr. Speaker, Mr. President, members of the Tenth Legislature, Lieutenant Governor Jean King, Chief Justice Richardson, members of the consular corps, my fellow Hawaiians:

It is my pleasure to appear before this distinguished gathering, and

the people of Hawaii, to share some of my thoughts and observations, and to report on our stewardship of the past, and some of our plans for the future as we face the new year and a new decade.

I look forward to this 'coming together' each year. It is in this way that we contribute to a better understanding of the goals that we seek and lay the groundwork for the role which government will play in achieving them.

The era of the 1970's ended less than a month ago, and this month heralds the beginning of a new decade -- the 1980's. It is a point in our history which presents us with a unique opportunity with a wisdom which only an ending enjoys, and the hope which only a beginning offers.

As citizens of the United States, it would be unrealistic if we entered this new decade without acknowledging that our nation, and its leaders, carry heavier burdens and greater responsibilities than ever before.

There are major national and international conditions which will test the strength and moral fiber of all Americans.
We, who call this State our home, will share with our fellow citizens, the problems, the sacrifices, and the changes which are inevitable.

But I do not face the future with fear.

To be sure, there are problems which cannot and should not be dismissed. But this nation has faced many problems in the past -- the excruciating problems of war, of economic depression, and of political villainy.

The important thing is that we have survived as a nation -- one indivisible -- and actually seemed to have gained strength and purpose from our adversities.

It is our purpose here today to address ourselves to Hawaii and her people -- where we began, where we are, and what we need to do if we are to deal with the challenges of the 1980's in a way to assure each of us a life of promise and satisfaction.

Perhaps no peoples in our world have reached the level of social, economic and political sophistication as rapidly and as completely as those in Hawaii in the 25-year period preceding the 1970's.

We moved from a plantation economy dominated by a few closely interlocked companies, to an economy made up of a variety of large and independent commercial enterprises.

We transformed our public educational system from one where some graduates could not compete on an equal basis with their contemporaries to one that offers a quality educational experience. The University of Hawaii has progressed from a small land grant college offering limited options, to a university which has achieved major standing in the academic world.

Our visitor industry and our federal establishment expanded to become equals with, and then to surpass sugar and pineapple as our economic mainstays.

As the decade of the 70's proceeded, we had the opportunity to reflect upon, and to assess what we had become and what we wanted Hawaii and ourselves to become in the future.

We thought about the impact excessive growth would have on our environment and on our lifestyle.

We recognized our vulnerability to the ebbs and flows of an economy too heavily dependent upon tourism.

We acknowledged the need to continue to provide meaningful jobs for our children in sufficient quantity and of appropriate quality to allow them to remain in Hawaii.

We recognized the danger inherent in being so highly dependent on forces outside of our shores for the basic necessities of life.

We determined that we must strive for a greater measure of self-sufficiency, acknowledging at the same time that we probably could not produce everything that we need but that we should do as much as possible in that regard. In addition, we concluded that it would also be in our best interest if we produce, grow and manufacture those things which we can sell outside of our State -- and not just commodities -- but also the expertise, and the talents and the abilities of our people.

And so in response to those conclusions about ourselves and about our lifestyle, and as the 70's drew to a close, we set in motion a number of initiatives and took numerous actions which we felt were essential if we were

to retain the uniqueness that Hawaii represented not only to the world, but also to our own people. It is about that period of assessment and adjustment, those programs that we have undertaken, and about our direction for the 80's that I would now like to speak.

I believe that the most significant action we took in the decade just past was to address the problem of too rapid growth of our population and of our economy.

The result was the preparation and adoption of our Hawaii State Plan.

It is a unique document. It sets out and establishes as public policy the goals and the directions for our future. It is the product of your efforts, of this Administration, and of many thousands of concerned citizens.

But the State Plan, prepared in the later years of the 1970's, is just the beginning of a more comprehensive and long-range task, a task which we will now address in the 80's.

In this session you will have the opportunity to review the next step in this significant planning process: the functional plans. They have been prepared for the major areas of Transportation, Agriculture, Energy, Health, Housing, Education — both higher and lower — Historic Preservation, Water Resources Development, Recreation, Conservation Lands, and Tourism. And it is from these more specific guidelines that we will draw our directions for the 80's in each of the particular areas which they address.

I encourage you to study them carefully for they are at this time our recommendations to you and it is for you as legislators to adopt or modify them as you conclude to be appropriate. We are available to assist in whatever way we can.

During the 1970's we also spent considerable time discussing the foundations of our economy. There were many in our community who argued that the only viable economic future for Hawaii in the 1980's and beyond rests with an expansion of the visitor industry.

They seemed to dismiss the potential of any other economic endeavor as insignificant.

As important as tourism is -- and I will refer to it again shortly -- I simply do not agree with the premise that all else is unproductive.

I have said on many occasions,

and I repeat it here today, that Hawaii has the potential in the 1980's and beyond, to dramatically increase its self-sufficiency in agricultural products, and to increase its exports of many other products.

There is no doubt that sugar and pineapple will remain foremost in agriculture here. Our efforts to diversify agricultural production are in no way a denigration of these basic and vital industries. But our potential for diversifying our agricultural base is only just beginning.

Already, because of both public and private sector initiatives, phenomenal growth has been experienced in recent years in the economic contribution of cut flowers and foliage, nursery plants, macadamia nuts, papaya, guava, passion fruit, vegetables and melons.

And I would remind you that the development of agriculture serves two purposes: it has value in our economy in producing income to Hawaii, and it contributes the open spaces which are so vital to those of us who live here, and so important to those who visit us.

It is for these reasons that in the most recent past we have undertaken programs for setting aside lands for agricultural parks, negotiated long-term leases for farming on State lands, funded the promotion of Hawaii agricultural products both here and throughout the world, provided low-cost loans to farmers, and provided agricultural expertise to new farmers.

Our supplemental budget request contains recommendations for increased funding in many of these areas.

Our efforts to develop an aquaculture industry parallel those of diversified agriculture. Aquaculture can become a vital income-producing part of our economy. It, too, needs the kind of government support that agriculture has received. We are the only state in the nation which has developed an Aquaculture Master Plan and our efforts now need to be directed toward its implementation.

Hawaii is the only island state, and that fact affords us the opportunity to utilize the resources of the ocean which surrounds us.

We are continuing our efforts to secure for Hawaii the economic benefits which will come from the mining and the harvesting of the resources of the ocean.

We are proposing the establishment of a marine education program in our public schools.

We are also submitting to you a Hawaii Fisheries Development Plan which has my wholehearted support. It was prepared in a cooperative effort by the public and private sectors and it concludes that the potential for expanding Hawaii's role in the fisheries industry is indeed very great.

There is no more exciting potential for Hawaii to expand its economy in the 1980's, in my view, than as the hub of the interchange between the United States and countries in the Pacific-Asian Basin. In matters of trade, finance, insurance, cultural and recreational relationships, and scientific and technological exchange, our long-perceived role as the broker between East and West finally is being realized.

Multi-national companies are looking increasingly to Hawaii to establish headquarters. In the past year, eight major American corporations established regional headquarters here.

These join 23 other such corporations which have recognized the importance of this meeting ground between East and West.

We intend to intensify our efforts in the 1980's to attract new corporations to our islands, not only to provide jobs for our people, but also to firmly establish our position in the Pacific.

These activities are to complement, rather than to compete with, the existing corporations and businesses of Hawaii.

Many of the present corporate entities of Hawaii have been among the foremost builders of our modern society. They have provided the capital, and the initiative and the goodwill that has been so necessary to achieving the social miracle that has been wrought in Hawaii.

But each society must renew itself. Each society must look beyond itself and its present boundaries for new ideas, and new approaches, and new opportunities. This we are doing in our approach to making Hawaii the meeting place of the Pacific and the world, not just in a physical or economic sense, but also as a way of life, and of style, and of understanding.

Work on the Aloha Tower Complex

fits significantly into this picture of the future.

Regional cooperation is emerging as a dominant theme in our Pacific community. For example, two major conferences, drawing together many of the island countries in the Pacific to discuss mutual concerns and interests will be held in our State this year. Increasingly, we are becoming the facilitator of information and dialogue in this part of the world.

The role Hawaii increasingly can play and will play in the world was demonstrated this past year by two very different, but significant trips, I took as the Governor of Hawaii.

In the one case, as representative of the President of the United States, I participated in independence ceremonies in the new Republic of Kiribati. My presence served to emphasize Hawaii's role as the only island state of the United States and also our preeminent importance in the Pacific.

The other significant trip was as a member of a National Governors' Association tour of the People's Republic of China.

China is a vast and ancient land, the cradle of much of Asia's heritage, language, and philosophy, and just as Kiribati struggles to become a part of the modern world, and to find its place in it, so does China.

The magnitudes are different, the outcome unquestionably will be different, and the impact on the world will be vastly different, but each in its own way reflects the world's long delayed recognition of the importance of the Pacific and its rim nations in the destiny of all the peoples of this world.

I am truly convinced that the skills and the expertise of Hawaii's people will be called upon by the People's Republic of China in the years immediately ahead. We can offer them much and we can, at the same time, receive much in return.

The role Hawaii increasingly is playing on the world stage is exceedingly significant not only to those of us who live here, but also to those unknown and unseen around the world who will benefit in the years to come from the successful social and economic experiments that have taken place in these islands.

It was here, in our red soil and black volcanic rock, that a new society was born. It was here that many from other societies gathered in disparate ways to start a new life and form a new society. It was here that the sons and daughters of these early immigrants learned their lessons of tolerance and understanding and Americanism.

It was here that they learned the verity that all men truly are created equal. And it was here that they learned that no one is bound by previous status, but rather bound only by the limitations of their own creation. It was here that hard work and application were rewarded.

This is the lesson of Hawaii, and it is one that increasingly is being learned by the world.

Let me turn now to our most important economic segment — the visitor industry. The 1970's saw tremendous growth in the number of visitors who came to these Islands and in the dollars that they spent.

At no time in our history has the need for maintaining a viable visitor industry been more crucial. It is a major source of employment for our people and a major contributor of tax revenues for the operation of our State government. Our proposed Tourism Functional Plan sets the kinds of goals and directions for it which will assure its appropriate place in our future. You will have the plan before you for your consideration.

I am recommending, too, that the Legislature reconsider its action of last year which significantly reduced government funding for the Hawaii Visitors Bureau. The increasing cost of fuel and its impact on airline fares may well discourage travelers to Hawaii. Therefore I believe that it is in our own best interest to vigorously support the Hawaii Visitors Bureau at this time.

In other efforts to reinforce and to expand our economic base in the 80's, we are also asking for your favorable consideration of funds to encourage the development of an electronics industry here. It is my belief that expanding markets in the Pacific Basin area make Hawaii's location ideal for those mainland electronic companies who wish to take advantage of the potential for increased business. In this connection, I addressed leaders of the electronics industries on two separate occasions last year in the

San Francisco area. I reminded them that Hawaii imports \$43 million worth of electronic products every year, and that our strategic location in this part of the world should be recognized for the potential which it holds for those who would do business in the Pacific region.

And finally in this quest for greater self-sufficiency, we are continuing our efforts to promote locally-manufactured Hawaii products throughout the world — a 'made in Hawaii' program. These products include garments, jewelry and perfumes, processed foods such as candy, tofu, and tropical drinks, recycled aluminum and many others.

It is in all of these ways that I believe Hawaii will become master of its own economic destiny.

In the last decade, we became acutely aware that much of our most beautiful land and coastal areas were becoming inaccessible to many of our people. Private development and the burgeoning visitor industry continually were shutting off selected areas for general recreational use.

In response to this concern we have made major progress in our efforts to retain many of our most beautiful beach and mountain areas in open space. In Windward Oahu alone we have determined that the area from Waiahole to Kahuku should remain as rural and as agricultural as possible. We have purchased hundreds of acres in that region -- at Malaekahana Bay, over a thousand acres, to Sacred Falls, Heeia Kea-Matson Point, Waiahole Valley -- to assure that future generations may enjoy these lands as we have. We are also doing this in other areas of our State. To maintain these and to protect all of our conservation and recreation areas, we are recommending additional funding in our supplemental budget request. This effort will remain one of our primary concerns as we move into the 80's.

Probably no area of State government efforts attracted more attention in the latter part of the 1970's than that of energy — the attempt to find alternative sources of energy for Hawaii and in the actual use of such sources in the daily lives of our people.

Of all the 50 states, Hawaii is possibly the best endowed with the various potential alternatives to fossil fuels. We have an abundance of sun, sea and wind, and a favorable geological substructure.

In just a few short years, but with the assistance of many, we have made tremendous progress.

Where once sugarcane waste was a pollutant in our oceans, today it provides a substantial portion of the energy used on the Islands of Hawaii and Kauai.

Where once geothermal energy was only a scientific probability, early next year, we will be generating electricity from it and will seek proposals for its commercial use.

Where once, OTEC -- Ocean Thermal Energy Conversion -- was an unproven scientific concept, we here in Hawaii have seen its first actual successful test. We are now assisting in the application for a \$150 million OTEC project for Hawaii in a joint venture with several large local and mainland corporations.

Our commitment to education, for all of our people, remains constant and of the highest priority. Education is what makes achievement possible, and what also makes possible a worthwhile and rewarding life.

We have seen a revolution in education in these Islands in the recent past.

In the years to come, we are going to reap the benefits of the efforts that have been expended in education, not only in the area of competency on the part of our citizens, but also in the enjoyment of life and in their contributions to our communities.

The emphasis this Administration, and the previous Administration, have placed on education is, I am convinced, of paramount importance to this State and its people.

To be sure, we read and hear that our children, as a whole, do not measure well on national tests. Some of this, without question, is due to an imperfect knowledge of the English language. Because of that, I am proposing a \$776,000 appropriation to identify and resolve problems of immigrant children. But the heartening fact is that our children are, in significant areas, measuring better in national testing.

I am especially pleased to see the increasing involvement of parents in the educational program. An interested and enlightened parent serves as a positive reinforcement to the efforts of school teachers, principals and administrators.

At the University, too, we have made great strides in offering advanced educational opportunities to those who wish to pursue such a course.

For a number of years in the 60's and the 70's, we set a goal of offering a university experience that served all the needs of every person regardless of the cost.

We have come to realize now that with limited State resources, a more prudent course of action is to seek selective excellence.

Health and social services program expenditures as a percentage of total State spending grew faster than any others in the decade of the 70's. This is eloquent testimony to the generosity and willingness of our citizens to provide for those needing help.

At the same time, we have attempted to protect the integrity of the program by the careful screening of applicants, and by increased efforts to detect fraud and abuse. In this way we can assure the continuance of the public's support and confidence in this area.

Also, we have expanded fivefold our expenditures to provide services to the elderly, the children, the family and the afflicted so that they, too, may enjoy a meaningful life.

For the mentally ill and developmentally disabled the decade saw the successful implementation of our efforts to provide a more home-like environment for their treatment and for the living of their daily lives.

In the future we will see our programs shift further from treatment to prevention —to 'wellness' for the individual; we will explore the need for a gerontology program; we will bring our hospitals up to standard; and to reduce the pollution of our waters.

For our people of Hawaiian ancestry, the work of the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands in the 1970's has been clearly remarkable. More homes were built for Hawaiians on homestead land in the past five years than in the preceding 25 years of the program. While we will continue to maintain a viable housing program, we are now also turning our attention to providing native Hawaiians with new opportunities to become successful farmers and ranchers. Not only will we continue to make agricultural lands available but most importantly

we will provide monies and technical assistance necessary to effectively utilize those lands.

We are also focusing on programs to develop businesses and jobs such as in a recent moss rock project in Nanakuli where a new business was formed and employment created for 23 young native Hawaiians. These will be our continued directions in the 80's, offering native Hawaiians hope and optimism for control and determination of their own future.

This was the expressed hope in the creation of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs by the recent amendment to the Hawaii Constitution.

Our society was built on the foundation of Aloha which we all inherited from those who were here before us. It is incumbent upon us all that we retain the Hawaiian heritage, and the Hawaiian way. I will have a bit more to say about this later.

Our progress in modernizing major transportation facilities can be seen each day as we move about the Islands but there remains several major projects needed to complete that picture. In this regard, let me stress the importance that I place on your authorization for the Barber's Point deep draft harbor, a new inter-island terminal at Honolulu, and the completion of our highway network.

For too long now we have put off the issue of a new general aviation airport for Oahu. I cannot over-emphasize the need for action in this session.

We have carefully looked at all the reasonable alternatives and we are convinced that the Poamoho site, while not perfect, is the most feasible one.

If you do not agree with our selection of a site at Poamoho then I ask that you designate a suitable alternative.

Those are some of the areas of program emphasis which I see emerging as we begin our new decade. There are others which are not mentioned because of time constraints.

The beginning of the 1980's also provides us with the opportunity to implement the amendments to our State Constitution. These include among others, the structuring of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, funding the Hawaiian Culture and Language program for which we are requesting \$335,000, adopting standards for determining how grants of public moneys may be

provided, establishing a tax revenue estimating committee. In each of these areas, we are prepared to provide you with whatever assistance you may need.

There are a number of legislative proposals which we will be forwarding to you in the early days of this session and we ask for your favorable consideration of them. Members of my cabinet will take the leadership in discussing them with you. For now, I would like to discuss two of them: one is a proposal for a tax rebate and the other for collective bargaining cost items.

Because of the prudent manner in which we have managed the State's funds and also because of the rise in tax collections, we now have a sizeable surplus in the treasury and we expect that condition to continue. I am convinced that the accumulation of a surplus for any long period is neither necessary nor desirable, and I am further convinced that it should be returned to the taxpayers in an equitable manner.

I would remind you, too, that this is now a fundamental policy of our State, as that policy was adopted by the people when they approved the amendments to the State Constitution.

I will therefore propose to you that a sizeable portion of that surplus be refunded to each resident of Hawaii who qualifies as an exemption under our income tax law. It will be in an amount which will approximately offset the 4 percent tax on food and drugs which the average person now pays.

In addition I will propose that a substantial portion of the balance of the surplus be used for the repair and maintenance of our public facilities, especially our schools. In recent years we have made significant investments in our physical plant facilities and there is a clear need to maintain them adequately as time and wear take their toll.

Let me say this about our surplus tax dollars. If you do not agree to a rebate, let me caution you about the use of these tax dollars for programs which require continuous future expenditures. We will soon be operating under a Constitutional spending limit and to commit us at this time to future spending increases now could lead us to great fiscal problems.

With respect to the collective bargaining contracts which we recently signed with our public employees, I will send you a message in the next few days asking your expeditious passage of a bill to provide those increased benefits to our employees as quickly as possible. I believe this is only fair to them and the State has the funds available to make these payments promptly.

Finally, let me say a word to the people of Hawaii about our legislators who are assembled here today. As one who has served long in this branch of government, and who has been in public service for more than a quarter of a century, it disturbs me greatly that so many of our citizens feel a strong sense of cynicism about public officials and the legislative process.

I can say that there is a genuine desire and sincere intention in each of the legislators here to make the right decisions, and to make Hawaii a better place for all of us.

But just as with any human endeavor it is easier to agree on the general objectives than on the specific ways to achieve it.

For the legislator, the right decision is not always clear, because the issues are complex and the solutions are very difficult. I know that they frequently agonize over what the 'right decision' truly is.

This is the public officials' dilemma.

People want more and better programs, but they want to pay less taxes. People want faster services, but want our officials to follow a more time-consuming process. People want perfect solutions where there are no perfect solutions; perhaps, in some instances, no solutions at all. A given response may help some but may create other problems.

In this legislature, I see compassion, I see initiative and creativity. I see people with vision serving us. They are our neighbors — decent human beings. And they are not infallible. They make mistakes, just as we all make mistakes. But they do give us their very best efforts. I therefore ask for your understanding, patience and the prayers for our public officials.

At the beginning of each new and challenging task, involving the cooperation, the goodwill and the Aloha of many people, I am reminded of the most poignant moment -- for me -- of man's adventure in space.

It was the Apollo 8 crew, who for the first time in the history of mankind, had broken free of the gravity of earth and were soaring at the rate of thousands of miles an hour toward the moon.

As they saw their home planet, the Earth, recede and grow smaller, and as they saw its blue beauty glowing in the black and white austerity of the rest of the universe, they all wondered aloud why men on earth could not live in peace and harmony.

From their unique vantage point, they could see that those of us who inhabit this earth truly are one people, and that the differences that separate us are insignificant compared to the common feelings that bind us together.

In my 1977 State-of-the-State message, I offered a conviction which has become the theme of this Administration, and of this State. It is that we will be the masters of our destiny.

In the three years since I appeared before you then, we truly have taken giant steps toward becoming the masters of our destiny.

In closing, I want to share with you my unbounded optimism about this State and its people.

Whenever I travel, I always return to these Islands and become refreshed and restored. It is not merely because I am coming 'home,' but rather because we truly do have a unique society here, one which is responsive to our past, and also one which looks to the future and is aware of its needs.

All of us living in these Islands have a unique opportunity, and a very unique obligation, to do our best as stewards, and to keep the beacon of Hawaii ever bright throughout the world.

Never before have the people of this State been so much in control of their future, and I applaud you and all of our citizens who make this possible.

Just as we are one world, we also are one State, and one people.

We have our differences, to be sure, but we also have a commonality of purpose that makes us one in the pursuit of what is best for our beloved Hawaii. I wish all of you well for a productive and a fruitful session.

Mahalo, Aloha, and God bless you."

Senate President Wong then stated:

"Thank you for your words of concern, wisdom, in terms of State Administration's presentation toward the Legislature. I must say this, Governor, that differences are not in the subject matter, rather one of approach. I can assure you that your proposals and your suggestions will be fairly heard and considered and the legislative input will be part of the total package that in the end will result in a better Hawaii.

Thank you very much, Governor.

There being no further business, I adjourn this joint session of the Tenth State Legislature."

At 10: 45 o'clock a.m., the joint session with the Senate adjourned.

At 10:55 o'clock a.m., the House of Representatives of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1980, convened with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Reverend Gerard Bourke of The Newman Center, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives de Heer, Kawakami, Lunasco, Say, Toguchi, Uechi and D. Yamada, who were excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Third Day.

On motion by Representative K. Yamada, seconded by Representative Evans and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Third Day was approved.

## INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION

A concurrent resolution (H.C.R. No. 2) recognizing and congratulating the Pacific Fleet Submarine Memorial Association, Inc., upon its sponsorship of the restoration of the World War II Submarine USS Bowfin was jointly offered by Representatives Lacy, Aki, Anderson, Andrews, Baker, Blair, Crozier, de Heer, Dods, Evans, Fukunaga, Garcia, Hagino, Hashimoto, Holt, Honda, Ige, Ikeda, Inaba, Kamalii, Kawakami, Kiyabu, Kobayashi, Kunimura, Larsen, Lee, Lunasco, Marumoto, Masutani, Medeiros, Morioka, Nakamura, Narvaes, Peters, Sakamoto, Say, Segawa, Shito,

Silva, Stanley, Sutton, Takamine, Takitani, Toguchi, Uechi, Ushijima, Uwaine, D. Yamada, K. Yamada and Wakatsuki and was read by the Clerk.

On motion by Representative Lacy, seconded by Representative Kamalii and carried, H.C.R. No. 2 was adopted.

At this time, the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives Say and D. Yamada.

Having received permission to make a late introduction, Representative Kunimura introduced the charming wife of the Speaker, Mrs. Irene Wakatsuki, to the members of the House.

At 11:05 o'clock a.m., on motion by Representative K. Yamada, seconded by Representative Evans and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m. tomorrow, Tuesday, January 22, 1980.

#### FIFTH DAY

## Tuesday, January 22, 1980

The House of Representatives of the Tenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1980, convened at 11:30 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Ron Arnold of Kaimuki Christian Church, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Baker, Larsen and Uechi, who were excused.

The Chair at this time reminded all members that the House sessions would convene on time and that all members would be expected to be on time and present; if not, the Speaker's office should be notified as to why a member would be late or absent.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Fourth Day.

On motion by Representative K. Yamada, seconded by Representative Evans and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Fourth Day was approved.

At 11:35 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:37 o'clock a.m.

At 11:38 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:05 o'clock p.m.

At this time, Representative de Heer introduced a professor at Stanford University who is visiting Hawaii from San Francisco, Leo Van der Reis and his wife, Margaret.

Representative Kunimura then introduced Aunty Aggie and her staff mentioning that Aunty Aggie is the aunt of both the Majority and Minority Leaders of the House.

#### ORDER OF THE DAY

Representative Kamalii was recognized and remarked:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to raise a question on the privilege of the House. Mr. Speaker, we'd like a clarification on the status on the chairmanships and vice chairmanships of your standing committees.

Are those who conduct the meetings for the committees on fiscal management and tourism, are they acting chairmen, are they chairmen pro tem, are they vice chairmen acting in the absence of chairmen?"

The Speaker responded:

"The Chair's ruling is that the individuals will be acting as chairmen of the committees."

Representative Kamalii:

"They're acting chairmen of their committees?"

Mr. Speaker:

"They are not acting chairmen, they will be considered as chairmen of the committees. The situation is this: if we did have a chairman, in fact, and the chairman was absent for a period of time, a week, two weeks or so, the vice chairman would then be the acting chairman for the absent individual.

In this present situation the former chairmen are no longer with us and, therefore, the vice chairmen assumed the duties and responsibilities of that chairman and of that committee; and, therefore, he will be acting as chairman of the committee."

## Representative Kamalii:

"So, just so that we can all understand this, not only for the benefit of the members of this House, but for the citizens of this State, if I have copies of articles in the media where they are now chairmen, Chairman of the Planning Committee on television last night said he was Chairman of the Tourism Committee. So,

this confusion...are you saying that's correct?"

Mr. Speaker:

"That is correct, as I have explained."

Representative Kamalii:

"He is Chairman. Then, if he is Chairman, there must be a vice chairman."

Mr. Speaker:

"Such is not necessary."

Representative Kamalii:

"According to our rules, Mr. Speaker, it is so."

Mr. Speaker:

"I believe the rules say that the chairman and the vice chairman may be designated. They were originally designated for the term and the resolution was adopted for the term. It is my opinion and the opinion of my counsel that the vacancy of the vice chairman at this time is not necessarily filled."

Représentative Kamalii:

"That's what I'm confused about. When the Majority Leader came to our caucus to explain Resolution No. 5, he said, and I quote, 'we have no chairmanship and they will not be filled. What we have is a vice chairman pro tem acting as chairman'. Now you tell me we have a chairman. Is a chairman acting or is he pro tem? Is he chairman? Now, there is a difference."

Representative Peters then rose on a point of order:

"Yes, I did have the pleasure of explaining to the Minority Caucus exactly where we were with House Resolution No. 5 that was brought to this floor, I think it was earlier this week. In my explanation, I indicated to the members of the Minority that House Resolution No. 4, which was passed during the last session, basically outlined all the officers and chairmen, vice chairmen and members of standing committees within this House.

That resolution still stands. House Resolution No. 5, which we passed earlier this week, basically accommodates two new members in this House -- everyone knows who they are. The rules indicate very clearly to me, perhaps the Minority has some difficulty interpreting, but the rules indicate very clearly to me that in the absence of the chairman, the vice chairman automatically assumes the role and responsibilities of the chairman. And that's exactly where we are today.

So your interpretation, Mr. Speaker, hits it right on the head."

Representative Kamalii:

"Mr. Speaker, it does not hit it right on the head because if he is chairman, then you truly do have a vacancy in the vice chairman's position."

Mr. Speaker:

"The Chair has indicated that the vice chairman...when the chairmanship is vacated or in the absence of the chairmanship, that that vice chairman assumes the chairmanship role and he is, in fact, the chairman of the committee.

We are dealing in semantics and I think we all know what the intent is. The Chair has ruled."

Representative Kamalii then rose on a point of inquiry:

"In the absence of the chairman, which is really a vice chairman, if he's to leave the room, who, then, takes over his duties?"

Mr. Speaker:

"He will designate a person within his committee to chair the hearings, if necessary. Otherwise, he may also call a recess. That's within the chairman's prerogative."

Representative Kamalii:

"And that recess, then, could possibly go for months, couldn't it?"

Mr. Speaker:

"We are delving in conjectural propositions at this time."

Representative Kamalii:

"Then, Mr. Speaker, am I to assume then that we have a representative in this body holding two chairmanships?" Mr. Speaker:

"In essence, that is correct because he assumes that responsibility and he is to be called chairman of that committee."

Representative Kamalii:

"Mr. Speaker, there is no absence if there is a resignation. When someone resigns from this body there is a vacancy and there is a difference between vacancy and absence. We have had two resignations in this House, so there is a vacancy."

Representative Kunimura then rose on a point of order:

"Mr. Speaker:

I can, you know, understand queries of the Speaker and explanations, but any matter to be argued before this floor, there must be a subject matter and at this time there is nothing before this House. So, I would rather ask the Speaker to request the honorable Minority Leader to stand on questions."

The Chair then requested Representative Kamalii to proceed with her questions.

Representative Kamalii:

"My next question, Mr. Speaker, is am I to assume, then, that the staffing for the Committee on Tourism is now part of the Committee on the State General Plan?"

Mr. Speaker:

"The Chair has not given Representative Kiyabu additional staff."

Representative Kamalii:

"But he's assuming he gets it by being chairman. If he's chairman of two committees..."

Mr. Speaker:

"There's no assumptions here.
I'm stating what is the present status."

At 12:15 o'clock p.m., at the request of Representative Anderson and with the consent of Representative Kamalii, the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:25 o'clock p.m.

The Speaker then recognized Representative Kamalii:

"Mr. Speaker, I again rise on a privilege of the House. My questions to the speaker are regarding fiscal management and tourism. I would now like to focus the Speaker's attention to another committee which is Legislative Management. Jack Suwa, who resigned, was vice chairman of that committee and I wonder if the Speaker has made an appointment to fill that vacancy."

Mr. Speaker:

"Not at this moment,"

Representative Kamalii:

"May I ask when that might be."

Mr. Speaker:

"It may or may not happen."

Representative Kamalii:

"Then, Mr. Speaker, may I suggest that you are in direct violation of our House Rules if you don't fill that vacancy."

Mr. Speaker:

"The Chair will take under advisement your remarks."

Representative Kamalii:

"Mr. Speaker, then may I request that according to House Rule 54.1 that the Sergeant-at-Arms be instructed to distribute to each desk a copy of an amendment to the rule that will provide the filling of vacancies in the Chairman or vice chairmanships of your standing committees, and that you instruct the Clerk of the House to place this amendment as a special order on tomorrow's agenda for action after the expiration of the necessary 24 hours, again, in accordance with the House Rule 54.1. I have my amendment here, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kunimura then rose on a point of information:

"Was that a motion made by the Minority Leader?"

At 12:28 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair during which time copies of the amendment were distributed to each member of the House.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:32 o'clock p.m.

Representative Kamalii:

"In my request, I requested that this be placed on the agenda as a special order on tomorrow's agenda."

Mr. Speaker:

"At 12:30 o'clock p.m."

Representative Kamalii:

"Thank you very much."

Representative Uwaine then rose on a point of information questioning whether an amendment to the House Rules had to wait 24 hours before it can be acted upon.

The Speaker responded that he would accept the 24-hour request in good faith.

Representative Evans rose on a point of information questioning when the legislative timetable and introduction of bills would be forthcoming.

The Speaker responded that the legislative timetable would be out in due time, in the very near future.

Representative Evans then said she hoped this meant before the end of the session, to which the Speaker answered in the affirmative.

Representative Evans asked when exactly the bills would be decked since there was a pre-filing date this session.

The Chair responded that the legislative timetable is now being worked on and would include the date of introduction of these bills as in last year's session.

Representative Evans:

"As in last year's session?"

The Speaker said that was correct.

Representative Evans:

"And that is why I asked the question....I

thought you had your act together."

Representative Kunimura then rose on a point of information:

"Did I hear you correctly, you accept that this amendment will be taken up tomorrow?"

Mr. Speaker:

"The Chair will accept the contents of it. The Chair will speak with the Minority in reference to the resolution."

Representative Kunimura:

"Yes, because this is a floor amendment for action on the floor at this time and is subject to the House Rules."

Representative Kamalii:

"Mr. Speaker, I'm afraid that's not so."

At 12:40 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:41 o'clock p.m.

At 12:42 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:37 o'clock p.m.

Mr. Speaker:

"The Chair would like to make this ruling in reference to the proposed amendment distributed by the Minority, that the governing section is Rule 27.1 and any matter to be taken up as a special order must be by motion of the House; that rule 54.1 in reference to the House Rules, the manner in which the House Rules may be amended speaks of special order, the mode by which one wants the House to consider."

## ADJOURNMENT

At 1:40 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative Kamalii, seconded by Representative Evans and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m. tomorrow, Wednesday, January 23, 1980.

#### SIXTH DAY

Wednesday, January 23, 1980

The House of Representatives of the Tenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1980, convened at 11:30 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Bishop Hosen Fukuhara of the Higashi Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Garcia, Kobayashi, Uechi and D. Yamada, who were excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Fifth Day.

Representative K. Yamada moved that the House dispense with the reading of the Journal of the Fifth Day and approve the same as read throughout.

Representative Evans asked:

"Mr. Speaker, I have a question about the Journal. May I have a short recess?"

The Chair said:

"Will you second the motion."

Representative Evans answered:

"Not until I get the question answered regarding the Journal."

The Chair recognized Representative Peters who then seconded the motion.

At 11:37 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 11:40 o'clock a.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representative Kobayashi.

Representative K. Yamada was recognized and he stated:

"Mr. Speaker, since there seems to be some question about the recordation of the remarks made yesterday on the floor, I would, at this time, like to withdraw my motion and ask that the matter be deferred."

The Chair said:

"If there are no objections, so

ordered."

Representative Evans then noted:

"Mr. Speaker, I believe that there was a second by the Majority Leader so the second has to be withdrawn also.'

The Chair responded:

"I believe there is no necessity for that. Any messages from the Governor?"

The Clerk answered that there was

Representative Evans then rose and asked by the Chair, "For what purpose do you rise?", Representative Evans answered:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise on a point of parliamentary inquiry."

Asked by the Chair to "state your point", Representative Evans asked:

"Mr. Speaker, why is there no provision in today's agenda for special orders to occur at 12:30? May I have a ruling on that?"

The Chair replied:

"That matter should be taken up at the end of the calendar. If you want to raise that question at that time, the Chair would entertain that question."

Representative Evans continued:

"Mr. Speaker, special orders of the day is under the fourth order. After the fourth order, this is. . .

The Chair interrupted:

"We are not in the order of the day."

Representative Evans continued:

"Mr. Speaker, I am referring to 27.1 which says that, 'Special orders shall take precedence over all business after the fourth order in the order of business', and I believe we are in the order of business."

The Chair answered:

"We are not in the order of the business."

At 11:42 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 11:43 o'clock a.m., the Chair asked Representative Evans to restate her question, to which Representative Evans asked:

"Mr. Speaker, why is there no provision in today's order of business for special orders to occur at 12:30? May I have a ruling on that?"

The Chair replied:

"The Chair had ruled yesterday that the House had not acted on any matter to be put on the calendar as a special order. That is why it does not appear."

Representative Evans then appealed the decision of the Chair, seconded by Representative Ikeda.

The Chair's ruling having been appealed, the motion to sustain the Chair's ruling was put to a vote and carried by voice vote.

It was not a fault of Dr. Bitterman. she just took over. We had the legislature, in its very unwise choice, turn over the ETV system to the University and DOE for its operation. As I always said, for the last few years, if you want anything done in the most expensive manner and with the poorest quality as its product, let government do it. And, today, Mr. Speaker, the person here that we are going to honor discourages that kind of fear and especially from the fair sex. A few of us here are still, to a certain degree, maybe, male chauvinist pigs. But it takes Dr. Bitterman and her kind that can turn us into clearer thinking, more productive members of this legislature. Mr. Speaker, I wish and I pray that God would send to us and to the United States more people like Dr. Bitterman because then I'm pretty sure the taxpayers would have more respect and more aloha for government.

And I would like to thank Dr. Bitterman

for her choice. We're going to miss you, but I think we've just begun to hear about you because you're going to go places way beyond the Voice of America. I wish you bon voyage, but please remember Hawaii as your home forever. Thank you."

Representative Larsen also rose to speak in favor of this resolution:

"It is my pleasure, also, to congratulate Mary and to offer sympathy that you're leaving my district and that nice little quiet Kaalawai Place. ### EIGHTH DAY

Friday, January 25, 1980

The House of Representatives of the Tenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1980, convened at 11:00 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Reverend Mr. Paul Evers of Saint Anthony Church, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Baker, Garcia, Holt, Ikeda, Kobayashi, Takamine, Uechi, Ushijima and D. Yamada, who were excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Sixth Day.

On motion by Representative D. Yamada, seconded by Representative Evans and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Sixth Day was approved.

Upon reconvening at 11:09 o'clock a.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives Ikeda and Ushijima.

A communication from the Senate (Sen. Com. No. 6) returning House Concurrent Resolution No. 3, which was adopted by the Senate on January 24, 1980, was placed on file.

A communication from the Senate (Sen. Com. No. 7) returning House Concurrent Resolution No. 4, which was adopted by the Senate on January 24, 1980, was placed on file.

At this time, the following introductions were made to the members of the House:

Representative Sutton introduced Congressman Henry Hyde of Illinois and Mrs. Hyde. A red carnation lei was presented to Congressman Hyde by Mrs. Sutton in the gallery.

After Representative Sutton introduced Congressman Hyde as a ranking member of the House Judiciary Committee, he remarked:

"Mr. Speaker, now that my wife has given him a beautiful carnation lei, don't you think my chances of getting a federal judgeship are better than yours?"

The Speaker grinned and responded:

"Yes, I do concede that point."

Representative Kihano introduced a very good friend, Mr. Ben Takayesu, "a true son of Waipahu, a former deputy Attorney General and judge."

Representative Segawa introduced Miss Marsha Oato, "a very beautiful girl from the plantation town of Waialua who is director of our Project Holomua on the Big Island, who has decided to move to Hilo to seek greener fields."

Representative K. Yamada introduced Miss Bernice Kadota, "a very close friend of mine, a classmate of mine from Hilo, and also a constituent."

Representative Lee introduced the following honored guests: Ambassador of the Commonwealth of Canada to the United States, the Honorable Peter M. Towe, and his lovely wife, Mrs. Carol Towe; the Honorable William Clarke, Consul General of Canada; the Honorable Abe Kovnats, Deputy Speaker of the Manitoba Assembly in Canada and his

lovely wife, Donna; and Mr. Tom Sakata of the Hawaii International Services Agency who accompanied them.

A red carnation lei was presented to Ambassador Towe by Representative Lee and a white carnation lei was given to Mrs. Towe by Representative Hashimoto.

The Chair then appointed Representatives Peters, Kihano, K. Yamada, Lee, Kamalii and Evans to escort the Honorable Peter M. Towe to the rostrum.

The Chair presented Ambassador Towe, stating:

"Members, distinguished visitors, friends, ladies and gentlemen, it is indeed my high honor to present to you the Honorable Peter M. Towe who is the Ambassador to the United States from the Commonwealth of Canada."

The Honorable Peter M. Towe addressed the members of the House and audience, stating:

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker, and members of the House. I confess that it is not without some considerable trepidation that I take this opportunity to come before you today with a message from Canada, your neighbor to the East. I am very much aware of the privilege of addressing this august body, deep in the traditions of Hawaiian history and in the democratic ideals of your great nation. I am reminded, in speaking through you to the people of this State, that both our countries are Pacific nations in every sense of the word. Beyond the calm strength of the ocean waters that were so baptized, in this troubled world that we share, peace is increasingly becoming a rare and fragile commodity. I would have preferred to limit myself to a simple and heartfelt message of warmth, harmony and goodwill -- qualities which are, of course, the natural resources of Hawaii and which are actively sought after and brought back to their homeland by some loving Canadians who visit your hospitable and beautiful State. But in these trying times of crises, in these trying times of conflict, I believe a further and more essential message Canadians would want me to convey is one of solidarity facing the crises in Iran and Afghanistan.

What is at issue in Iran goes to the very heart of the international system. The obligation to respect and protect embassies and their personnel has been recognized in every culture throughout the centuries. It is in reality a basic prerequisite for discourse between nations; all the more so when they are engaged in dispute. Even in times of war, this obligation has been honored, and as the Canadian representative said before the United Nations Security Council, 'We cannot condone in a conduct of a nation what is considered a crime according to the laws of our country.' The patience, the resolve, the determination demonstrated by your President and by the American people in confronting these challenges -these challenges to the very foundation of international law and civilized diplomacy -have engendered in Canadian hearts and minds a profound sense of understanding, of respect, and of sympathy.

The tragic events in Afghanistan have further aggravated an already difficult situation in the Middle East. Soviet aggression against the territorial integrity and political independence of a sovereign nation cannot and must not be ignored. There can be no justification for such a blatant takeover. Beyond whatever consequences this aggression may have for the people of Afghanistan, occupied by a foreign power for the first time in their fierce independence, we must all be concerned with the threat that this action poses to international peace and stability. In the region of the world which has been afflicted by unrest and conflict, the Soviet action adds a particularly dangerous dimension to an already extremely serious situation. And it is for this reason that countries such as Canada and the United States must continue to stand side by side and give our united support to all efforts to bolster international stability and territorial integrity in the world.

I have no doubt whatsoever that our two countries can face these conflicts together, united as we are by common border and a similar heritage, as well as sharing common democratic ideals, common social values and common aspirations. We have also the advantage of a long-standing relationship built on mutual trust, built on self respect. We are, of course, each others largest trading partners, having exchanged more than \$70 billion in merchandise in 1979. We are at home in each others countries, having over 73 million border crossings last year. Together, Canada and the United States are partners in NATO, the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. Through NORAD, we share a responsibility for the air defense of the continent we occupy. In March,

Canadian ships will be here to join exercises with the United States and other allies underlying our commitment to a peaceful Pacific, Along with you, we want to keep it that way.

In the spirit of traditional Canadian-U.S. goodwill, in the name of Canada, and for the people of Canada, I thank you again for this privilege of speaking to this session of the Hawaii Legislature. We wish you well in your important endeavors.

As for my wife and I, we are off for Maui. I understand we will not be the only Canadians to visit that island of beauty.

Mahalo. . .thank you."

The Chair responded:

"Mr. Ambassador, we certainly appreciate your words of solidity and unity. It is indeed confident to all of us to hear from you support that both our government and your government work together and neet the challenges in the trying days ahead.

We appreciate your visit here and know that you are on a very tight and busy schedule. We hope that you will see not only the island of Maui, but also the islands of Kauai, Hawaii, Lanai and Molokai, if time permits. If not, we hope that you will find the time to visit our State in the very near future. We wish both you and Mrs. Towe

At 11:25 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair, "for the purpose of extending our personal welcome and appreciation to our distinguished visitors."

Upon reconvening at 11:36 o'clock a.m., the Vice Speaker assumed the rostrum.

### INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

A concurrent resolution (H.C.R. No. 26) commending the University of Hawaii Women's Athletic Program was jointly offered by Representatives Evans, Aki, Anderson, Andrews, Blair, de Heer, Dods, Fukunaga, Hashimoto, Holt, Honda, Ige, Ikeda, Inaba, Kamalii, Kawakami, Kiyabu, Kobayashi, Kunimura, Lacy, Larsen, Lee, Lunasco, Marumoto, Masutani, Medeiros, Narvaes, Sakamoto, Silva, Sutton, Takitani and K. Yamada and was read by the Clerk.

On motion by Representative Evans, seconded by Representative Kamalii and carried, H.C.R. No. 26 was adopted.

Representative Fukunaga then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, on behalf of all of the women legislators here today, the 13th district representatives, and all of the Big Island representatives, it is indeed a rare honor and privilege to introduce our two championship athletic teams. However, before presenting the honorees with their copies of the resolutions and the leis, I do have a few remarks that I would like to make from an article in the HONOLULU ADVERTISER, December 11, 1979. I believe that these excerpts reflect the pride that we all feel in the accomplishments of our Hawaii athletes.

'How sweet it is! The University of Hawaii has won its first national sports championship and the University of Hawaii at Hilo won the National College Division sports championship. Hawaii could not be prouder.

What makes these victories so sweet? Of course, there is the pleasure of winning, the joy of being first, the best and number one. But there is more. They are sweet because the sport is volleyball which depends on team spirit and cooperation above all. It is one of the most popular sports in Hawaii, played in parks by families on picnics, on public courts by neighborhood groups, and in gyms by occupational leagues, as well as in high schools and colleges.

The victories are sweet because

both teams are home grown. They do not depend mainly on imported talent. The players' names and faces tell you that, as well as what we like to think of as uniquely local styles of team togetherness and support.

Last, but certainly not least, the victories are sweet because championships went to women's teams. It is sweet because sports ought to be an equal opportunity activity that these victories by women teams are so exciting and so rewarding.

In the past, women's sports have been slighted in many quarters. So, congratulations are in order to the Rainbow Wahines and the Vulcan Wahines, as well as to their coaches, trainers and boosters. They have brought glory upon themselves and upon Hawaii. Other champions may come but nothing will ever take away the pride of being first.'

Thank you."

Representative Segawa then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, looking at the brochure passed out by the University of Hawaii-Hilo Women's Volleyball Team, I think I would like to point out a very significant fact that while Representative Fukunaga has mentioned that the ADVERTISER mentioned the hometown people, I think you will look at this roster and everyone on the Vulcan Volleyball Team is from a hometown in the State of Hawaii and graduated from a high school in the State of Hawaii. And I think this is the first time we have ever had a team competing in a major team level in sports consisting of all local people from the State of Hawaii and who accomplished such a significant title."

Representative K. Yamada then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, as I mentioned earlier, today appears to be Hilo's day. There are certain other facts which I want to point out about our Hilo Vulcan Wahines.

One of the most striking thing that one will notice when they look at the team, first of all, is that they are good-looking wahines, and the second thing which an individual will notice almost immediately is that they are relatively short and that's their theme all throughout the year. They were known as 'short and sassy.' And that, I suppose,

is because of the short skit which they put on each time they were introduced at the games. But the striking fact about our Hilo Vulcan Wahines is that they utilized one of the most commonly known theme in Hawaii throughout the entire year and that is the theme of 'ohana.' They worked closely together; they were a family, and that is why they were able to win. They were well organized; they were shorter than the other teams, but they were one family. They worked together and that is why they won.

There are lots of individuals that received awards throughout the year. I would like to point out a few of them, Mr. Speaker, with your permission.

The Vulcan Wahines, of course, won the Western Regional Tournament in Division II, and we had three individuals who were selected as all-tournament stars: Cheryl Ching, Lyndell Lindsey and Kawehi Kaaa. When it came to the national championship in Division II, there were three individuals again who were placed on the first team for the All-Americans and they were Kawehi Kaaa, Vetoann Baker and Glennie Adams.

There is one other fact which ought to be pointed out about this team. On the second team for the national championship, we had two sisters placed on it. We have had two sisters playing all along on the team and that's the Lindsey sisters -- Lyndell and Sweetie Lindsey.

There is one other thing which I ought to note for the Vulcan Wahines and all others who are going to be playing the team next year and that is, of all the members that we've got on the Vulcan Wahines team, there is only one senior. The rest are all sophomores, juniors and freshmen. Lyndell Lindsey is the only senior and we are going to miss her very much next year when she graduates.

In any case, Mr. Speaker, one last fact which I would like to point out. I believe that the Vulcan Wahines was the first to win the national championship in this State or of any teams in the State and they did it ahead of the Rainbow Wahines by about five hours. So we've got the coveted award.

As I said, Mr. Speaker, it is Hilo's day today.

One other thing, Kawehi Kaaa was also nominated for the coveted Broderick Award in Division II and the announcement of the selection of the winner in that nomination is going to be announced very shortly.

Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kamalii was recognized and she stated:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I know we all signed these resolutions and I personally would like to congratulate both teams, all of the members of this House, including our male counterparts, that without their help, none of the athletic programs at the University of Hawaii and Hilo would continue.

I also want to point out that I am very proud to congratulate and very happy to have Dave Shoji as our coach of the Rainbow Wahines. My daughter had an opportunity to play under him and she also came from a championship team. So, it takes all of us working together to bring back the championship to the State of Hawaii.

Congratulations from all of us."

Representative Evans then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, it is not only a day for the Rainbow Wahines and the Vulcan Wahines and the women in the House, but it is a day for all women in the State of Hawaii and for those women who will become athletes as they leave high school and enter college. As a believer in Title 9 and in compliance of Title 9 and in equal opportunity, I salute the women athletes of the University of Hawaii.

Thank you."

Representative Holt then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, not to take anything away from our honored guests this morning, but I have to get my comments in. I would just like to add a footnote to all of the speakers' comments by stating that we do have an individual in our midst who is a pioneer of sorts. No, not because he left the wilderness of Waianae to push through higher education at Brigham Young, but a pioneer in the sense that he paved the way for athletes to follow After graduation from BYU, he played on the volleyball team in the Pan American games. I believe that was in the early 30's, and has enjoyed a successful career in government service, presently as the Majority Leader of this House.

I would just like to conclude by introducing Representative Henry Peters to our honored guests and to say to my fellow colleagues that I personally prefer one of these volleyball players as my Majority Leader than the one we have chosen.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kunimura then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, rather than emphasize sex today, I feel. . .did I say anything wrong?

Today is not the day for wahines, but today is the day that we should examine if under the guidance of these great coaches and athletic director, that these people gathered here this morning can do so much with so little, then let this be a classical lesson for the University of Hawaii because everytime they come to the Legislature, it seems like the more money, more success. I think that's hogwash, and I am pretty sure it has some correlation but all money doesn't mean success. It takes blood, guts, and lots of sacrifice.

And to my dear friend who's been pioneering out there and trying to convince many of us chauvinist individuals as far as maleism is concerned, you've come a long way leading us and you can count on this House because this House stood historically supporting women's athletics at the University of Hawaii."

Representative de Heer then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I know that a lot has been said this morning due to our praise. I just want to mention that I attended several of the games and I just want to mention to the ladies present how much I enjoyed it. You know, before the season started, I didn't think very much of women's athletics, but I found out that they can be very exciting, dynamic and are really a plus to all of us in the State.

I just want to say congratuations for a job very well done."

Representative Sutton then rose and asked:

"Mr. Speaker, may I add to this resolution?"

Directed by the Chair to "proceed", Representative Sutton said:

"Mr. Speaker, I think I would be remiss as the past director of the Quarterback

Club were I not to say that the recognition of these wonderful women athletes is coming at a time when we should all also recognize the magnificent contribution of Donnis Thompson. She is the one who once answered me a question by saying, 'Title 9.' I thought she was referring to a land court decision — I've never heard of Title 9. But Title 9 means that we have to give equality in education, equality on the athletic field to women and they have shown that when we do that, they come through.

So I would say to you, Mr. Speaker, let this body show its magnificent appreciation of two wonderful teams, their spirit, their teamwork and their ability to go out and win.

Thank you."

#### SUSPENSION OF RULES

Representative K. Yamada moved that the rules of the House be suspended for the purpose of voting on a substantive resolution, seconded by Representative Peters.

At 12:00 o'clock noon the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:01 o'clock p.m.

Representative Kamalii then rose on a point of inquiry:

"Mr. Speaker, is this House concurrent resolution a substantive resolution?"

The Speaker responded:

"It is the Chair's opinion that it is a substantive resolution and, therefore, the motion is to suspend the rules in order to have the House act on this resolution at this time."

Representative Kamalii:

"Mr. Speaker and the members of this House, I think you are quite aware of where the Minority Caucus is coming from when we question the suspension of the House Rules."

Mr. Speaker:

"Representative Kamalii, you are now speaking in opposition of the motion?"

Representative Kamalii:

"No, I'm not, Mr. Speaker."

Mr. Speaker:

"For what purpose do you have the floor?"

Representative Kamalii:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this resolution."

Mr. Speaker:

"The question is for the suspension of the rules. We are not acting on the vote for the adoption of the resolution at this time."

Representative Kamalii:

"Mr. Speaker, it's a point of personal privilege."

Mr. Speaker:

"The point is not well taken. The Chair rules you out of order on the point of personal privilege."

Representative Kamalii:

"Mr. Speaker, then I will speak against the motion to suspend the rules. I am speaking against the motion to suspend the rules because here again I find that the leaders of this House will ask for this type of suspension of rules when they feel like it, and I grant you that you have the votes but if we're going to go by the rules of this House, then let's be fair about it.

I find this kind of action, again, arrogant, because this resolution can be sent to committee and then back to the floor of the House in a manner which is proper. But if this is the kind of action that we expect to see throughout the session, then it's a sorry day. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Peters then rose to speak in favor of the motion to suspend the rules of the House:

"As you know, Mr. Speaker, and as all of us as members of this House know, there are times when we will have to make this kind of motion. We will have to make this kind of decision and I think, if we check the House Journals, you will find that there have been many occasions where we had to deliberate over matters and measures before this House in such a fashion and it was also concurred with on the part of the Minority. We are not trying to be arrogant here, we are not trying to go beyond what the rules allow.

I bring your attention, Mr. Speaker and members of this House, to Rule

No. 55.1 which states the rules of the House may be suspended by the approval of two-thirds of the members to which the House is entitled. It is a provision here. It is definitely a rule that we can utilize under these kinds of circumstances and I ask the members of the House to support us in this effort. Thank you very much."

Representative Evans:

"Mr. Speaker, I ask for a Roll Call vote on suspension of the rules."

Representative Ikeda:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against the motion to suspend the rules. It seems to me, Mr. Speaker, that just a few short days ago the Minority also made a motion to suspend the rules of the House for the purpose of taking up amendments to the House Rules. At that point in time, Mr. Speaker, our motion was ruled out of order. I don't feel there is very much difference between what we attempted to do a few days ago and what you're trying to attempt to do today. I think what we're calling for is fair play and I would like to see that occur in the future. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Mr. Speaker:

"I would like the record to show that the Chair allowed the motion to be voted upon, that the motion was defeated. The Chair did not rule that motion out of order."

Representative Ikeda:

"I believe, Mr. Speaker, that is not so. Your ruling was appealed and that was voted upon. The motion to suspend the rules was ruled out of order by you."

Mr. Speaker:

"That being the case, the Chair stands corrected, but nevertheless the Chair's ruling was correct."

Representative Sutton rose to speak against the motion:

"Mr. Speaker, we have adopted Rule 55.1 stating that the rules of the House may be suspended by approval of two-thirds of the members to which the House is entitled and there has been a request for a roll call and the burden of proof on the two-thirds would lie with those

with the motion. Therefore, if they cannot prove the two-thirds, the motion to suspend the rules would fail.

I also refer you, Mr. Speaker, to Cushing and Cushing very carefully states that when any contemplative motion or proceeding is rendered impracticable by reason of existence of some special rule by which it is prohibited; in other words, those two conditions precedent are there: A, that being practicable and B, it could not otherwise be done. But very simply you could refer this resolution to committee, it would then come back on the floor of the House and we would then be following the rules, for we do not even follow Cushing. So, Sir, I would ask that you, yourself, given your power, declare that this particular motion to suspend the rules is out of order."

Representative Peters again rose to speak in favor of the motion:

"I would like to bring the previous speaker's attention to rule 56.1, the most recent rule and parliamentary practice as set forth by Cushing that govern the House where not inconsistent with these rules. The rule that I indicated, 55.1 is there for a purpose. It is part of this process that we have accepted. Again, I emphasize our wish to have everyone's support this morning. Thank you."

Representative Kunimura rose to speak in favor of the motion to suspend the rules:

"If my hearing serves me correctly and my memory serves me correctly, I thought I heard the Minority Leader affirm that she and the Minority Caucus will be voting in favor of this resolution. I think it's most comforting to the Russians that we squabble on mere technicalities and two wrongs making one right."

Representative Sutton then rose on a point of order:

"Mr. Speaker, we are directing our debate to the subject of the motion to suspend the rules, none of the matters in the resolution is now relevent."

Mr. Speaker:

"Representative Sutton, I believe that Representative Kunimura is making his argument in support of the motion."

## Representative Kunimura:

"Like it has been done so many times in this House, Mr. Speaker, thank you very much. But if this kind of squabbling and unrelated technicalities and to embarrass...."

Representative Sutton again rose on a point of order:

"Mr. Speaker, the term of unrelated technicalities is not the fault. All we are doing is an application of the rules which we, ourselves, have applied to this body. They are not unrelated technicalities, they govern our very action and behavior."

#### Mr. Speaker:

"Representative Sutton, the Chair would appreciate if you would state your point of order and not get into a debate."

#### Representative Kunimura:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, it seems as if the shoe is beginning to pinch. Suspension of the rules, Mr. Speaker, is the avenue and the vehicle, the motion before this House, so you can speedily affirm the action of the President of the United States. That's all. The meter of the resolution can be debated on, but I feel that this body should put all stops aside and adopt this resolution or give this resolution an opportunity to be voted upon today."

Representative Ikeda rose on a point of order:

"Mr. Speaker, I would request that you ask the speaker to stick to the motion on the floor which is to suspend the rules of the House rather than speak to the resolution itself."

# Representative Kunimura:

"Mr. Speaker, I request that you ask the Assistant Minority Floor Leader to clean her ears because I'm talking about the motion before this House. It's the only vehicle that this resolution has a chance to be heard and discussed this morning. So, I urge all members to vote in favor of the motion to suspend the rules."

Representative Kamalii again rose to speak against the motion:

"A Majority Leader has cited many of the rules in 56.1, but let me refresh your memory of why I am opposing this suspension. If you remember several days ago, 54.1 giving us the opportunity to amend our rules that state very clearly that we would have been allowed to have a 24-hour period to lay on the desk and to vote on it. But, again, you know, I just don't know where you guys are coming from. It's ok when you do it, but it's not ok when we do it. Let me just say that if this is the way it's going to be, all we're asking for as the Minority Floor Leader said, is fair play and if you're embarrassed by this action today, that's not my fault."

Representative K. Yamada rose to speak in behalf of the motion:

"Mr. Speaker, there are some issues that concern the House which are much bigger than each one of us, which are much bigger than the State of Hawaii and, perhaps, much bigger than what this country represents. That, essentially, is the issue we are asking to take up today."

Representative Sutton rose on a point of order:

"Our sole direction is irrelevent to the motion. My point of order is that he has now gone into the issues of the resolution which is not before us. We are solely directing our attention to the motion to suspend the rules."

# Mr. Speaker:

"The Chair rules you out of order, Representative Sutton. If all of you will recollect, the motion to suspend the rules is for a specific purpose. That purpose is to act on the concurrent resolution before this body expressing support for President Carter to resolve the problem of Russian troops in the country of Afghanistan. The suspension is for the specific purpose of acting on this resolution."

# Representative K. Yamada:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This issue is so paramount, it is important for this body to take it up immediately and that's why we have the motion

on the floor, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Evans rose on a point of order:

"Mr. Speaker, the motion is to suspend the rules of the House for the purpose of considering the resolution, period. Another motion will come up to adopt the resolution."

Mr. Speaker:

"That is understandable. We all understand that."

Representative Evans:

"It is understandable and, Mr. Speaker, it should be as such."

Mr. Speaker:

"The Chair has ruled that it is as such."

Representative K. Yamada continued:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I am trying to explain why it's so paramount for this body to take this resolution under consideration today and apparently they've tried to make political hay out of this rather than to have bi-partisan support for it. In any case, Mr. Speaker, I'll cut my argument short because most of it has been said. I would like to refer this body to rule number 49.3 which requires that they have at least one-fifth vote before they can take it on Roll Call. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kunimura rose on a point of information:

"I thought I heard from the Minority side reference made to our action about their move to amend the rules. Was that said before this House this morning?"

Mr. Speaker:

"That is correct."

Representative Kunimura continued:

"Then I would say people are really getting convenient here."

Representative Sutton requested to rise on a point of order.

The Speaker responded:

"There is nothing before the House at this time."

Representative Sutton:

"The recent head of our Legislative Management has made a statement."

Mr. Speaker:

"The Chair rules you out of order Representative Sutton."

As requested, a Roll Call vote was then taken on the motion to suspend the rules of the House for the purpose of acting on HCR No. 30. The motion carried by a vote of 36 ayes to 10 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Evans, Garcia, Ikeda, Kamalii, Marumoto, Medeiros, Narvaes, Sutton and Uechi voting no and Representatives Aki, Baker, Lacy, Nakamura and D. Yamada being excused.

Representative K. Yamada then moved for the adoption of H.C.R. No. 30, seconded by Representative Peters.

Representative Sutton rose to speak in favor of the resolution:

"Mr. Speaker, it is very important that we, the fiftieth state, the newest and youngest of the states, show our conformance with the leadership of our country. The President of the United States, whether he's a democrat or a republican, is Commander in Chief. Our Republican Caucus holds two members who have received the highest declaration of their country. They are behind it 1000%. They want the representatives in Washington, D.C. to go back to President Carter and tell him that this resolution was adopted unanimously, that we in Hawaii are patriotic Americans and we, the Republican Caucus, are very proud Americans. Thank you. "

At this time, the Chair noted the presence of Representatives Lacy, Nakamura and D. Yamada.

Representative Larsen rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, my copy here does not have who proposed the resolution and I have a question to ask the individual who proposed it."

The Speaker then asked Representative K. Yamada if he would yield to a question. Representative K. Yamada said he would like to hear the question first.

#### Representative Larsen:

"The question is this, Mr. Speaker. As I recall the speech that President Carter made on television concerning this issue to boycott the Olympics, I believe he also stated a boycott, a selection of alternative sites or a delay of one year and I am wondering why we don't have those alternative proposals included in with this one issue of the boycott. I think these things should be considered and I think I would like to have a response from the gentleman who proposed it."

#### Representative K. Yamada:

"Mr. Speaker, I would be glad to answer the gentleman's question. As far as the resolution is concerned, the general aim of this is to support the action which the President has taken. Regardless of what ultimately comes about after the International Organization of States committee considers the request, nonetheless, we are not addressing simply what the committee felt it might do but we are addressing ourselves specifically to support the President of the United States and the action that he's taken."

## Representative Larsen:

"Mr. Speaker, I have indicated my understanding of the speech was he had several alternatives: boycott, alternative site selection or delay for a year. Now, I would like to suggest that we include those alternatives in the resolution."

# Mr. Speaker:

"The resolution is specifically directed to the Olympic Games to be held in Moscow and as such it makes mention that we support the President to boycott that game if it is held in Moscow. The resolution is correct in that respect."

# Representative Larsen:

"I understand, but I do have a feeling that alternatives as the President stated should also be included in the resolution. It's my understanding as how he stated it, Mr. Speaker. If I'm incorrect, I would like to hear from other sources."

At 12:24 o'clock p.m. the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair during which time copies of the resolution were distributed to all members of the House. The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:35 o'clock p.m.

#### Representative Larsen:

"I would like to withdraw my objection to the wording and accept the resolution as proposed."

The motion to adopt House Concurrent Resolution No. 30 was put by the Chair and carried.

No. 107) honoring Genoa Keawe for her contribution to Hawaiian music was jointly offered by Representatives Sutton, Peters, Anderson, Crozier, de Heer, Evans, Fukunaga, Hagino, Hashimoto, Holt, Ikeda, Kobayashi, Kunimura, Larsen, Lee, Marumoto, Medeiros, Morioka, Nakamura, Peters, Sakamoto,

Shito, Silva, Stanley, Takitani and Toguchi.

On motion by Representative Sutton, seconded by Representative Peters and carried, H.R. No. 107 was adopted.

Representative Sutton then rose and proceeded to introduce the honoree, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, today's renaissance of Hawaiiana will be infinitely indebted to those local artists who sustained the culture, the music and the language during the very lean years and then nurtured the present reflowering.

Today, one such artist is to be honored by this legislative body -- a woman whose songs for the past forty years have enamored kamaaina and visitor alike; a woman who has been a Hawaiian homesteader for nearly thirty years; a mother of 12 children, grandmother of 34, and great-grandmother of 19, with three more, Mr. Speaker, on the way. During her 40-year professional career, Genoa Keawe has recorded more than one hundred discs, perhaps more than any other local performer. Some of these were recorded by the company she founded, some were recorded with her sons, Gary and Sam, For more than one-third of a century, her songs about Hawaii, sung in Hawaiian, served as a rich repository fostering the rebirth of the Hawaiian language and style of music. Indeed, her old time recordings today help countless keikis throughout this State to learn the hula but this singing grandmother, with her trusty ukelele, is more than a talented performer; she is a generous, God-loving being. She personifies the aloha spirit for which this State is renowned. Through the decades, she has devoted her time and talents freely to promoting benefits for such worthy causes as acquiring ukeleles and guitars for deserving youngsters, restoring the proper use of the Hawaiian language, and preserving historic areas in these beautiful islands.

Mr. Speaker and members of this honorable body, it is my pleasure this morning to introduce to you Aunty Genoa."

Representative Sutton then presented Aunty Genoa Keawe to the members of the House and audience.

Representative Peters then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, it is with great respect and admiration that we honor Aunty

Genoa today.

Hawaiian music, as you know, Mr. Speaker and fellow colleagues, has always been an integral part of our Hawaii. In early Hawaii, it was the meaning by which history was recorded and handed down from generation to generation. It embodied the love of our aina so dear to all of us. Today, much of this authenticity has deteriorated but what we do have we tend to cherish and try to protect, such as the case with Aunty Genoa, for her music embodies the sincerity, the spirit and zest for life which is so rare today.

Mr. Speaker and colleagues, all of you know that her contributions to the Hawaiian culture, to Hawaiian music, have been great. For this, we thank and we honor her today."

Representative Peters then introduced the other members who were seated on the floor with Aunty Genoa:
Her dauther, Moana Lono; Georgiana K. Padeken, Director of the Department of Hawaiian Homes; Christobel Kealoha, Commissioner of the Department of Hawaiian Homes; Mr. Bob Nelson, an associate; and "our very favorite 'pupuna', Aunty Alice Makaula, our Godmother."

Representative Peters also introduced other relatives, friends and very strong supporters of Aunty Genoa Keawe who were seated in the gallery.

Representative Sutton then rose and asked:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like permission for State Representative Peters who, with myself, represents the Hawaiian homestead area, and Whitney Anderson who is named after my uncle, Judge Whitney; Representatives Marumoto and Narvaes to present pictorial gifts, and if we could have, sir. . . and I am supposed to be the parliamentarian for the Republican Party. . . and I am coming to you for advice. I would like a recess to follow in such a way that we could have a little music from Aunty Genoa so if you will advise me -- do I ask for presentation of these pictorial gifts and leis, or do we have the music first?"

The Chair answered:

"The Chair would suggest that you make your presentations hereafter. The Chair will call for a recess for the purpose of having our honored guest entertain the body." Representatives Sutton, Peters and Anderson then presented the honoree, Aunty Genoa Keawe, with ilima, maile and ginger leis, while Representatives Marumoto and Narvaes gave her pictorial gifts.

At 11:47 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair, "for the purpose of having our honoree to provide us with some renditions."

Upon reconvening at 11:59 o'clock a.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives de Heer, Kobayashi, Segawa and Stanley.

Representative Anderson then rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to explain or dispute Representative Sutton's remarks that I was named after his uncle. There is a member of my family that is, in fact, named after his uncle, but it is William Whitney Anderson and I was named after William Whitney, my uncle, and I would just like to get the record straight so that we don't have anything mixed up in the Journal.

Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Sutton then rose and the Chair asked:

"Representative Sutton, are you rising to ask for advice?"

Representative Sutton answered:

"Mr. Speaker, you have two grave conflicts: You are Speaker of this House; you are going to be a judge, and I am going to raise your salary."

The Chair responded:

"The Chair was very humbled when Representative Sutton asked for advice this morning. I believe that it was the first time he has ever asked for advice. All these years, he has been attempting to advise the Chair."

Representative Morioka moved that S.B. No. 1826-80, SD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Inaba.

Representative Lunasco then offered the following amendment to S.B. No. 1826-80, SD 1.

"SECTION 1. Senate Bill No. 1826-80, SD 1, is amended by depleting the dollar amount as reads '\$45'

in line 19 on page 2 of the bill and inserting in lieu thereof the dollar amount to read '\$60'."

Representative Lunasco moved that the amendment be adopted, seconded by Representative Masutani.

At 12:51 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 2:05 o'clock p.m.

Representative Lunasco rose to speak in favor of the amendment to S.B. No. 1826-80, SD 1:

"Mr. Speaker, what this amendment does is to increase the present per diem which is \$45 to \$60 for lodging and food.

Mr. Speaker, as one who has travelled to the mainland, let me give you a brief background on the cost of hotels throughout the United States. I selected four major cities, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Chicago and New York. As an example, the Hyatt Hotel in Los Angeles, the average cost for single occupancy is \$57 to \$75 per day; in San Francisco at the Hilton Hotel, \$63 to \$113 per day; in Chicago at the Holiday Inn, \$37 to \$52 per day; in New York at the Sheraton Hotel, \$56 to \$86 per day. Mr. Speaker, my concern is that as one going on legislative business, \$45 is not sufficient to handle the hotel costs. Furthermore, Mr. Speaker, presently our state employees who just completed their negotiations on their contracts, they also negotiated an increase in out-of-state and inter-island travel. Once the contract is funded, inter-island travel for state employees will be \$40 (for which we only get \$30) and out-of-state would be \$50.

Mr. Speaker, I think everybody knows that out-of-state travel is very expensive on state jobs. Unfortunately, I for one, cannot afford the out-of-pocket expenses. I only live on my legislative salary. I have no outside income, so for me to go on a conference as Chairman of the Education Committee, it would be almost impossible. If you check the record, Mr. Speaker, I have yet to attend a conference sanctioned by this House on education matters. Unfortunately, Mr. Speaker, there are a lot of us in this House placed in the same predicament and the

only way we can resolve this problem is to at least assist us in picking up some of the costs.

With that, I will close and ask all of you members to vote in favor of this amendment."

The motion was put by the Chair and failed to carry.

Representative Narvaes then rose to speak against S.B. No. 1826-80, SD 1.

"Mr. Speaker, the Hawaiian and American political decision-making generation is still re-living the last great deflationary depression of the 30's. Our most predictable reaction will always be to inflate government budgets to fight inflation because of an unseen fear of deflation and depression. These decision-makers don't seem to understand how to handle inflation.

The major problem of the 80's for Hawaii, and the nation, will be much like the problem that Germany had during the 20's when its economy was struck by the economic disease called hyperinflation and paper money lost practically all of its value and Germans paid thousands for a loaf of bread. Today the Germans refuse to inflate because of the memory of their hyperinflated economy of the 20's.

On the other hand, we have legislators today who are proposing that we allow deflation. These people simply don't understand politics or the human equation. Government will simply spend more and the federal reserve will accommodate the spending of our federal government.

This State, in the next recession, is going to be struck with a monstrous problem of declining tax revenues accompanied by increasing demands on state government to alleviate suffering caused by recession, unemployment and business slowdown.

Mr. Speaker, the 1980 state legislature must become more aware of our politics of inflationary-type spending. We need to become more frugal with our responsibility and our power of appropriation. I would like to review with you the past four-year spending and revenue trends and how the State has both been affected by them and dealt with them. These trends are important

as we plan and consider the outlook for the future.

The four-year period 1976-1979 was a difficult one for the state, financially. This is evidenced by the fact that for three of those four years -- fiscal years 1976, 1977 and 1978 -- the state spent more money than it took in. This imbalance totaled \$41.7 million in fiscal year 1976, \$6.6 million in fiscal year 1977, and \$32.8 million in 1978. We were able to avoid a deficit situation in those fiscal years only by virtue of a large carry-over balance of \$83.5 million from fiscal year 1975.

In fiscal year 1979, however, we turned that trend around. We took in more money than we spent — by \$64.5 million, most of which was attributable to a rise in tax revenues. As a consequence, we face the new year of 1980 with a fiscal year 1979 year—end balance of \$66.9 million. I am pleased with our success in this regard but feel that we are not giving enough consideration to the economic forecast of a coming national and Hawaii State recession.

Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I will vote against this bill which gives a 7% increase to the budget of our legislature for 1980, especially since we also gave a 7% increase to the legislature's budget in 1979.

To prepare for more inflation that's to come in 1980 and throughout the 80's, the budget of the legislature should be the first place for us to start holding the line against attractive inflation increases.

Mr. Speaker, let's become more economy minded in the appropriation of the revenue resources of Hawaii.

We should rebate the \$67 million surplus that we have today. Because of the inflation tax, we should expect surpluses in the near future, but we must not lose our sense of economy because of the gifts that inflation brings to us.

Our present day tax structure coupled with inflation allows us the power to create surpluses.

The more virtuous the legislature becomes in the spending of tax revenues such as in this bill, the larger the possible rebate to Hawaii can be.

Mr. Speaker, that is why I'm voting

against S.B. No. 1826, SD 1."

Representative Sutton also rose to speak against the bill:

"You have heard, Mr. Speaker, the excellent treatise on inflation by my learned colleague from Kalihi and, Mr. Speaker, I will just elaborate a little on inflation and then I will proceed to two other subjects, but as you know at the present time the President, Jimmy Carter, who is a democrat, the same party as you, Mr. Speaker, has asked us to cut all expenses to stop this most insidious thing which followed in Germany to a complete disruption of the entire economy, as my learned colleague from Kalihi has told you. After the abdication of Kaiser Wilhelm, Germany went into an inflationary cycle that destroyed the Republic of Germany and subsequently you had Adolph Hitler come in.

Now, Mr. Speaker, it is true that the President has stated that a 7% increase in the ceiling is allowable in his State of the Union address two weeks ago, but he brought out certain points, Mr. Speaker, and that is that we must redouble our fight against this persistent inflation that has racked our country for more than a decade. And this, he said, was the most important issue facing the country. That was prior to the invasion of Afghanistan and the hostages in Iran, but it is still a terribly important factor.

Mr. Speaker, we know that inflation is a burden for all of America, but it's a disaster, Mr. Speaker, for the poor, for the sick and for those who are old and on fixed incomes. No American family, Mr. Speaker, should be forced to choose among food, health and decent housing because the cost of these basic necessities has climbed out of reach.

Mr. Speaker, as you know, we here in Hawaii have the highest cost of living of any other state except Alaska. Where, Mr. Speaker, but here in this House, with the very basic requirements of the legislative budget, is the best way to show an example to the rest of this government, an enormous, huge government, and it comprises now 44 thousand individuals in our state and county, and, Mr. Speaker, if we don't set the example, who will?

And that is why, today, we have a legislative budget that has gone

up, Mr. Speaker, as follows: the session employees will get \$19 thousand more, the per diem, without the Oliver Lunasco amendment will go up some \$15 thousand, travel will go up \$10,000, stationery will go up \$54,000, Mr. Speaker, communication, postage and telephone will go up \$9,000; rentals of equipment \$32,000, Mr. Speaker, and we will end up with a situation of spending one million dollars more than four years ago.

Now, Mr. Speaker, there are a couple other things I would like to bring to your attention. We have here a very strange mechanism. The Senate has passed a bill over to us; we hold hearings, but we don't dare make amendments for fear of the fact that we are holding up the pay of those employees who are not full-time employees, those who are session employees. Now, they haven't gotten their paychecks. You and I have gotten ours. They haven't. And we have a hostage situation. We have a pressure situation that bequeaths a type of artificial decision-making. Our decision should not be based on external factors of that nature.

Let me go back and show you the Senate, and, as you know Mr. Speaker, just a few short years ago, some of those gentlemen were over on this side as House members and I am on very good terms with them but I don't like the way they handle some things and I'll show you what I don't like. I am mindful of the fact that the State Ethics Commission probably has me more targeted than anybody because I have more conflicts that are basic in owning property, stock and whatnot. But I do feel that the Ethics Commission is an appropriate thing and I feel that anybody that is head of that should be receiving an appropriate salary. But what happened over in the Senate? I am mindful of the fact that all other administrators of legislative agencies and executive agencies have had no salary increase for five years, but should the salary increase requested by the Executive Director of State Ethics who is earning less than any other department head, not have been raised? He has a very high fiduciary duty. He is doing a job which requires trust. We read in the papers of this Sting operation in the Congress of the United States. We know that individuals must be paid commensurate with their responsibility and authority. And yet the Senate did not take that into consideration. And we find ourselves hostage to their decision, because if we don't pass this bill and it goes back to committee, then the session employees are not paid.

Therefore, procedurally, we are doing something, Mr. Speaker, which is wrong and because you stand up and have stood up for us on this basic proposition, I would ask you to vote no. Now, Mr. Speaker, in conclusion I would like to say that this legislature must be like Caeser's wife - be beyond reproach. It must set a precedent of cutting costs and reducing the terrible inflation of our times. There are people on the other side of the aisle with immense intelligence and I shall appeal to them, too, to join my learned colleague from Kalihi and myself in voting no on this bill."

At 2:22 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 2:24 o'clock p.m.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1826-80, SD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS TO PROVIDE FOR THE EXPENSES OF THE LEGISLATURE, THE LEGISLATIVE AUDITOR, THE LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU AND THE OMBUDSMAN", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 44 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Marumoto, Narvaes and Sutton voting no and Representatives Crozier, Garcia, Kawakami and Say being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 1826-80, SD 1, had passed Third Reading at 2:26 o'clock p.m.

### SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative K. Yamada, seconded by Representative Evans and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of taking action on a substantive resolution, H.R. No. 170.

# INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION

A resolution (H.R. No. 170) relating to the compensation of officers and employees of the House of Representatives of the Tenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii was jointly offered by Representatives Kunimura, Crozier, Evans, Holt, Ige, Kamalii, Kihano, Morioka, Peters and K. Yamada.

Representative K. Yamada moved for the adoption of H.R. No. 170, seconded by Representative Evans.

Representative Sutton rose to speak against the resolution:

"Mr. Speaker, we are hereby putting in ranges and delegating the authority of this body. Many of the Supreme Court decisions during the early days of the New Deal ruled the entire concept of the National Recovery Act unconstitutional because of illegal delegation. Here we have a resolution with salary ranges delegating the authority of this body to others to make the decisions. Also, Mr. Speaker, if you examine this, you will see that there are raises, considerable raises, and that means costs will be going up - just the reverse of what we are trying to do and of the example that we wish to set.

And, therefore, Mr. Speaker, I would urge you to vote against this resolution."

Representative Kunimura then rose to speak on H.R. No. 170:

"Mr. Speaker, I can no longer sit and vote without saying anything. I speak in favor of this resolution, Mr. Speaker.

The gentleman from across the aisle talked about raises - for crying out shame, these raises are only to meet the minimum requirements under the federal law, to meet the minimum wage. They were being paid way below the federal minimum and we had to raise them to \$540 from \$500, and if that is causing inflation, then God save this country. And, Mr. Speaker, I take my hat off to the Majority and the majority of the Minority. It's easy to play politics on the floor of this House. but it took people with responsible, forthright guts to vote for this measure and the measure preceding this one because they were voting on issues rather than playing political chicanery."

Representative Narvaes then rose to speak against H.R. No. 170:

"Mr. Speaker, I was going to vote for it, but the words of my

honorable colleague have convinced me to vote against it. I do this in principle more than anything else. It is my philosophy today, and I think more of the public officials across the country are going to have to adopt this philosophy, that we are going to really have to fight inflation. I've been here in this legislature now for three years -this is my fourth year -- and I haven't seen much consideration really given at our level to fight inflation or prepare for something that may come. Perhaps in some way we are very lucky that the Russians did attack -- not really attack, but that they did go and do what they did -- because it might help to keep our economy solid for a little while more. Perhaps if they didn't do what they did do. if the federal government didn't expand and spend more money for defense, the major concern in our nation's mind today would be inflation. We seem to have gotten away from it a little

Mr. Speaker, I would like to tell the honorable representative from Kauai, that we certainly should be raising the salaries of the employees who work for the legislature, that we must do, because there's nothing that they can do to fight inflation, they need the money. But there are other places in the budget that we certainly can cut, where we can withhold our spending and we can be a lot more frugal."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried and H.R. No. 170 was adopted.

During the announcement of public hearings by committees, Representative Stanley requested that the 48-hour public notice requirement be waived so that two bills which had just come out and were of the same subject matter as others already on her committee's agenda could be included in the agenda for the committee's hearing tomorrow.

The Chair granted permission to waive the 48-hour notice in this case.

At 2:33 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 2:35 o'clock p.m.

At this time, Representative Sutton made a late introduction to the members of the House. He introduced Mr. Freitas, the head of taxation.

# ADJOURNMENT

At 2:37 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative K. Yamada, seconded by Representative Evans and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m. tomorrow, February 8, 1980.
