The House of Representatives of the Tenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1980, convened at 10:00 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Reverend Don Landers of Wahiawa Assembly of God Church, after which the Roll was called showing all members present.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Forty-Fourth Day.

On motion by Representative K. Yamada, seconded by Representative Evans and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Forty-Fourth Day was approved.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 2914-80, SD2, HD2 passed Third Reading at 10:21 o'clock a.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 856-80 on S.B. No. 2635-80, SD2, HD1:

Representative Morioka moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and that S.B. No. 2635-80, SD2, HD1, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Inaba.

Representative Sutton then rose to speak against this bill:

"Mr. Speaker, I hold in my hand a Wall Street Journal and it states that these industrial bonds have not been moved on the exchange for two and a half months.

The purpose of this bill is to provide for the issuance of special purpose revenue bonds to assist industrial enterprises and they have included, without any purpose, without any special enabling, anything concerning ethanol. Just out of a clear sky, Mr. Speaker, ethanol is put in here.

Now, that's not good statutory work in putting an enabling for revenue producing bonds in. This is going to pass by a simple majority, but when these bonds come before us, it will be two-thirds.

This is not good draftsmanship, Mr. Speaker. I am in favor, if you could sell these, but as I pointed out initially, they can't be sold at the present time.

Here we are, not giving the Electric Company bonds and yet we are putting on the books enabling legislation for industrial revenue bonds and then we stick in the word ethanol, and we're passing that; but we are not giving the Electric Company the bonds it needs to reduce the rates which are going up astronomically because of OPEC's increase in oil prices.

Mr. Speaker, we are not making sense. We should be giving Hawaiian Electric a chance to put these revenue bonds out at 7% or 8% in the most chaotic bond market the United States of America has ever seen. I'm not saying, Mr. Speaker, since the Great Depression, you have ever seen; and yet we're putting on the books an enabling, for some unknown user, we don't know who, maybe Henry Kaiser's proposition, maybe some electronic firm, but we stick in there ethanol and we are not being consistent thereby and we're not following good draftsmanship. We are not making sense from the point of view of what we need and

what we don't need.

We need, on the books of this state, utility bonds to allow the utilities to go out and get this money from the American public at 7% less interest. The only beneficiary can be the state of Hawaii and the consumer, when we do that; and yet, we're not doing that. Here we're doing it for a phantom, maybe it isn't so phantom when you stick that ethanol in here.

Mr. Speaker, on the grounds that this is not our priority and on the grounds that it's poor draftsmanship, I would ask you and your very worthy colleagues to please vote no."

At 10:25 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 10:34 o'clock a.m.

Representative Kunimura then rose to speak in favor of S.B. No. 2635-80, SD2, HD1:

"The gentleman from across the hall, namely from Nuuanu, is a member of the Finance Committee and I cannot sit here and allow innuendos to be entered into the Journal without correction.

No discussion was offered by the gentleman speaking against this bill. The Committee on Finance did not amend this bill per se. It came over from the Senate with the same language and it's really discouraging when you try to work in good faith and try to accept all input from all members, regardless of political affiliation or personality, but to come on the floor of this House and cast such doubts as to the workings of the Finance Committee, Mr. Speaker, is inexcusable.

Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I would like to say that I am ready to accept any and all constructive criticism on behalf of the Committee or even upon myself, but I will not sit here and accept such hogwash and garbage. Thank you."

Representative Sutton then rose in rebuttal:

"Mr. Speaker, this has nothing to do with the integrity of the Finance Committee. The Finance Committee has immense integrity and I enjoy and I love every person on it, including the last speaker.

However, Mr. Speaker, since I am the only one of the Committee,

on either side, who is an attorney and who has taken the CPA, I feel that I should give you some of my knowledge.

Now, Mr. Speaker, the state authorizes here, private enterprises to issue special bonds. We don't know who it's for and we run the risk of, whether anybody tells you differently or not..... certainly, the full faith and credit of the state of Hawaii is not on these bonds with the bond market running wild like this one. You can't tell me that the state of New York wasn't hurt by bonds that went under, that Nelson Rockefeller put on the books, that did not have the full faith and credit of the state of New York; but still it hurt the state of New York terribly and he had to seek escape.

This bill specifically refers to ethanol production as a valid public purpose eligible for this special bond funding.

I believe that this House should specifically reconsider this entire question of a valid public purpose if we're going to do that. It should reconsider this question in light of the fact that the House Finance Committee has already refused to report out two other bills that aid ethanol. Then, why do we stick it in here when we have no definition of public purpose at all.

Mr. Speaker, you're learned in the law and you know the definition of public purpose is a very, very stringent one. We don't want to put something on the books that all of a sudden sticks this phrase in here that we, every 51 of us here, find that ethanol is a public purpose. But, we're not finding it. We don't know it. We kill two bills on ethanol and then we stick it in here and say it's a public purpose.

Mr. Speaker, you will not become a party to this, so I ask you to vote no. Thank you."

Representative Kunimura:

"Mr. Speaker, the gentleman claims he is an attorney, claims he wants to share his knowledge.

This bill had a hearing in the House Committee on Finance. Knowledge not shared is knowledge not given.

Mr. Speaker, he didn't talk about this. This bill came over from the Senate with the public purpose so stated, we went through with the whole hearing, he participated and if he wanted to correct the bill, why did he not then raise the question.

Secondly, Mr. Speaker, talking about the other two bills and talking about Hawaiian Electric, this bill is an enabling legislation and that is the reason why the appropriation for Hawaiian Electric was turned down by the Committee because, exactly as the gentleman from Nuuanu has stated, that may overload the state's position as far as geographically or otherwise, in the bond market, saturating the bond market to a position where the state's ability and the state's position to get the best interest rate may be jeopardized. Therefore, the Committee withdrew its support.

This bill only enables. All proposals for the actual issuance of the bonds must be approved by the legislature. Maybe New York did not have this kind of safeguard. We do and I cannot see anywhere in this bill the arguments brought forth by the gentleman from Nuuanu that this is an enabling legislation plus approving the bonds. This only authorizes the department, but they must come back to the legislature for review and approval of the actual issuance of these bonds. Thank you."

Representative Sutton:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in the hopes that some lovely lady might yield her time."

Representative Ikeda stated that she would yield.

The Chair then stated:

"The Chair declares that Representative Sutton is out of order. According to the rules of the House, each person has the right to speak on a bill twice."

At 10:40 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 10:46 o'clock a.m.

Representative Ikeda then rose on a point of information stating:

"Will the Chairman of the Finance Committee yield to a question?"

Representative Morioka yielded and Representative Ikeda asked:

"Mr. Speaker, I don't see anywhere in this bill where industrial enterprises is defined and before I vote on this bill, I would like to know, specifically, besides an ethanol plant, what we are talking about. In other words, how broad is this definition of industrial enterprises?"

Representative Morioka responded:

"Mr. Speaker, the bill intends to follow the Con Con mandate which enables four categories: health facilities, utilities, housing and industrial encompasses manufacturers and so forth.

This is only an enabling act for the industrial enterprises. The constitution also requires that a separate legislative measure authorizing the issuance of special purpose revenue bonds for each project or multi-project program will require the approval of at least 2/3 of the members of each House of the legislature. In other words, no bonds can be issued unless the legislature specifically identifies and authorizes the specific entity, the project and the amount of bonds to be issued."

With the Speaker's permission, Representative Ikeda asked another question:

"Mr. Speaker, the previous speaker noted four sections in the constitution which permit the floating of bonds and, if I heard him correctly, he said hospitals and housing, as well as two others. My question is, does the constitution specifically say industrial enterprises or are we, by passing this bill, including that and expanding the definition of the constitution?"

Representative Morioka answered:

"Mr. Speaker, the Con Con mandate was very specific. It had to do with health facilities, housing, utilities and manufacturing or industrial enterprises."

Representative Ikeda:

"Then the wording 'industrial enterprises' is within the constitution itself?"

Representative Morioka:

"I believe it is. Yes."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2635-80, SD2, HD1, passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives Baker, Ikeda, Kamalii and Sutton voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 2635-80, SD2,

HD1 passed Third Reading at 10:50 o'clock a.m.

## S.B. No. 2693-80, SD2, HD1:

Representative Say moved that S.B. No. 2693-80, SD2, HD1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Kawakami.

Representative Sutton then rose to speak against this bill:

"Mr. Speaker, somebody just said that I will not get into conference, but we haven't solidified that rule so even if I vote no, I still may get a chance to get in on the conference.

Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against this bill because of the basic concept that we should be legislating, not doing administrative surgery. We are saying, in so many words, that we, a 60-day body, know how to do something 12 months of the year in administration.

It is true that we had an enormous snafu in the fact that there were 536 historic places reviewed, put on the books and then it was found that they did not comply with due process.

I do not feel, however, that this was the fault of the Historic Places Review Board. I think it is the fault of the Attorney General. He knows what due process is. They are lawyers and they should have told them that it takes proper notification and hearings, and we are penalizing them for that.

This particular concept is one where Hawaii was unique among the 50 states of the Union. We were the first one to talk in terms of perserving our culture and our humanities in having these various boards. We were the first one that established, and, therefore, there were no trails that they could follow. They were doing their own pioneering.

Now, all of a sudden, we find a few mistakes and we say okay, kill 'em. We killed the careers of two individuals and I say to you that this is not the appropriate function of a 60-day legislature. It is the appropriate function of the administration and we should have attacked it as an administrative problem.

So, Mr. Speaker, I ask you to vote no against this bill."

Representative de Heer also rose to speak against this measure:

"I believe, for too long, in spite of the valiant efforts of the Chairman of the Culture and Arts Committee and the Chairman of the Water, Lands Committee, that this issue has been mired by politics between competing factions and that our humanities program in the state isn't working.

I hope that this bill would relieve it, but I suspect that in the years to come we will be faced with the same basic problem -- battles between competing factions for the state's limited resources and the state's dollars that are going to be given to the humanities program.

I have tried to keep my own personal involvement at a minimum because I believe it is the prerogative of the subject area committees to take the lead in this. Inasmuch as we all want a humanities program for the state, inasmuch as the language which has been

valiantly worked out by the research staff, let's try to keep the concept of the humanities program.

I still do not believe that this bill will ultimately lead to the type of program that we all want for our state and our people and I cannot, in good conscience, as much as I want to, this morning when I came here, I was going to support this measure, I cannot, in good conscience, support a measure which I know will not ultimately lead to the specific purposes of this program. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and S.B. No. 2693-80, SD2, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HISTORICAL OBJECTS AND SITES; CULTURE AND ARTS; AND HISTORY AND THE HUMANITIES", passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives de Heer and Sutton voting no.

## S.B. No. 2155-80, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative Morioka, seconded by Representative Inaba, S.B. No. 2155-80, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INTAKE SERVICE CENTERS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 2693-80, SD2, HD1 and 2155-80, SD1, HD1 passed Third Reading at 11:17 o'clock a.m.

## S.B. No. 2292-80, SD1, HD2:

Representative Morioka moved that S.B. No. 2292-80, SD1, HD2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Inaba.

Representative Sutton rose to speak against this bill:

"Mr. Speaker, in your morning paper, the Honolulu Advertiser, which evidently had not gone out on strike yet, put out this Parade and if you will turn to page 10 of the Parade it says 'how to squash litter bugs'.

We have a bill in front of us that attempts to address this problem by spending \$1.1 million for a litter pick-up. In other words, it would be used by each county to contract and direct litter pick-up labor. We give this money to the counties and they do a crash program of

picking up litter, spend \$1.1 million of our state money and it's done for that brief purpose.

If you read this article in Parade, it states that the problem of litter is one where we have certain individuals who habitually litter. We do not solve this problem of litter by \$1.1 million which we give to the various counties. Labor programs here, it says, may include persons picked up by the Department of Social Service and Housing or other state unemployment programs.

Mr. Speaker, I want to tell you about an unemployment program to prevent forest fires in the great state of Washington. You know what happened? They put this on the books to prevent forest fires and they did one of these crash programs without experts and pretty soon they had more forest fires than they've ever had because the people were burning the forest fires to get the money to put them out.

If you put a litter program like this, you're going to have people littering on purpose to get hired to pick up the litter.

Mr. Speaker, I know of what I speak because during the great depression, I got a job through football in the Works Progress Administration and the moment we got our pick and started using that pick they told us to take it easy. You start at 4:30, one minute before closing, then you use your pick.

This is a boondoggle. You've got a big boondoggle written by a very brilliant man from the Diamond Head area. No man is more brilliant, and he's spoken on the floor of this House against having pensions where it's 25 years and out. He has saved money and now, all of a sudden, he wants to waste \$1.1 million.

Mr. Speaker, rather than a \$1 million pick-up program, let's have the state promote a Joe Kuroda kind of thing. Pick it up voluntarily. Let the Boy Scouts, the Girl Scouts, the Lions International.....Lions could do this single-handed, they help the blind and they can help the litter at the same time. There are some good Lions in here, including myself. We could go pick it up. You don't have to spend \$1.1 million.

So, Mr. Speaker, let's not have a boondoggle on our books. I ask you to vote no and I ask your worthy colleagues to do likewise."

Representative Larsen rose to speak

in favor of S.B. No. 2292-80, SD1, HD2:

"Mr. Speaker, the previous speaker has made some salient points about the potential for waste in this program, but the program itself is a measure to try and control waste. It's an attempt to try to involve the counties in a rationale that will allocate to each county funds available on the basis of their needs. It may be allocated and it may not, depending on how the finances of the state run.

It's based on the idea that each county has a certain population that creates litter. Each county has certain miles of road, numbers of acres of park and miles of beaches and that's the way the money is allocated.

I agree with the previous speaker that there is a potential for abuse in this program; therefore, the legislature, through the Department of Health, will review this thing at an opportune time each year to see if the program has functioned properly the previous year. If it has not functioned, that's the end of the allocation and the end of the money allocated to each county.

I think it is a self-destruct program. If it doesn't work, it is wiped off and there is no waste of money. If it does work, based on the success that is viewed by the Litter Commission in the Department of Health, then we can continue with the program. There's no built-in boondoggle in this thing. It's a one-shot deal.

The suggested amount of \$1.1 million is in there because that's the amount the counties say they need to clean up roads, parks and beaches. That's why it's at \$1.1 million, it's just rounded off from the demand that they say they need to pick up the litter.

I wish that we could change the consciousness of people in this state so that we wouldn't have to spend any money to clean up these different areas. In that same article that the previous speaker mentioned, they made the point very strongly that areas that are dirty tend to get dirtier. If litter is in a certain site, people will litter in that site because they think well, that's a nice place to litter and what's one more can when there's already five there.

The point here is that the present Litter Commission is now educating the school population. We have on the books control measures that say that if you litter, you'll get a fine. If you litter, you will spend hours on the road picking up trash. These things are now on the books; unfortunately, they are not functioning.

I believe that if we eliminate the feeling among the judges and among the police force that it's just a waste of time, if we put some money into this cleaning up, get it cleaned up and then, if we would have the cooperation of these people, using the laws that are already on the books, to say okay, if you litter this place up that's been cleaned, then you will have a fine or you will have to go pick up litter on the basis of a court award.

I believe this measure is a look at what we can do and I'm hoping that it will work successfully. If not, successive legislatures will be able to limit or eliminate the funds available.

I hope that you and your colleagues in the House will support this measure. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2292-80, SD1, HD2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LITTER CONTROL", passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Sutton voting no.

## S.B. No. 1161, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative D. Yamada, seconded by Representative Honda, S.B. No. 1161, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ATTORNEYS' FEES AND COSTS AND EXPENSES OF LITIGATION", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 2292-80, SD1, HD2 and 1161, SD1, HD1 passed Third Reading at 11:26 o'clock a.m.

## S.B. No. 1832-80, SD1, HD1:

Representative D. Yamada moved that S.B. No. 1832-80, SD1, HD1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Honda.

Representative Sutton then rose to speak against this bill:

"Mr. Speaker, addressing your attention to S.B. No. 1832-80, SD1, HD1, this is subject to career criminal prosecution efforts. An individual, when we delete the word 'shall' and we insert the word 'may' be the subject of career criminal prosecution efforts. We go down and it says, has had two or more felony convictions, has had three or more felony arrests, has had one or more felony and two or more misdemeanors, has had three or more misdemeanor convictions and arrests within the last three years....

We're talking about the hardened career criminal of which we know, for a fact, that they are repetitive. You have a policeman, he's out on the beat, he risks his life to make the arrest of a hardened criminal of this nature and then what happens? We've put on the books, not the mandatory career criminal thing, we've changed it from 'shall' to 'may'.

What we've done in effect, Mr. Speaker, is to disregard what the United States Supreme Court had in their decision just five days ago. They upheld a 'shall' law on the books of the state of Texas that said that three times and they're out, they go to life imprisonment. This particular case, Mr. Speaker, that they had before them, was a heart rendering type of decision because the particular felon had done three felony charges which were just as close to misdemeanors as you could possibly find and just separated by the common law concept of the monetary amount.

Yet, the Supreme Court of the United States upheld the conviction and the life sentence. Why did they do that? It's because the big problem in the United States of America today is crime and we're one of the fifty states and we have it here, too, Mr. Speaker.

The crime that is committed by the felon who performs repeated crimes is the one that you want to be able to stop. There is no longer room for compassion. There is no longer room for discerning whether or not that individual could be rehabilitated. You have a hard core criminal and he belongs behind bars.

We have taken a step backward here. So, Mr. Speaker, I would ask that you vote against this measure and ask your colleagues to do likewise." The motion was put by the Chair and S.B. No. 1832-80, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAREER CRIMINALS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Evans and Sutton voting no.

# S.B. No. 2419-80, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative D. Yamada, seconded by Representative Honda, S.B. No. 2419-80, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FAMILY COURTS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 1832-80, SD1, HD1 and 2419-80, SD1, HD1 passed Third Reading at 11:30 o'clock a.m.

### S.B. No. 2741-80, SD1, HD1:

Representative D. Yamada moved that S.B. No. 2741-80, SD1, HD1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Honda.

Representative Evans then rose to speak against this measure:

"Mr. Speaker, S.B. No. 2741-80, SD1, HD1 deals with the procedures to be taken when a person is found to be unfit to proceed in a criminal case.

It specifies that this person cannot be held or monitored by this process for a period longer than the duration of sentencing for the most serious crime with which he is charged.

It requires review of this case by the court at least every 90 days.

It requires the Department of Health, if it has custody of an 'unfit' defendant, to request a court hearing when the Department of Health determines the person is fit to proceed with the case.

And it requires dismissal of the charges if the defendant is committed to the Department of Health as an unfit person for the maximum period of imprisonment that could have been imposed if the defendant had been found guilty.

A Senate amendment to the original bill would have placed a defendant found to be 'unfit to proceed' in the secured unit of the state hospital. This amendment, however, was deleted in the final House draft.

Mr. Speaker, while I recognize that this bill was meant to address some of the very serious concerns we have today about crimes committed by persons later found to be unfit to proceed, it simply does not go far enough.

While I recognize the desire of the House Committee to maintain justice for the defendant by deleting the section on committal to the secured unit at the state hospital, I fear we have sacrificed the greater safety and welfare of the general public, and that is never just.

Mr. Speaker, there are no words, there are no laws we can pass, that can fully repair the damage done to an individual, to a family or to a community that has been the victim of a serious crime.

All that we can do, and what we must do, is to assure that the people of this community are protected, that precautions are taken to make sure that the individual responsible for that action is prevented from repeating the crime again. That is the basis of our corrections system, whether we are talking about imprisonment or hospitalization.

Justice is not simply a matter of guilt or innocence. Most fundamentally, it is a question of responsibility. That responsibility is inherent whether 'fitness' is or not. We can never be completely excused from the consequences of our actions.

Our responsibility as legislators is to assure the citizens of Hawaii that they have a reasonable expectation of safety in their community and that the criminal justice system will take care to prevent or restrain anyone from disrupting the safety and health of our society.

Thus, I introduced legislation which would have required a corrections follow-through on those who had been treated and were due for release. As individuals now considered 'fit', their responsibility to society can resume. That resumption must also include the possibility of serving the remainder of what would have been a prison sentence for the crime committed.

Sentencing is really a guarantee to the community that an individual will be removed from society and that all efforts will be exhausted to assure that person will have received as much rehabilitative assistance as we can provide. Mental stability, as we all know too well, is not a guarantee of 'going straight'. If it were, we would not need prisons, only hospitals.

But we need both and there are instances, I feel, when certain kinds of criminal action may require both.

However, because our legal system is structured on a finding of guilt or innocence, this community has had to sit back, helpless and afraid, when a person who has been found unfit to proceed was remanded to a medical facility and was then released to commit the same crime again.

On the question of whether placement in a secured unit is presuming guilt before a trial is held, I must argue that we are not talking about individual guilt, but about the innocence of the community.

It seems that too many of us here today have forgotten the headlines of the last ten years. We have forgotten the unspeakable crimes that have been committed by individuals who have been released to the state Department of Health, individuals who had been found unfit to proceed in a criminal case but who gained their freedom only to hurt and destroy once again.

I haven't forgotten, nor have the families of all these innocent victims. It is our responsibility as legislators to amend the law to protect the innocent.

In the case of defendants found to be unfit to proceed, I believe we should have strengthened the law to allow a judgment of 'guilty but mentally ill'.

In doing so, we would have retained the humanity in understanding the lack of reason in the defendant, but we would also recognize the responsibility of that individual for his actions.

I believe this bill takes a necessary half-step to acknowledging that we need improvements in our laws regarding the criminal actions of the mentally 'unfit'. But this bill stops short of finding a genuine alternative to what we recognize as inadequate at present.

We should not vote for a bill whose primary strength is recognizing the problem rather than addressing it. This is my main objection and why I now ask my colleagues to join with me in defeating this measure and working next year on an appropriate bill. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2741-80, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FITNESS TO PROCEED", passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Evans and Sutton voting no.

#### S.B. No. 1960-80, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative Blair, seconded by Representative Shito, S.B. No. 1960-80, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NO-FAULT INSURANCE", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

## S.B. No. 3, SD3, HD1:

Representative Morioka moved that S.B. No. 3, SD3, HD1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Inaba.

Representative Morioka requested that the following speech be inserted into the Journal and the Speaker, noting no objections, so ordered:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of S.B. No. 3, SD3, HD1. The purpose of this bill is to authorize the issuance of bonds for various capital improvement projects throughout the state.

The constitutional amendments made in 1978 include a lapsing provision for all capital improvements authorized prior to 1979. Those authorizations are scheduled to lapse as of June 30, 1980, unless previously expended or encumbered. S.B. No. 3, SD3, HD1 offers a means to re-authorize those projects which are scheduled for lapsing but are still deemed important and necessary. The bill also presents an opportunity for individual legislators to address concerns and priorities which may be unique to a particular area.

I urge all of my fellow House members to join me in support of this bill. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 3, SD3, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 2741-80, SD1, HD1; 1960-80, SD1, HD1 and 3,

SD3, HD1 passed Third Reading at 11:37 o'clock a.m.

#### S.B. No. 1851-80, SD2, HD1;

Representative D. Yamada moved that S.B. No. 1851-80, SD2, HD1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Nakamura.

Representative Ikeda requested that the following speech be inserted into the Journal and the Speaker, noting no objections, so ordered.

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill.

There are times when the whole concept of juvenile justice seems a self-contradiction. Minors in our society are subject to a different standard of justice, the crimes which may result in institutionalization are not applicable to adults, the court procedures which determine and set such institutionalization are not what adults would consider due process and, most unfortunately, the nature of the institutions themselves did not make certain vital distinctions about the nature of the crime and the quality of the social response.

I believe, Mr. Speaker, that this bill has addressed many of these concerns. I cannot join with some who argue that minors should be treated exactly like adults, my primary concern has been that they be treated with justice.

In particular, I was troubled by the mixing of status offenders with juvenile criminals. This bill provides for intake agencies that will be concerned with the special problems and appropriate treatment of children who need our help, not improper punishment.

These agencies will now be empowered to house such offenders in an environment free from the detrimental influence of hard-core juvenile delinquents. Perhaps as importantly, these juveniles will be provided with family counseling and direction.

It is my belief that such treatment may offer us the opportunity of dealing humanely with today's offenders and provide a genuine promise that such juveniles will not be tomorrow's adult felons.

I urge my colleagues to vote in favor of this bill. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1851-80, SD2, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE JUVENILE JUSTICE SYSTEM", passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Lee and Sutton voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 1851-80, SD2, HD1 passed Third Reading at 11:38 o'clock a.m.

#### S.B. No. 3012-80, SD1, HD1:

Representative D. Yamada moved that S.B. No. 3012-80, SD1, HD1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Honda.

Representative Anderson then rose to speak against this bill:

"Mr. Speaker, it is my idea that any legislation that we pass is for the benefit of all of our constituency and the title of this is relating to the registration of lobbyists, and I also believe that any money that they spend on any individual should also be divulged.

But when, Mr. Speaker, you ask us to vote saying that they have to divulge the amount of pay that they receive from their company or as a housewife or whatever a lobbyist happens to be, I don't think that that's the type of legislation that we have to pass.

For that reason, Mr. Speaker, I am going to vote no on this."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 3012-80, SD1, HD1 passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Anderson and Sutton voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 3012-80, SD1, HD1 passed Third Reading at 11:40 o'clock a.m.

At 11:40 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:44 o'clock a.m.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 2514-80, SD1, HD1 and 2081-80, SD1, HD1 passed Third Reading at 11:46 o'clock a.m.

### S.B. No. 2682-80, SD1, HD1:

Representative Blair moved that S.B. No. 2682-80, SD1, HD1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Shito.

Representative Sutton rose to ask the Chair's ruling on a potential conflict of interest stating that he has taken the CPA exam.

The Chair ruled no conflict.

Representative Blair then spoke in favor of this bill:

"Mr. Speaker, in favor of this bill, I would like to point out that we raised the requirements."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2682-80, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC ACCOUNTANCY", passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Uechi voting no.

On motion by Representative Blair, seconded by Representative Shito, S.B. No. 118, SD2, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PROFESSIONAL AND OCCUPATIONAL BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 2682-80, SD1, HD1 and 118, SD2, HD1 passed Third Reading at 11:48 o'clock a.m.

## S.B. No. 3146-80, SD1, HD1:

Representative D. Yamada moved that S.B. No. 3146-80, SD1, HD1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morioka.

Representative Lacy then rose to speak against this bill:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against S.B. No. 3146-80, SD1, HD1, not so much for what it does in a matter of law, but what it fails to do.

This bill fails to close a loophole in our campaign spending law and yet it brazenly calls attention to this loophole. This loophole allows corporations, unions, political action committees and other organizations to make contributions to candidates in large numbers and in large dollars without reporting them to the Campaign Spending Commission.

The bill calls attention to this loophole by distinguishing between, on one hand, candidates committee, that is one which makes expenditures and accepts contributions in behalf of and with the authorization of the candidate; and, on the other hand, all other committees, organizations and individuals.

However, the bill restricts only the candidate's committee in the transferring of funds and the purchase of fund raising tickets and does not adequately require reporting by the so-called independent committees.

Now our House Judiciary Committee, Mr. Speaker, in Standing Committee Report No. 615-80, reported out H.B. No. 2932-80, HDl, which covered this loophole very nicely by defining political committees as distinguished from candidate's committees and requiring reporting by the political committees which make or receive contributions in aggregate of \$500 or more per election.

Mr. Speaker, H.B. No. 2932-80, HD1 was recommitted. Its companion bill can be considered, in many cases, to be this S.B. No. 3146-80, SD1, HD1. Thus, the Senate Bill before us conveniently spotlights the way by which the intent of the campaign spending law may be circumvented, the use of so-called independent committees which are exempt from the essential restriction of aggregating their donations. These independent committees will multiply like flies around garbage. Many already exist in very large number.

Mr. Speaker, this bill is a shibai. It's really worse than shibai in that it's a lie. The bill purports to further the constitutional mandate for public accountability of campaign expenditures;

however, this bill clarifies the means by which such expenditures may be hidden from public scrutiny. Thus, it subverts the intent of the people for a more meaningful campaign spending law. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative D. Yamada rose to speak in favor of S.B. No. 3146-80, SD1, HD1:

"Mr. Speaker, first of all, the statement that unions, political action committees and the like can make large contributions without reporting them is not really true. Our law provides, at the present time, that any candidate receiving any contribution in excess of \$100 has to report the amount and from whom he received it.

As far as the independent committees, that amendment was discussed at the joint hearing between the Judiciary and Finance Committees. I think, at that time, Mr. Gonzales of the Campaign Spending Commission explained some of the pitfalls with the proposed amendment. After discussion, the majority of both Committees, after hearing the arguments presented, decided not to pass those measures."

Representative Sutton then rose to speak against this bill:

"Mr. Speaker, in our anti-trust laws, we passed a bill on immunity just a short while ago. We have a basic concept that if a corporation is engaged in a criminal conspiracy that the corporate officers are liable.

Now all the fines in the world mean nothing to a corporation. It's a tax expense, and there it is.

We say here that when an individual, and that's a person, constitutes a petty misdemeanor, it subjects the violator to a penalty; but, the violation of corporations, organizations, associations or labor unions subjects the violator to a fine not to exceed \$1,000. And then your Committee looked at that and they think the penalty is adequate.

But, you're not taking the basic concept of anti-trust and making the officers of the corporation and those that are co-conspirators liable to a criminal penalty, that's what they understand; and yet that individual is subject to the criminal penalties of a misdemeanor and, therefore, we have not put any teeth into it.

In addition to what the representative from the Waikiki area has said, I would like to bring out that we don't have any teeth in it. We have loopholes and no teeth. This thing can hardly walk, Mr. Speaker, so I would ask you to vote against it."

Representative Kamalii also rose to speak against this bill:

"Mr. Speaker, it's hard for me to decide which provision of this bill upsets me the most; that an in-kind contribution by individuals are excluded from the meaning of contribution; that a fund raiser is something which costs more than \$25 and that any number of fund raiser events, which I assume mean something costing \$25 or less, may be held; or that there is now no real penalty for illegal contributions. I really can't make up my mind what should outrage or disgust me most.

The basic sense of injustice, however, is that the general public will believe that we have truly done what was necessary to assure the integrity of the election process. That we haven't but will try to disguise such inaction is a mockery of citizen concern and that an elective office can now be bought.

I personally feel that we should confront that perception and deal with it. Contributions are most suspect when they cannot be admitted to publicly. By the provisions of this bill, we have enlarged those areas and services so that such a secrecy is not only possible, but condoned.

I do not believe that the citizens of Hawaii expected a campaign spending law which only simplifies filing of forms. They expected reform. This bill fails that objective."

Representative Marumoto rose to speak against S.B. No. 3146-80, SD1, HD1:

"Mr. Speaker, the Standing Committee Report relating to this bill states that its purpose is to clarify and refine the original intent of the campaign spending law enacted during the 1979 legislative session.

If that law had truly reflected the purpose of having campaign spending laws in the first place, perhaps clarification and refinement would be sufficient; but neither the 1979 statute nor the bill presently being considered, makes any effort to close the notorious loophole which allows thousands of dollars worth of campaign contributions to be made to political candidates without reporting them to the Campaign Spending Commission or to the public.

It is clear that this loophole undermines the citizens' right to know by whom and for whom money is spent in political campaigns. Moreover, it makes a sham of what campaign spending restrictions we do have. Without full disclosure of campaign contributions on the part of such organizations, there is no way of cross-checking candidates' disclosures of the source and amount of their contributions with the amount of money they may have actually received or expended.

For reasons such as this, Mr. Speaker, I urge members of the House to vote nay on this bill. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 3146-80, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAMPAIGN SPENDING", passed Third Reading by a vote of 44 ayes to 7 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Evans, Kamalii, Lacy, Marumoto, Narvaes and Sutton voting no.

## S.B. No. 2870-80, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative D. Yamada, seconded by Representative Honda, S.B. No. 2870-80, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ARRESTS BY POLICE OFFICERS WITHOUT WARRANT", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 3146-80, SD1, HD1 and 2870-80, SD1, HD1 passed Third Reading at 11:57 o'clock a.m.

## S.B. No. 3003-80, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative D. Yamada, seconded by Representative Honda, S.B. No. 3003-80, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MEDICAL TORTS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 3003-80, SD1, HD1 passed Third Reading at 11:58 o'clock a.m.

## S.B. No. 2501-80, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative D. Yamada, seconded by Representative Honda, S.B. No. 2501-80, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING

TO ABSOLUTE LIABILITY OF ANIMAL OWNERS; PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

## S.B. No. 1834-80, HD1:

On motion by Representative D. Yamada, seconded by Representative Honda, S.B. No. 1834-80, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ANNULMENT OF A MARRIAGE", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 2501-80, SD1, HD1 and 1834-80, HD1 passed Third Reading at 11:59 o'clock a.m.

#### S.B. No. 2877-80, SD1, HD1:

Representative D. Yamada moved that S.B. No. 2877-80, SD1, HD1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Honda.

Representative Evans then asked that the following speech be inserted into the Journal and the Speaker, noting no objections, so ordered.

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill, with one reservation.

The purpose of this bill, as I understand it, is to broaden the law to overcome obstacles to prosecution in the case of rape.

For too long, our laws have been constructed to favor the defendant over the victim, with some legitimate concern, I feel, for the right of someone who is innocent but accused of committing the crime of rape.

But also, for too long, the right of the victim to justice under the law has been diminished and oftentimes denied because of this concern. It has been a second rape of that victim because a legitimate concern has been mis-used to add further abuse to a victim and gain freedom for the accused.

My reservation with this bill is that it has to go even further to shore up our commitment to protection of the rights of rape victims. If, as we claim in the amending of the law, we desire to 'impart some degree of fairness to the plight of a victim of a sexual offense', let us carry this to its reasonable conclusion in the determination of punishment.

We should have discarded the different degrees of criminality in the commission of these offenses. In the crime of rape, it is difficult if not impossible to distinguish degrees of anguish, agony and humiliation on the part of the victim. Why, then, do we make such an attempt on the part of the offender?

We should have specified a mandatory prison term of 20 years for the crime of rape, a crime that is a manifestation of suppressed anger on the part of the offender, anger that is not likely to be lessened by a short sentence.

Until we realize the potential explosiveness of an individual who is found guilty of such a crime, until we recognize that light sentencing is unlikely to deter that individual from committing the crime again, we will not be exacting justice for society's sake and we will not be adequately protecting society from that individual's intent to commit that crime again.

A proper deterrent, a strong deterrent, is the only way to communicate to a potential offender that any intent to commit a crime of this type will be dealt with firmly.

Despite my reservations, however, I believe that the merits of this bill, its progress in protecting the rights of victims of sexual offenses, is important.

I urge all of you to support this bill. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2877-80, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SEXUAL OFFENSES", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

# S.B. No. 2329-80, SD2, HD1:

On motion by Representative D. Yamada, seconded by Representative Honda, S.B. No. 2329-80, SD2, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DEFERRED ACCEPTANCE OF GUILTY PLEA", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 2877-80, SD1, HD1 and 2319-80, SD2, HD1 passed Third Reading at 12:00 o'clock noon.

## S.B. No. 2202-80, SD2, HD1:

Representative K. Yamada moved that S.B. No. 2202-80, SD2, HD1 pass

Third Reading, seconded by Representative Segawa.

Representative Sutton then rose to speak against this bill:

"Mr. Speaker, we have a very unfortunate circumstance here that this body will not be able to hear the testimony that your Committee on Health heard. Your Committee on Health is interested in trying to bring up-to-date the tremendous technology that has occurred in the entire proposition of nuclear medicine. We eliminated ionizing radiation.

Testimony that this terminology would encompass a wide range of technologists working in nuclear medicine came out before us, and yet, we have eliminated that. At the present time, Mr. Speaker, there is no state regulation or licensing for nuclear technologists, and the present law doesn't cover it, and this law doesn't cover it and we could have so easily left it in.

We had a very eminent doctor tell us to leave it in. It's an unbelievable non sequitur in this Committee report that after the Committee report acknowledges what I've just told you, Mr. Speaker, it says and your Committee have therefore amended the bill to delete the words 'ionizing radiation' and they've replaced it with 'cobalt 60 or electrons'.

Now, cobalt is presently available, Mr. Speaker, at Tripler, at Queens and one other spot that escapes my memory. But cobalt, Mr. Speaker, is going out of existence.

Mr. Speaker, how could that Committee come to such a non sequitur. They acknowledge what I have told you, that we're not licensing nuclear medicine and then they knock out these essential words that a very prominent doctor 'ionizing radiation' he said was important to be in the bill, and then they knock it out.

Now, I am rising, as I told you, to speak against this bill because I don't think we should put legislation on the books where we are studying a subject and not cover all the bases. What we have on the books, admittedly, is perfectly all right; but because of the void we are leaving, Mr. Speaker, I would ask you to vote no against this bill."

Representative Segawa then rose to speak in favor of S.B. No. 2202-80, SD2, HD1:

"I want to clarify this bill to the members. The previous speaker, I believe, attempted to confuse the members as to the true meaning and objective of this bill.

This bill relates to the licensing of radiation therapy technologists and actually, the chapter which this bill pertains to relates to the licensing of radiologic technologists which is a different classification from the radiation therapy technologist. One is the diagnostic radiation technologist and the other is the therapy radiation technologist.

One part of the previous speaker's statement was true in as much as he mentioned the nuclear therapy radiation used in present day medicine; however, the purpose of this bill was to separate the radiation therapy technologist from radiation diagnostic therapist for the purpose of licensing radiation therapy technologists. Presently, there is no statute which covers the licensing of the therapist; therefore, the licensing procedure would allow the licensing under the diagnostic test and because of the difference in the professions, the therapist could not qualify for the passing of the exam. This bill merely sets up a separate therapist licensing procedure.

So, Mr. Speaker, I may have confused the body further by talking about the differences, but there is a difference between the therapist and the diagnostic radiation technologist and this bill provides separate licensing procedures for the therapist. I urge all members to vote for this bill."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2202-80, SD2, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE LICENSING OF RADIATION THERAPY TECHNOLOGISTS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

## S.B. No. 2770-80, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative Kiyabu, seconded by Representative K. Yamada, S.B. No. 2770-80, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TOURISM", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 2202-80, SD2, HD1 and 2770-80, SD1, HD1 passed Third Reading at 12:07 o'clock p.m.

#### S.B. No. 2571-80, HD1:

On motion by Representative Kiyabu, seconded by Representative K. Yamada, S.B. No. 2571-80, HD1, entitled: "A

BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII STATE PLANNING ACT", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 2571-80, HD1 passed Third Reading at 12:08 o'clock p.m.

## S.B. No. 1003, SD1, HD1:

Representative Kiyabu moved that S.B. No. 1003, SD1, HD1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Kawakami.

Representative Sutton then rose to speak against this bill:

"Mr. Speaker, we have a basic concept in the law that we grandfather in certain uses when we put in a new zoning law. We grandfather them in because they are pre-existing... non-conforming. Now, all of a sudden, the learned gentleman from Kapahulu wants to stick something in here that's going to knock out all that was grandfathered. This is a denial of due process, the denial of equal protection of the law and it circumvents the whole concept of grandfathering.

Come up into my area sometime with Mr. Baker and myself and you will see numerous small stores. We have them in Puunui, we have them in Liliha and Pauoa. They are pre-existing, non-conforming. They are in residential areas but they are grandfathered in because they were there when the horse and buggy days were here and there were stables right at the same place.

Now, all of a sudden, we say that little corner grocery that's been there for the last 40 or 50 years is going to be knocked out at our direction by the county ordinances. We have completely thrown out the whole concept of grandfathering, completely thrown out the concept of pre-existing, non-conforming and violated by due process and violated the equal protection rights of these various small businesses.

Now, I think the state general plan is a wonderful idea, but I do not feel that the state general plan should try to eliminate the corner grocery store as their first order of business. I have seen nothing in the state general plan come before this body except resolutions, and resolutions do not have the effect of law.

Under a lonely law that's coming out of the state general plan is something that will knock out these little corner grocery stores because they happen to have existed and gone into business at a time when there were no zoning ordinances.

Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I would ask you to vote no against this and ask the Chairman of the State General Plan to please have some mercy on small businesses. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1003, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COUNTY ZONING", passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Sutton voting no.

## S.B. No. 2784-80, SD2, HD1:

On motion by Representative D. Yamada, seconded by Representative Honda, S.B. No. 2784-80, SD2, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOTOR AND OTHER VEHICLES", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 1003, SD1, HD1 and 2784-80, SD2, HD1 passed Third Reading at 12:10 o'clock p.m.

# S.B. No. 1838-80, SD3, HD1:

Representative D. Yamada moved that S.B. No. 1838-80, SD3, HD1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morioka.

Representative Narvaes then rose to speak in favor of the bill:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill, but with very strong reservations.

According to the Committee report, the purpose of this bill is to extend the life of the Hawaii Crime Commission and to revamp its current structure and policies to make it an effective and efficient organization to counteract crime in the state of Hawaii.

But, Mr. Speaker, when I read the Committee report, some of the things it does, for example on page 2, item 6, it emphasized the legislative intent that the primary function of the Commission is to do research....."

Representative Kunimura then rose on a point of order stating that the Committee report is not up for a vote at this time, only the bill.

The Chair advised Representative Narvaes to continue and to tie in the remarks from the Committee report with his own arguments.

Representative Narvaes continued:

"Some of the other things that the Committee report points out: item 7 provides for the narrowing of the scope of functions of the Commission and item 9 points out that finally, it removes the subpoena power of the Commission inasmuch as the House version says that the primary function of the Commission under this bill should be researched.

Mr. Speaker, my main reason for speaking in support of this bill, with reservations, is that I still want to see the Commission's life extended. Other than that, this bill is really lousy.

The changes made to the final Senate Draft by the House Committee have all but retained the Commission in its present function with the major amendment made to focus its work on research and reduce its attention on investigation. This hesitation on the part of the House to allow the Commission to move ahead as a strong, investigative panel works against our efforts to fight the crime epidemic in Hawaii.

The crime rate in Hawaii is rising at an alarming rate. The number of murders in Honolulu rose 52% during the first nine months of 1979. Violent crime rose 11.7% during this same period.

Why did we create this Commission in the first place, I would like to ask everybody here. Wasn't it because we were all concerned about crime, about the growing strength and influence of organized crime elements. Wasn't it also because the people of this state rated crime as one of the biggest problems facing

What the House Committee did in attempting to alter the focus of this Commission's work so that it would be more of a research organization is to proclaim to the people of this state that the so-called fight against crime is being handled quite adequately by the existing law enforcement and criminal justice agencies; but we know that isn't the truth.

The fight against crime is not being handled adequately. Crime is still increasing and there is still a conviction among the people that organized crime is using its influence among island businesses, among the citizens and even within government. We need a strong citizen commission on crime. This Commission has a higher purpose than any of the law enforcement or criminal justice agencies that now exist. It should have more flexibility to move between these agencies to discover the kind of information that is needed to restore the confidence of the people of Hawaii in the agencies that we have already created to protect public safety.

That, I believe, is one of the missions of this panel. It is certainly not to act as a paper organization, something that looks good to the people but really does nothing.

Perhaps what has hurt the Commission in its efforts to win the approval of the legislature each year is that it's been too effective. It has done too good a job, has probably stepped on the wrong toes and maybe its potential for uncovering embarrassing information is what is feared most by some who oppose its continuation.

This Commission has demonstrated that it can and does act responsibly. It is not duplicating the work of other anti-crime units. It acted responsibly, collected its information and turned it over to the proper law enforcement agencies when it was ready. It's handled its past investigations discreetly. In the case of the Crime Commission, not only has it been able to get a great deal of cooperation with all government agencies, it has also been able to uncover information from individuals who have been reluctant to go to those law enforcement agencies in the first place.

The Commission's investigative staff has enjoyed a good working relationship with the Police Department, with the Attorney General's Office, and with federal law enforcement agencies. This is proof in itself that not only does this Commission have the ability to function properly but that it is more effective because of its accessibility and appeal to potential witnesses who are reluctant to approach other law enforcement agencies.

One other thing that we haven't mentioned too much is the ability of the Commission to look into the operations of various law enforcement agencies and see whether there is anything that can be improved. They can do this objectively because they have nothing to gain, nothing to hide.

You all know as well as I do that no law enforcement agency would be particularly effective in investigating itself and if it did, it would certainly hate to wash its dirty laundry in public.

Inquiries with the county police, state Attorney General and FBI have been answered to the effect that the Hawaii Crime Commission does not and has not hindered the work of these law enforcement agencies wherever the Commission's function, as seen by these other agencies, is very different from the more specialized work carried on by law enforcement officials.

Mr. Speaker, so that the Crime Commission will be able to carry out its mission of reducing crime in the state of Hawaii, I would have wanted to see the Commission given greater investigative powers, not less, as the House version of S.B. No. 1838-80 gives. Many of the hopes of the people of Hawaii lie with the Crime Commission in combatting and finding criminal elements through investigation.

I urge all of you to vote aye on this bill. Send it to conference where, hopefully, the Senate position giving greater investigative powers, making the Crime Commission stronger, will dominate."

At 12:20 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:29 o'clock p.m.

Representative Lunasco then rose to speak against S.B. No. 1838-80, SD3, HD1:

"Mr. Speaker, when the Hawaii Crime Commission was implemented several years ago, I thought the purpose for the Commission was great but unfortunately, Mr. Speaker, through the years we haven't seen any results. I hate to see us keep this another two years and at the end of those two years have a big fat zero again.

I think the only thing we heard about the Hawaii Crime Commission was several months ago when they made a study of crime only to find the report couldn't be released to the general public. The only people who really saw the report were the key people in the legislature and, unfortunately, I guess I'm not a key person in the legislature so I was excluded.

But more importantly, Mr. Speaker, what happened to the report after that. For this reason, Mr. Speaker, I feel that this Commission should be done away with and the money used to a greater advantage elsewhere."

Representative Marumoto then rose to speak against this bill:

"Mr. Speaker, according to every public opinion survey, crime is one of the most important concerns in the state. Regardless of whether they have been directly affected or not, the average citizen of Hawaii now feels threatened. There is no greater demoralizing or destructive social force than fear and our people are now frightened.

That is why it is so important that every effort be made to curb and control crime. It isn't just empathy for the victim or aversion to criminals. It's very fundamentally an expression of concern for the nature of how we will live as a society. That concern must have expression.

I believe that the State Crime Commission offers an articulate and acknowledged voice. We should commend those citizens who are willing to take an active role and provide a model for us. They care.

As elected leaders, it is essential that we give our support and voice to that same effort. This bill, though, is a denial of their concern. This bill denies scrutiny of their qualifications and narrows their scope of action. It denies the penal power of witnesses and limits the Crime Commission to study, research and educate. If the Crime Commission is not allowed to investigate but only to research, then in effect we have said, go back to reading your newspapers, just keep track of what is happening, don't try to do anything about it.

That frightens me the most, Mr. Speaker, when we ask people not to care anymore or worse, perhaps, say that we don't want them to care in a manner which has meaning; and without investigative powers, the State Crime Commission no longer has real significance.

This bill needs continued work to improve and strengthen it. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Sutton rose to speak against this bill:

"Mr. Speaker, I've already spoken against this bill on Second Reading and have been asked by the Chair to try to make my remarks on Third Reading expansive of what I had brought out on Second Reading.

I have before me a Webster's Dictionary and I'm looking at the word 'investigate'. Now, Mr. Speaker, this comes from the Latin investigium, investigare, investigatus and it means to seek out the truth.

This Commission was seeking out the truth and trying to get the truth and that was their point and that is what Governor Thompson gave us and this is what Governor Thompson and I brought out on national television together and this is what Governor Thompson brought in to Lieutenant Governor Doi that we should have the basic concept to array and to furnish with power or authority so that somebody could, in turn, allow the truth to come out.

In order to investigate, you have to track and you have to observe. You have to study by close examination and by a very systematic inquiry. This systematic inquiry was done by one man more than anybody else, Eddie Hitchcock. Eddie Hitchcock asked that he have another man because when he did this investigating, when he did this tracking, he was unarmed and he felt it inappropriate to investigate without another individual.

Instead, what happened? They took away all the powers to investigate and said no investigating, just

Mr. Speaker, I'm going to be careful in the use of my words, but in effect they emasculated. I could use a better word, but I'm not because I'm restrained. But to emasculate this Crime Commission, and they substituted the word 'research'. That is not a substitution. Syntex will tell you, Mr. Speaker, that investigate is not the correlation of research. Research is an entirely different function. On your income tax return, if you run a corporation, try and get a tax deduction by calling research, investigation. You cannot. Investigation is something that only

government has the power to do.
Only government has the need to do.

Governor Thompson sent these various entire histories of the Chicago Crime Commission and the Illinois Crime Commission down here to us and I had him get in contact with Lieutenant Governor Doi, and they determined that there was a direct need in Hawaii. The police don't do it, the county police don't do it, we do not have a state police here in Hawaii; we're one of the few states that do not. There was nothing in the Judiciary that allowed them to do what this Crime Commission was doing. We have no other body that could do this function.

Now, we're an archipelago, Mr. Speaker, of islands way out in the middle of the Pacific. We are, in many respects, like a foreign country. We are, indeed, the 50th state, yes, but we live in the hub of the Pacific. We have all the neighbors that come from the Far East, we have all of the tremendous dangers that occur from these neighbors.

We know that some of the worse criminals in the world are in Japan. We know that, for all intents and purposes, that the Japanese government has assisted our Crime Commission in every way possible, but we do know that we are a vulnerable citizenry here.

Mr. Speaker, why should we pass a bill that, in effect, emasculates what we have on the books now? You would not like to see a football game where they couldn't tackle and they couldn't touch. It wouldn't be football. By the same token, you don't like to see a Crime Commission that can't investigate. It would be meaningless the moment you take that power away. You will never see any statute which has been so changed as this one and I would like to read from the statute and show you, Mr. Speaker, exactly what happened. And so, if you will turn, sir, to page 5, you will see what we have deleted. The Commission formerly shall have the functions and shall perform the following duties: and this was deleted (1) develop, recommend and, where appropriate, implement public education programs relating to educating the public; (2) develop, recommend and, where appropriate, implement programs and information regarding affirmative steps which may be taken to avoid occurrence of crime, eliminate the possibility of becoming a victim of crime; (3) review and make recommendations regarding the operations of existing programs, agencies and other projects.

You know, they did this, they stepped on a few toes, believe me they stepped on some toes, but that's no reason that we, here, the sovereign that legislates for the state of Hawaii, should make this retreat. And this isn't a strategic retreat, this is a retreat in complete disarray. This is a retreat far worse than what Napoleon had at Moscow.

Mr. Speaker, why should we sit down here and destroy item 8 on page 6, investigate and collect evidence necessary to study criminal activity or the operation of the criminal justice system. That was the meat, that was the heart, that was the very essence, Mr. Speaker, of that Crime Commission. And yet, what do we do? We delete it. And the Committee report says, yes, we substituted research. But, Mr. Speaker, research is not a substitute for investigating.

I would ask you, Mr. Speaker, that you, serving as you do as the leader of this body, as the elected leader, not just from the Democrat side, it was our votes from the Republican side that made you Speaker just as much, that you cast a negative vote against this and give us the leadership which you have given us for six years. Thank you."

Representative Ikeda then rose to speak in favor of S.B. No. 1838-80, SD3, HD1:

"Mr. Speaker, the State Crime Commission has performed a valuable and useful role in community efforts against crime. As a form and a voice for public concern, they have focused on extortion, organized crime in school violence and published reports on legislative recommendations.

None of these reports, however, has resulted in any direct prosecution and that, Mr. Speaker, is appropriate. It is their primary function to provide priorities for the professionals whether we are talking about the police cadet or the state supreme court. It must always be public opinion which sets the priorities of government.

However, it must just as consistently be the responsibility of government to fulfill these goals with as much knowledgeability and trained personnel as possible. There are many who are disappointed that the State Crime Commission would no longer have investigative powers with this bill. I can understand that disappointment and there are times when I share

their underlying frustration with the slowness and, sometimes, incompetence of the professional, but I believe that frustration is better expressed by improving the professionals rather than giving more power to the amateurs.

A research function is an important and necessary role. Without a concept of community values and social aims, the professionals may begin to operate without moral considerations. Our anger at crime is not simply because of the destruction of properties or of the violation of the individual. At its most fundamental level, crime threatens us because it lacks any respect for what we cherish.

Research, in that sense then, would provide a statement of community demands for that respect and in what particular areas we feel it is most needed.

For those who, as I do, feel that there is just as strong a need to assert greater support for investigative activities and eventual prosecution, let's work to realize the promise of the State Organized Crime Unit. I know that this unit has failed its promise in the past, but if there is a full exertion of legislative and community pressure, then I do not believe that it would any longer be politically feasible to ignore or defeat the cooperation of intergovernmental agencies.

For those reasons, I urge the support of this bill. Thank you."

Representative Kunimura then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, with the permission of the lady from Hawaii Kai, may I request that her statement be inserted as my own and if I may add, Mr. Speaker, that the lady from Waialae Kahala talked about public sentiment, the polls, about how the community and the state feel about crime, yes, we are not insensitive. I guess we are a little more sensitive than that person from Waialae Kahala because we don't react and give them piddlings and just throw a few crumbs. I don't believe in passing a Crime Commission bill just to pacify.

If we really mean what we say about crime, then let us go get those judges, those lily-livered judges. They should be hanged. They should be shot. They're just as guilty as the criminals. Let us start getting tough and put the money where our mouth is and put CIP and build bigger and better prisons. No, the public is concerned about crime, give them the Crime Commission to investigate.

I doubt if these people really know what happened because as far as I'm concerned, any no-good, two-bit commission that feels there are only 4 or 5 influential members in the legislature, they can go to hell. There are 76 good men and women here, not just a few influential. Who the hell they think they are anyway? God?

Mr. Speaker, if you were there at the hearing that day when they answered our good member from Kalihi when he raised the query about some of the things he felt very strongly and had questions about, he was scolded by the member about why he was asking such a question. This Crime Commission, Mr. Speaker, is beginning to put themselves above the law and above the Constitution of the United States and the state of Hawaii.

Mr. Speaker, because I, too, feel very strongly about crime, I'm willing to go and give them an extension. Maybe they can redeem themselves, but I will not blindly and just with lip service, give them investigatory powers, give them additional life, give them money because the real war and battlefront for the fight against crime is in the Police Department, in the Prosecutor's Office and in the courts of the state of Hawaii. Let us touch those sensitive nerves instead of fooling around with this tokenism. Thank you."

Representative Lunasco again rose to speak against this bill:

"Mr. Speaker, who are we trying to fool? Are we saying that we have crime and we have to study it? The funny thing about being here, Mr. Speaker, is that everybody has answers, including the Crime Commission, but nobody has solutions to those answers.

Mr. Speaker, I don't think we have to study crime in Hawaii. We know it exists and until the Crime Commission comes out with solutions, like my colleague from Kauai mentioned, about some judges without any backbone, then, and only then, will I support the Hawaii Crime Commission. So far, and this is up to today, I've yet to see a solution to our problems in crime although the Hawaii Crime Commission has been in power for several years."

Representative Sutton then rose in rebuttal:

"We have a type of pleading in the state of California where we confess and then avoid. Let's confess that the Crime Commission made a mistake in saying there are only four key people in the legislature and gave them certain information. Let's confess it and let's avoid it. We've now confessed it, Mr. Speaker, and I think we've now avoided it.

Let's go back, therefore, to the Crime Commission itself, having wiped the slate clear of this one error which they made. Let us look at the basic proposition that we do not have any other body that can perform this function. A judge sits on a bench with powers of making a decision by the rules of evidence that we just passed two minutes ago.

Hearsay evidence does not come into a court of law. Evidence between a man and wife could not come into a court of law until the supreme court's decision two weeks ago. He is constrained as a judge by all sorts of remnants of our common law which prohibit even the truth getting before him when the truth does not come in a proper evidentiary form. Cases are dismissed where the public prosecutor did not present his case properly. We have just seen a large sting operation by the Federal government and we do not know, to this day, whether that will hold up in court because of the doctrine of false entrapment.

And so, the learned gentleman from Kauai is correct in wondering why the judges don't do this, but he has not been through three full years like yourself and me, where our minds have been sharpened and at the same time narrowed.

Now, Mr. Speaker, I find a need for this Crime Commission and how can they do it unless they have the power to investigate. How can they possibly achieve a protection of this archipelago of islands way out in the middle of the Pacific unless we have somebody that can find out through hearsay, through investigative powers, through the power of subpoena and try to assemble this data.

You know, Mr. Speaker, what we've done? We've said, all right, the Commissioner himself, the Chairman's going to get \$75 per day but the other members of the Commission, they don't get a penny. That's wrong, Mr. Speaker. We have taken that Commission and we have made a mockery of it by this bill.

Now, the learned lady who comes from Waialae Kahala has given us figures, statistics. We have a high crime rate. We have an infiltration by the underworld. We have a serious situation. She has told us this and in all sincerity she looks, not for this type of non-solution, but for a solution, and in her infinite wisdom she asks that this Crime Commission be re-established with the powers of investigation, with a subpoena power and respond to the will of the people which is, in essence, the basic doctrine of democracy. Thank you."

Representative Kamalii then rose to speak in favor of this bill:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill but with very strong reservations because I want it to go to conference. I don't want it killed on the floor of this House.

Mr. Speaker, this bill should be called 'The Commission of a State Crime against the People of Hawaii' whereby the terms of this bill, the one governmental agency which has met to represent public priorities and to set general goals for the police, the prosecutors and the courts in controlling crime, has been stripped of its primary power to investigate.

Without investigative powers, there can be no general crime commission. Without the authority to compel documentary evidence, there can be no genuine Crime Commission; and without that power, I would go even further and say that there can be no state criminal research commission either.

Research, Mr. Speaker, is invaluable. As legislators, we all rely on reports, studies, the efforts of our own staff; but we also know that resource is only a tool. It is the power to ask more questions, to require the submission of documents, to investigate an issue and then to take action which distinguishes a legislator from staff.

That is the same vital and necessary distinction which must be made between a State Crime Commission and a State Research Commission.

What is it that has made this House so afraid of empowering a citizens' group to conduct that kind of investigation? The people elect us. To distrust their judgment then becomes self-judgment.

Are we so disappointed in their collective wisdom at this level that we fear giving them back some of the power which they have extended to us? Government is beginning to stand on its head. The police, the prosecutors, the courts and the legislature receive their authority from the citizens, not the other way around. It is most appropriate, then, that they be a citizens' group with trained staff and adequate powers to act as an oversight commission on the efforts of government.

Is that what we're afraid of, that we can't withstand such scrutiny? It's been more than a year since the Commission published its report on organized crime in this state and that report explicitly charged that the level and degree of organized crime in Hawaii was linked to the cooperation of high state officials.

Now, there is another report. The Cassius Project, from what little we know, is again an indictment of public officials. How can those of us who are confident of personal innocence and responsible public conduct allow these reports to go unanswered?

No, instead, we are becoming a party, a kind of accessory after the fact because we attack, not the wrong doers, but the ones who are trying to do right; thus, Mr. Speaker, when I voice strong reservations about this bill, I am doing so for two important reasons. I trust the citizens of this state to assume and fulfill large responsibilities; and two, I'm more and more convinced that we are shirking ours.

The members of this House are quite aware of the investigation that I called for several years ago, that I still have to answer to in a \$6 million suit because the Governor of this state and the Attorney General refused to investigate whether there was a godfather on one of our boards and commissions."

Representative K. Yamada then rose on a point of order:

"The arguments raised by the Minority Leader at this point do not go to the merits of the bill, but is taking up other issues which have been argued in the past."

The Chair reminded Representative Kamalii to confine her arguments to the bill being discussed.

Representative Kamalii continued:

"Mr. Speaker, we are talking about crime and the powers that should be

given to the State Crime Commission. If our government has these powers, then why aren't they doing something? It takes citizens like you and me, when we leave the floor of this House, to stand up and be counted. Why we, as legislators, shun and are afraid of an investigation, I am appalled at.

I hope when this bill goes into conference that those who sit on the conference committee will have guts enough to put back the investigative powers to this Crime Commission."

Representative Holt then rose to speak in favor of S.B. No. 1838-80, SD3, HD1:

"Mr. Speaker, as established by current law, the Hawaii Crime Commission has been beset by problems and has generated much public controversy. My opposition to this organization, as it presently exists, has been based upon a review of its activities and accomplishments to date.

Mr. Speaker, when this body passed legislation to establish the Crime Commission in 1977, I do not believe it intended to create an organization devoted to conducting major investigative efforts. Rather, I believe the Crime Commission was designed to provide a vehicle for citizen input into the state's criminal justice system.

Mr. Speaker, a legislative grant or sanction of authority to the Crime Commission to investigate particular criminal activities may well serve to undermine public faith in those agencies presently invested with the responsibility and authority to investigate crime.

Moreover, the Crime Commission's investigative efforts may substantially duplicate or actually interfere with work already being performed by the county police departments.

Mr. Speaker, perhaps a part of the difficulties which have plagued the Crime Commission can be attributed to confusion over its role and goal. Perhaps the language used to establish the Commission three years ago was too broad to offer effective direction. The bill before us today helps to remedy that situation by re-defining the Crime Commission and clarifying the scope of its power.

Mr. Speaker, the Crime Commission as it currently exists, with large

emphasis on its investigative functions, offers no real service not already available to the public. What is needed, Mr. Speaker, is an organization equipped to conduct broad research on the problems of crime and to educate the public through the issuance of reports and the holding of public hearings on issues of public interest and concern.

Mr. Speaker, the Hawaii Crime Commission should follow the lead of similar bodies in other states and work for concrete achievement toward the development of community oriented services such as victim assistance and witness protection programs, of which we have none.

Mr. Speaker, if the Crime Commission is to have an effective role in the battle against crime in this state, a firm legislative hand must be applied to insure that the realities of the Commission are in tune with the intentions which prompted its establishment.

S.B. No. 1838-80, SD3, HD1 is a step in the right direction. I urge all of my colleagues to vote in favor of this bill. Thank you."

At 1:00 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:01 o'clock p.m.

Representative D. Yamada then rose to speak in favor of S.B. No. 1838-80, SD3, HD1:

"Mr. Speaker, basically when your Judiciary Committee was looking at the Crime Commission as it exists now, there were several guidelines that we were trying to follow. First of all, as has been mentioned before, it was not our intention that the functions of the Commission duplicate functions presently undertaken by other agencies.

It is our belief that criminal investigations should be done by the police.

Secondly, it was not our intention to create a super agency. If you would recall, several years ago, or maybe longer than that, they attempted to create a state organized crime unit whose primary function was to investigate. As most of us will remember, we had to dissolve that unit because of a duplication of effort resulting in the uncooperative environment between the state agency and the police department.

The bill in front of us at this time is not an attempt to emasculate the powers of the Commission, it's really to reaffirm what the Commission has been doing the last three years. At the hearing, when the Commission presented its testimony, they talked about projects and activities they've done in the last three years. They have written reports and done research on wire tapping and then offered that knowledge to the legislature which resulted in us adopting a wire tapping law.

We made research into extortion and looked at our laws as they apply to extortion cases, found where it was deficient, made suggestions, proposed legislation to the legislature which we adopted, studied school violence, something that we always talked about but we just did not know the extent. We have published a report, we have researched gambling and, as a result of that research, they have suggested amendments to the legislature which we have, at this time, not yet adopted; and this, basically, has been their function these last three years.

We also do realize that some investigation as an incident to the research function is necessary and that is why we have referred to that matter in our Committee report. The reason we took it out of the bill was that the law, as presently written, is big and broad and, therefore, we attempted to give more specific direction which really codifies what the Commission has been doing the past several years.

I think, more importantly, let us not forget that we have also reaffirmed the concept that a commission should be a citizens' panel, that such a commission is necessary for citizen input. If we were to change this Commission and make it an investigative unit, then I think we really would have to look at whether we should continue it as a citizens' panel.

The reason I say that is because most of the people in our present agencies which deal with ferreting out crime undertake intensive training, not only on how to find crime or how to investigate crime, but also how to handle confidential matters.

Mr. Speaker, I agree with the citizens' panel and I agree that citizens should continue to participate and this is why we have gone away from SD3, which really made the whole Commission an investigative panel.

Much has been said about reports previously written by the Crime Commission concerning organized crime and inferences that organized crime is in government and other high places, but I really take exception to that. Inferences without facts really screams of McCarthyism and I don't think any of us ever intended that type of error to come back.

So, Mr. Speaker, we have really looked into the function of the Crime Commission, what they've done in the past and where we would like them to go in the future. That's why we have the House bill in front of us in the form that is presented. I urge all members to vote for it. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1838-80, SD3, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII CRIME COMMISSION", passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Lunasco, Marumoto, Sakamoto and Sutton voting no.

## S.B. No. 2253-80, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative Blair, seconded by Representative Shito, S.B. No. 2253-80, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LAND USE", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 1838-80, SD3, HD1 and 2253-80, SD1, HD1 passed Third Reading at 1:07 o'clock p.m.

### S.B. No. 1441, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative Blair, seconded by Representative Shito, S.B. No. 1441, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INDUSTRIAL LOAN COMPANIES", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

### S.B. No. 1897-80, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative Blair, seconded by Representative Uwaine, S.B. No. 1897-80, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC UTILITIES", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 1441, SD1, HD1 and 1897-80, SD1, HD1 passed Third

Reading at 1:08 o'clock p.m.

At 1:09 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:12 o'clock p.m.

#### S.B. No. 2927-80, SD2, HD1:

On motion by Representative D. Yamada, seconded by Representative Segawa, S.B. No. 2927-80, SD2, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MENTAL HEALTH", passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives Evans, Ikeda, Kamalii and Lee voting no.

## S.B. No. 2938-80, HD1:

On motion by Representative D. Yamada, seconded by Representative Honda, S.B. No. 2938-80, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HIGHWAY SAFETY", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 2927-80, SD2, HD1 and 2938-80, HD1 passed Third Reading at 1:13 o'clock p.m.

#### S.B. No. 1831-80, SD1, HD1:

Representative D. Yamada moved that S.B. No. 1831-80, SD1, HD1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Honda.

Representative Evans then rose to speak against this bill:

"Mr. Speaker, the rationale for this bill, as I understand it, is to tighten up the criteria used by judges in sentencing a convicted person to imprisonment and to require a judge to spell out reasons for the imposition of a particular sentence of imprisonment.

The House Draft amends the original bill by reinstating six grounds on which the court may accord weight in favor of withholding a sentence with imprisonment.

The House Draft further deletes the provision which requires the sentencing judge to present written reasons why such a sentence was imposed.

Mr. Speaker, I am against this

bill in its amended form because, more than anything else, it appears to be giving more opportunities for the courts to set someone free, rather than having the opposite effect.

If we go back to the original intent of this bill, we would recall that it was meant to remove from judicial discretion the idea that a prison sentence should be withheld 'unless imprisonment is necessary'. This idea, this superconcern with the welfare of the defendant, seems to be the underlying reason for the changes made in the House Committee. Soon we'll be hearing all the sob stories about how the prison is over-crowded and that we shouldn't be sending more persons over there because of the lack of space.

The problem is the measure before us doesn't even address the seriousness of the crime, it does not take into account the community's fears for its own safety.

I take very strong exception to the reasoning given in the House Committee report which offered rationalizations for why it deleted the judge's justification for withholding a prison sentence.

This paternalistic attitude as expressed in the Committee report professes the belief that the courts and the judges therein are above human weaknesses and incapable of making mistakes. It professes the belief that a judge, in his secret wisdom, may withhold a prison term for a particular convicted offender without having to account for that decision, and it expresses the concern that requiring written explanations of any sentence given by the court would 'further restrict' the sentencing court and 'adds no more to the existing controls and checks upon the discretion of the courts'.

What controls and checks? Have you asked the man in the street lately what he thinks about the sentencing practices of our judges. Anyone who does not realize that the people of this state are losing confidence in the rulings of the courts must be going around with his or her head in a bucket.

By approving this bill, as it is amended, we are contributing further to that loss of confidence in our criminal justice system. We are telling the people of the state of Hawaii that we, in our infinite wisdom, leave it to the judge, in his infinite and private wisdom, to decide when the public should be protected from a criminal offender.

We cannot afford any further disintegration of public confidence, either in our courts or in our legislative system. We would be doing a disservice to the people of Hawaii if we pass this bill. I urge all of you to join me in voting against it. Thank you."

Representative D. Yamada then rose to speak in favor of S.B. No. 1831-80, SD1, HD1:

"Mr. Speaker, very concisely all this bill does is say that when you give a person direction that you use discretion. It would be ridiculous to tell anybody that you have discretion but you have to come to this answer. Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I believe that this bill gives discretion, the proper discretion, to the court. I urge all members to vote for it."

Representative Sutton rose in opposition to this bill:

"Mr. Speaker, you have just heard the learned gentleman from Kauai who heads this Committee say that it is ridiculous not to have a maximum discretion; but you heard the other learned gentleman from Kauai tell us that some that have this discretion have not used this discretion properly.

Now, I would like to resolve the division between these two gentlemen from Kauai by endorsing 100% the remarks of our own State Representative, Faith Evans. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1831-80, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CRIMES", passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Evans and Sutton voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 1831-80, SD1, HD1 passed Third Reading at 1:18 o'clock p.m.

## S.B. No. 2531-80, HD1;

Representative Morioka moved that S.B. No. 2531-80, HD1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Inaba.

Representative Morioka then requested that his remarks in support of this bill be inserted into the Journal; but the Speaker, noting an objection by Representative Kamalii, asked that he personally state his remarks.

Representative Morioka then spoke

in favor of this bill:

"Mr. Speaker, the purpose of this bill is to repeal Section 128 of Act 214, 1979. Section 128 of said Act imposes an encumbrance ceiling of \$110 million as of June 30, 1980, on capital improvement authorizations from the general obligation bond fund made prior to January 1, 1979.

Compliance with the \$110 million encumbrance ceiling has created problems in the allocation of funds for on-going capital improvement projects. Because of heavy capital improvement project allocations and encumbrances in the fiscal years 1978 and 1979, current encumbrance totals are considerably beyond the \$110 million.

As a result, in an attempt to bring the encumbrance totals down to the specified amount, new allotments for capital improvement projects have not been made. This has resulted in the delay of many necessary projects and an accompanying escalation of costs.

Removal of the ceiling proposed by Section 128 would permit the prudent allotment of capital improvement funds for those projects which represent extreme urgency. It is my belief that the current state administration has exercised conservative and responsible fiscal practices both in the expenditure of state funds and in the issuance of general obligation bonds. I am confident that such fiscal practices will continue and believe that the administration is deserving of the flexibility and trust afforded by the repeal of Section 128.

I urge all of my colleagues to vote in favor of this bill."

Representative Sutton then asked the Chair for a ruling stating:

"If I speak against this bill does that mean that I cannot go to the Conference Committee of the whole budget, or just this one bill?"

The Chair answered:

"The Chair is of the opinion that your no vote will be considered in terms of conference committee if this particular measure is agreed upon by the Senate, and no other bill."

Representative Sutton then stated:

"I rest. It's a good bill."

The motion was put by the Chair and

carried, and S.B. No. 2531-80, HD 1 entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET", passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Marumoto voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 2531-80, HD1 passed Third Reading at 1:22 o'clock p.m.

## S.B. No. 2795-80, SD1, HD1:

Representative Morioka moved that S.B. No. 2795-80, SD1, HD1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Inaba.

Representative Marumoto then rose to speak in opposition to S.B. No. 2795-80, SD1, HD1:

"The Constitutional Convention of 1978 amended Article 7, Section 9 of the state constitution to require that the legislature 'establish a general fund expenditure ceiling which shall limit the rate of growth of general fund appropriations to the estimated rate of growth of the state's economy'. This amendment was subsequently ratified by the voters by more than a 2 to 1 margin.

As an attempt to conform the Hawaii Revised Statutes to this amendment, Mr. Speaker, S.B. No. 2795-80 must rank as one of the most useless and illogical measures considered during the current session. It is a clear attempt to frustrate popular sentiment on the issue of limiting government spending and, as such, brings the entire legislative process into disrepute.

The economic factors leading to the recent expenditure ceiling amendment are well known. In a period of rapidly inflating prices, government coffers reap more and more revenue. The Con Con amendment sought to counter this serious problem by tying our state government spending to an unspecified indicator of economic growth. The obvious intention here was to prevent the state from expending the additional revenues generated through inflation.

Very sensibly, Mr. Speaker, the Senate Draft of the bill before us involves defining economic growth in terms of total state personal income. Despite some unavoidable limitations, TPI was the favorite economic growth indicator of the Department of Budget and Finance, the Tax Foundation and Dr. Thomas Hitch of the the First Hawaiian Bank.

The House Draft of S.B. No. 2795-80, however, invites us to define economic growth in terms of general fund revenues. Mr. Speaker, if the matter of government spending were not such a serious one, this proposal would be laughable for, as everyone can see, the present level of general fund revenue is the cause of the problem, not the solution to it.

If it were not for the fact that general fund revenues are growing out of all proportions to real economic growth, there would be no need to impose an expenditure ceiling. If general fund revenues truly reflected real economic growth, there would be no objection to the expenditure of these funds.

The fact is, of course, that they do not and for this reason, it is absolutely ludicrous to define economic growth in terms of revenue.

Mr. Speaker, I urge all members of the House to cast their vote against S.B. No. 2795-80, SD1, HD1 on the grounds that it is absolutely unresponsive to the spirit and intent of the public's expressed desire to establish a general fund expenditure ceiling. Thank you very much."

Representative Andrews then rose to speak in favor of this bill:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill, but with grave reservations. This bill addresses the state spending limit required by our constitution under Article 7, Section 9 which says 'the legislature shall establish a general fund expenditure ceiling which shall limit the rate of growth of general fund appropriations to the estimated rate of the growth of the state's economy as provided by law'.

Mr. Speaker, this bill, as amended from the Senate version circumvents the constitutional revision and ignores the intent of the constitutional convention.

My problem exists with two areas. First, the definition of growth in the state's economy. Your Committee on Finance has changed the Senate definition from personal income to general fund revenue. What this means, Mr. Speaker, is that there is no spending limit. How can we honestly say that the increase in general fund revenue to the state is a spending limit when it was this very increase which has caused the alarm to bring about the

constitutional amendment in the first place. The original Senate bill used personal income, a fair indicator of what the residents and taxpayers have available to them. Increases in personal income as a definition of growth in the state's economy would keep expenditures of this state in line with what our residents and taxpayers are now paying.

Presently, because of our present tax structure and inflation, general fund revenues are increasing at the rate of 1.5 to 1.6 times the amount of the personal income of residents; thus the limit proposed is no limit. It'll continue to place an unnecessary burden on the taxpayers of this state requiring a much larger share of everyone's paycheck as we all get pushed into higher brackets by inflation.

Mr. Speaker, Standing Committee Report No. 66 from your Committee on Taxation from the constitutional convention states that there is strong support in your Committee for using state personal income as a standard. It was argued that a number of experts testifying before your Committee agreed that state personal income was currently the best indicator of the state's ability to support government services and should be included in the constitution itself.

Your Committee on Taxation at the constitutional convention did not include it, only to allow flexibility, not because they disagreed with the index.

Mr. Speaker, the only reasonable spending limit we can propose is one that will keep the increases in state spending in line with the increases in the people's ability to pay. That, Mr. Speaker, is personal income.

My second problem with this bill is the base year. The Senate bill uses the 1978-1979 fiscal year as the base. The bill before us will use this fiscal year as the base. The problem here is that we have before us proposals to tremendously inflate that base. These proposals are for the expenditure of our present surplus funds. These expenditures will increase that base by around \$75 million. This, again, is an attempt to circumvent a ceiling of our present state expenditures. By keeping the base at the fiscal year 1978-1979, we can safely spend the surplus funds without affecting

the base and we could, therefore, proceed with an acceptable and reasonable growth in state expenditures.

Mr. Speaker, because of these problems I have, I hope our Committee on Finance will proceed with caution in its deliberations with the Senate on this matter."

Representative Sutton then rose to speak for this bill, but with immense hypocracy:

"Mr. Speaker, there are four indexes of growth that we could have used. We could have used the consumer price index. We could have used a different base year for personal income. We could have used the latest tax receipts for just one tax and, seeing from that, the base or weighted average that would have given us a new index.

Now, it is true that the constitutional convention passed the buck to us, but we should have recognized that the spirit of Proposition 13 still pervades in California and someday it will reach here and a limit on spending is something that has become far more acute in our lives now that we have such an immense inflationary factor.

It is true that the congress of the United States has the prime responsibility, and the President of the United States, and it is true that when the gentleman who was our favorite actor in Death Valley is President of the United States that at that time, Mr. Speaker, he will put limitations on spending and stop this inflation, but he will need the help of local legislators to do it and when we took personal income out of the Senate bill and stuck in general revenue, we were thwarting the plans for a balanced budget, a stop in inflation which former governor Ronald Reagan wishes to introduce. Thank you."

Representative Lacy then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, with your permission, I'd like to have the remarks of Representative Andrews be my remarks and placed in the record."

The Chair, noting no objection, so ordered.

Representative Morioka then rose to speak in favor of S.B. No. 2795-80, SD1, HD1:

"The purpose of this bill is to conform the Hawaii Revised Statutes to the provisions of Article 7, Sections 8 and 9 of the state constitution as amended by the constitutional convention of 1978 and ratified by the voters.

This bill provides that state growth shall be determined by averaging the annual percentage change in the total general fund revenue for the three calendar years immediately preceding the calendar year before the session of the legislature making appropriations from the general funds. The applicable state growth rate will determine the expenditure ceiling for each fiscal year by increasing the prior year's expenditure ceiling by that percentage.

Much testimony has been presented in both the 1979 and 1980 sessions of the legislature on the various indicators of state growth. Use of the general fund revenues as the indicator has the following advantages: (1) date on general fund revenues are available on an extremely timely basis, usually within 30 days from the close of the appropriate time period; (2) the general fund revenues are easily computed and understood; (3) the general fund revenues are indicative of the state's ability to pay.

Although some concerns have been expressed that the general fund revenues are not the true indicator of economic growth, it is my belief that the true economic indicator would be unnecessarily complex to compute and understand.

For these reasons, I am in full support of S.B. No. 2795-80, SD1, HD1 and ask all of you to join me in voting for this measure."

The motion was put by the Chair and S.B. No. 2795-80, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE BUDGETARY PROCESS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Evans, Ikeda, Kamalii and Marumoto voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 2795-80, SD1, HD1 passed Third Reading at 1:35 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 814-80 on S.B. No. 2557-80, SD2, HD2:

Representative Morioka moved that S.B. No. 2557-80, SD2, HD2 be recommitted to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Inaba.

Representative Uwaine then asked Representative Morioka what the purpose of recommitting this bill was.

Representative Morioka answered:

"The Senate has passed the same measure on Third Reading."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2557-80, SD2, HD2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING AND LOAN PROGRAMS, CHAPTER 356, HAWAII REVISED STATUTES", was recommitted to the Committee on Finance, notwithstanding the report of the Committee.

A communication from the Senate (Sen. Com. No. 453) returning House Bill No. 2944-80, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES", which passed Third Reading in the Senate on March 31, 1980, in an amended form, was placed on file.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 1944-80, HD 2, as amended by the Senate, was placed on the Clerk's desk, and in accordance with Article III, Section 16, of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, printed copies of H.B. No. 2944-80, HD 2, SD 2, were made available to the members of the House at 11:00 o'clock a.m.

At this time, the Chair reminded all members "to be prepared to disagree on Thursday if there are any bills that the committee wishes to disagree on."

The following introductions were then made to the members of the House:

Representative Hagino introduced 33 students (3 and 4 year olds) from Mother Rice School. They were accompanied by their teachers, Ms. Bernice Mitsunaga and Miss Lois Stemlosk; Cheryl Chang, volunteer assistant; and two parents, Mrs. Amy Noguchi and Mrs. Grace Shiota.

Representative Kihano introduced Dr. Edward Falces, a plastic surgeon, "who I grew up with in Waipahu and who is now practicing in San Francisco." He was accompanied by Shelly and Dr. Eduardo Carvalho from Brazil.

Representative Kihano then remarked that Representative Kunimura may need the services of Dr. Falces whereupon Representative Kunimura responded:

"In answer to Mr. Kihano, I don't think I have any problem with my face. I think I am aging pretty well but I have a problem with my chest and if Dr. Falces can do some plastic surgery to lift my chest for me and if I may go a little further, Mr. Speaker, I have been called fat, and I have been called everything under the sun here in the chambers, but actually, my problem is height. If I were six feet, five inches, I would be just right."

The Chair added that "it is not only your chest, but probably your opu."

#### SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative K. Yamada, seconded by Representative Evans and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering certain congratulatory resolutions.

#### INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

At this time, the Clerk read H.C.R. No. 118, extending the most profound mahalo of the people of Hawaii to Jack Lord, a living legend in his own time, for his innumerable and lasting contributions to Hawaii and its people, which was adopted by the House of Representatives on Friday, March 28, 1980.

Representative Kunimura then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker and members of this House, it is very rare that we are honored to have such a beautiful person as Mr. Lord visit the chambers here. Personally, I have not had the privilege and pleasure of meeting this very, very great man until a few minutes ago this morning and if I may, Mr. Speaker, use some of the time of this House to publicly and personally ask Mr. Jack Lord for his acceptance of my apology because I guess in life, many times we are misunderstood so often and almost for sure we are always knocked down when we succeed in life. Not having had the privilege of knowing Mr. Lord, I have had many people tell me about, I guess, the negative side of this beautiful person -we all do have negative side.

Mr. Lord is not one who comes out and glad hand everyone. You hardly see him around the place; he never comes to the Legislature to ask for any favors. You hardly see him except on television and I almost immediately accepted and, as a truth, all the things said were correct and I became very curious, Mr. Speaker, on our tour of the Latin American and South American countries, when everywhere we went, as soon as they found out we were from Hawaii, immediately, even the illiterate peons would ask us about Hawaii's synchosido and also in the Philippines and all over the rest of the places I've visited, Jack Lord and Hawaii Five-O preceded us.

Mr. Speaker, making a research for this resolution, I found out that Jack Lord is a warm, understanding and kind person and for that, Mr. Speaker, I would like to have my apology accepted and that so often in life, we see people give a lot but they give a lot with a lot of publicity. Mr. Lord is a true and honest Christian giver because all of the things he has done for the people of Hawaii and the less fortunate of Hawaii, he has done truthfully and truly like the Christian in a very silent and quiet way."

Representative Kunimura then presented Mr. Jack Lord to the members of the House and audience. Accompanying Mr. Lord was Mr. Henry Wong.

A red carnation lei was then presented to Mr. Lord by Representative Hashimoto and Representative Peters presented him with a certified copy of the concurrent resolution.

Representative Sutton then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I have known this honoree for twelve years and he has attended Hula Bowls with me and because he played full-back for New York University, he is more knowledgeable than I am about football. He has helped our program here at the University of Hawaii. He is a great athlete himself and I can tell you that from the athletic community, he is greatly renowned but we never read about what he did at New York University and I can tell you that one time, he made a fumble in a very crucial play. He was touched by the opposition and he recovered it; he made ten yards and first down.

Thank you."

At 11:21 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair, "for the purpose of extending our personal mahalo and best wishes to our honoree."

Upon reconvening at 11:30 o'clock a.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives Dods and D. Yamada.

Having had no response from the Chair, Representative Larsen again repeated, "Mr. Speaker, this is the first day of passover."

The Chair then said:

"It is very difficult to hear."

One day, he was notified by the hospital to come on over right away so as he went over, his doctor interviewed him and said, 'John, you have a very rare opportunity; first time in the history, as I can remember, there are three hearts available that they donated. And one heart belonged to a very young and vigorous athlete; the other, Mr. Speaker, belonged to a prostitute, and the third heart belonged to a very old but healthy banker. So he said, 'you may have your choice today', and this young man, and I cannot reveal his name, but anyway, he decided to choose the banker and the doctor was puzzled because the other two hearts were young and very, you know, vigorous, good life to live, and so the doctor asked this young man, 'How come you chose the banker's heart? You know I told you he's an old, old man, and he said, 'Well, doctor, the young athlete, you know, he

burns himself out with all that vigorous physical work, and the prostitute has too big a heart, and the reason why I chose this old banker is because bankers don't use their heart. . .very little, that means, you know, almost brand new.'

Well, Mr. Speaker, that may have been in the old days but today we have in Hawaii, and I believe only in Hawaii, a different kind of banking community where people like Mr. Hughson do participate in community activities and give of themselves and their pocketbook to the welfare of all the less fortunate, and on Kauai we have something like less than 35,000 people. To raise the thousand dollars. . .more than a thousand dollars in walkathon is some going because we don't have that many companies and we don't have that many big donors, and I can honestly say that it took a lot of work only to get those pledges for over a thousand dollars, and on top of that, this gentleman walked seventeen miles. I was offered, Mr. Speaker, four years ago, that they would give up to about ten thousand dollars if I would walk three miles and I couldn't finish, so seventeen miles is a fete and may I, Mr. Speaker, with your permission, introduce a very fine banker from Kauai, Mr. David Hughson."

"The bill does not take care of the situation, whether it's negligence on the part of the operator, and the key gets into the hand of a thief who steals the car and then you're liable for the car and the damage he does, and you have a third party liability. This is a very serious omission that we could have taken care of at this time.

So, rather than put poor legislation on the books, I would ask you to vote no."

The motion was put by the Chair and S.B. No. 2676-80, SD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOTOR VEHICLE INSURANCE", passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Sutton voting no and Representatives Anderson and Garcia being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 2676-80, SD1 passed Third Reading at 11:51 o'clock a.m.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12: 25 o'clock p.m.

At this time, the Speaker assumed the rostrum.

Representatives Kiyabu and Kawakami, for the Committees on State General Planning and Water, Land Use, Development and Hawaiian Affairs, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 927-80) recommending that H.C.R. No. 60, as amended in HD1, be adopted.

Representative Sutton then rose to speak against the adoption of this resolution:

"Mr. Speaker, water is man's greatest need. Water is Hawaii's greatest need.

Mr. Speaker, we're running out of water. In the famous 'Rhyme of the Ancient Mariner' it says 'water, water everywhere and not a drop to drink. Water, water everywhere and the very water did stink'.

Mr. Speaker, if we do not comprehensively move at this particular level, this is the appropriate level, to do something about water, we are going to find ourselves in a position where this archipelago of beautiful islands that Mark Twain said never anchored in any sea were such beautiful islands as the Hawaiian, but if we increase our population, if we allow very poorly coordinated system on water, if we allow agriculture to compete with the industrials, the industrials to compete with the residential, we're going to find ourselves in a position of no return.

Mr. Speaker, we're almost there now. What is known as the Pearl Harbor Basin water supply is now being diminished, never to be replaced. There is only one spot on these islands that has a proper source of water and that comes on the island of Kauai, and that has never been developed. That is the wettest spot on earth.

Now, Mr. Speaker, we have before us a great opportunity and we did not grasp it. The constitutional convention mandated something that has not been implemented. Here is an opportunity in this resolution to grapple with the facts. Instead, we have broad generalities and we do not define priorities.

And so, Mr. Speaker, I would ask you to please vote against this."

On motion by Representative Kiyabu, seconded by Representative Fukunaga

and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 60, HD1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION RELATING TO A WATER RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT FUNCTIONAL PLAN", was adopted, with Representatives Evans, Kamalii and Sutton voting no.

Representatives Kiyabu and Uechi, for the Committees on State General Planning and Agriculture, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 928-80) recommending that H.C.R. No. 59, as amended in HD1, be adopted.

On motion by Representative Kiyabu, seconded by Representative Inaba and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.C.R. No. 59, HDl, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION RELATING TO AN AGRICULTURE FUNCTIONAL PLAN", was adopted, with Representative Sutton voting no.

Representatives Kiyabu and Kawakami, for the Committees on State General Planning and Water, Land Use, Development and Hawaiian Affairs, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 929-80) recommending that H.C.R. No. 66, as amended in HD1, be adopted.

On motion by Representative Kiyabu, seconded by Representative Kawakami and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.C.R. No. 66, HD1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION RELATING TO A STATE RECREATION FUNCTIONAL PLAN", was adopted, with Representative Sutton voting no.

Representatives Kiyabu and Morioka, for the majority of the Committees on State General Planning, Tourism and Finance, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 930-80) recommending that H.C.R. No. 8, as amended in HD1, be adopted.

Representative Sutton then rose to speak against H.C.R. No. 8, HD1:

"Mr. Speaker, the primary purpose of this resolution was to adopt some type of a state tourism plan that would allow a basic concept of how Hawaii's most important industry would fit in.

In January of this year, the Department of Planning and Economic Development submitted a plan to us as some sort of a reference from which to work. We labored and we came forth with a mouse. We labored and we came forth without a recognition of what this industry means to this state where 70% of all revenue comes from the tourist industry, where sugar and pineapple are no longer major industries, where the military makes really no contribution. They buy their food from their PX's, they do not pay our taxes; they use our roads, but they make no contribution. We do get the benefit of civilian workers at Pearl Harbor and Wheeler Field and the United States Marine Corps Base at Kaneohe, but these are minor.

Tourism is our future. Tourism is our destiny and as I said, Mr. Speaker, we labored and labored and came forth with a mouse.

Therefore, I would ask you to vote against this measure."

Representative Kiyabu then rose to speak on H.C.R. No. 8, HD1 as well as in behalf of H.C.R. No. 60, HD1; H.C.R. No. 59, HD1 and H.C.R. No. 66, HD1:

"Although only H.C.R. No. 8, HD1, is before us now, I would like to have my remarks incorporated in the Journal for the three previous resolutions we have adopted. Mr. Speaker, I realize that it is highly unusual to speak in favor of four concurrent resolutions at once; however, I believe in this case, my action is justified.

To address all four functional plans together represents the approach your five Standing Committees have taken. Under the State Planning Act, plans for 12 identified areas of governmental activity were to be developed and submitted to the legislature. These individual plans are necessary to carry out the statewide goals set forth in Act 100, 1978.

Therefore, Mr. Speaker, your Committees had the task of deciding which of these 12 plans we should take action on this session, and which ones could be put off for further study and possible action next year. As I mentioned earlier, Mr. Speaker, the review and discussion of these functional plans involved no less than five Standing Committees of this House, some 34 out of the 51 members sitting here today. That comes to two-thirds the membership of the House, and I think that alone says a lot. We've learned much from our deliberations and exchanges with each other.

There are individual members who have strong feelings about one or another of these plans, but enough of us decided to use these four functional plans as a core group to guide and direct us in the review and evaluation of the other eight functional plans. These four plans should be viewed as a 'base line' because they significantly affect the future uses of our islands' land and water resources. If we know what we want to do with our land and our water, then we'll know how to proceed with everything else. Therefore, two of these plans, the water resources development functional plan and agriculture functional plan serve as the center, the heart, of this basic group of plans. These plans. recognize the need to preserve and protect our islands' limited water and agricultural land uses.

It is our belief that these four plans, taken together, address the major concerns expressed by the people at our numerous public hearings. We believe that the combination of these four documents can achieve a realistic and harmonious balance between providing economic opportunities in Hawaii and protecting our state's limited water, agricultural and recreational resources.

One of the purposes of our Hawaii State Plan was to establish the spirit of integrated planning. In the same way, Mr. Speaker, the merits of these plans should be evaluated. It is an integrated package of programs and directions. Too often in the

past we have looked at problems in isolation. We have expended great effort to address a single problem in one specific area, only to cause problems in other areas.

Therefore, I would like to urge members of the House not to lose sight of the larger picture and purpose behind our State Planning Act.

This is an innovative piece of planning legislation which we can all be proud of, but which we must now make work for us the way it should.

By acting on these concurrent resolutions, we serve public notice that we are taking the task of directing the future growth of the state seriously. By acting on these concurrent resolutions, we will be taking another giant step toward implementing the Hawaii State Plan and fulfilling the promise of that Plan. It gives us the chance to legislate in a more integrated fashion.

One thing, Mr. Speaker, I must mention is the tourism functional plan. The adoption of this particular plan will finally provide some management direction for our visitor industry. We have long needed to make this industry work for all of our residents in a manner which is consistent with the long-term beneficial use of Hawaii's natural resources.

In closing, Mr. Speaker, I would like to thank the members of the Committees on State General Planning, Agriculture, Tourism, Finance and Water, Land Use, Development and Hawaiian Affairs and numerous resource people who have been involved in the tedious preparation, review and modification of the functional plans for agriculture, water resources development, tourism and recreation.

It has not been an easy task. Every step has required breaking new ground. We've checked around and found there is no other state legislature which is at the point we are at in planning legislation and I believe that this is happening because Hawaii is such a special

place and we, as public policymakers, recognize this and are taking the responsibility to preserve this special quality.

I, therefore, urge all of my colleagues to vote in favor of H.C.R. No. 8, HD1, as you have for H.C.R. No. 60, HD1; H.C.R. No. 59, HD1 and H.C.R. No. 66, HD1. Thank you."

Representative Takitani rose to speak against H.C.R. No. 8, HD1:

"Mr. Speaker, contrary to what many people may think or have heard, I am not against tourism nor am I against tourists. I believe the visitor industry has been beneficial to Hawaii in very many ways. It has provided jobs, promoted local airline growth, stimulated small business, attracted investments from all over the world and yielded tax revenue to pay for needed public programs.

But, Mr. Speaker, the industry has now reached a point where it is necessary to carefully plan its future. We need to protect and preserve it and make sure that as it continues to thrive, it is operating in harmony with the needs and lifestyles of the residents of Hawaii.

I want to see a quality visitor industry in Hawaii and I believe that the best way to accomplish this is to declare a moritorium on its growth. If growth controls are not instituted, we could find ourselves facing an industry of quantity and no quality.

I do not believe the projected growth figures that the tourism plan is based on will provide us with a reasonable base of control. These figures merely accommodate tourism growth. A wise plan should state, as a policy, zero growth and then should address programs and projects designed to promote quality in our visitor industry.

Mr. Speaker, proponents of tourism growth say that it is the only industry that will generate enough jobs for our future population. DPED's population projection showed that with zero growth in tourism which would

be staying at the approximately 4 million visitors per year, Hawaii could stay at a resident population of under 1 million people through the year 2000; but if tourism occurs at what DPED calls the most likely level of growth, we will have almost 1.2 million residents by the year 2000.

What an analysis of these projections says, Mr. Speaker, is that tourism will create a growing population which, in turn, will create a demand for more jobs and most of these jobs can, in turn, only be provided by tourism. It sounds to me like a very self-fulfilling prophecy, Mr. Speaker.

Together with the well-known arguments against a heavy reliance on the tourist industry such as inflation, an uncertain economy, rising fuel costs, increase in air fares, we can add this self-fulfilling prophecy.

It's clear that what we have underlying the industry's growth projections to meet future employment needs is a circular and very soft argument. Jobs are needed for Hawaii residents, but expansion of the visitor industry is not the answer. We must channel our economic growth to our ultimate industries such as aquaculture, diversified energy production, agriculture and electronics.

Granted, these are not labor intensive industries, but if we adopt a zero growth policy, we will not need to generate as many jobs as claimed. We should cap the growth of the visitor industry and place more emphasis on these alternative industries.

We have all been told that Hawaii needs to keep itself in competition with other resort areas such as Mexico City, the Bahamas and other warm, attractive places. To me, it doesn't make sense to expand the industry to the point where the warmth and attractiveness of our islands deteriorate.

The pressures of expansion will do this to our limited resources.

All the advertising campaigns in the world cannot hide the truth once a visitor gets here and sees what is really happening. These pressures are already apparent in our state's competing uses of our public facilities, parks and beaches. As added pressures, we are now facing increased crime rates directed toward our visitors.

These visitors are the prime targets for prostitution, theft and physical violence. We are even getting national coverage on this very subject.

About a month ago, in the New York Times, March 9, to be exact, they devoted a half page article to describing the types of crime committed against tourists here in Hawaii.

One of the sub-headings read, Image of America's Fiftieth State as the Paradise of the Pacific Marred by Attacks on Tourists'.

Zero growth in the visitor industry will likely mean a moratorium on hotels and resort condominium construction. We can limit hotel and resort condominium construction through zoning regulations, land use restrictions and even, possibly, with more study, a certificate of need type of authority. After all, Mr. Speaker, times change, needs change, and our job is to make public policy to meet these needs.

Population projections and visitor projections are linked to each other and limiting hotels and resort condominiums can possibly help to curb the population growth of our islands. It is our responsibility. To do otherwise is to encourage the industry's growth and accommodate those who will economically benefit from it.

I don't believe that we seriously want to see more jumbo jets, more packaged tours and wall-to-wall hotels and condos along our shores.

Mr. Speaker, I realize it is a fact that with or without tourism our population will increase. With or without tourism we will have inmigration. After all, this is one of the best places in the world to live. But, because of this very fact, Mr. Speaker, we must adopt a zero growth policy for the visitor industry.

Only then can our island resources support our community without straining at the seams. We are at a transition point in our economic development. We need to encourage every developing industry because tourism alone cannot do the job.

We can have a strong, viable, quality visitor industry. We can have jobs for the future. We can preserve our open space, our lands, our beaches and our Hawaiian lifestyle. We can have all of this if we put the brakes on tourism right now.

Mr. Speaker, I've said this many times before and I'll say it just one more time today, if we live by tourism alone, I believe we'll certainly die by tourism. I mean that spiritually as well as environmentally and economically. Hawaii, as we know it, will cease to exist. Thank you."

Representative Andrews then rose to speak in favor of H.C.R. No. 8, HD1:

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, the question before us is to proceed or not to proceed with the functional plan for our most important and fragile industry, tourism.

I, too, share much of the concern of my colleague from the Valley Isle. Tourism has continued too long in an unplanned and haphazard manner and this has brought about many undesirable impacts on our community.

Mr. Speaker, not to proceed with this plan will only compound the problem. This plan before us is the first step in addressing the problems and benefits of tourism providing us with a means to direct the industry in a way that the problems can be kept to a minimum and the benefits to a maximum.

It is true that this plan does not solve all of our problems, but then, this is not the purpose of a plan. It is a guide for us to follow in our future deliberations and it provides that we take a hard and critical

look at the adverse effects of tourism. It proposes that we try to answer the very questions brought up by my colleagues.

Not to adopt this resolution is only to allow the present problems before us to continue. I urge all members of this body to take this much needed step and proceed with the adoption of House Concurrent Resolution No. 8, HD1."

Representative Anderson also rose to speak in favor of this resolution:

"Originally, Mr. Speaker, I was going to speak against the resolution because there were portions of it that I didn't agree with; but, like Representative Andrews said, this is a very important resolution.

We keep saying tourism. The tourists did not build Hawaii the way it is. It was poor planning on our part. We are the ones at fault, not the tourists.

The types of airports that we put up, the types of buildings that we put up, that's our fault. We can't go to a zero plan. A planned growth is what we need and this is what this resolution is about. We are going to have to evaluate what we are doing.

The attacks on tourists that come out in the newspapers is a small part of the crimes that go on in this city. We are a large city. It doesn't come out and say residents attacked in the headlines that the tourists get. Not very long ago, if you remember, there was a big article in Canada. A tourist from Hawaii was attacked and that hit the headlines. Anytime that you have something that's sensational, the newspapers will pick it up; but anytime that we do something like this here and we keep saying it's the tourists fault, it's not. It's our fault. We have to plan properly and we have to look at what we're doing and make sure that we do a good job.

I hope that my colleagues will vote in favor of this. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kunimura then spoke in favor of H.C.R. No. 8, HD1:

"Mr. Speaker, this state has had landmark legislation such as the Land Use Commission, we've had the Agriculture Coordinator established, and many others. Enough has been said about this resolution, but I would like to say this, Mr. Speaker, Mr. Anderson has just hit the nail on the head.

Our problems today are because we didn't have any plan. The Land Use Commission went all over the place, one agency working diametrically opposed to another agency, because we did not have any plan.

For the first time, Mr. Speaker, we are going to have something that is tangible, something everyone can read and interpret without going about by heresay or going about by scratching one's back, to have one's back scratched, and I would like to say this, Mr. Speaker, I am very, very proud to have had the opportunity to serve on this Committee for two terms.

This House is very unique. Because of the special problems of the youth and the elderly, we established a special Committee to address these problems. Now, only a few years back, we established the State General Planning Committee and its Chairman has worked very hard. I must say this, Mr. Speaker, because he's a special individual who spends long, long hours here and works very hard, and the kind of product he has produced for us to look over before we put our signature, he has solicited input from each and every individual member of the Committee and all those who want to have input and he has always been open minded; and I'd like to say this, Mr. Speaker, Hawaii is going to lead the nation because of the things we are doing and we learn from our mistakes. We do not sweep it under the carpet.

I urge all members, when they vote for this resolution, that it be a vote of confidence in the Chairman of this Committee. Thank you."

At 12:50 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:05 o'clock p.m.

Representative Sakamoto then rose to speak against H.C.R. No. 8, HD1:

"Mr. Speaker, before I proceed to explain why I am against the adoption of the state tourism functional plan, I want to make it very clear that I'm not against our visitor industry or against the idea that we need to establish a plan to guide the future direction and development of tourism in Hawaii.

During the past 20 years, Mr. Speaker, tourism has played a very important role in the development of our economy. It has been a major source of employment for both old and new residents. It has been a very good employment alternative and I would like it to continue to remain a major economic force in Hawaii. As I look ahead into the 1980's and 1990's, I want to see a visitor industry for Hawaii that will be known for its quality and Aloha spirit.

But, Mr. Speaker, what I see, instead, is an industry that is trying to serve too many tourists, that's too concerned with making a 'fast buck', that's becoming too slick and too commercial. Under the growth rate set forth in this tourism functional plan, Mr. Speaker, this is what will happen.

In reviewing this functional plan, I have become very disillusioned and disappointed with how it perceives the future development of tourism in Hawaii. This functional plan projects our annual visitor count as increasing from approximately 4 million in 1979 to about 6.4 million in 1990. That represents an increase of 2.4 million people annually visiting our islands.

Mr. Speaker, Hawaii can afford

to live without this type of increase. Where are we going to put all these people? Are we going to wipe out more beaches and shoreline property so that these visitors can have a place to stay and relax? We already have too many competing demands for the use of our beaches, parks and other public facilities and other areas.

What I'm saying, Mr. Speaker, is that the projected growth rate for tourism as proposed by this functional plan is much too high. By supporting a 5% annual growth rate between 1980 and 1985 and a 4% annual growth rate between 1986 and 1990, we are surely asking for a lot of problems.

Technologically, we have the capability of accommodating any projected tourism growth rate we want; however, by imposing such large numbers of tourists on our community during this short period of time, we will only get more of a negative reaction toward tourism. As this happens, future legislators will be subjected to more questioning regarding the value and role of tourism in Hawaii.

I believe we should adopt a functional plan with a growth rate which is not only considerably lower, but something we can realistically live with. In this way, private and public facilities and, most important, the people of Hawaii will not be overwhelmed by more than 6 million tourists a year.

Another major objection I have regarding the functional plan is that it does not contain any specific strategies or implementing action to guarantee that the plan's projected annual growth rate will not be exceeded during the next ten years. Whatever the annual growth rates are to be, shouldn't it include specific measures which will keep it here; otherwise, why have a plan? Another thing it doesn't have is a set of strategies or activities specifically designed to ensure quality in our visitor industry.

I am a strong believer that if

we are to plan for something, then we should know exactly how we are going to achieve it. If we are not clear about the manner in which we are to proceed, then I say we're in a lot of trouble. The state tourism functional plan is a nice descriptive document, but has been unable to address these basic concerns I have raised.

Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I urge all members of the House to reject this tourism functional plan, otherwise we will lose touch with our goal of making a visitor's stay a memorable and rewarding experience, one in which they can take home our spirit of Aloha, or what's left of it."

Representative de Heer then rose to speak in favor of H.C.R. No. 8, HD1:

"Mr. Speaker, there is one thing that we all should be aware of today and that is that the leisure time industry, not only in Hawaii but in the world, is going to be the number one industry, if it isn't already, in the future.

Therefore, this plan presents a mere framework, a constructive and positive framework, for planning in the future and it can address the various concerns that have been raised.

The representative from Maui and the representative from Waimanalo are concerned individuals and their concerns come from their heart and I appreciate their concern, but to put an artificial ceiling on growth is an improper planning tool and should not be used and certainly should not be written into a document which is considered by some to be the most important document in the state after our constitution.

We can accommodate an increased growth rate in tourism without building voluminous additional facilities. If you look at the hotel room occupancy figures for the past year, particularly on the outer islands, you will find that some hotels are barely 50% full. If you increase it to 75% you have

a growth in tourism in terms of numbers of tourists but without increased development.

This plan, if used properly, will be able to facilitate this kind of growth and at the same time, they can take those concerns into consideration.

There are alternatives to our future, but the best bet, by far, is tourism in the sense that we are stuck with it, I think it's a positive thing that we are stuck with it because it's an industry that is essentially a clean industry if used properly. There are a lot of statements made that we want quality tourism and the plan does not make the framework for quality tourism. I have yet to hear a definition of what quality tourism really is and I think in this room, today, there are 51 definitions of what is a quality tourism plan or legislation that develops quality tourism.

However, in the future we can address this using the mechanism set up inside the plan and come up with some agreement as to the values and policies that make up what is a quality tourist and if, in fact, it is a direction that we should take.

The remarks from the representative from Kapahulu are well taken and I believe that the plan, the first in the nation, should be supported by every member of this body. Thank you."

Representative Silva then rose to speak in favor of H.C.R. No. 8, HD1:

"I speak in favor, Mr. Speaker, being a young legislator, and I'm very proud to be a member of this legislative body and this system that we have in the state of Hawaii because it proves we do have some democracy.

I hear my colleagues having some concern and if he only had this functional plan 20 years ago, we might have been able to settle some of the concerns that we have today.

Also, Mr. Speaker, I feel that not all 51 members can come to a settlement; but it's because of functional plans like this that might not have all of the needs of all of us or the concerns of our constituents out there, but I also feel that this functional plan will definitely make us be aware that it is something very important and I think we all have the same goal in mind and that goal is to have a better Hawaii for us and for the people who come to visit. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Sutton then rose in rebuttal:

"Mr. Speaker, if an ancient mariner who stoppeth one of three, by the long grey beard and glinting eye, now wherefor stoppeth he me?

I listened to the learned gentleman from Kapahulu and he talks about Act 100. If I would refer him, therefore, to section 226-1, Overall Goals, Objectives and Policies. This is an Act, Mr. Speaker, passed under your jurisdiction as Speaker of this House and it was welcomed as something very much needed.

We said that the legislature finds that there is a need to improve the planning process in this state, to increase the effectiveness of public and private action, to improve coordination between different agencies and levels of government, I assume that means getting along with the county of Honolulu which doesn't seem to always be the case.

We started out with a magnificent theme, the Hawaii State Planning Act, and this has received tremendous applause throughout our nation. We are unique. We had a unique idea; we passed a tremendous concept of planning and economic development. We established goals. We established a whole concept of priorities.

Mr. Speaker, nowhere do I see priorities set in this tourism resolution. What is a resolution? It does not have the force and effect of law. A resolution is something that you have to put into this legislature if you forgot to file a bill on time.

A resolution is a very inept way of accomplishing the mission that we were mandated to do. We have not come forth with what is required.

Tempes Fuget. Time is elapsing. Look at your beautiful museum and right above it, what do you have. You have the Admiral Thomas Towers. There is an injunctive procedure to stop the Admiral Thomas because that wasn't part of an overall development; now, go look down there and see what you'd have to do to stop the Admiral Thomas. You couldn't do it. Do you call that coordination? All that Admiral Thomas was built after we put this state plan in.

Mr. Speaker, that's the way we are on the entire Hawaiian Islands. Look at the tremendous amount of asphalt we have laid on this island without any concept of what the future is and yet you can't get people across the Koolau Range properly.

Mr. Speaker, tourism is not only our destiny, but as the gentleman from Manoa said, it is a clean and quality thing. I invite you, Mr. Speaker, if you want to know quality tourism, come spend the night in my hotel; that's quality tourism.

But, Mr. Speaker, you don't get quality tourism if you walk 150 yards up onto Kalakaua, you'll get the most awful pornography you ever saw, don't go into one of those massage parlors. Waikiki's got the largest VD clinic in the world.

Mr. Speaker, we are not attacking this problem. We're doing it by resolution. You know that Nero fiddled while Rome burned. Do not fiddle, Mr. Speaker. Do not let Rome burn."

Representative Ikeda rose to speak in favor of H.C.R. No. 8, HD1, but with some reservations:

"There are several things that bother me about H.C.R. No. 8, HD1, Mr. Speaker. The question that was raised by the previous speaker, and that question has been asked time and again and still not answered. Is this concurrent resolution an extension of Act 100 and therefore does it have the force and effect of law?

We seem to have a great deal of disagreement on this. I personally believe it does but we still don't have an opinion from the Attorney General and must proceed on that basis.

In any event, we are making some heavy committments by passing this document. For example, Mr. Speaker, I call to your attention Policy A(3) and Implementing Action A(3)(b) which says policies improve the quality of existing visitor destination areas and the implementing action, recommend and prioritize capital improvement program expenditures for site improvements and off-site amenities to preserve existing and planned resort designated areas. I'm not certain that I'm ready to take that step.

Also, Mr. Speaker, Policy A(4) which states encourage greater cooperation between the public and private sectors in developing and maintaining well-designed and adequately serviced visitor industry and related developments; and the Implementing Action under that to institute more expeditious resort development approval systems at the state and county levels. I have some very grave reservations about both of those policy statements; but because at this point in time I feel a plan is probably better than no plan at all and because there is still time to modify the language and re-work some of this, I will vote in favor of it. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

On motion by Representative Kiyabu, seconded by Representative Morioka and carried, the joint report of the majority of the Committees was adopted and H.C.R. No. 8, HD1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION RELATING TO A TOURISM FUNCTIONAL PLAN", was adopted, with Representatives Evans, Kamalii, Sakamoto, Sutton and Takitani voting no.

Representative Blair, for the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 931-80) recommending that S.B. No. 1951-80, SD1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Shito, seconded by Representative K. Yamada and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1951-80, SD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INTOXICATING LIQUOR", passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading Friday, April 11, 1980.

Representative Kunimura then rose to speak against H.B. No. 2168-80, HD1, SD1:

"Mr. Speaker, I spoke against and voted against this bill when it passed the House, and with the Senate amendment it is still, I feel, an improper bill at this time.

If I may, Mr. Speaker, without getting into personalities, say that this bill portrays a kind of Peter, with the finger in the dike bill. We don't have any emergency, Mr. Speaker. This bill is the kind of panic legislation because if something happened, and I'd like to say, Mr. Speaker, I do agree that we need to clarify the essential workers provision under the collective bargaining act but to do it without having a careful and considerate study during the interim when we have the opportunity, because all of the contracts negotiated and ratified by the unions and the state of Hawaii is history and we will not be facing this, we have the time now to do a good job and I feel that if we had an emergency situation and conditions were such that negotiations were coming up and we had to clarify this, Mr. Speaker, I'd be the first one to support such a legislation; but to do this without having the proper input

of all concerned, I feel is not proper at this time and I, therefore, urge all members to vote against this bill."

Representative Sutton also rose to speak against H.B. No. 2168-80, HD1, SD1:

"Mr. Speaker, the basic concept that we are attempting to do is to define what constitutes an essential position; but what we have done is to make a strange distinction. We have said here is an essential position and then whoever fills that particular job, no matter who they are, they are encompassed by this statute.

Now, Mr. Speaker, as you know, all criminal statutes that have any inhibitions of the nature of criminal penalties always must watch out for that vagueness. If we say that the position, itself, regardless of who's filling it, in a statute, we have had a degree of vagueness that does not allow the individual proper notice that he, himself, is liable to a contempt citation.

We have made a very unfortunate distinction here. We should not talk in terms of the position and whoever may be filling it because whoever may be filling it may not only be ignorant of it, but may not be essential because of his knowledge of how to perform an essential function; so the Senate amendment has distorted this worse than ever.

Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I would ask that you vote against this bill. Thank you."

Representative Stanley then asked that the Journal reflect her previous comments in favor of H.B. No. 2168-80, HD1, SD1 when it passed the House on Third Reading. The Chair, noting no objections, so ordered. (See Journal for March 11, 1980)

The motion was put by the Chair and H.B. No. 2168-80, HD1, SD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RE-LATING TO COLLECTIVE BARGAINING", having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 43 ayes

to 8 noes, with Representatives Baker, de Heer, Evans, Fukunaga, Kamalii, Kunimura, Sutton and Takamine voting no.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 2191-80, HD1, as amended by the Senate, was taken from the Clerk's desk.

Representative Stanley moved that the House agree to the amendments proposed by the Senate to H.B. No. 2191-80, HD1, and H.B. No. 2191-80, HD1, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Kunimura.

Representative Sutton then rose to speak against H.B. No. 2191-80, HD1, SD1:

"Mr. Speaker, what the Senate did was to just include federal employees also under this. Now we have aliens armed on the county level, the state level and the federal level.

You know, Mr. Speaker, that in London the policeman, even in that fog and shrouded area of London where the fogs are so thick that you are in constant jeopardy, that they carry only sticks. They do not carry side arms; and here we pass legislation, Mr. Speaker, which is going to allow aliens to carry side arms, they'll have a shell in the chamber and they can pull that trigger and kill.

Mr. Speaker, if we are going to do this sort of thing, why don't we have a state police like the California Highway Patrol? Let's move over and re-study our entire police structure; but let's not go arming aliens.

I would urge you to vote against this, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and H.B. No. 2191-80, HD1, SD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO OWNERSHIP AND POSSESSION OF FIREARMS", passed Final Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 4 noes, with

Representatives Evans, Kamalii, Lacy and Sutton voting no.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 2372-80, HD1, as amended by the Senate, was taken from the Clerk's desk.

On motion by Representative Stanley, seconded by Representative Kunimura, the House agreed to the amendments proposed by the Senate to H.B. No. 2372-80, HD1, and H.B. No. 2372-80, HD1, SD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SELECTIVE EMPLOYMENT AND THE CIVIL SERVICE", passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 2191-80, HD1, SD1 and 2372-80, HD1, SD1 passed

Final Reading at 1:38 o'clock p.m.

At this time, the Chair stated:

The House of Representatives of the Tenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1980, convened at 11:00 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

### INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION

A resolution (H.R. No. 512) commending participants of the Kokokahi hunger mission model farm was jointly offered by Representatives Ushijima, Ige, Evans, Aki, Anderson, Andrews, Baker, Blair, Crozier, de Heer, Dods, Fukunaga, Hagino, Hashimoto, Honda, Ikeda, Inaba, Kamalii, Kawakami, Kihano, Kiyabu, Kobayashi, Kunimura, Lacy, Larsen, Lee, Lunasco, Marumoto, Masutani, Morioka, Nakamura, Narvaes, Peters, Sakamoto, Say, Segawa, Shito, Silva, Stanley, Sutton, Takamine, Takitani, Toguchi, Uechi, Uwaine, D. Yamada, K. Yamada and Wakatsuki.

On motion by Representative Ushijima, seconded by Representative Ige and carried, H.R. No. 512 was adopted.

Representative Ushijima then rose and asked:

"Mr. Speaker, may I be permitted to make an introduction at this time?"

Directed by the Chair to "proceed", Representative Ushijima said:

"Mr. Speaker, before introducing the honoree of the resolution which we just adopted, this entire project was called to my attention by an outstanding youngster living in Manoa, a boy scout called Mark Cunningham. Mark is presently here this morning and working on this particular project, and I am glad that in my small way, I am able to assist him."

Representative Ushijima then introduced Mark Cunningham and his mother, Mrs. Cunningham, who were seated in the gallery.

Representative Ushijima continued:

"This very unusual project, Mr. Speaker, was created under the leadership of Reverend Olin Pendleton and Associate Minister Dennis Alger, as the resolution has so indicated, and it is certainly a pleasure for me, on behalf of all of the members of this honorable body, more specifically the representatives from the Kaneohe area, Representatives Ige and Evans, at this time to introduce to you Reverend Olin Pendleton. Seated next to Reverend Pendleton is the associate, Mr. Dennis Alger."

Representatives Evans and Stanley then presented the honorees with a flower lei and a health food vegetable lei, and Representative Ige presented them with certified copies of the resolution.

Representative Toguchi then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I just want to say a few words. I would like to also congratulate Reverend Pendleton and Dennis, and I just want all of you to know that I have been out there several times and I still remember, at one time he invited me to dinner and I had the opportunity to try hibiscus leaves, and I have to admit that Reverend Pendleton is a very persuasive person. I resisted at first but I have to admit that after trying the hibiscus leaves, he told me. . . I didn't really go and find out myself; I had to believe him; he told me it was high in protein and I have to admit the hibiscus leaves really tasted delicious and if you have the opportunity one day, all of you should try it. Actually, I wanted to have the prawns that he was raising but instead he gave me the hibiscus leaves.

Thank you."

The Chair remarked:

"It is quite evident that he kept the prawns to himself and fed you the leaves."

Representative Larsen then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, you know, everytime we have a congratulatory resolution, I am thinking that at least these folks are doing something positive in the community, and here is an example that the Reverend and his whole organization out at Kokokahi are doing something in benefit of

the world problem which is coming into focus now in most under-developed countries in the world where those poor people have been eating away on their forests, and they are now stripping the forest from the landscape. And they were just starting to get into the use of kerosene but now that has tripled and quadrupled in price where they are back to foliaging for food to cook the food.

I think Reverend Pendleton and his whole crusade out there should try and develop another method so that these people can grow fuel as well as food so that they will not be taking off the remaining forest of the world, and this is worldwide and it encompasses Africa, South America and East Asia and all down to India. Those people are under terrific stress. They are losing their land and they are losing their forest at about the fastest rate in the history of mankind.

I think little examples of projects spearheaded by individuals is the only way that something like this can be corrected, and hopefully, start a new trend. Therefore, I would like to congratulate these two and I am sure their example will be reflected in additional projects throughout the world.

Thank you."

Representative Sutton then rose to speak in favor of the resolution and the honoree:

"Mr. Speaker, I had the privilege of working with this Reverend Pendleton on trying to stop the Admiral Thomas. We did not do a very good job as you can see if you go down to Thomas Square."

Representative Evans, at this time, introduced Mrs. Betsy Pendleton, "a very important person in Reverend Pendleton's life and has been for a very long time."

Representative Kunimura then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, not to detract from the honorees they justly deserve for the fine work they are doing, but may I add to this ceremony this morning because there may be hungry people around the world and people without fuel but we, too, in America, are starving for what we call togetherness and the lack or the loss of confidence in government, and may I add that today a beautiful picture that maybe a very few people know what really

happened here was the letter written by a very young person sitting up there in the gallery and if we don't do anything else here this session, we would have done something that we should continue to build on it, that we should make every effort to turn on young people of this State and the United States, that when this young gentleman wrote the letter to Representative Ushijima, I am pretty sure he did not have very much faith that something was going to be done like this ceremony here. . .I am pretty sure has turned on that young gentleman that government is sensitive and there are some sensitive people still around in this State of Hawaii and in the Legislature so the true hero today are the three people that should be honored and I would like to say I hope you can talk the rest of the young Hawaii and America that we must have faith, not only in God, but in our government.

Thank you."

Representative Narvaes rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in addition to all of the good things said about the activities of Olin Pendleton and his group, one of the other things that they have been working on has been the housing project. . .something to lower the cost of housing, and I am amazed at what they have done with this project dealing with housing costs. Perhaps we can have Representative Shito and the Hawaii Housing Authority to go visit them and maybe they could get some tips from them. But it is amazing that they have been able to put together little projects whereby they can get bricks for about two or three cents a piece and that's pretty amazing, and Olin, thank you."

At 11:30 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair, "for the purpose of extending our personal congratulations and aloha to our honorees."

Upon reconvening at 11:41 o'clock p.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives Dods, Hashimoto, Holt, Honda, Ikeda, Medeiros, Takitani and D. Yamada.

No. 521) recognizing and commending the Hawaii Ethnic Resources Center: Talk Story, Inc., for its contributions in the fields of culture, the arts and education in the state of Hawaii was jointly offered by Representatives Hagino, Say, Fukunaga, Andrews, Baker, Dods, Kiyabu, Kunimura, Lunasco, Marumoto, Masutani, Nakamura, Narvaes, Segawa, Shito, Silva, Stanley, Takamine, Takitani, Toguchi, Ushijima, Uwaine and D. Yamada.

On motion by Representative Hagino, seconded by Representative Say and carried, H.R. No. 521 was adopted.

## S.B. No. 2520-80

On motion by Representative Blair, seconded by Representative Shito, S.B. No. 2520-80, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INDUSTRIAL LOAN COMPANIES", passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative D. Yamada being excused.

# S.B. No. 871, SD1

On motion by Representative Blair, seconded by Representative Shito, S.B. No. 871, SD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LAND TRANSPORTATION", passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative D. Yamada being excused.

## S.B. No. 3098-80, SD1

Representative Shito moved that

S.B. No. 3098-80, SD1, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Blair.

Representative Marumoto then requested that the following remarks in favor of S.B. No. 3098-80, SD1, be inserted into the Journal and the Speaker, noting no objections, so ordered.

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill.

The purpose of this bill, Mr. Speaker, is to correct the constitutional deficiencies pointed out in a court ruling last year relating to the conversion of leasehold property into fee ownership.

This bill would amend the statutes to change the definition of 'owner's basis' from 'current fair market value' to the value that would apply if the lessor's leased fee interest were normally traded on an open market.

It would also allow for preliminary negotiation between lessor and lessee with the final decision of condemnation resting with the Hawaii Housing Authority.

And the bill further deletes statutory requirements for mandatory arbitration due to questions of constitutionality.

In the 8th House district, the greater part of the land area is lease-hold. Bishop Estate is the largest landowner in the area.

Waialae Kahala has already gone through the fee conversion process, but several other neighborhoods have yet to do so.

The following communities will convert under this new law: Waialae Golf Course subdivision, Waialae-Ike, first through fourth increments; Waialae-Nui Ridgeline and Waialae-Nui Valley.

Because this bill clarifies and tightens up our leasehold conversion law and assists in settlement of negotiation for this conversion process, I support its passage. I urge all of you to join me in voting aye. Thank you."

The motion to pass S.B. No. 3098-80, SD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RESIDENTIAL LEASEHOLD CONVERSION", was put by the Chair and carried by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Sutton voting no and Representative D. Yamada being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 2520-80; 871, SD1 and 3098-80, SD1 passed Third Reading at 12:00 o'clock noon.

## S.B. No. 43

Representative Kawakami moved that S.B. No. 43 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Sutton then rose to speak against S.B. No. 43:

"Mr. Speaker, the Committee report indicates that somehow or other there is a mandate from the constitutional convention. Let us look, Mr. Speaker, if you will, at Article XV, State Boundaries: The state of Hawaii shall consist of all the islands together with their appurtenant reefs and territorial and archeologic waters. Let's look up that term, archeologic, in the dictionary. I hold the latest Webster in my hand, Mr. Speaker, and it speaks of or relating or located in an archipelago; and that's the definition of archeologic.

But, we have the three mile limitation. We have now the International Law of the Sea which has been meeting and will continue to meet.

The learned Chairman of this Committee states that the purpose of this bill is to implement Article XV of the constitution of the state of Hawaii as proposed by the Hawaii constitutional convention of 1978 and ratified by the voters pertaining to state boundaries.

We have various channels between our islands. Some of these channels are as much as twenty-six miles. We cannot put, by resolution or by statute, something that changes the International Law of the Sea.

I recognize that we are going to go into the mining of nodules and I recognize that we have problems, but we're not going to solve it, Mr. Speaker, by putting something on the books which, for all intents and purposes, is of no value as far as international law is concerned.

I feel that we should wait, Mr. Speaker, until the International Law of the Sea has defined what these waters between the islands really are and, at that time, we can define it.

What we should be doing is sending representatives, I think the Chairman of this Committee would make an excellent representative, to the next conference of the International Law of the Sea and have him fight to make sure we get these waters; but we cannot in the abstract, Mr. Speaker, just claim these as ours.

Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I would ask that you vote against this. Thank you very much."

Representative Kunimura then rose to speak in favor of S.B. No. 43:

"Mr. Speaker, I cannot allow such accusations to go without challenge. I would like to request the learned gentleman from Nuuanu to read the Committee report.

This is not to alter unilaterally, or otherwise, but to express our understanding of our state and its boundaries. That is all the Committee report is doing and as far as amending the International Law of the Sea, not one nation can do it alone; it has to be done by treaty, we all know that, Mr. Speaker.

Therefore, I request that all members vote in favor of this bill to show our intent and our understanding, but not to declare unilaterally cedition from the United States or otherwise."

Representative Larsen also rose

to speak in favor of S.B. No. 43:

"I would like to say, Mr. Speaker, in the event that the Chairman is not able to go to that conference, I would submit my name in place of his."

The Chair then stated:

"No one should anticipate going."

Representative Toguchi then rose to speak in favor of S.B. No. 43:

"I just want to let you know that if we wait for the Law of the Sea conference it would take forever. Just recently, the U. S. Congress passed the Sea Bed Mining bill and they waited for the Law of the Sea conference.

What this bill is trying to do is to express intent. I hope that the Law of the Sea conference will move, not only in this area, but also in other areas.

I urge all of you to support this bill. Thank you."

Representative Sutton then rose in rebuttal:

"Mr. Speaker, I feel that both those who spoke for the bill indicated this enormous caveat. We, as yet, do not have defined boundaries. The dilemma of the congress of the United States has been shown. What we should be doing is passing this resolution, having people as learned as yourself represent us at the International Law of the Sea and do what we can to legitimately legitimize the channels between our islands as being ours."

The motion to pass S.B. No. 43, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE BOUNDARIES (CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS OF ARTICLE XV, SECTION 1)", on Third Reading was put by the Chair and carried by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Sutton voting no and Representative D. Yamada being excused.

## S.B. No. 2197-80, SD1

On motion by Representative Morioka, seconded by Representative Inaba, S.B. No. 2197-80, SD1, entitled:
"A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CORRECTIONAL INDUSTRIES", passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative D. Yamada being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No 43 and S.B. No. 2197-80, SD1, passed Third Reading at 12:05 o'clock p.m.

On motion by Representative Morioka, seconded by Representative Inaba, S.B. No. 2473-80, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE EXECUTIVE BUDGET ACT", passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative D. Yamada being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 2357-80, SD2; 2359-80, SD1 and 2473-80 passed Third Reading at 12:06 o'clock p.m.

## S.B. No. 1951-80, SD1

Representative Blair moved that S.B. No. 1951-80, SD1, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Shito.

Representative Lacy then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor, but with tongue in cheek I would like to express my great disappointment in the limits set forth in this bill.

With the loss of our major producer of beer, I am a little astounded that the Senate would reduce the amount of beer I can make each year to one half as much as I could make if I made wine. It seems strange since wine is much more alcoholic than beer.

Therefore, Mr. Speaker, knowing some of you are in my colleague's place, I am worried about the serious effects of this bill limiting their home brew to only 100 gallons a year; but I assure you, if you will pass as a private citizen an amendment to this next year, I'll submit it. Thank you,"

Representative Anderson:

"Would you insert the remarks of Representative Lacy as my own, please."

The Speaker, noting no objection, so ordered,

Representative Sakamoto also requested that Representative Lacy's remarks be inserted as his own and the Speaker, noting no objection, so ordered.

Representative Blair:

"Mr. Speaker, I'm put on notice knowing Representative Lacy is capable of passing bills, I am sure that his bill next year will have very easy going,

I would simply like to point out that in his four years in the House, then Representative Abercrombie was successful in passing a bill to allow bars to use the name, saloon. I think he has continued his good work in the Senate."

The motion to pass S.B. No. 1951-80, SD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INTOXICATING LIQUOR", was put by the Chair and carried by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative D. Yamada being excused.

On motion by Representative K. Yamada, seconded by Representative Evans and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering certain congratulatory resolutions.

### INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 522 to 526) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

A resolution (H.R. No. 522) commending Donald Johanos for a successful year as maestro of the Honolulu Symphony was jointly offered by Representatives Sutton, Say and Masutani.

Representative Sutton moved that the resolution be adopted, seconded by Representative Say.

Representative Say then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker and members of this honorable body, this is a celebrated day for the arts in Hawaii, the State that has pioneered and publicly funding its own impressive cultural and artistic programs. The arrival of Mr. Livingston Biddle on his first tour of Hawaii is an ideal time for us to honor one of our State's most renowned artists, maestro Donald Johanos.

The maestro's professional musicianship and his personal warmth and humility have endeared him to citizens of all ages and of all backgrounds throughout this State. Together, these two extraordinary gentlemen have sparked the revitalization of the Honolulu Symphony and the Hawaii Opera Theater, making them the centerpiece of the arts program for the entire State.

Mr. Biddle has approved the funding of about \$200,000 recently to these two musical enterprises or about

a fifth of the entire amount the National Endowment for the Arts channels to dozens of organizations throughout Hawaii, and maestro Johanos has put together those funds to excellent use by improving the quality and quantity of the musical production.

These two lucky developments have resulted in the enrichment of the lives of countless persons throughout Hawaii. For this, we say Aloha to Mr. Biddle and invite him to return often to Hawaii. This is what we call the soft sell, Mr. Biddle, and we say mahalo motomoto to the maestro.

Incidentally, we House members might learn a valuable lesson by studying Mr. Biddle's ascendancy to becoming America's czar of the arts. This ascendancy resulted, not from his pursuing an artistic career such as the maestro's, but instead, by being a legislative assistant who helped fashion the original statutes establishing the National Endowment for the Arts.

Thank you."

Representative Kunimura then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I am not a musician; I can hardly carry a note. But, even noise has musical tones and this is a very compassionate body, and I have a message here and guess who wrote this message. It says, 'Tony, I wrote and composed a symphony. I hope they will play it someday. Signed, you know who. And, Mr. Speaker, I will introduce the mystery guest, but I hope the maestro will someday find music, whether it be noise or composition or quality over symphony, play it for us, and maybe, we will all become patrons of the Honolulu Symphony. And the person who wrote this note, Mr. Speaker, has been crying in the dark and in the woods for many, many sessions. I believe he has always reminded us of his rare composition and I hope, at this time, it won't be any noise at all but rather a sweet music, and his name is Ike."

Representative Sutton then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, the prior gentleman has already declared my conflict.

Mr. Speaker, we have with us, and I would like to introduce them before I speak in favor of this resolution, Mrs. Betsy Chapman, James F. Morgan, Jan Stark, Catherine L. Hite, Robert C. Bickley, who is the Executive Director,

Samuel Woolley, Kathleen S. Roder, Ann Crowe and Douglas Crowe, and would you please all rise before we talk on this resolution. Would you give them a nice hand, please."

Representative Sutton then spoke in favor of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this resolution.

Mr. Speaker, last year, during a performance of Copland's 'Appalachian Spring', I became exceptionally impressed with the poetic mastery that maestro Johanos elicited from the Symphony Orchestra. In fact, Mr. Speaker, the music was so sweet that I equated it to an old Hawaiian expression. . .Ke iho la ka makani halihali pua o Nu'u-anu. . .which means, Mr. Speaker, that 'the wind comes down bearing the flowers of Nuuanu' as Representative Baker will agree with me who comes from Nuuanu, too.

Now, Mr. Speaker, such sweet sounds plus an expanded repertoire have become standard symphonic fare in Hawaii during this past 'Year of the Maestro.' During his first season as conductor of the Honolulu Symphony, our new maestro has captivated not only concertgoers but also our unusually hostile music critics like Mr. Driver. As Artistic Director, he has also introduced very subtler interpretations into the performances of the Hawaii Opera Theatre.

Besides these transformations he has effected without our concert hall, he, as Music Director, has overseen performances for our keikis in the school rooms and our community centers on the islands of Kauai, Maui and Hawaii.

Within the short span of a year under him -- for the first time in history -- the Honolulu Symphony Orchestra performed within the historic Kawaiahao Church, when, last Christmas, it presented the 'Messiah' as its holiday gift to the people of Hawaii, thanks to the Reverend Akaka.

Under him, for the first time in history, the Honolulu Symphony last year performed a Mozart festival. And under him, again, for the first time in history, the Honolulu Symphony Orchectra performed on a tour of the mainland. In fact, this tour may have been unprecedented in the musical annals of the world because,

rather than individual conductors, two entire orchestras -- Honolulu's and Utah's -- switched concert halls.

Now, Mr. Speaker, for these impressive feats, it is a special honor for me to introduce this extraordinary maestro and would you please rise, Mr. Johanos, and receive the applause of this body. And, Mr. Speaker, his lovely wife, would you please rise. Nothing, Mr. Speaker, could have been more appropriate than today when we recognize and applaud the magnificent work of Mr. Biddle and at the same time, have our maestro sitting next to each other so will both of them rise and receive our applause."

The motion to adopt the resolution was put by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 522 was adopted.

Representative Sutton further stated:

"Mr. Speaker, we not only have our own Hawaiian music, but we have a tradition of having classical music and we are a spot that is leading the world in culture and arts. At this time, Mr. Speaker, I feel it is appropriate that I ask Mr. Ted Morioka to change that figure to \$250,000 in the budget which we will give the Symphony if the Senate will ever come to terms and start thinking realities."

Representative Evans then presented an orchid and maile lei to maestro Johanos, and Representative Masutani presented him with a certified copy of the resolution.

A resolution (H.R. No. 523) extending aloha in welcoming Livingston Biddle, Jr. to Hawaii was jointly offered by Representatives Say, Anderson, Andrews, Baker, Crozier, Dods, Evans, Fukunaga, Hagino, Holt, Ige, Inaba, Kawakami, Kiyabu, Kobayashi, Kunimura, Larsen, Lee, Lunasco, Marumoto, Masutani, Medeiros, Morioka, Narvaes, Sakamoto, Segawa, Shito, Silva, Stanley, Sutton, Takamine, Takitani, Toguchi, Uechi, Ushijima, Uwaine, D. Yamada and K. Yamada.

On motion by Representative Say, seconded by Representative Sutton and carried, H.R. No. 523 was adopted.

Representative Say then proceeded to introduce the honoree, stating:
"As the resolution states, Mr. Speaker and members of this honorable body, we are deeply happy to have here this morning, Mr. Livingston Biddle,
Tr."

Representative Say then introduced

Mr. and Mrs. Livington Biddle, Jr. and Mr. Thomas Kanahele of the National Endowment Office for partnership and a cousin of Representative Henry Peters.

A haku lei created by Representative Say's intern from Kamehameha Schools was presented by Representative Hashimoto while Representative Stanley presented the honoree with a certified copy of the resolution.

Representative Peters then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I have three leis here; it is from my family tree.
..very grateful to Mr. Biddle who is here to visit with us; I am very proud of my cousin, 'brother' Tommy who grew up with me as a child.
I have been asked, on behalf of my family. ..Aunty Aggie who is up there, the mother of Tom Kanahele, to present these leis to Mr. and Mrs. Biddle and to my cousin on behalf of my family and the majority members of this House."

Representative Peters then presented the plumeria leis to Mr. and Mrs. Biddle and Mr. Kanahele.

Representative Kamalii then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, it is also an honor for me to welcome Kamaki home, and Mr. and Mrs. Biddle and his wife to our lovely islands, and I would like to extend our deep appreciation for all that they have done in the arts. Aloha."

A resolution (H.R.
