

## FORTY-FIRST DAY

Friday, March 27, 1981

The House of Representatives of the Eleventh Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1981, convened at 11:30 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Gary Secor of Saint Anthony's Rectory, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Hirono, Kamali'i, Kobayashi, Kunimura, Monahan, Rohlfing, Takamine and Waihee, who were excused.

#### INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

On motion by Representative Kihano, seconded by Representative Albano and carried, H.R. No. 505 was adopted.

Representative Kihano then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, we are very honored this morning to have the Mayor and his wife visit with us", and proceeded to introduce the following: Mayor Casiano Ledda; his wife, Mrs. Naty Ledda; Mr. Abe Albayalde, "a very good friend"; Mrs. Lucina Albayalde; and Mr. Domingo Tumacder, "a constituent of yours out in the Waianae district."

Representative Kihano then introduced other members of the Mayor's party who were seated in the gallery, as follows: Mr. Flor Martinez, Mrs. Laureana Arago, Mrs. Angelina Orallo, Mrs. Juliana Fabro, Mr. Rafael Fabro, Mr. Alfredo Fabro, Mr. Jose Lopez, Mrs. Eufrocina Ledda, and Mr. Rosito Ledda.

Representative Chun then presented Mayor Ledda with a pikake lei and Representative Albano gave Mrs. Ledda a pikake lei while Representative Kihano presented the honoree with a certified copy of the resolution.

Mayor Ledda then addressed the members of the House:

"Mr. Speaker, Mr. Speaker pro tempore, the honorable Daniel Kihano of the Philippines, honorable members of this august body, my friends, ladies and gentlemen:

In the name of the municipality of Balaon whom I represent in particular, and my government of the Republic of the Philippines, as well, allow me to express my sincerest gratitude and thanks for giving me this signal honor and rare privilege to appear before you today. This, I assure you, ladies and gentlemen, will have its mark in the history, not only of my little town, but the Republic of the Philippines as well.

Allow me further, Mr. Speaker, and honorable members of this House, to convey the happy feelings of the entire Filipino people for your participation and support in the celebration of the 75th anniversary of the coming of the first fifteen brave and adventurous Filipino forefathers who came into your bountiful islands to seek a better fortune. We are aware, Mr. Speaker, that 75 years ago today, when the Philippines was still a commonwealth and independent of the United States of America, our people were free to come and go as they pleased, and after the first fifteen brave Filipinos have blazed their way into these bountiful islands, caravans have come from common states invading your culture and embracing American citizenship.

We know, too, of your government's concern and liberality to the citizens of this great country, and that includes Filipinos who have stayed in these islands and so I say, rest assured of our undying cognizance of your generosity.

I ventured into your progressive and developed country to acquire firsthand information and knowledge of your modern economic, agricultural, social and political systems, and techniques, with the hope that we will be able to introduce and adopt the learnings I have acquired for the betterment of my country and my people. Only, however, for my limited stay, there is not much I can bring home, but indeed, ladies and gentlemen, I have learned things which I am sure will benefit my people and my country in the Philippines. I will go back home with a startled heart, enriched with your wisdom and ingenuity, but much more than this, I will leave your shores assured that with your kindness and hospitality, I will be able to transmit all of this to my people.

Furthermore, I will go home with my soul full of hopes that the United States of America and the Republic of the Philippines will always stick together as friends and will remain forever as staunch allies in the preservation of freedom and democracy.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and good day."

The Chair responded:

"Mayor Ledda, on behalf of the members of this House, thank you for being here today and sharing your very astute observations with us. I want you to know that we appreciate the contributions that the Filipino community has made to the State and to all of us as residents of this State. I hope that your stay here will be an enjoyable one and that you will have some very fond memories on your return to the Philippines."

A resolution (H.R. No. 506) extending appreciation and thanks to the Hawaii Kai Rotary Club for its presentation of the four-way desk plaque to each member of the House of Representatives was jointly offered by Representatives Dods, Ikeda, Aki, Albano, Anderson, Andrews, Baker, Chun, de Heer, Fukunaga, D. On motion by Representative Dods, seconded by Representative Ikeda and carried, H.R. No. 506 was adopted.

Representative Dods, at this time, introduced Mr. Michael Belkosky, Jr., President of the Hawaii Kai Rotary Club, and Mr. Robert C. Goodridge, President-elect of the Hawaii Kai Rotary Club.

Representative Dods then asked the other members of the Hawaii Kai Rotary Club who were seated in the gallery to stand and be recognized, and further stated:

"Mr. Speaker, the Rotary members are here today giving to each House and Senate members a Rotary International four-way desk plaque. The desk plaque will have the name of each legislator on the base. Similar plaques have already been formally presented to the U.S. Congress and to several other state legislatures.

On behalf of the House, I would like to thank the Hawaii Kai Rotary members

for the gift of these plaques."

Representatives Ikeda and Tungpalan then presented red carnation leis to Mr. Belkosky and Mr. Goodridge while Representative Dods presented them with certified copies of the resolution.

At 11:56 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair, "for the purpose of extending our personal gratitude and aloha to our honorees this morning."

Upon reconvening at 12:20 o'clock p.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives Hirono, Kunimura and Waihee.

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to clarify my earlier remarks. I regret having to introduce this resolution because I truly wished that Vicki could be here with us today. To be honest, I did not really get to know Vicki. I first met her at the 1978 Constitutional Convention where she served on the staff of the Environmental, Agriculture, Conservation and Lands Committee. Vicki may have lived a short life in our term, but what she accomplished and the people she touched during this time is more than I could hope to do in my life time.

#### DEFERRED MATTERS FROM EARLIER ON THE CALENDAR

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 777 on H.C.R. No. 82, HD 1:

Representative Say moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and H.C.R. No. 82, HD 1, be adopted, seconded by Representative Stanley.

Representative Isbell then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I'd like to rise and speak in favor of this resolution with some reservations.

If the intent of the resolution is to actually get the educational officers back to the classrooms, I would hope that the Board of Education knows that my personal feelings are that this would include principals, district superintendents, and the superintendent of schools, not just those that are working in the offices in Honolulu.

I would also like to state that in the section which says that they will serve with the students a minimum of one semester in each three-year period--is this to mean that one hour a month per semester? Is it meant for one week of a semester at the beginning and at the end, or does it really go

broad enough?

I would hope that this means that they will go into the classrooms, that they will be with the students, that they will get the feel of being a teacher again, and that it means that they don't have the alternative of, perhaps helping with the girls' basketball team, or the boys' basketball team, and consider that enough student contact. Otherwise, I am definitely in favor of the bill. I just hope that it means that it really is going to get everyone back to the basics.

Thank you very much."

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 780 on H.C.R. No. 160:

On motion by Representative Shito, seconded by Representative Honda and carried, the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 160, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION URGING STATE AND COUNTY HOUSING AGENCIES TO REQUIRE THE TEN-YEAR WARRANTY/INSURANCE PROTECTION PLAN PROVIDED BY THE HAWAII HOME OWNERS WARRANTY COUNCIL FOR THEIR PROJECTS", was adopted.

Representative Marumoto then made the following announcement:

"Mr. Speaker, this weekend the Easter Seal Telethon will be on again and every year a legislative panel devotes an hour of their time to help raise money for Easter Seals. The health bracket is very familiar with their services, but I would like to remind the other Representatives that 96 percent of the funds raised by Easter Seals remain in the State and goes toward direct services. The Representatives that will be taking part tomorrow night at approximately 10:00 p.m. will be Representatives Bert Kobayashi, Kinau Kamali'i, Jimmy Wong and Andrew Levin. Two Senators will also be participating--Dante Carpenter and Pat Saiki. Councilman Tom Nekota will also join them on this panel, so I am hoping many of you will be phoning in to make pledges at 10:00 o'clock Saturday night and not harassing our Representatives nor lobbying

them, but trying to help out Easter Seals.

Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

At this time, Representative Waihee, on behalf of the members of the House, extended belated birthday greetings to Representative Albano.

Representative Chun then rose to introduce the honoree, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in this day and age when we, at the Legislature, are asked to pass laws to combat vandalism, Mr. Kim, by his leadership and example, has prevented vandalism at his high school. He believes the way to control vandalism is through discipline. I was very impressed when I visited his high school -- by the lack of students loitering when classes are on, by the lack of graffiti on the wall,

and I couldn't believe it. I even went to the bathroom to see if there was graffiti in the bathroom and found none.

This is an exceptional school and an exceptional Principal.

Moanalua High School, for the past three years, had students that have scored above the average on the Stanford Achievement Test; the students at Moanalua High have scored the highest marks among local high school students on the Standard Achievement Test for the past two years in a row. The 'State Teacher of the Year' had been a teacher at Moanalua High School, the 'Biology State Teacher of the Year' and a 'Student Counselor of the Year.'

In 1981, Moanalua High School won the OIA championship in basketball and soccer.

In 1977, the State DOE Visiting Accreditation Committee granted Moanalua a full accreditation term for five years. The Visiting Committee stated these facts: 'We commend the students for their pride in helping to maintain a clean, bright and happy campus. We commend the administration and the faculty for providing a healthy and happy learning environment for the students of Moanalua High School. We commend the cafeteria staff for the well-planned menus and excellent food. We commend the administration for their excellent leadership and dedication to Moanalua High School. We commend the administration, faculty, classified staff and students for their commitment to the goal of humanism.'

Mr. Kim was voted 'Administrator of the Year' in 1980 by the Hawaii Association of Counselors."

Representative Chun then presented Mr. Kim to the members of the House and audience.

Representative Chun presented Mr. Kim with a red carnation lei while Representative Okamura presented the honoree with a certified copy of the resolution.

Representative Okamura then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I just wanted to add my personal thank you to Mr. Kim also. I would like to add that because of his outstanding leadership. . . I think if there was an award

"I do believe every word that was uttered this morning about Mr. Kim and I would like to say this, that maybe this State should, for once, have one party -- not Democratic, not Republican -- and hold a convention and nominate Mr. Kim as Governor of this State because in this turned-off generation, not only turned-off children, but turned-off grown-ups, maybe we need a man like Mr. Kim to turn us on again so that we would be spending more money on education than putting people in jail."

It's not too different from inviting the fox into the chicken coop.

It was expressed by former president Gerald Ford

and it relates to his personal feelings about success, and I quote: 'To me, success is not something to be measured in power or fortune or fame. I believe a life of service to others is a successful life. Always demanding the best of one's self, living with honor and devoting one's talents and gifts to the benefit of others. These are the measures of success that endure when all material things fade away.' Mr. Okada, thank you so much for giving to others and for giving for the benefit of others."

Representative Kunimura rose and stated: "Mr. Speaker, I feel that this is a very beautiful resolution, very timely but it lacks one thing, and that is the accent. If Mr. Okada was from Mars, then this resolution would suffice, but because Mr. Okada is a native born, there must be some history about this man.

I met Mr. Okada many years ago at Pier 11 back in the forties and the kind of work we were doing without pay was classified subversive by some sectors in the national politics and also in Hawaiian politics. It was almost dangerous, physically, because of the camp police that were ordered to look out for anyone like Mr. Okada and a few of us. We were classified as agitators with alien ideals. The only crime we were supposed to have committed was to get the people of Hawaii to recognize and realize that the constitution of the United States was for everyone, not only for the privileged few. That the Wagner Act, so beautifully put together by Franklin Delano Roosevelt, to give man or the people in the United States, the right to organize in a free and open society for collective purpose, and this is what we were trying to do.

I remember Major, young, spry, we were chased around by law enforcement people. We almost got our heads bashed in several times on the picket line. But never did I hear at any time, anything said about our government that was seditious in nature except that the constitution of the United States gave us that opportunity to change, even the form of government, but we were not trying to change the form of government, only to change to get the pendulum to swing from the left closer to the center, where every man regardless of race, color, creed, would have his day

in court, that every person regardless of his race, color, or creed would have full opportunity to the pursuit of education and betterment of life. This is what Major stood for, and there were only a few of us, one of our great leaders passed on, and he was branded a communist, couldn't be invited to any place of any social class. I remember when he passed away, this whole state mourned him, and his name was Jack W. Hall.

Major, I hope he stays with us for a long time because he deserves the retirement and pleasure of being a retiree. But this man is a workaholic. I'm pretty sure if he stopped working for people, then his heart would stop. He has come to us, year after year, trying to create something in Waipahu that would leave a legacy for the generation yet to come. This legislature has responded, and I hope, will continue to respond to the dream of people like Major Okada and others that the Waipahu Cultural Park will become a reality and become a showcase, not to man's intolerance to his fellow man, but that Hawaii, for what it is today, has a background of long struggle. Then the future generation can look at the struggle these people had to go through, and to continue to struggle to keep Hawaii free, beautiful and warm."

Representative Kobayashi rose and stated: "Mr. Speaker, if we had more time, I would suggest that we change the resolution to read General Okada."

Representative Kihano rose and stated: "Mr. Speaker, Hideo Okada, truly has been instrumental in the different growth areas of our community, a leader and friend in the labor sector, a promoter of youth activities, a public relations man between business and the legislature and the Waipahu community, an activist in the Democratic party and a Christian who lives and practices his faith. His leadership abilities and capacity is a link to his pet name, Major. While at Mid-Pacific Institute playing baseball, his technique was in the major league category, so his friends tagged him Major. He has lived that role so well."

Representative Hashimoto presented a lei to Mr. Okada and Representative Shito presented the honoree with a certificate of the resolution.

At 12:14 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess for the purpose of extending the personal Aloha of the members of the House to the honorees, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:23 o'clock p.m.

"Mr. Speaker, the Red Cross is an unusual organization. For one, it is one of few organizations with a congressional mandate.

Secondly, it is perhaps the largest channel for voluntary activity in the world with organizations in 123 countries, and in the United States alone, some 80 chapters. Here in Hawaii, we have the home base for the Pacific Division which represents the geographic expansive chapter or division in the United States, stretching from Hawaii to Guam, to the Trust Territories -- a huge area.

The responsibilities of the Red Cross, while mandated by Congress, do not carry with it government funding. In that situation, I suppose the Red Cross is like the State of Hawaii.

The Red Cross carries on certain activities which are vital to our community. For instance, a number of people in the community must meet first-aid requirements as required by OSHA (Occupational Safety and Health Agency). These first-aid classes are taught in part by the American Red Cross.

Further, there are free swimming classes which have been given for decades by the American Red Cross. In addition to that, a number of our vital public servants -- those having to do with pool, beach, life guard services -- receive training from the American Red Cross.

Firemen also participate in certain classes conducted by the Red Cross. These include both first-aid in a few

situations, but also cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

For these reasons, I believe that it is appropriate that we recognize this worthy organization on its 100th celebration."

Representative Kobayashi then proceeded to introduce "a number of individuals who represent a large sector of the American Red Cross," as follows: Dr. John Henry Felix, "who has long been associated with the Red Cross, I would say for perhaps as long as I have been alive. He is further, and with some distinction, perhaps the youngest members of the National Board of Governors of the American Red Cross. That, by itself, is a distinction"; Mr. Jerry Corn "who is Manager of the Pacific Division which, as I had stated before, stretches all across the Pacific"; Mrs. Vi Dolman "who is chairperson of the Hawaii State Chapter of the American Red Cross"; Jean Barnes "who is chairman of the Pacific Division of Volunteers for the American Red Cross"; Mr. Joe Pelletier "who, today, stands before us as a Board member for the Hawaii State Chapter of the American Red Cross"; Dorothy Walker "who is Assistant District Director of the Services to the Armed Forces"; and Paulette Maehara "who is Director of Public Affairs for the American Red Cross, Hawaii State Chapter."

What I am trying to refer to, Mr. Speaker, is that if the committees of this House are going to be subjected to this kind of wasting of time, because House Bill 66 was passed over to the Senate but because of the lack of information and the wrong information given to the House, the Committee on Finance worked on Senate Bill 426. We could have been working on some other bills, and I would like to ask the Speaker of this House to, maybe almost immediately, appoint a committee to investigate what's wrong with our computer service because if we are going to have to rely on something that's so unreliable, that we may as well save the money and junk the whole system.

And this is what I would like to have referred. . . my statement on the record is that it's tragic, it's disgusting, it's almost disastrous to waste time because time is so important, and many of these bills, Mr. Speaker, the Finance Committee has had only about three days to work on before the deadline. And I would appreciate the Speaker looking into this matter so that in the future -- next session -- each committee can rely on information coming out of the Legislative Reference Bureau that would have integrity and trustability.

Thank you."

Representative Lacy then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I know that the originators of the bill in the Senate had one idea of what they were trying to protect. Our committee has submitted to us a recommendation that we move a hundred percent down to eighty percent in the approval for obligation of the members

of the condominium on taking on a responsibility that will become a part of the common element.

I live in a condominium and I speak for the numbers of those out in the rest of our State that so do. We select that type of living with the understanding that we are purchasing our property that is defined within the declaration and within the by-laws. We have a very excellent horizontal regime act; it can have improvements, and I think this was an attempt to improve upon that act. Not knowing all the implications of this short bill, I want to warn you about what it could do.

This bill was put up with the general idea that suppose that we as owners of a condominium desire to buy another piece of property, maybe it's adjoining, or maybe it is a short distance away, but we would have the right to do this provided the owners agreed. The present law does not cover this point. But in my condominium, as interpreted within my by-laws, to replace or place something in to existence in a common element over a very nominal sum requires 100 percent of the owners to agree.

This bill that we are sending to the Senate, as corrected, says that would be 80 percent, so that scares me a little bit that the interpretation might be that it applies to my condominium and some of the things I might buy that are not now a part of the common element but becomes that because of future needs.

But what about the 20 percent that doesn't want it? So, in the end. . . what could be a long speech. . . let me give you an example. I am now a developer. I have one hundred units in my condominium. I sell twenty and hold eighty. Two years later, I decide to buy the parking lot next door to my condominium. I pass the rule. I have 80 percent of the votes. I buy the parking lot and charge the other twenty whatever share they have to pay.

Under this law, they have no right to renege. They must pay that. Think about it!

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Blair then rose to speak in support of the bill,

stating:

"Mr. Speaker, like Mr. Lacy, I also live in a condominium and like Mr. Lacy, I also represent a district with a great number of condominiums in it, and I assure all the members here that I would pass nothing to jeopardize the interest of either his constituents or mine.

Mr. Speaker, we have to protect, not only from the tyranny of a majority, but also from the tyranny of a minority. Essentially, if we allow one individual in a complex to say that something that is in the best interest of the complex cannot be preceded with, what we would then have happen is that under 514-17 where you can take a project out of the condominium chapter with an 80 percent vote and then bring it back in again, we would simply . . . if we had this 100 percent requirement, we would be causing people to use this more convoluted route to achieve the same objective. And I think nobody would really be well served if we had to go through this much more elaborate procedure which really, I think, puts peoples' interest more in jeopardy and so in order to conform to 514-17, we reduced it from a hundred percent to eighty percent. I think that way the chapter reads more logically and I think an 80 percent requirement is sufficient to protect the rights of the majority, and I would urge all the members that they vote in favor of this bill."

Representative Lacy, in rebuttal, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I think we ought to consider the majority but we better watch out for the minority because they don't have the votes. They are the ones from the democracy we must watch for -- same as in the condominiums.

Thank you."

Representative Liu then rose on a point of information and asked whether or not the Chairman of the Consumer Protection and Commerce Committee would yield to a question to which Representative Blair answered in the affirmative.

Representative Liu asked:

"Mr. Speaker, it is my belief that the percentage mentioned in the bill is only a minimum, such that if any condominium association should require a higher percentage, the percentage included in this bill would not negative the higher requirement of the condominium

association. I was just wondering if the Chairman of the Consumer Protection Committee would confirm my belief."

Representative Blair said: "I concur."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 816, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HORIZONTAL PROPERTY REGIME", passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Lacy voting no, and Representative de Heer being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 816 had passed Third Reading at 12:18 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 253, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Blair, seconded by Representative Hirono and carried, S.B. No. 253, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO REGULATION OF EMPLOYMENT AGENCIES", passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative de Heer being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 253 had passed Third Reading at 12:19 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 1505, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Kunimura moved that S.B. No. 1505, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Kiyabu.

Representative Kunimura then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, we had a House bill that the committee . . . I was responsible for the death of that bill in the House and I feel terrible that the original idea started in the House, and that bill belonged to a very dear friend of mine, Representative Tungpalan. And I hope, in the future, members of this House would communicate with the chairmen that if they have any bills that they are very interested in, that they would call our attention because it is almost impossible for . . . this is the first time I have ever had such a big committee and it is almost impossible for me -- an inadequate, insignificant human being to understand all the requirements and aspirations of

all the members of this House. And I am pretty sure that every chairmen in this House, including the members of the leadership of both sides, like to serve, not only our constituents, but our fellow members of the House. So, I would like to ask that they continue to communicate and have dialogue so that this House can go united in meeting the challenge of the State of Hawaii as a united front against whatever the last few days of the session may have in store for us.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1505, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHARITABLE ORGANIZATIONS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative de Heer being excused.

S.B. No. 1622, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Kunimura, seconded by Representative Kiyabu and carried, S.B. No. 1622, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE HIGHER EDUCATION LOAN FUND", passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Ige voting no, and Representative de Heer being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 55 had passed Third Reading at 12:21 o'clock p.m.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Taniguchi and carried, S.B. No. 1136, SD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHAPTER 353, HAWAII REVISED STATUTES", passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative

de Heer being excused.

S.B. No. 1324, SD 1, HD 1:

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 572 and 330 had passed Third Reading at 12:23 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 356, SD 3, HD 1:

Representative Kunimura moved that S.B. No. 356, SD 3, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Kiyabu.

Representative Isbell then rose to speak in favor of the bill with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I believe that we must always show hesitation in the passage of omnibus legislation. I know and understand the impatience

which the community sometimes feels about our seeming inability to treat major issues in a comprehensive and all-inclusive fashion, but unless we do so with great care and preparation, it is more than possible that we will do greater harm than inaction might have prompted. I feel that those implications are in this measure.

First, there is a very disturbing lack of definition in this bill. From the very beginning of the bill, and throughout its body, we mention goals and objectives of such import to the community that there should be some cursory attempt to define what we mean. But we don't.

Thus, we speak of 'proper and adequate' agricultural lands, and then we do not offer any explanation as to what that means. In later sections, we speak only of prime and unique lands. Mr. Speaker, on the West side of the Big Island, we have a commitment to agriculture, but in Kona, there are no prime lands and we have very few acres of unique -- we are considered 'other.' So, would we then be disqualified from consideration in this bill for proper and adequate protection of our lands?

Further, much is made of fostering 'self-sufficiency' in agriculture. But nowhere is there a determination of the nature or quality of that objective: Do we mean economic self-sufficiency? Total food demands for the State? Some established minimal caloric capacity? We can't tell from this measure what is self-sufficiency.

I am especially concerned by that lack of definition, because such 'self-sufficiency' is also one of the mandates of our State General Plan. And if we look to the agricultural functional plan, we find even more flaws in this regard.

In addition, I have difficulties with the encroachments on home-rule and individual county designations of land use and function. If we are only going to address prime and unique lands, then this concern becomes one of over-riding importance to certain areas of our State.

Overall then, Mr. Speaker, I find this subject too important to be treated loosely. We have recognized the need to address this subject with total seriousness. I would hope that the conference committee would take these concerns to the table for clarification and improvement.

Thank you very much."

Representative Kunimura then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, this is again another bill that is very thick. . . is almost the size of a cheap hamburger. The House Committee on Finance did not have any opportunity to improve this bill, therefore, Mr. Speaker, rather than let this bill die because its attempt to address a very important area, the Committee on Finance saw fit to report this out, to have the conference committee, if necessary, work out the entire bill and if they fail, then maybe we can have an interim committee to work out this measure during the interim so that next session, we would have a very comprehensive bill that would address all the agricultural needs of this State.

If we try to, Mr. Speaker, understand that the mountain that contains iron, or if you try to look at the mountain and see a car in it, it is almost impossible, but if you try to understand the legislative process, that the legislative process starts with an idea and then as it rolls along, it gathers more ideas, and finally in the conference committee, the good ideas are separated from the not too good ideas and it becomes law.

So, I hope the members of this House would have little patience and wait until what the conference committee comes back with and at that time, we either support it or disapprove of the conference committee's recommendation.

Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 356, SD 3, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURE", passed Third Reading by a vote of 43 ayes to 7 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Ikeda, Kamali'i, Liu, Marumoto, Monahan and Rohlfing voting no, and Representative de Heer being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 1713, 163 and 931 had passed Third Reading at 12:30 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 815, SD 2, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Kunimura, seconded by Representative Kiyabu and carried, S.B. No. 815, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE RENTER'S INCOME TAX CREDIT", passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative de Heer being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 815 had passed Third Reading at 12:31 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 508, SD 1, HD 2:

Representative Kunimura moved

that S.B. No. 508, SD 1, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Kiyabu.

Representative Isbell then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill with reservations and hope you will forgive me, but I feel strongly on this bill, too.

Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill with serious reservations because the intent of this bill is one for which there is a general agreement and support. The growing impact of predators on wildlife and game animals and birds is of great importance to all of us. However, as now written, this bill would categorically mandate the Department of Land and Natural Resources to eradicate all such predators -- and with such broad language, this bill now requires the Department of Land and Natural Resources to also destroy pet dogs and cats which may kill a bird in the family driveway. It also mandates an eradication program for the mongoose which is an enormous task. I hope the Department of Land and Natural Resources is up to it but because it may require the entire staff from the Department head down to participate. I don't believe that is exactly what we intended to do with this measure, but we have done it.

In addition, we have provided contradictory directives between conservation and profitable use of our resources, especially as it relates to coral. My own feeling, Mr. Speaker, is that many, if not most, of our live coral beds should be considered 'threatened or endangered species' and a concerted effort to protect these resources should be made. This bill, however, places these fragile corals in the realm of commercial licensing.

Further, there is a questionable inclusion of mandatory importation of wildlife for propagation. We do not make such a requirement discretionary or subject to the review of particular county needs or desires but we say there shall be such propagation. I believe that section contains a paradox. Especially here in Hawaii where there must always be a conscious

recognition of the important economic and ecological devastation which may occur whenever a new species is introduced. We choose to ignore that historical lesson when we require importation and propagation of a species.

In addition, Mr. Speaker, I am troubled by the amendment to this bill to include personnel discussions about tenure and promotion. I find the inclusion of this section improper in this bill. Further, the House has also amended that this bill have a three-year 'drop dead' clause.

If we are that uncertain of the bill and the full implications, and certainly that is indicated by such a three-year 'drop dead' clause, then it may be better to defeat this measure and continue working on what we could support without hesitation.

However, as I said at the beginning, I will vote in favor of this measure but I hope that these points will be answered in the conference committee or through the direction of the Department of Land and Natural Resources.

I thank you very much."

Representative Kunimura then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill and I agree with the previous speaker that this is not a perfect bill -- far from it. This is rather, if I may call it, the vehicle, so that the House and Senate may improve this bill, but without this bill, there would be no vehicle that they can work with.

Mr. Speaker, if the previous speaker would try to understand what the Finance Committee has done, we did not touch the bill except one area -- the sunset area. And the Constitution of the State of Hawaii has placed conservation as one of the executive powers of the Board of Land and Natural Resources. They have had that power for many, many years, as far back as 1959 when Hawaii became a State and the first State Constitution took effect. But if you go back in history, because I think only a few of us go that far back and beyond, that the Department of Land and Natural Resources has done very little to exercise this inherent power that is imbedded in the Constitution -- the rib-rock of our laws of this State.

And, therefore, the committee, although recognizing in the past that all policies, all laws came from the Legislature, and this particular bill,

we are now taking the extreme opposite position of letting the instrumentality of the Board of Land and Natural Resources take the active and leading role. But to get them to move, we put the 'sunset' provision and there will be several legislators meeting but this is a written notice, by statute, that they better move or else, and this is why it was inserted. It is not because we don't believe in it or we don't have faith in it, but maybe this is, if you want to, people in your district who raise lot of cattle use that electric prod to give the Department a good shock where it really is effective and, maybe, this is the way we can get them to move so fear not, I say the conference committee will work this out.

Thank you."

Representative Kamali'i then rose and asked whether or not the Chairman of the Finance Committee would yield to a question to which Representative Kunimura said:

"It all depends what kind of question."

Representative Kamali'i asked:

"Mr. Speaker, do we have the assurance that the Senate is going to disagree with these amendments in order for it to go into conference?"

Representative Kunimura answered:

"Mr. Speaker, I can predict that the sun will come up tomorrow, but I cannot predict what's going to happen in the other house; I don't think even God can predict that."

Representative Kamali'i then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against this bill because of the many, many flaws that are in this bill, and here again, as the ag bill, we are hoping that it will go into conference so that we can make these corrections.

Mr. Speaker, a vehicle is one thing; a runaway truck like the Department of Land and Natural Resources is another."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 508, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL

FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HAWAII REVISED STATUTES, TITLE 12, CONSERVATION AND RESOURCES", passed Third Reading by a vote of 42 ayes to 8 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Ikeda, Kamali'i, Lacy, Liu, Medeiros, Monahan and Rohlfing voting no, and Representative de Heer being excused.

S.B. No. 1150, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Kunimura, seconded by Representative Kiyabu and carried, S.B. No. 1150, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHAPTER 237, HAWAII REVISED STATUTES", passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative de Heer being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 508 and 1150 had passed Third Reading at 12:39 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 271, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Say, seconded by Representative Blair and carried, S.B. No. 271, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOTELS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative de Heer being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 271 had passed Third Reading at 12:40 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 113, HD 1:

Representative Honda moved that S.B. No. 113, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Nakamura.

Representative Liu then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, as I rise to speak against this bill, we are doing more here than merely making a technical change. I question the committee report's analysis; that is, that this bill would give the DSSH authority to assign a prisoner to lawful programs in the public's interest. Not enough thought has been given to this bill in order for this statement to be made. Do we really want to give blanket approval to all furlough programs that a prisoner on a mandatory minimum imprisonment term might be assigned to? In other words,

are we talking about two competing policies -- on the one hand, the desire to incarcerate convicted criminals for a guaranteed minimum term of years versus releasing such persons on furlough programs that amount to release out into the community without supervision of corrections' personnel to periods ranging from a few hours up to thirty days for the purpose of rehabilitation?

I think this is a question presented to us by this bill, Mr. Speaker, and I really wonder whether it was the intent of past legislatures to allow persons sentenced to mandatory minimum terms to be placed on extended furloughs.

Further, I question whether, at this time, a re-examination of the rehabilitative philosophy that underlies our correction systems, that we should embark on new ground. I say this in light of the Judiciary Committee's general stand to hold most sentencing bills until more study can be made of our sentencing laws as a whole.

Further, I am not satisfied that the guidelines that the DSSH will follow in this area are adequate. Your committees did not have a chance to review those guidelines because those guidelines are not complete. Furthermore, the creation of these guidelines are exempt from the Administrative Procedures Act. Therefore, it is questionable whether all interested parties, including the public at large, will have a chance to re-examine these guidelines before they are implemented.

Lastly, Mr. Speaker, whether or not we agree with the concept in this bill or disagree with it, the DSSH told your committees that a recent Attorney General's opinion that overturned a prior opinion gives it the authority under existing law to do what this bill claims to do. If such is the case, Mr. Speaker, I say, let the DSSH implement this policy because now they claim they do have the authority to do so, but I wish that we not be a part of it.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

seconded by Representative Kiyabu and carried, S.B. No. 532, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRUST COMPANIES", passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Rohlfing voting no, and Representative de Heer being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 868 and 532 had passed Third Reading at 12:47 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 164, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Taniguchi and carried, S.B. No. 164, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATUTORY REVISION", passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative de Heer being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 164 had passed Third Reading at 12:48 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 1699, SD 1, HD 2:

Representative Nakamura moved that S.B. No. 1699, SD 1, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Taniguchi.

Representative Monahan then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill with reservations and some disappointment.

Mr. Speaker, a famous psychologist, Abraham Maslow, indicates that it is really impossible for people to operate at full efficiency if they feel insecure, and if they are frightened, and they are really going to be rather ineffective. And this bill addresses that concern to perhaps some of the most important people that we have in our entire State government. It addresses that concern to our teachers and other employees in our schools.

The original draft of this bill that has passed out of Education tried to put some real teeth into a bill that is addressing a very narrow but extremely serious situation. It doesn't deal with kids using graffiti; it deals with extortion and violence, and threats, and assault, basically upon teachers and other employees.

The bill that was passed out of the Education Committee also indicated that it was the responsibility of the principal to report incidences of this extremely serious nature to the proper police authorities. There was a good reason for this and I say it from being a long-time educator when I particularly had to deal with some very tough secondary schools.

It was done in order to help your administrator. That administrator is faced with many, many interpersonal relations in the school, but in this very, very serious one, he needs the backup of a strong law so that he can say to the other pressures that would tell him to keep this serious crime quiet, that he unequivocally cannot deny it, that it is the law; and he, indeed, is jeopardizing his own job, his own legal position, if he doesn't obey this law.

And so I think the intent of the law, as we see it here, is correct, but it is doing only half the job, and I want you to know that this bill is not dealing with minor offenses. It is dealing with assault of teachers.

I am also disappointed in the amendment which restricted from it some direction toward the extortion and the assault upon students, and I think we should try to address that too, perhaps in conference committee.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1699, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO VIOLENCE AND VANDALISM IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative de Heer being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 1699 had passed Third Reading at 12:50 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 878, SD 2, HD 2:

Representative Kunimura moved that S.B. No. 878, SD 2, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Kiyabu.

Representative Ikeda then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill with some reservations.

Mr. Speaker, on many occasions this session, we have been asked to vote on measures providing piecemeal relief from the excise tax. Obviously, our prime motive has been to offer some form of credit or reduction in what has increasingly become a questionable burden on private enterprise. I find that objective commendable.

What I do question, however, is the manner for providing such relief. The equitability and standing of various funds is now jeopardized by our individualized approach to these measures. What must be preeminently clear to all of us is the need to offer systematic and comprehensive relief.

I hope, Mr. Speaker, that one of our committees will move to meet this oversight of needed review, and with the assistance of the Tax Department and Tax Review Commission, assure us that there is method as well as motive to providing tax relief.

Thank you."

Representative Dods then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, what the House giveth, the House can take away.

Two weeks ago, this House agreed that the highway fund was in trouble and by passing House Bill 808, we transferred over \$17 million to the Department of Transportation to play catch up work with the repair and maintenance of the Highway Department. Now we are saying that they have too much money and we have to take it back.

I think we ought to get our act together and if we are going to give them money, let's give it to them. If they don't need the money, we shouldn't give it to them in the first place.

Thank you very much."

At 12:53 o'clock p.m., Representative Kunimura asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:54 o'clock p.m., Representative Kunimura was recognized and he stated:

"Mr. Speaker, just for the record,

I hope the members of this House would read the bill.

Yes, the highway fund was in trouble. Just to clarify the statement made that one week the fund is in trouble, next week we got too much. I hope that member would read the bill. We are talking about the small boat harbor maintenance fund. They are in serious jeopardy if the bill passed in the manner in which it came to the House Finance Committee. Therefore, we amended the bill so that the maintenance fund could be preserved."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 878, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COMMERCIAL FISHING VESSELS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Dods voting no, and Representative de Heer being excused.

Representative Ige's remarks are hereby inserted:

"Mr. Speaker, chances are that those of us who are fortunate enough to own our homes or apartments will not have to experience the confusion and helplessness that others have experienced upon learning that their apartment building will be converted from rental units to a condominium.

While this legislation will not prevent the occurrence of condominium conversions in our State, nor alleviate the multitude of emotions felt by those affected by such actions, it can help to provide much-needed time to these people in relocating themselves and their

families.

I empathize with the problems faced by the elderly and the handicapped in our community and recognize that there are instances when they are disadvantaged by our society because of their age or disability and financial status. However, it is not my feeling that the elderly or the handicapped face more severe problems in relocating themselves than other members in our community.

Condominium conversions are disturbing for all tenants, not simply the elderly or the handicapped, and due to the shrinking rental market in Hawaii, many people find it difficult to locate convenient and reasonable rental units.

It is my feeling that families with children also experience a kind of disability in having to relocate themselves which is similar to that experienced by the elderly or handicapped. We have all been told by constituents at one time or another of difficulties in locating a large enough rental unit for large families or in locating a landlord who will accept tenants with school-aged children.

A residential move presents adjustments which must be made by all members of a family regardless of age and sex, hardships, inconveniences, more time than one can readily afford, and worries regarding one's financial ability to pay a higher amount for a place of comparable conveniences if one cannot be found at the same rental rate. I believe that these problems are shared universally by all tenants who find themselves forced to move because of conversion plans.

It was felt by members of your Committees on Youth and Elderly Affairs and Consumer Protection and Commerce that ninety days advance notification was not adequate enough for a tenant to put his affairs in order and relocate. In accordance with the overall consensus voiced by members of these Committees, this bill was amended to provide for a 120-day notification period for all tenants of the landlord's intent to convert to condominium.

Mr. Speaker, I urge all members to seriously consider passage of this bill.

Thank you."

Representative Kunimura's remarks are hereby inserted:

"RESPONSIVE AND RESPONSIBLE  
PLANNING FOR THE 80'S

Mr. Speaker, it is a common and widely accepted assertion that government exists to serve the people. Accordingly, we who serve in this honorable body like to think of ourselves as public servants, responding to the expressed needs of our constituents, on our respective islands and in the State as a whole. If the size of our recent and forthcoming biennial appropriations is any indication, we have been truly and wholeheartedly responsive.

But is it enough to be simply responsive? If that is the case, we could just as well dismiss this body and turn the whole matter to computers and clones, who I'm sure could do the job with greater efficiency at much lower cost. No, Mr. Speaker, in coming up with the State's operating and capital improvements budgets for the next biennium and in providing tax relief for our fellow citizens, we have had to make some hard and critical choices. We have had to be responsible, as well as responsive.

It is also commonplace that requests for legislative funding from both public and private agencies far exceed the government's fiscal capacity. Consequently, many meritorious requests have had to be rejected, postponed, or reduced in scope despite the fact that these decisions affect human ambitions and social well being. The best thinking and most dedicated efforts of this honorable body must and have been applied. We have had to be responsible, but the question remains: Have we been responsible enough?

Mr. Speaker, responsibility is more than responding to quorum calls and holding committee hearings, although these are necessary. Responsibility is more than applying our individual expertise and collective wisdom to make the critical decisions, although this is vital. Responsibility, to me, means going the extra mile when all previous efforts fail, providing the spark of inspiration when no solutions seem feasible, taking charge when the situation

demands, keeping a cool head when emotions are heavy, and, most important, looking ahead when everything seems under control. Responsibility means progressive leadership; it is the antithesis of complacent execution.

Mr. Speaker, to restate the obvious, these are extremely uncertain times. All around us, we see rapid and continuing inflation, persistent unemployment, declining productivity, deteriorating social conditions in our communities, and a dangerous international environment. Nationally, we have emergence of a new administration, representing a philosophy different perhaps from the majority members of this honorable body. I have not followed the national program as closely as I would like, but it seems to be following a two-pronged approach -- reduce the size of the public sector and increase the responsibility of the private sector in solving our economic problems and meeting our social needs.

While we applaud the boldness of this approach and the skillfulness of its presentation, responsibility demands that we carefully evaluate its impact, particularly on the well-being of the people of Hawaii.

Mr. Speaker, your Committee on Finance has experienced firsthand some of this impact. Because of impending and threatened reductions or elimination of federal programs, we have had countless requests for additional State funding. Many of these programs meet legitimate community needs and we have had to make difficult choices on State involvement. These are reflected in our recommendations for the biennial budget and for income tax credits, general excise tax credits, and renters tax credits for the people of Hawaii.

As to the impact of the proposed national economic program, which seeks to stimulate economic growth by increasing tax incentives to upper income groups and business corporations, we must reserve judgment because final decisions have not yet been made. Hopefully, the program will have the magical results of stopping wild inflation, reducing unemployment, and improving the competitive position of American industry.

Realistically, Hawaii must prepare its own scenario as to what is most likely to happen; we must make our choices as to what we must

do and where we are headed; and we must conserve and utilize our resources -- natural, human, and financial -- to meet our social needs in a responsible, as well as responsive, manner.

The challenge today is: Are we prepared to do all this? The problem is: Have we become so complacent in our leadership and so automatic in our response that we have lost a true sense of direction?

Mr. Speaker, the limited time I have at my disposal today does not permit a thorough or detailed analysis of these questions. However, because of the uncertainty and unease which confront us -- not only from national and international developments, but from what we see locally -- I feel impelled to make some additional remarks.

These comments are based not only on my experience this session as Chairman of your Committee on Finance, where the 'bottom line' on legislative decisions is often reached, but on 19 years of continuous, stimulating, though not always quiet, service in this honorable body.

Mr. Speaker, do we know where we are going in these uncertain 80's and how we are to get there? I submit that history -- even the history of this House -- teaches us lessons which we would do well to recall. As I look around this chamber, I see very few of the faces that were here in the 1960's. Those of us who follow recent history will remember the decade of the 60's as a period of vibrant growth, perhaps inspired by dynamic leadership and personalities in this House and in the executive chambers.

Hawaii was a brand new State in the union. Our population was scarcely 600,000 -- today it is one million. Our gross State product was less than \$2 billion -- today it is more than \$10 billion. Sugar and pineapple were still the dominant industries, their total value was \$250 million, while tourist expenditures had just reached \$100 million. Today, tourist expenditures are \$3 billion, while sugar and pineapple have crept up to about a half billion. State and local government expenditures were about \$200 million at the time of statehood; today they have

multiplied 10 times.

Mr. Speaker, we have had tremendous and dynamic growth in Hawaii. But as we know, this growth had not been without its cost and its problems. In more recent years, our legislative concerns and appropriations have been in such areas as preserving and protecting our land and agricultural resources, meeting the costs of urbanization, alleviating environmental pollution, meeting increasing costs of health care, providing sustenance and opportunity for the socially and economically disadvantaged, and combating the increased incidence of crime. I could go on and on.

Returning to the early 60's, I submit, Mr. Speaker, that those were also uncertain times. But we had a dream that Hawaii could be the best place on Earth to live; we had a goal that public and private resources and cooperation could make it so and we had a legislative program called 'The New Hawaii,' which provided the directions and guidelines to meet this goal. Only history can be the judge as to whether we have succeeded, or where we have been lacking.

Mr. Speaker, time does not allow me to go into the specifics of 'The New Hawaii' program of the 60's. But I believe some of its major headings are suggestive: (1) strengthening general education, (2) expanding and improving higher education, (3) contributing to the physical and social well-being of the individual, (4) improving and strengthening Hawaii's economic base, (5) developing diversified agriculture and fishing, (6) preserving and furthering culture and the arts, (7) strengthening the Hawaiian Homes Program, (8) strengthening Federal-State-local relations, (9) strengthening the Judiciary, and (10) strengthening representative government.

The final section of 'The New Hawaii' program dealt with government finances and expenditures, and I shall quote in part: 'Financing governmental operations and programs is a complex undertaking. Many of the expenditures required by the programs recommended in these legislative proposals are in the nature of an investment in the future of the State; others will reduce the need for future public expenditures of a remedial or custodial nature. It must also be recognized that a society has an obligation to pay its public employees a fair wage.

In considering our tax structure it is important to consider the burden which the tax system imposes on taxpayers from different income brackets.'

Mr. Speaker, I recognize that we have not met all these goals and that the situation in some areas may have scarcely improved. But I submit our legislative predecessors did respond imaginatively and act responsibly to the challenges of earlier times. In reflecting on earlier times, I do not mean to imply that this body has not acted responsibly and responsibly.

Certainly, we have been alert to the challenges that lie ahead and diligent in facing up to these challenges. This is clearly reflected in the program of the Democratic majority, submitted to you in February of this year. I quote in part from this document: 'We believe that the decade of the 80's will bring years of fiscal uncertainty, double digit inflation, and a more conservative mood at the national level. Federal cutbacks in social and educational programs place a greater burden on the Democratic majority to protect and safeguard hard-won educational, social, and economic gains. We believe that equal emphasis must be placed on effective planning and management to protect and preserve what is special and unique about this place we live in.

'We believe that the public has a right to expect that the State's fiscal integrity is maintained, that public funds are expended wisely, and that government operations are executed efficiently.

'We believe in guaranteeing equal education opportunities, recognition of our rich cultural heritage and a strong public arts program, and a well-managed higher educational system.

'We believe that our corrections system must always allow for those who can be rehabilitated and reintegrated as citizens of this State and that strong and effective crime prevention and control programs must coexist within a system of justice that is fair and impartial.'

Mr. Speaker, to elaborate for a moment on this last section, many of us have been deeply concerned

over the rising crime rate in our communities and the seeming inability of our enforcement and judicial authorities to cope with it.

I have no special expertise to contribute, except an inner feeling that we can do more within our educational system, especially at the early levels. As a step in this direction, your Committee on Finance has increased the funding for the Comprehensive School Alienation Program, with the proviso that additional efforts be undertaken at the elementary school levels to prevent dropout and other crisis situations from emerging. Such federally-supported programs as Project Head Start and its follow through program also offer potentials for socially-beneficial preventive measures, rather than socially-costly corrective actions. In view of the increasing seriousness of the situation and the possibility of federal cutbacks in these areas, your Committee intends to increase its vigilance to assure that meritorious programs will be sustained.

Mr. Speaker, to continue with the Democratic majority program, there are additional provisions dealing with consumer protection, agricultural development, employment opportunities, economic diversification, reliable transportation, environmental protection, ocean and energy resource development, public assistance and human services, and State planning.

Mr. Speaker, I don't think any of us will disagree with the intent of these objectives. In fact, they sound very much like the goals of 'The New Hawaii' program. What we really need is a renewed spirit of progressive leadership, purposeful action, and community participation in meeting the challenges which are so clearly and cogently stated in the Democratic majority program. What we need is a renewed Hawaii for the 80's.

In addition to the uncertainties of the times, the new requirements of our State Constitution compel us to respond in a more responsible fashion.

There are new constitutional limitations on general fund expenditures, on the amount of debt service charges, and on any excess revenues which can be retained in the general fund. Senate Bill No. 557, SD 1, was amended by the House as House Draft 1 and it implements the constitutional provisions relating to disposition of excess revenues by providing for a general tax credit of \$100 for each qualified taxpayer and dependent in the State. It also

greatly increases the existing excise tax credits by nearly four times the present rates and adds two new levels of claims to the current schedule. House Draft 1 of S.B. No. 815, SD 2, raises the eligibility level for low-income and gap group renters and increases their income tax credits by 50 per cent.

House Draft 1 of S.B. No. 734, SD 1, together with your committee's recommendations on the State biennial budget, responds to the constitutional limitations on general fund expenditures and debt service charges.

Mr. Speaker, your committee has attempted to act responsibly in dealing with these new requirements and with the uncertain economic climate. Fortunately, the State currently has a budgetary cushion, and we have been able to respond appropriately in the limited time available. However, in the very near future, we will no longer have a margin for error and must act in an even more responsible manner.

How can this be done? Mr. Speaker and members of this honorable body, permit me to suggest a planning approach from the vantage point of your Finance Committee. This approach is grounded on the precept of fiscal integrity. It represents a combination of fiscal outlook planning and fiscal impact analysis.

What we need at the beginning of each session or before your committees undertake serious program deliberations is a concise, yet comprehensive and meaningful, statement of the State's fiscal outlook for the next 5 to 10 years. The statement should be more than a mechanical projection of current revenue and expenditure trends. It should take account of developments in the private, as well as public, sector. It should reflect our best judgments on national and international, as well as local, developments. It should be cast in such a form that decision makers, legislative or administrative, can clearly see what the policy options are and can evaluate the longer-term fiscal implications of the various options.

The fiscal outlook statement should examine first the adequacy and efficiency of the existing tax structure and other revenue sources to see if they will meet future public service and expenditure requirements.

Then it should lay out the options

on the consequences of various changes in tax rates or tax base definitions, together with different levels of aspiration, in terms of the quantity and quality of public service. Only if this type of information, however preliminary or judgmental, is available ahead of time can more informed judgments and decisions be made.

Mr. Speaker, I also spoke of fiscal impact analysis as necessary for a more responsible public decision-making process. In brief, I'm referring to a more explicit and meaningful analysis of the various cost as well as revenue implications of the numerous projects which are presented each session for legislative funding. I would propose that every agency, public and private, provide with their presentations this type of analysis in some agreed-upon format so that your committees can respond to their requests in a more responsible manner. This would apply not only to specific projects, but to all physical, economic or social plans which have fiscal implications.

Mr. Speaker, I am aware that the State already has an elaborate planning process within the context of a State Plan pending various functional plans, and priority directions. It also has a detailed and comprehensive program planning and budgeting system in place. It has issued all kinds of revenue projections which your committee has found useful. There are also the ongoing deliberations on the Tax Review Commission.

The fiscal outlook and impact analysis I am suggesting here does not intend to supersede these worthwhile efforts nor impose additional burdensome reporting requirements. What I'm proposing is that the information already available to the various involved agencies be developed in such a way as to facilitate legislative policymaking. If we are able to do this, we will finally have a responsible planning process that is truly responsive to changing economic and social needs of our beloved State of Hawaii."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 734, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative de Heer being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 734 had passed Third Reading at 1:04 o'clock p.m.

At 1:05 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:06 o'clock p.m.

A concurrent resolution (H.C.R. No. 222) requesting a review of

the need to provide for the coordinated implementation of the Hawaii state correctional master plan was jointly offered by Representatives Honda, Albano, Andrews, Baker, Dods, D. Hagino, G. Hagino, Ige, Kawakami, Medeiros, Okamura, Sakamoto, Shito, Takitani, Taniguchi and Waihee.

A concurrent resolution (H.C.R. No. 223) requesting a review of the problem of cattle and other livestock rustling was jointly offered by Representatives Takamine, Isbell, Levin, Matsuura and Segawa.

A concurrent resolution (H.C.R. No. 224) requesting a status report from the juvenile justice coordinating council was jointly offered by Representatives Ikeda and Medeiros.

#### SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Stanley, seconded by Representative Rohlfing and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering bills on Third Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar.

#### THIRD READING

The following bills which were on the calendar for Third Reading, were read throughout and the following action taken:

##### S.B. No. 1642, SD1:

On motion by Representative Aki, seconded by Representative Segawa, S.B. No. 1642, SD1 entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NURSING", passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes with Representative de Heer being excused.

##### S.B. No. 1449:

By unanimous consent, action was deferred to the end of the calendar.

##### S.B. No. 562:

On motion by Representative Takitani, seconded by Representative Taniguchi, S.B. No. 562 entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GOVERNMENT MOTOR VEHICLES", passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes with Representative de Heer being excused.

##### S.B. No. 1163, SD1:

On motion by Representative Nakamura,

seconded by Representative Taniguchi, S.B. No. 1163, SD1 entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHAPTER 706, HAWAII REVISED STATUTES", passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes with Representative de Heer being excused.

##### S.B. No. 592:

On motion by Representative Blair, seconded by Representative Hirono, S.B. No. 592 entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE BOARD OF CERTIFICATION OF PRACTICING PSYCHOLOGISTS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes with Representative de Heer being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 1642, SD1; 562; 1163, SD1; and 592 had passed Third Reading at 11:23 o'clock a.m.

##### S.B. No. 1449:

Representative Takitani moved that S.B. No. 1449 pass Third Reading seconded by Representative Tungpalan.

Representative Ikeda rose to speak for this bill with reservations stating:

"S.B. No. 1449 deletes the definition of "service fees" and substitutes "dues" which will be determined by the union, or exclusive representative, and collected from all employees. This bill will further amend the collective bargaining statute by making no distinction between service fees and dues, and not including a definition of dues in the statute; allowing the unions to determine how much in dues will be assessed without the necessity of a review by the Hawaii Public Employment Relations Board to determine whether the dues are reasonable; and by requiring all employees, regardless of their affiliation, to pay these dues since the exclusive representative is given the right to have such dues deducted from an employee's payroll. This bill also mandates that the unions establish a refund procedure for non-members for the portion of dues spent on "activities of a political and ideological nature unrelated to terms and conditions of employment."

The exclusive representatives have cited the amounts of time, money and resources required to justify service fees before HPERB, and have said that procedures for refunding pro-rata amounts used for activities unrelated to collective bargaining are established. We have also heard the reasonable argument that while HPERB will no longer determine the amount of dues

to be charged, union members themselves will be effective watch-dogs on unnecessary increases.

Mr. Speaker, the Hawaii Public Employment Relations Board has established, through a history of court cases and labor laws, eight categories of expenditures that are now chargeable to non-member employees. There may be a question, however, under this measure, as to whether three of HPERB's categories would fall under the definition of "activities of a political and ideological nature unrelated to terms and conditions of employment" as stated in the bill.

The categories are: 1. expenditures for programs of benefit to union members only such as a group insurance or a disability income plan; 2. costs for recreational and social activities; and 3. costs for associate and retiree member programs. These activities are not currently funded by non-member employees.

It is my hope that in adopting their guideline for refunding amounts to non-members, that the unions will integrate HPERB's already established guidelines."

Representative Marumoto requested that her remarks in opposition to S.B. No. 1449 be inserted in the Journal and the Chair noting that there were no objections, so ordered.

The remarks of Representative Marumoto are as follows:

"Current law gives public employees the right of self-organization for the purpose of bargaining collectively through representatives of their own choosing on questions of wages, hours and other terms and conditions of employment, and to engage in other concerted activities for mutual aid and protection. It also guarantees that such employee has the right to refrain from any or all of such activities except to the extent of making payments for reasonable "service fees," which are defined as a pro rata "assessment of all employees in an appropriate bargaining unit to defray the cost for services rendered by the exclusive representative in negotiations contract administration." The "service fee," as determined by the Hawaii Public Employment Relations Board (HPERB) to be reasonable, is deducted from the payroll of every employee in the bargaining unit and remitted to the exclusive

representative. The law establishes an "agency shop" and creates an equitable procedure which insures that exclusive representatives can collect funds which are necessary for the performance of its statutorily permissible functions and duties, but which also protects non-member employees from having to pay for activities or causes of a social, political, or ideological nature which are unrelated or only incidentally related to wages, hours, and conditions of employment.

S.B. No. 1449 upsets this balance between representative and nonmember rights, and has the practical effect of benefiting the representative at the expense of the non-member employee. On its face, the bill merely modifies the procedure by which non-member employee agency-shop fees are paid, and in theory, the total amount ultimately paid by a non-member under S.B. No. 1449 ("regular dues" less refunds) should be equivalent to the amount of the "service fee" payable under current law. In reality, S.B. No. 1449 is nothing more than government permission to representatives to collect and use money belonging to non-member employees for statutorily impermissible purposes.

Under law, the representative is entitled to deduct from non-member employees' payroll only that amount which an impartial board (HPERB) has determined to be reasonable and necessary to defray the cost of the representative's services in negotiating and administering the collective bargaining agreement. This results in non-member employees paying their fair share of the representative's expenses, without depriving them temporarily or permanently, of the use of their remaining earnings as they see fit.

S.B. No. 1449 amends the law to allow the representative to collect from every non-member employee an amount equivalent to "regular dues." The amount of "regular dues" is established, not by an impartial board, but by the representative. The term "regular dues" is not defined. Undoubtedly it includes amounts over and above those presently defined as "service fees" which are earmarked for expenditure on activities unrelated to terms and conditions of employment. By law, non-member employees are not obligated to pay any fees which are to be used for unrelated activities, yet the representative

is entitled to collect such amounts from them.

To be sure, S.B. No. 1449 provides for a refund of such amounts upon demand by a non-member employee. However, until such demand is made, the representative has the interest free and uncontrolled use of money which clearly belongs to the non-member employee. While the actual sums involved will be a function of the number of non-member employees and the extent to which the regular dues exceed reasonable service fees, they will undoubtedly be substantial, and the unions will benefit greatly from even temporary use thereof.

Of even greater concern is the opportunity for the permanent conversion of such sums to union use. The refund of such sums is conditioned upon demand in accordance with procedures promulgated by the union. Peer pressure and inconvenience of demanding a refund could discourage some non-member employees from exercising their rights. Since it is in the union's self interest to retain as much of the money collected as possible, it is not inconceivable that the representative will promulgate complex or burdensome procedures to further discourage demands for refunds. And since the amount of the refunds is determined by the union, the presence of self interest automatically raises doubts about the fairness or reasonableness of the amount refunded. Although a non-member employee who disagrees with the amount of the refund may petition HPERB for review, review is not guaranteed, and the same factors which discourage demands for refund will deter requests for review. Court challenges will be rare merely because of the cost. Thus, the union benefits to the extent it can impair demands for, or review of refunds.

The effect of the changes is twofold. A union must presently justify, to the satisfaction of an impartial party, the reasonableness of the agency fees prior to collection; S.B. No. 1449 defers the need for justification until after the fees have been collected, and then, only if a request for review has been made and granted. In addition, the current burden of providing a positive (costs

of negotiating and administering an agreement) is replaced with the burden of proving a negative (activities of a political and ideological nature unrelated to terms and conditions of employment). The result is the creation of an presumption that all dues collected by the union from non-member employees are justifiable, unless and until rebutted. This is contrary to one of the primary purposes of presumptions, which is to protect those who are not in a position to obtain information necessary to the resolution of a dispute by forcing those with the information at their disposal to justify their actions. Thus, for example, under existing law, a non-member employee could not be required to pay fees to be used for union social activities unless the union could justify that such activities are "services rendered in negotiating and administering an agreement." Under S.B. No. 1449, on the other hand, non-member employees are required to pay fees to be used for such a purpose, and the union's right to retain such fees is presumed unless the retention is challenged and it is shown that the social activities are political or ideological activities unrelated to terms and conditions of employment.

In short, S.B. No. 1449 removes much of the protection now accorded to non-member employees, and in so doing, establishes a procedural framework which allows unions to economically abuse the relatively powerless non-member employees. The changes are certainly not mandated by case law. In general, cases which have upheld the requirement that non-member employees must pay all dues subject to a refund have involved non-members who refused to pay any fees, although only a small portion were in dispute, for in such cases, the resulting lack of funds impair the union's collective bargaining function and threaten its stability. That rationale cannot be used to support S.B. No. 1449 since Hawaii law insures the influx of funds necessary for proper union functions by obligating non-members to pay their pro rata share of the representatives' collective bargaining costs. The real effect of S.B. No. 1449 is to provide unions with the means of obtaining additional money from non-members, moneys to which they have no valid claim, and I must strenuously object.

Also, by the removal of the term "service fee" from the law, HPERB

will no longer have budgetary review of the various collective bargaining representatives. Historically, collective bargaining was introduced in Hawaii with the proviso that a government board oversee the financial aspects of public employees unions. Any increase in service fees had to be justified to this board for its reasonableness. Dues were not justified to this board for its reasonableness. Dues were not included in this law as they were determined to be an internal function of the union and union members.

Without budgetary review, as S.B. No. 1449 would propose, both non-member and members must look out for themselves to insure that union expenditures and dues are handled in their best interest.

For these reasons, I urge the defeat of this bill."

Representative Rohlfing rose to speak in favor of the bill with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, very briefly, I think that there is definitely a recognition that there have been problems in this area, and this is an attempt to clear up some of the problems. By the same token, for myself and at least one or more members of the Republican minority, we have some real concerns about the fact that this is not allowed to be a matter for

collective bargaining. And consistent with the philosophy that I stated in the past, matters relating to a person's employment as a whole ought to be bargainable subject if you believe in collective bargaining. I personally feel that that would be the way to go in resolving this particular problem, leaving it to the bargaining table to resolve, rather than having to come back to the legislature for tinkering with the law. In the broader form of bargaining that we could have, the more we could rely on it as being an effective system which would allow for policing within the system itself on both sides, I think that would be the more satisfactory way of dealing with this, but since we have this bill before us and it requires an aye or a nay, I will vote in favor of the measure."

The motion to pass S.B. No. 1449 entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COLLECTIVE BARGAINING", on Third Reading was put by the Chair and carried by a vote of 47 ayes, with Representatives Lacy, Liu and Marumoto voting no, and Representative de Heer being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 1449 had passed Third Reading at 12:24 o'clock p.m.

Representative Taniguchi.

Representative Rohlfing then asked other members of SPIA who were seated in the gallery to stand and be recognized, as follows: Mr. T.J. Townsend, Division Manager; Titaina V. Teiti, Maria C. Netzler, Francoise Puairau, Naufanua E. Lauago and Tauamo Tafunua'i, flight attendants.

Representative Ikeda then presented a white carnation lei to Mr. Wray while Representatives Isbell, Kamali'i, Marumoto, Medeiros, Anderson, Monahan and Wong presented floral leis to the other members of the delegation. Representative Rohlfing presented Mr. Wray with a certified copy of the resolution.

Representative Rohlfing further stated:

"Mr. Speaker, one final word. On behalf of President George Wray of SPIA, he has informed me that he would like the members of this body to have the opportunity of making an in-depth study of the Tahitian Legislature and the American Samoan Fono. In accordance therewith, he has stated that should any of you like to take a trip to Samoa and Tahiti, round trip for one person between now and June 15th, he would be glad to extend that on a 'manuahi' basis.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

A resolution (H.R. No. 701) extending welcome and aloha to the Kitakyushu Takato Lions Club was jointly offered by Representatives Nakasato, Waihee, Narvaes, Albano, Aki, Fukunaga, G. Hagino, Hashimoto, Hirono, Ikeda, Isbell, Kobayashi, Matsuura and Takitani.

On motion by Representative Nakasato, seconded by Representative Waihee and carried, H.R. No. 701 was adopted.

A resolution (H.R. No. 702) honoring Chester Ishimoto for

his outstanding devotion to the people of Kalihi-Palama was jointly offered by Representatives Nakasato, Waihee, Narvaes, Albano, Aki, Fukunaga, G. Hagino, Hashimoto, Hirono, Ikeda, Isbell, Kobayashi, Matsuura and Takitani.

On motion by Representative Nakasato, seconded by Representative Waihee and carried, H.R. No. 702 was adopted.

Representative Nakasato then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, you know, I have waited 55 days to make an introduction on the floor, and today, I had three big introductions, but unfortunately, two of them left me. They were the Kitakyushu Lions from Fukuoka, Japan, and the Kalakaua Lions Club from Kalihi, U.S.A. The tour conductor changed schedules on me at the last minute. They just received their leis and they left.

But, Mr. Speaker, I have the most important resolution of all, and that is to honor Mr. Chester Ishimoto. We, here on the floor, all do tons and tons of community service but Mr. Ishimoto does this despite the fact that he is totally blind. Over 21 years now, Mr. Ishimoto has given undue but uncounted hours and money to the community of Kalihi Valley and Kalihi in general."

Representative Nakasato then presented Mr. Ishimoto to the members of the House and audience.

Representative Nakasato continued:

"Mr. Ishimoto had two children -- a daughter, Caroline, who passed away at age 19 from leukemia, and today, he also has with him his son, Jimmy." Representative Nakasato then asked Jimmy to stand and be recognized.

Representatives Hashimoto, Fukunaga, Chun and Hirono then presented floral leis to Mr. Ishimoto and Jimmy while Representative Nakasato presented the honoree with a certified copy of the resolution.

At 12:07 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair, "for the purpose of extending our personal aloha and congratulations to our honorees this morning."

Upon reconvening at 12:20 o'clock p.m., the Chair directed the Clerk

to note the presence of Representatives Honda and Yamada.

A resolution (H.R. No. 703) expressing sincere condolences to the family of the late Mary Malpass Nakashima was jointly offered by Representatives Yamada, Kawakami, Kunimura, Albano, Anderson, Andrews, Baker, Blair, de Heer, D. Hagino, Hashimoto, Honda, Ige, Ikeda, Isbell, Kihano, Kiyabu, Kobayashi, Levin, Liu, Medeiros, Monahan, Narvaes, Sakamoto, Shito, Stanley, Takitani, Taniguchi, Waihee and Wong.

On motion by Representative Yamada, seconded by Representative Kawakami and carried, H.R. No. 703 was adopted by a rising vote.

A resolution (H.R. No. 704) commending the Kalakaua Lions Club for thirty years of combined community service was jointly offered by Representatives Nakasato, Waihee, Narvaes, Albano, Aki, Fukunaga, G. Hagino, Hashimoto, Hirono, Ikeda, Isbell, Kobayashi, Matsuura and Takitani.

On motion by Representative Nakasato, seconded by Representative Waihee and carried, H.R. No. 704 was adopted.

A resolution (H.R. No. 705) commemorating the Silver Anniversary of Kaewai Elementary School was jointly offered by Representatives Nakasato, Waihee, Narvaes, Albano, Aki, Fukunaga, G. Hagino, Hashimoto, Hirono, Ikeda, Isbell, Kobayashi, Matsuura and Takitani.

On motion by Representative Nakasato, seconded by Representative Waihee and carried, H.R. No. 705 was adopted.

A resolution (H.R. No. 706) recognizing the observance of Professional Secretaries Week,

April 19 to 25, 1981 and of Professional Secretaries Day on April 22 was jointly offered by Representatives Anderson, Aki, Albano, Andrews, Baker, Chun, de Heer, Dods, Fukunaga, D. Hagino, G. Hagino, Hirono, Honda, Ige, Ikeda, Isbell, Kamali'i, Kawakami, Kihano, Kiyabu, Kobayashi, Lacy, Liu, Marumoto, Medeiros, Monahan, Narvaes, Okamura, Rohfling, Sakamoto, Say, Segawa, Shito, Takamine, Takitani, Taniguchi, Toguchi, Tungpalan, Waihee and Wong.

On motion by Representative Anderson, seconded by Representative Say and carried, H.R. No. 706 was adopted.

A resolution (H.R. No. 707) joining the people of American Samoa in their celebration of Flag Day was jointly offered by Representatives Rohfling, Albano, Hagino, Nakasato, Narvaes and Waihee.

On motion by Representative Rohfling, seconded by Representative Narvaes and carried, H.R. No. 707 was adopted.

At 12:24 o'clock p.m., Representative Sakamoto asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:25 o'clock p.m.

At this time, Representative Kunimura rose and requested the waiver of the 48-hour hearing notice on some Senate bills and the Chair "so ordered."

At 12:31 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative Stanley, seconded by Representative Rohfling and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m. on Monday, April 20, 1981.
