Tuesday, April 6, 1982

The House of Representatives of the Eleventh Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1982, convened at 11:00 o'clock a.m., with the Vice Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Representative Russell Blair, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Kamali'i and Wong, who were excused.

By unanimous consent, reading and approval of the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Forty-Seventh Day was deferred.

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

A message from the Governor (Gov. Msg. No. 10) informing the House that on April 1, 1982, he signed House Bill No. 2319-82, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE JUDICIARY", as Act 3, was read by the Clerk and was placed on file.

At this time, the following introductions were made to the members of the House:

Representative Hashimoto introduced a group of fifth and eighth grade students from Our Savior Lutheran Church. They were accompanied by their teachers, Mrs. Jerry Jessen, Ms. Dorothy Wegener, and parents, Mrs. Toorinjian, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Moriwaki and Mr. and Mrs. Moe Braydon.

Representative Toguchi introduced 51 third and fourth grade students from St. Andrew's Priory. They were accompanied by their teachers, Mrs. Cushing and Mrs. Kim, and a chaperone, Mrs. Leong.

Representative Blair introduced a group of students from Island Paradise School. They were accompanied by their teacher, Mrs. Esado.

ORDER OF THE DAY

SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Stanley, seconded by Representative Rohlring and carried, the rules were suspended

for the purpose of considering resolutions out of order.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

At this time, the Clerk read House Resolution No. 307, recognizing the importance of Pidgin English and commending the promoters of pidgin for their work, which resolution was adopted on April 1, 1982.

Representative D. Hagino then rose and stated:

"I think today represents the pinnacle of my efforts to promote Pidgin English since I've been elected to the State Legislature. Two years ago, when Representative Say was chairman of Culture and Arts, we invited Derek Chock and Darrell Lum from Bamboo Ridge to give a poetry reading. I've had Jim Benton from Booga Booga and Arnold Hiro from Talk Story on my staff, and basically, I think their presence here enriched our lives in terms of what Pidgin English was about.

"Today is the crowning point. We have someone who has written a very scholarly work, which was reviewed by Newsweek magazine several weeks ago -- a full page review of his work and his book. We have people who took a humorous approach to Pidgin English. We could see the difference to their approaches if I would just read to you from Dr. Bickerton's book, Roots of Language. Just one short passage that's on the review: 'Bickerton sets out to answer these questions by means of a dynamic evolutionary approach which ends the isolation of linguistics from the other human sciences without sacrificing the autonomy of linguistics for alternative social linguistics pragmatic or communicative proposals.'

"I'm not sure exactly what he meant by that, but I'm sure Pidgin to the Max guys could put it in a different approach. The main thing is that the both of them are giving us an understanding of Pidgin English, something which all of us grew up with and I want to thank them for their efforts."

At this time, Representative D. Hagino introduced Professor Bickerton, Douglas Simonson, Pat Sasaki and Ken Sakata.

Representatives Tungpalan, Hirono, Say and Stanley then presented the honorees with leis; Representative Toguchi presented the certified copies of the resolution; and Representative D. Hagino presented the honorees with his own book on Pidgin English.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative D. Hagino and carried, H.R. No. 322 was adopted.

Representative Okamura then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, I am truly honored today to introduce to you one of Hawaii's foremost artisans and world renowned masters of the ancient art of the Japanese kimono. She is also a collector of these fine garments, having acquired a respectable number of kimonos over the years. She has also very unselfishly given of her time and expertise to the Cherry Blossom Festivals for over thirty years, where many of the Cherry Blossom queens have worn these priceless kimonos.

"As most of you know, the Japanese place a lot of symbolism in the kimono. Its intricate designs, colors, and folds all have specific meanings. It takes many years of study and dedication to master the fine art of the kimono and we are honored today to have Mrs. Yorita here with us."

At this time, Representative Okamura introduced Mrs. Eiko Yorita, who was accompanied by her granddaughter, Lynn Mari Yorita, who will be succeeding her.

Representative Okamura then introduced Lynn Yorita's mother, Mrs. Miwako Yorita, who was seated in the gallery.

Representatives Hashimoto, Ikeda and Hirono then modeled Mrs. Eiko Yorita's kimonos for the members of the House and audience.

At this time, Representatives D. Hagino and Kunimura presented the honorees with leis, and Representative Kobayashi presented the certified copy of the resolution.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:16 o'clock p.m.

At this time, Representative de Heer rose on a point of information stating:

"Mr. Speaker, what is the situation with miscellaneous business?"

The Chair replied:

"State your point."

Representative Stanley rose on a point of order stating:

"Mr. Speaker, if I may be permitted, miscellaneous business under

our rules says that those matters that are lying on the Speaker's desk, and there are no matters lying on the Speaker's desk at this time."

The Chair stated:

"That is correct."

At this time, the Chair called for any announcements.

Representative de Heer rose and stated:

"At this time, I would like to appeal the referral . . ."

Representative Stanley interrupted on a point of order stating:

"Mr. Speaker, that motion would be improper as it is not on the Order of the Day, and we are under Item 11 which is announcements."

The Chair replied:

"That is correct."

Representative de Heer rose on a point of information stating:

"When will that motion be in order?"

At 12:16 o'clock p.m., at the request of Representative Dods, the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:40 o'clock p.m.

At 12:40 o'clock p.m., at the request of Representative de Heer, the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:43 o'clock p.m.

Representative Rohlfling rose on a point of parliamentary inquiry stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to have an enlightenment if I may, from the Chair, as to what constitutes miscellaneous business on the calendar of the House."

At 12:45 o'clock p.m., at the request of Representative Stanley, the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives

reconvened at 12:53 o'clock p.m.

At this time, the Speaker assumed the rostrum.

Representative Rohlfing continued:

"Mr. Speaker, when the short recess was taken I addressed a question to the Chair with respect to the process and manner of bringing miscellaneous business before the House pursuant to our rules, and as to some instruction and edification in order to know what this process entails, and I'm wondering if the Chair would enlighten me?"

The Chair answered:

"Representative Rohlfing, for your edification, I suggest that you turn to page 23, The Rules of the House, Rule 26.2 relating to the order of matters to be considered on the Order of the Day, Item 6 under that section indicates very clearly that any miscellaneous business shall be that business on the Speaker's table.

"I also suggest for your edification, the duties of the Speaker, Rule 2.1, Item 4. Part of my duties is to receive all matters brought properly before this House and I emphasize, properly. Is that sufficient, Representative Rohlfing?"

Representative Rohlfing replied:

"Mr. Speaker, one point of clarification. Does that imply in order to meet Rule 26, to have it on the Speaker's table for you to decide whether it's properly before this House, the document should be in writing? Is that the ruling?"

The Chair answered:

"Yes, and done in a timely fashion, with the basic courtesies shared to each member of the House."

Representative Anderson rose and asked:

"Is it a parliamentary procedure to keep order in the House?"

The Chair replied:

"Yes, it is."

Representative Anderson:

"And we have to take a recess for every issue before this House?"

The Chair answered:

"Representative Anderson, I believe it is part of the tradition, basic courtesies that we extend to each member, when they ask for a recess, if there is a question that can be resolved between two parties, then all efforts should be made to that end."

Representative Anderson:

"Your ruling at this point with Representative Rohlfing, does this mean that on any of these bills, if we are to disagree, that we have to put it down in writing first so that you know what we'll be speaking on?"

The Chair stated:

"Representative Anderson, any matter before the House to do with a bill, if it's up for second or third reading, the motion is made by the proper party, a second and under discussion, you will be allowed to say your piece."

Representative Anderson continued:

"And under discussion, may I ask a question of the Chairman of the State General Planning Committee?"

The Chair answered:

"Representative Anderson, I believe that matter has been resolved. Representative de Heer knows the proper process to which his concerns will be raised."

Representative Anderson:

"This has nothing to do with Representative de Heer's concerns, but more with my concerns as a committee person."

The Chair asked:

"What point are you speaking?"

Representative Yamada stated:

"I assume the person asking the question is rising on a point of information, therefore, the question that he asks is directed to the Speaker. There's nothing before this body at this time to warrant anything more than a question asked and a question

answered."

Representative Anderson continued:

"With the problems confronting us for the last three days, Thursday, Friday and today, on the State General Plan and the . . ."

The Chair interrupted asking:

"Are you rising on a point of information?"

Representative Anderson:

"No, I am trying to find out as a committee person, who has spent two years on a committee, how is it all of a sudden, I have not a chance to ask the chairman of that committee . . ."

The Chair interrupted and ruled Representative Anderson out of order stating:

"You have the opportunity of sharing your concerns with the Chairman of SGP immediately following the session, as a committee member of that committee."

Representative Anderson:

"Mr. Speaker, may I ask a question of the Chairman of Water, Land and Hawaiian Homes?"

The Chair replied:

"Representative Anderson, we are under announcements. That matter is not before this House. I appreciate your courtesies."

Representative Kunimura rose and asked for an adjournment, but the Chair having previously recognized Representative Rohlfing, acted upon Representative Rohlfing's request for a recess.

At 1:00 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:03 o'clock p.m.

Representative Narvaes rose on a parliamentary point of privilege stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is just to give support to what the previous Representative has said talking about the recesses. I believe

that we don't need to have as many recesses that we have."

Representative Stanley interrupted on a point of order.

Representative Narvaes continued:

"Mr. Speaker, I am on a point of parliamentary privilege."

The Speaker ruled:

"Representative Narvaes, there are basic courtesies that override both of those privileges. The minority floor leader requested the recess, and he got it."

Representative Narvaes:

"Mr. Speaker, I am not referring to that recess, and I understand what you're saying . . ."

Representative Stanley interrupted on a point of order.

The Chair ruled:

"Representative Narvaes, you are out of order."

Representative Narvaes asked:

"On what point am I out of order?"

Representative Stanley rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, you have called him out of order, and his recourse is to appeal that ruling."

Representative Narvaes:

"To appeal the ruling at this time would be a little silly, and a waste of our time."

The Chair stated:

"I hope that you would keep that in mind. If you want to continue this, the Chair would be more than happy to do so immediately following the session."

Representative Narvaes:

"Without a recess?"

The Chair:

"Absolutely."

On motion by Representative Aki, seconded by Representative Segawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. No. 231, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION REQUESTING HAWAII'S CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION TO WORK TOWARDS LEGISLATION TO EXTEND THE TEN-YEAR DELIMIT PERIOD WITHIN WHICH VETERANS ARE ELIGIBLE FOR EDUCATIONAL ASSISTANCE UNDER THE 'G.I. BILL' ", was referred to the Committee on Finance.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

A resolution (H.R. No. 333) extending welcome, acknowledgement, congratulations, and Aloha to Mr. Robert B. Huff and his family on their homecoming and his distinguished alumni award from the University of Hawaii was offered by Representative Wong.

Representative Wong then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, Bob Huff was an easy choice of one of the seventy-five distinguished graduates to be recognized in connection with the University of Hawaii's seventy-fifth anniversary.

"I first became acquainted with Bob in 1961 when he first arrived in Hawaii penniless, and recovering from a broken leg. If memory serves me correctly, Mr. Speaker, I, too, was recovering from a knee injury, and both Bob and I were hobbling along, and I mean that, both financially and physically.

"Back in the early sixties, it would have been difficult to convince Bob's friends, which included Dr. Dennis Chai, who is working here on his sabbatical, and Red Morris, who we are familiar with, and he walks the halls here, that in Bob's career path, he would be the president of Bell and Howell, a \$710 million a year corporation. But believe me, the proof is in the pudding.

"After carefully analyzing Bob's

career, Red Morris, Dennis and myself, and other members of the UH basketball team, all agree that the foundation of Bob's success really lies in surfing rather than basketball. It was really Hawaii's beaches that recruited Bob.

"Of course, there are other aspects of Bob's career, for it was at the University of Hawaii that Bob met Karen. She was a scholar-athlete, a member of the 1960 Olympic team, as a javelin thrower. I believe that our present Superintendent of Education, Dr. Donnison Thompson, had some influence on getting Karen to the University of Hawaii.

"Besides being on the basketball team, Bob was Sports Editor for the University's newspaper, Ka Leo, a student senator, and the 1965 winner of the Dean Bitner Award for the outstanding graduating senior.

"Mr. Speaker, getting married and supporting a family while completing a college education all at once is a horrendous undertaking filled with uncertainties and many, many frustrations. The fact that Bob and Karen accomplished this with honors is an achievement that they can certainly be proud of.

"In addition to all the responsibilities, Bob has contributed his time, back in the sixties, to Hiram Fong's successful campaign for the U.S. Senate. After graduating from the University of Hawaii, Bob worked as a market research analyst for Bell and Howell in Chicago, acquiring an MBA from Harvard and by 1968, directing a \$2 million a year audio-visual product division for Bell and Howell. By 1972, Bob acquired a reputation as Bell and Howell's top managers and was promoted to Vice President of Corporate Planning.

"Mr. Speaker, his experiences at the University of Hawaii really prepared Bob and Karen well. As the saying goes, 'when push comes to shove, and when the going gets tough, the tough get going'.

"And it was in 1974 that Bell and Howell recognized more of Bob's abilities and potentials and placed in Bob's custody the mighty challenge of getting its fair market in the home improvement equipment business. Needless to say, Bob responded. In a course of a few years, under Bob's leadership, Bell and Howell

captured forty per cent of the movie equipment business. I am positive in the course of Bob's career, everything did not go as he might have wanted. There must have been the setbacks and the downers, for these two are vital elements in the learning process.

"The Board of Directors surely must have recognized the value of Bob's past experiences and particularly his winning track record, for they promoted Bob Huff to president and chief operating officer in 1981. Certainly, his ole gang and ole friends saw some potential in Bob back in the early sixties, but we really didn't realize that he would blossom into a chief executive officer.

"Seriously, all of his friends at the University of Hawaii and his basketball team, are proud and certainly delighted to have played a small part in Bob and Karen's life."

At this time, Representative Wong introduced Mr. Bob Huff and his wife, Karen to the members of the House. Representative Wong also introduced his daughter, Malia and his son, Matthew.

Representatives Chun and Rohlfing presented the honorees with leis, and Representative Wong presented the certified copy of the resolution.

SUSPENSION OR RULES

On motion by Representative Stanley, seconded by Representative Rohlfing and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering a resolution.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION

At this time, the Clerk read H.R.

No. 367, commending Irene Fujimoto for thirty years of community service to the Kalihi-Palama area which was adopted on April 13, 1982.

Representative Nakasato then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, before I introduce this beautiful and gracious lady, I would just like to add that Irene Fujimoto also has over 25 years of service to the City and State. And now, even though she is retired, Irene is even busier with community activities. In her, you will find a rare breed of person that serves the community for no ulterior motive."

Representative Nakasato then presented Irene Fujimoto to the members of the House and audience.

Representative Nakasato also asked members of the Board of the Directors of the Kalihi-Palama Community Council, who were seated in the gallery, to stand and be recognized.

Floral leis were presented to the honoree, Irene Fujimoto, by Representatives Waihee and Albano while Representative Nakasato presented her with a certified copy of the resolution.

At 11:47 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair, "for the privilege of meeting our honoree and express to her our aloha."

Upon reconvening at 11:57 o'clock a.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives Albano, Narvaes and Taniguchi.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Representative Nakamura, for the majority of the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 865-82) recommending that S.C.R. No. 42, SD 1, be adopted.

Representative Taniguchi moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and S.C.R. No. 42, SD 1, be adopted, seconded by Representative Dods,

Representative Liu then rose to speak against the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, there is an old story about the difference between a misfortune and a calamity. Back in the days of Disreili and Gladstone, those two members of Parliament used to always argue over words and the meanings of them. One day, it was asked by

Mr. Gladstone to Mr. Disreili: 'Do you know the difference between a misfortune and a calamity?' And Mr. Gladstone said, 'Yes, I do. If you fell into the river, Mr. Disreili, that would be a misfortune. But, if someone picked you up, that would be a calamity.'

Mr. Speaker, it was a misfortune for this resolution to come out of committee and it is somewhat of a calamity that it is on the floor this morning.

This represents the same kind of mentality that created the concept of manifest destiny; the same kind of concept that created the idea of America as the fortress of democracy. Do we really think that there is an American way to peace, as perhaps we have thought that there is an American way to the use of force? There exists various schools of diplomacy in this and other countries. We have the Fletcher School of Diplomacy connected with Tufts University, the Woodrow Wilson School of Administration and Diplomacy, and the International Institute of Peace in Geneva.

The intent of this resolution is perhaps to bring in people from other countries. But if the United Nations cannot carry out such a program because of international jealousies, is it realistic that an Academy of Peace in the United States will be able to attract persons from across the world? This is folly, Mr. Speaker. Merely by our existence as one of the most powerful and richest countries in the world do I doubt that we will ever be in a position of neutrality, regardless of what we may desire.

Finally, Mr. Speaker, peace to different lands come when people have jobs, when they have solved their population problems, when expectations and resources find some kind of amicable balance. If the United States would spend the resources that this resolution envisions into areas that I have just mentioned -- to a body such as the East-West Center, you would be much further along the road toward building, not just the U.S. peace, Mr. Speaker, but a world peace.

This resolution represents, to me, misdirected idealism as wrong as misdirected military adventurism that I also oppose.

I ask my colleagues to please vote against this resolution.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Blair then rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, while it is true, as was previously stated, that there is no American form of peace which can be forced off in a jingoistic fashion on the rest of the world, it is, nonetheless, equally true that the world quite often, probably principally because we are a very powerful nation, does look to the United States as an honest broker in disagreements between nations. I think we can look to two very prominent and fairly recent examples in Camp David, and even more recently, in the conflict between Argentina and England where the United States is being looked to by those parties as an honest broker to help them work out their disagreements. Now, whether this is an appropriate role for the United States or not, I will leave to Representative Liu to determine.

But the practical nature of our world is that that is a role that we have been forced to assume, at least from time to time, and I think that the Peace Academy could be very instrumental in providing the type of individual who would be very helpful in resolving these disputes, which is to take nothing away from Alexander Haig, but it may be possible for us to train people to handle these kinds of disputes, and I would think that, while this may not be the answer, it is certainly one that is worth pursuing, and I would urge that all of my colleagues support this resolution."

Representative de Heer then rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I hadn't intended on speaking on it but because of comments of the previous speakers, I think some words are important.

The Representative from the 15th district -- many of his criticisms as to the inefficiency and the inability of the United States to deal in peacetime or wartime situations in recent years are correct. However, I look to the time when the Camp David peace accords were signed and the mood of national optimism that followed and the mood of national depression which followed that because the Camp David accords were not signed.

Any activity that governments, individually and collectively, can do to support the concept of peace should be supported thoroughly and

completely. Peace is a good thing -- something that we all should work for. We don't say that the adoption . . . or the adoption of this resolution on the ultimate establishment of the National Academy of Peace will bring peace. I think it is important that some government money, considering the billions and billions of dollars that are being spent on developing our war-making abilities that a small percentage -- a fraction -- should be spent in developing our peace-making abilities. And I think that is a positive and constructive expenditure of Federal government dollars, not to mention State dollars.

It is also our hope that the Academy of Peace will be located here in the 50th State. We are the ideal location -- two-thirds of the world's population live within the Pacific Basin. Certainly, this is going to be the focal point of economics, politics and scientific advancement of the next century, and Hawaii can play an essential role. I think it is important that we go and support activities like this.

As to the institutions that have been mentioned. . . all of the institutions that have been mentioned are generally dominated by corporate interests. Hopefully, this Academy of Peace will not be dominated by corporate interests but will, in turn, be dominated, or at least have influence by pacifist interest, and with those thoughts in mind, I urge every member of this body to vote in favor of this resolution.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative D. Hagino then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise just to inform the members of the body that I am the prime author of a resolution asking the United States to stop their covert operations in Guatemala and El Salvador, and also a resolution asking that there be a freeze on the nuclear arms race by this country.

But I would like to say that on this resolution, and it may shock some people, I do agree with my colleague from the 15th representative district, and I am going to vote against this resolution. I believe that for America to truly pursue the aims of peace in this world, there are other methods we can use. For example, although the United States may be, in terms of the quantity of foreign aid, we may

give more foreign aid than any other country. In terms of the gross national product, we rank 19th in the world.

And, if we truly believe in peace, there are other more direct ways that this country can take in bringing about the goal of world peace. So, I am going to vote no on this resolution.

Thank you."

Representative Kunimura then rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"I intended not to speak this morning on this resolution, but I cannot help but rise and feel I should contribute what I feel to be putting this House in order.

Mr. Speaker, way before mankind developed the awesome bomb, way before mankind even had the idea of covert activities, men had already the tools of war -- a piece of log, a stone, a sharp piece of wood, and those were developed into spears, bows and arrows, and finally, the gun powder was invented and covert activities became more easily obtainable because of the mode of transportation and the electronic devices.

What are we talking about -- asking ourselves to disarm? Asking ourselves to close our eyes as to what our neighbors are doing? Then bring about peace? I think it is utterly asinine.

Mr. Speaker, maybe we ought to all cut our arms off and make our eyes blind and cut our legs off so we would be peaceful, so we can never injure anybody else and, maybe to be sure before we cut our arms off, pull our teeth so we cannot bite our neighbors.

Mr. Speaker, this idea of establishing this Peace Academy, I believe, is the same idea that has brought fruit to a troubled community, and a troubled nation, that could not think of anything else but police, jail, courts, psychiatric treatment, and the whole expensive gamut, when there is, and there was available, something simple, almost for free, and it was for free. And that was the establishment of the neighborhood arbitration system -- getting people to talk, getting people to put their problems on the table. This is the beginning maybe. The world can learn from something so simple -- more simple than fire by friction, and yet, we talk about resolution asking the President of the United States to cut out the nuclear bomb; arming

ourselves, national defense -- cutting them all out; stop looking into what's happening on the other side of our border. If there is a fire in my neighbor's, certainly I would get my hose pipe and hose my house, and hose his house, and call the fire department before that.

I cannot understand that, Mr. Speaker. I believe this resolution is in time and is in tune. Let us start. . . maybe that is why the Bible is so simple. You don't have to go to college; you don't have to be an attorney to understand the Bible because God so intended that everybody can understand the Bible and not only the learned.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and S.C.R. No. 42, SD 1, entitled: "SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING PRESIDENT REAGAN AND THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES TO ESTABLISH A NATIONAL ACADEMY OF PEACE", was adopted, with Representatives Anderson and Liu voting no.

Representative Takamine, for the majority of the Committee on Agriculture, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 866-82) recommending that H.R. No. 245, as amended in HD 1, be adopted.

Representative Kihano proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"This morning, Mr. Speaker, we have some beautiful women with us. In Filipino, they say, 'mangandang dalaga'. And this morning, Mr. Speaker, it gives me great pride and privilege and honor to introduce to this body and to the gallery Miss Cora Lei Flores Rivera, Miss Oahu Filipina."

Representative Kihano then asked Cora to stand and be recognized.

Representative Kihano then introduced her court, as follows: Miss Tracy Larrua, Miss Mary Llanos, Miss Alana Pagdilao and Miss Theresa Freitas. Accompanying the Queen and her court was Miss Julie Ann Sagum, the former Miss Filipina Hawaii and coordinator of the 1982 Miss Oahu Filipina Beauty Pageant.

Floral leis were presented to Queen Cora and her court by Representatives Waihee, Albano, Shito, Liu and G. Hagino and Representative Chun presented Julie Ann with a lei. Representative Kihano presented them with certified copies of the resolution.

Representative Albano then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, we are really honored to have, in our midst today, these beautiful ladies of Filipino ancestry which my colleague called 'mangandang dalaga.' But I would like to say also in Ilocano 'napintas nga balasang', which is really true.

Mr. Speaker, the title that Miss Cora Lei Rivera holds is a culmination of a very rigorous training and many public appearances in preparation for the Pageant which was held at the Neal Blaisdell Center last April 7th, I guess, and I would like to extend, in behalf of this honorable body, our congratulations to this beautiful lady and to all members of her court, and wish her success in her participation of the State finals for the Miss Hawaii Filipina title. This is just a preliminary for Miss Rivera because she is going to compete with other queens of the other islands in the quest for the Miss Hawaii Filipina title which will be held in July.

And may I also congratulate Miss Julie Sagum who is a former Miss Oahu Filipina. . . I think in the year 1980, for having chaired the Pageant. It was a beautiful show that we have seen and for her good efforts, I congratulate you.

Thank you very much."

Representative Waihee then rose and stated:

"In the spirit of things, I thought I would get up and say a few words myself.

I wanted to really acknowledge this Pageant, having participated in it. It was my honor to give the talent award to Miss Oahu Filipina, but more importantly, what it did was to give me an opportunity to experience what is called the 'Barong Tagalog.' As you know, this is the formal wear of the Philippines and I would suggest that the members of this body that, in the future, this might be a more civilized type of dress for us to wear, given our climate and our background, than the required suit and tie.

The other thing I would like to bring up is that my partner from the 17th district was a little modest, and I think we all ought to know that as President of the Oahu Filipino Community Council, he was partially responsible for getting this contest

on the road some years ago, and that would be Gene Albano.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

A resolution (H.R. No. 397) congratulating Palauni M. Tuiasosopo, Assistant to the Governor of American Samoa was jointly offered by Representatives Rohlfling, Aki, Albano, Anderson, Andrews, Baker, Blair, Chun, de Heer, Dods, Fukunaga, D. Hagino, G. Hagino, Hashimoto, Hirono, Honda, Ige, Ikeda, Isbell, Kamali'i, Kawakami, Kihano, Kiyabu, Kobayashi, Kunimura, Lacy, Levin, Liu, Marumoto, Matsuura, Medeiros, Monahan, Morioka, Nakamura, Nakasato, Narvaes, Okamura, Sakamoto, Say, Segawa, Shito, Stanley, Takamine, Takitani, Taniguchi, Toguchi, Tungpalan, Waihee, Wong and Peters.

On motion by Representative Rohlfling, seconded by Representative Kihano and carried, H.R. No. 397 was adopted.

Representative Rohlfling then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, it is customary in this and other deliberative bodies to note one's privilege and honor in introducing one's guest. To introduce our honoree today is indeed such a privilege and honor for me. But, it is more than that in my case as 'Brownie' Tuiasosopo, in my opinion, personifies what is best in a Pacific islander. Not just because he is intelligent and thoughtful, not just because of his numerous contributions to Pacific regional progress, and not just because of his numerous contributions to the work of the Jean Haydon Museum in Pago Pago, and its splendid efforts at maintaining the culture and art of the people of American Samoa; rather, it is because, to me, Brownie personifies the soul of island people who, though educated in the American system, use that system wisely to protect and foster traditional and enduring values in the best interests of the people of the Pacific islands; values deeply rooted, for example in Fa'a Samoa -- the Samoan way of life.

I've known Brownie since my first South Pacific Conference meeting in Nauru in 1975. Since then, we have worked together on many projects for the people of American Samoa and for better understanding amongst Pacific peoples.

And, while our Legislature has a few eloquent speakers, hopefully, someday the members of this body will have a chance to hear Brownie Tuiasosopo address a South Pacific Commission meeting and then you will have seen

an eloquent speaker.

Brownie's presence here and his work on behalf of the Pacific Island Development Program, headed by James Makasiale of Fiji, and his work with Bob Kiste, the Director of the University of Hawaii Pacific Islands Program, is a sign of increased awareness of Hawaii's role as a Pacific Island 'country.' Members of the House, you will remember that last session we honored Dr. Macu Salato of Fiji and Bill Bodde, Ambassador to Fiji. Both of these learned gentlemen are now in diplomatic residence at the East-West Center.

So, I think we have come a long way toward working up to Hawaii's role in regional leadership. With Brownie's help, I am sure we'll be moving further ahead in days to come."

Representative Rohlfing then introduced Mr. Palauni "Brownie" Tuiasosopo to the members of the House and audience. Accompanying Brownie was Dr. Saeu Scanlan, "another distinguished American Samoan visiting us on her way back from a conference in Missouri. She is the President of the Community College in American Samoa."

Representatives Marumoto and Monahan then presented floral leis to Brownie and Dr. Scanlan, respectively, while Representative Rohlfing presented them with certified copies of the resolution.

Representative Monahan then rose and stated:

"I would also like to tell this honored body a short anecdote, perhaps to demonstrate the character of Brownie Tuiasosopo, whom I haven't seen in a long, long time.

When I was a very young teacher at Punahou, Brownie came up from Samoa -- he was a very bright young man then, little slimmer, and he was a man of character and integrity, and he was going to do everything just right. He studied hard, he did exactly what the teachers told, but in those days, we had ROTC, and there was one area that Brownie was not going to compromise the Samoan way. And Brownie insisted that he would wear the shirt, the epaulet, the pin, the hat, but by golly, he wasn't going to put those trousers on -- he was going to wear his lavalava and with great dignity,

Brownie was the only ROTC cadet in the whole island who trooped the line in a lavalava and Samoan slippers and he did it with great integrity. And it is certainly nice for me to see you again, Brownie."

Representative Rohlfing then introduced "some distinguished guests" who were seated in the gallery, as follows: Dr. Matu Salato "who was one of our honorees last year, who is back in the role of diplomat in residence at the East-West Center"; Mr. James Makasiale, Director of the Pacific Islands Development Program at the East-West Center; Dr. Robert Kiste of the University of Hawaii, Pacific Island Study Program; Mary Pritchard, "foremost Siapo artist in the world"; Mrs. Siumu Faai Uaso, Brownie's cousin; Dr. John Cook, "who was formerly the Senior Executive with the Ford Foundation and now a Senior Fellow at the East-West Center, who Brownie calls his 'American brother' and his wife, Katherine Cool; and Mr. John Wright, Historian from the Bishop Museum "who is working together with Mary Pritchard on a Siapo book."

At 11:37 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair, "for the purpose of extending our personal aloha and congratulations to our honorees this morning."

Upon reconvening at 11:50 o'clock a.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives Honda, Kobayashi, Segawa and Yamada.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Representatives Say and de Heer, for the majority of the Committees on Tourism and State General Planning, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 933-82) recommending that S.C.R. No. 10, SD2, as amended in HD1, be adopted.

Representative Say moved that the joint report of the majority of the Committees be adopted and S.C.R. No. 10, SD2, HD1, be adopted, seconded by Representative Stanley.

Representative de Heer rose to speak in favor of the resolution with reservations stating:

"For two years now, Mr. Speaker, I've had the privilege and opportunity to review the functional planning

process. Fortunately, I cannot be too sanguine about what is occurring in the development of the functional plans.

"Many issues have been raised about the relevance, about the need for the functional plans. I think all of us here today know why they are being pushed out; why the events that have occurred and surrounded them are happening.

"Much has been said, albeit primarily nebulous, about the common good that will result from the adoption of the state functional plans. However, it is only one side of the coin and one perspective.

"I believe in voting aye, and I want to make it absolutely clear to you, Mr. Speaker, that I'm only voting aye to avail myself to the House and the two years of work and experience, in case these measures for some reason come to conference committee. At that point, I would, under the Rules of the House, to vote no would conclude my serving on the conference committee, and I would like to have that opportunity. In order to do that, under the Rules, I will vote aye.

"Mr. Speaker, I have further remarks that I would like inserted in the Journal."

The Chair answered:

"So ordered."

The remarks of Representative de Heer are as follows:

"Having spent two years reviewing both the 1980 and 1981 functional plans and technical reference documents and other supporting information in great detail, the following comments appear salient and appropriate.

First, there is nowhere in the law any mechanism which would create new functional plans or require legislative review when these current plans are partially implemented, obsolete or no longer appropriate.

Second, the so-called functional plans are anything but plans. Rather, they represent a shopping list or wish list, yet without a specific plan to succeed at any set number of activities. Disclaimers to the contrary, this lends itself to a hidden agenda interpretation without tangible accountability,

and pork-barrel politics on a larger scale.

Third, nowhere in any of the functional plans or other supporting documentation are any existing programs or personnel proposed for elimination. Rather, a substantial number of programs and personnel amounting to billions of tax dollars are added to already swollen public sector budgets and bloated bureaucracies.

Fourth, the functional plans when viewed together as collective policy statements are first and foremost land use documents that emasculate and render the Land Use Commission and county zoning prerogatives effectively useless. This is accomplished through state control of conservation lands which uses the Board of Land and Natural Resources as currently the largest land use arbitrator and the designation of the Department of Agriculture's ALISH soil classification system as the primary arbitrator of agriculture, rural and urban development. The major problem here is a lack of any fair and equitable mechanism or accountability of actions to be taken and thus opens up plenty of opportunity for abuse in the form of "taking" of property rights and/or political extortion.

Fifth and probably most importantly, the functional plans predominantly serve big political campaign interest in the state at the expense of the general well-being of the resident population in the state.

All five of these points can perhaps be best illustrated with a scenario of what the state of the state would be ten years from now as a result of the adoption of the functional plans.

Report to the Legislature on the

--Executive Summary--

At best the functional plans and statewide planning process were well-intentioned first steps, but only that. At worst there can be said to have been no real plan.

Perhaps the root cause was that the supporting documentation was not demanded to be rigorous,

accurate, qualitatively and quantitatively consistent for all planning areas and be not having the state statistician certify that this was the case. The number of instances where this shortcoming had negative impacts are too numerous to mention. Suffice it to say that the information, data and tables presented generally were selectively put forward to substantiate the particular point of view that the state departments wished to put forward rather than an accurate and complete picture. This dependence on relative interpretation of the facts rather than the accurate total picture can only have been described as a self-serving presentation.

The results of this continued information was to a great extent the cause of today's major issues which were to have been ameliorated by the functional plans themselves. By specific functional areas the following illustrate the problem.

Agriculture - Sugar and pineapple have been marginally maintained. World and national pressures, as could have been anticipated, overwhelmed all state efforts to halt the serious deterioration which was apparent in the early 80's. The real disappointment was a lack of planning for this inevitable crucial transitory period. Nowhere in the functional plans were there any attempts to establish some mechanisms that provided for the conversion of "King Cane" into diversified agriculture. This despite contemporary events at the time of adoption, such as Puna sugar closing, which clearly highlighted the need for such planning.

Perhaps the overall failure in the agricultural plan was the lip service directed toward enhancing diversified agriculture. Had a real, genuine, aggressive and sound program been planned and established, these activities today could have more than offset the demise of sugar and pineapple and their current drain on the state's economic and lifestyle well-being. Though it was apparent that these diversified areas offered large growth sectors and provided more jobs and return on investments than sugar and pine, no significant incentives were provided. Of course, the functional plan did provide for agricultural parks, but these were leasehold arrangements controlled by the state. Thus, the farmers could not build up equity. Moreover, the size of

most of the lots are such that a profitable living is the exception rather than the norm. Lastly, little attention was given to the scientific areas of opportunity such as genetic research or salt water irrigation and hydroponics which increasingly are revolutionizing agriculture.

The upshot of all this is to leave agriculture in far worst straits than had been the case ten years ago. Most affected have been the neighbor islands, where economics and lifestyles are in turmoil with greater development pressures than ever before.

Tourism - Tourism never got much larger than it was in the early eighties. Though it can be expected that better times are ahead in the 1990's, we have come to realize finally that just throwing money at the problem is not a solution. We have also finally recognized that tourism is an international economic enterprise dependent on a favorable international economic conditions. The ten years since adoption of the functional plans have been uncharacteristically slow growth years as has the national economy. Our state excessive dependence on tourism has blinded us to other less vulnerable and more diversified growth industries. Further, the tensions that were present at the time of adoption have become more acrimonious with stagnation and lack of upward mobility for Hawaii's youth.

Housing - The situation is disgraceful and a crisis. At the time of adoption of the functional plans all urban, industrial, commercial and agricultural land amounted to only 13 to 15% (of which urban was 3 to 5%) of the state's total land mass. Today this remains the case. Yet, Honolulu has been increased in density such that housing inventory is rapidly deteriorating, urban open spaces have been reduced, and the social ills that correspond to this "ghettoization" are increasingly apparent. While failed government policies were tacitly acknowledged as the cause of the housing shortage and the high cost of housing (both ownership and rentals) this artificial scarcity has escalated the tension and hostility between have and have nots.

Perhaps the least acknowledged issue surrounding housing was the backdoor utilization of agricultural lands for housing. At the time of adoption the public, as surveyed, wanted conversion of such land to urban use only if it provided low, moderate and gap group housing. In fact, the "save and protect" our prime agricultural lands was invoked as the essential justification for the adoption of the plans. The truth ten years later is quite different. First, requiring housing for employees of industries in non-urban areas has led to greater loss of agricultural land than would have otherwise have been the case with a clear program for housing in available, non-agricultural areas. To further illustrate, virtually every resort destination was located within or in close proximity to agricultural land. With the surrounding employee housing having initiated an urban core in each of these areas, we thereby created Waikiki types of urban sprawl development as the apparent inevitable future for each of these desirable areas and consuming good agricultural land. Also, the provision for such employee housing in agricultural clusters while at the same time big agricultural operations were in decline is now used as necessary justification to establish housing in these agricultural areas where they currently exist due to the functional plan rather than opening up uninhabited areas lacking infrastructure. In this respect, the Department of Agriculture has become the center of urban development and land use determinations with more arbitrary and unaccountable powers than the preceding land use or zoning commissions.

The ultimate and inescapable conclusion is that the dire housing situation, rental market, home ownership affordability, prevention of Waikiki-type environments, and the protection of agricultural lands issues have all been exacerbated rather than ameliorated by the adoption of the functional plans.

Water - In retrospect, this plan was used to simultaneously distract from other activities and to leverage and pressure counties to pursue the aforementioned development orientation of the state. Development was concentrated in areas where

water was already in serious difficulty, namely urban Honolulu and in resort destinations. At the same time, the necessary infrastructure for expanded agricultural needs were limited. To be sure, those farmers who have been able to survive have been given preferential treatment. But little was done to open up or expand new areas of agricultural enterprise.

Transportation - The largest disappointments resulting from this plan are first the neighbor island economics are still inadequately serviced from a frequency and cost standpoint. The shipment of diversified agricultural products, thus the viability of these economics, are still overburdened with damaged or spoilage and overhead factors. Second, in the urban areas the failure of the plan has increased congestion and the cost of living related to transportation cost. Rather than seeking creative solutions, our transportation bull in our island china shop is still oriented towards the bigger the better in transportation systems. Instead of incentives for desired behavior and areas of economic activity, emphasis was placed on punitive economic measures which added to the state revenues, reduce per capita discretionary income and did virtually nothing to alleviate transportation costs, convenience, traffic and parking congestion of the state's balance of payment deficit for petroleum dependence. Moreover, the state's vulnerability to dislocation and chaos from an oil embargo is greater than ever.

Energy - It was known but not explicitly stated in the seventies and early eighties that there was no state energy policy. That state has and still emphasizes the big money projects that resulted from federal research monies that were handed out prior to the Reagan administration. However, at no time before or after this money faucet was flowing did the state seek to find the best uses of this money to ensure residents self-sufficiency and reduced dependence on petroleum-based energy. Conservation efforts and reduced dependence on petroleum-based energy. Conservation efforts were primarily the result of the individual residents' economic

self-interest and behavior modification due to rapidly escalating cost burdens. The public sector was the last to institute sound tax savings conservation measures. Yet, with the millions spent on big ticket alternate energy projects, virtually none of these funds have worked their way into the homes and lifestyle of the states' residents. Residents' monthly cost of energy now exceeds food cost per capita and is rapidly closing in on housing costs and thereby creating increased hardship.

Recreation - With Hawaii viewed by residents and visitors alike as a recreational paradise, little has been done to enhance natural, diverse and innovative recreational opportunities. Camping and hiking are still risky, if not dangerous. Beach access is available and the norm because most of the desirable locations mix visitors and residents in a tenuous relationship. Concessions that create jobs and increase recreational options for all plus the vast amount of job potential from lifeguards, park rangers, guides and interpreters has still not been realized. The vast conservation lands and ocean environments which could greatly enhance the quality of life for all in a recreational sense, remains dormant to all but the intrepid adventurer or naive visitor.

Conservation Lands - Our great resource is still a sleeping giant. Little was proposed and less accomplished with these vast areas. General resident utilization has been minimal and essentially discouraged while the larger business interest and the state government revenue reserves are enhanced with large energy farms and ocean mining activities that have created few jobs but greatly impacted the environment.

Historic Preservation - This plan apparently was never intended to be much of a success. While loaded with motherhood intentions, the follow-through was always weak. Some historic sites and buildings have been maintained. Most archaeological concerns have been addressed but preservation of arts, cultures skills, traditions, and media resources have all been adrift to fend for themselves.

Education - The continued acceptance of private school flight due to emphasis on minimum competency rather than excellence has ensured our youth the unskilled jobs and an expanded labor pool for service jobs as it used to be for the plantations. Meanwhile, private schools, Japan, the mainland, and the balance of the post-industrial countries have placed great emphasis in the areas of the arts, computers, media, science, and challenging curricula; in a word excellence. Those social ills that were with us in the early eighties and were so troublesome . . . crime, racial tension, visitor industry hostility, lack of relevant and self-actualizing programs . . . are still with us today. The big consequence of the adopted functional plan was that educational administrators are more efficient and accurate in their perception that real problems exist. But the direct services to students and quality education for genuine life and career preparation are absent.

Higher Education - While this should be our community's best immediate and long-term resource, just the opposite has been the case. The quality of instruction and leadership has not been advanced. Emphasis was placed in areas that provided vocational training where little or limited job opportunity or mobility occurred. While we were told that training for tourism management jobs would keep local youth in Hawaii, the openings have not materialized, forcing more youths to leave the Islands or accept underemployment of their skills. The same is true of agricultural opportunities. Quality, diversified, professional growth sector career opportunities were relegated to lower priority over the past decade. Areas in great demand such as electronics, arts, computers, information services, media activities, biological and genetic areas have left our college education substantially behind the skills developed in Japan and the mainland such that the desirable professional skills and jobs must still go to an imported labor force contrary to state plan pretensions.

Health - This functional area remains a quagmire. The gamut of issues that were pressing at the time of adoption still remain. Administrative and recordkeeping systems are still inadequate. Cost containment

and decentralized services are unaddressed. Environmental health issues of air and water quality have been reduced to the minimum possible allowable levels. Regulation and monitoring of pesticides and chemical wastes are still deficient. The special health needs of the disadvantaged and minorities have grown while health department programs have been curtailed.

The point of this scenario is not to say I have all the answers. . . Rather, that the functional plans offer very few answers to serious issues and may well serve to extend and exacerbate the issues that we are currently facing.

The issue to me is clear and does not require a crystal ball. If the functional plans are just another campaign gimmick, let's get rid of it as too costly and as generating more problems than it's worth. Or we should create a genuine plan that will benefit all the residents and not just big special interests. The choice is yours. You can pay now or you can pay later when it will cost more in dollars, lives and lifestyles."

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the measure stating:

"Mr. Speaker, there is nothing that I can find really wrong with using these plans as guidelines. The part that bothers me is there are some legal areas that might make them mandated. I think this would take away some of the important roles of this legislature . . . as a legislature, whereby there are budget constraints, and a few other things.

"But Mr. Speaker, that little reservation is the main part of my concern which is really the House versus the Senate is the portion that mandates, or that we believe mandates, these plans. Consequently if I were to go WR just to go in and speak for and against the plan, I would be taking the Senate position. As a member of this House, anytime that I go into a conference, I want to make sure that I'm no longer a Republican versus a Democrat. I will go in there as a conferee for this House and at that time I damned well better believe in the House's position because the Chairman is going to have to believe in me.

And that really bothers me, because there's a lot of people that believe that the plans are mandated. They really want to vote 'I do not concur'. They are going WR so they can sit on a conference committee, and I don't think that would be fair to any chairman. And I don't think that this is really in the benefit of this House. For that reason, Mr. Speaker, I'm going no.

Thank you very much."

Representative Wong rose to speak against the measure stating:

"My concern, Mr. Speaker, stems from the apparent confusion and perhaps, even duplication between Part 4 of Chapter 37 of the HRS, and Part 2, of Chapter 226 of the HRS. And I've done a lot of thinking about, and comparison between both acts in the HRS, and I'd just like to relate some of this information to you and the members of the House.

"Part 4, Chapter 37, for the Executive Budget Act, mandated a planning and programming and budgeting act, and I'll read the statement of policies in that act.

"It says here in 37-63: 'It is the purpose of this part to establish a comprehensive system for state program and financial management which furthers the capacity of the Governor and the Legislature to plan, program and finance the programs of the state.

'The system shall include procedures for', and it lists a number of them; I'll just read two, 'the orderly establishment, continuing review and periodic revision of the state program and financial objectives and policies.' And second, 'the development, coordination and review of long-range programs' . . . and I emphasize long-range programs. . . 'and financial plans that will implement established state objectives and policies.'

"Mr. Speaker, it also lists governing principles and it states that 'the system will be governed by the following general principles', and it lists a total of eight and I will just read two. 'Planning, programming, budgeting, evaluation, appraisal, reporting shall be

by programs or groups of programs'. And secondly, 'the state program structure shall be such as well enable meaningful decisions to be made by the Governor and the Legislature at all levels of the structure. At its lowest level it shall display those programs which are the simplest units of activity about which resources, allocation decisions, are to be made by the Governor and Legislature'.

"Mr. Speaker, on the other hand, Chapter 226, Part 2, "Planning, Coordination and Implementation", for the functional plans as we see them on our desks today, state as its purpose, 'the purpose of this part is to establish a statewide planning system to coordinate all major state and county activities and to implement the overall theme, goals, objectives, policies and priority directions'. As a statewide planning system, it defines, Mr. Speaker, the statewide planning system shall consist of the following plans and programs. And again, Sir, it lists five or six of them, and I'll just read two.

"First, 'the overall theme, goals, objectives and policies established in this chapter shall provide the broad guidelines for this state. The priority directions established in this chapter shall provide direction for the decision making by the state and the counties for the immediate future, and set priorities for the allocation of resources. Conformance with the priority directions shall be demonstrated in the formulation, amendment, and implementation of state functional plans, county general plans, and development plans, and state programs.' And I emphasize the words, state programs.

"Mr. Speaker, many documents have emanated from the Executive Budget Act and also the Hawaii State Plan. For example, the six-year program and financial plan, the program memorandum and the variance report all come from the Executive Budget Act. In the Hawaii State Planning Act, some of the documents that have emanated were the functional plans which we have eleven on our desks today, and TRD or the Technical Reference Document. In the Program Memorandum, which I kind . . . or is very similar to, the functional plans which we have on our desk today, it lists all of the objectives and policies that each department should follow. On the functional plans that you see

on our desks, it also lists objectives, policies, and implemented actions. And, Mr. Speaker, although these two programs . . . these two documents, are similar in nature, they also overlap and are very similar with multi-year program and financial plan, and also the Technical Reference Document. In the multi-program and financial plan of the state, almost every program that we have lists statements of program objectives, description of activities performed, statement of key policies pursued, identification of important program relationships, description of major external trends affecting the program, discussion of cost effectiveness, and program size data, discussion of program revenue, summary of analysis performed, and further consideration.

"The Technical Reference Documents are very similar in nature. In addition to having the objectives and policies and implementing action, it lists lead organizations, the assisting organizations, time frames, and budget estimates, and priorities.

"Mr. Speaker, I see the similarities between these two acts, Part 4 of Chapter 37 and Part 2 of Chapter 226, as being something that is . . . perhaps, maybe that was planned for. Mr. Speaker, the rationale provided by the Senate for the elimination of the expressed or implied mandatory nature of the functional plans for the preservation of legislative, executive and county prerogatives, to quote, 'accommodate shifting situations and problems which may arise in the future'. And this quote comes from Senate Bill 2720.

"Mr. Speaker, that's exactly what the variance report does. It makes all of those adjustments or comparisons between the expenditures and revenues that are spent throughout the year.

"I'd like to turn to one more thing, Mr. Speaker, and that is the report by Roth, Hardy, O'Keefe, Babcock and Parsons of Chicago, for the City Council. The report is entitled: 'Issues for Clarification in the Draft State Functional Plans Having Potential Impact Upon County Operations'. And I just like to read just a few of those principles that were identified in this report regarding the potential impact of provisions in the proposed state functional plans upon the land use policies, plans and regulatory activities of the county.

"For example, Mr. Speaker, in our agricultural functional plan, B-5, Section B, 'Implementing Action', the report concludes that because the restriction of land supply was a principle purpose behind many of the redesignations through agricultural use, these agricultural designations are not consistent with the development plans and other agricultural use guidelines in the state agricultural plan. The potential effect of implementing action of B5, B of the agricultural functional plan, therefore could be to require the county to reassess the appropriateness of its agricultural land use designation as applied to land parcels previously designated residential or other land use classifications.

"Mr. Speaker, I would just like to point out another one, another example in the 'Tourism Functional Plan', B-4, Section E. The report says that the 'Technical Reference Document' for the 'Tourism State Functional Plan' identifies only five designated visitor destination areas - Waikiki, Kahuku, Makaha, West Beach and Queen's Beach. In contrast to this apparent restrictive intent of the 'State Functional Plan' for tourism, Objective B of Policy 1 of the 'Oahu General Plan' authorizes the City and County to designate appropriate areas of the island for resort use, concluding but not limited to Waikiki, Queen's Beach, West Beach, Kuilima and Makaha. This 'General Plan' policy would appear to be inconsistent with 'State Function Plan' policy. Mr. Speaker, in the report, Mr. Blaser asks the question, 'Is it the intent of the 'State Functional Plan' that the counties 'General Plan' be amended to conform to the more restrictive 'State Implementing Action'?'

"I guess one of the questions that . . . you know, we have to face as mentioned by the previous speaker, Representative Anderson, in terms of the legal ramifications.

"Mr. Speaker, planning is manifested in a variety of occasions and a variety of ways. Its chief manifestation of apparent signs and most effective instrument being a plan of action. And submit that our plan of action is really our 'PPB Document' - 'The Executive Budget Act'. For the plan of action rests on our resources, Mr. Speaker. Our buildings, our materials, our personnel, our

productivity capacity, on the nature and importance of work and progress, and especially, Mr. Speaker, on the future trends which depend partly on technical, commercial, financial and other conditions. All subject to change, whose importance and occurrence cannot be predetermined.

"Mr. Speaker, no one disputes the usefulness of a plan of action, but there are some good characteristics or, to be singled out, in terms of trying to differentiate between a good plan and a bad plan. .

At this time, the Chair interrupted:

"Representative Wong, the Chair would like to remind you that your ten minutes are up."

Representative Lacy rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, may I relinquish my time?"

The Chair replied:

"You may. Please proceed, Representative Wong."

Representative Wong continued:

"I was just ready to sum up.

"Experience is the only thing that finally determines the true value of a plan, Mr. Speaker. And of course, unity of a plan is an instance; only one plan can be put into operation at a time. Two different plans would mean plurality, confusion and disorder. The guiding action of a plan must be continuous. Unity, continuity, flexibility, precision - such are the broad features of a good plan of action.

"Mr. Speaker, I rise because I don't see some of these characteristics in our plans because we do, in my mind, have two plans - 'The Budget Act' and the 'State Plan'. I think that perhaps, the 'State Plan' is really a mislabeled, expensive, perhaps even redundant amendment of the 'Executive Budget'. The unfortunate result is that the 'Functional Plan' and perhaps the entire 'State Plan', Mr. Speaker, leaves the door open to deviation from the 'Executive Budget'. And it is for these reasons, Mr. Speaker,

that I expressed my concerns and expressed why I'm voting no on the plans. Thank you."

Representative de Heer rose to speak in favor of the measure with reservations for the second time:

"The Representative from the 24th District has presented a very well reasoned, well thought out approach. Isn't it amazing today, that what hula-baloo about the 'State Functional Plan' - that no one can really come up and say, this is the blueprint to our future?

"As for the budgetary implications, in this particular 'Tourism Functional Plan', the best of our knowledge, the best of our research, there are absolutely no budget figures given. Certainly though, these programs must have a cost. Certainly the state is involved, programs such as Hawaii '82, and presumably in the future we will be investing state dollars. However, nowhere in the 'Technical Reference Document' can there be found any significant, relevant budgetary figures. Yet these are, and this is, our document which is the secondly most document compared after the 'State Constitution'.

"In the next . . . as we go through the calendar today, we will have the opportunity to explore the different budgetary implications, and there are significant budgetary implications in the other plans because there is some information available on it. Unfortunately, and against the intent of the law, I might add, information is not available on the 'Tourism Functional Plan'.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kamali'i rose to speak against S.C.R. No. 10 and all other functional plans stating:

"Mr. Speaker, when we passed the 'State Plan' four years ago, whatever reservations we may have had about the broad language, competing interests or even contradictory provisions of the plan when we enacted that outline of aspirations and attitudes, we were assured that the mandated functional plans would flesh out and reconcile the tensions which were contained in the plan.

"Well, after being worked and reworked, and revised again, the 'Functional Plans' are not the meat of the plan; they aren't even very

good pabulum.

"The major difficulty, Mr. Speaker, seems to have been over what truly constitutes a plan and what policy statements and what objectives should be pursued in order to implement that policy. Instead, we set objectives and then devise policy to match what we say we will do. I find that the reverse of what planning should be.

"Let me give you an example from this 'Tourism Functional Plan', an example which is echoed throughout the other ten plans we will consider today. And I quote: 'The State Tourism Functional Plan does not mandate county or private sector actions. Rather, it is a guide to coordinate the various sectors of government and private industry toward achieving the statewide objectives of the 'Hawaii State Plan'. Through its adoption by concurrent resolution, the 'State Tourism Functional Plan' will be an expression of legislative policy but is not to be interpreted as law or statutory mandate . . .'

"There is no legal force to the functional plans. Then, what is the sense of adopting them? Just to be expensive? To be sentimental? To offer guidance and advice which can and probably should be ignored?

"The only sense that I can make out of this functional plan and it is a damaging directive, is that an analysis of the functional plan 'guidelines', is to be submitted to the legislature in two years. The only explicit function, then, that I can discern from this plan is that it requires planning for another report in 1984.

"Contrast this vagueness of purpose, intent, and direction with the philosophy and programs of the 'State General Plan' which was in force from the mid-sixties through our adoption of the 'State Plan'. Whether we agreed or disagreed with the goals and objectives of the first 'State General Plan', at least we knew specifically what we were talking about, and also fully expected to argue the statutory implementation of that plan.

"Rather than honest discussion and disagreement about such hoped

for implications, however, we are totally ducking the issues and again postponing a rendezvous with reality.

"A plan, Mr. Speaker, any plan should offer leadership, direction . . . at the least, a preference, a so called preferred future - if you recall the phrase. Our only preference is deference . . . a deferral of the hard choices, a delay of needed actions, an ignoring of the intensifying debate in the hearts and minds of Hawaii's people about what they want for the future.

"We all become tourists or visitors when that occurs . . . unsettled, paying the price, and commenting about the lack of Aloha we feel for each other.

"Well, I do and want to continue to live in and for Hawaii. And that requires planning. We do less than nothing when we attempt to confuse the public with plans whose only function is to say rather than to do what is needed.

"Mr. Speaker, I do not believe that the people will be misled by that distinction, nor will they forget that the 'State Plan' was passed largely as a campaign gimmick four years ago and that these plans will be forced for the same reason - to falsely assure citizens that there is leadership and direction is a terrible mistake.

"I will vote 'no' eleven times today, and hope that others will join me."

Representative Anderson rose to clarify a point stating:

"Mr. Speaker, when I said there was budgetary constraints, I meant on the whole eleven plans. I wasn't just looking at the 'Tourism Plan', nor when I said that if a person goes 'WR'. I said on the point of where it is mandated, or where we believe it is mandated.

"If a person is for or against a particular plan, that is his or her choice. What I said is, if that part bothers them, then that is by chance the Senate's position, and to go into a conference would be wrong. And that is all I wanted to do, is to clarify that.

"And I will be no on all plans."

Representative Stanley rose

to speak in favor of the motion stating:

"Mr. Speaker, briefly, I would like to point out to the members of the House, that these functional plans stand here before us today after much work, soul searching and anguish on the part of all the members in this House, and on the part of the Senators across the way.

"In fact, the remarks that have been addressed against the plans in expressing reservations indicate the great seriousness with which we all take them. I would like to put the plans into kind of a context for all of us. Sometimes it's 'hard to see the forest through the trees'. Especially on the fifty-eighth day or whatever day we are, when we are fast approaching the end of the session. And we're looking at all the various laws, sometimes we forget what the final product will look like.

"The 'Hawaii State Planning Act' was passed in 1978 and that's the forest. And I want us to redirect our attention to that act and read to you the beginning of it: 'The Legislature finds that there is a need to improve the planning process in this state to increase the effectiveness of public and private actions, to improve coordination among different agencies and levels of government to provide for the wise use of Hawaii's resources and to guide the future development of the state. The purpose of this chapter is to set forth the 'Hawaii State Plan' that shall serve as a guide for the future long-range development of the state, identify the goals, objectives, policies and priorities for the state of Hawaii, provide a basis for determining priorities, allocating limited resources, such as public funds, services, manpower, land, energy and water, and other resources. . . and ensure the coordination of state and county plans, policies, programs, projects and regulatory activities. The purpose of this chapter is to also establish a system for plan formulation and program coordination to provide for the integration of all major state and county activities. Implementation provisions contained herein are designed to carry out statewide guidelines presented in the form of the overall theme, goals, objectives, policies and priority directions.'

"We are setting in place and further implementing by adopting these functional plans a process. And there is great value to this process. It compliments the program budgeting system that was so ably described by the representative from the 24th district. And in fact, his remarks encourage people to further use the functional plans to make a 'PPBS' system work even to a better degree. The value of the planning process is that many of us, the citizens of this state through the advisory councils and the policy council and the legislators, can participate in selecting those goals, objectives, priority directions, policies, implementing actions and functional plans that set out the choices and directions that we want for our future for these islands which are in the middle of an ocean, have limited resources and need to be cared for with tender hands.

"These plans that are before us today are not permanent. They have provided an amendment process, an adoption process, a review process. Many of us fear we are going into grounds that we should not be. But we should have the courage to look to the future and see that with our own hands and try to plan for it. And that's what we are doing here today.

"The legislature has not, and will not give up its role to react to future budgets, to future plans, by adopting these functional plans. So, Mr. Speaker, it's in these contexts, looking at the forests and for what we are trying to do for every citizen in this state, that I urge all my colleagues to vote for this plan and all others before us tonight."

Representative Blair rose and spoke against this measure stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against, I guess only one resolution before us, but I will be casting no votes on all of them. I'll probably be casting more no votes this afternoon than I have in the last five or six years, and so I don't want that occasion to pass without some notice or some comments in the record.

"I'll be the first to admit, Mr. Speaker, that I have no real affinity for the planning process. My own point of view is that if we know what we want to do, we should do it. If we don't know what we want to do, we should wait until we know what we want to do, then do it. But

this comes somewhere in-between. And I'm frankly uncomfortable with that. If it has action forcing provisions, then I would be uncomfortable with it; and if it doesn't, then I don't know what we think we're doing, but I don't think we're doing anything. And frankly, I'm not sure that the reason I'm voting against these is that because I don't take them particularly seriously, and yet it's a serious matter. And I understand that it is.

"To a large extent, I think my feelings about this matter go back to when I was chairman of the Environmental Protection Committee, and I discovered Chapter 344, which is our 'State Environmental Policy'. And after four years on that committee, I discovered Chapter 344 doesn't really do anything but print a lot of nice language for people to read, and I'm sure everyone had a lot of fun adopting it though that was before my time.

"And I suspect we are doing something very similar though, I will confess it may be more substantive than I think it is. But I really don't think we're doing much of anything and yet we seem to think we are, and if we are in fact doing something that is going to have tremendous consequences, then I probably would disagree with it because we haven't gone so far as to say that we know precisely what it is we want to do, because if we had gone that far, we would be adopting laws.

"So with those few remarks, Mr. Speaker, I note for the record that I will be voting against these resolutions."

Representative Say rose to speak for the resolution:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak for the resolution and all others that will be coming up later on.

"First of all, I would like to say that after 1978 when Act 100 was enacted by Representative Ken Kiyabu and Senator Francis Wong, it was a major milestone in this state of Hawaii, similar to the 'Hawaii Constitution'. Personally, being the chairman of the Tourism Committee for the past two years, I have taken very strong interest in the functional

plan of tourism. For example, I'll give you a background that, let me remind all of you here, that for over a quarter of a century now, 1947 through 1973, the area of tourism or oversea visitors coming to Hawaii increased at an annual, or average annual rate of more than 20 per cent. That from 1973 through 1978, this rate of increase slowed to an average of 7 per cent per year and that the years 1980 and '81 have shown, not only no increase, but a fractional decrease.

"In my opinion, the primary reason for the decline in the number of visitors to Hawaii from the mainland United States, which was down from last year by 7.5 per cent from this year, to our total number of visitors holding steady because of the East bound or the Orient visitors have increased is the economic and economic reasons for a number.

"First, the U.S. economy is down. We've been very flat, and personally, we're in a state of recession.

"Second, the typical American family, even if he's the main breadwinner, is still working, and it is less able to afford luxuries such as long trips or vacations to Hawaii.

"With these concerns, I look for the state of Hawaii. . . maybe I may be wrong. . . but, as the functional plans, in deciding for all of us here, as a document whereby we could use the 'Technical Reference Document' as a basic foundation in determining your decisions in the coming year in regard to the area of tourism.

"Sure we have a lot of broad policies, a lot of broad objectives and goals, but if you look at the implementing actions of this particular functional plan, it has a lot of meaning to it. If this legislative body decides to concentrate more in the international market as far as overseas promotion and marketing, this body will decide. It's going to be up to the administration to decide if it wants to include it in its fiscal biennium, but if it is not, this is where the policy will be decided, in this particular floor of this House.

"Presently, I have two speeches that I would like to say a few words in regards to. One that was spoken in 1979 by the former speaker, Speaker Wakatsuki: 'As policy makers, the task of planning the future of Hawaii may be seem to rest solely with

the legislature, but that is not the case. The different levels and branches of our government, labor and business representatives, citizens and community organization will have that rare opportunity of working together in formulating our statewide functional plan. These plans will articulate the future growth of our state. The task will be delicate and indeed difficult, but we are resolved to fulfill our responsibilities". The speaker from the 24th District is absolutely correct, that we also have an administrative budgeting process known as the PPB. But does the PPB, the 'Planning, Programming, Budgeting' statutes lets the citizens of the state get involved in their future directions or goals. Basically, the PPB is formulated by the different state departments that we have in basically addressing their own operations as what they see fit.

"And the other speech that I have is in the opening remarks of this speaker, Speaker Peters, right here, that I have, and it talks about in planning for the near future we must also consider our distant future so that what we do now will provide long range direction for our state. Future issues will be easier to resolve when guidelines which we are adopting today contains in the state's twelve functional plans, are agreed upon and set in place.

"I wish all of these concerns that have been addressed here this afternoon, or this evening, on what Representative from Kailua has stated, the representative from Kaneohe, also the representative from Nuuanu and also Waikiki, would have brought up, Mr. Speaker, at the public hearings that we have had in the past two years, their concerns that they have addressed on this floor of this House.

"You know I always complain to you that members of the different committees sometimes don't even show up for hearings. You know, to be critical and not come up with any type of construction answers is not my way of, you know, working in the legislative body. If I'm going to criticize, I'll give you alternatives. But, this basically constructive criticisms on the part of how I try to deal with politics. And in this matter, others here may think this is a political vehicle. . . fine, it may be. But I for one really believe what the functional plans are saying in regards to the 'Technical Reference Document'. This document, which

is basically a resource book, has become very helpful for all of us here. May it be in the housing area, the health area, the energy, the conservation, historic preservation, tourism, education, higher education. . . because without that document, where will you get the knowledge and the resources to really set policy in place?

"And I myself, really don't know what to say right now because we have always talked about economic development and as I was telling one of my colleagues, that I was really surprised in regards to the Senate. And when I say I was surprised, it just that I really don't know how the President, who has maybe fourteen to sixteen years in this legislative body, concludes that a way of generating revenues for the betterment of the state is through a state lottery. Sometimes, you know. . . And these types of things really worry me. In the opening address of the testimony given by Mr. Jensen Hee, director of Budget and Finance, where presently we may be spending more than what we're receiving. I hope that all of my colleagues are aware of it. And that's why I take a very strong interest in the tourism area as far as being determined. If sugar is going to go down, pineapple, construction. . . what economic factor will play a major role in generating revenues?

"And this is all I have to say, but, I know I'm talking out of line right now, but I hope that all of my colleagues would support this particular functional plan."

Representative Blair rose in rebuttal:

"I rise to speak in rebuttal though I would precede my comments by saying that I hope that Representative Say is right and I'm wrong.

"Mr. Speaker, I very much appreciate and approve of the process that went about to generate the functional plans. It's just that I feel that the process should result in something more concrete.

"The reason that I rise to speak again, a second time, is because after hearing the comments that followed my own, I just opened up the 'Tourism Functional Plan' and I don't know whether the gods were speaking through this,

but it so happens that the page I opened to was page 16. And it just really struck home because it lists, and on the following page, there are three implementing actions. The first one is: 'give preference to the development of full service hotels over any type of visitor accommodations'. The one after that is 'monitor and study the impact of the conversion of apartments and condominium units from visitors to residential use, and from residential to visitor use, and suggest courses of action to control the conversions if necessary'.

"The one after that is 'monitor the public revenue cost ratio of visitors and visitors mixed and study the effect of visitors who stay in accommodations other than hotels as means of determining any significant trend in toward a reduction in the revenue cost ratio or a change in the mix of visitors which would affect employment and tax revenues'. After having read that, Mr. Speaker, it really came home to me that we're dealing with these very things on a day to day basis. This is what we're dealing with in our transient vacation accommodations and the question of time sharing, and what are its impacts on the industry. And it seems to me that what I find distressing is that we're dealing with these on a day to day basis, and these implementing actions don't tell us anything. They don't help us to resolve those questions. It's sort of, in a way, avoids the questions by giving us the impression that we can do this planning in a vague sense. These questions are very much before us on a daily basis and I wish the process that lead to these documents had lead to something more concrete, because it certainly would have been much more helpful to me and perhaps again, I'm being shortsighted. Perhaps if these documents had been done ten years ago, then today the answers would be here and not just the questions. And I hope that proves to be the case, and I hope I'm wrong but as I said earlier, I am not convinced that this is as substantive as it appears to be.

" Thank you."

Roll call having been requested, the motion was put by the Chair

and carried, the joint report of the majority of the Committees was adopted and S.C.R. No. 10, SD2, HD1 entitled: "SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION RELATING TO THE STATE TOURISM PLAN", was adopted by a vote of 33 ayes to 8 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Blair, Dods, Ikeda, Isbell, Kamali'i, Lacy, Liu, Marumoto and Wong voting no and Representatives Kunimura, Levin, Monahan, Morioka, Nakasato, Narvaes, Rohlfing and Takitani being excused.

Representatives Shito and de Heer, for the majority of the Committees on Housing and State General Planning, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 934-82) recommending that S.C.R. No. 12, SD2, as amended in HD1, be adopted.

Representative Shito moved that the joint report of the majority of the Committees be adopted and S.C.R. No. 12, SD2, HD1 be adopted, seconded by Representative Andrews.

Representative de Heer rose and stated:

"I know that a lot has been debated on the previous resolution; I shall try to be brief. I will speak in favor of this resolution but with reservations.

"Mr. Speaker, since this particular functional plan has greater budgetary implications, I'd like to address, as best as possible, what we're really dealing with right here in terms of adopting this particular functional plan by concurrent resolution.

"Mr. Speaker, the information that is available, as best as can be gleaned by the 'Technical Reference Document', which I've done a complete and through study, computerized too, is as follows, mind you now that this is not necessarily passing the budget. However, there has budget implications because administrators can now come to the legislature in the area of housing, suggest that we have tacitly approved the programs that they have proceeded on. For instance, in this year, fiscal year 1982, the total budget, this I grant you in some co-mingling of funds, for the housing program is as represented by this functional plan, this is the state's figures, is \$446,677,500. The grand total, if using conservation figures, and we look at it in the ten year period, between now and 1992, comes out to approximately 4.2 billion dollars.

"I think that we should see the forest from the trees. Just in this particular forest there are a heck of a lot of trees. And I don't know what kind of trees there are. Just for your reference, Mr. Speaker, of the total implementing actions in the housing plan of which there are approximately fifteen, only seven have. . . excuse me, eight have budgetary estimates, seven do not. So we're talking about half that have any representation of budget.

"Now a lot has been said recently about increasing government and the size of government. Just looking at the additional personnel that we're required by the various implementing action of the functional plans as proposed, and again these figures are approximate but conservative, and I might add quite conservative, where we gave the administration the benefit of the doubt since they are presenting the figures - implementation costs, additional personnel required over the next ten years conservatively estimated at a million dollars to the tax payers of the State of Hawaii. I think this has significant budgetary implications and should not be rushed through the legislature in any way, shape or form. I think it goes beyond the purview of just politics.

"A functional plan is supposed to be the blue print for the future. Not merely listing programs and adding of positions. Granted the legislature still has provisions to delete specific positions, however, how many times have we seen legislative action reversed in my experience in the last four years.

"Another note about the plan - there are approximately 650 actions, policies, implementing actions, objectives, that are represented in these documents that are before us today. This has the effect, well not the reality, but it has the effect of passing a law for each one of them. So let's not take this responsibility that has been hoisted upon us, albeit it unnecessarily, lightly. This is the effect, the equivalent of passing 650 laws in eleven concurrent resolutions to be approved by the House and the Senate. I believe there is certainly, ample room for more careful, constructive

consideration. There is not a need to rush this particular program through.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the joint report of the majority of the Committees was adopted and S.C.R. No. 12, SD2, HD1 entitled: "SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION RELATING TO STATE HOUSING PLAN", was adopted.

Representatives Segawa and de Heer, for the majority of the Committees on Health and State General Planning, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 935-82) recommending that S.C.R. No. 5, SD2, as amended in HD1, be adopted.

Representative Segawa moved that the joint report of the majority of the Committees be adopted and S.C.R. No. 5, SD2, HD1, be adopted, seconded by Representative Andrews.

Representative de Heer rose and stated:

"At the risk of sounding like a broken record, I'd like to review the budgetary implications as brought out by the 'Technical Reference Document'. The total for the 'Health Functional Plan' conservatively estimated over the ten year period with only about 39 per cent of the actions that are reported, comes out to conservatively estimating 1.7 billion dollar plus. In terms of personnel, the estimate is about 7 billion dollars of additional personnel that are mandated by the functional plans.

"Now there have been substantial improvements of, I note with interest, one improvement of implementing PIA, dealing with offering genetic counseling. I do not know if the state wants to mandate in its function planning and the second most important document after the Constitution, additional genetic counseling, but I believe there is a potential civil liberties violation as written therein. Therefore, I would caution all those that will implement these plans, if they got to that stage, to clarify that particular provision.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kiyabu rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this resolution and to clarify a point that has been made that the

functional plans will cost 1.X million dollars.

"That may be true, but what the functional plans laid out to do is to give the lawmakers, the policy makers of this body, a broad picture of where this state is trying to go. And while it may cost over a billion dollars, the true implementation of these functional plans come through the budgetary process. And as each legislature meets, they will decide, depending upon the number of resources that we have, which of these policies that we will be implementing and funding. So that while it may show that it will cost a million dollars, nobody in their right mind knows if we're going to implement all of these at one time.

"And so as policy makers, we would like to see the total picture instead of presently, things are coming to us piecemeal, and we're not sure in passing a particular project, how it affects the other areas. I think that through this planning process, a really good thing that has come out of this, all the departments now are talking to each other and the right hand knows what the left hand is doing, so we have better coordination in the various departments and programs. And I urge all members to vote for these functional plans."

Representative de Heer:

"I think that the Representative from the 10th District is absolutely right. These plans will be implemented on a piecemeal basis. It's just too bad that we don't know which part of the meal they're going to implement first.

"To me there should be greater sense of priority, of critical path analysis, a time frame, and which programs the administration intends to implement first. We need . . . a plan is supposed to provide that sense of direction and that sense of priority. But it defies anyone here in this body today to show where the priorities lie. Henceforth, my extreme reservations that this House is undertaking, and why we need more direction, and why this process is here for the first place.

"The point of planning is to give us a blueprint, a generalized

blueprint. Many people have argued about the lack of critical path analysis, how these plans and implementing actions conflict with each other; I think we have to explore in greater detail why they conflict with each other, or why they don't conflict with each other. As a matter of fact, just for your information, Mr. Speaker, a critical path analysis has been done by myself and my staff, and it works quite well, in which we can delete about 75 per cent of the implementing actions that are being considered today.

"Nevertheless, I think Representative Kiyabu argues for the point, or the reservations that I have had for the past two years on the functional plans. For that reason, I think we should look at this very carefully; we shouldn't rush into anything. If we can't do everything this year, then we can do it in subsequent years. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the joint report of the majority of the Committees was adopted and S.C.R. No. 5, SD2, HD1 entitled: "SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION RELATING TO THE STATE HEALTH PLAN", was adopted.

Representatives Aki and de Heer, for the majority of the Committees on Higher Education and State General Planning, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 936-82) recommending that S.C.R. No. 14, SD2, as amended in HD1, be adopted.

On motion by Representative Aki, seconded by Representative Andrews and carried, the joint report of the majority of the Committees was adopted and S.C.R. No. 14, SD2, HD1 entitled: "SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION RELATING TO THE STATE HIGHER EDUCATION PLAN", was adopted.

Representatives Sakamoto and de Heer, for the majority of the Committees on Water, Land Use, Development and Hawaiian Affairs; and State General Planning, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 937) recommending that S.C.R. No. 6, SD1, as amended in HD1, be adopted.

On motion by Representative Sakamoto, seconded by Representative Andrews and carried, the joint

report of the majority of the Committees was adopted and S.C.R. No. 6, SD1, HD1 entitled: "SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION RELATING TO THE STATE WATER RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT PLAN", was adopted.

Representatives Sakamoto and de Heer, for the majority of the Committees on Water, Land Use, Development and Hawaiian Affairs; and State General Planning, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 938-82) recommending that S.C.R. No. 7, SD2, as amended in HD1, be adopted.

Representative Sakamoto moved that the joint report of the majority of the Committees be adopted and S.C.R. No. 7, SD2, HD1 be adopted, seconded by Representative Andrews.

Representative de Heer rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, very briefly, and I promise I'll be brief . . . there's another function I must attend.

"In this particular plan, again we're dealing with an estimated budget - last year's version of 238 million dollars, this year's version on recreation, we're dealing with a budget of 300 million dollars with additional personnel costs represented in the plan. Incidentally, not a single plan and not a single position is phased out, only positions are added in at about .6 million dollars.

"Again, I urge extreme caution - more than that being presented here. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.C.R. No. 7, SD2, HD1 entitled: "SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION RELATING TO THE STATE RECREATION PLAN", was adopted.

Representatives Sakamoto and de Heer, for the majority of the Committees on Water, Land Use, Development and Hawaiian Affairs; and State General Planning, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 939-82) recommending that S.C.R. No. 8, SD2, as amended in HD1, be adopted.

Representative Segawa, prior to introducing the honoree, stated:

"This morning, it is my pleasure to introduce to you Jun Ashida who has made a special trip from Japan

to receive this resolution today. Mr. Speaker, I think it is very important for this body to know the high esteem in which it is held by our friends abroad that Mr. Ashida made a very special effort to be here today to receive this honor.

I first met Mr. Ashida, or Jun, on the golf course. . . on a weekend, Mr. Speaker, last January, and I had the privilege of dining with him and some members of the Planning Committee of the Fashion Show. During the evening, I learned a little bit about Mr. Ashida; for one, that we are about the same age. But as you observe Mr. Ashida, he looks a little younger than I do, and I concluded that this must be attributed to his work as a designer. He goes about the country picking out the youngest and the prettiest models for his shows. I believe if I had a job like that instead of associating with some tired, worn-out legislators, I might be young too.

But I also learned, Mr. Speaker, that Mr. Ashida is a sensitive designer who possesses a quiet and calm confidence of the fashion world, and I believe the ladies and the men who attend that show will see his fashions reflecting the classic simplicity, the refined sophistication, and practical elegance, because Jun believes that his fashions are made for wearing and enjoyment.

Incidentally, his golf game was not too good and he told me it was because I made him nervous. But he is a tennis player so he said he will take me on on the tennis court.

Furthermore, Mr. Speaker, as you have heard, Jun is the exclusive designer for Her Imperial Highness, the Crown Princess Michiko, and several ambassadors' wives. He tells me that in designing apparel for the Crown Princess Michiko, he bears in mind that he is designing for the people of Japan. In designing for the ambassadors' wives, he bears in mind international relationships as the utmost importance.

Recently, All Nippon Airways announced that Jun would design the uniforms for their stewardesses, ground hostesses and male personnel.

Jun is coming back to Hawaii for a Fashion Show which is being sponsored by the Japanese Women's Society at the Hilton Hawaiian Village and this is his first fashion show debut in the United

States. Mr. Ashida, because of his special love for the people of Hawaii, has consented to make his contributions to this Fashion Show on May 2nd. Mr. Speaker, I believe these are the relationships which develop and foster better relationships among the people of the world.

And so, at this time, I take great pride and pleasure in introducing to you and the people of Hawaii, Mr. Jun Ashida."

Representative Segawa then asked Mr. Ashida to stand and be recognized. Accompanying Mr. Ashida was Mr. Paul Jefferies, General Business Manager for Mr. Ashida in the United States.

if you look at his biceps, I don't know of any blood pressure equipment that is made for that size and when his blood pressure goes high during some of his episodes, it's very hard to detect that high blood pressure and you need to put out a lot of pressure into that instrument.

So, I just wanted to clarify that the Representative who made some of those remarks -- he needs to keep cool and keep his pressure down.

Thank you."

Representative Kamali'i then requested that her remarks, in favor of the resolution, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Kamali'i's speech is hereby inserted:

"Mr. Speaker, there may be some individuals who will feel that our passage of this resolution is a hollow gesture -- after all, the RIMPAC exercises and the renewed bombardment of Kaho'olawe has already been set and may begin at any moment.

But what has truly been hollow, Mr. Speaker, has been the empty promises of the United States Navy. Progress, certainly, has been made -- archeological surveys were permitted, limited access is available with permission, and the entire island has been placed on the National Register of Historic Sites. However, a basic consideration and recognition for the safety and heritage of Hawaii's people has not been assured.

Instead, the Navy continues to insist that our position as a State is one of choosing between a strong military presence in the islands and its vital nature for the nation, or of seeing some threat of total naval withdrawal.

Well, I don't like 'blackmail', Mr. Speaker. I do not believe that it is an 'either/or' situation for Hawaii or for the Navy. Instead, it is a high-handed and insensitive response from a branch of the military whose primary responsibility is the defense, not the bombing of this State.

I know that there will be some in the community who may misunderstand what I am saying -- I hope that I can clarify to the point of avoiding that unnecessary confusion.

I am not anti-military, quite the contrary in fact.

But Hawaii is no longer simply a strategic outpost of the American Nation, a territory to be treated in any way the military saw fit. We are a state of equal standing with any other in the country, and as such have certain reasonable expectations about the behavior and actions of our Armed Forces.

Even if there is no regard for the historical importance of Kaho'olawe, there must and should be a regard for the safety and well-being of the people of Maui. Even if there is no true assurance of the accuracy of RIMPAC participants in the protection of archaeological sites, there should be a guarantee of no mishaps affecting the lives or property of the County of Maui.

No other state is subjected to international bombing at the invitation of the American government. No other state has such bombing occur within thirty miles of inhabited areas. No other state is subjected to veiled threats of economic retaliation for raising serious and unavoidable questions of public safety.

The least that we can do at this time is to formally and forcefully register our opposition to the RIMPAC exercises. For myself, I intend to pursue this matter further. . . and to seek a genuine resolution to this problem, and that is the final return of Kaho'olawe to the State of Hawaii.

Thank you."

Representative Rohlfling then rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, very briefly, I think that it hits the nail on the head of a problem that has been with us for a long period of time -- since we passed the collective bargaining statute back in the early '70s, and having at that time served on the committee that worked on that problem in the Senate in the interim and otherwise, and came out with the collective bargaining law. It was our intention at that time to try and eventually provide for the elimination of much of the clutter

in the relationships between the government as the employer from that standpoint and the employees in the public system.

I think this is clearly a recognition of where we should be going in the long run, and that we should seriously examine many of the provisions of civil service which have long been with us that have become basically obsolete and contradictory in some cases with our collective bargaining statute; in particular, the areas of some of the grievances and the appeals from grievances. We have, many times, sort of a Hobson's choice with the employee when he is trying to make a choice as to whether to go through the civil service system with his problem or to go through his union. I have long believed that if we do believe in collective bargaining and we are going to support it, then we have got to support it to a lot more degree than we have been willing to do.

So, I think this resolution is a good step in that direction and one that is long overdue.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. No. 222, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION REQUESTING A COMPREHENSIVE REVIEW OF CHAPTERS 76, 77, 78, 79, 80, 89 AND 89C, HAWAII REVISED STATUTES", was adopted.

Representative Hashimoto's remarks are hereby inserted:

"Mr. Speaker and fellow members, I am speaking to you today to urge your support of House Resolution 235, HD 1.

As many of you know, there are several watercress farmers who cultivate lands in the Pearl Harbor and Waiawa areas. Many of these farmers have been working the lands in those areas for the last 23 years: a couple have farmed those areas from as far back as 1933.

However, even for all their years of work, these watercress farmers don't have the security of knowing that they will be able to farm the same lands in the near future -- many of them have only month-to-month leases. And in fact, a number of the farmers lost their leases in September of last year.

The goal of this resolution, in part, is to aid the farmers in obtaining

the security and stability they need so that they may be better able to increase their watercress production.

A related goal, and perhaps the major one from the State's point of view, is to preserve lands which are capable of producing wetland crops like watercress so that they may continue to be utilized for the growing of such crops. The State has made clear, on numerous occasions, its policy of protecting unique agricultural lands.

Thus, by aiding the watercress farmers in gaining the security they deserve, the State will also be aided. It will be secure in the knowledge that its lands, capable of supporting unique agricultural crops, are being preserved and utilized for such purpose.

Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. No. 235, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE PRESERVATION OF WATERCRESS FARMLANDS ON OAHU", was adopted.

Representative Kunimura, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 974-82) recommending that H.R. No. 303 be adopted.

On motion by Representative Hashimoto, seconded by Representative Andrews and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. Representative Lacy then rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I am not going to deliver the speech that I have written. It's a very important moment for us

to consider the War Memorial Natatorium and we have had discussions on the floor. Lots of research have gone into this problem. There are a number of things that must be done by the State in order to clear this up in the months ahead and I hope that my colleagues, and those in the Senate, and the Governor, and the people of the State, will support the direction in which we are moving now, and we can clean up what might be called a mess on the beach area and make it attractive as a true War Memorial and preserve that part for our veterans of World War I -- those people who fought and those who died for that cause from Hawaii, and I hope that everyone will support this.

Thank you very much."

Representative Lacy then requested that his remaining remarks be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Lacy's remarks are hereby inserted:

"Mr. Speaker, this resolution is an expression of legislative policy regarding the State's War Memorial Park in Waikiki. This park was created by the Legislature of the Territory in 1919, as a memorial to those who served in the First World War. Subsequently, the Legislature added the War Memorial Natatorium to the park. The Natatorium, a 100 meter salt water swimming pool with concrete bleachers seating 2500 people, was constructed at the shoreline and into the ocean, and over the years, it was the site of many important swimming meets. Unfortunately, over the years, it also suffered continuous deterioration.

Seventeen years ago, the State and the City and County of Honolulu reached agreement that the Natatorium should be demolished to make way for a major program of beach restoration. There were three major factors leading to this determination:

1. The dangerous state of deterioration of the Natatorium and the high cost of reconstruction and continuous maintenance of a structure built in the surf;

2. The present-day use of, and availability of, 50 meter fresh water swimming pools for competitive swimming;

3. The higher premium placed on open beach space due to the vastly increased urbanization in Waikiki since the Natatorium was built.

Mr. Speaker, these factors are even more valid today than they were seventeen years ago, and it is high time that this issue be resolved.

The beach restoration project was halted when, in 1973, the State was enjoined from demolishing the Natatorium, because the Governor had not formally withdrawn the land which had been set aside by Executive Order for the Natatorium, and because the Legislature had not been given the opportunity to approve or disapprove of such withdrawal. This resolution asks the Governor to take this action and to set aside this land solely for park purposes. The resolution also gives legislative approval of such withdrawal and setting aside.

The resolution also notes that the Department of Land and Natural Resources has presented to the Legislature a proposal that the Natatorium be restored and operated as a commercial venture by private developers. The resolution rejects this proposal because commercial use in this Memorial Park is not appropriate, due to both the memorial aspect of the park and to the adjacent residential neighborhood. It should be emphasized, however, that this resolution does not reject the concept of joint ventures between the State and private interests, rather, the resolution limits the Legislature's disapproval to this specific instance, at this specific location.

The decision that a historic structure should be demolished is not one to be made lightly. This resolution sets forth the reasons why demolition is in the public interest, and why preservation and reconstruction cannot be justified in this case. In addition to the three reasons cited seventeen years ago, there is a fourth reason: The only logical use to which a reconstructed Natatorium could be put is use for commercial aquacades and water shows, and such use is contrary to the memorial aspect of the park and the residential character of the adjacent neighborhood.

Finally, Mr. Speaker, this resolution emphasizes the importance of properly memorializing the men and women of Hawaii who served during World War I, and it requests the Department of Land and Natural Resources, in consultation with the City and County of Honolulu and other interested parties, to report to the next session of the

Legislature on various alternatives for improving the Memorial Park, including the preservation of appropriate historic and memorial objects, one of which is the Natatorium's Memorial Arch.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Rohlfling then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I also rise with respect to the latter resolution, H.C.R. No. 173, and as this issue has been discussed previously in this session on this floor, I will again state that while I have great reservations about aspects of the resolved clause of this resolution, I will support it, with reservations.

I believe that the Committee Report points out one very clear fact and that is that the Natatorium has become blighted and an eyesore, and a problem area, and a potential liability hazard of considerable extent. I think it's been allowed to become so on purpose by the City and County of Honolulu while the State also has sort of waltzed around the problem.

So, I agree very much that something must be done. My personal preference would have been for public funds to restore the Natatorium and I think that is still not out of the question. I also believe that possibly time could have been given for some greater examination of a cooperative venture with private enterprise, depending upon the extent of the restraints on that type of activity, and that would have, of course, relied upon the Department of Land and Natural Resources to come up with a plan which we would have a shot at subsequently.

However, under the circumstances, Mr. Speaker, I think that . . . first I want to commend the author of the resolution, my colleague and the efforts of his staff, in presenting the history of the Natatorium in that resolution. It's an outstanding background on the question and while we differ, in maybe the approach, we do not differ in the objective which is to truly honor the war dead of 1918 and that period, as well as to provide something that is of value to our community in remembering those people, but also allowing proper use of this park area.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair

On motion by Representative Chun, seconded by Representative Taniguchi and carried, H.R. No. 415 was adopted.

Representative Chun then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker and honorable members of this House, it gives me great pleasure and honor to be able to present a resolution to Dean Miller; Dick, to all six of us -- his former students who are

now members of the House of Representatives. Mr. Speaker, hindsight always results in better judgment, if one is given a chance to do it all over again. Today, Mr. Speaker, I, and some of the five, have a chance to show Dean Miller that we now have acquired the capability to make a better assessment of his actions when he was our professor of torts at the University of Hawaii.

All six of us had to be under him because he was the only professor who had taught the required subject of 'Torts.' I recall barging into his office and asking 'How dare you give an examination concerning all the torts process resolving tort disputes in one fell swoop -- a whole book at one examination! But he did -- from the specific details of the substantive law of torts to the general process of resolving tort disputes in our legal system. One student's answer was 17 pages, typed single space.

His examination, as I recall, started with a mental patient that escaped from Kaneohe State Hospital who set fire to a house, and ended up with an ambulance picking up the burn victim, hitting one of the Bobsey twins walking her dog by Queen's Hospital while the dog was doing his duty at a telephone pole.

Dean Miller is a hard professor -- hard on grades and hard on the Socratic method, and I hated him when I was in my first year. He always managed to call on me to recite a case when I was talking to someone else. So demanding, he never gave in to our demands. But as he learned how we locals behave, he mellowed, not with the grades, nor with the Socratic method, but on the ways in which to reach a student and teach us what he wanted us to learn. I can honestly say he is the best professor we have at the University of Hawaii Law School.

I feel that Dean Miller is the best choice as permanent Dean of the University of Hawaii Law School. He had worked with the school from its inception and has grown with it and, therefore, he is very knowledgeable of the processes, interactions, and political problems to be dealt with, for the survival and excellence of the University of Hawaii School of Law in the interest of Hawaii and the Pacific.

Mr. Speaker, it is true that beside every successful man is a dedicated

woman. We have here this morning that woman -- his wife, Dodie Miller, his wife of 26 years."

Representative Chun then presented Dean Richard Miller and his wife, Dodie, to the members of the House and audience.

Representative Blair then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, before we present the leis, I think we have to complete the record. There's still some things that have to be on the record before we can do that.

Actually, Mr. Speaker, I signed the resolution 'W/R', but Connie Chun took a bottle of white-out and erased that part. I haven't found a tort on that yet, but I am still looking.

The other thing the record should point out is that the 17-page paper that Representative Chun typed out was quite a good paper but, unfortunately, as I understand it, discussing this with Dean Miller, she spent ten of those seventeen pages discussing the liability of the dog to Hawaiian Electric Company.

I am particularly happy that I can address this resolution on the floor of the chamber, Mr. Speaker, because I know, from having taken his course, that I have legislative immunity and I can say anything I choose. However, there is also the defensive truth in everything I say here today is, in fact, true. Connie Chun may point out that a lot of this is just malicious because he gave her a better grade than he gave me in torts and while that is true, that's not really the motive behind my comments.

I think it is unfortunate that Deans of Law Schools are not required to go before the Senate for advise and consent. But my biggest reservation, Mr. Speaker, is that quite often when you take a truly excellent teacher and you turn him into an administrator, all you get is one less good teacher. Those of us who have served in the Legislature have seen this on many instances where. . .there are two examples to my immediate right where you take a very good committee chairman and you elect him to leadership and all you have are two fewer good chairmen.

But the final thing that really disturbs me today is that when I came down to the floor, I find a lei on my desk which Representative Chun says I am supposed to give to Dean Miller,

though I hope I am permitted to give it to his wife, but the thing that troubles me about this is that as soon as I do that, I know that he is going to turn to me and say, 'Representative Blair, that's harmful or offensive touching. I'll see you in court.' And so I asked Representative Chun if my legislative immunity covered that and she said correctly, 'I believe that it does not.' So, I just want it as a final word, Mr. Speaker, the record to reflect that I am presenting the lei in a capacity of an agent of Representative Chun and she has agreed to indemnify and hold me harmless against any claims that might be filed.

Thank you."

Representative Liu then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, unlike Representative Blair, I will present the lei to Dean Miller, not as an agent of Connie Chun. . . I would be very hesitant to, in any case, for that matter.

Let me just say that as the only Republican member of this body who went to the Law School under Dean Miller, that part of that process, I think, occurred while not only taking torts but civil procedures, social decision-making, and my third year writing seminar, so four classes, Mr. Speaker, that though I never asked many questions in class nor really answered many questions, I did, under Dean Miller, always find the minority, or dissenting viewpoint and opinions, the most interesting. And I am sure that under his leadership, the future students from the Law School will also take that interest in that area and will have more members from that body on this side of the aisle.

Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representatives Blair, Fukunaga, Liu, Taniguchi and Waihee then presented floral leis to Dean Miller and his wife, Dodie, while Representative Chun presented the honoree with a certified copy of the resolution.

Representative Narvaes, prior to introducing the honoree, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, first of all, I would like June to know that most of that resolution and the words of that resolution came from her co-workers. They seem to have a lot of affection for her.

Mr. Speaker, you know, when we first started out in school, we register, we get enrolled, our parents take us down, we're small little kids, and then one of the first things we're given are books. Books are where we start our formal education and when we end our formal education, like some of the law students here, we are basically closing a book.

Mr. Speaker, we've seen seven of the legislators here honor one of their former professors. Mr. Speaker, if we were to look at our past history and probably our future history, I believe everyone of us here has been in the State Library -- probably the Governor, probably the legislators, probably every elected official have spent some time in the State Library so today, really, everyone of us should be giving this honoree a lei today. She has helped us in our education.

Mr. Speaker, everytime I go to the library, I find it a place of peace because it is a place of learning. There are very few places where you can always find this type of atmosphere and it's there. I believe that atmosphere is there because it is a place of learning, and it's because of such dedicated workers like June.

Mr. Speaker, June first came to my attention when her co-workers called my office about two weeks ago and I was greatly impressed by the amount of affection they obviously felt for her, and so I really am honored to be able to participate in this resolution today."

Representative Narvaes then presented Mrs. June Uyeda to the members of the House and audience. Accompanying Mrs. Uyeda were Olga Sniffen, head of the Circulation Department at the Library, and Mr. Oi Yong Chong, Director of the Hawaii State Library.

Representative Nakasato presented

Hagino, Kiyabu, Kobayashi, Albano, Baker, Fukunaga, Ige, Isbell, Kihano, Lacy, Levin, Marumoto, Matsuura, Monahan, Nakasato, Narvaes, Rohlfling, Segawa, Stanley and Takitani.

On motion by Representative Hirono, seconded by Representative D. Hagino and carried, H.R. No. 417 was adopted.

Representative Hirono then rose to introduce the honorees, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, as the resolution mentions, the Kapa-Moi Lions started with 25 charter members of which 8 remain, including Mr. Clarence Konda who is with us this morning. The Kapa-Moi Lions has over 50 members now with businessmen, judges, lawyers, painters, contractors -- people from all walks of life -- who are members and they attempt to do at least one service project every month for the community in which they reside. This is in addition to their on-going participation in such activities as enrolling people as organ donors and, in fact, I was asked to put in a plug for that. "Mr. Speaker, this morning, it gives me great pleasure to be one of the co-sponsors of this resolution which honors Ruth Ono.

As you are aware, this resolution is rather lengthy but to have included the many other achievements and involvements of this remarkable young lady would have added several pages to the resolution.

Instead of dwelling on the many other good things that Ruth has contributed for the well-being of our society, I would like to just touch on a few personal observations of Ruth as I have perceived her during the past eight years. I knew she was a very busy person; always well groomed, friendly, and sensitive to those around her. But as I looked over the many involvements and accomplishments in the community which I gleaned from her personal secretary, I was just amazed at the time and energy that she has had to sacrifice in order to do so much.

And, Mr. Speaker, you wonder what makes a person to be so involved -- Glory? Self-serving ambition? Busybody? Not so, Mr. Speaker.
