Wednesday, January 16, 1985

In accordance with the provisions of Section 10 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, the House of Representatives of the Thirteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii convened in Regular Session on Wednesday, January 16, 1985. The Honorable Andrew Levin, being the Representative at the time present who was elected from the First Representative District of the State of Hawaii, called the House to order at 10:00 o'clock a.m.

The National Anthem was sung by Mr. Danny Kaleikini followed by Hawaii Ponoi sung by Ms. Yvonne Perry.

Representative Levin then appointed Representatives Cachola, Hemmings, Jones, Lardizabal, Nakata, Oshiro, Shon, Tam and Yoshimura to escort Reverend David Kaupu to the rostrum.

Reverend David Kaupu then invoked the Divine Blessing.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION

A resolution (H.R. No. 1) declaring the Honorable Andrew Levin, Representative from the First District, as the duly elected Temporary Chairman of the House of Representatives of the Thirteenth Legislature was jointly offered by Representatives Taniguchi and Bunda and was read by the Temporary Clerk.

On motion by Representative Taniguchi, seconded by Representative Bunda and carried, H.R. No. 1 was adopted.

Representative Levin stated:

"Members of the House, I thank you.

"Ladies and gentlemen, as the Representative of the First District on the island of Hawaii, I am privileged this morning to serve as Temporary Chair of the Thirteenth Legislature of our State. On behalf of my colleagues, may I welcome you -- our families, our friends and our guests who are here and those who are viewing at home. You honor us with your presence and we are grateful.

"We are gathered here at the Capitol to do the people's work. We ask your continued participation, your assistance, your guidance and your understanding in the months ahead. Together, we will continue the process of building a better Hawaii. Now, let us proceed with the Order of the Day."

The Temporary Chairman appointed George M. Takane as Temporary Clerk of the House of Representatives.

The Temporary Chairman then appointed Representatives Tom, Chairman; Shito, Vice Chairman; Andrews, Apo, Blair, Hashimoto, Hirono, Liu, Medeiros, Metcalf and Menor to the Committee on Credentials.

At 10:10 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:02 o'clock a.m.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION

A resolution (H.R. No. 2) declaring the Honorable Henry Haalilio Peters, Representative from the Forty-Eighth District, and Marshall K. Ige, Representative from the Seventeenth District, as Speaker and Vice Speaker, respectively, of the House

of Representatives of the Thirteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii was jointly offered by Representatives Kiyabu and Apo and was read by the Temporary Clerk.

On motion by Representative Kiyabu, seconded by Representative Apo and carried, H.R. No. 2 was adopted, with Representatives Anderson, Blair, Cachola, Cavasso, Graulty, Hemmings, Ikeda, Isbell, Medeiros, Onouye, Pfeil and Tam voting no.

The Temporary Chairman appointed Representatives Whitney T. Anderson, Mark J. Andrews, Russell Blair, Herbert J. Honda, Marshall K. Ige, Kina'u Boyd Kamali'i, Richard A. Kawakami, Daniel J. Kihano, John Justin Medeiros, Tom Okamura, Calvin K.Y. Say and Eloise Yamashita Tungpalan to escort the newly elected Speaker to the rostrum whereupon the Temporary Chairman presented the gavel to the newly elected Speaker.

The Speaker took the Chair and said:

"Before sharing my address with you this morning, I would like to introduce some of our honored guests who are present with us today," and proceeded to introduce the following: The Honorable George R. Ariyoshi, Governor of the State of Hawaii, and Mrs. Jean Ariyoshi; the Honorable John Waihee, Lieutenant Governor of the State of Hawaii; the Honorable Frank F. Fasi, Mayor of the City and County of Honolulu, and Mrs. Joyce Fasi; the Honorable Dante Carpenter, Mayor of the County of Hawaii, and Mrs. Carpenter; the Honorable Tony T. Kunimura, Mayor of the County of the Honorable Kauai; Hannibal Tavares, Mayor of the County of Maui; Mr. Robert P. Aguilar, United States District Judge; the Honorable William N. Fisher, "who specifically represents the country of Australia but in his official capacity here, he also serves as the chairman of all the Consul Generals in this State representing all the great countries who have Consul services here"; the Honorable Herman T.F. Lum, Chief Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court; the Honorable Stephen K. Yamashiro, Council Chairman from the County of Hawaii; the Honorable Goro Hokama. Council Chairman from the County of Maui; the Honorable Ronald Kochi, Council Chairman from the County of Kauai; his wife, Mrs. Carolyn Peters, and their daughter, Kimberly, "the 'speakers' of my house"; and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Drake.

The Chair then addressed the members of the House and their guests, as follows:

"Let my first words today be those of appreciation to the members of this House for the honor which you have again bestowed upon me. I am deeply aware of the obligation and trust which has been placed upon me through this office. The obligation is welcomed. And the trust, I assure you, will be fulfilled.

"The convening of the Legislature is a pleasant mixture of ceremony and celebration. It is the only time during the session that we are fortunate to have our family and friends with us on the chamber floor. And it's an appropriate time to reflect on shared and common values as well as forecast future dreams and hopes.

"It's a time to recall the basic principles of democracy which make allowances for ideas and interests of great variety while continuing to permit argument and criticism of an even greater variety. This capacity to take criticism and tolerate differences is at the heart of our form of government. It is a form of representative democracy which continues to serve the general good by the delicate check and balance of competing forces and interests.

"And nowhere is the representative form of government more vital, more clearly visible and more immediate than here in the State Legislature. Mr. Larry Margolis, the Executive Director of the Citizens Conference on State Legislatures, describes the Legislature as the institution, more than any other government activity, which most closely reflects the people -- their hopes, their dreams, their aspirations, their strengths, their weaknesses Incidentally weaknesses. Incidentally, in a ranking of the 50 Legislatures by the Citizens Conference, the Hawaii State Legislature was placed amongst the top ten in representativeness, accountability and performance. Significantly, Hawaii led the nation as the most open and accessible of all state Legislatures. I hope that doesn't come as a surprise to many of vou.

"I believe the reasons for the Legislature's closeness to the people go beyond geography and physical location. I think that the Legislature mirrors our community in large part because of its very nature as a part-time, citizens Legislature. Legislators reflect the various professions, the trade, social,

economic, ethnic and cultural interests of this community. This is what the Constitution provides and this is what the people intended.

"The report by the Citizens Conference on State Legislatures puts it this way: 'To be truly representative, the Legislature exhibit diversity and reflect, to some degree, the important interests and hopes within the state. Its members should have a variety of commercial and professional backgrounds and display a wide variety as opposed to a narrow range of interests. Legislators should have connections with the various ethnic, ideological, political and economic groups within the State...' In discussing the nature of a part-time Legislature, the report notes that, and I quote: 'It cannot be considered improper or immoral for a legislator to also be an employee of a business or corporation.' And finally, the Citizens Conference concludes, and I quote: 'In a democracy, the only really valid qualification for serving in the Legislature is the approval of all of you, the electorate.'

"I fully support these observations. The public trust continues to be served -- and served exceedingly well in Hawaii as I have mentioned earlier -- by those elected on a part-time basis.

"Before focusing on the Legislature 1985, I would like to share a comment by Professor Alan Rosenthal of the renowned Eagleton Institute of Politics. In describing those who attack the Legislature and detract from the work of legislators, Rosenthal observes that the media is very fierce in searching out whatever it can to justify a story, finding the messiness and untidiness of democratic government and legislative life easy to ridicule. He characterizes the perpetual critics who appear disdainful of what goes on in politics, saying that some resent the fact that they themselves are not in Legislature making public policy.

"What the exact motives are for the fierce attacks and negative reactions, I'm not certain. But I am convinced that the public's interests are more constantly and consistently served in this body than in the boardrooms of newspaper and media executives. We stand trial every two years; they don't, but I guess, on the other hand, as one famous media President, John Kennedy, has said, and I quote: 'Let us not seek to fix blame for the past, but let us accept responsibility

for the future.'

"With the convening of the Thirteenth Legislature, the members of the House of Representatives are prepared to seek solutions to provide for a better future for us all.

"We convene in a year which marks the 25th anniversary of the East West Center and the happy 100th anniversary of the Japanese immigrants to Hawaii. Both are good signs.

"The very name of the East West Center underscores the unique position of Hawaii as we embark upon what the United States Ambassador to Japan Mike Mansfield calls the era of the 'Pacific Basin.'

"And in celebrating the arrival of the Japanese to our islands, we proudly acknowledge that the Japanese culture, values and tradition are deeply woven into the fabric of our island State and while strong the weave is subtle, blending, if you will, with the many other strands forming a colorful, beautiful and diverse pattern of life here in Hawaii. Truly, our strength is in our diversity — in the many and diverse resources of our people and our islands.

"In 1985, the Legislature will focus attention on our resources. Many of the priorities for this session have been set by the studies commissioned in previous years. I wish to publicly thank those who participated in these studies and while every recommendation may not become legislation, I assure you that each proposal will be assure you that each proposal will be carefully and fully considered. I would also like to mention that recently, prior to any legislative deliberation, a number of these studies have undergone sharp and abusive criticism. Criticism of this nature is never constructive, guiding or helpful and benefits no one, not even the critic. Such negative action seems to be the trademark of those whose abilities may lie in tearing down and taking things to pieces rather than building up and con-structing solutions for a better life in our community.

"This is a critical time to construct and shape Hawaii's future. The subjects of these studies are of such fundamental importance that in considering the recommendations of the Tax Review Commission; the Advisory Commission on Water Resources; the workers' compensation report; the Judicial Council's Penal Code Committee and various land

inventory reports, the direction of the State's future economic, environmental and social development will be determined. Major policy decisions, as a consequence, will be made.

"One hundred years ago when our first Japanese families arrived, ours was an agricultural, plantation economy. Today, our economy has shifted toward services, with tourism being the largest service industry in the State.

"And years ago when the son of a Japanese plantation worker in Ewa became the first graduate of a local high school in Honolulu, the total number of students in both public and private schools in all grades was less than 30,000. Today, the number of high school senior graduates over the past four years alone has totalled more than 50,000.

"With an increasingly better educated and skilled workforce, will we be able to provide the type and number of higher skilled jobs required to move our economy to greater productivity and higher income growth? And will the visitor industry continue to grow and continue to be Hawaii's leading income producing industry?

"The answers to these basic questions as well as to the myriad and complex proposals before us are some of the major challenges which we face this year. And I believe a piecemeal approach would not only be inadvisable but imprudent and irresponsible.

"Our State has maintained sound and prudent fiscal policies and management and, as a consequence, the economic outlook for Hawaii is fairly optimistic. But changes in the national economy and federal policies will have a definite impact. For example, cutbacks in federal block grants to states and local governments, especially in the health and human services areas, would have a serious and adverse effect. Likewise, action on the national level regarding the U.S. Farm Act will be of critical importance to the future of Hawaii's sugar industry.

"Therefore, during the work of this session, we will also need to explore ways to support key industries, develop greater and better job opportunities and provide for the safety of our visitors to our islands as well as for the protection and safety of all our citizens -- young

and old alike.

"In all of this, we will look not for individual answers or partisan answers or even popular answers. But we will look for answers that are fair and equitable. We will look to promote the welfare of our citizens. We will look for just and decent answers.

"In other words, quite simply, ladies and gentlemen, in all of this, the members of the House of Representatives of the Thirteenth Legislature, will look with all our hearts, our minds, our souls and abilities, for the right answers.

"To all of you, aloha and God bless you."

At this time, the Chair presented the Vice Speaker of the House of Representatives, Representative Marshall K. Ige, to the members of the House and their guests and asked the Vice Speaker to join him at the rostrum.

The Chair recognized Representative Marumoto, Minority Leader, who then rose and responded:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

"Mr. Speaker, Governor Ariyoshi, Lieutenant Governor Waihee, Mr. Chief Justice, distinguished guests, my fellow colleagues, citizens of Hawaii -- aloha.

"I am honored this morning to address you on behalf of the Minority members of this august body. The Opening Day of the Legislature is always a special day. It is a time to commit ourselves to those ideals of representative government which were foremost in our minds when we chose to devote ourselves to public service. To you new members, may I extend a special welcome. I am confident that you will successfully meet your challenge and that this House will benefit from your efforts and hard work.

"This Thirteenth Legislature must deal with issues that will impact upon all of us -- business, labor, the future economic viability of this State, the environment, the control of our water, and the taxing of our citizenry.

"Foremost among these issues is the development of a long-term economic plan. This will not be an easy task for us. But we must make this a priority for, today, Hawaii is at risk.

The sugar and pineapple industries are endangered, and we have recently been told that the number of jobs has remained stagnant and unchanged since 1980. This signals the beginning of slower job creation in Hawaii. Economists have noted that the distribution of jobs reflects a shift to lower-skill occupations. What this trend foretells is the decline of labor force productivity, average wages performing poorly in real terms, and our sons and daughters leaving Hawaii for more challenging employment elsewhere — a continuing exodus of our most talented people.

"Our interest and our concern in the Legislature for a dynamic environment is to insure the generation of tax revenues for the State's spending programs, for without such revenues, we would be unable to meet the needs of Hawaii's people. And we must keep this in mind in our every deliberation,

"So, in order to create a more positive business climate, we must see reforms such as in the workers' compensation system. Business in Hawaii is crying out for relief and to ignore these cries would be completely irresponsible.

"Both lower and higher education are important priorities because a sound educational system is necessary if we are to have a citizenry capable of sustaining the economy and filling higher skilled jobs.

"We also have to examine the problems of crime, the needs of the elderly, health care, child care -- the list is endless.

"Our task is monumental, but I am confident, however, that all of us together will rise to the challenge. We must!

"Mr. Speaker, at this time, we, the loyal opposition, must say that we are duty-bound to state on the floor of this House that the eleven Minority Representatives do not believe that you should serve as Speaker of the House while you are a trustee of the Bishop Estate. This is by no means a personal attack for the point is, no matter who the individual is, he or she cannot serve in this dual role without it being a conflict. Laws that affect the Bishop Estate have an impact on our land and water use, our housing, our entire economy. A trustee of the Bishop Estate must honor his fiduciary duty to fully support those measures which will enhance the Estate's position, and for

a trustee to do less would be a serious breach.

"I have kept my comments brief with respect to Opening Day ceremonies. Despite our opposition, Mr. Speaker, you have been duly elected. We now stand by ready to work with you and all the other members of the Thirteenth Legislature.

"Thank you very much."

The Chair then recognized Representative Kawakami, Majority Leader, who rose and responded:

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

"Mr. Speaker, on behalf of the Majority members of the House, greetings and welcome to our family, friends, and honored guests.

"We in the Majority are pledged to work with and to learn from each other. We are here to get to know each other, and to know the concerns of each of the fifty-one districts in this State. We intend to share information and reach for an overall view of the State, and, hopefully, resolve some of the problems from this perspective. The Divine Blessing was invoked by Kahu Samuel M. Safferey, Jr. of the Liliuokalani Protestant Church, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Blair, Ikeda, Isbell, Kamali'i, Liu, Menor and Tungpalan, who were excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Fourth Day.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Marumoto and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Fourth Day was approved.

At 11:12 o'clock a.m., Representative Anderson asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 11:43 o'clock a.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives Blair, Liu and Tungpalan.

ORDER OF THE DAY

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 6 and 7) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

A resolution (H.R. No. 6) relating the Rules of the House of Representatives of the Thirteenth State Legislature (1985-1986), State of Hawaii, was jointly offered by Representatives Kawakami and Marumoto.

Representative Kawakami moved that H.R. No. 6 be adopted, seconded by Representative Marumoto.

Representative Kawakami then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, for the record, I would like to make a few corrections to the copies of the House Rules that were placed on the desks this morning.

"On page 1, section 1.3, line 5, after the word 'electing', insert ' by resolution' a Speaker, Vice Speaker, Clerk and so forth, so the addition would be 'by resolution.'

"On page 10, the program description on Human Resources. On the fourth line, delete the phrase, 'insure the proper development of a state general plan and an orderly growth of population.' Now insert that phrase on page 11 — the following page. Again, on the program description on Natural Resources, on the fifth line, after the word 'environment', insert the phrase, 'insure the proper development of a state general plan and an orderly growth of population.'

"On page 19, Rule 18, section 18.2, relating to the Committee on the Journal, on the second line of 18.2, add 'Minority Floor Leader" after the 'Minority Leader.'

"That is all, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Liu then rose to speak for the resolution with reservations, stating:

"The very last rule of our Rules states that: 'The most recent rules of parliamentary practice as set forth by Cushing shall govern the House, where not inconsistent with these Rules.'

"Let me read just a couple of quotes, Mr. Speaker: 'But this motion, to entitle it to precedence must be for the orders generally, if there is more than one, and not for any particular one; and, if decided in the affirmative, that is, that the assembly will now proceed to the orders of the day, they must then be read and gone through with in the order in which they stand; priority of order being considered to give priority of right.'

"Let me also quote another section when this order may be permitted: 'If on repeated trials, the presiding officer finds that the assembly will not support him in the exercise of his authority, he will then be justified, but not till then, in permitting without censure, every kind of disorder.'

"Let me just say, Mr. Speaker, I think that is about as clear as mud and one of these days, I would like to see us use a different basis for these House Rules. That is only one comment there and, hopefully, in the future, this topic may be taken up by future legislatures...a future House of Representatives of this body.

"Secondly, Mr. Speaker, the right to recall used to be Rule 34.1 and now, I believe it is Rule 37, page 28 -- 'Bills: Recall from Committee.' Let me just say, Mr. Speaker, there has been a lot of discussion on this point in the past and there have been Attorney General opinions as to what has been needed for this rule. And let me just say that I think it is unfortunate that we have not taken the opportunity this session to embellish the rule, to really give guidelines for this rule, which would truly give meaning to the right to recall. Currently, if one-third of the members wish to bring forth a bill to this body from a committee, that can be done, and then the body, I believe, would make some decisions as to what happens next -- whether it's referred back to your office or to a committee, or whatever, and that would be done by majority vote. The unfortunate part about this is that I believe recall should mean that if 17 members of this body can be mustered by an individual...as you know, Mr. Speaker, you being a great master of it, getting votes is a very tough job to do. But if a group of individuals or if an individual legislator can gather that kind of support for a bill, I would hope that, again, sometime in the future, that the right to recall will mean that the bill can be brought to this body which will then automatically resolve itself into the Committee of the Whole to talk about and consider the substance of the measure.

"Thank you for the chance, Mr. Speaker, to express my reservations."

Representative Jones then rose to speak in favor of the resolution, with mild reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, these rules, I am happy to vote up on them this session. I would like to remind my colleagues that last session, we had several issues that came up that we had to debate. One was prior concurrence; the other one was introduction of bills and the hearing of those bills.

"I think the reason why these issues came up is because a number of people felt that each one of us are elected as 51 Representatives here to represent what we believe is the best interest of the State of Hawaii and of

our district, and when a minority of people feel that they are being dictated to by any one person or chairman, it causes a lot of problems and it hurts in relationships here in the House.

"We have a new legislature. We have new people here and we have old ones like myself. I guess we have learned a little bit, and I am looking forward to working with the chairmen and with the leadership on both sides.

"I would like to mention, however, that I would like to encourage my colleagues to take what's in our Rules concerning prior concurrence. It is there for a reason. Let us seek as much as is possible in the time we have to abide by prior concurrence so that we who are in the lower committees can really make an input to the overall effectiveness of this body.

"Secondly, I will not be introducing an amendment at this time to the Constitution that all bills be heard because I believe that we allow more openness in this session, perhaps in the last session concerning the hearing of bills.

"I would just want to encourage my colleagues -- let's make a commitment together. Just take the issues on the merit of the issues. There's too much at stake in this Legislature to be reduced down to petty politics. Let's look at the bills from the issues, and I think we will have a great session as we do.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I encourage my colleagues to vote up on this resolution."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 6 was adopted.

A resolution (H.R. No. 7) that pursuant to Rule 56.1 of the Rules of the House, the Administrative and Financial Manual of Guides of the House be adopted for the Thirteenth Legislature in the same manner and form as that adopted by the Twelfth Legislature for the Regular Sessions of 1983 and 1984, and that the Clerk of the House is directed to compile and publish the Administrative and Financial Manual of Guides of the House of Representatives of the Thirteenth State Legislature, was jointly offered by Representatives Kawakami and Marumoto.

On motion by Representative Kawakami, seconded by Represen-

SEVENTH DAY

Thursday, January 24, 1985

The House of Representatives of the Thirteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1985, convened at 10:00 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Major Bobby G. Midgette, Chaplain, from Schofield Barracks.

At 10:10 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 10:35 o'clock a.m., the House of Representatives met in Joint Session with the Senate, pursuant to House Concurrent Resolution No. 1, to receive the Governor's address. (Gov. Msg. No. 3)

At this time, the Speaker welcomed and introduced the following distinguished guests to the members of the Thirteenth Legislature:

The First Lady of the State of Hawaii, Mrs. Jean Ariyoshi. A pikake lei was presented to Mrs. Ariyoshi by Representative Leong. She was accompanied by her two sons, Todd and Don; the Governor's mother, brother and sisters.

The Honorable Edward Nakamura, Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Hawaii; and the Honorable John Waihee, Lieutenant Governor of the State of Hawaii.

Mr. William Roland, Chief of Staff of the U.S. Coast Guard, representing the "military family."

The Honorable William Fisher, Dean of the Consular Corps in Hawaii, and other members of the various Consular Corps in Hawaii.

The Honorable Frank F. Fasi, Mayor of the City and County of Honolulu; the Honorable Tony T. Kunimura, Mayor of the County of Kauai; the Honorable Patsy T. Mink, Chairperson of the City Council; the Honorable Stephen Yamashiro, Chairperson of the Hawaii Council; and several Council members from Oahu, Kauai, Hawaii and Maui.

The Cabinet members of the respective departments of the State of Hawaii; and Mrs. Carolyn Peters, his wife.

The Chair then appointed Senators

Kawasaki, Kuroda and Henderson, and Representatives Ige, Kawakami, Okamura and Marumoto to escort the Honorable George R. Ariyoshi, Governor of the State of Hawaii, to the rostrum.

Senator Young and Representatives Hashimoto, Kim, Tungpalan, Ikeda, Isbell, Kamali'i and Marumoto then presented Governor Ariyoshi with ilima leis on behalf of the Senate and the House of Representatives.

The Speaker presented to the members of the Thirteenth Legislature, and guests, the Honorable George R. Ariyoshi, stating:

"Members, audience, will you please join me in welcoming to the rostrum the Governor of this great State of ours, the Honorable George R. Ariyoshi."

The Governor addressed the Joint Session, stating:

"Thank you very much.

"I have often talked about Hawaii as being a very special place and am very privileged in this State to go to many functions where I have the opportunity of receiving a lei -- a very unique custom here in our State. Everytime I receive a lei, I feel as though I have received one for the first time. Loving thoughts that come with the giving of a lei here in our community, to me, is so important for in our State, for us to remain a very special place, that we retain all of the things that have made our State the very unique place, and I express my appreciation to all of you this morning for the great warmth with which you have received me and the leis that you have given to me today.

"Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, distinguished citizens, and my fellow residents of Hawaii:

"For twelve years now, I have fulfilled one of the Governor's most important duties by coming here at your invitation in the early days of the New Year -- to stand behind the rostrum in this beautiful chamber, and to speak with you about the state of the State.

"Today, the long record of our Administration can best be seen, not only in a large file of newspaper clippings, but in some history books as well. Yes, twelve years seem like a long time to me. And to some of you with whom I have not always agreed, it may seem even longer.

"We have seen some remarkable changes during the 25 years since Hawaii ended its Territorial status and became a full-fledged State.

"Our population figures show best that great change. In 1960, there were 633,000 people here. Today, there are more than a million people. The poet, Carl Sandburg, once wrote that the story of America is the story of people arriving — that there were always new faces at the end of the block. That has surely been true of these islands. The first people came in huge outrigger canoes. Today, they come in huge 747's. In a free society, people can move as they wish. And I have the feeling that still more will be on the way to Hawaii.

"We can be proud that during the short period of our Statehood, Honolulu has been transformed into a major modern American metropolis. Indeed, on all of our islands we find the evidence of modern progress. But we also see with equal satisfaction that many places in Hawaii remain today much as they were in the long-lost past. In matters both old and new, our task is to pass on the legacy of opportunity given to us, without sacrificing the unique, desirable qualities that make our State such a special place.

"My desire to keep our Administration vibrant and 'on its toes' during the next two years is more than just a personal wish for a strong finish. For the needs of this island community for which we have all been chosen stewards do not slow down. They are ever-changing, but always with us.

"It's only natural to have more spontaneous energy at the beginning of an enterprise, but we cannot afford now a period of running down or of less energy, just because the end of our governorship approaches. If we allow that to happen, we cheat the people.

"The faces may change -- as, indeed, many of the faces in the Legislature have changed over the years that I have stood here -- but the offices and the functions continue. And the work done has an impact, not just on legislation today, but on life tomorrow. A century from

now, a man or woman not yet born will stand here as the Governor of Hawaii, or in your seat as a legislator. And what we do in the next two years will have some kind of effect upon them.

"So let us remain alert, diligent and responsive. We are, after all, a part of one of the most responsive political systems ever devised -- our American democracy. Our democracy is an unending process in which the people speak, point their government in a fundamental direction, and elect the officials to help guide it there. It is a process of public decision about what should be abandoned, what should be kept, and what should be created, as we try to shape our preferred future. It is a complex process that requires imagination, hope, participation, persistence, persuasion, and patience. Although politics and politicians are sometimes viewed with a skeptical eye, ours is a time-tested process we can all be proud of.

"Let us now look at some important aspects of the process as it unfolds today.

"The Reagan Administration has brought a major philosophical and financial shift to our Federal government. The President's reelection appears to confirm that Americans want to follow his path. For half a century -- since the first days of the New Deal -- Americans have been accustomed to the Federal government providing a broad array of essential and helpful services. And these have been much more than welfare programs and aid for dependent children. Agriculture, business, science, industry, educa-tion -- all of these important sectors -- have vastly benefitted from a thousand programs of Federal support. But, today, with a massive Federal deficit, the horn of plenty is no longer so plentiful. State governments are being asked to step into the breach. It is a difficult time, because Federal cutbacks are unpredictable and thus difficult to plan for. And there is no way that the resources of any State can come up to the Federal level. And so, we are learning to live with this reality. Perhaps the self-reliance we must now demonstrate will make us stronger in the long run.

"Though many people are concerned about this return of responsibility to the State level after half a century of Federal dominance, this does represent a return to a powerful and

historic American idea. The age of Jackson -- 150 years ago -- was the great era of state government, when churches and other voluntary agencies were the primary workers for social progress. It was also the heyday of efforts to improve the world by enlightening the mind of each individual. And if we are returning to these values, then all may yet be well.

"Turning from Federal policies to our own, I am pleased to report to you that I intend to turn over a fiscally healthy government to my successor two years from now. Long before the Federal cutbacks — actually, from my earliest days in the Legislature — I've had a policy of prudence in handling public money. I have even been described sometimes as being 'stingy.' But I can never forget that a government spends the hard-earned resources of individual citizens. And I can never forget that though we may deal in millions, each individual dollar comes right out of somebody's pocket. Our obligation of stewardship is a very serious one.

"The best time to do financial planning is when things are going well. If we are able to get by without spending everything in a good year, then we'll have something for the lean year. In this respect, a government and a business and a family are exactly alike.

"Let me remind you that when I spoke to you here two years ago —in January of 1983 — the State government had just made a projection of anticipated revenues that showed a deficit of \$250 million as of June of 1985.

"We would not stand still for that. While there was some controversy about how dangerous our fiscal situation really was, I placed some restrictions on spending for that budget year, and you of the Legislature followed suit with prudent appropriations. And there were no need for new taxes.

"And what is the result? No State deficit in 1985; instead, there is a modest surplus. In good times or bad, we will never have all the dollars we want. But we can manage the dollars we do have. And we have been doing just that.

"The annual process of 'squeezing' the budget -- as we call it -- is beneficial. It forces us to think. It helps us be flexible. It lets us shift money from programs that over the

years have become less critical, into progrms that have a clear need to be started or expanded. In short, squeezing the budget keeps our government up to date.

"These islands, like any other community, depend for their continuity on the ability of our young people to grow up and play a constructive role in the community. The family is the private institution that helps them along the way. Education is the public institution. In Hawaii, education has been the great equalizer. It has opened the door of opportunity. It has been a path toward dignity and harmony for a diverse people.

"I hope to use a substantial part of my time in the next two years to encourage all our citizens to become more concerned and more involved with education. A first step will be the Governor's Conference on Education that we will schedule this spring. We will have at this forum, not only our professional educators, but leaders from the whole spectrum of life, to sit down, to listen, to think, to talk, and to help develop ideas that might enhance our educational programs at every level.

"Anyone who takes the time to attend or follow the results of this conference carefully will be better able to understand what our schools are and what they are not. And they will understand how our educational resources are being spent and how they might be spent.

The emphasis on education comes at a critical time, and I hope it will last far beyond my term in office. Both the Department of Education and the University of Hawaii have new leaders this year. Francis Hatanaka and Cecil Mackey are experienced educators, dedicated to excellence. They deserve our support, and they will have it.

"There is another reason for this renewal of emphasis. Hawaii is one of the most geographically isolated places on earth, but it is also one of the most advanced and prosperous. Our educational system has helped get us where we are. Now, as we aspire to build a newer and more technological Hawaii, we have none to turn to but our better-educated young people. We can bring in silicon chips and computers. We can put up handsome buildings. But in the end, we must look to today's students for tomorrow's successes. I am certain that if we can draw all in our community into

a continuing dialogue about the aim and scope of education, we will truly achieve something wonderful.

"As you begin your work of determining the budget for the Department of Education for the next biennium, let me offer two recommendations. One I had made previously; the other you have not heard from me before.

"The first recommendation is that in putting the Department of Education's budget together, you orient it towards those things which clearly contribute to a quality education for our children. Be willing to change the existing distribution of resources — to match those resources with programs that will best achieve the goal of a quality education.

"The most important factor in achieving that goal is the relationship of our students and our teachers. It is in that relationship that the dynamic process of transferring information and wisdom to our children occurs, or should occur. It is primarily the harmonious interaction of student and teacher that develops the ability of our students to learn.

"The expenditures of our public school system must be geared towards supporting and enhancing this critical relationship. If our programs do not clearly do so, we must question them. I believe and that we could benefit from a systematic appraisal of what we do. For example, do all the activities in our central and district offices represent the most efficient use of our funds in support of the student and teacher relationship?

"My second recommendation is that, after re-examining and reallocating within the level of funds I recommended to you earlier, if you see areas where additional funding can provide substantial improvement in the ability of the Department of Education to meet the goal of providing our children with a quality education, that you be willing to increase the funding for the Department of Education by about \$5 million each year above the level recommended in our Executive Budget proposal sent to you several weeks ago.

"And I want to emphasize that this is not simply an invitation to spend money. But if, after careful consideration, you believe that more dollars will bring substantial returns, you have my blessing to provide those extra dollars to the Department of Education, within the context of the

overall State biennial budget, and it has been cranked into our financial plan and I make this recommendation to you knowing full well that it is something that we can afford.

"Our University of Hawaii is in the midst of important changes. It recently developed a Strategic Plan that delineates its relationship to the State; to the world beyond Hawaii; to the myriad potentials for knowledge in many fields; and to the students themselves.

"The establishment of this Strategic Plan is more significant than one might initially assume. The University has become a bigger enterprise than many realize. It directly employs 8,000 persons, has a budget of \$300 million, and serves 50,000 students of all ages, in all disciplines, throughout the State. Having a clear strategy for this huge institution is vitally important.

"In these days of change for the University, we will look to President Mackey and to his colleagues, and we will cooperate with them, for realistic reallocations of funds which will be of true benefit to the educational process. In this process, little need be sacred. We must look at every aspect of the University, trying to find what can be made better.

"In anticipation of Dr. Mackey's coming on board on July 1st, the beginning of the fiscal year, I am requesting, as a clear measure of our support, that a lump sum of \$10 million -- \$5 million for each year of the biennium -- be added to the amount for the University that appeared in the budget proposal sent to you earlier. I recommend that Dr. Mackey be given the flexibility to use these funds in ways he considers best for the University.

"And while we can assist Dr. Mackey and his associates with our ideas, with appropriations, and with this lump-sum grant, the basic direction the University should take remains their decision. What is the proper balance between the technical excellence already achieved in many departments, and the values that have always been found in the study of the humanities? How can the humane ideas found in a traditional liberal education be applied usefully in a technological society? How can the University of Hawaii become 'universal'? These are important questions that can best be answered by the leaders of the University itself.

"Because of Hawaii's isolation and singularity, many people from a distance take in all of Hawaii as a single concept. What they think of the University of Hawaii is often what they think of the State as a whole. And in that sense, the University could perhaps be described as 'the soul' of our State as well as its intellectual treasure house. I am confident that the soul and the treasure house are today under good management.

"When we turn from education to something like economic development, we quickly see how important education is. Two years ago, your legislation created the Pacific International Center for High Technology Research, or 'PICHTR' as it is sometimes called. Today, as we continue to encourage appropriate high technology development, our success will depend to a degree on how the world scientific community perceives both our research and our PICHTR is academic capacities. designed to play a big role in bringing together researchers in cooperative international projects that will propel us solidly into the high tech age. And it is designed to be an exporter of research results to the entire Pacific Basin.

"This year has seen several constructive meetings on PICHTR. I have been in frequent touch with other Pacific Island leaders and leaders of Japan and Asia. I am confident that now is the time for our Center to make a major move forward toward its goal of becoming a world-class institution. I am requesting that the Center incorporate as a private, non-profit institution. And I am recommending \$1 million for each of the biennium be appropriated for the Center to help the program grow.

will continue office "Mv strengthen international contacts and commitments we already have made. And at the Pacific Islands Conference in the Cook Islands this August, for example, I will be discussing with other heads of Pacific Island governments how we can help PICHTR be of benefit to this vast region. As my experience and our experience with PICHTR has grown, it seems to me that we did exactly the right thing in coming up with PICHTR when we did, and it will serve us well.

"We will also be served well as we continue to invest in one of Hawaii's own particular kinds of high technology, one which I call oceanic high tech. Today, ocean skills are being

developed rapidly at the Natural Energy Laboratory of Hawaii at Energy Keahole on the Big Island. There, things are moving ahead with advanced forms of energy and aqua-culture research and development. An abalone farm has been established and they are already asking for more land for expansion of their project. An algae farm to produce nutrition supplements is in the planning stage. It would be a great loss if, after our helping to develop their technology, companies like these were to relocate outside of our State. We need to develop a permanent home for such commercial activities, and so provide more stable jobs and tax revenues.

"In the budget before you, I have proposed the development of a Hawaii Ocean Science and Technology Park at Keahole. It will be developed as the first major project of our High Technology Development Corporation. When it is complete, we'll have there a fine ocean technology center with research and development and the commercial activity that grows from the R and D. Again, we will be building on our unique advantage as this nation's only ocean-surrounded State.

"Finally, in this area of ocean technology and economics, let me urge your favorable consideration of another project. The State of Hawaii Ocean Center, which we propose to locate at Waikiki, embraces technology, tourism, and education. It is an all-purpose idea which, I believe, will have a future value that we cannot easily estimate today. I don't want to overdramatize it, but if we design and build this Center in the right way, it will help us restore elements of our ocean heritage --things that we've lost in the past century or so. As our people and visitors come to this Center, they will begin to rediscover what the ancient Hawaiians knew; that is, the fullness of a life in which the ocean itself is Center will give us a better idea, and it will give millions of it will give millions of our visitors a better idea, of what the Islanders are, and why we think, believe, and act as we do.

"The Center might begin as a handsome, comprehensive redesign of the existing aquarium at Waikiki, and grow to be much more than that. In its complete form, it may include inter-active exhibits, displays, lectures and audio-visual presentations, 'touch tanks', and reef walks. There may be, for example, a model showing precisely how our ocean

thermal energy conversion works, and expeditions to take people out to the reef beyond the Center itself.

"You will remember that last year you appropriated funds for a schematic design for this program. The budget request for the coming two years includes funds for detailed planning and design and construction.

"Our Ocean Center and our oceanic technology will grow together, and they will have a synergistic effect. They will affect the thinking and planning and imaginations of people everywhere. And let me suggest that when Hawaii celebrates its Golden Jubilee of Statehood in the year 2009, we may well be using the ocean in ways that we cannot today foresee at all.

"Let me turn now to another area, where the economic returns can be more concrete and more immediate.

"Since 1976, nearly 400 feature films, TV specials and TV series have been filmed here in Hawaii. We've collected about \$14 million in taxes from these high-profile activities. The film-makers have spent about \$350 million, while providing 1100 jobs annually.

"This is a splendid record, and today we want to encourage film-making in a more consistent way than we have in the past. It is a valuable economic resource in itself, and it also reinforces our entire tourism industry through its promotional aspects.

"And so I ask that you look favorably on the proposal to establish the Hawaii Film Industry Authority. Its task will be to develop a professional film studio -- a first-class production center -- here in the State. It will be a clear example of our Administration and Legislature making it easier to do business in Hawaii.

"We in the Administration are continuously aware of the conclusions of the recent report of the Governor's Committee on Doing Business in Hawaii, and we are trying to respond to its major recommendations. This is a part of the process of government that does not have easy answers, but that does not mean that we are not looking for them. And in a modest way, we are making progress.

"I am sending, for your consideration, a bill that would allow the Department of Planning and Economic

Development to facilitate the granting of permits for resort, residential, industrial, and commercial facilities. None of the regular jurisdictions will be bypassed, but this bill will establish a voluntary process by which the applicant and the government agencies can sit down and work out permit requirements and timetables for decision-making in advance. Our objective, again, is to make it easier to do business in Hawaii.

"The second bill relates to the Land Use Commission. I am proposing that we streamline the Commission's actions by legislation that will send petitions for the reclassification of parcels of land, 15 acres or less in size, (in agricultural, urban and rural districts, not in conservation, but in those districts) directly to the appropriate County for action. This would reduce the number of petitions coming before the Commission by as much as 50 percent, while it would retain major land cases for Commission review.

"Through these efforts, we hope to convince our citizens when they come in to deal with their government, that the government is there to help and not to put up roadblocks against progress. And this is what the relationship should be at all levels of government.

"The Committee on Doing Business in Hawaii also highlighted two other major problems — tax reform and workers' compensation. I believe that we are poised to make progress in both areas, but the process will require a sharp focus from both the Governor's Office and the Legislature.

"I urge your careful study of the recommendations of the Tax Review Commission. The process of tax revision and reform is critical, and the last substantial review was almost 20 years ago.

"The State depends for most of its revenue on the general excise tax. If it is to be changed, we must have broad agreement about the direction in which we are going.

"At the appropriate time, my Administration will provide testimony on various proposals that will be before you, and you will be able to discern our direction from such testimony. But please let me make one point clear: I do not look to this tax review as a reason or means to raise additional revenues. We are living within our means today, and I want us to keep on doing so.

"We must find formulas that our taxpayers can easily understand and feel comfortable with. And we must recognize that a tax that discriminates capriciously against doing business here is not working in the best interests of all of us. As I have indicated, in spending tax money, we must be frugal. In collecting that money, we must be fair.

"We must also move, as the Committee recommended, to deal with the workers' compensation situation. Our compensation costs are higher than anywhere else in the country. obviously, we must reassess cost-effectiveness of our workers' compensation system. All aspects of this complex program must be reviewed, including the tendency of the courts in recent years to broaden dramatically the idea of just what is a work-related injury. To insure fairness to all concerned -- to employer and employee -- we can begin to act clearly on this principle, that any person who is legitimately injured on the job deserves compensation. Any person who is not legitimately injured on the job does not.

"We, in the Administration, are prepared to work with you in reviewing and revising the system, and will be presenting testimony when your hearings begin.

"Over the past year, we have continued to not only solve problems of economic development, but also to promote economic development with a real sense of dedication. Our dedication can be seen in many places.

"It can be seen in the new Small Business Information Service which, as quickly as possible, will be located in its own office in the centrally located Kamamalu Building. It is a unit of the reorganized Business and Industry Development Division.

"Our dedication can also be seen in the additional funds for our Hawaii Capital Loan Program, and the Hawaii Industry and Product Promotion Program. It can be seen in the commitment of the special Deputy Attorney General who deals specifically with small business problems. And these programs recognize that small business is today the backbone and the stabilizing factor in our economy.

"Taken together, these programs will help us get more small business people started. It will provide them with the information they need, both to start up and to be competitive once

they get going. They will assist more businesses in marketing their products. And they will protect small business people from unfair and deceptive practices.

"Since its inception, the Hawaii Capital Loan Program has produced 1,350 jobs directly and another 1,200 jobs indirectly through secondary efforts. Far more money has come back to the State than we have spent on the program. So it is, for the State itself, good business.

"Another key to a good business environment for Hawaii is that our visitor industry remain competitive in the intensely competitive world of tourism. Last year, you provided additional resources for special promotional programs for the Hawaii Visitors Bureau. I am recommending that the budget proposal for the Hawaii Visitors Bureau sent to you earlier be increased by \$600,000 in each year of the biennium.

"I also urge you to consider the recommendations of the recent Governor's Tourism Congress. At some point, for example, we are going to have to move on to the complicated task of building a world-class convention center. We may not be ready to start building, but we do need to move ahead in our discussions on the size, the scope, the financing, and the best location of such a center.

"The details of the redevelopment of Kakaako are different, but our underlying philosophy is the same. Here again, on a substantial scale, we are opening a new path to a more vibrant economy, in this instance in an important and historic district in central Honolulu.

"The Kakaako of the future will be an attractive, functional community. Its redevelopment will do a lot to further the goals of our Hawaii State Plan by guiding population growth to an urban area, protecting open space, preserving agriculture, and expanding the local economy.

"It is clear that the revitalization of Kakaako will require the commitment of millions of public and private dollars, but not all at once. We are going at this in an orderly and cost-conscious way.

"This year, we are asking for \$17 million from the Legislature for Kakaako. If you agree to this appropriation, these funds will be used to begin infrastructure improvements in early 1986.

"The economic development of agriculture -- the original source of wealth in our islands -- continues to be one of our great challenges in this modern era. We must hold to the patterns of the past when they serve us well today, but when they do not, we must move on to different forms of agriculture.

"So we are equally dedicated in this Administration to accomplishing what is feasible at the State level for the pineapple and sugar industries, and to continuing the promotion of diversified agriculture as well. For the pineapple industry, we are requesting \$200,000 for promotional efforts; and for the sugar industry, we are asking for \$2.7 million to support sugar research, along with research on possible alternative crops for the cane

"I am also in favor of the support and protection of sugar at the Federal level. Only our Federal government can deal with the fact that today some foreign governments are paying their farmers 26 cents a pound for sugar, and taking some of that surplus sugar into the United States market and dumping it here for 6 or 7 cents a pound. That is unfair competition for our sugar producers, and they deserve to be fairly protected.

"Let me add that we propose to spend \$5 million for the Waianae Agricultural Park and the Waimanalo Agricultural Park water system. It is good business for the State to invest in this way, for diversified agriculture has grown steadily over many years. I recall the years when we were first starting on this effort -the early years of my Administration
-- and people were saying that it was a pipe dream on our part to even think about diversified agriculture; yet, it has become a very important part of our economy. The \$199 part of our economy. million value of our diversified agricultural crops in 1983 -- the last year for which we have complete figures -- was an almost \$17 million improvement over 1982.

"The years go by swiftly. The end of this century and the beginning of the Third Millenium A.D. are only 15 years away. And we must be determined to find the ideal balance between tourism and technology, and our oldest economy standby -- our agriculture. A steady growth in diversified agriculture will help insure a future economy for Hawaii that is stable, balanced, and with fewer ups and downs.

"A year ago, we called together the Governor's Committee on Hawaii's Economic Future. That committee's report will be out towards the end of this month. When it comes to your desk, I hope you will review it thoughtfully. Having seen one executive summary of its 11 points, I believe that this careful piece of work will provide us with both discussion and legislative ideas for some time to come.

"Our economic history and our economic future are intimately linked to the fact that we are an Island State. Our land and our other resources are limited. The pitfalls and opportunities that lie ahead for us are both unique. So perhaps more than the public servants in most States, we have a special obligation to try to peer into the future — to see what the process of government is going to be.

"The goal of economic activity I've discussed is simply to make life here better for all of us. During the year, we have approached the matter of a better and safer life in many ways.

"Let me report now on how our Administration is dealing with crime.

"Crime is the dark side of our society. Although we will never be entirely rid of it, we can stand up and courageously, persistently fight against crime.

"The criminal justice system has many different parts. When those parts work well, and when they work together, our efforts to fight crime become more effective. The rate of serious crime in our State has declined significantly since the summer of 1980. I believe that the cooperative efforts made in recent years by the different elements of our criminal justice system have been a major contributor to this decline.

"You in the Legislature have been active in creating the laws that deal with crime. In recent years, you have passed legislation making child abuse a crime; you have shifted the burden of proof in a plea of insanity from the prosecution to the defendant; you have eliminated probation for persons convicted of Class A felonies; and strengthened the definition of rape, among other things that you have done. You have appropriated funds for the training of law enforcement officers, and for security and protection of witnesses.

"Our Administration has also been active in that fight against crime. The Attorney General's office has been directly involved in the prosecution of welfare and unemployment insurance fraud. Since 1976, hundreds of people have been convicted, over \$1 million in restitution has been ordered, and prison sentences of five to ten years have been set in some cases. In 1983, we had our first conviction in a case of tax fraud.

"We have supported the efforts of other agencies through a number of programs. The highly successful Career Criminal Program, which now provides about \$900,000 each year to county prosecutors, helps to keep professional criminals out of circulation. The Green Harvest of marijuana plants, led by county police and supported by the National Guard in all the counties, has been an effective activity in curbing the cultivation of marijuana.

"As the whole system becomes successful, as more criminals are captured and tried and convicted, we must find a solution to the problem of limited prison facilities. Our prison population has grown at a rate we have never known before.

"In 1974, Hawaii had an average of 300 prisoners in its detention facilities. In 1984, ten years later, that number was over 1800 -- an increase of more than 600 percent. The Judiciary has gotten tougher, but in part, this is a result of the actions of the Hawaii Paroling Authority. During the past few years, the Paroling Authority actions have resulted in fewer parolees on the streets. And perhaps most importantly, Hawaii now has one of the longest average of prison terms in the nation -- about 40 months.

"Our Administration has responded to this tremendous increase in the prison population by increasing our operating expenditures for corrections from \$3.8 million in 1973 to \$28.5 million for the current fiscal year -an increase of 750 percent -- and by building more than \$94 million worth of new facilities since 1973, and we have been able to provide those things with the help that the Legislature has given to us. We've built new correctional centers for each of the neighbor island counties as well. We've built the High Security Facility at Halawa and expanded the Oahu Community Correctional Center. We are also proposing to establish facilities in Waiawa and Olinda. In the new budget, we are asking for \$3

million to equip the new medium security facility at Halawa. We are also asking that you approve a substantial increase in the number of adult correction officers for our facilities.

"But prisons are not enough. And I hope you will agree that the time has come for us to sit down together to find realistic alternatives to incarceration -- alternatives that will not mean a decrease in safety for the community itself -- alternatives that can provide constructive punishment which will also be treating criminals with prudent compassion and practical firmness.

"We have some thoughts on this subject, and at the right time, we will share them with you. The situation has not reached an emergency yet, so by taking action now, we can prevent an emergency.

"I am pleased to report progress on the matter of our Hawaiian Home Lands. And certainly, when we discuss making life better, the possession of a home must be a high priority.

"Several weeks ago, I cancelled a number of Executive Orders and proclamations involving more than 28,000 acres of land that previous Administrations had set aside for public use, but not for the development of Hawaiian homes as had been intended under the original legislation. Under the new order, the lands will once again be under the appropriate control of the Hawaiian Homes Commission. There will probably be some interim use of the lands while the Commission figures out which of the parcels are appropriate for the purposes of its programs, and reaches settlements for the various parcels of land by other agencies.

"This is a step in the right direction. I want to see this Commission develop a stronger sense of initiative, and I'm happy to tell you that the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands and the Commission are working to accelerate their awarding of Hawaiian Homestead lots. We know our past efforts have been on the right track. We have provided almost as many homes during our Administration as were provided by all previous Administrations combined, and that is from the beginning of its act in the 1920's. Yet, we have not moved as fast as we would want and there are still 8,000 people awaiting action. That is too many. I have asked for \$3 million to be spent over each of the next two

years to support the lot development effort -- activities that will speed the process of getting the land back to the Hawaiian people. I hope you will look favorably on this important request.

"With our land area so clearly limited, our problems of land allocation continue to be of prime importance. Many have strongly questioned whether enough land is designated for housing and urban development. This theme arises, of course, when agricultural lands are ready to be turned to new uses. And other, opposing voices contend -- with equal passion -- that our agricultural lands are our most valuable resource and should be retained.

"Well, the fact is that we need both types of land. We must develop the ability and wisdom to decide which use for particular pieces of land is most beneficial for the community as a whole. These determinations do not have to be made in a frozen, inflexible way, but rather, can be made in a way that reflects both the current and future needs of the community.

"That is why I believe that the work of the Land Evaluation and Site Assessment Commission has been a worthwhile endeavor. The Land Evaluation and Site Assessment Commission is developing hard information about our agricultural lands, information that will help us decide on a factual basis, rather than on an emotional or nostalgic basis, what is the best use for given parcels.

"Water remains, of course, one of the most important topics on our agenda of our community well-being. The Legislature's Advisory Study Commission on Water Resources has developed a recommended code for the regulation of water on a statewide basis. Everyone has a stake in this process: local government, private landowners, developers, the agriculture industry, and the environmental movement. But as with the use of our lands, we want this code to steer a path through the conflicting aims, to let us use our water resources wisely so they will bring benefits to all of us.

"In two areas, we have made specific progress concerning water. We have chosen a consulting firm to assist the State in developing a demonstration water-desalting plant on Oahu to convert slightly saline water to fresh, drinking water. It will be located in central Oahu, where there is a good supply of saline water, and

it will be designed to produce more than a million gallons of fresh water each day. As our population increases over the years, it will be well for us to have experience in desalting techniques because we will probably need them. I think the prospect is eminently worth the \$4 million that we are asking to be appropriated.

"And we will request that the same amount be spent over the next two years in exploring surface and ground water resources. In that connection, I am happy to tell you that the State-drilled Mililani-Mauka exploration well "A" is now complete at 1100 feet. It is capable of producing two million gallons a day of water that is free of pesticide contamination. Last year, you appropriated the money for this well when others in the area were found to be contaminated. Having closed some of those wells, we are fortunate that this new back-up source of water has turned out to be so bountiful,

"I have aimed at being comprehensive in these remarks, but I hope you won't think that if a program or subject has not been mentioned, that we don't think that it is important. In one sense, everything we do is important, and the budget itself will encompass everything — as will enstimony that our Administration will offer to your various legislative committees in support of what we believe.

"Let me close then with two announcements that, like everything else, are important. But each of these has a special poignancy that calls for your special attention.

"There has been much public concern about the adequacy and the enforcement of laws regarding child abuse. Our Administration has responded with a request in this budget to add 32 positions to the Child Protective Service units of the Department of Social Services over the next biennium. We are searching for ways to make this array of services more effective. This is, of course, one of the most difficult of all human problems and especially of law-enforcement problems. It is made more complicated by the fact that aggressive actions against the children, which were once swept under the rug and not reported at all, are now very much a part of the public dialogue. That something must be done is certain. But in this troublesome area where the law intersects with psychiatry, we want to be sure that we are doing the right thing.

"Finally, this biennial budget includes a request of \$15 million in capital improvement project funds to build a new Hawaii State Hospital. This will become the primary facility for dealing with and helping to cure, if possible, that forgotten segment of our population -- the seriously mentally ill.

"My fellow citizens and my colleagues in government, this concludes my observations about the state of our State. The year 1984 -- our Statehood Silver Jubilee Year --turned out to be not so dismal as George Orwell predicted back in 1948. Indeed, the general state of human affairs in Hawaii, as compared to the many, many other places we read about in each day's headlines, is remarkably good. This may not be Paradise, as travel brochures have labelled it, but in some ways, it comes pretty close.

"The governmental process goes on. The push-and-tug of life here in the Capitol of our 50th State reflects, of course, the push-and-tug of life throughout the State itself. In our constant search for what I have called 'the best Hawaii', we will disagree on many things, but happily, we will agree on many, too. And always, we will have the job of earnestly striving to find solutions that will work for today as well as for tomorrow.

"The great violinist, Yehudi Menuhin, once said: 'Every performance counts. And no matter how skilled or how experienced you become, there is no resting on your laurels. The most important performance is always the next one.'

"Perhaps, my friends and my fellow citizens, we can all keep that in mind as we move into this year. Let us keep moving forward with a strong and active faith in Divine Providence and in our wonderful people of Hawaii.

"Mahalo and Aloha."

Senate President Richard Wong then rose and stated:

"Governor, on behalf of the members of the Thirteenth Legislature, I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for sharing with us your Administration's blueprint for a better Hawaii. In particular for me, and I am sure I share the sentiments of all the members in the Thirteenth Legislature, your rededication to the commitment for quality education in Hawaii is deeply appreciated. We will

in the next few days and weeks look forward for specific proposals from the Administration to accomplish and implement the things that you discussed with us today.

"If there be no objections by the members of the Thirteenth Legislature, I now declare the Joint Session adjourned."

At 11:40 o'clock a.m., the Joint Session with the Senate adjourned and the House stood in recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:02 o'clock p.m., the Vice Speaker assumed the rostrum.

The Chair directed the Clerk to call the Roll whereupon the Clerk announced that all members were present.

By unanimous consent, reading of the Journal of the Sixth Day was deferred.

Representative Hemmings rose on a point of personal inquiry regarding the Journal and inquired:

"I am new here and I noticed the second or third day of the session, one of my colleagues, Representative Anderson, had a point that was made and that was recorded in the Journal, and yesterday, another pertinent point was, I think, humorously made by Representative Kihano, and that is not in the Journal.

"As a freshman legislator, I think, sometimes, some things will be said that are important to me in my constituency to be recorded, and I was wondering what the process would be for me to find out how things are edited. ...inserted into the Journal so that for future considerations, important points that I feel are of interest to my constituency will be duly recorded in the House Journal."

The Chair responded:

"Thank you for your point. Representative Hemmings, it is my understanding that the Journal has not been approved yet for yesterday and that when it comes before this House, I am sure you can ask that question then. Does that answer your question?"

At this point, Representative Okamura asked for a recess, and at 12:05 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:07 o'clock p.m., the Chair stated:

"Representative Hemmings, on your point, the Chair feels that it is pertinent and a good one and we would like to get back to you in a few days based on your questioning. Is that all right with you?"

Representative Hemmings thanked the Chair.

Representative Okamura then rose and stated:

"I believe that we will get back to Representative Hemmings on that ruling."

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to be informed, if I may, when those bills are made available prior to the motion on First Reading, because the House Republicans would like to go on record as voting 'no' on those bills on First Reading."

The Chair responded:

"The Chair recognizes your point and will do my best to inform you."

However, for the record, the Minority members of this Caucus and of this body would like to go on record as being in opposition to those bills, and if you will allow that to be so recorded in the Journal, I think that will meet our needs."

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

Representative Crozier then rose and stated:

"Honorable members, AFS stands for American Field Service. American Field Service was a group of volunteers in the first world war where ambulance drivers who went over to France to help the French. They also did the same thing in the second world war and after a while, they stuck together as a group. They felt that if they could create an exchange program for high school students, we could have some intercultural relationships and eventually would no longer have any wars.

"Well, since 1952, this program has grown from a few students to now there is over 7,000 high school students in this program. Three thousand Americans will be going to all over the world -- Europe, Asia, Africa, Australia -- and 3,000 will be coming to America. Also, another thousand or so of this will be going from foreign countries.

"So, this program has come a long, long way, and it is basically made up of volunteers. Many high schools throughout the nation have AFS programs where they work towards having students become interested in taking the travels abroad and also, preparing the home for students coming from different areas.

"Last year, in Hawaii alone, twelve students went to foreign countries -- Mexico, Japan, France and whole bunch of other places. This year, thirty applicants are trying to go abroad and, hopefully, we can get thirty students to come to Hawaii so

that we can share with them.

"I got involved. . .my wife and I got involved in the program, kind of in a round-about way. My daughter, Kimberly, was an exchange student to Samoa last year so that is how we got started and we thought that was the end of it. But that was really a great program for us. Along the way, you know, once you get into the network, you become part of the coconut wireless. So, one day we got a phone call that a we got a girl from Italy that needs a home so I...my daughter got the message so she came up to me. She said, 'Daddy, we got a girl that wants to come live with us. Can she stay?' I said, 'Well, let Daddy check it out. You know, I gotta see how the things go -- the responsibilities and all this -- before you make a decision like that.' 'She said, you know, Daddy, you got to have aloha for that girl. You just got to tell her come; you not sup-posed to check it out.' Well, I checked it out anyway and we did accept her.

"And that girl has become my daughter. She has really become my daughter, and I can tell you the exact moment I knew she was my daughter. After about two months of living with us, you know you gotta go through the guest period and all of this, and that breaks down, and our love starts to come.

"Mr. Speaker, can I continue?

"Okay, she wanted to try out for the Nutcrackers' Suite ballet in Manoa and my son was playing a little football game, and being a typical parent, I gotta run all over the place, delivery everybody in 25 different places all at once. So, from Makakilo, we drive into Manoa. You know, that is quite a distance, and like I said, this is the moment she proved to me that she had become my daughter. She is no longer a guest in my house. About ten blocks before we got to the place in Manoa, she told me that her ballet slippers were broken. And that's when I said, 'Now, you're acting like my daughter, you know.

"But since then, I know when it is time for her to leave, she will be crying, my wife will be crying, and we all will be crying. We have learned so much from this child... no, this lady, really.

"And I can say that for Mrs. Sturm over there -- she has learned so much from her exchange son that we are firm believers in this program, and I would like to, at this time, introduce the backbone of the AFS program in Hawaii."

Representative Crozier then introduced the following:

Caroline Wong: "Caroline has been with this program for a number of years and like I said earlier, it is a volunteer program. She has spearheaded and cajoled people to take AFS students and everyone of us who have taken it have appreciated her forcing us into it. Thank you, Caroline."

"I would like to introduce my wife, the mother of Claudia Cantisani. Mr. Speaker, when we were discussing taking Claudia, one of the questions came up is: 'A, how we going. . .I asked my wife, 'how we going to feed this girl?' She said: 'Ah, we just add another cup of water to the soup.' So we added another cup and it's worked."

"I would like to introduce my 'daughter', Claudia Cantisani from the city of Balsano, Italy."

"Next is Mrs. Rakapa Sturm...she going give me scolding all day for saying it wrong. She is originally from New Zealand and she is the mother of Donald Jackson from Jamaica."

"We have two guests -- AFS students -- coming in from the mainland. They will be with us for a week. They going to stay couple of days in Honolulu then move on to Maui and then go back to their host families. I would like to introduce Maria Rosa Binutto from Italy, and Julia Sain from Australia."

Floral leis were presented by Representative Yoshimura to Mrs. Wong; Representative Okamura to Mrs. Lynette Crozier; Representative Leong to Mrs. Sturm; Representative Apo to Maria Rosa Binutto; Representative Morgado to Claudia Cantisani 'Crozier'; Representative Hashimoto to Donald Jackson; and Representative Hemmings to Julia Sain.
