And the constant return of these volunteers and their dedication over the twenty-six years of the program existent here in Hawaii is a testament to its merits. The most rewarding part of being a volunteer is witnessing the many outstanding local high school senior girls that compete each year, and I am pleased this afternoon to introduce to this honorable body Hawaii's 1985 Junior Miss."

Representative Kim then introduced to the members of the House and audience the 1985 Junior Miss, Michelle Ahulani Bissen, and her court, as follows: Regina Helene Mayor, 1st runner-up; Meta Farina Tjan, 2nd runner-up; Mary Jenevieve Tarutani, 3rd runner-up; and Diane Fumie Imamura, 4th runner-up. Accompanying the honorees was Mr. George Kodama, General Chairman of the program.

Representative Kim then asked the parents of the honorees, Mr. and Mrs. Bissen, Mrs. Tarutani, Mrs. Imamura, and Mr. and Mrs. Tjan, who were seated in the gallery along with volunteers of the program, to stand and be recognized.

Floral leis and certified copies of the resolution were presented to the Queen and her court by Representatives Ige, Tungpalan, Marumoto, Tam, Kim, Ikeda, Pheil, Graulty and Okamura.

# MATTER DEFERRED FROM EARLIER ON THE CALENDAR

H.B. No. 26, HD 1, on Third Reading:

Representative Shito moved that H.B. No. 26, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Tom.

Representative Blair then rose to speak in favor of the bill "with very serious reservations", stating:

"Mr. Speaker, my own feelings on this matter are that I would like to raise the drinking age to 20 which, for those of us who are old enough will recall, was the drinking age prior to 1972. In looking at this bill, unfortunately, it goes farther than I would like to go but on balance, perhaps it would be better to go a little too far rather than to leave the problem confronting our secondary school age population. By way of a little more explanation, Mr. Speaker, I think we have to look at what our objective is and what it is that we are trying to accomplish, and that will dictate to us what the appropriate tactics or the appropriate bill is.

"In this case, one objective is to continue to qualify for federal funds which will be taken away from states which do not have a 21-year-old drinking age if they are not in compliance with the federal mandate by September of 1986. I personally don't like the idea of the federal government getting involved in this area of state legislation. The 21st amendment has reserved that right to the states and I think we should protect that right. Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I think the proper response from the state with respect to that should be to support the position of South Dakota in challenging the federal law which would take away our federal funds. In any event, Mr. Speaker, I think that matter can be deferred one year and, unfortunately, that unless the Senate holds up this bill, that won't happen.

"Another objective, Mr. Speaker, is to cut down on traffic fatalities; particularly those connected with drunken driving. And in order for us to reach this objective, we should be very careful that we are not overly broad in our approach, and I am afraid that this bill is overly broad in its approach. Certainly by passing it, we will cut down on the amount of drunken driving and the number of deaths that occur as a result of that. However, in doing

so, we will also be treating unfairly groups who are not actually contributing to that problem. One particular group that I only recently became aware of because it hadn't come out in the statistics previously is women in the 18- to 21-year-old age group who are a negligible part of the problem but who would also be caught in the broad scope of this bill.

"Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I think if the argument can be made, and I would urge it on my colleagues, that while the objective is commendable and is one that we should be pursuing, this bill sweeps too broadly in trying to reach that objective. Over the 11 years that I have been in this body, I have introduced a number of measures dealing with drunken driving as has many of my colleagues. It is in fact quite the vogue and I think that that's a much more appropriate way to deal with that problem because then we will be punishing those who are, in fact, transgressing, not merely throwing in that in trying to see if we catch some people who are transgressing.

"Finally, Mr. Speaker, I reach the third objective which is the reason why I support this bill in spite of the fact that everything I have been saying up to now seems to contradict my opening statement that I am speaking in favor of the bill, and that objective is to try and remove alcohol or at least make it harder for our secondary school age population to be affected by alcohol.

"One of the reasons that I am speaking in favor of this bill is the testimony of Judge Spencer at the hearing which didn't deal with the question of drunken driving. It dealt with the impact that alcohol has on our younger citizens and how this often is a consideration in criminal charges that he sees before his committee. The fact of the matter is, I think that alcohol can have a very detrimental effect at any age but it seems, for whatever reasons, to have its most detrimental effect on the younger citizens, perhaps because of some synergistic relationship with lack of experience or immaturity generally.

"However, Mr. Speaker, I think this objective could be achieved by simply raising the drinking age to 19, or perhaps 20. And that is why I would say that perhaps, prior to the federal government trying to pre-empt this issue and prior to our lowering the drinking age to 18 in light of the Vietnam War, that the citizens of this State, through their elected repre-

sentative, construct the proper balance when the drinking age was 20, because while there are 18-year olds in high school who bring that liquor into the party environment, into the school environment, because it is legal for them to do so, and it is difficult in having a party or any sort of social function to maintain the dichotomy which is artificial between those who are 17-year-old high school seniors and those who are 18-year-old high school seniors, by simply raising it to 19, we would go a long way towards accomplishing that. I think, however, that a lot of people still maintain high school contact, even up to a year after they have actually graduated, so I would even be in favor of raising it to 20, going back to what historically has been the case in Hawaii.

"And for that reason, Mr. Speaker, I am only voting in favor of this measure with grave reservations. I do hope that this bill will be held up in the Senate. I do hope that South Dakota will be able to prevail in government's attempt pre-empt, and I do hope that we will be able to come back next year in an environment which is somewhat different than we find ourselves in today, and I hope, at that time, that I will be able to convince the majority of my colleagues that the appropriate age to insert into this bill would be 20. But, in the meantime, under the circumstances that we are faced with today, I feel marginally comfortable but not entirely so in supporting this

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson then rose to speak in favor of the bill, "with reservations", stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I see nothing wrong with 21. The implementations that the federal government has left us, I think, is what I am against -- taking from 18 immediately back to 21 is rather hard when you have people drinking for a couple of years. That's my point and it really bothers me.

"Also, I hope that people that are hiring people 18 and there are liquor on the premises, will let them keep their jobs and not say, well, because of the law, even though you can do it, I would rather get somebody a little older.

"For these reasons, Mr. Speaker, I am with reservations, but I do believe that it is going to help the younger

people of our State. And as for the 18-year-olds who hang around with 15-year-olds, it is not to give them liquor, but the 21-year-olds will give to the 18-year-olds. They do hang around together, they go out to parties and they are not going to break that up, but you're not getting it down to the secondary schools, and that is what I think this bill will do, so my reservations are in that order, Mr. Speaker, and I do hope my colleagues vote for the measure.

"Thank you."

Representative Souki then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, I wish to speak against House Bill 26. Unlike the two previous speakers who have some reservations, my reservation is strong enough that I would want to vote against it and I would wish to compel and ask the members here that you also consider in voting against House Bill 26.

"One of the major reasons, Mr. Speaker and members of the House, that I wish to vote against House Bill 26 is that I believe it provides a gross inconsistency with Hawaii's age of majority. Under Section 577-1, it states that all persons who reside in the State who have attained the age of 18 shall be regarded as legal age and that period of minority to have ceased, and consistently with that law, the Legislature went and lowered the age of voting from 21 to 18. And, of course, the age of majority means that you can be held liable for the purchase of services, that you can get married without your parents' consent, you can join the services without your parents' consent, and you can do anything that an adult can do and also be held liable.

"However, in our questioned wisdom, we are trying to make an exception to that law by saying that you are an adult in everything except in drinking. That, my colleagues, borders on class discrimination. What class do we go after next? The age 65 and over that you can't drink because you're too old? Maybe going after the class of Polynesians and Portuguese that you can't drink.

"And even worse, the fact is that we have been and we are intimidated by the federal government. The federal government states that it is giving us a choice and that it is not interfering with states' rights. However, the choice that it gives us is a very limited choice. It says

either we can enact a statute raising the drinking age to 21, or we can lose 5 percent of the government's highway funds. In a time like now when funds are at a premium, I believe that that kind of a choice is blackmail and we should not allow our 'big brother' to coerce us and further impede and destroy the rights of the states.

"So, my good friends and colleagues, I beg you to reconsider and vote against House Bill 26.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kihano rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I am not going to prolong the discussions we hear this morning, Mr. Speaker, but I would like to insert (by reference only) the comments of the speaker who spoke in favor of this bill with great reservations, Representative Blair. I think he pointed out the facts of this bill very expeditiously and made it very clear to the members of this House as to the reasons why we shouldn't have this measure passed. Also the former speaker, Representative Souki.

"I object, Mr. Speaker, to the federal government imposing ultimatum to the states who do not comply with their mandate and I think we here in our halls look to home rule a lot of times as to the kind of government we would like to impose with our counties. And I think this home rule should also apply to the State with the federal government, and for this reason, Mr. Speaker, I am voting against this measure.

"Thank you."

Representative Lindsey then rose to speak against House Bill 26, stating:

"In the course of our campaign to get me here, I did take a posture on this issue and along the way, I clearly indicated that I was against raising the drinking age from 18 to 21.

"I believe that at age 18, at least in the State of Hawaii, that one is legally an adult. If at age 18 one can serve in the Armed Forces of this country; if at age 18 one has the right to vote, then I say that the 18-year-olds of this State should have the privilege to drink.

"I believe we are being intimidated by Washington. My feeling is, let us keep our drinking age at age 18, and let Washington, D.C. keep their federal monies for highways.

"Thank you."

Representative Crozier rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, first of all, I can understand the people's feelings about the federal government trying to intrude onto our arena, but may I just share with you that two years ago, the House passed a bill raising the drinking age, so it is not something we are doing because the feds have started us to make us do it, but we have done it before.

"And, Mr. Speaker, two years ago, when I ran for office, I kinda shared this thought with some of the others but may I share it with you?

"Two years ago when I ran for office, on election day, I was driving down the road. A young gentleman, about 15 years old, had a can of beer in his hand and waving it and yelling: 'Vote for Crozier, vote for Crozier.' I stopped the car, sir, and I told that young man if I am elected, I am going to try and get that beer out of his hand, and I introduced a bill to change the drinking age. It got through the House; it didn't pass. Well, we are trying again.

"The reason I feel so strongly about that, sir, is that when you are 15-16 years old, you're still a teenager, you're still forming; your values are being formed and they're being tested. If we allow chemicals to get into the picture and to muddy the waters more, which is happening right now, the values of our young people will always be warped or slanted. So, we have to take some kind of stand to remove the chemicals that they are using now away from them, and this is one of the ways.

"The 18-year-olders hang around with the 15-year-olders, or they know each other. The 15-year-older can tap the 18-year-old person to buy them their beer, their wine, what have you. To change the drinking law to 21, a 15-year-old person does not relate to a 21-year-old. He has now become a man; there is an artificial separation. So the 15-year-old and the 16-year-old will have a lot harder time getting their beer. I am not naive enough to think they are not going to get their beer, but they won't be drinking four and five times a week. They may get it once a month, and at least that way, we can minimize the amount of alcohol they

are consuming.

"Thank you, sir."

Representative Metcalf then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I do not intend to repeat in the entirety the remarks I made in the Majority caucus earlier today, but one of the things that bothers me about this bill, Mr. Speaker, is the fact that if we are aiming at eliminating death on the highway, if we want to select that target group, or that age group, that is in fact the group that is most responsible for the tragedies we see on our highway, then this bill does not address that need, Mr. Speaker, because the statistics tell us its really..."

At this point, Representative Kamali'i rose on a point of order and stated:

"I didn't have the privilege of being in your Majority caucus so I don't know whether you are speaking for or against it."

Representative Metcalf answered:

"Excuse me, I am speaking against it."

Directed by the Chair to "proceed", Representative Metcalf continued, saying:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

"I think the statistics show us that it's the group between 21 and 24 that is the group that constitutes that category involved in the highest number of fatalities on the highways. The statistics also show us that, in fact, 80 percent of all alcohol-related fatalities on the highways involve people over the age of 21, and I would suggest that what this body is really doing is kind of singling out a politically impudent group for special attention when we attempt to raise our drinking age from 18 to 21.

"In all good consciousness, Mr. Speaker, I cannot go along with the measure and how it proposes to do that.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Menor then rose to speak "strongly in favor" of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, as a member of the Judiciary Committee, I would just like

to state my particular reasons for supporting this bill, given the fact that I think that a number of arguments raised during the hearings relating to this bill have not been raised.

"I fully concur with Representative Crozier that those of us who favor the passage of this bill are not doing so because of the 'hammer' of the loss of federal funds that is being wielded over our heads. It is not a matter of policy.

"One thing that has not been mentioned in favor of this bill is the fact that the passage of this bill could result in a reduction in automobile accidents involving drunk drivers and, as a result, save lives. I think that that really is the most compelling reason for the passage of this bill — the fact that it could save lives. And I think the statistics gathered from other mainland states indicate that when you do raise the drinking age, that in fact results in a reduction in the number of drunk-driving accidents.

"Secondly, in response to Representative Metcalf's argument, while it may be true that a disproportionately high number of drunk-driving accidents fall in the age category of 21 through 25, the fact is that the results of the disproportionately high number of drunk-driving accidents within the age category of 18 to 21, and while it might not be possible to raise the drinking age to say, 25, I don't think that that should preclude the Legislature from at least trying to address a part of the problem. And the fact is that the number of drunkdriving accidents proportionately is high in the 18 to 21 age category relative to other age groups, excluding the 21 to 25 age category.

"I would also like to point out the fact that I think that the argument that minors or young individuals are qualified to serve in the military, in fact argued persuasively for the raising of the drinking age, because I think one of the big problems in the consumption of alcohol by minors is the fact that we are talking about basically a combination of alcohol and youthful exuberance. I think that going back to our own experiences, while we do respect the conduct of the many juveniles, the fact remains that many of them can tend to display a reckless conduct and can oftentimes be carefree. And I think that when we talk about the consumption of alcohol, we are not talking about rational decision-making; we talking about the consumption of intoxicating beverage that impairs judgment. That is why I think the combination again of youthfulness, consumption of alcohol, and driving, could present a very deadly mix that results in an automobile accident. I don't think that we can also state that we grant rights to 18-year-olds and, therefore, we shouldn't reduce the drinking age in this particular situation because I think that if you look at the statutes, we do selectively grant certain rights to minors. For example, we grant minors the right to drive at the age of 16 but that doesn't mean that they have the right to drink, and I think that this idea of selectively regulating conduct of minors does have precedent here in the State and so it is not something that is new.

"Much argument has been focused on the consumption of alcohol and its impact on drunk-driving accidents. I don't think that something that has been fully discussed is the fact that we were talking about also other social problems that may be tied in to the consumption of alcohol by minors. For example, during the Judiciary Committee hearing, testimony was presented to the effect that a very disproportionately high number of juvenile law violations also involve the consumption of alcohol relative to other age groups. And so I think that the link between the reduction in the drinking age and possibly mitigating some of our other social problems is something that we also have to consider.

"The last thing I want to point out, Mr. Speaker, is the fact that when we argue that an 18-year-old is entitled or deserves the right to vote, I think that argument is premised on the fact that an 18-year-old can exercise the same degree of control and responsibility in voting as can an older individual. However, in the case of drinking, testimony was received during the Judiciary Committee hearings on this bill indicating that minors, because of their physiological makeup, may be less able to handle alcohol than can individuals who are older. And I think that the fact that this kind of testimony was presented may indicate that basically, in the area of drinking, that a person who is younger cannot exercise the same degree of control as can an individual who is older. So I think that that is something that distinguishes granting the right to vote and also reducing the drinking age issue that we have to try to compare in this situation.

"So, basically, for those basic reasons, Mr. Speaker, I just rise to speak strongly in favor of the passage of this particular bill and also to clarify the reasons why those of us here in the Legislature would like to see this particular bill passed.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Shito then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, two years ago, I had introduced a similar measure which has passed this House and at that time, we did not have the federal impact upon us. We have heard the arguments that changing to 21 where the person can have the right to serve, is drafted in the military is not so because, today, apparently the Army concept or the military concept is strictly voluntary.

"The other point I want to make is that it does not take away the drinking privilege on the military post because the State does not have jurisdiction in this respect.

"The time that I was a youngster, I had the age of 21 imposed upon me and I don't think I have suffered from that. And I think the other issue that we are concerned with is that as we also address the problem of alcoholism, this is also a contributing fact, the deterrent factor, to not have young people access to it, and I strongly urge all members to vote in favor of the bill."

Representative Morgado then rose to speak against House Bill 26, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, at this point, I have been informed that those who wish to vote against this measure are in very low minority. And at this time, I would like to concede that the House will again, as it did in previous sessions, pass such a measure. I would like to applaud the efforts of my colleagues whose intent in passing this measure is to save lives and to provide a quality community. I am sure that is all of our intent -- to serve the people of the State.

"It is a measure worthy of discussion and continued review because we cannot be less than judicious when we take the rights of individuals regardless of what age group, what race, or any other form of citizenship here in the State very lightly. When we choose to legislatively mandate that any population of our community is

not allowed to have that freedom to choose, we must be very careful. We must be very aware of the fact that in future legislative sessions, as we sit here today, our forefathers have passed measures like this and those who follow us will continue to look at eliminating privileges in this democracy as a possible solution.

"Specifically, this measure has not worked in the past. It has not discontinued substance abuse in our young people which I think this bill is trying to address. As a student at Punahou High School, the drinking age was 21. It did not stop me as a freshman, or any of my teammates, from acquiring alcohol, or any other substance for that matter.

"I think what the bill does is ask the question and try to eliminate how these kids, how we as youngsters, how they will acquire the substance -- alcohol. We will not allow them to have easy access to alcohol and that is what this bill does. And if that was the objective of such a measure, again I would applaud that effort. But that is not the problem.

"Mr. Speaker, I say to you and my colleagues, that these bills that we passed here cannot address itself solely with, how do they get the substance? Rather, it must ask: Why do they want the substance? And as long as we pass measures on this floor, it does not ask that important question: Why do they want it? I think we will fall very short, way short, of bringing about a positive solution to this substance abuse questions, not only in our young people, but in our society in general. It is a problem. Substance abuse will continue to be a problem after this measure is passed because we are not asking the question: Why do they want it?

"When you turn on the tube every evening, when you watch the Monday night football game, the biggest money spent on advertisement is in alcohol. I would suggest to my colleagues that it is not the 18-yearolders who is the role model for the 15-year-olders. It is you and I. It is the adult leaders of this community that sets the role models for these 15-year-olders. Ask ourselves, because we are the answers. We are the role models that must adjust our attitudes and the kind of behaviors that mimic substance abuse in our younger people. We are the causes for that abuse. It is not the fact that the 18-year-olders can get access to it. It is because they see their

parents drinking; they see their heroes as athletes drinking; and if they can do it, why can't we? But then again, until we ask the question: Why do they want it? Why do they feel they need it?, we will continue to pass legislation that falls far short of the mark.

"The Department of Education supports this measure. Our educational system, the State system, supports this measure. They, yesterday, supported a measure to decrease the age to 16 years old where, by statutes, the Department of Education would be responsible for education of kids dismissed from our school system for behavior reasons. At 16, they are saying we cannot effect any positive change in our children and we do not want to be statutorily bound to educate our kids because we have failed and we do not know how to educate them -- at 16 years old. So what happens to these kids at that age? We allow them to leave our system and let them fend for them-This system wipes their hands of trying to assist this child and that is what he is, a child -- in development, in total development. But now, at 18, we are saying that this kid is not old enough to make a decision -- choose to drink or not to drink, choose to drive or not to drive when under the influence. He is not old enough on one side, but he is too old on another side.

"I ask that my colleagues continue to work together to ask the question: Why do they want it? And I hope that we will continue to work in the future as conscientious, as sincere legislators, to bring the question before the people and a solution that would impact, I think, on the major problems of this community.

"Mr. Speaker, thank you very much."

Representative Tom then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, House Bill 26 states that at no time or under any circumstances shall any liquor be sold or furnished by any licensee to a minor.

"I am listening to the arguments today and I must say that much of the arguments by the opponents of this bill are very real and they do make sense. But, you know, parents are not licensees. There are laws now that allow a minor to drink so long as he has the permission of the landholder, or the landowner, person in charge, his parent, or what have

you.

"This bill does not attempt, as I read it, to say that the person under 21 cannot put his lips to any alcoholic beverages and swallow it. This bill says that it cannot be sold to him by a licensee.

"Well, let's go back to the arguments. What are we trying to accomplish? We are trying to save lives. And you know, as one of 51 legislators, Mr. Speaker, I was voted in like each and everyone of us here today by our constituents to make decisions, hard decisions sometimes, that would reflect the concerns of the public, and if the members of the public or constituents do not like the decision I make, then I wouldn't be here or I won't be here in the following years. But that is what our legislative process is all about and I say that the decision for me in this bill is to save lives.

"Now, it saves lives by cutting down traffic fatalities and I say this, that this bill, together with many of the worthwhile bills dealing in drunk driving that we passed in the past and we are working on now, especially in the penalty area, when these bills taken together are done to create a more public awareness that we are doing, that's when it is going to work to save lives.

"Now, we can argue several ways on statistics. You form statistics to how you want it to work for you and that is why I don't like statistics, but I know this to be true. The majority of the states have this age 21 requirement or close thereto. We are one of the very few that doesn't and that should tell us something.

"And the next thing I would like to say is the federal funds. You know, \$15 million is a lot of money but I am not voting for the bill because I am afraid of losing \$15 million. That is not what it is all about. My own purpose is because I really do believe very sincerely that it will serve to save lives.

"And one more final thing, Mr. Speaker. I think the stats are clear on this, that for states that raise the drinking age from 18 to 21, it has reduced fatalities, and for states that have reduced it in the early 1970s, fatalities went up. Those statistics don't lie.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 26, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LIQUOR", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 44 ayes to 6 noes, with Representatives Hagino, Kihano, Lindsey, Metcalf, Morgado and Souki voting no, and Representative Tam being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 26 had passed Third Reading at 12:25 o'clock p.m.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Ikeda and carried, the following Standing Committee Reports which were received by the Clerk passed Second Reading and were referred to the designated committees:

Representative Graulty, for the Committee on Human Services, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 194) recommending that H.B. No. 846, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION TO PROVIDE A GRANT-IN-AID TO THE KIHEI YOUTH CENTER, MAUI", pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Levin, for the Committee on Higher Education and the Arts, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 195) recommending that H.B. Representative Ikeda requested that her remarks, against the passage of House Bill 463, House Draft 1, on Second Reading, be inserted into the Journal, and with the prior concurrence of the Speaker, is hereby inserted:

"We have been speaking for some time now about the urgent need to improve Hawaii's business climate. Some of the major problem areas which need to be addressed have been identified. Workers' compensation is one of those most often mentioned.

"Because of the very serious problems we face with these increasingly high costs, we have spent two years and \$150,000 to obtain an objective analysis of the situation with practical recommendations for cutting costs. These recommendations were included in the original House Bill 463. However, in House Draft 1 of House Bill 463, most of these recommendations have been removed, leaving a skeleton bill which purports to fulfill the purpose of cutting costs but does not do so. I speak against the passage of this bill upon Second Reading for several reasons.

"One reason is procedural. We reviewed House Bill 463, House Bill 310, and a variety of other bills relating to workers' compensation throughout a series of public hearings which resulted in a total of 25 hours of public input and committee comment. Committee members also reviewed a draft of House Bill 310, House Draft 1. However, House Bill 463, House Draft 1, bears virtually no resemblance to the original bill and does not incorporate any of the public testimony in favor of the Haldi report. This bill was negotiated behind closed doors and committee members were not given the opportunity to

discuss the final version of the bill, much less to suggest any changes to it.

"A disservice has been done not only to the public, but to the committee members who have attended all the hearings and formed their own opinions on what should be included in the workers' compensation reform package.

"My other objection is on the contents of the bill. Besides the fact that a disservice was done by bringing a virtually brand-new bill to the committees with no input from committee members, the bill does not effectuate its stated purpose. We have been examining the workers' compensation situation and the various bills introduced with the intention of finding a solution to the problem of high costs. Haldi's report stated that no one area was responsible for a disproportionate amount of the costs, and he therefore proposed a wellreasoned package for reform. He made it clear from the beginning that his recommendations were interdependent and as a whole could reduce costs by 20 percent.

"House Bill 463, House Draft 1, under the guise of doing something to ameliorate the problem of high workers' compensation costs, will actually increase costs and does nothing to even out the inequities in the system.

"The fact that this bill will also go

to the Finance Committee is no assurance that they will make any significant improvements to the bill. We will be better off with the extremely costly and unfair system we have now than we would be if House Bill 463, House Draft 1, were adopted.

"The cavalier manner in which this issue has been handled does not do justice to the importance of workers' compensation in Hawaii.

"The high cost of workers' compensation affects all aspects of life in Hawaii. As has been noted, Hawaii is a small business state: 95 percent of Hawaii's businesses employ fewer than 50 people. These are the people who are hardest hit by the escalating costs of workers' compensation. They will not survive if something is not done to reform the system.

"It is my sincere hope that the Finance Committee will give this bill a serious and thorough review and that substantial amendments will be made. Until that time, however, I will vote 'no' on this bill because it does not deserve to be passed by this Body.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The House of Representatives of the Thirteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1985, convened at 11:40 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

# RECONSIDERATION OF ACTION TAKEN

Representative Ikeda moved to reconsider action taken on Stand. Com. Rep. No. 326 on H.B. No. 463, HDl, relating to Workers' Compensation, seconded by Representative Cavasso.

At 11:45 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Representative Kawakami then announced that there will be a short Majority caucus.

Representative Blair, on a point of information, inquired whether this would be an open caucus.

Upon reconvening at 12:01 o'clock p.m., the motion was put by the Chair before the House.

Representative Ikeda rose to speak in favor of the motion, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, my motion was to reconsider action taken on H.B. No. 463, HD1, which has to do with Workers' Compensation, and the reason I am making the motion is because of the fact that the bill was handled in a very poor manner.

"We left the Journal, as you recall, we left the Journal open until midnight to receive the bill or all bills laying on the Clerk's desk up to that point and time; and this bill happened to be the last one to come up and it came up questionably prior to the deadline. It was not made available to us prior to this morning at 11:30 on the desk. Therefore, it was not made available to the public and we feel, having reviewed this measure, that it is only proper to bring this measure back to the floor for discussion and for a vote of the full House and that is the reason why we are in favor of the motion and ask that all members of this body vote in favor of it as well.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Marumoto then rose to speak in favor of the motion, stating:

"This is a very important bill. It is very significant and therefore should be singled out for debate and public scrutiny.

"For the most part, we send our bills from one committee to another in a perfunctory manner. It's kind of an automatic process. But once in a while there is a measure which is so important to the entire State that it should not receive perfunctory or automatic treatment. I am referring to this bill, H.B. No. 463, HD1, on Workers' Compensation.

"It passed with all other bills in a blanket motion. We should not have dumped it together with a lot of other bills. There was a hundred and thirty-two bills Friday night and this one is most significant.

"The decision making on this critical measure amounted to no more than a few minutes. This was close to midnight and unfortunately this was after many, many hours of public input and testimony. The outcome of the bill was a surprise to us, Mr. Speaker, since most of the decision making was done behind closed doors. We would like to open the door, Mr. Speaker, and let a little sunshine in.

"I'm asking that we do consider our action taken. I ask for a "yes" vote on this measure.

"Thank you."

Representative Hemmings then rose to speak in favor of the motion, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I am a new legislator, and I am very concerned in which the manner of this bill came out that the public was denied the right to address the issue; and even we legislators worked so long and hard on this issue were denied the right to have input in its final outcome. So I'm asking my colleagues in all due fairness, that they afford us the opportunity to address this issue now.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Liu rose to speak in favor of the motion, stating:

"I'd like to speak in favor of the motion and point out that on this measure, H.B 463, HD1, the decision making on the bill had been initially

scheduled for last Friday at 8:00 in the morning, had been then deferred to 6:00 in the evening.

"I think if either of those times had been met, your Minority caucus would not be taking the position that it is at this point and time. However, it was then further delayed until approximately forty some minutes prior to the 12:00 midnight deadline, and as such, as pointed out by the previous speakers, thorough review of the bill was not, there was really not a chance to have thorough review of the bill, and as it turned out, full review by this body for the record, we feel, should be handled because the measure is of so great importance to the State of Hawaii.

"Thank you."

Representative Shon rose on a point of information.

The Chair asked Representative Shon to state his point.

Representative Shon replied:

"As I understand it, by our own deadline, if we were to approve the motion the bill would die? Is that correct?"

The Chair answered:

"That is an internal deadline, Representative Shon."

Representative Shon then thanked the Chair.

The motion to reconsider action on Stand. Com. Rep. No. 326 on H.B. No. 463, HD1, was put by the Chair and failed to carry by voice vote.

"And it will also mean, down the line, that we will be responsible for incurring cost and liabilities in relationship to the confiscation of these items.

"Right now, as I understand it, items that are confiscated are sold or destroyed, and if they are sold, the money goes back to the general fund where it belongs. This would provide otherwise, and I urge members to vote "no" against this bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

"You know, what more can I say about this spectacular, outstanding, warm and charming, energetic and vibrant lady that have not already been said in the resolution. The resolution speaks for itself.

"But in addition to all of her community activities, she is a devoted wife of 35 years, married to Ivan Hoe who must have had to put up with a lot. . . I give you a lot of credit, Mr. Hoe. And they still have time to have three lovely children, Yaison and two twin daughters, Melyn and

Suelyn. Now, she is very active, not only with the elderly, but with children and youth. She served three terms for the Governor's Board of Children and Youth, and now Dorothy is on the Governor's Board on Life Administrators on Nursing Homes. Beware! So, you see, this lady is very diverse because she works with the youth of today and she works with the elderly."

Representative Tom then introduced to the members of the House and audience the honoree, Mrs. Dorothy Chiyoko Hoe, and her husband, Ivan Hoe.

Representative Say presented an ilima lei to Mrs. Hoe while Representative Tom presented her with a certified copy of the resolution.

Representative Tom then asked a group of friends and supporters of Mrs. Hoe who were seated in the gallery to stand and be recognized.

Representative Leong then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I have known Dorothy for about 12 years and we have worked for the same cause to enhance the senior citizens' program and if there is a dedicated person, I don't believe I can find anyone like her. So, Dorothy, congratulations."

Representative Kihano then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, it really is a privilege and a pleasure to have known Dorothy for a number of years that I have been here at the Legislature, and she has taught me a lot working with the elderly, and she is one who sees that there is no one who exploits the elderly population and I would like to give my personal aloha to her today and I am glad that I am a friend of hers.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speak-

A resolution (H.R. No. 204) acknowledging the community contributions by the Waikiki Aquarium and the Marine Option Program in the selection of Hawaii's official State fish was jointly offered by Representatives Shon, Andrews, Apo, Hagino, Honda, Isbell, Kamali'i and Pfeil.

On motion by Representative Shon, seconded by Representative Apo and carried, H.R. No. 204 was adopted.

Representative Shon rose and

stated:

"Mr. Speaker, the selection of the State fish has become more than an entertaining exercise or an opportunity for comic relief. We as legislators have only been slightly aware of the efforts and the benefits of this remarkable process, and today, I would like to just highlight these two reasons why it was worth doing and why we should take our time today to acknowledge the real heroes of this fish story.

"First, it's become a cliche that we are an ocean state and that our people should be educated to understand and appreciate the ocean environment and its creatures. And while we continue to make valiant efforts to promote marine education, with so many other worthy subjects that must be taught, it is not always an easy task. The competition, or rather, the election of the State fish has, for some strange reason, captured the imagination of the young at heart all over the State and anything which captures the imagination of our youngsters and teaches them about the world is something we should treasure and encourage.

"Thousands of children became engaged in their own personal judgment as to the characteristics of the candidates, their niches in the environment and how they might best serve as symbols for our State. This required students to learn, not only about their ocean, but to think in a very personal way about Hawaii and how best to symbolize all that we cherish in the islands. In other words, this was a thoughtful and successful example of marine education at its best.

"Second, Mr. Speaker, and perhaps even more valuable, our young citizens were able to participate in the democratic process which will actually result in the passage of a law. Think back, Mr. Speaker, in those days of yesteryear when we were students, and when the world of government and politics was far removed and seemingly irrelevant from our childhood preoccupations. How our teachers struggled, Mr. Speaker, to communicate the importance of participation in a democracy and how so many of our young friends never understood. By contrast, the students who involved themselves in this selection of the State fish experienced democracy at first hand. studied the candidates, they picked their favorites, they campaigned for them, and with the assistance of the

Lieutenant Governor's Office, they learned to use the official ballot punch. They came down to the Capitol with their associates, testified, presented charts, presented information, politely listened to opposing testimony, and were even exposed to the probing questions of members of the Committee, challenging them to support their written testimonies. Perhaps their exposure to the legislative process is one of the most positive benefits for a community from the effort to select a State fish."

Representative Shon then introduced to the members of the House and audience the following: Dr. Leighton Taylor, Director of the Waikiki Aquarium, "who organized the community volunteers and a group known as 'Friends of Fishes'. He is a world authority on sharks and has named a new species aptly known as 'megamouth', now stored in formaldehyde at the Bishop Museum. He is now making plans to expand the State's aquarium into a world-class attraction"; Dr. Sherwood Maynard, Director of the University's Marine Option Program, and Director of the Bluewater Marine Laboratory "which has provided very strong support to make the whole affair an educational experience for the students and the public"; Ms. Annie Orcutt, "graduate assistant who schooled the under-graduates that volunteered to give internal support to wear the six fish models at each public event all throughout the islands"; Ms. Margaret Puder, "Aquarium volunteer who is the creative genius who designed and built the large fish models which allowed our leading State fish-elect to swim by the chamber today"; and Ms. Joyce Ksincinski, "the organizer of the State Fish Convention last Fall where the-

nomination speeches were given and assistant for the fish election."

Representative Shon then presented the winning candidate of the plebiscite, the humu-humu-nukunuku-apua'a, supported internally by Mr. Don Davidson.

Floral leis were presented to Dr. Taylor by Representative Kamali'i; to Dr. Maynard by Representative Isbell; to Ms. Orcutt by Representative Crozier; to Ms. Puder by Representative Crozier; to Ms. Puder by Representative Nakata; and to Ms. Ksincinski by Representative Apo. Representative Shon presented the honorees with certified copies of the resolution.

Representative Crozier then rose

and remarked:

"Mr. Speaker, you know, I have been typecasted as the Ebenezer Scrooge of the Legislature because I am going against the little children on this issue. I would just like to thank these gentlemen and these ladies for giving us this opportunity. I really enjoyed it; I have not changed my mind yet, but I enjoyed the whole participation.

"Thank you."

The Chair responsed:

"You're a very reasonable person, Representative Crozier."

Representative Kamali'i then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I agree with Representative Shon that 1984 was a year of historic proportions, politically, in Hawaii. As you know, we voted for and re-elected the Republican President; we returned Frank Fasi as a Republican Mayor; and we gave Chuck Marsland one of the largest votes in the State...

At this point, Representative Kawakami rose on a point of order and asked:

"Mr. Speaker, are we talking about fishes today?"

The Chair remarked:

"Representative Kamali'i's comments and observations are certainly 'fishy' but please proceed."

Representative Kamali'i continued, saying:

"They will get more 'fishy' as we go along. But the best campaign, in all seriousness, was conducted by the Waikiki Aquarium and the Marine Option Program of the University of Hawaii. The candidates for the State fish marched in the Aloha Week Parade; they held a rally at the Bishop Museum; they were refeatured on shopping bags; their posters are now collectors' items. And they were the subject of more TV interviews than any other politician.

"The Chief Elections Officer for this campaign was Dr. Leighton Taylor and the true winner was the Aquarium. I do not believe that it would detract, Mr. Speaker, from his honor if we paid others who participated in this program a large and warm thanks. But, in particular, I would

like to thank Representative Peter Apo for all of his hard work. For most of us, the State fish and the contest was simply fun and like all such impressions, that means a lot of people coordinated, organizing and making sure that the details were taken care of. Peter was literally at the heart of this during the interim. So, interim work does help. But the real command center of this election was the Aquarium. In addition to all of his unusual duties and responsibilities, Dr. Taylor took the campaign like fish to water.

"My concern, however, is that there has been recently a greal deal of comment about the hiring of a consultant of the Democratic Party. Please be assured that doesn't bother me. It will worry me, however, if I hear that Dr. Taylor had taken his considerable skills to the opposition because I know in my heart, Mr. Speaker, the humu-humu-nukunukuapua'a is a Republican."

At 12:10 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair, "for the purpose of extending our personal aloha and congratulations to our honorees this morning."

Upon reconvening at 12:22 o'clock p.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representative Kivabu.

By unanimous consent, the following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 194 to 202 and 205 to 210) and concurrent resolutions (H.C.R. Nos. 56 to 58) were referred to the Committee on Legislative Management and further action was deferred:

At this time, Representative Marumoto requested permission to make a late introduction and directed by the Chair to "please proceed," introduced her good friend, Mrs. Lori-Lee Melich, and her daughter, Alicia, and their guests, Dr. Becky Bergman, Dean of the Department of Nursing at

the University of Tel Aviv and also a consultant to the World Health Organization, and Mr. Shimone Bergman, Professor of Gerentology at the University of Tel Aviv and a United Nations expert on aging.

#### SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Ikeda and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering bills on Third Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar.

#### THIRD READING

The following bills, which were on the calendar for Third Reading, were read throughout and the following actions taken:

## H.B. No. 490, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Taniguchi, seconded by Representative Tom and carried, H.B. No. 490, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EXAMINATION OF APPLICANTS FOR HAWAII DRIVER'S LICENSE", passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Hirono and Ige being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 490 had passed Third Reading at 12:25 o'clock p.m.

## H.B. No. 89, HD 1:

Representative Taniguchi moved that H.B. No. 89, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Tom.

Representative Marumoto then rose to speak in favor of H.B. No. 89, HD 1, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, most of us Republicans are very interested in health and safety; I might say all of us are. Most of us signed the bill to introduce a similar bill in this session. In the past, we supported raising the drinking age in hopes of saving the lives of some of our young people and as you may recall, we introduced a measure, later adopted, giving a \$25 tax credit for keiki car seats. We hope that would encourage the use of the same and keep some young people from being injured. Many of us here voted for the mandatory use of these keiki seats also.

"This year, we requested an administrative revocation of drivers' licenses for drunk driving to further the safety of our citizens. We also threw into the hopper a bill to codify our dram shop case law and we even asked the Legislature to examine our 'happy hour' policies which seem to encourage people to drink more, and we don't want to see people drinking and then driving, but if they do, we hope they will use the mandatory seat belts and they would be a little bit safer.

"Therefore, our support in this legislation which would improve the safety of our citizens, we encourage all to vote aye on this measure.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Anderson then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I didn't plan on saying anything on this measure but since my leader said that most of us voted for it, I would have to tell you why I am voting against the bill. I just don't like government telling me what to do, when to do it, and how to do it. I voted against the smoking bill and I don't smoke any more.

"So, for that reason, Mr. Speaker, I am voting no on this bill. I would hope that my colleagues would vote their conscience, and thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kim then rose to speak in opposion to House Bill 89, House Draft 1, stating:

"Once again, Mr. Speaker, government is finding another way to infringe upon an individual's freedom of choice. Standing Committee Report No. 330 considers this a 'possible minimal infringement,' but I believe that it is those little infringements which would eventually lead to a major erosion of those freedoms we value so much.

"I would be the first, Mr. Speaker, to advocate any measure which would enhance public health and safety. On the other hand, I would not hesitate to urge my colleagues to vote down any bill which would not be effective in doing this. House Bill 89, House Draft 1, falls far short of being effective mainly from the standpoint of enforceability.

"The Honolulu Police Department has testified to your Committee on Transportation that they themselves would have profound problems in enforcing a law such as this. Primarily, they would not be able to stop a motorist just to check for seat belt usage. The Department and its officers would only be able to enforce this law when a motorist is stopped for a moving violation or for random D.U.I. checks.

"Further, Mr. Speaker, a Police Lieutenant has indicated that when a motorist is stopped, the driver could simply claim that the reason he did not have a seat belt on was that he took it off to reach for his drivers license and the officer would have a very hard time disproving this.

"If we were to expend the time and resources called for in this bill towards an extensive public education program on the use of seat belts, I believe that we could get better and more lasting effects and results from the voluntary efforts of a truly concerned public.

"Would this House, Mr. Speaker, mandate people who cannot swim to wear a life vest every time they entered the water? Are we going to bar the person with a family history of heart disease from eating fatty foods? And perhaps, Mr. Speaker, we should prohibit a person from smoking because the Surgeon General has determined that smoking is hazardous to one's health. Just as people have responded to public education on the hazards of cigarette smoking and improper diet, I believe the public will respond to an effective campaign on the hazards of not wearing seat belts.

"Certainly, there are actions that we, as legislators, would like to take in the best interest of Hawaii's people. However, Mr. Speaker, these are decisions which we leave to the individual because it is their right to make independent choices regarding their own personal safety. In the long run, I think public safety will be better served when people wear seat belts because they want to, not because they have to.

"I urge this body to work toward the long-term public good of this issue. We don't need to be the big brother to a public which has shown a tremendous willingness to cooperate in the community's interest. We don't need to legislate, but we need to educate, so that seat belt use is not a required nuisance, but rather, a thoroughly understood safety measure.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kihano then rose to speak in favor of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, my wife loves me very much and she would like to keep me tied down.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 89, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRAFFIC SAFETY", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 41 ayes to 8 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Graulty, Ikeda, Kim, Menor, Nakata, Onouye and Souki voting no, and Representatives Hirono and Ige being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 89 had passed Third Reading at 12:31 o'clock p.m.

### H.B. No. 453, HD 1:

Representative Taniguchi moved that H.B. No. 453, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Oshiro.

Representative Liu then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of the bill and to just make an observation.

"I do have just one concern that future Legislatures, in looking for examples for voting formulas for various organizations, understand that the weighted voting formula outlined in paragraphs 2 and 3 of Section 279E-6 in this bill is very specific just to MPO and does not necessarily mean that it is a suitable formula for other organizations that might be created by the State. I do understand that the referred two formula reflects provisions of the existing MPO compact, but perhaps this section might not have been appropriate for the bill, but in all other respects, I support it.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 453, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Hirono and Ige being

excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 453 had passed Third Reading at 12:33 o'clock p.m.

### H.B. No. 492, HD 1:

Representative Honda moved that H.B. No. 492, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Nakata.

Representative Isbell then rose to speak in favor of the bill "with reservations", stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill is going to provide a ban of the whole world on bringing honey bees into the State of Hawaii. . .into bringing all bees into the State of Hawaii. I am in favor of a limited ban but I oppose limiting the whole world.

"This bill is brought up because in the United States, Mexico and several countries, there has been found a tiny little mite in the trachea of the bees. This mite affects their health and eventually does cause a demise of the bees. In fact, and I am glad that there are few children here, they need to be aware that there is a world problem in many areas but not in every country and every island. In fact, if we don't be careful with this mite, it may affect all the pollinization of. . . especially on the mainland, the agricultural products including all the fruits and vegetables that we receive, if we are not careful.

"There are other places, though, in this world that are just as isolated as the island of Hawaii and all of Hawaii that do not have the mite. We need to bring in new stock occasionally to replace inbreeding to prevent that. We do have places in this State that raise honey bees -- Queen bees to be exact. Their production depends on fresh stock and they would be the last one to introduce any mites into this valuable Queen bee stock. A company which raises these will be very adversely affected by not being allowed to bring in fresh stocks that are healthy and free of the mites. But this bill does provide a total ban.

"One of the testifiers suggested that we go into artificial insemination for the Queen bees. Now that sounds good except I would like to give you some examples of why I do not necessarily agree with that.

"First of all, we have no assurance

that the semen will be of the quality provided that we need and that unless you see the action, as you know, you're not sure what you're getting.

"Number two, Queen bees mate only once and we are going to deprive her of this one big date by banning all bees from coming in and providing that they only use artificial insemination.

"I would expect that other areas of the world would expect us to say that we are mite free so they should buy our Queen bees. On the other hand, we are expecting them to believe us but we are not willing to believe them that they are mite free and can bring in our Queen bees but will bring in all the semen they can produce.

"Mr. Speaker, I would hope that the members of this Committee understand the seriousness of the mites but also the seriousness that we must produce more Queen bees because without them, you will not have any honey, and I am in favor of the aspect of the bill which allows a ban but not a total ban. I do vote any but with great reservations.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Honda then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of the bill and just to clarify some areas.

"First of all, this bill does not prevent the introduction of semen from anyplace else in the world; and secondly, talking with the people in the bee industry, they feel that there are sufficient wild colonies established throughout the State and they can pick the Queen from there and bring it back into their hives to be productive.

"So, I think the concern that was expressed earlier, I think we have enough situations here in the islands plus the introduction of semen will solve the problem."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 492, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO BEES", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Hirono and Ige being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 492 had passed

Third Reading at 12:37 o'clock p.m.

## H.B. No. 479, HD 1:

By unanimous consent, action was deferred to the end of the calendar.

#### H.B. No. 860, HD 1:

Representative Hashimoto moved that H.B. No. 860, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Cachola.

Representative Ikeda then rose to speak in favor of the bill "with some reservations", stating:

"Mr. Speaker, there is no doubt that we have a problem in this State and that there is a great need to provide more housing, and Hula Mae has done an admirable job in trying to provide homes for people with lower income and allowing them to qualify for loans so that they can finally become home owners.

"However, Mr. Speaker, \$2-million in bonds that we will be appropriating, or we will be receiving for this purpose, I would like to point out that if we do not take care of our high workers' compensation cost, that roughly 15 percent of that amount will go towards paying, through the cost of construction, workers' compensation premiums and that amounts to roughly \$300,000 -- \$300,000 more which could be allowed for loans for more people to own homes. And on the basis of \$100,000 per home, Mr. Speaker, I don't have to tell you how many more homes we could provide for people with lower incomes, and that is the reason why I vote in favor of this bill but with those reservations.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 860, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING LOAN AND MORTGAGE PROGRAMS", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Hirono and Ige being excused.

# H.B. No. 861, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Hashimoto, seconded by Representative Cachola and carried, H.B. No. 861, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN

ACT RELATING TO HOUSING", passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Hirono and Ige being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 860 and 861 had passed Third Reading at 12:40 o'clock p.m.

#### H.B. No. 206, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Say, seconded by Representative Andrews and carried, H.B. No. 206, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE FACILITATION OF PERMIT PROCESSING", passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Hirono and Ige being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 206 had passed Third Reading at 12:41 o'clock p.m.

### H.B. No. 194:

By unanimous consent, action was deferred one day.

At 12:41 o'clock p.m., Representative Kiyabu asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:42 o'clock p.m.

# H.B. No. 131, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Kiyabu, seconded by Representative Souki and carried, H.B. No. 131, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PRIVATE ACTIVITY BONDS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Hirono and Ige being excused.

# H.B. No. 18, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Kiyabu, seconded by Representative Souki and carried, H.B. No. 18, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS OF THE STATE OF HAWAII", passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Hirono and Ige being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 131 and 18 had passed Third Reading at 12:43 o'clock p.m.

On motion by Representative Taniguchi, seconded by Representative Tom and carried, H.B. No. 830, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PROHIBITED MOTOR AND OTHER VEHICLE EQUIPMENT", passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Hirono and Ige being excused.

### H.B. No. 522, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Tam, seconded by Representative Kim and carried, H.B. No. 522, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MANDATORY RETIREMENT", passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Hirono and Ige being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 830 and 522 had passed Third Reading at 12:45 o'clock

# MATTER DEFERRED FROM EARLIER ON THE CALENDAR

H.B. No. 479, HD 1, on Third Reading:

Representative Apo moved that H.B. No. 479, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Shon.

Representative Tungpalan rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, for the record, I would like to state that I am voting W/R on this with the Republicans."

Representative Hemmings then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of House Bill 479, House Draft 1."

Directed by the Chair to "proceed", Representative Hemmings continued:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and it is with a spirit of funness and also fairness that I rise to speak in favor of this bill.

"The humu humu nuku nuku apua'a has played a long and colorful role in Hawaiian folklore and our history. It deserves to be our State fish and as we well know, Mr. Speaker, nothing is law until it passes both houses and is signed by the Governor. Therefore, I am extremely worried that this bill may fall victim to some sort of last minute skulduggery. With that in mind, I am very pleased to see that the prime mover of this bill, Representative Apo, is not stuck in the elevator.

"Mr. Speaker, I am alarmed that this effort to subvert the humu humu nuku nuku apua'a is being put forth by supporters of the akule fish and I do want to let you know that we have a member of this body who is a calabash relative of Akule Joe and there might be a conflict here, Mr. Speaker, and we don't want any conflicts, Mr. Speaker.

"So, with that in mind, I would like to offer some evidence to be brought forth that I've had a House staff take over to Representative Crozier's desk. Because I was unable to attend a hearing on this bill, I've had delivered to Mr. Crozier's desk an akule plate lunch with two scoops rice, Mr. Speaker, and a large side

order of macaroni salad.

"Mr. Speaker, I don't know what people will think of us if we did not pass House Bill 479, House Draft 1, to proclaim the humu humu nuku nuku apua'a the State fish. I would hesitate to think what they would do if we reversed our decision on this matter and voted in favor of the fish Representative Crozier is lobbying for that he enjoys as a plate lunch.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Crozier then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Originally, I was just going to speak on the merits of the akule. I was walking through the halls of this.

At this point, the Chair interrupted and stated:

"Representative Crozier, before you proceed, the Chair would like to declare you not in conflict. Please proceed."

Representative Crozier thanked the Chair and continued his remarks, saying:

"Last week, I've been walking through the halls all by myself feeling very lonely, dejected; I believed in my cause; no one else was with me. I said, well, I am going to stick it out to the end no matter what happens. I was going to be a good guy and only talk about the akule. Then when my colleague from across the way said that at one time I called this fish a rubbish fish and I would change it and recognize it for what it is -- it is a Republican fish. When that statement was made, sir, I could feel. . .I could feel the surge, the surge, sir, of our partisan members come alive. They are now starting to feel the need for the akule to come forth and take over. The akule, sir, is the working men's fish and the Democratic Party represents working men.

"I would just like to explain some of the characteristics of the humu humu nuku nuku apua'a. Me and about seven other people can pronounce that word. Nobody else in this place can. They usually call it just the humu which is only one part of the fish.

"Well, sir, first of all, let me tell you about this fish. It is a very colorful fish, similar to the other party. Also like the other party, its

skin is very thick, very thick skinned. It cannot be sensitive to the surroundings. And let me also explain some of its characteristics, sir. The humu humu is like the ostrich. When it panics, it runs to a hole, sticks its head in and just hangs in there until the bad times pass by, not like the Democrats. We come out forward, grab a hold of the problem and do something about it. We are willing to face reality. Also, sir, the humu humu again is a loner. It swims by itself out on the reef; it will not associate with the other members of the community. The akule, sir, does associate with the other members. In fact, it swims out to the deep waters, comes back to the shallow. It is a community-oriented fish -- like the Democratic Party.

"And last of all, explaining the humu humu, let me just mention its disposition. The humu humu, sir, grunts.

"Now, may I get a little more serious and explain the virtues of the akule.

"First of all, you know, in history...sir, could you tell me when I use up my ten minutes? Thank you.

"You know, in history, when we chose our different symbols, like say, for the bald eagle; you know, Ben Franklin wanted the turkey but the bald eagle prevailed because of the free spirit. It roamed the skies. The Indians used the feathers to show manhood. Here in Hawaii, our Hawaiian song, our State song, is Hawaii Ponoi; and that we salute the aliis, the royalties of Hawaii. Our State tree is the kukui nut tree and for those of you that never seen a kukui nut tree, out in the lawn over there, when you walking to lunch today, go look at the kukui nut tree--okay? That's our State tree. Why did we choose the kukui nut? The ohia/lehua is a prettier tree, but the kukui nut played a role in the culture of Hawaii. The seed was used for food; it was used for medicine; and also used for lighting the huts at night. The tree trunk was used to make canoes. Not everybody had koa canoes. Just like today, not everybody drives Cadillacs. Some of us drive Datsuns. Well the kukui nut tree was the Datsun of olden times. It took care of the common people. Now, the Why do we have the hibiscus. That's for the tourists. hibiscus? Okay, we taking care of the aliis, sir. We are taking care of the tourists. Now it is time that we commemorate the working people.

"The working people of old -- the ones who made Hawaii great, and until today, it's still the working people that's making Hawaii happen. And that's the fish that the working people eat. Only around Christmas time, we try dig up \$18 to buy some aku and ahi but the rest of the time, it's around \$2 a pound for akule.

"Besides playing a role in our historical times, even today, the akule is important to us. You know, for food, also for recreation. On every island, sir, you will see. . .I had to go check this up to make sure I am pronouncing it right -- you will see the different families go down to the harbors, and let me start off from Kauai. Down in Nawiliwili and Hanapepe, you see the people fishing there.

"In Anahola, before I go through all the islands, just let me share a story with you -- a true story, sir. My wife's grandmother was the kumupuli for Anahola. Kumupuli is a minister and she was the minister of Anahola and in times of need in the '30s and '40s and early '50s, before she passed on, when the people needed fish, they would all go pray. And then she would take them down to the ditch in Anahola. I think Representatives Lardizabal and Apo know the area, and they would go pray. And the fish they prayed for to sustain them through these tough times was the akule. That's the importance the akule had for the people of Hawaii.

"Even today, go down to Honolulu Harbor. You folks seen the people standing there. You seen the old tutu man with his kid or his grand-child with the fishing pole. That is what they are after. They are after the baby akule -- the halalu. Down at Pokai Bay, Waimanalo, any harbor you want to mention; on the Big Island -- Kawaihae, Hana, Hilo Harbor; Maui -- Kahului; all those people you see out there, gathered, families sharing with one another -- they are catching the akule.

"Now, sir, I come to an end at this time and just share this one thought. At first, people were not taking me seriously, but now the seam is coming apart. I got a phone call from a very great man that I think and some of them may be perturbed with his policies at this time, but we all gotta agree that he is a great man. Papa Richard Lyman gave me a call last week and he told me, 'Boy, you doing

the right thing.'

"So, my fellow colleagues, come with me. Take the akule as our State fish.

"Thank you, sir."

Representative Kamali'i then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill naming the humu humu nuku nuku apua'a the State fish of Hawaii.

"Mr. Speaker, a number of objections have been raised concerning the designation of this fish. If I may, I would like to cite some of these concerns and respond to them.

"First, some have noted that the name humu humu nuku nuku apua'a is too long and difficult to pronounce and that it will be almost certain that will be shortened to humu humu. Mr. Speaker, I have a great love for kaolewa Hawaii -- the Hawaiian the Hawaiian language. And if I beleive that a great damage would be suffered or inadvertently created by such a possibility, this fact alone would cause me to vote against this measure. However, even in a shortened form, although not to be desired particularly by the media, even as the humu humu, we are still identifying the trigger fish and all of its varieties. Happily, then, this particular shortening still accurately identifies this beautiful fish. Thus, although precision may be lost by a shortening, we will not lose the fundamental means.

"Second, some have opposed the humu humu nuku nuku apua'a as being cowardly, or lacking in the symbol strength, which we associate with our State emblem. Mr. Speaker, such a characterization is totally in error. According to Latin, the humu humu nuku nuku apua'a is the fish form of Kamapua'a -- the demigod who successfully defied and wooed Pele. Kamapua'a was associated with the migration from Tahiti which also occasioned the arrival of Pele and her family. Kamapua'a was a kupua -- a changer of shape, capable of being man, hog, a variety of pharaoh, and a fish. And as each form he has been seen as handsome, strong, intelligent with great vision, sensitivity like the Republicans. The major significance for me is that, like Hawaii and her people, whatever the transformations are, we remain essentially unchanged. The source of our strength, the critical symbol, is in

that fact. We, Republicans, have strength. It was for Kamapua'a, as the humu humu nuku nuku apua'a.

"And finally, Mr. Speaker, there is the objection that the humu humu did not receive a majority of the votes cast. We live in a democracy and as politicians, we will understand the nature of a special election where the winner takes all profits. The major consideration is that of all the votes cast, the humu humu nuku nuku apua'a won. For this body to override this popular decision is to do great harm though the Majority have great tactics in doing such things. But a great many school children participated in this election and as many of them testified. Although the humu humu nuku nuku apua'a was not their choice, they would abide by the election process.

"And we, my fellow colleagues, can do no less. I urge for a unanimous vote of this measure.

"Thank you."

Representative Isbell then rose to speak in favor of the bill "with some reservations", stating:

"Mr. Speaker, we got into a partisan kind of debate it seems, and although I realize that the akule has a larger mouth, the humu humu has a very small mouth, and I think that should be, you know, part of the discussion if we are talking about fish. But I do not necessarily believe that the humu humu nuku nuku apua'a and we can almost, all of us, pronounce it by the way.

"It is not necessarily the fish that I would suggest for the State forever. In Massachusetts, the state fish is the cod. It hangs from a chandelier in the State Building. I would hesitate to think what would happen if we put the humu humu nuku nuku apua'a hanging from this chandelier. In the first place, it would be lost; it is so small. Plus, it is a very dull fish as well as thick skinned as he mentioned, but it is brown mostly. Although the fins here look bright, in the water they're really not that big and bright. It also has a black band on it which makes it look like a bandit, and that is why I hesitate to think of it as a Republican fish.

"I also feel that it should have been a fish for a time but not eternity. That is why I went along with the feeling of the oceanic aquarium, Dr. Taylor, that it should have a place in time, yes, but perhaps, like the rest of us, elected for an official number of years -- perhaps four or six, and then give another fish a chance.

"And the reason I believe that that has the most merit is because this has created so much interest. It has brought those children out -- brought them to the Aquarium and made them aware of a very important thing that surrounds them, and that is the ocean and all the fish that's in it. But if we are going to be stuck with the humu humu nuku nuku apua'a forever, I have a problem with that and I would love to see a different fish on a regular basis because that rotation would then create another large amount of interest. Now, that doesn't mean it has to be very often; it could be every ten years. But those same children are not going to be in school ten years from now. There will be another group of children and this whole new awareness can come about. So that is why I do vote in favor of this bill because I think it is excellent.

"I must commend Representative Apo for bringing to our attention this most important thing in the whole State. We now are going to have a fish. And I really feel that probably out of the whole legislative session, this may be the most important thing that comes out. But I would hope that we look seriously at perhaps in the future amending this bill to not make it forever but give other fish a chance. There's some beautiful little fish out there that would be very colorful and would look beautiful hanging from our chandelier.

"I thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Apo then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I had planned to be silent today and not say anything, but with all the comments flying around, I thought it was incumbent upon me to at least say a few words. I rise to speak in support of this bill with great reservations.

"Mr. Speaker, coming into the session today, I lent my full support and signed free and clear to have the humu humu nuku nuku apua'a designated State fish, but upon finding that it is a Republican, I now have developed some very serious reservations. I realize that it is too late in the process, and after all the hard work that has been done to stop this bill. However, I promise you that your Committee on Ocean and Marine

Resources, next year, will be introducing legislation to prevent this fish from reproducing and, hopefully, in future years we might extend that to other forms of elected officials.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kamali'i then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I just want to let my colleagues know that I have an amendment here that I could very well introduce because I know, and it states that the humu humu nuku nuku apua'a also known as the rectangle trigger fish, is established and designated as the official fish of the State for a term of office of five years or until the Legislature so designates its successor. I am not going to introduce it, but let me assure you, there are lots of Republicans in that ocean that could win this next election."

Representative Lardizabal then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I will keep my statement short, but I rise to speak in favor of this bill with some reservations.

"I would like to make an official statement, if I may, about this magnificent species; however, I would like to respond to my team colleague across the aisle.

"Sometime ago, when I chose a party, I was told that there is something fishy about the Republican party and after today's hearings, I now so conclude.

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak with some reservations only because when I was a young man, there were some drawings and coloring of fishes and this State fish was one of them. At that time, I had a tremendous difficulty in pronouncing the name and even spelling it and that, Mr. Speaker, is my trouble today. But that is not the problem. We do have a lot of people coming into this country and into this State that have difficulty in English and that may be part of it, but it is not a serious problem.

"Mr. Speaker, with your indulgence, I was told today there would be many, many fishes in the floor and so I came as a true fisherman to bring my fish net but the fish got away. So I would like to apologize and perhaps I should go back to the drawing board and stick to golfing.

"Thank you, sir."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 479, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE FISH", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Crozier and Kiyabu voting no, and Representatives Hirono and Ige being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 479 had passed Third Reading at 1:07 o'clock p.m.
