

THIRTY-SECOND DAY

Friday, March 8, 1985

The House of Representatives of the Thirteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1985, convened at 11:44 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Brother Eugene Fitzsimmons, of Saint Louis High School, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representative Pfeil, who was excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journals of the House of Representatives of the Twenty-Seventh, Twenty-Eighth, Twenty-Ninth and Thirtieth Days.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Ikeda and carried, reading of the Journals was dispensed with and the Journals of the Twenty-Seventh, Twenty-Eighth, Twenty-Ninth and Thirtieth Days were approved.

At this time, the following introductions were made to the members of the House:

Representative Leong introduced sixty-nine students from Haleiwa Elementary School who were accompanied by their teachers, Mrs. Koga, Mrs. Harada and Mrs. Kawachi and a staff member, Mr. Ed Brussad.

Representative Andrews, on behalf of the Representatives from Maui, introduced several boy scouts from Troop 18 from the Makawao Hongwanji. They were accompanied by their scoutmasters, Mr. Lou Shimabuku and Scott Sato.

Representative Kim rose on a point of information.

The Chair directed Representative Kim to state her point.

Representative Kim, inquired:

"I would like to know if we have mandatory seat belts in the chamber -- I find some seat belts here on my chair. I would like to know who put them there."

The Chair responded:

"The Chair is missing his."

ORDER OF THE DAY

COMMITTEE REASSIGNMENTS

House Bill No. 1581 was re-referred to the Committee on Water, Land Use Development and Hawaiian Affairs.

SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Ikeda and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering a resolution out of order.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION

A resolution (H.R. No. 213) honoring Fred W. Friendly: executive, educator, author and First Amendment advocate was jointly offered by Representatives Hagino, Okamura, Anderson, Apo, Blair, Bunda, Cavasso, Crozier, Grauly, Hashimoto, Hemmings, Hirono, Honda, Ikeda, Kihano, Lardizabal, Leong, Lindsey, Liu, Marumoto, Medeiros, Menor, Metcalf, Morgado, Nakasato, Nakata, Onouye, Oshiro, Say, Shito, Shon, Tajiri, Tam, Taniguchi, Tom, Tungpalan and Yoshimura was read by the Clerk.

On motion by Representative Hagino, seconded by Representative Okamura and carried, H.R. No. 213 was adopted.

Representative Hagino rose and stated:

"The foundation of democracy is really built on a free press and a free media. Today, we have as our honored guest, a man who has been a giant in the field of news broadcasting.

"As noted in the resolution, he began his career many years ago. Later, he teamed up with another famous newscaster, Edward R. Murrow.

"One of the achievements that he accomplished with Mr. Murrow was that during the fifties, they were some of first news reporters to begin to expose the excesses of then Senator Joseph McCarthy and I believe,

helped to bring about an end to that period of time, thirty years ago, which many feel to have been a nightmare.

"He later became, in his illustrious career, the head of CBS news and under his tenureship at CBS news, that organization won many awards mainly because of Mr. Friendly's stewardship.

"I would like to tell a little story which I think some people may recall, as to how he left CBS News.

"It happened back in February 10, 1966. At that time, Congress was holding hearings on the Vietnam War. Upon learning that his own network was not televising the congressional series because his own network preferred to broadcast "I Love Lucy" reruns, not even the original, but the reruns of "I Love Lucy," and a soap opera called "Love of Life", Mr. Friendly turned his resignation the following day upon learning that his own network had not covered this vital congressional hearing.

"In another series of congressional hearings that he covered as a reporter, which I think is of special interest to all of us, are the hearings that were held on Hawaii Statehood. We just celebrated our Silver Jubilee and Mr. Friendly insisted that CBS cover the Statehood hearings back in the fifties, and he was telling me just before our Session here, that, as part of the controversy of our then Territory, becoming a State--the Fiftieth State of the Nation, that he had received criticisms as to why he was, in effect, promoting our admission as a State.

"I think you can see by the resolution, he has been a very courageous individual. Since leaving the broadcast industry, he has gone on to become an author, a producer of a very well-regarded series on the Constitution broadcast by PBS, and he has become a distinguished scholar at the Columbia University, particularly at the School of Journalism.

"He is with us here because the American Civil Liberties Union is celebrating its twentieth anniversary awards dinner and he is the keynote speaker at that event. Just as an aside, the person who is going to be honored at the dinner is someone who is known to all of us here, Mr. Emmet Cahill. The dinner will be held on Saturday.

"At this time, I would like to

introduce to all of you this distinguished, courageous individual, Mr. Fred W. Friendly."

Representative Hagino then asked Mr. Friendly to rise and be recognized.

Representative Hagino also introduced Mrs. Friendly; Vanessa Chong, Executive Director of ACLU, Hawaii; Roger Fronseca, President of the Board of Directors of ACLU; Neil Hubert, member of the board; Dave Johnson, member of the board of ACLU; and John Gray, a very hard working volunteer of ACLU. They were all asked by Representative Hagino to stand and be recognized.

Floral leis were presented to Mr. Friendly by Representative Kim; to Mrs. Friendly by Representative Apo; to Vanessa Chong by Representative Tam; to Fronseca by Representative Hashimoto; to Mr. Hubert by Representative Tungpalan; to Mr. Johnson by Representative Ikeda and Representative Marumoto presented a certified copy of the resolution to the honoree.

The Chair stated:

"Before granting permission, the Chair would like to remind Representative Kim to unbuckle her seat belt before proceeding. Will you please proceed."

At 12:00 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair, "for the purpose of extending our personal aloha to our honorees this morning."

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:13 o'clock p.m.

Representative Hirono rose on a point of personal privilege.

The Chair directed Representative Hirono to state her point.

Representative Hirono stated:

"I'd like to set the records straight. This morning paper in a front page article relating to the ..."

At this time, the Chair interrupted Representative Hirono and asked:

"Does that have to do with the newspaper article?"

Representative Hirono replied:

"It has to do with the recording of my vote on a bill which was in error,

and I would like to set the record straight."

The Chair responded:

"Representative Hirono, the Chair has a definition on personal privilege, that you must have been aggrieved, number one; and that grievance occurred on this floor. The Chair allows all members to bring everything outside of this process, to this floor to have it brought under the heading of personal privilege, we'll be here all night. The Chair, as a consequence, declares you out of order."

At 12:15 o'clock p.m., Representative Hirono asked for a recess, and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:20 o'clock p.m.

SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Ikeda and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of taking up bills on Third Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar.

At 12:21 o'clock p.m., Representative Anderson asked for a recess, and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:25 o'clock p.m.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 346 on H.B. 194, HD1:

Representative Metcalf moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 194, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Tom.

Representative Anderson then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I've been trying to find out since yesterday the need for this bill. I think we have shoreline setbacks by the county. I think we have a Corps of Engineers. I think if there's anything that is going to take away the rights of people that there already, or to take care of problems, there are already bills that will take care of this. To have added

legislation is not needed at this particular time.

"Also, Mr. Speaker, if this bill goes through, the way I read it, it's going to take a person forever to get a wall built if he is losing his or her land. It doesn't say if there is a stream coming down pertaining to ocean, but the average stream, that is open -- because I have friends who, for over 30 years, the stream was closed; they opened it and it eroded all of the land. They had a heck of a time and it cost them a lot of money to try to get their land back.

"For that reason, Mr. Speaker, I vote against this bill, and I hope my colleagues will consider it too.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 194, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ACCRETION", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Anderson and Hemmings voting no, and Representative Pfeil being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 194 had passed Third Reading at 12:27 o'clock p.m.

"Mr. Speaker, the DOE priority funds are a means of allowing individual schools, through their principals, to make expenditures suitable to their schools' particular needs.

"Such specialized needs, however, should not depart from established educational theory or principle. And most important, the expenditures should not enforce student stereotypes or re-enforce educational disadvantage.

"What do I mean?

"Last year, as a part of the continuing research first initiated by the

work of the Native Hawaiians Study Commission, we investigated the library resources of elementary schools in rural areas.

"What we found was highly disturbing.

"The Library Resources Division of the Department of Education believes that 15 books per student is the adequate level for a school library. Anything less than 10 books per pupil is dismal, and a contributing force to the educational disadvantage of our student population.

"From the computer records of the Library Division, we learned that schools such as Manoa, Kahala, and Kamiloiki Elementary -- those schools with the highest standardized achievement test scores for early education reading tests -- had libraries with more than 20 books per student.

"In those schools where the reading scores were unacceptably low -- Waianae, Kalihi-waena, Keanae -- there were an average of less than 8 library books per student.

"It is my profound hope, Mr. Speaker, that the principals in these and similar schools, will seriously consider using their special funds for library acquisition.

"We will be monitoring the situation, and if such special funds are not used in this way, then I think special legislation next year for a special library resources fund should be introduced at these target schools.

"My fear is that the principals may be assuming that these children do not read, therefore, the investment in books is not a good one. One principal that I checked with had used his special funds for playground equipment. But let me say, Mr. Speaker, that when the choice is between a book and a ball, there is no question in my mind that the book comes first and I do seriously hope that the principals will agree.

"Thank you."

No. 1246, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Hashimoto voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 576 on H.B. No. 1251, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Tom, seconded by Representative Metcalf and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1251, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LITTER", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 1246 and 1251 had passed Third Reading at 6:55 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 577 on H.B. No. 1186, HD 1:

Representative Tom moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 1186, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Metcalf.

Representative Medeiros then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, we are all aware in these chambers this evening that a no-fault insurance policy belongs to the automobile. The registered owners of that automobile rightfully pay the premiums to that automobile.

"Now, why am I against this bill, Mr. Speaker?"

"Let me give you a hypothetical situation. Let's just assume now, Mr. Speaker, that I borrow your car for one purpose or the other and the Police Department finds that your automobile does not have no-fault insurance. This bill will say that they will suspend my license for a year and I believe that is not fair. This bill also, Mr. Speaker, tells you that your license also shall be suspended.

"Therefore, I don't see why I should have my license suspended for I have done no wrong and I did not intend to do wrong. Because of this, Mr. Speaker, I am voting no on this bill."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1186, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOTOR VEHICLE INSURANCE", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 41 ayes to 10 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Apo, Hemmings, Ikeda, Jones, Marumoto, Medeiros, Oshiro, Tam and Taniguchi voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 1186 had passed Third Reading at 6:56 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 578 on H.B. No. 463, HD 2:

Representative Kiyabu moved that

the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 463, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Souki.

Representative Shon rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I am, like so many of us here today, perplexed at this issue on workmen's compensation but I have not had the benefit of participating in the negotiations so I will confine my remarks to only one aspect of this bill -- the establishment of the State fund.

"Mr. Speaker, I find highly objectionable the campaign of ignorance that has been waged against the State fund. I have been bombarded with mail urging simply, 'Haldi yes; State fund no.' I've declined to press the senders as to whether or not they have actually read Haldi or understood this State fund.

"One thing is certain, Mr. Speaker. The concept of a State fund has scared the heck out of the insurance industry. Recognizing that State funds have been enormously successful in other states, they have stampeded the business community into rejecting this State fund, and sadly, that stampede has included some who sit here among us today. While recognizing that this is a golden opportunity to engage in partisan attacks, I would hope that at least we who are supposed to know what we are doing would stick to the facts on the matter.

"Finally, Mr. Speaker, I am disappointed that we did not include the necessary funds to set up our State fund right now for if insurance premiums are as bad as everyone says, there is little justification for holding off for another year.

"Thank you."

Representative Hemmings then rose to speak against H.B. No. 463, HD 2, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, a great amount of time, money and human effort has been put forth to curb a very serious problem in our State. That is excessive workers' compensation insurance rates. Throughout it all, I sincerely regret that the issue has been polarized -- business against labor.

"Colleagues, we are no longer in the plantation era. The Big Five is

gone; the sugar industry is on its deathbed. It is a common opinion that Hawaii is not a good place to do business. The adversarial role or mentality that has dominated labor/business relations in the past has reared its ugly head with this issue -- workers' compensation insurance. We are faced with a brave new world. If we don't change our attitudes and methods, our State is doomed to follow the Big Five in the sugar industry into bankruptcy. We are living in a world market now. All our businesses, our labor, our economy must be competitive throughout the world,

"House Bill 463, House Draft 2, if implemented, will add drastically to the negative business climate here in Hawaii.

"Mr. Speaker, I know that the hardworking, honest laborers of Hawaii want opportunities. They want pay raises; they want fringe benefits and they want job security -- the most important need of all for labor. Business people who own and operate Hawaii businesses want basically the same thing.

"House Bill 463, House Draft 2, if implemented, will further destroy our economy. This will hurt all the people of Hawaii, especially laborers. Remember, Mr. Speaker, when business gets bad, big business packs its bags and leaves, or the Big Five, and unfortunately, small businesses who cannot afford to leave simply go bankrupt.

"What are the poor workers of Hawaii going to do?

"Common sixth sense dictates a change, Mr. Speaker. Our present workers' compensation law is a disaster. That is why we are here. House Bill 463, House Draft 2, will make it worse. I urge a no vote on this bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Takamine rose to speak in favor of H.B. 463, HD 2, "with serious reservations", stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the past six weeks has been an experience I had never gone through before and a very valuable learning experience for me. But more importantly, what occurred was a focussed effort to address a very serious problem in our State.

"Many people participated and their efforts and contributions should be

recognized. At the outset, a commitment was made to perform a comprehensive analysis of the various components that contribute to the cost of the workers' compensation system. This task was undertaken by your Committees on Labor and Consumer Protection. The chairpersons of both committees and their members spent considerable time addressing this important issue and should be commended for their patience and efforts to understand the problem. Your Finance Committee, though not being able to spend as much time analyzing the problem due to the legislative calendar, also rendered its recommendations. The Speaker, majority leader and other members of leadership also provided guidance and contributed to getting us this far. There were many people from the community who participated and made the effort to voice their views. The small businesses and business organizations that took the time to provide testimony and all the union representatives and injured workers who testified deserve our sincere appreciation. I am grateful to all of the other participants, including Mr. Haldi, Mr. Webb and Mr. LeCompte, and the lawyers for the injured worker who presented a different perspective. It is through such participation that our system of government works, and we cannot forget the staff whose long hours of hard work made possible consideration of House Bill 463, House Draft 2, for Third Reading this evening.

"And last but not least, I would like to convey my appreciation to the Majority members of this House for the genesis of House Bill 463 is really found in the Majority Program that was adopted at the outset of the session. There, the Majority committed itself to 'place priority on, and to take affirmative action to remedy this complex and sensitive situation in a manner that is equitable to all concerned. . .'

"Mr. Speaker, one aspect of House Bill 463, House Draft 2, that is worth noting is the establishment of a mechanism for creating what has been referred to as a State fund. Mr. Haldi, the consultant, was instructed to 'evaluate the insurance system as it applies to the workers' compensation program. . .and ascertain what might be the likely effects of Act 263, Session Laws Hawaii, 1983, which allows investment income to be considered in the making of rates for workers' compensation insurance.' However, Mr. Haldi's final report did not include any substantive recom-

mendations on this point. Your Committees, during legislative hearings, were informed that a non-profit mechanism could be used to directly bring down the high premium rates that are being assessed against the business community. By establishing an advisory committee to consider the feasible means of implementing a non-profit insurance mechanism in Hawaii, House Bill 463, House Draft 2, addresses itself to the problem of reducing the financial burden presently imposed on small businesses.

"One area of grave concern is the proposed changes regarding the presumption clause. It was clear during the legislative hearings that this has become a very emotional issue. Based on actuarial calculations, we were told by the National Council of Compensation Insurance that a change in the presumption clause would amount to a 2 percent savings on cost. This actual savings is out of proportion to the strong feelings expressed that this was a major cost component of the system.

"From a dispassionate analysis of the provision, there are important reasons for opposing the proposed change. Such a change undercuts the historical trade-off where the worker gave up his right to sue in exchange for a no-fault recovery program with lower benefits.

"More importantly, Mr. Speaker, it creates unfairness in the system against the injured worker. The specific change imposes a change in the burden of proof that the employer carries, and lowers it from a 'substantial evidence' to a 'preponderance of the evidence' standard. What this means is that where the employer can show by at least 51 percent of the proof, a little more than one half, that there is no work connection with the injury, he will prevail and the worker will receive nothing.

"Especially in heart attack, stroke, and mental stress cases, the medical profession does not have a clear understanding of what the specific causal factors are. Therefore, doctors will disagree on causation. By lowering the standard, we allow economic factors to play a larger role in determining the outcome of the case. Due to its greater financial resources, the insurance company will always be more capable of hiring 2 or 3 doctors who will be willing to testify there is no connection to

work. The worker will not have the necessary resources to compete with the insurance company and thus in many cases will probably lose or be discouraged from pursuing a legitimate claim that he or she may have. The law was never intended to allow the economic strengths of the parties to play such a predominant role in deciding the outcome of the case. This is what the proposed change does.

"Moreover, it appears particularly unfair to have the economic strength of the parties play such a role in those cases where doubt is caused by the medical profession not having a clear understanding of what causes a medical condition.

"Such a change, Mr. Speaker, is clearly unfair, and I am unhappy with the final language of House Bill 463, House Draft 2. Yet, it is part of a more comprehensive package of changes that are intended to address the escalating costs of workers' compensation.

"With these stated reservations, Mr. Speaker, I am voting for the bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Medeiros then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill includes a probable mandate for a workmens' compensation fund. I have been here a few years and I have yet to see a special fund that didn't create more problems than it set out to solve, and now we are asking the taxpayers to believe government should be selling insurance. We are just jumping from the frying pan into the fire, Mr. Speaker.

"Let us look at some examples. We believe that the State could better handle the physicians' malpractice insurance fund. That fund went bankrupt. Then, we supposedly insured Thrift Guaranty and what did that get from that? Angry depositors and now they want their \$30-million back.

"We don't have a good record in this area, Mr. Speaker. But does that mean that we wouldn't succeed with a workmens' compensation fund? Well, look at us now. All State workers are presently covered by the State fund. While private insurance premiums jump up 50 percent, the State fund premiums increased an incredible 34 percent.

"With this in mind, Mr. Speaker, I am voting against the bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Bunda rose on a point of information and inquired whether or not he had a potential conflict inasmuch as he is in the insurance business.

The Chair ruled "no conflict."

Representative Bunda then spoke in favor of the bill with reservations, stating:

"At the outset, I must recognize that a tremendous amount of work went into this bill and I commend those of the respective committees who worked long and hard on it.

"Mr. Speaker, as you know, the reason why this bill is before us is because of the spiraling costs within our workers' compensation system. I support the passage of this bill as major steps have been taken in the correct direction to eliminate some of the deficiencies.

"Mr. Speaker, my reservation about this bill stems from the possible establishment of a State-run workers' compensation insurance fund, the apparent purpose of which is to provide private insurance carriers with competition in order to bring insurance rates down. If, indeed, the establishment of the fund will bring costs down to employers without State subsidies of any kind, then it would be difficult to oppose the establishment of such a fund. However, Mr. Speaker, the State's track record in sustaining funds established to protect certain segments of our society has been manifestly a poor one.

"The establishment of a State insurance fund to offer direct competition to private insurance carriers concerns me, for with its establishment, some of the existing insurance carriers may stop writing workers' compensation policies.

"Mr. Speaker, another concern to which I refer is the testimony presented by the State's Director of Labor that to start up a State fund would require an initial appropriation of \$300,000 for minimal staffing and other related expenses, and would eventually require between 50 to 100 positions at an annual cost of \$1.2- to \$2.5-million. Further, the National Association of Insurance Commissioners has preliminarily estimated

that to write even ten percent of the market and to make the fund viable, our fund will require \$8-million in capital and surplus. And because ours would be a new fund, with a small capital base, little investment income could be generated out of which dividends could be paid. In other words, Mr. Speaker, for the Hawaii fund to be able to match the performances of the California and Arizona state funds, funds which the proponents of the establishment of a State fund cite as examples of successful state funds, we must also have a large fund, one which we cannot initially have, and one which the prospects of having in the future appears minimal.

"Mr. Speaker, another bothersome aspect of the creation of a State fund is the unwise interference by the State in a field better left to the private enterprise. There was no showing in the Haldi report that our current private insurance system was responsible for the high cost of the workers' compensation system. In fact, Mr. Speaker, in the Haldi report, it is concluded that the workers' compensation law problem is a benefits problem and not an insurance problem.

"Mr. Speaker, I believe it is the government's role, especially the policymaking body, to be fair and consistent. If, in the interest of cost containment, the rallying cry of this session, a State insurance fund must be established in the workers' compensation system, then logically and fairly, a State fund should be established to provide public competition to doctors and lawyers in private practice. In addition, a State fund should be established in the area of automobile insurance because of the skyrocketing cost of automobile insurance. Furthermore, more State hospitals should be created to provide competition to the private sector acute care hospitals since there is no denying there is a need for hospital cost containment.

"The point I am making, Mr. Speaker, is that if we start with the creation of a State workers' compensation insurance fund to provide direct competition to the private sector in order to ostensibly bring about cost containment, then the logical end may be the creation of State funds to provide government competition in all phases of activities involving private enterprise. I am certain not one of us here hopes for that to happen.

"For these reasons, Mr. Speaker, I am voting for the passage of this bill with reservations. But let us not accept it as the final solution to the problems which exist in our workers' compensation laws, but let us continue to exert efforts to make the law fair and equitable for all of the people of this State.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kamalii then rose to speak in favor of the bill with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this measure is not all that everyone wants -- whether from the workers' point of view, or that of the employer.

"In fact, the most unfortunate aspect of the discussion about workmen's compensation has been just this tendency to view these and other proposed changes as either pro-labor or anti-business.

"As legislators, we are well aware of and sensitive to the competing interests which come before us. However, the balance which we hope to find is not, strictly speaking, a compromise between the two positions. Rather, the balance is the public interest. And the public interest is best served when we can maintain a sense of fairness and common sense in what we do.

"The two most blatant examples of unfairness in the present law are addressed in this measure: 1) a downward shift of evidentiary standards to 'a preponderance' of proof by the employer to demonstrate that heart attack, stroke, or mental illness is not job-related and, therefore, not compensable; and 2) a waiting period of two work days to avoid compensation payments for days not normally included in a regular payroll.

"Other imbalances remain. But these two changes are a clear signal of 'good faith' adjustments in law by this Legislature.

"Far less acceptable, Mr. Speaker, are attempts within this bill to strike a compromise between legislative remedies.

"In particular, I am talking about the 'study' of a State compensation fund. Such a fund does not just upset the balance we are attempting to foster; it destroys it.

"Here we are, attempting to forge

fairness -- and then suddenly declaring, 'well, the only way it can be done is if government does it.'

"Simply, my colleagues, that isn't true.

"The only examples we have of State insurance funds are so fundamentally different from our own situation that they offer no guidance at all. Both California and Arizona have populations far greater than our own -- numbers able to generate investment potential and dividend return. A capability that we lack.

"In addition, their laws are virtually the reverse of our own. They require a preponderance of evidence by the injured worker to prove a claim.

"I am confident that further amendments will be made to this bill both in the Senate and in Conference Committee. It is my sincerest hope that in that process, we will find a private sector solution. If not, then I will be compelled to vote against this measure the next time that it is before us. Why? Because I will not admit that we have failed when we have not yet even tried because, Mr. Speaker, that is our only fair thing to do.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson then rose to speak in favor of the bill with reservations, stating:

"My reservations are, Mr. Speaker, that from day one, since we started working on this bill, the presumption clause has not been something that's emotional. Both sides of the aisle, labor and business, said it was very, very important. Labor said keep it business and get rid of it. If it was emotional, it would not have been that much of a thing that we had to work on. It wouldn't have had the impact that everybody was worried about.

"After we had the Haldi report, we had 32 measures that they asked us to consider. Each one would change two or three percent and that is what we fought -- the percentages. The overall would have been a savings of twenty percent. We ended up, Mr. Speaker, with choosing four, and that's a compromise -- four measures and we might even have a cost rise rather than a cost going down.

"That's one of the reasons I don't like the bill, Mr. Speaker, and it is not emotion. I've had every report

that we could possibly get from Mr. Takamine, from our own staff, and from the staff of the business community. It's not something that we're just looking at and playing games with.

"People are in trouble. That's why we have this. Normally, when we have any type of a . . . I'm trying to think of the word right now . . . whenever we go ahead and spend money to have an issue looked at, we normally look at it, we use it as a guideline. This time, it's so important that it's not just something to be a guideline. There's people out there losing their jobs.

"The business community can no longer pass on costs to the people out there that is the consumer. They're at a point now where they are not even hiring in some cases. We have talked to businessmen that said to hire someone would cost them a thousand dollars up front. They haven't hired in two years. There's businesses letting people go. Construction companies that said, 'I used to have 20 people; I now have 6.' They're paying in excess of \$250,000. A small business person from Maui -- \$25,000 a year for 10 people.

"These are costs that people are just looking at and they want us to go ahead and try to solve this. And then we say we have a compromise. We're going to take 4 of the 32 recommendations and we are going to send it over.

"And for Representative Shon, if the Haldi report versus the State fund is one that we haven't really looked at, then the two gentlemen that came from California and Arizona, both after under questioning, their laws aren't anywhere near ours.

"If we are going to have a State fund, we just don't look at how we're going to implement it, we have to accept their whole law. That's the only way it'll work. But if we would sit down and try to take care of our own problems instead of using the bandaid, we'd be fine. Two or three percent here or there isn't going to hurt us. Both sides, we've got people that are temporarily out and they're on a disability that they'll never be able to go up on. They have been out for years and they're here. They can't go up.

"We've got to look at something like that. But first, we have got to bring costs down so that we can look

at how we're going to take care of those that absolutely deserve to get a little more. The Haldi report will give them about 80 percent, after taxes, whereas on the other side, it was 66 percent. We've got to look at all of the compromises that are there and we'll try to make up our own decisions rather than say a State fund -- that's the easiest way to go.

"For that reason, Mr. Speaker, I'm going to vote for the bill but I am hoping that I can get on a conference and at least sit and listen and try not to be too emotional, but sometimes I get that way. I hope my colleagues will vote for it and then fight to try and work things out.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Menor rose to speak in favor of the bill with reservations, stating:

"As a member of the Employment Opportunities and Labor Relations Committee and the Consumer Protection Committee, I support this bill because of the fact that I think it contains good positive provisions. For example, there is a provision relating to establishment of medical guidelines that would bring some form of control over excessive medical treatment. In addition, I think that this particular area and bill needs additional discussion so, therefore, passing it out of the House would ensure that.

"On the other hand, I do have some concerns.

"My first biggest concern, I believe, is with respect to the provision relating to the presumption clause. As I read the language in the bill relating to the presumption clause, I believe that the language, as it is written, may pose some serious constitutional problems and may result in some constitutional challenge as to that section of the bill. What the bill or the provision relating to the presumption essentially does is it creates two classes or categories of workers -- workers with particular kinds of injuries; for example, relating to cardiovascular ailments, and those that are specified in the bill would have the presumption apply but the preponderance of the evidence then would be the one that would be applicable.

"In the other situations, for other types of injuries for those categories of employees, then you have the substantial evidence rule applying.

And I believe that this kind of distinction between these two categories of classifications of employees may raise some constitutional problems in terms of possible challenges under the equal protection laws and I don't think that the testimonies offered during the hearing could provide a sufficient evidentiary basis to argue for the constitutionality of that provision, so as this bill is further discussed in conference committee, I hope that this particular concern can be addressed.

"My own preference would be to adopt a standard that would be applied across the board for all categories of employees. My stated preference has been for the adoption of a clear and convincing standard which is in between the substantial evidence standard and the preponderance of the evidence standard. I think that the adoption of this intermediate standard would, on the one hand, address the employers' concerns about not having to face an almost insurmountable evidentiary burden in trying to overcome the presumption while, on the other hand, recognizing the fact that an employee faces an imbalance in resources and we wouldn't want to put him in a position of having to hire attorneys and also to expend considerable resources in just pressing a claim. So, perhaps this adoption of an intermediate standard, across the board, would possibly minimize the legal challenges based on constitutionality while, at the same time, addressing the balance between the employer and the employee.

"I am also concerned, Mr. Speaker, as Representative Bunda had stated very well, the creation of a State fund. I think that this matter deserves further study in terms of the way it would be managed and also the experiences of other states. So while I support the study, I think that having an affirmative statement in the bill saying that the Legislature supports the creation of a State fund causes me some difficulties.

"In addition, I also am concerned about the fact that while we have made some improvements in the bill with respect to the waiting period, that we do not allow, under this bill, the retroactive collection of benefits for the initial days work loss, and this could be a deviation from what other states basically provide in terms of allowing the retroactive collection of benefits. I think that the biggest problem under this existing law is the fact that the time period for retro-

actively collecting benefits is relatively short. It means that an employee who is injured for a short period of time can just stay off the job for an additional day or two and be able to collect benefits retroactively. On the other hand, I do not believe that we would all here agree that an employee who is legitimately injured for a long period of time, that employee should not be adequately compensated for the wages lost. And so I think that some form of retroactive collection of benefits should be allowed, but what we ought to do is look at what other states are doing. For example, in California, which has a 14-day time period before you can collect their benefits retroactively, as opposed to what we have now in Hawaii which is, I believe, five days.

"And finally, Mr. Speaker, I don't think that the bill addresses the so-called problem of double dipping in which somebody who is initially injured receives or compensationally claim and then is subsequently injured is able to receive full benefits for that subsequent injury even if that injury is basically an aggravation of the initial injury. I think that we need to have some clarification in terms of apportioning the relative awards where you have subsequent injuries to take into account the fact that the second injury is, in fact, an aggravation of the first injury.

"So based on those concerns, Mr. Speaker, I think that this bill deserves further study. It should be studied further. I would favor this bill but again, I favor it with reservations.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Cavasso then rose to speak against the bill "as a small businessman", stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I speak as a small businessman with a laborer's background. At 14 years old, I went to work in the trenches at Correa's Plumbing in Kailua. I started my own lawn mowing business at 15 when I was at Kailua High School. At 28, I finally began my own landscape contracting firm and I have been given much and I have the ability to do other things than run a small business. The primary reason for starting this particular business, the landscaping company, was so that I could provide jobs to some people who I knew who were disabled and who needed work. The company grew over

7 years to employing 19 people, and experiencing the problems of our insurance and surviving in this community. I should share that during that time, there were many years when I paid myself less than the lowest paid employee in the company.

"I believe in workmen's compensation and the need for workmen's compensation. But not what we have here. The other night -- Friday night -- I was sitting right here and talking to some of the representatives and the feeling that came to me was somewhat a feeling of hopelessness and like, hey chuck it. Why fight to keep employees any longer. Why not just let them go and insure themselves. I desire to keep employees in my company; I desire to keep them insured; I desire to keep them safe; I desire to pay this. But we have a problem that's running out of control.

"Workmen's compensation began before I was born and it was under control until about ten years ago. It's only in the last ten years that something has gone wrong and we need now to deal with that which has gone wrong and straighten it out. What came out Friday night, coming against me and the feeling that came. . . I am a responsible person, and yet, the feeling came -- I don't want to deal with this any longer. Let the employees go. That's wrong, and I wonder if I am feeling this, how many other small employers with two or three, or five or ten, or even twenty employees in the State, are feeling the same way. We need to deal with this.

"I would like to address four points in this current situation and share from small business perspective, someone who is in the ground, working.

"Permanent partial disability. The law, as it says right now or as this is saying, is providing for double dipping. Someone in my company could get hurt in the leg, for example, and he could be given a permanent partial disability payment of \$300 a month. Suppose he is earning \$900 a month in my company and he goes and gets hurt and comes back and he gets a permanent partial disability. He gets \$300 a month for the permanent partial disability. He will also continue to get, not only that permanent partial disability, but will continue to get the \$900 a month that he is working for me for if he can do his job properly.

"I spent time in the military. I was injured on active duty. I received a disability for an injury to my leg. The disability goes as long as I don't go back to work but when I go back to work for the military, that disability gradually cuts down, depending on the amount of work and my earning capacity with the United States military. We should follow their example and make sure that we do not permit the double dipping. It must be cut down by percentage at least.

"The second point that I make. We have left it at 66-2/3 percent instead of going to 80 percent of after tax income. I did some calculations this morning. I called a number of contractors, got some payrolls that were actually paid this week, and did some figures. If we leave it at 66-2/3 with the rate we are going in taxes right now, if you're a single person (laborer) making \$40,000 a year, and this is a report of one labor I got this morning. After taxes, you make 62 percent of what you earned. So if we pay him 66-2/3 percent of his income for workmen's compensation, he will make more under workmen's compensation by a number of thousands of dollars, to be exact 4-2/3 percent, than he is making right now in his regular job. If that person is married, they would make 70 percent, so if they are on workmen's compensation, a married person with four dependents would make less on workmen's compensation slightly. Now this is the higher salary.

"I also got some prices for some lower salaries and we've got laborers out there at the lower salary at \$10,000 a year, and they would be hurt by this 66-2/3 benefit. They would gain more by the 80 percent figure because a single person making \$10,000 get 77 percent of his income to keep at working right now. He keeps 87 percent if he's got four dependents. It's a disincentive and I might add that if you've got union benefits, you also take the union benefits out of the man's salary and he does not have that to count when he goes and collects workmen's compensation.

"And the third point I make is presumption. I notice that some laws, I believe it is English laws, says that you are presumed guilty until you're innocent. What we have here is myself -- an employer. I am presumed guilty if an employee walks in and says, 'I got hurt.' He claims that he got hurt. I am presumed guilty. I must pay the fine, or the

bill, or whatever it be, until I can prove otherwise.

"The last point I make and it is in relation to fraud. The stopping of payments has been eliminated if we catch someone that's fraud. The people, whether we realize it or not, are stealing from the employer if they are in fraud and we must be able to stop that when that is discovered. In our own community and our courts, we call stealing something that can be punished and must be stopped immediately. We need to do the same thing with our insurance and with our business. We need to help our business environment to move on. And I might say that as far as fraud, we're saying that, yes, fraud is bad, but that the employer has a chance to defend himself. I share cases where I had an employee that works for me and the gentleman went away, claimed through our government organization and our bureaucrats claimed unemployment insurance after coming to work for me. He had left his family on the mainland to come to work in Hawaii, got a job with me, and then got a call from his wife and returned to the mainland. The decision of the government. . .bureaucrats who have decided and said that he had legitimate reason to leave my company to return to his wife and I am the one who supports the family. And yet, I see this tendency on the part of our administration, on the part of our Department of Labor and such to grant all, absolute all benefits of doubt, to the worker, feeling that the employer can afford anything and I share that. . . and I ask for these four points to be addressed should this bill pass on the Senate side.

"Mahalo."

Representative Shito then rose to speak in favor of the bill with serious reservation, stating:

"Section 14 of the bill which establishes a State compensation insurance fund should not have that incorporated in the bill. If we are to have a study, Mr. Speaker, it should have been encompassed in a House Concurrent Resolution, but outlines the perimeters of the study.

"Secondly, Mr. Speaker, I was faced once before whether to vote for a bill as such and I find myself in the same situation again tonight. The measure before us does not go far enough and the recommendation is contained in the Haldi report.

"It is for this reason I am voting for the bill with very serious reservations.

"Thank you."

Representative Ikeda then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against House Bill 463, House Draft 2, and with a very heavy heart, I might add.

"Mr. Speaker, if there ever was a bill that I would like to support this session, House Bill 463 would be it. We have, over the last four years, wrestled with this problem of increasing costs within the workers' compensation system, looking for ways to relieve this problem.

"We established a Governor's Commission in 1980 to study the problem and, last session, this Legislature placed a one-year moratorium on workers' compensation premium rate increases and at the same time, commissioned a study at the cost of \$150,000. The intent of that study was to provide a comprehensive examination of Hawaii's workers' compensation system in comparison with other states and to provide objective recommendations for improving the system.

"Insurers agreed to the moratorium because they were hopeful that costs could be reduced after careful study and amendments to the law by the Legislature.

"Mr. Speaker, we now have the results of that study, known as the Haldi study, as well as the results of another study conducted by Mr. John Lewis, based on a closed claim study, and commissioned by the Chamber of Commerce. Both studies identify the major cost factors in the workers' compensation system. The Haldi report shows that between 1977 and 1983, benefit payments per employee have increased fourfold, from \$70.46 to \$271.41.

"The Lewis study notes that Hawaii has the highest frequency of lost time cases of the 45 states studies; the frequency of permanent partial disability cases is the second highest; and permanent total disability frequency is the highest by a wide margin -- 97 per 100,000 compared to an average of 9 per 100,000.

"Both studies also noted that Supreme Court decisions interpreting statutory language have also con-

tributed to the high number of cases coming into the system, as well as their cost.

"Both studies also agree that much can be done by the Legislature statutorily to correct this situation. Mr. Speaker, the Lewis study also goes a step further and points out potential cost increases in certain areas if no changes are made to the current law. And, Mr. Speaker, all of this is relevant as we analyze the bill before us. Let's really look at what this bill does.

"First of all, it does nothing to address the major problem of pure loss costs--the fact that direct benefit payments to injured workers are essentially running out of control in this State.

"Proponents of the bill will argue that the section on temporary total disability gives the employer the right to ask the Director to investigate if the employer feels that the injured employee's benefits exceeds his regular after-tax pay in such a manner that the benefits are an actual disincentive to the employee's prompt return to work. And the Director may for good cause adjust benefits. However, Mr. Speaker, the bill goes on to say that in the event of a conflict, Section 386-31 (a) and (b) shall prevail. This totally negates the whole process.

"In addition, Mr. Speaker, no change has been made in the way benefits are computed and paid a part-time employee. Under our present system, a part-time employee will almost always collect more in benefits than he would in wages if he returned to work.

"Proponents of this bill will argue that the change in the waiting period from 2 calendar days to 2 working days will reduce costs. Mr. Speaker, while this is a minor improvement to the present system, both the Haldi and Lewis studies say that any cost savings are questionable and will not result in true cost savings.

"Secondly, Mr. Speaker, this bill fails to address the problem of liberal court interpretations of the law and, in fact, may justify further expansion of decisions to allow more cases into the system.

"Much evidence has been presented showing that judges in Hawaii have interpreted statutory language common to other states in a significantly different manner. And, as John

Lewis points out, the statutory presumption of compensability is such an instance.

"This bill sets up a separate evidentiary standard of 'a preponderance of the evidence' to overcome presumption for claims involving cardiovascular disease, stroke, hypertension and mental stress. While this change may seem like an improvement, given the legislative intent expressed in the committee reports, there is no conclusive reason to believe that there will be a significant change in the system. Also, Mr. Speaker, at the present time, these claims account for less than one percent of the total amount of claims although I will admit that it has a potential for growth, especially if this bill passes. The remainder of the injuries will still be decided by the 'substantial' standard.

"Third, Mr. Speaker, this bill will actually increase costs rather than reduce them.

"John Lewis, in his study, noted several aspects of the current system which, if not controlled, can be the source of substantial increases in cost in the not too distant future. The first is vocational rehabilitation. Lewis notes the change in vocational rehabilitation from counseling and job placement services to a system which provides formal training and education. He also notes that vocational rehabilitation does not serve to reduce costs of other benefits such as permanent partial disability.

"Mr. Speaker, this bill states the purpose of rehabilitation as, 'to restore an injured workers' earning capacity as cost-effectively as possible and to return the injured worker to suitable work in the active labor force as quickly as possible.'

"That little word change from 'the active labor force' in the original version of this bill, to 'suitable work' in this version, will have a major impact in increasing costs. As noted by our own State Director of Personnel Services, Mr. James Takushi, this change will 'dramatically increase costs.' Let me read the example he gave in his testimony.

"Conservation Resources Enforcement Officer III, SR 13, earning \$2,112.00 per month sustains an injury which prevents him from meeting the firearms certification requirements. Due to the inability to locate suitable employment within the State system, he is terminated. The

State has an obligation to provide vocational rehabilitation services. Under the proposed legislation, he has to be restored to his previous earning capacity. Because he was employed in a highly specialized area, we cannot find any comparable jobs in the normal labor market. Rehabilitation activities would be numerous and costly. The employee might still be deemed permanently and totally disabled if he can't be retrained and placed in a job that would provide for a salary of \$2,112.00 per month. This could occur even if the employee was physically capable of resuming some other type of employment which paid less.

"I might add, Mr. Speaker, that the State is self insured but our costs have exceeded those in the private sector.

"Four, fraud is another area which has not been adequately addressed. This bill eliminates the only existing provision that allows an employer to terminate on-going temporary disability benefits without the need for an order by the Director of Labor. If this bill passes, there will be no mandatory termination of benefits for fraud. Penalties are left to the discretion of the Director.

"It is also important to note, Mr. Speaker, that the committee report of House Draft 1 of this bill, which this version incorporates, states: 'Your committees believe that the humanitarian purposes and remedial character of the workers' compensation law cannot be ignored in enforcing Section 386-98.' One cannot help but wonder what, if any, sanctions will be imposed for fraud under these conditions.

"Mr. Speaker, this bill adds a very costly feature to the system -- an accident and fraud prevention unit which will require 9 positions and will cost approximately \$256,000 per year. This provision was retained despite the Director of Labor's testimony that 'most of the duties and responsibilities proposed for the accident prevention unit are now performed by the Division of Occupational Safety and Health.'

"And, Mr. Speaker, no provision is made to strengthen the administration of the workers' compensation program by the Department or to mandate enforcement and monitoring by the Department although these recommendations were made in the Haldi report. And finally, Mr. Speaker, this bill establishes a State com-

pensation fund in spite of the fact that Haldi found 'intense price and service competition' in the sale of workers' compensation insurance in Hawaii.

"Mr. Speaker, I asked Mr. Haldi to elaborate on what his study team did to investigate whether rates for workers' compensation insurance were disproportionately high and out of line with benefit payments. I would like to read a portion of his response.

"He said: 'I will endeavor to answer that question directly. Let me first state, though, that the attack on insurance rates, insurance industry profits and general overhead expense of the system is, in my opinion, a shibai of the first order. The major reason for this shibai, I suppose, is to deflect attention from the fact that direct benefit payments to injured workers (pure loss costs) are essentially running out of control in Hawaii. They are out of control because virtually no effort is made to control costs by either the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations or the statute.'

"Mr. Speaker, this has been an unusually long speech for me but that is because this issue is one of major importance and may very well be the most important thing we address in this decade because of its impact on the state of our State and its economy. I have tried to remind you of this over the past few days by pointing out the impact that high workers' compensation costs have had on housing, industry, and all other consumer items.

"The Governor, in his state of the State address emphasized the need to attract new business to Hawaii. He specifically targetted workers' compensation as a problem area. He said: 'Our compensation costs are higher than anywhere else in the country. And obviously we must reassess the cost-effectiveness of our workers' compensation system. All aspects of this complex program must be reviewed, including the tendency of the courts in recent years to broaden dramatically the idea of what is a work-related injury.'

"Mr. Speaker, Hawaii is in a crisis situation. We have not been able to create an adequate number of high level jobs and therefore have experienced a 'brain drain.' We need to improve the business climate and our anti-business image if we expect to attract new industries to Hawaii

and thus create new jobs. We must do this or suffer the consequences. We are no longer a plantation economy.

"Mr. Speaker, House Bill 463, House Draft 2, will not help the situation and, therefore, I must vote against it. I would like to leave you with one last thought as expressed by Dr. Haldi in his letter to me.

"Dr. Haldi said: 'If the Legislature so desires, it of course may ignore the obvious. But the Legislature should at least be put on notice that it is engaging in willful and massive self-deception which will not change the level of pure loss costs, nor will it change the marked underlying trend toward higher benefit payments.'

"Mr. Speaker, I ask you and my colleagues not to engage in 'willful and massive self-deception' and to join me in voting no on this bill. We can come back next year and do a better job.

"Thank you."

Representative Kim rose to speak in favor of H.B. No. 463, HD 2, with some reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, although I am for this bill, I am disappointed that we have neglected to heed--in full--the recommendations set forth in the Haldi report. Instead of implementing an objective study which we commissioned, we have a bill before us which has been 'manipulated' by various groups in our community so that much needed changes will occur only in piecemeal fashion.

"Because of this, Mr. Speaker, I believe that the amendments in House Bill 463, House Draft 2, which addresses the waiting period and creates a new standard of evidence in the presumption clause is a giant step in the right direction. Without addressing the presumption, Mr. Speaker, every disease, every heart failure, every illness due to normal aging process will be determined to be work related.

"We must remind ourselves the basic objective of the workers' compensation law, and that is to take care of the worker who is legitimately hurt on the job. I don't believe that the law was intended to compensate the worker who after work engages in a sports activity, collapses, and then links it to the stress of the work place. It is about time that we looked at the

loopholes. It is about time that we look at our current law and it has been shown that our current law encourages people to stay home long after the injury is over. We must begin to address measures that will encourage the worker to go back to work.

"This bill in no way, Mr. Speaker, will rob the worker of his benefits. After all, I am a worker, you are a worker, my father and brother are construction workers, my mother has worked in the hotel for 20 years. I believe that this bill only begins to address the high cost of workers' compensation. When the cost of business gets too high, Mr. Speaker, two things happen.

"First, the cost is passed on to the worker or consumer; and second, when cost is so high, businesses go out of business. We are beginning to see some of our major industries slowly die. These people who are now out of work, they no longer need to have to worry about the benefits of workers' compensation. This law will do them no good. They are worried about finding a job so that they can feed their families. I urge you, my colleagues, don't pass any more of the high cost on to the consumers and let us not put any more consumers out of work.

"For these reasons, Mr. Speaker, I plan to vote in favor of the bill but with reservations.

"Thank you."

Representative Nakata then rose to speak in favor of the bill with reservations, stating:

"My reservations are based on the changes in the presumption clause and the retroactivity. My support is based on the creation of the State fund. We do have a crisis in workmen's compensation. It's squeezing the small business person, it's squeezing the consumer, and if it squeezes much tighter, it will hit the employees.

"However, as Representative Cavasso mentioned, we had a system that worked, that was in balance, with the worker on one side and the union; and the other side, the employer and the insurance company. The balance was fairly even. Somewhere along the way, things went out of whack and it seems that this happened when the insurance industry found that it was easier to increase rates and continue to pay

benefits than to contest or to vigorously investigate cases.

"Certainly, benefit levels have risen. As Representative Ikeda mentioned, four times between 1977 and 1983. However, in that same time period, premiums collected in this State tripled, and if you look at the quantitative difference between collection and payout, what you find is that the difference in 1983 is more than twice what it was in 1977. If you also look at these numbers, you find that the insurance industry has returned less than 50-cents on the dollar in benefits to the workers. If you look at all those years, beginning in about the mid-1970s, this is what you find. So, the insurance industry makes its money off investments and it also has more than 50 percent of the premiums that have been paid in -- far more than adequate for the expenses, I believe.

"But, I think that we, too, bear responsibility in all this. Why has it been so easy for the industry to increase the rates? Is it the Insurance Commissioner? Is it us in our oversight?

"The industry has had no incentive to investigate and to police the cases that come before them. There is responsibility to be borne all around.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tungpalan then rose to speak in favor of the bill with serious reservations, stating:

"I will be voting for this bill because it will establish a State workers' compensation insurance fund. We have heard from State fund experts from California and Arizona who have stated that 'operating under our present law and given the amount of premiums written and losses incurred, if there were a State fund in existence in Hawaii in 1983, that fund would have returned twelve or thirteen percent dividends to employers in this State.' Let me say again, that these dividends would have been returned under our present law.

"If you recall, 1983 was the same year insurance companies came in and requested a 55 percent increase from our Insurance Commissioner. They got an average 29 percent and were allowed to raise premiums to 54 percent for certain employers. Establishing a State fund system would encourage competition in the marketplace and ensure businessmen and

women affordable policies with improved services.

"House Bill 463, House Draft 2, also contains measures for an accident and fraud prevention unit. This is not an adversarial unit -- it is one to aid both the employer and the employee. The only way everyone wins in this system is through good safety programs. We are trying here to keep accidents at a minimum, thereby reducing the frequency of claims.

"The reservations I have with this bill deal with two amendments made in the committee on Friday. We are penalizing both employees and employers by docking the injured worker's first day's pay. In so doing, we will be the only State in the union to do this as all other states allow their injured workers to recapture lost pay. What we are doing in effect is establishing a punitive system of workers' compensation. We are saying to injured workers that you will be docked for the first two days of any injury. We are also penalizing the employers of those injured workers who have sick leave because these businesses ultimately will have to pay the total cost of the first two days of injury. The only party who benefits here is the insurance company.

"The second serious reservation I have about this bill pertains to the lowering of the burden of proof when a claim is filed for work-related cardiovascular disease, cerebral disease, hypertension, mental stress, or anything linked to the natural aging process or consequent degeneration of the tissue, organ or body parts. Essentially what we are doing is eliminating the presumption clause and, as such, will cause more litigation and higher costs. Furthermore, Mr. Michael Camalario of the National Council of Compensation Insurance told us that changing the presumption would reduce the current cost in workers' compensation by only two percent. Mr. John Haldi, himself, said it might reduce costs by only one, three or five percent. Therefore, I don't think we will be reducing costs by changing the presumption. In fact, I believe we will be doing the opposite. Not only will there be more litigation, but there will also be need for more medical testimonies and the side that has the most medical experts will ultimately win. This type of system does not insure justice for all but favors the one with the most money.

"However, Mr. Speaker and my

fellow colleagues, after weighing this bill today, I believe it deserves to be passed on to the Senate for further consideration. As such, I will be voting aye with the noted reservations."

Representative Hashimoto rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to speak in favor of this bill with grave reservations very briefly in the interest of time.

"My major objection lies in the creation of the State fund that I think that the chairman and vice chairman of the Consumer Protection and Commerce Committee have very eloquently expressed my views. It is my hope, Mr. Speaker, that as this bill works through our legislative process, many of the concerns and reservations that have been expressed here tonight will be addressed in a very positive manner.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At 8:05 o'clock p.m., Representative Ikeda asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 8:15 o'clock p.m.

Representative Blair then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Blair's speech is as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, while I will be voting for House Bill 463, I must go on record as expressing my unhappiness with the substance of this bill and with the procedure by which the bill was developed. Regarding the substance of the bill, I will be brief. The issue is highly complex. That is why we commissioned the Haldi study. Despite this complexity, Mr. Speaker, the bottom line is a clear and simple one. This issue is before us for one reason and one reason only: the high cost of workers' compensation in Hawaii as compared with other states. As a percentage of payroll, it is my understanding that our employers are paying 2-1/2 times the national average. It is unfortunate and inexplicable that this House has chosen to ignore the fundamental issue of cost. As the bill came out of the Consumer Protection and Labor

Committees, it actually would have increased the cost of workers' compensation insurance. This is nothing less than astonishing.

"The bill before us today is a significant improvement over the product of the Consumer Protection and Labor Committees, but it is not even close to what is necessary if we are to resolve the problem. For that reason, Mr. Speaker, I must express grave reservations about the substance of this bill. I am only supporting its passage to allow further consideration in the Senate. Although I am not optimistic that the Senate will improve very much on the draft before us, we should all vote for it so that there will at least be an opportunity. I assure you, Mr. Speaker, that when the bill is back before us from the conference committee, I will not be voting based upon procedural necessities but on the merits of the bill. My vote will depend on how well it meets the needs of the community for a relief from the high cost of this mandatory insurance.

"I do not wish to dwell on the procedural problems that have plagued this bill. However, the handling of House Bill 463 has been outrageous and I must go on record as protesting it.

"As a member of both the Consumer Protection and Committee and Committee on Labor and Industrial Relations, I sat through more hearings on this bill than on any other bill in the eleven years that I've been a member of this House. At the end of all of those hearings (for what I presume must seem like good reason to the Chairman of the lead committee, but which I cannot accept) members of the committees were presented with a draft of the bill only minutes before the deadline and told that we had two choices: 1) sign the bill in spite of our reservations and hope that it would be amended and improved, or 2) vote against the bill and see the issue languish for another year. In light of all the work of the committee members, I think that this procedure was a gross disservice to us and made an absolute mockery of the democratic process. This affront to participation by members of the committees was compounded when the current draft of the bill came out of the Finance Committee at a time when it was impossible, for procedural reasons, to offer any amendments. Once again, we were forced to vote for the bill because of the desire to

keep the issue alive so that further amendments might be made in the Senate, to strengthen the bill and reduce the cost of workers' compensation insurance.

"Very well, Mr. Speaker, I will bide my time, knowing that I will have an opportunity to express my displeasure if this bill is not significantly improved in the Senate or in the conference committee. I submit to you that while the apparent strategy used to pass this bill has, thus far, stifled input from the majority of the members of this House, it ultimately will fail. The bill cannot pass without the support of a majority. As things now stand, I am perfectly prepared to withhold my support unless the final draft presented to the House significantly reduces the cost of workers' compensation insurance. It will be a travesty if we pass a bill which makes only token improvements because, in doing so, we are only attempting to reduce the pressure for reform. I would rather see the pressure increased, if that is what is necessary to affect a fundamental reform. This is not a case where a small portion of a loaf is better than none at all.

"In closing, Mr. Speaker, I stress my belief that amendment of the workers' compensation law is one of the most important items on our agenda. I rank it second only to the budget. In light of its importance, I am especially dismayed with the methods used to force a totally inadequate bill down our throats.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. That concludes my remarks on House Bill 463."

Representative Liu then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, on the issue of presumption, I guess a lot of figures were thrown out concerning the actual cost and loss attributable to the present presumption clause in the evidentiary standards related to that clause. Let me just say that in all the testimonies which came out, the thing which impressed me the most was the one lack of real analysis which was made on that point; that is, the two percent and one percent figures that have been thrown out. It seems to me to be really based on an analysis of appeals decisions to both the Labor Board of Appeals as well as Supreme Court decisions and not really any analysis on how that particular clause works in the actual

rendering of decisions on the hearings level and how it sets up certain standards and approach to making decisions at all levels of the system so that the cost attributable to that clause currently is, I feel, probably much higher but in need of further analysis.

"The change in the bill, I believe, will merely cause greater confusion than what currently exists and the confusion that granted that would have lasted for some time, even in accepting Haldi's proposals. But, as is with the two standards, I concur with the Representative from the Leeward side who is also the chairman of the Corrections Committee in questioning the constitutionality of the section as constructed.

"Finally, let me say, too, that the lack of leadership on this issue from the Administration, I think, is a bothersome issue, Mr. Speaker. It has been an issue; it's been with us, at least the awareness of it, has been around for four to five years, perhaps longer, and the lack of sense of any clear direction as to which way those who have to administrate the law. . . how they felt the law should go, I thought was a real detriment in coming up with a very constructive proposal.

"Concerning the comp fund, let me just say that for many reasons already stated, that I just feel like we are going through a black hole in hyperspace and I am very afraid that we are going to end up in 'Jabber-the-hut's' dungeon -- that creature coming from Star Wars fame.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Isbell then rose to speak in favor of the bill with some reservations, stating:

"House Draft 2 is not terribly different from House Draft 1 which passed, as you know, on a week ago, Friday.

"On his opening statements, the Department of Labor head stated that he thought that the purpose of the bill was to lower the cost to the employer, not to raise benefits, which is what House Draft 1 did and House Draft 2 is not much different, and this is what it has done. It has not lowered the cost at all. I also recall him stating that to implement the bill, he would need at least \$1-million, or very close to it, and 45 positions or more. So we have now added another cost, not just to the business directly

in the community but to government. When government raises costs, everybody pays because it's their tax money.

"People who can least afford to pay for workmen's compensation is the consumer and workmen's compensation is a consumer bill. When you are going to build a home, 16- to 20 percent of the cost of that home is to pay for workmen's compensation premium. When you go to the grocery store and buy your groceries, the cost is passed on to you and the groceries are higher.

"Workmen's compensation is one of the reasons for the high cost of living and only one in the State of Hawaii. Until we truly address the costs and realize that when we add on investigative units, add on more personnel, a State fund which have not even mentioned the millions of dollars necessary nor the personnel for that, then we have to realize that we've got to tackle the problem, and perhaps the best way is to start with this bill which is the only living vehicle we have. Otherwise, I probably would not be voting for it. When it goes over to the Senate, I hope that they massage it, work with it, and when it goes into conference, I hope we come out with something that we can live with. If not, perhaps what we have done is bring a whole new awareness to a very big problem. We put it into the focus it needed; people are understanding workmen's compensation more -- certainly, I do. I really didn't understand it well to begin with but I feel very familiar with it now, and I know we have to do something, so I would hope that we look at this as only the beginning of something that is very important to the State of Hawaii.

"I thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kihano rose and requested a ruling of his possible conflict as he is in the insurance business, and the Chair ruled, "no conflict."

Representative Kihano then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I am in favor of this measure and to cut it short, I want to have the remarks by the chairman of Consumer Protection Committee as well as the vice chairman as part of my own in the Journal."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Blair rose and requested a conflict ruling as he occasionally represents plaintiffs in workers' compensation matters, and the Chair ruled, "no conflict."

Representative Marumoto rose to speak against H.B. 463, HD 2, stating:

"I think, Mr. Speaker, about this time, we could all write a book entitled, Everything You Wanted to Know About Workers' Compensation, But Were Afraid to Ask.

"I have really been impressed with my colleagues who have labored long and hard over this complex subject and have mastered the intricate features of this type of insurance as our Representative from Kona just remarked. It seems like we have been living with this subject day and night for about a month. Last week, we Republicans, and many Majority members were up in arms with the changes made to the original workers' compensation bill.

"Today, we are facing essentially the same bill with some new wrinkles.

"Some of us are pacified with the new wrinkles made by the Finance Committee. Not to take anything away from the amendments made to the bill -- some of them were good ones -- but the amendments were made to the same old law which has been causing us grief and driving us bankrupt. That is why I am voting no this evening.

"Even in its present form, many of my colleagues have expressed dissatisfaction with this measure, but they have indicated that they be voting aye because they do not wish to kill the 'messenger' to the Senate who holds the only hope for further improvement. The 'messenger' will perhaps return to this House with just such a message.

"One year ago, we commissioned a learned gentleman to review our workers' compensation system. This year, Dr. John Haldi presented us with an objective overview of our law and how it functions.

"Dr. Haldi found that our costs were inordinately high compared to other states because of our high frequency and high severity rates and that our benefits were adequate but we were paying too much because of our presumption clause which allows the high frequency to occur.

"Dr. Haldi recommended change -- massive change. He listed over thirty recommendations which would overhaul the system, but we are adopting only the waiting/retroactive period change and taking some of his suggestions in the medical/legal cost areas. We are not making any systemic changes. We have totally rejected his idea to base workmen's compensation insurance on wages lost. And until we realize that we must accept his total package, we are stuck with our old, out-of-control structure with costs that will continue to climb. We will continue to have no time limits on vocational rehabilitation, no changes in benefits, no end to disincentives in the program, and we will have an untested medical cost containment section, a questionable accident prevention program, and a controversial State-run insurance company.

"I am not optimistic that this bill, as it presently exists, will help our employers and our workers. It will not encourage job opportunities or the economic climate. It will not help Hawaii.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Crozier rose and requested a conflict ruling as he "has a permanent partial disability claim and I receive money from a mutilated finger and also for a damaged neck," and the Chair ruled, "no conflict."

Representative Crozier then rose to speak in favor of the bill with reservations, stating:

"I will just make it short, sir. So far, there have been six people speaking against the bill and with myself, there's eleven of us speaking with reservations. I think the message to the Senate is that we are not happy with this bill. This bill is not flying through the process; it is crawling through, and they have to do something to upgrade the bill further.

"Thank you, sir."

Representative Grauly rose and requested a conflict ruling as "I represent between 30 to 40 workers' compensation claimants at the present time," and the Chair ruled, "no conflict."

Representative Jones rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, if I could just ask that the comments of Representative

Marumoto be incorporated in the Journal as my own."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 463, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WORKERS' COMPENSATION", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 43 ayes to 8 noes, with Representatives Cavasso, Hemmings, Ikeda, Jones, Liu, Marumoto, Medeiros and Pfeil voting no.

"The alarming rise in child-abuse and neglect cases, both on the national level and here in Hawaii, urgently required a review of our existing laws governing child abuse. I commend the Judiciary chairman for passing out a bill which offers a significant and timely remedy to minimize the trauma a child victim experiences during investigation proceedings and courtroom examinations.

"However, since our purpose is to protect the child while ensuring accuracy and validity of the child's testimony, I hope that the court will adopt rules and regulations to ensure that the total number of interviews a child is subjected to, be minimized to avoid confusion and alienation of the child during investigation, and that persons conducting the interviews utilize a script of questions prepared and mutually agreed upon by the social worker, police officer, medical staff, and other persons professionally involved who are required to collect information from the victim.

"Allowing the use of videotaped testimony in court is a step forward toward what I hope is a continuing effort to combat the problems of child abuse and neglect in our State."

Representative Shon rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak regrettably against this bill. I realize the work that has gone into this bill and the well-meaning intentions for this to stimulate the building of housing. . .the intention of the bill is to increase the feasibility of private development in conjunction with the Hawaii Housing Authority.

"However, I think that this bill really goes away from the primary intent of the statute that is involved. The statute reads: 'The Legislature has determined that there exists a critical shortage of housing units for lower income residents.'

"What this bill does, Mr. Speaker, is to allow developers the enormous benefits under this section in exchange for a mere 20 percent of the unit to be set aside for low income. The language of the bill, to be sure, says, 'at least 20 percent,' but what business person in their right mind would not hold out for the lowest percent possible.

"What are these benefits that is involved with this section of the law?

"I was really shocked, Mr. Speaker, when I read chapter 359G. I wonder how many of us sitting here, on the floor of this House, have had a clear picture as to what we're getting into, and I would like to quote just briefly from the law in terms of the benefits that would be accrued to any developer that went in with the Hawaii Housing Authority under the provisions of this bill.

"Quote: 'Project shall be exempt from all statutes, ordinances, charter provisions, and rules of any governmental agency relating to zoning and construction standards for subdivisions, development, and improvement of land and the construction, improvement, and sale of homes thereon.'

"Can you imagine that, Mr. Speaker? Exempt from all these laws, and just for a mere 20 percent dedicated to low income. What developer in a situation where the land was zoned, say, for a hundred and fifty feet, in terms of high-rises. . . what developer would not agree to go up to three hundred and fifty feet just to get the exemptions? And, sure, they'd dedicate 20 percent. But this could really do violence to our sense of zoning in certain neighborhoods and I realize that up to now, this law has not been utilized. The existing law says 60 percent. Perhaps, that is indeed too high. But I am not really sure that going down to 20 percent is in the intention of the original chapter.

"I have talked with the consumer housing task force people and they tell me this bill has been defeated several years in a row and they say that the argument that housing cannot be built with a higher percentage of low income and for them that means approximately 75,000 or less, that recent developments in expandable housing and in self-help housing have indeed proved that these houses can be built, that the incentives are coming onto line.

"So, I would hope that we would not go leaping off the tallest high-rise or reform here, Mr. Speaker. I think we should take another look at what we're doing. This bill, while attempting to respond to provision that has not yet attracted much attention and use, attempts to abandon the very purpose of the chapter, I think. If the Senate would have no more amendments to this bill, this bill would fly through as it is. And while the committee report does have very strong and admirable language which indicates that there should be rules and regulations that somehow creates a grading system and a waiting system for the various benefits as respect to the percentage of low income housing. In spite of the committee report, the bill does not have that, and I am very concerned that if this bill were to pass and the Senate made no amendments, we would not get into conference with this bill, that we

would be in a sense saying, anyone can go in with HHA for a mere 20 percent and getting exempt from all kinds of zoning and other regulations.

"I don't think this is a proper kind of thing that we are after. What we are after is more housing and not really providing a very small amount of low income housing in all kinds of urban and other areas in which the density in the zoning has been set to conform to the standards and the sensibilities of a community.

"So, I would urge all of you to reconsider on this bill and if the bill should pass, I would hope that those who are involved in a potential conference committee would look very carefully at the proposed rules and regulations which are not in the bill now.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1450, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING PROJECTS", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives Isbell, Kamali'i, Kim and Shon voting no.

"As introduced, it would have mandated some changes in the law concerning animal therapy, allowing pets to visit their owners who are ill, and I would have voted against that. However, because it has been made permissive, as I said to start off, it does not change the situation as it exists today and, as such, it really comes under the heading of, I think, 'Unnecessary Legislation', so I vote no.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Shon then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"In so doing, Mr. Speaker, I want to indicate that this bill should be opposed not because it has to do with churches, and I attend the churches well and I think many of us may be involved on either side of this. It is not a religious issue.

"The issue is, Mr. Speaker, of the appropriateness of potentially large-scale activities in prime

agricultural lands. And as I outline some of the objections, I pray very much that some of those green slips may move toward the front row.

"Mr. Speaker, initially, when this bill was brought to the House, the language was much more restrictive than it is now. There were some smaller churches that felt that it was appropriate for them to be able to get permits in agricultural areas without going through the regular process that we require of everyone else. However, Mr. Speaker, this bill does not do that for little churches only.

"This bill is so broad that it includes not only the marginal agricultural lands, but also our very best agricultural lands -- A&B lands included. It is the intention of this bill that potentially intense activities could, in fact, be conducted on our best agricultural lands without getting the required permit that we require of many others. As I said, the original language was very restrictive, and I don't really know why the committees amended the bill to broaden it.

"One of the people who came and testified on behalf of the church indicated that they would like to build a parking lot for 5,000 cars, and that is why this kind of a bill was needed. I would submit to this body that a parking lot for 5,000 cars is an inappropriate use to be put in prime agricultural lands without going through the regular process. Any congregation that large can certainly afford to go through the process, and the process does not guarantee a denial. The process is to ensure that what goes on is consistent with our goals and our standards for prime agricultural land.

"The language of this bill indicates church and temple buildings, including but not limited to their offices, rectories and parking lots for church and religious uses and it provides for incremental development under fifteen acres. That's a curious word, 'incremental' development. That means one after another in common use, and I think that we should be very aware that this bill, because of the word 'incremental', does not limit itself to activities of fifteen acres. We are very aware that in modern times, the definition of a church or religion is not the same as it has been in the past. The definitions are rapidly expanding as are the rights of those who claim protection under the definition of church and religious practices. We do not know today, if

we were to pass this bill, that there would be many activities under the guise of religious practice that while may be religious are certainly incompatible with use in a prime agricultural area.

"I think that the intention of the bill was very good, but somewhere along the way, it got mutilated to the point that it is no longer appropriate. We are now in the process of evaluating our agricultural lands. I don't think this is the time that we should be granting wholesale exemptions for activities that we are unaware of. This is a very speculative kind of bill, Mr. Speaker, and I would hope that all of us would see that this does not, by voting this down, this does not stifle small churches. By voting this down, this indicates that we are standing up for the laws of the State that indicate the aina is something to be protected; that standards are to be applied to each and every use of the land and if that were appropriate, certainly, churches can go, but not to say that any institution which is going to call itself a church and any subsidiary activity of that church is somehow appropriate no matter what it is.

"I urge all of you to think very seriously if you have not indicated a no vote that this is not for small churches only. This is for many other activities that we have to be careful.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"After talking to Representative Shon and going over it, even being a good Christian, I am really a farmer at heart, and looking at what could happen, I would hope that my colleagues would vote no, and maybe we could get a roll call vote on this one, Mr. Speaker.

"Thank you."

At 9:34 o'clock p.m., Representative Ige asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 9:45 o'clock p.m.

Representative Cavasso then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"The State of Hawaii, Mr. Speaker, has historically encouraged the building of churches, recognizing the

positive influence the churches of all denominations and backgrounds have had on our society.

"One. . . I am taking any denomination. Father Damien is a legend and rightfully so -- right in front of our own Capitol -- first producing the written expressions of the language of the people of Hawaii, then making education a reality is a well-known contribution of the church in our islands. Until recently, struggling groups could build churches freely in Hawaii as long as they owned a minimal required parcel of land. It's the very expression, country church, which brings the image of that which is Hawaiian history of our islands. Repressive societies of the world do not usually pass laws forbidding churches to be built or against religious freedom. They accomplish their purpose by passing laws and enacting regulations that make it difficult and sometimes impossible for one to freely pursue their religious beliefs.

"I am in support of House Bill No. 430, Mr. Speaker, which will change the zoning laws back to our historic position of allowing churches to be built on agricultural land if they met all the proper codes required by the respective City and County ordinances. I appeal to this State Legislature to maintain our historic position.

"Mr. Speaker, the point was made that this is an inappropriate process by the previous speaker. To term something of this sort inappropriate is against the Constitution of our land. He said that this process does not deny the right to build the church. Well, Mr. Speaker, that is exactly what we have happening on Maui right now. This process is denying the right to build the church. They cannot even go by special permit to build the church on agricultural land; in this case, on the island of Maui.

"The statement was made that how can you determine between church and recreational activities?

"Mr. Speaker, I say again that it is not our place to judge this one area which is so important -- religious freedom.

"The intent of the bill was to limit it to fifteen acres. The point is that if the church is within and under the limit -- there is a limit presently on fifteen acres -- and the desire is to keep it within that limit.

"The question was made: 'How can we permit so many cars?' I believe that number was an exaggeration but even if we have a thousand or five thousand cars in a church activity, we do not have the right in our State to block a religious gathering.

"The statement was made: 'We do not know what religious practices are incompatible with agricultural land.' I say that we cannot and should not absolutely forbid this as our law is doing right now.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Crozier rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"The first speaker said that somebody wants to build a parking lot for five thousand cars. I am not sure how many cars it takes to fill the Stadium, but I am under the impression it takes between five thousand and seven thousand cars to fill our Aloha Stadium. I doubt that there's any church now in Hawaii that has plans. . .or is that like a congregation, for a need to have five thousand cars parking lot, so I think he may have. . .whoever gave him that information may have been a little bit zealous at the time, and I would assume maybe it was a little smaller than that.

"With that, I would like for the rest of the members to consider the person testifying before the committee. . . you know how nervous they get; sometimes they exaggerate, not intentionally, but just under the constraints they on. Please reconsider.

"Thank you."

Representative Jones then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I must admit that some of the wording in the document, as it is, is questionable. I am not sure that somebody can make a bold statement that incremental means definitely illegally they were adding on acre after acre, fifteen acre parcels.

"I do want to say, Mr. Speaker, that by saying no to this, we will be limiting a whole number of small churches. On the Big Island of Hawaii, Maui, Kauai and other places, that they are growing and they need to find roots.

"Each colleague who was here, who was in the last session with me, knows the strong stand that I have

taken to protect our prime ag lands. Many times, against some of my own colleagues, I have gone with others to ensure that our prime ag lands are protected. To bring the specter of a bunch of wide-eyed, crazy people, taking over our State with fifteen acre parcels, is spurious, at least.

"I realize that we must ensure prime ag lands for the future of our State. And I realize that there are perhaps some questions concerning this statute that can be solved with case law. But do we need to throw a baby out with the bath water? Year after year, several Representatives have brought this issue up.

"A number of churches on the outer islands, especially, are tired of waiting. They need help and they are not rich. They're simply trying to find a place that they can call home. When the Protestants controlled this State, of which I am, a number of them were antagonistic toward allowing Catholics to use the land, and I abhor that. The Catholics and the Protestants became powerful, they had problems with the Mormons. And now, we find people of all these different kinds of faith raising the spectre of some easterly legends coming in and causing all kinds of problems. I think that it is easy to raise a straw ghost of a problem and forget the major issue here that our State and our country is founded upon religious freedom. And limiting it to fifteen acre parcels is not going to eat up this precious aina that I have fought to preserve, and I strongly encourage my colleagues to vote aye on this bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Souki then rose to speak in favor of the bill with some reservations, stating:

"I believe that the church is entitled to build on whatever property it sees fit to build on but I also believe that it should follow the same standards as all the citizens of the land, that they are no better, no worse than any of us, where I believe we should give some prerogatives to the church, but if we are to maintain the separation of church and state, they must be treated the same like we are.

"And for this, Mr. Speaker, I wish we all consider this bill very carefully.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Anderson, in rebuttal, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I don't want to go into this all evening but I would say that some years ago, we had a group in Kailua that would want to take over agricultural land in Maunawili. They had a full plan. They were going to put in a school, a convalescent home for some of their aged; they were going to have parking, and they had another facility that they were looking at that they weren't too sure of. And they were also going to try to see if they could take care of some of the farmers. The community was up in arms. That church group lost their battle. If this goes through, that means they can come back and not only take that fifteen acres, but others, in increments.

"There is a process that we should go through. I am not saying it is wrong to take over ag land. There's lots of ag land that is not being utilized properly. But can you imagine having something like we have in Laie that takes acres and acres -- it's a beautiful deal. But if we are going to have a temple that is that large for every denomination, on every island, we'd be in trouble. You have a process that you have to go through and if we ruin that, we're all going to be in deep kim chee, if you want to call it that. It's a heck of a process to go ahead and say, why don't we just take care of this group; they're the only one. Then you turn around and find out that A group, B group and C group are all interested in the same thing, and the lands are all going to be taken over, little by little, and is probably going to be for the best use of that particular group. But it is most certainly not going to be in the best use for the rest of the taxpayers of this State and this county.

"I ask you, very seriously, to look at what we are doing with ag land. We are going to have to make some changes, but look at it very carefully on every parcel that we give away. I hope that you vote no on this.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Cavasso rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to address it one more time.

"The First Amendment and the Constitution of our nation says, 'Congress shall make no law res-

pecting religion or prohibiting the free exercise of it.'

"We do have cases in Kailua, Mr. Speaker, where people have built a church in the community has come up in arms against them. Whatever church it be, Mr. Speaker, it is only this law which is protecting them. We have a church in Hilo which was built, Mr. Speaker, and the community is now saying they do not want a church in that community.

"Mr. Speaker, the Constitution is the only protection we have prohibiting the free exercise. Congress, our State, shall make no law prohibiting the free exercise thereof.

"Mr. Speaker, I say that I concur with Representative Jones and ask that we consider this bill, that we pass it to the Senate, that in committee that we work with the Senate closely. I concur with Representative Souki's concern and again say, pass it out. Do not take a chance on prohibiting the free exercise of religion in our State for it may come against any of us.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

"Mr. Speaker, I will make it brief as the hour is late.

"This bill serves no useful purpose except to insulate the Boards of Directors of certain large corporations from the annoyance of having a minority interest expressing its position on the Board. While those of us in the Democratic Majority may understand this inclination, I think we would all admit that without the Minority, the process is less balanced and I think the same thing can be said for what will happen if this bill is allowed to pass.

"I would note only that the Senate earlier today had the good sense to kill this bill and I would urge the members to share the same wisdom.

"Thank you."

Representative Liu then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Also, in the interest of time, I will keep my remarks short and just indicate that this bill, in fact, really does further the Democratic process in terms of formations of corporations by giving them an option to either include or not to include cumulative

voting in their by-laws.

"As such, I do not concur with the prior statement that this somehow impinges upon the rights of minority shareholders. It allows us much or greater rights under this bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tom then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I am really, really very proud to speak on a bill which represents a real genuine attempt to revise our Hawaii Penal Code which has been in existence since 1973.

"House Bill 100 was a joint referral made to the Judiciary and Corrections Committees. As chairman of the Judiciary Committee, I want to especially thank chairman Menor of Corrections, and vice chairman Metcalf of Judiciary and Blair of Corrections, and to all, to every single member of the Judiciary and Corrections Committees for working so very hard in coming up with this end result under House Draft 1.

"House Bill 100, House Draft 1, defines or it refines, it fine-tunes the Code. It does not call for any sweeping changes to our laws. The Penal Code is working and it's worked for the past decade. We've merely fine-tuned it and improved on it and made it better by clarifying the substantive laws that we have in our books and maintaining our sentencing structure and making it reflect the views of the community by placing all sentencing options on the same level, whether it is imprisonment or probation.

"This is one bill that we, the entire House of Representatives of the State of Hawaii, can take credit for. This bill is not a mere piecemeal approach to improving our Penal Code. It is an overall positive approach. These changes are long overdue, Mr. Speaker. They must be made now. The people of Hawaii deserve no less.

"Again, members, thank you so very much for your kokua, your support.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 100, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PENAL CODE", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 100 had passed Third Reading at 10:10 o'clock p.m.

Representative Kiyabu moved that H.B. No. 1350, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Souki.

Representative Kiyabu rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I speak today for the people of Hawaii. While the immediate issue at hand is the passage of House Bill 1350, House Draft 1, I sense that there is more at stake than you and I may realize.

"In the six terms that I have been elected to this body, I have seen other committed people, like you, come to this House wanting to improve the quality of life in Hawaii. I also know that it doesn't take long before we find ourselves doing the everyday business of legislation, losing sight of our vision for the people of Hawaii who elected us.

"Today, we stand at a critical point. We have the opportunity to create the foundation of a vital and dynamic future for our people. House Bill 1350, House Draft 1, is a beginning for us to take the step forward and commit ourselves to that future.

"In education, we can direct our energies toward achieving excellence. Our children deserve the finest quality education which not only provides the basics of reading and writing, but an education program which promotes an appreciation and respect for learning and continuing growth. We should elevate the standard of education for our public school system in the State. To do this, we need to make sure our schools have the teachers, books, libraries, computer and other high technology resources to prepare our children to achieve greater creativity and productivity for the good of Hawaii.

"In economic development, we can embark on a campaign to revitalize our economy. This will take a commitment to creative thinking and bold action. We must be competitive with other states in offering incentives to attract new industries, such as biotechnology, electronic design and assembly, and energy research. We must look at a program to stimulate agriculture. We must support small business by providing some major incentives. By doing all of this, we provide for a thriving business and industrial community that will create

jobs for our children.

"For the environment, we can assure the people of Hawaii a clean and healthful place to live, free of pollution and harmful agents. It is not enough that we react to crisis. 1) We must make sure we never worry about pesticides in the milk we drink; 2) We must make sure that our drinking water supply is free from harmful chemicals; 3) We must protect our people from harmful agents which may be in the food we eat; and 4) Most importantly, we must ensure the health of our people by preventing problems before they happen.

"So far, I have talked about the future. But, what about the present? What about the immediate benefits for our people now? House Bill 1350, House Draft 1, provides property tax relief for homeowners, especially for the low and middle income people. For renters, tax relief will be tripled and more people will be eligible. It also provides an income tax deduction for excise taxes paid on rent for higher income renters. It exempts groceries and prescription drugs from the 4 percent excise tax. It reduces pyramiding of general excise tax by exempting firms engaged in manufacturing and producing Hawaiian products. The elimination of the use tax is to rid our tax system of barriers to attracting high tech and other new industries. In addition, this bill responds to the county needs for more funds by sharing our State revenues.

"What does this mean to each person in Hawaii? First of all, it means direct and immediate tax relief for low and middle income groups. It means our senior citizens can live with a peace of mind, knowing they have money to meet daily living needs. It means that every taxpayer will have more money to spend on food and less to pay for drugs when they are ill. It means that Hawaii-made products can be produced at a lower cost by eliminating the excise tax on exports. It means the cost of starting a new business in Hawaii will be less with the elimination of the use tax on capital goods. Simply put, it will mean more money in the pockets of Hawaii taxpayers and more jobs for our citizens.

"I know we can argue for and against this tax reform bill. I also know some of you are concerned about the use of the moneys generated from this bill. If this bill passes this body, we must work

together to plan our programs for the fullest benefit of our people.

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, there are many people throughout our State who believe that this tax package is the key to the future of Hawaii. If we pass this bill: 1) We are voting for Hawaii's future because the development of our greatest resources lies in quality education for our children; 2) We are voting for the development of a thriving business community that can provide jobs for our children; 3) We are voting for a clean and healthy environment; 4) We are voting for tax relief for homeowners and renters; 5) We are voting for support for business; and 6) We are voting for elimination of the food and drug tax which is designed to benefit our senior citizens.

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, your vote on this measure will determine the future life in Hawaii. The people of this State have given us their trust. Now is the time to honor that trust. I ask that you vote favorably on House Bill 1350, House Draft 1.

"Thank you."

At 10:18 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 10:40 o'clock p.m., the Chair introduced to the members of the House and audience the Honorable George R. Ariyoshi, Governor of the State of Hawaii, and thanked the Governor for his presence at the session.

Representative Tam then rose to speak against H.B. No. 1350, HD 1, stating:

"Voting for this bill would label me as a person who copped out from the hotel room tax proposal to raise revenues for the State of Hawaii for I am a proponent of the hotel room tax.

"House Bill 1350, House Draft 1, proposes to increase the burden of raising income for the State of Hawaii on the local residents of our State. This is an unjust financial strain to Hawaii's people. Tourists should be paying their fair share to enjoy the pleasures of Hawaii as we, the residents of Hawaii, do when we are tourists.

"As the Representative for the 33rd District, Nuuanu to Pauoa of the State of Hawaii, I must respect the

wishes of my constituents. In a community survey conducted this year, about 60 percent of the residents stated that they favored a hotel room tax as the best way for the State to raise revenues. Only 29 percent favored an increase in the State sales tax.

"As stated by the Director of the Tax Foundation of Hawaii, House Bill 1350 would not benefit homeowners because homeowners would be paying more general excise taxes in the long run as compared to a cost savings in the reduction of real property taxes. Furthermore, the proposal would hurt low income people and make renters bear the brunt of the taxes. Raising the general excise tax would eventually have to be passed on to customers in the form of higher prices.

"I firmly believe that if this tax measure intends to place the burden on tourists, then we should have a hotel room tax as opposed to a hidden tax.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Shon then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill with many reservations.

"I had originally intended to be speaking on the opposite side and there are only three marginal reasons why I am, at this time, willing to pass this on to the Senate, and hopefully, into conference.

"The first is that I have the assurances that this does not firmly commit us against the hotel tax, that a hotel tax would be considered.

"Second. This is a comprehensive package and the package which is moving from the Senate is not a package at all. It is very fragmentary. It is not comprehensive. And I think that the fact this does attempt to deal with so many facets of our taxation system, that it is worthy of passage onward to further discussion just as the workmen's compensation bill has many problems but is worth continuing.

"Third, it does eliminate the tax on food and drugs and provide some relief for low income, and I would like to commend the author of this comprehensive plan because it is comprehensive, and I applaud the efforts to eliminate the tax on food and drugs.

But, Mr. Speaker, if this bill were to come to us in its final form, I would think that there would be some real problems, particularly for those who live in the urban core which I represent.

"First of all, Mr. Speaker, I don't really think this offers enough relief for moderate income renters -- the so-called gap group -- which is a very significant percentage of the population. Quite a number of people make more than \$29,000. I think that it is unreasonable to expect that rents would go down. I think it is unreasonable to expect that young couples who have condominiums that want to sell in order to move up into a higher quality of dwelling, that they would lower their price because property taxes are lower. They are going to try to get the most from their real property if possible. And I think that those involved in real estate will also be quite aware of the fact that the real property taxes being lower, those trying to borrow money can therefore take a little bit more of a burden on the price of dwellings. So, I think this is one area that has to be looked at very carefully, that the young, upwardly mobile or whatever, are not taken care of in this plan and do bear a burden which we should try to reduce in conference.

"Second. While I am in favor of tax benefits for manufacturers, it is, it seems to me, the tax benefits from the location of industries that we regard as one of the main benefits from locating industries and some of which may be of marginal use to us. I think of manganese nodule processing which would require the use of many chemicals, and it would seem to me that that kind of a trade-off would require that we get as much for our tax dollar if possible. And I am a little reluctant to see the exemption for all manufacturing so broad, and I think that this should be addressed in the future as to whether or not every single kind of manufacturing is worthy of this exemption as included in the bill.

"Third. This bill does seem to take a philosophical position that, in spite of the other adjustments, the ability to pay any excise tax shall be our standard and it may be a cliché but this is indeed a form of regressive taxation, and I think that we should look very carefully at the potential pyramiding that may be involved with this.

"Fourth. This bill applies the tax

to all service industries and we are a service-oriented economy. We are told that service-oriented industries and the information industries are those which are growing most rapidly, and I have some questions as to whether or not we shouldn't be spending or be putting that burden on our service industries outside of the hotel area. One of the testimonies we received on this indicated that the increased general excise tax will be particularly onerous on small businesses which do not have large capital resources available or substantial profit margins to absorb the added cost of the tax. So I would think that we would want to look very carefully in encouraging the information age in Hawaii, that we might want to grant some exemptions to those and not all to manufacturing.

"Finally, like a Representative who spoke earlier, I have been a proponent of the hotel tax and I campaigned on that issue. The residents in my area, I believe, would prefer that measure to an excise tax, and I hope that that will be very seriously considered when this bill goes to conference in the Senate.

"I realize that this bill has come to us rather late in the process. We really haven't had that much chance to look at it. I am grudgingly willing to say, okay, let's pass this on, but I do think it is important to assert that for many young couples, for those who are renters, that we may be placing an inordinate burden on them, and I think we have to look very closely on that. And I hope that when we do get into conference on this comprehensive package, that we will take care that those who are coming to Hawaii today, that those who are trying to get homes in the future who do not have homes now, that these folks will be fairly handled as well.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Hirono then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I share many of Representative Shon's concerns so I would like to have his remarks entered into the Journal as my own."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Hemmings then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I have spent the majority of my adult life being

governed by people that are very well meaning and wish to do the best they can for all of us. But there is a basic ideological problem because these people have felt in their hearts that big government, that more spending, and more taxation, will solve our problems. And, Mr. Speaker, I wish it was true, because we have big government; we have a tremendous amount of spending; and we have too much taxes in Hawaii. But the facts are we also have tremendous problems.

"Mr. Speaker, our schools are not dramatically better in spite of the huge sums of money being spent on education. We are a State at risk.

"Mr. Speaker, we have recently experienced tremendous problems with poison in our environment.

"Mr. Speaker, our social service programs are being exploited. People who generally need help from government are not getting all the help they need because there is a lot of people that are exploiting and stealing from the system.

"Mr. Speaker, our business environment is on the critical list here in the State of Hawaii. Our business environment is over-regulated, it is over-taxed, and we have unfair laws such as workers' compensation that are crippling business -- business is leaving Hawaii. Business is the basis of the free enterprise system that pays all our taxes. Without it, we have nothing.

"Mr. Speaker, we are not better off in our self-sufficiencies, or at least not much better off than we were ten years ago.

"So the bottom line is, Mr. Speaker, I think we really face an ideological problem and we have to come to grips with it. Big government, big spending and more taxes are not going to solve our problems. This bill, House Bill 1350, House Draft 1, would take an estimated seventy more million dollars from the private sector and give it to government. Mr. Speaker, this is wrong. The list of our problems is long and complicated, and unfortunately, over the last generation, we have found out, in very realistic ways, that these problems cannot be solved with money alone. There are a lot of other things that we have to institute into our society to bring back accountability, responsibility, and the other virtues that make our society work successfully. Our

society was not made great by big government. It was made great by the individual; it was made great by self-initiative; it was made great by the free enterprise system.

"I am urging all my colleagues to start turning our government around. It's being done at the national level; in many other great states in this union are doing it. We must stop escalating government spending. We must stop this huge monster called government that is taking more from the private sector and literally crippling our economy. We should start now by voting no against this bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hagino then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"We have been asked to be visionary tonight in the consideration of this bill and so I, too, will whack visionary in this bill and make a prophecy that if this were to pass in substantially the form that it is presented to us today and become law, that I have no doubt that we will see the end of the Democratic Party as majority in this State. We are going to unfortunately tax very greatly a segment of our society that has been very supportive. I refer to working young couples who are primarily renters.

"But before I go into that burdensome tax on these individuals, or family households, let us see what this bill does.

"This bill calls, I am sure as everybody knows, for a 2 percent increase in the excise tax. But it is really more than a 2 percent increase. The present excise tax, as we all know, is 4 percent. So, a 2 percent increase represents a tremendous 50 percent increase in this very pervasive tax that we have in this State. And we can see by the figures that have been presented to us by the Finance Committee that this 2 percent increase, or what I call a 50 percent tax increase, would generate a sum, as presented to us, of \$327-million. Now, someone has to pay for that \$327-million. And if it is true that we grant certain relief to various people; for example, those who are lucky enough to own a home in this State, looking at the relief as presented to us by the Finance Committee, homeowners will recapture \$91-million. However, renters of which approximately half of the people of Hawaii are renters, their recapture

will only be \$25-million. So, obviously, there has been a shift of the burden of taxation by proposing this 50 percent increase in the general excise tax and it is very clear that it is the renters who are going to pay for that tax, and these are working men and women and I believe most of them, in their tax bracket, who will not gain any relief are the young married couples, or the young married single people in this State. I believe that these are the people that we have all tried to help in the past and now we are turning against them.

"Secondly, this bill allows the property tax exemption to go up to \$175,000. It does not prohibit the counties to continue to raise the property tax rate for property that is valued beyond \$175,000. There is no mechanism to prevent the counties from indeed expending their revenues, including the current grant-in-aids that they receive and an additional grant-in-aid they will receive under this bill. So we will see an inflated. . . we will not see the kind of tax relief that we had anticipated by increasing the property tax exemption to \$175,000. The tax rate, I predict, will go up if this bill is passed.

"Finally, I have been concerned as to whether we will eliminate or alleviate the pyramiding of the 4 percent excise tax by this legislation. Upon hearing part of the explanation of this bill, I am convinced that if it is primarily only the manufacturers and those who produce for export out of the State who will get a benefit from the various exemptions in manufacturing use tax, that I am now convinced the pyramiding will not be eliminated, and indeed, will have been increased by this 6 percent excise tax and will then geometrically increase as pyramiding always does when you have a general excise tax. Therefore, I will have to agree with the prior speaker that the small businessmen in the private sector will be tremendously burdened by this tax.

"Therefore, for all of these reasons, Mr. Speaker, I must make known at this time my opposition to this bill and I ask all of us here on this floor to consider what we are doing and always to remember that the excise tax is basically a regressive tax we have because of our needs of revenue have gone along with the 4 percent excise tax, but this is really a regressive tax when it is viewed against the backdrop that it

represents a 50 percent increase in this tax.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Crozier then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, everybody has been picking and choosing different parts of the bill to speak about and I would like to choose my little section also. I would like to talk about the local government, sir.

"For as long as I can remember, the local governments have been coming to the Legislature, asking for help. And as long as I can remember, we have been chasing them away. They have come with their hats in their hands. The last time they came crawling and now we are rejecting them; saying, no, we don't need to help you.

"This bill will help them, sir. May I just give an example on what the impact of this bill would do.

"Right now, the local government, especially the City and County of Honolulu, they fund their bus system through the property tax. They get some federal funds but the property tax takes care of the bus system. The purpose of the bus system, the main purpose, is to move the worker to the job site -- to move the low-income worker to the job site. That is the only purpose. Getting our kids to school is secondary. The tourists all ride the bus. That's secondary. Because we are part of America, everybody can ride the bus, but the local government is funding this to get the worker to the job site so that the workers can work and create commerce and make our community healthy. But the tourist is using the bus. Fine, use the bus. But they are not paying their fair share.

"This bill will help us capture some of that money. Right now, four thousand visitors have bus passes -- those senior citizen bus passes -- four thousand of them. They're using it, right now. How can we capture that money? Not through the property tax. Some are living in condominiums; some are living in hotels. They're escaping through the process but they are using our facilities. They are putting a burden on our local government. We gotta help them out.

"Sir, I think this mechanism will help them.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Jones then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I appreciate the omnibus effort of the bill and I appreciate the efforts of the committee to try and produce something for the State of Hawaii. However, after careful and long analysis of this bill, Mr. Speaker, I believe this bill to be anti-small guy, anti-renters, anti-families who are trying to save money for a home, and anti-business. Although the stated purposes of this legislation are noble and achievable, the implications of this bill, I believe, are going to hurt a lot of Hawaii's people in the end.

"But the first big question that must be asked is: 'Why are we increasing taxes when we have a projected surplus upwards of \$200-million for the next biennium? The taxpayer out there and the voter out there is gonna say, why raise taxes when we don't need to.

"Indeed, Mr. Speaker, we could eliminate the tax on food and drugs, the estate tax and use taxes and still have a surplus without raising one single tax. And here we are, increasing by 50 percent one of the most devastating taxes ever invented -- the excise tax!

"Numerous experts in our State today and yesterday have told me about their grave concerns.

"Dr. Michael Sklarz, the real estate economist states that 'by the increase of this tax, since rents are subject to excise tax, the cost to the owner will force the owners to pass this on to their tenants.'

"Let us not forget the excise tax increase of 50 percent will also, most assuredly, increase the cost of new construction. By the elimination of property taxes only on owner occupants, counties are certain to increase property taxes on investment rental properties. The increase will also be passed on to the renters. Further, this bill fails to address the disparity between those taxpayers who own their homes and those who must rent, insofar as the real property tax burden is concerned. In fact, Mr. Speaker, the revolt will be to the people who can least afford to pay -- the tenants, who will pick up the increases.

"A leader of Small Business Hawaii told me this: ' 1) There is no jus-

tification for a tax increase; 2) There is justification for a spending decrease; 3) To increase the tax from 4 percent to 6 percent would mean a 50 percent increase in an already inequitable position; 4) The problem of pyramiding, which has not been addressed in this bill, would be made worse; and 5) All this tax increase bill does is redistribute the burden to small business.'

"Lowell Kalapa has said: 'While some have characterized this proposal as "pro-business", it must be remembered that one of the major criticisms of the State's tax structure is the pyramiding of the general excise tax. Whether perceived or real, increasing the general excise tax rate to 6 percent will only exacerbate the pyramiding of the tax. Unless the pyramiding issue is addressed head on, any increase in the general excise tax rate will only detract from the State's business climate.'

"Some people will say by placing more disposable income in the hands of homeowners by taking off the property tax burden from these taxpayers, there will be a stimulation for economic activity. This reasoning is flawed when consideration is given to the reduced buying power of those dollars as a result of increasing the general excise tax rate despite the elimination of the tax on food and drugs. It reflects 'a failure' to understand the cost of doing business in Hawaii that cost us so much.

"For example, a small store in a local area, a guy will now pay increased cost on that commercial property, increased taxes and that is going to be passed on to the cost of the very food that we are trying to reduce the cost of. Also, the average family, Mr. Speaker, have got to buy clothing; they've got to take care of their children's other school supplies. The average family will be very, very much pinched in this and I will almost guarantee that the savings ratio from middle-income families will go down because of the increased rent and the increased excise taxes.

"In closing, Mr. Speaker, at the risk of appearing contumacious, I want to remind my fellow legislators that the backbone of the American economy is the small business. As a small businessman, I promise you that this tax will hurt myself and my employees. We must also remember that the dream of every family on Oahu is to find affordable housing.

This legislation will cut even more into a growing family savings as they must pay more rent and more money for clothing, school materials, furniture and vital needs.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Marumoto then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, everyone has covered several subjects quite well and I could only underline them. I feel that the renter will be hurt compared to the homeowner. I feel that the rich homeowner will get the same consideration that the poor one will, and I think that's unfair. I think the circuit breaker would certainly be a fair method of giving relief to the taxpayers in the proper tax area.

"I just would like to bring home one point and ask the question: I really want to know why this bill is before us and what do we need the excess revenues for? I do not feel we are in dire need of additional revenues. According to Administration figures, by June 1986, we will have a \$168-million surplus. The Tax Review Commission has stated also that barring a recession, we do not need a tax increase.

"I ask again, why is this bill before us? What do we need the revenues for?

"This bill designates some of our extra monies for the counties. We still have \$71-million left over. Will it go to our schools? Our University? For Medicaid? Collective bargaining? How much?

"If we do prioritize our needs and determine that we need more money, only then should we consider raising taxes. Today, everyone is arguing on the best method to raise money -- be it a hotel tax, or lottery, for this method. We have the cart before the horse, Mr. Speaker. Will someone please tell me what the money is going to go for and exactly how much?

"The chairman has said that this bill is the key to Hawaii's future. Unfortunately, I think the door leads to the closet.

"Thank you."

Representative Cavasso then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I have such great admiration for

our esteemed Governor and his fiscal reserve and that reserve has brought the State right now to a financial position of stability. We do not need more taxes. More taxes come from the people. Putting it and dressing a tax increase in sugar makes it no more palatable to this people and, therefore, Mr. Speaker, I ask the people to vote against this."

Representative Blair then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill with reservations, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Blair's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I will be voting in favor of this bill. I will be doing so only because I wish to have the issue of tax reform kept alive and in the hope that certain seeds of tax reform which exist in this bill will germinate and bloom in subsequent drafts.

"The committee report notes that it is the purpose of this bill to lessen the tax burden on local residents, spur economic growth, and provide a reasonable level of revenue sharing to the counties. I agree with all of these purposes, but current version of the bill will not accomplish its stated goals.

"The committee report also notes that the last major reform of our tax system was accomplished almost thirty years ago. Since then, our economy has shifted from an agricultural base to an economy heavily reliant on tourism and related service industries. The committee report accurately states the need for tax reform, but the bill, as drafted, does not adequately address that need.

"I will not detail my objections to each provision of this bill, but will only note some of my graver reservations.

"My first objection is that the bill raises too much money, in comparison to the tax cuts which are also included in the bill. The two percent increase in the sales tax will raise an additional \$327 million dollars in taxes. This will be offset in part by property tax savings of \$91 million dollars, food and drug tax savings of \$65 million dollars, renters' tax credit and deductions of \$25 million dollars, exemptions on manufacturing and producing activities of approximately \$16 million dollars, and a \$14 million dollar exemption from the use tax.

"It is the position of the Chairman of the Finance Committee that the net effect of these changes will be to reduce taxes upon Hawaii's citizens and partially export our tax burden, because tourists will be paying the higher six percent excise tax without receiving the benefit of the offsetting tax deductions and credits. I support the Chairman's objective of restructuring the tax burden to export more of our tax burden, and it is for this reason that I am voting in favor of this bill. However, my analysis of the actual impact of this bill is different than the Chairman's. According to my rough calculations, we will export only \$80-90 million dollars of the additional revenue generated. Therefore, even after considering the effect of the tax cuts we increase the local tax burden by approximately \$27 million dollars. While this shifts the "relative" tax burden from Hawaii's residents to our tourists, it increases the absolute tax burden of both groups. I feel the bill needs to be further amended, so that the actual tax burden on our local residents is decreased.

"I propose that we convert our excise tax into a sales tax, removing all pyramiding. In doing so, I think we would significantly improve the business climate in Hawaii especially for our small businesses. I think such a change would be a realistic reflection of the fact that our economy is no longer oriented towards a few large businesses but is now broadly based upon a great many small businesses. I do not know the precise tax revenue consequences of this change, but I am reasonably certain that it would not exhaust the \$61 million dollar net revenue gain which is envisioned under the Chairman's proposal.

"My second concern about this bill is that we will become too reliant on a single tax. This concern is two-fold. First, it is my understanding that the excise tax is regressive and I do not believe that we should rely heavily on a regressive tax. My second concern is that if we become overly reliant on a single tax, our economic health will be unduly at risk. It is my understanding that the excise tax is very sensitive to changes in the economy. If we suffer another recession, especially if combined with an airline strike such as occurred a few years ago, the consequences could be horrendous. This problem will be compounded because, under this bill, we are committed to escalating payments to the counties. These payments increase without reference to

the revenues available to the state.

"Finally, Mr. Speaker, I am concerned because this bill provides tax relief which is more beneficial to property owners than to renters. My own district is about evenly split between these two groups. I feel that we must achieve equity in this bill by increasing the credits and deductions available to renters.

"Having expressed these significant concerns, I'm sure some people will wonder why I am not voting against the bill. My answer is that there is a need to seriously review our tax laws in the context of current economic circumstances. While this bill does so in a very faulty fashion, at least it makes the effort. I would like to see the bill kept alive so that the changes, such as I have just suggested, will have an opportunity to be considered. I know this bill will receive a harsh reception in the Senate. I am not concerned that it will pass in its current form. Therefore, in the interest of keeping the issue alive, I will vote in favor of it. However Mr. Speaker, I wish to make it clear that short comings of this draft of the bill are very serious.

"In closing Mr. Speaker, I ask the Chairman to look into the possibility of a one percent increase in the excise tax and using the additional revenue generated by that one percent increase for the purpose of restructuring the tax burden. I would like to see the \$163.5 million dollars, which would be generated by a one percent increase in the excise tax, used to reduce or eliminate the pyramiding effect of our present excise tax law.

"Thank you."

Representative Souki then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I am very surprised to hear the Minority speaking all against this when, in effect, this is their own package. For the first time in years, we are providing a tax relief for business which they themselves have been espousing for these last twenty years. Now just because we scoop them, they are saying that this bill is bad.

"Also, Mr. Speaker, we have a Mayor here that was in the headlines today where he is saying he doesn't know where he is going to get the money. The National Administration has cut his grant and he is going to

be \$20.5-million short. If you look at the share that he is supposed to get under this revenue-sharing plan, it comes pretty close to that. I wonder if your prestigious Mayor feel the same as you do across the hall there as far as this grant.

"And, Mr. Speaker, I think that this plan here provides a lot of imagination. It will help the majority of the people of the State and that's who we represent -- the majority of the people of the State.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Jones rose in rebuttal, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the Honorable Representative from Maui can scoop us any time. In fact, I think that the Majority package, as I see it, has scooped up an awful lot and we are thankful that the Majority sees some of the bills we've been trying to get through for years. So please keep scooping.

"But also, Mr. Speaker, this 6 percent increase was not a part of the Minority package of the House and we stand on that record.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Anderson then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the reason I would like to stand and speak for the bill is that I think that the chairman from Finance, in all sincerity, looked at a problem, same as we did with workmen's compensation. The people of this State are overtaxed. He wanted to find the means to give them some relief, and yet, take care of the programs that we have. If this is right or if it is wrong, I am not a taxman nor am I an attorney that can stand up and find a lot of things wrong with something when for years we've been asking for some kind of relief.

"The 4 percent off of food and drugs has been for years a Republican measure. I would be foolish not to stand and back that up. The property tax -- we have been having the county come over and ask for help. This is one way of giving them help and still and not giving them the right to go ahead and act so that we can have some control and the people will not be overtaxed.

"Also, Mr. Speaker, I did have some concerns about people who are

in business and unable to pass a tax along to us, but I believe that we have independent contractors. I think that they are flagged out and there must be some way between our House and our Senate that we can take care of the problems for those people so that they will get some kind of tax relief from this bill.

"Also, Mr. Speaker, I heard that this is going to help the rich as well as the poor as far as the property tax. So what's so wrong about being rich? What's so wrong about a person working their whole life to get a few dollars and if they have a few dollars more than I do, then I should work a little harder so that I can try to get myself up there. I see nothing wrong with trying to help everybody. So don't forget that the guy who buys food is also rich. So it is going to go ahead and it is going to take care of all segments of our community.

"For that reason, Mr. Speaker, we may be wrong; we may be right, but I think it is a step in the right direction. I think for once we are going to be able to have some kind of communication back and forth between this House and the other to find out if there is a way to help the people of our State.

"Thank you very much and I wish that our colleagues go aye, and I thank you, Mr. Chairman."

Representative Menor then rose and stated:

"I know the hour is late, but I just wanted to state for the record that I will vote for this bill with reservations."

Representative Kamali'i then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of House Bill 1350 with reservations. I don't want to disappoint my colleague from Maui that there are some here on the Minority side that will vote for this measure.

"But, Mr. Speaker, this measure is the most comprehensive tax proposal to come before us in twenty years. However, any such sweeping measure must also have certain trouble spots and this measure certainly has that.

"Although anyone who has completed their own income taxes will probably dispute this taxation really does or should have a rational basis. We have been losing that base.

"Years of sustained high inflation made a mockery of our income tax brackets. A series of credits encouraged piecemeal breaks for specific actions or investments. And changes in federal law have also greatly influenced the structure and nature of our taxes.

"Such developments have adversely affected the fairness of our taxes.

"It does not take a tax expert to identify which taxes have fallen most out of line with this standard of fairness. The excise tax on food and drugs, property taxes which may threaten to deprive an older citizen of the home he or she struggled all of their lives to secure, and the adverse effect of certain taxes on business investment and expansion.

"This measure attempts to respond to these concerns.

"Although there may be some hesitation about the means being taken here--an increase in the excise tax accompanied by a package of trade-offs in overall relief--there can be little doubt that this bill is on target in identifying those who are hardest hit by present taxes.

"But one group is still left a distinct disadvantage -- the renter.

"Very few of us start out our adult lives as homeowners; we must rent and save. Just as a business must have the opportunity to accumulate capital for investment, so does the individual and the young family. Although the renters tax credit was increased in this draft, I am still hesitant that there is not sufficient relief afforded the renter.

"I, too, am concerned and listened very intently when Lowell Kalapa came before the Finance Committee. I have grave reservations but, Mr. Speaker, I would like to have more discussion on this bill. I hope the Senate will hear it. I have always favored a hotel room tax but we cannot make adult decisions without more conversation on this very, very important measure. We need help from the Tax Foundation. It would be nice if they would come up with an aloha so that we can see how it affects a family of four. Instead of having figures tossed at us and expect this body to make the kinds of decisions that if we made in haste, we might be sorry for.

"I am looking forward to working further on this measure and I, too,

would like to thank the chairman of the Finance Committee for at least having the guts to put it together.

"Thank you."

Representative Apo then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I believe, as the previous speaker mentioned, this is the first creative thought that I have experienced in the last twenty years with respect to the problems the State has in raising additional revenues. As a total package, I believe it is comprehensive and, of course, anyone looking for trouble is going to find it. If we choose to pick apart specific sections of the bill, we could probably make valid arguments, but as a total package, I believe what we have is we will be able to yield a predictable desired outcome.

"For me, that desired outcome, as a politician and as an elected official, is to go back to my district for a change and say to my constituents that we have money to fix our schools; that we have money to fix our roads; that we have money to install a 24-hour emergency service; that we have money to raise the salaries of our teachers; that we have money to take care of problems that have been plaguing us for the last three/four biennium -- our prison.

"For anyone to stand here and tell me that there is no need for any more revenues for this State, I think is totally ludicrous and ridiculous; that I don't know where they've been for the last two or three biennium.

"Again, because I highly favor this bill, I would think it would be a shame for us to kill it tonight and not give it a chance to breathe a little more life and allow the Senate to massage it a little more.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kiyabu rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I just want to clarify some points that were brought up previously.

"It has been said that we are paying too much taxes in Hawaii. If you total up the total revenues generated and you divide it by the population here, you're gonna have a high figure. But what people fail to realize is that we have a defacto population of 4-point somewhat million tourists and our military. So if you

divide that number by the number of the revenues, we are not at a high tax rate as many have alluded to.

"At 4 percent tax, we are one of the lowest in the nation now. The median tax in the nation is 5.5 percent. How come these states are not called anti-business?"

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried and H.B. No. 1350, HD 1, entitled; "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 38 ayes to 13 noes, with Representatives Andrews, Cavasso, Graulty, Hagino, Hemmings, Ikeda, Jones, Liu, Marumoto, Onouye, Say, Tam and Yoshimura voting no.

H.B. No. 1270, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Shito, seconded by Representative Bunda and carried, H.B. No. 1270, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO REAL ESTATE", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 1350 and 1270 had passed Third Reading at 10:23 o'clock p.m.

On motion by Representative Shito, seconded by Representative Bunda and carried, H.B. No. 839, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONSUMER PROTECTION", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 1369, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Shito, seconded by Representative Bunda and carried, H.B. No. 1369, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CORPORATIONS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Blair, Crozier, Graulty, Say and Yoshimura voting no.

H.B. No. 549, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Shito, seconded by Representative Bunda and carried, H.B. No. 549, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT

Representative Say, for the Committee on Water, Land Use Development and Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 630) recommending that H.B. No. 1581, HD 1, pass Third Reading.

Representative Kamali'i then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"With this bill, Mr. Speaker, we will propose a State Constitutional amendment establishing a single definition of native Hawaiian without reference to a blood quantum.

"This definition will not and cannot affect the beneficiaries of the Hawaiian Homes Program. Only Congress can amend the Hawaiian Homes definition of a 50 percent blood quantum requirement. And given the divided feelings among the beneficiaries, this change will take some time to achieve.

"However, the immediate concern addressed in this measure is for a single Hawaiian beneficiary class for the purposes of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.

"We have all struggled, Mr. Speaker, with the philosophical and budgetary complexities of making OHA both a responsive and a responsible agency. There may be some who believe that we have failed in that objective.

"If so, much of the fault must rest on the now-divided nature of the Hawaiian community, and the con-

straints in approach, programming, and identity which have occurred because the office must serve the distinction between those who are half or more, and less than half Hawaiian.

"But the profoundest harm inflicted by this separation is not to an office, but to a people.

"When the 1978 Constitutional Convention approached this same issue, the Hawaiian Affairs Committee, chaired by Frenchy DeSoto, was eloquent in their reasons for removing this arbitrary barrier of blood. Allow me, Mr. Speaker, to quote from their Standing Committee Report:

' . . .since 1920, native Hawaiians have been defined only in the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act, 1920, as amended in Section 201(7), which states: "the term native Hawaiian" means any descendant of not less than one-half part of the blood of the races inhabiting the Hawaiian Islands previous to 1778.

' . . .the committee believes that the time has come to include all native Hawaiians, regardless of blood quantum, for the number of descendants is increasing. This qualification has proved to be a factor in dividing the Hawaiian community -- mothers and fathers from their children, cousins from cousins, and friends from friends. Moreover, the removal of a blood qualification will be in line with the current policy of the federal government to extend benefits for Hawaiians to all Hawaiians regardless of blood quantum.

'Your Committee believes that this division among people who are of the same blood and may even be parent and child is not right or fair. . . .'

"With this amendment, Mr. Speaker, we can heal the legal separation of families, and restore rightness and fairness.

"I urge my colleagues to vote in favor of House Bill 1581, House Draft 1.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson then rose and requested that Representative Kamali'i's remarks be inserted into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Anderson then said:

"I would like to say one thing. For those that don't understand, it is pretty hard -- if you're Japanese, you're Japanese; if you're Filipino, you're Filipino, and so on. But to be a native Hawaiian and a Hawaiian, it is very, very difficult. Some people look at you and say, well, you're not a native Hawaiian, you don't have the half. We have been divided for many, many years so I am hoping that this will help.

"Thank you very, very much, Mr. Speaker."

At this time, Representative Souki rose on a point of information and asked:

"Mr. Speaker, I wish to ask Representative Anderson, which is he?"

Representative Anderson answered:

"Portuguese, Hawaiian, Norwegian, English, Irish and Scotch."

Representative Souki thanked the Chair.

On motion by Representative Kamali'i, seconded by Representative Tam and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1581, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF HAWAII TO PROVIDE FOR A SINGLE DEFINITION OF NATIVE HAWAIIAN AND HAWAIIAN", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes, which was not less than two-thirds of all the members to which the House is entitled.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 1581 had passed Third Reading at 11:42 o'clock p.m.

No. 75) proclaiming March 1985 as Professional Social Work Month was jointly offered by Representatives Grauly, Anderson, Apo, Blair, Cachola, Cavasso, Hashimoto, Honda, Isbell, Jones, Kihano, Kim, Lardizabal, Leong, Levin, Lindsey, Liu, Marumoto, Menor, Morgado, Nakata, Onouye, Oshiro, Pfeil, Say, Shito, Shon, Souki, Takamine and Yoshimura.

THIRD READING

H.B. No. 1, HD 1:

Representative Kiyabu moved that H.B. No. 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Souki.

Representative Kiyabu rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, House Bill 1, House Draft 1, represents a commitment to directed and responsive funding, consistent with government's responsibility in each program area. In view of our current resources, the committee felt it was time to reassess

the funding of each program based on its responsibilities and functions.

"In the area of economic development, we strengthened government's role as a promoter of economic activity by adding funds for tourism marketing and high technology development. One million dollars has been appropriated in each year of the fiscal biennium to the Pacific International Center for High Technology Research. These funds have been earmarked for research studies to support a diversified approach to high technology development. Also, an additional \$1.7 million has been provided in each year of the biennium to the Hawaii Visitors Bureau for an intensified advertising program, promoting Hawaii as a prime vacation destination.

"In education, we adopted a theme of basic support and school flexibility. House Bill 1, House Draft 1, directs funds to reshape the intermediate school program, since this is a critical period in a child's growth. It also recognizes the importance of early intervention in helping children with learning difficulties. So we have provided funds to the early provisions for school success program. Through the increased school priority fund, schools will have more money and more flexibility in meeting their special needs. In addition, funds have been provided for library books and computer equipment. \$15-million has been provided for repair and maintenance of the schools.

"For Higher Education, moneys have been given for additional computer equipment and for hiring qualified people to upgrade related instructional programs. Funds have also been provided for the purchase of library books to expand the collection in newly developing research and instructional areas. Finally, this measure gives the University of Hawaii system \$4.5-million in the first fiscal year and \$5.4-million in the second fiscal year for much needed repair and maintenance of existing structures and replacement of educational equipment.

"In health, we redirected program emphasis and provided incentives for more efficient management.

"In the area of social services, to reinforce our commitment to the prevention and treatment of child abuse, additional permanent positions and an increased level of fundings have been provided to the Child Protective Services Division in an

effort to reduce the incidence of child abuse in this State. Additional funds have also been provided to expand the entire spectrum of child abuse and neglect services through the purchase of service system.

"In corrections, we took steps to solve the problems of overcrowding and security.

"In employment, we funded information and counseling programs to help high school students make the right career choices. We also provided money for the restraining and upgrading of our labor force.

"In closing, Mr. Speaker, I would like to thank the members of the Finance Committee for the long hours, hard work and patience that it took in preparing this bill. I would also like to thank my staff for their hard work and their patience.

"I urge all members to vote for House Bill 1, House Draft 1."

Representative Menor rose to speak in favor of House Bill 1, House Draft 1, with reservations, stating:

"First of all, Mr. Speaker, I would like to say at the outset that I support House Bill 1 because it contains many good provisions and I am especially appreciative of the fact that the funding has been included for the construction of a Mililani High School gymnasium, a project for which I have lobbied long and hard, even before I was elected to office in 1982. Therefore, I would like to extend my appreciation and to compliment Representative Kiyabu and the members of the Finance Committee.

"However, I do have some reservations relating to House Bill 1, House Draft 1.

"My first reservation is in regards to the appropriations relating to the Waiawa correctional facility. As you know, Mr. Speaker, the proposed Waiawa correctional facility is adjacent to several communities and as a result, there are some strong community concerns of the location of that facility in that particular site. However, I do recognize that in House Bill 1, there is a proviso that would limit the type of inmates who could be sentenced and confined within that facility. However, my biggest concern is the fact that this proviso would last during the period of the biennium so I have a big concern that if prison overcrowding becomes worse, that prison officials

may eventually utilize the site for a large-scale prison operation. I would hope that in future years my fellow colleagues will support my efforts to try to confine the use, or the restrictive use, of the Waiawa correctional facility as is provided for in the proviso in House Bill 1.

"My other concern, Mr. Speaker, is the fact that I don't think House Bill 1 goes far enough in addressing our overcrowding problem. Today, there are around two thousand inmates in our community correctional centers with an inmate capacity of about one thousand. I recognize, Mr. Speaker, that the Legislature has not been oblivious to the problem of prison overcrowding. For example, during the last biennium, the Legislature provided funding to expand several of our community correctional centers and additional funding was provided to complete at least a part of the Halawa medium security facility to provide for 250 beds but the maximum inmate capacity of 500, assuming the double bunks in every cell. In addition, House Bill 1, as Representative Kiyabu accurately has stated, does make a further attempt to resolve this overcrowding problem by providing funding to expand the Kulani correctional facility and, Mr. Speaker, despite my reservations to open up our Waiawa correctional facility.

"However, my concern is that even if one assumes that all of these projects are phased in by the fiscal year of 1986 to 1987, according to the projection of the prison officials, they are still going to be a bed-space shortage of approximately 370 to 400 beds. Unfortunately, based on the projection of prison officials, it appears that our overcrowding problem will not get better but worse, given the fact that increases can be anticipated in our inmate population over the next several years. I think, based on these figures, I think that the Legislature should try to do more to resolve the overcrowding problem, especially, Mr. Speaker, considering the fact that much of our actions in terms of passing tougher sentencing laws have been contributing to the overcrowded conditions in our present facilities. For example, as recently as Monday, this body unanimously passed a Penal Code bill that is going to toughen various provisions of our existing Penal Code law, the bill was passed in response to community sentiment and statement by our Prosecuting Attorney to send more criminals to prison.

"The point I would like to emphasize however, Mr. Speaker, is the fact that I do not think that we can continue to pass tougher sentencing laws that require the incarceration of inmates while, at the same time, not providing adequate resources to allow our prison officials to incarcerate and to confine our prisoners. I do not think that we can expect our prison officials to meet our high expectations to confine, to educate, and to train our inmates when, in fact, we are trying to cope with the prison overcrowding problem with extremely limited resources.

"Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I respectfully request that the Legislature, during the final closing weeks of this session, consider the possibility of providing funding for additional beds for the Halawa medium security facility. And if this body cannot accept that and disagrees with that particular disposition, then I urge my colleagues to at least come up with a concrete alternative now that will not jeopardize community safety.

"I believe that there is some urgency on this matter, given the fact that our correctional system right now is under federal investigation and our State is a party to a law suit which could be starting within the next few months. I have a concern that if we don't take appropriate steps, our correctional system could be placed under a federal master, under the supervision and control of that master who would have the authority to dictate the conditions and operations of our correctional system. I do not think that that is the kind of position that our State Legislature would want to put our correctional system in. In addition, I do not think that the alternative to expanding the Halawa medium security facility is to do nothing at all, given the fact that overcrowding is a reality.

"Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I would ask that we consider this proposal and if at all possible, that we take decisive action now. In the long run, I don't think that we can continue to build more prisons to resolve our crime problems; therefore, as I mentioned to Representative Tom and other members of the Judiciary and Corrections Committees, I would hope that during the interim, we could still consider possible revision to the Penal Code to perhaps shorten prison terms and to implement more alternatives to incarceration, but the fact is, overcrowding is a problem and I think we have to deal with it.

"My second concern, apart from prison, Mr. Speaker, is relating to page 113 of House Bill 1, regarding a CIP appropriation for a general aviation airport. As a member of the House Transportation Committee, I am very concerned that this body take decisive action in designating a second airport site for small aircrafts to avert a possible disaster at the Honolulu International Airport. However, I hope that this House does not accept the position of the Senate by designating Dillingham which is a distance from urban centers and its limited expansion space for aircraft. On the other hand, I think we should consider sites like Bellows, for example, which appear to have advantages in terms of the proximity to urban centers and the fact that it can be utilized for flight patterns that will not interfere or obstruct the traffic originating from the Honolulu International Airport.

"But the point I want to make about this, Mr. Speaker, is that I recognize that there are some community concerns about that -- community sentiment has been an obstacle to selecting Bellows, for example. But I would like to point out to this body the fact that today, you are going to be approving funding for the Waiawa correctional facility despite the fact that that facility is adjacent to the districts of several Representatives -- Representatives Kihano, Tungpalan and myself. And you are going to be making that decision irrespective of whatever we might say today about the concerns of our community because of what you believe to be in the State interest. And I would hope that you apply the same standard in reviewing the proposals or alternatives for a reliever airport.

"And finally, Mr. Speaker, I would like to very briefly state my opposition to State funding for abortions that is contained in House Bill 1. While I recognize, Mr. Speaker, that this body is not going to delete funding for abortions during this session, I would hope that this body would eventually reconsider its position on that matter. I especially appeal to those individuals here who share my concerns that abortion results in the taking of a human life and deplore the fact that each year, thousands of fetuses are being aborted and disposed of like so much trash. For those of you here who agree that abortions result in the destruction of a precious human life, but I say to you that you cannot condone the continued use of tax dollars to take that life. In addition,

Mr. Speaker, for those who argue that abortions are a matter of personal choice, I say to you, in response, that the right to choose is secondary and far less important than the right to human life.

"Mr. Speaker, those are basically my reservations about House Bill 1, and accordingly, I will vote for it but with reservations.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Grauly then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, your Committee on Human Services has dealt with a broad range of issues this session, and it has been a very difficult session for the Committee and for the people that are concerned with the various matters that the Committee has taken up -- from abortions to child abuse, to elderly affairs, to the medicaid program. We dealt with some major problems that the State faces.

"I would like to speak in support of House Bill 1, House Draft 1, because I feel that the final committee has been very supportive of the Committee's major efforts in the area of child abuse and neglect.

"Mr. Speaker, in the last two reporting periods, 7 children have been battered to death in our community. And your Committee on Human Services feel that that is 7 children too many. We have a child protective service system that has literally fallen apart and the efforts of your Committee and the Finance Committee have been to restore the child protective service into a system that works and protects our children.

"For this, Mr. Speaker, I feel that the Finance Committee has really provided the support that your Committee on Human Services need in order to provide the resources that is really needed by the community in this area. I would like to speak in strong support of House Bill 1, House Draft 1.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kihano rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I speak in support of House Bill 1, House Draft 1. I would like to, with your permission, insert the comments of Representative Menor on the concern of the Waiawa correctional facility funding. (By

reference only)

"That's the objection that I have as far as that particular segment of the bill is on, Mr. Speaker, but I also support this measure because I want to commend the chairman of our Education Committee for putting back into the budget the funds for Waipahu Intermediate School which was deleted by the Department of Education as part of one of the priorities. As we all know, that's one of the schools that has been neglected and the buildings are dilapidated, and I think we've had some problems in trying to build new classrooms out at Waipahu Intermediate, and I want to commend the Finance chairman and the Finance Committee for supporting us and putting the funding back into House Bill 1, House Draft 1.

"And that's my concern, Mr. Speaker, and I just hope that everyone votes for his measure.

"Thank you."

Representative Blair then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I reiterate some of the words of my chairman with regard to the correctional facilities. I appreciate that the Finance Committee and its chairman are still open on this issue, and I very much appreciate that fact.

"However, I think it is unfortunate that we were reflecting the community, perhaps a little too well on this issue. That is to say, the community wants tougher penal philosophies implemented but does not want to pay for the consequences of those penal philosophies in terms of incarceration. And while we may be a Democratic body in that we reflect the constituencies that we come from, when the constituencies are fundamentally irreconcilable, we cannot reflect that and we must reconcile the problem and, therefore, I hope that this will be resolved this year because I think the prospect of federal intervention is very significant, and I won't say anything more about that because I don't think it's something that we want to emphasize, but I think it would be very unfortunate if that were to come to pass.

"Thank you."

Representative Jones then rose to speak in favor of the bill with deep reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I want to commend

the chairman and his Committee on the tremendous amount of effort and work they put into this, and I like an awful lot of what I see in the budget.

"We've got a much needed investment. . . increase in tourism to HVB. We've got a good first step with our Pacific International Center for High Technology which is going to help development in our State. We've got a good first step in making Hawaii a center for international business, and I think this is very far-sighted and very visionary, and I commend the Committee on that. We've got funds in there to keep outside plants from coming in to our State and money to maintain our watchdog effort over pesticides and groundwater, and the Committee needs to be commended.

"There are three issues I thought I would like to address though, Mr. Speaker, which give me concerns.

"First of all, we worked very hard in the Corrections Committee on the budget. The chairman's staff worked for weeks in trying to get the funds properly developed and understood for the addition to the medium security facility, and I feel that perhaps prior consent was not really followed in deleting that's my recommendation, so I think there is a very great need for that.

"Secondly is the issue of quality of life. I don't want to see any more bella buenoes pass away in our State. I think it is a tragedy that we in the State to talk about the life of the land, also to talk about the life of the people, being perpetuated in righteousness. Special operations of the kind of bella buenoes that could have saved her life are needed, are necessary, and should be reflected in this budget. State policy does not yet do that.

"Finally, and the source of my greatest concern on this budget, is that in the past, since we started this session, we've had 7 children battered to death. We've appropriated millions of dollars which I support to stop child abuse. At the same time, the State has paid for the annihilation of one thousand welfare children who have been slaughtered by the abortionists of our State and whose lives have been taken. Our State paid for this, Mr. Speaker, with my tax dollar. This is an affront to myself and it's affront to most of the taxpayers in the State, especially for the fact that 99 percent of these abortions were for convenience only, had nothing to do with

the life of the mother, rape or incest. So with this budget, we are appropriating over \$2-million which could go to save the bella buenoes of our State. I consider it a major tragedy, for some 38 states of our union have eliminated abortion funding from their budget. We're still living with anti-life policies and providing funds for this. Mr. Speaker, I consider it a shame on this State of my home and my family for generations, that since 1973, our State have funded the death of more babies than all of my fellow veterans that were killed in Vietnam.

"And it's because of that, I have very deep reservations about this bill; yet I support it because the other elements of it do support some very vital things in our State.

"Thank you, Mr. Chairman, for letting me share this with you."

Representative Morgado then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of House Bill 1, House Draft 1, for two reasons, the first reason being rather obvious, for as your Education chairman, I would like to express a couple of points about the education budget that is within House Bill 1, House Draft 1.

"The primary consideration of your education budget was the basic needs of Hawaii's public school students. The intermediate schools were given top priority. However, your education budget reflects a sensitivity to the needs of our students in the special education, alienated, and gifted and talented categories, without ignoring the needs of our regular students statewide. Their adjustment from the primary school environment to the secondary school level has historically been a stormy period for students for two reasons.

"One, they are expected to adjust expeditiously from learning about things they could hear, see or touch to a curriculum that demands abstract thinking. They are introduced to the modular system and many other students.

"Secondly, physiological changes create unfamiliar social, as well as physical situations which our seventh and eighth graders must learn to control. The future educational success of these students demand they juggle and master these strange experiences.

"Mr. Speaker, your education

budget wants to help.

"Educators, our Superintendent, district superintendents, principals and teachers have recommended allocation of resources which allow for the flexibility in the curriculum and instruction and lend administrative support. Mr. Speaker, your budget reflects their recommendations.

"Additional support for the intermediate schools include provisions for remedial instruction, weight in the cash allotment of the school priority fund according to the DOE's regular allotment formula, and expanded use of the district resource teachers' NRA positions.

"Your budget reflects additional aid to the special education population as well as continued support for a TCEP program with special emphasis on the Olomana HYCS and detention home program.

"Your budget has, for the first time, earmarked positions for the gifted and talented programs in grades 7 through 12.

"Provisions have been made for the purchase of textbooks and essential classroom equipment, allowing the use of the school priority fund for the unique school needs.

"Furthermore, additional student summer school tuition waivers are provided for the students in need of financial support.

"Funds for computer literacy programs, purchase of athletic equipment and transportation costs for outer island athletic teams are recommended also in House Bill 1, House Draft 1.

"Finally, your education budget reflects the importance of the classroom structure by recommending over \$40-million in R/M money.

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to commend and thank your Finance and Education Committee members for the responsiveness to the needs of our students. Also, I would especially like to thank the chairman of Finance for his support and guidance throughout the budget preparation process. In addition, I would like to thank the vice chairman of the Education Committee for his strong support and the hard work of my staff and their commitment to the goal of our Education Committee.

"Mr. Speaker, I mentioned before I started my support of the education

budget of House Bill 1, House Draft 1, that there were two reasons why I rise to speak in support of the bill.

"The second reason, being the concerns that have been expressed earlier by my colleague in regards to Waiawa and other kinds of appropriations made to the Corrections Division. We passed, not too many days ago, House Bill 1135 that has to do with the Hawaii Youth Correctional Facility and in caucus, I asked the question whether or not we can afford, in a bill form, to say to the Corrections Department that we can incarcerate and punish the kids that are in the fifteen-year-old category at the HYCF. The people who fill our prison were not always adults. They were once young people in trouble with the law. Many of them had shown statistically to have come from HYCF or other alienated programs such as HYCF. Is it too hard, or too complicated, to assume that if we practice the policy of incarceration and punishment when the kids are fifteen years old, to expect that these kids then would graduate to our adult facilities? I say not. These are adults that overcrowd our facilities. Maybe they could have been helped in preventive programs in our educational system, in our alienated program, our TCEP program but, more specifically, in HYCF, where 85 percent have gone on to our adult facilities. The bill is passed; it is part of the Senate agenda, hopefully in the near future. But I ask that if we want to consider overcrowding the prison, yes, let's take the measures that can alleviate the problem today, but let us also pay attention to the youth of these problems as well, to hopefully, one day, circumvent OCCC entirely. Put the preventive programs in our educational system; put the preventive program at HYCF where they belong, for these kids who are just starting out who need guidance, who need that kind of support; that's an important program for them. But for us here to talk about overcrowding and the need for other facilities and still have passed out 1135 without any other objections, I think is a conflict; I think it is hypocritical.

"Mr. Speaker, I ask our colleagues to continue to think about the long-range problems that we try affect here and legislation upon our desks today.

"Thank you."

Representative Hemmings then rose to speak in favor of the bill with

reservations, stating:

"This bill is a good bill because basically it appropriates money within our means. Our State is allegedly going to have a surplus and this budget does not spend more than we are receiving, but the day may come when that situation may arise as it has happened at the national level, and I would like to suggest my reservations with this budget a more ideological than address the particulars which I think we all expressed and heard in the past.

"We are going to solve our problems in this State, not by just throwing money at them, but by instituting through this legislative body into our society, more self-reliance, more discipline, more accountability, more efficiency, more productivity, and by eliminating waste and fraud. And we would not need a huge budget of this nature if we had more of those ideas in our society.

"Mr. Speaker, over a hundred years ago, someone said something I think is pertinent to this and that was, you cannot permanently help men and women by doing for them what they should and could do for themselves.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Cavasso then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"The chairman spoke in favor of the bill and I appreciate the words they spoke and the work they have done, and I appreciate the work of the Finance Committee.

"The intermediate school has been a stepchild here, Mr. Speaker, and we seem to get a lot of attention today -- elementary and to the high schools and we left the intermediate schools out. And particularly in my community in Waimanalo, it's a demoralizing situation, and the address that this bill is giving to that subject is encouraging -- it will be exciting to my community. Sir, I also appreciate in education the attention to repair and maintenance.

"The other day, I was told I had the opportunity to choose funding or recommend funding in my community and my desire was to recommend repair and maintenance. I was not aware that it was already in this bill and I said I'd rather have repair and maintenance right now than new construction and I was told that I couldn't put it because this request

was specifically for construction so to find out that we've got so much in repair and maintenance, it is encouraging and also will be exciting to Kailua and Lanikai. The schools are in need of help and it's a priority there. Thank you.

"There is another area that's most encouraging and Chairman Gaulty has already mentioned and that's the funding of child abuse and the funds that are going in to help our family stay together, to help our community deal with it as a community, to confront the issue head on. However, Mr. Speaker, even as we add funds for the child abuse, dealing with it, we deal funds for something which I believe is child abuse and encourage it. Mr. Speaker, I think that I need to share and have shared before that my belief is that the child which is in the womb. . . or that which is in the womb, is a person and that that person needs the same protection of life as our oldest grandparents to our youngest child. That the Constitution applies to that person from the youngest age to the oldest age -- the protection of the right to life. And we do have funding in here, Mr. Chairman, for terminating those lives, and I recognize that not all of the people in our community believe that, but we have a significant portion of our community that does believe that that which is in the womb is a person, is a child, and that for us to include funding, State funding, for such an item is a disservice and wrong. To some, it would go far as to be called 'blood money', included in this House Bill 1, House Draft 1.

"I speak in favor of the bill and thank you, Mr. Chairman. Mr. Speaker, I hope that next year we will address this problem and, again, mahalo."

Representative Marumoto then rose to speak in favor of the bill with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is in a way of comment more than anything else. I notice that the purchase of services are not itemized in this budget and since that is a very large item in the next biennium, it would be helpful if we knew where our money was going as the various agencies were itemized.

"In hearing the comments from the members of the Majority, I noticed that there has been general satisfaction with this measure. There has been little demand expressed for more money and I might interpret that to mean that it reflects little need for

additional revenues. I am wondering whether that means that a tax increase is indeed needed.

"The Makiki Representative has mentioned that people do not want to pay for extra prison construction and I think we can extend that to say that people do not want to pay for a tax increase. I think we should keep this in mind when we do entertain further proposals for revenue enhancement.

"Thank you."

Representative Kiyabu rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I think the last speaker was out of order talking about some other bill, but I will address that question.

"There were a lot of demands and for more increased programs and dollars for different programs. But we did not accommodate all of those programs because the so-called surplus is a misleading surplus. That surplus is created by the restriction by the Governor not to spend dollars. In the last two particular fiscal years, we spent more money than we were taking in. The Governor didn't take the conservative approach so we are in a deficit position today, and that surplus will not be a surplus by the end of this session. We have not accommodated collective bargaining yet; we may be in a short-fall; the County/State hospitals are and so that particular reserve fund that we are talking about may not be there. And so there is a need for additional funds if this body wants to add more programs.

"Thank you."

Representative Liu then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of the bill but real quickly to indicate that concerning the need for this body in the future and the body across the way to commit themselves toward building new prison facilities, I concur with the chairman of Corrections, and I would like to differ by those that say that the public is not willing to pay for our positions on the Penal Code. I believe that they are and are willing to.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lardizabal then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to state that this bill provides, for the first time in a long time, recognition that tourism does play a very important role in developing funds for other programs that are non-profit and don't generate moneys.

"The tourist industry has lately become working posts for those that who really do not understand the necessity and ports of this industry -- a vital industry. I am disturbed by some sources that say tourism is not good for Hawaii and at the same time stick up their hands for more moneys for their programs. I find this conflict very disturbing.

"I would like to thank the chairman of the Finance Committee for recognizing that the increased funding of \$1.7-million for the first year's work of the budget is welcome. Whoever does fall short for what we really need. In this world today, tourism is one of the biggest industries, worldwide, and we are competing, and I emphasize competing, very strenuously with other destination areas. If we sit back and feel that we have enough from tourism, I would prophesize that in the next several years, that we would be losing much of our visitors. We must keep up and compete.

"Secondly, Mr. Speaker, I would just like to relate to the term surplus as our chairman has stated. There is a misnomer on the term surplus. The term surplus like the term tax evokes a negative response in many people. Everytime the word surplus is used, it means extra moneys. I would hope that each one of our colleagues here would sit down with the chairman of the Finance Committee or an accountant and really define what surplus means. You and I, as household heads, can have surplus and extra money anytime at home in the checking account by not feeding our kids, by cutting back on the meat, and cutting back on this, and because the Governor is a very prudent Governor, he had to do certain things, and that is not surplus -- that's money not spent and saved for a rainy day. Surplus, in my term, means moneys not anticipated in our budget processing from the excise tax collection and elsewhere.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

"Mr. Speaker, I just wanted, for purposes of the Journal, to go on record as being concerned about the shift last year that was made by the Legislature in their instructions to SHPDA, that they should take cost containment and cost as the major priority in determining certificate of need.

"And the reason I'm concerned about it is the federal policy has always been to also take up, or give equal attention to the question of access to services. I'm speaking mostly about situations that we have in rural Oahu, since the bulk of long-term care services occur in the urban core or located in the urban core and also for rural Oahu.

"So, for purposes of record, I'm hoping that perhaps when this resolution does get to Finance, the

members of the Finance Committee might be able to address this concern--and that is, how much weight we would give to access as opposed to cost.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.C.R. No. 13, HD1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE STATE HEALTH PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT AGENCY TO USE A CONSERVATIVE ESTIMATE OF THE NUMBER OF LONG-TERM CARE BEDS NEEDED WHEN CONSIDERING THE SIX PENDING CERTIFICATE OF NEED APPLICATIONS FOR ADDITIONAL LONG-TERM CARE SERVICES", was referred to the Committee on Finance.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

A resolution (H.R. No. 252) commending and congratulating Arthur Kaneshiro for being named Hawaii's selectee for the National Distinguished Principals Award for 1983-1984 was jointly offered by Representatives Nakata and Okamura and was read by the Clerk.

On motion by Representative Nakata, seconded by Representative Okamura and carried, H.R. No. 252 was adopted.

Representative Nakata rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, in my three years in this Body, this is my first presentation of this kind, and it is a great honor to be presenting Art Kaneshiro to you.

"I first met him about three years ago. When I met him, I was immediately impressed because of one statement that he made: 'the children live up to the expectations that we have of them and that we should expect much from them.'

"A year later, in another discussion with him, he said: 'the kids at Kahaluu can do anything.'

"That is the kind of attitude he brings to that community and you can see it. Many days when I leave home to come here, I happen to live right across the school, he is there. There are times on weekends, Sunday afternoons, 5:00 o'clock, I walk by the school and there is his car. He does put in long hours.

"He is a solid administrator. His teachers respect him.

"There is one instance where a teacher had some disagreement with him, she mentioned it to me, and I said to go ahead and talk to Art. He is an open person and he is strong enough to take some criticism. Later she reported to me that she had done so; and she is a teacher who had supported a very shy student to such an extent that a few months later, Mr. Kaneshiro did not recognize her because her behaviour had changed so much. I mention this because I think that is one of the important roles of an administrator -- to support his staff so that they can support their staffs also.

"Another indication of his value to the school, he mentioned this to me this morning -- I don't know whether he expected me to be using it -- but his first year at Kahaluu -- the Kahaluu School had come in twenty-fourth in the Windward Sports Festival -- twenty-fourth out of twenty-four schools.

"Since then they have moved up to seventeenth, twelfth, and fifth -- and I guess with that progression, very soon they will be number one. He says he has a long way to go, but I think he is fairly close now.

"One last comment -- he also mentioned to me that in his first year at Kahaluu, there were twenty-five students participating in the Windward Speech Festival. This year he reported to me that there are over a hundred -- one-third of the student body. I think that speaks very well for Art. I'm glad to have him at Kahaluu. We are fortunate in this State to have people of such calibre in our school system. Thank you."

Floral leis were presented to Mr. Kaneshiro by Representative Hirono; to his wife, Lorraine, by Representative Okamura; to his mother, Mrs. Elaine Kaneshiro, by Representative Hagino; and to Mr. Sakai Loo, Deputy Superintendent of the Windward District, by Representative Crozier. A certified copy of the resolution was presented to the honoree by Representative Nakata.

Representative Okamura then rose and stated:

"It gives me great pleasure this morning to speak in favor of this resolution.

"As a former member of the Board of Education, I was very disturbed at the time because we received a number of reports indicating the declining interest of our young people in reading and in books.

"Books are not only sources of knowledge, they are the road maps to the world offering themselves as imaginative travelogs to compensate for the constraints and limited financial resources of many of our young people. In this regard, any program designed to encourage a young person's interest in the world of books and literature is very much welcomed.

"Reading Rainbow is a television series which is designed to turn children on to reading good books and to help reverse the tragedy of more and more young Americans reading less and less.

"Reading Rainbow began as a fifteen part summer series targeted for children aged five through nine years old and received critical as well as popular acclaim.

"In a national survey, librarians across the country reported positive effects on children's summer reading habits. Because of this success, the series has been expanded to include five new episodes and has been shown in some cities in the fall as well as in the summer.

"In Hawaii, Reading Rainbow book marks were printed and distributed at libraries and book stores throughout the State. Librarians reported significant increases in the number of children asking for books featured on Reading Rainbow.

"Mr. Speaker, this indicates to me that this series has definitely helped to motivate Hawaii's young people to read."

At this time, Representative Okamura introduced several people who have been critical to the development and production of Reading Rainbow: Mr. Levar Burton, the host of the series and well known for his portrayal of Kunta Kinte in "Roots"; co-producers and directors for the series who are a husband and wife team, Mrs. Cecily Truett and Mr. Larry Lancet.

Floral leis were presented to Mr. Burton by Representatives Kim and Hirono; to Mrs. Truett by Representative Yoshimura; to Mr. Lancet by Representative Hashimoto; and Representative Okamura presented a certified copy of the resolution to Mr. Burton.

"I never personally knew this giant of a man, and little did I know, however, that one day I would have the privilege and honor to meet, know and to respect this giant of a son, Bob Luck, as an individual who in his own right, has given so much of himself to the betterment of the people of Hawaii.

"Bob has touched so many lives through his hard work--his endless work--for the betterment and improvement of, and advocating, for the rights of victims and witnesses of crime in this state.

"Bob was one who could understand and empathize with the fears, the terrible memories, the psychological and physical traumas and just knowing the overall legal consequences shared by victims and witnesses of crime.

"Bob, with his sincerity, his gentleness, his soft spokenness and, like his father, his humor was able to somehow make things all right for our victims and witnesses of crime.

"Bob, we are all going to miss you. When I heard that you were leaving us, I felt like someone very dear to me was going away for a long time. But I know that is not true.

"Bob and his family will always be a friend of the people of Hawaii. I just know that Bob's ability to make things happen now will be spread

around a little bit--to California now.

"Hawaii should be very grateful that our people were able to be blessed with some of that wit and contributions that Bob is leaving with us. We are going to keep going, Bob, we're going to keep building for rights of victims and witnesses, you have my word on that. The things that you started, we are going to keep going. Please keep in touch with the people of Hawaii. The House Judiciary hearings just won't be the same without you."

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

and unassuming, neither powerful nor rich. But this person holds to high standards and stands for his principles. This person lives his life like an example and demonstrates his goodness not by words, but by deeds.

"Such a person is Taichi Matsuno. He and his wife, Katherine, are held in great esteem by their friends and neighbors.

"Mr. Matsuno has led an active and productive life giving of himself in earlier years to the Y.M.C.A., Y.W.C.A., the Lion's Club, the Red Cross and he also helped found the Kaimuki Business and Professional Association in the mid forties.

"In fact he tells me he remembers Kaimuki as the second largest business and shopping district outside of Downtown forty or fifty years ago.

"He also ran as a Republican for the House of Representatives in the late forties -- and I'm glad he finally made it here today.

"I am very proud to be able to honor this humble and honest man this morning. He is an inspiration to the younger people in the community and we should not forget his kindness to so many of us."

At this time, Representative Marumoto introduced Mr. and Mrs. Taichi Matsuno who were asked to stand and be recognized.

Representative Kiyabu then rose and stated:

"I want to thank Mr. Matsuno. He had a great influence in my life for over thirty years ago when I was an active member of the Kaimuki Y.M.C.A. during high school.

"As the resolution has stated, he has influenced a lot of lives for a good number of people including the Chief Clerk of the House, Mr. Takane.

"At this time, Mr. Matsuno, thank you very much."

The Chair stated:

"The Chair thanks Mr. Matsuno for not persuading you to become a Republican."

Floral leis were presented to Mr. and Mrs. Matsuno by Representative Marumoto and Representative Kiyabu, and Representative Marumoto pre-

sented a certified copy of the resolution to the honoree.

A resolution (H.R. No. 303) congratulating the organizers and participants of the Conference on Creativity and Science was jointly offered by Representatives Hagino and Levin.

On motion by Representative Hagino, seconded by Representative Levin and carried, H.R. No. 303 was adopted.

Representative Hagino then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, when I first heard about this conference in an article in the newspaper, I was very struck by what the organizers were trying to do. As I read more about it, I wanted to bring some recognition to the work.

"I was told that at this conference, well over four hundred people from Hawaii and outside of Hawaii have registered for this conference.

"We have speakers for this conference from other parts of the United States and even all the way from England.

"Most of us here when we consider the budget request -- we see all kinds of requests for the Institute of Astronomy -- we read about the University of California putting a telescope on Mauna Kea--we're constantly funding millions of dollars worth of equipment -- and I think what this conference does which is so marvelous, is that it points out to all of us that a physicist dealing with a particle accelerator really has a lot in common with a poet with a pencil at hand; and what is in common is really the spark of creativity, of genius which all of us really have. I'm sure any one of the participants will tell you that creativity is at least latent in all of us. And I think this is the truly marvelous work of this conference -- to expand and to show the common ground that is with scientists, humanists, entertainers, dancers, choreographers, playwrights and even legislators -- that this creativity is the hallmark of human endeavor that we pay tribute to at this conference.

"This conference will be held this week-end at Mid Pacific Institute and all of us are invited to participate and listen to these wonderful lectures that will be presented."

At this time, Representative Hagino

introduced some of the major speakers at the conference as follows: Gillian Beer, vice-mistress at Gerten College at Cambridge University who had won a major literary prize in England for a book entitled, Darwin's Plots; Harold Morowitz, Professor of biophysics and biochemistry at Yale, who has written many books in the fields of biophysics and biochemistry; Arthur Miller, Professor from Lowell and Harvard University, who has written and lectured extensively on the History of Science and Technology; Dr. Gertrude Sharff-Goldhaber, who is an expert of particle physics at Brookhaven National Laboratory; Lenn Goodman, who is the Principal Humanities Scholar for this conference and who is a Professor of Philosophy at the University of Hawaii; Dr. Diane DeLuca, who is the hard-working project director for the conference and who is a Doctor and Assistant Dean at Windward Community College; and Lynn Hendricksen, President of the Hawaii Council of Teachers of English and also a Professor at Brigham Young University of Hawaii.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:17 o'clock p.m., with the Vice-Speaker presiding.
