

THIRTY-FIFTH DAY

Wednesday, March 11, 1987

The House of Representatives of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:00 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Lt. Kenneth Atkins, Chaplain of Destroyer Squadron 25, Pearl Harbor, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Hashimoto, M. Ige, Ihara, Lee, Leong and Tungpalan, who were excused.

By unanimous consent, reading and approval of the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Thirty-Fourth Day was deferred.

THIRD READING

The following bills, which were on the calendar for Third Reading, were read throughout and the following actions taken:

Representative Souki moved that H.B. No. 1181, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Liu rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I would like to express one concern and that is, I think as drafted, the bill perhaps may go further than was intended. I think the intent was to allow the police to charge fees if they so wanted to under rules and regulations of the counties involved, but I think, as drafted, the operative language indicates that the Police Department of each county shall furnish on a fee basis. I think that although you have other qualifying language concerning rules and regulations, that might create a situation where under conditions where they may desire, for various reasons to provide such escort for free, that

they may have their hands tied by the measure as drafted.

"So, perhaps an amendment by the Senate as this bill goes over might be entertained so that we don't have to come back next year, and perhaps have to change this bill again.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1181, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FUNERAL ESCORTS", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes, with Representatives Hashimoto, M. Ige, Lee, Leong and Tungpalan being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 1181 had passed Third Reading at 11:17 o'clock a.m.

Ige, Lee, Leong and Tungpalan being excused.

Ige, Lee, Leong and Tungpalan being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 416, 58 and 853 had passed Third Reading at 11:20 o'clock a.m.

On motion by Representative Metcalf, seconded by Representative Hagino and carried, H.B. No. 989, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WITNESS IMMUNITY PROCEDURES", passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes, with Representatives Hashimoto, M. Ige, Lee, Leong and Tungpalan being excused.

H.B. No. 1000:

On motion by Representative Metcalf, seconded by Representative Hagino and carried, H.B. No. 1000, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PROMOTING A DANGEROUS DRUG IN THE SECOND DEGREE", passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes, with Representatives Hashimoto, M. Ige, Lee, Leong and Tungpalan being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 989 and 1000 had passed Third Reading at 11:21 o'clock a.m.

H.B. No. 1267:

By unanimous consent, action was deferred until Friday, March 13, 1987.

H.B. No. 1270:

Representative Metcalf moved that H.B. No. 1270, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hagino.

Representative Crozier rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, what this bill would do will force people who have moved away from their districts to re-register in their new districts. I think this is a timely bill, but I would like to also point out the ramifications of what this bill would do.

"First of all, Mr. Speaker, the form of government that we have is a republic which is made up of three men, and three men are to choose their leaders. What has been happening. . . I guess since we've been a democracy, in Hawaii anyway, people

-- wherever they are born and raised and they grow up and they develop roots there. After they move away from the area, they want to continue having their roots wherever they came from, and for the first three elections that I was old enough to vote, I had already moved away from my community but I continued to go back to my community to vote. It was legal then and still is.

"But what is going to happen when this bill comes about, sir, is that all those people who traditionally go back to their communities, and these communities are the older communities; the kids have moved out -- they moved to Makakilo, to Waipio Gentry, wherever, but they still go back. There is going to be a realignment in the political bases throughout. I will have new voters coming in to my district. Even though they have been living there for ten years, they would no longer be able to vote in Kaimuki, Kalihi, and those people who used to count on the votes in Kaimuki, Palolo, Kuliouou, will no longer be able to count for those votes because they will be gone.

"So, Mr. Speaker, what I am saying is, this is major legislation. It will have an impact on the total society of Hawaii. It looks very innocuous right now, but if we understand the ramifications, we better be prepared for it, and I think we have to do it.

"Now, a good example is what these things effect the change. In the 1978 Constitutional Convention, we amended the bills to allow for more absentee ballots, brought in the scope for absentee ballots, because one individual came to testify before us, he felt that it was his constitutional right to vote and he did not feel that he had to tell us where he was when he voted. He was going to Israel but he thought that was his business to be in Israel. He did not have to tell the rest of the world. So we agreed with him. That's right, you don't have to tell us.

"But once we pass that law, people who have used their mailing or their absentee ballots to their advantage -- right or wrong, they use it. With this, sir, we will have the same thing happening. There will be a shifting in the electorate and it is better that the people that live there vote for their representative instead of somebody would be, I guess we call it 'reverse carpetbagging', going home to vote for somebody else which they don't really impact on their lives.

"So with that, sir, I would like to support this bill and ask my legislators also to support the bill and be prepared for the shifting in the political bases that you now have.

"Thank you."

Representative Apo rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the other side of the coin is that I kinda like the idea of people who may want to vote against me to be able to vote somewhere else.

"Thank you."

Representative Metcalf rose and requested that Representative Crozier's remarks and Representative Apo's remarks be inserted into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1270, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ELECTIONS", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes, with Representatives Hashimoto, M. Ige, Lee, Leong and Tungpalan being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 1270 had passed Third Reading at 11:26 o'clock a.m.

Representative Metcalf rose and stated:

"An observation, if I may."

Directed by the Chair to "proceed," Representative Metcalf remarked:

"This is rather a banner day for me. This is the first time the Judiciary agenda has come down on the floor and passed unanimously.

"Thank you very much."

At 11:27 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 11:43 o'clock a.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives Lee and Tungpalan.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

At this time, Representative Anderson rose on a point of information and inquired:

"Mr. Speaker, I am wondering if as

Speaker of this House, is it not the responsibility of the Speaker to more or less take care of all of us in our needs with the other fifty. . ."

The Chair interrupted and said:

"Depends what your needs are."

Representative Anderson continued his query:

"The reason I ask, Mr. Speaker, is that very recently, in what we will call a community newspaper, a constituent has an article whereby he accuses not only myself but the other legislators as more or less being on the 'take.' I called the AG's office and they are looking into the possibility of representing us. Their views right now is, normally we would have to represent ourselves and I don't think that's fair to any man or woman on this floor. . ."

Representative Crozier, on a point of order, stated:

"My point is, I don't think what he is talking about is on the agenda or is relevant to the proceedings of the day."

The Chair said: "Point is well taken."

At 11:44 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 11:47 o'clock a.m., Representative Anderson thanked the Chair.

Representative Lee: "Your Committee on Education will have an informational hearing tomorrow at 1:30 on the AIDS information program. The briefing would end at 2:30."

Representative Ihara: "Your Committee on Intergovernmental Relations will be having a public hearing on Friday at 8:30 a.m. in Room 310. We will be hearing a number of resolutions."

The Chair then stated:

"The Chair would like to remind all members that your Committee chairmen have Committee reports to be signed so we would like to know your whereabouts in the building so those Committee reports can be reported on the floor by midnight tonight."

At 11:49 o'clock a.m., the House of Representatives stood in recess until 9:00 o'clock p.m. tonight.

On motion by Representative Levin, seconded by Representative Apo and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1889, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PERMITS FOR ARCHAEOLOGICAL WORK", passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative Levin, for the majority of the Committee on Water, Land Use, Development and Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 500) recommending that H.B. No. 611, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

At 9:50 o'clock p.m., Representative Apo asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 9:52 o'clock p.m., Representative Hemmings rose and stated:

Representative Hemmings rose to speak against H.B. No. 611, HD 1, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I am really afraid that if we pass this bill, Representative Crozier will want to have the akule fish added to the list of official State fishes besides the humuhumunukunukuapuaa, and we are putting a bad precedent by having two of anything.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair responded:

"Representative Hemmings, I think you are talking about the wrong fish."

Representative Hemmings asked:

"A right forest or wrong fish, Mr. Speaker?"

The Chair answered:

"We're talking about the State tree, I believe."

Representative Hemmings said:

"That's exactly right, sir. I think it's a plot to get the two State trees and next we'll have two State fish."

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair remarked:

"It's good to share these things, though, you know."

Representative Crozier rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Thank you."

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

H.B. No. 1267 on Third Reading:

Representative Metcalf moved that H.B. No. 1267, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hagino.

Representative Liu then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I do commend the intent behind the bill which, I think, is to broaden participation among young people. I think that is a very noble ideal and a very noble cause behind this particular measure. But I have grave concerns that we are really on the borderline of constitutionality where we stretch the age deadline in the election year from election day now clearly to the end of the year of that election year. I think that it is somewhat contrary to the legislative history behind the various constitutional amendments both on the federal and state level which allow eighteen year olds to vote. I think we potentially set ourselves up for a challenge, or at least questions, either from the Federal government or, perhaps, from our own county clerks regarding the potential of having to have two separate ballots, perhaps, one for state elections, one for federal elections if there are conflicts on that level, perhaps, having the whole thing declared unconstitutional.

"Again, although I commend the concept behind the measure, because of my questions on it, I feel compelled to vote 'no'.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1267 entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE II, SECTION 1, OF THE HAWAII CONSTITUTION, TO CHANGE THE AGE QUALIFICATION FOR VOTING", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 43 ayes, which was not less than two thirds of all the members to which the House is entitled, with Representatives Anderson, Hemmings, Liu, Medeiros and O'Kieffe voting no and with Representatives M. Ige and Jones being excused.

The remarks of Representative Shon are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, as we consider this bill, I ask that we keep in mind the plight of a young woman I know. She is not a smoker. She is expecting her first child. She works in an office surrounded by non-smokers and smokers alike.

"In this situation, the non-smokers have been forced to tolerate the pollution of the smokers. My friend, who plans to work as long as possible until having her child, tries to take good care of herself. But she is worried. Each day she must inhale, for up to 8 hours at a time, the second hand smoke of her more senior colleagues. She has read the reports of the Surgeon General. She is anxious. She fears that the second hand smoke will affect her health and the health of her child. She has look for work in other areas, but jobs are hard to find. It is not realistic for her to seek employment on the basis of which business will accommodate her condition.

"Mr. Speaker, I ask you and all our colleagues, does not this individual have a right to clean and healthful environment? It is reasonable that pregnant women, people with asthma, people with other ailments, or just people whose eyes burn with smoke should have to endure 8 hours a day from inconsiderate co-workers?

"Mr. Speaker, this bill is a modest attempt to provide some remedies for non-smokers. It is not as comprehensive as I would like. If I had my preferences, however, this bill might not gain the support it deserves.

"What does it do?

"First, it requires employers to adopt a written smoking policy.

"Second, it requires a good faith effort to reach an accommodation between smokers and non-smokers.

"Third, it provides for an appeal by

a majority of non-smokers if they are unsatisfied with the policy.

"This bill also excludes private offices, businesses occupied exclusively by smokers, federal buildings and others.

"It is a reasonable bill. It is a modest bill. And it is a sensitive bill.

"Controls over smoking in the workplace have been favored by 79.6% of those surveyed by the American Cancer Society and the Hawaii Heart Association. And limits were supported by 65% of those who smoke!

"In addition, 85.7% favored a ban on smoking in public places.

"I think, Mr. Speaker, that it is time to stand up for the good health of our colleagues and neighbors, for the frail, the asthmatic, pregnant women and others who should not have to choose between their jobs and their health.

"It is also the time to get a handle on the spiraling costs of health care. We all know that prevention is the most effective way to reduce the price of health care. Let's take a step this evening. Let's save our money and our lives.

"I urge passage of this bill. Mahalo."

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak strongly in favor of this long overdue piece of legislation.

"There are many handicapped

students who are unable to use conventional educational materials. Under present copyright law, if more than one student needs alternative formatted materials, permission must be secured from the publisher.

"Materials in braille, large print, and tape are hard to obtain. When compounding this with laws that make things even more difficult, we end up doing a disservice to our handicapped citizens. This bill would mandate language in all State procurement contracts allowing the right to produce copies in alternative formats for those unable to use conventional materials.

"As a legislator having to attend hearings and review bills, much of my staff's time is spend brailleing those materials for me. I am very grateful for the opportunity to participate in our legislative process with my brailled materials. We cannot forget those handicapped people who do not have the resources to have materials prepared in an alternative format for their use.

"I thank Chairmen Takamine and Hagino for recognizing this and moving this important piece of legislation that will open doors for handicapped people by making it easier for agencies to provide materials to all who need them.

"H.B. No. 251, HD1, cuts through the red tape right to the heart of our mission as legislators--helping those who need assistance."

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of this bill which wasn't heard tonight because in the haste and pressure, it failed to get on the agenda. This is a bill which will put on the ballot the lengthening of our sessions from 60 to 80 working days.

"I am sure all of you are aware of the haste with which we struggle to conclude our work for each session. I am certain that each of us needs more time to consider the legislation, to talk with constituents and to go to hearings. If we had 20-hour work days, we might be able to cover all this, but since that is beyond the realm of possibility, I introduced, long before there was any talk of a salary increase, this measure to increase our sessions by 20 working days -- just about a month.

"The present length of the session does not provide sufficient time for thorough consideration of the legislation by the legislators, nor for the public to make adequate input. It is difficult for constituents to follow all the legislation. They often find themselves in the position of needing to be at two hearings at the same time, and sometimes find that they have missed an important measure because they did not know it was scheduled. Our Judiciary chairman noted during decision making on this bill that his committee had over 600 bills referred to it and, because of the briefness of the session, many worthwhile measures simply couldn't get heard.

"The pressures of the deadlines on committee proceedings tends to concentrate power in the hands of com-

mittee chairmen. Short notice on hearings and protracted agendas makes testifying an impossible task for people who are working and cannot afford a half day of waiting for 5 minutes of testimony. This gives organized pressure groups and corporations who can afford paid lobbyists more influence than they deserve.

"Had I known the size of the proposed salary increase, and that it will, if we approve it, take effect at the beginning of the Fifteenth Legislature, I probably would have suggested an even greater extension. But perhaps it is best that we take the extension in increments. There is no doubt in my mind that the salary levels proposed indicate that we should look ahead to being a full-time legislature.

"In addition to the aid that an extension will be to the public and to the members of the Legislature, I feel that the longer period of employment will enable us to retain good staff members and not have as much turnover as happens now."

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 789) recommending that H.B. No. 1595 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Liu and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1595 entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM", passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representative M. Ige being excused.

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 790) recommending that H.B. No. 428, HD1, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Liu and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 428, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC LANDS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representative M. Ige being excused.

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 791) recommending that H.B. No. 1519 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Liu and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1519 entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO VESSEL REGISTRATION FEES AND CHARGES", passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representative M. Ige being excused.

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 792) recommending that H.B. No. 628, HD1, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Oka-

mura, seconded by Representative Liu and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 628, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE FUTURE HOMEMAKERS OF AMERICA, HAWAII ASSOCIATION", passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representative M. Ige being excused.

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 793) recommending that H.B. No. 1053, HD2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Liu and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1053, HD2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INCOME MAINTENANCE PROGRAMS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representative M. Ige being excused.

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 794) recommending that H.B. No. 1013, HD1, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Liu and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1013, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MATERIAL AND LABOR USED ON PUBLIC WORKS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representative M. Ige being excused.

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 795) recommending that H.B. No. 27, HD1, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Liu and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 27, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS AND MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING FOR THE ELDERLY", passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representative M. Ige being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 1489; 858; 1131; 1315; 875; 594; 1465; 1873; 38; 1595; 428; 1519; 628; 1053; 1013; and 27 had passed Third Reading at 10:26 o'clock p.m.

At 10:26 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 10:47 o'clock p.m.

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 799) recommending that H.B. No. 1740 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Apo and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1740 entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC LANDS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Anderson and Liu voting no, and with Representative M. Ige being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 1740 had passed Third Reading at 10:48 o'clock p.m.

MATTERS DEFERRED FROM EARLIER ON THE CALENDAR

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 612 on H.B. No. 139, HD2:

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Liu and carried, the report of the majority of the Committee and H.B. No. 139, HD2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LEASEHOLD", were recommitted to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 614 on H.B. No. 897, HD1:

Representative Okamura moved that the report of the Committee and H.B. No. 897, HD1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Liu.

Representative Peters then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I don't know if you recall back in 1978--or maybe I should go back a little further--this leasehold law was passed. One of the major pronouncements was that it would provide people in the state of Hawaii the option of perhaps owning their land in fee. I'm sure there are a number of arguments for and against and, of course, me being the Speaker, I have been accused of using undo influence--HHA and the like--although they were lies; but now I am not the Speaker so I can get up and talk a little bit about it.

"Back in 1978--if those of you who have the bill before you--I would like to point out that under 'qualifications for purchase', they changed the word, 'and' to 'or' so that now land-owners are forced to sell their land to even people who are foreigners to this country and they are also forced to sell land to people outside of the state of Hawaii, and they call it a 'public purpose'. Maybe the Star Bulletin and Advertiser can add to that.

"Now, under Section 7, they are adding--or they are changing--another requirement. When this bill was passed, government used 'eminent domain'; basically, condemnation, the taking of land from one entity and giving it to another. Condemnation--so they are going to take it from Bishop Estate, Kamehameha Schools, Campbell and a lot of other lessors and supposedly they were going to give it only to those who did not have land that can be used for their residences close to their place of employment. So, if you had land on the Big Island and you lived here on Oahu, then you would still be eligible because that land on the Big Island is not close to where you're working, which is on Oahu.

"They changed the wording and, in my understanding, HHA, which has been pretty derelict in their responsibilities, is the entity pushing for this. How it now reads is: 'that person does not own a majority interest in fee simple lands'; before it read, 'does not own in fee simple land suitable for residential purposes'. Now they changed the words to 'majority interest'. What does it mean?

"It means that if I am a lessee and I have a wife and married, and we have, say, a hundred parcels of land, be it here on Hawaii or elsewhere, as long as 50% of those parcels or 50 parcels belong to me and fifty parcels belong to my wife, none of us have a majority interest.

"Very shrewd. Very shrewd, indeed. And yet we are supposed to be helping and designing laws to assist in housing--assist who? Obviously, not the people of Hawaii. But that is a 'public purpose', right?

"Obviously, I can stay here for the next hour going into detail. But instead, because I am not a lawyer, I rest my case."

Representative Crozier then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Early this afternoon, I made mention about my father. It brought back some memories I think is kind of appropriate at this time.

"My dad was quite a radical in his day. One of the things he spent a lot of his time doing was fighting against the Bishop Estate. He was quite upset with the Bishop Estate because they had all the land. They were not sharing the land with the people. He continually harangued the Bishop Estate because they were not making their lands productive; they were isolating the lands from the people. They had an obligation to society.

"Well, Mr. Speaker, somewhere along the lines Bishop Estate caught on. They developed Halawa Valley; they developed Kahala, down by Farmers Road and behind up in that valley up there; they developed Kokohead and that area. And when Act 506 came about, when the lessees were having an opportunity to buy their land, you know, I asked my dad--by this time I was a little bit older, I could understand more--I said, 'well, aren't you happy now that the lessees can buy the land'? And he said, 'boy, you were misinterpreting what I was trying to say all along. I was trying to say that the Bishop Estate had an obligation to make the lands available to the people so that the people can have homes'. He wasn't all that crazy about them selling the lands but that is the way the laws go.

"I would just like to make one more point about how the Bishop Estate went out and helped the people live by that law by the chipping away of their base. You know, Representative Peters had mentioned that in 1978 they changed the words from bona fide resident of the state from 'and' to 'or.'

"In 1975, originally, you had to live on the property for five years before you can buy the homes. In 1975 they eliminated that word so that all you had to do is be a resident and now, we take it all the way to the far end; you don't even have to live there.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lee then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I think we all have a duty and obligation to protect and enhance the patrimony of the Hawaiian people. I think the chipping away is contrary

to the intent of land reform.

"Land reform is supposed to provide the opportunity for a resident to own his home. It is not to break up Bishop Estate, not to diminish this patrimony.

"I urge you to remember that and all of us who either came here or were born here have the duty and obligation to protect and enhance that patrimony.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hirono then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to make my remarks very brief.

"The limitation that is addressed by this bill has not been fair and equitable in many cases, for example, where the lessee inherits a partial interest in fee property.

"We were told that this change would result in all kinds of circumvention of the intent of the Land Reform Act. However, your committee was not presented with any evidence of this kind of circumvention which can occur under the current provisions.

"I would like to note that while those purchasing their fee title under the Land Reform Act must meet certain requirements, once the tracts are designated and the prices established, lessors have offered to sell in fee to those lessees who would not have qualified under the limitations of the Land Reform Act.

"That being the practice of lessors--essentially, to open up sales to all lessees--I fail to see the adverse effect of this bill on the type of lessees who ultimately are given the opportunity to purchase their fee.

"I urge my colleagues to vote 'yes' on this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Peters then rose in rebuttal, stating:

"Obviously, I cannot stand here and let the chairman of the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce go unchallenged.

"I think the law is written very clearly.

"HHA has the responsibility for

qualifying those who are eligible under this program. Not the lessor, not Bishop Estate or anybody else who is a lessor.

"Now, we tested this legislation all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court. Now the U.S. Supreme Court has ruled that the public purpose is something that the state can do. Fine. We're not arguing that. We are arguing, however, the fact that there is this constant chipping away as Representative Lee has indicated.

"The wording right now would allow for greater abuse amongst those who certainly don't need these lands because they have their own. The law was initially designed for those who did not--who really need it--a place that they could call their own, in fee. And even though I disagree with that in principle, constitutionally, it has been ruled, all right. That's fine.

"But why do you have to change the eligibility all the time?"

"Thank you."

Representative Marumoto then rose and requested that the remarks of Representative Hirono be incorporated as if they were her own, and the Chair, noting that there were no objection, "so ordered." (By reference only)

At 11:01 o'clock p.m., Representative Apo asked for a recess, and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:03 o'clock a.m.

Roll call having been requested, the motion was put by the Chair and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 897, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RESIDENTIAL LEASE-HOLDS", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 32 ayes to 15 noes, with Representatives Apo, Bellinger, Bunda, Crozier, Hashimoto, Hemmings, D. Ige, Kanoho, Lee, Liu, Peters, Say, Souki, Tungpalan and Yoshimura voting no, and with Representatives M. Ige, Leong and Tajiri being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 897 had passed Third Reading at 11:05 o'clock p.m.

At 11:05 o'clock p.m., Representative Takamine asked for a recess, and

the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:06 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 615 on H.B. No. 885, HD2:

Representative Okamura moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and that H.B. No. 885, HD2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Liu.

Representative Hemmings then rose on a point of order.

Directed by the Chair to state his point, Representative Hemmings asked:

"Mr. Speaker, are we going to be allowed free and open discussion on matters of this nature that have been deferred until the end of the calendar?"

At 11:08 o'clock p.m., Representative Okamura asked for a recess, and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 11:09 o'clock p.m., Representative Hemmings rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, unfortunately, there is not much time left and probably there are a lot of people who want to speak on numerous, profound issues that are being expedited through the system here tonight, so I'll comment very briefly.

"People have a choice and we are headed towards a no-fault society when we start providing excuses for people who make the wrong choice. Especially in the case of alcohol and drug abuse, mandating that society has to pay for the poor choices of people abusing themselves and their loved ones and society, in general, is against all principles of right and wrong. The option is to, 'just say no', when it comes to taking drugs or when it comes time to alcohol abuse.

"I urge us to legislate back a responsible society by voting down bills like this. This allows people to cop out on their responsibility to take care of themselves.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Arakaki then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I think it is time that--as far as mental illness--we move out of the dark ages and into the Twentieth century and place mental illness on the same level as we do physical illness. And those who are concerned about cost to their pockets, they should look at our prisons and our state hospitals and see how many of them are there, and they are there because they either committed a crime or some act of violence. Think about the cost of their care.

"I think we need to recognize the importance of good mental health, and I think by passing this type of legislation, it will encourage people for early intervention and save the state the monies.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 885, HD2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INSURANCE", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 32 ayes to 17 noes, with Representatives Andrews, Bellinger, Bunda, Cachola, Cavasso, Hashimoto, Hemmings, D. Ige, Ihara, Kanoho, Lee, Peters, Pfeil, Say, Tajiri, Tom and Yoshimura voting no, and with Representative M. Ige being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 885 had passed Third Reading at 11:12 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 617 on H.B. No. 446, HD2:

Representative Okamura moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and that H.B. No. 446 HD2, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Apo.

Representative Cavasso then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Today, our community faces a major crises with drugs. This bill will abridge the rights of the society at large in order to protect those who may be using drugs.

"Just a month ago, on one of my job sites, an employee came to me and reported that drugs was being used on that job site and out of fear of being hurt or injured by this, the employee told me that he could not tell me who or under what circumstances.

"This bill would make it that much

more difficult to deal with this problem in our community. The Chamber of Commerce has estimated that drug and alcohol abuse among workers cost employers \$60 billion dollars each year. These are the costs for lost productivity, accidents on the job, higher medical claims, increased absenteeism and theft of company property. These costs are passed on to our entire community as we try to deal with the crises in drugs.

"So, here are we trying to legislate laws to further hamstring employers from identifying, rehabilitating or disciplining people who are on drugs?"

"This version of the bill sets up three conditions where an employer may test employees, but the three must be present before the employer can act on that; I think that's an unwise decision.

"I encourage this House to vote against this bill."

Representative Marumoto then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"At a time when Congress has recognized the need to get tough on drugs, this bill, unfortunately, will do just the opposite.

"While this measure would grant employees necessary protection and privacy from random searches, it gives drug users a great deal of immunity from detection. It makes it difficult to adequately protect public safety and while it is important to conserve workers constitutional rights, we should not use extraordinary measures to protect illegal activity.

"House Bill No. 446 allows testing of an employee only if there are reasonable grounds to believe that impairment exists. That is reasonable. But the bill further requires that the impairment presents a clear and present danger to self or others. This is a requirement so stringent that accidents virtually have to almost occur before a test can be administered, I'm told.

"Another problem with this proposal is that ambiguous language makes it unclear whether applicants for jobs can be tested. Page 3 refers to 'impairment if hired'. Yet the Committee report assures us otherwise. The most disturbing portion of this proposed law is that it switches the burden of proof when an employee is aggrieved about his drug testing. The burden falls on the employer,

under this bill, according to testimony from the construction industry legislative organization, and not on the employee.

"My colleagues, we have a duty to protect the public. The public has the right to be able to expect drug free employees in the police force, among firefighters, in the medical field, public utilities and in other sensitive and hazardous professions. Why make it harder for employers to detect users? Why make it easier to escape detection? Why vote, yes? This bill goes too far, farther than the touted San Francisco ordinance, and it is incumbent upon us all to vote 'no.'

"Thank you."

Representative Takamine rose to speak in favor of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill is aimed at providing employers, employees, the representatives, and other concerned citizens of our State with appropriate guidelines and standards for minimizing the influence of drugs in the workplace. We have found the task of accommodating a number of our fundamental and cherished values in our democracy difficult to achieve in developing these standards. Nevertheless, I sincerely believe that this bill represents a fair, balanced and appropriate approach to the problem of drugs in the working environment.

"It should be observed at the outset, that the problem of drug use in our society is not limited to the workplace. The problem is widespread and affects all segments of our community. This bill represents one approach, among many, which may be needed to finally eradicate drug use and drug influence in Hawaii.

"Any effort to regulate employees on the job must take into account many factors, among them, are the following:

1. Our commitment to public safety;
2. Our shared concern for the constitutional right to privacy;
3. Our interest in promoting employee health and safety;
4. Our desire to protect management's flexibility in operating and managing their businesses; and
5. Our commitment to limit costs and exposure to civil liabilities.

"Each of the foregoing considerations

have played a part in the development of this bill.

"First, we have found employers and employees equally concerned with the risk to public safety presented by those working under the influence of illegal drugs and chemical substances. Private and public employers are cognizant of the need for daily supervision to insure that no worker is impaired in their performance of work and that safety to that worker and others is not compromised.

"This bill in Section 5 prohibits the use of intoxicating substances and protects the employer's right to discipline and even discharge employees for working under the influence of intoxicating substances. When there is reasonable cause to believe that an employee's faculties are impaired and presents a danger to safety under Section 3 of this bill, the employer is empowered to require the employee to undergo blood, urine or encephalographic testing.

"Some have proposed that random and mandatory blood or urine testing be allowed. Very few employers in Hawaii have accepted such an approach because of the prohibitive cost and the inherent limitations in blood and urine testing which are discussed in the committee reports. More importantly, indiscriminate testing of employees without reasonable cause infringes upon the fundamental right to privacy endowed by our state Constitution in Article I, Section 6 and in Section 7. Our State Constitution expressly provides that, and I quote, 'the right of the people to privacy is recognized and shall not be infringed'. To conform to constitutional requirements, employers are permitted to test the employees when there is reasonable cause on an individual basis. Section 7 of the bill is also intended to encourage employees in high risk categories for affliction of communicable diseases to voluntarily undertake testing without fear of retaliation. Privacy is assured so that individuals will be encouraged to voluntarily undergo appropriate testing. Accordingly, this bill provides protection of the constitutional right to privacy in two respects.

"Third, under HD2, employers are permitted to continue to promote employee health and safety by requiring annual physical examinations of employees. Medical screening to monitor exposure to toxic and other unhealthy substances is allowed under Section 4. Your Committee on Judici-

ary also amended the bill to accommodate the safety and health standards established by the Hawaii Occupational Safety and Health Act.

"Fourth, this bill seeks to protect employers in various ways. Management's right to operate their businesses freely from undo government interference is preserved. We have also been concerned about the high cost to employers associated with indiscriminate testing. Available medical and scientific studies confirm that blood, urine or encephalographic tests lack reliability and demonstrate an alarming rate of false positive results. Often these tests do not even measure the effects of particular drugs on one's fitness to perform work. We are happy to note that Hawaii employers have not plundered their valuable resources to drug testers who currently lack the degree of scientific accuracy needed to isolate the menacing drug user.

"Finally, this bill represents a proper balance between the interest of safety in health, with constitutional consideration for privacy. By achieving such a balance, we provide employers the best possible protection against potential civil liabilities under the common law. By complying with the standards established in this bill, we aim to provide employers insulation from unwarranted lawsuits and costs.

"Mr. Speaker, I urge my colleagues to vote 'aye' on this measure.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 446, HD2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMPLOYMENT PRACTICES", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 36 ayes to 13 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Andrews, Bellinger, Cavasso, Hemmings, Jones, Kanoho, Liu, Marumoto, Medeiros, O'Kieffe, Pfeil and Ribellia voting no, and with Representative M. Ige being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 446 had passed Third Reading at 11:23 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 623 on H.B. No. 445, HD1:

Representative Okamura moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and that H.B. No. 445, HD1, having been read

throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Liu.

Representative Metcalf then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, your chairman on Judiciary would not have reported this bill out unless he thought it was a fair and equitable bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Hemmings then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Briefly, and to the point, bills like this and laws like this are exactly the reason why our state has a bad reputation as a place to do business.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Takamine then rose and requested that his written remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal, and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

The remarks of Representative Takamine are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill is aimed at redressing the disastrous effects on Hawaii's people when a large establishment suddenly and without any prior warning shuts down or relocates outside of the State. Workers and their families, in these instances, are unexpectedly thrown onto unemployment and welfare rolls and are provided little time for retraining and alternative job placement. Since medical coverage for affected workers is suddenly stopped, large number of workers and their families face potentially catastrophic medical losses.

"The economic and social problems resulting from plant closures have been inadequately handled in the past under Hawaii law. Plant shutdowns in the sugar and pineapple industries have affected whole regions of our State and the ensuing problems have ultimately ended up in the Legislature. More recently partial shutdowns are displacing workers in our service industries as well. Due to inadequate prior notice, the social and economic dislocation has been very costly to Hawaii's taxpayers.

"Under this bill, business establishments which employ more than 50 employees shall provide 3 months' notice to affected employees and the Department of Labor so that proper preventive measures can be undertaken under the existing dislocated

worker programs. According to the Director of Labor, of the 21,939 business firms in this State, the bill will cover only 1,211 employers. Thus, approximately 5% of all firms doing business in Hawaii will be covered. Construction projects are also excluded from this measure.

"Due to the large number of workers and families who are affected by plant closures and the need to provide effective job counseling, training and placement through the Department's dislocated worker program, a three month advance notice is provided. This three month notification requirement will not adversely affect transfers, mergers or other business transactions which are often associated with plant shutdowns. Those who are involved in such business transactions recognize that the time period required for the transfer of real property and for obtaining various government permits will normally take more than three months. Thus, the three month notification will not unduly interfere with the economic freedom currently enjoyed by entrepreneurs in our free market system.

"Since the bill provides for notice from a seller of a business firm, it should not deter new investors to Hawaii. It does not impose obligations on new investors who are 'purchasers.'

"Under this bill only workers and their families who are already covered by group medical plans will continue to receive medical coverage for 120 days. If a displaced worker is promptly placed in another job, medical coverage from their subsequent employer may be invoked to shorten the coverage period for the affected establishment.

"Finally, the bill requires that the affected establishment promptly pay for wages, benefits and other forms of compensation. This provision is intended to insure that displaced employees not be left 'holding the bag' with an irresponsible party who might attempt to escape existing legal responsibilities. In the age of increasing foreign owned establishments, such a minimum requirement is prudent and fair. It is consistent with good corporate citizenship in Hawaii.

"Mr. Speaker, I urge favorable action on this measure."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the

majority of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 445, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DISLOCATED WORKERS", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 31 ayes to 18 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Andrews, Bellinger, Bunda, Cavasso, Hashimoto, Hemmings, Isbell, Jones, Liu, Marumoto, Medeiros, O'Kieffe, Peters, Pfeil, Ribellia, Tajiri and Yoshimura voting no, and with Representative M. Ige being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 445 had passed Third Reading at 11:25 o'clock p.m.

H.B. No. 1169, HD1:

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Liu and carried, H.B. No. 1169, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE REPLACEMENT OF SAND ON PUBLIC BEACHES", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Cavasso, Jones and Medeiros voting no, and with Representative M. Ige being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 1169 had passed Third Reading at 11:26 o'clock p.m.

H.B. No. 611, HD1:

Representative Okamura moved that H.B. No. 611, HD1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Liu.

Representative Crozier then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, a real short statement.

"Two years ago, we tried to name the state fish. At that time, I was supporting the akule which I considered the working man's fish and, naturally, I lost, but to keep this thing moving real fast, right now we are proposing to make the koa the state tree.

"Mr. Speaker, the koa is for the rich and the powerful. If you look at this building right here, all this powerful people are surrounded by koa. If you go to the courts--koa. If you go to the expensive hotels, you find koa. Koa is for the rich.

"The poor people have to use the kukui nut for jewelry, for example,

for that is all we can afford.

"Mr. Speaker, even the canoes of old were koa canoes for the alii. The makaihana, or the working people, had to use ulu and kukui nut for their canoes. Just like today, the rich people ride Mercedes and Cadillacs and the working people have to drive Toyotas and Datsuns.

"For that reason, sir, I would ask that we do not allow the koa to become the state tree and to leave the working man's tree alone.

"Thank you."

The Chair replied:

"Representative Crozier, the kukui nut is very expensive today."

Representative Anderson then rose and stated:

"Very briefly, because we were to do some homework on this, I talked to one of the kupunas from Waianae and Auntie Aggie said, 'please, let's keep the kukui nut tree our state tree. We don't need the koa. We should have only one--it provided candlelight, oil, medicine--everything that we needed', so I'm going to go and ask all my colleagues to vote 'no' because I'm going to go 'no' on this.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and H.B. No. 611, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMBLEMS AND SYMBOLS", having been read throughout, failed to pass by a vote of 22 ayes to 27 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Arakaki, Bellinger, Cachola, Cavasso, Crozier, Hashimoto, Hemmings, Hiraki, Hirono, Horita, Ihara, Isbell, Jones, Lee, Leong, Liu, O'Kieffe, Oshiro, Peters, Pfeil, Ribellia, Say, Shito, Tam, Taniguchi and Tom voting no, and with Representative M. Ige being excused.

At 11:28 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:30 o'clock p.m.

H.B. No. 444, HD1:

Representative Okamura moved that H.B. No. 444, HD1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Liu.

Representative Cavasso then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill is going to provide that someone who comes to work, and then decides to quit--walk out on the company--and seven weeks later, they can apply for unemployment insurance. I believe that it is improper, especially in light of the fact that the company for which he walked out on will then have to hire a replacement.

"It is good that we, as a people, maintain responsibility and this bill is encouraging irresponsibility and I vote 'no'.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Marumoto then rose to speak against the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill proposes to change the present unemployment insurance law located in Section 383-30 by establishing a seven week disqualification period for claimants who voluntarily quit their jobs without good cause and for those who are discharged for gross misconduct.

"I am opposed to this bill because it would result in higher unemployment cost for employers while, in effect, be rewarding workers who quit their jobs without good cause or who have been fired for misconduct. They would merely have to wait their seven weeks for benefits to commence, and would collect as much in benefits as if they had been laid off for lack of work. To provide benefits to an individual who has chosen to be unemployed is both ill-advised and inequitable to those who pay the tax and to other workers.

"Mr. Speaker, the passage of this measure would cost the city at least 1.8 million dollars a year according to their testimony. Furthermore, employer costs statewide would increase an estimated 15 million dollars due to this bill. This testimony was from the Chamber of Commerce.

"The Hawaii Business League has called this amendment a 'giveaway' program. The National Federation of Independent Businessmen, business, the Hawaii Food Industry Association, the Hawaii food and beverage people, the automobile and retail dealers have also testified against the measure.

"The original intent of the State unemployment law is to, and I quote, 'mitigate the effects of sudden or

extended unemployment on the involuntarily unemployed'. This is from a 1976 House Journal. It was not meant to provide payment for the worker, who by his own actions, created his unemployment.

"Finally, Mr. Speaker, this bill would make it more expensive to do business in Hawaii. Our Legislature should be encouraging economic development. This is a backward step and I urge that this measure be defeated.

"Thank you."

Representative Pfeil then requested that his written remarks, against the bill, be inserted into the Journal, and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

The remarks of Representative Pfeil against the bill, are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against this bill.

"The unemployment insurance system provides valuable protection for those who are not involuntarily employed through no fault of their own. I don't believe it should be used to provide income for those who are voluntarily unemployed or whose unemployment is the result of their own misconduct.

"Mr. Speaker, this bill represents a philosophic position against the work ethic, and would continue to undermine values that we, as a policy-making body, should protect."

Representative Hemmings then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is a classic bill that rips off the workers--the producers in the businesses of Hawaii--by allowing the freeloaders and the cheaters the chance to not work and collect our hard-earned dollars through the businesses that have to pay for strikers' unemployment benefits.

"I urge all of us not to promote irresponsibility and not to promote people collecting from the system who don't deserve it.

"Please vote 'no' against this bill."

Representative Takamine then rose and requested that his written remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal, and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

The remarks of Representative Takamine are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill amends the five-week re-employment penalty which is currently assessed against claimants for unemployment insurance benefits who have quit or who were discharged for serious or gross misconduct. Its objective is to make more equitable the grades of penalties imposed on disqualified claimants.

"It substitutes a five week re-employment requirement with a seven week disqualification when an employee has quit or engaged in gross misconduct. In some ways the bill stiffens the penalty against all claimants who resign and/or are terminated for serious misconduct. It also reserves the most severe penalty for those claimants who are discharged for theft or embezzlement.

"The bill does not in any way free claimants from any penalties under existing law. The Department of Labor informs us that currently 22% of all applicants for unemployment insurance are disqualified. This bill will not change the rate of disqualification. Thus, between one out of every four to five applicants will continue to be disqualified for one reason or another.

"The bill also does not restore liberalized standards which existed under our law before 1976. By establishing a range of stringent penalties, this bill reminds all employees that unemployment insurance benefits will not be readily available to those who quit their jobs without cause or those who engage in gross misconduct. Overall the bill does provide, however, for a more equitable and fair administration of the unemployment insurance program.

"Accordingly, I urge favorable action."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 444, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO UNEMPLOYMENT SECURITY", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 33 ayes to 16 noes, with Representatives Andrews, Bellinger, Cachola, Cavasso, Hayes, Hemmings, Ihara, Jones, Kanoho, Liu, Marumoto, Medeiros, O'Kieffe, Pfeil, Ribellia and Tajiri voting no, and with Representative M. Ige being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 444 had passed Third Reading at 11:37 o'clock p.m.

H.B. No. 768:

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Liu and carried, H.B. No. 768 entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE XV, SECTION 1 OF THE HAWAII CONSTITUTION, TO ALLOW THE INCLUSION OF PALMYRA ISLAND IN THE BOUNDARIES OF THE STATE OF HAWAII", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes, which was not less than two-thirds of all the members to which the House is entitled to, with Representatives Jones and Liu voting no, and with Representative M. Ige being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 768 had passed Third Reading at 11:38 o'clock p.m.

H.B. No. 1384, HD1:

Representative Okamura moved that H.B. No. 1384, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Liu.

Representative Liu then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, very briefly, I'm not opposed to the intent of the bill but unless we are going to beef up the paroling authority with more staff to be able to provide an intensive surveillance type program, I cannot support the bill, so I shall be voting 'no.'

"Thank you."

Representative Hemmings then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the way not to solve the problem of not having enough prison space is to turn the prisoners loose by allowing the paroling authority to promote home detention.

"Judges send prisoners to jail to pay their debt to society and hopefully learn what they're doing is wrong. This should not be turned around by the paroling authority because we don't have enough room.

"We've got to build more prisons, promote prison industries and have the prisoners pay for their incarceration and pay their debt to society.

"I urge members to vote their conscience on this and vote 'no'. It's irresponsible.

"Thank you."

Representative Jones rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to insert Representative Liu's remarks as though they were my own (by reference only) and I would like to mention that in light of our prison problems in my own district--we had a young man who had been sentenced to ten years and got out after less than one, broken into a home and was killed this past week.

"I think with the kind of problems we're facing right now with releasing too many people too early, this is not the kind of law we should be enacting right now, so I encourage my colleagues to vote 'no' on this bill."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1384, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOME DETENTION", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 44 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Hemmings, Jones, Liu, Medeiros and Ribellia voting no, and with Representative M. Ige being excused.

H.B. No. 681:

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Liu and carried, H.B. No. 681, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COMMUNITY HEALTH", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 41 ayes to 8 noes, with Representatives Bunda, Crozier, Hashimoto, Lee, Oshiro, Ribellia, Shito and Yoshimura voting no, and with Representative Yoshimura being excused.

"Mr. Speaker, kindergarten has changed since most of us went to school. The curriculum is devoted to academic progress rather than merely providing an opportunity for social adjustment to the school environment, as was true in the past.

"As a result, those children who miss kindergarten sometimes have difficulty in keeping up with their peers in first grade.

"Under the present law, kindergarten attendance is not mandatory. A few people oppose mandatory kindergarten because they say that some children are not ready for school at the age of five.

"The present law on compulsory attendance in school already allows for exceptions under Section 298-9 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes, but this bill has been amended to emphasize the point that we wish to provide flexibility for students, parents and teachers in determining whether a child is ready for kindergarten or first grade.

"This measure is directly related to our commitment to lower class size in kindergarten before doing so in any other grade level. Lower class size will increase the potential achievement of all kindergarten students at a cost of approximately five and a half million dollars. If kindergarten is being given such a high priority in class size reduction, it is logical and necessary that it be made mandatory.

"By making kindergarten mandatory, we are emphasizing the critical importance of early education in attaining long-term academic success which will work toward our goal of providing quality education.

"I ask my colleagues to vote 'yes' on House Bill 18."

The remarks of Representative Bunda on H.B. No. 16, HD2, are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of House Bill No. 16, HD2, but with deep reservation.

"This bill establishes a convention center authority which will select the site for the center. Mr. Speaker, I feel the selection of the site for the convention center by this method is wrong and irresponsible. We, in the Legislature, have been elected to make decisions on issues of public concern. This responsibility must be exercised for all issues, not only the easy ones. The selection of a convention center site is a highly emotional one. We cannot, however, delegate our responsibility merely to avoid possible detrimental political consequences.

"Establishment of an authority to select the convention center site will not remove the issues from the legislative arena. Ultimately, we will all have to vote on this matter. Even if the authority selects the site, we will have to vote on appropriations to construct the center. Moreover, opponents of the site selected by the authority will surely introduce a measure to override the decision. In reality, this bill does not shield us from someday having to vote on the convention center site. This bill merely delays the day when we must all take a stand.

"Proponents of this bill also suggest that more study of the convention

center site issue is needed. The Legislature already has requested and received the recommendations of two studies: one by the Pannell Kerr Forster firm and the other by the Legislative Reference Bureau. Both studies, which evaluated various sites on strictly objective criteria, found that a small portion of the Ala Wai Golf Course is the best location for the convention center. Pannell Kerr Forster and the LRB were given a duty to perform by the Legislature. In the performance of their studies, they faced only slightly less pressure than is facing us now. Both realized that any site chosen would generate much dissatisfaction and be very unpopular with those who favored other candidates. But, both performed their duty and recommended Ala Wai Golf Course site.

"Yes, the State of Hawaii needs a convention center to stimulate the economy. And yes, the convention center should be oriented towards the visitor market to maximize the import of out-of-state dollars. Each year of delay results in the loss of a huge amount of dollars to the State. The site for the convention center must be chosen by the Legislature and no one else. Any site chosen by the Legislature will generate political opposition; however, political opposition should not be a factor in this matter.

"For these reasons, I do not agree that an authority should be delegated to perform a duty rightfully belonging to the Legislature. Nor do I agree that further study is necessary to select a convention center site. I feel that the Ala Wai Golf Course site, after consideration of all factors, except political factors, has much merit as the site for the convention center.

"Mr. Speaker, because the convention center should remain alive, I am reluctantly in favor of this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Cachola then stood and requested that his written remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal, and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

The remarks of Representative Cachola on H.B. No. 16, HD2, are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of H.B. No. 16, HD2, relating to a convention center. The purpose of H.B. No. 16 is to establish a state

authority for the selection of a site for the development of a Hawaii convention center. I believe that the creation of a convention authority is an alternative for resolving the highly debated issue of selecting a site for the Hawaii convention center. Although, my personal preference for a site is Magic Island, I can understand the concern of the members in supporting a site that has not been fully explored by the Legislature as a whole. I believe that Magic Island should be seriously considered as a possible site for the convention center. Why? There are lots of reasons. The accounting firm of Pannell Kerr and Forster which has completed one of the three major studies on the convention center have testified that, upon further examination, the Magic Island site combined with a portion of Ala Moana Park mauka of the island would rise in rank from 8th to at least 3rd in their evaluation of all the sites. A Magic Island site, centrally located and with ample parking, would allow the people of Hawaii to use the facility when it is not being used for conventions--for example, local functions such as graduations, weddings, and luaus can be held there.

"With increasing population growth and cars, the roadways near the proposed inland convention center sites will grow ever more congested. Neighborhood traffic problems will choke off access of an inland facility. We must look to the future and utilize transportation alternatives that will avoid and not further increase existing traffic problems. Utilizing the state's waterways is one of these transportation alternatives. To this end Magic Island is more attractive than an inland site.

"The choice of Magic Island strikes a balance among the various proposals which have been offered. It is almost exactly midway between Fort Armstrong and the Waikiki-Kapahulu sites. It is close enough to the Waikiki hotels for visitor convenience, yet it is situated in a location which will allow the convention center to act as an economic catalyst for the area between Waikiki and Downtown. Another advantage of Magic Island is its close proximity to Ala Moana Shopping Center. Conventioneers would be inclined to walk across to the shopping center during their breaks to shop. The result would be increased sales for the merchants and increased revenues, via the excise tax, for the state.

"The Magic Island convention cen-

ter, surrounded by water, can be a place of stunning natural beauty. It can become a Hawaii landmark recognized around the world. As word of the convention center spreads, it can easily become prestigious and sought after site for national and international gatherings. In short, we need a convention center that is matchless and can market and promote Hawaii.

"I am hopeful that after careful examination of all the relevant factors, the authority will find that Magic Island is one of the best, if not the best, location for the convention center. For the center to succeed it must serve the needs of both our local people, as well as the visitor industry. I want to emphasize that I support the Magic Island site only if additional recreation acreage is created to replace that area which will be occupied by the convention center. New park area must be created ewa of Ala Moana Park or at Point Panic before the first shovelful of dirt is turned for a convention center.

"Mr. Speaker, I speak in favor of H.B. No. 16, HD2, which establishes an authority for selecting a site for the Hawaii convention center. It is imperative that the site selected be one that will not only fill our present needs but for future needs as well. If we are going to spend hundreds of millions of dollars for a convention center, why not strive for excellence? The site selected should be functional well into the future and should maximize our investment and, therefore, our revenues. I hope that the authority will seriously consider the Magic Island alternative where a convention facility of beauty can be created which would serve Hawaii's people and our visitor industry well into the Twenty-first century.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hirono, for the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 707) recommending that H.B. No. 391, HD1, pass Third Reading.

Representative Tam then rose and requested that his written remarks, against the bill, be inserted into the Journal, and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

The remarks of Representative Tam against H.B. No. 391, HD1, are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against H.B. No. 391, HD1, 'A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING'.

"H.B. No. 391 would exclude apartment development by the Hawaii Housing Authority from providing less than the required one parking stall per unit.

"Permitting the passage of H.B. No. 391 would result in the lack of sufficient parking in Kakaako, thus, resulting in parking problems. We must be realistic! In Hawaii, every licensed driver basically owns his or her own car and needs a parking space.

"I urge my colleagues to vote 'no'

on H.B. No. 391."

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Liu and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 391, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING", passed Third Reading by a vote of 37 ayes to 12 noes, with Representatives Hemmings, D. Ige, Isbell, Kanoho, Lee, Liu, Marumoto, Medeiros, Metcalf, O'Kieffe, Tam and Tungpalan voting no, and with Representative M. Ige being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 391 had passed Third Reading at 11:51 o'clock p.m.

Representative Hirono, for the majority of the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 710) recommending that H.B. No. 1587 pass Third Reading.

Representative Marumoto then rose and requested that her written remarks, against H.B. No. 1587, be inserted into the Journal, and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

The remarks of Representative Marumoto are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against H.B. No. 1587, which would require that scheduled losses for permanent partial disability benefits be increased and paid on a uniform basis at the highest allowable rate--100%--instead of the 66 and 2/3 per cent of the workers pay, as currently paid.

"First, I would like to call to this Body's attention that this bill before us is without any general consensus from your Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce. Mr. Speaker, nine of the fifteen members of your Committee have signed the committee report with reservations or 'I do not concur.'

"My biggest concern--as it may be with other members of this House--is the wide disparity in what the increased costs under this bill will be.

"The State Department of Labor and Industrial Relations, which supports the bill, estimates the additional costs, based upon 1985 payouts, would be about \$250,000 a year. On the other hand, the Hawaii Insurance Rating Bureau (which analyzes on an apolitical basis), estimates the bill will

increase costs by 9.7 percent or \$18.6 million!!

"Mr. Speaker, I ask the question: Which is it? One-quarter million or \$18.6 million? Until we know, we have no business passing this bill. Our workers compensation costs are already an enormous burden on Hawaii's employers. Before we act on this measure, we need the facts!

"I urge all members to vote against this bill."

Representative Takamine then rose and requested that his written remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal, and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

The remarks of Representative Takamine are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill is aimed at correcting one of the most inequitable and discriminatory provisions existing under Hawaii workers' compensation law. It pertains to the award of permanent partial disability for what are referred to as scheduled losses --losses of the fingers, toes, limbs, eyes, and ears of the injured workers.

"Under existing law, two workers who receive the same injury will not receive the same level of compensation for permanent disability. Thus, two workers who suffer loss of their index finger will receive a different award depending on the wages they earn. Higher paid workers receive a higher amount even though their injury is no greater than that of a lower paid worker. Under this bill benefits for scheduled losses will be determined in accordance with the State's average weekly wages.

"Mr. Speaker, unfortunately, certain interest groups have grossly exaggerated the impact of this bill. The Department of Labor assures us that the cost implications of this bill are relatively insignificant and that certain interest groups have grossly exaggerated cost projections. Fairness and equity in the workers' compensation law is the sole issue involved here.

"I appeal to a sense of fair play and urge that this bill receive favorable action."

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Liu and carried, the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted

and H.B. No. 1587 entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WORKERS' COMPENSATION", passed Third Reading by a vote of 32 ayes to 17 noes, with Representatives Andrews, Bellinger, Cachola, Cavasso, Hayes, Hemmings, Isbell, Jones, Kanoho, Liu, Marumoto, Medeiros, O'Kieffe, Pfeil, Ribellia, Shito and Tajiri voting no, and with Representative M. Ige being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 1587 had passed Third Reading at 11:52 o'clock p.m.

Representative Metcalf, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 721) recommending that H.B. No. 441, HD1, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Liu and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 441, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WORKERS COMPENSATION RATE MAKING", passed Third Reading by a vote of 44 ayes 5 noes, with Representatives Cavasso, Hemmings, Jones, Kanoho and Liu voting no, and with Representative M. Ige being excused.

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 746) recommending that H.B. No. 1536, HD1, pass Third Reading.

Representative Liu then rose to speak against the bill and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, very briefly, I'm not against the concept; I think it's a people problem, not one that needs another position.

"Thank you."

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Liu and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1536, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SECURITIES", passed Third Reading by a vote of 44 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Cavasso, Hemmings, Jones, Liu and O'Kieffe voting no, and with Representative M. Ige being excused.

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Anderson and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering bills on Third Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 658 on H.B. No. 551, HD 2:

Representative Souki moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 658 and H.B. No. 551, HD 2, be recommitted to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Isbell then rose to speak on the recommittal, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I can understand the concerns of the House, especially when I talked to some of the Representatives what the bill should have had in it, and I realize now that it's got to be changed for next session. But it's important that they understand this for the recommittal. It should have said 'for large landowners,' because that is what we are really talking about, and we're really talking about Bishop Estate.

"These on your desks are an avocado, if you'll look, macadamia nut and coffee. They all grow on trees. The only thing that grows in Kona well are trees. So the farmers there must have long-term crops which means they must have long-term leases. Because, at the present time, there appears to be a crisis growing in Kona where the leases are being terminated; they are not being given long-terms anymore. In fact, if you can get fifteen years, you're considered fortunate. It would appear that lives mean nothing more than leaves down the stream because it's small business we're talking about. Every farmer is a small businessmen. In Kona, it just happens that every small farmer happens to live where his business is. So you're not only, when you terminate a lease, taking away his farm, but you are taking away his home. In fact, in one of

the testimonies that was given, in the Bishop Estate their own information that they give out is this: Every large landowner plays an important part in Hawaii's economic and social life. The decisions, depending upon their quality, can go good or bad for that life. It is important that the members of this whole State understand that what is happening in Kona is critical and it is getting worse. It started in 1981, and it got worse in 1983 when a whole group of farmers were being told that they were not going to get long-term leases.

"When you put in a macadamia nut tree, you get your first crop when it's eight years old. You do not get a full crop until it's eighteen years old. Macadamia nuts happen to be one of the largest crops in Kona. The coffee trees, some are over forty years old. Same trees, they just keep trimming them down and harvest the crops. Those are very important items in every farmers' life. The avocado, small as it is -- we're having a drought in Kona. As a matter of fact, it is very serious.

"Every farmer who has a Bishop Estate lease. . . it says in that lease that you must farm and those who have been on the land for third and fourth generations have had to keep that farm going even though at times coffee was a negative; it didn't pay anything -- \$8.00 a bag. And it was considered a financial hardship. Those farmers were forced to keep it in agriculture because that's what their lease says. From the Bishop Estate's own letter, it says very clearly that 'leaseholds which are unsuitable for productive crop cultivation, yet used for residential purposes, should be considered as if residential.' But when you have agricultural crops on them, the agricultural. . . this is a quote: 'The agricultural leasing policy of this educational institution has historically centered on the recognition of the needs of full-time farmers who have diligently worked the land.' I can tell you that you have to be part mountain goat to be a farmer in Kona. It is rocks; it is slope; and the only thing that grows well are trees. When we have the Land Use Commission even saying that 'inadequate controls... this is Act 187, have caused many of Hawaii's limited and valuable lands to be used for purposes that may have a short-term gain to a few, but results in a long-term loss to the income and growth potential of our economy, and the impact it has on the farmer.

"I want to just briefly read to you one of the leases that's from Kamehameha Schools. . . Bishop Estate, in other words. It says, in 1983 that this lease... this is from Kamehameha Schools. 'The policy is intended to provide an opportunity for lessees to be offered a new lease of up to forty-two years in length. The significant conditions of the new South Kona agricultural leasing policy are as follows. . . ' and it goes on to talk about it. Why there's a difference between North and South Kona leasing, I don't understand because they both grow the same crops very well except one part happens to be mauka of the Keauhou Resort development which may give you a clue. The new lease will have an expiration date of December 31, 2025. If you look at all the leases, they are non-renewable. At the year 2025 or 2020, it seems as if the world is going to end because there are no leases to be renegotiated at that time. Dead-end leases. There is something very ominous about all that. In the Kamehameha Schools, Bishop Estate letter of September 1986 -- now, this is what a new lessee is being offered. Fifteen years -- that's it. And the lease rents are very high.

"Obviously, we have a problem brewing and if the bill is to be recommitted, and I assume it is, then it is important that everybody knows that it will be coming out again, I hope. And I hope that all of you realize that what the bill is just simply saying -- if you're not going to give the farmers a new lease, at least if you're going to sell it, give them the right of first refusal, and I could tell you most of them can't afford it anyway.

"The lease also states, by the way, that if you are terminated, you may take your house with you and leave. Now, that's what it says. Now here's a quote from the lease itself. Incidentally, this is also from Bishop Estate, while I'm thinking about it. This is from their land plan addendum to the Kona agricultural leasing policy. It says: 'Lease terms. There are some criticisms of the proposed 45-year lease term as being inadequate. However, upon checking with Farmers' Home Administration, the 45-year term is sufficient to cover a thirty-year mortgage.' Forty-five is very nice; fifteen is impossible. If you have a storm and your trees go down and you replant, there's no way that you can resolve that problem by expecting a long-term lease.

"I have a lease here from someone

whose lease is up in five years. They are not being offered a new lease. It says: 'At the end of the said term of the lessee's lease, the lessee will peacefully deliver up to the lessee's possession of all the lands hereby demised, together with all fences, sewers, fruits, trees and other trees. . . .' Peacefully surrender. 'And if not in default, the lessee shall have the right, upon termination of this lease, to remove. . .', in other words, his house, other buildings, the sheds, water tank, and my question is: Where does the farmer go?

"The small businessman. You've said, okay, your lease is terminated. You may take your house down the road with you and your water tank, but you leave the fruit trees. Although you've put them in and you developed that whole thing and paid all of our taxes for years, you have nothing. Where would the farmer go?"

"What we are doing, Mr. Speaker, is saying to the Bishop Estate: This is inequitable. It is morally wrong. The trustees were never given that kind of... in the bill, the will of Bernice Pauahi Bishop. It says very clearly that one of her interests is agriculture. She says, 'I also direct that my said trustees shall have power to determine to what extent the said school shall be industrial, mechanical or agriculture. It doesn't say that you should take away agriculture. It's giving them a responsibility. This is a benevolent trust. It is supposed to be helping people. But by taking farmers out of their lands, these small businessmen, and saying to them, okay, take your house, go down the road, find a place for it, but leave your fruit trees and everything you've put in. You have essentially put these farmers into bankruptcy and they now become welfare recipients."

"Mr. Speaker, I will be very happy to accommodate anybody that has questions on this. I thank you for allowing me to speak on the recommittal, and I intend to come up with some more information for the next session and we will be having a new bill on it, I am sure. I just ask for all the people in this Legislature to understand that if they had thousands and thousands of people, and I do have in Kona, depend on agriculture for a living who were under the control of one large landowner who owns over 300,000 acres in Kona, you would be up here speaking as I do, and I ask only that you put yourself in my place. I truly am representing

the people of my district. I would only ask that all of you who are Representatives and elected do not represent special interest groups but represent truly the people of this State who elected you.

"Thank you very much."

At 12:20 o'clock p.m., Representative Taniguchi asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:21 o'clock p.m.

Representative Peters rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I think on Friday night. . .by the way, I speak in favor of the motion for recommittal. Friday night, I kinda made a comment that it is very easy for those of us who know the business of politics to pick on an institution that's fairly large. Bishop Estate. . .Kamehameha Schools is a benevolent trust and has tempered and balanced its relationship to the people of this community in such a way that I know lessees, as well as others, would stand and speak in behalf of that institution in a very positive way. But politically, I guess for the members of the media, of course for the purposes of selling newspapers, it is very easy to pick on big institutions. Now if you were to pick on John Doe on the street, I can assure you that wouldn't make headlines. But Bishop Estate, yes, and I think that's basically the kind of shenanigans that's going on here..."

At this point, Representative Isbell was recognized and she stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would just like to ask a point of information, please?"

Directed by the Chair to "state your point", Representative Isbell said:

"I would like to ask if. . ."

Representative Peters interrupted and said:

"Excuse me, Mr. Speaker, I am still speaking. You know, if she wants to rise to a point of personal privilege or point of order, I can understand your recognizing her. But for her to just stand up and call you. . ."

At 12:23 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:25 o'clock p.m., Representative Peters continued his remarks, stating:

"I guess the point is that when we talk about discrimination, and there is a section in this bill -- 519 -- the concern is how you go about amending your residential leasehold laws for the purposes of tying in agricultural activities.

"Now, who's playing games with who? Who's being mischievous, if you will? I challenge anybody on this floor to show me that Bishop Estate, over the years of their tenure in this process and in this State, has violated a lease and terminated a lease willy-nilly as seems to be the case by way of the comments made by the last speaker. I resent that very much, Mr. Speaker. This institution has been here for many, many, many generations and has performed a public good. I know many people on this floor would know of friends or relatives that have graduated from that institution and very proud of it. I never had that opportunity. I wish I did. But how do you think they get the revenues to operate? Not from the sky. You don't see me walking around here with handouts requesting the Legislature for money. We run it by virtue of the way in which we handle the purpose of our will -- that land that is handed down from generation to generation and held as a public trust for the Hawaiian children from the kings, the leaders of this State. At one time it was a nation. So if you think I'm going to stand here and apologize for having that land and administering it as responsibly as possible, you're crazy -- I'm not going to apologize.

"I can't tell you exactly what was in place with respect to policies in the past but I can tell you now -- yes, I have been appointed for the last two years, and yes, I expect that institution to maintain its social consciousness by way of extending leases in a responsible way because if you think I am going to let you steal it, you're crazy again. But you show me where a lease has been terminated. You show me! I know you can stand here and generate innuendos about that institution because nobody is here to defend them. Well, I am here and I am not the Speaker anymore so I don't have to take the bull. I don't have to bite my lip and my tongue everytime somebody mentions Bishop Estate."

At this point, Representative Souki interrupted and asked for a recess,

and at 12:29 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:30 o'clock p.m., Representative Peters continued his remarks, stating:

"Yes, Mrs. Speaker, just to wrap up. I know the previous speaker is also supporting the recommittal of this measure and I commend her for it. Obviously, there are definite flaws in it, and that's the sole purpose for the recommittal.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and Stand. Com. Rep. No. 658 and H.B. No. 551, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURAL LEASES", were recommitted to the Committee on Finance.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 663 on H.B. No. 706, HD 1:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 706, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Jones then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, what we might want to call this is the teenage unemployment bill for 1987. This bill proposes to increase the State minimum wage from \$3.35 to \$3.85 by July 1987, and beginning July 1988, the rate is proposed to increase by 5 percent per year regardless of inflation or anything else for each of these succeeding three fiscal years. Therefore, by 1990, the wage will be at \$4.45 per hour.

"Mr. Speaker, I submit to you, this bill will have a serious, detrimental impact on the job creation efforts for administration for this body and of the business community. Any increase in this wage will increase labor costs, production costs, and ultimately consumer prices. In effect, many of our local businesses will not be able to compete with their mainland competitors. Furthermore, there will be reduced entry level job opportunities. Employers will be less apt to hire students for inexperienced workers for the wages this bill proposes.

"I submit to you, Mr. Speaker, and

the rest of my colleagues here that the last increase of this sort resulted in a direct inflationary impact of 6.5 percent and a loss nationwide of 644,000 jobs. A report by the Carter administration on the result of a nationwide increase in this wage indicated the probable effects of close to the same, and that was the most conservative study that was done.

"Prior to us passing this bill out of committee, there was no economic model at all used. There was no study that was performed that would show the results of this increase in our State, especially considering the fact that we all know there is a good possibility of a recession a couple of years from now and we hereby lock ourselves in to a \$4.45 per hour minimum wage.

"I should also note, Mr. Speaker, this will create the ripple effects since wages above the present minimum will also be increased proportionately. This will definitely contribute to overall wage inflation. The vast majority of people that this will impact are not the family of four that most of the testifiers allude to. The overwhelming majority of people that this will impact, that will hurt their employment, will be teenagers and entry-level trainees. We are very aware of the shrinking funds from the federal side that are available for us to train new trainees. They come in to the marketplace. And now by increasing this minimum wage, hundreds, possibly thousands of young people, this summer and next summer, will be deprived of trained opportunities as employers that pay this minimum wage will be looking for experienced people to hire so that they can get more efficiency in their own personal economies.

"Mr. Speaker, the proponents of this measure have indicated that the present minimum wage a full-time worker will earn is close to \$7,000 for the year. Now, this is under the federal government's poverty level for a family of four annually, but it is very interesting, Mr. Speaker, that Congress has yet to make a change in the current Fair Labor Standards Act even though the proponents of this bill indicate that the minimum wage earners here are under federal poverty levels. Since we are using federal standards for poverty here in Hawaii, would it not be more appropriate and more timely for our State to follow the lead of Congress if they decide a minimum wage increase is needed?

"Finally, I would refer to a few very succinct paragraphs written in the Sunday paper by Mr. Pai: 'Raising minimum wage is kind of like trying to solve the problem by law rather than solving it by creating more opportunities. It's like a band-aid solution. . . .' he said. Pai said 'service businesses that pay the minimum wage operate on slimmer profit margins than say, manufacturing companies. If they have to pay more in wages, they pass the cost on to the consumer. When they can't afford to pass it on because of competition, they take smaller profits, cut jobs, or go out of business.' 'Rather than raise this wage, Pai said, the State should be helping to create more higher paying jobs -- jobs in the sciences, research, and high technology.'

"One of the people who testified at our hearing, I asked the question: 'Is it not true in a number of the poor areas of our State, for young children to come to work is fast food restaurants and they give their money to their parents when they go home to help that family?' And the testifier said, 'Yes, that's true.' Well, the conclusion of that is there will be an awful lot of young people, because these jobs will not be available, who will not have money to give to their parents, because they will be frozen out by employers hiring people at this wage level who are experienced and they won't have to train.

"I realize that everybody's motive in this are right. We want to have proper wage for people. But this particular wage is geared for entry-level people, for the young people, and they are the ones who are going to suffer the most by us raising it. I would strongly encourage us not to vote this bill in, not to commit ourselves to a \$4.45 per hour several years from now when we face a possible recession. Well, let's go back and do our homework before we write these bills. Let's get our economic models established and then let's make our decision based upon facts.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and I encourage all my colleagues, at this time, to vote no on this measure."

Representative Crozier rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, you know when I was elected to the Constitutional Convention, the League of Women Voters had a program for us and the number one thing they taught us...

the first thing they taught us -- the only reason for government is to protect man from his fellow man. If nobody ever encroached on another person, we would not have to be here, but we have to be here because people manipulate other people.

"Mr. Speaker, I speak in favor of this bill because the people we are trying to protect right now, or to assist, are those people who are the young, and more so the uneducated. For whatever reason they are here today and they are uneducated is not relevant. Twenty, thirty years ago, they did not get themselves educated. But now, they are in the workforce. One gentleman came before us and said, 'Everybody should get a raise if we get more productive.' For a person who is swinging a mop, I don't care how much faster he gets, his boss ain't gonna give him a pay raise because he's just doing the best job he can. There's a lot of people out there.

"Mr. Speaker, the minimum wage right now is \$3.35. If you double that, it will be \$6.70. After a year's work, that will come out to \$13,936 -- double of what these minimum wage people are making now! And that's less than what we legislators make and you folks have all. . .not all of you. . .eighty percent of us have cried that we are not making enough money. If we are struggling, imagine these people! They are making way less than half of what we are making. You know, these are the people that don't have medical coverage because the laws we pass, it says if you work less than twenty hours, you don't have to have medical. Who manipulates that? We all do -- the Legislature included. We manipulate that. These people have to work two jobs, two part-time jobs, just to make \$6.70 and they still sit without medical. The quality of life for them is not there. This is why we have this bill before us so that they can share in the basic quality of life that the rest of us have.

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to ask all my fellow members to vote for this bill because on this issue, we are helping the downtrodden and we are acting as their spokesmen.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I would also like to have Representative Jones' words as my own inserted into the Journal (by

reference only), but I would like to add to that, Mr. Speaker, by saying I think what bothers me most is that there was no study done on this. And what happens is when we turn around and go and just say from \$3.35 to \$3.45 to \$3.95 or whatever, without having any studies done, the rippling effect is terrible. I don't have to worry personally as an employer because my employees don't make the minimum wage. But when you are going to force me into giving another twenty percent or thirty percent without studying it, I then have to look at what I am doing, look at the hours that I am paying, either cut hours or cut employment, and I would have to cut employees and I wouldn't want to do that.

"And I think what Representative Jones says has got a lot of merit because when you force an employer without a study to just automatically turn around and say, what we are going to do is have to increase our wages. We are going to say, well, I guess we are either going to cut his hours back more drastically or get rid of people. And after a study is done, we may be able to then again employ future people, or we may just say if we can cut the hours and get along well, we won't hire additional staff. And that bothers me if we are not going to hire additional staff because we will not take the time to sit down with the employers, with the unions, with the employees, and say what's best for all of you. How can we best give you additional money without hurting anyone? And I think that can be worked out. But just for the Legislature to come in, sit down and say, you're right, they're not making enough; we're going to raise it. And then they lose their jobs and who do they blame? They blame us because we didn't sit down, we didn't try to study what we should, and for that reason, Mr. Speaker, I am going down and I would urge my colleagues to do the same.

"Thank you."

Representative Medeiros rose to speak in favor of the bill, with deep reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I am voting for this bill so that I can see this bill move to the Senate as a vehicle. I would like to see the Senate look into the graduating scale. That concerns me and that bothers me. But I sincerely believe that \$3.85 is not wrong at all, giving the teenagers at this stage, but I am very concerned about the graduating scale, Mr. Speaker, and I

hope the Senate will correct it.

"Thank you."

Representative Alcon rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I come from a section of town that is loaded with people who have two or three jobs just to make ends meet. The only reason why there was no study made on this bill, Mr. Speaker, is because of the fact that those people are not represented by unions who have time and means to make studies. Most of those people that are earning \$3.35, Mr. Speaker, are students and they are working while going to school and like my colleague, Representative Crozier, said, they are not working full-time and they are not deriving any of the fringe benefits that full-time people are entitled to.

"Mr. Speaker, we just concluded with the unions speaking in their behalf a pay raise for MTL and also of Local 5. The nurses at Kaiser also had pay raises because they were represented by unions.

"Mr. Speaker, it is up to us, as spokesmen for the people of the community, to see to it that something like this is given a chance for passage. I, therefore, ask all my colleagues, Mr. Speaker, to vote for this bill.

"Malamin Salamut."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 706, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WAGES AND HOURS", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 40 ayes to 6 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Cavasso, Hayes, Hemmings, Hiraki and Jones voting no, and Representatives M. Ige, Ihara, Ribellia and Shito being excused.

The Clerk directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 706 had passed Third Reading at 12:45 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 670 on H.B. No. 748, HD 1:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 748, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Again, Mr. Speaker, I would hope that everybody would look at our budget and every bill that's on your desk and the ones that we passed. I don't believe that we can afford to buy everything without a study. Just to turn around and say we want Waipio, we want to buy Magic Island or anything else, you better make sure that we have... it's not Magic Island, I'm looking at Carol. Anything that we want to buy. . . I didn't want to go ahead and get into . . . she flipped all of a sudden -- are we going to buy that too? I didn't want to hit on any other bills that we have that we are going to purchase but there's many and for that reason, Mr. Speaker, I don't think that we can just say we have a hundred million dollars, like some people are saying and we have lots of money. The hundred million that we have, ladies and gentlemen, is like a birthday gift. It's a one time only, and we have every State building, every school that needs to be repaired to be taken care of, and that will eat up your hundred million plus. And if you're looking at what we're going to get from the room tax, don't forget, if you were to check every one of these, we're going to give some to the schools, we're going to give some to the tourist industry, we're going to give. . . it comes up to 123 percent, I think.

"Sit down and think of what we are doing before you vote. Don't just say, well, that's a good idea. Look at it. We're coming back next year. There's a lot of bills that can stay alive. Make sure what we pass are going to be bills that are worthwhile and they are going to be productive, and then next year, we can look at the ones and find out if we are going to either pass it or kill it. But just to automatically say pass everything, it really concerns me, especially when there's dollars on it.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I hope everybody votes no."

Representative Souki rose on a point of observation and stated:

"I would just like to make a note that possibly we should make a study before we vote. That's all, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson, in rebuttal, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I think we should

back and do nothing but look at old bills and get rid of them. That's what happened here. We've got so many bills that we keep amending and amending because we haven't put any thought into it. We haven't been concerned about what we're doing; consequently, most of these are housekeeping. We ought to spend one whole session on doing nothing but repealing.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 748, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR PURCHASE OF WAIPIO VALLEY", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 34 ayes to 12 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Arakaki, Cavasso, Hemmings, Isbell, Jones, Kanoho, Liu, Marumoto, Medeiros, O'Kieffe and Pfeil voting no, and Representatives M. Ige, Ihara, Ribellia and Shito being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 748 had passed Third Reading at 12:50 o'clock p.m.

At 12:50 o'clock p.m., Representative Hiraki asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:52 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 679 on H.B. No. 239, HD 3:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 239, HD 3, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Hemmings rose to speak against the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill has an interesting legislative history and it started out with good intentions. Originally, we were going to use money for the Ocean Awareness Center, the bankrupt element of last year's budget, to buy Coconut Island for use by the University of Hawaii. Originally, the money was designated to purchase Palmyra Island. The bill was amended by Ocean Marine to buy Coconut Island.

"Last year, as you all remember, there were those of us who spoke out

very strongly against the Ocean Awareness Center; number one, because we didn't know what it was; and number two, because it was a terrible government intrusion into the business of the private sector. Nevertheless, last year's \$16-plus million was put into the budget with the stipulation that it would create an Ocean Awareness Center at Sea Life Park. Originally, the money was going to be destined for Ocean Awareness Center at Kewalo Basin.

"Well, it seems, according to the Honolulu Star Bulletin article of February 24th, that the misappropriation of the money last year was recognized and I will quote: 'We want to make the \$16-million work and because so many things are unanswered, we've got to start at square one,' the Chairman of the Ocean Marine Resources said. Another legislator said: 'In my opinion, we blew \$3-million,' and I agree. Let's not continue to blow \$16-million.

"This bill, mysteriously, was amended and I still can't find out how it had gotten from House draft 2 to House draft 3 to eliminate the repeal of the Ocean Awareness money. So that \$16-million mistake still exists in the budget, and simply, this bill appropriates \$1,000, whatever that means, to buy Coconut Island. This bill should be killed. We should correct this \$3-million plus the \$16-million mistake we've made by removing that money from the budget and conscientiously spending the money on government programs that need to be addressed by this Legislature and not leaving the money in the budget to make continued mistakes. If we are going to buy Coconut Island, then that should be part of the budget and can be amended at a later date.

"The conscientious thing to do is vote no on this bill, amend the budget later, and get rid of the \$16-million mistake and then we can all go home doing something responsible rather than more exploitation of taxpayers. I urge you all to vote no against this bill. Its legislative history stinks!

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tom rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this measure calls for the acquisition of Coconut Island by the State of Hawaii. I believe that this acquisition is essential in order to achieve the dream high-

lighted by Governor Waihee in his address to us just six weeks ago, and one which many of us share -- to make Hawaii second to none in the field of marine biology.

"With such a purchase, the University of Hawaii's Institute of Marine Biology will be in the forefront of marine research and education. The Island will become a magnet for educating our youth, our college students, and our citizens about the island environment in which we live. The Institute will be a center for researchers from around the globe, but only if we act NOW to preserve the Island for all to learn and enjoy from.

"Coconut Island sits on a bed of living coral, Mr. Speaker, the only such place on this earth so close to a major international airport and a major university facility. We are indeed fortunate to have this unique situation right here, but unless we capitalize on this now, we will regret out inaction. In addition, if Coconut Island is sold to a private buyer -- I believe there are three interested private persons now -- we are all losers because the new owner may not be as accommodating to the Institute as the present ones are.

"We cannot afford, Mr. Speaker, to jeopardize the critical work at the Institute. We cannot remain idle and miss a chance of a lifetime. My colleagues, I ask that you examine the acquisition of this treasure and support it fully. In the end, the University of Hawaii, the people of this State, our children, and the generations to follow will all be winners.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lee rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"I support fully what Representative Tom has said about the desirability of purchasing the Island. I think we should judge the bill on its merits, judge the purchase of the Island on its merits.

"The University's President Simone has a dream; it should be our dream to create institutes of world excellence, and one of the initiatives is for a School of Ocean and Earth Sciences. The Island is an incomparable laboratory and a site of the lab in itself. It is part of that dream, and if we support higher education in the State of Hawaii, this is the time to go ahead and purchase the Island.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Bellinger rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is a unique opportunity for us. Too often the Legislature is accused of having lack of foresight and this is one instance, however, that it is to the State's best interest for us to pursue this particular acquisition. Not only will this allow us to develop an international marine research center and marine biology, it will also give us an opportunity to expand our total marine research effort. Often, we've heard the term, 'Let's make Hawaii a center in the Pacific for different types of activities.' By utilizing an area like Coconut Island, we have a unique opportunity to develop this into an international marine center, something that very readily we can be recognized as frontrunners in the world of marine development.

"This is a super chance for us. Let's project a little bit beyond just today. Let's project in it tomorrow; let's not blow this golden opportunity. I urge my fellow members to vote yes on this measure.

"Thank you."

Representative Isbell rose to speak in favor of the bill, with some reservations, stating:

"I am very much in favor of buying Coconut Island. I think it's very important that it's the most precious resource that we have for that scientific research that we need to do with the ocean. But this is not the same bill that I saw before. When I was in the Ocean Marine Committee, we passed it out. It was to repeal the Ocean Center. The money -- \$16-million. When it came out of Finance, that's what I thought too. I must admit I did not read it carefully when it came time for signatures. It was one of a stack of several, and somehow, it was changed.

"That's not the point. The point is that it becomes a vehicle to go to the Senate, and I would hope that my colleagues go to the Senators and ask them to repeal, put it back in the language, because we may not have the money to buy Coconut Island this year, but if you repeal this year and come back next year, the money is still alive and you can then buy Coconut Island next year.

"If this bill stays as it is and we don't have the money to buy Coconut

Island this year, it's dead. So, you have a choice. Ride with it as a vehicle and see to it that we at least get that repealed because the \$16-million is still sitting there and it will sit there and lapse in two more years. We could use it to buy Coconut Island if we work it right, so I would like to suggest that we pass it with those reservations and, hopefully, we will get what we want at the end which is Coconut Island.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Liu rose on a point of information and asked:

"I am wondering if the Chairman of the Finance Committee would acquiesce to a question?"

Representative Souki replied in the negative.

Representative Liu said:

"Then perhaps Representative Tom might submit to a question, Mr. Speaker?"

Representative Tom answered:

"I will answer any question that would be within the purview of my knowledge. I am not on the Finance Committee. If you're asking me about the beauty of the Island, I can tell you that when I went on the Island, it looked beautiful! You don't have to be blind to appreciate. . . I tell you, it's a beautiful Island. You want me to answer your question on the beauty of it, Representative Liu?"

Representative Liu responded:

"I'll ask my question, Mr. Speaker, and if Representative Tom wishes to answer or not, then he can make that decision, so with your permission, I'll ask the question."

Directed by the Chair to "proceed," Representative Liu asked:

"My question is whether or not the Board of Regents has as yet come forward with any formal recommendation concerning the purchase. I understand that at one point they had referred it to another committee and had not come to a consensus yet as to what we should do with that."

Representative Tom responded:

"Representative Liu, I am glad you asked me that question because this is not a planned thing between my Republican colleague and myself. I

was going to ask the Speaker to allow me to submit a letter that we just received from Gladys Brandt of the Board of Regents yesterday... Friday. I shows unanimous support for the purpose of Coconut Island. As you know, the Pauley family representative came here -- Mr. Beckett -- to show his sincerity and seriousness in selling this Island if the State isn't interested. And Lord and behold, I received a letter from the Board of Regents saying, let's go for it.

"Does that answer your question, Representative Liu?"

Representative Liu answered:

"Yes, it does. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I agree wholeheartedly with the intent of all people. What bothers me most, Mr. Speaker, is again, I am not sure if the University is willing to give up some of the other institutions on fisheries that they have. Are they going to put everything on Coconut Island whereby we get back other lands that we have? Is that Island going to be sufficient for everything that they want. I really don't know. I do know that they have several locations. What are we going to do about the others? Are we just going to buy the Island with the intent of having everything there and then we'll wait a year or two years and it will become just a place to go and visit?"

"If, in fact, someone else does buy it, it is my understanding, being in committee, that all lands that were filled in by the prior owner belongs to the State anyway. And even I had some difficulty with that because it seems to me that since 1940, they've been paying taxes on land that they don't own. And that really bothers me if they're going to be paying taxes and they don't own it, and I think we owe the present owners some money back.

"But, anyway, all of these things came up in hearings and we were unable to get all of the answers. So I am not saying these people don't have three other groups or individuals willing to buy Coconut Island, but if in fact we have a little time, I would like to find out from the University exactly what they plan on doing with Coconut Island in its entirety. That's my job and that's your job. I would have hoped that in

committee, we would have gotten a lot more answers to the questions that we have.

"Because of this, I am going no, and I thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hemmings rose and inquired:

"Point of clarification, Mr. Speaker. I would like to address some of the issues brought up by some of the previous speakers on personal privilege?"

Directed by the Chair to "proceed," Representative Hemmings stated:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise to speak. . .

At this point, Representative Peters rose on a point of order and asked:

"Is he rising on a point of personal privilege?"

The Chair asked:

"Is this a rebuttal, Representative Hemmings?"

Representative Hemmings answered in the affirmative.

Directed by the Chair to "proceed," Representative Hemmings stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I want to make it perfectly clear to this body that I am rebutting the actions and the spoken actions of the Finance Committee on this bill. I want to assure Representative Tom, Representative Belinger and the rest of you that I am a hundred percent in support of the concept of buying Coconut Island so that we may create in our University system a Marine Affairs Studies Program that would beat Scripps Institute and all the other institutes in this country.

"What I am concerned about is what happened in the Finance Committee where the conscientious effort of the prior committee members to repeal the \$16-million from the Ocean Awareness Center and redirect that money towards the rightful acquisition of Coconut Island was deleted from this bill as it hit the decks today and that there's only \$1,000 in the budget. The appropriate thing to be done was to support Representative Tom's bill in the proper way, as it originally came out of Ocean and Marine Resources Committee, repealing the sixteen million foolish dollars which

was appropriated for the Ocean Awareness Center and put it into a constructive effort such as buying Coconut Island, in support of Gladys Brandt's Board of Regents and President Simone's desires. But that is not what was done.

"There would be no problem with this bill if the Finance Committee had done what originally was intended to be done. But what we have now, Mr. Speaker, is we have \$16-million from the previous budget to acquire Sea Life Park and it has been decided not to do that so we have \$16-million sitting in the budget with no place to go. The money could have gone to buy Coconut Island -- it did not.

"I support the acquisition of Coconut Island but not by the method in which it is being done.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 239, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO OCEAN AND MARINE RESOURCES", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 41 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Hemmings, Jones, Liu and O'Kieffe voting no, and Representatives M. Ige, Ihara, Ribellia and Shito being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 239 had passed Third Reading at 1:10 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 680 on H.B. No. 1776, HD 2:

Representative Souki moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 680 and H.B. No. 1776, HD 2, be recommitted to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Cavasso rose to speak in favor of the motion to recommit, stating:

"The bill has been worked on for two years but due to some confusion, the original amendment that was intended to go into the bill and was run through Representative Levin of the Water, Land Committee for prior concurrence was only partially incorporated into the bill and, therefore, there is some confusion. There is no confusion however, Mr. Speaker, in the intent of this House to solve the problem for the farmers in Waimanalo, those farmers who have

been on the land for almost thirty years and who have been on that land on a month-to-month permit system.

"There is a general concurrence in this House that we are going to solve the problem, and I appreciate that concurrence. There is concurrence from the Governor and the Department of Land and Natural Resources that we need a bill to address and solve this problem. There is concurrence from the Senate. In fact, there is a Senate vehicle coming over, and hopefully, we will be able to address it this year. If not, we do have assurance from the Department of Land and Natural Resources that they will take no action against the farmers in Waimanalo until this body has had time, in the interim, to address the subject carefully, redraft the bill that has language acceptable to all.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and Stand. Com. Rep. No. 680 and H. B. No. 1776, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC LANDS", were recommitted to the Committee on Finance.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 685 on H.B. No. 1482, HD 2:

Representative Souki moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 685 and H.B. No. 1482, HD 2, be recommitted to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative O'Kieffe rose to speak in favor of the recommittal, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, members of this body have received a plethora of information on this issue. Many individuals and recognized scientific associations have presented their arguments and well indeed. Both sides have presented their facts and disputed each others facts. However, this exercise is critical in deciding my position.

"What has transpired over the past several days has been an orderly forum but one that has transported me from a soft down to a soft up. For this reason, my remarks focus on the importance of open discussion, in the exchange of reliable information, for in fact, if 1482 was adopted, there will be a real need to involve individuals in the communities throughout our State in a similar dialogue.

"The members of the Water, Land Use, and Hawaiian Affairs Committee recognized the importance of citizen input and amended the bill to allow for public participation during the planning and evaluation stages of any fluoridation program. This provision has won my endorsement; however, this section should be strengthened. It must be sensitive to the rights of individuals and participating communities before implementing draconian measures to fluoridate their waters. There is no need to rush this implementation now. Concerns must be sincerely addressed. In addition, the floriculture industry must also be protected.

"The Committee will have the opportunity to strengthen the public participation provisions and I encourage them to do so. With my vote of support comes an additional appeal for vote of caution.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and Stand. Com. Rep. No. 685 and H.B. No. 1482, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO REQUIRED FLUORIDATION OF WATER SUPPLIES", were recommitted to the Committee on Finance.

KAWAKAMI, SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES (JANUARY 21-MARCH 8, 1987)", was adopted.

RECONSIDERATION OF
ACTION TAKEN

Representative Okamura moved to reconsider action taken previously on H.B. No. 463, relating to revenue bonds for G.N. Wilcox Memorial Hospital, seconded by Representative Apo and carried.

Representative Anderson then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I have nothing about my concerns on the bill. What concerns me, Mr. Speaker, is that we just praised the Speaker of the House this morning, the staff and everybody else for getting all of the Senate referrals over, and then we find out after they've been out for all week-end, and there's a lot of work that could have been done, then all of a sudden we don't have two Senate bills so we're now going to have to take a bill that was recommitted, bring it back on the floor. With twenty-six votes you can do anything that you want on this floor and that's what we've always been told -- if you got the votes, you can do anything. But let me tell you something, ladies and gentlemen. Work and getting good quality work out is what we're supposed to do. And I don't think that it's fair, just because we have votes, that all of a sudden we find out we didn't do something when it should have been checked out, so we say, well, never mind, we'll make the corrections and take care of it.

"I am not against the recommittal because the substance is fine, but I do worry about the way that we handle our business. And for that reason is why I am speaking against the recommittal. I will go up on that particular bill, but I want you to know that I am concerned with the quality of work that we are doing here. It bothers me and it should bother each and every one of you, and we better start looking at the next half of this session at what we're doing and come out with the best that we can for all of us.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Liu rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, regarding this motion to reconsider, I stand to speak against the motion and just to indicate that I wish the words of my colleague, Representative Anderson, the Minority Floor Leader, be incorporated as my own into the Journal.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Peters rose to speak in favor of the motion, stating:

"I often made the comment that what you can improve upon, we should do. We are all humans here. There are judgment calls that are going to be made on an ongoing basis, some of which is going to lead us to be slightly remiss. But we are humans -- we all make mistakes. And there's no problem if we understand those mistakes are there and try to rectify it, and that is exactly what this motion intends to do for the betterment of this State.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson, in rebuttal, stated:

"I am not talking about making mistakes -- everybody makes human mistakes. I think that's fine. But when we can turn around and have good quality bills that go down the tubes and then they turn around and they more or less smile and say, you don't have twenty-six votes so the heck with it. That's what I'm talking about.

"This bill happens to be a good bill. But there are other good bills that we've had and we refused, and I don't care, nobody here should be looking at authorship. What we look at is quality and when we have quality bills that go down the tubes and we bring out a mistake and you say, you don't have the twenty-six votes so the hell with the bill even if it is going to be good for the people, that's wrong. That's why I said in this particular case, Mr. Speaker, I think it is fine; I think that we should go ahead and have this particular bill. But I am against the way we do it, and that's what I am talking about.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hemmings rose to speak against the motion, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in doing so, I am not speaking against the substance of the legislation, and I agree with the good Representative from Waiānae that on a substantive basis, these bills possibly should be brought back to the floor. But we live under internal guidelines. Friday night and today, we have been juggling rules, internal deadlines, not to accommodate circumstances beyond our control but to

accommodate our own ineptness. And it is not in the public's best interest, nor ultimately in our best interest, to constantly accommodate our misgivings and mismanagement of this House. And if we are to have credibility in the community, we have to live with our own deadlines; we have to live with our own actions.

"On the second point, I only wish that other reasonable legislation -- much legislation that originates on this side of the aisle was given half the consideration that this initiative is doing in bringing these two bills that are technically dead back on to the floor. Theoretically, these bills should have been dead Friday night.

"This situation has not come about because of circumstances beyond our control. We're here now reconsidering previous motion because of our own ineptness, and it is certainly in our best interest to get our act together.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Apo rose to speak in favor of the motion, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I just have a very brief comment. I would hope that the Minority Party across the aisle understands. We've had the passing of our Speaker in this last week. We have tried our best to manage the transition and to transfer responsibilities for the Finance Committee, for the Speakership. We have done our best. A few things have slipped through the hole. I apologize to you personally for that, but I firmly object to your insinuating that the Majority is doing sloppy work, that we have not held this House together, and in fact I am rather proud of the swiftness in which we've made that transition between Speakers.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kanoho rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Regardless of what the reasons may have been for this bill to have come to this stage, it is nonetheless still a good bill with good cause. Unfortunately, there was some misunderstanding between both houses. We assumed that the Senate version was on its way over and the Senate, in anticipation of our bill going over, held it there. Nonetheless, we would be very remiss if we did not act on this bill at this time to make right for the benefit of our public.

"Thank you."

Representative Okamura moved that H.B. No. 463 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Apo and carried, and H.B. No. 463, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SPECIAL PURPOSE REVENUE BONDS FOR G.N. WILCOX MEMORIAL HOSPITAL", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes, with Representatives M. Ige, Ihara, Ribellia and Shito being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 463 had passed Third Reading at 4:39 o'clock p.m.

At 4:39 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 4:40 o'clock p.m.

Representative Okamura moved that the House reconsider its action taken previously on H.B. No. 1814, relating to the Lihue Shopping Center, seconded by Representative Apo and carried.

Representative Anderson rose and requested that his last words on H.B. No. 463 be inserted into the Journal on H.B. No. 1814, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Okamura moved that H.B. No. 1814, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Apo.

Representative Anderson then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, as I said earlier this afternoon, there's many bills. I was one that went to see my own community the other day because we had a bill to buy back Maunawili Valley. Maunawili Valley happens to have water, it has other good historic sites, many things that we could say we want to buy for our State in land banking. Again, it is one of those things, and I told the community I am not against the bill; I am against the idea that we can salvage everything. We do not have the money for everything. I tell my community that and then I come here and look down -- we're going to buy everything.

"It really bothers me, Mr. Speaker, over and over, why we are doing something without looking at it and seeing if it is really necessary and if we can afford. And if I can bite the bullet to my constituents, then every

damn one of you should be able to. Why do we always have to say, you don't have the votes, the hell with you. That's what we're saying again. If I can go to my community and tell them we cannot afford, then we can't afford it. And they either understand that or they dump me. I didn't come here to stay forever and ever. I don't look at every bill to see if it's good for me to run or not run. I look at it on the merits of the bill, if it is going to be good for the public -- every one of our taxpayers in this community. And that's what we're here for, ladies and gentlemen. We're not here to stay year after year. Either you make a determination on the bills that we have to the best of your ability for all of your constituents. Mine doesn't say Whitney Anderson, District of Kailua. It says, State Representative Whitney Anderson, and that's who I represent -- the people of this State -- to the best of my ability, regardless if it's Maui, Hawaii, Kauai or whatever. I'll do the best I can and I would expect you to do the same. If I ask for a favor because it's good, regardless of whether I'm a Minority person or not, you should look at it. Is it good for the people, and we'll buy it or we won't buy it.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Apo rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, let the Journal reflect that this purchase is intended to provide direct services, direct benefits for the 44,000 people who live on Kauai.

"Mahalo."

Representative Anderson, in rebuttal, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, 85 percent of the taxpayers are on this island. We shortchanged the county of Oahu more than anything else. If Kauai needs that, then I say they have as much right if you would do your job and I would. We give them a part of the 4 percent so that they know what they can afford, what programs and whatever. But no, we won't give them that. We sit here and we would rather give out piece by piece -- piecemealing. We don't want to give them homerule. Don't give me that baloney that it's needed. Either you do your job -- you give them a percent of the 4 percent tax. That's what they were looking at. That's what all the county mayors agreed to. But no, we don't want to do that.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1814, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION TO PURCHASE THE LIHUE SHOPPING CENTER, LIHUE, KAUAI", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 38 ayes to 8 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Cavasso, Hemmings, Jones, Liu, Medeiros, O'Kieffe and Pfeil voting no, and Representatives M. Ige, Ihara, Ribellia and Shito being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 1814 had passed Third Reading at 4:45 o'clock p.m.

Representative Apo then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to wish Representative Anderson a very peaceful and calm recess.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, it is a good thing that I am part Hawaiian because that's the calm part. The Portuguese is flipping right now. I only get angry at certain times, but really, I come back to Earth very, very fast.

"Thank you."

Representative Medeiros rose and remarked:

"Representative Anderson is using my share."

The Chair remarked:

"I like when you get angry, Representative Anderson. Your forehead gets a little sunshine."

At 4:45 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 4:47 o'clock p.m.

THIRTY-EIGHTH DAY

Tuesday, March 24, 1987

The House of Representatives of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:28 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Peter Fan, Associate Pastor, St. Elizabeth's Episcopal Church, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Hagino and Jones who were excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Thirty-Sixth Day.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Apo and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Thirty-Sixth Day was approved.

At this time, the following introductions were made to the members of the House:

Representative Yoshimura, on behalf of Representatives Arakaki, Cachola and Alcon, introduced several Kalihi constituents who are students at the Honolulu Community College's Hawaiian History and Contemporary American Issues class and also five students from the Farrington Community School for Adults accompanied by their teacher, Miss Elaine Kardenmeyer.

Representative Ribellia introduced eight young ladies from the Daisy Girl Scout Troop 740 who are kindergarteners at Kamoiliki School. They were accompanied by their leaders, Paulie Hottel and Charlene Bess and other members of their family.

Representative Andrews introduced twelve senior high school students from Maui and Molokai who are attending the Maui Community College Upward Bound Program. They were accompanied by their project directors, Ms. Charmaine Tavares; project counselor, Brian McKinnon; office manager, Ms. Mary Ann DeCambra; and chaperone, Ms. Lolly Medeiros.

Representative Metcalf introduced the Honorable Judge Harry Scilling

from the Federated States of Micronesia. He is here today "as an observer of our legislative process and to share some of his experiences with us. Judge Scilling serves both as an administrator of the courts and presides as a sitting judge."

Representative Apo introduced "three very distinguished gentlemen who have joined us on the floor of the House this morning. They traveled through five time zones to be here with us today and they are on their way to Brisbane, Australia, to participate in the Education Commission on the States' Conference."

Representative Apo then introduced the guests as follows: Irving J. Stolberg, Speaker of the House of the Connecticut State Legislature who was presented with an ilima lei by Representative Horita; Mr. Earl Mackey, executive director of the National Conference of State Legislatures; and Mr. William Pound, director of the Denver office of the National Council of State Legislatures.

Representative Isbell introduced a former resident of Kona who now works in Honolulu at the Child and Family Services, Ms. Sabina Lincoln, who was accompanied by her daughter.

Representative Medeiros introduced Kinau Kamali'i, former member of the House of Representatives.

Representative Crozier, at this time, stated:

"Today, when we will be discussing the budget, we will be talking about Hawaiian Home Lands and it was through the efforts of this gracious lady (Ms. Kamali'i) that some of the things that are happening today took place, and I would like to commemorate this day to you ma'am, Aloha."

Representative Anderson introduced his grandson, Ikaika.

At this time, the Chair stated:

"The Chair would like to be honored with having Speaker Irving Stolberg share some of his wisdom with us this morning, so I am going to ask him to say a few words to us."

Speaker Stolberg's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Governor, First Lady, Lieute-

nant Governor, distinguished guests, Mr. Speaker, distinguished members of this House, and citizens of Hawaii:

"It is an honor to stand here before you to convey greetings from your 49 sister states. This is such a beautiful state and such a beautiful chamber that it is with some awe that I stand before you.

"I am the Speaker in a state far away--on the other side of this nation--the State of Connecticut. My thoughts cannot help but be drawn some three hundred and fifty years back to when Connecticut was born, when our first fundamental orders were drafted and laid the foundation for first, a colony, and then the State of Connecticut.

"A hundred and fifty years after that--indeed, exactly two hundred years ago--my Legislature and 11 others met and selected delegates to travel to Philadelphia to work some minor revisions in the Articles of Confederation. My mayor at that time, Roger Sherman, was the architect of a compromise that established the two chambers, our House and our Senate, nationally. And indeed, Roger Sherman and his colleagues, elected from the Legislatures, created, at that time, what were to be the branches of the Federal government. And I wonder if they could have conceived of the growth of this great nation from the Eastern seaboard, across the continental landmass, and then leaping part of the way beyond across the Pacific to this great State of Hawaii. We have fulfilled a great deal in the last two hundred years, and you are to be congratulated on your great duty to represent the people of Hawaii.

"If I may just include one personal comment: Mrs. Kawakami, I would like to welcome you, in particular, to this Chamber. It is a great loss for a House of Representatives to suffer the loss of a Speaker, but indeed, Speaker Kawakami was fortunate to have you available to take that seat. I congratulate you and this Chamber, and I wish you the best in your important deliberations on the budget process and beyond.

"Mahalo."

At 11:43 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, "for the privilege of having our members meet Speaker Stolberg."

SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Liu and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering bills on Third Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar.

THIRD READING

The following bills, which were on the calendar for Third Reading, were read throughout and the following actions taken:

H.B. No. 2, HD1:

Representative Souki moved that H.B. No. 2, HD1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading,

seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Hemmings then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I don't think all the flaming rhetoric in the world or even good, old-fashioned, common sense will change the vote here today.

"As a member of the House Minority, I realize that our role--especially my role--is not to formulate legislation and pass it; that, in the two party system, is the duty of the Majority Party. My role is to try to find possible alternatives in the way things can be done and in instances where we feel things are not being done correctly, to point out positive ways to bring about change that will benefit the people who elected us. With that in mind, I'm rising to speak against this bill and to point out some philosophical problems with it and then some specific problems, not in hopes that we won't have a budget to work with, but in hopes that in future deliberations on this bill, we will be able to be more accountable on how we spend the taxpayers' money.

"Philosophically, there is a basic difference, I think, between the Majority Party--at least to my thinking. It's very easy for us to find ways to spend taxpayers' money and collect more taxes. What we really should be doing is looking for ways to save their money and pass on the savings so that the workers, the laborers of Hawaii that we so often worry about, will have money in their pockets to take care of themselves better, rather than having government try to be a surrogate parent because, quite honestly, we cannot do for them what they could and should do for themselves.

"We are appropriating \$3,378,285,123.00. If you add to it the CIP and the bonds money and the other obligations we are entering into it on behalf of the taxpayers of Hawaii over the next two years, we are going to spend over 5 billion dollars. The money is not grown on trees. It does not come out of the air. It comes out of the working people of Hawaii's pockets, and that is why I am rising to speak against certain provisions today, and I think there are numerous others.

"In order to not just talk philosophically, I would like to point out three instances where, if we were more accountable, we could save the taxpayers money, and I think if all of

us just found one instance where we could save money, we could arrive at a document that would save millions, if not hundreds of millions of dollars worth of money.

"On page 24 and 25, there is an obligation that we are entering into for the people of Hawaii to spend 17 million dollars to subsidize state hospitals operations and another 18 million dollars to build additional hospital facilities through the state facilities. While we're doing this, we're also paying to maintain a system of health care containment costs through SHPDA called CON that denies the private sector from coming in and doing exactly what we're asking the taxpayers to pay for. The CON process has been dropped by the Federal government because it eliminates competition in the marketplace and it provides for government subsidy for medical services. The Federal government has dropped the program entirely because it costs money to administer through the bureaucracy, and it also costs the consumers because they have to subsidize the costs we're allocating here today. That could be a major change that could ultimately save the taxpayers money. Currently, I received a call from an elected official on Maui who has one applicant for the CON program to put in a surgi-center on Maui. They've gone through the cost to try and get the CON certificate; they're in the process of being denied. If they had it, we wouldn't have to spend the money in certain areas to do what the private sector wants to do.

"SHPDA sends out a document every year bragging to us that they turn down 50, 60, 70 million dollars worth of medical benefits and programs because the state deemed that they are not necessary. Let's let the private sector and the free market system deem what is best for the economy, not SHPDA and bureaucrats pushing paper around in state government. These are dollars and cents that are being wasted in this program.

"Portable classrooms--in the document--is another example. On page 193, we're going to spend \$1,655,000 dollars in portable classrooms. Well, prior testimony says that new portable classrooms must be constructed and the estimated cost is eighty to one hundred thousand dollars. Well, I can tell you that someone in the private sector can build a 3 bedroom house for that type of money, and yet government is building a single-

walled construction portable classroom for eighty to one hundred thousand dollars. The cost is prohibitive, yet we're not investigating why this type of waste of monies is going on.

"I had a teacher on the North Shore call me and say that she could build--if she contracted independently on the North Shore--with that type of money, she could build two portable classrooms on the North Shore.

"Why are we letting these things happen? Why aren't we changing our philosophy? These are not generalities I am throwing out on the floor today. These are specifics.

"The last one is the HVB budget. There was a negative audit on HVB expenditures, So how are we going to solve the problem? We are going to give the money to DPED and let them spend it. With DPED's track history on spending money for the state, it leaves a lot to be desired.

"These are three specific examples of how we conscientiously, as legislators, can start ferreting out the abuse of taxpayers money and start arriving at a document that is going to find ways to save money and not exploit it.

"So, I would like to urge you to vote 'no' on this document today, but I know it won't happen; so what I'm really am trying to do, as a member of the loyal opposition, Mr. Speaker, in a constructive way, is to bring to the consciousness of this Body some thoughts that will make us, in the future, consider ways that we can save money and be more accountable to the taxpayers who are working too hard to have the single biggest item taken out of their paycheck--money being given to government.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Souki then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, I rise to speak in favor of H.B. No. 2, HD1, relating to our budget and that includes the budget for the Minority and the Majority as well.

"Mr. Speaker and members, H.B. No. 2, HD1, was developed in open communication with all of the members of the House, with the committee chairmen, and the full participation and the hard work of the Finance Committee and staff.

"Mr. Speaker and members, H.B. No. 2, HD1, takes bold action in the areas of education, economic development, human services and culture and the arts.

"In the area of education, we have looked in the area of where the biggest problem lies and in the area of class size, we have provided funding to reduce the class size from kindergarten and the first grade--26 to 20. There has also been the development of special creative programs to enrich the child's and the school's educational programs. In the higher educational level, we have provided funds for special initiatives in giving them 3 million dollars in discretionary money which they can do as they will. We have also looked at the higher education budget and have provided 26 million dollars for repair and maintenance of our university system throughout the state.

"In the area of economic development, we provided funding and flexibility within the DPED to provide for the Hawaii Visitors Bureau and other tourist-related programs a substantial amount of 15 million dollars, and this is to establish Hawaii as a world-wide international center in tourism and in business. We are also looking heavily into the areas of domestic business promotion as well as international.

"In the area of human services, we have provided, for the first time since 1977, an increase in the housing allowance general assistance and provided a network of human services programs for the aged, the young, the mentally ill so that all throughout the State will have the same services whether you live in Kona or in Molokai--that you will have the benefit of the State services which the State will provide for its people.

"In the area of culture and the arts, we provided assistance to the symphony program and other programs like it that deserves the aid of the State because they so enrich our lives.

"Mr. Speaker, this bill sets the foundation of a future vision for the State in which we can see the emergence of a society where economic opportunity, dignity and worth for all people of the State can be realized.

"Mr. Speaker and members, I recommend the passage of H.B. No. 2, HD1, and urge all the members to vote in favor of the bill."

Representative Tam then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the House budget for Hawaii's public schools and libraries represents a commitment to quality education, and closely follows Governor Waihee's two-to-one proposal for the public schools. This measure contains a significant funding increase for education--\$26.4 million dollars over the next two years including \$6.4 million dollars in reallocations.

"The Governor's proposal was intended to encourage the Board of Education to examine current funding and cut low-priority programs in order to shift the money to higher priority programs or new programs. Although the budget does not follow the two-for-one formula exactly, it retains the basic spirit of that proposal which was to promote innovation in the Department of Education.

"The department proposed cutting \$13 million dollars from current services, but after careful consideration, the committee on education determined that those cuts were excessive. For example, the department recommended cutting ten percent of the IRA teachers funding. But this is widely recognized as a valuable program which gives instructional flexibility at the school level. So we restored those funds.

"The central focus of this budget is to provide assistance to the teacher and the student in the classroom. To that end, we have funded the reduction of class size from 26 to 20 in kindergarten starting in the second year of the biennium. This will give the Department of Education sufficient time to plan for class size reduction in terms of availability of facilities, and also, teacher training, for which we have added over two million dollars.

"More teachers and support personnel have been provided to the Department of Education at the school level, including the following:

71 teachers for the gifted and talented;

31 teachers for alienated students;

63 school clericals;

43 educational assistants for the intermediate schools;

21 teachers for special education;

21 educational assistants for special education;

76 teachers for core improvement; and

50 security guards.

"We believe that libraries are an important component of our educational system, and we have recommended a one million dollar increase in funding for the purchase of books and other library materials and an expansion of the library security program. Furthermore, twenty-nine additional librarians and library technicians, replacement of old equipment, and most important of all, we have provided for the completion of the automated catalog system which will give library users, our general public, computer access to the entire collection statewide.

"We have also worked with the Department of Education in order to reallocate existing funds into other programs. The results of this effort are:

--the assessment and improvement of the learning center concept begun this year;

--an increased subsidy for summer school tuition;

--replacement of equipment in music, science, and vocational classes as well as in physical education; and

--a parenting education program to encourage parents to involve themselves more in their children's education and in the school system.

"Mr. Speaker, there is one issue yet to be resolved in the funding of our public schools--the issue of federal impact aid.

"Federal impact aid is appropriated by Congress to ensure that the state is adequately reimbursed for the education of military students. Senator Daniel Inouye, in a letter to Governor Waihee dated December 18, 1986, stated that the members of Congress acted with the clear understanding the money would be used for educational purposes and to allocate the funds for other purposes would directly contradict congressional intent.

"Presently, the cost to the state of

educating children who work and live on military bases is about 60 million dollars a year. The federal contribution is only 9.4 million dollars per year--to be increased to 19.4 million dollars next year.

"Unless the Department of Education is given this federal money, in addition to state funds, our public schools will continue to be starved of needed funds for textbooks, teachers and facilities.

"With this in mind, I was surprised to see that the Committee on Finance has left a proviso in the budget which places a cap on impact aid of 9.4 million dollars for the next two years when Senator Inouye has told us that an additional ten million dollars will be given to our State.

"This is equivalent to my giving my little niece 25 cents for her school lunch, even though it costs 45 cents for lunch, but she isn't going to be able to get a quality lunch unless I give her the full 45 cents.

"Since the Reagan Administration is already making efforts to cut impact aid funds, we must be very careful that we do not jeopardize these funds by using them in ways that were not intended by Congress.

"I hope that this proviso will be changed in conference committee to reflect the additional impact aid being made available to us. To do otherwise is unfair to all the children of our state who need these funds if they are truly to have what we all are working for--that is, a quality education.

"I wish to express thanks to all of the members of the Committee on Education who were so helpful in providing information and input during the decision-making process. This is indeed a special year for education--a year in which all elements of cooperation which increased and improved communication.

"Nothing is more important to the future of our democratic system and to the prosperity of our people than a strong public school system. Public demands for quality education and a new willingness and ability to provide the resources needed to accomplish this have created a spirit of hope and a readiness to take legislative action in order to improve educational opportunity for all of Hawaii's people.

"The Governor, the Board of Education, the Superintendent of Educa-

tion, and legislators--all of you--all worked together in order to produce this budget and to achieve our common goal--quality education.

"I want to thank the staff members of the House of Representatives which includes the staff people of the Education Committee and the Finance Committee who put long hours and a lot of effort into this budget. Many times we forget to thank them personally.

"I urge my colleagues to support this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson then rose to speak against H.B. No. 2, HD1, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I have a lot of respect for the committee chairman and the members. As a person who is an ex officio, I am able to go to all committee hearings and I have voice but no vote; consequently, I did go and did ask questions to a lot of the committees, but, because I was not able to vote, there's no sense in sitting there, waiting, when I can't even put down what I would like to. Maybe if I were able to, maybe, I would have a W.R. on this.

"But the reason I am against this, Mr. Speaker--what I would like to actually say--is that your educational system is being cheated. When the two gubernatorial people ran, when everyone of us was running for office, we said education is first and foremost. Teachers were going to get a substantial raise. I don't know if that meant they had to go through the collective bargaining system--it didn't sound that way. But then the other unions started to grumble, 'if this happens to them, it's going to happen to us.' And I think, right now, the teachers are going to fall back into the collective bargaining system. I don't think that's fair after we made promises when we're running. That's one point.

"The second point, Mr. Speaker, what is a substantial raise? Does that mean that when you go through a thousand dollars, that is substantial? Six thousand? Does this mean that we're going to get good--running or going to be--teachers because we are going to pay them well? Or are we just going to be willy-nilly and make sure that teachers are going to be treated the same as anybody else when we say that they are in charge of our children and our children

deserve the best?

"Also, Mr. Speaker, you talk about the class size. With what little bit of research we were able to do, \$2,800,000.00 isn't going to do it--first year, second year. We need more money than that for the class sizes. I think we are going to have to increase that. Now, every time we ran, we said, 'if, in fact, education was going to cost the taxpayers money, if, in fact, after looking at everything--streamlining--and we found that we're going to raise taxes, we would do so, for education.' That's not what I read in the paper, that's not what I see in the bills, that's not what I hear in this chamber. We're not going to do that.

"Let's go to the next part, Mr. Speaker. Tourism. Tourism has been a stepchild of this Body for years. Nobody has ever funded properly our tourist industry. Part of it was state funded; part of it was from private enterprise. Consequently, everytime we turned around and they put in a budget, we cheated them. We turned around and said, 'you should be able to do it for less money.' This year there's big bucks in there and all of a sudden everybody says that tourism is going to be the greatest thing since baseball. We're going to go ahead and make sure we do a good job and DPED wants to go ahead and do all of the marketing and the rest of it. But let me tell you, I've been around here for a couple of years. I'll have you know that the promotion department for DPED has gone to stores on the mainland and has put textile, fruits, jewelry, everything under one store to try to promote, and you can't promote it that way. But when you get around to tourism, the HVB can go ahead and go into a state and if they are going to have a breakfast meeting, they promote Hawaii and they promote papayas. If they are going to have a cocktail party in the afternoon, they can go ahead and promote our anthuriums, our macadamia nuts and whatever. They have that kind of ability to market. They have come out with a marketing program right now that, I think, is fantastic. I've gone to the meetings and I've looked and I've researched what they've done. And I am not there for the HVB; I'm there for the best that we're going to get for this community.

"If we are going to provide jobs and if we are going to provide tough, tourist industry, then we're going to have to have people that understands

how to market. You can't just go ahead and say we'll take anybody.

"Now, the DPED might have one of the best department heads today and one of the greatest staff people. But they haven't proven themselves yet and everything that we've had in the past has not proven that way. So, I think what we should do is look at what we're doing, make sure that we don't cheat our tourist industry again, and we go ahead and make sure we fund it the way we've been doing. You may want to watch it a little more closely, that's well and good. But to say that somebody else should take over a marketing program that they have no expertise in, is wrong.

"The counties--I said it before, and I'll say it again--why do we have to go ahead and piecemeal and give them grants every time they turn around--a little bit for you, a little bit for you--just so we have control? Why can't we give them a percentage of the 4%, and if the 4% isn't enough, why don't we raise it to 5% and give them a percentage of that, so that the counties can know what they are going to do, they can have their program, they'll know where they'll be going this year and 5 years down. That's what we're here for. We're supposed to help one another.

"For that reason, Mr. Speaker, I'm going 'no,' and wish my colleagues would also go 'no' or at least consider when they go into conference committees, the different things that can happen to this state if we really want to move ahead, then consider what you're doing and try to be a little more innovative.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative O'Kieffe then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I am supporting this bill with certain reservations.

"I hope that certain ambiguities within higher education, education and transportation can be clarified during conference committee.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Pfeil then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, we all know the importance of public education to the future of this state. Most of us

campaign for election or re-election by stressing our commitment to a quality system of public schools, and the bill before us now does much to fulfill that commitment. However, it has one important deficiency.

"I am speaking of the bill's treatment of federal impact aid funds to education. These are the funds received from the federal government to compensate our state for part of the cost of educating children of federal employees. The bill before us provides that any impact aid funds received in excess of \$9.4 million dollars annually shall be offset by an equivalent reduction in the state's general fund contribution to education. This would occur despite the fact that federal law has recently been changed to increase our allotment of impact aid by some \$10 million above the \$9.4 million. Mr. Speaker, in simple farmer's terms, Congress believes they are giving additional support to improve the public education in Hawaii, and this bill would divert those funds into the general fund instead of going to education where it was intended and where it belongs.

"The impact aid program has long been controversial at the federal level, and our congressional delegation has had to fight long and hard to maintain and increase Hawaii's funding allotment. I believe it would seriously undercut these efforts if we were to fail to use the full amount of funds available to the State of Hawaii to improve our public schools. We should not jeopardize this important source of revenue in the future by shortsightedly treating any increase in support as a windfall to the state's general fund.

"I hope House members of the conference committee that will produce the final budget bill will work to remove the \$9.4 million cap on impact aid contained in the present bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Ribellia then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I believe, as I am sure most of my colleagues believe, that we cannot make too great a commitment to education, and, towards that end, I'd like for the record to indicate that I would like to incorporate the comments of Representatives Tam and Pfeil as though they were my own," and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Hagino then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, first of all, I would like to thank the members of the Human Services Committee as well as the members of the Finance Committee for their time, effort and hard work. I would also like to thank the various staff members of the Committees as well as the chairperson of Finance and the other staff members who worked so long and hard to put together this budget.

"I just have a few words to say, Mr. Speaker. We were challenged at the beginning of this session to care for the sick, the weak and the old. We were challenged to nourish the young. I believe that in the Human Services portion of this budget, that we have met that challenge.

"In addition to various needed funds for various programs, we have made a small increase for our various income maintenance programs. We have also made an increase for the doctors and dentists who have long wanted in the area of Medicaid reimbursement.

"But what I think is most important for us in this budget is that we have taken a very bold and innovative step in the workfare program that we have instituted. This program has now been realized recently in the conference of governors as the way to go in an effort to end the cultural poverty. California and Massachusetts both have various forms of this innovative program. I am very proud to see that this State, at least through the House of Representatives, is also taking that step toward a reform of the welfare system.

"And for those foregoing reasons, I encourage all my colleagues to support House Bill No. 2, House Draft 1.

"Thank you."

Representative Jones then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker--this is my third term--for the past 5 years I have been in support of the budget. And notwithstanding all the good work of my colleagues here who have put in many hours to make our state a great state, a humane state and a compassionate state, I appreciate that.

"I know there is 'fat' in this budget. There's fat in every budget and I have some concerns about that. But after all these years of sitting

here, I have got to finally vote 'no', for a very important reason to myself--and that is, for the people who cannot vote, who cannot take a ballot, the people who we have a sovereign commitment to nourish and, that is, the 4,000 children of our state whose execution we guarantee today by passing this budget to fund abortion.

"We like to call ourselves a progressive state. We find ourselves involved in a butchery of 20 years ago, or 17 years ago, whenever Roe v. Wade was passed. Forty states have stopped the funding of abortions. We have not. As we look at the tremendous human service needs we have for the chronically mentally ill, the need for respite care, the coming problems with long-term health care which all of us are concerned about, I would submit to my colleagues here that it is time to get out of the dark ages, it is time to wake up the realities of science and we stop funding this very awful thing.

"We know for a fact that 90% of the abortions that are done for welfare mothers are not for their health; its for pure convenience. We know that many of these moms are having multiple abortions. We know that thousands of taxpayers of this state are tired of seeing this kind of legislation. I think it's time that we woke up and we say, 'lets stop trying to say that we are progressive' as we digress to the barbarism of pre-Christian times.

"There is a lot of good in this budget and I am very thankful for it. But I am very disappointed in my colleagues on this floor who, I know, right now, stand with me in their heart but who have not worked hard enough, I think, in the Human Services Committee and the Finance Committee to take a stand against this. So, in the hope of perhaps challenging them to stand on their consciences, those who I know stand with me here, and to make a point, I'll vote 'no.'

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson then rose in rebuttal to the remarks of Representative Souki, stating:

"In the educational system, Mr. Speaker, I would like to remind everybody that a few years ago we had a chairman who went and doubled the budget for education. Working hard, they did everything they could that was possible--but what comes

down is, what funds are going to be released? We have to make sure that what we have is something that we believe in and that we are going to help the Governor make sure that it is good quality that we are giving him, things that we can afford, not 'pie in the sky.' That's what we're talking about today and I listen to everybody saying, 'gee, we're terrific. We got this; we got that.' You can put everything you want in this budget. The Governor can only fund x number of dollars, ladies and gentlemen. Your responsibility is to go to that committee, sit down, and do the best job you can to try to help make decisions when he has the responsibility of coming down with the dollars that he is going to release.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Souki rose in rebuttal, stating:

Mr. Speaker, I would make it very brief, but in the area of the cost of the budget and dollars being made available, all members must be aware of is that this budget here is below the spending limits. There are considerable dollars that are below the limit and we don't expect the governor to have any problem in the releasing of funds, considering the continuing growth of the state and the availability of funds that we have. We believe that what we have is a relatively frugal budget.

"And for those who question the cost of 5 billion dollars, let me remind you that this is a growing state, that 5 billion dollars is not an exorbitant amount when you consider the total worth of the State of Hawaii.

"And for those members who are against the state run-hospital, I wish to remind them that if private enterprise want to come over and take over the state-run hospital, please make an offer, we'll be very interested in looking at their offer.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hemmings, in rebuttal to the remarks of Representative Souki, stated:

"Regarding growth, the only thing that is really growing in this state by leaps and bounds is the size and the cost of government and the taxes which we pass on to the people of Hawaii. I've been in this Legislature--this is my third year--and in spite of what we have heard about

not passing taxes, we did raise the highway tax two years ago; we did implement a huge hotel room tax last year. Regardless of what anybody thinks, you don't tax business--ultimately, the consumers pay.

"Business, companies, individuals--they all get their money from their own productivity. When you levy a tax or cost against a big corporation because they are 'fat cats,' they don't go to their back rooms and manufacture some money to pay the tax. They up their prices. And the reason the cost of living is so high in this state, in large part, can be blamed on us because we overregulate the private sector economy and we overtax it. The growth in the state economy is something that I really am scared of because the growth is not there to provide a diverse economic opportunity for the workers of Hawaii.

"Right now, when you want a job in Hawaii, you can probably get a good job working in a hotel making beds. There is no economic growth in Hawaii. We are stagnating. The cliché, 'the era of the Pacific,' well, it's passing us by. We have an opportunity, a great opportunity--I admire the governor's initiatives for trying to create new business opportunities with such programs as the space initiative. Astronomy on the Big Island, of course, is an opportunity that we are being presented with in spite of ourselves. But when you talk about growth, the growth has come in government and government gets its money from the people.

"As far as state-run hospitals, I would like to say that there are numerous health care providers that would love to come into this state and take over programs to administer health care to the people of Hawaii. But they can't because we have an insidious program which is administered through the Department of Health that regulates the industry and stifles free enterprise from coming in.

"In every instance where we have deregulated economic activity, the consumer has benefited. In airlines, we fly cheaper now between islands and to the mainland than we did when the government regulated it through the airline industry. In telecommunications, you can pick up your phone and make a phone call cheaper now than you could years ago. In banking, competition has led to better services and benefits for the consumers. It's an economic principle that

the free world is built upon competition and free enterprise, not government regulations and taxation.

"State-run hospitals can serve those less fortunate enough, but they don't have to compete against and eliminate free enterprise from the system.

"I would like to thank the chairman of the House Finance Committee for all of his hard work. Our differences don't lie in where our particular ideas come from; they lie in philosophical differences in government, and I will continue to defend--try to bring to the people of Hawaii--an alternative to the growth and cost of state government.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Chairman, thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Crozier then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'll limit my comments on what the good representative from Kahala had mentioned about taxing powers or who we should tax. He mentioned that we should just tax the laborers or the laborer. He said we shouldn't tax business.

"Mr. Speaker, the Japanese are buying all the buildings in Waikiki, all over town--they are buying all the businesses. They are going to make a profit. I think we should tax their profit, not only tax the working people, but also the people that are making the money that they are exporting out of our state.

"With that, sir, I ask all of my colleagues to support this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Hemmings then rose on a point of clarification.

Directed by the Chair to state his point, Representative Hemmings remarked:

"Mr. Speaker, just to clarify my remarks, I am not advocating taxing labor. What I did say, for the benefit of Representative Crozier, is that any tax, no matter if you tax through business, ultimately, is paid by labor and producers and workers.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Apo then rose to speak in favor of the bill and also in rebuttal to one of Representative Hemmings' concerns regarding hospitals, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I think it is important for us to understand that the health industry is the only industry in the country where the law of supply and demand works inversely. The more supply, the higher the cost. There is a reason for this.

"The health industry is driven by medical technologists, medical engineers whose primary concern is to address the question: Can we? Can we invent a machine that will cure this? Can we come up with a cure for this disease and that disease? These items cost tremendous amounts of money. Consequently, as the market is flooded with these new technologies, the absence of the philosopher is heavily felt who would pose the question: Are these new technologies good, because what we have in the health industry today, across this country, is that a person's access and ability to receive the best and quality health service is directly proportionate to their ability to pay, which is why we have a certificate of need program to allow the deregulation, particularly in this state, of the health industry which would mean that what you would have is a proliferation of for-profit hospitals, i.e., the Straub Hospital, and for-profit health organizations who are not concerned with offsetting costs and providing those services that affect districts like my area, Waianae, a low income, below poverty level--we will never see a Straub Hospital in Waianae. And without the help of the state for the Waianae Comprehensive Health Center there, I can guarantee you there would be no health services.

"This very large and growing group of people who need and cannot afford health insurance are dependent upon government support, not only in the way of hospitals, but also in other kinds of services. So, I think the notion that the private sector is going to take care of everything--which was a Reagan promise when he first ran for election--the private sector has taken care of nothing, and, in fact, the highly touted safety net on which he based his campaign--when the Federal government executive branch started to slash and cut and butcher the human service components going to states as well as health services--that private sector has not been forthcoming, and I say to this Body that for us to even think that the private sector is going to take care of the poor and the afflicted and those who cannot afford insurance, is sheer madness.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative O'Kieffe rose in rebuttal to the remarks made by Representative Apo by stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the County of Hawaii has no private hospital. Two years ago, I was admitted with a collapsed lung. I was given the opportunity--after a tube was put in my side--after one day, I was given the opportunity to walk down the hall to reach the one phone in my ward if I wanted to make an outgoing call. Shortly after, my lung collapsed again. There was no way I could go back to that hospital.

"On the trip over, private enterprise almost cost me my life when a water trap was knocked over and water flooded my lungs. It was at Straub Hospital which saved my life.

"I believe private enterprise should have the opportunity to compete in this sector. When you are not given the opportunity to compete, then what choice do the people have? Ten percent of the citizens of the County of Hawaii have to come to Oahu for private care. Shouldn't these people have a choice to stay in their own county where they are close to their families?

"Yes, the certificate of need should be abolished, and I support the medical system that we have in the state; and I also believe that free enterprise should be given an opportunity to try, too, in an area where they are not already allowed.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Apo rose in rebuttal, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'm surprised that the representative's remarks--given the situation on Molokai, which is the island on which he lives, who has adopted a private sector approach--I'm sorry, Mr. Speaker, I realize he is not from that island--but the island of Molokai that is under private sector supervision now, I think it's a fair statement to say that the services that they are receiving there have been reduced under private sector direction. And that, in fact, when the state was subsidizing to a large extent, those total operations that not only was the service better, but the quality was also better.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Shon then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I have tried to

restrain myself today but the discussion seems to be centering around health care costs, and I would like to point out to the members of this Body, that this is not the SHPDA bill; you'll get a chance later on that one.

"But I would like to point out that this bill in health cost allocation of resources, does take a strong stand to provide resources for those groups and those individuals who really do most need those services. The Finance Committee and their staff have really gone a long way in accepting many of our recommendations, particularly for the developmentally disabled, for resources to be able to put them out into the community, and also for many of the state hospitals which badly needed added funds. I would like to remind some of those who spoke earlier that we did have an opportunity to visit some of those hospitals, and some of those who spoke earlier declined the opportunity. I've just spent a number of days going through some of the hospitals on the Big Island and also going through the state hospitals, and I can tell you that these funds really are needed and these places have been neglected for many, many years.

"I think that this budget is a very important step in making that commitment that we've made so many times in words but perhaps not in funds--to upgrade those services and to insure that the weakest among us do have health care.

"As I said earlier, the issues of health care cost containment will be before us at a later date. I'm rather surprised that it is being debated now. But I would add that there is a position in the budget specifically for our state health department to look at cost containment because, in the past, as we have seen, our departments have not looked as closely at health insurance and health cost containment as they should, and I would expect those who are most interested in cost containment to support this budget and to support positions that are going to give us the kind of information that we dearly need to take a hard look at where the money is going and to be a legitimate referee in this great competition over the profits in health care versus those areas where we're losing money. The state, throughout the years, has taken the position, well, we will provide for those services that the private sector doesn't want to provide for; and in many ways, we have not

been an effective referee. But I think you will see in the number of bills we are passing this year and in this budget, that we are attempting to go into this arena of almost vicious competition--you see it every day on the television screen--people are competing with television commercials to lure patients to their hospitals because, 'we're the best, or they're the best.' This is one of the reasons why it is important for the state to continue to be involved in health care cost containment in refereeing the situation, and I ask you to support this budget and support the positions that are involved in analyzing health care, and also to support the streamlining of that system when it comes before us later.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Metcalf then rose and requested that the remarks of Representative Shon and all those who spoke in favor of the bill be incorporated as though they were his own, and the Chair, "so ordered." (By reference only)

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Hemmings and Jones voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 2 had passed Third Reading at 1:31 o'clock p.m.

H.B. No. 49, HD1:

Representative Souki moved that H.B. No. 49, HD1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Souki then rose and requested that his written remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal, and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

The remarks of Representative Souki are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill provides funds for the operating budget of the Judiciary over the next biennium.

"Your Committee scrutinized all aspects of the budget in order to design a funding structure and fiscal accountability to meet the challenges

of our judicial system.

"House Bill No. 49, House Draft 1, provides current spending levels in stable judicial programs, while adding funds for high priority programs and growth areas.

"Mr. Speaker, I recommend passage of House Bill No. 49, House Draft 1, and urge the members of this Body to vote in favor of this bill."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 49, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE JUDICIARY ", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 287, HD1:

Representative Souki moved that H.B. No. 287, HD1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Souki then rose and requested that his written remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal, and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

The remarks of Representative Souki are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, your Committee examined the OHA budget with a commitment to establish program integrity and accountability, and to ensure that the Hawaiian people will be true beneficiaries of OHA programs.

"The budget before us funds programs which will directly affect native Hawaiians. Moneys provided in this budget will allow OHA to implement educational, health, and human services programs, as well as plan and develop other needed programs.

"This is the critical time in the history of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, a time when the board and its administrator need to work within their lines of responsibility for the benefit of the Hawaiian people.

"As legislators, we are here to ensure that this is accomplished and that the programs funded in this bill are carried out in the next biennium.

"Mr. Speaker, I recommend passage of House Bill No. 287, House Draft 1, and urge all of the members of this Body to vote in favor of this bill."

The motion was put by the Chair

and carried, and H.B. No. 287, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE OFFICE OF HAWAIIAN AFFAIRS", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 49 and 287 had passed Third Reading at 1:32 o'clock p.m.
