And it took me about four months to realize this nice gentleman who was always pleasant to me, never asked me for anything, but he was a gentleman and we developed this sense of warmth, and all I knew was that his name was Ken Froelich. And so what? Eventually, I found out who this gentleman was. You know, he just wasn't another person like you and I, but he is one of the leaders of our community. He was chairman of the Hawaii State Chamber of Commerce, he was chosen as the

'Small Business Person of the Year' in 1982, and he has owned a series of companies, and he has always participated -- he's involved with the State and military task forces to have better relationship. He has committed his life, not only to his business and his family, but to making Hawaii a better place.

"You know, many of us talk about problems but few of us step forward to resolve the problems, and this gentleman is such a person.

"Ladies and gentlemen, I would like to introduce Mr. Kenneth Froelich," and asked Mr. Froelich to stand to be recognized.

Representative Bellinger introduced members of a youth group from the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints from Laie, "an area which is a more culturally diverse areas of the district which I represent.

"These young people have been participating in a conference with the theme, 'Lean on Me.' This is

a type of a program in which they have banded together for fellowship in the exchange of personal and professional views for the future. It's rather ironic, however, that with the emphasis with the theme of the program, 'Lean on Me,' that tragically, last Saturday, the leader of their program drowned at Sacred Falls while trying to rescue another one of their members in trouble. As a result, they have been going through quite an experience and so that the emphasis of the 'Lean on Me,' portion has really come to bear on each and everyone of them, and by staying together, and much as we have in the recent loss of our Speaker, they have all been able to grow."

The youth group was accompanied by their leaders, Harvey Alapa, Sharon Walker, and Don and Debbie Hartman who were congratulated by Representative Bellinger for "their outstanding job in organizing and maintaining this particular conference through a most difficult time."

Representative Cachola introduced ten visiting fellows from the Peoples Republic of China and the Republic of Korea who are "undergoing two separate and special programs in the School of Travel and Industry Management at the University of Hawaii at Manoa."

Representative Andrews introduced two constituents "who are outstanding employees of our state, Romel Dela Cruz, administrator of Kula Hospital and his wife, Jodene, teacher at Kalama Intermediate School."

"Mr. Speaker, I hope my colleagues know by now my total commitment to space on the Big Island. However, until a feasibility study is conducted to prove its viability, to do a housing study now is simply putting the 'cart before the horse.'

"Let us invest our funds prudently and wait on this study until it, too, is feasible.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Shito then rose and

remarked that "spaceport housing studies is not confined only to the Big Island; the resolution is amended to include the entire state for consideration.

"Thank you."

Representative Isbell then rose and remarked:

"Well, Mr. Speaker, in the budget it calls for housing studies to be done at South Point specifically, so if you have a budget item that says South Point and you have a resolution going across, it will be an interesting determination as to which one is chosen; but I think that should be definitely thought of at this time.

Monday, March 30, 1987

The House of Representatives of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:00 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

He was also the Deputy Minister of Interior for four terms, Chairman of the Budget Committee, Chairman of the Environmental Committee, Chairman of the Northern Territory Committee, and a member of the Committee on Transportation. He retired just last year and is presently Vice President of the Kokuba Gumi which involves 25 companies in Okinawa. He also received the Emperor's First Order of the Rising Sun upon retiring from the National Japanese Diet." He was accompanied by his sons, Yuki-kazu and Koei.

I think that because there's--Winnebago, for instance, was one of the campers that we used to rent out--there was no place to flush toilets, have electricity available, etc.

"If you made state lands available, if you had facilities that private enterprise could put in, you could take care of security and other things. Lots of our campers today are being harassed; there have been fights on beaches, etc. So, if you did it on state lands and if you had private enterprise put in security, I think it's a new business and a clean business for tourism that we could look at and it would be very lucrative.

"So, Mr. Speaker, those are some

of my concerns and I hope we could look at that in the future to try to see what we could do to benefit private enterprise and our State in general.

"Thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 887, SD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE RESORT CAMPS AND SERVICES", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes with Representatives Fukunaga, Hashimoto, Tajiri and Yoshimura being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 887 had passed Third Reading at 11:35 o'clock a.m.

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to speak for the Senate bill but I do have some concerns.

"The one gallon per day of sand. . . the way I read the bill and I understand some years back, the reason that it was changed was that if I wanted to build a sandbox for my granddaughter, I would have to go back consecutively every day. That's why we tried to make it whereby you could go down and take a truckload of sand for your home use, and consequently, I think that's fair. I understand about coral and the rest of it, but I think that most of us here would not take advantage of the law if it said that you could take sand for your home use. I wish that they would at least consider this and we could make that kind of an amendment.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

On motion by Representative Bunda, seconded by Representative Tungpalan and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 599, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO REPLACEMENT OF SAND ON PUBLIC BEACHES", passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

And now this year, they will represent all of us in Hawaii at the celebration of the 200th anniversary of the U.S. Constitution.

"It is my honor now to introduce to you the people who represent the band from Mililani High School."

So these festivals and activities and the queen contest are opportunities for Japanese-Americans to reaffirm their ties by their participation. We are here today to honor some of these participants who have worked very hard to make all these events successful."

Representative Marumoto then introduced the honorees as follows: Miss Marlene Akemi Sato, Queen of the Cherry Blossom Festival; Miss Kimberly Hatsue Inouye, Princess; Miss Shana Miyoko Kuratsu, Attendant/ Miss Congeniality; Miss Robyn Noriko Kosaki, Attendant; and Miss Julie Mie Fukunaga, Attendant/Miss Popularity.

The Nisei Week Japanese Festival honorees were introduced as follows: Miss Jennifer Lynn Kusumoto-Ahn, Queen; and Miss Tomodachi, "and if you don't know, tomodachi means, 'friend,' and I guess that could be translated to 'Miss Congeniality,' Miss Karen Chiemi Kakuto."

Accompanying the honorees were Mr. Matt Miura, president of the Honolulu Japanese Junior Chamber of Commerce and Mr. Terrence Iwamoto, chairman of the Cherry Blossom Festival. All were asked to stand and be recognized.

Certified copies of the resolution were presented to each of the honorees by Representative Marumoto and floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Arakaki, Hirono, Ihara, Kawakami, Liu, O'Kieffe and Shito.

A resolution (H.R. No. 265) commending the volunteers of the Fourth Aloha Medical Mission to the Philippines was jointly offered by Representatives Cachola, Tungpalan, Alcon, Bunda, Ribellia, Isbell, Kihano, Apo, Hagino and Hayes.

"Mr. Speaker and members of this Honorable Body: Beyond the walls of this beautiful House Chamber, there exists in less fortunate countries countless individuals who will never

have the benefit of even basic professional health care such as nutrition or desperately needed surgical operations.

"The individuals we are honoring today took time off from their busy practice and jobs and traveled to the Philippines at their own expense and worked around the clock to perform humanitarian acts involving the treatment of 2000 patients including 95 surgeries in a week's time. The health services rendered by the Aloha Medical Mission were indeed miracles in the lives of the poverty-stricken people of Bacalod City.

"One such miracle involved the life of a girl named Angie who was living in Bacolod City and who was suffering from congenital cataracts in both eyes. Dr. George Plechaty and members of the 1986 Aloha Medical Mission operated on Angie to remove the cataract in the left eye. Presently, the Aloha Medical Mission, together with Queen's Medical Center and the Philippines Airlines, are combining their efforts to coordinate flying Angie to Hawaii to be operated on to remove the cataract from her right eye, all at no cost to this beautiful girl. Mr. Speaker, I also understand that this girl will be arriving tomorrow and we will be there to meet her.

"Mr. Speaker, it is truly fitting for us to honor this special group of men and women who gave up so much so that others will benefit.

"Speaking from personal experience, I am honored to have been a part, and am still a part, of the Aloha Medical Mission, and barring any legislative responsibility requiring my presence in the State, my wife and I will be joining them again in a destination yet to be determined for another medical mission."

Monday, April 6, 1987

The House of Representatives of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:10 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Gary Peterson, Associate Pastor, Kailua United Methodist Church, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Crozier, Hagino, Horita and Ribellia who were excused.

By unanimous consent, reading and approval of the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Forty-Fifth Day was deferred.

At this time, the following introductions were made to the members of the House:

Representative Arakaki introduced his daughter, Jamie Lee Kahala Opuna Emiko, who was among the 23 kindergarteners from Hongwanji Mission School accompanied by their teacher, Ms. June Kobayashi, and chaperone, Mrs. Okamura.

Representative Lee introduced two of his grandaunts who were visiting from the mainland, Mrs. Claire Smith, from Syracuse, and Ms. Kitty Moriarity, from Moraga, California.

Representative D. Ige introduced 78 fifth grade students from Wai'au Elementary School accompanied by their teachers, Victor Chang, Ann Kawai and Sharon Asato.

Representative Alcon, on behalf of Representative Horita and himself, introduced 96 eighth grade students from Moanalua Intermediate School's Social Studies class accompanied by their teacher, Laurie Nessor, and parents, Mrs. Deborah Carroll, Mrs. Ruby Volck, Mrs. Ralita Daggar and Mr. John Hanley.

Representative Liu introduced former State representative, Joe Garcia, who was accompanied by several friends from the Big Island.

Representative Levin introduced

Ms. Irene Hughes, Ms. Joyce Brewsky, Ms. Katherine Harris and Mr. Norm Brewsky who had accompanied Mr. Garcia and who are participants in the Legislative Experience Program and "who have come to Honolulu to lobby on various issues."

The Chair, at this time, directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives Hagino and Ribellia.

## ORDER OF THE DAY

## SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Anderson and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering a resolution out of order.

## INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION

The following resolution (H.R. No. 296) was read by the Clerk and was disposed of as follows:

A resolution (H.R. No. 296) recognizing the Mililani Golden Years Club as an outstanding senior citizens organization was jointly offered by Representatives Kihano, Lee, Anderson, Arakaki, Bellinger, Cachola, Fukunaga, Hagino, Hayes, Hiraki, Horita, Ihara, Isbell, Kawakami, Leong, Pfeil, Ribellia, Say, Shito, Takamine, Taniguchi, Tom and Tungpalan.

On motion by Representative Lee, seconded by Representative Apo and carried, H.R. No. 296 was adopted.

Representative Lee then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, we have honored on occasions here the young people of Hawaii--students ranging from grade 1 to senior grades.

"Today, we would like to honor the Golden Years Club of Mililani. They undertake a number of very interesting and very community-minded activities. Basically, they are volunteers. They have been tutors at Kipapa Elementary School for special education and other children. They have worked with the first aid at Leeward College and they also volunteer at the library and, above all, they serve actively as election officials during the elections every other year. And if you would like to

find volunteers who would like to do a number of things for the community, the Golden Years--or the seniors--are always ready to do so. There is no club that is more active and better known in Mililani than the Mililani Golden Years Club."

Representative Lee then introduced the honorees--members of the Golden Years Club--as follows: Mr. Knud Rasmussen, president and member of the Neighborhood Board for four years, chairman of District 3, Senior Citizens Affairs, member of the Advisory Council and also a volunteer at Kipapa Elementary School; Mrs. Sonja Rasmussen, hospitality chairman of the Golden Years Club; Ms. Helen Shock, vice president and program coordinator; Ms. Elsie Thames, "Girl Friday", and a volunteer at the Mililani Library; Mr. Ron Pulfrey, vice president and volunteer at the Red Cross and tutor at Kipapa Elementary School; and Mr. Fred Sohi, advisor to the Golden Years Club and director of the district gym at Mililani.

Floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Fukunaga, Hirono, Isbell, Kanohe, Leong, Tungpalan and a certified copy of the resolution was presented by Representative Lee to Mr. Rasmussen.

At 11:28 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair, "for the purpose of extending our warm aloha to our honorees this morning."

Upon reconvening at 12:06 o'clock p.m., the Chair directed the Clerk to note the presence of Representatives Crozier and Horita.

#### SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Anderson and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering bills on Third Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar.

#### UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 978 on S.B. No. 518, SD2, HD2:

Representative Hirono moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 518, SD2, as amended in HD2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hiraki.

Representative Andrews then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, at the chance of sounding like an ogre speaking against the little kids, I would like to preface my remarks by saying that I am speaking about this bill and a number of other bills that require mandated health coverage in various areas.

"What bothers me the most is that the bulk of the people who testified on this bill, and the other bills that had mandated coverage to health insurance, were the providers of service--and one insurance company. As you can imagine, the providers of service told us how beneficial this would be and how cost effective it would be. In my mind there was nothing else they could say. The insurance company told us that these benefits would be very expensive and the cost effectiveness of them was in question.

"I really don't know who to believe and the problem is that I don't know of anybody else here who knows who to believe.

"What I would like to do in continuing in what I would like to say, is, read a few remarks from a recent Forbes article that just appeared in their latest edition. Basically, it deals with the way Congress is also addressing this problem and its caption by saying, 'Congress has found a new way to spend more on social programs without raising taxes--bad inflationary news for business and bad, too, for consumers.' It goes on to say, 'Congress is itching to give voters a fat, fresh package of social benefits--expanded health care, heftier pensions, expanded benefits for families with children--just for starters. But how to pay for it? Raise taxes? Don't be silly. That's a sheer path for retirement for politicians these days. Borrow the money? Not with the deficit. But there seems to be a way out and you can expect the Democratic Congress to take it. Sock to business with the bill for the new social spending. That's not a tax--it's just a legal obligation.'

"In Washington, they've already have a name for this new spending strategy--mandated benefits. It means that when Congress votes for a new social program, it simply orders that the cost be picked up by employers. Certainly, loading employers with the added cost of new social

programs will not enhance U.S. industrial competitiveness. On the contrary, it is almost guaranteed to weaken the competitiveness; more than that, the effect on the economy can only be inflationary. Prices will edge ever upward as companies sock consumers with the bill and some companies will even go out of business.'

"The article goes on and concludes by saying, 'and even big business will find its international competitiveness decreased for Congress has yet to face the fact that anything that raises the cost of making things in the U.S. cost some U.S. workers their jobs. This is a cruel fact of economic life and legislation cannot repeal it. Congress would do well to ponder what has happened in Western Europe. There, the social welfare system is a comprehensive system truly "cradle to grave," but the price has been economic stagnation. The U.S. has created 21 million new jobs since 1976 while Western Europe has created a net of none in the same period.'

"I think if we apply this article in my previous remarks to Hawaii's business and Hawaii's economy, we can conclude that instead of increasing benefits for many, the net effect of these bills through the lost of jobs, will be, no benefits for many more.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Arakaki then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I speak only in reference to this bill. When people ask why we should mandate health coverage, my response is that if I interpret our role as legislators correctly, we should be providing social policy and direction, and I think by passing this type of bill, we are making a policy statement that the health and welfare of our children is important.

"We already mandated the first two years of coverage for children. All we want to say is that the first five years is very important because they contain many of the developmental aspects in raising children.

"For those who are concerned about cost, we should look upon this as an investment where we each put into the future of our children, our share, and we should take our resources to nurture our investment because every single one of us will be af-

ected by the outcome of our investment in our children.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kanoho rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I've been pondering at length on the merits of this bill and what I should do with it and I would very much like to have Representative Andrews comments recorded as my own and, additionally, although this bill only provides for three additional examinations at ages 3, 4 and 5, it is my belief that parents should assume some responsibility, and, after careful consideration, I am in opposition of this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Hemmings rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, economic consideration aside, this and other mandated benefit programs that are being proposed in this Legislature are promoting a much more insidious problem where people who have children, or people that have problems, are not in a position to handle them themselves.

"Having a child is a right in our country, but in other countries it's a privilege, and in many ways with the growth of the world going the way it is, it should be viewed more and more as a privilege in this country. When you have a child it's your responsibility to maintain the welfare of that child. And if that child has an illness, certainly we want to, collectively, take care of that illness. But in the modern world we have to start having people be responsible for the care of their own children rather than making it a state function.

"We are going more and more into state and socialized social welfare programs where the individual no longer feels the responsibility to safely bring up their own child. So we're taking an economic, but, more importantly, a social and a spiritual path down the road of unaccountability where eventually we all will have to pay the price with much more just than the dollars and cents in this bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Cavasso then rose and requested that the remarks of Representatives Andrews and Kanoho be inserted into the Journal as if

they were his own, and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered." (By reference only)

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 518, SD2, HD2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH INSURANCE", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 37 ayes to 14 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Andrews, Apo, Cavasso, Crozier, Hemmings, Ihara, Jones, Kanoho, Liu, O'Kieffe, Peters, Pfeil and Tajiri voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 518 had passed Third Reading at 12:15 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1008 on S.B. No. 815, SD1, HD2:

Representative Hirono moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 815, SD1, as amended in HD2, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hiraki.

Representative Andrews then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I am in favor of this bill because it will keep us from doing in the future what we just did earlier.

"Thank you."

Representative Liu then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against this bill but for the same reasons as Representative Andrews. I think this bill should be passed first before we deal with a number of other issues related to mandated benefits and programs. So, for that reason, I shall be voting 'no,' not because of the sentiments behind it, but because the timing is wrong.

"Thank you."

Representative Metcalf then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I was going to vote against this measure but Representative Andrews speaks so seldom that his eloquence convinced me to support the measure."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 815, SD1, HD2, entitled: "A BILL

FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH INSURANCE", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Liu voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 815 had passed Third Reading at 12:16 o'clock p.m.

On motion by Representative Metcalf, seconded by Representative Hagino and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1007, SD1, as amended in HD2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1052 on S.B. No. 1729, SD1, HD2:

On motion by Representative Metcalf, seconded by Representative Hagino and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1729, SD1, as amended in HD2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COUNTY LICENSES", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 1458; 1007; and 1729 had passed Third Reading at

12:18 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1053 on S.B. No. 350, SD1, HD2:

Representative Metcalf moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 350, SD1, as amended in HD2, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hagino.

Representative Shon then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, there is no doubt that smoking is the number one public health problem in the United States today. Over a thousand people die every day as a result of smoking.

"As we discuss health care cost, there is one certain way in which we can reduce health care cost and, that is, to prevent disease. The Surgeon General advises us that the most preventable source of disease is to stop smoking and thus protect the rest of us from this pollution.

"I am proud that the House of Representatives has always stood strong in favor of public health, and today, we reaffirm our responsibility to protect the innocent and the healthy. I firmly believe that small business and public institutions would find a wave of appreciation from their customers if smoking were more controlled, and I also believe that it makes good business sense to demonstrate a concern for employees while being a comfort and help to customers. And, Mr. Speaker, this House has acknowledged that the health of workers in the private sector is just as important as the health of workers in the public sector. To consciously create a class of second-class citizens to afford one group protection and the other none, this is something I cannot understand. Our bill, members, seeks to protect all.

"With our bill, a woman who is pregnant who happens to work in the private sector need not choose between the health of her child and her job. The same is true of anyone with any form of respiratory disease--asthma, emphysema--this is equity, Mr. Speaker. This is responsible legislation and I think the House can be proud of it.

"And, Mr. Speaker, I would especially like to acknowledge the support for this bill of some of the members of this House who do smoke who have put their personal habits aside to vote for a healthier community, and I

would especially point to the distinguished chair of the Judiciary Committee, while still a smoker, you may have noticed that he is thinner, he's tanner and, hopefully, in the future, he, too, will be smoke free.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Metcalf then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I would just ask that Representative Shon's remarks be inserted into the Journal as my own except with the mildest of reservations."

Representative Anderson then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, as a non-smoker and one who has been smoking for 16 years, it always bothers me that we can go ahead and mandate what others can do.

"If an individual worked in an officeplace with 6 people and 5 of those 6 smoked, and that one person didn't, then they're saying that that person can stop everything. I don't think that it is fair, Mr. Speaker, that we continually tell people what they can and cannot do.

"You put down on the packages of cigarettes that it's hazardous to your health--and I think that's right--but I don't think it's fair that you tell people that they are not going to be able to smoke in a particular area just because one person does not want them to.

"I go to Los Angeles and I'm sure that the smoke there from the fumes and everything else are worse than cigarettes. Are you going to ban cars and the industry and everything else? You try to correct them and I believe that is what we have to do here--to try to correct some of the inequities--but not by banning everything.

"I'm going to vote 'no' and I wish the rest would, too.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hayes then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, as a lifetime non-smoker married to a reformed ex-smoker, and I'm also the mother of a daughter who would not give up smoking and she died about fourteen months ago. I think it's a good bill, I vote for it and I hope everybody

else does."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 350, SD1, HD2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SMOKING IN THE WORKPLACE", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 43 ayes to 8 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Bunda, M. Ige, Jones, Medeiros, Peters, Ribellia and Shito voting no.

"Mr. Speaker, the purpose of this bill is to establish a state authority for selecting a site for undertaking the development of an international convention center in Hawaii. The issue of selecting a site for a center has been highly debated from the beginning of this legislative session.

We all know that the Senate is strongly supporting an Ala Wai Golf Course site, while the House Tourism Committee, at one point in time, selected Magic Island. However, in view of numerous testimonies that we have received with regards to these alternatives, it is apparent that many important factors have not been sufficiently examined; like, for example: open space needs, visitor generated traffic, local traffic congestion, zoning change requirements, and use of the waterways as a means of really helping out solve the problems when it comes to traffic. Mr. Speaker, the most prudent course for this Body to take is to support the establishment of a convention center authority so that more deliberation and study may precede the selection of a convention center site.

"Mr. Speaker, while I have emphasized this point previously, I believe that if we will be spending hundreds and hundreds of millions of dollars just to put up a convention center that we must select a site that can sell Hawaii; a site that will be functional well into the future; a site that will be able to maximize our investment and revenues, and, what I am saying, Mr. Speaker, is, we've got to select a site that will never be obsolete through time.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1192, SD2, HD2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONVENTIONS, TRADE SHOW, AND OTHER EVENTS", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

"It depends on the question, Mr. Speaker."

Directed by the Chair to state his question, Representative Anderson asked:

"It's my understanding that the functional plans will be implemented; it will bypass the Legislature; it will come up only for our information. In another passage in the bill, it says that we have to 'adopt' and we are a 'part' of this. It seems like it contradicts itself and I would like to know just how we are supposed to take this."

Representative Andrews replied:

"To begin with, we did take into light the arguments that you've made in the past years, but it's intended that those what are now termed functional plans become department plans in the long run and be administrative documents."

Representative Anderson then thanked the Chairman and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, we have fought the functional plan for many, many years

primarily because they were always supposed to be guidelines, when, in reality, they were going to be implemented.

"This bill says, 'the Governor shall transmit approval of the state functional plans to the Legislature for its information.' Functional plans implementation--that means that when you and I and the rest of us are out during the interim, they can take the functional plan, the state plans, go out and do whatever they want to, come back, and they'll tell us, 'because that has been implemented, you will fund it.' They don't come to us on a regular process, and I think that that's our responsibility.

"I listen to everybody sitting around here saying, 'we have to be a part of what the responsibility is to the consumers and to the taxpayers,' and yet, Mr. Speaker, when I ask questions in Finance, no one seemed to be that concerned. I think it's our responsibility to make sure that anytime that we implement anything, that they don't come to us for approval, they come to us and say, 'this is what we want; can we afford it, will you folks fund it?' They don't come to us and say, 'ladies and gentlemen, you gave us the authority; we are implementing it and you will fund.'

"And that's the way I read the bill, Mr. Speaker, and I think that's the way my colleagues would read it, and I would hope that you would all consider voting 'no,' and if you want to look at it, you can put it in next year--we can talk about it--it will still be alive. That's what we're saying with other bills. I don't think we have to rush.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Andrews then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in regards to the section that Representative Anderson is discussing, what we did with the functional plans is to make them what they really are. We've gone over the discussions over the years many, many times as to whether these things are binding, whether they're just guidelines and to what effect they bind us to take action. In all of those discussions, we've all agreed that they do not bind this Body, and that the real implementing action is the legislation that we pass here today and the budget.

"As a practical matter, those plans were created by the departments,

and, if at all utilized by the departments, are pretty much ignored by the Legislature. And, in knowing that, what we did was make them what they are, hoping that they will get more attention from the body from which they were created and also remove some of the busy work and the work that didn't seem to be very cost effective on the part of the administration."

Representative Ribellia then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I would hope that in the next coming session that this Body will consider legislation which would help to restore even more effective state-wide planning by joining in the transfer of the planning function to the office of the governor--the research function of the department--as it now sits. It's a very basic planning technique that you need good research to accompany the planning function to be effective.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson rose in rebuttal, stating:

"If, in fact, Mr. Speaker, that these are just going to be used as guidelines, then that meant that the years of study and the years that we held this up means nothing. I can remember, Mr. Kono, who was the department head at that time, who said that he would use us as his 'bible' and to make sure that everything got implemented, and there was a big hullabaloo. I see no difference today. It's nice to come here and agree that we want to move ahead. I agree with you. But if, in fact, it's not going to harm us; if, in fact, it's not taking away anything from us--I believe that I have friends here, colleagues who are attorneys and the whole bit, and I don't normally go to them--but I think we have to go to the attorneys and look at this and find out just actually what will this do to the rest of us. Is it, in fact, helping or is going to hinder the process? If its going to help, I'm all for it. But I don't like to read something just by chance in a committee, and no one else seems to know about it and all of a sudden we're shoving it down. Let's take a little time. Why wasn't it said that this-- is what was happening?"

"Actually, I don't think anybody from the different committees knew what exactly what was happening and that, I think, is the wrong way to

implement different types of legislation.

"Thank you."

Representative Apo then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I think we're missing the issue here. I believe, first of all, that the Governor made it very clear in his state-of-the-state address that he did intend to transfer the strategic planning function from the DPED to his office. And I believe the rationale was that while the DPED is currently in charge of planning for the future of this state, that, in fact, in reality, because that agency has no authorization or jurisdiction over any of the other departments, it was very difficult to get any of the policies that we, the Legislature, have placed in the statutes acted on in terms of developing or implementing actions, largely because that agency is so far removed from the actual budgeting process which takes place out of the governor's office.

"So, I believe the intent of this bill is to move the strategic planning closer to the budgeting process through the governor's office, who does have authorization to finally put a 'head on the octopus,' and to, if necessary, mandate the various state agencies to act on those policies that the Legislature had approved and had set up.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Liu then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, first of all, I would like to thank the Minority Floor Leader for asking for assistance from attorneys to some degree on this measure, and, hopefully, I can lend some on this issue.

"I think that the debate we've had on the floor today indicates the problem that we've had over the years with the whole issue of the state plan. What does it mean? Are there going to be guidelines? Are they going to be mandated policies? Should there, in fact, be centralized planning to the degree that is envisioned by this measure, by breathing life back into the state plan?"

"I think all of this has caused confusion, a lot of wasted energy, and I think the state could do well in this era of new beginnings to, yes, transfer the planning function to the governor's office--I have no objection

to that--but doing away altogether with this state plan.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 1277 and 833 had passed Third Reading at 4:01 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 389, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative Hirono, seconded by Representative Hiraki and carried, S.B. No. 389, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NATUROPATHY", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 389 had passed Third Reading at 4:02 o'clock p.m.

At 4:02 o'clock p.m., Representative Apo asked for a recess, and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 4:03 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 1173, HD1:

Representative Hirono moved that S.B. No. 1173, HD1, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hirono.

Representative Kanoho then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I do believe that chiropractic treatment can be most valuable in remedying certain ailments. However, treatment without proper medical diagnosis can not only be very costly but, more importantly, can be a very dangerous procedure because real problems remain

undetected and can worsen without proper care.

"Mr. Speaker, I am also concerned with the continuing efforts to mandate insurance coverage thereby increasing overall costs where such measures would be more properly addressed in the private sector.

"Thank you."

Representative Metcalf then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I also speak in opposition to this bill and would ask that Representative Kano's remarks be inserted into the record as my own," and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Lee rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against this bill and also on other measures of similar nature.

"I think that medical insurance has been overloaded. It's like putting a lot of ornaments on the Christmas tree--it may collapse. I think we should be very careful to adhere to the original intent of medical insurance.

"This measure would add a cost of about 11.7 million dollars. I voted in favor of the well-baby bill even though it belongs to the same category. We are trying to legislate socially desirable objects in a medical insurance bill and the totality of all these measures will increase the burden, not only on business, but on all of us.

"The point about medical insurance is that it should take care of the common ailments for the greatest number of people and not be used to serve special or limited issue uses, and this is the reason why I must stand in opposition to this bill.

"Thank you, Sir."

Representative Hemmings rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, there is a positive alternative. We are opening up the floodgates to massive exploitation both by providers and recipients of the social welfare program, in this instance, the insurance program, by mandating additional coverage. The alternative in this is a 'gatekeeper' legislation where, in the future, all

providers can be provided even playing field for their services. Right now, I do sympathize because chiropractors can and in some instances, provide much necessary service to someone who needs their help. But by opening up the system to every chiropractor, we are going to be encouraging abuse of the system, both by chiropractors and providers. Gatekeeper legislation could provide for assistance by which people have to go to a primary physician and have future services in any area of medical services approved before they can go on to the insurance or the social welfare program payroll.

"For that reason, Mr. Speaker, I am voting against this legislation in hopes that, in the future, we can come back and institute a more responsible program to regulate health care cost to the benefit of consumers and victims.

"Thank you."

Representative Hirono then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I feel compelled to point out a few things regarding this bill. I can certainly understand the concerns of those who are concerned about the cost implications of this particular measure. However, there are two safeguards in this bill. One, the committee intends that this provision drop dead in four years to give the Legislature time to evaluate the economic impact of this mandated service. The other is that we will allow the insurers--the insurance company themselves--to set the level of coverage and, therefore, I doubt very much that they will allow the kind of coverage that they allow to general practitioners. So, those are two cost items that the committee took into consideration and recommended passage of this bill.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1173, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHIROPRACTIC SERVICE", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 36 ayes to 15 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Andrews, Apo, Bellinger, Cachola, Cavasso, Hemmings, D. Ige, Jones, Kawakami, Lee, Liu, Metcalf, Peters and Tom voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 1173 had passed

Third Reading at 4:08 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 830, SD1, HD1:

Representative Hirono moved that S.B. No. 830, SD1, HD1, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hiraki.

Representative Cavasso then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the bill--as it originally came out of the House--in the House version, did not add the first line in Section 1 which includes AIDS under the civil rights statutes.

"I have no objection, Mr. Speaker, to protecting people who have AIDS from being required to take an exam or such. I do have objection to taking away the rights of homeowners and such to take into consideration certain risks-- health risks, communicable diseases--in their decision-making as to whether or not they can rent under certain conditions. For example, if a family has a young child less than a year old--the child will be crawling all over the home, picking things up generally and putting them into their mouths--and that family should, if they are renting a room, have the right to consider the health risk to that child in deciding who should or should not rent their home.

"I prefer that we stay with the House version that we sent over to the Senate, and I would urge that this particular version, which has come over from the Senate, be held, and that we work with the House version.

"Thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 830, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DISCRIMINATION IN REAL PROPERTY", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 votes to 2 noes, with Representatives Cavasso and Jones voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 830 passed Third Reading at 4:10 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 1342, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative Hirono, seconded by Representative Hiraki and carried, S.B. No. 1342, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRAVEL

AGENCIES", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Anderson then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I've gone over this bill and, again, it bothers me that we can go ahead and lower the age for private investigators and also security guards from age 22 down to age 18.

"As a person who served in the service at seventeen, I'll tell you that a lot of times we are just not ready for certain things--we're not mature enough--and to have a person to be able to be a private investigator or even have the responsibility of being a security guard at age 18--there are many who are able to do this--but I would say that the majority are not ready.

"For this reason Mr. Speaker, I am asking all of my colleagues again to go 'no' and I know Representative Apo is going to follow suit.

"Thank you , Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 337, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PRIVATE INVESTIGATORS AND GUARDS", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no,

On motion by Representative Hirono, seconded by Representative Hiraki and carried, S.B. No. 1338, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CREDIT CARDS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 341, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative Hirono, seconded by Representative Hiraki and carried, S.B. No. 341, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNIFORM COMMERCIAL CODE", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 441; 1338; and 341 had passed Third Reading at 4:14 o'clock p.m.

On motion by Representative Hirono, seconded by Representative Hiraki and carried, S.B. No. 1079, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INDUSTRIAL LOAN COMPANIES", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 33, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative Hirono, seconded by Representative

Hiraki and carried, S.B. No. 33, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO REAL ESTATE TRANSACTIONS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 469, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative Hirono, seconded by Representative Hiraki and carried, S.B. No. 469, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO UNFAIR AND DECEPTIVE PRACTICES", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 1079; 33; and 469 had passed Third Reading at 4:15 o'clock p.m.

At 4:15 o'clock p.m., Representative Hirono asked for a recess, and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 4:17 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 565, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative Hirono, seconded by Representative Hiraki and carried, S.B. No. 565, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INSURANCE", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 565 had passed Third Reading at 4:17 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 447, HD1:

On motion by Representative Hirono, seconded by Representative Hiraki and carried, S.B. No. 447, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHIROPRACTIC", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 24, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative Hirono, seconded by Representative Hiraki and carried, S.B. No. 24, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONDOMINIUM BYLAWS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 447 and 24 had passed Third Reading at 4:19 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 986, SD2, HD1:

Representative Hirono moved that S.B. No. 986, SD2, HD1, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hiraki.

Representative Kanohe rose to speak in opposition to the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I agree with the concept and intent of this bill. However, I wish to express continuing concern with efforts to mandate insurance coverage thereby increasing its overall costs apparently without regard on whom such costs be absorbed. I believe such coverage be more properly addressed in the private sector.

"Thank you."

Representative Arakaki then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I speak especially on the part of mental health which I am very concerned about.

"I understand, right now, we have optional coverages for mental health. But, I ask, since when is good mental health an option? I think it is something we all need. I don't think anyone would no more choose to be mentally ill than they would to have a coronary or to have a stroke. I don't think, in many cases, it can be helped.

"And for those who are concerned about the cost, think about it in these terms: Many of our mentally ill are on the streets, they are street people. If they're not there, they are in one of our institutions, either the prisons or the state hospital. The only other option is for them to be with their families.

"I think what this bill says is that we are going to support the families who are willing to support the mentally ill and it's a very high cost that they bear. So, I think we should show support for these families and I think that's why I ask for everyone to support this bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lee then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I share the sentiments that my colleague, Representative Arakaki, stated about mental health. I certainly will support a bill that will mandate coverage for mental

health. It's indiscriminate; no one knows what happens.

"The other two coverages, however, that were mandated reflect personal decisions on the part of those who engage in such practices as to bring the suffering or affliction upon themselves. Those who are mentally ill do not have any choice. It is what has happened. The problem is, we cannot meet every physical ailment with a coverage and to place the cost of coverage on everyone--if its a case where there is a voluntary decision on the part of those who undertake such practices. I regret that the bill is not much more specific--addressed only to mental health--in that case I would support the bill. But since it includes the other two areas which are at considerable cost and which place an undue burden on those who do not practice things that bring upon such affliction, it is for those reasons that I will vote against the bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 986, SD2, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INSURANCE", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 30 ayes to 21 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Andrews, Apo, Bellinger, Cachola, Cavasso, Hayes, D. Ige, Ihara, Jones, Kanohe, Kawakami, Lee, Liu, Marumoto, O'Kieffe, Peters, Pfeil, Ribellia, Tajiri and Tom voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 986 had passed Third Reading at 4:24 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 749, SD1, HD1:

Representative Shon moved that S.B. No. 749, SD1, HD1, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Leong.

Representative Shon then rose and requested that his written remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal, and the Chair, noting that there were no objection, "so ordered."

The remarks of Representative Shon, in favor of the bill, are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, there is no doubt that healthcare costs too much. And there is no doubt that as a major provider of healthcare through the

many state hospitals and health clinics, the State of Hawaii has a responsibility to actively participate in decisions which affect those costs.

"The State Health and Development Agency was originally created by federal legislation. And because of that origin, I believe, our state officials have never taken a keen interest in its functions. Many have complained, but few have sought to actually reform and improve the state's role in controlling cost and ensuring quality and equal access.

"This year, perhaps stimulated by the end of the federal program, a reevaluation was in order. Your Committee on Health discovered that no one was systematically looking at health care costs. Information was fragmented, and seldom delivered in a coherent form to us or other decision makers.

"We found that SHPDA had lost its purpose, and was engaged in an unproductive turf battle with other planners within the Department of Health. Clearly it was time to sort out responsibilities, to refocus, to set a new direction.

"This bill, and the House bill which still survives on the Senate side, represent the refocus and the new direction. We have sought to streamline SHPDA by:

providing for administrative reviews of certain Certificate of Need applications;

raising the threshold when a CON is required;

providing for waivers; and removing references and obligations tied to the now-defunct federal program.

"Mr. Speaker, we have refocused SHPDA by:

1. We will be receiving an annual report on health care costs in Hawaii, which is essential if we are going to do anything about it.
2. We will insist that once a CON is granted, SHPDA also be responsible for monitoring of the projects for conformance.
3. We insist that the overall goals include the promotion of equal access of all the

people of the state to quality health care services at reasonable cost.

4. And SHPDA to peer into the future of emerging health issues, such as medical ethics, health care rationing, involuntary care, care for the indigent, and standards for research and development of biotechnology and genetic engineering.

"Mr. Speaker, there can be no doubt that there are enemies of SHPDA, the OLD SHPDA. But today, with the passage of this bill, and, hopefully, with Senate agreement, we need not dwell on the past. Rising out of the ashes is a reformed, born-again entity.

"This new SHPDA will assist us in getting a handle on health care costs; on playing referee when needed, as many be the case when two nearby communities insist on their own hospital; on ensuring that the state hospitals can operate in an economic environment which is not always a drain on the public treasury; and to enforce our commitment to equal access and quality of health care throughout the islands."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 749, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH PLANNING AND RESOURCES", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 619, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative Shon, seconded by Representative Leong and carried, S.B. No. 619, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CERTIFICATION OF PRIVATE CESSPOOL PUMPING FIRMS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Anderson voting no.

S.B. No. 1126, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative Shon, seconded by Representative Leong and carried, S.B. No. 1126, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MARRIAGE LICENSE", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 749; 619; and 1126 had passed Third Reading at 4:25 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 915, SD1, HD1:

Representative Tam moved that S.B. No. 915, SD1, HD1, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Lee.

Representative Tam then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, although two hearings were held on this measure, that is, S.B. No. 915, SD1, in the House Committee on Education, no favorable testimony was received. The bill would have eliminated the present district exemption policy in the public schools which have been in place since 1896.

"After careful consideration, the Committee found that the Department of Education's district exemption policy is working well. Therefore, this bill has been amended to accomplish the more important purpose of making kindergarten mandatory, thus the coming about of S.B. No. 915, SD1, HD1.

"The Board of Education has decided to place its highest priority on reducing class size in kindergarten, followed by gradually reducing class size in higher grades later on. The House budget contains a 6.6 million dollars appropriation and the Senate budget contains 5.5 million dollars appropriation for class size reduction in kindergarten. If kindergarten is not important enough to be mandatory, then we should start class reduction at the first grade instead.

"Kindergarten has changed in recent years. It's not merely recreational or concerned with social integration. Kindergarten now consist of academic work which, if missed, cause children who do not attend to be in danger of falling behind in first and second grade, perhaps never catching up.

"Although some express concern that children are not ready for academic work at age five, most studies show that children who have such exposure score significantly higher in language and mathematical achievement.

"In addition, your Committee found that the law already allows for exemptions to the compulsory attendance language in Section 298-9 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes, and our investigation of this matter shows that the department is liberal in the application of law. For example, exemptions:

1. When the child is physically or mentally unable to attend school, or
2. When the family employs a tutor approved by the Department of Education, or
3. When the family court allows that the child to remain away from school, or
4. When the child is enrolled in an appropriate alternative educational program approved by the Superintendent of Education.

"Thus, the above exceptions takes care of the concerns of parents who feel that their children are not ready for kindergarten.

"This bill has been amended to require the Department of Education to establish kindergarten classes as part of the public school system and to require the attendance of children who reach the age of 5 before September 1st of the school year. Those children who reach the age of 5 between September 1st and December 31st will be committed, although not mandatory, to attend kindergarten. This measure is not intended to be applicable to children who attain the age of 6 years on or before the end of the year of 1988 to 1989 school year, in order to provide the Department of Education and affected parents enough time to accomplish the purposes of this bill.

"Mr. Speaker, I believe that the future of our state and our nation depends more than anything on achieving educational excellence in this generation. Mandatory kindergarten is only the first step in emphasizing education as a top priority of our state government.

"I ask my fellow colleagues to vote, 'yes.'

"Thank you."

Representative Cavasso then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against this bill as it is currently worded. It's a gentle 'no' because I believe this will be changed again in Conference Committee.

"The bill, as we originally put it out, allowed for mandatory kindergarten, which is good. It went further, however, and allowed that parents would have the discretion of

sending their children to school at 6 years old.

"I was a slow starter myself, Mr. Speaker. I actually had to repeat the first grade and did well after that. I think Representative Apo was a little faster than me--he repeated kindergarten. Representative Isbell has some children she held back and I think there are others in this House that have looked at the maturity of their children and said that it would be good to start them a little bit later--often it's the males, the females seem to be a little bit quicker.

"But the bill, as we moved it out of here a few weeks ago, said that the Department of Education shall establish and maintain kindergarten, which is good, and it said, 'for everyone that wanted it.' It said that, 'no child shall attend kindergarten unless the child will be at least 5 years of age, on or before December 31st of the school year,' and then it allowed for exceptions. But then it went further and said, 'provided further that kindergarten attendance shall be mandatory for a child 6 years of age on or before December 31st of the school year who have not yet attended kindergarten for one school year, except that the teacher may recommend the child for first grade entry,' an exception again.

"The objection I have to the bill right now is that it is not the win-win situation that we had coming out a few weeks ago. There are a large number of people in the community that believe that 5 years is too young for the children and would like to have the option of sending them to school at 5 but have no problem with making kindergarten itself mandatory at 6 with the option of starting at 5. There are different degrees of development and, it seems, from my conversation with the chairman of the Committee, that he has no objection to going back to the original House version, and I discussed it with others and am hopeful that when this comes up for final vote, Mr. Speaker, that I'll cheerfully be able to vote 'yes' if given parental discretion back again and come to the original version as it was.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tam then rose to reply to the remarks of Representative Cavasso by stating:

"Mr. Speaker, Representative Cavasso had mentioned a willingness to discuss the matter in terms of what

he proposes, but keep in mind that we are to present our bill as we pass it upon Third Reading and, also, if the issue does come up as to any other options we will consider it, but we are to, at this time, adhere to what we have.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, irregardless of what anyone says--and I have a lot of respect for the chairman--and everybody else's concerns, I think that I am always going to be against anything that mandates what a person can do or cannot do, especially when we're saying they have to go ahead and send their child to kindergarten.

"I know many, many parents who could do a better job at home and then send their child to the first grade. It's been proven time and time again. We're looking at roughly a little over 400 people throughout the state. Right now, we cannot accommodate what we have. As I pointed out when we had the budget, there is not sufficient funds right now for the teacher-pupil ratio. Also, because kindergarten is a visual educational type process, even if we're going to put them in a portable, the portables are not standard equipment that the teachers want. They're too small because it is visual. With all of these things, Mr. Speaker, I don't know how we can turn around and say that this is going to be good. The only thing that I see that it's going to do is provide a few jobs for the Department of Education but, in reality, it's going to cost us; we're not ready for it; we can't accommodate it. Are we just going to overcrowd our kindergartens more than they are right now?

"Because of these questions, I am going to go 'no' and I don't think I am going to change very many minds.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 915, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SCHOOL ATTENDANCE", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Cavasso, Jones and Medeiros voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 915 had passed Third Reading at 4:36 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 957, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative Hagino, seconded by Representative Arakaki and carried, S.B. No. 957, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOME DETENTION", passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Hemmings, Jones and Ribellia voting no.

S.B. No. 774, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative Taniguchi, seconded by Representative Say and carried, S.B. No. 774, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 957 and 774 had passed Third Reading at 4:37 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 590, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative Oshiro, seconded by Representative Bellinger and carried, S.B. No. 590, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LICENSE PLATES OF STORED VEHICLES", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 589, HD1:

On motion by Representative Oshiro, seconded by Representative Bellinger and carried, S.B. No. 589, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DERELICT VEHICLES", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 241, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative Oshiro, seconded by Representative Bellinger and carried, S.B. No. 241, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOTOR VEHICLES", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 590; 589; and 241 had passed Third Reading at 4:38 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 584, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative Oshiro, seconded by Representative Bellinger and carried, S.B. No. 584, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR

AN ACT RELATING TO DEALERS IN NEW MOTOR VEHICLES", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 242, SD, HD1:

On motion by Representative Levin, seconded by Representative D. Ige and carried, S.B. No. 242, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC LANDS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Crozier and Shon voting no.

S.B. No. 1325, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative Levin, seconded by Representative Bellinger and carried, S.B. No. 1325, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC LANDS", passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Shon voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 584; 242; and 1325 had passed Third Reading at 4:39 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 934, SD1, HD1:

On motion by Representative Levin, seconded by Representative Andrews and carried, S.B. No. 934, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE FACILITATION OF PERMIT PROCESSING", passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 934 had passed Third Reading at 4:40 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 1218, HD1:

Representative Takamine moved that S.B. No. 1218, HD1, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hagino.

Representative Tom then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, as you know, I introduced a similar measure in the form of H.B. No. 251, HD1, which passed this Honorable Body earlier this session.

"I would like to personally thank Chairmen Takamine and Hagino for passing this bill out of committee and adopting the House language.

"You know, I asked that my colleagues support this measure, the

purpose of which is to allow public agencies to provide the transcription or reproduction of materials to handicapped students without having to secure permission from the publishers in every instance. Materials in braille, large print and tape are hard to obtain and, when compounding this with laws that makes things even more difficult, we end up doing a disservice to our handicapped citizens. This bill would mandate language in all state procurement contracts allowing the right to produce copies in alternative formats for those unable to use conventional printed materials.

"As a legislator having to attend hearings and review numerous bills, much of my staff's time is spent brailleing those materials for me. However, we cannot forget those handicapped people who do not have the resources to have their materials prepared in braille, large print and tape recordings as an alternative format to print for their use.

"Finally, Mr. Speaker, in my observation, I can say with certainty that I am extremely privileged for the opportunity to participate in our legislative process with fellow legislators--Democrats and Republicans alike--who are exposed to, and are most sensitive to the needs of handicapped citizens by observing me firsthand in transcribing all of my materials into braille. I believe this bill will open the door for handicapped people by making it easier for public agencies to provide materials to all who need them in this way, ie, braille, large print or by tape.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1218, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC CONTRACTS", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 1218 had passed Third Reading at 4:43 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 1399, SD1, HD1:

Representative Takamine moved that S.B. No. 1399, SD1, HD1, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Yoshimura.

Representative Marumoto then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill is relating

to wages and hours on public works. I believe this bill is passing under false pretenses. The committee report is in error; for that matter, I believe the bill is also.

"The Federal Government does not require overtime pay with fringe benefits calculated into the pay. Standing Committee Report 1024 conspicuously states that 'this bill conforms Hawaii's law, sometimes called the "Little Davis-Bacon Act," to the federal Davis-Bacon Act and to prevailing practices in the construction industry and under collective bargaining contracts.' The bill also reads, 'under federal law, all contractors who bid on federal public works projects are required to pay fringe benefits for overtime work.'

"According to the U.S. Department of Labor Employment Standards Administration Wage and Hour Division Regulations, federal law pertaining to overtime, 'excludes amounts paid by a contractor or subcontractor for fringe benefits in the computation of overtime under the Fair Labor Standards Act, the contract work hours, and Safety Standards Act and the Walsh-Healy Public Contracts Act, whenever the overtime provisions of any of these statutes apply concurrently with the Davis-Bacon Act or its related prevailing wage statutes.' Additionally, the rules go on, 'the contractors contributions or cost for fringe benefits are excluded in computing overtime as long as exclusions do not reduce the regular or basic rate below the basic hourly rate contained in the wage determination.'

"Despite testimony that this bill would bring Hawaii into line with federal law, this will not be the case. I was particularly offended when one of the testifiers admitted to knowing that this was not the case. He was overheard to say that, 'you have to lie a little once in a while to get a bill passed.' Credibility, Mr. Speaker, as you know, is a priceless commodity, especially in these legislative halls and, once lost, cannot be regained.

"But returning to the substance of this measure before us, I must point out that many of our collective bargaining contracts already call for overtime pay to include the cost of fringe benefits. So, I contend that this bill is unnecessary and, Mr. Speaker, if its not necessary, then we must vote 'no.'

"Thank you very much."

Representative Takamine then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, as indicated, the bill is to comply with what is in the federal practice. As indicated in testimony under the overtime provisions, there are contractors who provide for overtime wages at one and a half times the normal hourly rate and do provide for fringe benefits. It was pointed out in testimony that by passage of this bill, this would provide all employers a level playing field from which to deal with.

"With respect to the testimony that was submitted before the committee--your Committee on Labor and Public Employment--we did have testimony in file from the Department of Labor which does indicate that the provisions of the bill would comply with what is federal practice.

"Thank you."

Representative Cavasso then rose in rebuttal to the remarks of Representative Takamine and stated that he is against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, right now the previous speaker said that some contractors, by their own choice, by a contract with their own employees, do provide fringe benefits. Mr. Speaker, that's good and it's by their choice. There are other contractors who have contracts with their employees and we should leave them the freedom to have those contracts within the context of the law, and this is going far beyond simply providing that they meet the Davis-Bacon Act--this goes further, and I think that to deny contractors the right to have contracts between themselves and their employees, on a separate and individual basis, is improper.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Bellinger rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in trying to address part of Representative Marumoto's concerns, those initial concerns were mine also, but in exploring the intent of the Committee and the Committee's report and also in discussion with the various House attorneys, it was clarified that, indeed, this law does conform with the federal Bacon-Davis Act and there is no inconsistencies at all.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Marumoto rose in rebuttal and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would be very happy to provide both the Department of Labor and Representative Bellinger this publication put out by the Federal Department of Labor. I think this will back me up.

"Also, I had discussions with Mr. Tom Hayakawa of the U.S. Department of Labor here in the Federal Building, so we could pursue this discussion at some more opportune time.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

"Mr. Speaker, I speak against the bill for two reasons. The first reason is just to give my colleagues an opportunity to listen to somebody else besides Representative Anderson over there.

"On a more serious note, the reason I speak against this motion is because this bill will allow 16 year olds to work in the precincts. Mr. Speaker, I have been involved with the precinct process--the election process--under three lieutenant governors and once Lieutenant Governor John Waihee got involved, everything turned around. It was an open process, many of the Democratic Party officials were invited to bring the list in so that they could have their people work at the polls. It opened up a new horizon for us, sir, and we gained a lot of experience. A lot of people who thought they were excluded from the process felt honored that they could share and do some civic duty. I think there is enough adults out there that want to continue doing this. I cannot see us allowing youngsters to come in when we have other people available.

"You know, Mr. Speaker, I think it is very important to understand that--at least the minimum--if you are going to participate in the process, you should--the minimum--vote that day. These 16-year olds will not be able to vote and I also see that they possibly could be intimidated in the late hours when the rush builds--these youngsters will probably lose their 'cool' and for that matter, I will be voting 'no.'

"Thank you very much."

Representative Lee then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the bill intends to make 16 year olds election officials. I have no objection with the intent of the bill and, indeed, support any move to involve young people in the electoral process of our country. It is very important that they become acquainted and be able to participate in a meaningful way.

"But today, as you know, we honor the senior citizens of Mililani. Many of them serve as election officials. They work very hard and I think it would be hard put to understand why a 16 year old, who is not eligible to vote, is made 'election officials.' That's the point. They could be helping in setting up booths, directing traffic and doing a number of other things; but they will be election

officials, paid the same rate--\$80.00 as the senior citizens. And if any of my constituents ask me how I stood on this bill, I can say very truthfully, in their eyes, that I agree that it is not a good way of involving young people. There are many other good ways of doing so and, therefore, I will vote 'no' on this bill.

"Thank you."

At 5:19 o'clock p.m., Representative Medeiros asked for a recess, and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 5:20 o'clock p.m.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. "Mr. Speaker, what this bill does is to require a lobbyist to--the company that the lobbyist work for--to say exactly how much they pay their lobbyist. I feel that its an invasion of the privacy of that lobbyist.

"Sir, right now all legislators, judges and public administrators have to fill out a state ethics commission form--we all have to fill this out. In this form there is a schedule in which we have to identify how much monies we make within a range--between \$0 and \$10,000 and \$25,000 and so on--wherever you fall into the bracket.

"In the State Constitution, they require that we do something about this. They talked to legislators, judges and public administrators. They set a standard by what we have to live by.

"What this bill does, is set a higher standard just for lobbyists. I don't think that's fair. In our Constitution, we also have an area, a section that deals with privacy and only when there is a compelling state need, can we pry into the workings of a persons livelihood. If we're going to pry into their livelihood, sir, I would have no problem if they had to follow the same laws that we, as legislators--or same standards that we, as legislators-- have to abide by. But to set standards above what we live by, I think, is unconstitutional, and I don't think this bill, if it passes through in this form, will stand the constitutional test.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Anderson then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, very briefly, I'll go along with what Representative Crozier said. I believe that a lobbyist should tell people what he is giving us. I think that our campaign spending takes care of that. I don't think that they have to tell us what they make. They're not elected officials and for that reason, I am going 'no.'

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 575, SD1, HD1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LOBBYING", having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes

to 3 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Crozier and M. Ige voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 575 had passed Third Reading at 5:31 o'clock p.m.

The fifty-dollar credit goes to everyone and if the Administration firmly believes that a tax credit is the best method of dealing with the excise tax, then maybe the fairest mechanism for dealing with the excise tax should be to use the existing State schedule and to increase the allowances. This present schedule cost the State tax approximately 13.5 million. Therefore, the amounts in this schedule could be increased 3 to 4 times and we would still be in the ballpark figure to the governor's 45 million dollar revenue loss to the state. At the same time, it would give equitable tax credit to those who are least able to pay. In other words, Mr. Speaker, if you are making a hundred thousand dollars versus twenty-five thousand, I think that is the person we are trying to

help.

"I've said it in the past, it's fine to say that we are going to give relief later, but I think everybody is looking for relief immediately.

"For this reason, Mr. Speaker, I am voting against the bill; wish my colleagues would follow.

"Thank you."

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1075 on S.B. No. 1136, SD2, HD2:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee and S.B. No. 1136, SD2, HD2, be recommitted to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Crozier then rose to speak against the recommittal, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill deals with an issue that has had a lot of discussion before the public. I think we should address the concerns of this issue. It talks about the presidential primary and, here in Hawaii, we're lost in the middle of the ocean. We never look to the national scene and understand the issues. Normally, it just boils down to the two powerbrokers within the community telling us what to do and we vote along this.

"Mr. Speaker, if we have a chance to vote on this bill, we can go ahead and start to understand and start to appreciate what happens on the national scene, and we can become more interested, and when we do exercise our franchise on voting for our presidential candidates, because of the discussions that took place, we, the people of Hawaii, will benefit from it.

"Mr. Speaker, I am already in contact with the Governor of Massachusetts, Michael Dukakis, and I have volunteered to sit on his committee so that in case this presidential primary takes place in Hawaii, we will have a group ready to lobby for his position.

"Sir, with that I ask my members to vote against this recommittal.

"Thank you."

Representative Liu then rose to speak in favor of the recommittal, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I don't think that by voting to recommit this measure that we are necessarily killing the concept for the future. I think if we just look to 1988 is shortsighted. There

will be many presidential elections in the future.

"This is a very complex issue. We have to look for Supreme Court decisions, State party rules, national party rules, primary states procedures in other states. There are so many areas of question marks that, I think, to vote for the recommittal, will be very wise and we can always discuss it again next session and there is also questions of potential need for a state constitutional amendments, etc., dealing with this area.

"So for those reasons, I hope all of you vote 'yes' on the recommittal.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Metcalf then rose to speak in support of the recommittal, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, it is on rare occasions that I find myself agreeing with the Minority Leader across the isle, but I think that his points are well taken; this is certainly an item that we can consider for the future. I think there is some reluctance to proceed at this time, given the many unanswered questions.

"Thank you."

"We'd like to pay tribute to these courageous New Englanders who came with a vision of bringing new religion--christianity--to these islands. Over the past 150 years, these missionaries and their descendants have contributed not only to our religion but to every facet of life in the islands--to education, politics, business as well as to the culture and arts of Hawaii.

"In my own experience, among those here today are a number of individuals like Mary Fiedler, a law school classmate and tireless volunteer

on behalf of gifted and talented students, Professor Dwayne Preble, chairman of the U.H. Art Department, who has richly contributed to my own appreciation of art in an urban setting, and Charles Black, with whom I've worked in recreating offices as attractive and dynamic places to work. They've added considerable depth to my own life and I would like to introduce them and their family members to you. Some of these missionary descendants who are with us here this morning are from the Hawaiian Mission Children Society."

Thursday, April 9, 1987

The House of Representatives of the Fourteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1987, convened at 11:15 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Ms. Bettye Harris, President of the Hawaii Council of Churches, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Isbell, Leong and Taniguchi, who were excused.

By unanimous consent, reading and approval of the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Forty-Eighth Day was deferred.

## SENATE COMMUNICATION

A communication from the Senate (Sen. Com. No. 643) transmitting Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 19, relating to the 150th anniversary of the arrival of the 8th Company of missionaries to the Hawaiian Islands, which was adopted by the Senate on April 8, 1987, was read by the Clerk and placed on file.

By unanimous consent, further action on S.C.R. No. 19 was deferred.

At this time, the following introductions were made to the members of the House:

Representative Yoshimura introduced a group of fourth graders from Kalihi-waena School. They were accompanied by their teachers, Mrs. Jean Ma and Miss Jean Miyashiro; and a parent, Mrs. Bond.

Representative Tungpalan introduced 143 eighth grade students from Highlands Intermediate School. They were accompanied by their teachers, Mrs. Jan Shibuya, Mrs. Karen Kawakami, Mr. Gregg Yamate, Miss Joann Higa, Mrs. Marjorie Okuhara; and parents, Mrs. Wakayama, Mrs. Wenkett, Mr. Apana and Mr. Taniguchi.

Representative Tungpalan then introduced "some officials from the Little League", stating: "Little League Baseball season has begun in Hawaii. T-ball and minor leagues and, in some cases, the major leagues are in operation on every island.

Yes, Molokai and Lanai have always had the excitement associated with Little League Baseball. Each year, for the past five years, two umpiring experts from Little League Regional Headquarters based in San Bernadino have come to Hawaii to conduct baseball umpire clinics. Mr. Mike Wright has umpired in Little League games in California for the past 23 years. He is the Sports Director of the Santa Ana Recreation Department where he makes his living while he does his volunteer work with the Little League. Mr. Sai Levarde has been a Little League umpire for the past 27 years. He became the Western Regional Chief Umpire in 1980 and has traveled to Canada, Guam, Asia, and other areas, to conduct umpire clinics. He first came to Hawaii to conduct these clinics in 1978 and has been here in the last five successive years, bringing Mike Wright to assist him. Along with these two umpire experts, we have with us Mr. Bob Kawamoto, who is the Hawaii State Little League Chief Administrator and a resident of Kaneohe. Bob retired from his civil engineer position from the Board of Water Supply two years ago to devote full time doing volunteering activities for the Little League."

Representative Tungpalan then asked Mr. Mike Wright, Mr. Sai Levarde and Mr. Bob Kawamoto to stand to be recognized.

Representative Tom introduced a group of "remarkable" senior citizens from the Ann Pearl intermediate care facility in Kaneohe, as follows: Annie Hee, Lida Kapuniai, Evelyn Bowlman, Dorothy Mant, Lois Wyman and Sherri Koke. They were accompanied by Mr. Frank Camacho, Activities Director.

Representative Tom then introduced a group of student council members from King Intermediate School. They were accompanied by Mrs. Grace Wilson, Adviser; Pastor Leon Hiebert, Ohana PTA President; and Susan Young, resource teacher.

Representative Takamie introduced 20 students from Honokaa High School and their advisers, Mr. Nathan Kawashima and Mr. Marvin Sanemitsu, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this morning, I have the privilege of introducing to you and my colleagues a group of students and their advisers who are here

from the Big Island, and who are here also to attend the State Conference of the Future Farmers of America. For me, it is a special introduction, Mr. Speaker, because I have learned a lot about all that the program offers. In light of the significance of diversified agriculture on the Big Island, this program contributes, not only to the schools that carry on the program, but also to the general community of the Big Island. The benefits of this program include, not only the learning of skills and much knowledge, but also involves the learning of leadership skills, and also a sincere caring about the welfare of the entire community. #### STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT

Representative Taniguchi, for the Committee on Higher Education and the Arts, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1146) recommending that H.C.R. No. 5, as amended in HD 1, be referred to the Committee on Legislative Management.

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Okamura and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 5, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING A FINANCIAL, MANAGEMENT, AND PROGRAM AUDIT OF THE STATE FOUNDATION ON CULTURE AND THE ARTS", was referred to the Committee on Legislative Management.

#### INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 334 and 355) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

A resolution (H.R. No. 334) congratulating Karen Wright as the 1987 "Uchinanchu of the Year" was jointly offered by Representatives Arakaki, D. Ige, Oshiro, Takamine and M. Ige.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative D. Ige and carried, H.R. No. 334 was adopted.

Representative Arakaki rose to introduce the honoree, stating:

"To borrow an observation from Governor Waihee at a recent installation banquet, this year's not only the year of the Hawaiians; according to the Chinese calendar, it is also the year of the 'Hare,' which makes it appropriate for Okinawans. But Okinawans are known more for than just having hairy arms and legs. I

want to share that observation with Representative Anderson.

"They made their mark in every aspect of our Hawaiian society -- from business, especially in the restauranting business, government, sports and the arts. I also want to make note that Okinawans in Hawaii hold records for longevity. The Okinawans in Hawaii have also managed to retain a strong sense of cultural ties to the Sonjin Kai, or clubs associated with the city or village that the Issei or immigrants came from in Okinawa. These clubs perpetuate ties to Okinawa at their annual picnic and New Year's party. They also participate in activities of the United Okinawan Association, such as the Okinawan Festival, sports leagues, study tours and cultural shows.

"The United Okinawan Association, or Okinawan Kenjin Rengo Kai, which was first formed in 1951 to coordinate post-war relief efforts for Okinawa, has grown to represent over 45 clubs, an estimated 40,000 people of Okinawan ancestry in Hawaii. The United Okinawan Association is and will be an integral part in holding the clubs together so that they may pass on the legacy of their ancestors' culture and heritage. As our Isseis, or first generation, pass on, and as we move further away from our roots and move headlong into the future towards high technology, our sense of culture diminishes and our heritage dilutes.

"We, in Hawaii, are unique in the world community because we can claim an American heritage, a Hawaiian heritage, and the heritage of our ancestors. We need to nurture and encourage that uniqueness. For that reason, I am really pleased we can honor an individual who has devoted her time and efforts to promote our heritage. I am especially happy because I have known our honoree for many years, having worked with her late husband, Bob Wright, to develop new programs at Kuhio Park Terrace and Kamehameha Field. I have also had the pleasure of seeing her two boys grow up into young men, and I would also want to mention that I received her support as a constituent in my district."

Representative Arakaki asked Mrs. Karen Uesato Wright to stand to be recognized. Accompanying Mrs. Wright were Mr. Richard Fukuhara, President of the United Okinawan Association; Mr. Maurice Yamasato, the President-elect; and Mr. Edward

Kuba, the past President.

Representative Arakaki then asked Mrs. Wright's son, Duane; and his aides, Priscilla Kubota and Elizabeth Pagba, who were seated in the gallery to stand to be recognized.

Floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Horita, Tungpalan, Fukunaga and D. Ige, and Representative Arakaki presented Mrs. Wright with a certified copy of the resolution.

A resolution (H.R. No. 355) recognizing the Moanalua High School basketball team for winning the 1987 OIA basketball championship was jointly offered by Representatives Horita and Alcon.

On motion by Representative Horita, seconded by Representative Alcon and carried, H.R. No. 355 was adopted.

Moanalua High School was the outstanding school in the State last year in a competition sponsored by Frito-Lay. This year, it is the only remaining high school representing the State of Hawaii as a finalist in the competition sponsored by the U.S. Department of Education for best high school in the nation. Moanalua High School also excels in sports.

"I would like to present to you the OIA Boys Basketball champions."
