The House of Representatives of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1989, convened at 11:40 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Representative Ezra Kanoho, after which the Roll was called showing all members present.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Forty-Fourth Day.

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Forty-Fourth Day was approved.

At 11:52 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:10 o'clock p.m.

Representative Apo moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 733, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Hemmings then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"This body can be accused of being rather hypocritical on this issue, on this very historical day when the State Judiciary starts the trial of the deputy director of the State judicial system, by giving civil service exemptions to two secretaries when the deputy director of the State has civil service protection himself which is rather unique in all of government. We could be accused of creating a conflict of interest situation. The secretaries are, in fact, going to be political creatures without protection of the civil service system.

"It is also readily apparent that there are problems within the civil service system in the Judiciary as was pointed out by the citizens' panel report with circumventing of the hiring processes and circumventing the promotional processes by the civil service system in the Judiciary. And the report pointed that the person at the helm of these problems was the deputy director who himself has civil service protection.

"So, Mr. Speaker, in voting in favor of the bill, this will make secretaries political creatures which is pretty consistent with what we did last year but, nevertheless, does put the situation of conflict with the deputy director of the court system. Therefore, I urge that we be very cautious in how this is applied, Mr. Speaker.

"Thank you."

Representative Peters rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"The primary reason is for those that were eloquently expressed by the Minority Floor Leader.

"Thank you."

Representative Liu rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, there are a few things in this bill which are very good to help clean up the election laws but, unfortunately, there are too many that leave open a lot of questions concerning the integrity of our election process to be looked at at this point in time.

"We have a bill here that allows a partisanly elected official to challenge election papers up until the time a candidate is elected. I am very concerned about that provision, Mr. Speaker. It means that a candidate can go through the total election season and hours before the polls close, one's papers can be challenged. One can go through a primary election and one's papers can be challenged, at any time can one's papers be challenged by partisanly elected officials. I find that quite disconcerting regardless of who gets that office in the future or who holds it. I think it is a concern and a problem.

"Mr. Speaker, I also have a concern with the fact that this opens up the process to a partisanly elected official to hold elections for vacancies that are unanticipated under the law. I don't know what that means. It is much too wide open, Mr. Speaker.

"Thirdly, Mr. Speaker, there is a very interesting provision to change the dates concerning vacancies and how that affects the periods in which special elections are held to fill those vacancies. Right now, under various circumstances, you have thirty days until the election before which if a vacancy occurs, then a special election is called. This bill changes that deadline in various aspects -- in some cases 40 days, in other cases 60 days.

"What it means is that if a vacancy is declared at a period sooner than today, then potentially no election is required, and the individual, by appointment from the governorship, can serve through an election period to fill out the final term of a say, for instance, State senator, and I think that deprives the people of the State, or that district which might be affected, of a chance to vote at an election for their representative or senator to complete that term.

"I know the concerns of those who proposed that section may have looked at the need to have more time to print ballots, to get organized. However, I also think there is this other aspect and that change of times which is something very serious and something that we should not allow to happen.

"This is a very sensitive time for the issue of elections, Mr. Speaker. We have some very serious allegations of politicization of the process in the office which we should be sensitive to. Perhaps at a different time, perhaps at a different session, changes should be looked at. This is not the time, this is not the session. We should be looking towards taking politics out of our elective process.

"For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I shall be voting 'no' on this measure.

"Thank you."

And I would just like to express a concern, Mr. Speaker, that the monies in this bill seem to be going in the downward direction substantially, and I would hope that not only do we pass this bill but that it also remains with a lot of substance for future implementation.

Representative Cavasso rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"We have a great need to get together with the federal government in working our Hawaiian health issues together for the benefit of our people. The program was passed by the federal government and this will allow us in the State of Hawaii to coordinate our various organizations that are volunteering right now to work on Hawaiian health issues, and I speak in favor of this.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hemmings then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"One of the biggest problems we have here in the State is that we have one of the highest rate of expenditures of taxpayers' dollars per capita of any state in the union. And one of the reasons is because we have many different agencies of government working on, spending money on, and the problems get worse, and rather than hold the agencies accountable for the spending they have been doing on these problems, we simply find another agency to address the problem and if we can't find one, we create another agency.

"In this particular case, we are putting in the Governor's Office, in the Planning Department, money to address the issue of violence in our society. We all want to solve the problem of violence. There is no discussion on what the problem is and what we want to do with it, but the discussion should center on how we do it and we're not going to do it by giving more money to another bureaucracy in the Governor's Office to address the problem.

"The viable alternative on this issue is to hold the Department of Social Services, the Police Department, the Prosecutor's Office, and other agencies of government already addressing this problem, accountable. And if we did do that, we wouldn't have to spend additional billions of dollars, and we might even have some money left over to provide the taxpayers with a legitimate refund.

"Therefore, I would ask my colleagues to consider this point of view and join us in voting 'no' against Senate Bill 1321.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Apo moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 908, SD 1, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Stegmaier then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I speak in support of this bill, first, because it establishes in a very clear, unequivocal terms that local management of the public school system shall be the overriding policy of the State and that local control would be the procedure used whenever it would be reasonable which I assume would be almost all of the time.

"Second, this bill will give to local schools flexibility to determine their own individual priorities and to implement them through budgetary allotment decisions and even through the hiring of certain school personnel.

"I believe this bill is a step in the right direction towards making parents and teachers more responsible for the education of young people and for this reason, I am in favor of this proposal.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 908, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SCHOOL/COMMUNITY-BASED MANAGEMENT OF THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1174 on S.B. No. 31, SD 1, HD 2:

Representative Apo moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 31, SD 1, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Hemmings rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I am sorry to be rising again on this page but I believe it is my duty to stay consistent and a little to my Portuguese heritage.

"Mr. Speaker, this bill is another example of government spending money with a new program or commission to address a situation that we should already be cognizant of. This bill establishes an eleven member commission for three terms as a Legislative Advisory Committee.

"Mr. Speaker, we don't have to spend hundred thousand dollars getting advice. We have the public hearing process where we have experts, sometimes too many experts, banging on our doors all day long with pro and con views on these different issues, and it might even be a conflict of interest to hire our own panel of experts because they might be coming up with the view that coincides with the party in power at any given time. So the best thing to do is let the private citizen testify on the issues, let the experts come down. If we need expertise, there's literally hundreds of people that would be willing to step forward. We don't have to set up a Legislative

Advisory Committee, another bureaucracy that's going to start out with \$100,000 a year to provide us with information we should already have, and if we don't, there's a lot of experts already out there.

"For that reason, Mr. Speaker, I am voting 'no' against the bill."

Representative Apo rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, several years ago, I probably would have agreed with the Minority Floor Leader in looking at this bill. What had changed my mind is, a couple of years ago, I was fortunate enough to attend a legislative workshop at Boston University which is the only school in the country that specializes in the discipline of state legislators. It's amazing, even for those of us who have been in this process for several years, how little we really know in terms of how unique state legislatures are. It was pointed out to us -- those at the workshop -- that the state legislatures are unique institutions. It is not a corporation, it is not a community organization, et cetera, and as such, requires a different approach in terms of legislative operations, in terms of the way we deal with the public, et cetera.

"It was very eye-opening, and I welcome this Legislative Advisory Committee to help us improve our performance, to take a look at some of the suggestions that are coming out of Boston University, which I think are excellent and things that we should be taking a look at. And for that reason, I would really support this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Hemmings, in rebuttal, stated:

"If we want to spend \$100,000 making our system accessible, we can expedite giving to the people committee notices, having the public properly notified so that the public can get here, and the experts can get here, and maybe we can even spend some of the \$100,000 on our elevators to make sure that the experts can get to the hearings on time to give us the advice we so sorely need.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Apo, in rebuttal, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, the previous speaker keeps referring strictly to what I call 'front of the house operations' which is those public hearings.

"Some of the problems that we have here that I think this bill will help us address by creating this committee is such things as the document that we now use for our parliamentary procedure. The Cushings document is so complicated, nobody can understand it, and maybe one of the reasons we use it is that we don't want anybody to understand it. The document that is normally used by community organizations and corporations is Robert's Rules of Order. It is also insufficient to meet the unique needs of a state legislature.

"So, even getting down to parliamentary procedure, there are many things that we can do to improve our performance and to help us make better decisions. So, it is not only the 'front of the house operations' that we ought to be concerned about, but the internal operations of both the Senate and the House. I think there are many suggestions that this committee can help us bring forward, and by giving focus by establishing this advisory committee, I think, will go a long ways.

"Thank you."

Representative Hagino rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"The genesis of this bill is that, many years ago Senate President David McClung, when he was Senate President, realized that Hawaii, if not the entire world, was going to be faced with tremendous scientific and technological changes in the years ahead. A few years later, then House Finance Chairman Jack Suwa also realized that Hawaii, if indeed the world, was going to be faced with great economic upheavals in terms of our economic structure and the way in which the economic system would be run. I think both gentlemen, Senate President McClung and House Finance Chairman Suwa, were years ahead of their time and they felt that, with this understanding that these kinds of upheavals were going to be approaching Hawaii, the best way to deal with it was for this legislative body to have a body of advisors, both in the scientific and technological fields, and also in the economic field, to begin to help us prepare for that situation. These advisory committees were not utilized, unfortunately, and those upheavals that were predicted by the two gentlemen did indeed come true.

"I think Senate Bill 31 is a means for us to begin to address some of these changes that are still occurring and will continue to occur in the future. It will provide us with a body of expertise that we can wisely use in the years ahead.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 31, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LEGISLATIVE ADVISORY COMMITTEES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Hemmings voting no.

Representative Stegmaier then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Stegmaier's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill.

"This bill which allows persons to share part-time hours of employment will allow individuals who cannot work full-time to keep a meaningful job in which they are making a contribution to others while, at the same time, pursue other responsibilities such as spending more time with their families or obtaining more education. In this day and age, with both parents or a single parent working, such flexibility is crucial to the well-being of employees, as well as their loved ones.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1555, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Apo moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 1117, SD 2, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Stegmaier then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill with reservations, be

inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Stegmaier's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I speak in favor of this bill with reservations.

"I am enthusiastic about the fact that the bill's purpose is to appropriate monies needed for developing a comprehensive, effective system of mental health care, and I am especially encouraged by the establishment of children's mental health teams whose purpose is to help families to keep and maintain their mentally disturbed children at home -- for it is at home that they usually can best be cared for.

"Mr. Speaker, I am only reserved in my support of this bill because the support for the mentally ill person and his/her family is necessarily restricted. It is hoped that sufficient appropriations will be secured to establish an effective support system for the families of mentally ill children and adults.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1117, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MENTAL HEALTH," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1193 on S.B. No. 1787, SD 2, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1787, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO BURIALS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives Hashimoto, Hirayama, Say and Yoshimura voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1195 on S.B. No. 1052, SD 2, HD 2:

Representative Apo moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 1052, SD 2, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Hemmings then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"One hundred thousand dollars out of a three billion dollar plus operating budget is not a lot of money but if you start adding up the hundred thousand dollars here and a hundred thousand dollars there on various programs and new initiatives, it becomes a lot of money real quickly, and bureaucracies have a way of enduring and growing exponentially. A hundred thousand dollars does not seem like a lot of money, Mr. Speaker, but it could be better spent addressing the immediate health needs of the native Hawaiians in the rural areas or the immediate health needs of some of the other people in the

islands before we start expending money on a Pacific Health Commission.

"Mr. Speaker, we all want health but I think we have to worry about the people in our own neighborhoods before we start a Pacific Health Commission in that regards.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1052, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CALIFORNIA-HAWAII COOPERATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Hemmings, Liu and Peters voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1196 on S.B. No. 527, SD 2, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 527, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1197 on S.B. No. 785, SD 1, HD 2:

Representative Apo moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 785, SD 1, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Horita then rose and requested that her remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Horita's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of Senate Bill No. 785, SD 1, HD 2. This measure will aid the Honolulu Symphony in its efforts to maintain its financial stability, and as such is an important part of the cultural offerings of the State.

"Artistic expression in all of its forms is beneficial to our State. The musical performances of the Honolulu Symphony are a well recognized and appreciated part of our State's commitment to the fine arts. The Symphony has been a contributor to our well-being, exposing us to some of the finest artists in the world. However, finances have been a recurring problem, distracting the performers from their work.

"This bill would clarify the conditions for the matching and reversion of funds for the State of Hawaii Endowment Fund which is used to pay for the operations of the Honolulu Symphony. The net effect of the changes to Section 40-88, Hawaii Revised Statutes, would be to increase the sources of funding that the Symphony would benefit from.

"Mr. Speaker, this bill would enable the Honolulu Symphony to effectively meet their operating expenses and thus afford the musicians to devote their time to the pursuit of their art. A first-class symphony is a part of every city of the stature of Honolulu. I urge all my fellow representatives to vote in favor of this bill.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 785, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HONOLULU SYMPHONY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1198 on S.B. No. 2022, SD 1, HD 2:

Representative Apo moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 2022, SD 1, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"The only reason I am speaking against this bill is maybe in conference, they could answer some of the questions that I couldn't find out. For instance, I'm not sure if a person going to the University to further their education might have a spouse who is earning \$40,000 a year would qualify for care because we are looking at a University Child Care Center that may not be self-supporting.

"Also, Mr. Speaker, if a person goes to school during the day and has a very lucrative job in the evening, does that then mean also that they can send their child there free? I know some young people today where both husbands and wives are working and most of their money goes to sending their children to a day care center or to a baby sitter. Consequently, I didn't know if these questions were answered. I do not sit on that committee and no one else seemed to know at that particular time, and I wish that they would clarify that.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Stegmaier then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"First, with regard to the concern raised by Representative Anderson, my understanding is that the plan would be that only those who are in need would ever benefit from the tuition support. Although that hasn't come about yet, the idea would be to very closely scrutinize the income levels of the parents that would be involved.

"Second, with regard to other matters that I am concerned with, I have certain reservations myself. I think that the goal for the best quality child care is an admirable one. We all want that for our kids. But this bill goes further than just establishing the goal. The bill is intended as a first step towards State subsidization of the day care program at the University.

"I would support such a subsidy in the future only if it were to benefit the larger student-parent community rather than just the 98 students and faculty who would benefit in the present arrangement.

"Presently, most UH student/parents of young children are providing for their children as best they can but we are not fortunate enough to be among the 98 whose children have the benefit of very high quality care being given by the early school -- a premier private care program which is on contract by the University to manage and operate the child care facility. But they, too, want the best for their children and are doing the best that they can to provide child care wherever they have been able to find it in the larger community. These people should be offered the same opportunity as those in the UH child care center, and perhaps, the child care center operations

will need to be enlarged to deal with the greater unmet needs.

"I would also want the child care center to be used as a training ground for the many early childhood educators who will soon be needed as we strengthen our statewide early childhood education program.

"Mr. Speaker, I will be able to support the intent of this bill without reservations when a greater public purpose is assumed by the UH child care centers than is presently the case.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson then rose on a point of information and inquired:

"I would like to know -- the previous speaker said in the beginning he was for, then it sounded like he had reservations, and at the end it sounded like he was IDNC. I'm not sure exactly where he was on that particular bill."

The Chair answered:

"He sounded to me like he was for the bill."

Representative Alcon then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in support of Senate Bill 2022, SD 1, HD 2, with the understanding that UH, in this case, include all the community college system also. I would be very much in favor if that could be clarified to include all the campuses of the University of Hawaii system."

Representative Arakaki then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I understand the concerns that were brought out by the previous speakers and I just want to say that the basic thrust of this bill is to give the University some flexibility, especially in their child care programs, to develop some of the options that were mentioned. And the way that the statute reads right now, you know, they don't have that flexibility to exercise those options.

"As a member of the Child Care Center Advisory Board, I would like to bring some of these concerns to the Board.

"Mr. Speaker, if I may get a ruling as a volunteer member of the Advisory Board, if I am in conflict."

The Chair ruled "no conflict."

Representative Metcalf then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Just an observation, Mr. Speaker. This appears to be the most noteworthy bill this chamber has taken up thus far this morning.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2022, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII CHILD CARE CENTERS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Anderson voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1199 on S.B. No. 1850, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1850, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO BOATING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1225 on S.B. No. 1856, SD 1, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1856, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ACCOUNTING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1227 on S.B. No. 690, SD 1, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 690, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC CONTRACTS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1228 on S.B. No. 161, SD 1, HD 2:

Representative Apo moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 161, SD 1, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Bybee then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"My comments are merely that the description of the bill does not really fully state what the significance of this bill is. There is a second part, Mr. Speaker, that is very important and that is, it accomplishes the transfer of a substantial amount of our park lands in the State of Hawaii from state to city or county, or from county to state, and that is something that has been needed for a long time, Mr. Speaker, and the fact that that particular effort tied together with this bill should not be overlooked, and I strongly support this bill."

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I am against this strictly because it also provides that the parks go with it and other things that the counties may do. If you are going to transfer the responsibility for the parks, and we're supposedly going to give them what it cost us to maintain them, if that cost does escalate, it doesn't say if they're going to be able to get more revenues.

"At this particular time, I am against that."

Representative Alcon rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in 1978, we had a milestone in transferring the real property taxes to the City and County and today, it is another milestone in that we are giving them more taxing power.

"Thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 161, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COUNTIES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Anderson and Peters voting no.

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1565, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SENTENCING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1230 on S.B. No. 1868, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1868, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FISCAL CONTROL," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Peters voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1231 on S.B. No. 1910, SD 1, HD 2:

Representative Apo moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 1910, SD 1, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Hemmings rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"This will spend \$30-million buying certain land acquisitions, one of which is Coconut Island which could have been bought three years ago for \$8.5-million, and what we're paying for is being remiss three years ago. If we do have an opportunity to buy, it will cost us a lot more and I think the record should reflect that, Mr. Speaker.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"The previous speaker said Coconut Island could have been ours at a cheaper price. I am against the purchasing of Coconut Island, Mr. Speaker, and I've said so before, until such time as we can go there and take care of the facilities that we have, I don't see why we want to purchase something when we don't take care of the facilities that we have and make it a place that would be the tops in the nation as far as marine research."

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1405, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Peters voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1236 on S.B. No. 895, SD 1, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 895, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CORRECTIONS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1237 on S.B. No. 1896, SD 2, HD 2:

Representative Apo moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 1896, SD 2, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"As I've said before, I don't believe that we should be intermingling any and I will vote 'no' on that.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1896, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE SPECIAL FUNDS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 47

ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Cavasso, Hemmings and Peters voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 690, 161, 1565, 1868, 1910, 855, 99, 1367, 1405, 895 and 1896 had passed Third Reading at 12:50 o'clock p.m.

Representative Hayes rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"The bill purports to provide an incentive to landowners to sell their fee simple land to the apartment owners who are above that land. But the incentive in this bill is only 25 percent of the State capital gains tax. It seems to me it is too small an incentive really to have any effect.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 149, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Bunda and Peters voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1239 on S.B. No. 1140, HD 2:

Representative Apo moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 1140, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Horita then rose and requested that her remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Horita's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of Senate Bill No. 1140, HD 2. This bill would create a revolving fund which would fund the purchase of works of art for State buildings and construction projects.

"All forms of artistic expression, whether they be painting and sculpture to music and dance benefit our State. Artists need forums to show their works and conversely for the general public to view and appreciate it. Bringing the artist and the public together on works of art encourages cultural growth and flowering which is in turn returned to Hawaii in economic and academic growth. Supporting art should go hand-in-hand with support for our economy and our educational system.

"This bill would create a revolving fund into which would be deposited one percent of all capital improvement appropriations which would be used towards purchasing works of art. The one percent to be spent on any particular project would be based on the cost of that project and not on the sum of all construction.

"Mr. Speaker, I believe that the clarification that this bill would provide in the area of appropriations for art is needed, and I strongly support the intent of this bill to provide art in State buildings for the benefit of all. I urge all my fellow representatives to vote in favor of this bill.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1140, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ART IN STATE BUILDINGS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1240 on S.B. No. 783, SD 2, HD 2:

Representative Apo moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 783, SD 2, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Liu rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, a number of State agencies came forward to testify on this bill in the Finance Committee with grave concerns. One of the gravest of those concerns was that this Youth Services Board which this bill constitutes, or creates, to oversee all of the areas of preventive programs to make sure that our youths stay out of trouble, and to help those who do get into trouble, that this Board would be placed in the Legislature for administrative purposes. That section of the bill is still in this version and I think that it causes a major legal as well as potentially implementation problems for us.

"I also have some grave concerns about the focus of this Board with regards to the overlapping potential conflicts that can occur. I know there was a program put out by another State organization that we had created -- an Interagency Board of Juvenile Justice -- and this incorporates some of these ideas but it doesn't incorporate many others.

"I think this is trying to force a square peg into a round hole, and we should seriously reconsider this measure at this time and look towards the agencies that are on the line today to coming up with workable plans rather than us coming in from above to try and create something which I say will create more problems for us.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Arakaki rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I want to respond to Representative Liu's concerns on this bill.

"He did mention the testimonies that were presented, and he is right -- there were many concerns with this bill. I think what was heard from many of the presenters was that they agreed there was a great need for some type of oversight and coordination function. Given the fact that we have a growing number of at-risk youth and delinquent youth, there is a need to coordinate these services because these services are located in so many different agencies, each with different directions and different goals. As far as who should serve these oversights or who should house these oversight functions, is a matter for discussion, but it should not detract from the basic goal of this bill and that is to provide an authority with the function of oversight and coordination.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 783, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE REORGANIZATION OF YOUTH

SERVICES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Hemmings, Liu, Marumoto and O'Kieffe voting no.

Representative Hayes then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Just as in the nursing profession, the nursing home administrators are in short supply and this bill provides a very common sense solution by making it possible for someone who has had at least eight years of hands-on experience as an assistant administrator in a nursing home to take the exam for licensure.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 509, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NURSING HOME ADMINISTRATORS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 1917 and 509 had passed Third Reading at 1:03 o'clock p.m.

Representative Horita rose and requested that her remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Horita's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of Senate Bill No. 910, SD 1, HD 1. This bill is a small step towards realizing our goal of making our public school system second to none.

"Early childhood education makes a positive difference in the academic development of young children by giving them a solid foundation for learning. Research indicates that children who attend preschool have a head start in language development and in the skills to interact with others. However, most of those students who attend preschool are enrolled in private programs. Therefore, children from poor families or from non-English speaking homes are less likely to go to preschool.

"This bill will begin the planning process for providing early childhood education services throughout the State. The bill calls for full implementation of the education plan no later than the 1994-1995 school year; specifies that standards for early education programs be developed; requires programs to include methods and materials to involve and educate parents who opt for home care; and specifies that early childhood education be delivered by private providers as much as possible.

"Mr. Speaker, this bill is an important piece of the State's overall plan to improve public education in Hawaii. Education is the cornerstone of a strong society. I urge all my fellow representatives to vote in favor of this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Bybee rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill is one of several initiatives that have been proposed to address the need to improve our public education system in Hawaii. It merely calls for the development of a plan for early education. As such, Mr. Speaker, I think we, by adopting this bill, make a commitment to the people of Hawaii that when the plan is placed before us in the future, which hopefully will not be too far away, that we will then be called on to make the creative decisions to implement the plan or amend the plan, but to provide the necessary assets and resources of our State to implement it for our children's future. So, I support the bill."

Representative Arakaki rose to speak in favor of S.B. No. 910, SD 1, HD 1, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and colleagues, I think it is appropriate that I remark on early childhood education as we start this month of the young child in the year of the young reader. How simple it is to issue proclamations and declarations for children and to show pictures of cute little keikis with words to express how much we care for them, or how we love to pay lip service to our concerns for children.

"It brings to mind what Princess Anne said on the British tele: 'I wasn't particularly keen on children and I'm still not. But you don't have to actually like children very much to be interested in giving them the best possible start in life.'

"It doesn't matter whether you have young children, children who are grown, or no children at all. We all know that it is politically expedient to say how much we care for the children of Hawaii. But how many of us are willing to make that commitment in terms of an investment in the future of those children?

"We can willingly spend millions of dollars to bail out the savings and loan associations, but we lack the will to bail out our children from the tragic cycle of ignorance and poverty.

"We are willing to allocate millions to save a sugar company. Yet, we dicker over the cost of child care programs that have proven long-term results in better jobs and higher pay.

"For those who are concerned about the cost of these programs, they should be reminded that money spent on health and education of our young are investments and not costs. Paying for parental education is an investment. Paying for the results of child abuse and neglect is a cost. Paying for after-school programs that develop self-worth is an investment. Paying for treatment of substance abuse and alcoholism is a cost. Paying for quality child care is an investment. Paying for more prisons and public welfare is a cost.

"Maybe we need to stop being 'cutesy' and drive home a major point about the young children of Hawaii. Think carefully about the decisions you make for them today, for tomorrow they may be either working for you, be dependent on you, or maybe even shooting you.

"Mr. Speaker and fellow members, I ask all of you to join me and take this opportunity to express our commitment today to invest in our children's tomorrow. Senate Bill 910 will set the stage for the implementation of a statewide early education program by the year 1994. It directs the Department of Education to develop an early childhood education plan with special emphasis given to parent education and early childhood education resources to those who exercise the option of teaching and caring for the young children at home.

"Finally, it asks the DOE to develop standards to improve the quality of early childhood education and child care programs in the community. Senate Bill 910 and House Bill 69 are major pieces of a child care bill that will complement each other in the implementation of a statewide plan.

"Mr. Speaker and colleagues, I want to share with you a challenge. We, as a body, tend to react to immediate crises and while we do quite well in responding to problems of our State and communities, a greater challenge is to be visionaries and break ground for the future. Crises and indecisions are myopic and, in fact, usually hindsighted. But for decisions of far-sighted vision, the choices are neither clear nor are they simple.

But should we choose to invest in our future through our children, we shall leave a legacy for which we shall all reap the benefits.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tam then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of Senate Bill No. 910, SD 1, HD 1.

"In order for me not to give a long speech and to continue on with the day, Mr. Speaker, please insert the words of support of my fellow colleagues in regards to this bill.

"I wish to also thank my colleagues in strong support of our young ones.

"Thank you."

Representative Stegmaier then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"As a spouse of a licensed day care provider and also a pre-school teacher, I would like my remarks in support of this measure, Senate Bill No. 910, inserted in the Journal as a strong support for a very important bill.

"Thank you."

The Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Stegmaier's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in favor of this bill. It is clear that as parents have less time to spend educating their young children, child care providers have become very important in giving young people the right foundation.

"This bill will make it possible for children from families of very economic level to be given a good educational foundation during their formative years.

"It requires the Department of Education to develop a statewide plan for providing those services and it also mandates that implementation of the plan be no later than the 1994-95 school year.

"We know that much must be done to improve the care being given to the young child. We also now know that in caring for these children, the education being done must be developmentally appropriate--which means that we respect the natural phases of development which the child is going through.

"Such appropriate care will not be provided unless the care provider is trained in early childhood education theory and skills.

"This bill does much to enhance the training of early childhood education by requiring the Department of Education to develop standards for early childhood education programs, including standards for curriculum, facilities, and teacher training.

"For these many reasons, Mr. Speaker, I support this very important bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Alcon rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I think this is a remarkable bill, Mr. Speaker, because of the fact that it is about time that we start taking care of our young children from the earliest possible time. We have always complained about youth gangs and if we had this program going on when they were young, I think we would be saving a lot of money today and, besides, we have always blamed the immigrants who have never had an opportunity to go to school and, maybe, this is one way for us to save them.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 910, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 1898, SD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, S.B. No. 1898, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INVESTMENT," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

"The way the bill is worded right now, it appears to be forbidding any use of any netting material in the construction of traps. I wonder if that is really the intent of the bill for if it is, it seems to pose a problem and I'd ask that be addressed in conference committee."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1885, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FISHING WITH NETS AND TRAPS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 1841:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, S.B. No. 1841, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FISHING IN CERTAIN WATERS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Liu rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill has come before us in past years in various forms and this is just another form of a very strange concept; that is, we have defined in the law today what a remnant parcel is. It is basically a piece of land that the State owns which the State can find no use for but which may be useful to an abutting landowner. That's basically the intent of the law and under those conditions then, to allow those abutting landowners to work with the State to purchase that land in some form.

"This bill, perhaps well intended, will potentially create, I think, a real problem for the Department of Land and Natural Resources to deal with the subject and for a lot of people out in the community who have lands that abut State lands which are remnant parcels because, in effect, this bill on the slightest whim of anybody in this State, can make a nullity the concept of remnant lands because it says here that a remnant parcel cannot be a parcel in which there is a showing of public interest in or need for such parcel which may then or in the foreseeable future exist, including, without limitation, a showing of historical, cultural, recreational or educational significance. There merely has to be shown a public interest in, not only for today, not in the next five years, not in the next ten years, but in the foreseeable future.

"Mr. Speaker, if there are problems out there with specific parcels, let's deal with those specific problems with well defined statutes. Let's not go with the broad hatchet when, in fact, we don't need to. This is poor drafting. I suspect this is going to cause us, many people in the community, State administration, many problems in the future, and I would hope that this bill does not survive during the next three weeks.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Primarily, Mr. Speaker, because of what the Minority Leader said, and it worries me. It says, '...may at any time in the future. . .on the historical, cultural, recreational or educational significance.' Even if we had done work in that area, we can go back and have a few people, I guess, say they are showing a public interest, and that has bothered me, and I will be voting no, and I ask my colleagues to please consider voting no on this bill.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1054, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO REMNANTS OF PUBLIC LANDS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 37 ayes to 14 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Bunda, Bybee, Cavasso, Hashimoto, Hemmings, Hiramama, M. Ige, Liu, Marumoto, O'Kieffe, Peters, Say and Yoshimura voting no.

S.B. No. 660, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, S.B. No. 660, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HANSEN'S DISEASE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 1947, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Apo moved that S.B. No. 1947, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Hemmings rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, SHPDA and the CON process was started by the federal government, ironically, in the 1970s to drive down the cost of health care and to assure that there would be adequate number of, not excess but not too little, hospital beds for the people. I realize the Health Committee Chairman is getting ready to rebut my remarks and taking notes.

"But the facts speak for themselves, Mr. Speaker. SHPDA and the CON process has failed. It has failed so much that the federal government stopped funding SHPDA, and so far fifteen states have eliminated the CON process. For your information, the CON process is the certificate of need process where any medical provider wishing to provide new medical services has to get from the state a certificate of need.

"The results here locally, Mr. Speaker, have been less than desirable. The certificate of need process on the outside islands is allowing the State, through SHPDA, to legislate its own monopoly on health care. Outside island health care providers who wish to come into the marketplace have to go to the State to get a piece of paper to do so and, at the same time, the State is spending \$15- to \$20-million dollars subsidizing State hospitals which were the subjects of very controversial audits regarding mismanagement.

"Now, I know there will be people, probably on this floor and certainly the Director of Health, who will immediately stand up and say that the certificate of need process and the State hospitals protect the people on the outside islands who need medical services, especially the medically indigent. Wrong! The medically indigent are protected through medicaid, and the elderly through medicare.

"It's rather ironic if this system is so good that many outside islanders fly to Oahu to get their medical treatment. It's rather ironic that out of the 800,000 people on Oahu, they are adequately served, including the medically indigent, through the hospitals' community based non-profit organizations on this island. The facts are the way they take care of the medically needy is through existing medicaid programs, not through State-funded hospitals. So, the certificate of need is an archaic process that has, in fact, driven up costs on the outside islands especially.

"Medical providers who desire to go into business to provide choice in economic opportunities in medical services are getting turned down. This is just going to be another hurdle allegedly to check the SHPDA process. . .the certificate of need process. We should get rid of the process entirely. It's costing consumers money, it's eliminating choice, it's not doing what it's supposed to do, and putting another hoop to jump through with the idea of, well, this is going to give the CON request another chance -- second chance -- to get its permit. It is

just another hoop that the provider will have to jump through.

"What's really ironic about all of this is that it is extremely politicized. I do suggest that if this bill does survive and come to Final Reading, that you all take another look at the legislative audit of the State hospital system and the mismanagements there. We can offer the people on the outside islands, including the people in Waimea and Kohala and all the other areas, an opportunity to have a choice -- not chance -- in medical services, an opportunity not to have to spend additional money to fly to Oahu, by simply allowing community-based non-profit organizations more access to the marketplace.

"This bill is a step in the wrong direction, and I will be voting no, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Shon rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"It appears that we have just heard the annual anti-SHPDA speech, the anti-County/State hospital speech, with little comment on medicaid and transportation. However, Mr. Speaker, this bill has nothing to do with those issues. What the previous speaker has spoken against, Mr. Speaker, is a provision for an additional public hearing, and I think it is interesting to note that for those in this House who have been talking about having public input in again and again, that various bills are misconstrued in this manner.

"I would like to note, Mr. Speaker, that last year or two years ago, we streamlined the certificate of need process, and one of the things we discovered about the streamlining is that in certain respects, where there were a small minority of controversial applications which technically fit into the administrative review process, there was no provision for an early public hearing. And some of us have heard a great deal about some controversies with various clinics where there wasn't a public hearing. It consumed hundreds of hours of controversy and debate simply because there was not a public hearing.

"The certificate of need process also, Mr. Speaker, is very important because, for those health care facilities which are not hospitals -- I'm talking about doctors' offices where certain medical procedures may be performed, liposuction, clinics of all kinds -- you may not be aware of it, but there is virtually no licensing of these kinds of operations. The only overview, the only opportunity for any public input in non-licensed facilities, is the certificate of need process. And I think it is very distressing that people would again and again attack the only overview we have.

"There is no licensing of individual physicians. If someone wants to propose that, it will be very interesting to examine, but in the absence of licensing individual physicians, the only public input we have for areas as controversial as liposuction, where we know at least two people have lost their lives, perhaps due to inadequate oversight, for those kinds of things I think it is important that we continue to have some oversight.

"And what this bill does is, for those technically small financial adjustments in the health care system that qualify for administrative review, let's have a public hearing to see if anyone is concerned. That public hearing is what the previous speaker has spoken against. That's what this bill deals with and it was only with tolerance that I did not rise on a point of information or rather a point of procedure. This bill deals with public hearings, Mr. Speaker. I hope you all vote for it.

"Thank you."

Representative Hemmings, in rebuttal, stated:

"I am quite interested that the Chairman of the Health Committee would say that this bill has nothing to do with SHPDA and CON. He had better read his own committee report again because it's full of reference to the section of law and to SHPDA specifically. It's exactly what this bill addresses. We don't need a public hearing on an issue that government should not be regulating and that the medical service industry would be the answer to that.

"Regarding the bill passed two years ago to 'streamline' the process, I would like to submit to this body that that bill was shibai because it left in place, through some very clever maneuvering in the conference committee, the opinion by the Attorney General on the bill which said that all new service providers still would have to come to government and get their little piece of paper that oftentimes cost years and hundreds of thousands of dollars of work to get, which is called the certificate of need process.

"Incidentally, Mr. Speaker, it's important to note that that CON costs are not borne by the people requesting the permit. They ultimately are passed on to the consumers, so this drives up the cost of medical services.

"He talked about. . . this is to avoid hundreds of hours of hearings by SHPDA for the CON. The best way to avoid hundreds of hours of hearings on the CON is not to have it in the first place. Creating another hearing panel does just the opposite. I see some convoluted logic on this.

"And the last thing that astounds me the most is the implication that this concerns a doctor that is irresponsible in providing safe medical services such as liposuction. The doctor has to get his license from the State, and he also has to stand the test of the onslaught of the medical malpractice insurance laws which certainly weigh heavily against doctors as far as costs go. To say that the certificate of need process is the means by which to regulate the quality of doctors is absolutely ludicrous. The certificate of need process simply regulates the marketplace. The quality of physician care is regulated by the Department of Health, the medical exams, and the certificate that the Department of Health gives to doctors who are qualified. This, once again, Mr. Speaker, is a bill that further complicates a system that the federal government has eliminated in fifteen other states.

"Earlier in the session today, we passed a bill that is going to spend money having some sort of health commission service with California. For your information, California has eliminated the certificate of need process because their Legislature, in their estimation, determined it to be cumbersome, expensive, and counterproductive to making medical services available. So, if we need to have compatibility with California, maybe we can get rid of this certificate of need and SHPDA process and not spend a couple hundred thousand dollars starting a commission.

"Therefore, Mr. Speaker, after the previous speaker's comment, I remain steadfastly opposed to this bill, and I think the facts and the records regarding it speak for themselves.

"Thank you."

Representative Bybee rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"My reason in doing so, Mr. Speaker, is somewhat of a concern of some of the remarks expressed by the opponent of this bill because I think it's a short-sighted approach.

"Hospitals and medical services, Mr. Speaker, cannot be equated with the free enterprise process. We're not talking about hotels, or airlines, or trinkets in Waikiki -- we're talking about some very essential health services that are necessary for the citizens of our State, a State which is in the middle of the Pacific, and does not have the ability for our average citizens to drive a few hundred miles to another state or location to obtain those services. If our hospitals and medical providers are given a carte blanche to compete, Mr. Speaker, we'll have a situation with hospitals having multiple services -- one can think of liver specialties, Kapiolani which concentrates on maternal care, et cetera. The reason we have such a high quality health care service in this State is because of the SHPDA and CON process to permit the various hospitals to concentrate in areas of specialty so they're not competing in driving up our costs.

"So, I think, Mr. Speaker, although I embrace the free enterprise concept in most cases, we cannot apply it in the medical services and hospital industry. This is important philosophical point that we have to keep in mind in addressing this bill, Mr. Speaker, so I would support this bill."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1947, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ADMINISTRATIVE REVIEWS BY STATE HEALTH PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT AGENCY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes to 6 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Cavasso, Hemmings, Liu, Marumoto and O'Kieffe voting no.

S.B. No. 496, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, S.B. No. 496, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE LANDLORD-TENANT CODE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 1469, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, S.B. No. 1469, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DIRECTORS AND OFFICERS LIABILITY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Bybee and Hagino voting no.

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, S.B. No. 864, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH CLUBS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 1224, 864, 1912, 622, 408 and 255 had passed Third Reading at 1:25 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 625, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, S.B. No. 625, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURAL LOANS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 1294, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Apo moved that S.B. No. 1294, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Cavasso then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"I simply note that there seems to be a clause in the bill which does not require the persons or groups giving gifts to members of the HVB to disclose their name and I would say that this is an unwise move. As long as we are taking the positive action of requiring disclosure of gifts to the HVB people, we should also require that the persons giving those gifts be revealed.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1294, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII VISITORS BUREAU," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Hayes voting no.

S.B. No. 976, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Apo moved that S.B. No. 976, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Horita then rose and requested that her remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Horita's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of Senate Bill No. 976, SD 1, HD 1. This bill would enhance the level of government service to the people of the State of Hawaii by making it more accessible.

"Currently, the business hours and days of State and county offices are 7:45 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday to Friday. Only the Governor has the authority to modify business hours of public offices to meet specified public purposes. However, sometimes it is not possible for citizens to conduct their business with the State or counties without taking time off from their work. More flexible hours to services with corresponding changes in public employees' work schedules will enhance the level of service presently offered.

"This bill will enable the Governor to modify the days of business of public offices and allow the mayors of each county to modify the business hours and days of public offices within their respective jurisdictions. Workers with special schedule needs can be accommodated and services can be made available to the public for more hours.

"Mr. Speaker, I feel that this bill would be a positive step towards providing better service to the citizens of the State of Hawaii. I urge all my fellow representatives to vote in favor of this bill.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 976, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOURS OF WORK," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 833, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Apo moved that S.B. No. 833, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Anderson then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Even though it says workers' compensation fund amendments and we say we are not going to put any money in there, and there's really no reason for everybody to be upset, if that's the way they really believe, then I don't think there is any need for the bill.

"If we are going to fund it sooner or later, Mr. Speaker, I believe that it is going to cost the taxpayers of this State some \$30-million. There's never been anything to prove otherwise. There's been some states that has been higher, and there isn't very many people for it. For that reason, I will be voting against it.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Cavasso then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I also rise to speak in opposition to the workmen's compensation State fund amendment which changes the wording and definition of the fund.

"However, it's government doing something for the businesses of Hawaii which the businesses of Hawaii have unanimously rejected. The businesses of Hawaii would prefer that the government stay out of the workmen's compensation area and let the system which is working right now, which is bringing the workers' compensation rates down, keep going.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 833, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII WORKERS' COMPENSATION STATE FUND," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 40 ayes to 11 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Bellinger, Bybee, Cavasso, Hayes, Hemmings, Ige, D., Liu, O'Kieffe, Peters and Stegmaier voting no.

S.B. No. 1945, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, S.B. No. 1945, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WORKERS' COMPENSATION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 625, 1294, 976, 833 and 1945 had passed Third Reading at 1:28 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 676, HD 1:

Representative Apo moved that S.B. No. 676, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Horita then rose and requested that her remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Horita's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of Senate Bill No. 676, HD 1. This bill will enable the Department of Personnel Services to more efficiently carry out their duty of providing in-service training to State civil service and executive department employees. It also alters the composition of members of a proposed advisory committee on training.

"In-service training is a necessity for public employees who work in rapidly changing information oriented fields

as well as those workers whose offices are improved through new technology. Such training translates into better service to the public which we at the Legislature support.

"This bill allows the Director of Personnel Services to establish a new advisory committee on training with a new composition of committee members whose backgrounds would compliment the goals of the committee. This bill also gives clarification to the Director of Personnel Services to make use of the services of institutions, organizations or individuals from the field of education and training.

"Mr. Speaker, I believe this bill is important to the State as it allows the Director of Personnel services to utilize the various resources of the State to improve government service to the public. I urge all my fellow representatives to vote in favor of this bill.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 676, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO IN-SERVICE TRAINING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 253, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Apo moved that S.B. No. 253, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Anderson then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"The reason I am speaking against this, Mr. Speaker, I think it is the right of our citizens to know who's buying what and where. We've been asking the State to do this, Mr. Speaker -- the State has been constantly saying that it should be the responsibility of the federal government. Now, all of a sudden, we have a bill that says it should be the county's responsibility because the State doesn't have the personnel to do this and they think the county should be able to do it. I don't think the county should be doing it because the counties have been over here saying that we should be doing it.

"Mr. Speaker, I think it is the responsibility of the State. It is a statewide program that we should be doing and, for that reason, I will be speaking against the bill.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 253, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FOREIGN INVESTMENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Anderson and Peters voting no.

S.B. No. 1894, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, S.B. No. 1894, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SPILLING LOADS ON HIGHWAYS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 1983, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Apo moved that S.B. No. 1983, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Say then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Say's remarks are as follows:

"I rise to speak in favor of Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1206; Senate Bill No. 1983, SD 1, HD 1, relating to off-hour roadwork on the H-1 Freeway. The purpose of this bill is to initiate a one-year demonstration project with off-hour road work on the most congested portion of Interstate H-1.

"Mr. Speaker, having driven and sat in traffic conditions that are horrendous because of road work being done to repaid our highway, I can attest to it that daylight-hour work adds to traffic congestion -- where pot holes are filled, medial walls are being constructed, electrical writing to lights, sign changes, etc., have all contributed to the East Oahu traffic congestion during the morning and workday hours.

"Most of us do not understand that a 15- to 30-minute delay on the freeway adds a great amount of pollution to our environment because as we crawl with our automobiles, we are burning up more of our fuel without utilizing a maximum capacity of gasoline.

"Knowing that the H-1 is a six-lane freeway in most cases where there is work to be done, one lane is usually closed for repairs. Just having one lane closed has impacted the traffic flow tremendously for all users of East Honolulu. This measure before us is a step in the right direction of easing the environmental pollution and curbing the emotional frustration that comes with driving.

"I urge all of you to support this measure."

Representative Horita then rose and requested that her remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Horita's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of Senate Bill No. 1983, SD 1, HD 1. This bill proposes a demonstration project exploring the feasibility of off-hour roadwork on major arteries, and as such is a significant part of the State's overall plan to alleviate traffic congestion.

"Roadwork during daylight hours on the State's highways adds significantly to the traffic burden by creating bottlenecks. Even though roadwork is scheduled to commence daily after the morning rush hour and end before the afternoon rush hour the volume of traffic on the road between these times is still heavy and congestion is exacerbated. If roadwork can be done during off-hours it would not contribute to daily traffic congestion, and it may also accelerate the completion of projects due to the longer span of hours during which work may be conducted.

"This bill will initiate a one year demonstration project with roadwork on Interstate H-1 between the Kapiolani and Kahauiki interchanges restricted between 6:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. Certain types of emergency work and maintenance would be exempt from the provisions. The Director of Transportation will report any findings on the demonstration project to the Legislature prior to the Regular Session of 1991.

"Mr. Speaker, this bill is important because it allows us to explore viable methods of relieving traffic congestion.

I urge all my fellow representatives to vote in favor of this bill.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1983, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ROADWORK," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 1874, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, S.B. No. 1874, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONDOMINIUM MANAGEMENT," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 1948, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, S.B. No. 1948, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PROFESSIONAL ENGINEERS, ARCHITECTS, SURVEYORS AND LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 676, 253, 1894, 1983, 1874 and 1948 had passed Third Reading at 1:30 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 1229, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, S.B. No. 1229, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOTOR VEHICLE REPAIRS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 819, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, S.B. No. 819, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LABELING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 1382, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Apo moved that S.B. No. 1382, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Alcon then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I call this a no-nonsense bill and it is an equal treatment bill. And the only reason why I say this, Mr. Speaker, is that the DOE administration building is air conditioned, most of the buildings at the University of Hawaii are air conditioned, most, if not all of the buildings under the administration, are air conditioned, this State Capitol is also air conditioned -- why not air condition the schools also?

"Mr. Speaker, Representative Bybee kinda wondered how long it'll take the BOE to make their decisions. If they cannot make up their minds to air condition the buildings when it is sorely needed, how else can we get decisions for school management? Therefore, we need a change in the School Board selection.

"Thank you."

Representative Horita then rose and requested that her remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Horita's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of Senate Bill No. 1382, SD 1, HD 1. This bill addresses the concerns of public schools regarding extremes in temperature and provides for a planning process to meet these concerns.

"Excessively warm and sometimes cold temperatures as well as high noise levels from street traffic and/or construction are distractions to students in classrooms. Extremes in temperature make rooms uncomfortable and students restless. Outside noise makes it difficult to concentrate on studying. Both types of distractions make it difficult for educators to create an environment conducive to learning.

"This bill will require the Department of Education to consider local conditions in deciding whether acoustic noise and climate control are needed for effective classroom instruction. It also requires a private entity, rather than the parent-teacher association of the involved school, to pay for maintenance and electricity costs of air conditioners which are not installed by the Department of Accounting and General Services.

"Mr. Speaker, I believe this bill is important to the public school system in order for it to provide the kind of learning environment necessary for our students. I urge all my fellow representatives to vote in favor of this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Bellinger then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Although I am in favor of the bill, I've got to admit that there's a bit of concern.

"The purpose of the bill is to require the Department of Education to develop standards to determine which school facilities air conditioning should be installed in. So, basically what it says is, or what it means is, if we have a computer room in a school, it should have air conditioning because of the computers. We have to turn around and look to the State Legislature to say, that's going to be alright for us now to set up standards, it's alright for us to approve air conditioning in a computer room. Does this bill mean that the Department of Education has to be required by the State Legislature, through legislative mandate, that if a school is in an area that is very hot, that we have to legislate, that the DOE is not smart enough to say, why don't we put air conditioning in this school because of where it is?

"This bill seems to indicate that we have to, through State law, tell the DOE that if a school is near a highway and they have louvers on the classroom window, that they are not smart enough to figure that, well if they close the louvers and they turn on some air conditioning, that we can eliminate some noise from the outside that's going to be disruptive to the classroom educational purpose?

"These are the kinds of issues which are common sense and which should be done from a management perspective. Yet, the Legislature is being called to mandate, through law, that we do things like this. It seems to me that it's a pretty sad state of affairs when we have to get involved in making this kind of direction.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Bybee then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I would like to endorse Representative Bellinger's comments, Mr. Speaker, with this insight that, perhaps, this is indicative the point Representative Bellinger indicates of there being too many cooks in the kitchen with the Superintendent bouncing back and forth between them like a ping pong ball.

"The air conditioning that our schools need is something that I think is a process which each of the schools should be involved. The suggestion earlier, Mr. Speaker, that every school end up coming here to fight for its dollars, I say, what's wrong with that -- for parents to want better schools for their children? That's a positive, not a negative, Mr. Speaker. It gets them involved. That's accountability and control. And this air conditioning bill is a good example of what I hope to see all parents do, and that is, want more for their schools and not be turned off by a system that is too far removed from the decision making. We want them up here fighting, Mr. Speaker.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and carried, S.B. No. 1382, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SCHOOL AIR CONDITIONING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 1870, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Apo moved that S.B. No. 1870, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Tam then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and fellow colleagues, there appears to be broad based agreement that educational restructuring and decentralization would improve the administration of our public school system.

"This bill will start the process of assisting schools to shift to a system of local control. The bill mandates the Board of Education to establish procedures for the selection of a number of school communities, which include administrators, teachers, support staff, students, parents and community members, to start planning what form of school/community-based management they want. It also mandates State agencies to grant waivers from rules, policies and procedures unless they can justify a denial to appropriate authority.

"The Education Committee held five hearings on school/community-based management, including an informational hearing at Washington Intermediate School. I have gathered detailed information about school/community-based management by assigning a member of my staff to interview principals, teachers, support staff, students, and parents at the schools. I find that almost everyone at the schools we have visited want to be more involved in decision making. They are ready to spend the extra time and effort to make school/community-based management really work.

"In order for decentralization to really work, those of us who exercise power at the top of government must agree to share that power with those at the school. This is not the way we have done things in the past. This bill -- Senate Bill 1870, SD 1, HD 1 -- expresses our willingness to trust and empower those who actually deliver educational services at the public schools.

"But this bill means little without our sincere determination to delegate some of our power and to let decisions that we have made in the past be made by people at the school level.

"The language of this bill on collective bargaining waivers is not a mandate, because we realize that management and the unions must come to an agreement between themselves. But we also realize that school/community-based management will not be successful unless management and labor cooperate to make the program work the way principals, teachers, students, parents, support staff and community members say they want it to work.

"When Governor John Waihee sent us this bill -- and we thank him -- we all agreed it would require much work and much discussion. The testimony we received on this bill and its companion -- House Bill 1813, HD 1 -- reflected a wide variety of opinion on the intent, the language, and even the need for this bill.

"Despite this variety of opinion, the Education Committee was able to agree on this draft which indicates our intent that the public school system be restructured in such a way as to allow and encourage the decentralization of the Department of Education -- to give individual schools more autonomy from overly restrictive or inefficient central policies in order to improve classroom instruction and other services to students and parents.

"Restructuring of an organization as large and complex as the Department of Education can only be done with careful planning and coordination. The Department has assembled a task force comprising a broad base of participants. This task force is expected to recommend a process and rules whereby individual schools can do the actual planning and establishment of the school/community-based management system.

"It is our intent that planning for this restructuring take place at the school and in the community. We want planning to be from the bottom up, not from the top down. We have not mandated school/community-based management on the local schools. It is for them to decide whether they want it or not, and if they do want it, they should decide what form it takes.

"This bill is meant to respond to the desire of our people to have more say in the decisions of their local schools. I urge my fellow members to vote in favor of this bill.

"Mr. Speaker, I would also like to add that I wish to publicly thank the members of the Education Committee for enduring the many hours of public hearings to bring into focus the school/community-based management.

"Thank you."

Representative Bybee rose to speak in favor of the bill with serious reservations, stating:

"This is an administration bill, Mr. Speaker, which was submitted to us as part of the Governor's education initiatives package, a package which the Governor submitted to help achieve what he described as 'a public education system that is second to none.' At the heart of this initiative and reform effort, most everyone has recognized that governance, local community control, and accountability were key issues.

"In his State-of-the-State address to us, the Governor recognized this when he stated to us: 'With the renewed public interest in education, now is the opportune time to

review the governance structure of our school system. I propose that you take this opportunity to review the various options and consider appropriate constitutional amendments. In the meantime, we should not and cannot wait. Therefore, I propose that we immediately institute a school/community-based management program that puts our schools in charge of their own affairs. The school/community-based management system we envision would be one where local schools, communities, parents, teachers, administrators, and other interested parties, would have full charge of almost all budgeting, setting of educational programs and school priorities, and increased involvement in staffing.'

"Well, Mr. Speaker, we all know what happened to the constitutional amendment proposals that we submitted to the Senate. What we have left, Mr. Speaker, lies before us now in the form of the Governor's school-based management bill, or better yet, what's left of the Governor's school-based management bill.

"I say this because what's happened is, this bill has been amended to remove some of its most important provisions -- provisions which we included in the companion bill, H.B. 1813, when it passed our House in March. As a result, Mr. Speaker, it appears we, as a Legislature, are not only not going to meet the Governor's challenge to amend our Constitution on this key issue, but we are also proceeding to water down his interim proposal for school-based management.

"I seriously question whether this is sending the right message to the people of Hawaii on this issue.

"Why, for example, has the requirement that the Board of Education 'adopt rules and procedures' to implement school-based management been dropped from this measure as was proposed by the Governor and as earlier passed by our House?

"Why has the following sentence been added to this bill: 'The restructuring recommended by experts can be labeled as school/community-based management'?

"No expert I have heard during this session has said this. Paul Berman, in his report, certainly didn't label the restructuring he called for in the school/community-based management. He called for the creation of local elected school boards.

"What I am gravely concerned, Mr. Speaker, is that this bill does far, far too little at a time when the opportunity to accomplish and complete full reform is at hand, an opportunity which may not be here tomorrow, an opportunity which, after our parents and schools become rapped up with the internal policies of the Board of Education on school-based management, may not be here tomorrow.

"In closing, Mr. Speaker, because the Senate has rejected our House governance bills, this bill -- Senate Bill 1870 -- appears to be the only measure we will be adopting this session which will not even indirectly address the issue of restructuring our public school system. As such, it should not be watered down and it definitely should not describe itself as a restructuring of our school system. The Board of Education, the Department of Education, the Superintendent, the Governor, and the Legislature, in their respective powers and roles, are not changed one bit by this bill.

"As such, this bill addresses only the symptoms of the illness affecting our public schools and completely ignores the disease. I hope I am wrong for our children's sake, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Stegmaier then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"I would like to echo the concerns mentioned by Representative Bybee, but also to express that I think we are moving in the right direction and that what we have done by passing this measure, if we do that today and also go into conference with the hope of perhaps strengthening the measure, is to identify two of the missing ingredients which are critical to making Hawaii's education system the best in our country -- greater teacher involvement, and greater parent involvement in the management of our schools. Out of such participation will be a greater sense of ownership and commitment to the school which will result in a greatly improved attitude toward education shown by our students.

"Mr. Speaker, I am hopeful that the final product that will come out of the Legislature will be a strong one and one that will assist the learning process and make our school system the best in the country.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Shon then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I think it is important to note that the momentum for these... there is a certain way of thinking which seems to say that if we do not do everything in this session, this year, right now -- well, we may as well give up. I have talked to dozens of people, I have talked to people just recently at Washington Place who were there for the Governor's conference on literacy. I was sitting at a table with a number of businessmen and I asked them, 'Well, what did you think, for example, of the bill we passed over to the Senate?' 'Oh, yeah, that was great, that was reform, that was the Berman report -- right?' I said, 'Did you know that it's centralized authority?' 'Oh, no, we didn't know that.' 'Did you read the bill?' 'Did you see the bill?' 'No, we didn't know that.' Then I asked each one what they thought about governance. There was no consensus, Mr. Speaker. And I think one of the most difficult problems with this is that, in spite of our appetite, our genuine sincerity to do something right now, we cannot get ten people together to agree on what that is.

"This bill comes awfully close, Mr. Speaker. This bill, I think, really is on the brink of some still hard-to-define revolution in the way we treat education in this State. Everyone seems to be saying that they want to give more real power to each individual school. Everyone seems to be saying that they want the teachers to have some clout, that they want the parents to have some clout, that they want the community that surrounds that school to have some clout.

"This bill promotes an on-going task force which, to my understanding, is already a bubbling caldron of issues and interests and is going to continue throughout the interim. It is going, as I see it, to discuss not only what powers go to the schools, but what form each school should take in establishing its local governance -- similarly in ways that we set up neighborhood boards on Oahu where each neighborhood gets to submit to the City their little charter, how many members, what are their rules. I participated in that grassroots effort and there was a great deal of interest and enthusiasm in that extra power to say just what our governance in that neighborhood would look like. And I think that this is one of the things this bill makes a commitment towards.

"I think it is a mistake, Mr. Speaker, to look at what we passed over to the Senate as something to mourn the death of. It was a centralization bill, not a

decentralization bill. This is clearly a decentralization -- give more power to the schools bill.

"I think it is wonderful that we have come this close to some kind of consensus this quickly. I think it is worthy of commendation of all the pulls and tugs and difficulties that we have had in this House in trying to deal with this. In early discussions in Policy Committee, in the discussions in the Education Committee, in Judiciary Committee, it has not been easy, and yet, we have emerged with something that really does, at least philosophically, represent a consensus. This is amazing, Mr. Speaker, that we have gotten this far with only a few months of consideration of a major, major report. I look forward to other things that are emerging.

"Earlier, we passed a bill, Mr. Speaker, for the early childhood education programs. That also is part of the Berman report. And also, on this very page, Mr. Speaker, there are bills that relate to the actual learning physical environment at our schools which many of us have great concerns over.

"I think that there are major steps being made, that the Governor has committed himself, that we have committed ourselves, teachers -- everyone is committed -- and this, right now, is the most important consensus bill that we have before us. And I hope that in evaluating what we are doing this year that the media and everyone else will not just say, 'Well, they didn't take everything in the Berman report so they did nothing.' This is perhaps the most important thing that we can do. It is giving real power. I look forward, next year, to seeing a list of schools and a list of recommendations from that task force that is going to really flush out the powers that the schools are going to have and the options for local management. I think a lot of people are going to get involved in this, and if each one of us make that commitment to go out to our communities and try to get them involved in this task force and those discussions, it will be even more meaningful.

"For these reasons, Mr. Speaker, I am very glad to vote for this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Kawakami rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the measure before us proposes a major change in the way Hawaii's schools are managed. And as we know, Hawaii's public school system is the most highly centralized system in the nation, and this measure will begin the arduous process of decentralization and enroll principals, teachers, support staff, students, parents, community members, including businesses, as participants in the educational decision-making process. Decisions will no longer be made from the top and funneled down to the bottom for implementation. A more lateral system is envisioned.

"My purpose in commenting on this measure is twofold.

"First, I would urge all parties involved to take a cautious approach and to ensure that all the players have a total understanding of school/community-based management goals and objectives before commitments are made and plans are implemented. All the players that I mentioned must be a part of the planning and decision-making process if we truly are to succeed.

"Second, we should all keep in mind, with flexibility comes accountability. Those involved in the planning and decision-making process must accept the consequences of

their decisions -- good and bad -- and be accountable to their communities. Planned revisions will, in all probability, be necessary and, in some instances, decisions made will not be accepted by one hundred percent of the community at first. In short, the road to decentralization will not be easy.

"So, Mr. Speaker, the measure before us for Third Reading today is indeed historic and revolutionary. It is being passed with the very best of intentions and let it likewise be implemented with the very best of intentions and wisdom.

"Thank you."

At 1:50 o'clock p.m., Representative Anderson asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 2:00 o'clock p.m.

Representative Apo then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I hope this body will indulge me, you know, I've been through all the sessions listening to all the controversy and talks surrounding the school-based management bill. Certainly, I think we all understand that we're not going to reform the system in one year and whatever shortcomings. . ."

At this point, Representative Hemmings rose on a point of order and inquired:

"Could the Majority Floor Leader advise us if he is speaking in favor of or against the bill, please?"

Representative Apo answered:

"I speak in support of the bill, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hemmings thanked the Chair.

Representative Apo continued his remarks, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'd like to read a couple of pages of excerpts from probably the most enlightened statement that I have ever read having to do with education, and I think it would open some ears, and I put this in perspective with respect to school-based management, empowering the people from the community to make their own decisions as to how they think their children would best be educated.

"I want to read a section from the speech that deals with what's perceived to be major structural flaws in the way this entire country approaches education:

'Like the metric system, we are out of step with the rest of the world.

'Structural flaw number one, is that we quarantine our students in school buildings. We want our students to learn about the world, to learn all they can, but we begin by putting them in school buildings away from the rest of the world. We isolate them from the subject matter -- the world is big but our schools are small.

'Second, we place our students in classrooms where they are mostly passive listeners and receivers of information. We want them to be active and innovative but we make them spend much of their time in a passive mode. The classroom tends to focus on the teacher as the giver of information rather than focusing on the student as the learner of information. So far as I can tell, nobody is really certain as to how

learning really takes place. Each of us may be different in how we learn and at what pace and at what period in our lives, and in regard to which issues or subjects, but there is no evidence that I am aware of that people learn best while seated in the classroom, facing the front, listening to the teacher.

'Third, we structure the school day with lots of short class periods and hallway shuffles. It was my experience in high school that very little learning took place during the typical school day. Perhaps one hour of learning took place out of every seven hours in school. In many cases, the day was devoted to the bureaucracy of learning. We went to a class, turned in our homework, changed papers with our classmates, corrected our homework, received the next homework assignment, then went on to the next class. The passing periods were very useful socially but the real work -- the homework -- was done outside of school. It always seemed to me that there should have been a general assembly each morning to collect all the homework, distribute all the assignments, and let everybody go home to do their assignments, rather than wasting another six hours shuffling through the school day. In some cases, the classes, truly interested in a subject, were full of questions and excitement. When the bell rings, the students spend ten minutes getting out lab equipment, thirty minutes trying to conduct an experiment, and ten minutes putting the lab equipment away. It's all organized around the clock rather than the dynamics of the learning process.

'Fourth, we most often measure a student's knowledge by the use of written tests -- true or false, multiple choice, fill in the blanks, essays, problems to solve. The student only has to know the subject long enough to pass the test. Cramming for exams is a time-honored national tradition because it works. And because it works, students don't develop and retain much knowledge. The students who get an "A" may not remember anything the following year, or month, or even an hour after the exam. Once he or she is finished with that course and has that grade, he or she may never have to know the subject again. The grade says that the student has knowledge but the student, in fact, has little. A student cannot cram when it comes to projects like building a cabinet, or putting on the school picnic, or doing a science fair project, or learning to play basketball. Those activities require not only knowledge but the use of that knowledge to perform the activity. Today, however, the only use most students have for knowledge is to pass the exam and get the subject out of the way.

'Fifth, we teach subjects instead of students. We allow electives but, basically, students must learn what somebody else thinks they ought to know in the manner and at the time somebody else wants them to know it because we teach the subject instead of the student. We do not tap into the high level of motivation the student has for learning, the thing he or she is interested in knowing right now, including subjects which are considered important, but aren't taught until next week, or next month, or next year. Teaching subjects instead of students guarantees that school will be boring. The student has to adapt to the subjects because the subjects are not adapted to the student.

'Sixth, the subjects usually don't include the troubling questions which young people face in regard to their own personal lives. We say we want education to be relevant to our students but we don't coach and teach and guide our students on the subjects which relate most strongly to them -- how to interact with others, how to love somebody, how to get along with your parents and friends, how to decide what is right or

wrong -- in short, how to live. Growing up, establishing values, seeking one's own identity, learning about the opposite sex -- these are very important things which are going on in the lives of the students and they are not addressed by the curriculum. This guarantees that school will be totally irrelevant.

'Seventh, we focus more on controlling students than on inspiring them to learn. There are too many students for each teacher to handle and handling them is difficult because of the structural flaws. We isolate students from the rest of the world, put them in the role of passive receivers, shuffle them between classes so there is little time to really learn anything, teach them subjects when they are not the most interested in them, and in any event, teach subjects that aren't especially relevant to their deepest concerns. It's not hard to understand why students are often bored or rebellious. Just gaining control of a class of such students can be a major challenge. The teacher who is as much a victim of the structure as the students becomes the disciplinarian rather than a friend or source of inspiration.'

"Mr. Speaker, this is one of the best papers that I have read. It goes on and on but I would spare the members reading further.

"When we speak about reform, I believe that school-based management does give us that first big step in allowing communities to adapt in addressing these problems and being able to shape their own education in their own forum with consensus that is brought about at the local level.

"This also, to a certain degree, Mr. Speaker, by bringing about local empowerment and allowing local people to make decisions that affect their kids, also answers to a large part the question of governments. I've always heard that we have a governance problem because there is no accountability in this system. I cannot think of a better way to bring about accountability than to allow those people who are most directly affected by the system to make their own decisions. So, I believe we at least are making a big start with this school-based management bill.

"Also, I would caution some of our members who seem to place a lot of emphasis and focus simply on that one bill. Frankly, I think the real action is in the budget; otherwise, school-based management really means nothing if people have nothing to decide and all it is is a shibai. I believe that the budget, in the final analysis when we close this session this year, is going to reflect some empowerment of the community with respect to how to expend some hard cash dollars. That is what I think the communities are interested in. That is what I believe this Legislature will come out.

"If we can get those two things done this year, I think we will have gone a long way, and I would like, at this time, to really commend the Governor for providing the kind of leadership that I think we've needed for many years. When the Chief Executive comes out and leads the effort, and as he said to us in caucus, he doesn't have all the answers. He is looking to us for some help, and I believe we are going to do that and we will support him.

"So, I speak highly in favor of this measure, and I recognize that it is only a beginning and ask the rest of my colleagues to also support it.

"Thank you."

Representative Metcalf then rose on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"When Representative Apo began his remarks, I thought he was speaking in favor of the bill. But after awhile, I thought he was filibustering the bill, and it is reassuring to know that he is in favor of the measure.

"Thank you."

Representative Alcon rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I think it is about time that the University of Hawaii will also institute campus/community-based management.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Bybee then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, further to this same bill, I want to speak further in support of the bill. I would like to endorse Representative Kawakami and Representative Apo's remarks, but I would like to respond to a point that Representative Shon made, and that is that he doesn't believe we've received or achieved a consensus on how to reform our schools' governance, or restructuring, and I would agree with that, Mr. Speaker, but my concern is that, as elected leaders of the State, we must lead and the people are looking to us for ideas and direction. We are not facing new problems and new issues here, Mr. Speaker. These problems have been around for some years and there have been a lot of debate on it. Yet, the best we can come up with after all of this debate, is to tell the people of this State that all we can think of to do is to adopt this bill which provides in Section 2, and this is the heart of it, that the Department of Education, through the Board of Education, shall formulate policies to initiate a school-based management system.'

"Mr. Speaker, I ask -- how long will it take for policies to be adopted by the Board of Education? How long will the parents in our community remain optimistic and hopeful that we will have meaningful school reform? How long before the business community remains as intensely involved as they have been?

"The bottom line is timing, Mr. Speaker, and the time is now for meaningful reform; that is, lasting reform -- not by internal memos somehow issued by the Board of Education.

"Mr. Speaker, I predict that we have a serious problem or a potential problem, that the enthusiasm for school reform will wane, and when we address this in the next legislative session, we will hear that the Board of Education is still 'formulating its policies.'

"I would just like to leave this quote, Mr. Speaker, and this is from a 1984 report by the Board of Education, entitled: '**Hawaii Towards Excellence in Education.**' I repeat -- 1984. 'In the area of leadership and governance of Hawaii's schools, this task force recommends a more decentralized format at the elementary and secondary level.' Mr. Speaker, that's 1984 conclusion by the Board of Education and its task force, and now it's 1989, and all we're coming up with is a bill that gives that same Board a direction to formulate a policy. I think we can do much, much more, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'm not sure if we're moving a little too fast as everyone here is saying at least we're going to pass something. Yet, when the Haldi report came before us, everybody said we're moving too fast so we take it a little bit, and it took us a few years.

"With this particular case, Mr. Speaker, I'm worried on what's going to happen if each individual school is going to be fighting for the buck. It bothers me because I graduated from Waimanalo Intermediate School and, at that time, they were having problems, and they're still having problems whereby the curriculum isn't given out the way it is to other schools. And if you're going to have every school fighting for themselves, we're going to be in trouble.

"I've always looked at decentralizing. The Board of Education is who I wanted to decentralize, and I wanted to make sure that we had a strong Windward community school district whereby all the schools work together. Very recently, I called one of the schools to find out what their needs were for CIP, and they told me that they were going to do away with their wants because the high school needed more monies than they thought we would give individually, and since they were in elementary and their children were then going to go to intermediate and then up to high school and, very honestly speaking, they thought that's how long it's going to take anyway for that school to be air conditioned and get the needs that they wanted. So they were willing to give up their CIP. Now, that's community working together.

"I am hoping that if this bill goes through, maybe someone speaking against this kind of an issue, will bring everybody together so that they will consider these kinds of things that the schools and the parents and all of the advisers are going to have to work together and look to one another for the betterment of our children because they need it. Our schools in the Windward area are deplorable, but if everybody is going to fight I don't know if we're going to be able to afford everything.

"And I read the budget and to do this supposedly a school-based management trial, it almost gave everything. There's no dollars that weren't going to be expended, and it would seem they could hire whomever. If they do that, there's no test that's going to fail. But when it becomes a very practical thing everyday and they find out that they are going to be budgeted, it could fail. And that's what worries me, and that's why I will be voting 'no.'

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1870, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Anderson voting no.

S.B. No. 1622, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Apo moved that S.B. No. 1622, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Tam rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"This bill requires the Department of Education to adopt standards and conduct inspections to improve sanitation, safety, and general physical appearance for our public schools.

"Our committee discussed providing incentives for schools which show great improvement in physical condition, and we hope the Department of Education will develop such strategies to improve problem schools as soon as possible.

"Mr. Speaker and fellow colleagues, we must create and maintain a liveable and productive learning

environment for our Hawaii students, teachers, support staff, and community members.

"Thank you."

Representative Horita then rose and requested that her remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Horita's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of Senate Bill No. 1622, SD 1, HD 1. This bill is a step towards our stated goal of making the public school system in Hawaii second to none by establishing a school inspection program.

"The physical appearance and condition of school facilities has an effect on a school's overall learning environment. Facilities that are not sanitary or safe not only inhibit the learning process but are a threat to students' health as well. Our public schools must be housed in facilities that encourage learning and foster pride in achievement, and schools that are well maintained and cared for inspire such feelings within students, teachers and parents.

"This bill calls for the Department of Education, Health and Accounting and General Services to jointly establish a school inspection program to maintain sanitation, health, safety and physical appearance and to conduct announced and unannounced inspections of school campuses.

"Mr. Speaker, this bill is necessary in light of the deteriorating conditions of our public school campuses. We must set an example for our students to follow and create a feeling of pride towards their schools. I urge all my fellow representatives to vote in favor of this bill.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1622, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SCHOOLS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 672, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, S.B. No. 672, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HUNTING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 1229, 819, 1382, 1870, 1622 and 672 had passed Third Reading at 2:23 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 1891, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, S.B. No. 1891, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC LANDS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 1245, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, S.B. No. 1245, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC LANDS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 1803, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, S.B. No. 1803, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Hashimoto voting no.

S.B. No. 886, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, S.B. No. 886, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE FIRST ASSISTANT OR FIRST DEPUTY TO THE AUDITOR," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 1464, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, S.B. No. 1464, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE AUDITOR," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 1734, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, S.B. No. 1734, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 1891, 1245, 1803, 886, 1464 and 1734 had passed Third Reading at 2:24 o'clock p.m.

At 2:24 o'clock p.m., Representative Hemmings asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 2:25 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 832, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, S.B. No. 832, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO APPROPRIATIONS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 245, HD 1:

Representative Apo moved that S.B. No. 245, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Hemmings then rose and stated:

"I rise to speak against Senate Bill 245, HD 1, which is referenced with Stand. Com. Rep. 1222. Mr. Speaker, I have prepared some formal remarks that I would like to have inserted into the Journal and if I may be permitted, I would like to just summarize it."

The Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Hemmings continued his remarks, saying:

"Mr. Speaker, the first question is where did the surplus come from? It did not come from efficient, cost effective government. It came from overtaxation. Those who defend giving a small surplus refund say well if we

give it back to the taxpayers, they'll just spend it and I believe that's wonderful. The surplus came from the reorganization in large part of the State income tax code. When the federal government took away exemptions, we followed and took away exemptions too. But the federal government also reduced the rate of collection. We did not do so correspondingly. Hence a good part of the surplus has come out of the working people of Hawaii's pockets in the form of increased income taxes. It has come in the form of increased excise taxes which drives up the cost of living for all our citizens. Some say that it came from the hotel room tax. The hotel room tax this year is predicted to have into the public coffers approximately \$60- to \$70-million. The surplus is projected to be around \$600-million. So the surplus did not come from the hotel room tax. The surplus came from the working people of Hawaii's pockets.

"This money should be given back to the people from whence it came. This year's operating budget is extremely generous. The people of Hawaii -- the taxpayers -- who are working so hard out there take one-third on the average of their income and give it to government. My office is full of audit after audit after audit of the problems of government, the problems of State hospitals, of having the worse mental health care services in the nation, the problems of the State Corrections Department, the problems of social worker burnout, even the problems of education. Those audits don't say, give those departments more money. They say the problems are due to malfeasance and mismanagement. We have been extremely generous in giving those departments money.

"Let's fund next year's budget based on next year's revenues. Incidentally, the Tax Department says next year's revenues will go up eleven percent. Our personal budget to run our own household, if we're lucky, will go up five percent. Next year's budget should be paid for with next year's tax receipts. This surplus, out of the sweat and blood of the people of Hawaii, should go back to them. If you want to invest in the future, let's start investing in the poor working people of Hawaii's pocketbooks and give them back control of their dollars. They have been very generous with government and, in most instances, we have failed them. Refund the entire surplus. Let's be bold, let's be brave, let's do something different rather than just throw taxpayers money at old problems and create new agencies to address problems that the old ones have flunked in addressing.

"Mr. Speaker, I do have to send accolades to the Chairman of the House Finance Committee for making a \$200-million commitment, and I should say that this bill should go to conference and he should add another \$400-million to the pot and he will virtually assure himself his rightful place as a true leader in bringing about true reform and change to government. \$200-million is a step in the right direction, Mr. Speaker. I am voting 'no' against this bill because it is not enough, and I urge my colleagues to give it very serious consideration because it has a tremendous implication for the future of the State of Hawaii.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Further remarks by Representative Hemmings are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against Senate Bill No. 245, which would give the taxpayers only \$200-million back against a projected surplus of over \$600-million.

"I agree with the recent **Advertiser** editorial -- we should invest wisely in the future. Giving the surplus back to the people is, in fact, the best investment in

Hawaii's future. When questioned about the rebate, Senator Mamoru Yamasaki argued against returning a significant portion to the taxpayers, saying that if we gave it back, 'they'll just spend it.'

"I, on the other hand, have confidence that the workers and producers of Hawaii can do a good job of spending their own money.

"Future State programs should be paid for by future high tax revenues which are predicted to grow in excess of eleven percent a year.

"The current huge State tax surplus did not come from frugal or efficient government. The problems with State government, shown in audit after audit, are ones of mismanagement, not lack of funding.

"The surplus came out of the working people's pockets. We're among the highest taxed people in the nation. Hawaii taxpayers are very generous already, paying an average of one-third of their entire income in taxes. We need accountability in government -- we should not have to pay more for less.

"I firmly believe we should be investing more in the people of Hawaii, and less in big government."

Representative Lee rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I think it is correct for the previous speaker to vote against this bill because he had voted in favor of Senate Bill No. 1882, which provides for State financial assistance to wastewater treatment plants all over the State. If he is in favor of spending that much money for sewage plants, then obviously, he has to vote against the tax credit bill in Senate Bill No. 245.

"He has also voted in favor of Senate Bill No. 1910, land banking. It calls for appropriations. If he votes in favor of spending money to buy lands, then how could he vote in favor of a Senate bill rebating tax credit to the taxpayers?"

"If he is in favor of so much increased expenditures, then I think his position is right to vote against Senate Bill 245 because there won't be any money left. But I am in favor of Senate Bill 245.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Liu then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of Senate Bill 245, and also in response to the previous speaker. I think, in his facetious comments, we find a misplaced sense of humor as well as a missensed place of priorities.

"The comments made by the Minority Floor Leader indicate a difference of opinion of priorities as to where we put our efforts in spending our money and how we spend our money. He has pointed out, and rightfully so, that there are hundreds, perhaps thousands, of areas where we need to better manage what current services today cost us. We have yet -- perhaps we don't have the guts -- to submit to a local officially sanctioned Grace Commission to take a look at where we can cut and save and provide us with a number as to how much that would save us. On the federal level, that number came out to be billions, but we did not take all the steps on the federal level to follow through on a Grace Commission's recommendations. Perhaps, we should at least consider that for the future of our State here and, perhaps then, we can talk about exactly where our dollars are going.

"The audits that have been mentioned by the Minority Floor Leader talk about all the things he mentioned.

"The bills that he voted for are perhaps the right priorities for this State for expenditures. But we all know that the Minority Floor Leader has also voted against many other bills that would cost us thousands, millions, tens of millions of dollars, if not hundreds of millions of dollars. So, let's not ridicule other members for differences of opinions concerning priorities.

"This is what this bill is all about, Mr. Speaker. I concur with the Floor Leader that the House Finance Chairman should be congratulated on placing this body on the right road this session, and I am confident that in the next three weeks, there will be interesting developments which will cause us to be even closer to what would be a better goal for us all.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the reason to vote against this bill is I don't believe in tax credits and I have taken the floor nearly every time when it comes to tax credits. I pay taxes monthly for my business and I pay yearly for my income.

"This bill says they are going to return income taxes and I want to be like the Minority Leader and I would like to congratulate the chairman of the committee.

"However, Mr. Speaker, if we are going to do anything, we should either refund this money by a check rather than a tax credit, and everytime I have asked that, they said we can't do that. We can only do it by tax credits. Well, let me tell you that there are many people who are going down because they will qualify. They've never paid taxes but they are going to fill out a form, they are going to qualify, and they can receive a refund, and that's not fair because they haven't paid any taxes on income.

"But over and above that, Mr. Speaker, on the general excise tax, we have constantly asked to give it back on food. That's everyday, and we've been told we can't afford to do that. We don't know how much it is going to cost. Yet, we can turn around and take \$500-million and say we're not going to fix anything. Now, I went publicly on the radio that said I would not want to return any surplus, that our schools need to be fixed, and we need to put it in programs for human services and senior citizens, where it is going to be beneficial, but it won't be pyramiding, and as long as it's not going to be pyramiding, it will be beneficial.

"But how are we going to fix to have an income where a dependent, you can go ahead and put that person down and receive more. Or how about getting your tax structure fixed so that we can look at the rates, and we don't have to do it all at once. But if we can take \$500-million here and \$600-million there and then turn around and say, we're going to give back \$200-million and say we're doing a good job, or we are going to have tax reform -- \$50-million. I don't think that we're really taking care of the problems.

"So, I will be voting 'no' on those measures, not on the fact that we voted for other measures that might buy land or whatever because I voted against that too, as you all know, but for different reasons than the Minority Floor Leader, or different reasons as many of you may have voted against. I think we all look at what we are trying to do that is going to benefit the people of this State.

That is what we are all here for, and I don't think that anybody is doing it because they are trying to play games, or trying to take care of special interest groups, or whatever. But if you are going to really want to help, then don't charge people to eat because our food prices are going up every day. And don't charge them for medical services when they are getting sick.

"Thank you very much, and I will vote 'no' on this bill."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 245, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAX CREDITS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Anderson and Hemmings voting no.

At 3:15 o'clock p.m., Representative Apo asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 3:17 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 816, HD 1:

Representative Apo moved that S.B. No. 816, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Hagino then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against Senate Bill 816, HD 1, and in doing so, I also request, at this time, that there be a roll call vote on this issue.

"Mr. Speaker, in speaking against this bill, I am sure both caucuses -- both the Minority and the Majority caucuses -- have adequately discussed this bill. Briefly, this bill purports to waive the statute of limitations regarding an overpayment, or double payment, of the use tax by local General Motors dealerships as well as the overseas division of the General Motors Company.

"This is not an issue of over or under or double payment of taxes. When the error was discovered, pursuant to law, the proper rebate taxes were made by the State of Hawaii to the local entities that applied for the reimbursement. They were not able to go beyond the three year statute of limitations because we have enacted, and I believe very wisely, into law that there be a statute of limitations regarding underpayment as well as overpayment.

"For those of you who yearly pay your income tax, you know that you are required to keep your papers for a period of three years so that if there is an audit, you have the papers which the State or the federal government may review. It is a law that protects all of us. It is a law that all of us are aware of -- accountants are aware of it, businesses are aware of it, and individual taxpayers are aware of that.

"This is an issue of the statute of limitations. It is not an issue of whether there should be a repayment for this double payment. It is clearly an issue of waiving the statute of limitations, or extending the statute of limitations, to certain business entities. This being the situation, I cannot help but conceive of this bill as a special interest bill. We must see this bill in that light and with that perspective.

"Now, in discussing this bill, I have yet to hear anyone on this floor, and I really pride this House of Representatives because this bill has come over from the

Senate for many a year. I have been in the Legislature eleven years and in some measure or form, it has come for virtually all of the years that I have been in the House of Representatives, and I really pride ourselves in not giving in on this measure. But yet, in the discussion of this measure time and time again, I have yet to hear anyone really advocate for this bill on this side of the State Capitol. We hear comments that we really need this bill to leverage with the Senate, or we need it to bargain with the Senate. I have yet to hear anyone on this floor, in all the years that I've been here, really be an advocate for this bill that it represents a proper and just payment. And I think with this in mind, I think there is an understanding of why I have opposed this bill in all the years that I have been in the House of Representatives. I ask that this body continue to oppose this bill.

"One final closing remark. I think you have to put yourself in a situation -- if you were a small businessman in Kakaako and you have had this problem of overpayment, does anyone on this floor really believe that as a small businessman you would have come this far with this measure? I hardly think so.

"I ask all of my colleagues to carefully consider this bill. Although there are some protections in this bill that was not evident in the 1984 legislative session when it last came to the floor, this bill will go to conference and anything can happen in conference. I think if there is a time to vote down this bill, the measure should be voted down today.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I want to make Representative Hagino feel better. Representative Hagino said he's never heard anybody speak in favor of this. I've taken the position for years, Mr. Speaker, anytime that anyone is overtaxed, that he or she or the company should be taken care of. In this particular instance, if I remember correctly, Mr. Speaker, the companies were taxed twice and by the time they were told and found out, it was late, and they tried to get compensation from the Tax Department and they were told they couldn't.

"And Mr. Speaker, right above that, we have a surplus. And I am going to speak on that one after, but these are some of the reasons. I believe anytime that we talk about taxes, that we are a state that should be at least up enough to say we made a mistake and return any tax dollars that we may have taken regardless of your small store in Wahiawa or Waipahu or a big conglomerate.

"For that reason, Mr. Speaker, I'm in favor of the bill."

Representative Lee then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"It purports to waive the statute of limitations for overpayment by two entities -- General Motors itself and its dealers. It's not a question of overpayment of taxes by these two entities. From what I heard in the discussion last night, the General Motors representative said that the tax was passed on to the consumer. It is the consumer who bought the vehicle that paid the tax -- once to General Motors, and then again to the dealer. If there is a double taxation, that burden was borne by the individual purchaser.

"This bill is an abominable bill for that very purpose, and I am outraged at this type of bill that comes before

the floor. I speak as a neophyte, but I think as a private citizen I've learned something in this session, and I urge my colleagues to vote this bill down."

Representative Hiraki rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I guess this bill could be considered a rebate bill but this is not what I think the people of this State had in mind. I think we should look at it for what it is. It is a special interest bill, and I don't think that we should be playing politics with this bill, and I hope that people look at the bill on its merits and vote against it.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Bybee rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I would just like to make one point, Mr. Speaker, and it's with regard to Representative Anderson's point.

"The statute of limitations, Mr. Speaker, is a two-way street. That is, when the statute of limitations passes, the taxpayer may have lost rights to claim for overpayment but, at the same time, the State loses rights to go back and claim for additional taxes. The statute of limitations performs a very important function, Mr. Speaker, and you can't shut off one function without the other, and that's what this bill attempts to do. It attempts to override the statute of limitations for the purposes of a return of taxes, but I have not seen a measure before this body that would suggest that if General Motors underpaid its taxes, then the State can go back beyond three years to assess additional taxes. And that's why, Mr. Speaker, we need to keep the statute of limitations in place."

Representative Peters rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I think we have the responsibility for taking care of situations in which people overpay. One of the members talked about the statute of limitations. It shouldn't be overly restrictive. It shouldn't prevent us from doing what is right, irrespective of your perspective on it. If somebody overpays, they should be given consideration for that overpayment. We shouldn't be standing here like supreme gods, if you will, saying that under no circumstances anyone who overpays will not be given consideration. I take exception to that kind of thinking. We are the body that has the responsibility for making that decision. It has gone through the process of public hearing, everybody has had their shot at it, and it is here before us. If we didn't have public hearings or if we didn't allow for people to make input, then yes, I would have some exceptions to that. The statute of limitations shouldn't be a total prohibition or tabu with respect to what we can and cannot do here.

"I recall a number of years ago when the beautiful people of Manoa had Mr. Reinecke and Mrs. Reinecke appear before us because they felt they were discriminated against, and there was a statute of limitations with respect to them being able to bring suit against the State. We took a very strong position on that and we granted them, by way of our statutes, the ability to pierce through that statute of limitations and sue the State and be justly compensated for our wrongdoing, for the State's wrongdoing, against these people.

"Someone mentioned about some small business people not having the same kind of accessibility to this process. I have exception to that too. If they have a legitimate complaint, or a legitimate claim that requires us to pierce this statute of limitations, then let's do it. Let's look at each claim on an individual basis and see whether it is

legitimate or not and if it is legitimate, let's make the decision. I consider this a legitimate claim."

Representative Cavasso then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Just a few days back, I was privy to a small business which received notice that there was an error in their excise tax payments over a period of eight years and our Tax Department asked this small business to make the corrections and pay the taxes, and in this case the small business that I am familiar with would have been willing to pay those taxes had there been records to justify it.

"But the point, Mr. Speaker, is that our Tax Department, under circumstances when there are records that would justify, will go back and not remind the business that there is a statute of limitations and ask them to pay any taxes that were owed four, five or six years ago, and I think that's appropriate. If there is a dispute and there are not the records to straighten it out, then the statute of limitations should apply. But in this case, it appears that we have records to show that a mistake was made in good faith, that they paid the taxes when they should not have and the records are there to show that background, and there's no question that the records are there to justify it.

"I also feel the same way that Representative Peters has said that this body should be here to, in some cases, address special problems in our State, whether those be special problems for Waimanalo, as this body has helped us before, or special problems with one business or one family that needs special care from us when they have done everything to do what is right and because of a system, they are hurt. Our system is here to help our people, to help our businesses, and I see that this is a legitimate request that we should not keep or that we shouldn't have taken in the first place.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hirono then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I would like to have inserted into the Journal the remarks by Representative Hagino against this measure (by reference only) and in addition, I would like to make two observations regarding this bill.

"The first is that if we pass this bill, every other business and individual who underpaid or overpaid, should be entitled to the same tax relief in the following sessions of the Legislature.

"And the second observation is that we should keep in mind that, as regards General Motors and their dealers, this overpayment of taxes were passed on to the customers or the purchasers of the cars so, if anything, we should be giving the tax relief to those purchasers and not to the company itself.

"Basically, we are told that this bill contains a provision that requires General Motors and the dealers to show that they did not in fact pass on this overpayment, and we are also told that they had testified in a hearing that they did in fact pass on this overpayment. So the question arises as to why we need this bill in the first place in light of the attendant problems and policy issues that are raised by this kind of action.

"I urge the members to vote against this bill."

Representative Hagino, in rebuttal, stated:

"One of the previous speakers, in support of this bill, made a remark regarding the past situation where the statute of limitations was waived for the Reineckes. On the opening day of this session, Aiko Reinecke sat behind me as my guest on this floor. I fail to see how that situation, in any way, compares to the situation today with this use tax. I don't think anyone who was familiar with the history of the Reineckes can even begin to consider that as a comparable situation. I just wanted to add that remark. That was a very special situation. They were not business entities. They were two people who were caught up in an unfortunate period in Hawaii's past.

"I still urge all of us to consider the remarks made by all the speakers regarding the opposition to Senate Bill 816, and I urge all of you to vote 'no'."

Representative Anderson, in rebuttal, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, in the case of overpayment or the case of underpayment is one thing, but the case of being taxed twice is another, and regardless if you pass on that four percent, you're passing on a tax that's already been passed on. The dealer paid for it and then passed it on after to the taxpayer but paid it to the State twice, and that's wrong.

"And we've done other tax measures from grossing up and everything else but this one here, I have felt for years because of who it was, it became an issue that it was going to be a big company that was coming here to try to win votes. I didn't even know this bill was coming up because I don't sit in that committee until last night. No one comes in to try to say you should or should not vote for this.

"Some years ago, they said this is the problem. And if there's a problem, you look at it, and that's what we've done. So, special interest is not what we're looking at. It's something that we have done that's wrong in the Tax Department, and even the Director previously admitted that. And he said when they found out, it was near that time and, irregardless of whether it was right or wrong, it was his stand that they were not going to allow it, and he came here and told us not to refund that money and that's why it's been going back and forth. And I say that I think you should vote for this bill.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Souki rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"The bill represents to me equity. If they in fact have been taxed twice, they should be repaid by the State. However, there is language in the amendment of the bill as was so stated by the previous speaker, the burden of proof is on the dealer that they in fact did not pass it on to the customer. If they can prove that, then Mr. Speaker and members, they deserve to get some compensation for the overpayment.

"Thank you very much."

At 2:45 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 2:48 o'clock p.m.

Roll call having been requested, the motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 816, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO USE TAX OVERPAYMENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 31 ayes to 19 noes, with

Representatives Alcon, Amaral, Arakaki, Bellinger, Bybee, Cachola, Hagino, Hayes, Hiraki, Hirono, Ihara, Isbell, Kanoho, Lee, Leong, Oshiro, Shon, Stegmaier and Tam voting no, and Representative Hashimoto being excused.

S.B. No. 1748, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Apo moved that S.B. No. 1748, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Shon then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise and wipe the tears from my eyes for General Motors to speak against Senate Bill 1748, SD 1, HD 1.

"Mr. Speaker, we have all been struggling with this issue of the tens of millions of dollars which we allocate for so-called Chapter 42 or purchase of services or grant-in-aid organizations. In this allocation, Mr. Speaker, a recent auditor's report indicates something that we all know -- that the process needs a lot of work, that the departments are not engaged in an adequate review, monitoring, or evaluation of all of these programs. And we all know our own frustrations as different organizations come to us saying, 'This is important, you must fund this. The department cut us out, the department reduced our funds, et cetera,' and I can understand the desire to wipe this away from our desks, to say, 'Oh, yes, let's pass it back to the departments and not deal with this at all.' But, Mr. Speaker, I think that we have an obligation that if we are going to reform this system, that we be assured that what is in its place is better.

"I would like to argue today that the bill before us does not replace the current system with a better one. The essence of the bill before us is to remove from us, conveniently, the responsibility for reviewing these programs when we know that the departments have not yet got an adequate substitute. I quote from the bill of its process, the more appropriate process, and it should be known that this bill which is being promoted by the administration's Department of Budget and Finance, and so in many ways, this language is the department speaking to us. '...the following process will be more appropriate,' it says. 'First, the expending agency should identify the need for services.' In other words, maybe all of them don't, and today, in a public hearing, the deputy director of Budget and Finance stated in written testimony that they do not evaluate the actual needs before compiling that list. It's true. Some of the departments attempt to do this but, Mr. Speaker, we know the departments have not been given adequate numbers of auditors and accountants to deal with this.

"In the Division of Mental Health alone, ten million dollars of POS have been reviewed by one person. The Department of Budget and Finance has not said to the Health Department we insist that you build into your budget request adequate auditors. They have not said that. They have not said that to any of the departments. For those of us interested in accountability, for those of us who look to that Department of Budget and Finance as our surrogate for accountability in developing their budget, it hasn't happened, and we have a bill before us today, Mr. Speaker, which essentially says, 'Hey, what we want to do is we want to cut you out of looking at the list of POS but we are not willing to make any commitment to adding more auditors or reviewers or evaluators in this system at this time.

"The process outlined in this bill, Mr. Speaker, all the way up to the first three or four steps, is the process that

should be there right now. Think of the information we received today from the departments. Do we receive a list of their priorities? We could; we don't. Do we receive then the list of needs by geographical areas that the POS is designed to fulfill? We could but we don't. All we receive is a list of the providers and there is dissatisfaction while the Legislature tinkers around with this list. That's all we have left. That's why we tinker around with that list. And request after request to give us a different computer printout by categories of needs, by geographical area, has fallen on deaf ears. We have not received that systematic analyses that informs us.

"Mr. Speaker, a second area that is missing from this bill, and is missing from the commitment before we even begin with this, is the interagency coordination that all of us know is inadequate. We know organizations are going to the Department of Human Services, the Department of Labor, the Judiciary, the Department of Corrections, the Department of Health, and some of these programs are overlapping and there are some gaps. There is not today an administrative directive that all of these concerns be done on an interagency basis. I recently talked to three deputy directors of three departments who were very enthusiastic about a three department coordination of services. It is called single access for the Big Island. And I said to them, 'What about the purchase of services -- has there been any discussion that the three agencies in this process review that?' No, they hadn't thought of that. They haven't thought of it! There hasn't been that commitment to the interagency evaluation, Mr. Speaker, and yet we are willing to say, we want out of the list of POS providers.

"The administration has struggled with this but their approach for the current list that we're dealing with has been two policies: Number one, five percent increase across the board. Number two, no new providers.

"That is not an adequate review, that is not an adequate evaluation. No new providers. Is that a prescription for reforming and shifting funds to the better ones? No, it is not.

"And so, we sit on the verge of a totally new approach to this. Yeah, maybe some of us are a little hassled that people are coming to us with all these requests. But we did, in the Health Committee, sit down one evening and reviewed \$21-million of new requests. And I can tell you that while we did not do a thorough evaluation of every program, we were able to identify some that were very worthy and some that were very unworthy and we've made those recommendations to the Finance Committee. And those recommendations, for the most part, were accepted. I submit to you that that evaluation was a worthwhile thing to do and not something to eliminate from the process, especially because the departments are not doing it.

"We considered a resolution and we're hoping to pass it on to the Finance Committee to suggest that B&F and all the departments and the consumers and the advocates hold a conference this year, get their act together, come up with a way of doing this better, and come back to us next year.

"If we pass this bill, Mr. Speaker, there's not going to be any incentive for the Department of Budget and Finance and others to participate thoroughly in that process. I understand the very sincere concern that we do not have adequate resources and staff to go through all these purchase of services. But, Mr. Speaker, we could almost say the same thing for the entire budget process. Basically what we do is we take the current services with some analyses and we really inspect the add-ons. That's what we're doing. If someone would like to discuss the

need for more staff, I would be glad to do that -- permanent staff. But the review that we are able to engage in. . ."

At this point, Representative Apo yielded his ten minutes to Representative Shon.

Representative Shon thanked the Chair and continued his remarks, saying:

"The need to evaluate in whatever small way we're willing to do it by committees is still there. If we're going to come up with a system that cuts us out of the process, I want to know that you have an administrative commitment to the adequate auditors, to the adequate coordination, to the adequate public hearings that only we can provide.

"And so I urge you to say, 'No, let's not leap off the cliff and conveniently wipe off our desks of this untidy little task we have every two years of dealing with the POS.' It is our responsibility and we cannot point to a better system that we are establishing. The process established here would have us do lump sums, indicate the needs, and let the department later on select the organizations and those organizations would have no recourse to come to us and say, 'Hey, that hundred thousand dollars for ten different items doesn't buy ten different items. It only buys five services.' We can look at that. We can readjust it. I can tell you in several areas of health, we have had to readjust it and in the absence of that readjustment, people would have been hurt. In human services areas, people are hurt by the absence of these services. B&F doesn't have hearings, the department doesn't have hearings, only we have hearings.

"I urge you to hold this bill, to vote no on it, and let us go into the interim with all parties and then come out with something that we can feel confident about as we hand out millions of dollars for needed services in the community.

"Thank you."

Representative Tam rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill is a bad bill. What we are actually saying to the public is that we are denying them the fundamental concept and belief of democracy, balance of power, check and balance. We are sending out this message to our young ones that we preach democracy but we do not practice it. Is this the right message that should be sent out there? I don't think so.

"Mr. Speaker, let's gain confidence of our general public. Right now, the confidence is very low.

"Thank you."

Representative Arakaki then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I never thought I'd be echoing one of the standard Republican Party lines, but I have some real problems with allowing the administration to subvert the legislative authority and responsibility to provide direction to the financing of the POS and grant-in-aids. And while it is commendable that this bill seeks to close the backdoor that some providers and officials use to endrun the budget process, I think, instead of closing these doors, we should be opening doors to allow more input into the process. And granted, we don't always have the proper information to make sound decisions on the purchase of services and grant-in-aid applications. But the answer is

not to take ourselves out of the process but to obtain more and better information.

"Just this morning, we had a hearing on a House Resolution and House Concurrent Resolution asking for a review of the process to review the purchase of services and grants-in-aid and Budget and Finance did give us their verbal assurance that they intend to seriously consider the recommendations of the Legislative Auditor regardless of the passage of Senate Bill 1748. If this is so, then they should also be responsible for calling all parties and levels involved in the process to evaluate the process and to recommend changes to reform or refine the Chapter 42 process. And perhaps we can make the suggestion that perhaps this bill, Senate Bill 1748, can be used for all parties to hammer out a proposal rather than relinquish our authority right off the bat.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1748, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO BUDGETING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 33 ayes to 18 noes, with Representatives Amaral, Arakaki, Bellinger, Bybee, Cavasso, Chang, Duldulao, Hagino, Hayes, Hiraki, Hirono, Ihara, Lee, Leong, Marumoto, Oshiro, Shon and Tam voting no.

"My opposition to this bill is not based on the amendment that makes Ohana Zoning optional rather than mandatory for all of the counties. I agree with that provision in that it provides greater flexibility to the counties, but I do disagree with the amendment which requires counties to take certain actions in implementing Ohana Zoning because it is an intrusion on the powers of the counties for the State to establish procedures that the counties must follow in implementing Ohana Zoning.

"Therefore, I shall vote 'no' on this bill."

Representative Liu rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the committee report attached to this bill indicates 'since the tort reform law was passed, the crisis has abated.'

"Mr. Speaker, I disagree with that statement. I don't think the crisis has abated at all. I think what we have is a bleeding hemorrhage that continues to bleed and continues to hemorrhage at the same time so it is a pretty bad situation.

"We still find ourselves this session subsidizing medical malpractice premiums for physicians in the State. We still are bombarded with requests from various non-profit organizations to help them with the law's exceptions to the tort statutes because of concerns that they have in regard to their operations, such as the Institute for Human Services, such as day care centers for the elderly and the young. We have a myriad of bills dealing with bonding issues, for the main part deals with small business and individual professionals asking for alternate ways of providing proof of some sort of financial integrity because the bonds are going out of sight or are not being offered anymore because of risks tied to the tort system.

"I don't see evidence that the crisis has abated, Mr. Speaker. Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I wonder why we are continuing on a bandaid approach to a problem which will continue to haunt in the future. Why aren't we really dealing with overhauling the system that will affect greatly the relationship between insurance companies, and the public, and the attorneys, whether or not they are plaintiff's attorneys or defense attorneys. If we are concerned about compensating victims, let's really look towards a system that will compensate victims. Currently, it is estimated that less than half of the dollars that go into the total tort system reaches the victim. At best, 46 percent; at worse, 38 percent -- perhaps even less.

"Hawaii's system is no better or worse than that which continues in the rest of the country. But perhaps this is an area that we should be more of a leader than we have been. Nobody can tell me -- and I've had even plaintiff's attorneys agree with me on this point -- that a 38 percent or a 46 percent return of the tort dollar is a very fair or reasonable allocation of limited resources.

"So, Mr. Speaker, I know my vote won't change the outcome of this bill, but I would like to vote 'no' to indicate my hope for the future that we will really deal with this system philosophically, economically, and rightfully.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Cavasso then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I also rise to speak against Senate Bill No. 764, HD 1, the so-called tort reform bill we passed three years ago. It was a placebo then. Replacement for real tort reform was a deception on the people of Hawaii and it continues to be a placebo and a deception. It's a way to avoid facing an issue which needs to be confronted by us. We have lawsuits which continue to be out of control, liability insurance rates which continue to rise and hinder commerce and family, jobs, and incomes in Hawaii.

"We need to address tort reform for real and this is not doing it. It's kidding ourselves to think we are, so I also cast a 'no' vote until we come up with real tort reform."

Representative Metcalf then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I really wasn't planning to say anything but I do take umbrage at the words that this bill is a deception. This bill represents the efforts of this Legislature, together with the then Lieutenant Governor, to hammer out a compromise that was fair and equitable to all the parties.

"One of the key features of this measure was to collect information before we make further incursions into the area of tort reform. Because of the posit of information that has developed, we found that it was well worth it to extend the provisions of this measure pending the receipt of the kinds of information we'll need to make other intelligent decisions regarding the issue of tort reform.

"I will note, Mr. Speaker, that it is the view of the committee that the crisis has abated. We didn't hear from Sam Sloan or the Chamber of Commerce this session, but maybe, that's because they were at Representative Takamine's committee.

"Thank you."

Representative Cavasso, in rebuttal, stated:

"Maybe the reason we didn't hear from them was because we failed to schedule real tort reform bills for hearing.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hemmings then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'm afraid I'll have to disagree with the good chairman of the Judiciary Committee. This bill did deceive the public for the simple reason it was called tort reform and the goal and objective, as I understand it back then, was to reduce the rates for insurance. And though we had a long, convoluted bill, and though it was talked

about at being a magnificent compromise, I've always found that the proof is in the performance and it does not appear, at least to the constituents that I talked to statewide, have experienced real reduction in their insurance costs. Your car insurance and my car insurance have gone up, our liability insurance rates have gone up. Granted, we can sit back and say it hasn't gone up as much as they had prior to this bill, but nevertheless, we're in a crisis state with the cost of insurance. It's one of the reasons why it's difficult to make a living in the State of Hawaii because all the costs of insurance are passed on to the consumers.

"Proof of it lies in the fact that in that bill, we made a one-time appropriation of \$300,000 to subsidize the insurance for medical malpractice for outside island baby deliverers -- obstetricians. We had to make that subsidy again this year because we have not got tort reform.

"The bottom line is, Mr. Speaker, I think the mentality here with this and tort liability insurance and workers' compensation is that this illustrious body is going to redistribute the wealth, and we're going to redistribute the wealth from rich defendants, and from rich insurance companies, and rich people with deep pockets -- we're going to, in our magnificence, redistribute the wealth to the poor victims. All the facts and all the statistics point to that we are redistributing the wealth alright. We are redistributing the wealth from the taxpayers and payers of premiums, through the insurance companies, to the professionals dealing these issues -- mainly the lawyers, both plaintiff and defense lawyers.

"The Minority Leader was exactly right. The largest recipient of any of the dollars paid out of the system are in fact the lawyers. So, if we really want to help the victims, not only the victims of the accidents, but the victims of having to pay the high cost of tort liability insurance, which is all of us, we will enact genuine reform instead of passing on this bill which is a continuation of tort deform.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 764, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LIABILITY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives Cavasso, Hemmings, Liu and Marumoto voting no.

Representative Liu rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill arises again from first crossover. It took another worthy bill which restricted, in some cases, the use of furlough -- took all of that out. Instead, we have a bill again that takes a tremendous leap in logic that I think would have surprised the great philosophers like Lao-tzu, Aristotle, but more importantly, John and Jane Q. Public in Hawaii because, Mr. Speaker, we see that this bill permits exceptions where there are not these exceptions today to a mandatory minimum imprisonment terms' sections of our Penal Code as it relates to repeat offenders -- not first time offenders, not juveniles, but repeat offenders.

"If this bill eventually somehow passes, do you know what is possible, Mr. Speaker? Someone who has broken into your home with a weapon, who has done it twice -- convicted the first time, caught again the second time with intent to burglarize your home -- can be given probation. The same thing could happen to someone who has committed murder, served his time, picks up a weapon of some kind, breaks into your home, intends to burglarize your home -- this bill also permits that individual to get probation where, under current law, that person would have to serve a minimum mandatory term imprisonment.

"And how and why could this person, under this bill, get probation? These convicted felons, minimum two-time losers, if diagnosed as having any, any substance abuse problem, could, at a judge's discretion, receive probation.

"What kind of a message are we sending here, Mr. Speaker? Is it 'drink a six pack and then commit a crime?' Shoot up before being diagnosed for sentencing? Who loses, Mr. Speaker? Certainly, the public does, and probably the integrity of our sentencing system.

"A few years ago, we moved away from discretionary sentencing because analyses upon analyses showed that for the same crime, people were getting different sentences. I repeat, under the discretionary sentencing that we had between eight and ten years ago, we were finding out that people for the same crimes were getting different sentences. And you know who is benefitting? I found out it was the rich, the upper middle-class, were benefitting most. These convicted felons, because they had the money and the community contacts to persuade the judge that they had the great potential for rehabilitation, they had the education, they had the ability to, if they were let off, to serve well, that they could succeed.

"Fairness dictates, Mr. Speaker, that those convicted of the same crimes should receive the same sentences. If nothing else, this bill should fail because of those reasons.

For the other reasons I mentioned earlier, this bill should also fail.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1144, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SENTENCING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 43 ayes to 8 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Cavasso, Hayes, Hemmings, Liu, Marumoto, O'Kieffe and Stegmaier voting no.

Representative Horita's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of Senate Bill No. 700, SD 1, HD 1. This bill would exempt approved school activities from the prohibition against excessive noise in section 342-43, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

"Increasingly, school activities such as athletic events, bands which use athletic fields, and assemblies and rallies are complained about by aurally sensitive persons as violations of the excessive noise statute. With respect to those persons, the belief of the Legislature is that such school related activities should continue to be conducted with supervision as they are a source of fellowship and pride not only within the school but throughout the community.

"This bill would exempt school activities which are approved by school authorities, and it further defines school activities to mean school functions for students through twelfth grade which is approved by school authorities, and which takes place between 7:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m.

"Mr. Speaker, I believe this bill is necessary to allow schools to continue to promote traditional and customary extracurricular activities without fear of violating the excessive noise statutes. I urge all my fellow representatives to vote in favor of this bill.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 700, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EXCESSIVE NOISE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Hayes voting no.

Representative Bybee then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"This bill amends our real property law, Mr. Speaker, to add a new definition or class for those protected by our anti-discrimination law. And as in most cases involved in anti-discrimination legislation, the issues here involved are balancing of two separate rights.

"In this debate, we are balancing the right of a property owner to rent or sell their real property to another. This right, one of the right to sell or rent real property, is rather fundamental, while recognized right is protected by our Constitution, by our statutes, and by our common law. As such, it is a right not to be limited or interfered with lightly, and definitely, not without clear evidence of a great need to do so.

"The other right being balanced here is the right of persons not related by blood, marriage or adoption, single persons, to require a property owner to sell or rent their real property to them. But in practical terms, Mr. Speaker, this bill eliminates a property owner's right to choose not to rent or sell property to unmarried or single persons.

"My concern, Mr. Speaker, with this bill are several but two are paramount.

"First, I do not believe it has been demonstrated there is a sufficient need to establish such a special protection for unmarried singles in the housing market.

"Second, and my main reason for opposing this bill, is because of the broad application of this bill to all real estate. It will operate to eliminate the rights of homeowners not to rent rooms, cottages, and ohana units located in their residences to unmarried singles. Often, these homeowners are widows, elderly, single women, and families with young children. These persons have a right to be concerned and to decide who resides in their homes or on their family lots. These concerns can range from safety concerns to lifestyle concerns.

"Mr. Speaker, because of the close proximity of these renters to the owners and their families and because of the importance of the homeowners' rights to decide who will live at or near their homes, and because of the lack of demonstrated need for this bill, I urge the bill be defeated.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hiraki then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill is designed to remove barriers that prevent senior citizens from obtaining affordable housing alternatives. I believe, as legislators, we are very aware of the acute affordable housing shortage that we have and until we provide each citizen affordable housing, I believe that this bill will protect and provide seniors, in terms of affordable housing alternatives, an opportunity to obtain the dignity that they want and the respect that they deserve.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1321) recommending that S.B. No. 2016, SD 1, HD 1, pass Third Reading.

Representative Apo moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 2016, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Horita then rose and requested that her remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Horita's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of Senate Bill No. 2016, SD 1, HD 1. This bill is necessary for the economic well-being of the State of Hawaii because of the overall benefits to wage-earners as well as businesses which are provided by the minimum wage.

"For families who rely on minimum wage jobs as a primary source of income, the current level of pay is insufficient to reach the poverty level. Further, studies have shown that raising the minimum wage has numerous beneficial effects for society as a whole by raising living standards, reducing welfare, and encouraging economic growth. In addition, the loss of jobs that business predicts would result from an increase in the minimum wage is in reality negligible, amounting to roughly one-half of one percent.

"This bill will increase the State of Hawaii's minimum hourly wage from \$3.85 to \$4.20 beginning January 1, 1990 and to \$4.55 beginning July 1, 1991. Primary income providers who earn the minimum wage will find their earnings begin to once again keep pace with cost-of-living increases. Also, the issue of increasing the minimum wage in the near future is avoided by providing for an automatic increase.

"Mr. Speaker, this bill is necessary for our State. In these times of prosperity, it is important for everyone to share in it. By increasing the living standards of our workers' economic growth will be promoted and everyone will continue to benefit. I urge all my fellow representatives to vote in favor of this bill.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2016,

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, today we honor the Bishop Museum on its 100th birthday, and at the same time we honor Dr. Duckworth, the Director who has guided the Bishop Museum to new heights of excellence -- as an exhibiting institution, a research institution, and above all, a community institution.

"In 1988, more than 363,000 visitors shared in the fun and fascination of the Museum. Last year we, in the Legislature, designated the Bishop Museum the State of Hawaii Natural and Cultural History Museum in part because it is the responsibility of those of us who are older to preserve the things we value and to pass them on to those of us who are younger.

"For all of us, young and old, the Bishop Museum is a place where we learn about Hawaii's past -- we find the histories and cultures of the many peoples of Hawaii, as well as the finest collection of Hawaiiana in the world. The Museum is also a place where we can peer into the future -- the mysteries of space and the stars are alive in the planetarium and observatory.

"Thanks to the dedication and hard work of its directors, administrators and staff, the Bishop Museum

has continually brought in new and exciting exhibits, grown much closer to the community and become more efficient and financially stable than ever before.

"Now, if I may be permitted, Mr. Speaker, I would like to introduce our honorees.

"It is my privilege to present to this body our principal honoree who needs no introduction -- Dr. W. Donald Duckworth.

"Next to Dr. Duckworth is Sandy Duckworth. Mrs. Duckworth stands on her own right. She is a former County Supervisor for Fairfax County, Virginia, which is one of the largest suburbs next to the District of Columbia. She now runs her own business, Duckworth and Associates, which organizes and manages workshops and conferences.

"I would then introduce representatives of the Board of Directors of the Bishop Museum:

"Kenneth F. Brown. Mr. Brown is very well known to us as an architect, a businessman and a former State Senator. He is Chairman of the Board of Directors and has served on the Board since 1982. He is very active in many charitable organizations in Hawaii.

"Next is Philip Ching. Mr. Ching is Vice Chairman of the Board. He has been a member of the Board for five years and is, at the same time, Chairman of its Finance Committee. Mr. Ching is a Senior Vice President and Administrative Assistant to the Chairman of the First Hawaiian Bank.

"John Dominis Holt. Mr. Holt has been a Board member for the last three years. He is a noted author, publisher, and strong supporter of the Bishop Museum. In addition to serving as a Director of the Bishop Museum, Mr. Holt also serves on the Board of Directors of the Native Hawaiian Cultural and Arts Program.

"I would like now to introduce, Mr. Speaker, additional Directors of the Board of the Bishop Museum who are seated in the gallery."

Representative Lee then asked the following persons to stand to be recognized: Jeanne Anderson, Andy Ichiki, Peter Russell, Allen Wooddell, Jerry Pedesky.

"I would also like to introduce the Assistant Directors, the top management staff."

Representative Lee then asked the following persons to stand to be recognized: Susan Kodani, Allen Allison, Anita Manning, Steve Montgomery, and "all the staff and members from the Bishop Museum who came down to participate in our ceremony this morning."

Representative Tam then rose and stated:

"Donald Duckworth is a very good friend of mine and I had the pleasure of meeting him and working with him since last year and this year, especially this year, and I would like to say that I join my colleagues in commending Dr. Duckworth for his outstanding work in promoting educational excellence at Bishop Museum. He has demonstrated his determination to improve and expand the Bishop Museum's services for Hawaii's public and private schools, and we don't find too many people who are doing that. And thank you very much.

"I know I speak for the teachers and students in expressing my heartfelt 'thank you' and 'mahalo.'

"By the way, Mr. Speaker and fellow colleagues, I would also like to thank the Bishop Museum in helping the Chinese celebrate their 200th anniversary by co-sponsoring Family Sunday.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Kotani then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, Dr. Duckworth was appointed as Museum Director after a period of distinguished service with the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, D.C. At the time of his arrival, his appointment was greeted inevitably with more than a little skepticism because he assumed the helm at the Museum at a period of time when the Museum was facing a financial crisis.

"But I think today, Dr. Duckworth has dealt with any possible questions that might have existed at that time. His brief tenure of leadership has seen the Museum expand its outreach programs to the public through such activities as Family Sunday. We have seen new facilities being constructed such as the soon-to-be-completed Castle Hall, and the Museum's financial status has been turned around.

"And Dr. Duckworth and the Museum has played an important role in supporting such initiatives as a proviso in the State budget that will appropriate funds to do a study of establishing a new State historical museum.

"Today, as the Museum embarks on its next century of existence under the leadership of Dr. Duckworth, I think we can really look forward to the day when the Bishop Museum is not merely the State museum of cultural and natural history, but also the Smithsonian of the Pacific.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

"'Freckles' is an active member and leader in several organizations involved with the tourist industry, in addition to being a member of the Hawaiian Homes Commission and the Hawaii Economic Council. As owner of Smith's Boats Services, Inc., which was started by his father, Walter Smith, Sr., and mother, Emily, 43 years ago in 1946, 'Freckles' and his wife, Moki, has managed to expand the business into an enterprising industry with over 200 employees and 16 boats providing rides to the pristine fern grotto.

"In 1988, over 523,000 satisfied customers took the enjoyable ride up the Wailua River. In July 1985, 'Freckles' leased a piece of property bordering the Wailua River, invested more than \$1.5-million and improvements and with nurturing, love, and a lot of hard work, created a fantasy land which is now Smith's Tropical Paradise. One of its major visitor attraction is an erupting volcano preceded by rain, thunder and lightning, and the emergence of Goddess Pele out of the volcano to the murmuring background of chants.

"As successful as his businesses are, 'Freckles' still sees great potential for further expansion to meet the demands of the increasing number of visitors to Kauai. "And in the '70s, she embarked on a new career as the designer and manufacturer of wearing apparel. Thus today, she is known as one of Hawaii's premier fashion designers of island-inspired clothing and, as mentioned, she was given the honor at the Governor's 1989 Fashion Sports Awards luncheon last week as the Hawaii Speciality Store of the Year, contributing the most to Hawaii apparel manufacturing.

"Throughout the years, Mamo has maintained the qualities of kindness, gentleness, and wholesomeness, all synonymous with Hawaii's people and her works reflect the same qualities. And it is particularly gratifying for me to acknowledge this individual today for she epitomizes the women of the '80s -- a loving wife married to the former police lieutenant, Philip Dixie Howell, for 41 years, a gentle and a concerned mother, a grandmother of four, a community-minded individual, and a successful businesswoman -- all rolled into one. And whoever said that intelligence and beauty do not go hand in hand. Mamo is surely the proof of that fallacy.

"Now, I would like to introduce to this body Mamo Howell, President of Mamo Howell, Incorporated."

Representative Kawakami then asked the honoree to stand to be recognized. Accompanying Mamo Howell was Julie Sagum, "my sister, who has been a long-time family friend of the Howell family."

"Mr. Speaker and members of this honorable body, fifteen years ago in July of 1974, the now world-famous Honolulu Boy Choir, under the able leadership of Roy and Nile Hallman, was born. And if you listen very carefully, you can hear the unique musical blend of voices of young boys from all over the island of Oahu between the ages of 7 and 13 years, singing 'This is our Island Home,' a song made famous by the Honolulu Boy Choir, expressing the real essence of belonging to the Aloha spirit, the love and the pride that these boys have of our

island state we call Hawaii, by the words in the song, 'We are young men of this country.'

"In 1969, at the request of Dr. Thomas Crosby who was then the minister at Central Union Church, Roy and Nile Hallman relocated to Hawaii where Roy assumed the position of ministry of music at the Central Union Church while Nile, his lovely and devoted wife, became the assistant director and organist at the church.

"Under his father's influence, Roy grew up singing in numerous choirs and that is why in 1974, Roy Hallman had a vision -- a vision to form a choir of young boys between ages 7 and 13 years with the kind of unique and pure voices that would create a sound so beautiful when blended together within the short period of a young boy's life.

"The choir which started out with 40 members has grown into a choir of 175 strong. The Honolulu Boy Choir, although made up of many boys, is in the singular to emphasize the quality of singing it strives for, to sound like a single unified voice rather than many voices. The quality of sound, the disciplined performances, the wonderfully animated faces of the boys, and the unusual combination of music and dance have gained the Honolulu Boy Choir an outstanding international reputation. The Choir has captivated audiences from Tahiti to Toronto, from Taiwan and Guam to Washington, D.C., from Disneyland in both Toyko and California to the Rockefeller Center in New York, and from Seoul and Hong Kong to Tijuana Mexico, and let us not forget Australia and New Zealand, and the southern United States, including Texas, Florida and Tennessee, topped off with a performance at the Dolly Parton's Dolly World in Pigeon Forge, Tennessee

"The Choir has made numerous television appearances, including the Most Beautiful Girl in the World Pageant, the Bob Hope Special, Jim Nabors Christmas Special, and the Dolly Parton Hawaii Special. Performances by the Honolulu Boy Choir is commonplace in Hawaii at various conventions, charitable fund raisers and special events.

"And I speak of the achievements of the Honolulu Boy Choir, not only as a legislator but, in particular, as a parent with a son who has been in the Choir for the past 5-1/2 years. I think I know something about the Choir.

"Roy and Nile Hallman, through their patience, understanding and love, have been able to instill that sense of togetherness, teamwork and pride, to each boy singing and belonging to the Honolulu Boy Choir because these very qualities are what make Roy and Nile, in their personal lives as husband and wife for the past 40 years, so special. For, you see, the Hallmans not only preach love, teamwork, aloha -- they live it, each and every day of their lives. Their work at the Central Union Church is the focal point of their lives. Central Union Church should be commended for its community concern and encouraging the Hallmans and the employees of the church to undertake the significant work of opportunity and training for boys on Oahu.

"I can honestly say that each of my fellow colleagues in the House of Representatives sitting here today, each of us on the island of Oahu, is being represented by one or more boys living and residing in our various districts, singing in the world-famous Honolulu Boy Choir.

"At this time, Mr. Speaker, I would like to introduce my honorees," and asked them to stand to be recognized.

"First, the father, founder and director of the Honolulu Boy Choir -- Mr. Roy Hallman.

"Next, I wish to introduce the other half, the other component of Roy Hall, the arranger, the organist of the Choir -- Nile Hallman.

"These next three individuals that I am about to introduce are very special because each of them were once parents of young sons in the Choir. Their sons have since left the Choir, but these people are still here.

"The general manager, the one who does all the bookings of the Choir, arranges all the tours, does all the negotiations, and he still finds time to work at the Outrigger Hotel -- Doug Mossman.

"We have next the administrative assistant. These guys have real fancy names, you know. I'll tell you one thing, there is no person, and I speak from pure experience watching her, there is no person in the world who can handle with such ease 200 boys like this extraordinary woman, and let me tell you, she does -- 200 boys -- they behave like angels, boys now, and she keeps each of them in line -- Anne 'Aunty' Eli.

"Finally, the concert coordinator -- the guy who makes it all happen before the show starts; stage manager -- responsible for setting up each concert -- Leo 'Uncle' Kama."

Representative Tom asked Claire Engle, a member of the Board of Directors of the Honolulu Boy Choir, who was seated in the gallery, to stand to be recognized.

Representative Tom then asked Chinky Mahoe, "who is the kumu hula for the Honolulu Boy Choir. And besides having his own award-winning halau, Chinky's group won first place overall at the past Merrie Monarch Festival in Hilo," to stand to be recognized.

Representative Tom then asked the supporters, parents and friends of the Honolulu Boy Choir who were seated in the gallery to stand to be recognized.

Carnation leis were then presented to the honorees by Representatives Horita, Anderson, Baker, M. Ige and Kawakami while Representative Tom presented Mr. Hallman with a certified copy of the resolution.

Representative Metcalf then rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"Not that enough hasn't been said already in behalf of the honorees, but Representative Tom pointed out that his oldest son Matthew is a member of the Honolulu Boy Choir. Representative Tom himself tried out for the Boy Choir and he was the right height but not the right age.

"Thank you."

H.R. No. 415, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION HONORING THE WAIKIKI AQUARIUM," was jointly offered by Representatives Taniguchi, Hemmings, Bunda

On motion by Representative Hemmings, seconded by Representative Bunda and carried, H.R. No. 415 was adopted.

Representative Hemmings then rose and proceeded to introduce the honoree, stating:

"I think the resolution speaks very well of the contributions and role that the Aquarium has played in our society, especially for our town here -- Honolulu. It is something that is enjoyed by children, adults and visitors alike, so without any further delay, I would like to introduce the man who puts so much over and above

what he actually gets paid for in the way of job into the Aquarium, and that's the director -- Mr. Bruce Carlson."

Representative Hemmings then asked Mr. Carlson to stand to be recognized.

Representative Marumoto then presented Mr. Carlson a floral lei while Representative Hemmings presented him with a certified copy of the resolution.

H.R. No. 416, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION CONGRATULATING AND COMMENDING JESSE SAPOLU ON BEING A MEMBER OF THE SUPER BOWL CHAMPION SAN FRANCISCO FORTY-NINERS," was jointly offered by Representatives Arakaki, Yoshimura

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative Yoshimura and carried, H.R. No. 416 was adopted.

Representative Arakaki then rose to introduce the honoree, stating:

"I wasn't sure if our honoree was going to be here because he now resides in San Francisco, and I thought maybe I'd have to make him run ten laps around the State Capitol for being late but, fortunately, he did show up and I am glad we are honoring him today. Just a few words about our honoree.

"Jesse was born in Western Samoa and he came to Hawaii when he was about 9 years old and he attended Kaewai Elementary, Dole Intermediate, McKinley and Farrington High Schools. And also, he went to the University of Hawaii and he was an All-Wac performer, and just a little local touch about going to the play-offs.

"While in Chicago for the National championships, he was interviewed and he was asked what he liked and what he missed most about Hawaii, and he said he missed the plate lunch, being a true Kalihi local, and so one of the radio stations here did send him a plate lunch. And also, we all know about the Bengals' Icky Shuffle and our honoree wanted to rival the Icky Shuffle and do a Samoan slap dance but, unfortunately, he was wearing cleats and not barefooted so he decided, you know, instead of falling flat on his face, he would maybe wait for another time.

"And finally, he had the chance to visit the White House as a guest of the President and he did tell the President that, yes indeed, he was one of the true minorities of the country. And he also made a remark when I talked to him that he really felt proud of being from Hawaii and he especially felt proud because the people in Hawaii really take a lot of pride. . .they show their pride in the accomplishments of the people who do come from Hawaii and this is regardless of the person's ethnic or social background. And this is really important because one of the reasons why our honoree is here is to help us to deal with one of the problems we have today.

"A couple of days ago, I went to a meeting with the Police Department to discuss one of the problems we have with youth gangs and our honoree, having grown up in Kalihi and having gone through a lot of difficulties, I think he can really relate to the problems our kids are having today. He did mention that he had six F's in one school year and it's not something he is proud of but I think he mentioned that because he wants to get a message to the kids, you know, that even if you're down, no matter how low you go, there's always hope. And I think that's one of the messages he wants to get across, not so much that everyone can be a professional football player and a successful professional because only about two percent of the athletes actually make it, but it is really

important to get a good education, to work hard, and to persevere. And I think, as a true reflection of that, after he retires from football, and he hopes to play at least two more seasons, he would like to become a teacher and a counselor and a coach.

"And so, we want to congratulate him, not only on being an outstanding football player and being part of the Super Bowl champion Forty-Niners, but also for being an outstanding example to our kids here in Hawaii.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Arakaki then asked Jesse Sapolu to stand to be recognized.

Representative Alcon then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I had to rise although I didn't have anything prepared for Mr. Sapolu, but we're so proud of him that he is a product of Kalihi. Everytime there is something in Kalihi, it is always negative.

"The other day, Mr. Speaker, we honored the Bishop Museum and it is also located in Kalihi so we have some good in Kalihi and not the 44 percent, you know, Filipino gang, the 26 percent Samoan gang, and the 1 percent Korean and other leaders of the gangs.

"I'm really thrilled, Mr. Speaker, because once in a while, despite all the publicities that we have negatively from the newspaper and so on, I wish that they would also pick up the good points that we have in Kalihi, and I am very happy that Mr. Sapolu graduated from the best high school in Kalihi.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Fukunaga then presented Mr. Sapolu with a floral lei while Representative Yoshimura presented him with a certified copy of the resolution.

At 12:11 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Representatives Hirono and Shon, for the Committees on Consumer Protection and Commerce and Health, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1347) recommending that H.C.R. No. 44, as amended in HD 1, be referred to the Committee on Legislative Management.

Representative M. Ige then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I realize that it is unusual to speak on a measure when it is being referred to a second committee, but I do have words in support of this measure if I may express them at this time.

"Mr. Speaker, I have had, in the past, some reservations about supporting any kind of mandatory coverage on Hawaii's health insurance but at one of our hearings earlier, it was brought out that two out of ten women would develop this disease within their lifetime. That's the down side.

"The up side is that if the State were to come up with programs on prevention, a lot of this disease could be prevented or cured. And it was our feeling that these programs were not being actively pursued, especially on the neighbor islands, and I am hoping that the Legislative Management Chairman move this resolution as quickly as

possible over to the Senate and, hopefully, the House Finance Committee Chairman, within his wisdom, find some monies so that we can get a program like this out onto the neighbor islands and to help these women who are in need and who, hopefully, we will be able to prevent some of these incidences from occurring.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 44, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING A STUDY ASSESSING THE SOCIAL AND FINANCIAL IMPACT OF MANDATORY HEALTH INSURANCE COVERAGE FOR MAMMOGRAPHY," was referred to the Committee on Legislative Management.

Representative Liu then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"This bill increases the retirement benefits for District Court judges to place them on a par with Circuit Court, Appellate and Supreme Court judges. Until we decide that District Court judges should be selected in the same manner and have the same years of background qualifications, either through the Constitution or by law, I don't believe that they deserve the same type of retirement benefits as other judges do.

"I think the Constitution clearly intends, at this point in time, that perhaps District Court judges need not have the same qualifications or background as Circuit Court, Appellate and Supreme Court judges as it was only a five-year requirement minimum versus ten years for practice on other levels.

"Further, I do think that the screening process which Circuit and Appellate and Supreme Court justices have to go through is much more thorough and we are much more assured of a quality Judiciary at that level than we are currently at the District Court level.

"I do not believe also that there is a problem in recruitment for District Court judges. There are a lot of young attorneys who do apply, who do get their names placed in nomination, and who do get chosen.

"So, until we make some of these basic changes, Mr. Speaker, I think this bill puts the cart before the horse, and I shall be voting no.

"Thank you."

Representative Kotani then rose to speak in favor of House Resolution 113 and House Concurrent Resolution 93, stating:

"As we ponder Hawaii's future, we need to consider our relations with the neighboring states of the Pacific Rim, even those that have different political systems from ours. These resolutions urge Governor Waihee to establish sister-state relations with one such neighbor, the Soviet maritime republic of Primor'ye in the Western Pacific.

"Primor'ye is located on the extreme southeastern tip of the Soviet Union and is closer to Hawaii than Guam or Japan. Its major city, Vladivostok, is the center of Soviet power in the Pacific and the Soviet gateway to East Asia. The region borders on mainland China, Korea and the Sea of Japan.

"Soviet Secretary-General Mikhail Gorbachev has referred to the Pacific region as the likely focus of world politics and economic development in the 21st century. Vladivostok is the entry port to the vast and ruggedly beautiful region of Soviet Asia, a region that is well-endowed with untapped supplies of coal, natural gas, oil and timber. The Soviets want to develop this region and are looking to contacts with the other nations of the Pacific as sources of technology and investment.

"In addition, the Soviets are seeking contacts with the United States on other common Asia-Pacific concerns. Gorbachev has talked not only of the need to reduce nuclear arms in the Pacific, but also of the need to work together to contain environmental pollution and to preserve ethnic traditions and to cope with natural disasters. He has opened a dialogue with the governments of all the major Pacific states.

"Gorbachev has described Vladivostok's future role in words that ring familiar to the ears of those of us who live in Hawaii -- 'a major international center, a sea of trade and culture, a city of festivals, sporting meetings, congresses and scientific symposiums.' Vladivostok is expected to be fully open to foreign business and travel in the near future. Last year, UH President Albert Simone became the first foreign university president to visit Vladivostok, and in November, our University administration signed an agreement with the Far Eastern University of Vladivostok for the exchange of faculty and students. Hawaii has a tremendous opportunity in this area.

"In considering the future of our islands, we can no longer afford to languish in provincialism or in outmoded preconceptions of foreign nations. Today's world is truly interdependent. By establishing sister-state relations with Primor'ye, we may yet enable Hawaii to become a true bridge between East and West.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kotani then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of House Resolution 61 and House Concurrent Resolution 48, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Kotani's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of House Resolution 61 and House Concurrent Resolution 48.

"On February 19, 1942, one of America's greatest presidents ordered one of the worst violations of civil rights in American history. On that day of infamy for the U.S. constitution, Franklin D. Roosevelt signed Executive Order 9066 and authorized the forced evacuation and incarceration in detention centers and internment camps of 120,000 American citizens and resident aliens of Japanese ancestry.

"Today, there is widespread acknowledgement that Executive Order 9066 should not have been issued. In 1982, the Commission on Wartime Relocation and Internment of Civilians concluded in its report to Congress that 'a grave injustice' was done to citizens and permanent resident aliens whose loyalty to our country was questioned solely on the basis of their ancestry.

"Last August 10, President Reagan finally recognized the need to address this 'grave injustice' by signing Public Law 100-383, the Civil Liberties Act of 1988. The Act provides for an official national apology and \$20,000 in restitution to each American of Japanese ancestry who was forcibly evacuated and incarcerated in a U.S. concentration camp during the war.

"No government action can erase the suffering and pain of those who were subjected to the mass evacuation and detention. These loyal Americans were forced to sell their homes, farms and businesses at fire-sale rates, herded into wooden barracks encircled by barbed wire with armed guards in watchtowers, and exposed to public humiliation and distrust. Families were separated, careers destroyed, and left scars on the hearts and minds of the victims that the intervening years have not healed.

"For more than four decades, the wartime detainees have waited for our country to make amends. Unfortunately, their long wait is not over. The same President who signed the Civil Liberties Act into law decided that justice did not merit the necessary expenditure of dollars.

"While Congress had authorized a maximum annual appropriation of \$500-million for the reparations payments, in his farewell budget, President Reagan proposed only a \$20-million allocation in 1990 and only \$170-million in 1991. Forty years after the war, half of the 120,000 Americans who suffered through this wartime tragedy have died. The vast majority of the approximately 60,000 survivors are in the twilight of their

years. The \$20-million proposed by the Reagan budget for fiscal year 1990 would compensate only 1,000 people. The Department of Justice estimates that 2,400 eligible people will die during that same year. The bottom line is that the Reagan budget makes a mockery of the Civil Rights Act of 1988 by ensuring that most of the wartime detainees will not live to see the day of restitution by the government.

"The passage of H.R. 61 and H.C.R. 48 will demonstrate that, unlike the Reagan and Bush administrations, we have not forgotten the victims of wartime racism and hysteria. We have not forgotten the 2,000 Hawaii residents who were sent to internment camps at Honouliuli and on the United States mainland and the way in which they have borne their oppression in silence. We remember their stories of suffering and courage and we vow that what happened then should never happen again.

"Mr. Speaker, I believe that all of us in the Legislature of the State of Hawaii recognize that our country is strong enough to admit its mistakes. President Franklin Roosevelt, the leader who signed Executive Order 9066, is the same great leader who later admitted that the Japanese American soldiers of the 442nd Regimental Combat Team had demonstrated that 'Americanism is not, and never was, a matter of race or ancestry.'

"Justice cannot be measured by dollars but a failure to appropriate an adequate amount of funds reflects a poverty in spirit. We should strive to ensure that we bequeath, not merely a legacy of material prosperity, but a richness in spirit, to the next generation."
