Sen. Com. No. 750, informing the House that the Senate has reconsidered its action taken on April 10, 1989, in passing House Bill 1876 on Third Reading. Said bill has been recommitted to the Senate Committee on Ways and Means.

At 11:45 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:50 o'clock a.m.

At this time, the following introductions were made to the members of the House:

Representative Hagino introduced William Sloane Coffin, Jr., saying:

"Reverend Kaufman, by way of introduction, has had a distinguished past. He served in the United States Army during World War II, and a few years later actually worked for the Central Intelligence Agency. His life then took a different turn and he entered Yale Divinity School and he graduated from the divinity school and later became the chaplain of Yale University. It is at this time that many of us -- my generation -- began to hear of him. He was a tremendous. ... an important person and leader in the civil rights and the peace movement during the '60s and the early '70s. As a young college student, I remember him and I rank him with people like Reverend Martin Luther King and Dr. Benjamin Spock. He was truly an inspiration to all of us.

"Currently, he is the newly elected President of Sane/Freeze and he is promoting nuclear disarmament and educating us about the threat of nuclear warfare. He is such a tremendous individual that some of us may recall that he has been immortalized in the Doonseberry cartoon series as Scott Sloane and that's the kind of immortality that comes to very few individuals. He is a tremendous speaker, he is a tremendous advocate for international understanding, and for peace.

"And so, Mr. Speaker, on behalf of Representatives Tom and Kotani, I would like to ask Reverend William Sloane Coffin, Jr. to please rise to be recognized."

Representative Hagino continued:

"Reverend Coffin is here because he personally came to testify before Representative Tom's Committee on International Affairs for a concurrent resolution and House resolution asking that the United States enter into a comprehensive nuclear test ban treaty with Soviet Russia."

"Accompanying Reverend Coffin are several distinguished guests and I would also like to ask that they be recognized.

"First, we have his wife Randy Coffin; from the Peace Institute at the University of Hawaii, we have the director, Professor John Van Dyke; truly the most distinguished individual for me, the associate director, Dr. Luan Guanson; and members of Sane/Freeze Hawaii

-- Aileen Fujimoto, leader of the group; Charles Fujimoto and Jim Brewer.

"Thank you very much Mr. Speaker, and thank you very much Reverend Coffin, for your presence here today."

Representative Chang introduced five "outstanding senior citizens from Kona and members of the Kona Silver Legislature," as follows: Daisy Smith, Harold and Emma Boag, Martha Brewster and Frank Doner.

Representative Shon introduced two members of the Occupational Therapy Association, as follows: Kathleen Rego, public relations chairperson; and Dawn Noguchi, legislative chairperson.

Representative Horita introduced 29 members from the Kalihi Union Church Women's Fellowship Group, as follows: Elaine Char, Norma Oshiro, Trinidad E. Arlantico, Miyoko Asagi, Teruko Kase, Jane Shiroma, Betty Furumizu, Nancy Yamashita, Adeline Young, Harriet Iriguchi, Sumiko Gushiken, Lorraine Ohama, Grace Arakawa, Emi Omori, Mitzi Terada, Akiko Nakamura, Sylvia Yuen, Tomie Higa, Nora Shiraishi, Dorothy Tokishi, Florence Higa, Yuriko Yamashiro, Doris Matsuda, Hinayo Shichida, Susan Fukeda, Ruth Smith, Shirley Kimura and their leader, Stella R. Gibbs.

Representative Stegmaier introduced Rona Ho, Ramie Ibanez, Malia Labor, Denise Sumimoto and Melanie Tashima, legislative interns from Niu Valley Intermediate School.

Representative Tom introduced a group of fifth grade students from Punahou School. They were accompanied by their teachers, Mr. Barry Luckenbach and Ms. Linda Campbell.

Representative Tom then asked Kelly Ann Ikeda, his neighbor, and Melissa Mun, "two very special people" from the class to stand to be recognized.

Representative Taniguchi introduced a group of "beautiful women" from the University of Hawaii Clerical Association. They were accompanied by Jo Ann Oshiro.

Representative D. Ige then rose and proceeded to introduce his guests, saying:

"Mr. Speaker, I think more and more that the conventional wisdom is that the University plays an exceedingly more and more important role in the diversification of our economies, especially into high technology areas. And everyone recognizes that the University faculty provides a solid foundation for any university.

"With us in the gallery this morning are two special faculty members who have received national recognition. In 1983, the National Science Foundation created the Young Presidential Investigator's Award to assist universities in retaining outstanding young individuals to pursue careers in research and teaching. Recipients of these awards have completed excellent work and show promise in providing significant impact to their respective fields.

"This morning, of the 3,500 universities throughout the nation, only 73 have been honored with young presidential investigators and our university here at Hawaii has been honored four times — that's four faculty members have been so designated.

"With us this morning in the gallery are two of those recipients, and I would like to introduce them this morning.

"The first is Professor Cengiz Ertekin from the Ocean Engineering Department whose interest is in the computational hydro-dynamics and is studying different ways of calculating and accurately predicting the effects of ocean forces on marine structures and ships," and asked Dr. Ertekin to stand to be recognized.

"Mr. Speaker, as we initiated our ocean and earth sciences program at the University, it is very rewarding for us to see such outstanding faculty already in the program.

"Also with him this morning is Professor Anthony Koo from the electrical engineering department whose expertise surrounds models of neuro-networks that have been shown to be useful in solving problems in communications, signal processing, and artificial intelligence. It is believed that neuro-networks will lead to the next generation of computers that will take us to the 21st century," and asked Dr. Koo to stand to be recognized.

Representative D. Ige then asked the following people from the University of Hawaii to stand to be recognized: Dr. Albert Simone, President; Dr. Diana De Luca, assistant to the President; Dr. Paul Yuen, Dean of the College of Engineering; Dr. Charles Helsley, Dean of the School of Ocean and Earth Science and Technology; Dr. Kazutoshi Najita, Chairman of the Electrical Engineering Department; and Dr. Shu Lin who will become Chairman effective July 1, 1989.

Representative Souki introduced Alfred and Margaret Lipske and Ernie and Murine Torick, friends of Richard Sugita, former Sergeant-at-Arms of the House.

Representative Takamine proceeded to introduce his guests, saying:

"We, as a society, have decided that there really is no room for selfishness or greed if we are to build a better tomorrow and, therefore, the members of this body have provided for many programs that provide a helping hand to those in our community who are less well off. Participating in this effort and providing significant leadership are members of the Hawaii Community Action Program who have joined us in the gallery this morning. They are celebrating 25 years of an effort of a declaration of unconditional war on poverty."

Representative Liu then rose to speak against the resolution, stating:

"Just very shortly, I oppose the resolution and I would like a 'no' vote recorded for me.

"Thank you."

Representative Hemmings then rose to speak against the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, briefly, I am opposed to this resolution also. I think our concern should be with the interest of running an efficient penal institution and I want to note that this resolution was testified against by the Corrections Department and the Attorney General. If we're concerned about anybody and if we're going to be compassionate, we certainly should be compassionate about the families of the people who were robbed, raped, mugged, or killed by these prisoners.

"Our first concern should be proper incarceration and management of the penal institutions and, therefore, I believe that the government should have the ability to do what is best to expedite their incarceration and maintaining them properly. Therefore, I join Representative Liu in voting no."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 180, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THAT THE DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS REPORT TO THE LEGISLATURE WITH REGARD TO PRISON INMATES BEING TRANSFERRED OUT OF STATE," was adopted, with Representatives Hemmings and Liu voting no.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Human Services, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1456) recommending that H.C.R. No. 289, as amended in HD 1, be adopted.

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 289, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING A STUDY OF THE WELFARE HEARINGS PROCESS," was adopted.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Human Services, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1457) recommending that H.C.R. No. 232 be adopted.

Representative Apo moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.C.R. No. 232 be adopted, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Hemmings then rose to speak against the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is one of these alleged apple pie and mother issues and sometimes we, Republicans especially, get concerned that we get accused of not caring enough about the social issues, and I am very proud to stand up on this because I care so much about the family and the welfare of the family. I want to get government out of the families' affairs and return to a system where family starts maintaining their own well-being themselves and start being concerned about themselves rather than knowing in the back of their mind -- well, I don't have to take care of my kids, or I don't have to worry about this because if it goes wrong, the government will step in and take care of it.

"I would like to submit to this body that we're in big trouble because government is not even educating our kids properly in spite of one of the highest rates of expenditures for public education in the nation.

"We have a crime problem that is very serious and we cannot properly take care of even our own prisons and taking care of our own crime problem.

"Our State Health Department has the worst rated mental health care system in the nation. Our State Hospital is on the verge of non-accreditation because of mismanagement and malfeasance and now we are going to ask the State to embark on a new program to start setting policies on how families should take care of each other.

"I would like to submit to this body that maybe we should worry about the basics and allow families to take care of families. To cradle the grave management of the affairs of peoples' lives is something that has been tried unsuccessfully in other societies and the best people to take care of families are families, not government. Therefore, I am voting no on this resolution and I would like the Clerk to record a 'no' vote. Also, Representative Anderson is recording a 'no' vote."

Representative Arakaki then rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"This resolution does not address apple pie but it does address issues of motherhood, fatherhood, our children, and the rest of our families. And I do want to say that most members did co-introduce this resolution, and this resolution was the result of, you may have heard, the decisions '87, action '88 process, which involves the private sector of the businesses, the public sector agencies, and also government agencies, and public and private citizens. And they had the task of developing what they felt was the most important priority for the State of Hawaii, what we should be addressing as the most important concern, not only for government for us, but for the private sector as well — the businesses. And this is what they came up with. What they want to say is that our families are the basic social institutions for not only our State but for our country, in fact, internationally.

"Representative Hemmings is correct that government too often plays a large role in families and they play a larger role in the functional families. We have to take care of the problems when families don't work. We have to take care of their kids when they don't succeed as parents. And I think what we want to say is, you know, we shouldn't just play that role of treating our illnesses, that we need to play a pro active role in promoting good family policies, good family practices, and this is what this resolution is saying. And we want our State government to be one of the leaders in promoting good family values and this is what we are working on right now.

"So, I would like to urge everyone to support this resolution on behalf of the families of Hawaii.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson then rose to speak against the resolution, stating:

"The main reason, Mr. Speaker, I am looking at the committee report -- I don't see anything on here that says any families came down here to testify on behalf of this. I see here that it says the Office of Children and Youth, the Department of Health, the Department of Social Worker, the Judiciary -- these are all departments and everytime we put something in, they turn around and say, 'yes, this is an excellent program and if you give me another \$150,000-\$200,000, we'll make this a better program.'

"I heard very recently that some people were upset with the Department of Education because their children did not have proper hygiene and did not go ahead and have proper manners. That's how bad it is getting. People are expecting us to take care of the needs of their children, and I am not a person who is against children. I happen to like them. I love little children. But I think that we have a perfect responsibility to take care of our own, to start making sure that each one of them get the love, and the care from us -- their parents, their grandparents, their aunts and uncles.

"For that reason, Mr. Speaker, I am speaking against this because I think government ought to stay out of the home and we should be doing more to take care of the problems that are before us in the Department of Education and making sure that we go ahead and give them the proper tools for that reading, writing, arithmetic, not saying we're going to make sure you're going to get proper hygiene, or that you're going to be getting more help from the Judiciary.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative O'Kieffe rose to speak against the resolution, stating:

"As the co-head of my family, I choose to leave the decisions of my family within my family. But also, Mr. Speaker, my wife and I will also continue to help those other families that are less fortunate than us.

"Will the Clerk please cast a 'no' vote on this issue for

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 232, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION URGING THE ADOPTION OF A STATE POLICY ON FAMILIES," was adopted, with Representatives Anderson, Hemmings and O'Kieffe voting no.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 4:40 o'clock p.m.

Representative Apo moved that "all Standing Committee Reports and accompanying House Concurrent Resolutions referenced on Supplemental Calendar No. 1 be adopted."

The motion was seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Liu then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against the motion.

"Mr. Speaker, some of these resolutions are great, others are not so great. Some of the good resolutions included ones we heard this morning about the residence of damaged homes in the Kuliouou hilltop area, uniform poll closing act of Congress, access to legislators' voting records, and there are a number of others which are all very good and I value hearing some resolutions. I think we get a lot of good information from them and I think they serve a good purpose.

"But, Mr. Speaker, as I did, I think it was two years ago, cast a symbolic 'no' against a similar situation where we had a raft of resolutions in the closing minutes before some deadline. I would like to cast another symbolic 'no' on all the resolutions because I think we have to exercise better restraint as introducers, and I am as guilty as any others perhaps in introducing resolutions when perhaps other ways could be done to make the same point, and as committee chairs and all of us, I think we have to exercise greater restraint and greater discrimination. We demean what we want to do by waiting till the end by passing so many all at once without really knowing what is in them and we are not adding anything to the process.

"For that reason, I will ask the Clerk to cast a symbolic 'no' vote on all resolutions, and I appreciate your indulgence.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hemmings rose to speak against the motion, stating:

"I share the same concerns as the Minority Leader, but I would like to say that on the positive side that we have made some progress this year in that we received, I think, criticism about the State last year commissioning too many studies. This year, we have some creative titles. We are requesting reviews, we are requesting supports, we are requesting plans, and if it's a real big deal we'll request an action plan, and if it's a real complicated deal we'll request a comparison study.

"But the bottom line is, Mr. Speaker, although there are many fine resolutions in this pack that we are passing this afternoon, in fact one or two that I myself may have introduced, there are too many that are not fine and are time-consuming and leading to this process where, at the last minute, we are passing sometimes substantive resolutions without really having the time to caucus or go over them adequately.

"Secondly, I have a concern about what we are really here to do and I think our major concern should be passing effective, timely laws, and this process has been awfully time-consuming in the last couple of weeks. I think with Conference Committees on and deadlines to pass legislation, to be consumed by so many resolutions, is making it difficult.

"For those reasons, I would like to cast a 'no' vote, and Representative Anderson has indicated that he will be joining us also.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Metcalf then rose to speak in favor of the motion, stating:

"I would just like to inform the members of this House that your Committee on Judiciary tried, at its level best, to live up to the expectations of the Minority and have largely succeeded.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, because I think it is going to be a voice call, I would like to have the Clerk please register a 'no' for me.

"Thank you."

"I just thought that it is very important that I make a couple of comments on behalf of the House.

"Mr. Speaker, through your leadership, and the innovative and dedicated support of Chairpersons Souki, Metcalf, Fukunaga, and many others, the House has been the champion for open government, fair access, and for using telecommunications and computer technology to serve the people of Hawaii.

"Through this resolution, and other initiatives now integrated into Senate Bill 832 and waiting for action, we declare that the 1990 session shall mark the beginning of a new era of fair access and informed public participation. The House goes on record that it is ready and committed to investing in the people of our communities, to ensure that we provide every opportunity for their involvement in their government.

"Over the past few sessions, we have made strategic investments and adopted bold policies to ensure Hawaii's role in the age of the Pacific and in the age of information. We have invested in a statewide information network and the infrastructure to nurture the growth of new technology industries. We have invested in telecommunications and computers to make government more efficient, effective, and accessible. We have enacted laws and established policies to ensure fair, public access to public information.

"In this session, we call for investments in our democracy. Investments that will allow us to take government to the people.

"The time for study has passed. Now is the time for action. We have the means and we know the methods to greatly improve public access and public participation in the legislative process.

"This resolution calls for the Legislature to provide direct access to legislative information systems, to establish procedures to accept electronic transmission of testimony, and to implement other procedures to provide free flow of information and full public participation in the process.

"It also calls for the Governor to improve access by providing services such as transmittal of public testimony via facsimile machines and other equipment located in government offices in each of the neighbor islands and by providing public access terminals in all public libraries and public schools, and providing for toll-free telephone access to public services to residents on all islands.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for allowing me to speak in support of this measure. I believe it is an important resolution that really states our claim to our commitment to open government and open participation.

"Thank you."

Representative Hemmings rose to speak against the resolution, stating:

"Concerning House Resolution 306, fulfilling my role as the loyal opposition, Mr. Speaker, which I know you love and appreciate, I see that requesting a language survey of Hawaiian creole English is possibly something we could do but it has been surveyed many times and there's been so much written over the last several years about creole English.

"I would like to suggest that our time and energy could be better spent in trying to help the 154,000 estimated illiterate adults in our society, roughly 19 percent, to learn how to speak English properly so they can pass their exams in schools and to expend more of our time and efforts studying pidgin English is counterproductive to that cause."

Representative Liu then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against the motion.

"Mr. Speaker, on House Resolution 306, Standing Committee Report No. 1603, similar to the Minority Floor Leader's concerns, I share those. I would like a 'no' vote recorded for me on that."

Representative Stegmaier rose to speak in favor of the resolution, with reservations, stating:

"At the risk of being misunderstood, I wish to explain my reservations about this resolution. It asks for a survey to be conducted by the Department of Health with the assistance of the University of Hawaii to determine the number of Hawaii's residents whose primary language is creole English, otherwise known as pidgin.

"During the committee hearing, it became clear to me, in any case, that there wasn't necessarily a connection

between the information that would result from this study and any benefit that could be provided to those who have, as their primary language, the use of Hawaiian creole language.

"I have reservations about this resolution and would oppose it if the intent behind it is to afford the very important purpose of making all the children of Hawaii proficient in standard English. We, in Hawaii, are special because of the unique mix of our people, because of our unique spirit, and our unique cultural mix, and yes, because of our special language which is unique to our islands, termed in this resolution creole English.

"But to meet the challenges of our competitive international economic environment, we must teach our children to be conversant, not only in pidgin, but also in standard English. To do otherwise would be to put our children at a distinct disadvantage in competition for the scarce jobs that will be available in the future. And we shall be relegating a portion of our population -- the ones who can only speak pidgin -- to a greater likelihood of failure and low self-esteem. Let's not perpetuate this disservice to some by indicating to them that it will be okay for them if they are monolingual only in Hawaii creole English.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

"Mr. Speaker, this is my own resolution which I introduced which I am speaking against today. I appreciate the Chairman of the Intergovernmental Relations and International Affairs Committee for moving the resolution but, unfortunately, it does not accomplish the goal that it was originally set out to do. I have been here on several occasions when we discussed financial matters concerning the national budget and deficit spending, and I've heard talk about who is to blame for the national budget deficit and how it is the single biggest problem our country faces.

"Well, here was an opportunity for Hawaii to join 32 other states in calling for a constitutional amendment or a convention to put what we have on this very State, a cap or lid on deficit spending. In other words, the federal government could not pass deficit budgets.

"This resolution, as it was originally proposed, would have gone a long way in sending a very strong signal along with 32 other states to Washington that we would not tolerate deficit spending.

"Unfortunately, after receiving overwhelming favor with testimonies, this resolution was amended to become a strong suggestion and, therefore, I find myself in the ironic position of rising and speaking and voting against my own resolution.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tom rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"I just want to state, Mr. Speaker, that there was overwhelming testimony in favor of the resolution and the Chair agreed with the resolution. However, the testimony also was not clear as to the kinds of variables that would be placed in each of these other states. For example, they couldn't say that all of the resolutions called for a constitutional amendment or called for a convention.

"The Chair felt, in this instance, that although we kept the intent there in the resolution which was to work towards balancing the budget and/or to reduce the deficit, the Chair, however, did not feel that it was necessary to place a hammer at the heads of anybody and say, you do it by a certain time or we're going to do it for you. We felt that the federal level is responsible enough to look at its deficit and to try to do what was necessary without us telling them what to do either by a convention and/or an amendment to the Constitution of the United States. We feel that the message was maintained in this resolution.

I felt very strongly that we would assist the good Representative Hemmings in passing it, and he votes against it, and I just say at this time that we really tried our best to salvage and to maintain the kind of spirit and intent made in the resolution.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Fifty-Sixth Day was approved.

"I was asked how I reconciled the difference between politics and music, and my response is -- it's all show business."

Representative Tom then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, at the risk of being called out of order by our illustrious Floor Leader Representative Apo, may I nevertheless take a chance on what I have to say and make a very unusual and very proud announcement at this time.

"Mr. Speaker, it has always been my understanding that the two most talented artists in this House were you and me. You noticed that I named you first so don't take offense. You and me -- you're the singer and I'm your accompanist. Well, Mr. Speaker, apparently, like political elections that I know a lot about, there was a dark horse.

"And last evening, at the Sheraton Waikiki Hotel, the Hawaii Academy of Recording Arts presented the 1989 Na Hoku Hanohano Awards. Na Hoku Hanohano literally means 'the brightest star.' I guess another way of putting it is, 'striving for the highest.' The Na Hoku Hanohano Awards recognize different categories of talent -- in areas of graphics, for example, Contemporary Hawaiian Album for the Year, Single of the Year, Anthology Album of the Year, Instrumental Album of the Year, and Most Promising Artist of the Year, which award is given to an artist who makes his first recording and is recognized as a future promising talent.

"Peter Apo is that future promising talent. Last evening, the Hawaii Academy of Recording Arts presented the 1989 Na Hoku Hanohano Award for Most Promising Artist of the Year to our colleague, Peter Apo.

"Together, Peter Apo and Del Beasley recorded their first album called, 'Apo and Beasley.' Sounds like a law firm to me but what the heck. It was released early last year which I'm still looking for since I'm sure Peter gave each of us a copy of because I hear that it's selling like hotcakes. I am also told that he has another one forthcoming very soon and I know we're going to have that one too. Notice how elegant Peter dresses these days, how affluent he looks. Let me tell you, it ain't from his legislative pay, buddy!

"Peter has been a musician for many years and from what I am told, he sang folk music in the early '50s and '60s. That tells you his age, right? He sang folk music with a group called 'The Travelers Three.' Anyway, they backed up many known artists throughout the State and all over the United States. Peter is best known as a songwriter. He is also known, of course, as a singer and an accomplished guitarist, and I am told that whenever Peter is frustrated and under stress at the Capitol, he grabs his guitar and he composes beautiful music. So I think to get more beautiful music, keep him under stress, Mr. Speaker.

"Peter, I know that I can speak for the House in congratulating you for your musical talents and striving for the highest as our brightest star."

"They are all women who are professionals or full-time community leaders and they add a lot to our community. I am sure I am missing several people by omission. I am really sorry but I am really proud to be associated with these ladies and we want to congratulate them on their 65th anniversary and may they continue helping the people of Hawaii.

"Mr. Speaker, by having the Minority Floor Leader second the motion and by our agreement at this time to the process, I would like to indicate, however, that we do not, as the Minority, accede to fata comple that all measures are in fact needed or necessary, nor do we accede to any failures of administration boldheadedness or philosophy that in retrospect, on Monday, could cause us some problems, and that we also do not accede to any prolonging of the session unless we do get progress or word of nonprogress concerning this issue, and we hope that going forward this evening and what we may do on Monday does not fail the State in our responsibility to get the job done. We could vote 'no' but in the interest of hopefully making things work, with reservations, we will support the motion.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Apo then rose to speak in support of the motion, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I would just like to acknowledge the cooperation of the Minority Leader and the Minority Floor Leader. . .just to let them know, notwithstanding his remarks, that we do appreciate the cooperation."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried.
