In accordance with the provisions of Section 10 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, the House of Representatives of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, convened at 10:00 o'clock a.m.

The Honorable Daniel J. Kihano, Speaker of the House of Representatives, presided.

At this time, the members of the House, guests, and audience rose to sing the National Anthem and "Hawaii Ponoi" led by Ms. Myra English.

The Chair then appointed Representatives Andrews, Arakaki, Bunda, Bybee, Cachola, Hayes, M. Ige, Say, Tom and Yoshimura to escort Reverend Christopher Eng of the Waipahu United Church of Christ to the rostrum for the invocation.

The Divine Blessing was then invoked by Reverend Christopher Eng.

# GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

Gov. Msg. No. 1, informing the House of the appointment of Noboru Yonamine to fill the vacancy in the State House of Representatives, 44th District, created by the passing of Roland M. Kotani, effective December 29, 1989, and pursuant to Section 17-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, Representative Yonamine's term of office will expire on General Election Day of 1990, was read by the Clerk and placed on file.

The Chair appointed Representatives Hashimoto, Hirayama, D. Ige, Kawakami, Marumoto and Yoshimura to escort Noboru Yonamine to the rostrum.

The Chair then appointed Representatives Baker, Horita, O'Kieffe, Shon, Tajiri, Tam and Taniguchi to escort the Honorable Herman Lum, Chief Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court, to the rostrum to administer the oath of office to Noboru Yonamine.

# OATH OF OFFICE

The Chair called upon Chief Justice Herman Lum who then administered the oath of office to Noboru Yonamine, in accordance with the provisions of Article III, Section 5, of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii.

The Chair appointed Representatives Metcalf, Chairman; Hagino, Vice Chairman; Amaral, Bellinger, Cavasso, Hiraki, Hirono and Peters as a Committee on Credentials.

At 10:28 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

At this time, the members of the House, their guests and audience were entertained by Ms. Jan Kaeo.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 10:40 o'clock a.m.

# SPECIAL COMMITTEE REPORT

Representative Metcalf, for the Committee on Credentials, presented a report (Spec. Com. Rep. No. 1) which was read by the Clerk as follows:

"Honorable Daniel J. Kihano Speaker, House of Representatives Fifteenth State Legislature Regular Session of 1990 State of Hawaii

Sir:

Your Committee on Credentials begs leave to report that it has thoroughly considered the matter of the seating of Noboru Yonamine as a member of the House of Representatives of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii.

Your Committee was referred the communication dated December 29, 1989, from the Governor of the State of Hawaii on the appointment of Noboru Yonamine to fill the vacancy created by the death of the former State Representative Roland M. Kotani. After reviewing the communication of appointment and the qualification of the appointee, your Committee finds the said appointee to be qualified and recommends that Noboru Yonamine be seated as a member of the House of Representatives from the Forty-Fourth Representative District.

Representative Metcalf moved that Special Committee Report No. 1 be adopted, seconded by Representative Hagino and carried.

The Roll was then called showing all members of the House of Representatives present.

At 10:43 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair, to allow the members of

the House, their guests and audience to be entertained by Jerry Santos and Olomana with Frank Hewett's Halau.

Upon reconvening at 11:17 o'clock a.m., the Chair appointed Representatives Anderson, Arakaki, Cachola, Duldulao and Kawakami to escort Vice Speaker Emilio Alcon to join him at the rostrum.

The Chair then delivered his Opening Day remarks, as follows:

"Governor Waihee and Mrs. Waihee, Lieutenant Governor Cayetano and Mrs. Cayetano, Congressman Akaka and Mrs. Akaka, Honorable Mayor Tavares, Chief Justice Lum, honorable colleagues, distinguished guests, friends and fellow citizens -- 'Ano ai ke aloha.

"We stand at the dawn of a new decade.

"And it is indeed a golden moment. The events in eastern Europe in the past few months demonstrate once again, the people's desire for democracy and freedom. It is a reminder that liberty is our greatest treasure.

"Mindful of these historical events and the effect on our world as we know it today, I stand committed to serve you.

"During these historic times, we who serve together in the Fifteenth Legislature must design and place the building blocks that will be the foundation of Hawaii's 21st century.

"The eighties were the decade of politics. Iran-Contra, Americans held as hostages, the savings and loans scandal -- spending billions on defense and cutting social programs, the federal government seemed incapable of meeting the needs of the people. Other people have seen democracy at work and are impressed with our freedom to voice our views in our representative form of government.

"The eighties were the decade of the environment. Our global village faced threats from oil spills, acid rain, a hole in the ozone, and shrinking rain forests. And in Hawaii, we had our own woes from the heptachlor scare, Hurricane Iwa, and sewage spills.

"The eighties were a decade of science and technology. Ten years ago, computers were something seen in movies. Today, we are surrounded by them -- in our offices, in our homes, even in our cars. Superconductors, supercomputers, cold fusion, space stations -- every day brought a new wonder. The Voyager spacecraft sent us pictures of worlds never seen by human beings.

"The eighties were the decade of the Hawaiians. In 1980, the Office of Hawaiian Affairs was established. The Hoku'lea retraced the heroic voyages of the ancient Hawaiian seafarers. And the decade brought the State its first elected Governor of Hawaiian ancestry.

"As we face the 1990's, the last decade before the 21st century, it offers us the promise of a new beginning. What will the new decade bring?

"As times change, so do the needs of the people. In Hawaii, the 1980's were a decade of economic vitality. We began the decade beset by economic woes, and the Legislature was determined to change that. During the decade, we built up Hawaii's economy and economic structure, in quest of both growth and diversification. We expanded our airports, built new highways, created new technology centers, and set in motion the plans for the construction of a convention center and the redevelopment of Honolulu's waterfront. Through those efforts, and with

favorable trends in the world, Hawaii's economy is now progressing.

"But as we enter the 1990's, we face new problems. Now, our society faces a shortage of quality day care programs for the young and the elderly, divorce, drugs, child and spouse abuse, poverty, homelessness, gang warfare, increasing welfare rolls, traffic congestion, and illiteracy.

"And I suggest to you that instead of merely treating the symptoms of these problems, we should remember the wise words of the Hawaiians -- Nana i ke kumu. Look to the source. Let's look at the very basic structure of our society -- the family.

"Both venerated and vulnerable, the family, the most basic of our institutions, is facing unprecedented change. Our families today are of diverse styles and shapes. Only about a quarter of all families now match our idea of the traditional family. The reality of the family is that both parents must work to make ends meet. Little time is left for parents to be with children. The result of families pressed between economic survival and social responsibility is increasing family violence and children who abuse drugs and seek from gangs the nurture they lack at home.

"What we have planned for the coming legislative session reflects a simple but very profound idea--an idea as powerful as any in human history.

"It is the idea of the family.

"It is the idea that our community is built by families. And our community can only be as strong as the families that comprise it.

"It is the idea that all the families in the community are in this together. Regardless of who we are or where we come from -- each of us matters. By working together to help the families, we will create opportunities and enrich ourselves.

"We have a rare opportunity to make changes now that could be meaningful into the next century. We will launch the 1990's with a concerted effort to provide the resources and assistance needed by the families to respond positively to the altered circumstances in which we find ourselves. Just as the barriers of the Berlin Wall has tumbled, so too will the barriers surrounding the families facing poverty, illiteracy, crime, homelessness, sickness, and abuse.

"For the families of the nineties, compassionate innovation is our theme.

"Our 1990 legislative agenda will focus on meeting the needs of the family; ensuring the family's well-being; and improving the family's environment.

"Hawaii has the highest rate of multi-wage earner families and the highest proportion of women in the labor force in the United States. More than two-thirds of Hawaii's mothers work. Thirteen percent of all the single-parent households in Hawaii are headed by women. Children under five make up eight percent of the population. And in a few years, fourteen percent of our population will be 65 and older.

"As a result, families are faced with the dilemma of caring for the needs of the family, both young and the old, and striving to provide for the basic necessities of life. The family of the nineties faces tremendous pressure to survive in today's increasingly competitive and dynamic society.

"One of our first priorities will be to assist the children of working parents. It is estimated that Hawaii has between 31,000 and 45,000 'latchkey' children in need of adult supervision. We will provide affordable and quality after-school programs for elementary school-age children by funding the A+ program. I believe that the A+ program has the potential to enrich and develop our future generations.

"To strengthen the other basic supports for the family, we will expand and improve care giving and caregiver support; develop family support centers throughout the State to provide immediate and continuing programs for the families; and expand the parent network centers.

"A healthy start on life is another key for the family's future. To ensure that all of our children have a healthy beginning, we will provide for a comprehensive perinatal program.

"A safe, decent, and affordable house is the dream of every family. To this end, we have made significant strides with the planned development of our second city in Kapolei. Yet, many families cannot afford this basic necessity of life and remain hopeless and homeless. Without a place to call home, many of our families will suffer long-term negative effects. We will provide the assistance to the homeless to find the needed shelter.

"I remember my 'small kid' days in Waipahu when we left our doors unlocked. Like other plantation towns throughout Hawaii, we personally knew and trusted our neighbors. We didn't have the banks to rely on for loans but we had 'tanomoshi.' We could rely on each other when we needed money.

"Now, we must lock our doors. Federally insured banks and savings and loans now provide the loans we need. Waipahu, like the rest of the communities in Hawaii today, is no longer the small close knit community of yesteryear.

"Along with the growth in our communities, our families have faced new problems. A major problem is drugs. Our communities are plagued by illegal drugs, and the attendant crimes that they proliferate. We have the reputation as the state where 'ice' first gained a toehold. Drugs threaten the very integrity of our family structure.

"To end this strain on our families, we will wage a comprehensive war against drugs by focusing our efforts to rid the financiers, the growers, and the suppliers. We will provide the resources to the prosecutors and the police to combat drugs and youth gangs.

"At the same time, we will provide medical help and other assistance to the drug abusers to become healthy, contributing members of our society.

"We believe that an important aspect of a family's well-being is the family's ability to fulfill their own personal economic needs and aspirations. To help improve the financial status of the family, we will reduce the burden of the personal income tax; increase the food tax credit; increase the minimum wage; and ensure that auto insurance premiums and surcharges are reasonable.

"Our families need to rely on a healthy economy. The dream of every parent is that their child will be better off than they are. We pledge to provide the resources to make that dream a reality.

"To maintain the growth of our economy, we will provide more financial resources to encourage the growth

of promising industries, and encourage the growth of the software and financial services industries.

"At the same time that we provide for the individual needs and well-being of the family, we must strive to better the family's physical environs.

"One of our biggest problems is the traffic. Our traffic congestion is worsening. We need a transportation system which is reliable and will provide a quick and inexpensive means of traveling.

"We will continue to improve our highways by ensuring that we have enough moneys in the State highway fund to meet the current and future construction and maintenance needs.

"However, our transportation problems simply cannot be solved by the State alone. It will require a public/private partnership along with the dedicated commitment of all levels of government to develop viable solutions.

"A concerted effort is needed to provide for a public transit system that will alleviate our current traffic problems. We are prepared at this time to look at the proposals for mass transit. We will seriously consider the counties' ideas for mass transit.

"And at the same time, we will provide the counties with a stable and predictable source of revenues to assist them in meeting their needs.

"Our families need to know that they will continue to have access to the world's greatest natural environment. Our pristine waters, fertile land, and unique flora and fauna surround our families promoting physical and mental well-being.

"To ensure that our families will continue to enjoy their unique heritage, our policy of 'malama 'aina -- caring for the land with a sense of protection and deep respect' will continue.

"We will ensure that our pesticides and hazardous wastes are properly collected and disposed of; include additional land under the protection of our land banking system; and strengthen our enforcement programs to protect our precious natural resources.

"The '80s brought us progress. And I'm very proud of our progress. But I'm even prouder of the way we've made that progress. We talked and worked together with business and labor, educators and students. We shared responsibility and ideas to build the foundations for the future. In the '90s, we will continue this dialogue with the people, but we will use the tools of our new technology to improve public access to legislative information. We will integrate our legislative information systems, and expand the number of legislative access terminals for public use.

"At the same time, we will reaffirm our legislative role as the policy making body responsible for setting the directions and goals as directed by the people of the State of Hawaii.

"In closing, our legacy to the future will be the strengthening of the family. Granted, it will change and continue to be different in the 21st century. By carrying out the proposed agenda, we will be able to say that we provided the resources for the family to survive and grow in the nineties. Our family in the 21st century may be different but it will continue to sustain us and provide us with the love and affection we need.

"A society is the reflection of its families. A family that is harmonious, prosperous, educated and loving will produce a stable, caring, and just community.

"Mahalo."

The Chair recognized Representative Liu, Minority Leader, who then responded:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

"You do me honor by recognizing me for the purpose of addressing this House and our special guests -- the Governor, Mayors, many elected and appointed officials, members of our Judiciary, and most important of all: the people of Hawaii.

"Mr. Speaker, it is that time of year when we stop to catch our breaths and review the twelve months preceding this. Last January, I noted that we had a \$600-million surplus and I asked for a \$400 per person rebate. Well, I was wrong. The surplus turned out to actually be \$749-million and we're getting only a \$125 per person rebate.

"Last January, Republicans asked for a major child care tax credit increase, and child care assistance fund, to promote child care with choice in this State. Instead, we got a minor tax credit increase and a major headache in attempting to deal with a forced Fed program of afterschool care. So it might appear, Mr. Speaker, that what I say here today will fall on deaf ears. But to paraphrase one of Agatha Christie's wise old detective characters, 'I never use people's inability to take good advice as an excuse for not giving it.'

"Mr. Speaker, I believe the best advice we can take is that which comes from those we work for. Instead of superficial commentaries equating favorable ratings of certain politicians to mean that people are happy with the status quo in Hawaii; I say, let's look to other indicators—such as, the series of published surveys showing that 60 percent of Oahu's people do not feel that they are better off now than they were five years ago; that only 48 percent see that their personal life, in five years, will be better than it is today; that the majority of the people feel that life has remained unchanged, will not change, has gotten worse, or will get worse.

"We should be deeply disturbed by this information, Mr. Speaker, for a society cannot solve its problems if its inhabitants lack hope. But the State's leadership for far too many years have ignored these signs, and instead tries to sell the people a sense of false well-being. Well, it is my contention, Mr. Speaker, that the people are not buying it.

"A few hundred, maybe even a few thousand homes in Kapolei, Kealakehe or Lahaina will not solve the crisis we have in housing. A crisis calling for 70,000 new homes, and 36,000 rental units by the year 2000 if we are to meet demand. A crisis because we can barely see 4,000 units being constructed a year. Good luck to the few who get the State's or the County's 'affordable' housing units. But what about the tens of thousands of us who have to deal with an average price for a single family home of \$275,000, \$165,000 for a condominium, or rents of \$1,000 and more a month for mini rooms in the sky? How many people make \$90,000 a year so as to qualify for a mortgage?

"Mr. Speaker, will we continue to ignore that low supply of land and long development processes are the root cause of these outrageous prices? Or will we allow the administration and other selfish interest groups to assert that having only 7.7 percent of our land in residential use is satisfactory? Or allow the State to

support a State Land Use Commission that permits 80 percent or over a million acres of designated agricultural land to remain virtually unused?

Yet, this is exactly what is being perpetuated upon us. It is part of the myth that all is well. It is tied to the myth that change is bad, that change will hurt local residents. Yet, ironically, the very people most hurt by the State's control of land use have been residents. In the guise of preserving a fairy tale past, those in control have created a feeding ground for speculators and soulwrenching uncertainty for the average Hawaii family. We should reorganize our land use priorities and create a new residential use category that will encompass what we now call urban, rural and unused agricultural lands, mandate that the Land Use Commission do this within two years, restructure our tax system to give the counties the ability to pay for needed infrastructure, then let the commission fade into the sunset. Thereafter, let's have confidence in our counties to handle the specific zoning and planning functions. On the other hand, we can let things continue as they have been going and I can hope that voters will make changes for us in November at the polls.

"Mr. Speaker, why do I dwell on this subject? I do so because people in this election year will be confused. They are going to hear talk by the administration that they have been given tax reform and good jobs, that life is good. Yet, on the first and fifteenth of every month, when the rent or mortgage payment is due, people are still going to feel financially stretched and exhausted. They should know today that those feelings are justified; that whatever the increases in pay or benefits they may have received over the last few years, the cost of our housing has eaten, has devoured, all those increases. The majority of people in Hawaii are playing catch-up and it is no fun.

"For many senior citizens, this crisis means higher property taxes, and an inability to qualify for government medical assistance because inflated home prices make them on paper too rich.

"For college students seeking financial aid, this crisis translates into the over valuation of their parents' homes, making it impossible for students to go to the college of their choice.

"For those wanting community-based housing for the homeless and victims of mental health problems, this crisis means that an effective community-based housing plan fairly dispersed throughout the State will remain a dream. How many brothers, sisters, children and grandchildren will have to leave their Hawaii before we change the course?

"Republicans share your concerns, Mr. Speaker, about our entry decade into the next millennium. We feel that those concerns are compounded by what we know is a growing threat from drug use and addiction. We ask serious consideration of our proposal to impress upon teens that drug use is not acceptable behavior. That proposal: If convicted of a drug offense, the minor loses the right to get a driver's license until age 18; or if already with a license, automatic loss of it. Think back to our younger days of all the things one would do or not do to acquire that early symbol of emancipation -- the driver's license.

"We ask, too, that we accept the need to establish guidelines and requirements for drug testing of employees in safety-sensitive jobs and for those who exhibit behavior that can reasonably be linked to drug use. It is time we accept the reality that within the framework of preserving our right to privacy, there is a co-existing right of society and fellow workers to know that public and consumer

safety are not jeopardized by drugs on the workplace. We must give substance to our rhetoric about drugs having bad consequences.

"Consequences, Mr. Speaker, a word that we do not yet know the meaning of relative to our investment contacts with Japan. 'Fear,' 'support,' 'resentment,' 'acceptance' -- all these words could be used to describe our feelings in the '80s towards Japan. But it is time that we be more creative. It is no secret that Americans and Japanese have to do a better job of communicating with each other. We must, since our two countries alone account for 40 percent of the world's gross product. Understanding can start with language. An intriguing idea offered by a recent East-West Center panel member on Japan/U.S. relations in the '90s would have Japan funding language classes throughout the United States to foster learning of Japanese. Such a suggestion on a national scale might rightfully be deemed to be overly ambitious. But I wonder, Mr. Speaker, why not Hawaii as a 'pilot' project? Japan has the capacity to afford it, spending only a third as much as West Germany on education and cultural exchange programs, and only a tenth as much as the United States, and the benefits for both Hawaii, our country and Japan of such a successful program here are simple to see. Hawaii's hope of becoming a real player in the global economy is still a ways off but with work, it is a goal not yet unreachable.

"However, it may be more reachable than achieving true tax reform called for by Hawaii Republicans and the State Tax Review Commission.

"Under our current tax structure, we are likely to generate a \$1.2-billion surplus in 1995. But large surpluses are dangerous, Mr. Speaker, because they tempt politicians to spend and commit to long-term obligations without knowing what the future costs will be. I'd rather let people keep their surplus than do what the Democratic establishment in Hawaii told us to do in 1988, which was to: 'Follow the lead of Michael Dukakis, the Governor of Massachusetts, who through big programs and uncontrolled spending in good times, allowed the Massachusetts miracle to become the Massachusetts mess—a mess that includes an \$800-million deficit and the lowest bond rating in the country.

"Additional issues that will play themselves out in the ensuing weeks, Mr. Speaker -- initiative, mass transit, geothermal energy -- I will leave for others to comment on. And so I close, but it is with a heavy heart because my heart tells me that the very different views of the state of our State expressed by those in power, and, by those left out really reflects a growing gap between haves and have nots. It is reflective of a preoccupation with power rather than the actual results of the use of that power. It reflects a relishing of the game of politics and ambition rather than the building of dreams.

"Thus it is to me, that though it has become popular to dismiss the elections of 1990 and 1992 as mere dress rehearsals for 1994, the elections of this year are, in fact, very crucial to reversing fundamentally flawed policies before it is too late.

"Republicans will not let assumptions about alleged invulnerability of Democratic incumbents go untested. We will not leave the battlefield and sit idly by for five years because the people who want to have their dreams of opportunity live need to have choices today. And we, as House Republicans, Mr. Speaker, promise not to fail them

"Thank you."

The Chair then recognized Representative Okamura, Majority Leader, who responded:

"Mr. Speaker, honored guests, ladies and gentlemen, I speak today in the spirit of unity and shared responsibility for the future of Hawaii.

"With this session, we begin a new decade. A decade which is already filled with the promise of new beginnings, both here in Hawaii and around the world. In the past year, as the Speaker stated, we've seen Eastern Europe and China erupt with a call to freedom and democracy. In our own country, we begin the decade with more Americans experiencing wealth than ever before. In our State of Hawaii, we start this first session of the decade with a healthy economy, the lowest unemployment ever, and a surplus of funds from our tax revenues. But with all this promise and all these riches, there are still a multitude of problems facing us. We are plagued with the issues of the availability of affordable housing, of providing our young with a quality education, and of creating and maintaining a healthy social environment.

"While we enter this decade full of promise, we are also troubled by an undercurrent of powerlessness. It seems that the gap between what that we commit ourselves to do, and what we actually achieve grows wider and wider.

"Today, I beckon all, Democrats and Republicans, to work together to take control of our future.

"These are the three things that are needed:

- "1. Bold and creative ideas and solutions;
- "2. A structure for open participation; and
- "3. A financial investment in our future.

"With the solution of every problem, we create new and more complex problems. There are no simple solutions for the complex problems we now face. The key to closing the gap between our commitments and our actions is bold and creative thinking. I invite all of my colleagues on the floor today, to step outside of set patterns, and to have the courage to take risks and try new approaches. We must take the lessons of the past, rethink them and reshape them, to meet the challenges of the future. This calls for the shedding of our 'sacred cows,' if need be. It calls for us to avoid reactionary 'knee jerk' responses, and to make the legislative process work, to solve the problems we now face.

"A key element which is necessary for us to bridge the gap between commitment and action is dialogue with the public, and increased public participation in our legislative process. This year, for the first time, we have a structure for public participation which allows our citizens to instantly access information regarding any issue being discussed at the Legislature. We must continue to expand our commitment to public involvement and I invite you, the people of Hawaii, to share in the responsibility of forging our future, and helping to solve the problems we face through active involvement in the legislative process.

"Finally, to insure that our commitments become realities, we must make wise and prudent financial decisions. Having a surplus of funds affords us a unique opportunity to make powerful choices for investment in our future. With vision, we have the power to create a healthier and more prosperous Hawaii for all Hawaii's people, and for the generations to come. We have the financial power to solve many of Hawaii's present ills and avoid many of the problems the future might hold in

store. If we can wrest action from our commitments, these dreams for Hawaii can be realities.

"Mr. Speaker, today I invite everyone, all of Hawaii, Democrats and Republicans, business and labor, young and old, newcomers and life-long residents alike to join in the shaping of our collective future — for ourselves and for generations to come. I invite you all to work together in the spirit of community, democracy and cooperation to make our dreams reality, and our commitments action.

"Mr. Speaker, let us begin.

"Thank you."

## INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 1 and 2) and concurrent resolution (H.C.R. No. 1) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

A resolution (H.R. No. 1) to inform the Senate that the House of Representatives of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, has assembled and is ready to transact business with the following officers: Daniel J. Kihano, Speaker; Emilio S. Alcon, Vice Speaker; Gerald I. Miyoshi, Chief Clerk; Charles Y. Tomisato, Assistant Clerk; Kevin M. Ebata, Sergeant-at-Arms; and Frank Y. Arakaki, Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms, was offered by Representative Kihano.

#### INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

At 9:45 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 9:46 o'clock a.m.

At 9:47 o'clock a.m., the House of Representatives stood in recess, subject to the call of the Chair, to meet in Joint Session with the Senate, in accordance with House Concurrent Resolution No. 1, to receive the Governor's State-of-the-State address.

## JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives was called to order at 10:10 o'clock a.m. by the Honorable Daniel Kihano, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

At this time, the Speaker welcomed and introduced the following distinguished guests to the members of the Fifteenth Legislature:

The First Lady of the State of Hawaii, Mrs. Lynne Waihee.

First Lady of the House of Representatives, Mrs. JoAnn Kihano.

Congressman Daniel Akaka and Mrs. Akaka.

Lieutenant Governor Benjamin Cayetano and Mrs. Cayetano.

Chief Justice Herman Lum; former Governor of the State of Hawaii, William F. Quinn; Mr. Joshua Agsalud, Administrative Director to the Governor.

Mrs. Mary Waihee, mother of Governor Waihee, and Mrs. Matsue Kobashigawa, mother of Lynne Waihee.

Consul Herman Mulder, Dean of the Consular Corps in Hawaii; Consul General Daniel Droulers of France; Consul General Masaji Takahashi from Japan.

Rear Admiral William P. Kovalesky, Commander of the Fourteenth Coast Guard District; Rear Admiral Edwin Kohn, representing Admiral David Jeremiah, Commander-in-Chief of the Pacific Fleet; Major General Eugene Renzi, representing Admiral Hardisty, Commander-in-Chief of the Pacific.

Jeremy Harris representing Mayor Frank Fasi of the City and County of Honolulu.

The Chair appointed Representatives Emilio Alcon, Tom Okamura and Michael Liu, and Senators Gerald Hagino, Russell Blair and Mary George to escort the Honorable John D. Waihee, Governor of the State of Hawaii, to the rostrum.

The Speaker then invited Lieutenant Governor Benjamin Cayetano to join him at the rostrum and appointed Representatives Okamura and Hemmings to escort Lieutenant Governor Cayetano to the rostrum.

Representative Amaral presented Governor Waihee with a maile/ilima lei on behalf of the Senate and the House of Representatives.

The Speaker then presented to the members of the Fifteenth Legislature and guests, the Honorable John D. Waihee, stating:

"Members of the House and Senate, ladies and gentlemen, I present to you the Governor of the State of Hawaii, John Waihee."

The Governor addressed the Joint Session, stating:

"Thank you.

"President Wong, Speaker Kihano, members of the Fifteenth Legislature, honored guests, ladies and gentlemen, Aloha.

"With three years of new agendas, new actions and new partnerships behind us, let me begin by acknowledging you, the first among my partners, the Hawaii State Legislature. We have come a long way together since I first appeared before you.

"Today we gather together at the beginning of the last decade of the 20th century. We find ourselves in an era of unprecedented change. Just when we thought that the cold war would never end, walls of totalitarianism came tumbling down and we can see the faint shape of peace on the horizon. Just when we were defining our role in the Pacific century, scholars, who would have never suggested it at the beginning of the last decade, are talking about the re-emergence of Europe and the potential for a global economic and cultural renaissance.

"I believe the decade ahead will continue to confound our expectations. The challenges before us share two key characteristics. First, neither the public nor private sector can do it alone. Second, we begin to do what we dream we can do when we break loose from the old mindsets.

"Like many of you, I am a product of the sixties, facing the nineties knowing it is our turn to lead. The sixties come to mind because they were the last time when we as a nation believed we could control and shape our future. It was a time when no problem was too great, when we reached for the moon and we made it, and when, most importantly, we believed in ourselves.

"Well, I do not propose going back to the sixties any more than I would suggest that we cling to the 80's. It is not time to turn back the clock. It is time to wind it. It is time to reaffirm our belief in ourselves, and take charge of the 90's. We know we can do it.

"Remember the 1986 television commercial showing a deserted Bishop Street with trash blowing in the wind? The message: If Hawaii did not improve its business climate, that was our future.

"The naysayers said we would never improve our business climate. Well, the hard-working people and businesses of Hawaii, supported by an active State government, buried that 'never.'

"We rose from America's 34th worst business climate to the 12th best as ranked by **INC.** magazine.

"We extended tax relief to Hawaii's businesses: Abolishing the tax on exports, exempting certain business transactions and providing a capital goods excise tax credit. In the aggregate, our businesses received \$55-million in tax relief over the past three years.

"During this administration, approximately 50,300 new jobs were created at an average of 16,700 jobs per year or roughly 50 new jobs every day.

"And we can boast of having the lowest unemployment rate in the nation

"Are we satisfied? No. These successes have given us new possibilities to support Hawaii's businesses and expand economic opportunities for our people.

"Because we've reduced the number of workers collecting unemployment insurance by 65 percent since 1985, today we can reduce the burden of the unemployment insurance tax on Hawaii's employers, so that they may continue to prosper and grow.

"This session, I will submit to you a proposal to cut business costs for unemployment insurance. Through existing and proposed reductions, we will save employers \$124-million by the end of 1991.

"I also propose that beginning in 1991, \$6-million, or 4.8 percent of the business savings, be reinvested in a

training fund to help our people meet the skill demands of the future.

"It's time to change a system that collects more money than it needs and sends it to sit in a reserve fund controlled by the Federal government. Let's bring the money back home, for the benefit of businesses and workers.

"We have prospered in the last few years because the twin pillars of our economy --tourism and construction -- are doing well. These businesses need and deserve our continued support, and I ask you for it.

"Likewise, we must continue and strengthen our efforts to diversifty our economy to avoid being overly dependent on any single industry and to give our people choice in employment. We need your support to develop new industries for Hawaii's future such as the use of space for peaceful commerce and to promote Hawaii as a good place for new types of industry to do business.

"Hawaii has attracted substantial amounts of capital investment in recent years. While such investments have contributed to our economic growth, they have not contributed as much to the diversification of our economy. Unfortunately, most investment has occurred in the resort and travel industry.

"I am convinced that it will take more than promotion or incentives to change this investment pattern. Stronger action is needed if we are going to gain better control over our economic future. Accordingly, I have asked the Office of State Planning to prepare a policy for consideration by the Land Use Commission that will require creation of one non-tourism related job for every hotel room approved in future resort developments.

"In the meantime, a growing number of community-based enterprises are springing up across the State. They are being developed by entrepreneurs who may not fit the normal business mode. These enterprises share the following characteristics: They are locally based; they are people oriented, interested not only in profits but community concerns; and, they are developed to provide economic independence and real choices.

"One example is the Opelu Project on the Waianae Coast which will develop small-scale, backyard aquaculture. The fish raised will first feed the families who grow them, then meet commmunity produce needs, and finally be sold on the open market.

"I propose that we (1) support the Opelu Project as a prototype of community-based development; and create a fund in the Department of Business and Economic Development with its own advisory board to provide grants and low interest loans to other community-based enterprises.

"Two years ago you supported us in our goal to secure 61,000 new affordable homes by the year 2000. The plan was to encourage the private sector to develop 41,000 units and have the remaining 20,000 built by joint ventures between government and private developers. Obviously, this called for a strong public/private partnership.

"Well, how are we doing? We are ahead of schedule. Judge for yourselves.

"We challenged developers to a goal of 60 percent affordable homes in all new housing development that came before the Land Use Commission, and we were ballyhooed as dreamers. Well, dreams will come true for 20,000 families when they move into the affordable homes

approved since we set those goals. The developers will bury 'never' under foundations, four walls, and the future of our families.

"I'd love to be able to tell you today that I'm ordering the State Land Use Commission to move more quickly on classifying lands for housing on Oahu.

"I can't, because the Commission has opened up as much land for housing in three years as was opened altogether in the prior ten.

"I can't, because we already called for 60 percent affordable goals. In fact, we made 60 percent affordable, 100 percent acceptable.

"I can't, because every request for new housing on Oahu has been acted upon, and today there are none before the Commission. There is no bottleneck with the State; there is not even a bottle.

"And to those who said for 20 years, there will never be a second city on Oahu, I say, come with me to Kapolei and see tomorrow being built. The day of delay is over.

"Three years ago, we built 300 homes. This year, there are 4,600 State-supported housing units under construction across Hawaii. From self-help housing in Milolii, to \$89,000 homes in Waiehu, to senior citizen housing on Oahu.

"And there is more to come. For example, we are now working with the city to develop new urban rental housing for families and elderly on the city land that now houses the Police Department and the State land that houses the Department of Agriculture. What better place for our seniors to enjoy life than on Young Street.

"We must continue our bold battle on the cost of housing; and so we are requesting \$50-million for the home revolving fund.

"We must accelerate construction of family rental units, elderly housing and projects for the homeless. Thus, our housing package includes \$100-million in revenue bonds to finance rental housing construction, \$15-million for the rental assistance program and sizable requests for the disadvantaged and the homeless.

"When it came to education, we made a commitment to our children by negotiating two contracts which will increase a starting teacher's salary by 50 percent, by opening over one hundred parent networking centers, and creating a new school superfund to provide \$800-million over seven years for new school facilities.

"The critics said you can raise teachers' salaries and fix the schools, but you will never change the system. Well, never say 'never' to a united business, labor and school community. They responded with historic school reform.

"Last year, I shared a vision of entering the 21st century with a public education system that is second to none. I delineated a ten-year program to achieve it, because education is no passing fad or fancy. It must be the top priority of our decade.

"We envisioned a future in which local school communities would have charge of almost all budgeting, setting of programs and priorities, and increased involvement in staffing. We determined that the sooner schools are in charge of their own affairs, the sooner we would see great progress.

"We envisioned State-established and result-oriented performance standards to measure progress along the way and to hold schools accountable. Setting clear goals is the difference between children who can grow up and compete in this world, and children who can't.

"Today we all have a twin responsibility -- to help public education and to insist on excellence. Hawaii can be proud of the way the Board of Education and the Department of Education have begun to implement this vision. But we have a long way to go and tough decisions to make.

"This legislative session, I call on you to focus on the progress and problems of school/community based management, the pressing need to set performance standards, and actions for the second year of restructuring.

"Our teachers: Creative, talented and energetic, they spark the classroom experience. I ask you to consider mechanisms for applying professional standards to ensure quality teaching.

"We must also support continued improvements at the University of Hawaii College of Education to help address the teacher shortage, with attention to neighbor island programs where need is greatest.

"We have established our vision of the University of Hawaii as the premier university of the Pacific. President Simone tells me that we are now among the top two percent of universities in America.

"Your support has given us a University library which, on the basis of its depth, ranks 46th out of 3,500 in America. We are leading the nation with a new school for Hawaiian, Asian and Pacific studies and a new school of ocean, earth science and technology.

"We have opportunities for home-grown greatness. Greatness like we see in Jacqueline Chun, a Manoa junior, just named to **USA TODAY**'s top twenty All-USA Academic Team. Jacqueline has a 3.9 academic average and sings in fifteen different languages.

"Our University is becoming a great place to help solve Hawaii's problems. As a result of your support for the nursing program, we will double the number of U.H. nursing graduates by 1992. And I applaud our State departments for their partnership with the University in creating the accelerated Master of Social Work Program, serving 27 State social workers.

"And so does Leo Dean, a State social worker, who wrote Director of Human Services Winona Rubin and said, 'Thank you for the opportunity to further my education, enhance my social work skills, and also in so doing, be able to provide better service to our clients.'

"In addition to our ongoing capital improvement projects throughout the University system, I request special support for students and faculty.

"I ask for your funding of a number of programs at the University of Hawaii designed to support minority and disadvantaged students. For example, Operation Kua'ana, which seeks to recruit Hawaiian students in the University system.

"I also propose the creation of the Hawaii opportunity program in Hawaii -- Project Hope -- to support members of Hawaiian, Filipino and other groups whose numbers in our island society are not comparably represented on the campus of the University of Hawaii. Our State will be the

poorer if we neglect the opportunity to involve everyone in the educational mainstream that leads to accomplishment.

"To do this, I request the set-aside of \$7-million a year from tuition fees for the next decade to form a \$100-million endowment for a scholarship and support fund for such students.

"And for the faculty I say, let's send them a strong message of encouragement with immediate action on their pay bill.

"Let's continue our University building program. Let's renovate, innovate and educate. The premier university of the Pacific will bind us and build our tomorrow.

"Today, I propose tax reform on the top of tax reform. This Legislature has been the first since statehood to pass meaningful tax relief. You've done it for three years in a row. Let's go for four.

"Our tax relief has taken over 32,000 taxpayers off the rolls since 1986. They paid then, but they don't pay now.

"Our tax relief over the last three years took \$380-million from the State treasury and put it in the wallets of Hawaii's taxpayers and Hawaii's businesses.

"Our tax relief and tax rebate returned almost half a billion dollars to households and businesses over the last three years.

"Our tax relief means that a typical family of four earning between \$40,000 and \$50,000 a year today is paying 24 percent less than they would have without tax reform.

"Have we given relief? You bet.

"Should we stop now? No way. Not when batting four for four will help our people.

"This year, we propose \$40-million worth of additional tax relief. We will reduce the top rate from ten to nine percent, reduce the number of brackets from eight to four, increase the standard deduction, and make the food tax credit permanent.

"The total tax relief over four years will be \$520-million to taxpayers and businesses. Our typical family of four would enjoy a total of \$902 in lower taxes, or a reduction of 39 percent from what they would have paid without relief.

"Traffic Gridlock. Bumper to bumper frustration from Lihue to Kona. Now that's a problem skeptics are saying we will never beat.

"Well, let's prove them wrong. We have already started.

"For example, we have constructed the Hanamaulu-Ahukini cutoff road on Kauai, widened Honoapiilani Highway on Maui and made improvements to the Belt Highway on the Big Island.

"On Oahu, H-3 is rapidly being built after years of stalemate. Just last month, a number of us walked through the Koolaus in the new exploratory tunnel joining the windward and leeward sides of the highway. I have no doubt that we will complete construction on target by 1994.

"However, we all know that more needs to be done.

"First, the old formula of using State monies to match limited federal funds is just not sufficient. Federal highway funding programs are being held hostage to the deficit problems created by the national fiscal policies of the 80's.

"It's clear, if our people are going to get relief, we need to take control and not let our highway construction needs be dictated by the ambiguities of federal funding levels. So today, I propose that we speed up State highway construction by transferring \$80-million in general and capital improvement funds to the highway special fund. This will allow us to expedite the Haleiwa Bypass Highway, the Haleakala-Pukalani Highway improvements, the Kalanianaole Corridor and other needed highway construction.

"Second, we have got to move ahead on rapid transit. Building highways alone is simply not enough. We need transportation alternatives to the automobile.

"In 1987, shortly after taking office, I met with members of the city administration, at their request, to discuss the development of rapid transit on Oahu. Since then, our staff from the Department of Transportation has been working with their city counterparts on this issue.

"Now, my friends, we are at a critical juncture. Either we are going to take the bold steps necessary to make rapid transit a reality or concede victory to those who say it will never be done.

"It does not take a genius to know that the city will not be able to develop and construct a rapid transit system by itelf. They must have our support.

"I know that there are those who will immediately say, but can the city answer all of our questions? Fine, hold all the necessary hearings and ask them; but let's face it, there are some points that can only be answered in the process of development and those should not be used as excuses for delay.

"There are others concerned about cost, and rightly so. But we need to come to grips with the fact that there are no inexpensive rapid transit solutions. Furthermore, the city is not, on this occasion, asking for funds. They are asking for the authority to raise funds.

"Shortly, I will submit for your consideration an administration measure, jointly developed with the City and County of Honolulu with the input from our neighbor island counties, that gives the counties the authority to impose a 1/2 percent excise tax for a period of ten years. The proposed measure will also provide for further legislative review in 1991.

"On Oahu, the proceeds from the 1/2 percent county excise tax will be used to fund rapid transit development and construction.

"Third, our neighbor island counties have not been immune from the problems of traffic congestion and the 1/2 percent county excise tax may be used to meet their transportation needs as well as provide funds for other infrastructure such as sewage disposal, water development and parks.

"We all value the principle that government must be accountable to the people. Let's put that value into action in new ways.

"I have proposed giving the counties new revenues and new taxing power; because if they are spending the people's money, then they ought to be raising it. Last year, I became the first Governor in this State's history to propose shifting new taxing authority to the counties. I return with a proposal to give the transient accommodations tax -- all revenue and authority -- to the counties

"If you think that the issue is just money, you are missing the point. The issue is accountability, as basic as the principle of no taxation without representation. Now you may believe that there is a better source of revenue for this reform, and that is grist for the mill. But don't leave the essential principle behind.

"I also propose a phased-in transfer of the mauka portion of the Kakaako to the city. The Legislature wisely established the Hawaii Community Development Authority and designated Kakaako for development. We have done our job. We have successful urban renewal. And we've primed the pump. City tax revenues from the area increased by \$3-million and will double over the next four years. We should move on to our new priority, the waterfront.

"I suppose the two most commonly asked questions between people are: 'How's the job?' And 'How's your family?' We must change mindsets in the 90's by asking and answering these questions as one. Because, from the standpoint of the workforce alone, the betterment of our families is essential to the success of our businesses. Human service is no more the single domain of government than economic development is purely a function of the private sector.

"The feeling of family must be more than a matter of bloodline. It extends from the fireplace to the workplace, from the living room to the school room.

"That is the family of Hawaii. And the family of Hawaii controls the future of Hawaii.

"This session we propose the following actions for families:

"First, after-school care. Let me read a part of what Linda Mosher, a Kailua mom with two children at Keolu Elementary School, wrote us:

'Full-time care has become unaffordable for me now. My only other alternative if I remain working, will be for my children to take the city bus home and remain indoors until my arrival. I consider myself a conscientious, caring mother. The stress and conflict I experience just considering this solution is immense. Children become isolated in their own homes, and parents experience daily anxiety as a result of economic pressures....the A+Program offers parents and children a realistic solution to a need too long ignored. I believe this program could have a long lasting effect on Hawaii's families, especially for our children.'

"For Linda Mosher, Febrary 5, 1990, will be a big day. With your support, the A+ Program will begin. Nearly 19,000 students have applied, and we will serve all 170 public elementary schools.

"It will be the first statewide afterschool program in the nation. The need is real and deep. About 44 percent of our A+ children come from families earning less than \$30,000 a year. Nearly 27 percent come from single parent families, most of whom are working women. We will offer a high quality program, which compliments the regular school program, with about 87 percent of the site coordinators being principals or teachers who already come from the schools.

"I thank Senate President Wong and House Speaker Kihano for their strong words of support for A+, as do Lieutenant Governor Cayetano and our child care subcabinet. I ask you to consider A+ with an eye to helping all on a permanent basis.

"Second, for families, we ask for your continued support of the nation's first universal health care access program, which is well on its way to full implementation this Spring. We want early treatment when people need it, not expensive catastrophic care when it's too late. Public support for entry to the existing, excellent private health care system is what we seek. It's a matter of human dignity and common sense.

"Third, our families need protection from the menace of substance abuse. No family should have to worry about the threat of a drunken driver when they are taking a Sunday drive, nor should they have their homes invaded by drug-crazed criminals.

"In the last three years we created a statewide narcotics task force to focus on drug interdiction. The Attorney General led a law enforcement coalition to improve statewide planning in all law enforcement areas. We've enacted an asset forfeiture law, stiffer penalties for drug possession and production, an anti-drug paraphernalia measure, and drug-free school zones. This session, we will ask for your help in establishing weapon-free school zones.

"We must also end the carnage on the highways. A car is a vehicle, not a weapon. To keep it that way, I ask you to support the law enforcement coalition's call for administrative revocation of the licenses of drunk drivers. The time has come to take control of our own lives by taking the steering wheel out of the hands of those who aren't in control of theirs.

"Substance abuse must be fought on the fronts of enforcement, prevention and treatment. Unfortunately, the President's war on drugs falls short on funding for prevention and treatment. I recommend we fill the gap with a package for front-line action which gives the highest priorities to mothers and babies, to adolescents, and the training of substance abuse counselors.

"Fourth, I stated two years ago that creating dependence is not a compassionate act. You agreed and created 'Project Success.' Our record is one of creating independence, with welfare rolls down 13 percent over five years. Those aren't just statistics. Those are over four thousand families who now have real hope, and whose lives are being made better. We must continue to help people shape productive lives through the new 'Jobs' program.

"Fifth, in cooperation with the Aloha United Way, we are breaking down the informational barriers which prevent families from getting the help they need. Soon, statewide and at no charge, people will be able to get information about human services by simply dialing ASK-2000. This is a true breakthrough in public access.

"Sixth, we are accelerating action for Hawaiian families. That means completing construction of 450 homes on Hawaiian Homesteads over the next twelve months and providing infrastructure for 1,300 new lots over the next three years. It means challenging the Federal government to a joint commitment for housing. Thus, it pleases me to announce that for the first time in history, the Federal government is granting money, 1.2 million dollars, to the Department of Hawaiian Homes for infrastructure. Mahalo, Senator Inouye and our congressional delegation.

"We've got a challenging State and federal agenda ahead. There will be measures dealing with such long-standing issues as the extension of homestead leases beyond 99 years and the taxation of Hawaiian home lands. On the federal level, the State will pursue eligibility for housing, community development and loan programs, and seek compensation and land for illegal executive orders as identified in the Federal/State task force report. And I have directed the Attorney General to work out the incomplete business started with the cancellation of executive orders on State land exchanges.

"We will also perpetuate Hawaii's history by expanding the State's historic preservation office from a section to a separate division with new funding.

"Finally, as I have said before, we cannot avoid the tough issue of clarifying how much revenue is due the Office of Hawaiian Affairs from the ceded land trust. While our negotiations are still in progress, I am optimistic that we will be ready to present a proposal to the Legislature this session.

"There are changes we must make and there are values which we will not leave behind.

"One such value is captured in the word 'Kama'aina.' As Kama'aina, we are all stewards of our land.

"Today, I propose the following actions to protect our land:

"First, I propose a tougher environmental emergency response law to protect every living thing from the harm of oil or chemical spills. Parties who cause spills must be held responsible for reporting them and for the cost of clean-up.

"Second, I propose tougher curbs on land speculation. To us, land is far more than a trading commodity.

"So I propose a use-it-or-lose-it zoning law. When land is approved for development, it ought to be developed. But too often, vacant land with State land use designation and county zoning sits idle as owners speculate. I say no more waiting for one more turn of the wheel of fortune. The Land Use Commission must be given the power to void a boundary amendment if the owner is simply speculating.

"Similarly, it is also time to start calling a golf course a golf course. Thus, we will submit legislation to remove golf course development as a permitted use on agricultural lands.

"Third, we launched a bold land-banking program last session, and I ask you today to renew the investment in our natural and historic legacy with an additional pledge of \$20-million.

"Fourth, there are lands which are threatened which we must protect.

"It can be captured in a phrase: Save He'eia. Save He'eia. The He'eia wetlands are not only a natural treasure but they define us as a community.

"We are not Oahu without He'eia. It tells us where the windward side meets the North Shore and where the city becomes country. Simply viewing it is a blessing. If we lose He'eia today, we lose a part of ourselves forever.

"Also, with your support, we will take seven miles of public and private lands from Mahai'ula to Kua Bay in Kona and protect them as a shoreline wilderness park.

"We won't lose it to development. We will save the seven miles -- for the wildlife, for the generations, and forever.

"So here we are, beginning a new decade which will end in a new century. We face the challenges unshackled from rusty mindsets, as partners in a shared destiny.

"In the year 2000, there will be new leaders, reflecting back as they toast the turn of time.

"I hope that they will say about us:

"We challenged the status quo, tested the system and won.

"We tackled the tough questions, made the hard decisions and took the heat.

"We strengthened our economy and our families, met the housing crisis and reformed our schools, using not so much the strength of government but the values, talent and energy of the people we represent.

"We didn't fear differences...not in people nor in opinions. We welcomed them and we were better for them. We were many and yet one.

"We buried 'never' every time it got between the people of Hawaii and their aspirations.

"My friends, it is time to end talk of rising to the occasion. This is the occasion. Our decade. Our time. Our turn. Let's go.

"Mahalo."

Senate President Wong then rose and stated:

"Thank you very much, Governor. Thank you for sharing with us some of your thoughts on what issues confront Hawaii at the beginning of the new decade. In particular, I want to thank you for giving us a status account of your past three years in office which was, with some bias, outstanding.

"On a real, more personal note, Governor, I have been here for a long, long time. To some people maybe too long. I have heard a lot of phrases put in state of the state speeches and I must say I like your evaluation of the past three years. I also like your idea that the job has to be done with all the members of the community, including the City and County of Honolulu as well as the Legislature working together cooperatively, and for that I commend you.

"If there be no further business, I declare this Joint Session adjourned."

At 11:01 o'clock a.m., the President declared the Joint Session adjourned.

"Mrs. Kotake was the English teacher of my daughter, Kammy Lee, Class of 1986, Mililani High School. She was an excellent teacher, working with her students and Kammy during and after school hours. She instilled in them a love for literature and a devotion to learning which have stood my daughter in good stead at the University of Washington. Mrs. Kotake is highly regarded by her students, her peers, and by parents like myself.

"Mrs. Kotake is Hawaii's 1990 Teacher of the Year but, personally, I consider her the Teacher of the Year for the year my daughter Kammy had her; this year for my son, Thomas, who is in her class, and for many years to come for students at Mililani High School."

Representative Lee then asked the following honorees to stand to be recognized: Mrs. Alice Kotake; her 88-year old father, Mr. Torajiro Sato; Mr. Richard Kotake, her husband; and Mrs. Harriet Yano, her sister.

And as I had discussed with you prior to session, in the Congress, I would like to point out to the members that they have what they call a two-minute rule where, prior to session, you actually convene and any member may get up and say anything they want to, refer to anybody they want to. The only exception is that you cannot talk about each other or members of the other House and, hopefully, we will consider loosening up a little bit because our rules are a bit restrictive and there are members who would like to voice opinions or bring up issues that may not be a matter in terms of an agenda item that day.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Metcalf then rose and remarked:

"Mr. Speaker, I would note that the other chamber follow similar rules except that they do not restrict themselves to comments about members in the other House, so perhaps Representative Bybee would like to run for the Senate."

The Chair stated:

"Representative Stegmaier, I hope that clarifies your mind as to the recess that was called to explain this to Representative Bybee."

"Yes, Mr. Speaker. Thank you."

The House of Representatives of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, convened at 11:00 o'clock a.m., with the Vice Speaker presiding.

#### ORDER OF THE DAY

### INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 12 to 14) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

H.R. No. 12, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION EXTENDING CONGRATULATIONS TO CAL LEE, HEAD COACH OF THE ST. LOUIS HIGH SCHOOL CRUSADERS FOOTBALL TEAM," was jointly offered by Representatives Leong, Hirayama, Lee and Say.

On motion by Representative Leong, seconded by Representative Hirayama and carried, H.R. No. 12 was adopted.

Representative Leong then rose and proceeded to introduce the honoree, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and fellow colleagues, I rise to speak in favor of this resolution to Mr. Cal Lee, 1989 All-State Football Coach of the Year.

"It is hard to believe that Cal is not an alumnus of St. Louis High School, but his brothers were, and we are indeed fortunate to have him at St. Louis as a teacher and coach.

"From the 'razzle dazzle' debut in 1891 of football, great names of St. Lous all-stars bring back memories. Friends and classmates of mine, like the 'Black Grange" Hiram Kaakua nicknamed after college great Harold 'Red' Grange of Illinois, to the high-scoring prolific such as Abe Dung, to the forties of Hilo-born Herman 'Squirming' Wedemeyer, St. Louis has had its share of all-stars whom we are all very proud of.

"One name whose name will be emblazoned and etched in marble at St. Louis will be Coach Cal Lee. From very humble beginnings, he has blazed a trail that few coaches throughout the nation may ever accomplish in their lifetimes. Coach Lee is the architect/force of a major powerhouse that has won 54 consecutive games and four consecutive Prep Bowls. He and his teams have made a major impact in high school football for Hawaii because of St. Louis High School's ranking of being in the top 25 high school teams in the nation. To have this ranking exemplifies the quality and character of all prep high schools throughout this State and that Hawaii is a major player in prep football.

"What is his strategy in accomplishing these goals? Hard defense is Cal Lee's trademark and the backbone of the Crusaders championship teams although the run-andshoot offense made the headlines. A statement he made on November 27, 1987 in a Prep Bowl win over Waianae shows his modesty, quietness and understanding of the game in Hawaii. I quote: 'I don't think one game can justify saying who's the toughest league or that one league is better than the other.' This statement conveyed his sportsmanship and understanding of the game.

"Mr. Cal Lee, best wishes in your future football career as a coach, may it someday be in the college or professional level. And one last comment -- keep the winning tradition in the 90's!

"Mr. Speaker, at this time, I would like to introduce Mr. Cal Lee, 1989 All-State Coach of the Year and his players."

Representative Leong then asked Mr. Cal Lee, 1989 All-State Coach of the Year; Tupu Alualu, All-State running back; Selila Malepeai, All-State defensive lineman; and Kalei Kaanoi, All-State Defensive Player of the Year, to stand to be recognized.

Representative Leong continued his remarks, saying:

"My years at St. Louis, starting from River Street to the heights of Kaleipohaku, I think I remember seeing my high school team win two championships, and that was during the reign of the great running back, 'Black Grange' Hiram Kaakua."

Representative Horita then rose to introduce the honorees, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and honorable members of this body, it has been said that to experience and understand art, dance and music of a people is to experience and understand the people, for therein lies their essence.

"Today, we are fortunate to have with us four talented honorees who have given our community the opportunity to experience the beauty and intricacy of an Asian theatre art form -- Beijing Opera.

"The first honoree, Dr. Elizabeth Wichman, is our professor of Asian theatre at the University of Hawaii-Manoa. Dr. Wichman has shared her knowledge with the people of Hawaii through the lectures, workshops and her

highly acclaimed productions of Chinese theatre. She has received international recognition for being the first American performer to act in a Beijing Opera production in Chinese. She has also led the first American student touring group in an English language production of Beijing Opera throughout the People's Republic of China.

"The next three honorees, Madam Shen Xiaomei, Mr. Shen Fuqing, and Mr. Zhu Hongfa are currently principal instructors for the University of Hawaii's 1989-1990 Beijing Opera resident training program and production. They are all superbly accomplished practitioners of Beijing Opera and delighted Honolulu audiences with their broad range of acting and musical skills last September at the Honolulu Academy of Arts. They have been preparing a production of Yu Tangchun, The Jade Hall of Spring, scheduled to be performed at Kennedy Theatre next month by University of Hawaii students.

"Mr. Speaker, it was said that Hawaii will someday be the bridge to Asia. Our proximity and the economic ties now being forged give us a decided advantage, but an understanding and awareness of cultural aspects should not be ignored or forgotten. This is crucial, if we are to establish permanent relationships in the future. Our honorees are being recognized today, not only for their contributions to Asian theatre and Beijing Opera, but for providing us the opportunity to take another step towards understanding China and her people.

"Mr. Speaker, members, it is an honor and a pleasure to introduce to you Dr. Elizabeth Wichman, Madam Shen Xiaomei, Mr. Shen Fuqing and Mr. Zhu Hongfa."

Representative Horita then asked the honorees to stand to be recognized. Accompanying the honorees were Dean Robert Hines and Dr. Roger Long.

Floral leis and certified copies of the resolution were presented to the honorees by Representatives Lee, Baker, Taniguchi, Horita, Amaral and Hashimoto.

At 11:29 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:35 o'clock a.m.

### STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT

Representative Tam, for the Committee on Education, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3-90) recommending that H.B. No. 2137, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Tam moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2137, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Lee.

Representative Anderson then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I have some reservations about the bill, and I would like to vote for it but I would like to apologize to the chairman -- I was at his meeting the other day and I had to leave.

"Part of my concerns, Mr. Speaker, are in the liability area. There are also the rights of the teachers that are in a particular room and if they are going to share it. Does that mean that they have to lock up their own personal things, or just how are we going to handle that? I wasn't sure about the full extent of what we're going to do in case it raises the cost. I know because I have checked

that we are going to provide a snack for these children. Being a grandfather, I know my own grandson comes home after school and he's hungry. I understand that's one of the reasons that the cost has escalated.

"However, I have the operations and financial audit of the school food services and if I understand correctly, if a person cannot afford the \$23, they then would have that waivered and I'm not sure if the provision is in that \$5,600,000. But in this audit report, the free lunches and the reduced prices are over the 14,000 students. It comes out to \$6,900,000, and I'm not sure if that is reflected in here.

"We have in 1972 passed a law where we could put a program such as this into place but, Mr. Speaker, what I'm wondering about is, if it has been on the books since 1972 that we could have done this, then we should have had more input from the public. We should have had a better idea on what we're going to do if a family qualifies under this provision and their children go to a private school. What happens then if I am renting a house and decide to buy a home and send my children to a public school? I'm still a taxpayer just the way they are and, somehow, they can't come in here.

"We're also providing, Mr. Speaker, a program that allows a single parent to get job opportunities, but yet she can't qualify under this provision. She has got to go out to find a job and she can't really qualify for this until she finds herself a job, and I find that a little hard to take, Mr. Speaker.

"And also, Mr. Speaker, I don't know if there's anything else, but I would hope that the chairman could look into it later. If this is a pilot program, do we, in fact, have a policy or a way to see if this program is going to be beneficial enough? I have seen nothing that we are going to have any regulation to say, yes, this is a good program because it is taking care of x number of children we've been able to do this. There's got to be some kind of criteria.

"So, for those reasons, I am for it. I think that everybody in this House is for any latchkey child. It doesn't have to be from first to sixth grade. The program is excellent. I don't know if it has to fall into the DOE. According to the chairman the other day, or the Superintendent, he was even saying they are going to teach Japanese. Now, in one area we say we are giving out free education and on the next, we say we are going to charge you \$23, your child is going to have an after-school program because he is latchkey, but we are going to charge you additionally for your education.

"So, I have some problems, Mr. Speaker. Other than that, I would hope that everybody would vote for it but please look into these areas.

"Thank you."

Representative Tam then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, perhaps after this meeting, I can go into detail with Representative Whitney Anderson. Unfortunately, as he had said earlier, he had to leave the public hearing and those things were brought out so I'll discuss it with him later."

Representative Liu then rose and stated:

"I rise to speak in favor of the bill but with grave reservations only to note that, at this point in time, I am voting in favor because of the expectations that have been, unfortunately, raised for the 18- or 19,000 students who may be entering this program.

"However, many of the concerns expressed by Representative Anderson I also share, and I will be making further comments later.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Metcalf rose and remarked:

"Did I understand Representative Tam to indicate that Representative Anderson had cut class?"

#### INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION

And also, Mr. Speaker, I would like to also put into the record that it was not only the University of Hawaii Professional Assembly who negotiated this bill but also a lot of the leaders in the community.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lee then rose to speak in favor of House Bill 2138, HD 1, stating:

"My colleagues know well my interest in education and the priority on which I place on education. We are here today because we have had a good education from various different sources. It is time that we proceed with investing in education throughout the State.

"Last year, we passed a bill providing for substantial increases to teachers in secondary schools. This year, it is time to support the raises for the University of Hawaii and the community college system. If Hawaii is ever to be a center for Pacific affairs, we must develop our educational system so that it can be a magnet, it can serve as a means of attracting and also coordinating all the different activities in the Pacific area.

"For this reason, I think it is important that we give a strong vote of support for this bill, that we wish to make the University of Hawaii and its system the best that we can in this State, for without such a university, we will never fulfill the dreams that we have for ourselves, for our children and for the State as a whole.

"However, there are many other unfinished business. We must continue to build on what this bill has provided. We should start on those at this session. Until then, I wish to congratulate all parties to the bargaining agreement which has brought forth what I think is a very, very attractive package for everyone concerned.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Metcalf then rose and requested a conflict ruling, saying that his wife is an employee of the University.

The Chair ruled "no conflict."

# INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

On motion by Representative Hashimoto, seconded by Representative D. Ige and carried, H.R. No. 27 was adopted.

Representative Hashimoto then rose to introduce the honoree, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I believe that the resolution speaks for itself, and it gives me great pleasure and honor today to introduce to you and members of this honorable body the Principal of Our Lady of Good Counsel School, Sister William Marie Eleneki," and asked the honoree to stand to be recognized.

Representative D. Ige then rose and introduced "a couple of supporters here this morning who are in the audience," as follows: Mr. John O'Donnell, President of the School Board; Miss Florence Pasion, Vice Principal and 7th grade teacher; and a group of students from kindergarten through grade eight.

Representative Yonamine then presented a floral lei to Sister Eleneki while Representative D. Ige presented her with a certified copy of the resolution.

H.R. On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Souki and carried, H.R. No. 28 was adopted.

Prior to introducing the honorees, Representative Aporose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, when growing up as a child in Makiki, the only thing I knew about golf was that a golf ball was excellent for playing jacks because we always lost the little rubber ball that came with the set. What's notable about the golf ball was that it was especially effective on a rubber ball which gave you an extra 6/10 of a second to execute the doubles and the triples and the ultimate challenge which was to do an around-the-world. So other

than jacks, I never thought much about how else one might utilize a golf ball although I was old enough to know that you couldn't eat one -- a fact that some constituents of mine reminded me of recently.

"It wasn't until I was old enough to go digging for clams in the Ala Wai near the Kapahulu Library that I noticed that there were lots of people walking briskly around the grass, smashing these little white balls with long clubs. My first reaction was that seemed to be a silly thing for grown people to do. Then I found out that they had to pay to do this. I was especially fascinated with the way they would swing the ball with a vengeance and as it rolled in the air, they would lean their bodies to one side in total control of the trajectory. Sometimes, of course, this method of flight control would fail and you could tell because the hitter would yell things like, 'Oh darn,' or 'Where did it go?' Little did I know, Mr. Speaker, that what I was witnessing was the beginning of a multi-million dollar industry for the State of Hawaii.

"Mr. Speaker, I would note that the sport of golf brings with it an economic value to the State which surpasses that of all other sports combined. It provides us with the global window of promotion worth millions of advertising dollars. And the Hawaiian Open, which is the Grand Daddy of Hawaii tournaments, is celebrating its 25th anniversary and its 23rd year of national television network coverage. The Saturday and Sunday final rounds which is broadcast live garners a viewing audience of over 25-million people around the world. It consistently attracts a world class field of superb athletes which this year includes Tom Kite, Craig Stadler, David Ishii, Cory Pavin, Gene Sauers, Paul Azinger, Lanny Wadkins, Isao Aoki, Ben Crenshaw and many other of the top professionals.

"So, Mr. Speaker, it gives me great pleasure to introduce to the members of the House the two men responsible for putting it all together -- the General Chairman of the Hawaiian Open, Mr. Dick Post, and the Tournament Chairman, Mr. Don McKnight," and asked them to stand to be recognized.

Red carnation leis were presented to Messrs. Post and McKnight by Representatives Amaral and Kawakami, respectively, while Representative Apo presented Mr. Post with a certified copy of the resolution.

At 12:06 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:11 o'clock p.m.

## SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering a bill on Third Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar.

# THIRD READING

# S.B. No. 2330, SD 1:

Representative Souki moved that S.B. No. 2330, SD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Tam.

Representative Cavasso then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

- "Mr. Speaker, there is a better way.
- "Mr. Speaker, please record my 'no' vote on this Lt. Governor Cayetano program.
- "Mr. Speaker, I support child care and after-school care. Yes...I believe government should help families meet their child care needs. But there is a better way.
- "We Republicans have before this House, child care proposals designed to strengthen the family, to give greater choice to parents and to encourage initiative, self-reliance, and independent solutions.
- "We propose returning the monies back to the family and paents of dependent children, and if that means paying grandmother, or big brother or sister, or the friend down the street, then that's good.

"Raising taxes for more government programs is not the answer and will hurt our families.

"Hawaii's families are among the highest taxed people in the nation...maybe the highest. According to the Census Bureau, Hawaii's state taxes in 1988 were almost 50 percent higher than the average across the nation. The Hawaii per capita average was \$3,296 while the national average was only \$2,209.

"According to the Tax Foundation of Hawaii, our state and local tax burden increased by 14.5 percent during the first two years of this Waihee Administration. From 1986 to 1988, our state and local tax burden increased 2.16 from 12.68 to 14.84 percent. . .

At this point, Representative Alcon rose on a point of order and asked:

"Is the speaker addressing the merits of the bill or is he campaigning?"

The Chair then asked Representative Cavasso to "please stick to the germane subject of the bill and not to a bill on taxation."

Representative Cavasso answered:

"This is germane, Mr. Speaker.

"At 14.55 percent increase in just two years, is it any wonder we had a \$750-million surplus last year? Almost double the projections?

"In the State-of-the-State message last week, the Governor boasted how we're returning \$120-million to our Hawaiian people in these next couple of months through the \$125 tax rebate and then, in the same speech, he proposed that we increase our local tax burden by a .5 percent excise tax for the counties which, according to Richard Kahle, the State Tax Director, would be a \$123.3-million tax increase. The Governor wants to give \$120-million with one hand and take back \$123-million with the other hand and make us think we're getting a deal. There's a better way.

"We can give the counties a .5 percent tax from the existing base and still give back to the family \$600 per child so they can make their own choice on child care without discrimination. . .

At this point, Representative Souki then rose on a point of order and said:

"Mr. Speaker, I believe that Representative Cavasso is not speaking on the issue of the bill at hand."

The Chair responded:

"Representative Cavasso, I must remind you that this is the A+ program that we're speaking of. Could you speak to the subject matter of the bill?"

Representative Cavasso answered:

"Yes, Mr. Speaker, the words I have spoken are pertinent. Let me continue and you'll see."

"Today's Advertiser reports that 3,022 children have been denied participation in this A+ program. Where do they go now...now that the State has forced their current program out of existence?

"That was the first reason for opposing it, Mr. Speaker -- a misuse of tax dollars.

"The second reason, Mr. Speaker, for opposing this Cayetano Plan is that it does take away choice. It discriminates against the home care child, against the private school student, against church day-care and against the extended family. It's a trap which will destroy private sector initiatives, small business, and home child care provider plans, and will then leave the families stranded when the weekend or holiday or summer or government restrictions come into place.

"There is a better way. Our Republican plan will give choice back to the family and it's not discriminatory.

"Thirdly, Mr. Speaker, I oppose this Cayetano Plan because it has violated, from the beginning, the spirit of the constitutional separation of legislative and executive powers. Yes. . .I know the Attorney General and Professor Van Dyke have justified the Lt. Governor and said that what he is doing is legal. But most of us know, in our heart, when there has been a violation of the principle of separation of power.

"Cayetano, on November 11 -- two weeks before the Attorney General's opinion -- told the Honolulu Advertiser that he was 'gonna go ahead with this program even if the Attorney General came forth with an adverse opinion.' (Illegal). The Lt. Governor said he was going to do this program with, or without, the Legislature.

"Our founding fathers feared the power of government. They provided, through the Constitution, that the Legislature authorize and appropriate. And they provided the executive branch power to veto and execute what was authorized or appropriated. Last year, we denied the work comp state fund appropriation and therefore defeated the program, even through it had been authorized two years previously. Our founding fathers feared the arrogance and power of human nature, and government, without checks and balances, and so should

"Cayetano didn't really check this out with even a fraction of those who could have helped. He rejected the professional child care providers, churches, parents, teachers, principals, students. . . and us.

"On July 22nd, he told the **Star-Bulletin** that it would be counter-productive to allow current child care vendors, such as the YMCA and YWCA and others, to help in planning the program.

"There is a better way to solve this problem. . .that is to set the people free, to give them their money back --\$600 or more per child -- to give them choice, to help the poor and to put our collective minds together to work on a flexible creative solution.

"I challenge this Legislature to have the courage to give hearings to our Republican child care proposals beginning with House Bills 3119, 2633 and 2634.

"A note from the windward side. One of the people who worked on the model latchkey child care program, at Kahaluu Elementary School, told me that when they went in to solve what they assumed to be the latchkey problem, that they asked questions of students to determine the real need for the program. He was shocked, he said, to find that the extended family, older brothers and sisters and friends really were working, and that the true latchkey problem was only a very small percentage of the students at Kahaluu Elementary School. A different solution was called for.

"Did we ever, actually, on a statewide basis, survey the children and their families out there? Look at the

numbers and see how some were solving their needs? Did we ever, actually, gather the facts? Or did we just jump?

"We are presenting a solution before we've really gathered the facts. There is a better way, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Apo then rose in rebuttal, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, just a couple of comments.

"First of all, I would like to suggest that Representative Cavasso was out of order in his references to the A+program as that being of the Lt. Governor, but I will not press the point and ask for a ruling on it. The A+program, although the Lt. Governor no doubt had a lot to do with putting it together, he was operating on the authority of the Governor.

"On the question of the policy which many of us have raised, we have before us a bill that does two things. It provides funding for the program and, secondly, it puts forward a request that we shall, as a matter of policy, provide child care through the A+ mechanism. So it is now our turn to look at the issues, and if the bill survives it will become law, and we shall have a program.

"I don't agree with Representative Cavasso that the system has been usurped or bypassed. We do have the item before us and each member can vote his conscience and make whatever comments he desires as to the merits or demerits of the bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tam then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of Senate Bill 2230, Senate Draft 1, entitled, 'A Bill for an Act Relating to a Pilot After-School Program for the Public Schools.'

"The purpose of this bill is to establish a statewide pilot, otherwise termed as experimental, after-school program in the public schools to provide affordable and quality after-school supervision for students enrolled in kindergarten through grade six who may would be without supervision of an adult after the end of the regular instructional school day as a result of parental employment.

"Today, Mr. Speaker and fellow colleagues, the State of Hawaii will make history. The State of Hawaii will be the first state in the United States to have developed and implement on Monday, this coming Monday, February 5, 1990, a pilot after-school program to meet the needs of parents who work during the time that children are out of school after the regular school day by providing an interesting and challenging after-school program having educational value for our students. Now students will respond that they find school interesting and challenging when asked if they like school instead of responding, 'I don't like school.'

"I thank the Lt. Governor, the Board of Education, and the Department of Education for developing the concept of the pilot after-school program having educational components and values instead of just developing a 'baby-sitting program' only.

"Mr. Speaker and fellow colleagues, in the days to come within the legislative session, the Committee on Education and the Committee on Human Services will publicly discuss the development of a permanent afterschool program. I invite all interested persons and parties to help us develop a permanent program that a great majority of Hawaii residents will be satisfied with.

A successful permanent program will develop only if we all work together.

"The permanent after-school program will address a number of concerns not resolved in the pilot after-school program. Such concerns as (1) offering the after-school program to private school students; (2) offering the after-school program to students who have student-parents in school; (3) contracting private after-school programmers to implement the after-school program; and (4) making sure in the statutes that the funding of the after-school program will not be competing with the regular school program for funds. In other words, both programs stealing from each other.

"Fellow colleagues, I ask that you vote 'yes' on the passage of this bill. As my friend Lex Brodie would say, 'thank you very much.'"

Representative Bunda then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"Like others, I applaud the efforts of the administration to meet the needs of young children from working families. Economic and social changes during the past decade have dramatically changed our concept of the traditional family. We have the highest rate of multiwage earner families and the highest percentage of working mothers in the nation. Pressed between working for economic survival and properly carring for their families, many working parents do welcome A+.

"Mr. Speaker, while the intent of A+ is commendable, there are few areas that are of concern to me.

"First, it has been the administration's position from the very beginning that the legislation was not necessary; yet, they hardly endorsed the bill and encouraged its passage. As a result, Mr. Speaker, we are again exceeding the State spending limit. I ask you, Mr. Speaker, where is our system of checks and balances in our State government? And at best, does it make it right? Mr. Speaker, we must reaffirm our legislative role as the policy making body of our State.

"Along this same line, I am concerned that we are sending very mixed messages to the community. First, the State is telling the community -- okay schools, you set the course of the future through school/community based management. Then in the next breath, we're dumping additional demands on them without consulting them. Is A+ a program that was created from the bottom up? Were the principals and teachers involved with this from the onset? No! They learned about the program from the media just like the rest of us in the House.

"I am also concerned, Mr. Speaker, as to where the moneys are coming from. As I recall, when the program was originally announced, it was going to cost \$1.5-million for six months. Now, the price tag is over \$5.6 million for a period much less than six months. I hope that moneys for this program are not being diverted from our regular educational programs.

"I also have concerns about the other taxpayers who are left out of A+. I hope that the Department of Education will look also into those not currently being served. What about those parents who are students trying to learn new job skills? What about those parents of children who attend private schools? Their moneys are going to fund this program and shouldn't they be allowed to participate?

"Mr. Speaker, the basic premise of this bill also concerns me.

"This bill states that children unsupervised for even one hour a day would place them at a greater risk for substance abuse and criminal acts. But A+ is not a deterrent to drug abuse and crime. And to think that A+ will help alleviate this problem is really not being realistic. Mr. Speaker, the problem is -- lack of family unity. And let's not kid ourselves. A+ is a baby-sitting program.

"Mr. Speaker, you have stated that this is the year of the ohana, so let's work to put the family structure at the top. We must provide the resources for the families so that they can survive in the 90's. A+ is but one alternative. We need to explore the full spectrum of our options for the families. We need to rethink our educational system and sit down with the teachers and principals and talk about things like, maybe, lengthening the school day and paying them for the extra time and effort. Or, maybe, take a look at our tax structure and provide tax credits and other write-offs, or give help to our private child care providers so that they would enter this field.

"Mr. Speaker, the future of our children is at stake. Let's not just sit idly for the rest of the session thinking that we took care of the needs of our families with the passage of this bill. We still need and have much more work to do.

"Mahalo, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Shon then rose and stated:

"I rise to speak enthusiastically about this bill.

"Mr. Speaker, when I first heard about this program, the notion that 17,000 children who have been left to latchkey situations, who have been preyed upon by substance abuse dealers, who have been really left out of our thinking as we think about education as a kind of factory work -- everybody goes in at one time in the morning and we all let them out at 2:00 o'clock, and we all say, go away, we don't want you on campus -- the notion that 17,000, with one stroke, could have some kind of program for them, it was really phenomenal.

"You know, we have wrestled with this issue of child care and latchkey and programs for many years and there is not a single doubt in my mind that if this program had not come along, would there be some alternative program we'd be passing today? No way! We would not have found a solution or a program for 17,000 children this year, perhaps next year, perhaps the year after that. There are too many ideas, too many approaches, too many philosophies. If someone didn't force us into this, if someone didn't lay it on the table -- when I say force us, I mean with a public need out there -- to make a specific proposal and virtually all of us, Democrats, Republicans, whatever, felt we've got to somehow respond to this. Perhaps we want to respond by rejecting it completely because we don't like the individual who proposed it. Or perhaps we want to respond because, well, this is part of our mandate, our mission or philosophy. Maybe we should accomplish this, maybe we can do it faster than we thought we could.

"I think this is a great idea and that it needs more work. And as a great idea, we should pursue it as fast as possible. You know, we went around the State and had hearings on substance abuse throughout the State. There are some who have been critics of the program and didn't bother to even show up for some of those discussions with the people who were out in the front lines. And I will tell you, one of the major areas that just kind of glares at you right in the face is that there are lots of young folks who have virtually nothing to do and no productive situation

after school. You look at the introduction of this destructive wave of ice and these other things that three, four, five, six hours of no supervision, no programs, I firmly believe that that is a major factor in substance abuse

"You know, Mr. Speaker, the issue of whether a program is perfect or not seems to have solicited different responses at different times. You know, was it yesterday, the President came out with a suggestion of a goal for us in education, and members of his party said, 'Great leadership. Of course, the money is not in the budget but we still think it's generally a good goal and we'll work out the details later.' He came out with an environmental plan. Of course, there wasn't any funds for Boston Harbor, but people said, 'Oh, but at least he set some goals. We'll work out the details later. We are going to pursue it.'

"This issue of the latchkey children is something that needs to be pursued today -- not July 1st, not September -- it's something that needs. . .it needs us right now. I think that it was a good thing that we have had to address this issue as soon as we have had to. We would not, I repeat, have any coherent, clear mandate before us if this program hadn't come down the road, and there are 17,000 kids and their parents that are going to be beneficiaries come Monday and that would not have happened -- 17,000 weighed against, 'Oh, we have a little problem here, we have a little problem there; I don't like the guy who introduced it.' 17,000, Mr. Speaker. I can't think of any other single program with one-swell step has affected so many people directly. And when you go to certain areas of the State, Mr. Speaker, and you see the problems of substance abuse and you know what's going on after school, the fact that these kids are on the streets hanging around, I've got to believe that this is important on that issue and on many other issues. We are not going to turn back the clock and say to parents, 'well, one of you shouldn't work.' That's not going to happen. Parents are working. They don't know what to do with their children. Some of them cannot afford current child care. The private sector has not provided the solution. The private sector has struggled. can't pay their staff enough. In order to keep the price down to what it is today, they are paying their staff inadequately. It is incumbent upon us to act and to act

"I'm sure that the permanent solution bill that is being considered is going to address all the issues that people brought up. But I am really distressed, Mr. Speaker, that when the program first came along, it was very clear that some people's intent was, we've got to derail this right now, we're scared to death this is something that might work. Yes, it might work. I am sure it will work, and the permanent program will be even better. It is not as some said, a charade. Ask those 17,000 kids and their parents if it is a charade.

"I feel very strongly about this, Mr. Speaker. I, too, am affected by the issues of separation of the Executive and the Legislature. I, too, am concerned about some of the issues that have been raised, but overall, there has to be some perspective. This is a program for 17,000 kids that wouldn't have a program. How do you weigh that against no program?

"For these reasons, Mr. Speaker, I think we should diligently and sincerely pursue some of the many fine alternative proposals that have been put forward and everyone who has put forward a proposal to improve the program, I applaud, and we will improve it. But that is no reason to say, hey, let's wait another semester, let's derail this for another several months. The issues affecting those kids are unlikely issues that have affected

us when we were going through school. Ice wasn't there for us.

"For these reasons, Mr. Speaker, I urge that we all support this and that we all work productively on the bill for the permanent program and that we not lose perspective. There are many reasons to find fault, but there are 17,000 reasons to support this.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Amaral then rose to speak in support of Senate Bill 2330, SD 1, stating:

"I speak in support of this bill as a single parent who raised two latchkey children. I wish that this program had been around twelve years ago when I was looking for some assistance with my children. And like Representative Cavasso, I am also a pro-choice, but I think that we have given our parents another choice and another opportunity for the care of our children. This is by no means the end of the choices; there are many more choices coming down the line. But I am proud to be here on this momentous occasion when we have given those over-stressed parents out there one viable, secure option for their children, and I urge all my colleagues to support this as well.

"Thank you."

Representative Marumoto then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Last July the A+ program was announced by the Lt. Governor as the answer to Hawaii's latchkey problem, but the announced program begged many questions. At that time, Representative Liu and myself wrote to the Lt. Governor requesting answers to these many questions. For instance, where and when was enabling legislation passed for this program? Where was the money coming from -- the regular education budget (EDN 105 or 106) or was it coming directly from federal education impact funds? What would the effect be on the private providers, especially if the program was not continued in future years?

"Some of the questions have been answered, some not. Some have been answered to my satisfaction and some have not. There still exists these latter concerns and many new ones brought up by the many affected parties since we have discussed this since last July. The affected parties include principals, teachers, maintenance workers, the respective unions, the Board of Education members, parents, private school students, special education interests, and private providers, and last but not least, legislators. The questions remain. Will special ed students needs be adequately addressed? Will A+ detract and draw energy and resources from the regular educational program? The regular program is still crying for more teachers, for counselors, more clerical help, more operational funds, more library resources, more everything.

"Private providers' enrollment is dropping by 60 percent. We are legislating many of these programs right out of existence and the small providers are upset to see that we could make a blanket exemption from the criminal history check and fingerprinting while they are still bound by the letter of the law. The situation has been fraught with complaints and grumbling from the ranks. There are also detractors for more detached objective sources.

"A visiting UH professor, Dr. Mary Raywid, addressed the state of affairs in education in Hawaii. In an address entitled, **Reflections on a System in Transition**, given in December 1989, she said about A+ and SCBM, and I would like to quote a little of her speech: 'A+ has had a real part in the struggle over SCBM. It captured and shifted headlines and public attention. In doing so, it can be argued it effectively derailed SCBM and the effort to make restructuring operative, but its educational impacts do not end there. The program, that is A+, is to be financed now with federal funds earmarked for education and it will contend with educational programs for future funding. It is, in fact, now openly being acknowledged as an educational program. Perhaps one eventually involving all students in a three-hour extension of the school day. Thus, a great deal of school policy of longterm duration of substantial programmatic import and of rapidly growing financial magnitude appears to have been written already, without the Board of Education and the Legislature, either to memoers the dable chagrin. The enormous and instant without understandable chagrin. public appeal left A+ hard to challenge tantamount to "policy by press release" as one legislator put it. And in procedural terms, the proposal pre-empted both Board of Education policy-making functions and the Legislature's prerogative in deciding fiscal policy. As one principal put it, it made many of us feel like prawns in somebody else's future in politics.

"Dr. Raywid said a great deal more in her far-ranging speech which we should all read and discuss at length but for the moment, we are dealing with the A+ pilot program. I commend the speech to your attention. It has been provided to us by the League of Women Voters.

"Almost born out of wedlock, this vote today on A+ will be a hasty legalization by its parents -- the Legislature. As a protest to the lack of planning, which should have included all members of the educational family, I am voting no. I support the concept but not the conception.

"Thank you."

Representative Arakaki then rose and stated:

"I rise in support of Senate Bill 2330, SD 1, and for those who are calling for more studies and more assessments, I would like to say that we do have a study and the study was probably the genesis for this program, and this study was done by the Office of Children and Youth, at least contracted by the Office of Children and Youth, and the Legislature funded this a year and a half ago. The name of the study is Caring for Hawaii's Children and an Assessment of the Child Care System, and if there is any member here who doesn't have a copy of it, I will be able to provide them with copies, and I suggest that everyone read some of the findings and some of the recommendations of this study and assessment.

"I just want to point out a couple of things that the study says.

"One, it says that only 68 percent of the households with school-aged children get some type of child care and one-third, or 3,725 of those households with school-aged children, do not receive any type of child care, as defined by this study. It also says that lower income households -- those making less than \$20,000 per year -- pay about 18 percent of their income for child care. It also says that they pay 43 percent of their income for shelter. This study was done to address some concerns about the need for affordable and available quality child care for the State of Hawaii and it does identify this as a crying need for many families here in the State.

"I know there are many critics to what is being proposed and rightfully so. I am glad there is criticism because this is a pilot project and I think the process involves producing a quality program for the children of Hawaii. I am also one of the critics. I think there is a

lot of shortcomings. I think there's a lot more that need to be done in terms of this child care program and other child care programs for the State. But I see this as a start of the process, and I also see the process and even the controversy that was created as getting people involved in the discussion -- the real discussion of issues about child care -- and we've had more people involved and more people knowing about what are the important issues as far as child care is concerned. So I think that is a positive. And I know there's going to be a lot of questions about the cost, and the cost is great. But when you consider that many families spend more than the recommended ten percent of their family incomes for child care, we need to ask -- what is the State spending for child care?

"As far as long-term cost. As the Chairman of Human Services, I have responsibility for our welfare system and also our correctional system, and I have seen the budget increasing rapidly. And for those who want to look at ways of saving cost in welfare, then we should look at ways of increasing our expenditures for child care. And for those who want to avoid building more prison cells, then we need to look at more ways of building brain cells.

"So I would like to encourage everyone to support this measure as a beginning and work together to produce a quality, affordable, and available child care program for the people of Hawaii.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to have Representative Bunda's remarks placed in the Journal as my own, but that's for a 'no' and not for reservations. I have the same concerns.

"I am also interested, Mr. Speaker, that the Superintendent, in the Senate, said in response to if they are going to implement these in the schools — what degree does the principal have over this? And the remarks that he said was that that was the policy-making decision and the principal had no say into what was going to be done in his school. That bothers me, Mr. Speaker.

"Also, Representative Shon says in one sweep of the pen, we take care of 17,000 children. And I agree. However, Mr. Speaker, I am not sure how many of those 17,000 came from private providers, and that bothers me. As a businessman, 31,000 children they said was going to be in this program, and that's where the million some odd dollars came from. And then we came up short. So we have escalated the price to \$5-million perhaps, and maybe more.

"We also have home care. I can remember when some of my neighbors took care of children after school. But then we went ahead and we passed laws and we had them now where they have to provide x number of square feet, they have to provide a bed, they have to provide certain types of meals if they are going to take care of them, and they said, 'forget it. If I'm going to be subjected to this, I won't take care of the children.' So they got out of that business, and then they went to work because they had to work in order to provide for their families like the rest of us. As a grandfather, I work, my wife works, my daughter and my son-in-law -- all of us work. So these people went to work and then their children became latchkey children. So when we try to help people, in effort, sometimes we make mistakes, and there's nothing wrong, Mr. Shon, or Representative Arakaki. In the studies that you have, I've almost been ready to say that the latchkey program which was supposed to be is not a

DOE program -- it's a human services program. And I don't think that it should have been forced down into the educational system. We would have been able to provide a heck of a lot more had we been able to take care of not only those people in the DOE but in the private sector, those people who earn in the private sector and they happen to go to the DOE, could be making a hundred thousand dollars. But if their child is a DOE student, they can get taken care of. I don't think that that's quite fair.

"I also don't think that we were pushed into this. Had this program which we could have done in 1972, and we do have studies, if we weren't just going to push it through, we could have sat down and had with the private sector a lot of us, other people, and come up with a program that would have been a heck of a lot more beneficial to the people of this State. Our few votes are not going to stop the program because it is needed, but I think the people should know that there are other alternatives and there's lots of people out there with children that have to be taken care of.

"I've been sitting on the Board of Directors for a preschool for many, many years. This program is taking away some of our teachers because government is going to be paying them more and they're hurting. So there's many ways that we could help one another if we would sit down, discuss and forget politics if we're running. And this isn't a political deal. This is something that is going to hurt each and every one of us because it is our families, and we've said the family unit is what we're looking at. Well, let's not just always throw dollars and a bunch of bills for the people. Let's look at it and try to make sure — are we bringing families together? Will it be beneficial? Could we work with neighbors? Is there other ways to go ahead and take care of those children who are by themselves after school?

"For this reason, Mr. Speaker, I am voting no.

"Thank you."

Representative Stegmaier then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I want to first of all recognize the State administration for the leadership that it has shown in addressing the great need that exists for after-school care and supervision which has not been met up to now. The opportunity presented itself and the administration, and hopefully, we will be seizing the opportunity. I am enthusiastic because of the A+ program's emphasis on education and educational enrichment. I am thrilled with the numbers of community resource people who have come forward with innovative ideas and voluntary energies to participate in the enrichment program. The A+ program, as far as I understand it, will actually enhance school/community based management rather than derailing it. Community participation will increase and I believe that the A+ program -- the decisions that will occur with regard to the A+ program -- will be made at the school level. Panels are now forming to discuss the kind of needs that the students will have at each individual school, and the decision-making will happen at the local level which will be enhancing school/community based management.

"I am also happy about the fact that the A+ program has been able to retain quality professionals and others to provide the leadership and the assistance with the A+ program. I am thrilled that there are so many University students who will be participating as aides and will be setting a model for the young people who will be participating in the A+ program. And I am also happy about the fact that there will be a requirement of a

monthly payment of a fee which will cost the parents and the children who are participating in the A+ program to feel a sense of ownership for the program.

"I realize that it is a pilot project. We are all aware of that albeit it be a massive one. And therefore we should expect improvements, and we should know that improvements will come. There are still thousands of latchkey students who are not enrolled in this program and we must go out and recruit them to fulfill the purpose of the A+ program. We must broaden the scope of those who qualify for the A+ program because there is still a need and we must perhaps include support for other forms—private forms of after-school care that has been provided, or that could be provided.

"But, Mr. Speaker, in conclusion, it is refreshing to see the government addressing a dire need and acting quickly to meet it in a timely fashion and fully staffed. And I am very excited about the pilot project that will be beginning next Monday.

"Thank you very much."

At this point, Representative Apo rose and moved for the previous question.

Representative Hemmings then rose and asked for a recess, and at 1:01 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 1:04 o'clock p.m., Representative Apo rose and withdrew his motion.

Representative Hemmings then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"This isn't legislation -- it is an executive order sent down to this Legislature and we were told to rubber stamp and pass it. And I won't do it because I do believe in separation of power, and I am sorry that the Majority Party. . .

Representative Okamura, at this point, rose on a point of order and said:

"Just a reminder to the speaker that Cushings Rules indicate that whoever speaks should be addressing the Speaker."

The Chair answered, "You're correct."

Representative Hemmings responded:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I will face you," and continued his remarks, saying:

"This bill is, in fact, not legislation. It is an executive order that has been handed down to us and we've been asked to rubber stamp it, and it sets a very bad precedent -- one I don't think that this Legislature has ever done before. We've totally acquiesced our ability to legislate. We were told that even if we didn't pass the bill, they will go ahead with the program. What we are doing is giving the executive branch of government the right at any time to go anywhere they want and juggle the State budget which appears to be their own personal 'slush fund' to implement programs at their whim and we would have lost our ability to legislate. It is an important constitutional principle that we're addressing here today. It is an important I'm sad to say that the Majority Party, in this election year, is circling the wagons on this issue, and even the good Senator that brought this point up has acquiesced.

"I had a speech prepared which I will bypass. I would like to address some of the rebuttals made against our efforts to try to curb this alleged child care program.

"Everybody's for child care, no one's against it. How you attain it is the problem here. As the speaker from Waianae said that this is not the Lt. Governor's program, it's the Governor's program -- thank you very much. I agree, it is the Governor's program.

"The speaker from Nuuanu said this is affordable child care. Nothing could be further from the truth. At \$90 a person and the price is going up, it is far from affordable. What it is is a taxpayers' subsidized program and it is very unfair to the low-income people that have to subsidize it.

"It is interesting that the Lt. Governor and others, in rationalizing the program, said, well, 41 percent of the people in the program are going to be making less than \$30,000 a year. Well, that means that 59 percent are going to be making over \$30,000 a year. This is regressive. You, in the Majority Party, take pride in being for the little guy but the little guy is going to be paying for child care of the rich people. People making \$60-, \$70-, \$80,000 a year will receive the same subsidy as the working poor.

"The speaker from Nuuanu also said that this is historic. You're right -- it is historic. It's a historic step towards state socialism and away from free enterprise. Europe with perestroika -- Eastern Europe is getting away from socialism and we're taking a historic step into government-owned and operated child care -- cradle to grave treatment.

"The problems are many and the previous speakers have discussed them. The very erudite speech by the representative from Wahiawa brought out a point that should be enunciated again, that we do have the highest rate of two-wage earner households. We do have the highest rate of working mothers. That's a problem that government has created through the poor economic environment that we all have to live in. So government creates a problem and then creates a program to collect more taxes to try to solve the problem that they created.

"I loved it when the good representative, Mr. Speaker, from Makiki stood up and said there are 17,000 latchkey children being helped here. There's no evidence at all that these 17,000 are actually the numbers. 15,781, in fact, are in the program. Quite the contrary, there's a lot of evidence that point to children transferring out of private programs into the government-subsidized program.

"The Makiki representative said there are no alternatives. That, Mr. Speaker, is an admission of guilt. The guilt that this Legislature and this administration has had three years and has done nothing except in an election year to throw something on the table and have us try to fund it and rubber stamp and say we've done something. This speaker mentioned the President's program. The difference is, the President went before Congress and is bringing his program to Congress to be legislated by them. He is not saying, take it or leave it, you're going to get it no matter what happens.

"The good representative from Makiki mentioned the private sector. Mr. Speaker, he mentioned that the private sector is struggling. The excuse I hear from my liberal friends, including my bearded friend in the City Council, is where's the private sector in meeting these child care needs? I'll-tell you where they are. They are being put out of business by high taxes, by bureaucratic red tape, by the very rules regarding child care that the

A+ program has been allowed to bypass. The private sector cannot meet the child care needs in many instances because they have been put out of business or competed against by government, taxation and regulation.

"I said this bill and this movement was a charade. I say it again, and it is a cruel hoax on the taxpayers in an election year to make them think that they're getting something for nothing.

"The representative from Makakilo talked about choice. This is going to eliminate choice because once you have a government socialized program, the private providers, the community-based providers, the church providers, are going to be put out of business. There will be no choice. Teachers, professionals, we in the Education Committee, sit all year long to hear from the labor unions that they need more time, they need more money, they need more support, there is not enough time in the day to take care of the educational needs of our children while 148 out of 170 positions, or 87 percent in the A+ program, are being made up by teachers.

"Mr. Speaker, I could go on and on. I guess the politically prudent thing to do is what the Majority Party is doing -- roll over and play dead for the administration in an election year, circle the wagons, and pretend that the taxpayers of the State are getting a deal. Well, I can't in good conscience do it, Mr. Speaker. Therefore, I am voting no.

"Thank you."

Representative Liu then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in support of the position contrary to one of affirmation of this measure. At the same time, I speak in favor of child care. Mr. Speaker, I state my position this way because I think it is symbolic of the convoluted and murky history of the so-called pilot project.

"I appreciate all the concerns that have been raised by previous speakers and, by reference, I do incorporate them into my own concerns. And I want to make the point that I think that if we really didn't feel cooperative, if we really did feel that we are equal partners in this venture, we would have included in this measure, or we will very shortly and I hope the option is still there, rushing through this Legislature at the same time that we are doing these measures which are in the hopper by members of both parties, bills that would fund an objective evaluation of what is going on or what will be going on in this so-called pilot project so that we will have the benefit, Mr. Speaker, of learning from this experience. Otherwise, we can work on something for September without really having any basis for that situation. So I hope we keep that in mind.

"And finally, Mr. Speaker, I would like to indicate that the concerns brought up today by previous speakers are very well capsulated and in testimony which had been received by us from two of the unions who represent the workers who are going to be on the line, both unions having expressed support for an after-school care program, were having some very strong concerns and I would like to read a few of them here from the HSTA.

"Just quoting: 'HSTA strongly believes it is imperative to the quality of education that the A+ program not take from the regular day program in time, resources or funding.' Then from HGEA: 'The school administrators who were assigned the responsibility to implement and administer the program without being consulted as to what resources would be needed. They were not involved in the planning stage and therefore, we are very much

concerned as to the quality of assistance that will be available to implement the program.'

"Mr. Speaker, I think these concerns are something that should not have been allowed to exist during this very crucial time frame of essentially setting the course for us in a very uncertain area, and I just hope that if we really are going to do things right that we get serious evaluation of A+ as it is going on.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2330, SD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO A PILOT AFTER-SCHOOL PROGRAM," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 43 ayes to 6 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Cavasso, Hemmings, Liu, Marumoto and O'Kieffe voting no, and Representatives Ihara and Peters being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 2330 had passed Third Reading at 1:14 o'clock p.m.

He served as a director of both the symphony and opera departments at the Manhattan School of Music. He has conducted operas for virtually every major operatic company in the United States of America, so it is indeed a great honor for us to have him here in Honolulu to conduct our symphony in its current production of 'Othello'.

"'Othello' is one of the great operas of all times. It is a production of this symphony and the Honolulu Opera Theater. It is the great production by Verdi based on, of course, William Shakespeare's great drama. It is a merger of two great arts, both opera and Shakespeare, which I think makes it a very special presentation.

"Mr. Coppola is one of the foremost conductors of Verdi. That's why I think it is a special tribute and a blessing for all of us to have him present to direct the symphony.

"I think with the kind of background that you've heard discussed in the resolution, it is no wonder that with his background in music and opera, that no less than an authority than Francis Ford Coppola who is also his nephew, has referred to his Uncle Anton Coppola as 'Mr. Opera.'

"I think it is a fitting title for him because of his great career and so it really gives me a great pleasure to ask 'Mr. Opera,' Mr. Anton Coppola, to rise and to be recognized by the audience and the members of this body at this time. . .Mr. Coppola."

Accompanying Mr. Coppola were Mrs. Armaranda Coppola, his wife; Mr. James Becker "who gives the annual lecture on the opera"; and Mr. Marshall Turkin, Executive Director of the Hawaii Opera Theater.

Representative Peters then rose and proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"The Kahapea family have shared their aloha with so many folks in our community and I am happy that today we have an opportunity to return some of that aloha to all of them

"Ilima and Kalei recently celebrated their 23rd wedding anniversary. It has been 23 years full of loving, caring and sharing. There was a tremendous amount of caring when Kalei suffered a severe back injury a few years ago and was unable to continue his previous job. With the support of his family, he turned his attention to helping others in our community, especially our young people. He volunteered at the Waianae Rap Center -- some of you may recall I have a personal interest in this center. It was started when I was the director of the Waianae Model Cities Program. Many of the youth who were helped by this program are now active and leading members of our community.

"But Kalei's interest in helping others has not stopped with the Rap Center. After attending Leeward Community College, Brother Kahapea now works with the Family Stress Center and he and his wife, Ilima, are certified as therapeutic foster parents. But I thought it only fitting to mention it on the floor of the House on this first legislative day after the announcement because it made me think of a friend, a former colleague of ours. No representative or senator spoke with more forcefulness and dedication than Representative Roland Kotani. And I think that this announcement of the freedom of Nelson Mandela is a very touching and meaningful announcement that was made over the weekend.

"I do have, if I may, Mr. Speaker, a few short words to insert into the Journal which I will submit to the Clerk after this announcement. It is the words of a song that was very popular many years ago, and it tells about the kind of life that Roland led as well as the kind of life that Nelson Mandela continues to lead in the continuing struggle for peace and justice in South Africa.

"Thank you."

"Just a word in favor. I have consulted with a potential future candidate and Representative Hiraki tells me he has no problems with this bill."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2069, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE BUDGET," having been read

throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes, with Representatives Arakaki, Hagino, Ihara and Yonamine being excused.
