INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION

H.R. No. 83, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION CONGRATULATING AND EXTENDING BEST WISHES TO THE KALIHI-PALAMA COMMUNITY COUNCIL ON ITS 45TH ANNIVERSARY AND FOR ITS CONTINUED AND OUTSTANDING COMMUNITY SERVICE," was jointly offered by Representatives Alcon, Arakaki, Cachola, Hiraki, Horita, Liu, Tam and Yoshimura and was read by the Clerk.

On motion by Representative Alcon, seconded by Representative Arakaki and carried, H.R. No. 83 was adopted.

Representative Arakaki then rose and proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and fellow members, I don't suppose that many people consider Kalihi-Palama to be one of your bastions of community activism and community participation. But believe it or not, four decades and a half ago -- 45 years ago -- and that was even before I was born, there was a dream and there was a vision. And this vision was set forth by Dr. Shunzo Sakamaki who was a trustee of Palama Settlement and a professor at the University of Hawaii, and his vision and his desire was to see that the people of Kalihi-Palama were always represented and their needs would always be heard in the public and private sector. And so he, along with several others, decided to form the Kalihi-Palama Community Council.

"And in its four decades and a half of services on behalf of the community it set out to serve, the Council now looks back with pride on its many efforts and achievements. The Council tapped the community's leadership and coordinated the work of the many organizations in the area to attain its objectives. It came to be recognized by local and state government leadership as a strong organized force in community betterment. And although not always successful and without laying claim to sole responsibility in its attainments, the Council lists a compilation that follows as among its many achievements over the years, and I would just like to briefly mention some of these.

"It includes helping to establish the Kalihi-Palama Branch Library; working for the construction of the Joseph Rider Farrington Community Auditorium; promoting the Wilson Tunnel project; initiating action for the realignment of the International Airport runway towards the sea; initiating action for the coordination of public and private agencies in drawing up long-range plans for community services at Kuhio Park Terrace high-rise housing project; initiating action for the construction of an overpass on Likelike Highway; sponsoring non-partisan political rallies to air community needs and to meet with elected officials; and also the Office of the Secretary of the United States Department of the Interior to win an award for the beautification project for the Kapalama Canal.

"However, one of the crowning achievements for the Council, Mr. Speaker and members, was that they actively worked for the new sea runway at the Honolulu International Airport to be erected on the reef a mile makai of the present East/West Runway, and this occurred after more than ten years of frustrating efforts of trying to divert the aircrafts from flying over the densely populated areas of Kalihi-Palama, and on behalf of the hundreds of residents of the community and thousands of man-hours of community involvement, the bid was awarded and this major reef runway project was finally constructed. And in spite of early opposition by the State, the airlines and the Federal Aviation Agency, the KPPC was successful in proposing, planning, lobbying and finally hiring legal counsel, and after two weeks of

hearing in the First Circuit Court in Honolulu followed by a court case in the Ninth Circuit Court in San Francisco and the Supreme Court, they were able to overcome all of these obstacles. And this project has been perhaps the single most important project ever undertaken by the Council with regards to the health, safety and welfare of the residents of Kalihi-Palama.

"I think this kind of action stands as an epitome of what a citizen's group can do. And while we wrestle and debate over the topic of initiative, I think, you know, sometimes we concentrate a lot on the mechanism of how we should allow citizens to participate. But perhaps we should take the lesson from the Council and actually look at the spirit of citizen participation and that perhaps we, as elected officials, need to be responsive and let these people know that we are listening to their concerns and that we are willing to respond to their concerns whether we agree with them or not. And I think that is a true test of allowing citizen participation.

"With that, I would like to recognize some of the more active participants in the Council who have been steadfast in their efforts on behalf of Kalihi-Palama."

Representative Arakaki then asked the following honorees to stand to be recognized: Mr. Steven Kanda, "who is a charter member and a former Honolulu District Superintendent, and also one of my former principals at Farrington High School"; Elsie Ho, "charter member and a former teacher at Farrington High School; Irene Fujimoto, "who is the past President and former Executive Director of Kalihi-Palama Model Cities Program, City and County of Honolulu"; Akira Sakima, "a former colleague who is also another past President"; and Jeffrey Pang, "who is the incoming President and also the past President of the Kalihi Business Association."

Representative Arakaki then presented the honorees with a certified copy of the resolution and orchid leis were presented to them by Representatives Cachola, Amaral, Tam, Liu, Yoshimura and Hiraki.

At 9:35 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 10:14 o'clock a.m.

SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering bills on Third Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

H.B. No. 2989, HD 1 (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 598-90):

Representative Souki moved that H.B. No. 2989, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Shon then rose to speak against the 'cancer' bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, it is really unbelievable that we should be playing footsies with the tobacco industry on a bill like this. We have stated many times, Mr. Speaker, that at least a thousand people die every day. . . every day in the United States, directly from the use of this product. And quite a few also die from the indirect results.

"It is unbelievable, as you walk around the shopping centers, to still see parents with young infants waving that cigarette in their face.

"It is unbelievable that such a shift in public policy on smoking should not have been referred to the Committee on Health which other sessions have done. And it is unbelievable that this honorable body which has so long championed the health and welfare of its citizens should want to retreat from its commitment and to return something to the tobacco industry.

"There is no doubt, Mr. Speaker, why all the tobacco companies testified in favor of this bill. Do you think they would testify in favor of the bill if it was going to hurt them? They testified in favor of this bill because they believe quite rightly that over time, the cigarette tax being frozen, they'll be able to sell more cigarettes. And the argument that, well, if you would like to raise it in the future, you could come back and go through the whole process of trying a separate bill. Well, that's much preferable to the current system where the tax rises with inflation. We wouldn't want the tax to rise with inflation, Mr. Speaker.

"And how do you imagine the profits from the extra sales would be used? Perhaps, it will be to give away more free samples of cigarettes on the street corners. No need for any ID little girl -- here's some cigarettes. You know, when we had that bill a few years ago, a whole fleet of attorneys were flown out here. Anything which threatens the recruitment of the young into the smoking habit is stiffly resisted. Perhaps the extra money would be used to organize more groups of smokers to dissuade them from quitting, to re-educate them into the illogic of how it is a bad idea to respect others' health. Perhaps it will be used to sponsor a Virginia Slim's high school girls' tennis tournament. Perhaps it will be used to sponsor a Phillip Morris keiki soccer match.

"Mr. Speaker, the war against the ill health that is promoted by cigarettes is not going to be won if we are willing to set back and reduce the tax on cigarettes and, therefore, send that message that we are less committed. Do you have any doubt how this bill will be used if it passes? The tobacco companies will take this bill and run all across the nation and say, see, even Hawaii lowered its tax. Why don't you do the same thing New York, California, wherever? And while you're at it, how about increasing those federal subsidies for the poor tobacco industry?

"Mr. Speaker, this is now a national campaign. It reaches down to the very elementary schools where we have smoke-free classes. Attorneys are flying back and forth, back and forth. The whole product liability issue is bound up and who's funding it, and how it might help the tobacco industry? This is a national campaign for the health and well-being of the next generation. Of course, they testified for it.

"Mr. Speaker, Hawaii has been first in many things so we can be proud of the many kinds of laws we passed. And we can be proud of the stance we have taken -- bipartisan stance -- in favor of the health of our community. We can be proud of the volunteer efforts that are going on in the schools. But, Mr. Speaker, if we pass this bill, we cannot be proud. This is the wrong thing to do.

"I am sure there are many technical arguments how this can form such a law to this and that, and around and around we go, but the real result, Mr. Speaker, is a victory for those who want to profit over the ill health of our people and especially the next generation.

"This is why I feel so strongly about this. This bill doesn't belong on the floor of the House. This is inconsistent with our other public policy enactments. We should stand up for the health of our people and not give in to a very powerful industry that is anxious to take this new law and run all the over the country and say, see, even Hawaii gave us a break. Give me a break, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hemmings rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I want the record to reflect that I believe this is one of the first times in my ten years here at the Legislature that I have risen to speak against a tax break. But, Mr. Speaker, let the record also reflect that I do believe that certain taxes are necessary, and I do believe that certain quality government services are necessary; therefore, the need for taxes.

"But I believe, after the very precise words of the Health Committee chairman, that giving a tax break to a product that is killing Americans is unconscionable. I believe that the cigarette industry should be taxed out of existence. The fact that besides thousands of people dying yearly because of the consumption of this product, there is also the tremendous economic cost to every man, woman and child in this country regarding the prices we all pay for medical services and even death services. They are directly attributed to the consumption of this product.

"I find it unbelievable that we cannot give more tax breaks regarding health care services or eliminating taxes on food, fuel and recreation, or eliminating more taxes on the conduct of productive commerce and economic development, but yet we can give what amounts to a tax break to a product that is killing Americans.

"Mr. Speaker, I would ask that everyone on this floor think about this bill and its implications, and I would ask that we vote this measure down. We don't need to give a tax break to the cigarette industry.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Souki then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I guess I should be the villain and speak for this bill. Everybody is speaking on the emotional aspects of health and how good it is for the State that we should have very high taxes for something as bad as cigarette smoking. However, my good friends and members of the House, this is still a democracy. It's the peoples' choice as to what they should do with themselves and their lives.

"More important, though, is that this bill does not address health. It addresses equity. All the other tax bills that were provided to this House that had escalated clauses, we removed the clauses. We are saying that the responsibility and right to lower taxes or to raise taxes lies with this body and not with the administration. This amendment brings this right back to this body to raise or to lower taxes and not to let an automatic method that we don't have to take any action on. This restores the integrity of the Legislature. . .the House.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hemmings, in rebuttal, stated:

"I am quite perplexed by the previous speaker's remarks regarding the integrity of this body in instituting the spending of taxpayers' money, especially in the wake

of other programs that have been passed by this Legislature that were initiated in the executive branch of government without legislative overview.

"But the fact remains that the laws on taxation are very real and the laws on taxation are made on the floor of this Legislature, or certainly should be, and they are economic regulators. We tax and give incentives for people to have more children. We tax other products and obviously discourage the use and consumption, so the previous speaker is exactly right that we, on this floor, make tax laws to regulate economic activities and even social programs, so that does not become the reason to pass this bill. That becomes the very reason not to pass it. And, therefore, I would submit to you that the previous speaker's logic is exactly opposite of what we should be doing. We should be voting against this bill for the very reason he said we should be voting for it. We should be voting against this bill so this Legislature will send a strong signal out to the people of this State and to the people of the rest of this country that we're not hypocrites, that we're not going to waste their money on massive health care programs addressing cancer, that we're not going to continue to have one of the biggest causes of death in this nation -- cancer -- subsidized or benefitted through the cigarette industry who got a tax break.

"So I would submit to this body once again that that very logic is the reason to vote against this bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hayes rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I have had two deaths in my family of close relatives who would not give up smoking and died of lung cancer.

"I urge everyone in this body to vote against this bill."

At 10:27 o'clock a.m., Representative Isbell asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 10:31 o'clock a.m.

Representative Alcon then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, you know, the Legislature has been a martyr to everybody, and I think what we should realize on this point is that education begins at home -- from the time a child is born until he gets to his grave. Is it my fault, Mr. Speaker, that we cannot teach our children to keep away from something that is dangerous? I must tell you, Mr. Speaker, that those people who smoke know what they are doing and I don't see why we have to be father or mother to all those people. Let them do whatever they want to do! Let me just tell you also, Mr. Speaker, that alcohol kills more people than cigarettes. What are we doing about alcohol?"

"For that, Mr. Speaker, I support the bill and I urge everyone to do likewise."

Representative Peters then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"The fact is, we have the highest taxes on cigarettes in this country. Contrary to some of the remarks being made on this floor, we are 48 percent higher than the federal government, and we are approximately 30 percent higher than any other state in this country.

"I don't smoke, Mr. Speaker. I used to. I don't enjoy smoking, nor does the chairman smoke. Not too many of us around here smoke. That's besides the point. Let's present some rational facts in our deliberations on this floor and decide accordingly.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2989, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 36 ayes to 15 noes, with Representatives Amaral, Arakaki, Bellinger, Bybee, Cachola, Cavasso, Hagino, Hayes, Hemmings, Hiraki, Hirono, D. Ige, Shon, Stegmaier and Tam voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 2989 had passed Third Reading at 10:35 o'clock a.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 599-90 on H.B. No. 3236, HD 2:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3236, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Kawakami.

Representative Bellinger rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with the range of financial demands that are being made on the Legislature with many of the comments that are good, the Chairman of Finance has brought to our attention concerning how much money is being asked for in education, in housing, in health and human services, and in many other areas, it just doesn't seem prudent for us to be considering expending the sum of \$75,000 on doing a study in terms of self-esteem. I think if we are really interested in doing something to enhance self-esteem, we should begin right here at our own House floor and vote this bill down.

"Thank you."

Representative Liu rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I would like to echo the comments of the prior speaker from Kahaluu. I think he is right on the mark with his comments.

"Let me also quote from a recent article by a professor of philosophy at the University of California-Riverside, David Glidden. I think many of us saw his comments in this past Sunday's paper. I am going to quote a paragraph: 'The task force (meaning the California Task Force which apparently this bill was modeled on to some degree) bravely set out to discover a social vaccine to inoculate against despair and hopelessness. Requests for fresh statistics were made. Jonathan Swift would have loved this part best: "Far more study needs to be directed to how a person's self-esteem is affected by hunger and homelessness and on the appropriate social responsibility on the rest of society to welfare recipients."' 'Investigating the obvious,' Glidden goes on, 'is not the way to solve social failings.'

"I concur, Mr. Speaker. Where are we going to start next? Will we have a task force next year on love? Will we have a task force next year on how to be sensitive, or what we need to do to be sensitive to others? Perhaps we need a task force to talk about respect. All of these could be considered silver bullets to take care of the ills of our society and the problems that we all have to deal with. I

have no doubt that self-esteem is a question that we all must ask ourselves, let children ask themselves.

"But, Mr. Speaker, my guess is that this task force won't be able to even come to a real definition of what self-esteem is because we all have different ideas of what that term entails. The experts do as well as us. I would feel that if you divided up that \$75,000 among, say, a hundred families in Kukui Gardens or Mayor Wright Housing, we'd be doing a heck of a lot more for self-esteem in a solid way than whatever this report may suggest to us in the future.

"I hope we strongly think about this, Mr. Speaker, before we vote on this measure this morning.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Okamura then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Okamura's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, honorable members of the House, I wish to speak in favor of House Bill 3236, relating to the creation of a self-esteem task force. The mission of this task force will be to identify ways in which people's self-esteem can be raised, and to identify ways in which parents, schools, and society can help promote the self-esteem of present and future generations.

"To quote Henry Ford: 'If you think you can do well in life you're right. If you don't think you can do well, you're still right.' The importance of a healthy self image cannot be overemphasized. People who have positive self-esteem are more likely to be productive members of society; people who have positive self-esteem are less likely to abuse their children, be depressed, or resort to drugs. Unfortunately, low self-esteem exists with such prevalence in our society that we are no longer appalled by its tragic effects. Mr. Speaker, honorable members of the House, I speak to you today because we have a golden opportunity; an opportunity to give people respect for themselves and hope for their future. We have the opportunity to create hope out of doubt, and to instill pride in those who no longer see any meaning in their lives and their place in society. I speak to you today on self-esteem.

"Our society is not perfect; in fact, for many, life is a down right struggle, where each new day is merely another series of problems, hardships, and strife. We see many of these people as we walk uncaringly past them: They are unemployed, sleeping on the streets, drunk, addicted to drugs, on the verge of suicide, or just plain unhappy. Sure, we do offer these people our assistance: We give them food when they are hungry, money when they are poor, and shelter when they are homeless. What we don't give them, however, is a sense of pride, self-esteem, or confidence. To these people, defeat has become a sad, and inevitable way of life.

"Low self-esteem affects us all from time to time. We often get frustrated, angry, and raise our voices because we are unhappy with ourselves and our lives. We all know of the young school boy who fails, not because he is incapable or stupid, but because he believes himself unable to succeed; and the abused child who believes she deserves the torment and abuse that her similarly tormented father gives her.

"As any high school coach will tell you, if you don't face your adversary thinking you can win, you have already lost. If you don't think you are capable, you will

fail. While self confidence and self-esteem do not insure victory, they certainly give that person a chance. High self-esteem will not necessarily make scholars out of failures or winners out of losers, but it might. If we can give people hope, convince them that they can succeed, and teach them to like themselves, then they at least will not be defeated before they begin; and we can rewrite some of these tragedies with a happy ending."

Representative Arakaki then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I'm glad the first two speakers talked about or questioned why we are spending \$75,000, as the bill asks, to study self-esteem. And I guess, as your Chairman for Human Services, I can also attest that we're spending millions of dollars. . . we're paying the price for our failures in many of our systems. We're paying the price of the failure of many of our families, and we're looking for more and more programs for abused and neglected children, to rehabilitate substance abusers, for the pregnant teenager, and runaway youths. We're going to spend millions more for prison cells, more shelters for abused women, and shelters for the homeless. And we wonder why our children cannot read, why more children are learning disabled, or emotionally handicapped, and why there are more kids in gangs than there are in National Honor Societies. Well, the Hawaiians have a saying. They say, 'nana ike kumu,' which means, 'look to the source.' We spend a lot of money trying to treat our failures but too often respond to just symptoms of these failures, and we refuse to face that fact. Maybe we need to look at the source of our problems. What is the pain that our young people feel that drive them to use drugs, or alcohol? Why do they need to take drugs to ease that pain? What is the need for love that a young girl must have a baby of her own to provide her that love? Why must a young man turn to violence and a gang to find the acceptance and recognition he desires? And how hopeless is it for many young people and young adults who feel that suicide is the only way out?"

"I don't have those answers but I think that maybe there is a key, maybe we can prevent a lot of these long-term costs by looking at the source -- nana ike kumu -- the Hawaiians have a very wise saying. I think it is about time we looked at some of the causes for some of our problems instead of trying to treat the symptoms all the time. So, I want to urge my colleagues to support this.

"Thank you."

Representative Alcon rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, like I mentioned in House Bill 2989, education should begin from the home -- from the time a child is born until he goes to his grave.

"This bill, Mr. Speaker, will bring the homes, the churches, the communities and the schools back into upbringing those young children, and I agree with the previous speaker that there are a lot of causes of social ills because of the fact that we do not pay enough attention to our children.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Apo then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I am kind of amazed that there should be so much flak that I've been reading in the media and on the floor of this House. I guess we do have a tendency to want to legislate against bad behavior but everytime we

try to legislate for something to promote good behavior, we seem to run into problems.

"I think, Mr. Speaker, that this bill is probably ahead of its time because the information age is producing a generation of people, many of them sitting up there, who are beginning to turn away from the fundamental philosophy that government and society should be driven by economics and economics alone. And what we are witnessing of the generation today, following the 'flower' children of the 60s, is a generation that is beginning to place more emphasis and hold a higher value to things that are spiritual, and to things that contribute to the basic nature of man and in essence, in the long run affects behavior patterns that serve the common good.

"Self-esteem is one of those fundamental things about how people feel about themselves and if we had more self-esteem, Mr. Speaker, maybe we can get rid of the smoking problem because people wouldn't smoke.

"Thank you."

Representative Duldulao then rose and requested that her remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Duldulao's remarks are as follows:

"Self-esteem is a vital element in one's life. We present ourselves to others in a manner we feel inside of us. In my many interactions with youth-at-risk, I found that they're lacking pride, liking and trusting themselves. Their characteristics evolve from low or lack of self-esteem. I firmly believe and hope that with a strong emphasis of a self-esteem program added to our human services will be a successful tool for our youths to have in this time and age."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3236, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SELF-ESTEEM," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 44 ayes to 7 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Bellinger, Hayes, Hemmings, Liu, O'Kieffe and Taniguchi voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 3236 had passed Third Reading at 10:44 o'clock a.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 600-90 on H.B. No. 2104, HD 1:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2104, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Kanoho then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill with reservations, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Kanoho's remarks are as follows:

"The efforts to study the feasibility of cleaning the Ala Wai Canal for the expressed purpose of improving water quality is most laudible. The Ala Wai Canal extends along the entire northern border of Waikiki and a desired level of water quality would indeed enhance the beauty and image of this tourist mecca of the world.

"Although the bill currently appropriates only \$1, a creditable estimate of \$800,000 has been given for a combined feasibility study, engineering design and plans

while a feasibility study in the amount of \$200,000 could be incrementally and independently conducted. However, subsequent engineering activities, without direct benefit of the thought processes involved in the feasibility study could result in duplicative effort, conflicting intent and substantially more money.

"Most importantly, it was estimated that the needed work to effect improvement of water quality to desired levels would cost \$12- to \$15-million. It is very likely that the actual cost will approach \$20 million.

"We need to be totally aware of the magnitude of this project and its costs and unless we intend to make such a commitment at this time, it would be a total waste to expend our scarce resources on a feasibility study."

Representative Hayes then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating;

"Mr. Speaker, the people in my district are most enthusiastic about this bill. They look forward to the time when the Ala Wai Canal will be fit for swimming.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2104, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR A STUDY TO DETERMINE THE FEASIBILITY OF CLEANING THE ALA WAI CANAL," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 601-90 on H.B. No. 2791, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Souki, seconded by Representative Fukunaga and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2791, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR WAIPIO VALLEY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 602-90 on H.B. No. 3043, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Souki, seconded by Representative Fukunaga and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3043, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII FOR WAGE INCREASES FOR STUDENT ASSISTANTS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 2104, 2791 and 3043 had passed Third Reading at 10:45 o'clock a.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 603-90 on H.B. No. 2259, HD 2:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2259, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Fukunaga then rose and requested that her remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Fukunaga's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of H.B. No. 2259, HD 2, making an appropriation for improved public access, which would appropriate funds to promote improved public access throughout the State by using technological and other means.

"As you know, we began looking into ways to improve access to the legislature with Act 331, SLH 1989. With the funding provided, we have made great strides in making the Legislature more accessible to the people of Hawaii. Not only have our efforts been applauded by the public, we have encouraged others in the community to join us in improving communication between the Legislature and the people. For example, GTE Hawaiian Tel's generous donation of Fax machines in our public libraries has made a big difference in increasing the public's ability to communicate with legislators.

"Mr. Speaker, if we are serious about providing legislative access to the public, we must continue to expand public access. It is critical that we provide enough distribution points for public use so that the people can freely use the public access system throughout the State. For this reason, we should make the ACCESS Legislative Information Service accessible in key locations throughout the State.

"This bill would provide funding for additional access terminals, related communications lines, software and related equipment, and technical staffing in public schools, public school libraries, University of Hawaii library systems, neighbor island state office buildings, and state court libraries.

"In addition, in recognition that it is equally important to improve public access to legislative facilities, this measure also appropriates funds for the installation of benches outside conference rooms at the State Capitol to accommodate testifiers and other members of the public attending public hearings.

"Mr. Speaker, through your leadership, we have made vast improvements in providing improved legislative access in the past year. Let us continue our efforts in making the Hawaii State Legislature a leader in providing quality services to the people we represent by passing H.B. No. 2259, HD 2."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2259, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR IMPROVED PUBLIC ACCESS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 2259 had passed Third Reading at 10:46 o'clock a.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 604-90 on H.B. No. 2277, HD 2:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2277, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Shon then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'd like to acknowledge the Finance Committee and the Chair and the staff for this supportive and collaborative work that was done on this bill as well as the funds which were originally in the bill and are now in the budget document itself.

"I've spent probably the better part of the interim working on substance abuse. Our committee traveled around the islands. We spoke with dozens and dozens of organizations, people who are out in the front lines of this effort, and I can tell you that we've had like a twelve percent increase in drug-related crimes in the last year. This is in spite of some of the toughest laws on drug abuse, in spite of the drug paraphernalia law and a whole bunch of other things, that still this explosion is happening and we have to acknowledge it.

"Some of the things that we found, Mr. Speaker, were that while we have a lot of quality programs, they are very spotty. You'll find a great program and it's only in one or two schools or one and two neighborhoods. You'll find there are great facilities but it only serves just a fraction of what is needed. Just an example, the facility run by the Salvation Army for substance-abusing mothers and their young infants -- oh, it has about fifteen or twenty beds. They estimate on Oahu, the need may be as much as three hundred. This is just symptomatic of, I think, what we found is that the war on drugs has been a lopsided one a little bit so far. And I think we really need to begin to prioritize and identify those programs that are quality programs and will attempt to expand them to the various segments of our community that are not now served. Without this filtering through and focusing and prioritization, we are going to fund millions of dollars willy-nilly around the State and really never have a sense of purpose and a sense of accomplishment in the war on drugs.

"We've also found that there are some major bottlenecks in this effort. Many programs will not take substance abusers unless if they are so-called 'detoxed' and 'detoxed' programs -- programs to get someone off of what they are on -- are few and far between.

"We also lack facilities, Mr. Speaker. We hardly have places to send the teenagers, the pregnant substance-abusers, the alcoholics. We have had a very successful program located on the grounds of the Hawaii State Hospital and we need to provide for the rebuilding of that as the new State Hospital comes on line. We need more programs like the Bobby Benson Center. We need just a whole smattering of things that start in the schools. Our peer education program right now is only in eighteen schools. This bill and other funding would hope to expand that for self-esteem and other reasons. Once substance abusers are identified in the schools, we need to have a program to take those individuals and work with them. And, therefore, we have funding in the State budget for programs like the Hina-mauka Teen Care Program.

"We also need facilities for those individuals that simply cannot stay in their current environment and must be taken away from that, away from the temptations, detoxed, give real positive reinforcement in a new lifestyle. And we must admit, Mr. Speaker, that the rising land cost and housing have made it very difficult, very difficult indeed, to fund the number of beds that we need. If we don't strike now for some of these really needed facilities, who is going to be behind year after year after year? It happened in mental health. In mental health, we thought we were purchasing a certain number of beds and the skyrocketing costs have reduced that to some extent.

"I also think that, Mr. Speaker, our interim work revealed that we need some real creative solutions and some real aggressive outreach to those groups that don't necessarily walk in the door to line up at the bureaucracy. We need community health outreach workers and in so many ways it overlaps with AIDS, it overlaps with substance abuse, it overlaps with many, many other

areas. We're finding every social program we have in the State is under increased pressure because of substance abuse.

"I talked to a member of the construction trade a couple of weeks ago and he believes that thirty to fifty percent of his fellow workers are using ice -- crystal meth. Thirty to fifty percent! Of course, that's an anecdotal kind of statistics. But we know that this is very serious.

"Not too long ago, I had the opportunity to travel to one of the rural areas at 1:30 in the afternoon, Mr. Speaker. And everybody was on the street. It happened to be a Wednesday. You know, Wednesdays are short school days. You know, for four or five hours, our young people -- no supervision, nothing. And you wonder why something like 'ice' has spread so rapidly in this population.

"This bill, along with the State budget, is a modest proposal in my view. It left our committee with about \$8-million in general funds and with about \$3-million in facilities. Most of it is still intact, and I'm sure at the Senate side we will be assembling even more programs that are absolutely necessary.

"But I did want to thank the Chairman of Finance and the Finance Committee because they recognized that this was enough of a priority to add extra funds to the area. It is so crucial for everything that we hope and dream for our people, and I would like to thank all of you who worked on it and who supported it.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Liu then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill but I do have a reservation on it.

"I would just like to point out to the members that this bill does appropriate \$700,000 for the peer education program which was mentioned by the prior speaker and although there are instances and there are cases in some of the eighteen schools, there definitely seems to be some success here. It is still in the pilot phase -- there's no ifs, ands and buts about that.

"In my discussion with the two gentlemen who are intricately involved and in charge, they readily admit that the standards for evaluation of that program for the background to assess it have yet to really be creative. We have yet to receive all the information available to assess this program. And I would hope that it is successful. I would hope that this is money well spent to expand it, but I would hope that we will be cautious, that this will not set a precedent for other programs in terms of proceeding prior to getting the kind of information we would really like before knowing that these moneys should be put forward.

"With those reservations, Mr. Speaker, I do believe this whole area of prevention and help for substance abuses is worthwhile.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2277, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SUBSTANCE ABUSE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 605-90 on H.B. No. 3171, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Souki, seconded by Representative Fukunaga and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3171, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR A LOAN PROGRAM FOR PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 2277 and 3171 had passed Third Reading at 10:55 o'clock a.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 606-90 on H.B. No. 3018, HD 2:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 3018, HD 2, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative M. Ige then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this measure has two parts: The first part regarding the limitation of services which I have some major problems with, and the second part which allocates some moneys for the Waianae Coast for the protective services team out there which I support wholeheartedly.

"Mr. Speaker, it is the first part regarding the limitation of services that I have a problem with. I've been here for the past twelve years, serving the people of my district, and have been proud of the many accomplishments that we've made together regarding our children. But Mr. Speaker, it appears that this one particular bill takes us a whole step backward and brings us back to point one.

"Mr. Speaker, as the bill reads, the Director shall have the authority to set priorities and limits on the number of children for whom services are provided. You know, child abuse for our children should not be limited to an allocated amount of dollars. Our children must know that if they are in jeopardy of being abused, that someone will be there to protect them. This is an important philosophical point that we must make to our children, and this bill does the opposite.

"Thank you."

Representative Kanoho then rose and stated:

"I wish to speak in support of the bill but with reservations for the reasons expressed by the previous speaker, and I wish that the remarks of the previous speaker be inserted into the Journal as my own."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Anderson then rose and stated:

"I had some reservations but I more or less wanted to go no on this bill primarily because I felt the same way that Representative M. Ige did. However, at times when you do something like this, people think that you are against children rather than trying to look at the idea that you're for them, and the bill itself just doesn't explain it well enough.

"And I think he did such a great job, I would like to have his words inserted into the Journal as my own, and I will be going no.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3018, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHILD PROTECTIVE SERVICES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Anderson and M. Ige voting no.

They were accompanied by their teacher, Mr. Enrique Reyes, and Mrs. Theresa Anderson, a parent.

I mean, we might just as well amend this bill and include that elected officials receive birthday cards and Christmas cards to enhance our self-esteem.

Thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 3030, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARINGS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Bellinger voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 3030 had passed Third Reading at 11:23 o'clock a.m.

H.B. No. 2038 (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 623-90):

On motion by Representative Metcalf, seconded by Representative Hagino and carried, H.B. No. 2038, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PROTECTIVE ORDERS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

On motion by Representative Metcalf, seconded by Representative Hagino and carried, H.B. No. 1699, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ATTORNEYS' FEES AND COSTS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Anderson voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 2112, 3220, 2842, 2872, 2022 and 1699 had passed Third Reading at 11:25 o'clock a.m.

H.B. No. 2201, HD 1 (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 631-90):

Representative Metcalf moved that H.B. No. 2201, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hagino.

Representative Liu rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I commend the Judiciary Committee for attempting to do something concerning the problem of ties and how our current statutes are framed on that. However, I strongly believe that this is not the way to go. The formula provided for within the bill, I believe, favors larger precincts over smaller precincts. It subtly encourages people running for office to spend more time in larger precincts or districts, depending on the race, rather than the smaller precincts or districts. And I think any kind of policy statement that somehow grants more weight to a voter just because they live in a certain area is not fair and is not good under our elective laws. It may pass the constitutional muster, it may pass various legal tests, but I think it shouldn't pass the policy requirements that everyone who votes, regardless of where they live, will have their vote counted the same as anyone else, whether it is a tie situation or whether it's in a normal voting election.

"For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I urge us to disapprove of this bill and come up with a different formula.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson then rose and stated:

"I have some reservations and they were stated by the Minority Leader, and I would like to have his words put in the Journal as my own. (By reference only)

"I would also like to explain that there's lots of philosophical differences on many bills. Even though there's only six of us, we have all gone down, but on this particular bill I do have some reservations, but I would like to sit on committee, so at that time I would hope that even if we all go down, that's because, philosophically, I cannot buy some of them.

"Thank you."

The Chair remarked:

"That's a good one. That's the first time I've heard that explanation."

Representative Metcalf then rose and stated:

"I would yield to Representative Cachola to defend this bill, but if I did, we'll be here all night, so I will take the Minority's concerns under advisement."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2201, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ELECTIONS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Cavasso, Hemmings, Liu, Marumoto and O'Kieffe voting no.

H.B. No. 2089, HD 1 (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 632-90):

On motion by Representative Metcalf, seconded by Representative Hagino and carried, H.B. No. 2089, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ADOPTION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 2053, HD 1 (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 633-90):

On motion by Representative Metcalf, seconded by Representative Hagino and carried, H.B. No. 2053, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE IV, SECTIONS 4, 5, AND 6, OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF HAWAII TO REVISE THE LAWS REGARDING APPORTIONMENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 2201, 2089 and 2053 had passed Third Reading at 11:29 o'clock a.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 634-90 on H.B. No. 2546, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Metcalf, seconded by Representative Hagino and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2546, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO METHAMPHETAMINE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 635-90 on H.B. No. 2354, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Metcalf, seconded by Representative Hagino and carried, the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2354, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO YOUTH CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Cavasso, M. Ige and Liu voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 636-90 on H.B. No. 2269, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Metcalf, seconded by Representative Hagino and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2269, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ORGANIZED CRIME," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 2546, 2354 and 2269 had passed Third Reading at 11:30 o'clock a.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 637-90 on H.B. No. 2044, HD 2:

Representative Metcalf moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2044, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hagino.

Representative Liu then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"First of all, Mr. Speaker, I would like to make it very clear that I am speaking against this measure. I do not speak against the need to help people in the area of AIDS and the problems surrounding AIDS transmission, nor do I speak against the efforts and the goodwill of those people who strongly support this measure -- many, many good people who are professionals, and persons whose ideas and concepts I do respect.

"But this is one of those bills that does not fall neatly into one specific subject. It is not only a bill dealing with the potential spread of AID, it is not only a bill concerning counseling for those who are involved with drugs or who are substance abuser, it is a bill that also sends out other kinds of messages, a bill that deals with law enforcement, a bill that deals with questions of liability on the part of the State and others. So I feel that if we must make a choice, Mr. Speaker, on this very sensitive and new area of exploration in attempting to prevent the spread of AIDS, I would hope that we fall this morning on the side of the Honolulu Police Department, of the City and County Prosecutor of Honolulu, on the side of the Prosecutor on Kauai, on the side of the Prosecutor of the Big Island who indicates that although he is open to the idea, he does not give his support to this measure, and on the side of the United States Attorney, Dan Bent, that we should not go in this direction.

"I would like to point out to my colleagues that although a lot has been said about counseling in this bill, associated with whatever program is created here, counseling is not mandated in regard to the individual user. In other words, someone who comes in and asks for a needle need not necessarily sign up or have to get counseling under this bill. Perhaps that is intended, but I have heard no clear statement that in fact, prior to getting a clean needle under this program, that that substance abuser will have to agree in writing or otherwise that they go through counseling. So it is questionable whether all those who receive needles under this program will, in fact, get the kind of counseling which the proponents have

discussed. I am sure they would like to, Mr. Speaker, have that involved but if they don't mandate it, if it is not stated in the bill, I think we should have grave concerns over that.

"Another area of great concern is where -- where is the program going to set up? Are there any mechanisms within the bill that indicate that the public will have a chance to air their views concerning the location of this program? This is not just a question of 'not in my backyard' because there is a very sad example where a needle exchange program was in existence in Zurich and the creation of a 'needle park' did result. So those of us, like in my district where there may be concerns, where there exist right now a concentration of drug abuse, I think we should be concerned.

"Another area of concern, Mr. Speaker, is that none of the law enforcement officials, nor in any of the hearings I think, were we given assurances that monitoring of what happens to these needles can be guaranteed. In our caucus, in going over these bills, we spoke to an individual who is involved in passing out clean needles in San Francisco and he admitted that after they passed out the needles, he could not say whether or not those needles were still shared. He could not say how those needles were discarded. Were they just thrown in the rubbish can where a kid could grab it and hurt themselves, or a maintenance worker, for that matter? It is a concern, Mr. Speaker. On national TV, there was a scene presented, a real scene -- not a live reenactment -- but a real scene of police securing some drug abusers, frisking those people, and one of those policemen injuring himself on a needle.

"Now, although there is immunity built into the bill for the State and State employees and other 'participating' persons in this needle exchange program, I just wonder whether or not a court would uphold that immunity should somebody get injured by a needle that can be traced back to the State. And if it does hold up, I wonder whether it should. The proponents have said that this will not conflict with the paraphernalia law which we worked so long and hard to draft. But again I wonder, Mr. Speaker, if I am a defense attorney or public defender, if I can trace the needle of my client to the State, I wonder whether or not I would not use the argument that, in fact, my client should not be found guilty because this is a paraphernalia given out by the State. If you were the judge, Mr. Speaker, would you deny that defense? It is very difficult, Mr. Speaker.

"So I hope, Mr. Speaker, that the hard choice provided to us by this measure and the worthy discussion that has surrounded it will have us fall on the side of caution and to those involved in law enforcement, and perhaps more creative ideas concerning passing out sterilization kits, or bleach. These ideas should be explored which is less onerous and there is less chance for these things to cause danger to others.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Shon then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"First, I would like to begin by acknowledging the good work of the many organizations that have lobbied so hard and so compassionately for a bill which raises many questions at first blush but which answers most of the concerns. These organizations include the Hawaii Council of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, the Hawaii Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics, the Hawaii League for Nursing, the Hawaii Medical Association, the Hawaii Nurses Association, the Hawaii Psychiatric Association, the State Department of Health,

the Hawaii Public Health Association, the Hemophilia Foundation, Kalihi-Palama Health Clinic, Kapiolani Medical Center, many others, including, I might add, the Lions Club of Chinatown which is donating money to purchase needles in a needle exchange.

"I think it is very important to acknowledge that there has been much discussion about how this interrelates with the drug paraphernalia law which is now canonized as the ultimate solution in some peoples' eyes. You know, if you talk with the police, they will tell you, which is what they testified last year, they do not arrest anybody just for having a needle. In other words, they are not going out on Hotel Street and finding people today who are in the possession of a needle and arresting them. That is not the case. They testified in the committee twice last year. They are not going to arrest anybody involved with this program because they are not arresting anybody right now. Where they add the drug paraphernalia charge is upon an arrest for something else where someone else who has a needle, so it is very important to clarify that this in no way undermines an existing approach by law enforcement.

"With respect to the experience for these programs, we had a letter from one of the law enforcement officials from Tacoma. It said they like the program. For one thing, it got rid of a lot of dirty needles that were all hanging around the streets because rather than discarding a dirty needle for somebody to pick up, those who participated in the program had to bring one in -- one for one.

"We know that we've had a twelve percent increase in drug-related crimes under the drug paraphernalia law, and we know that we've got to find some way of getting to these individuals. It's not easy. You don't just set up shop and say, come in, I want to talk to you and change your life. You have to develop a personal relationship with those who are deeply involved in a very tragic compulsion and addiction.

"The statistics are very clear, Mr. Speaker. In program after program, there is virtually no evidence -- no evidence -- that this in any way encourages drug abuse but to the contrary, plenty of evidence that people are recruited into drug treatment and rehabilitation programs. In fact, in his staunch opposition to the bill, the prosecutor and those who did testify against, could supply us with virtually no statistics. All it was was philosophy.

"I submit to you, Mr. Speaker, that the specter of more and more children born with a life expectancy of little more than a year, a very painful death from AIDS, is a specter of this disease making a complete bridge from drug abusers into the general population, the specter of having no successful way of reaching out to these substance abusers who are using the needles. These, in my view, add up to a bill that I believe will save lives.

"There's really no need or desire on the part of health officials, or this individual speaking here today, to stick our collective necks out for a program that we don't think will save lives. I have no doubt that we may lose a few votes, but votes are not lives, Mr. Speaker. I know already the brochure is being prepared -- Shon promotes substance abuse. That is irrelevant because we are talking about lives. We are talking about one of the most complex and frightening diseases that we have before us, and we are talking about a population that does not respond, as you and I, to logic when they're under the grips of substance abuse in a normal way.

"I think that there has been a lot of testimony. We need not go on into great length, but I will tell you very clearly that the statistics and the facts indicate that these programs do recruit people into programs to get them off

drugs, they do not spread drug abuse, they do not conflict with the existing practices of law enforcement, and they do prevent the spread of AIDS.

"For these reasons, I hope all of you will support this issue.

"Thank you."

Representative Apo then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, it's unfortunate that what we have here is a conflict in public purposes between the war on AIDS and the war on drugs.

"I am voting for the bill because anytime we have two cross purposes with respect to a public purpose, we have to look at which action will provide for the common benefit as opposed to the negatives.

"The arguments being used by those who are concerned about the effect that this would have on the war on drugs are basically reflecting a supply side war. And I really don't believe, Mr. Speaker, that any supply side war from now until the end of eternity is ever going to win the war on drugs. I do believe that this bill does help and will provide relief for AIDS. For that reason, I think there are more benefits accruing to society by voting for the bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Kanoho then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill with reservations, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Kanoho's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, colleagues and friends, the issue of AIDS prevention is at the forefront of our concerns for public health and welfare.

"Despite education and awareness programs that have made significant impact in virtually all high-risk categories, Dr. Lewin's media report on the latest statistics on AIDS among IV users reveal a disturbingly high rate of growth.

"Admittedly, when the needle exchange program was first introduced, I, like many opponents feared that we would be 'sending out the wrong signals to drug users.'

"However, recent testimony supporting this innovative program has prompted a far greater concern for public safety, and a far greater compassion for those intimately involved in the lives of the IV user.

"This insidious disease is transmitted not only to their drug and sexual partners, but tragically to their children as well. It is one thing to sentence one's self to a lifetime of misery, but it is certainly a different matter to sentence another innocent life to an ominous future.

"If the IV users are physiologically and/or psychologically incapable of making responsible decisions, then it is incumbent on those in position of authority to intervene on behalf of the public good.

"It is for this reason, and this reason alone, that I vote in favor of this measure, albeit with reservations that I delineate in my memorandum to be sent out this week.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for this time to make my remarks, and to urge my colleagues to support this legislation."

Representative Stegmaier then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Despite the good intentions of those who are proponents of the bill, and their good intentions are that they believe this bill would attempt to counter the spread of AIDS, I raise the question -- what else would we be doing in establishing this program? Just looking at it very practically and considering the lives that could be lost, how much consideration have we given to the fact that a needle distribution program of this type would be likely to congregate Hawaii's relatively dispersed IV drug-using population and thus make the spread of AIDS even more likely? Clean needles, Mr. Speaker, can get dirty very quickly when people congregate.

"With regard to the larger issue of the message that we are conveying by supporting this bill, Mr. Speaker, drug use is an epidemic problem in our State as well as across the nation. In order to solve this problem, I believe we must take a strong and uncompromising stance against any program which would assist persons in committing drug offenses.

"The needle exchange bill, if passed by the Legislature, would directly assist drug users by providing them with the means to use illegal drugs. This would send the wrong message to our community, making it appear that we condone the use of IV drugs as long as it is done safely with clean needles.

"For these reasons, Mr. Speaker, I am opposed to this bill despite the good intentions of its proponents.

"Thank you."

Representative Duldulao then rose and requested that her remarks, against the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Duldulao's remarks are as follows:

"This bill sends wrong messages to the people of Hawaii. We are going forth and strong in the battle of DRUGS. We have staged big campaigns against drugs; however, this bill contradicts our message.

"I concur with the testimony given by Prosecutor Keith Kaneshiro. There is no guarantee that the participants of this program will abide by the rules to keep the needles clean and safe."

Representative Amaral then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I speak in favor of this measure, given a background of law enforcement, given a bias already against drug abusers and drug dealers, given a feeling that drug dealers are an anathema in our society and deserves stiffer penalties and longer incarceration and should be out of our neighborhood, and out of our community, and out of our State, I still support this measure.

"I support this measure because this is not a crime-control bill. This is a public health measure because the children that are born with HIV infection is double the amount this year, and next year will double again, and that these children are born to die.

"I speak in favor of this measure because it is not enough for us to be in the schools educating the children

about how to control AIDS. It is not enough to be in the homosexual and heterosexual communities and educate people about their sexual conduct and the control of the spread of the AIDS disease. But we must actually take a brave new step and this is one of them, as controversial as it may appear. I believe that there are inherent controls in this and if it is not sufficient, then let us put more controls in this measure before we finally pass it out. But the time to act is now for the protection of the future babies to be born, not just with drug addiction, but born with a fatal disease.

"Thank you."

Representative Cavasso rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I recognize that we are faced with two wars -- the war on drugs and the war on AIDS -- and that our war on AIDS includes our efforts to save the children from infection. And in that sense, those who are supporting the measure with full confidence are working with heartfelt concern for the children, but I feel that as this measure is currently drafted that it is sending a double message. It is sending a message that we may condone drugs. What happens when I tell young people in my community that drug distribution is a crime, that drug use is a crime, that distribution of paraphernalia is a crime, that the use of paraphernalia for drug users is a crime, but that it is alright for the State to pass out paraphernalia for the use of that which is a crime. It's a double message that's not good.

"The prosecutor testified that the crime has increased in Tacoma since they implemented this program, that crimes related to drugs have increased. There are European programs that have shown that it's being destructive, that it's being misused.

"I would urge others to vote 'no' against the program but recognizing right now frankly that it looks like there are more votes in favor of it. I would say that if we do intend to go ahead with it, that we need to address a couple of things then throughout the remainder of this session as the previous speaker alluded to.

"I note that in the bill right now that we are asking for data to be gathered on drug addicts and newborn babies. We are asking for data for HIV-infections and the rate of growth in HIV, but we are not asking for data on the growth of drugs, we are not asking for data on the effect on the war on drugs. We're not requiring that those who come in for the needles be part of the program. We're not really requiring that this program be used as a vehicle to address the war on drugs as well as the war on AIDS, and we should and can put clauses into this bill that will require that we address both wars. And I would hope that in committees, and as it comes back from the Senate, that we would work on putting those checks and balances into this so that we know that this can be used as both a tool for the war on the AIDS disease as well as the war on drugs.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2044, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO A PILOT PROGRAM TO REDUCE THE TRANSMISSION OF INFECTIOUS AND COMMUNICABLE DISEASES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 40 ayes to 11 noes, with Representatives Andrews, Bunda, Bybee, Cavasso, Duldulao, Hemmings, M. Ige, Liu, Peters, Souki and Stegmaier voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 2044 had passed Third Reading at 11:54 o'clock a.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 638-90 on H.B. No. 2573, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Metcalf, seconded by Representative Hagino and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2573, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CARPOOL LANES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 2573 had passed Third Reading at 11:55 o'clock a.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 639-90 on H.B. No. 2387, HD 2:

Representative Metcalf moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2387, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hagino.

Representative Hemmings rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"This bill is a well-intentioned bill that I don't believe even goes quite far enough with a very serious problem.

"In a recent hearing concerning this bill, there was evidence brought forth by a testifier that went on public record that there's a very serious ethical problem concerning the appraisals done by the State and that problem concerns, first and foremost, appraisals being done by unqualified appraisers which this bill addresses.

"Secondly, the appraisals done by the State are oftentimes awarded on a non-bid basis and go to people who were involved in contributing heavily to certain political efforts which is a blatant exploitation of the process. It was also revealed in testimony that this oftentime results in appraisals costing way more than they should under normal circumstances. The testifier also brought out in testimony that the people involved in appraising multi-million dollars in the Department of Land and Natural Resources in government also do not have adequate certification to be qualified to appraise some of these situations.

"Therefore, this bill is the right bill at the right time. I am hoping that as it weaves its way through the legislative process, it will become even more forceful in curbing the apparent abuses.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Metcalf then rose and remarked:

"Mr. Speaker, it is very gratifying to hear the Minority speaking in favor of one of the Judiciary Committee's bills.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2387, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GOVERNMENT APPRAISALS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 640-90 on H.B. No. 2353, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Metcalf, seconded by Representative Hagino and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. "I feel that the State could do more to protect its residents from drunk drivers and to protect the drunk drivers from themselves.

"Mr. Speaker, according to the Motor Vehicle Safety Office, during 1988 there were 129 fatalities statewide in which 72, or 56 percent, were alcohol-related, and of these 53, or 41 percent, had blood alcohol concentration above the legal limit of .10 percent.

"The strength of this bill was diluted in committee by several amendments. One deleted the lower standard of alcohol concentration for drivers under the age of 21 although they cannot legally consume alcohol. Another placed the burden of proof on the State at the administrative hearing.

"This bill was also amended to make the ignition interlock system discretionary rather than mandatory. It may have been prudent to do this, given the expense of the system and the shaky financial standing of the suppliers of the devices. The way to reinvigorate the strength of this bill would be to adopt the suggestion made to us by MADD -- Mothers Against Drunk Driving.

"There should be a mandatory license suspension for first offenders. This would be a simpler and more effective deterrent to drunk driving.

"Mr. Speaker, this bill should be passed today, but I hope that the Senate will consider amending it by making license suspension mandatory for even first-time DUI offenders and by reinstating the lower alcohol tolerance level for minors.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3429, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO REVOCATION OF DRIVER'S LICENSE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of House Bill No. 2290, House Draft 2.

"Mr. Speaker, House Bill No. 2290, House Draft 2, will establish the Hawaii Strategic Development Corporation. This bill will create a fund to finance new enterprises.

"The purpose of this bill is to foster innovative and high technology businesses, while building a diversified economy in Hawaii. The resulting employment opportunities will be a benefit to the community.

"The Hawaii Strategic Development Corporation will be placed within the Department of Business and Economic Development for administrative purposes. This will be a joint venture between government and private sector.

"The corporation uses public funds to attract private investment organizations, from both within the state and out-of-state. Thus the fund uses the relatively small amount of public funds as bait to attract the much larger amounts of money available in the private sector, while tapping the expertise of the private sector in making the investments. The impact of the public money committed to the project is increased many times over. When financial assistance is rendered, the corporation will make provisions for the recovery of expenditures as much as possible.

"I believe the Hawaii Strategic Development Corporation is an essential measure for economic diversification and growth. I urge all of my colleagues to vote in favor of this measure."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2290, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Anderson voting no.

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2287, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative D. Ige then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative D. Ige's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of H.B. 2287, HD 2.

"Mr. Speaker, through H.B. 2287, HD 2, a securities exchange and full service financial mall will be planned and developed for Hawaii. The funds for this project will be expended by the Department of Business and Economic Development.

"I believe this is important for Hawaii's expanding role as a financial center for the Pacific region. It also contributes to the diversification of the economy and weans the State from economic dependence on tourism and the military industry.

"To ensure the securities exchange succeeds, a full service financial mall would be established. This would include exchange trading floors and facilities for operational and support activities.

"The securities exchange will draw capital to the State and create new and rewarding careers for the citizens of Hawaii.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I urge my colleagues to join me in supporting this bill."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2287, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO

A FINANCIAL MALL," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Cavasso, Hemmings and Liu voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 671-90 on H.B. No. 2603, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Souki, seconded by Representative Fukunaga and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2603, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH CARE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 2287 and 2603 had passed Third Reading at 12:11 o'clock p.m.

At 12:12 o'clock p.m., Representative Apo asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:22 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 673-90 on H.B. No. 2582, HD 2:

Representative Apo moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2582, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Arakaki then rose and stated:

"I will have the entire text of my comments submitted for the Journal, but I felt compelled to highlight one of my comments. It's a real concern that I want to share with my colleagues.

"There's one aspect of homelessness that really bothers me and it has to do with the fact that we're beginning to see many families. . .you know, we talked about families, and we're beginning to see many families in our shelters. Where once upon a time most of the people who were in our shelters were single men and women who were recovering mentally ill people or alcoholics and substance abusers, we're finding more families with young children, and this really bothers me. And this bill just addresses that problem in a small way. But I hope that all my colleagues agree that we really don't want to see our young children growing up in this type of environment where they are sleeping and mingling with these other adults. And I really hope that we can, during this session, respond to that crisis and that problem, and I would like to ask my colleagues for any suggestions and for their support to deal with this problem.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Further remarks by Representative Arakaki are hereby inserted:

"For us, it's another day for you and me in paradise.

"For those who live in paradise, the plight of the homeless seems so distant in our collective consciences.

"But for those who, like President Ronald Reagan, believe that the market economy would provide homes for low income families if there is a demand for it.

"Think twice . . .

"For those who think that homelessness is a matter of choice, try spending one or two nights on the street and think twice if you would choose that way of living.

"For those who think that many of the homeless belong in mental health or substance abuse treatment facilities, think twice because the ones on the street are those released from treatment centers and hospitals to make room for more serious cases.

"For those who believe that many of the homeless belong in prison for being vagrants, think twice because the ones in the streets are the ones being released because prisons are overcrowded and are released with no provision for shelter or employment.

"For those who believe that homelessness is a small price we must pay for a healthy economy and after all, doesn't our low unemployment rate show that most people are working and making a living?

"For the hundreds who are working but are homeless in shelters, in cars and in our parks, and there are hundreds more who are one month's rent or a security deposit away from being homeless.

"Now, even if you still believe that homelessness affects only a small segment of the population.

"We all need to think twice. . .

"Even if you are willing to accept the homelessness of the mentally ill, the substance abusers, or the unemployed and even if you're willing to accept that homelessness is a matter of choice, it's unconscionable that as life goes on in paradise, there are many homeless children who have no choice in being homeless. If their families are homeless, then they must be homeless too!

"It's shameful that we are raising a generation of homeless children, the impact of which we shall all pay for. It is not a partisan issue. While we may not agree on how it is to be done, I believe all your members agree that it is a priority issue. This bill requires that the state agencies get their act together to respond to the problems of the homeless which has been weak and fragmented up to now. If it weren't for the private agencies and the churches, we would really be in crisis now.

"But we can no longer afford to respond to crisis. We can't be thinking about putting our homeless in warehouses or even an ocean liner, as was earlier proposed. They may say it's only temporary, but we know that all too often temporary becomes permanent. We need to look for permanent and long term solutions that will provide assurances that no family, especially those with young children, will be homeless."

Representative Anderson then rose and stated:

"I would like to speak in favor of this bill and since the representative asked for suggestions. . .for many years now, I've been saying we own all of the land up at Waimano Home. We have lots of facilities up there that are not being utilized. I have asked the department why we could not use them either for the homeless or others that may need some type of shelter, and I would hope that since the facilities are there, they are owned by the State, they are not going to cost additional money to the taxpayers other than maybe refurbishing them a little, I would hope that we could use it.

"Thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2582,

HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HOMELESS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 674-90 on H.B. No. 2308, HD 2:

Representative Apo moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2308, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Anderson then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, on the youth gangs response system, we are looking at \$2,063,000, and I have some reservations about that, Mr. Speaker, only because this morning we are spending \$75,000 on self-esteem and we have some other bills. I told you this when we started this year, Mr. Speaker, that I personally would be introducing bills to help families, not necessarily costing the taxpayers any money.

"We have youth gangs and they evidently need help in self-esteem. But when we have bills that says that the youth should be having their license taken away if they are driving under the influence of drugs and liquor, we don't pass bills like that because we're afraid to make sure those youths are going to be corrected when we take away their license until the age of 21. It doesn't cost the taxpayers anything, but it certainly tells them that we are concerned and we care.

"When we think of innovative ideas like having the schools have dress codes so that they'll have youth gangs dressing alike, instead these people would be dressing according to the schools. We don't want to do that. When we say, Mr. Speaker, that we would hope that these young people would get off the streets at certain hours of the night, that would certainly help in taking care of youth gangs. We say we can't do things like that because that would create problems. How then in the world, Mr. Speaker, could we help youth if we don't have some new and innovative ideas that's not costing the taxpayers and letting them know that we do care and we do love them? We're not necessarily throwing money, but we are going ahead and letting them know that we care, and that we are concerned and maybe they won't have youth gangs. Maybe we could have organized school activities rather than saying, no, we can't go ahead and do this, we're going to spend \$2-million to find out how we're going to take care of you.

"For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I do have some concerns, and I hope that when the bill goes to committee, they would look at some ways to help the youth and will help organize them in groups working together rather than in group gangs working against one another.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Amaral then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"This bill is a crime control, crime prevention bill in its focus and in its intention. It is a mechanism whereby we can begin to deal with an emerging problem that shows itself to be actually of epidemic proportions nationwide. It is intended to link up an informational network with all of law enforcement so that information can be shared with regard to the conduct of youth gangs and appropriate law enforcement response can be created.

"Additionally, we see funds for the Department of Education to train them in dealing with these youths that are enrolled in their schools.

"We see also money set aside to go back into the community where the creative, innovative programs are taking place so that we can support the communities and their efforts because we know, if anyone knows how to deal with this problem, our communities certainly do as well as law enforcement.

"Finally, there is provision for an evaluation mechanism to ascertain what it is we have accomplished and to help us to better plan in the future by way of an intelligent response.

"I will agree that this is no magic bullet. This will not solve all of our problems with regard to inappropriate youth conduct but it is, I believe, a brave step forward, and for that reason I urge all of you to support this measure.

"Thank you."

Representative Hemmings then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to echo the sentiments articulated by the representative from Maunawili and Kailua and underscore the fact that we in society are sending out amazingly contradictory messages to the young people of this nation regarding drugs. And especially on television, Mr. Speaker, where we have become so liberal in our society where children grow up seeing violence, seeing drug consumption. Mr. Speaker, one night I turned on the TV and my two young daughters were with me, and it was a feature movie and the story line concerned two lesbian lovers who were involved in a manege atroci-a and the male in the threesome got his kicks by watching. This was on TV, Mr. Speaker. I can remember the days when I grew up that having two people even in bed together on TV was a no-no. We have liberalized our laws in pornography. We're telling youth that the exploitation sexually of people is a terrible thing but it's not so terrible that you can't go down to the corner store and buy a book and watch it and observe it for a few bucks. But I guess that's a right of everybody.

"We are telling our young people that you should stay home and participate in family activities but the curfew laws are weak and unenforced. We're telling our young people that, yes, we are in favor of the year of the family and boy, we're going to do everything we can to promote the family but while we are doing it, we are passing laws to take away the family's right to participate in life and death decision-making concerning our children. So we cast our young people into a limbo of moral hell and then we turn around and we say, we're going to solve these problems because we're going to spend a great amount of money, time and effort creating youth gang response systems.

"Mr. Speaker, when is this lunacy going to stop? When are we going to start producing consistent laws that tell the young people where we stand on these moral, social and economic issues and stop sending them the mixed signals such as drugs are illegal but here's your needle.

"Mr. Speaker, I share the representative from Maunawili's concerns on this issue and that's why I am hoping that we will examine these signals further, and I vote with reservations on this bill."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2308, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO YOUTH GANGS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 675-90 on H.B. No. 2282, HD 2:

Representative Apo moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2282, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Kawakami then rose and requested that her remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Kawakami's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of House Bill No. 2282, HD 2.

"At the start of this session, Mr. Speaker, you made a pledge to focus our collective efforts to help the family. And we Democrats stood ready to honor that pledge.

"Mr. Speaker, today we turn that pledge into action with the passage of this bill.

"This Majority Package measure is our commitment to assist our families in their search for adequate and affordable care. House Bill No. 2282, HD 2, provides a comprehensive approach to developing a respite care system for our hardworking caregivers who provide home care to family members of any age with chronic illnesses or disabilities.

"Among other things, this bill (1) provides support services and training to families who provide home care; (2) expands respite care services; (3) develops a statewide caregiving program; and (4) expands the crisis intervention services for the elderly. This bill will provide the needed resources to the family and increase the family's ability to provide care to their loved one at home.

"I am amazed at the dedication and love these caregivers are able to provide to those in need. At the same time, I recognize the tremendous stress and pressure imposed upon them and the need for assistance. I lasted not even a month when I experienced the life of a caregiver for my Mom one summer. The relief offered by this bill will help our caregivers to continue their important work.

"Mr. Speaker, after seeing what the caregivers must do for their loved ones, 24-hours a day, day in and day out, it is easy to point to any caregiver and say, 'there goes a hero.'

"Mr. Speaker, let's collectively applaud the dedicated work of our unsung heroes by passing this comprehensive respite package today.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Arakaki then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Arakaki's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of House Bill No. 2282, HD 2.

"Mr. Speaker and fellow members, I don't know if any of you are caregivers of an elderly family member, but if the survey by the Executive Office on Aging is any indication, 20 percent of you are, just as 20 percent of our State employees are currently caregivers. If you add to this the number of physically and mentally disabled adults and children who are also being cared for by their families, the numbers are staggering. The numbers are probably far beyond what you would guess, but they should come as no surprise because for most of our ethnic cultures here in Hawaii, care for a family member is more than just a moral obligation, it is a given. For many families, it is not a matter of choice, but also a matter of economics or family pride. All too often our families are left with the dilemma of high cost institutional care or being reduced to poverty in order to receive State financed care. Would you consider those choices? Well nor do most families in Hawaii. That is why so many families, even those with both spouses working, and single parent families struggle to keep their family members at home. Even with their limited resources, limited time and limited training in caregiving, they still manage to provide a level of care that few institutions can match. At the same time, they save the State millions in health care costs.

"Isn't it time, Mr. Speaker and fellow members, that we show our support and gratitude for our family caregivers? Isn't it time that we spell 'relief' for our family caregivers by providing them with much needed respite? Isn't it time that we provide them with the training and resources to continue to provide quality care for their family member that will prevent costly premature and unnecessary institutionalization? I believe, Mr. Speaker, that it is time. Your support for House Bill 2282 will send a clear message to thousands of family caregivers that their time and efforts are truly appreciated.

"Mahalo."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2282, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LONG-TERM CARE AND FAMILY CAREGIVERS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 676-90 on H.B. No. 2938, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2938, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE GENERAL EXCISE TAXATION OF FINANCIAL CORPORATIONS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 677-90 on H.B. No. 2885, HD 1:

Representative Apo moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2885, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Liu then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against this bill, not against affordable housing. In 1987, I did support the Governor's package -- omnibus bill and appropriations --

to get the government massively involved in the building of homes in the hopes that something could be done about the overall prices and costs of housing in Hawaii, both rental as well as purchasing. Well, it's been about three years, Mr. Speaker, and we haven't seen any improvement. Prices are continuously rising. We rank at the very top, or nearly at the very top, when you look at both median and average price of homes throughout the State of Hawaii in comparison to the rest of the country.

"This bill will do nothing to bring down those prices. This bill gives another blank check, now after three years, to HFDC to start to take the risks that the private sector, in most instances, is required to take.

"The root problem really is not infrastructure cost. The root problem is availability and allocation of land resources. This bill does nothing to address that concern.

"The Tax Foundation indicates that this measure would increase the amount of automatic funding by \$35-million, or conversely there would be \$35-million less in the general fund available to fund other programs and projects. Certainly, in squirreling away more general funds, the illusion that there is no money in the treasury takes on a tinge of reality. This sort of playing with mirrors appears to give basis for call to increase taxes. In enacting this legislation, both lawmakers and administration officials violated their accountability to the taxpayers for not all the facts are on the table for discussion. Should the Legislature condone this action, the general fund will gradually be eroded to a level where it may not be able to support essential services without an increase in tax revenues.

"Further, it should also be noted that unlike the usual borrowing of money, this law specifically provides that HFDC is not required to pay any interest on the moneys advanced -- advanced from the general fund. Thus, taxpayers are subsidizing this program in an amount even greater than the nominal \$120-million. If the Legislature has deemed affordable housing a high priority item on their agenda, I would say, and if we decide that we want to stay on this course of large government involvement, then let's go ahead and appropriate the money outright so that people can know that all taxpayers are subsidizing what is going out in central Oahu and other places throughout the State. Then they may think that for the benefit of a few hundred people. . . oh, I am very happy for them, but only a few hundred. The rest of us are paying for it. And again, nothing has been provided us by HFDC or the administration to assure us or give us some idea that what they are doing is going to somehow curb the imbalance between supply and demand in housing and bring down the price of housing.

"The HFDC talks about plans to build so many houses by the year 2000 -- 35,000 homes. Well, if you look at their schedule right now, it is very difficult to see how they are going to meet even the state or county portion of that number. The rest of the 30-40,000 homes which will be needed by the year 2000 supposed to be provided by the private sector that stated blithely in testimony after testimony with no concrete facts behind it.

"The Governor, in his State-of-the-State address, Mr. Speaker, indicated that no land would have to be reclassified for housing. HFDC, in relation to this bill and another bill, indicated that in fact for its rental project, land would have to be reclassified in order for those projects to be built.

"For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I, and a number of colleagues here, will be voting against the measure and hope that a different direction can take place in the near future.

"Thank you."

Representative Hemmings then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Although I share the concepts put forth by the Minority Leader, I don't share his diplomacy on doing so because I did have the privilege of voting no against what ended up being Act 15 which was an amazing power-grab on the part of the administration in the name of affordable housing.

"Once again, Mr. Speaker, big government with high taxes has gone into the marketplace and created a problem and then used that very problem as an excuse to enter the marketplace itself. We saw this in A+ and we certainly see it in housing.

"Why is housing expensive in Hawaii? Building costs are excessively high in Hawaii because of issues this government has failed to address. We know that tort liability insurance highly impacts the cost of housing. We know that business and labor costs in the State of Hawaii highly impacts the cost of housing. We know that the goods and services that go into building houses are highly impacted by the tax and regulatory processes imposed on the marketplace by this government. Excise tax alone adds up considerably to the cost of an ultimate product -- the house.

"We know that this government has done nothing to stop the extensive speculation and the use of Hawaiian residential land for simple greed and profit while ignoring the homeowners' needs. We have allowed many of our residential properties to be bought enmasse by speculators, and some foreign speculators to be exploited by the local people so they can afford to buy their house.

"We know and it was underscored by a noted private sector bank economist that one of the major reasons that we don't have affordable housing is because this government has needlessly restricted the availability of land for housing although if you want to put a golf course up, you can certainly get land real quick. I have to note also that the critic of the administration who pointed this out was muted rather quickly when the administration hired him for \$70,000 a year.

"So what we did, Mr. Speaker, is we've created the problem and we passed Act 15. We took away county home rule and we're spending now hundreds of millions of dollars of taxpayers' money in the name of affordable housing. Well, it isn't going to be affordable because the marketplace conditions haven't changed. Granted, some people that are lucky enough to get into a lottery in this State-mandated housing lottery, will get a house at reduced cost. But it is not affordable because the taxpayers are standing the jerk on the rest of the price of the house.

"So, Mr. Speaker, I share the concerns on this bill and urge my colleagues to think of the larger picture, and think what we can do legislatively to solve the problem at its source rather than consolidating power and spending taxpayers' money on projects like this.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hayes then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"This adds \$35-million to the Homes Revolving Fund. The fund has been used up a lot faster than anticipated because instead of doing one planned community after

another, they are getting underway on each island concurrently instead of in sequence.

"In addition, the one complaint that I hear more often than any other is that there just isn't enough rental housing. This bill makes it possible for HFDC to use its Homes Revolving Fund for rental housing. One of the major problems in providing rental housing is that the depreciation allowed in the past by the Internal Revenue Service has been dealt a serious blow by the Tax Reform Act of 1986.

"I think this bill will go a long way toward making housing available to people who need it at prices that they can afford.

"I urge all my colleagues to vote for it.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2885, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HOMES REVOLVING FUND," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes to 6 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Cavasso, Hemmings, Liu, Marumoto and O'Kieffe voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 678-90 on H.B. No. 3299, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3299, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ENERGY CONSERVATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 679-90 on H.B. No. 2492, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Heemings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2492, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC LANDS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 680-90 on H.B. No. 2774, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2774, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 681-90 on H.B. No. 2289, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2289, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE INFORMATION NETWORK," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 2582, 2308, 2282, 2938, 2885, 3299, 2492, 2774 and 2289 had passed Third Reading at 1:43 o'clock p.m.

At 1:44 o'clock p.m., Representative Anderson asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 1:47 o'clock p.m., Representative Okamura was granted permission to make a late introduction and on behalf of Representative Taniguchi and himself, he introduced to the members of the House 20 students in the Ethnic Studies class from the University of Hawaii-Manoa.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 682-90 on H.B. No. 2649, HD 2:

Representative Apo moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2649, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Duldulao rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"With due respect to the introducer of the bill who is a very dear friend of mine, the Chairman of the Human Services, I can't help but speak in opposition to this bill for a lot of reasons, Mr. Speaker.

"I have been advocating for services relating to our children -- their needs, their welfare, their education and their right. However, Mr. Speaker, this bill addresses high risk teenagers, at-risk runaways, throwaways, homeless, et cetera.

"In Section 4 of this bill, Mr. Speaker, if we are really interested and sincere in addressing the health of our youth, why is it that there is an exception? The exception I am talking about, Mr. Speaker, is that this bill mandates that teenagers under fifteen years of age shall not be eligible to receive care unless under special circumstances.

"Another segment of this measure that bothers me is that teenagers at the age of fifteen and above shall not be required to obtain permission from their parents. Mr. Speaker, if this is the year of the family, I doubt it sincerely with all my heart that if our intention is to bring the family together in a spiritual way, in a good moral conduct, if one of the members of the family turns around and does things without letting the family know or get consent from their parents, I don't think there is unity in the family. This bill disregards parental notification.

"Another aspect of the bill that makes me very uncomfortable is the dispensing of prescription drugs. My question, Mr. Speaker, is that just in case something happens, what is the extent of the State's liability?

"For these and many more, Mr. Speaker, because to me this is a very, very touchy and emotional issue because, you know, it pertains to the family and children, I am voting no on this bill.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Bybee rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is a health-related bill that attempts to create two new health service clinics for teenagers on Oahu. The patients to be served in these essentially free medical clinics are children. These children are ages thirteen to nineteen years. The services that these children will receive at these clinics will include acute medical care, counseling regarding sexuality, pharmaceutical products, prescriptions, drugs, referrals to other agencies, among others. The medical care will be

provided to these children without, and I emphasize without, the consent of their parents unless they are thirteen or fourteen. They also will receive this medical care without even giving notice to their parents if they are fifteen years or older. Now, if the children are thirteen or fourteen, they will receive this medical treatment as long as they bring a consent form that is signed by a parent. And regardless of whether they are thirteen or fourteen and consented to, or fifteen or older, the parents are specifically prohibited by this bill from obtaining any information about the medical treatment that was given to their children.

"Now, as is the case oftentimes in health-related measures, Mr. Speaker, the goals are laudable, and the goals here are laudable. Teenagers need good medical care. But there are times when the means or the methods chosen to meet these goals are suspect and frankly, in the case of this bill, are just downright defective. Here, the goal is to provide teenage health care but the means used -- that is, this bill, Mr. Speaker, is defective.

"I would like to just refer to a few pages of the bill just to give you some examples.

"First of all, the bill is titled under the head, community-based teenage health clinic. I read the bill very closely, Mr. Speaker, and I see nothing where it refers to community-based or any kind of community involvement at all. Frequently, I see bills passed through this body appear that have very nice names -- sometimes Hawaiian names that look attractive and they look and sound good, but when you get into the body of the bill, you find that there's nothing there that relates to the title.

"I don't know what community-based means. I know what I think it means -- that the community has some say about what goes on in its neighborhoods. This bill has nothing whatsoever that gives the communities any role in what they have going on in their neighborhoods. Community-based it is not, Mr. Speaker. The only reference it has to community-based is in the title.

"It also references it as a demonstration project. Nothing in the bill refers to it being a demonstration project.

"Now, the introductory paragraphs speak about teenagers at risk, throwaways, runaways, homeless, but if you read it carefully, the bill in no way limits the medical care to those teenagers in those categories. It provides medical care for all teenagers. In fact, the specific purpose of the bill is to provide medical care to teenagers.

"The bill, too, Mr. Speaker, provides that this medical treatment facility will not be operated necessarily by the State. It is going to be contracted out to some agency, some private service agency that goes unnamed.

"It also provides, Mr. Speaker, for those thirteen and fourteen year olds. All they have to do is bring in a piece of paper that has a line that says, 'Parent,' and someone signs the right name there. Now, Mr. Speaker, I don't know about you but I remember when I was thirteen, I didn't have my parents sign my report card one time because I was unhappy about it. But a thirteen and fourteen year old, Mr. Speaker -- do they have the maturity to understand the consequences of acute medical care being provided to them, for the distribution or dispensing of medical products to them, the various pharmaceutical things? I think not. I think a thirteen and fourteen year old, if they wish it, may choose to have a friend sign that form, Mr. Speaker. There is no protection, no notarizations, no other backup.

"There is one particular provision, Mr. Speaker, that just astounds me, and I want to read it if I may and that is, it provides in a sentence on page 4: 'Any physician who in good faith makes a determination that a teenager is capable of giving informed consent or that the services or pharmaceutical products are clearly for the teenager's benefit, shall have immunity from any liability, civil or criminal...'

"Why in the heck do doctors get immunity for giving things to teenagers at free health clinics? Is there something wrong that we don't want to give those teenagers the same protections that they would get if they went to a private clinic? There's no reason for giving physicians clear immunity under this provision, Mr. Speaker. And I think for that reason alone, this bill is defective.

"There is the provision, Mr. Speaker, as I said, that provides that you as a parent, if your teenager, your thirteen year old, gets treated here, you can't have access to those medical records.

"There is a provision in the back of this bill, Mr. Speaker, for an outreach program and I don't speak against that program. That is a good portion of the bill but the other portions are very defective. I'm not going to go through all the parts of the bill but I think I just illustrated a few, Mr. Speaker, that justify why it's defective.

"I would just like to echo Representative Duldulao's points. We have existing clinics, we have existing programs, we have existing projects for welfare cases, for the true teenager out in the street without parental support. We don't deny the need for those programs. But when we adopt a new State program that provides for clinics to go out into the communities without getting the communities' wishes as to whether they want those, then we are imposing, Mr. Speaker, something on them that isn't needed.

"Let's upgrade the programs that we have now. Let's re-examine the needs and address it in a better way. It's not an answer to send these private agencies and clinicians with their personal philosophies and agendas out into our neighborhoods to set up these clinics. We recently had an experience in Kaneohe, for example, which there was much media concentration on. This is exactly the same program, Mr. Speaker. We are going to approve and fund these projects to go out into the communities. A lot of folks don't like them and I think there needs to be a lot of work on this bill.

"I laud the goal, but it's very defective, and I just ask this question and I remember, Mr. Speaker, in the beginning of the session we talked about the year of the family. My sense of the family is a parent or parents and children, or maybe an uncle or an aunt and children. Why are we advancing measures that exclude parents, exclude parental control and put the State in the position of making these decisions? Why do we provide medical care and medical treatment of the most significant kind? This isn't just casual counseling, Mr. Speaker, this is significant medical treatment and we provide categorically that they can be done without the parent's involvement and you can't even find out about it. There is a confidentiality provision. That's going in the wrong direction, and for those and many other reasons, Mr. Speaker, I urge that this bill be defeated."

Representative Apo then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I think the notion that the year of the family that we tried to celebrate this year is in fact a

celebration that is applauding all the things that are good about a family. Half of the program is to address the shortcomings of the nuclear family, and those instances where there are gaps between the reality of what a family can or cannot do for their children, and in many cases, what a family chooses not to do for the children. So to sit here and pretend that the family is the answer for all kids is ridiculous. That is not reality. And in fact, one of the needs for a center like this is for those kids who are lost, who are scared, or psychologically dependent on drugs who go home and try to seek help and get thrown across the living room by their father. Where do these kids go? Nowhere. There are no intervention services that allow, without parental consent, anyone to provide any kind of substantive intervention into the lives of these children. And I can tell you, there is a huge number of them out there. I suppose we could call them the gap group.

"Secondly, I have made references before to the fact that we are now in a new age--the age of information. One of the assumptions of the old age -- the industrial age -- is that kids cannot be trusted. That's why we lock them up in buildings, make them sit on desks facing the front, looking at the teacher. We don't trust them to make any choices in the curriculum so we force-feed them with subject matter that we think they ought to know. And in cases like this, we don't trust them to make choices that affect the deepest and most personal part of their lives. Without an intervention center like this, an option for them to escape bad parents, a bad family situation, the only other option left for them is to remain probably with the peer group that is responsible for their condition in the first place because these are the only friends they have.

"These, Mr. Speaker, are the realities of growing up in Hawaii today, and I am for this bill because I think it is needed. I think it is consistent with our attempt to help families in this year of the family.

"Thank you."

Representative Duldulao, in rebuttal, stated:

"That might be true that there's no intervention center or a place for this juvenile to go to just in case, you know. It happens in the very extreme example that the other representative had stated. However, this only serves a few of our youngsters of today.

"The message that we are sending across is that it is alright to do bad because there's always a state agency that is the catch-all for you guys just in case you fall back. Isn't it true, Mr. Speaker, that if we condone this behavior, it will continue and it will even give a stronger push for our children to not obey their parents because there'll always be somebody there that they can lean upon?

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Amaral then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I wish to add a little bit more information to this. Some of these throwaway kids and kids that are out on the street are out there through no misbehavior of their own but rather the misbehavior of those people who have primary custody over them. I think that when this body promotes family and family support, that inherent in that message is also that this throwaway child can be supported and protected, and I think that's what we intend here.

"We passed the laws that say the children cannot get care without the parental consent, and yet, sometimes we do not take the time to acknowledge that we have dysfunctional families, incompetent parents that are incapable of giving proper care to these children, that abuse these children physically and sexually, and that's why they run. And we make no provisions for these children to get primary care. This is an attempt to do that. These kids come from dysfunctional families. They are not asking for abortion services, they are not asking for birth control pills. They have sores and head lice and common ailments that they cannot go to anyone for assistance because they don't have permission from their parents, and we passed that law that said they needed permission first.

"This is a mechanism to get care for kids that nobody wants, and if you don't believe that they are out there, hang out on the streets in Waikiki late at night -- 2:00, 3:00 in the morning because you'll see them. Go out to the airport and hang out there -- 3:00, 4:00 o'clock in the morning because they are out there. Go out to the Leeward coast and on to the beaches because there they are too.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Arakaki then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I'm glad we're having this discussion and I can understand and empathize with both sides of the argument. I, as a parent, wouldn't want my daughters going out on the streets and receiving care that I don't know about. But I am just wondering how many of us realize that there are fourteen, fifteen and sixteen year olds out on the streets and having to survive on the streets. Representative Amaral recommended that you hang out in Waikiki and the airport but I don't know if I would want to recommend that, considering the implications. But there are people out there.

"There are outreach workers out there who are trying to reach these kids and it is not just in Waikiki. I know it is hard for us to imagine that there are kids as young as that out there trying to survive. It's hard enough to imagine an adult being homeless let alone a teenager who has no skills at all. And a lot of times we really don't notice them, but they are there and they're in almost every community. And we really don't have a handle on how many of these kids are homeless. Estimates are anywhere from one thousand to five thousand of these street kids and they move in and out of homelessness. They move in and out of shelters, in and out of foster homes. They move in and out of trouble with the law but in general, they are unwanted, throwaway kids. Their parents don't want them and the system can't handle them. They are misfits, runaways, at-risk, high risk, and it really doesn't matter what you label them, but they are there. But why should we worry? There are so few of them. What will it matter? All we have to do is look the other way because they're nobody's constituents. They don't vote. Why should we spend any taxpayers' money on them? If their parents don't care, why should we care? Why should we care if they contract AIDS or OD on drugs, or be forced to sell their bodies to survive? Why don't we just let them do their thing -- why should we worry? They are not our kids. I mean, after all, our kids would never do those kinds of things, and why should we waste our taxpayers' money on a bunch of good-for-nothing teenagers? They'll probably just end up in jail anyway. Why should we start a health clinic for those teenagers? I mean the clinics would probably just pass out condoms and birth control pills and teach them about sex. We don't want them to learn about sex. Why don't we just let them go home, force them to go home

where they belong, and let their folks beat some sense into them and maybe that way, if they are lucky enough, they can get hurt enough to end up in a hospital and get the kind of health care they need and not in some clinic for teenagers.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Cavasso then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"You ask, why should we care? We care, Mr. Speaker. The previous gentleman implies that we don't care for those who have need. He implies that because we think that parents should be involved to the maximum ability that we don't care for the homeless.

"Mr. Speaker, as the representative from Kailua pointed out, there are existing programs that we can use. We do care, we should care, and we need to care, and we need to help these kids get into the existing programs.

"But to set up a new clinic and tell all children from the age of fifteen up that they don't need to have their parents involved, to tell all doctors that they can give medical care and advice and medicines and such, and be exempt from responsibility when we don't even do that for adults, for anybody, it's crazy!

"Mr. Speaker, I appreciate the words of Representative Duldulao and Representative Bybee, and I support them and ask particularly that the reasons articulated by Representative Bybee be placed in the Journal as if they were my own.

"Thank you."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Bybee, in rebuttal, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I'd like to re-emphasize that this goal is laudable. I have no doubt that these children are out there and I empathize, and I am very concerned about them whether it is Waikiki, the airport area, et cetera.

"But my objection is not with the goal or the need to help, but with the method and the means of this particular bill. And I emphasize this bill is not limited to these teenagers that the prior speakers spoke to. It's all teenagers, everyone of them -- your children and my children. It's not limited -- it's all teenagers.

"Secondly, it's not limited as to areas. There may be appropriate projects that belong in Waikiki or the airport area, but not in the residential neighborhoods where the communities are strongly against them. Mr. Speaker, this bill forces these clinics in those neighborhoods and that's not right."

Representative Anderson then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I think a lot of us forget that we're supposed to be giving time to our children, grandchildren, and if we're doing this, I don't think we have to fear what's happening to our own children or others.

"But if there is a problem, then I believe your child or mine deserve the rights of any other, if you want to call them throwaway or whatever. But a child growing up that becomes a young person in life that may fear his or her parents, or grandparents, guardians or whoever he or she is with, should have some type of place to go to seek help.

"We all say this is not our child. This is not going to happen in our community. That's not true. It's happening in every community. We are changing. People have to have a place to go and even though I have said many, many times we have to give things at times and take away things in order to bring the families together, this is one of the things I think will bring families together. You make the families responsible for their kids but if they can't handle a daughter coming home and saying, I'm pregnant, I don't think that she is going to tell the parents regardless of how you feel or I feel. She may try to get help elsewhere that may not be with a proper physician. You may have a son that comes home and he's afraid to tell you. They have to have a place to go.

"For this reason I am going up, and I hope my colleagues will consider it because it's a bill that looks at the young people, and it's not telling them to go. It's saying there is an avenue for you if you so desire and if your parents can't handle the situation.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

"Representative Metcalf then rose and stated:

"I would like to have Representative Anderson's remarks inserted in the Journal as my own, deleting however the reference to being a grandparent.

"Thank you."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2649, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO A COMMUNITY-BASED TEENAGE HEALTH CLINIC DEMONSTRATION PROJECT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 39 ayes to 12 noes, with Representatives Andrews, Bunda, Bybee, Cachola, Cavasso, Duldulao, Hemmings, M. Ige, Leong, Liu, Peters and Stegmaier voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 683-90 on H.B. No. 3357, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3357, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR MEDICAID OPTIONS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 684-90 on H.B. No. 2569, HD 2:

Representative Apo moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2569, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Oshiro then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"As discussed on the floor of this House on Monday, Mr. Speaker, this bill, along with House Bill 2949, HD 2, together, comprise a financing package for the construction of a fixed rail rapid transit system for Honolulu. This proposal, Mr. Speaker, is premised upon a reasonable distribution of financial responsibility between state, federal and county government, and the private sector.

"While I have discussed the various components of this proposal on this floor previously, I won't go through them again. I would like to however, Mr. Speaker, point out that the State Transit Capital Development Fund proposed in this measure is not being established only for the purpose of funding a fixed rail rapid transit system for the City and County of Honolulu. Mr. Speaker, this fund is a generic fund and is premised upon providing assistance to all counties for the development and enhancement of mass transportation. Several neighbor island counties, Mr. Speaker, presently have bus systems in operation and they appear to be in need of financial assistance to expand their present operations by purchasing new buses.

"The State Transit Capital Development Fund is structured, Mr. Speaker, such that similar to how the City and County of Honolulu will be able to acquire assistance for constructing a fixed rail rapid transit system, the other three counties will likewise be able to obtain dollars from this fund for the purpose of purchasing additional buses. It is anticipated, Mr. Speaker, that the private sector entities such as the visitor accommodation industry where they are currently experiencing problems in retaining a sufficient number of employees, may be willing to contribute revenue to meet the county/private sector portion of the matching requirement pursuant to this special fund.

"It is my hope, Mr. Speaker, that the State Transit Capital Development Fund will stimulate the enhancement and expansion of existing bus transportation networks on the neighbor islands, and in addition, provide the county that presently does not have a bus transportation system an opportunity to establish one.

"I henceforth, Mr. Speaker and fellow colleagues, sincerely ask for your assistance and your support on this bill so that we can exhibit a strong commitment from State government for the development and enhancement of mass transportation statewide.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2569, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION," having been read throughout, pass Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Anderson voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 685-90 on H.B. No. 3110, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3110, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHILD SUPPORT ENFORCEMENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Bunda voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 686-90 on H.B. No. 2281, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2281, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FAMILY SUPPORT CENTERS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 687-90 on H.B. No. 2280, HD 2:

Representative Apo moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2280, HD 2, having

been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Bybee then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"This, I think, is a new area in which we are moving by the passing of this perinatal care bill. With the advent of the invention of the fetalscope, we are now able, medically, to go as far as even heart surgery on preborn children and I applaud this bill, and I think it is a real good step in the right direction, Mr. Speaker, and hopefully we will take more steps later.

"Thank you."

Representative Arakaki then rose and stated:

"I am glad that although we don't agree on teenagers, Representative Bybee and I agree on babies.

"I will have the text of my comments inserted into the Journal. (The Chair 'so ordered.') I just want to highlight or emphasize a couple of points and that is, I think we are not only interested in promoting good health care in pregnant women and our newborn, but we are also looking at saving long-term costs, and I think I should mention that as far as cost, you know, for a low birth infant, it cost over a thousand dollars a day in the neonatal intensive care unit. Besides that acute care cost, there's also the long-range cost for newborns who suffer from neurological damages, learning disabilities, and other factors that we pay for for many years beyond just the newborn stage. So I think it makes good sense to invest in good perinatal care, and I would like to ask the members to support this measure.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Arakaki's remarks are hereby inserted:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of House Bill 2280, HD 2.

"Mr. Speaker and members of this honorable House, if a 747 jet were to crash at Honolulu International Airport and the results were the death of over 170 infants under one year of age, we would be outraged. Almost every single one of you would express the horror and dismay at such an event. The public would demand an investigation and assurance that it would never happen again. Yet every year between 150 to 200 babies die in Hawaii, and except for the families of these babies, very little anguish or outrage is expressed.

"Infant mortality is the death of an infant before one year of age. Many are born too small or too early, with birth defects, or suffer complications around the time of birth. The sad part about these deaths is that many could be prevented by the assurance of a healthy, pre-conceptual woman and by assuring quality health care during her pregnancy. Mr. Speaker and fellow members, while we in Hawaii can take a small sense of pride at having one of the lowest infant mortality rates in the country, it has little meaning when you consider that our country, one of the wealthiest in the world, ranks with South Africa as having the highest rate of infant mortality among industrialized nations of the world. It is also shameful that our State's statistics show native Hawaiian women ranking among the worst of all ethnic minorities for infant mortality rates.

"Infant mortality is an indicator of poor perinatal health but another indicator, and a more costly factor, is that of the low birthweight babies. For those of you who have never visited a neonatal intensive care unit, I invite

you to see these babies, many no larger than the palm of your hand, struggling to survive. It's even more painful to see their parent or parents, wondering if their child will survive from day to day. Technology will allow many of them to survive but that technology is as much a bane as it is a boon. The cost of maintaining a low birthweight baby in intensive care is over a thousand dollars a day, but the cost does not end with the infants discharge from the hospital, because long term studies have shown that low birthweight babies have higher incidences of developmental delays, neurodevelopmental disorders, learning disabilities, and hearing, speech and vision disorders. If anyone here doesn't believe that State or federal dollars will end up paying for most of the treatment and remediation for these disabilities and disorders, I can show you some cost factors for these cases. If that isn't reason enough, then add the recent and growing crisis or drug exposed infants and imagine what the long term implications of these neurologically damaged babies will be as they grow.

"We as the Legislature must show leadership by assuring that Hawaii as a State immediately make the health and wellbeing of mothers and infants a State priority. We must assure universal access to early maternity and pediatric care for all mothers and infants by removing financial, geographic or administrative implications.

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, while we may not save every newborn from dying or prevent low birthweight babies, by instituting measures such as House Bill 2280, we will be the first in the country to provide perinatal insurance and assure the best outcomes for the newborns of this State. It's a crying need, Mr. Speaker.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2280, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PERINATAL CARE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 688-90 on H.B. No. 2059, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2059, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 689-90 on H.B. No. 2886, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2886, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HOUSING FINANCE AND DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 690-90 on H.B. No. 2306, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2306, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DRUG ENFORCEMENT, INTERDICTION, EDUCATION AND REHABILITATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 2649, 3357, 2569, 3110, 2281, 2280, 2059, 2886 and 2306 had passed Third Reading at 2:20 o'clock p.m.

At 2:21 o'clock p.m., Representative Okamura asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 2:43 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 691-90 on H.B. No. 2751, HD 2:

Representative Apo moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2751, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Cavasso then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, just on the point as we've said to such great extent on Monday, we're against tax increases and this is another tax increase. Let's make do with our existing resources."

Representative Andrews then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill does indeed request a tax increase, but basically that tax increase is to take care of cleaning up environmental damage done by the use of this product. And if someone thinks that we are going to get away with the problem this situation has incurred without paying for it is certainly misinformed.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2751, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO UNDERGROUND STORAGE TANKS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Cavasso voting no.

Representative Souki rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"What this bill does is it provides for the four counties in the State a permanent allocation of funding. For years, the counties have been asking to give them some permanency of funding so they can plan their budgets.

"This bill intends to do just that and, hopefully, as we go along we can provide more increases for the respective counties as these dollars become available. And it does

provide for five percent of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2302, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COUNTY GRANTS-IN-AIDS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives M. Ige and Peters voting no.

"Mr. Speaker, they call this the discrimination bill and it is about dentists, and I believe that's very true. I'm wondering how we can go ahead and discriminate against dentists.

"As a previous bar owner years ago, I was able to put up a sign in my bar that said I could refuse to serve the public if I so desired and that was a public place. The

dentist has a public office. He or she spends many, many years in school, serves the public and according to this bill, if they so desire, they may go ahead and exclude certain people from receiving certain services.

"Now, Mr. Speaker, if we want to correct this, I think that we could give tax credits because we want them to take care of certain individuals. If we make laws that says that people who have a public business and they are going to have to take care of certain individuals, their business could go down, and I think that's what a lot of them are worried about. They could lose money. But more than anything else, you are taking away their right, after many, many years of going to school, learning the profession and then saying, this is how you will go ahead and provide services.

"For this reason, Mr. Speaker, I am going to vote no and I wish my colleagues would consider.

"Thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 3123, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DISCRIMINATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Anderson and Liu voting no.

"Now what this bill does is, it gives the courts the alternative to allow public service to be imposed on the violators in lieu of a fine. That may be a good idea, Mr. Speaker, but the court can now go as low as 75 hours of public service for violations which interprets down, if you use a \$5 an hour guide, that the fines would in fact be \$375 which is about at least 50 percent to 75 percent below the actual cost of insurance.

"Mr. Speaker, this is a step backwards and I hope we don't move too far backwards or we will be back in the hot soup we were a couple of years ago.

"Thank you."

"Another one of these bills, Mr. Speaker, where I think the intent is probably well founded but I don't really think that the measure will do much to increase the number of owner-occupants in sales of condominium dwelling units whether they be single family type or multiple dwelling, nor do I see this bill as doing anything in terms of the area of price. In fact, it creates some rather interesting changes to definitions concerning owner-occupants that may in fact work against owner-occupants. We are redefining owner-occupants to include an individual who would be residing in a principal residence and physically

resides in that unit for a period of not less than five years essentially. And when we say physically resides in the residential unit, I am sure we are going to have to come back next year and amend this language. It talks about periods of vacations and people who transit perhaps between neighbor islands and have more than one residence because of business or other reasons.

"Also, we have a pretty firm five-year increase in the definition to mean someone has to reside in an area for five years or be subject to penalties -- subject to penalties if for some reason they have to move within that time frame. There is no language here that really gives the State any discretion or any rules or regulations that sets out under what type of circumstances people can perhaps not escape, but perhaps explain their case and cause to avoid that penalty. There are a lot of reasons why people feel that they have to move out of a place prior to five years of time elapsing. The condition of the neighborhood, the problems with neighbors, problems with construction of the project --this bill is silent on those points.

"Also, Mr. Speaker, I think the concept of having a State-mandated lottery for those in the business of building homes to take care of any potential reservation list and who gets in and who gets out again begs the question of -- how is this going to affect price -- which is still the basic problem in this State.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

the need for psychiatric services, to deal with that and other kinds of services.

"So, on the one hand, someone can collect under the current workers comp law under the definition of medical services for those types of injuries, and then perhaps for a very similar type of injury using new nomenclature which we provide; namely, emotional distress here, under that same injury under the workers comp law, that person can now go to court and collect possibly.

"I think this is the kind of thing which we have wanted to prevent based on the reforms enacted a few years ago and, hopefully Mr. Speaker, we continue along the way towards workers comp reform that is fair to both employer and employee, and I think this is going in the wrong way.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, H.B. No. 256, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SMALL CLAIMS COURT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 764-90 on H.B. No. 2388, HD 2:

Representative Apo moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2388, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Hemmings then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"This bill may be over zealous in its listing of chlorofluorocarbon produced or consumed products. The list is very long and extensive and if the labels had to be put on every one of those products, it would severely impact having those products delivered to Hawaii. And as we all know, most of the products that contain chlorofluorocarbons in their manufacture do not in fact release chlorofluorocarbons into the atmosphere. There's a lot of consumer products like that that would be affected by the labeling provision of this bill -- things like even contact lenses.

"For that reason, Mr. Speaker, as this bill proceeds through the legislative process, we certainly favor stopping chlorofluorocarbons from destroying the ozone layer, but we don't want to disturb the flow of products containing chlorofluorocarbons that would not affect the ozone to Hawaii.

"For that reason, I would urge that the Majority consider narrowing the scope of the labeling process as this bill weaves its way through the legislative process."

Representative Hirono rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the labeling of products is something that is familiar to all of us. The contents of all of our food stuffs are labeled, our clothing is labeled, the list goes on and on. And in this age of environmental awareness and the knowledge of the danger to the ozone layer of chlorofluorocarbons or CFCs, what is the big deal to require manufacturers that produce these kinds of products to label that their products contain CFC? The labeling requirement in this bill is very simple. It simply says, 'This product contains CFC.'

"I would like to note that there is a group of enlightened students at Punahou School -- the alma mater of the previous speaker -- who have organized themselves into a group called 'Save the Earth' and this group testified in support of this bill and, in particular, for the labeling requirement.

"I call the members' attention to a newspaper article in yesterday's paper about this group of enlightened Punahou students. And the article talks about their experiences in the Legislature, and this particular bill is among five of the bills that this group, 'Save the Earth,' has focused upon.

"At the hearing on this bill, I was very much impressed with their testimony, their demeanor, their knowledge of the subject and especially, in view of the fact that there are so many comments about troubled youth and our young people getting into gangs and into trouble and things like that, it was very nice to see a group of concerned students take the time to come to the Legislature. To quote the article, the students convinced the House committee which was the Judiciary Committee to restore language requiring CFC labeling that had been removed from the bill before it had come to our committee.

"Let's not disappoint these aware, involved young people. I urge everyone to vote 'yes' on this measure without reservations.

"Thank you."

Representative Hemmings, in rebuttal, stated:

"Especially regarding the former speaker who is a proud new stepmother of a Punahou student, I am glad to see her in the Punahou family and hope to see her working in the malasadas booth at the Punahou Carnival in the future.

"Mr. Speaker, I, too, admire the tenacity and hard work of the Punahou students that came here to testify on it. But, nevertheless, the facts are that it is an overkill, and many of the products being asked to be labeled, there's just no justification because it is absolutely impossible for the chlorofluorocarbons to be released into the atmosphere. If you look the list over, it entails almost everything that's manufactured with any type of plastic or foam products. There's just no justification for the overkill.

"I am in favor of protecting the ozone layer but this is far in excess of what is needed, and I do want the record to reflect that, and I appreciate the previous speaker's favorable comments about how intelligent and hardworking Punahou students are, and I am glad that she is in the Punahou family.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2388, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 2827, HD 1 (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 765-90):

Representative Apo moved that H.B. No. 2827, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Bybee then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"This bill is entitled: 'Medical Torts re Health Care Provider,' and what it does, Mr. Speaker, is it is a bill that applies in those situations where a health care provider is found to be liable in a court of law for having provided medical care below the standard which is acceptable in the community either by a judge or a jury. In other words, it deals with those physicians and clinics that are guilty. It is not a case where they have been found not liable.

"Now, in those cases where there has been a finding of liability because they're negligent, this bill gives the court, meaning the judge, the option to instead of awarding a lump sum judgment against the negligent party, a judgment which is spread over a period of years -- upwards to ten years -- and that's my main objection with the bill, Mr. Speaker.

"You as a professional, I as a professional, anyone in this body, in the things that we do in the community, are all subject to liability if we don't perform to the standard of care of our respective professions. When we fall below that standard of care and we injure people, we're responsible. We should be and we should pay them the damages we caused them and we should pay them then, at that time.

"This bill singles out a segment of our community and says, you can be liable, you can be negligent, you can injure people, but you don't have to pay them right away -- you can spread it out over a period of years.

"And I think, Mr. Speaker, that's unconstitutional. I don't think we can ensure this as a body to single out certain professions and say, you get special protections that others don't.

"The other feature of this bill that is, I believe, also unconstitutional is in reality what it does is it takes away our right to a jury trial because in most of these cases where they go to trial, the jury comes back and finds that the doctor left the scalpel inside or the wrong pills were prescribed, whatever the case may be. Those are the cases we're talking about here. The jury awards a lump sum and provides for rehabilitative care, pain and suffering, all of the things that most of these very injured people need. Now, they need it right then, Mr. Speaker. They don't need it five to ten years later. This bill gives the court the option, at the request of the health care provider, to extend it over a period of years. I think that's a violation of our right to a jury trial. And I think for those two reasons, it is unconstitutional.

"In closing comment, Mr. Speaker, these bills, and the one that follows that I would like to speak on in a minute, but these bills oftentimes are crafted by and lobbied for by very capable lobbyists. But who is the lobby for the victim who suffers from the misprescribed medicine, or

the physician who operates on the wrong leg, or whatever the negligence is? And you can be as creative as one wants to be to think of those negligences. But who is the lobby for those victims? I don't know. Mr. Speaker. I think we have to look at these bills very closely and wonder why we are giving special privileges to certain people to avoid liability that all the rest of us have to withstand and, hopefully, motivate us to provide the best care that we can.

"So I think with regard to this bill, Mr. Speaker, I would urge a no vote."

Representative Hemmings then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the rhetorical question is, who is the lobby for the victims? I can answer that, Mr. Speaker, because I have sat on a committee that addressed the tort reform issue. The lobby clearly is the lawyers, oftentimes the greedy lawyers, who take over fifty percent of the money awarded to victims for themselves. So I think they are adequately represented by the 'fat cat' lawyers who are getting all the profits off this thing.

"This is a good bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Bybee, in rebuttal, stated:

"I am really pleased that the prior speaker brought that point up because it really emphasizes why I am speaking.

"I am looking at page 4, subparagraph (e). I am going to read this relatively slowly, and it says: 'Periodic payments...(these are the ones the court is allowed to give for the medical provider)...'Periodic payments shall not be required for the portion of the award that represents plaintiff's attorney's fees and costs.'

"In other words, there's no question that there was some 'fat cat' plaintiff lawyers at this hearing and they lobbied for and got a nice provision to protect their attorneys' fees. So there is no delay on the attorneys' fee payment. They get that right up front.

"But what about the victims? Where's the victim at? The attorney's paid -- he's gone. He's got his money in his pocket. They lobbied well for that -- great! But what happens to the victim? Where's the victim at? He's still or she's still waiting for that payment to come over a period of years that they should have gotten when the lump sum was awarded in the first place.

"So, Mr. Speaker, this really emphasizes why we, as a body, have to consider ourselves lobbyists for the little people who get hurt by this provision.

"Thank you."

Representative Metcalf then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, speaking in favor of the bill, I would just note that actually the plaintiffs' attorneys were not present at the hearing.

"Thank you."

Representative Cavasso then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I see this as giving our courts the ability to be flexible in meeting the needs of those who've been injured and I see it as something that will in particular help some of those clients or people that are injured that

have taken all of their payments in lump sum and spent them without really thinking that, or recognizing that the payment was designed to help them for twenty years, or as long as they're suffering the consequences from said injury.

"I think it is a good bill and it's being supported in other places as well."

"The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2827, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MEDICAL TORTS INVOLVING A HEALTH CARE PROVIDER," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Bybee voting no.

H.B. No. 2826, HD 1 (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 766-90):

Representative Apo moved that H.B. No. 2826, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Bybee then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"It's basically the same bill but however, here it relates to minors and we're giving an additional treatment for minors by providing that the minors may not receive the moneys that they are awarded until they are eighteen. Now, this is the option given to the court.

"Now, I ask the wisdom of why a fifteen or sixteen year old who is severely injured as a result of a medical tort has to wait for the years till eighteen to receive the money when they, no doubt, need the rehabilitation and other support at the time. And I would point out, too, the practice in the courts to take the lump sum money and put it into a guardianship. You don't give a sixteen year old \$100,000 malpractice award. You give it to a guardian.

"So, really, these two bills, Mr. Speaker, I think should be closely examined.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2826, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MEDICAL TORTS INVOLVING MINORS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Bybee voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 767-90 on H.B. No. 1651, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1651, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH CARE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 2611 (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 768-90):

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, H.B. No. 2611, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FAMILY COURT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 2694, 256, 2388, 2827, 2826, 1651 and 2611 had passed Third Reading at 3:19 o'clock p.m.

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2425, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HARBOR FACILITY USE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, H.B. No. 2752, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGENCIES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 2967, HD 1 (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 779-90):

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, H.B. No. 2967, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 2028, HD 1 (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 780-90):

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, H.B. No. 2028, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC EMPLOYMENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 2737, HD 1 (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 781-90):

Representative Apo moved that H.B. No. 2737, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Fukunaga then rose and requested that her remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Fukunaga's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of House Bill 2737, HD 1, relating to legislative information, which would increase the accessibility of information services to the public. This measure specifies that the Legislature is the sole and exclusive owner of all rights, titles, and interests in and to legislative-generated databases. It also limits the liability of the Legislature in providing information to the public, except in the cases of INTENTIONAL omissions, additions, or errors.

"Mr. Speaker, at least 19 states, including Illinois, Michigan, Nevada, and New York, have established ownership in their legislative databases which are available for public use and dissemination. These 19 states recognize the importance of controlling databases to maintain the accuracy and timeliness of the data. Without adequate control, unscrupulous users can 'pirate' the information found in legislative databases and resell or 'bootleg' the information, which may be erroneous and inaccurate, at a profit.

"Mr. Speaker, it is imperative that the controls set forth in House Bill No. 2737 are implemented to prevent such abuses.

"Please support this measure."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H. B. No. 2737, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LEGISLATIVE INFORMATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 2450, 3176, 3435, 2967, 2028 and 2737 had passed Third Reading at 3:21 o'clock p.m.

H.B. No. 2738, HD 1 (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 782-90):

Representative Apo moved that H.B. No. 2738, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Fukunaga then rose and requested that her remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Fukunaga's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of House Bill No. 2738, HD 1, relating to the Hawaii Revised Statutes, which would require the copyright of the Hawaii Revised Statutes and other statutory compilations to protect their integrity and accuracy. This bill also includes a blanket license allowing all citizens to freely use, copy, and distribute portions of the Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS).

"Mr. Speaker, in the past, certain private publishers have chosen not to purchase electronic versions of the Hawaii Revised Statutes or Session Laws from the Legislature or the Legislative Reference Bureau. As discussed during the public hearing on this measure, such publishers purchased sets of the Hawaii Revised Statutes, and electronically converted the information into their own computer systems. One publisher has added a few case notes, and resold the statutes at a substantial profit. This publisher now proposes to offer the Hawaii Revised Statutes and Session Laws on-line as part of an electronic system including all State statutes.

"However, with the passage of Chapter 206P, Hawaii Revised Statutes, the Hawaii State Legislature has adopted a policy of economic diversification through creation of an information industry. To provide for widespread dissemination of the Hawaii Revised Statutes and Session Laws, encourage competition and improvements in the legal information databases available in Hawaii, there must be a process which will allow as many private information providers or publishers as possible to provide their information services to the public.

"This bill would close loopholes in our current process by allowing anyone to receive a nonexclusive grant for a royalty-bearing license, as long as they can satisfy the Legislature that this will not hurt the public interest. This measure would not restrict other legitimate uses of the HRS and Session Laws databases by public users.

"As the Legislature becomes an information provider on the public information network, I believe that it is important to assert the Legislature's copyright claim over statutory compilations. By establishing this precedent, we hope that future information providers will be able to provide on-line, legal information services which insures the public of up-to-date, accurate, and complete data.

"This measure will encourage public use of the HRS and also expand the availability of the ACCESS Legislative Information Service in the future. Please

continue to support public access by supporting House Bill No. 2738."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2738, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII REVISED STATUTES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Peters voting no.

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2265, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ENFORCEMENT OF OCEAN-RELATED ACTIVITIES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 795-90 on H.B. No. 2644, HD 1:

Representative Apo moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2644, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Marumoto then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I would like to speak in favor of this measure but I would like to take the opportunity to express a few of my reservations.

"I applaud the section requiring a public education campaign. However, it frustrates me to know that this bill calls for yet another study. It was my understanding that the purpose of the Interim Task Force was to study Hawaii's animal quarantine system.

"This bill will implement the Task Force's recommendations which consists of, in addition to the component for public education, a planning study for rabies research and collecting data on population and serological data. This is all very well as long as the results provide concrete information that does not require another study.

"My real concern with this bill is that it does not allow any loosening of our State quarantine laws. No modification of our quarantine system, and most importantly, there are no exemptions for guide dogs for the blind. I am fully aware of the importance of our quarantine laws for our citizens and for our agricultural industry. But I ask, why do we allow exceptions to circus animals and not for guide dogs? Clearly, guide dogs are equally and possibly better-trained and well-cared for than circus animals.

"Today, there are numerous techniques which were not available in the past to guard against rabies intrusion. We can inoculate animals against rabies and there are blood tests that detect rabies antibodies in animals. And there is also a microchip technique which contains an animal's overall health care and vaccination records. Are we, as a State, so paranoid that we refuse to trust modern technology as a means of assisting the legislative process?

"I sincerely hope that we can move towards a more rational policy that would seriously take into account the needs of citizens who are disabled and choose to use guide dogs. If cows and horses are allowed to enter the State of Hawaii scot-free, then I strongly feel we have a responsibility to rethink our roles and to take extenuating circumstances into account, especially when we're talking only about nine Hawaiian guide dogs.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Honda then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to clarify the previous speaker's talk.

"We have another Senate Bill that is coming over that has to do with guide dogs and we are waiting for this Senate Bill to come over so that we can work on that subject."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2644, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO A COMPREHENSIVE, STATEWIDE RABIES AWARENESS PROGRAM," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 2015, 2118, 2301, 2253, 2912, 2297, 2265 and 2644 had passed Third Reading at 3:26 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 796-90 on H.B. No. 2266, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2266, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR A STATEWIDE HOUSEHOLD AND AGRICULTURAL HAZARDOUS WASTE COLLECTION PROJECT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 797-90 on H.B. No. 2928:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2928, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC EMPLOYMENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 798-90 on H.B. No. 2911:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2911, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII HOUSING AUTHORITY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 799-90 on H.B. No. 2919, HD 1:

Representative Apo moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2919, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Peters then rose and requested that his remarks, against the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Peters' remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in opposition to House Bill No. 2919, HD 1. My concerns fall in three areas.

"First of all, this bill violates two of the more valuable lessons I have learned in my life. I learned these lessons while growing up in Nanakuli and had them reinforced while serving my constituents and working with my colleagues here in this esteemed House.

"Lesson one is to always keep your promises! Lesson two is to finish what you start!

"Well, Mr. Speaker, that's what House Bill 2919 is all about. In passing Act 206E, this Legislature made a promise to help the community of Kakaako to achieve its full potential. But this bill breaks that promise!

"In supporting HCDA's CIP requests for Improvement Districts 1, 2 and 3, this Legislature started the job of improving Kakaako's infrastructure, but this bill leaves two-thirds of the job we started for somebody else to finish!

"I think that what this bill does is irresponsible. And the small businesses who comprise the Kakaako Improvement Association think it's irresponsible, too.

That's why they testified against this measure in public hearing.

"While the Governor and the Office of State Planning and the Hawaii Community Development Authority and all of us here are anxious to turn our attention to revitalizing Hawaii's waterfront, we can't just break our promises. We can't just walk away leaving the job we started less than half finished.

"The second area of concern I want to address relates to the confusion and misinformation surrounding the costs of Kakaako's infrastructure improvement. I have had members of this House tell me that their reason for breaking these promises is because all of this infrastructure only benefits private developers.

"This is simply not true. And perhaps the following information I received from HCDA will allay the concerns of these members.

"Upon completion of Improvement District 3, \$155-million will have been invested in the improvement of Kakaako infrastructure. Of this total, \$92-million will be funded with State CIP monies and \$23-million will be recovered from private property owners, tenants and public utilities.

"The State's \$92-million will pay for drainage improvements that serve the mauka communities of Honolulu, like Makiki and Tantalus. It pays for widening of Kakaako roadways so they not only meet local needs, but also better function as part of our island-wide transportation network. It pays for the cost assessments for lands owned by the State or by churches like Kawaiahao and other organizations which are exempt from paying property taxes.

"The \$23-million paid by the private sector constitutes the full measure of infrastructure expenses that could be argued to have purely localized benefits. This includes all the costs for local drainage, sewer, water, underground utilities and local roadways.

"The point here, Mr. Speaker, is that some of those who helped advance this bill to the floor today may not have fully understood that the private sector has paid or will pay for all the improvements that directly benefit them.

"My final area of concern relates to the formula that this bill establishes to regulate developers' options for contributing to the creation of affordable and moderate income housing. And perhaps on this score, it is again pertinent to recall the lessons of my youth.

"A common expression we used in Nanakuli (as well as in other communities across our State) to bring down to earth someone who was pretending to be someone they really weren't or to do something they really knew nothing about was: 'No act!'

"Well that is precisely what I think we should all say to the proponents of this formula: No act! The HCDA and private developers came united in opposition to the specifics of this formula and to the concept of setting such requirements by statute.

"HCDA is our development expert. They understand construction financing and they know what the market will bear. They have already been successful in obtaining commitments to build nearly one thousand new affordable and moderate income units that are now in various phases of development. It's no act for them -- they're the experts!

"Mr. Speaker and members, that brings me to the conclusion of my comments about House Bill 2919. In closing, I urge you to keep the promises we made to the people of Hawaii. I urge you to finish the job we started. I urge you to get all the facts that apply to this situation. I urge you to avoid the temptation of substituting our good intentions for the professional judgment of proven experts. And finally, I urge you to reject this bill.

"Mahalo Nui Loa for your consideration."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2919, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PLANNING AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Amaral, Bellinger, M. Ige, Kanoho and Peters voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 800-90 on H.B. No. 2900:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2900, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RESPITE CARE AT WAIMANO TRAINING SCHOOL AND HOSPITAL," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 801-90 on H.B. No. 2962:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2962, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 802-90 on H.B. No. 3212, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3212, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WAGES AND HOURS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 803-90 on H.B. No. 2260, HD 1:

Representative Apo moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2260, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Liu then rose to speak in favor of the bill, "with very serious reservations," stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I think the concept of campaign reform, especially in the area of contributions and expenditures, do need to be looked at. I think they have to be looked at at a much more comprehensive manner. This is a piecemeal bill. There is not a comparable balance between decreasing the contribution limit from \$2,000 per election and then increasing the tax deduction for individuals or entities from \$100 to \$250 for campaign contributions. If we want to really promulgate a wider base of involvement through contributions, we should be looking at increasing the amounts that parties can give. We should be looking at the laws concerning packs. We should be looking at the laws in campaign spending concerning the aggregates and how they are considered.

"I think if you look at the history of campaign reform, both on the federal level. . .well, mainly on the federal

level because we haven't had that much since we've installed our own statutes, we can say that for every attempted reform -- piecemeal reform -- there's been a comparable reaction to it which has required perhaps even more reform. The increase and perhaps concern over packs arose only after the Buckley v. Vallejo decision in 1978 which was a case that dealt with limits on contributions and expenditures. And after that decision, the law became sufficiently muddled where to avoid the practice of large donations by individuals and very rich individuals, the same organizations and groups formed packs, and now there is a great concern about the influence of packs in the campaign area.

"So my concern, Mr. Speaker, is that this measure does not take a comprehensive approach, and secondly, Mr. Speaker, I think it can be argued, and has been argued by many prominent supporters of campaign reform, that the issue may not be the size of contributions, in terms of creating a better system of allowing challengers to come in, because in fact what type of a candidate have the better ability to raise moneys from larger groups in small amounts? Well, in most cases, it is not the contestant or the challenger to the non-incumbent. It is the incumbent -- the incumbent who chairs a committee, or the incumbent who has been in office for a long time who has a lot of ties to a lot of people in the community who's known. Yes, they can go out and solicit and get a lot of smaller contributions but for a lot of first-time people running, who do they have to rely on? They have to rely on a few members of their family, friends, and that's about it. And by cutting down the amount that they can get from a smaller number of people, this bill actually helps to protect the incumbents.

"I don't think this was the intent behind it. I think it's a laudable attempt to do something about the increased cost of campaigning. But I would hope that as this bill gets worked on in conference, I hope it does go to conference or gets looked at in the Senate, that we take a wider view of what is going on here and modify, if we must, the whole system, not just two very small pieces that I don't believe balance off each other very well.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2260, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ELECTIONS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Cavasso voting no.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 804-90 on H.B. No. 2208, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2208, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ALTERNATIVE TRANSPORTATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 2266, 2928, 2911, 2919, 2900, 2962, 3212, 2260 and 2208 had passed Third Reading at 3:32 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 806-90 on H.B. No. 2608, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2608, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO

JUDICIARY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 807-90 on H.B. No. 2229, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2229, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE SUPPLEMENTAL BUDGET OF THE OFFICE OF HAWAIIAN AFFAIRS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 2608 and 2229 had passed Third Reading at 3:33 o'clock p.m.

THIRD READING

H.B. No. 2500, HD 1 (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 805-90):

Representative Apo moved that H.B. No. 2500, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Hemmings.

Representative Souki rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Prior to going into it, I wish to thank all the members of the Finance Committee who, as usual, works very hard, and my vice chairman, and Mr. Leong, which might be his last session -- the vice chairman on my left and Leong on my right and he doesn't signify the left is better than the right or vice versa, but Mr. Leong has always been there and assisting the committee and this could be his last session and his last session with the Finance Committee, and thank you very much. Of course, I wish to thank all the members, and I wish to thank the staff, especially Mr. Robin Matsunaga, the head and all the staff and working day and night and making themselves available to the committees, the chairmen and to the members.

"And members, this budget you have before you is a rather modest budget. I know there's been some remarks made about it. Maybe in some minds, it's too modest. However, we wish to bear in mind that this budget reflects a supplemental year wherein last year we provided 33.3 percent increase over the previous biennium which was a very heavy increase and this year, the committee felt that this is a supplemental year and we should be much more prudent and provided an increase of approximately 2 percent in the Finance Committee budget that is presented to the House for your acceptance.

"It should be mentioned in this 2 percent, we took out the budget allocation for the grant-in-aids to the counties and it's now under House Bill 2302 that we previously voted on. So, ultimately, this figure will rise correspondingly by two or three percent calculated will end up about five or six which is similar to past supplemental years.

"This budget here tries to look into the areas of the family as was the Majority's bills and the priority of the House. There is very substantial dollars in the area of human services and in health. It also looks into the area of needed infrastructure, provides approximately \$60-million for highways throughout the State, other than H-1, H-2, H-3 which moneys cannot be allocated to the other highways. So this is the two major areas we looked at.

"We also looked in the area to broaden our horizons and not to be so concentrated in tourism, and we looked

into the area of broadening the economic development, the diversification of the State and there is some money in here, and there is also a number of bills that was passed leading towards that end.

"The Finance Committee is very concerned that if we are going to have too much of our dollars all concentrated in the area of tourism and in the event there is a down year like we can see some ominous signs that is around now with the strike, and if we are not diversified enough and if our spending continues at the pace of previous years, that in a downfall we can be hurt very badly.

"For this reason, Mr. Speaker and members of the House, we looked at this budget with a very conservative approach.

"I also wish to thank all the chairmen for their consideration and their patience and their cooperation and, members, thank you very much."

Representative Tam rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of this bill with reservations out of concern in regards to education. My remarks are limited to the budget for public schools and libraries.

"There are some positive things to be said for this House Finance Committee Education budget, that 'it is better than nothing at all.' It is a clear statement by the House of Representatives that we will maintain the fiscal status quo in our public schools -- almost last in the nation.

"But this budget does have the funds for the following:

1. The Vocational Industrial Clubs of America;
2. More studies of Asian Pacific nations and languages;
3. Additional school counselors; and
4. Continuation of the new financial management system.

"I want to say that I fully support Governor John Waihee in his desire to become the 'Education Governor' of the State of Hawaii. Unfortunately for him, and for Hawaii's children in public schools, many important items have been left out of this budget.

The following items I would like to mention:

1. Lowering the student-teacher ratio.
2. The maintenance of our existing systematic approach to repair and maintenance. Let us not go back into the past. Let us spend less on our repair and maintenance in the future. I think the taxpayers deserve this.
3. Increased school priority funds to help practice school community based management. The proposal by the Education Committee presents a very small increase of \$35 to \$75 per student. Educators, parents and students said they can use over \$100 per student. Every school has special needs.
4. Working toward the special education staffing goals to avoid not delivering services required by federal and state laws.
5. The lack of more alternative learning centers for our students at risk.

6. The lack of training money for parent community networking centers. Without the training money, our coordinators in these centers will not be equipped to do the progressive job in communication in the community.

7. Funding for the Information and Technology Services Office.

"The Committee on Education gathered information from the grassroots and from the executive branch in public hearings and based on that information submitted a budget of \$55-million. We reduced our request on the instructions of the Finance Committee chairman to conform with the ceiling established by the Governor's budget proposal. What we did in essence for \$20-million, as established by the Governor's ceiling, was to present a very clear picture of educational needs in this supplemental budget year.

"We, in the Education Committee, applaud the Governor's message containing \$4.8-million and 232 teachers for reducing class size. But this was cut by the Committee on Finance because they say there are not enough classrooms. But this misses the point. Increasing teacher contact and reducing class size is not mainly a matter of space, it is a matter of providing extra teachers and educational assistants in already overcrowded classes. We are 49th in the nation in class size -- almost the worst in the nation. We should be working on this every year if we really want to provide quality public education.

"This budget will not provide for quality public education. We might as well admit to the people of Hawaii that we don't think we can provide the dollars needed for a public education system second to none. If this is going to be the type of budget that the Board of Education has to implement, we should just tell the students, the parents, the teachers, the support staff and the administrators that the State's fiscal pie isn't big enough to provide for their needs. And furthermore, they will have to make do with the same dollar amount of support as they had in the past.

"What kind of message does this budget send our young people? If we expect our young ones to provide a prosperous economy in the future, especially in our senior years, then we must provide quality education for them now.

"Fortunately, there is still time in this legislative session for the House and the Senate to work together to take care of the educational needs of our students.

"Lastly, Mr. Speaker, I wish to thank the members of the Education Committee and the staff and others who have supported our students in the welfare of the educational system.

"Thank you."

Representative Souki, in rebuttal, stated:

"The previous speaker mentioned that the State of Hawaii has a low priority for education. Yet he fails to remember that in the last four years, there has been a \$100-million increase in education. He fails to remember that last year, we provided \$1.5-million for the biennium -- a twenty percent increase over the previous year and much more than any other program in the State! He fails to remember that in 1988 when we approved the lowering of the teacher-pupil ratio and when we asked the Superintendent what was going to be the facility impact and he said, 'none.' And three months later, he came out with a public address that he needed \$100-million more for facilities which to this day we have not failed.

We have facilities throughout the State that's overflowing. We have a school in Lokelani on Maui -- less than two years old -- children is in the bathroom already. We still haven't made the mandate, we still haven't met the mandate of the lowering of the class size from second down to kindergarten because of the lack of facilities.

"He also fails to mention that in 1988 when we approved the legislation, the Superintendent and the Board of Education were to get back to this body here and give us an evaluation in 1991, on June 30th, as to the effectiveness of the program -- Is it working? Are the students doing better? Are they doing better with a lower class size or a larger class size? -- so this body here can evaluate and then make decisions as to what should be increased further.

"He fails to make mention that with the lowering of the class size, that there is no need for physical facilities. Again, you ask the Superintendent -- what is the impact? This is the question we asked of the facilities. He says, 'none.' It's hard to believe! So we say, until we can act on this matter here, Mr. Speaker and members, we will defer until you give us an impact statement.

"Now, as responsible and prudent members of this House and responsible for the moneys of the State of Hawaii, I don't think that's an unreasonable request. To this date, we have not gotten anything from the Superintendent.

"In the area of R&M, in the biennium budget there is \$25-million for each year. It's not that we have not given them any money. The previous biennium, we gave them \$15-million. We raised it up to \$25-million. In checking where the moneys have been spent, thus far they cannot account for \$7-million. Yes, they make mention that it's all accountable. However, it hasn't been spent yet. In fact, in 1988, \$1.6-million was left of that R&M. He denies it but the staff says, 'yes.' Who's right and who's wrong? Is erroneous information given to us? We have to act on the information that is given to us and the information that we have right now, we see no need for an increase of \$5-million for R&M after we got the \$50-million.

"In the priority fund, last year we increased the priority funds from \$17- to \$35-million. That's a hundred percent. One year has passed by and they come and they say they want \$65-million. I think we have a right to question that. Again, as responsible money management for this House, we like to see what they are doing with these dollars.

"And as far as the parents' community training, last year we provided \$1.5-million for the parent networking centers. We don't think that we're opposed to that.

"Members and the Chairman of the Education Committee, you should not think that this body here is short-sighted in education. Continually over the years, we have provided a handsome amount of dollars but it cannot be done all at one time. The pie of this State is rather limited. The funds are finite. I think we have to look at the large expenses in the beginning of the biennium, not in the supplemental and, members, I ask for your consideration.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tam, in rebuttal, stated:

"The Committee on Education has had many, many public hearings and as we all know here in this House of Representatives, the Education Committee will

continuously be willing to supply any information that will back up the needs for our students.

"Thank you."

Representative Alcon then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, as one who has taught for thirty years in the public schools, I would like to say that I would understand the frustration that the Chairman of the Finance Committee has to go through because even in any other system that we have here in government, we don't have a plan to follow. It's like riding a ship without a rudder, Mr. Speaker.

"This bill that we have over here would provide for everything that is needed in the public schools, Mr. Speaker, if we have some guidelines, but then all the requests that have been going to the Finance Committee and to this body are all impulsive requests. They don't have any definite purpose for it. Because of the fact that a lot of those people hear that we have a lot of money, at \$450-million surplus, they want to put their fingers into that surplus and spend it any old ways they want to. Let me just tell you at this point, Mr. Speaker, that we have a lot of money that the DOE has not even touched.

"Now, as far as R&M is concerned, Mr. Speaker, maybe the DOE should wise up a little bit by hiring somebody that knows anything about buildings and not a school teacher to head that department.

"Mr. Speaker, the only qualms that I get about this budget, even if I am supporting it, is that all of a sudden we are going to construct a \$15,000 capacity auditorium at the Manoa campus and yet we forgot all about a college that has been struggling for twenty years, and I am talking about the West Oahu College, Mr. Speaker. The money has been given to them for planning. I don't know what the University is doing with the planning money -- maybe spending it for that auditorium or arena. But I think, Mr. Speaker, we should make all things equal by giving all the institutions some money.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2500, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Hemmings voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 2500 had passed Third Reading at 3:54 o'clock p.m.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Representative Arakaki: "Your Committee on Human Services will be continuing their hearing on various resolutions and we are going to carry on till tomorrow morning at 9:00 o'clock in Room 310."

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 84 to 86) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

No. 84, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION IN RECOGNITION OF THE HAWAII STATE COMMISSION ON THE STATUS OF WOMEN ON ITS TWENTIETH ANNIVERSARY YEAR," was jointly offered by Representatives Arakaki, Hayes, Duldulao, Kawakami, Amaral, Isbell, Fukunaga, Hashimoto, Baker, Horita, Hirono, Marumoto, Alcon, Anderson, Andrews,

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative Hayes and carried, H.R. No. 84 was adopted.

At this time, Representative Arakaki rose and proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"I wonder how many of you still subscribe to the belief that a woman's place is in the home. Well, perhaps the woman's place is in the home but then the world has become the woman's home and all the world is virtually placed at her feet. And while reform movements are creating social and political changes around the world, the social impact of liberated women has created a quiet revolution which has caused the rethinking of social and cultural values, creating new paradigms and frontiers for women in almost every segment of society.

"Here in Hawaii, women and groups advocating for women such as the Commission on the Status of Women and the Hawaii Women's Political Caucus continue to be at the cutting edge of progress in education, employment, social and political leadership. Women continue to advance academically, as illustrated by the percentage of women 25 years and over who have completed four more years of schooling beyond high school, which has increased from 11.9 percent in 1970 to 17.7 percent in 1980.

"In terms of employment, statistics show that in 1980, women constituted 51.7 percent of all workers in the professional speciality field which includes lawyers, engineers, architects, physicians, nurses and teachers. Women also continue to make inroads into traditionally male-dominated industries such as finance, insurance, real estate, as well as public administration.

"Parity, however, is another issue. An advocate such as the Commission cannot be content with the progress made thus far. Despite the advances made in education for women, the major source of employment for women in Hawaii remains largely in the service industries and in administrative supports. As of 1980, 52 percent of all women employed belonged to these two occupational categories. According to the 1979 median income figures, females earned 42.8 percent less than men. The statistics also show that of the single family households headed by females, 28.3 percent had incomes below the poverty level. And those same statistics also show that there's been a 54 percent increase of single parent households headed by females living below the poverty level. Other problems for women such as domestic violence continue to persist. Wife abuse remains the single greatest cause of injury to women and the number of cases continuing to rise unabated every year with the arrest of offending spouses approaching a thousand a year.

"These and other emerging issues for women will continue to be at the forefront for all of us here in the Legislature. By the turn of the next century, more than two-thirds of those entering the labor force will be women of which 84 percent will be of child-bearing age. Our population will continue to age as Hawaii leads the nation and most of the world in average life expectancy with most of the elderly population being women.

"We, as a Legislature, and others in the public and private sectors can no longer operate on old values and biases regarding women. We will need enlightened

workplace policies, particularly in the areas of flexible working hours and benefit plans, as well as child care programs, in order to assure productivity and retention of women in our work force. We can no longer expect women to subsidize human services, health and education by having these women accept substandard wages and doing it out of the goodness of their hearts. Women will demand, and rightfully so, the freedom to make choices and not be bound by the chains of sexual bias and discrimination.

"The women of the 21st century continue to evolve and what will finally emerge is not clear. What we do know from current trends, however, is that the status of women in the 21st century will be unequaled in history as women in the world and of the world take their places as leaders, not only to solve problems, but also to share the glory.

"And with that, Mr. Speaker, I would like to introduce the women who are representing the Commission who we are honoring today."

Representative Arakaki then asked the following honorees to stand to be recognized: Lali Hing, chairperson; Walette Palagrino, commissioner; Janice Higashi, secretary; Sharon Yamada, treasurer; Lois Emura, commissioner; and Marsha Joiner, commissioner.

Representative Arakaki then presented the chairperson, Lali Hing, a certified copy of the resolution, and floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Metcalf, Chang, Leong, Ihara, Shon and Tam.

H.R. No. 85, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING THE ACHIEVEMENTS OF JOHN PAK IN THE FIELD OF COMPETITIVE SOCCER," was jointly offered by Representatives Hashimoto and Okamura.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Alcon and carried, H.R. No. 85 was adopted.

Representative Okamura then rose and proceeded to introduce the honoree, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, we recently recognized a great local athlete, Mr. David Ishii. Today, I would like to introduce to all of you another great athlete, Mr. John Pak.

"John Pak, while only a junior at Aiea High School, was voted as the top soccer player in Hawaii, as well as voted as one of the top players in the United States by the National Soccer Coaches' Association of America.

"We hear so much today about our kids who have gone wrong, how drugs, indifference and apathy play such a prominent role in this generation. I introduced John Pak as a model of what is right with the youngsters of Hawaii. Through hard work, dedication, perseverance and a firm commitment to his goals, John, a young soccer player from Aiea, was able to overcome the odds and receive not just local, but national recognition. He will also be going to Europe in the near future to participate in international competition.

"We are very proud of him. He is a great role model as well as a great athlete. Through dedication, hard work, as well as cooperation with his teammates, John reminds us that dreams are meant to be achieved."

Representative Okamura then asked the honoree, John Pak, to stand to be recognized.

Accompanying John were his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Pak, and his older brother, Tom, who were asked to stand to be recognized.

Representative Okamura presented John Pak with a certified copy of the resolution while Representatives Kawakami, M. Ige, Duldulao and Baker presented the honorees with carnation leis.

Representative Hirono rose and prior to introducing the honorees, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, Miss Rasskasova, as the resolution indicates, is a remarkable young woman. Practically from the moment that she reached our shores, she has been on the go. She has given over twenty-five speeches to various organizations such as the Hawaii Women Lawyers, various women's groups, and even the United States military. She has visited our State Hospital and our prisons because, as she says, you can learn a lot about a society by the way they treat their mentally ill and their prisoners. In fact, when she visited OCCC, she chatted with one of the prisoners who turned out to be Bucky Lake and he was sitting at a computer terminal just typing away, and as Larisa says, 'What a country!'

"She has spent the last two weeks observing the legislative process with the House Consumer Protection and Commerce Committee, and I can only imagine what she thinks of all our goings-on. Miss Rasskasova has a great sense of curiosity about a lot of different things. She has a delightful sense of humor; she speaks English wonderfully; she is very candid about our country as well as hers.

"The Soviet Union could not have sent a more able emissary to our country."

Representative Hirono then asked Larisa Rasskasova to stand to be recognized.

Representative Hirono continued:

"With Larisa are two people most responsible for her coming to Hawaii. First, Judge Ron Moon, but before I ask him to stand, I would like to tell you a little bit about him.

"Judge Moon is one of our most respected judges. He is respected by both the plaintiffs and the defense bars and as you must know, that is not an easy feat. I have had dealings with Judge Moon myself and he was very nice to me -- thank you.

"Judge Moon is known for his fair-minded toughness. As you all know, Judge Moon is about to be sworn in as our newest member of the Supreme Court. He will be sworn in tomorrow afternoon or tomorrow morning I believe.

"Judge Moon, on behalf of the House, we would like to extend to you our best wishes, our congratulations. We

know that you are going to make an excellent justice of our Supreme Court."

Representative Hirono then asked Judge Ron Moon to stand to be recognized.

Representative Hirono continued, saying:

"Sitting next to Judge Moon is Raymond Tam. As the resolution indicated, he is the person credited with Larisa coming to our country as he had met Larisa on a trip that he had to the Soviet Union.

"Raymond Tam is one of our most respected attorneys in town. He would be too modest to tell you that he is listed in the book, **The Best Trial Lawyers in America**, although if any of you are interested, I think he still has about a hundred copies of the book left I understand. He even made the **Town and Country** list as among the country's best attorneys. He currently is a member of the Judicial Selection Commission and is active in many worthwhile causes such as raising funds for the Rehab Hospital of the Pacific and the St. Louis School.

"I also had the distinct pleasure of working, or I should say 'slaving,' for Mr. Tam for four years before I took an early retirement from the rigors of private practice."

Representative Hirono asked Mr. Raymond Tam to stand to be recognized.

Representative Hirono then asked Mrs. Audrey Tam, "Ray's better half, his wife," to stand to be recognized.

Floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Hiraki, Amaral and Hayes while Representative Hirono presented Miss Rasskasova with a certified copy of the resolution.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

By unanimous consent, H.R. No. 136, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION HONORING THE NATIONAL CENTER FOR FAMILY LITERACY AND ITS PRESIDENT SHARON DARLING," was taken from the Clerk's desk.

On motion by Representative Lee, seconded by Representative Arakaki and carried, H.R. No. 136 was adopted.

Representative Lee then rose and prior to introducing the honorees, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, Mrs. Lynne Waihee, members of the House and guests, we are honoring today, the National Center for Family Literacy, its President, Sharon Darling, and the members of her staff who have come to Hawaii from Kentucky to provide training for the Hawaii Family Literacy Program this weekend, March 17 and 18.

"The problem of literacy is nationwide, and here in Hawaii there are an estimated 154,000 illiterate adults or about nineteen percent of our population.

"Breaking the cycle of illiteracy means more than improving literacy skills. It is not simply teaching someone to read and write. It means changing attitudes, values, and in some cases, cultures.

"The National Center for Family Literacy concludes that the key is the family. Parental involvement is vital for the child's enthusiasm and capacity for learning. By working with parents of the very young, we can improve the family attitude towards education. 'Get the mother, and you will get the child,' and vice versa.

"The family literacy model focuses on families which are most disadvantaged educationally. It treats the family as a whole. Its components include adult learning, early childhood education, parent time, parent and child together, and life skills.

"We are fortunate to have Sharon Darling and her staff come to Hawaii to provide training on their family literacy model. This training is the first step in implementing the Family Literacy Program which we passed in the House form, House Bill No. 2281.

"Mr. Speaker, it is now my pleasure to introduce our honored guests."

Representative Lee then asked the following honorees to stand to be recognized: First Lady Lynne Waihee, Honorary Chairperson of the Governor's Council for Literacy; Sharon Darling, President of the National Center for Family Literacy; Dr. Andrew Hayes, Mr. Robert Spillman and Mrs. Bonnie Lash Freeman, her staff; Lynne Madden, Executive Chairperson of the

Governor's Council for Literacy; Frank Haas, Director of Marketing for Pizza Hut-Hawaii, from the private sector. "I would like to add a word about Pizza Hut which has been the major contributor to the smooth operations of the Hawaii Literacy Program. We are fortunate in Hawaii to have very strong and responsive and responsible private sector, and in this respect Pizza Hut has been leading the companies. We have to do more because we have just been awarded three federal grants for workplace literacy, and this involves both the private and public sectors. One of them is the UH and the Sheraton Hotels. The second is the community colleges with the Corrections personnel; and the third is on Lanai which now faces a lot of development and problems."

Representative Lee continued his introduction and introduced Lynn Fallin, Director of the Office of Children and Youth; and Sue Berg, Family Literacy Coordinator, Office of Children and Youth, and "the person who does all the work."

"Mr. Speaker, with your permission, I would like to introduce a large number of well wishers who are members of the Literacy Team statewide," and asked the following persons who were seated in the gallery to stand to be recognized: Dr. Beng Poh Yoshikawa, Lynn Goya, Lani Kiesel, Eileen Yim, Wanda Atkins, John Brough, Ermile Hargrove, Anita Li, Bette Matthews, Mae Mendelson, Kathie Reinhardt and Serena Shimabukuro.

Representative Arakaki then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, members, First Lady Lynne Waihee, I think it is very appropriate that we had a very eloquent speech by one of our most literate members here in our honorable House. I think it is also appropriate that I sit next to one of the most voracious readers in the House -- Representative Hagino is constantly reading. He even reads with his eyes closed.

"But what I wanted to point out, Mr. Speaker and fellow members, is that I've heard many times that literacy is the key. It is a key that opens the door of opportunity for many people and, unfortunately, there are many people who do not have these keys and are not able to open the doors.

"And I can speak specifically as the Chairman of Human Services, you know, when you look at our present population, we do have a large number of inmates who aren't able to read. And I think that illustrates one of the points about literacy, and besides our prisoners there are many others who are not being imprisoned by the physical barriers of bars and walls, but still they are in prison because they do not have the capacity that other literate individuals do.

"And if I can invoke again what I spoke of when we talked about self-esteem, I think we need to look to the source. As the Hawaiian says, nana ike kumu -- look to the source -- and possibly put a little more effort, not necessarily more money and resources, but put a little more effort and focus on things like literacy so we can prevent these people from getting into that situation. And perhaps we can enable them to open the doors and open minds so that we can provide for a more literate and a more enlightened society here in Hawaii.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Floral leis were then presented to the honorees by Representatives Tam, Arakaki, Ihara, Hagino, Hirayama, Yoshimura, Hashimoto, Horita and Kawakami, and Representative Lee presented Sharon Darling with a certified copy of the resolution.

The House of Representatives of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, convened at 11:30 o'clock a.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Rev. Larry Fisher of St. Stephen's Diocesan Center, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representative Honda, who was excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Thirty-Second Day.

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Thirty-Second Day was approved.

Sen. Com. No. 333, informing the House that S.B. No. 609, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO REAL ESTATE BROKERS AND SALESMEN," passed Final Reading in the Senate on March 15, 1990.

At this time, the following introductions were made to the members of the House:

Representative Metcalf introduced members of the Waiakea Intermediate School's Math Counts Team "which placed first in the Hawaii District and is here

competing in the State finals," as follows: Ono Iida, Justin Kimura, Eric Kozohara, Scott Tamura, Lei Fujishige and Peggy English. They were accompanied by their coaches, Mrs. Kurokawa and Mrs. Mizuno.

Representative Hemmings then rose and stated:

"Before I introduce the individuals, I would like to explain to this honorable body the circumstances why they are here.

"In 1915, Duke Kahanamoku, who I consider Hawaii's most distinguished citizen, went to Australia to compete in swimming. On Clearwater Beach outside of Sydney, he introduced to the Australians a sport that they have become very proficient at -- surfing. He did it at the Freshwater Surf Lifesaving Club and soon after, surfing took off in Australia.

"These gentlemen were in my office this morning and presented me this plaque, and I think the women in this body would especially like it because it shows the three first women surfers of Australia. One of them is Isabella Latham who started surfing in 1916, and she is a 90 year old woman now. She doesn't surf much anymore, but it shows how hardy surfing ladies are!

"These gentlemen are here to coordinate and help work with the State of Hawaii on the centennial anniversary of Duke's birth which will be celebrated in August of this year. They are putting up a fifteen foot high statue of Duke Kahanamoku in Australia and as we know, not only is he a great man of aloha for Hawaii, he is a great patriarch of surfing. Our State of Hawaii will be doing similar things and Representative Hagino and others are contacting many people who knew and loved Duke and is setting up a centennial celebration here in Hawaii.

"It is my pleasure to introduce two gentlemen from Australia who are helping coordinate what will happen in Australia to celebrate Duke's great life, and I would like to introduce those gentlemen to you. They're from the Freshwater Surf Lifesaving Club in Australia and they are Bernard Connelly and his son, Les Connelly."

Mr. Bernard Connelly and his son, Les, then rose to be recognized.

Representative Takamine rose and added to Representative Metcalf's introduction, saying:

"I guess in today's world of ever-increasing technological advancement, the role of math becomes more important. And the Math Counts Program is part of the curriculum of the public school system that does encourage the development of math skills.

"Today, also here from the Big Island -- Hilo Intermediate and Kalaniana'ole Intermediate Schools -- are other participants who will be in competition this weekend, and I would like to introduce them. They include, from Hilo Intermediate School, Kapena Fung; and from Kalaniana'ole Intermediate School, Carrie Mitsuyoshi, Manny Okano, John Sadayasu, Lori Sunada, Irene Jose and Alan Alicuben. They are accompanied by their very dedicated adviser and coach, Mrs. Satsuki Onoki, as well as her husband who is helping to chaperone the group."

The students, adviser and chaperone all rose to be recognized.

Representative Bunda introduced a group of fifth grade students from Helemano Elementary School in Whitmore

Village. They were accompanied by their teachers, Carol Fujiyama and Baldwin Miyake; part-time teacher, Cindy Anakalea, and her husband, Patrick; and a parent, Don Ramos.

Representative Bunda then introduced a group of students from the Storefront Alternative School in Wahiawa. They were accompanied by their teachers, Derek Tengan, Garrett Uyetake, Katherine Hongo and Sharon Nagano.

Representative Bellinger, on behalf of Representatives Apo, Bunda, Stegmaier and himself, proceeded to introduce "some individuals in the audience who are members of the International Board of Directors for the Pacific Congress on Marine Science and Technology, better known as PACON," saying:

"PACON is a Hawaii-born organization of individuals interested in promoting the exchange of marine technology information across the Pacific. This organization started in 1982 when a small group of five marine-oriented people, of which I am proud to be one, began a concept of bringing together marine experts from around the world to focus on an exchange of marine technology information. It was part of our hope to expand this thing to include the international arena, and in 1984 and in 1986, the first two PACON conferences were held here in Honolulu at the Princess Kaiulani Hotel. PACON 88 was also held in Honolulu and the success of the organization has been so great that we have now expanded into international chapters, and during the last few days the members of our international board have been in town preparing for the PACON 90 which will be held in Tokyo. PACON 92 is scheduled to be held in Kona, and PACON 94 in Australia.

"At this time, I would like to introduce the following people," and asked the honorees to stand to be recognized as their names were called.

"From Japan: Dr. Wataru Kato. He is a trustee of Nihon University, and Dr. Kenji Hotta, also of Nihon University.

"From Australia: Dr. David Hopley. He is the Director of the Sir George Fisher Center at the James Cook University in North Queensland.

"From Washington, D.C.: Mr. John Carey. He is Deputy Assistant to the Administrator of NOAA, in charge of coastal zone management; Dr. Rick Podgorny, Chief of the Office of International Affairs for NOAA; Dr. Gary Hill, Chief of the U.S. Geological Survey from NOAA; Ms. Fatimah Taylor and Ms. Mary Leach, also of NOAA.

"From Hawaii: Mr. and Mrs. Jack Harmon; Dr. Narendra Saxena; Ms. Stacie Kado of PACON International; and Mr. Chip Higgins of PICTOR.

"I would also like the members to know that of the Board of Directors of PACON 90, Representatives Apo, Bunda and Stegmaier are among those Board members.

"Thank you."

Representative Chang, with great pleasure and pride, introduced his son, Jensen Chang, first place winner of the statewide poster contest, saying:

"In the gallery this morning, we have the first place winner of the statewide poster contest. The contest was for 'What Being an American Means To Me,' sponsored by the United States Department of Justice, Immigration and Naturalization Service, and the Governor's Office.

Our winner spent this morning at the Governor's Office being congratulated by Senator Daniel Inouye and the Governor. His poster is being sent to Washington, D.C., to compete with four others for the national competition. The eventual winner, or the eventual winning poster, will be commemorized on a United States postage stamp. Our winner is a sixth grade student at Pauoa School."

Representative Horita introduced Kelly Harmon, Don Hansen, Anna Maria Coco and Ysmir Ramirez, eighth grade students at Moanalua Intermediate School, who are participants in the legislative "shadowing" program.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION

H.R. Ige, M. Ige, Ihara, Isbell, Kanoho, Kawakami, Kihano, Lee, Leong, Liu, Marumoto, Metcalf, O'Kieffe, Okamura, Oshiro, Peters, Say, Shon, Souki, Stegmaier, Tajiri, Takamine, Tam, Tom and Yonamine and was read by the Clerk.

On motion by Representative Taniguchi, seconded by Representative Shon and carried, H.R. No. 357 was adopted.

Representative Taniguchi then rose and proceeded to introduce the honoree, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, I am honored this morning to introduce to you a man who once wrote, 'We are accustomed to summing up people when their career is over because we imagine that only then can we form a judgment on a man's contribution to his times; but we will get a truer picture if we see people at the height of their powers when their achievement, or indeed their failures, are still before them.' So, it seems apropos to honor a man at the height of his powers, Lord Noel Annam.

"Mr. Speaker, were I to attempt to sum up the accomplishments and contributions of our honoree, the judgment of his contribution to his times would be clear to all here. The many honors bestowed upon Lord Annam throughout his continuing career devoted to culture, the arts, education and government; and his special talent of bringing history to life through biography speak for itself to the positive influence of this renowned educator.

"We are honored to have Lord Annam as a visiting scholar to the Center for Biographical Research at the University of Hawaii-Manoa.

"His experiences with the richness of history and his devotion to the art of biography will be of highest benefit to those of us who take advantage of his stay here in Hawaii.

"I know I speak for all of us here today when I extend the Aloha of Hawaii to our honored guest as we welcome Lord Annam into our midst today.

"It is my pleasure, Mr. Speaker, to introduce Lord Noel Annam."

Representative Taniguchi then asked Lord Noel Annam to stand to be recognized.

With Lord Annam on the Chamber floor were Dr. Cornelia Moore, Assisant Dean of the College of Linguistics; Dr. Amy Agbayani, Program Officer, Office of Vice President of Academic Affairs; and Dr. George Simpson, Director of the Center for Biographical Research, and they were all asked to stand to be recognized.

Representatives Bunda and Tom, for the Committees on Ocean and Marine Resources and Intergovernmental Relations and International Affairs, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 823-90) recommending that H.C.R. No. 10, as amended in HD 1, be adopted.

Representative Stegmaier moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.C.R. No. 10, HD 1, be adopted, seconded by Representative Tom.

Representative Apo then rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, sometimes we go through resolutions and think of them as being rather innocuous. On this issue, I cannot think of a more important issue for the future of this State than the jurisdiction over our ocean waters, particularly being an island state.

"In the past with previous administrations, we have tried to assert to the Federal government what we refer to as archipelagic claim; that is, in extending the three-mile State jurisdiction, we would draw a circle around the entire Hawaiian chain and that would extend out three miles. Of course, the Federal government laughed at us.

"I recall when the first OTEC pilot project was being set up with a demonstration model of the Big Island, that Sus Ono who was then the Director of the Department of Land and Natural Resources, in trying to put forth this archipelagic claim that they were outside the three-mile limits, claimed that the Federal government needed a permit from the State. Of course, they laughed it off. What we did to ensure our claim is, we paid for the permit. It cost us fifty bucks and we issued it anyway.

"We seem to have backed off of this archipelagic claim position, and in 1983 when President Reagan issued his proclamation declaring a 200-mile exclusive economic zone, it had huge implications, particularly for all coastal states. There was a total of 600,000 square miles in the entire nation that composed this exclusive economic zone; 275,000 square miles of that is in Hawaiian waters.

"When we get to subjects like manganese cross mining, it is critical that we are able to claim some sort of State's rights in the determination as to what resources are going to be tapped and in what conditions.

"When the President declared this proclamation on the exclusive economic zone, the Congress failed to act with any sort of domestic policy; that is, the 200-mile EEZ was largely an international document, sending a message to foreign countries that 200 miles out from every American territory we claimed, but there was a failure on the part of Congress to clarify what the policy direction was in terms of the relationship between the states and the Federal government. So we are in a hassle over that.

"Now, in 1989, President Bush comes with a proclamation extending the three-mile territorial sea to which the State clearly now has jurisdiction out to twelve miles. And the problem we face is that while the federal statute defines the territorial sea and extends to states many, many rights in terms of control of those resources, and they define it as three miles, the question is -- does the Presidential proclamation extending clearly the territorial sea out to twelve miles, what does that mean for Hawaii? For instance, the distance in the channel between Oahu and Molokai, at its two closest points is about twenty miles. If the twelve-mile territorial sea is defined as consistent with the current definition in federal statutes, that would give the State of Hawaii the rights between that entire channel and those waters. It poses some questions.

"For instance, several years ago as we all recall, the Russian fleet sailed down between those two islands. To what extent do we have, in terms of navigation rights of passage?

"These are very, very heavy questions, Mr. Speaker, and I think we're all aware that with emerging new ocean technologies and our ability to access many of the resources contained in the ocean, that we have by far a larger ocean mass, including submerged lands that we do have actual land mass, and that these kinds of policy questions and the failure to bring any clarity will have a huge and very severe impact upon our ability to control our resources and to expand our economy.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

No. 9, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION URGING SUPPORT FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A COMPACT BETWEEN PACIFIC STATES AND THE CANADIAN PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA TO PROVIDE FOR FUTURE PLANNING AND PROTECTION OF OCEAN RESOURCES WHICH ARE OF REGIONAL CONCERN," was adopted.

Representatives Bunda and Tom, for the Committees on Ocean and Marine Resources and Intergovernmental Relations and International Affairs, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 826-90) recommending that H.R. No. 19, as amended in HD 1, be adopted.

Representative Stegmaier moved that the joint report of the Committees be adopted and H.R. No. 19, HD 1, be adopted, seconded by Representative Tom.

Representative Apo then rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"I just want the members to be aware that high seas gill nets are being laid -- thirty thousand miles of net per day. That's the distance between Seattle and Tokyo and back. These nets run a depth of from forty to sixty feet. They're indiscriminate in what they catch -- everything that moves into their path.

"It's a very serious problem, and I would like to commend the Chairman of our Ocean and Marine Resources Committee for addressing this problem.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.R. Representative Ihara then rose and proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I've been a member of the Hunger Project since I attended a Hunger Project presentation in 1977, and back then it really did seem that hunger was inevitable. But now, due in part to the hard work of the Hunger Projects worldwide network of committed volunteers, including well over 15,000 in Hawaii, it's generally known that there is enough food to feed the world's hungry people and that hunger can and must be ended. It's still hard for me to imagine how now as it was ten years ago, Mr. Speaker, that every day, hunger related deaths among children number 26,000. That doesn't make the headlines, Mr. Speaker, but that's equivalent to 100 jumbo jets filled with children crashing every day. That would make the front page headlines.

"In Hawaii, the Hunger Project is working diligently to end homelessness, the visible result of the increased number of those in poverty. Hawaii's residents are barely aware that over 37,000 of our fellow citizens go hungry several days every month.

"Mr. Speaker, the long term disabling effects of hunger in our State are being felt perhaps not as dramatic as the family, but as the premature deaths due to lowered resistance to diseases but most of us are able to overcome and resist. These are the hungry, the homeless who suffer from chronic, persistent hunger.

"Mr. Speaker, some of the Hawaii Hunger Project activities include youth-ending hunger clubs being organized in our high schools, and the annual Ending Hunger Hawaii Teaching Award that was presented just yesterday to a Nanakuli High School teacher.

"Mr. Speaker, it is my privilege to introduce to this body our honorees. They are Catherine Parrish, Managing Director of the Hunger Project, United States; Kathleen Cook, Hunger Project staff, San Francisco; Dave Moncrief, President of the Board of Directors of Ending Hunger Hawaii; Chris Belnap, Hunger Project volunteer; and Bob Siegal, Hunger Project Event Manager."

The honorees rose to be recognized, and Miss Parrish was presented a certified copy of the resolution by Representative Ihara, and an ilima/maile lei by Representative Arakaki. Floral leis were presented to the others on the chamber floor by Representatives Chang, Duldulao, Isbell and Baker.

Representative Ihara then asked a group of Hungry Project volunteers who were seated in the gallery to stand to be recognized.

I thought my bunch was something, that must have been a bunch. Lisa said that after the first day, they all couldn't agree on anything. Although originally from New York, Lisa made Hawaii her home after a short career as a jazz singer performing at American military bases in France, in

exotic places such as Bangkok, Fiji and American Samoa. Maybe she'll sing one for us today. Lisa lives on the Big Island, is married, and has two children attending the University of Hawaii.

"One of the most eloquent and accomplished musicians of Hawaii is our honored guest, Aaron Mahi, whose distinguished career as a conductor of the Royal Hawaiian Band spans nine years. He has also been with the Honolulu Symphony since 1975, first as one of its bass players, more recently as its conductor of the Youth Concert series and is currently their acting associate conductor. I think all of us here have been witness to Mr. Mahi's powerful presence as he leads his very talented musicians.

"Mr. Speaker, without further delay, I would like to present to you and my colleagues, Maestro Aaron Mahi, distinguished conductor of the world famous Royal Hawaiian Band."

Mr. Mahi then rose to be recognized. He was accompanied by his fiancée and former Miss Hawaii, Ms. Kathy Foy.

"Mr. Speaker, Mrs. Spalding is 91 years old, born before this century began, and still teaching actively today.

"One of my sons had the opportunity to attend her class. She is a tough teacher. He indicated that he was tempted to quit a number of times but today a few months later, because it was only a few months ago that he took the two weeks course from her, he is so grateful and proud of his reading ability and especially his writing ability which has improved ten times over what it was.

"I would like to read a testimony from a young man who was enrolled in her course: 'My name is Peter Gumaer. I am eighteen years old. I could never understand words. I could not read and I could not write. I could always understand clearly everything that was read to me. I was labeled by various schools and educators learning disabled, attention deficit disorder, dyslexic, and eventually emotionally disturbed. I thought I was stupid. I thought I was not like the other kids my age. I was always separated -- grade schools were a nightmare to me. My junior high was terrible. I was angry and violent. Since I could not do what everyone else did, I just did bad things. By high school, I didn't care anymore. I thought I would never be able to read or write.' By the way, he spent some time in prison. 'My parents convinced me to go to Mrs. Spalding's workshop. By the end of the first day, I learned how not to reverse my letters, especially b and d. By the ninth day, I was reading out of the eleventh grade level reading text in front of the whole class. It's weird now. Words make sense. I never thought it would happen. I went to school for eleven years just to wait till the day I could find that I could learn to read and write.'

"This young man was reading at the second grade level six months ago. Today, he is enrolled in Honolulu Community College and has tested at an average college level reading -- six months later! This was with just a two-week course in phonetic reading and writing -- two weeks!

"Well, I am grateful. . . I am sure we all are, Mrs. Spalding, for the dedication you've given and we appreciate the wisdom you have with 91 years of experience, how you bridge the gap from the early 1900s teaching till today, and how you help kids read and write so effectively, and we long to have her phonetic method shared with other teachers and schools which is why, Mr. Speaker, the other women are with her today. I would like to recognize them as well.

"Mrs. Lennie Gumaer is the President of the Foundation, the Spalding Foundation, to work and save this teaching method and help it be shared with others; Betty Lou Miura is the President of the Foundation; and Sandra Maurie, Secretary of the Foundation."

Representative Cavasso then asked Mrs. Romalda Spalding and the others to stand to be recognized.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

"Mr. Speaker, Hawaii's Young Woman of the Year program is a part of a program called America's Young Woman of the Year. Until recently, this program was called America's Junior Miss program.

"I believe that the women's movement and the changing roles that women are assuming in our society have brought about a change in the name of the program, but the emphasis has always been the same -- identifying outstanding young women, high school seniors, who have demonstrated excellence in academic pursuits but who also are well-rounded in terms of their community involvement, their extra-curricular activities, their great potential as leaders in our community.

"Representing the Hawaii's Young Woman of the Year program this morning is Carol Chun, who is director of the Hawaii's Young Woman of the Year."

Representative Stegmaier asked Carol Chun to stand to be recognized.

"Mr. Speaker, we are honored to have with us on the floor this morning MeiLon Kavanagh, Hawaii's Young Woman of the Year first runner-up, who typifies the best of young America and Hawaii, who is a straight A student at Radford High School and has served as Chair of the Radford High School Student Council and Vice President of the French Club. MeiLon, known to most of her friends and others with whom she is familiar is called 'Lonna.' She has a tremendous sense of humor to balance the serious accomplishments and her intention to pursue a degree in engineering."

Representative Stegmaier then asked MeiLon to stand to be recognized.

"Mr. Speaker, I have the distinct pleasure of introducing Hawaii's Young Woman of the Year for 1990, Seema Sueko Ahmed. Her name identifies her cross cultural background -- Seema, meaning 'pure as silver' in Pakistani, and Sueko, meaning 'last child' in Japanese.

"Mr. Speaker and colleagues, you've heard what the resolution said about the accomplishments of this remarkable young woman, but let me tell you a couple of other things about Seema. First, that her strong close-knit family has had much to do with her success and her future plans. Her dad, Saleem, came to Hawaii from Pakistan as an East-West Center grantee where he met Carol, a UH undergraduate student from Kona, a graduate of Konawaena High School. Saleem is now a research associate with the Resource Systems Institute at the East-West Center.

"Seema has been brought up a Muslim and her career interests stem from her on-going concern about the problems and the injustices, as she describes them, that continue to exist in the Middle East, especially regarding the Palestinian refugees. Seema, this accomplished student, actress and singer, intends to pursue undergraduate and graduate studies in international relations for the specific purpose of someday being an instrument of lasting peace in the Middle East, as well as elsewhere in the world, where misunderstandings exist. When I asked her what her ultimate career goal might be, Seema hesitated. I suggested U.S. Ambassador to Egypt; she suggested U.S. Ambassador to Israel. I then suggested Secretary General of the United Nations; she suggested Secretary of State. Then Saleem interrupted and said, 'Why not President of the United States.' Whatever she finally settles on, we know Seema will be the instrument of peace which she is clearly meant to be.

"We wish her well in those long-term goals as well as the more short-term goal of winning the title of America's Young Woman of the Year in Mobile, Alabama, this July."

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Forty-Second Day was approved.

At this time, Representative Lee introduced to the members of the House Ira Haimowitz, a Ph.D. candidate at M.I.T. who "came to Hawaii to participate in the Second International Workshop on User Modelling, a conference sponsored in part by the University of Hawaii. The conference focused on computer interfacing and its applications to computer use for the handicapped. Approximately 25 papers were presented, and Mr. Ira Haimowitz, a young scholar from M.I.T., presented a paper on computer dialogues for use by doctors in hospitals."

Representative Lee added:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to add a very short comment on the contribution of the University of Hawaii to this conference.

"Of the 25 papers, two were presented by University of Hawaii professors relating to having computers predict a person's thoughts from his eye movements. It's very challenging, innovative, and an insight into our 21st century. It's great to see the University of Hawaii sponsor such an international workshop and to see young scholars from as far away as M.I.T. come to present their papers.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

ORDER OF THE DAY

COMMITTEE REASSIGNMENT

Senate Bill No. 3109 was re-referred jointly to the Committees on Planning, Energy and Environmental Protection and Judiciary.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 372 and 373) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

H.R. No. 372, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING THE LIONS CLUB INTERNATIONAL, DISTRICT 50, HAWAII, FOR ITS DEDICATED SERVICE TO THE COMMUNITY," was jointly offered by Representatives Tam, Anderson, Cachola, Fukunaga, Hagino, Hemmings, Hiraki, Honda, Kawakami, Say and Tom.

On motion by Representative Tam, seconded by Representative Leong and carried, H.R. No. 372 was adopted.

Representative Tam then rose to introduce the honorees, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and fellow colleagues, this morning we have five honorable guests representing a very prominent community service organization -- the Lions Club International of our Aloha State. I thank our Clerk of this honorable House of Representatives for reading the resolution honoring the Lions International in the State of Hawaii. The resolution mentions the highlights of 64 years of dedicated service by the Lions Club members of Hawaii but, Mr. Speaker, I wish to say a few additional words.

"I wish to emphasize that the Lions Club is a highly respectable community service organization because of the community-minded members who are willing to give unselfishly to Hawaii's community. And this is especially true in terms of recognition abroad.

"About two years ago, I had the pleasure of going to Taiwan, and I must say that the Taiwanese in the Republic of China had very kind words about the Lions members here in the State of Hawaii and much, much more respect. As a fellow Lion, I am very pleased to currently serve as the President of the Kuhio Lions.

"At this time, Mr. Speaker, I wish to introduce our honorable guests."

Representative Tam then asked the following honorees to stand to be recognized: Mr. Joseph Pontanilla, District 50 Governor; Mr. George Ito, Honorary District 50 Governor; Mr. Wesley Charlton, District 50 Executive Secretary; and Mr. Kiyoshi "K-Fat" Hiramatsu, immediate past International Director and "a very good friend of mine."

Representative Tam then asked members of the House who are also members of the Lions Club to stand to be recognized.

Floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Duldulao, Amaral, Horita and Hashimoto, and Representative Tam presented Mr. Pontanilla with a certified copy of the resolution.

H.R. No. 373, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION COMMENDING HUGH O'REILLY, LT. COLONEL ROLAND CARTER, LT. COLONEL MICHAEL THOMPSON, AND THE SOLDIERS OF THE 27th INFANTRY 'WOLFHOUND' REGIMENT FOR THEIR UNFAILING DEVOTION TO THE ORPHANS OF OSAKA, JAPAN," was jointly offered by Representatives Alcon, Arakaki, Cachola, Anderson, Andrews, Duldulao, D. Ige, M. Ige, Leong and Oshiro.

On motion by Representative Alcon, seconded by Representative Arakaki and carried, H.R. No. 373 was adopted.

Representative Alcon rose and proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the Clerk had eloquently read the resolution but there are some interesting spots that I would like to add if I may.

"Mr. Speaker, I have been told that there are about twenty orphans who have come to the State of Hawaii. In

fact, I have been told that two of them are presently attending Punahou School and, you know, if you go to Punahou I guess it's alright.

"There is also one of the former residents of this orphanage who has been adopted by Mr. Ken Keith, the President of Chaminade College and I think that is a commendable action on his part. Also, Mr. Speaker, the daughter of former Governor Burns also adopted one of the orphans.

"Mr. Speaker, the 'Wolfhounds' have been doing this charitable deed since 1949 and it has been going on all this time. We have not heard about it all this time because, you know, the military, like politicians, unless you do something wrong, the press will not write anything about you.

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to present to you and to the members of the House Mr. Hugh O'Reilly, who is the founder of the 'Wolfhounds' charity."

Mr. Hugh O'Reilly then rose to be recognized. Accompanying Mr. O'Reilly on the chamber floor were his wife, Yuko; Lt. Colonel Roland Carter, commander of the First Battalion; Lt. Colonel Michael Thompson, commander of the Fourth Battalion; Sgt. Major Darryl Coots and Sgt. Major Pat Orden.

Floral leis were presented to Mr. O'Reilly and the others who were present on the chamber floor by Representatives Hirono, Cachola, Amaral, Marumoto, Kawakami and Hirayama, and Representative Alcon presented them with certified copies of the resolution.

Representative Marumoto then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I am delighted to see my old friends here and Yuko O'Reilly here today. I have known them for many years--I would say practically thirty years--and haven't seen them very much recently, but I am very happy to see them. They are a wonderful couple. They have done wonderful work for the orphanage in Osaka, and I don't think many of you people know that their story is so heartwarming that a Hollywood movie was actually made of the work of the orphanage entitled, **Three Stripes in the Sun**, starring Aldo Ray.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

At 11:56 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:35 o'clock p.m.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Representative Honda, for the Committee on Agriculture, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 992-90) recommending that S.B. No. 2475, SD 2, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Honda, seconded by Representative Say and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2475, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC LANDS," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative Honda, for the Committee on Agriculture, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 993-90) recommending that S.B. No. 3012, SD 1, pass

Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Honda, seconded by Representative Say and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3012, SD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE AGRICULTURAL PARK PROGRAM," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative Honda, for the Committee on Agriculture, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 994-90) recommending that S.B. No. 3423 pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Honda, seconded by Representative Say and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3423, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FENCES," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Apo, seconded by Representative Hemmings and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering bills on Third Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar.

THIRD READING

The following bills, which were on the calendar for Third Reading, were read throughout and the following actions taken:

S.B. No. 3111, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Shon, seconded by Representative Leong and carried, S.B. No. 3111, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RESPITE CARE AT WAIMANO TRAINING SCHOOL AND HOSPITAL," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 AND, with Representative D. Ige being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 3111 had passed Third Reading at 12:36 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 2969, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Souki moved that S.B. No. 2969, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Fukunaga.

Representative Hagino rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is the very kind of legislation that gives our profession a bad name. Politics is a profession. It is a profession no different than law or medicine or real estate or any number of professions that we regulate by the passage of laws. We expect the people engaged in those professions to maintain high standards, and as professionals we expect the same for ourselves.

"This bill gives one person, the Stadium Manager, a pay raise. And this, I would remind you, is after we gave a pay raise only last year together with all the other gubernatorial appointees. The bill not only gives that person a pay raise but essentially raises him to the level of a department head. The person currently occupying that position happens to be a former colleague of ours. Is

that a mere coincidence? If someone else had held that position, would the bill have come this far?

"I think this bill is also bad because of the manner in which it was handled in this body. Normally, all bills relating to sports and recreation are handled by the Water and Land Use Committee. For example, the Stadium's executive budget program is reviewed by this committee. Customarily then, this bill would have been assigned to the Water, Land Use Committee. It was not. It was sent directly to Finance."

At this point, Representative M. Ige rose on a point of order and said:

"Mr. Speaker, my point is, the referral process -- how germane is that to the bill that is before us?"

At 12:39 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:43 o'clock p.m., Representative Hagino continued his remarks, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, it was my contention that subject matter jurisdiction is an important integral part of the bill process and which my colleagues should, I think, hear my opinion on that. However, since you'll rule me out of order if I persist on that, I will stop at this moment regarding the subject matter jurisdiction of the process in which this bill was reviewed.

"However, Mr. Speaker, there are other reasons to vote against this bill.

"As I mentioned earlier, we recently passed a pay raise bill last year. It was a pay raise bill based upon the recommendations of a special Citizens Advisory Commission to evaluate pay raises for all of his appointees. Among the appointees that were reviewed was the Stadium Manager's position. The Citizens Advisory Commission made its recommendations and we adopted those recommendations with little or no changes. Therefore, in adopting the Citizens Advisory Commission report, we also adopted the recommended pay raise for that Stadium Manager. Not even a year has passed since the bill has been signed into law. We are again considering a pay raise for this one position. We should wait until all salaries are to be reviewed again. If we do not do so, we will only create dissension and a loss of morale among the other executive appointees who do not have the means to the process that this bill apparently has.

"There are still, I feel, other reasons to reject this bill.

"We may be rewarding a person for engaging in some questionable behavior. Earlier this year, the *Advertiser* ran an article on the front page, January 8, 1990, regarding special trips taken to Georgia and Tokyo to examine the astro turf in those facilities. The trip to Tokyo was paid by the State, the other was paid by the astro turf manufacturer. Apparently one of the purposes of the trip was to help prepare the new contract for the replacement of the present astro turf at Aloha Stadium. Yet, the bid specification was prepared by a local consultant who had no need to take and did not even take the trip to Tokyo or the trip to Georgia. Furthermore, that local consultant was not given any report by the Stadium Manager after his trip in order to assist that consultant in preparing the bid specifications.

"In regards to the other trip to Georgia, the trip was paid for by Astro Turf Industries and it was for the purposes of visiting their headquarters. Astro Turf Industries installed the current astro turf at the Aloha

Stadium and was going to bid and has bid on the new contract."

At this point, Representative Peters rose on a point of order and stated:

"I don't think the reputation of individuals in the State should be subject to this kind of ridicule. If you have any information that's pertinent to what goes on in the stadium, then it should be shared with the rest of the membership here instead of relying on a non-authoritative source of information such as the media. And you should know better than that, unless you're telling me that the media is an authoritative source of information."

Representative Hagino continued, saying:

"Mr. Speaker, I believe the prior speaker is getting personal by making comments about the media. It's his privilege. This is an article that ran on the front page of the *Advertiser*. It is his privilege to go ahead and dispute the facts. . .

Representative Peters again rose on a point of order and stated:

"In the past, we've allowed individuals to get up and state their views about matters. But in that process, because we have 51 members here, we do not allow them to bring other sources of information into this process by virtue of innuendos. If he has a case to state, then state it. If you have a committee, have the subject matter chairman, or whoever that person is, I mean the Stadium Authority Chairman, come in and ask him the questions. For us to stand in judgment of that individual by way of personality, I don't think that's fair."

Representative Hagino continued, saying:

"Mr. Speaker, I believe Representative Peters has supported my position why the subject matter committee **wanted** to hear this bill and was given no opportunity to hear this bill. He has buttressed my case as to why proper procedures were not followed by this House. . .

The Chair interrupted and said:

"Representative Hagino, the bill was referred to the Committee on Finance by the Chair because the way he saw the bill . . . the way it was read, it dealt with the salaries and positions of the Stadium Authority Director, and I saw that it was fit to refer that bill either to Labor and then Finance, or to Finance only. I don't know what jurisdiction at that point that you had, as far as the Water, Land Use Committee, in having that bill referred to you. That was a judgment that was made by the Chair to refer that bill to Finance because it had financial implications. I hope that explanation is satisfactory with Representative Hagino."

Representative Hagino, in rebuttal, stated:

"I don't know of any bill regarding pay which was not sent to the proper subject matter committee. You stated it would have gone to Labor. I beg to differ. Pay bills relating to agriculture, relating to the Executive Office on Aging, the Public Utilities Commission, the Office of Children and Youth, were all sent to other subject matter committees, other than Labor and Public Employment. However, I do respect your judgment that I will be out of order in discussing the referral of that bill.

"I do want to make a rebuttal in terms of whether there were any innuendos made. I do have the newspaper article, and I certainly will give a copy to Representative Peters if he would like to examine that newspaper report

and determine whether some of the allegations in there were fact or indeed innuendos.

"Now, back to my speech. I've mentioned that there was a trip taken and I would submit to you, fellow colleagues, that one should not take a trip paid for by a private company which is about to bid on a \$1.8-million contract. I think these matters could have been brought up by the subject matter committee, and I would like to bring it to your attention.

"Therefore, for the reasons that I have stated previously, I call upon my colleagues to vote against this bill. I am not opposed to a pay raise in the future for this position or any other position held by gubernatorial appointees, and I think this should be properly considered. I would be more than willing to support these pay raises in future years.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Tam then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in regards to Senate Bill No. 2969, SD 1, HD 1, I wish to register a 'no' vote on this and let me further explain as to why for two reasons.

"Number one, the executives just received a pay raise last year; and number two, as the Chairman for the Education Committee, it is my duty to emphasize that we need more dollars for direct public service such as education, health and human services.

"Thank you."

Representative Hemmings then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"First of all, I believe that this is the floor of democracy, in reference to some of the prior utterances on this issue. I do believe it's in the public's best interest to discuss all facets of this issue, no matter what the source, including, I think, the bastion of democracy -- the fourth estate, a free and unfettered press. I'm sorry that certain individuals on this floor don't see the value in a free press.

"I'm speaking against this bill for several reasons, Mr. Speaker. First and foremost, because of cronyism. I don't believe that the individual or the system should be more important than the interest of the public in general. For too long, it's been the practice of the Waihee/Cayetano administration, and the administration before that, to fund public projects and pay raises, not on the merit of the work or the individual, but on the basis of friendship or insider politics. This appears to be another example of it. I think Representative Hagino's remarks concerning how this bill came to be underscore that very point.

"Looking at the merit of it, does the individual or does the system deserve a raise? I say unquestionably 'no,' Mr. Speaker. The people of Hawaii are faced with a multi-million dollar boondoggle. The stadium was ill-conceived, poorly planned, poorly built, and most especially, poorly managed. We're asking the taxpayers of Hawaii now to underwrite possibly up to \$75-million to repair the stadium which is less than twenty years old.

"Regarding specifics of taking trips to look at astro turf, Mr. Speaker, astro turf is a liability. I've taken the liberty of calling people in the NFL. Astro turf is an obsolete technology. Joe Robbie Stadium is state of the art facility. It put in grass rather than astro turf, Mr. Speaker. Stadiums in the NFL are making a transition

from astro turf to grass for a simple reason, Mr. Speaker, that it is safer for the athletes. Our University and high school players deserve the same type of consideration.

"Mr. Speaker, the list of problems concerning the stadium and mismanagement-related causes is long and sad, and now we are rewarding the people involved with a huge pay raise. Ironically, the people of Hawaii are faced with hardships in the cost of living. Can they get a large pay raise with the drop of a hat? Can they make ends meet?

"Mr. Speaker, this pay raise is undeserved and it's unfair to the taxpayers who have to pay for it. For once, let's not do what's right for cronyism and friends, let's do what's right for the taxpayers of this State of Hawaii.

"I urge all of you to search your hearts and see if you were in a private business or free enterprise, would you reward what is going on at the stadium with a huge pay raise? Our bosses are the taxpayers. I think all of us have to look long and close at this bill as it is an issue that goes far beyond the immediate dollars involved.

"I urge you all to consider the right thing to do -- a 'no' vote."

Representative Metcalf rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Representative Hemmings almost convinced me to vote otherwise, but I do have some grave reservations about this measure and the appropriateness of this measure before this House.

"Thank you."

Representative Bybee then rose and requested a conflict ruling, saying:

"My law firm represents the State of Hawaii in the Aloha Stadium litigation and we work for and closely with the Stadium Authority."

The Chair ruled "no conflict."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2969, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT REALTING TO THE STADIUM AUTHORITY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 37 ayes to 13 noes, with Representatives Cavasso, Hagino, Hayes, Hemmings, Hiraki, Hirono, Liu, Marumoto, Metcalf, O'Kieffe, Shon, Stegmaier and Tam voting no, and Representative D. Ige being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 2969 had passed Third Reading at 12:56 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 2668:

On motion by Representative Fukunaga, seconded by Representative Souki and carried, S.B. No. 2668, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE OFFICE OF AUDITOR PROPER," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative D. Ige being excused.

S.B. No. 2711:

On motion by Representative Hagino, seconded by Representative Andrews and carried, S.B. No. 2711, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HISTORIC PROPERTIES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative D. Ige being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 2668 and 2711 had passed Third Reading at 12:57 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 3151, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative Hayes and carried, S.B. No. 3151, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII HOUSING AUTHORITY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative D. Ige being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 3151 had passed Third Reading at 12:58 o'clock p.m.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Representative Hirono then rose and requested waiver of the 48-hour notice requirement for House Concurrent Resolution 339. "We inadvertently left this off our afternoon agenda. House Resolution 313 which is identical in content is scheduled to be jointly heard by CPC and Health this afternoon at 1:30," and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Hirono: "Your joint committees will add H.C.R. No. 339 to the agenda this afternoon."

Representative Metcalf then rose and stated:

"This is a rather unusual announcement, Mr. Speaker, but a number of members have inquired as to whether or not a certain Karen Metcalf who won the cerebral palsy rubber duck race yesterday was in fact my mother. She is in fact my mother and she won a trip for two to Orlando, Florida. However, I am not one of the invitees."

At this time, Representative Hayes introduced to the members of the House Wallace and Judith Wong, "two representatives from the Marco Polo condominium who represent about 60 percent of the residents there."

ORDER OF THE DAY

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

So it is a real honor for me this morning to introduce to this body a couple of students, faculties and staff members who are really instrumental in this program.

"On behalf of Representatives Hashimoto and Yonamine, it's a real honor for me to introduce to this body Ray de la Cruz, Robin Uyehara, Cecelia Alderkin, Valencia Wiggins, Hazel Shintani and Sharon Oi."

The honorees rose to be recognized and were presented certified copies of the resolution by Representative D. Ige, and orchid leis by Representatives Hemmings, Stegmaier, Yonamine, Hashimoto, Honda and Leong.

Representative D. Ige then asked Amber Alihado and Theresa Hatch, "students who are part of this program," and Sandy Cruz, coordinator, who were seated in the gallery to stand to be recognized.

Representative Hashimoto then rose and stated:

"I would just like to add an addendum to Representative Ige's presentation.

"Mrs. Shintani, I think, just started teaching when I was at Waipahu High School, and as I remember she was an excellent, excellent teacher, and it is so wonderful to see her now continuing her great work at Pearl City High School.

"Thank you."

H.R. No. 375, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION HONORING AND COMMENDING CHUCK FURUYA MASTER SOMMELIER," was offered by Representative Hagino.

On motion by Representative Hagino, seconded by Representative Hiraki and carried, H.R. No. 375 was adopted.

Representative Hagino rose to introduce the honoree, stating:

"On behalf of you, Mr. Speaker, and myself, it's really an honor to have Chuck Furuya here. I was trying to think of a way of describing how difficult it is to attain the title of Master Sommelier and of course, as noted, he is one of only twelve Americans and this is a title closely guarded by the Europeans. It really takes a number of years to attain this title and the closest thing I could think of would be like Konishiki becoming Yokozuna in the sumo ranks. That's the difficulty and the kind of sacrifice a person has to make to attain the title.

"Just a few tidbits about our honoree. He has a photographic memory and he says that he thinks he can remember every bottle of wine and champagne that he's ever tasted. I use the word 'taste' because he doesn't really drink the wine and the champagne but basically acquires the taste and an understanding and knowledge of the taste of the various different wines and champagnes of which there are tens of thousands of these.

"I should mention he was honored by the Senate because he's the nephew of Senator Richard Matsuura. However, in spite of that, we still want you here, Chuck.

"One last thing, because the resolution has said a lot about this young man who has really brought a lot of honor to us here in Hawaii, there will be a special about Chuck on television -- KHET, Channel 11 -- in the regular series called 'Spectrum.' You will see him on April 11, 7:30 p.m., on Spectrum Hawaii which will again repeat on Sunday, April 15, at 10:00 p.m. That's April 11 at 7:30 p.m. and April 15 at 10:00 p.m., and with his picture on page 11 of the Public Vision Guide which we all have, I really think that's also a tribute that a person so young could be featured in a television program.

"So on behalf of all of us, it is an honor to have you here, Chuck. You've worked hard and we're very happy for the honor you brought to us in Hawaii, and at this time I would like to have the honoree, Chuck Furuya, rise to be recognized."

Mr. Chuck Furuya rose to be recognized and was presented a certified copy of the resolution by Representative Hiraki and a maile/ilima lei by Representative Fukunaga, on behalf of the Chair and Representative Hagino.

"Mr. Speaker and fellow colleagues, it's my pleasure today to have James Clarke, his mother and father, and the Principal of Kahuku High School, here with us today.

"James is an outstanding example of what the young people of our State are capable of doing, as you heard in the long list of his accomplishments as the Student Body president and being selected as the member to receive the Hearst scholarship. He has been very active in his own community. He serves as an excellent example for his fellow students. He shows that a true commitment to our educational system is being made, and he is just an excellent result of what our State is capable of doing.

"For the last two years, James has also served as a member of my staff. We began a special program with the high schools in my area where we offered the opportunity for the school to select an outstanding student to be assigned to the Legislature to learn firsthand how the legislative process works.
