The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Forty-Eighth Day.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Forty-Eighth Day was approved.

At 11:20 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

#### JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives was called to order at 11:45 o'clock a.m., by the Honorable Peter Apo, Vice Speaker of the House of Representatives.

At this time, a Certificate of Recognition recognizing and honoring President Alberto Fujimori of Peru was read by the Clerk of the House of Representatives.

The Vice Speaker then welcomed and introduced the family of President Alberto Fujimori and distinguished guests accompanying him to the members of the Sixteenth Legislature, as follows:

Mrs. Susana Fujimori, wife of President Fujimori;

Mrs. Lynne Waihee, First Lady of the State of Hawaii;

Kenji Fujimori, the President's son, and Sachie Fujimori, the President's daughter;

Victor Joy-Way, Minister of Industry and Commerce; the Honorable Oswaldo Garcia, Congressman; Mr. Carlos Orellana, Press Secretary; and the Honorable Luis Coronado, Honorary Consul General of Peru to Hawaii.

The honorees rose to be recognized and were presented floral leis by Senator Hagino and Representative Taniguchi to Mrs. Fujimori; Representative Arakaki to First Lady Lynne Waihee; Representative Kawakami to Kenji Fujimori; Senator Chang to Sachie Fujimori; Senator Fernandes Salling to Mr. Joy-Way; Representative Isbell to Congressman Garcia; Senator Ikeda to Mr. Orellana; and Representative Hirono to Honorary Consul Coronado.

The Vice Speaker welcomed the members of the Governor's Cabinet and several of his key staffers.

The Vice Speaker presented to the members of the Sixteenth Legislature and guests, the Honorable John D. Waihee, who then proceeded to introduce His Excellency Alberto Fujimori, the President of Peru, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, Mr. President, honorable members of the State Legislature, it is indeed an honor for me to join you this morning as we welcome to Hawaii one of this world's most inspiring leaders. We share much in common.

"First of all, Peru, like us, shares the Pacific Ocean. All of us are concerned about the affairs of the Pacific/Asian Rim and we have an opportunity this morning to hear from the leader whose country shares this ocean with us. We also, in Hawaii, have a heritage of people who have come to our shores from all parts of the world, seeking a better life for themselves and for their children, and as a result of hard work and determination, have made that life possible.

"And in President Fujimori, we find such a story, when 57 years ago his parents emigrated from Japan to Peru and pursued a better life for their descendants and he, through his own initiative and through the hard work of the people and his supporters, rose to the very pinnacle of success in his country. Indeed, for those of us that are somewhat involved with politics, we can appreciate his campaign. You see, until he ran for President, he was not involved in politics at all, and I hear that in order to begin his campaign for the Presidency, he started by raising funds with the selling of his truck and tractor, and then got out there and conducted a grassroots campaign that resulted in his receiving over 60 percent of the votes -- the largest majority ever for the Presidency of Peru. So this is a man of inspiration who is leading his country during these challenging times to even greater heights.

"It is my privilege, this morning, to introduce to you the product of humanity's greatest dreams -- His Excellency Alberto Fujimori, the President of Peru."

Senator Ann Kobayashi and Representative Clarice Hashimoto then presented President Alberto Fujimori with floral leis on behalf of the Senate and the House of Representatives.

His Excellency President Alberto Fujimori addressed the Joint Session as follows:

"When I arrived here I was told that I must make a small speech, but I don't speak any more English after twenty years of not speaking it. I studied at Wisconsin but laid off. I just talk in Spanish so excuse for my bad English.

"Honorable members of the Legislature, ladies and gentlemen, I am very happy of being here in this nice place of Hawaii. Unfortunately, making just a short stop of ten hours before returning to Peru, but I am very happy because I am very honored also of being received by the House of Representatives and the Senate as the President of Peru.

"As I was introduced, I am President of a country with real difficulties but, as you know, I was selected by many people against all predictions. This election was possible because of the decision of the people. They wanted change. I found that, in fact, my motive as with this name - '90 change. And people listened to my words, listened to our objectives and plans. In fact, I should state I didn't have any party nor movement -- I was alone at first. But the people in Peru, as I suppose in many other countries, wanted new orientation. They wanted change. That's why this was possible -- becoming the President of Peru.

"We're making big efforts. I should say in some brief statement that we are in economical program with established objectives, a structural adjustment, and reinsertion in the international community. In the economical standpoint of view, we faced 50 percent of inflation each month before I took over the government and a big state management fiasco. And moreover, we were isolated from the international community. So we are working in these three areas in order to fight against poverty which is a very big problem in Peru -- poverty that covers many aspects of Peruvian life. And also against the internal insecurity and to solve a big problem

which is also an international problem which is the narcotic traffic. So the task is a big, huge task, but we are with the decision to fight against all of these problems. Fortunately we have, in spite of the strong, hard issues, we have the support of the people. While working seriously, we want to change all of these situations, not in the short time, but in the middle of a long range program.

"I just came from Nagoya. I made a long speech while many South American representatives from all South American countries came to Nagoya in the meeting of international development. Back in South America, there is an orientation for this new trained world which was once the South American peristroika, too.

"Finally, I want to say to all of you that I feel very honored, very happy of being received here, and thank you so much.

"Aloha."

Senate President Wong then rose and stated:

"Thank you, President Fujimori, for your remarks. We appreciate you taking the time from your very busy schedule to address the members of the Hawaii State Legislature. We are greatly honored by your presence.

"On behalf of the Hawaii State Legislature, I would like to present to you a small gift as a token of our respect and appreciation.

"I would also like, at this time, to call upon Senator Eloise Tungpalan and Representative Dennis Arakaki to present you with official certificates of recognition for your efforts and accomplishments in your country.

"I am advised that you have just arrived from a long trip from Asia and that you have an extremely tight schedule. While we wish that we can have the opportunity to meet with you personally to discuss matters of mutual concern, we know you have to proceed on.

"With that, thank you very much, President Fujimori, for being with us this morning."

Senator Tungpalan and Representative Arakaki then escorted President Fujimori from the podium to the departing area to enable them to proceed on with their schedules.

Senator Wong continued:

"There being no further business, I hereby declare the Joint Session of the Hawaii State Legislature adjourned."

At 12:04 o'clock p.m., the Senate President declared the Joint Session adjourned.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:15 o'clock p.m.

# INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

No. 411, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION COMMENDING AND CONGRATULATING NANCY NOTT FOR A LIFETIME OF DEDICATED SERVICE TO THE LILIHA PUBLIC LIBRARY AND TO HER COMMUNITY," was jointly offered by Representatives Chun, Tam, Yoshimura, Arakaki, Alcon, Cachola, Hiraki, Amaral, Anderson, Apo, Bainum, Baker,

Bellinger, Bunda, Chang, Duldulao, Fukunaga, Hagino, Hirono, Honda, Horita, D. Ige, M. Ige, Ihara, Isbell, Kanoho, Kawakami, Kihano, Lee, Marumoto, Metcalf, Morihara, Okamura, O'Kieffe, Oshiro, Santiago, Shon, Souki, Stegmaier, Tajiri, Takamine, Taniguchi, Tatibouet, Thielen, Tom, Ward, Yonamine and Young.

On motion by Representative Chun, seconded by Representative Tam and carried, H.R. No. 411 was adopted.

Representative Chun proceeded to introduce the honoree, stating:

"Our world seems to be ever changing, but there are a few special things and people who have contributed to the stability, integrity, and the growth of our community. Our honoree today is an individual who has been the head librarian of the Liliha Library since its opening in 1966. She has been a stable force, a caring and dedicated public servant and leader in our community for over thirty years.

"The resolution highlights a few of her outstanding life achievements. I would like to share a more personal side of Nancy Nott.

"As a child in elementary school, I remember always seeing the nice lady with the smiling face, a person who was eager to help the children who visited the library. Many years later, as an adult, I still see within this gracious lady that familiar smiling face and that same spirit and eagerness to help others.

"Under the leadership of Nancy Nott, the Liliha Library has become more than a resource of knowledge to our community. It has become a safe and comfortable after school home for many children from neighboring schools. Nancy, whether you realize it or not, you have touched the lives of thousands of children, including me.

"Among her colleagues, Nancy is known as the 'librarian's librarian,' because of her extensive knowledge in the area of library science and the manner in which she shares that knowledge with others. I know her coworkers, some of whom are here today, really appreciate her guidance and the kindness and the patience she has exhibited towards them all these years.

"Nancy's diligence and community-mindedness have extended beyond the Liliha Library, and many times she goes over and beyond the call of duty to accommodate people and make them feel at home. As the secretary of the Kalihi-Palama Community Council for 15 years, this in itself is to be commended. But to add to this, she makes the time to make small things like home-baked cookies and brownies and other yummy delights and this I know the Community Council members and many others really appreciate.

"We are sad to see her retire as head librarian but happy to know that she will still actively participate in our community, and I know she will enjoy a full and happy life.

"At this time, I would like to present to this honorable body this special woman. Nancy, could you please rise and be recognized."

The honoree then rose to be recognized. Accompanying Nancy on the House floor was Bart Kane, State librarian, who then rose to be recognized.

Representative Chun continued:

"In the audience, we have several people who wanted to help us honor Nancy today. They are her colleagues from the State Library System, members of the Kalihi-Palama Community Council and representatives from neighboring schools in the area."

Representative Chun then asked the following persons who were seated in the gallery to stand to be recognized: Catherine Knight, "one of her best friends;" from the Library System -- Pualani Rivero, Ms. Nott's supervisor, temporary East Oahu Library District Administrator and head librarian at Kaimuki Library; Florence Yee, East Oahu Library District Administrator; Caroline Spencer, head of State Library; Carol Matsuwaki, Florence Arashiro and Frances Manuel, Liliha Library staff members; Bobby Thursby, Kalihi Library staff; Ralph Heidenreich, Kaimuki Library staff; Louise Hinkley, retired librarian and Lydia and Bill Ranger, retired librarians; from the Kalihi-Palama Community Council remember; Francis Okita, former president of KPCC; Irene Fujimoto, former president of KPCC; and Gwen Lee, Principal of Kauluwela Elementary School.

# Representative Tam then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker and fellow colleagues, today is a great honor for one individual who has given so much service to the State of Hawaii, especially in our educational system. Many times we forget that our library services within the State of Hawaii are part of our educational system. It's like a volunteer service, so to speak, not a storehouse of materials as so many think it is, and I have used it for many years, in terms of helping me gain more information about our lifestyles here in Hawaii and abroad.

"I have known Nancy for over ten years, not only as a student when I was attending the University of Hawaii, but because the library system of the State of Hawaii had a lot of information that I could not find at the University of Hawaii Library so I used the Liliha Library a great deal. And then I got to know Nancy more when I became chairman for the Neighborhood Board, and I thank Nancy for helping me provide the services to the community for she is very much community-oriented as Representative Chun had indicated.

"During the years of service that Nancy has contributed to our State of Hawaii, she has demonstrated the fine qualities of a service-oriented employee of the State and especially in servicing our young ones. As Representative Chun indicated, she has devoted much service outside of her regular hours, and I can recall also at one time being a member of the Kalihi-Palama Community Council for endless hours of dedication.

"Nancy, the communities around Liliha Library would surely miss you but we hope to see you around on a dayto-day basis or all year round. And we know that you will continue to provide services to our State in your many ways.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Arakaki then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I am a lot older than Representative Tam and so I have known Nancy Nott for almost twenty years, when I was once a Playground Director at Kauluwela Playground, and I can also recall how helpful she was when it came to providing any type of service. I didn't have to be with books or libraries. Anything she could do to serve the community, she was always there, and she always made Liliha Library such a warm and welcome place for anyone, especially for the children.

And I think the community is really going to miss her and I think we're all going to miss her. And I sure hope that she continues as a volunteer to help the Kalihi-Palama community. We're really grateful for that also.

"So I want to extend my personal heartfelt Aloha and congratulations to her also.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Alcon then rose and stated:

"A famous man once said, 'To say goodbye is to cry a little.' But I am not that sad that Nancy is retiring because of the fact that she will always be with us on a voluntary capacity. Nancy has always worked with the Kalihi-Palama Council and she has been doing a good job as a volunteer secretary.

"May I just say that if Nancy is seeking a job as a secretary, I am looking for one. But this is the type of person she is, Mr. Speaker, that she always tries to do her best to help people. I am sure that Nancy, whether she will be working with me or not, will be doing a lot for the community because she loves to help people.

"And like I said, best wishes and good luck to you, Nancy.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Santiago then rose and stated:

"I am sad to see that St. Theresa's Elementary School isn't here but as a graduate of St. Theresa's Elementary School and as a student who shared, I am sure many of my classmates would welcome the opportunity to thank Library for all of the countless hours of studies that we did there also.

"Thank you."

Representative Tam presented Nancy Nott with a Certificate of Recognition and floral leis were presented to her by Representatives Arakaki, Taniguchi and Fukunaga.

H.R. No. 412, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION COMMENDING AND CONGRATULATING DAVID LEE ONERHEIM, SAM SLOM, HAUNANI APOLIONA, AND ROGER AND JUDY PECKENPAUGH, RECIPIENTS OF THE 1991 NATIONAL SMALL BUSINESS AWARDS," was jointly offered by Representatives Kawakami, Tatibouet, Say and Santiago.

On motion by Representative Kawakami, seconded by Representative Tatibouet and carried, H.R. No. 412 was adopted.

Representative Santiago rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, may I be allowed to share a few additional words?

"Mr. Speaker, as we are all aware, the Small Business Person of the Year Award is given annually to the person who best exemplifies all that is good in business, not just from an economic perspective, but from a humanitarian one as well.

"Mr. Onerheim has earned his accolade by establishing an excellent track record that he continues to build upon. He has a reputation as an honest, hardworking, and dependable businessman who truly guarantees his work.

"Initially, Mr. Onerheim intended his one-man painting company to be a means by which he would finance his law school tuition. Today, however, that one-man operation has developed into a successful business, employing more than 20 full-time painters, and temporary help as needed during the summer.

"In addition to this, Mr. Onerheim continues to be very much involved in teaching and assisting others who would like to start their own businesses. In 1984, the training program he started in his company became certified by the State and is now held at the Honolulu Community College campus.

"When not running his business and/or teaching others about it, Mr. Onerheim finds time to service the members of various business organizations and committees such as the Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii, and the National Federation of Independent Businesses. He also supports local charities and sport teams and has even made an addition to all of this -- a commitment to me today to become even more involved with certain specific local community needs of our district.

"We are truly appreciative of individuals like Mr. David Onerheim. It is therefore my distinct privilege and honor to introduce to you, Mr. Speaker and to my colleagues, the 1991 Small Business Person of the Year for the State of Hawaii -- Mr. David Lee Onerheim."

The honoree rose to be recognized and was presented a Certificate of Recognition by Representative Santiago and a floral lei by Representative Duldulao.

Representative Tatibouet then rose and stated:

"Mr. Sam Slom has long been an advocate for the 35,000 entrepreneurs in our island State, the thousands of Mom and Pop-type operations that are the engine that keeps the commerce of our State going every day and in every neighborhood.

"The giants of business and industry in Hawaii, once known as the Big Five, and now there are several successor companies, do provide our State with overall benefits which are essential to our life here -- shipping, fuel, banking, power, et cetera. But it is the neighborhood grocery store, the gas station, barber shop, hardware store, dry good shop and grain store, the locksmith, dry cleaner, laundry, bakery, taxi, bookshop, and saimin shop, that one million citizens of Hawaii need to make their lives liveable everyday.

"It is these small businessmen and women -- these entrepreneurs -- whose very existence allows us to carry on. They not only contribute to the ease of our daily lives, but they contribute enormously to the economic health of our State.

"Sam Slom, as President and Executive Director of Small Business Hawaii, is their cheerleader. He speaks with them and for them. He wants to ensure that we, the Legislature and the various branches of our government, among other things, remember these individual entrepreneurs as we consider legislation for the impact on them may be very great.

"The giants I mentioned have the staff to come here to the Capitol to testify and speak for themselves, but the 35,000 small businesses in Hawaii have depended on Mr. Slom for years to speak for them. If they were to leave their businesses, they would most likely have to close for at least a half-a-day. Our small business entrepreneurs need a person to speak for them and they need us here in the Legislature to always be cognizant of the role they play in keeping each and everyone of us going.

"Thank you, Mr. Slom, for being their voice.

"It is my privilege and honor to introduce Mr. Sam Slom in his honor today."

The honoree rose to be recognized.

Representative Stegmaier then rose and stated:

"I just wanted to acknowledge Sam Slom for contributing a great deal of his time and energy to our young people in our public and private schools, in letting them know about the exciting possibilities and challenges that are open to them should they decide to go into business. I appreciate the contribution that he's made in this area.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"It's an honor to be surrounded by such entrepreneurial talent -- the Arakawa's, Sears, the C.S. Wo's, the Retail Merchants Association, the SBA's honorees brought to us from Pat Saiki's SBA office, Sam Slom, and even the President of Peru that came out of a small business family.

"All of you know the importance of small business. Some of you have been retailers on Maui, some of you are dry cleaners, some of you are service people, but as I read the background of President Fujimori growing up as the son of a tire shop person, I saw the importance of what that is. It reminded me of what I do in my U.N. consulting, and that is, without a small business community, there is no middle class. These individuals in small business create that middle class, and I repeat, without a small business community, there is no middle class. If you look at Peru's employment statistics, 47 percent work for the government -- a clear sign of being a Third World country. In America, the private sector hires 88 percent of everybody. No small business community, no middle class, but Mr. Speaker, I don't want to get off but I could speak for an hour on this.

"All of you know the importance of small business. Some of you know some of the honorees, but I know Sam Slom so I can only say a few things about him, and I won't speak to his prowess as a banker, or as an economist, or as a public speaker, and all the many, many other things that he's been, but I've known him as the voice of the small business community here that is generally unorganized, generally is too busy with its nose to the grindstone to even say anything. But when that man speaks, small business listens. When that man speaks, this body listens. However, Mr. Slom, that doesn't mean we always necessarily agree with you.

"Today, we honor you; we honor small business, and it's a pleasure that we have all the entrepreneurs surrounding us this day. Keep up the good work, ladies and gentlemen!

"Thank you."

Representative Tatibouet then presented Mr. Slom with a Certificate of Recognition while Representative Ward presented him with a cigar flower lei.

Representative Say then rose and stated:

"I would like to honor and be given the privilege of introducing our Minority Small Business Advocate of the Year, Miss Haunani Apoliona," and asked Miss Apoliona to stand to be recognized.

The honoree rose to be recognized and was presented a Certificate of Recognition by Representative Anderson and a cigar flower lei by Representative Okamura.

Representative Say then asked Miss Apoliona's sister, Aulani, and her mother, Ma Apoliona, who were seated in the gallery, to stand to be recognized.

Representative Kawakami then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker and fellow colleagues, it is my pleasure to introduce Kauai's entrepreneurs, the Peckenpaugh's -- Roger and Judy -- a husband and wife team who began their tropical flower export business, short on cash but long on stamina, determination and a strong desire to succeed, and from their meager start in 1984, they have built their export business into a three-farm operation in the towns of Lawai, Puhi and Kalaheo, on acreage of 3-1/2 to 14 acres. It took them two years to make their first sale and they haven't stopped since then. Roger and Judy Peckenpaugh, through hard work and perseverance, have expanded their market to cities along the West Coast and Canada, and have an eye for expansion to the heartland of America.

"Last summer, the House Finance Committee had the pleasure of visiting the Peckenpaugh's Kalaheo farm on their oversight visitation and were impressed by what they saw.

"Mr. Speaker and fellow legislators, please join me in welcoming this enterprising team, the Small Business Administration's County of Kauai, State of Hawaii, and Region Nine Exporters of the Year -- Roger and Judy Peckenpaugh."

The honorees rose to be recognized.

Representative Kanoho then rose and stated:

"Besides growing and shipping their own products, Judy and Roger also receive, pack and ship exotic tropicals raised by seventeen others on Kauai, some of whom are part-time, large backyard growers. In so doing, they help to increase the financial status of these individuals and Kauai's economy as a whole.

"It is very interesting to note that in the middle of last year, Roger led a four-person team from Kauai to Equador, Venezuela and the Caribbean Islands. In their six weeks visit to the jungles, they collected and shipped back to Kauai about a thousand specimen - plant specimens -- and more than a hundred varieties of heleconias and other exotic tropicals. The logistics of traveling through these countries and hacking through jungles, of securing permits and clearances from each of these countries, the U.S. and State of Hawaii Agriculture Departments, are lengthy, interesting stories within themselves, and only serve to indicate the extent of their efforts.

"Judy and Roger, congratulations and our best wishes for more success in your future endeavors."

Representative Kanoho then asked family members of the honorees who were seated in the gallery to stand to be recognized, as follows: Heather McDonald, daughter; Dylan Peckenpaugh, son; Lois Lofland, Judy's mother; and Arnold and Marlene Thompson, Roger's parents.

Representative Apo presented Roger and Judy Peckenpaugh with a Certificate of Recognition while Representatives Kawakami and Kanoho presented them with ilima leis.

Representative Tatibouet then rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"I just would like to point out for my fellow Representatives and guests today that we have here on the floor of the House as one of our members, Representative Gene Ward who, last May, was honored at the White House as the National winner of the Small Business Advocate of the Year for Minorities by this Small Business Administration.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

They started as a handful of merchants who organized themselves way back in 1901, and at that time the Charter members wanted, as a core of the business, to ensure that Hawaii would have a retailing industry that would provide quality goods and services to the community. This they have done admirably.

"Today, they are expanding their horizons and the Retail Merchants of Hawaii's goal is not only to provide quality goods and services, but also to be a very active and contributing part of the community, and I'm sure you all know that of recent years they have really increased their activities as far as the Legislature, and they have embarked on a program to really get involved with the legislators themselves by sponsoring dinners and gettogethers and all of this because they really want to be, not just, you know, doing this for themselves, but to better Hawaii.

"Before I introduce our three guests from the Retail Merchants on the floor, I would like to introduce members of the group who are sitting in the gallery and I know they're here, not only to take part in this, but to make sure that I do it correctly. They have no faith, you know. I'll introduce each of them and if you can hold your applause until all of them have been introduced."

"He is one our dynamic young leaders in the retailing industry and you know that C.S. Barbara Mason "who came to Hawaii 23 years ago and as it happens to so many visitors to these shores, she came on vacation and she stayed and stayed. She fell in love with Hawaii, never to return, and she became employed with the Liberty House where she has spent her full 23 years, and previously Barbara had been with Lord and Taylor in New York, and has spent 42 years in the retailing industry. Barbara is currently recognized by the Hawaii retailing industry as their current Retailer of the Year"; and

Sharin Ro "who is one of my favorite people. She is the President of the Retail Merchants of Hawaii and has been with this organization for the last 3-1/2 years, and as executive of the 1,000 member trade association, she is responsible for coordinating all of the work and activities of the retail merchants, including services ranging from legislative to educational programs, to retail operations. She really is a Jack-of-all-trades and not only that, one of the most personable people to work with, and she does all of this as one of the youngest, I believe, executives within the Chamber of Commerce. Sharin's other claim to fame is that she is Russell Nagata's niece."

Representative Morihara presented the Certificate of Recognition to Mr. Miyabara while floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Hirono, Metcalf and Lee.

Representative Bunda rose and proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"To the soldiers of the 25th Infantry Division, we salute

"From World War II to the conflicts in Korea, Vietnam, and the Persian Gulf, this Division has distinguished itself for its valor and dedicated service to the ideals of democracy. Because of men and women like

you, we Americans can enjoy the fruits of life in peace and harmony.

"Mr. Speaker, I am honored today to speak on behalf of this resolution because I am familiar with the many accomplishments of the 25th Infantry Division because I basically grew up in and around Schofield Barracks. From my childhood days to now, I have many fond memories of Schofield. As a child, I attended elementary school on base. I remember, as a third grader, going out to play by the post library, hiding in the bushes while they were filming the movie From Here to Eternity. As a young 2nd Lieutenant in the Hawaii Army National Guard, I trained at the East Range in the hot sun and the drenching rain in the morning. Besides, I also learned how to play golf at the Kalakaua Golf Course. However, my most notable memories are in recent times, Mr. Speaker.

"As a representative from Wahiawa, I've had close interaction with the Schofield community. The Public Affairs Office is always present at our community meetings. They respond quickly to any problems that arise -- from drug problems, school concerns, to helicopter and gunfire noise.

"We all know that the military presence, as a whole, is vital to our economy in Hawaii. For example, in 1990 all military spending was \$2.6-billion, second to that of tourism. For the past 36 years, the Wahiawa community has honored Schofield and the rest of the military services by sponsoring Military Appreciation Week. Through sporting events, such as the fun run, tennis, volleyball, a golf tournament, and other social events, the Wahiawa community and the Schofield community have learned to appreciate one another.

"To Brigadier General Covault and your staff, on behalf of the House of Representatives, we would like to congratulate the 25th Infantry Division on your 50th anniversary."

Representative Bunda then asked the following honorees, who were seated on the House floor, to stand to be recognized: Brigadier General (Promotable) Marvin L. Covault, Deputy Commander for Support at Schofield; Command Sergeant Major Jan Schalavin, Division Command Sergeant Major (the senior enlisted man in the Division); Sergeant Rodney Lewis, Division Non-Commissioned Officer of the Year, assigned to A Company, 3rd Battalion, 21st Infantry Regiment; and Corporal Roland Mulgrave, attched to C Company, 4th Infantry Regiment. "Corporal Mulgrave just recently returned to Schofield Barracks from Operation Desert Storm."

Representative Bunda then asked guests who were seated in the gallery to stand to be recognized, as follows: Lieutenant Colonel Richard D. Lyons, Major Bob Sorenson, Captain Nelson McCouch, Lieutenant Alex Branch; Lieutenant Kelly O'Neill, and Sergeant Rueben Maestas.

Representative Lee then rose and stated:

"All that Representative Bunda has said applies equally to Mililani. Mililani and Wahiawa are sister communities. We share the same aspirations, the same hopes and desires, and we also share all the things that the 25th Infantry Division brings to Central Oahu. So I am very pleased to participate in the 50th anniversary resolution by this House.

"Let me just add a few words about the economy.

"The visitor industry accounts for about eleven billion dollars of the gross State product. The construction industry -- four billion dollars. Third, and as equally important, is defense. Defense brings in about 10 percent of the gross state product of Hawaii. We are far and above much more dependent on military expenditures than any other state in the union. The closest that any other state comes is South Carolina with 3 percent.

"However, much more important than the economic ramifications is the role that the 25th Infantry Division and all the different branches play in our life in Hawaii. Let me just suggest to you that all the active military personnel, their dependents, and the 27,500 civilian workers make up to 145,000 people. When you add reserves, retirees and veterans -- that's another 400,000 people. All those who have had a role or still continue to have a role in the defense of the United States add up to 40 percent of Hawaii's population. That is an aggregate. But for us in Mililani, it means that 500 civilians work in Pearl Harbor, an additional number work in Schofield and Wheeler. They also live among us. They coach the Little League teams, they are parents in the schools, they contribute to the Community Chest. They are our neighbors, and their hopes and aspirations are also ours

"So, when we commemorate the 50th anniversary of the 25th Division, let us remember that they have been in Central Oahu for a very long time. And before I forget, let me also add that if it weren't for the 25th and Schofield, the first high school on this island outside of Honolulu, would not have been Leilehua. The military was responsible for bringing education to Central Oahu. In the old days, there was only one central high school and that was McKinley. The next that was established was Leilehua. The old army battalions also contributed to the cultural life by furnishing many of the musicians for the Honolulu Symphony Orchestra. This was before the war. After the war, we are now very, very fortunate to have the 25th with its dependents because the registered nurses helped to make Wahiawa General Hospital one of the finest hospitals in the State, and we welcome you for being our good neighbors, and we wish you many more years in Central Oahu.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Young then rose and stated:

"Representative Bunda's remarks reminded me of my roots also. I am a former resident of Wahiawa. My family had several businesses there and the success of their business really depended on the success of the 25th Division and their being there during the long period that they were there.

"Also, as a teenager, I grew up playing golf on Kalakaua Golf Course, and my mother was a championship golfer and, in fact, held the course record there for several years at Kalakaua. So, I have fond memories of spending my summers there.

"As an adult, I began a career as a military dependent and my husband then was with the 25th Division so it is with great nostalgia that I, too, congratulate the 25th Division on their anniversary.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Apo then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak because the infantry has always sort of held a soft spot in my heart. I mean the Navy and the Air Force are okay but these guys are the ones that go eyeball to eyeball with the enemy. And when

the question was posed -- how do you know when a war is over? -- the answer was, when an infantryman is standing in the open and no one shooting at him.

"Also, it's widely known, or there was a remark made last night during the 'Welcome Home America' show, which really got me thinking and that is, there are no atheists in foxholes.

"So, I congratulate you folks and got to tell you -- I think you're all crazy.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative D. Ige moved that the reports of the majority of the Committees be adopted and H.R. No. 218, HD 1, and H.C.R. No. 192, HD 1, be referred to the Committee on Legislative Management, seconded by Representative Hagino.

Representative Bellinger rose to speak against the resolutions, stating:

"My only concern with the resolutions is that the tuition waiver is based upon a simple fact of an ethnic background and I think that anytime that we're going to look at granting a waiver simply because of the ethnic background of an individual, then we're probably missing the boat of what we're trying to accomplish.

"If the bill had been designed more along the line to create a scholarship fund which would provide for tuition fees and there was specific qualifying criteria that had to be met, then I think that would be fine. But in this case, it seems to me that the whole focus is based simply on whether or not a person is a native Hawaiian and that in and of itself should not be the sole criteria for why we would grant a waiver or a scholarship or whatever.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Amaral then rose to speak in support of the resolutions, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I think one thing that should always be recognized is that when set-asides are made by law, or by intent by resolution for native people, that we are dealing with a class of people rather than an ethnic category and that the native Hawaiian people were the original inhabitants. And, in fact, the impact of the invasion by non-native people has been documented to have a very negative impact on this population.

"I think that that documentation speaks highly to why this tuition waivers are needed, and that's why I support these resolutions.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in favor of the resolutions, stating:

"I think there is a familiar saying that 'the mind is an important asset not to waste.'

"I think if we look at the demographics of the Hawaiian community, the educational attainment is near the bottom. And if there is an incentive in giving tuition waivers, even though we know our system at the community college and the University is very inexpensive, I think we were noted to be one of the top ten deals in the country for an education. If this is an incentive, it is the best thing that this body can do. If it's a disincentive, then I agree with the original speaker that it's not appropriate.

"But I think the educational attainment of the native community is as important as we know the 1920 Organic Act to get the native people housing, and which for seventy years we have neglected. So if this bill has any way of spearheading the educational attainment, I think it is well taken.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lee then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to associate myself in favor of these resolutions with the previous speakers. I would like to really be in favor of helping the Hawaiians in all aspects of their lives and their careers which are in jeopardy.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the reports of the majority of the Committees were adopted and H.R. Representative Bainum rose to speak in favor of the resolutions, with reservations, stating:

"I know many in this body were part of the process years ago when Act 96 that called for the Waikiki Community Center Authority to be developed and a convention center built in Waikiki, and I know that the Chair of the Tourism Committee worked very hard, but there have been numerous changes since that time and I've made no secret of that fact that since that Act 96 has passed, I have worked to have this body consider repealing that Act. That was unsuccessful this year.

"But I would like to go on record as saying that since Act 96 has been passed, the Aloha Motors convention center is proceeding at pace and we are now faced, in Waikiki, of not having one but two convention centers. There's been numerous other convention centers built around the world. The economy has changed. And most importantly, I think master planning is now occurring in Waikiki, and it is very important that the option be open to have a planned Waikiki and one of the size that the convention center was currently being called for. The upper limit would be incompatible with any type of master planning and it would almost be incompatible with any type of crowded living in Waikiki.

"So, I welcome the resolutions because at least we've sent a message to the WCCA that we need to look at the least dense building that could possibly be built on that site.

"My reservation has to do with the Committee Report such where it discusses the possibility of using condemnation of surrounding properties. My reservation is that I hope this will not be misconstrued to suggest that we are welcoming any additional structures to that site.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tatibouet rose to speak in favor of the resolutions, stating:

"There has been tremendous public outcry to reduce the density of this structure or the entire complex, and I feel that by giving the convention center the ability to further reduce this density is a great advantage, and I hope that it will be used in the spirit with which it is meant to reduce the density and not add additional property and additional structures.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Cachola then rose to speak in support of the resolutions, stating:

"In response to my colleague from Waikiki, the intent of these resolutions is to reduce the density. We put language in the Committee Report about condemnation. We found out that there's certain properties out there that are for sale. At any time you expand the footprint of the property, you automatically reduce the density.

"For the information of my colleague from Waikiki, based on Act 96, we already put down the maximum density. We cannot go beyond that. What we're looking for right now is to reduce it and by coming up with condemnation of available properties surrounding Waikiki or the site, it will automatically reduce the density.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the reports of the Committee were adopted and H.R. No. 302, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION ENCOURAGING THE WAIKIKI CONVENTION CENTER AUTHORITY TO EXPLORE MEANS OF REDUCING THE DENSITY OF THE WAIKIKI CONVENTION CENTER FACILITY SET FORTH IN THE WAIKIKI INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION PLAZA PROPOSAL," and H.C.R. No. 283, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION ENCOURAGING THE WAIKIKI CONVENTION CENTER AUTHORITY TO EXPLORE MEANS OF REDUCING THE DENSITY OF THE WAIKIKI CONVENTION CENTER FACILITY SET FORTH IN THE WAIKIKI INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION PLAZA PROPOSAL," were adopted.

Representative O'Kieffe rose to speak in support of the resolutions, stating:

"I hope the members of this body will take a moment to read these resolutions very carefully. It was introduced by all the representatives from Windward to Pearl who represent the retail merchants and the manufacturing facilities like in downtown and that group of people who belong to that group in Kalihi.

"The things that's important is that 66,000 jobs are going to be impacted and \$80-million worth of tax revenues can be impacted if the federal government puts forth this garment industry bill so it would impact a tremendous amount of workers in our own State as well as affect the tax revenues. So, I wish you would take a moment and I would ask for your support for these resolutions.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Marumoto then rose to speak in support of the resolutions, stating:

"I would like to point out to this body that the resolution requests our federal delegation to oppose the institution of the federal textile and apparel legislation which has passed a couple of times before, and has been vetoed and, fortunately, the vetoes have been sustained. But the legislation would limit growth in the importation of textiles and apparel to only one percent a year, and that is an intolerable cap on this important Hawaii industry. In addition, it would impose a quota auctioning pilot program which would really devastate our Hawaiian Aloha wear industry.

"Under a quota auctioning pilot program, large entities could bid for the entire quota of imported textiles and literally freeze our manufacturers out of acquiring our Aloha shirt material, and if they were able to obtain some, it would be at a higher price.

"It's critical that we ask our Congressional delegation to fight this legislation -- some of our Congressmen have voted for it in the past.

"The 'BE IT RESOLVED' clause asks specifically that they oppose the limitation on growth in the importation of textiles and apparel to one percent a year, and also fight the quota program because it would really impact our manufacturing of Aloha shirts, the entire garment industry, our retail industry, and, in addition our tourist industry.

"These resolutions are with a large group of other resolutions, but this is a very critical one, and I ask all of you to vote for these resolutions.

"Thank you."

Representative Lee then rose to speak in support of the resolutions, stating:

"I think all of us are very strongly in favor of it and very strongly support our garment industry. It is an expression of our Aloha spirit. The Aloha attire is something that's unique to Hawaii.

"The resolutions reflect, I think, a really broad consensus of both industry and government that the garment industry needs our support. The resolutions call upon our Congressional delegation to do certain things. The resolutions also provide them with the flexibility to search for specific exemptions for Hawaii, and in that respect I think it should command all our support here today and, above all, I'd like to simply add my congratulations to the Committee Clerk who drafted House Draft 1, which made it a much better product all around.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the joint reports of the Committees were adopted and H.C.R. On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.C.R. No. 59, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION URGING STATE AGENCIES TO CEASE THE PRACTICE OF TREE TOPPING," was adopted.

Representatives Hagino, Oshiro and Cachola, for the Committees on Water, Land Use and Hawaiian Affairs; Transportation; and Tourism, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1381) recommending that H.R. No. 203, as amended in HD 1, be adopted.

Representatives Hagino, Oshiro and Cachola, for the Committees on Water, Land Use and Hawaiian Affairs; Transportation; and Tourism, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1382) recommending that H.C.R. No. 175, as amended in HD 1, be adopted.

Representative Arakaki moved that the reports of the Committees be adopted and H.R. No. 203, HD 1, and H.C.R. No. 175, HD 1, be adopted, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Thielen rose to speak against the resolutions, stating:

"During the testimony on these resolutions, it became evident that the Coast Guard was extremely concerned. They didn't know of a substitute location. None was really identified that would be acceptable to the Coast Guard during that hearing. I think that that is the first thing that must be determined before we request any study or request the Coast Guard to consider relocating its facilities. The Deep Draft Harbor is inadequate. don't have space evidently at Pearl Harbor. But at this point, the Coast Guard facilities themselves, and the people in the Coast Guard, have not been able to come in to us to say, 'yes, there's an alternate site; we'd be glad to cooperate with you.' At this point, they are very apprehensive. The majority of their emergency runs occur right out of where they're located and time is critical. And if we put them in a far location somewhere else on Oahu where the response time would be expanded, I think that would be to the detriment of those who are waiting for speedy rescue.

"For these reasons, I believe we first should do more homework and look at alternative locations before this body directs a resolution to the United States Department of Transportation, asking them to consider relocating the Sand Island Coast Guard facilities.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Stegmaier rose to speak against the resolutions, stating:

"As Chairman of the Ocean and Marine Resources Committee, I've realized the important role that the Coast Guard plays, not only in terms of law enforcement and rescue for recreational and commercial activities that we're involved in and will continue to play with the increased recreational and commercial use of our ocean, but at a time also when we are expecting greater cooperation from the federal government to assist the State in managing our resources -- our fishery resources and other ocean resources -- by having the Coast Guard help us with enforcing the rules and the laws that we will be implementing. And also, given the fact that in the Honolulu Waterfront Master Plan, that in the final report of October 1989, there was an acknowledgement of the need for the Coast Guard to maintain a central location and operate within the current 35 acres of land that it has available.

"For those reasons, I feel strongly that perhaps these resolutions are premature, especially as was mentioned by Representative Thielen, that we were not able to determine in committee a good alternative location to investigate further about. So I would suggest that instead of having the Coast Guard or the U.S. Department of Transportation look for an alternative site, that we make as a priority the continued location of the Coast Guard where they are most effective, and establish investigations of alternative sites for the other needs that will be required in that area.

"And for these reasons, I would ask the Clerk to record a 'no' vote for me.

"Thank you."

Representative Shon rose to speak in support of the resolutions, stating:

"As I read the resolution, it simply says that we respectfully request to consider relocating the Coast Guard facilities and that it be determined jointly by the Department of Transportation, Coast Guard and others.

"I recall a couple of years ago when we were looking carefully at the waterfront, that that prime waterfront space which the Coast Guard now holds is also very suitable for expansion of the container yards. And the issue where the container yards go is a whole domino effect as to whether or not we can actually arrange for a more exciting waterfront around Piers 1 and 2 and that whole area.

"So it seems to me that this is an appropriately respectful resolution. It doesn't say, get out of here. It says, let's work together to reconsider the relocation, and I think the State should push that issue because any agency that is located in one particular spot is obviously going to say, ah, we don't want to move, we'd rather not, we'll give you a lot of reasons. But this doesn't say, move, and then we'll decide where you're going to move. It says, let's work together to reconsider or to seriously consider moving out because we don't have an awful lot of flat land and deep water space to reconstruct our harbor and to create an exciting waterfront development.

"For that reason, I speak for the resolutions."

Representative Ward rose to speak against the resolutions, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, 'if you want to put fires out in Kahuku, you don't call the fire station in Waikiki.' These were the exact words of the Coast Guard because I think it rings true that 90 percent of the lives and the vessels that the Coast Guard protect are right in the vicinity of Sand Island. So I think we would, even respectively and considering a move, put in jeopardy the lives and the vessels that it does protect.

"My second reservation on this resolution is that it asks for the whole pie. It doesn't say, give us a piece of the action -- it says, give us the whole place. I think that's a bit unfair, particularly as people who are in the political arena compromise, I think the resolution more properly should say, could you spare us ten acres, fifteen acres. Not for the whole thing and not nearing 'respectfully an eviction.'

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tatibouet rose and stated:

"I just would like to ask that Representative Ward's comments be cast as my own with 'no' votes on these resolutions.

"Thank you."

Representative Hagino rose to speak in support of the resolutions, stating:

"I think it really is a 'Tempest in a teapot' as writers have said before. All it is is a request, that if the Coast Guard does not want to move, they will not move. They can stay there as long as the federal Executive Order remains and it's just a request. It's to get the ball rolling. It's not the first time that this resolution has come before this body. It was heard last year, and this is really an attempt to get all the parties together to see whether there is some amicable solution for relocation and if no relocation site is possible that will protect the health and safety of our ocean users, then, of course, there will be no move.

"I really think it's too much ado about nothing. It's just a request, but it's to get the parties together, and I think it is an important resolution in that sense because I think now, hopefully with the passage of these resolutions, all the parties will get together and maybe there will be a solution that all parties can live with and that would be a benefit to the people of Hawaii. That's all this resolution does

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lee then rose to speak in opposition to the resolutions, stating:

"I wonder whether we really need a resolution to get people to get together to talk about what to do about Sand Island. They've been talking for quite awhile and I think we have to have some sense of proportion.

"The Coast Guard was there first. It's got a lot of buildings and if we are going to move them, it's going to cost a lot of money. We might as well think about other solutions for the container yard. The Harbor -- it does present possibilities. And if that is the case about the situation there, what we should do about the container yard, then, you know, we are only addressing one possible alternative--that is to take over the Coast Guard facilities. And what about other possibilities?

"So when you look at the question and the real question is -- what shall we do to expand the container facilities? That is the question. It's not how to get the Coast Guard out of there, and frankly, I don't think we need a resolution. I think the Department of Transportation, the Director, should all get the interested parties together and really see what the Master Plan says about expanding the container facility in Honolulu Harbor.

"Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I am perplexed. I know what the problem is but I don't know whether I should vote for or against it, but on balance I think I'll vote against it.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Young then rose and stated:

"I rise to support the resolutions, and please enter Representative Hagino's words into the Journal as my own."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Alcon rose to speak in favor of the resolutions, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I was also at the public hearing on these resolutions. I heard all the testimonies. Mr. Speaker, I had signed the committee reports with some reservations but then there was enough time between then and now for me to think where to locate the Coast Guard.

"I would offer, in behalf of Representative Cachola, the other side of Sand Island which is at Keehi Lagoon. That side of the island, Mr. Speaker, is undeveloped and we are going to develop Keehi Lagoon anyway, so why can't we accommodate the Coast Guard along with it and free that economically valuable piece of land for those people who want to make a lot of money.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Marumoto rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I regretfully speak against the motion to pass these resolutions.

"I realize that the resolutions merely request the consideration to move. But we are sending this message to the Department of Defense and to the Secretary of Transportation and to the Commandant of the Coast Guard and to Congress, so I think it is sending the wrong signal to some very important people in Washington, D.C. So I regretfully will be voting 'no' on these resolutions.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the reports of the Committees were adopted and H.R. No. 203, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION RESPECTFULLY REQUESTING THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION TO CONSIDER RELOCATING ITS SAND ISLAND COAST GUARD FACILITIES." was adopted, with Representatives Bellinger, Lee, Marumoto, O'Kieffe, Tatibouet and Ward voting no, and H.C.R. "If I may note, my previous business partner, Dr. George Kanahele, wrote the first indigenous manual for identity for indigenous people. It was called **Kukunaka** -- stand tall -- and he has shared this through many programs throughout the world. Because of that, these resolutions, I feel, will have a chance of putting a different kind of Hawaiian on a poster and not one that just says, 'Come and visit Hawaii.'

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Stegmaier rose to speak in favor of the resolutions, with reservations, stating:

"I was looking over the resolutions and I think that it's something that needs to be said and that we need to use 1993 as a year to reflect on the role that the United States government actions have had on Hawaii, and I agree with the commentary in the Committee Report that it will be a painful year for Hawaiians and others as we look back at the overthrow of the Hawaiian monarchy and what's transpired since then.

"But there's certain things about the Committee Report that I wanted to comment on and perhaps separate myself from. There seems to be brought up in the Committee Report some items that are not reflected even in the amended versions of the resolutions.

"One is that there seems to be a debate or at least the bringing up of a debate about whether statehood for Hawaii is a thing that should be pursued in the future, and I just want to make a statement that my feeling is that whatever role we play that we need to act within the confines of the federal government, and that we will continue to hopefully improve the quality of life of the native Hawaiian people as well as all of the rest of us, but within the confines of the national government -- the federal government -- that we have been a part of for many years. So, if what we are intending to do is to debate about the statehood issue, I would like to separate myself from the sentiment that somehow Hawaii continuing to be a state is a bad thing or a detrimental thing for the people of Hawaii.

"There's vague language, and let me just read. It says, 'It does not necessarily make the most sense for Hawai'i to abide by decisions made five thousand miles away by people with different cultural backgrounds and different interests than those of Hawaii's people.'

"I guess that will always be the case, whether it's Hawaii or any other state, that decisions will be made and I think it has less to do with our being so different than that there is a kind of a growing and continuing dominance of the federal government over the state government, and I would prefer to state this in terms of a challenge to us to use the power that we have already established within the federal system to improve the quality of life for us and to strengthen the effectiveness of state government rather than somehow feel as though we're in an impossible situation because of our involvement and our identity with the federal system.

"And I guess with those comments, I just wanted to mention that although I am in favor of the thrust of the resolution which is to really use this year to reflect on our role and the future, that I have to separate myself from some of the comments that are mentioned in the Committee Report itself.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Ward then rose to speak in support of the resolutions, with reservations, stating:

"Firstly, I think it's premised on a lot of frustration that this body, from the very beginning, hasn't dealt with, and I keep going back to 1920 and the Organic Act in that we haven't, with the 200,000 acres that was given to Hawaiians, put Hawaiians on the lands yet. And a lot of this has escalated because the political role of this body has not crystalized to implement the needs of the native people. Now, an extension of that goes all the way across the ocean and into that five thousand mile arms-length Washingtonian alien power or source.

"If this resolution encourages the identity and the development of the Hawaiian people, it's good. But I, for one, do not want to be associated with encouraging debate for the cessation of Hawaii from the United States. I don't think that's healthy, I think it's backwards. It's involuted, and it's not, I believe, the will of the people of this State, for the Hawaiian people and self determination and sovereignty over their lands, the ceded lands, and all the issues that are being discussed. It's very relevant and very important to both the economics and the identity, but for this body to make a statement that we are encouraging people to say, let us take Hawaii out of the United States of America, I think is an absurdity.

"And I thank my colleague, Representative Stegmaier, for bringing that to our attention as we go on this lickety-split speed just so we can get through in sixty days and end up tripping over something of such monumental consequence. Why America is strong today is because of its unity of its diverse people. The cessation is of the 1860's and the Civil War is what ripped us apart.

"We need healthy dialogue. This is the place where healthy dialogue takes place. This is the marketplace of ideas. This is where discussion should take place. And I would hope that this body would continue that dialogue and not just put it into resolutions and then hide behind the resolutions.

"So, Mr. Speaker, I have grave reservations to talk about the great State of Hawaii in any future context seceding from the union of the United States.

"Thank you."

Representative Apo then rose to speak in support of the resolutions, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I appreciate the concerns expressed by the previous two speakers and certainly would assure them that in no way, shape or form were the resolutions intended to suggest that Hawaii secede from the union. Let me, in support of the resolutions, point out two, I think, important issues that face native Hawaiians and one important issue having to do with the role of Hawaii's society and its relationship to the nation.

"The first issue and underlying thing that we Hawaiians have not been able to get any satisfaction on is the issue of dignity. An apology -- a simple apology -- from the Congress would in fact, I think, make all of us feel a lot better. That has never been forthcoming, and the reason it has never been forthcoming is because an apology that a wrong was committed triggers a host of situations that might call or, in fact, would call for reparations. Obviously, if the Congress apologizes and said, yes, we did something wrong in 1893 and, in fact, we did aid and abet in the overthrow of the monarchy, it sets up scenarios for Hawaiians to then have a valid claim in a court of law for the wrong to be repaired.

"Separate from the Hawaiian issue, I believe that as a State, there are many, many situations in which we, as a State, fall through the cracks because most of the policy decisions that are made in Washington, D.C. are based on a continental economy. For instance, the Executive Branch of government, beginning with, I believe, Governor Burns and George Ariyoshi, has always laid claim to the fact that as an island state, that we in fact are entitled to jurisdiction to all waters between the islands as opposed to the standard established by the Congress that's based on continental thinking, that State waters only extend three miles out from the ocean. I believe Hawaii, as the only island state in the nation, deserves to be an exception. But the political and economical ramifications of us being able to claim that based on tradition, based on the fact that we were a monarchy, had treaties with other foreign countries that recognized this claim that, in fact, when you draw a circle extending out that establish jurisdiction over our territorial waters, in fact that circle we refer to as an archipelagic claim, extended out from the outer rim of the entire island chain which stretches for two thousand miles up and down the Pacific. This is in relationship with the federal government and I think Hawaii deserves special attention, and we need to carve out and determine exactly whether we are justified in demanding that relationship.

"There are many other areas in terms of government policy and our relationship with the federal government as Hawaii's society where we fall through the cracks. I believe that there are some common issues, whether you are a Hawaiian or not, in terms of the relationship of our State with the federal government, where we have some common ground with all the people of Hawaii to demand special attention.

"As pointed out in the Committee Report, or maybe it's in the resolution, all the Pacific Island nations have gained far more freedom and have been carved out for special recognition in terms of being able, in the case that I mentioned, to claim jurisdiction over their territorial waters. The fact is, just on the ocean issue alone, we are talking about an excess of 675,000 square miles of ocean which would essentially make us the largest state in the union -- probably twice the size of Alaska. These are important issues so in those cases where Hawaiians. . . the good of the Hawaiian people can be combined with the good of all the people of Hawaii in the pursuit of changing certain relationships with the federal government. I hope this body would support that.

"If the previous two speakers are reading these resolutions as perhaps a subtle attempt to suggest that we secede from the union, that was not the intent of the resolutions and an apology would be in order.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative O'Kieffe then rose to speak in support of the resolutions, with reservations, stating:

"I was not born yet in 1893, and for 40 years my wife and I searched for a home, having grown up in Chicago and lived in Los Angeles. In 1976, it was the first time we came to these shores and when we arrived at Honolulu Airport, both of us wept for some unknown reason, and when we talked about it, it was because we felt we had found home. We moved over here permanently in 1979 and have never looked back.

"And words that Representative Apo have said are very meaningful and very right, but I am disturbed with the third purpose in the Committee Report and I am sorry I am not very articulate this afternoon, but I am awfully proud to be an American, and I am awfully proud to be serving this great state of Hawaii and to ever think it

would never be a part of America would be just absolutely unbearable for me.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Peters then rose to speak in support of the resolutions, stating:

"Sometimes, I guess, we have a tendency of forgetting about history around here. This is simply establishing a mechanism to allow those people who have been affected by the overthrow of the nation of Hawaii back in 1893 to kind of allow the natives, the aboriginals of this nation, to look back in history and reminisce, if you will, about those things that have occurred that have been wrong.

"Representative Apo's observation is absolutely correct. What does it take to say, 'I'm sorry'? You did it with the Japanese/Americans for those wrongs conducted in 1941 and prior to that time. What about native Hawaiians and Hawaiians in general? You took a country, a nation, from them. It's simply one of the options to look at, whether you will continue what we now have with respect to our relationship to the United States or not. It takes more than a resolution or a council meeting to bring that about, as you well know, if the discussion on the issue should occur. The people have a right to know, as the members of the media well know in their crusade to let people know what's going on, but only so much from their perspective -- right? So I don't know why their perspective -- right? everybody's getting so paranoid about these resolutions. Have people meet, have them openly discuss the issue, and let's get on with life.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson then rose and requested that Representative Apo's and Representative Peters' words be inserted into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the reports of the Committee were adopted and H.R. Representative Arakaki moved that the joint report of the Committees be adopted and H.C.R. No. 332 be adopted, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Stegmaier rose to speak against the resolution, stating:

"The resolution talks about the opposition that the State feels towards a mandate from the federal government. But, unfortunately, the impact of the resolution goes beyond just an expression of our distaste for such mandates. The mandate will continue to exist and we're not voting on whether we're opposed to this kind of federal blackmail. The mandate says that the Governor and the Legislature must certify that we are either opposed to a license revocation bill of this kind or that we are in support of this kind of legislation. So, we're really making a substantive decision at this point in going on record with regard to whether we would be opposed to such a license revocation law, and because of this additional subject that we are making a statement about, I am in opposition to this resolution. Because I am in favor of such a law, as I've expressed before, I've introduced legislation to this effect.

"During the 1990 session, the Legislature appropriated over five million dollars in various programs and centers to deal with the ever-increasing burden this State experiences because of substance abuse. As legislators, we have certainly recognized that this is a critical problem to the welfare of the State and we continue to seek remedies and provide services in this area.

"One-half of all the states, Mr. Speaker, now have some sort of driver's license suspension law which relates to a drug conviction. One state has even found it highly successful to revoke a driver's license of under eighteen year old students who fail to attend school and they are now experiencing a better attendance rate and higher high school completion rate. California even uses the driving privilege revocation as a penalty for those convicted of expressing themselves with the use of graffiti. These states do have the right to temporarily suspend the driving privilege because the licensee has demonstrated, by being convicted of a drug offense, that he may pose a potential hazard and threat to the safety of others operating vehicles on the states' roads. I believe that there is a nexus here.

"While I will concur with the statements that you, Mr. Speaker, have made and the Attorney General has made, that the tactic of the federal government attaching caveat to our receiving financial assistance for much needed services is unfair, we should not turn away from the priorities voiced by the public nor should we deny that the revocation of a driver's license will serve as an effective deterrent to the use of illegal drugs.

"If we pass this resolution and should the Senate concur and if the Governor endorses our actions, we will in effect have turned our backs on the concerns of our constituents and on an apparently very effective way of curtailing drug use in Hawaii, especially among our youth and older socalled casual drug users.

"I ask my colleagues to vote 'no' on this resolution so that the House will not have to go on record opposing a law to revoke drivers' licenses upon conviction of a drug offense. The passage of this resolution will make it that much more difficult to pass such a license revocation law in the future.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Thielen rose to speak against the resolution, saying:

"I concur with the Representative and his remarks in opposition to H.C.R. No. 332, and I would request the Clerk to cast a 'no' vote for me, please."

Representative Amaral rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I think it is the feeling of the majority of the members on this Committee, and I hope in this body, that the punishment should fit the crime. If a person is arrested for selling drugs and is convicted of selling drugs, he or she is incarcerated or punished for that crime.

"If a person is found to be driving under the influence of drugs and is caught and convicted, he or she is so sentenced and punished for that crime. To attach one punishment after having given yet another punishment for different offenses is inappropriate, unjust, unfair, and therefore, I think good reason to support the passage of this resolution.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak against the resolution, stating:

"The State of Hawaii is known as the place where there's sixty billion dollars worth of drugs that go through this State per year or maybe it's one hundred billion. I think maybe the Attorney General has increased it. And if we come as a body and say, yeah, we don't want to take anybody's license away, and here we got a drug trade that we can't even control, I don't think it makes us look very good. We have to discourage drugs from all angles -- from the child to say 'no', to the school, and right up to the driver's license. I think this is clear with the policy of getting rid of drugs in this State as well as this country.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Young then rose and requested that Representative Amaral's remarks be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.C.R. No. 332, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REJECTING THE FEDERAL MANDATE THAT REQUIRES STATES TO REVOKE THE DRIVER'S LICENSES OF DRUG OFFENDERS OR SUFFER THE LOSS OF FEDERAL FUNDS," was adopted, with Representatives Stegmaier, Thielen and Ward voting no.

Representatives Metcalf and Tom, for the Committees on Judiciary and Human Services, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1586) recommending that H.C.R. No. 165 be referred to the Committee on Legislative Management.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.C.R. No. 165, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING A STUDY OF THE MERGER OF THE CHILD ABUSE AND CHILD PROTECTION LAWS INTO ONE COMPREHENSIVE LAW," was referred to the Committee on Legislative Management.

Representative Metcalf, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1587) recommending that H.C.R. No. 183, as amended in HD 1, be adopted.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 183, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THAT THE GOVERNOR AND LEGISLATURE HONOR AND REAFFIRM THEIR COMMITMENT TO THE PRINCIPLES IN THE BILL OF RIGHTS AS PART OF THE BICENTENNIAL CELEBRATION OF THE RATIFICATION OF THE BILL OF RIGHTS," was adopted.

Representative Metcalf, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1588) recommending that H.C.R. No. 85 be adopted.

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.C.R. No. 85 be adopted, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Hagino rose and requested that his remarks, in support of the resolution, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Hagino's remarks are as follows:

"Chick Gandil, first baseman and Eddie Cicotte, pitcher for the White Sox, did conspire to and were the ringleaders to throw the 1919 World Series. They asked 'Shoeless' Joe Jackson to participate. He adamantly refused. He was so concerned that he would be implicated in any fix of the World Series that he went to see Charles Comiskey, the owner of the White Sox. He asked that he be benched for the Series. Comiskey told him to play. And so 'Shoeless' Joe went out and played the best he could. He hit .375, the highet batting average for the Series. He hit the only home run and did not commit a single error.

"After the Series was over, with the White Sox losing five games to three, one of the players came to see Joe and gave him \$5,000 for his 'share.' Joe refused to accept the money. The player just dropped the envelop containing the \$5,000 at Joe's feet.

"Joe then took the money to Comiskey's office. Comiskey refused to see him. Later, Comiskey's secretary and unofficial general manager, Harry Grabiner, told Joe it was alright to keep it.

"When the scandal broke, a grant jury was convened. Joe went to see Comiskey's lawyer, Alfred Austrian, for advice. Austrian was not concerned about 'Shoeless' Joe. He only wanted to protect Comiskey. Why? Austrian believed that Joe's testimony would implicate the White Sox owner:

- Comiskey knew before hand that there might be a fix and did nothing.
- Comiskey tried to cover it up himself. After all, he wanted to sign (and did) all the players involved for the following season.

"The lawyer strongly urged Joe to admit that he was part of the fix and that because he was so popular with the fans, he would be forgiven. He also told Joe that no one would believe that he was innocent. He then reminded Joe that if the gamblers found out that Joe played to win, they would think that he doublecrossed them.

"With this kind of coercion, 'Shoeless' Joe, an illiterate, unsophisticated young man gave conflicting testimony before the Grand Jury. This can be seen in the quotation from the transcript that appears in his biography, Say It Ain't So, by Donald Gropman.

"Question (District Attorney): Weren't you in the inner circles?

"Answer (Joe Jackson): No, I never was with them, no sir. It was mentioned to me in Boston.

- Q: Who mentioned it to you first?
- A: Gandil.
- Q: Who was with you?
- A: We were alone.
- Q: What did he say?
- A: He asked me would I consider ten thousand dollars to frame up something, and I asked him, Frame what? and he told me and I said no.
- O: What did he say?
- A: Just walked away from me, and when I returned here to Chicago he told me that he would give me twenty, and I said no again, and on the bridge where you go into the club house he told me I could either take it or let it alone, and they were going through.
- Q: Did you do anything to throw those games?
- A: No, sir.
- Q: Any game in the Series?
- A: Not a one. I didn't have an error to make no misplay.

"As if to offset these answers and confuse the picture of his actual role in the Series, Joe also gave the following answers to the District Attorney in front of the Grand Jury:

- Q: How much did he (Gandil) promise you?
- A: Twenty thousand if I would take part.
- Q: And you said you would?
- A: Yes, sir.

"With such evidence, it is no wonder that he was acquitted of all charges. He did not throw the games.

"In spite of this, Kenesaw Mountain Landis, a former Judge, who became the new baseball commissioner, banished 'Shoeless' Joe along with the other players who did conspire to fix the games. It is important to understand the kind of man Landis was. This is what is said about him in the biography as to his performance as a Judge:

"In 1918 he presided over the 'Chicago Trial,' in which over one hundred members of the International Workers of the World were charged with violating several wartime emergency laws. When they were found guilty, Landis imposed over two million dollars' worth of fines and handed down maximum sentences, which ranged from one to twenty years. When a defense attorney admitted under pressure from Landis that an appeal would be filed, the judge recalled all the defendants and added fines of twenty to thirty thousand dollars for each man.

"Landis sat on his last political trial after the war was over. The defendants were Victor Berger, Socialist congressman from Milwaukee, and five other socialists. The charge was conspiracy to obstruct the war effort, but the greater issues were the defendants' politics and national origin. The defense requested a change of venue; Berger was a German-Austrian emigre and Landis, they claimed, hated all Germans and German-Americans. They alleged that Landis had once said, 'One must have a very judicial mind, indeed, not to be prejudiced against the German-Americans in this country. Their hearts were reeking with disloyalty.'

"The United States Supreme Court eventually reversed the decision and disqualified Landis for 'prejudicial conduct before the trial.' The defendants were released and never tried again. 'It was my great disappointment to give Berger only twenty years.' Landis told an American Legion convention. 'I believe the law should have enabled me to have had Berger lined up against a wall and shot.'

"With this kind of mentality in the baseball commissioner, 'Shoeless' Joe had no chance. His banishment from baseball was a great injustice. It is now time to clear his record. I urge your support."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. #### INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION

H.R. No. 424, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION EXTENDING CONGRATULATIONS TO THE OCEANIC INSTITUTE FOR SUCCESSFULLY DEVELOPING AND ESTABLISHING THE 'HAWAIIAN SCIENCE' AQUACULTURE CURRICULUM FOR STUDENTS OF HAWAIIAN ANCESTRY," was jointly offered by Representatives Isbell, Amaral, Alcon, Arakaki, Bellinger, Cachola, Chang, Chun, Duldulao, Hashimoto, Hiraki, D. Ige, M. Ige, Kawakami, O'Kieffe, Oshiro, Shon, Tajiri, Taniguchi, Tom and Young and was read by the Clerk.

On motion by Representative Isbell, seconded by Representative Amaral and carried, H.R. No. 424 was adopted.

## SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering bills on Third Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar.

## UNFINISHED BUSINESS

### Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1471 on S.B. No. 1704, SD 1:

Representative Souki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 1704, SD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Say.

Representative Tatibouet rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Years ago when the workers' compensation law was established, there was a very delicate balance created

between the employee and the employer. In exchange for the employee and his or her dependents receiving full and unquestioned benefits, the employer gave up the right to challenge the claims. The awarding of the claims to the employee and his or her dependents is called 'exclusivity.' This exclusivity, in exchange for no challenge to the claim, is the very delicate balance this has made possible of workers' compensation system which has benefitted so many employees over the years.

"This bill removes that exclusivity which is the foundation of workers' compensation by allowing non-dependent parents to be awarded benefits. Presently, under the rule of exclusivity, dependent parents are able to receive benefits. This seeks to provide workers' compensation benefits to persons who traditionally have not received benefits because of their non-dependent status. Almost all states with similar statutes have held that based upon the exclusive nature of workmen's compensation laws, non-dependent relatives of a deceased employee should not receive benefits and should not be able to file claims based upon the death. Those statutes have withstood constitutional challenge.

"This bill, Mr. Speaker, defeats the entire concept of the workers' compensation law by attacking the integrity of the law and by giving benefits to classes of people who have no claim even under tort law.

"Mr. Speaker, this bill erodes and dilutes a law which has benefitted the workers of our State and their dependents for a long time. Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I am casting a 'no' vote on on this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"This bill goes a little bit too far. I think it crosses the line and a lot that is reasonable and justifiable, and there's three reasons I have for that.

"The first is the justification. No one in the Committee, no one to date really brought the figures of how many people we're talking about. Someone said, well, maybe it's an immigrant laborer who didn't have any kids or a wife. I think, as a body, when we pass legislation, we should have justification. Representative Peters' bill about no justification, no bill, is making more and more sense. I don't think we can just continue to do things out of whims and without categorically giving evidence of it.

"The second reason I have is that, as my colleague just noted, it violates the notion that the dependent, that is the spouse and the children, are the beneficiaries. Right now, this is going outside of that dependency relationship. Who knows what will take place next year? Maybe next year we'll amend it and say, non-dependent parents, and then non-dependent relatives, and then non-dependent significant others, and then the year after we may have non-dependent living will proxies. Where is the line to be drawn?

"And lastly, the reservation I have is that the cost of it has escalated. Before the amount was \$8,775 for the beneficiary and now it goes to \$32,000. Who's going to pay for that? The cost of business just went up in Hawaii. The workers' compensation special fund just went down. The moneys no longer going to that fund—it goes directly to the non-dependent spouse. This means workers' compensation rates are going up, something that this body has wrestled with from the Haldi report of 1983, 1984 and 1985, and something that is this costly and only

nominally justified certainly doesn't deserve the vote of this Representative.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kanoho rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I had the good fortune of serving as the Safety Director for Hawaiian Telephone Company for thirteen years, during which time Hawaiian Telephone sustained a fatality. The employee, unfortunately, contributed to that mishap but, nonetheless, I felt so bad that because the employee had no dependents, that only a meager amount was contributed by the company into the special fund, and that the parents did not receive any money.

"So I think that this is a most appropriate measure, and I am in support of it.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1704, SD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WORKERS' COMPENSATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 42 ayes to 6 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Marumoto, O'Kieffe, Tatibouet, Thielen and Ward voting no, with Representatives Duldulao, Peters and Shon being excused.

"Today is a historic day for East Honolulu. Today is the first day of our 1,095-day siege because of the Kalanianaole Highway construction that began about three hours and fifteen minutes ago. This is a \$112-million project with a good share of federal funds in it. I feel confident that the people of my district, from Hawaii Kai to Aina Haina, want this project finished as soon as possible. The project, mind you, is already double the time that it's going to take. Because of cash flow problems, it is going from eighteen months to thirty-six months already.

"From my district and others that are going to go through these extended siege and construction projects, I feel that anything that has federal funds shouldn't be put in jeopardy. We've raised the drinking age to 21 so we will not jeopardize our federal funds. Why will we not now revoke drug offenders driver's licenses, not those who are suspected of it, but actual offenders?

"Those of you who are going to have your highways and your airports and your other federal funds with problems, I know it says, hey, there's a way you can get around this if the Governor and the Legislature agrees to do it, but that may not put us at the top of the list when the funds are available

"Hawaii Kai to Aina Haina votes 'no' on this measure, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. No. 351, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION REJECTING THE FEDERAL MANDATE THAT REQUIRES STATES TO REVOKE THE DRIVER'S LICENSES OF DRUG OFFENDERS OR SUFFER THE LOSS OF FEDERAL FUNDS," was adopted, with Representatives Bellinger, Kanoho, Lee, O'Kieffe, Stegmaier and Thielen voting no.

#### STATEMENT OF OBJECTIONS TO HOUSE BILL NO. 275

Honorable Members Sixteenth Legislature State of Hawaii

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 275, entitled, 'A Bill for an Act Relating to the Western Interstate Commission on Higher Education.'

The purpose of House Bill No. 275 is to expressly state that a member of the Western Interstate Commission on Higher Education ('WICHE') does not hold a public office so as to permit legislators to serve as commission members.

Section 8 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii precludes legislators from holding all but three types of public offices of the State. The constitutional debates on that section indicate that the delegates did not intend to allow the Legislature to add to the list of offices excepted from the 'no other public office' disqualification imposed by Section 8. Accordingly, the amendment to section 310-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to be made by this bill is not a rightful subject of legislation.

For the foregoing reason, I am returning House Bill No. 275 without my approval.

#### STATEMENT OF OBJECTIONS TO HOUSE BILL NO. 7

Honorable Members Sixteenth Legislature State of Hawaii

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 7, entitled, 'A Bill for an Act Relating to Driver Education.'

The purpose of House Bill No. 7 is to delete the time restrictions of the motor vehicle driver education and training program operated by the Department of Eduction and to open enrollment in the program to public and private high school students.

Section 1 of Article X of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii prohibits the appropriation of public funds for the support or benefit of sectarian or private schools. In Spears v. Honda, 51 Haw. 1 (1968), the Hawaii Supreme Court considered but rejected the argument that the provision is not violated when funds are spent to defray costs incurred by private school students and not their schools. Accordingly, because House Bill No. 7 opens participation in the Department of Education student driver education program to private high school students, I believe it violates the Hawaii State Constitution.

For the foregoing reason, I am returning House Bill No. 7 without my approval.

Representative Arakaki moved that the House agree to the amendments proposed by the Senate to H.B. No. 998, HD 1, and H.B. No. 998, HD 1, SD 2, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

At 1:25 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:27 o'clock p.m.

Representative Tatibouet rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I am in opposition to this bill because with little evidence of necessity and with inadequate findings, it seeks to further make it difficult and expensive to do business in the State of Hawaii. The laws under the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations are extremely complex for employers to follow and they are very technical and they often have very vague requirements.

"The present law in our State adequately penalizes those employers who willfully violate the lawful rules administered by the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations. I see no justification for expansion of such penalties to cover these other employers who reasonably or unintentionally do not fully comply with the Director's interpretation of these requirements, especially without meaning them to seek full review by the courts.

"Mr. Speaker, this unfairness in compounding by the possibility that the fines for unintentional violations could be very considerable.

"For these reasons, I cast my vote against this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Eighty percent of all of the bread and butter on the tables in this State comes from the private sector. Why

does this body continually thwart the operation and the function? This is \$250 for a penalty that we're not even sure could be on a daily basis if somebody doesn't get their worker comp forms in on time. It is written very broadly and very generally, almost with police powers -- maybe that's too extreme.

"Regulatory powers from a departmental level, if it was a serious and dangerous situation that really called for the Department to go in and really kind of hunker down on the businesses, I would say this is a good bill. But it's another one of those barriers which again increases the image that this is an anti-business State. If people weren't doing their health insurance, let's pass it, but they are. If they're not paying workers' compensation and TDI, let's pass it, but they are paying workers' compensation and TDI. For every dollar of wages an employer pays in the State, it got to pay thirty-three to thirty-eight cents for taxes and insurance. Why do we want to put another barrier in front of them?

"For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I don't think this is an advisably good bill.

"Thank you."

At 1:32 o'clock p.m., Representative Cachola asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:34 o'clock p.m.

Representative Takamine then rose and stated:

"I reluctantly rise to speak in support of the measure, reluctant only because it's really to clarify what the bill actually does.

"Mr. Speaker, I think for the members who take a look at the bill itself, they will find that, number one, there is a hearing process that is required to provide any party the full opportunity to participate in presenting their case.

"Number two, that as in any administrative decision, this is appealable should either of the parties feel that they have not been treated fairly. Also, if the members would look at the bill, the people who will be subject to the potential fines are 'any employer/employee or other person.' So this is a measure that applies across the board evenly to all parties, and suddenly it's a measure that says, we should adhere to our laws and rules and regulations when they have been fairly promulgated.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Thielen rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"The Department of Labor and Industrial Relations will have to adopt rules and regulations to implement this section of the law, and my concern is that I hope those rules will follow the intent of this amendment to the law and will not be so broad that they will subject people for inadvertent one-day late filings or minor matters of that nature, that they will not subject them to a fine of \$250. And I think that the business community and the public as well as we, as legislators, will have an opportunity to look at those rules and make sure that they do not go beyond the intent of our legislation.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tatibouet rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would just like to add to my previous remarks that I was fully aware of the fact that an administrative review is required under this bill. My concern is that a full review by the courts isn't permitted under this bill, and having been involved in many administrative reviews over the years, I find that they tend to interpret against the employers even when the laws have been vague and difficult to follow, even when the employer goes in with the best intent and with no willful disregard for the law, and that is my concern that this does not allow for the review by the courts.

"I also understand that it does cover both employers and employees alike and all other persons that might be involved, but it seems to rest normally with the employer that ends up having to be suffering under such legislation as this.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Takamine then rose and stated:

"Basically, this is an administrative decision. If either of the parties feel that they have not been treated fairly, they do have the right, under Chapter 91, to appeal to the Circuit Court.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the House agreed to the amendments proposed by the Senate to H.B. No. 998, HD 1, and H.B. No. 998, HD 1, SD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PENALTIES BY THE DIRECTOR OF LABOR AND INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Tatibouet and Ward voting no, and Representatives Duldulao, Tam and Yoshimura being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 794 and 998 had passed Final Reading at 1:37 o'clock p.m.

## SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of reconsidering action previously taken.

#### SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering bills on Third and Final Readings on the basis of a modified consent calendar.

#### **UNFINISHED BUSINESS**

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 2 on S.B. No. 1766, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 1766, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Lee rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Lee's remarks are as follows:

"On April 9, during the second crossover, I spoke in opposition to Senate Bill 1766. The bill then mandated solar heating systems with a possibility of heat pumps.

"I asked why should we add \$5,000 to the cost of a house when housing is already so expensive. I also asked how many members of the House had installed solar heating systems in their homes.

"We now see a conference draft which completely omits the possibility of heat pumps. A heat pump costs \$1,000

and saves 3,000 kilowatts a year. Compare that with a solar system which costs \$5,000 and saves 4,000 kilowatts a year.

"CD 1 gives the consumer no choice. It gives the developer no choice. It gives the seller of solar systems no choice, either.

"We should contrast what the City Council of Honolulu is doing. City Council Bill 35 provides for energy and water conservation standards. It states that long-term benefits of such savings should go to the ultimate homeowner.

"Bill 35 provides a choice between solar and heat pumps. Senate Bill 1766 provides no choice.

"Bill 35 provides for the following amendments:

'SECTION 3. Chapter 16, Article 7 of the Revised Ordinances of Honolulu 1978, as amended, is amended by adding a new section to be appropriately numbered by the Corporation Counsel and to read as follows:

# <u>Systems.</u> <u>Energy Saving Water Heating Systems.</u>

- (a) Any building constructed pursuant to a building permit issued after December 31, 1991, which is equipped with a hot water supply system shall be initially installed with a solar system which meets the standards established by ASHRAE, or a heat pump which meets the following requirements:
  - (1) Residential. Heat pump water heaters shall have a Gas Appliance Manufacturers
    Association (GAMA) certified Energy
    Factor (EF) of not less than 2.6.
  - (2) Commercial. Heat pump water heaters shall have a rated Coefficient of Performance (COP) of not less than 3.0 and shall conform to the installation requirements and conditions established by the building official.
- (b) If, due to unique circumstances relating to the building site, a solar system or heat pump is not feasible for the building or a portion thereof, the building official may waive this requirement for the affected building or portion thereof."

At 11:27 o'clock a.m., Representative Arakaki asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:29 o'clock a.m.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. By passing this law, we are creating a new definition of accessory. An accessory use will not be accessory to anything -- including the primary agricultural activity. It can be located anywhere on agricultural land, regardless of the detrimental land use consequences.

"For example, do we want slaughterhouses located separately from ranching operations? As long as the land is classified as agricultural, this law permits a slaughterhouse to stand alone in spite of the inappropriateness of this use in many smaller agricultural areas. Remember, some agricultural parcels are only two acres and the surrounding areas are urban.

"We already have a process under which a farmer or a rancher can get a special permit to conduct accessory agricultural uses on another site. The special permit process allows the counties to see if the location and use are compatible with the surrounding area.

"Today, we are opening the door to spot zoning and permitting slaughterhouses and other similar uses to locate as of right, anywhere on agricultural land -- with disregard to the surrounding area and its residents, and for this reason I am voting 'no' on this bill, Mr. Speaker."

For instance, if the spouse passed away unexpectedly or if there was a divorce or some other unexpected event happen, that they would be subject up to a \$10,000 fine. I think it is unrealistic. The person can't sell it, they can't rent it, and yet they have to continue paying for it.

"It also seems somewhat discriminatory against persons buying a condominium unit as a housing unit instead of a single-family residence where there would not be such a hardship placed upon them and, therefore, I cast a 'no' vote on this bill." The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. "This year, 30 out of 36 enrolled in Operation Nightingale have passed the nursing licensure exam. By helping qualified but otherwise unsuccessful nursing candidates overcome the final obstacle to licensure, this program helps to bring more nurses into the healthcare field with minimal cost.

"I urge my colleagues to vote in favor of this bill."

"This has to do with longline fishing. This bill sets a framework for the management of Hawaii's fisheries, with emphasis on regulating longline fishing within Hawaii's waters.

"It sets up a cooperative arrangement between the State and federal governments. This cooperation, Mr. Speaker, is vital to the successful management of our ocean resources, the enforcement of our boating, fishing, and coastal regulations and the general policing of our waters.

"Under present federal regulations, which the State is incorporating by reference, longline fishing will be prohibited within seventy-five miles of Oahu and Kauai, and within fifty miles of Maui County and the Big Island.

"With these regulations, the gear conflict, which has been a source of great danger to the various users of the ocean, will hopefully be generally resolved.

"As to the larger problem of protecting Hawaii's waters from being further depleted of fish by longline fishing vessels, the emergency measure promulgated by the federal government to establish a moratorium on the number of longline fishing vessels exploiting our waters does deal to some degree with the problem, but we have a great deal further to go.

"The Conference Committee Report recommends joint legislative action to determine the facts about our depleted fisheries so that we may take further action to manage this problem in the future.

"For these reasons, Mr. Speaker, I support this measure.

"Thank you very much."

Representative O'Kieffe then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I would like to take this opportunity to commend Representative Apo and the Chairman of the Committee, Representative Stegmaier, for making this very unusual and dangerous situation brought into focus for our State. And I do want to reiterate the necessity of the interim time being spent to understand exactly what ramifications will be on our own fishing industry, especially the sport fishing industry on the West Coast of Hawaii, during the interim and look forward to working with the committee on that, and I urge our colleagues to support this and to add their manaoo during the summer months.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

"House Bill 1304 would give police a new weapon in the fight against prostitution. Police will be able to arrest and charge persons who loiter in known prostitution areas and repeatedly beckon and stop by-passers to solicit for the purpose of committing a crime of prostitution.

"Moral arguments aside, I ask that you look at this issue from other important perspectives:

"One, the health issue of uncontrolled prostitution could be profound:

"Second, the crime associated with prostitution; and

"Third, how is it that this body recently allocated six million dollars to lure tourists back to our State and two weeks ago, on national TV, we viewed interviews with visitors saying they would never come back here again because of the prostitutes harassing them as they walk down the streets of Waikiki?

"This is not the message we want the rest of the nation to be hearing about our State.

"I recently had a hotel employee relay a story to me that I believe sums up the problem. She spoke of an older couple that went out for an evening stroll. Within ten minutes, they were back in the hotel with the man saying that they had saved all their lives for this trip to Hawaii. They were walking down the street, dreaming of a leisurely stroll, and they were accosted by prostitutes. His wife was embarrassed and frightened, and the man said, 'If they'll do this to me, a 70-year old man, imagine what they'll do to a younger man.'

"This is not the Hawaii that our visitors should find awaiting them.

"Please support this measure. Help make Hawaii a place where visitors can walk in peace.

"Thank you."

Representative Metcalf then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in support of this measure and to commend Representative Bainum for his efforts. This bill represents, I believe, his maiden bill, so to speak, and he led the House conferees in conference in securing the passage of this bill and deserves commendation for that as well.

"Thank you."

Representative Tatibouet then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I recently walked down Kalakaua Avenue with my husband one evening and there were far more prostitutes than tourists by actual count and hopefully, thanks to this body's support of funds for tourism, the situation reversed itself, but I think also it might be doing part to Representative Bainum's bill, and I heartedly support it.

"Thank you very much."

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 201, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LEGISLATIVE VACANCIES," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 44 on H.B. No. 73, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 73, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Shon rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill deals with a chronic problem in our University area and any areas which have a lot of students and particularly women who are living in dormitories and in single situations. This deals with the so-called 'Peeping Tom' issue.

"Many people may not be aware of the fact that when this issue first came to the attention of the community which was many years ago, an individual was caught in seemingly innocuous circumstances -- trespassing, peeking in windows -- and it was very difficult to work through the process of educating all parties concerned that this was the beginning of a continuum of behavior that was very serious and could indeed end in breaking, entering and assault. It has just been brought to our attention that the same individual which triggered our concern several years ago has been arrested with a gun and a ski mask in the same area.

"This escalating behavior is a very serious trauma to the community and to the individuals involved. There are many members of our University community who have dropped out of school and forced to move, have lived essentially in terror where they have blocked up the windows, locked their doors, felt that they were essentially imprisoned in an area that should be free of these kinds of harassments and threats.

"I would like to commend the Chair of Judiciary who worked hard on this for the last three years with us and to all the members in the community. The community is really organizing around this issue and others. It's really commendable to see the neighborhood watches grow up so that neighbors can watch neighbors, but it continues to be a serious problem and it is related to funds that we appropriate for mental health and treatment in this area because it is believed that if you catch these individuals early in their behavioral deviance, that it is possible to affect their behavior in the future. So I would like to thank the Judiciary Committee, the Chair, and all the members of the community especially, including some folks who are in the gallery today, for all their efforts on this. We have to keep up the good work, but this is a step in the right direction.

"Thank you."

Representative Metcalf then tose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"First, I'd like to thank the Chairman of the Health Committee for his commendation to the Judiciary Committee and its Chair. We so seldom get commended in this particular committee.

But I would like to recognize another individual who was instrumental, over the years, in working on this measure and that's Representative Taniguchi whose efforts also led to the successful conclusion of this measure.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and 73, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII PENAL CODE," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 359, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DIVORCE PROCEEDINGS," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 46 on H.B. No. 1317, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1317, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PENAL CODE," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 47 on H.B. No. 1090, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1090, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CURFEW FOR MINORS," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Anderson voting no.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 48 on H.B. No. 1230, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 1230, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Ward rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"This bill is a good bill but it's about seventy years late. That's when Hawaiian Homes lands needed their water to build their houses. Hawaiian Homes, with this bill, will finally be able to, almost in a mandatory way, get water on its lands. Unfortunately, not only its residential lands because the commercial lands were excluded somehow in that bill which is rather unfortunate. But to have to stand in line for seventy years with their hat in their hands, and as I know one person from the Commission has said, 'Actually begging this Legislature for water on its land.'

"Last week we talked about cessation. No wonder there's talk about cessation. You've got a bill on the books for seventy years and you can't get water on the lands? No wonder there's little faith in this government. And if I may make a suggestion, instead of waiting for the federal government to apologize for the overthrow of the Hawaiian monarchy, I would suggest that this body apologize to the Hawaiian Homes Commission and the

Hawaiian community for waiting seventy years before it will give them the water for the land.

"Mr. Speaker, I think we can do better and quite frankly, I don't think we'll ever tackle the homelessness issue until we tackle the issue of the Hawaiian Homes.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1230, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HAWAIIAN HOME LANDS," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

# Conf. Com. Rep. No. 49 on H.B. No. 513, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 513, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Ward rose and stated:

"In reference to House Bill 513, Sterilization of Adult Wards, I would again ask this body to amend that bill to exclude wards who are public officers and on this floor of the House -- to exclude sterilization of those public servants, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Shon then rose and remarked:

"On the same bill, I would like to note that this is particularly directed toward public 'wards' of the State."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 513, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STERILIZATION OF ADULT WARDS," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 1019, 1017, 201, 73, 359, 1317, 1090, 1230 and 513 had passed Final Reading at 12:03 o'clock p.m.

# Conf. Com. Rep. No. 50 on H.B. No. 923, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 923, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"My concern is found on page 3 on line 20 where 'the Director, in accordance with any law, may enter and inspect any building.'

"I find that language to be somewhat ambiguous and I would assume that any law would mean use of a search warrant based upon administrative probable cause standards.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tatibouet then rose and requested that Representative Thielen's remarks be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 923, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ASBESTOS," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

## Conf. Com. Rep. No. 51 on H.B. No. 2034, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2034, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Horita rose and requested that her remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Horita's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in support of H.B. 2034, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, relating to minimum wage. The right to labor and its protection from unlawful interference is a constitutional as well as a common law right. Every member of our community has a natural right to the fruits of their own industry. Our society and our nation deems labor so valuable that we equate it with a property interest so that it falls within the meaning of constitutional guarantees.

"The right to acquire property includes the right to acquire property through labor. Likewise, the right to earn wages is just as much property and within the protection of the Due Process Clause of the 14th Amendment to the federal Constitution as earned wages themselves.

"So significant is the right to labor that it is protected by the 14th Amendment and numerous guarantees of our Hawaii Constitution. No one can be deprived of these rights by arbitrary mandate of this Legislature, or any other -- not even by Congress.

"But the right to labor and the right to earn wages are empty rights unless this Legislature maintains the health, efficiency, and general well-being of workers and shields them from detrimental wage hour practices. As legislators, we must support those nonsupervisory workers whose duties are predominantly manual and who should logically be the subjects of any intended wage protection.

"We have heard much factual testimony to the effect that increases in the minimum hourly wage and the guaranteed monthly salary are long overdue. We have heard even more testimony to the effect that an increase of the minimum wage law is needed to restore the purchasing power of poor families and low wage earners and to ensure that Hawaii's minimum wage is adequate in relation to the federal minimum wage national averages.

"As a member of the House Committee on Labor and its former Vice Chair, I can remember previous sessions in which the current Chairman, Representative Dwight Takamine, and myself worked together in attempting to get similar legislation passed. Many times our efforts were not successful with the bills either dying in committee or on the floor. What a happy day this is for me, personally, to have the legislation not only pass, but do so without the kind of opposition it received in the past. This issue is truly an example of how individuals of different backgrounds can work together in building positive support to ensure favorable action!

"Therefore, I am also hopeful that some of the other issues in which we in the House seem to be far apart at

present, can also be resolved in a similar fashion over time.

"At this time, I humbly ask my fellow colleagues to join me in voting favorably on this measure."

Representative Tatibouet then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I just would like to comment that one's labor is the most valuable property that one has to sell. If I wish to work for a small wage and someone wishes to hire me, why should the law forbid it? I also would like to say that if the young person is willing to wash cars for \$2.50 an hour to gain work experience, is it the right of government to tell him that he cannot do it?

"Here in Hawaii, we have a problem with gangs and many of our youths. If we raise the minimum wage even more, we will contribute to forcing even more of these youths on the street by reducing the starting jobs available to them, and we should consider the consequences to the hundreds of non-profit agencies that are across our State delivering direct services to those most in need. Many minimum wage employees fill these service roles at the outreach level where our needy citizens are.

"Mr. Speaker, in the interest of time, may I request the Clerk to enter the contents of my March 8th speech on this very same bill as if they were spoken today," and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tatibouet's remarks of March 8th (28th Day) are as follows:

"I oppose this legislation because it will harm most those who we need to help most -- the young, the elderly, the handicapped, and the new immigrants.

"This body considers countless pieces of legislation to provide all sorts of human services for these very same people. What comes out again and again in testimony is that, that which they need the most is a job, a place in our living and working community, real wages and the self-esteem, independence and hope for the future that a job brings.

"The noted black economist, Walter Williams, in a 1986 column reflected on his own early years in poverty in Philadelphia: 'None of these jobs paid much, but then I wasn't worth much. But the real value of early work experiences is much more important than the little change a kid can earn. You learn how to keep a job. You learn how to be prompt, respect and obey superiors, and develop good work habits and attitudes that can pay off in the future. There is the self-respect and pride that comes from being financially semi-independent.'

"If a young person is willing to wash cars for \$2.50 an hour to gain work experience, is it the right of government to tell him that he can't do it?

"As an example, three years ago, I worked hard to bring a Girl Scout Latchkey Program to the young girls of Kalihi, designing it to use the resources within the community for everyone's benefit. Representative Arakaki and Representative Chun's father were among those who helped make this happen. We had no money to do this with but with the help of some donors, we were able to fund a five-day-a-week program using as staff Kalihi immigrant housewives. We have trained them, given them new skills, provided jobs that they could do in their own surroundings with no transportation needs, and they could work four hours every afternoon, allowing them to still be wife and mother to their families. They are at minimum wage today and they are so pleased to

have this beginning in America. We are now servicing over 200 girls in three schools which we couldn't do if the minimum wage were raised.

"Other agencies -- the list could go on and on -- also have positions that are at minimum wage opportunities, but it's a win/win for all -- for the person employed who couldn't otherwise be and for the agencies delivering the services. Shall we deprive the people they service of these essential services?

"In another vein, in 1989, the Hawaii State Department of Labor and Industrial Relations identified 35,000 minimum wage earners in the State of which 12,000 or one-third are in tipping categories. I imagine that many of my colleagues here today spent time working in a tipping category at some point in their teen years or while they were pursuing an education. I did. I worked as a waitress in a small restaurant during my college years. My salary paid only for my books. It was minimum wage, but it was my tips that paid entirely for my tuition through college!

"Having spent over 20 years here in Hawaii in one of many businesses that have tipping categories, both in personnel administration and in operations, let me assure you that tipping is still alive and well.

"As recently as a couple of years ago, I pulled a full shift when there was an unexpected emergency in a small hotel. Over the years, I have spent many days as a roommaid, waitress, bellman, and parking valet. I'm really good with the heavy luggage. The tips were phenomenal! Any of you here today would be very pleased to work for those tips and the wages were unimportant. I did turn the tips over to the other employees to share on those particualr occasions and they were delighted to have them.

"As a Vice President of Human Resources, I seldom have any trouble at all filling these positions, most of which are at or close to minimum wage.

"Of the other minimum wage earners, those starting out, those who are handicapped, those who are elderly -- a federal study in 1986 showed that 93 percent of minimum wage earners were not responsible for raising families and 70 percent of them lived in families where at least one other member held a job. In Hawaii, from my experience, these are the newly arrived immigrants and our teenagers, many of whom are high school dropouts. They are the ones who will lose out.

"Remember, we are talking about consequences beyond just the minimum wage for it only serves as a wage floor. All other wages must rise in relation to the new minimum wage. Businesses, small or large, especially the hundreds of small businesses we have in Hawaii, just cannot afford this rise in wages as proposed by this bill. It will force them to delete jobs at the very least. I ask my colleagues to consider the net loss to Hawaii that may result from raising the minimum wage:

- The loss of employment to the individual himself and along with it, the loss of his selfesteem, the loss of his chance to start out;
- The shrinking of the economic pie by the loss of his productive contribution;
- The financial loss to our community in supporting him in his idleness with unemployment compensation, welfare, etc.;

- The cost of funding training programs at the taxpayers' expense to get him reemployed at a higher level; and
- The loss to our citizens as a whole by having consumer prices driven up to cover the higher labor costs.

"This bill has considerable negative potential. It does have good intentions but it can produce bad results.

"Lyndon Baines Johnson loved to say, and I quote: 'Come now, let us reason together.' If we would truly reason together we would know that beginners are worth less on the market than experienced workers. But you cannot make a man worth a given amount by making it illegal for anyone to pay him less. You merely will deprive him of the right to earn the amount that his abilities and situation would permit him to earn. And you will deprive the community of Hawaii of the moderate services that he is capable of rendering for all of us.

"For these reasons, I cast my vote against the bill.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2034, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE WAGE AND HOUR LAW," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Tatibouet voting no.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2008, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRUST COMPANY POWERS," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Peters voting no.

## Conf. Com. Rep. No. 105 on S.B. No. 952, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 952, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

#### Representative Arakaki rose and stated:

"I do have some prepared remarks in reference to Conf. Com. Rep. No. 105, Senate Bill No. 952, in support; however, I just would like to recognize the Chairman of the Human Services Committee and also legislators from the Windward area in and around the women's and youth facilities, and also the Department of Public Safety and the Office of Youth Services for working together to find a very equitable solution and a win/win solution in determining the site for both the Youth Correctional Facility and the Women's Prison, and hopefully, they will continue to work together to develop the kinds of programs and alternatives we'll need for both of these populations.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

### Representative Arakaki's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, four years ago a report by Paul DeMuro on the Hawaii Youth Correctional Facility advised us to suspend plans to construct a nine million dollar, 150 bed new facility at the current HYCF site. It recommended that we first look at and consider alternative programs such as intensive case management and community supervision because most of the youth were not considered violent or dangerous. Subsequent studies, one by the Legislative Auditor and another by the National Institute on Alternatives, agreed that many youths were being 'warehoused' because there was a lack of alternatives and very little aftercare was being provided for those being released from the HYCF.

"The result of these studies was a commitment by the Legislature to plan for a smaller facility for youths while developing a comprehensive juvenile justice embodied in the Office of Youth Services to look at the total gamut of services for troubled youth from prevention, to detention, sentencing, alternative programs, rehabilitation, and after-care. The vision is to create a model system that will soon be recognized as one of the best juvenile justice systems in the country.

"On the heels of the youth movement came a similar call to look at Women's Correction. Again, studies showed that we should suspend plans to construct a \$21-million, 250 bed facility at the foot of Mount Olomana. The American Correctional Association released their study this month which confirms what many have been saying all along, that many of the inmates at the Women's Facility are inappropriately incarcerated and that over 50 percent of the population could be diverted to community-based programs which are more cost-effective.

Like the youth program studies, it recommends the development of a total system for women, including pretrial diversion, employment training, programs for women with young children, intensive supervision and after-care case management.

"This bill before us represents a beginning for the women and youth population. It has been extremely helpful to have the community join the Legislature in opposing the 'edifice complex.' This edifice complex is the mindset in which so many state governments have chosen to build more institutions as a response to the hue has to try to fight crime. However, many states, including Hawaii, are starting to realize that prisons are not the answer to the rising crime rates and that for many who are incarcerated, they end up at greater risk of criminal behavior than when they entered.

"Surely, there is no denial that secure facilities are needed for that segment of population who are dangerous and violent, but there is also a need to recognize that especially for women and youth, we need to provide every possible opportunity to avoid incarceration.

"Mr. Speaker and colleagues, I believe we are on our way to meet those goals and I ask for your unanimous support of Senate Bill 952.

"Thank you."

Representative Thielen then rose and stated:

"I would also like to thank the Windward community and everyone else who have worked so hard to accommodate the concerns of the residents, and that Mount Olomana be preserved for future generations.

"And I thank you, fellow colleagues, for your kind remarks for the legislators that have worked so hard on this from the Windward side as well.

"Thank you."

Representative Young then rose and stated:

"I would also like to commend Representative Tom and Representative Chun for their sensitivity to the Windward community and for inserting that in the bill that there be some collaboration with the community. I really appreciate that as a member of the Windward legislators' team.

"Thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 952, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC SAFETY," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 923, 2034 and 1124 and S.B. Nos. 1082, 212, 1206, 2008 and 952 had passed Final Reading at 12:10 o'clock p.m.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 106 on S.B. No. 1822, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 1822, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I support the bill that extends an adopting parent's health insurance to a child adopted within thirty days of birth. My only concern with the bill is that it does not go far enough, and I would urge members next session that we should consider extending coverage to infants and toddlers who are adopted to cover any pre-existing medical problems. It's the children that need health insurance, and we shouldn't penalize the child for not being adopted within thirty days of birth.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Upwards to twenty percent of the American couples are without children. In Hawaii, we have about 200 adoptees per year, but the hoops that we cause adoptive parents to jump through in all the paperwork is just amazing. And this bill adds insult to injury.

"It calls for a stringent application process in time and ask parents if the adoption falls through, to pick up all the expenses of it. It, in effect, excludes the kids over very minute things that are of no fault of theirs, or the parents, or the very complex system that they have to go through to become an adoptee.

"The kids are getting dropped through the cracks in this bill, and all of us know we have a SHIP Program for the gap insurance people but yet, in this one, we really look like pikers. Those who are adoptees -- we're not going to pick up your medical bills. And I think it's an embarrassment to this State that tauts its very liberal and all-inclusive health care. And like my colleague, I think we can do better. I think we can pick up these adoptees -- there's only 200 per year. I think that's something that we should seriously consider and that should be on our consciences when those parents who try their best to get a kid and then the thing falls through, they would have to come up with the medical expenses. They individually have to pay -- not the government to pay it or not the HMOs, but something we all should not be very proud of.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1822, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH INSURANCE," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Ward voting no.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 113 on S.B. No. 1757, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 1757, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Thielen rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"This bill forbids oil refiners and distributors of motor fuel from opening new gas stations. Although there was no convincing evidence during committee hearings that such companies are competing unfairly in the retail market, the bill nevertheless is before us today for a vote.

"The Conference Committee Report declares this bill to be in the best interest of the public. However, this legislation stops free competition. In a free market system such as ours, the general rule is that the more competition there is, the better it is for the consumer. There must be a strong presumption against any measure which bans a company from competing in the open market.

"The ultimate loser today is the consumer. We do not do gasoline buyers any favors by telling them that they cannot buy from a refiner, or a distributor, even if they offer gas at a competitive price.

"Hawaii and the federal government already have adequate antitrust laws forbidding anti-competitive actions by oil companies. If there's evidence of antitrust

violations, the proper authorities should act vigorously to enforce those laws. Otherwise, Mr. Speaker, the government should stay out of the free market.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tatibouet then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Again, I believe this action is premature and another example of unwarranted government intervention in our marketplace. I further feel that there've been no findings or documented evidence to support this sort of bill, and furthermore, across the United States, study after study from the Federal Trade Commission, from the Department of Energy, the states of Maryland, Virginia, Washington and Arizona, have discounted the allegations of unfair competition committed by integrated oil companies.

"In fact, the Federal Trade Commission has found the divorcement laws have resulted in higher motor fuel prices as well as fewer choices for consumers and, therefore, Mr. Speaker, I vote strongly against this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Hirono then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"There seems to be a misunderstanding regarding this bill. This is not a divorcement bill; this is a moratorium bill to allow us time for a two-year period to study the potential impacts of divorcement, and so in case anyone has a misapprehension or a misinterpretation of this bill, that is what this bill will do. And rather than being rash and getting into the marketplace in an unwarranted way, this is really an effort on our part to once and for all try and find out what the potential consumer impact of divorcement might be as we have been wrestling with this issue for at least I don't know how many years.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Metcalf then rose and requested that Representative Hirono's remarks be inserted into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Thielen then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I appreciate the Chair's comments. My concern is when government intervenes, how often does government let go? And I think the answer is almost never

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tatibouet then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I also appreciate the Chair's comments on this but what this is doing is laying the groundwork for perhaps future government intervention, and at the same time it really prohibits businesses from moving forward with plans. It brings everything to a standstill while this uncertainty about the future two years from now exists.

"Thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1757, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PROHIBITION AGAINST RETAILING OF MOTOR FUEL BY REFINERS," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Anderson, D. Ige, O'Kieffe, Tatibouet and Thielen voting no.

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 1382, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Tam rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, with deep regret I rise to speak against Senate Bill 1382, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1. I rise to speak against it because I must make a strike for a democratic form and process of government here in Hawaii.

"I am supportive of the intent and purpose of Senate Bill 1382 which would establish a program to provide a timely and appropriate response to the homeless, and to govern the services and benefits made available through facilities for homeless families.

"While I wholeheartedly support efforts to assist the homeless, I object to the provisions of subsection 5 (page 4, line 23 through page 5, lines 1 and 2), which exempt rules from the current 'sunshine,' or otherwise known as public access provisions of Chapter 91 of the current law relating to administrative procedures. The citizens of this State desire and deserve the right to have knowledge of what is happening in their government and to participate in the democratic process. Mr. Speaker and fellow colleagues, let us not let the Administration hide from public access.

"The provisions of Chapter 91, again known as public access which afford the general public with the opportunity to review and comment on proposed rules and regulations, should apply to this bill if we are to maintain the public's confidence in the democratic process.

"To ensure an adherence to open access and 'sunshine' in the processes and procedures of government, I believe that we should not provide for the exemption of Chapter 91 provisions, as stated in subsection 5 of Senate Bill 1382.

"Thank you."

Representative Tatibouet rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I would like to especially commend your Committee Chairman Tom and Chairman Isbell for shepherding this bill on homeless families' assistance act through the process so that we at last have some legislation which can begin to address our homeless families in Hawaii. And I would like to also commend the other committee cochairman and chairman that were involved in this process as well.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tom then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I would like to, first of all, address the bill and then respond to Representative Tam's concern because it is a concern that I think needs to be addressed, and I would like to thank Representative Tam for his concern and I hope I can clear it up.

"At each time this body has addressed the issue of homelessness, I have consistently spoken out in support of homeless programs and for our homeless population. Everytime I hear about the staggering numbers of homeless children, over three thousand of them, I cannot remain silent on this issue and will always fight for innovative and practical solutions to this embarrassment. I have always advocated providing a quality of life for every man, woman and child living in Hawaii, and this piece of historic legislation will bring us one step closer in achieving this goal.

"This bill is over thirty pages long and it creates a new chapter to the Hawaii Revised Statutes which run ten pages or more. It amends ten other existing chapters of the Hawaii Revised Statutes. In short, this is, in my opinion, one of the major pieces of legislation we are enacting this session. When it becomes law, this bill will be known as the 'Homeless Families Assistance Act.' It is really an omnibus bill relating to our responses to homelessness.

"Tonight, the federal homeless coordinator for our region of the country, flies into Hawaii for her first on-site visit, and I am proud that she will be shown this bill because I am told it is the foremost piece of homeless legislation of all fifty states.

"This bill expresses our concern in the form of a mandate to the State Administration to address homelessness and establish homeless programs. The bill goes even further by establishing a new paradigm, a new paradigm in how those programs are to be established in each case. They are to be established through the private non-profit sector. I would like to salute Governor Waihee and his administration for working so closely with the private sector and with our Legislature on this bill. I think his testimony to having done. . . all of us doing our

homework well, I note that 98 percent of the bill remains in the same language as when it was introduced.

"This bill asks many interest groups to give up something so that the overall program is enhanced. Let me mention just one of these issues -- one that caused some discussion. That was the issue of reducing liability to donors to homeless programs. We are all aware of the arguments against reducing liability and it was a difficult issue to address, but we did finally come up with language acceptable to the various parties which was hammered out, and I am proud of the compromise.

"This bill strikes a very delicate balance between providing the homeless a legal avenue of redress for injuries sustained in a homeless facility versus the need to encourage private donors to give money without the fear of liability--any liability -- or giving or leasing lands and improvements for a nominal cost or providing services and materials used to build or construct a homeless facility without the fear of liability except for a donor's gross negligence. I am told that the State can expect five to eight million dollars over the next year in donations brought about primarily because of this bill.

"I'd like to just say at this time that in this particular bill, Chapter 91 would not really apply at all, in terms of its impact. All of the requirements for zoning, all of the requirements for location, all of the public testimonies under Chapter 91, all of the public testimonies with the City Council, must still go through. There will be no diversion from that. In order to skip any kind of requirements, there must be laws that are made and this bill here talks. . .when you talk about the Chapter 91 requirements as to State requirements, it would be, for example, if we wanted to adjust the pay for social workers and we wanted to not have to go through the Chapter 91 procedure to expedite this matter, it does not refer to locating where the homeless will be, where the facilities will be, or any of these questions which are left in the City and County or State governments. Those requirements will still have to be adhered to.

"I would like to finally thank Chairman Souki. I know that he has done a lot, in terms of working hand in hand with this bill, in trying to provide the kinds of funds that are necessary to make it work, and I want to commend him for his work and his sensitivity in this area. And I would also like to thank Representative Isbell for all of her work and intent which is to provide homes for the homeless. We're going to all do it some day, and I think this is a real strong first step.

Again, I hope all of you will vote in favor of this bill and to be very proud of it.

"Thank you."

Representative Tam then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, as I said earlier, the concern that I have and many of the public has out there on this Senate Bill 1382, is the proposal to ignore public access' present law that assures public participation in expressing their concerns, whether it be pros or cons. As everybody has known throughout the nine years I have been here, I've always mentioned in terms of laying things on the table and I still believe that very strongly. We wish to eliminate emotionalism in terms of any kind of issue, quite frankly.

"In regards to what Representative Tom said, I appreciate his explanation but if that's the case, in terms of Chapter 91, then it should specifically state in terms what part of Chapter 91 he is referring to in the bill

rather than leaving it open or otherwise the Administration or anybody else will take it differently.

"And also, Mr. Speaker, lastly, I worked with the City and the many other counties, in terms of issues or concerns, and one specific concern that I had been involved in for a number of years and it happens to be a State land. Unfortunately, it is in my district and, therefore, I have experienced it. I have involved the City Administration but because they said that it is State land, they have no jurisdiction over it. Sure they have jurisdiction, in terms of building codes and so forth, but not over quasi-public institutions, in terms of their designations. And when I asked the State Administration to conduct public hearings or informational meetings, the response was not well accepted.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1382, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ASSISTANCE TO HOMELESS FAMILIES," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Bunda and Tam voting no.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 118 on S.B. No. 1247, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 1247, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Ward rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I speak in favor of this bill because as we all know, there is a housing crisis going on, not only because of families or their income or their leave, but because there are not enough houses around -- we don't have enough housing.

"This bill will breathe air into the Housing Finance Development Corporation and it will also close some wounds -- you know, there was a big tug-of-war between the counties and the State on this one. There's a lot of expectations and now with this bill, we can get on with the housing crisis. We can build those houses in Kapolei, we can see them sprout and grow, and we can see those chain of so many thousand units that we need being built.

"However, with this bill, Mr. Speaker, I think this Legislature needs to send a message and that message goes something like General Schwarzkopf's message that he gave the troops in Kuwait and that was, if this thing doesn't work, let's cut it off and kill it, because this housing crisis has been going on for decades. It's going to continue and we need things that work. This bill gives it new life and new authority but I think, with this bill, we need to send the message -- let's get on with it.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1247, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Anderson voting no.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 119 on S.B. No. 1088, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1088, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOTOR VEHICLES," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

## Conf. Com. Rep. No. 120 on S.B. No. 1756, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 1756, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Hiraki rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I have some prepared remarks which I wish to have inserted into the Journal, but I would like to still say a few words in favor of the bill," and the Chair "so ordered."

"Mr. Speaker, as we begin the 90's, environmental protection has become a top priority for all Americans. It's very easy to feel that there is little chance of finding solutions to some of our environmental problems like global warming, acid rain. On television, we've witnessed the environmental catastrophe caused by the oil spills in the Prince William Sound and in the Persian Gulf.

"We believe, however, Mr. Speaker, that our future is not fated, that we do have reason to hope. In our search for environmental excellence, experts have stated that we must fashion environmental laws with a new orientation that stresses preventative measures over crisis management.

"This bill, Mr. Speaker, adopts this philosophy by imposing harsh consequences to those who expose us to hazardous waste by giving the State the authority to force those who created the mess basically to clean it up.

"Our environmental disasters, with their several hundred billion dollars clean-up bill, have taught us a very harsh lesson: If the real costs of pollution had been factored in from the start, we would not be facing these clean-ups since basically it would have made good sense to operate in an environmentally benign manner.

"Mr. Speaker, human ingenuity and innovation can deliver us the goods and services we need and desire while reducing both costs and hazardous waste.

"I would like to thank the House leadership, the Judiciary Committee Chairman, the members of my committee for their support, and I've been especially fortunate to have such talented and dedicated freshman members who have made my job a lot easier on this technical and complex measure.

"Thank you."

Further remarks by Representative Hiraki are hereby inserted:

"Mr. Speaker, last year the Legislature passed a comprehensive environmental response law. Marred by controversy, the law has not been able to be effectively used. To address the concerns of business, environmental groups and the Department of Health, your Committees on Judiciary and Energy and Environmental Protection submit to you a package of changes to the law. In putting together this bill, your Committees attempted to emphasize the underlying goals of the law:

- The Environmental Response Law is intended to clean up releases of hazardous substances and pollutants and contaminants as quickly as possible. Senate Bill 1756 fulfills this mandate. For example, it allows for the cleanup of contamination caused by the legal application of pesticides. Mr. Speaker, this bill clarifies that the Department is authorized to clean up pesticide contamination in Mililani, Kunia and other areas in Central Oahu.
- 2. Second, and equally important, this bill deters the future release of hazardous substances. Besides liability, polluters may be subject to criminal and civil fines. This year we have significantly increased the level of civil fines. We all need to remember -- particularly users of hazardous substances -- that an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.
- 3. Mr. Speaker, a third goal of the law is to allow the State to recover the cost for cleanups of contamination from responsible parties. As under federal law, polluters are subject to strict, joint, and several liability for their releases. These releases include any releases of oil, which has been very broadly defined. The Department is authorized to extend the list of those substance which trigger liability through rule making. We have made clear that the State will not be involved in the apportionment and contribution proceedings and will not wind up footing the bill for which other parties are liable.
- 4. A fourth goal is to allow the Department to gather important information. The bill maintains the Department's broad power to seek such information. Additionally, from the date of the enactment of this bill, all releases since July 1, 1990, which exceed the reportable quantities requirements will have to be reported to the Department of Health.
- 5. Your Committees have also attempted to give potentially responsible parties more rights. Should a party want to challenge a departmental order, the party no longer need to wait until after the cleanup is completed. If the party is fully complying with the order, a judicial hearing of the order is available -- subject, however, to a very high standard of review. If this concurrent review is not sought, administrative review can be had after the cleanup is completed.

In some cases, criminal penalties have been reduced. We have also precluded from prosecution under this chapter a narrow group of workers who, because of their non-managerial positions, are forced to engage in criminal acts by their employers. It is our intent, however, that those ultimately responsible be punished.

5. Finally, Mr. Speaker, the Environmental Response Law is intended to protect our citizens. Therefore, pursuant to our State Constitution, we have authorized citizens to sue to ensure that the law is enforced. Patterned after the federal model, this provision will preclude suits when the Department of Health can demonstrate that it has taken significant and concrete steps to address the violation. In so doing, the State is protected from frivolous suits. It will, however, give citizens the ability to ensure that the Department of Health acts in the best interests of the people, and that polluters obey the law.

"Mr. Speaker, this bill goes a long way in addressing the concerns of business groups, environmental groups and the Department of Health. Guided by the principles I have just outlined, we have come up with a fair compromise. Above all, however, we have heeded the comments made by Senator Ikeda last year: 'I have therefore concluded that if we are to err on this issue, let it be on the side of protecting the environment.' It is my sincere hope that the deterrent effect of this law will protect the environment."

Representative Horita rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Across our nation and in our communities, leaders from all walks of life constantly extol the family as the bedrock of American society. They tell us that strong families are our nation's most valuable resource.

"But when wage earners must choose between caring for a seriously ill child or family member and losing their job, what happens to the income they may need to support their families and take care of their expenses? Is this how we protect our valuable resources?

"In our State, women currently make up 45 percent of the civilian labor force. Oral testimony on this issue has stated that by the year 2000, 80 percent of women between the ages of 25 to 54 will be in the work force. Our elderly population grows larger daily.

"Again I pose the question -- what happens when our wage earners must choose between caring for that seriously ill family member or losing their job? What happens when the income they need to support their families dries up?

"It is quite likely that the answer to this question is one that most of us as caring citizens do not want to hear -lost income, increased unemployment, and even more State assistance. The end result is a greater cost to the taxpayer over the long term then ensuring that the same employees return to their jobs, support their families, and contribute to the economy of their communities.

"Testimony we have heard on this issue thus far never fails to point out that most businesses recognize family concerns as work place concerns; and that most businesses find that family supportive policies are good business. One wonders how this is possible when the definition of 'good business' appears to be maximizing profits. Where do family leave concerns fit in?

"Again, there are indications that the cost of training and orienting new employees is by far the greatest cost that business owners bear when compared to the cost of keeping a loyal employee happy, healthy, and able to preserve the family sense of well-being.

"Opponents of family leave, when confronted with that argument, always seem to argue that it's not the money or negative economic effects family leave might have; rather, it's the idea that any time government mandates anything, it's a bad policy. But we've heard this argument many times over minium wage standards, workers' compensation/TDI and child labor laws.

"Family leave is not some kind of employee benefit designed to 'reward' employees for a job well done. In this day and age, with the demographics of the new American family and the new American work force, family leave is a labor standard. Without such a standard, the stability and productivity of the American labor pool is really what is at stake.

"As a member of the Labor Committee, I view family leave as a necessary labor standard for the protection of the worker. I hope you will agree with me that what I am talking about, though, encompasses much more than the narrow interests of the employer and employee labor standards. It is the family, the foundation of our society, that is the resource that needs to be protected here, and that is why I support family leave and respectfully ask my colleagues to do so.

"Thank you."

Representative Baker then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I believe that this is one of the most important pieces of social legislation we have considered this session. This bill establishes a minimum labor standard and guarantees that qualified employees shall have the right to take leave to care for a seriously ill family member or for the birth or adoption of a child. The bill acknowledges that family concerns are indeed work place concerns and enables workers to better balance work and family responsibilities.

"As with most pieces of legislation, Senate Bill 818, Conference Draft 1, is the result of compromise, applying first to the public employees and then moving on to the private sector. It is the product of give and take on both sides. To the major proponents of this legislation, the Hawaii Women's Political Caucus, the American Association of University Women, the Hawaii Women Lawyers, the Hawaii Commission on the Status of Women, among others, who lobbied long and hard for a family leave bill, I offer my congratulations. The principle of family leave as a work place right is established with the enactment of this legislation. To my colleagues who offered their help and support along the way, I extend my thanks on behalf of the proponents, especially to Chairman Souki who allowed the bill to move out of Finance and to Chairman Takamine who

spent many hours negotiating on this matter to produce a bill that would be both acceptable and meaningful.

"Senate Bill 818, Conference Draft 1, takes a measured, reasonable approach to establishing a family leave policy for our State. It balances the concerns of the business community with the very real need to ensure that workers not be placed in an untenable situation of having to choose between dealing with a family crisis or retaining their jobs.

"This legislation takes on even greater significance when you take into account the changing demographics of our State, knowing that women comprise an increasing number in our work force, that our elderly population is indeed growing faster than the rest of our population. Further, there has been a dramatic increase in the number of single parent heads of households. While family leave is not exclusively a women's issue, women are still perceived as the primary care givers.

"When a family crisis arises, it is more likely than not the woman worker who will be called upon to deal with the situation. Guaranteed family leave makes those demands more manageable. While some policies on family leave exist in the work place now, those policies are by and large discretionary. Without the protections afforded by this measure, employers are free to apply leave policies on an ad hoc and uneven basis, dependent on the facts and circumstances of each case, and on the employee's perceived value to the employer.

"Mr. Speaker, providing family leave to the workers of Hawaii is an idea whose time has come. This bill is fair and necessary, and I urge my colleagues to join me in supporting Senate Bill 818."

Representative Young then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I echo the statements of Representative Horita and Representative Baker, and I add to it by saying that in our every deliberation, we must consider the impact of our decisions on the next seven generations. That saying came from concerns about our environment, but decisions that impact on our personal lives are clearly an investment in our future. The concerns were once maternity leave and then it moved to parental leave and now, as it should be, family leave.

"As a mother of four children and a daughter who nursed a seriously ill parent, as Vice President of the National Women's Political Caucus, a 77,000 member organization that is in support of family and medical leave legislation, and as a colleague, I would like to offer my commendations.

"I see in the gallery Joan Yim who is with the Hawaii Women's Political Caucus who worked hard in lobbying for this bill, and I also commend Representative Souki, Representative Takamine and Representative Baker for creating a precious link between work and family life.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Shon rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Very briefly, every once in a while we do pass something that makes us very proud to be a member of this Legislature and this is one of them, and I would like to thank Representative Baker and all who worked on this to make us proud this year.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Evidentally, I'm going to be the only one voting no, and I've done this before so I better explain myself.

"I have no problem with parental leave or whatever they want to call it, but to say that it is helping the family I think is wrong. Coming from a family with my mother working, my wife worked, my daughter works, I have three grandchildren—two of them are granddaughters—I don't believe it's fair to say that it's going to strengthen it. My mother died of emphysema. I didn't ask government to take care of her. I have a daughter that was very sick when she was young. We took care of it because that's our family.

"Then to sit here and say that government should get involved so that they can take care of the family, I don't think it's strengthening. I think it weakens. We do this in education, we do it in everything we possibly can, and we sit here in the name of ohana -- we're going to help the families. We have been, as far as I'm concerned, destructive in many ways. By not helping the family, it had strengthened the family in the past. Today we do everything! We throw money out there like it's crazy and we say we're going to help everybody, and we have weakened. We have not helped in many, many areas.

"And I don't think that this bill is going to do everything that everybody says. I don't think that it's going to strengthen those families that we're looking for.

"For that reason, Mr. Speaker, I am voting 'no' and I don't ask anybody else to. I just do it because I don't believe that it's the thing that's going to help families.

"Thank you."

Representative Arakaki then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, there are times in our history when our Legislature has shown the political will to produce landmark legislation which positively affects the lives of our citizenry and promises to impact on the welfare of future generations as well. I believe that this measure on family leave is one that this Legislature will be noted for. While it may not be as bold or courageous a step as I would have hoped for, still, it represents a reaffirmation and commitment to our most basic of social institutions--our families -- and I appreciate Representative Anderson's comments, but times have changed. It is a breakthrough, Mr. Speaker and colleagues, one that recognizes a major paradigm shift in how we view families in the context of our modern technological Perhaps we have finally awakened to the fact that the modern family is no longer the typical, father working, mother as housewife, with two kids living in a single-family home in the suburbs.

"This measure starts to recognize that Hawaii as a State, has a work force and a population where more than two-thirds of all married couples are part of the families where there are two or more wage earners. It recognizes that Hawaii has one of the highest proportions of women in the labor force in the country. The reasons for these statistics become abundantly clear when you consider that Honolulu ranks the highest among metropolitan cities in the country in terms of cost to support a family, yet it is one of the lowest in the country in annual wages. The problem is compounded for women when you consider that 69 percent of female jobs are limited to sales, clerical and service occupations, which have comparatively low wages. And women, who were once the traditional care givers for the very young and the very old, now share the

added burden of economic survival for their families and are often forced to choose between providing caregiving or economic support, and many tried to do both. But in many cases, the stress and pressures lead to family dysfunction and disharmony. For families in Hawaii, it is an important part of our culture, that we have a moral obligation to provide care for elderly family members. I'm sure that every one of us knows someone who has had to confront the guilt and stress of deciding whether to care for a sick family member at home or having them placed in institutional care. No one should have to be forced to make that decision because they fear losing their jobs.

"This family leave measure should not be interpreted as our belief that employers in Hawaii are uncaring and need to be forced to provide these benefits. On the contrary, many employers, especially those in the corporate sector, have come to recognize family leave as an investment in an experienced, well trained, high morale, high productivity work force. They are the very ones who provide flexibility in their employee benefits in recognition of the ever changing family condition. These are the enlightened employers who, in the long run, will save the State and the taxpayers the cost of lost tax revenues, unemployment compensation, Medicaid, food stamps, welfare, and long-term medical care -- costs which could be incurred when a productive, tax paying employee is forced to quit work to care for a family member.

"This measure is but a small step because it leaves too many employees out from receiving the benefits and a month too short to provide quality care. But it does represent a vision for Hawaii's future and the strength of its work force. And it will send a clear message to Hawaii's people -- that for those who choose to work and be productive members of society, they shall not have to choose between their children and their jobs, their health and their livelihoods, and most important -- their families and their futures.

"I urge our unanimous support on Senate Bill 818.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 818, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FAMILY LEAVE," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Anderson voting no.

"I served on the Tour Aircraft and Helicopter Advisory Board and it was a group that was put together by community members as well as by the helicopter industry to try to come to some grips with the problem of low flights of helicopters over residential and other scenic areas. Many people, hiking into remote valleys, felt as if they were being bombarded by, not mosquitoes, but by helicopters. And in fact, in Hana, there was an incidence of one tour helicopter pilot setting down on a private residential lawn, letting the tourists get out and walk up to the door to pound on the door, demanding to see the movie star that happened to own that piece of property. Things got totally out of hand and we tried to make corrections and worked very hard to come to grips with some rational use of the space over the scenic areas as well as over the residences.

"Finally, I think this resolution will do it if we get some response from the Federal Aviation to raise the height limit flying over these areas in Hawaii. Without that, I think it is unacceptable to those people living in the rural areas that are bombarded by these helicopters, as well as unacceptable for those people who enjoy the scenic beauty of Hawaii and wish to have that be relatively undisturbed.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Thielen rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against Senate Bill No. 408 which, in essence, is going to permit the Department of Education to establish rules that will decide how parents are actively and personally involved in school matters.

"I think it's a little bit George Orwellian, 1983, but I look at us and we're really in 1991 today. I don't feel that this will accomplish what it is set out to accomplish, and what I don't know is, though it's not similar to requiring someone to go to the dentist's office, if you're mandated to go see the dentist, you go in with a lot of

apprehension, dread, and not particularly willing to participate. If the Department of Education decides that parental involvement means that you attend a school meeting once a month or you're not an involved parent, you're going to go out with a feeling of coercion rather than wanting to go to help the school and to help your youngsters.

"We also have to take into effect the problem of single working parents who may be holding down two jobs. If DOE comes up with regulations that mandate a certain number of visits to the school or certain number of hours of involvement, some of those single working parents, physically and practically speaking, won't be able to comply with this. Does this mean that they are any less caring or that they are not involved parents? I question our giving away our authority to the Department of Education, and I question whether this is an area where government should get in and mandate this kind of involvement. The parents that are involved and want to be involved and will be involved will not become more so because of this. I think they will find themselves somewhat resentful because of government again mandating in their personal lives.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Bellinger then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I spoke against the bill the other day and I need to do so again.

"I think it's fine to encourage parental involvement in schools, and I think it would be more appropriate if the Department of Education or the Board of Education were to simply establish policies which would encourage parental involvement and participation. But for the Legislature to mandate via its power of being able to create statutes, that they would simply say that it's against the law if you don't become actively involved with your schools and with your children and their schools, I don't think that that's appropriate, and as a result, I wish to vote against the measure.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"This bill is actually scientifically very correct but legislatively quite flawed. Scientifically it's correct because there's a true and clear correlation between parental involvement and achievement in schools. Those with parental concerns get better grades. Those parents who are removed with kids get lesser grades.

The legislative incorrectness of it, however, is that education is not the proprietary position or responsibility of the State. That is something we can encourage. In fact, if this was a resolution, I would gladly vote for it. Resolutions are to encourage; bills are to mandate, and I think this is mandating outside of the territory that it belongs in. And also, if we want to get into mandating educational laws, I think we better look very seriously at encouraging the SCBM Progam, not just parents.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tam then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I think there is a misunderstanding of our colleagues in terms of the purpose of this bill, and let me start by beginning to say that this bill is a request and

endorsed wholeheartedly by the parents out there in the community.

"This bill is not a mandate. What the parents propose in this bill is to state that they wish to find out in terms of how to get more involved in the school system, including a line of communication which needs to be established. So, in other words, this bill is a statement of support to permit the parents to get involved in our educational system.

"Secondly, it emphasizes parental involvement, as I mentioned before; and thirdly, this bill falls in line very strongly with the whole basis of legislation which we passed two years ago, I believe, when the school/community-based management invited parental involvement within our schools.

"Thank you."

Representative Thielen then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I have no problem with encouraging parental involvement. I do have a problem with the Department of Education establishing rules which define it and mandate it.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. And to the extent that these other issues are now excluded from investigation, I want to express my reservations about passing these resolutions.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Fukunaga then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in opposition to the above-mentioned resolutions -- Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 137, SD 1, HD 1, and Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 99, SD 1, HD 1.

"While I would agree that the subjects may be laudable ones for us to be taking up on the House floor, I do think it's unfortunate that the House leadership has not had an opportunity to review this matter in the Legislative Management Committee.

"Thank you."

Representative Okamura then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, please have the Clerk cast a 'no' vote for me on the same resolutions. I believe that it's a real bad precedence to totally guard a resolution and insert totally new subject matter into it."

Representative Anderson then rose and stated:

"Very briefly, Mr. Speaker, I did sign the resolution and with your indulgence, I did put a 'reservation' primarily because I don't think any of us really want the extension but we do want the public's business to get on. But more than that, Mr. Speaker, listening to what's going on in the media, we have been blamed in the House for many things and being a person that's been on conference with some of my collegues, a lot of the times I believe it's the other house that has not really come forth and tried to remedy the fact. For that reason, I have some reservations.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, this session began with the war and it seems to be ending with a tug-of-war, and I would hope, as my colleague has just spoken of it, that we would get on with the business of the people. Particularly as an extension implies, we have not enough time, but it seems as though if there is some brick and motor problems, those should be taken by leadership and settled rather than being drawn out and extended beyond the capacity of all of us here. Particularly I point to when there's only one party running the show, the checks and the balances to keep this thing on time and on budget is unfortunately getting out of whack.

"And I think that needs to be said, Mr. Speaker, because when there's no checks and there's no balances, anything can be done for any length of time by any number of individuals unless they are kept in check. Unfortunately, the six of us may be a little bit too few and too small, but I think we need to get on with it, and we need to get on with it professionally and efficiently.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Apo, in rebuttal, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, the checks and balances are provided within this process. It's not between parties — it's between houses. And I believe that what we are trying to do is to work out a responsible budget that is in the public interest. And in spite of what the news media has reported, I believe both houses have risen to the occasion that we are, by Monday, going to come out with a responsible budget.

"Thank you."

## Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1701 on H.R. No. 340, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and H.R. No. 340, as amended in HD 1, be adopted, seconded by Representative Anderson.

Representative Thielen rose to speak against the resolution, stating:

"I don't believe that socialized medicine has succeeded anywhere in the world. My concern about this resolution is that it lacks any detail -- what is involved in the comprehensive national health insurance program that this resolution supports? And I think without that detail, it is not wise to vote in favor of such a resolution.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Stegmaier then rose and requested that his remarks, against the resolution, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Stegmaier's remarks are as follows:

"I am speaking in opposition to this resolution and in doing so, I want to first acknowledge and thank Representative Shon for the great contribution that he, the Health Committee Chair, has made to this comprehensive health care system and that many others have made over the years that this sytem has been developing.

"This resolution urges the United States Congress to establish a comprehensive national health insurance program which is available to and affordable for all American citizens.

"My problem with this resolution is that it asks Congress and the President to do what we, in Hawaii, have done on our own, without the help of the national government.

"The resolution is asking the national government (the national legislative and executive branches) which is responsible for the growth of a budget deficit which now equals three trillion dollars -- to take on the task of establishing, appropriating funds for, and administering yet another huge national program with the inevitable massive federal bureaucracy. This we are asking in spite of the fact that we in Hawaii have proven that comprehensive health care can be provided by a state to its citizens and residents in economical, flexible, and responsive manner.

"Had this resolution been addressed to the 49 sister states, and had it urged each of them to follow Hawaii's lead, and had it offered our help to them in establishing their own healthcare systems, I would have been

supportive of this resolution. However, because of its reliance on the federal government to do the job, I must vote in opposition to this resolution.

"Would the Clerk please record a 'no' vote for me on this resolution.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose to speak against the resolution, stating:

"In fact it's true that we do need national health care but we don't need a national health care system. That's the bottom line of my statement. This nation doesn't need socialized medicine because that system has been bankrupted. I've seen personally in the British system, in the colonies in Africa, and in the colonies of Asia — it basically sets up a dual system of medicine. Those who are the haves and who've got the money go to the private hospitals. Even those doctors who work for the public hospitals, on the night, moonlight, and on the weekends, make their money. And those who are the havenots go to the government hospitals and they stand in line and the wretched treatment and the wretched masses of humanity go into those.

"The resolution would better read if Hawaii's prepaid health care should be adopted by the United States in the individual states. This is something that works. The wheel has been invented that works in Hawaii. Why should we back this resolution and tell the rest of the United States to do something that we know doesn't work because it's been tried time and again in other countries? But we know what works in Hawaii -- HMSA and all the other health care programs are solid programs. Why are we not touting that instead of touting a national health care system? We've reinvented the wheel and I think we're going backwards in rolling this one with its passage.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Apo rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I fully understand the concerns that are being expressed and the fears that we are moving towards socialized medicine. I think, though, the time has come where we need to face reality and start taking a look at what causes the high cost of health. The fact is, everyday that goes by, the quality of health care that is available to each and everyone of us is dependent on our ability to This is a fact. Even for those who are covered today and are satisfied with their coverage through the HMSA insurance schemes. I think what we're looking at is in ten to twenty years down the line that even the insurance schemes that we do have going today that we're able to afford will no longer be able to provide quality health care, so it's time on a national level, and I thank God, hopefully the federal government will take a lead in this that we start looking at alternatives.

"And the problem, Mr. Speaker, is very simple. The health industry is driven by mechanics and medical engineers whose basic mission is to answer the question -- can I, or can we develop a cure for this and a cure for that? There is absent the philosopher who would pose the question -- do we want to find a cure for this and for that because with every cure comes rising health costs? The health industry does not respond to the law of supply and demand like other industries do. The more the supply, the higher the cost. So we are coming upon an age and I believe a new paradigm, if I might use the term since it's one that's going around these days, that it's time that we started looking at these realities. And I promise you, ten

years, twenty years from now, everyone of us, if we don't start taking a look at these kinds of options and perhaps leaning towards socialized medicine, those of us who are not making \$100,000 or \$200,000 a year is going to be out to lunch as far as being able to afford what today we consider basic health care.

"For that reason, Mr. Speaker, with the previous concerns expressed which I appreciate, I think it's time that we did take a look at this.

"Thank you."

Representative Shon rose to speak in favor of the resolution, stating:

"Very briefly, I think it is important to note that most of the conflicts over labor that are happening throughout the country are conflicts over the cost of health care. And that health care is rising at an average of twelve to fifteen percent a year over inflation, that the United States pays about twelve percent of its GNP on health care which is over twice what the other industrialized nations do pay.

"The movement for the national Congress to address this issue has been called for by both parties, and it is also most likely to revolve around the issue as to whether or not, in any kind of national scheme, they will adopt a Hawaii-like pre-paid, employer-based health care system. That is going to be one of the main issues of debate and it is not going to be some draconian, socialized, take over the entire health care system, approach. What is more likely is that the innovations that we have developed in Hawaii will be expanded.

"But it is important to note -- very important -- that on the mainland, when you have contiguous states, providers and consumers rush across the state lines to the most convenient and advantageous spot to deliver and receive health care. We are somewhat isolated here. We do not have that situation. It is not as severe but at a national sense, if we have any commitment at all to the 37 million who are not insured and to the many more millions that are under-insured, that we should be concerned about this and not be frightened -- not be frightened by what is now a bipartisan movement to deal with the national health care issue. It is not breaking down as, oh, let the states go any old way. That is what we have now -- any old way -- and twelve to fifteen percent escalation every single year

"The quality of the debate will be rich, it will be interesting, it will be educational, and it is vital that we continue with this. This is perhaps the number one issue -- social issue -- before the Congress and the Administration, and all the states in the next several years. And we should join the other states, the overwhelming majority that have passed this resolution, telling the Congress that we expect them to act.

"Thank you."

Representative Arakaki then rose and stated:

"Just a short rebuttal to what was being mentioned about what is happening in the Third World countries. I think what the Representative was referring to is the two-tiered system where those who can afford medical care will get the finest care but those who don't have the resources are left in the lurch. And this is what's going to happen in this country if we don't have a nationalized system, that we will start to turn to rationing. And, unfortunately, the ones who will suffer are the ones who are poorest and even more so, it will be our children who have to suffer, because the greatest number of those who

are uninsured and not covered for medical care in this country are children.

"Isn't it a fact that right now, twelve percent of the gross national product is being spent for medical care? And they're saying that by the year 2000, about fifteen percent of the gross national product is going to go for health care. And for those who say that our federal government can't afford a national system, I think we ought to start reordering our priorities and instead of spending thirty to forty percent of our budget on building weapons and started looking at how we can care for the people instead, we will have enough resources to take care of the health and well-being of our people.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"There's a saying that says, 'Those who are ignorant of history are destined to repeat it,' and I'm not talking about the Third World only. I'm talking about the United Kingdom, I'm talking about those Scandinavian countries who found their health care system dysfunctional. That means it doesn't work. It sounds good and I agree with all the rhetoric. We don't want people to be without health care and that's why this State has a SHIP Program.

"The point is, there's a wheel that's been invented for health care and it's been invented in this State and it works! So this resolution should read: 'Let's get the other states to get HMSA.'

And if I may end, Mr. Speaker, with a question to my colleague who suggested for the first time. . I've never heard that the future of the quality of the HMSA health care is on the decline, and that is news to me. I had no idea that HMSA health care is on the decline in this State. If my colleague care to answer that since he threw it out."

Representative Apo responded, saying:

"Mr. Speaker, I don't believe I said that. The gist of my remarks is that the quality of the health care that we receive today is dependent on the ability to pay, and the situation will not get better -- it will get worse. So, regardless of which insurance program you subscribe to, the cost of the insurance is going to be totally out of reach for the rank and file. It may be within reach today, and that's the danger.

"The technologies that are being developed are going to be expensive and we're going to be making major breakthroughs -- major -- because the medical engineers are going to be very successful. We live in a society now where we can do anything we want to do and accomplish anything we want to accomplish. The question is cost. And who is to say who will live and who will die because you could afford the insurance for that dialysis machine or that MRI machine. I believe it's government's role to take a look at that.

"Thank you."

Representative Metcalf then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, brief point of rebuttal to the previous Republican speaker.

"As the members know, I am somewhat familiar with the Scandinavian countries. The fact of the matter is that Sweden has the longest longevity rate in the world and that's in part due to two things: "One, the national care system; and two, the fact that they eat pickled herring.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and H.R.
