Wednesday, January 15, 1992

In accordance with the provisions of Section 10 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, the House of Representatives of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, convened at 10:10 o'clock a.m.

The Honorable Daniel J. Kihano, Speaker of the House of Representatives presided.

At this time, the members of the House, guests, and the audience rose to sing the National Anthem and "Hawaii Ponoi" led by Representative Peter K. Apo.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Reverend Nelson Y.C. Kwon of the Hawaii Conference of the United Church of Christ.

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

Gov. Msg. No. 1, informing the House of the appointment of Edward K. Thompson, III, to fill the vacancy in the State House of Representatives, 36th District, created by the resignation of the former State Representative Dwight L. Yoshimura, effective December 31, 1991, and pursuant to Section 17-14, Hawaii Revised Statutes, Representative Thompson's term of office will expire on General Election Day of 1992, was read by the Clerk and placed on file.

The Chair appointed Representatives Alcon, Arakaki, Bainum, Cachola, Kawakami and Tatibouet to escort Edward K. Thompson, III, to the rostrum.

OATH OF OFFICE

The Chair called upon the Honorable Herman Lum, Chief Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court, who then administered the oath of office to Edward K. Thompson, III, in accordance with the provisions of Article III, Section 5, of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE REPORT

Representative Metcalf, for the Committee on Credentials, presented a report (Spec. Com. Rep. No. 1) which was read by the Clerk as follows:

"Honorable Daniel J. Kihano Speaker, House of Representatives Sixteenth State Legislature Regular Session of 1992 State of Hawaii

Sir:

Your Committee on Credentials begs leave to report that it has thoroughly considered the matter of the seating of Edward K. Thompson, III, as a member of the House of Representatives of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii.

Your Committee was referred the communication dated December 31, 1991, from the Governor of the State of Hawaii on the appointment of Edward K. Thompson, III, to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of the former State Representative Dwight L. Yoshimura. After reviewing the communication of appointment and the qualification of the appointee, your Committee finds the said appointee to be qualified and recommends that Edward K. Thompson, III, be seated as a member of the House of Representatives from the Thirty-Sixth Representative District.

Representative Metcalf moved that Special Committee Report No. 1 be adopted, seconded by Representative Amaral and carried.

The Roll was then called showing all members of the House of Representatives present.

At 10:20 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 10:40 o'clock a.m.

The Chair called upon Representative Kawakami to introduce the entertainers whereupon she proceeded by saving:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

"1992 is a very special year for all of us for it has been designated as the 'Year of the Family' by our Governor John Waihee and, today, we are so very pleased and elated to have joining us our own Miss America, Carolyn Sapp, who will introduce and sing 'the' song dedicated to the Year of the Family.

"This song was composed by our colleague, very talented Representative Terrance Tom, and Leon Siu, a musician, a composer, and a member of the Year of the Family Commission appointed by Governor Waihee. These two set off in an effort to encourage the people of Hawaii to do more about families -- but to show that government did care and that it wanted to do something significant and special to raise the level of awareness of all of the families in Hawaii.

"At this time, we would like to recognize the two gentlemen who have made this endeavor come true --Representative Terrance Tom and Leon Siu."

Representative Terrance Tom and Leon Siu then rose to be recognized.

Representative Kawakami continued:

"Mr. Speaker, I also note a very special individual sitting next to Representative Tom and we would like to honor her also, and it's our Miss Hawaii -- Lani Stone."

Ms. Lani Stone then rose to be recognized.

Cigar flower leis were presented to Representative Tom and Mr. Siu by Representatives Chun and Hashimoto, respectively, and a ginger lei was presented to Miss Stone by Representative Anderson.

Representative Kawakami continued:

"In their efforts to make this project a reality, one thing led to another and soon the Miss America Headquarters in Atlantic City informed them that Miss Sapp was excited and willing to be a part of this celebration.

"But there was one final catch. No successful project can get on the way without some monetary support. Representative Tom and Leon Siu were determined to succeed and armed with their demonstration song tape, they went to see Bank of Hawaii's President, Larry Johnson, and they were fortunate because the bank said 'Yes.' There was one commitment and one stipulation that said that all the proceeds from this project must go to charitable programs which strengthen families throughout the State of Hawaii.

"So now, ladies and gentlemen, please give a warm welcome to Miss America, Carolyn Sapp, escorted by the Chairman and Chief Executive Officer Howard Stephenson; President Larry Johnson; and Executive Vice President Dolly Ching."

Ginger leis were presented to Miss America, Carolyn Sapp, by Representative Apo; to Dolly Ching by Representative Taniguchi; and cigar flower leis were presented to Mr. Stephenson and Mr. Johnson by Representatives Amaral and Baker, respectively.

Miss America, Carolyn Sapp, then entertained the members of the House and audience with the song, Year of the Family.

The Chair then said:

"I would like to thank Miss Carolyn Sapp on behalf of the members of the House, and the Bank of Hawaii. . .I want you to know we didn't co-sign anything for the privilege of having Miss Sapp here with us this morning."

At this time, the Chair appointed Representatives Amaral, Hirono, Marumoto, Oshiro, Peters and Yonamine to escort Vice Speaker Peter K. Apo to join him at the rostrum.

The Chair then delivered his Opening Day remarks, as follows:

"Governor Waihee, Mrs. Waihee, Lieutenant Governor Cayetano (Mrs. Cayetano is not here but I would like to pay my respects to Mrs. Cayetano), Senator Daniel Inouye, Senator Daniel Akaka, Congressman Neil Abercrombie and Congresswoman Patsy Mink, Chief Justice Lum, colleagues from the county legislative bodies, and chief executives from the neighbor islands,

family and friends -- E KOMO MAI. . . ALOHA. . . and welcome to the historic chamber of the State House of Representatives.

"While our offices are now located down the street at the Leiopapa A Kamehameha Building...we are back home here momentarily, and I am extremely pleased and fortunate to address you here today, in the State Capitol Building for one more time...under this magnificent tapestry and unique 'sun' chandelier...before the building is officially closed to the public.

"In retrospect, 1991 was a year of political surprises internationally. In the beginning of the year, our nation stood unified with the world to end the Persian Gulf crisis. American lives around the globe were disrupted -- even here in Hawaii, you will recall, we refrained from the usual, customary festivities on Opening Day and somberly watched Hawaii's sons and daughters deployed overseas. Towards the end of the year, we joined with our global neighbors once again to rejoice as six U.S. hostages were freed from Lebanon. And on Christmas Day, we were presented with the political gift of a lifetime -- the lowering of the Soviet flag, and a rejuvenating hope that democracy may still become the European way of life.

"On the national domestic front, however, ominous clouds gathered over the horizon during 1991. Economic indicators such as the increased unemployment rates, decreased real Gross National Product percentages, and reduced consumer spending indicated a slow and faltering national economy.

"Fate was much kinder to Hawaii than the rest of the nation. A solid State budget, single digit unemployment rates well-below national unemployment figures, and a personal income growth rate that was twice the national rate in the second quarter of 1991 -- indicated that Hawaii was on sluggish, but firm, solid ground. In fact, just recently, our local economic advisors cautiously, yet optimistically, predicted that Hawaii's economy would fully recover during 1992. With this message in mind, let us remind ourselves that legislative directives must always be grounded in reality and not in political fantasy.

"What, then, is ahead of us in 1992? Or in the year 2010? What must we do to prepare for today and for tomorrow as well? Economic recovery is not enough. When Hawaii's youngest child is able to enjoy the benefits of adulthood and assume the responsibilities that come with it, our society will be judged by his education, his health, his job, whether he has adequate shelter, and whether he is content and happy.

"This year, the House of Representatives is honored to join with the Governor and the rest of the State to celebrate the 'Year of the Family,' It is a celebration that recognizes the family as fundamental to sustaining the strength, stability, and productivity of the community. It is a celebration that bids us to take a moment in our hectic lives and remember that government can only assist the family in obtaining its goals -- government cannot replace the family's nurturing and guiding environment. Government can provide the funding for educational programs that develop the basic reading, writing, and analytical skills necessary to survive in a sophisticated society -- as well as implement human services programs to ensure social justice -- but it is Hawaii's individual families that must ensure the physical, emotional, and spiritual development, and overall well-being of Hawaii's voungest child.

"Good parenting is an old but essential ingredient to the success and progress of the child and family. Without good parenting, children become disillusioned, families fall to disarray, and the base of society is weakened. If the base of society is weakened, government programs are not as effective, and families are weakened. As the old saying goes, 'God helps those who help themselves.' We must strive and work to strengthen our families first so that government can work for Hawaii's youngest child.

"Towards this end, the House of Representatives will introduce and support legislation to improve Hawaii's quality of life -- however measured and defined by our own individual, personal standards. In addition to introducing legislation to ease Hawaii's housing crisis as well as to maintain Hawaii's beautiful, natural environment, the House of Representatives will work towards strengthening the foundation and future of Hawaii's families. We will work towards providing a safe and nurturing family environment; towards providing accessibility to social programs that support and strengthen all families; towards assuring the physical care of all family members; and towards enabling families to be confident, self-sufficient and productive by means of an excellent educational support system.

"We cannot fail Hawaii's youngest child. The work and the world is changing -- and some old ways will not do. But the concept of the family has been embedded in our hearts and has survived against the test of time. It is the glue and the fabric of our society. Let Hawaii's youngest child look to the past with pride, and let him look to the future with hope.

"Mahalo."

The Chair recognized Representative Anderson, Minority Leader, who then responded:

"Mr. Speaker, Governor and Mrs. Waihee, Lieutenant Governor Cayetano, and so that I don't miss anyone, our distinguished guests, friends and our families, and those of you that I don't know--the citizens and the taxpayers of the State of Hawaii -- Aloha.

"Never in my wildest dreams did I ever think that I would be speaking on these chamber floors before the people of Hawaii on issues that affect all of us. These are issues that have bothered the people of the State of Hawaii, and I just want to take three.

"I think, Mr. Speaker, that the Legislature has a deep and important role in education. We have had non-productive programs for over thirty years. Mr. Speaker, we have a superintendent who is appointed by the Board of Education; we had a superintendent who was appointed by the Governor; we have had an appointed board; we have had a board that was elected. We have tried lump sum budgeting, three on two, and in the mid-sixties we raised taxes for what was optimistically called 'The New Hawaii,' setting new goals in education to be met with increased taxes. Today, the educators and Legislature are advocating SCBM, which takes us back 140 years to 1851, when the Legislature of the Kingdom tried to enhance education by giving parents the right to have management of the schools where their children were educated. A century and a half later, we have come full circle and our educational achievements grow less by the year

"Mr. Speaker, hopefully this session, we will enact legislation that some of us have advocated in prior years -- legislation that will truly change and improve the governance of our educational system and, hopefully, we will abolish the Board of Education, taking the rights of the people back to a home rule and giving the people the right to elect those who live within their own districts.

"Another top priority, Mr. Speaker, is housing. The lack of affordable housing has continued to grow year after year. Hawaii now has the highest cost in the nation. By the year 2000, Hawaii will have 16,000 fewer houses to meet the needs of the lower and very low income. Experts agree that the single largest factor in the high cost of housing for purchase or for rent is the cost of land. The supply of land must be increased. Fourteen years ago, the Constitutional Convention provided for the identification of prime agricultural land, over one million acres of marginal lands for urban housing. Unfortunately, the Legislature has failed session after session to pass the LESA bill.

"Mr. Speaker, we believe that to improve this, we must take long overdue action. We must ensure the protection of our best agricultural lands and we must ensure the availability of land for homes. This would help our economic base and help to ensure that our children will have a home that they can afford, and this is the right of all the people of Hawaii.

"Last session, we established a task force under the executive to evaluate the duties and authority of this department.

"This session, hopefully Mr. Speaker, we will complete this by structuring an environmental protection department that will not only regulate but will be productive at problem solving. We must fund this program and make sure that it takes care of clean water and essential needs to make sure that our environment is going to be a clean and healthy environment, as I have said, for our families.

"Mr. Speaker, everyone has said that this is the Year of the Family and if we were to take just these three programs -- education, housing and the caring of our environment -- the future of our family will be secure. We will have given our children the means to earn a good living because of education, a right to own their own homes because we have made lands available, and Mr. Speaker, clean water and green open space because we cared about the environment.

"If we can always get a hundred percent agreeable on either side of the aisle. . . all of these programs, ladies and gentlemen, cost money--lots of money -- and there's other programs that are very needy.

"I am hoping that we do not have a regressive tax that will take care of this, Mr. Speaker, that the bill that we have now lying in one of the committees on the lottery will be considered. It is not regressive. It is the means to money we need for all of these programs. I didn't have a chance to talk to all of you on that.

"Mr. Speaker, I thank you, I thank all of the people here today -- our friends, our families, and the people who have come to listen and, hopefully, to help us to be better legislators and better citizens for the future of Hawaii. I would like to say before closing that I have spent almost fifteen years -- a fourth of my life -- and as the Year of the Family, I find that we are really family and that we are one, and I look forward to working with all of you.

"Mahalo and Aloha."

The Chair then recognized Representative Taniguchi, Majority Leader, who responded:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

"Mr. Speaker, my fellow colleagues, Governor and Mrs. Waihee, honored guests and friends -- Aloha.

"It is hard to believe that less than an year has gone by since we somberly opened the Sixteenth Legislature on the verge of the war in Iraq. It was truly a time I will not forget. During those turbulent and uncertain times, the members of this House responsibly did our part by making necessary sacrifices, by settling internal differences, and by coming together to do what we believed was best for Hawaii and our people. And while the adjournment marked the end of the session, your Democratic Majority remained active throughout the summer and fall in preparation for the upcoming year. Interim work groups and committee work received vital community input and we devised innovative and commonsense ways to deal with common and not so common problems.

"Remember, Mr. Speaker, your House members --Republican and Democrats -- joined together for a historic, strategic planning session. During those sessions, we were able to forge a common vision that will enable us to overcome the overwhelming challenges that will confront our State in the coming years. We concluded that a strong and vibrant Legislature is the key component in Hawaii's future. We also concluded that the Legislature, as an institution, needed to change to ensure that government as a whole is open and accessible to all its citizens. We are now fully committed to fulfill this vision.

"Mr. Speaker, there are many challenges ahead. Optimum funding for our schools, affordable housing for those who need it, protection of our unique environment, support for our families, including non-traditional and dysfunctional ones, Capitol renovations at a reasonable cost, and a no-holds-barred review of the City's mass transit proposal are just a few that await us.

"Your Democratic Majority stands prepared and ready to see Hawaii through these changing times and to assure our citizens that our State will continue to aspire to be the best in the nation.

Representative Young then rose to honor Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., saying:

"It seems especially propitious that Dr. Martin Luther King's birthday coincides with the opening of our Hawaii State Legislature.

"Last year at this time -- on this very date -- the President of the United States announced that we were at war in the Persian Gulf. This last year has been an incredibly volatile one for our global village.

"Truly it is time now to plan for peace. On Monday, I was given a book by Dr. Glenn Paige. The book was published by the Center for Global Nonviolence Planning Project of the Spark M. Matsunaga Institute for Peace at the University of Hawaii. This small paperback entitled, Nonviolence in Hawaii's Spiritual Traditions, offers many paths to peace. One in particular by Dr. Lou Ann Ha'aheo Guanson gives us some guidance for our session. She writes:

'On an individual level, we need to renew the spiritual source of the Hawaiian religious and cultural tradition to move toward a nonviolent society. We need to live a life with the understanding of the relationship between the spirit of the people and the spirit of the earth. There is a spirituality and physicality in all our actions and in who we are in our daily lives. The sustenance for this life comes from the land, water and air. We need to live this way of life in harmony with nature.'

"Dr. Martin Luther King also said we are all interdependent.

"I quote from his writings: 'Every nation is an heir of a vast treasury of ideas and labor to which both the living and the dead of all nations have contributed. Whether we realize it or not, each of us lives eternally "in the red."

"'We are everlasting debtors to known and unknown men and women. When we arise in the morning, we go into the bathroom where we reach for a sponge which is provided for us by a Pacific Islander. We reach for soap that is created for us by a European. Then, at the table we drink coffee which is provided for us by a South American, or tea by the Chinese, or cocoa by a West African.

"'Before we leave for our jobs, we are already beholden to more than half of the world.'

"Dr. King also believed that people everywhere can have three meals a day for their bodies, education and culture for their minds, and dignity, equality, and freedom for their spirits. He firmly believed that what we humans have torn down, we humans can build up.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Anderson then rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I don't know if this is the right time but since we're more or less asking things, I would like to find out, after reading the paper and all of us coming together yesterday.

"It seems that everybody is worried about dollars. They are asking us to take back dollars from the renovation. We are looking at what's happening in Hilo with the Judicial Building. They are asking us not to take action on the rapid transit and all of these things and yet, Mr. Speaker, I am receiving letters from people saying, 'Please fund our program, they're different from someone else's.' And just yesterday, I started to look at them and it is running into millions of dollars, and I am wondering if the community out there, because I was listening to the Reverend this morning saying that people are having distrust in us and they think that we are overspending, if the community out there could give us some idea on how they might cut back on some of their projects to help us. I would hope that we could do this, Mr. Speaker, because I think it is going to be beneficial to all of us and as I said, I don't know if this is the right time, but I was hoping that we might be able to get the community to help us.

"Thank you."

The Chair responded:

"After your announcement this morning, I am pretty sure the community will hear about it.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Horita: "Your Committee on Higher Education and the Arts is having an informational briefing this afternoon at 1:30 in Room 1008 on the aquarium."

Representative Chun: "I would like to announce that we are continuing our Committee on Human Services public informational meeting in Room 1111."

Representative Bainum: "I would like to announce that the Housing Committee will be holding an informational hearing on the budget of the HHA and HFDC tomorrow morning at 8:30 in Room 1111."

Representative Arakaki then stated:

"Just knowing that this is sort of a historic moment because this is our first session here in these chambers, and I guess it wasn't as bad as I thought it would be. But I hope we keep it as short as possible here in these quarters."

ADJOURNMENT

At 11:24 o'clock a.m., on motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m. tomorrow, Friday, January 17, 1992.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Representative Yonamine rose on a point of personal privilege "to say a few words about a great and good person whose holiday we will be observing on Monday," stating:

"Fellow colleagues, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. -- the name takes me back 26 years to Cleveland, Ohio, where I had the privilege of seeing Dr. King in action. His audiences were inner city students of East Technical High and Glenville High where, because of restless behaviors, assemblies were few, and carefully selected.

"On these two occasions, Dr. King began to speak and a hush fell over the auditorium. He offered a message of hope to angry kids close to being lost to society. He talked to them about pride, about self respect. He talked about 'Black is beautiful.' He touched all of us in the audience who had suffered from prejudice, victimization and the effects of the urban environment. His call was to know and honor our history, our cultural heritage, no matter how painful, to know and honor ourselves so that with a renewed sense of who we are, we will go on to build our sense of communities, for families, neighbors and society.

"I consider myself fortunate for having been in his presence. Our country and our state honor themselves by remembering his birthday with a holiday. But there's a danger in that too; the danger of keeping him in the past, making a saint of him. He wouldn't want to be on a pedestal, safe and established and therefore noncontroversial. Dr. King called us to honor ourselves. But for what? Pride and self-esteem for what? That, it seems to me, is a challenge to all of us as public servants who serve the people.

"We must also remember that Dr. King was a living, struggling, political leader. He made mistakes. But he was part of a growing movement. He was challenged by people whose names we don't even remember, people whose names we never knew. Who, for example, knows the name of the woman who thought of launching the voter registration drive in 1963 when the triumph for the First March on Washington turned immediately to the horror of the bombing of the Birmingham church that killed four young children? He was invigorated by new ideas which were essential and had to come from many places and diverse leadership. The voter registration drive gave life and direction to the movement which

included legislation you are familiar with. Dr. King was a great leader because he was able to accept and take up the ideas others offered. He couldn't and didn't do it alone.

"Dr. King was also a leader learning and growing. Over time, he became more and more convinced that the fight for civil rights could not be separated from the fight for peace, from the struggle to end the War in Vietnam. He began to understand the need to look at interrelated problems and systems. This didn't necessarily make him popular in the short term. It did make him more relevant to us today.

"Near the end of his life, Dr. King said it this way, and I quote: '...we as a nation must undergo a radical revolution of values. We must rapidly begin the shift from a 'thing-oriented' society to a 'person oriented' society. When machines and computers, profit motives and property rights are considered more important than people, the giant triplets of racism, materialism, and militarism are incapable of being conquered.'

This message is not just a slice of time in American history. It is the eternal message of values, of justice, dignity, opportunity and freedom. It is the message of reaching out and lifting our brothers and sisters, our universal brothers and sisters, and ourselves to a new understanding of love and achievement.

"Dr. King went on to say, and I quote: 'True compassion is more than flinging a coin to a beggar; it is not haphazard and superficial. It comes to see that an edifice which produces beggars needs restructuring. A true revolution of values will soon look uneasily on the glaring contrast of poverty and wealth.'

"The challenge Dr. Martin Luther King presents to us as legislators is this: No matter what our backgrounds and cultures, respect and honor them. Then, with mutual respect, we move forward to address the problems of our beloved state that can only be solved by enacting sound public policy and fiscal accountability. Dr King talked about 'America's opportunity.' Let me make it local: This is Hawaii's, and I quote: 'There is opportunity to help bridge the gulf between the haves and the have-nots. The question is whether Hawaii will do it. There is nothing new about poverty. What is new is that we now have the techniques and the resources to get rid of poverty. The real question is whether we have the will, and I know we all have.

"Just as those teenagers in Cleveland quieted down to listen to Dr. King, I thank you for the opportunity to pause myself and listen, and share with you the words of his for our time, for 1992.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Stegmaier then rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"In following up on Representative Yonamine's words today and Representative Young's words yesterday, if I could, I wanted to mention the significance yesterday at the rally against domestic violence that many of us participated in, and of the fact that we broke out into a song that stems from the time when Dr. Martin Luther King was leading the civil rights movement -- 'We Shall Overcome' -- and it has brought us all back to a common feeling of the need to be vigilant in protecting the rights and encouraging the responsibilities of all Americans.

"Our society will be whole only when all of the citizens of our country are respected and have self respect. And

the thoughts and concerns expressed by Dr. King in his 'I have a dream' speech are truly a vision for us all.

"Thank you."

Representative Arakaki then rose and stated:

"Just a reminder that Monday is a holiday. And I also want to join Representatives Yonamine and Stegmaier in hopes that everyone in their own little way will celebrate, remember and reflect on the spirit and commitment of Dr. King and his work for peace, justice and human dignity."

ADJOURNMENT

At 12:20 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned until 9:30 o'clock a.m. on Tuesday, January 21, 1992.

At 9:45 o'clock a.m., the House of Representatives stood in recess, subject to the call of the Chair, to meet in Joint Session with the Senate, in accordance with House Concurrent Resolution No. 1, to receive the Governor's State-of-the-State address.

JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives was called to order at 10:05 o'clock a.m. by the Honorable Daniel Kihano, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

At this time, the Speaker welcomed and introduced the following distinguished guests to the members of the Sixteenth Legislature:

The First Lady of the State of Hawaii, Mrs. Lynne Waihee. She was presented pikake leis by Senator Aki and Representative Arakaki.

The Chair then appointed Representatives Apo, Taniguchi and O'Kieffe and Senators Hagino, Aki and George to escort the Honorable John D. Waihee, Governor of the State of Hawaii, to the rostrum.

Representative Baker presented Governor Waihee with a maile/ilima lei on behalf of the House of Representatives and Senator Ann Kobayashi presented Governor Waihee with an ilima lei on behalf of the Senate.

The Speaker then presented to the members of the Sixteenth Legislature and guests, the Honorable John D. Waihee, stating:

"Members of the House and Senate, ladies and gentlemen, I present to you the Governor of the State of Hawaii, John Waihee."

The Governor addressed the Joint Session as follows:

"President Wong, Speaker Kihano, members of the Sixteenth Legislature, honored guests, ladies and gentlemen -- Aloha.

"Five years ago, I asked you to dream with me of bold and creative ideas which would propel our State on its journey into tomorrow. I asked you to stretch your imagination and go for the best.

"We did just that, turning dreams into activism and reform on the pressing issues of the day.

"Today, I ask you to take pride in the dreams that we have realized, and not to lose faith in those that remain elusive -- to continue the task of striving for goals that are difficult.

"We convene now in the first month of the Year of the Family. We know that families are feeling the squeeze all across the country -- national unemployment rates more than twice the Hawaii average, the worst national growth rate since the Great Depression, and what Washington columnist David Broder recently called 'the economic devastation of state government.' If you could sell doom and gloom as a product, we could balance our trade deficit tomorrow.

"The issues are jobs, housing, health, education and the quality of life.

"I propose a course of action based on spending smart, thinking creatively, leveraging community partnerships, and using the mind and muscle of the total community to build homes, keep us healthy, empower our schools and nurture our environment.

"We begin by dealing with economic realities. From the standpoint of State budgeting, I believe that if we invest in needed CIP projects today, we will, in turn, generate needed revenues for important programs tomorrow. I want to thank President Wong for his support of this concept.

"Therefore, we have instituted an accelerated capital improvement program for \$1.9-billion worth of projects to be constructed over the next 18 months. Furthermore, I challenge the private sector to help us secure another \$500-million worth of construction activity. Together, we can bring construction activity up to the \$2.4-billion level we achieved in 1991. By doing so, we can prime the economic pump, meet important social goals, and stabilize State revenues.

"When speaking of economic realities, we cannot avoid a discussion of the renovation of this Capitol. Well, these are the painful facts: No doubt, parts of this building are contaminated and the asbestos must be removed. Leaving the asbestos in place is not cost-effective. As pointed out in the Attorney General's asbestos litigation report, it costs \$5,000 just to change light bulbs in this chamber because trained asbestos workers have to do it. Incidentally, the blackout this morning was, on the other hand, not connected to the Capitol renovation.

"Currently, \$47-million have been appropriated for this project and, given the realities of these times, we intend to complete the necessary renovations without additional appropriations. We also intend to recover these costs through litigation and we will get back here for good, as soon as possible.

"The recession has been a major test of our economic policies, and on the whole, I believe, the results show the wisdom of planning. But this is no time for complacency. We must continue to support tourism, our single biggest revenue generator and, at the same time, broaden our economic options by strengthening other industries.

"For tourism, we must pay attention to market and product. We must continue an aggressive marketing posture in an increasingly competitive world. Our travel mix today is more diverse than ever, with the continental United States providing about 65 percent of our market, Japan about 20 percent, and a rapidly increasing share

from new markets like Europe, Australia and other Asian countries. In 1991, we added five new routes to and from Japan, representing 700,000 more international seats to Hawaii

"Has our market strategy worked? Last August, when every other comparable travel destination was still in the post-war doldrums, Hawaii had recovered.

"Equally important is the product. Simply defined, the product is our people, our culture, our land. It is everything that makes Hawaii, Hawaii.

"How do we protect and, better yet, enhance that product? We do it with programs like the Waiaha Foundation which keeps workers in tune with their culture and environment. We do it by introducing new types of tourism like eco-tourism -- or what I like to call the 'Hawaii Watch' program -- which brings people here who want to rough it a little and improve our environment.

"Last week, Senator Mike McCartney, Chair of the Senate Education Committee, suggested to me that if our schools are to achieve educational excellence, we must chart a course that emphasizes the '3 R's' -- reform, restructuring and resources. I agree, and here is what I propose.

"If we are truly committed to the reformation of our public school system, then we have to both empower our local schools and insist on excellence.

"The first cornerstone of reform is the implementation of school/community-based management (SCBM) which places responsibility for the direction and operation of each school with school-level professionals and parents. Educators there need to innovate, participate in decision making, and in turn, be held accountable for meeting the educational needs of their students.

"The second cornerstone of reform is just as important. We must create a results-driven educational system.

"Unfortunately, by its very nature, our public education system is created toward managing, evaluating and reporting educational activities rather than educational results. If educational reform is to be meaningful, we must change from a system of activity management to one of quality control. In short, we need clear measures of educational performance. How else will we be able to give our local schools the authority they need? The twin of empowerment is accountability.

"In order for school reform to succeed, there is no question that we must restructure the way we service, operate and govern our schools.

"Here in Hawaii, we may be the only state in the country that is attempting to simultaneously restructure three levels of public education.

"First, after three years of implementing SCBM, it is clear that our present system is not designed to fully support it. For example, in his conversation with me, Senator McCartney observed that: 'If we truly believe that our schools will become the focal point of the D.O.E. and our community, then why can someone make more money the further you get away from the true focal point -- the students?' 'And why is it that state and district office personnel have greater access to Xerox machines, supplies and materials than teachers in the field?' These are critical questions.

"We need different policies if we are serious about empowering our local schools. Here are a few proposals:

Regarding Personnel Policies: I believe that the highest paid administrators in our system without the title of Superintendent should be our school principals; likewise, teachers who enjoy teaching and do it well should be able to realize their full economic potential and still remain in the classroom; furthermore, hiring decisions for these positions should be made at the local school level, with appropriate safeguards to protect against abuses and unfairness, using the broadest pool of qualified applicants.

"These ideas are not new. All parties agree they have merit. So today, I call upon all stakeholders, especially our collective bargaining representatives, to work with us to accomplish these changes. In doing so, let me make clear that I am not ready, as some in our community, to say that unions have no role in our public schools. However, just as we must change our public school system to meet the realities of changing times, we must -- for the sake of our children -- also be willing to change our collective bargaining practices as well.

"Regarding Resource Allocation Policies: With the monies you have provided, much has been done to improve local school facilities. I know because I have seen these improvements for myself. However, I have also seen necessary but minor repairs left unattended for irritatingly long periods of time.

"To help rectify this problem and strengthen the concept of local school governance, I propose an appropriation of \$2.3-million to establish a school based R&M program. These monies are to be allocated to all 235 schools statewide, with each school receiving at least \$8,000 to a maximum of \$20,000. These monies will be exempted from State bidding requirements and are to be used under the principal's direction.

"Second, we must move on administrative restructuring. I ask for your support of Superintendent Charlie Toguchi and the Board of Education as they implement Project Ke Au Hou, which is intended to reallocate resources outward and use central staff personnel to support the educational programs at local schools.

"Third, we are all well aware that our current system of educational governance diffuses and dilutes responsibility. As a result, accountability is muddled between the Board of Education, the Legislature and the Executive.

"In our efforts to develop new industries, we have increased the number of captive insurance companies from two to 22, added 11 new sporting events, and in February, will break ground on a new film studio at Diamond Head.

"Our high tech industry took a significant leap forward recently with the opening of the first facility in the Maui Research and Technology Park. With the development 75 percent leased and filling fast, more facilities in the planning stage, and the State's own Maui Research Technology Center to open within a few weeks, the future of high tech on Maui looks extremely bright.

"By the way, as a result of our \$10-million investment in the park, a \$19-million 'Super Computer' Image Information Center is being developed. The Center will be open to researchers from throughout the country and will play a major role in international research.

"Our initiatives to develop new markets for our agricultural products resulted in State and private agencies jointly participating in the world's largest food trade show -- Anuga -- in Cologne, Germany, last year, which is anticipated to result in more than \$4-million in new business annually.

"In addition, the International Business Center of Hawaii which opened last September, has served more than 150 businesses with trade counseling and trade financing, and is helping to make Hawaii truly an international center for commerce.

"These trade activities will become increasingly important at a time when the Asian-Pacific arena is expected to flex its economic and industrial muscle. That, according to Bank of Hawaii's 1991 annual economic report, 'will produce growth in Hawaii that is likely to be much broader and more sustainable than the intensely resort-focused developments of the 1980s.'

"Over the past several years, we've tried hard to improve the business climate in Hawaii. Last year, Hawaii employers saved a total of \$75-million, through the reduction of our unemployment insurance taxable wage base and lower employer contribution rates due to the solvency of the Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund. If low unemployment rates continue through 1992, employers should receive an additional \$80- million reduction.

"This year, we will work with businesses to focus on worker safety programs. Today, I want to acknowledge two construction companies -- Black & Veatch and Hawaiian Dredging -- who, in their work on the AES cogeneration plant, implemented a safety and health program which cut their workers' compensation costs by 80 percent, saving an estimated \$1-million in premiums. Safe working conditions and profits go hand in hand.

"Clearly, as a nation and as a highly vulnerable State, we hare behind the energy security curve. Our actions must be redoubled. We must provide for Hawaii's future needs by exploring both demand-side and supply-side actions.

"As you know, our experience with geothermal development on the Big Island suffered a setback last year. But we have taken sound measures to ensure the safety and health of our citizens. Satisfied, we remain determined and committed to the development of geothermal to fill the critical energy needs of the Big Island.

"Together, we have made some real gains in education over the last five years. We began school/community-based management, created a school superfund, increased teacher salaries by over 50 percent, and initiated or substantially augmented a wide range of education-related programs.

"Yet with all this growth and investment, why do we hear parents and educators voicing discontent? Because I believe, as so aptly stated by Lieutenant Governor Cayetano, Chair of the Task Force on Education Governance, that: 'Our current top-down highly centralized, overly bureaucratized system has distanced our people from their schools, while simultaneously becoming less able to address our educational needs.'

"No doubt, a public school system that provides equal educational opportunity has been one of the most enduring commitments of the people of Hawaii. Ours is a unique statewide system -- the envy of most states across this nation.

"Nonetheless, that very scope of administration has sometimes clouded our vision of what public education is all about. We need to remind ourselves that the mission of our public schools is not about the preservation of an institution but about educating our children.

"Many proposals have been advanced. Personally, I prefer an appointed school board. I believe that this alternative, like the UH Board of Regents, has the advantage of focusing on policy issues instead of administrative matters, and the potential for attracting the best talent in our community. Another alternative that has merit is a network of elected district or county boards to represent local concerns with an appointed board to set statewide policies and performance standards. However, any proposal that would clarify the current situation is preferable to the present system.

"Last session, you established the Task Force on Education Governance. The Task Force has done yeomen's work on this issue and even now is preparing to take its proposals out for further public input. I, like you, await their results. I hope that you will see fit to incorporate their recommendations into your legislative time table.

"In any event, I strongly urge that at the very least we deal with the policy governance issue this session and present a constitutional amendment to the voters for ratification in the 1992 General Election.

"The supplemental budget we submitted to you in December requests an additional \$20-million for education. Most of these funds are needed for current services. Today, I ask you for another \$14-million to be used to reduce class size, expand computer education and further enhance the quality of public education.

"I know that there isn't an elected leader in this room who would fail to support programs that clearly enhance quality public education. In the last five years, we increased funding for education by 70 percent. Our 1991-93 biennium budget appropriates about \$1.3-billion to the Department of Education. This represents a 21 percent increase over the prior 1989-91 biennium. In the last year, the publication State Policy Reports ranked us the fifth highest state in the nation in increased rate of spending for education.

"Yet, I am compelled to raise a voice of caution. Too often, we have tried to effect educational improvements only by asking for new monies. We must also be willing to reallocate resources from lower priority programs to higher priority ones. Since my first State-of-the-State address, I have challenged our school authorities to do this. Furthermore, a primary reason for calling for flexible funding, like we did last session with last session's \$70-million, lump sum appropriation, was to allow priorities to be set by those directly involved with the individual schools. However, for the most part, we continue to treat educational reform as a budgetary addon after the status quo has been funded.

"To facilitate the prioritization process and support the empowerment of local schools, I have asked the Director of Budget and Finance to submit for your review a breakdown of the Department of Education's budget, displaying how many dollars have been allocated to each individual school. If we are serious about SCBM, we ought to know how much of our resources are reaching our local schools.

"Actually, the concept of school-by-school budgeting is not new. Then Representative Norman Mizuguchi proposed it in 1977 and it was adopted by the Legislature in Act 10 of that session. I suggest that we may want to do that again.

"We are all too well aware of the enormity of the facility problems faced by our public schools. Therefore, in addition to providing needed appropriations for new construction, we must at the same time seek alternatives

to just building more schools each year to keep up with increasing enrollment.

"One attractive alternative is the year-round, multi-track system used extensively in other states with similar facility shortages. Indeed, the year-round school at Waihee here in Hawaii is a success. Well, it is time to extend that alternative to other communities in this State, like West Hawaii where Senator Malama Solomon and her constituents want to develop two multi-track, year-round schools.

"Yes, my friends, if we want educational excellence, we must be willing to commit ourselves to reform, restructuring and resources.

"Thanks to Speaker Kihano and all of you in the Year of the Family, Hawaii has become a national leader in human resource programs. Representative Pat Schroeder, the Chair of the U.S. House Select Committee for Children, Youth and Families, earlier this month held up our Healthy Start Program as a model for all. National leaders look at our State as having the most advanced health care system in the country. A-Plus, our literacy program and ASK-2000 have also received considerable national attention.

"The Year of the Family means stronger children, ready for school, ready to learn and ready to grow. That's the first national educational goal, by the way.

"Our Zero to Three Project is the first federally approved state plan of its kind and ensures that infants and toddlers with special needs have access to high quality early intervention services.

"An educator once said that there is no such thing as an at-risk child, there are only at-risk families. Our Healthy Start Program conducts screening and services to help 2,400 families statewide realize their full potential in giving their children the best possible start in life. I propose that we expand the Healthy Start Program. To do that, we are requesting an appropriation of \$4-million: Two million dollars to restore the cuts made last session and \$2-million for expansion.

"Healthy children need early immunization. Yet only 68 percent of our kids get their shots by age two. I propose a partnership with insurance companies, physicians, and private agencies statewise for every infant and toddler in Hawaii. I am asking for \$1-million for vaccines, \$600,000 for outreach services, public education and weekend and evening clinics.

"In 1989, we proposed early childhood education for all of our children by the year 2000. We are rapidly moving on that goal. Through federal, state and private programs, approximately 74 percent of our children are already getting pre-school education. That in itself is a remarkable fact. Furthermore, because of your high levels of funding for early childhood development, we are eligible for an additional \$2.8-million in federal child care and development block grant monies beginning in 1992, and I will ask for your support in securing these funds.

"The Year of the Family means reforming policies and services to meet family needs. Two exciting and dynamic programs are worth your special attention and support. One reforms policy. The other reforms services. Both support families.

"In November, Hawaii became one of seven participating states in the National Policy Academy on Families and Children. Our agenda is to pull together the very best minds from all sectors to look at family strengths, elements essential to the quality of life, and create a framework for policy reform.

"We must also reform the way we deliver family services. We are asking you for \$860,000 for our Family Center Demonstration Project, operating at four community-based centers across the State.

"The Year of the Family means increased family learning, with the library as the center of family education and self-learning. Happily, I announce that our renovated and expanded State Library at the corner of King and Punchbowl Streets will reopen as a center of learning this spring. Over 65,000 people use one of our 49 libraries in any given week. We offer the only system in the world with direct on-line microcomputer access to its database holdings, weekly preschool toddler hours to ready our youngsters for school, and on February 29th, with the dedication and opening of the Kailua-Kona Library, the first drive-through library service. For our libraries, we are requesting nearly \$2-million in supplemental funds for expanded services, equipment and books.

"From the First Lady, this reminder for everyone. Take the extra time to visit the library with your children and read with them each night. Ten minutes a day can change a lifetime.

"The Year of the Family means dignity and independence. Welfare and unemployment ought not be a place families go for good.

"Five hundred forty-four Oahu families have enrolled thus far in our Jobs Program. We are working with them on individualized needs like skill training and child care, which are transitional to employment. Retention is high and progress is gradual. Most importantly, the reports I get are that when people see options to the cycle of poverty and see hope for themselves and their children, they want to make it like everyone else. They want up and out for good. Later this year, we open our Maui Jobs Program, with Kauai and the Big Island part of next year's state and federal request.

"While we are talking about families, the time has come to heed the call of the abused and the battered by taking action to end domestic violence and while we are on the subject of violence, let us finish our work to stop the proliferation of military-style assault weapons in our society.

"The Year of the Family means having the healthiest families in America. The federal government must address health care reform in partnership with states, and Hawaii has become and will continue to be a major influence in this critical national debate.

"I can tell you that while other states are talking about what could happen to their peoples' health if they improved their systems, Hawaii can talk about what has happened to improve peoples' health as a result of our action:

- * The lowest rate of infant mortality and the lowest rate of preventable deaths from chronic diseases in the country.
- * Our secret weapon, primary care -- early, timely and less costly -- reducing the very expensive in-patient care time to between half and two-thirds of the national rate.
- * A private and public partnership which offers universal access to health care insurance and

translates into health care costs for small businesses which are among the lowest in the nation.

"Yet, as strong as it is, our system cannot stand still. Our community hospitals are running in the red. Grass roots plans for new management models on Maui and the Big Island are underway. I renew our call for new systems with the dual goals of containing costs and providing service to everyone -- rural and urban, rich and poor.

"Federal mandates, utilization rates and inflation have turned Medicaid into a budgetary Pacman for every state in America. Expenditures for Medicaid here have grown at a rate of 16 percent during the last two years. This translates into a deficit of \$54-million for this fiscal year and a projected \$78-million for next.

"We are proposing administrative actions to save \$34-million of projected increases by the end of the next fiscal year. These actions include restructuring programs and recapturing a greater portion of federal funds for services.

"We need to take control of rising costs, before Medicaid absorbs even more resources from other priorities, like education and housing.

"In the field of mental health, we have gone from neglect to respect. Hawaii's per capita spending on mental health has nearly tripled since 1986.

"We have opened a new facility at the Hawaii State Hospital. But we are not finished. We need three more years of continued support for the State Hospital and for community-based services. Our supplemental budget contains \$8-million for mental health priorities. Our goal is accreditation for our hospital and our community centers, because accreditation establishes, without question, that Hawaii has met the national standards for sound and competent care.

"As Hawaii's population grows older, we are faced with the deep concerns of long term care. This isn't an elderly issue. It's a family issue. That's why we call our initiative the Family Hope Program.

"Families facing the need for long term care have two choices, highly priced private care or Medicaid. As a result, people are turning to Medicaid, and costs are soaring.

"We have made real progress in developing a long-term care service model for Hawaii. However, a key element is missing in our financial plan. We need to work on an agreement with the federal government not to penalize us for taking the lead on this issue. Therefore, we must pursue federal approval to reallocate Medicaid funds into a state plan, which in turn will help finance long-term care. Second, we are pursuing a federal partnership and resources for a State Demonstration Project that will implement and test the recommendations of the Long-Term Care Financing Advisory Board. These critical and timely actions are necessary to pave the way for a long-term care financing system that will serve our seniors and their families.

"For families facing traffic congestion every day, we are dedicated to completing projects like Kalanianaole Road widening -- six lanes wide from Kahala to Hawaii Kai -- by late 1993; and H-3 construction remains on schedule.

"However, we can only widen and build so many roads, so Honolulu's Rapid Transit Program is very important. I want to express my thanks to the City Council and you for supporting rapid transit, and to our

federal delegation for its work in securing a \$618-million commitment toward the system's completion.

"We are all concerned about the system's cost. Fortunately, the recently passed Federal Intermodal Surface Transportation Act allows states to pursue the federal funds that are not used by other states by September of 1992. I have instructed the DOT to apply for these funds, for rapid transit. There are certainly no guarantees, but this additional source may make it possible to shorten the length of time the county needs the mass transit surcharge tax.

"Also, to further address the impact of costs on Hawaii residents, this session we will address the regressivity of the surcharge tax by submitting a bill to improve the offsetting income tax credit.

"No issue is more pressing in Hawaii today than housing. In the last decade, the number of homeless families, rent, and the cost of housing have all dramatically increased. The concurrent rise in all three is no coincidence. They are interrelated. To resolve one area is to ease the pressure in another.

"With your support last year, we moved on homelessness as no other state has done, with a funding level 300 percent over the national average, and in spite of receiving less than one half of our share of federal dollars. You see, in Washington, D.C., they think it's paradise out here and that we don't have any homeless families

"Some say a society can be judged by how it assists and cares for its most needlest citizens. I want to tip my hard hat to Senator Mike Crozier and to all of you for what we have done so far, especially that day last summer when we hammered nails and built model homeless shelters in the front of this Capitol. It dawned on me then, and is well worth remembering that, however complex life gets, we live in an extraordinary and unique place with wondrous ways of doing things.

"We have hardly been alone. The people of Haleiwa welcomed our first Weinberg Village for 50 families, and Oceanic Properties is building it. With help from AMFAC, we expect to break ground on our village in Waianae for another 60 families this month. Villages in Malaekahana and in Ewa should follow shortly.

"Through the Shelters-Without-Walls Program, the community of Hawaii Kai is already housing 51 families and Waimanalo has found shelter for another 40 families.

"Let me relate an incident to you that numbers don't cover. Last December, we were able to help a Sand Island couple move into a house for the first time in six years. Their young children, who had literally been born and raised on the beach, were happy beyond words. Human service providers were moved to tears as they watched the children on their hands and knees touching the carpet and staring in wonder at the stove — things that we all take for granted. The family was overwhelmed by the love shown by their neighbors.

"That's what our homeless program has been all about. And so I say to you, the City Council, the churches, the Weinberg Foundation, a host of government agencies and the good people of Hawaii, we have made a good start, and we will carry on. Thank you for your support.

"The homeless debate has legitimately raised questions about rental shortages.

"From 1980 to 1990, the average monthly rent for a single-family home on Oahu increased from \$660 to about

\$1,560 -- an increase of 137 percent. At the same time, rental vacancy rates have dropped as low as one percent and demand is continuing to outstrip supply.

"Therefore, I am proposing that the State increase its assistance to the three 'players' capable of increasing our inventory of affordable rentals -- government, the non-profit community, and private developers.

"In the past, the federal government provided substantial grants to states to construct and maintain rental housing. This is no longer the case. In addition, changes to the federal tax laws have reduced the incentive to invest in rental housing. Therefore, we must fill that vacuum with direct subsidies and look for other ways to make investments in rental housing attractive.

"I propose an additional \$63-million in direct subsidies, which combined with other forms of assistance will produce over 2700 units in the next two years.

"Too often, military and civilian residents are competing for the same rental units. Thus far, the federal government has not been as successful as it would like in getting the private sector to develop units on federal land. To relieve the competition, I will submit a bill to allow HFDC to participate in Section 802 housing construction of rental units on federally controlled lands.

"I also ask for your support in encouraging the federal government to continue the low-income housing tax credit which is scheduled to expire in six months. This tax credit, along with the State's tax credit which you approved three years ago, has resulted in 461 private units with another 175 more units scheduled for the upcoming year.

"Though few in number, and hampered by a lack of resources, the non-profit community plays an important role in providing housing, especially for those citizens who need the most assistance. And as Representative Virginia Isbell and her Housing Committee have so aptly pointed out, their efforts can be strengthened by the establishment of a Rental Housing Trust Fund. Thus, I propose we appropriate \$5-million from the General Fund for 'seed money' and then dedicate the income from the conveyance tax to this fund as a permanent source for grants and loans to build, preserve or rehabilitate rental units

"Interim construction financing is critical to a project's start-up, yet is difficult to obtain at reasonable rates. Therefore, I propose that we restructure the State's rental assistance program to free up approximately \$50-million that are now obligated, and use that sum to leverage, or 'blend' with the proceeds of revenue bonds to establish a \$100-million Rental Housing Interim Financing Revolving Fund. The fund will provide low interest interim construction financing to developers, non-profit organizations and governmental agencies for the building of affordable rentals.

"Until supply catches up with demand, rental prices will continue to be high. To provide immediate relief, I propose an increase in the renters' tax credit, from \$50 to \$85 per qualified resident.

"With both rents and the cost of housing rising dramatically in recent years, a highly speculative market only adds fuel to the fire. Consequently, I ask again for your support of an anti-speculation tax.

"In 1988, we launched a private and public sector initiative to build affordable homes across the State. We set a dual-sector goal of 61,000 affordable units by the year 2000. In the last five years, the State Land Use

Commission has opened up 12,615 acres of land for housing, representing over 51,000 homes, nearly 30,000 of which are affordable.

"If we were to break ground on all of those projects today, we would be half way to our goal. If we were to break ground, we would have homes for 51,000 more families. If we were to break ground, we would have nearly 30,000 affordable homes to fill our needs. If we were to break ground, we would provide not only homes, but jobs for our construction workers.

"Well, where are the houses you ask, and so do our families. Tied up in 'processing' and 'financing', we are told. Yet, what we all know is that you cannot build houses with excuses. Let's build them with action.

"First, to make more land available for housing, today I announce that as a part of the five-year boundary review process, we plan to open up an additional 5000 acres statewide in areas where infrastructure construction will be the fastest.

"Second, I propose time-is-money legislation which will require an even more expedited approval process of 60 days at the State Land Use Commission for private sector affordable housing projects. The legislation will also propose expedited processing at the county level, with the goal of 60-day processing unless the counties adopt their own fast-track processing.

"Third, while permanent mortgage financing is readily available at reasonable rates, interim construction financing is not. It's time to break the log jam. Today, we can do it, for I have received commitments from the Bank of Hawaii, First Hawaiian Bank (in alphabetical order), and the State Employees' Retirement System to provide funds for interim construction financing for private projects. Together, they will leverage a hefty \$300-million to stimulate immediate development.

"Fourth, we need to stimulate quick starts by developers and to reduce the purchase prices. Therefore, I propose that we grant an excise tax exemption to the builders of the first 10,000 affordable homes constructed by December 31, 1993.

"Fifth, we recognize that our 60 percent affordable housing formula depended on a robust market for high end homes. To adjust to today's market, we will temporarily offer greater flexibility to implement the policy. We have met with members of the Land Use Research Foundation -- the developers' representatives -- and others, reaching a consensus on several options to meet our requirements.

"Finally, private developers have told me that the necessary ingredients for a successful rental housing project are land, infrastructure, financing, and processing; and, because there are few things I like more than a good challenge, let me make one. Today, I offer any developer an excellent three acre parcel of land -- the former Pohukaina School site -- with all the infrastructure. And since it is in Kakaako, I can guarantee you quick processing and access to all our financing tools. Your job is to build good, reasonably priced rental housing on it. The only requirement is that first preference for tenants will be families referred by the Hawaiian Homes Program. That's the challenge. Show me your stuff. Thank you, Representative Hagino, for the idea.

"Last year, I submitted to you an action plan to resolve controversies relating to the Hawaiian Homes Trust. We knew that the plan would be the beginning of action, not the resolution itself. Now, with your help, we are in the midst of taking unprecedented steps that will shape the future of the Hawaiian Homes programs.

"For example, last year, I established a task force to resolve land claims, to clear title and to propose compensation for wrongful or improper withdrawals, transfers, takings or uses of the Hawaiian Homes Land Trust.

"The first proposal will be submitted to you this session. We propose a back rent payment of \$12-million. This will cover the land claims that have been verified so far. Obviously, the Task Force will continue its work until all compensation due has been paid. Our proposal seeks authorization to exchange lands. Hawaiian Home Lands needs to receive lands that are more easily developed for its beneficiaries -- buildable lands for actual houses now.

"Further, more resources are needed if we are going to place native Hawaiians on their own homesteads. Accordingly, I am requesting an additional \$25-million of capital improvement funds, for a total of \$38-million in fiscal year 1993. This will make available over 1000 homes and lots, including 400 homes at the Keystone Development in Nanakuli. Also, I am asking the State Land Use Commission and HFDC to promote Hawaiian Home Lands as an offsite option to fulfill affordable housing requirements.

"Finally, taking care of past wrongs is an important obligation, not only on the part of the State, but of the federal government as well. It is disturbing, and dangerous, that in addition to blocking every effort made by our congressional delegation to assist native Hawaiians, federal officials are now denying that they had any trust responsibility prior to statehood.

"We have catalogued the wrongs committed by the federal government under its watch, and they are grievous and undeniable. Most of the land claims we labor to address today were committed prior to 1959. Other wrongs continue to this very day. Two examples are the permanent reservation of trust lands without compensation or land exchange at Lualualei, and the discriminatory denial of federal dollars to Hawaiian Home Lands that are available to every other public housing agency. I have directed the Office of State Planning and the Attorney General to do whatever is necessary to finally hold the federal government accountable for these claims.

"While we are on the subject of federal responsibility, it is important for us to remember that this Trust was established in 1921 by federal law. Now, 71 years later, I have a message for the folks back in Washington: It's time to get serious about what you started. In 1983, the Federal/State Task Force ordered by the U.S. Department of the Interior recommended that the federal government and the state each provide \$125-million to Hawaiian Homes. In Hawaii, although it has been difficult at times, we have invested over \$167-million and are working on more. Mr. Federal Government, where is your share? It is past time to stop finger pointing from the sidelines and do what is right. Match or better us, dollar for dollar for native Hawaiians on Hawaiian lands.

"The preservation of our environment compels action from everyone immediately, because time is not on our side. That is why we teamed up with the federal government and the Nature Conservancy to produce 'Hawaii's extinction crisis.' It is our call to action and makes everyone a steward of the land.

"In the past, we joined together with communities across the State to preserve our natural heritage: The Heeia Wetlands, Mount Olomana, the Honokahua burial

grounds, the West Hawaii coastal wilderness, Makena Beach, the Waterfront Park, Kahoolawe, and our mauka watersheds, to name a few.

"Today, as stewards, we expand our call to action.

"Last year, you enacted laws for natural area partnership and forest stewardship programs which made it possible for private landholders and the State to jointly manage important private reserves. As a result of your action, we now have three new agreements to protect dryland and tropical rainforests. Because of this success, I am requesting \$500,000 on top of the \$300,000 already appropriated for next year to expand this program to other unique habitats.

"In addition, I believe that the protection of these private lands, as well as our State natural area reserves, should have a reliable source of funding. Therefore, I will submit for your consideration a bill for the permanent funding of up to \$4-million annually for these programs. Appropriately, the source of these funds will be revenues generated from leases of State lands.

"Also, I ask your support for an additional \$600,000 this year to halt the invasion of non-native plants and animals into our natural reserves.

"We must expand our vision of stewardship. Let me illustrate: The Kokia Cookei became extinct in its natural home on Molokai. All that was left was a cutting which had been grafted to a related plant on Oahu. To me, that is as near to total annihilation as a living thing can come. From this one graft came many, and with extraordinary pride, we brought it home to Molokai and replanted it. Really, a miracle when you think about it.

"Last Friday, I visited the Lyon Arboretum in Manoa. It is an Eden in our urban backyard. There, I saw a tissue bank where slivers of rare and endangered plants are preserved for future propagation. I can think of no venture more important than conservation and banking such plants, while we work to protect and nurture them in the wild. To do this, I request an additional \$500,000 for tomorrow's miracles.

"We all know that Hawaii is a center of nature's creativity. Now we must make it a center of conservation research and training. I ask you to support the University of Hawaii's supplemental request for conservation biology, research and training. I know what scientists and citizens can do when they put their heads and hands together to solve problems to protect the environment. Let us learn how to replenish our lands, protect them from non-native species and then teach the world. Let us make our University a leader in the science of biological conservation.

"Conservation and community education go hand in hand. I ask you to support a special \$1.4-million 'Aina Hoomalu' interpretive program for parks of distinction where residents can go to get in touch with what is really important.

"Even God's greatest creatures need our help. As you know, last week under my direction, the Attorney General sought and received a temporary restraining order to protect our State mammal, the Humpback whale, from vessels which disturb its migration through our waters. Make no mistake. Habitats on land and sea must be protected and will be protected by this administration.

"I have a theory about the people of Hawaii. It may have something to do with our distance from everyone else and our closeness to one another. We are not, and never have been, a people to get caught up in the malaise of the times.

"I was reminded of this by Gladys Brandt, who spoke at Hawaii Remembrance Day during the Pearl Harbor commemoration. As only someone with her grace and candor could do, she reflected that the people of Hawaii, unlike most of the United States, did not react with mistrust and suspicion for each other during World War II, even though the war came into our homes. 'With few exceptions,' she said, 'we affirmed our belief in the bond of community.'

"That message from the very hard times of the 40's applies to us today. Make no mistake. So much has changed. These are the 90's -- the days of empowerment, not paternalization; the days of supply-side management, not demand-side marketing; but this is still a time when everybody knows nobody can do it alone.

"For all the diverse and conflicting opinions in this room, we are bound by that principle -- by that bond of community -- and we must put it to work. It's a cliche when you say it, but it works when you do it.

"Let us not get trapped in the vise between doom and gloom. At a moment when the world seems to care less, let us care more; let us come together with our neighbors, provide for our families, build for our children, and believe in our dreams.

"It is our tradition. It is our future.

"Thank you."

Senate President Richard Wong then rose and stated:

"Governor Waihee, thank you very much for sharing with us some of your views. I have been in this building for a little while and I have heard a lot of State-of-the-State speeches. This is probably the longest, but I must say in all honesty, one of the more significant. It has been a very moving kind of experience for people who have been around this building for any length of time. Thank you.

"In a brief hour and twenty minutes, you have gone over the gamut of what is most important to Hawaii, namely, your mention of the family, about the health of the people of this State, about the shelter for the people of this State, and about the educational needs for our young people for Hawaii's future.

"I think you said it very uniquely ... citing someone who said it a long time ago, that a government or its leaders will be judged by their caring about its least members in their midsts, in terms of providing for themselves. Certainly, your agenda, ambitious as it is, will demand our attention.

"Again, Governor Waihee, I want to take this opportunity to thank you for a most moving speech. We, here in Hawaii, are truly unique and, hopefully, we will be able to take care of our own. Won't we, Malama?

"If there be no further business by the members of this Joint Session, I declare this Joint Session adjourned."

At 11:15 o'clock a.m., the President declared the Joint Session adjourned.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:31 o'clock a.m.

Representative Marumoto rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I noticed in the newspaper that two of our friends have passed away very recently. One of them was the husband of the Director of Human Services, Judge Barry Rubin. I didn't know him but we all know his wife and respect her very much, and I would like to extend my condolences to her.

"The other loss was Clem Judd who was the head of the Hawaii Hotel Association. I happened to have known Clem for many years, even before I was elected. I knew him well enough to call him 'Pudgy' which was his nickname and that is what his family called him. His death is a real blow to the tourism industry to which he devoted his professional life. I grieve for him because he did so much for young people. Sports was a large part of his life and he devoted many hours at Punahou School, his alma mater, to coaching young people and encouraging them.

"I would like to bid those two Aloha and I guess to these chambers again for the third time. We are told this is our final time in the Capitol. So to Judge Rubin and Clem Judd and to these chambers, I wish to say 'Aloha.'

"I am hoping that we can adjourn in the memory of our two lost friends today."

Representative Hagino then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I received a card from the Republican National Committee according me the honor of being a sustaining member for 1992. I want to thank the Republicans -- the Minority -- for nominating me for this great honor.

"I just want to note it in the Journal that my remarks are to the Republicans that when I opened the envelope, I 'Quayled' at the thought that they gave me this card."

Representative Metcalf then rose on a point of order and stated:

"I believe under the Rules of the House, under the Rules of Procedure, such points of personal privilege relate directly to things like lighting, the air conditioning, etc. and not to the humorous but off-point remarks of the two speakers."

Representative Tam then rose and stated:

"I have some education bills which I am willing to share, in terms of anybody wishing to support these bills. I have it on my desk for you to co-introduce, to sign, or support, and I do plan to have these bills decked today by the end of the day."

Representative Anderson then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to give a little information.

"Some people were calling me and wondering why I didn't show up for the State-of-the-State address. I was introduced and then unintroduced and Representative O'Kieffe escorted the Governor.

"I had a doctor's appointment and for the benefit of others, we had a Minority conference today and I missed

that because I had a therapy...doctor's appointment, and I will have one for all week. I have a deteriorating disk.

"I don't mind answering questions from the press, as far as the State-of-the-State address by the Governor or being there for our caucus on bills that we believe are important, but today, we are saying that the health of each individual here comes first so when you folks are feeling sick and you can't make it, I'll understand your plight.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Taniguchi then rose and stated:

"I believe the Minority Leader was out of order physically as well as. on the floor."

The Chair then said:

"I know we gave you an excuse for yesterday's State-of-the-State address. I understood your situation, Representative Anderson, and this is why you were excused. It was my error, in terms of going through the scenario, and I saw your name here and I made mention of Representative Anderson. But I realized that you were excused and so this is why I appointed your floor leader to escort the Governor."

Representative Anderson responded:

"I thank you, Mr. Speaker.

"If I may, it wasn't for you. It was for the people who had been calling me as far as the constituency.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, your loyal opposition would be amiss if it didn't say two things.

"The first, to welcome Representative Hagino now that he's a card-carrying Republican, gratis; and secondly, our leader's speech yesterday, Mr. Speaker.

"I think it was commendable that it was his most dynamic and charismatic speech. I think it was one that showed that there's a difference in the Governor's Office. I think, however, it's one that sometimes we like to sound like. If there's a political will, he wants to do something.

"I think that's what your loyal opposition represents, Mr. Speaker. That determination, that political will, to find out basically what needs to be done and then do it, and I commend the Governor for having represented that political will, and now the ball is in our court to implement.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Tenth Day.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Tenth Day was approved.

SENATE COMMUNICATION

Sen. Com. No. 5, transmitting S.C.R. No. 24, SD 1, entitled: "SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION URGING THE PRESIDENT AND THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES TO HONOR AND FULFILL THE FEDERAL TRUST OBLIGATIONS TO NATIVE HAWAIIANS," which was adopted by the Senate on January 30, 1992, was read by the Clerk and placed on file.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, S.C.R. No. 24 was adopted.

Representative Apo then rose and stated:

"I've got cornered to say a few words on it. We couldn't let this opportunity pass without at least making sure the members understood what the State of the State was as far as Hawaiians are concerned ... why this resolution is so important, and I'll try to keep my remarks short.

"Mr. Speaker, this Legislature is on record, at least as far back as 1978, as being supportive of the quest for native Hawaiians for justice and we have passed, on many occasions, resolutions addressed to the Congress and to the President asking that the issues and the breaches of trust be dealt with.

"The State, since 1982, has begun a program and has become very aggressive, at least to the extent that we can, and we were responsible for some of the breaches of trust and have aggressively pursued the issues and in the last two years, as we are all aware, we are in negotiations now, at least the Executive is, on the ceded land trust with the Office of Hawaiian Affairs and also of late, we are trying to deal with the native claims as far as the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act. So it is clear that both the Legislature and the Executive branch of government have taken the task and we are aggressive and we are trying to meet the problem head on.

"The problem is that the program was created by the Congress and the federal Executive and unless we get their cooperation, there is no way that we can stand alone in addressing all these breaches of trust. We are alarmed that there being several significant signals sent to us by the federal Executive, the latest of which is their attempting to declare the Hawaiian Homes program unconstitutional. If they are successful in doing that, we

would not even be able to maintain our status as indigenous people and as native Hawaiians.

"The Governor, I understand, intends to carry this resolution to Washington, D.C. with him on Monday where he is appearing before a Senate committee.

"I would like to thank all the members of this House and past members of this House for their support of Hawaiian issues.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair then stated:

"I have allowed Representative Apo to say a few words on this particular matter. I am sort of getting used to the terrain here so I just didn't hear his voice on my left for discussion. I have allowed him to say a few words on this because this is such an important Senate Concurrent Resolution that we would like the Governor to carry this on to the President of the United States."

Representative Anderson then rose and requested that Representative Apo's remarks be inserted into the Journal as his own as "I totally agree," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Amaral then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I think that the priest that was with us this morning raised the word that actually is a word that I have grown up learning -- the value of hoomananui. That value of patience is a value that is inherent and at the very core of what it means to be Hi waiian.

"I raise this point today because essentially the Senate Concurrent Resolution that we now have on our desks epitomizes the amount of patience that the native people of Hawaii have exerted. They have waited 70 years patiently for the wisdom of our leaders. I think, however, that it is time that the patience of the people be rewarded with justice. It is impossible for the people of Hawaii, for the native people, to know peace. It is impossible for the native people to know serenity. The native people will never have lokahi until and unless justice is finally brought to bear on this issue.

"And so I think all of us join our voices to urge the President and the Congress of the United States to honor and to fulfill the federal trust obligations to the native Hawaiian people, and I urge all of my colleagues to support this measure before us.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At 11:54 o'clock a.m., Representative Arakaki asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:15 o'clock p.m.

Representative Hagino then rose and stated:

"I'd like to say a few words before I introduce our honorees to the audience and to all our colleagues. I wanted to say a few words about what the National Geographic Society and Magazine means to all of us, and I refer you to a movie that I think all of us have seen. We see it every Christmas time.

"It's a movie by the great director, Frank Kaplan, of a wonderful wife, and it is the opening scene when the young George Bailey is at the soda fountain and he is mixing a sundae or a soda float for a girl and he asks her whether she would like to have coconuts sprinkled on the ice cream sundae, and she says 'no.' The young George Bailey says, 'You don't like coconuts? Say, brainless, don't you know where coconuts come from?' He pulls out a magazine and, of course, you know what magazine that is. He says, 'Look here, coconuts come from Tahiti, Fiji, Hawaii,' and the girl says, 'A new magazine? I've never Young George Bailey says, 'Of course seen it before.' you never saw it. I've been nominated for membership in the National Geographic Society. I'm going out exploring some day.'

"And I think that scene in the movie captures a lot for many of us when we were growing up, when we were kids, and we saw our very first National Geographic Magazine. I remember...I think I was in the third or fourth grade at Hilo Union School and I probably said the same thing, and all of you have probably said the same thing -- 'This is great, I'm going to go up the Nile; I'm going to climb Mount Everest; I'm going to go to Antartica...' and do all the things that we read about in the National Geographic Magazine.

"Unfortunately, just like George Bailey in the movie, we don't often get the opportunity to go exploring, and so I really say thank goodness for the National Geographic Society, for the Grosvenor family. The family has been synonymous with this Society. Thank you for giving us the privilege, at least by reading about these explorations, to attune us to distant lands and other cultures to learn about things, to teach the children of Hawaii, the children of America and the world, about the great and wonderful things about this world.

"I wanted to point out to my colleagues that the National Geographic Magazine and Society has many times featured Hawaii in their publications. I have on my desk just the publications from the middle 1970's through the very current issue. This month's issue has a story about the monk seals in the Northwest islands.

"National Geographic Society has been very charitable and wonderful to Hawaii and this is an opportunity, Mr. Grosvenor, to thank you and your Society for the splendid work that you have done to promote. . .in fact, your own model says, 'for the increase and diffusion of geographic knowledge." I think you've carried out that trust and that mission."

Representative Hagino then introduced Mr. Gilbert Grosvenor, Chairman of the Board of the National Geographic Society, and the honoree rose to be recognized.

Accompanying Mr. Grosvenor on the House floor were Mr. Charles Toguchi, Superintendent of Education; Ms. MJ Jacobsen, Manager of Broadcast Media Relations with the National Geographic Society; and Mr. Thomas Ohta, local representative and coordinator of the Hawaii Geographic Alliance.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Representative Anderson rose and said:

"Mr. Speaker, I have a parliamentary query.

"Mr. Speaker, yesterday we reconfirmed that we have adopted the House rules last year and voted on them and they are the permanent rules of the session. In the last rule, I believe, it says that as long as there is no conflicting rule, then Cushing's will be our guide, and I do have the memorandum sent to us on personal privilege and I checked to make sure there were no conflicting inquiries in the House, and it is part of Mason's which is almost verbatim. So I was wondering if this is going to become a rule of the House. It is my understanding, by parliamentary procedure, that we have to vote on this with two-thirds to make it a part of the rule.

"Is that true?"

The Chair responded:

"When we adopted Cushing's as our rule of parliamentary procedure, I believe Cushing's offers you a much more broader rule in terms of point of personal privilege, and we just put that in writing for you to understand what the interpretation of Cushing's to us is in that particular memo that went out to you."

Representative Anderson asked:

"What I'm asking is, if it's going to really be a part of our rules, could we not vote on it and make it so that everybody is in agreement that it is a part of whatever rule that is because now it's defined? Since Cushing's is very broad...

The Chair interrupted and stated:

"I think because of the broadness of Cushing's, I put that in writing for the members of the House so that I think it would give you some guidelines, in terms of what the rule is as I see it, in terms of the point of personal privilege. I think Cushing's gives the presiding officer much broader definition of the point of personal privilege but since the question is, what is it, and whether I would rule on some out of order and some not, I thought I would send out that memo so that we can at least have an idea as to what that particular rule implies."

Representative Anderson said:

"I am not disputing the fact. I agree with you wholeheartedly. I just wanted to know, as far as the parliamentary procedure was, do we get to vote on it? Is

it really a part of our rules or is this just a recommendation? I would just like a clarification."

The Chair answered:

"I think that's just as a recommendation, Representative Anderson, because we adopted Cushing's and Cushing's gave the presiding officer that broad latitude."

Representative Anderson answered:

"But this is not out of Cushing's, this is out of Mason's."

At this point, Representative Arakaki rose and stated:

"I think the subject has gone beyond the point of inquiry to debate. I would like to request a ruling or a short recess."

At 12:39 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:45 o'clock p.m.

At 10:55 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the House of Representatives and the Senate was called to order at 11:02 o'clock a.m. by the Honorable Daniel Kihano, Speaker of the House of Representatives, who stated:

"The purpose for this Joint Session is to honor the 1984 Nobel Peace Award recipient, The Most Reverend Desmond M. Tutu, Anglican Archbishop of Cape Town."

At this time, the House Clerk read the House Certificate, recognizing and commending the Most Reverend Desmond M. Tutu, Anglican Archbishop of Cape Town, for his steadfast commitment to promoting racial equality, human rights, and peace throughout the world, on behalf of the House and Senate.

The Speaker then presented The Most Reverend Desmond M. Tutu to the members of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii with greetings in Reverend Tutu's language -- Sau-bon-ah baba Tutu ningiani

Floral leis were presented to the honoree by Senator Lehua Fernandes-Salling and Representative Jackie Young.

The Most Reverend Desmond M. Tutu, Anglican Archbishop, then addressed the members of the Sixteenth Legislature, as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, Mr. President, thank you very much indeed for this distinct honor of addressing a joint session of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, a truly momentous occasion, and I learned it was arranged that you would move out of your normal Capitol building so that it would be easy for me to walk across from the Cathedral to come here. It is one of those oddities that I can have the privilege of addressing such an august diet in a foreign country. It cannot happen even now in my own country and just in case I end up falling on my head, it is always good for me to remember some of the things that have happened to me.

"Recently, we went to West Point, the military academy, and at the end of our visit, the cadets said, well, they wanted to present me with a cap. The cap which they gave me did not fit me. Now, a nice wife would have said, 'Well, the cap is too small.' My wife, just to keep me in order, said, 'His head is too big.'

"But seriously, I know that this honor has been bestowed on us, not for any personal achievement -- it is something that has been given to me in a representative capacity. It is to honor all the very many stalwarts of our struggle for justice, for peace, for reconciliation, for togetherness in our country. And one of the great privileges that I have had has been to come to gatherings and say, I know that in this one instance, I know I can speak without sounding presumptuous. I can speak knowing that I speak without fear of contradiction, that I speak on behalf of millions. I speak on behalf of millions in one instance of saying, thank you. Thank you to all those who have supported our struggle. Thank you for your love, thank you for your prayers, thank you for those of you who have, in the anti-apartheid movement, supported the imposition of sanctions because I want to assure you that, especially those economic sanctions, have helped us to come to the point we have reached in our country. Namibia has become an independent country because of the effectiveness of sanctions that stopped South Africa from continuing to fight in Angola. Sanctions have been effective. Nelson Mandella and others are out of jail today because of the effectiveness of the sanctions many of you have supported to be imposed on the government of our country.

"Our political organizations at home are now free to operate legally because of sanctions and we are at the threshold of exhilarating developments. There are many hiccups -- the hiccups of the violence happening in our country. But I want to say to you that the victory for the forces of good, of justice, of honesty, of love, of freedom -- that vistory is your victory as well. You played a substantial part in the freedom that is coming to South Africa and so, Mr. Speaker, Mr. President, very, very distinguished ladies and gentlemen, members of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, I want to When we celebrate our issue an invitation to you. freedom in South Africa, a freedom when Black and White will be able to live together as God intends us to live, we want to invite you to come to South Africa and we will be able to say to you when you arrive -- Aloha!

"Thank you very much."

The Speaker, at this time, introduced some special guests accompanying Archbishop Tutu, as follows: Mrs. Leah Nomalizo Tutu, the Archbishop's wife; Mr. John Allen, the Archbishop's aide; The Very Reverend H.T. Knight, Dean of St. Andrew's Cathedral; and The Right Reverend Donald P. Hart, Episcopal Bishop of Hawaii.

Floral leis were presented to the honorees by Senator Mary-Jane McMurdo, Senator Malama Solomon, Representative David Hagino and Representative Virginia Isbell.

The Speaker then stated:

"The Most Reverend Desmond M. Tutu is in Hawaii under the auspices of The Peggy Kai Memorial Speaker Fund of St. Andrew's Cathedral.

"I would like to say that it is really an honor for us to have the Archbishop Tutu with us here this morning. We feel honored that he had made some time to visit us here this morning."

President Wong then stated:

"Archbishop Tutu, Mrs. Tutu, it is indeed a pleasure and honor to have the opportunity to meet you and hear from you. In great anticipation of your visit by all members of the Legislature, particularly the Senate, I must pass this on to you, Archbishop Tutu. This morning we finished our Senate business in record time -- five minutes -- because nobody wanted to miss the opportunity of meeting you in person.

"At this time, the Speaker and I would like to pesent you with a certificate from the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii.

"Archbishop Tutu, thank you very much for allowing us the opportunity to meet you."

At 11:21 o'clock a.m., President Wong called a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The Joint Session reconvened at 11:33 o'clock a.m.

President Wong then continued:

"At this time, on behalf of the Senate, Mr. Speaker, I would like to thank you and the members of the House, in particular Representative David Hagino, for allowing the Senate to be a part of this truly honorable occasion. We appreciate this opportinity to share the very deep feeling we have for Reverend Tutu here in the Senate, along with the whole world.

"Again, Mr. Speaker, Representative Hagino, on behalf of the Senate, thank you very much for having us be a part of this event. Mahalo!

"If there be no further business, I hereby declare this Joint Session adjourned.

"Thank you very much."

At 11:35 o'clock a.m., the President declared the Joint Session adjourned.

At 11:36 o'clock a.m., on motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned until 2:30 o'clock p.m. tomorrow, Friday, February 7, 1992.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

I have known the named honoree the longest, for over ten years, as a member of her church. She typifies, I believe, a characteristic that's common to all the honorees today. They've demonstrated the courage of their convictions in being willing to sacrifice greatly for others.

"Ivy Olson, as well as her husband Doug, have been models for me in my life as community leaders. They both also have this natural spiritual quality about them. Ivy has, on numerous occasions, been willing to open her home and her heart to anyone, and I mean anyone, who calls for help or shows up on her doorstep at any hour of the day or night.

"The success of the Angel Network demonstrates to me that there's great potential in a decentralized community volunteer-based approach towards caring for others. There's vast goodwill out there -- a reservoir of goodwill -- that we need to be tapping. And the Angel Network symbolizes the success that can be.

"Mr. Speaker, I would like the opportunity to introduce you to the honorees at this time."

Representative Stegmaier then asked Mrs. Ivy Olson to stand to be recognized.

Representative Stegmaier continued:

"With Ivy Olson is a person that you all know for the various leadership hats that she has worn over the years. You may not know that she's also a leader of the Parish at neighboring Holy Trinity Church and one who has been willing to 'bury the hatchet' with the Lutherans, and has been willing to contribute much energy to the work of the Angel Network, has been highly instrumental, through her positive loving ways, in getting the East Oahu Housing Corporation, East Honolulu's homeless housing project, underway. I would like to recognize 'Sister' Naomi Correa and ask her to stand."

"Sister" Naomi Correa then rose to be recognized.

"I would also like to introduce you to Laverne Moore who, among other things, is the Chair of the Hawaii Kai Neighborhood Board, and who is on leave from her job as a teacher at Haihaione School, where my daughter goes, to assume the very challenging job of the Department of Human Services' liaison with the homeless. Laverne has inspired all of us, and in particular me, who were instrumental in working on a contribution that the Hawaii Kai community could make to the homeless problem by her unwavering commitment to finding a way for the Hawaii Kai community to do its part. I would like to ask Laverne to stand to be recognized."

Ms. Laverne Moore then rose to be recognized.

"I know that you know the next honoree, Mrs. Momi Minn Lee, a person who is well known to us for her work at the State Capitol and in other capacities. But I also want you to know that as a quiet supporter of this effort, she has been very instrumental in giving Ivy yet another burst of energy in moving forward to greater heights of accomplishment as a provider of social services. I would like Aunty Momi Minn Lee to stand to be recognized."

Aunty Momi Minn Lee then rose to be recognized.

Representative Stegmaier continued:

"By the way, if you include all of the activities of the East Oahu Housing Corporation and the Angel Network, there are now, at a minimum, 41 families who are being served by this program, and I want you to know that we are well on our way to reaching our goal of 55 families in the near future."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I shall be very brief but I wanted to footnote what Representative Stegmaier had said about Ivy Olson.

"Just a short note of history. A number of months ago, our community was in a crisis. Hawaii Kai was called the NIMBY community -- not in my backyard. We were the community that didn't care. That was a dilemma. We had to build shelters for the homeless. We wanted We had rejected the toolshed homes with dignity. approach and we wanted people to live and not be stigmatized. Faced with that dilemma, as often is the case in Hawaii Kai, the community got together, the leaders stepped forth. You've met the leaders -- the foursome -- and some others that are not here today. But the one that stood out above all and the one that had already put together the Angel Network -- Ivy Olson -really began to be the beginning of the solution which, as you see today, is well on its way to meeting our goals.

"The compassion, the understanding, and the practical approach of this lady has made Hawaii Kai an exemplary model for any of the other communities that will do other than the homeless village. We want to decentralize it and put it within the community itself.

"So, Ivy, on behalf of the community, on behalf of my colleagues -- thank you very much for caring, for your practical approach, and for making us all look kinder and gentler. And if I may be so bold, to invite all of my colleagues to come and have a look at your program, to see that it works, and it is something to be admired by the State.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Mrs. Ivy Olson received a Certificate of Recognition and a lei from Representative Stegmaier and orchid leis were presented to the other honorees by Representatives Cachola, Okamura and Ward.

At 3:00 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION

Committee on Judiciary

H.R. No. 78, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION HONORING AND COMMENDING THE COMMITMENT TOWARD EXCELLENCE OF HARRY J. CHINN," was jointly offered by Representatives Chang, Alcon, Anderson, Arakaki, Chun, Duldulao, Fukunaga, Hashimoto, Horita, Isbell, Kawakami, Okamura, Say, Taniguchi, Thompson, Tom, Yonamine and Young and was read by the Clerk.

On motion by Representative Chang, seconded by Representative Horita and carried, H.R. No. 78 was adopted.

At this time, Representative Chang rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, colleagues and honored guests, several weeks ago I had the unique opportunity to be in the audience of a standing room only premier showing of a very entertaining play. It was not a Broadway opening but a local production. The play was a musical drama called WHY?. WHY? is such a powerful and emotional play that when I looked around the audience, many young and old were teary-eyed.

"This is the play about the drug and child abuse in our local community. WHY? raises questions about today's morals and values. It goes one step beyond Just Saying No. And it asks the question: Why should one say no to drugs? It leaves the audience searching their conscience and their hearts.

"Mr. Speaker, this legislative body has worked very hard to educate and prevent substance and child abuse, funding the efforts of many non-profit agencies and organizations. But the play WHY? is a very different approach. These are very special projects which bring together students and adults as well as private businesses and public agencies to work together in a concerted effort for a drug-free society.

"Two private companies -- Kaimana Construction and Servco Pacific -- are sponsoring the play in partnership with the Department of Education. Not only are they underwriting the cost of the play so that the public may attend free of charge, but they are also awarding scholarships to the talented student actors.

"About the actors. The talented actors are local high school students and the adult cast are from Servco Pacific management and staff.

"Today, I am thankful for this opportunity to honor the author of this excellent play -- Mr. Harry J. Chinn. Mr. Chinn is an executive with Servco Pacific and was a retired lieutenant with the Honolulu Police Department. He has devoted over two years to this project. He sends a strong message for hopes of a drug-free community and safe schools. He portrayed the double standard that parents reflect, that parents expect their children to not abuse drugs when the children recognize that alcohol too is a drug.

"WHY? is scheduled for performances throughout the State, including Honolulu, the Big Island, Kauai and Maui. The next performance is tomorrow night at 7:00 p.m. at the Moanalua High School cafetorium. I encourage you all to encourage your community to see this play.

"Mr. Speaker, it gives me great pleasure to introduce this very talented, compassionate, and selfless man, Mr. Harry J. Chinn.

"Accompanying Mr. Chinn are two very special men who contribute so much of themselves and their companies to our community -- the President of Kaimana Construction, Mr. Harry Y.H. Kim, Jr.; and representing Mr. George Fukunaga, Chairman of the Board of Servco Pacific, is his son, Group Vice President Mark Fukunaga."

"In the audience is Mr. Chinn's daughter who is with Kaimana Construction and has been coordinating the presentation of this play throughout the State full time, Ling Su Chinn; and Karen Iwamoto, Servco Pacific's Governmental Affairs Committee member."

The honorees all rose to be recognized and Certificates of Recognition and leis were presented to the honorees by various Representatives.

Representative Arakaki moved that H.B. No. 3860, HD 1, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Arakaki then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I want to speak in favor of House Bill 3860, HD 1, and start out by recognizing Chairman Terrance Tom who, I believe, is still at his hearing, and Representative Souki for their immediate response to this crisis.

"I also want to urge all the members to respond expeditiously to move House Bill 3860, HD 1, which provides needed funding for Medicaid. We were told that the funds will run out, ironically, on February 14th -- Valentine's Day.

"But I think this bill represents a response and demonstrates our major compassion and concern for this population which is most at risk and most in need of health care. I am talking about the poor, the elderly, the disabled and young children. In fact, in the past three years, our Legislature, as a matter of policy, has expanded eligibility for the elderly to prevent spousal impoverishment for pregnant women and young children, and we also expanded to a hundred percent of eligibility young children up to the age of eight.

"Mr. Speaker, this past October, you sent me to a national conference on controlling health care costs and what I heard there was a lot of dismay from other states which are facing deficit budgets along with these increased Medicaid costs. And for the most part, their response has been to ration care either by limiting eligibility, limiting treatment, or limiting the number of providers who could provide health care and there was a consensus that if these trends were allowed to continue, many state budgets would be bankrupt. Almost everyone, all the elected officials there, recognize the need for the federal government to step in and look at the national health care policy. And these are both Republicans and Democrats alike.

"We heard President Bush's response to this. At this point, I would say, it's a little too little and too late. While many of them were envious of Hawaii's system of health care, there is an obvious need to address the spiraling cost, especially here in the State of Hawaii, because, obviously, by doing this type of crisis budgeting, it derails our ability to do better planning and it also cuts into other areas that we need to spend our monies on.

"So I think we need to pass this bill, but I would also want to urge that we really consider health care costs and ask the departments involved to look at alternatives, including issues of primary care and how we can prevent more expensive costs. We also need to look at mental health because those are the most expensive types of treatment. We also need to look at elderly health care costs because right now ten percent of the population is utilizing about 75 percent of our health care resources. So, hopefully, this Legislature can look at a lot of these other issues while passing this bill to meet the immediate need.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Alcon then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I would like to speak in favor of this bill, Mr. Speaker, because of the fact that in my district of Kalihi, there are a lot of people who are depending upon this type of bill. You know very well, Mr. Speaker, that the benefits have been expanded by the federal government

but then they did not give us the money to spend to cure this problem, Mr. Speaker, by the \$50-million request to expand or to proceed.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 3860, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATED TO MEDICAID," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes, with Representatives Chun, Duldulao and Tom being excused.

Ultimately the court may decide, in the light of the political climate, and that's the crux, that the case was frivolous. This could have a chilling effect upon those public interest groups, community groups or individuals. That result is not in the best interest of our society.

"And, furthermore, by passing this bill, we're going to enable government departments, corporations and others to use the threat of a hundred percent of attorney's fees

being assessed against those public interest groups as a cloud or a hammer to silence legal opposition.

"I think this is a very serious bill. I'd ask all of you to look at it and reconsider it because you tell me, as you go back into the community, which community group that you know that might oppose a project in your district would feel confident enough that they would be treated in the court in a manner that would assure that they would not be assessed a hundred percent of the attorney's fees for opposing some project or some action.

"I think this is a very bad step for us to do and I think its ultimate result will be silencing of the very opposition that we need to hear and encourage.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The veterans of this State are outraged at what we're doing, and the Vietnam War will never be over for them as long as we persist in giving and then taking away.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

No. 91, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION CONGRATULATING THE DISTINGUISHED RECIPIENTS OF THE 1991 HAWAII EDUCATOR AWARD," was jointly offered by Representatives Santiago, Kihano, Apo, Metcalf, Thielen, Marumoto, Alcon, Arakaki, Baker, Bellinger, Bunda, Chun, Fukunaga, Hagino, Hashimoto, Hirono, Honda, Horita, D. Ige, Ihara, Kanoho, O'Kieffe, Okamura, Oshiro, Say, Stegmaier, Takamine, Taniguchi, Thompson, Tom and Yonamine and was read by the Clerk.

On motion by Representative Santiago, seconded by Representative Apo and carried, H.R. No. 91 was adopted.

Representative Santiago then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, we are all very much aware of the important role our educators play in the lives of our youth and although at times these are perhaps taken for granted or overlooked, it is indeed a pleasure to see excellence in this field awarded in this way.

"On November 8th, six of Hawaii's educators received this award which included a very well deserved monetary gift. This award was established in Hawaii in 1990 in conjunction with the Milken Family Foundation of Los Angeles. It is presented on the basis of exemplary teaching and leadership ability, professional growth, achievement, and commitment to educational excellence.

"It is, therefore, an honor and a privilege for me today to introduce to you Mr. Speaker, and to all of you my colleagues, the winners of the Hawaii education awards.

"Unfortunately, three of the recipients were not able to make it today -- Mr. Milton Shishido who is the Principal of Waipahu High School; Ms. Lenora Kunimoto from Waiakea High School on the Big Island; and Mr. Larry Ginoza from Waianae High School."

Representative Santiago then asked the following honorees to stand to be recognized: Ms. Sharon Nakagawa, Principal of Waialua Elementary School; Ms. Francine Fernandes, Principal of Kailua Elementary School; and Mrs. Claire Furukawa, a teacher from Kalani High School.

Representative Santiago continued:

"If I may, I would like to, at this time, take the opportunity to just say a few words about Sharon Nakagawa.

"Mr. Speaker, Waialua Elementary School, which is in my district, has a principal who is very special to the community, and that is Sharon. She has done a tremendous and outstanding job for the elementary school. She has demonstrated her ability to motivate her students, the staff, and the parents through innovative educational programs, and she's involved in the entire community, the likes of which is really phenomenal.

"Sharon has a special kind of leadership. She believes in the children and that they can learn in different ways, using their various talents. I know that the parents and students appreciate Sharon, her dedication to Waialua Elementary School, and I am pleased to have this honor and opportunity to extend my personal congratulations, my thanks, and my aloha to Sharon.

"Mr. Speaker, at this time, I would like to give my colleagues the opportunity to recognize the principals or teachers from their respective districts."

The Chair recognized Representative Oshiro and he stated:

"Mr. Speaker, over the past seventeen years, Milton Shishido has, in one way or another, touched the lives of thousands of young people throughout our State. As an administrator, Milton has provided a tremendous amount of leadership and encouragement to all of his teachers and support staff. By allowing his faculty to pursue their ideas and to foster creativity, Waipahu High School has developed a number of nationally recognized educational programs and we are very, very proud of that.

"As an educator, Mr. Speaker, Milton has encouraged his students to overcome the numerous hurdles and obstacles that periodically appear in one's young life. By adopting an open-door policy to provide his students the opportunity of voicing their opinions and providing a forum for unabated discussions, Milton has attained the respect of his students and has, at the same time, significantly enhanced the quality of education at Waipahu High School.

"Mr. Speaker, while these accomplishments are numerous and immense, Milton remains a soft-spoken man who essentially lets his actions speak louder than his words. And although he could not be with us today, Mr. Speaker, to you, Milton, wherever you are -- I'm sure you're at Waipahu High School working very, very hard -- on behalf of Speaker Kihano, Representative Duldulao, Representative Amaral and all the members of the State House of Representatives, we would like to thank you, Milton, for your dedication, your hard work, and for all the aloha that you've offered to the students and faculty of Waipahu High School, to our community, and to our State.

"When I visit Kailua Elementary School, it's really clear that what she is doing works. The students are happy, they're motivated, they're excited, and the whole campus is alive with youngsters who are learning in the true sense of that meaning.

"She also involves the parents and has transformed the normal Parent/Teacher/Student Association meetings into occasions that bring students, parents and teachers in closer informal contact, and it's a way of accomplishing her chosen mission to touch each child to do his or her best. She is truly an example of what is the finest in

education in our State, and I'm very proud that she has received this award which she sincerely deserves.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair recognized Representative Marumoto who then stated:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

"I'm so happy that Claire Furukawa of Kalani High School is with us today and we are able to honor her. It's only a shame that her husband and daughter and five stepsons are not here also to see her so honored. But I think I speak for all the students at Kalani High School and the representatives of the Kalani complex -- Representatives Ward, Ihara, Tatibouet and Say -- to wish Claire welcome and honor her for her work. She's been wonderful. After 31 years as a teacher, she's still described as dedicated, as high energy, as enthusiastic, as a spark plug, as an inspirational teacher, and we thank her for everyday that she's been in the classroom. This master teacher is an example of what has made Kalani High School one of the best academic schools in the State. She's regarded as a master teacher and we are very happy to have her here today.

"I would just want to say 'mahalo' for everything, Claire, and best wishes in your future endeavors.

"Mahalo."

The Chair recognized Representative Apo who then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, on behalf of Representative Peters and myself, I would like to offer a few remarks regarding Larry Ginoza.

"Mr. Speaker, I know Larry well because I was teaching at Waianae High School when he was the Vince Lombardi of Waianae. I would tell you that he is as his win/loss records go. He is one of the top ten high school coaches in the nation today.

"What impressed me about Larry Ginoza is, as important as football and winning football games was to him, he was more interested in his players as people first and football players second. Larry Ginoza, way before the Department of Education instituted the 2.0 rule at Waianae High School — this goes back to 1973 — and while I was teaching, every two weeks he would send around this progress checks that teachers have to fill out in all the classes that his players were in and I have to tell you, he had some tough times. Without hesitation, he would bench a player for either inappropriate behavior, on or off the field, or if they weren't keeping up with their grades. And I remember a couple of playoff games when some key players sat out the game and he wouldn't let them even suit up if they weren't towing the mark.

"His teams that he fielded, and this was a period when Waianae was taking a heavy bad rap from the media as being the worst place in the world and our kids were the awfulest kids in the world, he would field teams with such class and with such dignity which never had a fight in all the years that he was the coach.

"He sends his aloha to us today and appreciates our recognition.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair recognized Representative Tam who then stated:

"On behalf of the Education Committee, as the Chairman for the Education Committee of the House of Representatives, and the rest of my colleagues here -- 50 colleagues in the House of Representatives, I would like to thank you six educators who have been awarded the Hawaii Educator Award for giving devoted services toward our educational system.

"We do have quality education here although people may say that we do not. Each of you will be given a suite personally for yourself or for your spouse too, and I wish you all the best of luck in the future.

THIRD READING

H.B. No. 3103, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that H.B. No. 3103, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Anderson rose and stated:

"Very briefly, Mr. Speaker, I am going to speak against the bill; however, I wanted to thank Chairman Souki for coming over and explaining it. I can agree with him except for the bill itself which points out that the Legislative Auditor says that when it comes to special and revolving funds, et cetera, et cetera, it should be self-sufficient and that, in fact, we have never been in favor as a group of conservatives, I guess you could call it, we have never been in favor of special funds, revolving funds, et cetera, and that's the only reason that I will be going no.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Ward then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"Following with my colleague, this bill points out flaws in what happens to be 150 to 200 small businesses that this government is running, and they are called special funds. Some of them are gloated in the purpose of our transfer today is that there are some excesses. According to the Hawaii Tax Foundation, there are \$3-billion of excess funds. If we look at all of our collective special funds, there are \$3-billion out there.

"My second reason for reservations, Mr. Speaker, is that the Legislative Auditor has warned us, collectively and individually, that we are not to encourage the creation nor the continuation of special funds because one-third of our budget is already locked up in special funds, and the bottom line of what he said is that if we keep doing special fund funding, all of us can go home because we'll not have anything else to do here.

"Thirdly, Mr. Speaker, is the constitutionality. We are the keepers of the purse and every dollar that this body spends, this State spends, we should do as we are doing today. We should vote on it, it should be discussed before the body, and basically this means that the bottom line is that these funds that we are voting on today actually belongs in the special funds.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 3103, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SUPPLEMENTARY APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1992," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Anderson voting no, and Representative Hiraki being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 3103 had passed Third Reading at 12:40 o'clock p.m.

ORDER OF THE DAY

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION

H.R. No. 94, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION CONGRATULATING INES CAYABAN, GENEVIEVE AKANA NAHULU, AND DR. ROBERT E. GIBSON FOR THEIR LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENTS AND CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE STATE OF HAWAII," was jointly offered by Representatives Young, Duldulao, Peters, Bainum, Cachola, Alcon, Amaral, Baker, Bellinger, Chang, Chun, Hagino, Hashimoto, Honda, Horita, Ihara, Kanoho, Kawakami, Metcalf, Morihara, Okamura and Santiago and was read by the Clerk.

On motion by Representative Young, seconded by Representative Duldulao and carried, H.R. No. 94 was adopted.

Representative Young rose and proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"Members, in these chambers we often speak of the importance of investing in the future, of the need to

insure that our children have the best education and the best health care system.

"We dream and work towards providing the kind of legislation that will allow opportunities for our children to be housed, to be nourished, and to be cherished.

"Well, Mr. Speaker and colleagues, all of you here today in the audience, when we were children, the people we honor today -- Genevieve Akana Nahulu, Ines Cayaban and Doc Gibson -- were in the schools, in the community, working to ensure the best for our future. Our lives have all been touched and enriched by these three individuals.

"Genevieve and Ines are the subject of two biographies. These books are the outcome of a project I initiated when I was with the Department of Education. These books were written in celebration of women's history and I have copies of them here on my desk.

"Not much of women's history has been documented. When women tell their life stories, it tends to be about human relationships and family history as women are most often the bearers of family culture.

"The oral historian/editor of these two books is Yvonne Yarber, a former Senior Class President of Waianae High School, who, with her husband, Curt Madison, spent a year recording and writing about the lives of Genevieve and Ines. These books have been distributed to all the public schools in Hawaii.

"Let me speak now about Genevieve Akana Nahulu who lives in Nanakuli. Her family began living there when the homesteads opened up in 1929. She graduated from St. Andrews Priory and has lived in Nanakuli since then. She is the mother of five children and, by the way, three of her children are here today -- Barney, Lambert and Albert -- sitting in the back there..." and asked them to stand and wave. "They are having a family reunion on Sunday in Nanakuli. She's also a grandmother, a great grandmother. Her father, Albert Nahulu, was a state representative in the Territorial House of Representatives.

"The book is rich about her early experiences -growing up in Kalihi, building her homestead house, and many glimpses into the Hawaiian culture.

"Quoting from the book: 'She is a Hawaiian woman whose story is about the evolution of a family mother to a community mother. She will quickly point out that there are many others like her who quietly give their time and love for the good of their community. Genevieve is a master in the way she has combined her family skills with her profession to change a community for the better. Always evident is her profound respect for other people. She taught at Nanakuli and Waianae Intermediate for over 25 years, mostly special education classes. She retired from teaching in 1979. She was the museum curator at Nanaikapono. Her philosophy of teaching is 'maka hana e ike ai' -- by doing one learns. She still keeps busy weaving lauhala, but calls herself a student.'

"She made a lot of difference in peoples' lives, especially in the homestead. In fact, some people feel like she saved their lives.

"Members of the House, I am pleased to present to you, Genevieve Akana Nahulu. Presenting the certificate and lei will be Representatives Apo, Kanoho and Kawakami.

Representative Shon then rose and stated.

"I would like to say a few words on one of the honorees, Dr. Robert Gibson.

"A couple of years ago when I was teaching history, I came across a book called 'The One Hundred.' It's a ranking of the most influential persons in history and I recommend this to everyone because of the fascinating journey through one's priorities and one's standards. And ever since I came across that book, every year I have made my own list of the people who I knew personally and most respected and felt that they really made a contribution and whose lives are lives that I try, in a small way, to emulate.

"A couple of years ago, when the Board of Directors of the Hawaii Democratic Movement was sitting around our living room, we wanted to really get a feeling for who we were. We went around the room and each person gave a of their interests and passions accomplishments and involvement, and Dr. Gibson was among us in that group. For over an hour, we were just spellbound with a life of incredible dedication, accomplishment, inspiration and leadership to many, many different phases of education, involvement in the Pacific, involvement in many, many causes that are dear to those of us who were in this room. And ever since that time, every year when I make my list of those who I most respect and most emulate and most want a part of my life to follow, on that list is Dr. Robert Gibson, and I am very, very honored to even know this gentleman and to count him as one of my friends.

"I just wanted to say, 'thank you very much,' Doc, 'you've done a wonderful job, and keep on going'."

Representative Young continued:

"Thank you, Representative Shon, for those kind words for Dr. Gibson. I will come to his remarks in a few minutes.

"Our next honoree is Ines Cayaban.

"Nana Ines Cayaban is an 88-year old Filipino woman and pioneer in Hawaii's public health. She first came to the islands as a young woman in 1931, after graduating from nursing school in Manila in 1928. Believe it or not, all of these people carry appointment books and it's very difficult to have time with them.

"She worked at Palama Settlement from 1931 to 1944 in public health. Mrs. Cayaban recalls the tension and misunderstanding between ethnic groups here at the time and worked hard against those negative images. Ines has done much to promote ethnic diversity and harmony in Hawaii.

"She then worked as a life insurance agent from 1944 to 1960. She also did cancer health education beginning in 1949. She was a supervisor in the tuberculin skin testing program from 1960 to 1970. She retired but then founded the Filipino nurses organization in 1971.

"She says, 'My life was not all work and no play. And although I vowed to put career before romance, I did eventually marry,' and her husband, Mr. Cayaban is here with her today.

"Her story is one of community service, dedication to education, positive thinking and vitality.

"And again, Mr. Speaker, we have copies of these two books to be presented to you after the floor presentation.

"A little later on, presenting the certificate and leis for Mrs. Cayaban will be Representative Alcon, Representative Hiraki and Representative Bainum."

Representative Young continued:

"Last and certainly not least, and thank you, Representative Shon, for your great remarks about Doc.

"There was a headline in the paper just a few days ago, and it had a picture of Doc. Gibson and it said, 'Lobbyist 94 Boost Long Term Care Plan.' So all of you who are in the area of the health field have seen Doc come to our offices at the State Capitol.

"He retired after 45 years as an educator, is the founder and leader of the Kokua Council for Senior Citizens, and for thirteen years had a show on KHVH radio.

"Doc Gibson has achieved a distinguished career in international education, having served as a member of the California school system, as director of the education program for Japanese American internees during World War II, as educational advisor to the U.S. occupation forces in postwar Korea, and as the first civilian director of education in the U.S. Trust Territories of the Pacific Islands.

"He also has been a Democrat for over 65 years, and Doc Gibson has always embraced liberal ideas. He was convinced the Democratic Party did indeed have a great philosophy. He said, 'Real democracy is community involvement and there are so many possibilities in the power of involvement. You can determine your own destiny. Our government is responsive to people so you can make a difference. Not to sound like a preacher, but it's true -- it is more blessed to give than to receive.'

"Unfortunately, his wife, Ida, had another appointment and was unable to be with him here today, but I am very pleased to honor Doc Gibson.

"In the audience also is Dr. Jeanette Takamura from the Office of Aging who is here to honor him also, and Dr. Lindel Wheeler from the Department of Education who actually had these books printed after I left the Department of Education, and these books will be available for members to see on the lives of Genevieve Nahulu and Ines Cayaban.

"Presenting the certificate and leis to Doc Gibson will be Representative Shon, Representative Fukunaga and Representative Ihara."

Representative Alcon then rose and stated:

"It is an honor to speak in behalf of Mrs. Ines Cayaban. As you know, Mr. Speaker, she is known among the Filipino community as Nana Ines. Very seldom do they know that her last name is Cayaban.

"Nana Ines has been a tireless worker for the Filipino community as stated by Representative Young. She is a tireless worker in understanding with the other ethnic groups and at the age of 88, she is still very active. She is the advisor of the Cagayan Club of Hawaii, a very active organization, and as has been said a while ago, she also organized the Filipino Nurses Association of Hawaii, and in addition to that, she is also an outstanding advisor to the Filipino Women's Club of Hawaii

"Mr. Speaker, with her today is also a very famous man. In fact, I would like to honor him also because of the fact that he was the second Filipino who graduated

from the University of Hawaii. The fourth one, as you know, was the late Fortunato Teho. And also, Mrs. Cayaban has brought to us, when we were still in the other Capitol, the Cagayan Valley singers, a group of young students coming over to show us the cultures of the Philippines.

"Mr. Speaker, I would also like to pay tribute to Dr. Gibson because of the fact that I always look forward to his commentaries on KHVH on Viewpoint. And as we all know, Mr. Speaker, Dr. Gibson works for us senior citizens, and I wish that he would be very successful in getting the long term care.

"Last but not least, I would also like to pay tribute to Mrs. Nahulu for all her accomplishments and, Mr. Speaker, she is also from Kalihi.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Duldulao then rose and stated:

"Nana Ines has been serving our community for 61 years now and still going. As you can see, at the age of 88, she still possesses the radiant Filipina beauty. I am honored to have known both of you, and I respect you and love you dearly.

"Nana Ines, if I can recall right, is the first Filipino nurse in the islands, and at the present time she is still very active -- very active -- in the Filipino community.

"In behalf of the Filipino community, we would like to thank you for your tireless devotion and also appreciate your contributions to our society.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tatibouet then rose and stated:

"I also would like to commend Ines Cayaban. I have known Ines for several years. We share the same middle name -- Ines. And besides that, it was a great honor last year for the Girl Scouts Council of Hawaii to recognize Ines as the Living Treasure in the State of Hawaii.

"She was an outstanding woman inasmuch as she was the first woman member of the Palama Settlement, and she has bridged the gap between Filipino women and a much needed help in human services here on Oahu as Representative Young explained in detail. She's been a true advocate for the women and girls from the Philippines who came to America, as she did in search of a new life and in search of freedom.

"Ines has emerged as a tireless crusader, nurse, teacher and friend to thousands of women who found her in their time of great need. And it is my hope that the young women of Hawaii will continue to look upon Ines Cayaban as a mentor and as a courageous woman and who is looked up by all of us.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At this point, Representative Young asked the honorees to stand "so we can honor them with a round of applause."

The Chair added:

"Mrs. Cayaban was one of the very few that had the chance to change my diapers when I was a little child, and I am not ashamed to say that."

Representative Cachola then rose and stated:

I have known Nana Ines and Tata J.O. way back. They really touched a lot of lives and one of them is me.

"When I came here in 1971, the first couple to help me out was Tata J.O. and Nana Ines Cayaban. We sat together at the Susannah Wesley Community Center as board of directors and with Tata J.O. Cayaban at the Kalihi YMCA. They are always there. They have a saying -- they are retired but never tired. They always say that in a very positive way.

"In all my elections, they are my secret weapons. They always come down and help me out and that's why, Mr. Speaker, I keep winning.

"To all of you, our honorees, may God bless you.

"Thank you."

Representative Arakaki then rose and stated:

"We do owe a lot to these great role models that we have before us and I would like, for all of us, to pay tribute to them once again, and we should stand and give them a round of applause."

The members of the House rose and gave the honorees a round of applause.

At this time, Certificates of Recognition and leis were presented to the honorees by the repesentatives previously mentioned by Representative Young.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Representative Hagino, for the Committee on Water, Land Use, and Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 83-92) recommending that H.B. No. 3606, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

"This House Draft 1 deletes that section and I would like, as it goes on to Finance, for the Finance Chairman to consider three important points: (1) There are dozens and dozens of TMK's in that valley; (2) The study was supposed to show which were the important land for saving and particularly useful in having historical importance; and (3) Without the important land, let those be sold in fee to farmers who are already farming down there and who have expressed in several hearings the desire to want to buy them.

"With those comments, Mr. Speaker, I would like this bill to go up at Third Reading."

Representative Hagino then rose and stated:

"The previous speaker mentioned that House Bill 3606, as originally introduced, had a very limited intent and he stated that the amendments include such things as to purchase various pieces of property in Waipio Valley. I do want to clarify that. I didn't want the members or the public to think that we stuck in a number of amendments that were not necessarily the intent of the original bill.

"What happened, Mr. Speaker, was that we heard four bills on Waipio Valley. Each of them had an individual specific subject matter and each of those four bills received favorable testimonies and received the support of the full Committee membership at that time or who were present at that hearing. And rather than passing out four bills, in trying to keep up with the example set by the Environmental Protection Chairman to recycle and save paper, we folded it all into one bill but all four purposes were testified to and discussed and there was no intention to put in additional measures that were not discussed.

"That's why House Bill 3606 has an amendment. But all four measures were given full attention. The intent of this Committee was to. . .if there is going to be a lot

purchase, that priority be given to the Bishop Museum land and not to the lands that are held by private individuals.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative O'Kieffe then rose and asked whether or not the Chairman would yield to a question, to which Representative Hagino replied:

"Mr. Speaker, normally I have no compunctions about yielding to questions, but on this matter I don't want to yield to a question because, with all due respect to my friend Representative O'Kieffe, he is a member of the Committee and the questions could have been directed at the decision-making."

The Chair said:

"Representative O'Kieffe, the answer is no."

Representative O'Kieffe thanked the Chair.

"Mr. Speaker, I vote no on H.B. No. 2740.

"Mr. Speaker, this bill is full of hot air! We have no business spending \$15,000 to promote hot air ballooning, especially when we haven't given our schools the money they need to repair broken fire alarm systems. School safety first -- then we can think about hot air."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2740, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR HOT AIR BALLOON INTERNATIONAL AND NATIONAL EXPOSURE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Cachola's remarks are as follows:

"This bill provides funds for establishing a visitor information office in Brussels, Belgium.

"Europeans have long vacations, high income and high prices, and therefore tend to travel overseas very often. According to the Hawaii Visitors Bureau (HVB), in 1990, the United Kingdom and Germany each contributed more visitor-days than any Asian market except Japan. Some European countries have the highest expenditures per person per day, after Japan. Europeans also have a greater tendency to visit the neighbor islands. The State's marketing effort currently assigns a high priority to attracting multi-island visitors, such as Europeans, in order to improve the neighbor island economies.

"Belgians, French and other Europeans tend to make careful vacation plans and thus require extensive information, which underscores the need for a continued, if not increased, presence in Brussels.

"The upcoming European unification, with the establishment of the political seat in Brussels, combines the diverse nations into a single market of 300 million people, of which only 150,000 came to Hawaii in 1990. Tremendous opportunities exist for Hawaii and other

travel destinations that choose to etablish a presence in Europe.

"Twenty seven states and two territories have recognized this and set up an office in Brussels. A Hawaii Visitor Information Office in Brussels would ensure that Hawaii is not left behind in the scramble for the European market.

"This bill would establish a permanent Hawaii presence in Brussels, Belgium, the political center of the European community.

"I urge my colleagues to vote in favor of this bill."
