The House of Representatives of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, convened at 11:42 o'clock a.m., with the Vice Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Father Bob O'Donnell of the Holy Trinity Parish, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Kihano, Okamura, O'Kieffe, Tajiri, Yonamine and Young, who were excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Thirty-Second Day.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative Anderson and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Thirty-Second Day was approved.

Sen. Com. No. 363, returning House Bill No. 2327, HD 1 (SD 1), entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE IV, SECTIONS 4 AND 6, OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF HAWAII TO SPECIFY THAT THE REAPPORTIONMENT COMMISSION SHALL USE THE TOTAL NUMBER OF PERMANENT RESIDENTS COUNTED IN THE LAST PRECEDING UNITED STATES CENSUS INSTEAD OF THE NUMBER OF REGISTERED VOTERS FOR PURPOSES OF DETERMINING REAPPORTIONMENT DISTRICTS," which passed Third Reading in the Senate on March 12, 1992, in an amended form.

By unanimous consent, further action on H.B. Nos. 2322, HD 1, and 2327, HD 1, as amended by the Senate, was deferred, and in accordance with Article III, Section 15 of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, printed copies of H.B. Nos. 2322, HD 1, SD 1, and 2327, HD 1, SD 1, were made available to the members of the House at 11:30 o'clock a.m.

"I am disappointed that the State can take a position like this. If there's a need out there, let us address it. The concern I am having is that this program works, there's a waiting list, we got to get people onto the program, but by deleting the funds we take two steps backwards, and I seriously hope that we would be able to address this issue down the road through the budget and appropriating more dollars to a program that works.

"Thank you."

At 11:52 o'clock a.m., Representative Arakaki asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:57 o'clock a.m.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

The Clerk read H.R. No. 171 and H.C.R. No. 161, congratulating the seventeen parties on the adoption of the Codesa Founding Charter, urging them to continue working for a multiracial and democratic political system for South Africa, and pledging the support of Hawaii, which were offered on March 4, 1992.

On motion by Representative Lee, seconded by Representative Ihara and carried, H.R. No. 171 and H.C.R. No. 161 were adopted.

Representative Lee rose to speak in support of H.R. 171 and H.C.R. 161, stating:

"The 20th Century began with Rudyard Kipling's 'white man's burden' and is now approaching the 21st Century with Martin Luther King's 'dream'.

"Martin Luther King's 'dream' is not limited to black people in America and South Africa, but also includes white people in Eastern Europe. We look forward to one day, very soon I hope, when the yellow people in China will also realize their own dream.

"The resolutions before us were initially drafted last December, and they recognize the historic changes in South Africa, much like those who perceived earlier changes in the Soviet Union before the advent of Boris Yeltsin gave meaning to the dream.

"The courage and statesmanship of Nelson Mandela are self-evident. He was in prison so long.

"So were the courage and statesmanship of Archbishop Desmond Tutu who won the Nobel Peace Prize, and spoke before us. He had stood alone so long.

"The referendum two days ago recognized the courage and statesmanship of President F.W. de Klerk.

President de Klerk, commenting on the overwhelmingly 68 percent yes vote on March 17, said he had two birthdays that day -- his very own, and the birth of a new South Africa.

"May I say that the gestation began several years ago when President de Klerk called on Nelson Mandela in prison, then released the leader of the African National Congress, and began negotiations in the Convention for a Democratic South Africa (CODESA).

"The road ahead for South Africa will be long and hard. The ravages of apartheid will take years and a great deal of effort to heal.

"We, in Hawaii, have travelled another path, not as tortuous nor as arduous, but still somewhat fraught with potential ethnic and racial strife.

"We believe we understand how the many peoples in South Africa feel, and we extend to all of them our warmest and our most fervent wishes for your hopes and dreams and above all, our universal dream to be free.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hagino then rose to speak in support of the resolutions, stating:

"I think this has been a very eventful year, both in the events that have taken place in South Africa, as the good Representative Lee has stated. It has also been an eventful year in the sense that we have participated in two ways: One, the joint session where we received an address from Bishop Desmond Tutu, Nobel Prize winner, and also, I am very happy to say that the long struggle that began all over the world, in terms of the imposition of economic sanctions in which Hawaii has participated, has almost reached its goal. I received a letter from the Employees' Retirement System that they have pretty much divested all of the moneys in the Retirement System. They're down, I believe, to the last \$25-million and this was from an amount of over \$1-billion two years ago. We have truly participated, I think, in bringing about, hopefully, a new era in South Africa, and I wanted to thank all of you here who supported the resolutions in previous years.

"I just wanted to close ... it really is with some regret that when we did have Bishop Tutu present for the address that someone couldn't be with us, but I wanted to close by just reading a favorite phrase that the late Representative Roland Kotani would mention from time to time, and I think it really gives a goal of what all of this struggle has been about. It's a phrase that Reverend Martin Luther King would always state and it's paraphrased from the Book of Amos: 'We shall not rest until justice flows like the waters and righteousness a mighty stream.' I believe that justice is beginning to close South Africa, and I commend the introducer of these resolutions, and I commend all of us for our participation.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for this opportunity to add to what otherwise is a rare occasion to speak to a resolution that commends a nation that's about to go into a humanitarian, democratic and racial equality situation, and indeed, as the previous speakers have indicated, the vote of the White overwhelmingly has encouraged all of us that, in effect, the way to a new constitution is about to happen and that equality between Blacks and Whites has begun, and I think these resolutions express our highest congratulations for that. Even though yesterday was not an emancipation/proclamation, it was a beginning. It wasn't a Brown versus a Board of Education, but it was a chance to saying that no longer is separate and equal acceptable. In fact, what we are about to see is the

unshackling of the human family, some of whom in here have grown or protested for and have started taking the money away out of for quite some time, so it's a very historic moment, and if there's a light at the end of the tunnel clearly for the apartheid, I think the darkness is going to take it away and it will be gone and by their own vote as they've done yesterday.

"As also has been alluded, it's not going to be easy as we know the Soviet Union and its reformulation, also with South Africa with seventeen different opinions, is not going to be an easy expectation. We would be very naive to expect that. Having lived in the area and having talked with people through my work in Swaziland about some of these very violent actions that some of the Whites have said that they would take, even including nuclear warfare if necessary if pushed to the wall and if they were forced to give up apartheid, they said, 'eventually we're going to do it ... give us our own chance and our own pace.'

"But I also hasten to say that the aloha and the goodwill that Bishop Tutu had here, between we in Hawaii and South Africa, there exists an extremely large amount of goodwill between the Whites and the Blacks of South Africa. I want to really underscore that point that it's not all what the media has said but the goodwill that you felt with Bishop Tutu. There is also a foundation for a new South Africa that is being forged and as all of us in this room represent, probably five or ten different ethnic groups or five or ten different nations, I think it behooves all of us to do all we can to support the multiracial democracy that, hopefully, is going to rise up in the new South Africa.

"Mr. Speaker, as a suggestion in this very vein, be it proposed that we offer Hawaii as the venue for future power-sharing or constitutional convention for the new South African government. This may be our first opportunity to be the Geneva of the Pacific of which we have spoken so often of but has never had the opportunity for. And as I propose this, I'm mimicking what Governor Waihee has already demonstrated, and that is that aloha is our foreign policy and free trips to Hawaii may be its vehicle. All of you have known that Mr. Steen, who was a six-year hostage in the Middle East, was invited by the State of Hawaii and he is just finishing his visit now after having been invited and being the guest of the State. I would propose we offer this same invitation to the State of Hawaii, to the negotiating groups, and to see if they would take us up on this proposition.

"In closing, Mr. Speaker, if the most significant ideological event of this century has been the lowering of the flag over the Soviet Union, possibly yesterday we had one of the most significant ethnic and racial events of this century in the vote of the Whites saying, 'yes, we are going to be a multiracial and a democratic society,' and there's probably no better way to express this positive potential development than what so many Blacks in our own country, in so much of what Martin Luther King has reminded us of in the cry of so many people who are unshackled, is that they should be free at last, free at last, free at last!

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS (FLOOR PRESENTATIONS)

On motion by Representative Horita, seconded by Representative D. Ige and carried, H.R. No. 465 was adopted.

At this time, Representative Horita rose and proceeded with her introduction, asking the honorees to stand to be recognized, as follows: Minosuke-san (Yoshida); Ichosan (Kiritake); Rodayu-san (Toyotake); Hanabusadyu-san (Toyotake); and Ms. Barbara Furstenberg from the College of Continuing Education, University of Hawaii, Manoa.

Representative Horita continued:

"Bunraku is a traditional performing art that was developed during the 17th century at a time when class lines in a very regimented society were beginning to blur -- the influence of the warrior class was on the wane and the merchants who were wealthy but lacked political power were rising in number. Against this backdrop, playwrights such as Chikamatsu Monzaemon wrote about incidents involving these types of people and the ways in which they rebelled against the feudal structure.

"The 26-member Bunraku Troupe from the National Bunraku Association in Osaka is here in Hawaii for a two-week period performing numerous lecture-demonstrations for the University and the high school students at Kennedy Theatre. The Department of Drama and Theatre have developed a two-semester curriculum around the troupe's coming and students from other colleges and universities throughout the mainland United States have been attending courses here. In addition to the 3000 high school students, predominantly from public schools who have been attending the free demonstrations, the troupe will be doing four free demonstrations on the Big Island and Maui tomorrow. There are demonstrations being done at the Honolulu Art Academy, the Japanese Cultural Center, Hawaii Public Television, and two children's performances this coming Saturday at the Bishop Museum."

Representative Horita then requested that her remaining comments be entered into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Horita's remarks are as follows:

"Tokubei, a soy bean clerk, falls in love with a courtesan, Ohatsu. He lends money which he had saved to pay off Ohatsu's debt so they can marry to a dishonest acquaintance who refuses to pay it back. Since the lovers cannot be together in life, they die together in a double suicide so that they may be reborn together on the same lotus petal.

"Some background information on the Bunraku troupe members present are as follows:

"Yoshida Minosuke is currently ranked as the number one puppeteer handling 'onnagata' or female roles. He also does, on occasion, male puppet roles as well. At seven years of age, he became apprenticed to the legendary Yoshida Bungoro and at age 9, he received his first stage name -- Kiritake Monjiro. He assumed his current professional name in 1961. He has received numerous awards for his work.

"Kiritake Itcho began his training at age 17 to his father, Kiritake Kamematsu, and received the name

Kamegoro until 1956 when he took his current name. He is considered a veteran among the puppeteers.

"Toyotake Rodayu V is considered one of the most popular narrators in Bunraku today. He began his training at age 7 with Toyotake Wakadayu X. He made his stage debut at that age and assumed his current name in 1967. He has also received numerous awards and since 1974, continues his study under Takemoto Koshijidayu, an Intangible Cultural Asset or National Living Treasure.

"Toyotake Hanabusadayu III began his training as a narrator at age 20 with Takemoto Harukodayu III and since 1969, has also been studying under Takemoto Koshijidayu. His grandfather is Toyotake Wakadayu X.

"May I note in the record that Tsuruzawa Seiji, master shamisen player, was unable to be with us today due to fatigue (we are working them very hard!) as well as the other members of the troupe who are doing a series of three workshops at UH-Manoa."

Representative Hashimoto then rose and stated:

"I would be really remiss if I didn't acknowledge our colleague, Representative Karen Horita, for her foresight and all of the work that she put into this. She is very modest in this and, for myself, I attended the performance on Friday night and it was one of the most moving things that I have ever experienced. I think this is the first time that Hawaii has ever been privileged to have these national treasures here in Hawaii and through Representative Horita's encouragement, the University of Hawaii did explore the possibility and also include these performances that she mentioned to our high school students which is a first. I don't think they've ever done these kinds of performances before and also she has been able to provide them with the opportunity to take their talents and their performances to the neighbor islands.

"If you haven't already gone to see their performance, I really encourage you to do so. I think it's a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity. I think if you were to go to Japan and in addition to the airfare, you'd probably have to pay about three hundred dollars per person so I think the twenty-five dollar ticket is more than adequate and we should all go to see this tremendous performance.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair then stated:

"On behalf of the Speaker of the House, the Honorable Daniel Kihano asked me to extend his personal aloha and mahalo to our honorees this morning for their distinguished presence in providing us this opportunity to meet you."

At this time, Certificates of Recognition and floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Baker, Ihara, D. Ige, Taniguchi, Horita, Duldulao, Fukunaga, Hashimoto and Chang.

H.R. No. 466, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING PARADISE CRUISE, LTD. FOR ITS CONTRIBUTIONS TO TOURISM IN HAWAII," was jointly offered by Representatives Stegmaier and Alcon.

On motion by Representative Stegmaier, seconded by Representative Alcon and carried, H.R. No. 466 was adopted.

Representative Stegmaier rose and proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"We are very proud to congratulate and commend the visionary leadership of Ron Howard, President; Captain Reg Wright, Vice President for Operations; and Herb Shriner, Assistant to the President; and all the stockholders of Paradise Cruise, Ltd. for successfully bringing this dream of an American/Hawaiian joint venture of these magnificent proportions into reality.

"I would like to ask Ron Howard, the President of Paradise Cruise, Ltd. and also Herb Shriner to stand, but prior to that, may I just mention also that the risk-taking that has been involved is after thirty-five years, as the resolution said, of operations, and it's a risk-taking involved in having an American company, the Nichols Brothers Company, and American workers build this ship as well as provide all of the furnishings for the vessel, including the engines, which were made in Illinois. The only exception is the high technology equipment which we no longer make in the United States and which we had to import from abroad."

Representative Stegmaier then introduced Mr. Ron Howard, Mr. Reg Wright and Mr. Herb Shriner and asked them to stand to be recognized.

Representative Alcon then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, the Star of Honolulu is not only 'Star of Honolulu' but I think it is also the 'Star of the Nation' because of the fact that it is a unique boat and the biggest cruise boat of its kind in the entire United States. Mr. Speaker, the State of Hawaii is very lucky and fortunate to have it sailing here in the Hawaiian waters.

"The State of Hawaii could derive about \$150,000 in docking fees but, unfortunately, the Harbor Division of the Department of Transportation was not receptive to that idea so therefore the \$150,000 docking fees goes to a private company. They are now subleasing just to be able to accommodate the 'Star of Honolulu.' I don't think the Kewalo Basin is big enough to take it in anyway.

"I would like to congratulate Mr. Ron Howard and all the people of Paradise Cruise for their foresight.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tam then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, a very gracious resolution was presented this morning, but I would like to add a few words aside from emphasizing that American Cruise has very positively helped in stimulating Hawaii's economy by adding that we thank you from the education side for permitting and encouraging your involvement through Mr. Herb Shriner who is also a very good friend of mine. By the way, Mr. Herb Shriner is the Honolulu District PTSA President. I may also add in ending that American Cruise is a good example of how the business community can get involved in our educational system.

"Thank you."

At this time, Representative Stegmaier presented Mr. Ron Howard with a Certificate of Recognition and floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Duldulao, Chun and Marumoto.

Representative Kanoho proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and fellow members of the House, I believe we would all agree unequivocally that there isn't anything in this world which is more precious and irreplaceable than human lives, especially when the life is very close to our hearts. It can also be said that the most satisfying and ultimately rewarding experience that anyone can possibly have is to save a human life. The feeling must be indescribably exhilarating and humbling, and so it is that we honor today three outstanding Boy Scouts from Kauai who are deserving of the highest recognition and praise.

"You have all heard the Chief Clerk read the account of those crucial moments when the child's life was on the verge of being extinguished on the evening of January 23rd, 1992. In those frantic last minutes, with the child's skin already deep blue from lack of oxygen, the scouts kept their composure. They calmed the child's relatives who were in a state of total panic and grief because they believed the child was dead. They quickly applied the Heimlich technique and administered mouth-to-mouth resuscitation which they learned in the scouting program.

Because of these scouts, the child is alive and healthy and returned home to Japan.

"One may ask, Mr. Speaker and colleagues, how many of us here in this chamber know the proper rescue breeding heart resuscitation or other life-saving techniques, not to mention being able to remain composed during such a traumatic incident? Their actions are indeed a tribute to their individual character and their scouting program. It is a very appropriate coincidence that their rank in the scouting program is that of Star Scout, for these scouts are truly stars in every sense.

"Mr. Speaker, it is important for all of us as leaders of the State, to recognize the good that our young people do. We constantly hear about the crime and drug problems involved with our youth. Today, however, like a breath of fresh air, we honor the outstanding actions of three of Hawaii's youth.

"Mr. Speaker and members, I am very proud and pleased, on behalf of Representatives Kawakami and Apo, to introduce our honorees," and asked them to stand to be recognized: Jack Munechika, an eighth grader at Kauai Intermediate School; his brother, Jay Munechika, a sophomore at Kauai High School; and Marc Torres, also a sophomore at Kauai High School.

"I am also very pleased to introduce their proud parents. In the gallery are the scouts' proud parents," and asked them to stand to be recognized, as follows: Councilman Joe Munechika "who, himself, was a scout," and Mrs. Judy Munechika; Marla Torres Lam and Marc Torres.

"Mr. Speaker, the Kauai delegation wishes to recognize and thank Aloha Airlines for their generosity in providing the scouts air transportation to Honolulu, and we are grateful for this kind of participation in honoring our youth."

and final Hawaii entry after finishing third place during the regular season. They did not let their regular season finish or the way they played the regular season affect their play. They swept to the first State Tournament, winning 12-2 over Iolani; then beating OIA champion Campbell, 8-2; defeating Maui champion Baldwin, 4-3; and finally beating in the State championship game over OIA Eastern Division champion Kailua, 2-1.

"You know, for many of us who have never been able to achieve a State championship, this truly is a great achievement. The team comprised no less of seven names to the All-State Team, and Wes Uyehara was named the Coach of the Year. It truly is an honor. This team was a team of destiny, was a team that symbolized team sport, that young and old, the veterans and the newcomers, worked to reach one common goal and that is the State championship.

"Mr. Speaker and members of House, it truly is an honor for me to introduce these people this afternoon."

Representative D. Ige asked the following honorees, who were seated on the Chamber floor, to stand to be recognized: Mr. Wes Uyehara, 1992 Coach of the Year; Leiko Kurosawa, senior co-captain, first team All-State pitcher, and the Hawaii State Girls' Softball Player of the Year; Chiho Bauske, senior co-captain and first team All-State third baseman, and "she had the game-winning hit in the championship game."

Representative D. Ige then asked other members of the team who were seated in the gallery to stand to be recognized.

Representative D. Ige then introduced the parents and asked them to stand to be recognized, as follows: Mr. Warren and Mrs. Leonora Okinaka; Dennis and Marilyn Au Hoi; Glenn Kong; and Sandra Lacar; Gary Iwatani and Keoki Nakashima, assistant coaches.

Certificates of Recognition and orchid leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Fukunaga, Yonamine and D. Ige.

At 12:11 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

At this time, Representative Anderson was permitted a late introduction and he introduced his gracious wife, Mrs. Hannie Anderson.

Representative Tatibouet then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise this afternoon to celebrate the 121st birthday tomorrow of one of the peoples' favorite alii who worked so hard for the welfare of the Hawaiian people -- Prince Jonah Kuhio Kalaniana'ole -- who, at the time he was in Congress, from 1903 until his death in 1922, was a resident of my district. His home was called Puu Leilani and he lived at the corner of Uluniu and Koa Streets for those who are familiar with Waikiki.

"I would like to read from the Congressional biographical dictionary a little about him and then share a few thoughts of current day issues.

"Jonah Kuhio Kalaniana'ole was a delegate from the Territory of Hawaii, born in Koloa, the island of Kauai, on March 26, 1871. He attended the Royal School and Punahou College Hawaii, studied...

At this point, Representative Arakaki rose on a point of information and asked:

"Mr. Speaker, is this an announcement or a history lesson?"

The Chair answered:

"The Chair will exercise his discretion and allow her to continue," and asked Representative Tatibouet to proceed.

Representative Tatibouet continued:

"Thank you.

"He was a student at St. Matthews College in California for four years and then went on to the Royal Agricultural College in England, graduating from a business college there. He was crowned a Prince by Royal Pax Proclamation in 1884 and occupied a position with the Department of Interior of the Hawaiian government, took part in the revolution of the Hawaiians in 1895, and was sentenced to one year in prison at that time. He visited Africa from 1899 to 1902, fought with the British Army in the border war, and was elected as a Republican to the 58th Congress of the United States from March 4, 1903 until his death in Waikiki.

"A true-blooded Hawaiian, it was greatly to his credit that he chose to devote much serious thought and energy to their rehabilitation. His was a work of laws in his lifetime. He saw the tenancy of his people to flock to the larger cities where their life in crowded living conditions, learning the vices of the white man, was leading to racial extinction. He thus devoted himself to get their land back. His efforts culminated in the passage in 1921 by Congress of the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act, a measure to provide homesteads to native Hawaiians for an indefinite term and a nominal rental. The Prince was made one of the commissioners and took great interest in the practical carrying out of his dreams.

"Prince Kuhio had a vision that the commoner, the maka ainana, Hawaiians' best opportunity to find and enjoy their property interest, denied under the Mahele in 1848, was under the laws of our Republic. It was due in great pride to this belief that Prince Jonah Kuhio Kalaniana'ole was originally elected to Congress by his people and why he, himself, chose to be a Republican.

"As we celebrate the occasion of his birthday today, I would hope you to join me and my fellow Republicans as we continue to share his vision for the future. We would like to see full implementation of the United States Congress Hawaiian Homes Commission Act as interpreted by the courts. This means rehabilitating the native Hawaiians, the maka ainana, to take responsibility for themselves on their own lands and not to be interfered with by the descendants of the alii that participated in the Mahele.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair then stated:

"Thank you, Representative Tatibouet.

"Just a note. While we appreciate your recognition, the Chair might suggest that a commemorative resolution next time might be a more appropriate vehicle.

"Thank you."

Representative Young then rose and stated:

"I have two brief announcements. The first one is that, in honor of Prince Kuhio's birthday tomorrow, the Water, Land Use and Hawaiian Affairs Committee will be visiting the homestead area of Kalaupapa tomorrow, and I was reminded by Chair Hagino that Prince Kawanakoa's brother became a Democrat.

"Also, the second announcement is that the House Women's Caucus will meet in Room 802 immediately following session."

At 12:27 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m. on Monday, March 30, 1992.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS
(FLOOR PRESENTATIONS)

The following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 469 and 470) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

H.R. No. 469, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION HONORING AND COMMENDING DR. ALBERT J. SIMONE FOR A JOB WELL DONE AS PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII AND CONVEYING BEST WISHES TO HIM FOR CONTINUED SUCCESS IN ALL FUTURE ENDEAVORS," was offered by Representative D. Ige.

On motion by Representative D. Ige, seconded by Representative Arakaki and carried, H.R. No. 469 was adopted.

Representative D. Ige rose and proceeded to introduce the honoree, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is truly a historic occasion. After spending seven years or so in these chambers, it is quite unusual for me to introduce congratulatory resolutions, and here, this is the second one in two days, so clearly this is beyond and outside the normal.

"I just wanted to offer a couple of comments on behalf of Dr. Simone. When I first met Dr. Simone, he was newly hired, newly arrived Vice President of Academic Affairs at the University of Hawaii, and I was a newly hired engineer at Hawaiian Telephone in the MBA program, trying to get on the fast track to success. I heard him speak at a conference for economists and I was overly impressed by this individual for he had a vision for the University in talking about his strategic plan, or the University's strategic plans back in 1983-1984. It was real clear to me that his heart and his passion were in this job that he had as the Vice President of Academic Affairs.

"Here we are, almost seven years later, and I am very much honored to be a part of this presentation this morning to honor Dr. Simone for his years of service at the University of Hawaii. You know, many say that the President of the University of Hawaii is one of the toughest jobs in the State, if not the country, and clearly all of us here have second-guessed many decisions that Dr. Simone has made. We may all have chosen to disagree from time to time on different issues but I think that no one can argue with his record.

"The resolution speaks for itself, Mr. Speaker, and talks about his many, many, many accomplishments during his tenure at the University. Many of them will continue on for many years to come. No one can argue that the University of Hawaii is clearly positioned to be a leading institution in the next century."

Representative D. Ige then introduced Dr. Albert Simone and asked him to stand to be recognized. Accompanying Dr. Simone on the House floor was his wife, Carolee, who also stood to be recognized.

Representative D. Ige then asked members of the Board of Regents, his senior staff, various academic deans and directors who were seated in the gallery, to stand to be recognized.

Representative Alcon then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to bid Dr. Simone goodbye and good luck. I know that the first time he and I met, we already locked horns because of the fact that I was very much interested in improving the community colleges and I kept on bugging him about giving them more money and also pay a little more attention to the community colleges. And that, Mr. Speaker, he has done and so we have pacified ourselves. Although Dr. Simone and I used to argue a lot, it was all professional disagreements.

"Dr. Simone has done a lot for the community colleges and he has given them more funding and also through the efforts of Representative David Ige, we have now granted the faculty members of the community colleges the status of professorship. Dr. Simone, I retired from the University of Hawaii, Community College System, and before you leave, will you sign a proclamation putting all the previous faculty members as professors emeritus?"

"I would also like to bid Mrs. Simone goodbye. I've enjoyed knowing her and she used to be the President of the Outdoor Circle. Maybe now that she's leaving, I can put bigger banners when I start campaigning."

"So, Dr. and Mrs. Simone -- good luck and aloha!"

Representative Marumoto then rose and stated:

"I just wanted to also say aloha to the Simones. My apologies for all the turmoil that you've undergone, Dr. Simone -- the legislative interference, the sex discrimination, race discrimination, athletics even, threats of loss of accreditation -- you've been through it all, and you've always been gracious under fire."

"As for Carolee, I must say she's always gracious, and we're going to miss the two of you. We thank Carolee, especially for her work for the Outdoor Circle. I hope you two don't go too far. There is an opening for Hawaii Pacific University which you might want to consider."

"But, anyway, we wish you both our good wishes and aloha."

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"Like many in this room who got their education at the University of Hawaii, we are grateful. (Could we raise our hands if we are part of the University of Hawaii?) A lot of us here come out of the University of Hawaii and some of us, particularly those who get into the higher level--into the MBA and PhD process--don't usually know the political process. I want you to know that Dr. Simone not only knows the academic and the political process, he has improved upon that. He has had more people in his house, at his residence, than I think any of us who'll ever campaign full time. We're going to miss you."

"Aloha."

Representative Apo then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I don't know if Dr. Simone is aware of some of the members. . . Last night, on television, **Honolulu Magazine** announced its yearly awards which polled its members, and on the best and the worst of Hawaii, one of the categories was the best job and the worst job. The best job was being Governor of the State, and the worst job was being President of the University of Hawaii."

"At this time, I would like to congratulate you, Al, on your deliverance. Also, I want to thank you very much for your personal friendship and the fact that he's opened up the University to the public for seven years, and particularly 'thank you' for the expansion of Leeward Community College out into the Waianae area where our citizens are very appreciative, bringing higher education closer to them."

"Mahalo."

Representative Taniguchi then rose and stated:

"Al and Carolee have been my constituents for a number of years -- they have been very good constituents. I've worked together with Dr. Simone when I was Higher Education Chairman and we've had our little differences but I think, all in all, I really believe that the President has the University's interest at heart, and that we're going to miss the both of you. I know you're going to come back so I'm not that tearful, but we appreciate your work and we look forward to your future success."

The Chair remarked:

"You had your differences with Dr. Simone, but he voted for you."

At this time, Representative D. Ige presented the Certificate of Recognition and a floral lei to Dr. Albert Simone, and Representative Horita presented Mrs. Simone an orchid lei.

H.R. No. 470, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION HONORING NATIONAL DOCTORS' DAY AND DOCTORS' DAY IN HAWAII," was jointly offered by Representatives Shon and Tom.

On motion by Representative Shon, seconded by Representative Tom and carried, H.R. No. 470 was adopted.

Representative Shon rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, it's a very great honor for me today to rise to speak in favor of this resolution, and for the many colleagues who work in health in the State of Hawaii, we are, I think, especially grateful when we think of the personalities that move through our lives and through our health care system that make great contributions. We are thankful for every doctor who woke in the wee hours of the middle of the night to rush to a patient in need. We are very grateful for doctors who deliver care with no concern for whether or not a particular patient had the financial resources but provided that care time after time. The State of Hawaii has a tremendous tradition of its doctors providing care whether or not people can pay or not. We are grateful for every doctor who ever worked in a mass unit, or went overseas in times of disaster or famine, or served with refugees, or worked with the homeless."

"We are grateful for every doctor who took time out of their daily schedule to come down and testify before us and provide leadership as advocates for public health in the State. In very recent times, we have seen the doctors speaking out on behalf of health issues such as smoking, helmet laws, drunk driving laws, many, many issues which affect the health of each and every one of us, and we're thankful for the leadership."

"And, Mr. Speaker, also a special 'thank you' for all the doctors' families who had to share their parent, or spouse, or loved one, with a beeper or cellular phone, or an office or hospital."

"Mahalo for your service, your dedication, and your willingness to sacrifice."

"Joining us today is, first, an individual who has become a fixture around our building here even though it's a new building. We see him up and down the halls and he's a very great contributor to the legislative as well as the health care status of our citizens. I would like to introduce the current President of the Hawaii Medical Association -- Dr. Stephen Wallach. Also joining us today is the President of the Honolulu County Medical Society -- Dr. Paul Di Mauro; and one of the key

organizations that support our doctors is the Hawaii Medical Association Auxiliary -- Past President Mrs. Maureen Lau."

At this time, the honorees rose to be recognized.

Representative Shon then asked the following persons who were seated in the gallery to stand to be recognized: Mrs. Susan Foo, Treasurer and Publicity Chairperson of the HMA Auxiliary; Dr. Carl Lehman, President-elect of the Honolulu County Medical Society; and Jann Estioko, Director of Communications of the HMA.

Representative Cachola then rose and stated:

"I'd like to just request that the remarks of Representative Shon be entered into the Journal as my own. (The Chair "so ordered.")

"However, as far as I am concerned, every day is Doctors' Day, not just one day.

"Thank you."

Representative Bainum then rose and stated:

"Since the first Doctors' Day some fifty years ago, there's been a lot of changes for medicine and for physicians, and there's many changes abounding now such as the health care reform, acts that's posed both nationally and changes here at home. The economic base in medicine may very well change profoundly. There's also new issues such as prescription privileges that come before bodies such as this. There's new ethical questions such as the the so-called 'doctor death' and the issue of life and death decisions. We have all these issues, all changing in how physicians act, but there's one constant role and that's physicians are dedicated people. They're dedicated and committed to serving their patients and patients' needs.

"I am glad that we can congratulate them and honor them today.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Marumoto then rose and stated:

"All physicians today are truly embattled of professions and I wonder whether young people really want to go into it with all the problems that Representative Bainum had enumerated and with increasing liability problems. Despite that, I have a son who became a physician and a daughter who is in Med School, so I guess they must really want to serve, and I understand that the problems. . . this isn't my children. . . I understand the problems that doctors must go through and it's really a profession that demands both day and night service -- constant service -- and I salute the doctors. I am very happy to be able to recognize them this one day although, as a previous speaker has said, we should recognize them every day.

"Thank you very much."

At this time, Representative Shon presented Dr. Wallach with a Certificate of Recognition and red carnation leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Duldulao, Kawakami and Bainum.

This will consist of displays and samples of diversified products that are just about beginning in Hawaii so there should be some good examples of new products that we are now getting into. This will be held from 5:00 to 10:00 p.m."

Representative Arakaki then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, maybe it's appropriate since it's Doctors' Day and Agriculture Week that this House today also represents the kickoff for our Hawaii Food Bank Food Drive.

"From the information we're getting, there's about six thousand to eight thousand individuals, over half of them are children, on Oahu alone who forsake meals each month and, of course, a great number of them are our homeless population, and we all know that a lot of these homeless and near-homeless are just one or two paychecks away from getting there. A lot of them are sacrificing meals in order to obtain shelters.

"Although we're trying to address the problem, it's a community problem that we all need to help solve and contribute to, so we're asking all the House members and their staff and the House staff also to demonstrate their commitment and offer to set good examples for the people in our community to help deal with the problem by donating food items, and I just want to give you an example of some of the high-demand food items -- things like peanut butter, macaroni and cheese, canned fruits, vegetables, juices and soups. And besides that, they need other products like hand towels, toothpaste, that people can use. We are going to have a display which shows what the House is doing in this effort.

"Last year, we raised over a thousand. . . combination of cash and food -- over a thousand pounds of donated items from our House alone, and we would like to equal or match that effort, and I want to ask everyone to make their contributions to the Sergeant-at-Arms Office.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

"Colleen, a third grader, attends Heeia Elementary School in Kaneohe in the Gifted and Talented Program and, more importantly, she is very much accepted by her peers at school as an equal. She is the younger of two children and I don't know how she does it but doing all of this homework, and school, and all of the things she does, she still has time to partake in jazz dancing.

"Colleen, we will be watching your success story in your lifetime. Don't ever stop aiming for the stars and continue to believe that anything is possible.

"At this time, Mr. Speaker, I would like to introduce our honoree and our guests."

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION
(FLOOR PRESENTATION)

H.R. No. 475, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION CONGRATULATING CLUB 100 AND THE SONS AND DAUGHTERS OF THE 100TH INFANTRY BATTALION ON THE FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY OF THE FORMATION OF THE 100TH INFANTRY BATTALION," was jointly offered by Representatives Thompson, Yonamine, Arakaki, Bunda, Chang, Chun, Fukunaga, Hashimoto, Hirono, D. Ige, Ihara, Kanoho, Kawakami, Lee, Morihara, Oshiro, Santiago, Say, Stegmaier, Takamine, Taniguchi and Young and was read by the Clerk.

On motion by Representative Thompson, seconded by Representative Yonamine and carried, H.R. No. 475 was adopted.

Representative Thompson rose and proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"Nearly fifty years ago, the United States Army created a separate but equal battalion of Americans of Japanese Ancestry, and designated it the 100th Battalion (Separate). Although aware that their battalion was conceived in suspicion and that many of their friends, relatives and fellow AJA's had been forcibly and unjustifiably imprisoned in relocation camps, the men of the 100th Battalion remained dedicated to the burden of making the skeptics see not the slant of their eyes but the unconditional loyalty within their hearts. So they marched through Mussolini's backyard; they found and returned to the Army the battalion it thought it had lost; and they became part of the most decorated American combat unit of World War II.

"Now we, as members of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, have come together in a resolution to honor the men of the famed 100th 'Purple Heart' battalion who gave their lives, or a portion thereof, so that people of their country and of other countries might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this.

"But in a greater sense, we cannot honor, we cannot commend, we cannot extol these men, for they have distinguished themselves in deed far beyond what our

weak words could add. During a time in which discrimination and negative sentiment against Japanese Americans and other Asian Americans was at its nadir, no other crusade could ever have done as much to establish the people of these groups as Americans in the minds of others -- Americans from the shape of their eyes to the color of their skins and through the farthest reaches of their hearts. These men, along with their sons and daughters who this resolution also recognizes and honors, have, during times of peace, further selflessly served and contributed to the Hawaiian community which they so bravely represented and fought to preserve during a time of war.

"People will little regard what is said here today, but no one can ever forget what these Americans have done. Rather, it is for us, their brothers, their sisters, their fellow Americans, their legacies, to be dedicated and take increased devotion to the unfinished work which all the members of Club 100 have so nobly advanced, and which the Sons and Daughters of the 100th Infantry Battalion continues to advance -- that every American, no matter which race, no matter which religion, no matter which gender, no matter which sexual orientation, no matter which economic position or social status -- deserves equal opportunity and equal treatment by all."

Representative Thompson then introduced and asked the honorees to stand to be recognized, as follows: Mr. Raymond Nosaka, President of Club 100; Mr. Sam Inouye, Vice President; and Mr. Warren Yamamoto, President, and Ms. Ann Kabasawa, Vice President, representing the Sons and Daughters of the 100th Infantry Battalion.

Representative Fukunaga then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would just like to add my comments to those of my colleague. I think, for many of us here in the State Legislature, we deal every day with legislation which is designed to improve the lives of others in our community and it would be very remiss of me not to take this opportunity to offer and add my thanks, on behalf of the sons and daughters of the 442nd organization.

"As some of us began the arduous task of organizing and attempting to learn about the amazing actions of these very brave and honorable men, it had been the sons and daughters of the 100th Battalion who have truly led the way in helping us organize, and also Mr. Raymond Nosaka and Mr. Inouye and for all of that, we are very, very grateful.

"Thank you."

Representative D. Ige then rose and stated:

"I would just like to add, you know, many of us, I think, are exploits of the world reknown 100th Battalion, and many of us who are sons or daughters are continually honored by their accomplishments, and as a representative and a legislator here, I only hope and aspire that someday someone will look at what I am able to accomplish and, hopefully, put it in the same kind of light that the members of the 100th Battalion have in changing the State of Hawaii.

"Thank you."

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to announce that I have returned. SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering bills on Third Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar.

THIRD READING

The following bills, which were on the calendar for Third Reading, were read throughout and the following actions taken:

On motion by Representative Oshiro, seconded by Representative Taniguchi and carried, S.B. No. 2879, SD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE CHAIRPERSON OF THE ALOHA TOWER DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 44 ayes, with Representatives Amaral, Bellinger, Cachola, M. Ige, Metcalf, Peters and Takamine being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 2879 had passed Third Reading at 11:53 o'clock a.m.

S.B. No. 2708, SD 1:

By unanimous consent, action was deferred one day.

At 11:54 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:55 o'clock a.m.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Representative Taniguchi: "There will be a Majority caucus on Monday morning at 9:00 a.m. in Room 1111."

At this time, Representative Arakaki moved that the Journal remain open until 12:00 o'clock midnight this legislative day, and that all Standing Committee Reports received by the Clerk up to such time be adopted and that all bills thereto pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading, except that all bills recommended for passage on Third Reading be deferred until Tuesday, April 7, 1992.

The motion was seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Thielen then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, as the Republican ghostbuster, I would like to express strong opposition to keeping the Journal open and again letting bills go through like phantoms in the night, unheard by the members and without the members having an opportunity to comment on those bills. I brought my flashlight ... I am very willing to be here with the rest of the members at midnight and be able to discuss those bills with you, to point out problems that we have seen in certain legislation and to alert you to those. That's the purpose of Second Reading.

"The purpose of Second Reading is not to allow them to proceed like phantoms in the night. I am sorry to see us continue this policy. I believe that we all should be here to be able to debate those on the floor at Second Reading

and to point out problems that could then possibly be corrected. Otherwise, it generally, in my experience, has been too late.

"So as the Republican ghostbuster, again I will vote no on this motion."

Representative Apo then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, just for the record. While I appreciate Representative Thielen's concern, I would remind her that the process provides for plenty of opportunity for members to input and to review bills. The fact that procedurally we are moving bills out and keeping the Journal open until midnight does not preclude members' participation in or discussion at the time that the bills come up for Third Reading.

"So the process is intended to provide many checks and balances, not to mention our plethoric public hearing process as well as opportunities for both caucuses, Republican and Democratic, to have full discussion on the measures before the final vote is taken next Tuesday.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson then rose and stated:

"I was just going to say, Mr. Speaker, if I may, because we are going to, hopefully one of these days, look at our rules and that was one of the procedures that we're looking at. . . on Second Reading, if we were able to have them on our desks, it would be a time before Third Reading when we really have no chance to either amend a bill or to have enough input. Second Reading, I think sometimes, would be beneficial to the House members and also to many, many committee chairmen.

"Thank you."

Representative Thielen, in rebuttal, stated:

"My concern again, and I respectfully understand what the Vice Speaker is saying, but my concern is that we do have a problem here where on Second Reading, when we can point out problems to the different members who have not sat on the committee that heard that bill, then when they are able to consider that bill, they can address those problems and maybe that legislation will not go through or will be amended.

"The problem that I see with passing bills that we have not seen in their final form is that it is similar to asking us to sign a blank check. I'm not willing to sign a blank check, and I think it is a very bad policy for us to continue to do this.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Apo, in rebuttal, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, again for the record, we are not passing bills in final form until Third Reading is completed. So again, the process provides for further input. Holding the Journal open till midnight simply signals that a bill is moving in the process essentially and thus provides for further opportunity for members to provide input.

"Ultimately, what is important is that members are free to cast a vote for or against a measure, and again that will occur on Tuesday. And between Saturday, when all members will be provided copies of these measures, between Saturday and Tuesday, those members who chose to lobby against a measure or have concerns, have four days in which to raise questions, check with the chairmen to discuss the items within their caucus and then on

Tuesday, when we go into Third Reading session, they can vote their conscience on any of the measures.

"So we are by no means today making any kind of final statement on any of the measures that will be received by the Clerk this evening.

"Thank you."

Representative Arakaki then rose and stated:

"I just thought I'd let Representative Thielen know that the Clerk's Office has graciously offered to have a chair outside of their office. All they ask is that she not come in her nightgown."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"A prospective, other than suspicion, is one of common sense. I think it's a great irony that we have feast or famine in here. I think we're hurrying up to do something which otherwise we have sometimes five- and ten-minute sessions here during the day, and then we've got to keep the Journal open till midnight and then probably on Tuesday, we've got to stay here for an eight-hour session. So I think rather than looking at it suspiciously, just common sense says budgeting our time so we can logically lock into the issues and debate them according to when we're all here and we're in the midst of our session. But sometimes we come in here and in five minutes, we're gone, and then sometimes we stay here for the whole day.

"I think this issue of the evening is a function of that type of scheduling, so as our GOP leader said, hopefully the rules can accommodate these things so common sense rather than suspicion will prevail on this issue.

"Thank you."

Representative Alcon then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, you know, the same people stand up all the time, make all the complaints that they want to do. Is that only for TV consumption?

"Everytime we go into a situation like this, they have an opportunity, Mr. Speaker, to offer their amendments during Third Reading and if I recall correctly, Mr. Speaker, I think the only time that we can offer our amendments is on Third Reading.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Thielen then rose and stated:

"My concern again is that the bills will go through without us here voting on those bills, and we will have been assumed to have cast our votes in support of passing all those bills on Second Reading. That is a bad procedure.

"It is a bad procedure, but what I would like to say is a good procedure is that today we have seen some actual debate on the floor of the House, and we are differing in our opinions which is healthy. I share a different opinion from my colleague on the opposite side of this floor, and I respect his opinion, and I applaud our ability to debate these issues in full on the floor. That's what we should also be doing on Second Reading and again say, I will vote against any blank check that says I approve wholesale these phantoms that will pass in the night.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair then said:

"I would just like to make an observation. Maybe you should have new batteries for the flashlight because the light is not too bright."

Representative Thielen responded:

"I think Republicans also can see in the night."

Representative Marumoto then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, this has been a pet peeve of mine for many years since the rule was changed. Just for a little historical perspective, I think the members should know that at one time it was required that the bills be on our desks, and that was determined by the Attorney General's opinion. At least we had something tangible to vote on.

"Now, you're giving your vote away -- it's just a waste of a vote -- and when it goes into the Clerk's Office by midnight, the public can't see the bills for practical purposes unless they're down here physically. We can't see it unless we're in here and asking the Clerk to see the bills. On weekends, when we deck on Friday night, it's very difficult to have access to the bills ... the public really has a hard time. On Sundays, of course, it's impossible. And then by the time they get to see them on Monday, they're locked into position. We have to vote on them ... there's no way to amend it because to amend it would be to kill it because it still has to lay over for 48 hours and we're up against the deadline.

"So I was very happy when this procedure had changed. I'm glad the issue is back up and people are aware of the problem, and perhaps we could amend the rules in future sessions to accommodate the public in openness and disclosure.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Apo then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, every measure that has survived so far began the process on the third Wednesday in January. What we are looking at is a collective process which will end on April 27th, and again I remind, with respect to our colleagues, that this is not any sort of day of infamy that holding the Journal open creates more opportunities for members to input on bills. We're going to be three-and-a-half months in a session and on April 27th, whatever survives is what we will vote on.

"Now, certainly the members have the right to vote against the motion that is before us today to lodge their complaint, but I object to the suggestion that there's something wrong with what we are doing by holding the Journal open. If the point they're making is that members do not have an opportunity to input, that is a flat out misstatement and misleading the public into what this process is about.

"The process begins the third Wednesday in January and this year ends on April 27th, and during that time, through the plethora of public hearings, three readings, six readings, there's plenty of opportunity for us to express our support or our disagreement with any particular measure. And I hope that ends the debate today.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson then rose and stated:

"Just for the record, I think that it's been debated here numerous years ago, that on Second Reading if there was a chance that an individual like myself who does not sit

on a particular committee, on Second Reading, if that bill is in front of us, we then have a chance to say, I do not sit on the committee, however, there's a problem with this although it's a very good bill, or whatever position that I happened to be in. The Chairman and the other members who sit there would then be notified. We have taken that away. They do it in Congress, they do it in other countries. There's debate, there's dialogue. But if we're going to pass Second Reading and then we're going to come back and have no chance except to vote, you're gonna say, you should have brought this up earlier. Had you been able to tell us that we could debate on this, then there would have been a chance for us to take care of it. Right now, you're gonna kill the goddamn bill if you do that, and that's where the problem is, and that's what we decided last year that it was going to be reformed.

"The reforms have not come, but evidently there are some reforms that are going to be put on the table next year. That would then, I hope, correct some of the problems that we have. We used to have them on our desks, the public used to have them ... now we don't. And that's a very sad deal, ladies and gentlemen. I think that all of us enjoy one another's company and everything else, but when it comes down that we basically disagree at times, there should be a chance for debate, there should be a chance for dialogue so that we learn that if this bill is productive or not, if it's going to be good for the community. I see nothing wrong with that. We do have our differences but that doesn't mean that we dislike one another or that person is not a good person or a bad person because they disagree with you. So that's what I'm hoping that maybe next year we'll all decide that we can look at this and make some changes.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Alcon then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, the 'Mr. Mayor' has said it eloquently that we are in the process of changing our rules, and I think the Majority Whip had asked every member of this House to send in his or her input and the committee will look into that, and if this is one of the suggestions that the Minority have inputted to the Majority Whip, I am sure that we will honor their suggestion.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion to keep the Journal open until 12:00 o'clock midnight this legislative day was put by the Chair and carried:

At 12:11 o'clock p.m., Representative Hagino asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 2714, SD 2, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Young rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"This morning, I conducted a radio interview with someone who asked me if it makes a difference to be a politician today, if it makes a difference to serve in the State Legislature, and it is this kind of bill related to the residents of Kalaupapa that makes me proud to be a politician.

"I commend the members of the Finance Committee for passing it out in the form that it is. It acknowledges the needs of those who have suffered long from Hansen's disease, and it provides them with what Chair Souki has called a bill of rights, affording them a long overdue policy to live a life of dignity, and I thank the Finance Committee for a fine bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Bellinger then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I am extremely proud to see such an issue before us as it addresses and reconfirms our commitment to those individuals in our community who are affected with Hansen's disease. We had an awful lot of notice in our newspapers over the controversy surrounding the Settlement in relationship to the lease difficulties between the Hawaiian Home Lands and the national parks. As that unfolding, one of the common things that has prevailed is then that, under no circumstances are the residents to be bothered, that their welfare and the individual dignity of those people with Hansen's disease is of paramount importance.

"This type of bill simply reaffirms our State's commitment to them as a permanent commitment, and I would urge everyone to support this.

"Thank you."

Representative Baker then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I also rise to speak in support of Senate Bill 2714, SD 2, HD 2, and would like to associate myself with the remarks of both Representative Young and Representative Bellinger.

"I think this bill is a tribute to the notion that you don't have to be large in numbers in order to be accorded dignity and worth, and on behalf of the residents of Kalaupapa -- mahalo."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2714, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HANSEN'S DISEASE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1159-92 on S.B. No. 2707, SD 1, HD 2:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 2707, SD 1, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Tam rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"At the heart of this bill is an amendment to Chapter 298, Hawaii Revised Statutes, giving schools new authority to undertake minor repairs and maintenance.

"It would create minor repairs and maintenance accounts, not to exceed \$8,000 per school, that schools may use to contract for services to address their immediate and urgent repair and maintenance needs.

"This bill has two features that schools have sought for a very long time.

"One, it reduces delays in repairing damages to school facilities. These damages are unpredictable and caused by actions of vandals and thieves, heavy rains and floods, and breakdowns to power and water lines. What is especially frustrating is the interruption to teaching, support services, and student learning that these emergencies create. With the Department of Education and the Department of Accounting and General Services working together to write the implementing guidelines, those delays will be reduced significantly.

"Two, the bill provides for a system of strict accounting for expenditures. Schools, through the Superintendent of Education, are to submit a report annually to the Department of Accounting and General Services. This requirement enables the Department of Accounting and General Services to keep a complete, accurate, and current accounting of all repair and maintenance funds. Moreover, all of the unencumbered funds are to lapse into the general fund each year. Also, no other funds are to be deposited into these repair and maintenance accounts. Taken together, these safeguards strengthen DAGS' and the Department of Education's accountability over all minor repair and maintenance funds.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2707, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC SCHOOLS REPAIRS AND MAINTENANCE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1160-92 on S.B. No. 3377, HD 2:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 3377, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Ward rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"After last night's staff party, this House and some of us will never be the same again. . .

At this point, Representative O'Kieffe rose and asked for a recess and at 10:56 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 10:57 o'clock a.m., Representative Ward continued his remarks, stating:

"As I was saying, the staff party almost mimicked the reality of this body last evening, and this bill that I am speaking about mimics the reality of a taxation that is already in place. If you recall, last year this body passed a training tax of .005 percent on every employer so we could train people to be prepared to get into industries.

"This bill, in a redundant way, then calls upon another \$50,000 to be put into the kitty to do the very thing that we've already taxed our employers for.

"As Representative Duldulao's look-alike said last night, imitation is the ultimate form of flattery. This look-alike bill will cost the taxpayers a \$50,000 price tag.

"Thank you."

Representative Lee then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I'll oppose the distinguished representative from East Honolulu on this particular bill. We must make a distinction between the Department of Education and the Department of Labor. There is no connection between the levy that was made last year and the appropriation of \$33,000 in this bill. There is absolutely no connection. His remarks are a non-sequitur.

"The tourism training in this bill refers to high school students. It is an educational program and the other day, I was very fortunate to participate in the inauguration of the Academy of Travel and Tourism which was set up with the help of a national foundation, and this Academy attracted the attention of the entire community of Waipahu, a lot of educators, and this type of appropriation to the Department of Education is to further the development of tourism training beginning in the high schools.

"So I urge my colleagues to look at the merits of the appropriation and vote accordingly.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Duldulao then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I seldom rise and speak about a subject matter but, at this time, I am compelled to stand in support of Senate Bill No. 3377, A Bill for an Act Making Appropriations for Tourism Training.

"If we truly believe that the visitor industry is our number one industry in the State of Hawaii, this bill will enable us to deliver efficient services and quality services to our tourists that visit the State of Hawaii.

"This program will enable youths that are not qualified or does not have the means to go to college and further their education an opportunity, after graduation, to at least get a decent job in the hotel industry. And I am very thankful that the hotel industry is recognizing this is a valuable tool and promoting tourism and delivering the quality of service that our tourists deserve.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward, in rebuttal, stated:

"I believe that training is training as a tax is a tax, and I am sure we can ask the citizens of this State if they know what the definition of either of those are.

"My point is that the tourism training is well founded -- it has merit. The funding mechanism has no merit.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to speak in favor of the bill primarily because I signed 'with reservations' and I think I should explain.

"Some years back, we had a filming that we took around to the schools to show them about the industry. It was late when we did that. With this bill, my reservation was that we didn't start soon enough to the high schools and that we should have gone to more high schools.

"The industry does pay taxes. It comes out of the general fund and I believe that it is money well spent. Just the idea that we're not getting to the young people -- people don't like tourists. We have to explain that they bring money into our State. There's lots of places that you can go in the industry, not just the lower paying, but also the higher paying, and I think that if we look at this as an investment for the future, it will be money well spent.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Alcon then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, you know, the trend now is towards vocational education. We always complain about immigrants coming here without proper training but then let me just tell you and the whole body, Mr. Speaker, that they are good working with their hands. If you can't work with your brains, work with your hands.

"Let me just tell you also, Mr. Speaker, that everyone of us go to a restaurant and demand good service, and it is this type of training that will give us those proper services. It seems like the other speakers who are not in favor of this bill seem to favor that everyone has to go to college and have a PhD. Well, I'd like to have a PhD. serve my meal also, Mr. Speaker, but then it's not the reality of life.

"This is a good bill. We have to take care of every segment of our student population and not only the ones that have something in between their ears.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Stegmaier then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I feel compelled to stand up to explain my no vote on this bill, Senate Bill No. 3377.

"It's not that the program, as it has been operating so far, is at fault. In fact, it's an exemplary program. The question is, at this point, based on the education reform matters that we are considering and the support of an inventory of the entire add-on system to our core program, whether it is appropriate to be passing this bill which would expand the tourism training program to other schools and, therefore, be supportive of more add-on programs. In thinking that it is inappropriate at this time to do that, I am going to cast a no vote.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Duldulao, in rebuttal, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I just want to clarify one thing that the previous speaker had mentioned.

"This is not an expansion program. It is only to continue a pilot program to make it permanent for the Farrington and Waipahu High Schools, so there is no expansion.

"Thank you."

Representative Stegmaier then rose and stated:

"If that's the case, I apologize. I understood that the bill was that, and I would like the Majority Floor Leader to understand that I would like to support this bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"There is a large difference between a PhD. serving you and a tax fund. . .

At this point, Representative M. Ige rose on a point of order and asked:

"Didn't he already speak twice?"

The Chair responded:

"I've allowed him to stand up for the last time on this matter."

At 11:06 o'clock a.m., Representative M. Ige asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:14 o'clock a.m.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3377, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR TOURISM TRAINING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1163-92 on S.B. No. 3432, SD 1, HD 2:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 3432, SD 1, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"Unfortunately, this bill keeps decision-making primarily at the Department of Education level. Local schools are fully capable of deciding if donated equipment and fixtures will enhance the school and to formulate their own guidelines. Allowing DOE to formulate implementation guidelines really is a betrayal of the SCBM system which so many seem to support. SCBM must be allowed to work and it will work if we allow it.

"If the DOE fails to relinquish its top heavy control of school decisions, we would have failed to accomplish the very goals that we have established, and we shouldn't allow this to happen with this legislation.

"And furthermore, I would like to note to my colleagues that it's unfortunate that the bill limits the gifts of fixtures only to new fixtures. Often, there can be a slightly used fixture which will have a long life period of maybe ten years, but under this legislation the schools would not be allowed to accept that.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tam then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and colleagues, this bill would establish clear guidelines for the Department of Education to accept donated equipment and to later repair and maintain them.

"It would, in effect, be an open invitation to organizations and individuals to donate equipment or fixtures for the purpose of improving education at the school site.

"In the past and even to this day, there is confusion, even fear, on the part of potential donors regarding their liability for claims that may be made for injury arising from donated equipment or fixtures. This bill would hold them harmless for such claims.

"It also specifies the conditions under which the Department of Education may accept donated equipment or fixtures, making the Department of Education responsible for repair and maintenance of donated equipment and the Department of Accounting and General Services responsible for repair and maintenance of donated fixtures installed in existing or new schools.

"Finally, it provides a means by which principals may solicit donations, and encourages principals to consult with parents on the educational value of a donation.

"This is a useful bill, owing to the fact that both donors and recipients benefit from a new and expanded form of school-community partnership. As a result, school/community-based management is given a new and novel meaning.

"I would also like to add, in terms of reference to my fellow colleagues prior to my comments, that we hope that all parties will be involved in terms of making up a criteria.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3432,

This is going to mandate the court in those actions relating to non-competition agreements to award attorney's fees if an employee prevails in the lawsuit. It doesn't say the same thing if an employer prevails in a lawsuit so unless the underlying contract would provide for that, it's a very one-sided bill. And I also think it's a bad policy to establish small, individual categories where we are going to award attorney's fees to only one party if that party prevails.

"The point is, if the bill states the court said that the attorney's fees may be awarded, then I could support the bill. It would leave the discretion with the court.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Marumoto rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"While I favor the State giving the receipts from the tourist accommodation tax to the counties, and while I support tourism promotion, I have reservations regarding naming the amount that counties should be required to spend for any specific purpose.

"The counties are already broadly directed to spend the entire TAT on tourism-related expenditures such as beaches and roads which tourists might use, but to require them to cross their t's and dot their i's is a bit too paternalistic for my liking.

"This bill does not give counties the latitude to spend more or less than 7.5 percent of the hotel tax for tourism promotion. Even if a county saw that tourism was dropping and that more money should be spent for advertising, the county could not spend a penny more than 7.5 percent. And with declining hotel revenues comes declining hotel taxes, so less money would be spent for promotion just at a time when more money should be applied for this purpose.

"Cooler heads will prevail in Conference Committee, I know or I hope.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Souki then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I just want to make a point of clarification.

"This bill and the 7.5 percent is not the maximum amount that can be spent on marketing, but it's the minimum amount if nothing precludes the County or the State from adding to this amount here. I just thought I would allow the members to know that, and also this being in the spirit of increasing the marketing capability of the respective counties.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker and members."

Representative Marumoto rose in rebuttal, stating:

"I realize the counties can use other funds other than the TAT to apply towards tourist promotion, and I am very much for tourism promotion but I would rather give them the money directly for this purpose. I support any money going to the Hawaii Visitors Bureau for advertising

and in the past we have given them \$6-million, and we feel that is what's in the best interest of the whole State.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Thielen then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I support Senate Bill 2423, but I have a slightly different concern. I would hope that the words 'to promote the visitor industry' could include matters such as maybe including and providing access to certain natural sights or other areas where tourists would like to visit, and it wouldn't mean just a promotion-type of expenditure as that is commonly known. So I hope the term could be interpreted very broadly to allow the counties the leeway.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Every year, this Legislature burns employers with additional costs for new and enhanced mandated employee benefits. Little or no consideration seems to be

given to the financial impacts that these benefits will have on businesses, employment and our economy.

"An increased benefit such as this may, in itself, seem insignificant, but when combined with the innumerable benefits mandated and increased over the past several years, this increase could be financially devastating, especially to the backbone of Hawaii's economy -- our small businesses.

"For this reason, I oppose Senate Bill 2732, SD 1, and thank you for the opportunity to remark."

"Again, referring to Stand. Com. Report 1218-92 on Senate Bill No. 3371, as I was beginning to say a while ago, Mr. Speaker, putting this agency or even coordination to the Department of Public Safety is not about the safest place because they are the greatest violators of sex offenders. None of the people who were accused of sex offenses by the guards and by the inmates were prosecuted and putting this, and let me just repeat again, Mr. Speaker, I'm speaking in support with some reservations, and putting this under the Department of Public Safety is not the safest place to put them.

"Therefore, Mr. Speaker, that is my concern and I don't know why we had chosen the Department of Public Safety when they don't even know what they're doing.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3371, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SEX OFFENDER TREATMENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

This makes an appropriation for activities to increase the transfer of international technologies and businesses to Hawaii, but specifically what it will do is it will establish a Pacific Data Commodities Information Center.

"My first concern is that it gives the dollar sum of one dollar which obviously means that as it goes into conference, then that dollar figure will expand, and then it also allows the hiring of consultants who specialize in the area of international businesses.

"I believe this is something that the private sector should handle. I don't think that this is an area that government should get into again. I think we need to really focus on where we are in competition with what the private sector should establish in our State.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"This bill is for those who bemoan tourism; this bill is for those who bemoan the lack of diversification of our economy. This is the opportunity for us to reach out to the world, and this is the opportunity for us to realize that for the long-range economic benefits of this State, we must go beyond the economic myopia of which some of my immediate colleagues have demonstrated, and what is out there? The rest of the world! We are small Hawaii in the middle of the Pacific. We need an opportunity to diversify and this is bringing the world to us. We're not going out to it, and I think this is a good bill -- a good possibility of diversification.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson then rose and remarked:

"I just wanted to show you that it's free and open discussion that we have at all times within our caucus.

"Thank you."

Representative Thielen, in rebuttal, stated:

"It may be economic myopia, but I take a look at the serious problems that we have in our State, and again I believe that we should focus here. This is an area that the private sector can step in and be a part of establishing -- this Pacific Data Center. I think we need to keep our economic myopia focused right on Hawaii -- dealing with the housing issues, dealing with the school issues --and again, with all due respect to my international colleague to my left who is maybe on my left on this one.

"Thank you."

Representative Apo then rose and remarked:

"At Representative Taniguchi's suggestion, we both would like to yield our ten minutes to Representatives Thielen and Ward."

Representative Lee then rose and stated:

"I rise to speak in favor of the bill in order to make a point of clarification. Both of my colleagues on my left are correct in their observations, and I think what the clarification would make is that if anyone who is interested in gambling -- lottery and all that -- he should be for this bill because commodities trading is the biggest crap shoots in the world."

Representative Ward then rose and remarked:

"Mr. Speaker, I don't rise to speak, fearing a recess would be called.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. I think that once the judge retires, she or he should be frozen at that level for retirement benefits.

"May the record also reflect that I agree with the sentiments of Representative Thielen. In addition to that, Mr. Speaker, we do not have shortage of judges. Maybe what should be done, Mr. Speaker, is for the courts to look at their rules and procedures. "This bill makes an appropriation of \$50,000, or so much as may be necessary for 1992-93, to remove hazardous materials from our schools.

"Much of the appropriation would be directed at chemistry and science classrooms that have stored unknown chemicals, some for over twenty years, in classrooms, closets, and storage areas. That sum is only a start, representing only a fraction of what is actually needed, to do a complete job of removing those chemicals and other potentially hazardous materials.

"The term 'hazardous' is significant here. It means there is potential danger to students, teachers, and custodians who come within reach of those materials every day.

"However, not knowing what those materials are, it's impossible to discard them. Without first analyzing their composition, there is no safe way to remove and discard those materials. Flushing those chemicals down the toilet, burying them, and dumping them in landfills are neither smart nor legal ways to discard those materials.

"The cost of analyzing the content of unknown and possibly hazardous materials -- let alone discarding them -- is indeed high.

"Higher still is the risk to the health and safety of students and staff.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3004, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR REMOVAL OF HAZARDOUS MATERIALS FROM PUBLIC SCHOOLS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1234-92 on S.B. No. 2868, SD 2, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2868, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE FINANCING OF AFFORDABLE RENTAL HOUSING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 2894, 2730, 3080, 3372, 2858, 3004 and 2868 had passed Third Reading at 11:57 o'clock a.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1235-92 on S.B. No. 2882, SD 2, HD 2:

By unanimous consent, action was deferred to the end of the calendar.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1236-92 on S.B. No. 2452, SD 1, HD 2:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 2452, SD 1, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Shon rose to speak in favor of the bill, with one reservation, stating:

"With respect to priorities for putting cables underground, I would hope in the future, we would also develop a system to prioritize areas where the highest levels of electromagnetic radiation being generated by cables are criteria for deciding where cables should also go underground so that we can eliminate potential risk to citizens where those cables are in near a vicinity.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2452, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS AND MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR PLACEMENT OF UTILITY WIRES, CABLES, AND RELATED EQUIPMENT UNDERGROUND IN THE AREA OF THE DIAMOND HEAD BIKEWAY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative D. Ige voting no.

having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Bunda voting no.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1419, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AN EMERGENCY RESPONSE TRAUMA PROGRAM," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1239-92 on S.B. No. 2407, SD 2, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2407, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION TO MARK THE ONE HUNDREDTH ANNIVERSARY OF THE OVERTHROW OF QUEEN LILIUOKALANI AND TO DISCUSS ISSUES OF HAWAIIAN SOVEREIGNTY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1240-92 on S.B. No. 2638, SD 1, HD 2:

By unanimous consent, action was deferred to the end of the calendar.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1241-92 on S.B. No. 2485, SD 2, HD 2:

By unanimous consent, action was deferred to the end of the calendar.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1242-92 on S.B. No. 2253, SD 2, HD 2:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 2253, SD 2, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Tam rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and colleagues, the amended draft that is before us has a total of seven provisions for assessing, studying, and discussing the Department of Education operations.

"One, modified lump-sum budgeting is to be assessed fully.

"Two, a student impact assessment report is to be done by the Legislative Auditor before the Legislature considers expenditures for new educational policies, programs, or activities.

"Three, an inventory is to be made of all 'add-on' programs seen as competing with basic skills program.

"Four, the longer school day and longer school year are to be examined.

"Five, the subject of class size reduction is to be studied broadly.

"Six, a school assessment and evaluation is to be discussed further.

"Seven, achievement standards and tests used by the Department of Education are to be assessed.

"The rationale that underlie all seven amendments reflects needs of education and those of housing and other human services agencies, our bleak revenue picture, and the existence of other legislative vehicles to improve education.

"I support the draft that's before us today in order to keep the fires of educational governance burning.

"It is likely that the Senate will come up with its own package on governance. That would maintain the momentum and the means to go into conference, but without the necessity of going into Special Session. As Chairman of the House Education Committee, I assure everyone that there will be an open process in place during conference.

"It is my hope that a solid package on educational governance emerges in the remaining weeks of the session.

"Thank you."

Representative Shon then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the first thing that must be said and acknowledged is the tremendous amount of discussion that has gone on over educational reform during the session, far broader than the usual process for dealing with bills, and I must commend the Leadership and everyone who have been involved with the wide-ranging, extensive meeting-after-meeting kind of discussion that's going on where philosophy has been put on the table, people have discussed their most intense personal feelings about how education takes place, how to improve it, and I must say that in the eight years that I have been here, I've never encountered such a wide-ranging inclusiveness involved with this kind of an issue.

"I must also comment that in the last week or so, I have been puzzled by reporters and others who have come up to me and said, 'oh, so I guess education reform is dead or something,' and I said, 'well, haven't you looked at the bills?. Haven't you examined what's going on?'

"This bill is a menu of a whole variety of issues that are going into Conference Committee and the bill, as it emerged from the Education Committee, had a menu. The bill that emerged from Finance Committee has a menu. The Senate has its own menu. There's going to be quite a banquet to choose from when we enter Conference Committee. And I think it is very praiseworthy of this body, knowing the ambivalence and differences and different feedback we're getting from the grassroots. Many people have commented of anecdotal, as well as statistical evidence, of grassroots and principals and teachers of having differences of opinion in education. And so we come together in this with a continued impressive commitment, not to defer, but to take it on head on, and I really must commend everyone who's been involved with this.

"I'm even puzzled by comments that because we had a serious discussion about the voluntary or mandatory notion of school/community-based management, that somehow this was a fumbling or an inadequacy of this body. I think it was very healthy that we had that discussion and there were many people in the schools who were very concerned about the way in which SCBM has been implemented, and I think it is commendable that the Committee on Education took those concerns seriously, considered it, finally decided they did not want to include

voluntary notion in one of the policies and moved the bill on.

"This is a process which should be celebrated and praised -- not criticized. And I must say I wonder at some of the editorial writers as to whether or not they're paying attention at all or do they just have an agenda and if we don't conform exactly to that agenda -- bang! -- we're going to be criticized. This is a very complex and intense issue, and I expect that the vehicle with which we communicate to the public, i.e. the media, should be as interested and as attentive and as informed as anyone, and I am frankly disappointed that the commentary on the process that has gone on has been so seemingly cavalier, lazy -- a number of other adjectives come to mind that do not, in my view, reflect the kind of process we've gone through and is continuing.

"We have had an enormous amount of debate over how to translate the fifteen or so recommendations of the task force into some form of legislation. Some of them are very difficult to translate into other than general statements -- some people should hold the meeting here, or we should review this and that -- and it is quite a challenge to know exactly how far we can go without interfering in other processes. There are others who believe that the only thing that's worth looking at is the structure of the Board of Education and if we don't change that, we haven't done anything, and if we do change it, we've done everything. But the fact of the matter is that what impacts on our students and our children is a very complex process that is going to take all our energies to understand and to be brought to bear on this.

"I am very proud of the House as it has behaved so far in dealing with this and also the Policy Committee which made recommendations to Finance, which came up with a number of drafts which the Education Committee then met and said ... well, which of these drafts do we think we would concur with? Prior concurrence was involved. I appreciate that because I think prior concurrence is an important and central element. Members of both parties were at that meeting when we discussed drafts that the Finance Committee was considering. There are certainly elements of this bill that I wish were there and aren't and there are things in there that I wish weren't there. But that's not the issue -- the issue is, are we moving forward with a fairly comprehensive menu of items to discuss in conference?

"And I am very optimistic that this Legislature is going to come out with more than just a quick answer that certain editorial writers think is the appropriate one. We're going to come out with a very thoughtful approach and things we will do this year and things that we will continue to do in the interim and next year and the year after that. And this is a 51-member participatory endeavor represented in Senate Bill 2253, and I look forward to the continued involvement of everyone. And I look forward to the use of this process in other complex issues that may come before this Legislature in the future.

"So, I would like to thank the Finance Committee, Leadership, the Policy Committee, the Education Committee, Minority members, everyone who has participated, in particular all those who have called us -- all the principals and teachers -- who have participated in this and given their opinion and their direction. Their continued input is very much needed, and I would like to ask very respectfully that the media look at these issues with care and with an informed view and not try to oversimplify it. Oversimplification is perhaps the greatest enemy in our efforts here. It can't be oversimplified. And with that, I would like to thank you very much."

Representative Yonamine then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with one reservation, stating:

"This is first, a very good bill, and I begin my remarks by commending the Task Force which we established that worked diligently for seven months to create the **Report of the Task Force on Educational Governance of the State of Hawaii**. What was accomplished by the Task Force was the result of careful work: they were thoroughly briefed by all the relevant branches of government and their functions. They held hours of public hearings and other meetings throughout the State to listen to teachers, administrators, parents, citizens, and educational experts. The issues involved are indeed complex and they took the time to learn about those complexities and to submit its recommendations.

"But most of all, the bill under consideration is also a testimony to the hard work and the thorough discussions conducted by policy committees, our task forces, education committees, finance committees and discussions by all House members. Our task is to understand and follow up on the basic components of this bill. And this will take time. To keep up the momentum established by the Task Force and to deliberate and plan and monitor the process is essential. Something this important cannot be rushed. Our task is to do careful future work. That's our commitment to the people of Hawaii. We are creating a strategic planning document that will put in place, in timely fashion, all of the hard work that is ahead of us and to be worked on by other entities concerned with public education.

"Having said this, I must now express my one reservation regarding this bill. It concerns the makeup of the Board of Education. The **Final Report of the Task Force on Educational Governance** suggests that the voters be given a choice of three structures for the Board of Education:

1. That local Boards of Education be elected along county lines;
2. That the current Board of Education be maintained but converted to an appointed Board with the Superintendent also appointed; and
3. That the current Board of Education be maintained but limited to policymaking authority only.

"This bill does not contain any provision for a new governance structure as it relates to the franchise for people to make a significant say in public education. Our House bill contains only the elected Board in its present state.

"The implications of each of these choices are profound; each has merit, noteworthy features that will begin reform from the top down or from the bottom up. Each needs to be thoroughly discussed by the people of this State. Then, after this discussion has taken place, the people should vote on the option that they want. Let's hope in conference that we allow the people of Hawaii what they want in the School Board.

"In the election of this School Board now, the situation currently in place does not work, as you well know. It has had the effect of disenfranchising the people. The present system to select Board members is so constituted that people don't know for whom they are voting. And elected Board members do not really have a close relationship with their constituency that placed them in office because, first of all, they are elected by those outside or residing in their districts. The result is a lack

of real accountability by those elected, and a lack of ownership of the process and its results by the voters on the local school level.

"Allowing the voters, after thorough discussion of the options, to make the choice of the makeup of the Board will have a crucial result of involving people in the process of choosing how their schools will be governed.

"As I said before, we are creating a strategic planning document. The passage of this bill is not the end of our work. It is imperative that we carefully monitor the process, that reporting back takes place. In other words, our work has just begun. But again, I commend my colleagues for putting together this very good comprehensive plan to reform our public schools.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Marumoto then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"Though this bill contains many noteworthy ideas, this education bill, if passed, would simply study these ideas to death.

"Yes, reducing class size is a good idea and a longer school day is worthy of consideration, as well as a year-round school concept. Yes, lump sum budgeting will help expedite repairs and we should inventory add-on programs. But evaluations and assessments of these concepts will not help our kids' education now.

"Another session means another year in the life of a child. And more studies is just a cop out. No matter how governance turns out this year, it is incumbent upon us incumbents to make some meaningful improvements in education in neighborhood schools, and in the classrooms. We need concrete steps, not more studies, which is all this bill consists of.

"I am also distressed about this measure because it was concocted by the House Majority Policy Subcommittee, and not by the Education Committee. Only Democrats were included in the formulation of this bill.

"A previous speaker said this was an inclusive process and I disagree. I feel it was exclusive. Finance decided on this bill on April 2nd, they had to deal with prior concurrence but the Education Committee did not meet until April 3rd -- well after the lateral deadline. They then rubber-stamped the Majority. . .

At this point, Representative Apo rose on a point of order and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I believe the track that Representative Marumoto is on is irrelevant to the issue."

The Chair then asked Representative Marumoto "to stick to the issue itself."

Representative Marumoto continued:

"I thank the Vice Speaker for his advice; however, a Majority member had spoken about the inclusivity of this measure and I was just addressing the exclusivity of the formulation of it. However, I think my point has been made.

"I think that the previous speaker from Pearl City made a very strong point when he said this bill does not deal with the issues of governance, and I think we should come to grips with this issue this session.

"Just to wrap-up, I'd like to say because this was a Policy Subcommittee measure and that committee has no standing in this body -- it's an unofficial committee of this House -- that the Minority will not get any credit for this measure, but I feel neither will it get the blame.

"Thank you very much."

Representative O'Kieffe then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, Senate Bill 2253 is about openness and public input. The time line I think is important because when Senate Bill 2253, HD 1, was heard in the Finance Committee on the 27th of March, there were nineteen testifiers who testified for House Draft 1, which included the Task Force on governance, the Board of Education, the Department of Education, the Chamber of Commerce, the HSTA, and the Hawaii Business Roundtable, to oppose that House Draft 1. But at the end of that hearing, decision making was deferred. French Cuffca must have got a hold of this bill because by April 2nd, it had metamorphosed into a completely different animal.

"Education is for Hawaii's children. It's more important than political gamesmanship. And some of the points that were deleted from House Draft 1 were important points. For example, to require the Governor to conduct a public hearing to explain any proposed vetoes, cuts, or restrictions in the budget of the Department of Education and to receive public input on the proposed budgetary action, whoever controls the purse has the power. But, of course, we all know that power can corrupt and absolute power can corrupt absolutely.

"The part that was added to the bill didn't go far enough. That was to require a thorough assessment and evaluation of modified lump sum budgeting as recommended by the Task Force on educational governance. The governance Task Force recommended lump sum budgeting and I hope that this can be addressed in the Conference Committee and be in place in seven years rather than just requiring a thorough assessment.

"The Finance Committee added seven items and took out three, and I believe that this is, when we looked through the digest yesterday, this was one of about four or five bills that was radically changed by the Conference Committee and going beyond what the subject matter committee had placed in House Draft 1.

"So in closing, Mr. Speaker, I hope when this bill goes to Conference Committee, it can re-evaluate those important items that were taken out by the Finance Committee, and I hope that the Conference Committee will also reference Chapter 92 which is the public hearing process for agencies. And in this particular example, the Department of Budget and Finance can hold public hearings to allow the public to express their opinion in an open and democratic way.

"Again, Mr. Speaker, this bill is about openness and public input. It is not about political gamesmanship.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Tatibouet then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, and requested that Representative O'Kieffe's remarks be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Ward then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"One truth seems self-evident and that is, education is in trouble in Hawaii. As a whole, the system does enjoy the support of the Board -- it guides it; we in the Legislature who fund it; the Department of Education that runs it, and the educators who teach in it, particularly the parents who put their children in it, and contrary to Representative Shon's remarks, I don't see anybody in my district praising or dancing in the streets for the condition of education in Hawaii.

"The fact is, the system is not working. There's been thousands of dollars and thousands of hours that have been spent on the Berman Report and the Governor's Task Force on governance. All we see now is a watered-down version that seems to be coming out which you might call, instead of a revolutionary report, a wimp report.

"The media, unfortunately, has called a spade a spade, and I think this body needs to be alerted to that. Nothing is happening or is likely to happen and what we need to do is rescue the best of these reports and the best of the Task Force's recommendations. I'm not convinced we'll do this issue justice by trying to press it into the business of this session or trying to give it the thirty minutes that we do now by talking about it on the floor. I think we're too preoccupied, too distracted, and too much out of an educational mode in terms of substantive element rather than rhetorical embellishments.

"Mr. Speaker, I think there is only one solution to this educational climax in Hawaii and that's a Special Session where we give only of our time directly to the educational issue, and only of the educational issue. The Special Session would focus right at this important crux that we are on right now. This bill does not meet the criteria. It's an omnibus bill. . .

At this point, Representative Apo rose on a point of order and stated:

"The current speaker's remarks are irrelevant to the measure."

Representative Ward continued:

"Mr. Speaker, Senate Bill 2253 is an omnibus bill to put all under one package and to try to do what would be impossible to really give education the attention that it needs. A Special Session is the only way we're going to be able to do this...

The Chair interrupted and stated:

"We'll decide that when it comes."

Representative Ward continued:

"But the point of it is, that to say we're going to settle this issue, I think is to fool the public, to distort the fact that education is important and that we're not able to give it that, and that's what this bill is trying to get around, and I don't think it's fair. It's a cheap excuse. What we need is a Special Session.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Apo then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, it's always interesting to me that whenever we have issues like this before us, the loyal opposition always characterizes the glass being half empty and I'd like to look at it as the glass being half full. Certainly, in any one, two, three, four, five sessions, we are not going to solve all the problems of education.

When we consider that we are trying to reverse over a hundred years of the development of the public education system based upon an industrial age paradigm, and try to make a smoother transition into an information age paradigm which requires major changes in roles and responsibilities and the way business is done, this is not going to happen in any one or two sessions.

"I do agree with the previous speaker that, of course, we're not going to solve it this session. I don't believe a Special Session is going to solve it either, and I think the word of caution is that, let us be careful not to acquiesce to the demands of the illusion that we're taking significant actions when, in fact, some of the suggestions that I hear throughout the year would throw us into a state of chaos. Many of the suggestions that I'm hearing such as lump sum budgeting within the concept of school/community-based management in throwing open decision making to the community level, a lot of these things have to be worked out. There has to be some sort of command structure. None of that has been worked out because when we talk about decision making at the community level which we all support, both sides of the aisle, the process by which that has to occur needs to be very clearly spelled out or what we end up with is a situation and an opportunity for anarchy to prevail at the community level and worse yet, total chaos because we have not yet established a process by which it is clear as to how those decisions are going to be made with respect to hiring and firing, who is responsible, who is accountable for budgeting, if lump sum budgeting is granted at the school level? Do the parents have anything to say? What do they have to say about what happens? What about the teachers? These are not questions that we are going to answer in any one session.

"Now, I would like to spend thirty seconds talking about the process by which this bill came about which I happen to be very proud of.

"First of all, I have to commend the Majority Leader in using his initiative and running a great risk of opening up the discussion on the whole restructuring problem within the House to the Majority Caucus. Yes, it is true that the Policy Committee had inserted itself as a bridge both between the Finance Committee and the Committee on Education as well as to any member of the Majority Caucus that wanted to participate in the two subgroups that he established to look at both the financial picture as well as structural changes. That process has been decried as being something foul. I think, in fact, it has set a new precedent for the operations of this House that, in fact, an issue as important as education and my hope is that on other issues, we will be able to open up the process so that every member of the House, particularly in the Majority Caucus through the Policy Committee who chooses to participate on an issue that is of statewide significance, has the opportunity to do so through an orderly process which the Majority Leader has successfully carried out. I am proud that this has happened. It is unprecedented in us handling this kind of an issue, and I particularly appreciate his efforts, the risk that we took, and I think the bill we have before us does represent the consensus of the Caucus.

"I would finally say, Mr. Speaker, that the original attempt was simply to keep a vehicle bill open that was not a loaded shotgun so that we would have an opportunity to take the issue of restructuring education into conference. We have not only accomplished that but I think we have started down the road of looking at some meaningful reform although some would disagree that any of the suggestions proposed in this measure are significant at all.

"Thank you."

Representative Bunda, in rebuttal, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I was not planning on speaking but I do take exception to some of the comments that have been made.

"You know, as a member of the Task Force, it was not an easy job, and some of the proposals that came about impact our very House here and it impacts this very process, and I had to swallow a lot when some of these proposals came about. And the reason why I say this is many of the proposals that came down were very far-reaching and the implication was that it impacted the Administration, the Legislature, students, everybody involved, and I do believe that we need to take the steps very slowly, and we are heading in the right direction I believe, and eventually passing many of the proposals taken up by the Task Force.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Anderson then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I really should. . . I wanted to speak against it, but education when we run, everyone of us here put down in our brochure -- education is first and foremost -- everyone of us. And the Task Force? I'm embarrassed that we had to go and get a task force.

"I listened to Representative Shon saying that we have to go slowly and everything is there and that in eight years, he's never seen so much input. Well, in fourteen years, ladies and gentlemen, I'm embarrassed that we've sat here and almost everything that the Task Force came up with, we've had bills for it, we've had resolutions for it, we've sat on. We haven't done a bloody thing that is not in there. For two years, I've sat on the Kaelepulu School school-based management and when we went in to get our permit or to be qualified for school-based management and it's in the law, they said we're not ready yet to take this under consideration. We have to look at it and study it. We study everything to death. Instead of saying, let's go ahead and move forward -- if it's wrong, we'll correct it. No, we study lump sum budgeting, two on one, whatever. We have done more damage than good and we sit here and say how wonderful it is that we now have a bill and we're going to study some more, and we're going to look at, and that a task force takes over our job and does what we're supposed to have done years ago.

"When I went to a public education system, we had a two tier. We had English standard and non-English standard. And all of a sudden, when the Majority Party took over, we're going to have public education where everybody was the same so we did away with English standard and went down to the other way, and they said that was betterment. Now we're saying we need all of these people to have a better educational system that is going to need improvement and everything else. We have not done well for education! We do not back up our teachers. We do not have even the principals backing up our teachers, and now we're saying that this is going to help.

"I got involved a few years ago, if you remember, because a teacher was stricken and I didn't even know it was in Kailua. It happened to be another Senator who put in a bill and it died. But the teacher was hit by a student because he accidentally stepped on his slipper. And all of a sudden the principal said, we're going to have to have the student expelled for a while, and then they changed their mind because the parents came in and

said, you can't do that to my child. So the teacher was out.

"Ladies and gentlemen, we have to go ahead and start saying -- we can do this for education, we have to back up our teachers, we're going to have school-based management. But don't sit here and say how wonderful it is when we're not doing our job.

"Thank you."

The Chair then remarked:

"No wonder you speak so well -- you went to English standard, just like me."

Representative Young then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, we've heard over and over again that public education is the cornerstone of our economic vitality, and social and political institutions.

"We know, both rationally and intuitively, that public education will be the deciding factor in our State's future success. I take exception to what Representative Anderson and Representative Ward said about our public schools. We have some great teachers, great students in our schools and we just need more. I think Kailua Elementary School in our district is a shining example. Principal Francine Fernandez was the Principal of the Year, went to the mainland, and her school is a wonderful example of what public schools can do.

"This bill has its strength. I speak in favor of this bill, but this bill has its strength. In fact, I recall a speech given on Opening Day of the Legislature five years ago when Speaker Richard Kawakami said, 'Let us cast aside the model in which an education must be obtained in a nine-month school year or only between 8:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. and entertain the potential benefits of a longer school year or a longer school day.'

"We have laid the foundations for that innovation in this bill.

"But this bill has its weaknesses and you've heard many of them because of its silence in other innovations. If we are going to prepare for the future, we must begin to think in terms of bottom up process, involving teachers more in making the essential decisions that impact the learning process, giving more flexibility to schools to be innovative, recognizing that the producers in the schools are the students. It is they who produce the relevant output which is pupil learning.

"The key goal, I believe, of education is to prepare students to continue to be producers of their own learning.

"The skills of the future are double TLC -- tender loving care -- and the ability to think, learn and create. It takes creativity to respond to change, to create a better future for our children.

"Yes, everything we want will require tremendous resources. But let's take a lesson from our self-help housing programs. We have affordable homes there because of sweat equity, because of the hours people are willing to put into building their homes. So let's be prepared to put in some sweat equity in coming together with some solid, progressive reforms for our public school system.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Thielen then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"It's been said today that this bill provides a menu of a variety of issues, but I believe that our school children and their parents are going to ask us -- where's the beef?"

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lee then rose and requested that his remarks, in support of the bill, be entered into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Lee's remarks are as follows:

"Representative Yonamine has made a most thoughtful and reasoned speech, and I ask that his remarks be entered into the Journal as if they were mine.

"I echo his reservation on the silence of reform of school governance.

"We should have the courage in ourselves and the confidence in the people, and let the voters decide what kind of Board of Education we need -- an elected or an appointed Board.

"The Berman Report recommended reform of governance. The Task Force chaired by the Lt. Governor recommended that the voters decide the issue. The newspapers urged that we make a decision and let the voters vote on the issue.

"Let us do it."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2253, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

At 12:38 o'clock p.m., Representative Taniguchi asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 1:22 o'clock p.m., the Vice Speaker assumed the rostrum.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1262-92 on S.B. No. 3316, SD 1, HD 2:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 3316, SD 1, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Marumoto rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I believe this bill has been cut down quite a bit and essentially still a study, but on the other hand, I think this measure will lead to the establishment of more artificial reefs in Waikiki which in turn will attract sharks to our well-populated Kuhio Beach, therefore, I am opposed to this in no uncertain terms.

"I am distressed to see that this bill will create a committee which could delineate the boundaries of a conservation area, and 'plan to expand the Waikiki Marine Life Conservation District.' Legislators will then be out of the loop in determining whether such an area should be established and where.

"I think our swimmers and our surfers should be protected, and our jet skiers and our parasailers don't need shark-infested waters. Boaters who anchor and dive off Waikiki also need protection, and finally, our tourists deserve the safest water conditions possible.

"I hope you all agree. Please vote no to sharks."

Representative Metcalf then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I have heard of reading between the lines but, Mr. Speaker, quite frankly, nowhere in the bill is there any mention of the establishment of artificial reefs or the encouragement of sharks to Waikiki. Quite the contrary, Mr. Speaker, the bill calls for a task force to be comprised of some seventeen different groups -- all user groups currently using the waters off Waikiki, including swimmers, beachboys, surfers, commercial fishermen and the like -- and what this bill calls for is a feasibility plan to be presented to the Legislature in the event that:

1. It is deemed feasible; and
2. Reserving to the Legislature the ultimate decision on whether or not a marine conservation district should be expanded in this area or not.

"I think it's a very laudable measure and I think that the subject matter Chair, Representative Stegmaier, and the author of the bill, Representative Bainum, are both to be commended for the hours of effort that they put into this bill in an attempt to seek a fair and equitable resolution involving all the parties interested in this area. And, in fact, when the hearing was concluded, the parties did leave with a sense of accomplishment and a sense that they would work together to determine whether or not this would be a feasible area for expansion of marine life conservation district and in no way takes the Legislature out of the loop, and there's nothing in the bill that I think any shark would find particularly tasty."

Representative Duldulao rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"As I see this bill, the decision was made on the Judiciary level, and I read the bill and it says here that a task force has to be formed. Number one, I am not too sure what really the importance of the task force will be.

"At the height of a budget constraint this year, if this task force needs some budget allocation, I question, how come this bill was not presented before the Finance Committee? As I look into this bill, I cannot find a dollar amount for the task force to expend.

"Again, I question, how much will it cost us? With this, Mr. Speaker, I am voting no.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill has come a long way and not only Representative Metcalf's people that he commended, he himself should be commended because of where it started and where it is now. It has been a real distance. . . I speak for the bill with slight reservations, and that's in the form of three questions, Mr. Speaker.

"The first is that it's under the State Planning Office. Why not the Department of Land and Natural Resources? The real issue of marine life belongs in that.

"The second question is, why the report would be due in the middle of June rather than before the session in 1994 so there can be more public access and input which was really one of the big volatile point in the hearings previously.

"Lastly, why some of the language in the report didn't reflect that in the actual study by the Department of Land and Natural Resources. It said the possibility of putting breakwaters in Waikiki would be thought of if we wanted to really make it Hanauma Bay with no turbidity or turbidity in the water and the possibility of eliminating surfing in Waikiki.

"I think that was such a momentous point, it deserves mentioning because if that's ever a possibility, it could be very threatening. But otherwise, it's been a commendable job by all those who sponsored it and delivered upon it.

"Thank you."

Representative Bainum then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to address the issue of sharks.

"Mr. Speaker, at the last hearing we had three experts, including Dr. John Randolph of Bishop Museum who, I have been informed, is one of the leading shark experts throughout the Pacific area, if not the world, and he's rarely in town because he's in such demand. He stated that he shared no concerns about the possibility of the marine life conservation district attracting additional sharks.

"But some interesting data did come out during the discussion, mainly in the study back in 1965 to 1967. They looked at the number of sharks in Waikiki and at that point, during the two-year period, they catalogued over 80 in the Waikiki waters, 16 of which were tiger sharks. So, if anything, there's a long history of sharks in that area. I think they will continue to be, and I think measures to control sharks are a separate issue and we should not let emotionalism regarding this certain species blind ourselves to the larger issue which is conservation and environmental concerns.

"Thank you."

Representative Marumoto then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I thank the Chairman of the Judiciary Committee for his reassurance. I certainly hope he is right but, nevertheless, I remain in opposition, not to marine life conservation districts, which I think will be very helpful for fishermen and snorkelers, but I oppose the location in Waikiki where there are so many tourists and so many recreational activities.

"Thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3316, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PROTECTION OF THE MARINE ENVIRONMENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 41 ayes to 10 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Duldulao, Fukunaga, Hashimoto, Horita, D. Ige, Marumoto, Okamura, Santiago and Thompson voting no.

Representative Ward rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"This bill is called the 'tax payment bill.' I think it's better known as 'your government is greedy bill.' It's another attempt to leverage the private sector for government's shortcoming and, in this case, cash flow shortage.

"This bill says that the Governor wants its money quicker by its withholding taxes and corporate taxes from the private sector, not to be in fifteen days but in ten days, and I hope that's not so we can spend the public's money quicker. We have to realize that 85 percent of every job out there comes from the private sector. Fifty percent of the State budget comes from the GET tax that the private sector is contributing and another 30 percent or so comes from the employee taxes of which this bill directly speaks to, that instead of the employers giving it fifteen days after the end of the monthly payment, the government wants it ten days earlier.

"I think that we have to be aware of our economic surroundings and know that it's been said that the neighbor islands this year will have a 50 percent occupancy rate of their hotels. The downturn in the economy is here. If we want to put people out of work, we got to keep putting more burden on business. Sometimes I think it's like the TV commercial of Mikey -- give it to Mikey, he'll eat it. And I think we've got to pull back to say, let's stick it to business -- they'll take it.

"Mr. Speaker, this is not a tax bill -- it's a cash flow crunch that we're trying to cover up our own inadequacies with.

"Thank you."

Representative Souki then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, point of clarification for the previous speaker across the aisle.

"This bill here is for companies that pay over \$100,000 in taxes. All businesses now, with the exception of the banks and the public utilities, need to pay their taxes on a monthly basis. The only two exemptions were for the public utilities and the banks.

"What this bill does -- it makes it uniform that the public utilities and the banks will also pay at the same time as the other organizations do. We should all make note that the federal government requires all businesses to pay on a monthly basis, and this bill will only provide

equity for all businesses and not to provide favoritism to the public utilities and to the banking institutions. By the way, it will save the State \$500,000. What these institutions were doing by not paying the State -- they were banking it away -- and it is only fair that they be treated the same as any other business. That's all, Mr. Speaker.

"Thank you very much."

"Mr. Speaker, I believe that this measure finally closes the loophole to a particular type of behavior we have heretofore been unable to deal with, and that is behavior that we commonly call 'stalking' where a person has not made an overt assault against another person nor has a person said anything with any specificity so as to determine terroristic threatening, but the conduct still

calls for an escalation in fear and in some severe cases, in fact, eventually leads to the harm or the death of another human being.

"I would like to thank my colleagues for their support of this measure. It is one of the cornerstones of the women's package, and I urge all of my colleagues to support it.

"Mr. Speaker, you will note I am having some difficulty speaking today. That is because I am somewhat handicapped. I have asked for an interpreter of Portuguese/Hawaiian extraction to assist me in my being able to speak but have not yet gotten it.

"Thank you for your patience."

Representative Thielen then rose and requested that Representative Amaral's remarks be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Thielen then said:

"At the committee hearing, I will be very glad to act as her interpreter."

Representative Bainum rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Bainum's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, the court system has made it increasingly difficult to impose new regulations to restrict the insultingly-high level of prostitution now seen in Honolulu, especially in the tourist areas of Waikiki. While these areas are used by our visitors, it is vital to keep in mind that Waikiki is home to thousands of our own residents, people who must pass by open solicitation on their way to and from their homes. That entire families, both visitors and residents, must view blatant solicitation is not right and I, therefore, continue to support legislation to discourage this illegal trade.

"Senate Bill 1528, HD 1, adds several important new deterrents. It permits the taking of a written statement from a declarant to the solicitation whether that person is available as a witness or not. Proper legal safeguards are incorporated. The fine for a first offense is increased from \$500 to \$1,000. For each subsequent offense a fine is imposed and the court would be able to sentence the person to perform community services.

"These are starts, and we must all continue to support new regulations that will make prostitution unprofitable. Prostitution creates extremely serious health problems, leads to a breakdown in our basic social system, and invites many forms of crime associated with the vast amounts of monies involved. Each year we must introduce legislation the courts will have to accept until this crime is removed from our streets.

"Please join with me and send a strong message to our liberal courts -- let's give the police and the prosecuting attorneys the tools to finally rid our streets of this crime."

Representative Souki then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I will be voting against this bill, only on the basis of an area that I think may create some problems in the future, and I discussed this with the Judiciary Chairman who has done a wonderful job on all of the bills that come out of his committee.

"But in this bill here, in the area of loitering, that can provide a fine up to one thousand dollars for one who

loiters in the street and could provide undue harassment, not only to one who works in the evening, but also to some innocent party that might be lurking in the evening, and it could lead to some harassments and possibly infringement of one's civil rights.

"On the basis of civil rights for the ones who work in the evening, I wish to speak against this bill.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1528, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PENAL CODE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Souki voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 2228, 3436, 2678 and 1528 had passed Third Reading at 1:44 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 806, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, S.B. No. 806, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LOBBYISTS LAW EXEMPTIONS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 2892, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that S.B. No. 2892, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Thielen rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I strongly oppose deleting the notification requirement when prison inmates are released to work furloughs or conditionally released or to somewhat similar program. I want law enforcement officials to be notified whenever such release occurs, and I think it is foolish of us to assume that a prisoner who is released would not be capable of committing an offense against the person. I don't see the merit in believing that where someone is committed for an offense not against the person that that person would not be capable thereafter of moving to a more serious offense. I think it's in the best interest of the law enforcement community and the neighborhoods and their residents to have this notification occur.

"Thank you."

Representative Tatibouet then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I would just like to add that my reason for voting no on this bill is because it only includes they only be given notification for an offense against the person under Chapter 707, and it does not include offenses of Chapter 711 which would be stalking, and I believe in the future, Peeping Toms. But I think those two categories need to be included, and that's why I'm voting against it.

"Thank you very much."

At 1:46 o'clock p.m., Representative Stegmaier asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 1:47 o'clock p.m., Representative Stegmaier spoke in favor of the bill, stating:

"I had a question whether the Police Departments themselves had come to testify in favor of this bill, and

apparently they have, so they do not have any reservations at all about the public security being compromised in any way and, therefore, I will support this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"As Representative Amaral just spoke about the new breakthrough for stalking -- that law will, in effect, become law which then this one will not cover because it's outside that chapter. And I think if there's any protection of women, stalking is clearly one of those and, as mentioned, Peeping Toms.

"The point is, Mr. Speaker, let's not give anyone a chance to be a Willy Horton in Hawaii.

"Thank you."

Representative Amaral then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"The measure goes far in alerting members of potentially violent persons -- persons who have committed offenses against persons. In the ideal world, should there be sufficient resources, we would like everyone to be told of the release of every felon. However, this is not an ideal world and there aren't sufficient resources for them and so the priority must be given to those who are considered most dangerous, and those are the ones that are convicted of offenses against persons. That being the case, I totally support this measure and ask my colleagues to do the same.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2892, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONDITIONAL RELEASE CENTERS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes to 6 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Marumoto, O'Kieffe, Tatibouet, Thielen and Ward voting no.

S.B. No. 3145, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, S.B. No. 3145, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FIREARMS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 2963, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, S.B. No. 2963, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FAMILY COURTS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 3345, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, S.B. No. 3345, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AERONAUTICS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 806, 2892, 3145, 2963 and 3345 had passed Third Reading at 1:50 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 2231, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, S.B. No. 2231, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII RULES OF EVIDENCE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 2654, SD 1, HD 1:

By unanimous consent, action was deferred to the end of the calendar.

S.B. No. 1440, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that S.B. No. 1440, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Thielen rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I am opposing this measure because, as it is written, district court judges in our State would be exempt from taking the loyalty oath. I think that's a serious omission and because of that defect, I cannot support this bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I entirely agree with the intent of the bill, however in that academic freedom, especially for the UH professors in which this bill was initially addressed for, should be excluded. As a member of the HPU adjunct faculty and Chaminade, I've seen how the State can, in effect, intercept and interrupt the ideas of academia.

"However, this bill goes beyond the University of Hawaii professors and throws the proverbial baby out with the water. Unknowingly, this bill clean sweeps the oath of office. It makes a number of grave mistakes -- one is the district court judges and another is, it exempts those who are at the county level -- the Mayors, the City Councils -- and most importantly, Mr. Speaker, it exempts the military.

"We have a Department of Defense here that has thousands of members and it spends millions of dollars. General Richardson, the head of our National Guard, is an oath taker because he is confirmed by the Senate and they are covered by this. However, the soldiers under him are not. General Richardson told me that his troops take an oath of office to both defend the U.S. Constitution and the State Constitution.

"If this bill passes in its present form, these soldiers, like those of many Third World countries, will not be bound to uphold the Constitution or an ideal larger than themselves but simply those who are in power over them. In America, we are a nation of law, not a nation of men or those who are in power telling those in the military what to do.

"This bill, therefore, contravenes a great tradition in America and that is that the military is always subservient to the civilian power. Remove the oath of office for the military in Hawaii and we weaken our society by failing to draw attention to the high ideals set forth in the State as each of us who came into this office have, in fact, a reason for speaking here is because it's put down under authority under the Constitution.

"Mr. Speaker, I suggest we amend this bill and put the military in and ask the Conference Committee to seriously reconsider reinserting Hawaii's military. I know I can

say without mentioning we are not a Third World country, therefore, we should look to professors not having to take an oath but because we are a First World country, we should have at least our military under our control and that control being allegiance to the Constitution.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At 1:53 o'clock p.m., Representative Souki asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:55 o'clock p.m.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1440, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF HAWAII TO CHANGE THE REQUIREMENT FOR THE OATH OF OFFICE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Tatibouet, Thielen and Ward voting no.

S.B. No. 2551, SD 2, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, S.B. No. 2551, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHILD ABUSE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 1283, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, S.B. No. 1283, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PENAL CODE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Metcalf rose and stated:

"I would like to stand in support of the measure and in doing so, just note that the persistent concerns expressed by the Minority relative to certain other measures that they feel need improvement, the Judiciary Chair notes that by voting down on these measures, they've effectively taken themselves out of the opportunity to participate in conference to make those improvements that they suggest needed to be made, and the Chair just points that out so that they can exercise perhaps a greater measure of discretion.

"Thank you."

Representative Thielen then rose to respond to the comments, stating:

"I would rather stand and vote with integrity and vote against a measure that I feel is wrong than to hedge my vote and go with reservations merely so I can sit on the Conference Committee. If I feel a measure is wrong across the board, I will express the reasons why I feel it is wrong and I will cast my vote accordingly. I will not

water it down just so I could sit on a Conference Committee.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair said:

"Your point is noted."

Representative O'Kieffe then rose and stated:

"I just wanted to point out to the Chairman of the Judiciary Committee that we are aware of what we did when we all go down on a measure."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2893, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC SAFETY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

"Mr. Speaker, I am speaking in favor of Senate Bill 2626 with the understanding, it was just clarified for me, that Project A for two dollars, Project B for two dollars, Project C for two dollars and Project D for two dollars, is not an increase to the Capitol renovation project but what it is aimed at projects in all of the representatives' districts. And with that understanding, I vote in favor of this bill."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2626, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Tatibouet rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"This bill will impact the neighbor islands' small car rental businesses and while it won't affect Oahu because they already have county ordinances long in effect which essentially do what this bill does, it will affect the many small businesses on the neighbor islands who otherwise may not afford to be in business because their insurance rates have the possibility of increasing considerably in order to cover bodily injury and, therefore, I vote against this bill.

"Thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 3109, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RENTAL MOTOR VEHICLES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Duldulao, D. Ige, O'Kieffe and Tatibouet voting no.

"I just rise to speak in favor, with reservations, on said bill, noting my discussions with the subject matter committee chairman, wherein she has assured me that she will look at the 120 days, basically because it's unconscionable and we'll have to change that.

"I hope that she also finds some time to review the requirements per residency. We do have a crisis in Hawaii -- a housing crisis -- and we shouldn't be giving consideration to non-residents, those who reside as snowbirds, or residents of other states in this country, or for that matter, foreigners.

"Let's start and kind of get our heads out of the sand and deal with reality. We stand here and give a lot of rhetoric about affordable housing but yet, when it comes to our land, there is no hesitancy to give first consideration to foreigners and to non-residents. I hope she takes that into consideration in her deliberations if, in fact, it goes to conference on this matter.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 363, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LEASEHOLDS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 3271, 3109, 2943 and 363 had passed Third Reading at 2:07 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 2676, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, S.B. No. 2676, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE INSURANCE CODE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 2237, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, S.B. No. 2237, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO BAIL BOND BUSINESSES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 2773, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that S.B. No. 2773, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Horita rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"As mentioned in caucus yesterday, I appreciate and commend the subject matter chairperson for taking the steps of eliminating the duplication of a written exam for foreign nurses. However, as I raised in caucus, nurses, as well as other health care professionals, often deal with us in situations of illness and in life-threatening situations, and I should hope that these health care professionals are proficient in English, in the mother language of our State.

"Language proficiency, as many of us know who have studied foreign language, is made up of not only written comprehension and reading comprehension, but also oral speaking comprehension. And this is something that I realize, while other jurisdictions throughout the United States do not do, that Hawaii has often been at the forefront in other kinds of issues and this is perhaps an area that we could look at. I am sure that all of us, should we be in the position of having to be cared for by someone, we would want to be able to communicate with them and be able to have them understand us. Thank you."

Representative Lee then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I am voting against Senate Bill 2773 because it eliminates the English proficiency examination for foreign nurse graduates.

"The purpose of the bill is to address the shortage of nurses by eliminating the requirement for English proficiency. This requirement has been in place for years, and indeed foreign students are not admitted to the University of Hawaii without taking an English proficiency examination.

"We should therefore not eliminate the English requirement for foreign nurses. We must be concerned with the health of residents who put their welfare in the hands of nurses."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2773, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NURSING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Lee voting no.

S.B. No. 2729, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, S.B. No. 2729, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RECORDATION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 2258, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, S.B. No. 2258, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOTOR VEHICLE INSURANCE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 2676, 2237, 2773, 2729 and 2258 had passed Third Reading at 2:09 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 1843, SD 2, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that S.B. No. 1843, SD 2, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Arakaki then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I did want to mention in passing that the committee did go through a long hearing on this issue and while I don't think we address the total issue of firearms control, I do believe that we address some of the real concerns that the law enforcement community has addressed in terms of the assault pistols, and we did address that.

"I think we also made a statement in terms of our willingness to face the issue and take a step forward in that direction in the interest of public safety, and I want to thank the Chair and Vice Chair of the Judiciary Committee for helping to craft this compromise and expressing our desire for the House as well as moving forward on this issue.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Metcalf then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"On behalf of Vice Chair Amaral and myself, I would like to, of course, thank the Majority Floor Leader for his comments. I would just note that there's a certain amount of misinformation about this bill as reported in one of the dailies. The daily incorrectly stated that the bill was received by the House as a bill that banned both assault pistols and assault rifles and that somehow the House stripped out the assault rifles and left only the pistols.

"Quite frankly, that was not the case, Mr. Speaker. The bill, as received, only related to certain forms of assault rifles which the law enforcement community testified to repeatedly during the seven-hour hearing that was held on the subject. They were most concerned with assault pistols because of their ready concealability, and that's what the House focused in on. At the same time, the committee heard considerable testimony from hunters, from target-shooting enthusiasts, and others that there were legitimate applications for semi-automatic rifles, and so we chose to concentrate our efforts in the direction that the law enforcement community was most concerned about.

"The only thing that I would add is that after last night's episode at the Honolulu International Country

Club, when this measure goes to conference, we may include assault for other rifles as well. Thank you."

Representative Anderson then rose and requested that his remarks, in support of the bill, with reservations, be entered into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Anderson's remarks are as follows:

"I will support this bill, but I do have some reservations which I would like to note.

"First, while this bill imposes controls on pistols, it does not include any controls on assault type rifles that are machine gun-like in being fully automatic.

"Second, as a general principle, I dislike imposing laws that take away any individual rights. All too often those who ask for certain limitations of rights with all good intentions eventually come back to ask for further rights to be taken away."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1843, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FIREARMS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 2592, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, S.B. No. 2592, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THEFT," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 1166, SD 2, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that S.B. No. 1166, SD 2, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"My concern is that when a formal charge is initiated to an agency alleging misconduct by an agency employee, the only measure of fairness the employee will get before that employee's name is released is that the employee will have a notice and an opportunity to respond to the complaint. There is no real protective process such as the agency being required to comply with evidentiary hearing or provide a contested case proceeding.

"So I am concerned that there could be an abuse and then the name would be released publicly, and we all know what happens when a name is spread across the front of the paper with an allegation. If that allegation is proven to be unfounded, the notice that it was proven unfounded is usually found in the want ads.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1166, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNIFORM INFORMATION PRACTICES ACT (MODIFIED)," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Young voting no.

S.B. No. 2227, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that S.B. No. 2227, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Thielen rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"As I have followed this bill through the Legislature, I have spoken out against it in the subject matter committee and on the floor.

"The current version of this bill requires that the Chief Election Officer can require voters in districts with fewer than a hundred registered voters to vote by absentee ballot. As it stands, I believe that this bill will have a chilling effect on the expression of voter preference in these districts. Requiring an absentee ballot, I think we will all acknowledge, is a poor substitute for actually entering a polling place to cast one's vote. Many of Hawaii's voters would prefer to attend the polling place and may not even respond to an absentee ballot in the mail.

"With voting trends on the decrease nationwide, I believe Hawaii should be at the forefront of doing all we can to ensure that voters have the maximum opportunity to vote. We should not enact measures that chill the voters' desire to participate. And for those people who, for the first time in their lifetimes of going to the polls, are now going to receive an absentee ballot, I extend my sincere apologies to them. I think it is a wrong thing to do to them, and I firmly am opposed to this bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Metcalf then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"With respect to Senate Bill 2227, I would just note that in most jurisdictions and countries that have vote by mail, the actual rate of participation is much higher than exist in our own country and, for many people, driving to the polls is not a convenience -- it's an inconvenience. And certainly, this modest effort to make the process convenient for those who otherwise would be dislocated by the reapportionment is, I think, a commendable effort.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Each of us in this room represent about 20,000 people. Some of us even had a tie in our elections. . .

At this point, the Chair interrupted and asked:

"Are you speaking for or against the measure?"

Representative Ward answered:

"I am speaking for it and in the hopes I'll get on the Conference Committee, I'll speak with reservations. That's under advisement, of course.

"I am speaking for it with reservations because the law says one person/one vote. It doesn't say one person/one absentee ballot, and even though it would save us money and it would be expedient, we don't want to change the behavior of the voters as the tradition of voting at a polling place is well and long established.

"There are ten places in the State that require a possible merging with an adjoining district. That should be prescribed in the Conference Committee, Mr. Head of the Judiciary Committee. That should be something until entirely exhausted because of its financial implication, not to go to absentee ballots unless otherwise prescribed as an emergency. This total package would cost \$50,000 to keep the voting process in its fullest integrity as it is now.

"I've said previously and I'll say it again, it's penny-wise and pound-foolish to be playing with the voting system in Hawaii. Thank you."

Representative Alcon then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is a good bill because of the fact that we do not all live in the blue blood area of the city. There are some of us who live in Kalihi and we have three jobs at times, and it is almost impossible for us to go and vote. Oftentimes, there are some people who would like to go and vote but then couldn't make it in time before the polling places closed. So this is a good bill and it should be passed. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2227, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ELECTIONS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Anderson, Marumoto, O'Kieffe, Tatibouet and Thielen voting no.

S.B. No. 1347, SD 2, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that S.B. No. 1347, SD 2, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Santiago rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"You know, this bill, in two parts, I would like to comment on first of all.

"The establishment of the Adoption Assistance Program is long overdue. Years ago, this was asked for and discussed and I think it's about time, and I'm totally in support of having that started. I am concerned, however, with some of the language contained in the later portions of the bill. You know, when we look at the CPS system and many of you who have been here for a long time, you're very much aware of what discussions that have been held over the years.

"The wording in the bill that changes the service plans and tries to create, or tries to correct, or assume that the service plans are written in such a way to set a family up for failure and so, as a result, they are going to try to say whenever you do a service plan, social workers -- you're going to have to bring in the family. Well, that's already something that the Department has already been doing. Statutorily, I get concerned when we start putting in wording like this that could be used potentially in those cases that go to court.

"The problems that exist and have existed at CPS have been documented and are very complex. When we begin to set policy, legislative direction, I think it's up to us to have the respect for the professionals who carry this out, to look towards reunification as always being the paramount focus. And when we have a system where people come in, stay for six months, stay for a year, leave, and we have constant turnover; we have people who've been there and burning out all the time, we need to start looking at what is going on there and how we're protecting our children.

"There has been a rise in the number of death of children due to violent crimes all over the nation. We have been reading about it locally in our papers also. I'm really concerned about this.

"I support the measure. I support the efforts of the Committee to do some things that are positive to improve

the protection of our children. I'm concerned about this wording and I'm hoping that in Conference Committee, we can clarify this a little bit more so that I won't be as concerned as I am now as to how this is going to be interpreted.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Amaral then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I believe, Mr. Speaker, that it was the intention to clarify the language in the service plan for the purpose of (1) focusing on family success; (2) as noted in the committee report, in being sensitive to the family's cultural, religious and ethnic values; (3) exploring all appropriate resources acceptable to the family; and finally, stressing the importance of the family for the child.

"I think the attempt here was to bring into balance the need to reunify and to stay in contact with the family for the purpose of reunification and there was no attempt in any way to try to minimize the role of other professionals who have all been in this process.

"I believe this is an excellent measure and is an excellent step towards reforming the Child Protective Act.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Arakaki then rose and stated:

"I also want to speak in favor of the measure, and I commend the previous two speakers for addressing some of the concerns that we have. We've been trying to tinker with the Child Protective Act and, you know, we've been pressured on both sides to strengthen it and, at times, to weaken it. It's a very delicate balancing act when you consider the rights of the parents and the protection of the child.

"You know, we can tinker with the bill and add in new measures and express our concerns and our priorities for child protection, but like Representative Santiago said, the bottom line is -- how much are we willing to commit in terms of the people who are out in the trenches -- the social workers who need to work with these families, who need to provide quality assessments and to really provide good services? And I think, along with these kinds of measures that we pass, we are also willing to provide the resources to the Department so they can enact these measures that we are passing.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1347, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHILD PROTECTIVE AND WELFARE SERVICES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 1843, 2592, 1166, 2227 and 1347 had passed Third Reading at 2:25 o'clock p.m.

S.B. No. 1624, SD 1, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, S.B. No. 1624, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MEDICAL TORTS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 3306, SD 2, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, S.B. No. 3306, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INFECTIOUS AND COMMUNICABLE DISEASES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

S.B. No. 2361, SD 2, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that S.B. No. 2361, SD 2, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I hope, as this measure goes to Conference Committee and moves forward, that we also will be able to eliminate the stacking. I think that that will be a better thing for consumers. When you talk of single parents who only can afford to have one car, actually their policies cost them more disproportionately because they are having to cover the cases where an individual may be able to afford many cars -- three, four or five -- for a household, and those people can stack recovery under their policies. I think that it is in the better interest of consumers to eliminate that.

"I do believe that we have made a very positive step forward on insurance reform to benefit the consumers, and I appreciate the hard work of the Chair of this Committee."

Representative Bunda then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"First of all, Mr. Speaker, I would like to commend both the CPC and Judiciary Chairs for taking these issues head on. I do believe that the House draft is a step in the right direction. It is clear that all of us want to see the rates stabilized and not to have them climb ad nauseam as in some cases to 48 percent.

"First, Mr. Speaker, my reservation is that the thrust of the House draft which is to limit tort action to 10 percent is somewhat unclear. The question is whether the method applies to the elimination of 90 percent of those claims arising for medical rehab claims only or applied to all claims to include bodily injury claims. Obviously, Mr. Speaker, without clarity, we see loopholes and dollar thresholds as currently in the law. Further, there is no real statute of limitations in the bill and that would mean that the claimants would have all the time in the world stacking up their bills to sue.

"Secondly, Mr. Speaker, I personally feel that all reforms so far, nationwide, have not addressed the underlying causes and costs for all concerned, primarily because political solutions have tended to be easy solutions.

"Mr. Speaker, I am quite hopeful that the problems can be worked out in conference so that we can all go home with real reforms that will result in stabilization of rates and rate reductions for the public.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, may I say that this is a fine bill and Representative Hirono should be commended for what has come a long way, and if I may draw analogies, I speak in favor of this, that we could do to education what we've done with no-fault. We're trying it -- we've got a bill out. It looks like a big cut -- some people feel not too comfortable with it, but what we're doing is put in motion

a reform and a rehabilitation. If it doesn't work, we'll take it back and fix it again, and I think we can do the same thing with education.

"Thank you."

Representative Bainum then rose and requested that his remarks, in favor of the bill with some minor reservations, be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Bainum's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, good afternoon. There has been a cartoon circulating throughout the Capitol and it depicts an impossible maze of corridors with the caption 'you are here.'

"I mention this only because I feel that the issue of no-fault auto insurance reform is a lot like this cartoon, and although many of us may feel as though we don't know where we are beginning, it's one very complicated issue through which we all must indeed begin to find our way. We are here.

"Many interested groups have appeared before the CPC Committee -- lawyers, doctors, chiropractors, insurance companies -- and the members of this body have heard their concerns, but we represent first and foremost the interests of the financially overburdened taxpayer and voter.

"Like all of the other elected officials in this room, I, too, have received countless letters and telephone calls about no-fault reform, some literally begging for relief. With no pun intended, my constituents don't care about the process -- only the outcome.

"Based on the communications I have received, I can guarantee you one thing. While we might possibly be able to satisfy the parties involved, our constituents will ultimately be the judge of our actions, and they will be evaluating us every six months -- when they pay their car insurance. Their final evaluation of our actions or failure to act, will come at the next election.

"During the months I have been studying this issue, and while I don't pretend to have all of the answers, several points have become clear to me:

1. We must draft fair legislation which will bring the majority of uninsured motorists into the system -- and the insurance rates must become affordable to all, once everyone is participating -- without sacrificing the insured's rights, the very essence of the concept of, and the very reason in the first place for insurance.
2. The respective fields of professionals involved must diligently continue their efforts to eliminate fraud and abuse from within the system and we as legislators must provide the strongest of consequences for those who would commit or facilitate fraud and abuse.
3. The insurance companies must assist us all by promptly providing the necessary data required and it must be understandable to those of us who must interpret it.

"As simplistic as this all sounds, the public may be expecting much more than we might be giving them, so we must somehow at least begin to give them some immediate relief. Not only must we immediately do this, we must also carefully examine all of the other alternatives which have been suggested during this

session. As radical as some of them may sound today, radical actions may just be required later on down the road.

"Many of us now occupying elected office in Hawaii are beginning to feel the winds of dramatic change that are now being felt in Washington, D.C. The public is demanding accountability and decisive, responsible action from their elected representatives -- and 'they, are us.'

"I truly thank our Committee Chair, Representative Mazie Hirono, for helping lead many of us through this complicated issue. I applaud her hard work. This bill is much improved over our first version. I do have some concerns regarding details of the medical-rehabilitation threshold issues. I trust these can be addressed in the coming weeks in Conference Committee.

"Thank you."

Representative Metcalf then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I would just like to extend, on behalf of the Judiciary Committee, our appreciation for the Chairwoman of the CPC Committee's diligence, hard work and effort in producing this draft. I think, fundamentally, it's a very sound bill and it's a bill that I think the House can be proud of and that the Chairwoman of the Committee can be proud of the work that she put into this bill. And as it moves towards conference, I think the House can feel confident that we are taking a consumer approach to the resolution of the high cost of no-fault insurance.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2361, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NO-FAULT INSURANCE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. Nos. 1624, 3306 and 2361 had passed Third Reading at 2:30 o'clock p.m.

At 2:31 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 2:56 o'clock p.m., the Speaker resumed the rostrum.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1134-92 and S.B. No. 3044, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PARKING FOR DISABLED PERSONS," were recommitted to the Committee on Finance.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1164-92 on S.B. No. 2757, SD 2, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2757, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR TOURISM," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 39 ayes to 12 noes, with Representatives Amaral, Bainum,

Fukunaga, D. Ige, O'Kieffe, Santiago, Shon, Stegmaier, Tam, Tatibouet, Thielen and Ward voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 2757 had passed Third Reading at 2:59 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1191-92 on S.B. No. 2749, HD 2:

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1191-92 and S.B. No. 2749, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PILOTAGE WATERS," were recommitted to the Committee on Judiciary.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1215-92 on S.B. No. 2888, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the majority of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 2888, SD 1, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Thielen rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"This bill places a disproportionate impact on single parent women, and it is unfortunate that the bill was tied to assisting participants in the Jobs Employment Training Program which is a good program. But because of the other defect, I oppose the bill."

Representative Tom then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the original purpose of this bill, Senate Bill 2888, Senate Draft 1, was to provide the Department of Human Services with the authority to establish an Imprest Fund to assist job opportunities and basic skills participants who are enrolled in employment training programs with extraordinary expenses they may incur for education, training and employment activities, or with emergency cash assistance during family crisis.

"Mr. Speaker, I was very much in support of the concept contained in this bill because it sought to cut through the bureaucratic red tape when necessary in a program designed to help poor people get on their feet again and lead self-sufficient and productive lives in the community. Unfortunately, Mr. Speaker, Senate Bill 2888, Senate Draft 1, House Draft 1, went one step further by freezing the standard of need for public assistance at the 1991 federal poverty level, only to expire on June 30, 1994.

"Mr. Speaker, this is one bill in particular which I don't enjoy speaking against. This is one bill in particular which I rise to speak against with a heavy heart and with mixed emotions for you see, Mr. Speaker, as Human Services Chairman for the past two years, I have tried very hard to act responsibly in my actions, to serve as an advocate for the underprivileged, and to be fiscally responsible with our State funds, realizing that there are many competing needs to be served in this great State of ours. However, I cannot sit by and let this bill pass in its amended form without speaking out with my mind and my heart because, Mr. Speaker, if this bill passes, today will be a very sad day for poor people in the State of Hawaii. Because this bill puts an automatic freeze on the standard of need at the 1991 federal poverty level, all poor individuals and families, many who are single parent families with children, struggling to make ends meet and who would otherwise qualify to receive a helping hand under the 1992 and 1993 federal poverty levels, will unfortunately be denied many welfare benefits because

their meager incomes, depending on the family size, will exceed 62.5 percent of the 1991 federal poverty level. In cruel dollars and cents, Mr. Speaker, what this means is that an individual earning less than \$4,893 a year, which is 62.5 percent of the 1992 federal poverty level, will be denied a monthly cash assistance payment of \$407. A family of two earning less than \$6,606 annually will be denied a monthly payment of \$550 to help supplement the family's income. A family of three earning less than \$8,318 a year will be denied a monthly sum of \$693, and a family of four earning less than \$10,031 annually will be denied a monthly cash assistance of \$835. Those individuals and families directly affected by the impact of this bill will be our 82 families with dependent children and those individuals and families receiving general assistance payments.

"To further illustrate the financial hurt that will be felt by our poor families in these two categories, 800 AFDC families who would otherwise receive cash assistance under the 1992 federal poverty level would be denied such help. This equates to approximately 2,400 individuals. Further, 300 families who would otherwise receive general assistance payments under the 1992 federal poverty level would not. This equates to approximately 600 individuals. The figures keep getting larger. In 1993, approximately 2,043 AFDC families, according to the Human Services Department, would be denied cash assistance, and approximately 723 families receiving general assistance would have to make it on their own. Multiply our AFDC families by three and multiply our GA families by two, and you'll get the approximate number of individuals affected by our vote today.

"Realizing the true monetary impact this bill will have on poor people, I still found it very difficult to speak against this bill because I, too, am very aware of the current fiscal constraints that presently face our State. I know there are many interests ranging from education, health, business, the housing, tourism to economic development, to environmental concerns, and to human services, have had to take their lumps, and I want to state for the record today that our Finance Chairman, Joseph Souki, has done an outstanding job -- an outstanding job in working with the budget, in being fair, and in trying to keep the needs and concerns of all competing interests, and I want to be very clear on that. This is not in any way a reflection on the Finance Committee and to Chairman Souki.

"This bill, however, is a little different than other bills because it affects an entire class of people -- poor people! It cuts across the board all poor people who would have otherwise qualified for help under the 1992 and 1993 federal poverty levels, only to be denied assistance because of a freeze imposed by us. The sad part about that is that poor people who want to get on their feet, to feel good about themselves, who are working to make ends meet, who just need a helping hand to get on their feet, to feel self-sufficient and productive human beings, will be denied this chance if their income fails to meet a magic number.

"This bill cuts across the board for all poor people -- those who want to work and those who want to take advantage of our welfare system. Mr. Speaker, I am a proponent of work ethics. I say, let's kick out those people from our welfare roll, from our welfare system, who are deadbeats, who are freeloaders, and let us cut out the cost of living increases for all those who are on welfare.

"I want to state clearly now that I am not advocating cost of living increases for our current and future welfare recipients. Those increases must stop. My concern is for those families who would otherwise qualify for basic cash

assistance but cannot although their incomes fall below 62 percent of the 1992 and 1993 levels.

"If this bill fails, it will cost the State of Hawaii \$17-million. If this bill passes, it will cost the State \$9-million. We are trying to save \$8-million and frankly, Mr. Speaker, I really don't have the answer, and I admit it -- I don't have the answer. But I do know this -- take away \$300 from a person with assets of \$100,000, take away \$300 from a person with assets of \$500, and ask yourselves -- is this a fair cut? Well, on its face it may seem so, but in reality, who is going to hurt more? And that is what this bill is all about.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Souki then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"It is with regret. . . I used to be an anti-poverty worker, and I know how tough it is, but I am looking at the State budget and the budget needs some assistance, and we're looking at this body, AFDC, and general assistance and senior citizens, and we are sort of targeting them. It's the idea that some people may have, but I want you to know that I've done this with my recommendation to the Committee and it's been with a lot of thought. It's not being done because I felt that they would be put at a great disadvantage.

"The State of Hawaii, in providing up to 62.5 percent of the poverty level, is one of the best in the nation. The national average is 47 percent; in Washington, it's 57 percent; in Oregon 50.5 percent; in Florida 32.4 percent. Only the state of California at 70 percent exceeds Hawaii, but California is bankrupt.

"Let me give you some idea of where we have been going with COLA these past few years. In 1989, when we first started COLA, our General Fund was \$72-million. At the end of this year, it will be \$107-million, an increase of 49.6 percent in approximately three years. Under AFDC, there's a 53.6 percent increase in three years. If we continue at the rate that we are going, taking an average increase of approximately 14 percent, and that was what it has been these past years, and in 1994, in a period of five years from when we started, we would have doubled the payment to AFDC. So the cost is rising dramatically because of the COLA. Now there is a two-year freeze on this and I'm saying, let's sit back and look at it. There may be some better way to handle this problem than the automatic COLA. Maybe we need to see it as Chairman of the Human Services, a great Chairman. He stated that we need to look at those that needed the most should be given more help and those that don't need the help should be weeded out so we can serve those that need the most. We have the Jobs Program. We should look at that and increase its capacity to serve those that can't serve themselves and need the training.

"Right now, for a family of three, you're an AFDC mother and couple of children with AFDC food stamps and Medicaid, your annual costs come to about \$18,672 a year; a family of four will come to about \$23,052 a year. That's the estimated cost for an AFDC family.

"Now, this does not include child care, the electrical energy assistance, no-fault insurance -- it does not include. It also includes assistance for these areas -- emergency assistance, Section 8 housing programs. So, if we add these -- the no-fault insurance, the Section 8 assistance and, of course, their school lunch is free, and the after-school care is free, and other assistance that they don't pay for -- if you include all of these, this \$23,000 with the non-taxable items that are attached here would come pretty close to \$31,000 to \$32,000. If you look at

the annual averages of income, it will put them roughly around the top 40 percent of the percentile of the average wage earner. What I am saying is that we're not paying them too much. What I am saying is that the salaries and the benefits that they are getting right now are rather generous. The State of Hawaii has been generous and to a good measure because of the good people in this Legislature, including myself, who, year after year have added entitlements. And the entitlements that we have added are not only in the salary and financial assistance, but also in the Medicaid entitlements which they have, I think, one of the best in the nation here in Hawaii.

"So, members, even though I vote for this with regrets, I believe that the damage to the families on AFDC and general assistance will be minimized and two years hence or even before that, we can look at and possibly come out with some new formulas and new criteria.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Anderson then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"You know, Mr. Speaker, to speak against the bill, it's easy to be a Republican at certain times when you don't have to make the tough decisions as Chairman Souki did, and at first I was going to sort of joke and say that I would enter Representative Tom's remarks as my own other than any reference to his being or my being a chairman. But it's a very serious matter that we're looking at, and I want to remind everybody that we knew there was going to be a shortfall. For that reason, before I voted against a lot of measures that people were phoning me on, I said I wanted to see what we're going to have for bills that were coming down and other means. That was one of the reasons that I put in the lottery bill because it would have been enabling legislation for the counties, and we would have been able to have money and take back the money that we've been giving in grants-in-aid to the counties. We didn't vote for that.

"Two years ago, the Chairman of Finance wanted to go ahead and have a one percent across-the-board enabling legislation for the counties. We all said, what the hell are you doing? Then I went back and I said, 'Chairman, that's a good idea,' because we take back the monies that we've been giving these counties. We then have money within our own State budget that would enable us to take care of the problems that we have. So, ladies and gentlemen, the responsibility really is on all of us.

"But again, being a Minority is really duck soup because I am not a chairman -- I don't have to make the hard decisions. We're going to have to be a lot more prudent than we've ever been before. Dollars are short. You're going to have to cut. You're going to be on a committee and you're going to have to make tough decisions -- all of us.

"So I'm going down on this bill because I believe that the \$8-million is going to have to be found somewhere so that we can give it to those that really need it. But it's really going to be hard when we didn't take the chance on trying to find this money elsewhere -- that would have been a lot easier. So I am against the bill, but I will tell you, Chairman, I have a lot of respect for you, and I want to thank you very, very much for being able to bite the bullet.

"Thank you."

Representative Yonamine then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I speak in favor of Senate Bill 2888, SD 1, HD 1, but with mixed feelings and deep conflicts.

1. We all care about meeting the needs of those who need it the most, no matter how we're going to vote on this bill.

2. Something's wrong about this issue. How the kinds of data we've been given is a good example, and I shall explain as I go along. Something's wrong about this issue.

3. Currently, we have about 22,000 households which receive AFDC and general assistance payments.

4. This bill calls for a freeze to the 1991 federal income level of poverty of which we are committed to provide 62.5 percent of that.

5. At the present time, and we're talking about the 1991 ceiling, and this is where we go into the kinds of information that we've been getting. The family of three will receive \$17,626 a year and this includes cash payment of \$666 per month and other benefits such as food stamps, Medicaid, and even in some cases, such as no-fault insurance if you apply for it and you qualify.

6. DHS has assured us that no one, and this I think has to be made perfectly clear to this body -- no one, I repeat, will be cut or eliminated as a result of this freeze on the 1991 level. No one who is presently receiving assistance will be cut or eliminated. And I think this has to be made clear again and again.

7. If it is absolutely necessary, if we need to go to 1992 federal income level, it will mean, as previous speakers have mentioned, an additional \$17-million to subsidize this program. Where can we get the money and who is willing to cut in our own program areas, or do you want the Finance Committee to do it for you?

8. If we do go to the 1991 freeze, there will be 800 AFDC households and 300 general assistance who may apply and get on this program, and this is the hard question -- as mentioned, 800 AFDC applicants and 300 general assistance applicants. Now, because there are terminations and people who graduate out of the program, these 800 and 300 can get on the program or they can find ways -- supplemental ways -- for the many programs and services we have funded in the human services, health and support services in many areas such as housing, counseling, child care, and basic needs that we have funded hundreds of these programs. We need to find ways until next year, in terms of making sure that these families who are waiting to the 1992 COLA increase, can then qualify for these programs.

9. As of this year, DHS, in analyzing the benefits the recipients get, told me that recipients get more than 102 percent if you total up the cumulative benefits -- 102 percent! -- 2 percent more than the federal guideline which calls for 100 percent coverage. This is their quotation and their analysis of the cumulative benefits they receive in this program at the present time.

"Next, so what happens to the \$17-million shortfall?"

"Well, here's the problem. In January, DHS told us -- this is in the Finance Committee hearing -- that it anticipated a change in the federal income level, but couldn't be sure at that particular time.

10. In late February, the federal government came in and told DSH that we have an increase in the 1992 income level and this, of course, due to the cost of living increases our State subsidy because more people then would be able to qualify for this increased federal income level. In early March then, about the very time that we

got our revised revenue projection from the Council of Revenues, we have told them, knowing that we have a \$360-million shortfall, that we need now \$17-million extra in order to go back to the 1992 level.

"Like I've said, something is wrong. In 1989, we established a law, as you all know, to fund the increase at the 62.5 percent formula to an ever-changing and increasing income level of eligibility that's established by the federal government -- you all knew that! So, we are in a way compelled to provide those funds unless you would want, in the future, to change that very law that you adopted in 1989.

"This \$17-million was not in the Executive budget. This \$17-million was not even part of the DHS budget. After all, who do you think is in charge of this program -- the Legislature or the DHS? The DHS and the Executive department better make this a priority. The DHS need, for example, to submit a five-year expenditure plan and to put it in the Executive budget. This is not a quick fix increase monies that we should be responsible solely for. We need to find another way of financing these increases and this is our responsibility. Is this also part of the special funds such as we provide special funds for our schools? Do we need another vehicle for financing of COLA increases if we already put it into law? Are there other creative ways to finance the needs of the people? These are the questions, I think, we ought to ask ourselves and we have, in this very stringent year, the necessity of putting a freeze which does not eliminate anyone from receiving public assistance if they are receiving it now. Of course, it is not enough -- even for that 62.5 percent or at the federal income level. It is not enough for those people.

"But finally, it is not the recipients' fault nor did we create the situation wilfully or willingly. What I need to say I guess is that we have our work cut out -- we need to look at alternative ways of financing this program, and let's get the Executive and the legislative branches to work it out before the end of next year.

"For now, my friends, whether you vote one way or the other, it's a tough decision to make, and I urge all of you to dig deep into your conscience and look at how we have always provided for the needs of all the people in this State, and is this one more example of whether we're meeting their needs or have we failed in this bill?

"Thank you very much."

Representative Ward then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the matter boils down to an issue of how you read the numbers and how you set priorities. How you read the numbers, for example, we know for two trains and one airport, we would have spent five billion dollars. Yes, the mass transit, the people mover, and the million square feet airport is going to ask for a tab of five billion dollars. This is not mentioning the \$70-million Hilo courthouse, the \$47-million Capitol renovation, and the other list that goes on and on, in terms of where our priorities are. The Finance Chair has made it very clear that this was not an easy decision. He has a tough job; in fact, he has a big heart as his speech just indicated.

"But I think reading the numbers differently can give you an equally convincing perspective. For example, we are told by the Tax Foundation we have \$1.3-billion in special funds -- \$1.3-billion in special funds! Two bills are now in the Senate, and hopefully will pass today that will actually free up \$400- to \$600-million that will literally wipe out all of our crying that we have no money because there is money. It's only that there are particular

claims and interests that are overriding what otherwise is a very strong human interest concern as Representative Tom has talked about.

"So, if this bill doesn't pass, we have to re-question: What are our priorities? Is this the microcosm -- the way we feel as a body? And secondly, where are our hearts? Have they all gone to brick and waters as the CIP numbers indicate?

"Thank you."

Representative Metcalf then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"I would just like to note that the Hilo courthouse is not a \$70-million courthouse -- it's a \$60-million courthouse, and it's no longer in Hilo. It's moved to downtown Honolulu according to the newspapers.

"Thank you."

Representative Young then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Before, the average worker was a man, whose wife worked managing the home, and with two children, with little time for herself. This is the average worker. Also, homes at that time were affordable.

"Now the average worker emerging on the scene is a woman. Hawaii has the highest percentage of women in the workforce.

"Senate Bill 2888, relating to public assistance, is a bill about welfare, but it is also about a strange phenomena called, 'women's issues.'

"A few years ago, when I was in Los Angeles, I saw a tee shirt that read, 'There was an old woman who lived in a shoe -- so this shortage of houses is nothing new.' I would like to read the rest of that rhyme: 'There was an old woman who lived in a shoe; She had so many children she didn't know what to do; She fed them some broth without any bread, spanked them all soundly and sent them to bed.'

"That nursery rhyme, from centuries ago, still provides a very sad message to us now in this closing decade of the 20th century.

"She was an 'old woman,' probably old before her time, I suspect, and the families of 3 or 4 on welfare are most likely single parent families -- mainly women who are especially desperate for rental housing that is decent but that doesn't discriminate against families.

"Also, the women who lived in a shoe 'had so many children she didn't know what to do.' Dual income parents depend on reliable childcare and devote a high percentage of their joint salaries to ensure that their children are well cared for.

"What choice does a low income, single parent have but to make do on a daily basis, desperate also for reliable childcare services.

"Have we, as political leaders, charged the Department of Human Services with the mandate to make it worth it for her to go to work?

"If we implement this freeze and 1,200 families or more, as Representative Tom pointed out, fall back into the cycle of poverty, what sort of safety net have we, as political leaders of the State of Hawaii, provided to ensure that the children are properly cared for?

"Saying, 'find a job, find two jobs' is possible for single people, but not for parents.

"In 1980, we were warned that if trends continue, then by the year 2000, the poverty rolls will consist solely of women and their children. Well, the trends have continued. The minimum wage is not sufficient to earn a decent living. The numbers of women and children on the poverty rolls continue to increase.

"Lastly, this single parent woman who 'lived in a shoe,' spanked them all soundly and sent them to bed.' She took out her frustrations on the children.

"You've seen in the papers the frightening increase in child abuse, in domestic violence, in crimes against women in the homes and in the streets.

"Women's issues are also family issues, but the bottom line is that they are economic issues that affect the quality of life of our entire community.

"I know all our programs are being cut. I respect the comments that Chair Souki and Representative Yonamine said. It's unfortunate though that we have no safety net for the people who won't be eligible if this freeze goes into effect.

"It's unfortunate that we have not been prepared to prevent this kind of drastic measure that the Finance Committee has had to take.

"It's unfortunate that this kind of crises is now before us.

"Members, this is your opportunity to help those who are less fortunate.

"Thank you."

Representative Baker then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"It is a difficult bill that we vote on but I submit that's what we're paid to do and what we have chosen to do by taking public office. It's made even more difficult by the kind of eloquent remarks that I've just heard from my colleague, Representative Young. It's not an easy bill to vote for because I suspect all of us would like to do everything we can, whether it comes out of our pockets or the State coffers, to make sure that those less fortunate than ourselves are taken care of. But I submit that even with this freeze, the neediest in our society will be taken care of because the kinds of things that Representative Young spoke of are not addressed in this measure but addressed at other places, not only throughout the budget, but in other areas of programs that we have authorized for women, for children, for parents, for families that need assistance. Not all assistance need be in the form of cash.

"This is a very difficult measure but it is one that I think is fiscally prudent and responsible, considering the fact that the neediest in our society will still be covered. And it's important, I think, to address one of the other items that continues to come up whenever we talk about funding having to be cut, or a program having to be altered in some fashion, and that is the notion that there are special funds of pots of money that could readily be tapped for these kinds of programs. The kind of programs that one of my colleagues spoke of recently are either funded with bonds. . . these kinds of programs -- the ones that this bill addresses -- cannot be funded with bonds, yet many of those CIP programs are bonds.

"The good representative from East Honolulu's favorite target happens to be the Airport Special Fund, and yet the good representative, because he sits on the House Transportation Committee, I submit, should well know that those monies, by federal rule, cannot be used for this kind of program -- they aren't airport-designated.

"So let's, in our concern about this bill or about others, let's try to educate and enlighten the public in factual and precise and truthful ways rather than resorting to the kinds of rhetoric and red flags that too often we hear.

"Mr. Speaker, I think those of us who signed the committee report of Finance and those of us that will vote for this measure, are not doing it gleefully, but we're doing it because we feel that it is called for at this time, and I urge my colleagues to do likewise.

"Thank you."

Representative Santiago then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I do so though with very heavy heart. I understand the very eloquent remarks made and I do not serve on the Finance Committee. I wasn't privy to a lot of the information.

"The questions, however, that I want to see raised are -- have we or have we not as a body created dependency on the part of people who are on the welfare rolls as they stand today? If we are guilty -- have we encouraged dependency? Those are the questions that I want us to start examining. If we have and if, as so many people criticized those who are on the welfare rolls today for having become dependent upon the system and not willing to get off the system, then what are we doing to break that cycle of poverty? If that's going to be the question that we address, if nothing else, this be the genesis of that question.

"I am voting against this measure because I believe that when we start asking those questions, that discussion belongs in Representative Tom's committee -- in the Human Services Committee -- to be addressed. How are we going to break the cycle of poverty? We are not going to do it by just cutting back. It should not, in my opinion, be handled in the Finance Committee and that's not where I'm coming from.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward, in rebuttal, stated:

"I wanted the speaker from Maui to know that the red flag from Honolulu was not actually my flag but the Legislative Auditor. I was quoting what the Legislative Auditor said that these bills are actually to turn over special funds back into the general funds. It is not the representative from Hawaii Kai to Aina Haina speaking but the Legislative Auditor, and it's exclusive of the Airport Special Fund, so this is not a fabrication of East Honolulu.

"Thank you."

Representative M. Ige then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I think this is probably the most difficult issue of my brief time here in the Legislature -- the freezing of public assistance at the 1991 poverty level for the 11,080 families in 1992, the possible 3,000 families in 1993; \$17-million in 1992, another \$50-million in 1993 -- if this bill passes. I guess, in my mind, I am wondering, why is it when times are hard, we choose short-term quick

fixes over long-term deliberate solutions? Why is it that during these hard times, we sacrifice those who can least afford it -- our children?

"You know back when I had the opportunity to have met and counseled by an old-time Democrat, and as I listened to his dream -- his commitment -- I realized that the Democratic Party was committed to people, not just for what they are, but for what they can be. From that moment on, I resigned from the other party and joined the Democratic Party. Here I am today, speaking against a measure -- a measure that crushes the very philosophy that I had believed in all of these years.

"If this bill is passed during these times, can you imagine what it's going to be like next year when the prediction is that it's going to be worse? Who will we sacrifice then?

"Mr. Speaker, during these times of conflict and challenge, let us not take the easy way out by making across-the-board cuts. Instead, let's take a stand. Let us clearly define what is important to us -- our priorities -- and at that time, chart our course and move ahead with a true sense of purpose and direction. Thank you."

Representative Alcon then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, most of the people that will be affected are from the Kalihi area.

"Mr. Speaker, I have asked that the funding for OCCC be zeroed out so that we can save \$50-million and that \$50-million can be passed on to people like these. I have spoken to Representative Tom to zero out the money to expand OCCC because we are short of funds, and because we are short of funds I wanted that \$50-million to go to poor people like us in Kalihi. Thank you."

Representative Hagino then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against this bill. I don't have much to say but I'd like to have the Journal reflect that the words of Representative Marshall Ige are those of my own, except I didn't switch parties. I was always a Democrat."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Arakaki then rose and stated:

"I think Representative M. Ige said it very well, but I want to speak in favor of this bill, but I also have a great deal of reservations, but I do also have a glimmer of hope. My reservations arise because of the amendments that were attached to Senate Bill 2888 by our Finance Committee, and my hope is that we will have the courage and compassion not to let this measure reach Final Reading in its current form.

"Mr. Speaker and members, it was Thomas Jefferson who once stated, and I quote: 'The care of human life and happiness is a first and only legitimate purpose of good government.' And he may have said that over two hundred years ago, but I think some of us still stubbornly cling to that notion that government exists to help those who are not able to help themselves and to protect the vulnerable and meek in our society. And why not? From the dawn of civilization, men and women and their families have traditionally formed societies and communities with the express purposes of support and protection for all members, especially those who are too young or too frail to fend for themselves. And while populations and cities grow, economic and technological

progress intensify competition -- they break up our families and desensitize our sense of community.

"I still think we cannot turn our backs on our moral obligation which is so ingrained in our cultures. And we have reminders everywhere -- our Constitution, our State Constitution reflects these ideals in our Preamble and I quote: 'We reaffirm our belief in a government of the people, by the people, and for the people, and with an understanding and compassionate heart towards all the peoples of the earth.'

"Our Democratic platform, and I think most of us here are Democrats, is more specific. I quote from the 1988 platform of our convention relating to families: 'Be it resolved that the State Democratic Convention adopt the family policy aimed at (1) meeting the basic needs of all families in the State of Hawaii; (2) providing support services to prevent families and individuals from becoming dysfunctional; and (3) providing social services to help families deal with these dysfunctions.'

"Even our Majority package statements for the 1992 session reflects ideal, and I quote from our Preamble: 'The commitment to our vision, to ensure that our commitment becomes realities, we must make wise and prudent financial decisions. With continued federal cutbacks and the recession on the mainland, an economic slowdown becomes a very real possibility and will place greater burdens on the Democratic Majority to protect and safeguard hard-won educational, social and economic gains.' The specific platform on family focuses on 1992 as a Year of the Family.

"One section of the Majority package platform states, and I quote: 'To deal with these issues, we must encourage positive family values of caring, nurturing and communication, provide support when and where it is needed, and establish programs that strengthen the family and allow families to function to their fullest potential.'

"And the question we need to pose to ourselves is -- are these just expressions of lofty goals, or are they empty words? Does it express a real commitment, or is it just rhetoric?

"And I know Chairman Souki is intent on passing this measure, and I admire his courage and his willingness to accept the criticism. The fact is, we can't absolve the Department of Human Services and the Administration from their responsibility for proposing these amendments, especially after it was rejected by the subject matter committees of both houses. And it bothers me that those who are supposedly the lead advocates for providing for the basic needs of people can propose to hurt so many families and children.

"I know we're concerned about the budget and the economy but these measures are not acceptable. As long as we can spend \$6-million for emergency appropriations to encourage tourists to stay in our fancy hotel rooms while more and more people here go homeless, it is unacceptable. As long as we can spend over a hundred million dollars to maintain prisons and prison inmates who are guaranteed nutritional meals while many of our children have to forego some meals because there is not enough money in their family budget, it is unacceptable. And there are times when I look outside these windows and I see those condominiums out there, and knowing that we subsidize them with State funds to improve their infrastructures, while many of our families can't even get subsidies for child care, it is unacceptable. When I hear the Governor say in his State-of-the-State that he wants to spend \$1.9-billion for construction, it is unacceptable that, on one hand, we feed the State's Oedipus complex

and with the other hand, we slap down struggling families, I say it's unacceptable.

"And it bothers me, Mr. Speaker, that this bill will slam the door on the families and individuals who are trying their best to survive on their own and only need a helping hand, not a handout, to provide a bridge over troubled economic waters to reach self-sufficiency. Those who are at or around the top of the eligibility level of 62.5 percent are your working poor -- the single parent who may need assistance for child care, health care, or shelter allowance -- and freezing that eligibility criteria will leave out over two thousand individuals and family members out in the cold over the next two years. For those who are left out or forced out by this measure, the choices are limited. You don't advance yourself in your job unless you get a significant raise in pay. You have to look for a higher paying job, and what I fear might happen is that many will be forced to quit work or cut their hours so that they can meet the lower eligibility requirements.

"And Chairman Souki may argue that we have the eligibility criteria that is higher than the national average, and he is right, and he is right about implementing a whole host of programs to support families over the past six years, but I think what people need to realize is that here in Hawaii, our cost of living is soaring. Consider that in 1976, the cost of living in Hawaii was 18 percent above the national average but at that time, the per capita income was at 21 percent above the national average. In 1990, the cost of living had risen to over 30 percent above the national average, but our per capita income has slipped to somewhere between minus three to plus three percent of the national average, so we are losing ground.

"And it should come as no surprise that in the latest kids' count statistics, they show Hawaii with one of the fastest growing populations of children in poverty and those who are homeless. Statistics also show that the use of food stamps are among the leaders when we, as a State, are among the leaders in the country and, surprisingly, even with mandated employee health insurance, SHIP, and Medicaid, we still have eight to ten thousand children not being covered by any kind of health insurance.

"So, like many of my colleagues, I am deeply troubled by these trends, and I worry about our future. And perhaps in a service-oriented economy, it is best to have a large population of poor and under-educated people. So what if they have to work two or three jobs to stay ahead.

"I can only hope that we can have a greater vision for our future, and it really doesn't matter how much reform or how much money we put into our educational system if our children enter that system unprepared, undernourished, abused, neglected, and without a sense of self-esteem.

"And just in closing, Mr. Speaker, everyday we start our session with people coming to give an invocation for us and maybe to a lot of us, it's just a matter of ceremony, but I think we should notice that we don't pray for more tourists, or pray for more money for CIP. Instead we are constantly reminded that we should not forget those who have no power and those who have no voice in these chambers and halls, that we should not forget the young, the elderly, and the disabled, that we, as the leaders of our community, are also servants to the people who, to the best of our abilities, we must assure that no one should fail or fall by the wayside because we didn't care. No doubt, we are faced with tough decisions that occur because of a sudden lack of resources, and these challenges will test our minnow and our resolve, but

it is my hope that if this bill does move forward, we can act with our hearts as much as we do with our heads and our pocketbooks.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Thielen then rose and stated:

"I appreciated the Majority Floor Leader giving us a historical perspective of the Democratic Party's platform. I'm sorry to see that the Democrats today are not joining the Republicans in opposing this bill, and I hope that some of you will look within your hearts and break ranks. Instead of standing up and giving a very eloquent statement with your reservations, but the statement itself clearly says why this bill should not pass, I would hope that you would look within your hearts to reconsider and be free agents in how you vote when the vote is called.

"Today we are hurting two thousand of our residents -- single parents, working poor -- and yet we passed the bill to put money towards rugby. Where are our priorities? As a Republican, I am standing up and saying, this bill should not pass. We should have a deeper conscience and a deeper responsibility towards those who cannot help themselves at this point, and we should be there to lend a hand to enable them to step forward and learn to help themselves. And I am saying this to the Democrats -- don't quote me your platform from prior years and then vote to pass this bill. . .

At this point, Representative Duldulao rose on a point of information and asked:

"Mr. Speaker, are we discussing an Imprest Fund or are we on the issue of being a Democrat or a Republican?"

The Chair answered:

"I think she is responding to a previous speaker's statement."

Representative Duldulao then said:

"Mr. Speaker, I suggest that the speaker should stick to the subject matter."

Representative Thielen responded:

"I am responding to the representative's prior discourse on the Democratic Party platform, and I am saying to all of you again -- break ranks, vote for those two thousand residents and the children that are in those families -- the mothers on the aid for families with dependent children, the AFDC recipients. Reach into your hearts and help those people, and vote against this bill. We can do that today. Join us and vote against it.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the majority of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2888, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC ASSISTANCE," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 26 ayes to 25 noes, with Representatives Alcon, Amaral, Anderson, Bainum, Cachola, Chun, Duldulao, Fukunaga, Hagino, Hiraki, Hirono, M. Ige, Marumoto, Okamura, O'Kieffe, Peters, Santiago, Shon, Tam, Tatibouet, Thielen, Thompson, Tom, Ward and Young voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 2888 had passed Third Reading at 3:57 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1226-92 on S.B. No. 3486, SD 2, HD 2:

By unanimous consent, action was deferred to the end of the calendar.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1235-92 on S.B. No. 2882, SD 2, HD 2:

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 2882, SD 2, HD 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Bainum rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I have one major concern and one major objection. Over a year ago, yes, maybe the two masterplanning efforts did need a nudge to work better together, but since that time the master planning effort is proceeding, the two groups are merging their efforts in association with other residential groups and community members and organizations. Progress is being made. I think the State getting into the picture at this time is premature and certainly raises the issue of home rule.

"My major objection though is the continuation of putting the Waikiki Convention Center Authority in this bill. Why are they here? I don't know. I don't think they should be. They are dedicated people and dedicated staff. They had a chance. They worked very hard but came up short. I think in this economy that we find ourselves, dollars are short and that we should not continue to fund this Authority at this rate. But certainly, this Authority need not be in this context.

"The Convention Center is not really the issue here. You can still be for a Convention Center and vote against this bill. What I am saying is that we have community groups working on the master planning efforts which is proceeding and then we have the Convention Center Authority staff plucked out and placed into this task force. It really makes very little sense. I think that the agenda or the concerns that they would bring would be contrary to the ongoing effort that's been in progress for some time.

"I urge my colleagues to vote no on this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Marumoto then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"This bill puts all of Waikiki under State control if this Waikiki Task Force selects a master plan for development. I believe that it is a heavy-handed, meat ax approach to planning and zoning and totally undermines county control of these functions.

"I will vote for this measure, however, because I think the State government should have a hand in building a Convention Center for our number one industry -- tourism. So it overcomes my objections to the broad nature of this bill.

"I look forward to modification, or better yet, moderation of this measure during the rest of the session.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Tatibouet then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"My main opposition is the fact that I believe it's a home rule issue. I would ask those who represent other islands and other counties to be concerned when issues like this come before the State. Waikiki is an island of its own and needs to be allowed to do its own thing under the auspices of the City and County of Honolulu. I think it's appropriate for the State to ask them to proceed rapidly and come up with a plan, but I feel it's totally inappropriate for the State to interfere in the affairs of the County of Honolulu.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Alcon then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in opposition to this bill because of the fact that we have over master-planned Waikiki and we haven't done a darn thing about Kalihi. Well, I have to let you know, Mr. Speaker, that the entrance to Waikiki and all of Oahu, all of Honolulu, is Nimitz Highway, and yet the tourist industry has not seen it fit to even beautify it. It is only the people of Kalihi that are trying to beautify Nimitz Highway so that it would look at least halfway decent for people to get to Waikiki.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I propose we amend this bill to include Kalihi, and I would ask the honorable representative to remember the Kakaako job, and I don't think Kalihi would want perhaps much to do with it.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"However, because it's a statewide issue that I'm looking at, we need the Convention Center, we need other improvements in Waikiki that I don't believe there has been a real effort on behalf of the county to take this up prior. Once the State decided that they had to get involved in order to move it ahead, it was then that the county started to jump aboard and say, I don't think that you folks should touch this. But if I remember correctly, Mr. Speaker, it was out of necessity and it was not really to take away home rule. It was to take care of the largest moneymaker that we have which is tourism. It's an industry that needed help and that's why we looked at it.

"Thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2882, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WAIKIKI," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 36 ayes to 15 noes, with Representatives Alcon, Bainum, Chun, Hagino, Hirono, D. Ige, Ihara, Isbell, Morihara, O'Kieffe, Shon, Stegmaier, Tatibouet, Thielen and Ward voting no.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 2882 had passed Third Reading at 4:04 o'clock p.m.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1240-92 on S.B. No. 2638, SD 1, HD 2, and**Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1241-92 on S.B. No. 2485, SD 2, HD 2:**

Representative Arakaki moved that the reports of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 2638, SD 1, HD 2,

and **S.B. No. 2485, SD 2, HD 2**, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Hagino rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I'm rising right now to speak against both bills. My comments on these two measures also reflect my no vote on Senate Bill 2855. I suppose as the Chairman of Water, Land Use, and Hawaiian Affairs Committee, that I could vote with reservation and hope to be on the Conference Committee; however, I choose to vote no to make a point as emphatic as I possibly can, and I know when the bills go to Conference, they'll be in the good hands of the Vice Chair.

"These two bills, as well as the previous one, deal with basically payments to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs and the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands -- the payments to the Hawaiians, so to speak. You know, I kinda thought I would have a bad day today and before coming to session, I stopped at the Post Office and went to the Stamp Center and bought a book on collecting stamps on featured Black Americans and the title of the book is called, **I Have a Dream**. And there's a statement in there by the great Afro-American abolitionist, Frederick Douglas, that reads: 'I am for any movement whenever there is a good cause to promote, a right to assert, a chain to be broken, a burden to be removed, or a wrong to be redressed.' And as you go through this book, you see three hundred years of agony and suffering and of the courageous spirit of these Afro-Americans, both men and women, and I think that it is with this kind of context of the hundreds of years of struggle that it takes to achieve some measure of equity that I must stand here today to vote against these two measures.

"I believe that the compensation that is going to be provided in these two bills simply are inequitable and insufficient. I do not choose to fault anyone who supports these measures. As I said in caucus, I believe that what we have, or the argument that we have framed for us today, in terms of compensation for Hawaiians, are based upon a simple framework of what is the public good, what is good for Hawaiians. So long as that argument is framed in that context -- what is the public good vs. what is good for Hawaiians -- so long as that is how the argument is framed, the Hawaiians will always lose -- always. And this is what is happening today, and I think we are all sincere about this. But let there be no mistake, I think that what we are doing today, if this bill should pass and if it should pass Final Reading in a comparable form, that we're doing something that I think is historically important as what happened over a hundred years ago with the Great Mahele, 99 years ago with the downfall of the Hawaiian Republic, with annexation, with Hawaiian Home Lands, that we are simply not making an adequate and equitable payment to the various Hawaiian groups for what will surely be a loss of land.

"I know there are considerations of budgetary restraints, and I know many a people have had to grapple with these budgetary constraints. And maybe there are some that would say, when the budget situation improves, when revenues improve, then we can make a more adequate compensation to the Hawaiian groups. I would pose to you that this will never happen. When we did have surplus years, when we had an opportunity to provide additional funds to the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, we did not do so. Why? Because again the simple argument that it was posed with each time. What is the good of society, and what is good for Hawaiians? So long as you phrase your priorities in that framework, there will never be a just compensation or an equitable payment to the Hawaiians.

"When we had a budget surplus and I tried to double the Hawaiian Homes budget, in the end we only increased it by four million dollars. So, there'll always be competing interests, whether we have good revenues for the fiscal year or whether we have a deficit or facing a deficit -- there'll never ever be the kind of consideration that would give us an equitable payment to the Hawaiian people. So until we understand this and until we are willing to be courageous and say we have to make just compensation, until we're willing to do so, we're simply not going to make any equitable settlement. And this represents the reason why I feel that I must not only speak out but also vote down on these two bills, as well as voting down on Senate Bill 2855. I think justice calls for us to make the fairest and the most adequate compensation that we could possibly make.

"I would like to point out that I think the Vice Chair of this Committee, Representative Young, who was delegated this responsibility, did work long and hard to try to bring all the different parties together -- the State, the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, the Housing Finance Development Corporation -- to come up with an adequate settlement. It was not the bill that came out of the Water, Land Use, and Hawaiian Affairs Committee -- it was not a bill that all the parties initially wanted. But it did represent, I think, a just compensation, so I asked all of you to understand that what we are doing here today is just as important as what took place over a hundred years ago, what took place 99 years ago. It is, I'm afraid, a historical moment.

"Too often, I think that we will hear or we will read stories such as the story that appeared in the **Wall Street Journal** last year, an article written by Susan Faluti, decrying what has happened to Hawaiian Homes, and it will touch our hearts, and we will feel guilty for a brief period, and we will come up with a few extra dollars to try to amend for the past wrong, and we will all give the same statement we've always done -- we have to take care of the Hawaiians. But those times will pass, as it has always passed for well over a hundred years.

"This time, we have an opportunity -- a historic opportunity -- to make just compensation, to make an adequate payment for what will surely be a loss of lands for the Hawaiian people. This is a historic opportunity for us, and I'd like to ask that all of us, I think all of us should rise to the occasion. Let's undo the wrong that has been recurring for well over a hundred years. This is our chance. This is a historic juncture for us.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Thielen then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to thank the Chair of Water, Land Use, and Hawaiian Affairs, and I would like to ask that his remarks be entered into the Journal as my own, and I would like to ask our Minority Floor Leader to cast a no vote for me on both Senate Bills 2638 and 2485, and again, I thank the Chair of Water, Land Use, for his very insightful and compelling remarks.

"Thank you."

The Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Young then rose to speak in support of the bill, with reservations, and "if you would instruct the Clerk to insert Representative Hagino's remarks into the Journal as though they were mine except for his vote," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Young continued:

"We have had long, poignant discussions about these particular bills before us, that is Senate Bills 2638 and 2485. These bills are about entitlement and with the remarks that Chair Hagino made and Representative Marshall Ige made about the bill before about welfare, that makes me pursue this because I do not believe there'll be another time. It seems as though our economic situation is such that, in the future, there will be less and less money available, less and less resources available. Again, these bills are about entitlement. It is a very complex issue and the Administration had been in negotiation for several years.

"When the Water, Land Use, and Hawaiian Affairs Committee heard the Senate bills as received, there were major disagreements among the parties involved so our Committee was charged with working out a compromise. We brought together HFDC, the Department of Land and Natural Resources, the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, the Hawaiian Home Lands, with the Office of State Planning in the background, observing. We brought in DDLET, the Alternative Dispute Center, to facilitate a mediation session. We spent two days and five hours in mediation, and we came to an agreement, not one that everybody liked, but one that we could shake hands with, and we did -- we all shook hands -- and said that this is agreeable for all of us.

"The bills sent to Finance would not have stopped affordable housing, as many people believed that it would have. It would have stopped affordable housing being built without fair compensation to the Hawaiian people, to OHA, and to the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands. The bills sent to Finance would have given the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands and OHA additional resources to seek greater self-determination -- self-determination to carry out their cultural legacies with dignity. The bills, as is, diminish this ability to move toward greater self-determination.

"The bills sent to Finance were negotiated with fairness, so I ask that the Conference Committee review Hawaii's history, think of the words that Chair Hagino has said, and think of what is fair for the Hawaiian people.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Anderson then rose and stated:

"I'm going to be speaking with reservations but as a part Hawaiian, Mr. Speaker, I want you to know that I want to go on this Conference Committee. That's what our Chairman over there said we have to do at times, but I've never gone against a chairman just to get on a Conference Committee. I would have rather voted no.

"But I'm going back, Mr. Speaker, and it just so happens that I'm not a native Hawaiian. I've always told Auntie Frenchy DeSoto that my Hawaiian blood isn't foreign so if I'm not native, I don't know what the hell I am, but I'm going backwards because my grandchildren are almost half Hawaiian, and I would like to see the benefits that's due them and due every Hawaiian because there's a lot of problems and I've told people before -- we sometimes have a hundred bills in here pertaining to Hawaiians and then we kill every one of them. We say a lot of things but we most certainly do not follow through, and it's been years.

"So I'd like to see us at least look at it, give it a fair shake and if money is tight, maybe like the Chairman did over there, you bite the bullet. And I'd like to be there, to sit there, and hope that if there's any bullet to bite, I'll

go and take my share, and I'll be as responsible as I'm supposed to be.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Morihara then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"It's interesting that people are choosing their votes against these bills for many different reasons -- some because they feel that it's giving too much away, and some because they feel that it's not giving nearly enough of what we owe Hawaiians. But it all goes back to our relationship that we've developed between the rights of the Hawaiians to the land and what we perceive as the State's responsibility and the rights to that land. The difference is in whether you believe that the Hawaiians' rights are simply an encumbrance or a true entitlement to that land. For too long, this has been like a badly written contract that we have not defined that relationship, and I speak in favor of this bill because I believe that it's about time we move ahead and truly define that relationship between the Hawaiians -- their land and the State -- our land.

"Thank you."

Representative Souki then rose to speak in favor of the bills, stating:

"Even though I'm not a native Hawaiian, I'm keiki o aina, born and raised in Hawaii, grandfather is buried -- both sides; parents buried -- both sides -- and roots very deep. I just want the members to understand that we tried to look at these bills as fairly as possible -- fair to the native Hawaiians and fair to the people of Hawaii whom we represent -- all the people, including the native Hawaiians.

"The bills, as they originally came out from the Water, Land Use, and Hawaiian Affairs Committee, would have made the housing programs unaffordable. They admit that. They said, however, it can be subsidized for the difference, that the housing program can be subsidized from the General Fund. We've got no money in the General Fund -- we're \$360-million puka!

"We need to look at this square on. When you look at property and you value property unemotionally, you value property at the present value as an appraiser will look at the property at the present value. And if you look at the property at Honokawai on Maui, the present value is urban -- it's urban zoned. That's the value that you would zone property at. The appraiser will also take into consideration the planned use if there is any planned use, but there will be consideration. That is the normal way and the traditional way that real estate is valued, and the Senate bills provide for that, as presented here from the Finance Committee, and that came from Water, Land Use, so with Hawaiian Homes into the planned value, phased incremental payments -- it's the planned value for residential as it is the planned value, so up to approximately \$300,000 an acre. \$300,000 an acre can probably get you five lots, roughly \$60,000 cost before infrastructure. Now, if you add to that the 50 percent land of OHA entitlement and the Hawaiian Home Lands entitlement at 20 percent, that would add an additional \$30,000 to the cost of the property. Where the property was \$60,000, it becomes now \$90,000 because of the \$30,000, of course, is owed for the entitlement. This additional \$30,000 per lot will make many of the homes unaffordable, and for this reason we voted against that measure, and this is only the beginning of it. If you go into the phased lots, after the first increment is complete and then you're going to look into the planned use for the second increment, it will be more expensive because the

first increment is already developed and it will become cumulatively expensive as we go along.

"Now you need to balance this. The Chairman of the subject matter committee states that this is an entitlement that is due, no matter what the sacrifice is, and I am tempted to go along with him. And I can understand his feelings for it, for the Hawaiians for too long have been neglected. However, you need to balance both needs. Housing is the major priority of the State of Hawaii and certainly of this body here. We need affordable housing for our people. The bills that came to the Finance Committee would have ruined that and that's why we needed to make an amendment.

"Now, I'm not saying this is how it's going to end. When we go into conference, there might be some compromises, but we could not have gone into conference on the high end like this. And, Mr. Speaker and members, I hope you consider these factors when you vote on these bills.

"Also, in this session, we provided \$25-million for Hawaiian Homes for their infrastructure needs. We provided an additional \$12-million for Hawaiian Homes for their back rental that is due, so we are providing. . . we're catching up in providing the compensation and the entitlements that's due to our native people.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Amaral then rose to speak against the bills, stating:

"I will be voting no on both and I need to be real clear what it is we're talking about. Basically members, I think what we're talking about is the transference of land held in public trust, from the Department of Land and Natural Resources to the Housing Finance Development Corporation. We're talking about the transfer of public land from one public entity to another public entity. Beyond that, Mr. Speaker, what we're talking about is a provision in the Constitution for entitlements to native beneficiaries, that if we transfer sugarcane land, we owe 30 percent of the profit we get from that to the Department of Hawaiian Homes, not so they can take that and go shopping, but so they can take that and put other Hawaiians on land. If we transfer or sell land from the ceded lands trust, we owe 20 percent pro rata share to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs so they can develop programs on health and all those social things we know. We need to respond to it in the native Hawaiian community.

"Basically what these measures say to us is that when we transfer the land to this public entity, also known as HFDC, we know they're going to be developing housing. We want to transfer it so they have fee simple title so they can sell the public trust? And we're going to let them sell at whatever price they want to but we're going to pay a class of people less than they deserve. And that is because Hawaiians must subsidize affordable housing for the rest of the people of Hawaii, and I think that's real laudable considering that Hawaiians lead the rolls in homelessness.

"You're also asking the Hawaiians to subsidize the ongoing programs that the State has planned for development whether it's affordable housing or it moves on, as we know it will, to golf courses, warehouses, and commercial developments, but Hawaiians should accept less for this land because right now, we're going through some pretty bad times.

"Hawaiians are asked again to be patient and to wait and that when times turn better, then perhaps we members of good conscience, would rise up and pay the

Hawaiians what is, in fact, owed them. And I have to say that I have no reluctance, Mr. Speaker, in voting no on these measures. It is my hope these measures never come to conference. It is my hope that these measures die here, and I ask you members here, in good conscience, will you ask Hawaiians to sacrifice again today as they have historically? I ask you, are you going to ask the Hawaiians who are homeless to subsidize the affordable homes for the rest of the people of Hawaii, to subsidize their golf courses, subsidize their warehouses, and maybe someday later, count on your good consciences, to pay them back for waiting patiently? I wonder now, if the **Wall Street Journal** is here to chronicle this event today, what it would say.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Hirono then rose to speak against both measures, stating:

"Very briefly, in all the years that I have been involved in the lease to fee controversy involving the condominiums and single-family homes, one of the major stumbling blocks to resolving this most heartbreaking situation is contractual language going to how lease rents will be calculated. That's why I'm so concerned about the definition of fair market value in both of these bills. Unless this definition is changed, Hawaiians will be accepting less than what they should be getting.

"I understand from the Chairman that he will be looking at revising this language; however, since I will not have an opportunity to sit on conference or even be assured that these measures will be going to conference, I feel that I need to rise at this time to share my very heartfelt concerns regarding the fair market value definition in these measures.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I am afraid the Vice Chair of Judiciary talked me out of my going to be on that committee. I am going to vote no, and I would hope that Representative Morihara and the Finance Chairman and them take good care of what's going to happen.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Hagino then rose and stated:

"I had not intended to speak a second time but I feel that I should.

"I think John Burns said it right. He said, 'We are all visitors here. We are all passing through Hawaii. We are all immigrants. There is only one people that really are Hawaii, and that's the Hawaiians.' And we are all passing through. I think that we are the kind of society that we are today only because of one particular culture and one particular group of people, and these are the Hawaiian people.

"I wanted to say this because I think some of the arguments used in favor of the bill are the kind of arguments that I was concerned about earlier -- arguments that there's no money in the General Fund, that we must deal with things that's 'present value,' we must take care of our affordable housing programs. And these are the concerns I mentioned earlier, that if you phrase your decision-making within this context, then you have to say that these were the kinds of arguments used in such historical times like the Great Mahele. We have to open up the lands for individual ownership. We have to make lands available for commercial development, and

this is why you had this very great and unfortunate act such as the Great Mahele. So long as you see it within this context, there'll never be equity for the Hawaiian people -- not ever -- because they're going to have to take the back seat whenever this argument comes up.

"Now, I wanted to point out a few things about some of the other measures that we have passed or are about to pass for the Department of Hawaiian Homes. Of the \$12-million in back rent -- that was Senate Bill 2855 -- sure, they're going to get \$12-million in back rent. But the appraised value of the back rent, as noted by the Department of Hawaiian Homes real estate appraiser, should be \$20-million, and not \$12-million which was the State's appraiser. Both the Department of Hawaiian Homes and the Governor's Office retained separate appraisers. One said \$20-million -- the other said \$12-million. The Water, Land Use Committee chose the appraised value that the Department of Hawaiian Homes appraiser came up with, and I wanted to point out that that appraiser did the job of Andrew Rothstein who I consider to be a fine appraiser, and he is the one that told us that the last swap with Hemmeter which gave us this building was very poorly appraised and when I heard that he was involved, I immediately felt that his appraisal methods were going to be better, and they came up with \$20-million based on a different definition of how to appraise the rent. Instead we chose or we have chosen, with the passage of Senate Bill 2855, the lower. . .the lower figure for the back rent. Once again, sure \$12-million, but once again, a reduction of payments to the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands.

"In regards to the \$25-million, the additional \$25-million from CIP projects, that \$25-million response from the Governor's Office came as a response to the **Wall Street Journal** articles, and I think that is a tremendous response, but it's a one-time response, and this is the point I was trying to make again. Every four, five, or maybe ten years, we are reminded by such periodicals as the **Wall Street Journal**, or some congressional committees that we have failed in our trust obligations. It will come out again five years from now or ten years from now, that we have failed again. And those who are here in this Legislature, five years from now or ten years from now, will feel pangs of regret and guilt, and perhaps it will be another \$25-million appropriation for the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands and for OHA, you know, because we will feel guilty. But I am asking you not to feel guilty -- not to feel guilty -- because that kind of guilt only lasts for about a few moments.

"The time is now to make a just, equitable compensation, and do it from the standpoint of what is correct, what is the principle role to take. Don't operate from guilt because guilt will only last for a short period of time. Do what's right.

"Thank you very much."

At 4:38 o'clock p.m., Representative Ward asked for a recess, and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 4:47 o'clock p.m.

Representative Say then rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"A lot has been said by all of our colleagues this afternoon and a lot of the statements that have been made in fact are excellent and correct.

"In the caucus yesterday which you were not in attendance, Mr. Speaker, I gave my side of the ledger as

far as why this particular measure is of importance. I did see Virginia Isbell, Chairperson of the Housing Committee, and I asked her, 'Will this particular measure affect some of our housing projects throughout the State of Hawaii?' And her answer was, 'Yes.'

"I commend Representative Amaral because you're right -- 30 percent of all revenues goes to Hawaiian Homes and 20 percent for OHA. That's a 50 percent markup in all financing of our affordable housing units.

"Mr. Speaker, this afternoon, you know, I speak with a frustrated, sometimes very cautious heart, and the reason why I pose this to the members of the House is that before the first crossover at the Finance Committee, Ms. Norma Wong of the Office of State Planning was there, and I asked her a very pointed question which was brought up in caucus by Representative Amaral also. The question, Mr. Speaker, was this: 'Was there a House bill vehicle, as far as what the Administration had sent down, compared to what we have here as a Senate vehicle?' And the answer was, 'Yes.'

"There was no vehicle that was sent from the Water, Land Use, and Hawaiian Affairs Committee to Finance in addressing this problem. The Finance Committee members never did have a chance in taking in all the concerns that was brought up this afternoon before the first crossover, Mr. Speaker. I find it very appalling that here now, at second crossover, we are being chastised -- the Finance Committee members -- without given an opportunity on this floor to say we didn't have that first opportunity.

"There was an Administration package in trying to resolve this entitlement problem. I commend the Chairman and the Vice Chairman of the Water, Land Use, and Hawaiian Affairs Committee in trying to negotiate a deal, but why couldn't he have done it with a House vehicle also, Mr. Speaker? Is this one's gamesmanship that we're playing? You tell me here this afternoon, members of this House, we are taking the brunt of the criticism that we are ripping off the Hawaiians and I'm saying to myself, no. I have a lot of aloha for the Hawaiian people, and you know that -- from the people of Hanalei where my family comes from, to Representative Peters' family in Nanakuli, to the people of Hana where Uncle Joe was, and the people of the Big Island and Maui. Don't give me this kind of an emotional plea that we're ripping off the Hawaiians. We are trying to find an equitable and just way of trying to address this problem.

"Representative Young, the Vice Chair of the Committee, was very fortunate to have two days and five hours of mediation. And if she knew that it was going to Finance, why didn't she invite the Chairperson of the Finance Committee or the Vice Chair to sit in on these negotiations?

"Mr. Speaker, is the process wrong? I don't believe so. It's just more of a question of communication and the games people are playing. Let's not play games with the people of Hawaii! I got very disturbed this afternoon -- 26 pages of appropriation measures -- all the Minority, all the Majority support a great deal of them, and here we are, criticized in regards to another bill. We are making hard decisions -- this is what Representative Anderson said -- and you're right. But I take offense and I said to the Chairman yesterday in caucus that he's playing with the emotions of the members of this House.

"Mr. Speaker, if this vehicle dies on this floor this afternoon, I would be very hurt for the Administration, I will be very hurt for the housing subcommittee because we will not have any affordable housing.

"I'm not trying to get the money off the backs of the Hawaiians. I believe that they should have just compensation. Don't get me wrong. If the other process is to go through condemnation of public lands for HFDC, maybe that's the route to take. And what market appraisal value? What it is presently in use.

"I really don't know today also, Mr. Speaker, if the negotiator that was with Representative Young was the Chairperson of OHA. I don't know if the representative from the Hawaiian Home Lands was Mrs. Drake. I don't know who was in that negotiation. But are these two individuals talking for the Hawaiian people also, Mr. Speaker?

"These are all the concerns that were brought up at the Finance Committee hearing, but we weren't given the opportunity. I've been here sixteen years and I've had that committee that Chairman Hagino has for four years, and I've seen what has happened. I'm very proud to tell you all today that I was very fortunate to work with your administrative aide, Jann Yuen, when we did the Kahoolawe research. I don't want to talk about history -- I want to move on, Mr. Speaker, because there is a major dilemma out there. Five years ago, we supported the HFDC, the Administration measure, and now we are at a standstill. We are stymied right now because we cannot come up with a formula for just compensation of those public lands. Sure, it's great to have it killed -- then there's no affordable housing. But why only one vehicle -- a Senate bill and not a House bill?

"Mr. Speaker, these are the concerns that I wanted to express to the members of this House this afternoon because I don't think Chairman Souki or Vice Chairman Say are playing games with all of you here. I would like to ask all of you to please support this measure in the name of affordable housing and for native Hawaiians. I'm up at the Finance Committee hearings -- why can't we just set aside 20 percent of all units that we do develop for the Hawaiians, or 30 percent for Hawaiian Home Lands? They never did want to agree with that.

"And lastly, but not least, what Chairman Souki said is true, which I'm very much worried about for the future with our financial obligations, that we have to meet if we go back to the original House draft.

"So, Mr. Speaker, thank you very much."

Representative Kanoho then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, before discussions began on these two measures, it was my intent to vote in support of but with reservations for many of the reasons expressed. Following the very convincing and compelling arguments, I submitted green slips indicating a no vote because I felt if I voted yes, I would be betraying my fellow native Hawaiians, and that was before the break.

"During the break, I realized, through discussions, that without these measures the Hawaiians may not have anything at all, and for those reasons, I have gone back to Plan A which is to vote in support of these bills, but with reservations expressed.

"Before relinquishing the floor, Mr. Speaker, I would like to express my deep appreciation and aloha for Chairman Hagino and the others who spoke so eloquently in support of the Hawaiians and their thoughts.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Shon then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, speaking on the merits of the bills, I would like to oppose the bills for one very specific reason actually, and that is that about a year ago, we put into the budget, with the assistance of the Chairman of Finance, a proviso which would require a certain percentage of personnel to be transferred within the Department of Health to the Office of Hawaiian Health and the debate that went on within the Health Department is very instructive and it parallels exactly what we're talking about today. There was resistance across the board -- across the board -- because of the belief that the programs which were serving everyone couldn't really jar loose anyone to serve this one segment of the population which everyone knew was at the absolute bottom of the barrel in terms of statistics. I mean it's like two or three hundred percent with diabetes and all these kinds of very serious problems.

"My understanding is that the revenues that would come from the ceded lands would go to OHA which would have the opportunity to fund some of these very programs. The very successful program on the Hawaiian Diet Program -- we couldn't get funding in the Legislature in the regular budget. OHA finally came through with funding for that program. It is symptomatic, I think. We have to recognize that we are torn in a number of directions, and in terms of some of the health and human service needs which is so difficult to target, that we have an obligation to target in this particular sense. We have an obligation to those who first came before us -- the native Hawaiians here -- and I think that structurally, it is correct to acknowledge that whatever context we put this in, there will be great pressures to spread it out for everyone, but not to target that one group that we can see in both housing and in health and human services is most in need.

"Representative Amaral spoke about homelessness. The earlier bill that dealt with welfare payments, a great percentage of those folks we know have native Hawaiian blood. We find it difficult to target, and I really think it is incumbent upon us to realize this is a transfer of funds on the basis of principle from one government agency to another that will fund programs that we're going to have to deal with anyway, but we have been unable and unwilling to provide that successful targeting.

"For this reason, I would like to cast a strong vote in opposition to this particular formula with the hope that if it goes forward, that people will consider the earmarking of those units, as Representative Say mentioned, and people will consider other formulas. I think there's a variety of play in this and I think that even the parties who were involved in that mediation have begun to say, yeah, I guess we're going to have to move a little bit, have some more discussions.

"Many of you have on your shelves a blue book on Hawaiian history that was distributed in the last couple of years. I had the opportunity to participate in writing that book and in teaching some of those lessons, and I can tell you that the lesson that Representative Hagino mentioned today come through to me very strongly and we're repeating them. We repeated them last year in that attempt to deliver resources for health in the Health Department, and that competition for everyone versus the Hawaiians is one that is unsuccessfully fought year after year and I, for one, believe that we must stand on principle at some point, and I agree that this formula is an inadequate one.

"Thank you."

Representative Apo then rose to speak in favor of the bills, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I really appreciate the very eloquent remarks on behalf of native Hawaiians and the expressions of reservations on these bills. But for those who want to do native Hawaiians a favor, you know, I would request that they vote yes on these bills to at least keep the door of negotiations open.

"I do believe that the Finance Committee is trying its best and in good conscience and I think they understand the problem, and I think they are getting the message. So to kill these bills, and I hope that the attempt to appeal to vote these bills down is not a serious one, it will completely shut off every opportunity that we have this session to do anything significant.

"I would prefer to see the bills go to conference, as flawed as it may be in the opinion of some people, and keep the opportunity open. And on April 27th, if what we see is something we don't like, you can vote your conscience then. So until then, Mr. Speaker, I think the rational thing to do is to keep the door open, let negotiations continue, and hopefully, we can get more input from the Executive branch who, I think, is partly at fault for where we are at this juncture, and move on.

"Thank you."

Representative Hagino, in rebuttal, stated:

"It was said that the Water, Land Use, and Hawaiian Affairs Committee did not pass over House bills to the Finance Committee on matters such as these, and I really beg to differ with that.

"The claims bill that Norma Wong referred to had to do with the back rent issue and I specifically told Ms. Wong that I was going to hold the Administration's bill because I had great concerns about the appraisal methods used and the manner in which the back rents was determined. However, I told her very specifically that I would deal with the Senate bill when it came over.

"But, however, in order to alert the Finance Committee, I did send over a bill on Hawaiian Home Lands which had the \$25-million that the Governor had wanted. It also had an additional \$22-million which was actually a Republican initiative for additional funds for Hawaiian Home Lands, and those two figures of \$47-million, in my opinion, was going to approximate the \$25-million CIP project and the eventual amount for back rent, and that did turn out to be the approximate figure.

"In terms of dealing with the issue of the transfer of land from one land department to another, we did pass over a bill which was a bill, I believe, the Hawaiian caucus wanted that was to stop the transfer of these lands until there was a better mechanism in which to determine the value of those lands, and I believe that bill was passed over to Finance, and that was the manner in which the Water, Lands Committee was going to deal with that issue.

"When a bill came over from the Senate which was not an Administration bill ... now you gotta understand, as far as I know, this was not an Administration bill, but certainly the methodology was not the Administration methodology. The reason why we decided to go ahead with this was because the Vice Chair, I think, did a terrific job of trying to get all the parties together. The bill that came over from the Senate was simply an unacceptable bill to the native Hawaiians department and she did a terrific job in getting it out, and that's why the bills did move over to Finance.

"In regards to whether Finance should participate, I find it strange to believe that I am being faulted for

following the committee structure of the House of Representatives, that we are the subject matter committee and we took it upon ourselves to try to deal with the situation, and I think we dealt with it appropriately and sent the bill over to Finance. I think it is unusual to have a requirement that there be a Finance participation in all of these measures that come before the subject matter committees.

"In response to the inquiry made as to why didn't we try to resolve the problem by setting aside HFDC houses, perhaps at the amount of 20 percent of the houses, as a means of dealing with the entitlement problem and, quite frankly, that was informed to me by the Vice Chair that that solution was detailed by the HFDC Director, Joe Collins, so they did look at as many creative means as possible to deal with the situation.

"The last point to be made is that, you know, I've dealt with this problem I believe now for over three years. In the first year, the State was going to take the position that when they transferred lands from the Department of Land and Natural Resources to HFDC, it was going to be on a dollar transfer, so I think that was done four years ago. Then the following year, there was a move to try to value the lands that would be used for industrial zoned properties or commercial zoned properties and so I think progress has been made because people have spoken out for equity, so this is not a measure that's come up for the first time this year. It's been coming up for the last several years, and I think some progress has been made.

And my statements today is really a statement that there's still more to be done and let's keep the pressure on. I don't fault anyone, as I've said. I think what is important is, how do we approach this problem? How we approach this problem will determine the solution of this problem.

"Thank you."

At 5:10 o'clock p.m., Representative Arakaki asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1226-92 on S.B. No. 3486, SD 2, HD 2:

Representative Hagino moved that the report of the Committee and S.B. No. 3486, SD 2, HD 2, be recommitted to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Metcalf.

Representative Peters rose and stated:

"I have never seen a bill assembled exactly this way. It has so much substance because it describes the illegal overthrow of our monarchy and provides a tremendous amount of history that I think we all, as members of this body, should be cognizant of. I realize that at this juncture, based on the commitments by both the Chairman of Judiciary and the Chairman of Water, Land Use, and Hawaiian Affairs, would probably find a vehicle in which to put all of this language into.

"I want to thank both of them for allowing this bill to come as far as it has. It certainly is a very positive kind of statement that I think we all, as members of this honorable body, should recognize and support.

"Thank you."

Representative Metcalf then rose and requested that the remarks of Representative Peters be inserted into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Anderson then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would hope that if we are going to recommit this bill, that we find another vehicle somewhere hopefully that would at least explain the plight of the Hawaiians and the overthrow, and the needs of sovereignty in some way, so that at least the people in Congress would look at us as native Americans and would most certainly want to adhere to some of the other rights that they have given the Indians and the Eskimos, and it's a very important issue and this bill is a very, very strong bill. Even in our caucus, some people said they thought it was a little overpowering. But I guess when you're looking at rights, it is a very strong message that we were trying to send and have been trying to send.

"If we can find a vehicle, it would be most appreciative to all of the people of Hawaii, I think, to realize that there was a wrong and somebody, someday, is going to have to -- I wouldn't say make everything right -- but at least look at it and say, there were mistakes and we'll try to correct some of those.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tom then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I want to also reiterate the statement that was made by Representative Peters that if this vehicle is not used, that we somehow find another vehicle. I looked at this bill, too, and it has so much rich history.

"I just want to point out that last night, I had a community hour in Kaneohe and of all times, it came out about the possible Heiau in the North Halawa area of the H-3, and with myself and Rex Johnson standing facing a number of Hawaiian persons, I didn't have to open my eyes. When I listened to them talk about Hawaiian history, about the sacredness of their culture, and about many of the wrongs that they felt were committed in history, they opened my eyes for me, and I think that we can send lot of messages. But the question they asked me and I almost couldn't answer was: 'What have you done for the Hawaiian people, Representative Tom?' I think the gist of my answer was that I haven't done enough.

"And I think that this bill... the language contained in this bill is so rich with history, it's a shame that we have to recommit it because it really, in many respects, rewrite a lot of the wrongs that we've committed historically, and we can rewrite that. The opportunity is right here before us. And I'll tell you, when you can hear the frustrations and the feelings, it is just something that you can't explain when you hear a Hawaiian person, spilling out her guts about what has taken place in history and culture.

"That's all I want to say."

Representative Hagino then rose and stated:

"I'd like to assure the body that there are some resolutions in the Water, Land Use, and Hawaiian Affairs Committee which we will use as vehicles to put in the main thrust of this bill into those resolutions, and I assure you that we will do so as expeditiously as possible and, in fact, when we pass those resolutions, we'll make sure that every member of the Conference Committees dealing with the two bills on Hawaiian Homes and OHA entitlements will get copies of those resolutions so that they'll have a chance to undo the injustice.

"Thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1226-92 and S.B. No. 3486, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HAWAIIAN SOVEREIGNTY," were recommitted to the Committee on Finance.

"I first became aware of Stephanie Castillo a few years ago when she was writing stories about health and human services, and I remember I was struck by the professionalism and the depth in which she went into the stories, and in reading between the lines, a very strong concern that came through for the citizens of this State that were affected by government and programs and crimes, and a whole variety of things, and I must say that

I've often thought, since she left journalism directly, that there was many a story that I wished that Stephanie had written and covered since then.

"What we have before you on your desks is a complimentary copy of the **Reviewers Guide** for this extraordinary film, and in this week where we have debated Hawaiian history and perspective, I think it is very appropriate that we focus just briefly on something that is truly a Hawaiian issue, a health issue, a Hansen's disease issue, an AIDS issue, a civil rights issue, a religious issue, and a moral issue. In this **Guide**, there are some wonderful quotes from the film itself, one of which is from a chant written by Kaehu in which those who were sent to Kalaupapa lament strange when a man's neighbors become less than acquaintances. 'Seeing me, they drew away; they moved to sit elsewhere, whispering, and a friend pointed a finger -- he's a leper. I bowed my head; I knew it was true. In my heart, I hugged my shame.'

"Of Damien and those who responded to this crisis, the noted historian, Gavin Douse, commented on Damien that he asked the ultimate question -- 'Who is my brother? And if I am my brother's keeper, what does that mean? Must I reach out of my own limitations, and my own disabilities, and my own hesitations, and my own self-absorption? Must I reach across and touch someone else -- even if I get my hands dirty, even if I put myself at risk -- must I do that? Should I do that? Can I do that?' And Damien's answer was, 'Yes.'

"And in many ways, in this current crisis that we face in society relating to AIDS, the answer that this Legislature and others have responded is indeed yes, in terms of our policies, in terms of our funding, in terms of many things that we do. I am very proud of this State, that we have responded to AIDS in a way that is so unlike the ignorance that engulfed the response to Hansen's disease a century ago.

"It is my very great pleasure to introduce you today to the individual who wrote, produced, and directed '**Simple Courage**', who has been the driving force to focus our historical and current attentions on the parallels -- Miss Stephanie Castillo."

The honoree, Miss Stephanie Castillo, rose to be recognized.

Representative Shon continued:

"Joining Stephanie today are two individuals who are part of a growing history in Hawaii which is actually far more vigorous, in my view, than even the private sector has been able to accomplish, in terms of filmmaking and education and developing a reputation for Hawaii beyond our shores," and asked Mr. Christopher Conybeare, Director of News and Public Affairs at Hawaii Public Television and Executive Producer of 'Simple Courage', and Dr. Jim Young, General Manager of Hawaii Public Television, to stand to be recognized.

Representative Baker then rose and stated:

"I, too, would like to offer my congratulations to Stephanie. You've done an extraordinary job and we're all very proud of the documentary that resulted.

"I remember when Stephanie first came to the Legislature to ask for some assistance. I'm not sure that even she knew at that time. . .well, the Legislature provided some initial funding, all of the arduous work in fundraising and production that was ahead, but I think we can say without reservation that for us it was all worth it, and I know you feel exceptional pride in the product.

"All of the residents of Kalaupapa that I have spoken with about this film believe that it was done with great sensitivity and with great care and they're very proud to have been associated with it.

"Thank you, Stephanie."

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. Representative Oshiro, for the Committee on Transportation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1290-92) recommending that H.C.R. No. 105, as amended in HD 1, be adopted.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 105, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION TO IMPLEMENT ALTERNATIVES TO ELIMINATE TRAFFIC CONGESTION ON WAIKUI AND WAIELI STREETS," was adopted.

Representative Oshiro, for the Committee on Transportation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1291-92) recommending that H.R. No. 210 be adopted.

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.R. No. 210 be adopted, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"This is the resolution that says Hawaii doesn't want a three dollar departure tax everytime you leave the airport. As in a rose is a rose by any other name, so is a tax a tax by any other name.

"This resolution, I predict, will grow into a grassroots repeal of three dollars to get out of Hawaii as was the agricultural inspection tax totally unacceptable to the people of Hawaii. This resolution very acutely points out why it's not acceptable, and I may add one other insight as to why we are called to pay three dollars and that's because the airport is, by responsibility in budget, larger than most Third World countries' budgets, and the terminal that they're building is one million square feet and the airlines themselves said they only need 500,000 square feet, so we've got to cough up more money to pay for it. In addition, the people mover is not a moving sidewalk -- it's a \$700-million train -- of which again, we're going to have to cough up this three dollars per departure to pay for.

"The point is, if there's ever a taxing spend department, it's been the Department of Transportation, the point being that if we can't confine our revenues and the size of our projects, why should we go out and create more because then we'll end up building even bigger airports.

"So this resolution, hopefully, is the first beginning to stop that or at least alert the government that a departure tax could lead into who-knows-what in the future, and this is the first good beginning.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lee then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I think it behooves me to point out a few things about this particular resolution. I think a study is called for but it is a very well known fact -- if you travel anywhere in the world, anytime you leave Tokyo Airport, London, or anywhere else, you pay an exit levy -- a tax, airport tax, whatever you want to call it, and it can be very, very expensive. That tax is paid by people who travel -- people who use airlines.

"It is a well known fact that the Republican Administration believes that those who use the facility ought to pay for it. In other words, would you call it a tax, or would you call it a user fee? And those people who use the facility, who contribute to the wear and tear of the facility, who make such demands, and new facilities, new improvements, have to be built -- who should pay for it? Should all the taxpayers pay for it? Should all the poor people or Kalihi pay for it? Or should the people who take aircrafts, take airplanes, who have the money to travel -- should they not pay for it? And who are the people who travel to and from Hawaii? The vast majority of them are tourists and, you know, we are very fortunate in Hawaii because we have been able to export our tax burden, our fiscal burden, whatever you want to call it, on those who use the facilities, be they the tourists or others, but mainly the tourists.

"And I submit to you, ladies and gentlemen, if we are to put our operations of the airport on a sound basis, we should follow what other countries have done and indeed to take up our responsibilities which the federal government has placed on the states by decreasing its assistance in transportation facilities and do so by levying the charge on those who use the facilities.

"Ladies and gentlemen, I think it's about time we wise up to the fact that the federal government is not going to help us, and we will have to help ourselves by asking our friends who come here to please help us pay for the facilities.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Baker then rose and stated:

"I think it's important to note that this passenger facility charge, if it continues to go through, is not just on tourists -- it's on anyone departing Honolulu International Airport.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson then rose and stated:

"If I read the last paragraph properly, it says 'interisland travel by air.' That means that when any of us go interisland travel, we are tourists. When our business people go interisland as that's the only means to

get back and forth to take care of their businesses on the other islands, they become tourists.

"I think that everybody better realize that it's not like driving from one state to the other on the mainland. We are the tourists that we're talking about, and we are the ones that's paying the user fees that our Representative Lee is talking about, and the poor people from Kalihi are going to be paying for it, too.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"Representative Lee reminded me that three dollars should be in conjunction with the one thousand percent increase in landing fees which will make us also the most expensive in the nation, which will again hit the price of the ticket that people will use to get on to the plane to pay the departure tax.

"Thank you."

Representative Lee then rose and stated:

"I would just remind the kind representative that his remark was not germane to the discussion. The resolution refers only to the imposition of the passenger facility charge.

"Now, I would like to simply note another very important fact. If other states, if other cities, impose a passenger facility charge, I think we have no choice, but until then, it might be better if we follow the lead of other states and cities; for example, like the charge on rental cars which came out of Florida and, lo and behold, every state is now doing it, including Hawaii. It's best that we in this instance not become the model innovative but follow others, and I am sure you would agree that sooner or later, all the other airports are going to charge the facility charge.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. No. 210, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION EXPRESSING OPPOSITION TO THE IMPOSITION OF PASSENGER FACILITY CHARGES AND URGING THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION NOT TO IMPOSE PASSENGER FACILITY CHARGES AT STATE AIRPORTS," was adopted.

Representative Oshiro, for the Committee on Transportation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1292-92) recommending that H.C.R. No. 199 be adopted.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 199, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION EXPRESSING OPPOSITION TO THE IMPOSITION OF PASSENGER FACILITY CHARGES AND URGING THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION NOT TO IMPOSE PASSENGER FACILITY CHARGES AT STATE AIRPORTS," was adopted.

Representative Oshiro, for the Committee on Transportation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1293-92) recommending that H.R. No. 162, as amended in HD 1, be adopted.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. No. 162, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE

OAHU METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION TO STUDY THE FEASIBILITY OF CONSTRUCTING A VEHICULAR TUNNEL UNDER PEARL HARBOR TO LINK THE SECONDARY URBAN CENTER WITH THE PRIMARY URBAN CENTER," was adopted, with Representatives Shon, Tatibouet and Thielen voting no.

Representative Oshiro, for the Committee on Transportation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1294-92) recommending that H.C.R. No. 151, as amended in HD 1, be adopted.

Representative Arakaki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.C.R. No. 151, HD 1, be adopted, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Thielen then rose to speak against the resolution, stating:

"What concerns me is once you give life to an idea such as this, then the idea may go forward. If we think we've had problems with H-3, I'd like to direct the members' attention to the kind of trouble that we would have if we attempt to tunnel under Pearl Harbor. I think it's not a cost-effective method. I think the idea lacks any merit, and I would wish that we would not ask departments to study this and use up their time and resources to do it. I think the measure should just stop here.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Oshiro then rose to speak in favor of the concurrent resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with such concern that we have regarding traffic congestion throughout our State, coupled with the increased development in the so-called 'second city' for the City and County of Honolulu out in the Ewa area, I certainly feel it is important for us to assess and to review and evaluate every possible means that we have over alleviating the traffic congestion.

"Back in the late 1970's, the Oahu Metropolitan Planning Organization did assess a similar concept for what we have here in this resolution. What this resolution is asking is to have the Oahu Metropolitan Planning Organization update those figures that they have, to discuss this issue again with the Navy being that it will be going under Pearl Harbor, to again give us some data on the cost, the alignment, the depot location, and the impact on traffic congestion.

"I certainly do feel that it's something that's viable in the sense that we need to take a look at it and to fully reassess its feasibility before we decide whether it's a good or bad thing to go with, so I certainly support this resolution.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 151, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE OAHU METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION TO STUDY THE FEASIBILITY OF CONSTRUCTING A VEHICULAR TUNNEL UNDER PEARL HARBOR TO LINK THE SECONDARY URBAN CENTER WITH THE PRIMARY URBAN CENTER," was adopted, with Representatives Shon, Tatibouet and Thielen voting no.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative Oshiro and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.R. "First of all, the reference in the Order of the Day is inaccurate. The purpose of the resolution is to get a comprehensive review of the factors that contribute to the escalation of public contracts in Hawaii.

"One of the things that I don't think most of our members realize is the difficulty it is for the State to go

through and actually process the contract to get something done. Unless you've actually tried to wade through this process and to try to figure out why things cost as much as they do, you can't begin to appreciate why projects that are so simple and should be so relatively inexpensive cost so much to do and take forever to get accomplished.

"What this resolution is intending to do is to have a review done to specifically go and identify the various factors that drive our cost of business up. For the State to do a contract on any particular project, we can basically add 50 percent to 100 percent more money into doing it. Very simply, we're not getting the bank for our buck so our entire process of how we bid our contracts, the requirements we put on how we let them, and how we come up with the cost for it, one, has to be reviewed, and (2), it has to be changed because how we do business right now is ineffective, and it's time-consuming and it costs way too much.

"So, I would ask everybody's support on these two resolutions."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the reports of the Committee were adopted and H.R. No. 207, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU TO PERFORM A COMPREHENSIVE REVIEW OF THE FACTORS THAT CONTRIBUTE TO THE ESCALATION OF PUBLIC CONTRACT COSTS IN HAWAII," and H.C.R. "This concurrent resolution is looking to review some of the various government functions that are performed and to try and identify those which might actually be privatized. One of the things we've noticed with state government is that as it's grown, I believe it's trying to do too many things.

"One of the things we've begun to see in a very alarming factor is that the number of employees of the

State is increasing very alarmingly. As we're going in and looking at very tight budgetary times, you know, we've got to turn around and look at our own selves and our own operation. Right now, if one out of every ten working person in Hawaii is working for the State of Hawaii, that should wave some red flags. We're developing a very high carrying fixed cost that we're locked into and I think unless we start looking very carefully at the types of things that the State does and the whole range of things that we do, that we will continue to find ourselves in some adverse financial position. So I think it's a very prudent management perspective for us to step back to look at all the different things that we do and say, look at what is it we really need to do, and what is it that we can walk away from and put back into the private sector.

"So I'd ask everyone's support on this.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. Representative Bainum's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, one of the more irritating of the various environmental insults we face each day, yet the one that is most easily remedied, is that of high levels of sound from vehicles. Such noise can disturb our sleep and it can upset an otherwise pleasant walk along the beach front. Yes, trucks must deliver food to restaurants and supermarkets, and refuse trucks must pick up trash, but neither service should be performed at 5:00 a.m. nor with great slamming of doors or growling of hydraulics. No motorcycle or car should be allowed to operate without benefit of a properly designed muffler. Our residents deserve better than this.

"House Concurrent Resolution 429 is a start towards an improved life of lessened noise. It requests a report be prepared that will inform the next Legislature of how other states have minimized noise pollution and how policy can be established for control of noise at the time of sales of a vehicle, periodically through inspection, and during illegal operation.

"Please join with me in supporting this resolution that will permit our residents, especially those who live in urban areas such as Waikiki, to enjoy a less noisy Paradise than has been available to us recently.

"I want to thank Representative Paul Oshiro for 'hearing' and responding to the concerns of Waikiki's residents."

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS
(FLOOR PRESENTATIONS)

The following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 478 and 479) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

H.R. No. 478, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION REQUESTING THAT THE WEEK OF APRIL 5 TO 12, 1992, BE DESIGNATED AS 'HAWAII WEEK OF THE YOUNG CHILD' AND THAT APRIL 9, 1992 BE DESIGNATED AS 'WORTHY WAGE DAY'," was jointly offered by Representatives Amaral, Arakaki, Thielen, Bainum, Baker, Chun, Duldulao, Fukunaga, Hashimoto, Hirono, Horita, Isbell, Kawakami, Marumoto, Stegmaier, Tatibouet, Thompson and Young.

On motion by Representative Amaral, seconded by Representative Arakaki and carried, H.R. No. 478 was adopted.

Representative Amaral rose and proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and members, in this the Year of the Family, it is with great pride that we set aside a time to recognize those persons who sacrifice their time and financial security to care, nurture and educate our children.

"All too often we have heard the phrase that, 'the children of today will determine the success and progress of our State in the future.' However, on many occasions, we, as a people and ourselves as a legislative body, fail to realize the great personal sacrifice that persons who provide quality child care experience. To say that the child care provider is an unskilled position in society does a great disservice to these people who assure the safety and well-being of our children while many of us go off to work. The wages and benefits that a child care provider earns does not mirror the amount of time, patience, kindness and love that they express to our young children everyday. Possibly the greatest reward that they receive is a loving hug, an expressive smile, the look of wonderment as they tell a child a story, or the grateful thank you from a parent after a hard day at work.

"I am sure that many child care providers sit with envy while the children that they care for tell them about the trips they took during the summer, the new car their family purchased, or demonstrate the latest nintendo cartridge on their Gameboy, all of which none of them can afford. It is not uncommon to find the child care provider at the bottom of our wage scale here in Hawaii.

"I believe it is imperative that we, as a body, begin to take the time to review the ways that we may assist our child care providers and hopefully this resolution is the beginning of that.

"So, in response to Reverend Norris' prayer today, ask that we all join hands with the child care providers and with our children and maybe win this battle together."

Representative Arakaki then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, very often when we talk about child care, and very recently we talked about the trilemma of child care quality, accessibility, and affordability, and we hear about the crises in child care, and we hear all these alarms and red flags going up about the problems that occur because of child care or the lack of it, and how important it is, I look at child care and I look at early education as an opportunity and it's a choice we need to make. It has to do with our investment -- human investment, our investment in resources -- because we talk about reforming education and how we can better the lives of our people and better the educational opportunities of our children. And yet, a lot of the studies have shown that the early childhood development is so important in education.

"How important is school readiness to the success of our children in school?

"You know, those issues have to be addressed and the studies have shown that those who have the positive child care and preschool experiences are the ones that tend to succeed in later life and they have greater successes in school. They tend not to be on welfare or end up in prison. And these are the positive things we want to promote, so I see it as an opportunity. And when it comes to child care and early education, it's not just a matter of cognitive stimulation. The opportunities that arise when we talk about child care and early education also has to do with the social and emotional development of a child. And there are other opportunities as well. There are opportunities to educate parents on how to raise our children. There are opportunities to intervene when it comes to preventing child abuse and neglect. So all these opportunities are rolled into this thing called child care, early childhood education, and I really wish we could put more emphasis on it.

"I just want to give you an idea of maybe of what Europe is doing and also in Japan, and I think their investments are starting to pay off as we can see from their economies. Just to give you an idea, they're looking at extending the length of day in existing nursery school arrangements to accommodate full-day working mothers, extending the age of admission in day care centers to include infants, and establish special infant and toddler facilities. They encourage an explicit developmentally appropriate curricular component in their care, they select care givers on the basis of aptitude and give them systematic training. They integrate day care into a larger system of child care support. They have more systematic supervision of child care facilities. They include the various kinds of care where the center base of home base is a mutual aid network of corporative facilities, and finally, they use centers as sites for health improvement and supportive parental education.

"So all these things, I think you know, some of the more developed nations have recognized as a great investment in our future. As an investment, I think there has to be an accompanying recognition of the importance of human resources in this area, and one of my colleagues said, well, they probably could make more at McDonalds, or delivering pizza, and I hate to think that making hamburgers or delivering pizza is more important than the care of our children, so hopefully, we can also recognize that we need to invest in more quality workers and provide them with the wages that they deserve.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Thielen then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would ask all of us sitting here today to think to the young parents of today that just have given birth to a new infant. Today we do have both fathers and

mothers taking maternity leave, but they come to the point where they need to go back to their jobs. They don't have the luxury of staying at home and being full-time parents at home, and they look out into the community to say, where can I take, or where can we take this precious new baby that may be three weeks, six weeks, three months -- that's a real luxury if it's three months old -- and they look out to say, where can we take this baby, our precious child? And there is such a lack of places where people would feel secure, where parents would feel secure in leaving that new infant.

"That's something that we, as legislators, must address. We must reach out and give some help to the new parents in our State, to be able to put together creative ways that we will have infant and early child care centers that are safe, that are affordable, and that give a living wage to those who chose to be employed there. This isn't a problem that we can sweep under the rug. It's a problem that these young mothers and fathers face everyday, every week, and they're asked to make unacceptable choices because they have to go back to work. Sometimes their unacceptable choices are they must go to work knowing that their child is in hands where the child may not be that well cared for.

"We have a moral responsibility, and we must pay attention to this and move forward. I would encourage all of us, during the interim, to think of ways that we can be more productive and more helpful, and that we also can recognize that we value those who provide the infant and early child care as highly as we do someone who drives out to deliver pizza in our neighborhood.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Metcalf then rose and stated:

"I would just like to commend the representative from the child care community, and note that Representative Arakaki and Representative Thielen have redefined for us the meaning of 'a few words.'

"Thank you."

At this time, Representative Amaral introduced the honorees and asked them to stand to be recognized, as follows: Ms. Virginia Fink, President of the Hawaii Association of Young Children and Curriculum Developer for Kamehameha Schools; Mr. Chuck Larson, Executive Director of Seagull Schools, Inc.; Ms. Dorothy Mahoney, a teacher at Rainbow School in Kahuku and also a part-time school custodian. "Ms. Mahoney drove daily from Kahuku to Honolulu Community College to earn her degree and provide the services she does"; and Keala Rierson, a teacher at the Prince Kuhio Child Care Center who also works as a part-time waitress, and she has a BA in child psychology and women studies.

Representative Amaral then asked other individuals who provide services in the child care community and who were seated in the gallery, to stand to be recognized: Miss Sharon Taba, Vice President of Membership Services of HAEYC; Dolores Estrada, Board member of HAEYC and former teacher; Amy Hogan, a teacher at St. Timothy's, and her baby, Allison Hogan who is three months old; and Pauline Bailey, Director of the HAEYC.

A Certificate of Recognition was presented to Ms. Fink by Representative Amaral, and floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Arakaki, Santiago, Bainum and Thielen.

H.R. No. 479, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION TO HONOR BOY SCOUT TROOP 10, ALOHA COUNCIL BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA, HAWAII'S LONGEST

CONTINUOUS BOY SCOUT TROOP ON THE OCCASION OF ITS 75TH ANNIVERSARY," was offered by Representative Tatibouet.

On motion by Representative Tatibouet, seconded by Representative Bellinger and carried, H.R. No. 479 was adopted.

Representative Tatibouet rose and proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"About nine years ago, my son was searching for a Boy Scout troop and he came upon Troop 10. It's for him an ideal troop and I must admit that with my interest in Girl Scouting over the years, he couldn't have found a troop where he found a better home and a happier home and one that's been a home, as you heard in the resolution, for over 1,600 boys over these past 75 years in Hawaii. My son went on to earn his Eagle and he has been joined by over 180 other boys of that troop which, according to the Aloha Council's statistics, seems to be the largest number of Eagle Scouts of any troop in the State of Hawaii.

"I would like to tell you a little about the troop. In terms of the graduates of the troop, on Sunday, April 12th coming up, the troop is gathering at the Hale Koa Hotel and has invited people from all over the country to attend. They'll have a large celebration for their 75th anniversary. And in response to questionnaires we sent out to people, they were asked: What has Boy Scouting meant to them? What has the experience of Troop 10 meant to them?

"The gentleman you see sitting closest to you, Mr. Speaker, is Mr. Masao Miyamoto and he has been a member of the troop for 67 years. He has been scoutmaster since 1945 so many of the men from around the country who responded with remarks concerning this troop attribute much of what's happened in their lives to the leadership of Mr. Miyamoto who is sitting here.

"This troop, believe it or not, in 75 years has had only two scoutmasters until a couple of weeks ago when the gentleman sitting to Mr. Miyamoto's right was chosen as the new scoutmaster -- Gordon Wong -- who I'll be introducing shortly. But the remarkableness of it is that it is the longest continuous troop in the State of Hawaii and it has had indeed only two scoutmasters during those 75 years. And these are boys who grew up in Hawaii, in the Kaimuki area, and this tells what Troop 10 has been to them.

"Abraham Aiona said, 'We were closely interwoven as friends and ohana. Friendships still continue today even though we've grown older and are apart.'

"Ralph Ai says, 'The Boy Scout pledge has influenced my growing up to adulthood. Till today I do practice the Scout's oath. I have also become a leader in moral ordered life.'

"And Melvin Fong reports, 'It has affected my life by giving me, through the merit badge program, guidance, and Mr. Miyamoto had a chance to select my vocation.'

"James Haley said, 'It has given me moral and ethical guide for life.'

"And yet again, 'We have memories of Hanauma Bay,' from George Porter, 'when it was empty -- beautiful and empty. We used to go camping there. It has meant a great deal to us as Boy Scouts.'

"And from another scout, Randolph Rarick, 'Meeting in the old reservoir in Kaimuki and knowing only Boy Scouts would be there -- no girls, no parents.'

"David Shimabukuro writes, 'We were always the largest troop around and I was proud to march in the parades. We were like an army -- 120 strong.'

"Bunchy Nunokawa, whose son is here today -- Robert Nunokawa -- who also was an alumnus of the troop. 'It was a very good and happy time to see Troop 10 graduates becoming good, professional and businessmen in the State of Hawaii.'

"Jon Ono who is the Prosecuting Attorney for the County of Hawaii. He says, 'Lifelong friendships were made. Their scouting values, I am still applying everyday.'

"William Yamada reports, 'The cleaning up of the blood-stained stretchers on December 7, 1941, exposed me to the reality of war that I experienced 28 years later in Vietnam.'

"Frederick Young says, 'I am better prepared for all things in life, both physically and mentally. The values of scouting are not ephemeral, they are constant. They are not only rephrased from time to time.'

"And lastly, I have a very long letter which I'll only quote two lines. It was written by Everett Young from Utah. He writes, 'Mr. Miyamoto has been one of the most influential, powerful things in my life, and I often think of him everyday. My heart is filled with aloha for him and I've been wanting to tell him so for many years.' On Sunday, Mr. Miyamoto will receive that letter from a former scout.

"Anyway, we have here today these wonderful results of that troop. We have alumni of the troop. We have the leaders who themselves were alumni. We have alumni and we have young men who have made Eagle, and I would like to take this opportunity to introduce them."

Seated in the gallery: Gary Shiraishi, Troop 10 Parents/Scouts Guild President; Alice Watanabe, part of the Troop committee and one of the main volunteers and long-time volunteer in the emergency system of the Red Cross on the island of Oahu; Robert Toyofuku, an alumnus of Troop 10 and Executive Director of the Pacific Law Institute; Eric Girndt, new Eagle Scout of Troop 10, and his parents, Walter and Evelyn Girndt; Edward and Florence Yee, parents of Thomas Yee; Robert Nunokawa, sponsor of Troop 10 and an alumnus; Douglas Tsuruda, Assistant Scoutmaster; Bert Komenaka, an alumnus and official photographer of Troop 10; and George Akahane, an alumnus of Troop 10 and former Councilman of the City and County of Honolulu.

Representative Tatibouet continued:

"We have several hundred joining us on Sunday but we're delighted, Mr. Speaker, that you gave us the opportunity of recognizing Troop 10 and for all it's done for the 1,600 boys of Hawaii today.

"Thank you very much."

"I would like to add, before we make the presentation to this august body in front of me, that I was a Boy Scout, Troop 118, and while earning one of my merit badges, I burnt my potatoes. But with that experience, I'm the best cook in the house now."

Representative Bellinger, an Eagle Scout, presented Mr. Masao Miyamoto with a Certificate of Recognition, and maile/ilima leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Santiago, Stegmaier, Hagino, Anderson and O'Kieffe.

"We talk here in the State House of Representatives often about the tourism industry and although some of these ladies and gentlemen represent hospitals and other industries that are related, the majority -- 85 percent of the membership -- is from the tourism industry so I'm going to address that aspect of it.

"We talk of the tourism industry but we seldom really see what makes the tourism industry tick. These ladies and gentlemen here today are the ones that make it tick. They're not the ones that you see if you go for dinner, or to a banquet, or to a luncheon, or even necessarily to stay overnight at a hotel, but these are the ones that are the heart -- truly the heart -- of the hotels in our tourism industry throughout the State. These represent hotels here on Oahu. Their chapter extends to the neighbor islands and includes, in fact, all of the State of Hawaii, and it is an international organization as well.

"These are the ladies and gentlemen who have proven that there are executive and management careers in the tourism industry. Many of them have started out in starting positions. They have, through their own hard work and intelligence, brains and wherewithal, learned and worked their way up. They are very successful management ladies and gentlemen. I've had the privilege of working with many of them, side by side. I was, once upon a time, an executive housekeeper myself so I know of what I speak in knowing exactly what they do everyday.

"They are the ones that make tourism happen in Hawaii. Without them, you would read in the newspapers about guests arriving at the airport, getting to hotels and having no rooms and having no place to sleep, not being happy, and the hotels themselves not being of fine appearance. They don't actually do the engineering chores but they are the ones that's responsible for seeing that the mechanical part of the engineering is done. So, in fact, they really are responsible for the physical plan of the hotel. They are the heart of the hotel, and in the tourism industry they are what we call the 'back of the house.' You all see the front of the house -- the front desk clerks, doormen, the bellmen, the assistant managers and all that sort of people. These are the invisible people that are really making the tourism industry that drives the economy of the State work, and I am very, very proud to have them here today to honor them -- these representatives -- on behalf of all of those in Hawaii who work so hard in the back of the House to make our economy what it is today."

Representative Tatibouet then introduced the honorees who were seated on the House floor, as follows:

"Rosita Galera. Rose has been a friend, associate. I've worked with her; she's worked with me; we worked side by side for a good long time. She is presently the corporate executive housekeeper of Aston Hotels. She has a long history of executive housekeeping experience with other properties as well. She is the President of the Hawaii chapter of NEHA -- the National Executive Housekeepers' Association -- and she's the immediate past member of the Board of Directors of the National Executive Housekeepers' Association;

"Kathy Quevido. Kathy is presently executive housekeeper at the Outrigger Prince Kuhio Hotel. I have also worked side by side with Kathy at one time in our careers, and Kathy is the Pacific Southwest District Vice Governor for the National Executive Housekeepers' Association;

"Wade Gesteuyala is the Second Vice President of the National Executive Housekeepers' Association, Hawaii chapter, and he is executive housekeeper of the Hawaii Prince Hotel;

"Seena Tupuola. Seena is executive housekeeper of the Island Colony Hotel, and Seena and I go back 25 years together. We worked side by side and she now is executive housekeeper at the Aston Hotel and a very proud addition to our management team in housekeeping; and

"Audrey Goh. Audrey is the executive housekeeper of the Halekulani Hotel -- the number one beautiful property in the State of Hawaii -- one of our newer lovely properties."

Representative Tatibouet then introduced other members of the National Executive Housekeepers' Association who were seated in the gallery, and asked them to stand to be recognized, as follows: Mattie Vero, Treasurer of the Hawaii chapter of the NEHA, and executive housekeeper at Arcadia, the retirement home; Elcinor Evasco, a member of the Board of the Hawaii chapter, and executive housekeeper at the Outrigger Reef Hotel; Madeline Chang, First Vice President of the Hawaii chapter of the NEHA and executive housekeeper at the Kahala Hilton Hotel; Diane Nakamura, Board member and executive housekeeper at the Waikiki Beach Tower Hotel; Roy Honda, Secretary of the Hawaii chapter of NEHA and executive housekeeper at the Waikiki Beachcomber Hotel; Grace Tashima, Board member and executive housekeeper at the Outrigger Waikiki Surf Hotel; Gisela Shelton, Board member and executive housekeeper at the Waikiki Banyan Hotel; Charlene Franklin, executive housekeeper of Charley's Angels "which is a contract cleaning company"; Pauline Galera, executive assistant housekeeper of the Island Colony Hotel; and Mercedes Ynalvez, executive housekeeper of the Waikiki Joy Hotel.

Representative Lee then rose and stated:

"I would like to thank Representative Tatibouet for this marvelous presentation.

"What I have said about the tourist industry, about management, has basically been out of textbooks, out of analytical and basically data that's written or by empirical observation, but today, for the first time, I really saw with my eyes what the new managers look like. You know, they look like everyone here! They are like all of us except for one big difference, and that difference is that all of them worked their way up from the ranks. They did not go to the university to get an MBA. They had to prove themselves on the job and, you know, it's so marvelous to see all of you here, to see even an evidence of equal opportunity employment, and I am glad to see the two gentlemen among all of you. Also to see the wide differences in the types of industries represented in the hotel industry, the different marvelous hotels like the Halekulani, Kahala, also rivaling with all the other hotels.

"The point is that we have a real firm evidence that your hard work, your perseverance, have brought you to become managers, and I think that opportunity exists in Hawaii today.

"Now the last thing I would like to say, in appreciation to Representative Tatibouet, is that my good friend, Ms. Franklin, is from Mililani and that makes two presentations in which people from Mililani have been recognized.

"Thank you, Jane. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Alcon then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to pay tribute to Rose Galera because in addition to being a national president, she's also active in Girl Scouting in Kalihi. She's one of the founders of the latchkey program of the Girl Scouts in Kalihi. In addition to that, Mr. Speaker, Ms. Galera is also working with the Farrington tourism program. And in addition to that, Mr. Speaker, she's also involved in the literacy program that Mrs. Waihee has started.

"With all the erudition that, you know, came from Representative Tatibouet and Representative Lee, I am sure that we are entitled to first-class hotel rooms.

"Thank you."

At this time, Representative Cachola presented Ms. Galera with a Certificate of Recognition, and floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Chun, Duldulao, Bainum, Alcon and Lee.

H.R. No. 481, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION HONORING AND COMMENDING MR. JAMES Y. UYEDA," was jointly offered by Representatives Bunda, Hashimoto, Arakaki, Baker, Bellinger, Cachola, Chang, Chun, Hirono, Horita, Kanoho, Lee, Marumoto, Morihara, Okamura, Santiago, Shon, Stegmaier and Young.

On motion by Representative Bunda, seconded by Representative Hashimoto and carried, H.R. No. 481 was adopted.

Representative Bunda rose and proceeded to introduce the honoree, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, on behalf of the Leeward district representatives, we would like to recognize Mr. James Uyeda for his many years of dedicated services to the young people of Hawaii. He has had a most distinguished career in music, inspiring many students to excel beyond their own expectations. Mr. Uyeda believes that the young people of Hawaii can be the best, not only in Hawaii and not only in the nation, but the best in the world. He constantly strives to create opportunities for our local kids to be recognized as the best. My brother was a student of his at Leilehua High School and he told me, 'Mr. Uyeda is a very firm disciplinarian, yet very compassionate to all of his students.'

"His teaching career began in Wisconsin, followed with positions at Maui High School, Stevenson Intermediate School, Leilehua High School, Western Washington State University, and Leeward Community College. During his second year at Leeward, he established this Leeward Symphonic Wind Ensemble in 1974 of which he is still a director. Performing groups include the Leeward Symphonic Wind Ensemble, the Jazz Band, and the Shin Gedai Band which is an ethnic Japanese and Okinawan music.

"The Leeward Symphonic Wind Ensemble performed by invitation at the College Band Directors' National Association and Western Regional Convention at Long Beach State University in 1982, and in 1987 Northwestern University in Illinois. The Leeward Symphonic Wind Ensemble was the first college or university band from Hawaii to be ever invited to perform at this national convention.

"Mr. Speaker, on behalf of the House members, I would like to offer my congratulations and aloha to Mr. James Uyeda for an outstanding career in music education."

At this time, Representative Bunda introduced Mr. James Uyeda and asked him to stand to be recognized.

Accompanying Mr. Uyeda on the House floor were his wife, Mrs. Lillian Uyeda, and Mr. Lester Tanji, Assistant Director of the Leeward Symphonic Wind Ensemble, who also rose to be recognized.

Representative Hashimoto then rose and proceeded to introduce the guests who were seated in the gallery, stating:

"Fellow colleagues, if you take a look at Mr. Uyeda, he does look like Hawaii's version of the maestro, Seiji Ozawa, and he indeed conducts just as well as Seiji Ozawa.

"Mr. Speaker, I have the honor also of introducing some of Mr. Uyeda's friends. Mr. Uyeda has taken his positive thinking, philosophy, and energy and is now working with Regal Travel. From Regal Travel, we have Mr. Ray Miyashiro who is the President of that company as well as Trans-Hawaiian Services; Miss Sonya Ouye; Mr. Charles Reindollar, Director of Sales; and Aileen Matsuda, the Manager for Regal Travel and a constituent of Representative Lee.

"Also in the audience is Mr. Uyeda's former students and I know he has always spoken very highly of Mr. Uyeda and introduced us originally to him -- Mr. Francis Tanji."

All of the guests in the gallery then rose to be recognized.
