INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS (FLOOR PRESENTATIONS)

The following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 482 to 485) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

H.R. No. 482, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION COMMENDING THE HAWAII STATE BAR ASSOCIATION YOUNG LAWYERS DIVISION FOR ITS SUPPORT AND PARTICIPATION IN 'DRUG FREE HAWAII WEEK'," was jointly offered by Representatives Bainum and Hirono.

On motion by Representative Bainum, seconded by Representative Hirono and carried, H.R. No. 482 was adopted.

Representative Bainum rose and proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, lawyers, like legislators, sometimes get little praise for the many things that they do well and right. Well, last October, dozens and dozens of lawyers and physicians joined together to go out to the different schools and make presentations for the Drug Free Hawaii Week. Paired as lawyer and doctor teams, they spoke out against the harm of illegal drug use. I was privileged to be a part of this program.

"But I'm even more honored to make this presentation today, to acknowledge the outstanding leadership of the Hawaii State Bar Association's Young Lawyers Division for their efforts in making this worthy project such a success.

"Today, I would like to introduce to you the presidents of the two professional associations as well as the cochairs of the No-Use Message Program."

Representative Bainum then asked Lorraine Akiba, President of the Hawaii State Bar Association's Young Lawyers Division; Shirley Devaris, Joseph Lee and Stephen Dyer, co-chairs of the Hawaii State Bar Association's No-Use Message Program; and Dr. Stephen Wallach, President of the Hawaii Medical Association, who were seated on the House floor, to stand to be recognized.

Representative Hirono then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, very briefly, Representative Bainum, I think, is a perfect example of a doctor who works well with the lawyers in the House. In other words, he doesn't give us any trouble -- we like it that way.

"I commend Representative Bainum for bringing this group here because, as he indicated, it's really nice to see the doctors and the lawyers working together and I hope that this is a portend of things to come.

"I would like to introduce two other people who are in the audience I believe, and these are the coordinators of the joint effort and basically, they are the people behind the scenes who actually did most of the work," and asked Lisa Tongg with the Hawaii Medical Association, and Paulette Suwa with the Hawaii State Bar Association's Young Lawyers Division, to stand to be recognized.

"Lastly, Mr. Speaker, I believe that the age cutoff for the young lawyers' section is 35 or 36, so that means all the lawyers here are over-the-hill. But it's nice to know that the younger people are carrying on with their good work, so thank you very much."

Certificates of Recognition and floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Bainum, Hirono, Oshiro, Hiraki, M. Ige, Duldulao, Isbell and Baker.

H.R. No. 484, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION HONORING AND COMMENDING THE COMMITMENT OF EXCELLENCE OF HARRY SEISHO NAKASONE, MASTER PRACTITIONER OF THE OKINAWAN SANSHIN," was jointly offered by Representatives Arakaki, D. Ige, Horita, Oshiro, Yonamine and Apo.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative D. Ige and carried, H.R. No. 484 was adopted.

Representative Arakaki rose and proceeded to introduce the honoree, stating:

"This morning I would like to say, 'men tsula' to our special guests, both from Okinawa and our honoree.

"Mr. Speaker, this past Saturday, I attended a conference at Stevenson Intermediate on education and technology. The keynote speaker, Dr. David Thornburg, provided an exciting vision of the future and how new paradigms in education and technological training will be needed to prepare our children for that future. An interesting quote he provided was, 'We have to prepare people for their future and not for our past.'

"In that regard, our State has, in recent years, come face to face with what it calls 'paradigm paralysis' and indeed the controversies in the news illustrate how the forces of history and culture can be pitted against those of progress and technology. Many of us are of different ethnic heritages. We consider ourselves Americans first, and yet we feel the tug of our ancestors and the threads of our cultural history which seem to weave us into a common bond through a sense of identity. Those strands may be reflected in music, dance, literature, food, religion and a myriad of other media that makes the culture unique.

"As the immigrants and kupunas who provide the direct links to the past slowly fade into history, we fail to realize the impact of their loss on our future. We also fail to appreciate the precious treasures we have in those who are willing to accept the stewardship of preserving what is special about our culture. That is why we honor Sensei Harry Nakasone on the floor of the House today. We honor him not only for the degrees of proficiency he has accomplished with the sanshin (Okinawan shamisen) and the talented versatility to perform both the minyo (folk) and koten (classical) Okinawan songs, or for the many honores he has been accorded including the recent distinction of being the first to be given a national heritage award for an Asian art form. Perhaps it is more fitting that we pay tribute to what Nakasone sensei represents, the indomitable spirit of 'gambatte' or never give up no matter what obstacles are placed before you. The willingness to 'shimbo' or be patient, yet never lose sight of your dreams. And I know many of us think that representatives like Representatives Marshall Ige and David Ige, Oshiro and Takamine and Yonamine are just a bunch of hard heads, but actually we inherited those traits.

"Even with all the accolades heaped upon Sensei here in Hawaii, nationally, and in Okinawa, he remains humble and grateful to those who appreciate his art and his teaching. As he says, 'Gujihi aruyini hana minmu shidi umanchu nu nasaki chiji ni kamira,' which is Uchinaguchi or Okinawan language and translates to --'Because of your support, my music has blossomed and bore fruit. Your compassion and tolerance are much treasured.'

"Sensei Nakasone is indeed one of Hawaii's living treasures whose gifts should be seen as rare and unique as the alala bird or the silversword of Haleakala. What will happen when Sensei is no longer able to teach? Will there be others of equal determination and commitment to carry the torch?

"Mr. Speaker, I've placed a great deal of effort encouraging my daughters to take lessons in either hula or Okinawan dance. It seems, however, they're more interested in doing the 'electric slide' or playing the latest game on their nintendo. Ironically, Dr. Thornburg sees the nintendo as the precursor for a pocket P.C. which every student in the future will carry, and thus eliminating the need for books and pencil. No doubt it is important to prepare our children for their future, but it is just as important to honor the stewards of our ethnic identity and cultural history who nuture our roots to the past.

"And so, Mr. Speaker, it is with a great deal of pride that I introduce to you one of those people -- those special people -- Sensei Harry Nakasone."

The honoree, Sensei Harry Nakasone, then rose to be recognized.

Accompanying Sensei Nakasone on the House floor were his daughter, Janet Ito, and Mr. Wendell Silva, Executive Director of the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts, who also rose to be recognized.

"Seated in the gallery and asked to stand to be recognized was another daughter, Karen Nakasone.

At this time, Representative Arakaki presented Mr. Nakasone with a Certificate of Recognition, and floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Hashimoto, D. Ige and Duldulao.

At 12:05 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:11 o'clock p.m., the Vice Speaker assumed the rostrum.

Representative Stegmaier rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker and fellow colleagues, you've heard from the resolution about the accomplishments of this remarkable nurse but let me tell you some things that weren't mentioned in the resolution about Elizabeth Olita.

"Liz was born in the Philippines as the second eldest of a family of eight children. She and her family came to Hawaii in 1979. She graduated from Campbell High School in 1981. Nevertheless, because of her large family and the high cost of living in Hawaii, she knew that financing a college education and realizing her dream to someday become a nurse would take hard work and perseverance. To this end, she first became a certified nurse's aide at Kaiser Hospital when Kaiser's medical facility was where the Hawaii Prince Hotel stands today. Sacrificing much of a social life, Liz worked full time on the weekends and part-time during weekdays. She pursued her goal one step at a time. First, she became a licensed practical nurse, then a registered nurse after she earned her associate degree. In 1990, she received her Bachelor of Science in nursing with distinction. Now, as stated in the resolution, she is pursuing a graduate degree in nursing. Other than an academic/financial scholarship which Kuakini Medical Center awarded her in 1988, she did not have any financial assistance from any other source throughout her college education.

"Mr. Speaker and fellow colleagues, Elizabeth is not only a shining example of the excellent nurses that can be found in our State, but a shining example for our young people, an example that says, if you want to become something, if you want to do something for society, you can do it -- taking your life seriously, trying hard and never giving up.

"I know that this is a message we, as legislators, wish very much to communicate to our young people. It is the underlying message in several of our educational initiatives, yet anything we do as legislators don't have the weight or the impact that a personal messenger can transmit. That personal messenger is Elizabeth Mier Olita, the 1992 Hawaii recipient of the American Nurses Association's Search for Excellence Award, whose inspirational record of accomplishment is all the more remarkable because she has always kept her grace, her beauty, and sensitivity towards others.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Fukunaga then rose and proceeded to introduce the honoree, stating:

"I think, as we look about us and see where the legislative institutions have come under fire in recent weeks, it is very inspiring to see what a young person who comes to this country can achieve, often against very great odds, by her own personal commitment to excellence through hard work and the value of a quality education.

"I would like to ask Elizabeth to please stand and be recognized at this time."

The honoree rose to be recognized.

Representative Fukunaga continued:

"What I would also like to add is that, oftentimes, we don't always recognize the people in our health care system who really do represent a commitment to excellence and whose hard work often goes unnoticed in the excitement of the delivery room or in the operating room, and it's not always focusing on the many things that the nursing profession has provided. "I would also like to recognize some of our guests this morning -- Judith Castillo, the Assistant Director of Nursing at, Kaiser Hospital; and Ann Cook who is President of the Hawaii Nurses Association.

"Through our recognition of these individuals and the nursing profession today, I think we also pay tribute to the way in which the nursing profession exemplifies the commitment to caring and to our community.

"I'd also like to introduce, very briefly, Mr. Speaker, a number of visitors that we have here with Elizabeth in the gallery."

Representative Fukunaga then asked the following guests to stand to be recognized: Nancy Smith, Executive Director of the Hawaii Nurses Association; Janet Smith, Public Relations Director at Kaiser Medical Center; Denise Chae and Nada Palan, co-workers of Elizabeth in the oncology unit.

At this time, Representative Fukunaga presented Miss Olita with a Certificate of Recognition, and floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Stegmaier, Okamura and Yonamine.

At this time, Representative Metcalf introduced to the members of the House Mr. Anders Thunborg, the Swedish Ambassador to the United States, stating:

"During the early 1960's, Ambassador Thunborg has served the needs of his country as a political leader as well as an ambassador to other countries. His accomplishments include serving as ambassador at large and special advisor with the position as Under Secretary of State at the Ministry for Foreign Affairs, Minister for Defense, Ambassador and Personal Representative of Sweden to the United Nations in New York.

"At the United Nations, he was Chairman of the United Nations Trust Fund for Southern Africa and served as Vice President of the United Nations General Assembly.

"Ambassador Thunborg has served as the Swedish Ambassador to such nations as the former U.S.S.R. and Mongolia. He is presently serving as Ambassador to the United States.

"Mr. Speaker and fellow colleagues, I take great pleasure in introducing Ambassador Anders Thunborg, the Swedish Ambassador to the United States."

Representative Metcalf asked Ambassador Thunborg to stand to be recognized.

Accompanying the Ambassador was his lovely wife, Ingalill, and Mr. James Cribley, the Honorary Swedish Consul in Hawaii, who then rose to be recognized.

Representative Metcalf presented Ambassador Thunborg with a Certificate of Recognition, and floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Hirono, Hagino and Baker.

At this time, Ambassador Thunborg addressed the members of the House and audience, stating:

"Thank you so much, Mr. Speaker.

"I feel very honored to be here today. I have been in the Swedish Parliament for quite a long time so I know how it is to be in a Parliamentary Building so I feel also a little bit at home with you here today.

"The changes in Europe nowadays is almost tremendous because of two things -- the unification of Europe through the European community, and the aftermath of what has happened in the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe during the last three, four, five years.

"My wife and I, we were fortunate to be in Moscow during that particular time, and I can assure you that to see how this empire was changing was something spectacular. I don't think I will witness anything like that again. And because of that, you have a lot of changes in Europe -- the unification of Germany, the new states --Czechoslovakia, Poland, Hungary -- and all the developments in what was the former Soviet Union. It will take a long time before all this dust has settled. Many people, they think that they can do it overnight. I'm sure you can't do it overnight; you can't establish democracy, a market economy, and a pluralistic society very quickly. It must take a longer time. And let us keep our fingers crossed that they, one day, will achieve what they are trying to do.

"Also, my own country's position is changing. Neutrality -- Sweden has been neutral between NATO and the Warsaw Pact for a very long time. Now, the situation is different and the former neutral countries of Europe --Austria, Finland and Sweden, and perhaps in the longer run, Switzerland -- we are asking for membership of the European community. And I really hope that we now can see a peaceful Europe in the years to come. You know, for many hundreds of years, almost all world wars - yes, all world wars -- had emanated from Europe, and the rivalry between Germany, France, England and Russia. Now, for the first time, I think we have the possibility to see a peaceful Europe which should also be open to the rest of the world. With Sweden as a member of the European community, it shall really work for free trade which I think is so important.

"Take care of these islands. What I have seen during my few days here, you are close to Paradise, environmentally and in other respects. I think you have a great responsibility for coming generations and also for other people in the world who would very much like to come back again.

"Thank you so much, Mr. Speaker, and good luck in your difficult work. We need good politicians nowadays. Many are frustrated, but we will always have politicians. Let us try to have good politicians.

"Thank you so much."

Representative Hirono rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"This bill has had a very long gestation period. Representative Hiraki and I introduced this measure about four years ago because of problems and criticisms with the existing sales to owner/occupants provisions; for example, prospective purchasers were literally hiring others to stand in line for them. The affidavits that we required for owner/occupancy were mainly ignored because we had no idea whether buyers were actually living in those units once they were purchased.

"The topper was of course the Waikele situation this year where over one thousand people camped out overnight to buy one of 216 affordable townhouse units.

As that developer, JPS Hawaii, Inc. had said, if this bill becomes law, they would probably go with the lottery for their next project which is a 700-unit affordable project on Kauai, and JPS noted that a lottery opposed the dignity of the people. With the passage of this measure, we are hardly in agreement with that sentiment.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 664, HD 2, SD 1, CD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SALES TO OWNER-OCCUPANTS," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 47 ayes, with Representatives Amaral, Fukunaga, Tajiri and Tam being excused.

And, at this point, although this is a study for the establishment of a department on housing, the issue will come before us as to whether a department of the ocean versus a department of the housing would better serve the public, and I just want to bring to the attention of the members, whatever the study reveals, we still will have to face that question since we're going to be limited by the Constitution in the number of departments that we will be able to establish.

I think this is a step forward where we have a problem with our economy, not enough money to go around, but a lot of people that are willing to step forward and to help, and this is the first step.

"I would strongly hope that the community be involved in this and that it not just be handled at the top level again at the Department of Education, but that we again go back to the community to say -- you help us say how we can best allow you to help adopt a school and help in your neighborhood.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Ula Schweer-Skrivanek, "who has spent three years in Hawaii as a Fullbright Scholar, fell in love with the islands and now brings back every year a group of high school students to see what life in school is like in Hawaii. Thank you for visiting with us."

Specifically, Johnston Island remains a chemical weapons disposal furnace right in our backyard. And those of you who go to Micronesia, that's one of your first stops along the way which I had the pleasure of recently.

"This resolution puts Hawaii in the communications loop so we know of any and all activities going on in Johnston Island which is, in its Hawaiian term, Kalama Island.

"This resolution also is a unique and unprecedented way of asking all of us in the Legislature to be informed of all chemical events. This is unusual in that usually resolutions say, inform the Governor, or inform the Legislature. This one specifies that each and everyone of us here will be informed of that. I think that's a point of showing how important that this issue is in Johnston Island. It also shows that this is a macro-umbrella for the environmental protection of Hawaii, and I think that each of us will then be able to know and act accordingly.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

"I think that's unfair to small businesses who can't afford to pay union wages, and we also must realize that small businesses are not the ones, when the downturn of the economy comes, that are going to collect the large unemployment benefits which these large businesses, particularly construction businesses, are going to do. So with those reservations, my no vote, as a small businessman, is definitely no."

ANNOUNCEMENTS

At this time, Representative O'Kieffe was permitted to make a late introduction and he introduced Mayor Linda Lingle from Maui, who was seated in the gallery.

Representative O'Kieffe then stated:

"Mr. Speaker, in the mail, you will have received a form letter from Hawaii Prepatory Academy on the Big Island in Waimea and it's addressed to: 'Dear Legislator...' and invites you to participate in funding their solar car for competition. The form has your name on it, and it says: 'If we do not hear from you by May 1, 1992, we will assume your approval. We want to make this event satisfying to you as a supporter, as well as to the team and the school, and you will then have an opportunity to contribute. ...' and they're putting out this brochure without your approval if you don't do something about this. But you'll have the opportunity to be a friend if you donate between one dollar and ninety-nine dollars.

At this point, the Chair interrupted and stated:

"Representative O'Kieffe, the Chair has allowed you to make your point and while we all appreciate that each of us received numerous requests, it may not be appropriate to solicit funds on the floor of the House. I've allowed you to...

Representative O'Kieffe interrupted and stated:

"I'm not. I checked this with Speaker Kihano beforehand."

The Chair answered:

"The Chair is going to use his discretion as a matter of precedence so that all members don't feel that they need equal time on certain letters that they get requesting....

Representative O'Kieffe interrupted:

"It's a warning, Mr. Speaker. I'm sending a very strong letter to them. . .

The Chair then said:

"I'll allow you to continue if you make your point quickly."

Representative O'Kieffe thanked the Chair and continued:

"It has your name on it. If they do not hear from you by May 1, 1992, they are going to assume you are supporting it and they ask to put in their caveat and they say, this is not an ultimatum, merely an attempt to give us time to properly prepare our brochure.

"I am writing a very strong letter, talking to the ethics and the presumptiousness of this form letter.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

"The Chair then said:

"We appreciate the warning. Next time, I would appreciate it if you would let the Chair know what it is -on the nature of those kinds of announcements."

Representative Isbell then rose and requested waiver of the 48-hour notice requirement for Conference Committee meeting today at 3:00 p.m., to hear House Bills 2719, regarding the homeless program; 2400, mortgage insurance for housing; and 1346, affordable housing, "because we did not get a list of the Senate conferees until yesterday," and the Chair "so ordered."

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair then stated:

"The Chair would like to apologize to Representative O'Kieffe for not understanding his plight, but you could have made it a little shorter and to the point."

Representative Souki: "Your conferences on the budget wish to announce a change in time from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. this evening, and we will be going through the conference right through the weekend."

Ige and Peters being excused.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 3039, HD 1, SD 1, was taken from the Clerk's desk.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the House agreed to the amendments proposed by the Senate to H.B. No. 3039, HD 1, and H.B. No. 3039, HD 1, SD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE DESIGN PROFESSIONAL CONCILIATION PANEL," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 48 ayes, with Representatives Bellinger, M. Ige and Peters being excused.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 3041, HD 1, SD 1, was taken from the Clerk's desk.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the House agreed to the amendments proposed by the Senate to H.B. No. 3041, HD 1, and H.B. No. 3041, HD 1, SD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAIIAN HOMES COMMISSION ACT, 1920, AS AMENDED," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 48 ayes, with Representatives Bellinger, M. Ige and Peters being excused.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 3051, SD 1, was taken from the Clerk's desk.

Representative Arakaki moved that the House agree to the amendments proposed by the Senate to H.B. No. 3051, and H.B. No. 3051, SD 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"I wish to speak with reservations on House Bill 3051 because the penalties under this bill are clearly excessively lethal.

"Thank you."

Representative Thielen then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"The civil and criminal penalties in Chapter 396, Hawaii Revised Statutes, apply to all employers, including the State and the agencies thereof. And the reason this is important is because of the serious problem that we have in our school system and where there may or hereto have been identified violations of the Hawaii OSHA law. The employer under our State law means the State and every State agency. The Department of Education, being the State agency responsible for the operation of the schools, would be liable for violations of the Hawaii OSHA --Occupational Safety and Health -- law. State employees are shielded from civil liability pursuant to a certain section which states that if the employee was acting within her or his scope of the employee's office, then they are shielded from liability.

"However, criminal penalties under this bill and under Section 396-10(g) apply to any employer who willfully or repeatedly violates any standard rule, regulation, citation, or order issued pursuant to Chapter 396. There is no provision specifically shielding our State employees from criminal liability in this provision. Since this provision requires willful or repeated violation and it applies to the employer, the employer defined as the State in every State agency, the head of the State agency -- the Department of Education -- given notice of the violation would most likely be subject to criminal culpability. This may be a way that we can have our schools repaired.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the House agreed to the amendments proposed by the Senate to H.B. No. 3051, and H.B. No. 3100, HD 2, SD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING DEVELOPMENT," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 48 ayes, with Representatives Bellinger, M. By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 3107, SD 2, was taken from the Clerk's desk.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the House agreed to the amendments proposed by the Senate to H.B. No. 3107, and H.B. No. 3107, SD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GENERAL EXCISE TAX EXEMPTIONS FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 48 ayes, with Representatives Bellinger, M. Ige and Peters being excused.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 3111, HD 2, SD 2, was taken from the Clerk's desk.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the House agreed to the amendments proposed by the Senate to H.B. No. 3111, HD 2, and H.B. No. 3111, HD 2, SD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GIFTS," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading by a vote of 48 ayes, with Representatives Bellinger, M. Ige and Peters being excused.

By unanimous consent, H.B. No. 3148, HD 2, SD 2, was taken from the Clerk's desk.

Representative Arakaki moved that the House agree to the amendments proposed by the Senate to H.B. No. 3148, HD 2, and H.B. No. 3148, HD 2, SD 2, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Tam rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"This bill establishes within the Office of the Governor, the Office of International Affairs by law. My objection to this bill is the manner in the hiring of the staff without regard to Chapters 76 and 77, the civil service law and compensation law, respectively.

"The purpose of Chapter 76 is to establish in the State and each of the counties, a system of personnel administration based on merit, principles, and scientific methods governing the classification of positions and employment, conduct, movement, and separation of public employee, and to build a career service in government which will attract, select, and retain the best of our citizens on merit and free from political influence.

"Chapter 77 is to establish a sound statewide system under which it will be possible to attract and retain competent persons for government service, to establish and maintain a high level of efficiency of employees, and to adequately and fairly compensate them for the work they do in comparison to similar job descriptions of other State employees.

"My concerns are:

- (1) Is it right to establish by law a permanent Office of International Affairs without regard to Chapters 76 and 77 of the State laws when we insist upon it in other State agencies?
- (2) Do we, as lawmakers, want to be the cause of further low morale, productivity and efficiency due to unfairness caused by political favoritism as seen by other State employees?

"Mr. Speaker, I wish to also add that I have experienced problems in my community in regards to this Office of International Affairs. My community has taken a stand where we do not want empire building. I am talking in regards to the Marks Estate. Previously, we had dialogue with the Office of International Affairs, stating that we would come to mutual agreement for the best use of the Marks Estate. After our meeting, I wrote a letter, a courteous letter, to Mufi Hannemann, director for that office. His response was that we did not come to any agreement and there will be no more further communications and therefore, it is hard to believe that we can trust such an office without foreseeing in the future that it will not be empire State building.

"Thank you."

Representative Thielen then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Welcome to the international State of Hawaii. I think it is morally and fiscally irresponsible and reprehensible for us to establish an Office of International Affairs where we again don't even have the textbooks that we can provide for our school children to teach them about foreign countries.

"Where are our priorities? We have no business setting forth on an international agenda until we address the serious needs that we have right in our State. There was a demonstration that we were unable to attend over on the lawn of the State Capitol by the human service recipients and providers. They need our help. They need our help in Hawaii, they need our help in your hometown area, they need our help throughout the State. We have no business becoming an international state where we cannot even provide for those desperate and serious needs at home.

"Go ask your school children -- do they have books to teach them about the emerging nations and what used to be the Soviet Union? Do they have textbooks? Do they have maps? Do they have information? Go see if your teachers all have enough books to go around for their students. You're going to find that your answer is 'no.'

"And what business does this body have in setting forth on an international agenda. I strongly vote against establishing an Office of International Affairs.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At 1:27 o'clock p.m., Representative O'Kieffe asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:28 o'clock p.m.

Representative Arakaki then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I just want to point out to Representative Thielen that a couple of days ago, I asked you to sign a letter that we were going to send to Congress asking them to consider breaking down the wall between budget expenditures, especially between the military and other domestic programs, and you refused to sign the letter. I think what you say on the floor here today applies not only for the State, but it especially should apply nationally as well because I agree with you -- we need to look at the human needs of our people. A lot of those programs are also generated because of the philosophy that comes from the top at our national government because we spend so much of our resources on our military and international programs, but yet you refused to sign that letter. "I have concerns about those people out there too because it makes a statement about where our priorities are, and I agree that we need to look at our human needs first. But I don't think there's any denying that this is a global village, and I hope that we can achieve balance in looking at all of these different, sometimes conflicting, measures. I hope we look at the total perspective, not only here for the State, but nationally as well.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in defense of my colleague as well as in favor of the bill.

"Firstly, I, too, did not sign that letter because Representative, I don't believe it's time that we lay down our arms and pound our rifles in the plowshares yet. And to do a knee jerk reaction of turning the military into food supplies and books and textbooks, I think, is foolhardy. Your lessons in history say that that's the defense of my colleague who I know has not been able to defend herself.

"However, may I speak in favor of the bill and against my colleague?

"Mr. Speaker, because we are Hawaii, all of our relations are international relations. I think we've got to get very clear on that -- all of our relations are international relations. Not having this office is like having a beach and having no lifeguard stand on that beach. We not only live by the resources of other people, our basic lifestyle, our cultures, our essence of Hawaii, is international in its origin, not to mention the capital that we live on and the visitors that bring us that capital.

"I think we have to straighten the misconception that the hiring exemptions are reason to exempt or to knock this bill out. I would contend that poor or mediocre employees in this office would be worse than if we had no Office of International Relations at all.

"And secondly, we have to get away from the notion that this is a Mufi bill. This is not a Mufi Hannemann bill. This is a bill to set up an Office of International Relations. It's just like saying that those people who traveled first class are the issue. The issue is the policy of traveling first class, not the particular individuals.

"My point, Mr. Speaker, is this. We need this office and I make you this promise. If it doesn't generate ten dollars for every one dollar we're going to invest in it, I will personally send each of you first class to Kahoolawe.

"Thank you."

Representative Thielen, in rebuttal, stated:

"I would like to respond to my two distinguished colleagues.

"When I was a small child, during World War II, my mother drove us in the car with a supply of water, a supply of food, blankets and other necessities in the trunk of the car. She was a single parent and people were scared during that time. I know because the stories have been told to me.

"When the war ended, people felt that the war had ended wars forever. We have learned, through sad experience, that this is not correct, and I follow the words of Theodore Roosevelt where he said: "Speak softly and carry a big stick.' That big stick made a huge difference during the Gulf War and you all remember last year when

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i introduced a resolution commending the brave women and men who were in that conflict, and we all acknowledged and honored them here. I hope that was the last conflict. I hope it was, but I am not prepared to sign away our ability to stay prepared -- to stay prepared as the defenders of democracy in the world.

"Again, speaking to my distinguished colleague to my left, I also believe that our priorities belong where those people on the State Capitol lawn were saying they needed to be here at home, here helping our people of Hawaii, not establishing an international office.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative O'Kieffe then rose on a point of clarification and asked:

"In floor debate, is it permissible to refer to a Representative by name?"

The Chair answered:

"Depends on what the context is."

Representative O'Kieffe continued:

"The point, Mr. Speaker, is I believe my opposite on the other side of the aisle was out of order referring to Representative Thielen by name in his debate on signing the measure."

The Chair answered:

"That is a reason for a point of personal privilege, and certainly Representative Thielen would have been within her rights if she had risen to that point."

Representative Thielen then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, then rising to that point of personal privilege, I would just say that I strongly welcome debate on the floor of the House. I am encouraged when it happens and I can take the debate on the other side where it appears to be aimed at me -- that's fine. I will respond but I think it's in the true sense of democracy that we are able to debate on this floor, and I appreciate that opportunity. My colleague and I disagree. I believe my colleague and I can remain friends in spite of the disagreement because we disagree on the issue, not as to the personal aspect of our respect for each other as colleagues.

"Thank you."

Representative Lee then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"I would like to ask, first of all, that my remarks in support of this bill that I made on March 3rd be entered in the Journal.

"The second point I would like to make is that we have before us an agreement to the Senate amendment, and one of the Senate amendments is to change the positions of the office staff from exempt to non-exempt, subject to Chapters 76 and 77. So I believe the remarks made by the distinguished Representative from Nuuanu are moot.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lee's remarks are as follows:

"I believe it's very essential that we place everything we do and everything we discuss in a context. President Bush has been criticized for devoting too much attention and providing too much aid abroad, and he has good reason to be criticized, not only by the public at large, by the Democratic Party, by even his own close supporters, including Mr. Buchanan.

"The point is that, not that he has done so well overseas, but he has done so poorly at home. And he has done poorly at home because instead of taxing and spending, he and President Reagan have been borrowing, borrowing and spending.

"The point that I am about to bring about is that the situation in Hawaii is utterly, utterly different from that at the national level. The point is that we have consistently managed our economy to produce the necessary revenues to fund all the necessary expenditures we need to do, the investment we need to do in transportation, in harbors, in schools, in health, and we have turned out to be an innovator -- a model -- for all the other states because we have been able to invest, to put our money where our mouth is. And that is what the Office of International Relations is all about.

"Our industry, our primary industry, is tourism. The Governor led a delegation immediately after the beginning of the Gulf War to talk to the Japanese, to present Hawaii as their most desirable attraction, not in terms of tourist attraction, but also the cultural and historic pride which binds Hawaii and Japan. And so it is with other countries throughout Asia -- Taiwan, Korea, Kwang Tung Province, the Philippines -- and let us not forget the Azores or Madeira from whom we had so many people whose descendants have distinguished themselves in all fields of endeavor in Hawaii.

"So, the Office of International Relations is an investment in economics, in culture, and in our historic exchanges between the different peoples which mark our origins in Hawaii and which set us so much far apart from everyone else, and which I may remind you, has brought about a consensual society that has emphasized saving and investment rather than consumption, rather than borrowing, borrowing, and spending and spending, which has been the hallmark of the last ten years. We do not have a debt that approaches four trillion dollars -- mind you, four trillion dollars! And that has brought us a lot of grief. It made the dollar so cheap that the Japanese were able to buy up a lot of property. We were at the mercy of those people in Washington.

"The Office of International Relations will help us prepare ourselves for the 21st century, and the man selected is one who commands great attention and not only that, may I remind you that Ms. Carolyn Sapp who described herself as a Republican has said as her career goal -- to be the director of this office. That, I assure you, is a testimony that I value a great deal. Here's a woman who best represents Hawaii, including our Republican friends as well as the diverse origins which she herself has described -- her Filipino grandparents in Kalihi, her mainland family, her immediate family in Kona -- and that, ladies and gentlemen, is what the Office of International Relations is all about, so I urge all of you to vote for it, vote for the future, invest in the future.

"Thank you."

Representative Tam then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, if I may read the bill itself, just the part that I am referring to.

"On page 3, line 7, it says: 'The director, without regard to Chapters 76 and 77, may retain such a staff as may be necessary for the purpose of this chapter and may set the salary levels for the same.'

"I rest my case in regards to what I said previously -- it still holds.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Stegmaier then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I believe this bill would help to establish Hawaii as a greater player in the international arena and, therefore, the impact will be on our children. They will be able to stay in Hawaii and work here as they would want to and play a role as international citizens which I think Hawaii's children are especially destined to do.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Arakaki then rose to make a clarification, stating:

"I just want to point out to my counterpart on the other side -- I won't refer to his name -- that basically, Representative Thielen and I are in agreement about our concerns and I think I noted that. The only point I was trying to make is that things apply nationally as well as locally and that was the point I was trying to get to."

Representative O'Kieffe, in response, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, it is my understanding that in debate, the debate is focused on the speaker and not to people directly. Is that correct or is that incorrect?"

The Chair answered:

"That's why there's a provision for members to rise to a point of personal privilege if they feel that they have been personally aggrieved."

Representative O'Kieffe asked:

"Generally in debate, don't we focus our discussion on the Speaker's podium?"

The Chair answered:

"There is a provision. In case a member feels that he/she has been aggrieved. . .

At this point, Representative Souki interrupted and asked for a recess, and at 1:38 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:40 o'clock p.m.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the House agreed to the amendments proposed by the Senate to H.B. No. 3148, HD 2, and H.B. The structure and setting of this Heiau and Kukuipahu as well provide insight and to the spirituality of the Hawaiian people, the profound appreciation of natural beauty and the essential role of worship in their life activity. "The designation of these sites as the Kohala Historical Site State Monument enhances and preserves the legacy and legends of Kamehameha and the people of Kohala.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Amaral then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I would be remiss if I did not note on this occasion, for the record, that the passage of this bill actually marks the significant work of a very special person, and it was the former Lieutenant Governor Jean King, in her role as senator, who first initiated the proposal to save the birthplace of Kamehameha and to preserve Mookini Heiau. I just wanted that noted today.

"Thank you."

Representative Anderson then rose and stated:

"I would also like to make sure that people know that Mr. Fred Cachola of Kamehameha Schools was very, very instrumental in that. Since we have Representative Cachola here, I want him to know that he was there before us. Being that it's his cousin, Mr. Cachola was very, very instrumental, and I would like to congratulate him also."

"Mr. Speaker, while we're adding names into the record, I would like to add the work of the community who worked very hard on this, but especially the work of the Kahunanui of the Mookini Heiau, Momi Lum.

"Thank you."

People want to come here, and if people want to come here to visit, or come here to learn, or come here to get healthy, this is one where they come here to learn how to fly, not necessarily first class, but they come here to learn how to fly. We know that this is a desirable destination, this is a desirable educational project, and it is a joint venture of the private sector.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Aty 12:15 o'clock p.m., Representative Apo asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:16 o'clock p.m.

Representative Bainum's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of this resolution, H.R. 386, requesting the City and County of Honolulu to consider including a storm water quality sampling station in Waikiki.

"Subsequent to the favorable reports on both these resolutions by our House Committee on Intergovernmental Relations, I have learned that a sixth storm water outfall in Mililani has been added to the five mentioned in the resolution. The additional Mililani storm water outfall was included apparently as a result of a three-year study conducted by the U.S. Geological Survey, with State and County participation, which indicated that storm waters in that area could be polluted.

"Strangely, the State Department of Health (DOH) maintains that storm water monitoring in Waikiki is much more 'difficult' than the six less heavily developed areas now in the program.

"Apparently, the six storm water monitoring stations now selected by DOH and the City and County complete the list of stations to be monitored under the Phase One permit application by the City and County to the DOH.

"Presently, intensive water quality investigations, both in dry and wet weather and with storm water, are adequately being conducted by the Department of Land and Natural Resources and the Ala Wai Task Force throughout the Manoa, Palolo and Ala Wai Canal watershed. Except for an intensive study of the water quality at the Kapahulu storm drain and its tributaries, the other storm drains on the Waikiki Beach waterfront are conspicuously lacking in attention.

"It is the purpose of this resolution to call the attention of the City and County of Honolulu to the importance of monitoring at least one additional storm water station in Waikiki. Waikiki is too important to our State's economy to not utilize every opportunity to monitor and enhance the waters in and around this vital area.

"I urge support of this resolution.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. No. 386, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE CITY AND COUNTY OF HONOLULU TO CONSIDER INCLUDING A STORM WATER QUALITY SAMPLING STATION IN WAIKIKI FOR ITS NATIONAL POLLUTANT DISCHARGE ELIMINATION SYSTEM PROGRAM," was adopted.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.R. No. 273, HD 1, "HOUSE RESOLUTION URGING THE entitled: MAYOR OF EACH COUNTY TO WORK WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF HAWAIIAN HOME LANDS, HAWAIIAN NATIVE COMMUNITY REPRESENTATIVES, AND COMMUNITY PLANNERS TO **ESTABLISH** INTERIM DEVELOPMENT STANDARDS STANDARDS TO ENCOURAGE SETTLEMENT OF HAWAIIAN ENCOURAGE THE EARLY HOME LANDS HOUSING ESTATES," was adopted.

At this time, Representative Anderson rose on a point of clarification and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, it has come to my attention after researching that we have a possible problem with an Act that we've already done on Senate Bill 1719. . .

At this point, Representative Arakaki rose and asked for a recess, and at 12:20 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:21 o'clock p.m., Representative Anderson was recognized and he stated:

"Again, I bring this up because it is unfinished business.

"Very briefly, Mr. Speaker, I made copies for everyone. I think that we have gone along with the law, as far as having hearings and the whole bit, on the development agreement between the City and the State. However, Mr. Speaker, according to the bill, it says that the law requires the Legislature -- it says, '. . . shall approve or disapprove this agreement.' That's what I have and I had a Minority attorney's decision on this and since I have that, I would like to know if I could call a recess and we could look at it, and I don't want to see the Legislature at any time, because we don't do something that could be pertaining to law, go into litigation and the project could be held up. That's my reason for standing, Mr. Speaker."

At 12:22 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:40 o'clock p.m., Representative Thompson was permitted a late introduction and he introduced to the members of the House students in the English as a Second Language Class from Farrington High School, as follows: Freddie Castro, Junald Tangonan, Moises Duldulao, George Velasco, Maria Cristina Quibuyen, Leonarita Quilana, Lucrina Peralta, Elizabeth Consolacion and Mary Jane from the Philippines; Agngarayngay Deng Douangphouxay from Laos; and Tuyen Le from Vietnam. They were accompanied by their teacher, Ms. Donna Adams.

Representative Bainum then rose and moved to disagree to the developmental agreement pursuant to Acts 183 and 184 of November 15, 1991 between the State of Hawaii and the City and County of Honolulu.

The Chair then said:

"I am not recognizing any motion at this time. I recognize Representative Paul Oshiro to respond to Representative Anderson."

Representative Oshiro then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. If I may add some words in response.

"Mr. Speaker, in the financial plan in 1990 that was developed by this Legislature which authorized the City to enact ordinances to finance the construction of a fixed rail rapid transit system was a very comprehensive one, first off, which blended the use of State, Federal and County dollars along with State tax credits, a possible surcharge, and private source revenues. In order to ensure that the City adhered to the intent and purpose of that legislation, the 1990 Legislature incorporated a provision allowing the 1992 Legislature the authority to veto the City/State Transit Development Agreement. This veto provision, Mr. Speaker, which is contained in Sections 11 and 13 of Act 184 (1990) and in Section 2.5 of Act 183, is just that, Mr. Speaker -- a veto provision. It is clearly stated as such.

"The Act does not say, Mr. Speaker, nor does it imply that the Transit Development Agreement must be approved by the 1992 Legislature. It is, in as pure a form as can be written into a bill, a provision for veto.

"Earlier this session, Mr. Speaker, your Committees on Transportation, Intergovernmental Relations and International Affairs, and Finance held extensive briefings along with a public hearing to closely review the City's procurement and selection procedures as well as the City's compliance with the provisions of these two Acts that the 1990 Legislature authorized.

"It was found, Mr. Speaker, following this review that the City did, in fact, comply with the intent and purpose of the legislative authorization granted in 1990, and that a veto of such was not warranted.

"Thank you."

The Chair then said:

"I think we wanted a response to Representative Anderson. I will cut the discussion at this point. We can't solve this problem today and I think the definition of that particular act of the law was given in response by the Committee Chairman, Representative Paul Oshiro."

Representative Anderson then rose and stated:

"I guess the answer to my question. . .it was not really my intent to have anyone approve or disapprove, or to go ahead and come out and debate. My main reason for today was because of the possibility of litigation. I think that we have brought it before the group. If you want to caucus on it in your caucuses, I think that's fine. But at least it was brought before the group and it's in the Journal, and I don't think that we would have to worry henceforth with other types of litigation.

"Thank you."

Representative Thielen then rose and noted:

"The Legislature cannot disapprove or approve it unless it is brought to the body as a whole, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair responded:

"It is a matter of opinion, Representative Thielen."

FIFTY-SEVENTH DAY

Wednesday, April 22, 1992

The House of Representatives of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, convened at 11:48 o'clock a.m., with the Vice Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Bishop Terence Miyahana of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, Kaneohe 3rd Ward, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Hagino, Horita, Isbell, Kihano, Matcalf and Souki, who were excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Fifty-Sixth Day.

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded by Representative O'Kieffe and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Fifty-Sixth Day was approved.

SENATE COMMUNICATION

Sen. Com. No. 726, informing the House that the President has added Senator Blair as a Co-Chairman on the conference of House Bill 602, HD 2, SD 1, on April 21, 1992, was read by the Clerk and placed on file.

At this time, the following introductions were made to the members of the House:

Representative Tom introduced Mr. Herb Coleman, stating:

"It really gives me great pleasure to introduce a gentleman behind of me with the lei. We all know him, love him -- Herb Coleman. I would like to talk a little about him. . .he is the recipient of a very, very coveted award, and I am just very honored to be able to stand and talk about him.

"Currently, he is secretary, as you know, of the Founders' Group Kokua Council and Senior Citizens, and also the legislative chairperson for the State National Association of Retired Persons. But that's not all. Herb has worked and lived in Hawaii for the past fifty years -fifty years after having first arrived in Hawaii as a Shipyard worker at Pearl Harbor in 1942. He got married, he got a degree from the University of Hawaii, and after retiring Herb embarked on a career of compassion and involvement, serving as a tireless advocate for elders in a variety of roles, and in a multitude of positions on countless committees, boards and panels. Herb has crusaded, and he's a real crusader, as a selfless advocate and has been described by legislators, I know, and others in government, as a master lobbyist for a broad range of legislation that benefit elders, including long-term care health insurance, tax relief for the payment of medical bills and nursing homes, prevention of spousal impoverishment, subsidies and credits for caregivers, innovative community care, expansion of Medicaid to home-bound patients, and automobile insurance. One thing I want to say is that I've had the opportunity this year to work with Herb on the long-term care insurance, and I tell you this man has so much commitment and so much aloha for the elders.

"Herb has been selected as one of ten 1992 recipients of the Thomas Jefferson Award sponsored in Hawaii by The Honolulu Advertiser, and nationally by the American Institute for Public Service, which gives well-deserved recognition to persons like Mr. Coleman.

"At this time, it is indeed a pleasure for me to introduce Herb Coleman and wish him the best of luck in his national endeavors."

Mr. Herb Coleman then rose to be recognized.

Representative Amaral then introduced Mr. Kelly Reece, "a friend of mine, and a hardworker in the community of Makakilo."

At 11:55 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:10 o'clock p.m., Representative Santiago introduced Mr. B.G. Vinigas, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, yesterday I had the very distinct pleasure of being involved with this youth direction seminar that was put on by the Boys and Girls Club of Honolulu. The seminar was run by Mr. B.G. Vinigas. Mr. Vinigas is one of the founders of **Save Every Younger Youth Enterprise Society Say Yes, Incorporated**, and he serves as its Chief Executive Officer and Executive Director.

"Say Yes is a community-based organization, incorporated in 1968 in California. It focuses primarily on problems of youth in the South Central Los Angeles area. B.G. developed an alternative approach to the reduction of gang violence to address the problems of atrisk youngsters. In 1979, this program was funded and implemented in the Los Angeles Unified School District and now serves over two hundred schools.

"B.G. developed the first in-service training program for teachers and counselors in the Los Angeles Unified School District and taught this course over a two-year period. He has conducted lectures, workshops, in-service training sessions for numerous law enforcement agencies, and social and community organizations throughout the He is a member of the California Office of country. Criminal Justice; Planning, Gang Suppression Program; Gang Task Force of the South Central Youth Services Advisory Committee; the Inter-Agency Gang Task Force for Los Angeles County and the Crenshaw Church of He is known throughout the nation as the Christ. professional with unlimited expertise in an extensive knowledge of gang structure, their activities, habits, and graffiti. He is affectionately called the 'Godfather' of youth gangs. He possesses the ability to effectively relate to gang members, resolving many of their differences He works hand-in-hand with the youths, peacefully. schools, and law enforcement agencies to keep violence off school campuses.

"I must say that yesterday's seminar that I attended affected me. As a social worker working in the field, I always thought that I was in touch with what's going on around me. But only having been informed yesterday about the dangers of where we are today and where we may be in the future, it was pointed out that Hawaii is fifteen years ahead of where Los Angeles is today, and the focus of yesterday's seminar was on prevention. One of the messages that came through so effectively by Mr. Vinigas was that although we are doing a great job today, we need to be very careful about the devastating effects that should happen if we let our guard down. "It was an extremely pleasant, informative seminar and B.G. is a very dynamic speaker, and 1 did want to introduce him to the members today."

Representative Santiago then asked Mr. B.G. Vinigas to stand to be recognized.

Representative Arakaki then introduced Mr. David Nakata, Executive Director of the Boys and Girls Club of Honolulu, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I also had the pleasure to attend the seminar, at least parts of it, and I want to introduce a friend of mine who I have known for many years. We worked together to develop some youth programs, collaboratively for kids in the McCully/Moiliili area, and he also is the Executive Director of the Boys and Girls Club, I think one of the more successful programs we have here in Hawaii. And he has been asked several times why the program was so successful, and I know he has mentioned that it's basically because they have some very simple rules that they apply consistently and the kids have to follow, and their staff has always been the kind of caring people that, you know, they take the time to listen to what the kids have to say. And the program is so successful, it has expanded to your area -- out in Waianae -- as well as to Ewa Beach and pretty soon to Kaneohe. So I think success sort of breeds more success, and I want to recognize him. We do provide some assistance to the Boys and Girls Club to encourage them to develop more programs that, hopefully, will eliminate a destructive gang activities." lot of

Representative Arakaki then introduced Ms. Diane De Shambo, Administrative Assistant to the Speaker of the Idaho House of Representatives.

Representative Lee then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to announce and introduce to the House the winners, both individual and teams, as well as participants in the State Math Counts competition. The competition shows that we have good students and good teachers, both in the private schools and in the public schools. The Math Counts Program in Hawaii is sponsored by the Hawaii Society of Professional Engineers, Hawaiian Electric Company, and Aloha Airlines. About 250 students competed in this program throughout the State, and nationally as many as 7.4 million students do so. The State's final competition was held on March 14th at Kamehameha Schools.

"The winning teams were Punahou, Wheeler Intermediate, and Iolani.

"The individual winners were Justin Valdez from Iolani; second, Travis Ortogero from Punahou; and third, Alan Aspinwall, an eighth grader from Wheeler Intermediate School; and the last two -- Masters Ortogero and Aspinwall -- are residents of Mililani. They will go to Washington to compete in the national finals, and the prizes are substantial but probably the best prize is a trip to the NASA Space Facility in Cape Kennedy.

"Members of the House, it is my pleasure to introduce to you the individual winners, the teams, the coaches, and the relatives who make all of our young people develop into what they are today.

"Let me announce the individual winners first: Alan Aspinwall from Wheeler Intermediate; Hannah Okamura from Kaimuki Intermediate; Travis Ortogero from Punahou School and a resident of Mililani; Justin Valdez from Iolani School; and the coach of the Hawaii team and also the coach of the Punahou students and team, Mrs. Evelyn Cheong; Patricia Young, teacher and coach from Wheeler Intermediate School; Mrs. Jean Kurita, teacher and coach from Kaimuki Intermediate; Mr. Wilfred Ortogero, the proud father of Travis Ortogero; Mrs. JoAnn Valdez, the very proud mother of Justin Valdez; Mrs. Rowena Blaisdell who is the statewide Math Counts coordinator from Kamehameha Schools; and Mrs. Pauline Marcello, the assistant coordinator for the Math Counts."

The individual winners, coaches, parents, and coordinators all rose to be recognized.

There are some insurance carriers who refuse to pay for these medications such as cancer drugs for cancer patients if the label, as approved by the Federal Drug Administration, does not indicate that specific disease. "Fortunately, a bill was introduced during this session and negotiation took place between the Department of Health and the third-party payers that led to the resolving of the current problem that we have here in Hawaii, but this resolution broadens the picture and says, if additional problems arise in the future where an insurance carrier refuses to pay for a potentially life-saving medication, that the Department of Health and the providers will have a mechanism to address this situation.

"Unfortunately, the concurrent resolution fell through the crack, but I hope at least this resolution will send a strong message to the State insurance carriers and to all those involved in health care that we cannot let the cost of medication be our sole decision-maker when it comes to saving and protecting the lives of our citizens.

"I urge my colleagues to support this resolution.

"Thank you."

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Representative Anderson rose on a point of information and "possibly parliamentary procedure," saying:

"Mr. Speaker, the other day I had an inquiry on a particular Senate Bill, and I was given information that it wasn't needed, that we didn't need to vote, and I agreed on that, Mr. Speaker, primarily because there was an opinion from the attorney, there was one from the Attorney General, and also because of friends, Mr. Speaker.

"However, as of this morning, I was looking at our House Bill 2454, HD 1, SD 1, and the Senate, I find Mr. Speaker, has added the fixed rail transit system's development agreement in their bill and says that this will pass. If the commitment is that it's going to pass without us even knowing, it doesn't give us a chance to vote on it individually and I believe that this is wrong, Mr. Speaker. I believe that they have taken away the rights of each one of us to represent the people in our districts and our constituents...

At this point, Representative Arakaki interrupted and said:

"Mr. Speaker, I believe the speaker asked for information. . .

Representative Anderson then stated:

"That's what I'm going to get around to. And also, while I'm at it, Mr. Speaker, I did look up the rules and I looked up parliamentary procedure, and all it says is that rules and parliamentary procedure are to guide us so that we don't get carried away and take away the rights of people. And I believe that's what we're trying to do, Mr. Speaker, most of the time. And I believe that you have a right to ask us to stay within those points, but I don't think that rules and parliamentary procedure are to always stand up and cut us out of any kind of debate.

"In this particular case, Mr. Speaker, I wanted to know if on that particular bill, on pages 619 and 620, parliamentary-wise, if we can have that deleted from the Senate Bill and bring that development agreement plan to this floor if we really need that vote or just let it go, according to Acts 184 and 813, as stated by yourselves the last time."

The Chair responded:

"We have received the Attorney General's opinion on that particular question that you have been raising, Representative Anderson. We will forward the opinion to you and to your office. ..."

Representative Anderson retorted:

"No, sir. Mr. Speaker, I'm not asking for an opinion. I'm asking because it's in the budget. I'm asking, either we take it out of the budget, or I'm asking each one to vote entirely against the budget even though everybody's worked so hard on it. I don't think that this is fair to each of us as a legislator. I don't think it's fair to our constituents."

Representative Taniguchi rose and asked for a recess, and at 4:37 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

"I know you've been rather gracious this evening, allowing people to make comments on matters not before this House, and I would certainly appreciate a ruling from the Chair regarding any of those kinds of matters from here on."

"Thank you for your indulgence, Representative Peters. That's exactly correct. We're on Announcements at the present time and, Representative Thielen, you're out of order."

The people that work there should be able to handle the matters professionally and competently. We do not need to continue expanding that massive department. "Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Bellinger then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I wish to take issue with some of the comments the previous speaker just made in that I believe the Department of Transportation and its staff is very competent. They work very hard, and personally I resent the whole implication that they are a non-professional group and that they are not capable of doing their work. I find them to be very professional, very capable, and I believe that an additional position of this nature would be warranted for.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Thielen then rose to rebut, stating:

"I would like to thank my worthy colleague on the other side of the pillar for putting words in my mouth. I have not challenged the competency or professionalism of the people that work in the department. I feel that they should be competent and capable enough to handle the work without adding another deputy director.

"I do recognize that they have a great deal of work to do because of a matter upon which my worthy colleague and I disagree, and that is the sensitive routing of what is called either Danny's Highway, or H-3.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the Department of Transportation needs more people because it has the budget of most Third World countries. It has the responsibilities of taking the harbors and the highways and the airport into the 21st century.

"However, I think what my colleagues are attempting to say and I will add my voice to -- since 1986, government has been the growth industry in Hawaii. We have grown by 24 percent since 1986, so I think we should keep that in perspective. Even though they are doing a fine job, we, as government, have expanded by 24 percent just in the last five years.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Bellinger, in rebuttal, stated:

"In rebuttal to my colleague, Representative Thielen, in terms of the reference to H-3 as Danny's Highway or whatever, H-3 has been a project. . .has long been before the State. It's one that's had an awful lot of support. We've gone through the H-3 wars. Those in opposition to that highway have generated hundreds of millions of dollars in delays in cost and to suggest that the only reason that the. . .

At this point, Representative Thielen interrupted and said:

"Mr. Speaker, may I ask a question? Is H-3 in the bill before us? Mr. Speaker, I believe we're talking about a position. . .

The Chair stated:

"Representative Thielen, Representative Bellinger has the floor."

Representative Bellinger thanked the Chair and continued his remarks:

"And the suggestion that the reason that the department would be looking for an additional position simply because of the current disagreement over the routing of the H-3 in Halawa, I think we're trying to mix apples and oranges here.

"Thank you."

The Chair remarked:

"Let's hope they name that highway the Danny Kihano Highway, not just Danny."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the House agreed to the amendments proposed by the Senate to H.B. No. 1048, HD 2, and H.B. "This has been the first year that the Keiki Caucus was formed and we had quite an agenda before us. This bill is a Keiki Caucus bill, because to be able to see and to be able to hear is so basic and so fundamental that they're often taken for granted.

"You know that one of the reasons for poor performance in school, for inattention and for behavior problems are sometimes due because of vision and hearing problems. As I look around here in the chambers, I see that there are several of you here with glasses and I wonder if your vision problem was detected early in your childhood, perhaps in the school system.

"Well, we now have programs that use the technology to detect and identify hearing and vision problems in the schools and the growth of this program. . .this is doing more than screening which is what we had at our time when we were growing up. They had an E chart, and they also had perhaps the bell that they would ring, or they would whisper and see if you could hear. Well, this program does more than screening for vision and hearing deficiencies that reaches out to students, parents, teachers, physicians, and other professionals to conduct a public education program to conserve and prevent hearing and vision deficiencies.

"In this day and age, it seems to be popular to bash both people and agencies and I have to admit I have been guilty of that also. But this bill is evidence of collaboration and cooperation between two public agencies -- between the Department of Education for their speech pathologists, and the Department of Health for the audiologists. And we will all benefit from this because the children of public schools will have a fair start in their education.

"Thank you very much."

No. 228, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE GOVERNOR TO INSTITUTE APPROPRIATE LEGAL PROCEEDINGS AGAINST THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA AND TO SOLICIT A CONGRESSIONAL INVESTIGATION CONCERNING TRUST OBLIGATIONS OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA TO THE INHABITANTS OF HAWAII GENERALLY AND TO NATIVE HAWAIIANS PARTICULARLY," was adopted.

Representatives Isbell and Hagino, for the Committees on Housing and Water, Land Use, and Hawaiian Affairs, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1787-92) recommending that H.R. No. 348, as amended in HD 1, be adopted.

On motion by Representative Isbell, seconded by Representative Arakaki and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.R. No. 348, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE COMMITTEE ON HOUSING AND THE COMMITTEE ON WATER, LAND USE AND HAWAIIAN AFFAIRS OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES TO EXAMINE THE ISSUE OF THE USE OF THE PUBLIC LAND TRUST (CEDED LANDS) AND WHETHER IT SHOULD REMAIN IN LEASEHOLD FOR ALL USES, INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO RESIDENTIAL LEASEHOLD," was adopted.

Representative Hagino, for the Committee on Water, Land Use, and Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1788-92) recommending that S.C.R. No. 219, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, be adopted.

On motion by Representative Young, seconded by Representative Ihara and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.C.R. No. 219, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES TO PLAN FOR THE PURCHASE OF WAIPIO VALLEY, HAWAII, FOR LAND BANKING PURPOSES," was adopted.

At 2:48 o'clock p.m., the House of Representatives stood in recess until 3:00 o'clock p.m. to meet in Joint Session with the Senate, in accordance with S.C.R. No. 256 to appoint the Legislative Auditor, Director of Legislative Reference Bureau and the State Ombudsman.

JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the House of Representatives and the Senate, Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1992, was called to order at 3:13 o'clock p.m. by the Honorable Daniel J. Kihano, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

At this time, Representative Apo moved that Gerald Miyoshi be appointed Clerk of the Joint Session, seconded by Senator Chang and carried unanimously.

Speaker Kihano then announced that the purpose of the Joint Session is to appoint the Legislative Auditor, the Director of the Legislative Reference Bureau, and the Ombudsman for the State of Hawaii, pursuant to Article VII, Section 10, of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, Section 23G-1 and Section 96-2 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes, respectively.

Representative Taniguchi then nominated Marion Higa for the office of Legislative Auditor, for a term of eight years, commencing July 1, 1992; Samuel B.K. Chang for the office of Director of the Legislative Reference Bureau, for a term of six years, commencing July 1, 1992; and Yen L. Lew for the office of Ombudsman of the State of Hawaii, for a term of six years, commencing July 1, 1992, seconded by Senator Hagino.

Senator Hagino moved that the nominations be closed, seconded by Representative Taniguchi and carried.

Representative Taniguchi then moved that the House of Representatives of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii confirm the appointments of Marion M. Higa to the office of Legislative Auditor, Samuel B.K. Chang to the office of Director of Legislative Reference Bureau, and Yen L. Lew to the office of Ombudsman of the State of Hawaii, for the terms provided by law as set forth in S.C.R. No. 256, seconded by Representative Apo.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried by a vote of 47 ayes, with Representatives Fukunaga, Hagino, D. Ige and Tajiri being excused.

At this time, Senate President Richard Wong assumed the rostrum,

At 3:16 o'clock p.m., the Joint Session stood in recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The Joint Session reconvened at 3:17 o'clock p.m.

The President then called for a motion by the Senate to confirm the appointments of the Legislative Auditor, the Director of the Legislative Reference Bureau, and the Ombudsman of the State of Hawaii.

Senator Hagino moved that the Senate of the Sixteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii confirm the appointments of Marion M. Higa to the office of Legislative Auditor, Samuel B.K. Chang to the office of Director of Legislative Reference Bureau, and Yen L. Lew to the office of Ombudsman of the State of Hawaii, for the terms provided by law as set forth in S.C.R. No. 256, seconded by Senator Aki.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried by a vote of 21 ayes, with Senators Fernandes Salling, Koki, McMurdo and Nakasato being excused.

The ballots having been so cast, Marion M. Higa, Samuel B.K. Chang and Yen L. Lew were declared unanimously elected Legislative Auditor, Director of the Legislative Reference Bureau, and State Ombudsman, respectively.

At this time, the President invited Mrs. Higa, Mr. Chang and Mr. Lew to the rostrum.

The Speaker, on behalf of the Joint Session, then introduced the newly elected officers: Marion S. Higa, the Legislative Auditor; Samuel B.K. Chang, Director of the Legislative Reference Bureau; and Yen L. Lew, State Ombudsman, who were extended congratulations and a round of applause.

At 3:21 o'clock p.m., the Speaker declared the Joint Session of the House of Representatives and the Senate adjourned.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 3:32 o'clock p.m.

Representative Anderson, at this time, rose to a point of clarification, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, pertaining to the procedure that I believe would be defective to a particular constitutional problem that we may have on a bill that we passed last evening, I ask the question: If the bill was lying on the Clerk's desk for Second Reading. . .at that time I was told that we were in overtime and the bill had been decked. . . Mr. Speaker, according to the Constitution, every bill has to have three readings and that means that we have to have a Second Reading in this House, and I am wondering if you have discussed it, and are we going to have the Second Reading today, or are we extending the process?"

The Chair answered:

"We are coming back in session tomorrow to pick up whatever conference drafts that were agreed upon between the House and the Senate."

At 3:34 o'clock p.m., Representative Arakaki asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 3:46 o'clock p.m., Representative Anderson rose and stated:

"I thank you very much for your decision on this and I'll be back tomorrow to discuss the \$1.7-billion, and I do hope at that time nobody calls me out of order and recess because I think if we get a chance to discuss this and make this blow away, it may not have been anything i anybody ever gave us a chance to talk.

"Thank you."

SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Arakaki, seconded 1 Representative O'Kieffe and carried, the rules we suspended for the purpose of reconsidering acti previously taken.

RECONSIDERATION OF ACTION TAKEN

Representative Arakaki moved that the Hc reconsider its action taken on April 10, 1992, disagreeing to the amendments proposed by the Senat H.B. Nos. 3158 (SD 1); 3564, HD 2 (SD 1); and 38 HD 2 (SD 1), seconded by Representative O'Kieffe.

Representative Thielen rose and asked:

"Mr. Speaker, is it appropriate to discuss specific now?"

The Chair answered:

"That's correct."

Representative Thielen continued:

"Mr. Speaker, I am speaking. . .

Representative Arakaki interrupted and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I believe this is just a procedural motion. . .

The Chair replied:

"I will ask for discussions later, Representative Thielen."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried.

Representative Arakaki then gave notice of intent to agree to the amendments proposed by the Senate to H.B. Nos. 3158 (SD 1); 3564, HD 2 (SD 1); and 3851, HD 2 (SD 1).

The Chair then said:

"When we come up for Final Reading, Representative Thielen, on these bills, we'll ask for discussions."

Representative Thielen thanked the Chair.

Representative Peters then rose and stated:

"I think, in reference to Representative Thielen's comments, a motion was made for reconsideration of action previously taken. If her comments were addressed to that motion, she certainly should be allowed to say something.

"My understanding, Mr. Speaker, is, that aside, the motion was carried nonetheless so that matter is not before us."

Representative Thielen then rose and stated:

"I wish to thank my colleague on the other side of the aisle. I think it would have been appropriate to have permitted me to make some comments. I am concerned about the process that was used, and I wanted to alert other members about that process. I think it was not good policy for this body. I think we should not have lealt with it in the manner in which we did, and I did vant to make those comments before.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At 3:50 o'clock p.m., Representative Souki asked for a ccess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call 'the Chair.
