SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering bills on Third Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar.

THIRD READING

The following bills, which were on the calendar for Third Reading, were read throughout and the following actions taken:

H.B. No. 1152, HD 1:

Representative Say moved that H.B. No. 1152, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Kawakami.

Representative Say rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in support of this measure but before I do, Mr. Speaker, may I introduce the staff of the Committee on Finance?"

Representative Say then introduced Mr. Dean Seki, chief analyst, and Ms. C.J. Leong, chief researcher, and asked them to stand to be recognized along with the other members of the Finance Company who were seated in the gallery.

Representative Say continued:

"Mr. Speaker, if there are accolades to be made this afternoon, accolades should fall upon all of you here today. I was very honored to be given the privilege of the assignment of the Finance Committee chairmanship and I was very honored to have the opportunity to work with these Finance Committee members. Their intelligence, their knowledge, their participation in our deliberations were very, very democratic, very open. I can recall, Mr. Speaker, when you spoke on the floor in regards to the legislative bill that we had started a major reform -- a reform of a roll call vote for the members of the respective committees -- and it is a start and a beginning.

"Mr. Speaker and members, despite our hard and sluggish economic growth and discouraging revenue forecast, which I told the media yesterday, in the area of tourism, the closure of agriculture, the phase-off of the military spending and construction, we were very much concerned, and we were concerned that we were committed to providing those programs and services identified as essential by the general public. In light of this responsibility, Mr. Speaker and members, we have developed a balanced and fiscally sound budget, while not hastily increasing any taxes, primarily the general excise tax and the personal income tax to generate more revenue.

"In the area of economic development, I can be very proud that the Majority Package is reflected in it, that we

are supporting the area of tourism, diversified business such as the area of the computer system on Maui, and other programs. And we are looking at other particular areas, Mr. Speaker.

"You know, Mr. Speaker and, I think the Majority Leader, I told them, members that I wasn't going to speak and I don't want to speak ... all I wanted to do was have my written comments inserted in the Journal. I know there's a lot of highlights. . .but accolades should be given to all of the members of this House for their support -- Representative Ward who have contributed a lot in our deliberations, Representative Marumoto, Representative Kanohe, Representative Nekoba, Representative Pepper, Representative Suzuki, Representative Nakasone, Representative Morihara, Representative Tam, Representative Tajiri, Representative Santiago, Representative Chang -- thank you to all of you. And a very special thanks to my Vice Chairperson, Bertha Kawakami.

"So, Mr. Speaker, can I have my written comments inserted in the Journal?"

The Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Say's remarks are as follows:

"Despite our sluggish economic growth and discouraging revenue forecast, we are committed to providing those programs and services identified as essential by the public. In light of this responsibility, we have developed a balanced and fiscally sound budget, while not hastily increasing the general excise and income taxes to generate revenue.

"The following highlights illustrate our approach to the biennium budget:

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

- (a) Due to the devastating economic effects of Hurricane Iniki, we have provided \$4-million for tourism promotion to revive Kauai's visitor industry and stimulate economic recovery.
- (b) We have provided an additional \$4-million for the long-term economic development of the Hilo-Hamakua region.
- (c) Because tourism is the primary revenue generator for the State, we have provided an additional \$17-million to the State Tourism Office for marketing and promotion of Hawaii as both a vacation and business destination.

EDUCATION

- (a) Primary and secondary education remains a top priority of the State. We have provided an additional \$30-million over the biennium for special needs funding for: the Kapaa Complex Schools in the wake of Hurricane Iniki; special education to accommodate an increase in disabled students; the substantial enrollment increases in the A+ Program; and the current shortage of qualified teachers for Hawaii's schools.
- (b) Further, we have provided \$33.2-million in addition to the \$180-million allotted through the Educational Facilities Special Fund, for capital improvements program projects for

building, renovating and improving facilities on our school campuses. This includes the repair of Kauai's schools, part of the Hurricane Iniki Package, and a \$17-million renovation of Building A at McKinley High School.

- (c) In the Higher Education programs, we have provided an additional \$10.3-million to the University of Hawaii's campuses and community colleges to minimize reductions in course offerings and student programs currently available to our undergraduate and graduate students.

HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICES

- (a) In the area of area of Health and Social Services, we have addressed priority needs to ensure the health and well-being of the public. We have provided over \$18-million for the anticipated increase in enrollment in the State Health Insurance Plan (SHIP), and for high-end, intensive care for seriously emotionally disturbed youth to comply with the Department of Justice Settlement Agreement.
- (b) Further, our Social Services budget includes over \$137-million to address the estimated Medicaid shortfall, \$2.2-million to restore funding for shelter and support services for victims of domestic violence, and \$4.8-million for early intervention and family based services.
- (c) In recognizing the vital services and programs provided by organizations through Chapter 42D, we have not reduced purchase of service, grant or subsidy funding.

ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION

- (a) Although a variety of permit and emission fees were proposed to support the environmental management program, we have made a commitment to continued general fund support to ensure the quality of the water we drink and the air we breathe without large burdens on the public.

REVENUE MAXIMIZATION

- (a) Acknowledging that the Department of Taxation is the largest revenue generating state agency, we have restored \$600,000 for the maximization of delinquent tax collections.
- (b) Further, we support House Bill 1460, HD 1, which establishes the Tax Administration Special Fund. This measure allows the Department of Taxation to utilize up to \$500,000 per year from delinquent tax collections to defray operating expenses when outstanding delinquent taxes reach 3-1/2 percent of total tax collections from the previous fiscal year."

Representative O'Kieffe then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I would like to take this opportunity, however, to express some grave concerns. In his 1992 State-of-the-State address, our Governor said that under his leadership, Hawaii would have an educational system

'second to none.' However, Mr. Speaker, here we are, once again wishing for an educational system that is second to none. What we have before us today is a budget that does not make education a priority. Instead, it seems to place the priority on everything except education and human services.

"When we received the Executive Budget in January, over fifty million dollars had been cut from an already austere education operating budget. Today, thanks to the efforts of the members of this body and a very vocal public, the Department of Education Budget Director has said, 'We are only ten million dollars short.'

"Mr. Speaker, our much touted lump-sum budget process is scheduled to begin this year, and I applaud this initiative. However, this \$10-million shortage means that lump-sum funds given to the schools to empower them will be accompanied by a mandate to immediately cut the funds by approximately two percent. And with 92 percent of those funds already earmarked for personnel costs, the message we send to teachers, parents, students and the community is clear -- in spite of the rhetoric, the money you need for basics could not be found.

"This budget before us will once again ensure that Hawaii will rank high in the nation in per capita tax burden. Yet, we remain 49th in the nation for public school expenditures. Where is all this money going?

"Mr. Speaker, did you know that Hawaii ranks number four in the nation in dollars spent on administrative overhead? While education needs have gone begging, the administration has continued to grow at a rate far exceeding the population growth rate. The State government has added more than thirteen thousand positions to the job rolls during the past five years. Many of these positions and departments are duplications of existing agencies.

"Where is the accountability I asked for on Opening Day? The Legislative Auditor noted, and I quote: 'The Legislature has granted the executive so much latitude that legislative power to direct State policies to program appropriations has been undermined.' Each of us are here today because we asked to be a voice to the people of Hawaii. The citizens of this State have made it abundantly clear ... indeed they are demanding that our children have the opportunity to receive the best education that we can deliver. If the Governor chooses to place other things ahead of education and human services, then we must speak up and act on behalf of the people.

"I will be looking forward to the next biennium budget when it comes down from 'her' office.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kawakami then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I offer comments concerning this document and the document we labored over beginning of the session -- the 1993 Majority Package. The policies contained in this document reflect the broad objective statements we adopted as a Caucus in January.

"Mr. Speaker, the work of the Finance Committee, under the fine leadership of Chairman Say, has indeed paralleled the 1993 Majority Package of the State House.

"Under the broad 'umbrella' of economic development, the budget reflects a balanced viewpoint which ensures a broad-based economy and provides for a multitude of opportunities for Hawaii's people, while maintaining

fiscal integrity, equity, and efficiency in the management of public funds. The Finance Committee worked hard to manage public programs to ensure the long-term economic well-being of our entire community, and hard choices had to be made. It was not easy to say 'no,' especially to a number of new social service programs and to plans to expand existing social programs and benefits. Chairman Say provided us with the facts and figures, and when it was time to cast our committee votes, he provided us with recommended courses of action and his rationale for his recommendations. And in the end, we were told to 'vote our conscience.'

"The Finance Committee devoted considerable time to the development of a convention center and to visitor marketing and also promotional programs to ensure Hawaii's place as a premier visitor destination. We listened to the business community and did not capitulate to demands for an increase in the general excise tax. We provided for the State's transportation infrastructure to accommodate inter-island mobility, the visitor industry, and the efficient import and export of goods and services.

"Mr. Speaker, for our special populations across the State in need of assistance, we provided for the continuation of programs to ensure basic financial, medical, housing, social, and rehabilitative needs. Basic services will continue -- those who are being served currently will continue to be served. We wanted to provide more, but we just couldn't at this time.

"For the environmentalists, we supported programs to continue to protect and manage our State's threatened and endangered plant and animal species, and to protect and manage our precious water resources. And we responded to our moral and financial obligations to the Hawaiian population.

"In the area of education, Mr. Speaker, a program area of special interest to me, we provided resources for the hiring of additional teachers to meet increases in student enrollments statewide, and for the purchase of textbooks, supplies, and equipment. And perhaps most significant, we continued to support school decentralization efforts by appropriating money for lump-sum budgeting. And, Mr. Speaker, the education budget fared well despite declining revenues and a projected negative growth rate.

"Last but not least, Mr. Speaker, I want to thank you, Chairman Say, and all of our colleagues for your continued support for efforts to rebuild Kauai. We are on the road to recovery, but the road is much longer and the road is much wider than first anticipated. Kauai looks forward to the day when it can again become a fully contributing island to the State's economy.

"To the Finance Committee staff, mahalo for your efforts for a job well done. And to Kippen and my staff, mahalo for your efforts also.

"And, Mr. Speaker, we forgot one person that we didn't mention on the Finance Committee ... that was Representative Alcon and I wanted to include him.

"Thank you very much, all of you.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative D. Ige then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, a couple of months back, when I was appointed Chair of the Education Committee, I looked forward to the task at hand with great enthusiasm. A lot of people thought that I was nuts just because they feel

that education is really a funding kind of issue, but I have always believed and shared with many of my colleagues that simply pouring more money into a system that cannot meet the needs of the 21st century is not the solution. I truly appreciate your support and the Chairman of the Finance Committee who essentially gave me carte blanche to fund the education system to what we felt was comfortable and I could not, in my good conscience, ask for more funds than I could justify.

"We have spent numerous hours in many, many hearings in the Education Committee, looking at processes, looking at how the Department of Education chooses to conduct its business, and our efforts are consolidated in our bill that went across to the Senate on Tuesday which proposes to reinvent the public school system that really does put the schools in charge. It really creates a process to encourage and foster innovation and creativity amongst the schools. And most importantly, Mr. Speaker, at this session we focused on accountability and ensuring that all funds and any additional and future funds given to the department is focused at school improvement and student achievement.

"Mr. Speaker, that being said, the question becomes ... how do we handle the public school budget in this fiscal year when funds are not that prevalent?

"I have examined the department's budget and looked into many, many different things. For example, the current bureaucracy, as the Minority Leader has mentioned, is rampant in all of the state government and is quite large in the Department of Education. Administrative positions account for more than sixteen million dollars and more than twelve hundred positions in this State. If we are clearly to say that there is no need for administration, that would increase the resources and each school could receive up to four additional teaching positions off the top. Now, I recognize that that is not an accountable or respectable thing to do because clearly there are functions that need to be centralized and carried out.

"But what we are doing and saying in this budget is essentially challenging the Superintendent and the Department of Education and the Board of Education to really look at the bureaucracy of this Department of Education and make a commitment to reallocate resources back into the classrooms.

"Mr. Speaker, I've been proud to serve as your Chair of Education. I think this budget and the bills that we put forth is something that the Legislature can be proud of because we recognize that education is not purely a funding issue. It is a process and we must be committed to school improvement and school excellence.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Thielen then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with certain reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I was a little bit surprised to find a press release dated yesterday about the State operating budget which really assumes that we are going to merely rubber stamp the budget today. I am not going to rubber stamp it, Mr. Speaker. I will vote in favor of it but I want to point out some of the mixed-up priorities.

"I first would like to thank the Finance Committee for all of the hard work that they did and especially the Finance staff - the Committee staff -- who I understand now have to take Vitamin D supplements because they haven't seen daylight for two months. So let's hope that they will once again be able to get out into our Hawaiian sun.

"I am really concerned about certain measures in the budget. In a time of austerity, I note that our government-wide support program went up 4.81 percent. This means while everyone else tightens belts, cost of government expenditures for government itself stays fat on the hog, and I just really disagree with that.

"Once again I am concerned and more convinced that the glossy Office of International Relations should be eliminated, that it's a duplicative luxury that the State of Hawaii can't afford when our students study and our teachers teach with outdated textbooks, if they are lucky, and in substandard facilities. I know that my worthy colleague in the Minority Party is my opponent on this and has called me myopic, so I put together a pair of glasses for him that have the Office of International Relations over the top but they also have needs for our schools on the glasses. So I'm hoping that my colleague, the worthy Representative from Hawaii Kai, will take a look at these glasses and think with more concern about the schools.

"I'd like to see the near one million in the general funds that are going to be used for the Office of International Relations be used to bring our schools up to minimum standard so they might pass fire code.

"I'd like to see the Department of Education hire forty additional teachers to reduce the student/teacher ratio in the third through sixth grades, or one million could go a long way in providing extra money for students in our special needs schools here on this island, on Molokai, and Lanai. And the twenty-two positions scheduled to be eliminated in the Windward district could remain. It's a matter of priorities, Mr. Speaker.

"And while I agree with the argument that we must strengthen our economic base by supporting Hawaii's tourism industry, I somewhat question placing all of our pogs in one pack on this. Is it really necessary that we spend hundreds of thousands of dollars to promote Hawaii as the sporting events host. Our existing contributions to such events as the Aloha Bowl, the Hula Bowl, the Great Aloha Run, and the Honolulu Marathon place us in good stead. Why are we not encouraging the private sector to enter those other areas instead of our continuing to put State money into those.

"The budget also appropriates \$280,000 for a State Visitor Information Office in Brussels, Belgium. Again, the timing is bad and I believe that we should use the existing offices to be able to take care of that.

"There is one little item that I really question, Mr. Speaker. It's \$7,500 for each director, chair, comptroller, Attorney General, the Director of the Office of International Relations, the Director of OSP for protocol expenses. What is protocol? I know what \$7,500 per each director and head is, and I know what a teacher position is, and I wonder if \$7,500 protocol isn't really \$7,500 for a director's slush fund. I just disagree with the concept and think we should eliminate it.

"Next, I'm concerned about the Kakaako lei of green -- \$14,500,000 found on page 206 of the budget. It relocates existing users out of Kakaako and it continues with the Governor's objective of creating a lei of green around Hawaii. I don't believe we can afford that now. I think it's again a matter of priorities.

"And then I wish you all would turn to page 248 on your budget bill. Take a look at that nice little measure that slid in on Section 119. In the event that requirements associated with the removal of asbestos such as rental, renovation, and moving costs, exceed

appropriations, the Governor is going to be able to utilize savings from other appropriations in this Act to meet such purposes. This is the Capitol renovation project, or could be, and I think we really should hold the line on those expenditures. The renovation of the Capitol never should have been a priority to this State and yet this bill, in Section 119, is going to give a blank check to the Governor to spend extra moneys on its refurbishment. In the financial predicament we are in now, we cannot continue to bury our money in that Capitol renovation project. Enough is enough, and I think the people of this State have made that very clear. Somehow the message hasn't gotten through.

These resources could be better used if invested where it's needed in education. The Budget Director of Education remarked that even with the extra \$10.6-million additional funds allocated by the Governor, the Department of Education is still approximately \$10-million short of meeting its basic fiscal needs. That means textbooks, teachers, classrooms and quality programs sacrificed really for the renovation of a building. A blank check given to the Governor in no way invests in the future of our State, and the only return our children will have on this investment are in crowded classrooms and a sadly lacking educational system.

"I want to finally comment on an item that is missing and I find this is very unfortunate, and I am referring to Ocean and Marine Resources. If you blink, you'll miss it. We're an island state, surrounded by ocean and dependent upon our marine resources but somehow we have really left that area out.

"With these concerns, Mr. Speaker, and again with a sincere debt of thanks to the staff, to the Finance Committee, because I know that they worked long, long hours on this. I want to say again ... I am concerned about our lack of priorities and I would like to see us focus on those as this budget moves through the process and we go into conference committee. Let's fund education fully.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Cachola then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"There seems to be a lot of criticism when it comes to the budget relating to tourism, and I am here to defend BED 113 which is the State tourism budget.

"Let me tell you, Mr. Speaker, that I will not hesitate to fund disputed programs. For example, putting up \$218,000 to create an office in Brussels. You see, our major market, Mr. Speaker, when it comes to tourism is thirteen states west of the Rockies and Japan. Both of these markets are now down. We need to create a third major market and we believe that Europe will give us the third major market. In Europe, we have about 320,000,000 people out there which belongs to the EEC community and by putting up a regional office, we can promote and market Hawaii better.

"When it comes to sports events, Mr. Speaker, let me tell you why we have to support it. First, it takes money to make money, and there's a lot of economic benefits that these sports events give to the State. For example, just the 1991 Great Aloha Run ... it gave the State \$2.8-million in sales generated by out-of-state participants. To the Honolulu Marathon, there's about 35,000 participants -- 15,000 from Japan alone. And this kind of event is featured in ESPN, the Japanese television, and also it generated \$71.2-million in sales, and generated \$4.1-million in tax revenues.

"The Aloha Bowl ... it was the fourth most watched post-season football game in 1992. We had a viewership of twenty-eight million and it also generated sales of \$31.1-million and \$1.2-million in tax revenues.

"The Hula Bowl ... in 1992 alone, it generated \$3.6-million in sales, and carried live on national television.

"The NFL Pro-Bowl ... we almost lost it. It's good that the Department of Business and Economic Development, through the leadership of Mufi Hannemann, was able to get a five-year extension to this kind of event. It has a forty million viewership. In 1992 alone, it generated \$67.5-million and \$4-million in tax revenues.

"On the Senior PGA Tour -- Kaanapali Classic ... the only reason why they are trying to defend or fund this event is because the major sponsors of this -- the First Development or Daichi -- are having financial problems and they are only asking a one-shot help from us which is \$200,000. This event generated four million dollars. And also, it is being broadcast to more than seventy countries, and that's including the United States of America. When it comes to the PGA Grand Slam Golf, it has an audience of fifteen million, and an additional fifteen million reached through other media and it is considered one of the most watched golf tournaments in the United States of America.

"Of course, we need money to make money and that's also the reason why we are putting up a convention center. And this mother of generator of revenues will give us \$336-million additional revenue to the State, and this will be used to fund all programs, especially education, health and human services. We have to make and build a convention center. With one, we will probably prosper -- without one, we will certainly decline.

"With that, Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in support of this bill.

"Thank you."

Representative Shon then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"This is actually first crossover -- time for my traditional remarks on children's mental health which I've felt the need to speak on each year.

"This budget does include significant funds which the administration proposed, and that is very good. It also includes a fairly strong proviso on page 79 which attempts to force the community mental health centers into billing for Medicaid which they have recalcitrantly refused to do year after year. Actually, I think the Chair of Finance was perhaps a little kind on them. I would have removed the funds we expect them to generate in Medicaid and transfer those directly to the private non-profits. But I am hoping that this proviso, along with the language which requires the Department of Budget and Finance to finally do its job and monitor this, I hope that that does the trick because as the overseer of our finances for the entire State, it has always been a great disappointment to me that that department has not sat down and really talked turkey with the Health Department about the Medicaid issue. Year after year, programs are requested and that Department of Budget and Finance regularly says, we like this, we don't like this, we like this. We have no problem with saying no, but they do seem to have a problem with forcing the issue to generate more federal funds. I hope that this will do it.

"This year, Mr. Speaker, we have a very interesting document that was generated. It is called **The Future of**

the Child and Adolescent Mental Health System in Hawaii. It was distributed to all legislators this year. When the Department of Justice people came here, they were not even aware that there had been, for two or three or four years, a task force on children's mental health. They were not informed of this by the administration and they were not aware of this report which is a very comprehensive overview of the needs of the State.

"The reason why I bring this up is because the funds which have been requested by the administration do not include this as its standard and we're going to have to look very carefully at what is still missing after many years of neglect. The Department of Justice, now being aware of this, has recently written to the State of Hawaii and said ... this is our standard. They have embraced this report as a standard for what they are going to expect. This report indicates to us that even with the additional funding, out-patient services for children's mental health on all islands will still only meet 39 percent of the needs. Home long-term care services for children and adolescents will meet zero percent of the projected needs. Adolescent/children day treatment -- 13 percent; long-term residential -- 33 percent.

"Now, many of these services are actually on the island of Oahu so when we move to the neighbor islands, and if those of you who still have this, there's a very convenient chart that shows island by island, service by service, the amount of treatment slots or services that are currently there and what is still needed. And I want to bring this up because it is a very significant development that the Justice Department has now recognized a complete, broad array of services. Of course, there will be negotiations between the State and the Department of Justice, but now this is a standard that they are aware of which the administration sought to hide from them, and the budgets developed which we have rightfully endorsed up to the amounts we've endorsed were in the context of not having this on the table in the discussions with Justice. So I think we've made some important steps.

"This budget is far better than last year's with respect to children's and adolescent mental health -- far better. And the proviso is very good, but we still have a way to go.

"My second thing I want to mention and that is, with respect to the service of those, particularly on the neighbor islands and the rural areas for health care, signing people up for SHIP is not necessarily the answer to deliver the most services. We have added additional funds for SHIP. My criticism of the administration's strategy is that they have added no funds for community primary care centers. To put this in perspective, there are seven non-profit primary care centers in the State of Hawaii. They run on a little less than ten million dollars a year operating. They serve 55,000 different clients. The State Health Insurance Program operates on about twelve to fourteen million dollars a year and serves less than 20,000 clients. Some of these go to primary care centers -- many not. About 20,000 clients are seen each year in the primary care centers with virtually no insurance ... that means they are not signed up for Medicaid, they are not signed up for SHIP, they are not signed up for anything. We still do have an uninsured population problem here and many, many of these folks are native Hawaiians. Only 6.7 percent of the clients that are seen by these centers are signed up for SHIP. If we do some crude calculations ... if 9.7 million serves 55,000, then an additional two million is put into the primary care centers, particularly to create new ones on Kauai, on Maui, where there are none, which serves another ten thousand. ... there is at least one deputy in the Department of Health that is already bragging the great confidence we're going to get the additional two million a

year for SHIP that the administration requested. ... I would urge the Finance Committee to hold firm, at the very least, on the levels that are there into considering very seriously the cost effectiveness of funding primary care centers, particularly where they do not exist. It's fine to sign up for the State Health Insurance Program but the hardest to reach individuals, particularly in the rural areas, particularly of various culture and ethnic groups, are not getting the services that we all want them to receive, and the cost effective numbers point very directly that if we do expand the primary care centers, we will be expanding real services to each and every one of the districts that we hope to serve.

"It is important to note that when someone signs up for SHIP, HMSA gets seven hundred dollars whether they seek services or not. That's the insurance deal. It doesn't matter if they never seek service. However, when you fund a primary care center, you fund real services to real people. We need both of these in the State for a complete health care system. Signing up on paper is not the same thing as delivering the goods. That's why I urge, as we continue these deliberations, that any additional funding or even existing funding to expand health care, particularly for rural areas, we look very seriously where there are none right now -- no primary care centers, particularly on the neighbor islands.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor of the budget but with some reservations, not only about the budget but about the budget process.

"First, I join with all of you in commending Representative Say, his staff and, Mr. Speaker, I realize when you were the Chair, why people stood up and so many accolades came forward because there was a lot of work by a lot of people. I think all that credit should be given up front and where it's due. However, all the hard work that's been done does not justify some of the things that are in the budget on the process by which those issues arrived in the process of the budget.

"I have the following reservations about the contents of this budget, Mr. Speaker. First, as my colleague has pointed out, it falls short of full funding of education. The budget is shortchanging our kids again. We're nine million down ... when are we going to get it to where it should be?

"Secondly, Mr. Speaker, I'm afraid this budget is going to increase my constituents' property taxes. Nobody in East Honolulu wants their property taxes increased. If this budget is built upon the amount of the TAT tax that is not going to the counties, that, Mr. Speaker, is inevitable and I think that's dangerous, I think it's unwanted. Now, all of the others from Oahu I'm sure share that opinion.

"Thirdly, Mr. Speaker, the budget still puts brick and water and CIP projects above its people. The number four priority in the budget is CIP and that wasn't given in your analysis that was handed out. Is it any wonder then, while we're freezing welfare payments and purchases of services which the previous speaker just spoke of, with priorities such as these, the money glut of the 80s has skewed us though we haven't realigned our priorities yet? It still got brick and water priorities for people and projects.

"Unfortunately, the budget authorized the three dollar departure tax for all of our people leaving the airport ... they are going to get hit with the three dollars departure

tax. This is something that this body, each of us here who are not freshmen, have already voted for. We don't want it -- it's already been taken care of but it's in the budget. And on the same page as that's on the budget, on page 217, in case you're wondering, we also got a hangar and a terminal ramp subsidy for Hawaiian Airlines. Just in case the bail out doesn't work or the reregulation, there's a rent subsidy in there for Hawaiian Airlines -- that's page 217. Then on pages 211, 212, 248 which could be taken to the cleaners again on the renovation of the Capitol contract, after getting burned with the marble floors, the \$800 chairs, the \$1,700 koa benches. It behooves each of us to know exactly what is in every line item in those budgets but we don't. How many of you know what's in those contracts? I've asked to see them -- I've got no information yet. Do you know if there are any benches in those contracts, or other things that we could be surprised and embarrassed to find out? DAGS has already seriously embarrassed us about the cost of these renovations. And then on page 248, this budget has the nerve to authorize the Governor to spend whatever sums he sees fit to complete the renovation of the Capitol. So it's not only what we're approving, we're giving the Governor a blank check if we fall short on any renovation of the Capitol. On page 248, he's got a proviso that says ... whatever you need, you are authorized to spend it.

"Mr. Speaker, this is irresponsible budgeting. To give the Governor this authority is not only unconscionable, it's probably unconstitutional and that proviso should be stricken from the document. Likewise, provisos for the Governor on pages 89, 91, 218, 227, 237, 239 and 247 give the Governor just about any power he needs to transfer money or people between any project, between any department, any personnel who are needed, and basically usurp this legislative, constitutionally mandated fiscal budgetary mandate. We have been warned about this surrendering of our fiscal authority by the Legislative Auditor -- the previous one -- and we have been told of the dangers that this increases.

"But, Mr. Speaker, the unkindest cut of them all is on page 241. Some previous speakers have alluded to the private sector really hunkering down in trying to stay afloat. On page 241, Mr. Speaker, this budget actually gives the Governor twenty new positions. Do we need to create twenty new executive positions of which we authorize by proviso on page 241?

"When seen in this light, this budget is the white flag of surrender from this legislative body to the executive body. And just as a little aside to show how powerful we are ... of the ten billion dollars in this budget, we, fellow colleagues, have control over twenty million dollars -- just so we keep our power in perspective.

"Which now, Mr. Speaker, leads me to conclude with some comments about the budget process itself and how ways perhaps budgets in the future can be improved.

"First, Mr. Speaker, it has to be said that this is not our budget -- this is the Governor's budget. I use to naively think that it was the Congress that was always sabotaging President Bush's budget, but I have learned by being on the Finance Committee that it's really the executive budget. They have the active role -- we have the passive role. Let's be honest ... we play on the sideline. This is the executive fiscal game that's being played and we are not in the midst of it. And it's probably because we've given all of our authority and all of our equipment away.

"Secondly, this is not our budget from the Governor's point of view. It's not even that, not even our budget from the Finance Committee's point of view. But it's the

staff's budget. There are a number of reasons for this, none of which involve Representative Say or none of his staff personally. These deficiencies point to where there are areas of improvement and how the budget process can be improved in the future.

"First of all, the budget process is too secretive. There's too much mumbo jumbo about what the information is and where to get it. We never saw any operating statements from any departments. We only got narratives and testimonies -- we never saw any numbers.

"Secondly, we never got any special fund accountability. Where did the moneys come from and where did they go? Never saw any numbers.

"Thirdly, we never saw the totals and the percentage increases in the budget over the last five years even though all of you and I know that the executive departments have increased by a hundred percent, but we never saw the trail where these departments were coming from. We only saw one small snapshot that was before us. We never found out how many employees the departments have. Have you ever tried to count permanent employment? Temporary employment? Exempt employment? Temporary exempt employment? Temporary permanent employment? We went crazy just trying to figure out the categories and finding out how many people worked in various departments. So we don't know how many people work for this government. We don't know how many people are being paid for in this budget. And when we did have the department heads in front of us, we had to pull information out of them like it was pulling teeth. And then when we did get the information about the departments, we couldn't take the information with us. We had to keep it on our table and it was in the folders which we could not remove from the room. We couldn't xerox them. It was there and it was secretive.

"I submit that no one really knows what's in this budget -- no one except a very, very few select people. That's because the budget process still leaves us a lot of room for improvement. And because of the mystery that surrounds the budget process, Mr. Speaker, I submit that this body and the Senate will always be scrambling for lotteries or other get-rich-quick money, tax, or other gimmicks to get revenues because we've never really looked at cutting down the bottom line by efficient government. We're always going to be looking on the revenue side rather than the control and efficient expenditure side. We always think revenues but we don't think about efficiency and expenditures. And because no one in the executive or the Legislature has a handle on expenditures and accountability, this process will probably go on and on and on. We have to institutionalize that efficiency, and I'll have some remarks later to say why I'm encouraged that will come about.

"My last recommendation, Mr. Speaker, about the budget process is that it may be illegal. Yes, illegal, according to the Hawaii State Constitution. By constitutional mandate, every department of this government used to be audited every two years. Our departments are lucky if they're audited every five years.

"This budget, Mr. Speaker, is like a man or a woman who hasn't had a physical checkup for ten years and you can tell by the signs of sickness, bloatedness and fat because of being overweight and never having been trimmed by an audit. The delegates of the Constitutional Convention in 1978 were very wise to include the audit requirements every two years and the wisdom of this very body, just a few years ago, to establish the Office of Legislative Analyst that is our watchdog on the departments and their body. It is imperative, Mr.

Speaker, that we fund that watchdog body. So by the lack of the audit, this budget that we've got in front of us is built on a lot of tenuous assumptions.

"Therefore, Mr. Speaker, and in conclusion, other than the fact that this budget has misplaced priorities, it's not our budget, it has been conceived in secrecy and is probably illegal ... it's not a very bad document. My point, Mr. Speaker and fellow colleagues, is that there's room for improvement. It offers us one of the best areas for reinventing government in the future.

"Mr. Speaker, as sure as under your able leadership that this body has been transformed from otherwise dictatorial chairs in the committee system to where it's open voting, I am convinced under your leadership, to open up the budget process, to get the information out, to get people working together, that this budget, too, will grow in its understanding and we, too, will grow in the budget process and in the end, Mr. Speaker, it will all work out.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Duldulao then rose to speak in strong support of the bill, stating:

"I was a member of the Finance Committee for four years. I know where to look for information and I know how to ask questions, and that's the reason why I can tell my colleagues that the budgeting process is not secret. I didn't go there as a spy -- I went there to learn and to look for information. I was there with an open mind and, in the end, a very positive attitude.

"Before us is a very responsible budget. I'm not going to give statistics because I do not keep a record of the wrong or the negative. This budget before us was put together in the most prudent, humane, and fairest way. Although our resources are very tight, this budget managed to fund and address the on-going health services and programs that are essential in ensuring the health care of our constituents. This budget was well thought out and was molded with a lot of common sense, taking into great consideration the needs of the people over our State and that is in spite of our hemorrhaging budget situation.

"I highly commend Chairman Say for having the foresight to package a fair budget in a tight fiscal year. Thank you very much, Chair Say. We're recognizing what is needed and for having the wisdom to put together provisos in the budget as a means of communicating our concerns to the respective departments.

"Mr. Speaker, I am honored to serve as your Health Chair under your administration and under the chairmanship of Chairman Say, and I would also like to thank Vice Chair Kawakami, the Finance members, and their able and hardworking staff. I'm sure, and I can be very, very positive, the Chairman of the Finance Committee did his very best, and I feel that way, too.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Tam then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker and fellow colleagues, I speak in support of House Bill 1152, HD 1, in particular to the overall bill of over one hundred pages, so I would like to speak in regards to the education part.

"As a strong proponent for education in regards to lump-sum budgeting, I wish to thank my fellow colleagues in the Education Committee and the other colleagues in the House of Representatives for what we have taken on is

a challenge to permit our schools individually to draw the forces together, to make up their own budget. By doing that, you invite involvement within our schools. And this is going to be a very promising thing in the future whereby everybody can work together.

"Other than that, I would like to recognize Representative Calvin Say as being the Chairman for the Finance Committee. He is very humble, as we can all see, and rather shy in some sense. Thank you very much for your openness, and we mean it sincerely as you all know that I'm very heavy on openness.

"Thank you."

Representative Stegmaier then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"The House Majority set as our priority this session the improvement of our economic condition and as we have seen in our daily deliberations, the work of every committee in the Legislature touches on our economic well-being.

"As Chair of the House Committee on Economic Development and Business Concerns, I want to acknowledge and thank the Chair and members of the Finance Committee for proposing a budget which includes moneys for new initiatives in the following areas:

"First, developing Hawaii into a center for trade among the nations of the Pacific with a special role as the broker for American exporters wishing to sell their products and services in Asia;

"Second, developing a multi-media software industry in our State;

"Third, allowing us to eventually host the Hawaii Pacific Games. And by the way, Mr. Speaker, that conference to which the Minority Floor Leader referred, would provide the consensus among the international participants to develop this premier pre-Olympic Athletic Games of the Pacific here in Hawaii;

"Fourth, supporting of long-term economic development efforts in the Hilo, Hamakua region; and

"Fifth, forming an inter-agency job creation program with an emphasis on our growing role in the Pacific community with the potential for our becoming a home for cross-cultural employment training and an aviation training center for the Pacific.

"Mr. Speaker, these budgetary items help to ensure that Hawaii will play an important role in the Pacific era, hopefully to provide interesting and challenging jobs for Hawaii's people and, in particular, for our special cross-cultural keiki-o-kaina.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Isbell then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I would like to commend the Chairman and all of the staff and the members of Finance because I know how difficult it is. I sat on Finance for eight years and that's when I got momona (fat). You sit a lot but you learn a lot up here too.

"I want to bring to your attention, on page 34, one item which I don't believe everyone may be aware of. It is number 19 -- BUF229. This is the Housing Finance and Development Corporation and it is \$468,000. Actually it's almost a half a million dollars in cash -- A

Funds. They're being used to pay the rent. This does not include the \$222,000 that they pay out of special funds. So we're really talking about \$700,000 just to pay the rent for a very large developer. HFDC is suppose to develop housing for the State and I must say to you that I do not feel that they have been very successful in producing housing for those who really need it, especially those below the eighty percent of the median income, and for those in the gap group. Many of us sitting here, in fact, are in the gap group -- many making too much or not enough. In fact, some of us are in the poverty level, if I'm not mistaken.

"But my main concern to you is that Pohulani is an elderly project that was built in Kakaako. That project is a wonderful project, there's no doubt about it. But this \$700,000 is a subsidy. It's paying off the bonds, or helping to, and I really feel that you should know that that's a back door way of subsidizing low income housing and it is for the elderly.

"I have no problem with that except that this is not the way to do it. If you're going to subsidize, it should be by GO bonds, it should be by up-front perhaps grants -- whatever it might be -- but I don't feel that this is the way we should be subsidizing housing.

"Another thing that I would like to bring up is that the administration cost of personnel only for HFDC is four million dollars per year, so if you start adding all these costs up you will find that this developer has one of the highest overheads of any developer in the State. I have talked to several developers -- none of them have this kind of overhead. They couldn't possibly produce housing if they did and so that's why I'm expressing to you my concern that we must take a very clear and careful look at what we have produced, and it's not HFDC's fault. Let me tell you ... I really think it's the way we set it up by the Legislature, it was doomed to become this huge conglomerate. Actually, it's now the biggest developer in the State. It is also sucking out cash that's suppose to be on special fund, and I have a problem with taking a half million dollars of cash that should be going for other purposes and paying the rent in a roundabout subsidy for a building.

"So with that in mind ... that's the only real problem I have with the budget which isn't too bad.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Marumoto then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"My reservations arise from the fact that there are insufficient funds appropriated for education, health and human services, especially those services which pertain to children. However, thanks to Chairman Say, the House Finance Committee has restored much of the fifty million dollars for education which had been cut by the administration but the DOE is still short millions. Wouldn't we all be happier to provide the beleaguered educational system with more money?

"My reservations go beyond this bill to the planning process in which the budget was conceived. When the bill came down from the administration, it was a "balanced" budget. However, in my opinion, it was not worth the proverbial paper it was printed on. It was woefully incomplete. Not included in the budget were additional funds for Medicaid, the State Health Insurance Program (SHIP), public employees' health fund, extra tourism program requirements, compensation to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs for the back rent on ceded land, and collective bargaining increases. In other words, we're short hundreds of millions -- three hundred/four hundred

million. A lot of these and other measures are in the budget now before us as one dollar items so they fit in. But it's a good thing the Honolulu City Council voted down the rail system because that would have cost us another fifty million dollars a year. Why weren't these expenditures accounted for in the budget?

"In the midst of all this teeth gnashing and hand wringing, have we asked ourselves why we are in this financial mess? Hawaii residents certainly wonder why. They remember when the budget wasn't a problem and they have a right to ask ... what happened to the surpluses we had a few years back? And now, all we can tell them is that the surpluses are gone. Our constituents have a right to ask of the State ... why didn't the State save some of those funds? Why didn't the State plan for the hard times? We knew for years that we would have many bills to pay and if the administration had a plan for economic recovery, we haven't heard about it. We should have planned for collective bargaining increases, for the long-term debt we owe OHA, for additional tourist promotion, and for soaring health costs. If we couldn't plan for the expected, then the unexpected was bound to throw us off -- way off course -- Iniki being the prime example. Certainly with such unforeseen disasters, we are happy to help our neighbors -- the people of Kauai -- out of that crisis to the extent possible. But there were long-standing problems in the State before Iniki.

"Why didn't the administration plan for the inevitable? Did it expect the super-heated economy to flow forever? Did it not consider that the Japanese bubble would eventually burst or subside? And now we, the Legislature, are left with the uncomfortable task of withholding funds for needy people and programs. We must tell them that the State doesn't have enough funds for them unless we cut some essential programs or raise taxes. It's a revolting situation!

"I think I speak for many of my colleagues when I say something's got to change. So, my fellow colleagues, we are all in this together. It is incumbent upon us to address this budget in its entirety and see what we can live without before we even consider raising the taxes of our already over-burdened taxpayers. We must set both realistic and compassionate priorities, preserve the people programs, protect and educate the children, enhance our number one industry -- tourism. We must examine what is essential, what we can live without or postpone for awhile. We must ask ourselves how much non-essential CIP we can cut so that we can instead build our schools, hospitals and housing. Regarding the other construction projects, I think we should judge them on criteria such as whether they will decrease State revenues rather than more comfortably house State employees and elected officials. Let's look at how much we are spending on our prisoners as opposed to our students. Shouldn't we readjust our priorities there? Most importantly, should we not fully fund the private social and health agencies which provide much of our direct services because they are far more cost effective than our bureaucracy?

"Though I am angry at where the lack of planning the last three years have landed us, the situation is not totally bleak. The economy, though flat, can improve and we can cut back on superfluous or overlapping State programs. We can also retrieve some money from special funds and we have time -- time until the end of session -- to better define our priorities.

"I look forward to working with other members of the Finance Committee, Chair Say, and Vice Chair Kawakami, and the very professional staff. There is a new spirit there and a new openness, and I am encouraged that together with all the members of the

House, and eventually the members of the Senate, we will find answers to these challenges.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Chun then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I'd like to acknowledge the good work of the Finance Chair, Calvin Say, and his members and all the staff. I know you folks have put in a lot of time and a lot of heart into the budget.

"I wanted to highlight a few things that Chairman Say did not speak about in the area of social services. Social services is the third largest portion of the State budget, third to government-wide support services which is number one, and lower education which is number two. Our budget for fiscal year 1993-1994 in the House version is approximately \$847,000,000, and in fiscal year 1994-1995 -- \$887,000,000.

"Some good news about the purchase of services which originally, in the administration budget, was cut either fifty percent, some of them even zeroed out. Our domestic violence programs and youth shelters like Hale Kipa, and other purchase of services have been restored to 85 percent of the 100 percent that was the originally allocated budget amount in 1992. So at least we have spared the social service agencies from having to close down.

"I think our priority was to at least maintain operations. We are close to that. We don't anticipate if this funding goes through and even higher, that any one program will totally close which we were very fearful of. We want to continue the spectrum of services for the elderly and for our youth, and I thank the Finance Chair and members for that.

"Also, with regards to the number of purchase of services that we've seen grow over the years, there has been concern about us having increases in that area, and I think part of it is because, as a body, we wanted privatize our services to agencies that are a lot more cost effective as Representative Marumoto has put it. One of the problems that we still need to address is how to monitor and evaluate the effectiveness of these private agencies as well as our State agencies so we can maximize our State dollars.

"There is an initiative called **The Families Together Initiative** which utilizes existing State monies for the purpose of child abuse and neglect prevention programs. What it does is it clumps that money, identifies it, says ... hey, federal government, this is what we're spending for child abuse and neglect prevention type programs -- please match it. And this initiative will be bringing in additional federal dollars that we can use to supplement our social services.

"I think in our economic situation and it is quite serious for our families that we have tried in this budget to address their needs. I hope that with the Council on Revenues projections that we are anticipating this month, that there will be an increase, and I know there's still time and room for increases in this area to occur, and I hope that our House and Senate will work together to support the families of our State.

"Thank you."

Representative Bainum then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"The Finance Committee, under the shining leadership of Representative Say, showed great environmental sensitivity in this budget when our current economic environment could have attempted others to do otherwise.

"As Chair of the Energy and Environmental Committee, I thank you, the EEP Committee thanks you, and most importantly, our children who inherit the environment we live in thank you."

Representative Arakaki then rose to speak in favor of the bill, "with just a few reservations," stating:

"While I do have some concerns about certain items in this budget, I must laud the efforts of Chairman Say, his members and staff for the yeoman work that they have done thus far. I know they've got much to do and many long hours to complete this process.

"I think you remember, Mr. Speaker, at the beginning of session when we all attended the Red Mass at which Bishop Quinn told us, and I paraphrase: The greatest priorities of the State and the country are not priorities of the budget. They are the priorities of human needs.

"At this point, I am convinced that our Finance Chair and the Committee members are seeking to put people's needs first. Perhaps the open decision-making process has helped to make these priorities clear. I applaud the Finance Chair for utilizing savings from the refinancing of bonds to allay the need for a health care provider tax. I also applaud the Finance Committee and also the Department of Human Services for utilizing federal funds drawn down through federal matches from the families to get initiative that will restore much of the purchase of service programs which are critically underfunded in the Governor's budget.

"At this point, I would also like to urge the Finance Committee and their Senate counterparts to continue to be creative in their efforts to search for more funds to preclude a freeze on eligibility for public assistance, especially in the area of AFDC, our aid to families with dependent children. We will need about \$4.6-million of State funds which will also be matched by another \$4.6-million in federal funds to care for the eight hundred to twelve hundred families that may be left out because of this freeze. I am hoping that the Senate and our House money committees can find these funds.

"Two years ago, six million dollars was requested to fund an emergency tourism promotion program. Six million dollars was also requested for children and adolescent mental health programs. Well, tourism got their six million dollars immediately while children and adolescent mental health programs went through a long process and ended up with about one-third of their request. Well, we know the result of what happened in children and adolescent mental health. They were in a state of shambles and many kids are being hurt by that. But today, I've yet to see an accounting, or for that matter, any results from the six million dollars of emergency appropriation we provided for tourism promotion. I think it's time we look very hard at where our moneys are going. Maybe it's time we discard the fiscal policies of trickle down economics. I think the American voters recognized the economics of the past twelve years of Reagan and Bush resulted in those at the bottom being, as Governor Waihee put it, trickled on instead of receiving the benefits of trickle down. One of the previous speakers said, 'you've got to spend money to make money.' Well, I can't find that anywhere in the Constitution that government exists to make money. I know it does say though that we ought to use public funds to meet human needs.

"I also join my colleague in applauding the Finance Committee Chair and his committee for its efforts to hold the Department of Health's feet to the fire to utilize our precious State funds to draw down additional federal funds in children and adolescent mental health. We are going to need those six million dollars for there's a potential to double that if we use them prudently.

"And finally, Mr. Speaker, the budget provides substantial increases in our education budget, over and above the Governor's zero-growth budget, and I think this is clearly an indication of the House's priority being placed in education.

"A part of that education budget includes a \$1.5-million appropriation for our special needs schools in Kalihi. Mr. Speaker, this past Tuesday evening, even though we had a long day, I attended a community meeting of students, parents and teachers of which over five hundred people attended to talk about special needs funding and what it meant to them. And anytime you can get over five hundred people to attend a meeting in Kalihi, you know people are concerned.

"I want to beg your indulgence and the members' indulgence, but I do want to share something that one child said, and she's a fifth grader at Kapalama Elementary School, and I would like to read what she said: 'My name is Bridgette Salacup and I am speaking on behalf of my fellow students at Kapalama Elementary School. I believe in education and I love school, but in order for me to succeed and reach my dreams, I need help. My Dad was a farmer from the Philippines and he never finished school. After they left the Philippines, my father could not find a job and my mother worked in a hospital. They always believed in education and always reminded me that I need to study and finish school. Mom always said that school was first, and I want to go to college and become a doctor, but I don't know if I can because it seems to be hard and cost a lot. My teacher says that if I study hard, nothing will be too hard and I may even win a scholarship to send me to medical school and become a doctor.

"My teachers have talked about Special Needs Schools and the extra money that we receive to help us. I really didn't understand at first because I thought that my school was okay and the teachers were doing fine and didn't need help. But when I found out about all the extras that we're receiving, then I had to wonder about the schools that don't get enough money.

"Governor Waihee has always said that education is supposed to be number one priority. Sometimes we wonder about this when you begin to get raises and our teachers do not. You buy expensive koa benches while we sit on broken plastic chairs. You have air conditioners while we study in a hot room with a lot of noise outside. You bought a beautiful mural worth thousands of dollars which could have bought many more books for children, or even begin a cafeteria for Linapuni School. You can take free trips to islands and states and countries while we can't even afford to go to the zoo or the aquarium. You quickly carpet your floors while we sit on tile. You would never think of sitting on a chair that doesn't spin around. Your \$5,000 allowance can buy more teachers, equipment, and books. Your \$5,000 can help to improve my education so that I can become a doctor to help my friends and family in Kalihi. I don't even get an allowance, even if my Dad works two jobs and my mother works one. While you are living so comfortably with all the wonderful things in your temporary tower, the workers and leaders of tomorrow are being deprived. Your job is part-time, my job is full-time, and I think you are forgetting this. You and your family's welfare depend on me and my friends. One day,

you may need to come to me as your doctor. Don't you want the best?

"Remember our DOE's theme song -- **CHILDREN LIKE ME** -- which was written by your fellow legislator, Representative Terrance Tom.

"Hear our voices! Please help us! Show us that you care!"

"This made me think about the Emperor's new clothes. It took a child to recognize and say that the Emperor had no clothes. Sometimes here, we hear all the things that we want to hear but we forget what's going on out there and what people are saying in the community. But I think our children will be watching us, Mr. Speaker, and they will judge us whether our commitment to our physical comforts and financial security will be matched by an equal or greater commitment to providing the needed resources to invest in their future. Otherwise, they will know that we shall be like the Emperor with no clothes.

"At this point, Mr. Speaker, I remain very hopeful, and I urge our Finance Committee to continue their good work.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Representative Alcon then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to tell everybody that this is my second term of serving with the Finance Committee and I find the Finance Committee to be very open, willing to provide all the information that is needed, and the Chairman also instructed the members of the Committee that if they want further information, that they could go to the different departments. Mr. Speaker, the Finance Committee headed by Chairman Say was very open. It provided all the information that was asked for and I don't see why some members of the Finance Committee still chastise.

"This is the most open Finance Committee that I have ever served under, Mr. Speaker, and I want to thank my colleagues for helping Kalihi, even if we didn't get more money for the at-risk or the special needs. We kept it at \$140 per student but I know for a fact and plead -- I know Senator McCartney is somewhere around here -- that the Senate will raise it to \$300 per student.

"I would also like to inform you, Mr. Speaker, that Kalihi or Waianae are not the only places for special needs. I think one of the areas that needed more special needs is in Kauai, and Chairman Say has provided for them.

"As the President has said, Mr. Speaker, we all have to sacrifice. Unfortunately, we did not raise the tax because I had wanted to tax the rich for the poor. So, Mr. Speaker, we got to where we are, not because we wanted to, but then we got to where we are because of the national leadership that we have been having. The leadership in Washington sent us orders to do this, to do that, but there wasn't even one penny that came along with it so we had to bear the brunt and we forget, Mr. Speaker, that the new President is trying to solve all the mess that we have done for the past twelve years.

"Thank you."

Representative Ward then rose and responded:

"To keep the record straight, I meant no chastisement for Chairman Say, but with his wisdom we are where we

are today, and I rather mean that to praise him, but it is the process that he inherited. It's like we haven't voted in committees for seventeen years -- this year we are doing it. He's running the best process of what we have is the vehicle for Finance, and I want to be very clear there were no personalities nor individuals, or his staff, suggested.

"Thank you."

Representative O'Kieffe then rose on a point of information and asked:

"The previous speaker mentioned all the undoing of the past twelve years, blaming it on Reagan and Bush. . .

At this point, the Chair interrupted and ruled Representative O'Kieffe out of order, whereupon Representative O'Kieffe thanked the Chair.

Representative Lee then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I think I have learned a great deal by listening to everyone present its own views about the budget. What I find extraordinary is the admission by our distinguished colleague from East Honolulu that he's now finally discovered that the fault is not with the Legislature but with the executive, and he's actually quite right. This is the problem that has happened during the last twelve years.

"You know, I think it's good to put everything in perspective. The reason why we cannot do very much this year is because the economy is down. When the economy is up, it generates jobs, it generates profits for businesses, it generates taxes, and we were able to fund a lot of things. When the economy is down, we don't have the money to do these things so, therefore, it's very difficult. But I would like to point out a very important fact why we are in as good a shape as one can expect during a period of slowdown in the economy. The reason is that we have been able to put aside moneys, we have been able to plan ahead so that when private construction goes down, the State can go ahead with public construction.

"But the best thing that ever happened during the last twelve years, Mr. Speaker, is that the State of Hawaii has brought down its public indebtedness. In 1980, the State of Hawaii had a very high public debt. It was the seventh highest in the nation among the different states on a per capita basis. Ten years later, we've brought our debt down to a point we were twenty-two. In other words, we came from one of the highest in debt to about average in debt, and it's a very important point to remember now when we fund a lot of our construction with bonds because we did at one time doing it with cash.

"Let us contrast what the State of Hawaii has done these last ten years with what has happened in Washington during the ten or twelve years. When Mr. Reagan became President, he inherited a public debt of seven hundred billion dollars from President Carter. That seven hundred billion dollars was the result of two hundred years of borrowing. Eight years later, the debt went up to three trillion; four years later when Mr. Clinton became President, the debt is four trillion. This is the reason why I would like to present this historic reason why we are able to do what we can.

"It is very important we continue the prudent management that has characterized the State of Hawaii in the last ten years, and I speak very, very heartily in support of the bill before us.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Amaral then rose to speak in favor of the bill, with reservations, stating:

"I was not intending to speak, Mr. Speaker, because I felt that perhaps one of my colleagues would mention this. Having not heard it as of yet, I stand to make the point.

"First, before I do, my commendations to the Committee on Finance, its Chair and Vice Chair, for work that is truly labor-intensive, time-consuming, and thankless. I believe the effort that they have put forward has been an excellent one, and so any reservations I hold with respect to the budget has nothing to do with the Chair and Vice Chair's work nor with the work of the committee.

"Rather, Mr. Speaker, I believe that we have ignored what is the most obvious -- either we're not reading the newspapers today or we are hesitant to discuss this on the floor -- and that is that perhaps we have available to ourselves somewhere between fifty million and two hundred million dollars in uncollected delinquent taxes. That amount of money is actually the difference between a program for victims of sexual assault, or none. It actually spells out the difference between a bed for a runaway child, or none. It actually means a difference between textbooks or cafeteria for your child or mine, or none. I wonder why it is we're not talking about this.

"I am troubled also that at a time when we have all decided to tighten our belts and not begin any new programs, not initiate any new creative ventures that our Legislature is so infamous for ... at this time we do, however, include in our budget a new initiative by the Governor, and that is Families Together. That program, in fact, has taken away from existing programs. I wonder at the fact that none of us talked about the cut to Hale Kipa. I wonder that none of us talked about the cut to the youth gang response system that has been nationally reknown.

"I am troubled by a response and a process that seems to be one of columns and figures and pencils and paper tabulations when, in fact, we have forgotten the person that is sleeping in the bushes on the State Capitol grounds that we pass every evening.

"I am troubled by this budget, and the only thing that gives me faith is that I know the process is not done and we will have the opportunity to continue to remedy this huge neglect.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Young then rose to call for the question and to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Our bills have crossed over in a timely manner, our budget is balanced, and our opinion statements on concerns about the budget have been very eloquently expressed today. Our message to the administration is clear ... the path to reinventing government is marked by signs that read fairness, accountability, reform. The press release referred to earlier very accurately stated that it was on the passage of the Second Reading.

"I ask my colleagues now that we applaud the work of the Finance Committee, the Finance staff, Chair Say, Vice Chair Bertha Kawakami, for the good work that they provided. I ask my colleagues that you vote unanimously for the passage of this bill on Third Reading.

"I call for the question.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1152, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes, with Representatives Apo, Menor, Okamura and Tajiri being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 1152 had passed Third Reading at 2:53 o'clock p.m.

H.B. No. 203, HD 1:

Representative Say moved that H.B. No. 203, HD 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Kawakami.

Representative Tom rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this bill was structured in recognition of the need to create a balanced budget for the State and in light of the current economic uncertainties, it provides for a continuation of operations and current expenditure rates.

"This budget, Mr. Speaker, provides for \$85.3-million in general funds for court operations and related activities, and \$1.8-million in special funds for the driver's education program for each fiscal year of the biennium budget period. This means that the on-going, essential court operations will continue; that is, all previously authorized Circuit, District and Family Court Divisions are provided for in this budget.

"There is much funding on programs here for people programs such as domestic violence services, juvenile shelter facilities, rehabilitation and treatment activities, and the mediation and alternative dispute resolution.

"And although the Judiciary's request for capital improvement funding has been reduced, continued funding has been provided for continued plan and design work associated with the Hilo Complex, the land purchase, and design of Koolaupoko District Court, and a reduced level of funding for remodeling and upgrade efforts related to the Judiciary buildings statewide.

"I just want to say, Mr. Speaker, in conclusion, the bottom line is that for the Judiciary to be able to have sufficient funds to take care of the consumers -- for those who want their day in court -- my only concern is that although today's austere budget we have now that our judges and our court personnel, at their current numbers, will be able to take on the awesome additional caseload which has grown substantially in the areas, especially drunk driving and domestic abuse, and still maintain that positive outlook.

"I want to acknowledge, if I may, Mr. Speaker, finally, two individuals who I feel have done tremendously for this budget and will continue to.

"The first guy I was looking for in the chambers and I think I see him on the top right hand with the white shirt and the avocado tie -- it's Clyde Namuo. I hope you're still awake, Clyde. Clyde came down today because he's going to see Calvin afterwards and still try to find more money for the Judiciary budget.

"The second person I especially want to thank is my colleague and friend, Calvin Say, and I know I heard you moan back there, Calvin. You've had a lot of accolades today, but you deserve it and you better take it while you can because it's a long road up there. Beneath this quiet

and shy guy, let me tell you one thing that no one has mentioned. I've always told Chairman Say that he's always been ahead of his time and that's true ... he's taught me a lot of what I know -- about life and about the Legislature. He's been a tremendous influence to me personally and I want to recognize that. I'll tell you one thing this man has done. You take a dried orange that's squeezed all the blood, sweat and tears out of it, and this man has been able to even squeeze more. But I want to congratulate the Finance Committee and Chairman Say. I know that we've got a long way to go but it's going to be very successful under his leadership.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 203, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE JUDICIARY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes, with Representatives Apo, Menor, Okamura and Tajiri being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 203 had passed Third Reading at 2:57 o'clock p.m.

H.B. No. 195, HD 1:

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION (FLOOR PRESENTATION)

H.R. On motion by Representative Young, seconded by Representative Baker and carried, H.R. No. 297 was adopted.

Representative Young then rose and introduced the honoree, Tamar Chotzen; her father, Walter Chotzen; her mother, Carla Chotzen; Kenneth Kupchak and Don Carroll, trustees of the Nature Center, who were seated on the Chamber floor; and Mr. Barney Tsuruda, her husband, who was seated (by his choice) in the gallery, and asked them all to stand to be recognized.

Representative Young continued:

"Two weeks ago, I received a letter from Warren Haig, President of the Hawaii Nature Center, and it began: 'Something wonderful has happened,' and he proceeded to announce the prestigious award to be presented to Tamar Chotzen.

"This is truly an event full of wonders that the United Nations had so recognized a child of Hawaii. As Executive Director of the Hawaii Nature Center since 1986, Tamar expanded membership and community support for the Center's hands-on environmental education program for 4 to 12-year-old children, investigate stream life, take forest walks, catch insects on a 'safari' and share other direct experiences with nature, thus developing a caring attitude, a respect, and aloha for the land.

"As an example of her desire to include everyone in learning about nature, she reached out to us, the members of the Legislature, in her own special way. Knowing how difficult it is for us to see the forest, through the mounds of paper on our desks, paper which came from trees in some faraway forest, so it was that about two months ago we all received an invitation to the Nature Center. If you will recall, inside was a maile leaf that came with the invitation, and the instructions were to crush the leaf, breathe in the wonderful maile fragrance and imagine being in a forest -- listening to the sounds, feeling, sensing, dreaming. She managed to bring us into her world in a very simple, hands-on, but special way. Truly something wonderful is happening in the lives of the

children of all ages whose lives were in some way touched by the work of Tamar Chotzen.

"Mr. Speaker, several of my colleagues are planing to speak and to add to my brief comments by noting that on the Nature Center's fax cover sheet is a quote by Rachel Carson that exemplifies the spirit of the work Tamar and all of the people associated with the Nature Center has done. It says, 'If a child is to keep alive an inborn sense of wonder without any such gift from the fairies, a child needs the companionship of at least one adult who can share it, rediscovering together the joy, excitement and mystery of the world we live in.'

"Mr. Speaker, we are so honored today to be recognizing Tamar Chotzen. Just a few minutes ago outside, as we were waiting for the session to begin, she asked, 'How can I get to the podium?' So I said, 'Teach the members of the Legislature about what you're doing,' and the answer was, 'Of course.' The last person we had there was Bishop Desmond Tutu who won the Nobel Prize, and we may have her eventually on the podium speaking to us so -- congratulations, Tamar.

"To the trustees of the Nature Center, to your parents, your family, your friends, and to the staff and volunteers with the Nature Center -- congratulations!"

Representative Shon then rose and stated:

"I think it's very important to recognize one of the primary ways in which we teach ourselves and teach our parents is through our children, and the Nature Center, along with other organizations like Nature Conservancy and others, are bringing together more and more adverse elements of this community to recognize the central role that our natural environment plays in our lives, in ways that are very positive and very forward-looking. I imagine that there are many, many conversations that go on in households as a result of Tamar and the Nature Center. It goes something like ... gee, Mom and Dad, why are they paving over this or that natural area? Why aren't we preserving this or that bird? How come that species is no longer with us? Why didn't you folks do more? How can we do more? It's that kind of conversation and that kind of love of the natural world and of our resources that I think is being fostered here so that all of us, hopefully, are going to be confronted, one way or another, by many of those children who have gone through the Nature Center and held accountable to their dreams, and to our dreams as well, that we are truly integrated in this world with the aina.

"And I am very honored to be able to congratulate Tamar and the rest of the folks at the Nature Center for what is part of a growing movement that teaches us in very quiet and personal and important ways that we are all connected.

"Thank you."

Representative Bainum then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to congratulate Ms. Chotzen on her work. I don't know if the members realize this last weekend there was an environmental business conference on Maui, and it proved to me that not only is Ms. Chotzen a leader in Hawaii, but throughout the nation. I was a representative there for the United Nations and spoke of her leadership and her expertise. We are indeed very fortunate to have her in our State.

"Thank you."

Representative Takumi then rose and stated:

"I think it goes without saying that Ms. Chotzen would not be here without her parents, and although I didn't have the privilege of knowing Tamar, I do know her parents, Carla and Walter well, and they have had a lifetime commitment to bettering the quality of life in our community, and it's no surprise that they've passed on this commitment to their children.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Stegmaier then rose and stated:

"As a present parent of a Kaiser High School student, I want to express my great pride in one of several outstanding graduates of Kaiser High School. And I also, as Representative Takumi just mentioned, want to acknowledge the contributions that Mr. and Mrs. Chotzen have made in raising, not only the person that we are honoring today, but a group of seven siblings -- eight children altogether -- who have made tremendous contributions to our society in a number of different areas. You've done a remarkable job of parenting -- in raising such vibrant, versatile, resourceful and generous children, and we thank you."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"As a consultant with the United Nations on the off-session and a past UN adviser in Africa, I'm particularly delighted that we have this award on the floor today and we have this awardee, not only because she went to Kaiser, but because she is bringing the world to us today. She is bringing our attention to the fact that there are another 266 countries, and there are another five billion people, to again reinforce the fact that international relations in Hawaii are of utmost importance.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Young presented Ms. Tamar Chotzen with a Certificate of Recognition, and floral leis were presented to the honorees by various Representatives.

The House of Representatives of the Seventeenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1993, convened at 12:07 o'clock p.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Pastor Iope Fale of the Cup of Freedom UCC, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Hagino, Herkes, Shon and Takamine, who were excused.

The Clerk proceeded to read the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Thirty-First Day.

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journal of the Thirty-First Day was approved.

ORDER OF THE DAY**INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION
(FLOOR PRESENTATION)**

H.R. No. 316, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING MARCH AS 'PROFESSIONAL SOCIAL WORKERS' MONTH', AND HONORING ALL THE PROFESSIONAL SOCIAL WORKERS IN THE STATE OF HAWAII," was jointly offered by Representatives Yonamine, Santiago and Arakaki and was read by the Clerk.

On motion by Representative Santiago, seconded by Representative Arakaki and carried, H.R. No. 316 was adopted.

Representative Yonamine rose and proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and colleagues, I am privileged to speak on the House resolution which recognizes the National Social Workers' Month and the Hawaii Chapter of the National Association of Social Workers. The Hawaii Chapter, as mentioned, was founded in 1955. It now has unit chapters on all neighbor islands and they have over 800 active members, several hundred affiliate members who are retired social workers, other active social workers, and students in the School of Social Work, friends and supporters.

"Today, we honor and commend this organization which serves as a point guard for the thousands of dedicated persons in the health professions. You all know that social work professionals work, as mentioned in the presentation. In addition, social workers now are involved in all public and private sectors' delivery of services such as juvenile justice, gerontology, and many other program areas that I can't possibly list this morning.

"The images of social workers have also changed with the times and the needs. Our social work was called 'charity work' in the Elizabethan times, conducted by well-to-do citizens who provided comfort, relief, food and other provisions to the inmates of what was called the insane asylums. Other than those religious institutions, the work with the poor, the disadvantaged, the neglected, was done by our English forefathers and foremothers.

"In the United States, social work took a very serious systematic and organized turn into a profession with work with the immigrants from Europe and in-migrants from the rural communities throughout the United States and major metropolitan areas. But for a time, however, our forerunners were also called 'friendly helpers' -- cheerful, friendly, compassionate persons who, among others, would leave a food basket and provisions on the footsteps of a house of a needy family and then steal away unseen. And then on the other hand, in the height of the civil rights movement and the empowerment of the neighborhoods throughout the 60s and 70s, you have a portrait of community organizers who brought about community change and strategizing about power relationships, self-determination and community control, the increased grassroots organizations and mobilizations and you found these in the back of the yards in Chicago and the South side of Chicago as a beginning of what is now called community organizations.

"Today, the social work profession is still deeply rooted in its efforts to meet human needs and to assure quality care and services for all. This profession continues to work on increasing awareness of the problems of society, initiating new knowledge and methodologies in our work with people and it's very open to change in the way program services are formulated, organized, delivered and, most of all, financed.

"The Hawaii Chapter is increasingly involved to mobilize new talents, to count on their proven skills and experiences of all practitioners, and to maximize the resources in order to extend effective services to Hawaii's children, families, and individuals.

"This month we recognize the social workers. This profession, with these three people we honor today, this profession and this chapter continues to work with all concerned entities, the Legislature, the executive departments, the volunteers and board members of all private sector agencies, the front line workers and policy makers, the universities, and most importantly, the people -- the consumers -- the people we want to serve. We need to reaffirm again and again that investing in the future of Hawaii means the immediate attention and care of people in the present.

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, I am very pleased to honor three people here."

Representative Yonamine asked the following honorees to stand to be recognized: John Tomoso who is the President of the Hawaii Chapter from Maui; Dean Pat Ewalt from the School of Social Work, University of Hawaii; Debbie Shimizu, the Executive Director of the Hawaii Chapter, NSW, and a close friend and classmate of Representative Ishii-Morikami.

Representative Yonamine then asked members of the Board of Directors and members of the PAC Committee of the NSW, who were seated in the gallery, to stand to be recognized.

Representative Yonamine continued:

"So under your leadership, Mr. Tomoso, I congratulate you for your directions and visions that you give to the chapter and to all of the many dedicated members of your chapter and the people that you represent.

"Thank you very much for being here."

Representative Santiago then rose and stated:

"As a practicing professional in the field, it is with great pride and honor that I share these brief comments with you today, Mr. Speaker. It was about ten years that as a second year student -- and I see the Dean sitting over there from the University -- as a second year practicum student, I learned a lot about social work. Needless to say, my practicum instructor was none other than Representative Yonamine. I needed to acknowledge that because I learned quite a lot from him during my second year as a social work student at the University.

"I just wanted to share with you today that the work of those of us who are line-level social workers have, in the past, gone for the most part, unrecognized, and I think it's about time we did acknowledge the work that social workers have done for those of us in society and even though the profession has gone somewhat unrecognized, countless of people have been touched in very positive ways by those of us in the profession -- dedicated professionals, compassionate individuals -- whose commitment in this day and age has not diminished, and I believe that as we enter into the 90s, the role of the social workers will become even more crucial for our society. And I am confident that with the help of those of us in the Legislature, those in the profession will meet those challenges and exceed any of our expectations.

"I thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Arakaki then rose and stated:

"You know, Mr. Speaker and colleagues, I have a quote prominently displayed on my desk and it reads: 'The measure of a man or woman's value is a degree to which he has made a difference in the lives of those he has touched.' It is a credo which I try to live by and a driving force for me, and I would guess for many of my colleagues as to why we choose to serve here in the Legislature. I think most of us feel that we can honestly make a difference in the lives of the people we serve to make them better such as the fire that burns in many of Hawaii's social workers. It is a fire that drives them to seek to improve the lives of our families, our children, our elderly, and our disabled. It is not the financial rewards as the pay scale for social workers remain as a profession relatively low. It is not the recognition for social workers as a profession and as individuals remain unsung and unappreciated as they dedicate their time and energy to those in our society that many will not even acknowledge.

"Our social workers, day in and day out, are given the monumental task of putting lives and families together and keeping them together -- lives that are shattered and broken by poverty and homelessness, domestic violence, abuse and neglect, and catastrophic illness and disability. As in the nursery rhyme ... 'All the king's horses and all the king's men couldn't put Humpty Dumpty together again.' But if they were to call social workers, they probably could have done it -- piece by piece -- no matter how long it took. And this is what they do in rehabilitating lives here in Hawaii.

"And it is said, Mr. Speaker, that our society will be judged, not by how many buildings and edifices we create, but by the care and compassion we provide for those who are in the dawn of their lives -- our children; those who are in the sunset of their lives -- our elderly; and those who are in the twilight of their lives -- our disabled. So our social workers are the soldiers in the trenches and in the front line of society who will provide the care and compassion that we will be judged by.

"So I ask that you and all my colleagues join in acknowledging the work that they do and to show our appreciation for them.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Amaral then rose and stated:

"I just wanted to add acknowledgement to this wonderful professional group of people. I have known and worked with social workers since I entered policing in 1975. I think half of the work that I have done could not have been accomplished without their presence and it's important, I think, to acknowledge that the whole support for victims and that effort has come from the field of the social workers, and we deeply appreciate their presence. I think if it were not for social workers, much of the work that we do here in public service could not be accomplished, and so this is recognition duly deserved.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At this time, Certificates of Recognition were presented to Mr. Tomoso by Representative Yonamine and to Dean Ewalt by Representative Takumi, and floral leis were presented to the honorees by Representatives Ishii-Morikami and Ihara.

At 12:27 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

One national poll had them ranked 27th, the AP poll had them ranked 19th in the country; nevertheless,

teams that ranked much lower were selected and invited to participate in the national tournament.

"It's a real insult to the Wahine team, to Coach Vince Goo, to the University, and indeed to the entire State, and I feel that the NCAA Selection Committee owes the Wahine team an apology, and I do hope that next year we will have a level playing court to play on, that we have a new chairman of that Selection Committee and a new committee, and a new chance for our Wahine to shine.

"Thank you very much."

At 12:33 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:34 o'clock p.m.

Representative Lee then rose and stated:

"We will have a floor presentation later on to honor the UH basketball team for their outstanding season.

"The purpose of this resolution is quite clear -- to protest exclusion -- and we want to do it in the spirit of a fine gentleman -- Adlai Stevenson. He was a fine gentleman of great erudition and dignity. He said after his defeat that it hurts too much to laugh but he was too old to cry, and we would like to offer this resolution with the same dignity and ask that all the members accept the resolution in that spirit -- with dignity.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 359 was adopted.

At this time, Representative Baker, on behalf of the members of the House, extended birthday greetings to Representative Chumbley.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

At this time, H.R. No. 360, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION HONORING HAWAIIAN EDUCATORS," which was jointly offered by Representatives Beirne and Amaral on March 19, 1993, was taken from the Clerk's desk and read by the Clerk.

On motion by Representative Beirne, seconded by Representative Apo and carried, H.R. No. 360 was adopted.

Representative Beirne then rose and stated in Hawaiian:

"ALOHA NO

"E NA KUMU KAULANA
"NA KUPUNA 'EU A ME
"NA MAMO O HAWAII NEI

"O KEIA LA HANO HANO MAMA KE NO HO'I AU E HA'AWI AKU I KU'U ALOHA PIHA IA 'OUKOU NO KO 'OUKOU A'O ANA MAU I NA PO'E PILI KO'O HAWAII A ME NA LAHUI 'E A'E.

"ULU MAU A'E NA 'OPIO MA MULI O KO 'OUKOU KAKO'O ANA MAI I NA LEHULEHU.

"HE LA HA'AHEO NO HO'I KEIA NO NA HAWAII KAULANA.

"E HOLOMUA 'OUKOU PAKAHI ME KE ALAKA'I A KE AKUA MANA LOA.

"NA KE AKUA E HO'OPOMAIIKA'I MAU IA 'OUKOU.

"O 'OUKOU NA MAMO O HAWAII NEI."

"Mr. Speaker and my colleagues, I am saying:

'Greetings to the famous teachers, active elders and descendants of Hawaii ... on this honored day, I would like to give my love to all of you for all of your continuous teaching of our Hawaiian people as well as educating other nations.

'The youth continue to grow with your support for the public welfare.

'This is indeed a proud day for the famous Hawaiians.

'May you all continue with the guidance of the Lord and may you all be blessed continuously.

'All of you are indeed proud descendants of Hawaii.'

Representative Beirne continued:

"Mr. Speaker, I would just like to share a few words on Rubellite Johnson. She's very, very special to me as are the rest of the kupunas. She's not only special to me, but she is also a professor in my studies towards my Bachelor's degree in Hawaiian Studies. Rubellite Johnson is known for her articulate manner of Hawaiian language and in speaking the Hawaiian language. She is also a professor of Hawaiian mythology and she's known throughout the Hawaiian community as the 'jewel' of our Hawaiian community.

"I want to also share, Mr. Speaker, that Rubellite Johnson descends from the Kinney family, and they hail from the 46th District as well in the Kualoa region. It is my privilege and honor this day to share this 'jewel' among our Hawaiian people.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker and my colleagues."

Representative Arakaki then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to say a few words about my friend, Jack Yama.

"I remember when I was growing up, there use to be a cartoon and the cartoon use to say, 'He's everywhere! He's everywhere!' That was Roger Ramsey, but that could also describe my friend Jack Yama. I know he's been at several schools in the Kalihi area. I think in behalf of the Kalihi gang -- Representative Alcon, Representative Cachola and Representative Chun -- we really know the kind of work that he's done. He's

provided a kind and understanding ear to all the students besides teaching them a lot of things. We also know that he is also a co-member of the Kalakaua Lions with Representative Cachola and myself, and an active member of the Kalihi/Palama Community Council, and the Lanakila Senior Center. You know, he spends more time in Kalihi than a lot of us who live in Kalihi do even though he lives in Aiea. So I think, if anything, we'd probably have to recognize him as the Honorary Mayor of Kalihi. He's everywhere and he gets involved in everything and everything that he does, he puts his heart and soul into, and I think we're really grateful for all that he's done over the years for our community, so I would like to say 'mahalo' ... thank you very much for all your time and efforts.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Amaral then rose and stated:

"I also would like to add my aloha to the kupunas that have joined us today and especially to acknowledge a dear friend of mine, and that is Harriet O'Sullivan.

"Harriet and I are members together in Alii Pauahi Hawaiian Civic Club which has the distinction of being the smallest club and the largest troublemakers -- yeah, Harriet? We're good that way. And everything that I have learned by way of troublemaking, I have learned from my dear friend Harriet.

"Harriet is one of those people that when she ended her career in education in 1974 as the District Director of Special Education, instead of actually retiring, she then began a second career as a planner and coordinator in human services, continued on as President of the Girl Scouts of the Pacific. She is now President of the Foundation for Hawaiian Women's History, and she continues to assist the Office of Hawaiian Affairs in their Kupuna Program. So to say that Harriet is a busy woman, it is truly an understatement.

"Harriet's community network allows an interplay of resources on behalf of Hawaiian students and she believes strongly in family values which teach individual responsibility.

"Aloha, my friend, and mahalo for your good work."

Representative Alcon then rose and stated:

"I'd like to pay tribute to my dear friend, Mr. Pi'ianai'a. Mr. Pi'ianai'a and I go all the way back to the late 60s. He was also the Director of Hawaiian Home Lands, and he had all his white hair then and he still has all of them today, Mr. Speaker.

"But it is nice to know that he is continuing to help the Hawaiian community, and my aloha and mahalo for all his services.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Apo then rose and stated:

"I want to thank Representative Beirne for providing us the opportunity to have this presentation. As you recall, it had been the custom several years ago ... the Hongwanji Mission use to offer up a select 'Living Treasures' which we would always bring to the floor and we apparently stopped that practice, as I recall, last year. And I think we have here before us today our own version in coming from Hawaiians, basically four 'Living Treasures,' and I look at this ceremony as being every bit as important.

"Mr. Pi'ianai'a and I go back a long ways also. I was one of the people who looked up and admired him. I just want to make the point, Mr. Speaker, that both Mr. Pi'ianai'a and the other three honorees today ... I first knew of them back around 1975 when two of the most critical and important events that have led us to this day where we're talking about a Hawaiian nation and sovereignty and all those heavy issues. When other Hawaiians were making the headlines and were out there, in sort of I guess you would call the glamour positions, specifically Protect Kahoolawe Ohana, when everyday the front pages were talking about that issue and those people who were involved in that effort, and the Hokulea Project was just getting underway, and people like Herb Kane and others were involved.

"Meanwhile, these four people were sitting quietly, doing the really hard work of carrying on the day-to-day task, tending to the Hawaiian people and making sure that we had a strong educational foundation, and I believe that they are as important a part to the sovereignty movement as anyone else who perhaps got more press, and I want to congratulate them for that today.

"Mr. Pi'ianai'a, of course, his record of accomplishment is listed in the resolution, and I want to congratulate him specifically because I had a relationship with him.

"Thank you."

Representative Okamura then rose and stated:

"I would also like to say a few comments on behalf of Mr. Jack Yama.

"Mr. Speaker, in a year declared by the United Nations as the 'Year of the World's Indigenous People,' it is no coincidence that we are here today to honor the four individuals, including Mr. Jack Yama, for their contributions to the education of the Hawaiian people. Mr. Yama's contributions to the Hawaiian people are immense and as Representative Arakaki stated, he is spending more time in Kalihi. But in addition to that, he is almost a life-long resident of Aiea and has made tremendous contributions there as a leader also.

"To the Hawaiian community, in addition to what was stated in the resolution, he is a member of the King Kamehameha Hawaiian Civic Club and he has donated his time to help raising scholarship money to assist young Hawaiians to further their education. Also as President of the Lanakila Seniors' Hawaiian Club, he has initiated visits to elderly Hawaiian residents at Lunalilo Home, bringing donations of food, money and entertainment. In his most recent project, Mr. Yama has been sharing his expertise in Hawaiian herbal medicine and health care to the youth in our public school system and community. Mr. Yama's contributions to the State of Hawaii and its people go far beyond all of these things. He is a symbol of what we in Hawaii call the aloha spirit.

"There is an old saying, Mr. Speaker ... 'There was a man, they called him Mad. The more he gave, the more he had.' The saying must be true because in Mr. Yama's case, he has a lot -- a lot of respect, a lot of love and admiration from the thousands of individuals, both young and old, whose lives that he has touched.

"On behalf of the people of Hawaii, I thank you Jack Yama, for all that you have done and all the hearts that you have touched.

"Also, Mr. Speaker, just for clarification ... Representative Beirne asked me to say a few words on his

behalf and she asked me to handle Mr. Yama since he is Japanese. Just for clarification, Mr. Yama is part-Hawaiian.

"Thank you."

Representative Tam then rose and stated:

"I am most gratified to see a good friend and former teacher of mine. Much has been said about Mr. Pi'ianai'a who is a long-time friend of many of my colleagues -- Representative Peter Apo and Representative Alcon -- but believe it or not, he was my professor at the University of Hawaii. And people ask me why am I such a rebel. Well, he is responsible for that. He taught me about culture and the history of Hawaii, and I really appreciate being one of his students in the past.

"Thank you."

Representative Marumoto then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would be remiss if I didn't tell you that Harriet O'Sullivan has spent many, many hours with the Girl Scouts, and I had the pleasure of meeting and working with her under these circumstances, and we really should thank her for all the hours she has devoted to this cause.

"And Dr. Pi'ianai'a, I'm sure if you look at him and his wife today, you'll find out where Alema, their daughter, got her white hair. He is a very learned scholar and a man of moderation and great wisdom and a big heart, and I'm glad to see us honoring him here today.

"Thank you."

Representative Beirne then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would just like to add a few words on Professor Pi'ianai'a as well, and I would like to recognize his wife in the audience, also his son, Gordon," and asked them to stand to be recognized.

"They have come to be supportive of their father and husband receiving this award today.

"Also, Mr. Speaker, I would like to just add that Abraham Pi'ianai'a was also my professor at the University of Hawaii when I worked for my Bachelor's in Hawaiian Studies, and he's a real go-getter. Let me just say that when you go into his class, it's just so full you can hardly find a chair in there and he never teaches with a book -- it's all up here (head) and in his heart -- and he says that the books are all obsolete. And so this is the kind of mentor that he is and he is very instrumental with the Hokulea ... they've had a lot of opportunity to work real closely with him.

"As far as Harriet is concerned, she goes way back with our family in Kaaawa where she raised her family and was very instrumental in square dancing, if you will, when I was just a little girl. We remember her very well in Kaaawa, but these are four distinguished people, and now I would like to have the pleasure of introducing them."

Representative Beirne then introduced Mrs. Rubellite Johnson, Mr. Jack Yama, Mrs. Harriet O'Sullivan, and Dr. Abraham Pi'ianai'a, and asked the honorees to stand to be recognized.

Certificates of Recognition were presented to the above-named honorees by Representatives Beirne, Okamura, Amaral and Apo, and floral leis were presented to them

by Representatives Duldulao, Baker, Arakaki, Peters, Tam and Kawakami.

H.R. No. 435, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION COMMEMORATING THE 50TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE 100TH INFANTRY BATTALION AND THE 442ND REGIMENTAL COMBAT TEAM," was jointly offered by Representatives D. Ige, Apo, Baker, Cachola, Chumbley, Chun, Kanoho, Kawakami, Marumoto, Morihara, Nekoba, O'Kieffe, Okamura, Santiago, Souki, Stegmaier, Takumi, Taniguchi and Young and was read by the Clerk.

On motion by Representative D. Ige, seconded by Representative Ihara and carried, H.R. No. 435 was adopted.

Representative D. Ige rose and stated:

"My grandparents, the issei's, left their families and friends in Okinawa and Japan, seeking more opportunities in Hawaii. They worked very hard in the sugar plantations, hoping that their children would have a better life.

"My father and father-in-law, nisei's, volunteered to defend a country, who for a dark moment in history, questioned their patriotism and loyalty. Their legacy of courage and commitment changed America and Hawaii forever. They opened the floodgates of opportunity for many, many to follow.

"In our work and lives in Hawaii, we sansei's can only be inspired to work for a better Hawaii, and we hope that someday the yonsei, including my daughters, Lauren and Amy, will be as proud of our accomplishments as we are of our parents.

"In a time when society is in turmoil and the family is under siege, we, as a generation, have had the privilege of growing up with all-American heroes. It is with tremendous pride and humility that we are committed to carry on their vision for a better world.

"Mr. Speaker, it's with great privilege that I am allowed to present this resolution and I would gladly open the floor for other comments from members."

Representative Nekoba then rose and stated:

"Speaking as a yonsei, I would just like to say that growing up and hearing about you -- you were mythical beings, you were heroes to us, the yonseis, who've grown up hearing the stories about your heroism and the things that you've done for us, the things that you've done for the Japanese-Americans in Hawaii and abroad. You've been the subject of many a paper of mine that I've gotten an A on so thank you very much.

"I'm always filled with pride whenever your accomplishments are talked about, and you are the reason that I can stand before you today and say that I am very proud to be Japanese-American.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Stegmaier then rose and stated:

"Although I am relatively recently a resident of Hawaii, having come here seventeen years ago, I've had an opportunity to read the history of your accomplishments and one of the characterizations of your accomplishments especially struck me which is that you and your buddies were fierce fighters and gentle liberators. It's that combination of strength, I think, that you characterized

for us and the reason that you are such heroes to all of us, no matter what our ethnicity.

"We, as the people of Hawaii and as Americans, want to thank you from the bottom of our hearts for your indelible contribution to all of us. We shall never forget the sacrifice that you and the others have made for us.

"Itsumademo, oboetoki masu -- wasurimasen. Domo.

"Thank you."

Representative Marumoto then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to thank the gallant men of the 100th and 442nd and their fallen comrades. I am a sansei -- a third generation Japanese -- that had the misfortune to grow up on the mainland during and after World War II. Besides having been interned in 1942, we had to grow up surrounded by misunderstanding and prejudice, ignoring taunts of 'Jap' or 'Go back where you came from', high school interviews, job interviews where we were told, 'You need not apply,' clubs and sororities where you knew you were not wanted, and neighborhoods which restricted certain races. In our defense, we always referred to ourselves as Japanese-Americans -- hyphenated -- stressing our American birth and American citizenship.

"So the achievements of the 442nd drew fame and honor to the Americans of Japanese ancestry and made it easier for at least one young sansei girl to hold her head up higher.

"Thank you to the 442nd for your contribution and for helping your fellow AJA's.

"Gambate."

Representative D. Ige then rose and proceeded to introduce the honorees and asked them to stand to be recognized, as follows:

What we're doing is essentially taking the power away from them because they didn't want the 'heat' of having to engage in their responsibilities.

"I'm not really sure that a 'hot potato' bill like this is appropriate. The spirit of the land these days is to give more authority and respect to the elected Board of Education, not for us to sort of intervene, bail them out when it's a hot topic. They have shown that they are quite capable of dealing with hot issues -- they have the responsibility now. If we are going to remove responsibilities from them, that's a totally different agenda. But to me, when I discovered that the Board already had this power to enact this formula that's in the bill for school lunches, and at least in the second hearing in the Education Committee, they did not even show up to explain why they didn't want this power any more, for that reason, I think it's perhaps inappropriate for us to say ... oh, well, we'll raise the fees so you don't have to. It seems to me that this is micro-management and it may be inappropriate, and I want to signal to the members of Finance that it is very clear that the Board already has this authority and that it is not required for the Legislature to enact this bill for school lunches to be brought into line with the actual cost.

"Thank you."

"Thank you."

No. 256, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SMOKING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committees on Judiciary and Finance, with Representative O'Kieffe voting no.

Representative Stegmaier, for the Committee on Economic Development and Business Concerns, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 982) recommending that S.B. No. 2, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ENTERPRISE ZONES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Stegmaier, for the Committee on Economic Development and Business Concerns, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 983) recommending that S.B. No. 1599, SD 2, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 1599, SD 2, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Thielen rose to cast her no vote, stating:

"Once again, it's a bill establishing a Hawaii Aviation Training Corporation to facilitate the growth and development of international aviation industry in Hawaii. This is something that the private sector should be doing, Mr. Speaker, not the government with taxpayers' dollars.

"Thank you."

Representative Shon then rose to cast his no vote, stating:

"On behalf of the residents whose houses will be disturbed on Saturday mornings by people training in their small planes, I also record a no vote."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1599, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AVIATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Shon and Thielen voting no.

Representative Stegmaier, for the Committee on Economic Development and Business Concerns, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 984) recommending that S.B. No. 1345, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 539, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HUMAN SERVICES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representatives Chun and Tom, for the Committees on Human Services and Judiciary, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 992) recommending that S.B. No. 1593, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and S.B. No. 1593, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHILD ABUSE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representatives Chun and Tom, for the Committees on Human Services and Judiciary, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 993) recommending that S.B. No. 552, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and S.B. No. 552, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representatives Chun and Duldulao, for the Committees on Human Services and Health, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 994) recommending that S.B. No. 1529, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and S.B. No. 1529, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII CHILDREN'S TRUST FUND," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representatives Chun and Duldulao, for the Committees on Human Services and Health, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 995) recommending that S.B. No. 1715, SD 2, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Ihara moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 1715, SD 2, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Thielen.

Representative Shon rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I think that perhaps the proper name for this bill is the 'tar paper' bill. It kind of sticks on and you can't get rid of it -- it keeps coming back.

"I've watched with disappointment when the administration first introduced this proposal. I think it was even in the Fall of 1992. It was an attempt to balance the budget by increasing the 'sick' tax. This was along with other proposals to freeze welfare, benefit reductions, lottery, and other kinds of things like these, and it represented part of an insensitivity on the part of the administration in ways of balancing budgets and in its way of insisting that the Department of Human Services balance its own budget or deal with the Medicaid deficit which actually is the result of other weaknesses and deficiencies in our economy when people go on Medicaid, that that particular institution or department be responsible in and of itself, and its clients be responsible in and of itself for balancing that Medicaid budget for dealing with the deficit. I think that was a very insensitive and incorrect premise that generated this bill.

"I watched with distress as this rather half-baked idea was presented without any provision to pay back the institutions when it was introduced. Now this idea is not a new one on the mainland. There are all kinds of other states that have attempted to do these things and I'll tell you the doors are slamming very quickly on these kinds of schemes. But they did not even adopt what other states have done and was approved. In fact, the mechanism in this bill, as was noted today in the discussion, is one that has never been tried anywhere else. This is how the administration is going to attempt to deal with the deficit or the increase in Medicaid spending. This is not a well thought-out, professional proposal. I listened with actual outrage for confidential phone calls when I was told that there was a meeting in which providers were told ... if you folks don't go along with this, we'll find ways to reduce our reimbursements to you. That kind of bullying does not belong in this kind of a democracy.

"I watched with disbelief when it was revived after death in the first committees. I breathed a sigh of relief when it was recommitted because we found refinancing quite rightly -- we did not send it to the Senate -- but I was very surprised to see, the very next day, folks in the House saying, 'Yeah, we're going to revive it again when it comes over,' even after it was just recommitted. In fact, there was a statement by our leaders and Speaker.

"I was appalled that in this year of reform that first the bill, as it came over from the Senate, is referred only to Finance because we know that those two committees don't like it, but then re-refer to the committees if you'll promise to pass it out. To me, that is not a sign of respect for the committees and the members in the process. I can appreciate the rock and the hard place that the two subject matter committees are put in this. I think it is unworthy. . .

At this point, the Chair interrupted and asked Representative Shon to "please speak on the merits or demerits of the bill."

Representative Shon continued:

"I was saddened also to watch the administration representatives, today and an earlier day, pull one amendment after another, almost daily amendments, on this bill. Still, they haven't got a clear view of how this can work, still they haven't answered all the questions. This is a major proposal. It has created enormous anxiety in the community -- enormous anxiety. Is it fair to create this kind of anxiety without having an adequate payback mechanism in the bill? I think not.

"The current draft, in my view, still does not contain an adequate way of returning the funds tax to nursing homes or hospitals. Yes, there is this indirect. . . well, we're going to increase Medicaid rates, we're going to do this, we're going to do that, but in the end -- in the end -- an institution has got to ask itself . . . come July 1st, can I afford not to raise my rates, knowing that ultimately I'm going to have to be taxed from July 1st?"

"There is not yet accepted by the administration any kind of a fund in which we can even loan money to institutions and not have it paid back until after the residents get their tax credits or whatever that indirect mechanism is. They seem very confident . . . oh, let's try this new mechanism that in questioning today indicated they had never tried before. And when proposals were made by members of committees and others about -- what about this, what about that . . . oh, no, no, we don't want to try that. We'd much rather go through a rather convoluted, indirect approach that is, I believe, unreliable, especially for those institutions that are just barely making it today."

"I hope, as this goes to Finance, that the pledge that was made to us that this bill will not emerge until there is a very solid agreement between the providers and the administration and all concerned as to how funds will be paid back so that the consumers do not have their health care increase, if that pledge will be honored and an agreement is not reached, then we will say, 'Fine, nice try, come back next year with a much more professional approach.'

"The history of this bill does not speak of a well thought-out, well-reasoned attempt to regroup more Medicaid money. In my view, it is an insensitive approach because of the lack of it and the anxiety it has caused, particularly among our senior citizens, is unwarranted. When this bill was first calculated, they calculated at both acute care and long-term care would generate around twenty million dollars. Then a month later, they said, 'Oh, I guess we made a mistake, that would be generated just by the acute care.' They could have, at that point, said, 'Okay, long-term care, we're not going to deal with that, we're not going to put our senior citizens and the families that are supporting them through that anxiety.' They refuse to do that. I know there were conversations with the Chief Executive and said, 'You may have to come to that,' and I know the answer was, 'Yeah, but let's see if we can get it.' I don't think that our seniors appreciate that kind of anxiety -- unnecessary anxiety -- and what I consider yet an unpolished, half-baked idea."

"Please, Finance Committee, ask the hard questions. Please do not let the administration convince you that just because they want it, they can pull it off. The guarantees are not there. The anxiety is there among acute care as well as long-term care institutions."

"For this reason, I would like to cast a no vote and urge the next committee to look very carefully as to whether or not a real honorable deal has been struck with the administration and the providers."

"Thank you."

Representative O'Kieffe then rose to speak in strong opposition to the bill, stating:

"This bill, while superficially different, is essentially the same as the House bill we killed earlier this session. Senate Bill 1715 is an administration bill which imposes a tax on the income of nursing facilities and hospitals with the intention of reducing the local Medicaid deficiency by obtaining increased federal matching funds. These funds

would theoretically be used to increase provider reimbursements and minimize the cost-shifting of the Medicaid expenses to private-pay patients and third party payers."

"This bill, as amended by the House Health and Human Services Committees, sounds at first blush to be a good bill, given the increasing cost of participating in the Medicaid program and of health care in general, but make no mistake -- this is a bad bill."

"Mr. Speaker, the State Director of Taxation testified yesterday that federal regulations require the State to jump through certain hoops in order to generate more and new Medicaid monies. The real question is . . . why is this? I'll tell you why. State Medicaid provider taxes became controversial in the late 1980s and early 1990s as the State sought to keep up with Medicaid costs through the enactment of provider taxes and assessments. The Health Care Financial Administration (HCFA) and the federal Office of Management and Budget (OMB) claim they were schemed to cut the State's share of Medicaid. OMB reported that provider assessments cost the federal government \$6.7-billion in additional expenditures in 1991. A recent report by the Inspector General of the federal Department of Health and Human Services claims that the provider tax program could bankrupt the Medicaid programs."

"Mr. Speaker, the Tax Foundation of Hawaii points out, and I quote: 'It is ironic that while the proposed new taxes in SB 1715 are to help recover federal matching dollars, it comes at a heavy price in increased costs to the taxpayers. The additional taxes will be passed on to them in the cost of higher health care insurance premiums and higher health care costs. Moreover, it flies in the face of those who, for many years, have attempted to exempt medical and health care services from the general excise tax.'

"So rather than reducing the cost of health care in Hawaii, Mr. Speaker, these taxes would just exacerbate it. It should be noted that due to the taxing structure proposed by this measure, tax payers who utilize the hospitals or nursing facilities, such as the elderly and their families who support them, will be asked to pay the majority of this tax. As one testifier to this bill stated yesterday, 'This is a "sick" tax created by sick people. It is a sick tax, Mr. Speaker, because it preys on the very people who can very least afford it and can least stand up for themselves at the Legislature.'

"Senate Bill 1715 discriminates against the private-pay patients who, along with their families, that pay fifty to sixty thousand dollars a year for nursing home care and should be commended for pulling their own way and costing the taxpayers nothing. Instead, we seek to impose an additional burden on them which some family members have testified may just force them to enroll their beloved ones in the Medicaid program and cost taxpayers even more."

"As one of my colleagues across the aisle stated today, this bill should be a concern to us because of the many distressed people who cannot afford an additional financial burden and what is already a taxing situation to them and has no pun intended."

"True, this bill allows for a special tax credit for these people, but our own State Department of Human Services admits that the HCFA will scrutinize these tax credits. And what happens to our distressed people if the HCFA determines that the tax credit is merely a scheme to loophole the reimbursement restrictions to private-pay patients? Even if the tax credit is approved, how long will patients have to wait before receiving relief -- one

year, two years? Distressed people don't have the means to afford the additional tax, let alone the means to wait two years to receive relief.

"Mr. Speaker, even the health care industry is divided on Senate Bill 1715. Those facilities and providers who have a large percentage of Medicaid patients and thus stand to gain the most are enthusiastically supportive of this tax while those facilities who have few or no Medicaid patients are stridently opposed to this tax. But it is not the health care providers who are the true victims here. It is the people like the Ackersons, the Andersons, the Leavitts, the Maddens and the Patys -- people who are our neighbors, our friends, ourselves. If you want to see who will suffer, look around you in your neighborhood and in your district. Take a moment to talk to the people who have loved ones in nursing facilities and hospitals or who reside there themselves. They will tell you of the hardships they suffer as they mortgage their homes and take out personal loans just to pay for the care of their loved ones. They will tell you how they are paying their own way even though their loved ones already qualify for Medicaid because they have family pride and feel responsibility to take care of their own. They will tell you how this egregious new tax will finally push them over the edge, into the abyss we call the Medicaid program. Don't take my word for it -- ask them.

"Mr. Speaker, Senate Bill 1715 will not solve the Medicaid crisis in our State. Once again, and I quote the Tax Foundation of Hawaii: 'It is unfortunate that while the State has been well aware of the rising costs of health care and the increasing high cost of participation in Medicaid, it has done almost nothing about seeking alternatives to participation in the federal program or, at the very least, attempting to better manage the program.' Several states throughout the mainland have undertaken massive restructuring of their former Medicaid programs with an emphasis on managed health care and they have had surprising success.

"Senate Bill 1715 seems to imply rather than reform ... it will be business as usual. Given that approach, this bill is not an acceptable solution to the problem.

"Mr. Speaker, if the intent of this bill is to take a first step in resolving the Medicaid funding shortage in this State, then let's all do the right thing and address the problem of managing and reforming the Medicaid program itself rather than attacking the symptom. But, please, do not make the distressed people in our nursing facilities and our hospitals suffer even more by taxing them on the care they receive. This is truly unconscionable.

"I firmly oppose Senate Bill 1715, Senate Draft 1, House Draft 1.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Alcon then rose and requested a conflict ruling, saying that he is the only senior citizen in the House, and the Chair ruled "no conflict."

Representative Thielen then rose to speak in opposition to the bill, stating:

"I would like to echo my colleague's comments -- my colleague from the Big Island and his comments. This bill, unfortunately, again sets us on the wrong path where we prey upon the elderly. We did that with lottery which would have preyed upon the poor but we refused to move forward and pass that gambling bill.

"I would ask very much that the Finance Committee and all of its members speak to people in your districts. I've been receiving calls from people from all over the islands, not just my district -- all over -- and they're saying, don't pass this -- don't pass this legislation. And I would suggest that everyone go back on our three-day weekend and speak to people in districts and say ... is this something we should be doing? I hope you'll come back and say, 'No, the answer is no,' and the Finance Committee will hold the bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I wish to speak against the bill because of a conflict of logic.

"I think we've heard enough good reasons why it's a bad bill, but I would like to speak for the silent majority who's for this bill if it passes and not let it be like these other bills, and that is, everybody thinks we're going to get a free lunch out of this one. It's got kind of a logic of lottery. We're going to put very little in and get a lot out, and we're going to leverage. And it's that principle that's motivating a lot of this whole medical proposition that we're doing here, not only because we need the money, but we think we're going to get a free lunch. I think we're going to be sadly disappointed from what the data says and the principle that we're pursuing here. Not only is the prioritization incorrect, that is when we run short of money, we run towards those who are the sick and the needy, and then we get a scheme that's so complex, I would challenge anybody to explain this bill to me and make sense out of it and that you could convince everybody else that you actually understand and know what it's all about. But I do know there's a free lunch motivator here and it's not a good one. If something is for nothing, you know that there's no such thing as a free lunch, for those of you who live in the real world. But everybody's behind this thing like ... hey, all we've got to do is just leverage the money, tax all these people who've lived all their lives and are supporting their loved ones, put a tax on the hospitals, and then we take this pile of money the Feds just piled up, and then we live happily ever after. I think we're deluding ourselves.

"Mr. Speaker, if there's such a thing as voodoo economics, I think this is a good example of one. This is mumbo jumbo taxation. I think it's a bad precedent. I think we've got to get our heads straight and clear before we do these kinds of things.

"Thank you."

Representative Baker then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"It seems that from some of the concerns I have heard expressed tonight that a number of my colleagues have not read the committee report or sat through the hearings or listened to much of the discussion on this measure. I believe the two committees involved in this particular measure -- the Human Services Committee and the Health Committee -- did, in fact, ask the hard questions. That's why the first time round, they were wary of the measure and decided not to move it forward. But, they talked with the Administration and talked with health care providers; they talked with nursing home facilities' managers and discovered that there were ways this program could work. Because the program would allow us to receive additional Medicaid dollars into the State, it was important to take another look at this measure. All of the providers said, at one point or another, one of the problems they have is that their reimbursement levels are not as high as their costs. This measure will allow

additional Medicaid monies to come in so that those monies can go to providers to increase their rate of reimbursement.

"I would remind my colleagues that ninety percent of the persons receiving nursing home care in this State are Medicaid/Medicare patients. This bill will allow us to take the additional money generated by this measure, some twenty-four million dollars, and get an additional fifty percent of that returning to the State for reimbursement to the people that are providing care.

"As we look at other provisions in this measure, it does not, as some have said, place an onerous tax on individuals. Private-pay patients already receive a medical services tax credit which allows them to take a credit on their income taxes for taxes paid for medical services. This measure extended the tax credit to include the provider tax. The tax credit is refundable in that if a taxpayer has no taxes due, then a refund of the amount of the credit is made. The cap has also been removed for the medical services tax credit which will also assist the private-pay taxpayer. This is an important provision that provides a measure of equity and I believe makes the measure more palatable for everyone. Senate Bill 1715 will allow us to bring back much needed Medicaid monies into the State, and I believe it's a measure that ultimately will help the health care providers. It is certainly a measure that we need to move forward.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Chun then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Our Committees on Human Services and Health share the concerns of the first two speakers. I think that we really wrestled with this particular issue and there are concerns that still exist. However, a number of the amendments, as elaborated by the Majority Leader, have allayed some of the concerns that we have; namely, a tax credit in which six percent credit will be on top of the existing four percent given back to families that do not receive Medicaid.

"Secondly, for hospitals and nursing homes that have a disproportionate share of Medicare patients that wouldn't get Medicaid reimbursements, there is language that would assist or make the Director of the Department of Human Services be in a position to assist those disproportionate share facilities in a way that they would not have to transfer the four percent provider tax on to their patients.

"We have also included a sunset date of July 1, 1995, and this would allow the Legislature to evaluate this particular mechanism.

"We've also included a reporting mechanism that would require the Department of Human Services to provide to our Legislature in 1994 and 1995 ... one, the per hospital and nursing care facilities -- the revenues they're generating to the State; and two, the amount that they are being reimbursed at, and this will give us a way of monitoring whether or not, in fact, facilities are getting back reimbursements at the level or even above the level of what they are receiving.

"We also have asked that the Department of Human Services look at different options for families that are possibly going to be distressed by this provider tax because it is the least or the furthest from our intent to have any family have to go on to Medicaid. It's in the interest of the Department of Human Services, it's in the interest of the Legislature for that not to happen. So we

have strongly encouraged the departments to continue their efforts to look at different options for them.

"If people are not already aware, there is cost shifting that is going on right now because the hospitals and nursing care facilities that have Medicaid patients are eating a lot of that cost. They are basically passing it on to all of us that are not eligible for Medicaid and those that are HMSA or the Kaiser Plan, they are also experiencing that cost shifting. Our insurance premiums are going up and partially because we are paying for that shortfall on Medicaid. So this is one of many efforts that we need to look at in the whole reform of the Medicaid system.

"My understanding is that the Department of Human Services is looking very carefully at the Medicaid program and as a former representative has mentioned, there is restructuring going on in different states. Hawaii is one of them, and I know that our Human Services and Health Committees, hopefully in both the House and Senate, will be working diligently during the interim to address this particular program.

On behalf of the members of the Human Services Committee, we all urge that you do support this. I know that one of our members is opposed and he has spoken out, but thank you for your time."

Representative Beirne then rose to cast her no vote, stating:

"I would like to be consistent -- I voted it down in the House. This is the Senate version.

"Even with all the explanation that has been on the floor, Mr. Speaker, I feel that we're all going to reach that time when we might need service, we might need the help, or any one of our family members may need that help and may not be in the position to take care of it. So with all the understanding that has been explained on the floor, I still would like to put my vote in opposition.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Arakaki then rose and requested a conflict ruling, saying that he is a planner for a health care system, and the Chair ruled "no conflict."

Representative Arakaki then spoke in favor of the bill, with some grave reservations, stating:

"I guess when this bill started off, it was sort of robbing Peter to pay Paul type of bill. Now, it has emerged as mugging Peter to pay Paul, but then we're going to provide victim restitution to Peter.

"The fact is, no matter what we do, no matter what measure we take, it's going to hurt, and it's going to hurt someone. The fact is, you know, having worked on this problem since I first started in the House over six years ago, the problem hasn't been solved either locally or nationally. And we've sort of reached a fork in the road, and it's become especially difficult because of the economic shortfall that we've suffered recently. But the fact is, we do have a major problem, in terms of what this Medicaid deficit is going to do to our State, in terms of our budget. We saw a \$55-million shortfall this past year. They are projecting anywhere from \$81- to \$95-million in shortfalls for the following biennium. Given that kind of situation, I think a lot of states. . . and I was at a conference in December and I met with other state officials from other states and they were all concerned about the same thing because they are all suffering from the same type of problems. No one really knows how to deal with the problems of providing care for the indigent

and especially for the elderly because the people who need long-term care, the elderly and the disabled, they are eating up about forty percent of that Medicaid share and that cost is continuing to rise and, you know, they are taking more and more. Of course, our elderly population is growing larger and larger so we can't expect that budget to shrink. It's going to continue to increase.

"And like I said, you know, I've been working on this problem for six years. We've hounded the Department of Human Services and even the Department of Health to come up with alternatives, to look at more Medicaid options, more matches maximizing the amounts of federal funds that we can retrieve, and this is one of their alternatives. We have to give them credit for coming up with at least this alternative although it's not really that great an idea, it's an idea that has to be implemented right away because there's a narrow window of opportunity for this type of 'scheme' to work. There is a possibility that the Clinton Administration will close that window very quickly.

"The fact is, Mr. Speaker, I think the point that I made to the committee this morning is that we need to not just look at Band-Aids or piecemeal approaches to how we're going to deal with Medicaid, but we need to look at the total Medicaid budget and we're going to have to make some tough decisions. Either we're going to have to cut some of the services that are available, or we're going to have to cut from other areas in order to pay for the services because as we see from the emergency appropriations we've made, we don't have any choice. When the bill comes due, we have to pay for it because that's what is mandated.

"So there's a couple of things we do have to look at and I hope that, as Chair Chun said, I hope we can look at in the interim and I hope all the members will be interested in this issue and not just cry about things but come up with solutions.

"I also hope that people will give Family Hope a good look at. I know it's a tax but it's a tax...

At this point, the Chair interrupted and stated:

"Representative Arakaki, that's not on the Order of the Day."

Representative Arakaki continued:

"Okay, but I want to make a point that, you know, taxes like this provider tax are going to be piecemeal and they are going to be piecemealing different parts of our population and somebody is going to have to ultimately pay for it. I just wanted to say that for Family Hope, it's a little more progressive and it's a little more up-front and we need to take care of the long-term care problem.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Duldulao then rose and stated:

"I would like to remind my colleagues and you, Mr. Speaker, that at the first go-around, the Health Committee, which is my committee, killed this bill. We had grave reservations and great concerns regarding the tax mechanism of this bill. As a representative, and I am sure my colleagues share this concern, that when we go back to our respective districts, we cannot face our constituents when we bring home, you know, tax increase packages.

"But I decided to support this bill, Mr. Speaker, because we have to be real. If we are living in the real world, we have to realize Medicaid is paralyzing our

State budget. Yes, this is not the best solution available. We need to look at more options but, unfortunately, this is one that would help us at this moment. This one has a drop dead clause for two years.

"I just, at this point, would like to confide my remarks by trying to explain the two elements in the bill that raises some great controversy to all of us, including myself.

"One is the tax element of this bill. Yes, it's true that the providers' tax will increase the payment for nursing home by three thousand annually. Let's take for example, a fifty thousand payment for each individual in a nursing home. Yes, it will go up by three thousand dollars at the rate of six percent. However, with the new version of the bill, the Director of Taxation, who we questioned intensively yesterday, has agreed that we then amend this bill by putting the language from the tax law in this bill and he removed the cap of six percent so we can go higher than six percent. If you try to calculate 53 x 6, you would come out to \$53,180 so therefore, the tax credit refund is in excess of how much you pay. I would like my colleagues to know to look at the bill again and do their calculations. I know that right now, it doesn't seem for real, but you know, you just have to trust the people that's working on this, and in conference we'll make sure that what is in the bill, as amended, should come true.

"Another element that I would like to clarify this evening, Mr. Speaker, is what are we going to do to address the financially distressed institutions if there will be? Okay, we had expressed our concern that now you don't have the provision but it's in the bill but it's not defined. Then the Department of Human Services agreed to further define what is a distressed financial institution and also promised us that they will address financially distressed institutions before they even become distressed in their State Plan, and with that, Mr. Speaker, I hope that my colleagues would open up their minds and hearts to this bill before us and let it go to conference because we have a lot of time to ask questions and to get the information that we need. I don't feel too comfortable totally with all the amendments but let's give it a try because if we are really looking at trying to help the State budget, not to go more into deficit in the years to come, we have to bite the bullet sometimes and I know that this bill will be a win-win situation because the hospitals will get reimbursed by the calculation of the taxes that they pay. In other words, when they pay X-amount of providers' tax, their reimbursement then will be equal to, if not more, than what they pay.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Thielen then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I've listened with respect to the Chair's comments and to the Majority Leader's comments. I don't think we cure a deficit on the backs of the elderly in nursing homes. I think that's wrong. We're looking at a graying America. The elderly population is growing. Unfortunately, with the exception of my colleague who acknowledged his conflict as a senior citizen member, we don't have really the representatives here of that graying community. We don't have the Claude Peppers, we don't have the Maggie Kuhns, co-founder of the Gray Panthers.

"I was privileged to work with Maggie Kuhn on an age discrimination case against the University of Hawaii in which we did prevail. I became sensitized to the way in which the elderly, many times, are ignored, patted on the head, looked at as almost set on the side, and we need to have their consideration really be first and foremost in

our family-oriented society. This bill does not do that. Unfortunately, it does not do that.

"A couple of comments have been made that government is going to look into this ... the various branches of government will be sure to check and make sure that everything is operating correctly. All that costs money. That's more people, more government bureaucracy -- that's not the way that we should go.

"And then there's a comment saying that this will sunset on July 1st, 1995. To my knowledge, once government has imposed a tax, I've really never seen it say, okay, we'll take off the tax now. I think that's naive to think that, and I believe that it is unfortunate that we again use the elderly in nursing homes as our way to collect money.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At 8:49 o'clock p.m., Representative Ward asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 8:54 o'clock p.m.

Representative Hirono then rose to cast her no vote, stating:

"I'll feel a lot better about this bill if I could point to a number of other measures that get tough on various groups and corporations, et cetera. Unfortunately, I can't find too many other bills like that so, in looking at the context in which we are viewing this bill, I find that I cannot support this measure although I do acknowledge the hard work that the two chairs have put into this measure.

"Thank you."

Representative Pepper then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I had not intended to speak on this bill but had planned to listen to and learn from those senior to me in both experience and age.

"Mr. Speaker, I find there is much misinformation about this bill and, unfortunately, I am not Claude Pepper who I respected greatly ... you have to settle for Len Pepper in this body.

"Those who have spoken in support of this bill have tried to clarify some of the issues. One issue, I think, remains unclarified as brought up by those who oppose the bill, and that is the question of ... what happens if we do not have federal approval of the way in which this bill is structured? It is very clear if the members will please look at the last part of this bill that if we do not have federal approval, this tax will not take effect, and I wanted to make that comment before we have our vote.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At 8:57 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 8:58 o'clock p.m.

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and the joint report of the Committees was adopted and S.B. No. 1715, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH CARE PROVIDER TAXES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee

on Finance, with Representatives Amaral, Beirne, Hirono, O'Kieffe, Shon, Thielen and Ward voting no.

At 8:59 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 9:01 o'clock p.m.

Representative Duldulao, for the Committee on Health, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 901) recommending that S.B. No. 1148, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce.

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1148, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH INSURANCE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 906 on S.B. No. 1547, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Duldulao, for the Committee on Health, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 906) recommending that S.B. No. 1547, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce.

Representative Duldulao moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 906 and S.B. No. 1547, SD 1, HD 1, be recommitted to the Committee on Health, seconded by Representative Pepper.

Representative Duldulao rose and requested that her remarks relating to the recommittal be inserted into the Journal and the Chair, noting that there were no objections, "so ordered."

Representative Duldulao's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to speak in support of the motion for recommittal and state, for the House members here in the House Chamber and the public-at-large, my reasons for this action.

"Mr. Speaker, I fully support the intent of this bill which would clarify the specific immunization requirements for children which must be covered or reimbursed by health care insurance plans. The type of immunizations to be covered by health insurance policies would be dependent upon a determination of 'prevailing medical standards.' However, Mr. Speaker, after the Health Committee supported my recommendation to pass this bill out of committee, 'with amendments,' on March 22, 1993, I was informed that this measure is in all probability subject to the provisions of HRS Section 23-51, which requires the preparation and submittal of a Legislative Auditor impact assessment prior to enactment.

"Mr. Speaker, in recommitting this measure back to the Health Committee, it is my intent to comply with the statutory provision previously cited, and to review this measure once again for passage during the 1994 session.

"Thank you for your indulgence."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and Stand. Com. Rep. No. 906 and S.B. No. 1547, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHILD HEALTH SUPERVISION SERVICES," were recommitted to the Committee on Health.

SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Ihara, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering a bill on Third Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 149 had passed Third Reading at 9:05 o'clock p.m.

Representative Lee continued:

"The rest of the delegation consists mostly of officials involved in the Parliament, both in Bonn and also in

Magdeburg, capital of Sachsen-Anhalt. Magdeburg is between Hamburg and Berlin on the Elbe River. The area was formerly a part of East Germany -- the communist part of Germany. These gentlemen and their wives came to study how we in Hawaii put in practice our form of parliamentary democracy. They will continue later on to New Zealand and the Fijis."

Representative Amaral then introduced Mr. Mathias Hoffman Kuntz, "a friend who has joined the German contingent, and he is a young student from the university in Germany who has come to help us with our ocean marine research at the lab at Kewalo Basin. He's studying the life of the dolphins there."

Representative Chang, on behalf of Representative Herkes and himself, introduced five papaya growers from Puna, as follows: William Julia, Orlando Manuel, Tranquillino Leantera, Mike Durkin, and Ernesto Tagalicud.

At 11:50 o'clock a.m., Representative Thielen asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 11:51 o'clock a.m., Representative Thielen rose and stated:

"I would just like to note, I believe, that my colleague mentioned that the Representatives and maybe the delegates also are males, and I would like to encourage the women that are participating over here to run for office, and I hope that as your country develops and merges with Germany and you become the unified Germany, that the women will take a major role as elected members of your official bodies. We here are somewhat egalitarian -- we still have a ways to go -- but we certainly have a strong Women's Caucus.

"I also would like to note that I visited East Germany with my three oldest children in 1973 and you all extended a great deal of hospitality to me, to the extent you were able to do so at that period of time. I would urge the women not to just accompany the male delegates but to become those delegates.

"Wie geht es Ihnen."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"Madam Speaker, I rise to commend my colleague for her international mindedness, and to thank the delegation for coming.

"Aloha."

H.R. No. 436, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION CONGRATULATING THE MATH TEAM OF NIU

VALLEY INTERMEDIATE SCHOOL," was jointly offered by Representatives Stegmaier and Ward.

On motion by Representative Stegmaier, seconded by Representative Ward and carried, H.R. No. 436 was adopted.

Representative Stegmaier rose and proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"It's a rare opportunity for a State Representative in one session to present the State Teacher of the Year from the same complex as the State math team winners, and I am very honored to be able to do both today, having earlier made the presentation of the State Teacher of the Year from Kaiser High School.

"There's been some hand-wringing and some concern expressed: judgments on the part of those who were the normal winners of this competition and those who make assessments that somehow the standards in the normally winning schools have been reduced and people are very concerned about the impact of this kind of unexpected victory on the reputation of those particular schools. My feeling is that kind of judgment is very, very unfair to those particular schools but it's also something that those public schools, including Niu Valley, have had to deal with for many years -- the kind of unfair, unjustified judgments that are derived from the actions of a few students, whether they be very successful actions or very unsuccessful actions.

"What I think is most meaningful about this particular victory is that this group of people came together as a team, didn't listen to the comments from outside -- the negative comments, the demeaning and destructive kinds of comments that I've heard many a time -- and focused on the work at hand which was to put together the best performance possible. My feeling is that this group should be an inspiration to us all in a macro sense, that that's exactly what we as Hawaii's society must do as well, to be able to compete in the international economic society that we are a part of. We need to put aside the kinds of judgments, reputation, thoughts that occur about Hawaii by outsiders, and focus in on the job at hand which is to join together as one team, one society, in producing the best students from both private and public schools in order to assure them a challenging future in this larger international society that we are a part of. So it's really a wonderful story of the Niu Valley School taking its place among other schools, both private and public, to eventually represent Hawaii in Washington, D.C., in the national competition.

"We wish you all very well. We wish you the best in that very difficult competition ahead ... we know that you've been working hard and as we would say locally, whether it's with athletics or with scholastics -- Geev Um!

"I'd like to introduce the members of the team, if I might," and asked the following honorees to stand to be recognized: Daishi Fujita, Mildred Park, Yuko Okado and Reyna Furuya; and Mr. Joel Mochida, teacher/coach, who were seated on the Chamber floor.

Representative Stegmaier then asked the following people who were seated in the gallery to stand to be recognized: Mr. Eric Hugh, Principal; Mrs. Sybil Schoenstein, student activities coordinator, Mary Ann Morimoto, Student Body President; Mrs. Paula Mochida, wife of Mr. Joel Mochida; Mrs. Sachiko Okado, mother of Yuko; and alternates -- Jennifer Saito, Aimee Sze, and Dylan O'Conner.

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"Madam Speaker, the media called the win by Niu Valley an upset, and all of us who know East Honolulu know that Niu Valley is a public school, as David pointed out, which is the home of the best and the brightest, so we're not surprised that the media was wrong that it was an upset. We knew what they were doing.

"We commend the coach, the Principal, Eric Hugh, and I want to commend particularly the young ladies -- Mildred, Yuko and Reyna -- because little girls and all big girls are supposed to have math anxiety and these are models that that's not true. Math anxiety doesn't exist in women the way some social scientists said it does.

"Lastly, may you go on to Washington with your genius and when you come back and we haven't balanced our budget, that's really the math contest of this body here.

"Aloha."

Representative Takamine then rose and stated:

"Certainly, I would like to personally add my own congratulations to all of the students for their hard work and, if I may, especially recognize the efforts of the coach. Mr. Mochida is an alumnus of Honokaa High School, a Dragon true and true, and I think, you know, clearly Representative Stegmaier made reference to the ability of a coach to bring together the collective effort to inspire the students and even back in the Honokaa High School days, his special qualities were reflected in the many roles he played, especially as Student Body President of Honokaa High School.

"I know as the students and coach head off for the mainland, we certainly wish you well in your efforts and know that you will continue to make us all very proud of you.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Nekoba then rose and stated:

"As a person who is not that far removed from high school and intermediate school and also one who tried out for the math team and never quite made the cut, I do know how difficult it is to get on to the math team. One thing that struck me, too, was the word 'upset' and I watched Mildred's face when they said the word 'upset' and she looked around at everybody and said, 'It wasn't an upset,' which is the truth and which is probably why they are here today because they believed the whole time that it wasn't going to be an upset -- it was going to be a contest -- and that they were going to take it and I think that's a singleness of vision, and something that we should all keep in mind when we go through it that it's never an upset, and that you should always think positive.

"I want to congratulate you all for that.

"Thank you."

A Certificate of Recognition was presented to Coach Joel Mochida by Representative Stegmaier while Representatives Chun, D. Ige, Okamura, Baker and Ward presented floral leis to the honorees.

H.R. No. 437, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION CONGRATULATING THE KAIMUKI HIGH SCHOOL BOYS' BASKETBALL TEAM ON WINNING THE HAWAII HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION'S VARSITY BOYS' BASKETBALL CHAMPIONSHIP," was jointly offered by Representatives Yonamine, Hagino, Hirono and Say.

On motion by Representative Hagino, seconded by Representative Hirono and carried, H.R. No. 437 was adopted.

Representative Hagino rose and stated:

"It's really quite an achievement ... this is the very first basketball championship that Kaimuki High School has won, in either Territorial days or statehood days, and really, what we have here is not just the boys' basketball team but, I think, a team that I would refer to as the Kaimuki High School United Nations Basketball Team. The members come from New England on the mainland of America; from the heartland of America -- Ohio; from the heart of the Pacific -- Kaimuki/Kapahulu; and all the way to Europe. It's really a United Nations basketball team as the resolution stated

"It exemplifies, I think, an example for the entire world that people can work together and achieve greatness, and I would like to thank Representative Yonamine for putting together this presentation and Representative Hirono. The timing was superb on Representative Yonamine's selection of the date because in this morning's paper, the **Advertiser** announced the All-State Basketball team. Shannon Lee is first team and also Player of the Year; Ante Peris is second team All-State; John Neal is second team All State; Zaan Bursac is honorable mention; and if I mispronounced the two names of the people from Croatia, I was coached by Representative Sam Lee who served with the Consulate in Eastern Europe and he coached me on the pronunciation. The coach, Raymond Fujino, was selected as Coach of the Year.

"At this point, Madam Speaker, I'll turn it over to the two Kaimuki High graduates for further words."

Representative Yonamine then rose and proceeded to introduce the honorees, stating:

"As the senior member of the Alumni Association here in the House, along with the Sergeant-at-Arms Kevin Ebata, may I first introduce our honored guests," and asked the following honorees, who were seated on the Chamber floor, to stand to be recognized: Shannon Lee, Jason Nakamoto, Junior Faitau, tri-captains of the team; Raymond Fujino, head coach, and Mrs. Thelma Nip, Principal.

Representative Yonamine continued:

"Thank you and congratulations!

That's our Alma Mater folks! I still remember it, and that, Madam Speaker and members of the House, that's the occasion we'll always remember when we have many fond memories of Kaimuki High School.

"As alumni, we are all very proud of our school -- both for its academic and extra curricular activities over the years. Kaimuki High School has truly been an educational institution. It grew up with this city ... the community itself was the earliest suburb of downtown Honolulu, and Kaimuki High has graduated thousands of good citizens who can rightfully take its place in helping to make Hawaii a better place to live.

"This morning, we recognize excellence. We recognize the very talented members of the OIA and State champions, and we say 'thank you' for making athletics a rallying point for fostering pride in the school, the

community and, of course, the alumni, and the State. We commend you for the way you performed on the courts ... you are indeed very talented. You did it through hard work, hard practices, and teamwork. You had confidence in your skills and in yourselves. You never lost your poise in the pressure-packed moments in both tournaments. You had the Bulldog 'guts' -- the toughness that comes when the chips are down.

"And Coach, you brought a diverse United Nations team together and forged a real 'kala koa' Hawaii team that worked together.

"May all of this be a lesson to all of us, the captains and members of the basketball team, and to the students of Kaimuki, whatever their future endeavors may be. We want you all to carry on this spirit to excel! And always remember that alumni and friends share the joy of your fine achievement. And we know that you will continue to be good role models so that the younger kids will follow in your footsteps and perhaps make your coach happy that you have other good teams coming up in the future, and then so that the adult community will receive our own inspiration for the way you achieved your goal.

"Again, congratulations!"

Representative Hirono then rose and stated:

"I congratulate Representative Yonamine for remembering the words to the Alma Mater -- the true test is if you know the words to your class song.

"As you all know, this is the first time in the history of Kaimuki High School that the Bulldogs have won the State basketball championship. With a name like the Bulldogs, it was only a matter of time before they would manage the stupendous feat and, sure enough, twenty-six years after I graduated from Kaimuki High School, they did.

"The students and teachers of Kaimuki High School are justly proud of your accomplishments as are all of us and the graduates of Kaimuki High School for winning this title. It has been said that some graduates of Kaimuki High School are late bloomers. After all, look at Representative Yonamine, Senators Bert Kobayashi, Randy Iwase and myself, but Bulldog doggedness is something that we can relate to, and I congratulate all of you for having this trait.

"Thank you."

Representative Alcon then rose and stated:

"I would like to also put into the record that being the oldest member of the House, I had also taught at Kaimuki High School in 1961 and 1962, and I guess great politicians come from Kaimuki High School because of the fact that at that time when Mr. Al Minn was the coach, Kaimuki High School had the only Olympic-sized swimming pool, so at this time I would like to congratulate the basketball team for winning and because of the fact that I had something to do with Kaimuki High long before they were born. I still have that pride of Kaimuki High School also, Madam Speaker."

Representative Okamura then rose and on behalf of Representatives Pepper, D. Ige and himself, who represent the Aiea area, "I wanted to tell you that we weren't rooting for you guys, but you guys have an outstanding team. It was a great game, and we're real proud that the two top teams are public schools.

"Congratulations!"

Representative Say then rose and stated:

"I just wanted to convey my congratulations to Raymond who lives in Palolo, to Junior Faitau who lives in the public housing complex in Palolo Valley, to Thelma Nip who is a very good friend of my mother, as far as both being teachers, and now she's an administrator. Also to Jason ... I've watched you play football, basketball, and Shannon -- the very best.

"What we have here this afternoon is an example of our public school system. The four young men that you see before us are all public school students, including Raymond who's a graduate of Kaimuki High School. I, too, am very proud of the public school system that really promotes sportsmanship, academics, and one's ethics of life that we all share.

"On behalf of the residents of Palolo and St. Louis Heights, I convey my very best wishes to the five of you here on the floor.

"Thank you very much."

At this time, a Certificate of Recognition was presented to Coach Raymond Fujino by Representative Hagino while Representatives Say, Chun, Duldulao, Marumoto and Hirono presented floral leis to the honorees.

At 12:23 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Ige, Menor, Peters and Souki being excused.

Representative Thielen rose and stated:

"I was unable to attend the event on Sunday but I think that outstanding congratulations go to two home run hitters -- one from each side of the aisle -- Representative Ihara and Representative Ward. For those of you that didn't know, they both hit a home run.

"And the other thing that we should all note is that it's a good thing that Representative Bainum moved on to politics and medicine."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"Because of the late session, Madam Speaker, last Thursday, you know, we were here till about 9:00-9:30 ... we forgot what the occasion was of the long weekend. And as we recall the long weekend, we recall it was the birthday of Prince Jonah Kuhio Kalaniana'ole. . .

At this point, Representative Baker rose on a point of order and asked:

"This is an announcement?"

Representative Ward continued:

"This is an announcement of what otherwise should have happened Thursday night because it was late. It's the reminder of Prince Kuhio and the role that he played ... one, in being the first delegate from Hawaii to be a representative in Congress for ten sessions. He authored and ushered through the Hawaiian Homes Commission

Act of which we have with us today -- the 200,000 acres for the Hawaiian people; and lastly, for the record and for those who tend to forget -- he was a member of the Republican Party.

"So when we have a holiday, it bestows us who bestow the law to have a holiday, that we remind ourselves of why we did that. I think this is a bit late but pertinent.
