Wednesday, January 15, 1997

In accordance with the provisions of Section 10 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, the House of Representatives of the Nineteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1997, convened at 10:00 o'clock a.m.

The Honorable Dwight Y. Takamine, being the Representative at the time present who was elected from the First Representative District of the State of Hawaii, called the House to order at 10:00 o'clock a.m.

The members of the House, guests, and audience rose to sing the National Anthem led by Fiji.

The Temporary Chair appointed Representatives David Morihara, Nathan Suzuki, Nobu Yonamine and Chris Halford to escort Kahuna Nui Momi Mookini Lum to the rostrum.

Kahuna Nui Momi Mookini Lum then delivered the invocation.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION

The Temporary Chair then appointed Representatives Dennis Arakaki, Eric Hamakawa, Scott Saiki, David Tarnas and Bob McDermott to escort the Honorable Ronald T.Y. Moon from the rostrum.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION

H.R. No. 2, electing the Honorable Joseph M. Souki, Representative from the Eighth District, and Paul T. Oshiro, Representative from the Forty-First District, as Speaker and Vice Speaker, respectively, of the House of Representatives of the Nineteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii was jointly offered by Representatives Okamura and Ward and was read by the Temporary Clerk.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative Ward and carried, H.R. No. 2 was adopted.

The Temporary Chair appointed Representatives Nestor Garcia, Marcus Oshiro, Tom Okamura, Calvin Say, Gene Ward and Cynthia Henry Thielen to escort the newly elected Speaker to the rostrum.

The Temporary Chair stated:

"Members of the House of Representatives, I present the Honorable Joseph M. Souki, the Speaker of the House of Representatives of the Nineteenth Legislature," and presented the Speaker with the gavel.

The Speaker took the Chair and delivered his address, stating:

"Governor Cayetano, Lt. Governor Hirono, Senator Akaka, Representative Mink, Representative Abercrombie, Chief Justice Moon, County Mayors, County Council Chairs, honored leaders of our military, Ambassador McDonald, members of the Consular Corps, and former Governor George Ariyoshi and Mrs. Ariyoshi, and former Speaker of the House, U.S. Senator Hiram Fong, distinguished guests, fellow House colleagues, and the people of Hawaii -- Aloha.

"People ask me why I keep coming back to the Legislature. They say things like: 'Joe, you had a real close election there.' Or 'Joe, when you go to Honolulu, everybody gives you a hard time.' Or 'Joe, the job sure doesn't pay much.' Or, my personal favorite, 'Joe, aren't you getting a little old for this?'

"I do this for the same reasons as you. I want to make a difference. I want to make a better Hawaii. I find serving the public immensely satisfying and educational.

"But along with all the altruistic reasons, I discovered an unexpected side benefit -- another reason why I keep coming back. You see, every year this job takes me away from Maui for a grueling five months -- a grueling five months for me.

"But for my wife, it is a wonderful vacation. My time in the Legislature has been the best years of her life.

"So with that, let me introduce my wonderful wife of 33 years, Frances.

"Also here is my newly-wed daughter, Desiree O'Neal, and her husband, Dutch O'Neal.

"If I may give some public fatherly advice to the new couple for the years ahead, based on your Mom's and Dad's experience, absence makes the heart grow fonder.

"For the past few years, Hawaii has faced enormous challenges:

- * Falling state revenues.
- Business closures.
- * Lost jobs.
- * Increasing crime rate.
- * Declining student performance.

"Together we have worked hard for the past two years to deal with many of the issues. And I feel good about the results.

- * We passed balanced state budgets without raising taxes.
- * We passed a comprehensive workers comp reform package that has reduced premiums by 27 percent, and businesses should expect savings of more than \$100 million in 1997.
- * Our Convention Center is on schedule for completion in 1998 and already has 17 confirmed bookings. These confirmed bookings will generate close to \$500 million in new spending for the State of Hawaii.
- * Also, by targeting repeat offenders and imposing mandatory sentences for ice dealers, our crime rate is being reduced. Our murder rate has gone down. And so had our auto theft rate.

"And we did much more. But I'm not here to recap our past accomplishments. The public wants results and not rhetoric. And we are here to do the people's business.

"Before I discuss our action plan for the upcoming session, let us remind ourselves of our fundamental tenet. Our goal is not simply to have a better balance sheet. Nor is it simply to provide a more effective government.

""It's for a better Hawaii...a fairer Hawaii...a confident Hawaii. It is for a Hawaii where people have faith in themselves, opportunities within their grasp, and hope for the future.

"We can reach this goal by doing the people's business. So just what does doing the people's business mean?

"Doing the people's business means reforming our automobile insurance system by giving people real and meaningful savings in their insurance premiums. We will fight the fraud, false claims, and frivolous lawsuits that have made Hawaii one of the most expensive places for auto insurance. We will balance the rights of those who are injured as a result of a car accident to hold the negligent party liable with the need to provide consumers with actuarially sound rate reductions.

"Doing the people's business means government pension benefits that are equitable. We will reform the State's high-three retirement law for legislators, including eliminating provisions for early retirement. To ensure parity throughout the overall government pension plan, we will eliminate the use of overtime pay in the calculation of pension benefits, which lends itself to abuse.

"Doing the people's business means enabling the Legislature to develop sound economic and fiscal policies based on well-researched information and analysis. We will fund and staff the Office of the Legislative Analyst so that we can have proper oversight over the development and execution of the State budget. "Doing the people's business means accountability in education. Economic development initiatives require a high quality educational system. We will propose that the Board of Education be appointed so that the Governor will have the ultimate responsibility for public education. We also insist on accountable and properly structured management of our schools, and will study the benefits of removing educational officers, such as principals and vice-principals, from collective bargaining.

"Doing the people's business means working with Hawaiians to pursue the goal of greater self-sufficiency and self-determination, including clarifying the OHA revenues and claims. Also, we will accelerate the payments for the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands.

"Doing the people's business means protecting the life and safety of newborn children and their mothers. We will require a minimum of forty-eight hours of inpatient care for a mother and her newborn.

"Doing the people's business means providing the public with more cost-efficient services. We will continue to streamline government, by reviewing the administration's response to our mandate to consolidate government operations.

"Doing the people's business means ensuring an equitable tax structure. We will take a comprehensive look at our taxes, including a review of the recommendations of the Tax Review Commission, by creating a finance subcommittee on taxation. As part of its work, the subcommittee will look for ways to stimulate the economy.

"Doing the people's business means recognizing that crime has social and economic costs. We will stop the revolving door at our prisons by increasing prison space using cost-effective, efficient, and innovative means. We'll look at erecting tent-type structures and using inmate labor to build prisons.

"And we must facilitate the prosecution of crimes against visitors by assuring that nonresidents may testify via videoconferencing. As hosts of visitors from all over the world, we will not tolerate crimes against them.

"As we attempt to increase the efficiency of State government, to eliminate its inequities, and to fix accountability, the State administration has announced the possibility of a \$170 million shortfall. The biennium budget as submitted may not be balanced, and there is still more information to come. This leaves the Legislature in the position of trying to hit a moving target.

"As Speaker of the House, I have in the past made consistent statements about not raising taxes. This year, I look at tough issues like a struggling economy and declining federal support, especially in social services, and we know this is no year to impose a tax. I can tell you that every member of this House wants to pass a budget without increasing taxes. And surely that is what the people of this State want.

"But the only thing people want less than a new tax are politicians who make promises they can't keep. I am committed to a revenue plan which supports the people's business without raising taxes. But with the administration's recent news of a potential shortfall, I can not absolutely nor responsibly promise 'no new taxes.'

"I ask all members of the Legislature and the administration to do everything within our power in these difficult times to balance the budget without a tax increase. "I think I just heard someone say, 'Is this Joe's retirement speech?' Maybe it's my wife. She's worried that I might be home for twelve months.

"Well, if I must return to civilian life, there will be plenty to do. Because doing the people's business also means taking steps to empower people and to make them more responsible for their own decisions and actions.

"Our first major task is to address the pending issue of same-sex marriage. We must take this decision away from the courts.

"The House will propose a constitutional amendment to permit the Legislature, rather than the courts, to resolve this issue. At the same time, certain benefits and rights will be made available to couples who are legally prohibited from marrying one another.

"Furthermore, to empower the people to decide the broader issues of the future, we will also establish the parameters for the election of delegates and the holding of a constitutional convention in 1998.

"Moving to business, we must take stronger action to reduce the cost of doing business in Hawaii. When we reduce the cost of doing business, we increase the dollars which business can invest in itself. Let's make sure that business can take responsibility for what it does best.

"Thus we will further reform our workers' compensation law by strengthening fraud investigations. And, very importantly, we will incorporate coordinated care organizations to better manage workers' comp cases in order to further cut down costs. We expect the medical and business communities to take responsibility for making this approach work.

"We will also review the recommendations of the Blue Ribbon Commission on business laws and regulations, especially as they impact small business. Unnecessary regulations must be eliminated.

"Regarding tourism, we will continue to provide funds for promotion of our most important industry. We ask the industry itself to leverage the maximum use of these funds.

"It is critical that we all work to rejuvenate our economy and to create economic options, especially for the next generation. Compassionate, creative, and collaborative private-public partnerships like school-towork transition are all around us, helping young people prepare for the new millennium. And more must be done.

"But the fact that times are tough is no excuse for crime. Once young people are old enough to know right from wrong, they must be made responsible for their actions. No longer can they be allowed to hide behind a cloak of secrecy.

"Therefore, we will propose juvenile waivers allowing the Family Court to waive to the adult court system juveniles, 14 years of age or older, who commit crimes that would be classified as felonies if committed by an adult. In addition, confidentiality will be waived for juveniles who are at least 12 years old who commit certain crimes. This isn't kid stuff. People have a right to know.

"Not only juvenile offenders will be affected. Certain adult offenders will also have to take responsibility for their actions. The public will be notified whenever repeat or violent sexual offenders, including child molesters, are released into a community.

"Finally, there is in Hawaii a crime in our forest which is in its own way as insidious as crime in our streets. I'm speaking, of course, about the invasion of alien species. Today, I want to thank groups like the Sierra Club who have taken responsibility and joined with the State agencies to educate the public and to help rid Hawaii of these pests. To protect our fragile environment further, we will pursue the possibility of establishing agricultural inspection facilities at all airport cargo stations to prevent additional introduction.

"I have touched on just a few of the proposals which are contained in the Majority package. This is not a legislative laundry list; it is a people's agenda. It is not the last word on these issues, but it is a strong start in doing the people's business. The people's business requires each of us to take responsibility for these islands. For however else we may differ, we are bound by a shared belief in Hawaii and its future. That is our unchanging core.

"Today, I challenge each of you to make these priorities a reality.

"Despite the changing times and the limited resources, this is still Opening Day. The big parties may be gone. Yet there is a celebration of democratic spirit. The big budgets, too, may be gone. Yet we make up for it with a surplus of human ingenuity and resourcefulness which is inside us and all around us.

"The people's business calls on the best of all of us. Let's get to work.

"Thank you very much."

At this time, the Chair appointed Representatives Robert Herkes, Kenneth Hiraki, Bob Nakasone, Michael White, Barbara Marumoto and Colleen Meyer to escort the Honorable Paul T. Oshiro to the rostrum...

The Chair presented the Vice Speaker, stating:

"Members of the House of Representatives, I present the Honorable Paul T. Oshiro, Vice Speaker of the House of Representatives for the Nineteenth Legislature."

The Chair then recognized Representative Ward, Minority Leader, to present the Minority's response.

Representative Ward rose and responded:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

"Governor Cayetano, Lt. Governor Hirono, Senator Akaka, Representative Mink, Representative Abercrombie, former Governor Ariyoshi, Chief Justice Moon, County Mayors and County Council members, Speaker Souki, and former Speaker of this House from 1948 to 1954, U.S. Senator Hiram Fong, my fellow Representatives, spouses, guests, and the people of Hawaii ... Aloha and Happy New Year!

"Welcome to the day we open the session for 1997. Speaker Souki, that was a terrific speech that you gave. I like the spirit, I like that you were a promise keeper, and I appreciate the few minutes you have given us to respond. I am encouraged as I begin this speech.

"As the poet Longfellow indicated, 'Great is the art of beginning, but greater is the art of ending.' The first thing we need to do in this 1997 session is to start on the right foot if we are to prevent the mistakes when we started here on the wrong foot in 1996. And some of you know and some of you in the press have labeled it, we had a 'Do Nothing Session' in 1996.

"To prevent history from repeating itself, Mr. Speaker, House Republicans have declared a state of emergency on four pieces of legislation that should be debated and passed in twenty days in this House of Representatives.

"A state of emergency exists because the people of Hawaii have told us they're scared, they're broke, and they're feeling powerless! They're scared because of the way we're running our criminal justice system; they're broke because of the way we're running our economy; and they're powerless because we have taken all the governing power to ourselves and not shared it with them.

"The present state of emergency began over eight months ago in this chamber when we left four critical issues undone. And let's face it, we have had emergency situations in the past. We have bailed out Medicare; we have bailed out the prison system, the Department of Human Services and many times when the occasion arose, we actually came to the occasion and for the people of Hawaii, did this in emergency fashion. In fact, in less than twenty days. We've done some in seven to ten days.

"But the risk is, if we go longer than twenty days on this floor, Mr. Speaker, bills can get bottled up, they can go into the eleventh-hour closed doors where, unfortunately, bills get morphed from High 3 to High 5's, and bills that are for realtors' education can turn into legislative exemptions as the eleventh hour nears.

"Because of these dangers, House Republicans are calling for the passage of these four following critical issues:

"Our first piece of emergency legislation is to protect the safety of the people of Hawaii by building prison boot camps.

"A recent survey by the Attorney General's Office noted that 45 percent of the people of Hawaii have been the victim of a crime in the last twelve months. That is half the people in this room having been a victim of a crime in just the last twelve months. According to an Oahu prison warden, there are 741 criminals roaming the streets of Hawaii right now as I speak who should be behind bars. It has also been noted that a city the size of Honolulu would just get close to mainland standards on per capita prison space and beds. We should have three times the amount of prison space. We have one thousand beds -- it should at least be 2,500. And even the Consular Corps of Japan, the Consul General, has warned us that things are so tough that he, by his position which is not supposed to speak out on local issues, has actually spoken to the people of Hawaii.

"If that were not enough, Prosecutors Keith Kaneshiro and Peter Carlisle and Mayor Harris and others have said countless times, that a lack of prison space is what is driving crime in Hawaii, and they have called for temporary detention quarters such as tents that we are proposing, that should be done immediately, quickly and expeditiously.

"Mr. Speaker, let's build these temporary boot camps. Let's not be an appeaser of the criminals. And as Winston Churchill warned us in defining an appeaser, he said, 'An appeaser is one who feeds a crocodile -- hoping that it will eat him last!' Let's not tempt the hand even though we are up to here in alligators already,

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"Mr. Speaker, we cannot let 'the land of the free and the home of the brave' become 'the land of the crook and the home of the scared.'

The second piece of emergency legislation that should be passed in the first twenty days of this session is that we should deep six the High Three!

"Mr. Speaker, this is really a piece of emergency legislation to restore the integrity of this body and everyone in it. There is absolutely no reason to continue this policy of legislators receiving special retirement perks at rates that drain the treasury of the people of Hawaii. No one in this room ran for office for fat retirement benefits -- at least no one on this side of the aisle, and I am sure no one on the other side of the aisle actually came here for fat retirement benefits.

"So let us work cooperatively, but quickly, and reform the High 3. And as the **Star-Bulletin** said: Hey, this is a no-brainer, we could do it quickly, get it over with, and get on with the agenda of the people of Hawaii, which leads to emergency legislation number three.

"The third piece of our legislation that should be an emergency passage in the next twenty days is that no-fault insurance should be reformed or it's going to be our fault if we don't do it.

"With over 600,000 autos in the State, we could have saved Hawaii's taxpayers over a half a billion dollars. Mr. Speaker, how much money would that have pumped into our economy? You talk about stimulating the economy -- it's just the political will on this floor that could have created a half a billion dollars to be plowed back into our economy.

"And this is why we pledged, Mr. Speaker, on the steps of this very Capitol, October 27, 1996, that if elected, we would fight to give MORE TAKE HOME PAY! and the centerpiece of that take home pay is auto insurance reform.

The fourth and last piece of emergency legislation that should be passed in the first twenty days of this session is to let the people of Hawaii decide the fate of same-sex marriage.

"I have great honor and respect for Chief Justice Moon and all who wear the black robes of the Supreme Court. But I have greater honor and greater respect for the people of Hawaii in deciding an issue that affects them, their children, and will certainly have a ripple effect for our nation, and let us be frank -- our world and our civilization, The activist high court has placed itself above the people and the moral order of the State of Hawaii.

"This is not the time for this body to surrender nor to turn its back on 70 percent of the people who have spoken that men should not marry men, and women should not marry women. Same-sex marriage was not a state of matrimony ever intended by the framers of the state or the federal constitutions, and our justices know that, and we have all just sworn to uphold those two constitutions. Judge Chang has spoken for the legal community; let us, fellow legislators, speak for the people of Hawaii on this issue. Let's do it in twenty days. Let us not be accused of having that as a preoccupation, let's get on with it, put it aside, and get on with the agenda that we need to.

"In summary, Mr. Speaker, House Republicans are calling for a change in the phone number of this House of Representatives. We call it now '911.' We are in a state of emergency.

"We have outlined the four issues but it is not to say that those who sent us here do not have more issues but for the small amount of time I have, I have not the time to really speak to their concerns about the declining economy and particularly job creation, Mr. Speaker.

"We wish you, your Majority, the strength, the courage, the political will to do this year what you would not, or could not do last year. And, Mr. Speaker, I can't help but acknowledge that we are 71 percent stronger. I can't believe -- this is all Republicans, sitting right here. It's really an encouragement to see that. We owe a debt of gratitude to the people of Hawaii for that, and we are humbled by that. We have been so small for so long.

"But, Mr. Speaker, I would ask you ... please listen to the almost 250,000 voices that we represent in our constituency. Please listen to us and please be fair with us."

The Chair interrupted and said:

"I'm always fair with you, Representative."

Representative Ward continued:

"Yes, always.

"In conclusion, Mr. Speaker, we have the opportunity to erase the memories of the 1996 session, and transform the people of Hawaii from being scared, broke, and powerless, to becoming a people who are physically safe, financially secure, and have a voice in the affairs of their government. We believe the House Republicans have proposed legislation we think can make this happen by creating safer streets, giving workers more take-home pay, and returning government to its rightful owners -the people of Hawaii. And we know, Mr. Speaker, you, too, believe in these things and your Majority believes in these things, especially to make Hawaii a better place and for the sake of our children which is so best expressed in Kodomo No Tame Ni.

"So, Mr. Speaker, let us resolve to finish this session so the people of Hawaii will again regain the belief in themselves and the future of their State, and that things as they were in the past were not impossible and they should not be impossible in the future. Hawaii is such a special place with a special destiny. Even on our worst day, this is still the best place in the world.

"Mr. Speaker, with your Majority and my Minority, together we can make this session even a better session than 1996, and we can make this place -- Hawaii Nei -- a better place to live. Your House Republicans are ready to roll up their sleeves to speak for the people of Hawaii, to give what is the best and what we think is the future. Without ending, the best is yet to come.

"Aloha, and God bless the State of Hawaii and God bless the people of Hawaii."

The Chair then recognized Representative Okamura, Majority Leader, who rose and responded:

"Mr. Speaker, Governor Cayetano, Lieutenant Governor Hirono, our distinguished guests, family, and friends ... on behalf of the Majority members of the State House of Representatives, I bid all of you Aloha and welcome!

"Today we begin our 60-day mission. We start with a new line-up, a clean slate, and a clear mandate. To our new members, Democrat and Republican alike, I extend a warm welcome. "Mr. Speaker, assembled before you is a mix of youthful idealism and experienced wisdom. I expect that we will engage in spirited and lively discussion -- but this, Mr. Speaker, is healthy and as it should be. For such discourse is the friction which polishes our efforts.

"More importantly, Mr. Speaker, your Majority shares a common purpose, and we pledge to work together -- as partners -- to do the people's business.

"Mr. Speaker, our constituents have invested in us their confidence, their trust, and their tax dollar. In return, they ask that we shoulder our responsibility, demonstrate our leadership, and make the tough choices that are vital to our State's future.

"To do so, we must get down to basics, and deliver realistic, responsible solutions. We must be responsive and accountable. Anything less is unacceptable!

"Mr. Speaker, it is my pleasure to inform you that your majority members stand ready -- indeed anxious -- to proceed with this task.

"Mr. Speaker, under your leadership, this House is committed to a process of open debate and timely action. The objective of this year's organization was a more inclusive and accountable process -- one which values the opinions of all members, and strives for a new level of consensus and shared vision. Mr. Speaker, this you have achieved, and the reforms we have enacted are testament to that commitment.

"This spirit of inclusiveness and collaboration has also motivated your Majority to work together in unison to craft a legislative package which is realistic and meets the needs of the people.

"Please permit me, Mr. Speaker, to thank not only your policy committee members, who dedicated their time and energies to building this package, but all the members of the majority for their contributions, support and endorsement.

"In particular, I would like to acknowledge the work of Representative Marcus Oshiro and Representative Ed Case, both of whom helped to coordinate and prepare this package.

"I would also like to acknowledge Linda Oamilda, our Chief Researcher, and her very dedicated and hardworking staff for putting in many long nights and weekends because of the time constraints that we had to craft this package.

"And finally, I would like to acknowledge my own personal staff -- Judy Gold, my office manager; Eric Sakai, our session attorney; and in particular, Frank Streed, my Executive Assistant, who made this package possible, again because of the time constraints that we had.

"Our package this year reflects the fundamentals of our party -- equal opportunity for all, care for the needy, responsiveness to the people, partnership with the private sector, nurturing of the aina, and hope for the next generation.

"Recognizing that a strong economy is the basis for social and fiscal progress, we will create an environment which is favorable to business and provides opportunity for our people.

"To combat crime and assure public safety, we will no longer tolerate repeat offenders, the targeting of visitors, or the reckless actions of youth. "Acknowledging the social, political and economic changes of the times, we will review and adjust the structure of our laws and political institutions.

"In our quest for a lean and efficient government, we will assure that our citizens receive the best possible value for their tax dollar.

"In the tradition of the Democratic Party, we will maintain a social 'safety net' and care for the needy, but not at the expense of personal responsibility.

"To assure the continued quality of our land and water resources, we will demand sound environmental management and use practices.

"Finally, Mr. Speaker, as today's youth represents Hawaii's future, we will strengthen school governance and tailor a system that will enable them to compete in the global marketplace.

"As servants of the public, we pledge to work together as partners, to set priorities, forge consensus, and make the tough and realistic decisions that are demanded of us.

"Mr. Speaker, this is our commitment to the people's business.

"Thank you."

"Mr. Speaker, it is indeed a pleasure for Sam and I to honor Chris Naeole who, unfortunately, is not here today. Chris has fallen ill and he has had to go to the hospital. He is here for the Hula Bowl football game and we pray that he will be able to play on Sunday.

"Chris was a football star at Kahuku High School and has brought great honor to my district. I want to say 'aloha' this morning to Tara, his beautiful wife, and his father, Mr. Simeon Naeole. Congratulations to you, Chris.

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"At a time when much of our youth are searching for direction, Chris Naeole has proven himself to be a leader in his community and as a leader at Colorado State. When he went to school in Kahuku, he started off in the wrestling team as a freshman. Chris also joined the Kahuku freshmen team in 1988. It may be surprising to know that when he started playing on the freshmen team, Chris did not know how to don his pads because he was a novice to the game of football. You see, he was not able to play football at a younger age on the local Pop Warner teams because he was over the size limit. At the age of 12, he weighed over 140 pounds. However, he learned the game quickly and with his natural athletic ability, won several football honors in his senior year. He has been honored by being named to both the OIA East Coaches' and the Honolulu Advertiser's All-State Football Teams, and was further honored with the Red Raider Award as the top athlete at Kahuku High School.

"I am proud to also point out that Chris also distinguished himself off the field in academics. A student with interests in history and the Japanese language, Chris held a 3.0 grade point average.

"Nicknamed the 'pancake man', because of how he left his opponents on the field, this locally born Hawaiian/Irish/Polish boy from Kaaawa was one of the most sought after recruits in the State when he graduated from Kahuku High School in 1992.

"Today, as a senior and a graduate of the University of Colorado where he majored in sociology, he is again one of the premier football players in the nation. He is a semi-finalist for the Outland Trophy, and has been nominated for the Lombardi Award, college football's top honors for linesmen. He has won a unanimous first-team All-Big Eight selection by league coaches and The Associated Press and second team All-American from The Sporting News.

"Congratulations to his wife, Tara; his father, Simeon; and especially to Chris Naeole."

Representative Meyer then introduced and asked Mrs. Tara Naeole, Chris's wife; and his father, Mr. Simeon Naeole, who were seated on the House floor, to stand to be recognized.

Representative Alona then rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I also want to point out that the NFL draft will soon be coming up, and I urge you all to watch it because Chris Naeole is going to make history. Obviously, we don't know when he is going to be picked, but it is predicted that he is going to be picked very early in the draft and be one of the first from Hawaii, or be picked as one of the highest that Hawaii has ever seen, and I congratulate him on that."

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions (H.R. Nos. 13 and 14) were read by the Clerk and were disposed of as follows:

H.R. No. 13, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION ADOPTING THE HOUSE ADMINISTRATIVE AND FINANCIAL MANUAL OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETEENTH LEGISLATURE," was jointly offered by Representatives Okamura and White.

Representative Okamura moved that H.R. No. 13 be adopted, seconded by Representative Garcia.

Representative Thielen rose on a point of order and stated:

"When I take a look at House Resolution 13 which refers to the House Administrative and Financial Manual and the resolution we're being asked to vote upon right now, if you will turn to the attachment ... mine may be the only one, but the way mine is, it attaches actually the Rules of the House of Representatives. And then if you will turn, Mr. Speaker, to House Resolution No. 14, which is adopting the Rules of the House of Representatives, and you look at the attachment, that attachment is the Financial Manual, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair responded:

"Thank you very much for that correction. We will take a short recess to correct the technical error, which is all it was. Do you mind if we do that?"

Representative Thielen answered:

"I don't mind, Mr. Speaker, if I may have the floor back when we finish."

At 12:32 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:34 o'clock p.m., the Chair recognized Representative Thielen and she stated:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

"If I am correct in what you are correcting, then, Mr. Speaker, I rip off House Resolution No. 13, rip off House Resolution No. 14, and put House Resolution No. 13 onto the Financial Manual. And that is the issue that is before us for a vote?"

The Chair answered:

"That is correct, Representative Thielen. You will make a great clerk someday."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 13 was adopted. (Representatives Cachola, Chang, Menor, Takai and Whalen were excused.)

H.R. No. 14, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION ADOPTING THE RULES OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETEENTH LEGISLATURE," was jointly offered by Representatives Okamura and Herkes.

Representative Okamura moved that H.R. No. 14 be adopted, seconded by Representative White.

Representative Thielen rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I move to amend House Resolution No. 14, and specifically by amending Rule 50.1 to delete the proposed language in this resolution. In looking at our House Rules, Mr. Speaker, on this, it is clear that the only time we need to have a copy of the proposed amendment is when it is a bill...

The Chair interrupted and asked:

"Is there a second to the motion?"

The motion was seconded by Representative Kawananakoa.

The following amendment was offered by Representative Thielen:

"SECTION 1. House Rule Number 50 is amended by amending Rule 50.1 to read as follows:

'[[]No member shall speak longer than ten minutes on the same question: provided however, that any member may yield his or her speaking time to another member.[]] No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the House; provided, however, that the movant of the matter pending shall be permitted to speak in reply, but not until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken. [No member shall speak longer than five minutes the first time and three minutes the second time on the same question; provided however, that any member may yield his or her time to another member.']"

At 12:36 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:43 o'clock p.m., Representative Thielen rose to speak in support of the amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, House Rule No. 50.1 has been amended to continue to allow all of our members to speak for ten minutes on the floor of the House of Representatives. The way that the rule was proposed in the Majority's package is that it would almost cut in half our ability to debate issues on the floor.

"When I take a look at what has happened with our Republican Caucus where we've almost doubled our numbers, and then I take a look at a proposed rule that almost cuts in half the amount of time we're going to be allowed to debate, I can't help but draw a connection between the two.

"Republicans are one-fourth of the House of Representatives -- let's slash the amount of time they're going to be able to debate issues on this floor. But when you stop and think, the only place that we are all able to debate issues, the only place we're able to do that is on the floor of the House of Representatives. It doesn't happen in committee hearings. In committee hearings, we're restricted to asking questions. But there have been instances -- and those of you who have been here before know this -- there have been instances where people have stood up and debated an issue so compellingly that members have changed their votes because of that compelling argument a member has given on the floor of the House of Representatives. We are now sitting here with a time clock, looking at it, and being told -- stifle your freedom of speech, stifle your freedom of debate. And of all places, in the Democrat-controlled House of Representatives.

"I personally find that offensive, Mr. Speaker. I don't see any call for it. We haven't had any filibusters, we haven't had any instances where people have talked on the full ten minutes with everyone in the whole body speaking for that length of time. Debate has not run amok, but debate has been healthy for this body. We're a two-party system. One of the tools the Republicans have to get our points across is debate on the floor of the House of Representatives.

"I would think you would all look within your hearts to say ... what is freedom of speech in a Democratcontrolled House of Representatives? Is it allowing the Minority to have their ten minutes say? Or when their numbers begin to swell, when they get to be a significant amount -- one-fourth of this body -- then does the Majority take the approach and stifle out that freedom of speech?

"I would ask all of you to consider voting in favor of this amendment which will continue to allow us to have the freedom of speech in the House of Representatives."

Representative Herkes then rose to speak against the amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, it should not be news to anyone in this body that there are separate factions. We have the Minority with new and greater numbers, a renewed vigor, also demanding rapid action on key issues in twenty days. I believe they flatter themselves to think that this rule is aimed at them. It is aimed at the long-winded members of the Majority, and there are distinct factions within the Majority that we are concerned about.

"Let me point out also, Mr. Speaker, that virtually unlimited testimony can be inserted into the Journal but, of course, that gets no TV coverage.

"In developing this rule change, the Majority has agreed among themselves that getting the peoples' work done takes precedence over any individual group's personal agenda. We have agreed that no group within the Majority -- within the Majority -- will hold up the peoples' work by lengthy debate. Not at dispute is the House's right to limit debate. This is not the State's continuous debating forum -- that is the Senate. The Majority feels that full and free discussion on all issues should be encouraged at the committee level, and I believe we do that at the time of vote.

"Let it be noted that any group of twelve, whether it's the Minority or a group within the Majority, can argue for or against any proposal for over three hours -- three hours, Mr. Speaker -- an hour-and-a-half during Second Reading and again for an hour-and-a-half during Third

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Reading. If you can't make your point in three hours, perhaps a refresher course in summation is in order, or maybe you just don't have an argument. Add to this the increased probability of roll call votes. The House could be severely limited in the time it has available to do the peoples' work.

"Please note that it took the Minority Floor Leader just three minutes and fifteen seconds to make her point. It has taken me the same ... do you get the point?

"I urge the members to vote against the amendment.

"Thank you."

Representative McDermott then rose to speak in support of the amendment, stating:

"The Majority organized under the guise of more openness, and this is the people's House -- the marketplace of ideas. And if you really believe in more openness ... you want to walk the walk and talk the talk, then support this amendment.

"Thank you."

Representative Okamura then rose to speak against the amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, all bills have been heard and thoroughly discussed at least once previously in committee. The House's main business is to provide a forum for public input into legislative measures. Public hearings provide the best forums for public input and not floor sessions.

"As Representative Herkes stated, if everv Representative uses or yields their entire eight minutes on each bill, each bill will have six hours and 48 minutes of debate time, not including the time it takes to go from one speaker to the next. Time limits provide an incentive to keep floor debates concise and limited to each speaker's major concerns about the bill. Five minutes is more than enough time to discuss each speaker's major consideration. In the past, when we have had long dialogue on various measures, members tend to repeat each other's points of view. If five minutes, plus an additional three minutes, are not enough for a speaker to complete his/her discussion, or if other members want to hear more from the same speaker, other members can continue to yield some or all of their time.

"The Legislature can best promote efficiency throughout government by leading by example. The public wants action, not repetitive rhetoric. The Republicans have been pushing that we should get some of the major legislation through in twenty days and if these kinds of things continue, we could possibly be in session for eighty days.

"Thank you."

Representative Fox then rose to speak in favor of the amendment, stating:

"We are talking about a change in the rules that we previously had; yet, the membership of the House is exactly the same -- 51 members. Do we need to reduce the amount of time each member speaks because we have more members? No.

"I suggest that the reason that the Majority is proposing to reduce the amount of time we speak is very simply because the number of Republicans has increased from seven to twelve, and it has felt necessary to contain the amount of time the Republicans speak before this body. I, therefore, think that the Democratic process would suggest that we stick with the amount of time that was available for 51 members last session and 51 members this session, ten minutes each.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kawananakoa then rose to speak in favor of the amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, as has been duly noted on opening day, your Republican Caucus has grown. We currently represent over 250,000 citizens of the State of Hawaii. They have a right to be heard. This is the forum upon which we may debate questions of concern to our constituents. We represent these people. I don't find the necessity to reduce or limit the time of debate here on the floor that would otherwise stifle the thoughts, the concerns, and the ideas that our constituents give us. . .give us their trust.

"I also wanted to note that there has been a lot of discussion that there would be an extension of two minutes, or limiting of two minutes. We're arguing to allow us to continue to have a full ten minutes of debate. And I ask, how hard is that for anyone of us to sit and to listen to perhaps an opposing view, perhaps an unpalatable view from your perspective, but still a valid view? Again, I mention that we represent 250,000 of Hawaii's people.

"Another thing comes to mind -- the name Kelijahonui. This name means a leader with great patience. That is the name of my father. There is a great wisdom in listening -- listening to both sides of an argument. And I believe we owe it to the people of Hawaii and the traditions of our past to have that patience here in the House of Representatives.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward then rose to speak in favor of the amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, at the conclusion of the 1996 session, I filed a complaint with the Media Counsel because of the stifling of the Minority over Olelo. There were infomercials given to every eighteen chairs for a total of nine hours, and they were able to say what great things we did in that do-nothing session. Upon my registering of the request and a complaint, I was asked for one...

The Chair interrupted and said:

"Representative, please stick to the relevancy of this measure."

Representative Ward: "This is relevant, Mr. Speaker. It is leading to the point that the Minority has been stifled.

"I couldn't get one minute of Olelo time last year. You guys had nine hours. Now, we have ten minutes going down to eight minutes and the principle is the same. Why can we not speak out for the people of Hawaii? Why can we not be heard on this body? We have not increased other than our numbers -- the same 51 members are here.

"I challenge the premise of Representative Herkes, I challenge the premise that there are long-winded factions here. We have never used our ten minutes. Never! Not once, nor had a filibuster. Is there a fear we are going to do something otherwise the people might find out about? And I know why so many people, and let us be very frank about what the Majority feels about the floor, you guys do it behind closed door, you don't want the people to hear

it out here. We are the opposite. We want the people to hear it out here and you guys don't want to hear it. . .

Representative M. Oshiro then rose on a point of order.

Representative Ward continued his debate, saying:

"That's the basic motivating premise behind the floor debate. That is the point. That is the practice of the Majority. . .

Chair: "Recess!"

At 12:55 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:57 o'clock p.m., the Chair stated:

"Representative Ward, you still have the floor if you're a little more cool and calmed down."

Representative Ward continued, saying:

"My apologies for being what her ancestor said, 'Give me liberty or give me death.' But, Mr. Speaker, I guess the point is this: You have the votes. . . you have the votes. Mr. Speaker, you can do anything in this House you want. You've got thirty-nine members. If you want to say you guys are limited to one person to speak one sentence, you could cut us off -- you've got that power. But why change the rules to formalize that and do a blow directly to our heart of which, as you know, this is the medium that we've got, whether the TV's are on or otherwise? This is the marketplace of ideas, this is the biggest marketplace in the Pacific Ocean. This is where ideas are debated. We just want to be heard. We don't want to be structured out of style. You've got the power, you've got the votes, Mr. Speaker, this should not be a threat to you. In fact, it's probably not even worth the downside of the media coverage that you're going to get for having done this today. And I spoke about that previously in private with some of your officers, sir.

"Having said that, Mr. Speaker, I would just plea that the greatest export of America is democracy, the greatest part of democracy is freedom of expression. And let freedom prevail, let what was the founding point of the debate on this floor and every house in America, let it prevail, Mr. Speaker. That's the point.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Herkes then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would just like to refresh the memory of the Minority Leader. Once, upon the floor of this House, a Democrat -- Representative D. Ige -- spoke for close to an hour on a single issue.

"Thank you."

Representative Moses then rose to speak in support of the amendment, stating:

"Our system of government is based on the free exchange of ideas brought out in open debate. As we've already heard, the current system allows us ten minutes each -- ten minutes times 51 members for a total of 510 minutes. The changes would reduce that to 408 minutes. That's a 20 percent reduction -- one hour and 42 minutes. Yet, the total number of Representatives has not changed. Twenty percent reduction in the time to debate, yet the people deserve no less time to hear the merits of the issues in front of us.

"Representative Herkes explained that the proposed changes were decided by the Majority; yet we, the Minority, represent approximately one-fourth of the people of the State. Those people deserve to hear the debate on the issues. We must be less concerned with the theoretical maximum time than with the possibility of stifling a real exchange of ideas.

"Thank you."

Representative M. Oshiro then rose to speak against the amendment, stating:

"I would just like to make it perfectly clear to the community out there that may be confused over this debate right now, but that the House Rules will apply to all members, both Democrats and Republicans, the same time limitations apply to you as to me as to the Minority Caucus.

"I also need to clarify and make very clear that this is not a freedom of speech issue. What we're talking about here is the process and procedure in this House.

"The third point, Mr. Speaker, from all I've gathered so far, is that no one is harmed. There is a principle, and the principle that I've learned is that where there is no harm, there is no foul.

"Fourth, Mr. Speaker. Debate will not be cut off in this chambers. That is not the point of these rule changes.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Pendleton then rose to speak in support of the amendment, stating:

"This is not the right way to begin the session which is still in the first week. It does not send the correct message or signal to the people of Hawaii. However benign the motives may be, perhaps as one of my distinguished colleagues has said, it is simply to restrict the long-winded speakers in a Democratic faction.

"However, if that is the motive, then I rise in their place. The marketplace of ideas, like the economic marketplace, does not benefit from stifling or restricting speech or commerce. Regulations such as this are not beneficial and will not lead to better legislation.

"I may not agree with all the things my Democratic colleagues may say, but I rise to stand up for the right for all of us to speak freely and to have enough time to speak thoroughly on all points. Thank you."

Representative Thielen then rose and moved for a roll call vote on the motion to adopt the amendment, seconded by Representative Kawananakoa.

Roll call having been requested, the motion was put to vote by the Chair and the amendment failed to carry by a vote of 37 noes, 11 ayes, and 3 excused. (Representatives Chang, Menor and Whalen were excused.)

Representative Thielen then rose to speak against the adoption of House Resolution No. 14, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, because the main motion contains a provision which will limit free debate on the floor of the House of Representatives, I cannot in good conscience vote in favor of the new rules. I find it really a sad day in Hawaii when we end up polarizing, with the Democrats saying -- cut out the amount of time that you all can freely debate and with the Republicans standing up to say -- we believe in free debate and freedom of speech. I'm sorry to see this. I don't see that the debate privilege has been misused in the six years that I have been in the House of Representatives. I do see that sometimes members need more persuasion to be able to look at something from a different view or perspective. I see the same thing in court when I appear before a judge that many times the oral argument may have repetition in it. But many times it is that repetition coming from a slightly different angle that will persuade the court to look at the matter in a different way. That's all we're asking for here.

"It's the opportunity for us to stand up and represent the 250,000 people that we Republicans represent and be able to ask you to look at things in a slightly different way, a slightly more open way. And because these rules will prevent us from having that full freedom of speech that we used to enjoy here in the House of Representatives, I can't vote in favor of the rules."

At 1:08 o'clock p.m., Representative Ward asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:10 o'clock p.m.

Upon reconvening at 1:10 o'clock p.m., Representative Marumoto rose on a point of information and asked:

"I would like to ask the movant some questions, if possible."

The Chair answered:

"We just had a recess, Representative. You should have asked the question at that time. You had ample opportunity."

Representative Marumoto: "Well, may I rise to speak in opposition?"

Chair: "You may rise to speak in opposition. Please proceed."

Representative Marumoto stated:

"Thank you very much.

"In my point of inquiry, I note that in these rules there are some new subcommittees formed on intergovernmental relations, taxation, and capital improvements, I believe within the Committee on Finance, and my question was simply whether these subcommittees would have proportional representation. I am wondering whether a Minority member would be serving on these committees.

"My second question had to do with page 16 of the Rules. I notice there is an interesting deletion. Deleted is this sentence: 'The requirement of prior concurrence as applied to Standing Committees under these Rules shall apply to Conference Committees in the same manner,' and I just wanted an explanation."

The Chair responded:

"That's a fair question. Representative Herkes?"

Representative Herkes answered:

"On the question on page 16, on the Conference Committees, the procedure is that the subject matter committee chair serves on the Conference Committee and so there is the ability for those Conference Committees to have concurrence from the chairs of the committees.

"What we're trying to do is to make sure the Conference Committees work in a timely manner. Those of you that serve on Conference Committees know that many times they move rather swiftly in the closing days of the Legislature, and we still think that the principle of prior concurrence is upheld by following the deletion of this rule because the committee chairs serve on those Conference Committees."

Chair: "Will you please answer the other question as to the composition of the subcommittees in Finance."

Representative Herkes: "I think that is covered elsewhere in the Rules requiring it."

Chair: "Requiring that all be represented by the parties?"

Representative Herkes: "That is right."

Representative Marumoto continued:

"Mr. Speaker, thank you very much. I would like to conclude my remarks in opposition.

"I understand that the subject matter committee chair will be on the Conference Committee, but I think that's always been more or less the practice. It would appear to me that this deletion would dilute the deliberations and decisions of the subject matter committees. And it doesn't directly affect the Minority as much because we are not chairman, but all the members work very hard in subject matter committees and I believe this change may negate much of their work.

"For this reason, and because of the prior amendment where we limit debate and limit dissention, I will be voting no on this resolution.

"Thank you."

Representative Kawananakoa then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote on this motion, "due to the fact that 50.1 has not been amended and would otherwise limit our debate."

Representative Halford then rose to ask the Clerk to register a no vote, "because of the constriction of the amount of time available to us in these new rules, I would like to register a no vote."

Representative McDermott then rose to ask the Clerk to register a no vote for him "because of Rule 50.1."

Representative Meyer then rose to ask the Clerk to register a no vote, "because this body has not increased in size and yet the debate time is cut in half. I can't go along with the rules."

Representative Moses then rose and stated:

"I, too, would like to register a no vote to indicate my opposition to the change to 50.1 and note for the Majority members that although the Majority members had indicated during debate that this was not a partisan issue, if you look at the record of votes, it is definitely a partisan issue -- all Democrats voting no.

"I would like to quote Thomas Jefferson in his first inaugural speech where he said: 'All, too, will bear in mind the sacred principle, that though the will of the majority is in all cases to prevail, that will, to be rightful, must be reasonable; that the minority possesses their equal rights which equal law must protect, and to violate would be oppression.'

"Thank you very much."

Representative Pendleton then rose to register his no vote "for the reasons stated earlier."

Representative Aiona then rose to register his no vote.

Representative Fox then rose to register his no vote.

Representative Ward then rose to register his no vote.

The motion was put to a vote by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 14 was adopted, with Representatives Aiona, Fox, Halford, Kawananakoa, Marumoto, McDermott, Meyer, Moses, Pendleton, Thielen and Ward voting no. (Representatives Chang, Menor and Whalen were excused.)

JOINT SESSION

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The Joint Session of the House of Representatives and the Senate was called to order at 10:10 o'clock a.m. by the Honorable Joseph Souki, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

At this time, the Speaker welcomed and introduced the following distinguished guests to the members of the Nineteenth Legislature:

The Chair appointed Representatives P. Oshiro, Okamura, M. Oshiro and Ward and Senators Levin, Ihara, McCartney and Anderson to escort the Honorable Benjamin J. Cayetano, Governor of the State of Hawaii, to the rostrum.

Representative Kawakami and Senator Baker presented Governor Cayetano with floral leis on behalf of the House of Representatives and Senate.

The Speaker then presented to the members of the Nineteenth Legislature and guests, the Honorable Benjamin J. Cayetano, stating:

"Members of the Nineteenth Legislature, ladies and gentlemen, please join me in extending our warmest aloha and welcome to the Governor of the State of Hawaii, The Honorable Benjamin J. Cayetano."

The Governor addressed the Joint Session, as follows:

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

"I want to invite you and Norman to join me in the Hawaiian diet. Let me tell you, it works, and I urge all of you to look into it. It really is a great program. It tells you a lot about the Hawaiian culture as well. Senator Kawamoto is still visible. He's been losing so much weight that he might not be here. He's on it and we truly, truly enjoy it.

"Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, Lt. Governor Hirono, Chief Justice Moon, members of the State Legislature, Mayor Harris, Mayor Yamashiro, distinguished guests and friends from our military, members of the Consular Corps, my fellow Hawaiians -- Aloha.

"It is truly a privilege to once again speak on the State of the State. You know, this is my third State of the State and at this time I think I would like to go back two years and see where we were at that time. Then, my administration was brand new. The state was in its worst fiscal crisis ever. The budget submitted to you was not mine, and we struggled to find answers to the huge fiscal problems before us. State spending had skyrocketed.

"Between 1987 and 1995, general fund expenditures for the Executive Branch grew from \$1.6 billion to \$3 billion. A whopping 88.9 percent or an annual increase of 8.3 percent! Every state department had grown by leaps and bounds except one, the Office of the Lt. Governor.

"Dozens of unnecessary boards and commissions were established to oversee virtually every state agency and to deal, if seems, with nearly every state problem. A federal court consent decree loomed over our prisons because of overcrowded conditions, and our State Hospital entered its 22nd year of non-accreditation because it could not meet national mental health standards.

"Our state bureaucracy was a maze of red tape. Our cumbersome state regulatory rules frustrated and slowed private sector economic development adding more to Hawaii's reputation as a poor place to do business. And our workers' compensation and no-fault auto insurance premiums were among the highest in the nation. Well, we rolled up our sleeves and we went to work. We made hard decisions and we have made good progress.

"First, we put our fiscal house in order. Under our financial plan, there is no need for layoffs or furloughs. Moreover, our plan provides enough funding for modest tax relief for our people and modest pay increases for our state workers.

"The 12-year old federal consent decree will be lifted this summer after the improvements to the women's prison at Olomana are completed. Recently, the State Hospital regained national accreditation after 22 years of not being accredited.

"We eliminated more than twenty boards and commissions, fifteen nonessential programs and streamlined sixty programs to improve efficiency. We cut red tape. Two years ago, it took five years to build a school. We've cut that time by at least one-third and we will do even better this year.

"We hired outside engineers from the private sector to cut our backlog of clean water permits, and we adopted new rules which will speed up the process. We reduced the size of state government by 3,000 positions.

"And over the past two years, I am proud to say, we have kept the growth of our state government below the rate of inflation and the rate of our state's population growth.

"And with your help and with the help of the Lt. Governor and the Insurance Commissioner, we reduced Hawaii's workers' compensation premiums by 27 percent, a \$100 million savings for Hawaii's businesses.

"Let me now speak about some of the issues we must deal with over the short term.

"Hawaii's auto insurance carriers enjoyed record profits over the past years. It is now time to give Hawaii's consumers a break. We will submit a no-fault automobile insurance bill which will reduce premiums by 25-30 percent. Based on my informal discussions with your leadership, I believe and I feel confident we will reach common ground on this issue.

"In my first year as Governor, I vowed to resolve the long-standing issues that have plagued the Department of

Hawaiian Home Lands. I strongly supported the passage of the \$600 million settlement simply because it was the right thing to do.

"This year my budget not only funds the annual \$30 million payment -- it doubles the amount paid, giving the department \$60 million each year over the next two years. This prepayment will save the state money and will give the department more resources for housing.

"But, you know, building more homes is only part of the solution. Thousands of Native Hawaiians remain on the waiting list, but only a small number can qualify to buy homes.

"To address this problem, the department is introducing new and innovative means of financing such as a new rent-to-own policy for homesteaders who would not otherwise qualify.

"So far, 349 homes have been fully completed, with 1,100 homestead lots in various stages of construction. Another 1,100 are currently under design. It is my hope that by the end of my first term, we will complete or begin construction on 3,000 homestead lots.

"This session we face another challenge. We must resolve the state's differences with the Office of Hawaiian Affairs over the ceded lands. And it is important that we resolve this matter in a way that is fair to all of the citizens of this state. It is a difficult task, but I believe working together in good faith, we can do it. Therefore, I will ask OHA to join me as I convene a task force of community leaders to work out a settlement of our differences.

"Making Hawaii a safe place to work, a safe place to live and to visit is a high priority of my administration. As your Governor, I intend to use all of the crime-fighting tools under my control to reduce crime and its impact in Hawaii.

"First, we need more prison expansion in all of our counties. With your help, we will build 1,000 new prison beds over the biennium. In addition, we will lease prison beds from the federal government when it completes building its new prison at Elliott Street.

"The state has the responsibility and the organization to lead the fight against crime. I take this responsibility very, very seriously. Last year, Attorney General Bronster chaired the Law Enforcement Coalition which includes every police chief and prosecutor of this state. The Coalition produced a crime package which I strongly support and which I urge you to support. The new legislation will accomplish the following:

- * Mandate a jail term for repeat criminals convicted of 3 misdemeanors within a 5-year period;
- * Provide public access to information about sex offenders;
- * Make the 8 percent of the youth population who commit more than 50 percent of the crimes accountable for their actions by lowering the age at which the courts may treat them as adults;
- * Impose a 'truth-in-sentencing' which requires defendants to serve 85 percent of their terms.

"You know, there is no greater threat to our society than illegal drug abuse, and we must do more to win the fight against drugs. For that reason, I am proposing legislation that will do the following:

- * It will strengthen our drug laws;
- * It will expand by 200 beds our successful KASHBOX program at Waiawa.

"These efforts to reform laws and build prison beds must be coupled, however, with community programs in order to truly make a difference. You know, in New York City and in other cities throughout the country, crime reduction has resulted from effective use of more police officers on the streets and strong community partnerships to fight crime.

"In this regard, I have asked my top national guardsman, General Edward Richardson, to develop security watch programs in neighborhoods which do not have one. This program, manned by volunteer national guardsmen, is called the Na Koa Watch.

"Finally, let us always remember the victims. Too often, the victims of crime are ignored. You know, we spend a lot of money protecting the rights of offenders, but we need to also use our resources to help the victims of their crimes by continuing to fund the Victim Witness Assistance Program for which I ask for your support.

"Our people are blessed to live in a state with the best natural resources on earth. Hawaii's environment is the God given treasure that provides us with an unsurpassed quality of life. Hawaii is an ocean state with the fourth longest shoreline and the largest coral reef system in the United States.

"And yet, we spend less on protecting our marine resources than desert states such as Arizona. This neglect threatens our fish species like the ehu and the onaga and endangers the life of our coral reefs. As an ocean state, we must protect these resources. And we will.

"To achieve this, I propose to double the state aquatics budget by \$4 million over the biennium and I propose to substantially increase the number of conservation enforcement officers at the Department of Land and Natural Resources. The added manpower will expand our law enforcement capability and provide more aquatic scientists to protect our marine resources.

"Over the past two years, we have paid much attention to sustaining Hawaii's unique and special resources. For example, with volunteer help, our parks on Kauai and on the Big Island were transformed from neglected eyesores to true island wonders. This year, we hope to add Ka Iwi to our string of wilderness pearls.

"Last year, Congress made significant changes in the nation's welfare laws. States now have much more responsibility for designing and funding their own welfare programs.

"The new welfare law provides a five-year life time limit on all cash assistance. This means that all ablebodied welfare recipients are now required to find work or become actively involved in preparing themselves for work. Hawaii's new welfare program ends the old idea of 'entitlement.' Those days are gone, and it stresses individual and family responsibility.

"Our new program will reduce benefits ... that is true, but it will also encourage people to work by permitting them to keep more of their income and assets. The program encourages individual responsibility and, you know, we are already seeing positive results.

"Family and individual responsibility is an important theme in my administration. However, to help people go to work, we must create jobs. "The private sector must now step up to the plate and work with us to provide job opportunities. The Department of Human Services has begun a new Public-Private Employment Partnership that provides incentives for businesses to hire welfare recipients.

"In addition, I have asked all of my department heads and state offices to assist in providing training for welfare recipients. This program which we call WORK PLUS, calls for state workers to help train welfare recipients on the job. We will have welfare recipients working in our different departments. Helping welfare recipients is not in the job description of our state workers, but it should be in their hearts, because getting people off welfare is everyone's business and is to everyone's benefit.

"Finally, our state has a strong tradition for caring for all its people. And even though the federal government is withdrawing funding for legal immigrants, this Governor will not do it in Hawaii. It is not right. It is wrong, and I ask for your support.

"Nothing -- nothing -- is more important than the education we give our children. A quality education system goes far beyond preparing our children to earn a living. Our entire society is uplifted when everyone is better educated.

"I stated many times that education is my highest priority, and working with you, I believe I have demonstrated my commitment in the shaping of our budget over the past two years. While every other state department was suffering budget cuts ranging from 10 to 22 percent, the DOE's budget was cut only three percent in 1995, and only in the administration area. Not one cent was cut from the instruction budget. By mid-1996, the DOE was the only state department to be restored to full funding.

"That is my commitment to public education, and that commitment continues. My proposed \$1 billion CIP budget will double the yearly \$90 million appropriation that goes for construction of DOE's projects. This means \$360 million will be spent over the biennium to build new schools, classrooms, libraries and cafeterias. To ease overcrowding in our schools, we will build 377 new classrooms.

"And you know, a few months ago we received an unexpected bonus for our public schools. We reached agreement with GTE Hawaiian Telephone to add 7,000 new telephones in our public school system at very little cost due to the declining telephone rates in the commercial area. This will address the serious shortage of telephones for teachers in our public schools. But although new classrooms and telephones can help, the disappointing test scores indicate that significant fundamental changes must be made before real gains can be made in our schools.

"Therefore, I propose two fundamental changes. First, I agree with you, Mr. Speaker, that it is time to return to an appointed Board of Education. I have the utmost respect for the elected members of the Board of Education. But unlike the elected school boards on the mainland, our Board of Education does not have the power to raise revenue to finance our schools. A school board without the power to raise revenues is limited in its ability to govern. We need to return to an appointed school board. This change will clear the lines of accountability and hold the Governor fully accountable for public education. "The second change that I would like to propose is that we must extend Hawaii's school year. Hawaii has a 180day school year -- the shortest in the country.

"By comparison, Japan's school year is 240 days, of which 210 are committed to basic instruction. The disadvantages to Hawaii's school children are obvious; and the disappointing test scores and critical reports show it.

"We have proposed an extended school year in our collective bargaining negotiations. And I say to the teachers, accept our proposal and we will work with the Legislature to find the money to pay for it so that our schools will have an extended school year and day.

"A few years ago, the Legislature passed a law which permitted teachers to take early retirement without penalty. More than 900 teachers retired taking with them invaluable classroom experience.

"The early retirement law was a mistake. It is doubtful whether it produced any savings, but it is clear to me that too many of our most experienced teachers left the classroom prematurely. Our children need experienced teachers back in their classrooms.

"Therefore, I will send to you a bill which will permit them to return to the classrooms full time without penalty.

"I propose that we permit this for a limited period of time -- perhaps four years -- in order for the DOE and the University of Hawaii to develop a plan to train more local teachers to make up for the shortage, and I ask for your support.

"With respect to the University of Hawaii, I am pleased that we recently reached agreement with the faculty on a four-year contract. The agreement was timely. And it was fair. Both sides worked hard to avoid a strike that would have adversely affected our students. It is a major step forward for the students, the faculty, the University, and the State of Hawaii.

"We will help the University of Hawaii. I am committed to the University of Hawaii, and we are proposing that 22 percent of the CIP initiative, a \$1 billion CIP budget, be applied to long-standing construction needs of the University. First, we will build a new marine science building for the University of Hawaii at Hilo. Then we will build a telecommunications and media center at Maui Community College. We will build the third phase of Hamilton Library at the University of Hawaii-Manoa, and we will design and construct the new educational centers in West Hawaii and on Molokai to spread the University's services to the people of those regions. And finally, this year we will begin the planning for the new campus -- the West Oahu University campus in Kapolei.

"All across the country, public funding for state universities have declined. And as a result, state universities have embarked on major fundraising campaigns. The University of Hawaii has successfully raised about \$25 million each year since 1994. The University is now considering mounting a major five-year campaign in 1997. As Governor, I wholeheartedly support this effort and I urge the public, the Legislature, and the UH alumni to join me.

"Therefore, I propose that the state match the earnings from the additional endowment funds raised in this campaign. This means that the state will contribute to the University's operating budget for every newly endowed chair, scholarship, or program. I ask for your support on this issue. "Our biggest challenge is to stimulate the economy and to provide more jobs.

"Two strategies are available to the government that can increase the number of jobs in the near term. First, we can increase expenditures for capital improvement projects, such as our \$1 billion CIP projects; and second, we can increase our expenditures for tourism promotion and marketing.

"I have submitted, as I have stated earlier, a \$1 billion CIP budget for the next two fiscal years.

"Many of the projects represent investments in the future prosperity and strength of our community.

"We will work with the City and County of Honolulu to revitalize Waikiki. We will open the Convention Center within budget and on time. We will dredge and improve the Ala Wai Canal.

"And in Kakaako, we will provide the infrastructure for the development of a major shopping center that will involve private investment of \$200 million and create 1,700 jobs.

"We are planning, in Kakaako, a Children's Center with the Children's Museum and Theater at its core. Our plan is to include a world-class aquarium in Kakaako.

"Despite all the benefits of an expanded construction program, there has been criticism that we can't afford it. On the contrary, I believe we cannot afford not to do it.

"The construction sector has lost nearly 10,000 jobs since the early 1990s. We need to put those construction workers back to work so they can stimulate the economy, so they can pay taxes, and they can earn a living wage for their families and themselves.

"Hawaii's tourist industry is the engine that drives our economy. The industry provides approximately 178,000 jobs. Last year, tourists spent \$11 billion, generating approximately 25 percent of our tax revenues. To help boost our tourist industry, I will be sending you an emergency message for an additional \$10 million to be given to HVB for marketing and promotion. This will be over and above the normal appropriation that we give them.

"While tourism remains our primary industry, we should continue to encourage economic diversification.

"We should recognize our strengths. We have a superior quality of life that is very attractive to business. A good example is Square, USA, a large computer graphics and animation firm. Square, USA is planning to set up a design center here in Hawaii, employing 200 professionals to take advantage of that quality of life. About a hundred of those professional jobs will be open to Hawaii.

"To ensure that Hawaii residents get jobs, they have donated equipment and have offered to cooperate with the University to develop relevant classes. We need to encourage businesses like Square, USA to come to Hawaii.

"Finally, we are moving forward on our Enterprise Zone program after years of inactivity. This program promotes expansion of current businesses and location of new businesses in distressed areas by offering tax relief for as long as seven years. The counties and the state have designated ten Enterprise Zones, including the recent designation of Molokai and three more on Oahu. To date, approximately 25 new businesses have enrolled in the program with more applications being received every week.

"We have been active in our Asia-Pacific initiatives.

"During the past year, I and members of my cabinet led several trade and investment missions to Asia. Upon invitation of the respective governments, we went to Japan, China, Okinawa, Korea, Taiwan, and the Philippines.

"As a result, Hawaii has received 26 investment petitions from foreign investors, representing \$35 million in new investment and about 180 new jobs. We have also been asked to undertake projects in Asia that will provide employment for our architects, engineers, and professional consultants.

"Last year, I spoke of Hawaii as the Health Care Center of the Pacific. Together with the private sector, we are promoting Hawaii's expertise and facilities to gain visibility in Asia and throughout the country. Several of our hospitals have formed partnerships with globallyknown health centers. Last year, The Joslin Diabetics Center of Boston and the Ningen Dock Diagnostic Program of Japan joined Straub Hospital; and this year, Hamamatsu Photonics Inc. has joined Queen's Medical Center. We have been talking to M.D. Anderson, the University of Texas Cancer Center, a leading cancer center in the world, and I can tell you that they are interested in coming to Hawaii and have already exchanged letters of intent with four hospitals, and I look forward to their presence in Hawaii over the next few years.

"Our strategy to make Hawaii a world-class center for state-of-the-art medical and health services is beginning to take shape, and I ask for your support.

"The opening up of former sugar lands has created new opportunities in diversified agriculture. We have seen a dramatic increase in the production of vegetables and fruits formerly imported from the mainland.

"Today, 95 percent of our sweet potatoes and watermelons, 85 percent of our bell peppers, 70 percent of our tomatoes, and 60 percent of our cucumbers are home grown. Ten years ago, no one would have thought that was possible, but our small farmers are doing it, and we must help them.

"To help our farmers export their products to the mainland and foreign countries, the State and the County of Hawaii, Mayor Yamashiro and I, will work together to help the private sector build an irradiation facility in Hilo. This will help our farmers export their produce and fruits and flowers to the mainland and other places. And I ask for your support on this venture.

"Forestry is also becoming a new growth industry in Hawaii. Hamakua Timber, connected to Prudential Timber, has already begun planting on former sugarcane land in Hamakua. We are finalizing negotiations to lease state lands in Hamakua to OGI Paper Company, one of the largest paper companies in the world. I am confident that OGI will be here very, very shortly.

"These are some of the economic development initiatives that we have taken, and I ask that you support them.

"Now let me turn to the issue of tax relief. I'll come to you and propose major changes in my tax policy to deal with the issues of economic development and tax relief. "One of the major concerns that we face is that when the Convention Center is opened this year, we will not have enough first-class hotel rooms in Waikiki. To encourage economic development, I propose a two-year window in which hotel operators are encouraged to renovate their properties by being able to claim as an income tax credit the entire amount of the general excise tax paid for such renovations.

"The excise tax credit will also encourage renovations of hotels in the established areas of the neighbor islands.

"We need to do more to stimulate tourism. We need to expand our business frontiers beyond our state. I propose that we eliminate the excise tax on export services to allow our architects, engineers, and professional consultants to compete effectively for employment outside the State of Hawaii.

"To stimulate affordable home construction in the next two years, I propose tax credits to first-time home buyers buying affordable homes.

"These Hula Mae eligibles would receive a 2 percent income tax credit applied up to \$200,000 of the purchase of a home resulting in a maximum credit of \$4,000. We call this the 2x2 program. The 2x2 program should increase the demand for affordable homes and create additional home construction activity. I ask for your support for these home buyers.

"There is no doubt that the current economic situation has hurt some islands and some communities more than others. Certainly, we know that it has hurt Kauai and Molokai more than it has hurt Oahu, Maui and the Big Island.

"Therefore, I am proposing an 18-month moratorium from the collection of excise taxes for businesses on both islands for every business that requests this. I ask that you support this measure.

"Taxes for individuals should also be reduced when we are able. It is especially needed to assist those at the lower end of the economic spectrum; for those with extraordinary expenses; and to encourage post-high school education.

"I propose eliminating the current \$27 food tax credit per person and in its place reduce state income taxes by 25-100 percent for those with incomes less than \$22,000. This would provide tax relief to at least 250,000 taxpayers tax relief which is overdue and is needed, and I ask for your support in this measure.

"Because of my own personal experience with my father, I have long been concerned over the extraordinary expenses endured by those caring for their loved ones.

"Therefore, I am proposing a tax deduction of up to \$50,000 for amounts paid for qualified long-term care services and premiums. I ask that you support this measure.

"In this era of rising post-high school tuition costs and the ever more pressing need for more education, I am proposing a \$5,000 tax deduction for all post-high school tuition costs. I ask that you support this, as well.

"Now, there are some who may wonder where we will get the money to fund the proposals I have made today. Let me state that we have accounted for every proposal -dollar for dollar -- in our financial plan which will be submitted to you. We have already briefed your Ways and Means and your Finance chairs, and I believe that the proposals we have made are affordable, and that there is something this year for everyone, for our taxpayers, for our state workers, and for our people.

"You know, as I sat in this House last week and listened to the leaders of both parties -- the Speaker, the Majority Leader, the Minority Leader -- heard their arguments, their little digs at each other, I thought about the first time I sat here 22 years ago when I served as a member of this body. Today, however, I am thinking of the future. I see a common thread that connects the leaders of both our parties -- Democrats and Republicans, liberals and conservatives.

"We have one thing in common. We all love Hawaii. We want a future for Hawaii with productive, welleducated people with high quality jobs in a diverse dynamic economy. We want a smart economy where Hawaii has the latest technology and the value added is knowledge.

"We want a Hawaii where our children will have the opportunity to enjoy a fulfilling life. We want a Hawaii with compassion for the less fortunate. We want a future where our unique environment is still alive and beautiful -- a future where we are all safe and secure. A Hawaii where people continue to care deeply about each other, a Hawaii where the Aloha Spirit is alive and well. -- a future, where we are all safe and secure. A Hawaii where he he have a safe and secure and well where the Aloha Spirit is alive and well.

"Over the past two years, we -- you and I -- have worked together to lay the foundation for that future. Now together we must build on that foundation. I ask you to join me.

"Thank you very much and Aloha."

Senate President Mizuguchi then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Governor Cayetano, for sharing your thoughts and aspirations for Hawaii with us today.

"We accept the challenges with a firm determination to make the tough and right decisions. In these troubled economic times, let us approach our State's problems in a spirit of cooperation and collaboration.

"Our success depends on how swiftly we act, how boldly and creative we venture, and how far we reach out to each other to build consensus. Starting today, we will be receiving your administration's proposals.

"The Legislature shares some of the many goals that you have set forth in your speech. For our part, we pledge to give them our full attention and consideration.

"Again, Governor, mahalo for your thoughtful State of the State address.

"If there is no further business by members of the Senate and the House of Representatives, I now declare this Joint Session adjourned."

At 10:55 o'clock a.m., the President declared the Joint Session adjourned.

JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Nineteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1997, was called to order at 10:04 o'clock a.m. by the Honorable Norman Mizuguchi, President of the Senate.

At this time, the Senate President welcomed and introduced the following honored and distinguished guests to the members of the Nineteenth Legislature:

Senate President Mizuguchi then appointed Senators Chumbley, Matsunaga and Slom and Representatives Tom, Yamane and Thielen to escort The Honorable Ronald T.Y. Moon, Chief Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court, to the rostrum.

Senator Baker and Representative Kawakami presented Chief Justice Moon with floral leis on behalf of the Senate and the House of Representatives, respectively.

Senate President Mizuguchi then presented to the members of the Nineteenth Legislature and guests, The Honorable Ronald T.Y. Moon, Chief Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court, saying:

"Members of the Nineteenth Legislature, ladies and gentlemen, please join me in extending our warmest aloha and welcome to the Chief Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court, The Honorable Ronald T.Y. Moon.

Chief Justice Moon addressed the Joint Session, as follows:

"Thank you very much.

"I just had a fleeting thought. After that resounding round of applause, I thought what might really make you happy is for me to say 'thank you' and sit down, and perhaps I might have gained another resounding round of applause. But I am very concerned about the people that paid to get in here and so I won't do that.

"Governor Cayetano, Lt. Governor Hirono, Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, distinguished members of the Nineteenth Legislature, former Chief Justice Richardson, Hawaii State Bar President Alan Van Etten, my fellow judges, other public servants, and special guests: "It is a great honor and privilege to be the first Chief Justice invited to deliver the State of the Judiciary address to a joint session of the Hawaii State Legislature. I thank the leadership and members of the Nineteenth Legislature for this opportunity and hope that this is the birth of a long-lasting tradition. I truly believe that this is a historic event, as important in its symbolism as it is in its substance, and that it marks the beginning of a new dialogue and cooperative spirit among our three branches of government as we pursue our shared goal of providing for the common good of the people of Hawaii.

"The state of the Judiciary is sound, but it is fragile because it has no political constituency and is dependent upon the Executive's and Legislature's willingness to maintain the Judiciary as a strong, independent third branch of government. Thus, I take this opportunity to comment on the importance of preserving an independent Judiciary, to apprise you of the current state of affairs in our third branch of government, and to share with you some of our plans for the future. I promise not to bombard you with statistics, and because I realize that each of you have much work to do, I will be brief, which I'm sure everyone understands is a relative term -especially when it comes from a person in the legal profession.

"Standing before you today reminds me of speaking at a business conference several years ago. After my presentation, one of the organizers asked me whether it bothered me to see some of the attendees looking at their watches. I said, 'No, not until they started shaking them!'

"Since most of us here today are associated with one of the three separate, independent, and equal branches of government -- please feel free to shake your watches at any time.

"As you know, tri-partite government in Hawaii is a relatively recent development as compared to the federal system and many of the other states. Under the rule of absolute monarchy, all executive, legislative, and judicial powers -- as we understand them today -- were vested in the Monarch, along with his advisory council of alii. However, soon after the arrival of Western missionaries to the islands in the 1820's, the concept of tri-partite government began to replace the existing monarchy as evidenced by the Constitution of 1852, which laid the foundation for our present structure.

"Since statehood and the adoption of our 1959 Constitution, legislative actions have reaffirmed the concepts of the separation of powers and judicial independence. For example: In 1974, legislation afforded the Judiciary full authority to develop its own budget, free from executive control, and to receive and disburse its own monies; in 1977, the Legislature conferred upon the Judiciary the ability to fully develop and administer its own system of personnel administration; and in 1979, judicial independence was further solidified by legislation that created the Commission on Judicial Conduct and that bestowed upon the Supreme Court full authority over judicial discipline.

"Although the phrase 'separate, independent, and equal branches of government' may suggest to some that there are no limits as to what each branch can do, such perception is, of course, inaccurate. The system of checks and balances, built into our system of government, has, at its core, the purpose and intent of protecting our citizens against one branch becoming too powerful and of guarding against the potential for excesses and abuses of power. Therefore, as each branch asserts its constitutional independence, discord and tension may arise as a natural consequence. "For example, the courts are sometimes characterized as legislating from the bench, that is, making or remaking the law. When deciding cases, judges often apply common law, statutory law, or constitutional law to new facts and circumstances. In so doing, we do not intend to usurp the legislative function. However, under our system of checks and balances, if we stray into legislative prerogative, the Legislature has the ability to cure the trespass. As you know, in our legal system, statutes trump common law, and constitutions trump statutes. We are ever mindful that the Legislature -- the peoples' representatives -- hold the highest trumps. That is, the peoples' representatives have the authority, within constitutional limits, to write or rewrite statutes and to propose amendments to our Constitution.

"Thus, although none of the branches are absolutely independent due to the system of checks and balances, each branch must maintain its independence in order to carry out its constitutional duties.

"Judicial independence, as it relates to judges, means that our decisions must be based <u>solely</u> on the legal merits of a case -- not on popular opinion polls or surveys, or the views of special interest groups. In the words of United States Supreme Court Chief Justice Rehnquist, judicial independence is 'one of the crown jewels of our system of government today...and is essential to [the Judiciary's] proper functioning and must be retained,' which brings me to a subject that has, in recent years, been discussed at the Legislature and which I understand may once again surface this session, and that is, the subject of the election of judges.

"Throughout my thirty-one years in the legal profession, I have observed that, whenever a court's ruling is not in accord with the views of some of our citizens, they will cry out for reforms, such as the election of judges. As you know, the federal system, long ago, shunned the elective system in order to protect and maintain judicial independence. And, presently, several elective-judge states are either considering, or in the process of adopting, a non-elective process similar to that which currently exists in our state. I submit that, if we are interested in strengthening our government process, any move toward electing judges would be a step backwards.

"In our system of representative government, the premise that members of the legislative branch and the heads of the executive branch of government should be elected by the people they each represent, that is, their constituents makes good sense. They are, under our system of government, guided by popular opinion and are expected to carry out the will of the people. On the other hand, judges are prohibited from having constituents or from engaging in politics because our decisions, and I reiterate and I emphasize, must be based solely on the legal merits of a case. And therein lies the crucial distinction between judges and representatives of the legislative and executive branches.

"If judges are elected, they would necessarily be compelled to raise campaign funds. Consider: Where will these contributions come from? Judges in elective states obtain hundreds of thousands of dollars in campaign contributions mainly from lawyers, who appear before them, and special interest groups, whose cases may be decided by them, raising serious conflicts of interest and appearances of impropriety.

"I am not saying that disagreeing with a court's ruling is wrong or that we are above criticism. What causes great concern is the type of uninformed, emotionallybased criticisms that we've recently read in letters to the editor or heard about on radio talk shows that have resulted in such recommendations as prorating judges' salaries based on the length of the sentences they issue. As judges, we welcome and respect informed or 'principled' criticism, which is in part our American legal tradition. In the words of William Henry Hastie, one of the most distinguished legal figures of this century and the first Black judge appointed under Article III of the federal constitution:

'Principled criticism serves as an invaluable corrective of otherwise unrealized error. But such criticism is quite different from outcry against the courts from those who seek to make them partisan: whether promanagement or pro-labor, pro-prosecution or prodefense, pro-government or pro-private citizen, proinjured party or pro-insurer. Any attempt to make the courts partisan, or to cause the public to want partisan decisions, is, at best, a misconception of the judicial role and, at worst, an effort to prostitute the courts and subvert their assigned function: that is, the rational adjudication of controversies in accordance with the law.'

"Speaking of public 'misconception of the judicial role,' I submit that underlying much of the criticism about judges and the courts is a misconception or misunderstanding -- by the public, the media, and even sometimes by legislators -- of our justice system. Such misunderstanding can undermine the effectiveness of the Judiciary and can erode the community's trust and confidence in the courts.

"One popular misconception is that the Judiciary is responsible for releasing into the community arrested persons who have a history of multiple arrests. The fact is that the courts play no role in the arresting or charging process. The police, or prosecutors, may decide -- and rightly so -- to release an accused, pending further investigation or because of a lack of evidence.

"Public misconception of the judicial process is probably most apparent in the area of sentencing. The judge, of course, is the most visible figure when sentence is pronounced. A judge imposes a prison term or grants probation (that is, no prison term) in accordance with the applicable sentencing statutes. Once a term of imprisonment is imposed, however, the determination of how long a defendant actually stays in prison passes to others in the executive branch. The very serious problem of prison overcrowding has compelled the Department of Public Safety and the Paroling Authority -- not the courts -- to release defendants into the community before their sentences have been fully served. The fact that the Department and the Paroling Authority have no alternative is a mockery of legislative intent and of our judgments. As such, the Judiciary fully supports the Governor and those legislators who are calling for more prison space.

"Another public misconception is that, unless judges are in their courtrooms handling trials, they are not working. Admittedly, a judge's work is most visible when he or she is sitting on the bench. The fact is, however, that a large part of a judge's work is done outside the courtroom. Judges spend countless hours reviewing motions, legal memoranda, and other documents in preparation for trials, hearings, conferences, and so forth. Judges are also involved with various Judiciary, community, and charitable boards, commissions, and committees, actively working for the improvement of our judicial process and to fulfill our obligation and responsibility to inform and educate the public about the operation of their judicial system. "I have taken the time to speak on these matters of uninformed criticisms and misconceptions of the Judiciary because I firmly believe that these and other misconceptions must be corrected if we are to keep and deserve the public's trust and confidence and to preserve judicial independence. The late United States Supreme Court Justice Thurgood Marshall once said, 'We must never forget that the only real source of power that we as judges can tap is the respect of the people.' Without public confidence in an independent Judiciary, court orders and judgments would be rendered meaningless, legislative intent would be undermined, chaos would reign, and our system of government would surely deteriorate.

"In our continuing efforts to inform and educate, we are currently organizing a Media/Judiciary workshop to promote dialogue and cooperation in the exchange of information to facilitate the concerns of both sides pertaining to the reporting of judicial news and the obtaining of judicial information. Also, for the past two years, the Judiciary has invited members of the Legislature to learn more about the judicial process through our Day-In-Court Program. Some of you have participated in the Program and have remarked how valuable the experience was. The invitation remains open to all of you to spend a day with us at your convenience.

"Let me now take a few minutes and present to you an assessment of Hawaii's Judiciary. I must say that after the past year, with its budgetary cuts and RIFs, I wondered when December 1996 rolled around whether the Judiciary was entering 1997 or evacuating 1996.

"I share with you four observations about Hawaii's Judiciary. First, in spite of the economic straits and having to do more with less, Hawaii's Judiciary is one of the best judicial systems in the nation.

"The excellence of Hawaii's Judiciary is the result of the commitment and dedication of all of its employees to deliver the highest quality judicial service to the citizens of Hawaii. Hawaii has much to be proud of its Judiciary. Among our recent professional accomplishments are a Special Merit Citation from the American Judicature Society for our Domestic Violence Backlog Reduction efforts; an award from the National Institute for Dispute Resolution presented to our Center for Alternative Dispute Resolution for its significant contributions to innovation in public dispute resolution; and the City's 'Project of the Year Award,' honoring the District Court of the First Circuit for its Officer-On-Call Program.

"It is often said that the quality of justice is determined by the quality of judges. Since the inception of the Judicial Performance Program, judicial evaluations statewide indicate that our trial judges have been uniformly rated by attorneys who appear before them as possessing good judicial management skills, comportment, and legal ability, thus providing objective proof that Hawaii's judicial selection process works. The Program is being expanded to include per diem judges, and, thereafter, will include all appellate court justices and judges.

"In addition to serving as an invaluable tool for individual self-improvement and planning for continuing judicial education, these evaluations are also available to the Judicial Selection Commission to assist in its review of applicants for appointment or retention. We judges welcome such accountability.

"Our justices and judges have been working tirelessly to address the many critical issues brought before them. In September 1996, the appellate courts instituted temporary, emergency procedures to deal with the large inventory of pending and aging appeals, which numbered 1,327 at the end of fiscal year 1996. Recognizing that the liberty, financial, and emotional interests of your constituents required a more timely disposition, we appellate judges were compelled to resort to issuing summary disposition orders in some cases. I wish to emphasize that, notwithstanding these emergency measures, all of the justices and judges have and continue to carefully review and fully consider each case.

"Since September, the number of cases disposed of by way of disposition orders and opinions has more than tripled. And, although we are pleased with these results, we appellate judges strongly believe that litigants are entitled to full, explanatory opinions. We therefore find ourselves with conflicting goals -- that is, timely dispositions via summary disposition orders and shorter memorandum opinions versus issuing full, explanatory opinions that take much more time to write.

"Consequently, it is becoming increasingly obvious that neither goal will be adequately met under the current situation. In order to maintain a responsive and effective system of appellate review, the Judiciary is seeking authorization for additional positions on our Intermediate Court of Appeals this legislative session.

"My second observation is that, although resources are scarce, the Hawaii Judiciary continues in its effort to provide the people of Hawaii with accessible forums for the fair and prompt resolution of disputes, without undue hardship, cost, or delay. The Judiciary continues to research and develop alternative dispute resolution or ADR mechanisms, such as arbitration or mediation. Currently, we have in place eleven ADR programs at all court levels -- district, family, circuit, and appellate -that enable parties to utilize various ADR mechanisms to resolve their cases outside the courtroom. One of our most recent developments in this area is the mediation program at the appellate level. Although some practitioners initially expressed reservations about the possible success of mediation at such a late stage in a case, forty-one percent of the 102 appeals that have been processed through the Program were completely settled. In another seven percent of the cases, the parties either narrowed the issues on appeal or reached partial settlements. Such positive results are due in large part to the skill of our mediators -- that is, retired justices, judges, and semi-retired, seasoned members of the Bar. serving entirely on a pro bono or free-of-charge basis.

"Our continuing efforts to expand alternative dispute resolution are not limited to the appellate courts. New trial court rules require attorneys to meet face-to-face -early in the process -- to discuss whether ADR is appropriate, and the judge may now order the parties to participate in a specific ADR process.

"In our efforts to provide access to the courts by all of our citizens and to address public concerns about our judicial system, the Judiciary wholeheartedly supported, through its co-sponsorship with the Hawaii State Bar Association this past Fall, the Citizens' Conference on the Civil Justice System. Through this Conference, the Judiciary and the Bar created an opportunity for Hawaii's citizens to suggest tangible ways to improve our civil justice system. Over a three-month period, more than 300 members of our community responded to the call for solutions and action. Their hard work culminated in a one day Citizens' Conference where, through consensus, a number of recommendations were made. The Judiciary is committed to making those recommendations that relate to it a reality.

"Of particular significance is the Citizens' Conference recommendation regarding a statewide court reporter program. As a result of Hawaii's rich ethnic diversity, twenty-two and a half percent of your constituents do no speak English at home. This figure -- the fourth highest in the nation -- has significant implications. If the Judiciary is to be truly "accessible" to all, we must be able to service the non-English speaking public. We have trained our judges on the effective use of court interpreters, and we have begun to recruit and register interpreter candidates. Our biennium budget request includes a full-time position to coordinate our efforts in this critical area, and we are respectfully seek your support.

"In another effort to make Hawaii's courts more accessible, the Supreme Court adopted what is now commonly referred to as 'The No-Bounce Rule.' The rule essentially provides that the courts must accept all documents presented for filing, regardless of form. Although this means more work for the clerks and judges, the no-bounce policy has been well-received by the Bar, individuals who represent themselves, and other court users and represents our on-going commitment to promote substance over form.

"In the current difficult fiscal environment, the public and private sectors alike are turning to technology to help do more with less. The Judiciary is no exception. Accessibility to court information was recently enhanced through the development of the Judiciary Homepage, where you can now find information about caseloads, description of programs, and the latest Judiciary news and where we hope you will eventually be able to find court rules, forms, and information on more substantive matters.

"The Video Conferencing Pilot Project, initially used to conduct arraignment and plea hearings for in-custody defendants at OCCC, was recently expanded, allowing public defenders and the adult probation workers to conduct client and intake interviews from their offices with defendants at OCCC. In 1996, the project was awarded additional monies from the Byrne Foundation to evaluate expanding the use of video conferencing even further. Your investment in this project has saved our citizens money and time.

"And, just a few weeks ago, the Judiciary formed a public/private partnership for the creation of a document and information access and retrieval system for the First Circuit Court, at no cost to the taxpayers. When completed, attorneys will be able to access and print a case document at their computers, twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week, and the public will have free access to the imaged documents via computers placed in public locations.

"In addition, we recently turned our attention to utilizing electronic document filings and digital signatures in response to Act 203 of the 1996 Legislature.

"The Judiciary's Capital Improvements Projects are the most tangible signs of our dedication to making justice accessible. The proposed Family Court Center in Kapolei is a bricks-and-mortar example of our efforts to provide as many avenues as we can through which your constituents may protect their rights. I therefore remain staunch in my support of a Family Court Center in Kapolei.

"My third observation is that Hawaii's Judiciary remains flexible in our approaches, consciously seeking out more culturally appropriate dispute resolution alternatives. We recognize that, as the cultural makeup of our society becomes more diverse and the types of conflicts become more varied, our Western from of dispute resolution may not always be the most appropriate. The Judiciary has therefore joined the Department of Human Services -- for example -- to develop the Ohana Conferencing Project in Waianae, where professionals work with the extended family to design a service plan to protect a child. Similar programs in New Zealand and Canada have decreased the number of children under court supervision and increased the number of in-family placements for such children. Our family court judges also continue to refer appropriate cases to ho'oponopono where a 'haku,' known and trusted by the parties, assists them in working through their problems.

"In addition to these culturally appropriate alternatives, and in light of society's changing needs, we continue to look beyond our traditional role as adjudicators of disputes. We must do our part to provide assistance of differing types at all stages of an issue. This belief currently is manifested in tangible ways in Hawaii's Judiciary. For example, the results of and reactions to the Teen Court and Hawaii Drug Court programs are encouraging. Many youths have appeared before their peers on the 'sentencing jury' of Teen Court and have come away from the experience with a better appreciation of the judicial process and a greater sense of accountability to their community and their classmates. Drug Court has been a critical success in reducing recidivism among drug offenders; however, expanded funding for this resource is necessary and is part of our current biennium budget request.

"Our current legislative package also includes a proposal for a \$25.00 surcharge on all matrimonial an paternity actions in the family court. The monies collected are to be used for the education of separating parents. One such program, which is currently staffed entirely by volunteers and known as 'The Kids First Program,' educates separating parents about how to avoid custody litigation, how to help their children cope with the stress of the parents' separation, and how to structure post-separation relationships to avoid conflicts.

"It should not be prohibitively expensive to move our vision of Hawaii's justice system forward, and we look to you for support in fulfilling our commitment to the people of Hawaii. We have submitted a modest budget request, well below the two-year spending ceiling. Although we are the third branch of government, the fact that our budget consists only 2.7% of the state's total budget, may cause some to believe that the Judiciary is more a twig than a branch.

"My fourth and final observation is that the continuing loss of experienced and seasoned judges will adversely affect the Judiciary, and, ultimately, the public. Hawaii's Judiciary is committed to administering justice independently, according to law, equally to all people, and with a high level of judicial excellence.

"Judicial excellence, however, can be maintained only if we can continue to attract and retain the best and brightest practitioners in our community. Since 1992, eight experienced, seasoned judges have left the bench; and another, Big Island Judge William Chillingworth, recently notified me that he, too, will be leaving shortly for the private sector. Almost all of these judges have left for higher paying positions. It is significant to note that the average age of the judges -- upon leaving -- is 48.4 years old, far below the mandatory retirement age of 70.

"I believe it is obvious that any further increase in the attrition rate of our judges will have and adverse affect on our justice system and thus on the public. The need to retain experienced judges is apparent. Lawyers who are appointed to judicial office soon realize that lawyering and judging are entirely different. Although knowledge of

the law is certainly basic to both, the skill, techniques, and advocacy style of a successful lawyer do not necessarily make a good judge. Just as lawyers gain proficiency through their practice of law, handling numerous cases over many years, judges learn the art of judging through the many cases that they handle on a daily basis.

"When we lose judges after much time, effort, and monies have been spent to raise their level of expertise and productivity -- not because they are ready to retire, but because of a lack of a salary increase -- judicial excellence, as a whole, declines and service to the public is adversely affected.

"Although the honor of public service substitutes, in part, for the monetary rewards of private practice, it will become more increasingly difficult to attract and retain quality jurists without a fair increase in judicial salaries.

"The Judicial Salary Commission's recent report explains that our justices and judges have been without a pay raise for seven years -- the longest of any Judiciary in the nation, and that, when you factor in our high cost of living, our rand nationally falls to 47th. The Commission also notes that, during the past seven years, Hawaii's professionally-categorized State government employees, such as public school teachers, unit-13 professional and scientific employees, and University of Hawaii administrative professional and technical employees have received salary increases averaging almost three percent annually. And, it appears that they will receive another raise this year. The Commission's report also notes that federal judges have received salary increases totalling approximately 38% over the last four years, and, presently, the lowest paid federal magistrate earns almost \$30,000 more than the chief justice of Hawaii's Supreme Court.

"Please understand that we certainly do no begrudge our fellow government employees their increase in compensation; they all are deserving as each performs meaningful and important public services in a state that has one of the highest costs of living. The same, I believe, should be said of our justices and judges, all of whom indeed recognize and are sensitive to the fact that the state's financial resources have been limited as reflected by our judges' agreeing not to request increases the past two years; however, fairness alone dictates that a judicial pay raise this year is appropriate. We therefore request your support and favorable consideration of the critical issue.

"Governor Cayetano, Lieutenant Governor Hirono, Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, members of the Nineteenth Legislature:

"As you consider and provide for the essential needs of the people, I request that you keep in mind the judicial service guaranteed to all in our Constitution that is, the right of every person to an independent forum for the civilized resolutions of wrongs and injuries. Our cooperation must precede and extend beyond the appropriation process. To paraphrase former United States Supreme Court Chief Justice Charles Evans Hughes, in his speech to Congress on its 150th Anniversary: 'We are all partners in the great enterprise of making democracy work.'

"Again, to the leadership and to the members of the Nineteenth Legislature, I thank you for the opportunity to deliver this State of the Judiciary Address. This is an honor for me personally and for those who labor in the service of justice for Hawaii's people. On behalf of the justices, judges, and the employees of Hawaii's Judiciary, we look forward to working with you in this session. "Mahalo."

Speaker Souki then rose and stated:

"Chief Justice Moon and honored guests: I want to thank you, Chief Justice, for delivering this very historic and inspiring address to the Joint Legislature. I am sure that members of this Joint Legislature will consider what you have stated with great thought. And may I add, especially that section where you stated that the Legislature holds the highest trump, thank you very much for reminding us of what we can do.

"Also, we wish to remind you that the Judiciary may be like a twig, but they are like a steel twig as far as government is concerned.

"I want to thank you all again for being here. And Chief Justice Moon -- thank you very much.

"I declare this Joint Session adjourned."

At 10:49 o'clock a.m., Speaker Souki declared the Joint Session adjourned.

ADJOURNMENT

At 12:00 o'clock midnight, the House of Representatives adjourned until 12:00 o'clock noon tomorrow, Thursday, January 23, 1997.

Thursday, January 23, 1997

The House of Representatives of the Nineteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1997, convened at 12:10 o'clock p.m., with the Speaker presiding.

The invocation was delivered by Lieutenant Shelley J. Hill of the Salvation Army, after which the Roll was called showing all members present.

By unanimous consent, reading and approval of the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Fifth Day was deferred.

At 12:13 o'clock p.m., Representative Okamura asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:30 o'clock p.m.

ORDER OF THE DAY

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT

Representative Hiraki, for the Committee on Transportation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3) recommending that H.B. No. 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative Hiraki, seconded by Representative Takumi and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOTOR CARRIER SAFETY LAW," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering a bill on Third Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar.

THIRD READING

H.B. No. 117:

Representative Tom moved that H.B. No. 117 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Yamane.

Representative Tom rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in support of H.B. 117, A Bill for an Act Proposing a Constitutional Amendment Relating to Marriage.

"Mr. Speaker, as you will recall in 1994, this Legislature passed by an overwhelming majority, in both the House and the Senate, a bill which defined marriage in our statutes as the union between a man and a woman. Act 217 was signed into law by the Governor and remains the law in Hawaii.

"Notwithstanding the passage of this legislation, the judicial branch of government has, to this point, refused to recognize this legislative policy and continues on a path which, if left unchecked, will represent a very dangerous departure from our democratic traditions.

"Justice Levinson wrote, in the Baehr v. Miike case, that the people of Hawaii, like it or not, must submit to changes in the law when the Supreme Court's vision of the social order demands it.

"I had hoped that the Hawaii Judiciary would have, by now, abandoned this unconstitutional attempt to usurp the policymaking role of the Legislature. I had hoped that by now the Hawaii Judiciary would have recognized that making fundamental policy decisions under the guise of interpreting the Constitution was a foolhardy and dangerous concept, one which taken any further would surely destroy the people's faith in their government.

"Mr. Speaker, all of us submit to the authority of the Judiciary because of our faith that they are the instrument which gives voice to the will of the people as expressed in our Constitution. When that faith is broken, and the Court substitutes its voice for the will of the people, we cease to become a nation of laws authorized and adopted by the governed.

"The most precious civil right we all enjoy, regardless of our sex, our sexual orientation, our race, or our background, is the right to be governed under laws which are adopted by the consent of the people.

"No one can seriously claim that when the voters of this State adopted our Constitution, they wanted the State to issue marriage licenses to same-sex couples.

"This proposed constitutional amendment before us today does nothing more than confirm that the people, in adopting our Constitution, did not authorize the Supreme Court to impose same-sex marriage on an unwilling citizenry.

"The citizens of the State are the ultimate constitutional authority. The Constitution is an expression of the will, not the will of any branch of government.

"Mr. Speaker, I wish to assure the members -- I wish to assure the members of this body, and the members of the Senate, that there is no reasonable basis to believe, as some have stated, that this amendment to our Constitution will somehow be found invalid. I am very confident that this proposal, if ratified by the voters, will completely and

with finality address the constitutional crisis which our Supreme Court has inflicted upon this State.

"The Hawaii Supreme Court has no choice once a constitutional amendment is passed. It must follow the directions set out in the amendment, for our Hawaii Supreme Court exists and derives its authority solely from the State Constitution. If the Court were to act contrary to the explicit mandate of our State Constitution, its actions would be a nullity.

"And anyone who claims, Mr. Speaker, that the United States Supreme Court will set aside this amendment because it violates the United States Constitution is really arguing that our United States Supreme Court is prepared to invalidate the marriage laws of all 50 states in this union, for H.B. 117 does no more than return Hawaii to the same laws that govern marriage in the other 49 states.

"Mr. Speaker, both houses of this Legislature have already decided that marriage in Hawaii is defined as the union between one man and one woman.

"We need a closure to this debate over the proper constitutional role of the Judiciary. That closure can only be achieved when the authors of the Constitution are permitted to speak...

At this point, Representative Say rose and yielded his time "since his time is up."

Representative Tom thanked the Chair and said:

"I just have one more sentence, Mr. Speaker.

"The Constitution is the voice of the people of the State of Hawaii, and they have a right to be heard. I urge the passage of this measure -- House Bill 117.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Moses then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Yesterday, in joint session assembled, we heard the Honorable Chief Justice Moon espouse the virtues of our tripartite form of government. We're three separate but equal branches.

"We also heard the Chief Justice clearly indicate that we in the Legislature hold the trump card. Well, today we put that trump card on the table, and the will of the people must prevail.

"Thank you."

Representative McDermott then rose in support of the bill, stating:

"I want to thank you and the committee chairman for pushing this through as fast as you possibly could, and I'm here to cast my vote -- my precious vote -- in support of this bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tarnas then rose to speak in opposition to the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, from all the legal debate on this issue, I understand that the main basis for the dispute is the implementation of the equal protection clause of the Hawaii Constitution.

"Even though I continue to believe that marriage is a religious issue and, as such, is a matter for theologians to debate, not elected officials, I realize that changing the state's marriage laws to create a purely secular marriage is not a popular idea.

"So in the spirit of collaboration, let me offer this: our common goal is to provide equal protection to all under the Constitution. This constitutional amendment before us would result in creating rights exclusive to certain people in the state. As such, it does not address the critical issue before the courts.

"The way to meet the constitutional requirements is to do two things: One, add a clause to the amendment stating clearly that substantial benefits will not be denied to those who cannot legally marry; secondly, pass a domestic partnership bill that provides substantially equal benefits to those same couples.

"I understand that this bill is linked to H.B. 118 that creates an arrangement of reciprocal beneficiaries providing very limited rights to those couples who cannot marry. But this connection is only articulated one way, from House Bill 118 to House Bill 117. And there is no specific link stated from the constitutional amendment to a domestic partnership statute.

"So I challenge all of you to provide a balance and state it clearly in the constitutional amendment. In this way, we would be providing equal protection under the Constitution, and succeed in the goal of resolving this issue out of the courts.

"Thank you for your consideration of this idea."

Representative Thielen moved for a roll call vote, seconded by Representative Ward.

At 12:40 o'clock p.m., Representative Case asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:49 o'clock p.m.

At this time, Representative Thielen moved for reconsideration of action on the previous motion.

At 12:50 o'clock p.m., Representative Okamura asked for a recess and the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:51 o'clock p.m.

The following remarks were received by the Clerk's Office for insertion into the Journal:

Representative Case:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to House Bill 117.

"Mr. Speaker, it is clear that, at least in this House, the die is cast. My remarks on this floor of March 5, 1996, which I incorporate by reference, still stand. The Chair of the Judiciary Committee is to be commended at least for crafting a bill which comes closer to passing constitutional muster than last year's version. But I cannot get on this train.

"Let me share some deeply personal thoughts. As a husband, father, person, do I not have deep personal misgivings about homosexuality generally and samegender marriage specifically? Yes. Did the religion in which I was raised condone either? No. Would my heart not stop if my child told me he was gay? Yes. And do

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not I feel the temptation, the rationalization, the almost irresistible pull to vote with the majority? Of course.

"But, fundamentally, I must vote otherwise because I believe it is not for me to impose my personal beliefs, my value system, my religion, on others, even if, and perhaps <u>especially</u> if, I am in the majority. Two sayings come to mind: 'Live and let live.' 'Judge not, lest ye be so judged.'

"But, equally as important, I believe in an allocation and separation of powers, a mutual agreement, which has been the single defining characteristic of our country. For over 200 years our Constitution has stood for the proposition that minorities need and are entitled to protection from majority will, and our courts, not, for the most part, our executive and legislative bodies, have been the guardians of that protection. Without that basic protection, as tense and controversial as it often is, many of our social ills would never have been overcome, and we would have been indistinguishable as a country from many others that are long gone.

"We in Hawaii have availed ourselves repeatedly of the companion protection in our own Constitution. Yet now that our Supreme Court has acted to protect an especially controversial minority, we rise up in indignation and say that we no longer want to protect this particular minority against the fears of the majority.

"That the specific issue today is same-gender marriage is not, to me, material, nor is whether I personally or anyone else personally would have ruled as these particular justices did. Instead, it is the precedent we are setting that is of vital importance. What will be the next minority that asks for protection, and who will protect them? Will it be us, for the majority?

"So, to the black children of Arkansas in the early 1950s, whom the majority didn't want to attend white schools, this no vote is for you. To the Japanese-American internees of World War II, who should have been protected by our Constitution from majority America, but at least had a Constitution from which to seek protection, this no vote is for you. To all of the interracial couples of the past, present and future, whom the majority didn't want to marry, this no vote is for you.

"To the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii, the United Church of Christ, the Zen Buddhists, Lutherans, Congregationalists, Unitarians, Baptists, Presbyterians, Episcopalians, Jews, Quakers, Methodists, and others whose Gods and religions preach tolerance, this no vote is for you. To those great religions whose God considers homosexuality generally and same-gender marriage specifically an 'abomination,' this no vote is for you, for those inevitable times when your God will call upon you to stand firmly in the minority.

"To the respected minority members of this House, who only days ago so eloquently defended the rights of the minority -- themselves -- against majority will, this no vote is for you. To those who fear the rise of the thought police and the drive to homogenize a country and state whose greatest strengths are their diversity, this no vote is for you.

"To all of the minorities of the past, and to those minorities of the future whose circumstances we cannot even imagine today, this no vote is for you. This no vote is for us all."

Representative Saiki:

"This is a civil rights issue. As the United States Supreme Court stated in Romer v. Evans: 'Laws of the kind now before us raise the inevitable inference that the disadvantage imposed is born of animosity toward the class of persons affected. If the constitutional conception of equal protection of the laws means anything, it must at the very least mean that a bare...desire to harm a politically unpopular group cannot constitute a legitimate governmental interest.'

"I would hope that in spite of this legislation, we will continue efforts, even incrementally, to teach Hawaii's children about tolerance and acceptance. For the real solution to issues like this lies not in constitutional or statutory language, but in our ability to treat people fairly and to accept them just as we accept ourselves."

Representative Hamakawa:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to the measure.

"Mr. Speaker, as I understand the proposed amendment in H.B. 117, passage of such could result in single persons, whether gay or straight, being stripped of protections under our State Constitution.

"The measure before us, as written, provides that any statute, regulation, law, rule, order, decree, or legal doctrine that defines or regulates the benefits of marriage shall not be deemed in violation of the due process and equal protection sections of our State Constitution or any other section of the State Constitution, by virtue of a limitation of the marriage relationship to the union of only one man and one woman.

"What this means is that the Legislature, the Governor, any administrative agency, or any other body that can enact a statute or law, or promulgate a regulation, rule, order, or decree, or formulate a legal doctrine, may define and regulate what legal benefits are reserved for married persons and are not available to single persons.

"Theoretically, under H.B. 117, a benefit of marriage could be sexual intercourse. Under H.B. 117, the Legislature could limit sex to the marital relationship as a benefit and prohibit single persons from engaging in premarital or extramarital sex. Another example is that adoption could be limited to married couples as a benefit and be available to unmarried couples or single persons.

"Today, when the Legislature limits benefits to married couples, single or non-married persons are afforded standing to challenge the denial of benefits in court under some provision of the State Constitution as a denial of due process or equal protection or some other provision. Whether or not the denial is or would be constitutional would be for the court to decide. Under H.B. 117, there could be no challenge nor review by a court. The Legislature would have the final say. This would be unprecedented in our history of government in the State of Hawaii and the United States.

"For these reasons, Mr. Speaker, I respectfully vote no on this measure."

Representative Ahu Isa:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in support of HB 117. Ignorance of the law is no excuse. The courts have forced their misinterpretation of the word 'sex' as stated in the State Constitution. The people of Hawaii want and should be given the opportunity to vote on this most precious matter. Why is the minority infringing on the majority? Marriage is sacred and holy and should be defined as being solely between one man and one woman."

Representative Lee:

"I am voting in favor of House Bill 117 which would enable the people to vote on a constitutional amendment defining marriage as a union between a man and woman. I agree with that concept and the majority of the people are in favor of that definition.

"However, I do have reservations about adopting a constitutional amendment which does not also provide for equal rights and benefits for the minority.

"A constitutional amendment is a fundamental law, and should protect all people. We must continue to work in that direction."

The motion for a roll call was put to vote by the Chair and upon a show of hands, the motion was carried.

"She is internationally known for her work in oceanography. She's a specialist in marine algae and to do the work that she wanted to do, she had to figure out how to get there. So, she was a founder of a company, Deep Ocean Engineering, that has designed submersibles, individual submersibles. You've seen them in movies, you've seen them in National Geographic, and she herself suited up in one of these and descended thousands of feet below the sea surface. So you think that sometimes we get in deep water, Sylvia has been in deeper water than any of us.

"Sylvia also provided great public service. She was Chief Scientist for the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, and she has served internationally for many different organizations in the efforts for maine conservation.

"We, in Hawaii, are an ocean state. Our maine resources are essential for our quality of life and for economic development. And it is important to recognize that this year is the International Year of the Reef, and so for all of us to remember marine resources as we go through our session this year and our budget process. It's important, and I wanted to take the opportunity of honoring Dr. Earle because she is such an eloquent spokesperson. I told her she didn't have to give any speeches, so she might bend your ear as you're going by shaking her hand.

"On behalf of the House of Representatives, the people of Hawaii, and all the fish and monk seals and everybody who's in the ocean, we welcome Sylvia. It's truly an honor to have you here, and I present to all of you, Dr. Sylvia Earle."

Representative Tarnas presented Dr. Earle with a Certificate of Recognition, and a floral lei was presented to her by Representative Hamakawa.

At 12:22 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:30 o'clock p.m.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Representative Hiraki, for the Committee on Transportation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 4) recommending that H.B. No. 47 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Hiraki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 47 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Takumi.

Representative Moses rose to speak in support of the bill with reservations, stating:

"There are some information that have been obtained since your Committee on Transportation heard the bill, and I'd just like to point out three things very quickly.

"One, is in compliance with the federal law. I don't believe that we can mandate that the study be limited to HOV lanes. It would probably be more appropriate to consider the transportation problems and let them come up with the alternatives. Number two, there is indication that the City Council does not wish to support the matching fund required from DURF, from DURF's side of the equation. And number three, there appears to be a \$1.5 million shortfall in federal funds which would limit the ability again to get the matching fund for this bill."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 47, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Hiraki, for the Committee on Transportation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 5) recommending that H.B. No. 14 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative Hiraki, seconded by Representative Takumi and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 14, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOTOR VEHICLE DRIVER LICENSING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering a bill on Third Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar.

THIRD READING

H.B. No. 118, H.D. 1:

Representative Tom moved that H.B. No. 118, HD 1, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Yamane.

Representative Tom then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, yesterday this House sent to the Senate a proposed amendment to the Constitution which, if ratified, would reaffirm that the policy issues surrounding marriage and the benefits and responsibilities of marriage will remain the province of the Legislature. It must necessarily follow, Mr. Speaker, that upon the ratification of the amendment, the responsibility for legislating in this area is entirely ours. As such, we should not and cannot, Mr. Speaker, ignore the legitimate concerns of those couples in our community who are prohibited by law from obtaining a marriage license.

"Mr. Speaker, today we vote to fulfill that obligation and to address the concerns of those couples in a thoughtful, caring, and responsible manner. This measure is designed specifically to take effect if the people decide, by ratifying the constitutional amendment, that it is the Legislature, as the representative of the people, and not the courts who should take policy in this area, Couples who are prohibited by law from becoming married often find that when illness, financial reverses or death strikes one of the parties to the relationship, they, as a couple, lack the protection that long established legal doctrines afforded married couples under the same circumstances.

"This bill speaks to these legitimate concerns. It specifically addresses the issues which have been most frequently raised during the hearings we have been holding during the past several years. It also creates a framework under which the Legislature can, in future sessions, continue to address concerns of those couples who are prohibited from marrying each other but who nonetheless maintain such a close relationship that they wish to designate each other as a special type of legal beneficiary, which the bill describes as a reciprocal beneficiary.

"This measure provides benefits not only to the gay and lesbian community, but to all couples without reference to sexual orientation who are prohibited, by law, from marrying each other. For example, a widow living with her unmarried son may find that it is to their benefit to designate each other as reciprocal beneficiaries, or two sisters have decided that they have formed a relationship which is the most important one in the world to each other.

"With the passage of this measure, all of these couples will have the opportunity to enjoy those basic legal benefits which provide a measure of financial, personal, and emotional protection when the inevitable difficulties of life arise. Specifically, Mr. Speaker, this bill provides for the right to hospital visitation, and the right to make health care decisions for the other party, the right to hold property as tenancy by the entirety, inheritance rights, and the right to sue for wrongful death.

"This is not a domestic partnership bill, because it does not create an economic unit which can only be dissolved in court, nor does it place burdensome requirements on the couples. There are those who suggest that this bill should be extended to all couples; however, I don't think we should adopt legislation which would act as an alternative to marriage for opposite sex couples. I think it would be inappropriate at this time or any time to undermine marriage, or to discourage an opposite sex couple from getting married and entering into all of the benefits and burdens that the marriage state entails.

"Mr. Speaker, I know that there are those who believe that we should add more rights and benefits to this measure, and others who think that the benefits should be reduced. But your Committee believes that this bill incorporates the type of rights and benefits which would achieve the broadest consensus in the community. I believe that this bill, as it is structured, will provide real benefits, protection, and peace of mind to a valued and important segment of our community. And I urge my colleagues to join with me in voting up on this bill."

Representative McDermott then rose to speak in opposition to the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I understand and appreciate the reasoning and strategy behind this measure; however, I must ask who's clamoring for this? Whose constituencies are asking for this? Have people been knocking on your doors, asking you to pass 118? I would suggest they're not. In fact, I've received phone calls to the contrary.

"Mr. Speaker, I suggest that the only reason we are passing this measure is to placate the Senate. I, for one, will not engage in this type of political horse trading that will lead us down the slippery slope of domestic partnership. The bill sounds pretty benign, but if you listen to some of the prior rhetoric, that's where we're headed.

"My constituents did not send me here to endorse such unneeded and unrequired nonsense. Let's face it, the primary purpose behind this measure is to provide samesex couples special rights when they already have equal rights -- the same rights as you and I have."

Representative Whalen rose to speak in opposition to the bill, stating:

"I had some concerns when we first looked at this bill about where we were headed, and I heard from many people that this bill is designed to address the concerns only. It's designed to give the Senate something that they say they're concerned about; that way, we can get this amendment through, and I am concerned.

"Even in a speech today, it was mentioned -inadvertently or not -- but it was mentioned that now we have a mechanism to continue to address the concerns of this group of people. And as all of our colleagues, all of us here have said, there's not a constituency clamoring for it, and as well our rights are all guaranteed. We have equal rights under the Constitution. There are special rights that are being asked for, and we are moved towards that in a certain direction. But now we are opening the door to create a special class of people that have special rights through this 118.

"And up until today I was actually going to vote for it, but when I heard that now we are creating a mechanism to continue to address the special concerns of this group of people, I have to voice my opposition to this bill."

Representative Tarnas rose to speak in support of the bill with reservations, stating:

"Unlike the previous speakers, I think that this is a step in the right direction. I think it's only a half step, and I think we need to take a couple more steps in order to wholly meet the requirements of the equal protection clause of the Constitution.

"So I applaud the Committee for moving in the right direction, but I do hope that in further deliberations on this, we recognize that the rights and privileges and responsibilities that we place in this reciprocal beneficiary package should be expanded. Thank you."

Representative Pendleton rose in opposition to the bill, stating:

"I sat on the Judiciary Committee, and we heard extensive testimony and carefully deliberated and thought about what people were saying.

"We heard testimony from individuals such as Father Marc Alexander in opposition to this bill. We also heard testimony from individuals such as Bill Woods, who very articulately argued in opposition to this bill, and also a number of other individuals who would be in favor of same sex marriage but who are opposed to this bill. Because both of those sides, the right and the left, are in agreement that 118 is unnecessary, I will not be voting in favor of it. Thank you."

Representative Goodenow rose in support of the measure and asked that his comments be entered into the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Goodenow's comments are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, while the measure before us today must be considered as an integral part of our solution to the same-sex marriage controversy, this bill, like House Bill 117, can stand on its own merits. I do not think the people of Hawaii would wish to deny anyone the ability to have their loved one, the person they have chosen, make health care decisions for them when they are too ill to do so. I do not think the people of Hawaii want loved ones to be barred from hospital rooms.

"This bill addresses real life situations where illness, death or financial reverses strike. Because of the very sudden and unpredictable nature of the circumstances concerned in this bill, it should not be assumed that other legal methods available to citizens are sufficient in affording the intention of this legislation.

"In addition, some people may argue that the bill does not go far enough, but issues such as health care coverage which have great financial impact on our state must be reviewed responsibly and a variety of options considered. My answer to such criticism is that we should do whatever we can now. I therefore urge all of my colleagues to vote in the affirmative on this measure."

Representative Kawananakoa rose in favor of the bill with reservations and asked that his comments be entered into the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kawananakoa's remarks are as follows:

"This bill, House Bill 118, relating to unmarried couples, may be constitutionally flawed, based on the recent analysis of the State Supreme Court on Baehr, et al, in that it does not allow heterosexual couples to enter into this reciprocal beneficiary relationship."

Representative Marumoto rose and stated:

"I just would like to express some reservations on this measure. It is very broad in covering large groups of people. I am wondering. . .I am unfamiliar with the cost implications of this measure, so I just wanted to express my reservations. Thank you."

Representative Case rose and stated:

"Will the Clerk enter a vote of aye with reservations on my behalf, and I'd like to incorporate the comments of the Representative from North Kona, not South Kona, regrettably, as my own," and the Chair "so ordered. (By reference only)

Representative Herkes rose in support of the bill with reservations and asked that the comments of the Representative from South Kona be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Moses rose in opposition to the bill and said: "Equal rights for all, and special rights for no one."

Representative Kawakami rose in support of the bill with reservations, and stated:

"The comments of my colleagues in the same vein, I agree, and would like that in the Journal."

Representative Kahikina rose and stated:

"I'd like to register a yes vote with reservations for the same reasons that all my colleagues have mentioned. The economics, and mostly the fear that through the process of this. . .I just want to register my reservation that the process -- that a lot of times, it turns out to be what we don't want it to be."

Representative Jones rose and stated:

"I'd like to vote in favor of the bill with reservations, and I share a lot of the concerns expressed by the previous speakers."

Representative Ahu Isa rose and stated:

"I would also like to vote yes with reservations because of the concerns of my colleagues here."

Representative Takumi rose and stated:

"Please have the Clerk register a yes vote with reservations, and I would hold my final vote when I see what happens by the end of session."

Representative Menor rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye vote with reservations, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Abinsay rose in support of the bill and asked that an aye with reservations be cast for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

At this time, Representative M. Oshiro called for the vote.

At 12:48 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:49 o'clock p.m., the motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 118, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO UNMARRIED COUPLES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 41 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives McDermott, Moses, Pendleton and Whalen voting no, and Representatives Arakaki, Menor, Stegmaier, Takai, Takamine, and Meyer being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 118 had passed Third Reading at 12:50 o'clock p.m.

Representative Garcia rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"Now you may be wondering why a Filipino boy like myself is involving himself with things Chinese. Guess

one of the reasons why, Mr. Speaker, is because my wife is Chinese. But as an addendum to that, when it comes to money, Mr. Speaker, I am the pake of the family.

"But just to let everyone know, because as a good public relations chairman I want everybody here to know, that we have our Night in Chinatown this Friday. Mr. Speaker, Wes Fong likes to remind me that I have to put out the press release and just to let you know in advance, colleagues, that this will be at 6:30 right outside of the headquarters of the Chinese Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii, of which I am yet to enroll myself as a member and that oversight will be corrected soon. But thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would also like to congratulate Queen Susan, and as the Representative from the district, by which I think the last three queens came from, I would gladly now concede this to another district.

"However, as Representative Garcia mentioned, one of the proud traditions of his family is that his wife is Chinese. Also, one of the proudest traditions in my family is my daughter who is Chinese, who, like you, represents both the beauty as well as the brains by which the strong tradition is built upon. "Mr. Speaker and members, I'd like to introduce our fourth princess; her name is Connie Suk Yee Woo.

"Connie is not only a beautiful young lady, she is also a very hard worker. She's employed part-time as a production technician at KHET and an office clerk on weekends at Zippy's. She is a graduate of Castle High School and now attends Honolulu Community College where she is studying architectural design. Connie enjoys drawing, body boarding, swimming, cross stitching, and rollerblading.

"I want to join my colleagues in congratulating our Queen Susan and our princesses, and wish you all the very best in all your endeavors."

Representative Ahu Isa rose again and stated:

"I want to recognize her again. This is Queen Susan and she, I'm sure, will really personify Hawaii and the Chinese community in her reign this year. Please give her a big hand as well as her princesses."

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT

Representative Say, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 6) recommending that H.B. No. 230, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative Say moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 230, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading, seconded by Representative Kawakami.

Representative Kawananakoa rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"However, I just wanted to draw out the distinction or actually the comparison between our budget for this branch of government -- the Legislature -- which is roughly coming in at \$12,250,000 for the Senate and for the House.

"I just wanted to note for my colleagues' understanding that the other day we had an informational briefing for the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, the fourth co-terminus branch of government in the State of Hawaii. And their general fund appropriation request for their budget was \$2.5 million.

"While many people think the Office of Hawaiian Affairs has received enough revenues and has actually attained enough resources to take care of its 20 percent of the population, it's quite the contrary. Their budget is a mere one-fifth of what our legislative budget would be."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 230, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS TO PROVIDE FOR THE EXPENSES OF THE LEGISLATURE, THE LEGISLATIVE AUDITOR, THE LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU, AND THE OMBUDSMAN," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading, with Representatives Menor, Morihara and Okamura being excused.

Representative Ward then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I think the mandatory use of back seat belts in this bill is laudable, that we want to keep the people in the back seat safe. But, Mr. Speaker, we have to remember that we've got motorcyclists bashing their heads on the pavement, and they are not even wearing helmets.

"And if this bill passes on, I know that until we find out what the damages are from back seat injuries, and what other states have done who have passed this, I think we may be sacrificing the freedom of some people for the sake of what otherwise looks for the point of consistency very good and very elementary. But we've got a lot of people out there in danger of our highways more so than those in the back seats.

"I would encourage the Judiciary Committee to come up with: What are the damages by those in the back seats without belts, and what other states have done this and if they haven't done it, why are we doing it as an experiment? Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 8, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MANDATORY USE OF SEAT BELTS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary, with Representative McDermott voting no, with Representative Okamura being excused. Representative Hiraki, for the Committee on Transportation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 16) recommending that H.B. No. 19, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative Hiraki, seconded by Representative Takumi and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. Representative Tarnas rose to cast an aye with reservations, saying:

"My reservations are obvious. In the rural areas, we use a lot of pickup trucks to bring families around. But it is a very important public safety issue, so I would like to see it go further to Judiciary. Somehow, we've got to address the problems in rural areas.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Goodenow rose to register an aye with reservations and requested that Representative Tarnas' remarks be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Jones rose to register his aye with reservations, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Halford rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"It is, I think, the primary concern of our communities and government to put the safety of our people and communities first. This is an honorable acknowledgement of that responsibility. Thank you."

Representative Marumoto rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"To answer the concerns of the many people who live in rural areas who may have concerns about the bill or are in opposition, the bill actually has an exemption for agricultural enterprises, so if you are a farmer you are exempt from the provisions of this measure. Also exempted would be businesses that serve the State, and I believe all businesses actually serve the public...

At this point, the Chair interrupted and said:

"Would you please speak into the mike because we can't hear you. There is something wrong with the mike. Please speak a little louder."

Representative Marumoto answered:

"It's on, but somehow it faded out."

Chair: "Please speak louder so all the members can hear your very intelligent remarks."

At 12:23 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess, subject to the call of the Chair.

Upon reconvening at 12:24 o'clock p.m., Representative Marumoto continued her remarks, saying:

"As I mentioned earlier, House Bill 88, which restricts riding in the back of pickup trucks, has two very important exemptions. These two items would be exempt from the provisions of this bill.

"Also, for emergency purposes, you could carry a person in the back of a pickup truck. There are also exemptions for parades.

"Lastly, this bill does not go into effect until 1999. So if people are planning to purchase another vehicle before then, they can plan for the restrictions in this bill.

"I do hope that we will be able to pass some legislation that will reduce the carnage on our highways. There's too many people dying and getting injured in these pickup truck accidents. A grandfather whose granddaughter was killed in the recent crash in Kailua, where seven teenagers were involved, has changed his mind about allowing people to ride in his pickup truck and will now not let anyone ride in his truck. There's still a child who was riding in that truck who is in a coma, so there's so many tragedies as a result of these accidents.

"We hope to prevent them, and I hope that you folks will help me in this regard. Thank you."

Representatives Herkes, Chang, Whalen, Kahikina and Meyer, respectively, rose to cast their no votes, and the Chair "so ordered."

"When we say to the Regents -- pay anything you want to hire that President, we actually give them an open checkbook, but the check comes out of the funds of the taxpayers.

"For those reasons, I do not believe this bill should pass, and I will continue to vote against it."

Representative Morihara then rose to speak in favor of the bill, stating:

"I would just like to point out that that is the present practice at the University of Hawaii. In fact, they have that ability to the year 2011, and it is also common practice across the nation. In fact, our state is probably the only state that actually does set its President's salary by statute.

"Thank you."

"And due to conflicts in many of our schedules, we wanted to have the opportunity to further discuss these important matters with the various firms and industry leaders that will be with us tomorrow and throughout the weekend. So our office will sponsor a public forum where the press and others can come from the private sector here in the islands, private citizens, to come and ask questions of these learned companies. That will take place from 3:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. in Room 329.

"So there is much opportunity for all of our legislators and many of our viewers and guests here today and others. The press, I hope, will be able to join us to help understand the efficiencies that we hope to garner from the private sector. I should mention that there will be eight various private sector correctional facility firms -the leaders in their industry -- that will be with us here tomorrow at the State Legislature, and I encourage all of our members and all of the public to come and join us.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Arakaki rose and stated:

"Somewhere between those two previous announcements comes the significance of welfare reform. I guess one emphasizes how important it is for small businesses to look at employing welfare recipients and, hopefully, that the changes we're making will not result in more people in our prisons.

"But since welfare reform for Hawaii kicks in February 1st, I thought it might be a good opportunity to provide an informational briefing not just for our Committee on Human Services and Housing, but for all the members who, I am sure, will have constituents affected by the changes. So we're having an informational briefing on Monday at 12:30, and I would encourage all the members to either come or send one of your staff.

"In addition, Mr. Speaker, on a more somber note, I want to note that this is the last day of one of our esteemed colleagues in the Senate, Senator Matsuura, and I guess we are going to miss him as a friend and as a long-time legislator. I want to invite all our fellow members and the staff to join the fellowship group to offer a prayer for the Senator and his family immediately following session in our Majority Caucus Room.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

SENATE COMMUNICATION

Sen. Com. No. 4, returning House Bill No. 230, H.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS TO PROVIDE FOR THE EXPENSES OF THE LEGISLATURE, THE LEGISLATIVE AUDITOR, THE LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU, AND THE OMBUDSMAN," which passed Third Reading in the Senate on January 31, 1997, was received and announced by the Clerk and was placed on file.

At this time, Representative Jones rose and introduced several very important officials from All Nippon Airways (ANA), who were seated in the gallery, saying:

"As you know, ANA started direct flights from Nagoya, Japan to Honolulu this Saturday, February 1st, and these flights are really a shot in the arm for our economy. And because of that, and because ANA is really the sixth largest airline in the world and they serve over 30 cities throughout the Pacific and the Americas, we're real fortunate to have them now start services to Honolulu.

"They're going to be flying to Honolulu one flight daily, seven days a week, so they'll be bringing in tens of thousands of tourists to help our economy. So, at this time, I'd like to introduce five members who weren't here for the inauguration. "First of all, we have the senior vice president of ANA Americas, Mr. Ohashi. Mr. Ohashi is in charge of all the air stations in the Americas -- that's North America, South America and the United States -- so his management covers a real big area.

"The second person I want to introduce is the administration manager for the Americas, Mr. Egashira. He works closely with Mr. Ohashi.

"The third person we have, part of his name is also Ana. He is the administration manager for the Honolulu office, the office that they're going to be setting up in Honolulu to take care of the flights -- Mr. Anabuki. Mr. Anabuki said that because his name is Ana, that's how he got the job.

"Then we have the President of ANA Hotels in Hawaii, the person responsible for helping us put together this reception -- Millie Takesue. Millie has been real instrumental in moving things in the hotel industry. Millie actually runs the Makaha Sheraton in my district. That's how I got to know her real well, and that's how we work real closely together, and I think she's a great person.

"Then we have the Administration. One of the administration managers for the Honolulu office is Miss Teresa Kubota. Miss Kubota also acts as the translator for this group and she's been doing a wonderful job today.

"We welcome all of you to Hawaii, to the State Capitol. We wish you the best of luck in your endeavors. And whenever you need help, come and see us; we'll be more than happy to help you."

Representative Cachola rose and stated:

"Being Chairman of the House Tourism Committee, I would be remiss if I'm not going to say a few words to thank the delegates from ANA.

"The history of ANA to Hawaii started in 1987. Representative P. Oshiro and I introduced and passed a resolution to allow ANA to have a direct flight from Nagoya, Japan and back, and urging congressional leaders to pass a bilateral agreement between the U.S. and Japan.

"It was, at that time, when the President of ANA was still Mr. Segaya Goto, and the name of Millie, the last name wasn't yet Takesue but Ludwig, if I remember right. At that time, they were given just like one flight a day, but then all of a sudden they stopped. I do hope that the resumption of the flight of ANA to Hawaii will continue and should not stop again because we need your help.

"I understand that they are also trying to get a direct flight from Kansai, and that's Osaka, directly to Hawaii. And I do hope that if you need our help to again introduce a Resolution or House Concurrent Resolution to that effect, that we'll be willing to do that again.

"To all of you, may I say: Please have a lot more flights to Hawaii, and say 'hi' to Mr. Segaya Goto. And may your application for flights from Osaka or Kansai to Honolulu be granted to you as soon as possible, and from the House and the members of the House Tourism Committee, we say 'thank you'."

Representative Ward rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, may I also break protocol and thank these gentlemen for what they are doing? Because of the hard economic times that we are going through, that we now have a flight per day from ANA, we're greatly appreciative of that.

"And as the others have remarked, whatever we can do to turn this economy around, we're very grateful that you are a part of that. And what may be in the future, please let us know. Arigato gozai mashita."

Representative White rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would just like to point out that it's been estimated that every time one of the wide-bodied jets lands in Honolulu from Japan, it represents a contribution to our economy of about a million dollars.

"Ten percent of what is spent generates tax revenues so every time these folks land a jet in Honolulu, it's contributing a million dollars to our economy and a hundred thousand dollars to our State tax rolls. So from the bottom of our hearts, thank you very much."

Representative Stegmaier rose and stated:

"I, too, want to add my comments in support and appreciation for the new arrival of A-N-A, and ask just to say in Japanese -- yokoso irrasshaimashita.

"Thank you."

SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering bills on Third Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar. (Representatives Arakaki and Meyer were excused.)

THIRD READING

The following bills, which were on the calendar for Third Reading, were read throughout and the following actions taken:

H.B. No. 111, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro and carried, H.B. 111, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SEXUAL ASSAULT," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Arakaki and Meyer being excused.

H.B. No. 106, HD 1:

Representative Okamura moved that H.B. No. 106, HD 1, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro.

Representative Tom rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this year the Democratic majority in the House of Representatives has committed itself to addressing the rise in violent juvenile crimes.

"Today, as unbelievable as it may sound, if a person commits murder but happens to be 15 years old or 14 years old, that individual will be released from all control by the state in only 4 years, if he's 15 years old and commits a heinous murder.

"Hawaii is one of four states only in the nation -- only four states that do not permit the waiver to Adult Court of individuals below age 16. The majority of them do. In fact, 27 states allow it at any age. In most cases, crimes committed by juveniles should remain within the Family Court System as many of these young people will mature and become good citizens if guided properly by the Family Court.

"However, what we are addressing in this bill are not youthful indiscretions. What we are addressing are juveniles who cannot be helped by Family Court, whose behavior is such that the sanctions provided by the criminal laws can serve as the only effective deterrent to future crimes.

"Mr. Speaker, what we are addressing is a juvenile male hanging out with his friends outside a bar, and armed with a millimeter -- semi automatic nine millimeter weapon. He shoots some of the bar patrons who he does not know. One of the patrons is shot in front of his pregnant girl friend and killed instantly. Two others are seriously wounded, one requiring extensive surgery for a jaw bone that was partially shot away. And after being released from HYCF, this juvenile stabbed another man in the neck, severing his spinal column and paralyzing him for life.

"What we are addressing is a 15 year old juvenile gang member, riding in a truck with three others. They exchange words with the adult male victim, and follow the victim to a service station where he tries to dial 911. The 15 year old and other members of the gang proceed to attack the victim, hitting him repeatedly on the face, head and body. The victim suffers multiple fractures and is rendered unconscious, but the gang continues to punch and kick him.

"Both of these are actual cases, Mr. Speaker. Both of these cases involve juveniles who could not be tried as adults in the Adult Criminal Court because they were not 16. Mr. Speaker, in these cases, the juveniles, even if found guilty by the Family Court, would spend a maximum term of four years in the HYCF. These are the types of cases that H.B. 106, House Draft 1, is directed at. The decision to waive or not to waive a juvenile to Adult Court remains with the Family Court.

"This bill does not in any way propose to dismantle or undermine the philosophy behind our juvenile justice system. What it does do, however, is give the Family Court the power and the flexibility to insure accountability, deterrents and appropriate punishment for the most dangerous juveniles who come before it.

"Our obligation is to make sure that the community's safety remains paramount in our justice system. This bill is a necessary part of our effort, by the Democratic Party, to make Hawaii a safe place for all of our residents and visitors.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Thielen then rose to speak in strong support of the bill, stating:

"I thought when we entered these halls, that we were legislators. I find that the Judiciary Chair's reference to the Democrat Party being behind this bill is offensive. . .

At this point, the Chair interrupted and advised Representative Thielen to "speak to the bill, please."

Representative Thielen responded by stating:

"I will speak to the bill, Mr. Speaker. Our Republican caucus introduced similar legislation. It is fine that the legislation that was sponsored by the Majority members was the vehicle that went forward, but I would like it to be well known that the Minority caucus, the Republican caucus...

The Chair interrupted Representative Thielen by stating:

"Would you please speak to the items on the bill, and the context of the bill, and not to the party?"

Representative Thielen responded by stating:

"That's wonderful, Mr. Speaker, if you will use that same request to the chair of your party, or the Chair of your Committee."

The Chair, at this point, stated:

"I'll have to call you out of order. Again, would you please confine your remarks to the bill?"

Representative Thielen responded by stating:

"I would be glad to confine them, Mr. Speaker, but I am responding to what the Chair of Judiciary said.

"Thank you."

The Chair responded by stating:

"You have; please confine yourself to the bill."

Representative Santiago then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

"While others may jump at the opportunity to praise the bill, as a member of the Majority Party I do want to voice some of my reservations regarding this type of bill.

"Mr. Speaker, we have heard more than enough of our share of what is politically correct, which is to get tough on crime. There is no one, I think, in this room who will deny that juvenile crime is a problem; it is a growing problem. It is something that I wish to point out to all of us here: We are not going to solve by touting this type of legislation.

"I would like to see a balanced approach. I have talked about this for many years and I'm hoping that this year, while we look at legislation like this, which I will support with reservations, I ask all of us to consider how is it that we are going to direct our resources in those areas that we know will prevent such incidents as have been referred to by the Chair of the Judiciary Committee.

"I refer to the second incident which he talked about, which I am very, very familiar with. It happened in my community, it happened with individuals that I know. It happened, because a program that one of those individuals was in had been cut. They lost a worker that had been working with that individual very successfully. Unfortunately, due to cutbacks, the program was stopped.

"I again would like to just emphasize, if we talk about deterrents, let us also not forget to remind ourselves that prevention is also extremely important as is intervention. So I ask for a balanced approach this year, and while others may jump at the opportunity to claim full support, I would like to sober us all by explaining this is not going to be the cure-all, nor is this going to lead us to total safety in any way, shape or form.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Moses then rose and stated:

"I also rise in support of this bill, and I commend the Majority for supporting this bill which treats juveniles that commit heinous adult crimes as adults. This is a major issue to the Minority caucus and was contained in the Minority caucus bill.

"I thank all of my colleagues for their support, and urge also their support on increasing prison bed space so we can lock up these criminals.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kahikina then rose and stated:

"I rise in support with reservations. And I'd like to express another reservation besides what the representative from the North Shore had expressed. That, along with these examples that Chairman Tom had alluded to, that there were also youth offenders that weren't guilty of the crime.

"My reservation is: I was told by the Majority Floor Leader that once a juvenile is waivered, the juvenile is waivered even if he's found not guilty; they no longer can go back to Family Court. I'm hoping that the Senate would be able to address this concern.

"Thank you."

Representative Pendleton then rose and stated:

"I rise in support of H.B. 106, House Draft 1. As a member of the Judiciary Committee and of the Human Services and Housing Committee, I wholeheartedly support our holding people accountable for their crimes, and so I echo the concerns and remarks of Chairman Tom. I also would like to echo the remarks of Chairman Alex Santiago.

"While this bill is not the complete answer, will not solve all of our problems, it's an important step in the right direction. But let us also remember that prevention, as Prosecutor Carlisle has taught us, is just as important, and is probably the better bang for our bucks. So we need to do both of these things at the same time. So in our eagerness to get tough on crime, let us not forget the needs of those who are most susceptible to being involved or getting attracted to crime.

"Thank you, and this is why I support this bill."

Representative Ward then rose and stated:

"I also rise in favor of this bill, and to say that individual responsibility is the basis of the law. And I wasn't going to say this but I'm afraid that once it gets out that my colleague from the North Shore says that the 'cutbacks made me do it,' we may be sending a signal that as we try to bring individual responsibility to the people of Hawaii and to this nation, the cutbacks are going to be a whipping boy for that individual responsibility which built this nation, which is the strength of what law is, and what the strength of what our society is based upon.

"So having said that, I think that this one says that regardless of what your age is, you will be responsible, and regardless of what your socio-economic status is, you will be responsible. I think that's a note that needs to be said because I'm afraid that if I didn't say this today, it might be echoed time and again each time something happens. It's society that made me do it, or lack of prison space that made me do it, or something other than the individual responsibility by which this nation was built and stands for.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Santiago then rose and stated:

"For further clarification, there was no alluding to anyone trying to blame anything. I just wanted to remind the members that while we talk about individual responsibility, we also accept responsibility as statesmen.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Saiki then rose and stated:

"I'd like to also express my reservations on this bill for the same reasons as the Representative from the North Shore. I'd also like to add that I hoped that we will consider an alternative, which is to increase the age jurisdiction of the Family Court in these kinds of cases.

"Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. 106, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO YOUTHFUL OFFENDERS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Arakaki and Meyer being excused.

H.B. No. 214:

Representative Okamura moved that H.B. No. 214 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro.

Representative Tarnas rose and stated:

"I want to speak in support of this measure. This measure is to rename our airport in Kona, from the Keahole Kona International Airport to the Kona International Airport at Keahole.

"As you all know, Kona is world renowned and our name is recognized throughout the world. We want to capitalize on that to make sure they come visit us first and then go to the convention over here at the Convention Center.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 214, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO KEAHOLE AIRPORT," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Arakaki and Meyer being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. Nos. 111, 106 and 214 had passed Third Reading at 12:47 o'clock p.m.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Representative Thielen: "Happy Monday, Mr. Speaker. It's nine days left and we're really moving ahead. Prison bed space is going to be addressed today. I understand that automobile insurance reform will take place on Wednesday evening now, and high three should reach us tomorrow on the floor, and we should eliminate it.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Yonamine rose and requested waiver of the 48-hour hearing notice requirement for decisionmaking on H.B. No. 1555, and the Chair "so ordered."

At this time, Representative Aiona rose and wished Representative Pendleton a "Happy Birthday." "His birthday was yesterday, and I would like to ask for a round of applause in wishing him a happy birthday."

Representative Pendleton rose in response, saying:

"I rise just to thank you all. I can't think of a better place to spend my 30th birthday than here at the House."

At 12:49 o'clock p.m., on motion by Representative M. Oshiro, seconded by Representative Thielen and carried, the House of Representatives adjourned until 12:00 o'clock noon tomorrow, Tuesday, February 4, 1997. (Representatives Arakaki and Mever were excused.)

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 597, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION TO ESTABLISH A BACCALAUREATE DEGREE PROGRAM IN ASTRONOMY AT THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII AT HILO," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Chang being excused.

Representative Yonamine, for the Committee on Labor and Public Employment, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 80) recommending that H.B. No. 139, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Okamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 139, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro.

Representative Marumoto rose to speak "strongly in favor" of the bill, stating:

"I am very happy to see this bill moving. The wheels of justice move very slowly but I think they do move. It started last year and we will attempt to move this again this year, and I am glad to finally see some reform happening.

"I believe this law came into existence in the early 1970's, and I think there was an attempt at reform in 1978 at the Constitutional Convention. This was a proposal heard by that committee, but nothing happened.

"I think for about twelve or thirteen years, I have been putting in bills to have a separate computation for the legislative salary and the executive salaries, and finally this year it looks like this is moving through committee.

"Excuse my partisanship, but I kind of consider this measure a Democratic legislator's pension plan, and I think it's been very unfair to public employees as a whole. I think if we change it, it would be fairer to them because, after all, it is their pension system, too, and we should not take a greater share than they do.

"We should also pass this measure because I think it's the right thing to do as far as the taxpaying public is concerned.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Moses then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"I also wish to commend my colleagues for moving so swiftly this session on ending the perks derived under the current system of high-three.

"This bill ends the ten year early retirement and the computation based on the last three years at 3-1/2 percent. It is also consistent with your Labor Committee's efforts on the military veteran's eight year preference, and also on the public worker's retirement based on salary not including overtime.

"It appears that with your support, we have a good chance of passing all four of our emergency items within the first twenty days of this session and, again, I wish to commend you."

Representative Kawananakoa then rose and stated:

"I would also like to rise in support and to commend my colleagues also as the prior two speakers have with regard to the passage of this legislation. The high-three reform bill is important to not only this legislative body, but to our constituents.

"My only concern is that we won't see such a delay with regard to the use of private prisons, which also seems to be foremost in the minds of my constituents, and I early encourage that we move swiftly on all measures important to our constituents.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward then rose and said:

"Mr. Speaker, well done!"

Representative Thielen then rose in support of the bill, stating:

"I am reminded of the Wizard of Oz -- ding dong, high-three is dead. Congratulations!"

The Chair thanked Representative Thielen and remarked:

"Not quite yet. It has another committee to go to."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 139, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PUBLIC EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Chang being excused.

Representative Jones, for the Committee on Agriculture, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 81) recommending that H.B. No. 551, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Water and Land Use.

Representative Okamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 551, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Water and Land Use, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro.

Representative Fox rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"This bill is peculiar. It freezes lease rents on only two islands -- Kauai and the Big Island -- neglecting Molokai, neglecting the rest of the state. I am not quite sure why that is happening, but I think this bill should be voted down.

"Thank you."

Representative Jones then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"House Bill 551 attempts to alleviate some of the problems facing agriculture on the neighbor islands. It focuses on the Big Island and Kauai, and what it attempts to do is to freeze prices on state lands for a period to allow the farmers to recoup some of their losses and at least to survive during this period of hardship.

"And we amended the bill to address some of the concerns raised by the Department of Agriculture and by replacing assessment and using lease rent instead.

"So, this is a good bill. It should help the economic situation on the two islands -- Kauai and Hawaii -- if it passes.

"Thank you."

Representative Herkes then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"The counties of Kauai and Hawaii -- ag counties -are the ones that lost all the sugar jobs, and there is a transformation from corporate agriculture to small farmers trying to get involved in the business. This bill is an attempt to help those hundreds and hundreds and hundreds of people that are no longer in sugar and trying to give them a start-up.

"I urge your support. Thank you."

Representative Kawananakoa then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"This will simply be a protest vote on behalf of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. One of my concerns, while I am very encouraged that we're looking at means by which to stimulate our economy, is the fact that many of these agricultural lands are leased out by the state and they contain ceded lands and those ceded land revenues in the form of 20 percent to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. So in this manner, we seem to be shortchanging the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. . .

At this point, the Chair interrupted and said:

"Representative, will you please stick to the contents of Stand. Com. Rep. 81. I don't believe that's quite consistent with the language."

Representative Kawananakoa continued, saying:

"I noticed that the Office of Hawaiian Affairs testified in opposition to this measure. I wasn't able to be at that hearing. I understand that some of the concerns were with regard to the ceded land revenues that are derived from these rents on agricultural lands. So in that matter, whether we knowingly or otherwise, we are actually reducing some of the revenues that the Office of Hawaiian Affairs receives from the ceded lands trust.

"For that reason, I am voicing my concern that there may be other proactive, innovative ways to reduce the burden on our agricultural constituents that have lost their jobs by otherwise encouraging businesses through tax credits or tax relief.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Jones then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I just want to remark that under 5F of the Admissions Act, agriculture is one of the five purposes of 5F and, as such, it is a trust responsibility of the State of Hawaii to provide lands under 5F for farmers also.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 551, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURAL LANDS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Water and Land Use with Representatives Fox and Kawananakoa voting no, and Representative Chang being excused. Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Human Services and Housing, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 82) recommending that H.B. No. 405 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Okamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 405 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro.

Representative Pendleton rose to speak "in strong support" of the bill, stating:

"I am involved with the issue of domestic violence -it's going back to the days as a youth pastor, and I am heartened by this body's unanimous and wholehearted support for services such as this.

"This goes hand in hand with getting tough on crime. It's not enough to get tough on crime, we also need to support those victims of domestic violence, and I want to applaud the Legislature for moving in this direction."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 405, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR SUPPORT SERVICES FOR VICTIMS OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Chang being excused.

Representative Stegmaier, for the Committee on Education, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 83) recommending that H.B. No. 807, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Labor and Public Employment.

On motion by Representative Okamura, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 807, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PARENT-TEACHER CONFERENCES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Chang being excused.

Furthermore, there's a reason for the County water costing more; it's treated water, and it's piped to a residence. So there's a sound reason for the price differential and can be taken as a business expense, therefore, there is no need for this legislation.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Jones then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I speak in support of House Bill 170, relating to income tax.

"Mr. Speaker, at the present time the County supplies water to farmers throughout the state, and their water rates would go as high as \$2 per thousand gallons, compared to the state system, which is subsidized and amounts to about 18 cents per thousand gallons.

"So what this bill tries to do is to give the farmers that are not on the state agricultural park lands a break in their water bill, especially in areas that are dry, where water is a big part of their expense. So this bill tries to incorporate Article XI of the State Constitution, Section 3, which says that the state has an obligation to promote agriculture in Hawaii, and basically this is what the bill seeks to do.

"And we want to keep the bill moving, and if there is a financial question involved, we want the Finance Committee to look at it.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Jones rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker and members of the House, House Concurrent Resolution 23 asks the governor and the mayors of all four counties to declare next week 'National Child Passenger Safety Awareness Week'.

"This effort attempts to focus national attention to the thousands of pedestrians, pedestrian injuries, and deaths occurring among children throughout the nation. Each year in Hawaii alone, an average of five children are killed and over 72 are hospitalized for injuries as pedestrians.

"So today, it gives me great pleasure to not only speak in support of House Concurrent Resolution 23, but also to introduce some of the people who work so hard to promote the National Child Passenger Safety Awareness Week in Hawaii, which will be declared by the governor beginning next week, starting on February 9th to February 15th.

"In Hawaii, led by Angela Zangerle and her parents, and her daughter, Odee, who was involved in a car accident.

"Also, we have Jovita Sagadraca from Kauai, whose daughter was also involved in a car accident last year for which we passed the resolution, and many others from various departments in the federal, state and county governments, including the CINCPAC Pacific Fleet, the Department of Health, the Department of Education, the Honolulu Police Department, the Neighborhood Board, and parents from various communities along the Waianae Coast who are in the gallery today with about 28 children who are involved in this program.

"This group also produced a video, Mr. Speaker, which we have in your office, and which is available to all the members who want to watch it. It's entitled, 'Watch It, Don't Dodge It,' which we encourage all of the members of the House to watch. It's about a 10 minute video presentation, and it gives kids tips on how to cross streets safely, and it's a real good video.

"So at this time, I would like to introduce the group up there: Angela Zangerle, her parents, and daughter, Odee, who was involved in the accident. And also Jovita Sagadraca from Kauai.

"Last year the House passed a resolution spearheaded by our Kauai community, so at this time, I would like to ask all of the participants who are involved in this program to please rise. Everyone, thank you.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kahikina rose and stated:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I also want to rise in recognition of this project.

"Mr. Speaker and my fellow colleagues, in recognition of this project, from its creators and writers, its blossoming actors and actresses, the camera crew, the organizations who financially made this video possible, I also stand and recognize the parents of these children who, through their encouragement and support, enabled them to participate in such a worthwhile effort.

"I encourage everyone, from kupuna to keikis, to watch this video. I am sure they can learn from their peers how to cross our highways in a safe manner, to make wiser choices, even though it means taking more time to cross at a traffic signal or a crosswalk such as Farrington Highway.

"And at times we need to be more cognizant of the hazards of speeding and driving in an unsafe manner. We must learn to be more keiki conscious on the roads and highways. After all, aren't we adults?

"Mr. Speaker, I'd like to recognize the true heroine and the star of this video, Miss Angela 'Odee' Burgess. I'd like to have her stand again and get recognized. Will you recognize her? And also, Mr. Speaker, I think we should take the time to recognize the following people that helped in the project, such as the public health students: Mary Kelly, Helen Kauai, Eve Decampo; also Sgt. Kawasaki and Officer Avery Choy from the Honolulu Police Department, who do an excellent job in our community; the Department of Health Injury Prevention and Control, Theresa Argard; the CINCPAC, Colonel Ronald Lee; and our very treasured Hawaiian Culture Resources in our community, Miss Mililani Allen. Will you folks stand and get recognized, please?

"And also, Mr. Speaker, I'd like to recognize some very close friends in this audience also: Sylvia Pilago and Paula Ann Burgess, will you stand up and be recognized?

"Finally, as lawmakers, we need to pass legislation which will make our roads and highways safer for our children. We need laws that can and will be enforced. We also need to reevaluate our highways and scrutinize the pedestrians as well as the vehicular traffic.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Marumoto then rose to speak in favor of these resolutions, stating:

"I'm so glad to see that there's an emphasis on passenger safety and traffic safety, and especially pedestrian safety, but I think the resolution does not mention much about child passenger safety, and I would think that we should include the resolution to encourage people to buckle up when they're in the back seats of vehicles.

"Also putting small children, up to four years and up to 40 pounds, into keiki passenger restraint systems. And last but not least, remembering to keep children out of the backs of pickup trucks.

"Thank you very much."

Representative Moses then rose and stated:

"I also wish to rise in favor of these resolutions. As a proud representative of a district which also shares part of Farrington Highway with my colleagues, I also wish to commend these folks. I've seen the video; it's very, very good. And I wish to remind you all that Farrington Highway can be a very dangerous stretch of highway, as can be attested by the recent deaths of the members of the Nuuanu family from my district, and I wish to commend my colleagues for their efforts, and wish to join you and lend all my support.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ito then rose in support of the resolution, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I reviewed the video, this excellent video, and I just want to congratulate all of you for all your hard work, and making this excellent video possible.

"Thank you very much."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.C.R. No. 23 was adopted, with Representatives Kanoho, Say, Takamine and Tom being excused.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Representative Thielen rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, there are seven days left for us to enact the emergency legislation.

"Today we're going to do it, and reform automobile insurance at 1:30. We still have one problem and that's with prison bed space. Let's hope that we can get that dealt with within the seven days, and we're doing a good job, guys, we are doing a great job."

At this time, Representative Yonamine was permitted a late introduction, and he introduced four students from Pearl City High School who were "shadowing" for the day: Noah Ai, Ashlee Blas, Shireen Garcia, Jessie Weed and David Weed.

ADJOURNMENT
