Representative Garcia rose in support of the resolutions, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, your Chairman on your Committee on Public Safety and Military Affairs is pleased to commend to the attention of the members for their consideration of these two resolutions.

"Mr. Speaker, they speak of the request to our Congressional delegation for their support of the designation and establishment of what's called a National Guard Rapid Assessment and Initial Detection Team for Hawaii, or the so-called RAID Team. This team would assist the State in responding to nuclear, biological, or chemical threats.

"Mr. Speaker, this effort was launched long before the State of Hawaii and, in particular, the City and County of Honolulu had a brush with the biological threat some weeks ago, and so we are trying to do what the ten states in the Nation have already been able to secure ten so-called RAID Teams and an additional five more teams will be designated come next fiscal year, and we hope that Hawaii will be one of the five.

"Mr. Speaker, the incidence that I refer to happened on February 23rd and 24th. These were the anthrax events which

raised more of a scaring and garnering attention more than anything else.

"I speak to the issue of biological terrorism, Mr. Speaker, and just to inform the members how grave the situation could be if we are not prepared to deal with it. Biological terrorism is what's referred to as the 'poor man's atom bomb.' It's one of the so-called weapons of mass destruction that terrorists will employ.

"Mr. Speaker, a U.S. Army General in 1960 is reported to have estimated that just two aircraft, each carrying ten thousand pounds of biological agents over the United States, could kill or incapacitate some sixty million Americans.

"A particular biological agent, Type-A botulinal toxin, is referred to as the most deadly of the biological agents, more deadly than nerve gas. Some people say, Mr. Speaker, that anthrax is even deadlier. For example, the U.S. Law Enforcement Assistance Administration reported in March 1977, that a single ounce of anthrax introduced into the air-conditioning system of a domed stadium could infect 70,000 to 80,000 spectators within an hour.

"According to another study, in principle, if the spores of an anthrax agent were distributed appropriately, a single gram would be sufficient to kill more than one-third of the population of the United States.

"Mr. Speaker, as one of the lead agencies charged with dealing with these acts of terrorism, your State Civil Defense, they have stated that the State of Hawaii is vulnerable to terroristic attack, the potential for loss of life, injury and property damage is significant.

"Your Committee on Public Safety and Military Affairs, shortly after the anthrax scare, convened an informational briefing, calling together government agencies, State and county, plus the private sector and others, who are so-called responders to these types of incidents. And we asked several questions: What are the standard operating procedures of your agency for responding to different acts of terrorism? What type of inter-agency coordination has been arranged? What is your sense of how well prepared the private sector is concerning these events? To what extent and in what manner does the private sector participate in efforts to prepare for these acts? And what can the Legislature do to help?

"And in reference to that last request, these resolutions were something that your Committee was able to do, in part to try and see what we can do to help our agencies respond to these types of incidents.

"One of the other questions that your Committee posed to those who attended the informational briefing was: to what extent the parties have been able to engage in the private sector, I mean the population at large, to see what those agencies can do to better prepare them so that the civilian population can be better educated in how to deal with these. . .

At this point, Representative Goodenow rose and yielded his time to Representative Garcia.

Representative Garcia thanked the Chair and continued, stating:

"And so this question was posed to all the responders, interested parties, and that your Committee will be following up with that informational briefing to see to it that these kinds of questions and others are answered.

"Lastly, of course, I want to encourage and urge the support support of the members for these resolutions. Thank you."

Representative Arakaki rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ordinarily, I wouldn't do this on a Second Reading bill, especially since we already heard a House version on this. But in this case, Mr. Speaker, there are some mischaracterizations in the media and from our Governor and some others that legislators are introducing this bill as sort of a 'knee-jerk' reaction to some of the highlighted cases regarding severe cases of child abuse, including that of Reubyn Buentipo.

"While the Child Protection Roundtable did address some of these issues as part of a response to some of these severe cases that were coming up, the Roundtable has been working on these issues for a year and a half. They're certainly not 'knee-jerk.' We even convened a special symposium on child protection reform, and we were told by the Director of the Center for Prosecution of Child Abuse that, in fact, Hawaii has one of the weakest penalties when it comes to child abuse. So I think in the interest of recognizing how important our children are to the people of Hawaii and, in fact, I think it sends a message that we value our children and if people are going to severely injure their children, that they're going to pay the price for it.

"So first of all, to object to any characterization that this Legislature is 'knee-jerk,' we certainly have looked at this issue for quite an amount of time. And I think this is a response that speaks clearly to the issue. We hope that this is a message that the Governor as well as other people in Hawaii get from this bill as well. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Pendleton then rose in support of the measure and asked that his comments be inserted into the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Pendleton's remarks are as follows:

"This bill proposes to toughen Hawaii's current penal code as it relates to perpetrators of child abuse.

"Specifically, House Draft 1 of this bill proposes five ways to tighten current penalties against child abuse perpetrators. First, by making intentional, knowing, and reckless actions that cause serious bodily injury to a child age ten or under a 'Class A' felony. Second, by making intentional, knowing, and reckless actions that cause substantial bodily injury to a child age ten or under a 'Class B' felony. Third, by changing the age delineation for child victims from age eight, as current statutes provide, to age ten when determining whether or not to impose an extended term of imprisonment. Fourth, by changing the age delineation for child victims from age eight, as current statutes provide, to age ten when determining whether or not to impose a mandatory term of imprisonment for offenses against children, elder persons, or the handicapped, which result in the victim's death or serious bodily injury. And lastly, by considering the condition in addition to the age and size of the minor when determining the penalty for mistreatment or neglect.

"Mr. Speaker and honorable members of the House, it is doubtful that anyone present today would dispute the fact that children are a precious gift. We, as both parents and legislators, have been entrusted with the weighty task of ensuring their protection, good guidance, and welfare. Yet recent studies show that an unprecedented number of children are overlooked by the watchful eye of government agencies such as the Child Support and Protection Agency and the Child Protective Services.

"According to the National Child Abuse and Neglect Data System, the number of child victims in the Nation suffering from substantiated or indicated maltreatment rose an approximate 18 percent between 1990 and 1996. Hawaii confirmed 2,531 cases of child abuse in 1997 alone, 39 percent of which were in Hawaiian or part-Hawaiian families. In a one-month review of the Child Welfare Services done by the State Auditor Marion Higa earlier in 1999, over 40 percent of suspected sexual assaults on children were not reported to police. Fellow colleagues, we cannot stand by, letting criminals abuse our children and get away with it.

"Child abuse is not just a statistic -- it's a human tragedy suffered by families everywhere. Right now there is a little girl, probably wearing a ponytail and carrying a favorite doll like one of my own daughters, who is in desperate need of medical attention. A few blocks away, there's an older boy, maybe around nine or ten, who feels the shame of an abusive father and in turn, takes it out on his younger sister. These images may make some uncomfortable. However, they are not images that we as a society can or should ignore. Child abuse and neglect -- whether physical, emotional, or sexual -- must be addressed in the open. It must not be hidden, admitted only in private or suppressed altogether. It must be stopped.

"Families need to be educated about childcare and how to avoid abuse so that they can provide a healthy, safe, and loving environment for their children. Abused keiki must know that they are not to blame for the negligent and hurtful actions of parents under severe stress, depression, or dependence. Alcoholic or otherwise addicted parents must be reminded that there are severe consequences to pay for irresponsible child rearing. And women must be affirmed. They must not feel that silence is the only option if a family member is abusing them or their children.

"Again, Mr. Speaker, I support the measures proposed by SB 176, HD 1. We in the Legislature cannot realistically prevent

child abuse from every happening again. Yet we can send a clear message to those that would hurt children, recklessly neglect their needs, or look away as they are abused. The clear and unambiguous message is that such behavior is not acceptable, and it will not be tolerated.

"We must be assertive in the measures we take to protect and affirm the futures of our keiki. Our legacy depends on their future. And their legacy depends on what happens during the formative years -- or rather, what does not happen. Approximately 26 percent of victims of abuse and neglect are children ages 8 to 12, and another 21 percent are between the ages of 13 to 18. We as a collective body can and must insist that all children have a stable and healthy environment in which to develop. This requires a tight control on those adults who would abuse their position and age by violating or disregarding children. SB 167, HD1 works toward this goal.

"Mr. Speaker, an earlier draft of this bill would have protected a larger category of children, but there were concerns raised as to the change in the age from the present requirement of eight years to twelve years. Thus, HD1 reflects the compromise figure of ten years or younger.

"In a side note, one of my Legislative Aides recently took a moment to surf the House website. From our online biographies, the fifty-one Representatives reportedly represent ninety children and a dozen more grandchildren. In a finding by the National Incidence Study of Child Abuse and Neglect, approximately forty-two of every 1,000 young children under the age of 18 are harmed or endangered by maltreatment. While this is not to suggest that any members would engage in such conduct, statistically speaking, that means that almost four of our own children will be abused or neglected for the first time during this year. This is in addition to the children and adults that have already been scarred by an abusive childhood.

"Perpetrators are often parents, but not necessarily so. Fortunately, because of each of our own upbringings and lifestyles, it is likely that the keiki of legislators suffer a much lower rate of abuse than the average. But the legislation that we enact now is for other less fortunate keiki, children who come from predominantly low-income families and alcoholic or drug-addicted parents.

"While we seek to address such addictions, we will nonetheless ensure that our criminal system provides serious incentives against abuse. I respectfully urge the members of this house to support this bill for the foregoing reasons.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for the opportunity to speak in support of SB 176, HD1."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Human Services and Housing, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1254) recommending that S.B. No. 876, S.D. 2, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce.

Representative Case moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 876, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, seconded by Representative Yonamine.

Representative Pendleton rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"There is only one individual who spoke in favor or testified in favor of this measure, but there are a number of people or groups that testified in opposition. One of the groups that testified in opposition was the Housing and Community Development Corporation of Hawaii. Attached to their testimony was an opinion from the Attorney General on that particular topic.

"The concern of the Attorney General had to do with present case law relating to this area and that if a law were to specify only one means of evaluation or appraisal of the value of the property, it may not pass constitutional muster. Referring to page 2 of the particular bill, the language highlighted by the Attorney General, Mr. Speaker, had to do with lines 6 and 7 where it says 'a qualified real estate appraiser shall complete a lease-fee analysis.' The Attorney General opined that if this language is interpreted as saying that only one form of appraisal is available, then it may not be constitutional. So these are my reservations.

"I think the intent of the bill is very good to address the question of what is a fair and appropriate way of determining what just compensation may be. But I wanted to note those concerns. At the time that I voted in the Committee, I had not yet had the opportunity to read that Attorney General's report.

"So those are a few of my reservations. I note that this bill is moving on to the Consumer Protection and Commerce Committee. And if I may humbly suggest that perhaps one way to address the Attorney General's concern is to provide for a whole host of different ways of appraising the property and maybe suggesting that one or two methods can be selected by the parties. Something like that, I think, would address that specific concern. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Moses rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"This is the cigarette stamp tax bill again. I've spoken out on this floor for several years, and I'll do it again. This does not exempt the military. I can't see any exemptions in there. If you understand the problem aboard ships or military PXs or in the commissary, veterans, military personnel are allowed to purchase cigarettes. It's part of their overall pay. It's factored in as part of our pay. That's our privileges. We save money in the PXs and commissaries. Those privileges, if they're not reinstated in some other form, will constitute a hardship on those military people.

"Now once they buy a cigarette out of the State or a package of cigarettes aboard a ship, for instance three miles out, what happens when they come ashore? That isn't addressed in the bill either. I know they can ask for exemptions. Certain people can ask for exemptions, but that's an onerous burden on the people and on the distributors. So unless all of those things are fixed, I stand in opposition of this measure."

Representative Takai then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I just wanted to address some of the comments made by the speaker from Makakilo in regards to the purchase of cigarettes on military institutions as well as on ships.

"First of all, this cigarette stamping provision is only for those cigarette packs that are considered taxable by the State. In other words, cigarette packs that are sold on military institutions are not taxable by the State, therefore, the State doesn't realize any taxes from those cigarettes nor will we be allowed to be placing these cigarette tax stamps on these packs of cigarettes.

"In regards to the concern about the sailor purchasing a pack on the ship and coming back onto land, there's no problems with that because that sailor will be using it for his or her own consumption. It becomes a problem if that particular sailor decides to go to, let's say, Hotel Street and sells his cigarettes to people. Then he or she would be transacting business and therefore be in violation of our tax code and should be assessed a tax on that particular cigarette pack.

"So all we're talking about is taking care of or addressing the concerns that we have in regards to cigarette packs that are sold within the State, but not paying cigarette taxes. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Moses rose and stated:

"On page 7 it clearly states: 'A person who knowingly possesses, keeps, stores, acquires, et cetera...regardless of the source of, or method of obtaining the cigarettes, is guilty of a class C felony.' And it talks about five years, \$10,000 or both. That's what I'm talking about, Mr. Speaker. When a sailor is in Waikiki, you don't know where he got the package of cigarettes. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative McDermott then rose and stated:

"Same measure, I'm going to cast a no vote. All this discussion about cigarettes and the pros and cons, I feel I'm somewhat in a smoky haze right now. So I'm going to cast a no vote."

Representative Rath then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 788, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives McDermott, Moses and Rath voting no and Representatives Chang, Halford, Hamakawa, Kawakami, Menor, Morihara, Okamura, Souki and Whalen being excused.

Representative Cachola, for the Committee on Water and Land Use, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1260) recommending that S.B. No. 1229, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, as amended in HD 2, be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Case, seconded by Representative Yonamine and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1229, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING," was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Chang, Halford, Hamakawa, Kawakami, Menor, Morihara, Okamura, Souki and Whalen being excused.

Representatives Herkes and Santiago, for the Committees on Economic Development and Business Concerns and Health, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1261) recommending that S.B. No. 47, S.D. 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Case, seconded by Representative Yonamine and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 47, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Chang, Halford, Hamakawa, Kawakami, Menor, Morihara, Okamura, Souki and Whalen being excused.

Representative Garcia, for the Committee on Public Safety and Military Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1262) recommending that H.R. No. 49, be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Case moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.R. No. 49 be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Yonamine.

Representative McDermott rose to speak in strong support of the measure, stating:

"I'll be brief, it'll only be about two or three minutes. But this is to a House Resolution requesting the United States Department of Defense to homeport an aircraft carrier along with its support group in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii.

"I think as a representative of that area, it's very fitting that I stand to speak in support not only for our community out there, as their representative I say not only do we support it, we welcome it with open arms. Clearly, an aircraft carrier would be a big shot in the arm for our local economy and all the merchants.

"When we had our military briefing up at Camp Smith, I asked the Deputy of CINCPAC what he thought our chances were. And he said that we weren't in the running or wasn't too good at that point. It wasn't promising. But the point of this is they look at two things. As a former Marine officer, I won't tell you how long ago but it was 50 pounds ago, they look at two things when they determine this. They look at tax code decisions and tax program ramifications as well as quality of life issues.

"And I know one of the quality of life issues, let me just share with the body. I have up in my office a letter from a three-star flag officer to the deputy commander of CINCPAC, which is all the Pacific Command, and he says in there -- the number one quality of life issue for them right now is the educational system we have here. And I'm not an expert on process, but I know particularly the facilities in this area needs some shoring up.

"And in particular, all these high school students, and I know my friends here are going to get tired of hearing this, but all these high school students that would come with this aircraft carrier and support group would go to Radford High School. Clearly, we can ask the military if they come to maybe get some money for that, but also we need to do our share, too, and fix that school. If we build it, they'll come. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. No. 49, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE TO HOMEPORT AN AIRCRAFT CARRIER ALONG WITH ITS SUPPORT GROUP AT PEARL HARBOR, HAWAII," was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Chang, Halford, Hamakawa, Kawakami, Menor, Morihara, Okamura, Souki and Whalen being excused.

Representative Garcia, for the Committee on Public Safety and Military Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1263) recommending that H.R. No. 75, as amended in HD 1, be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Case moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.R. No. 75, H.D. 1, be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Yonamine.

Representative Moses rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I want to remind this body that we each owe a great deal to our veterans. This resolution is our chance to begin to repay that debt. Mr. Speaker, with your permission, I not only would like to support the resolution, but I'd like to remember in a moment of silence those who are now veterans and are flying in

the skies over Kosovo in harms way. If we could do that, Mr. Speaker, I'd appreciate it. Thank you."

The Chair responded: "May we take that up at the end of the session, Representative Moses. So ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. Representative Meyer's remarks are as follows:

"I stand to register a 'no' vote on S.B. 498, SD 1, which allows prescriptive authority to a lesser trained group of health care providers. This group is the advanced practice registered nurses. Under this bill they would also be permitted to prescribe controlled substances, Schedules II to V.

"Both the Hawaii Medical Association and the Hawaii Federation of Physicians and Dentists submitted written testimony in opposition to this measure.

"The Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce cited that presently thirty-three states grant APRNs the authority to prescribe these drugs. However, a study by the Journal of the American Medical Association has reported that 100,000 people per year die as a result of medical errors. Reducing qualifications of the personnel who prescribe the potentially dangerous substances is not the way to address the problem of the safe delivery of quality health care."

Representative Marumoto then rose and asked the Clerk to record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Stegmaier then rose and asked the Clerk to record an aye with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Yamane then rose in support of the measure, stating:

"I would just like to ask the next committee to take a look at whether the approval should be with the Board of Nursing, as proposed. But as far as the contents of the bill, I do support the APRNs. Thank you."

Representative Kahikina then rose to register an aye with reservations, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Rath then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Auwae then rose to register a no vote, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Moses then rose in support of the measure with reservations, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Pendleton then rose in support of the measure with reservations, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Santiago then rose in support of the measure, stating:

"This is somewhat interesting. This is not a new issue. We have already looked at prescriptive authority for nurses, and the wisdom of this body in the past has been to allow the nurses to do what they are qualified to do. We have presently 33 states in the union that have already conferred this authority on the APRNs, which are Advanced Practice Registered Nurses. These are nurses at the highest level of professional aptitude and ability. Twenty-three of those 33 states do allow for the prescriptive authority to include Schedules II on through V, which is where a little bit of controversy came up in our hearing.

"Insofar as the appropriateness of the Board of Nursing being the granting body, I do agree, as the Vice Chair has already mentioned, that CPC would be the more appropriate committee to address that issue.

"Insofar as the need, it has been addressed, it has been proven. I've asked the nurses to come to the next Committee's hearing and emphasize the fact that what we're talking about is allowing nurses to provide prescription to those individuals who are in greatest need, where physicians presently are not practicing. As a result, I do ask my colleagues to please reconsider, and this measure should move forward wholeheartedly.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. "There is a trend and political pressure to reduce the qualifications for medical professionals. Senate Bill 40 fits in this category. It would give physician assistants full authority to write prescriptions for schedule III through V controlled substances if they pass a minor licensure program. These are the most potent and potentially dangerous drugs in the medical arsenal. Physician assistants have not had anywhere near the training of medical doctors, so why are we handing over prescriptive privileges to PA's?

"Passage of this bill would compromise the quality of our health care."

Representative Pendleton's remarks are as follows:

"The purpose of this bill is to raise the various fees charged by State agencies to more accurately reflect the cost of providing governmental services. Its original method for doing this was (1) by establishing fees for freshwater game fishing; (2) by establishing mooring fees for boating facilities; (3) by establishing fees for after-school and weekend educational programs; (4) by allowing towing companies to charge a fee for performing road clean-ups; and (5) by increasing the required student fees for adult and community public education programs to half of the total cost.

"Currently in its fifth draft, SB 425 has undergone considerable alteration since its original form. Only the third and fourth provisions now remain, which authorize the Department of Education to charge fees for after-school and weekend programs, and allowing towing companies to charge a minimal fee. The clause regarding after-school and weekend educational programs has especially raised concern among constituents in my district, prompting many to contact my office directly in opposition to this bill.

"The intent of SB 425 is commendable, as it is reasonable and necessary for a balanced State budget to tie the money being spent to offer a public service to the real cost incurred by providing it. Yet, charging heavy tuition fees for programs that can only lead to a more comprehensive and competitive public education is not appropriate. Our students should never be penalized for their desire to learn.

"While they are perhaps supplementary to the basic curriculum of English, mathematics, history, and science, afternoon and weekend public classes for Hawaii's keiki in subjects like art, ballet, creative writing, hula, ukulele, lei-making, and the like, are not excessive or extravagant. They are critical for a well-rounded education, and fundamental to the preservation and continuation of the distinct Hawaiian culture. Furthermore, day care programs such as those endangered by the additional fees established under SB 425, SD3, HD2, largely benefit low-income, working parents. These families depend on the affordability of such day-care programs to keep their own jobs, jobs which are in turn critical to a healthy economy and low welfare rolls for all of Hawaii.

"In a report recently released in Education Week Magazine, Hawaii's educational standards have slid from a B in 1997, and a C last year, to an alarming D- in 1999. School climates were given an F for both 1998 and 1999, and while efforts to improve teacher quality are on the upward trend, they still only merited a C rating against national standards.

"For a State that already spends at least \$5,720.00 in classroom costs per pupil, and still needs more revenue, as the preamble to this bill would suggest, something is wrong with how we're spending those educational dollars. Take Iowa for example, they spend a nearly equivalent amount, \$5,705.00 per pupil, yet the combined verbal and math SAT scores of Iowa students are nearly 200 points higher than those of Hawaii students, according to 1998 SAT statistics.

"Claiming that more money is needed to provide a good public education is like the chef suggesting to just throw more flour into an unbalanced cake mix. Without examining the proportions of each ingredient and how they react together as a whole, the cake will never turn out right. You don't just add more money to the mix, you have to get the proportions right in

the first place. And you must re-examine the use and function of each ingredient as it relates to the final product.

"If our students score poorly in comparison with those of other states, and graduate unprepared for higher education and the competitive work force that awaits them, more money is not necessarily the answer. Instead, we must examine how the current tax dollars are being spent, what is working, what is not, and what areas we can streamline for an optimal learning environment without jeopardizing student performance.

"In the end, math or reading comprehension skills alone do not determine one's intelligence and contribution to society. It is a diverse and challenging learning environment that cultivates young adults, and gives them the proper tools with which to compete on a national level. We cannot pass any measure that would even further disadvantage the very group of keiki who need our support the most. For the foregoing reasons, I must oppose this bill and its increased fees as they currently stand.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for this opportunity to speak in opposition to SB 425, SD3, HD2."

Representative Ahu Isa then rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kahikina then rose in opposition to the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition only to defend the consumer, and this procedure that this vehicle would allow the dental hygienist to do is the intra-oral block anesthesia which the dentist himself just performs only five of them.

"Mr. Speaker, we've heard testimony of dentists, actual dentists, making mistakes in performing this anesthetic. It's because of the consumers' safety.

"Mr. Speaker, in the section that talks about the curriculum to study at least thirty-nine hours, they have all these procedures to learn in just thirty-nine hours. One of them is CPR certification. CPR certification takes more than ten hours, and if you go down the list and you get to all of the injections, Mr. Speaker, this is about consumer safety, and I oppose it. Thank you."

Representative Ito then rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative McDermott then rose to cast a no vote and stated:

"I asked a dispassionate observer -- actually he's my father who is a retired dentist. I asked him about this. He's not making any money now and I said: 'What do you think about this?' He said: 'Dentists should do it. If the dentists can't figure out how to do that while he's doing his normal practice, he should get out of practice.'

"Thank you."

Representative Santiago then rose in support of the measure, stating:

"Regarding many of the comments about safety, et cetera, I do want to point out that this is not the first time this debate has come up. It probably won't be the last.

"The bill calls for many safeguards. The bill makes sure that the dentist is in total and complete control at all times. At no point in time will any hygienist be allowed to do anything without the dentist's okay. I think that safeguard in and of itself provides the community with the safeguards. But in addition, what we have attempted to do in this measure is further clarify what it is within the ability, within the scope of practice, within the educational background that a dental hygienist has, what they can do.

"One of the frustrating things that we have encountered over the last two years is, we gave the Board the opportunity to draft rules, which is where this debate is more appropriately held, and not here on the floor. Unfortunately, they failed to do so. It left this body no alternative but to look at the policy that we had set forth two years ago to be implemented.

"What we see before us is truly a compromise. It is truly a measure that has gone through extensive debate. And I would point out that there were many opposing factions who, over the years, have come together and now support this measure. We do ask in our committee report, the CPC Committee, which has already ruled that one of the recommended amendments which was to have the dental hygienist only practice within. . . the exact wording escapes me right now, but it has already been looked at through the Hawaii Revised Statutes that limiting administration of anesthesia only to the practice of dental hygienists is unduly restrictive. We do ask that we re-evaluate that recommended amendment and see if it does in fact provide further safeguards, which is what we're looking at.

"After having sat through hours and hours of debate, in my opinion this has gone beyond just being a 'turf war.' Now we've gone almost beyond any sense of what we're actually trying to do, which is to give a dentist who believes his dental hygienist, who has had training that has been specified, who has met the requirements that DCCA and the Board say they need to, if that dentist at that point feels that this person can provide intra-oral block anesthesia, he be allowed to do that. If he doesn't, he does not allow that to occur.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Pendleton then rose in opposition to the measure and asked that his written remarks be entered into the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Pendleton's remarks are as follows:

"I rise today in opposition to Standing Committee Report No. 1337, which is Senate Bill 779, SD2, HD1. This bill establishes the educational requirements for the administration of intra-oral block anesthesia by dental hygienists, and establishes the method of documentation required for dental board certification of a hygienist to administer anesthesia.

"In short, this bill may very well endanger the safety of children and the elderly. I cannot support a bill that would demand dental hygienists to perform more than that which they have been properly trained to do. I concur with the opinion of dentists who stand in opposition to this measure because of the untoward effects likely to be caused with a poor administration of local anesthetics, such as nerve injury, overdose, and seizures, among other complications.

"It is my understanding that dental hygienist courses are designed only to cover the basic concepts of the administration of anesthesia in the practice of dental hygiene. Further, the American Dental Association and the Dental Hygiene Accreditation Program have confirmed that the education for local anesthesia is not standardized across the nation, as dental hygienists are currently not allowed to perform these procedures in more than half of the fifty states in America.

"I fully support the competence and training of dental hygienists -- my own cousin is one. It is not their ability at all that I question, nor their role in assisting dentists. Rather, it would seem unwise and inappropriate to extend the performance of dental personnel who have not had the full four years of professional training and three years of clinical experience to perform the risky procedure for block local anesthesia. The potential for danger is heightened, and the liability for malpractice suits is increased.

"Again, while I am in opposition to this SB 779, SD2, HD1, I endorse the fine work of Hawaii's dental hygienists. Their role in the dental field is commendable, and they are of great help to many dentists.

"Some have suggested that time constraints on dentists may be lessened to a certain extent by certifying dental hygienists to perform block local anesthesia. I cannot condone this reasoning, as the benefits of this increased responsibility for dental hygienists do not outweigh the potential consequences of the more limited education and experience they have in comparison with licensed dentists. Safety must always outweigh economic concerns when we pass health legislation.

"Again, I respectfully oppose SB 779, SD2, HD1, for the foregoing reasons.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for this opportunity to voice my concerns regarding this issue."

Representative Arakaki then rose in strong support of the measure, stating:

"This is a measure that I think the Chair of the Health Committee and I worked since last year. I just want to make two points. Number one, as the Health Committee Chair mentioned, I think we want to empower the dentist to utilize the dental hygienist. And I think one of the reasons we want to do that is we're finding, especially in the area of serving low income areas, low income families, adults who need dental care, especially preventive dental care, there's really a short supply. And especially when we talk about rural areas, Neighbor Islands, we have to make use of the professionals that we have on board and enable them -- granted we need to provide protection -- but I think in these cases, we need to expand the scope of what they can do so that they can provide for more people. The fact is, many dentists do not want to serve in low income areas, so I think it is imperative that we consider these measures seriously.

"The other point I wanted to make is that many of the things that are being proposed in this bill are actually proposals that the Board of Dentistry has come up with, albeit they may be slow, but I need to point out that the Board of Dentistry is made up of eight dentists and only two dental hygienists, and two people representing the consumers. So I think that if those dentists feel comfortable with what is being proposed, I think we can rest assured as well.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Meyer then rose and stated:

"Although there are safeguards every step of the way, I am still not comfortable because of the syringes and needles that the dental hygienist will have to stick into the mouths of these people, especially the young children and the elderly. I don't feel the training in administering the intra-oral block anesthesia in such a short period of time is sufficient for the dental hygienists.

"Another thing that scares me are those dentists that are going to open large clinics, with something like ten chairs, and have the dental hygienists administer the intra-oral block anesthesia on these people as they went from chair to chair, and I really have concerns about that.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Yamane then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, our dental standards are the highest in the Nation, among other things.

"As far as consumer protection, even if this bill passes, the dentist is still responsible. The licensed dentist empowers the dental hygienist to administer the local anesthesia under his direct supervision, so as far as the responsibility goes, it still lies with the dentist.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Chang then rose and asked the Clerk to change his aye with reservations vote to a no vote, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Moses then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Arakaki then rose and stated:

"When we talk about dental hygienists, she is responsible for a very, very small part of what we discussed. Basically, we are talking about preventive dental health, and the lack of dentists out in the rural and low-income areas. We are talking about having the dental hygienist do the intra-oral block anesthesia under the direct supervision of a dentist, after they have gone

through the educational requirements and being certified by the Board of Dentistry.

"Mr. Speaker, we are trying to find ways to cut the cost of dental health so our young children and our elderly, especially in the rural and low-income areas, can have dental care. We need to be reasonable and allow the dental hygienists, in certain cases, to provide intra-oral block anesthesia because it is going to save money in the long run, and I think that is one of the reasons for this bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ahu Isa then rose and asked the Clerk to change her eye with reservations vote to a no vote, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kahikina then rose and stated:

"I just want to put more information on the table. I know there are some safeguards put in the bill. But what I am talking about, and what I am concerned about, is that the dental hygienists are going to stick a needle in the mouths of these people. That is what I am talking about -- consumer safety.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Stegmaier then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of this bill although my comments may not be considered as such.

"I believe that we in the Legislature need to abide by the decision that we made last year to allow certain types of block anesthesia to be administered by adequately trained dental hygienists who are supervised by their dentist employers. And I also believe that it is reasonable to expect the Board of Dental Examiners to adopt rules in accordance with the policy that we've established.

"At the same time, Mr. Speaker, if, in the professional judgment the dentists on the Board feel so cornered about this policy that they are unable to take action, then we need to reckon with this stance.

"I am troubled that the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs is putting inordinate pressure on the Board to act against their better judgment by threatening to terminate the existence of the Board, if they don't.

"Such action on the part of the Department is inappropriate, and it troubles me a great deal. There is a better way to resolve this impasse, Mr. Speaker. Thank you."

Representative Hiraki then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 779, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DENTAL HYGIENISTS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce with Representatives Ahu Isa, Auwae, Chang, Halford, Hiraki, Kahikina, Kawakami, Leong, Marumoto, McDermott, Meyer, Moses, Pendleton, Rath and Thielen voting no, and Representative Takamine being excused.

"This bill was amended to allow the Department of Health to grant noise permits and will not allow a county ordinance with higher standards to supersede a State noise permit. They will be in trouble, so I am concerned about that.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. "Therefore, Mr. Speaker, although I support the trustees receiving employment and health benefits within the 20 percent that they receive from the State, they are a separate entity from the State, and that is my reservation.

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Souki then rose to speak in support of the bill with reservations, stating:

"My main concern with allowing the trustees of OHA to participate in and receive the same retirement benefits as other elected salaried State officials is that we should then allow the Department of Education to do the same with the members of the Board of Education.

"I think also by giving one entity consideration, it can then go on and on, and that is my concern on this bill. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. Representative Pendleton rose and asked that his remarks be entered into the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Pendleton's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of SB 823, SD1, HD1. This bill seeks to make abusers more accountable for the harm they do, by including a child who observes domestic violence as a secondary victim of the abuse. Stiffer penalties may be exacted upon abusers when this is taken into consideration.

"I support this bill for two main reasons. First, it recognizes the importance of our keiki and our sacred obligation as adults to safeguard their well-being and to provide an environment that is nurturing and healthy. Second, it will act as a deterrent against domestic violence in general; ensuring that our families, and women in particular, are better protected by the law.

"Mr. Speaker, we must do all that we can to stem the tide of domestic violence. Unfortunately, it is an increasingly serious problem both for our State and for our country. Nationwide, a

woman somewhere is brutally beaten every twelve seconds. Twenty percent of all murders are related to domestic violence. Some studies suggest that anywhere from one-fourth to over one-half of our families experience violence in the home.

"Regrettably, domestic violence is on the rise in Hawaii. A shocking 39 percent of homicides were related to domestic violence in 1993-1994. Many of the women killed had spouses or boyfriends with long histories of violence. Although Hawaii has a relatively low rate of violent crime in general, it has a disturbingly high rate of domestic violence. Clearly, things such as temporary restraining orders are not adequate protection for people who have been abused.

"Mr. Speaker, the seriousness of the situation here in Hawaii is common knowledge. We are all aware of the terrible injuries or deaths that the victims of domestic violence have suffered, and I do not want to downplay the seriousness of those facts and the statistics I just mentioned. However, I am concerned that in the past we, as a society, may not have looked deeply enough into the issue to fully consider the total impact of domestic violence on not only the adults involved, but also upon the children.

"Senate Bill 823, SD1, HD1, facilitates the process of increasing awareness and acknowledges the impact that experiencing domestic violence can have on a child. In testimony presented at the hearings, various organizations shared statistics, some of which I would like to reiterate for you. Various studies indicate that where there is domestic violence, approximately 87 percent include children who witness these violent acts. Further studies have documented multiple problems among children that have witnessed continual assaults by one parent on another in the home. These problems include serious emotional and psychological scars which in many cases may never truly heal.

"Perhaps most serious is the fact that perpetual abuse, whether experienced first or second hand, can start a self-perpetuating cycle of violence. As children of abuse grow up, their windows to the world forever besmirched with images of violence, they often become abusers themselves, seeing no better way. According to one study, these children have a 74 percent higher likelihood of committing criminal assaults. Sons of the most violent families have a wife-beating rate one thousand times higher than sons of non-violent families.

"Mr. Speaker, as we were sobered in the past by the statistics of the consequence of abuse to adults, I hope that we are similarly sobered by these facts about our keiki. The unilateral support for this bill seems to suggest that we are. This bill alone will by no means end the problem of domestic violence. It has taken humankind centuries to acknowledge domestic violence as a problem. We will not solve the problem in a single session, but SB 823, SD1, HD1, takes an important step towards improving the lives of women and children, those who have been the unheard victims for far too long.

"In addition to supporting this measure, I strongly urge that we pursue additional avenues that will further improve the quality of life for all of Hawaii's families. Besides providing for adequate sanctions as this bill does, I would suggest two other factors that must be brought into play.

"Education is essential. Citizens of all ages need to understand that violence is socially unacceptable and that it is against the law. However, the education needed to prevent this malady is more than the public sector alone can deliver. Our society desperately needs the counseling, remediation, and, yes, moral virtues that only the public in collaboration with our private sector can provide. Statistics show that the family or the home is the place where abusive behavior is learned and passed from generation to generation. The home is also where positive patterns of behavior and communication are effectively taught.

"Our government, together with private, non-profit organizations, must provide a supportive environment for families. It is by working together with the private sector that our government will be most effective in deterring abuse and ending domestic violence.

"Second, funds are mandatory. Given our current fiscal situation, it is exceedingly difficult to find more funding for support services, such as abuse shelters, victim hotlines, victim counseling, and abuser rehabilitative therapy, but can we afford not to increase our efforts against domestic violence? I think not.

"With bills such as SB 823, SD1, HD1, and the other principles I have mentioned, we can send the message that domestic violence will not be tolerated. As one bumper sticker aptly puts it: 'There's no excuse for domestic abuse.'

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for this opportunity to speak in support of SB 823, SD1, HD1."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 823, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SENTENCING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, with Representative Takamine being excused.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Human Services and Housing, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1391) recommending that S.B. No. 513, SD 2, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committees on Consumer Protection and Commerce and Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative Case moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 513, SD 2, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committees on Consumer Protection and Commerce and Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, seconded by Representative Yonamine.

Representative Rath rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Halford then rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Okamura then rose and asked that his written remarks in opposition to the bill be inserted into the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Okamura's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak against Senate Bill No. 513, SD 2, HD 1.

"Last November, Senator David Ige, Representative K. Mark Takai and I held a town meeting to 'touch base' with our constituents and to listen to their concerns. As a result of various legislative ideas received, Representative Takai and I co-sponsored and introduced by request, House Bill No. 92. The intent of the bill was to help alleviate the shortage of available family child care providers by allowing family child care facilities to operate in condominiums, apartments and townhouses.

"I, too, am an advocate of quality family child care, and while I support the establishment of more child care facilities, I cannot support any legislation which I consider to contain serious flaws. Although Senate Bill No. 513 was also introduced with good intentions, its current draft -- Senate Bill No. 513, SD 2, HD 1 -- raises grave concerns.

"The bill contains a provision that would force current and prospective child care providers to operate on the first four

floors of the building complex. If child care providers comply with the floor restriction, their condominium association would be spared any liability for accidents or injuries arising from child care services. However, non-compliance would subject the entire condominium association to full liability. This 'forced' location of the child care provider is not equitable.

"The measure also forces the condominium associations to accept the operation of family child care facilities, regardless of their support or opposition. These decisions, with potentially far-reaching implications, should be left up to the association, as provided for in Chapter 514A of the Hawaii Revised Statutes and not mandated by legislation.

"Another area of concern is the potential increase in insurance costs to the child care provider and the association. Although the measure requires the provider to be responsible for any premium increases assessed to the association as a result of the service, all risk and cost factors must be carefully reviewed to determine if the costs can be reasonably absorbed by the provider. Until this is known, we cannot expect to impose unforeseen costs on anyone.

"There is no doubt that there is a need for more family child care facilities. However, Senate Bill No. 513, SD 2, HD 1, is not an appropriate vehicle to deal with this issue, and I question its fairness.

"Due to a number of concerns with House Bill No. 92, HD 1, a joint hearing of the House Committees on Consumer Protection and Commerce and Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs held the measure. It is my hope that Senate Bill No. 513, SD 2, HD 1, will also be held in committee until a review of the major concerns is conducted and appropriate amendments are made.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative McDermott then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Pendleton then rose in opposition to the bill and asked that his written remarks be entered into the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Pendleton's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to SB 513, SD2, HD1. This bill seeks to include condominiums, apartments, and townhouses as types of residences eligible to be used as child care homes.

"My wife and I have three children and we both work. I understand many of the problems we working parents experience while trying to provide care for our children. I know that many of Hawaii's families are struggling with similar circumstances. While I recognize the need for ready access to good child care alternatives, I am not sure that making all condominiums, apartments, and townhouses as types of residences eligible to be used as child care homes is the wisest way of meeting that need.

"The Condo Associations in their testimony cited Hawaii Revised Statutes 514A, and asked why State government was trying to micromanage their associations. This statute guarantees organizations such as condo associations the authority of self-government. These decisions, that is, whether to allow or disallow such child care facilities in condominiums, are best made not by the Legislature but by the condominiums themselves.

"Mr. Speaker, I oppose SB 513 SD2, HD1, because although on the surface it seems beneficial, particularly by providing more opportunity for people to run home child care businesses, the risks involved are simply too great. It may be short-sighted to unilaterally decree that all condominiums, apartments, and townhouses are eligible to be used for child care businesses. It

seems to me that this would be at the expense of the children involved. A lot of the Committee testimony, such as that from the Fire Department, expressed genuine concern about safety issues.

"Of course, the need for more child care must be met. I simply don't believe that SB 513 SD2, HD1, is the best way to do this. As I understand it, condominiums, apartments, and townhouses may be used for child care businesses, but this is dependent upon the agreement of the individual associations involved. It would be unjust to force the other tenants to accept the Legislature's decision on this issue, given the intent of HRS 514A.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for the opportunity to speak in opposition to SB 513, SD2, HD1."

Representative Meyer then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Stegmaier then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Yamane then rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 513, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FAMILY CHILD CARE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committees on Consumer Protection and Commerce and Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs with Representatives Fox, Leong, McDermott, Meyer, Okamura, Pendleton, Rath and Stegmaier voting no, and Representative Takamine being excused.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Human Services and Housing, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1392) recommending that S.B. No. 570, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Case moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 570, SD 1, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Yonamine.

Representative Kahikina rose and asked that his comments be entered into the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kahikina's remarks are as follows;

"The purpose of this bill is to improve the quality of life in the Waianae Coast community by extending the Waianae Coast Community Benchmarking Pilot Program to June 30, 2003.

"The House Bill of this version was held in the Committee on Finance due to the funding constraints. All fund requirements have been deleted, but because of the title of the bill the Committee on Human Services and Housing created the

funding clause and extended the Benchmarking Pilot Program to 2003.

"Therefore, I ask all the members to support this measure. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. "My only reservation with this bill is that I am still not convinced that the health center should be school-based. So that is my only concern.

"Mr. Speaker, when this bill was heard, the substance of H.B. 102, HD 2, was inserted in its place.

"The purpose for hearing this matter is to seek back wages for the employees. This particular bill will 'punish' an employer who fails to pay wages in a timely manner in an amount equal to unpaid wages, plus six percent interest, from the date that the wages were due.

"We try to help our businesses, and some of them are really having a hard time, and this is not the way to go. I recommend that we put discretion back in the amount of penalty assessed to the employer with equitable justification for not paying wages when due.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Rath then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Halford then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Meyer then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"We are trying to help businesses. Having an employer pay back wages due in an amount equal to the amount of unpaid wages, plus interest, can amount to \$10,000 per person. This just seems like an overkill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Stegmaier then rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Pendleton then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 206, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WAGES AND COMPENSATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Halford, Meyer, Pendleton, Rath and Whalen voting no, and Representative Takamine being excused.

Representative Yoshinaga rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I believe we are making progress of modernizing the civil service system with this measure, and I would just like to highlight S.B. No. 1046 based on the concerns by members.

"We have maintained our House position that would require the Director of Human Resources Development to establish a task force and work collaboratively with the task force to modernize current civil service laws, and specifying the issues that the Director and the stakeholders should discuss and examine. We have also included rules for the Department and other interested parties on individuals. We have also listed other provisions on page 3 of the bill, but not limiting the general agreement in terms of specific considerations that were discussed.

"And finally, modernizing the civil service system cannot be accomplished with just a 'slap of the hand.' It needs to be thoroughly considered by your members. To create an opportunity that encourages all stakeholders to work collaboratively to co-create this modernized civil service, it is proposed that a 'fresh start' provision be established.

"Mr. Speaker, we should work closely with the Senate on this so that the Legislature will be able to adopt legislation to be effective June 29, 2000, to define the employment of persons in the civil service system with 'fresh' ideas.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Rath then rose in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is a good measure and I do not have an amendment to offer."

Representative Pendleton then rose in support of the bill and asked that his remarks be entered into the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Pendleton's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of SB 1046, SD3, HD1. This bill seeks to put into motion much needed modernization of Hawaii's Civil Service.

"Support for this bill has been unanimous in both the Senate and the House. It has been recognized that the Civil Service System has performed admirably, but it is equally as obvious that the inevitable time for change has come. Governor Cayetano, in his State-of-the-State address, concluded that 'the past four years have led me to conclude that Hawaii's 60-year-old Civil Service System is obsolete. With nearly 1,700 job classifications, the System is rigid, inflexible - unable to make timely responses to public needs. The System stifles employees who are innovative, hardworking, and who want to do a good job.'"

"We need to modernize the Civil Service System, imbuing it with increased flexibility and making it more compatible with the needs and challenges of our global society. What we require is a professional staff armed with new tools, given new information and resources, and most of all insulated from political influence, but accountable to the people. It is time to step up to another level - a new plateau made possible by the new world that we live in today.

"I would have, of course, preferred the Governor's proposal to abolish the Civil Service System altogether by a date certain in the early part of the next century. This would have created a sense of urgency to bring real reform to Civil Service. It would also have allowed us to start from a blank slate. While I would have preferred the Governor's proposal, I support this bill as the next best solution.

"Mr. Speaker, computers have become integrally linked with every facet of modern life: changing how we interact, communicate, and even think. Some of you may remember with great fondness your first personal computer, the accompanying dot matrix printer and the incredible possibilities that seemed to accompany them. Back then it seemed that this was the penultimate. So much power in one room. With today's technology you can hold one hundred, even one thousand times the processing power and storage capacity in the palm of your hand. And with modern printers, one-tenth the price of that noisy old dot matrix, you can now print beautiful photo quality images digitally manipulated in any way you choose. Again, the possibilities seem even more boundless, even more wonderful.

"The wonders of ever-changing technological advances can be expounded upon at great length, but I hope that with the passage of SB 1046 SD3, HD1, we will rediscover that same sense of wonder, that sense of urgency that makes us want to use the resources available to us to their utmost, to test their limits and to transcend them. As we look at a changing, growing Civil Service and its potential, may the new vision we have exceed the old by a hundred, even a thousand times.

"In the language of the computer age then, in regards to the Civil Service, SB 1046 SD3, HD1, is simply a call for an upgrade -- Civil Service version 2.0, with built-in empowerment module. The new Civil Service System

envisioned by this bill will encourage and reward innovation and hard work and will not fall into the classic stultifying traps that bureaucracies are infamous for. Civil Service can be adaptive and creative, responsive and efficient. I support SB 1046 SD3, HD1, because it will foster this positive atmosphere of change and growth with respect to our Civil Service System.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Yoshinaga, for the Committee on Labor and Public Employment, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1415) recommending that S.B. No. 1231, SD 3, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative Case moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 1231, SD 3, HD 2, be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, seconded by Representative Yonamine.

Representative Catalani rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Rath then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative McDermott then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Meyer then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1231, SD 3, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SMOKING IN THE WORKPLACE," was referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs with Representatives McDermott, Meyer and Rath voting no, and Representative Takamine being excused.

Representative Yoshinaga, for the Committee on Labor and Public Employment, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1416) recommending that S.B. No. 803, SD 2, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Case, seconded by Representative Yonamine and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 803, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WORKFORCE RESTRUCTURING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Takamine being excused.

Representative Yoshinaga, for the Committee on Labor and Public Employment, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1417) recommending that S.B. No. 1151, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative Case moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 1151, SD 1, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, seconded by Representative Yonamine.

Representative Catalani rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Rath then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kahikina then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Takumi then rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Schatz then rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1151, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CIVIL RIGHTS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs with Representatives Kahikina and Rath voting no, and Representative Takamine being excused.

Representative Yoshinaga, for the Committee on Labor and Public Employment, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1418) recommending that S.B. No. 235, SD 2, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative Case moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 235, SD 2, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, seconded by Representative Yonamine.

Representative Catalani rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Rath then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Takumi then rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Schatz then rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Halford then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 235, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMPLOYEE PROTECTION UNDER THE WHISTLEBLOWER LAW," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs with Representatives Halford and Rath voting no, and Representative Takamine being excused.

Representative Chang, for the Committee on Tourism, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1419) recommending that S.B. No. 816, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Case moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 816, SD 1, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Yonamine.

Representative Halford rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Fox then rose to speak in favor of the bill with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this measure puts the Convention Center Authority under the Hawaii Tourism Authority starting on July 1, 2001. But on July 1, 1999, it starts to take money out of the Tourism Special Fund to start paying for the Convention Center expenses.

"I think a two-year gap for the Hawaii Tourism Authority to gain control of the operations of the Convention Center is justified for the orderly transfer of responsibilities from the Convention Center Authority to the Hawaii Tourism Authority. This will also help to level the debt service obligation. So I think it is a bill necessitated between the time to transfer responsibilities and the time for the economy to improve, and I hope this will be fixed. There are other problems with this bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Souki then rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"I stand to speak against this bill, and I will vote no on this bill. There are a number of provisions I am sorry to see.

"We will be transferring all moneys in the Hawaii Convention Center Special Fund to the Tourism Special Fund and assigning the responsibilities of the convention center to the Hawaii Tourism Authority on July 1, 1999. But we will be assigning the responsibility to market, operate, manage and maintain the convention center from the Convention Center Authority to the Hawaii Tourism Authority on July 1, 2001. That alone seems to present a problem.

"Marketing services for the convention center are presently provided by the Hawaii Visitors and Convention Bureau which has no authority over the Convention Center Authority. There is a division of responsibilities between the Convention Center Authority and the Hawaii Tourism Authority, and we should look at this and make the necessary changes. But an agreement was made with the Senate and the House and all the stakeholders with the funding. We presently have warm bodies there -- they're not cold. They have not been buried, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Goodenow then rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye with reservations for him, and that the Representative from Maui's speech be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only)

Representative Meyer then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 816, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE CONVENTION CENTER," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Meyer and Souki voting no, and Representative Takamine being excused.

Representatives Chang and Herkes, for the Committees on Tourism and Economic Development and Business Concerns, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1420) recommending that S.B. No. 1325, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Case, seconded by Representative Yonamine and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and S.B. No. 1325, SD 1, HD 1,

entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Takamine being excused.

Representative Herkes, for the Committee on Economic Development and Business Concerns, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1421) recommending that S.B. No. 785, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committees on Consumer Protection and Commerce and Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative Case moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 785, SD 1, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committees on Consumer Protection and Commerce and Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, seconded by Representative Yonamine.

Representative Kanoho rose and asked for a potential conflict ruling, saying that he was an employee of Hawaiian Telephone for many years, and the Chair ruled "no conflict."

Representative Ahu Isa then rose and asked for a potential conflict ruling, saying that she was employed by GTE, and the Chair ruled "no conflict."

Representative M. Oshiro then rose and asked that his remarks be entered into the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative M. Oshiro's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I speak in support of SB 785, SD1, HD1. This bill clarifies and implements the intent of this Legislature as expressed in Act 80, Session Laws of Hawaii 1994. It serves the public interest and must be enacted in the interest of consumer fairness and public safety.

"The genesis of this legislation lies in the long history of inadequate service provided by the current telecommunications provider to customers in rural areas of Hawaii, and in the repeated delays and refusals by the current telecommunications provider to carry out or comply with the policies set forth by the Legislature and the orders of the Public Utilities Commission (PUC). Even though the current telecommunications provider states that its service to rural Ka'u has been improved, such improvements have come grudgingly, and only after repeated directives from the PUC and the Legislature.

"Most of us living here on Oahu have no memory or concept of what it means to not have single-line telephone service. Yet, the people living in remote areas of Hawaii deal with party lines right up through this decade. Since 1987, the current telecommunications provider has continuously failed to meet the demands of its rural customers for single-line service. According to a former State Consumer Advocate, the PUC in 1992 investigated the current telecommunications provider's service in rural areas and found that its failure to provide single-line service actually jeopardized lives, because the customer does not have control over the use of the phone in the event of an emergency.

"The current telecommunications provider's apparent nonchalance toward its rural customers, especially those residing in Ka'u, led the 18th Legislature in 1994, to find that telephone service to rural areas is often so inferior to service elsewhere that lives are put in jeopardy. At a hearing on HB 2599 during the 1994 legislative session, public testimony received from rural residents revealed the current telecommunications provider's service to be so poor as to pose a threat to the health and welfare of those residents residing in those districts. It was conditions such as these that led the 18th Legislature to enact Act 80 in 1994. This measure allowed for the removal of a carrier by the PUC should it be determined that the service provided by that carrier is inadequate, and that

carrier does not make a convincing case as to why it should not be removed and a replacement carrier found.

"Subsequently, and in accordance with the intent of Act 80, the PUC found that the current telecommunications provider was unwilling and/or unable to provide for improved service, and that a replacement was needed. In response to the PUC's Request for Proposal (RFP), competitive bids from interested carriers, including the current telecommunications provider, for the right to serve Ka'u were submitted.

"In July 1996, the PUC issued Order No. 14789, designating the replacement provider as the provider of telecommunications service in Ka'u, and ordering negotiations for the transfer or use of the current telecommunications provider's facilities on Ka'u to the replacement provider. Additionally, the PUC directive required the current telecommunications provider to provide information regarding its network in Ka'u to the replacement provider and to allow the replacement provider to conduct an engineering audit of the current telecommunications provider's facilities in the district. The replacement provider anticipated beginning its service in May 1997.

"However, two years later, there is still no improved service for Ka'u residents because the current telecommunications provider has since refused to comply with most of the PUC's order, and due to continuing litigation. The current telecommunications provider's position is that Order No. 14789 only requires it to allow the replacement provider to interconnect with its Ka'u facilities. Such an arrangement, the PUC contended in subsequent Orders Nos. 14883 and 15602, is unacceptable because it would still leave the current telecommunications provider in control of the lines and switching centers, and would only result in continuation of the existing inadequacies. The current telecommunications provider has also refused to allow the replacement provider to conduct an engineering audit of its Ka'u facilities. Such tactics led the PUC to fine the current telecommunications provider \$255,000 for its refusal to comply with its orders. Unfortunately, such a fine is hardly a deterrent and simply an ongoing business expense for the likes of a large national corporation.

"Because of the current telecommunications provider's refusal to cooperate, the replacement provider in January 1997 sought PUC approval to exercise the power of eminent domain to acquire a portion of the current telecommunications provider's facilities in Ka'u. The PUC subsequently determined in Order No. 15602 that such a condemnation was in the public interest, which prompted the current telecommunications provider to appeal to the PUC for reconsideration of all of its orders, as well as dismiss or hold in abeyance the replacement provider's original application. When these appeals were denied, the current telecommunications provider then appealed to the State Circuit Court.

"This continued delay, Mr. Speaker, is what prompted the Representative from Ka'u to introduce legislation to which SB 785 is the companion measure. SB 785 would allow the PUC to decertify a telecommunications carrier only in those distinct and narrow circumstances when that carrier provides substandard service and then fails to justify why it should not be replaced. It would also allow the alternative provider to acquire the property of the existing carrier through eminent domain, but only under limited circumstances.

"Senate Bill 785 has become necessary because it is abundantly clear that the current telecommunications provider has breached its duty to serve its customers in Ka'u. Whatever improvements the current telecommunications provider made to its Ka'u service were first prompted by, and have come subsequent to, the PUC's decision to award the replacement provider the rights to service this area. The current telecommunications provider should not be rewarded for these after-the-fact efforts any more than a basketball team should be

given points for a basket shot after the buzzer sounds to end the game. Because of the current telecommunications provider's lackadaisical attitude toward its rural customers, the residents of Ka'u endure an eleven-year struggle to gain the single-line service we all take for granted.

"The current telecommunications provider only seeks to avoid or delay the consequences resulting from circumstances of its making. It should not be allowed to profit from its actions, which may lead to the demise of the replacement provider or its withdrawal from the island marketplace. Since 1996, the replacement provider has, in good faith, spent millions of dollars in complying with the PUC's directive, but has yet to see any revenue derived from that investment.

"Add to this the additional money expended by the replacement provider as a result of the continuing litigation, first in the PUC and now in the State Circuit Court. What we see now is a portrait of a small company, invited by the State of Hawaii to do business in these islands, caught in an untenable business position not of its own choosing or making. I would like to submit that this was not what the 18th Legislature had in mind when it enacted Act 80 in 1994. Allowing this to drag on through the legal process will only benefit the current telecommunications provider because the replacement provider cannot continue in business without any revenue. Enacting SB 785, SD1, HD1, into law will avoid this possibility, and will foreclose the endless litigation in this case.

"Passage of SB 785, SD1, HD1, Mr. Speaker, will not adversely impact the current telecommunications provider, a corporation that owns over 19 million lines across the nation, including over 700,000 in Hawaii. The 3,000 lines in Ka'u are insignificant to the current telecommunications provider, as its callous behavior toward that district's residents amply demonstrates.

"The current telecommunications provider's attempt to drive the replacement provider from the islands by means of a protracted and fiscally ruinous period of litigation sends a chilling message to those companies that might otherwise consider entering the local market. If we allow the current telecommunications provider to succeed in litigating the replacement provider out of the islands or out of existence, future competition will be wary of deploying limited capital and human resources here in Hawaii, and our only significant growth industry will most likely stagnate. If we are at all serious about changing peoples' perception of Hawaii as having a hostile business climate, then it is imperative that we pass SB 785.

"The Representative from Ka'u has been credited in the past for his work on telecommunication legislation, and I again must commend him for his work on this measure. His tenacity, determination, and persistence to solve this rural telecommunications service problem that plagues his constituency is an example for all to follow. This legislation is not just about telecommunications, but is about seeking justice in a system that is obviously faltering.

"We have an opportunity to take a step in the right direction in changing peoples' perception of Hawaii as a place to do business, as well as to simply do the right thing. I urge my colleagues to strongly support SB 785, SD1, HD1."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 785, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC UTILITIES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committees on Consumer Protection and Commerce and Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs, with Representative Takamine being excused.

Representative Herkes, for the Committee on Economic Development and Business Concerns, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1422) recommending that S.B. No. 1583, SD 2,

as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Case, seconded by Representative Yonamine and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1583, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TECHNOLOGY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Takamine being excused.

Representative Herkes, for the Committee on Economic Development and Business Concerns, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1423) recommending that S.B. No. 1607, SD 2, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Case moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 1607, SD 2, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Yonamine.

Representative Rath rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Halford then rose in opposition to the measure, stating:

"This bill is an intrusion."

Representative Morihara then rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the purpose of this bill is to appropriate funds to be paid into the Hawaii Strategic Development Corporation Revolving Fund for investment in primarily high technology companies to develop a sustainable venture capital industry in Hawaii to attract investment from the private sector.

"Because the Legislature finds that the shortage of venture capital in Hawaii makes it difficult for local high technology businesses to obtain the necessary financing, this bill requires the Board of Trustees of the Employees' Retirement System to invest employees' retirement system funds in qualified high technology businesses as a means of providing venture capital for those businesses.

"Mr. Speaker, I believe this is an opportunity for this kind of investment. We do want quality investments and I believe there are quality investments in Hawaii."

Representative Rath, in rebuttal, stated:

"Mr. Speaker, we cannot be irresponsible and invest employees' retirement system funds as a means of securing venture capital for high technology companies."

Representative Whalen then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Auwae then rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1607, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND PRIVATE INVESTMENT ATTRACTION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Halford, Rath and Whalen voting no, and Representative Takamine being excused.

Representative Herkes, for the Committee on Economic Development and Business Concerns, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1424) recommending that S.B. No. 44, SD 1, as

amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Case moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 44, SD 1, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Yonamine.

Representative Herkes rose in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, there's an error in the O.D. It's not GTE. We're not exempting exported services from the general excise tax for GTE. Otherwise, this is a good bill.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative McDermott then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 44, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representative McDermott voting no, and Representative Takamine being excused.

Representative Herkes, for the Committee on Economic Development and Business Concerns, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1425) recommending that S.B. No. 638, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Case, seconded by Representative Yonamine and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 638, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Takamine being excused.

Representative Herkes, for the Committee on Economic Development and Business Concerns, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1426) recommending that S.B. No. 1177, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Case, seconded by Representative Yonamine and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1177, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE GENERAL EXCISE TAX," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Takamine being excused.

Representative Herkes, for the Committee on Economic Development and Business Concerns, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1427) recommending that S.B. No. 1178, SD 2, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Case, seconded by Representative Yonamine and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1178, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE GENERAL EXCISE TAXATION OF RELATED ENTITIES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Takamine being excused.

Representatives Herkes and Menor, for the Committees on Economic Development and Business Concerns and Consumer Protection and Commerce, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1428) recommending that S.B. No. 744, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Case, seconded by Representative Yonamine and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and S.B. No. 744, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Takamine being excused.

Representative Menor, for the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1429) recommending that S.B. No. 822, SD 2, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Case moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 822, SD 2, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Yonamine.

Representative Rath rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Halford then rose in support of the bill with reservations, stating:

"I think that this bill can be successful with further discussion and progress in this form in the end. I think the Chairman did a very good job, so I will go with the majority.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 822, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH INSURANCE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representative Rath voting no, and Representative Takamine being excused.

Representative Menor, for the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1430) recommending that S.B. No. 830, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Case, seconded by Representative Yonamine and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 830, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH INSURANCE REIMBURSEMENT," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Takamine being excused.

Representative Yamane rose and asked for a potential conflict ruling, saying that he is with the insurance industry, and the Chair ruled "no conflict."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1129, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INSURANCE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance with Representative McDermott voting no, and Representative Takamine being excused.

"Nevertheless, I am also a resident of the McCully neighborhood and am raising my daughter there as a single parent.

"When vacant retail space was acquired by an adult book and video store, I was naturally torn between the right of free expression, the need for business development, and the need to protect the integrity and character of my community.

"This issue has been a thorny one across our country. While it preoccupies all of us, it is in the final analysis a City and County issue that is most effectively handled through zoning ordinances.

"That is why I am asking our Legislature to support the City and County of Honolulu in adopting Resolution Number 98-226 which relates to the zoning of adult establishments.

"I look forward to finding a compromise solution to this situation that is acceptable to all involved."

calendar year. It's a good idea to keep an eye on groups that are not presently covered by the Campaign Spending Commission but nevertheless could have a heavy impact on the outcome of the elections.

"I am a big fan of disclosure. And this bill requires the identification, amounts disbursed, the election and candidates mentioned in the communication, and the names and addresses of all who contributed to the committee or organization for the purpose of publishing or broadcasting the electioneering communications. I do foresee some problems with the phrase: '...for the purpose of publishing or broadcasting the electioneering communications.' But we'll see how that works out in the next election.

"This bill will almost fill a loophole in our campaign spending law -- ads made by parties who don't presently file with the Campaign Spending Commission. In other words, they're not presently on the political radar screen.

"I urge the House to retain the \$1,000 threshold rather than the Senate's \$5,000. One can purchase a lot of radio and print ads if you spend between \$1,000 and \$5,000.

"I urge all of you to vote for this measure. Thank you."

BURNS SCHOOL OF MEDICINE," were referred to the Committee on Finance with Representatives Menor, Meyer, Okamura and Saiki being excused.

Representatives Arakaki and Garcia, for the Committees on Human Services and Housing and Public Safety and Military Affairs, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1557) recommending that H.C.R. No. 63, as amended in HD 1, be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Case moved that the joint report of the Committees be adopted and H.C.R. No. 63, H.D. 1, be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Yonamine.

Representative Pendleton rose in support of the measure and asked that his comments be inserted into the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Pendleton's remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, this House Concurrent Resolution originally proposed to establish a task force within the Governor's Office that would develop a Strategic Plan and to request an audit of the State Office of Youth Services. When the OYS conceded that it had been out of compliance with the statutory mandates that govern the OYS, the joint Human Services and Housing and Public Safety and Military Affairs Committees, to which H.C.R. No. 63 had been referred, deleted the entire substance of this resolution, replacing it with more appropriate objectives.

"The current H.C.R. No. 63, HD 1 requests that the Office of Youth Services officially revise its Strategic Plan. The plan that the OYS functions under will be 10 years old in 2001, and most would agree, Mr. Speaker, that their operations should be updated. This resolution first asks that the OYS outline for the Legislature the steps necessary to implement its vision. Second, we must know what resources the OYS needs to accomplish those goals, so that it does not once again fall into the quagmire it currently faces due to a lack of adequate

resources. And third, this resolution seeks to confirm whom the OYS will consult regarding the strategic restructuring. This is perhaps the most important aspect of the House Concurrent Resolution. In the Standing Committee Report Number 1557, on page two, there is a clear directive that the OYS 'seek input on the revised Strategic Plan for the committees that are affected by the Strategic Plan' and I assume this means my Olomana and Pohakupu communities.

"The OYS has already noted its intention to collaborate with the Juvenile Justice State Advisory Group in its restructuring as well as with other local and national experts who have experience in the administration of your-related agencies in both the public and private sectors.

"Mr. Speaker, I support House Concurrent Resolution 63 because I believe that it is important to hold the Office of Youth Services accountable to the law and to the youth they serve. I hope that this resolution will enable the community to have an opportunity to work more closely with the OYS. This agency, though small in size, has the potential to affect many of our young people in a very positive way. A clear and realistic Strategic Plan which is drafted in consultation with the community will serve all the people of Hawaii. I urge my colleagues to support H.C.R. No. 63, HD 1.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for the chance to speak in support of this measure, H.C.R. No. 63, HD 1."

Oshiro, Saiki, Schatz, Souki, Takumi, Thielen, Whalen, Yonamine and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representative Hiraki, for the Committee on Transportation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1666) recommending that S.C.R. No. 33, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Case moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.C.R. No. 33, SD 1, HD 1, be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative M. Oshiro.

Representative Meyer rose to speak in strong support of the bill, stating:

"My feeling is, it is about time. I am glad that the last Committee changed the date to the year 2000 to bring it a little closer.

"This is a situation on Lanai that has been in need of attention for a long time. The breakwater there was practically destroyed during Hurricane Iniki, which was in 1992. And here we are in 1999 -- seven years, the people there have been putting up with a very dangerous situation.

"I realize that the Harbor is privately owned, but at the same time it is on an island of State residents. It is the only Harbor.

"I was pleased to see this resolution here on the desk today, and I just ask everyone to support it wholeheartedly.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kaho'ohalahala then rose to speak in support of the resolution, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, Kaunapali Harbor at one time used to be the port of entry for all of our pineapple plantation years, and there were times in which two barges would visit Kaunapali Harbor daily. Today, we are down to one barge per week. Pineapple is no longer shipped out of the island of Lanai. And from the last two hurricanes -- Hurricane Iwa and Hurricane Iniki -- damage to this Harbor has been such that there is now surf with a good south swell in Kaunapali Harbor.

"But some of the things that I think we should know is that this serves as the lifeline to the island of Lanai. It is here where goods and all of our food items are shipped in to Lanai one time during the week. And in a west swell or south swell, this Harbor faces the kind of surge that will not allow barges to actually enter the Harbor. And at one time, the island of Lanai was threatened without any fuel delivery because of the surge into the Harbor which presented dangerous conditions for landing a barge. So I am thankful to the Transportation Committee for having heard this resolution.

"I am now asking that the members of the Finance Committee consider moving this out as quickly as possible because it does serve the needs of the people of Lanai. Without this Harbor, we will be suffering a lot of consequences that none of us here would want to put upon our people in this small island.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.C.R. No. 33, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING URGENT ATTENTION TO AN EXPEDITIOUS PLAN OF ACTION TO RESTORE KAUNAPALI HARBOR," was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Cachola, Herkes, Hiraki, Menor, Morihara, Okamura, P. Oshiro, Saiki, Schatz, Souki, Takumi, Thielen, Whalen, Yonamine and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representative Rath rose to speak against the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is a contractor retainage from the subcontractor, and I speak to this as having been both a general contractor and subcontractor in the past. And this basically limits the retainage a general contractor can hold on to the moneys due to the subcontractor to five percent. While it may have the guise of fairness to it, there are some other factors that I think you should consider.

"This is basically for government contracts. I know what government contract is. As a contractor, you're the one that's

required to put forth the performance bond that guarantees the work in the contract. Additionally, the agreement between the contractor and the subcontractor is a private agreement, and while there are certain State laws that govern the payment of prevailing wage and other things, the only real lever you have to assure that all aspects of the job are completed is this retainage -- the money. And it actually has happened to me that a subcontractor just said: hey, it's not enough and walked away.

"I think, when we look at agreements between contractors and subcontractors, we are getting into an area of business where it's an agreement between the parties and that we probably should not be meddling in this. For that reason, Mr. Speaker, I would like to vote no on this.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Thielen then rose and asked for a potential conflict ruling saying that her son, Greg, is a contractor, and the Chair ruled "no conflict."

Representative Stegmaier then rose and asked the Clerk to record an aye with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B.
