The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:11 o'clock a.m.

At this time, the Chair delivered his Opening Day remarks, as follows:

"Governor Cayetano, Lieutenant Governor Hirono, former Governor John Waihee and his lovely wife Lynn, First Lady Jean Ariyoshi, our honorable Congressional delegation, Chief Justice Moon, family, guests, and friends:

"Before I begin, I'd like to introduce my pillars of support, my wife Cora, and my two sons, Geoffrey and Jared.

"Also with us this morning is our former House colleague but our friend always -- Paul Oshiro, who after 16 years of distinguished public service, decided to share his talents and knowledge with the private sector.

"Visiting us today are government officials from two countries. From Japan, we have Senators Takaoka, Hayashi, Ide, and Sukenobu. They are from the Fukuoka prefectural government. Another distinguish colleague from Canada, we have the Speaker of the House of Commons, Mr. Gilbert Parent, and his wife, Sarah. Welcome to our islands!

"Aloha!

"Today, I invite you to take a voyage of discovery with me. And in so doing, I ask you to bring three essential items:

"Courage. Faith. And the Spirit of Aloha.

"These are the provisions we will need as we embark on our voyage of discovery. I imagine these are the same provisions that the brave Polynesian voyagers brought with them when they embarked on their own journey of discovery and set sail over an unknown sea more than a millennium ago.

"Bring courage because courage is a necessary part of taking risks. As a French philosopher once noted: 'You cannot discover new oceans unless you have the courage to lose sight of the shores.'

"Bring faith because faith is the anchor we will need when we face the seas of opposition and the unknown. Faith is the hope in a child's eyes. Faith is the touch of an elder person's hand. Faith is the smile on the face of the poor and the sick.

"And bring the Aloha Spirit because taking a voyage of discovery together requires teamwork, respect, and self-discipline. It is the same Aloha Spirit I asked you to embrace when I gave you Nana Veary's book as a gift last year. I hope her words instilled in each of you its true meaning and significance, that you live the Aloha Spirit by listening not just with your ears -- but like the Hawai'ians of yesteryear, with your eyes, your mind, and your heart.

"A voyage of discovery requires action. As with any action, there are risks and costs. But just imagine where we would be, if not for the bold action of the early Polynesians who set sail for places not yet on the map!

"Our voyage of discovery will take us to many places in the days ahead. Let us discover the possibilities that await us! Let us take the bold actions required of us!

"We know from our own experience that bold actions and change, however difficult, also bring opportunity and renewal.

"Nowhere else is that more evident than at the University of Hawai'i. When faced with unprecedented budget cuts, the University went through a painful process of deciding which programs were core to the University's mission and cutting those that weren't. They did what was required to balance their budget and developed innovative ways to enhance their own sources of revenue.

"But the University wasn't done yet. They dared to dream big and they went after people who could make that dream a reality.

"Four of them are with us today. These are the mavericks, these are the visionaries, the motivators -- the kind of people who try to do more than they're expected to do -- to help the University regain its international stature and help drive Hawai'i's economy forward.

"First, we have Dr. Edwin Cadman. This former Yale physician, educator, and hospital administrator is now the new Dean of the Medical School and the interim Dean of the School of Public Health. Dr. Cadman has a vision that Hawai'i can lead the rest of the nation in medical research and innovative teaching techniques. To fulfill that vision, he is creating partnerships with other groups, both locally and nationally. Among other things, he envisions that biomedical research is an industry that can generate enormous economic activity for Hawai'i.

"Next is Dr. Wai-Fah Chen. He left his prestigious post as the Goodwin Distinguished Professor of Engineering at Purdue University to become the new Dean of the College of Engineering. He is known as an imaginative leader in engineering and his leadership is welcomed here. Our future will depend heavily on strong, vibrant, and creative technological and industrial bases. Dr. Chen's work will help train Hawai'i's students to work in the many fields of technology, including a share of E-commerce, which is predicted to be a trillion dollar industry by 2003.

"Next is Dr. David McClain. Dr. McClain was the Henry Walker Distinguished Professor of Business Enterprise and is now the new Dean of the College of Business Administration. He has been instrumental in bringing together the University and entrepreneurs to nurture the development of high tech firms in Hawai'i. High technology is almost a two billion dollar industry in Hawai'i. His leadership can help to transform our State into the high-tech center of the Pacific.

"Finally, we have Coach June Jones. He left a high paying professional coaching job to take on a winless college team. He said he took it because it was a challenge. We all know how that turned out. In one season, the University went from worst to first place, won a bowl game, and turned a budget deficit into a million and a half dollar profit for the Athletic Department. But most impressive to me is the attitude and confidence he inspired in his student-athletes. He is the kind of leader that former Notre Dame coach, Ara Parseghian, said 'will make his players see what they can be, rather than what they are.'

"It is often said that knowledge is the new strategic resource and education is the best way to attain it. We are all excited at what you will bring, not only to the University but to the rest of the State. You represent the kind of visionaries that the University -- the entire State -- needs. Not only will you be educating and inspiring our future leaders, but you have set in motion plans to ensure that the University is an integral part of the economic engine of our State.

"It is this kind of excitement that attracts international attention to the University. Just recently, I had the privilege of receiving a delegation from the National Assembly of Taiwan. They told me that the Taiwanese private sector is very interested in investing in educational and cultural enterprises in Hawai'i. They have already started discussing a joint venture with the University of Hawai'i at Hilo. These are the kind of

innovations that the University can further draw upon to become a leader in the Pacific-Asia arena.

"President Mortimer -- I thank you -- and please convey my thanks to the regents, the faculty, the students, and the administration -- for showing us the way, that the difficult fiscal seas that the University has been navigating through has resulted in unprecedented opportunities for everyone in the State. It is not just about the money; it is about having a vision --- and the courage, faith, and the Aloha Spirit to make it a reality.

"It is not only the University that has been establishing a new course. Our own House members have been busy preparing for the voyage into the future.

"At the end of last session, I asked our House members to continue working, especially on our troublesome issues: civil service, collective bargaining, Public Employees Health Fund, Employees' Retirement System, business regulation, Hawai'i State Hospital, and children's mental health system.

"Some members examined whether our tax dollars were properly spent on projects we approved. Others educated themselves about our schools systems, our farms, and alternate energy ventures.

"These issues dominated the last session, will dominate the session before us, and will probably continue to be with us for the next few years.

"This was a very busy year.

"I know that as a part-time Legislature, you all have jobs and commitments outside of the Capitol. Thank you for taking the time to participate in these work groups. Your work will play an essential role in our journey ahead.

"Although our economy is slowly growing, we still face rough fiscal waters. While the Council on Revenues predicts a moderate growth for the next few years, the Council has also issued a negative one point one percent growth rate for this fiscal year. It is still a time of budgetary caution and constraints.

"But, unlimited demands are being placed on our limited resources.

"Some of the demands are being placed by the courts, notably the federal courts. I highly respect the role of our courts in our system of government. But on too many occasions in recent years, courts have interpreted state laws beyond what we intended, and applied federal laws beyond what Congress intended.

"No doubt each court felt its decision was justified. But the sum total of these decisions has been to place enormous fiscal demands on our limited state resources. That is clearly wrong. We are the ones elected by the public and entrusted by them to create laws. We have the big picture. We know where the greatest needs are. We have the constitutional power to make these decisions and set the policy direction for the State, not the courts.

"We will work in good faith with all concerned to carry out our own intent and the Congress' intent. We ask for judicial appreciation of the enormous tasks we face, and for judicial restraint.

"Even with these court decisions, we cannot -- must not -- shirk from the responsibilities that surround us.

"Let us discover the opportunities that can be done even with these tight fiscal reins. "Let us closely examine the regulatory burdens placed upon our businesses. We must ensure that the administrative rules are not outdated, that the rules meet their intended purposes, and that the rule-making process is more flexible and responsive.

"Let us remain committed to the tax reductions we provided in the last two years to ease the burden on our businesses and consumers.

"Let us spur construction, and assist our tourism industries at the same time, through a properly established hotel and resort construction tax incentive.

"Let us keep our streets safe through adequate prison space, treatment and rehabilitation alternatives to incarceration, and better gun control.

"Let us give the Department of Education the needed fiscal and administrative authority and accountability to improve the educational governance.

"While these initiatives will help us stay the course on our voyage, let us boldly explore new routes.

"We should explore ways of assisting tourism without using more of our tax dollars. We should develop more partnerships with this industry since increased tourism not only helps the State but provides profits for the stakeholders in the industry. One possibility is to work together with the large passenger cruise lines to improve our inadequate State terminals. Rather than issuing general obligation bonds and incurring the debt for the State, why not offer the passenger cruise lines a long term lease and allow them to pay for upgrading the terminals through their own special purpose revenue bonds?

"We should explore our growth policies and consider their overall, long term impact on the entire State's quality of life. I am troubled by directives issued by established communities not to increase densities in their neighborhoods. So, where is the growth going to take place in the next ten to fifteen years? Does it make sense to spend money to accommodate new growth when there are areas where the infrastructure already exists? What will happen to the beauty of our State when our green belt disappears? What will happen when political power and resources shift to the growth areas? We need to look at growth in terms of our environment, our revenues, and our overall quality of life.

"We should explore our advantages as the 'Health State'. We should create opportunities, not only with the Western methods and medicines, but with our own specialized knowhow of Hawai'ian, Pacific, and Asian healing methods and medicinal herbs. Consumers spent more than six point five billion dollars in dietary supplements in 1996 alone. We suffer because of time delays waiting for approval of these products from the Mainland labs. Let's share our knowledge and invite the federal Food and Drug Administration and the National Institutes of Health to set up a pilot project in Hawai'i to test these products before it goes on the market. We can lead the way for the rest of the nation in testing, developing, and promoting safe medicinal herbs and products.

"We should also explore land policies to help us become much more self-sufficient. Land is both sacred and scarce in Hawai'i. Our rich soil, year-round growing climate, and strong agricultural traditions, including a well established irrigation system, means we can grow most of the food we need. With the decline of the large sugar and pineapple plantations, more land is available for entrepreneurial farmers. But our farmers need help. They need to count on land and water being available to them at a reasonable cost. Perhaps we should also look at tax and other incentives to make it attractive for both the landowner and the farmer to use fallow agricultural lands productively. Businesses which lease lands also deserve some assistance. Many, facing huge rent increases, may be driven out

of business. A few years ago, when single family homeowners faced similar problems during their lease/rent renegotiations with the large landowners, the Legislature did not look the other way. Perhaps we have another opportunity to help.

"These are just a few of the many opportunities for us to explore in the voyage ahead.

"Let us be bold. In adversity, there is opportunity!

"At the same time that we are exploring new routes, let's also take a close look at government services.

"We will continue our work at making systemic changes. As times change, so must government. We need a new government for a new millennium.

"As has been evident in the past years, government cannot solve all of the problems for us.

"We need a new style of government that will provide the tools for us to solve our own problems. That means a government that is smaller, lives within its means, and provides public services efficiently.

"We will look at modernizing our State's personnel policies. Our statewide civil service system was created, just think, over sixty years ago and needs to be scrutinized to ensure that it responds to the needs and resources of Hawai'i today. We will look at performance-based pay, collective bargaining, classification flexibility, and benefits.

"Government will have a new role in the coming millennium. But, government alone cannot do all the work. Each of us must share in the responsibility with the new government. Parents and guardians must make sure their children are ready for school. Businesses must hire people off of the welfare rolls. Each of us must work with our neighbors to keep our streets safe. We must learn to share responsibility for our family, our neighbors, and our community, and not simply rely on government to do all the work.

"The twentieth century is ending. A new century is beginning. A new millennium is dawning.

"This is the time in our history for us to use the wisdom that an ending provides, and to ponder our dreams that only a beginning can offer.

"Discovery for the people of Hawai'i did not end the day that the early Polynesians landed their canoes here. We still have much to discover.

"Let us launch our new voyages and face the turbulent seas of change.

"Together, with courage, faith, and the Spirit of Aloha, let us cast off our own canoes and make our own discoveries. Our future awaits.

"Aloha!"

The Chair then recognized Representative Case, Majority Leader, who rose and responded:

"Mr. Speaker, distinguished guests, respected colleagues of the minority party, but, first and foremost, to our bosses, the people of Hawai'i, from the 39 members of your House of Representatives whom you have elected from the majority party and charged with the obligation of leadership: Aloha!

"It is as you say, Mr. Speaker, that we must all enter, with courage, faith and the spirit of aloha, upon a voyage beyond sight of our current shores. We must do so because the shores we depart can no longer sustain us, and because we believe deeply that we will find and mold a destination that can.

"We have not entered upon this voyage blindly, or recklessly. We have prepared for it. We have stocked what has worked and we are leaving behind what hasn't. We know where we are going and why.

"In fact, we are already some years into this journey. But let's first back up and review the mission statement with which we embarked. With credit to Representatives Mina Morita and Sol Kaho'ohalahala, whose cultural heritage has encompassed this ideal for generations, our mission is sustainability.

"Sustainability is familiar to us in the environmental sense, and certainly protecting the carrying capacity of our natural bounty is a key element of our mission. But, in a broader sense, sustainability means our very ability to preserve the best of our society for future generations. It means a mutually agreeable and maintainable set of commitments to each other, an equilibrium on which we can all depend, through good times and bad.

"Sustainability does <u>not</u> mean no growth, no change, absolute stability and predictability. Growth and change and human progress are constants in today's world, just as are instability and unpredictability. Our mission is to build a better foundation, to identify a better set of guideposts, on which and by which to adjust to and master this new world. As Charles Darwin observed: 'It is not the strongest of the species that survive, nor the most intelligent, but the one most responsive to change.'

"Let's now look at the specific components of our mission, starting with our most immediate destination, which has to be economic sustainability. Today's dynamic economies are like natural fusion, feeding on themselves, creating jobs, improving the quality of life, and producing adequate tax revenues to fund core government functions like education and public safety and pay public employees' salaries and benefits. This New Economy -- built on knowledge, innovation and adaptability -- is fostered by a fair and broad-based tax structure, a focused and flexible regulatory environment, a trained workforce, and carefully targeted government incentives.

"We have already traveled far here. In 1998 and 1999, your House majority led in enacting eight separate tax reform measures, including the personal income tax and the general excise tax cuts, which over the next six years will leave in the pockets of consumers and businesses for investment and spending an aggregate \$2 billion which would otherwise have been collected in taxes. In 1999, your House majority led in creating a comprehensive measure to foster the high technology industry in Hawai'i.

"We will stay this course and fully absorb these tax cuts. Now we must turn our attention inward to comprehensive regulatory reform, following the lead of Representative Bob Herkes and his bipartisan interim workgroup's efforts. We must all -- from businesses to consumers to regulators to legislators -- kick our addiction to over-regulation.

"We have traveled the least, and we have the farthest to go, toward government sustainability. In short, we seek an affordable, flexible, performance-driven, customer-oriented, responsive, externally-focused government that can adjust quickly to changing needs in the delivery of core functions.

"Complete reform of Title 7, encompassing civil service, collective bargaining and public employee benefits, must be our goal, because without it government will not be able to deliver what we need, either financially or operationally. We must also continue a moderate and prudent fiscal policy which recognizes that our last decade's journey of budgetary adjustment is not over.

"The sustainability of our education system, both lower and higher education, deserves separate note because the keys to virtually all of our other efforts lie here. Our goals for government reform apply doubly here. Additionally, we seek greater fiscal and administrative autonomy for education as the fastest and best means to achieve our goal. To this end, we endorse Superintendent LeMahieu's initiatives in education-specific reform to increase accountability and authority, from the classroom to deep within the corridors of the Department of Education.

"We also seek equilibrium in our commitments to each other's well-being and protection, and to a vibrant civic life. In recent years, we have molded a sustainable safety net, but we have reached a place where continued sustainability must be achieved through efficient delivery rather than reduced coverage. To sustain the crime reductions we have achieved, we must and will provide both adequate prison space and preventive rehabilitation and treatment. And, while we have implemented comprehensive election reform in recent years, we must take it to the next level and now try full public financing of selected campaigns.

"Finally, back to environmental sustainability, we must distance ourselves, once and for all, from our overdependence on imported petroleum and outdated power generation and distribution policies. We must move toward full implementation of our existing state policy favoring renewable local energies to which, thus far, we have paid merely lip service.

"In sum, the voyage upon which we have already embarked, and on which, Mr. Speaker, your majority now continues, lies down several parallel but interdependent paths, all arriving at the same destination. While we have journeyed far already on tax and fiscal reform, we will now advance just as far on civil service/collective bargaining reform, regulatory reform, education reform, civic reform and energy reform.

"These are ambitious goals, but, if we are to fulfill our mandate, to lead this voyage for all, we must not and cannot be tentative. Nor will we neglect the guideposts of our core Democratic principles -- equality, opportunity, tolerance and compassion -- because they have repeatedly, repeatedly proven to offer the best hope for the most members of our diverse society.

"And as we do what must be done, we say:

"-- to you, Governor Cayetano, and your administration, that, as members of a separate, independent and co-equal branch of government, your House majority appreciates the spirit of partnership in which we have worked these past months and years. While we may and will disagree from time to time on course adjustments, we believe that together we represent the mainstream collective wisdom of the often silent majority of Hawai'i's people;

"-- to our minority colleagues, that we also appreciate the bipartisan spirit with which we have together done the people's work, and urge that together we both hold down the distracting rhetoric of an election year while we get our work done;

"-- to our Senate colleagues, that ultimately we are on this voyage together. We will give you our best set of directions and we will welcome yours, and we will work with you in good faith to implement what we agree on and resolve what we don't:

"-- to those who would abandon, under the guise of selfsufficiency, the old and weak, the vulnerable, the truly needy, those who honestly strive for a better life, that we will not go there with you;

"-- to those, both inside government and out, who would still practice a centralized control, personality-based brand of politics, that you have no place in this House, that we meant what we said about this open, inclusive, externally-focussed

marketplace of ideas where each of us is accountable to each other and to the people; and especially;

"-- to those who just cannot let go of the status quo, cannot let that old shore disappear under the horizon behind us, we say to you that we have tried our level best to show you why we must go, but we can no longer wait for you.

"But most important, Mr. Speaker, we say to our bosses, the people of Hawai'i, that this is your voyage, that you know we must all go, and that the shore lying ahead will provide the safe harbor we seek. Oliver Wendell Holmes said: '[T]he great thing in this world is not so much where we stand, as in what direction we are moving. We must sail sometimes with the wind and sometimes against it, but we must sail, and not drift, nor lie at anchor.'

"Mr. Speaker, we are underway!"

The Chair then recognized Representative Marumoto, Minority Leader, to present the Minority's response:

"Mr. Speaker, Honorable Governor Cayetano, Lieutenant Governor Hirono, Chief Justice Moon, Congresswoman Mink, distinguished mayors, distinguished guests, friends and family, and my colleagues -- Aloha Kakahia'ka. Good Morning! We are at the dawn of a new Millennium! It is an exciting time to take bold initiatives, strike out in new directions, and take some risks. Yes, we can do it! In fact, we must do it!

"Though economists tell us our economy is looking up, it is still structurally very small and very weak, overly dependent on tourism, government expenditures and outside forces. Our regulatory apparatus stifles formation of new businesses and expansion of businesses, and our antiquated civil service system requires modernization. And high taxes remain a formidable barrier to capital formation.

"Forty years ago, John F. Kennedy looked out over a nation mired in economic stagnation and proclaimed, 'We can do better.' Twenty years ago, Ronald Reagan, facing even greater economic stagnation along with high inflation, said America needed 'a government as good as its people.'

"Well, today Hawai'i needs a government as good as its people.

"The U.S. mainland is enjoying the longest period of uninterrupted prosperity in its history. But, Hawai'i is the State the boom forgot. Politically we are still frozen in a past generation and a one-party state; the aging old boy network is alive and well. But I think people are disenchanted with political power plays and tired of excuses for non-performance.

"Our people want to work. They want good jobs. However, Hawai'i's high cost of living, especially high taxes on everything, including food, rent, and medical services, is driving our friends and families into bankruptcy - or to the mainland. If we lower the cost of government, lower taxes, increase efficiency, and ease up on illogical regulation, then we make Hawai'i more attractive for investment, and will eventually see more prosperity and increased revenues to the State. New revenues will then pay for government services that are necessary.

"How do we turn things around?

"Experts tell us we need structural reform, something the mainland economy went through over a decade ago. We have no reason not to believe them. Republicans have great hope for Hawai'i if we are willing to make some necessary changes -- take some risks.

"This Caucus knows that state government can create a business-friendly climate, a simplified tax filing system, lower taxes, and increased opportunities for privatization. We can enact strong legislation to promote clean government and clean elections. We can push for safer streets and increased drug programs - in prison and out - since Hawai'i is in the grip of a crystal meth or ice epidemic that is tearing our families apart. We can construct a privately-built and privately-run prison - in Hawai'i.

"And because we believe that it is more effective to spend money on prevention than punishment, Republicans support full use of the tobacco settlement money, whatever the exact total is, -- 100 percent, not just 60 percent -- to pay for health programs that are investments in prevention. Why spend only 60 percent on important programs? Why save the remainder of the settlement money for a rainy day fund? As one senator said, 'it is raining now!' We can use the money for substance abuse and mental health programs and programs that prevent child abuse in order to give families a good start. Many studies confirm that prevention programs reduce future costs to government.

"Randolph Court, from the Democrat-supported Progressive Policy Institute, said recently that the new economy requires of us 'less stability, more risk and opportunity.' To compete in the new economy, Hawai'i must produce public school graduates who can read, write, handle math, speak English, speak one other language, and know how to take chances.

"The most important structural change Hawai'i needs is a public education system that works. The solution lies with granting decision-making authority closer to communities, educators, parents and students. Local boards of education, student-centered and charter schools are part of the solution as are small schools and 'schools within schools.'

"The current Board of Education system has few supporters. Democrats favor a centrally-controlled statewide appointed board, but voters have not once, not twice, but three times rejected that option. Hawai'i's people want to vote for their board of education. Regional, elected boards would encourage greater district involvement.

"Republicans are concerned that Hawai'i has by far the largest high schools in the country. Our high schools are 20 percent larger than high schools in #2 Florida. Teachers teach better if they know their students. Students learn better when they are valued members of an educational team. It helps, therefore, to divide large schools into smaller schools on the same campus -- so-called 'schools within schools,' or multiplex schools. Teachers, parents and students who then select a small school have a bigger stake in making the program work. And it goes without saying that we should preserve our current standalone small schools that are perennially threatened with extinction.

"We applaud the new support for charter schools. But current practice violates a basic charter school principle by allowing only one entity to grant charters. Republicans recommend that in addition to the BOE, the University of Hawai'i and even the counties be considered as chartering authorities.

"The school principal is perhaps the most important job in Hawai'i. Here is the person most able to lead Hawai'i public schools in a new, positive direction. We should consider paying Hawai'i's principals substantially more, provided they are willing to work under a limited-term contract tied to performance outcomes.

"Superintendent LeMahieu deserves credit for his emphasis on accountability. He offers the promise of a public school system that measures performance, and uses those measurements to reward and assist schools. It is an important starting point.

"I am also heartened by the news that the Department of Education and Kamehameha Schools will work cooperatively for the benefit of Hawai'i's keiki.

"We should further encourage Kamehameha Schools to follow the suggestion of former trustee Oswald Stender. He invited Kamehameha to take over the operations of public schools in areas with heavy concentrations of ethnic Hawai'ians. If Kamehameha uses existing public school facilities, they would save millions of dollars in construction costs in expanding their own system. And the Department of Education would save millions of dollars for not having to pay for students under the tutelage of Kamehameha. It is a win/win situation for all concerned.

"Finally, if we want to take our State rapidly into the knowledge era, we must ensure adequate funding and sufficient autonomy for the University of Hawai'i. A strong state university and community college system is our surest route to economic success and a ladder to success for its students.

"Hawai'i's future is a bright one, if we follow our instincts to change public education for the sake of the children. Let us take some risks to make structural reforms in our government. To continue to do things the same way is to be blind to the opportunities of a new century and a new millennium. Let us see, instead, the light of a new day in Hawai'i, and work together to let it shine for our children and our children's children.

"Thank you."

At this time, the Chair appointed Representatives Kanoho and Kawakami to escort Pastor Rob DeWolfe of the Good Samaritan Episcopal Church to the rostrum.

Pastor DeWolfe delivered the benediction.

At 9:43 o'clock a.m., the House of Representatives stood in recess, subject to the call of the Chair, to meet in Joint Session with the Senate, in accordance with House Concurrent Resolution No. 2, to receive the Governor's State of the State address.

JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the House of Representatives and the Senate of the Twentieth Legislature was called to order at 10:03 o'clock a.m. by the Honorable Calvin Say, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

The Speaker then welcomed and introduced the following distinguished guests to the members of the Twentieth Legislature:

A floral lei was presented to Governor Cayetano by Representative Kawakami and Senator Fukunaga on behalf of the House of Representatives and the Senate.

The Speaker then presented to the members of the Twentieth Legislature and guests, the Honorable Benjamin J. Cayetano, stating:

"Members of the Twentieth Legislature, ladies and gentlemen, please join me in extending our warmest aloha and welcome to the Governor of the State of Hawai'i, the Honorable Benjamin J. Cayetano."

The Governor addressed the Joint Session as follows:

"Thank you very much.

"I was glad to see that measure of cooperation. I've never kissed a Representative and a Senator at the same time.

"Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, distinguished members of the House and Senate, Lieutenant Governor Hirono, Congresswoman Mink, Chief Justice Moon, Mayors Apana, Harris, Kusaka and Yamashiro, members of the County Councils and City Council, members of the Consular Corp, distinguished guests and friends.

"First I want to tell you that for the first time ever, the viewers on the World Wide Web are watching this address at their desktops in Hawai'i and throughout the world and for this we have to thank, the University of Hawai'i, PixelWorld, Oceanic Cable, the Department of Information and Computer Science, and the High Technology Development Corporation. To all of our on-line viewers, aloha and thank you for logging on

"Now before I begin, I want to introduce three outstanding individuals, who I believe symbolize everything that is right with public service in Hawai'i. First is someone who is part of our cabinet, he served our country and state in peace and war with great distinction. He served under three governors and as State Adjutant General. He built the Hawai'i National Air and Army Guard into one of the best in the Nation. We are going to miss him, but he's earned a well deserved retirement. May I present ladies and gentlemen Maj. Gen. Edward Richardson.

"Faye Nakamoto. Faye heads the Department of Health's WIC program. WIC stands for Women, Infants and Children. When Faye was faced with a 30 percent budget cut, Faye rolled up her sleeves, restructured her unit, implemented the most sophisticated computer check system in the nation, and continued to provide quality service to the 35,000 needy women, infants and children in the WIC program while saving money. Last year Faye was selected as one of only three state employees in the entire country for the National Governors' Association prestigious Distinguished Service Award. Ladies and gentlemen, please give a hand to Faye Nakamoto.

"When our First Lady Vicky first heard that the University of Hawai'i was considering hiring a person named June Jones to coach the University of Hawai'i Rainbow Warriors football team, for a moment, being the kind of women's advocate she is, she thought Hawai'i had made history by hiring the first woman football coach. Well June, she wasn't disappointed, believe me. June Jones is a special person. He loves Hawai'i. He understands what makes Hawai'i special. I wanted to acknowledge June today because his leadership and vision go far beyond the football team. What he has accomplished in just one year is the beginning of a new era for the University of Hawai'i's athletic program. June please stand to be recognized.

"This morning it is my privilege to make my sixth address to you on the State of the State.

"I am struck by the historical significance of this moment. As Governor, and as members of the Legislature, you and I have been given the honor of being the first to lead our State into the dawn of the New Millennium. For this, I thank the people of the Hawai'i for giving me the privilege of serving them for the past 26 years.

"I want to thank my wife Vicky, our children, my son Brandon who is here, our family and all of our supporters who helped make this day possible.

"When I took office in December of 1994, Hawai'i's economy was stagnant -- absolutely zero growth since 1991 -- with severe dislocations in tourism, construction and real estate. Japanese investment in particular had dried up, pure and simple.

"State government faced its worst fiscal crisis ever with a projected shortfall of more than \$600 million -- approximately 20 percent of the State's \$3.1 billion general fund budget.

"We needed to make tough decisions. And we did. We cut spending and we implemented policies to make state government more efficient and productive. We protected lower education from budget cuts, but at the expense of other departments.

"To boost tourism, we built a world-class convention center, created the Hawai'i Tourism Authority and gave the Authority \$60 million to market Hawai'i.

"We gave one of the biggest tax cuts in the country -- \$2 billion over six years. And we reformed workers compensation, cutting premiums by as much as 30 to 50 percent.

"We developed new, aggressive strategies to diversify Hawai'i's economy with a focus on industries such as biotech, high tech, healthcare, and multimedia.

"Well, I am happy to report our efforts seem to have borne some fruit.

"Recent economic indicators reveal: That personal income is up by more than 2 percent since 1997; The unemployment rate is down nearly a full percentage point compared to a year ago; Visitor arrivals are up 2 percent this year; Real estate sales have been up since 1997, and in 1999 are growing at double-digit rates; Automobile sales are at record levels; Construction, our hardest hit industry, is also recovering. The value of private building permits is up 30 percent indicating a resurgence of private construction.

"And last month, the Council on Revenues surprised all of us by increasing its revenue forecast by an average of a full percent each year for the next five years. Compared to the Council's September projections, this adds nearly one-half billion dollars by 2005.

"A year ago, few of our economic experts even acknowledged a hint of recovery. Today, all of them agree that Hawai'i's economy is in recovery. Some, like Bank of Hawai'i's Paul Brewbaker, have told you that they believe

Hawai'i's economy is past recovery and is now in the expansion stage. What a difference a year makes!

"We are on the right track. But now is not the time to rest. We still have much more to do. The work of government never ends. And as the leaders of this New Century, we have a tremendous opportunity to build a New Economy for our children's future.

"So let me share with you, this morning, my priorities over the next few years.

"Education has been, and will continue to be, my highest priority. Over the past five years, we've increased -- I repeat, increased -- education's budget. We've built a record thirteen new schools, added more than 900 classrooms, gyms, cafeterias, and libraries. We've extended the school year by seven days. And we've increased teachers' pay.

"This year, our supplemental budget gives the Department of Education nearly 400 new positions and \$21.7 million in additional general funding. This includes \$2.7 million for the DOE's Hawai'i Content and Performance Standards, and \$4.4 million for additional regular education teachers, who teach special education in their classrooms.

"In addition, I am proposing to you a three-year, \$210 million repair and maintenance program for our schools, university and public buildings.

"Last year, the National Education Association ranked Hawai'i 21st in the nation for per student spending. This year we're spending \$6,229 per student. Next year we'll be spending \$6,865 per student.

"It is important for all of us to realize that 38.4 percent of our general fund budget is going in to lower education and 12.7 percent of the general fund is going into higher education. This represents 51 percent of our general fund.

"All of us would like to provide more funding to our schools. But the funding debate should not detract from the real issue. No matter how much we fund education, little will change unless we hold people accountable for their performances.

"In my 26 years in elected office, I've seen many educational reforms developed with high hopes -- Three on Two, the Hawai'i English Program, School Community Based Management, Rollover Savings -- just to name a few.

"In spite of our well-intended efforts, we have yet to show really satisfying results. To be frank, we all know our taxpayers are not satisfied with our public schools; and too many of our educators are demoralized by the state of affairs in public education.

"We need to ask ourselves why. Accountability. Or rather, the lack of accountability, I believe, is the answer. Study after study shows that every state which has made significant improvements in student performance, has a strong accountability system. And we simply don't have one here in Hawai'i.

"Fortunately, we have a Superintendent of Education who understand this only too well and is willing to do something about it. And I agree with him in concluding that a system of accountability is what Hawai'i's public schools need most of all.

"Therefore, I propose the following:

"First, that we support Dr. LeMahieu's proposal to implement a system of accountability and give him the authority necessary to make it happen. Dr. LeMahieu, please stand.

"Second, that we implement teacher competency testing by the start of the 2001 school year. Teachers who are not knowledgeable about their subjects are of no help to their students. It's unfair to the teacher, and it's unfair to our children.

"Establishing competency testing should not be difficult. After all, Hawai'i and Washington are the only two states in the nation that do not have it. And so there are 48 models from which we can choose. We do not have to reinvent the wheel to do this. I ask for your support.

"Everyone agrees there should be some system of accountability when you ask them. But some say accountability is a subject of negotiation in collective bargaining. On this issue, I respectfully disagree. Setting performance and accountability standards which have to do with the education of our children, cannot -- must not -- and should never be negotiated.

"In his book, Work of Nations, former U.S. Secretary of Labor Robert Reich, said that the nations, states, cities which will prosper in the new century are those which have a highly skilled and educated workforce. This holds true for individuals as well. This is why I have given education the highest priority.

"Today, I'm very happy to announce our plans for bringing Hawai'i's educational institutions -- and the people they serve -- into step with the competitive challenges of the new century. These plans call for a number of investments in new programs at the Department of Education and the University of Hawai'i.

"Our children, Hawai'i's future leaders, must have the best K-12 education in reading, writing, science, math, and technology. Therefore, I propose investing \$1 million in the Hawai'i Networked Learning Communities Program, an innovative e-school approach using the latest technologies for students and teachers. This is a joint effort of the DOE, the University of Hawai'i, and the private sector, that is attracting the attention of the National Science Foundation. I ask you to support this.

"There are some exciting things happening at the University of Hawai'i besides the football team. The University has recruited a couple of academic leaders of bold vision who are nationally renowned in their particular fields and they happen to be experts in two fields in which I believe we have high priority: Healthcare and Technology.

"A first rate medical school is fundamental to our desire to make Hawai'i the Premier Healthcare Center of the Pacific. A first rate medical school sets the standards which others -physicians and scientists -- aspire to.

"Dr. Edwin Cadman, the new dean of the medical school proposes to establish the Asia Pacific Center of Medical Biosciences. According to Dr. Cadman, this center will transform the University's medical program 'into absolutely one of the tops' in biomedical research.

"Dr. Cadman, formerly from Yale, brings with him a distinguished national reputation. Moreover, for those of us who have met him, he is the ultimate and the most extreme optimist. With community support, he believes we can develop a medical school and a bioscience program that in five to ten years will become one of the best in the nation. And he believes that this school will be an economic boon for our State.

"Therefore, I propose to give \$1 million to the medical school to help Dr. Cadman build his center. And I ask that you support me in supporting Dr. Cadman and the University School of Medicine.

"Dr. Cadman is here today. Those of us who have had the opportunity to know him, know that he really loves Hawai'i. He's an outdoor person and besides being really smart in what

he's an expert in, he's a great guy. Dr. Cadman, please stand up and be recognized.

"All of you know who Guy Kawasaki is, local grown Iolani graduate and one of the pioneers at Apple Computer. He's also now a nationally known hi-tech consultant, business person and some say evangelist. Guy once told me that if Hawai'i wanted to develop a high tech industry, it must have a world-class engineering school.

"We are fortunate to have Dr. Wai Fah Chen, the new dean of the College of Engineering. Dr. Chen hails from Purdue University and is nationally renowned in the field of engineering.

"Dr. Chen tells me that the University of Hawai'i already has a fine College of Engineering. He leads what he calls an allstar faculty. Almost 25 percent of the UH school's professors have earned the National Science Foundation's Presidential Young Investigator award. This award only goes to the nation's best and brightest young faculty. Dr. Chen says that our ratio is better than many of the best engineering schools in the country, and to me that demonstrates the quality that we have already at our engineering school.

"Dr. Chen believes that the College of Engineering can become even better, in time, one of the best in the world. As a start, he proposes to build the Hawai'i Wireless Communication Center. I am inspired by his enthusiasm and vision. Therefore, I propose that we give an additional \$1 million to him to build his center. This first-of-its-kind facility will enable the school to integrate cutting edge research and development with teaching. Ladies and gentlemen, I'm pleased to introduce Dr. Wai Fah Chen.

"In 1998 the internet economy generated over \$300 billion in revenue and 1.2 million jobs. By comparison, it took the automobile industry 100 years to reach such heights. For this reason, Hawai'i and its workforce must be competitive in global e-commerce.

"Under the direction of Dr. David McClain, the new dean of the University of Hawai'i's College of Business Administration, the College is developing the Asia Pacific Center for E-Commerce and Entrepreneurship. I am excited by this project and I propose to give \$1 million to this program as well. This will give students the skills they need to take advantage of business opportunities in the explosive Internet industry. Dr. McClain could not be here today, but I ask your support for this program as well.

"Hawai'i's community colleges are also preparing our workforce for the challenges of the future. Their new Pacific Center for Advanced Technology Training will provide the rapid re-training needed for workers to compete for better, higher paying technology jobs. I propose \$1 million for this program as well.

"Each of these initiatives contribute to our vision. Hawai'i's education system will become a network of complementary institutions producing a skilled workforce to compete in the new economy.

"We want to build a more flexible, more responsive education system in Hawai'i, one that will work in close cooperation with both public and private sectors.

"Now you may be wondering, how do we intend to pay for these projects? I was wondering that myself when I thought it up.

"As a start, I propose to use funds from the \$27 million the state realized from its Digital Island investment. The success of Digital Island was a grand-slam home run for the State. Digital Island was started at the State's Manoa Innovation Center by a

fourth-generation 'local boy' named Ron Higgins. Today, that company is a global corporation valued at more than \$3 billion.

"To encourage more Digital Islands, we must attract more venture capital to Hawai'i. And we can't expect to do this without first investing in Hawai'i ourselves.

"Hawai'i has many assets attractive to technology companies: the high quality of life, a fine college of engineering, and a world-class communications infrastructure. But, we don't have venture capital.

"The availability of venture capital to finance start-up companies is vital to building our technology industry. We need more venture capital.

"Therefore, I propose establishing a new \$50 million state venture capital fund called the Hawai'i Technology Fund. This fund will be comprised of proceeds from the State's Digital Island holdings, together with an investment from the Employees' Retirement System.

"I believe these funds can be leveraged with Small Business Administration Programs up to \$90 million. And we will encourage our labor unions and private and charitable trusts to invest into the fund.

"I ask that you support our legislation to establish this Fund.

"Hawai'i's landmark Technology Omnibus Bill, Act 178, was passed last year and it creates a great framework to move Hawai'i's technology industry into the new century. Private industry, including national corporations, have given this new law high marks. Compared to other states, it is one of the most progressive in the nation.

"At this time, I'd like to thank you, members of the Legislature for passing this bill, and I would also like to acknowledge its key authors, Representative David Morihara and Senator David Ige, who went with me to Silicon Valley and talked to all those CEOs, for their vision and their fine work in authoring this bill.

"Act 178 also calls for the consolidation of the state's technology agencies. I propose a plan which takes the best of these agencies and consolidates them into a single new entity. This entity will work in close partnership with the private sector.

"The Act also calls for integrating technology into government. I am pleased today to announce that we have developed a state web portal called Access Hawai'i. Access Hawai' is a great public and private partnership. Beginning next month, state on-line services will be delivered to the public at no cost to the state.

"In six months, every state department will offer services online. My long-range goal is to work closely with the mayors of each county so that in two years, state and county information technology services are completely integrated. This will result in a more efficient state and county government.

"Recently in the news, AdTech -- one of the best in its field in the world, located right here in Hawai'i -- was having trouble finding 30 to 40 engineers to work in its business here in Hawai'i. AdTech's experience reveals there is a shortage of technology workers in the state.

"To address this problem, we have launched a plan to bring our brightest technology minds back to Hawai'i. We have established an online expatriate recruitment website. Look it up, it can be found on the web. This is part of our strategy to bring all of the best and brightest back home.

"A few weeks ago, a business executive -- according to the newspaper -- said the technology industry in Hawai'i is but a

dream -- like Alice in Wonderland. I disagree. Hawai'i definitely has a future in technology industries -- and like Donna Tanoue said in her TV ad, no ifs, ands, or buts about it. We have a future in technology.

"Although economic revitalization remains our primary focus, we have also been concentrating on addressing the other needs of our people.

"For example, working with you, Hawai'i's homeless program has been held up as one of the best in the country. Since 1992, the number of homeless in the state has declined by nearly 40 percent. Moreover, we've partnered with the private sector to develop more affordable housing than at any other time.

"And for our Native Hawai'ian community, I'm proud to say, our Department of Hawai'ian Homelands has designed, built and developed more homesteads during this administration than at any time in the history of the Program and we're going to build even more.

"For the fifth straight year, the federal government has ranked Hawai'i among the top three for accuracy in managing the Food Stamp program. And we got a bonus -- \$1.7 million for the excellent work by our people in the Department of Human Services. And we've moved more people from the welfare rolls to the workplace on a per capita basis than any other western state and we've done it in this down economy.

"Our work in this area, however, is not over. As a result of the reforms made to the federal welfare laws -- December 1, 2001 will be a date to remember. On that day, 3,000 of our Hawai'i families will be moved off the welfare rolls, whether they like it or not. Thereafter, every month, 90 to 100 families will lose their benefits.

"Many of these people work. Yet, because they are earning such low wages, the minimum wage -- they are below the poverty level and qualify for welfare. We must help them make the transition.

"Therefore, I propose an increase in the state minimum wage. Our bill will follow the lead of Alaska, and tie our state wage to the federal minimum wage.

"My friends, this is not a partisan issue. A few years ago the federal minimum wage was increased by a Republican Congress with the support of a Democratic President. And Congress today is currently looking to increase it again. And so should we -- because it's the right thing to do.

"Nothing is more important than the care of our children, and we are taking better care of them.

"Working with the private sector, we've achieved great success in finding loving homes for many of our children. Our state posted the highest adoption increase in the nation and we received a half-million dollar federal bonus for doing it.

"Though we have one of the highest rates of health-insured children in the country, we've set a goal to enroll 100 percent of all eligible children in our program. Through a performance partnership entitled 'Boost for Kids', we intend to reach this goal.

"On July 1st, we'll take another step toward children's universal health insurance coverage in Hawai'i. The new program, known as 'CHIP' (Children's Health Insurance Program), will expand coverage to another 4,000 children and thereby close the gap.

"One area where we fall short, however, is dental care. Hawai'i's children have one of the worst rates of tooth decay in the country. We can, and we must do better. We need to fluoridate our water. For every \$1 we spend fluoridating, we'll save \$80 in dental expenses down the road.

"Last year, we approved legislation that will help Hawai'i boost its role as the number one Health State in the Country.

"With 60 percent of the tobacco settlement earmarked for health promotion, we rank among the top in the nation in our use of settlement monies for health-related purposes.

"We will establish a 'Healthy Hawai'i Initiative.' This program will include everything from replacing candy bars in school vending machines with healthier snacks -- to innovative programs to tackle problems such as tobacco use.

"Substance abuse is one of our greatest social problems. It is an issue that affects both pubic health and public safety. We need to step up our efforts at rehabilitation and prevention. Therefore, I will submit proposals to expand drug treatment programs for those on probation and parole.

"To fund these initiatives, I ask that you increase the tax on alcohol and tobacco. Doing so will help us raise \$4 million in revenues to expand the Judiciary's Drug Court and drug rehabilitation programs in our prisons.

"For several years we've been weighing our options on the site of a new prison. Two years ago you gave me the authority to locate a site, but you didn't give me any money to build one.

"While there may be a resurgence of community support for a prison in Hawai'i -- there's no getting around the fact that building and operating a State prison in Hawai'i is too expensive. That's why we've been exploring the possibility of building a prison on the mainland.

"Let me be very candid. If you want a prison in Hawai'i, then give me the authority to not only select a site, but to fully privatize the operation and maintenance of the prison.

"Time does not permit me to do proper justice to our plans on a number of other issues vital to our future: agriculture, culture and the arts, transportation, the environment, mental health, the revitalization of Waikiki, small business problems, and the Lt. Governor's SWAT program figure prominently among this administrations priorities.

"But there is one subject that demands our immediate attention -- and that is the modernization and the reform of our state government.

"As we enter the new century, Hawai'i has its best opportunity ever to create significant, meaningful change in the way government operates.

"I am energized by the possibilities that lay before us, and I invite each of you to join us in creating a government that is more responsive to our people's needs -- and one we can afford.

"Our civil service system is outdated. If we are to successfully compete in the new century, we cannot continue to operate with a structure geared to the Industrial Age.

"An inefficient civil service system takes a tremendous toll on business, residents and the taxpayers of our state. And it robs our state employees of the dignity that comes with being part of an organization respected for its productivity and work culture.

"We have made great progress in bringing about a major shift of resources.

"We reduced the number of full-time state employees significantly. Compared with when I took office five years ago, the number of positions has declined by five percent from roughly 45,604 to 43,248. And we accomplished this even

while adding 900 positions to the Department of Education, and meeting increasing court imposed obligations in the area of prisons, health, and diagnostic services.

"It is not so much the size of the state government, however, that concerns most taxpayers. I don't think there is any question in most people's minds that government will one day grow again -- as school enrollment grows and the state's population increases. Rather, I believe that our people want a government that does its job well, is responsive to community needs, and is easy to interact with. We have been working hard to create that kind of government.

"For example, the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affair's incentive plan, the first of its kind in the State, which awards modest bonuses to employees for superior performances has paid big dividends in terms of boosting employee morale and performance. By the end of this year, DCCA will be 100 percent self-sufficient.

"Without addressing systemic problems -- it's difficult to bring about significant and lasting change. Therefore, we have developed an omnibus reform bill which we will submit for your approval.

"I know there is a natural tendency to resist change. But let me say at the outset that we will not propose anything that compromises the benefits promised to current state employees.

"Fairness and merit are at the core of our reform proposals.

"Let me share with you some of our proposals.

"First, we propose to decentralize the collective bargaining system. Our counties operate in different market conditions, and the people they serve sometimes have different needs.

"We believe each county should be able to make their own decisions and bargain independently.

"We propose also a more timely and flexible recruitment and job classification system. There are more than 1,700 job classifications today, and it takes far too long to hire new employees or process changes.

"With the exception of police and firefighters, we propose to restore the right of our public workers to strike and to eliminate the designation of essential workers.

"Experience has shown that the mandatory binding arbitration law passed four years ago is seriously flawed. It is too vague, too broad, and it gives arbitrators too much discretion to make decisions which sometimes have no relationship to the state's true fiscal condition.

"At the very least, we must reform the process by redefining the existing criteria an arbitrator must consider. Collective bargaining works best when it is balanced.

"We cannot continue to condone a process that gives arbitrators the power to award pay raises, and compels the state to increase taxes or cut programs to pay for them. This is why we need to reform or repeal the mandatory arbitration law.

"Beyond civil service, there are great inefficiencies and costs throughout the system which we simply cannot afford.

"Take the State Employees' Health Fund. In 1998, the State paid \$44 million for Employee Health Fund premiums. This year the cost will escalate to \$240 million. Under the current system, a child born this year would see the health fund costs soar to more than \$1 billion by his or her 13th birthday. We cannot afford this, nor should we allow it happen.

"To make the system more efficient, we propose the following:

"We propose to replace the Employee Health Fund with a Union-Employer Trust Fund. We believe this approach benefits both sides. The State will make a defined contribution and the unions will negotiate collectively with insurers for better rates. I believe that our talks with our labor leaders indicate that this is a very promising proposal.

"For prospective state employees, we propose a new schedule of benefits which will help provide good healthcare at reasonable costs. And for these employees, we will also propose a new schedule of vacation and sick leave benefits which, unlike the current system, will be phased in over a scheduled period.

"We propose measures that will implement the concept of 'managed competition' making it easier for the state to privatize and give the affected employees alternatives to being laid off.

"These are just some of the 21 reform proposals we will submit for your consideration.

"The fundamental challenge before us, however, is to change the existing government culture. Too often, the needs of the community become secondary to an almost mindless deference to 'the system.'

"The taxpayers deserve better. Our state employees who perform deserve more.

"We must create a workplace that inspires workers to take ownership. A workplace where employees know their purpose, and perform their duties with passion and accountability.

"It is important that we do not pursue the illusion of security by avoiding change. In today's fast changing world, the status quo offers the least security of all. It is, indeed, a prescription for failure.

"As Franklin D. Roosevelt once said, 'Wise and prudent men...have long known that in a changing world, worthy institutions can be conserved only by adjusting them to the changing time.'

"Last year was unlike any other. Our reaction to two events that brought the century to a close revealed the true nature of our community.

"We were inspired and united in pride when June Jones and our Rainbow Warrior football team achieved one of the greatest sports comebacks in history. And we came together as one when the worse workplace tragedy in our history stunned our community, and devastated the lives of seven families.

"And through it all, our spirit of aloha, our humility and character as a community, shined bright. That is the difference. That is what sets Hawai'i apart from the rest of the world. Now, and from this moment forward, let us never forget it.

"Let me close with these thoughts. This is an election year. There will be all kinds of interest groups who will lobby us, me and you, hoping to influence our decisions. There is absolutely nothing wrong with this. It is the American Way. It is democracy, and this is America.

"What I believe has sustained me in these circumstances in my 26 years of public service, what has helped me make decisions which I believe to be in the public's best interest is this thought:

"There is no greater calling than public service. I believe this with all my heart.

"To be given the privilege of leading this State into the next century, to be the first generation of elected leaders of this century whose decisions will set the direction for our State's future is something few people will experience, something which can't be bought.

"There are 76 of you, one lieutenant governor and one governor. What a great privilege, what a great honor it is to represent the future of 1.2 million people. What a great duty we have been given.

"These thoughts have sustained me in difficult times and they have inspired me during my proudest moments.

"We owe it to our people not to coast. We owe them the courage and wisdom to make sound decisions. We owe them a better and greater Hawai'i. We owe them hope.

"And working together, we can make it happen.

Thank you."

Senate President Mizuguchi then rose and stated:

"Governor Cayetano, thank you for sharing your first State-of-the-State Address of the 21st century with members of the House and Senate and with the people of the State of Hawai'i.

"This is certainly a special time in Hawai'i's history as we begin a new century and a new millennium. There seems to be an infusion of hope for the future here in our island community.

"Hope, optimism, and the ability to work together are essential ingredients to bring about change for the good of all.

"As I have mentioned in the past, the co-equality of the Executive and Legislative branches of government -- as well as the Judiciary -- is a principle to be respected and honored if our system is to endure. We can build a stronger economy, improve our educational system, and make government more efficient and accountable with greater cooperation and mutual respect.

"We need to do this for the sake of Hawai'i's people and for their continued advancement.

"Governor, mahalo again for sharing your vision and presenting your challenges in your State-of-the-State Address.

"If there is no further business by members of the House and members of the Senate, I now declare this Joint Session adjourned."

At 10:59 o'clock a.m., the President declared the Joint Session adjourned.

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Twentieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2000, was called to order at 10:01 o'clock a.m. by the Honorable Norman Mizuguchi, President of the Senate.

services on my behalf and extend their apologies to you for their absence here this morning. On behalf of the entire Judiciary, I extend heart felt sympathies to Justice Levinson and his family during this most difficult time.

"Governor Cayetano, Lieutenant Governor Hirono and Mr. Oshima, Speaker Say, President Mizuguchi, Speaker Emeritus Souki, other distinguished members of the Twentieth Legislature, Mayor Harris, Chief Justice Richardson, Dean Foster of the Richardson School of Law, the Hawai'i State Bar Association President Joel August, members of the federal and state Judiciaries, special guests, family and friends:

"It is my privilege to be here today to deliver my fourth State of the Judiciary Address. And the first of the new century or the last of the old, depending on how one counts. As many of you know, I have two advisors who serve for free, my mother and my wife. Both have again conveyed to me jewels of wisdom about my speech today advising me on the virtues of brevity. My mom said, 'Ron just remember, a speech doesn't have to be eternal to be immortal.' My wife said, 'Remember that although the Constitution guarantees free speech, it doesn't guarantee listeners.' And so accepting their usual sage advice, I will be relatively brief. But before doing so let me introduce the immediate members of my family. My mother the 'godmother' of the Moon clan; my stepfather Mr. Joel Han; daughter Julie; son Scott and his wife Jill, who are from Mississippi; and brother Eric.

"As I stand before you in the Year 2000, I am pleased to report that the state of Hawai'i's Judiciary remains sound. However, I am concerned about public perception of certain aspects of the justice system. Last year, Hawai'i participated in a first-of-its-kind national summit in Washington, D.C. Five hundred delegates from the judiciaries of 46 states, Guam, and Puerto Rico, as well as members of the federal courts, the bar, the media, and citizen groups from across the country met to develop a national plan to address areas of public concern. The overwhelming representation at the summit was indeed an acknowledgment that the public's regard for the state and federal judiciaries is just as important, or more important, than the judiciaries view of themselves.

"Delegates reviewed results of nationwide surveys that measured public views of the state and federal judiciaries. In my view, some of the survey results are encouraging. For example: 80 percent of those surveyed agree that 'judges are generally honest and fair in deciding cases'; 74 percent 'strongly' or 'somewhat' agree that court personnel are helpful and courteous; and 75 percent had a 'great deal' of or 'some' trust and confidence in the courts in their communities. However, results also indicated, that: 70 percent of African-Americans believe they are treated 'somewhat worse' or 'far worse' than other groups; and 68 percent of the public believe that it is not affordable to bring a case to court. What was most alarming to me was the fact that only 39 percent of those polled could identify all three branches of government and that 25 percent of them could not even name one branch.

"By the conclusion of the summit, delegates had identified a number of issues that impact the public's perception of the justice system. The top three concerns were: first, the perception of unequal treatment within the justice system; second, the high cost of the justice system; and third, the lack of public understanding about the justice system.

"Having participated in the summit, I believe the perception of unequal treatment in the justice system is less of a problem in Hawai'i than in any other state. In fact, this year, the National Consortium of Task Forces on Racial and Ethnic Bias in the Courts recognized the make-up of the Hawai'i State Supreme Court as 'a prime example' of the 'principle of inclusiveness in the justice system.' While most states are struggling to achieve a Judiciary that is representative of its population, Hawai'i's bench is a reflection of our diversified society, and our community is truly enriched by it.

"Nevertheless, Hawai'i is not immune from the perception of unequal treatment in the courts. We, therefore, continue to take affirmative steps to enhance equal treatment to all who enter our courthouses through the development of numerous programs to improve the quality of justice for everyone. The Judiciary's innovative programs that focus on helping our significant immigrant population better access and understand the justice system include: a multilingual LawLine; informational videos on small claims and traffic violations that are captioned for the deaf and hard-of-hearing and dubbed in Ilocano and Korean. And just to negate any accusation of discrimination, ladies and gentlemen, the Governor and I had nothing to do with the selection of these languages. We also have a directory of bilingual and multilingual attorneys and paralegals and an immigrant outreach directory. As a result of its work on these projects, the Hawai'i Supreme Court Committee on Equality and Access to the Courts was selected this year as one of ten nationwide recipients of the Foundation for Improvement of Justice's award for innovative programs.

"To enhance equal treatment to immigrants and nonimmigrants alike, the Judiciary is making information about cases readily and freely accessible via our web site. Last Friday, we unveiled a searchable Internet site that contains certain information on all public criminal, civil, and family court cases filed in our circuit courts statewide. Now, visitors to the Judiciary's web site can find case information on-line on any day, at any time.

"Last legislative session, you helped address the perception of unequal treatment in the justice system when you appropriated capital improvement funds for a court navigation project that we refer to as 'Ho'okele,' which means 'to guide.' With a 'guide' or concierge at the courthouse entrance and a Customer Service Center in courts that have a large number of self-represented litigants, Ho'okele will provide enhanced services to court users. Implementation of this innovative project will also be aided by over \$250,000 in federal funds.

"The second issue of concern that emerged from the summit was the cost of using the justice system. Related concerns were that the justice system is too slow and too adversarial. We recognize that the adversarial system has worked well for hundreds of years and forms the heart of the right to trial. In our system of justice, there are -- and will always be -- certain cases that require the structure and discipline of the traditional adversarial system, but others may not. We, therefore, continue to encourage and pursue faster and less costly methods of dispute resolution that will meet the specific needs of those who come to our courts.

"For example, the Judiciary has assisted the Hawai'i Civil Rights Commission in the development and implementation of a mediation alternative for contested cases. The results over the past year have been encouraging as a significant number of civil rights cases -- 67 percent -- have been amicably resolved without the need of a formal hearing.

"Three weeks from today, the Civil Divisions of the First Circuit Court will convert to an individual trial calendar system, where one judge will handle a case from initiation through resolution. Under this new system, judges will have increased responsibility for managing an assigned caseload. They will be able to more easily employ proactive case management procedures, including the use of alternative dispute resolution mechanisms, such as arbitration and mediation. In fact, judges in each civil trial court now have the explicit power to compel parties in appropriate cases to go to non-binding arbitration.

"At the foundation of our efforts to reduce costs and delays is technology. This past year, the Judiciary finalized and published a technological vision that represents a strategic outlook through the Year 2010. At the core of our strategic technological vision is the development of an integrated case management system. Under this system, cases could be filed

electronically, court calendars and more detailed case information would be published on the Internet, and case information would be electronically shared between all courts, thus negating the need to re-enter data. The process will not only be more convenient for the public and the courts, but will enhance speed and data quality. Although we recognize that technology is merely a means to an end, it is a critical component in our efforts to reduce costs and delays. Consequently, approximately one-half of the Judiciary's supplemental budget requests are technology-related, and we ask for your support in this very critical area.

"Associated with the issues of cost and delay is the public's growing belief that the judicial system must offer specialized forums tailored to address society's changing needs and to accommodate a broader spectrum of rehabilitative services. Our adaptability to changing social needs can be seen in the area of foster care. Unfortunately, we are seeing more and more cases where parental rights require termination due to abuse and neglect, resulting in more children being placed in foster custody. To address this growing concern, the First Circuit Family Court worked with representatives from the Department of Human Services, the Casey Family Program, Child and Family Services, foster parents, and others to form a new program called 'The Adoption Connection,' which has as its Honorary Chair, Mrs. Vicky Cayetano. The primary goal of the Adoption Connection is to secure permanent, safe, and loving homes for Hawai'i's foster children. We are proud to be involved in this collaborative community effort.

"The drug abuse problem and our efforts to assist in addressing this significant area can be seen in the work of the drug court program. Since its inception in 1996, Hawai'i's Drug Court Program has successfully treated non-violent offenders addicted to drugs. Drug courts divert non-violent offenders from incarceration in order to enhance their recovery, prevent their relapse, and significantly reduce recidivism. Not only does the program help restore these individuals to full, productive lives, but it saves the State the considerable expense associated with incarceration and the potentially recurring costs of subsequent incarceration. Last year, our's was the first drug court in the nation to develop a program to treat offenders who have both mental-health and drug-addiction problems. Grants from the United States Department of Justice and the state Department of the Attorney General were instrumental in launching this new program.

"The Judiciary is grateful for your decision last session to make the Oahu Drug Court a permanent program. We have now turned our attention to the neighbor islands, where a Drug Court should be serving the tri-island County of Maui by June 2000. The target population for our first year on Maui are 120 non-violent substance-abusing offenders. Federal grants and private donations will initially help to fund the Maui Drug Court, and we hope you will see fit to allocate state funds this session to this most worthy effort.

"In 1999, Oahu's District Court became the first in the nation to participate as a judicial partner in a federal program known as 'Weed and Seed.' Hawai'i's Weed and Seed Program, which has received national recognition, currently focuses on the Chinatown/Kalihi-Palama neighborhood. It is an innovative community enhancement program sponsored by the Department of Justice and is actively promoted by the United States Attorney's Office in Hawai'i. Under the program, representatives from the Hawai'i Drug Court, social service organizations, and federal, state, and city law enforcement agencies work closely with individuals and businesses within the designated area to 'weed out' certain offenders for special community-centered treatment. Unlike the traditional court model that emphasizes process and precedents, the Weed and Seed Program focuses on problem-solving and 'restorative' outcomes for the community as a whole. Later this year, the program will focus on a second designated 'weed and seed'

"The third issue, that is, the lack of public understanding of the justice system, is my most important area of concern. And, I am the first to acknowledge that the Judiciary has a responsibility to help educate the public about the third branch of government. In our efforts to meet that responsibility this past year, our judges have served as panelists or guest speakers at conferences and seminars, spoken at schools and community gatherings, and hosted schools or other groups in their courtrooms. We also continue to take every opportunity to inform our citizens of certain guiding principles. For example: that judges may not consider popular opinion in reaching decisions; that the accused has the right to legal counsel no matter how heinous the charge; that judges are bound by case precedent and evidentiary rules; and that the Judiciary is a separate branch of government and its separateness and independence are vital to the protection of liberty.

"In response to some of the Judiciary's general education efforts, hundreds of people this year attended the first ever 'Meet Your Judges' forums simultaneously held on Oahu, Maui, Kaua'i, and in Hilo and Kona on the Big Island. During the forums, judges representing every level of our courts answered questions and discussed a range of court-related topics. The forums provided a unique opportunity for judges to hear directly from members of the general public, and for the public to learn about their court system directly from the judges.

"The Legislators' 'Day-in-Court' Program represents our efforts to provide you with a first-hand look at court operations. I was pleased to learn that, over the past few months, more legislators have participated in this program than in any previous year.

"Our on-going efforts to educate jurors can be seen in our recently completed pilot project that employed certain jury innovations. We are currently evaluating the results of that project and will, if appropriate, alter or modify our jury trial procedures.

"However, our continuing educational efforts alone will not significantly increase the public's understanding of the justice system. I submit that, in order to remedy this situation, the quality and quantity of civic education in both our public and private schools must be improved. According to the National Assessment of Educational Progress, considered the most authoritative source regarding the status of nationwide elementary and secondary education, three million high school seniors will be eligible to vote in the first presidential election of the 21st century. However, only one in four of them has more than a basic understanding of how the American system of democratic government works, let alone the Judiciary's role in it.

"Indeed, basic knowledge about how government works is essential for a citizenry to govern itself, and I believe we -- as a society -- have a responsibility to provide our young people with the necessary tools so that our democratic form of government can continue to flourish. This includes providing an understanding of the proper role of the Judiciary as well as the Executive and Legislative Branches. I have spoken with Superintendent LeMahieu -- and plan to call upon the private schools -- regarding this concern. I would like to thank Doctor LeMahieu for his openness, but more importantly, for his responsiveness, as he has indicated that he intends to immediately assess the present curriculum relating to the teaching of civics and government. He has also indicated his interest in reviewing the Summit's national plan to determine the possibility of forming a partnership between the Department of Education, the Judiciary, and the Bar to address this critical

"I have talked today about national concerns with the justice system because they have application here in Hawai'i as well. But as we embark on a new century, we must acknowledge that Hawai'i has unique challenges. We are grateful to you for the monies appropriated last session for a new Kauai courthouse; however, some of our other state court buildings are bursting at the seams. Nowhere is this more apparent than on the Big Island in Hilo. Security there is jeopardized, efficiency is compromised, and employee-morale is significantly affected by the cramped conditions. This session, we respectfully seek your support in appropriating monies to acquire the land for a new Hilo Judiciary complex.

"As you well know, serving the public with the limited resources available is always a challenge. The Judiciary's budget represents less than three percent of the State's budget, but we have almost 1,700 employees. Consequently, we are looking at how best to organize for the future. In that regard, we have initiated our own restructuring effort, called Achieving Court Excellence, or ACE. An important part of the ACE effort addresses the cultural and work environment of the Judiciary. We, therefore, stand ready to work with the Executive and Legislative Branches, as well as the employee representatives, to find creative solutions to better serve the public while balancing both the interests of the employees and of the public.

"We also face the ever-present need to attract and retain qualified judges. This session alone, the Senate will be asked to confirm appointments for nine judicial vacancies. We are grateful to you for your commitment to provide the judicial pay raise that you intended last session, and we hope the additional compensation will help attract and keep good judges.

"Finally, standing as we are on the threshold of the 21st century and looking into the future, I pledge to you and the people of Hawai'i that, as we enter the new century, the fundamental values and guiding principles that the Judiciary represents will not change. The courthouses of the future will almost certainly bear little resemblance to the structures of the present. But, whatever the physical appearance of the courthouse may be, I assure you that it will be a place where everyone is equal before the law. Our citizens can rely upon the Judiciary in the third millennium because it has proven it can embrace change and, at the same time, preserve the fundamental principles of the past. We also pledge to work cooperatively and constructively with the Executive and Legislative Branches.

"Ladies and gentlemen -- throughout the coming years, the Judiciary will remain committed foremost to applying the rule of law through impartial and independent decision-making. Ultimately, the principles of justice and fair play remain, and will forever remain, the heart of our Judiciary.

"Thank you."

Speaker Say then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Mr. Chief Justice. Your words on the state of Hawai'i's Judiciary provides us with a deeper understanding of the Judicial branch and an appreciation of the strides you have made.

"A true and meaningful democracy cannot be achieved without an independent and co-equal judicial system. Yet, in these times of change, in which we live, we are gratified to see that the state Judiciary recognizes that the swift dispensation of justice must also be conducted with a mind to administrative efficiency and responsiveness. Thank you, Mr. Chief Justice.

"On behalf of Senate President Mizuguchi and the members of the Senate and on behalf of the members of the House of Representatives, the Legislature is open to receiving your ideas and recommendations for improvement. I personally look forward to working with you and your colleagues on bettering government for all of the people.

"I hereby declare this Joint Session of the Legislature to be adjourned."

At 10:35 o'clock a.m., Speaker Say declared the Joint Session adjourned.

At 12:20 o'clock p.m., the House of Representatives stood in recess, subject to the call of the Chair, to meet in Joint Session with the Senate, in accordance with S.C.R. No. 9 to appoint the Auditor.

JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives was called to order at 12:33 o'clock p.m. by the Honorable Norman Mizuguchi, President of the Senate.

Senator Ihara moved that Mr. Paul Kawaguchi be appointed Clerk of the Joint Session, seconded by Representative Case and carried, with Representatives Kahikina, Okamura and Whalen and Senators Fukunaga and Matsuura being excused.

At this time, Speaker Calvin K.Y. Say assumed the rostrum.

Speaker Say then announced that the purpose of this Joint Session was to appoint the Auditor for the State of Hawai'i, pursuant to Section 10, Article VII, of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i.

Representative Case then nominated Ms. Marion Higa to the Office of the Auditor of the State of Hawai'i for a term of eight years, commencing on July 1, 2000.

Senator Ihara moved that the nomination be closed, seconded by Representative Marumoto and carried, with Representatives Kahikina, Okamura, and Whalen and Senators Fukunaga and Matsuura being excused.

Representative Case then moved that the House of Representatives of the Twentieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i confirm the appointment of Ms. Marion Higa as Auditor for the State of Hawai'i for a term of eight years, commencing on July 1, 2000, seconded by Representative Marumoto.

Representative Case rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of the motion.

"Mr. Speaker, in 1959 the Auditor's Office was created in order to assist the Legislature in effectively discharging its checks and balances responsibilities. Under our Constitution, the duty of the Auditor is to 'conduct post-audits of the transactions, accounts, programs and performance of all departments, offices and agencies of the State and its political

subdivisions, to certify to the accuracy of all financial statements issued by the respective accounting offices, and to report the auditors findings and recommendations to the Governor and to the Legislature.'

"In 1971, Marion Higa joined the Auditor's staff. Born in Honolulu, educated at McKinley, UH/Manoa and the University of Illinois-Champaign, she has just celebrated her 29th anniversary with that office.

"Marion became Acting Auditor in 1991, and was appointed State Auditor for an eight year term in 1992. For reasons which my colleagues will express more fully, there is no doubt that she has fulfilled her duties in a truly exemplary fashion, earning, through focus, perseverance and sheer force of will, the respect and admiration of this Legislature, Hawai'i state government, and the people of Hawai'i.

"Moreover, she has brought national credit to our State. From 1995 through 1998, for example, she was elected as one of only 20 legislative staff representatives from around the country to the Executive Committee of the National Conference of State Legislatures. She serves with the National State Auditors Association and the Legislative Fiscal Officers Association. Her counsel is sought out by her colleagues and others nationally.

"But perhaps more important than these accolades is how she does her job. I'm sure we've all seen her sit dispassionately and unemotionally in legislative hearings as someone tries to explain why one of her audits is off-base, and then equally dispassionately and unemotionally get up and explain the facts. I'm sure she would be the the first to credit and back up her staff of 33, whose loyalty to her and to their office is well known. In short, she is what all public servants should be.

"Mr. Speaker, there are few actions we could take that would be more widely supported by the public, and would accrue such benefits to our state, as to reappoint Marion Higa to another eight year term as our auditor. I urge my colleagues' favorable consideration.

"Thank you."

Representative Marumoto then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I also speak in favor of the motion. And in speaking in favor of the nomination of Marion Higa as Legislative Auditor, I would like to read a Star Bulletin article of April 20, 1998, which is laudatory of the fine job she is doing as auditor. It is by Charles Memminger and is entitled: Let Awesome Auditor Rule the Roost.

"'Considering the shabby state of economic affairs in Hawai'i, I think we should just cut to the chase and put Marion Higa in charge of everything.

"'Higa is awesome. She's the Michael Jordan of government employees. I believe she can fly. Technically, she's only the state auditor, but in reality, she seems to be the only person in government who understands how things are supposed to be run, why they aren't running that way and what should be done to get them running the way they should.

"'She comes out with these amazingly astute reports on various departments, showing how millions of dollars are being wasted here and there. And she does it in such a pleasant, non-confrontational way that most of those on the receiving end of her scathing manifestos don't even realize that they are being taken to the public woodshed and soundly thrashed.

"'I don't know Marion. But I'd like to. Hell, I'd like for her to handle my personal finances. This may be a bit overstated, but she appears to be the most competent human being in the entire state. And that's why I say we should just quit fooling

around and hand the reigns of government, the whole shebang, to Higa.

"'We can let Ben Cayetano keep his title of governor and Jeremy Harris the title of mayor. And we can let the Legislature and the City Council keep meeting. We'd just have to come up with a title to make it clear that Marion would be higher than all of them on the decision-making totem pole. I think something like Super Duper Economic Czar or Ultimate Master of the Hawai'i Economic Universe would be appropriate.

"'Higa already has figured out what's wrong with half the departments in state government. Nothing is too complicated or too mundane for her probing eyeball.

"'She drove the Department of Transportation to distraction with a report that it blew several million dollars in interest by not investing its reserves for two months. She fired a shot over the bow of the state harbors department when she discovered that small boat harbors and docks weren't exactly shipshape. Some University of Hawai'i astro-nomers saw stars after she slapped them with a report showing sloppy management of the Mauna Kea summit

"'And that was just working with a small staff.

"'Just think what she could accomplish if we made her the Grand Poobah of All Things Government? With a couple of more staff people she would be able to whip the state into shape and set us on the road to financial prosperity.

"'It wouldn't even cost anything to hand the reigns of power to her. We could put her on a commission, like the Bishop Estate trustees.' This was written in 1998. 'Let her keep 2 percent of any waste she cuts from government. That way, the government would be 98 percent leaner and she'd be a multimillionaire practically overnight.

"'The question is whether she'd want the new post. I doubt it. She seems to enjoy the quiet life as Hawai'i's stealth auditor. You don't see hide nor hair of her for months on end and suddenly she emerges into the sunlight with some devastating screed about government mismanagement. She must drive department managers nuts. You know it's going to be a bad day when you see Higa standing in you waiting room with a smile and a briefcase.

"'Because she has been so successful for the state, the City Council now wants the city to create a county-level auditor. That's not a bad idea, but I doubt that there are any other Marion Higa's hiding in the weeds. She seems to be one of a kind

'So the answer is just to put her in charge of everything and everyone else take a break.' Maybe a nap break. 'Hail, Higa.'"

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried by a vote of 48 ayes, with Representatives Kahikina, Okamura and Whalen being excused.

At this time, Senate President Norman Mizuguchi assumed the rostrum.

Senator Chun then moved that the Senate of the Twentieth Legislature of the State of Hawai'i confirm the appointment of Ms. Marion Higa as the Auditor for the State of Hawai'i for a term of eight years commencing on July 1, 2000, seconded by Senator Slom.

Senator Ihara rose and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the motion.

"Mr. President, I rise today to support the appointment of Marion Higa as State Auditor for a second term of eight years.

In her first term as Auditor, Ms. Higa has produced 209 audits. These audit reports have helped to improve government service, save millions of dollars and increase public confidence.

"Marion Higa's audits are well researched, focused, reader friendly and always present useful recommendations. Near the beginning of her first term Marion was recognized with a Good Government Award from Common Cause Hawai'i. At the time, newspaper columnist, Bud Smyser, said that, 'Citizens wanted to proclaim Marion Higa public servant of the year.' He observed that her audit recommendations were like rifle shots to government effectiveness, and that charmed the public immensely.

"Midway in her term, a man considered by many as the feistiest watchdog of Hawai'i government, the late Desmond Burns himself called Marion Higa the 'feistiest of all State Auditors'. Marion, knowing Desmond, I think you can consider this a compliment of the highest order.

"And now at the end of her current term, things have not changed. Her audits still contain piercing insights and recommendations to improve the management of public funds and programs. A Honolulu Advertiser editorial last November called Marion a 'real treasure of Hawai'i' because her reports save the public's money and get better services for the community.

"Mr. President, I wanted to note that early in Marion's term she got the Legislature's support to allow her to conduct follow-up audits. This has made quite a difference because agencies know that after the Office of the Auditor has done an audit, she'll be back asking the question, 'What have you done to implement the Auditor's recommendations?'

"Representative Marumoto had quoted the Charles Memminger 1998 column and I'll just point out and repeat that in it he says that 'We should put Marion Higa in charge of everything,' and that 'She is the Michael Jordan of government employees.' In response to that, Marion wrote back and said, 'Please, I am perfectly content being State Auditor. Nothing else, thanks.'

"Well, Mr. President, I ask my colleagues to confirm Marion Higa to her singular interest and allow her to ask for another eight years, 'What have you done to implement the Auditor's recommendations?' Thank you."

Senator Anderson then rose and stated:

"Mr. President and colleagues, I'm not only pleased and proud, but very honored to speak today in strong support of Marion Higa. The only thing that really took me back a little bit is when Representative Case said she had 29 years of service. I only thought she was 36. So, I don't know, but she's a wonderful lady and the position of Auditor is not an easy one. Audits as you well know point out problems. And hopefully recommendations and solutions.

"No matter what the subject of the audit, someone somewhere doesn't like it. It takes a special person, a strong person, an intelligent person, someone both responsible and reliable to be the State Auditor. This person is Marion Higa. She has brought a new standard of professionalism and integrity to the Office of the Auditor.

"She has earned great respect throughout Hawai'i for her professional standards both for herself and for her staff. And they are well beyond compare. The complex audits generated from her office are constructive in nature. They are always delivered in a comprehensible, precise and timely manner. In addition, they clearly and consistently show the value of accountability.

"Mr. President, her objectivity, her fairness, and her attention to detail all contribute to a well balanced audit that is result oriented. Her strength of character and her remarkable ability to grasp the complexities of problems that really face us today. And these audits are something that we all rely on.

"In summary, Mr. President, Marion Higa is a role model in excellence, a public servant who we can all respect. And normally Marion, I don't read speeches, but I didn't want to leave anything out. I am really honored and you are definitely one of the best people that we could have ever chosen. Mahalo."

Senator Slom then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Mr. President, I rise in support of the motion and the nomination.

"I've had the honor and the privilege of knowing Marion Higa for a number of years. We entered the University of Hawai'i together as freshmen, a couple of years ago. She's aged far better than I have. And I would ask my colleagues, please don't hold that against her that she's known me that long because she's still able to put up with me. And that's the thing, she's able to put up with everyone and everything.

"She was a leader then, an excellent debater, an excellent student and she always did her homework and always went for the facts. We are very, very fortunate as a community and as a state to have Marion Higa who is one of the brightest, most creative, most hard working individuals anywhere around. And she's been recognized nationally as you've heard. And the same terms, the same words keep coming back: respect, integrity, honesty. There's not too many occasions when all of us in this body, the two houses together, feel the same way and express ourselves about the same individual. So it's got to be true.

"I think that we can honor Marion today by putting her back to work for another eight years, but for those people that are always asking the questions, 'How can we downsize government? How can we save money? How can we reprioritize?' All you got to do is take any eight of Marion's reports, any eight of them, and just implement them. And that would be the best honor of all, to fully implement all of the things that she said to save us some money, to make everything more efficient, and to hold people accountable and responsible.

"I'm proud to know you Marion. We love you for everything you've done and you're going to do. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator M. Ige then rose and stated:

"Mr. President, I too rise in support of Ms. Higa.

"Mr. President, Senator Bunda and I were very fortunate to be Co-Chairs of Government Operations for the Senate. And one of the reports that stick out is a report on the Baker and Taylor contract, and you know the results. The other report that sticks out is the Department of Defense. Senator Bunda and I went in, we asked the questions that she asked and we, in fact saved the State some money there after some very long and deliberate negotiations, but it was through her efforts that we were able to do that.

"And you know, Marion, as I stand here and I see you, I think of what kind of gift I can give you, but allow me to just read one of my favorites from Tennyson. It's out of the poem Ulysses and in my opinion it reflects who you are.

'That which we are, we are. One equal temper of heroic hearts. Made weak by time and faith, but strong in will. To strive, to seek, to find and not yield.'

"On behalf of the people that I represent, Marion, I want to thank you for your service to this community. Thank you."

Senator Tam then rose and stated:

"Mr. President and fellow colleagues, I wish to speak in favor of Marion Higa as State Auditor.

"I'm very pleased to have known her for a number of years. As a Chairman for Government Operation and Housing, I must attest that she's a very fine leader and also very productive and efficient in government.

"One most outstanding characteristic that I feel about her is that she goes into the community and she searches for information. She searches through everyone. Not just a certain few, but everyone in the community in Hawai'i. Marion, fine job, well done. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried by a vote of 23 ayes, with Senators Fukunaga and Matsuura being excused.

The votes having been so cast, Ms. Marion Higa was declared State Auditor.

Senator Ihara then rose and stated:

"Mr. President, I would like to introduce the people sitting with Marion today. They are her son, Jason, her daughter, Allison who flew in from Los Angeles to be here, and Marion's mother, Mrs. Sakai Murakami.

"Mr. President, I'd like to also ask the staff of the Office of the Auditor to stand to be recognized."

At 12:55 o'clock p.m., the Senate President declared the Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives adjourned. (Representatives Kahikina, Okamura and Whalen and Senators Fukunaga and Matsuura were excused.)

Representative Yoshinaga introduced her ARC of Hawai'i intern, Mr. Marvin Anderson.

SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Yonamine, seconded by Representative Pendleton and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering certain bills on Third Reading on the basis of a modified consent calendar. (Representatives Okamura and Stegmaier were excused.)

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 32-00 and S.B. No. 1345, SD 2, HD 2:

Representative Case moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and S.B. No. 1345, SD 2, HD 2, pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Yonamine.

Representative Fox rose in opposition to the measure, stating:

"I believe that there are good arguments for raising the pay of the Judiciary. We did that last year, maybe not as much as should be. But I am concerned about the lack of accountability in the Judiciary -- to use a word that is gaining some prominence this year -- about the gap between pay and performance. We have one of the weakest systems for evaluating judges in the country, and I don't see much progress in that direction.

"I think that one solution to the problem that I wish would get more serious consideration is to have judicial retention elections in Hawai'i similar to what we have in California. That way the people of Hawai'i could evaluate the performance of judges after they'd been in office for a certain period of time and that kind of evaluation would make me feel much more comfortable about increasing the pay of the Judiciary.

"Thank you Mr. Speaker."

Representative Thielen then rose in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you Mr. Speaker. I would like to make it very clear about why I am voting against this bill to increase judicial salaries

"Mr. Speaker, I strongly believe in the separation of powers. I believe that we have three co-equal branches of government. We have the Legislature, the Executive and the Judiciary, not necessarily in order of importance. We may not, in the Legislature, we may not like the decisions the Judiciary issues, but this is their role and their function. And I strongly support their independence.

"I do, however, also believe that we need to look across our society as we consider wage increases and take a look at what our teachers are paid. The day in, day out, hard work that they do to educate our youngsters, and they are, I would say, more deserving of an increase in pay than the Judiciary.

"There's a finite amount of money in the general fund and we have to take a look at where do we put our resources. My vote has always come down on the side of teachers. Let's keep increasing their salaries. And my feeling is when you serve in the Judiciary, you make a commitment to public service. With that commitment comes the realization that your salary will be less than what you would earn in the private sector. And I applaud their willingness to make that commitment, but I cannot go along with a pay increase.

"Thank you."

Representative Rath then rose and stated:

"Thank you Mr. Speaker. I'd like to vote no on this same measure and to save time I would like the Clerk to insert the remarks I made from last session voting no on this," and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Rath's remarks from March 9, 1999 on House Bill 20, HD 2, are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, many, many years ago the practice of law was a very honorable and noble profession. Those people who engaged in the practice of law had the highest ethics and were above reproach. Certainly, I think the vast majority of people who engage in law today still adhere to that conduct.

"However, there are some that have moved outside of that and, of course, lawyers have gotten the 'black eye' just like politicians and car salesman. Right at the top of that list are, of course, judges and we tend to look at them and disagree with those decisions they make as my friend to the right here has pointed out.

"But I'd like to differ with the Representative from Manoa, in that indeed, the judges are to interpret the laws, but let us remember the judges are not suppose to legislate from the bench. That is not their job. That is our job. That's what they've been doing in this State. They have been legislating from the bench. They have invaded our rights, our responsibilities and our duties. We have not invaded theirs.

"But what this is about is money. It's about do we pay these attorneys who, hopefully, after a lifetime of dedication to the law have risen to the level where they can sit and adjudicate. Are we to pay them more money? I think it's time to look at our entire criminal justice system and the way it operates.

"It's much like an upside down pyramid. Up at the top of that pyramid you have the very high paid judges. Then, of course, below that you have different attorneys. You have prosecutors. You have defense attorneys. You have PIs who make a lot of money. Then as you come down you have investigators who investigate both for prosecution and defense. But when you get right down to the bottom of that pyramid, that little tiny point at the bottom on which our whole criminal justice system sits, there's that guy on the street with a badge and a gun. He's the least educated, the worst paid and he's got the most terrible hours. Unless he walks up to somebody and says you're under arrest, the whole system doesn't even come into play.

"Now that guy is underpaid and overworked. That guy is out there with his life on the line and he has to leave for Oregon to get a good paying job. We're talking about giving the guys right on the top of that inverse pyramid a raise. I think we're looking at the wrong end of the spectrum. We should be looking at the bottom end and keeping those guys who are out in your neighborhoods in patrol cars keeping them well paid

and active in our communities. So let's put the money there instead of where the judges are. Thank you."

Representative Ahu Isa then rose in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I want to say that judges work very, very hard. They dedicate their life to public service. There's no question that they are there to serve, and long hours are put into their days just like us here at the Legislature. And I speak not only because my of brother, who stepped down from the Circuit Court bench, but others like Judge Wendell Huddy, who is about to retire. I've known him for a long time too, and they really are dedicated. So I just want my colleagues to know that.

"Also when we heard it Finance, I was appalled to see that our Chief Justice only makes \$90,000, when our professors at the University make way over \$116,000 or even our principals of our adult education schools make about \$115,000.

"Thank you Mr. Speaker."

Representative Takamine then rose and stated:

"Thank you Mr. Speaker. I like to speak in support of the motion briefly.

"I just wanted to offer a few comments just so we don't lose perspective on this measure. Mr. Speaker, as we all know, this bill was one of the key measures that had much discussion last year.

"I think I heard the word accountability. Accountability is important. It is important to all parties. I think when it applies to the Legislature it is perhaps even more important. I think this is one of the issues that due to inadvertence, in terms of drafting, the legislation that was passed did contain an error. There was discussion following last session. I think we clearly saw it as part of our responsibility, in terms of integrity of the process, to make the correction.

"Mr. Speaker, this bill merely implements that correction. Thank you very much."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1345, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION IN THE JUDICIARY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 44 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Fox, McDermott, Meyer, Thielen and Rath voting no and Representatives Okamura and Stegmaier being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that S.B. No. 1345, had passed Third Reading at 12:47 o'clock p.m.

This one especially so, and I make reference for the members to the 'industry days' that you have been sponsoring here at the Capitol for our benefit and for the general public, Mr. Speaker.

"I notice for those who are testifying in support of the passage of H.B. No. 1969, several of the industries will be focused on at your third industry day that we have marked for March 8, 2000, here at the Capitol. And so I make reference to that, Mr. Speaker, for the members, only because I want them to know that this Legislature, this Committee especially, is moving forward on programs that are important to those industries and important to the State as a whole. And also the bill also references the industry that we focused on in our first industry day and that was High Technology Trade Association. If not for the Manufacturing Extension Program, perhaps, that trade association might not have been launched. Thank you very much Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. "Mr. Speaker, I was too slow to stand up. I wanted to vote with reservations on one of the bills on page 4."

The Chair responded: "Please announce the measure."

Representative Meyer continued, stating:

"This is Stand. Com. 43-00, HB 2204 ethanol producer income tax credit. I see there are some positive things about this bill and that it would promote a new business, the ethanol production which could be done in conjunction with some of our remaining sugar facilities.

"But I have some concerns. The Department of Taxation was not in favor of this. It's a fairly large tax credit being offered in this bill to the ethanol producers. I'm not sure that this will pass constitutional muster. It would require anyone buying the ethanol would have to buy from the companies producing the ethanol in Hawai'i. It would preclude competition from cheaper sources of ethanol from out of the State and I don't know if that is legal. And for that reason I do have some pretty strong reservations. Thank you."

Representative Rath then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to register with reservations on that same bill..."

Representative Souki then rose on a "point of order," stating:

"I believe we have taken action on this bill and I don't think any further debate is necessary."

The Chair responded: "Representative Souki, the Chair has allowed them to incorporate their remarks in the journal. So, Representative Rath."

Representative Rath continued, stating:

"Yes, I just wanted to have reservations recorded for the like reasons," and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2204, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ETHANOL," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Economic Development and Business Concerns, with Representatives Okamura and Stegmaier being excused.

Representative Morihara, for the Committee on Higher Education, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 44-00) recommending that H.B. No. 2070, as amended in HD 1, be recommitted to the Committee on Higher Education.

Representative Kahikina rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, my opposition to this measure is really remarkable because the intent of this bill is to fulfill U.S. treaty obligations with the Consulate-General. And I found that it is really unique because the United States has a unique obligation to the native Hawai'ians through a federal act called the Hawai'ian Homes Commission Act. So unique that it is part of the admissions requirement for the State of Hawai'i and also incorporated in our State Constitution.

"I find it really, really ironic that this body would play with the Constitution only when it matters for vehicles that are important to perhaps somebody. When we talk about the native Hawai'ians and we identify the U.S. obligation it seems like this Body pays a deaf ear to that.

"And so I have to stand in opposition because these Consulate-Generals were really created during the Monarchy. And when the Monarch was overthrown, I wonder and even ask this Consulate-General, in history, where were the Consulate-Generals? Because the relationship was really made through the spirt called aloha. That same aloha, Mr. Speaker, that you called upon this Body to react.

"I have to apologize to the Chairman of Finance and Vice Chair and members of Finance because I didn't participate in this bill, basically because of the emotional insensitivity of this bill and the relationships. I chose not to participate, and that's my way of participating, but I need to stand in opposition. It's almost like fornicating with democracy using the Constitution only in cases where it pleases somebody. But the same document also gives rights to native Hawai'ians, Mr. Speaker, and therefore I stand in opposition."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1691, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," passed Third Reading by a vote

of 46 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Kahikina voting no and Representatives Chang, Herkes, Okamura and Stegmaier being excused.

The Chair directed the Clerk to note that H.B. No. 1691, had passed Third Reading at 12:55 o'clock p.m.

The only reason I am doing this is to provide an alarm. I'm very fearful that the language of this bill and the endearing philosophy that follows this bill will probably indirectly advise the Finance Committee not to provide any capital improvement funds for the building of the prison. Now if you do not get private funding, then the prison issue is going to be dead again and I believe that this body here needs to take a firm and bold step and agree that we need a prison. I am afraid that if you don't provide the capital improvement dollars for the building of a prison, we will not have a prison in the very near future. Thank you Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2739, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CORRECTIONS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Ahu Isa, Herkes, Kahikina, Morihara, Okamura, Oshiro, Souki, Takamine and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representative Santiago, for the Committee on Health, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 93-00) recommending that H.B. No. 2422, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

I just noticed in the Committee Report, I have not read the original bill, but apparently it establishes a new fund which is the Tobacco Enforcement Special Fund, that changes the distribution of the tobacco settlement monies. I think there might be some good aspects to it because it does free it from the surcharge that it usually has to pay to Budget and Finance, but I notice that this money, \$500,000, will go to the Attorney General and I definitely would like to see it used for direct services and health prevention programs rather than going to the Attorney General. Perhaps a smaller amount will do the trick. I noticed that the Coalition for a Tobacco Free Hawai'i had concerns about this measure and the Hawai'i Nurses' Association voted against, so this is only second reading and it will go to Finance but I would like to register my 'no' at this point. Thank you."

Representative Santiago rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"This measure in no way jeopardizes or changes any of the formula we already put forward for the Tobacco Fund. The Attorney General's Office attended the first meeting at which time we deferred the measure and allowed them an opportunity to let the members know why this was necessary. justification for that is, it's necessary for the Attorney General's Office to expend a large number of funds and manpower to ensure us that we are going to receive our maximum settlement amount. We've already seen a reduction occur and what I wanted to do as the Chair of the Committee, with the support of the members, is allow the measure to move forward to the Finance Committee so that they can have a full discussion of it and make sure that we do in fact receive the total amount. I was reassured this does not in any way jeopardize the funds that we will be receiving and how we have already worked out the formula for the 45 and 25. Thank

Representative Kanoho, for the Committee on Legislative Management, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 114-00) recommending that H.B. No. 2311, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Case, seconded by Representative Yonamine and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2311, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PROCUREMENT CODE FOR DESIGN PROFESSIONAL SERVICES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Abinsay, Cachola, Herkes, Okamura, Souki and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representatives Menor and Herkes, for the Committees on Consumer Protection and Commerce and Economic Development and Business Concerns, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 115-00) recommending that H.B. No. 1959, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawai'ian Affairs.

On motion by Representative Case, seconded by Representative Yonamine and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 1959, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO THE HAWAII STATE CONSTITUTION DIRECTING THE LEGISLATURE TO REFRAIN FROM ENACTING LAWS

THAT AFFECT CONSUMERS UNLESS THE LAW IS BENEFICIAL TO CONSUMERS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawai'ian Affairs, with Representatives Abinsay, Cachola, Herkes, Okamura, Souki and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representatives Menor and Herkes, for the Committees on Consumer Protection and Commerce and Economic Development and Business Concerns, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 116-00) recommending that H.B. No. 1960, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawai'ian Affairs.

On motion by Representative Case, seconded by Representative Yonamine and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 1960, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONSUMER ACTIONS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawai'ian Affairs, with Representatives Abinsay, Cachola, Herkes, Okamura, Souki and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representative Herkes, for the Committee on Economic Development and Business Concerns, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 117-00) recommending that H.B. No. 2434, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Case moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2434, HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Yonamine.

Representative Whalen rose and stated:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise, and for convenience sake, the Republican Caucus will be voting no on this in unison. And the concerns we have, Mr. Speaker, is that, as you will recall, when we established this Fund, the purpose of the Fund was to provide investment capital for startup companies..."

The Chair interrupted, stating:

"Representative Whalen you're on Stand. Com. Rep. 117?"

Representative Whalen continued, stating:

"Yes, thank you. The Governor's plan is to take the profits that have been generated in this Fund to use it to pay for other projects he has listed. The original bill had \$1 million. The Governor's offices, the departments came in asking it to be changed to \$3 million. When pressed as to where the funding will come from to replenish the Fund, they indicated that they were going to rely on the ERS Health Fund, requiring them to invest in this, which is in a different bill which at this point has been amended.

"I just want to remind everyone that when we set up this Fund, the purpose was that some companies will bomb, and some will be very successful. It's a revolving Fund so the profits go in, and we can use matching funds to bring even more money in the State to help our struggling economy. It was not suppose to be a special fund that we would dip into to pay for other projects and that's why it went through the House and the Senate.

"Now, in this tough economic time, is not the time to take money out of a fund that's being successful bringing money into the State. We're seeing some success with investment in the high technology arena. We should not use this Fund to pay for other things. We should stick to our original purpose and use the profit that's there to reinvest in Hawai'i's businesses which was the original intent and not look at it as another special account that we can dip into to pay for various projects."

Representative Pendleton then rose and stated:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to the same measure, Stand. Com. 117. From the quizzical look on our Clerk's face, I just want to make sure that it's clear that the entire Republican Caucus is voting no on this measure," and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ahu Isa then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Luke then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I appreciate the comments from Representative Whalen. And as you can see from the record of votes, we had a lot of deep discussion and we had a lot of very insightful input into this area. Just as a form of background, this bill came from the Governor in two forms.

"The first part was eliminating CBED funds and after consideration we decided to take that portion out because we felt that CBED has contributed a lot to our communities and it deserved continued funding from the State Legislature. The second portion of this bill dealt with taking out funds from the Hawai'i Strategic Development Corporation. And as Representative Whalen has indicated, yes, I understand his concerns, but one of the concerns that I had and one of the concerns that the members had was when we asked the Department of Economic Development or DBEDT or the Administration what their plans were as far as the use for this revolving fund. Are they going to cash out the Digital Island funds and then further put this money into other venture capital or other Hawai'i companies or what was their plan?

"Our responsibility is to continue to question what the Department is doing with this Fund. At this point, we can take a step and say okay, say 'no', we're going to put a stop to this discussion and kill this bill and stop the discussion at that point or we can take the right road and continue to question what DBEDT and the Administration is doing with this Fund. In order to do that, I decided to change the appropriation from \$1 million to \$1, pass it on to Finance, so that we can see the financial application of this. So if the members of this body understand where our discussion is leading, then I encourage you to support this bill. However, we do recognize a lot of the concerns that the members had and I appreciate your input. Thank you."

Representative Morihara then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I support this wholeheartedly. One of the things that we started with HSDC, we put the original \$5 million out of general funds into that pot. Pointing to the success of that organization with it's stock value of Digital Island, it's grown to about \$24 million. In looking at the true needs of technology in this State, certainly, venture capital is one key element, but the other key element that we've learned is that we need to increase our educational and human capacity. So the strategic decisions that were made to remove the original \$5 million that were put in from general funds was to use it in things that are closely related to the needs of that industry, not only venture capital, but also human resources.

"This is the seed monies the Governor has suggested we put toward the University to start key programs and help these key programs in medicine, in engineering, in business. In fact, it's not only going to the community colleges, but also to our schools and e-academies. I'd be glad to take that in general funds any day too, but I understand that we need to share our resources. And thanks to the success of that technology stock, I think we can more equitably use these resources to develop the whole infrastructure of technology in Hawai'i. Thank you."

Representative Whalen then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, still in opposition, just to clarify one point. Mr. Speaker, the testimony was very clear that at one point the stock was worth about \$40 million, but as stock goes up and down, value changes. And also connected with that is the fact that although the stock is worth around \$20 to \$24 million right now, they cannot sell it right now. This is the first opportunity, currently they've had to sell stock, and they only can sell a little bit at a time otherwise it'll cause the corporation to bomb. Right now, there's no money in the revolving Fund. They need money in the Fund to continue what we started, to provide capital for start-up operations. If we take the \$3 million now, the Fund will remain at zero and there will still be no money in the Fund for who knows when until they're able to sell the stock. The reason why they were looking at requiring the ERS to invest in it is because they know they cannot sell the stock for a period of time. Now is the time to use the \$3 million that they say they can sell to continue our economic revival, if you want to call it that, not to take it and spend it somewhere else. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kaho'ohalahala then rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"I'd also like to add that, in the discussions by the Committee one of the main issues raised, and as you can see by the written testimony that most of them were in opposition of the bill, had to do with the CBED component. For example, we looked at an item in Molokai that used this particular Department to apply for seed grant out of CBED, and as a result of that, getting seed monies to really initiate a plan that would lead to an enterprise community that now qualifies them for federal dollars which can be matched for any of the projects that they have come about with.

"But the point here, Mr. Speaker, is that, that component was being taken out of the bill. And at that point, you will see in the Committee Report that I voted against that. The amendments have now been put back into place and maintain that CBED will continue to be in the Department of Economic Development where it needs to be so that those communities that rely on funding of small grants to help economic activity and spur it, is going to be maintained. So at this point, I'd like to support that effort and say that the bill has been changed and I would like to vote with reservations at this time," and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Halford then rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"From a larger picture, the Administration fully intends, and I know we all know this, to fund hi-tech startups to use perhaps \$20 or \$30 million from the Employee Retirement System, in addition to Digital Island money to help fund hi-tech startups. Any money that we would take from Digital Island and put in the general fund would mean that we would need to take more money from the ERS portfolio to fulfill the Administration's goal. So I believe that we should use the Digital Island money for the startup purpose that the Administration intends so that we would take less money from the Employee Retirement System. Thank you."

Representative Suzuki then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'd like to support the Chair of the Economic Development Committee and allow this work in progress to continue on its way to Finance. Finance can measure the effect of cash flow in the long range financial plan and for having this program fulfill its mission, as intended by the Legislature.

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2434, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE FINANCES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Ahu Isa, Auwae,

Fox, Halford, Leong, Marumoto, McDermott, Meyer, Moses, Pendleton, Rath, Thielen and Whalen voting no and Representatives Abinsay, Cachola, Herkes, Okamura, Souki and Yoshinaga being excused.

Representative Hiraki, for the Committee on Transportation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 118-00) recommending that H.B. No. 2729, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Case, seconded by Representative Yonamine and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. "Thank you Mr. Speaker. I apologize for that, I rise in opposition. I'd just like to make a few brief comments.

"I fully support the intent in this. There is nothing worse in our society today, I don't think, than the scourge of drug abuse, drug addiction and all those terrible ills that go on with it, not to mention the pain that it brings to families. I did not bring these concerns up in Committee, but I object to the increase in fees. In one case, from \$2.50 to \$250, and a fee to get a duplicate permit due to loss or damage, goes from \$.50 to \$50.

"I could probably support these increases in fees if the money was going directly to an organization such as the Salvation Army Charity. I think those folks have the right idea when it comes to dealing with the drug abuse. They not only heal the body, but the soul from inside. They use a faith based component. Here we have a situation where we're going to create additional positions with these increased fees and I don't believe, based on the testimony that I heard, that these folks will be in the trenches or be down at IHS or will be pulling people really out of the gutter. Their coordinating effort, and I understand to coordinate all these programs is difficult, but I think we would be best served if we took that money and gave it to the private sector, such as Salvation Army or someone else. Thank you."

Representative Stegmaier then rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Fox rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"This bill calls for the privatization of two harbors. One is the Ala Wai Boat Harbor, and the other is Keehi Lagoon. Mr. Speaker, I believe that this bill is very premature. There's a general recognition of the problem that the Department of Land and Natural Resources faces. It does not have enough revenue to support its small boat harbor system. It's basically starved in terms of revenue, but it has an additional problem. And that relates to mismanagement, particularly of the boat harbor at Ala Wai.

"If you look at the Ala Wai Boat Harbor from a distance, it's actually quite a lovely harbor. As you get closer and you bring your nose right up to what's going on on the docks, it doesn't look so good. The State Auditor has commented three times on the way this harbor and the harbor system are managed and called for corrections that, thus far, have not been performed. Step one, before we get to the issue of privatization, is to fix the changes that were called for by the State Auditor. Step two is to raise the fees. The fees are really quite low and raising the fees would bring in additional revenue. So these two things are what we should be doing before we consider privatization.

"Now, let me just raise a couple of concerns about privatization if that is the step we take next. First, to increase revenue under privatization the person who takes over the Ala Wai Boat Harbor will have the right to bring in commercial

vessels. Those will be brought into the area near the Hawai'i Prince Hotel and the Ilikai Hotel, which was called the tourist row of the landing. This is going to be a highly disruptive activity for all the activities that currently go on relating to boating in that harbor, including all the paddlers and all the canoes that go in and out of the Ala Wai Canal to have major commercial vessels -- the kind of booze cruises that we see in the evening. The activity that's currently located at Kewalo Basin will be relocated to the Ala Wai Boat Harbor to provide additional revenue to the privatization effort. And that will disrupt the canoeing.

"Another privatization activity that will take place if this happens is the parking situation will change. The parking will be controlled by the private developer. He will build a multistory parking garage and the current free parking that's out at the end near Duke Kahanamoku Beach between the Hilton Hawai'ian Village Hotel and the boat harbor, which is a very popular area for surfing. One of the few areas on this side of Oahu where you can drive your car, get out of the car and go immediately to the surf free of charge. That will change as well. And the ambience of the area in front of the Hawai'i Prince Hotel and the Ilikai Hotel both of which are prime tourists destinations in which we want it to remain attractive for the people will change drastically with motorized buses coming in on the order that they do at Kewalo Basin, picking up people and dropping them off and creating these further disruptions that actually decline the quality of life in that area for tourists and residents alike.

"As I said, it's a very premature gesture. The Hawai'i Government Employees Association testified against it on the basic grounds that it's premature. There are other ways to raise revenue and I think it's a mistake to move this bill forward at this time. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Schatz then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I just want to point out for the House's education that for any submerged lands lease it requires legislative concurrence. And our Committee was concerned with some of the same potential adverse impacts that the Representative from Waikiki had delineated. So what we did was, we reinserted the requirement for legislative concurrence for any submerged lands lease. What that means is that any of these potential impacts -- removing the parking for surfing at Ala Moana Bowls or creating a booze cruise or ousting any of the existing residents -- would have to come before our Legislature for legislative concurrence. So it's for that reason that I support the measure because in our wisdom we should be able to prevent any of these potential adverse impacts. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative McDermott then rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Representative Fox has raised some serious concerns, but we do need to do something with Keehi Lagoon. That place really needs desperate help. So I fully support it out there, but the free parking I'm concerned about that. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2579, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LEASING OF SMALL BOAT HARBORS," passed Second Reading and was referred jointly to the Committees on Labor and Public Employment and Finance, with Representatives Fox and McDermott voting no and Representatives Menor and Okamura being excused.

Representative Meyer then rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ito then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"House Bill 3003 all it would do is establish the Adult Literacy Education Program in the community colleges. The purpose for this exchange from the DOE is the belief that the community colleges can provide quality education and training for individuals who wish to enter Hawai'i's workforce.

"It is our intent to just review viable options that are in the best interests of Adult Education students.

"It is the community colleges' goal to keep up with the Workforce Development Act of 1998. This Act aims to assist adults in literacy and obtaining the knowledge and skills necessary for employment and self-sufficiency. By placing the literacy portion of Adult Education at the community college level, there are hopes that the transition from literacy training to vocational training and other programs within the community colleges will be easier and more accessible for students if they are already in the system and environment. This bill in no way affects the GED or the naturalized immigrant type programs.

"As policymakers, we are responsible for exploring all options and make available the best possible resources and services for our people, especially our students. We are also responsible for and must continually keep in mind, the best interests for the future of our islands. For these reasons, I urge you to pass House Bill 3003. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Takai then rose to speak in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Ito be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Takai continued, stating:

"I'd also like to offer a few comments. The bill does not transfer the entire adult education program from the Department of Education to the University of Hawai'i. I think we have to make that very clear because some of us have been receiving phone calls, faxes and emails into our office stating that, and I can assure you that that is not the intent of this bill.

"The intent of the bill is to really take a look at one segment of adult education called adult literacy. As a matter of fact, the intent of the bill is to take a look at one segment of adult literacy and see if, in fact, the community colleges could do a better job than what the Department of Education Adult Community Schools is doing right now. As you know, a part of the Workforce Development Act is to encourage potential students to enter the workforce through possible community college programs or through, what they call, the Employment Taining Center Programs. People in those programs have been saying for a few years now that students that enter those programs are not necessarily well equipped to go into the

community colleges. They don't have the reading skills, the writing skills, or the math skills to enter community colleges. I think what the community colleges can do for this segment of the population is to address the remedial work necessary to provide them entry into the community colleges or for that matter into the Employment Training Centers.

"I think that's what the bill is all about so any discussion regarding closure of adult education is just a misconception or imagination or a dream that someone has that is not part of the support for this bill nor the drafters of this particular measure. Thank you."

Representative Souki then rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"I believe that if you feel that the community colleges can do a better job with the adult literacy program you should merely take out the money from adult education because the community colleges are already providing literacy programs. There's no need to transfer any money to the community colleges, that's literacy programs for adults. And it's also an infringement on their autonomy for us to transfer a measure like this to the University of Hawai'i. For this reason, I have some reservations on this measure. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3003, HD I, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Ahu Isa and Kahikina voting no and Representatives Menor and Okamura being excused.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would like a ruling on a potential conflict on both Stand. Com. 198 and Stand. Com. 199. Firms with which I was previously associated with have handled numerous claims against either the State or UH. And I'm not sure whether or not any of the partners have handled these particular claims," and the Chair ruled "no conflict."

"It's probably really for members of the Finance Committee. The testimony from the University of Hawai'i was really zero when it came to explaining what was requested in the bill and their testimony revolved entirely around the hazardous waste settlement.

"Just to remind the House, I believe it was last year or the year before, they came in asking for their own attorneys because they wanted more autonomy to decide their own future. In this particular case, their attorneys agreed to settle with the Department of Health for I think \$1.8 million worth of fines and fix up that behavior or activities they were supposed to engage in. This is outside the purview of the Governor or the Attorney General's Office. Now that that's done, they come to us asking for the money. Come to find out, when first questioned, the fines were going from one pocket of ours, general funds, into the Department of Health, into their funds. So we're paying our right hand into our left hand. So instead of doing that, the University of Hawai'i decided that instead of paying a big fine we'll agree to do a bunch of clean up stuff. And they've come to us asking for the money.

"It seems to me to 'fly in the face' of their reasoning in the past that they wanted autonomy to make their own decisions to settle their cases. They made a mistake. Well, that's fine, people do. Now they're coming to us again for money to pay for it. I'm not saying that we shouldn't, but we should closely analyze just what's going on because we have given them the power and the authority to settle their own cases, but now that it comes time to 'pay the piper' they come running back to us to sign the check. And for those reasons, I think we should take a close look to see whether or not they did all they could to minimize the cost to the taxpayers of Hawai'i. Thank you."

My concern is, presently, we have a system where we have the Attorney General handling the work. This bill may allow for private attorneys to be retained and to be compensated wholly at the discretion of the Attorney General. I think we ought to exercise a little more oversight over something like that. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I am voting no on this measure."

Representative Marumoto then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Stegmaier then rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Souki then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Saiki rose to speak in support of the bill, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of this measure. Basically the purpose of this measure is to provide the Attorney General with resources to defend cases which may pose a significant financial impact on this State. We've seen, over recent years, a rash of very significant cases such as the Felix consent decree and the developmental disabilities class action law suit. All these have a great impact on our State and we would like to provide the Attorney General with the ability to effectively represent us in the courts. Thank you."

Representative Meyer then rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Pendleton rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. First to clarify that I am fully in favor of New Century Charter Schools and because of that, because I'm supportive of our New Century Charter Schools, I need to vote no on this measure.

"This measure has the effect, Mr. Speaker, of restricting the fiscal autonomy of our charter school law. To me, that seems to be reversing our position in favor of giving more autonomy. I'd like to give more autonomy not restrict autonomy as this bill does. One of the side effects of this bill, perhaps it's unintended, Mr. Speaker, but it's very real nonetheless, would be, with respect to federal regulations concerning grants to charter schools. The federal regulations are very clear that one of the criteria in order to receive the grant is to have clear fiscal autonomy.

"Because this bill restricts fiscal autonomy it may make it more difficult, if not impossible, for our charter schools to receive as much federal grant money and funding as they otherwise would. So I am concerned about the potential limitation on federal dollars in that fashion. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I have to oppose this measure."

Representative Moses rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. On the same measure a no for me and the same concerns. I'm afraid this will jeopardize the federal funding of this program."

Representative Ito rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I speak on behalf of this measure. H.B. 2493-- all it does is give the State Superintendent the responsibility to determine allocation to the public Charter Schools Program.

"Currently, the responsibility for determining allocations for public schools is the responsibility of the Legislative Auditor. The Legislative Auditor's Office has expressed concern that the responsibility for determining the funding methodology for Charter Schools may be open to challenge as an inappropriate expansion of its functions. The Auditor's Office believes that the method of allocating funds should be an executive branch function, something the Department of Education could facilitate successfully.

"In the future, the situation could arise where the Legislative Auditor's Office is required to audit the transactions of Charter Schools--forcing them to audit their own actions. An obvious conflict of interest arises here.

"For these reasons, the Committee on Education proposes the responsibility of allocations for the Charter Schools Program rest in the able hands of the Department of Education."

Representative Meyer rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. We heard a lot of congratulatory speakers on this floor last year when we passed this New Century Charter Schools bill. We are known to have the weakest charter school laws in the nation. This bill just goes further to weaken our position. The federal grant money for charter schools is based on three criteria. They look at states where the growth of charter schools is robust in comparison to other states, and we are at the bottom of the list there. They look to see if the states have a separate chartering authority, which we don't have, so we also are not even being considered. But then this bill comes along and sort of adds an insult to where we are because we're further weakening our position by making it very clear that any charter school in Hawai'i will have no fiscal autonomy.

"So for those reasons, I'm voting no and am disappointed that we seem to be going in the wrong direction where charter schools are concerned. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Yamane rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Contrary to some of the earlier speakers, I don't see where there's less fiscal autonomy for the schools because nothing in this bill says how the schools will be spending their money. I'm assuming that they handle the funds now and will continue to handle the funds in the future. My concern with this bill, and I will support it with reservations, because I support the Chair, is the concern of the history of the Department of Education and their relationship with charter schools.

"The history of the Department of Education and charter schools is almost like they don't want to think about them. They are but they don't want to deal with them. Hopefully, with the hope of the Chair and our new Superintendent, this will change in the future. But until that does I'm hopeful that we can at least call upon the Auditor to have future audits at our request. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Goodenow then rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye vote with reservations for him, and asked that the remarks of Representative Yamane be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Marumoto rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I too rise to express some reservations on this measure. I do share the concerns of some of the previous speakers and that we lack dual chartering authorities and so Hawai'i may not be able to compete for the federal funds that are available for charter schools. On another point, I question the fact that we are giving the Superintendent so much power in this bill to allocate funds to charter schools. Whereas, we have the Auditor allocating the funds previously, we now give this to the Superintendent. I'm wondering whether that power should reside with the Board of Education.

"Also, I don't quite understand the language in it that should extra federal funds be issued to small schools that the Superintendent could determine how much of the funds should go to the designated school. Then there is a portion of those federal monies to be used to off-set the small school allotment which is also provided to the schools. So I will be looking at this measure with close scrutiny as it moves to the next committee. But right now, I would just vote with reservations. Thank you."

Representative Leong then rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Stegmaier rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you. I'd just like to let the members know that both the Superintendent and his former worker, as well as his wife, have been consultants to Waialae School, one of our charter schools. They are very strongly in support of the charter school movement and I think we can count on them to do well by the charter schools. Thank you."

Representative Fox rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. The Committee Report makes it clear that the purpose of this bill is to reduce the amount of money going to charter schools. I think that's the wrong way to go. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2493, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NEW CENTURY CHARTER SCHOOLS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Fox, Meyer, Moses and Pendleton voting no and Representatives Cachola, Morihara, Okamura, Rath and Whalen being excused.

Representative Fox rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"This bill has some of the same problems that I discussed yesterday in connection with the privatization of the Ala Wai Harbor. This one calls for the commercialization of the Ala Wai, which is the main objection that I had to privatization yesterday. What this will allow is the movement of all the commercial activity that's currently going on at Kewalo Basin, it will move that over to the Ala Wai Harbor. There's really no advantage to moving that stuff from Kewalo to Ala Wai. It's only a few hundred yards closer to the tourist. There is, however, one important advantage from the perspective of the Department of Land and Natural Resources. That is, if the commercial activity goes on at Kewalo, the revenue goes to the Department of Transportation, while if it moves to the Ala Wai, the revenue goes to the Department of Land and Natural Resources. So because of the bureaucracy, DLNR doesn't get the money unless the commercial activity moves to Ala Wai.

"That's why they're making this change, which as I mentioned yesterday is going to disrupt the paddlers going in and out of the Ala Wai Canal. It's going to restrict surfing activity at Ala Wai Boat Harbor. It's going to mess up life for the people who live in the Ilikai and the Ilikai Marina. It's going to reflect adversely on the quality of life experience for tourist staying at the Hawai'i Prince Hotel and at the Ilikai Hotel. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Meyer then rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"It wasn't too very long ago that the Small Boat Harbors' DOBOR (Division of Boating and Ocean Recreation), did have control of Kewalo. And then some years back it was transferred to DOT. I do understand the concern of my colleague from Waikiki. I would prefer to see us turn Kewalo back to the Small Boat Harbors people. I feel that they would get the revenue from that Harbor and it would keep the commercial activity where it more appropriately ought to be. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Pendleton then rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Fox be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered". (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2571, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE BOATING FACILITIES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Chang, Hamakawa, Herkes, Kanoho, Kawakami, Menor, Nakasone, Okamura, Saiki, Souki and Takamine being excused.

Representative Takumi, for the Committee on Ocean Recreation and Marine Resources, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 266-00) recommending that H.B. No. 3001, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Case, seconded by Representative Yonamine and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 3001, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NONCOMMERCIAL PIERS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Chang, Hamakawa, Herkes, Kanoho, Kawakami, Menor, Nakasone, Okamura, Saiki, Souki and Takamine being excused.

Representative Herkes, for the Committee on Economic Development and Business Concerns, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 267-00) recommending that H.B. No. 2583, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawai'ian Affairs.

On motion by Representative Case, seconded by Representative Yonamine and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2583, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO OPEN MEETINGS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawai'ian Affairs, with Representatives Chang, Hamakawa, Herkes, Kanoho, Kawakami, Menor, Nakasone, Okamura, Saiki, Souki and Takamine being excused.

Representatives Hiraki and Morita, for the Committees on Transportation and Energy and Environmental Protection, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 268-00) recommending that H.B. No. 2615, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawai'ian Affairs.

On motion by Representative Case, seconded by Representative Yonamine and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2615, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HAZARDOUS MATERIALS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawai'ian Affairs, with Representatives Chang, Hamakawa, Herkes, Kanoho, Kawakami, Menor, Nakasone, Okamura, Saiki, Souki and Takamine being excused.

Representatives Hiraki and Morita, for the Committees on Transportation and Energy and Environmental Protection, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 269-00) recommending that H.B. No. 2896, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Case, seconded by Representative Yonamine and carried, the joint report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2896, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ALTERNATE FUELED VEHICLES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Chang, Hamakawa, Herkes, Kanoho, Kawakami, Menor, Nakasone, Okamura, Saiki, Souki and Takamine being excused.

Representative Cachola, for the Committee on Water and Land Use, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 270-00) recommending that H.B. No. 2807, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Case, seconded by Representative Yonamine and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2807, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR A WAIALUA-HALEIWA STORMWATER DRAINAGE MASTER PLAN," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Chang, Hamakawa, Herkes, Kanoho, Kawakami, Menor, Nakasone, Okamura, Saiki, Souki and Takamine being excused.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Human Services and Housing, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 271-00) recommending that H.B. No. 2273, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Case, seconded by Representative Yonamine and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2273, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII CHILDREN'S TRUST FUND," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Chang, Hamakawa, Herkes, Kanoho, Kawakami, Menor, Nakasone, Okamura, Saiki, Souki and Takamine being excused.

Representative Arakaki, for the Committee on Human Services and Housing, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 272-00) recommending that H.B. No. 2429, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Case, seconded by Representative Yonamine and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2429, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HOUSING AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION OF HAWAII," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Chang, Hamakawa, Herkes, Kanoho, Kawakami, Menor, Nakasone, Okamura, Saiki, Souki and Takamine being excused.

Representative Santiago, for the Committee on Health, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 273-00) recommending that H.B. No. 2525, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce.

On motion by Representative Case, seconded by Representative Yonamine and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2525, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PRESCRIPTION DRUGS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, with Representatives Chang, Hamakawa, Herkes, Kanoho, Kawakami, Menor, Nakasone, Okamura, Saiki, Souki and Takamine being excused.

Representative Santiago, for the Committee on Health, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 274-00) recommending that H.B. No. 2541, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Case moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2541, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Yonamine.

Representative McDermott rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the hearing was run in a very decent and fair manner. The Chairman did a great job. The evidence was overwhelming in support of the notion that fluoride does help your teeth and does fix your teeth. I kind of felt conflicted about that. But I also got scores and scores of messages in my office, phone calls, saying 'Please do not do this'. I didn't receive one single phone call saying 'Please do this'. I know it's going to fix our teeth, I know it's probably good for us, but so is vitamin C. So I'm going to listen to my constituents on this one. Thank you."

Representative Rath then rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"This is obviously another one of those 'Oahucentric' bills. People on the Big Island have voted on fluoridation, I think, seven times now. In addition, we have 23 different water sources, some people are on catchment, of course. And there's a large amount of private water systems. I think, probably, my main objection is you're going to have some employee somewhere putting this in. I can see a mistake being made. I can see the consequential liabilities for over-fluoridating, especially with 23 different sources and different demands in use. I just don't think, at this point, with our economy 'in the bag', whether we need to add more government services, more employees, and one more program. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Pendleton then rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'm of course speaking in my own individual capacity as a legislator. Mr. Speaker, I, in all candor, used to support this notion. In speaking with a number of Representatives, I was initially very much in support of this measure because fluoride is good for you. However, in thinking about the impact of this, and in a number of other issues, I've changed my mind. I guess I have learned to be able to change my mind when I see new facts.

"I want to make it absolutely clear that in my opposition to the forced ingestion of fluoride by the general public, I'm not opposed to good teeth. I'm not opposed to our keiki having great dental records. I'm not opposed to us being able to use fluoride in toothpaste, in our fluoride rinses, or to our dentists being able to give us fluoride treatments. What I am opposed to is everyone being forced by the government to have to consume, ingest, and take fluoride into their bodies.

"Mr. Speaker, most Americans have been brushing their teeth with fluoride toothpaste for years. Looking at my children's Aqua Fresh, a fluoride protection toothpaste, it says to parents 'children under six years...to minimize swallowing use a pea size amount and supervise brushing until good habits are established.' Under the warning section it says that 'if accidentally swallowed,' one of the courses of action is to 'contact a poison control center immediately.'

"My kids also use, as I mentioned just a second ago, fluoride rinses, and go for fluoride treatment, but their dentist advises against swallowing any fluoride, whether accidental or intentional. As infants, all three of my kids had prescribed fluoride drops, but with these the dosages were set in relation to their weight and age and were carefully monitored. In all these cases, the dentists state that the benefits of fluoride are important, but they carefully monitor the dosage. And in only the situation with the infant drops is the fluoride ever ingested and then only for a limited period and strictly calibrated to fit the size of the individual ingesting it.

"So, Mr. Speaker, why then would we want to force all of Hawai'i's residents to consume fluoride everytime they drink tap water. Vegetables and fruits are good for you, but we don't compel people to eat vegetables and fruits. Vitamin supplements are good for you, but we don't coercively administer them in our public schools. Aromatherapy is good, but we don't have the government putting it into everyone's air. We allow people to choose. If vegetables and vitamins are good and we allow people to choose, why can't we allow people to drink fresh pure water without fluoride in it?

"Some studies conclude that fluoride ingestion is beneficial. Others say that it could be harmful to those who are hypersensitive and to those who have certain kinds of health conditions. How are we going to screen out those people, Mr. Speaker?

"Again, I'm not opposed to fluoride treatments at the dentist office or fluoride toothpaste. I'm opposed to us forcing people to ingest and consume fluoride. The dosage issue is an important one. I don't think we should minimize that.

Everyone would be taking in the same dosage, whether it's my one year old infant, Danielle, in the powder mix for her milk, or a football player like Russ Francis, it's the same concentration in the water. No physician would prescribe medication in the same dosage given the disparity between those two weights. So why would we feel comfortable having fluoride at the same level?

"There's also the issue of human error, Mr. Speaker. No one has said that government is perfect or infallible, that they never make mistakes. We would never claim that. But if we make a mistake in this area, if for some reason, we accidentally put too much and two weeks later we discover this and let people know, we may never be able to really address the health concerns. Sure there may be law suits and all of that, people can receive damages, but we want to prevent those kinds of health situations from occurring. House Bill 2528 which we just spoke about a few pages ago, we just reviewed that bill. That's a safe drinking water bill. This bill seems to add something, which the EPA considers a contaminant. The EPA says it's a contaminant.

"The EPA sets forth various levels at which fluoride is safe and when you shouldn't have too much. But the bill, Mr. Speaker, if you look at the bill, on fluoride, page 4, section 1, it doesn't set a ceiling for how much can be put in. We allow all that to go to rulemaking. We give the other people, who are administering, the discretion to do that. Now what happens if you violate the EPA ceiling? If we're not going to do a State ceiling, legislatively, we're going to give it up to some rulemaker to do with the minimum kinds of oversight. What would be the consequences? The EPA would only require them to give out public notices. So that's the only thing that would happen if we made a mistake."

At this time, Representative Auwae yielded her time to Representative Pendleton.

Representative Pendleton continued, stating:

"In closing, Mr. Speaker, let me focus on the last thing. Again, the most troubling aspect of this is the forced ingestion of fluoride. In all of the other cases where we allow fluoride to be administered, the dentists say and the dentists require that they spit it out. When you go to the dentist's office, the warnings on the dental rinse, the warnings on the toothpaste say, you're not suppose to ingest it.

"I think Hawai'i's families should have the right to choose pure drinking water, Mr. Speaker. Let us not use tax dollars to place an EPA categorized contaminant in Hawai'i's drinking water. Let us not force babies to drink water less pure than the water we ourselves drank as babies growing up here in Hawai'i. Rather, let's focus on educating Hawai'i's parents who have fluoride toothpaste, fluoride rinses and fluoride treatments at their disposal. We can eat fewer sweets, drink less soda and floss regularly. Hawai'i's rate of 3.9 cavities per child ages five to nine is high. We need to do something about it. Something must be done, but forcing everyone to drink fluoride is not the solution, Mr. Speaker. Thank you."

Representative Stegmaier then rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I will be reiterating some of the points that were made by the previous speaker, but I want to bring the perspective of a member of the Health Committee who heard the very comprehensive testimony on Saturday.

"Despite the good intentions of its proponents, I must raise some serious concerns about the bill on Second Reading as it moves on to the Finance Committee. First and most fundamentally, this would be a step backwards from the philosophy of personal responsibility and governmental accountability that this House has been advocating in a variety of ways. When I asked Dr. Greer, the head of the Dental Health

Branch, whether there are ways of maintaining dental health that don't involve ingesting fluoride in our water, he said that there were, but that realistically, 'certain ethnic groups' and certain communities 'would not or could not take personal responsibility for their dental health.' As a specific, Mr. Speaker, he mentioned Lanai. Yet, when I asked him what the goals of his agency were concerning the dental health of the residents of Lanai, Dr. Greer said that it, the agency, didn't have any specific goals.

"Mr. Speaker, I hear a condescending and paternalistic attitude of resignation in the words of Dr. Greer that, I believe, is very counterproductive to the goals of empowerment and personal and parental accountability that this House is committed to.

"The Health Committee was told that the Netherlands and West Germany chose not to fluoridate their water because of a very successful dental education and practices program operating in both countries, which results in good dental health for children and adults alike. It is this approach that we should adopt in Hawai'i. Rather than take a defeatist attitude about parents and social service professionals being unable to provide for the dental health of the children of Hawai'i and blaming it all on a lack of resources, the Department of Health should develop programs working with all the dentists, dental hygienists, other dental health professionals, educators and social services providers to educate, encourage and empower parents and significant others to teach their children proper dental care.

"Mr. Speaker, there is an alternative to fluoridation that will result in dental health for our keiki as well as our elderly, but it is available to us only if we redouble our efforts to support each other rather than give up on each other.

"Another troublesome comment, Mr. Speaker, which we heard at the hearing last Saturday was made by the representative of the American Dental Association who said that there has not been any increase in the amount of fluoridation that we are ingesting and that, therefore, there is no danger of anyone getting amounts of fluoride that could be damaging to them.

"Yet, Mr. Speaker and members, Dr. David Doi, a dentist practicing in Hawai'i for 20 years and the son of former Lieutenant Governor Nelson Doi, refers in his statement against fluoridation that there are manufactured juices and sodas regularly consumed by almost all of us, and especially our children, that contain up to 2.6 parts of fluoride per million. Way above the .6 per million that proponents suggest should be in our drinking water. Dr. Doi, whose words of concern were echoed by Dr. Carl Lehman, a noted local pediatrician and allergist, and Dr. Paul Kenyon, asserts that no one knows how much fluoride our bodies are already dealing with and, therefore, how much fluoride in our drinking water would be safe for us.

"For me, the issue of fluoridation boils down to the basic question: Do we really want to deliberately contaminate our water with sodium fluoride simply because we as parents and adults are not providing the materials, meaning toothbrushes, toothpaste and dental floss, and the instruction for our keiki so that they can maintain healthy teeth and gums?

"May I conclude, Mr. Speaker, by making reference to the recent poll that shows that a majority of Hawai'i's residents are opposed to fluoridation and that a significant majority of kama'aina are opposed. I wish to paraphrase the testimony of Dr. Fred Holschuh, a highly respected physician who is philosophically in favor of fluoridating our water. Dr. Holschuh wrote to the Health Committee that as long as the people of Hawai'i are strongly divided on this issue, it would be unreasonable to pass this measure out and impose fluoridation against their will.

"Mr. Speaker, I agree with Dr. Holschuh's assessment of the situation and ask that we put this matter to rest either now or in the Finance Committee. Thank you very much."

Representative Santiago then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. As the Chair of the Health Committee who sat through approximately, I think it was, six hours of testimony on Saturday, members please note the committee report because it does show the overwhelming, I mean just tremendously impressive support that was shared by many people who, I must admit, are much more knowledgeable about this issue than many of us on the floor here. Many highly respected scientists and others came, they flew in, nationally renowned experts in this area. And I must admit, going into the committee hearing I was really pretty much neutral. I had heard the fears that had come out before. I had gotten the calls in my office, close friends and family members saying, 'Don't you do this,' and all that. I really went into the committee hearing wanting to be educated, and I was.

"I was truly educated on Saturday. And one of the things I have to note is given the poll that came out, given the recent announcement on the part of my counterpart across the way, I believe that the one thing that is clear is we need education. There is a tremendous amount of education that needs to go on about the safety of fluoridation, about the countries and the states that have gone before us who have done this. There is a tremendous amount of fear that needs to be allayed. One of the reasons why I asked my Committee to support moving this measure out of the Committee and to allow for this kind of debate to occur was for that education to be allowed to continue

"I believe, based upon the statistics that was shared with us, just as Dr. Bruce Anderson has said, there is nothing we can do now that will have a better effect, that will be safe, that's going to be introduced into our keiki's bodies in a different way than what we've heard earlier about it being topically applied. I was convinced, after the hearing, that not only did we have an obligation to our children to continue this educational effort, we had an obligation to sometimes say, 'You know what? We don't live in a perfect world.' We aren't going to be able to educate all of our parents to go ahead and make sure that these children get the kind of dental services that they need. We have to recognize that some people are being affected tremendously negatively because of terrible dental care.

"Note in the committee report, one of the members of our Committee had reservations about moving this forward because of the efforts to take away dental hygienists, the front line workers. We object vehemently, as the Health Committee, to that. We note in our committee report, we want to see benchmarks. We want to see how you're going to make sure that this effort, not only the safety mechanisms be put in place, but also to show us that this is, in fact, resulting in what they want.

"Mr. Speaker, I ask the members to allow this measure to continue to be discussed, allow the Department and the proponents of the measure to continue to educate the population. I certainly, now that I have been educated, have had all of my fears and my concerns addressed. The only thing that remains for me is to find out whether or not the individuals who are really pushing for this measure can, in fact, reach out to our population because I know that, being a reflection of our population, the only way it's ever going to get done is if all of you sitting in this room have enough of your constituents saying the opposite from what the poll said on Sunday. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Arakaki then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd like to speak in favor of the committee report and the bill, House Bill 2541. Also in support

of the Health Committee Chair, I'd like to have his words inserted as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Arakaki continued, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I realize this is only Second Reading, but I think it's important to point out that as a health policy issue, which was what was discussed in our hearing, I think there's no question that this is the right thing to do. In fact, this is probably one of the greatest things we could do for the future of our children

"I know it does sort of step on the rights of a few minorities, but we do these things very often for the sake of our children. Look at immunization, prenatal care, and car safety seats, these are not panaceas, but they are strategies that we employ for the protection and well being of our children. This is what we should be looking at. I know sometimes we have difficulty looking beyond the next day or the next week or the next year let alone the next generation. And that's why I think because we focus so much on the 'here and now', too often we're led by fear. But as one of our great President's said, 'the greatest fear is fear itself'

"For those of us who were at that hearing, we know that all of these fears were unfounded. But I really think we need to look at what this means to the future generation because I think, you and I, Mr. Speaker and a few others, we had a chance back in 1987 to also establish this policy. Unfortunately, we didn't and I think our children today are suffering because of that. But I hope we can resolve that situation. I think there's no better way than to make this landmark legislation for this Legislature in the year 2000, and dedicate this bill to the future of our children. I know a lot of us will probably be gone by the time the beneficiaries of this bill go into adulthood, but I'm sure they're going to look back and thank us for having the courage to establish this good health policy. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Leong then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. At the committee hearing, I had to ask our Chair if I could have time to speak because I had a conflict. I have four children in my family who are dentists and my husband is a dentist. When I was pregnant with each of my children, my physician recommended to me that I ingest fluoride for the fetus and my child in my womb, and I did. After they were born, they continually took fluoride. Since they were born, my children have had like one cavity through their whole lifespan. When they got a cavity in their mouth, I would be really upset. When you take fluoride it hardens your tooth enamel. It starts working on it and it prevents cavities from coming. But when my son got a cavity I was really upset. But in high school they eat, they don't brush their teeth and they fall asleep.

"Well I also have a periodontist in my family. If you were at that hearing, you found out that periodontists are very concerned because periodontists are the ones who are so wealthy in the dental practice because they do gum surgery. When they do gum surgery your roots are exposed. We know that when you take this fluoridated water it will protect your roots also from getting cavities.

"For the children of Hawai'i, that's what we're shooting for. Even adults will benefit from it in the long run because as I said periodontist do root canals. I mean everybody knows that when you get to be a little older, you may or may not have cavities, but you will end up going to see a periodontist. The periodontist are very much in favor of fluoridation in the water.

"We know that all of our lives we've taken some chlorine at some time in the water. Nobody complained too much about the chlorine. But this fluoridation is something that's going to be of benefit for all of our children. Now in our dental practice, the children that couldn't afford to come in, my husband gave them the topical fluoride, and that helped. It helped to minimize their cavities. But really and actually, had they had fluoride from the beginning, they would have just hardly any cavities at all.

"So we have to look out for our little children. We're going to benefit too. Don't let that all scare you, all that they're saying. The children are the ones we need to look out for. I'm such a great proponent of fluoride. I wish you could see our family's teeth. They're all there. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Meyer then rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. When I went to college, I took a dental assistant course. That was way back in 1957. I learned and actually found out about the value of fluoride because of different parts of the United States where it's naturally in the water, and one of those states was Colorado. Many of the youngsters in Colorado would have these little brown spots on their teeth because maybe the level was too high, naturally nobody was doing it. They might have had these kinds of unattractive spotted teeth, but they didn't have any cavities. They had very few cavities and this is how the dentists learned that this was a very beneficial thing. Seeing that we have the worst dental problems in Hawai'i for our children, I see that this would be a great benefit. I too have had many calls from constituents who said, 'Don't put this poison in our water. Lots of people, mostly people over 40 years old, they don't want our wonderful water to be tampered with and I can understand that.

"I would feel more comfortable if we were not looking at this bill, but that it was something being done at the county level. Again, I feel that the county level reaches the people more easily. People, and especially with our island community, counties are different. As the Representative from Kona pointed out, the Big Island is quite different from Oahu. Lanai was mentioned because the kids over there seem to have worse problems than we have on some of the other islands. It would seem more appropriate to me to let the people of Lanai decide if they want fluoride and do a pilot program. Although personally, I've realized we don't need a pilot program. We know it's good, but the people of Lanai would vote on that. I think we have to have people vote on whether or not they want this added to their water. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kahikina then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support of the measure. I want to ask that the four previous speakers' words be added into the Journal as if my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Kahikina continued, stating:

"I want to add my personal observation, Mr. Speaker. I was one of those that voted with reservations because I wanted the dental hygienists to be reauthorized, and I heard last night in the community meeting that Dr. Anderson had indicated that the Governor was supportive of re-establishing that.

"But, Mr. Speaker, what had happened to me on Saturday while I was sitting through the hearing is that I think I got 'bachi' because I got a toothache while sitting through the hearing. So I suffered for two days, and on Tuesday, I finally asked Vicki to get me into a dentist. In fact, Tuesday morning I went to my home dentist in Nanakuli, Dr. Young. And three dentists, all of them told me, 'Representative if you had fluoride in the water you wouldn't be sitting here.'

"What really compelled me, Mr. Speaker, is that when I went to Nanakuli and my dentist showed me all the kids with the silver caps and with all these 'pukas'. He said he's been in Nanakuli for almost 20 years and now he's not afraid of these

big Samoan mothers. He's scolding them, 'You give them the fluoride.' The fact of the matter is that this bill is for kids. Kids that are not able to vote. Kids that probably would not know the difference that chlorine is on the same level as fluoride on the chemical list, but we put chlorine in our water. I sure hate to say that, but we do that because of the bad germs in there. We hate to think about contaminating our water, but this is a health issue and the decision to do this policy is really based on our kids.

"When you see all these toothaches and all these 'pukas' in their teeth and kids that I work with at Boys and Girls Club that have 'no more' teeth and cannot eat, that's what compelled me and I support this bill. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Moses then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd like to rise in support of the measure also and I'll do my colleague from Nanakuli one better and ask that the five previous speakers' comments be inserted in the Journal as if my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Moses continued, stating:

"But I would like to add, as we heard from one of the previous speakers, I believe this should be a matter for 'homerule'. I do believe, personally, it's best for the children, but I think this is a matter that again we should leave up to each county and they can decide for themselves. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Whalen then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Lee then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, as a health care professional, I feel almost obliged to speak. I think we have to look into our community and see who it is that supports water fluoridation. Who is it? They are credible and respected scientific and professional organizations that have been established and operational for a long time; physicians and dentists and other health care professionals in the community, those who take care of you and your families, whose offices provide jobs for the community and continue to live and work in the community in which they desire to fluoridate.

"On Saturday, when I was at the hospital, I talked to some of the doctors in the hospital and they had actually put some messages on the internet in response to a lot of the misinformation that's on the internet. They were kind of appalled at the misinformation in the community. So Alex is absolutely right, there's a lot of misinformation out there and we really need to do something to combat the misinformation.

"On Saturday, I was really impressed with all the positive testimony. I think Dr. Michael Easley, who came here from the dental school in Buffalo, New York, was probably the most impressive because he's a national expert on fluoride.

"I want to read something from his testimony, which is actually a quote from Professor John Harris, who's the Director of the Center for Social Ethics and Policy at the University of Manchester, England. This quote has to do with the allegation from those that oppose fluoridation; that community water fluoridation somehow interferes with someone's freedom of choice:

In considering the ethics of fluoridation, one might legitimately reverse the question and ask if fellow citizens are entitled to impose not only a disadvantage on the community at large, but impose actual deaths and the risk of death on children for the sake of a minor diminution in the ranges of choices available? We should ask not are we entitled to impose fluoridation on unwilling people, but are the unwilling people entitled to impose the risks, damage and costs of the failure to fluoridate on the community at large. When we compare the freedoms at stake, the most crucial is surely the one which involves liberation from pain and disease.'

"I think that's a very important thing to remember. We're doing this for our children. Thank you."

Representative Auwae then rose and asked the Clerk to register an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Auwae continued, stating:

"I feel that fluoridation is very good, but I do feel you can take people to water, but you can't force them to drink and we have one of the best waters in Hawai'i. Why would we want to add anything to it? Thank you."

Representative Halford then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'll be quick in speaking in opposition.

"I am in favor of fluoridation. I'm concerned that this bill has some fatal flaws. One is that our public water systems, which there are a variety, there are different islands and different systems on each island. We don't necessarily need a 'one size fits all' policy for fluoridating water. It is and should appropriately be a local issue.

"Secondarily, I'm concerned about the mention in the committee report about the abolishment of the Department of Health's Dental Hygiene Program. A previous speaker mentioned that, perhaps, the Department of Health would advocate for its return. I don't know, but I'm concerned that the State might move in the direction of diminishing health care in Hawai'i.

"Third and last, there seems to be some reliance on the Hawai'i Tobacco Settlement Fund, which might prove to be an unreliable source of income. Thank you."

Representative Yamane then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. As has been indicated by several speakers before me, there needs to be an educational program going on. So all members, all colleagues who are interested in reading the testimony, I have about two and a half inches of it and we can make copies for anyone that's interested.

"I have to say that the education should start right here. As has been mentioned, chlorine is not a natural occurring substance and as was brought out in testimony, fluoride is already in the water. So if you reverse this bill, it will cost us a whole lot of money to take out the fluoride that's already in the water.

"Fluoride is tasteless and odorless. For those of you who are interested, the benefits were presented and everybody has been talking about it. At the end of the hearing, I think it's up to the proponents of fluoride to take to the public the concerns, as our Health Chair said, and the fears. The fears like, for example, it leads to brain tumors, an allegation. It gives you spinal cord injuries, an allegation. It leads to cancer, an allegation. It clogs up pipes. These are all some of the fears that were put out, that have been passed, that have been on faxes. And these are some of the excuses that the public is using to be against fluoride.

"Fluoride, remember now, is suppose to be an experiment that's 55 years old. Anything that's been an experiment for 55 years, I don't think is an experiment any longer. The so-called studies that are supposedly against fluoride, the opponents can

come forward and ask if they can repeat their study. The problem is nobody did. We have testimony from the School of Medicine here about the potential disadvantages of fluoride and Dr. Vogel said there were none.

"I'm not saying that this bill is going to be a 'slam dunk', but until the opponents can address the repeatable studies and until the proponents can address the fears of the public, I think we still have a way to go. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ahu Isa then rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"I don't want to belabor the point. I have the highest respect for our Chair of the Health Committee and also the Co-Chair of our Women's Caucus group. I know fluoride does help our children's teeth because, as a mother like Representative Leong, I did take fluoride vitamin tablets and my two children today have no cavities, and one is 29 and the other is 36, and yes it does work.

"But I just want to relay what happened a couple of weeks ago. I broke out in a rash and went to the dermatologist to try to figure out what it was. He has to give me a series of tests. Now he thinks it might be fluoride, which is interesting, or chromium. I take vitamins everyday, the One-a-Day vitamins. If you look at your bottles, people, it lists chromium as one of the ingredients. And who would have thought that I would be allergic to it. So I have to go through a series of patch tests that they put on you. This is not teeth, this is just skin. So I don't know what's the result, I probably have good teeth, but I'll have a rash. It's just, like some of our colleagues have said, giving people a choice. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2541, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COMMUNITY WATER FLUORIDATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Ahu Isa, Halford, McDermott, Pendleton, Rath, Stegmaier and Whalen voting no and Representatives Chang, Hamakawa, Herkes, Kanoho, Kawakami, Menor, Nakasone, Okamura, Saiki, Souki and Takamine being excused.

Representative Menor, for the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 275-00) recommending that H.B. No. 1882, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred jointly to the Committees on Legislative Management and Finance.

On motion by Representative Case, seconded by Representative Yonamine and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1882, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION," passed Second Reading and was referred jointly to the Committees on Legislative Management and Finance, with Representatives Chang, Hamakawa, Herkes, Kanoho, Kawakami, Menor, Nakasone, Okamura, Saiki, Souki and Takamine being excused.

Representative Cachola, for the Committee on Water and Land Use, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 286-00) recommending that H.B. No. 2577, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawai'ian Affairs.

Representative Case moved that the report of the Committee be adopted and H.B. No. 2577, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawai'ian Affairs, seconded by Representative Yonamine.

Representative Rath rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"For the edification of those in this House and for many people on Oahu, meat really doesn't come from supermarkets. Meat originates with live animals that are killed, then they're gutted and skinned, hung, bled and then cut up before they wind up being in those little styrofoam packages.

"The reality is that a lot of people hunt and a lot of people on the Big Island hunt. It's often thought of, by those on Oahu, as a recreational sport. I ask you to compare it to fishing. Well, licensed hunting and now this bill wants to increase the fees for people who hunt. For many people who hunt, that is their meat on their table. It's not done for trophies. Additionally, this bill not only increases the hunting fees, not only is it opposed by the Hawai'i Hunting Association, the Hawai'i Hunting Advisory Council, and the Conservation Association of Hawai'i, but I believe anybody who hunts would oppose this bill and increase of his fees.

"In addition to the increase of fees, which are not necessarily going to increase game areas or game programs, additionally, they now want to establish different categories of license, mammals, birds and the like. I know a lot of people -- not a lot of people anymore -- but some people on Oahu probably still fish. I wonder how they would feel if they had to get an aku fishing license or ono fishing license.

"Mr. Speaker, everybody in my family, as far back as I can think, hunts. My daughter hunts, I only have two girls, one of them is a hunter. I now have two grandchildren, I'm sure they'll take it up too. Most of the people I know who hunt on the Big Island do it for subsistence. It's their meat. It's the stuff they put on their table, and I'm sure some people do it for sport, some people go fishing so they can have a large trophy, it's something they're not going to eat. But this is just carrying it a little too far, and I'm in opposition to this. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Herkes then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Whalen then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Goodenow then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kahikina then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Marumoto then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Moses then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kaho'ohalahala then rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"I'd just like to add that Lanai is a subsistence gathering island. While we're concerned about raising the fees for all the different categories of game animals perhaps that are on an island, you have to also know the other side. Hunting on the island of Lanai is also a management program that is intended to help save an island from being overgrazed. Here's an island where it's become very necessary for us to continue a hunting program to manage the number of animals that are on an island so as to not allow the island to be deforested. Therefore, we won't have any water to fluoridate. So I think we need to look at the other side of it when here is an opportunity, perhaps, that we want to consider raising the fees and yet on the other side it becomes a very necessary part of an island to maintain a hunting program in order to maintain just its ability to absorb and bring water back to the island itself. So I would just ask that we not support this."

Representative Pendleton then rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"I would just like to note that my reading of the bill indicates that the money is not earmarked for government work related to hunting or the Department's needs relating to hunting of game. So it looks more like a tax increase than just a simple fee increase. So for those reasons, I'll vote no."

Representative Leong then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Auwae then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Halford then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Meyer then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative McDermott then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Cachola then rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, what came out in the hearing is that Hawai'i is the cheapest when it comes to license fees. As to what they're going to use the money for, it's the maintenance that will benefit programs that have something to do with hunting. So for that reason, Mr. Speaker, for the information of this body that we should continue discussing this bill as it goes through the motions and to the other committees and let's see whether or not it can still be amended and whether or not it can only raise fees for non-residents. With that, Mr. Speaker, I support the measure. Thank you."

Representative Ito then rose and asked the Clerk to register a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2577, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HUNTING LICENSES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary and Hawai'ian Affairs, with Representatives Auwae, Goodenow, Halford, Ito, Kahikina, Kaho'ohalahala, Leong, Marumoto, McDermott, Meyer, Moses, Pendleton, Rath and Whalen voting no and Representatives Chang, Hamakawa, Herkes, Kanoho, Kawakami, Menor, Nakasone, Okamura, Saiki, Souki and Takamine being excused.
