"The five soldiers that are here today, we together very humbly represent the millions of American soldiers that have served in the Pacific throughout the hundred years that we talked about. We also humbly represent the tens of thousands of Pacific based American soldiers that stand this morning, this afternoon on the front line of America's war on terrorism. Also, several thousand Pacific-based American soldiers are journeying home as we speak from very successful operations and exercises with our allies and neighbors in Japan and in the Philippines. And in just days, several thousand more Pacific-based American soldiers will journey to exercise and train with the armed forces of India, the largest democracy in the world, and the armed forces of Indonesia, the largest Muslim nation in the world.

"We very proudly join those soldiers in service to our nation and we very gratefully serve here in the beautiful State of Hawaii. Mahalo."

Having an adopted daughter from China who is the love of my life and the blessing of my life, these are the same kids who the Chinese government pretends doesn't exist. They're all over. They're working. They're kind of like Dickens' kids on the streets of London. The chances of them to make a life out of what they've been given is very, very short.

"So I think this, like other resolutions, sends a strong message or sends at least a gesture of compassion to the Chinese government, which eventually, probably won't even acknowledge it. But right now, it's like a Kabuki play. There's nobody seeing and saying anything. And I think it's time that this be brought to their attention. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS
