STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

Representative Souki, for the Committee on Transportation presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3-08) recommending that H.B. No. 2034, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative Caldwell moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2034, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Representative B. Oshiro.

Representative Mizuno rose in support of the measure and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Mizuno's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of HB2034. If the outside temperature is 80 degrees, which is very common for Hawaii, the temperature inside a car under direct sunlight can reach 110 degrees after 5 minutes. When a child's body temperature reaches 106 degrees, it's fatal – that child can die or suffer permanent disability from heat stroke.

"This measure will simply make it a traffic violation, not to be mistaken with a criminal charge, and violators will only be subjected to a fine - similar to our seat belt law.

"However, the violation and fine in this measure will act as a substantial deterrent to parents, caregivers, or anyone responsible for children while driving and ultimately save lives.

"I respectfully ask all Members to support the passage of HB2034. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2034, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO UNATTENDED CHILDREN IN MOTOR VEHICLES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary.
