INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

H.R. No. 53, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION URGING THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES TO AGREE TO AN ECONOMY-WIDE REDUCTION IN ITS GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS AND TO COMMIT THE UNITED STATES TO A BINDING INTERNATIONAL TREATY THAT WOULD RESULT IN A SIGNIFICANT AND RAPID GLOBAL REDUCTION IN ATMOSPHERIC GREENHOUSE GAS CONCENTRATION," was jointly offered by Representatives Morita, Awana, Belatti, Berg, Bertram, Brower, Cabanilla, Caldwell, Carroll, Ching, Chong, Green, Hanohano, Har, Ito, Karamatsu, Lee, Luke, Manahan, McKelvey, Mizuno, Nishimoto, M. Oshiro, B. Oshiro, Pine, Rhoads, Saiki, Say, Shimabukuro, Sonson, Souki, Takai, Takumi, Tokioka, Tsuji, Wakai, Waters, Yamane, Yamashita, Chang, Evans, Finnegan, Magaoay, Nakasone, Sagum, Takamine and Thielen.

Representative Morita moved that H.R. No. 53 be adopted, seconded by Representative Carroll.

Representative Morita rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support of this Resolution. Mr. Speaker, it's our country's moral duty to act. The world's leading climate scientists are telling us we have a narrow window to act to avert the most severe impacts of global climate change. Given what we know today about climate change, history will judge us harshly if we choose as a nation, inaction.

"In the 1930s Winston Churchill wrote to those leaders who refused to acknowledge the clear and present danger of the gathering storm in Europe at that time and he wrote: 'The era of procrastination, of half-measures, of soothing and baffling expedients of delays is coming to a close. In its place, we are entering a period of consequences.' "We are entering a period of consequences with global climate change. It is time for our federal government to take responsibility. So I ask the Members for their support with this Resolution. Thank you."

Representative Meyer rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This Resolution was brought to me, and I chose not to sign it. I'm not going to vote for this. I am going to vote no, and I would ask permission to insert remarks in the Journal."

Representative Meyer's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to HR53 Regarding Greenhouse Gases. The advocates for this Resolution and others like it believe that the science is out on global warming. That there is consensus amongst the scientific community that global warming is mostly man-made. Well, Mr. Speaker, attached are the names of 100 scientists who are skeptical about that theory. They believe, as I do, that global warming is a natural phenomenon that has more to do with the sun's solar activities than man's industrial activity. In fact, some of them believe that the greatest source of greenhouse gas is the world's oceans. And this, along with the sun's solar activity, is having a greater effect on our climate than man-made activity.

"Can science be incorrect? Absolutely! After all, in the early and mid-70s, scientists were warning us about massive global cooling. They told us that we were on the precipice of a new Ice Age. But that didn't happen. In the late 90s, we were warned about the looming disaster of Y2k. The 'experts' told us that there would be massive blackouts, social and financial disaster because of a computer dating glitch that had to be fixed. Well, the 'experts' were wrong. At a minute past midnight January 1, 2000, the world held its breath for a second until we realized that the lights were still on.

"Mr. Speaker, the climate change 'experts' may be wrong again. And if you listen to them, what will it cost us? If we are required to reduce our CO2 emissions to 20% below what they were in 1990, what will happen to our economy and standard of living? Mr. Speaker, that cost will be too high. I urge my colleagues to vote 'no.'

Representative Marumoto rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I will be voting with reservations on this particular measure. I did not feel that the United States should subject themselves to United Nations' guidelines. I think we should determine our own rate of reducing our carbon footprint. I think it's a necessary direction to go, and I just do not feel that we should give away our self-determination. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise with reservations. I think the authors should be commended. This is very, very timely in that we have the world's 18 largest and most-developed countries here in Honolulu as we speak. I think the Resolution has some well-taken points except it forgets one thing, and that is the reason why the people are here in town is because this all started in Bali when the President said, 'Let us cut greenhouse gases.'

"Where this Resolution fails is where it says, and it forgets that there are those countries that are not yet developed that will also be able to develop. So there are many millions of people who are dying of hunger or dying of disease of which this Resolution says, 'For we developed countries, let's go for it.' But for those others, who many in this Chamber often decry their poor state of being, and having been a Peace Corps volunteer in the jungles of some of those countries, I know that that is the priority as much as it is for we developed countries.

"Let's not forget the poor. Let's not forget the downtrodden, the hunger, the disease in the world. That's the reality of climate change, so these other countries can raise their standards. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Bertram rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Yes, I rise in support of this Resolution. I commend the introducers for having the courage to put it forth. And I also urge that we not just urge the President look to reducing greenhouse gases, but individually we need to look to ourselves as well.

"So I ask all of the Members to really think about: Number one, walking and biking, which will help eliminate that. Number two, skip the burger, because the next big contributor are cow farts and burps. That is one of the major sources of greenhouse gases being emitted. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 53, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION URGING THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES TO AGREE TO AN ECONOMY-WIDE REDUCTION IN ITS GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS AND TO COMMIT THE UNITED STATES TO A BINDING INTERNATIONAL TREATY THAT WOULD RESULT IN A SIGNIFICANT AND RAPID GLOBAL REDUCTION IN ATMOSPHERIC GREENHOUSE GAS CONCENTRATION" was adopted.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Representative Shimabukuro: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I just want to announce that today at 3:00 in the Auditorium, the Health and Human Services Committee is holding an informational briefing regarding the tragic deaths of Cyrus Belt and Janel Tupuola and the other domestic violence victims that we've had in the State. In addition to having health officials, human service officials, we've invited law enforcement officials.

"I really want to urge any Member, especially the Judiciary Committee, Public Safety Committee members, and anyone else who's interested to come. I know that there's a lot of scheduling conflicts and it's a tough time. I know that a lot of these questions really do fall more on law enforcement oftentimes, rather than the human service and health area, although we all need to work together.

"So please come. Again it's 3:00 today in the Auditorium regarding Cyrus Belt and Janel Tupuola, and *mahalo* to the Health Committee for really setting this up. Thank you."

Representative Chong: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to congratulate one of our colleagues from the Hilo/Kurtistown area on another year here with us on his birthday. Happy birthday and many more to come to the gentleman from Hilo and Kurtistown. Thank you."

Representative Tsuji: "Aloha and mahalo."

Representative Berg: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd just like to make two announcements in light of the Representative from Kauai's Resolution. Today and tomorrow, representatives from 16 of the largest greenhouse gas producing countries are meeting in Honolulu at the University to discuss the international agreement addressing global warming pollution and Hawaii's susceptibility to this.

"The Hawaii Blue Line Project is Hawaii students drawing a line on greenhouse gas emissions and are encouraging all of us to join them at the Old Stadium Park from 3:30 to 5:30. The purpose of this project is to demonstrate to the delegates, and to us and media, the seriousness of what can happen to the Waikiki and Moili'ili and McCully area.

"Equally of interest to colleagues is this evening at 7:30 at the University, there is a UH climate change teach-in and this is a fast-paced, interactive forum focusing on climate change predictions and solutions. So if there are still questions that many of us have, this is a good opportunity to go and find out. Thank you."
