The House of Representatives of the Twenty-Fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2009, convened at 6:40 o'clock p.m., with Vice Speaker Magaoay presiding.

The invocation was delivered by Representative Rida Cabanilla, after which the Roll was called showing all Members present with the exception of Representatives Bertram and Takai, who were excused.

By unanimous consent, reading and approval of the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Fifty-Seventh Day was deferred.

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGES

The following messages from the Governor (Gov. Msg. Nos. 325 and 326) were received and announced by the Clerk and were placed on file:

Gov. Msg. No. 325, dated May 1, 2009, informing the House that on April 30, 2009, pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the State Constitution, the following bill became law without her signature, stating:

"Dear Mr. Speaker and Members of the House:

Re: Senate Bill No. 1108

On April 30, 2009, Senate Bill No. 1108, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to Native Hawaiians" became law without my signature, pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the State Constitution.

The purpose of this bill is to extend from June 30, 2009 to June 30, 2011 the sunset date for the operation of the Aha Kiole Advisory Committee.

This Committee was established in 2007 to initiate a process for using indigenous best practices in managing State natural resources. This Administration supports the concepts embodied in the original bill which called for the adoption of traditional, community-based natural resource management techniques.

Unfortunately, the actual operations of the Committee have strayed from the original intent, to the extent that certain Native Hawaiian organizations are calling for the Committee to be abolished.

The concerns with this bill are twofold. First, it fails to address the need for a larger cross-section of the native Hawaiian community to be represented on the membership. Act 212 established a membership selection process that required the Governor to select names submitted by only one umbrella organization. There are many groups and individuals in the Native Hawaiian community who care deeply about the preservation and restoration of our ecosystems. It is unfortunate that the membership has come from only one portion of that community and no efforts were made to expand that membership in this bill.

Second, there is a growing concern about the focus and positions that this Advisory Committee has taken. The Committee has taken official stances on issues that appear to be outside of the scope of its intended jurisdiction, which are the natural resources of the State of the Hawaii. The Advisory Committee has weighed in on the issue of fisheries management in jurisdictions outside of this state, affecting other countries and their ability to oversee their own resources. Further, the Committee has acted in a manner that masks its advisory nature, blurring the lines between advising others and taking positions independent of the State or the Department of Land and Natural Resources. Again, this bill to extend the Committee fails to redefine and clarify the matters that the Committee should address.

This measure does not include an appropriation for the Advisory Committee. I believe it is incumbent upon the Legislature to review the sources of support the Aha Kiole Advisory Committee has used and determine if those sources have compromised the independence or objectivity of the Committee.

For the foregoing reasons, I allowed Senate Bill No. 1108 to become law as Act 39, effective April 30, 2009, without my signature.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTION

The following House Concurrent Resolution was received and read by the Clerk:

H.C.R. No. 313, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION RELATING TO RECESS AND SESSION DAYS OF THE REGULAR SESSION OF 2009," was jointly offered by Representatives Say, Evans, Magaoay and B. Oshiro.

ADOPTION

Representative B. Oshiro moved that H.C.R. No. 313, be adopted, seconded by Representative Evans.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Yes, Mr. Speaker. I rise to speak against the Resolution. Mr. Speaker, there is only one purpose for extending this Session, and that's so the Democrat Majority will be in a position to override Governor Linda Lingle's vetoes of tax measures. I oppose this extension, Mr. Speaker, and I believe that we should allow Governor Lingle to have her chance to veto measures, and we should live with that result.

"The taxes on our people are going to be very onerous. She's aware of that, and I don't like us to set up this Body to set forth an override of her vetoes."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I also rise in opposition to this measure. Mr. Speaker, time management experts tell us that a task either expands or contracts, according to the amount of time that you give it. The people of Hawaii have given us 60 days to do our business. We have a budget. In fact, we just came out of the Conference Committee that said, I think in the words of the President of the Senate, 'We have a budget surplus.' So, the biggest job that we were sent here to do, we've done.

"Now, is it because we don't have enough time to combat the Governor who said unequivocally, 'We can balance the budget without cutting jobs. We can balance the budget without raising taxes.' If we are extending to refute that, I think it's a futility. For those reasons, I oppose this motion."

Representative B. Oshiro rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support. Very briefly, I just want to rebut some of those comments. First and foremost, just to rebut this argument about time expanding or contracting. Let's be honest, all we're doing is really adding one calendar day. I think in these budgetary times, where we are crunched with some significant pressures, adding one legislative day is not really too much to ask, especially when we are looking at what the actual cost to this Body will be. And that will not be very excessive, because the Speaker has already said, unfortunately, our staff will be ending on the originally stated date of May 7th. And so if there are any costs for that one additional legislative day, it will be very minimal.

"Secondly, the argument about a surplus that will be carried over. I think that's a mischaracterization. If anything, Senator Kim said it was a slim, very slim surplus that we may have. And all of that is extremely contingent on every single one of these tax revenue proposals passing. If they don't pass, at that point, our budget falls apart. It's all out of kilter. It's all out of whack. And so, at that point, we need every single one of these measures to pass.

"Thirdly, this is about the balance and separation of powers. This is about checks and balances. And, they may not like the fact that there's a 2/3 majority in this Chamber that can override the Governor's veto, but that's the way it works. That's the way government works. There are checks and balances. We don't have to just abide by what one person decides is best for this State. Instead, it's a collective decision made by the 51 House Members and the 25 Members in the other Chamber. Thank you."

Representative Pine rose, stating:

"I just wanted a point of clarification, please. Yes, I was in that committee hearing where Senator Kim did speak, and we do have a recording of it. And, what she said was, with the tax increases, the many program cuts and layoffs, we will have enough money to make up for our budget shortfall, plus a surplus."

Representative Finnegan rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I just wanted you to note my opposition to the extension, as well as just short comments. We've all been very careful with the timing of this Session, and I guess I'm also just curious as to why, knowing that we had less than nine days for the Governor to veto, and we needed an extension, why couldn't we have at least tried to do that business 10 days before the Session is over? And so, that would be my question to, I guess the Body, or to leadership. Could have done it with careful planning since it was just one overnight day with that particular bill.

"Mr. Speaker, I do speak in opposition because I voted against all those tax measures. I believe that, just like everyone out there in the public that has to deal with living within their means, I think we should do as well. Thank you."

Representative Marumoto rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Yes, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. I think it's bad enough to vote once to raise taxes, but to vote to override a veto of a tax increase is to vote twice for the same tax increase. I think it's doubly wrong. Thank you."

Representative B. Oshiro rose to a point of order, stating:

"Point of order, Mr. Speaker. We're not talking about the bills yet. This is just about the Resolution. Can we just focus on the Resolution? Thank you."

Representative Ching rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Rhoads rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. I just want to say that if the Governor doesn't veto the bills, then we can go sine die on Thursday. Thank you."

Representative Thielen rose to respond, stating:

"Bingo, Mr. Speaker. Bingo. That's exactly the point. There's no question why this extension is being requested and pushed through by the Democrat Majority. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.C.R. No. 313, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION RELATING TO RECESS AND SESSION DAYS OF THE REGULAR SESSION OF 2009," was adopted, with Representatives Ching, Finnegan, Marumoto, Thielen and Ward voting no, and with Representatives Bertram, Souki and Takai being excused.

"Yes, Mr. Speaker. I would like to rise in support of this very memorable area in my district. Thank you."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in strong support."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.C.R. No. 183, SD 1, entitled: "SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION URGING FULL PRESERVATION OF THE WORLD WAR II HONOULIULI INTERNMENT CAMP AS A NATIONAL MONUMENT, MUSEUM, AND RESTORED MEMORIAL PARK FOR THE STATE OF HAWAII," was adopted, with Representatives Bertram, Say, Souki and Takai being excused.

Representative Ching's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in strong support of S.C.R. 138. The Falls of Clyde has a rich history and is one of the few remaining man built jewels of old Hawaii. She was launched in 1878 from Scotland and serves as a reminder of all the great contributions the Scotts have been making to Hawaii since their arrival in the late 1700's. The Falls of Clyde serviced the residents of Hawaii by carrying sugar from Hilo to San Francisco and in 1900 an act of Congress allowed the ship to fly both the U.S. and Hawaiian flag. Over the years tens of thousands of people have toured the Falls of Clyde and in 1989 she was named a National Historic Monument by the National Parks Service.

"This piece of legislation has been long overdue and as the founder of the Heritage Caucus I am very proud to have sponsored this measure on the House side. To have the Legislature recognize the historic importance of this distinguished ship is quite an exceptional accomplishment. As a result of this legislation we will be able to preserve and protect this ship for many years to come so that people of Hawaii can prosper both culturally and financially. Thank you."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.C.R. No. 138, SD 1, entitled: "SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE STATE TO RECOGNIZE THE HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE OF THE FALLS OF CLYDE AS A SAILING SYMBOL OF HAWAII," was adopted, with Representatives Bertram, Say, Souki and Takai being excused.

Representative Manahan, for the Committee on Tourism, Culture, & International Affairs presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1906) recommending that S.C.R. No. 152, SD 1, be adopted.

Representative B. Oshiro moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.C.R. No. 152, SD 1, be adopted, seconded by Representative Evans.

Representative Ching rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ching's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in strong support to S.C.R. 152. As founder of the Heritage Caucus I believe this measure will be a valuable asset in the effort to secure Iolani Palace as a World Heritage Site. Being a World Heritage Site will raise the global awareness of Iolani Palace and in-turn will attract more visitors to Hawaii. I believe attracting more visitors to Hawaii during these economic times is vital to helping the tourism industry and our economy and I am in full support of this measure. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.C.R. Filing Deadline

Prior to the convening of the 2009 session, the Senate President and I prepared an internal legislative timetable, setting May 1st as the last day to file fiscal bills to deck for Final Reading. A few weeks ago the President and I signed the Conference Committee Guidelines that provides, in paragraph 11(c) that all Conference Committee reports shall be filed by 11:30 p.m. on Friday, May 1st.

As you know, several measures were being negotiated throughout the evening. Several Conference Committees, even though they had reached agreement on the substance of these measures, did not have the time to prepare and adequately review the reports and the final form of the Conference Drafts prior to the filing deadline.

Therefore, the President and I are exercising our powers under Rule 13 of the Conference Committee Guidelines, to make an exception to this deadline for the bills that were agreed to and voted upon this evening.

The President and I are granting this exception to provide the Conference members with an opportunity to ensure that the Conference Committee reports and the Conference drafts reflect the agreements reached on the evening of May 1st.

The President and I felt that since the Conferees had reached timely agreement on these bills, allowing these bills to die based on an internal procedural deadline for filing paperwork with the Clerks' Offices, is not in the best interest of the people of Hawaii.

For the bills agreed to and voted on this evening, the Clerks of the respective Chambers shall accept Conference drafts between 12:00 noon and 1:00 p.m. tomorrow Saturday, May 2nd.

I wish to emphasize that previous Legislatures, when facing similar problems in past years, have followed the same procedure we will follow with these measures."
