"Mr. Speaker, in opposition with a brief comment, please. Mr. Speaker, one of our roles is to encourage the entrepreneurial spirit, not dampen it or kill it. This bill basically makes accountants out of lemonade stands, swap meet personnel, etc. The difficulty I have with it is that three or four years ago we passed a bill that says, we're going to go after everybody who does business and they're going to have to give receipts and they've got to keep records. We said okay, but don't let it go 'gestapo'. And what they did was drew the line at nine receipts or nine transactions per day.

"This bill in the committee was based upon the testimony that, well they're just saying they did nine or they did under ten. Basically, the testimony personified the anti-business, we're not open for business attitude in the State of Hawaii. The unfortunate thing is that some businesses only do a few transactions per day and the way it is put now, the casual sales, just makes it look like we're out to get everybody.

"Lastly, let me say this. There are some big fish out there to fry that have over a billion dollars of outstanding payments due to the Department of Taxation. If we add in the cash economy of drugs, there's probably another billion. We've got \$2 billion of big fish to fry, which we're not going after but we're going to pass a bill like this and go after the small guys. Mr. Speaker, it's penny-wise and pound-foolish the way we're going after these cash economy guys. We need to encourage entrepreneurship, not discourage it by putting all these restrictions. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Yamane rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Oshiro rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Lee rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, in support. I'd like to just note that the EDF fee has been purposed by the Legislature in 1994 to recycle glass and give that money to the counties so they're able to ship it off and pay for that.

"Since that time 15 years ago, the dollar, of course, has declined in value so that what was then a dollar is now today roughly 65 cents. At the same time shipping costs, oil and everything else related to this have gone up through the roof to the extent that counties have had to actually increase the fee already. Today should we not act we would potentially leave this program as an unfunded mandate for the counties and at the same time force them to dispose of glass in our landfills or find other, alternative methods which are going to be equally costly or have other unintended effects.

"So, I would note that this bill actually is blanked out in its amounts as it goes on to the Committee on Finance for further discussion. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. Again, very briefly in support and I'd just like to note that it's so rare that we actually have coalitions between the building industry, between developers, between the environmental community and everybody else here in government. This has been one of those examples where you have a task force come together over the last several years which have come up with consensus solutions to be able to fund the review of environmental review documents so that things are timely processed, that projects can move ahead quickly.

"This is one of those that had unanimous support including that from the Building Industry Association and others, and we are here today to move this forward as it goes forward to the Committee on Finance for further discussion. Thank you very much."

Representative Kawakami rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support with very slight reservations and I would like to explain why. Just as a tracking for the conversation in the next committee, I noticed that money is being used from this fund to support and maintain technology systems for the office. However, we are undergoing a major infusion of capital into OIMT for the very same purpose and my concern is we could be having duplicative efforts here. So maybe just as the conversation moves forward, that they would look to OIMT and their initiatives to cover those expenses. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations and brief comments. Two slippery slopes, Mr. Speaker. One is special funds. Everybody knows my colleague in the Senate will never vote for a special fund because basically, and as the Tax Foundation indicates, they basically hide it from investigative and oversight on the legislative process. 30% of our funds up into the billions are in the special fund areas already.

"What we're doing here, we're taking another step to saying, look if you use government that you've already paid for, we want you to go on a fee by fee basis. Mr. Speaker, we have talked about core services after we had a \$3 billion deficit a number of years ago. Is our core service where every vote that we take on this Floor we should be given a, what's the per diem, 5 cents every time we vote, or every time we stand up to speak, you probably fine us a dollar or something.

"But the point is, doing our job is government, is doing our job is government. We get on this second slippery slope, it's going to create what we've already done with the special funds which are really already out of control. If we say everybody's got to charge a fee for doing what otherwise we pay them for, I don't think that's going to end up being good governance at all, Mr. Speaker. So I think we should proceed very cautiously. Thank you."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative McDermott rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, second time. Reading the Committee Report, there were five reservations in one of the committees, which I find troubling. Then if you read it, it says, number A, 'support and maintain technology systems for the Office.' Well, we already had the Representative from Maui address his slight reservation regarding that. We're not sure if the left hand knows what the right hand is doing with an overall technological reformation throughout the state.

"Second thing is, 'support outreach, training, education, and research regarding environmental stewardship.' Don't we have enough of that, Mr. Speaker? I can't walk down the street without hearing something about the environment. Everything is about the environment. We need more and we need to hire more people? Grow government just to do that, Mr. Speaker? I disagree. Then of course we have to 'provide for the hiring of adequate staff for the Office,' so they can do this environmental outreach training research. You can't turn on the TV without being inundated with pro-environmentalists, because here in Hawaii we're selling our good looks. That's how we sustain ourselves. We have enough of that.

"Then of course you establish fees to enhance activities of the office and the council and appropriate funds. I mean, this is not needed. This is not a core service. This is not something we need. A lot of times these stakeholders won't partner with us because they're afraid we're going to put something worse in front of them. Thank you, sir."

Representative Fukumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. I would just point out that OEQC has been very underfunded for a long time and it's not just general outreach we're talking about. We're talking about outreach to agencies to help agency employees understand the Chapter 343 process which will make it run more smoothly and save everybody money in the long term. That's all, thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and S.B. No. 1143, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE OFFICE OF ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY CONTROL," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Cabanilla, Fale and McDermott voting no.

Representative Takai: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. At the appropriate time I'd like to ask for a moment of silence. Today marks the 10th year since the Iraq War began, on March 20th, 2003, local Iraqi time, or March 19, 2003, Hawaii time. Many service members and civilians have sacrificed their lives over the last decade to protect the basic freedoms that allow me and you to stand in front of everyone today. About 4,500 US service members have been killed in Iraq along with about 3,500 contract workers.

"This number hits home. Colleagues, as you know, we created the Hawaii Medal of Honor for military personnel with Hawaii ties killed in action. Since the war began we have awarded 327 medals to families of our military heroes. Let's honor them today and let's honor their families with this moment of silence. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."
