KA HUA 'ŌLELO O KA LĀ HAWAIIAN WORD FOR THE DAY

"And so in the light of some of our efforts to help the language of this land to continue, *E ola mau ka 'olelo Hawai'i*."

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Strong reservations. Thank you very much."

No. 2046, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MILITARY LAND," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Water & Land, with Representative Jordan voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Thielen being excused.

Representative McDermott rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Weak reservations, Mr. Speaker. I look forward to sitting in the introducer's committee and hearing more about it. My concern is the nexus to any misdemeanor and the round number of the fine. It is a problem. Last year we had 1,400, that's a low number, as high as 1,900 cases of people downloading child pornography and only seven arrests. They can't arrest them because there's not enough people. So this measure clearly is needed, and I support the chair and his intent. I just want a little more clarity. Thank you."

Representative Jordan rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Reservations, and I hope we can get some of the little issues that I have with this measure cleaned up in Judiciary and I look forward to seeing what comes out of there. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1516, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ASSESSMENT OF THE INTERNET CRIMES AGAINST CHILDREN FEE AGAINST CRIMINAL DEFENDANTS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary, with Representatives Jordan and McDermott voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Thielen being excused.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. I just wanted to say, the three groups heavily affected by the lack of electrical infrastructure are homeless shelters, businesses, and many, many residents. So, this is very important, and I wanted to commend the introducers and the supporters of this bill. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2047, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representative Thielen being excused.

Representative Yamane, for the Committee on Water & Land, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 30-16) recommending that H.B. No. 2037 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Tourism.

On motion by Representative Saiki, seconded by Representative Evans and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2037, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE WORLD CONSERVATION CONGRESS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Tourism, with Representative Thielen being excused.

Representative Yamane, for the Committee on Water & Land, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 31-16) recommending that H.B. No. 2036, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative Saiki, seconded by Representative Evans and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2036, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONSERVATION DISTRICTS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary, with Representative Thielen being excused.

Representative Yamane, for the Committee on Water & Land, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 32-16) recommending that H.B. No. 2097, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Housing. On motion by Representative Saiki, seconded by Representative Evans and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2097, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC HOUSING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Housing, with Representative Thielen being excused.

Representative Belatti, for the Committee on Health, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 33-16) recommending that H.B. No. 1673, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Saiki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1673, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Evans.

Representative McDermott rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, a no vote and a brief comment. This is a healthcare bill that really intrudes government into the private sector. Essentially it says, if you are going to sell medical equipment, you have got to do a mother may I, and be licensed, as my colleague just said, for \$300 just to sell medical equipment. You've got to have your telephone system available at a certain time of the day, you've got to have a suggestion box and a way of complaint. Mr. Speaker, this looks to be overburdensome.

"And by the way, for the authors of the bill, on page 5 there is a grammatical error that doesn't make sense.

"So, Mr. Speaker, the solution to all of these things, and it's a long and tried solution, it's called competition. When people are not delivering what you want, somebody else is going to do it quicker, better and cheaper, and instead of coming to the Legislature and complaining and making a bill to where we insert ourselves into the business now of healthcare, tomorrow it's going to be, well, we want you to be able to have your restaurants in Waikiki serve a particular food, which because of certain ethnic or religious groups you are not serving, therefore you will serve it.

"This has gone for the last eight or ten years to the extreme, and now we're jumping on that bandwagon, Mr. Speaker. Competition is the solution, not telling these guys to be on the telephone at a certain time of day or not saying that there are certain ways that you're going to conduct your business. Let the private sector be the private sector. Let us be government and be the referee, not down on the playing field. Thank you, sir."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you. In support, Mr. Speaker. This bill has been drafted because of a federal mandate under the ACA, which says you have to buy durable medical equipment at the lowest price possible, no matter the location. Which is great if you live on the mainland, Mr. Speaker, and have access to markets and delivery systems and trucking. But when you're in Hawaii, you are now dependent upon a company that is going to be able to ship on time and get the products to the very people who need it, many of our seniors and those in hospitals who need it.

"The reason why this bill is introduced, Mr. Speaker, is because these companies are falling short. The equipment is not showing up. Telephone hours, they're calling, they're not answering. Now somebody who needs this equipment to get out of the hospital doesn't have it. And that's why this bill is introduced, is to try to find a way so that if we are forced to do the ACA competitive bidding, that we have the ability to make sure that the products that our seniors and others need are actually delivered. So, that's why I am in support of the bill. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I want to thank the Chair of Consumer Protection for adding that footnote and actually reinforcing the fact, for those of us who think Obamacare is not successful, this is exactly the reason why it is not successful, because of the way it's carrying itself in this part of inserting itself into the private marketplace. Even Amazon can get here in a day or two. If there's nobody out there in the private sector on the mainland who can't service us, that means the whole private sector is lacking, and ACA is not the solution to the private sector of the United States of America. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1673, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH CARE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives McDermott and Ward voting no, and with Representative Thielen being excused.

Representative Hashem, for the Committee on Housing, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 34-16) recommending that H.B. No. 2243, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Saiki, seconded by Representative Evans and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2243, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FIRE SPRINKLERS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Thielen being excused.
