"A no vote please, brief comment. I think that, because we always talk about cost of living, so many people depend on online sales in order to kind of offset that, especially Amazon Prime, which is amazing. And I just wanted to say that the Chamber of Commerce weighed in and said that it'll level the playing field, but we could also level it by repealing the GE for local businesses, and I support that, so I just want to thank the introducer and compliment him on his beautiful hair. Thank you."

Representative McDermott rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, no vote and brief comment, please. Mr. Speaker, I call this the big brother retail bill. It's come back to visit us again, and I know the Representative from Manoa is very fond of it. However, it's come up and went down a number of times, and primarily for a couple of reasons.

"The first is that it's borderline privacy for the sake of getting more taxation, and there's a number of issues in the courts which will decide this. Not that they should be getting a free ride, but that eventually this is going to be decided, and the more we allow savings to the State, where the cost of living is the highest in the nation, the better our constituents are, Mr. Speaker.

"The other reason is that, we keep saying this is going to even the playing field. Well, having been a retailer before I was in office, 15 years in Waikiki, any time anybody came to our store or called our store or visited our store or re-visited our store, and we sent the product to the mainland, there's an exemption on the GET tax form that says you don't have to pay the GE tax. So the playing field is even in the sense that every retailer in Hawaii can sell to the market on the mainland, which is even bigger than our market, and they don't have to pay taxes, but they're complaining about people on the mainland who are selling here, and they have to pay taxes.

"It's an even playing field because everybody who's in business should by now, and if they're not, they're not a real retailer, everybody should be on the Internet. Everybody should be doing on-line sales.

"Other than that, Mr. Speaker, the speaker of my house says, leave my Amazon Prime alone. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Choy rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. This bill merely helps the collection of taxes that are already due. It is not a new tax, it's a tax that's already old. And I think I said this many, many years ago, that the people who oppose this type of legislation to help collect taxes that are already due are called tax cheats. But I'm not accusing my good friend from Hawaii Kai to be a tax cheat, but maybe he just misunderstands the term.

"But again, colleagues, we need the taxes from internet sales. The state tax director, in a Finance hearing, said the collection of general excise taxes from retail stores were flat. Unfortunately, she had no clue on why that was, and I told her, have you heard of a company called Amazon? So hopefully she's listening, and she knows that about 40% of our sales, our holiday sales, now are done online.

"If we continue not to collect these taxes, then guys, we're going to have to get a tax increase to make up for it, our schools will suffer, human services will suffer. How are we going to do this? This bill merely helps collect the taxes that are due. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Matsumoto rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"After that wonderful speech, no vote, please."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 398, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives Fukumoto, Matsumoto, McDermott, Thielen, Tupola and Ward voting no.

Representative Ing, for the Committee on Ocean, Marine Resources, & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 28) recommending that H.B. No. 910 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Education.

On motion by Representative Saiki, seconded by Representative Evans and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 910, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE OFFICE OF HAWAIIAN EDUCATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Education.

Representative Ing, for the Committee on Ocean, Marine Resources, & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 29) recommending that H.B. No. 908 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Water & Land.

Representative Saiki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 908 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Water & Land, seconded by Representative Evans.

Representative LoPresti rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative DeCoite rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 908, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE RIGHT OF FIRST REFUSAL FOR THE DISPOSITION OF REMNANTS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Water & Land, with Representatives DeCoite and LoPresti voting aye with reservations.

Representative Ing, for the Committee on Ocean, Marine Resources, & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 30) recommending that H.B. No. 451 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative Saiki moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 451 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Representative Evans.

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, strong support. Mr. Speaker, I know there's a rather high threshold to stand up and speak on second reading, but this bill is a 96-yearold bill, if you will, in the sense that, in 1920, the U.S. Congress approved the Hawaiian Homes Act. It said that with 200,000 acres we will return some land to the Hawaiians which was either taken or stolen or otherwise they were displaced.

"Unfortunately, after 96 years of this act, there are only about 9,600 leases that have been given, and there are 27,000 on the waitlist for a home. We have a report that there's just about 57,000 Hawaiians left who are eligible for Hawaiian homes.

"What this bill does, for the descendants of those on the land, allows for their blood quantum to go from 25% down to 1/32nd. It allows the Hawaiians to stay on the land, which is very important, which basically if you look at it has been a broken promise for the last 96 years, Mr. Speaker. This is a very compassionate, economic, social, political, cultural bill, of which I'm hoping will just be the beginning, that we will roll back all of these things that have been promised to the Hawaiians that have never been given, Mr. Speaker. This is one small step. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Reservations. I fear that this can favor the haves over the have-nots, the lessees over those who have been waiting, 27,000 people still waiting. That's why. Thanks."

Representative DeCoite rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support. This bill is to address the selling of lands that evade the list, and the reason why that has happened is because of the blood quantum and the successorship. It is in no means to get away from that list of people that are there, because when you start running out of blood quantum, you start to sell it so that you can find money to put a fee simple down on other land, and to remove these Native Hawaiians from those lands. For those reasons, I'm in strong support of this bill. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ing rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. I just want to *mahalo* my fellow Representative from Maui for introducing this bill and being a stalwart advocate for DHHL. I also want to say that my original concerns were that this sort of measure may pit beneficiaries against waitlisters. From working on this bill for two years now, we see that that's simply not the case.

"If you talk to a waitlister, nobody wants to get their homesteads awarded to them by displacing other Hawaiian families. I've never seen that once so far, and it doesn't make sense. These are homes that are established, they've raised their kids there, it's full of stuff. What we need to do is build more homes for everyone, if we want to address the waitlist problem. So what happens is, after they can't hand it down, it doesn't even go to a waitlister, it usually ends up going out to sale, or for some other purpose, and that's very unfortunate.

"The other criticism was that it was the intent of the homesteads act to rehabilitate Native Hawaiians so they can re-integrate after a couple of generations into the American capitalist system. I do not think that was Prince Kuhio's intent. In fact, it was to set aside land in order to perpetuate Hawaiian culture for future generations. These families that have been living on these plots of land are still practicing traditional ways of living, and we as a body should not be displacing them.

"Lastly, the whole system of blood quantum was created to be unsustainable. There's a good book about it called Hawaiian Blood, written as a dissertation I think by Blaisdell a few years ago, and I encourage everyone to read it where, it's a system that's designed to, as generations go on, that ultimately you're going to have to give up your land.

"As long as there's portions of land set aside for Hawaiians, then we should make sure that it doesn't really matter how much blood quantum somebody has. If they can trace their lineage back to pre-colonial days and have a commitment to perpetuating our lifestyle, then, by all means, they should be awarded the land. Nowadays, we have a few folks that are homesteaders that want to see their grandchildren take over their land and continue their way of life. *Aloha.*"

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. Permission to enter the comments of the Representative from Molokai as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Tupola continued, stating:

"And just a brief comment, I wanted to *mahalo* also the Representative from Maui for his work and his insight on the bill. I think the blood quantum and the successorship issue has long needed to be addressed, because eventually it will phase out Hawaiians from owning their own lands. And so I'm glad to see this bill pushed along, and I'm glad that whatever issues were there have been worked out. And I do agree that no Hawaiian wants to displace another one, but we want to see more housing, so that we can keep the land and keep the people from Hawaii here on their own land. Thank you."

Representative San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I, like the Representative from Ewa Beach, in the last session, was also concerned. In my district I've actually seen Hawaiians where the birth certificate says 100%, pure. I also was concerned as to whether or not it is the waitlisters versus the homesteaders, and it was only after I started talking to my constituents-"

At 12:31 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:32 o'clock p.m.

Representative San Buenaventura continued, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Basically, I also have the concerns of the Representative of Ewa Beach. I am not Hawaiian. My constituents, I have a huge constituent base who are Hawaiians, and I did talk to them. And like my fellow Representative from Ewa Beach, I was concerned about these huge waitlists. But the Representative from Kihei's remarks, as well as the Representative from Molokai's remarks, resounded in my constituent bases.

"They were concerned that the property that they end up having to mortgage because they're building these houses are not being passed on. They are being forced to sell, and they are being forced to sell to people who are not on the waitlist to get the highest and best price, so that they would be able to move on. And I agree that there needs to be something done with the waitlist. We need to cut that waitlist down. However, it should not be on the backs of the people who have to put on the mortgage to put on these houses, and for these reasons, I am in support."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 451, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAIIAN HOMES COMMISSION ACT," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary, with Representative LoPresti voting aye with reservations.

At this time, the Chair stated:

"For the edification of the members, these bills are short form bills, to recommit the short form bills, so purely a procedural motion."

Representative Creagan, for the Committee on Agriculture, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 31) recommending that H.B. No. 774, as amended in HD 1, be recommitted to the Committee on Agriculture.

On motion by Representative Saiki, seconded by Representative Evans and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 774, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURE," was recommitted to the Committee on Agriculture.

Representative Creagan, for the Committee on Agriculture, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 32) recommending that H.B. No. 775, as amended in HD 1, be recommitted to the Committee on Agriculture.

On motion by Representative Saiki, seconded by Representative Evans and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 775, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURE," was recommitted to the Committee on Agriculture.

Representative Creagan, for the Committee on Agriculture, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 33) recommending that H.B. No. 776, as amended in HD 1, be recommitted to the Committee on Agriculture.

On motion by Representative Saiki, seconded by Representative Evans and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 776, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURE," was recommitted to the Committee on Agriculture.

Representative Creagan, for the Committee on Agriculture, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 34) recommending that H.B. No. 778, as amended in HD 1, be recommitted to the Committee on Agriculture.

On motion by Representative Saiki, seconded by Representative Evans and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 778, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURE," was recommitted to the Committee on Agriculture.
