## Wednesday, January 17, 2018

In accordance with the provisions of Article III, Section 10 of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, the House of Representatives of the Legislature of the State of Hawaii convened in Regular Session of 2018.

The Honorable Scott K. Saiki, Speaker of the House of Representatives, called the House to order at 10:03 o'clock a.m.

The Members of the House, guests and audience rose for the singing of the National Anthem followed by *Hawaii Pono'i*, which were performed by the Hokuloa Singers of Iolani School led by Director John Alexander.

H.C.R. No. 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION RELATING TO RECESS DAYS FOR THE REGULAR SESSION OF 2018," was jointly offered by Representatives Saiki and Nakashima.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Tupola and carried, H.C.R. No. 1 was adopted.

H.C.R. No. 2, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE GOVERNOR TO ADDRESS THE LEGISLATURE ASSEMBLED IN JOINT SESSION," was jointly offered by Representatives Saiki and Nakashima.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Tupola and carried, H.C.R. No. 2 was adopted.

At this time, the Speaker delivered his address, stating:

"Members, these are tumultuous times. This year, we must step up to the plate. The State of Hawaii requires leadership now, and the House of Representatives can and should provide that leadership.

"Unfortunately, one need only look to the past weekend to see a glaring instance of the inability of government at various levels to manage major issues facing our state.

"Saturday's events reinforce the importance of the role of government. It also shines light on the role of the Legislature as the policymaker and as the check on the other branches of government. It is our duty to ensure that the three branches abide by their respective constitutional duties so that we all do our jobs well.

"We rely on the executive branch to competently and efficiently implement our laws and to administer programs. This begins with basic

functions. Some of these functions must be carried out without mistakes because, when mistakes happen, the public loses confidence in all of us.

"We also rely on the Judiciary to fairly adjudicate and dispense justice. It is not the role of judges to make policy decisions from the bench. It is the Legislature's duty to set policy, and we do this with the benefit of broader public input and context.

"The legislative branch, and particularly we as the House of Representatives, begin this session with a renewed sense of purpose. The House is in a unique position to provide leadership. Part of the reason is our composition. Our 51 members are diverse, experienced and energetic. We represent some of the smallest units of government. Our members have a pulse on what real people actually think, what they do, and what they want.

"This collective insight is very powerful and should not be taken lightly. We should use this insight to be bold and creative. We should always be thinking of how to make things better.

"There are two painfully obvious challenges that confront our state. The lack of affordable housing and the increasing homeless population. They are full of complexity and competing interests that make them hard to solve. They will require commitment and courageous action, sustained over several years. But, the time to start is now.

"There is a shortage of 65,000 housing units in Hawaii. The State has set a goal of building 22,500 affordable rental units by the year 2026, and encouraging the development of housing for all income levels.

"There is a huge gap between what our working families are able to pay and the cost of building new housing in Hawaii. The State and counties must continue to partner with private and nonprofit developers to add to the affordable housing inventory and make these projects pencil out.

"To address the financing gap, we should consider increases to programs such as the Rental Housing Revolving Fund, Dwelling Unit Revolving Fund, and the Rental Assistance Revolving Fund. These programs will subsidize rents, infrastructure, and construction costs.

"For the very low income, elderly and disabled, we should upgrade our public housing inventory. We should also invest in infrastructure in areas that are conducive to such housing, including areas near the proposed rail stations.

"There are now over 7,000 homeless persons throughout the state, including 667 families. The approach to homelessness is multifaceted and requires short and long-term action. But there is a model that we can adopt. That model is Kahauiki Village.

"Kahauiki Village is an example of a successful public-private partnership that included the combined work of the State, the City, nonprofits and the private sector, some of whom had not interfaced before.

"It is a self-contained community that is comprised of 153 transitional homes, a preschool, a market, and a police meeting room. It also operates from a PV-generated battery system and is off the electric grid. This model can be extended to homeless populations with substance abuse and mental health conditions.

"One important takeaway is that Kahauiki Village represents what is possible if people and agencies at different levels work towards a common goal.

"And even as we develop more transitional housing, we must also increase law enforcement to avoid encroachment into public spaces. This encroachment affects the quality of life for all, and we must find ways to divert it.

"These are the kinds of issues that our residents are counting on us to solve. But leadership is more than solving issues.

"A year ago, President Obama said something in his farewell address to the nation that reminds me of Hawaii's situation today. He spoke of the youth, diversity and drive of Americans, and the potential that these traits offered to our country.

"But the President also offered this warning, 'that potential will be realized,' he said, 'only if our democracy works. Only if our politics reflects the decency of our people. Only if all of us, regardless of our party affiliation or particular interest, help restore the sense of common purpose that we so badly need right now.'

"The people of Hawaii are looking to us for more than problem solving. They are also looking to us to articulate and demonstrate a sense of shared purpose that calls others, calls on everyone, to join in.

"The House will play a critical role in calling people together in common purpose, but to do it, I believe that each of us must embrace three things.

"First, let's be open to reform and to challenge the status quo. We can still honor the past, but build upon the foundation that was left for us. It is okay to do things differently.

"Second, let's view challenges through the lens of those who are impacted by them. Some of the most contentious issues in Hawaii arise when people believe that government does not consider their perspective or history. We need to do better at reconciling these differences by drawing on the knowledge of all our people, including those impacted by the policies we create, to shape the path forward.

"Third, let's take a global approach to decision-making. Sometimes government is too focused on jurisdiction and turf. We need to move beyond that.

"Members, we are at a moment in history where we cannot just be stewards. This legislative session is a call to broader involvement and decisive action. We must be courageous activists because the issues facing our state are too urgent to wait. But I know that we are up to the challenge.

"This year, we will rebuild a foundation that will help many residents throughout our state. And by doing so, we will advance Hawaii's tradition of pioneering justice, fairness, and opportunity for all.

"Members, thank you and best wishes for a productive session."

The Chair then recognized Representative Tupola, the Minority Leader, to deliver remarks on behalf of the Minority Caucus:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for allowing me to give some opening day remarks. Good morning, *aloha*, to all of the House Members as well as to our friends, our families, and those members of the public that came to join us today, maybe some people who are connected via 'Ōlelo or live on social media, thank you for being with us.

"I want to thank my caucus members first and foremost, Representatives Ward, McDermott, Thielen and Matsumoto, for their continued support and collaboration. And I want to thank all of the people who have made what we do possible.

"With the events of this past weekend, it really made everyone stop and think how disconnected we are. And the events of today can help us to remember how to reconnect to our history, to our people, and to this place that we call home.

"My hope is that for the 2018 Legislature, that we can find new ways to connect. We need to find ways to connect to our committee members, to our communities, and to a lot of concerns that plague our community and affect our quality of life.

"We represent geographic areas throughout the State of Hawaii. Fifty-one of us represent these geographic areas. And it was made that way so that we could feel the everyday needs of the people at a very personal level. The connection that I'm suggesting is an energy that is made and exists between us when people's voices are heard and their opinions are valued.

"As the Minority Caucus, we are proposing to reconnect better with our communities, our counties, and our *keiki*.

"First off, we think that we could do a much better job at connecting with our communities by having more live broadcasts of our session hearings, allowing remote testimony and access to everything we do, so that people can participate. We saw this as one of the biggest needs during the special session, when people wanted to voice their concerns but yet were too far to have their voices be heard.

"This feedback that we get from people in the communities can help us make better decisions because it will help us to see things that we currently don't understand or may not be aware of.

"Two examples of this is, in Kona, they already allow remote testimony from multiple areas on the island for their city council hearings. And I know that we can do that here too. If they can do it on Hawaii Island, we can do it here to allow neighbor islanders and even people who live in far areas on this island to participate.

"The second example I can think of, increasing our communication and our connection, just last night, the director of transportation called me up, asked me to get community feedback about the contraflow that happened yesterday. Immediately I jumped on social media and we got hundreds of great comments that we're going to implement today. And that's how fast it was.

"Some of the solutions to allow remote testimony or community involvement can be free or of little cost, and it can actually happen today. And that's what we're suggesting as a caucus, is to open up these connections so that we can better serve our community members. Because the most basic, powerful way to connect to somebody is to listen. And I definitely think we can improve equal access for all the people in Hawaii.

"The second thing that we believe that we need to do is connect better to our counties. One of the things we talk about with affordable housing is the fact that it takes an exorbitant amount of time to get a permit. And people have brought it up many times that the days, the months, and the years that it takes to get a permit increase the prices of the housing inventory that we have on this island and throughout the state.

"And one of the things that we need to do is better support our counties. Because some of these vital procedures that the counties provide for us can actually improve our whole entire state. We believe that the counties have been crying out for our help, our support. And the 2015 report to the Legislature by the State-County Working Group is a great way for us to start, to read through their suggestions and implement it now. Because we believe that if we actually strengthen our counties, that these vital resources, and things as simple as a permit and the time it takes to get one, will actually improve our whole entire state.

"Lastly, we need to better connect to our *keiki*. We see that there is a changing desire to have diversity in school choice, but yet we're still lagging far behind equally funding all of our public school students. The Minority Caucus made it a priority to propose equal public school funding because it's our responsibility to make sure that we help our *keiki* to connect to future solutions and ways to embrace education.

"We have some schools that have closed down. We have other schools that are desperately looking for space. And as some of you guys are aware, just last year an under-enrolled public school partnered with a charter school that had no facilities, and now they're sharing space. But that's because we don't equally fund CIP for all public schools. And we need to, so that these public school students can have spaces. But we have all of these resources right in front of us, but if one principal didn't connect to one charter school principal and make that happen, these kids would still be without classroom spaces. I have no doubt that if we start to equally fund all of public school students, that we will see that creativity truly is from making connections.

"A true community is not just about being geographically connected to one another, it is actually feeling responsible for what happens in our community. 'Auamo kuleana, which means to shoulder our burden and take a responsibility that is ours. And it's my hope that we can do that, shoulder

the burden of our communities by better connecting to them, hearing what their needs are.

"We cannot keep doing the same thing and expect different results. In fact, we cannot keep doing the same thing 10 times, 20 times, 30 times harder and expect something else. We actually have to do something different. And by doing something different, reconnecting, allowing people remote access to us, actually jumping on social media, getting people's input so we can implement things in the state right now. Strengthening our counties, supporting them through the vital procedures and resources that they provide for us. And strengthening our *keiki*, connecting them to the resources that they need so that they can get quality education. This is going to make all the difference for our state.

"If we decide to increase these connections, we're going to see an increase in resources, we're going to see an increase in public involvement. And in events like the ones of this past weekend, it could even mean saving lives because we're better connected, and we know and we feel what happens in our communities. And then we don't react, we initiate something different.

"Our generation is tasked with creating a new vision for Hawaii, built on some of our oldest values. And we can't make this vision without our whole community, we can't do it. We may not and we should not demand unreasonable things of ourselves, but we should always demand improvement. And that's what we hope to see this session.

"Mr. Speaker, these are my thoughts. And I'm grateful for this day and hope that this session will indeed yield the reconnection that we need, not just in this House, in our body, but in our communities. Thank you."

The Chair then recognized Representative Belatti, the Majority Leader, to deliver remarks on behalf of the Majority Caucus:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for allowing me to make some opening remarks. Mr. Speaker, members, members of the public, indulge me to speak from the heart on this historic day of a new legislative session.

"Two recent events shocked me to the core. Earlier this month, two reports came out, one in the Washington Post and one in Civil Beat, reporting on the Aloha United Way report. These reports didn't tell us anything new. The Washington Post reports told us despite record low unemployment, Hawaii's population fell for just the third time since statehood in 1959.

"Civil Beat, in the Aloha United Way report, explained to us that the biggest challenge for Hawaii residents is to find a well-paying job and affordable housing in this great state. This is not new to us. We know this in our core. Many of us know and fear the day that our children may not be able to return.

"I'm happy to report, Mr. Speaker and to the members, that we are taking action though, to these very specific issues. In 2014, this legislature initiated the Early College High School Grant Program that graduated for the first time this year a student in both high school and an associates college degree within our community college system. Eleven more students are in the pipeline.

"Last year, Mr. Speaker, this legislature, the members in this body, passed the Hawaii Promise Program, a scholarship program to provide free in-state tuition for qualified University of Hawaii Community College students. This semester, 1,000 students across the state have been awarded scholarships for the 2017 fall semester. That is 1,000 students, that is 1,000 families, that is access to better paying jobs.

"Mr. Speaker, you spoke about what we will be doing on affordable housing, and I hope we will move the needle on that. So I think we are responding to the challenges ahead.

"The second event that rocked me to the core, that rocked everyone to the core, was this Saturday's events. Where were you. Did you know what you were going to do. In those 38 minutes, did you reach out to the people that you love. In those 38 minutes, Mr. Speaker, I thought about the job ahead

of us. I thought about what we do, the basic functions of government, as you spoke about.

"You're right, Mr. Speaker. People are looking at us to do the important work of this state. As you said, we are a diverse, experienced and energetic group. I would also add that we are a passionate group. We have strong opinions. We have strong viewpoints, sometimes conflicting viewpoints.

"But on this day, when you have called us to demonstrate a shared purpose, I leave you with a thought and a motto that we might live by. The words of Queen Liliuokalani, *e'onipa'a kākou*, to be steadfast, established, firm, resolute and determined. It means for me, let us put aside our differences, our party differences, our geographical differences, our age differences, and yes, even our faction differences, members. We must work and do the work of the people. *E'onipa'a kākou*. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At 9:09 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess and the House of Representatives stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair, and in accordance with House Concurrent Resolution No. 2 met in Joint Session with the Senate to receive the Governor's State of the State Address.

# JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the House of Representatives and the Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature, Regular Session of 2018, was called to order at 10:04 o'clock a.m. by the Honorable Scott K. Saiki, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

Speaker Saiki then stated:

"Members, this morning we are gathered for the Governor's State of the State Address. Although the State of the State Address is not constitutionally required, it is a tradition in our state. It is also one of the occurrences when all three branches of government assemble in the same room. This gathering is not symbolic. Rather, it is a reaffirmation of the framework of our constitutional form of government, and specifically the distribution of power between the three branches.

"The Hawaii Supreme Court has described this distribution as follows. 'While the object was to divide and allocate the sovereign power among three co-equal branches, the separate powers were not intended to operate with absolute independence.' The Constitution 'contemplates that practice will integrate the dispersed powers into a workable government. It enjoins upon its branches separateness but interdependence, autonomy but reciprocity.'

"In the Hawaii Supreme Court's own words, the constitutional framework rests upon the principle that the branches will not overstep their bounds. Each branch's respect for the others ensures a government that is workable, and therefore able, to advance the well-being of the entire state."

The Speaker then called upon Representatives Della Au Belatti and Lauren Kealohilani Matsumoto on behalf of the House of Representatives, and Senators J. Kalani English and Brickwood Galuteria on behalf of the Senate, to escort the Honorable David Y. Ige, Governor of the State of Hawaii, to the rostrum.

The Governor was presented with lei by Representative Joy A. San Buenaventura on behalf of the House of Representatives, and Senator Rosalyn H. Baker on behalf of the Senate.

The Speaker then presented to the Members of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature and the audience, the Honorable David Y. Ige, Governor of the State of Hawaii.

The Governor then addressed the Joint Session as follows:

"Speaker Saiki, President Kouchi, former governors, distinguished justices of the courts, representatives of our congressional delegation, members of the Hawaii State Legislature, elected officials, military leaders, honored guests, family and friends, good morning and *aloha*. As a new legislative session opens, I want you to know I am ready to work with you on the issues that affect us all. The state of our state is strong. We are a resilient people and the future is bright.

"As I stand before you today, I am struck by the beautiful and often challenging complexity that makes Hawaii our home. We really are the most beautiful place on earth. We are of many cultures and faiths, and we live together in greater harmony than any place in the world. People from all over the planet come here to enjoy our environment, our host culture and their gifts to all of us. The gifts of *aloha*, tolerance and respect, and the celebration of each other and our differences.

"We often need to be reminded of what makes us so special. We are one of the healthiest states in the nation. People here live longer than anywhere else in the country. We have led the nation in health insurance for decades, and in the current chaos, we stand firm in caring for each other. We have the lowest unemployment rate in the nation. We are strong financially. Our bond rating is the highest it's ever been in our history, making it possible for us to get the most bang for our buck when we borrow money. This saves the State tens of millions of dollars, allowing us to make critical investments in our schools, housing and highways.

"And we have made our voice clear. Hawaii will not stand for the hateful and hurtful policies of the Trump White House. We are doing more than any other state to stand up for what is right, such as DACA and the Paris Climate Accord, and to stop what is wrong, such as the travel ban and stopping transgender members of the military from defending our flag and our freedoms.

"And yet, so many of us are living paycheck to paycheck, relying heavily on our extended families to make ends meet. Owning a home is out of reach for many families, with housing costs rising faster than wages. Too much of our time is spent in traffic, affecting our families and quality of life. The growing gap between those doing well and those who are not should concern all of us.

"We depend too heavily on imported food and fuel, and we must find a just place in our relationship with our own history and with the people of the first nation of Hawaii. And the challenges to our island environment, such as global climate change, stare us in the face every single day.

"I honor my predecessors, former governors, and I have built on what they have done. In doing so, I affirm three truths about Hawaii and the way we govern. First, I see Hawaii as a place and a people that cherish our children, celebrate our diversity, and want a better life for the next generation. Second, I see Hawaii as a place and a people where we believe in 'ohana, we respect our kūpuna and understand that our 'āina and our ocean are critical to our quality of life. And finally, I see Hawaii as a place and a people where we still believe in the promise of Hawaii and the prospect of limitless opportunities.

"This is the legacy of our host culture, the cultures of our immigrant families, and all those who choose to call Hawaii home. We have put these values and beliefs into action to chart the course to our collective future.

"It is one thing to say our children matter. It is quite another to do something about it. We have invested more widely in classrooms than in previous years. We promised to cool 1,000 of Hawaii's hottest classrooms where soaring temperatures have hindered learning for years. I'm proud to report, with the Legislature's support, that we exceeded our original goal, and we're at 1,200 classrooms and counting.

"I also promised to empower our schools so they can focus on 21st century skills and critical learning. In meetings around the state, community members, teachers, staff and principals expressed frustration about the top-down mandates and one-size-fits-all approach to schools. And so, with more than 3,000 parents, teachers and community members from around the state,

we created a new blueprint for education. This blueprint for change is now in the hands of new DOE leadership.

"I also recognized that it is not enough to say to our teachers, 'we respect how hard you work.' That's why we've given our educators the pay raises that they have long deserved.

"Now, let's talk about housing. When we say 'ohana, we truly mean nobody gets left behind. For those who want to live in Hawaii, probably no issue is more challenging than finding a decent, affordable place to live. And probably no issue challenges us as a society more than the daily sight of those who are now living on our streets and in our parks.

"We have dedicated more money to mental health treatment and services, including to our homeless population. We have initiated the largest annual increase in production of affordable housing with thousands of new units coming to market. We're on track to meet our goal of 10,000 new housing units by 2020, with at least 40% affordable. And this session, I'm requesting \$100 million to maintain the momentum and produce more affordable homes across the state.

"It has been my firm belief that the State must remain committed to developing and delivering Hawaiian home lands to beneficiaries. In 2016, we provided \$24 million in funding to the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands. This was the highest level of funding in the department's 95-year history, and more than double what had been set aside previously. For its part, Hawaiian Home Lands has been ramping up development of vacant and turn-key lots. More than 220 lots were awarded in 2017, and that number will more than double in 2018.

"We have also worked hard with the department to spend down federal funds and identify alternative sources of revenue that can be used to sustain the agency over time. Our Housing First policy focuses on transitional housing as a way to get people into permanent housing. The New Kakaako Family Assessment Center moves families off the streets and into permanent housing in less than 90 days. A special team at public housing reduced the vacant turnaround time from 267 days to just 7 days. And our landlord summits increased the number of landlords willing to rent to families transitioning out of homelessness. Even in the tragedy that is homelessness, there are significant signs that these policies are starting to make a difference. Homelessness is down 9% statewide, the first decline in eight years.

"There's more to be done for sure. We continue our efforts to offer services to those who have so far refused to leave the streets, to move into a better life. We have set aside monies in this year's budget to support more progress on the homelessness front. Our budget request also includes \$15 million in additional funding for Housing First initiatives, outreach services, and maintaining safety in our public places.

"We also know how important community partners have been in tackling this challenge. Take Kahauiki Village, a permanent housing project for homeless families launched by local businessman and philanthropist Duane Kurisu. Duane brought together the City, State, nonprofits and businesses to make the village a reality in record time. The first 30 families moved in recently. Duane, please stand to be recognized.

"Ohana also means that you should be able to put food on the table and be home with your family to eat it. That means jobs that pay well and commutes that work. Even though tourism is up and unemployment is low, many of our residents are living paycheck to paycheck, one health emergency or car repair away from crisis. Some people may have two or three jobs to make ends meet. The challenge is not just about creating jobs, it's about creating quality jobs and the training that go with them. I understand the frustration of many. And that's why I'm working to transform our economy to give residents a diversity of employment opportunities that pay higher wages and lead to a better quality of life for all.

"We're tackling another quality of life issue, and that's traffic, traffic congestion. I have three goals. Get projects done quickly, get them done inexpensively, and get them done with minimum impact on the environment, and we are making progress. From zipper and shoulder lanes and other contraflow lanes, to safety around our public schools and truck-

only routes, we are going to where the problems are. We're reducing backups and bottlenecks in West and Windward Oahu, Kahului, Lahaina, Lihue, Hilo, Kona, and other communities all across the state. We want commute times to be shorter.

"We must create a better life for the next generation, it is what we all want. We all dream of our children succeeding here in Hawaii. With my three children on the mainland, I know firsthand how hard it is to have them an ocean away. My personal goal, the goal to which I have dedicated my service as governor, is creating a Hawaii that gives all of our children the choice to live and call Hawaii home.

"My grandparents came to Hawaii in search of opportunities. It is not acceptable to me that many of our kids are essentially becoming immigrants in other places because we don't have the opportunities here in Hawaii.

"While there is more to do, I am proud of what we have accomplished together. We have more early college programs so high school students can earn college credits, saving families money and making it easier to graduate with degrees. We expanded campuses and offer more courses at UH West Oahu and Palamanui. The creation of Hawaii's Promise scholarships helps to pay for the costs of attending UH community colleges. The Entrepreneur's Sandbox in Kakaako brings start-ups together in one shared space and helps with loans and grants. And we also founded the annual hackathon competition, which enlists hundreds of professionals and amateur code writers to develop solutions for the state's biggest information technology challenges.

"We must prepare our young people for jobs in this sector, and that means supporting STEM education, focusing on science, technology, engineering and math.

"The good news is that it is expanding at all levels. The University of Hawaii is one of the leaders in this work, with the Manoa campus increasing its STEM graduates by more than a third in recent years, and the community colleges leading the way, tripling their numbers.

"Also helping to train students in our schools are partners like DevLeague, a computer programming and coding academy founded by two local software engineers. They are working with the DOE and private foundations. Together, they are teaching high school students advanced coding and cybersecurity skills. We'd like to recognize DevLeague's founders, Jason Sewell and Russel Cheng. Jason and Russel. He's up in the back.

"To be sure that workers in Hawaii's existing industries aren't left behind, we've made available a wide variety of vocational training opportunities through the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations. These programs match training with current job openings in fields ranging from computer science and shipyard welding to banking and food safety. And within state government, as we ride the wave of modernization, we remain fully committed to retraining every worker to use the new computer systems and technology tools. Technology helps us be more responsive to serve the public.

"We have always been a state that cares about the elderly. We are making good on that. I am proud that together we were able to pass Kupuna Care legislation that provides assistance for full-time family caregivers who also have full-time jobs. This is a win for Hawaii's families.

"We also worked to make sure those who have served our state get to retire with the dignity they were promised and deserve. With the Legislature's support, we took aggressive steps that will save us \$1.6 billion over the next 20 years.

"As our *kūpuna* have taught us, paying our bills, honoring our obligations, and saving for the future is how we build a brighter future, and we have done that

"One value that has guided this administration is to not simply pass on our debts to our kids and grandkids. Together we have made tremendous strides in this task. Rebuilding our rainy day fund to \$310 million. We have gone after tax cheats and collected millions from those who were not paying their

fair share. And we are working to modernize our tax collection system to make it easier and fairer for the people of Hawaii. We made needed changes to improve the system so we can collect the tax revenues we rely on to deliver state services. I believe we're on the right track to accomplish this major task.

"We're also making great strides in protecting our 'āina and ocean resources. To date, we have protected over 40,000 acres of watershed forests on Kauai, Oahu, Molokai and Hawaii islands. We helped preserve Turtle Bay lands from further development. A joint agreement with the US Navy is helping us reach our renewable energy goals. And together, we've established guidelines to use recycled water on food crops. Working with all of you here in the Legislature, we were able to provide tax credits for organic farmers, which means a healthier people and healthier lands. And you passed and I signed a law to abide by the Paris Climate Accord, the first state in the nation to do so.

"We understand deeply and fully what the future requires of us. I also fought to give Native Hawaiians a seat at the table when it comes to the management of Papahanaumokuakea, a national marine monument. The Office of Hawaiian Affairs is now co-trustee of the monument.

"Our goal of increasing local food production is another golden opportunity for Hawaii. We are blessed with four growing seasons and a land-grant university with a college of tropical agriculture that has a long history of cutting-edge work. With all of these factors, Hawaii can and must become the premiere center for new agricultural technologies.

"We already have ag-tech startups going strong in Hawaii. One company that comes to mind is Smart Yields. They help small and medium farmers to increase their production with data analytics and other technology tools. The company received international attention when it was chosen to be part of the Vatican's very first tech accelerator focused on global food production. At this time, I'd like to recognize Smart Yields CEO Vincent Kimura and his mentor, Hawaii Island farmer Richard Ha.

"What we need now is the driver to make greater local food production possible. There is no better way than through our schools. I applaud the new leadership in the DOE's Farm to School program, the leadership provided by Lieutenant Governor Shan Tsutsui, and the great cooperation of the Department of Agriculture and the State's Procurement Office. Shan, please stand to be recognized.

"Clean energy is not only critical to air and water quality, it is important to our economy and our wallets as we work to reduce our reliance on imported fossil fuels. Working with the Legislature, I was the first governor to sign into law a bill requiring 100% of Hawaii's electricity to come from renewable sources by 2045. This demonstrates what we can accomplish when we work together.

"We want hydropower, seawater air conditioning, solar and wind energy, biomass and the fullest possible use of our waste streams. We celebrate the Hu Honua Power Plant on the Big Island as well as the new solar farms on other islands, and this week we will join NRG Energy, Hawaiian Electric, and Kamehameha Schools in celebrating three utility-scale solar projects here on Oahu.

"As a next step, we will grow a carbon market here in Hawaii. This way, carbon polluters around the world can invest in restoring Hawaii's koa and 'ōhi'a trees and forests to offset their carbon emissions, whatever that is.

"We want the brainpower and the imagination of the world to continue to come here. They can help us find our way to 100% renewable energy sources for electricity, and in doing so, help the world find its way to 100%. Let us take the billions we export for fossil fuels and spend it here, and then export the energy systems we develop. We are dreaming big and creating the promise of limitless opportunities. Anything less means we are letting down the next generation.

"Hawaii has so much potential in this new globally connected world. We are already viewed as the ideal research base and testing ground for innovative, globally significant technologies such as telemedicine, smart cities, and autonomous driverless vehicles. Hawaii is a leader in solving the

issues of our time. Much of what we do here in Hawaii is groundbreaking. Hawaii is home to many talented individuals breaking new ground every single day. Hawaii is full of stories of business innovators blazing the trail to create new products and services.

"The Big Island's Tina Fitch turned her start-up Switchfly into a global software platform used by almost every major travel and hospitality company in the world. Now, she's returned home and started a second company, HobNob, which we hope achieves equal success. Tina, who flew in to be with us this morning, Tina can you rise to be recognized.

"In our own state government, employees are helping us improve the services to the public every day. One example is a team of young millennials known as 'The Three Amigos,' Jodie Nakamura, Ryan Mercado and Liam Tobin. The wait time for workers' comp hearings has been cut in half because of their efforts. This 2017 Team of the Year from the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations launched a project to digitize mountains of paperwork from some 20,000 claims a year. And there are many more dedicated workers just like them all around the state. Jodie, Ryan and Liam, please stand to be recognized. They're just a sampling of our homegrown talent. We just need to do more to create the supportive environment around them that will launch and sustain their careers here in the islands.

"I hope you'll leave today knowing that we have laid important groundwork and that Hawaii is on the edge of something exciting. At the beginning of my speech, I said Hawaii is a beautiful and complex place. I believe that is our gift to our children and to the future.

"Imagine a future economy for Hawaii that isn't reliant solely on tourism and the military. Imagine a future where local entrepreneurs are inventing useful products and services that are sold across the globe. Imagine that we use our temperate weather and four growing seasons to develop new high-tech agricultural tools that increase yields for farmers from Hawaii to India. Imagine that we farm our nearshore ocean waters to feed our own communities and the growing global demand for seafood. And with these businesses, there's new demand for scientists, technicians and marketing professionals.

"And what does this mean for the people of Hawaii? It means a healthier economy with quality jobs that enable us to improve our schools, take care of our *kūpuna*, and provide more affordable housing. This future Hawaii isn't as far off as it seems. We've already set things in motion. We've put stakes in the ground and we're making progress. To face the challenges of the future, Hawaii must seize the opportunities, embrace change, and identify the game-changing steps that we need to take. Together, the possibilities are limitless. I believe the qualities we treasure most about Hawaii are what will draw our children back to us.

"When I ran for Governor four years ago, I wanted to take my lifetime of public service and fundamentally change the path we were taking. I have committed my life to the people of the State of Hawaii. No matter what challenges we face, no matter what frustrations or issues we have with one another, I find my strength and courage in our shared sense of unity. We must work together. *Mahalo* and *aloha*."

President Kouchi then rose and stated:

"Mahalo, Governor Ige. I too share your vision, your aspirations and hopes for this state and the people who reside here, the guests who we welcome here. I would reiterate in that vision of the Hawaii in the future, again, that it is with the 100% renewable energy that we're providing to the citizens of this state. I want to restate that because the island of Kauai and the Kauai Island Utility Cooperative, with two of those solar battery storage facilities and the recently agreed hydro project using, or a partnership with the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, DLNR, and ADC, Kauai is driving through 60% and will be heading to 70% renewable within the next 18 months, and at one point last year for about five minutes, Kauai Island Utility Cooperative ran with 100% renewable energy on the grid.

"So, like the Governor, I'm not here to talk about dreams, I'm here to say what we are doing and how we're going to continue to do it, and how we're going to do it better. I commit to the Governor on behalf of the Hawaii State

Senate, and to the Speaker of the House, that the Hawaii Senate stands ready to work with your branches of government to ensure that we get the results that we desire for the people of Hawaii.

"And I want to read a speech in closing. Only kidding, big font. I'd like to close with a quote from Yehuda Berg. 'Hurt people hurt people. That's how pain patterns gets passed on, generation after generation after generation. Break the chain today. Meet anger with sympathy, contempt with compassion, cruelty with kindness. Greet grimaces with smiles. Forgive and forget about finding fault. Love is the weapon of the future.'

"Mahalo, and this joint session is adjourned."

At 10:58 o'clock a.m., President Kouchi declared the Joint Session of the House of Representatives and the Senate of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature, Regular Session of 2018, adjourned.

Representative Belatti moved that H.R. No. 9 be adopted, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Say rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Choy rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Please record a no vote for me. I do not believe this is the correct path for this body, I think we're just going down the wrong direction."

At 1:03 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:03 o'clock p.m.

Representative Tokioka rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'd like to record a no vote to H.R. No. 9. I'm not going to prolong the debate or the discussion, but I would like to say that I served as the vice chair for the VMI Chair and I've been his friend for 12 years now. And this is a man of honor, this is a man that has served his country, and who else better to lead a committee like military and veteran affairs? And I feel so bad for the VMI Chair, and I'd like to ask to insert additional comments into the Journal. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tokioka's written remarks are as follows:

"I am disappointed by the decision of the Representative from District 26 to remove the current VMI Chair. Throughout his 23 years in the House, the current Chair has set a high standard of leadership and service. It has been my honor to serve as his vice chair, and I believe that I have performed admirably in that capacity. Based on the current Chair's qualifications and performance, I believe that this resolution is unjustifiable.

"Removing the current VMI Chair is an insult to him and the years of his life that he has dedicated to his service both in the military and in the House. With all due respect to the Representative from District 41, the current Chair is the most qualified individual to lead this committee. This move does little to hurt the current Chair, but it is detrimental to the hundreds of veterans whom he represents.

"In my opinion, this resolution is uncalled for. I find the decision to remove the current Chair unfortunate. In the future, I hope for greater transparency regarding decisions of this nature."

Representative Souki rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I want to record a no vote. And I, for my good friend here who I've known over 30 years, and I wish him well, and I wish the members remember this. A reward for working for the State for 30 years. Thank you very much."

Representative DeCoite rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in light of the resolution and so forth, likewise I'd like to record a no vote, for all the years of service that the VMI Chair has served, and in light of the discussion that we just had. Thank you."

Representative Har rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Please have the Clerk register a no vote for me, and just brief comments. First of all, I want to thank the VMI Chair for his service, not only to the people of the State of Hawaii, but to the people of the United States, as a veteran. I could think of nobody better to lead this committee, and it has been an honor for me to know the VMI Chair, as this is his last year with us in the House.

"I'm reminded of a saying, what's right is right, even if everybody's doing it, what's wrong is wrong, even if nobody's doing it.

"First and foremost, members, we have to remember to respect the institution. Personal differences aside, we should always put the institution first, besides personal differences and petty politics. Unfortunately, I don't think that this resolution embodies that, and for these reasons I will be voting no. Thank you."

Representative Creagan rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. When I came here, the VMI Chair came to me and supported me. He was my mentor, he was my friend. I am voting no, please record a no vote. And that's, I can't sit here in silence and disrespect my friend, a veteran, who served in this so honorably for how many years. I can't sit here in silence, so I have to record a no vote. Thank you."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I too share and extend my thanks to the good Representative from Kaneohe. I do also, however, support this measure, as it will help this House move forward. We all can still contribute as members of the committee, as members of this body on this floor. But this leadership team that's represented by this resolution has the confidence and the support of this body, I believe a majority of this body. We have worked hard to be inclusive, we have worked hard to listen to the members. And while, as I said on the opening day, we are a body that has many differences, we can continue to move forward with this resolution. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ohno rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. While I have the greatest respect for the former Chair of VMI, I do think it's important to note out that the hopeful new Chair, the Representative from Ewa Beach, has been in front of many issues, most notably the issue that happened two weekends ago. I think he certainly has the experience and the interest in taking this committee even further. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 9 was adopted, with Representatives Choy, Creagan, DeCoite, Har, Say, Souki and Tokioka voting no, and with Representatives Cachola, Hashem, Kong, Lee, McDermott, Tupola and Ward being excused.

So I think we should just proceed with those cautions in mind for the safety of the public. Thank you."

"With reservations and comments. Mr. Speaker, I'm concerned about the impact that this bill will have on the ability of local financial institutions to access the secondary mortgage market, specifically Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac. I think that will further make it more difficult to reach the goal of homeownership in Hawaii. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, no vote with a brief comment. Mr. Speaker, \$1 on the mainland is worth 65 cents here, because of the cost of living. We have the highest cost of living in the nation. This is one of those drivers to even increase it.

"The irony is that most of these local banks that this bill is trying to encourage literally end up selling all of their, probably 95% to 100% of their mortgages to mainland bankers, Fannie Mae, *et cetera*. This bill might possibly do that, so it's going to hurt our mortgage industry.

"Secondly, Mr. Speaker, this bill is very provincial and does not have the wide future of what commerce is. Commerce is not a brick and mortar phenomenon any longer, it's online, and to prevent our people from doing that is to curse to even further higher costs of living than they have now.

"This is unfair, it's not a good bill, and I would hope all of us would realize our constituents would not want a bill like this, especially those who don't have housing, because right now we're one of the lowest housing ownership states in the nation, most of our people are renters. So, let's give them a chance to get a mortgage, but let's get them cheaper, because the rates are cheaper by going online. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Thielen rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tupola rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Har rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Please note my reservations. While I have the utmost respect for the introducer of this measure, I'd please like to incorporate the comments of the Vice Chair of Housing, and I will await to see what comes out of this bill after the next committee. Thank you."

Representative Brower rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. The Legislature and the term that we're serving serves as a conversation. And there actually is some good information to propel this bill forward. And the committee that it enters now is the author of the bill, and I think we should give that committee one last chance to correct this bill, and then, if not, it may die a quiet death. Thank you."

Representative Takumi rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. Based on what the Housing Chair said, your Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce may be inclined to amend the bill back to its original language because obviously it was a great bill to begin with.

"Mr. Speaker, in all seriousness, this bill has come about because we all know when you sign up to get a mortgage from a financial institution or refinance your house, buried in that contract, for those of us who have gone through it, you have to initial these pages many, many times, and most of us don't go over it with a fine-tooth comb. Well, buried in that fine print, it says that the financial institution reserves the right to sell your mortgage, and unbeknownst to you, many times they will sell that mortgage to someone not in the state.

"So, this is the dilemma, Mr. Speaker. This is a pro-consumer bill at its core. Now, whether or not the implementation side of it will be onerous, it remains to be seen, but here's the rationale behind it. Your mortgage gets sold to a bank on the mainland, so from that point on you have to deal with that mainland bank. So, take for example you have homeowner's insurance, just a what-if. You have homeowner's insurance with State Farm, something happens to your roof, your roof gets damaged, State Farm agrees to pay for the roof, and then State Farm will send you a check. Now, you may not know this, but you can't deposit that check unless the person who has the lien, in other words that financial institution, cosigns that check. Then you have to deal with someone on the mainland instead of being able to walk into a local bank and say, hey, I got this check, can you cosign it so that I can deposit it?

"Now, I don't know about everybody on this floor, but many people in our community will say, oh my goodness, that's just a lot of obstacles you have to go through. They would much prefer that they can walk into a local financial institution. By the way, Mr. Speaker, it may very well be that financial institution that sold your mortgage to that mainland institution. It seems to me, the burden on that local bank to merely cosign that check is not that burdensome, and besides, that financial institution that sold that mortgage made money off of it. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Evans rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm in strong support of this bill, and I'm really glad we're forwarding it, and I wanted to add additional comments to the previous speaker, the Chair of Consumer Protection & Commerce.

"This last summer and fall, I had many people come to me very concerned about their residential loan, fighting with the fact that their residential loan had been sold multiple times. There may be some language needs to be worked out, I get that, but I think it's important we forward this.

"Eventually, they bundle it and they sell it to someone else, who then bundles it and sells it to someone else, those people hire someone to service it, and before you know it, when you call to find out what's going on with your mortgage, all of a sudden you find it's been transferred several times. And you ask, well, did you have the authorization from me to do that? Aren't you required to inform me when you do that kind of stuff? And it can get really quite complicated.

"I even got on a phone call, a three-way phone call, because, one thing is, these end up getting sold a lot of times to the government, Freddie Mac I believe is still around. And so, ever since the foreclosure, and we've done a lot of work in this body trying to deal with mortgage foreclosures and how the paperwork was all messed up. In the old days, there wasn't computers, and people would lose files, it was really hard on people here in Hawaii. So I think we still have a problem, it's getting better all the time, but it's one of those things I think we have to stay focused on. Thank you."

Representative Thielen rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I was wondering if the chair of the subsequent committee could look into possibly amending the bill to say that in the event of a sale from a local institution to an out-of-state financial institution, a local person must be designated who could accept service of process and could execute documents related to the loan. That could take care of that problem that's been identified by the Big Island Representative, but keep us from preventing them, instead of limiting the sale of residential mortgage loans, let's modify the way in which they can be done, to protect the local consumers. Thank you."

Representative San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I stand in support. Basically, I agree with the two prior speakers. I just want to point out on the Big Island, where there's a lot of foreclosures, after it's been sold, a number of times, the mortgage gets sold to Deutsche Bank, Germany. So, it's very difficult for foreclosure homes, for the homeowners' association or neighbors to get ahold of this German bank for them to take care of the vacant foreclosed lot.

"But as an attorney, I think there are supremacy clause problems with this. So, I stand in support, but I don't know about enforcement. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, two additional footnotes in not-support of this bill. First, a reality check. The US government owns the mortgage business. Number two, no bank in Hawaii's going to agree to forego selling their mortgages, it's in the 90th percentile rate. This is not about mortgages. It's about cost of living, it's about the interest which we're going to punish the people of Hawaii with if this bill passes. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1619, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives Har, McDermott, Nakamura, Thielen and Tupola voting aye with reservations, with Representative Ward voting no, and with Representatives Souki and Todd being excused.

Representative LoPresti, for the Committee on Veterans, Military, & International Affairs, & Culture and the Arts, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 50-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2181, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2181, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PEARL HARBOR REMEMBRANCE DAY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Souki and Todd being excused.

Representative Woodson, for the Committee on Education, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 51-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2185, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Health & Human Services.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2185, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SCHOOL BASED HEALTH," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Health & Human Services, with Representatives Souki and Todd being excused.

Representative Woodson, for the Committee on Education, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 52-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2685, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Ocean, Marine Resources, & Hawaiian Affairs.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2685, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HAWAIIAN EDUCATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Ocean, Marine Resources, & Hawaiian Affairs, with Representatives Souki and Todd being excused.

Representative Woodson, for the Committee on Education, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 53-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2156, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Agriculture.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2020, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Water & Land, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"I have reservations, Mr. Speaker. I know that the drafter of the bill is trying to solve a problem that's a very serious problem, and I credit him with his attempt at that. But my concern about the bill, number one, the bill uses 'shall' instead of 'may,' taking away any Land Use Commission discretion when they see the facts in the particular land use case before them.

"Second one is that the requirement of the subdivision to be kept for ag purposes is only for 20 years. That's a very brief time and, in my opinion, doesn't protect the agricultural land as much as it should. The use of the word 'primarily' as ag use is a little bit waffly, and I think it needs a much tighter definition. And then I believe it needs redrafting so it does not allow condominium regimes to circumvent the ag requirement.

"I think the bill needs some serious work. I applaud the intent, but before it goes through to the Senate, I'd like to see some amendments made to it. Thank you."

Representative DeCoite rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations, brief comment. I'd just like to address the fact that while we're trying to grow food and trying to address buffer zones and pesticides and pesticide drifts and noise that these farmers and ranchers make trying to conduct business, I would like us to be real careful about subdivisions in those areas, as urban sprawl out seems to be pushing out important ag lands and lands that we are using to grow food on, to double up food production in the upcoming years. So, I'd just like to add that, with my reservations. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Matsumoto rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to vote aye with reservations on this measure. A large portion of my district is comprised of ag land, and we need to be very careful about the implications of this bill. We must work together to keep land designated for agricultural purposes to be used for agriculture. The measure needs revisions: uses 'shall' approve instead of 'may' approve, requirement of the subdivision to be kept for ag purposes for only 20 years, while the Land Use Commission agrees with 'in perpetuity' language, use of the word 'primarily' as ag use needs better clarification. *Mahalo* for the opportunity to speak on this measure."

Representative Evans rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Takayama rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tupola rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Gates rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2020, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURAL LANDS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Water & Land, with Representatives DeCoite, Evans, Gates, Matsumoto, Takayama, Thielen and Tupola voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Souki and Todd being excused.

Representative Brower, for the Committee on Housing, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 60-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2575, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2575, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative McDermott rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Cachola rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, ruling for a possible conflict. I own condos for rent," and the Chair ruled, "no conflict."

Representative Cachola continued to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"This bill is still a work in progress, and that's why I'll be voting with reservations. There's a lot of questions about this bill, and there's a lot of expense and things to be done before we can implement anything. But for the sake of this body looking at this, I'll be willing to vote at this time with reservations rather than a no vote. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, a no vote against this rent controlled bill, which never has worked. Thank you."

Representative Tupola rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Thielen rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. If the bill is actually doing that, I think that's a very serious situation, so I'm a no vote at this point. Thank you."

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Members, we need this bill to potentially help protect kids, so I urge my colleagues to support this measure. Thank you. In support."

Representative Quinlan rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2492, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHAPTER 245, HAWAII REVISED STATUTES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representative Ward voting aye with reservations, with Representative McDermott voting no, and with Representatives Quinlan and Tupola being excused.

No. 2145, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MEDICATION SYNCHRONIZATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives Quinlan and Tupola being excused.

Representative Mizuno, for the Committee on Health & Human Services, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 185-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2531, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2531, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PRESCRIPTION DRUGS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives Quinlan and Tupola being excused.

Representatives Takayama and LoPresti, for the Committee on Public Safety and the Committee on Veterans, Military, & International Affairs, & Culture and the Arts, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 186-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2693, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2693, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC SAFETY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary, with Representatives Quinlan and Tupola being excused.

Representative Takayama, for the Committee on Public Safety, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 187-18) recommending that H.B. No. 1994, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1994, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to the sanctuary state bill, 1994, with a few comments. Mr. Speaker, this bill is as myopic as it is partisan, political

and polemical. But who doesn't like immigration? Who doesn't like immigrants? My wife is from Malaysia. My daughter is from China. The key, Mr. Speaker, is that they're all legal.

"This bill legitimizes, protects and otherwise disguises illegal immigration, therefore promoting it. The territory that we are entering on calls all of us into question. Every two years, we raise our hands to protect, obey, and otherwise enforce the US Constitution and the State Constitution. This bill pushes us to say that, hey if you at the federal level want to do something, we are going to exempt ourselves from the US Constitution. Mr. Speaker, that's a dangerous proposition.

"I would also say how this is a bill that is going to hurt us rather than help us, even though it's supposedly going to hurt us. We're getting on a territory that's going to hurt us more than it's going to help us. Not because I'm a member of the Finance Committee, but everybody here knows that our budget is federally funded up to the point of 25% and growing.

"Mr. Speaker, we have already not endeared ourselves to the Federal Government. And to do something like this is going to make us even all the more marginal. I'm not going to note how many times our federal congressional delegation has poked their fingers into the President's eye, but this is going to be a bigger one than even in the past.

"This is going to hurt us fiscally, financially, and on the margins of being a full participant in the Federal Government in all the things that we do. Can you imagine if PACOM says, well, HI-EMA, we're not going to help you because you guys have got it all on your own, we're not going to give you federal assistance because of this disaster on January 13th where you didn't know what you were doing when you created trauma for 1.4 million people and our visitors. The feds are going to pull us out of this. Should we say, well, if the feds do a reciprocal, it's okay? No, Mr. Speaker. But we're tempting the hand of that. You know, what goes around comes around, what comes around goes around.

"So we're playing with fire in the same way that many of us would not wish that the feds would pull back in so many areas, not just the defense of the country, but our human services, our transportation, the majority of our funding. And the idiosyncrasies of some personalities in Washington can earmark stuff and take money away.

"So why do we want to do this? We don't have an immigration problem, per se."

At 12:31 o'clock p.m., Representative Belatti requested a recess and the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:31 o'clock p.m.

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, I think the bottom line is, the costs outweigh the benefits. If there's any benefits, I need to know them. And that is not to demean anything or anybody, but other than this, if there's a problem where we have huge immigrants, if we want to talk about immigrants who really need help, what about the Indonesians down at the harbor? They're captive right on our shores. What have we done for them?

"We already have a sanctuary state for the homeless. We have the highest homeless in the whole nation. The state of Hawaii has the highest homeless. What kind of sanctuary are we giving the homeless?

"So where are the priorities here? And also, I should note that this morning we passed a bill, 2091, which is for a Homeland Security fusion center, which states, by continually staffing itself to monitor all crimes, hazards, and shall be the focus for sharing local, national, and international information. So we've already got a bill that says the national level intelligence community, we are going to cooperate with this fine bill passed this morning—"

Representative LoPresti rose to a point of order, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, point of order. Ask that he speaks to the measure at hand, which hasn't even been done yet."

The Chair addressed Representative Ward, stating:

"Representative Ward, please confine your remarks to the bill before us."

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"I'm sorry, it's relevant to me when we pass a bill that's contrary to what we are passing now. The bottom line, Mr. Speaker, this bill is going to hurt us more than it's going to help us. It causes our loyalty, which is a virtue of this state, to be put aside. And it's got a *kapakahi* emphasis on, more for illegitimate migration rather than legal migration, which is what this country is founded on and it's all about because we are all immigrants. Thank you."

Representative McDermott rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, I am, after a lot of thought, I am going to be voting no on this. I come from a family of immigrants that came over to this, it wasn't a country then, in fact, one of my ancestors helped with the revolution and stood up to the ruling party there.

"The concern I have, Mr. Speaker, it's going to put a spotlight on Hawaii. It's going to put a spotlight on those people who are here that aren't documented but they've been part of our communities for decades. They're our friends, they help out with things in the neighborhood, they might be a little league coach, soccer coach, whatever. But it's going to bring down the wrath and the attention of the Federal Government on Hawaii, and we don't need to do that. We may feel noble in here, that we're protecting these people who are undocumented residents, but we're putting the spotlight on them, and I think it can end up with some very brutal consequences.

"The other thing, I understand in Chicago, which went out and said, look at us, we're a sanctuary city, I understand that ICE agents are now going into the courts and questioning people, and finding some of the undocumented residents of Chicago and arresting them and deporting them. That's pretty darned intrusive, but the Federal Government has that power, and Chicago put itself in the spotlight. We don't need to do that with Hawaii.

"I know it's a bill that makes people feel, isn't this great, but I don't think anyone in here is an undocumented immigrant. It's going to focus it on them, it's going to harm them. And I would encourage members to think about this a lot more seriously.

"You also have the political rhetoric on page 2 of the bill, lines 9 through 13, and that'll be a message back to Washington, D.C. And the federal administration is powerful, they do have huge resources, and we're hurting the very people we're trying to help. So I'm voting no."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Evans rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations and a few comments. I understand why this bill was introduced and why it's moving forward, but I was compelled to speak because of the former speaker from the other side of Oahu, sorry I can't remember your district.

"I think I had pointed out some issues, and that is some of the purpose language may be a little inflammatory and unnecessary. But also, based on what we do here at the Legislature, this may be more appropriate as a resolution instead of a bill, because if it does move forward, it will be a Hawaii Revised Statute in our statutes, and I think it may be more appropriate as a resolution from this body. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Har rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representative Evans be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Choy rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Hashem rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1994, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LAW ENFORCEMENT," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary, with Representatives Evans, Har, Hashem and Tokioka voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Choy, Matsumoto, McDermott, Thielen and Ward voting no, and with Representatives Quinlan and Tupola being excused.

Representative Takayama, for the Committee on Public Safety, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 188-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2387, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2387, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Thielen rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Same request, Mr. Speaker, for this get out of jail free bill."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2387, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE RELEASE OF MISDEMEANANTS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary, with Representatives Thielen and Ward voting no, and with Representatives Quinlan and Tupola being excused.

Representative Ing, for the Committee on Ocean, Marine Resources, & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 189-18) recommending that H.B. No. 1751, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1751, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

"In support. We had a hearing maybe three months ago with DLNR and they actually initiated, it was the division head of Department of Aquatic Resources and the chair of DLNR, and they said that this is the year to move forward on making the Governor's 30% of nearshore fisheries managed by 2030 codified into statute, so I think we're following their lead. It is a work in progress."

The city council already is addressing this issue, and there is something, I believe, in this measure before us, where it's saying, you have to have one parking space per each bedroom. That really doesn't make that much sense. When a family that has eight children and maybe they have four bedrooms, or possibly five, they're going to have to have five parking spaces, and that's going to be physically impossible within our smaller residential lots. I don't think we need to get into this kind of management. It is before the city council, and why don't we leave it there. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2109, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you. Mr. Speaker, I'm standing up to speak against a bill that I cosponsored. Actually, you could say that I learned belatedly, and I should've learned earlier and should have known this, the bill is making certain mandates, assuming that all residential homes will have solar water. Well, our technology has improved, and the gas company, which is a competitor, small competitor, but they're out there doing some excellent things, small competitor to Hawaiian Electric.

"Gas company has gas water heaters that are on demand. They're extremely well designed. You turn on your tap when you want hot water, bingo, the gas device, the gas water heater instantly gives you that hot water. It's very different in a, say a larger home or a more sprawled out home, you can have your bathroom over in this area with a gas water heater, you don't have to heat the water from the big electric water tank, which is clear over in this side of the house, heat that water in that big tank, heat more water than you're ever going to need for a shower, and then run that water all the way across the house to the other bedroom. That's costly, and it uses a lot of electricity, once your solar system depletes with its hot water and you have to rely upon electricity to fill up that tank, and then the hot water in the tank stays unused.

"So what I'm saying is, the gas water heaters make sense, and they're instantaneous, they're inexpensive, and they can be site-located, and only need to heat the water when you're using it in that particular location. This adds to the cost of housing and the plans for homes that won't ever need to use a solar device. So, we're taking sides in a competitive environment where the gas company has a better product, and we should be encouraging them rather than assuming everyone's going to have to have solar on their homes, and therefore if you want an exemption, you have to go through this more expensive process. So, I am a cosponsor and I oppose the bill. Thank

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, without explaining why, I would just have the words of the previous speaker entered into the Journal as my own, as a no vote, with one exception. Mr. Speaker, having lived in the third world a number of years, they not only have gas on demand water heaters, they have electrical, and my family used that in East Timor time and time again. Even the electrical are quick and efficient. So, for those reasons, I think we should offer choice, and with this bill it's basically saying it's solar or nothing. In some places, Big Island or otherwise, Kauai where it's very wooded, you're not going to get solar. So hopefully this will, through discussion, make more sense than it does right now. Thank you."

Representative Lee rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, just briefly, in support. I would just note for my colleague from Kailua as well as Hawaii Kai, between whom my district is sandwiched, that this bill in no way prohibits gas water heaters. In fact, it opens up consumer protections that will reduce costs in the long run. Because the automatic installation of a gas water heater automatically passes costs on to the homeowner or prospective homeowner if they're buying a

new home. When, by and large, solar hot water heaters are significantly cheaper and have a lower payback rating and minimal operating costs. If a gas water heater or any other technology is in fact cheaper than that, then that is permitted under this bill. Thank you very much."

Representative Cachola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, Standing Committee Report Number 208, this is a very good bill. We will be saving a lot of money if we are going to do self-insurance against property and casualty risk. This is not my bill, but it's just like what we did on the hurricane relief fund as well as others, that when we went self-insured, we save a lot of money. And that's why another bill that is on the pipeline is to be self-insured that will save us about half a billion dollars each year, for the next 30 years or more. That concept that is in the bill will save us a lot of money, practically \$19 million each year. And the way I look at it, let's pass it out. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2603, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE SELF-INSURANCE AGAINST PROPERTY AND CASUALTY RISKS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives Har, McDermott, Souki, Tupola and Woodson being excused.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1614, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, at the first glance of this I'm not convinced that this is the best thing to do, to put an automatic restraining order on couples who would like to part peaceful. Even though I know it's for real estate and other kinds of things, I want to study this further before I would vote for it, so with reservations, please."

Representative San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Just, really short, I've been practicing family court for 30 years. In support, in strong support. And basically, these are the kind of orders that automatically occur anyway, should the party be represented and they actually go to court and seek these types of orders. If this protects and creates

a level playing field for the unrepresented, it helps, usually, the woman, who is usually in a lesser financial status or ability than her spouse, from having to go to court and seek financial orders just to keep their child on their life insurance, on their medical insurance, just to keep status quo. This is long time, this is needed, occurs regularly in California, Massachusetts, and in Kauai, and it's about time it happens here in Hawaii. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1614, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AUTOMATIC RESTRAINING ORDERS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Ward voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Har, McDermott, Souki, Tupola and Woodson being excused.

"Mr. Speaker, ruling for a possible conflict of interest. I have two members of my family who are doctors, and they are members of the Hawaii Medical Association, who is opposing this bill."

The Chair addressed Representative Cachola, stating:

"There's no conflict and that'll remain in effect through sine die."

Representative Cachola continued to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"And with that, I will be voting no on this bill."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, no vote, brief comment. Mr. Speaker, this bill has come up probably five, six, seven, eight times. Many, many, many, many times. And each time that it comes up, the evidence gets increasingly against the bill, so maybe a time out will be better than having to go through it again, because I know it's a very intense, emotionally charged bill.

"But the bottom line is, for the safety and security of those who are in need, in need of it, I know the rural areas have said we've got to get somebody out there, and the data says that the psychologists are not actually going out there, so what the bill purports to do, exactly, is not happening, and it's, I'm sure, something that will go through third reading and conference committee and on and on. But we've been around that block, and I think the way we've decided in the past, is the best way we can decide in the future. Thank you."

Representative Mizuno rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, in support. I agree with the good Representative from Hawaii Kai, we need a time out on this bill, and that's what exactly that we did when we heard it. We passed it as a study group, and it was a psychologist that

came out and said that they wanted to help with the homeless, help with mental services. In fact, they want to engage with the psychiatrists together, work together to address the concerns of our homeless, over 7,200 homeless, and over 3,000 with mental conditions.

"So I'm a little perplexed, and the Minority Leader, who was in our committee, voted up. We all voted up on this, this is just a study, so it is a timeout. So I appreciate the comments, we'll see how this goes, but it's just a study. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Creagan rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support with some reservations. I think that, I thank the Chair of the Committee for Health & Human Services for converting this to a study group. I think that going forward we should look at adding some psychiatrists to that study group, and going forward, and possibly from the medical school, to ensure that it's a balanced look at this going forward, because in the other states, most of the programs that have been looked at have a balance of psychiatrists and psychologists, shaping whatever program they're going to come up with. So I think that, while this is a good idea, I think it should be doctored or shaped a little bit. Doctored, yes. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. And that's why I came up with this bill, to see if there's a way we can possibly address the doctor shortage. Otherwise, the State of Hawaii and our constituents will be having a hard time having a primary care provider.

"And not only that, if we send, this is only a pilot program to allow our residents here in the State of Hawaii to study abroad because the costs of medical education in other countries, like for example the Philippines, the equivalent of tuition per semester is only about \$500, comparing it with here in the United States, it's tons of money. So by coming up with that, we should at least look at ways to address the doctor shortage. Thank you."

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. On 264, relating to public lands, I am rising with reservations, and not on the amended substance of the bill, which I think is a very good attempt to clean up an area and restore an area on the Big Island, it makes sense. But my concern is, we all know how bills can start through in a broad application, get narrowed down to what they really should be, and then when conference committee comes, all of a sudden it's again enlarged. So, my reservations is more to watch this bill that it doesn't morph back into the broad application. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2641, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC LANDS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Economic Development & Business, with Representative Thielen voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Har, McDermott, Souki, Tupola and Woodson being excused.

I think that's not really fair, and not a good idea. And the other thing is, the language appears to allow the small business representative to be from a bigger business on the Hawaii Community Development Authority, and I don't like that. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2122, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY," passed Second Reading and was

referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Thielen voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Har, McDermott, Souki, Tupola and Woodson being excused.

No. 2303, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PESTICIDE USE REVOLVING FUND," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives Har, McDermott, Souki, Tupola and Woodson being excused.

Representatives Lee and Creagan, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection and the Committee on Agriculture, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 269-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2722, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2722, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative DeCoite rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative DeCoite's written remarks are as follows:

"By prohibiting neonics and glyphosate will remove a tool for farmers; for the state and county agencies, it will hinder them in getting their jobs done safely. Proper application of these insecticides and herbicides is totally OK. Improper application causes the problem. I do not support removing the pest control groups from this bill. *Mahalo*."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2722, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representative DeCoite voting aye with reservations,

and with Representatives Har, McDermott, Souki, Tupola and Woodson being excused.

Representatives Lee and Creagan, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection and the Committee on Agriculture, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 270-18) recommending that H.B. No. 1756, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1756, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative DeCoite rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations, long comment. Mr. Speaker, pesticides don't kill, it's ignorance, stupidity, and a lack of education that kills. I'm a third-generation Native Hawaiian homestead farmer and rancher on the island of Molokai, and proud of it. I'm a mother, a grandmother, a wife, a community person, and yes, somebody that will tell you like it is.

"I'm not going to stand here to try and convince people of the forces outside of our control have targeted big corporations that decisionmakers like myself are going to wipe out the small farmers. Big business farms across the state are and have shutdown. I cannot believe some of the testimony being given by people who know nothing what to do if the so-called should hit you on the head. Farmer's deal with so many issues from weather, to bugs and pests, to vandals, to thieves, and now they have to justify a noble profession that people would not give a second chance to look at

"Chlorpyrifos, or scientific name organophosphate, is found in insecticides, bug sprays, termite killers, lawn and garden to control pests. People use it to treat their homes for pests. It's used on golf courses. All of where the bulk of people live, play and sleep in. Yes, it is known to cause neurological disorders if you're ingesting it. Then why aren't these over-the-counter products also being removed?

"Chlorpyrifos is a widely used broad-spectrum insecticide, first registered in 1965 for ag use and pest control. Before regulatory action by the EPA phased out the residential use in 2001, applications were heavily used in urban areas where exposed populations included pregnant women. I could not believe while the biggest issue is that the insecticide affects the woman's fetus and unborn child, that we would ignore the obvious. It has been known that a woman had ingested from this product being used in her home and caused deformities, abnormalities, autism, and yet this measure is being moved forward removing out fumigating businesses that treat our houses, and allows people to continue to use the many over-the-counter bug sprays of which over 17 of these are easily purchased in our stores, and sprays and so on, the list goes on, all of which have been misused by every one of us.

"Mr. Speaker, when you use this product for cockroaches, you are to point and then shoot to the target pests. As a young child growing up, I would always recall my mom never ever hitting her intended prey, the cockroach. With one shot she would literally take the can and drown the heck out of this cockroach, knowing that one shot would have killed it.

"Housewives are the number one misusers of all insecticides purchased over-the-shelf. These insecticides are aerosols and they become, as we say, airborne, or in the words of many that have said this, drift.

"In my sardine can, or shall I say my apartment that I live in now while working here on Oahu, when I go home, the many different smells as I walk to my apartment from cooking to smoking and in some cases, yes, the bug spray. So many different smells that pass my neighbors' rooms, we can smell it. This is really what is happening. Those are the cases that has been proven to be accurate in the residential areas of all kinds of the surroundings in these areas, with the heaviest usage of the so called chlorpyrifos or organophosphate, yet not one word of taking this off the shelf. This is what was found on record of a woman's fetus and unborn babies that had levels of chlorpyrifos.

"Don't blame the farmer. Poor farmers, they take all the cracks, the innocent punished while the culprit goes free. Amazing. Well there was over 900 testimonies with the three most important bills of pesticide being heard yesterday that could change the whole scope of our farming industry, right here in Hawaii. If we're so concerned and devastated about what is happening to our children, our families, and our friends, of a dangerous, dangerous, I say again, dangerous insecticide, then allow the Department of Agriculture to continue its work, and fund them adequately so we can get to the root of the problem. Let's not forget that the regulating body here is the EPA. Oh, yeah, but they're not doing their job, according to many."

Representative Tokioka rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative DeCoite continued, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, as we would say, I no understand. Farmers have not been the problem, it's the lack of education on using products safely and understanding what they are used for. I never try to punish my child that does nothing wrong, I punish the one that does wrong. And isn't that the correct thing to do, Mr. Speaker? Punish them by educating them. And yes, by all means, we need to look at what else in the surrounding environment that could also contribute to the neurological disorders, the so-called drugs, ice, cocaine, smoking, alcohol, exhaust from our cars, those are the things that are also in our environment, and the secondhand smoke. If it's a fact it causes cancer and it kills, making impulse decisions on emotion without a fair hearing or looking at the facts is not cool. If it does kill, get it off of our shelves, by all means, I would support it.

"Invasive species, the influx of fire ants and coqui frogs, are spreading. MISC has asked to spray the fire ants in Nahiku of where I represent in District 13 to stop the spread of our fire ants. They also use these tools as listed. They're used to protect our watersheds, they're also used to take care of the brush alongside of the roads. We do not have the manpower nor the funds to maintain our roads, and when one of the biggest complaints my office receives is that people cannot safely turn onto Hana Highway with all the brush leaning over the roads. A lot of these issues need to be addressed, Mr. Speaker.

"I urge you to look at the scientific data. It's not the farmer who has caused many of these problems here. Let's educate ourselves on what is right. Don't let the smoke in front of you blur your vision so bad that you get lost and never find your way back to doing what is right because you're not looking at the facts.

"You can hate the company, as many mentioned so many times, but don't hate the practice. Done the right way, this product does not kill you. So I ask that you hold all offenders of misuse to the highest level of penalties and fines, but do not remove a tool that most farmers need to use as a last resort. And if you remove the tools of a surgeon, he would not be able to perform his surgery. So I ask you, Mr. Speaker, don't be a hater, be a sweet potater. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. With due respect to my colleague who just went before me, the refutation of that argument is embarrassingly simple. Domestic product use of this chemical is to kill bugs in your house. How many people in here eat cockroaches? That's a serious question. Because we don't eat cockroaches, we use this chemical to put it on them and get rid of them. Certain agriculture, especially large ag, puts the chemical on our food, it's that simple."

Representative DeCoite rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with all due respect to my colleague from Ewa Beach, I'm not saying we're eating the cockroaches, unless you're in Thailand or some other foreign country. What I'm saying is, the release of the spray of which we are allowed to purchase over-the-counter, and it's aerosol, is what is being ingested, as we so had said earlier in the case of the woman out of New York. So, thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Creagan rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'll try and be brief. I'm rising in support for this. The chemical companies come up with wonderful chemicals to kill things. And when they first start using them, they seem wonderful, like DDT did. It was, it actually was very useful, it wiped out malaria, the malaria mosquito. We had malaria in our country, which was very prevalent in the south, southern United States and California. So it was very useful that it eradicated in the '80s mosquito here. But then the unintended consequences, all the complications of using it, so now it's banned by the WHO, except for some limited uses against malaria in South Africa and in adjoining countries.

"So we learn from experience that some of these poisons are just too poisonous to use. Europe, the EU, has banned this chemical for all uses except in greenhouses to treat brassica seedlings with a robot. So, we learn by experience, and we've learned that this, unfortunately, that this is not safe to use and that's the conclusion of the EU, is that there's no way to make this used safely without banning it. Our EPA made the same conclusion that there's no way to use this on food crops without banning it. But then our president appointed Scott Pruitt to run the EPA, and the EPA, he contravened 10,000 pages of testimony supporting the position to ban it.

"Now, in our state, because he did that, the food that comes into our state has chlorpyrifos on it. Almost all of vegetables, or many of them, and ones that're imported from Mexico are even worse. But they come in here. If we ban it here, at least the food grown here will be safe to eat. If we ban it here, our pregnant women will not be necessarily exposed.

"Now, the other problem of course is that pregnant women don't know they're pregnant until too late, and there's no guidelines currently in place by these companies to prevent pregnant women or warn pregnant women from going into the fields where this is sprayed, and it can affect their fetuses and damage their brains permanently. So the precautionary principle which our EPA was taking said that this should be banned, the EU has banned it, it's on proposition 65 listed in California. And I think we just need to protect our people by banning this. There are other options, and the chemical companies that have them, I'm sure they'll be happy to sell them to people. They work as well, they may be a little more expensive at this time, but the more they make, the less the costs, the lower costs will come. So, anyway, I just strongly support this bill."

Representative Tokioka rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representative DeCoite be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ing rose, stating:

"I was just going to say, with all due respect to all my colleagues, this is second reading, there's two more committees, so I call the question."

The Chair addressed Representative Ing, stating:

"No, that's out of order, Representative Ing. The main motion pertains to additional measures that we haven't debated yet."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative McKelvey rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Creagan be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 1756, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PESTICIDES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives DeCoite, Tokioka and Ward voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Har, McDermott, Souki, Tupola and Woodson being excused.

Representatives Lee and Creagan, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection and the Committee on Agriculture, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 271-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2721,

as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2721, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative DeCoite rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative DeCoite's written remarks are as follows:

"I believe that requiring prior public notification will subject farmers to vandalism and theft. Forcing notification to everybody will set farmers back and result in additional costs they don't need. *Mahalo*."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2721, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representative DeCoite voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Har, McDermott, Souki, Tupola and Woodson being excused.

Representative Ing, for the Committee on Ocean, Marine Resources, & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 272-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2381, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2381, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RULES GOVERNING COMMERCIAL ACTIVITY FOR OCEAN RECREATION AND COASTAL AREAS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives Har, McDermott, Souki, Tupola and Woodson being excused.

Representative Ing, for the Committee on Ocean, Marine Resources, & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 273-18) recommending that H.B. No. 1999, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Labor & Public Employment.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1999, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRAINING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Labor & Public Employment, with Representatives Har, McDermott, Souki, Tupola and Woodson being excused.

Representative Ing, for the Committee on Ocean, Marine Resources, & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 274-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2355, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2355, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PERSONAL PRIVACY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary, with Representatives Har, McDermott, Souki, Tupola and Woodson being excused.

Representative Ing, for the Committee on Ocean, Marine Resources, & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 275-18) recommending that H.B. No. 1722, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred jointly to the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection and the Committee on Water & Land.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and

H.B. No. 1722, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CESSPOOLS," passed Second Reading and was referred jointly to the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection and the Committee on Water & Land, with Representatives Har, McDermott, Souki, Tupola and Woodson being excused.

Representative Ing, for the Committee on Ocean, Marine Resources, & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 276-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2438, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Labor & Public Employment.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2438, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAIIAN LANGUAGE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Labor & Public Employment, with Representatives Har, McDermott, Souki, Tupola and Woodson being excused.

Representative Ing, for the Committee on Ocean, Marine Resources, & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 281-18) recommending that H.B. No. 1752, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1752, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Quinlan rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Holt rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Gates rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Todd rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Nakamura rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Fukumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative DeCoite rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ito rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Keohokalole rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, reservations, brief comment. I think it's pretty clear that there's a lot of discussion that needs to be had when it comes to management of our nearshore marine ecosystems. Because of the complexity of that conversation and the need for broad public dialogue when it comes to that conversation, I have reservations with the measure as is written. Thank you."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Reservations, please, very serious ones, and I'd just like the comments of the previous speaker entered into the Journal as if they were my own. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ing rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. Usually don't do this measure, but we're the only state without permits for non-commercial fishing. Literally the only state. And if you look at the fish that are the most threatened, uhu, kumu and the like, it isn't really the commercial guys, it's the hobbyists and the subsistence folks, and people that just go and use your three prongs.

"And just like hunting where you take your son, your daughter, get their license, it's like a fun thing, and it's a responsible thing, and allows us to get data on our fish stocks. And actually, if you go and talk to people who are out fishing and who do these things, they support this, because they're seeing less and less fish, and they want to be able to pass down their practices to their kids. And I advise, it's a very, very popular issue, especially for those of you who live in coastal areas where there's a lot fisher folks. Just a caveat, thank you."

Representative Thielen rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Onishi rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Evans rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations and a few comments. The Committee on Water & Land, prior to this Committee on Ocean, Marine Resources, has heard this idea for many, many years. I think what the problem really is, is we just have no confidence in, right now the, what the former speaker said about having public dialogue and actually engaging the community that's impacted by it.

"We have to be careful because if we do move this forward, the department may end up passing fees and putting stuff in administrative rule that's totally not acceptable to the general public, and that has been a continuing problem within the department. So I think we need to have reservations just to send a strong message to the department, we still don't have confidence in your ability to have public dialogue. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Yamane rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, reservations. And just a note that, being an island state surrounded by water, there's very few free activities you can do with your children, and part of the fishing experience is also teaching them to take care of the 'āina. So I understand the concern that we're trying to address, however, I think there's a lot of families that would be impacted or reduce their ability to do wholesome family-oriented activities that would be supported in the community. Thank you."

Representative Fukumoto rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Yamane be entered into the Journal as her own, and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Fukumoto's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in opposition to this bill because I believe further outreach and discussion with the public is warranted before we jump into a new licensing system for non-commercial fishing. While we certainly need to preserve the limited resources of our state and protect marine life, we can do so in a way that doesn't alienate the community that will feel the impact of this measure the most. Fishing is a part of Hawaii's culture and tradition, and our local fishing community should be a part of the conversations surrounding marine sustainability and any potential licensing system.

"The report referenced in HB 1752 conducted by Conservation International and the Western Pacific Regional Fishery Management Council affirms community engagement as a key step to effectively establishing a registry, permit, or licensing (RPL) system. In fact, the study group assessed different possible RPL systems, and it did not choose one in particular due to the intricacies of the issue and the need to include stakeholders. In addition, the report offered a page and a half of issues to be carefully considered prior to establishing a system which have not yet been addressed. These issues include outreach, additional research and information gathering, funds, advisory boards, native Hawaiian rights, and enforcement.

"As a body, we have seen our fishing community in this building a great deal over the past few years as different measures were introduced that directly affected their way of life. It is a community that is involved and willing to collaborate; we should be honoring to them by including them in the process of finding solutions to marine resource problems and in creating a possible RPL system. This measure is premature, Mr. Speaker, let's talk to our community before imposing a drastic change like this one."

Representative Choy rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I want to change my reservation to a no vote. And I have a brief comment. Being that as someone said, there are very few things that are free and there are very few things that the government has got its nose in, and I think fishing should be a rite of passage that everyone should have. And it would appear that we should all have a vetting in our community before we really vote for something like this.

"I know there's a propensity now for some to say it keeps the fish stock. I think it's a bit more sophisticated than keeping the fish stock supplied properly, but I would say this one needs a lot of study, a lot of dialogue, a lot of feedback from those who not only have a vested interest in it, but for those who live in the surrounding ocean community that we call our home. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Reefs across the globe, not just in Hawaii, are in serious peril right now with climate change and global warming. We had a huge bleaching event in Hawaii in 2014 that had almost 50% mortality rate. A fishing permit, keeping fish on the reef and protecting our resources, a fishing permit is a large part of this.

"The intent and the effect, I don't believe would be to limit, would not be to limit access to fishing, or to make it really costly so that people could not participate, it's to preserve the ability to continue doing it into the future. Without a fishing permit, there's no opportunity to educate people about how to fish responsibly. There's no opportunity to collect data so that we have a better understanding of our resources and how to protect them.

"We have a choice to make here. We can take the view that people are going to react poorly to this and not take any action, and the consequence of that in the future could be that there's not fishing at all. It sounds dramatic, but I think the science is there, and there's serious threats to the resource, so that needs to be considered when we look at this."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Strong support. I'd like the words of the previous speaker entered into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative LoPresti continued, stating:

"I'd also like to share, I've spoken with the fishermen in my community, and especially the old timers are strongly in support of this. Because when they're fishing and they see some of these younger guys come out, and they try to ask them, hey, don't take that fish, they're breeding, they're in breeding season. The younger fishermen don't care and they say they don't know and they don't care.

"Now, I know that's not true for everybody, but this is a prime opportunity to help educate people for a nominal fee. It's been mentioned before, we're the only state in the country that has no basic fee for fishing. I grew up in the Midwest. I was not prevented from having wonderful experiences with my father and my uncle and my grandpa because we had to get a \$10 fishing license. Rather, we were educated about fish, and we helped them record fishing takes.

"It's been noted also, that the largest depletion of our nearshore reefs of the fishes are from those doing it recreationally. And this, again, will help educate, and help take that data. So, it's beyond important that we do this. Thank you."

Representative Ing rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Lowen be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1752, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AQUATIC LIFE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary, with Representatives DeCoite,

Evans, Keohokalole, Matsumoto, McKelvey, Nakamura, Thielen and Yamane voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Choy, Fukumoto, Gates, Holt, Ito, Onishi, Quinlan, Todd, Tokioka and Ward voting no, and with Representatives Har, McDermott, Souki, Tupola and Woodson being excused.

Representatives Ing and Yamane, for the Committee on Ocean, Marine Resources, & Hawaiian Affairs and the Committee on Water & Land, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 282-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2625, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2625, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection, with Representatives Har, McDermott, Souki, Tupola and Woodson being excused.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2452, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations with a brief comment. This is a good bill because it says new construction should have a category 3 hurricane shelter. My difficulty with it is that it cut the heart out of what the actual original bill was, and that was what a nuclear fallout was added to it. The point is, it was a good wakeup call bill, now it's just another vanilla ice cream bill. Because of that, it's with reservations."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 2452, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC SAFETY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Ward voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Souki being excused.

Representative LoPresti, for the Committee on Veterans, Military, & International Affairs, & Culture and the Arts, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 315-18) recommending that H.B. No. 1944, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1944, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Cachola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Strong support, Mr. Speaker. We know we funded the Filipino burial assistance last year, but it's only good for one year, that's July 1, 2017 to June 30, 2018. So, this bill is to create a special fund so that it will continue to be funded. And I'd like to request written remarks inserted in the Journal. Thank you."

Representative Cachola's written remarks are as follows:

"The sacrifices of Filipino soldiers played a vital role in the Allied victory in the Pacific as their numerous guerrilla actions provided United States forces with time to build and prepare for the Allied counterattack. Filipino soldiers fought side-by-side with United States forces to secure their island nation as the strategic base from which the Allied forces launched their final effort to bring an end to World War II.

"Due to their efforts, Act 105 was established to provide burial assistance to Filipino veterans living in Hawaii. This Act began on July 1, 2017 and will remain in effect until June 30, 2018. After such time, funding will discontinue. To avoid reintroducing this bill every two years, a special fund will be created through H.B. 1944, HD 1. Current funding does not meet the veterans' basic burial obligations for repatriation of remains and other funeral expenses, hence funding must then be determined by the Legislature with the help of the Department of Veterans Affairs.

"I stand in strong support of this bill."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1944, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FILIPINO VETERANS BURIAL ASSISTANCE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Souki being excused.

So, I'll be coming up with additional written remarks to be inserted in the Journal. Thank you."

Representative Cachola's written remarks are as follows:

"Premiums under Medicare are taken from retirees' Social Security checks. This bill protects the retiree from losing their own money due to a two-year retrieval policy, which is otherwise forfeited if EUTF is not notified. H.B. 2466, HD 1 allows retirees claiming Medicare Part B reimbursement to receive payments from as far back as 2013, so long as it is claimed.

"Retirees must not be penalized. If retirees are unable to claim due to disability, incapacitation, relocation, or other circumstances, they will not be able to notify EUTF. Hence, this bill allows retirees the right to proper and timely notification."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations with brief comments. Three brief points, Mr. Speaker. We should not pass bills that are not enforceable, there's no way we're going to enforce this. Secondly, should we be the ones saying what can and cannot be bought on the internet? I don't think so. And thirdly, this asks for big brother. How are you going to enforce something when somebody's on their internet and they say, hey we're ordering cigarettes? Other than the NSA or other kinds of abusive government agencies, how are you going to enforce this, unless you really spy on the citizens? This is a slippery slope on which we should not venture. Thank you."

Representative Tupola rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1907, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Tupola and Ward voting aye with reservations, with Representatives McDermott and Quinlan voting no, and with Representative Souki being excused.

So those are my concerns, and obviously, it has a little ways to go. Thank you."

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support with slight, slight reservations. I want to be very clear, I support the intent of this measure, I think it is absolutely laudable. This is a Women's Legislative Caucus measure. I think my biggest concern though is, we always talk about the devil is in the details.

"I would draw the body's attention specifically to Walgreens's opposition. The fact of the matter here is that here in Hawaii we do not have any drug enforcement agent sanctioned facilities, which would dispose of these medications. Pharmaceutical waste that is generated by pharmacies cannot be destroyed in any other way. In addition, it would be against federal law for Walgreens to ship pharmaceutical waste for disposal.

"So, as this bill moves on to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, I hope that we can find some resolution to this, because I think this is a wonderful measure. Many of us know that twice a year the Attorney General's Office has the take back drug initiative. So this would be very convenient for many of our residents, including our, most importantly, our  $k\bar{u}puna$ . But right now I think, again, we just have an issue with how we're going to get there with respect to enforcing this bill. So for those reasons, I'm with very slight reservations. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

## ORDER OF THE DAY

## REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES

Representative Lee, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 446-18) recommending that H.B. No. 1714, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1714, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Har rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support with reservations, please. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, the purpose of the bill was to clarify the parking fee exemption for EVs parked in non-metered parking stalls by specifying that electric vehicles shall be exempt from parking fees for no longer than 24 hours. I don't have an issue with that.

"My concern arises from the amendments that were made. Specifically, now the bill authorizes DOT to adopt rules for registration and license plates for electric vehicles, and exempts electric vehicles from parking fees and HOV lane restrictions.

"As someone who lives on the west side, the point of the HOV lanes is to incentivize people to carpool so that they are taking cars off of the freeway and they're not exacerbating the traffic problems that we have. If you have a person in an EV who only has one person in that car, that defeats the whole purpose of the HOV lane. So for those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I stand with reservations. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Ruling on a potential conflict. I have an electric car and it's awesome," and the Chair ruled, "no conflict."

Representative LoPresti continued to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Strong support. I just want to say, we've incentivized the fossil fuel industry for more than 100 years. It's going to take a little bit of incentive, and this is very modest, to try to incentivize people to move off of that.

"Furthermore, as somebody who lives on the west side and uses the HOV with an electric car, I can attest that there is lots and lots and lots of room in the HOV for lots of people to still carpool and to continue this incentive. It is working. There's still a lot more room to go, and there's a lot of room in the HOV lane for people to carpool or get electric cars. Thanks."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations. I think there's new data that says we should disincentivize this, at least, it's suggested so far. As we had with the research into ethanol, the amount of energy it took to produce the ethanol was not worth the amount of energy that was being saved by using ethanol. And some of the more recent studies have indicated that the amount of energy for the battery production and the use of the electric car, the actual building and the operation of an electrical car actually equals more than the electrical car is saving for the environment. So, Mr. Speaker, I think we should be contemplative and research-oriented as we proceed with these favorite vehicle legislation, such as this. Thank you."

Representative Lee rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I recognize it's second reading, Mr. Speaker. In support. I'd just like to clarify something, and for anyone who understandably raises concerns about electric vehicles beginning to drive in HOV lanes or park around the city, I just note that those rules were adopted back in 2012 and that's been the case already for six years, and this bill doesn't enable them to do anything more. Thank you."

Representative Har rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Second time. Again, I appreciate the comments that have been made by the previous speakers and I realize that the HOV

exemption has been in place, but again, that defeats the whole purpose of the HOV lanes. It's to get people out of their cars to carpool so that we can have less traffic on the freeway.

"Again, as somebody from the west side, and a previous speaker from Ewa Beach had noted that that lane is empty, that's not the point. The point is that the HOV lane is to be used for people with two or more in their cars, because we are trying to incentivize people to get out, instead of single people driving in their cars alone, we're trying to incentivize people to carpool so there are less cars on the freeway, so that we can deal with the traffic problem that we have, specifically from the west side. So for those reasons, I continue to stand with reservations. Thank you."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Just with reservations. Appreciate the conversation and look forward to more of it in Finance. *Mahalo*."

So, we've always thought about this as something that would help affordable housing, but again, our schools need a lot of help as well. *Mahalo*."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Reservations. I'd like the words of the previous speaker adopted as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative LoPresti continued, stating:

"In Ewa Beach and the west side, we're seeing so much development with so little infrastructure put in. People are moving there because it's where the affordable houses are, but this pattern of putting the cart before the horse has to end. We need to make sure we have infrastructure for transportation and infrastructure for education there at least concurrently with, if not before we put in the housing.

"Every day I'm getting letters from my constituents complaining that we're still building more houses, more houses and more houses, and there's been very little of anything done to mitigate traffic. We just approved, not we, but the State had approved, Hoopili going in there, and the DOT allowed them to do that without putting in the traffic mitigation measures, and now we're living through that, and it's getting worse every day. And we need these fees to help have the infrastructure for the families buying the houses. Otherwise, there's no point in having houses there. Thank you."

Representative Gates rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Har rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations. May I please adopt the words of the Minority Leader as well as the Chair of VMI into the record as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Har continued, stating:

"And I would just note for the record that, currently the amount of school impact fees that are being collected are not even enough. So, again, as a previous speaker had noted, that affordable housing is where all the houses are being built on the west side, that's why people are moving out to the west side, because that's where the affordable housing is going. And so, currently the school impact fees are not even enough to build the infrastructure required to assist all of the housing, to accommodate all of the housing that we're building. And so to pass this bill out would further degradate the quality of life for the folks living on the west side, given the fact that their infrastructure is not even appropriate at this time. So for those reasons, I'm with reservations. Thank you."

Representative Tupola rose to respond, stating:

"Still with reservations, and I just want to thank the previous two speakers and insert into the record that the current school impact fee for single-family units is \$3,359, and for multi-family dwellings \$1,796. And I'm in strong agreeance that there, maybe we should have a bill to increase those so that we can actually get the sufficient amount of schools and capacity that we need out there. Thank you."

"So I think those two suggestions should be taken into consideration since it wasn't just the lack of a visitation center, but more things that we should be looking into to make sure that incarcerated families can interact with their loved ones. Thank you."

"To me, the bill the way it's written, it says if the resort fee is mandatory, you've got to pay the TAT. Right now, they don't pay the TAT, and if you're a hotel, what you're going to do is simply say, look it's not mandatory, but they're still going to stick it on the bill, and unless the customer contests it, they're going to pay it, and then the hotelier will not have to pay the TAT.

"So I'm not sure if the wording really gets at what the problem is. The problem has been that this resort fee has escaped the TAT tax, and this one is to make it happen, and I'm not sure if it's going to work. So until the wording comes clear to me or is changed, I am no on this issue. Thank you."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Just reservations, looking forward to discussion in Finance. Thank you."

Representative Har rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Currently, there's no legal definition of a resort fee, and therefore you can have hoteliers 'lower their rates,' quote, unquote, to \$50 a night and then charge you a mandatory \$200 resort fee, and that allows them to avoid the TAT taxes. The only way that those resort fees are really practically ever taken off is if you gnash your teeth and stamp your feet at the front desk and make a scene, and then they'll remove it for you, maybe. And this helps to close the loophole that I think is being abused. Thank you."

Ms. Lolena Nicholas, Instructor and Mānaleo Resource for Kawaihuelani Center for Hawaiian Language at UH Mānoa.

Representative Quinlan recognized Dr. Wong, a native speaker from the island of Ni'ihau and former *kumu* at Pūnana Leo o Honolulu, for her contributions to the advancement of 'ōlelo Hawai'i, and introduced honoree who was seated on the Floor of the House:

Dr. Kuʻuipolani Kanahele Wong, Associate Professor and Director of Kawaihuelani Center for Hawaiian Language at UH Mānoa.

Representative Tupola recognized Dr. Kimura, the "grandfather" of Hawaiian language revitalization in modern Hawaii, for his lifetime of service to the revitalization of 'ōlelo Hawai'i through his work as a kumu, songwriter of mele Hawaii, 'ōlelo Hawai'i activist, as a co-founder of 'Aha Pūnana Leo, and introduced honoree who was seated on the Floor of the House:

"I stand also in reservations as to the HD 2 specifically for the criminalization. I don't expect the owner of CVS, who is in the mainland, to be actually criminalized, but the mom and pop, the Avon lady, because we do have oxybenzone in makeup, is the one who's going to end up suffering with the criminalization. And so, for that, I stand with reservations."

Representative McKelvey rose, stating:

"Just a clarification. I'm in support of the measure, no reservations."

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Just to clarify, the bill applies to sunscreens that contain oxybenzone because that's the biggest contributor of oxybenzone and other chemicals like it to the environment, it doesn't apply to other personal care products that contain oxybenzone or to prescriptions."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support, but I would like the words of the speaker from Puna as well as from Maui inserted as if they were my own, and also tracking that portion of it. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

I'm thinking particularly, Department of Land and Natural Resources, for their enforcement division is right within the department and knows very well all of the different rules for that department, and then uprooting them and putting them in Office of the Attorney General, I don't think it's going to be more effective for preservation and protection of our environmental natural resources.

"So, I hope to learn more about this. It is going on to Finance, it will come back to us for, I assume, for another vote if Finance decides that this makes sense. And at this point, I'm a no vote. Thank you."

Representative Say rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations, quick comment. Thank you. Same concerns as the Representative from Kailua, but specifically in regards to DLNR, we've had issues with not understanding, one, the community, and two, within the department, and I feel like putting them even farther away from it, that's my main concern. It's just those interactions that those officers have had and making sure that we keep them as close to the situation and department as possible so they can be more knowledgeable about it, rather than more distant and not sure why they're at certain incidents and

arresting people that they're not even sure what's going on. So, that's my concern, obviously it has a ways to go. Thank you."

Representative Har rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

"Why the heck do we unionize it, unless there's really a super grievance, I'm not sure whether we're just doing this to increase the cost of the University of Hawaii, which already is a concern, because everybody says that tuition is going through the roof.

"So, Mr. Speaker, I hope as we have done in the past, think very seriously about this, and why the students need to be unionized is still questionable. Thank you."

Representative Choy rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. The point of this bill is to allow the graduate students to collectively bargain. I believe everybody has the right to collectively bargain, and I think this bill does that. So, I'm in strong support. Thank you."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. There were actually five issues that the graduate students had with the college, and specifically with the office of graduate assistants. We've been trying to work on two of the five, which one was as simple as there was no manual telling them what the procedure was as far as when you're a graduate assistant, what the payrate is, when you get paid, how recent or late they give you notice that you're going to continue on to the next semester, so that part's been resolved.

"The other part was that the notice that they gave students when they actually had maybe not decided to continue them on for the next semester was too short for them, and a lot of them didn't have that tuition figured out before that they were cut off.

"So, again, I think that whatever happens with this, is what happens. But we really should get into the nitty gritty of what those issues were and just start to solve it with the university, because they can start to do some of that stuff now. So, thank you."

"When you do something like this where you're going to fine people for not having their license displayed, like a restaurant doesn't have their pass displayed, and the guy's got to have something in his pocket also that says that he's kosher. Why we want to go after these small guys I would agree with if we have, 2017 we had so many pirate mechanics. There's no evidence that RICO knew, in the hearing. So, I would suggest for those who are going to hear this bill in the future, if RICO doesn't come up with some reason, this is simply just a premeditated attack on the small guys who are trying to make a living by being mechanics.

"And with that, Mr. Speaker, I would hope everybody would pursue this so we don't pinch the small business community more than they already are being done so. Thank you."

"Mr. Speaker, 670, I stand in support. Very briefly, I'd like to thank the committee chair for hearing the measure. He always makes me feel like a fully enfranchised member of the committee and cares about the input that I'm giving, and asks for it.

"I'd also like to thank my colleague from Ewa Beach. We had a town hall meeting, it was in my district, but I invited him out to hear the concerns of the residents regarding this road. He took two, two and a half hours out of his night, a very busy individual, but he saw the concerns of these folks, because it's a safety issue.

"Very briefly, the road, the City owns one third of the road, then the golf course owns a third of the road, then the Navy owns the final third. Well, as you can imagine, the only part of the road that's not maintained is the part that the golf course owns. So that's when cars get dumped there, or refrigerators, or tires, or trash. The golf course is less than receptive to pick it up. And it's only about 800 meters, but it's 800 meters right in the middle of the road. So it creates quite a problem for the elected officials, because we get all the phone calls, and we call the City, and they say it's private property, we can't do anything about it.

"To that regard, the golf course has said they will give us the road, previously. I went over there this morning, as a matter of fact, trying to get it for a dollar. We can worry about improvements down the road, but if we can get this, we can be in the process of bringing this up to snuff, because there're 1,400 families that live in Iroquois Point, and this is a problem for

"So, that being said, I'd like to thank the chair and my colleague from Ewa Beach for taking the time out to come out there and hear the concerns of people that weren't in his district. I found that truly remarkable. Thank you, sir "

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, in strong support. This is extremely important for the Ewa Beach community. This is a road that has brush overflowing on it that children are walking down at 4:00 in the morning, 5:00 in the morning, to get to the school or get to the bus, and walking back at 7:00 p.m. or later, just to get home, along a very dark road with speeding cars and no sidewalks and dumped cars, it's a mess. And we really owe it to the people in the Iroquois Point community to do this. So, very, very strong support, and thanks to my colleague for taking the lead on this."

Representative Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, I'm rising to speak against Standing Committee Report 696. This is relating to transient accommodations, or TVUs as they're known in the community. Evidently, the neighbor islands, Mr. Speaker, have special use permits to allow these kinds of short-term rentals on the neighbor islands. Oahu does not, and so I'm speaking against the bill as an Oahu Representative, and one on the Windward side, an area that is so badly hit by the illegal short-term rentals. Those short-term rentals take away housing from our local folks in the community. They can't find rentals because they're all on this short-term basis.

"So this bill, I understand the proponents are trying to come up with something that's going to help solve this. Well, it won't help solve it for Oahu, and I'll tell you why. What it's doing, it's developing a process, it's telling the City and County of Honolulu, among the others, to develop a process to expediently issue special use permits, and that's for the short-term rentals. So it's saying, City and County, we'll give you \$1 million from the State, \$1 million, and you have to in return develop a special use permit for short-term rentals.

"And then on top of that, Mr. Speaker, we put in a process that says all of those illegal operators now that are going to be first in the door to try to get the short-term rental permits, all those illegal operators then are granted a speedy, expedited process for addressing an appeal to the City that would be filed by any of the short-term operators that were denied a special use permit.

"So, number one, we've got the \$1 million on Oahu. We tell the City, put in a special use permit system, which they haven't had, for good reason, and the special use permit is for issuing short-term rental permits in our Windward side and other areas of the island where these short-term rentals, the illegal operators, have been operating. Then we say, okay, you illegal operators, if you're denied the permit, you get an expedited appeal process.

"So what do you think that's going to do, I mean what message is that, to these illegal operators? Number one, be first in the door, tell the City you want the \$1 million from the State, get going, let us have our special use permit, we want to make this something that we can go ahead and do all the time in our neighborhoods.

"Number two, you denied it to me? I'm going to be 9,486th in line behind all these others that are appealing your denial of my special use permit. So we'll flood the City and we will get what we want, which is to be able to turn our residential areas into resort destinations, taking away the housing from our kids, our local folks, giving it out to the tourists in residential areas, and degrading the integrity of those residential areas.

"I know the bill was well intentioned, but as it applies to Oahu, it's a terrible, terrible bill, Mr. Speaker, and it will destroy the integrity of our neighborhoods. A lot of us are fighting back against this, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Matsumoto rose to yield her time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Thielen continued, stating:

"Thank you very much. A lot of us are fighting back against this, and we're saying. A lot of us as we go door to door, Mr. Speaker, you can tell when there's a dead street, where they're all the illegal rentals, no slippers outside the door, and those lock things that you punch in a code that those operators give to someone calling from the mainland or from overseas. You punch in the code and then you go in. The places are sterile, no bicycles in the garage, everything locked up until the short-term renter appears. And then those maybe further down the street don't have a community, the communities that we've always loved and treasured.

"When my family was young, Mr. Speaker, we never locked our front door, we had a hook and eye on it. That was our evening lock. You don't have that anymore, particularly when you have strangers from all over the world coming in for two, three, four nights. You have the mess of the trash they leave behind, because they don't care, they don't pick it up, they don't put the blue bin out, the green bin out, the grey bin out, none of that.

"And this bill is creating, with \$1 million, creating a process for the City and County to go ahead and just open up our neighborhoods to become tourist destinations for short-term stays. And then it's doing the other thing, Mr. Speaker, it will erode away a large part of their \$1 million to have to handle the multitude of contested case proceedings that they have, if they ever do deny any of these short-term rental permits.

"So I really would ask Oahu members in sensitive areas, Windward side certainly, other areas where they've been hit, I would ask them to rethink their support for this bill, and I would hope that the bill does not survive to make it over to the Senate side. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'd like to commend my colleague from Kailua, and with that, a no vote. Thank you."

Representative Todd rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Briefly, in support. I just wanted to point out that I have a punch key entrance for my door, it's very convenient for when you need someone to come in and feed your cats or if you forget your keys, so I just wanted to point that out. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2605, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRANSIENT ACCOMMODATIONS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Thielen and Ward voting no, and with Representatives DeCoite, Ing, Nakamura, Onishi and Woodson being excused.

Representative Onishi, for the Committee on Tourism, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 697-18) recommending that H.B. No. 1828, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Souki rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I have some reservations with this item. Historically, I had something to do in developing tourist accommodation tax, and throughout the years I've seen that the tax has been raided, so to speak, by different types of function other than the purpose of marketing.

"The tourist accommodation tax was developed for marketing purposes, and to provide assistance to the counties in the pursuit of tourism. And I see that we're beginning to move away from these things here. The language in the bill here, as far as mitigating types of problems that they have because of tourism, I don't know how you can define mitigation, it's such a general term, you can say the whole state is mitigated by tourism. So to get a

particular area that's going to claim that they're mitigated is going to lead to a lot of litigation and a lot of problems, besides, again, taking money away from tourism where it should be used for two items. One is for marketing, one is to assist the counties in the pursuit of tourism. Thank you very much."

Representative Ward rose, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I wasn't clear whether the previous speaker was for or against the bill."

Speaker Saiki then stated:

"He was with reservations."

Representative Souki rose, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I believe I said with reservations because I want to see as this bill proceeds how it's going to effect, but at this moment I have some grave reservations."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1828, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TOURISM," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Souki voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives DeCoite, Ing, Nakamura, Onishi and Woodson being excused.

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support. I want to thank the introducer, thank all of those who put it together. It's definitely an issue, not just in our community, across the island as well as across the state. One clarification I wanted to bring up is that on line six and seven of the last page, it says that if there's no current registration it should be considered derelict.

"I just wanted to share with the members, since a lot of us have been going back and forth on how to help out with this issue, that currently in the law, in 298, derelict is already defined as this. So there's five things that make a car derelict, which means that you can just haul it whenever you want. One, is that the registered owner doesn't live at the address anymore. Two, is that the registered owner says that's not my car. Three, if the license plate and

the VIN number are scratched out, it's derelict. Four, if it hasn't been registered in that period or previous years. And five, if it's not registered in that county, it's considered derelict and you can haul it.

"So as far as those people who are trying to solve the issue, this helps us. This bill helps and as well knowing what derelict helps, so that we can all be active and help out in our communities, since it's a growing epidemic everywhere now. So, thank you."

Representative Gates rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support. This measure is very important to my District 44. Abandoned vehicles are not just eyesores anymore, they are environmental and safety hazards for our residents out on the coastline. And I just like to thank the chairman of Transportation for moving this measure out, and I hope we can pass it out of the House. *Mahalo*."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. And I asked them how they detect for fraud, and it's actually a really, really strong, I think, tight-knit system where they actually check five different points in the signature matched up with the ballot, so they've actually been able to do away with a lot of those skepticisms that it'd be fraudulent, and they showed me how they do it, so I kind of sort of became a believer once I saw that. And I think that if we can try to embrace it, even as a pilot, it could be a good idea, especially if we model it after states that have gone through all of those issues and worked them out. Thank you."

Representative Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising to speak against this bill, and I voted against it in committee hearing as well. Mr. Speaker, I would like to thank the chair for removing the political rhetoric in the bill that was, I think, very inappropriate to be in a measure before this body. But the difficulty is that the entire bill is political. And what it is doing, I'm afraid, it's going to put Hawaii in the, whatever you call those things on a rifle, the crosshairs, in the crosshairs of the Federal Government.

"We can take the example in Chicago, which is a sanctuary city, and the Federal Government has come down pretty hard on undocumented residents back there. So, in a bill that we're trying to put forward to be a feel-good bill to protect our undocumented residents, what we're actually doing, I believe, is putting them at significant harm. These are people that are in our communities that some of us know personally, some of us know of them, some of us see them, maybe they're coaches of our athletic teams, maybe they're volunteers on beach cleanups, you name it, what they are, they're part of our communities.

"And the way to protect them is not by passing this bill, because this bill is saying to Washington D.C., to the administration, come get them. Look what we're doing, we're saying you can't, we're picking a fight with you. Well, they're a heck of a lot bigger than we are, they have a heck of a lot more resources, and they're going to then come after the very people that we should be trying to protect. It's a feel-good bill, Mr. Speaker, but it doesn't do good for the undocumented residents in our communities.

"I hope people will think hard about this. It's a pretty dramatic step to say we're going to be the sanctuary state in the Pacific. And that's, I think, going to have a very sad backlash against the people that we would like to protect in our communities. Thank you."

Representative McDermott rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No vote, brief comment. To summarize, having spoken rather lengthily on third reading, I would just summarize by saying, this bill is going to cost us money and our reputation.

"Money, I noted that 25% of our budget is actually federal money, why should we want to jeopardize that? Let's be like Mayor Caldwell, he saw \$1.5 billion coming out of the feds for the rail. And anybody on this floor who voted for rail should think twice, because \$750 million is still sitting with the Federal Government. Why do we want to poke our fingers in the eyes of the administration?

"And then the reputation is, we have been known to do that, I think this will even make it more intensive, like sharpen our fingernails so when we poke the next time it'll hurt even all the more.

"Mr. Speaker, we don't need to do that, this is a nation of 51. I would just put it this way. We are part of a bigger entity called the Federal Government, where 50 states of which we are one of those, and to say that we're not going to cooperate with the mothership just doesn't make any sense.

"And as my colleague from Kailua said, this is more of a political statement. Mr. Speaker, political statements belong in resolutions, not in law, bills like this. So let's get over it and get on with it, and let this thing go

on the wayside the way it did with, it came up in the City and County and they realized that, hey we don't want to cut our nose to spite our face for economic reasons and for reputational reasons. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, let us all contemplate what we're doing here. Thank you."

Representative Choy rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tokioka rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Thielen be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Har rose in opposition to the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Har's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to Standing Committee Report number 748-18, HB 1994, HD 2, Relating to Law Enforcement. This bill would prohibit state law enforcement agencies from complying with federal immigration detainers or honoring requests for 'non-public information.' I oppose this measure for the following reasons: HB 1994 contravenes federal law and could result in the loss of federal funds, it is unconstitutional, and it opens-up our law enforcement agencies to liability.

"First, HB 1994 may cause the loss of federal funding because it contravenes federal law. As stated by the Department of the Attorney General, 'it is the position of federal authorities that when federal grantees commit to following all relevant federal laws when they sign for their grant awards, it includes compliance with section 1373.' Title 8 U.S.C., section 1373, subsection (b) reads:

... no person or agency may prohibit, or in any way restrict, a Federal, State, or local government entity from doing any of the following with respect to information regarding the immigration status...

Thus, noncompliance with title 8 U.S.C., section 1373 could result in the loss or delay of federal funding.

"Secondly, HB 1994 is unconstitutional. As the ACLU testified, 'the non-warrant exceptions to the prohibition against honoring immigration detainers are contrary to the 4th Amendment and therefore, unconstitutional.' The exceptions made in section 4(b)(2) of HB 1994 states that a Hawaii law enforcement agency would allow for an ICE detainer request under certain conditions, even without a judge's signature or a warrant. It is this section specifically that is unconstitutional.

"Finally, HB 1994 leaves our law enforcement agencies open to liability. The Maui Department of the Prosecuting Attorney testified that 'this measure does not protect state and county law enforcement agencies from liability if a person who should have been held on an immigration detainer is released pursuant to this measure and the person victimizes members of the public.' We should be considering the protection of our local and state law enforcement. We should not be setting them up for possible lawsuits.

"It is for these reasons, Mr. Speaker, that I rise in opposition to this measure."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. No vote, quick comment. When it came up last year, my vote was in the same regards, which is, us dictating through state law what law enforcement officers should do, which at the time of incidence, giving them the autonomy to decide and as an agency determine if it's a safety issue or if they should comply, I think we should leave it at that level so that there's no interference from the state side, and issues that may or may not regard safety of the citizens. So, thank you very much."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1994, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LAW ENFORCEMENT," was referred to the

Committee on Finance, with Representatives Choy, Har, Matsumoto, McDermott, Thielen, Tokioka, Tupola and Ward voting no, and with Representatives DeCoite, Ing, Nakamura, Onishi and Woodson being excused.

Representative Ohno, for the Committee on Intrastate Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 749-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2651, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2651, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WIRELESS BROADBAND FACILITIES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives DeCoite, Ing, Nakamura, Onishi and Woodson being excused.

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1950, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PRACTICE OF PHARMACY," was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives Cachola and Ward voting no, and with Representatives DeCoite, Ing, Nakamura, Onishi and Woodson being excused.

Representative Takumi, for the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 751-18) recommending that H.B. No. 1911, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1911, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives DeCoite, Ing, Nakamura, Onishi and Woodson being excused.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. Representative Takumi, for the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 754-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2471, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2471, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, on 754 and 755, for expeditious sake, please note my reservations and comments to the Journal."

Representative McKelvey's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker I stand with strong reservations on both HB 2471 and HB 2727 which seek in essence to make all video games gambling and pay public monies to create another level of bureaucracy to oversee the content of all video games and labeling.

"Despite the claims that this is to protect the *keiki*, the average gamer today is 35 years old with 20% percent of Americans over the age of 50 playing video games at least once per week. Additionally, Mr. Speaker, 67% of parents play video games with their children at least once per week.

"The assertations in the preambles quite frankly are sensationalist opinions rather than scientific facts.

"It would be helpful for the chair of the committee to have a comprehensive understanding of the in-game mechanisms this legislation is seeking to address before advancing something so overboard and draconian it will not only be unenforceable but create economic harm to our current diversification efforts.

"While both measures inaccurately compare the reward system of 'loot boxes' which are in-game mechanisms to gambling and being similar to slot machines, HB 2471 legally includes all reward-based games and video game loot boxes gambling. Loot boxes do not constitute gambling. In general, for an activity to constitute gambling, it must meet three elements: staking something of value (consideration) for a chance to win something of value (prize) and something of value is given to the 'House' which gets a cut for the chance to play. Loot boxes do not satisfy those elements.

"Like opening a package of baseball cards, customers might not know exactly what they are getting until they open the loot box, but they are guaranteed to get something. Loot boxes may reward the gamer with a sought-after virtual item (e.g., a hard-to-find object) or a more pedestrian item, often a combination of both. However, players always get something for use within the game, not outside the game. All loot boxes contain virtual items.

"There is no 'prize' because you cannot win something of value in the real world. Whatever worth those virtual items have, it is limited to within a virtual universe. Nor can one cash them out legally as the terms of service prohibit it. So, the virtual items found in loot boxes have no 'value' in the real world.

"If it is the *keiki* the proponents seek to protect, in my humble opinion the most effective tool available to consumers today in limiting unwanted content are the parental control features available on all devices used for playing video games.

"More to the point—why is this legislation aimed at video games while ignoring, for instance, sports cards? Who will be responsible for monitoring games with 'random rewards?' How often will they audit game publishers? Who will they audit? Who will do the auditing? Who will bear that expense? What is to prevent a publisher from offering 'clean' code up to an auditor and then going right back to the 'exploitive' code after the audit completes?

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker." [Note: See Stand. Com. Rep. No. 755-18, H.B. No. 2727, HD 1, for further remarks.]

Representative Say rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'll be changing my no vote that came out of the committee to with reservations."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Har rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2471, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONSUMER PROTECTION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives McKelvey and Say voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Har and Tokioka voting no, and with Representatives DeCoite, Ing, Nakamura, Onishi and Woodson being excused.

Representative Takumi, for the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 755-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2727, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2727, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, on 754 and 755, for expeditious sake, please note my reservations and comments to the Journal."

Representative McKelvey's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker I also stand with very strong reservations on HB 2727 which seeks to require all video games sold that feature a system of further purchasing to 'prominently disclose and publish to the consumer the probability rates of receiving each type of randomized reward' and further labeling requirements.

"HB 2727 inaccurately states that video games allow players to 'purchase changes at wining rewards within games, like a slot machine.'

"'Randomized reward' can mean anything. When I play a RPG like Lord of the Rings Online and my team defeats the Watcher, say; the Watcher will drop some 'loot.' That is, a random piece of in-game equipment; perhaps several such including rare legacy items.

"Does this mean that I and my teammates are in danger of being harmed?

"Rather than having the state mandating its own warning labels that video games are gambling, which I believe violates federal law, this body should lobby to strengthen ESRB ratings. These established ratings, when conspicuously placed with its recognizable and trusted icons and other descriptors, allow parents to quickly and easily identify in-game features they may not want their children to access, including digital purchases.

"That Lord of the Rings Online should have a big red sticker that warns purchases of the dangers of gambling addiction? That when we enter a 'dungeon' to fight the Balrog, that a big alert should pop up that details every possible bit of loot the dragon might ward and the odds of receiving each one?

"Again, why is this measure also only targeting video games? If a warning is required on Madden Football or Star Wars Battlefront II, then surely every product on a store shelf that offers a 'random reward' should likewise be labeled as potentially harmful and addictive? Magic the Gathering? Harmful? Fleer Football Stars 2018? Harmful. Chocolate Kinder Joy. Addictive! Delicious, but harmful to our youth!

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker." [Note: See Stand. Com. Rep. No. 754-18, H.B. No. 2471, HD 1, for further remarks.]

Representative Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising in strong support of the measure, and I want to applaud the sponsors of this measure. I wasn't aware, Mr. Speaker, that embedded in some of the video games is a device that really encourages gambling and gambling addiction, and these are games that our kids are using.

"So, it's something that has kind of gone under the radar, and I am very pleased that these three sponsors are bringing it out into the open so we can really take a look at this more seriously, because we're enabling gambling addiction in our youth, and I'm glad we're going to take some steps to reverse that. Thank you."

Representative Say rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Once more, I'll change my vote that I was a no from the committee, as a with reservations, thanks to a member who educated me on this issue. Thank you."

Representative Tokioka rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Same request, Mr. Speaker. I was a no vote in the CPC Committee and I'd like to change that on this vote today for reservations. Thank you."

Representative Har rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2727, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONSUMER PROTECTION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Har, McKelvey, Say and Tokioka voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives DeCoite, Ing, Nakamura, Onishi and Woodson being excused.

"My concerns arise from the legal burden this measure places on employers of former offenders to collect and monitor their restitution payments. This may result in employers choosing to fire or simply not hire someone because of the burden of becoming a collection agent for the State. This will add to the many obstacles already faced by former offenders trying to become productive citizens.

"Last year the Legislature enacted Act 77, giving court-ordered restitution the same legal status as child support payments, enforceable as civil judgements. This law allows cash bail and state income tax returns to be applied towards restitution payments. We should fully implement these new enforcement tools before enacting a measure with potential to adversely affect employers.

"Also, the Attorney General's Office has expressed concerns over the added personnel and resources that would be needed to implement this measure, and over the coordination required with the Judiciary to enforce withholding orders. Prior versions of this measure would have placed responsibility with the Judiciary, which currently has primary responsibility for collecting and distributing restitution.

"For these reasons, I am voting with reservations on H.B. 1774, HD 1."

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 792-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2539, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2539, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PLANNED COMMUNITIES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Yamane being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 793-18) recommending that H.B. No. 1665, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1665, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Souki rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"I wish to speak against Stand. Com. Report No. 793. I speak against this measure because this measure here sends a terrible message to the counties, of which we all belong to, by the way, that we are repealing the original language in the sharing of the TAT.

"So now it will not be by a sharing of the TAT, but it will be with the counties getting tax credits, and I have no idea how they're going to get the tax credits. And also, by the fact is that this is only reimbursement for work done, and I don't know how you're going to qualify work done for tourism or work done for the County of Maui. There's going to be a fine line going to call in between. And if you hire more policemen, will then that be considered because of tourism or not? So we're going to have a huge debate on it. What it means in the end is the counties are going to take years before they get the reimbursement.

"Now, this may be just to send a message and not how it's going to end. But it's still a very bad, bad message that this county is showing to the counties, which we all, by the way, are members of. It's not a different country, it's something that you live in, and you need the tourists and all the services that it has to offer. Police and fire for your protection. Water for your safety. All of this you need. So please don't short-change the counties with this bill. I ask you to defer action on this bill, so I vote no on this bill."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. I just wanted to give my reasoning, which is a little bit different than, I think, others. I was reservations in committee on this bill, and my reservations stem from a more philosophical perspective, that the TAT was originally created not to deal with mitigation of tourism impact. I strongly support any, I shouldn't say any, I strongly support the idea and the principle of trying to mitigate tourism impact on our communities.

"I'm not convinced this is the right measure to do that, because it then creates a nexus that I think doesn't exist right now, linking TAT to tourism impact. And if we give in with this kind of foot-in-the-door technique to allow that, we may find ourselves bleeding tens, if not hundreds of millions of dollars on the future of TAT with that argument that can then be brought before us time and time again, as it has been brought to us time and time again, that TAT should be used for this. This creates the precedent that it will, and that's why I'm opposed to it. Thank you."

Representative Choy rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations, Mr. Speaker. Thank you. My comments are more mechanical than anything else. And the reasons for my reservation is, as I read the bill, under Chapter 235, it's just totally untenable, it just can't be done. So I'd like to incorporate the comments or testimonies from the Attorney General's Office, the Tax Foundation, and of course DOTAX as the reasons for my reservations. Thank you, Mr. Speaker," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative DeCoite rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative DeCoite's written remarks are as follows:

"With reservations. I think that we should return to the original intent of this bill that would give our counties a specific portion of the TAT. The current draft was called a 'bureaucratic nightmare' by Mayor Harry Kim since it would require the counties to request reimbursement for expenses and justify each request to receive any TAT. I don't think we should be burdening our counties with this kind of requirement. The Tax Department and the Attorney General also expressed concerns on HD 1 that we need to take a closer look at as we move forward with this bill. *Mahalo*."

Representative Say rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations, but with the caveat that the statements made or the written testimony made by the three respective departments, Department of Taxation, the Tax Foundation, and the Attorney General, that the Senate would consider it as part of their corrections to this bill that goes over. Thank you."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tokioka rose in opposition to the measure and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tokioka's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to incorporate the words of the Representative from District 23 in opposition to HB 1665. I am disappointed that, in my opinion, we as a body seem to constantly exploit counties with such unfair and detrimental legislation. As this bill moves forward, I hope to see the language changed to better reflect the original purpose of ensuring fair distribution of the Transient Accommodations Tax revenue by removing the \$103,000,000 cap on the counties' share so that we can assist them in managing the services that they provide to visitors and residents alike."

Representative Har rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representatives Souki and Choy be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, no vote, and a comment that I think the messaging is as follows. Every year we beg, steal and borrow in order to make all the county budgets balance. You, the State, have not given us this money, therefore, this is another way to shoot a message across your bow to say, look we need your help. So, Mr. Speaker, this is simply the counties crying out that we

haven't given them a fair deal, and they want a fair deal, and this is not a fair deal. Thank you."

Representative San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. I would like to point out that this is part of the Hawaii Council of Mayors package. So I'm assuming that they vetted this out, that it would be in favor of the various counties, otherwise they would not have introduced this bill. And as such, I agree with the prior speakers, and I am in support."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations. I think the conversation has to continue. The TAT was originally implemented in 1986, but, however, in 2014, Act 174 did establish the state-county working group that studied the TAT, and they did it per a mandate by this body, to look at how to better distribute it. And this report is, it's fairly long, I think it was 170-something pages, but it's a good read. And within the report of the year that it took everyone to look through how to better allocate the TAT funds, it actually has proposed legislation, and it's actually pretty good, I think it's a good way forward. It's not like this though, it's not a reimbursement system.

"And so I'm thinking that we should read through this working group report that took them a year to figure out what was the best way forward, and try to glean some pearls of knowledge, since it took them a year to come to the conclusion of where the split should be, how it can happen, where is the mechanism that it needs to happen in. Because that's the conversations we're having here, is everything that's written in there. It's a good starting place for all of us to read, start from there and try to get the best mechanism method.

"I realize that all the counties need more money, and that's why Honolulu County actually opposed this one, is because, I don't know if he thought the mechanism was good, but there's a discrepancy because everyone wants more money, but it's, how do we get more money to the counties? Well, here we have it, a document mandated, Act 174, the Legislature in 2014 asked them to do it, we should read it, maybe implement parts of it. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Just to cite the data and the vote, or let's say, the sponsorship on this particular bill. The good member from Puna mentioned that, hey this was by the Council of Mayors. The councilmember representing District 4 of the Hawaii County Council is for this bill, but who is against it? The Office of the Mayor of the City and County, the councilmember of the City and County, the councilmember of the Mauii County, Hawaii State Association of Counties is against it, and the Mauii County Chamber of Commerce. So Mr. Speaker, this is not a very popular bill, other than saying that it's behind one of these bigger organizations. If you look at the numbers and the votes, no one really likes this bill. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1665, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE TRANSIENT ACCOMMODATIONS TAX," passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Choy, DeCoite, Har, Matsumoto, Say and Tupola voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Evans, LoPresti, Souki, Tokioka and Ward voting no, and with Representative Yamane being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 794-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2389, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2389, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PAROLE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Yamane being excused.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising, first of all, I'd like to make a disclosure and see whether there's a conflict. A couple of years ago, I built an ADU, which I only rent for a minimum of a year or longer," and the Chair ruled, "no conflict."

Representative Thielen continued to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising to speak against the measure, and this is the bill that's House Bill 2009. It stated in the committee report, Mr. Speaker, 'the purpose of the measure is to expressly include single family homes, multi-family homes, and accessory dwellings as property types which may be used as transient accommodations.' So, it's enlarging or putting into statute that all of these can be used as transient vacation units, or TVUs, as they're known. This means, again, single family homes, multi-family homes, and accessory dwellings, or ADUs, then by state law they'll be able to be used as TVUs.

"So the problem is, here we go again on the island of Oahu, and it's a real difficult situation. Expedia is thrilled, the short-term rental platform, Expedia, their vice president for government and corporate affairs says that, 'these amendments validate the Legislature's efforts to recognize the value of the vacation rental business to Hawaii's lodging capacity.' That's just great, but what does that do to our local people?

"Well, you go to what OHA is saying, and they're stating that, 'unfortunately, the unaddressed proliferation of illegal vacation rentals may exacerbate the rise in Hawaii's rental housing costs,' and then directly remove much-needed housing units from the residential rental market. That's absolutely correct, that they will. And then, the growing use of our limited housing supply for illegal TVUs will only continue to worsen our housing crisis, and I'm paraphrasing what they wrote in their testimony there

"The interesting thing, Mr. Speaker, does this affect our local homeowners? No. The data shows that 70% of properties listed as vacation rentals in Hawaii are owned by out-of-state property owners who do not reside in the islands. So we have another crisis, that our housing stock is being bought up, 70% of it is owned by out-of-state owners, and they're operating these TVUs, the illegal short-term rentals, particularly over on Oahu, I think we have the majority of them.

"There's not really an economic benefit. San Francisco has found a negative economic impact of \$300,000 for each housing unit used as a vacation rental. So, we're not really making money for the State.

"I really would ask members to, I know it's on third reading, I know it's going to pass and it's going to go over to the Senate, but you have an opportunity to take a harder look at that, and to say, do we want to do that? What we're doing is legalizing short-term rentals in our housing market, for the tax money, but think of what we're doing to the people that live here, that really, someday, want to have a home, but 70% of those illegal operators are from out-of-state, because they're making so much money, and we're letting it go on. So, I'm a no vote on this. Thank you."

Representative Quinlan rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition, Mr. Speaker. I don't think there is any ill intent in this bill, and indeed, some may see it as a more of a housekeeping measure, but my fear is that it sends a message to the counties that the State of Hawaii condones transient accommodations in residential areas, and that's why I'm a no vote. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kong rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in opposition. As you know, I'm working with many homeless projects and I have a very comprehensive plan, and part of this is working with the homeless being within, hopefully, 80 units and being housed within properties throughout the community, and this may actually put a little bit of crick in my comprehensive plan. So, with that, I rise in opposition. Thank you, sir."

Representative Holt rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representative Quinlan be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

"With reservations. I don't believe that this new tax on accessory dwelling units, single family homes, and multi-family homes is necessary. We may end up taxing people that we don't really want to burden with any more taxes. The Department of Taxation has stated that the current definition of transient accommodations is already broad enough to cover accessory dwelling units. The Tax Foundation stated that letting out a spare room or vacation home may trigger a tax liability when the taxpayer is not even running a business. *Mahalo*."

Representative Say rose, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I believe the Majority Floor Leader has my green slip, so members, you don't have to stand up to say no when you have submit your green slip."

Representative Evans rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Souki rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with strong reservations."

Representative Ito rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2739, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

At this time, Representative Tupola offered Floor Amendment No. 1, amending H.B. No. 2739, HD 1, as follows:

SECTION 1. House Bill No. 2739, H.D. 1 is amended to add additional safeguards and clarity as follows:

- 1. In section 3 of the bill, by:
- A. Amending the definition of "adult" to raise the age requirement from eighteen to twenty-one years of age or older;
- B. Amending the definition of "health care provider" to clarify that the person must be licensed or certified by the law of this State:
- C. Amending the definition of "prescription" to clarify that the qualified patient must either self-administer, if the patient chooses to do so, or otherwise dispose of the medication properly;
- D. Amending the definition of "terminal disease" to clarify that the disease must be one that will, within reasonable medical judgment, produce death within six months despite reasonable and ordinary medical treatment;
- E. On page 13, restoring the requirement that self-administration of the medication prescribed pursuant to this chapter shall be listed on the death certificate as an immediate cause of death;
- F. On page 17, deleting "evidence that the patient owns or leases property in Hawaii" as a factor that may demonstrate state residency;
- G. On pages 18 and 19, deleting language that would limit the disclosure of information in criminal and civil malpractice proceedings;
- H. On page 20, requiring the Department of Health to make rules to govern lawful means of disposal of unused medication, and inserting an unspecified felony criminal penalty for failure to lawfully dispose of unused medication;
- On pages 22 through 24, following the recommendations of the Department of the Attorney General by deleting each instance of the term "good faith";
- J. On page 23, following the recommendations of the Department of the Attorney General by clarifying that health care providers are not required to inform a patient about the option to obtain life-ending medication or refer a qualified patient to another provider if they are unable or unwilling to participate; and
- By making conforming technical amendments and renumbering sections of the bill accordingly.

Representative Tupola moved that Floor Amendment No. 1 be adopted, seconded by Representative McDermott.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Thank you for allowing us this time to just discuss real quick. So, everyone has a copy of the amendments. And yesterday and the prior days when we had the hearing, there's a lot of good, good discourse, lots of good conversations, lots of respect in the room, and we want to keep it that way. So the amendments that were laid down are outlining some concerns that I raised in my questions, but also some concerns that were raised in the testimony of the Attorney General.

"So, briefly, the first part of the amendment raises the age, and as you know, we've been a state that's been very proud about making sure that our tobacco and our alcohol sales are at the age of 21. So that's the first part of the amendment. The second part, letter 'B' as well as 'F,' it talks about making sure that the healthcare provider is licensed in our state. On letter

'F,' it talks about deleting evidence that the patient owns or leases property in Hawaii. I had brought that up in my questioning, just with the concern that many people who aren't residents of Hawaii own and lease property, and currently in the bill, it allows for the identification of a resident to be if they own or lease property in Hawaii. And as you heard, on HB 2009, my colleague from Kailua eloquently described how many out-of-state owners we have. So we want to make sure to close that *puka*, because we don't want to allow and open ourselves up for anything that's not having to do with residents of our own state.

"As well, letter 'C,' in the definition of prescription, I had brought up that it said 'may,' and we just wanted to tighten that up to 'shall' self-administer, as brought up by the testifier from Oregon, who did describe that in order for us to kind of walk that line of medical aid in dying, that we need to make sure that it's always self-administer and always that the patient makes all the decisions. We are definitely a state that prides ourself on making sure that we curb elder abuse, so we wanted to make sure that was in there. As well, on letter 'D,' one of the conversations had, in other states as well as ours, was in regards to the length of time, which at this point would be that it's determinate that the person will be ending their life, or dying, or having a disease that will have them die within six months, but didn't take into consideration medication. So in there it actually says, produce death within six months without reasonable or ordinary medical treatment. So all that means is that there are diseases like diabetes, where if you don't take, if you don't do dialysis, that you could possibly pass away that week, that day. So with treatment, people's lives are prolonged.

"On the last page, on page 18 and 19, it deletes language that would limit disclosure of information in criminal and civil malpractice proceedings, and this is really important, because we want to make sure that there is no malpractice here, and of course we talked about it throughout the hearing, and it's been one of the things that will prohibit us from being able to ensure that, if they're actually not able to look into those.

"On letter 'H,' it talks about the gathering of medicine. Now, we've talked about opioid abuse here, we've talked about the fact that overdose is one of the things we're trying to stop in our state and in our nation. So, in our that section it talks about the unused medication. Brought up by the Attorney General was the fact that there is no penalty. So there is no consequence if someone does not return it, and in a lot of the testimonies, they actually describe that some people will start off the procedure, but actually never ingest the medication, because maybe they got hope, they got a cure for it. So we are trying to write into our law to make sure that the medication is collected back up again, but currently we do not have a procedure for that in this state. There is no pharmacy that will collect back up your medication if you don't use it. We just need the Department of Health to actually make those rules, make those guidelines, to make sure that the recollection of cyclobarbital, which we don't want anyone to have access to this if they're not actually going to apply this act, and I know that in my community, even in one of the testifier's testimonies on the day of the hearing, we're concerned that we don't want anyone to have this in their bag where young children can grab it and digest it. So, simply suggesting that the Department of Health look into making rules of how we would recollect it, and that there be a consequence or a penalty.

"Second to the last is good faith. In the Attorney General's testimony, it says for us to strike out on page 21 and 22, lines 8 and 12, line 8, in order to establish a clearer, objective standard for liability. Good faith compliance is difficult to disprove as one could simply claim that he or she was 'acting in good faith compliance' without additional evidence. It's a word, it just needs to be stricken out so that there can be some clear penalties in there. Clearly, we don't use good faith in criminal proceedings because it is guessing somebody's state of mind when it happens, and of course, the Attorney General is just suggesting that we tighten that down."

Representative McDermott rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered"

Representative Tupola continued, stating:

"Lastly, page 23, there was in recommendation by the Attorney General that read as such, 'including informing a patient about the option to obtain medication for the purpose of ending the patient's life.' Now, the reason why

the Attorney General had put it in here was because there needed to be a provision in there allowing for the choice for our providers, and that was the discussion we had in the hearing. Basically, what they're saying is, if they don't feel comfortable suggesting it to people, they don't want to be forced to, and we all agreed on that. So all it is, is clarifying the language, making sure that it's in there. We talked about it in the hearing, making sure that this was giving the right to life to the right people, making sure nobody else is making the decision, and making sure we don't have medication that's lethal out there where other people can ingest it, and that stems from where these amendments come from. So with that, I end, and I thank you for allowing us to share that."

Representative LoPresti rose, stating:

"Point of personal privilege. Will the introducer yield to a question?"

Representative Tupola: "Yes."

Representative LoPresti continued, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. My question is simple yes or no, and it is that, if we adopt these amendments, will you then vote for euthanasia?"

At 1:34 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:35 o'clock p.m.

Representative Tupola rose to respond, stating:

"Just real quick. In the hearing, we were very clear that we were not saying that word. We are trying to stray away from it. In the Oregon testifier's testimony, she said medical aid in dying is not euthanasia if one, it is self-administered, and two, the person makes all their own decisions. So all we're doing is we're trying to walk that fine line and we're trying to make sure that what we implement is actually what we intend. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I have a request to submit comments to the Journal, and with my no vote, basically summarizing. Sorry, we're not at the final bill yet. In support, support of the amendment, that is. And for the record, the summary of the findings of the Oregon 1997-2017, I would like to submit to the Journal for the record on, basically, they've been around the block on this, we're the new kids on the block, and I think we need to learn from them, therefore, I request it be put in the Journal. Thank you."

# Oregon's Assisted Suicide Experience 1997-2017

In 1994, Oregon voters passed a ballot measure that allowed physicians to write a prescription so terminally ill patients could kill themselves. The ballot measure made Oregon the first jurisdiction in the world to legalize

Before Oregon legalized physician-assisted suicide, euthanasia proponents had previously proposed ballot neasures in California and Washington which would have legalized eutherasia—lethal injections by doctors. Both measures, deemed od angerous, falled. Thus, the eutherasia proponents changed tactics in Oregon and proposed "

After court challenges as well as a ballot measure to repeal the law failed, PAS (physician-assisted suicide) began operating in 1998. Euthanasia is not legal anywhere in the United States.

### The Campaign

The pro-physician-assisted suicide campaign centered around two themes

- People would not have to die in unbearable. uncontrollable pain
- "Do not let one church (Catholic) decide how you can die" [Oregon is one of the states with the least church attendance]

#### The law

Intolerable suffering is not a requirement to use the

An individual must be diagnosed with a terminal illness with six months or less to live. A second physician's opinion needed.

One written request to the physician; two verbal requests to physician separated by 15 days

If depression is indicated, the patient must be given a psychiatric exam

The drugs must be self-ingested.

Physicians are protected from criminal liability; the standard of care required is lowered from "negligence" to "good faith"

### What we don't know

While Oregon is touted as an excellent model for White Original to Outed as an excellent induction PAS, the reality is there is a shroud of secrecy covering how assisted suicide actually works. In spite of an annual report generated by the Oregon Department of Health, very little is known about

- Physicians are to self-report some statistical information such as age of patient, disease, race, etc. No independent analysis of statistics is allowed; no follow-up questions asked; reports are guarded and discarded after a year. Any falsified reports will go
- "The Oregon Department of Human Services has no authority to investigate individual Death with Dignity cases. The state law authorizing physician-assisted suicide neither requires nor authorizes investigations by DHS [Department of Human Services]."2
- DHS officials admit they have no way of knowing how many PAS cases are no reported.<sup>3</sup>
- A death certificate may not indicate PAS as cause of death; the underlying illness is recorded as cause of death.
- Under threat of immediate termination, state officials are ordered not to speak of any PAS deaths they know of.4

# What we do know

Because physicians are required to report some basic statistics, some information can be gleaned as to how the law is working.8

The overwhelming reason for using PAS differs from the main reason purported that the law was needed. Ninety-one percent of PAS is done because the patient is "losing autonomy" and eighty-nine percent because the patient is "losing autonomy" and eighty-nine percent because the patient is "less able to enjoy activities". Patients make the choice to request assisted suicide because they want to control the timing and manner of their death," said Dr. Linda Ganzini, professor of psychiatry at Oregon Health and Science University School of Medicine.<sup>9</sup>

The 2<sup>nd</sup> least used reason for using PAS stated by 26% of patients is "inadequate pain control or concern about it" (last reason is financial). "Our data ests that patients who request physician-assisted death do so not because of

physical symptoms or their current quality of life," reported Dr. Ganzini in a 2009 study. "They often make their requests based on an anticipation of future suffering."<sup>10</sup>

Despite the fact that depression is the only factor Despite the fact that depression is the only factor that significantly predicts the wish for death, "I only five percent of PAS victims received a psychiatric exam prior to obtaining a prescription. However, 25% who request PAS may be clinically depressed, but generally are not given psychiatric evaluations, according to a 2008 study. The study concluded that "the current practice of the Death with Dignity Act "the current practice of the Death with Dignity Act may fail to protect some patients whose choices are influenced by depression." Dr. Ganzini, who led the study, says "I think the problem is physicians who are seeing these patients are not doing rigorous screening for depression." <sup>12</sup> In a 1996 survey of Oregon physicians, only six percent felt very origing physicians, only six percent let very confident that, absent a long-term relationship, they could determine in a single visit whether a patient was competent to commit suicide. <sup>33</sup> Even in cases where a psychiatric exam is given, the patient's best interest is not necessarily being looked after. Joan Lucas, a patient with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis was mailed a psychiatric questionnaire which was filled out by her family as they "cracked up laughing." Ms. Lucas received the prescription and

Median time of relationship between a patient receiving a PAS prescription and the prescribing physician of 13 weeks reveals doctor shopping. Few Oregon physicians want to help their patients kill themselves, preferring instead to treat their underlying needs and give palliative care.
Compassion & Choices, Oregon's pro-assisted-suicide organization, controls the majority of assisted suicides. In 2007, they reported that three-fourths of all PAS deaths in Oregon were Oregon's Assisted Suicide Experience 1997-2017

their clients. Between 2001-2007, three physicians wrote one-fourth of all prescriptions. <sup>15</sup>

The most reliable source of information on PAS deaths has been newspaper stories. In the first few years, reporters located families who were proud of the PAS deaths of their loved ones. These stories often unwittingly reveal gross negligence and abuse of the law. Sample stories reveal:

Dementia patient under family pressure receives PAS. Kate Cheney, 85 years old and diagnosed with a deadly tumor, was refused PAS by her family deadly tumor, was refused PAS by her family physician. Her daughter sought another physician who ordered a psychiatric exam. The psychiatrist found that Kate did "not seem to be explicitly pushing for [PAS], had difficulty with short-term memory and lacked the "very high level of capacity provided and the property of the provided of the prorequired to weigh options about assisted suicide. He refused the suicide request, saving Kate's He refused the suicide request, saying Kate's apparent dementia, combined with pressure from her daughter, made him wonder whose agenda the PAS request really was'. The daughter sought another opinion. This physician, while noting Kate's memory problems and that her "choices may be influenced by her family's wishes, and her daughter may be somewhat coercive", approved the PAS request. Kate was dead three weeks later.<sup>16</sup>

Depressed patient receives PAS. An 84 year-old woman diagnosed with breast cancer requested PAS
Her family physician refused so she sought a second
physician. This physician also refused saying she was degressed and recommended treatment. Her family depressed and recommended treatment. Her harmly then called the Compassion & Choices network for a doctor, who saw the patient once and agreed to the PAS. In a recorded conversation before her death just 15 days later, she stated, "I'm looking forward to this because I was always active...every year I had a yard full of flowers...it was my hobby. I will be relieved of all of the stress I have."<sup>17</sup>

Suspicious deaths. Oregon's PAS law requires no care for a patient by the physician after the lethal

prescription is written. Only 11% of PAS deaths are attended by a physician. No witness is required to detection of the patient ingests the lethal dose without duress or confusion of mind. The lethal drug is commonly Secobarbital capsules, which are emptled into pudding and eaten. They have been known to be administered through a feeding tube.

Thomas Middleton was diagnosed with Lou Gehrig's disease and moved into the home of Tami Sawyer He died by PAS later the same month. Middleton had named Sawyer his estate trustee and put his home in her trust. Two days after Middleton died Sawyer listed the property for sale and deposited \$90,000 into her own account. A federal investigation into real estate fraud exposed the abuse. Sawyer was indicted for first-degree crimina mistreatment and first-degree aggravated theft.<sup>18</sup>
ODH's annual PAS report did not mention the case.
In other instances where family members inquire about suspicious circumstances of their loved one's<sup>19</sup> death, they are rebuffed by state officials.

Patient with history of suicidal ideation receives PAS prescription. Michael Freeland, a 63-year old man with lung cancer and a 40-year history of chronic depression and attempted suicide, called Compassion & Choices and received a prescription for PAS. He then met a physician opposed to PAS who befriended him, offering to help with his who bernended him, oftening to help with his depression and any future pain. Months later he was admitted to a hospital depressed and suicidal. Police removed his guns from his house, however they knowingly kept his PAS drugs "safely at home." The hospital psychiatrist pronounced Freeland incompetent to make his own decisions, knowing incompetent to make his own decisions, knowing that Freeland had the PAS drugs. Soon afterwards, the helpful doctor found him at home alone and in pain, for which he prescribed pain medicine. The good doctor helped him reconcile with his daughter. Two years after his "six-month terminal illness", Freeland died at home of natural causes, painlessly and reconciled with his daughter.20

Oregon Health Department will pay for PAS but not cancer treatment. The Oregon Health Plan, established to help low-income Oregonians with

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health care, rations care it will pay for. In two separate publicized cases, cancer patients who wer on the Oregon Health Plan applied for payment for cancer drugs prescribed by their oncologists. In both cases the State denied payment for the drugs and suggested they use PAS, which the plan would pay for.<sup>21</sup>

# SUMMARY

"A concern with physician protection, rather than patient protection, pervades the Oregon experience patient protection, pervades the Uregon experience.

# CONCLUSION

So-called "safeguards" do not work Julnerable patients are not protected PAS has become death-on-demand

Oregon Physician-Assisted Suicide Numbers from 1998 through June 2017:

Prescriptions written: Prescriptions taken (suicides)

From 1998 through 2013 PAS deaths increased 14% annually. From 2013 through 2015, PAS deaths increased by 36% annually, but leveled in 2016.

Is end-of-life care better because of PAS?

Prior to legalization of PAS, Oregon was a leader in palliative care; after legalization, Oregon's improvement in hospice utilization fell below the national average.<sup>22</sup>

Palliative care has improved markedly when states passed laws that prohibit PAS but explicitly allow use of powerful drugs such as morphine to control pain.

<sup>23</sup> Oregon's morphine use has not increased. <sup>24</sup>

In a 2002 nationwide study, states where PAS is outlawed outpaced Oregon in key end-of-life areas. Thirty states had statewide coalitions to improve care of the dying.25 Oregon did not.

According to the U.S. Center for Disease Control and According to the U.S. Center for Disease Control and Prevention, Oregon's suicide rate increased 49% between 1999 and 2010 (compared to 28% nationally). Oregon's health department reports the state's suicide rate (not counting PAS) has been rising since 2000 and as of 2012, was 42% higher than the national average.26

The motion that Floor Amendment No. 1, amending H.B. No. 2739, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," be adopted, was put to vote by the Chair and upon a voice vote, failed to carry, with Representatives McKelvey, Tokioka and Yamane being excused.

(Main Motion)

Representative McDermott rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to the underlying bill. Mr. Speaker, I rise as a friend of all the folks who put the hard work into this, they spent many hours, we all know that. This is the most important bill of the session, clearly. It deals with human life. In fact, they worked all night, worked up till 15 minutes before the committee hearing. That was what they told me. We were working 15 minutes until before the committee hearing. Sixteen amendments were made to a 40-page bill. Yet the members of the committee were not given anything to read. There was no House bill before us.

"Here, I have it today. Why have you given it to me, Mr. Speaker? So I could read it, so I could review it, so I can make an informed decision. In fact, Mr. Speaker, if they finished 15 minutes before the hearing, no House draft I actually existed, it was just thought, ether in the air. Now, we were read the amendments, 16 of them to a 40-page bill, and I dare say it would take the intellect of Albert Einstein or Stephen Hawking to collate those amendments and put them in the underlying measure in context and make sense out of it in the three minutes before we had to vote. The point is, Mr. Speaker, we had no House draft in front of us. The most important legislation of this session, that's sloppy work. If I did that in my real estate practice, I would be fired. Fired.

"Mr. Speaker, you've mentioned before, process and tradition. We are handed House drafts in committee before we vote on it. Now, there's an occasional minor one where it's, okay, I'm going to make some technical amendments, members, but the underlying message stays the same. But these were 16 substantive amendments. And so I think a disservice was done to the members of the committee. They were put in jeopardy because they had to vote on something that didn't exist. I stood there, all I had was my pen in my hand. I'm on the committee, I had nothing to review. How can I make an informed decision if I have nothing to review? Even the amendments weren't handed out to us. How long does it take to print 20 copies of a single sheet of paper and hand them out to the members? They weren't available.

"Mr. Speaker, you pride yourself, sir, on transparency. This was not a transparent operation. I would still vote no, and I think everybody who voted yes would still vote yes, but that's not the point. The point is, the process. Mr. Speaker, how many times over the years have you scolded me about process? How many times over the years have good friend from Wahiawa, who's no longer here, scolded me about process? That's not the process, Representative, you've got to follow the process. Today, customs and traditions, you don't do this on second reading. Customs and traditions. Custom and traditions are, you're given a document to review. We weren't given the opportunity to review this, let alone make a cogent decision on the measure. Now, as I said, I don't think it would change any votes, certainly wouldn't change mine, but it's the process.

"Mr. Speaker, I think because members didn't vote on a bill, an actual bill, there was nothing there, and it didn't exist, and I'd be happy to be corrected, because the copy machine keeps records of who makes copies when. So you could pull up House draft 1, 2739, and see when it was actually copied, but at the time of the hearing, House draft 1 didn't exist. There were amendments that were come to an agreement and articulated to the members, but there was no document in front of us to vote on. We voted on nothing. We voted on thoughts in the air, ether and trust. That's no way to run a railroad, sir, and if I was in the majority and some of my colleagues over there, they would be on me all day long and twice on Sunday for doing something like that. As I said, I think it open us up to legal jeopardy because we didn't do it right. The most important bill of the session, you don't bring to committee, literally, you don't bring it to committee, there's nothing there. You're voting on space, you're voting on air, ether, and we're told, okay this is House draft 1, please pass it.

"So there was nothing for us to vote on, Mr. Speaker. That was sloppily done. It wasn't transparent, and for those reasons, sir, I make a motion to recommit this to committee and do it right, have a revote."

Representative McDermott moved to recommit Stand. Com. Rep. No. 902-18 and H.B. No. 2739, HD 1 to committee, seconded by Representative Ward.

At 1:42 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:44 o'clock p.m.

At this time, the Chair stated:

"There has been a motion to recommit this measure. Is there any discussion?"

Representative McDermott rose to speak in support of the motion to recommit, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, thank you. My colleague to the left from Kailua said, Representative McDermott, I think your measure's going to fail. I said, of course it is, I'm captain of the lost cause. But Mr. Speaker, the point here today is, I wanted to document and get it in the record that there was no physical amendment before us, there was nothing before us to vote on. There were no physical amendments before us. We were read some amendments, but as I said, it would take the intellect of Albert Einstein or Stephen Hawking to take those amendments and put them in the underlying bill and formulate the context, and how they affected the context, before or after the amendments, sir. Again, if I did this in my private sector job, I would be fired, there's no question.

"So, this is not transparent. The people who came to hear it, some of them wanted to see the bill, they couldn't because there was nothing to give them. And I suggest to you, sir, that House draft 1 didn't exist at that time, only in the minds of the committee chairman. The amendments were written, but they weren't put into paper in context, or else we would have been given copies. I would suggest in the future that an important measure like this, hey, we're going to postpone decision-making for two hours so members can be given copies of the amendment, House draft 1, to read and digest and go over.

"This is very important, Mr. Speaker. This is, this is not the transparency that we have been sold, sir, and I just don't see this as the way to run a railroad. The most important bill of the session goes to committee, and you have a House draft, and it's not available for members to read because it doesn't exist. As I said, I don't think it would change one vote, clearly. That's not the point. The point is the process. Now, I expect after this exercise today, when we have House drafts on important measures like this, certainly, that we will have a House draft in front of us before we vote on it. But I wanted to state for the record that there was nothing in front of us to vote on yesterday but air. Air, Mr. Speaker, and I'm surprised that more people aren't upset about that than I am. Thank you, sir."

Representative San Buenaventura rose to speak in opposition to the motion to recommit, stating:

"In opposition. So we all have, in our ability, to print out the actual bill before the amendments, and it is custom and practice, and I admit, I've only been in this House for three years, but it is, I've never seen, it's very uncommon for us to have a House draft that was drafted prior to a vote in committee. What I do, personally, and I suspect a lot of other legislators do, is we have the draft that's about to be amended, and when the oral amendments come along and is being said, we go through it. And that's what I did, that's what has been done, that has been common, and that has been the practice for the three years I've been in the House. And as such, I'm in opposition."

Representative McDermott rose to respond, stating:

"Second time, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, for routine housekeeping, yes, that's the case. But we recessed the day before, and we were told, these are important amendments, we want to get them right, we want to get them in, this is a very important bill, we want to make no mistakes, *et cetera*, *et cetera*. They worked all night, I appreciate their hard work, came in the next morning, continued to work. This is the most important bill of the session. It's not a housekeeping measure, it's not moving a stop sign 10 feet or the width of a bicycle lane. We're talking about human life here, Mr. Speaker.

"And the document should have been in front of members, and the amendments were read so fast that my colleague here to the right couldn't even write them all down. So to say that you had the opportunity to write them down, put them in, and go over them, all in three minutes, I salute you, because you're a better speed writer than I am, and you're much smarter than I am, and your ability to cognitively embed these and then figure out the context of how they create, affect one another and affect the whole totality of the bill is amazing. As I said, Stephen Hawking or Albert Einstein are the only two people I know who could have done this. So with that, sir, I just, I will rest."

The motion was put to a vote by the Chair and upon a voice vote, failed to carry, with Representatives McKelvey, Tokioka and Yamane being excused.

(Main Motion)

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition. Mr. Speaker, according to the polls, this bill gives the people of Hawaii what they want, but it should not be given without our precautionary measures, and I have four precautionary measures that I'd like to note as the reasons why I'm voting no.

"The first precaution is, follow the money, or follow the insurance company, or follow the insurance company money. One thing this bill doesn't cover or attempt to manage are the insurance companies who pay for our healthcare system and play a pivotal role. There are live examples in testimonies of cancer patients in Oregon and in California who are being denied lifesaving treatments and are instead being offered suicide pills as an alternative. Mr. Speaker, the point is, whatever is cheaper appears to be a de facto motto of many of the insurance companies, where assisted suicide becomes another marketing tool, rather than saving lives.

"But this greed is not limited just to the private sector. Let me provide a personal example. My sister-in-law, who lives in London with her South African husband, had to go to the dentist for a toothache. The National Health Service dentist said the tooth was really bad and it should be pulled. Wanting to get it over with, she agreed, they pulled the tooth, but then when she got home her husband railed against her saying, why did you get your tooth pulled? Nobody pulls teeth anymore, they just do crowns. He then researched what had happened. The British National Health Service insurance reimburses a dentist for pulling a tooth, \$75. For grinding and fitting a crown, \$125. So, pulling a tooth takes about 10 minutes, and doing the grinding and fitting the crown may take a root canal, hours and many possible appointments.

"So, Mr. Speaker, follow the money. The dentist goes to choose the quicker and the cheaper. Likewise, a physician or an insurance company who says, look, your cancer is really something that's going to be too costly, why don't you consider this? This is live videos from patients in California and Oregon who are speaking, it's not me speaking, Mr. Speaker. So, it makes it look like destroying life is cheap and repairing our lives is expensive, and this bill has a downside and a cheap side to it.

"The second precaution, Mr. Speaker, the Oregon study says, the primary reasons patients choose suicide is not pain and suffering, but lifestyle and other considerations, lifestyle considerations, inconveniences, *et cetera*. This is important because everybody who goes to hospice, and we assume if someone is in hospice they're going to die, hospice has, for all terminally

ill, their own morphine tube and morphine flow control button. Pain is up, the button gets open, and more morphine to the patient. But if they really open the patient too wide and for too long, morphine can slow the breathing to the point of death. My point is, Mr. Speaker, this is already happening, and it's already legal, and it also says, well, why do we want to go beyond that, because it's already there, in terms of what people are doing to their lives?

"The third precaution, Mr. Speaker, this sends the wrong message to family members, and especially to our youth. Hey, aunty ended her life when she was feeling miserable, I'm a depressed teenager, why can't I do that? The message is, it's going to be an accepted habit, or let's say, an acceptable exit, to which, Mr. Speaker, already we have a suicide crisis among our youth in Hawaii. We're one of the, probably in the nation, the largest per capita suicide rate here. The bill will give a quick way out for the hopeless and the depressed, and maybe not with pills, but using the multitude of other options that teenagers are using now. This bill is a blinking red light for teenagers when they hate their life, they just want to end it. It seems to take away the hopes and the dreams, and as they see family members and friends, they say, look, I'm out of here, and they choose suicide.

"My fourth and final point, Mr. Speaker, is about Michael Tada. Michael has cerebral palsy and has difficulty breathing and talking, and he's testified in these committees for this floor many, many times, and he's disabled, and he speaks out for the disabled. This bill says to him that life is cheap and expendable, and if you're disabled and can't talk, he murmurs mostly, even though he's got the guts to testify, as he did last week in the Health Committee, in the Finance Committee, it's likely those who are disabled like Michael, could have those who are unfavorable in their family or associations—"

Representative McDermott rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"Thank you. So, Mr. Speaker, for those disabled out there, they're not excited about this bill. Lastly, Mr. Speaker, how many on this floor chose to be born a man, or chose to be born a woman, or Japanese, or Caucasian, or Filipino, or Hawaiian? The bottom line, the point is, Mr. Speaker, we have no control over such decisions, nor should the State of Hawaii or insurance companies decide who should be allowed to live or who should be allowed to die. Assisted suicide is government giving a death license to doctors and patients and insurance companies. It sends the wrong message to our people, particularly our youth, and I would hope that as this goes on to other committees, they will consider these precautions, and particularly some of the amendments that we have discussed earlier. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I thank you for listening."

Representative Todd rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Briefly, in support. I just wanted to point out that Hawaii actually has a relatively low suicide rate and it's significantly below the national average. Thank you."

Representative Choy rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Quinlan rose in opposition to the measure and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Quinlan's written remarks are as follows:

"I am in opposition because I believe that the safeguards contained in the bill are still inadequate. If a person chooses not to end their life after being prescribed the medication, there is no system to track what becomes of those lethal pills. Simply adding a line that says you shall dispose of it by lawful means is insufficient. If we are going to pass a law with such potential consequences, we must eliminate as much risk as possible, and this bill fails to do that."

Representative Woodson rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Woodson's written remarks are as follows:

"My concerns are multifaceted. To me, I believe we are interconnected, and although the decision to end one's life is personal, it's a decision that could negatively impact those who are left behind. Within the community that I have the privilege of representing, a significant number of people do support this proposal. However, the majority of individuals in my community do not support this proposal and concept. Where would we be as a society if people like Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. decided to end their life for whatever reason? Would we even have a Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. as we now know him and the impact he made on lives in this country and around the world? I do not begrudge anyone who believes in death with dignity, nor do I begrudge their communities. Fundamentally, this decision is one that needs to be made by the individual. My understanding is this proposal has sufficient support to survive the legislative process, and ultimately, whatever is the larger will of the people will come into fruition."

Representative Johanson rose in opposition to the measure and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Johanson's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise respectfully in opposition to this measure. This is a difficult vote for me as I witnessed firsthand how difficult it can be for our loved ones to struggle with a terminal illness. I moved back to Hawaii to be my grandmother's full-time caregiver when she was diagnosed with terminal pancreatic cancer and given four months to live. I grew up living with my grandmother and she was more like a second mother. Although it was an honor and a privilege to care for her, it was difficult to see her suffer in the last two months of her life. It was equally difficult to see the cancer take away the dignity that so characterized her entire life. It still remains the most painful and difficult time of my life. Because of this experience, I do empathize with those who are suffering and wish to have control over their own end. I also empathize with the people who do not wish to see their loved ones suffer. I have the utmost respect for the many who have advocated for HB 2739 and those who may ultimately avail themselves of the option to end their life should this measure become law. Although I empathize with those who support this measure and those who wish to have the choice to determine their ultimate health decision, I still have some unresolved bioethical concerns over the precedent set by this bill and the long-term implications of this policy if it were to be altered. I do not necessarily wish to negate this measure with a no vote, but at this time, I cannot fully affirm the measure and support it with a yes vote either."

Representative Har rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Cachola rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, no vote for me, and the simple reason is this, I still believe in miracles. Thank you."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative DeCoite rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative DeCoite's written remarks are as follows:

"With reservations. I personally believe that we should give people choices in how they want to live and how they want to die. I am not sure if this bill has covered all the bases to ensure that we do this right the first time. I would like to see what information would be given to physicians, patients, and other healthcare providers that have roles covered by this law; and by whom. The entire process needs to be explained in simple to understand and follow instructions, so everyone can comply with the requirements spelled

out in the law. If those affected by this law are unclear on what is required, then we will see confusion and other possible negative consequences.

"As this bill moves forward, I hope that we gain more consensus rather than split our constituents on one side versus the other. *Mahalo*."

Representative Kong rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Aquino rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Cullen rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tupola rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative McDermott rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. "Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to Standing Committee Report Number 928-18, H.B. 71, HD 1, Relating to Ethics. This bill makes it unlawful for any governor or county mayor, while serving in their respective capacities as governor or county mayor, to maintain any other employment or receive any emolument. I am in opposition to this measure because if the Legislature is to pass such a bill for the executive branch, we should also pass the same measure for the legislative branch. Doing so would exemplify good government and transparency, in that we would remove any purported conflicts from either branch of government.

"Mr. Speaker, while there is no preamble to HB 71, HD 1 explaining the legislative intent of this measure, I can only surmise that the intent is to ensure that any such conflicts of interests the executives of the State or county may have by holding private sector employment, would be avoided should this bill become law. While I wholeheartedly support that intent, the fact of the matter is that we in the Legislature have the same conflicts as the governor and mayors and perhaps even a heightened conflict of interest. What exacerbates our conflicts in the Legislature is that we have the power to appropriate funds, whereas the executives have only the power to release the funds we have appropriated. As such, members of the Legislature who hold outside private sector positions have the ability to influence funds to any private sector interest that would benefit that member. While we in the Legislature requests rulings on potential conflicts, it is rare that the Speaker has ever found an actual conflict, notwithstanding the fact that some members may benefit in a pecuniary manner (i.e. a member who is an attorney and votes on the 'claims against the State' bill which would provide settlement monies to that member). Accordingly, I stand in opposition to this measure insofar as it should apply not only to the executive branches, but to the Legislature and councils as well. For these reasons, I sadly remain in opposition to this measure as it fails to ensure that all conflicts of government officials are averted. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support of this measure, which would regulate for-profit universities by requiring them to identify themselves as a for-profit business on all promotional materials, ending a deceptive behavior that can have serious negative consequences for students. The integrity of the diploma received from an institution is of prime importance to the individual who invests years of their life and tens of thousands of dollars—often in the form of state and federal loans or grants. People seeking a higher education should not have to investigate whether an institution is a business that's trying to make a profit versus a non-profit or government institution. This should be stated plainly by the business on all of its promotional materials.

"Those who seek to become students want to enroll at institutions that put students' needs first. Unfortunately, they have too often found themselves to be merely customers who are being bilked for the bottom line of a publicly traded company whose primary incentive is to minimize spending on actual education so that they can maximize profit from their customers' tuition. Genuine higher education nurtures relationships between professors and students conducive to opening minds, instilling knowledge and awakening wonder; it has never been about employees serving customers. It is important that prospective students know which sort of institution they are considering to dedicate years of their life and future earnings towards and

this information is so important that it should be in the name of the institution itself.

"National for-profit institutions such as ITT Tech., Trump University, and Heald College locally have failed catastrophically, nullifying the credibility of diploma holders and displacing students. According to a U.S. Senate committee report, 96% of all students in these types of institutions take out loans to pay for their education and have a 22% chance of defaulting on their loans in the first few years of their education. Due to the previous presidential administration's tightening of rules on for-profit institutions, more than 28 institutions, including some of the largest and most popular ones, have been charged with false advertising by the Securities and Exchange Commission.

"According to The Century Foundation, a nationally recognized nonpartisan think tank, for-profit institutions, particularly when financed by third parties such as government grants and loans, disproportionately lead to decreased student earnings, growing debt balances, unmanageable debt loads, loan default, and student deception.

"The Century Foundation has further indicated in testimony that across Hawaii, over 2,000 students are enrolled in for-profit colleges. Hawaii students at for-profit colleges are half as likely to graduate and more than twice as likely to default on student loans compared to their counterparts at not-for-profit colleges. In the past, state policymakers may have assumed that, because for-profit colleges receive up to 90% of their funds through the U.S. Department of Education and additional funds for serving military and veteran students, overseeing them is primarily a federal responsibility. But in fact, federal oversight has been demonstrated to be inadequate, and the Trump administration is in the process of rolling back the protections that do exist."

A \$10 fee to get a birth certificate may not sound like much to many, but to someone on the streets, it might mean everything. Since homeless people by definition have no residence, they cannot safely and securely store their items like most people, and they are at greater risk of losing their identification, or someone stealing it off their person as they sleep. This principle applies to the money in their pockets as well. As a state that has taken responsibility for the homeless crisis, it makes no sense for the State to continue to have monetary barriers in place that could deter homeless people from their path to getting off the streets. In this instance, let's be practical and make an exception to the rule for the people who have the most to benefit—our homeless who we are always talking about helping but not doing enough for. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative LoPresti's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support of this measure. On November 11 of this year, the United States will see the 100th anniversary of the end of World War I. This legislation would serve to recognize the more than 10,000 soldiers and civilians from Hawaii who served and sacrificed in the Great War. The National World War One Centennial Commemoration, which was established by an Act of the U.S. Congress in 2013, relies on each state and territory to plan and carry out its own commemoration programs. Hawaii's Governor formed the Hawaii World War One Centennial Task Force to lead the State's efforts. The commemoration effort cannot accomplish its assigned mission without funding. If Hawaii is to have a commemoration worthy of the sacrifices and service of the people who served either in uniform or civilian capacity, it must be funded by the State. This legislation will allow the people of Hawaii to express their respect, admiration, and gratitude to the generation who served during the Great War. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2698, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO VETERANS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Woodson being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1046-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2007, as amended in HD 1, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2007, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Choy and San Buenaventura voting no, and with Representative Woodson being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1047-18) recommending that H.B. No. 584, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 584, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative San Buenaventura rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Lowen rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 584, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representatives Lowen and San Buenaventura voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Woodson being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1048-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2106, HD 2, as amended in HD 3, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2106, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative McDermott voting no, and with Representative Woodson being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1051-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2547, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2547, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations, brief comment. My reservations are three part. This is creating an Office of Sustainability within DBEDT and it's appropriated \$2 million for one director, six staff positions, which in one of the testifiers testimonies kind of pointed out that there is, this is a huge appropriation for that many positions, and of course, with the amount of need that we have in our state right now for homelessness, for other things, I'd be remiss to not point out that that was high. And of course, blanking it out and making sure the conversation continues is important.

"However, in the Attorney General's testimony they also pointed out that many of these responsibilities within this new Office of Sustainability is duplicative of that of the Office of Planning, and that there was no differentiation, meaning that there will be increased inefficiency. Secondly is that it's also going to allow the office to solicit and accept donations while they're giving advice to the Governor and the Legislature, which seems against ethics.

"And I think my last concern with the Office of Sustainability is that there's no clear funding source. So although I love sustainability, I don't know if I can vote for a new office that's not going to be sustainable because there's no clear source, it's going to be accepting donations, and many of the services are duplicative. So those are my reservations. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2547, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SUSTAINABILITY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Tupola voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Woodson being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1052-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2021, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2021, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. My brief comment about this was that it was in regards to the Hawaii Youth Correctional Facility, which ends up that our youth are doing much better. So there's a lot of space in there, they want to start using the facility. However, as we have in our HRS right now, that severe mental illness, meaning people that need that type of support, need to go to a psychiatric hospital. So they're not allowed to go to a community center or a non-profit, because you actually need a lot of those services. And those are my two concerns.

"Of course I support homelessness, but sending any severe mental patient to a place that isn't a hospital is actually against what we have in our current guidelines. And secondly is making sure that these new support places, say for example Hawaii Youth Correctional Facility, has enough support staff to handle this kind of severe mental illness. The pilot projects suggest that we start with 10 people, which, maybe that's not a lot, but you never know what kind of illnesses they have. So 10 people could be a lot for them to handle, we don't know. And then, after they are given that treatment, where do they go? Back out to the street? And that's where that other part of it really needs to be thought through. Because as we start a pilot program that doesn't have a clear, I guess, direction of where they go, we could be making it worse and maybe not helping where we want to. So those are my concerns. It's still in support. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Evans rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. I personally have a friend whose daughter has been mentally ill, and I've learned from that experience that people go into the hospital and they get treated, but according to the federal law and insurance and payment schedule, they can only offer services for a limited amount of time, and then they release them and then they go back on the street again. And of course we have Mental Health Kokua and other providers, Hope Services on Hawaii Island, that try to provide housing for them, but, but we give the right to mentally ill patients to have their own choice, their freedom of where they want to go.

"But I think what this bill is doing is really moving us in the right direction. Number one, it's a pilot, but more importantly what it's saying is, some people are very, very severe, and they are out on the streets, and they really need to be in an environment that's very supportive for them, and it really is going to take a specialty and certain people that can work with those type of folks. I believe there is going to be due process in this bill, and I think it's an unmet need that's long overdue.

"I'm looking forward to seeing how this pilot project gets rolled out, because it's been really a sad situation to see this person that I know sleeping on the doorways every night in Kona, and really needing to be in a home that can provide services. More than just, again, Hope Services and Mental Health Kokua that provides these group homes, but really don't have that staffing, and that mandate or that vision or mission of really helping these people that are severely in trouble. So thank you, and I strongly urge everyone to support this. Thank you."

Representative Lee rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, strong support."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2021, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOMELESS INDIVIDUALS WITH SEVERE MENTAL ILLNESS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Woodson being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1053-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2493, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2493, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EPIDEMIOLOGISTS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Woodson being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1056-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2750, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2750, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Har rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2750, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Har, Matsumoto, Tokioka, Tupola and Ward voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Ito, McDermott and Say voting no, and with Representative Woodson being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1058-18) recommending that H.B. No. 1725, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1725, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COLLECTIVE BARGAINING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Woodson being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1059-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2114, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2114, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COLLECTIVE BARGAINING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Say, Tupola and Ward voting no, and with Representative Woodson being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1060-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2598, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2598, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support, request to insert written comments, and just brief remarks. Mr. Speaker, this is a work in progress, a priority of the Women's Legislative Caucus, and I would like to commend the Labor Committee and its chair for putting work into this as this continues to move forward. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Belatti's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support of House Bill 2598, House Draft 2.

"Paid family leave has long been a policy that many in our community have worked towards. Indeed, in a community that prides itself in placing a high priority on 'ohana and coming together to take care of those who are sick, frail, and elderly within one's family, paid family leave is a policy that supports our community's core values surrounding 'ohana.

"The intent of House Bill 2598, House Draft 2 is to establish a paid family leave program into statute and provide a reasonable timeline in which to work out the complex details in setting up such a program that can broadly help the 247,000 people who serve as family caregivers throughout the state.

"Some may criticize that this approach does not go far enough. However, any system and program that seeks to provide the types of benefits that will have as broad an impact as this policy may have on workers, businesses, and society-at-large should be done carefully. Time will be needed to determine the appropriate balance of funding for paid family leave, capitalize any system that will pay out family leave payments, and build out the staff needed to manage such a system.

"Because a benefit such as paid family leave can have such broad impacts on our community, I support the approach being taken in this measure to carefully craft a paid family leave program that will work for Hawaii's people."

Representative DeCoite rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative DeCoite's written remarks are as follows:

"I have reservations on this bill because I have heard from many in my district who may be negatively affected by this bill because it will increase their costs of doing business. This bill will affect all employers, large or small, and will also impact all employees because they will have to make payments into this new Paid Family Leave Special Fund. Most benefits such as this are entirely employer paid and I believe that paid family leave may eventually have to be borne only by employers. One negative consequence if this bill passes is that employers may end up reducing their staff to pay for this additional cost. That is not what we want or need. I also recognize the need that employees have in taking care of their families, so I hope that as this bill moves forward, we will be able to find the right balance that we can all live with. *Mahalo*."

Representative Har rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Strong support, permission to enter comments."

Representative LoPresti's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support of this measure. It is time to catch up with the rest of the civilized world which treats their employees with compassion, empathy, caring, and humanity. Family members are born. Family members can become ill. Why do we continue to go on as if these things shouldn't affect us and that employees must be expected to choose work over family? I propose that not having paid family leave is a knowing and deliberate regressive policy that we have allowed to exist all this time. The people that this regressive policy hurts the most are people at the lowest income levels,

while the people at higher income levels can rely on paid leave, employer perks, or personal savings and other financial assets. Let's acknowledge that someone who has a new baby is not always a stay-at-home mom, but could be a working single mom (or dad) or a part of a family that is barely making ends meet. Let's acknowledge that Hawaii is a special place where we want to personally care for our 'ohana during the hour of their greatest need. Let's end the nonsense and finally adopt a progressive policy of paid family leave for all employees. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2598, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FAMILY LEAVE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representatives DeCoite, Har, Tokioka and Ward voting aye with reservations, with Representative Tupola voting no, and with Representative Woodson being excused.

Representative Nishimoto, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1062-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2436, as amended in HD 1, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2436, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOPEDS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Woodson being excused.

At 9:46 o'clock a.m., the Chair noted that the following bills passed Third Reading:

Representative Tupola rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1632, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO BICYCLES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representatives LoPresti and Tupola voting aye with reservations, with Representative Lowen voting no, and with Representative Woodson being excused.

Representative Nishimoto, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1066-18) recommending that H.B. No. 1851, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative McDermott rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. I'd just briefly like to thank the Judiciary Committee Chair for taking the time out during the hearing to explain to us what exactly this measure was. It's sort of confusing for non-attorneys, but he was creating a tool to get tough on people who show pornography to children. So it was a very confusing matter, but we thank him, and thank you for giving the time, Chair. Took us aside and spent some time with us. He didn't have to do that, and I'm grateful he did. Thank you."

Representative Evans rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise with slight reservations and a few comments. My only concern is the language about the person voluntarily performs duties that are parental in nature to generally provide for the minor. To put it in context, it's a pornography bill, and it's defining the definition of in loco parentis, a situation in which a person who is a non-parent or legal guardian of a minor stands in place of a parent. My slight reservation is I know that in state libraries and schools, many times there's opportunities, possibly, a minor may be in the building or in their presence and there may be some situation, exposure to pornography, and I don't want to inadvertently have created a situation where parents or other people may file a complaint against them. So I was just slight hoping that I want to make sure in the end that there is protections in place for staff. Thank you."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With slight reservations as well, brief comment. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. My concern was similar to the prior speaker in referencing the Attorney General's testimony as well as sitting down with the prosecutors, is trying to wrap my head around if it expands the protection for those who might be with a child for any extended period of time, whether that's a coach, whether that's a babysitter, whether that's a sleepover. So those are concerns, obviously it has some ways to go, hoping that it gets clarified, but of course, applauding those who are trying to take this and do the right thing to prosecute in a situation that happened that needs to be addressed. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations, brief comment. Mr. Speaker, this bill clearly fits the definition of being a conundrum. The best lawyers in this building, the AG and all the others, have two different sides to the issue. On the floor, it's not clear, and if you're a member of the public, how are you going to decide on something that even we can't decide on. Even though it's likely to pass, it's not really clear-cut when you have the top lawyer in this building saying, this is going to spread pornography more easily because of the way that it covers so many people, which otherwise would not be. So for those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I'm with reservations for this conundrum bill. Thank you."

Representative Har rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support, brief comments. First and foremost, Mr. Speaker, I want to thank the Judiciary Chair for having the fortitude to hear this bill. If you actually understand the issues, where this case arose from, the Judiciary Chair took the bold move of tightening up a loophole that we have in the law. And so, as a previous speaker from Ewa Beach had noted, if you actually understood the genesis of this bill and why the Judiciary Chair heard this bill, you would understand why this is passing as it is. So for these reasons, Mr. Speaker, I'm in strong support."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1851, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PORNOGRAPHY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representatives Evans, Tupola and Ward voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Woodson being excused.

Representative LoPresti rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1768, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INFORMATION PRACTICES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 43 ayes to 7 noes, with Representatives LoPresti and Matsumoto voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Choy, DeCoite, Har, Ito, Say, Tokioka and Tupola voting no, and with Representative Woodson being excused.

Representative Takumi, for the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1071-18) recommending that H.B. No. 1602, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1602, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Thielen rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Thielen's written remarks are as follows:

"I stand in support of this bill in the fight against the deadliest drug crisis to ever hit America—spreading faster than the HIV epidemic & killing more in 2016 alone than the total U.S. troops killed in the 20-year Vietnam War.

"I declare that our nation treat opioid drug makers and distributors the same way we did tobacco companies—like pariahs. In the 1990s, American including Hawaii legislators used multipronged strategies and tactics against the biggest cigarette makers due to unrelenting pressure by citizens. Eventually, smoking was banned in public.

"This week, the New York Times stated that the Sackler family—who invented OxyContin, led a marketing campaign that deceived doctors, is worth some \$14 billion and ranked as one of the 20 wealthiest families in America: '... bear a large share of responsibility for the opioid epidemic through their pharmaceutical company's production and fervid promotion of OxyContin. Having facilitated one of the biggest public health crises in modern American history, they need a new profile. The art world should not help them achieve it.'

"HB 1602 will alert consumers that these products are addictive and can cause death."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support, and just wanted to thank the introducer as well as those working on this, as this issue is very severe, and I'm grateful that we're taking a measure to address that. So, thank you very much."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1602, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO OPIOIDS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Woodson being excused.

Representative Takumi, for the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1072-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2143, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2143, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO BEHAVIOR ANALYSIS SERVICES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives McDermott and Tupola voting no, and with Representative Woodson being excused.

Representative Takumi, for the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1073-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2741, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2741, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative DeCoite rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative DeCoite's written remarks are as follows:

"With reservations. I believe that this bill may be premature because cannabis is still illegal under federal law. Until the States and the Congress can reconcile this problem, working on insurance reimbursements is premature. There are many other medications that are not reimbursable by insurance because they are still in the experimental stage and not approved by the FDA. I believe medical cannabis is in a similar boat, so I am voting on this bill with reservations. *Mahalo*."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Har rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tupola rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2741, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MEDICAL CANNABIS," passed Third Reading

by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representatives DeCoite, Har, Tokioka, Tupola and Ward voting aye with reservations, with Representative Choy voting no, and with Representative Woodson being excused.

Representative Takumi, for the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1075-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2651, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2651, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative DeCoite rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative DeCoite's written remarks are as follows:

"I am voting with reservations on this bill, so we can continue the discussion to establish a process to improve access to broadband services throughout the state and to ensure that these services are affordable for all residents. Both the IAC and CPC Committees made numerous changes to the bill, and as it moves to the Senate, I hope any further changes will result in improvements to that policy framework establishing a robust, reliable, and technologically advanced wireless broadband network. *Mahalo*."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations. I'm watching it, it's a very complicated issue. There's still a lot for me to learn about it, and for now I just want to express my reservations. Thank you."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2651, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WIRELESS BROADBAND FACILITIES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representatives DeCoite, LoPresti and Tokioka voting aye with reservations, with Representative Say voting no, and with Representative Woodson being excused.

Representative Nishimoto, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1078-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2530, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2530, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2530, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHILD CARE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Matsumoto voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Woodson being excused.

Representative Nishimoto, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1081-18) recommending that H.B. No. 1650, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1650, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHILD SAFETY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Woodson being excused.

Representative Nishimoto, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1082-18) recommending that H.B. No. 1859, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1859, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHILDREN," passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Har, McDermott and Tupola voting no, and with Representative Woodson being excused.

Representative Nishimoto, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1083-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2399, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2399, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HIGHWAY SAFETY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Woodson being excused.

Representative Nishimoto, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1084-18) recommending that H.B. No. 1942, as amended in HD 1, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1942, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DRIVER LICENSING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives Matsumoto, McDermott, Tupola and Ward voting no, and with Representative Woodson being excused.

Representative Nishimoto, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1087-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2589, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2589, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOTORCYCLES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Woodson being excused.

At 9:56 o'clock a.m., the Chair noted that the following bills passed Third Reading:

H.B. No. 1632, HD 1 H.B. No. 1851, HD 2 H.B. No. 1849, HD 2 H.B. No. 1768, HD 2 H.B. No. 1602, HD 2 H.B. No. 2143, HD 2 H.B. No. 2741, HD 2 H.B. No. 2651, HD 2 H.B. No. 2530, HD 1 H.B. No. 1650, HD 2 H.B. No. 1859, HD 2 H.B. No. 2399, HD 1 H.B. No. 1942, HD 1 H.B. No. 2589, HD 2

Representative Nishimoto, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1093-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2617, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2617, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. I wanted to thank the introducer, and just a quick comment. Last year on Fourth of July, we had over 10,000 people at Waikiki on these flotillas, and last year Memorial Day, which both of those holidays are coming up, the same Instagram flotilla phenomenon happened at Waimea Bay, and it was horrible. I mean, there was thousands of people out there, minors included, all over the area, and it wasn't just for HPD, HFD got out there, DLNR got out there, all the lifeguards were out there trying to man and police this incident. So I think that it's definitely a step in the right direction as we have these holidays coming up this summer. People love being outdoors, but we should always be safe. Thank you."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. While I appreciate the intent and support of this measure, I have to stand with some reservations. My concerns stem from page 3, starting at line 19, where they define a floatation device to include a surfboard. However, further down, it says it's not included if it's propelled by mechanical means, and as somebody who surfs and paddleboards quite a bit, as many of my constituents do, the fact that mechanical propulsion exempts this very same craft from a floatation device, and you inadvertently have surfers who could fall into this law who are just surfing. And anyway, I hope when the Senate looks at this, they will address the situation as to whether an exemption exists for just regular old surfing after a few cold ones. Thank you."

Representative Quinlan rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition, Mr. Speaker. I like to drink beer in the ocean. I think a lot of people like to drink beer in the ocean. I don't think there's, again, any illintent in this measure. I think it's an overreaction to a couple of incidents, and there are far better ways to address this issue. And quite frankly, my police officers on the North Shore of Oahu have far better things to do than to write tickets for people drinking beer in the ocean. Thank you."

Representative Ing rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. So, I kind of want to talk about the problem. Since July, there was about 200 rescues outside of Waikiki. Our emergency, our first responders that we all say we all would support, were very, very much overwhelmed. There's 12 ambulances for the south side of Oahu, 10 were used in that one spot. So if something was going on with your family or you had like some emergency, there's a chance that there would be a huge delay in emergency services getting there. So this was actually prompted by first responders, the police officers who have better things to do, and they came to me and said, we should do a bill about this. So it is about enforcement.

"Right now, it's impossible to enforce these underage drinking laws in the water, so there's no way to card people. During that event, there was a 17-year-old woman, or girl, a 17 year-old-girl who was hospitalized in critical condition, had to get her stomach pumped for alcohol poisoning. There was 10 people, actually, that got rushed to the hospital that day.

"And lastly, the media interviewed Sustainable Coastlines, who talked about the extreme litter that transpires from these events, and how these floatation devices break open, and there's these little Styrofoam balls that look like fish eggs, and these fish will bite them, and then float at the top, and they can't dive down to get food and they die. So it's one of the most heavily causes of littering out of any event in the water.

"And currently, you can't drink on the beach, but as soon as you walk into the water you can, and it's a loophole, really. And I don't know, I just find it disappointing that people in this body are trying to drink while swimming. Most surfers I know, I grew up surfing, don't do that, and they're actually really concerned about litter in the water. And look, I'm a young guy, I'm all about having fun, but we've got to do it responsibly. Like, people are dying, our reefs are getting destroyed. Thank you. Not dying, getting really close to dying, critical condition. Thank you. Don't want to exaggerate."

Representative Brower rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I was just going to reaffirm that I'm in strong support of this bill, and it's ironic that we don't have a law, swimming under the influence. Thank you."

Representative San Buenaventura rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tupola rose to respond, stating:

"Second time, still in support, Mr. Speaker. I just wanted to commend the introducer, again, because, again, speaking from somebody who actually understood the day that it happened last year, on Memorial Day, and it actually started the night before, the amount of minors that were getting this Instagram post about what was going to go down, what you should bring, what was going to happen while we're there, maybe we do some alcohol, maybe some drugs. It was, I actually saw the posts, I got to see what happened that day with the amount of responders that were out there, and how they didn't have a mechanism whereby to handle the situation, and that's what we're talking about. Not for just regular, every day, they're not going to go out there and bust guys that are just swimming around. We're actually specifically making a mechanism for days like this, when thousands of people are out there.

"The emergency medical services couldn't handle it, the police couldn't handle it, the HFD was out there trying to handle it. There was a bunch of minors whose parents didn't even know they were out there that day, and they started the night before, camping out on the road, waiting for this event to happen. So again, it's not for the overall enjoyment of the water, it's so that in the event of events like this, that we have a way to actually have a mechanism so that they can do something about it. Thank you."

Representative Souki rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I wish to have a nay vote on this measure here. Historically, families have always gathered and sometimes consumed a little bit of beer, drinking, and I think it's unrealistic to say that you can't drink on the shoreline. And I hope as we go along this bill will be put into sleep, and if I can use the term, drowned a little bit. Thank you."

Representative San Buenaventura rose to respond, stating:

"Second time in reservations, and I just want to point out. I understand Oahu's problem with this flotilla, I'm just concerned that it casts a wide net, that it will affect neighbor island fishermen who are innocently drinking while fishing or diving, and I understand that it refers to bathers. I also do understand that it doesn't refer to the thousands of bathers that prior speakers were referring to, it talks about individuals, and that's what I'm concerned about. Thank you."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ing rose to respond, stating:

"Still in support, but I also have a point of information. This doesn't ban drinking on the shorelines, that's already law. Second, when it comes to like drinking and diving, people probably shouldn't be doing that, either. It's like you have a spear gun and dude, whoa! It's kind of crazy to think about. So, but I am open, if this does go over to conference, that we can broaden it after hearing everybody to maybe five or more bathers in one area, something like that, that might make more sense to quell some of the concerns. Thank you."

Representative Keohokalole rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I do want to note that it's not an over exaggeration to talk about deaths. There was a death in Kaneohe as a result of one of these flotilla events that took place on the Kaneohe Sandbar, and this Legislature took action to impose strict regulations on allowing these

types of events to happen out on the Kaneohe Sandbar. And so, what happened? It spilled over into Waikiki, it spilled over into the North Shore.

"Also, if you speak with the DLNR about these types of events, what they will tell you is that these sorts of random boat parties, floatation parties, pop up across the state, including on Niihau, right offshore. Because, while they're not allowed to trespass on the private property, they are allowed to go on the beach, and they do participate in these types of parties right off shore. So taking a broader statewide approach to this type of activity, I think is the right direction to go.

"Now, should fisherman on boats hooking *akule* be prohibited or come in contact with criminal liability for having a few while they're fishing? No, I don't think so, and I think that a reasonable attempt was made in the various committees to make sure that we're drawing the line in the proper way, and if the Senate has disagreements with how to properly define that line, I think then that's a discussion that we can have. I agree with the Representative from Kihei. Wielding a spear gun in the water, diving is an inherently dangerous activity, I don't know if those folks should be exempt from the prohibition on consuming alcohol on the water.

"But again, it's illegal to drink on the beach. It's illegal. So to allow thousands of folks to just venture out into the water and drink, and then congregate in these manners, so you have thousands of pounds of rubbish that wash up the next day on the shoreline, broken floatation devices, bottles, Styrofoam coolers, it's a problem. And we saw it in our community, and so because it was the first incident of its kind, oh and by the way, yes, there was a gentleman who was heavily intoxicated when he got back to Heeia Kea Pier, got into a fight, got punched, fell, hit his head on the cement, and died. And so that's the type of unforeseen circumstances that come from allowing these huge congregations of people to act in an inappropriate

"We have lots of regulations and rules about these types of events while they're on land, and I don't see why we shouldn't take a look at this stuff from a broader perspective across the state, instead of having people die in different locations, after these events pop up across the state, and then reacting the way we did in Kaneohe, by just banning the activity in one specific area, one at a time. So for those reasons, I stand in support. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations and a brief comment that, in today's opioid and drug culture, eliminating alcohol is symptomatic, maybe of that subculture, but with the drugs and the opioids that are around, I think we're going to be scratching the surface if this passes. Thank you."

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations. Just concerned about the overreach on the neighbor islands where, on Kauai, drinking at public parks is allowed during certain hours of the day. So, just concerned about the sensitivities to recreational users on the neighbor islands. Thank you."

Representative Evans rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations, a slight comment. I haven't heard anybody say this, but I was thinking about, we have laws on drinking while driving a car, so it may be that we should be looking at drinking and driving the boats, and making the person, the owner of the boat, responsible for the behavior of the people driving it. So if somebody is harmed, just like if someone's drinking while driving in a car, there is some penalty for that. So I'd like to see it advance, I think it's good discussion, and it is a problem that has to be addressed. Thank you."

Representative DeCoite rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, reservations. I also, on the neighbor islands, we actually had a case where a person was given a ticket for drinking while riding on horse, and I would just like to kind of reflect on that. He lost his beer and his ukulele in the process, and the horse was guiding him home, but he did have to appear in court, and of course it was thrown out of court. But reservations, Mr. Speaker. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2617, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO OCEAN WATERS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives DeCoite, Evans, McKelvey, Nakamura, San Buenaventura, Tokioka and Ward voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Gates, Holt, Quinlan and Souki voting no.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1095-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2454, as amended in HD 1, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2454, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HAWAII CORRECTIONAL INDUSTRIES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1100-18) recommending that H.B. No. 1676, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1676, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. We've seen similar bills to this for the past four years I've been here, and I just really support expanding these. Gosh, I wish I could just buy an EMS or an ambulance for some of these areas that have been without for years, decades for some areas. Puna. I mean, I appreciate my colleagues from the neighbor islands bringing up how long, how many years it's been without, and in some areas that were brought up in the hearing, over an hour before you get an ambulance coming to you. So we're definitely spoiled here on this island, and of course I support expanding this in areas where they desperately need it. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Strong support. I just wanted to draw attention to the nexus between this bill and the bill previously on consuming alcohol in the water. One of the major problems with both of these is, we don't have enough ambulances. And when we have Panama City beach-style spring break *fiestas*, which we don't want the reputation of, that takes away resources of our ambulances to actually help people in need elsewhere in the community, and so we definitely need this. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Strong, strong support. Mr. Speaker, this bill kind of catches Oahu off guard, and as my colleague said, thanks to the neighbor islands, particularly Kauai and the Big Island, and hey we've got an emergency ambulance situation that's nearing a crisis. Some of our ambulances have over 400,000 miles on them, and I wonder why. Well, Kauai got its last new ambulance in 1992, Maui got its last new ambulance in 2004, the Big Island 2005, and Honolulu in 2012. Every year there's about a 3% increase in calls, that's about 4,400. In 2012, there were 125,000 calls, and 2017, 146,000 calls. And, Mr. Speaker, this is not to mention what came out in the hearing that probably 5% to 10% of these increases, or 10% of the calls, are from the homeless population. One individual was cited as having 195 calls in one year. And it's not to blame on them, but the point is, everybody is getting more calls to the ambulance, for various and sundry

reasons. The projected increase of the 65 and older population who use the EMS is going to be 17% in 2016 to 23.5% by 2030.

"The point is, Mr. Speaker, there's a real need for this bill, and by increasing the number of ambulances, our state will be able to reach those requiring EMS services in a timely manner. So the point is not just having access to an ambulance, it's having access in a timely manner, Mr. Speaker. If it's a stroke, you've got to be really, really quick. If you get there too late, the paralysis may not be correctionable.

"The point is that Honolulu City and County has only 18 ambulances, or 20 ambulances to serve 1 million people, and in the hearing, it was said we need at least double that amount, just for Honolulu, Mr. Speaker. At the Hawaii Kai neighborhood board, the EMT employee stated that an ambulance from Hawaii Kai drove to Makakilo due to a lack of ambulances in that area. In fact, he said that probably 48% of sometimes of the East Honolulu ambulances were moving into the urban areas and beyond, even sometimes as far as Nanakuli.

"This is not to play favorite geographical reasons, but it's a wakeup call that we have not given this entity, EMS through the City and County, enough funds, and even the city council members who were at the neighborhood board meetings said, what? This is what we've got as the state of the art of EMS service? That's the difficulty, Mr. Speaker. Again, as I said earlier, a stroke, odds of survival drastically decrease after you get beyond so many minutes. Drugs, odds are less than 50% if it's beyond 18 minutes. There's a lot of overdoses, as you know. And drowning needs to be rescued within nine minutes, after nine minutes they're really, really in trouble.

"The point is, Mr. Speaker, as we are charged to first secure the safety and the security and the health of the people of the State of Hawaii, this bill needs to be taken very seriously, and hopefully increase. And there's one way to increase it without taking money out of the coffers, and that was in the testimony it said that the majority of ambulance services in the mainland do an *a la carte* service, which means, when you have an ambulance, depending on what services or what medical medicines or drugs that you get, you pay for those individually, the same way that when you go to the hospital. Hawaii has, at least the City and County of Honolulu, a \$1,200 flat fee. Whether you get all kinds of adrenaline or other kinds of anti-stroke or whatever medicine, charge is all the same. Forty million dollars are raised by just that flat fee, but what was brought on in the Finance Committee is if we did an *a la carte*, we would be able to raise that, and hopefully buy a few more ambulances that wouldn't have mileage, and that wouldn't have pick up times so great.

"So Mr. Speaker, this is kind of a wake-up call for all of us, all of our districts are affected by this, and I think, even though it's through the City and County, we have been the ones that pony up the money, and I hope with this bill, we will continue to do so. Thank you."

Representative Tokioka rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support, and I'd like to thank you, Mr. Speaker, for introducing this bill for all the men and women at EMS that struggle every day to get to their patients on time, and people who are suffering and need the service, and I would like to adopt the words from the Representative from Kahala, and that will be my longest floor speech of this session. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. Thank you. I would like to point out that although the Big Island has had ambulance in 2005, Puna has grown almost exponentially since then, and we have substandard roads, and the only thing I'm a little bit irritated about is that Oahu has co-opted our emergencies, whereas we have been in dire need for a long time. I understand that there's a need everywhere, and I do understand that, but we have been requesting for a Puna ambulance bill for long time, and it was a top priority, and this bill kind of co-opted our need. And for that reason, little bit irritated, but I am in support. Thank you."

Representative Todd rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Briefly, in support. I just kind of wanted to echo some of the prior comments. My brother actually started his fire career in Puna, and there's one ambulance to serve an area that's roughly the size of Oahu. I spoke with him this weekend about this bill specifically, and he told me that the average medical call is about two to two and a half hours, when you count the commute time. You're talking about basically a two-lane road, and it's 25 to 30 miles out of Hilo, which is the only hospital that services the region.

"So this will literally save lives, and I wanted to thank the Finance Chair for finding kind of a creative solution to some of the squabbling that happened in our committee with various EMS services by appropriating this funding to the state EMS, where they can then prioritize instead of allocating it specifically to an area. Thank you."

Representative Evans rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you. I rise in support, and I just want to point out that in West Hawaii, we've had a request for several years now to try to get this ambulance unit because we have, again, the same issue of not adequate response time. The community really stepped up and built a fire station, but we need to get it outfitted with this emergency ambulance.

"And I really want to shout-out to the Finance Chair for moving this forward, because this has been a problem on how we're going to really find the funding to address all these issues. The more roads we build, the more traffic we get, the less response time. And so we have to address the fact that just like the previous speaker from Kahala said, with strokes and heart attacks, you have to get to people in a timely manner or they will be brain dead. And that's not acceptable nowadays in these day and age. So, thank you everybody, and I hope we get everybody supporting this. Thank you."

Representative Hashem rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Ward be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1676, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1102-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2014, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2014, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOMELESSNESS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1110-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2724, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2724, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE ENERGY AGENCIES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1112-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2176, HD 2 pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2176, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2176, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR

AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Tupola voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Ward voting no.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1117-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2653, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2653, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support, brief comment. This is a real issue, one of my own constituents has contacted me about it. It's in regards to when the waterline comes up. So the waterline comes up, that part of your property is not yours anymore. And so the issue is that those areas are not being repaired, because whose property is it? Does DLNR come out and rebuild it? No, they don't. But there are concerns with people giving away public land, and I can understand both sides of it, but in the event that somebody's house is crumbling and they don't have the right to fix it, because it's not theirs anymore, that's what this seeks to try to address. Thank you."

Representative Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising with reservations, and I'd like to give a few comments as to why. Thank you. I know the introducer of this measure is trying to help when we're set in a situation where we are having sea level rise. Hawaii's shorelines are public lands up to the high wash of the waves, and we all know that, Mr. Speaker. Under this bill, the Department of Land and Natural Resources can set up short duration easements to enable these shoreline landowners to consider alternatives to ultimately relocate those private structures that now are landward of the shoreline setback land. In other words, they originally had maybe revetment seawalls, whatever, on the shoreline, legally permitted and legally cited, and then with sea level rise and other environmental developments, those lands became mauka of the shoreline setback line. And the idea is, under this bill, to say to DLNR, you can grant easements for up to 35 years for those structures. It's a 10 year, and then renewals, and they total 35 years.

"My concern is that it's not in the best interest of properly managing our shorelines, as we're faced with the sea level rise in the islands. So there's a way to, I think, to fix it, and that's if you turn to page 3 of the bill, and it's the first paragraph that's running over from the prior page, it's talking about short-duration term easements to enable these landowners to consider alternatives to ultimately relocate these private structures landward of the shoreline setback line. Well, don't just let them consider it. If we're giving them up to a 35-year lease on those properties, at a very nominal fee, by the way, do it to enable these landowners to promptly pursue relocation of these private structures. Then, there's some emphasis on the landowner to go ahead and act, to move the structures back out of what is public land, back onto a proper section of their property. The other way we're, in essence, saying to existing landowners, hey you've got 35 years, all you have to do is consider it, you don't have to act, you don't have to do anything.

"So I think the bill could be corrected, and I would hope that if the bill's sponsor agrees with this analysis, that the bill's sponsor would notify the Senate to take a look at page 3 and let's get some action in there so we achieve what we're trying to achieve. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I think the Representative from Kailua makes a great point, I'd like to enter the comments from her as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative LoPresti continued, stating:

"My other additional concerns are, though I'm in support I do have concerns and I'll watch it closely, and maybe this is an unfounded concern, but if they get these easements, I would hope that the bill clearly states that

under no circumstances can they build sea walls to continue the preservation of those buildings, and instead they should be encouraged, not encouraged, but maybe perhaps required to move those. Then my other concern with it is, in essence, what we'll be doing, say at the end of the century, is we'll end up losing our beaches to wealthy people who own beachfront properties, and now the beach is their property, because they got a house, basically, or a structure right within that area.

"And so it's not an easy problem to deal with, I'm glad we're wrestling with it, but I think we all need to begin to imagine what that future's going to look like where we have extremely wealthy, sometimes extremely powerful people, who will begin to literally own our beaches with this kind of exemption. Thank you."

Representative Matsumoto rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Thielen be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Thielen rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Just little bit of a follow up. Mr. Speaker, people should also note, members should also note that the bill applies retroactively back to 2012. So we're taking a very serious step, we're going back retroactively to allow people to get an easement up until the year 2053, where they just simply have to consider alternatives. So I think we need to do better. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2653, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SPECIAL SHORELINE ENCROACHMENT EASEMENTS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Thielen and Ward voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Gates and Har voting no.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1119-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2593, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2593, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Keohokalole rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Creagan rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in reservations. I'm concerned about potential predation of our endangered native bird species. Thank you."

Representative Cullen rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Please register a no vote, with comments. Mr. Speaker, there are two national wildlife refuges in my district, the Kilauea Point Wildlife Refuge and the Hanalei Wildlife Refuge. Both are sanctuary for endangered birds and plants. Between 2012 and 2015, the Hanalei National Wildlife Refuge attributed the deaths of 252 endangered water birds to feral cats. These include the Hawaiian common gallinule, Hawaiian coot, Hawaiian stilt, Koloa duck, and Pacific golden-plover. Nesting birds are also at risk. Feral

cats are suspected in the death of 22 Laysan albatross chicks during a three-week period in 2015.

"According to the DLNR, cats are the only known reproductive hosts of the toxoplasmosis parasite. Toxoplasmosis reproduces in the feline digestive system, and a single cat can excrete 145 billion eggs per year in its feces. Once released into the environment, these eggs can infect other animals including humans, both on land and in the ocean. In Hawaii, NOAA has recorded at least eight endangered Hawaiian monk seal deaths that are attributable to toxoplasmosis infection. In humans, toxoplasmosis can result in severe damage to the unborn child, miscarriage, stillbirth, or substantial birth defects. It should be noted, Mr. Speaker, that spaying and neutering does not prevent cats from releasing toxoplasma cells into the environment. Once released, these eggs can live in the soil and water for months and even years.

"HB 2593 makes trap, neuter, return, a statewide policy. It does not make exceptions for culturally sensitive areas such as salt ponds in Hanapepe, it does not take into account sensitive seabird nesting areas, and does not avoid areas where our monk seals haul out. It does not recognize the one to three-mile roaming distance of feral cats. In fact, HB 2593 exempts registered caretakers from state and county ordinances that prohibit or tries to regulate feral cat colonies. Again, it exempts these caretakers from these laws.

"Our federal, state and county governments are doing many things to save our native birds. The County of Kauai has spent millions of dollars installing shielded lights at county parks, and pays the state government \$10,000 for every downed Newell's shearwater. For over four years, night football games were canceled to protect our birds from light disorientation during fledging season. Our Kauai Island Utility Company, cruise ships, resort properties along the coast, County of Kauai, are all working on habitat conservation plans and are implementing measures to reduce endangered bird takes on Kauai. Passage of HB 2593 will undo many of the efforts to address endangered birds on Kauai.

"Mr. Speaker, we all acknowledge the need to control feral cat colonies. Because this is a polarizing issue, we must bring together stakeholders to have the needed conversation on how to reduce feral cat populations. We need the humane societies, wildlife advocates, feral cat caretakers, federal, state and county governments, OHA, cultural practitioners, and aquatic resource managers at the table to find some common ground. I believe the common ground is that cat abandonment has to stop, because it perpetuates this vicious cycle.

"This is a difficult and complex discussion that will require professional facilitation to help build consensus and come up with future recommendations. The Feral Cat Task Force on Kauai generated solid recommendations that should be a starting point for statewide discussions. Mr. Speaker, this bill is premature and will have dire consequences for Hawaii's native birds and aquatic species, expose the State to liability under the Endangered Species Act, and negatively impact human health. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In strong opposition. First, I'd like the words of the previous speaker adopted as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative LoPresti continued, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, trap, neuter and release is not working in Hawaii, it's not working. These cat colonies and those who support these cat colonies are actually increasing the suffering of animals in Hawaii, they're increasing the suffering of cats, and they're certainly increasing the suffering of those species that these feral cats are decimating. They are decimating endemic species here. There is no shortage of cute kitty cats on the planet, there's none. But, and I love cats, I grew up with cats, but because they're so awesome, and I admire them because of their great hunting prowess, it's that which makes them so dangerous. It's that which means we need to check our own emotions about how much we like kitty cats, and set that aside so that we can protect those endemic native species in Hawaii, because they're

killing them. There's a lot more I'd like to say, and I'll just put it in written comments. This is a horrible bill."

Representative LoPresti's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong opposition to this measure. Invasive, freeroaming cats are among the most severe threats to our endangered native bird populations, and they transmit diseases like ringworm, pinkeye, parasitic worms, Lyme disease, and a toxic parasite *Toxoplasma gondii* which has killed sea otters, spinner dolphins, kangaroos, and even humans. Even when fed, cats continue to hunt ruthlessly, and our native species are running out of time. We cannot afford to let more species needlessly go extinct while we waste time and taxpayer resources to implement expensive, ineffective 'Trap-neuter-release' (TNR) programs on all the Hawaiian Islands.

"In over 30 years of practice around the world, there is not one scientifically verified instance of TNR ever eliminating a cat colony anywhere. Contrarily, multiple peer-reviewed scientific studies have deemed TNR programs 'ineffective' after a decade of study, and often show that cat colonies actually increase or stay the same, because the practice encourages 'dumping' of unwanted pets and attracts nearby strays. In essence, objective reporting shows that TNR is dangerous to both cats and other species alike.

"The situation is becoming dire for native species, who have no natural defenses to protect themselves from predation by invasive cats. More than half the state's 130 native bird species are gone, and most of those that remain have been listed as endangered. We openly, rightly, and unashamedly spend time, money, and resources to fight invasive species in these islands (eg. Albizia, frogs, ants, trees, weeds, etc.) but for some reason, cats—one of the MOST destructive species—are allowed to flourish, and special laws are proposed to unjustly excuse and protect a small number of individuals who encourage the growth and perpetuation of destructive feral cat colonies.

"Scientists everywhere agree that feral cats are a huge problem for biodiversity, but unlike global climate change, deforestation, or other complex threats to wildlife, the feral cat dilemma is actually a fairly easy problem to solve. We owe it to our native species to protect them from this imminent threat of extinction, instead of wasting time and money on costly, futile TNR programs that merely prolong the problem. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Yamane rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, standing in support. So Mr. Speaker, I wasn't planning to stand, but I'll explain the nexus behind this bill. Again, I've been serving another community on behalf of the State of Hawaii, so I'm glad to be back. Mr. Speaker, the reason this bill was generated was at the request of non-profits who actually service many of the communities highlighted in previous testimony.

"Mr. Speaker, the system on currently dealing with feral cats is broken, it's only increasing. Mr. Speaker, it is not true to say that trap and neuter, return release programs are ineffective, it's how you implement it, Mr. Speaker. Currently, TNR programs are being used at the University of Hawaii, Manoa, Magic Island, Ala Moana Beach Park, Diamond Head Beach Park, and many other communities across the islands. Mr. Speaker, this program is successfully used on places like Disneyland and Stanford University. The reason for success is resulting in not only the program being implemented and the use of education to support those who feed these feral cats, but also on the counties and states that implement it.

"Mr. Speaker, currently, these feral cats are attacking indigenous native birds, but turning a blind eye to the problem is not a solution. Mr. Speaker, this bill was an attempt to try to bring people together to finally come up with a program that will address both sides of the problem. Not only the cats being left by former owners, but also by those who feed them. Mr. Speaker, if you talk with them, they understand it is an ongoing problem to have 300 cat colonies running through Central Oahu and other places. However, Mr. Speaker, for them it is a passion of theirs not to have these cats die from starvation. And Mr. Speaker, the last point I want to make in the rationale

behind this bill was that we are trying to address a problem that has been plaguing out state and city parks for decades. It's about time that we try to do something about it in a humane and constructive way, by looking at the implementation of a scientifically proven program called TNRs. Thank you."

Representative Kobayashi rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition. I believe that one of our biggest jobs here is to prioritize. Do we prioritize feral cats over wildlife, endangered birds, which our state is protecting through state tax dollars? Feral cats are a huge problem that I think cannot be adequately addressed by a bill which essentially delegates that responsibility of feral cats to a private non-profit organization.

"This bill says that the State shall contract with a private non-profit organization which meets the following qualifications, and I won't read them all, but those qualifications are very suspiciously targeting a well-known existing group or groups within the islands. When that rescue organization is selected, that rescue organization then can exempt caretakers from current law. In other words, a non-profit organization has the power of exempting someone from statute, and then that registered caretaker of cats is not limited to the number of animals, not limited to the confinement of animals. So this is a very dangerous kind of delegation of authority.

"In addition, I think we should be mindful of the fact that once we delegate this authority, because of the shall language, this is a perpetual, long-term obligation that we will have to fund through state taxpayer dollars. And so for these reasons and many others, I oppose this bill. Thank you."

Representative Holt rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Kobayashi be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative DeCoite rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative DeCoite's written remarks are as follows:

"With reservations. As the DLNR pointed out, the feral cat problem is a major threat to both wildlife and humans in Hawaii. The cats are a major predator of native wildlife, including threatened or endangered species. A major problem DLNR pointed out with this bill is that any realistic approach to the feral cat problem must include euthanasia for animals that cannot be placed into homes or sanctuaries. A trap-sterilize-return (TNR) program would only increase the feral cat problem and exposes the State to potential lawsuits under the Endangered Species Act (ESA). The Department of Health opposed this bill and stated that the counties have ordinances that addressed the management of feral cats. Another concern was that this bill exempted caregivers from state law and county ordinances. For these reasons, I vote on this bill with reservations. *Mahalo*."

Representative Har rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Gates rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative LoPresti rose to respond, stating:

"Second time in opposition, I just wanted to correct some facts. You know, trap, neuter and release does work in certain parts of the mainland. It's scientifically not working here. I'm all for moving according to science. I also wanted to note that even PETA, the People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals, cite that feral cats trap, neuter and return is considered an inhumane approach for cats themselves. So even that organization that's radically in favor of protecting animals, sometimes even above humans, says

that these programs actually hurt cats. So if you care about it, you don't support it. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2593, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FERAL CATS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 40 ayes to 11 noes, with Representatives Creagan, DeCoite, Gates, Har, Keohokalole, Matsumoto, Tupola and Ward voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Choy, Cullen, Evans, Hashem, Holt, Kobayashi, Learmont, LoPresti, Nakamura, Ohno and Takayama voting no.

Representative Nishimoto, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1120-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2072, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2072, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Keohokalole rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Unfortunately, I can't support this bill right now, and I'd just like to publicly explain why, because I don't want people to think that I'm not opposed to cruelty against animals. And quite the opposite, I have a conflict of interest, actually, I have to share with the members if I may, that I own a dog."

The Chair addressed Representative McKelvey, stating:

"There's no conflict."

Representative McKelvey continued, stating:

"Thank you so much. My concern with this measure, like so many other dog owners around here and dog lovers, is that while very well intended, the current version has a lot of problems, a lot of problems. It basically, what worries me about this measure is that it's criminalizing behavior under very subjective enforcement regimes, and things that regular dog owners do, dog trainers do, according to this bill, could now subject somebody to an animal cruelty charge, and any criminal charge warrants going to the criminal court system, getting a defense attorney. And a charge of animal cruelty also carries a lot of social stigma with it, too.

"So when I read the measure, and looking at some of the restraints on tethers, trolley wheel systems, 10 feet of leash or less. I could easily construe situations whereby innocent dog owners, especially those going to work, or perhaps in different parts of the house, or doing training or other things could be exposed to criminal liability.

"And so while I do not support animal cruelty, obviously, in any way, shape or form, as a dog lover my concern is that, with so many other things, the road to hell is sometimes paved with good intentions. And I think a lot of good dog owners, because of the way the statute is written, could find themselves being charged with a very serious offense, which ironically, they would never want to be associated with in any way, shape or form. Thank you."

Representative Gates rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative McKelvey be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Evans rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I stand in support. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. There's a lot of vulnerable children and adults, and now we're talking about vulnerable dogs. This bill has been around for several years, we're trying to get it right. It's with good intention, the intention being, there is the right way and the wrong to tether and chain dogs. If you saw what happened here, what, last week or the week before, it was on the television and the paper

about someone who had chained a dog and the chain grew into its neck, and it was just horrible. The dog could not eat, it was really a nasty situation.

"And the intent of this is, we know people are going to chain and tether, but there is the right way and the wrong way, and the best analogy that I can have is, here, years ago, we decided that you're supposed to seat belt your children in a car, but we all know that if you don't have booster seats and if you don't do it the right way, you could actually harm that child.

"I think that's what the intent of this bill is, is we know you're going to do it, but there's a right way and a wrong way. Because, inadvertently, you could actually harm the dog, and what will happen is, is what they've discovered in studies, is that if you really hurt a dog like that, leave them improperly on a chain all day long when you're gone, they end up turning into being barkers, potentially, they end up being biters, they're angry, they're upset, and it turns them. It's a behavioral thing. So I encourage us to keep it moving, and if there's some concerns, to keep working on it and try to make it right. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2072, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SECTION 711-1109, HAWAII REVISED STATUTES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 3 noes, with Representative Keohokalole voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Gates, McKelvey and San Buenaventura voting no.

Representative Nishimoto, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1122-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2215, as amended in HD 1, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2215, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO BICYCLES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1128-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2641, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2641, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC LANDS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1130-18) recommending that H.B. No. 1828, HD 2, as amended in HD 3, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1828, HD 3 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Souki rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. I would speak with very, very strong reservations in as much as it's going into the Senate and going to come back into conference, possibly, so it's a long way, but my concern with this, again, has to do with the share of the counties and the tourist tax, tourist accommodation tax. I would prefer that this money be used for mitigation of tourism, is very general and probably impossible to make it operable. How do you measure mitigation? How do you measure how much a county gets? Honolulu County, which is the largest, Oahu county, which is the largest, we could use that in a couple hours.

"So it's very difficult, and I understand you want to give some money back to the respective counties, but this is not the way to do it. The way to do it as an, also in 2605 also is to provide to increase the share of the tourist accommodation tax and to make it permanent with an increase every year, so they can take care of their own. We don't have to worry about the county, we got enough things to do on the State without telling the counties what to do.

"So with this measure, I would hope that as we go along, we look a little more closely, I know the intent is good, but I believe, again, it's wrong. We should be giving it to the counties and let them do with the dollars as they see fit. Thank you very much."

Representative Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support with a slight reservation. My concern has to do with the following language. Initiatives that mitigate negative impacts on communities caused by tourist activity. The idea of this bill is that perhaps as much as \$10 million, per the original drafts of this bill, might be spent to mitigate negative impacts, but negative impacts are not defined. Now, tourism causes all kinds of negative impacts, and the prioritization of these negative impacts could very well decide how \$10 million might be spent.

"For instance, would you want to mitigate the negative impacts of transient accommodations, short-term transient accommodations, like Airbnb or crime in tourist areas, or environmental quality, or beach safety, or homeless in tourist areas and other places? All those choices are left up to an agency who is named, the Hawaii Lodging and Tourism Association. I think that unless we further define negative impacts, some of this \$10,000 in taxpayer money will be spent on things that perhaps some people in the community would not like to see. I would like to see concern placed on negative impacts that are of widespread concern.

"I would note that tourism has grown so big that it has negative impacts that we did not originally contemplate, for instance, environmental quality. The Office of Environmental Quality Control was of such concern back in the '70s, during the Governor Burns administration, that OEQC, Office of Environmental Quality Control, was actually in the Governor's Office, and that had to do with Governor Burns's concerns about the growth of tourism and what he called the necessity for quality control policies, quality control policies. And the idea there was that we wanted tourism, but we wanted quality tourism, and we wanted tourism that did not impact, negatively, our communities. So for these reasons, I have some concerns and I hope that the term 'negative impacts' can be further defined later. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations, Mr. Speaker. Some interesting concerns raised by the previous speakers. My concern is quite different, and I've mentioned it before. My concern is about setting a precedent that we will continually have to mitigate and fight back against, of creating a nexus between the TAT and tourism impacts. So we're creating a nexus where it didn't exist before, and to quote my colleague in front of me, that creates a very slippery slope that endangers tax dollars for the State. Thank you."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Har rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1828, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TOURISM," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representatives Har, Kobayashi, LoPresti, Souki and Tokioka voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Say voting no.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1131-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2010, as amended in HD 1, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2010, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I am with reservations on 1131 because of forgiving the loan, the debt."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in mild support. It's mild support because it's a good bill, but it needs to be made known in the record that this bill is wiping off the books \$191 million, which some of us on this floor voted for years ago, because it was a quick payback of a location was the best thing since sliced bread, and it's been very disappointing, Mr. Speaker. So I wanted to go on record that this is \$191 million for the mortgage of which they otherwise said they were going to pay off very quickly. Now it's, what, 27 years later and we still owe \$191 million, and we're erasing it.

"My point is, to make known for the record, that we're erasing it, but to say what is at least good on the horizon, they've almost broken even, in fact, got a very small, how would you say, in the black this last year, but they still haven't, because of the past years, been able to pay it off. And, let's be very honest about it, other funds, other departments needed the funds, and instead of paying off the mortgage, they ended up using the Convention Center's funds. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I feel very mildly about this bill. Thank you."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations, same concern as my previous two colleagues. It's a huge amount of debt to forgive. Obviously, we don't want it to continue. However, we have priorities, we have other things that we've talked about in this body about things that we need to prioritize. So the reservation is the \$191 million of forgiveness of debt, with no clear plan of how we should have mitigated that and come at it. So those are my reservations. Thank you."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2010, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TOURISM," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representatives Matsumoto, Thielen and Tupola voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Say voting no.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1132-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2605, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2605, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Strong opposition to Standing Committee Report 1132, House Bill 2605, relating to transient accommodations, and if I may say a few words, please. Thank you. Mr. Speaker, the bill originally had a one, I'm talking about Oahu, by the way, neighbor islands have different setups, and neighbor islands seem to have really done a pretty good job with their transient vacationers, Oahu has not. It's been abysmal. And this bill had a \$1 million incentive in it to begin with for the County of Oahu. It's been, I guess, lined out, and now it's a blank incentive, but if the bill makes it to final reading, there will be a monetary incentive for the County of Oahu to create fast track special use permits for short-term vacation rentals, and these are the ones that are tearing apart our communities.

"A special use permit would grant exemptions from the existing residential zoning code, and it would mean that thousands of short-term vacation rental units could be allowed to operate inside residential zoning areas, areas that, up till now, have been reserved for our homes, our schools, and community parks.

"And then, in addition to the special use permits, the SUPs, the bill mandates the County of Oahu to set up a contested case process for any person who wants to have an SUP and is denied that. So then they're going to get a contested case. Number one, they're going to get to apply for the SUP. Number two, if they're denied, they get to apply and be granted a contested case proceeding.

"A 2016 study by SMS found that vacation rental units exacerbate the affordable housing problem by reducing our housing stock and driving up rents. And then in 2016, University of Hawaii's UHERO said, there're roughly 17,000 individually advertised units in Hawaii. Those are only the advertised ones, but we're talking 17,000. And another consulting firm, JLL, estimates if we don't do something to stop them, the number of vacation rentals in Hawaii are slated to grow by 3% every year.

"Mr. Speaker, 80% of these are owned by people that live outside of Hawaii. These are not local owners, 80% owned by people that live outside of Hawaii. And every new vacation rental is a home that your family, your children, my grandchildren won't be able to live in, because they're going to be churned on a short-term basis at this much higher revenue stream that these 80% owners, out-of-state owners, are benefitting from, and harming our local communities.

"The City and County has continually told us that they're unable to enforce the law for the few legal short-term rental units they already have, and I'd like to say loudly and clearly, the City has proven themselves incompetent and unwilling to enforce the ordinances that they already have on the books. How do we think this bill will cause them to be any different? It won't. What the bill will do is, the City will say, gee we have to grant special use permits, SUPs, and the City will then go ahead and be inundated with contested case requests, because they've denied some of those SUPs, and then the City will cave and say, we don't have the person power to be able to handle this, so we're going to grant all of these. This is 80% out-of-state owners. My grandchildren won't be able to find a place to rent, other members' children or grandchildren won't be able to find a place to rent."

Representative Quinlan rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Thielen continued, stating:

"Thank you. And we're going to be faced with the situation where the majority of people in our state won't be people who reside in our neighborhoods. I've told you before, Mr. Speaker. When I go door to door, I can tell which streets, which beachside streets in Kailua, are just vacation renters. They're dead, or else they're loaded with beach equipment, et cetera, but there's no neighborhood left. No one looking out for another neighbor. And the owners? There's a lockbox there, the owners aren't around. They're somewhere in New York, maybe even overseas. So what we're doing with this bill, it may have been well intentioned, but it's devastating because it incentivizes City and County, an entity that can't handle things anyway, they're just inept at handling what's going on now.

"There're two places in Kailua, Mr. Speaker, that have been featured on television that have a half a million dollars in fines, and they've been operating for 4 to 5 years, and the City hasn't even been able to shut them down or collect the money. They come to us for rail money, tell them to collect their fines that they have from the illegal operators, operating these Airbnb type of operations.

"So we're saying to the City, here's your incentive, you get more money, don't use it for rail, use it to set up a special use permit process, and then a contested case process. And when you plow through the money, because of the thousands of people that are operating illegally that are demanding to be having a legal permit, when you plow through that money and then you end up granting them all, what are we left with? Shells of former residential areas, places that none of us can call home, and then we say to our kids, sorry you can't afford to live here, because those places are owned by people that don't live in Hawaii, and they're not going to be available to you, to set up your family and live in Hawaii.

"It's something that, in my belief, is a wrong and devastatingly wrong policy. I'm sorry to see this bill reach third reading. I hope we never see it

on final reading, Mr. Speaker. Let's keep our homes for our local people. This bill does exactly the opposite for Oahu. Thank you."

Representative Quinlan rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Second time, I'll be brief. Just a couple points I want to make. On the North Shore, last time we counted, and this is probably a low number, there are over 2,000 vacation rentals listed on Airbnb, VRBO. Last time I did a district-wide mailer, that was 9,000 postal addresses. So you do the math on that. Another point I wanted to make is that we live in an era of cheap financing. The world is awash with capital, like a butterfly searching for its mate, and Oahu is the biggest, most beautiful butterfly out there. Thank you."

Representative Matsumoto rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, in opposition. Same, I represent the North Shore and our communities are overrun with illegal vacation rentals. It's turning our communities into resort areas, and it's a big problem, and I think we really need to look carefully at this bill as it moves through, and I would just like permission to insert further comments."

Representative Matsumoto's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. At this time, I rise in opposition. My fear is that this bill, although it attempts to address the pervasive issue of illegal vacation rentals, may potentially increase the number of illegal vacations rentals, or transient vacation units (TVUs), when counties already have a hard time regulating illegal TVUs.

"Currently, our communities are being overrun by illegal vacation rentals, which are turning our local communities essentially into resort areas. I am very much against these illegal vacation units transforming our communities beyond recognition and pushing out our local residents.

"These illegal vacation rentals are also removing housing options from our residents. In 2016, the Hawaii Tourism Authority found that 70% of properties listed as vacation rentals in Hawaii are owned by out-of-state property owners. By legitimizing these illegal vacation rentals, this bill is incentivizing homeowners to create more vacation rentals, as opposed to creating housing options for our local residents.

"If we do not address the continued proliferation of illegal vacation rentals, we will continue to see a drastic rise in rental housing costs. This is simply not an option for our residents, who are already struggling with our residential rental market.

"I believe that we need better enforcement of these illegal vacation rentals. The Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP) already does not enforce or address this issue affecting so many of our communities. However, just blindly throwing funds towards enforcement efforts may continue to fail to bring us results and does not directly address the issue of illegal vacation rentals.

"Furthermore, I am opposed to the way this bill expedites the permitting process for illegal rentals. By requiring the counties to establish processes to expediently issue special use permits, and to establish an expedited process for addressing appeals of denied special use permits, this bill is essentially creating a process to quickly legalize these illegal vacation rentals. This bill is legalizing and legitimizing these rentals that we don't want taking over our communities in the first place.

"I think we need to re-evaluate our approach to reducing the negative impacts of these illegal vacation rentals, but expediting the process to legalize and legitimize these rentals is not the solution. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Har rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2605, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRANSIENT ACCOMMODATIONS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 43 ayes to 8 noes, with Representative Har voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Ing, Matsumoto, Quinlan, Say, Souki, Thielen, Tupola and Ward voting no.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1133-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2471, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2471, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Lee rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, in support, Mr. Speaker. I just, because this is the first time this issue has come to this body, at least to my knowledge, I did want to say just a few words. The issue this bill tries to address is something which is being discussed worldwide right now in gambling commissions, in countries in Europe, in Asia, and so forth, and including right here in the United States. The issue deals with the expansion of predatory and exploitive mechanisms in video games, which specifically target kids, which are unregulated, and which are having extreme and adverse consequences, so much so that the UK Gambling Commission recently found that 11% of all 11 to 16-year-olds in that country have been actively betting and cashing out these kinds of online products through these kinds of mechanisms in video games.

"The Gambling Commission in the State of Washington recently ordered the shutdown of sites which helped promote this sort of thing and enable people, including youth, to be able to gamble and cash out these sorts of online items.

"The concern is not whether, ultimately, we as elected officials or bodies, whether regulatory, statutory, or any of the sort around the country define these kinds of in-game gambling-like mechanisms as legitimate gambling. The industry tends to say that because some of these mechanisms tend to give out something, even if it's nearly worthless, because of that, the money that people are spending and committing and gambling on, means that this isn't technically gambling. But by that definition, Mr. Speaker, if we were to walk in and place \$1,000 on a roulette wheel in Vegas, and we were to get even a penny back from the casino, we would then exempt the entire organization from the definition of gambling, which is just silly.

"No, Mr. Speaker, the concern here is about ultimately the outcomes that we're seeing, concerns with cognitive development, with growing addiction, particularly among youth, and ultimately the financial harm which has befallen thousands or tens of thousands of families around the country, and right here in Hawaii, many of whom we've recently heard from.

"A recent study here in the United States found that about 90% of all kids between 8 and 18 play video games, and I think by and large that's reflected in society and in our families, and it's everywhere, on your phone, on your PCs, on Xboxes and PlayStations. But what's concerning is that another study done just recently found that, of all those kids, of that 90% that play games, 9% of those kids age 8 to 18, of everybody, were found to exhibit multiple signs of behavioral addiction, which the addition and proliferation of these kinds of gambling mechanisms throughout the video game industry is certainly compounding.

"The American Psychological Association, the World Health Organization, local psychologists, child psychologists, pediatric mental health experts and others have all raised red flags about the growing impact that we're starting to see with this issue, and numerous colleagues in states around the country are currently starting the same debate in their own chambers. But what's really important to note is that this falls to us because the industry has failed to self-regulate and failed to take action to avert the kinds of consequences and impacts that we're seeing today.

"Parents today have no ability to meaningfully protect their kids, because there is no disclosure in any of these games that these kinds of mechanisms are included. There is no distinguishing being able to buy something in a game from the kinds of addictive, exploitive and predatory mechanisms, which any game could present. There's no way to know, and that has to change.

"So, Mr. Speaker, this bill establishes a group to start monitoring the situation, and in the future, make recommendations. It is absolutely the least that we can do to start to address the situation, which some mental health experts have already compared in scale and scope to the opioid crisis, except that while it does affect many adults, in this case a huge majority of them are our kids. Thank you very much."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. On this and the next measure, I'm just going to take it as one, if I may, just cause it's a thematic thing. I have reservations on these measures. I appreciate what the author is trying to do with this bill. You know what, you're right, the video game industry has not self-regulated, despite promises to do so. There has become a wild wild west with developers, but like so many of my concerns on other measures today, it's not with the public policy aim, it's with how it's trying to get there. I mean, I'm sorry, but I just can't see how video games and opioids are in the same category, Mr. Speaker. If we're going to do that, if they're that dangerous, we should ban all video games in the State of Hawaii. I guess all of us who have them on our phone, and there's many people here, both in the Chamber and elsewhere, who do.

"We need to protect our kids, but at the end of the day, these devices allow parents to do exactly that, to protect their kids. And I think that to say that video games in and of themselves are automatically gambling opens up a huge Pandora's box. And again, it's criminalizing behavior, it's a criminal offense. It could not have the intended consequences, and I think also what it does is, it opens up the door for other activities, baseball cards, for instance. Baseball cards would be considered gambling. You'd get a pack of cards, you don't know what cards are in there, but you know you're going to get something. It may not be a Barry Bonds, but you know you're going to get players.

"So we do need to hold the video game industry accountable, and I agree with the author of that, I see where he's going with this measure. And the public policy aim of trying to make sure they disclose openly to parents and consumers that they're not being used in ways to entice people to go down the road of gambling, I support him on that. I just worry that it's overreaching on behalf of the State, and I also worry that it's taking a huge leap into an area of gambling that may not necessarily exist. There may be other ways to get to this aim of trying to protect our kids and inform consumers without criminalizing inadvertent behavior. So those are my only concerns, and comments to the Journal, if I may. Thank you, appreciate it."

Representative McKelvey's written remarks are as follows:

"I have reservations on these measures and would like to reference my comments previously submitted on the 20th Legislative Day, February 16, 2018 on Stand. Com. Rep. No. 755-18, H.B. No. 2727, HD 1, and Stand. Com. Rep. No. 754-18, H.B. No. 2471, HD 1."

Representative Holt rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. If I may have the words of the previous speaker entered into the Journal as if they were my own. And just to note some of the testimony from the Office of Consumer Protection, some of the things that they regulate are mortgage rescue fraud, data breaches, gift certificates, refunds and exchanges, complex litigation involving alleged unfair or deceptive marketing practices by pharmaceutical companies, and motor vehicle manufacturers, and now we want to add video games. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations on both measures, this and the other one as previously stated by the speaker from Maui, brief comment. If I could have the words of the Representative from Maui inserted as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Tupola continued, stating:

"And I think as a parent of children and of nieces and nephews, I would say that there is a mechanism for parents. Check your kids, look at what they're doing, watch them as they play the games, put on the parental controls, open their phone, make sure that you have that on.

"So again, the overreach of the State is that we feel like, of course, of course we're against gambling, we don't want addictive behaviors, we don't want this starting young, but also, there is a part to play on the parents' role of making sure that you're a part of it, it didn't accidently happen to you. You let it happen because you didn't check, you're a parent, you're supposed to do that. And so I feel like it's a good intent to start to push that way, but again, with a board and commission, which it's going to establish a commission, and two of the members are going to have regular and broad experience playing mobile digital games, that could be anybody. That could be my nephew, that could be my niece, and he's pretty good, he's five years old and he can kill it, I mean he's good.

"But again, when we talk about the root of the issue and regulating something that's not in our state, so we're trying to regulate an industry that's not here, they don't produce their video games here, then we really are reaching into a round that I think needs further discussion, definitely advocacy. Let's make sure to get out there that all parents know that we should be aware of gambling mechanisms in video games and on our phones, but that we should encourage parents to play that role in their kids life, to be more aware and more involved. Thank you."

Representative Tokioka rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations, Mr. Speaker. In the committee, I voted no, and I've learned more about it since that time. But I would like to adopt the words from the Representative from District 29 as if they were my own, because they include the words from the Representative from Lahaina, and as well as the Representative from Nanakuli, because it is up to parents to make sure that their kids don't have their credit card on the machines and don't have the access to buying the things that the parents don't want them to buy. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Onishi rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Har rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representatives McKelvey and Holt be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative DeCoite rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representatives McKelvey and Holt be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Quinlan rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support, Mr. Speaker, both measures. I'm not sure necessarily that it would be a good thing for either of these two measures to actually pass and become law, although I am in support of both of them. However, I think it does send a very strong signal to the industry that it is time to self-regulate, and for that reason, I am in support. Thank you."

Representative Ohno rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Say rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ito rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2471, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONSUMER PROTECTION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives DeCoite, Har, Ito, McKelvey, Ohno, Onishi, Say, Tokioka and Tupola voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Gates and Holt voting no.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1134-18) recommending that H.B. No. 2727, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2727, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative McKelvey rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered." [Note: See Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1133-18, H.B. No. 2471, HD 1, for further remarks.]

Representative Tupola rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered." [Note: See Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1133-18, H.B. No. 2471, HD 1, for further remarks.]

Representative Quinlan rose in support of the measure. [Note: See Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1133-18, H.B. No. 2471, HD 1, for further remarks.]

Representative Ohno rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Say rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ito rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Onishi rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2727, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONSUMER PROTECTION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes, with Representatives DeCoite, Har, Ito, McKelvey, Ohno, Onishi, Say, Tokioka and Tupola voting aye with reservations.

#### H.B. No. 2588, HD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that H.B. No. 2588, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I wanted to thank the introducer and, of course, share my gratitude for putting forth a measure that's actually been talked about a lot in our community. So this is highlighting something that happened to one of my own constituents, and so I wanted to be real clear that I feel that it's so appropriate for it to be named after this family, because they've extended their reach to many other families that have had the same incident happen. Even within the last year, it's happened over and over again.

"And so we just wanted to show my gratitude because the Werner family has been in pain not being able to see somebody who afflicted so much pain to their family not have any jail time. And so, of course that's their intent, is that there be a mandatory prison sentence for people who fail to render aid in the event of negligent homicide. And of course, recently, they've also extended their hand to the Kahooilihala family, who had the same incident happen, and then recently to Jonah Ragsdale and Daniel Mole, who his funeral is in two weeks on Saturday, as well.

"And so even though it's brought our community a lot of hurt, it's also brought us all together to be more aware, to be more mindful. And then for families who this has happened to, to extend an arm of support, because some of these families have no idea what to do, they have no idea what to feel, they're having problems with the Prosecutor's Office, they still have no type of closure of what happened.

"So I'm grateful to see this addressed, and of course I'm very grateful for the introducer, and grateful that my community members were able to come forward and work together with organizations who curb driving under the influence to address this issue. Thank you."

Representative Gates rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support, permission to enter written comments into the Journal and make brief comments now. I would like to also thank the introducer and the committees for passing this bill out. As many of you may know, we had an incident in my district recently where two lives were taken. And this bill will send a loud message to the community that drinking and driving is not acceptable, and that taking the life of another will be met with severe punishment. So, with that, I would like to insert written comments to continue. *Mahalo*."

Representative Gates's written remarks are as follows:

"On April 24th, 2016, Kaulana Werner's life was tragically ended in front of his family home when he was struck by a drunk driver in Nānākuli. The driver fled the scene, showing no remorse and a callous heart. Kaulana was 19 years old and was said to bring joy to all that encountered him. The driver is still free and any punishment she is likely to face will hardly provide solace to the survivors.

"This past President's Day weekend, the Wai'anae community lost two young residents that were loved by many to a hit and run incident in Mākaha. My heartfelt condolences go out to the Ragsdale and Mole *'ohana* for their tragic loss of Jonah and Daniel.

"The Werner, Ragsdale and Mole families deserve better. Our community deserves better. We demand safe streets for our residents and punishments that not only fit the crime, but serve to deter future criminals.

"On this almost second anniversary of the death of Kaulana Werner, let us honor these victims and their families by passing House Bill 2588, offered by the Werner family. This measure will increase the maximum prison sentence for any felony that results in the death or serious injury of another while acting with reckless disregard for others' safety. This bill will help bring justice to community members who have lost loved ones through hit and run incidents and serve as a warning to others by showing that harsh consequences do exist when the life of another is taken so needlessly. *Mahalo*."

Representative Lowen rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, H.B. No. 2588, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EXTENDED TERMS OF IMPRISONMENT," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes, with Representative Lowen voting aye with reservations.

## H.B. No. 2074, HD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that H.B. No. 2074, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Takayama rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Takayama's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support, with reservations, of H.B. 2074, HD 1, which proposes to increase sentences for offenders convicted of committing property crimes against nonprofit organizations.

"I believe in punishing those who commit crimes, but our system of criminal justice must be fair. In this case, I have reservations about the fairness of arbitrarily elevating penalties for property crimes against nonprofits. Nowhere in the bill nor in the testimony has there been any reason given for the need to implement this new sentencing category.

"There already exist criminal sanctions for theft, embezzlement, and other offenses against nonprofits, just like those against any other business.

"Mr. Speaker, this measure unfortunately opens the door to seeking enhanced sentencing for every other category of entity that is the victim of crime. We should not allow emotional anger over a single incident to determine our sentencing laws, because that does not lead to a fair criminal justice system.

"For these reasons, I have reservations over the wisdom of passing H.B. 2074, HD 1."

Representative San Buenaventura rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Souki rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker and members, I wish to vote no on this measure. I did not submit a slip, but I will. Anyway, I've always been opposed to extended sentences, I believe in rehabilitation, and a lot of times there are circumstances that we don't see when there is such a situation as ugly as it is, but there may be certain situations, and we certainly don't want to see anyone, especially our family, get caught in a situation where they be in for an extended time. I think everybody eventually will come out, and we will prefer they come out of prison well and sooner than later. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tupola rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Lowen rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ing rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations and just a brief note. My concern is creating different kinds of criminal liability based upon one's tax status. Thank you very much."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, H.B. No. 2074, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO OFFENSES AGAINST PROPERTY RIGHTS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representatives Ing, LoPresti, Lowen, McKelvey, San Buenaventura, Takayama and Tupola voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Souki voting no.

#### H.B. No. 2739, HD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that H.B. No. 2739, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

At this time, Representative Tupola offered Floor Amendment No. 2, amending H.B. No. 2739, HD 1, as follows:

SECTION 1. Providers. House Bill No. 2739, H.D. 1, is amended with regard to health care providers by amending section 3 of the bill as follows:

- 1. To ensure that a rigorous psychological screening for mental health issues occurs, and to better align with proven policy in other states like Oregon, amending the definitions of "capable" and "counseling" to strike references to clinical social workers;
- 2. To ensure that all health care providers involved in this process meet the high professional standards required for medical treatment by the State of Hawaii, amending the definition of "health care provider" to clarify that the person must be licensed or certified by the law of this State:
- 3. To ensure that health care providers are given a clear standard for what is required to fully inform a patient of the relevant facts, amending the definition of "informed decision" to clarify that the phrase "informed consent" is synonymous;
- 4. To ensure that patients receive the best possible medical advice regarding their full range of end-of-life options, including palliative care, on pages 11 and 14, adding a requirement that the attending provider refer the patient to a physician specializing in palliative care for a consultation regarding alternative options;
- 5. To ensure that health care providers retain the right to conscientiously object to this process and to decline to participate in any part of it, on pages 23 and 24, following the recommendations of the Department of the Attorney General by clarifying that health care providers are not required to inform a patient about the option to obtain life-ending medication or refer a qualified patient to another provider if they are unable or unwilling to participate; and
- 6. To ensure that life-saving professionals are not inadvertently punished for doing their jobs, on page 24, providing that emergency medical services and nursing care providers shall not be subject to civil or criminal liability for unknowingly rendering medical assistance to a qualified patient who has self-administered the prescribed medication to end the patient's life.

SECTION 2. Patients. House Bill No. 2739, H.D. 1, is amended with regard to patients by amending section 3 of the bill as follows:

- 1. To ensure that teenagers cannot access life-ending medication at an earlier age than society entrusts them with the decision to use alcohol or tobacco, amending the definition of "adult" to raise the age requirement from eighteen to twenty-one years of age or older;
- 2. To ensure this does not legalize "euthanasia", amending the definition of "prescription" to clarify that the qualified patient must either self-administer, if the patient chooses to do so, or otherwise dispose of the medication properly;
- 3. To ensure that manageable diseases or conditions do not qualify, amending the definition of "terminal disease" to clarify that the disease must be one that will, within reasonable medical judgment, produce death within six months even with reasonable and ordinary medical treatment; and
- 4. To ensure that qualified patients are truly residents of the State of Hawaii, on page 17, deleting "evidence that the patient owns or leases property in Hawaii" as a factor that may demonstrate state residency.

SECTION 3. Enforcement. House Bill No. 2739, H.D. 1, is amended with regard to enforcement of the law by amending sections 3 and 12 of the bill as follows:

- 1.To ensure accurate medical records, on page 13, restoring the requirement that both the terminal disease and self-administration of the medication shall be listed on the death certificate as the immediate causes of death;
- 2. To ensure that malpractice is discovered and punished if it occurs, on pages 18 and 19, deleting language that would limit the disclosure of information in criminal and civil malpractice proceedings;
- 3. To protect minors and the general public from accidental ingestion of lethal drugs, on page 20, following the suggestion of the Department of the Attorney General by requiring the Department of Health to make rules to govern lawful means of disposal of unused medication, and inserting an unspecified felony criminal penalty for failure to lawfully dispose of unused medication;
- 4. Because the term "good faith" is not an objective standard that would allow for clear-cut and consistent prosecution of wrongdoers, on pages 22 through 24, following the recommendations of the Department of the Attorney General by deleting each instance of the term "good faith"; and
- 5. To ensure that the law will be revisited by a future legislature for the implementation of any improvements shown by experience to be necessary or desirable, on page 39, adding a sunset provision that will repeal the Act after three years, on December 31, 2021.

SECTION 4. House Bill No. 2739, H.D. 1 is amended by, in section 3 of the bill, making conforming technical amendments and renumbering sections of the bill accordingly.

Representative Tupola moved that Floor Amendment No. 2 be adopted, seconded by Representative McDermott.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Everyone has the copy of the amendments, and I'm just going to highlight additional portions that were added. As we left the floor last week, we, of course, continued conversations with people on both sides of the issue to make sure that we incorporated and heard out all the parts of the testimony. So I organized it a little bit better, it has a section for providers, section for patients, and a section for enforcement, so that it's easier to explain through it. So I'll just highlight the parts that were newly added.

"So under providers, now again, we're talking about safeguards for providers that were brought up in testimony, as well as from doctors, as well as from people that were actually proponents of the bill from Oregon that were guiding us along. So number one, it says, to ensure a rigorous psychological screening for mental health issue occurs, and to better align with the proven policy in other states like Oregon, amending the definitions of 'capable' and 'counseling' to strike references to clinical social workers.

"So right now, it actually says, psychiatrists, psychologists, and clinical social workers. And it's nothing against clinical social workers, because we actually have a great clinical social worker member in our body that does amazing things for many communities, but this is just to make sure that the counseling reference is only for doctors and psychologists as written in the same Oregon law, that they didn't allow clinical social workers.

"We also added number four, and in number four it's basically, the chair did a great thing by saying to mandatorily have the capability or a psych eval before somebody is allowed to proceed. But also, we're suggesting a number four, to mandatorily allow or put there, for the patients, a consultation with a palliative care specialist, so that nobody feels like this is their only option, but yet one of other options they can consider.

"The last one under providers that's new is under number six. And this one was brought up to me and actually got lots of calls from EMT, nurses, saying that they didn't want to be held liable if they didn't know that somebody was actually in process of applying the act. So in number six it says, to ensure that life-saving professionals are not inadvertently punished for doing their jobs, on page 24, providing that emergency medical services and nursing care providers shall not be subject to civil or criminal liability for unknowingly rendering medical assistance to qualified patients who has self-administered the prescribed medication to end the patient's life.

"This is a really sensitive subject for a lot of the nurses who came forward, as well as EMT, because there's no 'no resuscitate' band that you'll have on your wrist. They wouldn't know, upon arriving on scene, whether or not they would be interfering with the act. So it was suggested in the hearing, and now it's written in this amendment, offered so that people can consider it.

"Secondly, under patients, the four parts of patients are all similar to what I had expressed on second reading, I just want to emphasize number four. To ensure that qualified patients are truly residents of the State of Hawaii, on page 17, deleting 'evidence that the patient owns or leases property in Hawaii' should not be part of a residency requirement. We just went through a long discussion about Airbnbs and how 80% of them are owned by people who are not from this state, so we want to make sure that this only applies to residents. So striking out those references would make sure that we're not opening the door for people to come vacation out here or come out here and own property and then apply the act, because they wouldn't be residents.

"Lastly, on enforcement, I just wanted to highlight number three. So, of course, I've read through one, two, three, four, five last week, as far as the suggestions from the Attorney General, and these are ones that we should take very seriously, because these are the ones that are going to make it possible to enforce malpractice, to enforce whether or not people are bringing back the medication.

"In the opioid crisis, when people talk about abuse and that doctors are overprescribing, they always allude to the fact that there is no budget and there is no means or funding for compliance. So we can't force people to comply if there's not a law, or if there's not a mechanism to enforce or aid, fund, compliance officers. So in number three it says, to protect minors and the general public from accidental ingestion of lethal drugs, the following suggestion is that the Department of Health, with the Attorney General, make rules to govern the lawful means of disposal of unused medication, and inserting an unspecified felony criminal penalty. And again, this is a suggestion by the Attorney General that there be a penalty so that there is a way for us to enforce that.

"And so in this section, I just wanted to highlight that this part is so important for us to consider, when we know that there's going to be medication there, maybe a lot of it, we're not even sure how many pills it would take, actually, for somebody to be able to actually apply this act."

Representative McDermott rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tupola continued, stating:

"And so in this portion of the act, we've had incidents in my own district happen, I actually saw, a one-and-a-half-year-old child ingest pills from her grandma's purse, accidently eat it, and I watched at the hospital as they could do nothing for her. She didn't die, but she basically went on the high, crashed from the high, because they couldn't do anything for this young child that accidentally ingested it, and then the grandmother got thrown in jail for having that kind of illegal drug in her purse.

"And now, we're making sure that through this, and I'm suggesting that we consider this, is that because there's no penalty, we wouldn't know if there's extra medication hanging out in someone's bag, or in the medicine cabinet, or somewhere else, that it's not going to be tampered or touched by other people, who may or may not have any intention to apply this act. And bear in mind that in the hearing, many of the proponents of the bill said a lot of the people who start this act don't end up using the pills. They change their mind, they say, hey I don't want to do it, and that's their discretion, they can do that.

"But how are we going to make sure to recoup all that medication when we don't have pharmacies that recollect medicine? We don't have a method whereby we can actually make sure that X amount of pills went back, and now we have them back in our possession and nobody else can actually ingest them, no minor can be subject to them, and it won't be in a place where people can access it.

"And so those are concerns. Obviously, there's many amendments in here, because our deepest concern, and with respect to our chairs who have worked very diligently on it, our deepest concern is to make sure that we guard against malpractice, that we make sure that no elder, no *kupuna* in our community feels like they're forced into it. And that's the point of this, right? Is that no one should feel forced into it. And secondly, that nobody else gets ahold of medication that's not intended for them. As we know with the opioid crisis, that's what's happening. And we don't want to open the door for younger, or even older people, who might decide that, yup, I want to apply this too, that there's access to that type of medication out there. So those are my comments, and we offer these amendments with respect."

At this time, the Chair stated:

"The Chair would like to ask the members of the public to please refrain from applauding during the floor debate. We make the same request to the Members of the House. Thank you very much."

Representative LoPresti rose, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Point of personal privilege. Will the introducer yield to a question, to wit, will the introducer even vote for this version of the bill?"

At 11:45 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:46 o'clock a.m.

Representative Belatti rose to speak in opposition to the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, really brief comments in opposition. These proposed floor amendments do not strike the proper balance before patient choice and access versus the safeguards that have been contemplated by the underlying bill. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Matsumoto rose to speak in support of the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. At this time, I rise in support of the amendment. Something I wanted to highlight was that this amendment includes a provision that requires an attending provider to refer a patient to a palliative care specialist. This can help patients improve their quality of life and reach their best possible functioning in their daily physical activities and self-care.

It can also assist in the difficult decision-making, not just for the patient, but it can also provide emotional support for families.

"By speaking with experts in palliative care instead of just having a psychological evaluation, a patient can make a fully informed decision. And I feel that it's crucial that all individuals suffering from terminal illness understand all options that are available to them, in all stages of the process. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support. Specifically, one issue that was not in the previous discussion of the amendment last week, and that is a measurement mechanism. Mr. Speaker, in my past I've taught goal setting often, and the key is, if the goal can't be measured, it's not a goal. And generally, you can't tell the efficacy of a bill unless it has a sunset date.

"Following the example of California, there's a three year sunset date that I think is one of the things in this bill that will help it, because how many times do we pass bills on this floor that have unintended consequences, and this is a way that we can measure it, we can evaluate it, and we can make it better. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I'm in support of this amendment."

The motion that Floor Amendment No. 2, amending H.B. No. 2739, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," be adopted, was put to vote by the Chair and upon a voice vote, failed to carry.

(Main Motion)

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I know it's too late for a late introduction, but I wanted to acknowledge the participation in the democratic process of the blue and the yellow shirts that are here. I want to thank each one of them individually, for here we can't have them stand up, but at least we can acknowledge that they are here because of their concern for this bill. In all due respect, regardless of which side. In opposition.

"Having acknowledged that this is something where we agree to disagree, I think there's something that needs to be said. One is that, as life is a sacred thing, so is the act of dying, and I think it has to be both given the same respect. What's missing in both the existing bill as well as the amendment is that fact that this can be a public phenomenon. It doesn't specify in the bill that this will be in a hospital or will be in a home. It discourages people from doing it in public, but I think there's enough difficulty out there with what people are doing in public now to say that it probably should meet with some specificity. So as it moves on, I would hope that that would be the case. Lastly, Mr. Speaker, I would request additional comments into the Journal."

Representative Ward's written remarks are as follows:

"I am in opposition to HB 2739, 'Our Care, Our Choice' Act, which establishes a regulated process under which an adult resident of the state with a medically confirmed terminal disease and less than six months to live may choose to obtain a prescription for medication to end the patient's life.

"I am against this measure because of inadequate safeguards present within the legislation. I have attached an editorial published in the Star Advertiser as a reference. Many of my concerns, such as the sunset clause, are addressed within this article. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward also submitted the following *Honolulu Star-Advertiser* editorial:

Closely monitor 'aid in dying'

House Health and Human Services and Judiciary Committees holds a public hearing on the so-called Death with Dignity bill that would allow terminally ill adults to end their lives with a lethal dose of prescription medication. This must not be the end of the discussion — even one that has gone on for as long as this one.

It now appears likely House Bill 2739, which would legalize medical aid in dying, will become law. Last week the House passed it, 39-12, and that has been the chamber where the proposal has met its stiffest opposition in recent years. Further, Gov. David Ige has indicated he would sign the bill.

It surely would bring great relief to many to allow a terminally ill patient a prescribed drug for ending his or her life without suffering. However, even if lawmakers and the governor enact this measure, their duty to monitor its consequences must continue.

The legislative process has not ended, of course. Opponents have offered amendments in an effort to improve the bill. One, to add a "sunset clause" enabling lawmakers to take another look in three years, should be considered.

This has been one of the most hotly debated issues ever confronted by lawmakers, in Hawaii or anywhere else. Nearly two-thirds of states have contemplated it, but only five have legalized it: Oregon was the first, in 1994, with Washington, Montana, Vermont and California following suit.

Every aspect of this provision is filled with controversy, including its name. It used to be commonly known as "physician-assisted suicide"; now "medical aid in dying" is preferred.

The rationale is that bills such as HB 2739 limit this optional path to those found by a medical practitioner to be within six months of death from a terminal illness. This is not suicide, they argue, because death is shortly to be inevitable, and the drug merely eases that end.

Others will counter that a finding of "suicide" will nullify insurance claims by the survivors, among other unintended consequences. They add that this is why the term is avoided at all costs.

They also posit that there is no way to know for certain when death will come. Even one of the bill's most ardent supporters — retired lobbyist John Radcliffe, still under treatment for cancer considered terminal — has exceeded what doctors projected as his life expectancy by something approaching two years.

But supporters are also correct to assert that for many, many terminal patients, death will come as forecast, and it can be unendurable. Wishing and hoping for a miracle, they say, does not negate the very real suffering that can afflict terminal patients in their last days.

The House measure currently under review includes hoped-for safeguards against abuse. Among these: a waiting period of 20 days from the time the patient files a written request for the prescription; and steps to prevent coercion by someone in the patient's circle of family and friends.

There are two witnesses required to attest to the patient's sound mind in making the decision to seek the life-ending prescription. One of them must not be a relative, and one must not be someone entitled to a portion of the patient's estate at their death.

Whether or not this is enough protection should be the focus of further discussion as the bill moves through the Senate.

There are plainly defensible arguments that weigh in favor of HB 2739, not the least of which is simple compassion for the dying and their loved ones. Compassion & Choices, a nonprofit advocacy group, has testified that there have been no abuses documented in the states enabling medical aid in dying.

Organization officials have cited Oregon, which has tracked the program the longest, as having maintained palliative care — provision of pain relief and comfort to a dying patient, without a life-ending drug — as a choice; hospice referrals are up.

Still, Hawaii is not Oregon, and it behooves this state to make sure that no horror-story scenarios play out here. HB 2739, if it becomes law, should be followed by state health officials with an eye on possible coercion of the terminal patient.

Among the criteria they should check is the approach taken by health insurers, which could set coverage rates to encourage medical aid-in-dying over other clinical or end-of-life treatment options.

And if lawmakers are as inclined to enact the measure as it now seems, there should be discussion about whether alternative options are sufficiently supported by this legislation. Critics have pointed to the requirement for one or more counseling sessions to be provided "as necessary." This may not be strong enough, as mandates go.

The end of life can be an exquisitely difficult time for a dying patient and his or her loved ones. It also can be exquisitely precious, if pain can be managed properly. These final days have value, and each individual deserves his or her life to be lived in full measure.

Ultimately, it is compassion that is driving measures such as HB 2739 through the life-or-death gauntlet. But ensuring that someone is not deprived of their chance at life — that's compassion, as well.

Representative Kong rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. So, I may not be deemed terminal. Many people view this bill as being towards being old and decrepit. But I'm not sure if you remember, back in November of 2014 when we first met, I was just released from the hospital and out of major surgery. And I barely made it, and if you recall, the first time we met, in fact, the first time I met the majority of you, I had a tube coming out of my stomach connected to a bag, which was tied to my leg. And oddly enough, I'm still suffering from that operation today.

"It's been a long go, and I'm not sure if any of you recall, but in March of 2016, I was rushed from this building by ambulance to Queen's Hospital. And thank you, everyone here, you've all sent me a very beautiful get well card. And from then on, it's been a very tough go for me. I suffer every day. I suffer so much that, of all people, I have to log my pain in a health journal. In fact, everyone here, free to look. In February, of my pain level that is recorded, I actually used one of these tools, Mr. Speaker, and the minimum number recorded in February is a four. And if anyone wants to look at this little chart here, a four, the smiley face, there's no smile on this, and that's the minimum. And the worst days goes up to an eight. It's a very difficult life I live. It's a different world I live.

"So what happens is, I see the doctor a lot. In fact, tomorrow I have to take a blood test. On Saturday, I have to go for an MRI. And in doing so, in the life I live, I get to meet a lot of other patients who live a similar life. And it's not that we're not deemed terminal, it's just that it's a very different world we live in, Mr. Speaker. And what we do is, we try to encourage one another to make it through the day. People don't understand that this encouragement, the message this House is, we should send to the people of Hawaii, is to try to just to survive. Suicide is not something we take lightly. It's a struggle each and every moment.

"You're not going to believe this but, in this bill, the process to commit this act of compassion is almost a little bit crazier, because each morning, when I pack this little pillbox, the pills in this little pillbox could kill me if I was to take it all at one time. I have to be very careful each morning, because if for some reason I was to be in so much pain, and for some reason if I forget if I took a pill or not and I double up, I'm out like a light."

Representative Takayama rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kong continued, stating:

"And if it's a worse day and I overdose, I'm gone. This is the life we live. We don't need, when it comes down to suicide, why would I go through the process of this bill. You folks have to understand, we don't want to send a message of suicide. We want to send from the House, we want to send a message of hope. I wish I could push this idea of *aloha* to the members I don't want to hear from you saying, oh, give it up Sam. I want to hear a message saying, please, make it one more day. It's so difficult for us, and there's many more like me. I speak to them as we wait in the doctors' office. It's a daily struggle for us.

"So, please, when you think about voting for this bill, please think about us that are suffering. We may not be terminal, and who knows, I'm not sure if you read the story about the story about Colin Nishida from Side Street Inn. I suffered, his story is my story. He died at a young age. I don't know how much longer I have, but this is the life we live. So, please, my friends, you have to understand, this is not just about the old and decrepit. This is about our lives. Thank you very much."

Representative Mizuno rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. First, I wanted to thank you, Mr. Speaker, for allowing your Committee on Health & Human Services as well as your Committee on Judiciary the latitude to hear a bill of this nature, of this magnitude, in an election year. You told your chairs to be bold, and that's what we did. Your decision to allow your chairs of the Health & Human Services Committee as well as Judiciary Committee allowed us to do government right. We listen to the voices of the people. I believe this displays the strength of the open democratic process for the people of Hawaii.

"I'd like to thank the Judiciary Chair, who is steadfast and focused on the strongest safeguards in this bill. The Judiciary Chair was our foundation as we went through the various discussions on this measure. I'd like to thank the Majority Leader, who was outstanding. She did a superb job at working with the advocates as well as the opponents, with working with both chairs, with working with all the members. She did a great job in crafting the strongest language that any state has on this subject. I have the highest admiration for our Majority Leader.

"Mr. Speaker, I also wanted to thank our Sergeant-at-Arms. We knew this would be a contentious issue at the hearing. He was so kind as to give me a script on the rules of decorum, which I promptly read. We had a five-hour hearing, and it was without incident. A lot of that was due to him, his outstanding staff, the sheriffs, our staff, all of our members. I also wanted to thank LRB, HMSO, Ian Ross, House Minority Staff Office, the Clerk's Office, and the Chairs and the Vice Chairs of both the Health & Human Services Committee and Judiciary Committee, for their fine work. We displayed public service in its finest form.

"Mr. Speaker, Our Care, Our Choice addresses an issue that we've been grappling before the Legislature for the past two decades. We as a people, we as elected representatives, must decide if we will recognize a person's freedom of choice. It's a very difficult decision when we're dealing with a person who has a terminal illness, who is in excruciating pain. We have to make that determination. Oregon recognized this and provided a state law that's called Death with Dignity back in 1994. Since then, four states and the District of Columbia has followed the Oregon example. One state, Montana, has done this by state supreme court ruling.

"I sincerely respect the values and choices and religions of all people. Mr. Speaker, I've felt that this issue, a magnitude of this issue needed at least a public hearing. We did not force any members to vote up or down, that's not us, and you know that. I just thought at the very least, we needed a public hearing on this issue, and the fact that it's an election year, even more so, to show transparency and accountability and public trust. This is what we did. I thank you for allowing us to do that.

"Mr. Speaker, nationally this has been an ongoing debate. In fact, it's risen up to the defining civil rights struggle of our time. Our Care, Our Choice follows a long history of landmark court rulings and legislative accomplishments recognizing our common humanity, our personal liberty, and our fundamental rights."

Representative DeCoite rose to yield her time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Mizuno continued, stating:

"Thank you, Representative, thank you very much. In 1954, you had Brown v. Board of Education, which confirmed the rights of education, equal education to all. The Voting Rights Act of 1965 ensured fair voting right to the ballot boxes for everyone, regardless of race. In 1973, Roe v. Wade confirmed a woman's right to reproductive organs as well as a procedure on her body. And in 2015, the United States Supreme Court recognized marriage as a fundamental right between same-sex couples.

"Hawaii has often found itself on the right side of history during these previous civil rights struggles, and this hasn't been by accident, Mr. Speaker. It is because matters of this nature and magnitude are voted upon and by past legislatures. Today, this Chamber will have that opportunity. We will have the ability to determine the fundamental rights and the civil rights of our people.

"Mr. Speaker, I want to make this clear. This is about fundamental civil rights. It's about the right to dignity. It's about the right to privacy. It's about the right to bodily autonomy. It's about the right to liberty. It's the right for patients to seek treatment of their choice from their physician without government infringement or interference. Mr. Speaker, additionally, as spiritual leaders and religious members have often shared with me, it is a religious right as well. Strongly protected by the first amendment, I, along with many others who hold a faith and as some who may not have a faith, believe that there is a spiritual and sacred side to life.

"Government should tread carefully in matters relating to personal relations between people and their creator, their god, their religion. Few issues are more personal or of more spiritual significance than one's choice on their life and their creator.

"I believe democracy represents the government of the people, by the people, for the people. This must include a person's fundamental right to pursue her or his civil rights.

"I'm going to end it on this, Mr. Speaker. The faith and dignity of a person's fundamental and civil rights, to have the freedom of choice, lies in the hands of this body today. House Bill 2739, House Draft 1, Our Care, Our Choice, will afford an adult of sound mind, who is a resident of our state with less than six months to live in prolonged, excruciating and unbearable pain, the ability to exercise their freedom of choice. The freedom from the bondage of excruciating pain and suffering. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I support this bill. Thank you, thank you members."

Representative Cachola rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to this bill. But before stating my reasons, I'd like to state that I respect all Members of this House, whether they are for or against this bill. My main reasons, there are two, why I have to speak in opposition of this bill is because I believe that it's against God's law. One of the ten commandments states, thou shall not kill. It's not about, you can kill with dignity or suicide, it just plainly states, thou shall not kill. As a Christian, I follow that.

"Number two reason, Mr. Speaker, I still believe in miracles. There's a lot of miracles happening, not only in Hawaii, but worldwide. If we have this bill, longtime, we will have a lot of people dying or dead. I know that our good friend, a lobbyist, has been maybe stage IV terminal cancer. If we had that bill way back, he's no longer with us now. That's one of the miracles of life. And of course, as we go through the process, I hope and pray that there will be a miracle happening before we do final reading that will convince us that this bill is not a good bill. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. *Aloha*."

Representative Creagan rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in strong support. As a legislator and as a physician that may one day be called upon to prescribe a life-ending medication, I welcome that potential opportunity because I think it's the right thing to do. We are now, finally, willing to provide for our human loved ones what we have long been able to provide for our animal loved ones. I think it is ironic we've been able to provide a humane death for animals, but not always for humans. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Keohokalole rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support. Mr. Speaker, as representatives, we each hold these positions of stature in our representative communities because of our titles. And as a result, we're often the beneficiary of certain benefits as a function of our community's respect for us and for the position, and we're also afforded certain responsibilities as a result of our duties. I've often said that I think difficult decisions should be debated before this body because that's our responsibility, to ask and debate and find solutions to difficult issues.

"Two years ago, I was afforded a significant responsibility among my own family. I was asked to do the eulogy for my first cousin, Jeanine Keohokalole. I'm a younger, as far as the adults go in my family, I'm on the

younger end, and I was genuinely nervous when I was asked, because I didn't want to do it. And I knew that, being a younger member of the family, I knew why I was being asked. I was being asked because I was a person of stature in the community and in the family, and I didn't want to be asked because I knew I would have to say yes, and I knew that I had to. It made me think about death in a different way. I had to encapsulate the life of a person in a speech.

"And as a result of that experience, I've come to realize that we don't talk about death in our society, in our local community. We just don't deal with this issue well. Even for those of us who believe that there is life after death. But you know what, Mr. Speaker? No one is immune to this issue, no matter how much we ignore it, and if we cannot talk about something within this body, it limits our ability to address it in a meaningful way.

"Many families today, many of us on this floor, are impacted by the slow and often painful fade of a loved one. As an adult, I've personally experienced the slow decline of my grandmother, my wife's grandmother, and my cousin, whose eulogy I did. She died of cancer, pancreatic cancer, which was discovered because she was suffering from lingering back pain over a period of about a year, which she initially tried to ignore, and eventually, because of the pain, sought the assistance of a doctor for.

"In the spring of 2015, the doctors discovered a tumor on her pancreas that had not only spread to her adjacent organs, but was also pressing on a nerve in her back, which was the source of that excruciating pain. She underwent successive rounds of chemotherapy that ultimately proved unsuccessful. In April of 2016, she passed away. She was 47 years old. She had two children. She was in pain from that entire year, from her diagnosis until she passed, she was in pain. That year was defined by pain. The tumor pressed upon the nerve in her back and left her in constant pain, and the side effects from the medication made it difficult for her to eat.

"I remember sitting in church with her and she had a hard time sitting, because of the pain, but she was too wiped out from the chemotherapy to stand, so she'd sit there and suffer. The sitting made it difficult for her to ride in vehicles, which made it hard for her to go over the mountain from Kaneohe into town to undergo chemotherapy, to try and save her life. Toward the end, she came home. And for the last several weeks of her life at home, eating was so painful that the only sustenance she could receive was water or juice soaked in a small sponge attached to the tip of a lollipop. So that she wouldn't die of dehydration, that's how she spent the last several weeks of her life. Suffering."

Representative Ohno rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Keohokalole continued, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, these are terrible details to have to hear. I myself was uncomfortable with this issue, again having to relive this situation, but I wasn't the one suffering, I was only a family member. I spoke with her family, I spoke with her daughter, just to make sure that they were comfortable with me bringing this up because, again, we don't talk about this issue in Hawaii, from a cultural standpoint, the local culture. But these things happen, they happen every day to people, and those are the people that we are considering in this legislation.

"We, as leaders, are duly designated by our committees, need to hear these stories and understand the consequences of our action or our inaction as a legislature. Mr. Speaker, I can appreciate the concerns with this bill. I agree that we should be vigilant in our efforts to ensure that this proposal is not misused, and I believe that the approach laid out in this bill appropriately accounts for those concerns.

"Ultimately, I support this legislation because of the issues brought up by the Chair of Human Services. I believe this is a constitutional issue, a civil rights issue. Mr. Speaker, we have, each of us, a constitutional right to refuse medical treatment. If any of us today, heaven forbid, were to get into an accident, and the ambulance were to come to try to provide service for us, we have a constitutional right to refuse their care. Even if we are bleeding out on the sidewalk, we can say, no, let me go, and they are duty-bound to abide. In light of that right, I just cannot see how, at the same time, we can continue to stand by a policy that acknowledges your civil right to refuse

medical service but requires people like my cousin to suffer at the end of their lives.

"Because I believe it is a civil right, I also believe that the government should, as it does with all other civil rights, recognize that the assertion of that right comes at the age of majority. You have no civil right to smoke cigarettes or drink alcohol. You do have the right to privacy from government interference in medical decisions, though. I believe that, again, this is a right of personal liberty. Individuals should have that freedom, and this bill gets the government out of the way by no longer forcing these people to suffer.

"Where in the constitution, Mr. Speaker, does it say that the people have empowered the government to force this type of suffering, that I previously described, on their citizenry? I don't think that the founders accounted for this, I really don't. Not when they drafted a bill in a time where we didn't have even the most basic of medical treatment options that we have today.

"So Mr. Speaker, my cousin and I, we never had this discussion before she passed away. I don't know what she would have decided, had she been given the chance. But that's the point. She never had the choice. People deserve a choice, and for those reasons I stand in support of this bill. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Strong support. Mr. Speaker, I actually did not plan on speaking on this, but I owe my constituents an explanation for my vote. As a scholar, I've spent a fair amount of time studying medical ethics. I've taught, many times, a course that's entitled 'On Death and Dying.' Currently, I'm teaching a directed studies class, and the title of the class is 'On the Philosophy of Death.' Mr. Speaker, I don't talk much about it, but I've spent a lifetime studying this issue. But I'm not going to pontificate to my colleagues, my friends, my constituents.

"The best explanation is a personal one. Because those in my life whom I've spoken with about this and who've come to me to speak about this support it. From whatever background, from whatever religion, from whatever political views. The conservatives in my family are some of the strongest supporters of a measure like this, to have this choice. And just to try to be brief about it, I believe we should have, each have, that free and unfettered choice.

"We are a death-denying culture, Mr. Speaker. We don't like to talk about it. We hide it away in hospitals and hospices, and it makes us uncomfortable to think about it. Of course it does, it's our mortality. But we do have that duty to consider that here today, and I know that you each are, as I am. And I believe we, in the end, need to err on the side of freedom in our democracy in unfettered choice, and therefore I am strongly in favor. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, may I add a historical footnote to this debate. Two questions. Where do civil rights come from? Where does life come from? The answer is simple, it's from Providence, not this body. Thank you."

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. Both my father and my brother had terminal illnesses. My father had supranuclear palsy, and my 59-year-old brother had ALS, or Lou Gehrig's disease. Both lived full and active lives. In the end, when they could no longer walk and take care of themselves, both wanted the choice to die with dignity.

"This bill is about giving people a choice. If you're terminally ill, this bill gives you an option. If you're morally against this bill, you have a choice not to proceed down this path.

"I would like to thank the Majority Leader from Makiki for her hard work in crafting this bill, and I would like to acknowledge the Health & Human Services and Judiciary Committees for amending this bill to include strong safeguards. Your work is very much appreciated." Representative Ing rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. We've heard a lot of great speeches about the mechanisms and protections in this bill, and it's clear that we created a sound and just legislation. So I just want to speak at the core of its intent to address some concerns about morality that have been raised.

"Indeed, our humanity tells us that our lives are all sacred and should be cherished, but we are all intelligent, critical thinking, and empathetic adults in this Chamber, and surely we can understand that the quality and dignity of life are essential to our humanity as well. I trust that we have the ability to understand, at certain times, the decision to end your life is not wrong, but merciful. Just for a second, envision your spouse, parent, son, daughter, like we heard. If that loved one fell upon enduring intolerable suffering, is it moral to force them to continue on that way, or should that person be given a compassionate choice, to seek medical help to end his or her pain and leave us with dignity?

"My partner's uncle was a gregarious man, everyone loved this guy, a self-made immigrant from the Philippines, a true American story, a doctor. But upon his twilight years, he fell into extreme ill health, contracted a cancer, where he was in constant pain and dizziness all day. His mental faculties were intact, but he felt his essence slipping away. All his loved ones felt it too. And at a certain point it became unbearable and he knew he wanted to go but had no dignified way to do so, so he attempted to take his life over a balcony. He shattered most of his bones but remained alive in a cast on a hospital bed, suffering even worse for months until the day he left us just last year. No one wants to, no one should be remembered that way.

"I'll conclude with something current. Two days ago, I watched the Oscars. One scene from one of those movies, one letter read out loud, really captures the humanity and spirit of this bill. I won't tell you the movie, because, spoiler alert, but here's the letter.

"My darling Anne. There's a longer letter in the dresser drawer I've been writing for the last week or so, that one covers us, and my memories of us, and how much I've always loved you. This one just covers tonight, and more importantly, today. Tonight I have gone out to the horses to end it. I cannot say sorry for the act itself, although I know for a short time you will be angry at me, or even hate me for it. Please don't. This is not a case of, I came in this world alone and I'm going out of it alone, or anything dumb like that. I did not come in this world alone, my mom was there. And I am not going out of it alone, because you were there, drunk on the couch, making Oscar Wilde jokes. No, this is a case, in some senses, of bravery. Not the bravery of facing a bullet down. The next few months of pain would be far harder than that small flash. No, it's the bravery of weighing up the next few months of still being with you, still waking up with you, of playing with the kids, against the next few months of seeing in your eyes how much my pain is killing you. How my weakened body, as it ebbs away, and you tend to it, are your final and lasting memories of me. I won't have that. Your final memories of me will be us at the riverside, and that dumb fishing game, which I think they cheated at. And me beside you, and you beside me. And barely a fleeting thought of the darkness yet to come. That was the best Anne. A whole day of not thinking about it. Dwell on this day, baby, because it was the best day of my life. Kiss the girls for me, and know that I've always loved you. And maybe I'll see you again if there's another place.

"That's the spirt of all this, of this bill, and unfortunately this individual, albeit in theater, didn't get a chance to go peacefully because he was not provided an act of compassion like we are considering today. But to me, this letter captures the dilemma people who are suffering face. But that decision should ultimately be in their hands. It's about humanity, and now more than ever, in these uncertain times, we need to act to restore and base our kūpuna and all loved ones the love and mercy they deserve, and empower them with the chance to carry on and carry out with dignity and pride. Thank you."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support, in strong support. House Bill 2739, House Draft 1 establishes a regulated process under which an adult resident of the state with a medically confirmed terminal disease and less than six

months to live may choose to obtain a prescription for medication to achieve a peaceful death from suffering.

"Mr. Speaker, the theme of my comments is conversation. This is a decades-long conversation we have been having in our state, as noted by the Chair of the Health & Human Services Committee. It is a conversation among policymakers in this body, and passionate, wise and committed people on all sides of this issue.

"In 1998, then Governor Cayetano's Blue Ribbon Panel was deeply divided on the issue of physician-assisted suicide. Of the 18 panel members, 11 were in support, 6 were in opposition, and 1 chose to abstain. Among the noes, expert leaders in the medical field, a psychiatrist, a gerontological nurse practitioner, the Hawaii Nurses Association, a cancer researcher, an elder law expert, and religious leaders. Since that time, in 2002, 2004, 2007, 2011, 2017, different committees within this body have argued and debated and examined the issue. So these conversations have not stopped, but what has changed is the opinions of the public, of medical practitioners, and another thing that has changed is that we have seen more evidence.

"So last year I had the opportunity to attend a conference following the one-year anniversary of the passage of California's aid in dying bill. There, the conversation was continuing. Leading palliative care specialists from around the country, ethicists, some of the greatest medical minds within the University of California system, were still struggling with the same questions that we are struggling with here today.

"But what we know from the experience of California, and what we know from over 18 years of experience in Oregon, to address the concerns of my very wise colleagues from across the aisle, the concerns about where these choices are being made and exercised, whether or not palliative care is being accessed. We know from the data that in Oregon, over 94% of the people exercising this are using this in their homes in the presence of family and friends. In their home, where they are loved. We know from just six months of data in California that people who've exercised this option are in fact receiving quality palliative care, hospice care. So we know that this choice is one that is being exercised with deep care and deep thought to what is happening.

"So what did we do, learning all of this? We responded in our committees to the critiques that mental health assessments were not being done in Oregon, and the strongest safeguard that I stand by in this bill, Mr. Speaker, is the one that requires a conversation. Again, another conversation with a counselor, a psychiatrist, a psychologist, a licensed clinical social worker, the people who are trained to have these conversations and to know if their decision is informed. We responded to that critique. We made this bill for the residents of Hawaii. We recognize that there's access issues, so we said, for that counselor position, we can allow for telehealth. This is a bill for Hawaii that was made in response.

"I'll leave one last thing, Mr. Speaker. The good Representative from Kahaluu talked about the fact that we don't have these conversations enough. And I would leave you with a book to read called The Conversation: A Revolutionary Plan for End-of-Life Care by Dr. Angelo E. Volandes. The last chapter of this book actually talks about the excellent palliative care that is occurring and the excellent conversations that are beginning to happen throughout our community. But this doctor who looks at palliative care issues says the first, necessary step toward a remedy lies with a return to the oldest tool in medicine's proverbial black bag, talking with patients about their wishes for how they want to live their remaining time.

"That is what this bill is about. It is to offer that end-of-life option for individuals with a terminal illness, to talk about how they want to live in their remaining days. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for the opportunity to work on this bill, and thank you for allowing us to have this conversation."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tokioka rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tokioka's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I know that this is a contentious issue. Some people cannot reconcile their morals with the idea of any life being ended intentionally, regardless of the situation. However, I believe that people have a choice to end their own lives in situations where the alternative is a lengthy, painful death

"My father was bedridden for the last 18 months of his life, and my family watched him lose his health and happiness. It broke our hearts to see him suffer. These types of situations are tragically common because the reality is that when people die of natural causes, they often die in terrible pain.

"I have concerns with the current version of this bill. I support the amendments suggested by the Attorney General's Office to minimize ambiguity in the language. Additionally, I am in favor of raising the age requirement from 18 to 21-years-old.

"I am not in favor of people dying. However, when death is practically inevitable, I do not want anyone to suffer more than necessary. I hope that this bill will provide peace of mind to people battling terminal illnesses and make the process easier on their families."

Representative Ichiyama rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ichiyama's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of HB 2739, HD 1. The Our Care Our Choice Act provides a comprehensive framework for a terminally ill patient to decide, in consultation with a qualified medical team, whether to endure significant pain and suffering or to receive a prescription medication that would allow the patient to die in a peaceful manner.

"The bill also contains strong safeguards to ensure that this process cannot be abused and that patients suffering from depression or an untreated mental illness cannot receive a life-ending prescription. The patient also retains the right to rescind their request for a prescription at any time.

"After talking with community members, stakeholders, friends and family, I realize that this is a personal choice that each individual needs to make for themselves. I will continue to support comprehensive end-of-life care and services, including hospice and palliative care, to ensure that every Hawaii resident has a full range of options available, should they ever have to make this difficult decision. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Yamane rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in reservations, brief comments. Mr. Speaker, as a social worker who's actually worked in the hospitals, had to work with families, actually had to counsel people regarding their next steps, have talked to many families who have addressed the issue of pain and suffering. Mr. Speaker, I support the underlying understanding of having the discussion about death and dying.

"Mr. Speaker, some of my concerns still remain in the bill, is the issue of the protections to the healthcare workers as well as addressing some of the directives regarding ensuring that these individuals are making the decisions without undue pressures and influence, as well as the encouragement that they also seek the guidance, not only medically, but also spiritually. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Takayama rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, strong support, permission to insert written comments."

Representative Takayama's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in strong support of H.B. 2739, the so-called death with dignity bill.

"I believe it should ultimately be the patient's personal decision to choose the option of ending one's own life. I know it is an option I would want for myself, and I do not feel that I should deny it to others.

"H.B. 2739 can only be used by terminally ill patients with six months or less to live and mentally capable of making decisions. It requires the patient to make at least two requests verbally plus one in writing, the diagnosis of a terminal illness must by verified by two physicians, and the patient must undergo a mental health counseling session.

"At every step of the way, the patient must affirm his or her decision to seek this path. Finally, the medication must be self-administered by the patient. These safeguards are intended to prevent against abuse or misuse of the law, and are more stringent than those of any other state that has enacted a 'death with dignity' law.

"The use of this law is purely voluntary by patients and doctors. Religious groups who feel this goes against their beliefs can decline to participate.

"Mr. Speaker, as for those who contend that this is just another form of suicide, I respectfully disagree. I know what it is like to lose a close friend to suicide, and this is far different. Persons who commit suicide often suffer from mental depression or other illness, or are under the influence of drugs or alcohol. H.B. 2739 requires that patients be fully capable of making an informed decision, and requires confirmation by physicians and counselors.

"For these reasons, I ask my colleagues to join me in supporting this important measure."

Representative DeCoite rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative DeCoite's written remarks are as follows:

"With reservations. I personally believe that we should give people choices in how they want to live and how they want to die. I am not sure if this bill has covered all the bases to ensure that we do this right the first time. I would like to see what information would be given to physicians, patients, and other healthcare providers that have roles covered by this law; and by whom. The entire process needs to be explained in simple to understand and follow instructions, so everyone can comply with the requirements spelled out in the law. If those affected by this law are unclear on what is required, then we will see confusion and other possible negative consequences.

"As this bill moves forward, I hope that we gain more consensus rather than split our constituents on one side versus the other. *Mahalo*."

Representative Mizuno rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, still in support. I just want to submit something to the Journal from Governor Abercrombie. He called our office yesterday and applauded the House of Representatives on this bill, and I'd like to place that in the record, if I can have permission to place his statements in the record for today. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Mizuno submitted the following letter he received from Governor Neil Abercrombie:

Dear John,

Having begun my elected political career in 1974 I have been an observer of and participant in the legislative process for hundreds of issues and thousands of votes over the last five (5) decades. I write to you today to state with some justified degree of authority that I believe HB2739-HD1 – The Our Care, Our Choice Act – is a textbook case study in how the legislative process should work and that it represents a high point of Representative democracy in action. I believe it will serve as a standard for the conduct of how a bill transforms itself into a law.

HB2739 addresses issues that are profound in their implications; issues difficult if not impossible to reconcile in that the positions taken are held by many who espouse them to be absent of compromise. The principles referenced in support of one view or another are thought to be immutable by many who sincerely put them forward. The consequences of legislative action are thought to be deeply personal and passionately believed.

In such a context, what is demanded of legislative leadership is unwavering respect for the process and for those participating in it. Calm oversight of hearings, abiding patience with and respectful attention to those whose views are being shared is fundamental. And perhaps most importantly what is required is a clear understanding that the decision makers who ask the voters to put their faith in the good judgment of their elected representatives cannot run away from the responsibility to make those decisions; that they forthrightly and resolutely exercise their best thoughts and conclusions in the legislation before them and take action.

HB2739 is the very definition of what I've outlines. It will be seen in time to come as a masterpiece of transparent deliberation leading to the vote to be taken today. I am well aware that many will be disappointed in the final version up for consideration, their opposition will not alter nor will their reasoning and convictions be swayed.

But what the Legislation has provided in the steps taken to this point is a lesson plan in showing how everyone's views can be heard, considered, respected and acknowledged.

Approval may not be universal, but this Legislature will have done its duty openly and thoroughly and HB2739 will be adjudged a tribute to its integrity and fidelity to democratic legislative tradition.

Well done!!

#### TWENTY-EIGHTH DAY

#### Monday, March 12, 2018

The House of Representatives of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2018, convened at 12:03 o'clock p.m., with Speaker Saiki presiding.

The invocation was delivered by Kahu Derek Napoleon of One Love Ministries, after which the Roll was called showing all Members present with the exception of Representative Fukumoto, who was excused.

By unanimous consent, reading and approval of the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Twenty-Seventh Day was deferred.

#### SENATE COMMUNICATIONS

#### INTRODUCTIONS

The following introductions were made to the Members of the House:

At 12:10 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:32 o'clock p.m.

#### ORDER OF THE DAY

#### SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Morikawa, seconded by Representative Ward and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering a certain House Bill for Third Reading by consent calendar. (Representatives Fukumoto, LoPresti and Yamashita were excused.)

# THIRD READING

# H.B. No. 1900, HD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that H.B. No. 1900, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Luke rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise to speak in favor of House Bill 1900, House Draft 1. First and foremost, I wanted to thank the Finance staff who are here, and if I could recognize them at this time, and if the members could hold your applause until I recognize everyone who is up there. First up is Albert Vargas, who is the budget chief, Julie Yang, the budget supervisor, Riley Fujisaki, who is the special assistant to the deputy decision-maker,

that's what he wants to be known as, Melanie Carlile, Jordan Alonzo, Katey Peck, Lexie Leventis, and in the front office it's Suhyeon Burns, Kai Kojimoto, Victoria Tyrell, and Nandana Kalupahana, who is hiding in the back. Stand up, Nan. So, if we could thank them for their hard work. Thank you, you may be seated.

"Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak in favor, and I want to thank the subject-matter chairs for looking into the budget this year, and also the committee members. We spent a lot of time going through the line items in the budget, and they are very thorough and ask a lot of questions, and through our internal discussion, we have made additional decisions on what to do with the budget. And so, I really want to thank the members of the Finance Committee, if you could give yourselves a hand. And of course, Vice Chair, my trusted companion. He keeps me stable and grounded, and we have a lot of discussion on what to do with not just the budget, but the bills as well. So, special *mahalo* to the Vice Chair.

"Mr. Speaker, when the Governor submitted his budget this year, there were two troubling things. First is the fact that there was a \$48 million miscalculation for the unfunded liability, and we are thankful that he has caught the mistake and sent us a Governor's message in mid-February, correcting a \$48 million mistake. In addition to that, the Governor's budget and the financial plan depends on annual new taxes collected from short-term rentals, including Airbnb and VRBO, in the amount of \$67 million.

"But there is no bill currently in the Legislature which would collect \$67 million worth of new taxes, and in spite of the claim by the administration that they are working with us on a bill, that is not true. We are not working on, the House and the Senate and the administration is not working on any bill. So I don't want people to come to us and the Finance members and say, okay, what bill are you working on? So I just wanted to dispel those issues.

"And because of that, the Finance Committee, in dealing with this budget and the various bills, first had the challenge of trying to balance a six-year budget plan, in spite of the over \$100 million worth of *puka* in the administration's financial plan. So because of that, we made some changes and tweaks and made sure that the House sent over to the Senate a budget that balances that for the next six years, and I'm thankful for the members and their understanding for them to recognize this and then make those difficult choices. Can somebody yield their time?"

Representative Cullen rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Luke continued, stating:

"Thank you very much. And so, even with that, we are hopeful that when the Council on Revenues meet again tomorrow, because we have also been tracking the tax collections, that they will be looking at the positive impact of various activities going on in our economy. So I'm hopeful that the Council on Revenues will increase their projection, which will put the Senate in a good position receiving this budget and hopefully working with the new Council on Revenues' projections.

"So I wanted to just quickly go through some of the things that are in the budget today, which were not part of the Governor's request. So these are important to highlight, because these are some of the things that the various Finance members picked up, or various chairs have requested. And through the budget, this is really setting the vision of the Legislature. So I wanted to highlight that the PISCES funding, this is something that we need to continue to look forward to, and I know the Hawaii Kai Representative is a strong supporter of PISCES and aerospace. So it was important that the Finance Committee recognize that, and put in \$150,000 for PISCES aerospace program, which was not in the Governor's budget.

"Also, in the Governor's budget, they had requested \$500,000 for what's known as small business innovation research grants, but instead of the \$500,000, we have put in \$2 million, because if there's anywhere we can help the high-tech industry to increase and grow, it's this program, and \$500,000 is not going to be sufficient. So we felt \$2 million would continue to support the high-tech industry for the future of the State.

"For Department of Education, Teach For America and Alternative Teacher Route is an important program which supports teachers in toughto-fill and rural areas. And in the base budget it was only \$200,000, which was increased by the Legislature to \$870,000. That in itself is still not enough, because we still have a teacher shortage, especially in the rural areas. So this budget includes \$1.3 million in Alternative Teacher Route Program.

"In addition to that, we have looked at the various needs of our hospitals, and we felt that the Hilo Medical Center needed additional assistance to ensure that people who have heart problems need a cardiac care unit in Hilo so they don't have to fly to Oahu, especially in these life and death situations. So the House committee has decided to put an additional \$1.5 million for the Hilo Medical Center.

"For parks, the Finance Committee has visited the needs that are in the Kauai state parks, especially, and the needs of all the parks around the state. So as opposed to the two positions requested in the Governor's budget, we felt that was not sufficient, so in this budget we will be allocating 10 positions for state parks across the state in the amount of \$188,000.

"In addition to that, Rapid 'Ōhi'a Death has been a huge negative impact on the island of Hawaii, and so in order to combat that, an additional \$800,000 to combat the spread of Rapid 'Ōhi'a Death. And I also wanted to highlight some of the capital improvement projects for ohana zones, \$30 million has been allotted in this bill, and whether it's called ohana zones, I know members have caught this too, whether it's called ohana zones or Pu'uhonua Village, we are trying to make sure that through this bill we recognize the importance of providing these infrastructure for homeless individuals, and this budget provides that funding, in addition to that \$35 million additional for affordable housing."

Representative Nakashima rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Luke continued, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, as you know, because the State of Hawaii is one of the only states where the State has jurisdiction over various schools, it's not the counties. So the counties provide permitting and building permits to build all these homes and subdivisions, and what do they forget? They forget to build schools, and that's why we have overcrowding in Campbell, we have big problems on the neighbor islands, we have problems in Ewa side. So this is what we get, because there is very little coordination between what's the need for the schools versus building new homes. So because of that, every year we're always doing catchup.

"I'm happy to announce that this budget bill provides \$13 million for phase two construction of new East Kapolei Middle School, \$10 million for design and construction of a new intermediate school at Kahului, Maui, \$20 million for phase one of new classroom building at Waipahu High School, \$2 million for design of new classroom at Paia Elementary, \$60 million for Pohukaina Elementary. In addition to that, it provides substantial funds for various libraries, including \$2.5 million for a new library at Kapaa Elementary, \$300,000 for a new library at Keaau and Mountainview, and \$1.9 million for land acquisition for Waikaloa Library.

"One of the things that the Finance Committee has tackled for the last six years is the vacancy. The number of vacancies still in state government is not something that we would like. This year, we have cut, through this budget, 203 vacancies, and these vacant positions have been vacant for over a year and a half. So 203 positions would yield about \$10 million. This is \$10 million that should be spent to hire important personnel, including healthcare personnel, invasive species personnel, and we want to continue to work with the departments to fill these vacancies.

"The other trend that we need to be watchful of is various programs that are supported by special funds that need to be converted through general funds. So, as an example, a few years ago we have converted the Environmental Health Administration Division in Department of Health, because they were running out of barrel fund. The worst that we can do is say, okay, we're running out of barrel fund for this agency, so we're going

to increase barrel, and that wouldn't be a good approach. So we converted that whole agency to general funds. So we've seen that over the years.

"So campaign spending, campaign spending was running out of money, and we don't want campaign spending to go and say, okay we're going to fine a bunch of people and then so we're going to support our program. So instead of that, we made an effort to convert campaign spending from special funds to general funds.

"Well, we're seeing that again. So with HTDC, HTDC is being kicked out of Manoa Innovation, so what happens? They said, okay, we're going to come in for general funds. And so the Governor's message has contemplated that, but that's something that the Finance Committee members and the Finance staff has known and anticipated. And so what we would like to urge the administration is to be proactive. When you know these things are coming up, don't do it when it's too late.

"So I can give you another example, the Energy Office, there was an audit from the Energy Office saying that they're going to run out of money next year. Well, if you're going to run out of money, what's going to happen next year? They're going to come down with something similar like this again. Well, the request to the administration is look at restructuring the Energy Office and look at some of the things that they're doing. The Auditor's Office criticized them for being too active on the dockets. Well, restructure that and do it as an opportunity to figure out what service the Energy Office is going to provide, as opposed to waiting and giving us no choice but to just give them general funds. So that is going to be something in the future."

Representative Belatti rose to yield her time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Luke continued, stating:

"Another example would be cigarette tax. Because the State has done a good job in cutting or reducing cigarette smoking, okay, all these programs that are attached to cigarette tax and tobacco tax, the result cannot be, we want to tax cigarettes more to support these programs. We have to change that mentality. The approach should be, well if we're doing a good job in preventing people from smoking, then we should use that and then turn the into general funds, as opposed to the initial knee-jerk reaction to be, okay we're going to raise more cigarette tax so that we can support these programs.

"It's almost as if the way we do business is backwards thinking. We need to change this approach. We need to be proactive. We have to seek out opportunities where we can restructure government as opposed to doing the same ole, same ole way.

"So with that I would like to close and thank you again for all your support, and thank you again for the Finance Committee staff and for the members for giving me this opportunity to speak on the budget in support. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support. Mr. Speaker, you've heard a very, very, very comprehensive overview of the budget. I've never seen the Chair speak as long as she has just completed. And in some ways, I'm going to be redundant as if I looked over at her speech and I adopted a few of the things, and maybe I've added a couple of things in addition to her not mentioning it.

"But what we did in the Finance Committee is what the people of Hawaii do at the kitchen table, Mr. Speaker, they balance the budget. Even though sometimes there are mistakes, and I think the Finance Chair pointed out very astutely, the Governor messed up in a couple of places where there's \$67 million and \$45 million that were out of place. So that was a corrective measure that made sense, but let me focus on what I find the most interesting and that I think we need to highlight.

"First on the economic diversification, Mr. Speaker. For decades, this floor, the Senate floor has talked about diversification. We are on the precipice of doing that. And I thank the Chair for the \$150,000 and the mention of PISCES, because right now, Mr. Speaker, space travel is going

to be a new industry, and it's going to be privatized. The \$150,000 that the Chair restored in PISCES reinvigorates an industry which, now with the head of PISCES, Henk Rogers, we have a really strong possibility of getting into the fast lane.

"Henk Rogers hangs around with Jeff Bezos, he hangs around with the Gates, and all the big wheelers who are going to get into space big time, Elon Musk for example. But as I mentioned in the Finance Committee, I will mention here so my colleagues know. Henk Rogers is the chair of PISCES. He's not going to put up with a lot of bureaucratic, slow lane nonsense, Mr. Speaker. We need to let him calibrate his vehicle at a pace that makes sense with what's going on in the private sector. He just came back from Tokyo, he was at the European Space Agency presenting the Hawaii case just a few weeks ago. He knows what's going on, but DBEDT needs to get in step with them. It's not a warning, but it's saying that if we lose the space race, because we are the most ideally situated in the world, we will have really lost a big diversification of the economy. And space exploration is going to be big time, Mr. Speaker.

"The other thing I would point out that the Chair didn't is that the people of Hawaii saved \$39 million by taking the DOT tram out of the airport, so when you come to the arrivals and then you go to get your rental car, which is only about 300 yards away, they were going to put in a tram. Mr. Speaker, that is not wise use of taxpayers' money. So I commend the Chair for that, and I think it's astute, balancing the budget, or an issue that is very astute to keep the finances used properly.

"Mr. Speaker, I would also note that the Chair had mentioned the \$2 million for the Small Business Innovation Research. This is based on the sound principle that without entrepreneurs, there are no job creation, without job creation, there's no economic development. So this budget pays attention to that entrepreneurial principle and fact of life. No entrepreneurs, no development. You can only have a centralized economy go so far and then it's got to go down to the individual, and that's where China is going to be limited in its development, because it's still a centralized economy.

"Mr. Speaker, the Chair mentioned the hiring of teachers for DOE. There's \$3 million to get the hiring of teachers. But at the same time, notice that she said that we have saved \$10 million, actually my figures are \$10.7 million, by cutting 203 positions for people who haven't filled their empty spots, the people that they need to hire to get the job done. They left them vacant for over a year and a half. I think that's a great rule of thumb. If you don't hire, well you're going to lose the money. So Mr. Speaker, that was a great shot across the bow of a lot of the executive departments.

"Another point I wanted to bring out was that the Department of Education also has funds now to do a lot of repair and maintenance. Mr. Speaker, as you know, it's been rather embarrassing with the University of Hawaii and other buildings. We build them, but we don't maintain them."

Representative Say rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"Thank you, Speaker. And most importantly, Mr. Speaker, as you at a number of public occasions said, that we're going to concentrate in this session on housing and homelessness. I'm really proud to say that the \$39 million that this budget has for homelessness is really putting our money where our mouth is. Thirty-nine million dollars for homelessness plus \$30 million of which \$15 million, as indicated earlier by the Finance Chair, is for Oahu, puts together a total package of which, whether you call it Ohana or Pu'uhonua Villages, gives us a running chance to get away from what otherwise is a pipe dream to be able to do housing first. The brick and mortar, Mr. Speaker, is not going to work. Those are \$250,000 to \$400,000 a pop. Even the great philanthropist, Mr. Kurisu, at the airport, where we all toured, those are \$120,000 minimal, those were the shelters from Japan that he reconstructed here.

"So Mr. Speaker, those are the points I wish to highlight. It's, in a way, it's a very brief discussion of what is otherwise a very robust budget. But I want to make one final statement with some good news and some bad news. First the bad news, Mr. Speaker, lest we forget. The people of Hawaii are the highest taxed in the nation, we have the second highest tax rates in the

nation. The good news, Mr. Speaker, is that with the tax cuts and jobs act, on the average, according to the Tax Foundation, every one of our constituents who filed taxes will get an \$800 savings or rebate, or not having to pay taxes. Mr. Speaker, may I encourage all of us to do as we did in 1987 when the Reagan tax cuts came in, let those rates slide, let them go down, let the savings accrue to the people of Hawaii, Mr. Speaker. With those remarks, Mr. Speaker, I vote in favor of this bill. Thank you."

Representative Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, I'm rising to speak in support of the budget, but I wanted to point out something to the Finance Chair, which I think might be interesting to pursue as we go to final reading on the budget. Mr. Speaker, I think that we can take some funds from the Transportation Department, and I think it would be justified. When I entered the Legislature, Mr. Speaker, I was told Department of Transportation doesn't really care what we say in the Legislature, because they get so much funding from the federal government. That percentage has declined over the years, but the attitude of Department of Transportation has not changed.

"I find, let's say, particularly with the Highways Division, there is an arrogance that ignores the needs of our constituents, many of whom are trying to generate the general excise tax that keeps our government running. I wanted to just read from a constituent, and it speaks really to those of us on the Windward side, the Representative from District 51, I'm from District 50, Representative from Districts 49 and 48, who have constituents that need to use the Pali.

"And here, the constituent says, 'I'm just providing a "fun" report on my observations on my "favorite" Pali Hwy improvement project. This is strictly FYI observations. I've been leaving at 8:15 p.m. to arrive in Waikiki at 10 p.m. and having a lot of free/wasted time in Waikiki. Thank you, State of Hawaii and Goodfellows, for the new rest period. I came back over the Pali at 10:30 p.m. Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, and want to share by observations on all the work being done that clearly does justify closing a major island connecting highway for a third of a day, five days a week

"Monday, down by the exit to Old Pali Road by the religious center, two guys with flashlights looking at the sidewalk on the Kailua-bound side of the road. That's the side that's not being closed. One-fourth mile up, three guys with flashlights standing in the road in front of a pickup truck looking at the roadway. At basecamp Ige, four to five guys lifting steel frames with a device and moving them far off the road. That's it.' That's what caused the highway to be closed.

"Tuesday, two men with flashlights 1/4 mile up just standing there, halfway between tunnel and basecamp Ige. Two men with a light and a torch burning something on the road. That's it.

"Wednesday, a flurry of activity, five to six people in the basecamp moving the forms around off the roadway. That's it.

"'Thursday, surprised to see cars headed town-bound at 10:40 p.m. When I dashed to the Pali at 8:25 p.m. to head to town, the sign that said 'road closed' was up and flashing. When I got back it was off and the road open. I guess they got so much done on Monday to Wednesday that they took Thursday off. Maybe the pace had been too intense. I think I now am better able to comprehend how it takes nearly two years to redo eight miles of already installed road.

"By the way, I like the addition of the extra lanes from three to four in the lower town side part of the road, just before it comes to the two-lane bridge underpass."

Representative McDermott rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Thielen continued, stating:

"Thank you, Representative. 'I pray I'm missing something there that as a non-civil engineer I can't yet see. In fairness, I may have missed work later

in the night, but virtually nothing was being done at 10:30-10:45 p.m. each night.

"'As I'm sure you notice going in the morning, perhaps/probably you are much earlier than I am, they do a lot of work with hundreds of nice orange cones deployed every day on the town-bound lanes in the day time. Just keeps me building increased confidence in the government of Hawaii.'

"And then I look at Highways Division on highway safety, page 18 of the budget. They're getting \$754,000-plus for that, and I think that's a section that could be slashed.

"I refer to the Mokapu Saddle Road, which runs from Oneawa or Mokapu Boulevard, past Kalaheo High School, up to let motorists get onto H-3 to head town-bound. No notice of a reduction in speed, down to 25 miles per hour. Police ticketing motorists at \$250 a ticket. That hurts. No construction. For weeks and weeks and weeks, no construction, and after much pressure, and having to go up to the Governor's Chief of Staff to demand a meeting with Highway's chief, then finally there's a flashing sign up there, letting only half of the motorists know that there's going to be a change in speed limit, but do you think it tells them what the change is? No. Just blink, blink, blink, reduce speed ahead. Any construction? No.

"And then the people coming from Oneawa, which is from District 51, they have no advanced notice. Begging, this is Grace Pacific, a subsidiary of Alexander & Baldwin, after begging Grace Pacific to put up signs saying what is the speed limit so people don't keep getting \$250 tickets, finally they put up a two-foot by two-foot, on a tripod, sign on the side of the road, letting half of the motorists know the speed's going to be 25 miles per hour.

"So I would say that this figure of nearly \$800,000 for highway safety operations could be slashed a lot, because they obviously aren't spending it on putting up signs, they obviously aren't helping the motoring public, and it's something that is showing the ineptitude of our state government. It reflects very poorly on all of us in state government, but it's brought to you by Department of Transportation.

"So I hope when the budget goes to conference committee that the Finance Chair and others can ratchet down that money for Department of Transportation, and try, at least a little bit, to change the arrogant attitude that they will do it the way they want to do and the public be damned. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I just wanted to commend the Chair, of course, for being meticulous. As stated previously, there was a lot of discrepancies as well as miscalculations that all of us were looking through and wondering, and all of that was kind of cleared up. As well as, over the years, talking about sweeping the vacant positions so we can actually save money if over a year there hasn't been a filling of that position. And as well, at the Hawaii Youth Correctional Facility, we have only 20 youth left, but 73 guards. And so, paying attention to that and making sure that that was converted into social worker positions, which is what we need.

"We, of course, are grateful for the funds appropriated for libraries, for the Wiki Wiki Shuttle, for the teacher incentive program, for Rapid 'Ōhi'a Death, and for repairs much needed at Hawaii Public Housing Authority. And I hope and look forward to the reinstatement of the \$4 million needed for adult dental Medicaid services.

"And so we've had the conversation in our committee as well as last week, it came up in a resolution again. And I just wanted to highlight it for the members that in our state, 52% of low-income adults have not even seen a dentist, and 51% of those adults actually have been to the emergency room for severe, for dental disease. And so when we talked about it in the committee, something that's brought up to me by our community health centers was the fact that some of our issues in the high cost of emergency services are due to people going to the emergency room for dental services, because since 2008 we haven't reinstated that money that's needed for adult Medicaid dental services. As well as it affects people who are trying to transition out of homelessness, and can't get that, so that they can actually

have the confidence, eat correctly, and get a job, because they don't have teeth

"And so it seems like something that maybe we take for granted, but it's something that definitely needs to be addressed, and I look forward to seeing that reinstated so that we can support in that way and truly help all the different portions of homelessness that are affecting us, not just where they live, but also the services they need to thrive and to succeed. Thank you."

Representative San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Short comments in support. I would just like to point out that not all Representatives agree with cutting the Department of Transportation's budget. We love the Department of Transportation in my district. Thank you very much."

Representative Souki rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, thank you for recognizing me. And first of all, I will be voting with this, for one of the few times, with reservations on the budget, and let me explain why. First of all, before I get into explanation, I want to thank the Chairman, the committee members, the staff, for doing a wonderful job. Being a former chairman myself, I know that it's a very difficult job, and we have an excellent chairman that's doing the best she can under the circumstances.

"My disagreement in the little parts on this budget, it has to do, and go back to a contractual relationship between the State of Hawaii and Kaiser in putting up the Maui quasi-government hospital, private nonprofit hospital, what is now the Maui Health System. I know that there are some discussions that have been going on. My concern is that there should have at least have some money in to show a commitment by this body here, the House.

"What I'm talking about is that, there's different figures, but the figure that comes to my mind is \$30 million a year for three years, and at the end of three years, they would be on their own in order to carry on the hospital and its expenses, and in the long term, after three years, and in the long term, they would be saving the State a lot of money.

"My concern is that there was no money put in. I know there was discussions given in, talking, but some commitment should have been shown, and putting some money in for the Maui Health System.

"So all I ask is that, in fact, we're losing an advantage when you allow the Senate to come in with the money and not us, we lose the advantage. The advantage you have by being the first party to submit a budget is that you can craft the budget as you would want and let the Senate react to it, but in this case here we didn't put any money at all for the Maui Health System.

"And I know the Chairman will be putting some money later on, but again, there was a lack of commitment as I've seen at this point here. So this is my *mana'o* with the budget here. But I'd like to add, I admire the Committee Chairman, I admire the staff for the hard work they do, and the committee members, but please don't forget the contractual agreements that we had some years ago. Thank you very much."

Representative Cullen rose in support of the measure and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Cullen's written remarks are as follows:

"As stated earlier, Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support of HB 1900, HD 1. I would like to thank the Finance Chair for all the work she put into the budget and being fiscally conservative with the State's finances. I would like to thank the budget staff for all the time they have put into providing the members with the most knowledgeable information, so that we can make informed decisions.

"Even in this conservative and detailed budget we were able to include funding for Kaleiopuu Elementary School's cafeteria renovation and expansion that would create better opportunities at the school. As we have continued to address the track school issue, this budget includes additional funding necessary to plan, design, and construct 'Phase 2' of the new East Kapolei Middle School. Finally, we have also included funding to redesign the Kunia eastbound on-ramp that would work to address concerns with the current congestion situation, which I can personally attest to as it is part of my daily route as I head to work.

"These proposed CIP appropriations in HB 1900, HD 1 should significantly contribute to the essential day-to-day commute and family's quality of life, teacher's work environment, and student's learning potential in our communities."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, H.B. No. 1900, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Souki voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Fukumoto being excused.

I think it's a precautionary measure. Look, nobody likes guns, nobody wants to revel in what's been going on in the nation and the number of school shootings that we've had. But concealed to carry has a protective measure against those criminal elements that do run and do wild things in our nation. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, a no vote, please. Thank you."

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.R. No. 4 be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tupola's written remarks are as follows:

"This resolution urges the City and County of Honolulu to reduce the time it takes to award a building permit.

"We all know that Hawaii is in a state of crisis when it comes to housing. We need at least 65,000 new units in the next 10 years just to meet growing demand.

"This housing shortage drives up the price of homes, making rent and sale prices out of reach for young people and working families.

"According to a 2016 study by Trulia, Hawaii has the longest average number of months to receive building approval—17 months. That's longer than famously expensive places like New York, Washington D.C., and San Francisco.

"We urge the DPP to review the growing number of rules, regulations, and codes that require landowners and developers to navigate an expensive and complex system of bureaucracy, costly studies, and legal requirements.

"Reducing the time it takes to get a building permit will be a huge step toward tackling our affordable housing crisis in Hawaii.

"Thank you to the Chair of Housing for hearing this measure, and I hope we can all continue working together to address the problem of homelessness and rising housing prices."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. No. 4, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION URGING THE CITY AND COUNTY OF HONOLULU TO REDUCE WAIT TIMES FOR HOUSING CONSTRUCTION PERMITS," was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives Fukumoto, Har, Hashem, Lowen, McDermott, Nakashima and Souki being excused.

Representative Brower, for the Committee on Housing, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1151-18) recommending that H.C.R. No. 8 be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 8, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION APPROVING THE SALE OF THE LEASED FEE INTEREST IN 41-1373 HAUNAUKOI STREET, WAIMANALO, HAWAII," was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Fukumoto, Har, Hashem, Lowen, McDermott, Nakashima and Souki being excused.

Representative Brower, for the Committee on Housing, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1152-18) recommending that H.C.R. No. 7 be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. Representative Brower, for the Committee on Housing, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1153-18) recommending that H.C.R. No. 4 be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.C.R. No. 4 be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Thielen rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, first of all, I wanted to ask for a potential conflict. My son was a former president of the Building Industry Association."

The Chair addressed Representative Thielen, stating:

"There's no conflict, and it will remain in effect through sine die."

Representative Thielen continued to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you. And the BIA is opposed to this resolution. I'm in opposition to it, also. I'll tell you what my concern is. It's asking for a task force to study the issue of residential automatic fire sprinkler systems for one- and two-family dwellings. The problem is, we do a study, we form a task force, we do a study, and then the bill follows and then the law follows. And were that to be the case, Mr. Speaker, we would then see the median price for a family home to be in the \$800,000 range.

"It's really a big price issue, I think we ought to be very careful in even going the task force way with this. And with the technologies that we have available, there are many less expensive ways to be able to detect whether or not there's a fire within a dwelling. We don't need to have fire sprinklers, that's a little bit antique. It's kind of like a rail when we've got Uber. So, we ought to rethink this. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.C.R. No. 4, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE FORMATION OF A TASK FORCE TO STUDY THE ISSUE OF RESIDENTIAL AUTOMATIC FIRE SPRINKLER SYSTEM COSTS FOR NEW ONEAND TWO-FAMILY DWELLINGS," was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Thielen voting no, and with Representatives Fukumoto, Har, Hashem, Lowen, McDermott, Nakashima and Souki being excused.

"In the hearing it was basically a face-off between the young people who said, don't pass this, it's too premature to do it, and to the older people who testified and said, you probably should do this, and it was a confusion between blockchains, of which probably nobody understands what it is, including many of us, and actually the gambling, and even one of the members of the committee said he almost lost \$10,000 by virtue of bitcoin.

"So Mr. Speaker, I think us passing this is a bit premature, it needs to be studied more, it needs to be put in its proper perspective, because there's no regulation of it, there's no real total place that it fits in the present macro and microeconomic environment, even though one of the testifiers said he bought a car with bitcoin somewhere in Honolulu, and other things that are going on of which we have no idea what it is. So with those, Mr. Speaker, I reserve this as a no for the time being. Thank you."

Representative Choy rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. I'd like to invite my friend from Hawaii Kai to read the bill. Thank you."

Representative Cachola rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations. I know that my colleague over there said that I almost lost \$10,000 in a week's time, but I was smart enough not to buy or invest. That's how volatile this currency is. So, with reservations. Thank you."

Representative Tupola rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. A no vote on the same measure, Mr. Speaker, and a few words. Thank you. This authorizes the Agribusiness Development Corporation to enter into contracts with private businesses to remove select municipal solid waste, glass, food and green waste from the waste stream. The Agribusiness Development Corporation seems to have been operating without oversight from the Legislature. It's of a concern to me. I think an audit of them is well overdue. I know that we don't receive reports from them, understand what they're doing. We hear discussion from the former Ag Chair, who heads the ADC, we hear from him at committee hearings, but there's a great deal that we don't know about what is going on. So I think it's not wise to move ahead and give more work to that organization until we audit them and find out exactly what is happening. Thank you."

But creating these buffer zones in areas where we don't know how big these are and then saying that schools can't be there, when we know on the west side because of how big and how fast we've grown, we need schools all the time, everywhere, this would really affect us. Thank you."

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2783 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative McDermott rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tupola rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Support with an important footnote, Mr. Speaker. The section on the bill that impacts low-income housing, public housing, there's a strong correlation between ones' low income and ones' propensity to smoke. Therefore, if you're low income and you're prone to smoke, and the cost of cigarettes is as it is, this is not only a regressive position to put them in, but sometimes that's their hold onto social facilitation, *et cetera*.

"Having smoked for a couple of years, or decades, I know that it facilitates social as well as psychological well-being. To put it to the low income who have sometimes not all the hope that others, I just think we should be aware. I'm not trying to be sympathetic or mushy or syrupy, I just want us to know that these are the people who are hooked on that, and sometimes that's all they have to rely upon for the sake of the moment, that they are doing such things. A lot of us here have smoked, a lot of us have got over it. Hopefully this will help them get through the smoking addiction, but when we target those the way we're targeting in this bill, it hurts. And I'm sure there's some feedback that will be forthcoming.

"For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I support this. Smoking is not good, but to know the group that we're hitting, just like when we passed the GE tax, we say, oh this is so regressive, the poor people are going to get hurt by it. Just so we know as a footnote, that's going to hurt some of these people here. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2783, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII PUBLIC HOUSING AUTHORITY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary, with Representatives McDermott and Tupola voting no, and with Representatives Choy, DeCoite, Har and Souki being excused.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising with reservations on Senate Bill 3099 and I would like to make a few comments. Thank you. Mr. Speaker, this doubles the deposit that our constituents and visitors are going to have to pay when they purchase something that's subject to the Hawaii HI-5. I think the better approach would have been to read the Auditor's report, which was very critical of the HI-5 program, and then to look at our different communities to see whether or not that program is being run even in a way that will enable our residents to turn in their bottles and cans.

"I get a lot of complaints from people that the redemption centers aren't well located, that their hours aren't really kept in the way that they should be. And it makes it difficult, and then people get discouraged and just don't participate in it. So I think we're going about the approach in the wrong way. Instead of hitting people with more fees, double, double the amount, which sure is going to make a difference when you do your grocery shopping, I think we ought to make the redemption process be a very good one.

"I know that some places actually allow you to go to your grocery stores and turn your bottles and cans in there. We had a lot of push back from the grocery industry about doing that. Although I think a couple of the large boxes like Costco were talking at one point, this was some years ago, but talking about being willing to set this up within their system. So there are lot of different things that we could do other than just going ahead and hitting people with another fee that just raises their cost of living and makes it harder. Thank you."

Representative McDermott rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No vote, and I'd like to echo the sentiments of the previous speaker."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations, brief comment. I'm still in discussions, most of the recycling companies are actually in my district, a lot of them are in Campbell Industrial, a lot of them are giving me their insight on kind of what the real issue is going on in our recycling industry. I'm trying to wait for some of their comments to come back to me. On third reading we definitely can make more comment about it, but I think we need to consider where these monies are actually going, where the increase goes, if it really does target that issue, and how much it does affect the cost of living for people, even as small as it is. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations. And if it has in the bill that it's double, I'll have a no vote, but I read the bill that it's not in there, that it has been taken out of the Senate draft, so I'll stick with reservations for the point right now. Thank you."

Representative Har rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Please register a no vote, may I please adopt the words of the Representative from Kailua into the Journal as if they were my own. And in particular, I just, again, would like to note the audit that was done by the Auditor's Office. I think that really gets to the crux of the problem with the HI-5 program. While I understand the intent is to incentivize people to turn in their bottles, the fact of the matter is, that audit really gets to the heart of the matter and what the issues are with the HI-5 program.

"So what we should be doing is, looking at the audit and really addressing the issues in the audit, as opposed to attempting to increase the fees on each bottle, because I don't necessarily think that its still going to be the incentive people need to recycle. For these reasons, I'm in opposition. Thank you."

Representative Evans rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Har be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Creagan rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. My initial response to this was somewhat negative, but I do rise in support. On the Big Island, we have a problem with implementing the recycling. But I think on Oahu and perhaps on the Big Island, this might help some of the homeless population actually support themselves and buy some food. It will double the amount they could collect in a relatively short period of time. So I think that little silver lining of this might be worth doing it. Thank you."

Representative DeCoite rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations. My concern is, on the island of Lanai, when they lost their recycling, people that were there, they still ended up paying for their cans and bottles, and yet those were never being reimbursed back. So in areas such as that, there is nobody to handle the recycling, it becomes a big problem that now they're being doubled, the payment for it. So, still have major concerns behind this bill. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3099, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT,"

passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives DeCoite, Thielen, Tokioka, Tupola and Ward voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Evans, Har and McDermott voting no, and with Representatives Ing, Lee and Souki being excused.

As well, I have an airport in my district, and so it's the same thing, helicopters, planes, and so I think starting with the air tour management plan and finishing it is going to be very key in us resolving this issue. Thank you."

I know infrastructure's been a big problem, but so has housing costs and the amount of people who qualify for a mortgage. And I know some people think that this may be the nose of the camel into the tent, and tiny houses may go into other parts of the community, but this is strictly for the Hawaiian homestead, and it's something, Mr. Speaker, has and is becoming a really, really, really big broken promise that Prince Kuhio in 1921 in Congress said that, because of the loss of the land and the dignity, we will return the Hawaiians to the land.

"Now, we're to the point where we haven't, and we've got tiny houses as one of the options, and I just encourage everybody to say, let's get on with the housing crisis in the Hawaiian community, before we can solve even the others. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

So, it's a serious problem. I think it's a major concern, I wish we would address it straight on through some creative measures, and this is not one of those creative measures. Thank you."

"Mr. Speaker, a no vote, brief comments. Mr. Speaker, if there was the political will in the counties, they could do this without our help. This is kind of an encourage them, which is good. But if there was a way of sharing data between what's legal and what's taxable, and what the data is in the city level and what the data is at the state level, this Airbnb, huge giant in the room, this giant elephant in the room would go away. And this is kind of like sneaking around to the sides of it. It's not the right way to go, but it's really in the cities and counties and the islands that the ball should be in their court in resolving the situation. Thank you."

Representative San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Reservations, strong reservations for different reasons. I'd like to note that this allows the county to create disclosures during the time of conveyancing, not at the time when the contracts are occurring. So, conveyancing is a time when contracts have already been signed, and it's just a question of transferring the property after a sale has occurred, transferring the property from one to another. I believe this is a very dangerous precedent of allowing government interference into contracts between private parties, and for that reason, strong reservations."

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising to speak against 1353, which is relating to special management areas, Mr. Speaker. Before I begin talking about the bill itself, I would encourage members to take a look at the special management area that this bill will affect, and take a look at the maps that are available that show the SMA for all of the islands. For example, virtually all of Lanikai is in the SMA, not just the houses on the beach, but all the houses leading backward, and I think it includes the entire Lanikai area.

"In Kailua, it's not just beachfront houses. The SMA goes back along the canal and back around along the marsh. It's very extensive, it includes areas of Coconut Grove, which have our more moderately priced houses in Kailua. And then you go to other islands, and for example, well, let me continue with Oahu. Kahala, quite extensive SMA, not just on the ocean front. Hawaii Kai, very extensive, Waianae, extensive, and then we have Lihue on the island of Kauai that has quite a broad swath. On the Big Island, you have Waimea, and then Kailua Kona. Quite extensive. But I would encourage members to take a look at the SMA maps.

"This bill, frankly, is going to pretty much be the death knell for anything remaining in an affordable category for our people here in Hawaii. It's strangely crafted, I imagine that the drafters were under a time crunch, et cetera. So as it has come out, what it means is that if you want to do an addition or a renovation, you will have to get an SMA permit if the cost of that addition or renovation reaches \$500,000, but this figure is cumulative during a 10-year period.

"So let's say in year one, Mr. Speaker, you bought kind of a cracker-box house and you want to fix it up for your growing family. So you do this, you add some bedrooms, some bathrooms, and you just put it into better shape. It's not brand-new construction, this is remodel or renovation. Then you reach up to maybe, with the cost of building here, maybe up to \$400,000 on

that. During the next 10 years, your aging parents need to move in with you, and you figure out, okay, we can do this, we can extend this sort of area and remodel to be able to take care of our aging parents that are going to move in with us. The renovations are going to cost \$100,001, which catapults you into being mandated to get a special management area permit.

"Now remember, we're not talking just about beachfront homes here. Go look at those maps, we're talking about all of Lanikai, all the way to the back. We're talking about other areas on other neighbor islands, quite extensive. We're talking about a huge swath, Kahala, *et cetera*. So here you are with \$500,001, and you have to get an SMA permit. Well, that is extremely costly."

Representative McDermott rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Thielen continued, stating:

"Thank you, Representative. It's extremely costly. They've got a trailing, that we learned in law school, the trailing covers the whole 10 years. So it's going to discourage you renovating your house to take care of elderly parents, because the SMA process can be very expensive with a lot of requirements, including the doozy, each individual permit has to be considered by and either approved or rejected or with conditions added, by the city council. Now that's absurd. I mean, it's just strangling the housing for our people in this state.

"I don't know if there's any bill here this session that is quite as disastrous, other than the short-term rental ones that are bad, but I don't know of any bill that is quite as disastrous that will really create major, major problems for families that live here. Your beachfront owners are going to have the money to go hire all the people they need to do to put everything through the process, I'm not concerned about that. I'm concerned about the families that are within the SMA, probably don't even know it, that have growing needs and change circumstances during a 10-year period. And this bill is going to absolutely hammer them.

"Can you imagine marching over to City Hall before the council members to say, please, I do want to make this addition to my home because my parents really need to move in with us, may I please do this? Three hearings at the least, committee hearings. I mean, what are we doing to people, what's the cost that this is going to add on? You're going to have to do an environmental assessment, and then if the City wants to say, hey we want a full EIS because it might create some other issues, you're talking about adding \$100,000 to that project, according to one of the testifiers. It just doesn't make sense, Mr. Speaker.

"I know the bill was put together under a rush, because we have deadlines, but the bill makes absolutely no sense. It does go to Finance, where it has a chance to sit on the shelf and stay there until people begin to think of what they're trying to accomplish. I know we're all trying to accomplish protect our shoreline, begin to bring the structures further away from the edge of the water, great, but are we trying to go back to take all of Lanikai out, are we trying to go back to take large swaths of other areas out and make those homeowners, once they buy, once that house has any renovations, they're going to be held to either a costly, time-consuming, unmanageable process, or they just cannot renovate, repair, remodel.

"That doesn't make sense, Mr. Speaker. I mean, it just doesn't make sense. If anyone in this building has any experience with the building industry for residences, take a look at this and you're going to go, oh my goodness, this shouldn't move forward. And my plea to Finance is, if you have a chance to look at it, if you have a crowded agenda, shove this one up on the shelf, don't move it forward, Mr. Speaker. And I would like to add more remarks into the Journal, please. Thank you."

Representative Thielen's written remarks are as follows:

"Some of my colleagues might think that the bill exempts reconstruction or alteration of an existing single-family residence from the permitting requirements. However, on page 3, the bill clearly states that 'development' does include any reconstruction or alteration that is over the threshold of a

minor permit. That threshold is \$500,000, cumulative with other reconstruction or alterations done over the prior 10 years.

"It is easy to misinterpret what is really going on here, because the language of the bill is inarticulately drafted. It presents a 'double-negative,' and it also requires the reader to know or research what the value threshold is between a minor and a major permit.

"Under this bill, if a home has had \$499,999 of reconstruction or alteration work done over the past 10 years, the next reconstruction or alteration would require an SMA major permit. That would include the preparation of an environmental assessment and add months and costs to the process.

"As to new construction, this bill eliminates the existing permit exemption that benefits new single-family home construction and leaves it up to the counties to come up with a substitute. This will immediately stifle residential construction.

"Finally, what happens when someone buys a house and the previous owner used up the allotted \$500,000?"

Representative McDermott rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tupola rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Quinlan rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Reservations. I just wanted to comment, there's only one single group that's even ever testified in favor of this, and that's one county's planning department. Massive majority of testimonies have been opposed to it as well, and I have my suspicions and problems with it too, so, thanks."

Representative Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I am in support. I might note that on page 3, as I read it, the development does not include the following. Reconstruction or alteration of an existing single-family residence that has less than valuation threshold for special management district. Thank you."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. First off, the words of the previous in the Journal as if they were my own and a couple comments, if I may? In support. I want to thank the Chair of Water & Land on this measure, because when this one showed up, it was quite interesting. It was a shotgun to take care of a spider, City and County of Honolulu spider. Though Maui County is listed as having comments, it was actually in opposition, because we've done a good job with our SMAs. Yes, they're sprawling SMAs, like on some of the other islands, but our county's done a good job with the SMA process having home rule. The version of the bill that showed up to Water & Land would have taken that away, and the most egregious portion of it, I think for many of the comments which were negative, in reality, was the size limitation trigger that was in there for homes, which the Water & Land Chair took out, and I thank him for that, because that was obviously very vexing.

"What this does is, clarifies and restores home rule to Maui County in this issue, and what it also does, Mr. Speaker, is address something that's been going on on my island, maybe it's a touch of social justice, but what is happening is many of these SMA homes, which were plantation homes, local homes, have been bought out by speculators, speculators who put \$500,000, million dollars into turning these things into mega mansions.

They completely change the quality of the neighborhood, drive the tax rate up, and quite frankly, should be going through some kind of an SMA process, because it's changing the character of entire parts of Maui. So I thank the Chair for taking, I guess, a look at this issue through this bill. I know it's a work in progress, but I think, given the changes he's made, I'm going to support it, because it's headed in the right direction. Thanks."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and S.B. No. 2969, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SPECIAL MANAGEMENT AREAS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative LoPresti voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Matsumoto, Quinlan, Thielen, Tupola and Ward voting no, and with Representatives Lee, Lowen, McDermott, Souki and Tokioka being excused.

Representatives Yamane and McKelvey, for the Committee on Water & Land and the Committee on Higher Education, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1354-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2078, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and S.B. No. 2078, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUEO RESEARCH," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Lee, Lowen, McDermott, Souki and Tokioka being excused.

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"I don't want to break my perfect record since 2007, please register a no vote for me."

Representative Har rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative McKelvey be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. They've received a lot of money from the Legislature through the years. We don't, any of us, really have a report in front of us to show what they've actually accomplished or what they haven't accomplished. It's an uncomfortable feeling, as we keep throwing money and scope of duties at the ADC, but yet they've not yet been publicly held accountable for what they have or have not done. I think all of us should have that little discomforting feeling inside of us to say, this is an entity that is ripe for review fiscally, as well as what they have accomplished or not done. Thank you."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations. I also made that similar comment regarding the audit needing to be done. Many people have suggested that, and still hasn't been done. Thank you."

Representative Evans rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support. As chair of Economic Development and looking across the State for our different industries and where we want to develop small business in Hawaii, I think this is a good bill to advance and keep into discussion as we hopefully get it to conference and look at what we're doing in Hawaii to help all the sectors grow here in our state. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and S.B. On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3031, SD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ORGANIC FOODS PRODUCTION TAX CREDIT," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Lee, Lowen, McDermott, Souki and Tokioka being excused.

Representatives Creagan and Evans, for the Committee on Agriculture and the Committee on Economic Development & Business, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1376-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2522, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2522, SD 1, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Here's the ADC again. And, Mr. Speaker, I am going to vote no for the same reasons that I'm concerned about this entity, and I think we need to have it be held accountable before we continue doing these kinds of legislation. Thank you."

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and S.B. No. 3001, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ENERGY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Lee, Lowen, McDermott, Souki and Tokioka being excused.

Representative Lee, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1378-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2571, SD 2, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2571, SD 2, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, support, strong support, with written comments and a brief comment now. Mr. Speaker, this is about saving our reefs, for my district it's save Hanauma Bay, where a lot of the research was done for banning two chemicals in sunscreen. There's been a lot of discussion between the industry and the scientists, and there's been a compromise to where this is not an immediate ban, it would be phased in, I think it's logical, but no one will be hurt by this. It's an excellent bill, and I'll have my further comments in the Journal, please. Thank you."

Representative Ward's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I stand in strong support of this measure. I believe that it is of the utmost importance to preserve our reefs. In my district, the Friends of Hanauma Bay have been staunch supporters of this legislation to preserve one of our State's greatest tourist attractions. Last year, Senator Espero and I went to Hanauma Bay to gather samples of the

water at different points throughout the bay with Dr. Craig Downs, the Executive Director of the Haereticus Environmental Laboratory Clifford, VA. I would like to attach his letter to our legislators, which include his findings from the aforementioned study, into the Journal. I would also like to insert into the Journal letters from Dr. Cheryl M. Woodley, NOAA, to Senator Espero and the Maui County Council that include her findings. *Mahalo*."



SUPPORTING Hawaii Legislative Bills That Prohibit the Sale of SPF Sunscreen Products Containing Oxybenzone & Octinoxate

Dear Hawaii Legislative Chairperson and Committee Members,

I was the lead scientist who co-authored the scientific paper in Archives of Environmental Contamination and Toxicology regarding the impact of oxybenzone on coral planula and oxybenzone contamination along the coasts of Hawai'i and the U.S. Virgin Islands. I am also a graduate of the John A. Burns School of Medicine at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa.

Oxybenzone/Octinoxate in the marine environment can have detrimental effects to all marine life, including changes in fish behavior, pathological changes to fish sexual identity, damage to genomic and DNA integrity, and the developmental success of almost ALL of Hawaii's marine biodiversity. Its greatest DANGER is as a poison that can kill or maim juveniles of corals, sea urchins, and fish. This poison THREATENS the restoration of Hawaii's already degraded coral reefs by preventing juvenile marine life from recruiting into an area that is polluted by oxybenzone/octinoxate. The image below is what 1 part per billion (1,000 ng/L) OXYBENZONE can do to a fish embryo in 48 hours! This concentration can be seen soon after high tide in areas along Maui's West Coast and in many popular swimming areas/reefs along the coasts of Oahu and Kauai.



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The SCIENCE is strong that Oxybenzone & Octinoxate poses a threat to marine life, from directly killing juveniles to inducing pathological behaviors in fish. There are at least 13 other scientific papers that have been published in peer-reviewed scientific journals since 2015 on the Ecotoxicology of Oxybenzone & Octinoxate on aquatic and marine life. There are over 25 papers in the scientific literature that demonstrate the toxic effects in aquatic and marine life, or the contamination of wildlife.


Lace coral, (Pocillopora damicornis) which is found nearshore in Hawaii, was exposed for 14 days under ~35% sunlight at a temperature of  $80^{\circ}$ F to 500 parts per trillion (500 ng/L) Oxybenzone. As you can see, the coral is bleaching.



Oxybenzone is toxic to adult and juvenile coral. In a related coral species, oxybenzone caused in less than 24 hour exposure (a) DNA damage to juvenile coral, (b) induced coral bleaching, (c) caused morbid deformities, (d) induce an endocrine disruption event by causing the coral planula to incase itself in its own coral skeleton (effectively killing it), and (d) killing the planula quickly. Oxybenzone can cause these toxicities to juvenile coral in the parts per trillion level (nanograms/liter = ng/L).

What are the concentrations of oxybenzone (or octinoxate) in the waters in Hawaii? One recent study of oxybenzone contamination was conducted in Hanauma Bay Marine Conservation District with the help of State Senator Will Espero and State Representative Gene Ward (http://www.hawaiinewsnow.com/story/36876108/samples-taken-from-hanauma-bay-could-lead-to-ban-on-certain-sunscreens).



The lowest concentration of oxybenzone that we detected was 30ng/L, the highest concentration was 27,880 ng/L, while the mean of all 10 sampling sites was 3,731 ng/L. Remember, coral can exhibit toxicity to oxybenzone as low as 62 ng/L.


There is a formal process to determine if a chemical poses a potential threat tow ildlife called a Hazard Assessment. This process differs very little among nationalized governments:



Using the lethality dose-responses curves to coral planula found in our paper (Downs et al., (2016) Toxicopathological effects of the sunscreen UV filter, oxybenzone (benzophenone-3), on coral planulae and cultured primary cells and its environmental contamination in Hawaii and the

U.S. Virgin Islands. Archives of Environmental Contamination and Toxicology. DOI 10.1007/s00244-015-0227-7. We determined that all 10 concentrations pose a potential threat to the survival of coral planula in Hanauma Bay. In the graph below, anything above 1.E+00 line is considered a "Hazzard" to coral planula.



Using data generated for other marine organisms such as algae, shrimp, and mussels conducted by an independent scientific laboratory in Spain, we conduct a second Hazard Assessment, and again see that the concentrations in Hanauma Bay pose a threat to this biodiversity (see graph below).



Data for this Hazard Assessment was taken from:

Paredes et al., (2014) Ecotoxicological evaluation of four UV filters using marine organisms from different trophic levels Isochrysis galbana, Mytilus galloprovincialis, Paracentrotus lividus, and Siriella armata. Chemosphere 104:44-45.

The large amount of scientific publications on this topic sets a foundation for environmental contaminant data and ecotoxicological data to make a case in a forensic setting that sunscreen pollution, specifically oxybenzone pollution, poses a clear violation of specific standards set forth in the U.S Clean Water Act. Mitigating oxybenzone and Octinoxate pollution in Hawaii'a water by banning the sale of SPF sunscreen products containing oxybenzone and octinoxate may prove critical in preventing possible future lawsuits from shutting down tourism access to many marine conservation districts, and even within Federally managed waters, such as in a National Marine Sanctuary.

Many legislators have asked me why doesn't the U.S. Food and Drug Administration ban the use of this oxybenzone and octinocate already, especially if the chemical poses such a toxicological threat. There are over 100 scientific papers describing the toxicity of Oxybenzone/Octinoxate to humans and mammalian laboratory models! A recent study has provided strong evidence of an association between prenatal exposure of human fetuses and the occurrence of Hirschsprung's Disease — a congenital intestinal disease that strikes between 15,000 to 12,000 infants (Huo et al. (2016) The relationship between prenatal exposure to oxybenzone and Hirschspring's disease. Chemosphere 144:1091-1097). We encourage every member of the Hawaii Legislature and the Hawaii Governor's office to petition the U.S. FDA to conduct a formal risk assessment based on new scientific literature that has been published since 2015 on the impacts of oxybenzone to developing fetuses and children.

Haereticus Environmental Laboratory and I support this effort as being an effective means in reducing oxybenzone/octinoxate pollution, preserving and restoring Hawaii's coral reefs, and protecting the resource that so many local businesses depend upon.

I am writing in response to your request for comments on SB1150, an Act to protect Hawai'i's coral reefs from the impacts of sunscreens and cosmetics containing oxybenzone.

I am a NOAA scientist working within the National Ocean Service's National Centers for Coastal Ocean Science. I have over 30 years of experience in molecular and cellular biology, biochemistry and pathobiology, which I have applied to aspects of coral health and disease research for the past 20 years. I am also one of the co-authors of a 2016 peer-reviewed article in Archives of Environmental Contamination and Toxicology that examined the toxicological effects of oxybenzone on coral larvae, cultured primary coral cells and measured environmental concentrations in coral reef areas in the Caribbean and at multiple sites in Hawaii.

The preponderance of scientific evidence indicates that oxybenzone is toxic to coral and threatens overall coral reef health by:

- inducing coral bleaching;
- harming or killing coral larvae by inducing gross deformities, DNA damage, and bleaching;
- acting as an endocrine disruptor; and
- bioaccumulating in coral tissue.

In support of this conclusion, I have provide the attached summary of the relevant peer-reviewed literature (Appendix A). As you will see, the research documenting the toxicity of oxybenzone on corals is extensive. While additional research may incrementally add to our understanding of its impacts to additional coral reef species, additional research on the impacts of oxybenzone should not be a prerequisite to management action.

Managing exposure of corals to oxybenzone is a key step in threat-reduction, and is a critical aspect in improving coral reef health now and for the future.

#### Appendix A: Literature Review

The weight of evidence, built over at least 20 years of research and hundreds of peer-reviewed scientific articles, demonstrates that oxybenzone is toxic to corals and other animals. Oxybenzone [aka, Benzophone-3; (2-hydroxy-4-methoxyphenyl)(phenyl) methanone] is present in aquatic1234, marine56789 and coral reef environments101171213. It can convey multiple and different lethal and sub-lethal effects in aquatic taxa as diverse as marine bacteria14'15. microalgae16, protozoans17, cnideria18, molluscs19'20, sea urchins21, crustaceans22, and fish23'24'25.

Compounding the problem, oxybenzone becomes more toxic when the exposures occur in sunlight (or artificial light containing UV). Additionally, oxybenzone is also known to act as an endocrine disruptor with non-monotonic dose responses (meaning low doses can have greater endocrine disrupting effects than at higher doses)26/27/28. In addition, among these studies are also those that have developed ecological risk assessments (i.e., hazard quotients) 29/30/31 for various receptor species (non-coral) exposed to oxybenzone in aquatic environments.

The first evidence showing that oxybenzone is a threat to coral reefs came in 2008, when Danovaro et al.32 showed that oxybenzone could induce coral bleaching. Our work33 provided evidence for more precise toxicity effects using exposure-response profiles and photo-enhanced toxicity characteristics of oxybenzone (i.e., oxybenzone is more toxic in sunlight) in corals and provided insights into the toxicopathology of corals exposed to oxybenzone. Multiple toxicity endpoints were assessed to determine toxicity for coral larvae including gross deformities, DNA damage, and bleaching. Cell mortality in primary coral cell cultures was used in an in vitro assay across multiple coral species to assess oxybenzone toxicity and species sensitivities to the compound. Our results showed that gross developmental deformities in coral larvae of differing degrees across all concentrations tested and after 8 h exposure their movements ceased. These gross observations were underscored by subcellular pathologies showing catastrophic tissue lysis and cellular degradation, particularly at the surface of the larvae. The larvae also displayed  $reduced \ chlorophyll \ fluorescence \ indicative \ of \ bleaching \ at \ all \ concentrations \ tested.$ 

The accumulation of DNA damage underscores the potential threat of oxybenzone to corals and  $other\ coral\ reef\ organisms.\ It\ has\ implications\ for\ potential\ impacts\ to\ larval\ development,\ coral\ and\ property of the proper$ recruitment and juvenile survival and on a larger scale implications for impacts to the adult coral's reproductive effort and the fitness of coral populations exposed to oxybenzone now and in the future. Our laboratory studies included concentrations levels of oxybenzone that were in the same range as actual levels measured in coral reef zones in the U.S. Virgin Islands and in the




Fig. 1. Exposure-response of Fungia coral to commercial sunscreen lotion formulation. commercial sunscreen lotion formulation. This experiment was to evaluate the responsion of coral to a water-accommodated fraction (WAF) of a commercial sunscreen formulation and to determine the amount of sunscreen components that are taken up into coral stusses, Penals A. 86 show response of Fungia sp. after 23 h exposure to WAF of a commercial sunscreen. Musus sheets and expansion of surface epithelial tissues in response to sunscreen exposure, a reaction similar to that described by Danovaro et al. (2008). Panal C is sunscreen product label of active ingredients in tested formulation. Tissue extracts of exposed cora's showed oxybenzone levels could bloaccumulate to 220.7 parts per trillion (rg/L) after 48h exposure.

A follow-on experiment conducted in our laboratory with adult coral (Fungia sp.) showed that when exposed to a water accommodated fraction of a popular sunscreen formulation (Fig. 1), the corals exuded large amounts of mucus and lifted epithelial layers of their surface tissues. Analytical chemistry determined that coral tissues do bioaccumulate active sunscreen ingredients (results presented in 2016 at the International Coral Reef Symposium, Honolulu HI).

A new study<sub>34</sub> builds on previous work to provide further information indicating a high bioaccumulative potential for oxybenzone to accumulate into coral tissues and a preliminary risk assessment for coral species exposed to oxybenzone and other sunscreen contaminants. The authors caution of an increased risk during coral spawning seasons and for corals close to aquatic recreational hotspots

The preponderance of scientific evidence provided by our work and that of many others supports a reasonable conclusion that oxybenzone is a threat to coral and can threaten overall coral reef health. Managing the exposure of corals and other reef organisms is one essential step for reducing this threat on reef ecosystems.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, may I request a ruling on a potential conflict? I am an anti-skin cancer activist, a purchaser, and an ardent user of sunscreen," and the Chair ruled, "no conflict."

Representative Har continued to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I wasn't going to say anything, but please register a no vote, and just very briefly, I'd like to rebut some of the comments of the Minority Floor Leader. A new study was released on March 1, 2018 on the human and natural impacts on coral reefs, and they used 10 years-worth of data to learn about what is negatively impacting our coral reefs. The study concluded that overfishing, sedimentation, coastal development, and runoff are the biggest threat to Hawaii's coral reefs. The study did not cite any sunscreen ingredients as posing dangers to our coral reefs. And so for these reasons, Mr. Speaker, I remain in opposition. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'll mention a few things I may have otherwise put in the Journal. In terms of what really is hurting our reefs, it's sedimentation. Probably 80% of the variance is sedimentation, and if you're not looking for the impact of oxybenzone and octinoxate, you're not going to find it. But it's not only in the individual reefs, it's also in the fish, and for some of the data, it says it's even a women's and a men's hormonal issue, that it affects the adrenaline. More feminizing men and more, even with fish, having their, almost becoming asexual, if you will.

"Having said that, this is a chemistry that I think is on the precipice of saying, it's wiser to side or err with the data that's out there, being that when we have our beaches as the primary destination in the world, sand, surf and Hawaii beaches, Mr. Speaker, this is something that is, it won't hurt anybody, because these are chemicals that are produced primarily, oxybenzone comes out of China by the ton. And the industry knows that they can make other chemical substitutes, particularly something with zinc in it. Having said that, there's no real danger to the economic theories, and for those who have beautiful faces like the previous speaker and others in this particular Chamber, they will not be harmed by any of these changes in the chemistry. Having said that, Mr. Speaker, my future comments will remain the Journal. Thank you."

"These companies want to do business here, they're willing to pay the price to do business here, they're willing to bid, the County of Honolulu has bids in excess of \$1,000 per pole right now, and yet competitors are coming in here and trying to bulldoze lawmakers over, and maybe that's an easier,

cheaper route. If they can convince us to let them do it for \$40 a pole, then of course they're going to try to do it, but we shouldn't give in like that. I think it really, if it ends up giving a big discount to these multibillion-dollar corporations who are willing to pay the price to do the business, I think that's wrong. And that's my concern, and I hope you all share my concerns and watch this through conference committee, and don't let that happen. Thank you."

Representative Cachola rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations. My concern is about the negative impact of this project on the health issue, and I hope that they will look into that, because radiation really causes a lot of concerns, and it might impact the health of people. And also, it affects the budget of airports, not only in Honolulu, but every place. So for that reason, at this time I'll be voting with reservations. Thank you."

"Mr. Speaker, 1492, in support, brief comment. Mr. Speaker, we have a beautiful building here, which is going to be celebrated for its 50th year. I just want to say for the record that every beautiful building like the State Capitol throughout the nation usually has a gift shop that has a couple of things like pins and lapel pins, particularly. Those things, and our mousepads, those things are souvenirs because when visitors come, they like to have a takeaway. So I would hope some of the money that's being appropriated for this will be creative, will be entrepreneurial, and that we, like the beautiful logo in front of your podium, we at least have a pin for visitors to buy, or pens, or something, rather than, say, we cut the leis and we have the cake, and we say, yeah it's a great building for 50 years, but we don't have anything lasting that people can take away. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I hope this money is well spent, that it'll last longer, so the next 50th year, there'll at least be other commendations for it. Thank you."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I'm in support, and we do have a gift shop law on the books thanks to my good friend from Judiciary, however, it takes the people upstairs to actually implement it. So, help us with that one. Thanks."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, just with slight reservations in regards to the impact for small businesses. Some of the businesses that have contacted me in regards to this were concerned because they do have their own type of funding where all of their employees contribute to a paid leave fund, and some of them are taking care of their employees even better than the State ever would be. One specific business who called me and said that this is, might propose that they take care of half of an employee's pay if they get sick or if there's a family death. One of the businesses that I spoke with, they actually paid a full salary for one of their employees that contracted cancer for a year and a half, and this is because the businesses that we have here in Hawaii are so good to their employees and know how to treat them.

"So I just wanted to speak out with that small concern for those who are doing their part, and making sure that we're not making it harder or bringing up costs, or the cost of living, in doing something that is and should be implemented, but I definitely think that businesses who are taking that initiative should also be applauded for their efforts. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, a no vote for now, with the hope it'll be amended to the extent of acknowledging that we are a state of small businesses. But the data

is that 80% of small businesses never reach their 5th birthday, that's just the reality. Making and surviving in Hawaii as a business is often difficult, this will make it more difficult. Some businesses, however, can afford this. What I'm making a plea for are the mom and pops. Eighty percent of our businesses have 20 or less employees. Really, really small. SBA says 500 below. Well, Hawaii's 80% less than 20 employees.

"So Mr. Speaker, this one says, well yeah we have a carve-out, but we're going to subsidize or we're going to give you grants to get family leave. I would say, let's put it down to 5 or 10 employees, and let's just exempt them, Mr. Speaker. That would be more fair. For those who are struggling to survive to hire employees, it would be fairer than saying, well we're going to have money available in a fund, which then we can give grants or subsidies. I don't think that's going to be fair for the mom and poppers, or those new businesses that hire, new businesses create 70% of all new employment, that's an area we want to nurture, we don't want to have a suppression on it, and this bill will be a suppressing factor.

"For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I would hope those in this Chamber and in the conference committee will at least consider ratcheting it down to the really small guys, and exempting them, and not asking them to qualify for scholarships or grants under this bill. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative DeCoite rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations. Actually, for the first time, I agree with the Representative from Hawaii Kai, and if I could incorporate his words into the Journal, and I would like to add additional comments to the Journal. Thank you, Mr. Speaker," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative DeCoite's written remarks are as follows:

"With reservations. I have reservations on this bill because I have heard from many in my district who may be negatively affected by this bill because it will increase their costs of doing business. This bill will affect all employers, large or small; and will also impact all employees because they will have to make payments into this new Paid Family Leave Special Fund. Most benefits such as this are entirely employer paid and I believe that paid family leave may eventually have to be borne only by employers. One negative consequence if this bill passes is that employers may end up reducing their staff to pay for this additional cost; another negative consequence is that employers may reduce current benefits to pay for this new one. These negative consequences are not what we want or need. I also recognize the need that employees have in taking care of their families, so I hope that as this bill moves forward, we will be able to find the right balance that we can all live with. *Mahalo*."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2990, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FAMILY LEAVE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives DeCoite and Tupola voting aye with reservations, with Representative Ward voting no, and with Representatives Lee, Lowen, McDermott, Souki and Tokioka being excused.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 648, SD 1, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Choy rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Say rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Strong support, comments to the Journal. Thank you."

Representative McKelvey's written remarks are as follows:

"I am ecstatic about the passage of the measure. This is something the counties have sought from the Legislature since I began serving in 2006. Getting state lawmakers, the majority of them from Oahu, to agree to give the counties more TAT funding has been difficult and it's been a slog for one reason or another. The money allows the counties to invest in tourism related services, like expanding ocean lifeguard services, enhancing parks, improving the Waiehu Municipal Golf Course, and doing more to develop bicycle paths and green ways. What rankled neighbor islanders last year

when the transient accommodations tax was raised by a percentage point (9.25% to 10.25%) for 13 years to pay for Honolulu's rail project, there were no benefits of the increase coming back to the neighbor islands as well. Now, with the passage of the Senate bill Tuesday, there's something that comes back to us. It helps to offset revenue that should have stayed in the neighbor islands. I hope that those in the Senate will see what we're trying to do and see it as a great idea. This is what the counties have wanted forever."

Representative Woodson rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, strong support, written comments, please."

Representative Woodson's written remarks are as follows:

"We should resist the us versus them mentality. The Legislature should debate policy based on the needs of particular communities. I urge my colleagues to support this measure."

Representative Quinlan rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Strong support, written comments, please."

Representative Quinlan's written remarks are as follows:

"Over the years we have seen an increase in the number of visitors but not a concomitant increase in tourism mitigation funding to the counties. This bill goes a long way towards a more equitable revenue sharing environment."

Representative Gates rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Strong support, written comments."

Representative Gates's written remarks are as follows:

"Due to the cap on the counties' share of TAT revenues and the disproportionate growth of the tourism industry, the counties have been receiving less than their rightful share. Let us support the tourism industry and counties by supporting this bill and fairly distributing the TAT revenues. *Mahalo*."

Representative Holt rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Same request."

Representative Holt's written remarks are as follows:

"Due to the cap on the counties' share of TAT revenues and the disproportionate growth of the tourism industry, the counties have been receiving less than their rightful share. This measure will provide much needed financial support for the neighbor islands in support of the tourism industry. *Mahalo*."

Representative San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Same request."

Representative San Buenaventura's written remarks are as follows:

"This bill would allocate additional transient accommodations tax revenues to the counties of Kauai, Hawaii and Maui. Many legislators, including myself, have fought for years to increase the neighbor islands' share of the TAT and believe that this measure is long overdue. This bill will provide the means for the counties to address their infrastructure needs which will help them accommodate the growing number of visitors to the outer islands and, among other things, help pave the way for economic self-sufficiency.

"I would also like to note my disappointment in those who are opposing this bill based on the opinion that Oahu legislators must, above all costs, fend for their own interest. It is this kind of divisive attitude that has caused unnecessary conflict amongst the public and unnecessarily prohibits our ability to work together toward our long-term goals.

"I would like to reiterate my strong support for this bill and express my gratitude to the Finance Committee and House leadership for working with me and my fellow outer-island legislators in crafting this bill and moving it forward."

Representative DeCoite rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative DeCoite's written remarks are as follows:

"With reservations. I don't believe this bill is fair to Honolulu since it is left out. Why? We are increasing each county's share of the TAT and should also include Honolulu. *Mahalo*."

Representative Har rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Creagan rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Strong support. Thank you."

Representative Say rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is my second time up. Even though I'm a no vote, personally I truly believe in helping all the neighbor islands. My point to all of the members of this House, after all these years, is a question of fairness and equality. This measure before us that is in second reading will not address any other issue but a grant-in-aid to the other three counties, which I truly agree. But I also think about the 800,000 individuals on Oahu that may not get a fair share of the general fund. I truly hope, I truly hope, because I get another chance on third reading, I truly hope that the Oahu members of this House will support a grant-in-aid tied to the percentage of what this draft is all about.

"I've shown my colors this afternoon, and I'm happy that those that, from Oahu, do not support helping the County of Oahu for police, fire, emergency medical services, *et cetera*, cannot get a fair share of what the general fund is all about. I disagree with the statements made by other individuals that it is tied to our bill that was addressed during the special session. No, it is a separate bill for Oahu only at the expense of the neighbor island colleagues. My good friend from Hawaii Kai giving me a wink goes and said, what are you talking about? But my point of the matter is, fairness and equality for the people of Oahu. Why do you now address only Kauai, Maui and the Big Island? Why? And we don't get anything from Oahu. We are the majority, the members of Oahu."

Representative Morikawa rose to a point of order, stating:

"Point of order, can the speaker please address the Speaker."

The Chair addressed Representative Say, stating:

"Yes, please address the Chair, Representative. Please proceed."

Representative Say continued, stating:

"I apologize, Mr. Speaker. It's been done many a times throughout my career that I allow members to look at other members, *et cetera*, of the House, and I can respect what the Floor Leader is talking about. But today is basically, on second reading placed on the calendar for third reading, that I challenge my Oahu members to support me, to support Oahu, for our firefighters, for our police, our lifeguards, and other city and county services that they are struggling. Mr. Speaker, very candidly and honestly, the Representatives from this House have done a tremendous job at our neighborhood boards."

Representative LoPresti rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Say continued, stating:

"Thank you very much, Representative. The colleagues from Oahu, from the three neighborhood boards I do attend, really support the county services also. I see the police department comes before the neighborhood board, the fire department, and the only one, Mr. Speaker, that doesn't show up every time, and doesn't show up, is the City and County Parks Department.

"But what I'm saying to all of us on Oahu, we truly believe that Oahu should get a fair share from the general fund. It's not the TAT, it's not the TAT, it's a separate issue. And that's why this afternoon I have to say my piece on second reading. To educate the members of Oahu who are not on Finance, to consider that if there is a floor amendment, would you consider, considering and incorporating Oahu as part of the general fund appropriation as a grant-in-aid to the counties of Oahu, Maui, Kauai and Hawaii. Thank you."

Representative Todd rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support. I just wanted to thank the Finance Committee and all of the neighbor island Representatives and Oahu Representatives who were very kind to us with this piece of legislation, and did want to point out that historically, Oahu has received on the order of \$25 million-plus for the Hawaii Convention Center, as well as Turtle Bay, which provides zero impact on the neighbor islands. Thank you."

Representative San Buenaventura rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would also like to point out that, I stand in strong support, and basically, I resent the divisiveness that occurred in special session, and the discussion of the divisiveness that is occurring now. I stood up in support of the TAT for Oahu as a neighbor island Representative, and I had to withstand the criticism of my neighbor island constituents because I stood up for Oahu. We represent the State, and we should look out in favor of the State, and for prior speakers to tell Oahu Representatives to stand up against us, that's the kind of divisiveness that we should stand against. Thank you."

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support, Mr. Speaker. Just want to have the comments of the Representatives from Hilo and Puna be reflected as my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ito rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, support with a comment. Mr. Speaker, I've often said that this is the marketplace of ideas. Healthy debate is not divisive. Healthy debate is bringing the idea to the state where you will either buy it, or you won't buy it. And I would discourage people to think that because we disagree, that we're disagreeable. Particularly as from the minority's point of view, good, healthy debate is good for democracy, we are in an advocacy system where people try to sell their ideas, and I think it's very healthy, even on second reading. We don't do first reading, but second reading gives us an opportunity to at least flag a bill that's dear to people's hearts or to their districts. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, this marketplace of ideas is very healthy and strong this day. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Reservations. I just wanted to state that I agree with much of what my colleague from Palolo has said, and I'm very strong reservations about this. Thank you."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I just wanted to also appreciate the comments from our neighbor island Representatives, and especially because we went through the special session and knew what they had to go through.

I think that it is timely for us to do this, as well as, the TAT has increased exponentially and they still haven't gotten a further cut. Now bear in mind, what might equal a dollar here, could be 5 or 10 or 20 times more for a neighbor islander because of the cost that it takes to get there, because of the access to resources. We joke around in my district that we feel like we're our own county because we're farther away from resources as well, but that's the reality of 'fairness,' is that we're talking about distances, we're talking about less businesses, less airports, less everything that we have here that they don't have. And so I think that it is definitely discussable in the next a sufficient amount of TAT to help out the counties, especially for all of the issues that we've been talking about before, from emergency services, to ambulances, to schools that haven't been fixed, to the jails that look exactly the same as 30 years ago on some of the neighbor islands, and I think it's about time that we helped. Thank you."

Representative DeCoite rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, second time, again with reservations. Maybe I'm naïve to the situation, and I'll just resort this into the fact that I'm grateful for the TAT for the neighbor islands, mind you Maui County also falls under the island of Molokai, Molokai with the highest socioeconomic impacts. No jobs, unemployment. I believe that we as neighbor island people need to look back towards Oahu and be fair about the process of making sure that you folks also receive fair and access treatment. We have continuously on the neighbor islands taken advantage of the general funds that you folks have generously supported us as neighbor islands, and yet we as neighbor islands have not been able to stand on our own two feet. I believe that you folks also deserve a fair share, and whether or not it is unlikely of me to make that statement, I think that you folks also deserve your fair share to help the people of Oahu. I'm very grateful for what you folks have done for us, but in all due respect, you folks also have contributed to us as neighbor island people. And for that reason, with reservations again for the second time, and permission to add additional comments to the Journal. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 648, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading, with Representatives DeCoite, Har and LoPresti voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Choy, Ito and Say voting no, and with Representatives Lee, Lowen, McDermott, Souki and Tokioka being excused.

Ms. Meli James, President, Hawaii Venture Capital Association, representing Mr. Olin Lagon, CTO, and Mr. Forest Frizzel, CEO, Shifted Energy, Agriculture and Clean Tech Entrepreneur of the Year; and Mr. Jim Reddekopp, Owner, Hawaiian Vanilla Company, Consumer Packaged Goods Entrepreneur of the Year.

Representative Evans recognized Representative Keohokalole for his steadfast commitment to providing an environment for ingenuity, innovation, vision and entrepreneurship for our next generation of business leaders and consistently contributing to the startup community, and introduced honoree who was seated on the Floor of the House:

Representative Jarrett Keohokalole, Startup Paradise Champion.

Representative Ward, as a founding member of the Hawaii Venture Capital Association, congratulated the awardees and recognized them as the hope and the future for Hawaii's economy.

Representative Tupola congratulated Ms. Meli James on the success of Mana Up, and thanked her for all she has done for entrepreneurs and businesses in the State of Hawaii.

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 220 was adopted, with Representatives Choy, Souki and Tokioka being excused.

At 12:17 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:38 o'clock p.m.

### SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Morikawa, seconded by Representative Ward and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering certain Senate Bills for Third Reading by consent calendar. (Representatives Choy, Ichiyama, Souki and Tokioka were excused.)

## THIRD READING

## S.B. No. 648, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that S.B. No. 648, SD 1, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Say rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I will be very brief, but let me start off by saying that I am in opposition to this House Draft 1. I would have liked to have had this House consider the Senate Draft 1 that dealt with the earned income tax credit, it dealt with the restore the income tax rates for our high income residents, and removed the sunset date for the refundable food excise tax credit, which is all part of our democratic position of the Democratic Party, the progressives and the liberals. So that is one of the reasons why I'm in opposition to this measure. And secondly, on Friday, which I stated for the record, I hope there was some equality in reference to Oahu getting a fair share of the general fund. Thank you very much."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support. This measure has had due consideration by members of the Finance Committee. We have other measures taking into account the other provisions, and as we continue with this session we hope that all of these measures get considered by both the Senate and the House. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Luke rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you. In support of Senate Bill 648, Senate Draft 1, House Draft 1. This is a continuous discussion from the special session. During special session, we wanted to thank all the members for your patience and working through the tough issue of additional funding for rail, and I know that in itself took a lot of energy and debate out of both houses, both the House and the Senate. And we especially wanted to thank the neighbor island members, whether you voted in support of rail or in opposition of that special session vote. It was a tough thing that we as Oahu legislators asked of the neighbor island Representatives in that because of difficulty in trying to figure out the TAT distribution, we asked this House to support funding the rail project through a statewide TAT. And whether you agree or disagree with that approach, at that point in time, including the Star-Advertiser editorial board, believed that that was the best approach that the Legislature has taken.

"At the end of the special session, this House, especially you, Speaker, has made a commitment to work with the neighbor islands, especially with the neighbor island colleagues, to work on providing equity for the neighbor islands, and we heard that throughout either special session and coming into this session. This is the result of that effort and working with the neighbor island Representatives and some of the leadership members and some of the councilmembers. This now provides equity to the neighbor islands, and again, we wanted to thank the neighbor island Representatives for taking a hard stand during special session and providing support for Oahu's rail project.

"Just to clarify for the record, the underlying bill, Senate Bill 648, deals with EITC, we did that last year, and that's why we used this vehicle. Funding, taxing at the high-rate, we did that last year, and that's why we used this vehicle. And then the third section, the credit, we did that last year, and that's why this was a bill that was lying in conference, where we addressed all the aspects in the underlying bill, and that's why we felt it was perfect to use this vehicle, because there was no other additional things that are left in the substantive portion of that vehicle that needed to be addressed this year. Thank you."

Representative Morikawa rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Strong support. Mr. Speaker, I've always been concerned about how the counties spend the money that they do get from TAT, and I think this measure does hook the spending to a general plan, a tourism strategic plan, or a development plan, and for that I am more assured that this will be used to impact each islands' tourism. Thank you."

Representative Har rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representative Say be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Woodson rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, strong support, written comments, please. Thank you."

Representative Woodson's written remarks are as follows:

"We should resist the us versus them mentality. The Legislature should debate policy based on the needs of particular communities. I urge my colleagues to support this measure."

Representative Creagan rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in strong support. I think the county councils probably going to be considering a rise in the GET tax for the neighbor islands, and I'm hopeful that this bill will stave off that increase, and I thank you for this bill."

Representative Nakashima rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. Mr. Speaker, I would like to acknowledge the work of the Finance Committee and the Finance Chair and the leadership of the House for bringing this measure forward. I would like to also request additional comments in the record. Thank you."

Representative Nakashima's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support of SB 648, and thank the Finance Committee and Chair for bringing this measure forward to the floor of the House for consideration. This bill will increase transient accommodations tax money provided to all of the neighbor island counties totaling more than \$36 million.

"This is very much a bill that recognizes the large investment that the Legislature committed to the City and County of Honolulu during the interim when the TAT was increased statewide to provide additional funding for the Honolulu Rail project. This bill will limit the expenditure of these funds to county plans and programs that have already been adopted by the county for county services such as park maintenance, police and fire protection, and infrastructure repairs—public services and recreational areas that are used extensively by both residents and tourists alike.

"The TAT is paid by visitor accommodations to the State and allocated to several groups, including the counties, to pay for visitor released expenses. Remember, these taxes are almost entirely paid for by tourists staying in our hotels. Not by residents.

"As amended, SB 648, SD 1, HD 1 will increase the amount of the TAT revenues for the neighbor islands:

- Increasing Hawaii Island's TAT revenues from \$19,158,000 to \$31,248,000.
- Increasing Kauai's TAT revenues from \$14,935,000 to \$24,360,000.
- Increasing Maui's TAT revenues from \$23,484,000 to \$38,304,000.

"The TAT amount for the City & County of Honolulu is unchanged for a total of \$45.4 million per year.

"I believe that this strikes a fair balance recognizing the growing needs in the counties and will serve as a stopgap measure while we more closely examine the current need for re-balancing and re-directing the general excise tax, income tax and TAT to better serve the need of our citizens and provide a healthier economy for all of Hawaii."

Representative San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, in strong support. I also thank leadership, Finance Chair for introducing this measure and in taking into account the concerns we have on the neighbor islands. I'd also like to submit further written comments to the Journal. Thanks."

Representative San Buenaventura's written remarks are as follows:

"This bill would allocate additional transient accommodations tax revenues to the counties of Kauai, Hawaii and Maui. Many legislators, including myself, have fought for years to increase the neighbor islands' share of the TAT and believe that this measure is long overdue. This bill will provide the means for the counties to address their infrastructure needs which will help them accommodate the growing number of visitors to the outer islands and, among other things, help pave the way for economic self-sufficiency.

"I would also like to note my disappointment in those who are opposing this bill based on the opinion that Oahu legislators must, above all costs, fend for their own interest. It is this kind of divisive attitude that has caused unnecessary conflict amongst the public and unnecessarily prohibits our ability to work together toward our long-term goals.

"I would like to reiterate my strong support for this bill and express my gratitude to the Finance Committee and House leadership for working with me and my fellow outer-island legislators in crafting this bill and moving it forward."

Representative Say rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, my second time, please. I'll be very brief at this point in time, but let me say this all the Members of the House. What we pass today

may have some unintended consequences, and I hope, I truly hope, that when the counties do receive these particular general funds, they will do it for primarily capital improvement projects. The reason why is very simple. Once you depend on that allotment of the TAT for the next 12 years, you'll be providing more jobs, more opportunities, but also the fact that you'll be relying on it.

"Yes, one of our colleagues stated for the record this afternoon that this may alleviate some of our problems, Mr. Speaker, in regards to not raising property taxes for some of our three counties that are going to be receiving it. I don't believe that should be the approach to look at, as far as government financing. Why? It's all a stopgap measure.

"This is a 12-year appropriation that the State of Hawaii, the State Legislature of the House and, I don't know what the Senate's going to do, but it's something that is going to cost all of us, during that 12-year cycle, over close to a half a billion dollars. And it is for this reason that I stated earlier that I wish Oahu had some small share of the general fund of the transient accommodations tax that goes into the state general fund. And for these reasons why I share this, because once you open up the can of worms of depending on this, some of you who are here 12 years from now are going to be stuck in regards to determining, are you going to extend the TAT. It may be the next six years, no one knows what is the forecast, the future of our great country that we love, and this great state that we love. But be cautious, be aware of the unintended consequences that may occur. Thank you."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I wasn't planning to speak today, but the comments of the previous speaker, I guess, I wanted to rise because there is actually already an allocation from the TAT for the City and County of Honolulu. Special session, the 1%. Rail is a municipal, federal project, period. It's going to fall on the municipality to fund rail. This 1% gave them funding that they would otherwise have to take from other services. What is happening today is basically an acknowledgement and restoration of what we've been trying, since I've been a freshman, is to get our allocation of the TAT for our services. The 1% coming in is going to be generated by Maui tourists, that's why neighbor islanders were so upset about it, and this restores what many saw as neighbor island TAT coming in to subsidize a City and County of Honolulu-only project.

"So thank you for this bill, and I know the people of Maui will put it to good use to make sure, and I really like the master plan idea, because we don't want to use this to offset things in the past that were rightfully so not related to infrastructure or the impact of quality of life from our visitor industry. Thank you."

Representative DeCoite rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, just for clarification with our last speaker from Lahaina. I'm rising in support, but a clarification. Maui County, which includes Molokai and Lanai. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 648, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 44 ayes to 3 noes, with Representative Har voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Ito, McDermott and Say voting no, and with Representatives Choy, Ichiyama, Souki and Tokioka being excused.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. I realize this is your resolution, but I think I'm closer to needing these facilities than you are, so have some consideration for the elderly, I would really appreciate that. This resolution calls for the closure of two state-run long-term care facilities, Leahi Hospital and Maluhia Long-Term Care Health Center. They're up for consideration for closing because they're losing money.

"Mr. Speaker, in the last few days, this Chamber has been very, very generous in funding different areas of government, and I think this is an area of government that we should fund. And it seems, because of our generosity, we do have the money to fund these two long-term care facilities, specifically built for our less fortunate. Mr. Speaker, we need to support facilities of this type, and of course, long-term care beds are very, very few and hard to find, and even harder to find for our less fortunate. That's why, Mr. Speaker, today I stand in opposition to this particular resolution. Thank you."

Representative Ohno rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him on both measures, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kobayashi rose to speak in support of both measures with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand with grave reservations. Compared to the Representative from Manoa, by age I'm even closer to needing these long-term care beds. We have a crisis on our hands in that more and more citizens are becoming seniors, and these beds are in great need.

"As of the prior fiscal year, beginning in 2016, approximately one-fourth of the beds at Leahi Hospital and Maluhia Hospital were closed for lack of approximately \$10 million. Currently, the reimbursement for Medicare and Medicaid averages, kind of sort of, in the range of \$200 per day for these beds. However, the costs are in the range of double that, approximately \$400 per day. That gap is increasing because, as you know, the cost of medical care as a whole has been increasing faster than normal inflation. At the same time, the cost of government fringe benefits are increasing much faster than the so-called norm. And reimbursements for Medicare and Medicaid are not keeping up.

"So what we see as a gap will increase. When these beds closed a year and half, approximately, ago, HHSC, Hawaii Health Systems Corporation, said that they can expect either further cuts or privatization.

"For one, I would like to see more long-term care beds, not less. However, the fiscal reality is that the current funding model does not work, will cost the State more in the future, and unfortunately, when that future comes, we will be needing more long-term care beds. So for those reasons, I stand in with reservations. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of both measures with reservations, stating:

"With reservations. I'd like to adopt the words of the previous speaker as if they were my own, subtracting the age reference. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Morikawa rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. I know that we need more beds, but I think we need to look at what is quality, what can the State do as far as providing a quality facility, and I think this study might help us determine that, because both hospitals are not up to what I would want them to be, personally, and I think, is it better to beef up one and perhaps shut the other, where there is more competition in that area? I think this is something worth looking into, we can't continue to put money into the two facilities and not bring them up to the best standards. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Cachola rose to speak in support of both measures with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, strong reservations, and I'd like to adopt the remarks made by the Representative of District 19 as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him on both measures, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Takayama rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him on both measures, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Thielen rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her on both measures, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tupola rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her on both measures, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Hashem rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him on both measures, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Har rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her on both measures, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him on both measures, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. Mr. Speaker, in support because as we look at the ecosystem for long-term care beds, aging in place, the multitude of facilities and situations where we're going to need taking care of our elderly. As we consider this measure and other measures that are looking to invest in caregiving, kupuna care, we really have to look at the entire ecosystem, and this resolution does that. This resolution looks at whether or not these long-term beds, on this island, are the best use of our monies. So, in support, Mr. Speaker. Thank you."

Representative Mizuno rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I can appreciate this is second reading. Nonetheless, the State of Hawaii is graying faster than any state in the nation. It's called the silver tsunami, Mr. Speaker. One in four of our residents by year 2020 will be age 60 or older. So I support the resolutions before us, and I'd like to adopt the words of the Vice Chair of Health & Human Services, as well as the words by both the Majority Floor Leader and the Majority Leader, and note that the study is worthy. We need to look at a solution, a long-term solution for our  $k\bar{u}puna$ . Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the reports of the Committee were adopted and H.R. Which means there will be a boost, rather than a negative. I think as we stay tuned to this particular federal legislation, this resolution may be turned on its head. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tokioka submitted the following:

"Mr. Speaker, Speaker Emeritus Souki has spent most of his life building a legacy of service. In the past 35 years, Speaker Souki has helped see the State of Hawaii through some of its biggest challenges and most tumultuous

political periods. With all the changes we have seen over the years, his strong leadership has remained one of the few constants.

"Perhaps Speaker Emeritus Souki's greatest strength as a legislator is his ability to balance compassion and tenacity. Year after year, he has earned his reputation as a champion of the underprivileged and disadvantaged. Some call him stubborn, but he is at his most relentless when he is defending the interests of those who might otherwise be overlooked.

"I have tremendous respect for the contributions he has made and a great appreciation for what he has taught me about serving as a legislator. One of the most important traits that Speaker Emeritus Souki shared with us is the ability to put aside personal disagreements and keep our emotions separate from our decisions. In heated situations, Speaker Emeritus Souki always focused on the task at hand. He did not let his feelings distract him from his duty to serve. Representative Ward submitted the following:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I am writing comments into the Journal to commend Speaker Emeritus Joseph M. Souki for 36 years of service to this body, his constituents, and the people of Hawaii. I am saddened that his distinguished career in public service is ending in such a manner, but am grateful for the good he has done for our state.

"I will never forget the budget discussions many years ago, in which then Speaker Souki called for my removal from the House Floor. While often adversaries on a number of policy issues, Speaker Emeritus Souki and I maintained a civil and friendly relationship over the 20+ years we have served together in this body, even though I'm the only member to be kicked off the Floor of the House because of Speaker.

On March 30, 2018, I will resign my position as an elected member of Hawai'i's House of Representatives. For over half a century I have had the high privilege and honor of faithfully serving not only my constituents on Maui, but all of the people of the State of Hawai'i. My political life began as an officer and Precinct Chairman on Maui in 1966.

Over the years I was honored by being a delegate to the State

Constitution Convention, a member of the Hawai'i State Legislature since 1982,

Speaker of the House from 1993 – 1999, and Speaker Emeritus from 2000 – 2012.

In all my years of public service, I have attempted to serve with honor and dignity. I have championed the rights of all without regard to race, ethnicity, or gender.

I have learned in the last few weeks that certain women have complained to the Hawai'i State Ethics Committee, accusing me of inappropriate and unwelcome conduct. That conduct included "touching" and "kissing" more than one woman inappropriately. I am told that the conduct complained of occurred between 3 and 8 years ago.

I have absolutely no memory of ever acting inappropriately with any women at any time, as a member of the House or in a private setting.

I am greatly saddened that something I did was misunderstood and believed to be inappropriate conduct.

I have always been a fighter. I have fought to remedy injustices that affect our citizens' everyday lives. I have never avoided standing up for what I believed to be a just cause.

As to the allegations currently filed against me, I have made the difficult decision to avoid a media circus by stepping down without a public confrontation with my accusers.

I do not intend to have my wife and family agonize through public hearings before the Ethics Committee or elsewhere.

I do not want my colleagues in the legislature to waster their valuable time in deciding where the truth lies, and what sanctions against me, if any, are appropriate.

I will not force my accusers to be examined publicly by my attorney or others about what they perceived as my wrongful conduct.

I apologize to the women that believe I treated them in any unwanted and inappropriate manner.

At the age of 86, this was to be my last year of service to the people of Hawaii. I have agreed to resign before the end of the current session.

In conclusion, I can safely say to everyone who supported me in politics, or as a friend, I have always strived to conduct myself in a respectful manner befitting my office. I have never intentionally violated the trust, confidence, and integrity place on me by the people.

I thank everyone who has shared my life with me as a public servant.

Representative Gates rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support of SB 2051. I believe that this bill is a game changer that I believe will modernize our education system. This measure will allow for schools across the state, like Waianae High School in District 44, to continue to improve on the innovative work they are doing with programs such as Searider Productions and the Marine Science Learning Center. Searider Productions is an award-winning multimedia program that allows students to design and sell products such as t-shirts, hats and other apparel to the public, which generates revenue for the program. The Marine Science Learning Center instructs students on how to be modern hydroponic farmers, which sells premium *ogo* and other products to places such as Costco and Foodland.

"With this bill, students will learn how to be entrepreneurs and start businesses, greatly contributing to the economic health and vitality of our local communities by allowing students to engage in commercial enterprises through their school curriculum, and I humbly ask members to support the passing of this measure. *Mahalo*."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2051, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes, with Representatives Choy, Fukumoto, Holt, Lee and McKelvey being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1814-18) recommending that S.B. No. 3070, SD 2, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and

S.B. No. 3070, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes, with Representatives Choy, Fukumoto, Holt, Lee and McKelvey being excused.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2905, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ON-SITE EARLY CHILDHOOD FACILITIES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes, with Representatives Choy, Fukumoto, Holt, Lee and McKelvey being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1820-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2774, SD 1, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2774, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INSURANCE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes, with Representatives Choy, Fukumoto, Holt, Lee and McKelvey being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1821-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2945, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2945, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LIQUOR," passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes, with Representatives Choy, Fukumoto, Holt, Lee and McKelvey being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1822-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2522, SD 1, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2522, SD 1, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative McDermott rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, no vote and some comments. This measure establishes the Agricultural Accelerator Program to authorize ADC to invest in existing or new agricultural businesses approved by the board of directors of ADC in return for equity, part ownership, in those private-sector ventures. And then we're going to establish an ADC accelerator special fund to provide monies that ADC may invest in these agrobusinesses under this new program.

"Why is this needed? Well, the last five years we've spent \$65 million buying agricultural land on the island of Oahu at top dollar, and in one case we paid above appraised value for that land, thereby chasing the farmer out. The average farmer can't afford to buy land or lease land when they're competing against the State who comes in and buys, last year I think we spent \$23 million on three parcels of Dole property.

"Why are we doing this? We're not farmers. So we're interfering in the market, we're coming in and buying agricultural land. Everybody knows what the heck's going on here, and everybody knows whose fiefdom this is. We're going in and buying agricultural land at inflated prices, top dollar, the most expensive agricultural land in the world, and we're reinforcing that top dollar, that top asking price, by paying it, and in one case paid over the appraised value for this land. Now, the average farmer can't compete to get on the land. He can't buy his way on the land, and he can't lease his way on the land. So our solution to creating this problem is say, hey, we will subsidize you for a piece of the action. We want a piece of your business.

"So in this session we see ADC getting into the trash business, they're getting into the livestock business, now they want a special fund to get into partially owning private-sector farming operations. They have proven to be an abysmal failure at getting farmers on the land. Why are we doing this?

"I know it's not this body's creation, it's not from this side of the building, but we are creating a fiefdom out there. One only has to look at the success, \$65 million, by the way that's money that could have gone to schools that are greatly in need across the state. All of us have schools in need of disrepair. We could have used that \$65 million instead of land banking. If you're flush with cash, land banking makes sense, but in this case with ADC, it makes no sense at all.

"Mr. Speaker, I predict the success of this venture will parallel the other ADC venture. By the way, one footnote, the land that ADC buys, or the State of Hawaii buys, the State of Hawaii does not own that land, ADC owns that land. Now, we ostensibly control ADC as a state agency, but the State of Hawaii doesn't have title to that land, the Agricultural Development Corporation holds title. It's just an interesting footnote. The board is appointed, we know who's on the board, we know who they're beholden to. This is troubling. And I know I'm not the only one in this body who feels this way about ADC and the mission creep going on here, sir.

"But again, I'll summarize and conclude, which I predict that the success of ADC will mirror the success of their Tamura warehouse project, which we paid several million dollars for a few years ago, which continues to sit vacant up in Wahiawa. No, I take that back, it's not vacant, there is a ColorTyme TV store renting one of the garages. So with that, sir, I conclude, there's something troubling here, and we should stop it. Thank you."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you. Mr. Speaker, also please register a no vote for me in this measure. Four of the farmers that were actually one of those Dole properties that got sold to the State recently, they had a huge parcel in Wahiawa and they had it subdivided between 21 different entities, but when they went in to try to buy it, similar to what my colleague said, they came up with the money and they actually offered it, and the State overbid them by more than what the appraised value was worth, so all of them were displaced, from their animals to their livestock, to everything that they had to move off of there, and they had nowhere to go. They tried to reach out to Kamehameha Schools, they're still trying to reallocate some of their property, some of their businesses.

"But again, with the lack of information we have on the effectivity of ADC, and on top of it, the type of revenue or benefit that it's bringing into the State, our bigger concern here is whether or not we should be allowing this to kind of grow and expand into an area where we have very few areas where you can farm, and when you're able to do it, it's actually almost at a loss to you and your family or to you and your company, because you're either breaking even or you're not making any money. And so this is something that we really need to think about as we push forward with all of these different measures to put it into one agency that we still haven't completed an audit for, and this is real. These companies have called me and asked me to help connect them to other lands because they don't know what to do, they don't know where to move, and there are, again, very few parcels left for them to even continue farming or doing what they did on those Dole plantations in other areas.

"So I would urge other people to look into this, as we make decisions based upon huge parcels of very few, very far-between farmlands that we have available in the state. Thank you."

Representative Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. To paraphrase a line from Hamlet, something's rotten in Denmark. And Mr. Speaker, I'm a no vote on this measure. I think it just shows, desperately, why we need to have an audit of ADC, to find out what Agribusiness Development Corporation has or has not accomplished, and what they have done or have not done with the millions of money that we have appropriated to ADC. This is just another example of what used to be called 'mission creep,' but I think we really have to call it 'mission leap,' and I cannot understand why the body doesn't just stop on this policy measure and say, first we need to hold them accountable, let's find out what they've done.

"I know that ADC has opposed any audit. That in the past has not stopped this body from passing measures to audit different branches of government when it's been appropriate to do this. I can't think of a better example than ADC, who's sitting with millions of dollars of taxpayers' money, and not a record that one could put forth to say it justifies the spending and the continued mission leap of their authority. Thank you."

Representative McDermott rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'll just be very brief. I know for a fact that ADC is interested in acquiring another \$33 million parcel, the last large parcel on this island, and I know our Finance Chair is an honest individual who works hard and does the best she can for all our members, and I admire her. I'm just wondering what the Senate is going to do, and I look with curiosity to see if that's going to be in the final budget that comes out. Because that, again, will just magnify the problem we have. Thank you, sir."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations. Mr. Speaker, this is a good news, bad news bill. Good news is, it pays attention to the farmers from a point of investing and creating in an entrepreneurial way, more farmers. We've given them lip service, now we're going to give them money. This is to, what DBEDT has done for its accelerators for non-farmers, for what the farmers can do. And it's to buy equipment and other things, and do marketing studies, et cetera. So, it's good, but where the bad news is, any corporation, particularly this one, that refuses an audit, in their testimony they think that's a bad idea, it's hard to go with them. And given what my colleagues have just said, Mr. Speaker, they deserve intense scrutiny, and an audit is a must, before I would vote full up on this. So with those reasons, I'm with reservations. Thank you."

Representative Thielen rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you. Second time, Mr. Speaker, and quickly. I would ask people to look at the vote record from the Senate side, it's pretty dramatic, with the number of noes and then the with reservations. So this is a measure that I'm sorry to see it moving forward, but at least it will go to a conference committee, unless the Senate agrees to the House's version. But I think this is, frankly, a very poor policy. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2522, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 42 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives LoPresti and Ward voting aye with reservations, with Representatives McDermott, Thielen and Tupola voting no, and with Representatives Choy, Fukumoto, Holt, Lee and McKelvey being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1823-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2556, SD 1, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

#### COMMITTEES ON CONFERENCE PROCEDURES

The Senate and the House have agreed to the following special procedures for all 2018 Regular Session Committees on Conference. These Conference procedures shall be effective from 8:00 a.m. on Monday, April 16, 2018, until 12:00 midnight on Friday, April 27, 2018.

## 1. Definitions

For purposes of these procedures:

"Chairs" refers to all of the designated chairs and co-chairs of a Conference Committee.

"Conference Committee" refers to the conference of the House Committee and the Senate Committee assigned by their respective chamber to resolve the differences between the House and the Senate over a particular measure.

"Lead chair" refers to the chair of the House Committee or the Senate Committee who is listed first on the Action Sheets, as provided by the respective chamber.

"Lead committee staff' refers to the staff of the lead Chair from the chamber from which the measure in conference originated.

"Managers" refers to all members of the House and Senate assigned to a Conference Committee.

### 2. Conference Committee Scope and Amendments

The authority of the Conference Committee shall be limited to resolving differences between the Senate and House drafts of a measure. Accordingly:

- a. With the exception of the Executive Budget, the Judiciary Budget, and the Budget of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, a Conference Committee shall not amend a measure by inserting any unrelated or new subject matter.
- To assure the integrity of individual measures, the merging of two or more distinct but related measures into one encompassing measure shall not be allowed.

## 3. Conference Committee Meeting Times and Places

Conference Committee deliberations shall take place only between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 12:00 midnight.

A Conference Committee shall meet in the conference room assigned or reserved, pursuant to the Room Scheduling Procedures and Guidelines and Room Assignment Schedule, as attached.

## 4. Initial Public-Meeting Notice

The signatures of all chairs shall be obtained before the notice of an initial meeting is posted or distributed. Prior to offering the initial meeting notice for signatures, the chairs shall consult with one another on the information to be included in the notice. Lead chairs from both houses are encouraged to sign meeting notices first, before distributing them to other chairs to sign.

Chairs shall provide at least 24 hours public notice of the first meeting of the Conference Committee and are strongly encouraged to provide more than 24 hours notice if at all possible. Written notices shall be submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official postings on the Legislature's website and Capitol bulletin boards. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.

# 5. Notice of Subsequent Meetings

a. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting but the lead chairs of both chambers agree to meet again before midnight on the same day, the lead chairs of both chambers shall publicly announce at the meeting the time and place at which the Conference Committee will reconvene. Written notice of the reconvening of the Conference Committee on the same day is not required to be distributed. However, written notice containing information on the subsequent meeting shall be submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official posting as soon as possible. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.

- b. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting but the lead chairs of both chambers agree to meet on another day, the lead chairs of both chambers shall publicly announce at the meeting the date(s), time(s), and place of the subsequent meeting(s), and submit written notice to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official posting. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.
- c. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting and the date(s), time(s), and place of future meetings are not publicly announced at that noticed meeting, chairs shall ensure that a written meeting notice, signed by the lead chairs of their respective chamber, is submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for official posting at least 24 hours in advance of the next meeting of the Conference Committee.

# 6. Attendance at Meetings

- a. To <u>convene the initial</u> conference committee meeting only the lead House and Senate chair must be present. All other conference committee managers, especially any co-chair, should attempt to be present.
- b. Once a conference has been opened, <u>reconvening of any subsequent</u> meeting of a conference committee shall require the following:
  - i. For the Senate, the lead chair or co-chair must be present.
  - ii. For the House, the lead chair must be present.
  - iii. All other conference committee managers, especially any cochair, should attempt to be present at the convening of and during each meeting.
- c. For <u>decision-making</u> at a meeting, a quorum must be present. "A quorum shall be a majority of the House Committee managers and a majority of the Senate Committee managers, and shall include the lead House and Senate chair and majority of the chairs of the Conference Committee for their respective chamber." See Section 9.a of the "Procedures." The lead House and Senate chair of the conference committee must be part of this quorum.
- d. For a measure with fiscal implications, approval must be given by the chair representing the House Finance Committee and Senate Ways and Means Committee during the decision-making on the measure.

# 7. Conference Discussion

Except as authorized by the respective chairs, only the respective chairs may speak during conference. All other managers or other authorized persons shall be recognized by their respective chairs before speaking on any issue.

# 8. Decorum in Conference Committee Meetings and Courtesy to the Public and to the Managers

- Managers shall respect the differing views of other managers and conduct themselves in a courteous manner.
- b. Chairs shall ensure that meetings convene and reconvene at scheduled times. If none of the chairs of one of the Committees are present within 15 minutes of the scheduled meeting time, the chairs of the other Committee shall have the names of the absent chairs paged through the State Capitol public address system.
- c. If none of the absent chairs are present within 30 minutes of the scheduled meeting time, the chairs present shall inform the managers and members of public present that the Conference

Committee cannot be convened or reconvened, and that, pursuant to 5c of these Committees on Conference Procedures, a 24-hour advance notice shall be provided for a subsequent meeting of the Conference Committee.

### 9. <u>Decision-making Meeting</u>

The decision-making meeting of a Conference Committee shall comply with the following open meeting provisions:

- a. A quorum of the Conference Committee shall be present for the decision-making meeting. A quorum shall be a majority of the House Committee managers and a majority of the Senate Committee managers, and shall include the lead House and Senate chair and majority of the chairs of the Conference Committee for their respective chamber.
- b. To report a measure out of Conference Committee in amended form, Conference Draft (CD), a majority of the quorum of managers for each respective chamber shall vote in favor of the proposed amendments.
- c. The lead chair (or the lead chair's designee) representing their respective chamber shall call the roll and be the recorder of the quorum and the votes on that measure for that chamber. (Sample attached).
- d. If, after naming a Conference Committee on a measure, the Conference Committee managers representing the chamber from which a measure originated agree to the amendments made by the non-originating chamber, only a quorum of those representing the originating chamber shall vote on the agreement at a duly noticed meeting. For example, if after naming a Conference Committee on a House measure, the House managers of the Conference Committee decide to agree to the amendments in the Senate draft (SD) of the measure, then only the House managers of the Conference Committee shall vote on the measure, returning it to the House in its SD form. For such action, only a quorum of the Conference Committee managers representing the chamber from which the measure originated need to be present. The "Record of Votes of a Conference Committee" sheet detailing the votes of the managers of the originating chamber shall be filed with the appropriate chamber without a Conference Committee Report.

# 10. Conference Committee Reports

- a. A majority of the House and Senate chairs, respectively, of a Conference Committee shall attest to the action of the Conference Committee by signing the Conference Committee Report on behalf of their respective managers; provided that no Conference Committee Report concerning a measure with fiscal implications shall be reported out of a Conference Committee without the signature of the chair (or the chair's designee) of each fiscal committee to which the measure is referred. The "Record of Votes of a Conference Committee" sheet detailing the votes of the managers of the Conference Committee shall be attached to the report as a part thereof.
- b. All House measures reported out of Conference Committee shall be filed with the House Chief Clerk, and likewise all Senate measures shall be filed with the Senate Chief Clerk. A document filed in the originating chamber shall be deemed simultaneously filed in the other chamber. Only the original Conference Committee Report, with the attached Record of Votes, and the Conference Draft of the measure shall be required for filing.
- c. If the Conference Committee votes to report the measure out, the Committee must file a Conference Committee Report and Conference Draft with the appropriate chamber's Chief Clerk.

## 11. Decision-making Deadlines

On the deadline nights for Final Decking of both non-fiscal and fiscal bills:

- a. Conference Committees shall conclude their negotiations by 6:00
   p.m. to allow adequate time for final preparation of the bills and Conference Committee Reports.
- To provide all chairs with ample opportunity to review and sign the Conference Committee Reports before filing, all Conference Committee Reports shall be available for review and signature by 9:00 p.m.
- c. All Conference Committee Reports and Conference Drafts of measures shall be filed with the respective Chief Clerk by 11:30 p.m.

### 12. Electronic Transfer

Should a Conference Committee for which the vehicle is a Senate bill decide to use a proposal drafted by the House, the House chair shall have the House proposal electronically transferred to the appropriate Senate office so that the Conference Draft can be prepared. The converse shall apply to House bills with proposals drafted by the Senate that the Conference Committee agrees to.

# 13. Exceptions to these Deadlines and Procedures

Exceptions to these deadlines and other procedures may be made only with the advance written approval of both the Senate President and the House Speaker.

**Senate Conference Rooms** (Room 016, 224, 225, or 229). If your committee is designated to use one of the Senate conference rooms, please reserve the room by contacting the Senate Sergeant-at-Arms office at 586-6725.

Conference committees assigned to use a specific conference room will be given priority in using that room for conference committee meetings. (See attached Room Assignment Schedule)

All conference room assignments must be made by the respective Sergeantat-Arms offices. Committees should not allocate the use of their assigned conference room to another committee without first contacting the House or Senate Sergeant-at-Arms office.

# Coordinating the Use of Assigned Conference Rooms:

So while I support the intent of the bill and what it's trying to accomplish, I believe there's more work that needs to be done to address these concerns to provide guidance for the people who are going to have to implement this. Thank you."

Representative Kobayashi rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in opposition to Standing Committee Report 1912. I agree with the prior speaker. The bill is extremely, extremely costly because it includes all buildings, and impossible to achieve because the trigger date is July 2018. Thank you."

Not because I've been a graduate assistant, but because if you add the numbers up, if you put the \$17,000 that they get in wages, added to the 8 to 10 or 11 or \$12,000 of tuition, that's probably \$25,000 to \$30,000, plus they get a master's degree, and they get a PhD in the end of it, and that can go three, four, five years.

"In fact, Mr. Speaker, last night at my beer summit, at Kona Brewery, Coach Rolovich said he has four graduate assistants. They are the ones who help analyze the plays and basically put the data into gear. I asked him if they were for this bill. He said, I don't know, but I know there was a move afoot in some college football teams to unionize the players. So I thought, well why don't we unionize the undergraduates then? But he said the football team actually backed off after they realized that they could lose their scholarships. Right now, you can get a scholarship at the UH, 85% of the football team, which is 100 members, they can't lose their scholarship unless they do something illegal.

"So my point is, they're probably well-protected, well-funded, except there's always a grievance. Nobody at the University is really happy because what you're learning is to be critical as a thinker, critical as an analyst, and the more critical you are, the better grade you get.

"But for the job that we have as the governing body of the State, I think we have to be fiscally responsible, and for someone who's getting a master's degree getting \$25,000 to \$30,000 a year, it's not a bad deal. I lived on it, in fact even saved money while I was a graduate assistant. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I hope the Governor stays true, vetoes this thing again, and that we will get on with academic excellence, rather than complaining about what they said in the Finance Committee was, we're poorly paid and harassed. Mr. Speaker, that was the quote of the representative, the graduate person. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I'm, again, still with reservations."

Representative Say rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2585, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COLLECTIVE BARGAINING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representative Ward voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Holt being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1919-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2494, SD 2, HD 2 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2494, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ELEVATOR MECHANICS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representative Holt being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1920-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2831, SD 2, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2831, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PROCUREMENT FOR THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representative Holt being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1921-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2364, SD 2, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2364, SD 2, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations. The DLIR did include testimony referencing a court case that kind of addressed some of this. They had some really good reasons why they opposed it, but also, I think the bigger conversation that was had was about how it will affect small businesses. Per the state law right now, employers are already mandated to pay all treatment related to compensable injury, and adding this additional burden on top of it, and then some of these businesses not even having the funds to do it, dependent on their employee base. So those are my reservations. Thank you."

Representative DeCoite rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representative Tupola be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations. The Department of Labor and Industrial Relations has raised numerous concerns, as key provisions of this bill are contradictory and could result in legal ambiguities, including employers' due process rights and logistics relating to reimbursements if claims are non-compensable. So for these reasons, with reservations."

Representative Har rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representative Nakamura be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Thielen rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. For so many years, a lot of employers have stopped paying for medical services for disputed claims, and so a lot of injured employees have gone without, to detriment to having worse industries because of it. I believe this is a small step towards what workers' comp was meant for. So, in strong support."

Representative Tupola rose, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, if you could change my reservations to a no."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2364, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WORKERS' COMPENSATION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives DeCoite,

Har, Nakamura and Thielen voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Matsumoto, Tupola and Ward voting no, and with Representative Holt being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1922-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2122, SD 1, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2122, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ELECTRIC VEHICLES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representative Holt being excused.

Representative Nishimoto, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1923-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2609, SD 1, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2609, SD 1, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Thielen moved to recommit Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1923-18 and S.B. No. 2609, SD 1, HD 1, seconded by Representative Ward.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in support of the motion to recommit, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, what this bill is, it's relating to the financial disclosure statements that are available for the public to see when people are appointed to boards and commissions of the State. The reason it is necessary to recommit the bill, and that's what I'm speaking on now, is that Article XIV of our constitution requires all boards and commission members who wield significant discretionary or fiscal powers to file financial disclosure statements to promote transparency and accountability. It doesn't matter whether these board and commission members are nonpaid volunteers, they still wield significant discretionary or fiscal powers.

"This bill that I'm asking to recommit, Senate Bill 2609, will require the redaction or the hiding of all financial interest amounts on the financial disclosure statements. So in other words, the public would be able to look at a meaningless document, because the financial information would not be included on that, it would be hidden.

"There were a number of good government testifiers that opposed this bill, and they include League of Women Voters of Hawaii, they include the Hawaii Chapter of the Society of Professional Journalists, they include Common Cause Hawaii, they include the Kupuna Caucus of the Democratic Party of Hawaii, Hawaii Advocates For Consumer Rights, and the Hawaii State Ethics Commission.

"The bill should be recommitted, Mr. Speaker, to allow the Judiciary Committee to have time to analyze the constitutional provision, because I believe the measure, as it stands, is unconstitutional. Thank you."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the motion to recommit, stating:

"Thank you. In support of the recommittal. I just wanted to also share that there's 160 boards and commissions. Just so that those members know that it's not every single board and commission, but it's actually outlined in the bill which ones, and so the number one board and commission is actually the Agribusiness Development Corporation. The second one is the Board of Agriculture, State Ethics Commission, Hawaii Community Development Authority, HCDA—"

Representative Belatti rose to a point of order, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, point of order. Debate on the motion to recommit should be confined to the merits of the motion, and not the substance of the bill being recommitted." The Chair addressed Representative Tupola, stating:

"Yes, please confine your remarks, Representative Tupola."

Representative Tupola continued, stating:

"Thank you. And so the point I'm making is that the recommittal, because this is including boards that I don't think everyone is aware of, I heard that some of the testimonies in Labor saying that it's for all the boards and that this is why people don't want to join boards, which that wasn't the reason. And so, definitely on the recommittal, it's to look at, really, the content of this, and make sure that we're not doing something that we don't totally understand how the effects are going to be had. Thank you."

Representative Johanson rose to speak in opposition to the motion to recommit, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition to the motion to recommit. While I think this body always brings up good points on the floor, what I will say is that the bill has a defective date, so all these questions that people have still have time to be considered, including whether or not it's constitutional, in the conference committee, thus not needing to be recommitted today. Thank you."

Representative Thielen rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. A brief rebuttal to my colleague across the aisle. Conference committee is no place to examine whether or not a measure is constitutional. The proper place is to look at that in the Judiciary Committee. My colleague, our Minority Leader, brought up a very good point when she was cut short. It is relevant to list the entities, the boards and commissions that would be exempt from having these financial disclosures of their members, because what it could do is stop government from functioning. The ADC may be somewhat minor, rather secretive, but you take a look at some of the others, such as—"

Representative Belatti rose to a point of order, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, point of order. Again, motion to recommit debate must be confined to the procedural debate, and not the substance."

The Chair addressed Representative Thielen, stating:

"Representative Thielen, could you please confine your remarks? Thank you."

Representative Thielen continued, stating:

"I am. What I'm saying, Mr. Speaker, the need to recommit is very drastic, because when you look at the HCDA, you look at HHFDC, you look at the Board of Land and Natural Resources, if their decisions are challenged because this measure is unconstitutional, we are going to create vast chaos within our government and in the public sector. We can't go ahead with a measure that is constitutionally infirm, and that's why recommittal is very appropriate at this point. Thank you."

Representative Nishimoto rose to speak in opposition to the motion to recommit, stating:

"Thank you. Just very briefly, in opposition. Mr. Speaker, the previous speaker serves on the Judiciary Committee, and she never did raise a constitutional issue."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the motion to recommit, stating:

"For the motion to recommit, Mr. Speaker. Couple of reasons. In support. Judge Brandeis said that sunlight is the best disinfectant. I think those were guiding words for all of us and what we do publicly, what we do administratively, *et cetera*. This is a season of unethical behavior in government. Not only nationally, but locally, Mr. Speaker. This is a—"

The Chair addressed Representative Ward, stating:

"Representative Ward, please confine your remarks to the motion before us. It's a procedural motion to recommit."

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"Procedural motion is saying we need more deliberation. We need to put more sunlight onto this bill before we go quickly, to allow redacting. The irony, Mr. Speaker, is that the Ethics Commission itself will be exempt from this. Isn't that a great irony? And as my colleague indicated, the Ethics Commission is against this. They are the ones who the adjudicators of, if you will, are the referees of what's ethical. And they don't think this is ethical. So what we're doing by speeding this thing up and committing it to a vote is unethical.

"Redacting should not be allowed for the sake of openness in government and transparency, of which all of us preach and all of us run for reelection on. Mr. Speaker, let us not be hypocritical. Let's recommit this bill, let it go back to be digested in its proper form, and get this ethical cloud that's over the State of Hawaii away. It'll benefit all of us. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, this is a very good recommittal motion."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the motion to recommit, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in support of the recommittal. I was going to stand and speak in opposition to the bill, and I still plan to do that if we fail on the recommittal. I support a recommittal because I don't think that this body should even consider this bill. I'll reserve my remarks for what I suspect will be voting down of the recommittal and voting no on the bill itself."

The motion was put to a vote by the Chair and upon a voice vote, failed to carry, with Representative Holt being excused.

(Main Motion)

Representative McDermott rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in opposition to the measure. Mr. Speaker, financial disclosure statements are very broad and nebulous by nature. They include ranges of ownership and ranges of income, denoted by alphabetical numbers, for somewhat protection of the people filing. We all here in this body file financial disclosure forms. I suggest you look at mine, you will not be impressed. But we have folks, there was a case of a well known banker a few years ago who decided not to serve on the UH Board of Regents because he didn't want to disclose his holdings. Well everybody knew he was rich already, I mean, that wasn't the deal. He just didn't want to disclose his holdings. And a bank president has his fingers in many things, so maybe he felt uncomfortable.

"But there are plenty of good people in this community, in a state of 1.2 million folks, who would gladly serve. Good, talented folks who will gladly display their assets and wealth, because there's not that many of us that are that wealthy, Mr. Speaker. Most of us come to work every day, do the best we can and try to put away a couple bucks. But this measure, I don't know the majority would put this forth, Mr. Speaker. Oh, by the way, I did vote no in committee, and so did my colleague, the Representative from Kailua, just as a point of information. After studying it, we might want to ask more questions on the floor, and of course conference committee, it's pointless at that time.

"The disclosure forms are broad and nebulous, and so for the majority to put this forward, the same body that, as I recall, unless I have early onset of Alzheimer's, last year was asking for the President's tax returns, which is detailed information, down to how much interest you got on municipal bonds. So I'm trying to reconcile the schizophrenia between asking for tax returns from some officials, and then more locally where it actually impacts us, on a daily basis, people in powerful positions being exempt from disclosing what holdings they have. I mean, this is very real. Imagine someone on DLNR has land holdings that are adjacent to a development

property, and they're going to vote whether that development goes through, yes or no. We have no way of knowing if they have a personal interest in it. And Mr. Speaker, history is rife with people taking advantage of government and the system to personally benefit themselves.

"And so we would be well advised not to proceed with this measure, because we're tempting people. We're tempting them. We're saying, don't disclose anything and you can vote on these measures, which you may have a personal interest in. Even if the fella or gal is honest and votes up because they think it's a good idea, and they have an interest next to it, we'll never know. So for those reasons, sir, I just think that this is inconsistent with the majority's mindset as a body, and what they certainly put forward last year, repeatedly, regarding tax returns. If we're going to ask for someone's tax return on a national level, and then we don't ask for local guys, who actually impact us, for their own financial disclosure, it makes no sense to me, sir. And for that reason, I'll be voting no."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong opposition. I'd first like to adopt the words of my colleague from Ewa Beach as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative LoPresti continued, stating:

"Don't have a heart attack. Mr. Speaker, I think this is a very serious matter. There is a lack of confidence in government today, across the nation and in Hawaii. There is the perception that we are a government of the rich, by the rich, and for the rich. This bill encourages that view, because it will erode confidence in government. Mr. Speaker, I've had several of these wealthy folks in my office, as I know many of my colleagues have had, and I've been floored by the obtuse audacity that some of these people have declared that the reason we don't have smart people on boards and commissions is because we're not allowing wealthy people on them. And this false equivalency between wealth and intelligence, between wealth and ability, is offensive. It's also just plain wrong.

"Indeed, most spiritual traditions, most intellectual traditions, most philosophical traditions draw a very clear, sensible line, and puts arguments against the idea that somehow seeking wealth is wise, that the truly wise actually avoid wealth. And instead what we're going to do is encourage the hiding of wealth and encouraging opportunities for conflicts that the people will be ignorant of. That is the only purpose of this measure, and it is wrong. It's a shameful proposal, and I'm strongly opposed to it."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in opposition. Mr. Speaker, in addition to adopting the remarks of the two gentlemen from Ewa Beach, may I add a few words," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the reality is that boards and commissions are appointed with political flavoring, political spin, political ingredients. They are appointed by either yourself, or the President of the Senate, or the Governor, and there's usually a connectivity between that person and something political in who they are or what organization they represent. And my point, Mr. Speaker, is disclosures are intended and our very purpose is to defuse the politicization of those things by being open and by having disclosure. Saying, here if there is some, if you're on a particular board and you happen to have interest in something that's very conflicting with that particular board, the public should know.

"Mr. Speaker, I wrote a book on disclosure of politics for USAID. When the people of South America realized that their president was elected by drug money, they were aghast. But because of disclosure, not redacted financial but actual physical evidence of where money came from.

"The point is, Mr. Speaker, this bill is inflaming the political process of appointments, instead of defusing it. And the whole purpose of disclosure is to defuse the politicalization of these things and to make it open for the

public to see. Mr. Speaker, we have an obligation to be open with the public, and to do what we're doing here shows we got something to hide or somebody to protect or some agency that is up to something untoward, because who they don't want to attract and who they may want to attract. It doesn't pass the smell test, Mr. Speaker. My colleague used the famous quote of Hamlet the other day, something is rotten in the state of Denmark, something is rotten in the state of this bill, and it should be rejected. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. Mr. Speaker, when we look at the bill before us, at HD 1, the only thing being redacted are the amounts reported. What continues to be reported these nonpaid volunteer members who we are asking to serve the public, the source of the income is still reported, as well as a whole list of things identified in HRS 84-17(f). So, there is still much transparency, it's simply the amounts that are going to be redacted. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Johanson rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. This is one of the many measures that I think the body has considered with respect to how do we attract the most qualified people to serve in nonpaid boards. And whether this is the perfect vehicle or not, I think the Majority Leader just made the most salient point, which is that any conflict can still be diagnosed, it is still transparent. It's not obscuring that fact. So there can still be investigation, there can still be transparency there. But I think it's important, especially in a small state, and it's not necessarily respect of your income, but I do think some of the testimony we heard in the Labor and Judiciary Committees, there are people who are sometimes discouraged, inadvertently, by what we may have on the books, from serving.

"And so I think this is part of a necessary and broader conversation of how do we ensure that our current laws most enable the best qualified people to serve in the most transparent manner possible. So again, whether or not this is the perfect vehicle, it's part of a broader conversation that I think we need to ensure that our boards and commissions that are unpaid are full of people who do want to serve, who have the necessary expertise to help advise and/or oversee. Again, while remaining transparent. Thank you."

Representative San Buenaventura rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"I'd like to declare a conflict. My husband serves as a volunteer with one of the state boards," and the Chair ruled, "no conflict."

Representative San Buenaventura continued, stating:

"I'd like to have it continue for the rest of the session, however short it is. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative San Buenaventura continued and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Now I can speak on the bill itself. I continue to be in opposition of the bill and in favor of the failed recommittal. The Majority Leader brought up a point, basically, don't worry about it, only the amount is redacted or hidden, but just take a look at this. This bill covers the powerful Public Utilities Commission members. So, someone is appointed to that body and puts down one of their holdings happens to be Hawaiian Electric. It's meaningless if you don't have the alphabet letter showing what is the amount, the range of amount, of those holdings.

"The only good thing I can find about this bill is that it didn't originate in this body. It came out of the Senate, sponsored by the Ways and Means Chair. We didn't start this, he did. And then you take a look at it, as it came out of Ways and Means and passed from the Senate, it's pretty dramatic that they had seven noes voting against this measure, and on top of that they had three with reservations. So, 10 out of the 25 on the Senate side were signaling, this is a bad policy, it's a bad bill. And I think if you all take a

look at the names, there's some very, I maybe need to say a conflict, potential conflict, Mr. Speaker. Senator Laura Thielen, my daughter, was one of the noes."

Representative Belatti rose to a point of order, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, point of order. Mr. Speaker, it's inappropriate to be speaking about the other Chamber. It's also inappropriate to be speaking to the intent of—"

At 1:28 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:30 o'clock p.m.

Representative Thielen continued, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I just wanted to have a ruling on that potential conflict," and the Chair ruled, "no conflict."

Representative Thielen continued, stating:

"Thank you. Mr. Speaker, when we try to show that we are being open with our government and that we're being responsive to our constituents and to the broad community out there, I think that we need to take the high road. And I look at this bill as trying to go underground and saying, gee we want to have these powerful members of these powerful Board of Land and Natural Resources, Public Utilities Commissions, Land Use Commission, which makes major, major land use decisions on reclassifying land, and we want to be able to put these people on there, but hide, basically hide from the public what their value is of their different holdings. It's not a specific dollar figure, it's a broad range, as we all know, because we file those reports.

"This is such a step on the road to degradation, to bad government. I just can't believe our body accepting something like this that came over from the other Chamber. It should have just sat and not had any movement on it. So I would ask members, I know what the reality is, I mean we're sort of outnumbered here, although we do have some, I want to appreciate that some colleagues from the other side of the aisle that are also opposing this, but I know there are overwhelming numbers that will be able to pass this through. It does not have to ever have a conference committee scheduled. And I would say that that at least would allow us to keep the dignity and the necessary open government that we should all be proud of. And I say again, the only good thing is, this did not originate in this body. Thank you."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong opposition. Thank you. Two things. One is that I don't think we've ever all seen any research studies showing us that there is a direct nexus between us not showing dollar amounts and all of a sudden people signing up to be on boards and commissions. There's other reasons which, one, some of the members of boards and commissions that I've talked to that live on neighbor islands that don't get reimbursed for that. Two, perhaps not even being appointed. Some of the vacancies were not even filled, not even asked, actually. Three, it could be anything from the effectivity of the boards.

"There's many reasons why there wouldn't be these filled vacancies for boards that are voluntary, but we don't know for sure if by clearing out the number of how much they've given to other companies is actually going to make people just come by the hordes to come sign up for boards and commissions. And so I see that that's maybe the reason for some people, but it shouldn't be the underlying reason as to us believing that this is going to fill all the boards and commissions.

"And I did want to say that in committee, one of the testimonies that I heard even said that the CDC chair had stepped aside when she was found to have disclosed that she was putting money into tobacco settlements. And so what it is, is that yes, we want to see what people are contributing to, but the amounts do make a difference.

"And I want to read the boards so that everyone knows what boards these are. These are very big boards that make lots of decisions for our state. The Commission on Water Resource Management, the Public Utilities Commissions, the Board of Directors at Hawaii Public Housing Authority, the Board of Directors of the Natural Energy Laboratory of Hawaii Authority, the Natural Area Reserves Systems Commissions, the Legacy Land Conservation Commission, the State Land Use Commission, BLNR, the Board of Directors of HHFDC, Hawaiian Homes Commission, the Hawaii Community Development Authority, State Ethics Commission, the Board of Agriculture, and the Board of Directors of the Agribusiness Development Corporation. So that people know that those are the boards that we're talking about. Thank you."

Representative McDermott rose to respond, stating:

"I'll be brief, Mr. Speaker, I'm getting hungry. Still in opposition. Just a thought, the majority party has always fought for the little guy. Is that what you're doing here? Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Second time in opposition, Mr. Speaker. Speaking of the majority, I want to commend the majority leadership for giving the great leaky roof analogy. Hey, 90% of the roof is fixed, but you know, Mr. Speaker, if you fix 90% of the roof, it still leaks. This bill is leaking all over us. It's lowering the ethical standards that we have, it's lowering the bar. It's the common denominator that keeps us with moral authority in the eyes of the public, but this bill lowers us in the eyes of the public, Mr. Speaker. No good can come out of this bill. Bottom line, it's a bad bill. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti rose to respond, stating:

"Still opposition, I'll be brief. I just wanted to state, some of you know I recently had a health scare, and it helped to really clarify things for me that if I don't vote my conscience, I have no right being here. And I don't ask any of you to listen to me, I ask you to listen to your conscience, and vote against this unethical bill. Thank you."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I wasn't going to rise, and I'm in support, because you're in support, because this is you and I, we're the ones that did the underlying measure on this. Remember a few years ago when we took a bill that was supposed to disclose a salary range, like other state employees, for, I believe, just the PUC, and then we expanded it to everybody. And along the way we made it detailed amounts. And so what happened was, this bill came forward.

"I agree with my colleague from Kailua, perhaps the genesis of the bill is not one that makes me grow to love it, but at the same time I think that having classifications, that you can easily look up on the internet, that we all have to file, doesn't take away what we're trying to do, which was, what is the source of the outside income, and does that source, that range of source, perhaps, could that play into, perhaps, troubling decisions or issues that are in front of these boards and commissions.

"So because you see that there's a discussion still to go on, 2050, it's going to conference, and because I think what we were trying to do is still intact in the bill, I'm standing in support of it. Thank you."

Representative Evans rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise with reservations. Mr. Speaker, I know that so many people in the community really want transparency, and I believe that's why we passed this bill that was referred to by the previous speaker. But I do think, hopefully as it moves through conference, maybe there's a way to find some compromise language and really come up with some way to determine what really we want in terms of transparency and accountability for people that, I believe these boards and commissions they make some major, major decisions that impact everybody's life in the state. So, with reservations. Thank you."

Representative Matsumoto rose in opposition to the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to this bill.

"This bill would prevent the disclosure of financial information owed to the public.

"Article XIV of our constitution requires all board and commission members who wield 'significant discretionary or fiscal powers' to file financial disclosure statements to promote transparency and accountability.

"Without the disclosure of the magnitude of their interests, the public may not trust the actions of the member or even the board/commission. For members of very high-profile boards and commissions, such as the Board of Land and Natural Resources, the Hawaii Community Development Authority, and the Ethics Commission, the public would still be allowed to see that an individual held a financial interest in a particular entity but would have no way of knowing whether the interest was \$1,000 or \$1,000,000. I have concerns that this bill moves in a direction that is not transparent – the public has a right to know about financial interests, and redaction of the financial interests would render the disclosures meaningless.

"Disclosure, transparency and accountability are hallmarks of good government. We need to do everything we can to improve public confidence in our government, and this bill is moving in the wrong direction.

"For these reasons, Mr. Speaker, I am in opposition to this measure. *Mahalo* for the opportunity to speak."

Representative Cachola rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'll be voting with reservations, and just like the Representative from Maui, the effective date is still defective, so hopefully in conference they'll fix it, and we'll decide later on what comes out in conference committee. Thank you."

Representative Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations. Sometimes, one size does not fit all. Having financial disclosure categories like above and below \$1,000, above and below \$5,000, above and below \$10,000, may be insignificant, but at a certain point, I'm not sure when, maybe it's six digits, it does become significant. So maybe there could be disclosure, but perhaps in different categories or ranges. Thank you."

Representative Say rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Har rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Please have the Clerk note my reservations, and change my vote from in opposition, please."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2609, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FINANCIAL DISCLOSURE STATEMENTS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 37 ayes to 12 noes, with Representatives Cachola, Evans, Har, Kobayashi, San Buenaventura and Say voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Creagan, DeCoite, Gates, Ing, LoPresti, Matsumoto, McDermott, Quinlan, Thielen, Tokioka, Tupola and Ward voting no, and with Representative Holt being excused

Representative Nishimoto, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1924-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2351, SD 1, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2351, SD 1, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Fukumoto rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support and request to insert written comments, please. Thank you."

Representative Fukumoto's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in strong support of this measure. I am grateful for the collective efforts of the Women's Legislative Caucus in introducing this bill and the companion House bill which moves Hawaii closer to equal pay for all of its citizens. Over 50 years after the women's movement began, it is atrocious that women still only make 80 cents for every dollar that men make. We must do better, and this is an excellent first step.

"I have issue with how we have behaved as elected officials over this measure, however. That an issue like equal pay, for which women have been fighting for so long, should be used as a vehicle of political chess playing and creating division between women is disappointing and disrespectful. As the individual who drafted the language of this bill, I believe both this measure and its House companion, HB 2137, should have been moved through the legislative process to allow for the issue to be thoroughly vetted and assessed by all interested parties prior to landing in conference committee.

"The people of Hawaii deserve better from us on issues of such import. We can and should do better for them."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2351, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EQUAL PAY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representative Holt being excused.

Representative Nishimoto, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1925-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2610, SD 1, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2610, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE EMPLOYEES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representative Holt being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1926-18) recommending that S.B. No. 3025, SD 1, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3025, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONSUMER PROTECTION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Matsumoto, Tupola and Ward voting no, and with Representative Holt being excused.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd like to cast a no vote on Senate Bill 2519 and a few comments. Mr. Speaker, this bill will authorize the Agribusiness Development Corporation, the ADC, to enter into contracts with private businesses to remove select municipal solid waste, glass, food and green waste from the waste stream, to use in other business sectors, and it also will enable them to contract out for particular projects. It's another, I guess another example of how we're continuing to throw scope of work and money at ADC, an entity that very severely needs to be audited, and we need to know more about what it's been doing, what it hasn't been doing. Has it been making errors, has it been operating correctly, using the taxpayers' money. We need to find that out before we do anything more. So, a no vote."

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations and comments. I'm concerned that some of the recycling may be appropriate on agricultural lands controlled by ADC. I think green waste and maybe composting if it's related to an agricultural use seems appropriate, but other types of recycling, used tires, building materials, and other industrial waste, to me may not be appropriate on ADC lands. And so for these reasons, with reservations."

Representative Lee rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you. In support, Mr. Speaker. I just note that while this bill moves on to the conference committee, some of these issues which have been raised I think by some of our colleagues will be looked at and sorted out. We do think there's potential to leverage some of the resources available in our municipal waste stream for better purposes. We note that some of the contracts the City and County has with H-POWER and other entities which currently capture most of that waste stream are probably not the absolute most efficient and highest priority use of those materials. So we do want to explore these other options, and just ask for that opportunity to continue the conversation. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2519, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ENVIRONMENT," passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes to 4 noes, with Representative Nakamura

voting aye with reservations, with Representatives McDermott, Thielen, Tupola and Ward voting no, and with Representative Holt being excused.

# S.B. No. 3095, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that S.B. No. 3095, SD 1, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Say rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Creagan rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I ask that I be allowed to submit written comments to the Journal in support, strong support. Thank you."

Representative Creagan's written remarks are as follows:

"I am in strong support of SB 3095, SD 1, HD 1.

"When I first came to the Legislature I had not heard of chlorpyrifos by that name and had to learn to spell and pronounce it. But I did my homework and realized what a disaster this pesticide has been for the brains of our country's babies and children. It is an organophosphate that acts by inhibiting acetylcholinesterase – an enzyme that breaks down acetylcholine. Acetylcholine is a neurotransmitter that controls the nerves in the bodies of insects, and in our own brains and bodies.

"While organophosphates were originally developed as pesticides by German chemist Gerhard Schrader to help produce food for the Nazi war effort, they were so toxic they could not be safely used. They were then turned into weapons of war and Schrader and others developed the organophosphate nerve agents Tabun and later Sarin. Sarin was recently used by the Syrian dictator Assad to murder civilians including babies and children. Chlorpyrifos was developed by the chemical company that was the precursor to Dow in the 1960s. Lest we forget Dow was one of the major manufacturers of Agent Orange that is still devastating the countries where it was indiscriminately and massively sprayed. Not a very reassuring pedigree.

"One of the testifiers in a recent hearing on chlorpyrifos stated, 'Chlorpyrifos is an efficient and cost-effective tool that is used by landscapers, government, golf courses (don't pregnant women play golf?), hotel industry (that should reassure our pregnant tourists), and farmers to control pests.' It also seems that Assad appears to find Sarin gas, the close cousin of chlorpyrifos, a very efficient and cost-effective tool in eradicating pesky civilians who opposed his dictatorship.

"Nicholas Kristoff of the New York Times says since chlorpyrifos is too big a mouthful for some (perhaps those exposed to chlorpyrifos as babies) we should just call it 'Dow's nerve gas pesticide.' While a small amount is needed to cause symptoms in adults, in unborn babies there is no known lower limit that will not cause some permanent brain damage. Even if our pregnant women are not sprayed with this nerve-gas pesticide they will get a dose toxic to their unborn child in the 'fresh fruits and vegetables' they are advised to eat, which are too often laden with chlorpyrifos.

"We are currently experiencing a growing epidemic of neurodevelopmental disorders including autism and ADHD in our children. While we know there may be a genetic component to conditions such as autism, we saw that condition rarely in the past and therefore it is clear that environmental factors are largely responsible for this increase. Dow's nerve gas pesticide is not the only environmental culprit, but it seems to be the worst and the evidence that chlorpyrifos alone can cause these harms is steadily accumulating and is now overwhelming.

"Our own EPA when it was less compromised back in 2001 recognized that the indoor use of specifically chlorpyrifos was causing brain damage to babies and children in the apartments of New York where it was used to control roaches and other vermin. Studies of exposed children have continued and have now been going on for 18 years and continue to document the severe brain damage caused by that exposure. The EPA was poised to ban chlorpyrifos completely but settled for a ban on most indoor uses in 2001. Our recent EPA was poised to extend that ban to all food uses last year, but then we elected President Trump and Scott Pruitt took over the EPA, and that ban supported by 10,000 pages of evidence was scrapped.

"The European Union has now banned chlorpyrifos for all but a tiny exception of brassica seedlings, based on all the accumulating evidence, and by the economic harm caused by the neurodevelopmental injuries to their children which were estimated to be \$120 billion per year!

"Our *keiki* are born into an increasingly competitive world. Jobs requiring high intelligence are very desirable and often pay the best. Why then would we continue to use a pesticide that damages our children's brains? What is the benefit? The benefit is to the bulging coffers of the chemical companies. We have recently and rightfully spent a lot of money to cool our children's classrooms. How sad that we are cooling our classrooms but doing little to prevent future students' brains being fried by a brain damaging chemical. We can correct inadequate classroom environments, but we cannot correct the irreversible damage caused by Dow's nerve gas pesticide.

"People might ask, what good would it do to ban chlorpyrifos in our state if so much of the produce coming into our state from California and Mexico and elsewhere is laden with chlorpyrifos. If we ban it here our locally produced food will be 'Hawaii grown – Chlorpyrifos free.' Organic food would be the safest for our pregnant mothers and other states do recommend that, and our state should be properly warning our pregnant mothers and those with small children; but a ban of this toxic chemical could give a great boost to the safety and desirability of our locally grown food, organic or otherwise. In a time when rat lungworm disease is causing concerns about our local produce, a ban on chlorpyrifos in this state would boost the relative safety of locally grown food. California has placed chlorpyrifos on its Proposition 65 lists as a chemical known to cause harm to unborn babies and young children. Soon produce coming in from California may bear a warning label. Let Hawaii be proactive and warn our people now and provide a safer local alternative. Let us support our local farmers in protecting themselves and their customers by helping them find safer alternatives to chlorpyrifos.

"Lastly, this is a moral issue. This is a social justice issue. This poison disproportionately effects farmworkers, unborn babies of mothers without medical or prenatal care, the poor who cannot afford chlorpyrifos free organic food, and the less educated who aren't aware of the danger to the brains of their children and unborn babies. It has been pointed out that 90 to 100 countries are still using chlorpyrifos. How many countless millions of babies and children are being injured in those countries? Is that not a crime against humanity? Should we not speak up for those who are still being fed fake reassurances and fake science? Let us be a beacon of sanity in a world being rapidly obscured by a fog of chemicals and a fog of misinformation by the chemical companies. Let us ban chlorpyrifos now!

"As Rachel Carson wrote in her seminal book on pesticides, Silent Spring, '...we should no longer accept the counsel of those who tell us that we must fill our world with poisonous chemicals; we should look about and see what other course is open to us."

Representative DeCoite rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations and a brief comment. Mr. Speaker, while I'd like to thank the Chair of Finance for making the amendments to the bill, pesticides in all shape or form kills. Without proper education for all of those who buy pesticides off the shelf, and the relationship of incidents of the evacuation, whether it be schools or residents, I believe the incorporation of all pesticides and the safety of all our kids at the school should be incorporated into the bill. And I would like to add additional comments to the Journal. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative DeCoite's written remarks are as follows:

"With reservations. I have reservations about this bill because it is incomplete. All pesticides are poisons and if we are going to ban pesticides containing chlorpyrifos, then we should ban all pesticides. No exemption should also be given to pest control operators. Pesticides and harmful chemicals used inside the home or school also must be a part of this bill. This bill seeks to address the risk of agricultural pesticide drift to Hawaii's schools but does not address concerns associated with pesticide drift attributed to residential use. The Department of Agriculture has testified that pesticide odor complaints have been attributed to residential use. Another major concern I have with this bill is that it may negatively impact not only the large agricultural producers, but also the smaller local farms that are trying to grow and at the same time stay in business. *Mahalo*."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Har rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kong rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Belatti rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Belatti's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in support of Senate Bill 3095, House Draft 1.

"Crafting good laws and policies is a balancing act. This is especially true – and especially difficult – in the case of pesticides. We rely on the food produced by farmers, but we also need to be mindful of the unintended negative effects of food production. Lawmakers in this Chamber have grappled with the issue of pesticides year after year. This is among the most carefully balanced proposals seen by this body.

"Section 1 of this bill creates a program within the Department of Agriculture that collects and discloses information to the public about which Restricted Use Pesticides – or RUPs, the most potentially harmful kind of pesticide – are used in and around their neighborhoods by agricultural businesses. Furthermore, out of an abundance of caution, this bill also creates buffer zones around schools where RUPs may not be used during instructional hours.

"Section 3, beginning in 2019, bans the use of chlorpyrifos without a permit. Businesses may obtain permits to use chlorpyrifos until the end of 2021. This multiyear timespan allows farmers to gradually transition their crops away from chlorpyrifos and to alternative pesticides.

"The bill also appropriates money and creates positions within the Department of Agriculture to enforce the act and educate the public about its requirements.

"Senate Bill 3095, House Draft 1 affirms the public's interest in knowing what is going on in their neighborhoods without forbidding existing agricultural practices except in the case of a single pesticide and around children – our most sensitive population. What new requirements this bill imposes, it balances with additional employees, education, and accommodations.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 3095, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes, with Representatives DeCoite, Har, Kong, Say and Tokioka voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Choy and Holt being excused

# Tuesday, April 10, 2018

The House of Representatives of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2018, convened at 9:05 o'clock a.m., with Vice Speaker Nakashima presiding.

Representative Cachola's written remarks in support of the measure are as follows:

"SB 287, SD 1, HD 2 relates to health insurance and addresses preauthorization, disclosure, insurance, and medical policies. This bill cautions all health insurers from requiring a medical treatment or service. It requires all health insurers to disclose the medical policies that the insurer uses for preauthorization decisions.

"Preauthorization causes undue delay in the receipt of the treatment or service prior to administering some tests such as MRI. In some cases, treatment is delayed especially when there are appeals undertaken which take longer time to facilitate.

"According to the 'American Medical Association Prior Authorization Physician Survey,' 64% are waiting at least one day and 30% are waiting for three days. During this time, the patient can have a worsening in their health conditions while waiting for preauthorization.

"Inefficient time, administrative snags and difficulties coming from noncommunication by insurers frustrate physicians and patient alike.

"Due to the preauthorization requirements, more problems loom for medical practitioners. 'Hawaii is facing a critical shortage of doctors, and it's expected to get worse,' according to Dr. Kelley Withy of JABSOM. 'We're starting with a shortage and we're not making up for it. We have an aging population so, it's just getting worse and worse.' Presently, the state is short 700 doctors. Of those, 282 are primary care physicians. It is projected to increase to 1,500 in ten years. The shortage is even worse in the neighbor islands.

"Why is doctor shortage being experienced in Hawaii?

"There are two major factors for this anticipated crisis. Aside from preauthorization, there is capitation, which causes more challenges. The County of Hawaii is experiencing a large and growing physician shortage with a 39% shortfall of physicians and 49% shortfall for primary care physicians, and Hilo has seven fewer physicians in 2017 than it did in 2016, five of which are based on income.

"One reason for the shortage, particularly primary care physicians, is the lack of adequate reimbursement rates. The amount of reimbursement for physicians in Hawaii is reported to be around \$24.00 per member per month, as compared to other states with higher reimbursement rates.

"In recent studies, 50% of physicians admit to burnout, and 15% to 30% of practicing doctors and 26% of resident doctors are depressed. This results in physician and staff resignations. Adding to the growing dissatisfaction is the imminent retirement of a large number of currently practicing physicians, with over half of all physicians currently practicing in Hawaii reaching the retirement age of 65 over the next ten years.

"SB 287, SD 1, HD 2 proves to be net positive for physicians and patients in Hawaii. I stand in strong support of this bill."

Representative Nishimoto, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1949-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2783, as amended in HD 1, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2783, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise with slight reservations and a brief comment. Thank you. This bill specifically targets low-income seniors in the public housing area and extends the buffer zone from 20 to 25 feet, which seems a little unnecessary. I'm not a smoker but I am a teacher, and I think that if we could give more emphasis on teaching and educating and advocating for our public health initiatives, it would go so much farther than some of these increases that we see, that we don't really have enforcement for. And really, for the public housing area, some of the reasons why the smoking is there is because they're getting off of other substances. And so with those reservations, I'd just like to cast my vote that way. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2783, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII PUBLIC HOUSING AUTHORITY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Tupola voting aye with reservations.

Representative Nishimoto, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1951-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2087, SD 2, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2087, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMERGENCY RESCUE DEVICES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes.

Representative Nishimoto, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1954-18) recommending that S.B. No. 134, SD 1, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 134, SD 1, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Also with reservations. This is only the second UH bill we've seen here, but creating legislation to ban smoking at UH, which they can actually already do per their policy, is one of the many ways that I feel like we're overregulating into agencies that should be doing things for themselves. As we saw with the graduate student union, a lot of the reasons why they wanted to unionize is because UH needs to step up their game and do the things for the students that they're asking for. And so by us stepping in and doing what an agency should do for themselves, I feel that we're also sending the signal to other agencies that we can nanny them if they don't do the things that they're supposed to, when we should really encourage them to listen to their students. And so those are my reservations. Thank you."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, thank you. In support. I can appreciate the concerns of the previous speaker, I had them myself several years ago. But this is exactly like what happened with HHSC with their smoking policy. Until it gets implemented by state law, it's a gray area of enforcement, and we took extra steps to make sure to exempt collective bargaining from it completely. But you need to do this if you're going to have an actual enforceable, well-delineated no smoking policy, even though it is the right of the Board of Regents. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 134, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Tupola voting aye with reservations, and with Representative McDermott voting no.

Representative Nishimoto, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1955-18) recommending that S.B. No. 270, SD 1, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 270, SD 1, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative McDermott rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you. I rise in opposition. I'd like permission to insert comments in the Journal, but my comments on this will be relatively positive. I would like to give a nod to the Chair, because in discussing the issue of LBGTQ counseling, Q, that's the critical group here, questioning. These students will be left adrift without any recourse or resources to talk to. They're, by the very definition, questioning. What if your son comes to you and says, dad I have these unwanted attractions, please help me. Or what if your son or daughter comes to you, I'm not sure I'm a male or female, who can we talk to? This bill will send a chilling effect to anyone offering those sorts of counseling opportunities.

"Now, I'm not talking about the young lady who testified saying, I'm a lesbian, I'm happy with who I am, my parents are trying to change me, they should love me. She's not a candidate for any counseling of any sort. She's happy with who she is, let her be. The other fella came and testified, said he went through some sort of therapy and he wasn't allowed to talk to his mother for three years. Well, that's just plain insanity. By the way, that young man came to my office afterwards and we talked for about 45 minutes, very nice young fella. But there is a group that can benefit from counseling, and that is the Q group, the questioning group.

"Now, if we put this ban in effect, the only people left are the clergy, and they're not particularly the best at this. They don't have advanced degrees in psychology, they're not medical doctors who are psychiatrists. And the psychiatrists, if there's a ban, if there's any questioning where the line is, the psychiatrist is not going to jeopardize his \$250,000 a year practice, because he has a mortgage and kids in college. So we're cutting these kids adrift. We're telling them, you're on your own, we can't help you. One size fits all, because we in the Hawaii State Legislature, with our collective medical expertise, and I, with all do deference to my good friend behind me, we're making a decision, because we know best, damn it, and we're cutting these kids who are Q loose. They will have no resources to go to.

"So that's why I commend the Chair for setting up a study, it took a lot of courage for him to do that, Mr. Speaker, because the groups that believe like I do didn't show up, and they didn't show up because they don't think it matters anymore. With the past issues, whether it's Pono Choices, same-sex marriage, they show up in force, it doesn't matter, show up at the BOE, it doesn't matter, the policy goes forward. But he demonstrated courage, Mr. Speaker. In the face of all the support to ban this, he said, wait a minute, we got a group of kids here, the Q group, who are questioning. And by the very nature of the definition, questioning, you will benefit from some direction or guidance or counseling. So for those reasons, I am a no, but at the same time, I acknowledge the courage of the Chair for including a task force in here to look at that group very closely. Thank you, sir."

Representative McDermott submitted the following National Task Force for Therapy Equality report:

The American Psychological Association Says Born-That-Way-And-Can't-Change Is Not True of Sexual Orientation And Gender Identity

In its "Series Preface," the APA Handbook on Sexuality and Psychology (American Psychological Association, 2014) states, With the imprimatur of the largest scientific and professional organization representing psychology in the United States and the largest association of psychologists in the world, and with content edited and authored by some of its most respected members, the APA Handbooks in Psychology series will be the indispensable and authoritative reference resource to turn to for researchers, instructors, practitioners, and field leaders alike. (p. xvi).

The American Psychological Association (APA) could not confer any higher authority on the APA Handbook of Sexuality and Psychology than it does, bestowing its "imprimatur" and calling it "authoritative." In the APA Handbook, the American Psychological Association itself is now saying that born-that-way-and-can't-change is not true.

In addition, Dr. Lisa Diamond, a self-avowed lesbian, is co-editor-in-chief of the Handbook, and she authors and co-authors chapters in it. She qualifies as one of the APA's "most respected members." In her APA Handbook chapters where she is speaking for the APA itself, in her own book, in a YouTube lecture, and journal articles (example 2016) she says sexual orientation does not come in two types—exclusively homosexual and exclusively heterosexual—that are rigid and unchangeable. She is telling LGBT activists to stop promoting the myth.

The battle to disprove "born that way and can't change" is now over. The public needs to hear this.

In the APA Handbook, thus on behalf of the APA, Dr. Diamond states, "Hence, directly contrary to the conventional wisdom that individuals with exclusive same-sex attractions represent the prototypical 'type' of sexual-minority individual, and that those with bisexual patterns of attraction are infrequent exceptions, the opposite is true. Individuals with nonexclusive patterns of attraction are indisputably the 'norm,' and those with exclusive same-sex attractions are the exception." This pattern has been found internationally (v. 1, p. 633). Most people who experience same-sex attraction also already experience opposite-sex attraction.

More conventional wisdom that the APA Handbook says is not true is that samesex attraction and transgender identity never change. The American Psychological Association (2011) officially recognizes sexual fluidity or sexual orientation change. The APA Handbook says, "Although change in adolescence and emerging adulthood is understandable, change in adulthood contradicts the prevailing view of consistency in sexual orientation" (Rosario & Schrimshaw, 2014, APA Handbook, v. 1, p. 562).

Also, both the American Psychiatric Association (Diagnostic and Statistical Manual-Fifth Edition, p. 455) and the American Psychological Association (Bockting, 2014, APA Handbook, v. 1, p. 744) recognize transgender identity fluctuates, and the vast majority of gender dysphoric minors will eventually accept their chromosomal sex.

Therapy that is open to change is more in harmony with the course of sexual orientation and gender identity for many than is gay-affirmative or transgender-affirmative therapy.

Researchers often measure sexual orientation by one or more of three separate factors: sexual attraction, behavior, and self-label identity. The APA Handbook says these frequently do not match within the same individual (Rosario & Schrimshaw, 2014, v. 1, p. 558-559; Diamond, 2014, v. 1, p. 634). For example, a person could have bisexual attraction, homosexual behavior, and heterosexual identity if there is a sense that the same-sex sexuality does not represent the authentic self. Many do not act on or base their identity on their same-sex attractions (Rosario & Schrimshaw, 2014, p. 559; Diamond, 2014, p. 629-630; both in APA Handbook, v. 1). The APA Handbook states, "[R]esearch on sexual minorities has long documented that many recall having undergone notable shifts in their patterns of sexual attractions, behaviors, or [orientation] identities over time" (Diamond, 2014, in APA Handbook, v. 1, p. 636).

The APA Handbook reviews a highly regarded study by gay researcher Savin-Williams and colleagues (Savin-Williams, Joyner, & Rieger, 2012; Rosario & Schrimshaw, 2014, APA Handbook, v. 1, p. 562) that followed the sexual identity of young adult participants when most were ages 18 through 24 and again at ages 24 through 34, about 6 years later. Participants indicated whether their sexual identity was heterosexual, mostly heterosexual, bisexual, mostly homosexual, or homosexual

The bisexual group was larger than exclusively gay and lesbian groups combined. But the largest identity group, second only to heterosexual, was "mostly heterosexual" for each sex and across both age groups, and that group was "larger than all the other non-heterosexual identities combined" (Savin-Williams et al., 2012, abstract).

"The bisexual category was the most unstable" with three quarters changing that status in 6 years (abstract, emphasis added). "[O]ver time, more bisexual and mostly heterosexual identified young adults of both sexes moved toward heterosexuality than toward homosexuality" (p 106, emphasis added). Similar change is found in other population-based longitudinal studies, and rates of change do not appear to decline as participants get older (Diamond & Rosky, 2016, p. 7, Table 1).

For both sexes, a heterosexual sexual orientation identity was the most stable" (SavinWilliams 2012, p. 104), as Diamond reports is true in all of the large-scale prospective, longitudinal studies (2014, in APA Handbook, v. 1, p. 637). Savin-Williams and colleagues reported, "In our study, when shifts occurred in sexual orientation identity, most were to an adjacent identity category" (Savin-Williams, 2012, p. 107). Spontaneous change from a 100% homosexual identity to a 100% heterosexual identity seldom occurred (p. 109). "When mostly heterosexual

women and men shifted over time it was primarily to and from the 100% heterosexual category" (p. 109).

A shift of one or more adjacent categories in the direction toward heterosexuality can make a desired goal of chastity easier for some, and a goal of having a gender complimentary relationship may become more or entirely possible.

In the APA Handbook, Diamond says, "In every large-scale representative study reviewed thus far, the single largest group of individuals with same-sex attractions report predominant—but not exclusive—other-sex attractions" (v. 1, p. 634). Kleinplatz and Diamond say (v.1, p. 256), "Historically such individuals [mostly heterosexual] have been treated with skepticism and suspicion by laypeople and scientists alike. They have been viewed as either closeted lesbian, gay, or bisexual individuals (who cling to a mostly heterosexual label to avoid the stigma associated with same-sex sexuality) or as confused or questioning "heteroflexibles." *Heteroflexibles* refers to individuals who, given our culture, have had infrequent same-sex fantasies or experimented with same-sex behavior but are not really gay or bisexual (v.1, p. 256).

Kleinplatz and Diamond urge that "it is critically important for clinicians not to assume that any experience of samesex desire or behavior is a sign of latent homosexuality and instead to allow individuals to determine for themselves the role of same-sex sexuality in their lives and identity" (p. 257) (emphasis added).

Mostly heterosexual individuals do not identify as LGB, and LGB activists have not recognized or represented them well. Some have had therapists wrongly assume they are really homosexual and would be happier leaving their marriage and family for a gay life. But some mostly heterosexual individuals want therapy to help them be faithful in their marriages and keep their families intact.

Therapy that is open to change is more harmonious with the heterosexual fluidity tendency of bisexual and mostly heterosexual individuals—most non-heterosexuals—than is gay-affirmative therapy.

Readers can hear Dr. Diamond review research in her YouTube lecture for an LGBT audience at Cornell University (2014). She said that excellent and abundant research has now *established* that sexual orientation—including attraction, behavior, and identity self label—all three—is fluid for both adolescents and adults and for both genders, and exceptions for LGB individuals are a minority.

Despite the research, political activists continue to promote the "born-that-way-andcan't-change" myth about sexual orientation. The Southern Poverty Law Center (SPLC) published a paper in May this year (2016) in which it said the "National Gay and Lesbian Task Force reacted with alarm," and "warned that the ex-gay industry was under-mining the battle for LGBT rights by suggesting that homosexuality is a choice, not an unchangeable condition like skin color" (p. 9).

Actually, it is the APA and Dr. Diamond, herself a gay activist, that are undermining the falsehood that sexual orientation is like skin color.

According to the APA Handbook, "[W]e are far from identifying potential genes that may explain not just male homosexuality but also female homosexuality" (Rosario & Scrimshaw 2014, v. 1, p. 579). The Handbook also says it is not the case that some same-sex sexuality is biologically determined and some is not. "The inconvenient reality...is that social behaviors are always jointly determined" by nature, nurture, and opportunity (Kleinplatz & Diamond 2014, APA Handbook, v. 1, pp. 256-257).

At the same time, the APA (2008) says same-sex attraction is generally not a choice. Therapists who are open to change agree people generally do not just choose their sexual attractions, otherwise these therapists would not bother to offer therapy. But the reality is, non-heterosexual sexual orientation is changing all around us.

Further underscoring that sexual orientation is changeable, Diamond reports that some say choice was involved for them, and she says one may choose a context or circumstance that may influence sexual orientation change, such as choice of roommate (2008, pp. 249-250), deciding to live in an ideological, political, or social reference group —as in "political lesbians" (2014, in APA Handbook, v.1, p. 632), or being in therapy that is open to change (2008, p. 252). One may reasonably deduce that LGBT and traditional religious support groups are diverse social reference groups that may bring out sexual attraction potential and influence fluidity in contrasting directions.

Dr. Diamond tells LGBT activists near the end of her YouTube lecture, "I feel as a community, the queers have to stop saying, 'Please help us. We're born this way, and we can't change' as an argument for legal standing. I don't think we need that argument, and that argument is going to bite us in the ass, because now we know that there's enough data out there, that the other side is aware of as much as we are aware of it." In other words, Dr. Diamond says, "Stop saying born that way and can't change' for political purposes, because the other side knows it's not true as much as we do."

She also directly discussed the harm of political activists promoting the "can't change" myth in her own book on sexual fluidity in women (2008, pp. 256-257) that won the Distinguished Book Award from the APA Division 44 (LGBT). She acknowledged that, for political motives, some activists "keep propagating a deterministic model: sexual minorities are born that way and can never be

otherwise." She addresses the question, "[I]s it really so bad that it is inaccurate?" Her answer is, "Over the long term, yes, particularly because women are systematically disenfranchised by this approach." She said this deceptive practice does harm to women who have experienced sexual attraction fluidity and have "thought there was something wrong with them." She said this "silencing is ironic," because it is being inflicted by the modern lesbian/gay/bisexual rights movement.

Dr. Diamond has publicly gone on record that she opposes psychotherapy that is open to sexual attraction change. (See Rosik, 2016 for a penetrating critique of her position as expressed in Diamond & Rosky, 2016. See Rosik) Nevertheless, she says in her book (2008, p. 252) that some same-sex attracted individuals may have more capacity than others to channel the direction of their sexual fluidity in response to their context, and they may for that reason modify it in psychotherapy.

Officially, the APA Handbook predictably affirms the position of an APA Task Force (2009) that "same-sex attractions, behavior, and partnerships" are "normal variations in human sexuality and explicitly condemns the use of therapeutic techniques aimed at changing an individual's sexual orientation" (Mustanski, Kuper, and Greene, 2014, APA Handbook, p. 598).

What is surprising is that the APA, in its 2014 Handbook, is now not consistent in the view that sexual variation is normal. The APA Handbook confirms there is excellent research evidence for "associative or potentially causal links" between childhood sexual abuse and ever having same-sex partners, especially for some men. (Mustanski, Kuper, & Greene, 2014, pp. 609-610).

It also confirms that there is possible evidence that psychopathology may be related to the development of transgender identity (Bockting, 2014, APA Handbook, v.1, p).

If pathology leads to an individual's sexual variation, treatment could lead to a significant and meaningful shift in that variation for some. It is harmful and ineffective to ban such treatment.

Curiously, the APA has been silent on even stronger research showing that growing up without one or both biological parents, especially the parent who is the same sex as the child, is potentially causally related to having same-sex attraction, relationships, or identity (Frisch & Hviid, 2006; Francis, 2008; Udry & Chantala, 2005). If literal unavailability of parents could have such effects for some individuals, do we want to dismiss lightly the possibility that emotional unavailability of parents, and especially the parent of the same sex as the child, could have similar effects for some?

In the most stunning of these studies, research on a population cohort of two million Danes (Frisch & Hviid 2006) found that, not only loss of a parent, but specifically loss of the same-sex parent in childhood (such as through death, divorce, end of parent cohabitation, not living with the same-sex parent, or unknown paternity), and especially parent loss during the first six years of life and, for girls, the mother's death during adolescence, were associated with greater likelihood of entering same-sex marriage. The findings suggest the most important developmental periods for parent influence on sexual orientation may be the first six years of life and adolescence. The researchers concluded, "Our study provides population-based, prospective evidence that childhood family experiences are important determinants of heterosexual and homosexual marriage decisions in adulthood" (p. 533).

In the United States, a large, nationally representative, prospective longitudinal study (using the first two waves of the highly regarded Nationally Longitudinal Study of Adolescent Health (Ad Health) data set) found a female growing up with only a biological father—that is, without a biological mother—increased the likelihood a female identified herself as not exclusively heterosexual by 9.5 percentage points (Francis 2008 p. 376).

In another study using the Ad Health data set (the first three waves), when same-sex and opposite-sex attraction were measured separately, 90% of boys who had strong same-sex interest had absent fathers—a very strong relationship. Among boys, the greater the degree of same-sex attraction, the greater the likelihood of father absence, delinquency, and suicidal thoughts. As opposite sex interest also rose, that strong relationship completely disappeared (Udry & Chantala, 2005, p. 487). With the father's presence, there was likely to be opposite-sex attraction, possibly with same-sex attraction also.

There is evidence that transgender identity also may not be a normal sexual variation. The *APA Handbook* says the origin of transgender identity is "most likely the result of a complex interaction between biological and environmental factors...Research on the influence of family of origin dynamics has found some support for separation anxiety among gender-nonconforming boys and psychopathology among mothers" (Bockting, 2014, v. 1, p. 743, emphasis added).

The American Psychiatric Association and the American Psychological Association concur that it is not the case that individuals with transgender identity are born that way and can't change.

According to the APA Handbook (Bockting 2014, v. 1, p. 744), 75% or more of gender dysphoric boys and girls accept their chromosomal sex by adolescence or adulthood. According to the American Psychiatric Association's *Diagnostic and Statistical Manual, Fifth Edition (DSM-5)*, as many as 70 to 98% of gender

dysphoric boys and as many as 50 to 88% of gender dysphoric girls eventually accept their chromosomal sex (calculated from DSM-5, p. 455).

Further, Bockting says in the APA Handbook, "Premature labeling of gender identity should be avoided. Early social transition (i.e., change of gender role, such as registering a birth-assigned boy in school as a girl) should be approached with caution to avoid foreclosing this stage of (trans)gender identity development." If there is early social transition, "the stress associated with possible reversal of this decision has been shown to be substantial..." (2014, in APA Handbook, p. 744).

The American Psychological Association, in its Handbook (Bockting, 2014, v. 1, pp. 750-751), and the American Psychiatric Association (DSM-5, p. 455) say there are three approaches to treatment: attempts to lessen the dysphoria and community—to fully accept the child's gender-variant identity, and the wait-and-see approach. The APA Handbook warns that the full acceptance approach "runs the risk of neglecting individual problems the child might be experiencing and may involve an early gender role transition that might be challenging to reverse if cross-gender feelings do not persist" (Bockting, 2014, v. 1, p. 750).

Both gender identity and sexual orientation can change, psychopathology may be a developmental factor in both, and therefore, we can reasonably deduce, some individuals, though not all, may make a significant and meaningful change in sexual orientation or gender identity through therapy.

For the latest research showing sexual orientation change through therapy is safe and effective (Pela & Nicolosi, 2016), go to http://www.josephnicolosi.com/collection/outcome-research.

Therapy that is open to sexual variation change should be neither coerced nor banned. Shaming generally should be avoided by family members or others for an individual's sexual variation or for the outcome of therapy, whether change does not occur or does occur in the heterosexual direction. Ex-gays have been subjected to shaming, sometimes by the LGBT community that rightfully decries shaming.

Some who have modified their sexual variation with the assistance of professional psychotherapy have regretted that their culture or family told them they could not and should not try to change through therapy. Some chose to live in ideological reference groups that supported chastity or change toward heterosexuality.

Individuals who have sexual variations should have the right to know the above information and to seek therapy to address such issues.

Representative Har rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tupola rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 270, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MINORS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Har and Tupola voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives McDermott and Ward voting no.

Representative Nishimoto, for the Committee on Judiciary, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1957-18) recommending that S.B. No. 901, as amended in HD 1, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 901, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE AEROSPACE ADVISORY COMMITTEE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1959-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2740, SD 1, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2740, SD 1, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Belatti rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Because of a previous ruling on a conflict of interest, I request a limited recusal from voting on the underlying bill, Senate Bill No. 2740, Stand Com. Report No. 1959-18."

The Chair addressed Representative Belatti, stating:

"So ordered."

Representative McKelvey rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2740, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR CLAIMS AGAINST THE STATE, ITS OFFICERS, OR ITS EMPLOYEES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Choy, Har and McKelvey voting no, and with Representative Belatti being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1962-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2100, SD 2, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2100, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RENEWABLE ENERGY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1964-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2910, SD 2, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2910, SD 2, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations. Thank you. This bill is creating a Grid Resiliency Task Force, a Grid Resiliency Loan Program, and a Grid Resiliency Loan Special Fund within the Hawaii Green Infrastructure Authority. So the Hawaii Green Infrastructure Authority, they administer the GEMS Program, which we've talked about a few times on this floor, the Green Energy Market Scrutinization Program, and that gives money into what we call the Hawaii Green Infrastructure Special Fund.

"This fund, if you remember in 2016, we actually passed Act 47 which used \$100 million to cool classrooms from this fund, and then in 2017, Act 57 gave DOE \$46.4 million more from this very fund for heat abatement, to keep cooling classrooms. And as far as I'm concerned, we're not done yet, because there are schoolrooms that still need to be handled but we haven't done those yet. But this is proposing to take \$20 million from that fund and put it into the new Hawaii Grid Resiliency Loan Special Fund. And so it's going to do that, take the \$20 million, put it into there, it's also going to create \$50 million revolving line of credit to sub-fund this Hawaii Green Infrastructure Special Fund.

"And typically, our body has been against creating new funds, special funds, we've been trying to eliminate those so that we can actually figure out where all the holes are, put all the money in the right place, so that we don't have pockets of money not being used. And I commend our chair for doing that, because it's actually made things more efficient, so that we understand what money we're actually operating with every year.

"But this is the thing, is that creating and using ratepayer money to do this program, and this is the comment from DCCA, they acknowledge in their testimony that the proposed Grid Resiliency Loan Program will not directly benefit hard-to-reach consumers or decrease the cost of electric utility service for all, even though it is funded by consumer ratepayers. This inequitable benefit from ratepayer fees is especially unfair, given that this

bill does not include language that ensures that funded energy efficient measures are cost effective.

"So those are my concerns, is that this fund has provided money for us to our heat abatement, which we could definitely use more of it, but we're going to create another loan program that doesn't necessarily benefit each individual ratepayer, but we're using their money to do it. And so we need to be careful as we create new funds to make sure that they're even effective and that they're doing what they're supposed to do, which the GEMS fund, that whole pot of money that we're collecting was supposed to benefit ratepayers, and as we know, the first thing that's most expensive for residents of Hawaii is rent and mortgage. The very next thing, their electric bill. And if we're not bringing that down, then we're not doing enough. Thank you."

Representative Lee rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you. In support, and just wanted to correct my colleague from Nanakuli just on two points, very briefly, for the record. First, that the \$46 million which has been appropriated in a prior legislative session for cooling in schools is actually included in that \$50 million revolving fund. So all we're basically saying is, as that money comes back from the DOE for the work that's been done in those classrooms, it can then be used for other purposes to do efficiency work, to meet the same standards, goals, reductions in both energy use and cost for taxpayers, as well as everyone who uses those facilities.

"Secondly, it's clear that while I think some of the testimony cited referred to certain portions of the bill, ultimately, what's clear is that the \$20 million loan program, which is for critical grid infrastructure, meaning police stations, fire stations, those sorts of things, in the light of a hurricane, which has been estimated to cost this state, if there's a direct impact on Oahu, for example, upwards of \$40 billion. That infrastructure is then upgraded to withstand that kind of impact, so that we have critical services which do benefit all ratepayers, as people will be needing to go to the hospital, will be needing the houses addressed by emergency personnel and so forth. It is a proactive measure looking forward, and something which I think is worthy of further consideration. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2910, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ELECTRIC GRID RESILIENCY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Tupola voting aye with reservations.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1966-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2571, SD 2, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2571, SD 2, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in favor with written comments, please, to save Hanauma Bay and a lot of the other reefs in Hawaii. Thank you."

Representative Ward's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. As I have on previous readings of this measure, I am rising in strong support. Thanks to the research by Dr. Craig Downs of the Haereticus Environmental Laboratory, we have found that oxybenzone not only affects the health of reefs, but also humans. I understand the reservations of the cosmetic industry that one year may be too quick to phase out sunscreens containing this oxybenzone. As this measure moves forward into conference, I hope that our government and the cosmetic industry can find a reasonable compromise to phase out this chemical from the market and preserve our reefs for the next generation. *Mahalo*."

Representative Matsumoto rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered." Representative Matsumoto's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. At this time, I rise in strong support.

"I'd like to thank this body for the work that we've done to help preserve our coral reefs for future generations. Banning oxybenzone and octinoxate will keep our environment and *keiki* safe from the harmful effects of these chemicals.

"Though I am in strong support, I am concerned about the implementation time that was shortened to one year in its last committee. The chair of EEP wisely extended the implementation time to three years.

"We should restore the three-year implementation date to give manufacturers and the FDA time to develop alternatives that are safe for our environment and bodies, protective, and aren't prohibitively expensive.

"I hope we can address those concerns in conference.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Cachola rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative DeCoite rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative DeCoite's written remarks are as follows:

"My reservations with this bill relate to the scientific evidence that has been presented in hearings on this bill. DLNR has testified that studies have documented the negative impact of these chemicals on corals and other marine life in a laboratory setting, however, little is known about the actual impacts of these chemicals in a natural marine setting. The Hawaii Medical Association also opposed this bill and said the science on this bill has been misrepresented and that the primary source of damage to coral reefs is due to land-based source pollution, over-fishing, invasive species, and climate change. We also need to address these other sources of damage to our coral reefs. *Mahalo*."

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Our reefs could soon disappear from the planet. Forty percent of the Great Barrier Reef is already dead, and Hawaii's reefs were extensively damaged in the bleaching event in 2014 and 2015. And in West Hawaii, which is home to the state's healthiest and most vibrant reefs, 50% of coral has died in that single event. And scientists now estimate that, at the rate we're going, over 90% of the planet's reefs will be dead by 2050.

"The reef is the rainforest of the ocean, and the consequences of losing it are hard to imagine. It would impact hundreds of millions who rely on the ocean for food and fishing, and forever change our way of life and culture here in Hawaii. It would be devastating to our economy and our tourism industry.

"Some will argue that we shouldn't pass this bill because they mistakenly believe that they must have this specific kind of sunscreen to protect them from UVA and UVB rays that can cause skin cancer. This is false. There are a multitude of products on the shelves today, available at Safeway, at Long's, at KTA, produced by mainstream brands like Coppertone, Banana Boat, Neutrogena, that are oxybenzone free and are rated SPF 30, 50, 60. Dermatologists recommend SPF 30 or above, and a SPF 30 rated product containing oxybenzone does not provide better protection than an SPF 30 rated product containing titanium dioxide or zinc oxide. They both provide the same protection of SPF 30 as defined by the FDA.

"And others say we shouldn't pass this bill because climate change, coral bleaching, sewage and runoff are larger threats to the reef, but this is like saying, if we cannot do everything at once, we should do nothing at all. We are working on reducing Hawaii's greenhouse gas emissions, and to clean up our waste water systems. But passing this bill today is something we can do right now to protect our reef and give them the best chance of surviving.

"Exposure to the sunscreen chemicals oxybenzone and octinoxate prevents coral from reproducing, causes coral to bleach at lower temperatures, and severely impacts the ability of corals to recover from bleaching events. We have a job to do here, and even though we don't have a magic wand to wave to solve all of the planet's problems at once, the citizens of Hawaii expect us to do what we can, to make an effort and to not give up. Saving our reefs will be an uphill battle, but I intend to fight to the last breath, starting right now by supporting this bill. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2571, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WATER POLLUTION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Cachola and DeCoite voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Har, Hashem, Kong, Onishi and Takayama voting no.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1973-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2705, SD 2, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2705, SD 2, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative San Buenaventura rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2705, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC-PRIVATE PARTNERSHIPS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative San Buenaventura voting aye with reservations.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1976-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2653, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2653, SD 1, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Choy rose in opposition to the measure and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Choy's written remarks are as follows:

"In opposition. My very deep belief is that local work should go to local people, but I do understand there could be a shortage of physicians in the State of Hawaii. To my dismay, this alleged physician shortage has been a mantra from the medical community for all ten years I have been in the Legislature. Unfortunately, our state government, our medical community and our educational institutions do not seem to be able to address this problem. The problem that this bill is trying to address should be addressed by a policy change, policy courage and policy implementation, instead of taking the easy way out by allowing medical professionals from other states to practice in Hawaii. This is bad policy.

"What if the physicians from the other states decide not to come? What happens to the medical needs of our citizens? Do the best and most competent professionals really have time to fly to Hawaii to help our residents, or is it just the mediocre ones? Will professionals from the mainland really support our community, or are they the same as the people who come and buy our homes, which raises our home costs and exacerbate our cost of living, then fly home?

"This body has promoted many sustainability initiatives in the areas of food and energy sustainability. But sustainability in health and other professional services, we seem to be taking a direction that declares we desperately need help from the mainland and that we even covet that support.

"This is a failing of policy makers. We should be trying to be sustainable in all areas, including professional services. Ironically, we have a medical school whose sole purpose is to produce medical care professionals for the people of our state. If this institution cannot fulfill its mission, then we should close our medical school and save our precious resources.

"If we truly want to be independent and self-sufficient, we policy makers should be serious and consistent on sustainability polices in all areas."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2653, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHAPTER 453, HAWAII REVISED STATUTES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Tokioka voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Choy voting no.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1982-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2654, SD 2, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2654, SD 2, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Gates rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support with reservations. I support the intent of this measure to reduce usage among youth and young adults regarding ecigarettes, but my concern with this legislation as it stands right now is that it would make it unlawful for local retailers to sell e-cigarette products online to deter youth from getting their hands on it, but what my concern is is that we don't have that regulation in place to regulate online sales as of right now, from my understanding, and this would put local retailers at a disadvantage. I do have multiple retailers of e-cigarettes within my district, and it would have some drastic impacts on their business and could possibly shut it down, and that's why I'm speaking with reservations on this measure, and I hope that conferees can work this out in conference. Thank you."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Register a no vote, please. I also share similar concerns as my prior colleague, and other things I wanted to bring up in the bill is, I've always been against not just tax increases, but fees, overregulation. This is going to take the license fee from \$2.50 up to \$250, it's going to take the permit fee from \$20 to \$50, it's going to increase tax from 16 cents to an unspecified amount. It's also going to tax all other products from 70% to an unspecified percentage, which will be figured out later. All of these increases, on top of the fact that we don't have the ability to enforce it.

"And that was the gist of our conversation in the Finance Committee, is upon passing this, how would we actually do it? We'd have them go online and check a box that they got it shipped in and then who would go and make sure that the guys who shipped it in got penalized for it, or that someone found out about it? This measure specifically lacks enforcement of the proposed civil penalty of the out-of-state retailers and will not eliminate tobacco product sales to Hawaii residents.

"If the goal is to ban tobacco use in the State of Hawaii by making it cost prohibitive to smoke, then we should probably just ban tobacco all together. Because we're kind of nibbling around the edges, but we're going to propose something that we possibly couldn't even enforce, and wouldn't even know how to start.

"Secondly, I definitely think that, I've actually never smoked in my life and I'm not a fan of smoking, but there's so much good that we can do to push forward our public health initiatives. When we do advocacy, when we teach, when we put out public awareness announcements. And so some of these things I think would actually be a proactive way of addressing the

health concern that many people have, and then also enabling businesses to still operate and not increasing these fees in an exorbitant amount that, again, like my colleague said, would shut them down because of how far the increase is. So those are my concerns. Thank you."

Representative Mizuno rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I'm a little perplexed, \$2.50 for a sales license for cigarettes, I mean, really? A carton of cigarettes cost double that. Some people think that this bill is about taxing, taxing, taxing. Who would do this in an election year, it's crazy, absolutely crazy, I get that. It's about saving lives. We'd like to tax people so we don't lose the 1,400 lives every year in the State of Hawaii because of tobacco. Some people don't get it, tobacco kills. Every year, 1,400 people die because of tobacco. This is not a tax to get our state tax coffers filled. This is not a tax to make government rich. It's to save 1,400 lives. In support, thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in favor with a brief comment and, actually, a question. As a reformed smoker of a couple of decades, I know what the downside of this is and what the intent is, and what the good speaker just noted. The problem I have is it confounds me on the enforcement. And in the Finance Committee, we had a room full of people, I said, will one of you please tell me how you're going to get somebody who's on the internet, and they order cigarettes and it's delivered? I had a constituent who, because of the price of cigarettes, started to order out of either North or South Carolina. How are you going to catch these people, unless we're going to grow a big brother, secret cigarette police. If the good speaker from Kalihi or anywhere knows how we're going to enforce this, I would greatly benefit from the enlightenment of that, because this is a good bill, but is it practical in the sense that if a piece of legislation can't be enforced, it's really a gesture and a feel-good message that we're sending during an election year. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2654, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHAPTER 245, HAWAII REVISED STATUTES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 2 noes, with Representative Gates voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives McDermott and Tupola voting no.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1985-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2293, SD 2, HD 2, as amended in HD 3, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2293, SD 2, HD 3 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations. Thank you. I understand the intent of 2293, and I learned even more of it through the committee, and I think there's only one part that I have reservations about. And it's not even because it's a Maui thing, it's just in general about the way we deal with businesses.

"It definitely had an appropriation in there for HHFDC to negotiate the extension of the affordable housing status. And then it also contained an appropriation to expedite the construction of the Leialii affordable housing apartments. And then it provided a rent subsidy to the apartment tenants, and this was good, because then it could help the tenants. The part that I didn't understand and I have reservations about was in regards to the rent subsidy.

"In the bill we required a dollar for dollar match from either the County of Maui or the apartment owners, and if none of these entities provided matching funds, then it prohibited the apartment owners, which is a private business, or their successor, from ever doing business in the State of Hawaii. So, again, it's a private business, and if they don't comply with our requirements, then we're going to ban them from doing business in Hawaii, and that's what my reservation was about, is if we did this on this bill, how

would that affect other statutes or bills that we put forward in regards to things that happen.

"And the owners of the apartment complex, they had actually put out and signed a contract to exercise their right to obtain the property. And then when they filed for that right, HHFDC had a year to find a buyer, and they weren't able to find a buyer, and that's why we're at where we're at. So that's the part of the bill that I had concerns with, is just telling one specific business that if this doesn't work out, then you can't do business here in Hawaii.

"I definitely think that we need more affordable housing. I think that we need to support that. I don't know what that would look like for this specific housing project, but I do think that it is going to set a precedent for affordable housing projects in the future that go this way. And I definitely think we should consider that it's kind of meandering towards a bill of attainder, which basically says that we're punishing a specific business or entity. And so we don't want to do that, and I know we don't intend to do that, and those are my reservations with that portion of the bill. Thank you."

Representative Luke rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. The history behind the Front Street Apartments is the entity and the owners of the apartment has promised to provide 50 years of affordable rentals for these residents of Maui, and these are the working poor and lot of seniors who live in Front Street. And this entity that went into the agreement with HCDCH, they entered into an agreement, and with that agreement the county has provided a lot of support for the owners, and in addition to that, they were able to get either federal credit or tax credits to build this unit. After that, they were able to find a loophole in the tax law and got out of this agreement, which was supposed to provide 50 years of affordable housing for these poor individuals.

"So after 15 years, they give a notice to these residents and say, you know what, we're going to turn it into market, all you guys are out. So the concern that we have is, this is a strong message. This is a strong message that if you are going to use the state and federal tax credit, and if you are going to take the benefit and promise residents that you are going to provide 50 years of affordable rentals, you cannot then turn around and find some loophole and kick these individuals out to the street. Because we have heard time and time again that these individuals, there are not enough affordable housing on Maui to take care of these individuals, and these 200 individuals will essentially become homeless.

"So this is a specific circumstance, and we need to send a strong message to bad actors who take advantage of senior citizens and the working poor and promise them 50 years of affordable units, but after 15 years kick them out on the street. And we need to send that message, that no one should be taking advantage of working poor, no matter where they live in our state, and no one should be taking advantage of some kind of loophole that they found 10 years after they took over this property. So, strong support."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, strong support. I would first like the words of the Finance Chair entered into the record as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative McKelvey continued, stating:

"And I'll probably be less nice than her. They ripped off the taxpayers of the State of Hawaii and received millions of dollars in benefits from the county and state level for the assurance of affordable housing for the time period.

"This is a canary in a coal mine, because there's a lot of other projects that could potentially fall into this loophole, and that loophole could be exercised in the future. So this could be the beginning, the strong message being sent in here is so apropos, given that this could be taken and developed in other areas. Thank you."

Representative Tupola rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you. I support both of the previous speakers in what had happened with that, and again, my concern wasn't for what was going on on Maui, but in the future. And I think closing up the loophole is one of the most important things that we can do, but it was for the people who don't actually fall into this category. So I appreciate that and do support all of the discussion. We've had lots of discussion in Finance about this. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2293, SD 2, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AFFORDABLE HOUSING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Tupola voting aye with reservations

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1987-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2424, SD 2, as amended in HD 1, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2424, SD 2, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Holt rose in support of the measure and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Holt's written remarks are as follows:

"Amid a huge housing crisis due to the rising cost of living and the movement to smaller, more efficient and low-impact lifestyles, SB 2424, SD 2, HD 1 gives us the unique opportunity to address both our homeless and affordable housing crises by supporting the development of affordable tiny homes. I think there is definitely a need for this to make alternative-type housing available for our Hawaiians, with great financial benefits."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2424, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING FOR NATIVE HAWAIIANS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1988-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2990, SD 2, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2990, SD 2, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations. I support paid family leave. What I have concerns with in this particular bill is that the employer sections includes those with only one employee. And so it includes those with family businesses, with the lunch wagons, with the tiny hole in the wall, who have a difficult time when that one employee takes family leave, because they don't have other employees for which they could juggle to fill in the hole.

"For those reasons, until we fix that portion, I am with reservations. And I understand that there is this insurance appropriation that the chair or the introducer inserted in this bill, and I would like to point out that small businesses who have had assurances before, like the supplementation of prepaid health insurance, know that that's an illusory appropriation. It may be in for now, but not for later. And as such, again, until we take care of the small businesses, the tiny businesses, not just the small business as determined by Small Business Administration, but the tiny family-run businesses of one or two employees, I stand with reservations. Thank you."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I have similar reservations, but I'm going to cast a no vote, and there's a few reasons why. I definitely echo the same sentiments, my main concern is for the small businesses, the ones that aren't

going to be able to support, financially, a determination that we don't know yet. So what this is proposing is that we make a board that in the future would determine what the paid family leave program would look like, and that's where the ambiguity lies. I would much, much, much rather vote on something that we know how the fiscal impact is going to affect businesses, how it's going to either help or hurt the economy, and how businesses are going to be able to be sustained through it. Then we could be able to determine whether or not we would be able to support it, but this is supporting a board who would make that determination later.

"And another thing I wanted to bring up is that the bill requires the composition of the board to have 18 members, and as was brought up in testimony, only three of those would represent the interests of those who would have to be enforcing this family leave. And that's where the concern was with the chamber, with other business organizations that came forward, is that the representation on the board should be such where people who have to implement it would feel not only represented, but be able to vet their concerns of how they would implement it, whether it's through accounting or through additional positions in order for them to actually execute what would be proposed. It doesn't actually create a model, but it creates a board that would think about it. And from a lot of submitted testimonies from small family-owned businesses, they confirmed that it's really hard to do business in Hawaii, already. And so, that's what they're afraid of.

"And again, If we had already done a task force or a study and we were voting on the completed proposed project, then we would be able to comfort these businesses and let them know, okay there's a way out, there's a way for you to get the help you need. And I think for a lot of these mom and pop stores, they want to stay competitive and they want to keep being able to do business in Hawaii, but they're concerned that this will make it harder, it'll increase their prices. And I talked to a few of the restaurant owners, big restaurants, and I don't want to say the names because probably half of us eat over there, but a lot of them were saying that they indefinitely would have to increase the prices on their menus in order to figure out how to implement it, how to make money aside.

"And of course we talked about it in the committee, about it'd only be a dollar a year, it'd be 50, but that's what we hypothetically think it would be, we still don't know, because it's still going to be discussed. And I believe it was brought up, I forget by who, about Washington State, implementing their model, and it took them about 10 years to prepare their economy, to prepare their businesses for this. And so I think DLIR said that the social insurance model is pretty costly for Washington, and of course we don't want to go down a costly route, but we don't know what will come out of the actual committee that will convene.

"And LRB had some serious concerns about the actual timely completing of the study. So they're supposed to do a study, and then when they finish the study by 2019, that study is supposed to guide the board. And they said that in order to do a comprehensive one and make sure that all of the perspectives were considered, they didn't think they could do it by 2019. And they said that it would be a very ambitious goal to set it to be done by 2019. And if this board was convened to actually finish that study and reassure people, not only ourselves but business owners, that this could be a model that our economy could handle, that businesses could survive through. I think it would go a lot better for those businesses.

"It does create a supplemental fund, which intends to offset the costs for temporary hires. But still, it's kind of a stopgap, because we don't know how much that impact would be. So, again, the Chamber of Commerce, not just here on this island but all around the state, they've all brought up, if we could just see the impact, the financial impact for businesses, then we'd be in a better position. But having only three representatives on the board of 18 to represent our needs concerns them. So, those are my concerns. Thank you."

Representative Johanson rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I think all of the concerns that have been brought up today are certainly valid, and as chair of the Labor Committee we do take those concerns definitely to heart, because I think the main thing that is important to understand with paid family leave is that there's a symbiotic relationship between the employer and the employee,

there cannot be, effectively, a system of paid family leave if employers are not healthy, if businesses are not thriving and not able to employee people.

"With that said, as a context, part of the reason for the design of this particular bill is to provide a framework, recognizing the complexity of executing a paid family leave program. This bill was specifically designed to enfranchise all of the important stakeholders who heretofore have not agreed on how to execute paid family leave, and it's led to the fact that we haven't necessarily talked about mechanics. We haven't gotten a discussion further beyond just a conceptual support of something, as opposed to at least now, where we're talking about mechanics.

"I will also note that the composition of the board, I think people forget that someone from the accounting or tax industry, someone from the insurance industry, and someone from the HR industry, as well as the named three small business representatives, are all from the private sector. So there are actually six people on this implementation board that come from private industry and come from a business of some type. That is balanced with the number of advocates that are also six.

"I think people only look at the small business representatives that are 50 and under, 50 to 100, and 100 or more. And while I specifically explicated those, because I think it's important to have businesses of varying sizes, I wanted to emphasize that the composition of the board is more balanced than sometimes opponents of this measure like to characterize. Furthermore, I think the reason specifically for this design is, we need these stakeholders to have the input rather than just, and we could, in fact the Senate has done so in the House bill, we could mandate a model, which I understand certainly would give people certainty as to what they're evaluating, and that's one way to go.

"But I would say, it's also important to enfranchise the very people who we're supposed to be concerned about, and who many have rightly so mentioned, our employers, that we also need to factor in here, the ability to shape their own destiny. And that's what this implementation board does, Mr. Speaker, it allows people from the business sector to choose or to help, to at least have input, along with the paid family leave advocates, on what kind of effectuating mechanism would establish paid family leave in Hawaii.

"I will also note that in this version of the bill, there are specific benchmarks, so it's not just a conceptual framework, but there are specific benchmarks that must be met. And in addition, the model chosen, or the mechanism chosen to effectuate paid family leave, must give preference to the following criteria. Coverage of all workers, gender equity, ease of application or claims, speed of benefit payments, sustainability, administration, data collecting capabilities, and compliance monitoring capabilities.

"So what we've tried to do is, while not necessarily mandating a specific model, we have tried to ensure that there are enough safeguards and enough mandates within the bill such that something reasonable and feasible is going to be implemented.

"And lastly, Mr. Speaker, besides something that I think is helpful not just for small businesses but also certainly for workers, as our population ages, and as we will continually have to confront, as a workforce, changing demographics with what millennials and their preferences would be, what I think is important to note here is that I understand the discussion and am empathetic, actually, to the small business community, but much of their testimony is predicated on the belief that they will bear every single cost.

"In the two models, at least that are talked about in this particular bill or referenced, much of the cost is actually borne by an employee payroll deduction. It's certainly fair for people, I think in the course of debate, to assume a worst-case scenario, but I think we also have to contextualize that for those who oppose paid family leave, they are understandably taking a worst-case scenario when they evaluate the fact that they assume they will bear every burden."

Representative McKelvey rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Johanson continued, stating:

"Thank you. I can't speak to the obligations created by previous legislatures where businesses do have to bear the brunt of the cost, and so I do understand that their concerns are certainly valid, but I will say, it would probably be a mistake to assume, at least with paid family leave, that businesses will bear the entire brunt of the establishment of the program. So it's for all these reasons that I ask for support of this measure, that I also recognize is a work in progress. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations. Five pieces of reservations, Mr. Speaker. The first of which, if we go back to the hearing in the Finance Committee, the good Chair of the Finance Committee called out DLIR as, why are you testifying with this lukewarm endorsement? The possible confusion of what this is and how it's to be put together, and who's going to do it and how they're going to do it, is really questionable.

"Second reason, we're rushing to an implementation board, not a task force, which generally is the stage chronologically when we do these kinds of things. An implementation board, which means it's ready, fire, aim, which we often do here in the Legislature, Mr. Speaker. Why we're rushing this is confusing.

"Third reason, as has been brought up by my good colleague from Puna, the cost to the small guys. Not only the mom and pop, just the mom or just the pop, the one person. This is an entrepreneurial killer, Mr. Speaker. You don't want to put barriers, like the Europeans do, to make the hurdle to get into business so high that those who are already in business and they've made it, i.e. 80% fail the first five years, the 20% who made it, they're going to benefit from this because they can probably afford it.

"Fourthly, the structure that my good colleague from Moanalua just spoke of. He said there were 6 members out of 18. Well, the actual business people are going to pay for it, or pay the most of it, are the actual entrepreneurs, the others are ancillary entrepreneurs. But even granting if you get 6 out of 18, I generally shy from doing math in public, but 6 out of 18 is one third. When you stack a deck 65 to 35, Mr. Speaker, where's the stakeholders that is claimed to be engaged here, where are they being represented?

"Lastly, Mr. Speaker, as we do these studies, as we take in these remarks that have been on the floor today, I would hope the conference committee would be very deliberative, very purposeful to see some of the reservations that people have. Not just because of the business community, but because of the Department of Labor and other people in the implementation process, to find out a model that works well and can be implemented well. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."


Representative Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising in support of family leave. Thank you. Mr. Speaker, I would like permission to insert a one-page chart into the Journal showing the 41 nations that do grant, it's parental leave in this chart. And at the very bottom, with a zero by it, is the United States. I think it's time that we change that statistic. And Mr. Speaker, it starts with Estonia, which has a significant amount of paid leave, and then Japan is fourth. So, we're down at the very bottom, and if I may have permission to have that inserted in the Journal. Thank you."

Representative Thielen submitted the following chart by the Pew Research Center:

Representative Cachola rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'm voting in support of this measure, but with reservations. I'm very, very concerned, not only about the small business, but for those first-generation immigrants. We've been through that, my wife and I are first-generation immigrants here in America. My wife being a medical doctor with a degree, her first job is babysitting, my first job is the lowest of the totem pole. If we come up with increase in, more or less, business expenses, et cetera, they will have a hard time getting into a job.

"And so they wish at least fix, more or less, to address the concern of the small business, so that then first-generation immigrants just like me will be able to get a job. Some work as yardmen, some work as landscaper assistants, whatever they can get. My advice to them, when they come to me, how to get a job, don't choose any kind of job irrespective of what degree you have in your country. Get the first job, work, and do the best thing you can and prove to them that you can do the job.

"If we come up with a lot more expenses for small business, then it's kind of hard for them to get in. If you go apply with the bigger corporation, they will look at your credentials. Those are the things that are more or less my concern about first-generation immigrants, and there's a lot coming to Hawaii. It is for that reason that I'll be supporting this bill, because it has a lot of merits, but with reservation. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support permission to insert comments in the Journal. Just in brief, my support is simply because we need real relief for working families. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, first I would like to thank the Labor Chair for his hard work on this issue this year. I would like to comment that the House version is much better. I fear that the implementation board will end up being stacked with business representatives. At the end of the day, it's not their job as businesses to protect our working families—that's our job as legislators.

"This bill provides for another study on paid leave, but the necessary research has already been conducted. The US Department of Labor has a full analysis on Paid Family Leave in Hawaii. I don't believe we need another study- we need real relief for working families."

Representative Tokioka rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representative San Buenaventura be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative DeCoite rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations and a brief comment. Mr. Speaker, while many small businesses have been struggling throughout these years, and the encouragement by the State and by others have always been encouraged for youth entrepreneurship, for small business administration, to get these guys on the right track. While I support the need for family medical leave, I look at what's in front of us today.

"Many small businesses, even on an island like Molokai that have struggled for many years, have been met with the same competition in transportation, in gas, in high electric, while an added cost, of what we don't know to date, will be added to another expense towards the employer, while those that have given sick leave and vacation, expanded out on TDI and temporary disability is also an option for these businesses to give towards their employees.

"Granting that we do have a few bad apples, Mr. Speaker, adding on another added cost without realizing the struggles of those that have existed today within the business community forces many of us to now try and hire another person in case of a family medical leave that is requested. And by all means, I've had to stand by and watch my own pass on, and take the day off, or several days off and weeks off to care for them.

"But at the same time, when we're faced with those that continue to abuse the use of sick leave and vacation and family medical leave, I hinder upon the imposition of these that are on small businesses, and would request that when we go into conference and deliberation, that whether or not companies that have 10 or less employees be looked at as another avenue to not impact those employees on a measure such as this. And I would like to add written comments to the Journal, Mr. Speaker. Thank you."

Representative DeCoite's written remarks are as follows:

"I have reservations on this bill because I have heard from many in my district who may be negatively affected by this bill because it will increase their costs of doing business. This bill will affect all employers, large or small; and will also impact all employees because they will have to make payments into this new Paid Family Leave Special Fund. Most benefits such as this are entirely employer paid, and I believe that Paid Family Leave may eventually have to be borne only by employers. One negative consequence if this bill passes is that employers may end up reducing their staff to pay for this additional cost; another negative consequence is that employers may reduce current benefits to pay for this new one. These negative consequences are not what we want or need.

"HD 1 also changes the lead agency on this bill and replaces the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations (DLIR) with the Department of Human Services (DHS). I believe that this should be given back to the

DLIR because it has the most experience in administering employee benefit programs such as Prepaid Health, Unemployment, Temporary Disability Insurance, and Workers' Compensation. I also recognize the need that employees have in taking care of their families, so I hope that as this bill moves forward, we will be able to find the right balance that we can all live with Mahalo."

Representative San Buenaventura rose to respond, stating:

"Sorry, second time. I would like to point out that, I would like to put written comments, but just a few brief remarks. Thank you. I would like to point out that I am fully in support of the Labor Chair's implementation board, I really admire the fact that he put that in to ensure that small businesses and tiny businesses are going to be taken into account. But I'd like to make sure that tiny businesses like mine, I am an employer, I have this tiny business, I used to have three employees, I'm down to one, barely, and that one employee, because I'm a legislator, whatever money comes in the door pays for her wages. So if she goes on paid family leave, there's no money coming into the door, which means I'm going to need to lay her off.

"So there are tiny businesses like mine where, because we love our employees, we want to make sure that they do have income, that even though we have separate sources of income or that we can retire, and I know that there are a number of businesses, family businesses where they do want to retire and shut their doors, but because they love their employees, they want to keep it open enough, but if there is no money coming into the door, there's nothing to pay for their wages.

"So the second thing I want to point out is that if we start doing this, there may be an unintended effect, and the example of that, and I'm speaking as an employer, who is a feminist, an example of this is our implementation of TDI. We did not prevent discrimination against women when we implemented TDI. Employers who pay TDI know that when they get their insurance premiums, they are requested, and we are required as employers to state how many women we employ. Few states prevent that kind of discrimination. And I'm afraid that if we pass this, the same people we want to protect, those who are the women who have children, who have family dependents who are dependent on them, are going to be discriminated against. Thank you very much."

Representative San Buenaventura's written remarks are as follows:

"Businesses know that the premium insurance fund mentioned in this bill is illusory like the healthcare premium supplementation fund which is rarely funded. Thus, I am concerned that this bill will adversely affect small struggling businesses of one employee, like lunch wagon owners, who are not big enough to absorb the expense of paying for the absence of one employee because they will need to hire another when they can barely afford one. I am concerned that in helping those who are in desperate need of a flexible job because of dependent care, they will in fact be discriminated against because an employer will not be likely to hire them in key high-paying positions under the fear that they will not be available. Until those concerns are taken into account, I will be voting with reservations."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"With reservations, second time. Mr. Speaker, what I heard was an excellent amendment on the floor from that last speaker from Puna. What I am saying is that for the counsel to those who are going to be on the conference committee, exempting the micro businesses, one to three employees, would be an honest and just adjustment of this bill. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tupola rose to respond, stating:

"Second time. I just wanted to also thank everyone for the conversation. I think what my colleague brought up from Hawaii Kai is that, I don't think we all are against family leave, I think we want it to happen, but in a way that people can bear it. And the implementation board could be a good idea, definitely, but what the concern is, is what would be implemented. Again, you could do it in the implementation board and kind of create it as you go, or you could have the statute pass where we know what the board would be implementing it and how they would actually support businesses through it.

"But I just wanted to share real quick that I agree with that symbiotic relationship between the employer and the employee. And one of the best stories, and I know I shared it, and I'm going to share it again because I feel like this is a prime example of just what the Representative from Puna said about how employers love their employees, and how we can find a way to actually reward that, find a way to embrace those employers that are actually taking in their employees just like family members, taking care of them. And Richard Tanaka of Tanaka of Tokyo, this is a really good restaurant, but he told me this story that when his employee, who they love, he said everyone in their whole company, he said, no matter how big my company gets, we all treat them like family, fell sick with cancer. He said, I paid his salary for a year and a half and he didn't come in while he had cancer and he undertook his operation.

"And all I'm trying to say is that there are businesses out there that take care of their employees just like family members, and that's what their concern is. Is knowing what the object would be that's being implemented so that they wouldn't be adversely affected if they're already doing even a better job than I think any state government program could come up with, and how we can reward those businesses while still bearing in mind that the businesses that are 10 employees and under or even smaller aren't adversely affected. Thank you."

Representative Say rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, may I request a ruling on a potential conflict? I'm a small business man with three full-time employees, and three sales commission members," and the Chair ruled, "no conflict."

Representative Say continued to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"May I just record a with reservations at this point. I realize that the defective date is 2050, and I hope the conferees of the House will try to support the small business which is the backbone of the State of Hawaii. I would also like to request that the conferees also consider that we here, as Members of this House, all 51 members will be employers, and I hope this particular issue will be addressed in more of the bigger corporations and the unions, that they could negotiate family leave as part of collective bargaining.

"But the unintended consequences will be, if it is a mandate in our insurance policies, it's an increase for all of us, as far as paying for that, too. It's going to be part of the overall package of the EUTF. All of this are the unintended consequences that you folks should be aware of. Any mandated benefits, as far as family leave, is going to cost the employer more. And at this point I'll be waiting to see what the conference draft is. I am a with reservations. Thank you."

Representative Har rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tokioka rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations again. But real quickly, on Kauai we have a lot of small businesses, and I know the intent of this bill is good, but some of the discussion that happened earlier when it pertains to small businesses. I have a lot of small restaurants in my district, and I know one of them is close to Aunty Jane Dobashi's house, but they have three employees, and if one of those employees are gone at Po's Kitchen, it's going to be very, very difficult for her to operate that business, and I know that was brought up a lot today.

"So for those types of concerns, I was a previous owner of three restaurants. We did pass the minimum wage without the tip tax credit for those small businesses, and so, if you look now in the media throughout the state, a lot of restaurants are closing, and some of them have reached out to us to share their concerns about the small businesses and how they cannot make it on some of the laws that we pass. So for those people, I stand with reservations, and hopefully, as Speaker Emeritus said in his speech, I know the defective date is in there, but I hope in conference we can fix some of those things that were brought up on this floor this morning. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support, a few brief comments. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In addition to the nation's reported by the Representative from Kailua, I would add that paid family leave is becoming more common amongst our own sister-states, California, New York, Washington, Rhode Island, New Jersey. Of these, two, California and New York, some of the most populace states in our country. So paid family leave is becoming a norm. And for the 247,000 family caregivers that this could affect, and the children and *kūpuna* who could be affected because of this, this is a measure that we should pass, and continue to discuss.

"Second point, Mr. Speaker, in rebuttal to the comment that we're rushing into this and where is the opportunity for individuals and different stakeholders to participate. Through the framework created with the implementation board with benchmarks and with specific reports to the Legislature over a period of three years, we have addressed those concerns. Finally, Mr. Speaker, third and last point, this bill is going into conference, so many of the good points noted here on the floor can be taken up by conferees. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ing rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. I do have a few issues with the implementation board, how there's only going to be one recommendation to the Legislature after they're done convening. And it seems like, in the interest of fairness, we always talk about bringing the stakeholders to the table, but when you do that and you don't account for power dynamics, whoever comes to the table with the biggest bags of money and the best lawyers and the most existing power ends up prevailing. So we need to do more than just bring all the stakeholders to the table. Even if they're just a few from the chamber or the business community, they will have a lot more power than community advocates at the end of the day, so it would be nice to have a few options come out at the end of this in order for the Legislature to consider.

"Because, when we talk about our sister-states who have already passed this law, they're a lot stronger than some of the things that's been discussed throughout session. If you watched the State of the Union, Donald Trump supported paid family leave, right? So what does this paid family leave proposal look like? Is it a social insurance model? Is it a TDI model? New York passed a TDI model, that's what it seems like it's leaning here in Hawaii. New York passed one, but they had a government program already for TDI. Ours goes through private insurance, which would be costly, not just to the worker, but to the employer as well. So how do you create a system that's fair to all?

"And I should also note that what employers need, what business owners need, as well as low costs, is customers. And our state, over 30% of us now, aren't meeting our basic needs, 40% of our jobs aren't living wage, don't pay living wages. So how are people even going to go to restaurants anymore? I'm eating out a lot less, right, than I used to. So let's keep that in mind, that small businesses, with all due respect, aren't the backbone of the economy, workers are. Workers create, labor creates all wealth, right? And with all due respect, if you cannot afford, we need paid family leave now, and if you can't afford paid family leave, then you cannot afford to do business in Hawaii. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tupola rose, stating:

"I'll be changing from no to with reservations. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2990, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FAMILY LEAVE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representatives Cachola, DeCoite, Har, San Buenaventura, Say, Tokioka, Tupola and Ward voting aye with reservations.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1989-18) recommending that S.B. No. 2524, SD 1, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2524, SD 1, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Matsumoto rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. At this time, I rise in opposition. Thank you. I'm a strong believer that agricultural land should be used for agricultural purposes. I know this bill is well intentioned, the Honolulu Department of Planning and Permitting wants to stop people from subverting or disobeying zoning laws on Ag land, and so do I, Mr. Speaker. But unfortunately, I don't think that's what this bill does.

"As the law currently stands, a CPR property has the same requirements, restrictions and amenities as the larger subdivision it's a part of, no more, no less. Land use, zoning, density, permitting, building codes, infrastructure, all of these very important things are determined at the subdivision level, through county zoning and permitting. The CPR process changes none of them. That fact helps make the current CPR process safe for those like me who want to keep agricultural land for agricultural purposes.

"But this bill threatens to change that. It would take the CPR process and turn it into a new subdivision process. The land would be treated not as a part of the larger subdivision, but as a new subdivision. That means requiring more urban infrastructure on ag lands, such as streets, street lights, gutters, and maybe even water lines and sewer lines. This isn't preventing development on ag lands, it's helping it happen. Requiring so much urban infrastructure on ag lands is a slippery slope to non-agricultural uses.

"This is an issue in my district that many are very concerned about, and if we put in all of this residential infrastructure, it only makes it easier in the future for more residential homes to go up where they shouldn't be. As the saying goes, if you build it, they will come. That's to say, if we require residential infrastructure on our ag lands, eventually we'll end up with residences. As the Hawaii Cattlemen's Council put it, cows don't need streetlights, and neither do our farmers and ranchers.

"If the problem is that many buyers of CPR ag lands are misinformed, then we need to give them more information. On the other hand, if the problem of CPR ag lands is that they're threatening to break or subvert the county zoning rules, then we need to enforce those rules. Requiring urban infrastructure on ag land isn't the solution to the actual problem here. And for that reason, I oppose this bill. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Nakamura rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"May I have a ruling on a potential conflict of interest? I own a CPR property, and my husband's law practice sometimes involves CPRs," and the Chair ruled, "no conflict."

Representative DeCoite rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. Mr. Speaker, we heard a lot on this measure, and while this has been a Honolulu issue, and maybe everybody else but Maui County, just to be clear, I believe that those that have opposed it in Maui County, whether it be the landowner, the realtor, and the farmer or rancher, they're opposing it on two separate issues of opposition.

"I think the intent here is to really catch the fake farm, to catch the urban sprawl out on ag lands. But at the present state of this bill, it's also to identify the unit on that ag land. As many of you know, whether you're a rancher or a farmer, some of those units consist of stalls, horse stalls, sheds, packing facilities. These all become an issue of trying to really identify what is the unit on those ag lands. I think even to the possibility that the request would be at this point to carve out Maui County, so Maui can sit down and have

further discussion on the ag land itself, as well as the CPR. And I would like to also insert written comments to the Journal. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative DeCoite's written remarks are as follows:

"I am voting in opposition to this bill because it appears to fix a problem that only the City and County of Honolulu has. It is a statewide fix for a Honolulu County problem. The Hawaii Farm Bureau testified that this bill will hurt rather than help farmers. Maui Mayor Alan Arakawa offered comments and stated that the State should not mandate county zoning restrictions. I think that Honolulu can fix their problem through their own county zoning codes and that Maui County should be exempted from this bill. Mahalo."

Representative San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I stand in support. I'd like to just point out that my understanding of what lawyers have been doing for years was, this was a way for them to get around, this was an end-run against the county subdivision requirements. So what my problem with this bill, and I'm hoping it gets fixed in conference, is that it may be unconstitutional as an *ex post facto* law, because it refers to existing CPRs, instead of preventing CPRs moving forward. For those reasons, I stand in support, but I hope they fix it. Thank you."

Representative McKelvey rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representatives DeCoite and San Buenaventura be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No vote, brief comment. Mr. Speaker, in the Finance Committee there was a rather lengthy, heated debate, and the bottom line of it was, leave us alone, this is home rule issue. If Honolulu's got a problem, let the Honolulu City Council fix it. As my good colleague said, cows don't need streetlights.

"I think the counties have that ultimate control, they have property taxes, they should be able to handle this. Everybody testified against the bill, except the City and County. And, Mr. Speaker, you know the City and County comes to the State for a lot of things. I won't mention the rail or other things like that, but they're dependent upon us because they themselves can't settle the issue. Airbnb is another issue. So Mr. Speaker, let the counties prevail, let the home rule persist. Thank you."

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Standing with reservations. While I support the efforts of the City and County of Honolulu to address illegal residential dwellings on agriculture and preservations districts, I believe there are unintended consequences that need to be addressed. For local families on Kauai that are land rich but cash poor, CPRs are the only economical way to divide family property.

"Mr. Speaker, it should be made clear that CPRs must follow the underlying zoning codes, building codes, and density regulations. However, CPRs do not have to follow subdivision regulations, which can be very costly. This bill would negatively affect Hawaii's housing market by eliminating a significant portion of real estate inventory of condominium units on the market. In addition, this bill does not define equivalent subdivision requirements. For these reasons, I stand with reservations."

Representative LoPresti rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations, and I'd like to adopt the words of the Representative from Kauai and just add that if there's an issue with the CPR process that Honolulu City and County feels that they're powerless to deny your request, that it just involves filling out a form, maybe

they should look at fixing that instead of creating this new process for subdivisions on ag lands. Thanks."

Representative Yamashita rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Please register a no vote. Similar concerns about the CPR process, thanking my colleagues from Kauai as well as from Kona on bringing up the fact that it wasn't just the City and County of Honolulu that testified in support, it was DPP. So, just the planning and permitting division that can't say no to people, which, again, no other county had this issue except for Honolulu County, and that's why we're saying that it should be put at the county level.

"The second part of it, which talked about the affordable lands, what the Representative from Kauai brought up is true, is that the CPR process actually makes it affordable where ranchers can swap land, and it makes it in such a way that it's a valuable tool. They use this to raise capital by selling pieces of property to other farmers, and then likewise they use it when they need to expand their production.

"One of the parts that the HD 1 draft did bring back, unfortunately it was just in regards to the structures in congregate use, and so what it talked about is that these congregate pieces of land, that farmers wouldn't be able to share that anymore as part of this CPR re-division process that we're talking about. Long story short, all we're trying to say is that we're really micromanaging an issue that should persist, and if DPP has a problem with it, they should fix it. But this sharing of land, CPRing land and utilizing it for other farmers to benefit their crops, their productions, sharing pieces of equipment and tools, all of this is necessary for us to help our farmers.

"And speaking out for my district, in which we do have a lot of farmers that are still trying to make it, still trying to pursue agriculture, still trying to double the food production for our state. We definitely need to look out for them in regards to something like this that could make it very costly for them. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2524, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COUNTY LAND USE REQUIREMENTS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 43 ayes to 7 noes, with Representatives LoPresti, Lowen, McKelvey, Nakamura and Yamashita voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives DeCoite, Evans, Matsumoto, McDermott, Thielen, Tupola and Ward voting no.

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At 10:45 o'clock a.m., Representative Belatti requested a recess and the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 10:51 o'clock a.m.

## THIRD READING

#### S.B. No. 2582, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that S.B. No. 2582, SD 1, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support, brief comment. I know I comment every single time, and I think I'm going to have to do that all the way up until this becomes a law just to continue to speak out on behalf of families and victims that have been part of a lot of different incidents that happen in our community. This bill sends a strong message to our constituents about our stance against failing to render aid to an injured person when involved in a collision.

"The current sentence for hitting another person while driving intoxicated is only about two to three years of imprisonment, plea deals aside. By increasing the sentence when failing to stay at the scene and rendering aid, we will allow for a more fitting penal consequence for this catastrophic violation of the law. Each year, 28 pedestrians die in Hawaii due to a vehicular accident. On the Waianae coast alone, we suffered 100 in car crashes per year, of which 50 involved pedestrians.

"One pedestrian, who was mentioned many different times, Kaulana Werner, graduate of Kamehameha Schools, was killed on the side of Farrington Highway, while the person was too impatient to render aid, and that could have saved his life. Just this past February, two men were killed in a hit-and-run crash in Makaha, leaving them fatally injured, the two young men who were changing a tire on the side of the road. Just last month, a 74-year-old man and Waianae resident was dragged underneath a car five miles after being fatally struck, and the person who hit him didn't even realize until they got to work that they had killed somebody.

"Given the lack of road safety for our pedestrians, we need to let the drivers know that they are held responsible to the fullest extent when causing an accident, and that they should stop and render aid. The families of these victims deserve justice and proper closure upon the unnecessary death of their loved ones. In the quote of King Kamehameha's splintered paddle, *e hele a moe i ke ala*. Everyone has the right to feel safe along the path. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Gates rose in support of the measure and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Gates's written remarks are as follows:

"On April 24th, 2016, Kaulana Werner's life was tragically ended in front of his family home when he was struck by a drunk driver in Nānākuli. The driver fled the scene, showing no remorse and a callous heart. Kaulana was 19 years old and was said to bring joy to all that encountered him. The driver is still free, and any punishment she is likely face will hardly provide solace to the survivors.

"This past President's Day weekend, the Wai'anae community lost two young residents that were loved by many to a hit-and-run incident in Mākaha. My heartfelt condolences go out to the Ragsdale and Mole 'ohana for their tragic loss of Jonah and Daniel.

"The Werner, Ragsdale and Mole families deserve better. Our community deserves better. We demand safe streets for our residents and punishments that not only fit the crime, but serve to deter future criminals.

"On this almost second anniversary of the death of Kaulana Werner, let us honor these victims and their families by passing Senate Bill 2582. This measure will increase the maximum prison sentence for any individual that flees a crime scene. This bill will help bring justice to community members who have lost loved ones through hit-and-run incidents and serve as a warning to others by showing that harsh consequences do exist when the life of another is taken so needlessly."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 2582, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EXTENDED

TERMS OF IMPRISONMENT," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes.

#### S.B. No. 2461, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that S.B. No. 2461, SD 1, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative LoPresti rose in support of the measure and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative LoPresti's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in strong support of this bill. Fake service animals can create very real problems for legitimate service animals. Legitimate service animals are highly trained to the tune of \$20,000-90,000. Fake service animals have been known to distract and accost real service animals, which can cost thousands of dollars to the disabled handlers to get them re-trained. If the service animal is traumatized enough by the incident, re-training is ineffective, and the handlers are left with no other option but to get a new service animal. These people aren't bringing their animals into stores for fun, or because they get lonely—the people who use service animals have debilitating disabilities and literally can't function in their daily life without them.

"Titles II and III of the Americans with Disabilities Act makes it clear that service animals <u>are</u> allowed in public facilities and accommodations, but emotional support animals, comfort animals, and therapy dogs are not service animals under Title II and Title III of the ADA.

"I believe it is a disservice to Americans with disabilities if we allow individuals without disabilities to bring untrained animals in restaurants, stores, and public facilities as if they were service animals."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 2461, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SERVICE ANIMALS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes.

#### S.B. No. 2719, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that S.B. No. 2719, SD 1, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Thielen rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Thielen's written remarks are as follows:

"I am in support of this bill, but I believe we should go much further than this temporary measure.

"Child sexual abuse remains a serious problem in Hawaii and across the nation. According to the National Sexual Violence Resource Center, one in four girls and one in six boys in the United States will be sexually abused before the age of 18 years old.

"All too often, the victims of child sexual abuse withhold disclosing the truth about their experiences until they reach an adult age. This can happen for any number of reasons, including fear, disbelief, anger, helplessness, betrayal, and anxiety. These feelings are not the victims' fault.

"Some studies have estimated that between 60% and 80% of child sexual abuse survivors withhold disclosure. Of those who withhold disclosure of their victimization until adulthood, the average delay is approximately 20 years, with some survivors delaying up to 50 years.

"We know from recent revelations in the news that it is not unusual for monstrous crimes to remain secret for decades. Larry Nassar, the former USA Gymnastics national team doctor, committed criminal acts of sexual assault against at least 250 girls and young women over 30 years. The first woman to publicly accuse Nassar of sexual assault was Rachael Denhollander, who was 15 years old at the time of the assault and came

forward 16 years later, at the age of 31. Many other victims remained silent for even longer.

"Even closer to home, we have the horrific example of Robert Browne, the former school psychiatrist who drugged and sexually assaulted an estimated 50 young boys at Kamehameha Schools over the course of 27 years, from 1958 to 1985. It wasn't until 1991, 14 years after his own abuse ended, that Emmett Lee Loy first confronted Browne. And it wasn't until 2014—almost 30 years after the last assault—that a lawsuit was filed.

"Hawaii's current statute of limitations requires that a lawsuit be filed within eight years after turning 18, or three years after discovering an illness or injury caused by sexual abuse. Under that law, Rachael Denhollander would not have been able to seek justice against Larry Nasser in the courts, and neither would most of Nasser's other victims. Nor would Emmett Lee Loy, or any of Robert Browne's other victims in the Kamehameha Schools. I cannot condone a law that would stand in the way of granting these people relief, because we know that there are sadly many others like them.

"For these reasons, I believe that Hawaii should permanently eliminate the statute of limitations that restricts the time in which lawsuits stemming from child sexual assault may be filed. Other states that have taken this step include Utah, North Dakota and Maine.

"It is not equitable for our state to have a system of law that punishes a victim of child sexual abuse for not coming forward immediately. We owe the survivors a fair chance to obtain justice against abusers, no matter how long it takes them to disclose their suffering. I believe we should look to the victims of Larry Nasser and Robert Browne for guidance. We should make sure that our system does not stand in the way of justice when such monsters are exposed."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support, brief comment. I definitely think this is necessary, and I think that lifting the statute of limitations so that these cases can be heard is important. However, I do think we should consider lifting it altogether. There are some states that have no statutes of limitations, there are others that have two years, three years, seven years, every state it depends. But as you know, with a certain case that happened with a private school on our island, and it's still pursuing, some of the victims have actually passed away because it's so old, I do think that we should consider even further action. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 2719, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SEXUAL VIOLENCE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes.

## S.B. No. 2922, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that S.B. No. 2922, SD 1, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative McDermott rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in support with some reservations. Who can be against the teachers? Mom and apple pie, right? And of course, letting the people decide was a chant that I participated in a few years ago. So it'd be somewhat hypocritical of me to vote against this.

"But Mr. Speaker, we need to look to where this money is going to come from. When we say investment properties, we all visualize a mansion on the beach in Kailua, my colleague to the left's district. That's what we view, a vacation rental, something like that. But the reality is, this is going to come from three story walkup apartments. 2238 Kaluaopalena Street in Kalihi, nestled in the lovely area behind Marukai and a gas station. That is not a transient accommodation, but it is an investment property. There's 30 units there, and they're all rentals. Entry-level rental properties, concrete cinderblock walls, tile floors, that's what people there rent.

"They just saw their taxes go up because the assessment on the building went up by 4.5%. The landlord is not going to eat that. The first opportunity

he has to raise your rent when you come up for renegotiation, whether it's a year lease or six months, he's going to add that on, because that's what people do, that's human nature. These people are at the low end of the income scale. It is a struggle for them to pay rent every month. That's an investment property worth over a million dollars, about \$4.5 million, that now we're going to tack on a surcharge. Now, does anybody think the owner is honestly going to eat the surcharge out of a gesture of goodwill? Of course not. He will pass it on to the renters.

"You drive down the road into Waipahu, the Pupus, look to your left as you're going Ewa, the Pupus, the entire area, I would venture to say most of those folks are on welfare and food stamps living in those apartments, barely making it. Those are not transient accommodations visitors renting those for a weekend here. Those are low income folks barely hanging on, and their rent is going to go up. They've just seen a bump or will see a bump because the property values are exploding on the island, and now we're going to hit those people with a surcharge.

"I own my home, I'm not going to be affected, but those folks will. At the bottom of the ladder, the very bottom, we're going to hammer them, because the landlord will pass it on, that's what they do.

"Now, some folks can get Section 8, but that thing is always maxed out, and there's always a waiting list for folks to get Section 8, some sort of subsidy or relief to help them. Then my concerns would shift to the implementation, right? The devil's in the details. The next Legislature is going to come back and decide, if this passes, how it's going to be implemented. I would have preferred if the committee report would have put an intention in there, that we intend that 100% of this tax raised would be added to the baseline, a certain baseline that the Legislature has provided over the past three years.

"But the reality is, we could raise X amount of dollars from this tax and then subtract X amount of dollars from our general fund commitment. This is what has happened with lotteries all over the mainland. We're going to have a lottery for education, we'll raise \$50 million and then they take \$50 million out of the back end from the State's commitment, or they take \$25 million, say, look you got \$25 million more. Well, yeah, but we wanted the whole \$50 million. Well sorry, too bad. That's the reality. I wish we would have had something stating our intent in the committee report to that.

"And then secondly, it doesn't say where it goes. Is it for infrastructure, buildings, classrooms, physical, tangible things we can touch and feel, which we know we're years behind in? Or does it go to salaries? What does it go to? It's nebulous, it goes to whatever, at some point in the future. I wish the committee report would have had more specificity with the intention of this body regarding this tax and where it's going to go in future."

Representative Ward rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative McDermott continued, stating:

"Is it five minutes already? I can't believe it. Sorry about that. Well, I'll wrap up. Anyway, those are my concerns. So, we're going to hit the poor disproportionately, there's no question about it. The illegal rentals that are being rented, I mean if we could find out who the heck they are, that's one thing, but we have scores and scores of three story walkups across this island, entry-level rentals just going to get hit with a property tax increase, now we're going to hit them with a surcharge. These folks can't afford it.

"And then the lack of clarity in our intention. Our intention should be 100% of this new money goes on top of the three-year rolling average of what we have appropriated towards the DOE in the last three years, but that's not there. So when this new money comes in, we can pull it out the back end. I fear that may happen, but who knows, because it's the next legislative body that will make that decision. If we left them some instructions in the committee report, it would have been helpful to them. And with that, I'm done, sir."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. Year after year, Hawaii's public school students continually rank in the bottom few states in reading

and math, and our teachers are the worst paid in the nation. Here in paradise, where public education spending is the lowest in the nation, we're the only state that doesn't use property taxes to fund public education, despite having some of the lowest property tax rates in the nation. We are actually a tax haven, Mr. Speaker. The property here in Hawaii is a tax haven for the wealthy to buy up property, pricing out local buyers and increasing the cost of living for everybody. It's far past time that we look at addressing some kind of disincentive on investment properties to try to make sure that property is more available for locals.

"The idea is a legitimate concern that, I don't think we want to see the cost passed on directly to low-income renters, and there's ways that we can address that with the yet-to-be-formed underlying legislation, should this pass. We can, for example, say that if the rental is provided at an affordable rate, then the investment property is taxed at a different rate. We can do lots of things like that to make sure that it doesn't pass on to our most vulnerable economic citizens.

"But the bottom line is this. Our students deserve better, our teachers deserve better, the principals deserve better, and the parents who put their trust in the State to educate their children, they deserve better. And this is a mechanism to do that. All the bill does is put the question on the ballot for voters to decide, and we should let them do that.

"My last statement is, I agree with what the previous speaker said about we should, I think, be clear with whatever underlying legislation that may come after this, that 100% of that money raised goes to a baseline, because budgets are fungible, and I don't think we want to do that. We want to make sure we're adding, not just supplanting the budget. Thank you."

Representative Takumi rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. In support with reservations. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. I know the speakers after me and the speakers before say that education needs more money. As your former Education Chair for 15 years, I think my record shows that I've always advocated for increased funding for the Department of Education. As a matter of fact, I introduced, over a number of years, legislation to increase the general excise tax so that we can better fund our schools. I'm afraid, though, I have two major concerns with this approach.

"The first is that it amends our State Constitution to go into property taxes, an area in which counties historically have done exclusively, and I think we all know each county has developed their own property tax scheme independent of each other. That is why when you go to the County of Kauai, they emphasize more residential property taxes. If you go to the County of Maui, they emphasize more on the hotel property tax side. What we will do with this, obviously, is we will have to invoke a property tax that's applicable to the entire state in a one-size-fits-all system that I am concerned it will impugn the integrity of what has developed in each individual county, who are sensitive to the needs of their community.

"Secondly, the State definitely would have to stand up a property assessment department, and I haven't gone and did a survey as to how many employees are employed by each county to assess property taxes and collect them, but I suspect it's in the hundreds. We would have to do the same. If we went down the road of increasing taxes, whether it be on income tax, which is progressive, on a general excise tax, which we could take care of people who can ill afford an increase in the general excise tax, on the TAT. There are other mechanisms in which we could employ that would not require the hiring of hundreds of new employees to stand up a new department.

"Secondly, the other concern I have is that the original proposal for this, Mr. Speaker, was to increase the tourist accommodation tax, the TAT, and in some measure, investment property. The TAT is no longer on the table. The TAT was projected to provide the majority of the anticipated revenue to help the Department of Education. This would require hundreds of millions of dollars, Mr. Speaker. I'll give you one small example. If all of us are in favor of universal public preschool, just the mere fact that the department would need 500 new classrooms over a period of years, that price tag alone is \$700 million. So we're talking, we need a real infusion of

real money. But once the TAT was taken off the table, we have to rely solely on the property tax.

"Previous speakers talked about the kind of exclusions we can have. Please remember that the original proposal had over a dozen exclusions, seniors on fixed incomes, disabled people, renters who pay \$1,500 or less. Well, the pressure for the Legislature next session is going to be to exempt those kinds of properties that the previous two speakers alluded to, small mom and pop businesses who can ill afford an increase in their property tax, maybe hospitals, maybe restaurants, maybe hotels. Once you start building up the list of exemptions, proportionately the amount of revenue that's available is going to shrink.

"I do not think we should venture down this path, if in the end it ends up raising \$25 million or \$15 million out of a DOE budget of over \$1.6 billion. We have to get serious about this, and the only way to get serious about this is to really broaden the applicability of that property tax. That's going to be our challenge next session. Let me end, Mr. Speaker, by saying once again, I support increased revenue for our teachers, our parents, our community, and our schools, I'm just concerned whether or not this is the best way to do it."

Representative Ing rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Strong support. Couple weeks ago I tweeted that teachers in Hawaii are paid the same as teachers in Nevada, except in Nevada the median rent for one bedroom is \$910, over here it's around \$1,600, not to account for the wages, the cost of milk, normal things, groceries is outrageous over here. So, apples to apples, by far Hawaii teachers are the lowest paid in the nation, and that tweet got like 2,000 likes, like people are sympathetic. Like the people of Hawaii are ready, so I think we pass this and then test it out.

"But I wanted to address some of things that were said on the floor. So, we're talking about property taxes and the Constitution, to fund through the State for education. It was mentioned as a bug of this bill, I think it's more of a feature, it's about damn time.

"Secondly, there's a statement about having to do a new department of taxation to assess property values. Just use county data. Like the previous speaker said, it already exists in the county, there's no need to be redundant. Also, look, the counties came to the State to ask for a state tax last year for a county function. We're just returning the favor, y'all.

"Next, I wanted to talk about rent and walkups. We don't have to tax or assess the property based on the TMK, that's not usually how it's done, it's per unit. And if you're renting a unit that's over a million dollars, you're not the least among us. Lastly, oh no, that's all I got. Let's let the people decide and let's pay the teachers what they deserve.

"I came from the public schools, up until I made it to Kamehameha. These teachers are some of the, I can't even tell you what a difference they made for my life. After my dad passed away, my public school teachers would drive me to football practice, they'd keep me after school, and they didn't get any bonus pay for this, they're just really passionate about their jobs. And I think Corey Rosenlee from the teachers, during one of the testimony from the HSTA president, he said, I asked one of the teachers, would she quit her second job if she were to get a raise, and she said, no, but I'd quit my third one. This is out of control. So, let's move this bill. Thank you."

Representative Onishi rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I have strong reservations. First of all, I'd like to say that I am in favor of a surcharge assessment on real property for education, but I have concerns. And first, my concern is that we're going to be amending the Hawaii Constitution, and if we're going to be doing that and asking everybody in the State of Hawaii who can vote to weigh in on this matter, then to me the question should be, should we have a surcharge on real property, period, and leave the decision on what real property we're going to add a surcharge to up to the Legislature. I think that is the most appropriate, and that way we can determine how much money we want to raise, how it affects the bottom line of what we already allocate from the

general fund to education, and it'll raise the funding for education that we feel is appropriate.

"Secondly, the surcharge is only, at this point, on investment property. And because it's only on investment property, it's not going to be fairly assessed throughout the State of Hawaii. There's going to be communities within the state that will have absolutely no effect, although they may impact education a lot in their particular area. To me, this uneven distribution will cause many in our community to have ill feelings about this kind of an assessment. If we're going to be assessing a surcharge, then it should be applied to all real property and let the Legislature decide as to which properties would be affected, and how much they would be affected. So with that, I still have strong reservations on this bill. Thank you."

Representative Woodson rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, strong support. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm not going to spend a lot of time focusing on the schematics of this particular proposal. I will just say, Mr. Speaker, that the definitions are in fact broad, to allow the Legislature the maximum flexibility so that adjustments can be made accordingly, if in fact this is ratified. That was, in fact, purposefully done, because I think the last thing that any of us want to do, Mr. Speaker, is to inadvertently hurt working people. To me, anyway, I think that this is the more responsible approach. And yes, Mr. Speaker, this is a funding mechanism that has never been used before, but also, Mr. Speaker, in my mind, we just can't keep looking at these static parameters as barriers and expect to move forward with higher results. We've got to move forward into the future.

"And it is true, Mr. Speaker, that Hawaii is the only such state that does not use this type of funding mechanism. It's the only state in the country that the county municipalities do not have to provide any funding for our public schools, in the entire nation, Mr. Speaker. So instead, Mr. Speaker, I'm going to spend a little bit of time just talking about what this can mean for the future. It's a question, as my colleague had articulated. That is what it is, Mr. Speaker.

"So let's take a look at what public education means more broadly. Well, Mr. Speaker, education, as we all know but sometimes need to be reminded, impacts all facets of our life. There is a direct positive correlation between education and income. So as your educational obtainment grows, so does your earning potential. This in itself, Mr. Speaker, I believe helps out our community in countless ways. Fewer homeless, decreased dependency on social services, fewer people in and out of our prison systems.

"There's also a direct correlation, a direct relationship between increased educational obtainment and even health. The healthier our communities are, the more productive they can be, and the more active they can be. Increased educational levels also lead to greater political participation, which can lead to better governmental policy on all levels.

"And Mr. Speaker, if I may be permitted just to diverge a little bit and share a story, about a year ago in my home on Maui, I was sitting on the couch with my son and we were watching CNN. And this was around the time that the gentleman, the doctor, was forcefully removed from the United Airlines flight. And as my son and I watched that video clip over and over again, just watching and observing, my son said, dad, can they do that? And I paused for a second, because I wanted to give a thoughtful response, and I said, well, legally they can remove the man from the plane, even if he's paid for the ticket. So then my son responded, yeah dad, but it wasn't right how they did it. And I said, yes son, it was not correct how they did it. So Mr. Speaker, some of our kids have the opportunity to have these types of discussions."

Representative Belatti rose to yield her time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Woodson continued, stating:

"Thank you so much. To have this increased opportunity to create themselves critically. They can develop this critical thinking inside the household. In this particular type of discussion, there was questions, distinctions between legal and illegal, there was distinctions between legal but not righteous. But Mr. Speaker, there are tens of thousands of our *keiki* 

throughout the state and all of our communities that simply are not afforded this opportunity. The only time they spend with an adult is in our public school systems. That time to develop their cognitive capacity, so they can have these essential skillsets, the ability to think critically, to articulate your voice, is important as we work together to shape our future.

"I can speak very briefly about preparedness, Mr. Speaker. How prepared will our *keiki* be to compete in this new global economy? How well will our state be able to compete if we don't spend a concerted effort, time, energy and resources, focusing on our school systems? By extension, how prepared will our country be? What will happen if the State of Hawaii, and also our nation, fail to prepare the next generation? How will the rest of the world suffer?

"So Mr. Speaker, thank you for your indulgence. In all of this time at the nucleus is public education, public education. So Mr. Speaker, it's simply just a question. Do you want to better support our *keiki* in this way? For all our futures. So Mr. Speaker, I ask my colleagues for their support, I humbly ask that we pass this proposal."

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. And I do understand some of the concerns, and just following up on some of what the Representative from Volcano said. In most other states, the county or local governments can access things that here we consider state taxes, like a hotel room tax, and vice versa, in other states the state has the ability to do special assessment districts and put surcharges on local taxes.

"So what we do here is actually really unusual. And so, yeah, it would require amending the Constitution, and maybe some here consider it uncharted territory, but it's actually a normal way to deal with taxation in almost all other states. And what it would enable, to open up these tax sources, is to eliminate the conversations we have where the counties are like, these are our taxes, and the State is saying, these are ours, those are yours, and then when we have to look at the times when we do need to find a way to raise revenue, we're not looking at the potential sources of revenue in a holistic way. We're thinking, well we'll raise theirs instead of ours, or the county is saying, well we'll try to get the State to give us some money instead of us raising our taxes. And the reality is, at the end of the day, it's the same people, the same constituents, the same citizens of the State paying this money, and that we should have the ability to look at everything all together and figure out the best way to do it. Thanks."

Representative Matsumoto rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support. All of us believe that education is extremely important. My father is a teacher at Nanakuli High School for the past 30 years and has been very dedicated to his students. I myself am a product of the public school system from Mililani, and give him a few years, but my son will also be in the public school system. And I'm voting yes on this bill because I believe that people should have the right to vote and have the right to decide how education will be funded.

"I will mention that I do have a few concerns that I mentioned in committee. I'm concerned with the ballot question, that people may not have a complete understanding of exactly how this surcharge will be applied, because there are no amounts stuck in the bill or in the ballot question. There's no specific amount for what the surcharge on investment real property would be, and so they might not know how this amendment will affect them when they're voting on this bill.

"I completely support funding education, and this is why I am voting in support to allow people to vote, to have their voices be heard on how they want to fund education. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Todd rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. So I think it's very clear, when I was considering this piece of legislation even last year and over the interim, that it is quite messy. I'm in support, by the way. So the question for me is, if we're going to pass what's maybe a messy solution and a complicated one,

are we at a point of desperation? And I think that it's very clear, and I don't think many of us here would disagree that we are at that point.

"My high school, I'm a third-generation graduate, and our football field, where I spent a lot of my time, slopes towards the ocean, and you can't use it on consecutive days of rain because kids will get injured. There are exposed boulders that we spray paint so that kids avoid and hopefully don't get tackled on and injure themselves. Ankle injuries, ligament injuries are a regular occurrence, just because the field is sloppily constructed and 100 years old.

"That's just the football field, and that might be, probably, one of the better parts of our campus. If you go to the old gym, the bathrooms do not work and they are caution-taped off. The weight room underneath, which is utilized for classes in the PE department and weight training classes, there are probably five or six dozen holes in the ceiling, and if classes are operating above, the whole building shakes. When I was a senior there, we had maintenance guys come in and dig into the concrete floor to see if there was asbestos there. They found asbestos and covered it up, and so there's a puka in the floor that's still there. I'm not sure what the purpose of that was.

"I think that there are stories like this in most public schools in Hawaii, and it was really put in perspective for me this year when I was fortunate enough to visit Huntsville, Alabama. It was my first time in the south, not sure what to expect. Huntsville is a very well-to-do area, low cost of living, high income. And when we were there, we got to look at a brand new high school, Jemison High School, and included in this high school they have a class dedicated to 3D printing, where they have technology and equipment available that you probably wouldn't find in any part of our state, much less a public high school. In addition to that, they teach classes on cyber security where the students build drones from scratch, and they also participate with that 3D printing in, they actually build race cars as part of their curriculum, and they have virtual classrooms where they can learn valuable trades that are taught remotely.

"The point of this is that we're at a point of desperation, and desperate times call for desperate measures. In addition to that, I think that this is a situation where we can effectively kill two birds with one stone. There was a representative from Maui last year who talked in length about what do we have here in Hawaii that we can utilize, what are we trying to sell, in a sense? If you're in Alaska or parts of Texas, you have oil, and that's your exploitable resource. We don't have anything like that here. We have the natural beauty of Hawaii, and we have a very limited amount of land.

"What we have in addition to our crisis in education is a crisis in homelessness and housing, and, as mentioned before, Hawaii's become a tax haven for rich foreign investors. To me, this is an opportunity, if this passes and we get to deal with this next year in terms of rulemaking, to effectively kill two birds with one stone, to dramatically disincentivize foreign investment in local property. And so I hope that, through the wisdom of our body and hopefully being able to address this next session, we can account for affordable rental categories, as we already do on the Big Island, and make sure that we exempt certain categories, to really drive it home that investing in Hawaii property, especially if you're a foreign investor, should not be profitable, and it should not be incentivized. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose in support of the measure and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward's written remarks are as follows:

"Let the people decide."

Representative Matsumoto rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support.

"I am also concerned that there is no definition of 'investment real property' in the amendment, and thus we will not know who will be affected by this bill until this definition has been clarified next session. Again, people voting on this may see themselves as exempt from the surcharge, later to find out that in fact they now fall under this definition of 'investment real property' owners.

"In the SD1 version, the surcharge had been imposed on owners of homes valued at over \$1 million that did not have a homeowner's exemption.

"The average price of homes in Hawaii is rising, and is now close to \$1 million per home. In my district, for example, in Mililani alone, there are 526 properties worth over \$1 million, and in Waialua and Mokuleia there are a total of 296 properties worth over \$1 million. These housing costs will only continue to increase, and if that definition of 'investment real property' goes back to utilizing property values, this bill may affect quite a large population, with the potential to drastically affect Hawaii's rental and affordable housing markets.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you. Support with reservations. While I support giving the Department of Education additional funding for preschool education for all children, lower class sizes, qualified teachers in our classrooms including special education, and teacher pay increases, I'm concerned that the approach before us may yield much less than what's needed to raise the bar on public education in Hawaii. I believe most of us in this Chamber realize this.

"For everything we know about early childhood brain development, public investment in education is critical. I therefore support moving forward with this constitutional amendment, and at the same time, looking at collaborating with counties and reforming state and local taxation policies that might yield additional funding for the DOE in the long run. Thank you."

Representative Keohokalole rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. Mr. Speaker, I'm going to speak mostly on the issue of a constitutional amendment. This bill allows the public to decide a fundamental question. The question that has been put before us is broad, maybe too broad for some of my colleagues, but I believe it's broad rightly so. Actually, not broadly enough for some of our other colleagues, which in my opinion is fair. Shall the State be authorized to utilize investment property taxes to pay for public education? That's the only question, in my mind, that should be put to the voters, because that's the only question that needs to be put to the voters.

"It's my belief that amendments to the constitution, the foundational document upon which our democracy is built, should only be considered when the fundamental nature of our government requires change. We cannot, and should not, just make changes to this document whenever it suits us. That is the role for our statutes and administrative rules. If we set a threshold in the constitution, if we get into the details, we're saying basically that we're going to make this constitutional issue a regular question, and I don't believe that's the way to go.

"This measure actually goes to the heart of our role as the Legislature. The Judiciary interprets the law, the administration executes the law, we set the law. And among that role is the power to levy taxes and appropriate those revenues for the benefit of the public. What the rates are, what qualifies, who qualifies, who doesn't, how much money this proposal raises, what the money is going to be used for, how much better, ultimately, will this proposal make our schools? Those are questions that require details. Those are policy decisions. Those are implementation decisions. I don't think those are appropriate for a constitutional amendment question.

"I believe that the majority of the Members of this Body and the public believe simply that education is one of our most important state functions. And I also believe that the majority of us agree that our public schools deserve more support, and that we can do a better job of educating our children. And I also believe that the majority agree, as my colleague stated earlier, that this need is an urgent one that can no longer be remedied as

things stand, and that fundamental system change is necessary to achieve this. We just cannot continue to keep going the way things are going.

"So this bill provides a mechanism to be put to the voters to ask that question. Are the changes we need to make so urgent and necessary that our role as a legislature needs to be improved to account for this.

"Now, like many decisions, there are costs and benefits, there are risks and uncertainties that come with this issue, I agree. If the voters believe that those costs are too great, that there's too much risk and uncertainty involved, that after the fact the Legislature is going to be ultimately incapable of figuring this all out in a responsible way, they can vote no, and this body will have a clear directive on how to proceed. However, if they vote yes, then we have, as this body seldom has, we'll have a legislative mandate to take this power and use it to improve the outcomes of our kids.

"So lastly, constitutional amendments are hard to get passed. I think this point is lost on many, many people. This is not an easy process. This will not be an easy process. They're hard to get passed, and for good reason. We had a constitutional amendment question on education come before the voters four years ago, in the same election that I entered this body. It did not pass. It did not pass, I believe in part, because it was complicated. It asked an implementation question. It put a policy question to the voters, and it was confusing, and that led to no votes. This doesn't. It asks a question about the role of government. That is a question that should be decided by voters, and that's why I support this bill. Thank you."

Representative Lee rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support. Thank you. There is no silver bullet for the myriad issues that we face here in Hawaii, save one, and that's providing an awesome, quality education is the absolute best thing we can do for our next generation, and I support any measure, absolutely support any measure, which allows our communities and our public to decide new ways and to consider new ways to achieve that goal. Thank you very much."

Representative Creagan rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I think we need to recognize this bill isn't just about education, but it's about justice and equality. I rise in support. Our state is the highest percentage of students in high-priced private schools, or one of the highest, if not the highest. Our public schools are separate, and they are not equal, and this bill will help make them more equal. Thank you."

Representative Evans rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I want to rise with slight reservations, and I want to take the words of the Representative from Keaau, Volcano as my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Evans continued, stating:

"I think the need for funding is really obvious. How to get there seems to be the real question, and I'm glad that we're taking it to the voters to ask. But I have some concerns if it's the right question. I too, like the Representative from Volcano, think if it's about our future and everyone in this state is vested in having a good economy, taking care of our vulnerable, our children, our seniors, if we're going to have a solid economy and make right for the future, we have to educate our kids, but why not have everybody invest in that? I have concerns that we're just picking on investment property. I think it sends a strong message that we're not all in it together, to try to find the answer.

"Since I've been here, there's been so many discussions about gambling, and it seems that socially and culturally we, as a community, reject that as a way to raise money, so that's off the table. When you talk to the teachers' union, and I asked them, are you going to file a lawsuit against the State because they're not properly funding education, and they go, oh no, no, no we don't want to do that, though other states have done that, and have won. We don't want to see our state go down having a lawsuit.

"And I think, thirdly, is I have some concerns about people looking at legalizing marijuana as a possibility of raising taxes, again, to pay for some fundamental, what fundamentally government does, and government educates children, that's part of our basic, fundamental, what we do as government. And so the question is, again in my opinion, not broad enough, and I would like to see it expanded to all property, that would be agriculture, that would be rural, that'd be residential, it would be investment. It's like, everybody, stand up and participate in doing the right thing. Thank you."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I stand in support with slight reservations, and I wanted to thank the body. This has been a great conversation. My goodness, I could definitely do a special session about this topic and talk for hours about it until we finish it, but we've always done more controversial issues. And so I really think that all the points that were brought up today were so important, and really I just want to boil it down to four, because I think what I hear everyone saying is that everyone believes that education is important, and we want to fund it more. And I appreciate the colleague from Hilo actually giving us a very descriptive look at what his school looks like, and I won't give a descriptive look of some more schools, because I think we're in the same bucket as far as all of the needed improvements.

"And so the two things that we're discussing here is one, how to fund it, two, where it should go. And I think the how to fund it part, it has a few of us with a little bit of hesitancy. And I want to thank my colleague from Waipio for giving that historical history of where this bill has come, and all the different versions of where the pocket of revenue would come from. So the how to fund it part is really important, because we're putting it on the ballot. So if we do the how to fund it part correctly, which what I hear from a lot of people is, if the base is not big enough, then the impact of money collected will not be enough to actually create an impact.

"And so the how to fund it part I think definitely deserves more conversation. Should it be investment property? Should we disincentivize for mainland investors? Yeah, maybe. But is it going to be enough, we don't know that. Are we going to need another department to actually do that, if we do that on top of what the counties do? We don't know. So it's broad enough that we have to actually figure that how to fund it.

"The second part, which is where it goes, and this is the part that people have been bringing up concerns to me about. Where it goes. If we don't know where the money goes, then actually asking the voters to put it on the ballot and not understand where it goes, that's what people have concerns about. And I love the comment brought up by my colleague from Kaneohe, on point. Constitutional amendments, hard to pass. Too specific, hard for people to determine. Too broad, same thing. The where the money goes part is so important, because either we can put it toward salaries and know for sure that teachers are going to get a raise, as my colleague from Maui brought up, super important, way past due, teachers should get more pay, hands down. But also, should the weighted student formula be increased? Absolutely.

"If the money was going straight to students or straight to teachers, I think people would be a lot more supportive, but they don't know what the Department of Education will do with it. And I think we've had this discussion many, many times with the teachers, and I see them smiling, because that's the gist of it, is that this doesn't handle the underlying issue that we have, which is management of funds. And so we want to see educational funds, especially if we do something like this. We change the constitution. We have a revenue source. We boost education in our state. We have to, have to, have to see it go to students or teachers. It has to be that way. It cannot go to more administrative costs or not actually make an impact where we need it to make an impact.

"We know that our weighted student formula is too low. We know that charter schools get less than public schools for the weighted student formula. We know that the teachers' pay is too low. But if we just put it towards education and let the department determine it, that's where a lot of people have that hesitation. It's because they still want to see the department audited, because they don't know where all the monies are going, or why

we're not actually using all the federal funds, or why we're always short on certain things that we need for our schools.

"And so those two fundamental questions are so important, and that's what I hear everyone talking about here, is that we need to solve how we're going to fund it, and where it goes. And if we can do those two things, I think we're moving forward. And I think, just like the Representative from Hilo brought up, we are in a moment of desperation, because we know that it's so badly needed, and we need to move forward.

"So I hope that that's where we can center our conversations, it's just compartmentalize it, figure out the two parts that we need to figure out, put it on the ballot, because it seems like everyone's okay with letting the public vote on it, which I think that's a very, very democratic way to do it. We love that. We love hearing the voices of the public. But making sure that they know, one, how it will be funded, and two, where the money will go. I think that they at least deserve to know that part. Thank you."

Representative Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support with reservations. Adding a definition for 'investment real property' would, I believe, improve this bill. Thank you."

Representative Say rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. But before I do my short speech, may I address the Speaker in saying that there's a two-prong approach, or can I kill two birds with one stone? It's just very simple. The first request, Mr. Speaker, is may I be able to make a late introduction? No, it is, because this is about civility, this is about state government, and this is an issue that I think will resonate for this whole session. So, may I be permitted?

"On behalf of the Oahu members, we are very privileged to have 100 students from Sacred Hearts Academy, who have listened to this fantastic debate on the Floor of the House. They're accompanied by two chaperones, Mr. Jeff Peterson and Ms. Elizabeth Gabriel. But these are seniors, Members of the House from Oahu, that will be voting in August, if they have the opportunity. So would the students please stand to be recognized by the Members of the House, and I hope you know your elected official here.

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support, and I think for the students who are seniors and will be graduating this spring, it's a reflection now that they understand what is before us, which is a constitutional amendment to give the people the choice to vote for a legislative surcharge on private property. The bigger issue for all of us is that now that they have heard this discussion, which is a very thorough, well discussed, well thought out by all members from Kauai to Oahu, to Maui, to Hawaii, and Oahu, they will probably make a very educated choice when they go to the polls in August or November. It's probably going to be in November, correct me if I'm wrong, the constitutional amendment.

"But in just closing, this is democracy at its best. For the 100-plus students who are here from Sacred Hearts, and finally, we, the House of Representatives, appreciate your presence in having to hear the discussion that is on the floor. Thank you very much."

Representative Holt rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representative Nakamura be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Mizuno rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I appreciate the members that have concerns and reservations. I too share many of your concerns and reservations with the measure before us. However, the reason why I'm a straight up up vote on this bill is because of the very genesis of the bill, the foundation. The fact that our state's most precious resource are our *keiki*, our students.

"I don't have a crystal ball, I don't know what's going to happen the next 50 years from now, but I do know this. We invest in our students, and the teachers are our best allies to do that. If we invest in our students today, 50

years from now, our state, our economy, our housing, our healthcare is going to be *pono*. So for those reasons, I support this bill. Thank you."

Representative San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I stand in support. I'd like to focus on the bill itself, and not the minutia. The bill is specific, surcharge on investment real property to support public education. No more, no less. I would like to have the comments of the Representative from Kaneohe be submitted as if they were my own. Thank you. Because I agree. By putting this on the ballot, it gives the public the opportunity to say that they believe that public education is a basic constitutional, fundamental right. It is a right that I, as a member, as a product of the Hawaii public school education was able to use while I was growing up, and which I wish to impart on all the other Hawaii residents.

"This bill gives latitude to the State Legislature to decide how to implement it once it has passed. It is not too broad to ask for all real estate, all real property, because by making it too broad, the public will go into the kind of debate like we are doing, and basically allow for this constitutional question to die. We want it. I support this bill, I support the basic right for the public to decide to say that this is the right.

"I also would like to have the comments of the Representative from Hilo to be submitted as if they were my own. Because in my district, Puna, we kind of envy Hilo public schools, because we don't even have a cafeteria in my elementary school. We believe that certain basic functions in every public school that we don't have, we should have too. And we're hoping that the kind of debate that we have here every session as to how much to fund education, is now going to be put forth to the public. And as such, I stand in strong support. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Gates rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representatives Todd and Keohokalole be entered into the Journal as his own, and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Gates's written remarks are as follows:

"Senate Bill 2922 is an example of democracy in action. It will create a question to be placed on the November ballot for voters to decide their own future. The question is do we allow the state to collect property taxes on investment real estate to better fund public education?

"Unlike most other states in the Union, Hawai'i does not have a property tax that funds public education. Many other states have county-run educational systems and use county property taxes to fund their programs. This option is not relevant to Hawai'i since we are unique in our statewide educational system. Funding a statewide educational system through county property taxes has not made sense and is why our educational system is sorely underfunded.

"Low teacher pay has led to low teacher retention and the hiring of underqualified applicants, dilapidated schools, and ineffective or nonexistent programs for developmentally challenged students. Our per student expenses rank among the lowest in the country. We are shortchanging our *keiki* and our own futures. There is no way Hawai'i will be prepared for the changing business and economic climate if we do not properly fund and support public education.

"More money is needed for public education. County home rule dictates that we allow only the counties to raise property taxes, but since we have a state-run public educational system, there is no effective way for county property taxes to fund state education. Therefore, we need to ask the voters, is the education of our *keiki* or county home rule more important? My constituents know where I stand and now it is up to the people to decide."

Representative Luke rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. And I wanted to thank the Education Chair. Last year we had a similar bill, and looking back, he did the right choice by taking

time off and looking at the proposal from last year. And if we had the bill from last year, I think based on the amount of discussion we had here, chances are the last year proposal probably would not have passed because it was too specific and too regimented, and I think people had a lot more questions. So I just wanted to take the time to thank the Education Chair for doing a really good job in crafting what we are about to vote on today."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 2922, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AMENDMENTS TO ARTICLES VIII AND X OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF HAWAII TO AUTHORIZE THE LEGISLATURE TO ESTABLISH A SURCHARGE TO INCREASE FUNDING FOR PUBLIC EDUCATION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representatives Evans, Holt, Kobayashi, McDermott, Nakamura, Onishi, Takumi and Tupola voting aye with reservations.

## S.B. No. 192, SD 1, HD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that S.B. No. 192, SD 1, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support but with some slight reservations, and the reason, if I may say, is that because it will allow the director of Finance to transfer some balances from the Natural Area Reserve Fund into the general fund, and I don't support that portion of the bill. That's what concerns me. Thank you."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 192, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET," passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Thielen and Tokioka voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Ito and Say voting no.

Representative Evans: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Today, April 10th, is Equal Pay Day in the United States, a day that signifies how far into the new calendar year women have to work to earn what men made the previous year. Pay inequality persists here and everywhere, and it matters. It matters because it condemns millions of women and their families to lives of limited possibilities, and for many, poverty.

"Women earning less than men has obvious immediate repercussions, such as less money to spend. But also, it directly relates to longer term impacts such as credit worthiness, savings, social security benefits, and retirement income. Women in old age are living without any regular income from an old age or survivor's pension, despite having been in the workforce in earlier life. Where every dollar counts, pay inequality can be enough to plunge families below the breadline.

"Income well spent on education, nutrition and health, potentially moves a generation out of poverty. Insufficient income reinforces the poverty cycle. The motherhood penalty is larger for low-wage workers, and women in the USA occupy two-thirds of the care economy, in child care centers or residential homes for older people, as domestic workers and cleaners. This work is critical to the functioning of our economies but is hugely undervalued. In the USA, golf caddies, who are mostly men, earn an average of \$17 an hour, while caregivers, mostly women, are paid just \$9 an hour.

"We will not be able to close the gender pay gap as long as there are so many women trapped in low-paid, undervalued work, and as long as working conditions are inflexible. The male breadwinner model of society has long gone, yet its influence remains. Contemporary economies need a workforce that draws in both men and women, but workplaces are still designed as if workers have no domestic responsibilities.

"There is need to sensitively accommodate the caring role, provide the flexibility and working hours that real life demands, and apply a similarly realistic appreciation of women's engagement. Ample research exists to demonstrate the scale of that value. Conversely, the recognition and significance of men's caring role and responsibility is underappreciated and underserved in policy and practice.

"Failure to support the care economy reinforces the gender pay gap in two ways, by undervaluing women's jobs and entrenching women in low-pay work, and by limiting women's paid work opportunities through a lack of affordable care services. When it comes to tackling the gender pay gap and reducing unpaid care work for women and girls, we urgently need to be finding and implementing effective solutions. To reach the goal of equal opportunity, a founding principle of our great country, we must consider pay equity. Equal pay matters. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The House of Representatives of the Twenty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2018, convened at 12:06 o'clock p.m., with Speaker Saiki presiding.

# ORDER OF THE DAY

## REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES

Representatives Takayama and LoPresti, for the Committee on Public Safety and the Committee on Veterans, Military, & International Affairs, & Culture and the Arts, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1990-18) recommending that S.C.R. No. 40, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that S.C.R. No. 40, SD 1, HD 1 be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in favor, brief comment. Mr. Speaker, I stand up not because I planned on it, but I think it's so important to set the historical record straight, Mr. Speaker. So I just have a couple of points I want to make. First of all, this bill is an excellent way of this body, the Legislature, Senate and the House, letting know to the public, that probably what was the equivalent of the Stevie Wonder blunder at the University of Hawaii, this will be the mad missile crisis of this administration.

"Mr. Speaker, I think it's a way of finding out what's to be done, what has happened, and how we prevent it in the future. What I think is missing on the huge list of people that are going to be participating in the task force to see what HI-EMA should be doing, I don't see any legislators, I don't see any PACOM officials. Those are the ones who probably, at least from PACOM's point of view, they are the ones who should be telling us there's

a missile crisis. But if they're not there, hopefully this group is not going to err by their absence.

"Lastly, Mr. Speaker, I think that the way we handled it, I still disagree, and I want to go on record, the way we cut short our inquiry, the way some of us were not able to make questions known, I think the residual of that is where this stuff is still a mystery. The people of Hawaii still do not know exactly why, when and how we had a button pusher, who by the way is now suing the State of Hawaii."

Representative Belatti rose to a point of order, stating:

"Point of order, Mr. Speaker, please. He should contain his comments to the merits and the substance of the resolution before us. Thank you."

The Chair addressed Representative Ward, stating:

"Please confine your remarks."

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"Who is now suing the State of Hawaii because we didn't handle it. This bill will handle it."

Representative Belatti rose to a point of order, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, point of order. He should be addressing the Speaker."

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"Thank you. Mr. Speaker, may I proceed? Having said that, Mr. Speaker, this is good, it's what the Legislature should be doing, it'll let us know what to do in the next session, and to do it wisely, because what we've done so far, again, as I said, is equivalent to the Stevie Wonder blunder, and we still have egg on our face from that one, as well as this one. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Takayama rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. If the previous speaker would review the text of the resolution, he would note that the commander of the US Pacific Command is a member of the proposed task force. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, in strong support. I just wanted to note for the record, this is the only remaining bill or resolution on this entire missile alert scare issue. It's really sad. Everybody in the state was upset about it, many people here pretended to care about it, and now this is all we have is a resolution requesting that they do something. We had bills that, a lot of this comes from earlier bills that was requiring all sorts of things protecting businesses, saying that you can't force people into the street, and we've done little to nothing in relation."

Representative Belatti rose to a point of order, stating:

"Point of order, Mr. Speaker. Please confine the comments to the substance in front of us."

Representative LoPresti continued, stating:

"Thank you, I am. As the chair of the committee who helped put this content in, it's from those bills that died, that's the genesis of this, Mr. Speaker. So it's just, we need to at least do this, but it's just sad that this is all that's left. Thank you."

Representative Ing rose to a point of order, stating:

"Just a point of order, could you strike from the record the members pretending to care? I think it's impugning motive. I request that that language be stricken from the record. Members pretending to care about the issue impugns motive of members in this body."

There are many more pictures, of course, on the internet, of the devastation that has occurred.

"Mr. Speaker, there's also a headline, front-page article today in the Star Advertiser titled 'Erosion is eating away at Hawaii's shorelines.' And we, instead of recognizing that and instead of doing maybe piece by piece management, we are just going ahead and issuing all of these leases covering submerged lands and portions of state submerged land, *et cetera*, as we have these measures before us.

"I think it's time, Mr. Speaker, to stop doing this in this body and to recognize that we are faced with sea level rise, and to recognize the problems that we have to address in a more sensible way, in a management way, rather than just going ahead and issuing these easements and continuing to do that.

"I'd like to read a couple of quotes from Dr. Chip Fletcher, University of Hawaii, he is one of the most knowledgeable people in the state about sea level rise. Dr. Fletcher says, 'Look at our beaches on any weekend. They are crowded with families. Beaches belong to our children. We are caretakers. If we keep building sea walls and destroying this legacy, we deserve to be known as a generation of thieves.' And Mr. Speaker, he goes on to say, 'We know sea level is rising. We know the shoreline is going to recede and move landward. In my opinion it's our job to get out of the way.'

"Mr. Speaker, these measures do not let us get out of the way. These measures really are denial of what is happening to our island shores, and I'm casting a no vote on all of them. So I will stand up individually, because there are some good measures interspersed in between the ones that are refusing to acknowledge that we need to get out of the way. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.C.R. Inouye Saddle Road Highway."

> Subject: Grant of Term, Non-Exclusive Easement for Seawall Steps and Landscaped Area Purposes Seaward of Tax Map Key (TMK) 8-7-023: 044

This is in response to your request, received September 1, 2017, for comments on the subject Project. We understand the Applicant seeks a grant of term, non-exclusive easement for a seawall that is approximately 353 square feet. The seawall is make if of the property line and is therefore in the State Land Use (SLU) Conservation District. The site mauka of the property line is within the SLU Urban District and the County's R-5 Residential District. We have the following comments:

The seawall fronting the subject site is listed as nonconforming in our seawall inventory. However, portions of the wood and chain-link fences shown in the photos appear to be within the SLU Urban District. Photographs of the shoreline from 1988 and 1989 do not show these structures and we do not have any record that they were authorized as minor shoreline structures. Therefore, we recommend that the Applicant be required to remove the fences and any other unauthorized structures from the shoreline setback. Once a certified shoreline survey is issued, the Applicant may seek a Minor Shoreline Structure Permit to allow a 50-percent open work fence within the shoreline setback.

According to the application documents, the dwelling unit on the site was destroyed by fire and has been completely removed. The Applicant should be aware that any work that me the site definition of 'development' for purposes of the Special Management Area (SMA) Ordinance (Chapter 25, Revised Ordinances of Honolulu (ROH)) (i.e., work that is not part of the development of a new single-family dwelling that is less than 7,500 square feet of floor area) will require an SMA Permit. At this time, it appears no work is proposed on the seawall structure. Therefore, no SMA permit is required at this time.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, H.B. No. 1624, HD 1, SD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INSURANCE," passed Final Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Say voting no, and with Representative Choy being excused.

# H.B. No. 2114, HD 2, SD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that H.B. No. 2114, HD 2, SD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Thanking the chair for the amendments, respectfully, a no vote. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, until the veto that the Governor placed on this bill last year is cleared, I am also a no vote. Thank you."

Representative Johanson rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I'd like to just make comments, I think because this is final reading and it will likely not come back to us, it's important for the record to be clear. Although the previous speaker regularly alludes to the veto of what was SB 410 in last session, this measure is substantially different. Here are some of the differences that I would like to highlight for the members so that they know that this has been a finely-honed compromise between the executive branch and the six public-sector unions. Some of the substantial differences include the following.

"One, this product, and I'd actually like to thank James Nishimoto for his work when he was the chief negotiator on behalf of the executive branch, he actually brokered this compromise and much of the language that is contained in HB 2114, and since he is no longer part of the administration, I did want to express my thanks. I think it's very significant that the chief negotiator was the one who negotiated some of this compromise language with the six public-sector unions.

"This is far more narrow in scope than SB 410. In fact, what it does, Mr. Speaker, is preserve the status quo and the fidelity to Chapter 89 bargaining rights, which is the bedrock of our labor law. It does so by explicitly clarifying that a gray area that existed before, with respect to management and public-sector prerogatives, the employee prerogatives, when they conflicted, as we saw with the privatization of public services, there was an imbalance created. And in that imbalance, sometimes management asserted that their prerogative should supersede anything, even when it had to do with wages, working conditions and hours. Again, the three terms of Chapter 89. And that, again, created the imbalance that brings us here today.

"What this bill does, Mr. Speaker, explicitly in the bill as well as in the committee report, is to define the fact that some of these, when management and the employee prerogatives clash, if it is not something explicitly stated, as may be the case when management has the right to transfer an entity to the private sector as enabled by this body, but when it effects the employees' wages, working conditions and hours, what this bill does, Mr. Speaker, is clarify that some of these areas are still gray. Neither side is compelled to negotiate on them and neither side is bound in a particular way. And I think while that preserves the status quo, it does add a little bit of clarity to a situation that, as we find ourselves in different circumstances in the future, may arise, that will create some ambiguity if this is not rectified.

"I think also for the record, Mr. Speaker, I'd like to, because we often don't discuss these, I would like to name all the employer groups, because you don't have to take my word for it, the fact that all of these employer groups except for one have remained silent and not opposed this bill when they opposed SB 410 is a significant testament to the fact that there is agreement on this compromise. And for the members edification, the public employers are the governor, the respective mayors of the counties, the chief justice of the Supreme Court of the Judiciary, the Board of Education, the Department of Education, the Board of Regents of UH, the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation. And out of all of these groups, Mr. Speaker, all of these groups that negotiate our collective bargaining agreements, only HHSC has ever testified in opposition.

"So because there's been some statements in the record that imply that this is exactly the same as a measure vetoed before, I did want to introduce some clarity, and I did want to note that in a committee where compromise is very rare, mutually agreed upon compromise is very rare, I'd like to thank all the parties, all six public-sector unions and the executive branch for coming together to achieve what regularly is very rarely seen in the Labor Committee, which is an amicable compromise for all. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2114, HD 2, SD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COLLECTIVE BARGAINING," passed Final Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Tupola and Ward voting no, and with Representative Choy being excused.

## H.B. No. 2275, HD 2, SD 2:

We've had a very recent example, Mr. Speaker, of what has happened when we're hit with rather devastating but actually not unusual storm in this era of climate change. We had bison

swimming in Hanalei Bay from the late Bill Mowry's ranch in Hanalei where there are over 100 of these massive animals.

"It was a situation that should have been a wakeup call to us that we need to stop granting easements and we need to start making either the State or the county or the private entity move any encroachments *mauka* onto their property, and not where it's on public property. I just don't understand our not taking this year and this time to say to Department of Land and Natural Resources, work with those people to find a way that those encroachments either can be left to just be disintegrated by the natural processes, or move them further inward, and work individually with each of the applicants that come to ask for an easement for something that is now on public land.

"So I think the time actually has passed for us to draw the line in the sand, and I'm casting a no vote on this, and if I may, Mr. Speaker, may I cast a no vote on page 3 on all of those easements, and then I'll stand up after that when the appropriate ones come."


Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

# **Broken Promises And Broken Homes**

n their landmark book, "Land and Power in Hawaii," authors Gavin Daws and George Cooper drew direct historical connections between land ownership and political clout in the islands. It remains nearly inconceivable that an entity can control more than 203,000 acres of land and

yet have little financial or political power But that is the case with the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands.

In 1921, the United States Congress passed the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act, which designated that some 203,000 acres of land be divided among Hawaiians with at least 50 percent blood quantum. In nearly a century since then, only about 9,700 homesteads have been resettled with more than 44,000 applicants on a wait list.

In the words of an audit by the U.S. Inspector General, "Both Federal and State Governments contributed over the years to the current deficient condition of the Home Lands Program by not acting in the best interest of the



Native Hawaiians when administering the Program and through insufficient funding, inadequate planning and management, and inaction"

To understand the myriad reasons for these deficiencies — or broken promises to Hawaiians — Hawaii State Representative Gene Ward

formed a study group within his office to seek answers and find solutions.

Rep. Ward wrote his Ph.D. dissertation at the University of Hawaii-Manoa on the Hawaiian business community, has been involved in Hawaiian affairs at the Legislature for the past 20 years and is a former business partner with Hawaiian civic leader Dr. George Kanahele.

Ward's office conducted interviews with all living former Directors of the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, including its current Director, Jobie Masagatani, and her Deputy Director, William Aila.

Former DHHL Directors interviewed included Micah Kane, Kali Watson, Raynard Soon and Kaulana Park

Others with DHHL working knowledge and expertise were current or former Kamehameha Schools and Office of Hawaiian Affairs trustees Oswald Stender, Peter Apo, and Kelii Akina; DHHL contract land developers Stanford Carr, Peter Savio, Craig Watase, and Chynna Stone and Ka'iulani Sodaro of Jeff Stone Development. Hawaii civic and business leaders Momi Cazimero, Rob Iopa, Walter Thoemmes, Jim Dannemiller and Robin Danner were also key interviewees providing background information on DHHL and its beneficiaries. Though not exhaustive, more than 20 interviews were conducted.

# **▶** OVERVIEW

What follows is not an indictment of the present Ige administration or any former administrations, but a summary of the collective and cumulative neglect at the federal and state levels to carry out their responsibilities to the 1921 Hawaiian Homes Commission Act.

Actually all former DHHL Directors were proud of their tenures there, but were not satisfied with the lack of progress in carrying out their mandate. They told of an implementation process that was fraught with delays, a lack of resources, scant

political will, mismanagement, political manipulation, and a general lethargy to capitalize on developing one of the biggest land ownership bases in Hawaii.

Due to the sensitive nature of the topic, interviewees were granted anonymity in exchange for their candid views, however, the views expressed in this document are the responsibility of the authors from a public policy perspective.

Homesteading was thought to be the right approach for Native Hawaiians, who fewer than three decades earlier had lost/surrendered their kingdom to the United States. But the promise to return Hawaiians to their lands that offered hope appears to have turned into a broken

promise. Today more Native Hawaiians are said to be dying on the wait list than are being settled on homesteads. Clearly, the system is broken and we wanted to know why and what can be done before there are no eligible Hawaiians left and large tracts of land belonging to Native Hawaiians go undistributed. This is a concern of both the Hawaiian and non-Hawaiian communities.

#### **MAJOR FINDINGS**

#### ▶ 100 YEARS OF STRUGGLE

Most present and former leaders of DHHL agree that the task of putting Hawaiians on their own land has been a monumental, uphill battle — some might say impossible — given the remoteness of the allocated land, the cost of infrastructure, and the instability of federal and state funding to build more homes. To be sure, it has been a difficult assignment to develop more than 203,000 acres, most of which are on the Neighbor Islands (50 percent on the

Big Island), or to have the funding and the political will to develop land on Oahu, which is most in demand.

#### ► MORE HOUSING OPTIONS REQUIRED

The agrarian society of 100 years ago, upon which the homestead act was modeled, is not truly relevant in today's housing market in general and to the Hawaiian community in particular. Hawaiians want and need housing where they can make a living. A "one-size-fits-all" approach of just pasture land or garden lots does not take into consideration housing models such as townhouses, condominiums, alternative dwellings like "tiny homes," or even granting undeveloped parcels of land.

Alternatives to traditional home ownership such as "rent with an option to buy" and traditional rental units also should be explored with more vigor, according to one developer. For example, one of the most valuable properties in the DHHL inventory on Oahu is the old Bowl-O-Drome

to provide sufficient funding for the DHHL's administrative and operating expenses in line with the 1978 constitutional mandate. The judge set the appropriate amount at \$28 million a year, nearly three times the amount the Department had been receiving (\$9.6 million) to hire and pay its employees and just keep the lights on. (This amount has nothing to do with capital funding or building actual homes.)

With the Governor's Office, the Speaker of the House and the President of the Senate intervening to strike down the Castagnetti ruling, the Legislature and the public witnessed a historic lack of political will and a governmental conspiracy against DHHL in the eyes of the authors of this research effort.

#### ► FIGHTING FOR EVERY DOLLAR

The Castagnetti decision will be continually appealed and re-appealed and it will take more years before the funding snarl is untangled. Since the six Hawaiian Homesteaders filed

suit against the State in 2007, the question remains if members of the Legislature will garner the political will to provide "sufficient funding." Political will should not have to be begged for Native Hawaiian housing, but that is the position the Department has been placed in.

Judge Castagnetti summarized the dismal state of affairs of the agency in 2015 by stating, "DHHL suffers from a lack of funding and staffing, which adversely affects beneficiaries of the Hawaiian Home Lands Trust"

# ► LACK OF CHAMPIONS AT THE FEDERAL AND STATE LEVELS

Funding for Native Hawaiian programs has not always been popular with whomever is in the White House or Washington Place. But the late Senator Daniel Inouye for decades made sure there were budgeted earmarks and plus-ups to get the job done for the Hawaiian community and for the DHHL. President Barack Obama's Administration

still not finished.

#### ► NO STABLE OR SUSTAINABLE FUNDING SOURCES

The most formidable barrier mentioned by anyone familiar with DHHL is that the agency cannot behave like the land/housing developer it is mandated to be without access to the reliable and sustainable capital that a developer needs to build infrastructure and install utilities before trying to build housing that is affordable. This is partially a government funding problem and a DHHL lack of imagination and entrepreneurial initiative.

The DHHL has been unable to raise sufficient funds through its investments or by leveraging its various land assets. It also is unable to rely on adequate funding from

state or federal governments. Bottom line: It is land rich — and cash poor — and stuck in a trough.

# NO STABLE OR SUSTAINABLE POLITICAL SUPPORT

Not only is DHHL short on cash, it is equally short on political capital in the State and Federal governments. For the past 10 years DHHL and Homesteaders have had to pursue sufficient funding through the courts in Hawaii and they have won consistently up until recently. In the "Nelson Case," First Circuit Court Judge Jeanette Castagnetti ordered the Legislature

ensured the continuation of that legacy, albeit at a slightly lower level. For example, the Native American Housing Assistance and Self Determination Act (NAHASDA) entirely zeroed out funding for Hawaiians because of a huge balance of unspent funds. This presents a dilemma to this day for the DHHL, which has sought assistance and connectivity to Capitol Hill and the Trump White House with little success because it has been slow to spend down nearly \$36 million in past funding grants. At the State level, no politician has emerged to lead the fight to get DHHL funding or housing construction into the fast lane.

# **▶ DHHL NOT WITHOUT FLAWS**

To be fair, the Department itself bears a good share of the blame for its present lack of progress in delivering on its mandate. DHHL has been characterized as mismanaged, risk averse and suffering from bureaucratic behavior. The caliber of people appointed by the Governor to


head the agency or to serve as Hawaiian Homes Commissioners was criticized for their general lack of business background or business experience. The standing, or the lack of standing, of the DHHL in the Governor's cabinet was also cited as a sign of weak political will and priority.

The Department of Hawaiian Home Lands thus remains asset rich and cash poor as it has since its founding almost 100 years ago. It is the still one of the largest land owners in the state but it is rarely getting the highest and best use of its lands. Unlike the state's largest land owner; Kamehameha Schools/Bishop Estate, the DHHL has not aggressively entered the housing market and leveraged its land assets.

## WHAT CAN BE DONE?

What follows are some recommendations on how the Department can move forward, open new lines of dialogue and access funding that it can leverage for more development of housing.

dead and assuming Native Hawaiians can make a living by farming is a rather naive assumption and no longer the most relevant model for meeting their housing needs. Instead, DHHL could and should leverage its vast land holdings and secure dwellings on smaller plots of land or create more subdivisions with land trades, or on limited-sized urban parcels build vertically.

This means DHHL needs 2014,45 to put more emphasis on building more housing by creating multiple housing types, including townhouses, single-family homes, condominiums, apartments — even "tiny homes" or modular eco-friendly houses that are "off the grid" and energy independent.

The past, rather narrow, "one-size-fits-all" turnkey approach to home ownership will not work in today's market and within the Native Hawaiian community. A paradigm shift should of necessity also include "rent-to-buy" options for homes as well as apartments and make buying a roof over one's head

affordable. Presently, almost half of the people on the wait list experience difficulties qualifying for a traditional mortgage, but could easily qualify to build equity as a renter or a gradual home owner on a lot of variable size and square footage.

Creative entrepreneurial financing and a full construction menu of housing could solve this problem. But this takes political will and money, both of which are in short supply

# 1. DHHL Should Get Clear On Its

Purpose — Housing First: If anything has been learned from the homeless crisis in Hawaii, it is that housing comes first before you can "rehabilitate" or treat any other symptom of a person or family.

DHHL needs to view its role commensurately as a priority need for the Native Hawaiian community without wavering. It needs to overcome a type of "identity crisis" that has crept in where sometimes it thinks it is a housing development agency, then later says it is really more of a human services agency that has to meet the social needs and other demands of beneficiaries.

Clearly the Hawaiian Homes Act calls for

both housing and services for purposes of "rehabilitation" of Native Hawaiians, but the balance between housing and social services is out of whack and needs to be corrected. Until the wait list of 44,000 is at least cut in half, DHHL should make housing Native Hawaiians its first priority. This means being a real development agency that not only builds but also buys existing buildings and converts/divides them into separate units for beneficiaries to rent or to buy. "Housing First" should be DHHL's new motto and not be left up to the

predilections of whomever is Governor or chairman of the Hawaiian Homes Commission.

2. DHHL Needs To Change Its Housing Paradigm: DHHL was created in an era when most of America lived on farms and the nation was not highly urbanized. The opposite is true today. A homestead on a large agricultural lot or an even larger pasture land is out of the mainstream of the housing needs of most Hawaiians. DHHL can barely afford to build the infrastructure required for these large lots and the contemporary lifestyles of most Native Hawaiians lacks sufficient knowledge to be able to make a living by farming or cattle ranching.

Hawaii's agriculture economy is largely

3. DHHL Could Better Leverage Its
Assets: DHHL is asset rich and cash poor,
and it has been for almost 100 years. It was
never properly funded from its early years
under federal tutelage to its present lack of
funding by the State of Hawaii.

One way of getting out of this funding rut is to better leverage its assets. DHHL has used the least what it has the most of to capitalize its mandate — land.

It is still the second-largest land owner behind Kamehameha Schools/Bishop Estate and needs to take a plan out of KS/BE's playbook and use its land assets to create a sizable, self-sustaining funding source, or at least a revolving fund that could lead to a self-sustaining agency free from the fickleness of government funding.

Land swaps have been used to some degree but without much impact on raising funds or building housing, hence DHHL remains almost entirely dependent on government largess.

A dose of entrepreneurial prowess is again called for to help turn the agency away from being just another government bureaucracy and into the fast lane to do what it was mandated to do by Congress 100 years ago.

For example, it could start with better using its powers of being exempt from

county zoning regulations. This is potentially a tremendously powerful tool for DHHL, but it doesn't appear to have been used to much advantage. Again, a more entrepreneurial approach to its mandate and leadership could change this.

4. Bring In The 'A' Team: DHHL has good and faithful hard-working public servants, but it needs a management approach that better fits its mandate.

Given the opportunity it could recruit top business and real estate people to serve on its board and/or serve as its chairperson. This is a choice by the

Governor and could be easily implemented if there was the political will in the Governor's office to do so. From a distance. but from a few decades of observation, past Governors of the State of Hawaii have never put meeting the housing needs of Native Hawaiians as a top priority or put DHHL as a most-favored member of the executive cabinet.

Bringing in the "A" Team would also temper what many non-Hawaiians use an excuse for not fully backing DHHL and its mandate, saving that incompetence and infighting causes Hawaiians to be responsible for their own failures.

Presently DHHL is having a hard time spending down its funding from the federal government. The agency had a balance of \$38 million in 2016 and had not built any new housing units in the previous fiscal year. The Obama administration even suspended DHHL's funding because of it, and as U.S. Senator Brian Schatz told Civil Beat, "You only get so many millions of dollars a year and you have more than 20,000 people waiting for homes. We've got to rethink what it means to try to provide housing to beneficiaries. If zero people are getting a home and maybe a dozen or two are getting a lot, something is not working."

#### 5. A Charm Offensive Is Required:

Political impotence is always a problem in State politics. This in part may be because Hawaiians have stayed too long and too far outside the political arena. Hawaiians as group also have been politically marginalized like the proverbial frog in heated water, wracked with internal division and a lack of sophistication on the part of

What appears necessary is a grassroots resurgence or a "Charm Offensive" in the political arena. The management of DHHL needs to improve its public image and is a concern both locally and on Capitol Hill.

## 7. CONCLUSION: DHHL HAS LAND BUT NO POWER TO DEVELOP IT

DHHL started out with good intentions and much promise, but improper funding and management is turning it into a broken promise to the Hawaiian people. Hawaiians were led to believe if they met the income and blood quantum requirements, they would be placed on the land, have a mortgage and be returned to some degree of dignity after the loss of their kingdom.

Instead, Hawaiians 100 years later, are at the bottom of the socioeconomic and health ladders, have the largest homeless population, are more likely to be incarcerated, and are the least likely to own their own home. This alone is not an acceptable state of affairs, especially with 203,000 acres of land waiting to be distributed.

The role that the DHHL can play in the "rehabilitation" of Hawaiians is thus of immense importance and an urgent need in the State of Hawaii. An act of Congress is still being thwarted after nearly 100 years,

and the State of Hawaii is not holding up its end of the bargain by providing sufficient operating funds. Under these conditions we cannot expect the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands to build more houses for a waitlist of more than 44,000.

This is a wrong that needs to be made right and a promise that was broken and needs to be kent

In summary, DHHL should:

- 1. Get clear on its purpose.
- 2. Change its housing paradigm.
- 3. Leverage its assets.
- 4. Bring in the "A" Team.
- 5. Initiate a "Grass-Roots Charm

6. Distribute the land before no Hawaiians qualify

What needs to be done can be done. The State of Hawaii and the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands just need to commit to what is right and do it.

DHHL and its beneficiaries need to create a groundswell of support from the Hawaii congressional delegation. senior officials within the Departments of Interior, Housing and Urban Development, and the United States Senate committee on Indian Affairs. This long journey however begins at the State Legislature, which generally has yielded to Hawaiian protocols in social and cultural affairs but has given mere lip-service to Hawaiians' economic and political affairs.

DHHL should also stop feuding with groups that have competing ideas, such as one led by Robin Danner.

6. Soon There Will Be No Eligible Hawaiians: DHHL is in a race against time, which it doesn't appear to acknowledge. Exhausting the universe of eligible Hawaiians before distributing 203,000 acres of land to beneficiaries is fast approaching.

DHHL should set forth an "End Game" scenario where all of the land and all Hawaiians with 50 percent blood quantum are exhausted, actuarially

## speaking, including distributing land without housing

It was said that only about 50,000 Hawaiians (half on and half not on the DHHL wait list) remain eligible for Hawaiian Homes, but the applicant list according to SMS Research (2013) shows nearly 60 percent of the applicants are 55 years or older. This suggests the Department needs to do an inventory and create an actuarial

table of when it runs out of eligible Native Hawaiians. Having so much land with Hawaiians dying on the wait list should not become an acceptable outcome.

As stated in the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act, Hawaiians are to be placed on lands set aside for them "in a prompt and efficient manner."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.C.R. No. 48, SD 1, entitled: "SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF HAWAIIAN HOME LANDS TO PROVIDE MULTI-FAMILY, HIGH-DENSITY DEVELOPMENT IN TRANSIENT-ORIENTED DEVELOPMENT ZONES AND TINY HOMES FOR NATIVE HAWAIIANS," was adopted, with Representatives Evans, Hashem and Say being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2070-18) recommending that S.C.R. No. 64, SD 1, HD 1 be adopted.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.C.R. No. 64, SD 1, HD 1 be adopted, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. Thank you. My opposition to this is basically because what this resolution is doing is calling for armed guards in public schools in Hawaii. The last whereas of the resolution talks about that this'll allow officers to have an opportunity to build trust and gain respect from students by providing positive police interaction. Well, Mr. Speaker, the records show that children are 10 times more likely to end up in jail with these sorts of officers present, because the only tool in their tool box it seems in their training is to arrest children, rather to deescalate, rather than to problem solve, rather than to counsel.

"I don't believe we should be backing some idea that we should criminalize student behavior, I don't believe that we should militarize our schools, and I don't believe it makes sense that the State, with some of the best gun control laws in the nation, Mr. Speaker, and the lowest incidences of gun violence, should take the opposite approach and say that more guns is the answer. Not only that more guns is the answer, but more guns in schools is the answer. That is not a sensible response, and I don't believe it really makes sense with the other policies that our state uses.

"In Parkland, for example, they had a school resource officer, Mr. Speaker, and he stayed outside, he did not go inside, he did not confront the gunman. In fact, he told his responding sheriff's deputies, don't go inside, and set up a perimeter.

"These sorts of school officers don't do anything but criminalize children, in my opinion, and so I'm strongly against it. If we're going to ask the feds for any money, we should ask them for more guidance counselors, we should ask them for more school psychologists, we should ask them for funds to support afterschool programs, things that make a difference in kids' lives and actually reduce violence. Thank you."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Mr. Speaker, I think if we take a look at the language of this resolution, it doesn't say anything about criminalizing students. What it says is, and if you look in the title, is that if there is a school in this state that requests school resource officers, that we request federal funding for that purpose.

"And I think it's prudent of us as a state, one, to allow our Department of Education schools to determine what they might need, and if they so ask, and if federal funding is made available, we should not turn away that federal funding. Secondly, I think it's important that school resource officers do provide and can provide some services in the school. Things like building up relationships with students.

"Mr. Speaker, in my public school on career day, when the police officers come, they speak with the children, and my own child comes home and says, mom I want to be a police officer. This is my daughter speaking. Now, I think that those kinds of interactions are important, and if there can in fact be a school resource officer who can help the school with revising its policies, improving its community relationships as is suggested in this

resolution, that this is a good measure that can be supported by the Members of this House. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ing rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition, can you register a no vote, please? No police in schools."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.C.R. No. 64, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING FEDERAL FUNDING TO PROVIDE SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS IN EVERY MIDDLE OR INTERMEDIATE SCHOOL AND HIGH SCHOOL IN THE STATE THAT REQUESTS SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS," was adopted, with Representatives Ing and LoPresti voting no, and with Representatives Evans, Hashem and Say being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2071-18) recommending that S.C.R. No. 81, SD 1, HD 1 be adopted.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.C.R. No. 121, RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE HAWAII SISTER-STATE COMMITTEE AND DEPARTMENT OF BUSINESS, ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT, AND TOURISM TO EVALUATE THE SISTER-STATE PROGRAM AND MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS TO IMPROVE THE CAPACITY AND SUSTAINABILITY OF THE **EFFORTS** TO **PROMOTE** MUTUALLY BENEFICIAL RELATIONSHIPS," INTERNATIONAL adopted, was Representatives Evans, Hashem and Say being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2073-18) recommending that S.C.R. No. 40, SD 1, HD 1 be adopted.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.C.R. No. 40, SD 1, HD 1 be adopted, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, support for 2073 and 2074, with permission, please, for written comments. We need to get this emergency system down pat without any more fiascos. Thank you."

Representative Ward's written remarks are as follows:

"After the January 13th missile alert fiasco, the Legislature took swift action to introduce measures to prevent another disaster. While it is unfortunate that many of the measures have failed this session, it is my hope that the members of the task force will find the solutions necessary to protect the people of this state. *Mahalo*."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.C.R. No. 40, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE STATE OF HAWAII DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE TO CONVENE AN

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY REVIEW TASK FORCE," was adopted, with Representatives Evans, Hashem and Say being excused.

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2074-18) recommending that S.C.R. No. 161 be adopted.

# UNFINISHED BUSINESS

# Conf. Com. Rep. No. 3-18 and H.B. No. 1900, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1900, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Luke rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise to speak in favor of House Bill 1900, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1. I wanted to thank the Members of this House for your patience. This is kind of momentous because we have never opened the budget one day and closed the budget on the second day, so we wanted to really thank all the members. In addition to that, I wanted to thank the Chair

of the Ways and Means Committee, Donovan Dela Cruz, and the Members of the Senate, and of course, all the staff members who worked really, really, extremely hard to get the budget out today. And as the members know, the reason why we have expedited the passage of this budget is to ensure that it gets enrolled to the Governor so that we can pass the disaster relief bill, which is the next bill on the agenda. So we wanted to thank everybody for your hard work and your patience, you know who you are, Representative Yamashita, Representative Lowen. My apologies for mentioning you by name since that's not protocol, but you guys are worth mentioning because I know how hard you folks had to work to put together this budget, just in a few days.

"I just wanted to highlight just three things. Usually my speech would go on for 20 minutes, but lucky you, I'm just going to highlight three things today. First up is the ambulance. So in the beginning of session, HSAC, which is the counties and the mayors' offices, came and requested that we provide two ambulances, one for Kauai and one for Puna. This body took it upon themselves to evaluate that and agree that the ambulance for Puna, 24-7 ambulance for Puna was very important, so we wanted to fund that. Ambulance for Kauai, that was very important, we wanted to fund that. But in addition to that, we wanted to fund the third ambulance on Oahu, because as you know, there are critical needs in, especially in the Honolulu area, that is taking up a significant amount of drain and taking away resources from ambulance services and emergency needs that happen in the Honolulu area as well, so we wanted to ensure that we provide, whether it's from East Honolulu all the way to Moanalua, Salt Lake, we wanted to ensure that we have one additional ambulance provided.

"The second thing I wanted to mention is the homeless package. The executive budget had various homeless packages and homeless items categorized, whether it was housing first, rental subsidies, cleanups, storage, what we wanted to do is lump that all in, and as opposed to \$12 million in different items, we appropriated \$15 million in lump sum funding, because what happened this year, especially in the Waianae situation, that could happen anywhere else, and we wanted to make sure that the Governor's Office and the homeless coordinator has the flexibility and the funding to address it in an immediate way and an expeditious way, as opposed to having these funds tied up in different program IDs. So we are trying to change that mentality and change that mindset that when you deal with the homeless population and this group of individuals, they have very different needs, and it could be completely different than what we think they need. So we need to be flexible, and that's the reason why we provided a lump sum funding.

"The third thing is the caregivers. This body, especially the Kupuna Caucus in this body, is the one that started up the caregivers program. The caregivers program was something that the Legislature envisioned to assist our hardworking caregivers. We appropriated \$600,000 last year to start up this program, and what had happened is the \$600,000 unfortunately only served 90 people, because Office of Aging took it as a daily subsidy, and a daily subsidy is not something that the Legislature even envisioned, because a daily subsidy is not something that we thought caregivers program should be."

Representative Morikawa rose to yield her time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Luke continued, stating:

"Thank you, Representative. It's really a respite, it should be something that caregivers need to give them a break from taking care of their elderly, whether it's parents, grandparents, grandpa, whoever. It shouldn't be a daily subsidy to send your *kupuna* to daycare services, and that's not what was envisioned by this Legislature. So we have set that straight, and what we did was, as opposed to the \$600,000 requested in the executive budget, we appropriated \$1.2 million, but the \$1.2 million we proviso, we put restrictions on that money to ensure that it's not a first come, first served basis, and they need to set some guidelines to make sure that we provide caregivers to the ones who really need it, and it will only be a once a week subsidy, as opposed to a daily subsidy. So as opposed to 90 people, the new amount of \$1.2 million will provide services to close to 1,000 people. So we hope that the executive office will stand up this program as intended by the Legislature.

"And with that I will close, and I wanted to thank again all the members, and good luck in the rest of the session. We still have three more days to go for conference. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, strong support. This bill is very historic. This is not the minority response but it's kind of a minority echoing of what has been said. Because I've never, after 10 terms, sat on the Finance Committee and got out of closing, opening and closing a budget in two nights, maybe total of three hours, historical. Which means, Mr. Speaker, this budget shows that when there's political will, things can happen. Unfortunately, it was Kauai and a tragic that sped us up to do this, but there's other good things in here, other than it being a way of showing the people of Hawaii we are adaptable, we're agile, that we can do the things that otherwise are needed, and needed on time

"I wanted to commend the budget, as I had in the earlier readings, regarding the aviation and space industries that have been given good budget. The UAV and the PISCES programs, that's a very good chance of diversifying our economy for the future. It's very impressive that we can do that. I know, Mr. Speaker, when you had spoken earlier at one of the functions at the Plaza Club, you said, we are going to hit the homeless and the housing crisis in this situation. I think, probably the budget falls a little bit short of that, but I know there's a number of appropriations that can catch us up in either the housing or the homeless area, which we will have coming shortly.

"Other than that, Mr. Speaker, it's historic in its speed and its capacity to meet the needs of the people at a very timely situation and manner. Thank you."

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Just a big thank you to Chair, Vice Chair, the CIP Chair, all the members of the committee and Members of the House, and permission to insert written comments."

Representative Lowen's written remarks are as follows:

"I rise in support of this measure.

"I would like to thank my colleagues and staff for their help and input in crafting this budget.

"The House of Representatives finds Capital Improvement Projects are essential to our economy and play a pivotal role in building social infrastructure and helping to strengthen communities.

"The House of Representatives recognizes the need in our state for services provided by non-governmental groups and non-profit organizations and has thus provided \$20 million in general obligation bond funds in fiscal year 2018-19 to help aid these organizations in better serving the community.

"These projects qualify as grants, pursuant to Chapter 42F, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and include the following:

Representative Cullen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, thank you. In support. I just wanted to send a big *mahalo* to the Chair of the Finance Committee because of all her hard work, and to the staff, the Finance staff that spent overtime working on the measure. And I request written comments for the rest of my comments. Thank you."

Representative Cullen's written remarks are as follows:

"As stated earlier, Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support of HB 1900, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1. I would like to thank the House Chair of Finance for all the work she put into the budget and being fiscally responsible with the State's finances while dealing with the current emergency situations and as we deal with crises on housing and education infrastructure. I would also like to thank the budget staff for all the time they have put into providing the members with the most knowledgeable information, so that we can make informed decisions.

"This responsible and detailed budget includes items that will continue to improve our communities. These items are funding for Kaleiopu'u

Elementary School's cafeteria renovation and expansion that will create a better environment within the school. As we have continued to address the track school issue, this budget includes additional funding necessary to plan, design, and construct 'Phase 2' of the new East Kapolei Middle School. We also have included plan, design, and construction for a new building at Waipahu High School. As they lead the State in early college education programs, this building will aid the school in their pursuit of success. Finally, we have also included funding to redesign the Kunia eastbound on-ramp that will work to address concerns with the current congestion situation, which I can personally attest to as it is part of my daily route to work.

"The proposed capital improvement project appropriations in HB 1900, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1 will significantly contribute to the essential day to day commute and family's quality of life, teacher's work environment, and student's learning potential in our communities."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Support, just wanted to also thank the Chair, Vice Chair, CIP Chair, GIA Chair, there's a lot of hard work, as my colleague mentioned, that happened in a very short amount of time. One of the line items that we were specifically watching was in regards to our position on the Hawaiian education, which actually was taken in this budget, which was a million dollar difference, which is a huge deal for us. And so we're super grateful that the whole House position was taken on that.

"Many other very good things that happened for our district as well as for the State of Hawaii, and just wanted to *mahalo* them both, because I know that it was a lot of lot of work, and it's always an honor to work alongside them. Thank you."

As the chair of Economic Development, it really pleases me, and I want the public to know that with the Council on Revenues and the projection this year, we're doing extremely well. So it's very pleasing that we have money to put in our rainy day fund and plan for the future in case things turn on us. But it's been a wonderful year and it's great to see how we're spending the money, and I hope more good things to come. Thank you."

#### Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I forgot one kudo. The fact that there's three ambulances that are going to be purchased by this is very significant. What came to the Finance Committee was two, and because of the need and the adjustment to know that there are many different needs, not only on the neighbor islands, but also here, primarily because of homelessness and the stretching of what otherwise some of these vehicles are up 400,000 miles and going all over the island. So the fact that I've misspoke without mentioning the kudo for the ambulances, I want to say it was very insightful and very timely. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Takayama rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. And on behalf of the Kupuna Caucus, as House co-convener, I'd like to express my appreciation to the Finance Chair for her leadership and guidance to the office on elderly affairs, particularly on the Kupuna Caregiver Program, and also her continued support for the Kupuna Care Program. Both are very vital to our elderly in Hawaii, and very much appreciated. Thank you."

Representative DeCoite rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. It's been an honor to serve on the Finance Committee, and I'd like to insert comments to the Journal. Thank you."

Representative DeCoite's written remarks are as follows:

"I want to thank the Finance Chair for her leadership and the privilege to serve on the Finance Committee. We were able to help Kauai and Waimanalo in their time of need. We also funded programs for the homeless and for education. We were able to do all this and still pass a balanced budget. My fellow committee members worked diligently as well, and I commend all of them on their hard work. *Mahalo*."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1900, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

At 12:09 o'clock p.m., the Chair noted that the following bill passed Final Reading:

At 12:09 o'clock p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:17 o'clock p.m.

At this time, the Chair recognized the Clerk who announced:

"I have been informed by a representative of the President of the Senate that the conference committee report for H.B. No. 1900, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1 was adopted, and said House bill, Relating to the State Budget, passed final reading in the Senate at 11:45 a.m. on this day.

"In addition, I have been informed by the Assistant Clerk of the House that at 12:12 p.m. on this day, H.B. No. 1900, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1 has been duly transmitted by the Legislature to the Governor, pursuant to Article VII, Section 9 of the Hawaii State Constitution."

## Conf. Com. Rep. No. 1-18 and S.B. No. 192, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 192, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support, strong support. Over the past week and a half, you've seen the flood damage on Kauai. You've heard about communities that are physically isolated due to mud and rockslides. You've heard stories of community resilience and witnessed incredible generosity flowing in from all parts of the state. The \$100 million in emergency funds for Kauai proposed in SB 192 will help to clear rockslides and to restore Kuhio Highway from Waikoko to Wainiha to two lanes, clear debris from homes and businesses, provide support and services to isolated areas, fix other county roads and sinkholes, rebuild demolished restrooms and other amenities in our county and state parks, and address other infrastructure needs once assessments are completed.

"Mr. Speaker, we are extremely blessed that there was no loss of life from the flooding. We're also blessed that as a community that once again has come together in time of need to help each other. I'd like to thank you, Mr. Speaker, our Finance Chair and Vice Chair, CIP and GIA Chairs, Finance staff, and the Senate Leadership and colleagues in this body for recognizing the magnitude of this disaster and for coming to Kauai's aid.

"Mr. Speaker, after the conference committee meeting last week Wednesday when this appropriation was approved, Mayor Carvalho rushed

home to share the news at the emergency operating center. From what I'm told, everyone in the center erupted in cheers, and some had tears in their eyes because they knew that they were not alone. This past Sunday, Mayor Carvalho organized a community meeting in Haena. Over 400 residents in isolated Wainiha and Haena were told of this state aid. There was applause and more tears of gratitude.

"While I would not wish this extreme rain event on any community, I'm glad that mother nature came down hard while this legislature is still in session, and thank you, Mr. Speaker for moving with lightning speed, in 10 days, to get us to where we are today. *Mahalo piha* to all."

Representative Morikawa rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Kauai is resilient. Despite previous devastation brought by hurricanes Dot, Eva and Iniki, we have survived and even thrived. This last storm was different. It crashed down unexpectedly, blanketing, smothering the island, like a tidal wave from the mountains. The normally peaceful water of Hanalei Bay receded out past the 300-foot-long pier. This is something I have never seen before. Even the earth's rising ocean gave way to the torrential rain.

"This appropriation, Mr. Speaker, for disaster relief efforts on Kauai, is a necessity that will help the county, state departments, and other agencies work together, as we have done before, to rebuild access to the people of Hanalei. I thank all my colleagues for their understanding and quick, decisive action. Thank you all for your support. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tokioka rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. And Mr. Speaker, I'd like to ask that the words of the Representative from North Kauai and West Kauai be inserted into the Journal as if they were my own, and just some short comments. I just want to thank the leadership in the House and the leadership in the Senate and the members of both Chambers for acting so swiftly in coming to aid for the people of Kauai. It is historic, as others have mentioned, and this deed and this act will not go unforgotten. And the people on Kauai that I've seen, along with the Mayor, understand how fast this legislature moved, and will always be grateful for the support. Thank you very much," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Hashem rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I stand in support. I just wanted to note to say thank you to the leadership for passing this bill and to giving aid to East Honolulu, because my district was really devastated. And I was at the disaster recovery center this week, yesterday, last night, in fact, and there were people there that were just, their homes were completely wiped out. So this would really help. Thank you very much."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, as the other representative from East Honolulu, I stand in superlative, strong, strong support. This is all about Kauai, but as my colleague just said, and I want to put the record straight, Kauai went through what basically East Honolulu, Hawaii Kai went through in the flood of '88, the New Year's Eve, the flood of '88. Literally, Hahaione Valley became a river. Houses, cars, everything tumbled into it. Kauai deserves every bit of this \$100 million. The point I would make, however, in terms of the money, is that the \$25 million is not designated, and not that it wouldn't be used for East Honolulu, but I would hope that the committee report would specify that East Honolulu has been hit very, very hard.

"And I want people to know this is very up front and personal for me. Behind my house is an easement of which a river from the top of the mountain flows to my neighbor's house, and there are rocks that are filled as high as our desks here, which is the precursor of the flood of '88, because after the rocks came, of the size of which you cannot lift up, 10 and 12 foot boulders came down, and one went right through my neighbor's bedroom. Those conditions exist now, Mr. Speaker, and one of my neighbors told me they told this to the City and County of Honolulu, they said, oh that's your responsibility, not the clean up through the City and County or whatever money that may be going.

"So Mr. Speaker, I want to be on record that as in the flood of '88, Hahaione Valley was almost wiped out, and I hope that these funds and the political will that is behind this, timely and with agility, will be transferred to the City and County of Honolulu, so East Honolulu, like the Mayor of Kauai is right on top of everything, that we also will have a mayor who will do the same thing and do the right thing for the people of this state. Thank you, sir."

Representative Luke rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I wanted to thank the members of the Legislature for allowing this bill to go forward. I think this is an example where the community and the members come together to help out the families and the communities of Kauai and Oahu in need.

"One of the things I wanted to make clear is, there were some questions about whether this is contingent on receiving FEMA money. We did not put any restrictions, because one of the things that we recognized, and I just wanted to put it on the record, that this is not dependent on FEMA money. If we were to wait for FEMA money, there needs to be steps taken. For instance, an emergency declaration by the executive has to be done and then the other type of steps need to be taken at the federal level. So, this is not contingent on anything, we wanted to at least make sure that the money is available so that Kauai and anywhere else can use that money right away, and it's not restrictive. It is to build up the infrastructure.

"The other thing that I wanted to make clear is, there are farms that are devastated, and we're hoping that this will also go for rebuilding the infrastructure and farms, and it is meant for broad purposes. And in the end if we are to get reimbursed by FEMA, I mean it is, we just look at it as something that could be extra for future disaster, but this is completely noncontingent on anything. Thank you. Thank you for all your support."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 192, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET," passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Holt and Quinlan being excused.

## Conf. Com. Rep. No. 2-18 and S.B. No. 508, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 508, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Choy rose in opposition to the measure and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Choy's written remarks are as follows:

"My objection to SB 508, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1 is philosophical rather than substantive against the specific merits of this bill. The bill started out in the right direction when introduced in the Senate, correcting a wrong the Legislature perpetrated last year. Last year the Legislature passed HB 209, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, which was signed into law as Act 107 of 2017, which raised our income tax rates to one of the highest in the nation. The Legislature packaged this increase using a state earned income tax credit for our lower income residents, to disguise the huge tax increase. Cleverly, the state earned income tax credit was written as a nonrefundable credit, essentially giving our lower income residents nothing.

"The original SB 508 corrected this travesty and made the credit a refundable credit. Unfortunately, the original SB 508 was gutted and replaced with another initiative to collect more taxes without regard to lower income earners. I hope someday the Legislature will be more transparent and actually help the people who really need assistance.

"It is for this reason I object to SB 508, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1."

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2821, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Choy rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. Mr. Speaker, thank you. I have to admit that this bill was just posted, and I can't read 48 pages of tax code in two hours, but from what I gleaned from this particular, the part I did read, I did find some errors that concerned me. The conference committee report on number four, using the IRS citation 2642, I believe is an incorrect citation.

"And also, I found some typographical errors on page 30 on line 10. Now, the problem with is, this particular part of the bill is talking about tax rates, and I was just wondering if we're actually going to raise the rates to the federal rates or are we going to be using the state rates, but because of the typographical error, I couldn't really determine that.

"I feel that a conformity bill this year is very, very important, and I've stood up and said so. I didn't have enough time to read the rest of the bill, so I would like permission to insert comments to the Journal as I further analyze this bill. Thank you."

Representative Choy's written remarks are as follows:

"In opposition. Let me start by saying that we missed the greatest opportunity in 30 years to make a meaningful change to the economy of Hawaii. Had we studied the 2017 Federal Tax Cuts and Jobs Act more competently we could have crafted policy to give tax relief to our residents and cut the cost of living in Hawaii, giving our local businesses not only a tax break but also an opportunity for capital formation in Hawaii.

"Unfortunately, we picked and chose different aspects of the act to conform to, without any direction.

"Here are some examples of provisions that would have helped the people of the State of Hawaii:

- 1. Individual income rate reduction
- 2. Corporate rate reduction
- 3. Deduction for pass through entities
- 4. Sec. 179 expensing
- Repatriation of foreign earning at a reduced state corporate rate (capital formation)

"Mr. Speaker, the U.S. Congress packaged a great bill with a lot of moving parts, we should have taken this opportunity to truly move our economy. That is my core objection to this halfhearted effort that is SB 2821, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. It may be repetitive, but I think it's important for the review of where we are now in the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of the Federal Government to note that, on the average, the Tax Foundation has said that there's \$800 per filer that will be returned to the people of Hawaii, and with 600,000 filers, according to DOTAX, that's \$480 million that'll be

pumped into our economy. So even though there's some technical and other flaws that are here, overall I think the tax cuts are going to benefit everyone, I think because of the maintenance of the charitable contributions as well as the mortgage options, the people of Hawaii will benefit immensely. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I'm in support."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. Representative Aquino rose to speak in support of the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. All this does is make an amendment to the effective date to ensure that all the affected parties, including DOT, rental car companies and others have the time to implement the contents of the measure. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I move to amend the amendment to the year 2050, after driverless cars are on the highways, and this increased tax can be postponed indefinitely. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At this time, Representative Ward moved to amend the amendment to the year 2050, seconded by Representative Tupola.

The motion to amend the amendment was put to vote by the Chair and upon a voice vote, failed to carry.

#### (Main Motion)

The motion that Floor Amendment No. 3, amending H.B. No. 2601, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION," be adopted, was put to vote by the Chair and carried.

### Conf. Com. Rep. No. 159-18 and S.B. No. 3058, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1:

By unanimous consent, action was deferred to the end of the calendar.

## Conf. Com. Rep. No. 7-18 and S.B. No. 2361, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2361, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Choy rose in opposition to the measure and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Choy's written remarks are as follows:

"In opposition to S.B. No. 2361, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1.

"I have absolutely no objection to giving the collective bargaining unit members the negotiated wages and benefits. My objection is giving the employees who are not a part of the bargaining unit a wage increase on the backs of the unionized employees. If employees want a raise they should join the union or form a bargaining unit.

"For this reason, I am in opposition."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2361, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC EMPLOYMENT COST ITEMS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Choy voting no.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1652, SD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Say rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

At 9:45 o'clock a.m., Representative Thielen requested a recess and the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 9:46 o'clock a.m.

Representative Choy rose in opposition to the measure and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Choy's written remarks are as follows:

"In opposition to H.B. No. 1652, SD 2, CD 1.

"My objection is the increase in the central services fees in times of booming budget. This budget technique is unnecessary, in times of booming budget this merely becomes a raid on special funds."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1652, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NON-GENERAL FUNDS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 3 noes, with Representative Say voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Choy, Har and Tokioka voting

## Conf. Com. Rep. No. 12-18 and S.B. No. 2407, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2407, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising to speak on CCR 12-18 in support, in very strong support, and with some comments. Thank you. Mr. Speaker, this Senate bill adds opioid use and substance use disorders, or withdrawal symptoms resulting from the treatment of these conditions, and it adds that condition into our medical cannabis program. I believe that this is a very sensible and timely step for this body to take.

"I reference Time magazine, the recent publication that Time has put out, and it's called, 'Marijuana: The Medical Movement.' And I'd like to just note a few things from the magazine, that medical research is continuing to show medical cannabis has value, and as Donald Abrams, a professor of clinical medicine at the University of California, San Francisco stated, 'No one has died from an overdose of cannabis.' The magazine goes on that cannabis has great potential in reducing pain, and it's led some experts to recommend it as an alternative to addictive pain-killers, such as opioids.

"Since 1999, overdose deaths in the US involving opioids have quadrupled, and a 2015 analysis published in the Journal of the American

Medical Association reported a 30% or more reduction in pain from cannabinoids compared with a placebo.

"So what we're looking at is, medical cannabis actually can prevent the opioid overdoses that are occurring nation-wide and right here in our state in Hawaii. And it's interesting that doctors significantly have reduced their prescriptions of painkillers when they are in states where medical cannabis is permitted.

"So we're taking a very sound and sensible step today with passing this bill including the opioid addiction as one of the categories for which medical cannabis can be prescribed. The only thing I would note, Mr. Speaker, is that the Department of Health has not stepped up as it should to get this program going for our residents and our patients. And it's a very difficult situation for them to access the medically prescribed cannabis, because Department of Health just has failed to get the program moving in the way it should, to serve our constituents and the people in Hawaii that need this medication.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. And Mr. Speaker, by the Department not stepping ahead as it should, sometimes it drives these people to the black market. That's exactly what we don't want to happen. But government is the reason and the fault, at least at the Department of Health. Thank you."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. At this time, I rise in opposition with some comments. Thank you. This bill will change the definition of debilitating medical conditions to include opioid use disorders, substance abuse disorders, and withdrawal symptoms as conditions that can be treated with medical cannabis. I appreciate my colleague's remarks and she always comes very prepared, and I actually agree with her on some of the points.

"However, the House version of this particular measure proposed that a working group first study the efficacy of using medical cannabis in treating substance abuse, but this part was removed in conference committee. Our chair for Health, as well as our previous chair, have moved forward with abundance of caution because they know that this is a matter that we need to proceed forward with, with actual research evidence.

"Definitions for diseases and other medical terminologies are only allowed to be altered based upon research-based evidence to support the change. Numerous, major health organizations oppose this bill, due to lack of underlying research. Eligibility for and access to medical cannabis is an issue that needs to be addressed. But I think what our chairs have cautioned us with, as well as how they've conducted themselves in the type of bills that we've proposed on our side, it's always been research-based, and I think that that's the part of the conference committee bill that got cut out, which I think, of course, on our side, we had the right motive to have the working group study the research, evidence-based first, before altering the definition.

"I think creating further legislation to change this terminology will then make it where any bill that comes forward will be able to change the definition without the proper steps, which were set forward way back when medical cannabis was first passed in this state. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Mizuno rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Thank you. I'd like to adopt the words from the speaker from the Windward area as if they were my own, and I also wanted to thank the previous speaker who spoke in opposition. We did do a working group on this, but I've evolved on this position. There's a lot to do with medical cannabis, especially high content CBDs and perhaps lower THC levels. There's beneficial use, it's done great with our veterans, many people that suffer from stress, post-traumatic stress disorder. This is actually to alleviate the opioid overdose crisis that we're facing. And for those reasons, I support this measure. I think it's a step in the right direction, and I think we need to continue to study this medication for further use, but I support it. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Choy rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. I'd just like to note that the Department of Health, the University of Hawaii John A. Burns School of Medicine, the Honolulu Police Department, the Hawaii Substance Abuse Coalition, the Hawaiian-Pacific Pain and Palliative Care Association, and the Hawaii Patients' Right Hui all oppose this bill. Thank you."

Representative Matsumoto rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. At this time, I rise in opposition. I understand the intention of this bill is to utilize medical cannabis to help those who have an opioid dependency, and we all know that opioids is such a huge problem, not only in our state, but across the country. My hesitation lies in that we haven't had the thorough research to make sure that this is efficient and that it's effective, and I would have preferred that this bill had been a study first, so we can make sure those treatments with those with opioid dependencies are being able to be best informed with their decisions. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. And permission to insert written comments."

Representative Matsumoto's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. At this time, I rise in opposition.

"Although I understand that the intention of this bill is to utilize medical cannabis to treat opioid abuse, and to treat the associated withdrawal symptoms or substance abuse disorders, there is a lack of underlying research proving the efficacy of such treatments.

"I believe that in order to adequately address our opioid crisis, we first need to research all potential solutions instead of simply enacting legislation in the hopes that this method will work.

"We need to thoroughly research the implications in terms of federal policy regarding medical cannabis, as well as the health implications of utilizing this form of treatment.

"Mr. Speaker, I would have preferred that this bill be a study on these treatments so that we can make better-informed decisions prior to enacting such legislation. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative DeCoite rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative DeCoite's written remarks are as follows:

"I am voting with reservations on this bill because cannabis is still at odds with Federal law and we appear to be expanding its scope with this bill. The Department of Health has stated that '...the addition of opioid addiction as a qualifying diagnosis moves the use of medical cannabis for treatment of chronic pain into the realm of treating chronic behavioral health illnesses and disorders (addiction), for which there is insufficient evidence at this time.' Mahalo."

Representative Thielen rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, just one quick other statement that I'd like to make, in support still. I would like to note that the states that have legalized medical cannabis have seen drops in opioid-related deaths. This works, Mr. Speaker, and it can save people's lives. As the scientist from the San Francisco university stated, no one has died from a cannabis overdose, but people are dying from opioid overdoses. Cannabis can help, so it would be foolish of us not to move ahead and add this as a category for our cannabis program.

"The other thing is, there is a cost-saving to the medical costs in our state, because instead of people needing the care from opioid addiction, they're able to take care of that and reverse that addiction through using cannabis.

The only fault that I see is with the slowness of the Department of Health in the cannabis program, and they need to get moving. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered"

Representative Ward's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Reservations. I appreciate the debate on both sides. However, I am unsure if medical cannabis is the correct form of treatment for those recovering from substance abuse. I believe more deliberation is necessary to fully vet the effects of this drug in treating withdrawal symptoms for recovering addicts. *Mahalo*."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2407, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MEDICAL CANNABIS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives DeCoite and Ward voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Choy, Matsumoto, Tokioka and Tupola voting no.

# Conf. Com. Rep. No. 16-18 and S.B. No. 2247, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2247, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Matsumoto rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. At this time, I rise in strong support.

"Opioid abuse is a serious issue in our state. An average of 400 non-fatal overdoses occur in Hawaii each year. Opioid related overdoses also resulted in \$9,800,000 in hospital costs in 2016.

"This bill addresses the issue of opioid overdose in Hawaii by expanding access to opioid antagonists, also known as opioid blockers, such as naloxone. Studies have found that providing overdose training and naloxone kits can help people identify signs of an opioid-related drug overdose and can reduce mortality.

"This bill will give pharmacists the authority to prescribe and dispense opioid blockers to an individual, or their family or caregiver, that is at-risk for overdose without proof of a previous prescription.

"Mr. Speaker, this bill includes sufficient safeguards for pharmacists to complete training and ensure consumer protection. In my opinion, preventing deaths by increasing access to life-saving medication is an easy decision for this legislature to make. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Belatti rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Belatti's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in support of Senate Bill 2247, Conference Draft 1.

"This legislature has been proactive in addressing the problems of opioid addition. This measure continues that work by expanding the scope of practice of registered pharmacists and allowing them to prescribe, dispense,

and provide education related to opioid overdose, signs and responses to opioid overdose, and the use of opioid antagonists.

"Deaths caused by opioids are preventable if an opioid antagonist is administered in a timely manner. Pharmacists can safely prescribe an opioid antagonist to an individual at risk of opioid overdose or a family member or caregiver of an individual at risk. Pharmacists are also well-situated to provide individuals receiving an opioid antagonist with information and written educational materials.

"This measure represents a sensible way to address some of the problems associated with opioid addiction and aligns with prevention and pharmacy-based interventions in the Hawaii Opioid Action Plan that has been crafted by numerous stakeholders in the community."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2247, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO OPIOID ANTAGONISTS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

# Conf. Com. Rep. No. 21-18 and H.B. No. 1602, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1602, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Matsumoto rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. At this time, I stand in strong support. This bill requires all packaging of any opioid drug dispensed by a healthcare professional or pharmacist to include the warning label to read, 'Caution: Opioid. Risk of overdose and addiction.' And while it might seem simple, this is a very realistic and implementable change that patients can be informed on how opioids are so addictive, and hopefully this will curb some of those opioid deaths that we've been talking about today. As well as permission to insert written comments. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Matsumoto's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. At this time, I rise in strong support.

"This bill requires all packaging of any opioid drug dispensed by a healthcare professional or pharmacist in outpatient care to include a warning label to read: 'Caution: Opioid. Risk of overdose and addiction.'

"According to the American Society of Addiction Medicine, drug overdose is the leading cause of accidental death in the US, with 52,404 lethal drug overdoses in 2015. In 2016, there were 77 opioid-related overdose deaths in Hawaii.

"This bill provides much needed consumer protection that will alert consumers of the dangers of addiction and death when ingesting opioid prescriptions.

"Mr. Speaker, the requirement is implementable and realistic for pharmacists as they are allotted flexibility in size and font that will accommodate other required information on the label such as dosage.

"Providing information on how opioids used for pain management can lead to dependence, misuse and accidental overdose may prevent a further increase in opioid overdose and death. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Thielen rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Thielen's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in strong support of HB 1602.

"HB 1602 requires that pharmacies and any outlets selling opioid drugs must provide a warning label of the risks that the medication carries beginning August 2018.

"Death by a foreign nuclear attack threatens, but horrifyingly, the U.S.' largest mass killer is American-made and -distributed. Its nationwide body count in 2016 alone – 64,000 – surpasses the total U.S. troops killed in the 20-year Vietnam War. Already in Hawaii, an escalating number of people die of it each year, outpacing fatal auto crashes.

"Its name is opioid – a class of painkillers that doctors often prescribe – and Hawaii's statistics show we're on trend to suffer the rampant consequences from the deadliest drug crisis to ever hit American soil, spreading faster than the HIV epidemic at its peak. Gripped by this reality, we must push and support the state's bipartisan Hawaii Opioid Initiative newly released last month; two legislative bills that I am introducing; and heightened public awareness to protect ourselves.

"Don't be fooled about opioid's reach. A surge of newborns is now entering the world dependent on the overprescribed, highly addictive drug. It claims victims of all ages, ethnicities, genders and income. Its various forms and names include fentanyl, hydrocodone and oxycodone, commonly known by its brand name, OxyContin.

"Why else does this drug crisis matter to Hawaii's people? According to the Hawaii Opioid Initiative report,

- the amount of opioid painkillers prescribed nationally in 2015 was enough to keep every American medicated 24/7 for 3 weeks.
- in Hawaii, there are nearly 490,000 dispensed prescriptions for oxycodone and hydrocodone, potentially consumed by one-third of our state's population.
- 66% of 56 overdose victims autopsied in Honolulu County in 2016 showed positive for opioid pain relievers other than morphine, codeine and methadone.
- oxycodone, oxymorphone, fentanyl and hydrocodone were among the most common opioids found in the above autopsy sampling. Fentanyl is up to 100 times more potent than morphine.
- · only one of the 56 victims was homeless.
- 91% of the deaths were accidental.
- around 400 nonfatal overdoses require treatment in Hawaii hospitals annually.
- it costs about \$40,100 for each Hawaii hospitalization and every opioidrelated overdose costs \$4,050 on average per emergency department visit.

"How did this painkiller lead to the worst drug crisis in American history? The Sackler family – worth \$14 billion in 2015 and ranked as one of the 20 wealthiest families in America by Forbes – developed OxyContin in the 1990s through its Connecticut-based Purdue Pharma business. The Sackler children reportedly made their fortune by acting as primary perpetrators and beneficiaries of our nation's opioid epidemic.

"Simply put, the Sacklers' enormous wealth is blood money, earned at the expense of millions of people – Hawaii residents included – who have fallen prey to drug addiction and accidental overdosing deaths.

"OxyContin's addictive properties were apparently well-known to the Sackler siblings but they denied any knowledge. Their marketing campaign misinformed doctors about the risks.

"As a result of the Sacklers' alleged complicity and collusion, the attorneys general of 41 states – including Hawaii – joined a coalition that last September served subpoenas on the Sacklers' Purdue Pharma and four other major opioid manufacturers as part of a multistate investigation. Other manufacturers under investigation are Allergan, Endo, Janssen and Teva/Cephalon. Three distributors were also subpoenaed: AmerisourceBergen, Cardinal Health and McKesson.

"Other states have filed lawsuits against the manufacturers and distributors.

"Waging war against opioids resembles the multipronged strategies and tactics that I executed with fellow legislators, backed by unrelenting pressure by citizens on the biggest tobacco makers in the 1990s. Eventually, smoking was banned in public.

"Similarly, we can defeat the deadly widespread effects of opioids.

"Meanwhile, 'make America great again' is an overused, diluted slogan and frankly, America hasn't been great when it comes to drugs since opioids' production in the 1990s and likely before then. Let's make America clean, or as pre-opioid clean as possible. A nation must quash its worst drug epidemic before it can be great.

"At this juncture, it's up to us to take action, such as the 41 attorneys general and I are doing, because incomprehensively, the president did not declare this a 'national emergency,' as he originally promised to do. Had he done so, we'd have quick federal funding at our disposal.

"Join me in supporting legislation that safeguards us; keeping the participants in the governor's opioid response plan accountable; getting educated about opioids and safer alternatives; advocating for ourselves when interacting with doctors; and pressing insurance carriers to do the right thing. Let's stand together to end opioid misuse and dethrone the 'unstable genius' of America's largest makers and distributors of 'death and addiction by prescription."

Representative Mizuno rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Although I don't know the comments that the previous speaker stated, I'd like to adopt her comments. She is the author of this very good, well-intended bill. We did a lot of work on this, and at the end of the day I think this will save lives. So I am in strong support, and if I can have those comments written by the author, job well done. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1602, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO OPIOIDS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

### Conf. Com. Rep. No. 23-18 and H.B. No. 2106, HD 3, SD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2106, HD 3, SD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Belatti rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Belatti's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support of House Bill 2106, Conference Draft 1, the first of a trio of bills this session to address pressing environmental challenges of our times.

"Given Hawaii's position in the middle of the Pacific Ocean, rising sea levels threaten our coastlines and our island ecosystems. Our current environmental assessment process does not take into consideration rising sea levels, one of the biggest environmental threats the state is facing as we witness each year the increasing power of ocean tides. House Bill 2106, CD 1 requires the Environmental Council to adopt rules that mandate all environmental assessments and impact statements include consideration of sea level rise based on the best available scientific data.

"Planning for and around sea level rise along our coasts is the responsible thing to do to preserve our coasts, mitigate costs, and wisely expend our time, monies and efforts to address the growing problems associated with sea level rise."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2106, HD 3, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Har voting no.

## Conf. Com. Rep. No. 25-18 and H.B. No. 2694, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2694, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I stand in strong support. For many years, many disadvantaged homeless people have been faced with a conundrum. In order to sign up for support services, they need an ID. In order to get an ID, they need a birth certificate, and often they don't have that. This bill removes one of the hurdles for them to get these services by waiving a small \$10 fee, which people who are destitute simply can't afford. I learned about this myself when I tried to help a homeless person get off the street in Ewa Beach, and we couldn't get him signed up because he didn't have his birth certificate. So, thank you to the members for moving this bill. Thank you."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Homeless birth certificates are one of the, the birth certificate is one of the requirements to obtain ID, like previously mentioned by the speaker, and as well, want to commend him on noticing something that seems kind of small to us but is actually one of the biggest hurdles that they have to go through. This birth certificate is what allows them to get a state ID. Why do you need a state ID? Because you need to get into housing. You can't get into housing without a proof of identification. However, even more than that, is that once you have the birth certificate, you still need money to get the state ID. And so Next Step Shelter is actually one of a few of the shelters that actually provide private, nongovernmental funds to help people with this. So this is one step towards a very complex problem where people, and maybe we should actually look at just waiving the need for the birth certificate for the state ID and just use a social security card. At this point in time, there are certain documents that are easier than others.

"I definitely want to commend the author, I know that this is a good step forward, but as we unroll this, I think we should also consider the fact that some of these steps could be changed at our level, at the state level, that that particular requirement may or may not be needed to obtain an ID so that we can actually go past just waiving the fees and use those fees to actually help them to obtain the necessary identification for housing. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2694, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FEES," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

### Conf. Com. Rep. No. 27-18 and H.B. No. 2169, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2169, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Choy rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. In the subject of youth suicide prevention, it's very, very important, and I believe no youth should be left behind. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2169, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO YOUTH SUICIDE PREVENTION," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Choy voting no.

## Conf. Com. Rep. No. 28-18 and S.B. No. 2519, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1: $\,$

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2519, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, I'm rising on 28-18, Mr. Speaker, to cast a no vote and to make some remarks against the measure. Thank you. Mr. Speaker, the purpose of this Senate bill is to authorize the Agribusiness Development Corporation to enter into contracts with private businesses to remove select

municipal solid waste, glass, and food and green waste from the waste stream for use in other business sectors.

"Here's the infamous ADC again, Mr. Speaker, that this House consistently wanted to have audited. We passed resolutions calling for an audit of ADC. We passed bills calling for an audit of ADC, they ended up on the other side, and suddenly the audit was removed, but the powers and money still is being thrown to an unaudited state entity to give them more power and responsibility. They haven't shown us what they've accomplished with the money they've already had and the authority that they've had. They have accomplished one thing, giving subsidized crop land to genetically modified seed companies like Syngenta, which is now called Hartung Brothers, DuPont Pioneer, and Beck's Hybrids. Those are the three anchor tenants on the ADC's West Kauai lands."

Representative Evans rose to a point of order, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, point of order. The bill is about solid waste diversion, so I don't know what these comments are about. Thank you."

The Chair addressed Representative Thielen, stating:

"Please confine your remarks to the subject matter."

Representative Thielen continued, stating:

"I will confine my remarks to the bill again. The bill goes and gives money again and powers to ADC corporation. The problem is, that corporation has really not been subject at all to legislative oversight. So in taking a look at a bill that is saying you get more money, you get more power, we still have not learned what has ADC accomplished, other than, I was saying, the GMO tenants that they've put on to West Kauai land.

"So, Mr. Speaker, I'm voting no on this measure, and I think that we unfortunately did not get what we had wanted from this body, and that was an audit of ADC, but fortunately the auditor is able to conduct audits without having the direction from us to do so, where the auditor may feel an entity, a state entity, needs to be looked at more thoroughly. My hope is that the auditor will make that call, and actually audit ADC. Then we'll be able to see whether or not a bill like this should pass. And until that happens, I think this bill should be held. Thank you."

Representative McDermott rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in opposition. To amplify what my colleague's comments are regarding the ineffectiveness of ADC, and that is the thrust of it. Why are we giving them more responsibility? They spent \$61 million on farm land and all they're growing is abandoned cars. We got a \$4 million warehouse in Wahiawa, Tamura's old warehouse, it sits empty, with the exception of a ColorTyme TV storage center in one of the garages. This is what these guys do, nothing. They're incompetent, breathtakingly so, and we're giving them more responsibility, more money. It's got to stop, we all know who's in charge of it, we know who runs it, and I don't mean the appointed guy who makes \$170,000 a year more than the director of the Department of Agriculture. So, enough ADC. Thank you, sir."

Representative Evans rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. As the chair of Economic Development, I wanted to make a few statements in strong support. Number one, there is no appropriation language in this bill, and number two, the bill is about giving the corporation may enter into contracts with private businesses to remove select municipal waste, glass, food, green waste from the waste stream for use in other business sectors.

"I applaud this bill because, number one, we're trying to get stuff out of our landfill. Number two, we're all about repurposing, recycling, reusing. That is, I think, a model that we can all support. And number three, isn't this wonderful that possibly we can expand the economy and create some other businesses in Hawaii? So I'm strong support. Thank you."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in opposition. Thank you. First off, I think the two conversations we're having is about ADC, and the other conversation is about solid waste. So I'll talk about both, because actually every landfill on this island is in my district, so, PVT is in my district, Waimanalo Gulch is in my district, H-Power is in my district. Anything about solid waste, we've had to meet, we've had to talk about this, because a lot of these core root issues are what needs to be solved.

"Now first part, Agribusiness Development Corporation, the scope of what they were supposed to do, and I'll read it from statute, says in 163D, is 'to make optimal use of agricultural assets for the economic, environmental, and social benefit of the people of Hawaii.' So that was the core vision of what they're supposed to be doing.

"Now, solid waste, yes, we want to get rid of it, yes, we'd like to get it better, yes, we'd love to have recycling better. But I think we should learn from the experts, because ADC is a five-person corporation. Now these guys have run businesses across the world, they've actually run it for decades here in Hawaii, and some of these issues that we have with solid waste are much bigger than what five people could try to even comprehend of where we need to go with solid waste, recyclables, and where we need to get an island that has no way of getting some of these materials off the island.

"The current solid waste strategies are about as good as Hawaii can get for right now. The biggest current impact is shipping of these recyclables, and the low price for recyclables in the world market. It costs five times more to ship from Hawaii to China or Vietnam or the Philippines than it does from Los Angeles or San Francisco or China. Because of this, we ship to the continent before recyclables can go overseas markets, which really reduces the price of what these companies can make.

"The beverage lobby has kept this price for recycling bulk non-HI glass at the same price since it's been in 1994. This makes it almost impossible to recycle bulk glass. Now, bear in mind in this bill it says that the corporation can enter into contracts with private business to remove solid waste, glass, and food. So I'm bringing up this glass conversation because this is heavy. I have companies in my district with mounds bigger than this place of glass, metal, paper, all kinds of things that they have to pay to get off, that they actually lose money once they ship it off.

"This makes it impossible. The City is currently sending as much as it can to H-POWER. If we don't know what H-POWER is, what it does is it burns all of it. H-POWER reduces the impacts of the landfill, which isn't a bad strategy for food waste and green waste, but it doesn't do anything for glass. The major problem is that the Department of Health Solid Waste Division does not want to let that type of compost be applied to food crops. So they're wanting it to be a food compost, so that we can actually bring it down and maybe use it for farming, but at this point, Department of Health does not allow that.

"The most important issue that we should address is that DOH is composting of food waste and application of food crops. So there's a number of companies, namely Hawaiian Earth Products, which is the one that the City uses, but this is a problem that is much deeper than just, hey let's let a company with five people go into contracts. We have an issue here. Our solid waste for this state has nowhere to go. People don't want to get into business to do it because they lose money by doing it. We don't have anywhere to put the glass.

"So I think we should actually let the experts come up with some solutions, we should help the experts get to there, and then we can incorporate some of the changes in Department of Health that we can affect in this body, and then move forward with anybody who wants to join the game. Because once you join the game, you figure out that it's kind of a losing battle. I mean, PVT, luckily, they can burn some of their own and they can recycle about 70% to 90% of their own, but not everybody can do that. Waimanalo Gulch has not been successful at doing that.

"And so those are my concerns, why I'm in opposition. Let's start with the root of the problem and then later get on to who should be able to enter into contracts to do something that they may or may not understand. Thank you."

Representative Holt rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Evans be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Lee rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Just briefly, we know many of the problems which have been illustrated by our colleagues are real, and are tangible, and need to be resolved when it comes to what to do with our municipal waste stream and all the different elements within it, which currently don't pencil to address here in Hawaii. We know that H-POWER, which is more than anything the end burning point for the bulk of our, not only trash but also recyclables, is soon going to be one of the most expensive sources of power on the electric grid. What we need to do is figure out how to look forward, so that we don't end up stuck with contracts that force us to buy expensive power over the long-term and force us to continue to dispose of our waste, recyclables, and everything else, in a very inefficient manner.

"One of the things that this bill really attempts to do is benefit our local businesses, especially those right now who are disposing of many of the recyclables, which no longer pencil to ship to other places. We need to figure out how to give them other options to dispose of that without being forced to subsidize the cost of shipping overseas.

"The second thing we can do with this bill is benefit new local businesses, which can be created to divert those sources of revenue. Right now, we know we are working with the City and County, which has a number of different conversations going on with local businesses right here to do different things. For example, taking our plastics and turning them into park benches and other sorts of things which can be useful for the general public.

"When it comes to glass, we know there's an RFP out. Numerous companies right now are looking to turn glass into sand to be used as sand traps and filler, potentially even replenishing beaches that were eroding.

"But most of all, Mr. Speaker, I represent the east side of the island, and we for decades had hosted a landfill right in between Kailua and Kaneohe. We've done our part, and we know that other portions of the island right now are stuck receiving the trash from the rest of the state. This is something that we want to help our other communities with as well. And so, Mr. Speaker, more than anything, I support this bill because it benefits the west side of the island and those communities who want to move beyond having to host landfills and beyond having to host waste-to-energy plants, and to help those communities do something different and achieve the same things which the east side of the island has, which is closing those down in the long term. Thank you very much."

Representative Quinlan rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Lee be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Keohokalole rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Lee be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Thielen rose to respond, stating:

"Still in opposition, Mr. Speaker, and may I adopt the words of our Minority Leader and my colleague from Ewa as if they were my own and add a few more. We're relying on a corporation, the ADC, that has not shown us what they can accomplish. So it's pie in the sky, Mr. Speaker, but it's expensive pie in the sky, and the objective, I don't see them being able to accomplish it. Yes, they can lease land to GMO companies, but what can they do in this area. And as our Minority Leader said so aptly, use the people that are skilled in these areas to do what they can do and need to do. ADC doesn't qualify. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative McDermott rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, still in opposition, but I would like to acknowledge the arguments of my friends from the Big Island, and Kailua, Waimanalo, they're sound and valid arguments. Our arguments are not with what to do,

our argument is who we're asking to execute. And we're asking ADC to execute, and they've proven a colossal failure at every turn.

"Don't take my word for it. Drive up to California Avenue, make a right, go down about three-quarters of a mile and there's Tamura's warehouse, still empty, \$4 million of taxpayer money sitting empty. Could have been classrooms, could have been payment towards gender equity. But not, we gave it to ADC and they've proven a failure. Or go out and look at the farmlands that's growing nothing but abandoned cars.

"Their arguments are sound and valid, and I agree with what they want to do, but we're giving it to the wrong guys to execute. They haven't proven to be successful. Their track record is one of failure, and that's why I object to the bill. But they have good arguments and I respect them, but it's not the argument, it's the guys we're giving the execution to. Thank you, sir."

Representative Thielen rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative McDermott be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2519, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ENVIRONMENT," passed Final Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives McDermott, Thielen, Tupola and Ward voting no.

### Conf. Com. Rep. No. 37-18 and H.B. No. 2748, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2748, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Strong support, Mr. Speaker. In your opening day remarks, Mr. Speaker, you spoke about the need to be bold to address Hawaii's affordable housing shortage. You spoke about the need to provide funding for the Rental Housing Revolving Fund and the Dwelling Unit Revolving Fund, and the need to partner with the private sector and nonprofit housing developers to get more affordable housing built in the State of Hawaii.

"HB 2748 more than delivers. By investing more than \$570 million in general funds and current and future general excise tax exemptions, the State will leverage these funds raised by the private and nonprofit developers to build over 25,000 affordable rental housing units over the next 12 years.

"I'd like to thank you, Mr. Speaker, for your bold vision, our Finance Chair from Nuuanu for finding the means to carry this out, and special thanks to our Housing Chair from Waikiki for looking out for the least fortunate in our state. *Mahalo*."

Representative Brower rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. May I adopt the words of the previous speaker? Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Brower continued, stating:

"Members this is the first of two Housing Committee 'good in the hood' bills today, and more importantly, it's exciting, it's a symbol that it's this Chamber that's driving the conversation on affordable housing in Hawaii. And as earlier stated, we want to thank the Finance Chair, but I also want to thank the freshman chair of Housing who previously spoke, and this measure will provide a total of \$570 million to hopefully generate 25,000 affordable units by 2030, and it's the largest appropriation made by the Legislature, to demonstrate our relentless commitment to providing innovative solutions to our long-term housing demands.

"It's also a small sign that Reverend Bob Nakata's work is almost done, and what I would say to him, and I think he would say to us today, that God is in the details of this measure's implementation and adjustments. The real work begins, and my office and I will share information with you, will email

it to you, on this measure and another large measure we're voting on today, should you want to share these details with your community. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support with some doubts, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, I think what everyone has said is spot on, but I see it as more as aspirational, given that we have been having housing summits for the last two decades, with promotions and promises, and even the numbers that DBEDT says we're 60,000 short, within the same period they said we're going to be building 25,000. Twenty-five from sixty, even though I don't like to do math in public, is nothing as a net gain when we're behind 6,000 every year.

"So Mr. Speaker, I see this as more as aspirational, we've got to try to do it, but as I said on this floor as a freshman, we should go to Singapore and see how they do it, because I don't think we know how to do public housing, affordable housing, or an oxymoron such as what we have for even Section 8 housing, with five to ten years on the waiting list.

"Mr. Speaker, this is nice because we promised it was going to be done, but as they say in one of the states, the test of the pudding is in the tasting, or show me, and then I'll believe it. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I'd like to adopt the words of the Representative from Waikiki, and I'd like the part 'good in the hood' underlined. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Say rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, thank you. First, I'd like to say a few words with reservations, and primarily, my reservations is that this is a noble gesture on behalf of the authors of the conference draft, but the biggest issue for me walking the district that I represent will be the issue, do we have the capacity of our city and county sewer systems? Will we have the capacity in addressing these particular developments in different parts of the state, whereby sewer systems play a major integral part. We are getting away from cesspools, which is great, but I believe the alternative to cesspools, which are septic tanks, is not the answer for a lot of our homeowners.

"So one of the shortcomings is that, did we address it in this housing package, infrastructure for the four counties, sewer, water, and electricity? If we have, great, I'm willing to see by the end of this year who are the prospective developers. And it's the bare reality. You can build all these units you want, but if we don't have the infrastructure in place, what happens, it just backs up.

"So, congratulations to the authors of the measure, but let's hope we can get more concessions from the City, the State, and the Federal Government, in regards to also helping the developers in connecting their projects to the city and county sewer systems. Thank you."

Representative Matsumoto rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I stand in support. I send out a community survey every year, and when it came back, the number one issue that my community cared about was homelessness and housing. And so I stand in support, this bill is a step in the right direction to addressing those issues. Thank you."

Representative Belatti rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Belatti's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support of House Bill 2748, Conference Draft 1.

"Housing and the availability of affordable housing was an important priority for this legislative body from the beginning of this session. House Bill 2748, CD 1 delivers on this promise to tackle the problems of affordable housing in our state. By making significant investments of \$200 million into the Rental Housing Revolving Fund, \$10 million into the Dwelling Unit Revolving Fund, and committing \$30 million per year in general excise tax exemptions for construction costs over a period of 12 years, the goal is to fund the development of over 22,000 affordable rental units for working families throughout the community. This combination of cash investments and tax exemptions represents a commitment of \$570 million to tackle the supply side of affordable housing.

"House Bill 2748, CD 1 goes beyond fiscal commitments and makes it a priority that developments benefiting from the GET exemption will serve the range of renters in our community. Specifically, this measure recognizes the stigma attached to the Housing Choice Voucher Program, also known as Section 8, that is an important federal program that assists low-income families, the elderly, and disabled individuals to afford decent, safe, and sanitary housing in the private market. House Bill 2748, CD 1 addresses the problem that participants in the Section 8 housing program often encounter in finding landlords who will rent to them and makes it a requirement that developments applying for the GET exemption will accept qualified residents participating in the Section 8 program.

"While some of the focus is on the lower end of the housing spectrum, this bill is also targeting development for households at or below 140% of area median income. For those working families who are not wealthy enough to afford a home in our expensive housing markets, by providing more affordable rental options, this measure will allow these same families the time and opportunity to save for purchase of a home of their own.

"Lastly, this bill also takes a small but important step forward in appropriating \$50,000 for the Hawaii Housing Finance and Development Corporation to conduct an access and functional needs study for those individuals such as the frail and elderly, individuals with physical or severe mental disabilities, individuals transitioning from incarceration, emancipated foster youth, individuals with alcohol or drug addiction, individuals with HIV/AIDS, and survivors of domestic violence, who are in need of housing. By identifying the supportive services that these individuals require, inventorying the number of providers of these supportive services in each county, developing a system to forecast and monitor the number of these individuals with access and functional needs who are seeking affordable housing, and developing strategies to assist these individuals in retaining affordable housing in independent settings, House Bill 2748, CD 1 lays the groundwork in making affordable housing for these populations more accessible.

"I strongly support passage of House Bill 2748, CD 1 because it seeks to address different facets of affordable housing for many of Hawaii's most economically challenged groups and provides significant investments to build units across Hawaii's housing supply spectrum, demonstrating this legislature's strong and renewed commitment to tackling the problem of housing for all of Hawaii's residents."

Representative San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support, short comments. I support and applaud the chair and vice chair for this bill. However, I believe it needs to go further. This bill basically prevents discrimination against Section 8 housing, Section 8 voucher recipients. It does not require developers to have Section 8 housing recipients. We have a problem that is not being addressed, and that is the Section 8 waiting list, which is not being brought down. I wish there were more monies towards that, that is the problem in my district, which is not being addressed by this bill. But I applaud the effort, and hopefully next time we go further. Thank you."

Representative Holt rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Along with thanking the Finance Chair and the Housing Chair, I'd also like to give a big thanks to our Majority Policy Leaders for pushing this agenda forward with the homeless and housing. When they said this was going to be our priorities I was very happy, because as the Representative from Waialua said, my district, the homeless and housing is the top two priorities, automatic. And getting results for that

is kind of difficult, but with this bill and a few other bills that we have put out this session, I'm very happy, and I would just like to send thanks, and if I can have additional written comments into the Journal."

Representative Holt's written remarks are as follows:

"Because of the high demand of affordable housing, and comparatively low supply, it is not rare to be on a waiting list for several years. So effective management of housing wait lists remains a core competency. Maintaining compliance in this space allows us to ensure clean audits and reduce the likelihood of a negative fair housing claim. Overall, it's crucial that you follow established best practices for managing wait list openings, guaranteeing fair access, selecting applicants, and documenting these steps. This measure will look for those best practices to manage that waitlist in our state and each county to gain a better understanding of the current and future demands for and supply of affordable housing suitable for individuals with access and functional needs."

Representative Mizuno rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support. Mr. Speaker, can I have the words of the Chair and Vice Chair of Housing to be inserted into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Mizuno continued, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This year has probably been the most comprehensive and robust year ever in our legislative history in dealing with two issues, homelessness and affordable housing. Mr. Speaker, this measure is commendable because it takes large steps towards creating sufficient affordable housing, making Hawaii more affordable, and solidifying a potential endgame for our state's homeless issue. See, I know we're dealing with homelessness, but unless there's affordable housing, we're not addressing homelessness fully, we still have the endgame. So as we line up a number of other bills to address homelessness, we needed affordable housing as the endgame to make this picture complete. Without it, we'd still be having major issues with our homeless.

"Furthermore, affordable housing is needed if we're to end our homeless crisis in Hawaii. At the end of the day, even if we have every person experiencing homelessness in Hawaii, and we help them find their way off the streets, we get them in the shelters, we get them into ohana zones, we still need to transition them into affordable housing. This measure creates affordable housing that may become their home someday.

"Mr. Speaker, more affordable housing means a more affordable Hawaii. For our residents, a better life, also for our next generation, and a destination for those struggling to find a way out of homelessness. At the end of the day, affordable housing is needed if we're ever to properly address homelessness. I support this bill. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Keohokalole rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representatives Nakamura and Mizuno be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Luke rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Mr. Speaker, I would actually like to thank the entire body of the Legislature. This is actually part two of the conversation that the Legislature started last year in working with the development community and working in the interim with the various chairs and the construction industry to come out with this draft. So I want to thank all the Members of the Legislature for being the champion of affordable housing and for coming up with this out-of-the-box solution in working with the construction industry and improving on that.

"One of the things that we wanted to highlight in this bill is that this provides affordable rental units. It's not affordable sale units, it's affordable rental units, and as one of the speakers, okay what happened to the 64,000 units that we need? Well, 64,000 number came from DBEDT as the total amount of units including the units that needs to satisfy the number of inbound, inbound individuals who come to the state. So they don't specify what should be provided for local residents compared to what should be

provided for investment, and I don't think it is the goal of this body to provide luxury houses, luxury market homes that will be sold as investment property, and that's why the focus really should be on what the true number is. And according to Bob Nakata and significant research with DBEDT, the amount of rentals that will be needed by 2030 is around 20,000, and that's what this accomplishes. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, also in support with now even more doubts. Mr. Speaker, the numbers are very clear, we are now about 25,000 units short, and according to the Council on Revenues and the various people at the University of Hawaii, we need 6,000 units just to keep up with the population, nothing to do with tourists. Six thousand a year, which when you do the math, what we've got in this bill is enough to catch up where we are, but if you go ahead to where this thing is supposed to happen, we're still going to be 25,000 short. So we've got to face the numbers. This is a good election year gesture, but it doesn't solve the problem. We have not been able in this legislature—"

Representative Quinlan rose to a point of order, stating:

"Point of order, Mr. Speaker. Will the Representative please address you?"

The Chair addressed Representative Ward, stating:

"Please address the Chair, thank you."

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"This does not solve the problem, Mr. Speaker. We need this as a lever, if you will, a fulcrum to get a more robust, every year, not just this year, Mr. Speaker. That's my point. My point is, I'm in full support of it, but we've got to look at the numbers in a way that's a bit more realistic, because we are now 25,000 short, and we project ahead 25,000 that we're going to build. What do we have as a net gain? Twenty-five thousand still yet to be built. And Mr. Speaker, we only have I think less than 50% of the people in this state who are owners. We are one of the lowest homeownership people or states in the nation. So we've got to really build houses. Not only rental, but also for the purpose of ownership. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I wasn't going to speak on this issue, but I took slight offense at this being characterized as an election year special. This is doing something concrete. People have been demanding us, you guys have been full of talk, affordable housing, affordable housing, affordable housing, every election, every year. Now we're stepping up and delivering.

"And the rental market, Mr. Speaker, I want to speak on that briefly, and may I have the words of the Finance Chair in regards to the rental market entered into the record as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative McKelvey continued, stating:

"We need affordable rentals desperately, my community especially, Lahaina, West Maui, it's a dearth of affordable rentals for our workforce. This cripples our economy. How are we going to handle this influx of seats and visitors, if you don't have affordable rentals for the workforce to provide this economic base that's needed, how do you catch up? A home isn't one size fits all, housing is not all one size fits all. We need a strategy that attacks it like laser, and rentals are a huge component of it.

"To do nothing is not an option. This does something. We've got more to do, but this takes a huge strike at the problem, especially, again, on the affordable rental market, which quite frankly has not had the issue addressed, and this year we have, and so I stand in support. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti rose in support of the measure and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative LoPresti's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. The lack of truly affordable housing in Hawaii consistently places at the top of the list of concerns and hardships for all of our constituents. I want to commend everyone for their hard work on this issue to provide real relief to the hardworking people of Hawaii."

Representative Fukumoto rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Fukumoto's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I commend this body for taking such significant action to address the housing crisis in our state. Supporting affordable housing efforts by dedicating a significant amount of state funds that will legitimately begin to provide more housing opportunities for lower income families is a long overdue act. For years, we have watched this problem grow while offering far too few resources to effectively offer solutions.

"I believe we need to continue fighting for our working families by continuing to find ways to lower housing costs for our residents. For years I have felt it my duty to speak for the growing demographic who can no longer afford to live in the state that we grew up in and love. For us, Hawaii is our home, and we simply can't afford it anymore.

"As I said before this body in 2016, 'If the housing shortage is a crisis, let's treat it like a crisis. Let's explore every avenue possible to solving the crisis rather than continuing to talk about it. Let's be creative. Let's be collaborative. Let's apply for every federal grant, reach out to every agency possible and make a concerted effort to fix this, now. Let's lead the country in innovation. Let's build right-now rental housing and let's set real goals for home ownership.'

"While this measure is a good start to dealing with this, we have a number of other options that it's time to prioritize. Over the past five years, we have lost billions in federal funding to our state which includes transportation, utility infrastructure, and housing money. Let's start getting that funding back. Let's look at bond flotation to further fund affordable housing projects. Let's hold developers accountable to their affordable housing requirements. Let's offer incentives to those developers who specifically focus on building housing units at accessible price points. Let's establish a refundable earned income tax credit.

"We can do more, Mr. Speaker, and we need to for our citizens to be able to stay here at home."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2748, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes, with Representative Say voting aye with reservations.

### Conf. Com. Rep. No. 40-18 and H.B. No. 1874, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1874, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. Just permission to insert comments on this and the following measure, and I just want to thank the introducers. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. This measure helps unit owners gain a level playing field with the condominium association. It expands the dispute resolution options so that disputes can be resolved quickly and efficiently with subsidies from the Condominium Education Trust Fund."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1874, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONDOMINIUMS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

### Conf. Com. Rep. No. 42-18 and H.B. No. 1621, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1621, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition, specifically in regards to part I. I'm just going to speak briefly on it. This bill would prohibit merchants with a brick and mortar store from charging a purchaser any fee, including a processing fee or an administrative fee, to repair, replace, or refund damaged or defective goods.

"We know that the cost of doing business here is very high. Many, many, many people know that running business in Hawaii is one of the hardest things to do, and keep it going.

"The Retail Merchants of Hawaii stated in their testimony that retailers often have no way of knowing if the item truly contained a manufacturer's defect or if it was damaged during transit. And you can imagine that, seeing as though we're an island, a lot of the goods that are sent are sent via shipment.

"Most retailers operate in good faith and will resolve the purchase of damaged or defective goods by replacing the item, and for those companies large enough, they often offer free return shipping. However, the cost of any processing or administrative fee for return items will burden small local businesses. Meaning that, if this passes then they will have to raise prices in order to compensate for that possibility that people will charge them for it, and also, it may cause consumers to practice friendly fraud, where they want to return something that wasn't defective on shipment, they just didn't want it.

"I definitely think that the cost of living here in Hawaii didn't rise overnight, it was small, small bits getting chopped around where it was making it harder for businesses to operate, making it harder for businesses to keep their prices down, because of mandates just like this. It's something small, it's seemingly miniscule, but in the larger scheme of things, it's one more roadblock for businesses. And we definitely want to see our businesses thrive. We want our economy to boost, and anything we can do to help them,

I know that that's what we want to do, is to make sure that the economy in Hawaii thrives. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in opposition, please. Mr. Speaker, in addition to what my colleague has just said, I would say that this is the first anti-business, antismall business, anti-economic growth bill for the session, at least on this OD right now. In addition to what my colleague said that we are out of step with the rest of the nation, particularly regarding refunds and things that we're restocking, I mean that's kind of common, but when we come to, and ypoints are regarding the franchisees, the restaurants. This bill requires a restaurant to post a sign in it that says, you are not included, or we are not including this deal that was on the national franchise advertisement.

"It adds an unnecessary burden of putting another sign in big bold letters in front of a restaurant. Not only distasteful, but it's unbecoming of the profession of what are now sit-down restaurants, not fast-food restaurants. Signs will have to be constantly changed to keep abreast of this, Mr. Speaker."

At 10:46 o'clock a.m., Representative Saiki requested a recess and the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

At 10:47 o'clock a.m., Representative Belatti requested a recess and the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 10:53 o'clock a.m.

At this time, Representative Luke moved to postpone further consideration of H.B. No. 1621, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1 until Thursday, May 3, seconded by Representative Belatti.

The Chair then stated:

"Members, this is a non-debatable subsidiary motion, we will do this by voice vote. Members, we are going to take a voice vote. If you vote aye, you are in favor of the postponement. Vote no if you are opposed to the postponement."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and further consideration of H.B. No. 1621, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1 was postponed until Thursday, May 3, 2018.

Representative Belatti rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Belatti's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support of House Bill 2182, Conference Draft 1, the second of a trio of bills setting forth important work to be done to protect and improve our environment for future generations.

"Hawaii is one of the most isolated and diverse places on earth and is particularly vulnerable to the effects of climate change. Rising global temperatures continue to threaten the biodiversity of our planet's ecosystems and are permanently changing the life cycles of plants and animals causing devastating effects to our environment.

"Hawaii has a history of committing to mitigating the negative effects of these rising temperatures and must continue to do so. In 2017, Act 33 was signed into law establishing a Carbon Farming Task Force to identify agricultural, aquaculture, and agroforestry practices with the intention of improving soil health and promoting carbon sequestration across the State's agricultural, aquacultural, and agroforestry sectors.

"House Bill 2182, CD 1 renames that task force to be the Greenhouse Gas Sequestration Task Force to better reflect the work of the task force which includes establishing a baseline for greenhouse gas emissions within Hawaii with short and long-term benchmarks for increasing greenhouse gas sequestration in the State's agricultural and natural environment.

"Certification Program: The task force will also identify criteria to measure baseline levels and increases in greenhouse gas sequestration, improvements in soil health, increases in agricultural and aquacultural product yield, or other indicators that could be attributed to greenhouse gas sequestration. All of these measures, then, may be used to create a certification program for promoting agricultural and aquacultural practices that benefit increased production of food and other greenhouse gas sequestration benefits.

"Increasing Greenhouse Gas Sequestration through Better Policies: The task force will also identify the following: (1) policies and mitigation options that promote agricultural and aquacultural practices that increase greenhouse gas sequestration; (2) ways to increase the generation and use of compost in Hawaii to build healthy soils; and (3) practices and policies that add trees or vegetation to add to the urban tree canopy to reduce ambient temperatures and increase climate resiliency.

"Zero Emissions Clean Economy Target: House Bill 2182, CD 1 also takes the important step of establishing a statewide target to sequester more atmospheric carbon and greenhouse gases than is emitted within the state within no later than 2045. This ensures that Hawaii is fulfilling its *kuleana* in addressing the global threats to our community and to communities around the world.

"House Bill 2182, CD 1 demonstrates this legislature's commitment and proactive approach to addressing the threats to our environment and to the health and well-being of our communities."

Representative Har rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2182, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes, with Representative Har voting aye with reservations.

## Conf. Com. Rep. No. 51-18 and S.B. No. 134, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 134, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Say rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Nakamura rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Nakamura's written remarks are as follows:

"While I support smoke-free working and learning environments, I'm concerned about the right of employees to negotiate over terms and

conditions of employment and current arbitration proceedings to resolve this dispute.

"Since 2009 the Legislature has allowed smoking in 'outdoor areas of places of employment' in Section 328J-7, HRS. The proposed SB 134 will not give union workers the opportunity to smoke in outdoor areas near their workplace. Given the size of many university campuses, SB 134 would require a vehicle and additional time to get to the outside perimeter of a UH campus to smoke.

"While we can all agree that smoking is hazardous to one's health and the health of those exposed to second-hand smoke, I'm concerned about collective bargaining implications and therefore vote with reservations."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 134, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representatives Nakamura and Say voting aye with reservations, and with Representative McDermott voting no.

#### Conf. Com. Rep. No. 55-18 and S.B. No. 2087, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2087, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, strong support. Mr. Speaker, this is an excellent bill. This is a bill that saves lives, and it's for those who are swimming and who may even be knowledgeable about the ocean. This is something that is a rescue tube that can be thrown to people who are in distress or who are tired or fatigued, and Mr. Speaker, even in my district, Hanauma Bay, people drowned left, right, front and center, unfortunately, and these are local as well as visitors. Also, the famous or infamous spitting caves, the young high school people dare each other. They jump into waters that blast them against the rocks or take them out.

"Mr. Speaker, this is an invaluable lifesaver and it's simply a rescue tube, and I have one in my office, if anyone cares to look at it. And I want to commend Senator Chang for introducing this bill. Its origin is the Hawaii Kai Lions, which borrowed and took it from the Kauai Lions Club, and it's for the benefit of the State of Hawaii. And lastly, Mr. Speaker, this is a good Samaritan non-liability, if you have one of these on your property, even if you live in any waterfront property, and people use it, you will not be sued or liable for that. Mr. Speaker, this is all around good policy, good legislation, and it saves lives. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2087, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMERGENCY RESCUE DEVICES," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

## Conf. Com. Rep. No. 59-18 and H.B. No. 2134, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2134, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Belatti rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Belatti's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in support of House Bill 2134, Conference Draft 1.

"Sadly, in this age of social media, digital communication, and electronic devices, 'revenge pornography' or the nonconsensual disclosure of images or videos of individuals engaged in a sex act or in the nude is a problem we confront more and more. As a form of cyberbullying and harassment, revenge pornography can have far-reaching consequences from embarrassment and humiliation to forced sex trafficking. While revenge

pornography affects all, this problem disproportionately affects women and can have devastating effects on one's self-esteem, reputation, and career.

"This measure addresses this growing problem of revenge pornography by amending the offense of violation of privacy in the first degree to prohibit threats to disclose an image or video, specifically including disclosures that are acts of revenge or retribution, and requiring that any recording or image that is the subject of the offense be kept confidential.

"This measure sends a clear message that efforts to threaten, humiliate, and intimidate people though the electronic circulation of explicit images are unacceptable and that the privacy and confidentiality of victims will be protected if these abhorrent acts of revenge pornography are prosecuted."

Representative Matsumoto rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. At this time, I rise in strong support.

"I support this bill because it strengthens Hawaii's protections for the victims of revenge pornography.

"Revenge pornography is a horrible act. As the ease of taking and spreading invasive photos and videos increases, our laws must adapt to protect as many victims as possible.

"Victims of revenge pornography often suffer from nightmares and night terrors; from depression, anxiety, and fear; from PTSD and substance abuse.

"This bill helps deter violations of privacy by closing loopholes in our existing law, and giving prosecutors more tools to go after criminals.

"The bill does this in three ways.

"First, it adds a new prohibition not just of actually disclosing an image or video, but of <u>threatening</u> to disclose an image or video of revenge pornography. This will give prosecutors a new tool to help the victims of emotional blackmail or extortion.

"Second, the bill makes it illegal to disclose an image or video for the purpose of harming someone's education. This will help protect the futures of young people against those who would try to force them from school through shame.

"Finally, the bill adds a catchall provision that will broaden our ability to prosecute any disclosures of images or videos for the purpose of revenge or retaliation. This will fill any gaps in our existing law's precise categories, making sure there is always a way to prosecute those who do wrong.

"For these reasons, Mr. Speaker, this is a very good bill, and a great step forward for decency and respect in our society. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2134, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO VIOLATION OF PRIVACY," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

## Conf. Com. Rep. No. 60-18 and H.B. No. 2247, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2247, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Lee moved to recommit Conf. Com. Rep. No. 60-18 and the attached proposed conference draft to the Committee on Conference, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and Conf. Com. Rep. No. 60-18 and H.B. No. 2247, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAMPAIGN FINANCE," were recommitted to the Committee on Conference.

#### Conf. Com. Rep. No. 66-18 and S.B. No. 2436, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2436, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Matsumoto rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. At this time, I rise in support. Just a brief comment. It shortens the amount of time that someone disqualified from gun ownership has to voluntarily surrender or dispose of all firearms from 30 days to 7 days. This underlying statute is an important mechanism to keep dangerous people, like those convicted of domestic violence, from holding on to their guns. Reducing the time period from 30 to 7 days will speed up the disposal or surrender process and ensure safer communities. And I'd like to also insert more additional comments into the Journal. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Matsumoto's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. At this time, I rise in support.

"SB 2436 shortens the amount of time that someone disqualified from gun ownership has to voluntarily surrender or dispose of all firearms and ammunition from 30 days to seven days.

"Disqualifying convictions include committing a felony, any crime of violence, or illegal sales of drugs.

"The underlying statute is an important mechanism to keep dangerous people – like those convicted for domestic violence – from holding onto their guns.

"I've always been a champion of women's issues and will continue to advocate for laws that make Hawaii a safer and fairer place for all.

"Since women are disproportionately victims of domestic abuse and other crimes that would disqualify gun ownership, this bill is one such way to keep all residents, but especially women, safer.

"Reducing the time period from 30 days to seven days will speed up the disposal or surrender process and ensure safer communities. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Belatti rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Matsumoto be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative LoPresti rose in support of the measure and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative LoPresti's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support. This important measure will protect victims and potential victims by reducing the amount of time allowed for a disqualified person to voluntarily surrender their firearms. When a person is disqualified from owning a firearm, there is no reason they should need 30 days to surrender. In fact, the time period immediately following the disqualification can be the most dangerous and hazardous time. A lot can happen in 30 days, which is a long, stressful time full of fear and apprehension for any potential victims. Seven days is more than enough time for voluntary surrender."

Representative Kong rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2436, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FIREARMS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 3 noes, with Representative Kong voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Choy, Har and Tokioka voting no.

#### Conf. Com. Rep. No. 69-18 and H.B. No. 1768, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1768, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. This bill seeks to change the disclosure of legislative salary stats, and Civil Beat actually, one of their most popular articles lists the salaries of state employees. And one of the things that we talk about a lot here is making sure that we are doing things in a transparent way. As we know we had a previous bill we discussed in regards to disclosures for ethics for boards, which is different than this, but it's still the same purpose, which is that the discussion hovered around the fact that we are trying to make government more transparent so that people actually feel like they know what's going on, where their tax dollars are being spent.

"When public records are exact, it's clear if this legislative salaries are being used for favoritism, and that's what people want to see, so that when we put it out there, nobody has any question. Everything's in the black and white, nobody can say either way what happened because everything was transparent. The public should know the difference between these salaries, and when I talk to people, one of their top issues is transparency in government. As we have a lot of different projects that people are losing public faith in what we're doing here in the government, we need to seek to keep those lines of transparency open so that we can go in the right direction, so people actually want to engage and know what's going on. And for those reasons, I'm in opposition. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in opposition also. Mr. Speaker, in addition to everything that my colleague said, this truly summarily is a step backward in terms of transparency. It hides what otherwise is very apparent when we have now, as the status quo, who's making what in which areas is known to everyone. I want to thank Civil Beat for bringing out the fact that, and I'm going to name some names, Mr. Speaker, and I'm going to get put out of order, but the Majority Research Office makes 40% more than the Minority Research Office, and this would cover that up. Salaries are not equitable between the minority and the majority, even though qualifications are comparable.

"Having said that, Mr. Speaker, this is another way of giving a disclosure, or let's say a blanket over the eyes of the public to see these inequities, in addition to what my colleague said, as a way of giving favoritism or giving increases, and if you go just below the A, B or C levels, no one will ever know. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, this is a step backwards in transparency. Thank you."

Representative Johanson rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Just very briefly, I think one of the things that makes the Legislature a very different employer is that each of us represent the employer and each of us make decisions that bind the body. And accordingly, because so many of us rightfully have the prerogatives on behalf of our district and behalf of our offices, makes for an increasingly challenging employment workplace. As such, I think the minority critique ignores the fact that disclosure is still mandated, it just happens to be in \$15,000 increments. So while you cannot see the exact salary, you still can see ranges that are within \$15,000, thus being able to ensure that the public can inspect and judge for themselves.

"But I think the employment landscape here in the House and in the Senate is far more complex than the civil service. I shouldn't say, it's not more complex than the civil service, but it's different, rather, than some of the other employment landscapes, and that's why I think this bill tries to help facilitate the better running of the House and the Senate while still preserving transparency. Thank you."

Representative Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. So it's different, so therefore we hide the information by having a salary range. This body also was trying to hide the information of important board and commission members that would be appointed."

Representative Quinlan rose, stating:

"Point of order, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward rose, stating:

"Point of order, Mr. Speaker. She has the floor, these people are interrupting her, and she is not out of order."

At 11:04 o'clock a.m., Representative Belatti requested a recess and the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:06 o'clock a.m.

Representative Thielen continued, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Still in opposition. This measure can permit inequity to continue. There are 46 of you, there are 5 of us. Our staff members deserve the equal salaries that are granted to the majority members' staff members. When this is hidden by a range—"

Representative Belatti rose to a point of order, stating:

"Point of order, Mr. Speaker. This is off point."

Representative Ward rose, stating:

"Point of order of the point of order, Mr. Speaker. This is not off."

Representative Thielen continued, stating:

"I am speaking to the measure."

At 11:06 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:16 o'clock a.m.

Representative Thielen continued, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I've been asked to continue or to confine my remarks to the demerits of this bill, and I will try to do that. What this does, Mr. Speaker, is perpetuates an inequity. And I thought, with the majority party having 46 members, they could try to make things equal within our body. Well, they aren't. And our staff members are not treated equally, and this is what the bill will be able to continue to perpetuate. I'm a very strong no on it, Mr. Speaker, and I think it's in the best interest of this body if we recommit the bill. We know that on the Senate side there is no minority party, so they don't even have the issue. So we could go ahead and take the more democratic approach and recommit the bill, Mr. Speaker."

At this time, Representative Thielen moved to recommit, seconded by Representative Ward.

At 11:17 o'clock a.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:17 o'clock a.m.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in support of the motion to recommit, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I am speaking in support of the motion to recommit. Thank you. Mr. Speaker, when a measure is faulty, it really is this body's job to look at that and to realize the measure should be recommitted for further work or further study. I think that is very clearly the situation here. This is not a measure that even affects the Senate. So it's really right here, within our House, only within our House, where we need to take a look at this and say, is keeping these salaries secret in the best interest of a democratic process and open government. And I say, no, it isn't. So I support the motion to recommit."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the motion to recommit, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support of the recommittal, and I believe my staff member has the actual differential in the salaries between the two, even though they're not on the floor. Because this a matter of equity, it's a matter of fairness, it's a matter of what I think the Women's Caucus has pleaded for, of what we do for the homeless, what we do for other people. We are striving to keep democracy alive."

Representative Luke rose to a point of order, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, point of order. This is really about the discussion of the recommittal, not on the substance."

The Chair addressed Representative Ward, stating:

"Please limit your discussion to the purpose of the recommittal."

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"The recommittal is to keep democracy alive by having transparency and other relevant parts of motions on this body. This body governs the State of Hawaii, Mr. Speaker. How we behave sends a message to the people out there. How we want to make things open and transparent is to our benefit, Mr. Speaker. And if Civil Beat gets onto this and digs even further, we're all going to look even worse than the way the bill is right now, in its recommittal stage. Which I think, Mr. Speaker, is the best thing to do. If not recommittal, let's have it voted on Thursday, so we can get beyond where we are now, stuck in a trough. Thank you."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in opposition to the motion to recommit, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. In this day and age, this kind of salary information, this specific kind of salary information, is personal. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, any public salary is public. Anybody who works for the government, whether it's federal, state, or city and county, is the public's business."

Representative Mizuno rose to a point of order, stating:

"Point of order, Mr. Speaker. Point of order. The point is, they can only debate on the merits on the motion, not on the merits of the bill at this point, and the motion is to recommit or not to recommit. Thank you."

The Chair addressed Representative Ward, stating:

"Please limit your discussion to the motion to recommit."

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, when there's an untruth on the floor, do we have the right to retort, when there's an untruth spoken on the floor, we have no right to retort? The point is, Mr. Speaker, whenever taxpayers' monies are used, the taxpayers, the public, our constituents have a right to know how much

money is being spent, and therefore salaries for federal, state, and staff, city and county, deserve that same openness and transparency. That's my point, Mr. Speaker. Thank you."

The motion to recommit was put to vote by the Chair and upon a voice vote, failed to carry.

(Main Motion)

Representative Matsumoto rose in opposition to the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. At this time, I rise in opposition.

"HB 1768 is another one of the bills this session that will make Hawaii's government less accessible and transparent.

"Like the previously considered bill that tried to hide the salaries of public board members, this bill allows legislative employee's salaries in public record to be listed in increments of \$15,000 instead of their exact amounts.

"This is yet another way this legislature is working against goodgovernment practices and making it more difficult for the public to know what is happening in their government.

"In our current political climate, people are increasingly distrustful of government and have less confidence than ever about how or why decisions are made.

"Not only is this bill bad for government transparency, but it may lead to differential treatment among legislative staff.

"With \$15,000 increments, there's no way to tell if certain staffers are being paid significantly more than others. There's a big difference between an office manager making \$51,000 and an office manager making \$66,000 a year.

"Finally, it's ironic that we would pass legislation shielding salary information at the same time as we pass legislation addressing the gender-pay gap.

"When exact salaries are public record, everyone can easily see if women and men are being paid the same amount. However, if this bill becomes law, it will be much harder to tell if women are being paid the same as men for the same work. It's unacceptable that this legislature, which has tasked itself with tackling one of the foremost of women's issues, would consider legislation that may increase inequality in this very building.

"For those reasons, I am in opposition. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative McDermott rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in opposition. Mr. Speaker, it seems to me that the body is engaging in a little bit of schizophrenia here. When we take great strides with equal pay, pay equity, ensuring that that sort of information is available so women in the workforce get a fair shot, and then here, we seem to be going in the opposite direction. However so slight, it seems to be a degree of obfuscation.

"And we have a minority research, you could make the argument that they only have five members, so why should that person be paid the same as an individual running majority research, where you have 40-something? Well, the responsibilities are no different, they have to manage the same amount of bills and try and get the same individuals assigned to conference committees, et cetera, et cetera, and you could make the argument that it's even a more difficult job because the lack of support, five or six people to do the same job that the majority has. So I would just put that into

consideration for the future, Mr. Speaker, but I'm going to stand in opposition of this. Thank you, sir."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1768, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INFORMATION PRACTICES," passed Final Reading by a vote of 43 ayes to 8 noes, with Representatives Choy, Har, Matsumoto, McDermott, Thielen, Tokioka, Tupola and Ward voting no.

## Conf. Com. Rep. No. 71-18 and H.B. No. 2416, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2416, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAX ON INTANGIBLE PROPERTY," passed Final Reading by a vote of 43 ayes to 8 noes, with Representatives Choy, DeCoite, Har, Ito, McDermott, Say, Tokioka and Ward voting no.

### Conf. Com. Rep. No. 77-18 and S.B. No. 2461, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2461, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative LoPresti rose in support of the measure and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative LoPresti's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. Fake service animals can create very real problems for legitimate service animals. Legitimate service animals are highly trained to the tune of \$20,000 – \$90,000. Fake service animals have been known to distract and accost real service animals, which can cost thousands of dollars to the disabled handlers to get them re-trained. If the service animal is traumatized enough by the incident, re-training is ineffective and the handlers are left with no other option but to get a new service animal. These people aren't bringing their animals into stores for fun, or because they get lonely - the people who use service animals have debilitating disabilities and literally can't function in their daily life without them. Titles II and III of the Americans with Disabilities Act makes it clear that service animals are allowed in public facilities and accommodations, but emotional support animals, comfort animals, and therapy dogs are not service animals under Title II and Title III of the ADA. It is a disservice to Americans with disabilities if we allow individuals without disabilities to bring untrained animals in restaurants, stores, and public facilities as if they were service animals."

Representative Ward rose in support of the measure and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Strong support. This is a very important issue in my district. For those who live in condominiums that otherwise prohibit pet owners, many seem to host pets under the guise of a service animal. This has led to many  $k\bar{u}puna$  and residents who have pet allergies to deal with behavioral issues of dogs that are not properly trained. With proper enforcement mechanisms in place, this bill will deter those who think they can circumvent the law for amendable living conditions. *Mahalo*."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2461, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SERVICE ANIMALS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

## Conf. Com. Rep. No. 78-18 and S.B. No. 2582, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2582, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Last week we celebrated the life of Kaulana Werner, and it's been two years since this tragedy hit our community. And I know, I think actually uncle and aunty left already, but I just wanted to say thank you to the introducers and thank you to this whole body as well as to the Senate members who were able to make this bill possible. I think for a lot of the community members, there's still grieving, and I feel like in a small way this bill is helping them to try to find some resolve.

"And this past week, I just wanted to say the names. The four young men that were honored was Kaulana Werner, Troy Kahooilihala, Daniel Mole, and Jonah Ragsdale. And I also wanted to mention Kailen Wong as well as all of the others that have lost lives in our community due to negligent homicide or other reasons. And I think it's about time that we had a bill that actually creates a type of consequence when you fail to render aid, as opposed to letting some of these people that have caused this harm and hurt to families to go months if not years without even one day of consequence, not even one day of prison time. So I just wanted to say thank you and give support. *Mahalo*."

Representative Gates rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support, permission to insert written comments. Thank you."

Representative Gates's written remarks are as follows:

"On April 24th, 2016, Kaulana Werner's life was tragically ended in front of his family home when he was struck by a drunk driver in Nānākuli. The driver fled the scene, showing no remorse and a callous heart. Kaulana was 19 years old and was said to bring joy to all that encountered him. The driver is still free and any punishment she is likely to face will hardly provide solace to the survivors.

"This is not an isolated incident, with another event happening last President's Day weekend, when the Wai'anae community lost two young residents that were loved by many to a hit and run in Mākaha. My heartfelt condolences go out to the Ragsdale and Mole 'ohana for their tragic loss of Jonah and Daniel.

"The Werner, Ragsdale and Mole families deserve better. Our community deserves better. We demand safe streets for our residents and punishments that not only fit the crime, but serve to deter future criminals.

"This year marks the second anniversary of the death of Kaulana Werner, and we honor these victims and their families by passing Senate Bill 2582. This measure will increase the maximum prison sentence for any individual that flees a crime scene. SB 2582 will help bring justice to community members who have lost loved ones through hit and run incidents, and serve as a warning to others by showing that harsh consequences do exist when the life of another is taken so needlessly."

Representative Aquino rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. First, I'd like to thank the Judiciary Chairs in both the House and the Senate for moving a bill that seeks to protect and deter individuals who make certain dangerous decisions and take innocent lives through reckless acts. Mr. Speaker, many families throughout our state have suffered tremendous losses through the actions I just described, and feel that the current system does not fit the crime. Mr. Speaker, this measure tries to rectify that. Thank you very much."

Representative Yamane rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Aquino be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2582, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EXTENDED TERMS OF IMPRISONMENT," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

#### Conf. Com. Rep. No. 80-18 and H.B. No. 2442, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2442, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I'd like to commend the introducer and thank him for his work on this. I definitely think that in our, not just our community, but across the state, this is becoming an issue. One of the main things that we've seen become a problem with abandoned vehicles is the fact that it actually becomes a danger to the community.

"In one of the areas of my district where we had an abandoned vehicle, it wasn't just that it was abandoned, there was actually a dead body found in it. And in two other areas on this island, the same thing happened. Because certain activities happen in these abandoned vehicles for undetermined amounts of times, people don't address it, the cars become then shelters or other forms of recreational activity happen in it. And so, making sure that there's actually a time period in which they have to be removed, this is very important.

"And I hope that everyone knows that aside from this bill there's also going to have to be a lot of work put in on our part as legislators because there's a fair amount of roads that are in our communities that are private, and some of these roads have just as much issues as city and county roads. So there are various ways to address the problem, but I'm grateful and hopeful with this step in the right direction that many other people will join in, jump in. We're going to have to give our efforts as legislators to try to connect those pieces in areas where there isn't currently a solution on private roads, as well as teaching other people how they can identify derelict vehicles and actually take this process into their own hand and help to alleviate the burden that is currently on our city and county. Thank you."

Representative Gates rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in strong support. Abandoned vehicles have become serious safety and environmental hazards when left in our communities for an extended period of time, not only in my district, but across the entire state. This bill requires the counties to remove abandoned vehicles from our communities within 10 days of being reported. This measure also makes it easier to dispose of abandoned vehicles by making a public auction optional for derelict vehicles, and gives the counties and agencies rulemaking powers to further streamline the removal process.

"This is a very important issue for my community in particular, and I would like to thank the Transportation and Judiciary in both the House and Senate, including the county agencies that worked diligently to pass this measure and ensure the safety of our *keiki* and residents and preserve the beauty of our *'āina*. Mr. Speaker, permission to insert written comments into the Journal. Thank you."

Representative Gates's written remarks are as follows:

"Abandoned vehicles are widespread in communities across our state, rusting away on our public roads and highways. They are not only an eyesore, but a safety and environmental hazard that need to be removed as quickly as possible.

"H.B. No. 2442, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1 requires the counties to remove all abandoned vehicles within 10 business days of being reported. One of the main complaints I hear from my constituents is about abandoned vehicles and it is not just in Leeward O'ahu, it is statewide. These vehicles are a safety hazard for *keiki* who are tempted to play in them, and an environmental hazard as they leak toxic fuel and liquids into our 'āina.

"This bill changes current law to require rather than request that the counties remove abandoned vehicles within 10 business days of being reported. An abandoned vehicle is defined as having been left unattended for more than 24 hours and unlawfully parked on public or private lands adjacent to a public road. Additionally, it gives the agency rulemaking

power to streamline the removal process and makes a public auction of derelict vehicles at the discretion of the county.

"I believe a requirement for the counties to remove the derelict vehicles within 10 days will bring about the change our communities demand and deserve. We love our neighborhoods and it hurts to see them inundated with so many abandoned vehicles."

Representative Holt rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support, and may I have the words of the previous speaker entered into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Quinlan rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Strong support, written comments, please."

Representative Quinlan's written remarks are as follows:

"This bill is a much needed measure for my community. Abandoned cars are a very particular form of blight, one that poses significant public safety hazards. They are an arsonists' delight, havens for criminal activity, and a very visible sign that our government is not working properly."

Representative Ito rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, same request, in strong support. Thank you."

Representative Ito's written remarks are as follows:

"I am in strong support for H.B. No. 2442, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1. Requiring the counties to remove all abandoned vehicles within 10 business days of being reported is a first step toward addressing the visual blight and safety concerns associated with these vehicles. Constituents in my district and residents throughout the state have increasingly complained about the many safety hazards, as well as environmental and parking problems created by abandoned vehicles."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support and would like to adopt the words of the speaker from Waianae into the record as if they were my own. And I think this will also have a huge effect on our airports where a lot of vehicles get abandoned. Thanks," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2442, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ABANDONED VEHICLES," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support. I'd just like to note that we do have goals of increasing agricultural production, and these guys make the tastiest asparagus you could ever hope for. Thank you."

Representative Matsumoto rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Also in support. Twin Bridge Farms is located in my district in Waialua and is known for its asparagus that is in many restaurants. And we're always talking about building local food for local people, and while they do other types of ag, they do produce a lot of local food for local people, asparagus, onions, tomatoes, and other crops. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1208, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURE," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes, with Representative Thielen voting aye with reservations.

Representative Choy's written remarks are as follows:

"In opposition to S.B. No. 2919, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1.

"This bill is a slippery slope similar to Act 97 Session Laws of 1965 and will end up like S.B. No. 2919, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1. This is not good public policy, and I would like to reference my comments on S.B. No. 2237, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 129-18."

Representative Thielen rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations, Mr. Speaker. Thank you. I fully support the intention of this bill, which is to help Hawaii public libraries. In fact, we just had the opening of our public library in Nanakuli, and it's beautiful.

"I would like to point out some important testimony, though, that came through in this bill, and that it's stated that the Hawaii State Public Library System doesn't currently hold title to the lands under which the public libraries sit. And also in testimony they said that they don't have expertise necessary to guide the public library system through a pilot program which would involve redevelopment, leasing, and management of library.

"I'm also concerned about the commercialization of this bill, specifically in regards to the fact that there is a point in the public trust doctrine that states that in the Admission Act of 1959, that the support of anything used on these public lands should be for the support of public schools and other public institutions, and I think that that's ultimately what we want to see. We want to see the libraries thrive, and we want to find ways to help them, but we need to make sure that the intention of having any type of business or entity actually being able to lease or be managed by the State on these lands has to do directly with educational purposes. So I think those are my reservations, and I'm sure other people had same concerns. Thank you."

Representative Woodson rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Speaker. In support. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This is simply just to create a way to bring more, potentially, funds in for our much needed public libraries. It's limited to five properties, and I urge my colleagues to please support this proposal."

Representative McKelvey rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Woodson be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2556, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising in support of this measure with a few comments. Thank you. Mr. Speaker, this is relating to agriculture, and it's a Senate bill that is going to continue and fund the state industrial hemp project. For those of us here in the Chamber, I just wanted to give some quick information about the potential of industrial hemp that is now being discovered, now that different scientists are able to examine the plant.

"Here is one that says, results from some of the first studies to examine hemp's ability to fight cancer show that it might one day be useful as plant-based treatment for ovarian cancer. New findings tied to hemp's anti-cancer properties will be presented at the American Society for Biochemistry and Molecular Biology's annual meeting this spring in San Diego. The therapeutic potential of an extract known as KY-hemp is produced from hemp grown in Kentucky.

"Kentucky is ahead of us, Mr. Speaker, because they started aggressively the minute the federal farm act passed in 2014. They started aggressively with a hemp research project, with a tremendous amount of support from their governor and their administration. Our project has kind of stumbled forward, but it's had wonderful support from the Finance Committee and support in the Senate. We just need the administration to be more on board and more aggressive about it.

"They're showing that adding various doses of the Kentucky hemp extract to cultured ovarian cells has led to a significant dose-dependent slowing of cell migration. And the extract might be useful for stopping or slowing down metastasis, the spreading of cancer to other parts of the body.

"This is a dramatic research, something that we should be able to do here, and we have a wonderful team from University of Hawaii that is working on the hemp research project here.

"Kentucky hemp slows ovarian cancer comparable to or even better than the current ovarian cancer drug Cisplatin. Since Cisplatin exhibits high toxicity, we anticipate that hemp would carry less side effects.

"So, we have a miracle plant, Mr. Speaker, and we may have some miracle results for women who are subject to ovarian cancer. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2556, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURE," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2607, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Matsumoto rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. At this time, I stand in strong support. This bill contributes to Hawaii's educational system in three incredibly positive ways. It creates a statewide computer science program, it'll help create a competitive workforce in Hawaii, and it'll also help to provide equity in the field of computer science, which is mainly dominated by men. I'm extremely excited that we passed this bill this year, I've been working with a lot of advocates in computer science, and I'd like to also insert written comments into the Journal. Thank you."

Representative Matsumoto's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. At this time, I rise in strong support.

"This bill contributes to Hawaii's educational system in three incredibly positive ways. A state-wide computer science program will foster the creation of a competitive workforce in Hawaii, will encourage Hawaii's public school students to enter into the field of computer science, and will provide the platform for equity in education.

"Computer science drives job creation and innovation throughout our nation's economy, and providing students with access to computer science education is a critical step for ensuring that Hawaii remains competitive in the global economy.

"Computing occupations comprise up to two-thirds of all projected new jobs in STEM fields, making computer science one of the most in-demand college degrees offering higher paying entry-level jobs than other degrees.

"This is especially important to note, as in the State of Hawaii, the ability to enter into a field with higher-paying salaries is essential, due to our high cost of living. By instituting a state-wide computer science program, we are leveling the field for students of lower socioeconomic status, or students living in rural areas, who are unable to attend computer science courses if they are not offered in school. By creating equity in education, we are creating equity in future employment opportunities.

"This bill will also encourage our students to pursue computer science and increases potential interest in the field. Currently, there are fewer advanced placement examinations taken in computer science than in any other STEM subject area, showing a lack of interest in or availability of adequate computer science courses.

"National studies of K-12 computer science education indicate that many students may not perceive advanced computer science as relevant to their education in part because computer science is not treated as a core academic subject under existing policy.

"By encouraging Hawaii's students, especially women and Title I students, to enter into the field of computer science, we can stimulate greater interest in STEM fields, which will not only benefit our students as individuals, but will also benefit their families, communities, and Hawaii's economy as a whole.

"Additionally, basic technological skills are increasingly necessary in day-to-day life regardless of a student's ultimate career choice. Information technology skills are needed at all levels of training and education, and across all sectors of Hawaii's economy.

"Providing students with a basic understanding of computer science is likely to contribute positively to the well-being of students, their families, and their communities.

"Hawaii must do more to encourage the study of computer science. Additional steps must be taken to improve and expand access to computer science education, particularly in advanced courses that could prepare students for careers in the field. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2697, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative McDermott rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I stand in strong support, and I would just like to acknowledge the hard work of the Chair of this committee. He's attacked his responsibilities with a gusto that I have not seen since I've been here. Perhaps that's because, and this is not a negative, but he didn't serve. So he wanted to show all those that did serve that he really does care. And I witnessed him basically save the

fleet reserve, along with my colleague from Kalihi, from going under, and helping in a myriad of other ways. In fact, when he first became Chairman, he came to me and said that if there's any help that veterans need, please let them know I'm available and I want to do the work. So, I give him a shout out, and a kudos, and this is good work here, and I thank him for his hard work. Thank you."

Representative Keohokalole rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I stand in strong support. I'd like to adopt the words of the previous speaker and I'd also like to congratulate the Chair on his good work on this bill. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, strong support, same request that the Marine Captain from Ewa Beach be as if they were my remarks into the Journal. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. First, thank you for the very kind remarks from my colleagues. Mr. Speaker, just a few brief words about this. I strongly support this bill, relating to veterans, because it will facilitate the first State of Hawaii Veterans Summit. Veterans issues are so important because they intersect with so many other issues, homelessness, immigration, higher education, and women's issues. This summit will allow stakeholders and advocates from all across the islands to come together and find solutions to help the men and women who have literally devoted their lives to serving and protecting the citizens of our country. Thank you."

Representative Matsumoto rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. Having both Schofield and Wheeler Air Force Base in my district, this is an extremely important bill. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2697, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO VETERANS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

## Conf. Com. Rep. No. 115-18 and H.B. No. 2010, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2010, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TOURISM," passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Say and Ward voting no.

## Conf. Com. Rep. No. 116-18 and H.B. No. 2097, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2097, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support, and I just want to say that I believe the intention of the funding in this bill was to hire additional lifeguards at the beaches that most need them so we can save lives there. And I have some concern that the division is intending to use this to make up for some of their shortfall and not for hiring new lifeguards, so I just wanted to make that clear, that as my understanding, that was the intent. And request to insert written comments."

Representative Lowen's written remarks are as follows:

"There has been ongoing discussion for many years about the need for a lifeguard at the Kua Bay section of Kekaha Kai State Park on Hawaii Island.

Lives have been lost that might have been saved, and injuries sustained that might have been prevented had a lifeguard been present. It is my view that access to this dangerous beach should never have been improved in the first place without ensuring that a lifeguard position would be funded. This year I also passed HCR 34 to urge State Parks Division to consider, among other things, whether access should be improved to previously difficult to access beaches if the lifeguard positions needed to ensure safety are not concurrently funded or assured of future funding.

"The funding in this bill was put in place to cover this need and to provide for new lifeguard positions where they are most needed. The Division of State Parks has repeatedly expressed that Kua Bay is at the top of this priority list.

"I have confirmed verbally with the Chair of the House Committee on Water & Land, the Chair of the House Finance Committee, and the Chair of the Senate Committee on Water and Land that their understanding was also that this funding would cover the need for new lifeguard positions. Recent conversations with the division have led me to be concerned that they may not intend to use these funds in line with legislative intent, but to make up for other budget shortfalls. Therefore, I am submitting these written remarks to clarify the legislative intent of HB 2097. It is my hope that the Division of State Parks will use these funds as intended."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2097, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LIFEGUARDS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

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### Conf. Com. Rep. No. 117-18 and H.B. No. 2464, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2464, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Thank you. I definitely want to commend the introducer as well as many people who have been working on this issue in the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands. We know that the list has gone up to at most 22,000, maybe more. There are people who actually get on the list and then never receive housing before they pass away because the issue is so bad.

"And so this is actually suggesting for us to do a study to determine whether or not people are utilizing the list correctly. I think it would be very unacceptable for people to be waiting years for a lease, and other people have been given multiple leases and possibly even sublease the land to people who are not on the list. And we know that this is happening, but it's a way for us to address it in a study to determine if these leases are actually going to the people who are waiting in the order that they waited in.

"Prince Kuhio was the founder and the starter of the Hawaiian Homes Act. And the whole intent behind the Hawaiian Homes Act was not just to provide housing, but to focus on the wellness of all Hawaiians, meaning the housing, the infrastructure, the land to farm, the wherewith that they could actually sustain themselves. And I'm hopeful that this bill is a step in the right direction for many people who are on the list. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, strong support, brief comment and request to insert comments in the Journal. As my colleague indicated, the Hawaiian Homes Act of 1921 was made for sterner stuff, I guess, as Shakespeare would say. After 100 years, there's been 9,700 homesteads, 44,000 on the waitlist, and 203,000 acres which largely remains undeveloped. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, any way we can boost, prod, fund and develop Hawaiian homes for what otherwise was a hundred-year-old promise, we certainly must do. This is a, kind of a baby step, but it's a step in the right direction. And Mr. Speaker, may I enter further comments into the Journal? Thank you."

Representative Ward's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I stand in support. I believe that this study will help to bring light on those who may be taking advantage of the Hawaiian homes program and contributing to the infamously long wait list. I want to thank the introducer for bringing light to this issue and hope that the fruit of this bill will be more housing for the Native Hawaiian people. *Mahalo*."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2464, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAIIAN HOMES COMMISSION ACT," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

#### Conf. Com. Rep. No. 118-18 and H.B. No. 2259, HD 1, SD 3, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2259, HD 1, SD 3, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MARINE EVENTS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 aves.

### Conf. Com. Rep. No. 123-18 and S.B. No. 2646, SD 1, HD 3, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2646, SD 1, HD 3, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Belatti rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Belatti's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in support of Senate Bill 2646, Conference Draft 1.

"Senate Bill 2646, CD 1 is another of several measures considered by this legislature to address the problems of opioid addiction that are sweeping the country. This measure aims to reduce the public's access to all Schedule II, III or IV controlled substances. Prescribers of controlled substances are currently required to register with the Department of Public Safety's Prescription Drug Monitoring Program ('PDMP'), but effective use of the PDMP has not been realized because prescribers have not been required to consult the system before prescribing controlled substances.

"This measure closes that loophole and requires prescribers to consult Hawaii's PDMP before prescribing controlled substances. Reasonable but limited exceptions to this consultation requirement exist for any prescription for a supply of three days or less that is made in an emergency situation, by an emergency medical provider or in an emergency room and when the State's electronic PDMP system is nonfunctional.

"Because the effectiveness of PDMP systems are still under study, this measure imposes a five-year sunset clause that will allow time for adjustments to be made as needed to improve the systems around the prescribing of opioids to limit the availability of opioids to the public for overuse and abuse."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2646, SD 1, HD 3, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PRESCRIPTION DRUGS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

#### Conf. Com. Rep. No. 128-18 and H.B. No. 1614, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1614, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in opposition with written comments and a brief note. Mr. Speaker, the American family has been pummeled almost to the point where it doesn't exist, or the strength of it has been so weakened. This one that creates the polarity between if there's a divorce rather than being no-fault, it becomes a polemic, because it puts a restraining order as an automatic due between what otherwise was loving couples in the beginning. I don't think this is in the right direction, but it continues to degrade the family, and we've almost lost it already. Thank you."

Representative Ward's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. The American family has been weakened over the past decade and adding another polemic between couples of having an automatic restraining order upon divorce is reprehensible.

"Amending Chapter 580 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes to prohibit the removal of a child from their current school or island of residence will make it more difficult for those in abusive relationships to escape their former partners. I would like to adopt the testimony of the Hawaii State Commission on the Status of Women dated April 4th, 2018 as if it were my own.

"Mr. Speaker, if this group is against this bill, how can it be good for women? *Mahalo*."

Representative Belatti rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Belatti's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in support of House Bill 1614, Conference Draft 1.

"At the onset of divorce, separation, or annulment proceedings, House Bill 1614, CD 1 seeks to freeze the status quo of financial accounts, property, credit cards, and insurance policies of the parties, and the residential and school settings for any minor children. The intent of this initial automatic restraining order is to preserve some stability during a time of emotional upheaval and to ensure that financial assets are not wasted to the detriment of either party.

"Through the hearing process on this measure, lawmakers learned that this practice has been used in some judicial circuits but not others. This measure seeks to bring uniformity and consistency across the courts and provide a tool to the judicial system that makes clear that the parties cannot and should not waste financial assets and seek to harm the other party through financial means.

"Although some advocates do not support this measure as it may disadvantage the party with lesser power in an already broken and dysfunctional relationship, because this measure still affords judges in the case the discretion to alter orders as the cases proceed, this measure on balance should allow better resolution of these difficult cases."

Representative San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. The idea behind the bill, contrary to insinuations by others, is to actually preserve the family unit at the time when it's at most stress, which is at a time of the filing of the divorce. It intends to preserve status quo, thus preventing the kind of game playing used by unscrupulous

people who want to take advantage of usually the lower earner spouse. And as such, it is a bill that's timely and should have been passed a long time ago. Thank you."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations. I think that I understand, because I've actually followed this story with the introducer for a while and I know her passion for trying to handle this. I think two of the concerns which it's possible that she could possibly address or maybe just help us to understand is one, the ability for somebody to actually leave, meaning be able to flee from the situation that they're in. And currently, as it's written, that's one of the concerns that the Hawaii State Commission on the Status of Women had, as well is the ability for somebody to be able to say, yes, I'm in this situation, I need to take my children, I need to go. Because it makes it harder for people to leave, because of the fact that they would have to come back and face their abuser in court to handle the TRO. And so that's one of the things.

"The other part is the part that's stated in regards to if domestic violence has occurred, not has occurred to the person or to the victim, that one sentence which needed some clarification was something else that we were hung up on when we analyzed through the bill. So I definitely know that it's a step where we're trying to protect families and help individuals. Those two instances that actually have to do with interpretation of the law, the clarification in the bill is what our concerns are about. Thank you."

Representative San Buenaventura rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This is the second time that I've tried to address this same bill that has worked very well on the island of Kauai, has worked well in Hilo until the retirement of a judge. And basically, the TROs, whenever domestic violence is an issue, is already taken care of. In fact, we actually have a carve out on this bill.

"This addresses financial abuse. It's the kind of thing that is so common in middle class families that we are not addressing. We are addressing physical abuse very well in other cases, but we are not addressing financial abuse, which is just as bad, and which basically impoverishes low-earner spouses, which are usually women. This prevents, usually men, the higher earner spouse, where all of the bills are under his name, from preventing him from cutting off medical insurance, leaving uninsured children and leaving uninsured spouses who did not know that the divorce was coming until somebody, who with money, who was able to hire a lawyer early enough, is planning for it. This prevents game-playing. This helps women. Thank you very much."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, second time in opposition. And I commend my colleague for stating very well what's in the bill and what is positive about it. But if all of that is true, why on page 4, line 4, sub 5, says, 'Neither party shall remove a minor child of the parties from the island of that child's current residence nor remove a minor child of the parties from the school that child is currently attending.'

"If it's all about just the finances, fine, but so why stick this in where the kids get to be fought over, especially as my colleague said, if one decides to flee because of difficulties. So why do we have it where no child can be removed? If it's all about financial, why is it in here? Thank you."

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. Mr. Speaker, may I adopt the passionate words of our Representative from Puna as my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Belatti rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support, second time. Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support because I think women who are going through

divorces, who understand the financial abuse that they are exposed to, understand greatly and deeply the risk at which their children are put.

"So, yes, this is about financial abuse, but this is about keeping the child in a place that is a steady place, and to ensure that the status quo is maintained, as everything else is falling apart around the family. So in strong support for this measure. It's about time that we do this. This is a priority of the Women's Legislative Caucus, and it's something that we've been pushing for for a long time, and in response to the criticism that we are not doing enough on the issue of domestic violence. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Keohokalole rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I'd just like to clarify some previous comments, also. This bill does not further the breakup of the family. The breakup of the family takes place during a divorce. This is an attempt, a well-meaning attempt, to make sure that what's left of the family after that terrible incident takes place, because it does take place. That's the reality of our society, divorces happen. But the intent of this measure is that after that does take place, that both parties are able to move forward equitably and that children in the family, and the rest of the family that's impacted by this terrible situation, are protected to the extent that we are able to.

"We're never going to get it right, because this is a terrible scenario that we have to recognize takes place in our society. This bill doesn't cause the further breakup of the family. The family is broken up during the divorce, which happens immediately preceding the scenarios that are accounted for in this piece of legislation. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1614, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AUTOMATIC RESTRAINING ORDERS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representative Tupola voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives McDermott and Ward voting no.

#### Conf. Com. Rep. No. 129-18 and S.B. No. 2237, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2237, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Choy rose in opposition to the measure and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Choy's written remarks are as follows:

"In opposition to S.B. No. 2237, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1.

"First, this bill represents the abandonment of our duty to our children. That duty is to provide public education.

"Second, there are many bills this year that delegate the obligation of education to others. The first policy call the Legislature made was to put to the vote the funding of public education in a constitutional amendment.

"Third, Mr. Speaker, we do not live in a democracy, we live in a republic. The people need to elect people who will fund public education adequately, not punt it back to the voters.

"Fourth, SB 2237 is worse than our constitutional amendment bill. This bill allows private entities to lease or use our public school land to fund the needs of our schools. Some see this as a novel way to get moneys to fund our educational system. I see this as a dereliction of duty to our children.

"Fifth, the potential abuse of giving away the property rights to fund our obligation to our children is great and we should never let this happen.

"Sixth, specifically as to inclusion of Manoa Elementary School, Hokulani Elementary school, and Noelani Elementary School, none of these school grounds are conducive to any type of commercial development.

"Seventh, giving the discretion to utilize school land in this manner to the Board of Education is ludicrous.

"For these reasons, I object to this bill."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2237, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC SCHOOLS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 3 noes, with Representative Tokioka voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Choy, Kong and Say voting

#### Conf. Com. Rep. No. 131-18 and S.B. No. 2909, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2909, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. We saw this bill prior to it becoming a study and had robust discussion about what we thought about law enforcement, where it should go, should we consolidate it. And so this is requiring LRB to conduct a study with no appropriation and finish it by 2019. And the purpose of the study is to basically figure out if we should have a state law enforcement division in the Attorney General's Office which would contain the powers, functions, duties, and related personnel and properties of DLNR, DOT, public safety, and public safety's law enforcement staff, including sheriff's office and judiciary security personnel.

"The Attorney General's Office testified that they'd remain opposed to overseeing the consolidation of the law enforcement, and as well DLNR, DOT and public safety all opposed it for the consolidation and the differentiation of what they do, and the different tasks that they have to carry out. So, again, we've talked about this that it's not a good idea, but then we're going to put it into a study that has no appropriation, and so my opposition is the fact that we don't need to study something that everyone, especially agencies that are going to have to have that consolidation, are opposed to. Thank you."

Representative Johanson rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I would just note that not everyone feels the same way, in fact this study is being done precisely because individual workers who are at these agencies, who sometimes feel like they're treated like red-headed stepchildren or a misfit for the overall agency because the nature and the scope of what they do is very different from the rest of the agency's mission, which is why I think a study is wholly appropriate and necessary. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2909, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LAW ENFORCEMENT," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Tupola voting no.

# Conf. Com. Rep. No. 135-18 and H.B. No. 1802, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1802, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CESSPOOLS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

## Conf. Com. Rep. No. 138-18 and S.B. No. 2384, HD 1, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2384, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

#### Conf. Com. Rep. No. 139-18 and S.B. No. 2382, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2382, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. I definitely think that setting the vacancies of buildings is super important. I think I've brought up on this floor previously that the partnership with one charter school and a public school in the Honolulu area that's been working very well, and it's helped the school that is actually under enrollment and helped a school that has no buildings. So the partnership is what we needed.

"We definitely need more partnerships for the charter schools, seeing as though right now the per-pupil allocation for public school students is \$12,000 and for charter public school students is \$7,000. Much of their per-pupil allocation has to be used towards CIP funds and as well for costs that, in regards to buildings and cafeterias and things that other public school monies don't have to be used for because of that, and so I think it's very good for us to start to look at the use of these areas so that we don't have to continually have charter schools that are without places that they can actually meet, and without facilities. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2382, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC CHARTER SCHOOLS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

#### Conf. Com. Rep. No. 140-18 and S.B. No. 2351, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2351, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. I'd like to start by commending the Women's Caucus for a real banner year in working towards equality for women in the Aloha State. This bill affects everyone, as well though, because for years employers have had the power to fire employees just for discussing wages. And I'm really glad to see that that is now going to be outlawed in this bill. No longer can you be fired for discussing how much you make.

"This is one of the mechanisms that bosses use to control the labor force and keep everything and everyone in the dark about pay, and equal pay, and the lack thereof. This measure, Mr. Speaker, protects workers by allowing them to shed light on wage inequalities and discriminatory practices whether it's based on gender, race, religion, sexual orientation, or just because they can. So, it's a great bill. Thanks."

Representative Matsumoto rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I stand in strong support. This is a bill that many of the women in the Women's Caucus have been working hard on for a long time. And just permission to insert additional written comments. Thank you."

Representative Matsumoto's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. At this time, I rise in strong support.

"It is a frequently-quoted statistic that today, women working full-time earn 79 cents for every dollar that a man working full-time makes.

"Although true that the gender wage gap varies across industries and races, it is undeniable that this gap still exists, and will continue to persist without further action.

"The passage of this Women's Caucus bill will decrease wage disparity by eliminating pay secrecy and decreasing circumstances that encourage compensation based on salary history.

"First, allowing and encouraging employee discussion on wages will shine a light on existing wage discrimination practices and increase worker awareness of their rights.

"Women cannot challenge wage discrimination if they do not know it exists.

"Secondly, basing current compensation on past salary fosters existing salary inequality. Studies show that prior salary is not a necessity for an employer to determine a worker's salary: Market-based approaches are equally effective.

"In turn, a decrease in salary history-based compensation will also decrease employee turnover.

"Testimony consistently reflects that employees receiving competitive salaries and equal treatment are satisfied by the fair treatment and are more likely to remain with their employer.

"Again, as more and more women today become the sole or primary breadwinners of their families, it is more important now than ever to close the gender wage gap. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Fukumoto rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Fukumoto's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, earlier this session, I said eliminating the wage gap was the number one issue for millennial women. I'm proud that after decades of inaction, the Legislature is moving forward with a bill to end wage secrecy and prevent salary discrimination.

"As the initial drafter of this bill, and the introducer of the House version, I couldn't be prouder of the work we have accomplished today by establishing in statute our commitment to ensure that salaries reflect skill and responsibility levels, not a person's gender.

"That said, I also still believe that preventing the House version to be vetted by the community and my fellow legislators through a complete legislative process and then reconciling the Senate and House bill in conference committee undermined the integrity and importance of enacting such a groundbreaking initiative. We are setting an example for the entire nation on this issue, and it deserved the full extent of discussion possible.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Belatti rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Belatti's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support of Senate Bill 2351, Conference Draft 1.

"This measure seeks to: (1) disrupt the cycle of wage inequality for women and minorities by prohibiting prospective employers from requesting or considering a job applicant's prior wage or salary history in the job application process; and (2) encourage equal pay between men and women by prohibiting enforced wage secrecy and prohibiting retaliation and discrimination against employees who disclose, discuss, or inquire about their own or coworkers' wages for the purpose of exercising their rights under the law.

"Salaries speak louder than words. Despite greater access to education, advances made in the workplace, and existing laws and policies that seek to eliminate gender discrimination in the workforce, the disparity in pay between women and men persists. The National Partnership for Women and

Family estimates that the pay gap takes \$2.5 billion out of the pockets of women statewide, over \$7,500 per woman per year.

"This wage gap is even more pronounced for women of marginalized identities with the most extreme disparities existing for Native Hawaiian and immigrant women in our state. Where women in Hawaii earn an average of 84 cents to every dollar a man earns, Native Hawaiian women earn 70 cents for every dollar a man earns.

"To systematically address this inequity, laws have to complement and support better workplace policies and practices such as prohibiting salary history inquiries in the job application phase of employment and enforced wage secrecy and retaliation when individuals are exercising their rights to ensure wage discrimination is not occurring in the workplace.

"With Senate Bill 2351, CD 1, Hawaii joins 18 other states that have laws protecting against discrimination or retaliation for discussing wages, and eight other states and cities that have banned salary history requests since 2016. In its tradition of leading on women's rights, Hawaii continues to be at the forefront of change that is helping women attain economic equity. For all of these reasons, I support Senate Bill 2351, CD 1."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support, and I would hope political parties would be included in the future. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2351, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EQUAL PAY," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

# Conf. Com. Rep. No. 142-18 and S.B. No. 2693, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2693, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support, Mr. Speaker. As I've stated previously, one of the things that our state needs to improve on is our sister-state relationships with other Polynesian nations. And I feel like this is going to be a step in a positive direction, because it'll help us to start those conversations, interact, and maybe even develop a better relationship and bring some of that commerce over here to Hawaii.

"I'm excited to see the people who are on the board, I'm excited to see the people who are involved, and of course commend the Senator from Maui for his lead on this. But I think it's time that we start to integrate some of what we do, even in regards to tourism and economic development for our state, and start to build those relationships with other Polynesian nations that could possibly help and strengthen our position here in the Pacific. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I just wanted to say very few brief words. The Festival of Pacific Arts, it will celebrate all of the rich culture and heritage the multiple nations across the Pacific. In 2020, Mr. Speaker, this festival will be held in Hawaii for the very first time, and I trust that the temporary commission on the 13th Festival of Pacific Arts will hold a delightful celebration of Polynesian, Melanesian, Micronesian and Aboriginal cultures all throughout Oceania. And I also would like to commend the Senate Majority Leader on his work on this. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2693, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE FESTIVAL OF PACIFIC ARTS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

#### Conf. Com. Rep. No. 143-18 and S.B. No. 2514, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2514, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," passed Final Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives Choy, Har, Tupola and Ward voting no.

# Conf. Com. Rep. No. 144-18 and S.B. No. 2571, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2571, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Cachola rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Cachola's written remarks are as follows:

"S.B. No. 2571, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1 relates to environment; water pollution; sunscreen; oxybenzone; octinoxate; sale; distribution; prohibition. Beginning January 1, 2021, bans the sale, offer of sale, or distribution in the State of any sunscreen that contains oxybenzone or octinoxate, or both, without a prescription issued by a licensed healthcare provider to preserve marine ecosystems.

"The most damaging report formulated by the Hawaii Medical Association are public health concerns about deadly skin cancer.

"Given the lack of peer reviewed evidence suggesting that sunscreen is a cause of coral bleaching and the overwhelming evidence that not wearing sunscreen increases rates of deadly cancer, the HMA would like to propose that this issue be studied more deeply before passing a policy that would severely limit the availability of sunscreens that people are likely to wear on a daily basis.'

"We should look at the lasting impact exposure to these pollutants would do to affect public health, coral reef damage, climate change, and other issues.

"It should be noted that the primary stressors of coral reefs in Hawaii are related to land-based source pollution, over-fishing, invasive species, and climate change. Continued monitoring on these stressors will have the largest impact on coral reef resilience and recovery."

"Furthermore, the provision the bill states with regards to allowing purchase of sunscreen with a prescription would defeat the statements S.B. No. 2571, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1.

"For these reasons, I am voting in support with serious reservations."

Representative Ward rose in support of the measure and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Strong support for what has been known this session as the 'Oxybenzone Bill.' I want to begin by thanking Dr. Craig Downs of the Haereticus Environmental Laboratory for his groundbreaking research on the effects of oxybenzone on marine life. I would also like to thank Lisa Bishop of the Friends of Hanauma Bay for her tireless advocacy to ban the sale of these toxic chemicals.

"Last year, Dr. Downs, the Senator from Ewa, and I gathered water samples throughout different parts of Hanauma Bay. Dr. Downs's experiment concluded that the average amount of oxybenzone found in Hanauma Bay was 4,661 ng/L, with different parts of the bay ranging from 30 ng/L to 27,888 ng/L. The amount that is toxic to coral reef is 62 ng/L.

"Dr. Downs's research has also led to a public advocacy campaign by the private sector. Just last month, Hawaiian Airlines gave samples to incoming visitors and showed an 11-minute documentary warning of the effects of this

oxybenzone on our reefs and marine life. Further, the Aqua-Aston hotels have given out more than 40,000 samples of reef-safe sunscreen at its 40 properties throughout the state.

"Mr. Speaker, this is truly historic legislation. As the first state in the nation to ban oxybenzone sunscreens, it is our hope that other states and nations will do the same to preserve their marine life for generations to come. *Mahalo*."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2571, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WATER POLLUTION," passed Final Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 4 noes, with Representative Cachola voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Choy, Har, Kong and McDermott voting no.

# Conf. Com. Rep. No. 145-18 and S.B. No. 2990, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2990, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support, brief comments. I think when we had this conversation, we had a very robust conversation about how it would affect businesses, and one of the things that the LRB said that they wouldn't be able to do is the actuarial analysis. It's something that's going to be really important moving forward, and I commend the Labor Chair for all his work on doing this. And I think maybe working with the Chambers of Commerce would be in line to helping us determine how this would possibly affect businesses now so that we can actually help when it does come down the pipeline and understand the actual fiscal impact that it'll have so that we can give businesses that reassurance that they've been taken into consideration. Thank you."

Representative Say rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Belatti rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Belatti's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support of Senate Bill 2990, Conference Draft 1.

"Many in our community will criticize this legislation as failing in establishing paid family leave benefits for workers in our state. However, to advance good policy and design a program that will enable all employees to access leave benefits while addressing concerns about sustainability and business productivity requires not just a study but a sunrise analysis, as required by this bill, that looks specifically at Hawaii data and plugs this data into the various models for paid family leave that have been adopted by other states. While some will point to studies that have been done, none have fully briefed and analyzed the impact of any paid family leave program in conjunction with Hawaii's Prepaid Health Care benefits that are found in no other state in our nation. This measure represents a significant step in laying the groundwork for the establishment of a paid family leave framework that fits into Hawaii's system of laws and already existing employee benefits and worker protections.

"Because a benefit such as paid family leave can have such broad impacts on our community, I support the approach being taken in SB 2990, CD 1 to carefully analyze the impacts of different paid family leave models using Hawaii data to craft a program that will work for Hawaii's people."

Representative DeCoite rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative DeCoite's written remarks are as follows:

"I have reservations on this bill because I have heard from many in my district who may be negatively affected by enactment of a paid family leave bill. This bill has evolved during this session, and conference draft 1 now requires the Legislative Reference Bureau to conduct a sunrise analysis of the impacts and best framework for a paid family leave program. I recognize the need that employees have in taking care of their families, so I hope that any program we end up with will be one that we can all live with and afford. *Mahalo*."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Har rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. First of all, I'd like to applaud the efforts of the Labor Chair in both our House and in the Senate. But I'd like to see us do a lot more on this, and I just wanted to say a few words about that. The bill provides for yet another study on paid leave, but I believe that all the necessary research has already been conducted, Mr. Speaker. The US Department of Labor has a full analysis on paid family leave in Hawaii.

"So, again, while I applaud the efforts, I'm a little disappointed, we could do more this year to provide for the desperately needed relief for working families struggling to take care of their families while they work 40 to 80 hours per week just to make ends meet. It is our job as legislators to help protect them and make the tough decisions, not to wait until everybody can agree on at least that option. And I'm hoping next year we can do more, and I'll be sure to make myself available to try to help as much as I can to that end. Thank you."

Representative Tupola rose, stating:

"Please register a reservations. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Reservations. While the original bill has morphed into a sunrises analysis (normally done by the state auditor) by LRB, I still have reservations as we move forward. First and foremost, sunrise analyses usually lead to action. By the time the analysis is complete next year, it is all but guaranteed that this program will be taken up by the 30th Legislature.

"As technology has advanced, the need for retail and service jobs has begun to decrease. A most recent example is the new, cashier-less Amazon Go grocery store in Seattle. While this technology is still in its infancy, businesses may be more inclined to invest in automation or cut their number of employees in order to pay for this new benefit. Artificial intelligence will soon become commonplace in our everyday lives.

"I appreciate the committee chairs taking a step back to measure the impacts of such a program. Whatever the result of the analysis may be, I hope that we will proceed in a way that will not hurt our small business community. Further, micro-businesses with less than three employees should be exempt from any future program implemented. *Mahalo*."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2990, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FAMILY LEAVE," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes, with Representatives DeCoite, Har, Say, Tokioka, Tupola and Ward voting aye with reservations.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2538, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Thielen rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm rising to cast a no vote against House Bill 2538, relating to agriculture, and do a few comments. Thank you. Mr. Speaker, what this measure does is issues millions of dollars worth in general obligation bonds, and it's for a livestock feed mill using waste materials to be expended by, here we go again, the Agribusiness Development Corporation, the ADC. And because of my skepticism about the unaudited ADC, the entity that does not file annual reports to the Legislature, I don't like to see granting more money to them. So it's a no vote. Although I do like the concept of a livestock feed mill, I don't like the ADC being involved with it. Thank you."

Representative Luke rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support of House Bill 2538. This is actually an appropriation that was made in 2015, so we already voted for it. Okay, thank you."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations. I definitely think we really need a feed mill. We do have, actually, egg farmers in my district that this is one of their number one concerns, is that 100% of our animal feed has to be shipped in from the mainland. And so that portion, yes. And I realize that this is something that happened in the past that we're voting on now, but those are my reservations, previously as what my colleague from Kailua stated. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2538, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURE," passed Final Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 2 noes, with Representative Tupola voting aye with reservations, with Representatives McDermott and Thielen voting no, and with Representative Takumi being excused.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1932, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMERGENCY RULES BY AGENCIES," passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Tupola voting no, and with Representative Takumi being excused.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1778, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WORKERS' COMPENSATION MEDICAL BENEFITS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Takumi being excused.

# Conf. Com. Rep. No. 152-18 and H.B. No. 1401, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1401, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. Mr. Speaker, in 2016, 56% of the voters on Kauai voted early or used an absentee ballot in the general election. Only 44% voted at the polls on election day. Further, 85% of the voters on Kauai who requested an absentee ballot voted in the general election.

"Mr. Speaker, the majority of voters on Kauai want the convenience that our current absentee mail-in ballot system offers. Residents like the convenience of voting early, having additional time to assess the candidates on the issues, and not feeling rushed to make a decision in the voting booth. The Kauai Office of Elections believes there will be reduced personnel over time and ballot production expenses with mail-in voting. Further, finding election officials for polling places, counting center, delivery and collection, and control center is getting more difficult as longtime community members are aging and declining to serve.

"Mr. Speaker, the Kauai Office of Elections welcomes the opportunity to be the pilot program for the State in the 2020 elections. I believe there is strong and capable leadership in place at the Office of Elections to carry out this pilot program, and that leadership will provide a thorough program evaluation to this body. I would like to thank the Judiciary Chair from Kapahulu for crafting this bill and for making it easier for Kauai voters to exercise their civic duty."

Representative Morikawa rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support, strong support, and I'd like to use the words of the previous speaker as if they were my own, and also note that Niihau has always, since I got elected, was all mail-in vote. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. I also would like to thank the Judiciary Chair in resurrecting this at conference, and I'd like to also point out that when Puna had their disaster in 2014, we really wanted mail-in voting, and I'm really glad it's finally starting, and it's going to help out Kauai a lot. Thank you."

Representative Mizuno rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thanks, Mr. Speaker. In support. I remember Oregon had one of the worst voter turnouts in the nation, and they went to an all mail-in ballot election system, and that greatly improved their numbers. I'm hopeful that not only Kauai, but someday our entire state will be mail-in ballot. I think this effective. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tokioka rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support, and I'd like to ask that the words from the Representative from North Kauai be inserted into the Journal as if they were my own. I'd also like to take this opportunity to thank the JUD Chair for moving this bill, it's long overdue, when we did the permanent mail-in ballots that increased voter registration and participation on Kauai, and I'm certain that this particular bill will continue to increase the percentage of voting on Kauai. And I want to thank the Office of Elections on Kauai for being steadfast in lobbying for this bill, and everyone here for voting on it.

Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Nishimoto rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you. In support, Mr. Speaker. I'd be remiss if I didn't thank the Senate Judiciary Chair for his hard work on this bill. He is watching right now, and I think he's feeling a little left out."

Representative Tokioka rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, thank you. In support again. I was going to talk about the Judicial Chair from the Senate, but I didn't want to leave my good friend out from Kaimuki, because he likes the proper due that he's getting right now, and you deserve it, Representative."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1401, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ELECTIONS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Takumi being excused.

# Conf. Com. Rep. No. 154-18 and S.B. No. 3095, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 3095, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative DeCoite rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, thank you. In support with slight reservations. Mr. Speaker, Senate Bill 3095, SD 1, HD 1 was a good bill that protected our *keiki* and community, but the CD version does not. I'm a farmer and I'm a highly trained pesticide applicator. While I do not use pesticides on my farm, we do have the land in my capacity to rotate my crops when many other small farmers do not, and they are the ones that need pesticides and will suffer the most. They cannot afford to buy more land and/or afford to rent those lands. Pests stay around such fields as those of the small farmers because they constantly have food to feed on. These additional rules and regulations will force them to move away from Hawaii or go out of business.

"Farmers farm because they are passionate about what they do and how they do it. While they are faced with the obstacles of weather conditions, flooding, drought, theft and pests, they persevere. Farmers have been unfairly targeted by the CD 1.

"Federal and state laws already strictly regulate those farmers who use those pesticides. The pesticides regulated by this bill are mostly used by the regular people, the public, you and me, not farmers. The local farms targeted in this bill are the ones that supply most of our local food. Unwarranted and new regulations will hurt those local farmers. Can we afford to lose more farmers, or unjustified new regulations?

"Mr. Speaker, we want this bill to protect our families and our communities. The CD I should have kept the ban encompassing structural and all other users of pesticides. The education component in this measure is not in line with the intent of the bill. Also, who has the authority to set the rules, state or federal? We continue to make rules and laws I have yet to see us enforce.

"Structural use pesticides have been in the news recently for breaking rules and regulations. So why would we give the exemption from the regulations in this bill? Access to RUPs comes with the responsibility to use great care in protecting our public health. This exemption only further proves where we plan to go with our local farmers. That's why you wash and clean everything when you return back to your home after being treated. Just like what we do with rat lungworm outbreak, we're told to wash our vegetables before you eat it. Don't be so *lepo* about it.

"Mr. Speaker, we've also allowed in the bill that the DOA shall grant any person, upon request, a temporary permit allowing the use of pesticides containing chlorpyrifos. This is not in line with the intent of this bill, which is to protect our *keiki* and our communities. With the recent natural disaster on Kauai and our fellow neighbors in Waimanalo, pesticides will be used even more because of settlement of water. Dead carcasses, rotting, and feece will trigger an epidemic of diseases, and will continue with borne illnesses. So we grant a temporary permit allowing the use pesticides? It doesn't matter what kind of pesticide. The public should know, even more so, but this bill does not allow for the disclosing.

"People need to be educated, and if you use any pesticide, you should have to take at least a minimal class, and get some kind of training, and if you do not follow the label instructions, you should not be allowed to use these pesticides. Three thousand dollars for pesticide drift monitoring and outreach will not be enough. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I have those comments. Thank you."

Representative Kong rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, thank you. With reservations, and though I may not be a farmer, I do agree with the words of the Representative from Molokai. Thank you, sir."

Representative Lee rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. This measure is a first but significant step toward addressing the myriad concerns raised by communities around the state with respect to pesticide use, and at times, the unintended consequences which befall some people in our community. It is a long time in the making. We have debated these measures for years here in this House and in this legislature, and as we all know, any bill which passes, any good piece of legislation, is the product of compromise, and this is no different.

"This bill has been put together, and I really want to thank the chairs of the respective committees who've worked on this both in the House and in the Senate, as well as all the members who had come together, because what this does is provide data. When we talk about these issues before us, we can draw no conclusions one way or the other without meaningful data. This bill makes basic disclosure of data a requirement going forward, it creates basic buffer zones around schools when they are in session, when kids are present, to protect them from the kinds of unintended consequences that we have heard about. And most of all, it prohibits the use of one of the most dangerous chemicals that we have ever seen anywhere in widespread use. It's a chemical which has already been prohibited for use by the EU and other countries, it is responsible for thousands of deaths around the world every year, and it is responsible for sending dozens of workers, right here in Hawaii, to the hospital.

"This is, Mr. Speaker, an important step forward. It is not going to be the end of the discussion, but it is something which, as a responsible body, I believe we are taking the right action in moving forward.

"More than anything, in addition to thanking everyone who's worked on this measure here in this body as well as the Senate, I really want to thank those folks in the community who have time and again stepped up to the plate to make their voices heard in community organizations like the Center for Food Safety and their leader Ashley Lukens who have rallied communities and rallied people to make their voices heard and show up throughout this process. And so many others who've taken the time to come down here, to take part in the political process, which has resulted in what we have today. Because ultimately, Mr. Speaker, more than anything, what this bill demonstrates is that people getting involved can make a difference. Thank you very much."

Representative Say rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ito rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representative DeCoite be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. First, I'd like to request permission to enter comments into the Journal, and then I have a few additional comments. First, I'd like to thank the introducer, the committee chairs, and the members, and especially the community advocates who came out to discuss, debate and testify on this bill.

"For years now, I've watched, many of you watched the communities on each island rise up in strong support of regulating chemicals that get sprayed near schools and waterways, and each time it seems they got pushed back, either in the courts or through some other process, and people have been crying out for the State to take action, and this bill is a step in that direction.

"As a matter of scientific bookkeeping, mandatory disclosure is vitally important to analyze statistical trends and develop a foundation for future research. If it turns out that there is no correlation, great. But for now, I believe that the scientific evidence shows otherwise. But for now, also, the users of restricted use pesticides should at a minimum be required to disclose where, when and how much of these highly toxic chemicals they're using, many of which are completely banned in other countries, as mentioned previously. The only downside I see in this bill is that the disclosure goes into a 'black box' at the Department of Agriculture, and that the public does not get to see that information, but at least it's being recorded somewhere for the sake of recordkeeping.

"Lastly, this is a groundbreaking measure that bans use of chlorpyrifos, a pesticide sprayed aerially in Hawaii for quite some time. It is a known in peer-reviewed journals that chronic exposure to the chemical may result in long-term toxicity spread across several organs. It's an endocrine disruptor, and major studies have found strong evidence to suggest that even at very low doses, Mr. Speaker, the chemical triggers effects among children ranging from lower IQ, to higher rates of autism. This pesticide with its potent effect on our *keiki* and our 'āina' is not something we can let go unchecked. I stand proud to be a member of the nation's first legislature to ban this dangerous pesticide and to vote yes on this historic legislation. Thank you."

Representative LoPresti's written remarks are as follows:

"Schools have been evacuated due to pesticide drift from neighboring crop fields that share fences with the school. Doctors have come to us as policymakers and said, 'it is difficult to treat a child who has been experiencing acute distress from pesticide exposure if we do not know which chemicals they have been exposed to.' We cannot rely on the optional reporting through the so-called 'Good Neighbor Program' to accurately understand the scope and magnitude of restricted use pesticides in Hawaii. This bill states that no application of a restricted use pesticide shall take place on or within 100 feet of a school property during normal school hours. This is the very least we can do to protect our growing *keiki* while they learn."

Representative Har rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representative DeCoite be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Belatti rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Belatti's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in support of Senate Bill 3095, Conference Draft 1.

"As stated previously in remarks on Senate Bill 3095, crafting good laws and policies is a balancing act. Discussing issues with stakeholders, especially complicated issues, is necessary to find that balance. This bill is proof of the importance of discussion.

"Usage Reporting: The previous House draft of Senate Bill 3095 required only commercial agricultural users of restricted use pesticides – or RUPs – to report their usage to the Department of Agriculture. To acquire better, more comprehensive information, this conference draft requires all users,

not just commercial agricultural entities, to inform the department about the type, the location, and the times when RUPs are used.

"Prohibiting Pesticide Use around Schools with Reasonable Exceptions: Senate Bill 3095, CD 1 retains the prohibition on RUP use within 100 feet of school during normal school hours. However, it makes the important clarification that this restriction or buffer zone does not apply to whole-structure furnigation which is necessary for treating termites in residences located near schools.

"Pesticide Drift Monitoring Study: Senate Bill 3095, CD 1 also directs the department to conduct a study of pesticide drift at three different Hawaii schools, requires a report on its findings prior to the 2020 Legislative Session, and appropriates \$300,000 to fund the necessary work so that policymakers and the community are better equipped with good information to understand the scope and impact of pesticides in school environments.

"Reasonable Exemptions to the Chlorpyrifos Ban: Senate Bill 3095, CD 1 continues to retain the ban on chlorpyrifos use, beginning in 2019, without a permit. However, it grants users the ability to obtain permits to use chlorpyrifos until the end of 2022. This extra year ensures farmers have additional time to transition their crops away from chlorpyrifos and that the State, when considering its next steps, will be able to consider new scientific information.

"Senate Bill 3095, Conference Draft 1 continues to balance the necessities of agriculture with the need to protect the public health and the public's interest in knowing what is happening in their neighborhoods. The compromises in this bill are a testament to the hard work of our legislators and the benefits of collaboration and discussion with key stakeholders. For these reasons, I support Senate Bill 3095, Conference Draft 1."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3095, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representatives DeCoite, Har, Ito, Kong, Say and Tokioka voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Takumi being excused.

# Conf. Com. Rep. No. 155-18 and S.B. No. 2027, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2027, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Choy rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. My opposition is for some reason, this bill, this appropriation bill, deletes the requirement that the administration of the appropriated funds must conform to industry financial, accounting, and performance standards. So I'm just kind of curious on why there's no accounting for this particular appropriation. That's my objection. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tokioka rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Say rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Mizuno rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I stand in support, Mr. Speaker. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. The homeless crisis is an extraordinarily complicated and multi-faceted issue. No one approach offers the right solution for everyone and every circumstance. What this measure does get right is that it helps the often overlooked group, our working families.

"This also strengthens a program that is already highly successful, and this is cost effective. What I mean by cost effect, \$1.5 million will save 1,600 families from going homeless. That equates to 5,000 people from going homeless. This is what this bill accomplishes. Your master contractors,

Aloha United Way, you've got 20 nonprofit contractors below them. They have already done an excellent job, they'll continue to do an excellent job.

"The reason we need this bill is because Hawaii has the highest cost of living of any state in the country. This group is especially vulnerable. This is our working families who are just barely making it. They just need a little bit of help on their rent. For the many hardworking families that are at risk of homelessness, this short-term financial assistance can be the difference between them staying in a home or becoming homeless.

"It is important that we work to help the people find their way out of homelessness, but that we also help our people not become homeless. Since its inception in April of 2016, a coordinated statewide homeless initiative has saved 1,600 families from going homeless. I think \$1.5 million to save 5,000 people from going homeless is a good deal. For those reasons, I support this bill. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2027, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO APPROPRIATIONS TO ADDRESS HOMELESSNESS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 2 noes, with Representative Say voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Choy and Tokioka voting no, and with Representative Takumi being excused.

# Conf. Com. Rep. No. 156-18 and S.B. No. 270, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 270, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative McDermott rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. First I'm going to read, because it requires some precision, some information prepared by my staff. First, I stand in opposition. If you look at page 3, lines 8 through 20 of the bill, the bill clearly states that a person who is licensed to provide professional counseling shall not engage in reparative therapy. So this part of the bill appears to apply only to licensed professionals. To be sure, line 16 again refers to licensed professionals. However, on page 4, lines 9 through 17, the bill now states that a person who is licensed means any person who performs counseling as part of their person's professional training, which may not require licensure. The bill contradicts itself, because it's clear that it applies only to licensed professionals, but then says you don't have to be licensed as long as counseling is part of your professional training. So, which is it?

"Secondly, I would direct the body's attention to the AG's written testimony submitted to the House Judiciary Committee where they state, the Department of the Attorney General alerts the committee that a case currently pending in the US Supreme Court, National Institute of Family and Life Advocates vs. Becerra, may have important implications for this measure. It raises questions regarding the extent to which government may constitutionally regulate professional speech, that is, speech that takes place in the context of a professional relationship with a professional who's subject to state regulation. Since the bill only applies to certain licensed professionals, and again, does it really only apply to licensed professionals, because it seems it applies to anyone who counsels as part of their profession, it's likely that this ruling will inform any future discussion of regulation of professional speech. Until that decision is issued, we will be unable to determine the extent that this bill will impact the analysis of the bill. The case was argued March 20 of 2008, decision expected in June.

"In other words, the AG is saying that there's currently a US Supreme Court case that may render this bill unconstitutional, so why not wait?

"My concern, Mr. Speaker, is that medicine is being politicized. Who are we to tell child psychiatrists how to perform their work? Now, I certainly don't agree with taking a child who is happy in their identity and forcing them against their will to go see counseling when they are happy. As one of the testifiers said that their parents forced them to go, and she was very happy with who she was. I don't agree with forcing someone to do that, or the other young fella who said he wasn't allowed to see his mother for three

years, based on this treatment. Well, anybody who would do that would be a quack, in my opinion, Mr. Speaker. That's sort of, that's cruel in my view.

"But the bill prevents the kids who are questioning. Because of this overbroad definition of, and I hate the words 'conversion therapy' because it's so broad it covers, in my view, basic counseling. If the child says, I have unwanted sexual attractions, dad, please help me, take me to see somebody. I'll be lucky to find somebody who will do it for fear of a lawsuit. And rest assured, there will be people out there targeting child psychiatrists who engage in this behavior to remove unwanted attractions. Believe it or not, there are kids out there who have unwanted attractions. We're saying in this bill, that's impossible.

"Also, there's children who are questioning, not sure. They need guidance, where do they go? Where do they go? We're taking it off the table, you can't go anywhere. No, you're not allowed to question. Well, I'm questioning, mom, dad, help me. Well, we can take you to a less qualified professional, how about the baseball coach? Maybe he can help you. Why are we doing this?

"And then, of course, the transgender individuals who by very definition have a psychological disorder, gender dysphoria, they can't get help. Eighty percent of kids go through some sort of gender questioning."

At 1:31 o'clock p.m., Representative McDermott requested a recess and the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:34 o'clock p.m.

Representative Tupola rose to yield her time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative McDermott continued, stating:

"But Mr. Speaker, for these broad concerns, removing the option or the opportunity for a young person who is questioning, who has unwanted attractions, why are we doing this? I don't agree with forcing students or young people to get this if they don't want it, if they're happy with who they are. In fact, when I hear that I have visions of a toothless mother in the foothills of the Arkansas dragging young Jimmy by the hair to a pickup truck and taking him down to Little Rock for therapy by some quack, of course I don't agree with that.

"What I'm focused on is the kids who are questioning or have unwanted attractions coming to their parents and saying, I need help. And my fear is this will add a chilling effect, a chilling effect to those offering therapy. Why would I risk it if I'm a child psychiatrist and I have a \$250,000 a year practice, why would I risk it to even delve into this, because I could put my entire family's wealth in jeopardy by losing a lawsuit. If I just happen to, in the professional context of the relationship, drift over into this area of talking to the child.

"So I just don't agree with that, I think it infringes on parental rights. If the child has an unwanted attraction and a parent wants to take that child somewhere, we're infringing on their rights, because there's going to be nowhere to take them, and the parent has no opportunity to engage their child in some sort of counseling that would help that child, if the child wants it. Again, I don't support forcing the children. I'm looking at the questioning children and the children with unwanted attractions. That's why I say this measure is too broad. We have to have some faith in parents, though. After all, they're the parents of the children. Maybe they know what's right for their kids. And if their kid has an unwanted attraction or is questioning, the parent should be allowed to get that child treatment.

"The task force, Mr. Speaker, I give the Judiciary Chair credit, because he fought for the task force. In fact, I was there when he made sure it was included in the conference committee report. But the task force has three people, and the only qualification is they have to be involved in the mental health services. I would like child psychiatrists on that task force at a minimum, and that they have no bias. We have seen task forces where the deck was stacked, and I'll give you an example, the Pono Choices task force. The deck was stacked. I knew everybody who was on there. There was one guy who shared the same views as me, everybody else had a documented

public history, it's how I knew, because I research who they were, what they did, of being pro-Pono Choices. Yet we got a fair ruling from them, but I think that was only because of Board of Education's chairman's directive, and they removed the lone medical professional and replaced him with an unbiased professional, as best I could tell, but the lone medical professional, additionally, was absolutely biased.

"So my concern is the makeup of the task force. And then the task force starts concurrently with the bill being implemented. Normally, you have the task force come first, and then the bill afterwards, based on the findings of the task force. Well, this bill gets implemented immediately and the task force doesn't report back until next June. So what happens in the interim? The damage will be done, and I suspect nothing will happen when the task force comes back, unless they find some sort of egregious violations.

"And lastly, Mr. Speaker, and in closing, I don't think this stuff is done here. I've never heard of it. So I don't understand the purpose of it, other than we are foreclosing options to parents whose children are questioning or have unwanted attractions."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 270, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MINORS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 45 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Choy, Har, Kong, McDermott and Ward voting no, and with Representative Takumi being excused.

#### Conf. Com. Rep. No. 157-18 and S.B. No. 2653, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2653, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Belatti rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Belatti's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support of Senate Bill 2653, Conference Draft 1.

"Hawaii is experiencing a healthcare workforce crisis. We feel it when we struggle to find pediatricians who will see our children. We see it when our  $k\bar{u}puna$  have difficulty locating a nearby physician when they age into Medicare. We hear about it when we discuss the dearth of providers serving Medicaid patients.

"The causes of the workforce shortage are as numerous as its effects. Therefore, we must have an assortment of tools to address each of the factors that contribute to the problem. I am proud to say that this body has been proactive in this regard. We have passed bills with the long-term objective of building a workforce from our own population including loan repayment programs to immediately bolster to the workforce and incentivizing healthcare professionals to stay in Hawaii when they complete their formal schooling.

"Senate Bill 2653, CD 1 helps to further address our workforce shortage. The bill allows the Hawaii Medical Board to issue licenses to physicians who: (1) pay the relevant fees; (2) hold an active license from a jurisdiction with substantially similar – or stronger – requirements for licensure than Hawaii; and (3) submit proof that they have actively practiced medicine for at least two of the previous five years. In addition, the board must find that the physician has a clean disciplinary and practice record and may further require the applicant to take an additional examination to demonstrate their competence.

"By reducing unnecessary and duplicative barriers to practice for active, qualified physicians in good standing, we make Hawaii a more attractive place for doctors to hang their shingle. Though the bill will not solve the State's workforce shortage by itself, Senate Bill 2653, CD 1 is nonetheless another tool we can add to our toolkit and represents this body's continued commitment to addressing the issue in a way that recognizes its complexity."

Representative Choy rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition, and may I have my written remarks on second read inserted into the Journal during the third reading," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2653, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHAPTER 453, HAWAII REVISED STATUTES," passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Choy voting no, and with Representative Takumi being excused.

# Conf. Com. Rep. No. 158-18 and S.B. No. 2524, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2524, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

At this time, Representative Ward moved for recommittal, seconded by Representative Tupola.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the motion to recommit, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Our desire to recommit the bill stems from the need that in every version of this bill when it went through committee, there was hundreds of testimonies in opposition, and the current state of the bill has never received public testimony. So it changed in conference committee to take out all of the neighbor islands, because currently all the other counties are able to do this process except for our county, and therefore we believe that this bill should be kicked back to the City Council of Honolulu, since every other county is able to do this except for ours, and they can determine it at their level, and then we can get actual testimony from people that are concerned about this issue across the state, because we should get testimony on the current bill, the way that it is, which was just birthed in conference committee as far as the current state of it.

"And we should be aware that in recent census studies, it's up to almost 90% of our lands here in the State of Hawaii are rural, and therefore ranchers, farmers. Hundreds of people who came out against this, they have a huge, huge influence here in our state because they are over and they understand these processes, which is within agricultural and rural areas. So for those reasons we believe that it'd be best to recommit it, get public testimony on it, and/or let the City and County of Honolulu handle it. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the motion to recommit, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in favor of the recommittal, please. Mr. Speaker, we are a state legislature, not a proxy City and County of Honolulu, of which, if we listen to the other counties, they said, this is an issue we've handled, we've been able to do it, Maui, Kauai. Why, Mr. Speaker, for a bill that's never been seen, should we have the City and County, or as it says euphemistically, any county with 750,000 residents or more.

"The point is, cows don't need streetlights, if we're going to do CPR, let the City and County, let's punt it back to the City and County, see what Mayor Caldwell and his colleagues will do. Thank you."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in opposition to the motion to recommit, stating:

"Thank you, in opposition to the motion, Mr. Speaker. This position of the CD 1 was what the neighbor islands were clamoring for on every version of the bill. Keep us out of it, we already have CPRs, we already do this. Repeatedly, if you look at all the testimony in opposition, the vein and bulk of it comes from the neighbor islands saying, take us out of it. The CD 1 reflects the public testimony that was continually received, which is, take us out of it. So on behalf of one, being taken out of it, thank you, chair, and again, in opposition to the recommittal."

Representative Tupola rose to respond, stating:

"In support. We are very aware that a lot of the testimony was from neighbor islands. However, we're back to the point of the fact that there is a process whereby our City and County can do this, as evident with all the other counties being in testimony saying that they do this very well. So that's what our concern is, is that in the current version of it, we'd like to hear what it is that they need help with on the state level, because if it's not needing any state help, then they can go ahead and handle it on the county level. Thank you."

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in opposition to the motion to recommit, stating:

"In opposition. With all due respect to the Minority Leader, the City and County of Honolulu asked for this language. They believe that they are unable to, based on their legal advice, to enforce without the language provided in S.B. No. 2524. This bill was amended CD 1 to, as our Representative from Lahaina stated, to address the concerns of the neighbor islands. So what we really have is a measure that addresses the concerns of the City and County of Honolulu, and the Hawaii Farm Bureau, and addressed the concerns of the neighbor islands. So for these reasons I am against the recommittal."

Representative Yamane rose to speak in opposition to the motion to recommit, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. in opposition. As several of my colleagues have stated, the version before you is a conglomeration of feedback given by the various counties, including Honolulu County. Mr. Speaker, the language crafted was also reviewed and supported by many landowners as well as farmers. The goal of the process was to gather feedback to address a problem that has been occurring, and if you have an issue or concern about the widespread use of county rules or loopholes, or if you are opposed to the use of gentlemen farms to get around current ag rules to do fake farms, Mr. Speaker, you would be opposed to a measure like this.

"The goal, Mr. Speaker, for the measure before you, was to support bona fide ag. This is a bill to allow the City and County of Honolulu to review and enforce ordinances to make sure that people do not develop fake farms using valuable ag land for the purposes of building giant homes. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Second time, in support of the recommittal. Mr. Speaker, by logical deduction, if it's legal for Kauai, Maui and other counties to do this, but illegal for the City and County of Honolulu, or because their corporate counsel thinks it's not proper, it must be illegal in Maui and Kauai and these other places. We're all under the same set of state rules, state laws, US Constitution, Hawaii Constitution, so that's a bit confusing. Second thing is, if the neighbor islands can do it, why can't Honolulu County do it? It would seem as simple as that. Thank you."

Representative DeCoite rose in opposition to the motion to recommit and asked that the remarks of Representatives McKelvey and Yamane be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Belatti rose to speak in opposition to the motion to recommit, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition and call for the question."

At this time, Representative Belatti called for the previous question.

The motion to recommit was put to vote by the Chair and upon a voice vote, failed to carry, with Representatives Hashem, Hashimoto, Matsumoto, Takumi and Tokioka being excused.

(Main Motion)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2524, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COUNTY LAND USE REQUIREMENTS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 45 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Matsumoto, McDermott, Thielen, Tupola and Ward voting no, and with Representative Takumi being excused.

# Conf. Com. Rep. No. 163-18 and H.B. No. 2501, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2501, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thanks, in support. Just want to say, this program's going to help reduce cost barriers and help many worthy local college students get the education they need to succeed in their chosen careers, so I support it."

Representative Holt rose in support of the measure and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Holt's written remarks are as follows:

"In my district, the best way to lift people out of poverty is to address educational inequality and provide access to higher education; Hawai'i Promise Program does exactly that – to remove cost as a barrier to higher education, clearing the path for community college students to complete their education without taking out student loans.

"We as servant leaders are responsible for preparing the citizens of Hawai'i for the modern workforce by ensuring access to quality higher education and the many benefits that come from it.

"Hawai'i Promise Program at our community colleges is a 'last dollar' scholarship that would provide any financial needs not met by other forms of financial aid, such as federal grants and benefits and scholarships from UH, employers and other private sources.

"I look forward to the day that we will be able to offer this program to our Hawai'i students at our four-year UH campuses."

Representative Gates rose in support of the measure and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Gates's written remarks are as follows:

"This bill codifies into law the Hawai'i Community College Promise Program. Last year money allocated for the community college promise program helped provide scholarship opportunities to 1,000 college students that had financial needs unmet by any other source. This success demonstrates that the permanent establishment of the program is essential at the community college level.

"The State of Hawai'i has a 55 by '25 campaign goal that focuses on increasing the percentage of working-age adults with two or four-year degrees to 55% by 2025. According to the most recent data available, 44% of Hawaii's working age adults have a postsecondary degree. By passing HB 2501, we promise to bridge this educational attainment gap.

"Education is the great leveler of the playing field. Through understanding and wisdom we will create a more vibrant and successful Hawai'i. More opportunities will be created for our young people and more civic and political engagement will surely follow. HB 2501 is a commitment to our future and promise not to leave behind anyone that strives for success."

Representative Belatti rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Belatti's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support of House Bill 2501, Conference Draft 1.

"This measure delivers on a promise of making a community college affordable. For many of our residents, better opportunities and improving one's life and the lives of family members are made possible if they can pursue an education beyond high school.

"House Bill 2501, CD 1 codifies the Hawaii Community College Promise Program and provides scholarship monies to pay for those unmet direct cost needs of qualified students enrolled at any of the University of Hawaii community college campuses located throughout the state. By providing this last-gap scholarship funding, important needs such as tuition and the costs of books, supplies, and transportation will be funded after other sources of grants and scholarships are applied.

"By reducing the cost barriers to attending community college, House Bill 2501, CD 1 strengthens the capacity of our residents to succeed so that our economy and all of our communities can thrive."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2501, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII COMMUNITY COLLEGE PROMISE PROGRAM," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Takumi being excused.

# Conf. Com. Rep. No. 164-18 and H.B. No. 1508, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1508, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ENERGY EFFICIENCY," passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Say voting no, and with Representative Takumi being excused.

At 1:48 o'clock p.m., Representative Belatti requested a recess and the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:49 o'clock p.m.

At this time, the Chair stated:

"Members, could you please note, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 167-18, S.B. No. 2791, is deferred one legislative day."

# Conf. Com. Rep. No. 167-18 and S.B. No. 2791, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1:

By unanimous consent, action was deferred one legislative day.

#### Conf. Com. Rep. No. 165-18 and H.B. No. 1986, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1986, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Belatti rose in support of the measure and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Belatti's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support of House Bill 1986, Conference Draft 1, the third of a trio of bills worked on by this legislature to improve and protect our environment and our economy.

"The increase of the amount of greenhouse gases released into the atmosphere and the resulting climate change threaten our state's natural environment and our economy. The transferring and selling of carbon offset credits has proven to be effective in generating revenues to mitigate and enhance adaptation to climate change.

"House Bill 1986, CD 1 sets Hawaii on the path of creating a carbon credit offset program where carbon credits are tradeable certificates or permits that represent a greenhouse gas reduction or greenhouse gas removal enhancement that is equivalent to one metric ton of carbon dioxide.

"Revenues generated by the selling of carbon offset credits can be invested into projects that will further enhance the State's efforts and work to mitigate or adapt to the problems associated with climate change. This could be very useful as we see our coastlines threatened by rising sea levels associated with climate change. Revenues from the selling of carbon offset credits may also be used to invest in projects that enhance the State's bold sustainability goals and policies.

"Because House Bill 1986, CD 1 continues Hawaii on the path to a sustainable environment and a strong economy, I support this measure as an important tool to achieve those objectives."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support, just brief comments, these will be my last of the day. This carbon offset program will not only reduce Hawaii's carbon footprint, but it will also, I hope, serve as an inspiration to the rest of the country. As an individual state, the effect may be minimal for us, but it will help establish a culture of responsibility and environmental stewardship for generations to come. And I'd like to, I was remiss in not mentioning this earlier with HB 2182 as well. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1986, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ENVIRONMENT," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Takumi being excused.

# Conf. Com. Rep. No. 166-18 and S.B. No. 2740, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2740, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Belatti rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Pursuant to a previous ruling on a conflict of interest on this measure, I request that I have recusal to vote from this measure for limited purposes."

The Chair addressed Representative Belatti, stating:

"So ordered in this limited situation."

Representative Thielen rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2740, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR CLAIMS AGAINST THE STATE, ITS OFFICERS, OR ITS EMPLOYEES," passed final Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 2 noes, with Representative Thielen voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Har and McKelvey voting no, and with Representatives Belatti and Takumi being excused.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2742, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MEDICAL CANNABIS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Choy voting no, and with Representative Takumi being excused.

# Conf. Com. Rep. No. 170-18 and H.B. No. 1895, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1895, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative McDermott voting no, and with Representative Takumi being excused.

# Conf. Com. Rep. No. 171-18 and H.B. No. 1911, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1911, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Mizuno rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. First, I wanted to thank you for allowing us to move this very important bill through the legislative process. I appreciate the opportunity to testify before this Chamber today in strong support of House Bill 1911 in its conference draft form. This measure takes an important step forward in creating safety and fairness. The safety net is protecting our consumers, and fairness in that it is closing loopholes in business regulations.

"Before I get into the details, Mr. Speaker, I wanted to recognize several colleagues who are crucial in the passage of this measure. Again, I thank you, I thank the Senate Chair of Consumer Protection and Health, I thank our House Chair of Consumer Protection. I also wanted to thank the Director of Health, Dr. Pressler, and two key people that worked on this bill with us, Department of Health Administrator Keith Ridley, and Deputy Attorney General Angela Tokuda. Finally, I wanted to thank the over 2,000 community care homes that are licensed in the state, the caregivers, the case managers, all those who supported this measure. I'd like to have permission to submit their names into the Journal, they're just too numerous. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

"Consumer safety and protection must always be our top priority, especially when we're protecting our most vulnerable, our  $k\bar{u}puna$  and our people with disabilities. This measure protects consumers by authorizing the Department of Health to investigate and enter care facilities that have been reported to be operating without certification or license. We purposely used the word 'may' instead of 'shall.' So it does not allow them to go into that unlicensed care home, they could talk with them and see if they can go into the care home, so any rumors about having stronger police powers than law enforcement is false and misleading. In the bill, we put the word 'may,' it's permissive, it's not mandatory, we purposely did that to recognize the opponents of this measure.

"During the hearings and the informational briefing this session, we heard heart-breaking stories from families and nurses about the business practices of the unlicensed and uncertified care homes. Taken in their totality, these stories are about businesses that provide inadequate care, fail to meet basic regulatory and medical standards, and charge excessive rates. Retirement funds built over a lifetime may be expended far faster in these unlicensed facilities.

"As I mentioned earlier, another harm created by unlicensed and uncertified care homes is the way in which these facilities undermine the legal, legitimate, licensed care homes that are doing the right thing and are following the rules and the laws of the State. There are numerous regulations that we, the Legislature, have imposed on these businesses in order to create a market that provides good services to Hawaii's consumers. Businesses that circumvent these regulations by failing to obtain the appropriate documentation should not be rewarded with significant commercial advantages over their more ethical competitors. Yet, in the status quo, that is exactly what is happening.

"I have a list before me, and I'm not going to go through every one, Mr. Speaker, I'm not going to take everyone's valuable time. I'm just going to highlight a few of them. Criminal background checks, the unlicensed care homes do not have any criminal background checks. You can have a murderer or a rapist be your primary caregivers. In addition, these unlicensed care homes do not have annual inspections by the Department of Health. They don't have any unannounced inspections by the Department of Health. The legitimate licensed care homes all have to acquiesce to these rules and regulations.

"For the licensed care homes and certified care homes, they all have liability insurance for their patients. In fact, we put such stringent laws on them, they even need liability insurance for their vehicles taking these patients to and from their places of need. We also have building and fire code requirements that the licensed and certified care homes need to abide by. Medical record requirements, TB clearance, I could go on and on. I'm not going to, that's just some, just a few of the important requirements that the licensed and legitimate certified care home industry has to abide by."

Representative McKelvey rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Mizuno continued, stating:

"Thank you, Representative. Hawaii has nearly 2,000 licensed legal care homes serving approximately 13,000 residents, these are our  $k\bar{u}puna$  and our people with disabilities. Department of Health has reported that 76 community care foster family homes closed in 2016, and another 74 closed in 2017. That's 150, and that's only one segment, they're called CCFFHs, that's only one segment. There's about nine different segments of care homes, Mr. Speaker. This shows that there's an exodus of licensed caregivers. In January, in fact, this year, January, the Department of Health fined one of these formerly licensed care home facilities \$325,000 when they continued to operate without a license. This is a problem that is only worsening with time.

"Unfortunately, this should not be surprising. We should not expect every care home to try to follow the rules and compete with those competitors that aren't held to the same standards. We need to pass this measure in fairness to the legitimate licensed care home industry. The tragedy of unlicensed and uncertified care homes is played out daily across our state, and it victimizes  $k\bar{u}puna$ , people with disabilities, and families trying to do the best they can. The victims and their advocates have voiced themselves loud and clear to us. Today we have the opportunity to show them that we are here and we listened to their concerns. I urge my colleagues to do what is right for the safety of our residents, and what is fair for law-abiding care homes. Vote in support of House Bill 1911, CD 1. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Mizuno submitted the following additional names:

"Dr. Nancy Walch, Amelia Casamina Cabatu, Agnes Reyes, Elsa Talavera, Maribel Tan, Wannette Gaylord, Lilia Fajotina, Esther Pascual, and many additional people."

Representative Cachola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support. I'd like to request that the remarks of the previous speaker be entered in the Journal as if they were my own, and I'd also like to make further comments to be entered in the Journal. And one more thing. If we allow these things to have to be our *kūpuna* under unlicensed care homes, they will be susceptible to abuse, fraud, and they will be at risk. It's always better to have regulations in terms of taking care

of our *kūpuna*. It is for this reason that I strongly support this bill. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Cachola's written remarks are as follows:

"H.B. No. 1911, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1 relates to care facilities; uncertified; unlicensed; enforcement; community-based care home; adult care center; criminal penalty. It authorizes the Department of Health to investigate care facilities reported to be operating without an appropriate certificate or license issued by the Department. Establishes penalties for violations and for knowingly referring or transferring patients to uncertified or unlicensed care facilities, with certain exceptions. Excludes landlords from licensure, under certain conditions.

"Anytime  $k\bar{u}puna$  health is under unlicensed care home and medical facilities, it is susceptible to fraud, abuse and at risk of neglect. This is due to non-compliance to necessary inspection requirements.

"Licensed community care homes and medical facilities by the Department of Health must have to comply, among other things, with the following requirements: (a) Criminal background checks for all employees; (b) Be licensed by the Department of Health (DOH)after fulfilling all safety and insurance requirements; (c) Annual inspections by the DOH; (d) Unannounced inspections by the DOH; (e) Liability insurance for the patients; and (f) Must allow the state Department of Health to go onsite to visit the patient or the conditions of the care home.

"With constant and regular monitoring, our *kūpuna* would be better served by H.B. No. 1911, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1.

"I stand in strong support of this bill."

Representative San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. As the Chair of Health & Human Services has stated, this is about protecting the most vulnerable. My only request is that next time we go through this, it actually be stronger. Because we are requiring licensed care facilities to have these surprise visits, these inspections, all of these requirements that cost money and cost them employees and cost them their time, whereas unlicensed facilities, because they're unlicensed, are not subject to all of this. By making it a 'may' instead of a 'shall,' hopefully next time we look at this we make it a 'shall' be able to, an actual requirement that the department inspect upon a complaint.

"What's happening now is that licensed care facilities are losing clients to unlicensed ones because of referrals, which I believe we should sanction even stronger than we are at this measure. So I thank the Chair for introducing this, and I support it, however, next time let's make it stronger. Thank you."

Representative Cullen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in support. Mr. Speaker, I just wanted to commend the Chair of Finance, because I know how hard she worked on this measure towards the end of conference. This measure will provide important protection for those that are caring for our *kūpuna* and those with disabilities, and this will allow for fairness in making sure that we are protecting the consumers in this industry. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1911, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Takumi being excused.

# Conf. Com. Rep. No. 172-18 and H.B. No. 2729, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2729, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2729, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CANNABIS FOR MEDICAL USE," passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Tupola voting aye with reservations, with Representative Har voting no, and with Representative Takumi being excused.

# Conf. Com. Rep. No. 173-18 and H.B. No. 2271, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 2271, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. This intention of this bill, and I want to also thank the chairs for introducing this, is so that DOE can bill Medicaid, and that's something we've needed for a while for our ABAs, for applied behavior analysts. And so I just wanted to share that, one of the concerns that people had was in regards to the reimbursement in the expansion of the definition of psychologists being able to provide these services. And so currently in HMSA they state that Quest patients will not be able to be reimbursed if the person was not actually certified by the Behavior Analyst Certification Board.

"So that's something that some parents were concerned about, because this is definitely a step in the right direction, we've needed this for a long time. And some of them asked me to actually read this part, that they were concerned about the fact that psychologists are allowed to provide ABA so long as it's the psychologist's education, training and competence. However, there is no place where education, training and competence are defined.

"So I share their worry, and I think that the step is correct for us to get that Medicaid billing going, and that we should consider the fact that the expansion might prohibit some of the proper billing that families need in order to get reimbursed. Thank you."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support, request to insert written comments, and just brief remarks. I would like to thank the Chairs of Education, IAC, and Health & Human Services for the good work they did on this difficult topic. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Belatti's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in support of House Bill 2271, Conference Draft 1.

"Since the passage of the insurance mandate for behavior analysis services for the treatment of autism, our provider communities have struggled with ensuring that behavior analysis treatment is offered and provided to those who would most benefit from this treatment in the educational and community settings in which behavior analysis is supposed to be provided.

"These struggles have been, in part, because of the need to grow and identify the qualified providers who can provide these services. However, with the Department of Education in particular, there appears to be many more obstacles where parents report frustration with the Individual Educational Program or IEP process where behavior analysis seems to have been systematically disregarded and minimized in autistic children's plans even though these children and families may have received the appropriate autistic diagnosis from their treating physicians and healthcare providers outside of the school system.

"House Bill 2271, CD 1 continues to afford agencies such as the Department of Health and the Department of Education some time to successfully integrate and implement these services for the populations that they serve. But progress needs to be made and made with much more meaningful commitment to integrating these services for the broad range of children with varying levels of autism, not just those with severe autism. For the sake of improving the immediate educational outcomes of these students and their ability to succeed and thrive in the future, integrating these services

is important – otherwise we, as a community, will fail in providing the appropriate services to another generation of children."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2271, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PRACTICE OF BEHAVIOR ANALYSIS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Takumi being excused.

#### Conf. Com. Rep. No. 175-18 and S.B. No. 2854, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2854, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOPEDS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Takumi being excused.

# Conf. Com. Rep. No. 177-18 and S.B. No. 2401, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 2401, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Brower rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. Thank you. About eight years ago, Mr. Speaker, I introduced a simple House resolution regarding the subject matter of safe zones, and the idea was to create space where the homeless will want to go, instead of them monopolizing our sidewalks, parks and beaches. When a natural disaster strikes, government provides temporary shelter to people who have been dislodged. And what we have today may be an economic disaster, and government must do the same.

"This bill has several funding mechanisms, including a provision for \$30 million to fund ohana zones, or as some people call them, *mālama* zones. It's a place for people to go before they get into more permanent housing, and it's much needed. We're using the Kahauiki Village by the Daniel K. Inouye International Airport as the template for this measure, and we look forward to adding a new solution to a major challenge, perhaps the ultimate challenge facing us in Hawaii today.

"And with a smile, Mr. Speaker, we have to recognize the work of one legislator, without him we could not have taken his three ohana zone bills and put them into one Senate bill. Joking aside, thank you to the Health & Human Services Chair, I enjoy his company and respect his work ethic."

Representative Mizuno rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in strong support. Thank you. It's about a decade ago, the Chair of Housing brought up, touted this idea, about safe zones. We've always been close, you see, and I'm so honored today that his concept is now in a bill. For 10 years we had people laughing at us, thinking we're kind of crazy. I think some people still do. But at the end of the day, the Chair of Housing truly represents this statement, and I say it with complete love and from the bottom of my heart. In this bill, and his concepts on helping our homeless people, this sentence displays all that he's about, that there are no throwaway people in our society, and I'm just so proud to be a colleague of the Chair of Housing, just so honored to have this bill pass after 10 years.

"This bill also represents two pilot programs, Mr. Speaker. One is for the Emergency Department Homelessness Assessment Program, the other is Medical Respite Pilot Program. This will address the urgent need of patients that are in need, many of these are homeless that go to the emergency room when they don't need to. They'll get the proper help they'll need, and we'll end up saving a lot of money at ERs and for acute care bed space, ultimately saving taxpayer dollars, Medicaid funds, as well as monies from our hospitals.

"The concept by my good colleague, the Housing Chair, is this, that in order for individuals experiencing homelessness to transition out of homelessness, there's several factors they need. First, they need a place of stability. Second, they need a place to heal. Third, they need the ability to

become self-reliant, and this is the safe zones now called ohana zones that is touted by my good colleague, the Chair of Housing, that is finally coming to fruition today. The Ohana Zones Pilot creates all these, and we're hopeful that our people that go to these ohana zones can truly transition out of homelessness and get into permanent support housing.

"I want to thank you, Mr. Speaker. At the beginning you told all the chairs to be bold. I want to thank the Majority Leader, the entire leadership team, the Finance Chair, especially my good colleague the Chair of Housing for a job well done. *Mahalo*. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support, and I do praise both the Housing Chair and Health & Human Services. And the reason for it is because while this bill was going through, even homeless advocates were testifying against this bill. And for them to be bold and to continue forward shows strength, and for that I admire them. I also want to point out, one of the things that wasn't brought up that I really admire and I'm glad they put in, is a Law Enforcement Assisted Diversion, LEAD project, \$200,000 of which is going to be on the Big Island. That would go substantially towards hopefully reducing our district court backlogs and allow self-empowerment to the law enforcement community to determine for themselves who is best to go to jail versus to a treatment program. Thank you."

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Strong support. Mahatma Gandhi said that the true measure of any society can be found in how it treats its most vulnerable members. SB 2401 is a multi-pronged approach to addressing homelessness throughout the state. It's groundbreaking because it provides flexible funding for ohana zones, or what some people insist on calling *mālama* zones, the LEAD program, an expansion of family assessment centers on the neighbor islands, a new Medical Respite Pilot Program, and new Emergency Department Homelessness Assessment Pilot Programs. And both of these pilot programs involve leveraging private funding.

"Mr. Speaker, the bill before us provides alternatives to incarceration, alternatives to living on the street, alternatives to the revolving door at all of our hospitals throughout our state.

"Mr. Speaker, I'd like to thank the Housing and Human Services Chairs for their persistence over the last decade in both the House and the Senate for their leadership, for our House and WAM Chairs for securing the financial resources to make this bill work, and the Majority Leader from Makiki for crafting this bill that provides flexibility for addressing homelessness in each county."

Representative Gates rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would just like to adopt the words of all of the previous speakers as if they were my own, and insert written comments. And I want to give a big shout out to Majority Leader for crafting such a broad but very specific measure to address our homeless crisis. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Gates's written remarks are as follows:

"Today the Legislature stepped up to the plate to address our homeless crisis across the State of Hawai'i. SB 2401 provides \$30 million for pilot 'Ohana Zone' projects to create an alternative to traditional housing and social services for homeless individuals and families. Up to six (6) sites, three (3) on Oahu and one (1) on Kauai, Maui and Big Island will be established. This is intended to care for our homeless and free up our parks and public spaces for their intended use. Additionally, it provides \$1 million for an Emergency Department Assessment Pilot Program, \$1 million for a Medical Respite Pilot Program, \$800,000 for a new family assessment center, and \$400,000 for two new Law Enforcement Assisted Diversion (LEAD) Programs on Maui and Hawai'i Island. Another homeless measure, SB 2027, provides \$1.5 million for a Coordinated Statewide Homeless Initiative.

"Homelessness effects all our communities, from Chinatown to the North Shore, from Kauai to Big Island, tents and makeshift structures are pervasive on our sidewalks, parks and beaches. By passing SB 2401 we chose to no longer ignore this epidemic, but instead we have secured the funds and demonstrated the will power to take a big step at solving homelessness in Hawai'i. These bills will not only provide an alternative to traditional housing, but afford these individuals and families the social services and medical care that every human being deserves. I would like to thank leadership for their tireless efforts, compassion and courage to think outside the box to make a real difference in the lives of our most vulnerable population."

Representative Holt rose in support of the measure and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Holt's written remarks are as follows:

"As our state struggles with the answer to chronic homelessness, and especially in my district, we have taken the first of many steps by appropriating funds to facilitate assistance to individuals who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless.

"With this measure and the other two previous bills passed, this will allow the Governor to implement various strategies to address homelessness along the full spectrum of care. To truly tackle the issues, we will need more transitional housing, more robust job placement, and a tremendous expansion of our existing mental health and addiction counseling service while partnering with public/private sectors to address this concern throughout our state."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. I'll try to keep this very brief, but I wanted to frame my comments with three concepts.  $M\bar{a}lama$ , to care for,  $k\bar{o}kua$ , to help and assist, and 'ohana, family. We all know homelessness is one the biggest issues facing the State. We read about it in the news, hear about it in our townhalls, and often see it for ourselves when we return to our districts. For me, it's driving along King Street, the short distance between the Capitol and my home.

"The reasons for homelessness are myriad, as are the solutions and populations effected. That means there is no one answer, and this bill acknowledges that reality and proposes a variety of solutions accordingly. *Mālama*, to care for. So as noted by the Housing Chair, our ohana zones three year pilot program could in fact be called *mālama* zones. It addresses the basic needs of homeless persons and provides them services necessary to transition them into affordable housing. It is meant to be a temporary fix. It gives the Governor the flexibility necessary to identify the departments and agencies best equipped to begin and manage the program, while also appropriating \$30 million to ensure that the project is big enough to make a difference. The bill creates evaluation and oversight standards, and requires regular reports to the Legislature of the progress made. The Legislature will be watching, the community will be watching as we give the Governor flexibility.

"Kōkua, to help and to assist. In part II of the bill, two pilot programs are created, and I cannot underscore how important that the private sector is in kokua-ing with us. In helping and providing funds to set up programs like the Medical Respite Program and the Emergency Assessment Program in the emergency room departments. Also, the Law Enforcement Assisted Diversion Program is also something that we partner with, and importantly, it's something that we partner with our government agencies. So the Department of Health is at the center of the LEAD, or the Law Enforcement Assisted Diversion, attempts to address the underlying behavioral health conditions that contribute and to persons' underlying medical behavioral challenges, directing them away from the criminal justice system into programs that work.

"'Ohana. The family assistance center is conceived of something new, beyond just the Kakaako Family Assessment Center, which we know is working. So, again, flexibility given to the Governor, to the executive, to be able to identify other areas for family assistance centers.

"Mr. Speaker, this bill approaches the issues of homelessness in a way that is robust, tailored to the needs of different populations, and will build the foundation for future efforts to combat this issue. For these reasons, I stand in support."

Representative Keohokalole rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I'd like to start by commending the chairs, conferees, and members of this body for supporting this legislation. And I'm going to speak a little bit about one of the pieces within the bill itself that I think is very important and has gotten sort of under-covered over the last year since the Legislature actually initiated this program. And as my colleague from Puna mentioned, it's the LEAD Program.

"I think it's very important to have this discussion right now, in light of this ohana zones discussion, because when we talk about different types of services for the homeless, we really don't talk about a key component of the homeless crisis, which is drug addiction and how the ohana zones part of this measure along with the other two pilot projects and LEAD are really finally the Legislature's reaction and solution to addressing that part of the homeless crisis, which is a major part of it that everyone I think understands, and we just don't talk about.

"LEAD is Law Enforcement Assisted Diversion. And this bill expands out funding, appropriating funding so that this program can be implemented on the neighbor islands, as well as on Oahu. We started it on Oahu, the homeless crisis doesn't only affect Oahu. The State of Hawaii is not only Oahu. We have this problem on the neighbor islands, and so it's time to expand out beyond Oahu. This is a voluntary, non-coercive support initiative, and it's these types of programs for homeless and drug addicted individuals that are just superior to what we are doing now, when it comes to homeless, which is mostly either ignoring them, sweeping them from one site to the other, or worse and most expensive of all, locking them up. That's why, as I mentioned, this body actually authorized and appropriated the first LEAD Pilot Project last year, which I'm glad that the Governor has recently initiated on Oahu.

"But in order to address our homeless crisis, our systems need to change. That's what this bill is about today. It's not only about money, it's not only about housing, our response systems need to change, and that's what LEAD is. Our emergency response systems are just not meant to deal with the homeless crisis. Primarily, they're meant to save lives. Fire, police, ambulance, we did not create them to treat homeless people. We created them to fight fires, to fight crime, to protect the public, and to save lives. They are not designed to treat people with behavioral health issues.

"This is a system problem. That's why our other ancillary systems are suffering and buckling under the pressure. Our parks, our hospitals, our maintenance support for all of our public spaces, highways, schools, they're all buckling because we haven't addressed the system part of this problem. So this bill does two things, it appropriates money, but it starts that change that is so necessary in order to actually solve this issue.

"When it comes to homelessness, like I said, we talk about housing, over my time here in the Legislature, we talk about mental health, but we don't talk about drug addiction. I recently spoke with a doctor in my district who treats lots of different patients in Kaneohe, and he told me that part of the reason why we haven't really started to make headway on the homeless issue is because we haven't addressed the three top problems related to homelessness. And he said those are meth, meth, and meth. This is a primary care physician in my community who takes all comers.

"Eighty percent of our chronic homeless are addicted to some kind of substance, we just don't talk about it. We say mental health, we say all these other things. Those are parts of it, but we don't talk about this part of it. We need to address it, and LEAD is meant to address it. That's what this program was created for. Locking up addicts or individuals with mental health conditions for sleeping on sidewalks or bus stops is just not solving the problem. This program especially gives our police an opportunity to get these individuals some help right away, which is a critical third option to locking them up or ignoring them, the primary two choices police and first-responders have when they get a homeless-related call. This is a subtle, but

I believe monumental change in the way our response systems work. We need to redesign these and many other parts of our government system."

Representative McKelvey rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Keohokalole continued, stating:

"Sorry, I'll be done right after this. We need to account for the realities of today, okay. Our state government systems were designed in 1959 for the sugar economy of the mid-50s. That part of Hawaii has passed us by. We need to account for what's going on now and get our heads out of the sand. This does this. People are going to fight it, people aren't going to agree, we're not going to get it right, like I said before, but we have to try. I'm biased in favor of trying. And so that's what this does, and that's why I'm speaking passionately about it, because it's about time that we actually try to solve these problems that are right in front of our faces.

"So I'm in support of the bill. I'm glad that we're moving this program and the rest of the ohana zones initiative out to the neighbor islands and the entire state because it's a problem for everybody, and that's why I support the bill. Thank you."

Representative Luke rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. In the beginning of session, you instructed the Legislature and this House to focus on housing and homeless, and as we have already discussed housing, this bill is the culmination of work, the extensive work done by the various Members of this House during the interim and leading up to now. And I can tell you in the beginning of session there were numerous number of bills introduced relating to homeless, and I think even the advocates and even the community members and even the members themselves felt, okay where is this all going, because things are all over the place, where is this going.

"This is really the example of the best of the Legislature. This is an example of how people came together, both the House and the Senate, the various members and various community leaders, and with a lot of hard work, a lot of late nights, what resulted in is Senate Bill 2401. 2401 did not look like this in the beginning of session. 2401 is the culmination of the various discussions, the many hours that people put together, and this is part of a package of bills that the Legislature is committing to address our homeless community.

"Along with this, the \$50 million in the budget which deals with shallow rent subsidy, housing first storage, mental health services, and the AUW bill packaged together, the Legislature is providing close to \$50 million to provide services and assistance to our homeless community. And this is a huge commitment, and I want to thank everybody in the Legislature, because every one of you has made this a commitment, and has made this a priority, and because of that, this is what we see today. So thank you very much "

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support with mild precautions. I agree with everybody who has just spoken. But Mr. Speaker, in our profession we are supposed to under promise and over deliver. I think we may be over delivering like we did about in the earlier session today in the housing project. We're getting expectations pretty high. And this is a good bill, it's \$50 billion, it gives so many different elements that are good for the bills, particularly the ohana zones which morph from safe zones, and I commend the Chair of Housing for his persistence. Because we know, Mr. Speaker, we cannot do status quo. We cannot keep on keeping on the way we've done it.

"This establishes a Medical Respite Pilot, establishes a Family Assessment Center, and it just does about everything that we've learned, except for one thing. It doesn't have a master plan to end homelessness. It doesn't have a plan to even put meat on the bones of what otherwise is a bill that says, okay, czar in the Governor's Office do this, and City and County do that. I don't see the plan that's going to do it, Mr. Speaker. And when the example was as the pilot by the airport, the villages, those, Mr. Speaker, are

costing between 100,000 and 150,000 each. I don't think there's enough money to do that.

"In the beginning, there were a number of bills that were considered. Some of them were passed unanimously, some of them failed, but I think overall there was an attempt to do something different. What my fear is, is that when we leave things vague and open to question, we may miss some of the basic points. And that is, Mr. Speaker, as has been said, everybody needs to have a stable place to stay. Everybody needs to know where they're going to put their head down at night. Some of us did the CEO Sleepout here on the rotunda. Sleeping on that cement is not easy, and in fact, I thought if I could have had a few drinks, I would have slept a lot better. Therefore, the anesthetization of the meth is a good way to numb yourself from the situation.

"But Mr. Speaker, what I'm afraid is that we are not going to have enough to solve the homeless problem, and we're doing as the analogy this leaky roof proposal. The leaky roof solution is where you got enough money to fix 20% of the roof, and it doesn't leak in that 20% but you still got 80% of your roof leaking. Mr. Speaker, let's face it, homelessness has gotten worse, and worse, and worse, and worse. It is not getting better. So we really need to deliver, we really need to do a great job of what this bill outlines, and it has the potential to do it, but it's going to take the political will and people who know what they're doing, like Mayor Kim and others.

"Mr. Speaker, I would also add that there are some models out there that we shouldn't ignore. Pu'uhonua Villages under Twinkle is a shining example of hardly any government money, except for government land, with governance, with rules that say you can't do this, you can't do that, with homeless people who are working, with homeless people who have children, with a homeless modicum of governance without any interruption from government. Mr. Speaker, that unfortunate experiment is being threatened by a huge sweep.

"Another example, Mr. Speaker, and I bring that to the attention of all my colleagues, is in Kaneohe. First Assembly of God has 12 domes, as we speak, being erected. Nine are for homeless mothers with children. Terrific group of people, we really need to, our hearts should really go out to them. Three of the buildings are for food, restrooms and for governance, which would be safety as well as probably social services and other things. Mr. Speaker, that's by the churches, First Assembly of God, I think Pastor Kaneshiro and Pastor Ko are proud of that, and they're just now, after two years of waiting for proposals.

"I hope some of the Puuhonua Villages Act that is modeled after that would be taken into consideration, because Mr. Speaker, those are one unit, \$15,000 or less. As earlier spoken, these are transitional solutions to what otherwise would be permanent housing. Mr. Speaker, we're not going to reach permanent housing using the brick and mortar."

Representative McDermott rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"Thank you, sir. The brick and mortar model is about \$300,000 to \$450,000 a pop. We need \$3.5 billion to solve the homeless problem. But if we use temporary housing like Puuhonua Villages Act has proposed, we can house all of the people for less than \$200 million.

"Mr. Speaker, we need to have that commitment. We need to say, we have a solution. I don't think anybody out there really believes what we said on the floor today, because they've seen it get worse and worse and worse and sweep after sweep. So, Mr. Speaker, the bottom line is, we really have to deliver."

Representative Keohokalole rose to a point of order, stating:

"Point of order, I did mean what I said."

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"I'm sure that we've all meant what we said. But my point is, Mr. Speaker, we have to deliver. We have to really put actions behind our words. For those of us who have been here a while, we were kicking this can down the road for how many sessions, how many decades? Too many decades to even remember when safe zones came up, Mr. Speaker.

"The point is, we are on the line for our credibility, we've over promised with this bill, we've probably, I hope do not under deliver for the sake of all those out there who need our help. The bottom line again, we have to deliver. And I want to thank Mike Goodman for all of his effort, and Mr. Speaker for the Housing Chair and others to know, he is at your service to do as much as possible that he can do, and his wages are simply pizza and gratitude. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ing rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. I just want to start by *mahalo*-ing everyone for all the work. This was a long time in the works, I think it was last July and August when we first sat down and discussed how to best move forward with housing and homelessness. And I think we've done both, we also did the three priorities that I was hoping for as Majority Policy Leader with vote by mail and equal pay and pesticides. So it's really nice to see all the work that's been done. I remember meetings with the Housing Chair and the Majority Leader with all sorts of members from nonprofits, from the private and public sector, all sorts of personalities. And to get to something like this, it shouldn't be unsaid by how much that work is valued here.

"So with the ohana zones, I think there was a quote by my fellow Majority Policy Leader last year, and he was talking about how the prisons are becoming de facto homeless shelters. It was a very apt quote, but one thing that I was concerned about with safe zones or ohana zones was to make sure that these homeless camps don't become de facto prisons by putting them all in one area and having it patrolled by law enforcement.

"So it was really important that we pass Law Enforcement Assisted Diversion, to give these law enforcement officers more power than just punitive, because right now, if they were to see a victim of drug abuse using, they only had two options, either to leave them alone, or arrest them. Or they could walk up to them and say here's a card to a social service provider. But as you've probably seen if any of you played basketball up in Chinatown, there's those like business cards all over the place that they just throw away or leave on the floor. So you really need that warm hand-off to make sure that these people are getting the services they need.

"It should be said that drug abuse and mental health are not two distinct issues, they often overlap in very profound and obvious ways. One out of 100 people in our general population are schizophrenic, and in a world where it's easier to come across meth than it is to psychotropics, drugs that are legal, they self-medicate, and then they become addicted. And the other way around too, once you do become addicted to meth, you can fall into patterns of drug-induced schizophrenia and mental illness. So it's important that we don't conflate those, but also understand how they connect.

"Thirty percent of the homeless population now is Native Hawaiian. Twenty-seven percent of the homeless population are COFA migrants from Micronesia or the Marshall Islands, even though they only represent 1% of our general population. So that's a 27x disproportionate rate of houselessness. And one issue is, these folks don't receive Medicaid funding from the Federal Government and a lot of the services here at the State as well

"So following what the last speaker was saying, if we really want a holistic plan of addressing homelessness, I think we're well on our way. This, with Housing First, to actually provide housing to people who need it, that's a great next step. And I challenge anyone who says this isn't enough to introduce a bill, whether it's large bonds for public housing, or to actually tackle the demand side and shift resources over. Because we know, in Hawaii, scarcity is not a problem. You just look out and you see luxury condominiums popping up every two weeks in Kakaako, literally adjacent to Native Hawaiians and veterans in the streets. It's just a matter of having the will to shift those resources to actually help working people.

"I apologize, I have a really bad toothache right now for some reason, so I'm just trying to talk over it. Thank you. Thank you, leadership especially, for moving this. *Aloha*."

Representative LoPresti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Strong support. I wasn't going to speak, but I really wanted to take a moment to just commend Majority Leader, the Housing Chair, Health & Human Services Chair, and their respective Senate Chairs for their leadership on this.

"This is the hardest, most rewarding job I've ever had and that I can imagine. But one of the most difficult things in this job, I think for everybody, is trust. And we often have to trust one another, that people are going to put in the work, and the hard work and the hours, to solve problems. And we're not always on those committees where a lot of these issues are tackled. And I really just want to commend all of those members of those committees for doing the hard work and tackling this very important issue, as well as the housing issue, and thank you. Thank you as a colleague and thank you for doing that great work for the people of Hawaii."

Representative Tupola rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Also wanted to thank all the chairs, leadership as well, and permission to insert written comments."

Representative Tupola's written remarks are as follows:

"SB 2401, provides funding for many programs which are essential for the fight against homelessness. It also allocates \$30 million to establish ohana zones, which is a three-year 'safe-zone' pilot program.

"While this is a laudable effort, done with the best of intentions, I respectfully question the wisdom of spending \$30 million on a safe-zone pilot program, when we could have spent it on Pu'uhonua homeless villages as specified by HB 2014, the Pu'uhonua homeless villages act. For reasons I can't understand, the conference committee decided to defer HB 2014 indefinitely, and instead proceeded with the ohana safe-zones pilot program.

"We don't need a pilot program to show us how to end homelessness. Existing programs here and across the country are ending homelessness every day. For example, housing first programs have an 89% success rate with severely mentally ill and substance addicted chronically homeless individuals. For homelessness caused by purely economic reasons, providing apartments with sufficient subsidies has a 100% success rate.

"In fact, the only reason we still have a homeless crisis, is that we have a shortage of subsidized apartments; and the only the reason we have a shortage of subsidized apartments, is they cost an average of \$450,000 each to build, and roughly \$1,200 to \$1,500 a month to rent.

"So what's the solution? We need to 'think outside the bricks.' We can do what we're already doing in apartments without apartments; housing first will work just as well in a modular home as it does in an apartment.

"HB 2401 was based on a \$200 million plan to assemble 8,000 comfortable, safe modular homes that cost \$15,000 or less, have 200-300 square feet of living space, are virtually fire-proof, can withstand force-five hurricane winds and 8.0 earthquakes. If HB 2014 had passed the conference committee, 8,000 modular homes would have brought homelessness to 'functional zero' in about six years.

"Pu'uhonua villages could also have started out as 'ohana-like safe-zones,' but end up as villages with permanent housing. For a 'down payment' of \$36 million, 80 villages could have been built with 8,000 homesites, complete with communal bathrooms, showers, access to public transportation, and wrap around supportive services, just like ohana zones. And like ohana zones, everyone would initially live in temporary dwellings, but with a huge difference:

"Ohana zones will try to transition residents into apartments that may or may not be available, and pay for it with funds that may or may not be available. Instead, Pu'uhonua villages would have brought permanent housing to the residents. For an amount that is predictable and affordable, every temporary dwelling would eventually be replaced by permanent, modular homes. So, if the conference committee had passed Pu'uhonua villages instead of ohana zones, \$30 million would have gone towards permanent housing and a real solution to the homeless crisis.

"I sincerely hope we can revisit this issue next year, and not continue to make the same mistakes we've made for decades."

Representative Say rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"In support with slight reservations. Members and Speaker, this afternoon it's with slight reservations that I support this measure. And one of the core that we are missing here in this particular measure is workforce. Workforce development for those who are going to implement these programs.

"I've come across a lot of social workers who are already burnt out. I hope, in the budget, that the University of Hawaii School of Social Work got some increased funding so that you can increase the enrollment. Our medical profession that you want to have the diversion, where are these particular doctors going to come from? Nurses, *et cetera*, whereby the medical school has already a program that uses a van that goes to Waianae to do this medical evaluations of these homeless individuals.

"But more importantly, think about it. We're spending a lot of money, but do we have the qualified individuals to execute and implement the programs that are in this particular measure?

"It's hard to say what's really going to happen, but it's great that it is a pilot program, and this body, who are coming back next year, will have the opportunity to evaluate how successful it is.

"But it is a little scary, because in this particular measure, is it possible that we could grant them an exemption from Chapter 76, our civil service laws. Will these be all contractors, private vendors doing the services? I really don't know. But you have given it to the Governor to make that determination.

"And I wanted to go on record this afternoon to tell the Governor and his homeless coordinator, and the Department of Transportation, and all other departments that are affiliated with the homeless program presently, for a job well done in responding, for the Representatives from the Kaimuki, Kapahulu, Palolo area. When we called, they were there, under the bridge by the Board of Water Supply, Harding Avenue and 3rd, they were there up at St. Louis Heights, they were there at Diamond Head Park, and they were there to support all of us here also. But the bottom line, do we have the workers of the future addressing all of these different programs that you folks have developed?

"So in closing, congratulations to the authors of this conference draft. And god willing, if I'm back, I'll probably ask the question, how far have we gone through this particular program after six months? Thank you."

Representative Mizuno rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Still in support. I just wanted to address some of the very good questions that several members have brought up. Again, I'm going to repeat what I said first. The ohana zones, the entire rationale behind this is, number one, stability, to get our homeless stable. Number two, it's to have them given a chance to heal, to allow them to heal. Third, it's going to allow them to become self-sufficient.

"So when we talk about workforce development, that's included in wraparound services for the ohana zones. When we talk about the medical teams that are going out to help these homeless, they're called navigators, they already are in practice. In fact, Queens has a great program where their ER physicians voluntarily do this with nurses and social workers. There are teams, outreach teams, that are actually getting to our homeless. This is going to be easier for the teams to engage the homeless in a homeless zone, because it's already at a site.

"So there are a lot of good questions, and I anticipate that after a year or so, we'll be able to show the results. And I too am hopeful that the robust bills that we've put in place will actually provide great results for our homeless. So, thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative San Buenaventura rose to respond, stating:

"Second time. Again, I stand in strong support. I'd like to point out that the Big Island has shown that it has worked there. We had, at the last homeless point-in-time count, we had the largest drop of all the other counties. I believe it was a 39% drop. And at that time, we had Camp Kikaha, we had an excellent homeless coordinator of Lance Niimi. The problem is we didn't get the money fast enough. We lost our homeless coordinator, we closed Camp Kikaha. We're hoping that with the monies, hopefully it comes out now, we would be able to have the kind of wraparound services that was necessary, and we hope that we can restart it again.

"One more thing I'd like to point out, and Twinkle Borges did a wonderful job at Waianae, but what we'll need to point out, it's not only the cost of the wraparound services, but the amount of security, the cost of security. The homeless is the most criminally vulnerable of all peoples. The security costs at Camp Kikaha was high, as well as the social working cost. And I'm really glad we finally got the monies. Thank you."

Representative Luke rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you. Again, still in support. I just wanted to clarify two things. The ohana zone concept in this bill, which is different from the previous version, this allows for flexibility for operations in addition to brick and mortar. Because in Kauai, they are already ready to go, in working with the community groups, including the churches. I don't think it's a good concept that we create permanent housing using the shelter-type of model, because things for homeless community should never be really about permanent shelters in these shacks. The true goal for us is to allow some of the homeless population, who is the working poor, to transition into permanent housing. So it is not a good solution for us to say, lets give somebody tons of billions of dollars to make them permanent housing in these shacks. That's not the right approach.

"The second thing is relating to workforce development. That's why we passed two bills today, Senate Bill 2653, which the Department of Health believes this is going to be the workforce development to add more physicians and doctors to address this issue. The second thing that we did was the preceptor bill. So, it is a comprehensive approach, and we encourage members to look at other bills and see how they're all connected. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. # UNFINISHED BUSINESS

# H.B. No. 2601, HD 1, SD 2, CD 2:

Representative Belatti moved that the H.B. No. 2601, HD 1, SD 2, CD 2 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Not in support, and I think it's a good contradistinction. Even though this is the last session and the last day of the session, or let's say this is the last day of the session, day number 60, I want to remind the body that the bill like this is not necessary. We have 9.6 million visitors, we have about a billion dollars per month, we are the highest cost in our hotel rooms. This transportation cost, adding \$2 to \$3 or \$3 to \$5 to the car rental, Mr. Speaker, is not necessary, it's uncalled for. And by the way, this is not only for visitors, it's for *kama'āina*, local residents.

"I think we should not tempt to pull back the feed that we have for the golden goose, in fact this damages the cage in which it is now encased. Tourism is the goose that lays the golden eggs. Mr. Speaker, this is unnecessary, it could be the straw that pushes us over to where we are no

longer as competitive as we should be. There are a lot of nice destinations with better airports, with better hotels, with sun, sand and surf. So to me, this is a blow against the future of our industry. And Mr. Speaker, I say without mentioning the specifics, but when we've cut \$40 million out of the Hawaii Tourism Association, we are endangering ourselves even worse by increasing the cost of visitors having rental cars. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, this is not a good bill. Thank you."

Representative Todd rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Aloha, in support. I just wanted to point out that over the last 30 years, real visitor spending has actually declined, despite seeing the number of visitors increase by well over 40%. So we're actually seeing less revenue when adjusted for inflation today, despite having a dramatic increase of over 3 million in actual visitor arrivals. Thank you."

Representative Aquino rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. First, Mr. Speaker, I'd like to thank the author of the measure, the Representative from District 12, for his work on this, Finance Chair, and our Senate colleagues. This bill, Mr. Speaker, yes, will increase fees, yes, from \$3 to \$5. Yes, we are increasing the fees, Mr. Speaker, I just want to make that clear one more time, okay? The new fees are actually for non-residents who utilize our roadways and contribute to the traffic congestion we face daily on all islands, all counties.

"While there may be concerns because of the difference between resident and non-resident fees, and equal protections, Mr. Speaker, the AG's Office provided a legal analysis in a memo sent to conferees on April 25th that the language in this bill is defensible based on previous cases. Mr. Speaker, this bill seeks to supplement and stabilize our state highway fund, particularly in the area of increased capacity, which the current administration has placed a moratorium. The increased funding will help. It will not, again, Mr. Speaker, will not be at the expense of our island residents. Thank you."

Representative Luke rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you. In strong support. I would like to thank the members for this innovative approach. Securing the highway fund and sustainability of the highway fund has been a point of contention and debate for the last several years, and some of the approaches have included increasing the weight tax, increasing the gas tax, which would have impacted all residents, especially the residents who live on the Leeward Coast, and North Shore, and others, and it is not okay for us to continue to tax people who have no choice other than to live on the Leeward area. So this is an innovative way to secure additional funds for the highway fund, and in spite of the allegations, it's increasing it by \$2, not by \$5, and if you look at other bills, we did not decrease the HTA by \$40 million. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, brief rebuttal. Mr. Speaker, it is \$2 a day for local residents, it's \$3 a day for tourists. So, yeah, we get a dollar off, big deal. My point about the highway fund, and the plea for that, of course we need it, but lest we be accused of malfeasance, Mr. Speaker, you know why the highway fund doesn't have any money, because this body raided it. I repeat, this body raided the highway fund for other purposes, because of other imbalances in our budget. So, Mr. Speaker, this is correcting it, but it's putting it on the backs of the tourists, and my point is, not that they cannot afford it, but we cannot afford jeopardizing the goose that lays the golden egg, that's the whole bottom line.

"You take away tourism, what does Hawaii have in the middle of the Pacific, we got military spending, almost equivalent, but the two together make for an economy because we have not diversified our economy, and like we'll see later on later on in this agenda, we are not friendly to our small businesses so they can proliferate, so they can hire more people. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I still think this is a bad bill."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I wasn't going to speak, I was going to do written comments into the Journal, but I feel compelled, given some

of the statements on the floor. This bill, I want to thank Representative from 12th District for writing it, addresses a huge problem in our area, which is one of the top visitor areas in the state, West Maui, where we desperately need a bypass to get people in, visitors included, to their resorts. Two hours is the average drive, on a good day, for the visitors to get in.

"I invite the Representative from Hawaii Kai to talk to the visitors. I work at another job where every day I talk to tourists, and I ask them a question, talking story, would you pay a few bucks more to get to your hotel and not have to sit in that traffic for two hours? I have yet to have somebody say no. Especially with all the money they're putting in to be a part of Maui and the Maui experience, Cosmo's top 100 bucket list destination, and by the way, 10,000 more seats of lift were just added to Hawaii, a large portion to Maui.

"The visitor spending is expected to hit an all-time high, they want to come, but they want that quality of experience, and our residents deserve a quality of life, too. And what they really deserve, Mr. Speaker, is to know that we're looking out for them, and we're not going to immediately just tax them, and we're going to look to where the biggest impact is being generated, and where revenue can come that will provide for quality, not only for them, but for the visitors upon whom their economic, their satisfaction creates that economic re-diversification or reengineering, because they'll come back to Hawaii because they've had that good experience. But they come to the bypass in Lahaina, they come to the Leeward Side, and they sit two hours in traffic, you're right, those other destinations sure look a lot better.

"So I thank the author, I thank the Finance Chair and the Transportation Chair for moving this forward so that we can get the revenue for the revenue bonds to build out these projects, so we can have the capacity that the neighbor islands and others deserve to be good strong tourism partners for the State of Hawaii. Thank you."

Representative Luke rose to respond, stating:

"Okay, just a quick rebuttal. I'm reading from the bill. It says, the \$2 additional charge is for people who are without a Hawaii driver's license, so I'm not sure what the Hawaii Kai Representative is talking about. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2601, HD 1, SD 2, CD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION," passed Final Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Matsumoto, McDermott, Thielen, Tupola and Ward voting no.

Representative DeCoite rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that her written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative DeCoite's written remarks are as follows:

"I am voting with reservations on this bill because I think it could have negative impacts on my home island of Molokai because as more people adopt renewable energy technology and go off the grid, the costs for those who still need to obtain energy from the utility may end up paying more. I have heard that this has happened to several of my constituents. In addition, the state's Consumer Advocate has said in recent testimony that issues raised in this bill will be addressed by the PUC and it should be given additional time to complete its analysis of microgrids. *Mahalo*."

Representative San Buenaventura rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations, short comments. I support microgrids. I find it, however, odd that Hawaiian Electric supported this measure, but the microgrid industry themselves did not testify in favor of it. I oppose a blank check to increase our utility rates. I do hope that they do come to the table, the microgrid industry do come to the table and provide us with a utility, with a power alternative that would be cheaper for the public. And for those measures, I stand in support, but with reservations. Thank you."

Representative Onishi rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Lee rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Just for the record, I stand in strong support. I just note that of every microgrid which has been looked at in a meaningful way here in Hawaii and around the world, it's clear that this is a reasonable step forward to not only save costs over the long term, but also ensure better grid resiliency to prepare for disasters. Here in Hawaii, Parker Ranch has done a study which has found that it's cheaper to build a microgrid there than stay with the current status quo. We know that there've been multiple developments for new subdivisions and new apartment buildings around the islands that have already found that it actually would be cheaper to do an onsite microgrid than build new connections to the existing utility.

"We know that UH itself has an opportunity to microgrid many of its campuses, at cheaper costs than sticking with the status quo. And most of all, Mr. Speaker, for all the accolades we've given to Kahauiki Village, the homeless assistance project right here on Oahu, that is a de facto microgrid which was done as cheaply as possible, which ended up being a microgrid.

"These are one of the things that can change the way that we pay for our grid services going forward in partnership with our utilities, and at the same time, save everybody money, not only today upfront, but certainly over the long term. Because what we don't want, Mr. Speaker, is to end up in a situation like Puerto Rico, where we've got a disaster upon us, and we found that our grid was torn to pieces with no watertight compartments to keep services going in places where we know they can be done and done cheaper than the status quo. We've got to look forward, I think this is not only a prudent measure for saving money at the front end today, but also could save billions over the long term in the event of that sort of catastrophic event. Thank you very much."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 2110, HD 2, SD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RESILIENCY," passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives DeCoite, Onishi and San Buenaventura voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Har and Tokioka voting no.

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition. This bill is kind of a small business nuisance bill. It says that if you're a mechanic, you've got to have in your shop a big sign that says you're licensed, you've got to carry a sign or a packet or a membership card in your wallet that says you're a certified mechanic, and if you don't, you get fined \$100, or if you're a dealership, you get \$250 if you don't have the sign in the window. This session we've had kind of a sign fetish, Mr. Speaker. We've asked for signage for those people who didn't have a national franchise, we talked about the restaurant bill a couple of days ago, if you didn't have a sign in the window. A few sessions ago, we had if you were a pregnancy center and you didn't advertise abortions, you didn't have a sign regulation.

"The point is, we have a rather unfriendly business environment. This kind of encourages it. It's more of a nuisance, it's not a substantive discourager, but it's a nuisance, Mr. Speaker. The enabling environment needs to grow small businesses, because that's the future of our economy, 70% of all new jobs come out of small business. These are the guys who went to community college, who are these mechanics. Why do we want to discourage them? I've not heard of mechanics under trees taking away business from the dealers and the dealers got most of the business now already, because it's computers that basically fix the car that fix the tune up, et cetera. If you don't have all that equipment, you can't do it. So this kind of hurts the small guy, it's a nuisance, and again, uncalled for. Thank you."

# ANNOUNCEMENTS

Representative San Buenaventura: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. On this last day of session, my thoughts are with Puna. Since Monday, we have been rocked with earthquakes, multiple earthquakes. Last night, we had an alert where residents were told that an eruption was imminent at Leilani Estates, Nanawale, Pohoiki. That is south and east of the 2014 lava flow. If the lava were in fact above ground, it would have crossed Highway 130 by now. That is how far east the magma has intruded towards Kapoho.

"Although some want to evacuate, there are no evacuation centers that are open, and experts themselves do not agree whether or not an eruption is imminent. The unknown with a constant shaking of the ground is causing major stress in my community. In fact, one charter school has closed. Pohoiki, the road to the surfing beach is also closed because of cracks that are widening. Since session will be over and emergency appropriations like that that has occurred for Kauai will not occur if disaster should strike Puna, I ask for your support during the interim for any measure that the Governor may choose to do. And I ask that you keep us in your thoughts and in your prayers that Pele would spare us as it heads towards Kapoho, the site of the 1960 eruption, which decimated an entire village. Thank you."

Representative Quinlan: "It has been a momentous year, as I said last night in so many words, we did it all. We did absolutely everything. And in this endeavor, we were led by five people that I'd like to thank today on behalf of the freshmen. Speaker, Vice Speaker, Majority Leader, Majority Floor Leader, and Finance Chair, thank you guys for the last two years, for all your hard work, for all the long nights, for putting up with my antics and the rest of the freshmen, we really try hard to keep Nadine in line but it's a tough job. And so we have some leis for you that we wanted to present, and how about a big round of applause for our leadership, you guys."

Representative Mizuno: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd like to thank my staff who have been just steadfast and great. Many times, we as lawmakers get the credit, but really the staff, the entire institution behind us, they should really get the credit. I wanted to thank Christine Fehn, Charles St. Sure, Espie Badua, Amanda Patrick, and of course my wife, May Mizuno, for the great support that they give me. Mr. Speaker, I'd also like to thank you. I'd like to thank you and your entire leadership team and all the members of this body. This could be arguably the greatest legislative session in the history of our state. Significant topics as affordable housing and homelessness, consumer protection, education, environment, and healthcare were passed out of this legislature.

"Mr. Speaker and members, I'm going to ask for your kind indulgence. I'm going to go back on November 13, 2017. The Ways and Means Chair, and Speaker, you and myself, were at Queen's Hospital on that day and on that time, 12:00 noon briefing, that exact moment, my brother was rushed into the Queen's ER room. You see, he slipped and fell, and he had brain hemorrhage, massive bleeding. At that exact time, I was brought up to his room, and I got to do something that not many people get to do. I got to hold his hand and tell him I loved him. I got to have my speakerphone on so my sister could tell him she loved him. And I know you worked with my wife and said, whatever I need, we're here for you. Thank you, I'll never forget, I didn't say anything, I kept it to myself, thank you, Speaker.

"I want to thank the Majority Leader. When I was going through a most difficult time and just keeping everything inside, and she saw me and said, you look like you're holding up, are you okay? And I said, yes. And I was just broken inside. But when she said, she checked on me, that meant so much to me. I want to thank the Judiciary Chair, who I saw in the hall and he shook my hand and he said, one in a million that your brother was there and you were there with him. That meant so much to me, it kept me going. I'm so grateful. As hurt as I was, I was so grateful.

"How does this relate today? I know two things, that life is so precious and yet at a moment's notice it's precarious. So I don't know where I'm going to be next year, Mr. Speaker. I'd like to be back, but anything can happen as what happened with my brother, who I just love, who was homeless and suffered from a mental condition, and a drug addiction.

"So you see, Mr. Speaker, I want to thank you. You stepped up, told us to be bold, and our policy leaders made it a point to deal with homelessness

and affordable housing. Again, this is truly historic, \$570 million for affordable housing, over \$50 million for our homeless, we've never had a session like this ever, ever. I want to thank the Majority Leader for her leadership, especially in crafting Our Care, Our Choice. This has been a debate for over 20 years, yet when I'm looking at the bill status, in a little over a month, about 37, 38 days, your House, working with the Senate, was able to pass a most difficult bill, Our Care, Our Choice. What took 20 years was dealt with in less than 38 days, it's amazing. I could go on about the environment and the landmark legislation that was passed. I could also talk about the outstanding Education Chair and what we did for special needs children, and a landmark decision to put on a Con Am amendment, because of education for our teachers.

"I just wanted to say, Mr. Speaker, for all of us here, and I wanted to make sure I don't leave anyone out. For the Majority, the Minority Caucus we work with, your entire leadership team, Sergeant-at-Arms, Clerk's Office, House Majority Staff, House Majority and Minority Staff Offices, LRB, DAGS, Public Access, and all staff, our Senators, all staff of this great institution. I want to thank everyone. I want to thank everyone for being part of something great. The special thing about this is that greatness will be with us forever, for the rest of our lives. Thank you for everyone. Thank you, Mr. Speaker and all the members of this institution. God bless you all."

Representative Ward: "Mr. Speaker, that will be hard to follow, but on behalf of the minority, I want to thank you, leadership, freshmen, everybody, and hopefully, Mr. Speaker, this session, we've had a greater appreciation of the role of the minority. We love you guys, we're 46 to 5, we fight, but in the end it's for the sake of democracy and the people. Lastly, Mr. Speaker, I want to thank all those who have given their time, and those who six who are leaving, thank you for your service, and we're going to miss our Minority Leader, and on behalf of your caucus, we have a lei for you. So let's give Andria Tupola a round of applause."

At 11:15 o'clock a.m., Representative McDermott requested a recess and the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:16 o'clock a.m.

At this time, the Chair stated:

"As was mentioned, we do have a few members who will be rounding out their service in the House of Representatives, and we wanted to take some time to recognize them today. So first, beginning with a member of the Class of 1995, Representative Ken Ito."

At this time, the Chair recognized Representative Ken Ito, Class of 1995, who was presented with a certificate and lei by Representatives Say and Har on behalf of the Members of the House.

Representative Ito: "Mr. Speaker, first of all, I want to thank the Majority Leader for putting me number one. But thank you very much for this certificate. This is the first certificate I got in 12 terms. I wrote up a speech, and I was going to read through the text, but you know, sitting here and looking at all your faces and people that I served with for all my 24 years, it's different, it changes the whole dynamics.

"First of all, I want to thank the constituents of Kaneohe for having the trust in me with doing the job as representing their concerns. They re-elected me for 12 terms, and I want to thank them, first of all.

"Secondly, I want to thank my staff who put up with me for all these years. And some of my former office managers all moved on to greater things. First one I had was Carol, then Lisa, and Melissa, and Roxanne, and now I have Richard. I also want to thank my family for putting up with me, too, all these years, and this has been a long journey. I want to also recognize Speaker Emeritus Calvin Say. We taught together way back at Kalani High School, where he was a teacher, and he didn't stay that long, he just stayed maybe about two years or three years and then he moved on to run for office and he got in, and I see him right now, and he has been a good friend and a mentor all these years.

"When I first got elected, I was sitting on the Finance Committee, and I still remember, I was the vice chair of Intergovernmental Affairs, and the chairman at the time was Roy Takumi. And from there on, things went bad. He gave me a lot of advice, he guided me through all this turmoil, how to control the committee, and I'm really grateful for that. And I just want to say too, I think he was the best Education chairman we had. When he used the word 'pedagogy,' I said, he has arrived, because that's one of the key terms that you use in education. Primary, secondary and tertiary education. So that term was, when I heard that, I said that I really, really was impressed.

"I also worked with different committees. One of the vice chairs that I had was Sharon Har on Water & Land. People don't know this, but she has a wide expertise on early childhood education. When I was the Education chair, she represented the Lieutenant Governor Mazie Hirono, and she came down and started off the early childhood education program from the Lieutenant Governor's Office, and she did an amazing job. As far as Water & Land, oh, I tell you, that's one of the key parts that IAL came about, working with Sharon and the LRB.

"Another person that I want to recognize is Representative Mark Takai, he was vice chair for Military Affairs and then he became chairman of Military Affairs. And I really miss that man, he was a really great man, he had vision, and unfortunately he's not with us anymore. Had Jimmy Tokioka, Military Affairs, he's a fast learner. I was really, I said to myself, wow the guy knows a lot about military for a guy that wasn't in the military. So I was very impressed that he's a fast, fast learner.

"I also want to talk about Speaker Emeritus Joe Souki, he was the Finance Chair at one time when I went see him, and I wanted to get some money to buy oscilloscopes for my program at Kalani High School, and he questioned me for almost half an hour, why I need it and everything. So I told him the reason, and I talked about innovation, and that was back in the '80s now, and then he said, okay, he said he's going to see what he can do to help. And he did it, he gave me the money, I bought the oscilloscopes, but it's obsolete right now, because of technology, but I'll be forever grateful for that. He also became like family. He attended my daughter's wedding and some of our family activities, and I really appreciate him for his guidance, leadership and friendship.

"Finally, I want to wish you, Speaker Saiki, much success in your future endeavors as Speaker of the House of Representatives. I remember we both all came in in 1994, was it 94 or 95? I think it was 94, right? And we all came in, we was, just like I see these guys right here, these young four freshmen, and then I see Choy over here. Oh God, real big difference. And I can see the promise of these young people. But we all came in 1994, and Speaker, I wish you much success, again. Good luck.

"I want to end by saying that it was a privilege serving with all of you folks. But before I say that, I just want to recognize the staff that made this all, really helped me a lot. The Clerk's Office, Sergeant-at-Arms, technology especially, I had to do a lot of relearning with all the computers, LRB, House Majority Office, and all the different agencies that made my life here productive. I also want to thank the Minority Office, from time to time when John Gibo was there, I asked questions and he helped me. And also Candace, right now she's at the House Minority Office. So, all in all, we all work together, and we try to get the people's job done.

"And again, I want to say, it was a real privilege. And I came to the realization that this is my last day here in the Chamber, the last time I'm going sit on this brand-new chair, and maybe the last time I'm going to see all of you folks on a regular basis. So, again, thank you very much."

At this time, the Chair recognized Representative Isaac W. Choy, Class of 2009, who was presented with a certificate and lei by Representatives Hashem and Ichiyama on behalf of the Members of the House.

Representative Choy: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I said during my invocation that I think I'm going to be sad, and I know it's today. But Mr. Speaker, I would like to report that I was the victim of very, very appropriate kissing and hugging today. And I just want you to know that I really, really appreciate that, because I really enjoyed it. Can I say that? But Mr. Speaker,

first of all, I'll put my farewell remarks in the Journal, but I'd like to take this time just to thank everybody.

"First of all, the leadership, thank you. I know I was a pain in the butt, but I just want you to know that I meant no disrespect. I love each and every one of you, and I know you have good hearts, and I know you guys are trying your very, very best to lead this state forward, and I thank you for that.

"Specifically, I just wanted to thank people like Aunty P. in House Sergeant-at-Arms, Rod and everybody, thank you. Thank you for opening my door, I know I keep forgetting my key, I don't really carry it, so the only way I can get in is with you folks. House supply Glenn and Rudy, thank you very much. You know Glenn, you've been my friend all my life, and I really, really appreciate that. The Sheriff's Office, I come in very, very early in the morning and you guys always say good morning to me, and very, very respectfully. I really appreciate all that you do to help protect us and this particular institution.

"Printshop, Tammy, Summer, Carol and staff, thank you. I know I print a lot of weird stuff, but, actually it wasn't me, I didn't ask for anything printed, it's my office managers, they come up with all this crazy stuff. And then of course the House Clerk's Office, BT, Rupert, thank you, I really appreciate that, even your predecessors, they really, really helped me become a representative, and I really, really appreciate that. Accounting, Roger and staff, thank you for paying me, I appreciate that. And Tech, of course the Tech staff, they're always coming up to the office to help me, and it's so embarrassing because every time they come and help me, all they do is push a button or plug something in and everything works fine, and I keep telling them I could have done it myself, but that's not true, because, you know, I couldn't have done it myself. So thank you, thank you for helping me. House Journal, Emma, thank you, thank you for correcting all my grammatical mistakes and all that kind of good stuff. You actually make me sound good, because when I read back the stuff, I say, did I really say that? I think, oh, I think Emma just fixed it up for me. So I really appreciate that.

"The Public Access Room, Keanu and Virginia, you've been my friends throughout my career, I really appreciate that. House Communications, Carolyn, James, thank you. Thank you, I think you guys are doing a very, very admirable job. And of course, HMSO, Jamie, Steven, Alison, Mr. Funaki, all the attorneys, analysts and staff, thank you. Thank you for helping me, and I know I've been a pain in the ass to you. Can I say that? But that's okay. You know, but that's just one of those things. LRB, Charlotte, Shawn, I know I criticize a lot of your writing, but that's just the way I am. Maintenance, of course, our custodians are great guys, I talk to them all the time, I swear to them that the rubbish that they have to take out is not mine, it's made by somebody else, but actually it was mine. So I really appreciate that.

"Of course, all of you, my colleagues. And Representative Nishimoto, for the record, you do not have permission to marry my daughter, okay? For the record, for the record. The people who passed away, Bob, Mark, Richard, Clift, Mele, I miss them, I miss them, Mr. Speaker, and they were part of my tenure, and I will always remember them.

"And of course, my office staff, Pam, my former office manager, Carol, Hector. I always tease Pam, but I want you to know, I knew her since high school, and I definitely aged better than she did. Please don't strike that too, okay. And finally, Mr. Speaker, if you could, could you please send a message to Mayor Kirk Caldwell? Please tell him, if he ever screws up on his paperwork again, I ain't running. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At this time, the Chair recognized Representative Beth Fukumoto, Class of 2013, who was presented with a certificate and lei by Representatives Johanson and Nishimoto on behalf of the Members of the House.

Representative Fukumoto: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I've never actually, which, this is going to be surprising because of everything that has gone on in the last six years here, I've never actually cried on the floor, but I'm positive it's going to happen today, so I'm warning everybody right now. I tried writing this speech a couple of times and ended up writing it while we were sitting here, so it looks like this. But it was a hard speech to write because I haven't even come to terms with the fact that I'm leaving. That was

so fast. I tried to write it, I tried to have other people write it for me, I thought maybe there was a way to power through and not get sad. There isn't, so I'm going to be sad.

"This building, this is my 10th session, and I think a lot of people don't know that. When I first walked into this building, I was just, Gene's going to make me cry, he's looking at me. When I first walked into this building, I applied for a job, just looking at an ad in the paper that said that the Minority Research Office was hiring. And this is supposed to be funny and it's like not going to be funny because I'm crying, but anyway, I answered this ad that the Minority Research was hiring, and I came in for the interview thinking that I was actually applying for a job to research ethnic minorities, and I thought, hey that makes sense because we have a lot of ethnic minorities in Hawaii. I knew so little about politics that I didn't know who I was interviewing with.

"So I got in and my interviewer said to me, you know this is the Republican office, right? I said, sure, I don't care, I just need a job. I was 25, I was just out of graduate school, my master's degree, it cost me a lot of money and I had tons of student debt, and I said, okay, it's the recession, I just need a job, I'm going to do this, and the job was filing papers. And that's what I did, I just filed papers, every day, with a master's degree, 2,000 pages every day, testimony, everything, before we were paperless, and I just sat around and listened.

"And I knew I was struggling. I knew my family was struggling, as I said, it was the recession, I couldn't find another job, I couldn't move out of my parent's house. And I looked around and I felt like a lot of the decisions that were being made were being made by only a few people who had a lot of power but weren't really in touch with the average working people in the state. And I felt that a lot of those decisions were being made for other people with power, being made for people with wealth and influence and not really being made for average people, and so I thought I should run for office, and maybe we just needed new voices. And I was so antiestablishment that I thought, maybe the way to do this is to run as a Republican and run out, completely outside the fold of power.

"But I got in here, and I met so many of you who also were frustrated with the status quo, and I didn't know you were there. And getting to know you all, getting to work with you all has been such a blessing. But what I really want to say, especially today, to the Speaker, to the Majority Leader, to the JUD Chair, to the Finance Chair especially, you all have made more progress here, in this one year, in a way that I never expected, in a way that I never believed could even happen. I had given up hope of change in this body and in this state. And you all made progress on things that I didn't think that we even cared about anymore. And that you did that made me very proud to be a member of the Democratic Party, made me very proud to be a member of a Majority Caucus that actually believes in democratic values and actually wants to advance those values, and allowed me the opportunity to do the things that I always cared about, and all I ever wanted to do was to make things easier for the people of the state, and I think we actually did that this session. So, thank you. Thank you for being different. Thank you for showing me that the status quo is not always going to control the state, and thank you for letting me be a part of that.

"The other people that I feel like I really want to thank right now, and the people that, it's their fault that I'm crying already, we have a giant group text, and some of you are up there, but we have a giant group text in my staff going on. I've had so much change over the course of the last 10 sessions, more change than I think most people have in their entire lives, more challenges, and more uphill battles. And the people that have always been with me are my staff. We have a group text going right now, with people all over the country watching this speech, because they feel so invested in everything that we've tried to do over the course of the last 10 years. And I want to thank them, I want to thank them for having my back always, for listening to me every time I came back and lost hope in things ever being different.

"And I want to thank everybody that was there from the very beginning, but especially I want to thank Candy Kelsey, who's up there, because she was the one that was in charge of making sure I filed papers in the right place from the beginning. Aunty P. who let me into my office also all the time because I got locked out, I hope you've noticed that I get locked out

less now. I want to thank my family who has believed in me, and believed in me even when I didn't believe in myself, has always been willing to step up even when I didn't want to go out sign waiving, my dad did it, and I couldn't have done any of this without them.

"And last but not least, I want to thank the people of Mililani who gave me this chance, who took a chance on some kid that just knocked on their door over and over and over again, and eventually badgered them into voting for me. And to be able to be a part of their history and the history of our town has been an enormous blessing that I'll carry with me for the rest of my life. Thank you."

At this time, the Chair recognized Representative Kaniela Ing, Class of 2013, who was presented with a certificate and lei by Representatives Nakashima and Lowen on behalf of the Members of the House.

Representative Ing: "Today I feel my parents with me, I feel my grandparents with me, especially from my maternal side. My Japanese-American grandpa and my Portuguese-Spanish-American grandma first met at the statehood celebration on Maui in 1959, and they told me the most extraordinary stories of solidarity in old Hawaii. They taught me to reflect fondly on our plantation history but remember that that history is one of struggle. Their parents were among the brave workers who organized across genders and races, mashed up their own unifying language, Hawaiian Pidgin English, built an unbreakable coalition, and took it to the streets by unionizing and going on strike. Some were shot and killed by their corporate bosses, simply for demanding a \$2 wage and an 8-hour work day.

"And my parents told me to always smile, but never forget that Hawaii was built on stolen land, with stolen labor, and to remember and remain inspired by how immigrant and indigenous workers stood together to shape life in our islands. I know that if my great grandparents did not stand up to the corporate establishment of their time, I'd still be on the plantation. And that's what guided me throughout my life, from picking pineapples as a teenager after my father passed, to these six years with all you guys. I worked to make my district, my lāhui, and my grandparents proud.

"Since our first day in office, we have expanded voting access through same-day voter registration, kept fracked natural gas out of our islands, raised the minimum wage, demanded equal pay for equal work, led the nation in transgender rights, set the nation's first 100% renewable energy goal, and ban on toxic chemicals, we protected our  $k\bar{u}puna$ , we provided compassion to those facing death, and we secured record funding for South Maui, ensured the right to marry, and so much more. But our work's not done. The labor leaders of yesteryear, the Sakada, have passed into myth, and attacks against workers are at a generational high.

"The privileged few are once again stripping away the opportunity our  $k\bar{u}puna$ , my grandparents, risked their lives to build. Hawaii is becoming a playground for the ultra-rich. Forty percent of us aren't making enough to meet our basic needs, 70% of us now are living paycheck to paycheck, just one car crash or medical emergency away from going under. The average, the median home is now \$770,000, which means coming out of high school or college, you've got to be making \$200,000 just to enter the middle class and own a home. So the economy is rigged against our generation, we're not set up to succeed. These are radical problems that demand bold solutions. So yes, we should strive to bring everyone to the table, but too often, the people with the biggest bags of money and best lawyers on the table win. Sometimes we've got to build a bigger table.

"Seventy percent of my classmates moved to the mainland. I now have a 2-year-old son, and I just want him to have a shot to make it here, 16 years from now. And I trust that if we continue to amplify the voices of all who speak truth to power, with *aloha*, then you all make that happen. I have faith in all of you.

"Here are 10 things that I've learned from each of you throughout my time here. Number one, be driven by values, look for goodness in others, and be consistent. Two, there's always a reason not to do something, that's where most of us end up. If you want to bring about change, you have to do something, so get in there. Three, the experts won't save you, neither will your own brilliant ideas, it's all about the questions you ask and where you

look. The further you are from the people most impacted, the less likely you are to get the right answer. Four, there's nothing more powerful than an idea whose time has come, be able to see those moments and seize those opportunities, it'll be in these moments when maximum social change is possible.

"Five, there are always people within a system who have the right answer within the system, are working towards it, and face unreasonable, often arbitrary resistance. Figure out how to identify those people, and shift power in their direction. Six, your truth is important, and you should fight for it, but it's not the only truth. Others have experiences that are also valid, and your job isn't to deny that. If you just focus on attacking the truths of others, you will wear yourselves down, and others. Seven, figure out how to compliment those who are working towards similar goals. Just because your tactics or strategies are different does not mean that you don't both have a critical role. You're not going to win by spending all your time fighting your allies. Even when they appear to be fighting you, they may actually be helping to expand what is possible and assisting you in achieving your goals, so swallow your pride.

"Eight, sometimes, the most important thing you can do is create space for voices who are often unheard, and do your part to make sure that they have that space. They will take it from there, and you will shift the paradigm. Nine, foster creativity and openness. Don't think of all the reasons why something won't work, think about what can work and start there, before something. Ten, systems tend to funnel power and influence through the top. If you can fight that movement and keep power closer to the people most impacted, you're most likely to make social change.

"I've spent half my adult life here, as a triangle in a square building. I'm in this suit, and it feels like I'm out of my skin half the time. Growing up, no one thought that would be me. You know, I was into music, bodyboarding, I had dreadlocks at one point. And when I first ran, I could count the amount of people who thought I'd have a shot on one hand, and half of them lived at my mom's house. And sometimes it feels like the longer I swim in this soup, the more I think that's what the world tastes like. But it's important for people like me to be here. People that don't come from money or power, whose parents never went to college. I know it matters because I remember growing up, and seeing like, you know, Senator Akaka on TV, and Colleen Hanabusa, from Waianae, and people who talk like me, who dress like me, who look like me, and I was like, man, you know, maybe this is something that I could do, even though none of my parents, my friends' parents were doctors or lawyers, especially politicians.

"So, we got to reconnect with the people in our community. The stuff we do here is important, but real change only really comes from leading the people while being one with the people, to take our Hawaii back. For too long, we grew the sandalwood to build their mansions. We picked the pineapple, they drank the juice. We cut the cane, them the cake. But we have learned the lessons of our forbearers. We too are building people together across genders and races, no matter where they're born, who they love, how they identify, how they walk, if they walk, how they talk, and we are rising up to offer breath to generations yet unborn.

"So thank you all for fighting with me, I've learned so much from all of you, especially to my class, 2012. My mentors, and the rest of you, leadership, I see the *aloha* and love and care in all your hearts. Even in times we disagree or see the world differently, I have no doubt that each and every one of you are in here for the right reasons to serve our state. And I feel my grandparents here and I can see that they're proud of all of us.

"And most importantly, I'm thankful for the people of South Maui, for trusting me with this incredible responsibility, at 23 years old. We secured record funding for our district, hundreds of millions, Kihei High School is finally under construction. We have the most beautiful district in Hawaii, not just because Makena Beach, our world-class sunsets, the chill vibe, but because of the people, the kindest people you'll ever meet, in Kihei. They'll just stop you on the street and just chat you up. When you're talking to someone, it doesn't feel like you're taking away from their productivity, it really has that sense of commons and community that's so rare today. So just, thank you people of South Maui for your kindness. I love you all and will always treasure this incredible privilege.

"And big *mahalo* for my staff for making it happen, especially this session. Kory, Alan, Yvette, Alan, and most importantly, again, my *mahal ko*. Mahal ko, I love you. And lastly, to the lāhui. Hawaiians, take heart in one another. Even though we make up 40% of the homeless population, and that there are more of us outside of Hawaii than here, we've got to keep the faith, they will not crush us. If you're ever feeling weak, just remember where you come from, remember that we have, if you're Hawaiian and you're alive today, you come from the strongest of the bloodlines that our ancestors faced, famine, all sorts of diseases that were introduced in our islands, some really tough times. So, you are strong, all right.

"My great-great-great-great grandmother, she was in the Kalaupapa settlement, she had Hansen's disease, and the policy at the time was, if you have a child, that child needs to stay within the colony. But before the baby was able to contract the disease, she had it snuck away by the mailman to live with her brother on Maui. So she made that ultimate sacrifice, to allow our family to continue. I would not be here today if not for her sacrifice. Her history was erased, erased by folks that sought to oppress our culture. I didn't even know our name was Kekipi until a cousin of mine, coming out of law school, decided to get some, go really deep into genealogical research. It was changed to Davis. We were ashamed of our Hawaiian name. So when Laguna was born, we gave him the name of Kekipi, which means the rebellion, or the resistance, and this resistance will carry on for generations. And when I look out to Hawaiians all across the nation, all across the state, I see people coming, going to university, obtaining higher degrees in record numbers, becoming doctors, lawyers, business owners, social movement leaders, and almost as if we're building a new nation. So, 'onipa'a kākou, and thank you so much, everybody."

At this time, the Chair recognized Representative Jarrett Keohokalole, Class of 2015, who was presented with a certificate and lei by Representatives Evans and San Buenaventura on behalf of the Members of the House.

Representative Keohokalole: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I want you folks all to know before I start that there are a bunch of lines crossed out. Brevity was my intention. When I start to go on a rant, I just want you to know, I tried to cut it, make it short. So I'm going to start by stealing part of Isaac Choy's speech, he did a much better job at taking the time to identify all of the people who are just crucial parts of this building that make this place work. But identifying them by name, which is really appropriate and well deserved, for all of you folks. So everyone who makes this building function, you folks deserve that recognition, I really appreciate all the work that you do.

"Also, I really appreciate how professional everyone is. I don't like to be referred to as Representative, in part because I was staff here, and I thought that a lot of you folks were just stuffy jerks. But the staff that do it, they, even after I, my first year I went around and told people don't, you can just say Jarett, and they refused. And they refused because they're professionals, because you folks take your jobs seriously, and you understand that there's a role to play in making this building work, and this building serves the people. And I just want to take a second and recognize that that professionalism is much appreciated by me, and, and I'm sure many other members. So for all of the folks, the staff that make the building work, my office staff who really serve the people of the district really fantastically, I really appreciate the work that you folks put in, so thank you for that.

"I'd also like to thank, again, the members of my community who chose to allow me to come here. It's been one of the greatest privileges of my life. I spent my whole, actually, I thought about it, I've wanted to be a lawmaker since I was nine years old. I can't remember what movie it was that I watched, but I remember thinking, yeah, I want to do that. And ever since then, really it's been twists and turns. I spent a lot of time screwing around in college and things like that, but it's always been, I've always been trying to kind of prepare to eventually get here, so that when the opportunity arose that I'd be ready and deserving of it, and then I did it, and now it's over. I was talking with Beth about it last night, it was so fast, and it's amazing that it's over, and I'm really just grateful and privileged to be here.

"I think we did good things this session, and I'm really proud to have been a part of it, if only a small part. I think this session really was a high note in my short tenure here, which is as good a point to depart as I can think of. So I'm happy that we got what we got done, and I know that there's lots of work to continue to do, there will always be work in this building, and I'm happy to have played a part in what we were able to accomplish.

"I know as time goes by, I'm going to forget a lot of things about my time here, but I do know that there are moments that have taken place throughout my time here that I will never forget, especially the moments where I learned lessons. Some of those moments are definitely going to stick with me, and I'm thankful for that. To be on this floor, in this Chamber, and a part of these debates, I'm going to remember very fondly. I'm proud to be able to go on for the rest of my life and say that I was here. I was here for these arguments, for these debates. I appreciate the minority, even the members of the majority that we've debated with, like I said, I'm proud to say that I was a part of this, that I was on the floor, in the room.

"A friend of mine told me recently that he admires the perch that we sit on in this Chamber, because of how much we get to see. And when he said that, that really reminded me of the weight of the responsibility we also carry, and it reminded me of one of these moments that I'm going to never forget. And it was in a Finance Committee hearing, and there was a member here, I'm going to screw up exactly what happened, so they know who they are. But we were having a debate, I think with the counties, we were jousting with them over some issue, I don't even remember what it was. But this person made a point to tell a story about when the recession hit, and how this Chamber had to reduce the budget by I think a billion dollars, and he said, you know, and people died, and he said it in a really casual, like terse manner, and it was meant to deliver a message to the people that we were discussing, but it hit me. It hit me right in my heart, and I'll never forget it, because that's the weight of the responsibility that we carry.

"We make decisions here and they affect people's lives, and if we don't take that seriously, then it's really, I think that's really unfortunate. And I don't think that it's something that's lost on the members. It's just, because of the way this process works, and the weight, the scope of the responsibility we have, it's easy to forget about that. But I'll never forget it, because it's real. It had a big impact on me, because the first couple of years, actually all the way until really this session, I just spent the majority of the time, it might not have looked this way, because I tried really hard to hide it, but I spent the majority of my time just stumbling around this building trying to figure out what to do. How to keep up with all of you talented people, how to understand what's going on and how I can make an impact. And so, it made me realize that people are suffering. We have to take this job seriously, and we're not going to save everybody, we just can't do it. And so we have to do our best to just take that responsibility seriously. And so I respect all of you and admire all of you for joining me in taking this responsibility seriously, and coming here.

"It's really easy to talk about all the things that are wrong in our society and in our state, and criticize and grumble. It's even easy to talk about how you could do a better job than the people here. And, you know, maybe you should. And then you get to the point where it gets hard, that line right there, where you have to actually make the decision to go for it. Isaac always jokes about how he got pushed into it. Yeah, but we all had a choice, we all had to make a decision to come here, and you folks did, you took the responsibility and you did it, and I admire that a lot.

"Too often, the public only sees the worst side of the Legislature, the worst aspects of the Legislature. The fights and the pettiness that are real, because this is a body made up of human beings, and that's a part of what it means to be a human being, we're going to fight, and sometimes it's going to get ugly, and it gets ugly because it matters, because people are taking it seriously. So, the other side of this legislature that I think the public doesn't get to see enough, and that I've gotten, really just recently, like in the last couple of months, in my fourth year here, is really coming to understand how to craft solutions to fix some of these problems. It's really taken me that long, and it comes from understanding different perspectives.

"Some of the other members have talked about how we don't get along, and sometimes it's just because we see things differently, but we represent different perspectives in our communities, and they all matter. And the only way to really fix things is to genuinely take a moment and try and figure out exactly what the underlying values are of the people who you disagree with,

because at the end of the day we're really not that far apart. And if you don't take, if you don't understand and appreciate that, then it's hard to get to a solution. So we've done some of that this year, and I think that really does reflect the moments when the Legislature is at its best. When we see a serious, significant issue come to light, and we all just take a moment and realize that it's our responsibility to fix it, and the grownups take over, and everybody puts aside their differences, and we solve problems. Kauai is a great example, I hope that we do that with Puna, and I'm confident that we will, because people in this building care. That's the whole point of this.

"It's been a real blessing to be here with you all. I'm truly honored that for the rest of my life, I get to say that I was here with you folks, even for just a short time. And I also deeply appreciate the lessons that I have learned. And I want to take a moment to just say, for those of you folks, and you know who you are, who took extra time, when you didn't have to put politics aside, or whatever was going on. You took extra time to sit with me and teach me, I really appreciate it. I didn't always do what you folks wanted me to do, but I was listening, and I learned, and it's because of that that I learned, because people took the time to sit me down and teach me, and take my calls when I asked, and answer my questions when I asked them. So, thank you.

"And I want you folks all to know, and it'll go in the record, I don't know if many members of my district are listening, but I do want you folks to know that you have gotten my very best. You folks have pulled it out of me, I have done, this is the best version of me that has ever existed, and it's because of you folks, because of the talented people that are in this building, and watching, and trying to keep up with you guys, and like I said, figure out how I can make an impact and be a part of the progress. So, it's been a challenge, I love challenges, and I'm grateful for it, I'm very grateful for the experience. So thank you all very much. Aloha."

At this time, the Chair recognized Representative Matthew S. LoPresti, Class of 2015, who was presented with a certificate and lei by Representatives Takayama and Belatti on behalf of the Members of the House.

Representative LoPresti: "Mr. Speaker, I rise to announce that I will not be seeking reelection to the House of Representatives. And I know that may surprise some of you, but I rise to say farewell. I did not come here to make a career change. I came here because I believe that the Founding Fathers built a brilliant system of government, whereby normal people, normal citizens, would step up, take time out of their lives, and serve their country, and I've done that. And so I'm going to move on. But, hopefully, maybe to the other side of the building, we'll see. It's been a true honor and a privilege to serve with each one of you. Pardon me, I get emotional. And I hear that term a lot, and to say it and have meaning, it really feels different, to say what an honor and a privilege it's been.

"I want to give my *aloha* to my colleagues, to leadership, for honoring me, just a second term rep, with a chairmanship, I'm very honored by that. To thank my staff, without whom I couldn't have done anything, I'd be completely lost. Charles and Natalia, Randy, Rihui, Jun and all my previous staff and my previous interns. Gosh, I didn't think I'd get choked up, sorry. I want to thank the staff, minority, majority leadership, and majority, minority parties. I want to thank Sergeant-at-Arms and Chief Clerk's for being consummate professionals. I want to thank all the advocates who come here every day. I want to thank the journalists, I want to thank even the lobbyists, who work very hard on behalf of their clients. But more than any of these, I want to thank my wife for being my best and most sincere critic. I want to thank my family for their loving support for this extremely difficult job, and I want to express my heartfelt gratitude to all my constituents in Ewa and Ewa Beach for believing in me and trusting me to represent them and their families' interests in state government.

"Many people from so many different backgrounds and interest groups and constituents encourage me again and again to stand for some other position, and I said no, again and again, because of what I was said earlier, I just wanted to serve a few years and get on with my life. I know I made a difference where I am, and right here in the people's House with you. But after going back and forth in my head and my heart, and my friends and family, many times, I came to realize that I sincerely can make even more of a difference by staying involved in government and asking the people I

represent, those in the larger community, to consider me for something else. This was not an easy decision. In all honesty, I've considered quitting many times. As many times as I've considered other things, when I weigh my passion to serve, the struggles this place has, how it's negatively affected my health in some ways, and to be completely honest, how it's negatively affected my outlook of human nature in many ways, and I do not say that lightly.

"At the end of the day, when all things are said and done, I just want to make this world a better place for my children to inherit. I want them to have forests and reefs, where wild things thrive and grow. I want them to know peace because they live in a society defined by justice, not a retributive kind of justice, mind you, but a society filled with restorative justice, economic justice, a generational justice, and where inequities are dealt with openly and honestly, and where all those who come to the table are treated with dignity and respect. We do not have that world. We do not yet have that kind of system, at least not yet. In truth, I think many systems are like this, but if you're not at the table, you're on the menu. If you speak your truths and use your voice in a way that makes other uncomfortable, even here, you pay a price for it.

"You see, I come from academia, I'm a professor, you all know that. And I tell my students at the beginning of every semester that my job is to make you feel uncomfortable, to make you challenge your own beliefs, not to disrespect them, not to even get them to change their minds, but rather to really challenge themselves and the way that they see the world and how to act in it. I've brought that here, but you, my peers, are not my students, you're my peers. And if I've ever offended any of you, I'm deeply sorry, it's never been my intent, only to challenge you as I challenge myself every day.

"So how do we change this place for it to be even better, how do we do this? There's many simple ways. My momma, Martha Ellen Shelton Lopresti, taught me to always speak my mind, even if my voice shook, for example, and I stood alone. And I'm reminded by, if I can use some art history, Norman Rockwell's painting of freedom of speech. He painted this in response to FDR's speech on the Four Freedoms, January 6, 1941. And when I've looked at it over the years, it's always reminded me to have courage to speak. But as I grow, it reminds me to have courage to listen to those who speak.

"Siddhartha Gautama, also known as the Buddha, he taught us many things that I believe are applicable to this job and this place, maybe I'll write about it someday. But one of the things that stands out as I wrote this, just this morning, because I didn't know what the heck I was going to say, he talked about, we have to have the right intent, and from that we get right speech, and from that we get right action. But without that speech part in the middle, being free and unfettered, we cannot get from an envisioned world of peace and justice, to one that resembles it.

"Therefore, I say to everyone here and outside, speak, speak your truth, and you will have those who listen. Speak your mind, and say yes when you mean yes, and no when you don't. Don't be afraid to stand in the light of the truth that you bear witness to, and also stand comforted in the light of the values that guide you, even if others do not share those values. Speech is that bridge between intent and action that can show all who you really are, and what you really think and believe. And without robust, respectful debate, tempered by reason and goodwill, we cannot make but a middling progress towards a better world. Though I'm very proud that this session, I think we really did do a heck of a job, and I'm proud to have served with you, especially this session.

"But if we cannot and do not share ideas in the public sphere with one another respectfully, how can we ever expect to form a just society in a world that we must all peaceably share? Even as a young student in high school and as a Boy Scout, I learned the value of speech, especially when I disagreed with it. And I committed myself then as I do now to encourage the use of free speech, even that with which I disagree with. And though I may disagree with you, I'll always fight for your right to speak. Democracy cannot properly function, much less flourish, without the protection of dissenting voices.

"We, elected officials especially, must be vigilant and mindful as to how this job changes a person, so that those of us in power do not lose touch with the people and do not lose sight of the passions and values that led people to vote for us in the first place. We worked so hard to get here. Nobody knows that like we do, how much hard work it takes to get here, and it's frightening to consider leaving. But I feel humbled, I feel grateful, and I feel free in leaving. Keep that spirit alive, and that drive alive that got you here. Put it to work on policy, and you cannot fail to do the work of the people. Thank you for making room for me to bring my spirit and drive and ethic to bear on the very good work that we've done together here in my short time. *Mahalo* and *aloha*."

At this time, the Chair recognized Representative Andria P.L. Tupola, Class of 2015, who was presented with a certificate and lei by Representatives Belatti and Ward on behalf of the Members of the House.

Representative Tupola: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. First off, I want to thank those previous speakers, thank my colleague from Ewa Beach. Thank the philosopher, for four years we've been hearing his philosophies and I think it's changed us, I think it's helped us to think and ponder. And I want to thank my colleague from Kaneohe. Thanks for your words. I think what you said is so true, that we get passionate because we believe that it's the right thing to do here. We get passionate because we care so much, so much that it hurts us sometimes. I want to thank my Hawaiian musician from Maui for all that he does to speak out for Hawaiian rights. I want to thank my colleague from Mililani, as well. You know, we've had some times, and she definitely was part of the first part of my journey, and I want to thank her for her words. My colleague from Manoa, who's ever so inappropriate but very knowledgeable, I want to thank him for being so astute to how many different people have made a difference for each and every one of us in this building. So many people we can't even say all their names, there's so many people here that make this place go round. To my colleague from Kaneohe, wisdom, just pure elderly wisdom. When I sit with him, I feel like I'm getting counseled by my own father. So, thank you so much.

"I would be remiss if I didn't thank my district. As many of you know, I love the people of Waianae with all my heart. For me, not being a lawyer, not having any kind of background to do this job, and thinking in my head that I could get elected and make a difference for people, I have to say thank you to them because they trusted me. The girl from Hawaii Kai, the one that everyone was skeptical about, because they didn't know. And my main purpose in becoming a legislator was just to serve them, to see what I could do to help my community. And I feel like I've tried my best, as my colleague from Kaneohe stated, put it all out there, left everything on the field. I wanted to go back to teaching so many times, but I said, if I'm going to be a legislator, I'm going to do it all the way. I'm not going to do side-jobs, I'm not going to teach piano or voice on the side, I'm just going to legislate, I'm going to figure out how to do this, I'm going to do it to the best of my ability, and that's what I did for the past four years.

"I want to thank my staff members, definitely my office manager, my assistants, HMIR, Marcia, HMIR that's up there as well. I have to say thank you, because it is no joke to work for me. I run it hard and I run it hard every single day. I think we just finished our 40th town hall. Because every single time something happens in the community, boom, I'm doing a town hall, boom, we're trying to strategize, we're trying to solve things. And I know for people who work in my office, it's not easy, because I want to do so many things, so fast, all the time, and I definitely come in like a wrecking ball, if not even stronger. And it's definitely couldn't have done it without a team of people that cared. I mean, I'm sure they probably talked to their other friends down the hall and like, does your boss make you go pick up trash? We do all kinds of stuff. But to me, the intention was, in order to be a legislator, we needed to understand our people, understand our district, I wanted everyone to know who worked in my office that my vision was only to serve the people, every single day. And if people in my office didn't understand that we were here to serve the people, then we needed to change it, because we are here to serve. We are here to make a difference and a impact in our community.

"I want to thank Sergeants. Rod, you're awesome. Your staff, I know this sounds funny, but I love them so much, I feel like they're kind of protectors over all of us. Rupert, Brian, Emma, thanks for listening to all of our conversations and being so levelheaded about everything. Thanks to

Accounting, to Clerks, to the Custodians, to Gaya, I know she's up there. Every time she walks in our office she brings such a joy to us.

"I wanted to thank my family, definitely, my husband who came along with me, kicking and screaming, didn't want any of this, didn't want any kind of publicity. And I have to share a small story about how he helped me. Couple years ago, when a lot of things were going on, and you guys know how it is, you're always on the news, you're saying stuff, people are commenting about the stuff you said, and I remember going home, and gosh I must have been in the news cycle for so many days that I just wanted it to be over because it was just getting so harsh. And I remember coming home and looking at my husband, thinking he was going to cry, hug me, and he laughed, and I was like, whoa, what in the world. And he said, I don't think you want to hear what I have to say to you. I said, no, by all means say it to me, tell me what you're thinking. And he said, Andria, I am a public servant too, and he said, do you see anybody crying for me? He said, no, because you voluntarily got into public service. So pull up your pants, stop crying, stop feeling sorry for yourself, get back out there. He said, do what you have to do, don't care what people have to say, do it with the right intentions, and don't look left and right, and don't let it affect you. And I remember thinking like, all right, I can do this, let's do this. And just like my colleague from Ewa Beach said, it gets tough. There are days that are tough, that you feel like, man, was I supposed to do this? But every day you come back and you remember, yes, I was. Yes, I was supposed to do this. This is why I'm here.

"And I wanted to thank my colleagues, my caucus members. Lauren for being an awesome mom. Giving birth, nursing baby, coming to work, holding town halls, still getting mailers out, she's an example. To my colleague Cynthia, my goodness, I've never seen a woman of your age just fight, fight. This lady is something else. When I'm your age, I want to be just like you. She's an example of somebody who doesn't let down, and she has taught me so much. My colleague Bob, even with all the explicit words, he is still somebody that is been on my side, on my left, all the time. To my colleague from Hawaii Kai, who was actually my Rep. when I was a kid and now I'm sitting alongside him. He even gave a certificate to one of my family, I mean this is how long he has been here giving service. And I know sometimes we get so irritated, because of the point of the point of order, and all of the different rules that Gene makes up that don't exist. But I definitely think that without him, we wouldn't be having as much fun here, we wouldn't be smiling and laughing. And so, my colleagues have definitely helped me to become a better person. I thank them for giving me their trust. I thank them for allowing me to lead, even as somebody who has probably less years in the Legislature than all of them.

"And lastly, I just wanted to say that for me, I definitely think that there is, everyone here wants to get results. Everyone here wants, whether it's an appropriation, a bill, a resolution, and for me, the only desired result I ever wanted was just growth. I just wanted to grow. And I think for me, growth comes with risk, and I took that risk when I did it the first time, and I'm doing it again, and I had that impression when I spoke at a community meeting on one of the neighbor islands. I had that impression come to me, Andria you can help more people, prepare yourself now, and I want to. I want to make myself available for service as long as I can, because it feeds my soul. It helps me to remember that that's what our purpose here is, is to make the lives of other people better. And I know we have all different ways of how to do that. And I thank you, every single person, all 51 of you, and I wrote you each a card, because that's how much I care.

"I want to thank you for allowing me to be me. Because sometimes the things that I do maybe were unacceptable, maybe I spoke out of turn, maybe I asked too many questions, maybe I showed up at the hearing with too many binders, because as an educator, I wanted to get an A in every hearing. Every time I came back, I was like, yes, I think I got an A. No one's giving out grades, but I was making sure that I was getting As. I was making sure that I was raising my hand, asking questions. And so I want to thank you for just letting me be me. And I know that I do things different, I know that sometimes I do things that are out of step, I know some legislators pull me aside, like, Andria you vote no way too many times, I'm like, I know, I just, it just feels so good.

"And so I know that the way that I do things may or may not be acceptable, but like my colleague stated, I wanted to be me. I wanted to be able to serve and stay true to who I was, and I want to thank all of you guys for allowing

me to do that. Thank you for allowing me my musical-isms, for being able to sing whenever I wanted to sing, for allowing me to ask questions even though everyone knew the answer and I didn't know the answer. I want to thank everyone for helping me to become a better person, and I know these past four years have been such a blessing in my life. It's changed everything about who I am, and even if it was four years, I am so grateful to each and every one of you for helping me to become the person that I am.

"And I hope that as we look forward, that each and every one of us can remember, there are many beginners, very few finishers. So finish strong every single day. Finish hard and be who you know that you are. Don't be somebody else, be the best version of yourself in anything you do. And remember that the desired result that any of us is looking for is growth. And if you have to take a risk, take a risk. Grow, expand, even if it hurts, and that's why I'm so grateful today. And I'm actually excited. I'm excited for the new doors that are opening. I'm excited for a new future, I'm excited for all of you. And I wish you all the best in everything you do in all your future endeavors. Thank you."

The Chair then recognized Representative Belatti, the Majority Leader, to deliver closing remarks on behalf of the Majority Caucus:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Wow, those are really hard speeches to follow. I'll start with the customary thank you. Thank you for all of our constituents who allow us to be in these seats for these two fleeting years that we serve. Thank you to all of our staff members, our legislative support offices, the Clerk's Office, Sergeant-at-Arms Office, House Majority Staff Office, House Minority Research Office, and the Legislative Reference Bureau. You make us look good every day of the week.

"I'm going to go a little off script, I want to thank the members of the Majority Caucus, and you, Mr. Speaker. There is no singular blueprint for what it means to be majority leader, and I'm going to steal some of the words of my co-Majority Policy Leader. I was stumbling around this place quite a bit, keeping up with all of our chairs, all of our members, and it has been a real privilege to serve as the House Majority Leader.

"Mr. Speaker, when you convened this session, you asked this Chamber to confront two interrelated challenges, the dearth of affordable housing units and a worsening homelessness situation. Though many felt that addressing these problems was akin to trying to farm in barren fields, your members and your leadership team remained undaunted and stood up to prove them wrong. Your members met during the interim to till the soil and stood beside your committee chairs as they sowed the seeds that were their very best proposals.

"Your members and your leadership teams stood behind those chairs as these ideas sprouted in committee during numerous community conversations, conversations involving service providers, those living in homelessness, and yes, even conversations with members of the executive branch. These ideas grew during crossover. Finally, even in the headwinds of conference and criticism, your members and your leadership team stood firm, sometimes misunderstood, but confident that we were doing what was best for our state.

"Mr. Speaker, our labor has made this a productive session on our top priorities. Not only did we allocate \$570 million to build 25,000 affordable units by 2030, fulfilling the promise we made to begin addressing the State's housing crisis, we also committed \$50 million to help people transition out of homelessness and into permanent housing. This commitment includes the \$50 million in flexible funding to the Governor's agencies that can be used for tried and true programs such as Rapid Re-Housing, Housing First, First-to-Work, Housing Placement, and the state Rent Supplement Program.

"This commitment also includes pilot programs that will engage the private sector and our executive agencies that stand eager and ready to address these community problems, to build ohana zones, work with our overtaxed emergency department rooms as they continue to deal with high utilizers of their service, to work with police officers and social workers in communities across three islands to address the social service needs of individuals in settings that are far, far less expensive than our jails and prisons.

"Mr. Speaker, our labor continued to the very last days of session, until last night, in fact, to this morning, when we passed Senate Bill 2791, to enable our agencies, without being handcuffed, to bring to fruition juvenile justice reform that will by next session help some of the most vulnerable living on our streets, homeless youth and youth who are survivors of human trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation.

"Mr. Speaker, our labor has made this a productive session, beyond affordable housing and homelessness, that has yielded a bounty of responsive, forward-looking legislation. We passed the Our Care, Our Choice Act, to give competent, terminally ill adults control over how they spend their final days. We passed voting by mail for the island of Kauai to move our election systems forward. We passed sensible bills targeted to assist survivors of domestic violence, to protect them against financial abuse, against revenge porn, and to keep the locations of these survivors confidential from their assaulters.

"We passed groundbreaking environmental and energy laws that continue us on our path of achieving 100% renewable energy, protect our *keiki*, and improve the health and wellbeing of our watersheds, our reefs and our oceans. We invested money into Hawaii's future by funding Hawaii's community college Promise Program and the Department of Education's Early College Program.

"Amidst all of this, Mr. Speaker, we rallied as a legislature to respond to April's devastating floods on Kauai, East Honolulu, and Waimanalo, appropriating \$125 million to help our communities and businesses rebuild. And now, we watch with bated breath as our Pahoa and Puna communities are living in fear and anxiety.

"Although we have much to be proud of, Mr. Speaker, we cannot rest on our accomplishments because much work remains ahead of us. We have laid the tangible bricks into the ground for paid family leave, a robust system to protect all of our students in our public schools and institutions of higher learning. And, depending on how the population decides the constitutional amendment, we have laid the groundwork to critically look at our tax and revenue system into the future.

"We must continue to build on the foundations we have laid and remain unafraid of tackling the State's future challenges. Mr. Speaker, on behalf of your membership and your leadership team, we stand ready and waiting. *Aloha*."

The Chair then recognized Representative Tupola, the Minority Leader, to deliver closing remarks on behalf of the Minority Caucus:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I want to thank you for a wonderful session, thank also the Majority Leader and leadership. I want to thank my team as well. We did our job as the minority to make sure to come prepared. We definitely had talked over the interim last year to make sure that all of the bills and resolutions that we talked about were things that were of absolute necessity for our state, and we're grateful to see some of those initiatives pass forward.

"We're grateful that the conversation was had about public charter schools. We're thankful that we're starting to get at the root of some of the issues of inequality for funding for our students. We're grateful that we're pushing forward to find more use of wasted space, or even wasted monies, so that we can better help our state to move forward. We're thankful that we were able to add to some of the discussions, and want to thank the Majority Leader personally for some of the hearings that they even added some of our discussion points into the bill, into the amendments. And I'm glad that we're able to do that, because as the minority, that's our job, is to make sure to look through and scrutinize and add in those, maybe perspectives that weren't taken into consideration. And we've actually found common ground on quite a few things. And I think that it's made both the majority and the minority stronger.

"We are grateful for the times that we've had and been able to speak out, not just in hearings, but here on the floor. For each one of my caucus members that comes prepared to the session, and as you saw in this past session on Tuesday, everybody was ready to speak, everyone popping up,

making sure to get their voice out there, making sure to be heard. And as the Minority Caucus, we did an active, active role in being part of the solutions that came forth this year.

"We have a lot ahead of us. During the interim there's so much more that we can be doing in each and every one of our districts. And we do, we feel for the people of Puna and we feel for the people of Kauai, as well as for East Honolulu, that are still overcoming and going through difficulties that maybe all of us need to come and render aid, and if you need our help, call us and we'll be there.

"As legislators, we do, in this body, from January to May, effect changes through bills and resolutions, but from May to December we can do much more. We can get into our communities, find out other things that need to happen. We can get into agencies and help to alleviate some of the backlog that they have. We can even look at some of the systemic issues that we have and start getting at the root of the problem, which many of our departments have been stuck and things have been, for lack of a better, not turning, and that's something that we are tasked to do as legislators, is to go in and study those systemic issues, not only propose the solutions here on the floor, but implement them in our communities.

"I hope that during this interim that we can still work hard for each and every one of our communities. We can go to our schools and see if the CIP monies that were granted were given, to see if the appropriations that were given were spent, to see if all of the things that we did made sure that they came out and actually had an impact on the people. As each and every one of us put our time, our sweat, our desires and everything that we have out here, we need to go forward and make sure that these impacts are felt by the people, so that we can truly say that this session was of great worth to the people of Hawaii.

"I hope that we can get out into encampments. I hope that we can get out into shelters, into affordable housing units, and start to see with our own eyes some of the impacts of our decisions, and then maybe take some turns, maybe suggest some better things, or maybe double down, because we know that it's starting to work in areas that have severe need that we're addressing from housing, to homelessness, to education, to better health care.

"So we thank you, Mr. Speaker, to our leadership, to the minority team, for everything that's been done this session, and wish everyone good luck during the interim."

Speaker Saiki then gave his closing remarks as follows:

"Members, the Chair just has a few closing remarks. In addition to all of the other acknowledgements that have been made this morning, the Chair wants to thank the Senate President and the Senate leadership and our Senate counterparts for the civil working relationship and the willingness to just reach results this year. Members, if you recall, it was only seven months ago that the Legislature was mired in a special session. And whether we agree or disagree on the result, the more important by-product of that special session was the realization that working together, the House and Senate can accomplish anything. This 2018 Regular Session is a testament to that lesson.

"The Legislature's accomplishments are historic in terms of their substance and range. A balanced budget with a sustainable carryover balance, 24,000 affordable rental housing units, five ohana zones for persons and families in transition, medical, law enforcement, and assessment services for homeless persons, funds for disaster relief on Kauai and in other areas of our state, individual autonomy for end-of-life decisions, mail-in voting beginning on Kauai, a step towards Title IX protection, a choice for voters to fund public education, restrictions on pesticides, a structure for paid family leave, equal pay for women, a ban on modified firearms, planning for sea level rise, and sunblock restrictions.

"But notwithstanding all of these measures, in my opinion, the overarching accomplishment made this year is that the Legislature acted as a legislature. We fulfilled our constitutional role as a separate but equal branch of government. The Legislature deliberated to resolve some of our most pressing challenges. The Legislature initiated and executed upon its

own ideas. The Legislature reset a profound policy direction for our entire state. This work will improve the lives of residents, our environment, and our commitment to the principles of justice, fairness, tolerance, and opportunity. I just want to say thank you very much to everyone for all of your work this session."

Representative Choy: "Mr. Speaker, I think I already did this, but I'd like to have further comments into the Journal. Thank you."

Representative Choy submitted the following:

Shall we humble ourselves in prayer.

Being this is the final day of this legislature, as men and women of all faiths we Pray.

We pray for our all the people in our state, especially our families, friends, staff and colleagues.

We pray that all the hard work we have done will be of benefit to all of the people in our state, in our country, in our world.

We pray that our hearts were pure.

We pray that we have governed well.

We pray that we did not mess up too badly.

And finally, lord, I ask my colleagues to pray for me

For it is said:

I am already being poured out like a drink offering, and the time of my departure is at hand. I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. For now the crown of righteousness is laid up for me, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will award to me on that day...

I pray in the name of my lord Jesus Christ,

"Mr. Speaker, perhaps it's fitting to write this farewell address, on the floor of my last long day. I think I am going to miss this place, but I will let time do its job in making reflection a more thorough process.

"At no time did I ever think I would be working in the government and getting a government paycheck. I certainly never thought that I would ever run for public office. But here I am.

"Every one of the men and women of this body are dedicated, good hearted, and hard-working people. Sometimes politics get in the way of true friendships but bringing people together from all walks of life is truly an educational experience. Trying to get them to work with each other is genius.

"I hope history judges me kindly, as I was the 'politician by mistake.' My conservative views both socially and fiscally were tested in this liberal, progressive atmosphere. If given the opportunity to ever describe myself or how I would want to be remembered is that I was consistent and kept my word. I believe the colloquial term for this is 'hard headedness.' Although I remember being called 'wrong headed' by the press.

"I wish I could report that the State was in a better place because of my presence in the Legislature, but I can't. I certainly left a lot of work for future generations to do. A democracy is far from perfect and truly inefficient, but I would not have it any other way.

"The future of our state is at a tipping point. Our policies will determine whether our children will have a place in Hawaii to call home. I lost my three children and grandchildren to the mainland during my watch. This will be the biggest disappointment of my political career. I am hoping the next generation of political leaders will make this priority-one.

"Finally, it's time to thank the people in my district and the people in Hawaii for this opportunity to serve. It was an honor and a distinct privilege to be a part of your lives. If ever given this chance again, I will be more experienced and hopefully wiser; just trying to better the lives of all in Hawaii. *Aloha*."

Representative Fukumoto: "Same request."

Due process requires that laws "state with reasonable clarity the act it proscribes and provide fixed standards for adjudging guilt, or the statute is void for vagueness." *State v. Gaylord*, 78 Hawai'i 127, 138, 890 P.2d 1167, 1178 (1995). In this bill, the phrases "typical duration," "approximately one hour" and "moderately priced," among others, in the definition of "high turnover restaurant," do not state with reasonable clarity the requirements of the statute, and do not provide fixed standards to avoid arbitrary or subjective enforcement.

In addition, even if this bill is not unconstitutionally vague, a plaintiff will need experts and witnesses to demonstrate whether the "typical duration of customer stay is approximately one hour," and whether the restaurant is "moderately priced." As a practical matter, the high costs of expert testimony, the limits of recovery, and the uncertainty of results will prevent lawsuits from being filed and will therefore impede enforcement.

It is unclear whether ADC's or the counties' authority would have priority when determining control over the municipal waste disposal, and allowing ADC to remove certain wastes from the waste stream could interfere with a county's comprehensive solid waste management plan.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill No. 2699, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to the Transient Accommodations Tax."

The purpose of this bill is to ensure that Transient Accommodations Tax (TAT) is imposed on resort fees charged by hotels and other transient accommodations. Section 1 of this bill amends the definition of "gross rental proceeds" to include resort fees and adds a definition of "resort fee." "Resort fee" is defined as: "any charge or surcharge imposed by an operator, owner, or representative thereof to a transient for the use of the transient accommodation's property, services, or amenities."

Section 2 of this bill authorizes the Department of Taxation to issue administrative rules further defining "resort fee" and "gross rental proceeds" and clarifies that the bill does not prevent the Department of Taxation from collecting TAT on resort fees prior to the issuance of administrative rules.

This bill is objectionable because it creates the potential for a large and ambiguous expansion of the TAT and also undermines the Department of Taxation's current interpretation of the TAT.

The current draft of the bill does not properly reflect the Department of Taxation's current position. The qualifier "mandatory" in the definition of "resort fee" was removed and would allow an overzealous interpretation of that term. Such an interpretation would subject charges to the TAT even if those charges were unrelated to the letting of the transient accommodation. This may include discretionary charges such as those for long-distance telephone calls, movie rentals, room service, and any other charge to the occupant of a transient accommodation. The potential for such a large and ambiguous expansion of the TAT, which directly affects the state's largest industry, was not fully contemplated during the legislative process and may lead to many unintended consequences.

Furthermore, by omission of the word "mandatory," this bill simultaneously undermines the Department of Taxation's current position and leaves the agency with no guidance toward a new position.

The Department of Taxation's current position is clear; its position is that only mandatory resort fees are subject to the TAT. By its exclusion of the word "mandatory," this bill undermines that interpretation. During the 2018 Legislative Session the proposed definition of "resort fee" was amended numerous times to both include and exclude the qualifier "mandatory." The final bill omits "mandatory," therefore it could be argued that the bill overturns the Department of Taxation's position that only mandatory resort fees are subject to the TAT. Even though the bill may overturn the Department of Taxation's current position, it offers no guidance toward a new position. This bill's definition of "resort fee" does not limit what may be included in "resort fee" in any way. Therefore, the bill leaves full interpretation of the definition of "resort fee" to the Department of Taxation while simultaneously undermining its current interpretation.

The lack of clarity inherent in this bill will lead to ambiguity, confusion, and unintended consequences within the TAT.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning Senate Bill No. 2699 without my approval.

In addition, the legislature hopes that family court congestion can be reduced by providing automatic orders. Previously, only the Kaua'i family court automatically issued restraining orders for annulment, divorce, or separation cases. With enactment of this law, this process will now be uniform state-wide.

Concerns were expressed in testimony about the potential negative impacts this new law may have, especially on victims of domestic violence filing for divorce. We will consult with the Judiciary and others in the coming months to determine whether amendments to this law are necessary should there be unintended negative consequences.

This bill will assess an additional fee of \$2 per day upon vehicle renters who do not possess a Hawai'i driver's license.

Tourism is Hawai'i's largest economy and we need to be extremely careful when we increase the overall cost when visiting our islands. Nevertheless, the State's highway fund revenues are declining due to increased fuel efficiency and electric vehicles. Although we encourage the greening of the transportation industry, the Department of Transportation needs to find new ways to replenish the highway fund and respond to residents' concerns regarding the condition of the State's roadways.

Over the last few sessions, my administration's legislative package has included numerous bills to increase these revenues, but none have come to fruition. Although this measure could affect our tourism industry, this is a start as we look toward continued discussions to increase the revenues for the State's highway fund.

For the foregoing reasons, HB2601 HD1 SD2 CD2 will become law as ACT 215, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2018, effective July 10, 2018, without my signature.

This bill would allow motor vehicle insurers the ability to satisfy their requirement under Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) section 431:10C-119 to maintain a local complete sales and claims office if a licensed producer maintains an office in every county where the insurer does business.

Due to Hawai'i's unique island geography, it's possible that some islands may lose the insurer's physical presence resulting in the change in requirement to one office per county. The lack of physical presence would particularly affect seniors and those who have limited Internet access. Moving towards a regional call center model could also lead to local residents having to deal with mainland personnel who lack familiarity with Hawai'i laws, local auto repair shops, hospitals, and doctors.

Nevertheless, technology is taking over the sales and claims process and leading us in the direction of reducing brick and mortar locations. Due to the customer's ability to select from one of many auto insurance companies, it should be up to the insurance company to determine the proper balance between technology and customer service.

For the foregoing reasons, HB1876 HD1 SD1 CD1 will become law as ACT 216, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2018, effective July 10, 2018, without my signature.

SB2461 SD1 HD1 CD1, entitled "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SERVICE ANIMALS" will become law without my signature, pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the State Constitution.

The purpose of this bill is to 1) establish a civil penalty for knowingly misrepresenting an animal as a service animal; and 2) conform existing Hawai'i law with the definition of "service animal" under the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990.

Enforcement of this civil offense may be problematic because there is no official registry or form of recognized identification for a service animal. The ADA prohibits asking any questions beyond "is the dog a service animal, required because of a disability?" and "what task(s) has the dog been trained to perform?" In other words, the ADA makes it illegal to ask about the nature of the person's disability, require proof of the disability, and/or require the animal to perform the stated task. Additionally, owners are allowed to train their own animals, as opposed to being professionally trained.

None of the county police departments submitted testimony. However, it appears they would be the primary agencies responsible for enforcement. It may be difficult to prove in court by a clear and convincing standard that a person knowingly misrepresented an animal as a service animal. However, it is worth noting that similar legislation is present in at least fifteen other states.

For the foregoing reasons, SB2461 SD1 HD1 CD1 will become law as ACT 217, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2018, effective July 10, 2018, without my signature.

HB2589 HD2 SD1 CD1, entitled "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOTORCYCLES" will become law without my signature, pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the State Constitution.

This bill will authorize the Department of Transportation to designate shoulder lanes upon which motorcycles are allowed to operate when traffic is halted. It will also prohibit the opening of automobile doors that interfere with motorcycles in the shoulder.

The shoulder lane is designated to accommodate stopped vehicles and emergency vehicles on highways, as well as bicycles on arterial roadways. There are significant concerns that this could compromise road safety and create more dangers for operators of all vehicles.

Despite the possible safety concerns, we trust that the Department of Transportation will properly vet which shoulder lanes can be accessible to motorcycles while carefully considering optimal safety measures.

For the foregoing reasons, HB2589 HD2 SD1 CD1 will become law as ACT 218, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2018, effective July 10, 2018, without my signature.

The purpose of this bill is to appropriate \$1.5 million for fiscal year 2018-2019 to the Department of Human Services to continue and to improve the coordinated statewide homeless initiative to prevent homelessness and rehouse homeless people in the state.

This bill authorizes the Department of Human Services to contract the services of a master contractor to procure and oversee subcontracts for the coordinated statewide homeless initiative. The master contractor will operate a coalition of agencies to provide: (1) homeless diversion services by providing short-term financial assistance to households in the eviction process; and (2) housing navigation services and placement of homeless households into permanent housing.

Homelessness continues to be a major issue in Hawai'i and requires resources and the coordinated efforts of all levels of government and the private sector to ameliorate. However, we are concerned about the statutory requirement that the entire amount of \$1.5 million be provided upfront to the master contractor. The provision of all appropriated public funds in advance to a private entity is not aligned to standard procurement processes consistent with the goals of public accountability and public procurement practices. This mandate severely limits DHS's ability to carry out its fiduciary duty to manage and oversee taxpayer funds as required by this bill.

For the foregoing reasons, SB2027 SD2 HD1 CD1 will become law as ACT 219, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2018, effective July 10, 2018, without my signature.

HB2071 HD2 SD2 CD1, entitled "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LAW ENFORCEMENT" will become law without my signature, pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the State Constitution.

This bill will establish an unpaid fifteen-member Law Enforcement Standards Board responsible for the certification of county police officers, state public safety officers, and employees of the Department of Transportation, Land and Natural Resources, Taxation, and Attorney General with police powers.

The Board will also be responsible for developing minimum standards, establishing and maintaining curriculum and training programs, and establishing procedures and criteria for the revocation of certification.

Although this bill presents implementation and funding issues, we recognize the need for accountability and public confidence in law enforcement. The community deserves to have the highest quality law enforcement and this statewide Board will begin discussions to achieve that. The administration is committed to working with the police chiefs and all law enforcement officials to successfully implement this measure.

The administration and the four police chiefs have concerns regarding the implementation of this bill. First, Hawai'i has no existing certification process. The Board will need to develop the criteria and certify all law enforcement officers, and the one-year timeline is unrealistic.

Second, all four counties have already established accreditation through the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (GALEA), the gold standard in public safety. The state has law enforcement officers with varying duties and scopes of authority. An accreditation system still needs to be established that accommodates these varying responsibilities. We do not want this bill to compromise what the counties have worked to achieve.

Third, the state does not have joint training facilities to accommodate a robust training program. The \$100,000 appropriation is inadequate to build and maintain these mentioned facilities. It would also be unreasonable to expect the counties to train the state's law enforcement officers.

Fourth, Hawai'i has a unique situation with our unions, collective bargaining statutes, and "home rule" precedence. Establishing a decertification process could be difficult with collective bargaining and existing arbitration procedures.

We hope to have continued conversations next session to address the bill's implementation challenges including providing adequate resources to help the Board and law enforcement achieve the intent of this measure.

For the foregoing reasons, HB2071 HD2 SD2 CD1 will become law as ACT 220, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2018, effective July 10, 2018, without my signature.
