Wednesday, January 17, 2018

In accordance with the provisions of Article III, Section 10 of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, the House of Representatives of the Legislature of the State of Hawaii convened in Regular Session of 2018.

The Honorable Scott K. Saiki, Speaker of the House of Representatives, called the House to order at 10:03 o'clock a.m.

H.C.R. No. 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION RELATING TO RECESS DAYS FOR THE REGULAR SESSION OF 2018," was jointly offered by Representatives Saiki and Nakashima.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Tupola and carried, H.C.R. No. 1 was adopted.

H.C.R. No. 2, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE GOVERNOR TO ADDRESS THE LEGISLATURE ASSEMBLED IN JOINT SESSION," was jointly offered by Representatives Saiki and Nakashima.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Tupola and carried, H.C.R. No. 2 was adopted.

At this time, the Speaker delivered his address, stating:

"Members, these are tumultuous times. This year, we must step up to the plate. The State of Hawaii requires leadership now, and the House of Representatives can and should provide that leadership.

"Unfortunately, one need only look to the past weekend to see a glaring instance of the inability of government at various levels to manage major issues facing our state.

"Saturday's events reinforce the importance of the role of government. It also shines light on the role of the Legislature as the policymaker and as the check on the other branches of government. It is our duty to ensure that the three branches abide by their respective constitutional duties so that we all do our jobs well.

"We rely on the executive branch to competently and efficiently implement our laws and to administer programs. This begins with basic

functions. Some of these functions must be carried out without mistakes because, when mistakes happen, the public loses confidence in all of us.

"We also rely on the Judiciary to fairly adjudicate and dispense justice. It is not the role of judges to make policy decisions from the bench. It is the Legislature's duty to set policy, and we do this with the benefit of broader public input and context.

"The legislative branch, and particularly we as the House of Representatives, begin this session with a renewed sense of purpose. The House is in a unique position to provide leadership. Part of the reason is our composition. Our 51 members are diverse, experienced and energetic. We represent some of the smallest units of government. Our members have a pulse on what real people actually think, what they do, and what they want.

"This collective insight is very powerful and should not be taken lightly. We should use this insight to be bold and creative. We should always be thinking of how to make things better.

"There are two painfully obvious challenges that confront our state. The lack of affordable housing and the increasing homeless population. They are full of complexity and competing interests that make them hard to solve. They will require commitment and courageous action, sustained over several years. But, the time to start is now.

"There is a shortage of 65,000 housing units in Hawaii. The State has set a goal of building 22,500 affordable rental units by the year 2026, and encouraging the development of housing for all income levels.

"There is a huge gap between what our working families are able to pay and the cost of building new housing in Hawaii. The State and counties must continue to partner with private and nonprofit developers to add to the affordable housing inventory and make these projects pencil out.

"To address the financing gap, we should consider increases to programs such as the Rental Housing Revolving Fund, Dwelling Unit Revolving Fund, and the Rental Assistance Revolving Fund. These programs will subsidize rents, infrastructure, and construction costs.

"For the very low income, elderly and disabled, we should upgrade our public housing inventory. We should also invest in infrastructure in areas that are conducive to such housing, including areas near the proposed rail

"There are now over 7,000 homeless persons throughout the state, including 667 families. The approach to homelessness is multifaceted and requires short and long-term action. But there is a model that we can adopt. That model is Kahauiki Village.

"Kahauiki Village is an example of a successful public-private partnership that included the combined work of the State, the City, nonprofits and the private sector, some of whom had not interfaced before.

"It is a self-contained community that is comprised of 153 transitional homes, a preschool, a market, and a police meeting room. It also operates from a PV-generated battery system and is off the electric grid. This model can be extended to homeless populations with substance abuse and mental health conditions.

"One important takeaway is that Kahauiki Village represents what is possible if people and agencies at different levels work towards a common goal.

"And even as we develop more transitional housing, we must also increase law enforcement to avoid encroachment into public spaces. This encroachment affects the quality of life for all, and we must find ways to divert it.

"These are the kinds of issues that our residents are counting on us to solve. But leadership is more than solving issues.

"A year ago, President Obama said something in his farewell address to the nation that reminds me of Hawaii's situation today. He spoke of the youth, diversity and drive of Americans, and the potential that these traits offered to our country.

"But the President also offered this warning, 'that potential will be realized,' he said, 'only if our democracy works. Only if our politics reflects the decency of our people. Only if all of us, regardless of our party affiliation or particular interest, help restore the sense of common purpose that we so badly need right now.'

"The people of Hawaii are looking to us for more than problem solving. They are also looking to us to articulate and demonstrate a sense of shared purpose that calls others, calls on everyone, to join in.

"The House will play a critical role in calling people together in common purpose, but to do it, I believe that each of us must embrace three things.

"First, let's be open to reform and to challenge the status quo. We can still honor the past, but build upon the foundation that was left for us. It is okay to do things differently.

"Second, let's view challenges through the lens of those who are impacted by them. Some of the most contentious issues in Hawaii arise when people believe that government does not consider their perspective or history. We need to do better at reconciling these differences by drawing on the knowledge of all our people, including those impacted by the policies we create, to shape the path forward.

"Third, let's take a global approach to decision-making. Sometimes government is too focused on jurisdiction and turf. We need to move beyond that.

"Members, we are at a moment in history where we cannot just be stewards. This legislative session is a call to broader involvement and decisive action. We must be courageous activists because the issues facing our state are too urgent to wait. But I know that we are up to the challenge.

"This year, we will rebuild a foundation that will help many residents throughout our state. And by doing so, we will advance Hawaii's tradition of pioneering justice, fairness, and opportunity for all.

"Members, thank you and best wishes for a productive session."

The Chair then recognized Representative Tupola, the Minority Leader, to deliver remarks on behalf of the Minority Caucus:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for allowing me to give some opening day remarks. Good morning, *aloha*, to all of the House Members as well as to our friends, our families, and those members of the public that came to join us today, maybe some people who are connected via 'Ōlelo or live on social media, thank you for being with us.

"I want to thank my caucus members first and foremost, Representatives Ward, McDermott, Thielen and Matsumoto, for their continued support and collaboration. And I want to thank all of the people who have made what we do possible.

"With the events of this past weekend, it really made everyone stop and think how disconnected we are. And the events of today can help us to remember how to reconnect to our history, to our people, and to this place that we call home.

"My hope is that for the 2018 Legislature, that we can find new ways to connect. We need to find ways to connect to our committee members, to our communities, and to a lot of concerns that plague our community and affect our quality of life.

"We represent geographic areas throughout the State of Hawaii. Fifty-one of us represent these geographic areas. And it was made that way so that we could feel the everyday needs of the people at a very personal level. The connection that I'm suggesting is an energy that is made and exists between us when people's voices are heard and their opinions are valued.

"As the Minority Caucus, we are proposing to reconnect better with our communities, our counties, and our *keiki*.

"First off, we think that we could do a much better job at connecting with our communities by having more live broadcasts of our session hearings, allowing remote testimony and access to everything we do, so that people can participate. We saw this as one of the biggest needs during the special session, when people wanted to voice their concerns but yet were too far to have their voices be heard.

"This feedback that we get from people in the communities can help us make better decisions because it will help us to see things that we currently don't understand or may not be aware of.

"Two examples of this is, in Kona, they already allow remote testimony from multiple areas on the island for their city council hearings. And I know that we can do that here too. If they can do it on Hawaii Island, we can do it here to allow neighbor islanders and even people who live in far areas on this island to participate.

"The second example I can think of, increasing our communication and our connection, just last night, the director of transportation called me up, asked me to get community feedback about the contraflow that happened yesterday. Immediately I jumped on social media and we got hundreds of great comments that we're going to implement today. And that's how fast it was.

"Some of the solutions to allow remote testimony or community involvement can be free or of little cost, and it can actually happen today. And that's what we're suggesting as a caucus, is to open up these connections so that we can better serve our community members. Because the most basic, powerful way to connect to somebody is to listen. And I definitely think we can improve equal access for all the people in Hawaii.

"The second thing that we believe that we need to do is connect better to our counties. One of the things we talk about with affordable housing is the fact that it takes an exorbitant amount of time to get a permit. And people have brought it up many times that the days, the months, and the years that it takes to get a permit increase the prices of the housing inventory that we have on this island and throughout the state.

"And one of the things that we need to do is better support our counties. Because some of these vital procedures that the counties provide for us can actually improve our whole entire state. We believe that the counties have been crying out for our help, our support. And the 2015 report to the Legislature by the State-County Working Group is a great way for us to start, to read through their suggestions and implement it now. Because we believe that if we actually strengthen our counties, that these vital resources, and things as simple as a permit and the time it takes to get one, will actually improve our whole entire state.

"Lastly, we need to better connect to our *keiki*. We see that there is a changing desire to have diversity in school choice, but yet we're still lagging far behind equally funding all of our public school students. The Minority Caucus made it a priority to propose equal public school funding because it's our responsibility to make sure that we help our *keiki* to connect to future solutions and ways to embrace education.

"We have some schools that have closed down. We have other schools that are desperately looking for space. And as some of you guys are aware, just last year an under-enrolled public school partnered with a charter school that had no facilities, and now they're sharing space. But that's because we don't equally fund CIP for all public schools. And we need to, so that these public school students can have spaces. But we have all of these resources right in front of us, but if one principal didn't connect to one charter school principal and make that happen, these kids would still be without classroom spaces. I have no doubt that if we start to equally fund all of public school students, that we will see that creativity truly is from making connections.

"A true community is not just about being geographically connected to one another, it is actually feeling responsible for what happens in our community. 'Auamo kuleana, which means to shoulder our burden and take a responsibility that is ours. And it's my hope that we can do that, shoulder

the burden of our communities by better connecting to them, hearing what their needs are.

"We cannot keep doing the same thing and expect different results. In fact, we cannot keep doing the same thing 10 times, 20 times, 30 times harder and expect something else. We actually have to do something different. And by doing something different, reconnecting, allowing people remote access to us, actually jumping on social media, getting people's input so we can implement things in the state right now. Strengthening our counties, supporting them through the vital procedures and resources that they provide for us. And strengthening our *keiki*, connecting them to the resources that they need so that they can get quality education. This is going to make all the difference for our state.

"If we decide to increase these connections, we're going to see an increase in resources, we're going to see an increase in public involvement. And in events like the ones of this past weekend, it could even mean saving lives because we're better connected, and we know and we feel what happens in our communities. And then we don't react, we initiate something different.

"Our generation is tasked with creating a new vision for Hawaii, built on some of our oldest values. And we can't make this vision without our whole community, we can't do it. We may not and we should not demand unreasonable things of ourselves, but we should always demand improvement. And that's what we hope to see this session.

"Mr. Speaker, these are my thoughts. And I'm grateful for this day and hope that this session will indeed yield the reconnection that we need, not just in this House, in our body, but in our communities. Thank you."

The Chair then recognized Representative Belatti, the Majority Leader, to deliver remarks on behalf of the Majority Caucus:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for allowing me to make some opening remarks. Mr. Speaker, members, members of the public, indulge me to speak from the heart on this historic day of a new legislative session.

"Two recent events shocked me to the core. Earlier this month, two reports came out, one in the Washington Post and one in Civil Beat, reporting on the Aloha United Way report. These reports didn't tell us anything new. The Washington Post reports told us despite record low unemployment, Hawaii's population fell for just the third time since statehood in 1959.

"Civil Beat, in the Aloha United Way report, explained to us that the biggest challenge for Hawaii residents is to find a well-paying job and affordable housing in this great state. This is not new to us. We know this in our core. Many of us know and fear the day that our children may not be able to return.

"I'm happy to report, Mr. Speaker and to the members, that we are taking action though, to these very specific issues. In 2014, this legislature initiated the Early College High School Grant Program that graduated for the first time this year a student in both high school and an associates college degree within our community college system. Eleven more students are in the pipeline.

"Last year, Mr. Speaker, this legislature, the members in this body, passed the Hawaii Promise Program, a scholarship program to provide free in-state tuition for qualified University of Hawaii Community College students. This semester, 1,000 students across the state have been awarded scholarships for the 2017 fall semester. That is 1,000 students, that is 1,000 families, that is access to better paying jobs.

"Mr. Speaker, you spoke about what we will be doing on affordable housing, and I hope we will move the needle on that. So I think we are responding to the challenges ahead.

"The second event that rocked me to the core, that rocked everyone to the core, was this Saturday's events. Where were you. Did you know what you were going to do. In those 38 minutes, did you reach out to the people that you love. In those 38 minutes, Mr. Speaker, I thought about the job ahead

of us. I thought about what we do, the basic functions of government, as you spoke about.

"You're right, Mr. Speaker. People are looking at us to do the important work of this state. As you said, we are a diverse, experienced and energetic group. I would also add that we are a passionate group. We have strong opinions. We have strong viewpoints, sometimes conflicting viewpoints.

"But on this day, when you have called us to demonstrate a shared purpose, I leave you with a thought and a motto that we might live by. The words of Queen Liliuokalani, *e'onipa'a kākou*, to be steadfast, established, firm, resolute and determined. It means for me, let us put aside our differences, our party differences, our geographical differences, our age differences, and yes, even our faction differences, members. We must work and do the work of the people. *E'onipa'a kākou*. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."
