

SEVENTH DAY

Tuesday, January 29, 2019

The House of Representatives of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2019, convened at 12:02 o'clock p.m., with Vice Speaker Nakashima presiding.

The invocation was delivered by Representative Nicole E. Lowen, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representative Thielen, who was excused.

By unanimous consent, reading and approval of the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Sixth Day was deferred.

INTRODUCTIONS

The following introduction was made to the members of the House:

Representative Lowen introduced her staff, Pono Suganuma.

At 12:08 o'clock p.m., Representative Belatti requested a recess and the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:15 o'clock p.m.

ORDER OF THE DAY

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES

Representative Luke, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2) recommending that H.B. No. 2, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading, with Representative Thielen being excused.

Representative Yamane, for the Committee on Water, Land, & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3) recommending that H.B. No. 453, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 453, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII PUBLIC HOUSING AUTHORITY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary, with Representative Thielen being excused.

Representative Yamane, for the Committee on Water, Land, & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 4) recommending that H.B. No. 458, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Transportation.

Representative Belatti moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 458, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Transportation, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Wildberger rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 458, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SMALL BOAT HARBORS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Transportation, with

Representative Wildberger voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Thielen being excused.

Representative Yamane, for the Committee on Water, Land, & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 5) recommending that H.B. No. 259, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

On motion by Representative Belatti, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 259, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAIIAN HOMES COMMISSION ACT," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary, with Representative Thielen being excused.

SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Morikawa, seconded by Representative Matsumoto and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering a certain House Bill for Third Reading by consent calendar. (Representative Thielen was excused.)

THIRD READING

H.B. No. 1:

Representative Belatti moved that H.B. No. 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Say rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support with written comments, thank you, on behalf of the employees, session and full-time. Thank you."

Representative Say's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in strong support of HB 1, relating to the legislative budget.

"I am in strong support of the legislative budget, the session employees, legislative agencies and full-time permanent employees. The silent majority of the legislative branch are hardworking individuals that work on behalf of elected officials. For permanent employees, they do deserve a pay raise tied to Unit 13 bargaining agreement. They are hardworking, conscientious and respectful to all of the legislative requests by the House and Senate members and I am very thankful.

"It is for these reasons that I am in strong support of HB 1. *Mahalo.*"

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, H.B. No. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS TO PROVIDE FOR THE EXPENSES OF THE LEGISLATURE, THE AUDITOR, THE LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU, THE OMBUDSMAN, AND THE ETHICS COMMISSION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Thielen being excused.
