Monday, February 4, 2019

The House of Representatives of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2019, convened at 12:01 o'clock p.m., with Speaker Saiki presiding.

The invocation was delivered by Representative Angus L.K. McKelvey, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives DeCoite, Quinlan, Say, Thielen and Tokioka, who were excused.

By unanimous consent, reading and approval of the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Tenth Day was deferred.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Representative Holt: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. To my esteemed colleagues, this week is Hawaiian Caucus Week 2019. This year we have reinvigorated the Hawaiian Caucus and I'm proud to say that we have 34 members in our House Chamber as members this year. And our vision is to be engaged, informed and educated on issues that affect our Native Hawaiian community. And although we all may not be Native Hawaiian, these issues affect all of us and we all have Native Hawaiians in our districts that we all represent.

"This week's floor presentations will be conducted in both the Senate and the House Chambers, starting today with our *'ohana*, we honor our *keiki*, our *'ōpio*, our future. Children are raised not only by their parents, but by their grandparents and other relatives. And as the saying goes, it truly takes a village to raise a child.

"Today we share a story about some *'ōpio* and their involvement in the political process on the subject of water management. Tomorrow we will honor a *makua*, a parent, and their strong dedication and commitment to their family and their Native Hawaiian community. On Wednesday, we honor a *kupuna* who believes that we are always learning, no matter how old you are, as long as you learn with *aloha*. On Thursday, we honor one of the largest ethnic groups that came into our islands, who have always created great working relationships with Native Hawaiians. And finally, on Friday, we celebrate the centennial anniversary of one of the largest grassroots organizations in Hawaii and its movement.

"The importance of *'ōlelo* Hawaii to our state is very evident, it is both the indigenous language and an official language as recognized by the Hawaii State Constitution. Further, Act 28 in 2013 designated the month of February as *'ōlelo* Hawaii Month to celebrate and encourage the use of the Hawaiian language.

"The importance of indigenous languages from around the world are being recognized globally. The general assembly of the United Nations recently declared 2019 as the International Year of Indigenous Languages. Its purpose is to draw attention to the critical loss of indigenous languages and the urgent need to preserve, revitalize and promote indigenous languages.

"As part of our festivities on Hawaiian Caucus day this Friday, the Honorable Governor David Ige will sign a proclamation in the Capitol Rotunda declaring 2019 as the International Year of Indigenous Language in Hawaii. Also on Friday, our community will come together and take part in educational displays, speeches and entertainment to share and highlight our Native Hawaiian language and culture.

"I would like to *mahalo pihā* the following. The Governor, David Ige, you, Mr. Speaker, the Senate President, the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, Kamehameha Schools, labor unions, and Ke One o Kākuhihewa, the Oahu Council of the Association of Hawaiian Civic Clubs, for their support in assisting with our Hawaiian Caucus week events. *Mahalo*, Mr. Speaker."

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

Representative Okimoto's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support with strong reservations for House Bill 1315, HD1. I commend the Speaker's initiative to think outside of the box to draft legislation to address our state's housing crisis. However, I strongly believe that amending the Constitution is not the correct path. This body should continue to focus on funding existing state programs which encourage public-private partnerships to develop affordable housing for the residents of Hawaii. Finally, perhaps this body should briefly refrain from pursuing amendments to the Constitution as the electorate voted overwhelmingly in opposition against a Constitutional Convention in November."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition with brief comments. Mr. Speaker, this bill guarantees, through a constitutional amendment, access to housing. Very laudable, very, I mean everybody should have access to food and water and housing and all that, it's very laudable. It, however, may be the first promise that we will not be able to deliver. As you will recall that this body, in a number of years ago, said we should have all access to health care. When the pencils were put to how much it would cost, it knocked us out of the ballpark and it was not passed. So, access to anything as progressive as this has never met the test of, or let's say, has never met muster. And I know we're going to have other progressive things here that are related to education and health care.

"It has to do also with the terminology of access. To be very frank, it's a loosey-goosey term, you can't really tell what it is, it's almost like the ConAm amendment, where because it didn't say where the money was going, it was so vague, that the courts kicked it back and people were confused by it.

"I think that if we look at, really, the housing situation, we are actually short 50,000 houses. And now when you say everybody is going to have access to housing, what about the 7,000 who are homeless? What about the 27,000 Native Hawaiians who actually already have the land in DHHL, but they don't have houses? So, I think what we have in front of us is probably more aspirational, it probably should be a reso, it's warm and fuzzy, but in terms of substantial government engagement of giving everybody housing, it is almost a phenomenally unreachable, unrealistic, but laudable goal. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I want to say a couple of things with reservations, if I may. Mr. Speaker, this is, to go back to what it was a number of years ago in terms of elected Board of Education, there's probably a good 50% of us who were here who said, yes this is a good thing, let's get the governor, the way it is now so there can be accountability, there can be efficiency. They said nobody knows who their Board of Education is. We have a board that's as big as the, it's statewide, and now we're going back to the old one which everybody in this body condemned as ineffective and unaccountable.

"So, Mr. Speaker, this is a bit of a schizo bill, it's a little bit of like, what do we really mean? Do we have numbers? Do we have data that says we have changed it and it worked, or we changed it and it didn't work? I think we have to get our head straight on this before we vote with sensible objectivity. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative McKelvey rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. And I was one of those who did not like the idea of having an all appointed board. And I think my concerns have been well established. And considering how great the Department of Education is doing under this model, I'm really happy for the Lower & Higher Education Chair for putting this forward. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B.
