Thursday, March 14, 2019

The House of Representatives of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2019, convened at 12:01 o'clock p.m., with Speaker Saiki presiding.

The invocation was delivered by Mr. Brendan Burns, grandson of former Hawaii Governor John A. Burns, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Say and Takumi, who were excused.

On motion by Representative Morikawa, seconded by Representative Matsumoto and carried, reading of the Journal was dispensed with and the Journals of the Eighteenth, Nineteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-First, Twenty-Second and Twenty-Third Days were approved. (Representatives Hashem, Say and Takumi were excused.)

ORDER OF THE DAY

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS
(FLOOR PRESENTATIONS)

The following resolution (H.R. No. 208) was announced by the Clerk and the following action taken:

Representative Kitagawa also recognized parents of the players who were seated in the gallery, Al Souza, Mike Yamaguchi and Mike Chun, and commended them on supporting their children as they develop into outstanding individuals.

Representative Morikawa recognized her relative, Mana Lau Kong, first baseman, and congratulated the team.

Representative Ward thanked the team and shared how proud they have made the State of Hawaii.

Representative Cullen, as a former baseball player, recognized the amount of courage it takes as a player to stand strong throughout the game, and congratulated the team.

"Mr. Speaker, same measure with a brief comment with reservations. Mr. Speaker, according to one of the McDonalds executives, they are in

agreement with this, except they need a bit more time. And I noticed that this really has an expiration date of July 1, 2100, which is probably a little bit too long. But for the committee members and the conference committee people who know that three to five years, or at least two to three years, would be a healthy period to get that. They just said there's not the technology to be able to keep the food out without some of the Styrofoam, but there are substitutes which needs a little bit more time for development. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I just hope we give them a little time, but not 100 years. Thank you."

We got half the equation and it's good news in the sense that the young people who start smoking, 80% of them start with vaping. The equation that's missing is those who quit smoking using vaping is very important, and we don't have any figures on that. So, I'm waiting for the data, until I get it I'm with reservations. Thank you."
