Wednesday, January 18, 2023

In accordance with the provisions of Article III, Section 10 of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, the House of Representatives of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2023, convened at 10:09 a.m.

The Honorable Richard H.K. Onishi, being the Representative who was elected from the Second Representative District of the State of Hawai'i, called the House to order, following the *Oli* delivered by Dr. Kaiwipunikauikawēkiu Lipe.

At this time, the Temporary Chair stated:

"The House of Representatives of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai'i is now called to order.

"*Aloha*, I am Richard Onishi, Representative from the Second House District on Hawai'i Island. I am honored to preside over this Opening Day ceremony. *E komo mai*.

"At this time, I call upon Major Jared Sproat of the Hawai'i Air National Guard to lead us in the singing of the National Anthem and Hawai'i Pono'i. Thereafter, Kawaipomaika'i Kahaloa, daughter of Representative Kirstin Kahaloa, will lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance. Will the members and audience please rise."

The members of the House, guests, and audience rose for the singing of the national anthem followed by Hawai'i Pono'i, which was led by Major Jared Sproat of the Hawai'i Air National Guard. Thereafter the Pledge of Allegiance was led by Miss Kawaipomaika'i Kahaloa.

The invocation was then delivered by Dr. Noe Noe Wong-Wilson.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

The following resolution (H.R. No. 1) was read by the Temporary Clerk and the following action taken:

H.R. No. 1, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION ELECTING THE TEMPORARY CHAIR OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE THIRTY-SECOND LEGISLATURE," resolving that the Honorable Richard H.K. Onishi, Representative from the Second District, be and is hereby declared the duly elected Temporary Chair of the House of Representatives of the Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, was jointly offered by Representatives Nakamura and Matsumoto.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Matsumoto and carried, H.R. No. 1 was adopted, with Representative Nakashima being excused.

At this time, the Temporary Chair stated:

"Members of the House of Representatives of the Thirty-Second State Legislature, thank you. Let us commence with the Order of the Day."

The Temporary Chair appointed Mr. Brian L. Takeshita as Temporary Clerk of the House of Representatives.

The Temporary Chair then called upon Representative Tarnas for the report of the Committee on Credentials.

REPORTS OF SPECIAL COMMITTEES

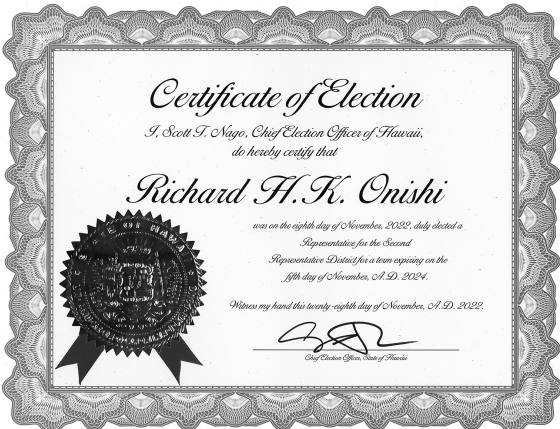
Representative Tarnas, for the Committee on Credentials, presented a report (Spec. Com. Rep. No. 1) as follows:

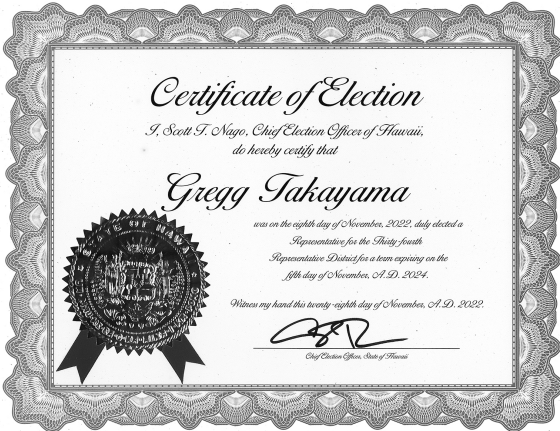
The report was submitted by Representatives Tamas, Nakamura, and Matsumoto, with the following Certificates of Election attached:

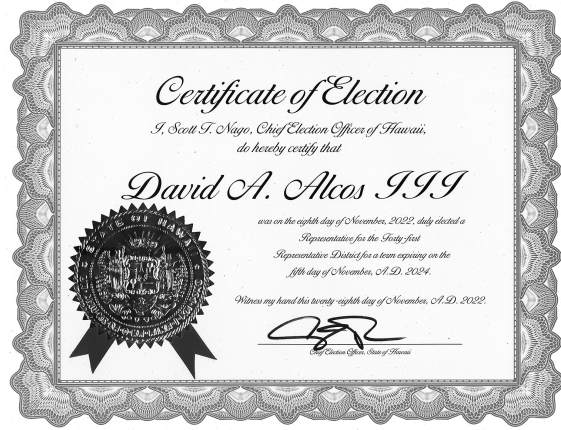














On motion by Representative Tarnas, seconded by Representative Matsumoto and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted, with Representative Nakashima being excused.

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

Saiki, Representative from the Twenty-Fifth District, and the Honorable Greggor Ilagan, Representative from the Fourth District, be elected as Speaker and Vice Speaker, respectively, of the House of Representatives of the Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, was jointly offered by Representatives Nakamura and Matsumoto.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Matsumoto and carried, H.R. No. 2 was adopted, with Representative Nakashima being excused.

The Temporary Chair appointed Representatives Nadine K. Nakamura, Dee Morikawa, Lauren Matsumoto, and Diamond Garcia to escort the newly elected Speaker Scott K. Saiki to the rostrum.

The Temporary Chair then presented to the members of the House and audience the Honorable Scott K. Saiki, Speaker of the House of Representatives of the Thirty-Second Legislature, and presented him with the gavel.

No. 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION RELATING TO RECESS DAYS FOR THE REGULAR SESSION OF 2023," resolving that the dates of the mandatory recess for the Regular Session of 2023 are hereby determined to be the 23rd, 24th, 27th, and 28th days of February and 1st day of March, on which dates the Regular Session of 2023 shall be recessed; and that the dates of the recesses other than the dates of the mandatory recess for the Regular Session of 2023 are hereby determined to be the 24th and 26th days of January, the 6th and 8th days of March, the 10th, 12th, and 26th days of April, and 1st and 3rd days of May, on which dates the Regular Session of 2023 shall be recessed, was jointly offered by Representatives Saiki and Ilagan.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Matsumoto and carried, H.C.R. No. 1 was adopted, with Representative Nakashima being excused.

H.C.R. No. 2, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE GOVERNOR TO ADDRESS THE LEGISLATURE ASSEMBLED IN JOINT SESSION," resolving that the two Houses of the Legislature assemble in Joint Session in the Chambers of the House of Representatives at 10:00 a.m. on Monday, January 23, 2023, for the purpose of receiving such address or greetings from the Governor of Hawaii as he should be pleased to make, was jointly offered by Representatives Saiki and Ilagan.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Matsumoto and carried, H.C.R. No. 2 was adopted, with Representative Nakashima being excused.

At 11:04 a.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

At this time, the members of the House, their guests, and audience were entertained by the Mākaha Sons.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:23 a.m.

At this time, the Speaker delivered his address, stating:

"First of all, can we give a big hand to the Mākaha Sons for the entertainment this morning. The Chair has some remarks this morning, but before beginning, the House of Representatives would like to extend its deepest condolences to the family of Ron Menor, who was a former member of this House.

"So, normally I try to keep my speech within seven minutes, but today I am going to spend a lot of time introducing and acknowledging people. So, I apologize because I am going to go over time.

"First of all, thank you to the Hawai'i Symphony Orchestra for the pre-program music. Thank you to Miss Kawaipomaika'i Kahaloa, daughter of Representative Kahaloa, for the Pledge of Allegiance. Thank you to Major Jared Sroat of the Hawai'i Air National Guard for the national anthem and Hawai'i Pono'i.

"Please join me in thanks and acknowledgement to the community leaders who are cultural practitioners for setting the ground for us in chant and prayer at the start of today's proceedings, Dr. Punihei Lipe who provided the *oli*, and Dr. Noe Noe Wong-Wilson for the invocation.

"Please welcome my lovely and beautiful wife, Patsy Saiki. And my parents, Richard and Sue, who are watching online this morning.

"We also have guests from the Hokkaido Prefectural Assembly and the Fukuoka Prefectural Assembly in the gallery.

"And I'd also like to introduce some of the public officials who are here with us this morning. Governor Josh Green and Mrs. Jaime Green. Lieutenant Governor Sylvia Luke and Second Gentleman Michael Luke. Incidentally, thank you to the Lieutenant Governor for providing the members with a cactus plant, although mine is plastic, I'm not sure why.

"From the Hawai'i Supreme Court, Chief Justice Mark Recktenwald and Associate Justices Paula Nakayama, Sabrina McKenna, Michael Wilson,

and Todd W. Eddins. From the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, Chair Carmen 'Hulu' Lindsey.

"From our congressional delegation, United States Senator Mazie Hirono, Congressman Ed Case and Mrs. Audrey Nakamura, Congresswoman Jill Tokuda.

"We also have former governors with us this morning. Governor George Ariyoshi and Mrs. Jean Ariyoshi, Governor John Waihee III and Mrs. Lynn Waihee, Governor Linda Lingle, Governor Neil Abercrombie. We also have former Congresswoman Colleen Hanabusa. Honolulu Mayor Rick Blangiardi and Kaua'i Mayor Derek Kawakami.

"And we have council chairs here with us. From Kaua'i, Chair Mel Rapozo, from Maui, Chair Tasha Kama, from the Big Island, Chair Heather Kimball, and from Honolulu, Chair Tommy Waters.

"And finally, we also have members of the Consular Corps with us this morning, could the members please stand.

"*Aloha. Aloha kākou. Aloha* to all of us. Welcome and thank you for attending our first open Opening Day in three years.

"So, a couple of weeks ago, Chris West, who is the president of ILWU Local 142, said something to me that is spot on today. He said, it's cool to have Hawai'i back. I know we all agree with Chris. So, let's give everyone here a round of applause for making it through the pandemic. We celebrate this moment, and are happy to see so many familiar faces and many new faces.

"Today, we are joined by 16 new House members. This is our largest freshman class in 28 years. And I would like to introduce twelve of them, and Representative Lauren Matsumoto will introduce the remaining four. So, members, could you please stand when I call on you.

"First, Representative Kirstin Kahaloa from District 6. Kirstin is a Native Hawaiian woman, mother, paddler, nonprofit manager, and someone who originally left Hawai'i for 14 years and almost didn't return, but did so to make her community and state a better place to live.

"From District 11, Representative Terez Amato. So, Terez is known as Tamato in her community. She grew up on Maui, she's an advocate who eagerly overcomes obstacles and challenges, and views this role as an opportunity of a lifetime.

"From District 13, Representative Mahina Poepoe. Mahina was born and raised on Moloka'i, she is a Native Hawaiian woman who is passionate about *aloha 'aina*, and seeks to bring this intention to government.

"From District 14, Representative Elle Cochran. Elle is the purple hair lady who is a surfer, she previously lived off the grid, she is a floral arranger, she is passionate about regenerative agriculture, and she will work her hardest to ensure that the voice of her community is heard in the State House.

"From District 22, Representative Andrew Garrett. Andrew was born and raised in Kanagawa, Japan, he's a former cabinet member, he is married to my law school classmate, Patti, and he wants to ensure that his two daughters and all families here have opportunities to thrive in Hawai'i.

"From District 27, Representative Jenna Takenouchi. Jenna is a problem solver who thrives in absorbing information, has a background in library and information sciences, and is a trivia expert.

"District 32, Representative Micah Aiu. Micah is an attorney and volleyball coach who makes history as the first mother/son team serving concurrently in the House and Senate, and who wants to make Hawai'i a better place to live.

"From District 35, Representative Cory Chun. Cory began his public service as a member of the Waipahu Neighborhood Board, and his entire family, himself, his wife, and his two children all have names that begin with the letter C.

"From District 36, Representative Rachele Lamosao. Rachele is a mother, lifelong Waipahu resident, a proud Marauder, she is the youngest female Waipahu representative elected thus far, and wants to create a better future for her son, Waipahu, and Hawai'i.

"From District 40, Representative Rose Martinez. Rose is the dean of the freshman class, she has a never quit and a can do attitude, whose lifelong passion and purpose is to serve her community and make a positive difference for the state.

"From District 44, Representative Darius Kila. The son of Stephen Kila, Jr. and Heide Kila, grandson of Grandma Leslie, and a proud, diehard Taylor Swift fan, Kapolei High and collegiate football player, and the tallest member of the Legislature.

"From District 50, Representative Natalia Hussey-Burdick. Natalia is a former restaurant server who fosters stray kittens, who fell in love with the legislative process, and is not afraid to take on our toughest challenges and brings so much enthusiasm to the House.

"Those are our freshmen. But I'd like to spend a couple of minutes to introduce our sophomore members because they were elected two years ago during the pandemic shutdown and they have never had an open Opening Day yet, where they could be introduced to everyone. So, I wanted to just do that very quickly.

"From District 4, Representative and Vice Speaker Greggor Ilagan. From District 5, Representative Jeanne Kapela. From District 21, Representative Jackson Sayama. From District 24, Representative Adrian Tam. From District 30, Representative Sonny Ganaden. And from District 51, Representative Lisa Marten. Could you please give a hand to all of our freshmen and sophomore members.

"So, as you know, the past three years impacted everyone in our community. Stay-at-home parents instantly became homeroom teachers; students could no longer have daily interactions with other students; employees faced fiscal uncertainty; employers faced business uncertainty; individuals and communities already at a disadvantage when times are good carried even more hardships; families lost loved ones, including the recent loss of community members and leaders; and our healthcare professionals and first responders worked tirelessly through it all.

"As we return, we know that the lessons and inspirations of meeting difficult challenges will always be with us. Every crisis, if met together with resilience and resolve, brings new lessons and a chance to improve. In the face of adversity, this House rejected business as usual and arose in action and inquiry in unconventional ways. We asked the community to work with us in ways that were outside the box to better understand conditions and aspirations, and to produce results.

"There are a few groups here today whose work continues to be felt and I want to acknowledge them very briefly. The first is the chairs who ran our House committees during the pandemic shutdown. And in doing so, each took on specific initiatives to manage the problems we were facing. Could our House chairs please stand to be recognized.

"The second group is the House Select Committee on COVID-19 Economic and Financial Preparedness that the House formed in March 2020. This committee included leaders from the public, private, and nonprofit sectors, and it protected public health and our economy by developing reopening protocols, creating mass vaccination centers, and providing timely data to the public.

"Several members from our COVID-19 committee are with us today, Peter Ho, Dr. Mark Mugiishi, Elliot Mills, Na'alehu Anthony, Pamela Tumpap, Tina Yamaki, Sheryl Matsuoka, Sherry Menor-McNamara, Dr. Carl Bonham, and Su Shin. Could you please stand to be recognized.

"The third group is the House's Mauna Kea Working Group that met for a year and a half to propose a new governance structure for Mauna Kea. The proposal is now law and is being implemented. Simply put, this group is showing us how we can resolve conflict in our state. Several working group members are here today, Dr. Noe Wong-Wilson, Rich Matsuda, Brialyon Onodera, Shane Palacat-Nelsen, Jocelyn Leialoha Doane, Dr. Lui Hokoana, Joshua Lanakila Mangauli, Kaiu Kimura, Mahina Paishon Duarte, and Sterling Wong. Please stand to be recognized.

"So, sometimes through adversity we are reminded that we should be better. Without public trust, we cannot lead. All of us need to rise to the highest expectations, and standards of conduct help set the way. Last year, the House asked Judge Dan Foley to chair the Commission to Improve

Standards of Conduct and to make recommendations how standards can be improved.

"This House takes reset and reform seriously and will take up the recommendations in earnest this session. Judge Foley is here with us today along with another member, former U.S. Attorney Flo Nakakuni. Could you please stand to be recognized.

"COVID challenged us, but we learned and adapted throughout. The pandemic taught us that if we don't meet challenges directly and timely, they will only grow larger, more difficult, and more divisive. It's time to take those lessons and incorporate them into our work.

"Our first step was our decision to continue the hybrid legislative environment allowing in-person and remote testimony from the public. But we are not done.

"One hundred and fifty years ago, in 1873, a 33-year-old Catholic priest from Belgium arrived in our islands, volunteering to serve a spare and forgotten settlement at Kalaupapa. There was not much there except for great need and the sick, caring for the very sick.

"Father Damien and the sisters built shelters, established a reliable water supply, nursed the sick, and welcomed patients as human beings into the community as best as they could become. He labored until his death in 1889, demonstrating courage, resolve, and resilience.

"Today we have far more resources, infrastructure, and authority than Father Damien. But will we have his courage, resolve, and resilience?

"While we undoubtedly deal with many issues, as every other legislature in the U.S. will do this year, we have an opportunity and the resources to focus on unresolved issues that often seem insurmountable. Here are a few examples.

"First, financial relief for Hawai'i residents. We need to continue to build on the progress of prior legislatures to target relief for middle- and lower-income families. One potential reform is to adjust the earned income tax credit, which provides comprehensive relief for 108,000 Hawai'i households.

"Second, renewable energy. The Legislature set the year 2045 as the deadline for our 100% renewable energy mandate. A \$200 million investment for low interest, pay-as-you-go loans for low- and moderate-income families would allow up to 7,600 households to install solar battery systems, resulting in lower utility bills and preventing the emission of 767,000 metric tons of greenhouse gases over the lifetime of their systems.

"Third, Hawaiian home lands. Last year, the Legislature made a concerted decision to reduce the waitlist. We will work with the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands to ensure there is a strategic and common-sense plan to leverage and maximize the \$600 million infusion.

"Fourth, mental health. The gaps in our mental health system can be seen as we walk and drive through our communities. The pandemic has exacerbated the demand for mental health services. We will work with our mental health partners, the Judiciary, and the Department of Health to identify, treat, and support these members of our community.

"Fifth, housing. We will add another \$300 million to finance affordable housing projects, to meet the housing demand for lower-income groups.

"Sixth, state parks and trails. Visitors should pay fees to maintain our state parks, trails, and other venues. We should create a statewide visitor reservation and payment system; make major investments to repair or restore our state parks, ocean resources, and forests; and harness the enthusiasm and physical strength of community organizations to maintain our parks and trails.

"And finally, Red Hill. When it comes to the current state of our environment, no issue presents more of an existential challenge than the purity and well-being of our water. The House will reauthorize a special committee for Red Hill and the aquifer, for accountability as well as to formulate a state and local coordinated policy as we step into the stewardship of this most precious resource that feeds this entire island, our people, businesses, and future.

"In all of these areas, we open this session pledging resolve and fresh perspectives. And let me mention one other thing. I'm going to steal this from the Sesame Street playbook. The Sesame Street word of the day is 'cooperation.' Cooperation, as you know, is the process of working together toward the same ends. In order for Hawai'i to be successful, we must all endeavor to cooperate with each other. And we should routinely challenge ourselves to serve as Father Damien did, and would ask us to do so with courage, resilience, and resolve.

"So, speaking of cooperation, as you know, there have been some media reports speculating on the relationship between the Legislature and the Governor. So, let me be clear. The House will work with Governor Green and his team in good faith and in a positive manner so that we can solve problems and bring results to Hawai'i residents. Governor Green, could you please stand to be recognized. And I guess the Lieutenant Governor can also stand to be recognized.

"The year 2023 is a challenge and opportunity for all of us. Freshmen with enthusiasm and energy, sophomore members with the benefit of fresh perspectives on existing issues, and veterans with institutional and experiential knowledge.

"Let's resolve to face and deal with problems together, with and for the community. Let's be resilient in the face of adverse conditions. Let's have the courage to make this time and labor count, for all. And maybe we should routinely ask of ourselves, what would Father Damien do?

"Thank you, members, and let's have a productive session."

The Chair then recognized Representative Matsumoto, the Minority Leader, to deliver remarks on behalf of the Minority Caucus:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Majority Leader Nakamura, friends, family, and public who are here to celebrate with us today, good morning and *aloha*.

"I remember standing in this room for the first time 10 years ago, humbled by what it meant to be a State House Representative. I remember the excitement and the anticipation, and let's be honest, a little bit of nerves. Let me tell you, that doesn't go away. But each and every one of us being sworn in today has worked so hard to get here. You each have a vision and a passion to serve your community.

"So, on my first opening day, I remember my brother coming up to me. He gave me a lei, he looked at me and he said, get over yourself. Younger brothers, I tell you. And while it pains me to admit it, he was right. None of us have gotten to this point alone.

"I'd like you to just take the time to think of all of those who have helped you to get here today. Your family, your friends, your mentors, and your communities. And as we go through session, I ask you to never forget why you are here and who you are doing it for.

"Each of us standing here today has been honored to represent thousands of people in our communities. Hawai'i deserves leadership that will work together to put the common interests of people ahead of our own. And sometimes that will mean voicing opposition. But that's vital for a healthy democracy, and it actually produces better legislation. And though we may have differences, I commit to work collaboratively and fairly, giving honest feedback with respect, and I am humbly asking for your willingness to do the same. Mr. Speaker, thank you for your leadership and commitment to the people of Hawai'i. We look forward to working with you.

"Now, I'd like to take some time to acknowledge the members of the Minority Caucus. As a polyglot speaking Malay, Indonesian, Vietnamese, and English, we have Representative Gene Ward. Representative Gene Ward is an expert in international affairs, as well as local issues. He is our longest serving member, a Vietnam veteran, Peace Corps director, has a Ph.D., and an endless list of accolades from his time serving the people of Hawai'i. Representative Ward, your dedication to serve the people of Hawai'i and your relentless persistence to seek their best interests does not go unnoticed.

"His not-so-secret talent of singing and playing *'ukulele*, we have Representative Diamond Garcia. Diamond has brought much joy to his district on the leeward side of O'ahu. I'd also like to add that he just beat me

out for the record, for the youngest Republican ever elected in the State of Hawai'i by just two months. But this is a title that I gladly pass on. Representative Garcia, your passion and youthful zeal to uphold the values of the people of Hawai'i are a force to be reckoned with.

"As a Division I rower at USC, we have Representative Kanani Souza. Representative Souza went on to be an attorney licensed in both Hawai'i and Washington, D.C. She is also a proud graduate of Kamehameha Schools. Representative Souza, your strength and unwavering conviction gives me confidence that this legislature will be held to the highest standard.

"As a sixth generation from Ewa Beach, we have Representative David Alcos. Representative Alcos is a successful business owner and leading contractor in Hawai'i's construction industry. He is a proud husband, father, and papa, and really sticks to his values of family first. Representative Alcos, your incredible ability to stand firm in your conviction while still having a soft heart is a skill that few have mastered.

"And last but not least, as an athlete, referee, chaplain, professor, author, and officer in the Air Force Reserves, Representative Elijah Pierick, he has accomplished so much at such a young age. Representative Pierick, your desire to seek change and growth in every area while still pursuing humility is admirable.

"And I'm proud to stand among each and every one of you today. Although our caucus is few in numbers, we are strong in our passion, conviction, and motivation. And let me tell you, we have a lot to bring to the table.

"What brings us all together today, but the one thing we all absolutely have in common is we all call Hawai'i home. Everyone in Hawai'i will be affected by the decisions that we make in this chamber. The House Republican Caucus is committed to take a stand for Hawai'i this legislative session so that the people of Hawai'i aren't simply surviving but thriving.

"Our Republican legislation will focus on combating the high cost of living, assisting local families towards home ownership, supporting the rights of people to make decisions for themselves and for their families, implementing government reform, and keeping our communities safe by being tough on crime as well as focused on rehabilitation.

"I'd like to just take a quick moment to highlight a few of the policies that we're going to introduce. As we know, the majority of people in Hawai'i are living paycheck to paycheck. For years, the cost of living has been a top issue. And for decades, the Republican Caucus has introduced legislation to eliminate tax on food and medical services. This is not a revolutionary idea. The majority of states are already doing this. Even further, we propose to eliminate the state income tax. For the average household, this will provide an additional \$15,000 back in their pockets. That is life changing.

"Home ownership is unattainable for the majority of our state. It is a pipe dream. The people of Hawai'i need assurance that we as a legislative body are taking every possible action so that families are not left with the tough decision to leave Hawai'i. Creating paths towards home ownership is a top priority. One of the biggest obstacles to buying a home is a down payment. So, we propose a down payment assistance program to make that pipe dream a reality.

"And the people in our state want their voices to be heard and are more than capable of making choices that are best for them and for their families. We want to turn the volume up on their voices to be heard through legislation like implementing local school boards. Every single state has implemented local school boards except for Hawai'i. By doing this, communities will have a greater say in the direction of our public education, and local voices need to have a seat at the table.

"And our legislative body has lost the trust of the people. In order to earn that trust back, government reform is imperative. We propose several safeguards to ensure that elected officials are held to the highest standards, as well as a 12-year term limit for state elected officials. We need transparency in government now more than ever.

"And finally, the phrase 'crime is on the rise' doesn't even begin to capture the severity of the issue. Last week, we all heard the story on the news of the man who broke into a 77-year-old woman's home, pushed her down the stairs and violently beat her. That man is a convicted murderer who was let

out of jail. And this is an issue that hits close to home because that woman is my neighbor.

"Crime is happening in our backyards. For the last decade, our policies have opened the doors to an increase in crime, and our communities are looking to us to make laws that protect them this legislative session. And that's why we will introduce legislation to be tough on crime, as well as focused on rehabilitation.

"In the last decade that I've been here, I learned it's critical to think not only of our own goals and priorities, but we must recognize that first, great accomplishments don't happen alone. And second, in order to do the best work for our state, we have to genuinely listen and work together.

"It is with so much gratitude that I stand here today. Equal to the amount of gratitude that I feel is the weight of responsibility heavy on my shoulders, our shoulders, to ensure that Hawai'i stays home for generations to come. People of Hawai'i, we are listening. We want to hear what you have to say. Please join us this legislative session to have your voices be heard to make the best possible future for the generations to come. And to all of my colleagues in the room, let's enjoy the celebrations of today. But tomorrow, let's get over ourselves and work together for the people of Hawai'i. *Mahalo.*"

The Chair then recognized Representative Nakamura, the Majority Leader, to deliver remarks on behalf of the Majority Caucus:

"*Aloha* and good morning, everyone. Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members, for the opportunity to serve as majority leader of our Democratic Party Caucus. I would like to first recognize Representative Della Au Belatti for her five years of service as majority leader. Della, please stand. We thank you for your leadership, for your boundless energy, and the sacrifices you made to guide the majority caucus. And *mahalo*, Representative Belatti, for personally helping me and my staff prepare for this new challenge.

"Mr. Speaker, we all know how much our families and friends help us get elected and support us so that we can do our work. I'd like to recognize my mother, Mabel Maeda, 95 years old. And I'd like to thank my family and my friends in the gallery for their support over the years. And a special shout out to Ben Viernes and my staff, past and present, who continue to support me.

"While there has been a dark cloud hanging over the Legislature, Mr. Speaker, please take note. The voters of Hawai'i, from Hilo to Hanalei, reelected 31 incumbent Democrats in the House. Hawai'i residents gave their vote of confidence because members responded to their concerns, passed meaningful and impactful legislation, engaged with their communities, problem solved, helped their constituents navigate the state bureaucracy, and most of all conducted themselves ethically. Mr. Speaker, I'm honored to serve alongside incumbents and the 14 new Democrats you just introduced.

"We heard loud and clear from our constituents that we need more affordable housing, we need more mental health services, and we need to take care of our natural resources.

"Mr. Speaker, your House Majority believes that our families in Hawai'i cannot grow and thrive without building more affordable housing. Although we allocated close to \$1 billion for housing last session, we can't take our foot off the pedal. The State Legislature's past investment will yield over 7,000 affordable housing units over the next several years. By putting an additional \$300 million into the Rental Housing Revolving Fund, we can build another 800 units of affordable housing and keep the development and construction pipeline flowing. I would like to thank Housing Chair Troy Hashimoto for his work on this bill.

"The House Majority believes we must listen to the voices that are not always heard in these halls. The growing need for child and adult mental health services requires a multi-pronged approach, including bills to improve and expedite assisted community treatment for those experiencing severe mental health crises and improve youth crisis response services through a pilot mobile outreach program. We recognize you, Speaker Saiki, and Representative Lisa Marten for working with our community partners and the administration to craft these bills.

"The House Majority deeply values the natural beauty and resources of the State of Hawai'i and believe it's our responsibility to steward our lands and waters. We propose funding targeted to divisions within DLNR who *mālama* our natural resources, and in doing so help to mitigate and adapt to climate change.

"Funds are needed to purchase heavy equipment to clear debris to prevent flooding, develop fire resistant landscapes, develop an urban forestry program, reforest acres of land with koa and other native tree species, control and maintain invasive species that threaten watershed functions. And there are many other ways that we can add to this list. But we also would like to leverage critical federal grants. We thank Energy and Environmental Protection Chair Nicole Lowen for working on this bill.

"Mr. Speaker, your House Majority serves with *aloha*, a willingness to collaborate, a pledge to resolve differences respectfully. We commit to work hard, to serve with integrity, and most of all, work together for all of Hawai'i's residents. *Mahalo piha.*"

The House of Representatives of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2023, convened at 12:03 p.m., with Vice Speaker Ilagan presiding.

The invocation was delivered by Representative Micah P.K. Aiu, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representative Nakashima, who was excused.

By unanimous consent, reading and approval of the Journal of the House of Representatives of the First Day was deferred.

At 9:09 a.m., the Chair declared a recess and the House of Representatives stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair, and in accordance with House Concurrent Resolution No. 2 met in Joint Session with the Senate to receive the Governor's State of the State address.

JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the House of Representatives and the Senate of the Thirty-Second Legislature, Regular Session of 2023, was called to order at 10:04 a.m. by the Honorable Scott K. Saiki, Speaker of the House of Representatives, following the *pule* delivered by Kumu Hinaleimoana Wong-Kalu.

The Speaker then called upon Representatives Nadine Nakamura and Lauren Matsumoto on behalf of the House of Representatives, and Senators Michelle Kidani and Dru Kanuha on behalf of the Senate, to escort the Honorable Josh Green, Governor of the State of Hawai'i, to the rostrum.

The Governor was presented with lei by Representative Dee Morikawa on behalf of the House of Representatives, and Senator Donna Kim on behalf of the Senate.

The Speaker then presented to the Members of the Thirty-Second Legislature and the audience, the Honorable Josh Green, Governor of the State of Hawai'i.

The Governor then addressed the Joint Session as follows:

"*Aloha*. Thank you for that welcome, it warms my heart. Good people of Hawai'i, Jaime, Speaker Saiki, Senate President Kouchi, Chief Justice Recktenwald, OHA Chairwoman Carmen Lindsey, Lieutenant Governor Sylvia Luke, honorable members of our Legislature, colleagues and friends, former governors of our state, I respect you so much, mayors, your representatives, congressional delegation, foreign dignitaries, and leaders from our public sector and private sectors, *mahalo* for being here. I appreciate you.

"It's a great honor to stand before you here and address you as your governor. This is more than just an update. This is more than an update just on our progress as a state. This is our beginning, our *huliau*. A moment to share our vision and values.

"Over the past few years, we have come through enormous challenges together. We endured a once-in-a-century pandemic that impacted our way of life, threatened our economy, and robbed us of too many precious lives. We wrestled with a housing crisis. This housing crisis forced too many of

our people out of our state, in search of economic opportunity or, more importantly, affordable homes.

"We witnessed the risks and the consequences of an economy that's simply too dependent on tourism alone. And we suffered environmental threats from both pollution and the effects of global climate change.

"But even in our darkest hours, Hawai'i's values shone through. The character and soul of our people has prevailed, and we found a new dawn of hope. A new dawn of hope together. Through these difficult times, we showed that when we stand together, when we put our values into action, we can meet almost any challenge and overcome any problem, no matter how large or difficult it may seem.

"People of Hawai'i have elected us to lead and they've given us a clear mandate, and I say 'us' a clear mandate, not me, to act on their behalf following our common values. It's time for us to move Hawai'i forward. And we'll do that by taking bold action rooted in these values that we share.

"Unity. Governor John A. Burns said it best. 'In diversity, there can be unity; in division, there is a schism.' Hawai'i is one *'ohana*, one family, and this is one of our most important values and greatest strengths. In its essence, *'ohana* is a commitment to each other with *aloha*, respect and appreciation for our diversity, and tolerance of our differences, all in service to the greater good. I know we share that value.

"It allows all of us to benefit from our different cultures, our perspectives, our lived experience. And that is a different lived experience all across our state. Through this we forge a single unity of purpose out of the most diverse population imaginable. Look at us. Look how diverse. We unite and bring all of our strengths to bear on the urgent issues we face with this diversity.

"This will be one of my most important responsibilities as governor, honestly, to bring people together. I'll unite us as one *'ohana*, and always remind us that we're stronger together and that we can accomplish anything when we share a common purpose.

"A mandate for bold action. The preamble of our constitution in Hawai'i holds that, 'we reserve the right to control our destiny, to nurture the integrity of our people and culture, and to preserve the quality of life that we desire.' It's not only our right, but our *kuleana*, our responsibility, to take action to control that destiny and preserve the quality of life for our people. Our constitution gives us this right, and the people of Hawai'i have given us, again 'us,' the mandate and imperative as their elected leaders to do it.

"So, today we need new ideas, we need new solutions, and bold action rooted in these shared values, once again. So, you know me. Business as usual won't work anymore, there's simply too much on the line to accept the status quo. Each day without action means another family is forced to leave to the mainland, another child is sleeping on the street, another local business closes, or another precious natural resource is put at risk. Each day without action means we miss another opportunity to heal Hawai'i, do what's right and just, and preserve our islands for the future generations.

"So, our administration has already begun to act with urgency since day one. Our state motto says so powerfully, 'the life of the land is perpetuated in righteousness.' And this is the moment for righteous, bold action rooted in our common values.

"So, I ask everyone here to say yes to the wisdom of guiding us in our constitution, our motto. And in the mandate the people have given us, say yes to new ideas, solutions, and to putting our values into action. Say yes to achieving goals. Yes to overcoming challenges. Yes, we can make a difference in our communities and the lives of the most vulnerable. And yes to more housing, as we all believe. Yes to more jobs and opportunities for our young residents. Yes to building and leading the world on renewable energy. Yes to lowering the cost of living, which we know is the most important thing that our families wrestle with. And, yes to governing ethically together.

"We owe the people of Hawai'i an effective government that takes action. If we accept our *kuleana* and we follow the mandate we've been given and take rooted action in common values, we'll show the people of our state that we're working for them and they can believe in government once again.

"So, what have we done so far? Today is day 49 of our administration. We've had a little more than 1,000 hours on the job. We've already accomplished a great deal together in a short time.

"We nominated a cabinet of qualified public servants, led by my chief of staff, Brooke Wilson. Thank you, Brooke, for that. I appreciate you. We showed respect to our public workers with administrative leave during the holiday season, a move which also supported local spending and our local businesses.

"We announced a new educator tax credit, which I hope that you guys will believe in, so that our teachers can receive a \$500 credit to support the work and investment they put into students in the classroom.

"Because of your work, your work, we released \$50 million in grants-in-aid to directly support our non-profits across our state and the service providers for the critical work that they do in our communities. That's credit to you, thank you for giving us those resources for people who need it.

"And we've proposed a climate impact fund of \$100 million, right out of the gate, to fight climate change. We've announced the return of over 363 acres to the Hawaiian Homes Commission on Moloka'i for beneficiaries.

"And we've signed an agreement with Haneda Airport to streamline travel and promote made-in-Hawai'i products and even improve Daniel K. Inouye Airport. We took immediate action to prevent disruption in a health care crisis when the service to our rural communities was threatened when the plane crashed from Hawai'i Life Flight. This saved lives along the way. We've been active. Our administration attacks problems.

"So, now is the time to invest in our people and our communities. With this in mind, I'll identify, right now, several of the priorities our legislature and administration must act on to move Hawai'i forward. I take to heart what you are saying.

"Budget and bill priorities. The Legislature, on Opening Day, already advanced extraordinary ideas. Our budget will reflect those priorities. We're adding and emphasizing several high priority items related to housing, homelessness, the cost of living, climate, environment, and mental health.

"Some important specifics that you'll see right now, additional Ohana Zone funding, which puts homeless individuals into permanent housing right away to give them the chance to thrive. You already have supported that, *mahalo*.

"More resources for the Hawai'i State Loan Repayment Program to help pay off educational loans for primary care providers and behavioral health providers so that Hawai'i remains the health state for generations to come. This investment once and for all addresses our healthcare provider shortage. Once and for all, we cannot have shortages in our neighbor islands. Thank you for supporting these initiatives.

"In the health theme, our budget also adds 60 new positions to expand nursing and medical programs across all of the UH campuses, with a special emphasis on behavioral health, which the freshmen legislators made very clear was a priority for them. *Mahalo* early legislators.

"And we also know that there has to be more service in certain parts of our state. So, we'll expand the intensive care unit and medical surgical units at Hilo Hospital with a \$50 million request for CIP funds. They have great needs on Big Island, and we saw that during the pandemic. Thank you for that recommendation, Big Island.

"In your wisdom, you created an Office of Wellness & Resilience within the Governor's Office, to focus on trauma informed care. We have put resources in there to make that permanent. And we will have a concerted push to protect our natural environment in partnership with all of the great work that you always have done.

"We're adding critical mental health resources in our budget for schools and our communities, because that's where kids get care. And finally, we'll be supporting our state's priority to make pre-K universally available to Hawai'i's families, led by my lieutenant governor, whom I think some of you know.

"Since our inauguration last month, I've been meeting with departments and agencies to insist we break barriers and open doors in the halls of government. I tell them constantly care for people. That's my message. So, here's how we're going to start caring for people.

"Affordable housing. The biggest factor affecting the cost of living in our state, the biggest, is affordable housing. Safe, affordable, and stable housing is a human right. And it's more than just a place to live, it impacts our health, our identity, our sense of belonging.

"Housing crises are not new. All the way back, May 15, 1935, the Eighteenth Territorial Legislature created the Hawai'i Housing Authority, this basically as the first body in our islands' history dedicated to addressing the housing needs of our state as a priority. But nearly nine decades later, we're still working to provide housing for our people.

"When Governor Burns signed Act 105 into law on June 19, 1970, which was 5 months after I was born, state government initiated housing and community development on a scale unprecedented in our state. So, I suggest we return now to an era of bold housing initiatives.

"I'm completely aware that you've already begun this fight. But, we need a comprehensive approach, it has to continue, to housing on all segments of our population, from renters, to low- to moderate-income individuals, to families, to those experiencing homelessness. That's why our administration is making housing the top priority and committing a comprehensive housing agenda to you. You'll see the details right now.

"Developing infrastructure from the resources we appropriate for the state is crucial in every way to create adequate housing. But we need to start from the ground to make sure that our infrastructure is built, and affordable housing actually gets expedited. We'll also address and improve policies and processes that impede the development of housing. This has become a very big problem.

"And we can't do this alone. We need a coordinated approach with the counties and our stakeholders. That's why I'm glad they're here today. We need to also make these big investments, but we have to coordinate getting rid of the red tape. So, we're proposing over \$1 billion of new investment in housing, and I've already heard some of that from you, as leaders.

"To be specific, these funds will be used to support major investments in the Hawai'i Public Housing Authority to renovate and upgrade public housing units, to provide state rental subsidies for the low-income families we have, and to boost financing for more affordable units through the Hawai'i Housing Finance and Development Corporation, HHFDC. You are all familiar with these approaches.

"But we'll also deliver on the Legislature's commitment to fund the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands. This is a priority for our administration. I know you want answers, we will work with you to get this done.

"In addition, new ideas, we propose a state match for a city affordable housing program, which incentivizes the development of more affordable housing rental units in urban Honolulu. Mayor Blangiardi and I are already partnering on our approach, day and night, to this housing initiative because the crisis is felt most intensely on O'ahu, but of course, all across our state. So, I'll partner with all of our mayors, and regularly convene stakeholders across all sectors so we can troubleshoot and streamline the processes to speed up housing. These projects have to go faster.

"So, what you'll see is you'll see us cutting red tape so we can provide housing as soon as possible. And it will likely require additional action from you and from the executive branch. Please don't doubt the scope of this problem requires both.

"Now I'd like to talk about housing communities that are homeless based. We can't forget about our unhoused communities. They're struggling. In the past, efforts to address homelessness has often emphasized enforcement and triage. Pushing people from one neighborhood to another, moving people from street or shelter to temporary housing, with many frankly finding themselves back right where they started.

"We've made progress at getting people into homes in recent years, but the number of people on the street, those experiencing unsheltered

homelessness, continues to rise, and we see it every day. We need to shift our efforts from temporary fixes to a permanent solution. We need these places immediately.

"Homelessness should not be accepted as a normal of our society. It shouldn't be normal to avert our eyes from the suffering of another human being, ever. We shouldn't ever need to avoid our public places because homeless citizens have overwhelmed a park or street or sidewalk. We've come to accept the silent suffering that goes on for thousands of our people in our parks, along our beaches, even here on the grounds of the State Capitol. Our homeless crisis is a strain on our *aloha* and a threat to our spirit.

"That's why we're committed to the development of 12 *kauhale* across our state, 12 *kauhale*. As you know, *kauhale* are tiny villages. They are communities where people can thrive. And we send our special respect and application to Twinkle, to Auntie Blanche, to others who have been pioneers in this area.

"So soon, Hawai'i will break ground on a new neighbor island *kauhale*, perhaps in the next two or three days. This will be at Kukuioia Emergency Shelter and Assessment Center in Kona. With 64 units, this new *kauhale* will meet the housing, social, and healthcare needs of a people there on the street. It will help future residents for years to come and it will only cost \$8,000 per unit, that's about \$500,000 in total.

"Now, for perspective, it costs \$322,000 a year to support a person who is suffering with schizophrenia or other mental illnesses at our Hawai'i State Hospital, \$322,000 per person, per year. So, for less than the cost of keeping two such people out of a hospital for one year, we can build an entire community of low-cost, permanent housing, a *kauhale*. Just two people.

"Building *kauhale* communities takes time, it takes energy, it takes planning, it takes people, it takes passion. It also takes conviction, a commitment to breaking from the status quo. So again, Twinkle Borge and Blanche McMillan, just two names among many, are showing what it takes to embrace this village concept to help our people find a permanent home.

"So, to be specific, our enhanced *kauhale* initiative will follow their example, it will create low-footprint, low-cost housing, with a village environment designed for community support, healing, and progress. As long as we are in a housing crisis, we'll treat it like an emergency.

"So, I'm going to do something a little untraditional. I'm going to take action right now, with all of you. I've spoken with many of you as leaders. As of this moment, because this is a crisis, in my hands is an emergency proclamation. And I'm signing it for you, for all of us. It goes into effect today. Thank you for that.

"This emergency proclamation will streamline construction and processes for housing, low-impact housing. It removes unnecessary barriers, it removes red tape. We've done this before together and it worked. It enables our partners, our community leaders, to tackle homelessness head-on, right quick, affordably. A copy of this proclamation will be delivered to your offices right now. Thank you for working with me on this.

"The cost of living. Two weeks ago, I testified in person before the House Finance Committee on the meaning of ALICE, asset limited, income-constrained, and employed-people. These are families that are struggling to afford very basic household necessities such as childcare, healthcare, and transportation. Families who have to choose between buying food or medicine for their families. One paycheck, one paycheck away from a healthcare crisis which would bankrupt them, slipping them deeper into poverty or facing eviction.

"Our cost of living is the highest in the country at nearly twice the national average. We all know this. In Hawai'i, we should not teeter, none of our people should teeter on the brink of poverty in order to simply provide for their *ohana*. Our job should be enough to support our families with just one employed person in our family.

"So, here's what we're going to do. Our plan takes the necessary steps to strengthen the health of ALICE families in our communities. The Green Affordability Plan, GAP, cuts taxes significantly and provides tax relief for people that need it the most. And I was so grateful to hear that in the speech of Speaker Saiki and alluded to by Senate President very passionately just one week ago. Give them a round of applause, they are incredible people.

"If adopted fully, this package, by the Legislature, it will provide just over \$300 million in tax relief annually to the people who need it the most. This tax break will help us get money into the pockets of the working families that I referenced, so that they can purchase essential goods and services like food, medicine, and housing, as we discussed. And it will in turn stimulate our economy because every single dollar that goes back to an ALICE family will be spent immediately in the economy, immediately.

"So, this proposal follows very specifically the recommendations of the 2020 Tax Commission. So, we will reform our tax code. We do this to provide for a cost-of-living adjustment in response to recent inflammatory pressures. They were inflammatory but they're also inflationary, which is really what I meant to say.

"This plan provides universal tax relief, and let me break it out for you. We shift the tax brackets slightly to ensure that working families aren't burdened by inflation, more than double the standard deduction from \$2,200 to \$5,000. We double the personal exemption from \$1,144 to \$2,288. Now it may sound complicated, but it's not. Our current tax structure misses support, in many cases, for ALICE families. It helps people who are in deep, deep, deep trouble, but in the ALICE family sense, it doesn't.

"And I'm just going to show you just a little bit of what it looks like without dwelling on this, okay. Right now, ALICE families are in the middle here. These are people that make between \$41,000 and \$129,000 depending on how many kids they have. They really struggle to pay their rent, their mortgages, for food. We have a lot of tax breaks for people who are deeply, deeply impoverished. So, you can get an idea of what that looks like.

"If we implement this plan together, this is what it looks like. These are those ALICE families, and these are the tax breaks that they would see. It would be tax breaks for every single income bracket in our state. They'd be paying less taxes under this plan. This is where we are focusing our energies.

"So, I reiterate, the Green Affordability Plan directly supports ALICE families. This plan makes sure every income bracket does a little better. And it directly lowers Hawai'i's cost of living for every single resident by keeping more money in our pockets for each taxpayer, especially those who are wrestling with survival. This proposal means that a family of four in every income bracket can anticipate \$2,000 in savings right off the bat through reduced taxes. And lower-income families will see even more savings, significantly. For many, this is the equivalent of a full extra paycheck every year.

"In the spirit of what you've been proposing and working on for years, sometimes with me, sometimes with other leaders, the Green Affordability Plan also intentionally rewards families who take care of others, the caretakers, the caregivers, and educators. As I mentioned, it creates a new educator tax credit of \$500 per teacher. They can help their students. It provides our hardest-hit residents a renters' credit of \$350. It also makes the food/excise tax credit available to a full third of all taxpayers. It expands the earned income tax credit from 20% to 30% of the federal amount.

"We will also take bold action to expand something important, the child and dependent care tax credit. Now, under this proposal, working families paying for daycare, babysitters, summer camps, after school care, care for support is needed when families are working, and people who have adult daycare individuals in their family, they'll be eligible for up to \$10,000 to offset the costs of the fees that are going into all of that care.

"Now, this will provide huge relief for working families and help reduce the choice that they face. They have to face the choice of whether to start a family or invest in a career. That choice won't be before them if they're able to have this tax credit.

"Now, how can we afford this? Well, this plan doesn't just make it easier for ALICE families. This plan goes to the core of what economic growth has to be. This plan will grow our economy. It ensures healthier *kūpuna*, our *keiki* are healthier, they have more care, it reduces the burden placed on family caretakers all across our state. This way they don't have to choose between a job, childcare, rent, or healthcare, or even between school supplies and dinner.

"So, the Green Affordability Plan, our plan, is essentially relief from the economic burdens faced by all of the families who are right now choosing

to leave our islands. We've thought long and hard about this, how resources should be allocated and invested. And these are our state priorities. So, when we invest in families, we invest in our future, and our return on investment is unlimited as it will come back to us tenfold.

"Now, as you can see, I feel that the people of Hawai'i deserve generational tax reform. And I think this is the time to do it, with a new legislature, a new governor, coming out of the pandemic. All the stars have aligned for us to take action for people. And what this will do will help us build a more equitable future, where our people can be productive and secure. A future where residents are not one paycheck away from crisis. A future where our priorities reflect, actually, our values, and that we can all rise together as one 'ohana. That's what this plan is about.

"Our climate crisis. Tax relief provides immediate support to our families across the state, but we also need to take action to protect our environment and our planet. Which is why we have direct and long-term effects constantly on the horizon. Even as our economy is struggling, we have to look to the future for climate response. This is why addressing climate change today is most important. So, the impact of climate change is wide-ranging.

"As an island state, climate change does so many things. It threatens our economy, our culture, our environment, and really the sustainability of our way of life. So, you heard me commit \$100 million for climate impact funds steered by the Climate Change Mitigation and Adaption Commission. So, it's not just my ideas, it's the ideas of those who know about the environment.

"But we're committed to broader strategies on climate change, strategies that are equitable, culturally responsive to a resilient future. And this includes looking at resiliency of the power grid, renewable energy, sustainable transportation, land use planning, sea level rise, the health and how it's impacted by the environment, natural and cultural resource impacts, and frankly much more. So, we've dedicated these resources in a vital effort, but we can't do this alone at all.

"So, this fund, which I do believe is a necessity, will be open to contributions from anyone, whether they are local or from around the globe. This is our opportunity to seek resources on the impact of tourism.

"Now let's break this out a little bit. The revenues generated from visitor impact fees should fortify all of our efforts to protect Hawai'i's people and our way of life. And we'll continue to take the impacts of climate change seriously. I support any plan, any plan that gets us to a place where resources come from the impact of travelers to protect our environment. Thank you, Senate President, for expressing those good ideas.

"Economic development. Our administration will work to ensure that our economy does several things. Fosters prosperity for all of our people, creates opportunities for our *keiki*, protects the unique character of Hawai'i, and finally, strengthens and supports all of our shared values. So, we're not going to sit passively on the sidelines any longer when it comes to our economic development. We'll reach out to beyond our shores and seek opportunities for our people.

"In doing so, we'll fill the promise that Governor Burns saw for our state, and in his words, Hawai'i will finally assume our rightful place in the Pacific sun. We're the center of the Pacific, linking Australia, New Zealand, Taiwan, Japan, Korea, and the broader United States. In the coming years, I hope to reposition our economy to pursue global opportunities. We retool tourism, develop green technologies, and expand our reach into international markets better than ever for our small businesses and also our world-class professional sector.

"How do we do this? We do this by being bold. We'll have to move beyond an economy of pure tourism, and we have to become energy independent, as you all know. We fulfill this potential as an economic renewable energy leader in the Pacific.

"We have already, in the first 49 days, been doing something. We've been working with partners across the globe, Japan, local businesses, and key sectors from Hawai'i's economy. Like the international wedding industry, which also brings in 20% of all the visitors from Japan. We're working with them to change the way we view our traditional economy. And welcoming more visitors like our Japanese neighbors means we can generate much

more revenue for local businesses while taking in fewer tourists overall. That's tourism management.

"But we're also working on new plans. New plans to increase the export of locally-made and locally-grown products with our regional partners. Despite being the 41st largest state by population, we rank last of all U.S. states in overall economic exports, a statistic that has to change. So, our economy is rife with untapped potential. We'll encourage small businesses and professional service sectors to seek new markets beyond our islands. Health tourism should be among that.

"But we'll strengthen, most importantly, Native Hawaiian-owned businesses. By supporting Native Hawaiian-owned businesses, we support Hawaiian agricultural food products like taro, breadfruit, sweet potatoes, and we promote indigenous farming practices to keep our people physically, mentally, and spiritually nourished. Diversifying our crops, expanding on ag with food systems that actually help us connect with the land and each other, helps us grow in ways that we haven't done before. We eat together, we grow foods together, we deepen our connection to our 'āina. This is critical for our state.

"By advocating for our local interests and through dialogue with our partners, we can create many more opportunities for Hawai'i. I'm pleased to share that we are doing something right now, it's an initiative with the federal government, our community, and international partners to pursue investment in cutting-edge hydrogen technologies for Hawai'i.

"I'm going to give you the highlight here, through cooperation with partners in Japan, Australia, New Zealand, and the Congress, this technology can help stabilize the Pacific's energy resilience that we need. It promotes our defense infrastructure and reduces our reliance on fossil fuels. To that end, we are preparing right now a historic application to potentially bring over \$1 billion in federal and private sector investments to our state through a regional hydrogen hub.

"The integration of hydrogen technology into our grid, along with continued expansion of traditional renewables, solar, wind, all of the infrastructure, gives utilities, businesses, and local talent an international advantage. With the potential to turn our state into a regional energy exporter, we change the whole model of our economy. Through proactive efforts like these, these are just a few examples, Hawai'i can lead our Pacific neighbors into the future. This is not just through defense initiatives, which are critical to us, but through greater economic, energy, and cultural integration. This is our future.

"So, as you see, what we'll be doing is leveraging climate investments, renewable energy and environmental expertise, and our unique geographic position, our location, to achieve even greater economic diversification. This is one of the ways we escape from a full reliance on tourism.

"Now, please indulge me as I talk about major projects. We also need to address two major projects at least, the stadium and a new correctional facility. We all want a stadium, a place where we can be proud of our sports teams. We want a stadium for our university, our families, our *keiki*, and our broader community.

"Now, when the Aloha Stadium first opened in Central O'ahu on September of 1975, it was a great triumph. We won six of our last eight games that season. We had a new coach. I'll tell you this, we had 40,585 people in the stands on that last game against Tennessee. And the Pittsburgh Steelers that year won their first of their six titles. But for a project of this size, we have to be thoughtful, thorough, and analytical.

"We've already addressed the benefits of a public-private partnership in the future development of the Aloha Stadium, but such a partnership will only work if the state gets a fair deal. We're carefully reviewing our options, we're working with colleagues, because we know that there is some conflict. And we'll find the best option to go forward to make this a reality for our people. We can't afford to wait, as has been pointed out by dear friends. We can't afford to wait, because the longer the delay, the higher the cost. We have to support this stadium with economic activity all around it.

"The same goes for replacing the obsolete OCCC. To replace the OCCC we need to build a modern, new correctional facility that's safe, secure, and humane. It has to have the capacity to provide rehabilitation, counseling,

education, job training opportunities to inmates, and at the same time protects us, protect our kids.

"Almost all of those convicted of non-violent crimes and held in our correctional facilities will someday return to our communities and will be living alongside us as our neighbors. We must move forward with restorative approaches to justice rather than strictly punitive ones.

"As my administration reviewed the details of these projects, we saw that previous legislatures provided general fund monies to begin the construction of a new stadium and plan the construction of the new jail. We'll work with you on projects of this size, hand in hand, we have to work together to reach consensus. Because these two projects will have to be debated seamlessly between us, we have to get it right. Again, our goal will be to secure the best deals for our state and get these projects moving forward as quickly as possible. I am there with you 100% of the way.

"Just a little more to share. Accountable government. Our state deserves transparent and accountable government. We agree on this. Without good governance, without trust, without ethical standards, how can we truly serve the people and make progress for our state? Corruption from the past must be taken seriously and rooted out. The abuse of power is an affront to all the people of Hawai'i. They tell us that day in and day out. And corruption was the basis of widespread pessimism which people expressed openly across our state.

"To be a public servant is to be responsible. It's a privilege, and we carry with this privilege a full responsibility for everyone around us. So, I've directed our new attorney general to take seriously corruption and ethics reform in our state and county government.

"Now, what does this mean? I agree with the recommendations of the House Commission to Improve Standards of Conduct. It's time to, as they said, 'rebuild integrity and trust in government.' I look forward to working with the Legislature in every way on taking a course of action, and I will sign any common-sense legislation that achieves anything meaningful from ethics reform standards in our state government. I am there, again, with you 100% of the way.

"So, as you can see, we'll hold everyone in Hawai'i to this high standard of ethics and accountability. And the federal government, also, and its institutions are no exception. We must hold the U.S. Navy accountable for the environmental disaster at Red Hill and shut it down for good. To be blunt, Hawai'i must never again risk any leaks or spills of any toxic substance into our water supply. This means that any entity or organization that wants to operate in our state must fully understand, respect, and comply with the absolute commitment that Hawai'i will not tolerate pollution of our water.

"The current oversight of Red Hill is not strong enough. I just need to be direct about this. Like so many citizens, I was not satisfied with last week's presentation from the Navy and the EPA. And I say that with respect. The Navy needs to be 100% transparent with us and open with the public and their elected leaders, which is all of us in this room.

"To be specific on how we will approach this, our administration intends to approach Red Hill like we dealt with the pandemic, with continued monitoring, continued updates, continued analysis, and transparent updates so people can see what is actually happening. Enhanced oversight, these frequent updates, and constant communication about the draining of the tanks, the quality of our water around them in the community, the progress to permanently close Red Hill will all be led by our deputy director of health in partnership with the Board of Water Supply's leadership. And I will be there every step of the way beside them. So, forgive me, get used to some more white boards on these matters.

"Finally, I've tasked our attorney general with a real problem to address a chilling reality described in the Missing and Murdered Native Hawaiian Women and Girls Task Force Report, which found that Native Hawaiian girls, women, were experiencing gender-based violence at rates disproportionate to any other population. The very recognition of this matter is a critical first step towards reckoning with the depth of this horrifying issue. And we are committed in our Attorney General's Office to providing the resources to end these crimes against Native Hawaiian women. Thank you, Anne, for leading this charge.

"When it comes to governance, sunlight, open windows, and plenty of fresh air are the best disinfectants we have. Don't freak out here. This is why I agree with the call from the Civil Beat Law Center for our administration and their partners, our government documents have to be easily accessible and available and virtually cost-free to obtain. We're going to make that happen in our administration. We need to build trust, and to do what we can to be open and transparent all the time, and accountable to the public. That's a commitment I give from our administration.

"A culture of public service. Over the last few weeks, the Legislature has conducted many important informational briefings with our new cabinet and nominees. As we lean into our first legislative session together, this administration comes to you in a spirit of full collaboration. You have my cell phone. Our nominees are stepping forward in a time of great adversity. Times are tough, you know that as elected officials. They are willing to dedicate themselves heart and soul to the work of the people of Hawai'i. And several critical members of our cabinet and our government will require absolutely confirmation by the Senate in the coming weeks. Thank you, colleagues, for that work.

"But government in Hawai'i cannot function without these people. Without qualified and dedicated people, a corps of public servants, to administer all that we come up with together to implement our mandates and priorities. All the work that you will do in these next 100 days. So, I extend my gratitude to our cabinet nominees who have stepped up to serve. They are leaders in their fields, they have great experience. They're often willing to sacrifice enormous time with their families and other professional opportunities for a life now of public service. So, I'd like to especially to congratulate and welcome our many new women and Native Hawaiian leaders. They will smash the remaining glass ceilings of public service, and I am honored to sweep-up the debris behind them.

"I want you to know, I've set a high standard for all of our nominees. None of us can actually meet all of the expectation of us as legislators. But they are already meeting with you, they're exceeding my expectations as a new governor, because of how hard they work and how much they care. So, the Senate will now vet them and confirm them on their ability to do the job, I hope.

"There are moments when nominees can become collateral damage, from potential disputes that have gone way back for us politically, though we've done what we can to heal any rifts that we ever had. But their ability to work and their commitment to getting things done in Hawai'i is critical. I would say this, any conflict, chronic or acute, and dysfunction amongst branches of government is not going to be good for any of us, especially when it doesn't serve the interest of the people. I need these folks working. I nominated them because they can get the job done in their disciplines. And we will work together to make sure that happens. So, I ask you to let them do just that. *Mahalo* for considering all of these nominees.

"Now with due diligence, I ask that you confirm them. But I will work with you day and night to make sure we are a responsive, powerful, impactful government. They will make Hawai'i proud. They're making me proud. And they, like you, are public servants. So, we ask each other to respect our team, your teams, as they step forward into these roles. This is Hawai'i's team. Thank you for your consideration.

"Our dream and our destiny. Today we find ourselves at a crossroads, a turning point in our history. We face enormous challenges as a state. And the strain of these challenges is slowly eroding the hopes and the dreams of our people. Thousands of families are voting with their feet, choosing to leave our islands in search of affordable housing and economic opportunity. Thousands more live in our streets, suffering without help, without hope, despairing for a better tomorrow. Climate change and industrial pollution threaten our permanently degraded land and resources. These are tragedies which must not stand by and be witnessed idly without doing everything in our power to change.

"Ultimately, we're not going to be judged by our words or our rhetoric. We're going to be judged by our actions and our accomplishments. How will we secure the health of our state? How will we nurture the integrity of our people and culture? How will we create the quality of life that we desire? We will do it together, as one *'ohana* united by our shared values. We must provide economic relief, that I described, and restore hope to our people.

We must restore the health of our land and our water. We must redeem the promise of Hawai'i.

"In pursuit of these goals, here and now, we commit ourselves to four years of decisive action. Making progress every single day and never giving up. Hawai'i's people deserve ambitious goals, big dreams, and bold action. 'The less foresighted may label us dreamers for expressing what may be regarded as overly grandiose thoughts.' Governor Burns said that. 'But dream we must, as we must pursue these dreams with vigor and energy, if we are to attain the greatness that is so patently the destiny of Hawai'i and its people.'

"Governor Burns was right. Hawai'i's destiny is greatness. A greatness born of shared values. A greatness of family, community, and love, of rich diversity, tolerance, and unity. Of commitment, responsibility, and hope. Of reverence for our natural and cultural heritage and our shared history. We are the inheritors of this dream and this destiny. Together, we will fulfill our destiny. Together, we will realize our dreams. And together, we will live up to the promise of Hawai'i. *Mahalo* and thank you for the honor to serve."

President Kouchi then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Governor Green. I would like to cite two specific examples of how I will commit my personal support in working with you going forward. I have never made the top 10 best dressed list in any kind of fashion competition. But I want you to know that I chose the tie with intentionality this morning, and it's buried in the leis, but it's a green tie, for Governor Green and the Green Plan.

"Going forward, as showing a sign of my support, the second is when the Governor talks about 100% renewable as the goal. Currently in my district, the islands of Kaua'i and Ni'ihau, they are in for a permit for a pump storage energy plan out in West Kaua'i. If approved, by 2025 Kaua'i will have achieved a 90% renewable energy provision to the grid on Kaua'i. And so, the goal is attainable, and my personal commitment is not to stop to take care of my district, Governor Green, but to continue to have Kaua'i work with you and your team to bring those kinds of numbers to the rest of the state.

"Last Wednesday, when we convened in the Senate, I wanted to be cautious. And we opened at 60% and invited cabinet members, the military, and the consular corps, but we had no one from the private sector on our floor. So, in closing, I would like to look to the private sector people who are here today.

"When the pandemic hit and we were faced with what seemed like an insurmountable challenge, you responded in such an incredible way. And so quickly, with nonprofit leadership from Hawai'i Community Foundation, all of the banks putting aside the competition for customers and pooling their resources to help us, the hospitals putting aside their competitive issues and working together for all of the people of Hawai'i, and I appreciate that I have a chance to say to all of the private sector businesses, the non-profits, and most importantly, each of you have stories of the unsung heroes in your communities, individuals who stepped forward during the pandemic and helped others in their community to make sure that nobody was left behind. A big thank you.

"And I commit on behalf of the Senate, and I am confident of the commitment of the House, that we will replicate what we did together in collaboration during the pandemic. The challenges that the Governor has outlined are greater than any one of us individually could overcome by ourselves. And it's only in that collaboration that we will succeed. So, Governor, you have the full support of the Senate as we go forward.

"I declare the joint session adjourned."

The President then stated:

"After all the challenges of the pandemic, it is indeed a blessing to be back here in person. *Mahalo* to President Kouchi and his team, the Sergeant-at-Arms, the Clerk's Office, everyone who makes this event happen, for welcoming us into this beautiful chamber.

"An event was held this past Sunday that brought such pride and joy to our state, the running of the Eddie Aikau Big Wave Invitational. I am honored that we're joined here today by Eddie's brother, Clyde Aikau, who organized this epic event. I'd like to ask him to please stand and be recognized. Mr. Clyde Aikau.

"The Judiciary '*ohana* is made up of 1,700 dedicated and hard-working members. And as chief justice, I'm proud to be one of them. I thank the Legislature for this opportunity to tell our story, to explain how we are advancing the cause of justice and serving our community.

OPEN JOURNAL

At this time, Representative Morikawa moved to keep the Journal open until 6:00 p.m. this legislative day for the purpose of receiving House Bills for introduction, seconded by Representative Garcia and carried. (Representatives Alcos, Amato, Nakashima, Ward, and Woodson were excused.)

At this time, the Chair stated:

"Members, please note that tonight's 6 p.m. deadline is firm and there will be no exceptions. Please make sure you give yourselves and your staff ample time to file your bills before 6 p.m."

RECESS

At this time, the Chair stated:

"The House will stand in recess for the purpose of convening in joint session in the Senate Chambers for the State of the Judiciary address at 10 a.m. We will convene in regular session on Friday at noon."

At 9:08 a.m., the Chair declared a recess and the House of Representatives stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair, and in accordance with Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 1 met in Joint Session with the Senate to receive the Chief Justice's State of the Judiciary address in the Senate Chambers.

JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Thirty-Second Legislature, Regular Session of 2023, was called to order at 10:05 a.m. by the Honorable Ronald D. Kouchi, President of the Senate.

The President then stated:

"Before receiving the Chief Justice's message, I would like to recognize some of our honored guests. So, it was really fun Monday to be at the House Chamber where the Speaker had to read all of the names and I got to just say what I wanted at the end, and so unfortunately today I'm the reader of the names and then I will shut up for the rest of the day."

The President then welcomed and recognized the following honored and distinguished guests:

Governor Josh Green and Mrs. Jaime Green, who were presented with lei by Representative Nadine K. Nakamura and Senator Les Ihara, Jr.;

Lieutenant Governor Sylvia Luke and Mr. Michael Luke, who were presented with lei by Senator Henry J.C. Aquino and Representative Dee Morikawa;

Mrs. Gailynn Williamson, wife of Chief Justice Recktenwald, who was presented with lei by Senator Mike Gabbard;

Mr. Andrew Recktenwald and Mrs. Jessica Recktenwald, son and daughter-in-law of Chief Justice Recktenwald, who were presented with lei by Representative Amy A. Perruso and Senator Chris Lee;

Speaker of the House Scott K. Saiki;

"To Governor Green, we're eager to collaborate with your administration and are encouraged by your focus on homelessness and mental illness in our community.

"I wish to recognize my two friends and colleagues, Justice Paula Nakayama and Justice Michael Wilson. They are retiring this year after serving a combined total of over 50 years in the Judiciary. Would they please stand so we can recognize their outstanding contributions to our state.

"On a sad note, I wish to acknowledge the recent passing of two beloved members of the Judiciary *'ohana*, my predecessor Chief Justice Ronald T.Y. Moon, and Judge Darolyn Lendio Heim. As the first person of Korean ancestry to serve as chief justice on any American court, CJ Moon helped shape the Judiciary into the institution it is today. Judge Lendio Heim made her mark in district court, by taking the court out into the community to reach those in need. We dearly miss them both.

"Public service is the lifeblood of the Judiciary. It defines who we are as an institution. The Judiciary's role in our democracy is different from the other branches of government, but we share the common goal of serving the public.

"Our core mission is to decide cases fairly and impartially in accordance with the law. But our work doesn't end when the gavel falls. We implement programs to address the root causes of recidivism, such as drug use and mental illness, and to respond to other urgent community needs. We embrace this expanded role.

"Like everyone else, the pandemic tested us, but we have emerged as a stronger, more resilient institution. We've harnessed new technologies to make us more accessible. We're forging new partnerships to make our community safer. We're expanding programs to support vulnerable children and families. And we're improving access to justice, nurturing diversity, and promoting civic engagement. And I look forward to sharing these priorities with you today.

"The pandemic created immense challenges to a court system accustomed to conducting business in-person. Despite personal hardships, our judges and staff have always met those challenges and kept providing justice to our community. I want to thank our chief judges, Lisa Ginoza, Mark Browning, Peter Cahill, Bob Kim, and Randal Valenciano for their leadership. But it is truly a team effort, and I would ask all the members of the Judiciary *'ohana* here in attendance today to stand and be recognized for keeping the Judiciary strong. Please stand.

"We learned from the pandemic. We could not meet in person, so we harnessed new technologies to conduct proceedings remotely. Instead of having to miss work, people can now appear in a traffic infraction case by simply using their phone. Since the pandemic began, we have held more than half a million remote hearings, and this number is rapidly climbing.

"We also started an eReminder service and have sent more than 24,000 texts and emails to notify parties of upcoming court dates. Guess what happened? The appearance rate has significantly increased and is now almost 90% in O'ahu District Court.

"We are also more transparent. The Hawai'i Supreme Court now livestreams all of our oral arguments, and more than 17,000 people have tuned in. And last April, we made electronic filing available 24/7 for all courts throughout our system, a huge milestone, by adding family court civil cases. In short, we have created modern courts that use new technologies to meet the needs of a community accustomed to doing business online.

"In his Opening Day speech, Speaker Saiki said the Sesame Street word of the day was cooperation. Indeed, the pandemic demonstrated the importance of partnerships, working together with others, to achieve far more than we could do on our own.

"When the pandemic hit, there were predictions that there would be thousands of evictions, a literal tsunami, but that didn't happen. One big reason why is because the Legislature enacted Act 57, which required eviction cases to go to mediation. It was a win-win for both landlords and tenants. It kept people in their homes, while treating landlords fairly. Statewide, over 85% of the 1,600 cases mediated were settled without going to court. And here on O'ahu, 85% of the settlements resulted in tenants remaining in their homes.

"Mahalo to Representatives Troy Hashimoto and Nadine Nakamura for crafting Act 57 and our district court judges, the bar, and mediation providers for implementing it. Act 57 expired last year, but we look forward to working with the Legislature to re-establish a similar program going forward.

"Hale Hilinai is another example of a successful partnership. If you've driven up Piikoi Street recently, you've seen it, a gleaming new 20-story tower. It provides both 200 affordable rental units and critical resources for juveniles. We could not have completed this innovative project without the Legislature's cooperation, and particularly that of Speaker Saiki, and our partner, the Hawai'i Housing Finance & Development Corporation. This new facility symbolizes the Judiciary's commitment to prevention and healing for at-risk youth. It enables us to intervene earlier and connect youth and their families with meaningful, culturally responsive services. In short, it will empower at-risk youth to forge a better future.

"The new Wahiawa Civic Center, which will house the Wahiawa District Court and probation offices, is another multi-use project that will provide much needed benefits to the community. *Mahalo* to Senator Donovan Dela Cruz for having the vision for this project.

"Our core mission is deciding cases. Last year, we resolved more than 92,000 criminal cases, 35,000 civil cases, and 13,000 family court cases, not to mention several hundred thousand traffic and parking infractions. Deciding that many cases gives us unique insights into the challenges facing the community. And we use these insights to find ways to help people and identify broader solutions.

"We can keep our community safer by addressing the root causes that bring people into the criminal justice system. The rates of serious mental illness and substance use disorders are four to seven times higher for those in jail than the general population, and many inmates suffer from both conditions. Yet these individuals often cycle repeatedly in and out of incarceration without access to needed services and treatment. We must stop that revolving door.

"One answer is treatment courts. They use intense supervision and a team approach to break the cycle of recidivism. From our ground-breaking Girls Court to our Drug, Mental Health, and Veterans Treatment Courts, we have developed specialized programs that enable participants to overcome deep-seated challenges and lead productive lives.

"Building on this success, the Legislature last session approved funding for Women's Court. It recognizes the simple fact that women experience very different pathways to criminal involvement than men. Women in prison are 80% to 90% more likely to have extensive histories of trauma, such as sexual or physical abuse. In just six months, our Women's Court team, led by Judge Trish Morikawa, has developed programs tailored to address women's needs, collaborated with treatment providers, and selected participants. And we are excited to announce that Women's Court will officially go live later this afternoon.

"*Mahalo* to Judge Mark Browning for having the vision for Women's Court, and to the Women's Legislative Caucus for its support, and in particular, Representative Linda Ichiyama and Lt. Governor Sylvia Luke. *Mahalo* also to the Women's Prison Project, a grass-roots group organized by former Governor Linda Lingle, that supported Women's Court and other legislation focusing on the special needs of women in the criminal justice system.

"Homelessness. We see it around us every day. People in makeshift tents lining the sidewalk, in parks, and at beaches. Indeed, right outside this building. I'd bet that for many legislators here, it is the number one concern voiced by your constituents. We know there are no simple solutions, and no branch of government can hope to address homelessness on its own. But the Judiciary is committed to doing our part to find more effective solutions.

"Our Community Outreach Court represents a novel approach that has achieved positive results. The court focuses on non-violent individuals who are houseless or on the verge of becoming houseless and who have pending matters for minor offenses. Participants agree to perform community service to resolve those matters and are matched with service providers who assist them in obtaining housing, mental health and drug treatment, and other services.

"Community Outreach Court is unique in that teams go out into the community, sometimes tent to tent, to find participants to enroll, and the court itself travels to convene where those in need live. More than 465 individuals have completed the outreach court program, 7,600 cases have been cleared, and 5,600 hours of community service have been completed. We're holding Community Outreach Court on O'ahu in Wai'anae, Kāne'ohe, and Kaka'ako, and on Maui in Kīhei, and we plan to expand the court to Waikīki.

"In 2019, we held a summit that identified major shortcomings in how people suffering from mental illness are treated in the criminal justice system. It simply makes no sense to hold in custody for months non-violent petty misdemeanor defendants who are incompetent, only to release them back to the streets with no ongoing treatment or services.

"The Legislature responded by passing Act 26, giving those offenders the chance to obtain treatment, rather than having them languish in custody. And I appreciate Representative Della Au Belatti and Senator Joy San Buenaventura for their work on Act 26. In the short time since it was enacted, the State has saved over \$8.5 million due to reduced incarceration and state hospital costs, over 70 defendants have been discharged and linked to services, and more than 25 have received an extended commitment for treatment. We should build on that success and consider diverting other non-violent individuals with mental illness.

"All of us, the Legislature, the Executive Branch, and the Judiciary, are strongly committed to resolving the mental health emergency afflicting our community. Let's seize the opportunity and work together. Let's invest in resources such as mental health drop-off centers and crisis stabilization units, successfully used in Arizona and Miami, to get people appropriate treatment away from the criminal justice system. Let's explore all options to get treatment for those who need it. Let's join forces to find more effective solutions.

"Family court is where hope, healing, and new beginnings occur. It is where the profound impact of our expanding role in providing essential services can most clearly be seen. Reducing the detention of minors has been a critical focus of the family courts. Almost all the minors in the juvenile justice system are themselves victims of abuse and trauma. Research shows that placing them in detention often inflicts additional harm which can spiral into more serious offenses.

"Our reforms, which have been underway for more than a decade, focus on detaining youth only when necessary for public safety and diverting the others into appropriate supervision and treatment. These efforts have been a resounding success. We have drastically reduced the number of juveniles held in detention, while enhancing public safety.

"In the last 15 years, the number of juveniles admitted to secure detention or committed to the Hawai'i Youth Correctional Facility has dropped by more than 80%. But juvenile crime did not go up, quite the opposite. There has been an 85% reduction in juvenile felony petitions. But there is one statistic that exemplifies the tremendous progress we've made. Last June, for the first time ever, there were no girls detained at the Hawai'i Youth Correctional Facility. You cannot do better than zero.

"The pandemic was particularly hard on our state's students. Many faced obstacles to participating meaningfully in classes. Our Truancy Court program is helping students who aren't attending school to get back on track. The key is early intervention. Our juvenile probation officers engage with students, parents, and counselors to resolve the issues causing students to miss school. These early interventions are highly successful in getting students back to attending classes and only rarely are formal court proceedings required. From its start at Waiānae Intermediate, the Truancy Court program has expanded to other middle schools, with the goal of spreading further as resources allow.

"Family court is also targeting absenteeism in elementary schools, and is currently working with the families of eighty-eight students at eight schools. I thank Judges Matthew Viola, Rebecca Copeland, Jessi Hall, and Darien Nagata for all their efforts on these initiatives.

"To ensure the public's trust, courts must be transparent and accessible, judges should reflect the diversity of the communities they serve, and the

public must understand the Judiciary's role in our democracy. So how are we building trust? First, we must ensure that everyone's voice is heard.

"We have established self-help centers across the state where volunteer attorneys provide free legal information or assistance to people in civil cases who otherwise would have to navigate the system alone. Over the past decade, there have been more than 35,000 self-help consultations at little or no cost to the public, and remote consultations added during the pandemic have expanded the centers' reach.

"We could not provide this critical resource without the steadfast support of the Access to Justice Commission, the Hawai'i State Bar Association, the Legal Aid Society of Hawai'i, the county bar associations, and the hundreds of attorneys who have donated their time. We have an absolutely amazing access to justice movement in Hawai'i, and that's because of the passion of so many people who are dedicated to supporting that effort. And I want to ask all of them here in the audience today that I just mentioned to please stand and be recognized.

"We must ensure that 'olelo Hawai'i can flourish in our courts. We recently hired a Hawaiian language coordinator, and I thank Senator Karl Rhoads for his support of that position. One of the first projects she will tackle is to make foundational legal documents, our constitution, key cases, and statutes, readily available in 'olelo Hawai'i.

"Public trust is also bolstered by a judiciary that reflects the diversity of the communities we serve. Here in Hawai'i, our merit-based judicial selection system has enabled us to secure highly qualified judges from many different backgrounds. The Senate is a crucial component of the selection process, and I thank President Kouchi and the members of the Senate for their commitment to that process.

"Here's one important sign of the progress we've made on diversity. I am pleased to report that as of today, 49% of our full-time judges are women. And our judges reflect Hawai'i's rich diversity of races, ethnicities, and backgrounds. In cultivating the values of diversity and inclusion, we post demographic information about our judges and mandate implicit bias training for all judges and staff.

"Finally, trust requires public understanding of the importance of a strong and independent judiciary. Our Courts in the Community program promotes that awareness by holding Supreme Court oral arguments live, in actual cases, at high schools across the state. Over the past decade, more than 5,000 students have participated. Just last month, we convened at Lahainaluna High School with over 300 enthusiastic high school students from Maui, Moloka'i, and Lāna'i. The energy in that gym was amazing. We are so grateful to the lawyers who volunteered their time to teach the students about the case, and I want to thank each and every one of them for their commitment. Thank you very much.

"Courts in the Community is part of a much broader effort. The Supreme Court has created the PACE Commission to promote and advance civic education for students and citizens throughout Hawai'i. The commission, led by Chief Judge Lisa Ginoza and Representative Amy Perruso, recently hosted a free, three-day academy for high school students on Maui. They learned about the legal system, community involvement, and law-related careers. *Mahalo* to the American Judicature Society and its chair, Larry Okinaga, for supporting the PACE Commission, and to the William S. Richardson School of Law, the University of Hawai'i Maui College, and the Maui County Bar Association for making the academy such a success.

"Although we are proud of what we have accomplished, much remains to be done. We thank the Legislature for your past funding support. As we move forward, we respectfully ask for funding that will enable the Judiciary to provide justice and meet our community's needs.

"For our operating budget, we are requesting a modest increase of 4.4% in the coming fiscal year, and 4% the year after. Most critically, we are seeking restoration of funding for more than 30 positions statewide that were de-funded early in the pandemic. We curtailed our budget requests during the pandemic and did everything we could to stretch our limited resources. But without restoration of funding, our ability to provide needed services is severely compromised.

"We are also seeking a new district court judge in the First Circuit to provide stability and continuity for rural courts on O'ahu, funding for our programs in the community, including our new juvenile resource center at Hale Hilinai, and funding for court-appointed counsel, guardians ad litem, and to permit children to stay with their mothers undergoing residential treatment.

"Our capital improvement requests total \$16 million, and they include fixtures and equipment for the new Wahiawa District Court and funds for essential repair and maintenance for our aging courthouses to keep the roofs from leaking and the elevators working.

"These requests reflect what we need to restore the services impaired by the pandemic and to forge ahead with new initiatives to serve the community. And we sincerely appreciate the Legislature's consideration.

"In sum, the Judiciary is moving forward from the pandemic a stronger and more resilient institution, applying the lessons we learned, and building on the partnerships we formed. We have harnessed new technologies to make us more accessible. We are expanding programs to reach and assist vulnerable children and families. And we are raising awareness of the Judiciary's critical role in our democracy. We are doing everything in our power to provide justice and serve our community.

"This past Sunday, in monster waves with 50-foot faces, the Eddie Aikau Big Wave Invitational was held at Waimea Bay. The contest honors Eddie Aikau, the legendary lifeguard and waterman who risked, and ultimately gave his life, to help others. Eddie's legacy is captured in the simple phrase, Eddie would go.

"Just as Eddie would go, the three branches of government must also be bold and courageous in finding solutions to the daunting challenges facing our community. Each branch must of course be faithful to the separate roles we play in our democracy. But we can still collaborate to find solutions. On issues such as homelessness and mental illness, the ideas are out there, the resources are out there, the will is out there. Let's dive in and find the way forward, together.

"Once again, thank you to the Legislature for inviting me to be here today, and best wishes for a productive session. *Mahalo* and *aloha*."

Speaker Saiki then rose and stated:

"Thank you, Chief Justice Recktenwald. I just told the chief justice that his speech was better than my Opening Day speech, and certainly better than the Senate President's Opening Day speech.

"Before adjourning the session, I'd just like to make three brief shout outs. So, first to Chief Justice Recktenwald. I just want to let everybody know that we really respect the chief justice, his leadership, and his advocacy for the Judiciary. And we look forward to working with him this year and next year. So, thank you, Chief Justice.

"And as the CJ mentioned, we like to also do a shout out to all of the judges and the Judiciary staff and community partners who we know have worked so hard throughout the pandemic. We know that you worked under severe constraints and limitations that were exacerbated by the need to balance due process. So, thank you for all of your work throughout the pandemic.

"And finally, we'd like to do a shout out and thank you to our retiring justices, Justice Wilson and Justice Nakayama. In particular, I'd like to just mention something about Justice Nakayama, because from afar I have just developed so much respect for her. And I know that after 30 years, she leaves a body of work that will endure because it is reasoned and practical and leaves us with a framework to solve problems in our state. So, thank you to both Justice Wilson and Justice Nakayama.

"And with that, I declare that this joint session is adjourned."

At 10:41 a.m., Speaker Saiki declared the Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Thirty-Second Legislature, Regular Session of 2023, adjourned.

The House of Representatives of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2023, convened at 12:07 p.m., with Vice Speaker Ilagan presiding.

The invocation was delivered by Representative Sonny Ganaden, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Amato, Kong, Nakashima, and Quinlan, who were excused.

By unanimous consent, reading and approval of the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Seventh Day was deferred.

ORDER OF THE DAY

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

H.R. No. 9:

Representative Nakamura moved that H.R. No. 9 be adopted, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"My thanks to the Speaker for introducing HR 9, which reestablishes the House Special Committee on Red Hill. We heard many issues regarding Red Hill over the last year. There were several concerns that came up over the summer and during the interim. Despite notions that the federal government and the county have already come to agreements about this, I think the state still certainly has a role to play and this House has a role to play because of our direct involvement with our communities, we're supposed to be the closest to them and hearing directly from them.

"As the representative of many people who were displaced in 2021, our office hears some pretty horrendous stories about people who've had to move away, health issues, and we know that these are going to be coming up. I think that for the duration of my career here in this House, I'm going to be hearing about Red Hill. Again, my appreciation to the Speaker and the House for continuing this important work. In support."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 9, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING THE HOUSE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON RED HILL TO ADDRESS ISSUES RELATED TO THE RED HILL BULK FUEL STORAGE FACILITY, WATER CONTAMINATION AND REMEDIATION, AND ALL RELATED IMPACTS," was adopted, with Representatives Amato, Kong, Nakashima, and Quinlan being excused.

H.R. No. 10:

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, H.R. No. 10, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING A LEGISLATIVE WORKING GROUP TO OVERSEE THE DEPARTMENT OF HAWAIIAN HOME LANDS' EXECUTION OF FUNDS APPROPRIATED PURSUANT TO ACT 279, SESSION LAWS OF HAWAII 2022, TO ADDRESS THE BENEFICIARY WAITING LIST," was adopted, with Representatives Amato, Kong, Nakashima, and Quinlan being excused.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES

Representative Perruso, for the Committee on Higher Education & Technology, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1) recommending that H.B. No. 390, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 390, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Pierick rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"*Aloha*. Mine is a no with reservations. Yes with reservations. My perspective being, in going door to door, my constituents were concerned about higher taxes. And so, the desire is to decrease taxes in the State of Hawai'i."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 390, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII PROMISE PROGRAM," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Pierick voting aye with reservations, with Representative Garcia voting no, and with Representatives Amato, Kong, Nakashima, and Quinlan being excused.

Representative Perruso, for the Committee on Higher Education & Technology, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2) recommending that H.B. No. 78, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 78, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. Strengthening access to community college is essential to delivering the promise of higher education to all Hawai'i residents. Too often, the cost of college tuition is unattainable to working families, many of whom are experiencing chronic financial hardship because of our island's extreme and ever-increasing cost of living.

"According to the University of Hawai'i's Institutional Research, Analysis and Planning Office, UH reported that roughly 12,500 classified students with Hawai'i residency were enrolled in community college. Approximately 5,000 were registered as full-time students and 7,500 were registered as part-time students. UH also reported that approximately 42% of community college students received financial aid to cover the cost of their tuition in the most recent year for which data is available, and that part-time residential community college students enroll in an average of six credits per semester.

"When these data points are considered, the cost of making community college tuition free for Hawai'i residents can be estimated at less than \$20 million, even after accounting for first year enrollment increases which were experienced by other states. In fact, the actual cost is likely to be even lower since many students receive financial assistance from other scholarship programs. Many states have implemented programs to make community college free for all students, or most students, including California, Delaware, Nevada, New York, Oregon, Rhode Island, Tennessee, Virginia, and Washington. We should join this movement and ensure that the dream of higher education is affordable and attainable for all working families and their *keiki*. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Garcia rose in opposition to the measure and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Garcia's written remarks are as follows:

"*Mahalo*, Mr. Speaker, I stand in opposition to HB 78 because it is my sincere belief that universal education is a step in the wrong direction both nationally and locally. This bill vastly expands the scholarship program for eligible students and expands the eligibility requirements. This is a step toward socialism.

"If an individual is low-income there are already FAFSA grants and multiple scholarship programs that will cover the tuition needs for a community college."

Representative Pierick rose in support of the measure with reservations. [Note: See Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1, H.B. No. 390, HD 1 for remarks.]

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 78, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR

AN ACT RELATING TO STRENGTHENING ACCESS TO HIGHER EDUCATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Pierick voting aye with reservations, with Representative Garcia voting no, and with Representatives Amato, Kong, Nakashima, and Quinlan being excused.

At 12:17 p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:17 p.m.

Representative Perruso, for the Committee on Higher Education & Technology, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 3) recommending that H.B. No. 230, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 230, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Garcia rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Garcia's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, the University of Hawai'i testified in committee explaining that this bill is plainly unnecessary. For these reasons, I vote aye with reservations."

Representative Takayama rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition with a brief comment, please. I think the last poll that was taken, that 65% or 70% of us are UH graduates, so we've got skin in the game on this one, Mr. Speaker. But for some of us who have been here that voted for autonomy for the University of Hawai'i, this bill is a micro-managing bill. Why do we have to tell them how to do what they're doing when, in fact, we've given them autonomy?"

"And I think this is an overreach and it's like a lack of trust with the officers of the building. And I think we should just leave it the way it is and not put our nose into their business, which we officially, technically, and legally gave them autonomy, the only thing is we've never implemented it. So, for those reasons, a no vote, please. Thank you."

Representative Kobayashi rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, we are still responsible for matters of statewide concern. And the division of power and preventing the overcentralization of power at the University of Hawai'i is still our responsibility. So, for these reasons, I support this measure."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 230, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Garcia, Kobayashi, and Takayama voting aye with reservations, with Representative Ward voting no, and with Representatives Amato, Kong, Nakashima, and Quinlan being excused.

Representative Perruso, for the Committee on Higher Education & Technology, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 4) recommending that H.B. No. 231, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 231, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tam rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Takayama rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

So, currently our Department of Education has no such body as the Candidate Advisory Council to provide recommendations to the governor for his appointments to the Board of Education. And this measure would simply bring the Board of Regents into that same structural process alignment. Moreover, this also brings us into alignment with what happens at other public universities across the country. *Mahalo.*"

Representative Alcos rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, no vote for the same micromanaging reasons as the previous bill. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 231, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE X, SECTION 6, OF THE HAWAII STATE CONSTITUTION TO MODIFY THE APPOINTMENT PROCESS FOR THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, Kobayashi, Matsumoto, Onishi, Takayama, and Tam voting aye with reservations, with Representative Ward voting no, and with Representatives Amato, Kong, Nakashima, and Quinlan being excused.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise with reservations and a brief comment, please. Mr. Speaker, the State Constitution says the counties shall have the right to property taxes. We've breached that by giving them not only property taxes, we've given them TAT taxes, we've given them GET taxes, state storm drain taxes, solar farm exemptions from property taxes to a fee, and now we want to take GET taxes and give it to fixing the roads, which is going to cause a deficit over here, which I fear is going to create another increase in GET taxes, of which we're really straying from the Constitution.

"This is probably, it's a good cause because I know a lot of people here have electric cars and the gas tax is not being paid. But if we're going to have a county tax competing with the state, I think in the long run it's going to be detrimental. My point is now, using this is purposely meaningful, but in the long run it is going to be detrimental. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Alcos rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kila rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support. When we're looking at bills such as this intent, where we have dilapidating roads in communities that never got the chance to turn over their roads to the city--"

Representative Garcia rose to a point of order, stating:

"Point of order, Mr. Speaker. If the gentleman could please address the Chair. Thank you."

Representative Kila continued stating:

"Okay. So, when we're looking at bills like this where we're addressing the county roads, in my community and communities throughout urban and rural Honolulu that are not getting the maintenance that's needed but they're traversed by the public constantly and always, I'm looking for ways that we can find ways to support these roads where they're having potholes awful wide and whatnot. Because honestly, when we are traversing these roads, these private roads owners that are subject to the use of these roads, that really is the intent to help out our local residents in the rural communities. So, I stand in strong support of this bill. Thank you."

Representative Todd rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm in support. I just wanted to note that this does not create an additional tax, it simply provides the county flexibility in how to deploy that tax. And there are notable rural communities, like in my newly minted community, where first responders cannot respond in time due to the condition of some of these roads. So, this would allow the county that flexibility where necessary to look out for the public good. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. Representative Pierick rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Marten rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I stand in support. This bill would extend what is already law in Honolulu County to the rest of the state. And it's a very, very small investment during the construction process that can save homeowners thousands of dollars should they choose to install PV or EV charging in their home later, and allow people that are lower income to be part of those benefiting from our cheaper electricity that we get from renewable energy. Thank you, sir."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 329, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ENERGY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representative Ward voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Garcia and Pierick voting no, and with Representatives Amato and Nakashima being excused.

Representative Hashimoto, for the Committee on Housing, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 34) recommending that H.B. No. 670, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Water & Land.

Representative Hussey-Burdick rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, reservations. I just want to also mention that I do appreciate the work that's been done on it in committee. And I'll just be on the lookout for what it looks like at third reading. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 670, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE LAND USE COMMISSION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Water & Land, with Representative Hussey-Burdick voting aye with reservations, with Representative Kapela voting no, and with Representatives Amato and Nakashima being excused.

"Reservations, brief comment. Through testimony we found out that the current trafficking victim services fund has a balance of \$2,700. So, I have no idea how they plan to provide reparations with that amount. So, for those reasons, with reservations."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

"Same request, brief comment. This bill would simply remove fines for minors when they break the law or what have you. The judge came from Family Court and testified and said, really there's no need for this because minors are hardly ever fined anyway, and if they do, it's very small and there are options to pay fines through community service. So, for those reasons and us going softer on crime, no vote."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. This is part of a national move to treat juvenile offenders like juveniles, basically realize that they are young people that deserve the opportunity to learn from their mistakes, to build services around them, to be part of families, and to integrate them into our communities moving forward. Fees have proven to be of no use in allowing children to learn from their mistakes to become participating members of our community.

"In the wake of numerous lawsuits here in the state, I think that we need to pass something like this in anticipation of a prospective lawsuit with the Supreme Court mandating that we do so. Thank you so much."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, no vote and a brief comment. Mr. Speaker, I don't know if you've seen the news in the last couple of days, but there is a couple of people beating the bejesus out of a young person. To say that the violence among youth has increased I think is a little bit of an understatement. So, to give a get out of fees jail fee free I think is the wrong direction, though contrary to our good friend from Kalihi. I think we have to put a responsibility to the young people as to what their behavior can and cannot do.

"And I think this sort of opens the door. It's almost like giving the people who, hey look, if I steal less than \$750, I get out of jail free. If I do these particular things, I don't get any fees or any penalties whatsoever. The bottom line, Mr. Speaker, it's the wrong message to the young people who we should be raising as responsible civic-minded adults. And I think this one goes in the opposite direction. Thank you."

Representative Alcos rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Mizuno rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I appreciate the WRs and the no votes, we certainly do not rubber stamp. In support, Mr. Speaker. I stand in support because Judiciary provided important comments for this bill which we placed in the committee report. I'm going to ask for your kind indulgence as I read back the testimony by the Judiciary. The intent and purposes of this bill are admirable, the strategies employed are evidence-based. And that family courts across the state rarely impose fine, fees, or costs on minors and their parents.

"At the end of the day, Judiciary supports this measure. It's not perfect. It's a work in progress and we still have to work to get the correct language in. But they support the intent. For those reasons, I support this measure. Thank you."

Representative Souza rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Ganaden be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 317, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO YOUTH FEES AND FINES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, with Representative Alcos voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Garcia, Pierick, and Ward voting no, and with Representatives Amato, Kila, and Todd being excused.

schools, where currently, through the open doors program, they can choose to go to various church preschools or non-profit preschools. And so, this bill would simply give the power to the department director to say yes or no, whether or not church schools could receive funding through the open doors program. So, for those reasons and the attack on religious liberty, a strong no vote."

Representative Pierick rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations, brief comment. Mr. Speaker, the biggest window to socio-economic mobility is education. And if we get them earlier, the better. This is a good bill. But if it knocks out the core, the pillar of the school system, because I think when we, a number of years ago, considered preschool, it was the parochial, the church-based schools that were the bulk of the locations and the bulk of the teachers. If this one takes that out, I think it's really putting one arm behind the back. So, I'm for the preschool, but for eliminating one of the major players, if you will, I think is not the policy we should be backing. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 961, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EARLY LEARNING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Education, with Representative Ward voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Garcia and Pierick voting no, and with Representatives Amato, Kila, and Todd being excused.

No. 1116, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SCHOOL PSYCHOLOGY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representative Garcia voting aye with reservations.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 663, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO BREAST CANCER SCREENING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Belatti, for the Committee on Health & Homelessness, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 100) recommending that H.B. No. 650, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 650, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No, please. There's a few things I'd like to cover. So, in the Hippocratic Oath, it says, I will do no harm. In the practice of medical aid in dying or euthanasia, it's basically killing somebody, and that, I believe, is against the Hippocratic Oath.

"The second point is sociology. As a hospice chaplain, I've been with many families where the patient desires MAID service, medical aid in dying, and the family strongly disagrees with it. It causes much social turmoil for that family in the process of that elderly person committing suicide to kill themselves. That's one reason I am strongly against it.

"For the third, it's based on theology. It says in Ecclesiastes 3 that there's a time to be born and a time to die. That's in the context of God explaining

his sovereignty to the people of Israel. I believe it's God's place to have somebody's life terminate. In the Book of Job, Job was saying, God, please kill me, it's too hard here down on Earth. And God's reply to him was, it's my job to determine the end of man.

"These are the three reasons I'm against this bill."

Representative Alcos rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Garcia rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Same request, brief comment. Our state motto, Mr. Speaker, *Ua mau ke ea o ka 'āina i ka pono o Hawai'i*, the life of this land is perpetuated in righteousness. And we continue to move into steps which are unrighteous. And if we're not going to move in righteousness, there will be no more life in this land. This bill takes life away from people. So, for those reasons, no vote."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in opposition, I have a brief comment. I think maybe it's reason number five and it's basically about supply and demand. Do you know why this bill is here? Do you know why it's needed?"

Representative Quinlan rose to a point of order, stating:

"Point of order. Will the gentleman please address the chair."

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"Where's the chair? Sorry, Mr. Speaker. You're the man. You're the man who knows better than this. Because reason number five is supply and demand. How many doctors have wanted to do the suicide bill? The point is, they have vacated that responsibility, and now we got to say, hey, nurses, you come up and fill the gap. That's the basis of this bill, because they don't want anything to do with it.

"Imagine if you were a physician and your hands, the day before, created somebody's death and now today you're going to heal somebody. That's the Hippocratic Oath. This is why this is a manpower, a womanpower issue, and it's because the doctors don't want to do it. I think it's like 90-some percent saying, thank you, but no thank you. And that's why these nurses are here. And we may inevitably see the nurses may turn against it. So far I know they're for it, but I think inevitably they may turn as the doctors. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kong rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 650, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, Kong, Matsumoto, Pierick, and Ward voting no.

Representative Belatti, for the Committee on Health & Homelessness, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 101) recommending that H.B. No. 485, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 485, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Garcia rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This bill is relating to marriage. Opposition, thank you. In regards to marriage, this bill says that when someone transitions their gender and changes their gender, they're allowed to go back, if the bill passes, to change their marriage certificate to reflect their preferred gender to match all their other legal documents. Once again, I just don't think

that gender is changeable. You're born male, you're born female. There are trans individuals. There are trans men. There are trans women. There are LGBTQI, non-binary, lots of options. But you can't change gender, Mr. Speaker. And so, for those reasons, a strong no vote. When you change your gender and you're arrested previously as a male, does that change your criminal record? Can I change my race, my age? The list goes on and on. You're born what you're born, and that's a legal document, it should remain that way. So, for those reasons, no vote."

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No, please. For the following reasons, I'm voting no. The question is asked, how does one change their gender? If they're undergoing a sex change surgery, at their chromosomal level and at their DNA, their gender stays the same. When they die and when they're buried, if their bones are excavated, brought back out of the ground, if they do a DNA test on their bones, they're still the same gender as they were born with.

"And the second is based on theology, and that is from Genesis 127, which reads, so God created man in his own image, in the image of God created he him, male and female created he them. Thus, if God created two genders, who are we to say that—"

Representative Nakamura rose to a point of order, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, point of order. Concerned about the separation of church and state."

At 12:35 p.m., Representative Matsumoto requested a recess and the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:36 p.m.

Representative Pierick continued, stating:

"Standing on the foundation of the First Amendment, which says that Congress shall enact no law establishing the religion thereof, I now proceed with the following scripture verse. It says again in Genesis 127, so God created man in his own image, in the image of God created he him, male and female created he them.

"I'm going to share another scripture. It says in Matthew 18:6, and this is with the perspective of we as adults creating legislation in Hawai'i that has an impact on youth. But whoever causes one of these little ones who believe in me to sin, it would be better for him to have a great millstone fastened around his neck and to be drowned in the depth of the sea.

"We are adults here, and the legislation that we enact affects the children of Hawai'i. If we are saying that it's okay to change your gender, we are deceiving them, and the judgment can then be incurred upon us. For these reasons, I vote no."

Representative Alcos rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 485, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MARRIAGE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, with Representatives Matsumoto and Ward voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, and Pierick voting no.

Representative Lowen, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 102) recommending that H.B. No. 748, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 748, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO

ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Lowen, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 103) recommending that H.B. No. 1410, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1410, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DEPOSIT BEVERAGE CONTAINERS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representatives Lowen and Ichiyama, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection and the Committee on Water & Land, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 104) recommending that H.B. No. 444, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that H.B. No. 444, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I applaud this bill. I'm in reservation mode right now because this says, by our Constitution, and anything that is ingrained in the Constitution has a superpower, a super veto over other things. And this has to do with the environment and the guarantee for the health of the environment.

"Everybody knows I live in Hawai'i Kai. But if I lived in Waianae, I would sue the state for the landfill that's next door to my house and to the breath that I breathe and the children that I have that are going to be polluted by that. My point is, this is going to open the state to a huge series of lawsuits. And the Waianae landfill is only one example of that, Mr. Speaker.

"So, I would say let us be fiscally responsible when we pass legislation. This is a good intention. But we've been warned even on this floor about guaranteeing the rights of particular individuals. They said, you know, you open a plethora of lawsuits to the State of Hawai'i, of which, Mr. Speaker, as you know, we cannot afford to do. For those reasons, I have an abundance of caution, and with that, reservations because of what it implies legally. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 444, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE I OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF HAWAII TO RECOGNIZE AND PROTECT THE INHERENT AND INALIENABLE RIGHT OF ALL PEOPLE TO CLEAN WATER AND AIR, A HEALTHFUL ENVIRONMENT AND CLIMATE, HEALTHY NATIVE ECOSYSTEMS, AND BEACHES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, with Representative Ward voting aye with reservations.

Representatives Lowen and Ichiyama, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection and the Committee on Water & Land, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 105) recommending that H.B. "There is no conflict because this legislation applies to a class of individuals and entities. So, the ruling is there's no conflict through *sine die* unless circumstances change."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 195, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RENEWABLE ENERGY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

"With reservations, brief comment, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, I have my same reservations as I had earlier with the bill that said, we are going to open ourselves to a flood of costly liabilities. This one removes the \$2,000 asset limit. We already have probably almost a half a million, about a third of our population, on this particular Medicaid program. If we lift the cap to where it's anybody, and I don't see anything in the bill that says, you can be driving a Tesla and you can be qualified for health service.

"The point is, Mr. Speaker, there are things that we have to kind of keep the banks of the river, so people don't go astray in this. And I think this is a great cause. If we didn't have this, there would be a lot of sick people in Hawai'i. But to have it without limits, I think is going a little bit too generous, a little bit too far afield and something I don't think the State of Hawai'i can afford.

"For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, with reservations and I hope future committees will at least put some kind of a cap that's rational. We shouldn't have people on the welfare of the Health Department as at the same time they're driving Teslas. It just doesn't mesh. Thank you."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support, Mr. Speaker. Many of the income limits that we're discussing in this bill were not strictly applied during COVID and it allowed the Department of Human Services to be more free in preventing poverty throughout our communities, especially child poverty. For that reason, I stand in strong support."

Representative Amato rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. The \$2,000 Medicaid asset limit actually costs us more money because of the verification process that is required to go through to verify these limits. By removing it, states that have done so have found that they actually save a lot of money, that removing the asset limitation is actually a cost saving method. Thank you."

Representative Mizuno rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Amato be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Hashimoto, for the Committee on Housing, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 150) recommending that H.B. No. 681, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 681, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Kapela rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, thank you. No vote. And I would also like to read the testimony from the Hawai'i State Energy Office. Hawai'i's eligibility for FEMA funding for disaster mitigation, resilience and recovery is determined in part by scores for hazard-resistant building codes and standards."

"I can't support something like this if we're going to possibly lose our disaster funding. Last year in a portion of a district that's no longer in my area or in my district, but there was a building that had waves that were crashing over it, and this building is three stories high. I think when it comes to something like this and with the looming climate crisis ahead of us, we have to be making sure that we're protecting constituents. Thank you."

Representative Lowen rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Perruso rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 681, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE BUILDING CODES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives Lowen and Perruso voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Kapela voting no.

Representative Hashimoto, for the Committee on Housing, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 151) recommending that H.B. No. 920, as

amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Gates recognized Aunty Blanche and Aunty Twinkle as foundations of our community, especially our Native Hawaiian community; complimented their lifelong commitment to providing refuge and a sense of purpose for individuals facing houselessness across the state, creating meaningful connections and villages in places of instability; shared the mission of Pu'u honua O Wai'anae: to provide a safe space, governed by strictly-enforced rules to homeless families in Hawai'i; commended Aunty Twinkle for providing encouragement to families when they feel defeated, giving hope to the hopeless; and thanked the honorees for their work.

Representative Marten recognized Aunty Blanche for her decades of service spreading love and *aloha* to children and families in need, commended her on starting the Hui Mahi'ai Aina community, giving people dignity, respect, and a role to play, and thanked the honorees for all they have done.

Representative Ward thanked the honorees for being an inspiration and blessing to the community and commended them on their work.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 337, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Garcia rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Hawai'i has one of the highest tax burdens in the whole country. The census results showed for the first time ever in our state's history, there are more Hawaiians living on the U.S. continent than in Hawai'i. That's a problem because we continue to increase taxes and make Hawai'i unaffordable. And this here is a tax increase on the capital gains tax. Why are we trying to take away profit from our local residents? For those reasons, a no vote."

Representative Alcos rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Pierick rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kong rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support. I just want to make mention that, yes, we do have high taxes. But this is a tax that taxes luxury investments. It also taxes luxury items that are art or antiquities that our local families can't afford. So, why not capitalize on these things and then make sure that we're investing that money in our public schools, in a child tax credit, back into our communities, back into the pockets that need it. Thank you."

Representative Garcia rose to respond, stating:

"Second time, in opposition still. Our state has record surplus and yet we continue to raise taxes. The term was used 'luxury.' Well, flash alert, the average price for a house in Hawai'i is over \$1 million, that's luxury. So, anyway, no vote."

Representative Tam rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. I just wanted to make a comment that although we do have a surplus this year, that might not be the case for any future years. Thank you."

Representative Kong rose to respond, stating:

"Second time, still in opposition. For some reason, people are trying to equate this as income tax, also, right, the capital gains. But the capital gains is applied to all tax brackets, from the lowest to the highest. So, not necessarily it's a luxury to anyone when they sell their homes and getting this capital gains. Thank you."

Representative Kapela rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Second time and just to clarify as well, in very strong support, if capital gains were to be taxed as regular income, there are studies and data that shows that the bottom 80% of taxpayers, this includes even doctors, lawyers, business executives, would be paying absolutely nothing at all. So, the only people that are actually impacted if we were to tax capital gains as regular income would be people who are making at least half a million dollars a year. So, when we talk about houses and the ability for local families, for Native Hawaiians, to not be able to afford houses, these are people who are benefitting from a living wage, not individuals who are making over half a million dollars a year. Those are individuals that need to be taxed at a higher tax rate and at least make sure that they're paying regular income on these luxury investments."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, brief rebuttal if I may, in opposition. I know we don't have a macro economic instructor in these particular hallowed halls, but capital

is what keeps the economy and businesses and employees, it makes the economy move. Because if you don't have investment, you don't have any businesses, you don't have any hiring, you don't have any jobs. That's a macro principle regardless of where you apply it.

"The point is, why the governor had the REITS bill vetoed is because the capital that they want to bring in was saying, hey, you tax us higher, we're not going to come around. The point of making that in this context is, if you don't have capital or you discourage capital, it's going to go where it's welcome. We have no capital markets here. We have to either go to the East Coast or the West Coast in terms of where, we are a capital-short state. That's the bottom line.

"So, the more we discourage capital, the less economic development. And Mr. Speaker, if there's anything that we need, it's economic diversification. And if we discourage, for example, becoming the Hollywood of the Pacific or other ways of being innovative and creative, the sports center of the Pacific, the Geneva of the Pacific, where it's going to take capital to make it. If we discourage it. But you know, it's only 2%, okay, but who knows, it's going to go up to another 4% or 5% into the teens, to which then there will be discouragement.

"The point is, economics is market forces. This is a political force on this floor. But political forces have market consequences of which, as a capital-short place, we should not discourage people as already the highest taxed in the nation to come and invest in Hawai'i. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 337, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAPITAL GAINS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Matsumoto voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, Kong, Pierick, and Ward voting no.

Representative Holt, for the Committee on Economic Development, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 170) recommending that H.B. No. 396, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 396, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII TECHNOLOGY DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Holt, for the Committee on Economic Development, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 171) recommending that H.B. No. 397, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 397, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII TECHNOLOGY DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Holt, for the Committee on Economic Development, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 172) recommending that H.B. No. 395, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 395, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII TECHNOLOGY DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Holt, for the Committee on Economic Development, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 173) recommending that H.B. No. 276, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 276, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Kapela rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 276, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representative Kapela voting no.

Representative Holt, for the Committee on Economic Development, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 174) recommending that H.B. No. 520, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 520, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Kong rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 520, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives Garcia and Kong voting no.

Representative Holt, for the Committee on Economic Development, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 175) recommending that H.B. No. 1259, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1259, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DIRECT SHIPPING OF LIQUOR," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Todd, for the Committee on Transportation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 176) recommending that H.B. No. 1110, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1110, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Garcia rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. This bill is relating to the road usage charge program. It creates a mileage-based road usage charge. So, we're going to charge people based upon the miles they drive. This affects those who live furthest from town, West O'ahu, North Shore, rural areas. And it gives incentives to move to e-vehicles. Well, I can tell you, lots of folks in my community can't afford a Tesla and they drive to town each day for work, and this bill will definitely impact them and break their banks. So, no vote."

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations, but for different reasons. I just think we're sending mixed signals about electric vehicle adoption. If we're moving to decarbonize the economy, ground transportation is a huge part of it, and this singles out electric vehicles for extra charges without at the same time repealing the \$50 extra charge on EVs that we implemented several years ago. So, if we're going to test out the road mileage charge on EVs, fine, but then we should also repeal that \$50 extra charge at the same time. Thank you."

Representative Todd rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, in support. I just wanted to note that there already is a tax for driving a lot and it's called the fuel tax. So, this does not actually discourage or put a penalty on rural drivers because that already exists, it's the fuel tax. This has nothing to do with incentivizing EV adoption. All it does is pilot project what would be an opt-in for EV owners who already pay a surcharge, and this is an alternative to the surcharge.

"And as the prior speaker noted, there may actually be concerns in the opposite direction, that this could potentially disincentivize that adoption, which is why we left it as an opt-in. So, just in summary, we already pay a fuel tax, so this has no impact on that. And there is an opt-in program, so there is no direct impact to encourage or discourage EV adoption. Thank you."

Representative Marten rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Just as an EV driver, I want to assure people that in committee I did make sure this will actually not penalize EV drivers. We currently pay \$50, and they will allow us to pay less than \$50 if our road usage comes, the formula comes out to less than \$50. So, this could incur savings for EV drivers. But it's also a chance for them to test the system and get it figured out with a smaller group of drivers so that when they do transition this, which will still be equitable because those that drive far now are paying more for gas, those that drive far later will pay more with their mileage, but they just need to test the system. Thank you, in support."

Representative Alcos rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition, brief comment. Mr. Speaker, this bill is caused by a deficit in the fuel tax going to repair the roads, *et cetera*. This is an EV-created problem, but we're pushing it on the poor and the ones who live far away as a way of doing it. I know there was a great equalizer from the gentleman from the Big Island. But if you look at it, if you got an old junk that has very little mileage, that burns oil and other things, this is a punishment of the ALICE families. Let's call a spade a spade, because the EVs have not bought the gas, everybody else is having to pay. That's the problem with this bill. This is an EV-created situation. And my sense is, particularly if you want to have capital gains, have those Tesla drivers, have the other ones compensate with not \$50 but \$150."

Representative Quinlan rose to a point of order, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, point of order. Will the representative please confine his remarks to the measure at hand."

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"Sorry, I missed the comment. What did he say? This is an EV-created problem. My point is, we should have the EVs pay the difference. They're the ones who have created the deficit in the fuel tax repository. So, therefore, make it up to them rather than have everybody having to pay it, particularly if you're poor, you live far away, and you got an old junk that doesn't have any good mileage. It's very simple economics. Thank you."

Representative Todd rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you. Once again, in support. I just want to note again that this bill does not apply to non-EVs. It's very clear in the language of the bill and even in the summary of the bill that it does not apply to anyone else. It is an opt-in program. And one of the things it's trying to address is we're trying to study this as a potential model to replace the fuel tax in the long run, which already penalizes rural drivers, it already penalizes people who may have cars that are not as miles-per-gallon friendly.

"So just as a quick example, I have a hybrid. I'm fortunate to have a hybrid, it gets over 50 miles to the gallon. So, one of the things we're trying to address in here is that EV drivers would actually pay more currently than I would for a hybrid. So, we're trying to find an opt-in model that finds a balance there. As a quick example, if you were to opt in, you would benefit if you drive about 6,500 miles or less, give or take. And if you drive more than that, you'd be better off paying the existing fee that's already in place, the surcharge.

"But once again, it does not apply to anyone else, and it's an opt-in program. And I think the language in the bill is very clear that that is the case. And I just wanted to put that out there."

Representative Lowen rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Still in support, slight reservations but I want to adopt the most recent words of the Transportation Chair. And also just comment that the reduction in fuel tax, electric vehicles are still less than 2% of all cars on the road. The reduction in fuel tax revenues has more to do with more efficient vehicles than it does with electric vehicles. And I think it's a good thing to transition off of fossil fuels, reduce local air pollution, *et cetera*. So, we need to come up with different systems. I do support switching to the road usage charge, I just want to also make sure that we have strong incentives in place for EV adoption. Thanks."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1110, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ROAD USAGE CHARGE PROGRAM," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives Alcos and Lowen voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Garcia and Ward voting no.

Representative Todd, for the Committee on Transportation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 177) recommending that H.B. No. 1186, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1186, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LIABILITY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative Todd, for the Committee on Transportation, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 178) recommending that H.B. No. 1187, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1187, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs.

Representatives Quinlan and Holt, for the Committee on Tourism and the Committee on Economic Development, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 179) recommending that H.B. No. 1375, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Water & Land.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1375, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Water & Land, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kahaloa rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd like to request a ruling on a potential conflict of interest. My fiancé is a public affairs officer for the Hawai'i Tourism Authority," and the Chair ruled, "no conflict," and that the ruling would extend through *sine die*.

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in opposition, brief comment. Mr. Speaker, when a coach wins a season in football or basketball or any sport, you say, hey, right on, spot on. He comes into a losing season, you say, eh, fire the bugger. This is basically what this bill does to the Hawai'i Tourism Authority. We told them in the early 2000s, hey, guys, we got to get better. We got half of our economy on you, get out there and promote. They did Hawai'i Five-0, they got everything everywhere and they got it up to 10 million. And then this body said, hey, control things, manage tourism.

"This says, throw the baby out with the bath. This says, you guys haven't done diddly squat. It does not acknowledge, in fact, it's an insult, in effect, the way that this bill is coming up. I don't see how you can take and repeal something which has done such a good job, and in this interim, COVID interim, has not been able to control things.

"So, Mr. Speaker, I think this is a policy that is reactionary, it's emotional. It doesn't have the substance of what otherwise the executive branch has had heretofore to have 50% of our economy strong, vital, everybody knows Hawai'i, everybody loves Hawai'i. Now we've got to manage it, we've got to be able to have a green fee, we've got to be able to control our environment by charging people who are using it. So, I think we're in the right direction. But this bill is a hook in the road, turning us around in the wrong direction. Thank you."

Representative Quinlan rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support, Mr. Speaker. So, I think it's important to go back a little bit in time, back to the 1980s. We were coming out of the plantation days and we made a conscious decision to save our economy by investing very heavily in tourism. And then sometime later, we created the Hawai'i Tourism Authority and we gave them a mission, and their mission was to market Hawai'i to the world and bring in as many visitors as possible. And they were very successful at that mission.

"The representative from Hawai'i Kai, as always, makes a number of very fine points. However, I must disagree with the characterization of this bill as in any way being insulting. This bill is an attempt for Hawai'i to keep pace with the times. The residents' sentiment has changed. The type of visitor we're getting has changed. We are getting hordes of people day after day pouring into some of our communities with no management and very little messaging.

"Mr. Speaker, over the years we have done a lot for the visitor in Hawai'i. We have done a lot for the visitor industry, and it was appropriate to do so. And now, Mr. Speaker, I think it is appropriate to do something for us, for all of us, for the local residents. Destination management is the key to the future of tourism in Hawai'i. Thank you."

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 1375, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TOURISM," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Water & Land, with Representatives Garcia, Pierick, and Ward voting no.

Representative Tam, for the Committee on Culture, Arts & International Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 180) recommending that H.B. No. 340, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 340, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO BROTHER JOSEPH DUTTON DAY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative Ichiyama, for the Committee on Water & Land, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 181) recommending that H.B. No. 756, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 756, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kapela rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Hussey-Burdick rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, thank you. With reservations, brief comment. I would like to thank the introducer for introducing this important measure and passing it through the first committee. I strongly support the intent of this bill. I was just at a meeting last night where we were shown pretty drastic pictures of people's houses that are falling into the ocean. Some of these people have lived in those houses for generations and they do not have the wealth or the means to move.

"And so, this fund is exactly what we need to move our state forward and to give these homeowners an out. But I'm worried because I don't see any protections, any income cap. So, I'm a little bit worried that without those kinds of things, we might see people with the wealthy attorneys being the first to take advantage of this money. And, as we know, our resources are limited, and we really have to prioritize those with low income. So, I appreciate that this bill is moving forward, and I hope that the next committee will take those concerns under consideration. Thank you."

Representative Kong rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. I don't think I'm going to go into my sea level rise as I did last year, but we really have to address the erosion problem instead of focusing on this thinking that by addressing to sea level rise that we're going to solve this problem. Thank you very much."

Representative Cochran rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Chair, for this opportunity to state with reservations. An explanation, please. So, knowing that this will be being heard through multiple hearings, I'm looking forward to having my issues and concerns addressed through the process. And I appreciate having another tool in the toolbox for OCCL. And again, just looking forward to the process and having my issues being heard and addressed then. Thank you."

Representative Garcia rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. I want to thank the representative from Aiea for his words. And my only problem with this is, first, I do support the fact of addressing the issue of houses falling into the ocean. But the problem is, this bill would expand the climate change adaption priority guidelines, and for those reasons, a no vote."

Representative Amato rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Perruso rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kapela rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would just like to note that erosion is caused by sea level rise and, still in opposition, second time, and sea level rise is caused by our pending climate doom unless we address climate change."

Representative Kong rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition, second time. I'm not sure if anybody remembers my speech last year, Mr. Speaker. But the rate of sea level rise still is 1.5 millimeters per year. And it has been that way, according to the NOAA, for the past 100 years. So, any destruction that has occurred with even the last 50 years is still accountable for a sea level rise of 1.5 millimeters. If you want to see what that is, you have to imagine, there's ten millimeters in a centimeter, two and a half centimeters in an inch. I didn't want to have to get into this, but here we go again. Any case, because of the facts, I mean, it's just not my data, this is the NOAA data specifically addressing sea level rise. If I was to use a different study, anybody can look up the author, Nils-Axel Mörmér. He is a leading, well, he was, I'm sorry, he passed away, geophysicist for Stockholm, but he is a leading authority on sea level rise. So, if anyone wants to go back and really take a look at what the facts are, then they can look at this study. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 756, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LAND USE," passed Second Reading and was

referred to the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection, with Representatives Amato, Cochran, Hussey-Burdick, and Perruso voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Garcia, Kapela, Kong, and Pierick voting no.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1348, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LABELING OF MACADAMIA NUTS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Gates, for the Committee on Agriculture & Food Systems, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 192) recommending that H.B. No. 1382, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1382, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I stand in strong support of this bill. This will feed the homeless. This will take wild game, it will allow, if properly shot and dressed and approved,

to do otherwise what is wasted meat protein to be fed to homeless, not only homeless but food banks, *et cetera*. It's very good, it's creative, we should have done it before. And I would like comments in the Journal please. Thank you."

Representative Ward's written remarks are as follows:

"This innovative measure provides a solution to our overpopulation of wild game, particularly axis deer and wild pigs, while offering a nutritional food source as our families increasingly struggle to make ends meet. Creative ideas such as these are what the people are looking to us to pass, and I offer my strong support of this bill as it moves forward."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1382, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MEAT DONATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Gates, for the Committee on Agriculture & Food Systems, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 193) recommending that H.B. No. 1426, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Economic Development.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1426, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Economic Development, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Lamosao rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I request a ruling on a potential conflict. I work for a food distribution company that supports local food systems," and the Chair ruled, "no conflict," and that the ruling would extend through *sine die*.

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1426, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO VALUE-ADDED PRODUCTS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Economic Development.

Representative Gates, for the Committee on Agriculture & Food Systems, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 194) recommending that H.B. No. 852, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Economic Development.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 852, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE ENTERPRISE ZONES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Economic Development.

Representative Matayoshi, for the Committee on Labor & Government Operations, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 195) recommending that H.B. No. 77, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Education.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 77, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Education, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Garcia rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support, brief comment. For years there's been an inequity between the DOE and our public charter school teachers and school systems itself. And so, this bill is bringing equity in that direction. So, for those reasons, strong support."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 77, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TEACHERS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Education.

Representative Matayoshi, for the Committee on Labor & Government Operations, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 196) recommending that H.B. No. 977, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

"I stand in support, Mr. Speaker. This measure will ultimately help my constituents out in Kapolei because that's going to be one of two child care centers that this measure is proposing. So, I stand in support of my constituents and this great measure. Thank you."

Representative Garcia rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Souza be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 800, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHILD CARE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Human Services, with Representative Pierick voting no.

Representative Mizuno, for the Committee on Human Services, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 198) recommending that H.B. No. 547, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 547, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Mizuno, for the Committee on Human Services, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 200) recommending that H.B. No. 261, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 261, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 261, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EARLY LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Garcia and Pierick voting no.

Representative Mizuno, for the Committee on Human Services, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 201) recommending that H.B. No. 777, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 777, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO BACKGROUND CHECKS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative Mizuno, for the Committee on Human Services, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 202) recommending that H.B. No. 775, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 775, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT ESTABLISHING THE SOCIAL WORKERS FOR PUBLIC SAFETY PILOT PROGRAM," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Mizuno, for the Committee on Human Services, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 203) recommending that H.B. No. 350, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 350, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Garcia rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. I do support the intent of the bill, I think that the intent is fantastic, and we all agree that more action to mitigate sexual abuse on children is important. But my only reason for voting no on this is I am a firm believer in the separation of church and state. And some folks don't understand what that means. But what that means is the government shall never tell the church what to do and vice versa. It keeps it separate to refrain from bad experiences, which we've seen throughout history. And this bill is now allowing the government to now step foot into the church and tell them what to do. So, for those reasons, a no vote."

Representative Pierick rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I stand in support. From the perspective of needing to protect children, and that's it."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Quinlan rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support, Mr. Speaker. I'm also a very strong believer in the separation of church and state. Now, let me quote from the Bible. No, I'm just kidding."

Representative Souza rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support, Mr. Speaker. There's no reason to perpetuate secrecy in this regard. Thank you."

Representative Mizuno rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. Mr. Speaker, I just wanted to share my thoughts on this bill. I understand about separation of church and state. I wanted to say that just because you're a pastor, you're human and

you can make mistakes. And just because you're in a clergy, it doesn't give you a free pass. If a child is being sexually assaulted, we need to know that. I mean, it's simple, what would Jesus do? For those reasons, I support this bill. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, there's one more piece of information here. That is, if you're a journalist, you don't have to give your sources, generally speaking, because the press is sacred. However, if there is a crime and it's proven that you are a key witness, of course this should apply. But this says mandatory, it doesn't say what stage, at least my understanding of this bill, doesn't say what stage it's in. So, they should be treated at least like journalists. Which if it leads to a crime or somebody's injured or somebody's killed or somebody, somebody, somebody, something really harmful happened. If that chronology is in this bill, I'm for it. But if it's not, we're treating clergyman less fairly than we are journalists. And journalists, as you know, really push back heavily when they are forced to testify because they have a secret source, almost like a lawyer has a confidentiality agreement with their clients. So, I think this may need a little bit more exploration to make it equivalent to what journalists have now have in their context. Thank you."

Representative Mizuno rose to respond, stating:

"Still in support. I appreciate the words from the good representative from Hawai'i Kai. However, this talks about a clergyperson knowing that there's sexual assault happening. And within a reasonable, foreseeable future, they need to report that. So, time is of the essence. We need to save those kids.

"So again, I'm a Christian, I support our churches. But in this case, if someone's being sexually assaulted, it doesn't matter if you're a pastor or minister or what, you need to report that. And that's what this bill displays. For those reasons, I still stand in support of this bill. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Garcia rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Still in opposition. The phrase was mentioned, what would Jesus do? Well, he said, render unto Caesar what is Caesar's and render unto God what is God's. I do, once again, support the intent of the bill. Safety of children is super important. But once again, the point is never shall government tell the church what to do. That's a basic, fundamental philosophy from the inception of this nation, and that should remain that way. Thank you."

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in support of this measure. First, I'd like to clarify that there is a relationship between the church and state. And the government does pass laws that the church has to abide by. So, that should be clear. And I also would like to state that I would hope, as a former teacher who is a mandatory reporter, that members of the clergy would hold themselves to a higher standard and embrace this opportunity to be mandatory reporters alongside teachers."

Representative Souza rose to respond, stating:

"Again, Mr. Speaker, in strong support. Just to echo the sentiments of the previous speaker and also to note that the moral minimum should be disclosure. And so, the law currently exempts clergy. So therefore, separation of church and state doesn't really apply to this argument. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 350, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHILD ABUSE REPORTING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, with Representatives Garcia and Ward voting no.

"The second concern is, I have a lot of products I want to buy and they say, oh we don't ship to Alaska or Hawai'i. I'm afraid that this may even make it worse, if we're going to say, hey guys, if you've got an extra 5 or 10 cents or \$5 or \$1 on it, it may cut down that service to Hawai'i. We're already kind of a bit isolated because of our distance. So, hopefully we can handle this gingerly. It's effective in shooting a shot across the bow. But in terms of denying our people here because of this shipping, whether it's a couple of bucks that we're going to be able to take advantage of is fine. The intent is good, I'm not sure about the implementation or if it's going to cut some of our supply lines. Thank you."

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Quinlan, for the Committee on Tourism, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 247) recommending that H.B. No. 12, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 12, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TIME SHARING," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives Kila and Lamosao being excused.

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1295, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FARMS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives Kila and Lamosao being excused.

Representatives Gates and Holt, for the Committee on Agriculture & Food Systems and the Committee on Economic Development, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 253) recommending that H.B. Representatives Gates and Belatti, for the Committee on Agriculture & Food Systems and the Committee on Health & Homelessness, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 254) recommending that H.B. No. 1359, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1359, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support for the sake of our colleague. We call her the hemp lady, Representative Cynthia Thielen, who used to stand here, and she would just plead, listen to help. It's going to cure the soil. Listen to her to say you can make 75,000 products out of it. And with her enthusiasm, finally, we have arrived at this day. So, with robust enthusiasm, I vote yea. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 1359, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEMP," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives Kila and Lamosao being excused.

Representative Belatti, for the Committee on Health & Homelessness, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 255) recommending that H.B. No. 955, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 955, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Hussey-Burdick rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would like to rule out a potential conflict. I was born at home under the expert care of a traditionally trained birth attendant, and if and when I become pregnant, I would prefer the same type of birth attendant to help me bring my child into the world," and the Chair ruled, "no conflict," and that the ruling would extend through *sine die*.

Representative Hussey-Burdick continued to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. So, first I want to be very clear about the two things that this bill, HB 955, is doing. So, the original version eliminated what's been known as the drop-dead date in the current law that's scheduled to make traditional birth attendants illegal on July 1st of this year. The HD 1 version changes that drop dead date to 2025, which matches the sunset date of the whole statute. At that time, we will have a sunset analysis and we'll be back here again deciding the fate of the midwifery licensure law. So, this is currently just a temporary extension so that nobody becomes illegal while we figure out the details of licensure.

"The second part of this bill allows all certified professional midwives, or CPMs, to be eligible for licensure because our current law only allows certain CPMs to be licensed. Both of these elements are in alignment with Oregon's midwifery law, and many other states either have similar provisions or don't regulate midwifery at all.

"I want to thank the Health Committee Chair for moving this bill forward and writing into the committee report, 'your committee finds that traditionally-trained birth attendants of all cultures are valued and preferred by some consumers, and that the type of birth attendant utilized at a birth should be the birthing person's choice. Your committee further finds that Act 32, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2019, inadvertently omitted a category of professional midwives who have completed the North American Registry of Midwives portfolio evaluation process.'

"Mr. Speaker, 33 years ago, my mother intentionally chose a traditionally-trained birth attendant to help her give birth to me at home in our little house in Kapaa Street, in Kailua. That birth attendant's name was Medra. She had already attended over 1,000 births before mine, and she had been practicing since long before any of these certifications or licenses ever existed. Just two years later, my little brother was born in the same room, in the same home, with the same birth attendant.

"For both of those births, Mr. Speaker, that choice that my mother made was criminal, because just before I was born in 1989, the people in this very same square building that we stand in today, with all their good intentions, had passed a law making Medra's traditional knowledge illegal. And I'm so grateful that she was willing to care for my family anyway. Because when my baby brother was born, he came out with his cord wrapped around his neck, his face was blue, and he wasn't breathing. But Medra, with her years of traditional training, gave him the breath of life.

"Now, my mother is highly educated, an attorney who many other attorneys and members of this room probably know from her years of advocating for women's rights. She did her research. She knew who she was choosing. And she carefully weighed those risks against the risks of an impersonal, uncomfortable hospital birth filled with the pressure of unnecessary medical interventions. She felt so strongly that she wanted a non-certified non-medicalized birth attendant that she told me she probably would have given birth unassisted if she couldn't find a traditionally trained midwife to care for her.

"Unfortunately, mothers on Moloka'i or Lāna'i or the more rural areas of our neighbor islands literally don't have that luxury of choosing whether or not to go to a birth center up the street like my mother did. They don't have access to a nearby hospital. There are simply not enough licensed midwives practicing on their island. So, unless this law passes, their only chance will be to either fly to O'ahu for the last month of their pregnancy, give birth

unassisted, which will almost certainly happen if it's premature before they have that chance to fly, or illegally enlist the services of the traditionally trained birth attendants who have been serving their communities for decades.

"Mr. Speaker, I encourage everyone in this room to go on YouTube and watch the Health Committee hearing from last Friday, February 3rd, and read all the testimony on HB 955. In my six years of working here, I have never seen so much overwhelming support on any other bill. One thousand two hundred and thirty-one people took time out of their day to give passionate, moving testimonies in support. Only 39 opposed, but the vast majority of that opposition made comments indicating they actually support the bill's intent by stating things like, I oppose this bill because I should be allowed to choose my traditional birth attendant. In comparison, Mr. Speaker, death with dignity had between 800 to 900 testimonies and they were very mixed in terms of support."

Representative Kobayashi rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Hussey-Burdick continued, stating:

"I'm sure you'll remember that with death with dignity, members of the medical community stood on both sides of that issue, as they do now with this bill. The only bill I've been able to find that had more testimony was same sex marriage. But again, those were very mixed in terms of support. Mr. Speaker, in both of those instances, this body was brave enough to pass laws that gave people the right to make decisions about their own lives. And that's all I ask of you again today. *Mahalo.*"

Representative Marten rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, I'm registering a no vote and with brief comments. I understand this is a work in progress, and I appreciate the efforts of the Health Chair to address the issue. The reason for my no vote is that I think that everybody should be licensed when providing this kind of very important health care and that standards should be met. And I understand that three years ago, when the deadline was given, that was a time period to resolve some of the issues and agree on a path forward. And I'd hate to just keep kicking the can down the road while people are still practicing, taking money for a service in our state, without any set of standards.

"In my mid-twenties, I worked in Guatemala. I ran a child and infant nutrition program. And there in very traditional Mayan villages, almost everybody was attended by traditional midwives with no particular certification. The only people that were not were the people that could afford to go to the hospital. We did have relatively high maternal mortality. And I saw the consequences of that among the children that I cared for when they were orphaned. So anyways, I believe that everybody probably has the talents and skills and ability to learn to become licensed. But we should have that standard in our state. Thank you."

Representative Pierick rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. My mom had four home births. My sister had four home births. Based on experience and in observation, I support."

Representative Garcia rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. I rarely say this but, my body, my choice."

Representative Amato rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. Choice should be absolute."

Representative Tam rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 955, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHAPTER 457J, HAWAII REVISED STATUTES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representative Tam voting aye with reservations, with Representative Marten voting no, and with Representatives Kila and Lamosao being excused.

"I can see the intent to yield to bicycles to be a little more free. But, as I think many of the cyclists say, we are to be treated equally as cars, and cars can't go through red lights with impunity, particularly now that we want to put red light cameras up. I think this probably is a little bit too liberal into the wrong direction. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, serious reservations. Thank you."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support, Mr. Speaker. First off, the purpose of this bill is to establish and appropriate moneys for a four-year Pacific cultural court pilot program in the family court of the First Circuit, that's here on O'ahu.

"As testified before the Judiciary Committee, Judge Hall noted that, in Hawai'i, children of Hawaiian ancestry and other Pacific Island youth are overrepresented in the juvenile justice system. For the fiscal year 2022, statewide, Native Hawaiian and Pacific Island youths accounted for 48% of youths who were arrested, 49% of the youths who were referred to the

family court, 50% of the petitions filed in family court, and 63% of youths who were placed in our detention facility.

"Studies have shown that youth who are connected to their culture and community are more successful and less likely to become involved in the justice system. We envision a cultural court program that will connect at-risk youth to their community and their culture, and in turn reduce their involvement in the justice system.

"Mr. Speaker, there are similar programs currently happening in Navajo communities, in First Nation communities in Manitoba, and, most notably, in New Zealand, they call it the Rangatahi Court. They've essentially changed their entire juvenile justice system to be a partnership between the juvenile court system and various community groups.

"What we're trying to do is use best practices, the diversity of our community, and acknowledge that courts can often act as another source of trauma for children. That oftentimes when young people meet a judge, it's just a person in a black robe telling them that they're a bad person. We now know that excessive fines, court dates, and a probation officer don't replace a loving family, a connection between mistakes and growing up, or taking accountability. Mr. Speaker, this is our opportunity to have the justice system act as part of the village instead of an oppressive experience of trauma.

"We also have an opportunity to partner with numerous philanthropic organizations. The Kellogg Foundation has just given \$20 million to Partners in Care, the Hawai'i Youth Correctional Facility, and numerous other non-profits are looking forward to partnering with the Judiciary in reducing trauma to communities and to children, and to really, finally, having an effect on the overrepresentation of Pacific Islander and Hawaiian kids in our justice system. Thank you so much."

Plus, I would hope that people would know that Act 277 was passed in 2019, which if you are indigent or you're poor or whatever you have no money to post bail, instead of going to jail, which costs us, Mr. Speaker, \$258 per day, this Act 277, and I hope CJ and other judges are listening, is a bill that this body passed which says, hey, if you don't have the money, just give us your signature. It's an IOU, it's a promissory note. And if they show up, Mr. Speaker, the thing is ripped up, a no brainer. But none of the Judiciary has practiced that.

"There is now circulating without a hearing, I think it's bill 1172, which I talked with the head of the prisons yesterday, he didn't know about it. The point is, we have a way of doing without cash, if people would just keep their word. So, Mr. Speaker, this is redundant and to me and no is a no brainer because there should not be no cash bail. You've got to have skin in the game. And right now, people are not showing up, even if they're poor or they're rich. This is not the way we should be going. Thank you."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support, Mr. Speaker. In response to the representative from District 18, this is not affecting cash bail. It still remains in the purview of the issuing court to issue bail if they decide to. Members of the CMV and Judiciary Committees last week heard from the National Conference of State Legislatures regarding numerous best practices happening around the country, regarding how we treat those who are charged with crimes but who are not yet convicted. This does work, as seen through around the country. We also need to start making moves towards remedying the ill effects of the war on drugs. I have much more to say on this, but I suppose I'll wait until third reading. Thank you so much."

Representative Quinlan rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition, Mr. Speaker. I think there are a lot of really great ideas contained in this bill, but I do have some issues with the part three, so I'll be a no for now. Thank you."

"I think that if we're going to move on a water credit, it should be equitable and we should make sure that the communities that are the most harmed have access to these things. However, if this is specifically to Red Hill, then we need to make sure that in this bill we provide the proof of harm so that we're making sure that that money is going towards families that may have been impacted by Red Hill. Thank you."

Representative Hussey-Burdick rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. I have a biology degree and I studied sex and gender pretty extensively during my undergrad. I just think that maybe this body should be aware that a 2018 study by Horii, *et al.*, published in the *Gynecologic and Obstetric Pathology*, Third Edition, shows that people with intersex parts have different XXXY genotypes, concluding that chromosomes do not necessarily dictate what genitals you get. From the study it says, based on external phenotype, two-thirds of true hermaphrodites are raised as males, despite the presence of an XX, female, karyotype in at least half of them. Other karyotypes are 46,XX/46,XY and 46,XY.

"Mr. Speaker, according to the science, there are far more than two naturally occurring sexes, and perceived sex is actually a complicated mix of hormones and genotypes. As a biologist and a strong LGBTQ+ ally, I support the right of all humans to make decisions about their own body. Thank you."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representatives Mizuno and Belatti, for the Committee on Human Services and the Committee on Health & Homelessness, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 415) recommending that H.B. No. 1343, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1343, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No please. I'd like to thank the representatives introducing this measure. I do support contraception. But, if this measure would include abortion, that goes against my belief. My understanding is that life begins at conception, and when a heartbeat begins to be at around five and a half to six weeks, that's a very precious thing. And it's my desire to save human life, including life within the womb. So that's why I'm voting no on this measure."

Representative Nakamura rose to a point of order, stating:

"Point of order. The previous speaker should address the bill at hand."

Representative Garcia rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Addressing the bill at hand, in opposition. This expands reproductive health care access, which is a code word for abortion services, statewide. So, no vote."

Representative Alcos rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Strong support. I would like to clarify for members who may not understand that reproductive justice is more than just abortion access. Reproductive justice means access to women's health care. It means access to being able to know how your body is operating. Being able to understand if you ever have any issues, how to take care of those problems.

"On the neighbor islands, we don't have access to reproductive health at all. It's very difficult in many areas and in rural communities, you barely have access to a doctor. So, having a care access office that makes sure that in every single community, women can understand how to care for their bodies, whether it's a cancer screening or a mammogram, that's what reproductive justice is, not just abortion access."

Representative Mizuno rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I wanted to thank the members of this body for saying some really good arguments on this and many other bills. So, I'm going to state something that didn't come from me, but I heard from a very intelligent colleague of ours. My body, my choice. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Marten rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, in strong support. I would like to have the words of the representative from Ka'u entered into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Souza rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ganaden rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Kapela be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tam rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Kapela be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support and I'd also like the words of the representative from District 5 entered into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Lamosao rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and H.B. No. 1343, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH CARE ACCESS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Lamosao, Matsumoto, and Souza voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, Pierick, and Ward voting no, and with Representative Kitagawa being excused.

And it's something, I would hope, would start a trend, and I want to thank the author for introducing this, and I hope this sails through. And I hope it's a beginning for future diversification, to some have said, we can be the sports center of the Pacific, if we get a stadium eventually, if this body decides what to do with that. We can be the diplomatic Geneva of the Pacific, diplomacy, we have the East-West Center and the other in Waikiki. We could also be space tourism.

"The point is, Mr. Speaker, we've got to think outside of the box because, and here's the bottom line, we have half of our population is ALICE families, asset limited income challenged, and they're working. We are the stewards, if you will, of this economy. And when we have half of our population, we don't have an economy this size. And this helps expand that economy, it helps good paying jobs, and it's probably one of the best bills this session, if it goes all the way through. For those reasons, I hope everybody votes with exemplary enthusiasm. Thank you."

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support with a brief comment. I would like to thank the chair of the Committee on Labor & Government Operations for passing a strong sick leave bill through our committee. Currently, approximately 180,000 workers in Hawai'i lack access to sick leave, most of whom work in the service industry in jobs that frequently engage the public, like food servers and sales associates.

"Low-income workers and women are significantly less likely to have paid sick leave than other members of our workforce. Only one in five low-income workers has access to paid sick leave. Studies have shown that access to sick leave actually reduces the cost for businesses, especially small businesses, because it increases employee retention.

"We just went through the pandemic, whose effects we are still feeling today. We know that people were and still are going to work with COVID-19 because they cannot afford to sacrifice their financial security in order to get better. Paid sick leave is essential to preserving personal and public health, giving employees time to recover from illness and prevent the spread of contagions in our communities.

"I would also like to add that I am very grateful for the HD 1 of this bill that cuts out the exemption for small businesses. Because if we were to use that exemption, 91% of all businesses in Hawai'i are small businesses with less than 50 employees, which means that all of those workers would not have access to this very, very important opportunity to get better. Thank you."

"In another bill, germane to this bill, the Board of Water Supply is asking for \$10 million to pay for those wells. We also are not sure how we're going to continue to help tracking in coordination with the federal government. For those reasons, in strong support, Mr. Speaker."

Mr. Speaker, we have a housing crisis, and this is going to punish them all the more. That's reason number one.

"Number two is that we're giving the counties so much taxing power. They're going to be competing with us and competing with each other to whereas in the Constitution it says, the counties shall have property tax authority. And it's kind of getting out of hand. There are stormwater authority, to give a tax on that, which we'll come to later on this agenda. They have TAT tax, they have GET tax, I mean where does this end? Particularly now with housing, another tax for them to say, hey, if you're going to build infrastructure for housing that we need, like 50,000 to 60,000

shortage of units that we have right now, we're going to make you pay more, which is going to go on to the consumers, which is going to put the price of housing even higher than it is right now at \$1.1 million. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

You get free tuition, you get to be a professor for the day, you get to be an administration, if you will,

of the course. And you put it on your resume and it's a good track becoming a professor or getting a MA, or probably more so, a PhD.

"The point is, Mr. Speaker, this has come up every 10 years. We are now in a crunch with the University of Hawai'i. The University of Hawai'i budget is being challenged, as it was cut in the last couple of sessions. I think this is going to decrease their viability as well as also, for the last 10 years we've said, look, we're not ready for that. And I think this session, we're not ready for it either. Thank you."

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. Graduate students have the right to organize, just like all other workers. And that is why we are moving this measure, so as to be ready for the Supreme Court decision when it comes down, to further facilitate that process."

Representative Ganaden rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Ruling on a potential conflict, Mr. Speaker. I am an attorney representing several unions who supported, through motions, the graduate students' case in the current case before the Hawai'i State Supreme Court."

The Chair addressed Representative Ganaden, stating:

"No conflict, ruling stands through *sine die*. It relates to a class and group of people. Thank you."

"We had a great discussion on the radio the other day. I said, basically, we're throwing the HTA out with the bath. We're punishing achievement, because look, they've done such a good job. They're the ones with their foot on the accelerator, they got us all these tourism, they will know how to back it off. They have a management plan, but we're not giving them a chance to show their stuff by saying, hey, we're going to cut you off at the pass or cut you at the knees.

"My point is, Mr. Speaker, let them do what they're doing well, and they're turning into an indigenous organization, not the one at HVCB that just rallies everybody to come to Hawai'i. My point is, this may come up next year, but right now it's untimely. And I think it needs to be put on ice for the present. It's not a good bill. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Quinlan rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. Mr. Speaker, Shakespeare once wrote, give every man thy ear, but few thy voice. And I think that the voices of our people, of those

communities that have suffered so much from unmanaged over tourism, are not being heard. And I have a commitment to those people, Mr. Speaker, to continue to lend them my voice. Thank you."

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, second time in opposition. Mr. Speaker, we have to know historically why we've reached this point. Number one countless is the Airbnb. If we can't solve the Airbnb process and the situation, how are we going to solve the HTA, which is a threat of situations? The second thing is, this went under the microscope because the HTA contract with HVCB and with CNHA and what the former administration did with awarding the contract, taking the contract back, awarding to the other entity and contracting it back, has made us focus, like in a laser focus, on what's going on with tourism.

"I think understanding those two things has highlighted, because look, all of our neighborhoods are under a threat of Airbnb. We haven't been able to do that. But to blame the HTA on the Airbnb phenomenon, I think is misplaced importance. Regardless of what Shakespeare has said, damning with faint praise is not praise at all. Thank you."

Representative Quinlan rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support and may I have the words of the representative from Hawai'i Kai entered into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Some of you recall they came to the neighborhood boards and explained that this is coming soon. And by the way, Mr. Speaker, they said yes, government is going to have to pay.

"This one is a direct contradiction to what the City & County of Honolulu has spread out throughout the neighborhood boards of this island. This

exempts the state from all of its lack of ability to fess up to what it's been telling all of us in the different neighborhoods, that you will be taxed also.

"So, this bill is totally unfair to what has already been circulated. This exempts them and it's not fair because of what they said. And it's another new tax, also. Because of your driveway, the size of your roof, you're going to pay another way. You know, there's so many ways you can get money out of people's pockets, but to me, this is a very unfair way. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in strong, strong opposition, based upon principle and on conscience. Mr. Speaker, this allows a relocation allowance, if you're a millionaire on the beach, we're going to find you another property as a substitute where you live. This is such a slap in the face of the Hawaiian community that's on the beach, homeless, and we can't find them houses because we want to reserve the money, and there's a fund in this to move those millionaires off the beach so they can be safe from the sea climate change.

"Mr. Speaker, this bill is probably the unkindest cut of all in all of these bills that are negative. This is unfair. It should fail. It should not be even written by any of us here, to say that we back such a bill with such inequity implied and totally funded by the state for the favor of one group. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Poepe rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tam rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Amato rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

"But we do not! We have a General Excise tax system. The GE tax system is uniquely structured to affect the cost of doing business in this state. Yes, the GE tax may be passed through to the consumer but doesn't necessarily mean that it has to be passed on to the consumer, or vice versa.

"In other words, any GE tax cut may not necessarily be beneficial to the consumer, but will definitely benefit said business.

"For this reason, I stand in opposition."

It does accelerate the date for something like 25,000 of the almost 90,000 cesspools that exist in the state with the reasoning that if we wait until 2049 before this requirement kicks in for anyone, we're going to be in a lot worse situation by doing nothing.

"And so, we need to move the date a little earlier in order to encourage workforce development, to get those loan programs, the grant programs, the tax credit, all that stuff in place. We're simultaneously working on a lot of other measures that also implement recommendations of the Cesspool Conversion Working Group. But this is also an important part of it."

Representative Kahaloa rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Lowen be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Therefore, bills like this, says that you can conceal carry, but you can't do it anywhere. So, it defeats the purpose. No vote."

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No, please. I'd like just to remind us that we all took an oath to protect and defend the Constitution, which includes the Second Amendment."

Representative Alcos rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Souza rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No vote please, Mr. Speaker. I think that the members of this body should remember that the *Bruen* case is a little bit more complicated than just fighting for Second Amendment rights. But I do feel that this bill generally, there's many facets that do overstep and infringe upon our Second Amendment rights, even though the purpose of the bill is to update our Hawai'i gun laws based on the *Bruen* decision. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kong rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support and just want to note that in preface to the part of the Constitution that was mentioned, it's also prefaced by mention of a well-regulated militia."

Representative Tarnas rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. This bill is a bill that is implementing the necessary system to comply with the U.S. Supreme Court decision that requires all states to set up a system to allow for concealed carry weapon licenses. We developed this bill, the attorney general proposed it, and we carefully reviewed it to ensure that it is compliant with the Supreme Court decision.

"We also used the concurrent decision that Justice Kavanaugh and Justice Roberts signed on to, that would allow for certain restrictions that are reasonable and also they allow for certain sensitive places. And so, this bill I think is very reasonable and it is protecting the rights of those who seek to get concealed carry weapon licenses and also protects the rights of the general public. So, I urge all members to support it. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. and they're very well taken. Except there's one that is conspicuous in its absence, and that's the decision making.

"I was going to start off my floor speech by saying, hey, I can kill a bill anytime I want to. That's a famous quote for someone who is now incarcerated. The point is, we have not changed that methodology of decision making. When a bill is voted down, everybody is silent. Because of that, Mr. Speaker, we can vote a bill up, but when it's deferred, the chair reigns superior. And that's why I say, when the quote is, hey, I can kill a bill anytime I want. That doesn't pass the smell test.

"Everything else in there is good except that one needs to be reworked and recommitted. Because decision making is a democratic process in a democratic body such as this. Thank you for listening."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.R. "No, please, with a brief comment. I'd like to share with the body the Second Amendment which reads, 'a well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed.' I'd like to read the caption of this bill, 'authorizes a fingerprint-based criminal history record check by the county police departments of applicants for licenses to sell, offer to sell, distribute, or otherwise transfer electric guns or cartridges.'

"So, from my understanding, now we're going to implement background checks for weapons, electric guns, tasers. I don't believe that the Fourth Amendment had in mind a background check. Keep in mind the colonial people, they were wanting to prevent suppression by England. And so, they thought to themselves, we need to make sure we're allowed to bear arms to keep against this.

"Well, if the person in power, if the group in power so chooses we should not allow the sale of a gun because we determined the background check should not go through, a quick phone call from the governor to the police department, *et cetera*, that to me sounds like a loophole in the Second Amendment. So, for those reasons, I vote no."

Representative Souza rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. No vote for me. I think the majority of the reason why I'm voting no, in addition to the Second Amendment, is that the Honolulu Police Department provided testimony in opposition. Thank you."

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kong rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Alcos rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tarnas rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. This measure requires those who sell electric guns to go through those checks, not the people who buy. So, I want to make sure the members understand what the purpose of this is. And this is, I think, a standard approach that I think ensures that those who are sellers of electric guns meet certain standards. I urge the members to support this. Thank you."

Representative Kila rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, no vote. Can I adopt the words from the representative from Kohala into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Gates rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. "Well, Mr. Speaker, here we are today again trying to allow hemp farmers to get their products out to market. Now, we have seen foreign hemp products come to Hawai'i markets from outside of the state, but not locally produced. In attempt to get a variety of local products sold here, legislation has been unsuccessful since 2020. We talk about sustainability, but with this crop it is very difficult.

"Our former and now retired colleague from Kailua was a strong advocate and champion for hemp production. She would bring hemp products for us to taste, she encouraged the use of hemp clothing on one special Friday, and did all she could to get Act 14 to become a reality.

"Our challenge with this legislation is to finally allow our hemp farmers to get products out to market. Mr. Speaker, this bill, I hope, will finally help our hemp farmers who have invested so much into a farm product that may have many health and environmental benefits. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 843, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 887) recommending that H.B. No. 936, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Morikawa rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. Although the committee report will show that there were many reservations on this version of the

bill, including mine, this issue is very important. The reservations were because of the added language that this bill only applied to any island with a population of 500 or less, which would be the island of Ni'ihau.

"The original intent of this bill was to bring awareness to the difference of Ni'ihau speakers, who have maintained the language of their ancestors and are now the only true community of Hawaiian language native speakers left in the world, to clarify the type of support needed for native speakers of all islands who have never lost the Hawaiian language in their families, and to appropriate funds to support the perpetuation of that language with regard to the provision of public services and notices to native speakers in the language and orthography they understand best.

"The Department of Accounting and General Services, DAGS, submitted testimony in support of this bill because they believe that increased support and education of the Hawaiian language, that includes the form of the language that was taught during the Hawaiian kingdom, should be acknowledged and that the rich documentary heritage contained in the State Archives is accessible to more than just the few native speakers and academics who understand it.

"Further, DAGS suggests that efforts to more fully support increased fluency in the indigenous language that existed in the early Hawaiian kingdom should be made throughout Hawai'i and not restricted to just islands with populations of 500 or less, so that that rich documentary heritage contained in the many memory institutions throughout Hawai'i can be more widely understood and appreciated.

"Mr. Speaker, after much discussion and some misunderstanding, I believe we need to at some point return to the original language of the bill to support all of Hawai'i. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, strong support. May I have the good remarks from the good representative from Kaua'i entered into the Journal as my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Kahaloa rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, same request from the representative from Waimea," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Garcia rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, same request," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Cochran rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, same," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1128, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SUPPORT FOR TRADITIONAL NATIVE SPEAKERS OF HAWAIIAN," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 890) recommending that H.B. No. 67, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 67, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE PU'UHONUA PROGRAM," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

The question should be asked, why should they be paying taxes for someone else's college degree? Thank you."

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Quinlan rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Strong support, Mr. Speaker. I would just say that my house has never caught on fire, but I'm still glad we have a fire department. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 390, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII PROMISE PROGRAM," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Garcia and Pierick voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 893) recommending that H.B. No. 554, HD 2 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 554, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Kila rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, no vote and a brief comment, please. I support the intent of the measure and knowing that this is on the rise across college campuses, but in respect to University of Hawai'i System, I am requesting that they make the appropriation because it seeks only one year of funding. And for the program to succeed, it needs more than one year. So, requesting that University of Hawai'i take this and run with it and put it in their own budget. So, *mahalo*. No vote."

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Pierick rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 554, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAMPUS SAFETY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Aiu, Garcia, and Pierick voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 894) recommending that H.B. No. 580, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 580, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO VICTIM-COUNSELOR PRIVILEGE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 895) recommending that H.B. No. 694, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 694, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO

THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 896) recommending that H.B. No. 877, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 877, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No. My understanding is that this bill would promote critical race theory, which is basically racism against white people."

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. And I just want to state for the public record that this program is not designed to promote racism against white people. And critical race theory is a body of knowledge that has been developed to help those going through and entering into the legal profession to better understand the history of race relations in this country and to be able to address them in their practice. And I think that it would be wise if we better understood the concepts that we're using on the floor before we use them to determine our analysis about bills. *Mahalo*."

Representative Garcia rose to respond, stating:

"Second time in opposition still. Just for the record, critical race theory is racism because it tells you to judge certain classes of people based upon their skin color. So, no vote."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support. In response to the representative from District 42, discussing race is in the original draft of the Constitution, when we discussed slavery. This bill is the result of three different deans, some of the most esteemed academics in our community, coming to us, asking to collaborate to give us best practices for how the justice system works, to basically make our jobs easier.

"I think it's troubling that there is an anti-academic bent and a movement against what is basically a technical legal analysis of constitutional law that is coming from, I don't know, radio punditry or something.

"Essentially, discussing race and the way that history plays into the law is embedded in the way we discuss everything here on the floor. It is a part of our legal practice. If we think about the cases that were developed after the Richardson Supreme Court, in which they protected water rights, those water rights were then embedded in the 1978 Constitutional Convention. That was essentially critical race theory because they analyzed a discussion of the law going back to a time when it was essentially legal in the kingdom but illegal in American law. It was a discussion in the case.

"Much of the discussion about critical race theory is already in place at the law school. I'm a proud graduate of that law school. I didn't know about the thing until the second and third year of law school. And I'm really proud to have been educated by people like Mari Matsuda, who was the first ever Asian-American law professor tenured in the United States. I'm a former student of Chris Iijima, who developed some of these theoretical frameworks and who passed away and who educated many of us in this community. So, as a part of that pride, I am a strong supporter of this bill."

Representative Souza rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I stand in strong support of this bill. This bill is generally to foster a collaboration between different aspects of academia at the University of Hawai'i System. And it's not just with the law school, the law school will be housing this program, but it's to bring different facets of academia together. And also, the program is meant to have an eye towards peace and justice. And I think that everybody should want world peace. And generally, I think that there definitely has been a sensationalizing the law on the floor and overgeneralization of the law. Thank you."

Representative Pierick rose to respond, stating:

"In opposition. In commenting on academics, I have a bachelor's and two masters with a 4.0 GPA. I have a doctorate degree and I teach at four universities. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 877, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Garcia and Pierick voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 897) recommending that H.B. No. 963, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 963, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO BROADBAND," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 898) recommending that H.B. No. 1148, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1148, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1148, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MENTAL HEALTH," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes, with Representative Garcia voting aye with reservations.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 899) recommending that H.B. No. 1204, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1204, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC EDUCATION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 900) recommending that H.B. No. 278, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 278, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 901) recommending that H.B. No. 406, HD 2 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 406, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 902) recommending that H.B. No. 838, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 838, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LONG-TERM CARE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 903) recommending that H.B. No. 907, HD 2 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 907, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Chun rose in support of the measure and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Chun's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in strong support of House Bill 907, House Draft 2, which establishes health insurance reimbursements for telephonic telehealth services.

"The purpose of this bill is to better support residents that live in rural, isolated, and underprivileged communities who do not have enough access to proper medical care. During the COVID-19 pandemic, telehealth - whether by virtual or through telephonic means - became a necessity to making sure that Hawai'i residents could continue receiving necessary medical services in a safe and effective manner. House Bill 907, House Draft 2, seeks to make the delivery of these services permanent in statute.

"I rise to share the work of many major stakeholders, including Hawai'i Medical Service Association (HMSA), the Hawai'i Psychological Association, the National Association of Social Workers, Hawai'i Island Association for Marriage and Family Therapists, the Hawai'i Substance Abuse Coalition; the Hawai'i Primary Care Association (HPCA), AARP, the American Cancer Society Cancer Action Center, the Hawai'i Parkinson's Association, the Epilepsy Foundation of Hawai'i, and the Alzheimer's Association, brought together by this bill's introduction and have collaborated over the last several weeks to fine tune the language into an agreement better suited for all involved.

"Given the nature of the legislative process and the time needed to reach this consensus, HB907 HD2 does not reflect the most recent agreement. Should this bill move forward, my hope is that this agreement becomes a part of the final measure.

"For these reasons, I stand in support of House Bill 907, House Draft 2. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 907, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TELEHEALTH," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 904) recommending that H.B. No. 982, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 982, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Support. I'm generally not in favor of taxes, but when it comes to taxing tobacco, I support this."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 982, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FUNDING FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF THE ATTORNEY GENERAL TOBACCO ENFORCEMENT UNIT," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 905) recommending that H.B. No. 814, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 814, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Cochran rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, WR on this. I always get leery when we're mandating requiring counties to do certain things. And in this bill, I'm also a staunch

supporter of affordable in perpetuity. This is only keeping the housing at 30 years. I reached out to Maui County to see if they had a chance to chime in and look this over. And they, as I understand, had not. So, thereby, I'm WR on this one."

Representative La Chica rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Perruso rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered." [Note: Representative Perruso later changed her vote to a no vote.]

Representative Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations. This bill requires counties to do certain things. Long before I came here and during my first years here in the Legislature, I worked on several county home rule issues or county autonomy issues, including working with the mayor of Big Island, whose son sits in this body, and also the mayor of Maui. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 814, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AFFORDABLE HOUSING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 44 ayes to 7 noes, with Representatives Cochran, Kobayashi, and La Chica voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Ganaden, Hussey-Burdick, Kapela, Lowen, Marten, Perruso, and Tam voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 906) recommending that H.B. No. 920, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 920, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Lowen rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition, brief comment. Building codes exist for a reason. And we have to think not just about upfront costs but the cost to taxpayers if things are not built to appropriately deal with natural disasters. And we have to think about cost to the occupants of these units if they're not built with energy and water efficiency, for example. But all of that aside, there's already a process in place for the counties to amend building codes. And this is just basically, in my view, facilitating a certain county's incompetence and I cannot vote for it."

Representative Belatti rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 920, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII STATE BUILDING CODE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Belatti voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Lowen voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 907) recommending that H.B. No. 923, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 923, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO BONDS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 908) recommending that H.B. No. 992, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

THIRD READING

H.B. No. 132, HD 1:

Representative Nakamura moved that H.B. No. 132, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tarnas rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, in support. This bill clarifies the use of electronic voting systems for the purposes of marking and counting ballots and auditing the results. Electronic voting systems were first used in Hawai'i during the 1998 elections. The technology involved with such systems has continued to evolve to improve the administration and security of elections. Ballots are scanned and counted through the electronic voting equipment.

"Since we have transitioned to elections by mail, ballots are processed and counted in the order they are received, in contrast to a polling place model which we used in the past, where the ballots are isolated to the assigned district and precinct only. Using the voting equipment, the counted ballots then can be filtered to the selected precinct and viewed to create a hand tally of the results. Further, we're still able to track and go back to the individual source ballot and do a physical review as necessary.

"Your Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs amended the bill to ensure that a post-election pre-certification audit to be done of a random sample of no less than 10% of the precincts is required. For these reasons, I encourage all our members to support this measure. Thank you."

Representative Pierick rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 132, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ELECTIONS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 4 noes, with Representative Matsumoto voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, Pierick, and Ward voting no.

"I want to register a very strong no vote on this measure. Because if you read it closely, in the middle of the bill, there's one line that codifies in law a first responder campus, which I have been pretty adamantly opposed to because my constituents told me that they don't want to spend hundreds of millions of dollars of taxpayer money in this fashion. So, for that reason, I'm a no."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1039, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ACT 278, SESSION LAWS OF HAWAII 2022," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Kapela and Perruso voting no.

H.B. No. 981, HD 1:

Representative Nakamura moved that H.B. No. 981, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No, please. My understanding is that even an electric gun or the sale of an electric gun is an arm per the Second Amendment. And this wouldn't be an infringement if the background check was curtailed to discriminate against that person."

Representative Tarnas rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you. In support, just a brief comment. This measure specifically requires those who sell, or offer to sell, distribute, or otherwise transfer electric guns or cartridges to be required to have a criminal history background check. This is for public safety and consumer protection. I urge all members to support this measure."

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Souza rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Chun rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Chun's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise with reservations regarding House Bill 981, House Draft 1, Relating to Criminal History Background Checks.

"The purpose of House Bill 981 is to require the sellers of electronic guns to submit fingerprints and photographs to the county police departments for the purpose of using national databases to determine if the seller has any history of criminal felony convictions.

"Mr. Speaker, I want to thank the chair of the Committee on Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs and its members for working on this measure. Generally, I would support having some type of oversight over sellers of these devices. My concern, however, is the way that the bill is currently drafted. On page 5, lines 3-5, the bill requires county police departments to acquire fingerprints and photographs.

"(e) Every applicant or, in the case of an applying entity, every responsible person *shall* be fingerprinted and photographed by the police department of the county of application;" (emphasis added)

"The measure makes the background check, however, permissive for the county police departments.

"The police department *may* perform a fingerprint-based criminal history record check pursuant to section 846-2.7, before any determination to issue a license is made." (emphasis added)

"Mr. Speaker, if the purpose of the measure is to require background checks using fingerprints and photographs for the purpose of conducting national criminal databases, then county police departments should also be required to run these background checks. If the purpose of the bill is to have the county police departments decide whether to use these background checks, then the fingerprint and photograph requirements should also be authorized only when the county elects to use these background checks. Otherwise, the requirement to collect this information is an unnecessary burden to the police departments and overly intrusive to the applicants.

"I look forward to working with the subject matter committees on this bill, Mr. Speaker. Based on my previously stated concerns, however, I have reservations with this bill and hope that work can continue to clarify these concerns. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kila rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd like to register a no vote and may I adopt the words from the previous speaker of Waimea into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Alcos rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Lamosao rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 981, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CRIMINAL HISTORY BACKGROUND CHECKS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 44 ayes to 7 noes, with Representatives Chun, Lamosao, and Matsumoto voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, Kila, Kong, Pierick, Souza, and Ward voting no.

H.B. No. 792, HD 1:

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, H.B. No. 792, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MINORS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

H.B. No. 426, HD 1:

Representative Nakamura moved that H.B. No. 426, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tarnas rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, thank you. In support and a few words. This bill will function as an exception to the federal law, Protection of Lawful Commerce in Arms Act, which was passed in 2005, which I'll refer to as PLCAA. That bill provides gun manufacturers, distributors, and gun dealers with special protections from civil liability. These protections are such that none other U.S. industry is provided. This bill will ensure that valid civil claims can be brought against the gun industry for dangerous, negligent, and unlawful actions. And so why is this important?

"The PLCAA, the federal law, has been interpreted by some courts to effectively bar victims and survivors of gun violence from holding firearms businesses liable for injuries caused by negligence, defective products, or unreasonably dangerous conduct that would otherwise be actionable under civil justice principles. The PLCAA denies justice to victims and survivors. The PLCAA perpetuates the flow of crime guns into communities of color. The PLCAA disincentivizes responsible business practices.

"Remember, this federal law, Protection of Lawful Commerce in Arms Act, provides gun manufacturers and distributors special protection from civil liability that no other U.S. industry is currently afforded. I ask members to please support this measure, as no industry should be above the law, especially not one that makes and sells lethal weapons. This bill will ensure that bad actors in the gun industry are held accountable and victims of gun violence are able to get justice through the law. I urge all members to support this measure. Thank you."

Representative Pierick rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Alcos rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Souza rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Chun rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Chun's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise with reservations regarding House Bill 426, House Draft 1, Relating to Firearms.

"The purpose of the bill is to impose liability towards firearm manufacturers and sellers to make sure that they take necessary precautions and protocols to protect the public from the improper use of these products.

"Mr. Speaker, I want to thank the chair of the Judiciary and Hawaiian Affairs Committee for working on this measure. In general, I support making sure that manufacturers and sellers share in the responsibility of making sure that their products are safe for use and that they take necessary precautions to protect the public. This measure as currently written, however, raises several concerns by having terms that are overly broad and undefined.

"Specifically, on page 4, line 17, the bill uses the word 'assaultive purposes' as a presumption that the product is abnormally dangerous. The term assaultive is not defined. Abnormally dangerous is partially defined, however, as a firearm is not abnormally dangerous based on a firearm's inherent capacity to cause injury or lethal harm. The question, then, is what type of firearm or aftermarket addition or enhancement qualifies as making the device assaultive. Firearms are generally mass-produced products and owners make customizations in the form of aftermarket products to make the device easier to use for the owner. It is unclear from the provision what types of enhancements would qualify the device as assaultive since it cannot be based on inherent capacity to cause injury or lethal harm.

"Mr. Speaker, I also have concerns over the rebuttable presumption created by page 6, lines 13-15, that allows for the presumption if the 'action or failure to act created a reasonably foreseeable risk that the harm alleged by the claimant would occur.' The concern with this standard is that foreseeable risk standard extends beyond the purchaser of the device and transfers this risk towards a potential third-party victim. It is unclear what types of actions or failures to act create risk that is not currently addressed by the current regulations regarding licensing and background checks for purchasers. If the purpose is to extend liability for violating current restrictions, then the measure should reflect violations of those provisions instead of creating a new standard.

"I look forward to working with the subject matter committees to clarify these concerns. This bill is still going through the legislative process and the final version may address these concerns. At this time, however, based on the current draft and the concerns raised, I support this measure with reservations. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lamosao rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, no vote and a brief historical note regarding what the former speaker, the chair of Judiciary noted. The COVID manufacturers, Pfizer, *et cetera*, they are exempt from being sued, so there is an exception to what you say. Also, I think if we look at the industry called Twitter and Facebook, they also cannot be sued because there's no Act 230, which holds them accountable.

"So, in a way, this is not unusual. It's kind of par for the course for those that feel like they're immune or they should be immune. But this is something where we just need to consider it a bit more seriously. And remember, it's the Supreme Court that's going to be the final arbiter of many of these gun issues that we are concerned with here today. Thank you."

Representative Aiu rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kila rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, no vote and may I register the comments from the representative from Waimea into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. In order to address the homelessness problem in the State of Hawai'i, we need to start building housing for people with mental illness, with substance abuse, people who are coming out of prison, men and women, kids who are aging out of foster care, people with intellectual developmental and physical disabilities, and our frail elderly.

"It's very difficult to build housing for people with very, extremely low incomes. And that's what this bill attempts to do by addressing people with incomes of 30% and below area median income. It's the most difficult type

of housing to be built, which is why it's very difficult for developers to even attempt to try to do this.

"So, this bill tries to get capital funds to encourage developers to build this type of housing, whether it's a group home, a two-story walk-up that can be renovated, or even within a multi-story building, setting aside a floor or scattered rooms to serve people with disabilities.

"This bill envisions a partnership with government, with nonprofit organizations and for-profit organizations that know how to develop the housing, working with our Hawai'i Public Housing Authority that provides rental assistance because incomes are so low, they need a subsidy, and with nonprofit organizations who can provide the supportive services but know nothing about how to build housing. So, this is a pilot program, and we ask for your support. Thank you."

Representative Holt rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. And I'd like to thank the majority leader and the Housing chair for their work on this issue. I have a lot of constituents who could be served by this. And in fact, yesterday, me and the Housing chair went down to a facility which possibly would be perfect for this program. So, I just want to give my thanks to the Housing chair and the majority leader for doing the work and trying something new to help our most needy. Thank you."

Representative Souza rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support, Mr. Speaker. Please enter the words of the majority leader into the record as my own. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition with a brief comment. Generally, EVs solve problems, not create problems. This is one that says we are going to have your mileage as a basis of how much we're going to tax you. This is a new reconfiguration of what was the fuel tax. Because EVs came in and the fuel tax didn't rise to the level, this is a way of solving that problem.

"The difficulty is instead of surcharging the EV, the Tesla drivers and others, this now is spread across everyone. And if you're old, if your car is old and it's driving a lot of mileage, like from the west side or further away from that, North Shore, you're going to pay more. I think this is an unintended consequence. I think the solution is very sexy, a lot of moving parts. But I don't think it's fair and I don't think it's just, and not a good policy. Thank you."

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. And I just want to point out that the vast majority of reduction in fuel tax revenues comes from more energy efficient fossil fuel powered vehicles or hybrids, and not from electric vehicles, which are still relatively small in numbers, but rapidly growing."

Representative Todd rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, I'm in support. I just wanted to point out, the bill is relatively narrowly tailored. It has an opt-in program, so zero people will have to actually opt in. It only applies to current EV owners, so it does not apply to the general population of people who have hybrids or trucks that get five miles to the gallon or fifty miles to the gallon.

"And in addition to that, we've capped the amount that they could potentially pay. So, there's literally no disincentive from enrollment. The intention of this is actually to collect data, which could potentially inform our decisions going forward on whether this should apply to a broader class of vehicles or not.

"And I also wanted to point out that rural drivers who have to commute are already punished and already pay a disproportionate amount of fuel taxes, which this would not really change that paradigm. They're already paying more as is, they're not going to be paying more as a result of this.

"In fact, if we charge on a per mile basis, the only people who would be disincentivized in the long run, if this does apply to everyone, would be EV owners and people who own very fuel-efficient vehicles, which tends to reflect people who are doing a little bit better for themselves. So, in the long run, if this does get implemented and shared across other vehicle classes, it would actually help those who have less fuel-efficient vehicles, which has been one of the most common criticisms. So, it is a little bit ironic that we've somehow mangled that into the opposite argument, but it does not apply whatsoever. Thank you."

Representative Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. The fuel gauge on the highway special fund is on low. The Highway Division came to the Legislature three times within the last decade for increases in funding for the highways. They didn't get anything all three times. As a result of that, the Highway Division set aside construction projects that would increase the capacity of many of our roads.

They concentrated on safety programs and other smaller projects. The Highway Division needs some help. This is just one plank of many options that could and should be considered to replenish the highway fund. Thank you."

Representative Kila rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Strong support. May I register the words of the Transportation chair into the Journal as if they were my own and may I add a brief comment. In commuting over 20,000 miles last year alone I paid \$357 on gas tax. So, in the hopes that this program would succeed in replacing the gas tax, removing that from our Hawai'i households, putting a cap on low-income families and folks who are commuting from rural communities, this will put more money into the pockets of Hawai'i families and the folks in District 44. So, *mahalo*," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, second time. I just have a basic conceptual problem of treating my car and the people of Hawai'i's car like it's a rental car in how many miles you drive, we're going to charge you. I think the concept is misplaced. Thank you."

Representative Gates rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support, may I adopt the words of the Transportation chair as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Marten rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. As an electric car driver, I can't wait to start this program. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1110, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ROAD USAGE CHARGE PROGRAM," passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Garcia and Ward voting no, and with Representatives Alcos and Matayoshi being excused.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 10:17 a.m.

Representative Nakashima, for the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1041) recommending that H.B. No. 192, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 192, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ENERGY EFFICIENCY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Nakashima, for the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1047) recommending that H.B. No. 1340, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1340, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Opposition. The testifier on behalf of the State Health Department mentioned that the private sector could sufficiently provide this service to the State of Hawai'i. My recommendation is that we don't need to be expanding the government and using more tax dollars."

Representative Tam rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. The purpose of this bill is to authorize the Department of Health to establish temporary advisory councils to a breakthrough therapy, to establish those rules and regulations for such therapy if they are to be administered within the state. So basically, the state will use their own existing resources to administer and establish this council.

"So, with respect to the representative from Royal Kunia, if we were to take his suggestion, it would mean that the state would shovel out taxpayer dollars to procure a private business to establish those rules and regulations, which does not make sense. The Health Department can establish these councils of qualified experts on their own, saving taxpayer dollars in the process, which this bill seeks to allow them to do. I urge all members to support this measure."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1340, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MENTAL HEALTH," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Pierick voting no.

Representative Nakashima, for the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1050) recommending that H.B. No. 378, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 378, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Nakashima, for the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1051) recommending that H.B. No. 187, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 187, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No, please. This bill would be increasing the cost of construction, and my understanding is that we are in an economic crisis. So, my encouragement is that we vote no on bills that will hurt the economy."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Garcia rose in opposition to the measure and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Garcia's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise today in opposition to HB 187, which seeks to establish labor requirements for the construction of renewable energy projects. While I support the development of renewable energy projects in Hawai'i, I believe that this bill will have negative consequences for our state's economy and housing market. By imposing additional labor requirements on renewable energy projects, this bill will increase the cost of construction and make it more difficult for developers to build affordable housing in Hawai'i. This is a serious concern, as our state is already facing a housing crisis, with many families struggling to find affordable homes.

"Furthermore, this bill could discourage investment in renewable energy projects in Hawai'i, as developers may choose to invest in other states with less restrictive labor requirements. This could have a negative impact on our state's economy and job market. In conclusion, while I support the goal of promoting renewable energy in Hawai'i, I believe that HB 187 is not the right approach. Instead, we should focus on policies that encourage the development of affordable housing and promote economic growth in our state.

"Therefore, I urge my colleagues to vote against this bill. *Mahalo.*"

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 187, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RENEWABLE ENERGY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 3 noes, with Representative Matsumoto voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Garcia, Pierick, and Ward voting no.

Representative Tarnas, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1060) recommending that H.B. No. 975, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 975, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Pierick voting no.

Representative Tarnas, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1062) recommending that H.B. No. 1241, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1241, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No, please. So, this bill would violate the Fourth Amendment, which reads, 'The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.'

"So, I know land surveyors, that's not their intent to do any of these things. But the idea of trespassing and the right to allow who can and cannot go on your property should be the resident's protected right."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1241, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RIGHT OF ENTRY FOR PROFESSIONAL SURVEYORS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Amato and Pierick voting no.

Representative Tarnas, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1065) recommending that H.B. No. 1201, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1201, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NOISE POLLUTION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Pierick voting no.

Representative Tarnas, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1066) recommending that H.B. No. 1398, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1398, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COLLECTIVE BARGAINING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Tarnas, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1067) recommending that H.B. No. 692, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 692, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PESTICIDES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Garcia and Hashimoto voting no.

Representative Tarnas, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1071) recommending that H.B. No. 823, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 823, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Souza rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, request for a ruling on a potential conflict. My cousin is the chair of the Hawai'i Correctional System Oversight Commission. And this bill deals with correctional system oversight. And the commission also submitted testimony in support of this measure."

The Chair addressed Representative Souza, stating:

"Representative, the Chair's ruling is that there is no conflict because this legislation deals with a class of individuals. So, the ruling is no conflict through *sine die* unless circumstances change."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 823, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DEATHS WITHIN THE CORRECTIONAL SYSTEM," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Tarnas, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1073) recommending that H.B. No. 70, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 70, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Kapela voting no.

Representative Tarnas, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1076) recommending that H.B. No. 1091, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1091, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Souza rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations. I am in full support of the intent of this measure. However, I take issue with the requirement in subsection (b)(1), mandating that the seller disclose all permitted and unpermitted erosion control structures, specifically on state land seaward and adjacent to the parcel. Sellers should not have to be required to disclose information regarding property that they do not own, even though these erosion structures may be known to them. The assumption that this bill makes is that the seller perhaps built the erosion control structure that is on state land adjacent to their parcel, which is not always the case.

"I understand the sentiment of this requirement. However, technically this could be problematic when a seller for any reason is simply not aware of these structures that are not specifically on their property, which could open them up to liability for lack of disclosure. The seller should already be disclosing information regarding erosion control structures that are on their land, and buyers should be doing their due diligence in this regard as well. Thank you."

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in full support. I think it's a reasonable assumption that the owner of a property would be aware of erosion control measures that are property adjacent, and I think it is a reasonable requirement that they be required to disclose those structures."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1091, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO REAL PROPERTY DISCLOSURES WITHIN SHORELINE AREAS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Souza voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Pierick voting no.

Representative Tarnas, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1077) recommending that H.B. No. 1159, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1159, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to this measure with a brief comment. Mr. Speaker, contrary to the name of this bill, which says relating to climate change, this is not a climate change bill. This is another way of nullifying the idea of Kaka'ako Makai and OHA building its high rise in order to get the money that it was owed from the ceded lands.

"It's a way of saying that we're going to hide behind the ghost of sea level rise and say, by the way, according to this bill, we can resite buildings that don't fit our climate change, sea level rise dimensions. It's something that we should not be behind because there's enough issues with OHA right now that we don't have to steal another way of getting their development rights put on the back burner. Thank you."

At 10:23 a.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 10:24 a.m.

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Why is Waikiki not listed in the bill and only Kaka'ako, which Kaka'ako Makai happens to be OHA, happens to have land that is now at the \$200 million mark devalued down to \$100 million. And this says, hey, by the way, this bill can tell you where you can and cannot build. Mr. Speaker, that's not fair."

The Chair addressed Representative Ward, stating:

"Representative Ward, please confine your remarks to the bill that is before us, the measure before us."

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"That is purposely confusing to me, what you just said. Having said that, Mr. Speaker, if we're going to say if you are on the ocean front, let's just not say Kaka'ako Makai oceanfront, let's say you guys in Waikiki, you better watch out. We're not going to allow you to build."

At 10:25 a.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 10:26 a.m.

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I have one more comment, and that is this bill has an immediately effective upon its approval. So, there's no debate. If the House does it and the Senate does it, this baby is gone. So that's a very important thing that we should know. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1159, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CLIMATE CHANGE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, Matsumoto, Pierick, and Ward voting no.

Representative Tarnas, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1078) recommending that H.B. No. 995, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 995, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO IMPORTANT AGRICULTURAL LANDS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Tarnas, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1079) recommending that H.B. No. 167, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 167, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Alcos rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Conflict of interest. I'm a contractor."

The Chair addressed Representative Alcos, stating:

"The Chair's ruling is that there is no conflict because this legislation applies to a class of individuals, all contractors, so there is no conflict. This ruling remains in effect through *sine die* unless circumstances change."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Garcia rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that his written remarks be inserted in the Journal, and the Chair "so ordered." [Note: Representative Garcia later changed his vote to a no vote.]

Representative Garcia's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise today in opposition to HB 167, which seeks to make general contractors liable for the debts incurred by subcontractors for wages due to claimants. While I understand the intention of this bill to protect workers and ensure they receive the wages they are owed, I believe that it will have negative consequences for our state's construction industry and economy.

"By making general contractors liable for the debts of subcontractors, this bill will increase the cost of construction and make it more difficult for developers to build affordable housing and other private works in Hawai'i. This is a serious concern, as our state is already facing a housing crisis, with many families struggling to find affordable homes.

"In conclusion, while I support the goal of protecting workers and ensuring they receive the wages they are owed, I believe that HB 167 is not the right approach. Instead, we should focus on policies that promote fair labor practices and protect workers' rights, while also supporting our state's construction industry and economy. Therefore, I urge my colleagues to vote against this bill. *Mahalo.*"

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 167, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WAGES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 3 noes, with Representative Matsumoto voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Garcia, Pierick, and Ward voting no.

Representative Tarnas, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1080) recommending that H.B. No. 448, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 448, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No, please. It's a good idea to have children giving their input when they're requesting a restraining order on another adolescent. But I think the parents' consent would be wise in requiring a restraining order."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 448, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MINORS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 3 noes, with Representative Matsumoto voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Garcia, Pierick, and Ward voting no.

Representative Tarnas, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1083) recommending that H.B. No. 650, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 650, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No, please. So, it says in the Declaration of Independence that we are to protect life. Euthanasia is an attack on life. It's in violation of the Declaration of Independence. If we look at the Hippocratic Oath, it says that we should do no harm. To do harm is to, at times, end life. And so, I believe that the euthanasia bill is in opposition of the Hippocratic Oath.

"Also, it says in Ecclesiastes, Chapter Three, that there is a time to be born and a time to die. This is God explaining his sovereignty to his people. It also says in the Book of Job, that Job was suffering, and he asked God to kill him. Like, Lord, just kill my life, it's too hard down here. And God's reply to him was that it's my job to determine the end of man. For these reasons, I vote no against the euthanasia bill."

Representative Souza rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support, Mr. Speaker. Just a point of clarification that this bill is not about euthanasia. That's a different term and a different meaning. Although this bill presents a subject that is not easy to discuss, the bottom line is that medical aid in dying is already allowed in respect to physicians. Therefore, expanding this practice to APRNs, amending the mandatory waiting period, and providing an expedited pathway for terminally ill qualified patients to bolster the sentiment of the original act so it can achieve its full potential and implementation is all that this measure purports to do. The law, as it is, presents roadblocks for some patients, and this bill will rectify these issues. Thank you."

At 10:31 a.m., Representative Matsumoto requested a recess and the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 10:32 a.m.

At this time, Representative Pierick offered Floor Amendment No. 1, amending H.B. No. 650, HD 2 as follows:

SECTION 1. House Bill No. 650, HD2, is amended by amending section 3, page 5, to insert an age requirement of 120 years read as follows:

"~~[A~~n~~]~~ Except as otherwise provided in section 327L-11(c), an adult who is capable, is a resident of the State, is age 120 or older, and has been determined by an attending provider and a consulting provider to be suffering from a terminal disease, and who has voluntarily expressed the adult's wish to die, may, pursuant to section 327L-9, submit:"

Representative Pierick moved that Floor Amendment No. 1 be adopted, seconded by Representative Ward.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in support of the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"I'm in support of the amendment. I'm in opposition to euthanasia. I believe that if we were to increase the euthanasia age to 120, it would effectively disqualify this law from the state."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in opposition to the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition to the floor amendment. As noted by the speaker previously, this is intended to undermine the entire medical

aid in dying chapter. In addition, this amendment also undercuts the safeguards, the safeguards that were put into the medical aid in dying to ensure that this process is done with care and integrity and with dignity. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion that Floor Amendment No. 1, amending H.B. No. 650, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," be adopted, was put to vote by the Chair and upon a voice vote, failed to carry.

(Main Motion)

Representative Lamosao rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ganaden rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Souza be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Aiu rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Martinez rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. Mr. Speaker, thank you. As noted before, this is a measure that updates, after five years of the medical aid in dying chapter operating, some reasonable amendments that ensure access to a process that is highly regulated and safeguarded. We are increasing the providers to be able to allow APRNs to participate in the assessment, as well as reducing the mandatory waiting period at the discretion of the health care provider who is responsible for working with the patient on the Our Care Our Choice Act. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Chun rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 650, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," passed Third Reading by a vote of 43 ayes to 8 noes, with Representatives Aiu, Chun, Lamosao, and Martinez voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, Kila, Kitagawa, Kong, Matsumoto, Pierick, and Ward voting no.

Representative Tarnas, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1089) recommending that H.B. No. 470, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 470, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MINORS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Tarnas, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1090) recommending that H.B. No. 350, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 350, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Mizuno rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I stand in support. I'm going to explain the reasons I support this bill, along with addressing some of the questions that were voiced on this bill during second reading. Please note that I have complete respect for all colleagues and the focus is on the policy of this bill, not any member.

"The purpose of House Bill 350, House Draft 2, is to require clergy to report child abuse, even when the information is received in a penitential communication. What is a penitential communication? It means a communication, including a sacramental confession, that is intended to be kept confidential and is made to a member of the clergy.

"I wanted to thank my good friend, the representative from Hawai'i Kai, who brought up a number of questions about this bill, and I'm going to do my best to address them.

"In hearing this important piece of legislation, your Committee on Human Services, as well as your Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, made the appropriate amendments to provide, penitential communications shall remain confidential except when the clergy member believes that there exists a substantial risk that child abuse or neglect is occurring and it is especially heinous, atrocious, cruel, manifesting exceptional depravity, and this may occur in the reasonable, foreseeable future. I've just identified the elements of the bill and a timeframe of the bill. So, I thank my colleague from Hawai'i Kai for pressing for those answers.

"Mr. Speaker, as a person of faith, I stand candidly that I've been around some outstanding pastors. And a measure of this magnitude will definitely help to bring trust and faith back toward members of the clergy and our churches. But most importantly, this bill will protect our *keiki*. Licensed and registered professionals, teachers and employees of any public or private school, physicians, psychologists, nurses, pharmacists, healthcare workers, law enforcement, childcare providers, coaches of any public or private agency providing recreational or sports activities are all mandated to report any child abuse or suspected child abuse. So why are the members of the clergy exempt?

"Today, the House of Representatives will have the opportunity to change the clergy exemption to save our *keiki* from sexual assault and abuse. For those reasons, I support the passage of this bill. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Souza rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. Even though I am in strong support of this measure, I believe this bill does not go far enough in addressing reporting by the clergy. I understand the sanctity of penitential communications. However, protecting our children should supersede this practice and no exception should exist.

"This bill requires that the clergy need only report child abuse or neglect that may occur in the reasonably foreseeable future if it is especially heinous, atrocious, or cruel, manifesting exceptional depravity, which means a conscienceless or pitiless crime which is unnecessarily torturous to a victim, which can be found in HRS 706-657. However, meeting this threshold may be problematic and discretionary. Our duty is to protect our *keiki* at all costs, and this bill, as it is written, is the first step in doing so. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 350, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHILD ABUSE REPORTING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Garcia voting no.

Representative Tarnas, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1091) recommending that H.B. No. 1319, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1319, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE TRAFFIC CODE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Garcia, Matsumoto, and Ward voting no.

Representative Tarnas, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1092) recommending that H.B. No. 1154, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1154, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GUARDIANSHIP," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Hussey-Burdick and Kapela voting no.

Representative Tarnas, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1093) recommending that H.B. No. 1336, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1336, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

At this time, Representative Ward offered Floor Amendment No. 2, amending H.B. No. 1336, HD 2 as follows:

SECTION 1. House Bill No. 1336, HD2, is amended as follows:

1. Inserting a new section on after section 11 on page 22 to amend HRS §804.9.5 relating to unsecured bail; and
2. Amending the section numbers after the new insertion of section 12 to proceed accordingly.

Representative Ward moved that Floor Amendment No. 2 be adopted, seconded by Representative Pierick.

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of the amendment. A very simple amendment. Mr. Speaker, in the context that we've been talking about, no cash bail, this amendment is simply one word that is in already an existing statute. It says that the Judiciary shall allow the indigent, the poor, those who don't have the money to make bail, and they have to go to jail. It says they sign a promissory note that is an IOU, and that's all the amendment is about.

"It's something where we've had cash bail. We had the governor doing a bill that everybody loved, and then he vetoed it. The mayor got involved. And there's a plethora of no cash bail going on in the mainland. This simply came up in 2019. I want to thank Kat Brady publicly for bringing it to my attention. It's already on the books. It says, if you don't have the money, just sign your name. If you show up in court, they rip it up and it's finished.

"Mr. Speaker, this is a very simple amendment. It's a no brainer. It says instead of may, and I don't know why the Judiciary hasn't utilized it, why the judges are ignoring it, and maybe they don't know about it. But I hope that this will bring it to their attention and to know that that is already on the books, and this is a bill that it's inserted to bring to their attention. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I hope we have no cash bail *vis-à-vis* this IOU promissory note."

Representative Tarnas rose to speak in opposition to the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"In opposition to this floor amendment. Thank you very much. This floor amendment is requiring the court, saying the court shall order the defendant released upon an execution of an unsecured financial bond for all or part of the bail amount by the defendant. The whole effort of this bill, the underlying bill itself, is to be permissive, to give more discretion to the court. And I will speak to more of the details on the bill when we come to the main motion.

"But this floor amendment actually runs counter to what the purposes of the bill itself, because it is tying the hands of the judges and compelling them to use this one particular means. So, I urge the members to vote against this floor amendment. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in favor of the amendment. I find it rather strange that if you're a judge and you say you've got to go to jail or sign this promissory note, that that's being unkind or giving a lack of options to those who are indigent. Mr. Speaker, you know we have over 50% of our families are ALICE families. They don't have enough money to survive. And those who go to jail are generally those who don't have the money.

"This is a no brainer to say it's not going to cost us anything. But if you show up to court, this is simply a disciplinary matter. And the judges are basically psychologists, so to speak, in terms of what best to do to turn the person around. So, to say it's unkind for the judge to give an opportunity to sign a promissory note versus, hey, you're going to go to jail because you don't have any money, that doesn't make sense, Mr. Speaker. For those reasons, this is a very simple thing that we need to get on the books and ask, with shall, that the judges will do this for the sake of the poor in the State of Hawai'i. Thank you."

The motion that Floor Amendment No. 2, amending H.B. No. 1336, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CRIMINAL JUSTICE REFORM," be adopted, was put to vote by the Chair and upon a voice vote, failed to carry.

(Main Motion)

Representative Tarnas rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, in support. The main goal of this bill, and I want to thank the introducer, the representative from Kalihi, for his hard work on this. We're adopting the best practices from throughout the country on how to improve our pretrial detention practices within the State of Hawai'i.

"The representative from Kalihi attended a series of presentations and workshops, run by the National Conference of State Legislatures, in order to learn about best practices from across the country. This bill is the product of that work.

"And I recognize some members might feel uncomfortable with some of the things that we're talking about here and the recommendations. But this is a big paradigm shift. So, I can understand their discomfort and I think whatever reservations they have about this bill, that's okay. I think it will improve the bill as it goes forward.

"The main goal of this bill is to reduce the number of unnecessary arrests made in criminal cases to reduce the overcrowding of our correctional facilities. And it's done by authorizing a 48-hour grace period after a missed initial court appearance. This is to standardize the current practice of continuances that many judges already grant. This will also be done in conjunction with another bill that we have, which authorizes the Judiciary to send text messages and emails to remind people that they should show up at court.

"The other thing this bill does, it authorizes officers to issue citations in lieu of making certain arrests. This bill deals only with misdemeanors, Mr. Speaker. So that means only nonviolent crimes are eligible for the provisions in this bill. Most of the provisions pertain to pretrial detainees and not those who have been adjudicated. The provisions relating to drug testing do apply to parolees, but often they have been adjudicated for a different crime and then rearrested for a failed drug test. So, this bill helps to keep them out of jail as well.

"This bill also makes meaningful reforms to the determination of eligibility for pretrial release and promote greater fairness and equity in the criminal courts by doing a number of things. Let me just mention and highlight a few. It requires that copies of the bail report be provided to the parties, including the defendant's counsel, no later than the commencement of the bail hearing. It requires that bail be set in an amount affordable to the defendant under certain circumstances. It prohibits the denial of pretrial release based solely upon certain factors, such as the defendant's first positive test for drug use. It requires automatic issuance of no contact orders in assaultive cases. It prohibits a defendant from being arrested for a violation of conditions of release solely because the defendant had one positive drug test. It requires the prosecution, with respect to sanctions for violations of conditions of release, to prove by a preponderance of the evidence, based on certain specified criteria, that the defendant intentionally or knowingly violated reasonable conditions of release. And the last one I want to highlight is that a law enforcement officer issuing a citation in lieu of arrest must find and be reasonably satisfied that the person poses no significant danger to a specific or reasonably identifiable person or persons.

"This bill does a number of different things. I will leave it to the introducer to expound upon this further. But I urge all members to support this very important bill in adapting pretrial best practices to the State of Hawai'i. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. It's become the fashion this year to mention religion. So, I'll just share something that was told to me when I was a kid. I was told to act as if you had faith, and faith will be given to you. So, I'm acting. And as an act of that faith, I suppose in democracy, this bill is the work of many hands, in coordination with the chairs of Corrections, Military, & Veterans Affairs and Judiciary, through a state-sponsored bipartisan fellowship with the National Coalition of State Legislatures, the

MacArthur Foundation, utilizing best practices from other states, and most importantly, existing court procedures that have been in effect in Hawai'i for decades.

"What is presented is not new. The Legislature ordinarily abhors an omnibus. I understand why. But that is what is necessary here. Mr. Speaker, the right to be free pending a trial on the merits of a criminal case is enshrined in our federal and state constitutions. For the last several decades, we have used pretrial incarceration in Hawai'i as a means to prevent future crime and to punish defendants.

"The first reason, preventative detention, that's valid. But punishment without a trial is a violation of human rights, as we have argued internationally. The federal courts have essentially abolished bail, instead holding defendants only if they are a danger to themselves or others or are a flight risk.

"The intent of this bill is to decrease crime through proven methods. Section two of this bill allows, but does not force, a judge to offer a defendant a continuance for 48 hours to appear for a pretrial hearing. Regular working people with nonviolent charges have issues with lack of reliable transportation, the inability to find childcare, or simply losing track of dates. They miss court appearances often.

"The courts, without our help, have expanded hearings significantly during COVID to utilize Zoom and other technologies. I would like myself, Mr. Speaker, and many others to think of how we were reminded when to go to the dentist, or pay your phone bill, or file your ethics forms. For nonviolent petty misdemeanors and misdemeanors, court dates are important. However, allowing an individual to essentially reschedule without being incarcerated is an important and often used option. This practice is not codified. Judges are not rubber stamps. This legislation allows courts to refer to the code to give guidance.

"Mr. Speaker, section four allows, but does not force, county police officers to have discretion in giving citations, essentially tickets with an order to appear instead of arrests for nonviolent petty misdemeanors and misdemeanors. The Honolulu Police Department has come out in support of this, as an arrest for a minor nonviolent charge entangles an officer for hours, ratchets up the danger of an interaction, and means an officer is unable to assist in other more serious offenses that arise during a shift. This has become the practice, at least here on O'ahu, but without guidance from the Legislature.

"It is important to note that arrests for minor crimes do not lead to a lower crime rate. Sweeping arrests and arrest-heavy policies do not solve issues related to mental health or homelessness. Citations have been studied internationally and nationally. They save time, increase law enforcement efficiency, enhance community police relations by reducing the ill will that results from unnecessary arrests. And importantly, Mr. Speaker, reduces taxpayer jail costs and overcrowding.

"Section eight amends the Hawai'i Revised Statutes to align with the modern use of the terms of bail. A task force convening prosecutors, defenders, the courts, the Office of the Attorney General, and numerous others, including the vice chair of Judiciary, suggested simple amendments to the code five years ago. These amendments protect victims by codifying the practice of issuing automatic stay away orders in cases involving alleged physical or sexual assault. It also codifies the practice in drug court, veterans court, in women's court, in which one positive drug test does not automatically trigger an arrest.

"Section 13 allows the discretion, not yet codified, to order a defendant to undertake a substance abuse assessment. Mr. Speaker, we collectively now know much more about the way addiction and mental health operate than we did 50 years ago at the onset of the war on drugs. There are several other measures that our body, the federal government, and the counties have adopted that advance drug treatment facilities, triage centers, and housing for those who are recovering from addiction."

Representative Mizuno rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ganaden continued, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the law needs to catch up. Pretrial incarceration and monitoring for continued drug use is still an option for courts. This just honors what we now know about addiction in the 21st century.

"Mr. Speaker, I think that we should remember the Legislature of 1993 and '94 in which inaction led to a federal court case and federal oversight of the Department of Public Safety and contracts with private prisons to reduce overcrowding that we still have.

"Mr. Speaker, I think we should also remember our collective experience from just last summer in which years of inaction at the Legislature led to a Supreme Court case which caused near disarray in the way defendants are charged with serious crimes and a request by all county prosecutors to call a special session. To the extent possible, Mr. Speaker, these sorts of situations can and should be avoided with best practices."

Representative Alcos rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I'm in opposition on this. Safety should be the most important thing for our families, for our community, even for our state. And the reason why these bills are coming out is because it's overcrowded on jail. We don't want to hold prisoners or convict low crime. But this is danger to our society. It's increasing more crime on our street. So, we need to protect our families. And I'm opposed on this bill. Thank you."

Representative Holt rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. Mr. Speaker, this bill authorizes a grace period of 48 hours after an initial missed court appearance. And as I had mentioned in the Judiciary hearing, I believe that part of my job is to be a good example for our community, especially our *keiki*. And what kind of example are we sending to them if we're telling them that court is not important and you can show up 48 hours later.

"The public defender's testimony in support refers to making an honest mistake or a family emergency. However, the bill does not mention any of this, it just gives a blanket 48-hour exemption for anybody. Proponents say that this is best practices from rural states around the country. I believe those states may be red states in the middle of America. So, I don't know how relevant those lessons we learn from those rural states are valid here.

"Also, our rural courts are on the neighbor islands. And in the testimony, we've learned that they only operate once or twice a week. And when I had asked them how they would practically administer this measure, nobody had any answers.

"Also, just to note that the Judiciary who would have to administer these new changes is in strong opposition. In fact, from their testimony, 'The Judiciary strongly opposes this section of the bill as untenable and disruptive to daily court operations. This proposed legislation disregards the function of the court and disrupts the orderly judicial process, and detracts from the serious nature of court proceedings. The court is an institution based on rules and procedures. For every hearing, the court provides notice to the litigants and counsel based on established rules. Court calendars exist for a reason. Hearings are intentionally scheduled in advance to provide the judge and staff time to adequately prepare,' which, by the way, this measure makes police officers be judges on the spot without having time to adequately prepare.

"Such a scheduling system is vital to maintaining an organized and thoughtful judicial process. Permitting defendants to suddenly appear for their court hearings without notice to the court and parties disrupts this system. This bill forces courts to accommodate walk-ins and requires prosecutors and defense counsel to be on standby at every courthouse. There are insufficient resources for such accommodations."

"The testimony alludes to what I'm saying, Mr. Speaker. Should we let kids go to school whenever they feel like it or take the test whenever, 48 hours after it's initially scheduled?

"There's another section which creates a rebuttable presumption, and I'm not a lawyer, so I had to take the word of the Hawai'i County prosecutor's office and all the other prosecuting offices which were in opposition. And they say, 'creates a "rebuttable presumption" that a defendant is entitled to

release on recognizance or supervised release.' So, on the spot, the police officer already is leaning towards releasing the person. 'The burden is then placed upon the prosecution to establish by clear and convincing evidence that release would be inappropriate based upon certain criteria... Presumption of release mandates like these further decrease the public's trust and confidence in our criminal justice system.'

"Mr. Speaker, speaking of remembering what happened last summer, we did pass a measure similar to this, which did subsequently get vetoed by the governor, and I took lots of flack in my community for it. I was asked many times. In fact, when this bill was brought up in front of our neighborhood board a few weeks ago, it was faced with heavy opposition. Only opposition.

"And I'll just end with the prosecuting attorney of the City and County of Honolulu, because my community is looking for increased safety, Mr. Speaker, not to be letting more people out on the streets after they commit these offenses. And the City and County of Honolulu states that, 'we urge the committee to maintain the current safeguards that are used to assess a pretrial detainee, and allow our courts to continue to consider each defendant's circumstances and background on a case-by-case basis. Not only does this provide the best opportunity for the court to consider each person's potential for dangerousness, obstruction of justice, witness tampering and other illegal activity, it also provides the best opportunity for courts to determine if and how to safely release an individual back into the community.'"

Representative Gates rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Holt continued, stating:

"So, Mr. Speaker, I understand we have a jail overpopulation problem, but our community is looking to me for more safeguards, not to relax the safeguards. And if we need more space in jails, then maybe we should build a new one. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. I'd like to have the words from the representative from Kalihi adopted as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Pierick continued, stating:

"I'd also like to point out to the body a few examples of misdemeanors. So, these are things that if occurred or if experienced by a citizen of Hawai'i, they wouldn't have to go to jail now. That is, disorderly conduct, simple assault, harassment, trespassing, theft. Have these things become irrelevant? Driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs, reckless driving, possession of marijuana, resisting arrest. So, if we resist arrest, now we can't get arrested? Violation of a restraining order. Indecent exposure. Have clothes become irrelevant? Vandalism or criminal property damage, prostitution or solicitation of prostitution.

"I think the person or the group that has the most *akamai* in this conversation is the police. Let's see what the police have to say on this issue. 'Our officers are on the front lines battling crime 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year. We know who the habitual criminals and repeat offenders are who we arrest repeatedly, just to see them set free without any consequences. The rate of certain types of criminal activity, including violent crimes, have jumped over the last several years. The homicide rate is more than double the rate from 2021 and going back to 2017. Robberies and auto thefts have also leaped to their highest levels in over five years. Passing over the needs of victims of these crimes in our community, this bill arbitrarily emphasizes the need to address life disruption and bias experienced by those arrested and positions bail reform as the way to address it and solve prison overcrowding. But we ask at what cost? Our community cannot afford the consequences of this bill.'

"I think if the police say this is a bad idea, and this is a bill to address what the police are doing, we must listen to them. Thank you."

Representative Perruso rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Tarnas be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in opposition. In a summary statement, I would say this is part of the series of get out of jail free that has been sweeping the mainland. And I think some people in this body feel like that's the best way to do it in order to save money, not save safety, but to save money.

"Lastly, I would say, may I have the remarks of the representative from Downtown as my own, except take away the red states and say the blue states where most of these get out of jail free things are occurring. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. We should be reminded that approximately 40% of the people who are in jail have violated supervision or awaiting trial. These pretrial people number over 1,000 year after year after year. They are not convicted. They haven't even gone to court. But they are in jail at the cost of what is equivalent to an Ivy League tuition and room and board. So, I urge support for this item. Thank you."

Representative Garcia rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. A lot was mentioned, and I agree with them, for those who are against the bill, so I'll save my comments. But the term was mentioned, best practices. This isn't best practices. This is bad practices. And it mentions that this is only focusing on misdemeanors, nonviolent offenses. Promoting pornography for minors, possession of a child-like sex doll, criminal trespassing, negligent homicide. I'm sorry, but this is a soft on crime bill. And the people of Hawai'i have spoken loud and clear this last election that they just don't feel safe. And so, we pass bills like this, and last year no bill, making our streets more and more unsafe. So, no vote, thank you."

Representative Matsumoto rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition and a brief comment. I have surveyed my district for the last 10 years. And every year we ask, what is the biggest issue facing our community, what is the biggest issue facing our state? For the first eight years, crime was not even in the top five. Last year, crime was number one, and this year crime was number two. This is a huge concern for our districts and for our communities. And I think it's something that we really need to look into further as we move forward if this bill is going to pass today. Thank you."

Representative Kila rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition, Mr. Speaker. I appreciate the comments given from our Judiciary chair and the representative from Kalihi, and I hope and envision that maybe one day we can move towards this system. But at this time, when the residents are asking for us to come a little bit harder on the issues we are facing, this is the reason for my opposition. *Mahalo*."

Representative Takayama rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. We've all heard in this chamber and in our communities the fact that our correctional facilities are overfilled beyond capacity. We also have all heard the concerns from our neighbors about crime in our communities.

"This measure addresses both issues by ensuring that those who are in jail and who are in prison are those who are awaiting trial for the most serious crimes. The repeat offenders, those who have used or threatened violence against our fellow citizens. Those are the ones who should be and would have space for in our in our jail while they await trial. And this bill does so by ensuring that those who are unable to afford bail, simply for the reasons of poverty, are not the ones who are sitting in jail awaiting trial. For those reasons, I asked my colleagues to support this measure."

Representative Aiu rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition, permission to enter the comments from the representative from Palama into the Journal as if they were my own, with the exception that I am an attorney and I do understand what a rebuttable presumption is. Thank you, Mr. Speaker," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. I would just like to adopt the words of the chair and the vice chair from Judiciary into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Todd rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, in support. I share many of the concerns and I'm hopeful that as this progresses through the legislative session, that specifically some of the violence-adjacent crimes are addressed and maybe carved out. But as a model, I think it's generally a good idea to relieve some of that burden.

"And I think it's also worth noting that there's a lot of evidence that just even a brief stint of incarceration, much less prolonged, can actually make someone more likely to re-offend in the future. So, there may be the opportunity where this could actually potentially reduce crime in the long run, provided that we make some of those carve outs down the road prior to passage. I think I would be generally supportive.

"And I think it's also worth considering that, generally speaking, crime is declining nationwide and has been for the last 30-plus years, pretty much the entire length of my very, sometimes it feels young life, maybe not today. So, while we're categorizing crime trends, it's valuable to keep in mind that the recent uptick may have more to do with the COVID pandemic, because we've seen this uptick everywhere and we're starting to begin to see a subsequent decline. So, just worth considering while we're making these decisions that, generally speaking, crime has been declining, even though attention on crime has been increasing. And I think it's worth collecting data over the next few years to see if our crime rates continue to fall back to prior trends or if the trend we're seeing over the last two to three years is something indicative of a larger social and societal shift. Thank you."

Representative Souza rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. Can you please enter the words of the representative from Moanalua into the record as my own with the same caveat. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Matayoshi rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. I think we did not learn the lessons of last year when this bill came up. Specifically, the exclusive nature of these. There are certain misdemeanors that I think should probably be excluded because they are more violent adjacent to it. That came up very, very late in testimony after the bill passed this body and went to the governor, but I do think that they had a point.

"Instead of using exclusive language, though, I think we need to be using inclusive language and specifically identify what crimes should fall under this bill and thereby excluding all others, not creating certain exemptions that are up for debate or interpretation.

"The other portion of this bill that I have concerns about is the language being inserted to require that in order to deny bail, that now a significant danger must be shown and danger to a specific person or persons. That, I think, is too restrictive. And if someone is showing themselves to be a danger to someone, not just a specific person, then bail also should be considered to be denied. Thank you."

Representative Hashimoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Chun rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1336, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CRIMINAL JUSTICE REFORM," passed Third Reading by a vote of 32 ayes to 19 noes, with Representatives Chun and Hashimoto voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Aiu, Alcos, Garcia, Gates, Holt, Kahaloa, Kila, Kitagawa, Lamosao, Lowen, Matayoshi, Matsumoto, Nishimoto, Pierick, Quinlan, Sayama, Souza, Tam, and Ward voting no.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:28 a.m.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1094) recommending that H.B. No. 848, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 848, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII INSTITUTE FOR MARINE BIOLOGY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Pierick voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1095) recommending that H.B. No. 1408, HD 2, as amended in HD 3, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1408, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DIGITAL EQUITY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Pierick voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1096) recommending that H.B. No. 485, HD 2, as amended in HD 3, pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 485, HD 3 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Garcia rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. I just want to reiterate that legal documents ought to report accurate information, and allowing someone to change their gender to a preferred one is not accurate information."

Representative Tam rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Marriage certificates are important legal documents necessary for a number of different affairs, both legal and financial. These certificates are needed for sharing health and other insurance benefits, applying for a loan or mortgage, filing taxes, arranging property succession or retirement benefits to a spouse, giving tax free gifts to a spouse, custody changes, international travel, amongst many others.

"There are other avenues in Hawai'i that allow for an individual to change their names and gender on their driver's licenses, birth certificates, and other legal documents. But as of now, there is no way to update a marriage

certificate to reflect someone's preferred name or gender identity. This could cause legal and clerical issues if these documents do not match up.

"The only way for an individual to change and correct their gender or sex identifier on a marriage certificate is by legally filing for divorce and remarrying for a new certificate. This is costly, emotionally distressing, and will unnecessarily raise Hawai'i's divorce rates.

"Marriage is sacred and an expression of an individual's love for and commitment to one another. It is disheartening that couples who have made it through the often difficult journey of a transition aren't allowed to have their truth reflected on their marriage certificates. People should have the opportunity to have this important document reflected of their true current selves. People should not have to be misgendered or deadnamed on a legal and highly personal and sentimental document. The advocates for this bill are asking for dignity and respect, and the Legislature should pass this bill granting that. Thank you."

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. Gender is binary. I'm going to get graphic. Males have a penis and women have a vagina. If somebody undergoes sex change surgery, if they're buried and they're excavated, their bones stay the same surgery. God said in Genesis 1 that he made mankind in his image, male and female he created them. There's only two genders. And if we're trying to share with people that you can change your gender, we are deceiving them."

Representative Perruso rose to a point of order, stating:

"Point of order. The previous speaker is conflating sex and gender and I would like the record to reflect that."

Representative Pierick rose to respond, stating:

"In opposition. I can give the same speech again if everyone would like, but just use the word 'sex.' They're the same thing."

Representative Alcos rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I oppose this bill. Again, that my community that I represent in our area mostly believe that there should be only two genders, male or female. And I don't feel that in a marriage, on your birth certificate, it says when you get born, they recognize your gender right away, right from birth. Right the day, the minute of. They see what you have and that's your identity. You can't change your identity when you get married. So therefore, I oppose this bill. Thank you."

Representative Ichiyama rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support. I wanted to let the members know that I introduced this bill on behalf of my constituents. This is not a hypothetical situation. This affects real people and real lives. My constituents are able to change their name, amend their birth certificate, get a new driver's license, but not update their marriage certificate. To me, this is one of the last few statutes relating to government documents that should be updated to reflect our changing society.

"I wanted to thank the Equality Caucus for adopting this measure as a part of its caucus package. I also wanted to share my appreciation with the Health, Judiciary, and Finance Committees for hearing this measure and moving it forward on behalf of my constituents. This bill tells not only my constituents, but the rest of the community, that we see them for who they are, we accept them, and that their relationship is valid under the laws of the State of Hawai'i. Thank you."

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. I wanted to first thank the introducer of this bill, not just for the pragmatic implications and the positive impact it will have on her constituents, but also because it allows us to have this very important conversation around sex, gender, and identity. And I do think it's important to clarify that sex is biological, gender is socially constructed. And that's a very important distinction. And I hope that moving forward in our legal work, we can be very clear about that distinction."

Representative Garcia rose to respond, stating:

"Second time in opposition. Thank you. For thousands of years, sex and gender has been the exact same thing. There's male and female, period. The previous speaker mentioned changing things to fit their truth. If we're going to allow people to change legal information on legal documents to fit their version of truth, should we allow name, name changes are allowed. Shall we allow age changes, address changes, race changes, hair color changes, eye color changes? No, because you can't change what's truth. This is a legal document, it should report accurate information."

Representative Marten rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you. In strong support. I want to thank the introducer of this bill. And I also wanted to have the words of the representative from Waikiki adopted as my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Hussey Burdick rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. I wanted to let the record show that sex and gender are both nonbinary, with around 1.7% of the population born with intersex traits and many are found by doctors later in life to have traits that they didn't originally know. And I would like the words from my floor comments on the 14th on this bill to be inserted into the Journal again," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Sayama rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support with brief comments. I'd like to note that there have been many changes over the past thousand years, both socially and legally. Not to name a few, but to first of all, women weren't able to engage in our civic procedures. Persons of color were treated as property. These were truths back then. Things have changed for the better and we are still working on them. And this bill, thanks to the introduce of the bill, pushed that forward and makes it clear in the State of Hawai'i that you are accepted. And I just want to again urge the body to vote in support. Thank you."

Representative Souza rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Thank you to the introducer for this bill. And also, allowing a change on a marriage certificate of bride, groom, partner, or spouse is fine by me. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 485, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MARRIAGE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, Matsumoto, and Pierick voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1102) recommending that H.B. No. 244, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 244, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Pierick voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1103) recommending that H.B. No. 850, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 850, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Pierick voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1106) recommending that H.B. No. 540, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 540, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. This bill is free lunches. My concern is that this is indicative of the need to diversify the economy. We have free breakfasts, free lunches, because we don't have enough money in families that they can afford to do this, Mr. Speaker. These are the ALICE families that I'm referring to. Those that are over 50% of the population who are asset limited, income challenged, and they're working, they're employed.

"It's like, as I mentioned before on the floor, it's like having eight kids. Three of them you can feed, two are on rations, and then the others are on SNAP and other government programs. If we can't afford families with an income to feed their families, Mr. Speaker, we're derelict in our duties. This is why we have to diversify the economy, we have to create good jobs and high paying jobs. And this is just a reminder of it. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 540, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Garcia and Pierick voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1109) recommending that H.B. No. 503, HD 2 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 503, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Lamosao rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 503, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COMPUTER SCIENCE EDUCATION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 3 noes, with Representative Lamosao voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Aiu, Kila, and Pierick voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1112) recommending that H.B. No. 306, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 306, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ORNAMENTAL GINGER," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Pierick voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1114) recommending that H.B. No. 971, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 971, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. This bill is designed to provide bailout for a company that goes under. I don't believe the government should be feeding tax dollars to failed economies or failed businesses. If I start a business and I fail, I wouldn't expect my neighbors to pay taxes to rescue my business."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 971, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURAL LOANS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Pierick voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1119) recommending that H.B. No. 1373, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1373, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO

WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1121) recommending that H.B. No. 567, HD 2 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 567, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

At this time, Representative Ward offered Floor Amendment No. 3, amending H.B. No. 567, HD 2 as follows:

SECTION 1. House Bill No. 567, HD2, is amended as by amending section 9, line 2 to read as follows:

"SECTION 9. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$600,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 for the purposes of Act 279, Session Laws of Hawaii 2022; provided that any moneys not encumbered for specific purposes shall lapse to the general fund on June 30, 2025."

Representative Ward moved that Floor Amendment No. 3 be adopted, seconded by Representative Pierick.

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Support of the floor amendment. The purpose of the floor amendment is to safeguard the \$600 million which we have passed and promised to the Hawaiians. Like many of us in this chamber last session, we sang the praises of the positive nature of this. We virtue signaled how good this was going to be for the Hawaiian community. I was one of those.

"But, Mr. Speaker, when I saw this bill, I saw a blank where in effect the \$600 million, we backed out because we only gave them a short period of time to implement it, and then to put it back in, it was blank. So, Mr. Speaker, this amendment simply puts in a dollar amount of \$600 million of which we promise legally past that we would give the Hawaiians.

"Now, I know then some would say, well, they've already spent \$19.6 million. Well, let's give them another \$19.6 million. After 100 years of only having 9,800 homes, 28,000 on the waiting list, it's about time we top off, if you will, Mr. Speaker. So, the point is, this is to do what we did last year, \$600 million in not leaving it blank. So, between the House and the Senate, we can do some horse trading."

Representative Hashimoto rose to speak in opposition to the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. I think when you take a look at this bill, it's a simple bill to allow some of the things that the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands wants to do. And I think when we took a look at this bill, we needed to really try and figure out how to ensure the \$600 million would be available. And I think when you take a look at the provision that this floor amendment tries to fix, it's actually really defecting the bill. Because the way that we are trying to move this bill along is we're not sure how much money is actually needed to reappropriate.

"So, essentially what our original bill does is force lapses and reappropriates the funds. So really what you have to do is you have to minus out how much money they've already spent, which at this date, it's about \$23 million. By the time we get to the end of session, it's probably going to be more, maybe upwards of \$50 million, and you're going to have to minus that out and put it back into the bill to reappropriate the funds to ensure that they have the funding available to use for the allotted period of time that DHHL wishes to have it.

"So, I think this amendment doesn't follow the intent of what the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands actually wants. So, I ask the body to vote it down. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I would just add a note that if in effect we've spent \$20 million or whatever, I would give the honorable gentleman from Maui the amendment to change it, put \$580 million if that's the case.

"But the point is, don't leave it blank to do horse trading between the House and the Senate. We cannot risk that. This is where the genuine sense of commitment to the Hawaiian people of \$600 million is what this bill is all about. It's not about personal things. It's about what the community has waited for 100 years to build the houses with 28,000 on the waiting list. Mr. Speaker, that cannot be overemphasized.

"We shouldn't be nickeling and diming this thing. We should say, here's the money. We're not going to change it. We're going to fill in the blank and we're going to do it now, and you don't have to worry about when the House and the Senate go horse trading. That's simply all we want to do, is to say this is a commitment, we're keeping our word. Thank you."

The motion that Floor Amendment No. 3, amending H.B. No. 567, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF HAWAIIAN HOME LANDS," be adopted, was put to vote by the Chair and upon a voice vote, failed to carry, with Representative Lowen being excused.

(Main Motion)

Representative Holt rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. And first, I'd like to give great thanks to the Housing chair for doing a lot of work on this measure to help the department responsibly spend the \$600 million we appropriated last year. I do appreciate the representative from Hawai'i Kai is concerned for making sure we spend this responsibly.

"And, Mr. Speaker, because of your foresight in introducing HR 10 and creating that working group, which the representative from Hawai'i Kai is a part of, we also did have a meeting yesterday and the Housing chair did lay out to us all of the information which he just explained again about spending the money. And side note, they're doing a good job at spending the money. So, we will keep on top of that and make sure it's spent well. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kahaloa rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Holt be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Kila rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support. It's measures like this that we have passed out through the Housing Committee that will help Native Hawaiians succeed here in Hawai'i, keeping us on the land. So, I appreciate the introducer. I appreciate the Housing chair for doing the measure, and thank you to the body for the support of this."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 567, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF HAWAIIAN HOME LANDS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1124) recommending that H.B. No. 88, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 88, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COASTAL EROSION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Pierick voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1127) recommending that H.B. No. 203, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 203, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Garrett rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kila rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Aiu rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 203, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CIVIL SERVICE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Aiu, Garrett, and Kila voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Kapela and Tam voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1130) recommending that H.B. No. 755, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 755, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Garrett rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Aiu rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Lamosao rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Takenouchi rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Chun rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kahaloa rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 755, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AQUATIC NUISANCE SPECIES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Aiu, Chun, Garrett, Kahaloa, Lamosao, and Takenouchi voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Kila and Kong voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1131) recommending that H.B. No. 756, HD 2 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 756, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition. Mr. Speaker, if you're a beachfront owner, this is a super bill for you. This bill, because of sea level rise, will allow you to move your house to an inland safe place which has a relocation fund in the bill. It has a way of getting land trade exchanges. So, if you're a millionaire on the beach, you're in great shape.

"If you're Hawaiian on the beach, Mr. Speaker, and you have no home, you have no relocation, this is a smack in the face. I hope you don't cut that out. This is an unfair bill, Mr. Speaker. It gives priorities to those who can afford to move on their own, but yet those who cannot afford are not given any sense of relocation. We have Hawaiians living on the beach. How many Hawaiian homes have we got for those? Well, there's 28,000, probably a good share of those on the beach.

"The point is, Mr. Speaker, this is a bill that really differentiates in an unfair way. If you've got the wherewithal to be on the beach, we're going to help you because of sea level rise, but if you're on the beach out of homelessness, we have no way to help you. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I'm not sure where this bill came from or where it's going, but it's using the sea level rise issue as another excuse for, I don't want to be called out of

order, for denigrating a particular group of people who live on the beach, but they don't have anything over their heads. How's that for a euphemism? Thank you."

Representative Pierick rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Hussey Burdick rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Ruling on a potential conflict. This could affect my family home."

The Chair addressed Representative Matsumoto, stating:

"The Chair's ruling is that there is no conflict because this measure affects a class of individuals and homeowners. The ruling remains in effect through *sine die* unless circumstances change."

Representative Matsumoto continued to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"So, with reservations, please. And I think one of my reservations with this bill is the part with eminent domain. I think there's a lot that we need to look. This is, of course, an issue. We're seeing it all across North Shore, my former district. But I do think we need to look at all of the specifics in the bill and the three different ways that we're trying to address this."

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Alcos rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Amato rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 756, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LAND USE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes to 6 noes, with Representatives Alcos, Hussey-Burdick, and Matsumoto voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Garcia, Kapela, Peruso, Pierick, Poepoe, and Ward voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1133) recommending that H.B. No. 952, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 952, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 952, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NATURAL RESOURCES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Garcia and Pierick voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1134) recommending that H.B. No. 993, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 993, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No, please. This bill would be using tax dollars to study the weather, to study climate change. I believe the private sector can best use their resources to study the weather and then we can just ask them for a copy and save tax dollars."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 993, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SEA LEVEL RISE ADAPTATION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Garcia and Pierick voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1138) recommending that H.B. No. 1394, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1394, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Pierick voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1140) recommending that H.B. No. 1089, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1089, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO A STATE BOATING FACILITY LEASE PILOT PROGRAM," passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Hussey-Burdick, Kapela, and Tam voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1141) recommending that H.B. No. 1101, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1101, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, this is the stormwater drain bill. In opposition. This is if you have a roof and a driveway and a sidewalk at your house, it's going to charge you a particular percentage of the square footage. Mr. Speaker, this is another tax that is come at the county level. I think it's going to be one that people will regret once they see what's going on. But this one actually exempts the, which was said in committee that they were not going to be exempt, the State Department of Transportation, which has all these roads which are impervious. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I think government has to pay its fair share and with this one it doesn't. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1101, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STORMWATER FEES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Ward voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1143) recommending that H.B. No. 346, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 346, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. My understanding is that this bill would increase the cost of future infrastructure and Hawai'i's in an economic crisis. So, in order to build the economy, we need to have prices cheaper."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 346, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ELECTRIC VEHICLE CHARGING INFRASTRUCTURE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Garcia and Pierick voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1145) recommending that H.B. No. 1363, HD 2, as amended in HD 3, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1363, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, Pierick, and Ward voting no.

At 11:54 a.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:55 p.m.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1146) recommending that H.B. No. 551, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 551, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Matayoshi rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Strong support. I'm not going to go too much into this, you all know my strong support of this bill. I also want to point out that it does have broad public support. I'm sure many people's constituents have contacted them advocating for this bill.

"The one point I do want to make and reemphasize, Mr. Speaker, is that this is not a smoking cessation device. Flavored vaping products, while they may have some impact in allowing smokers to quit, 80% of youth have or try flavored vaping product as their first tobacco product. That's 80% of our youth getting addicted, that are being addicted to nicotine based on these. So even if it does have some positive impact in smoking cessation, the overall impact on our society is that we're addicting another generation to nicotine, and we just cannot afford that. Thank you."

Representative La Chica rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support, Mr. Speaker. I would like to thank the introducer of the measure, representative from Kāne'ohe. I'd like also to thank the chairs from Labor, and Consumer Protection, as well as Finance for moving this out of committee. This is a good bill.

"When I had first worked on this issue before being in here, I was pregnant with my first child. That child is now six years old. And he now goes to the same school where a lot of vaping behaviors are being observed at such a young age. As the representative and the introducer had mentioned, our kids deserve a life free of addiction. Many of us grew up or have been exposed to households where there have been cigarettes or other tobacco products. But we didn't grow up in households that had candy flavors and fruit flavors and all things that could be addicting and deemed as addicting to our kids.

So, I'd like to ask the rest of the body to join me in supporting this measure. *Mahalo.*"

Representative Lamosao rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations. I'm afraid of the harmful unintended consequences that this ban may cause to my community. This ban may compel people to purchase these goods online and especially in the black market or military bases. Thank you."

Representative Holt rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representative Lamosao be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Takenouchi rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Quinlan rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representative Lamosao be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Kila rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Gates rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, reservations, brief comment. I support the intent of this measure, but as the representative from Waipahu stated, the unintended consequences may increase the issue that we're trying to resolve with this. I'll leave off by saying that I strongly believe that prohibition on these types of items does not work. Look at our firework issues, look at the many things that are happening on the black market because there is no regulatory platform for these things to exist. So, thank you."

Representative Marten rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. As a mother, I feel like we can't protect our children from everything but where we can protect them, we should. And so, trying to protect our kids from predatory marketing, targeting them to get them addicted and hooked to support a particular industry lifelong is something that we should try to protect them from. Thank you."

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. I just want to add that there are a number of youth advocates who have become adults throughout the course of their advocacy on this bill, and I would really like to see them see some success on this measure."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 551, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Gates, Holt, Kila, Lamosao, Quinlan, and Takenouchi voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Aiu and Kong voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1149) recommending that H.B. No. 1261, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1261, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SPECIAL PURPOSE DIGITAL CURRENCY LICENSURE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Amato and Kapela voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1150) recommending that H.B. No. 521, as amended in HD 1, pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 521, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Kitagawa rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Nakashima rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. HB 521, HD 1 is targeted specifically for small farms with a maximum of 10 milk producing cows, it is not a massive dairy operation with hundreds or thousands of cows. This bill helps to promote sustainable farming practices and provides consumers with a direct source of fresh, locally produced milk. This is especially important for Hawai'i's rural areas, where small scale farming can serve as an important part of the local economy.

"While there is a small risk of illness associated with consuming raw milk, there is also other foods that also have the same risks. However, these can be minimized through proper production and handling practices. This bill specifically requires the establishment of standards to prevent such contamination.

"It is hypocritical from a health standpoint to legalize sale of an item that are otherwise legal to consume. Farmers who produce raw milk can drink it or give it away free for human consumption and it is not illegal, it is just the sale of raw milk that is currently illegal. Milk is not a drug. The general public will not be forced to consume raw milk. Even if this measure passes, most consumers may not even become aware that this option exists.

"Opponents have misconstrued the health dangers associated with just raw milk. The government allows consumers to access foods and other commodities that are also proven to cause illnesses ranging from leafy greens, raw fish, shellfish, raw eggs, raw meat, and even alcohol and cigarettes. The CDC website cautions against all of these items, not just raw milk.

"This measure is about protecting the family farm, giving consumers a choice, and not really about public health. It's time that Hawai'i joins the 41 other states that allows for the sale of raw milk in one form or another. *Mahalo.*"

Representative Morikawa rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. When I was a little child, or actually I was a toddler or a baby perhaps, all I had access to was raw milk. So, when milk became homogenized, I told my mom, Mommy, this milk is green. In other words, I thought the raw milk was ripe, homogenized milk was green. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Onishi rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. Mr. Speaker, two bills ago, people talked about how important it was to protect our children. The consumption of raw milk, although it can hurt the health of all people, it especially can affect the health of young children.

"The Department of Health continues to oppose this measure because of the impact it might have to public health. We have seen situations where farms that do not practice clean sanitation, do not have regular safeguards, can create situations where large portions of the population can be infected and become ill because of the products that they are producing.

"So, if the Department of Health thought that there was very, very, very minor danger in the public consuming raw milk, then they wouldn't oppose it. But in this case, we do bill after bill to try to protect children's health and this bill is taking us in the wrong direction. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Morikawa rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Second time in support. I would like to have the words of the representative from District 1 inserted as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 521, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RAW MILK," passed Third Reading by a vote of 39 ayes to 12 noes, with Representative Kitagawa voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Aiu, Evslin, Garrett, Kila, Kong,

La Chica, Lamosao, Marten, Matayoshi, Onishi, Sayama, and Tam voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1152) recommending that H.B. No. 576, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 576, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 576, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FERAL CHICKEN MANAGEMENT," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Pierick voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1154) recommending that H.B. No. 852, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 852, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE ENTERPRISE ZONES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1163) recommending that H.B. No. 1235, HD 2 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1235, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Souza rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, request for a ruling on a potential conflict. My cousin is the chair of the Hawai'i Correctional System Oversight Commission, and this bill deals with correctional system oversight. And the commission also submitted testimony in support of this measure."

The Chair addressed Representative Souza, stating:

"The Chair's ruling is that this measure applies to a class of individuals and all correctional officers, so there is no conflict. And this ruling will remain in effect through *sine die* unless circumstances change."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1235, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CORRECTIONS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1165) recommending that H.B. No. 441, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 441, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 441, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CLIMATE EQUITY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Garcia and Pierick voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1166) recommending that H.B. No. 1326, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1326, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Hawai'i does not have a sustainable solid waste management system and is desperately in need of a systemic shift in how we think about and manage waste. Most waste created in the state is landfilled or incinerated, which represents a linear waste stream, is very costly to taxpayers, and creates pollution that is harmful to the health of the environment and the residents of the state.

"Landfills discharge leachate, a contaminated toxic fluid which has potential for leakage that can harm groundwater, surrounding communities, near shore and marine resources downslope. On O'ahu, the landfill produces around 9,800 gallons of leachate per day and sits over Hawai'i's aquifer.

"Waste that is incinerated can be used to produce energy. But this process still produces air pollutants, greenhouse gases, and toxic ash. An average of 411 tons of toxic ash from H-Power are buried in the landfill every day.

"A linear waste management system is characterized by a take, make, and dispose model where virgin resources are extracted and goods are produced and then discarded with the end result of a growing mountain of waste and depletion of resources. In a linear economy, taxpayers and local governments bear the costs for waste management.

"In contrast, a circular economy is designed to keep resources in use for as long as possible, reducing waste, conserving finite resources, and promoting sustainability. A circular economy prioritizes waste reduction and creates a closed loop system where producers are responsible for at least some of the cost of disposal of their products, creating market-based incentives for waste reduction and product redesign that reduces waste at the source and facilitates reuse, composting, and recycling.

"A zero-waste initiative in Hawai'i would elevate these circular economy principles and put them at the center of the state's waste management strategies, redirecting state and county agencies to prioritize source reduction, reuse, refill, composting, and to improve the availability of recycling services for waste that cannot be avoided, reused, or composted.

"The adoption of a zero-waste initiative would lead the shift away from the linear waste system and toward a circular economy that is more sustainable, will create green jobs, and will reduce costs for waste management that are borne by taxpayers. It would also address the environmental and public health concerns posed by our overflowing landfills.

"The second part of this bill is about creating an extended producer responsibility program for packaging waste. Extended producer responsibility or EPR programs can exist for almost any product type. There are existing programs in other jurisdictions that cover a range of products, including things like carpets, large appliances, e-waste, packaging waste, prescription drugs, batteries, paint, pesticides, tires, photovoltaic panels, used motor oil, and mattresses.

"Under these programs, producers are responsible for ensuring that services are available to reclaim them and recycle products when they reach the end of their useful life. And producers are accountable for ensuring that their products don't wind up in landfills. Countless tons of waste and virgin resources are voided when these programs are implemented.

"Additionally, EPR programs for packaging waste already exist in Europe, Canada, China, India, Japan, South Korea, and many countries in Africa and South America, and in recent years have been adopted in California, Colorado, Maine, and Oregon, and proposed in many other state legislatures.

"For those with concerns about whether implementation of this program would add to the cost of goods, a 2022 published study from Columbia University looked at this issue and concluded that the estimated increase in costs would be zero to less than 1%, and that 'it would be difficult to discern

such a small impact on prices.' At the same time, implementation of this program would bring funds into the state to improve recycling services and offset the cost to taxpayers, making it a net positive.

"There's growing recognition globally, nationally, and here in Hawai'i that our throwaway culture is not sustainable and that we need a new and more sustainable approach to waste management, which is what is proposed in this bill."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1326, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ENVIRONMENT," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representative Matsumoto voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Aiu and Kila voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1168) recommending that H.B. No. 1430, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1430, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1430, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII AT HILO," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Pierick voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1170) recommending that H.B. No. 258, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 258, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. So, this bill is about acquiring St. Francis School at a discount to expand the University of Hawai'i. The University of Hawai'i has asked for about a \$17 million budget this year. That is a big dent in our state budget. And if we are to acquire more property for the campus, it's to consume more tax dollars. Why not give tax dollars to Chaminade, Pacific Rim University, Wayland Baptist University, the list goes on and on, HPU. Should the government be paying for education or should it be privatized? Thank you."

Representative Aiu rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 258, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ACQUISITION OF THE SAINT FRANCIS SCHOOL CAMPUS FOR THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII AT MANOA," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Aiu voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Pierick voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1171) recommending that H.B. No. 561, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 561, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAX CREDITS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Kapela and Ward voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1181) recommending that H.B. No. 249, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 249, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII CHILD NUTRITION PROGRAM," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Pierick voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1182) recommending that H.B. No. 622, HD 2 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 622, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. So, I have four certificates in suicide prevention. The private sector has many opportunities to address this issue. I think this is another example of the government expanding and using tax dollars where the private sector could easily solve this."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support. Many of us have heard about the issues regarding mental health that COVID has brought to our communities and especially to young people and the unfortunate rise in suicide rates in our communities. I think that this is difficult, important work that this task force is producing and will produce in the coming years.

"I'd also like to say that I rise in support of someone I knew very well, his name is Mikey Sakuma. He passed away in May of last year at the age of 10 years old. And he's loved and missed dearly. And I think that any efforts to stop incidents like that happening in the future should be supported by this body."

Representative Mizuno rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. The task force in the Department of Health to prevent suicide is not being paid. Not one red cent of taxpayer money goes to that task force that is working to prevent suicide in the State of Hawai'i. So, I support this bill. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kila rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, strong support. I'd like to thank the introducer for introducing this measure as every Native Hawaiian life that we can continue to keep alive in Hawai'i is valuable. And if this body chooses to stand behind supporting initiatives like that, they support to choose Native Hawaiian lives to keep them alive. So *mahalo* to the introducer and thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kahaloa rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Kila be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support and same request," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Souza rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Kila be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 622, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SUICIDE PREVENTION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Pierick voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1183) recommending that H.B. No. 617, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 617, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ORAL HEALTH," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Pierick voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1184) recommending that H.B. No. 1301, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1301, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. So, this is using the state budget to appropriate funds for a study that UH would perform. The private sector can do the study and save tax dollars."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support. If the private sector was going to do it, they would have done it by now. People are dying and it's our job to ensure that our constituents are safe and have pathways to ensure their own health."

Representative Tam rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Kapela be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1301, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CANCER," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Pierick voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1185) recommending that H.B. No. 95, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 95, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PARTIAL PUBLIC FINANCING OF ELECTIONS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Pierick voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1188) recommending that H.B. No. 37 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 37 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Souza rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, request for a ruling on a potential conflict. My brother is an OHA trustee, and the content of this bill falls under the purview of his fiduciary duties."

The Chair addressed Representative Souza, stating:

"The Chair's ruling, representative, is that there is no conflict. This measure applies to OHA as an entity, so there is no conflict. And the ruling remains in effect through *sine die* unless circumstances change."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 37, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO NON-GENERAL FUNDS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1193) recommending that H.B. No. 277, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 277, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MOTOR VEHICLE INSURANCE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1195) recommending that H.B. No. 538, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 538, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Aiu rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 538, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RESIDENTIAL REAL PROPERTY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 3 noes, with Representative Aiu voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Hussey-Burdick, Kila, and Poepoe voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1205) recommending that H.B. No. 15, HD 2 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 15, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO REAL PROPERTY LIENS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Amato and La Chica voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1208) recommending that H.B. No. 953, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 953, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1209) recommending that H.B. No. 994, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 994, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LAND USE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1214) recommending that H.B. No. 1385, HD 2 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1385, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC LANDS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Kapela, Kila, and Poepoe voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1215) recommending that H.B. No. 537, HD 2 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 537, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ELECTRONIC SMOKING DEVICES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Kong voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1217) recommending that H.B. No. 984, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 984, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Tarnas rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, thank you. In support. This bill is in response to a U.S. Supreme Court case known as the *Bruen* case. And the decision by the U.S. Supreme Court means that, regarding concealed carry weapons licenses, Hawai'i must comply by moving from what one might call a 'may' issue

state to a 'shall' issue state for concealed carry licenses. In other words, we have to come up with a system for the application and provision of licenses for people to carry weapons in a concealed manner. But restrictions on who gets these licenses and where the licensees can use the guns are permitted under the *Bruen* decision. From the case it says the 'reasoning under the Second Amendment is neither a regulatory straitjacket nor a regulatory blank check.'

"In addition to the majority decision, there was a concurrence written by Justice Kavanaugh and signed also by Chief Justice Roberts. I'm going to read two short snippets from it. 'Nothing in our opinion should be taken to cast doubt on longstanding prohibitions on the possession of firearms by felons and the mentally ill, or laws forbidding the carrying of firearms in sensitive places such as schools and government buildings, or laws imposing conditions and qualifications on the commercial sale of arms. We identify these presumptively lawful regulatory measures only as examples; our list does not purport to be exhaustive.'

"In his concurrence, Justice Kavanaugh went on to say he preemptively gave a green light to a variety of restrictions on concealed carry permits, including, 'fingerprinting, a background check, a mental health records check, and training in firearms handling and in laws regarding the use of force.' All of these requirements, he declared, are constitutionally permissible.

"In this bill, we've worked to craft a fair bill to meet the needs of the Supreme Court case and treat fairly those who wish to carry weapons in a concealed manner and also protect public interest. There are three categories of policy in this bill, one regards permits, the second regards usage, and the third regards accountability. I'll briefly summarize those three categories.

"Regarding permitting, this bill sets up a license for concealed carry that applies statewide. There are two types of licenses, open and concealed. *Bruen* does not change the criteria for open carry, but only for concealed carry. The state applies criteria including training, definitions of suitable person. This concealed carry license would last for four years instead of what was originally two years in the original draft. And it costs \$150 per application. The counties can designate a non-government agency to conduct trainings to support their needs. A person who is denied a license is entitled to a contested case hearing conducted by the police chief or a designee. And this addresses the due process concerns that some opponents have. An applicant for a license to carry must identify any health care providers who possess or may possess any records that have a bearing on the mental health of the applicant. The license holder must include the name, address, and phone number for the transferer and the transferee of a firearm. Licensing authorities must consider whether a person would present a danger to the community when making determinations on whether a person lacks the essential character or temperament to be entrusted with a firearm.

"Regarding usage, as to the sensitive places where concealed carry weapons are not allowed. In the Kavanaugh opinion, he said, 'nothing in our opinion should be taken to cast doubt on longstanding prohibitions on the possession of firearms by felons and the mentally ill, or laws forbidding the carrying of firearms in sensitive places such as schools and government buildings.'

"Hawai'i didn't have a set of rules about this before, because so few people got the permit in the past. So, the attorney general, in crafting this bill, looked to other states for guidance like New York and New Jersey. Concealed carry is prohibited on private property unless the owner explicitly allows for it."

Representative Onishi rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Tarnas continued, stating:

"Thank you. The bill exempts law enforcement officers from being prosecuted under these restrictions. And the bill exempts from liability physicians, psychologists, physician assistants, advanced practice registered nurses, and psychiatrists who provide information on the applicant for firearms permits.

"And finally, Mr. Speaker, the provisions regarding accountability. Terroristic threatening in the first degree, a Class C felony violation, increases to Class B felony if a user carries a gun in sensitive places. Any crime committed under the Chapter 707, Hawai'i Revised Statutes, which

regard assaults, could rise to the level of prohibiting a person from owning a gun. And this should act as a deterrent.

"The insurance requirement in the original bill was removed because there was questions about whether or not there was even an insurance policy that would meet the needs. So, we have a House resolution that we're submitting for consideration to study how best to implement that provision.

"A licensee must securely lock the firearm in a storage box when transporting it. Alcohol and drug use is prohibited while carrying the gun. And finally, an annual report from the attorney general is required, that details the number of licenses that are issued and those that are denied. I think that we have come up with a bill that is fair, reasonable, and I ask for everyone's support to pass it. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. Legislators take an oath of office, which starts, 'I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same.'

"The first paragraph of the Bill of Rights, which is a portion of the Constitution of which we all took an oath to uphold, says, 'the Conventions of a number of the States, having at the time of their adopting the Constitution, expressed a desire, in order to prevent misconstruction or abuse of its powers, that further declaratory and restrictive clauses should be added: And as extending the ground of public confidence in the Government, will best ensure the beneficent ends of its institution.' This is the first paragraph of the Bill of Rights.

"Now jumping to the Second Amendment. 'A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed.'

"We took an oath to not infringe the right to bear arms. So, I'm in opposition to this bill, which would infringe the right to bear arms. Thank you."

Representative Souza rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in opposition. Thank you to the Judiciary chair for his hard work on this bill, but my perspectives diverge. I will reiterate that Justice Kavanaugh's concurring opinion in the *Bruen* decision states that the Second Amendment is neither a regulatory straitjacket nor a regulatory blank check. And properly interpreted, the Second Amendment allows a variety of gun regulations.

"However, this measure goes too far in regulating the right to bear arms in our state. Especially in light of the fact, as Justice Kavanaugh also states, that individual self-defense is an essential component of the Second Amendment right to possess and carry handguns for self-defense.

"Justice Alito states in his concurring opinion that the *Bruen* decision holds that, 'a State may not enforce a law, like New York's Sullivan Law, that effectively prevents its law-abiding residents from carrying a gun for this purpose.' In this instance, Justice Alito is referring to the right of individuals to use a firearm to defend themselves. He goes on to say, in regard to the *Bruen* decision, that, 'our holding decides nothing about who may lawfully possess a firearm or the requirements that must be met to buy a gun.'

"Facets of this bill are burdensome to Second Amendment rights for our Hawai'i residents, and therefore I am voting no. Thank you."

Representative Alcos rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I oppose this bill. I feel that government is reaching too far for our Second Amendment. And if someone goes crazy in public, grabs a gun, how are we to protect ourself? We cannot protect ourself with our fist. We cannot protect ourself with our hands, with a rock or a stone. The bill will restrict a lot of places to carry our firearms. And if something happens in a public area, if someone had a firearm before the police get there, they can save a person's life or help someone's family. In taking away the right where we can't have that choice anymore. And I feel that safety, again, is a big and important thing in our lives. We want to feel safe that we be able to protect our families. And therefore, I'm against this bill. Thank you."

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Today is March 7th and our nation has already surpassed 100 mass shootings this year and there's still ten months to go till the end of 2023. And those aren't just statistics, those are lives of civilians and children and others gunned down, and their families and communities left behind to deal with the consequences.

"There are 120 guns for every 100 Americans in our country. No other nation comes close to the amount of civilian-owned guns that we have here. And the data is very clear, more guns equals more shooting, more accidents, more suicides, and more deaths. The U.S. has more deaths from gun violence per capita than any other developed nation, eight times more than Canada, twenty-two times more than the European Union, twenty-three times more than Australia.

"So, I support this bill and any bill that leads to fewer guns and more restrictions on gun ownership and where people can bring guns, because all of the evidence shows, this makes our society safer and that more guns makes us less safe.

"And I would just point out, the U.S. Constitution has been amended 27 times. It's not a holy text, it's a living document that should reflect the will of the people. And polling shows again and again, the will of the people in the U.S. is better gun control. So, I thank the Judiciary chair for working on this bill."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ganaden rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Lowen be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Marten rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Same request and a brief comment in support. I feel much less safe, and I resent the fact that the Supreme Court is able to change the way that we keep people in our state safe. And I appreciate the work of the Judiciary chair in the House and in the Senate to try to do the best they can with our circumstances. Thank you."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support and I'd like to adopt the words from the representative from Kailua-Kona into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Lamosao rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representative Souza be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I'm in strong support. I'd like to adopt the words of the representative from Kailua-Kona as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Kila rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Garcia rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. Guns are not the problem. Mental illness and lack of heart is the problem. And that's where we should be focusing and not taking people's rights away. We're passing bills to increase crime on the streets and at the same time restricting people from protecting themselves. This is ridiculous. No vote."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition, brief comment, Mr. Speaker. I mean, it's good we have to keep guns out of the hands of the crazies. The difficulty is that the crazies, they don't pay attention to the law at all. They are the active shooters of which, if there's anything good in this bill that we need to look at, is that there are no locations other than your home, probably, where you can keep the concealed carry.

"Active shooters are in shopping centers, they're in schools. If you have someone who's not a crook with a weapon, it sends a message to these guys who are going to shoot somebody up that, as soon as they get their gun out, they're going to get shot themselves. Mr. Speaker, that's the good side of this. The other thing is, whenever you get any of these shooters, they're all illegal, they're criminals. They're not paying attention to the law. So, to protect our people, look at this in the opposite sense, saying this is a public security bill if we have the active shooters shot immediately. Thank you."

Representative Pierick rose to respond, stating:

"In opposition. It was mentioned that the U.S. Constitution was amended 27 times and thus it's a living document. Let's understand what the founding fathers said about this original document, of which we all took an oath to follow. Thomas Jefferson said this, 'on every question of construction, carry ourselves back to the time when the Constitution was adopted, recollect the spirit manifested in the debates, and instead of trying what meaning may be squeezed out of the text, or invented against it, conform to the probable one in which it was past.'

"I'd like to quote another founding father, James Madison, concerning authorial intent to the Constitution. He said, 'I entirely concur in the propriety of resorting to the sense in which the Constitution was accepted and ratified by the nation. In that sense alone it is the legitimate Constitution.'

"Proceeding on now to the chief justice, the first in America, James Wilson. He said this, 'the first and governing maxim in the interpretation of a statute is to discover the meaning of those who made it.' Those who made the Constitution were a group of men who had just come through a brutal war fighting against British tyranny. They wanted to keep themselves from the probable forming of a bad government by bearing arms. It's the right of the people to bear arms to prevent us, the government, from ever becoming evil and coming against the people. Thank you."

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. May I have the words of our Judiciary and EEP chairs adopted as my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Tam rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Same request," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 984, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FIREARMS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes to 6 noes, with Representatives Kila, Lamosao, and Matsumoto voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, Kong, Pierick, Souza, and Ward voting no.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1218) recommending that H.B. No. 1375, HD 2, as amended in HD 3, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1375, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TOURISM," passed Third Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, Matsumoto, Pierick, and Ward voting no.

At 1:33 p.m., Representative Nakamura requested a recess and the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:35 p.m.

include intentionally or knowingly damaging the property of another that is used in a business operation without the other's consent in an amount exceeding \$100.

"My hope is that this measure will provide not only a deterrent but a more specific avenue for punishing these types of crimes and providing recourse for business owners. Thank you."

"This bill also affects licensed CPAs in Hawai'i who pay license fees in order to do business in Hawai'i. This bill would allow unlicensed CPAs from throughout the United States to practice in Hawai'i without notice, without the ability for us to track taxes that would be due the State of Hawai'i for doing work in the State of Hawai'i. This bill really takes away protections for the public and for our public accounting industry in the State of Hawai'i. So, I'm voting no on this bill. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Souza rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representative Onishi be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Chun rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in strong support. This is a very important bill, particularly for the two main issues that I have in this session. Number one, Hawaiian issues, and number two, ALICE issues. According to the governor's whiteboard, there are 450,000-plus members in Medicaid. So, this reso is a way of expanding or at least keeping the ALICE families up to speed with their health, *et cetera*. This is a very good reso to remind us of that. Thank you."

The House of Representatives of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2023, convened at 12:04 p.m., with Speaker Saiki presiding.

The invocation was delivered by Representative Dee Morikawa, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Kila, Kobayashi, and Perruso, who were excused.

Representative Takayama recognized Ms. Chang as an innovative contributor who vastly advanced the social and emotional needs of her students by providing an excellent counseling program, and congratulated and introduced honoree who was seated on the floor of the House:

Shely Chang, counselor at Ka'imiloa Elementary School, 2023 Hawai'i School Counselor of the Year.

Representative Takayama also recognized and congratulated additional honoree who could not be here:

Laura Ahn, principal of Niu Valley Middle School, 2022 Hawai'i State Principal of the Year.

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 215 was adopted, with Representatives Kobayashi and Perruso being excused.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1220) recommending that H.B. No. 133, as amended in HD 1, pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 133, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Yamashita rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in support of this measure. Thank you very much."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 133, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE BUDGET OF THE OFFICE OF HAWAIIAN AFFAIRS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes, with Representatives Aiu, Kobayashi, Kong, and Perruso being excused.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1221) recommending that H.B. No. 382, as amended in HD 1, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 382, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE JUDICIARY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes, with Representatives Aiu, Kobayashi, Kong, and Perruso being excused.

At 12:37 p.m., the Chair noted that the following bills passed Third Reading:

THIRD READING

H.B. No. 300, HD 1:

Representative Nakamura moved that H.B. No. 300, HD 1 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Yamashita rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. Because I rarely speak on the floor, if you would allow me a little latitude on this part. Because I hardly get to get remarks into the Journal, I'd like to wish my wife a happy 39th anniversary.

"Mr. Speaker, at this time, I'd like to also thank the people that helped me put this budget together. The person that previously sat in this chair, I thank her for her counsel and her support through this process. I'd also like to thank, second of all, is our vice chair of the Finance Committee. I think through the first half, we have become a great team. We have put in long hours working on agendas, going through the budget several times. And through the hearing process, she has kept me focused because I tend to multitask and lose my place, so she kind of helped me. So, thank you very much.

"And I'd also like to thank our CIP chair who is doing a wonderful job, because I know what it takes to do that job, there's a lot of time and effort you have to put into every single item and every single ask. So, thank you, you did a great job. And of course, Mr. Speaker, I'd also like to thank the members of the Finance Committee. You sat through over 300 bills, you gave up your weekend to go over the budget with us, and I appreciate your homework and what you have contributed to the process. So, thank you. And Mr. Speaker, I also would like to thank you and your leadership team for your support through this process and also your guidance. So, thank you very much.

"And the others that are very important to this process is the committee chairs. So, we asked you for input, we asked you for what priorities are to come to Finance, and we appreciate all the input and look forward to working with you on the most important part of the budget, which is the end.

"Mr. Speaker, last but by no means least, all of this work could not be done without staff. And in the gallery today is the budget staff. Led by our budget chief Jon Kawamura, put your crown on, Jon. Also up there is, let me go in order, Kristine, Rebekah, Jaymie, Heath, David, and Jadine.

"Mr. Speaker, unprecedented revenue growth in 2022, over 29%, catapulted collections and provided us with opportunity. Opportunity to restore funding for critical programs that were cut during the pandemic. Opportunity to tackle outstanding one-time large funding opportunities, like to the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands \$600 million to get their beneficiaries off the wait list. And opportunities to improve the state's ability to withstand economic downturns by shoring up our budget reserves.

"To put that 29%, nearly 30%, in perspective, the revenue of state government in 1968 was \$258 million, \$258 million was collected to operate our budget. It took 20 years to get to \$2 billion in 1988. It took another 17 years to 2005 to add another \$2 billion to hit \$4 billion. And the other \$2 billion took another eight years, when we broke \$6 billion. And then it took seven years, that was in 2013, and then it took seven years to get to 2020 to get to \$8 billion."

Representative Kitagawa rose to yield her time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Yamashita continued, stating:

"And guess what happened after that, Mr. Speaker? In just two years, with a raging pandemic, revenues went from \$8.2 billion to \$10.2 billion in just two years. That, Mr. Speaker, is not sustainable. The fact is, after this incredible revenue spike, the current projection for the next \$2 billion is in 2029 and 2030. So, what caused the spike? To put it simply, unprecedented federal stimulus.

"Mr. Speaker, national data confirms that what's happening in Hawai'i is happening in other states. Various factors drove higher than expected revenue conditions and revenue projections. Unprecedented federal aid helped support business and unemployed workers, quicker than anticipated recovery for the stock market and employment, the Wayfair decision that gave the states the authority to collect taxes from out-of-state online sales, and job stability in high wage professions that pivoted to remote working.

"According to PEW Fiscal 50: State Trends and Analysis, despite surprising strength in revenues, most economic experts expect the states' revenue to taper substantially in 2023. Although higher-than-expected tax revenue growth and record financial revenue improvements in the budget conditions, states must navigate looming challenges, including slowing revenue growth as the economy weakens and monetary policy tightens, historically high inflation, and a tapering of federal COVID-19 funds. These things are already happening in our state, Mr. Speaker.

"The Council on Revenues met on March 7, 2023, and their updated revenue forecast is a critical reminder of how quickly things can change. PEW cautions the slowing of revenue growth was prophetic. The COR reduced the 2023 forecasts from 5.5% to 2%, and in FY2024 it lowered it also from 5% to 4%. This change means we have \$1.2 billion less to spend over the next three years.

"A typical year, this budget draft would reflect more of our needs. However, this budget was presented to the Legislature in December and was considered a 'steady state' budget. This 'steady state' budget increased spending \$1.1 billion in 2024 and \$846 million in FY25 for the reduction of pandemic and supplanting of federal funds, restoring the budget cuts during the pandemic, collective bargaining, and future shoring up of our rainy day fund.

"Mr. Speaker, the budget before you today evaluates that 'steady state' recommendation and includes recommendations and modifications based on your Committee on Finance's work. Governor's Message No. 1, submitted by the new administration on February 13, proposed a spending increase of \$743 million in FY24 and \$677 million in FY25. Just two days ago,

Governor's Message No. 2, submitted to the Legislature, added another \$76 million in the FY24 and \$22 million in FY25."

Representative Nakashima rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Yamashita continued, stating:

"Thank you very much. Your Committee on Finance did not have the necessary time to evaluate the request and will be working with the administration in the upcoming weeks to vet through those requests.

"Mr. Speaker, the glamor of spending is great. There are extraordinary amounts of demand for expanding state services, creating new programs, for pushing for comprehensive tax reforms and tax credits. The revenue picture has dramatically changed, and risk exists if we are not cautious on how we work on our spending plan.

"Mr. Speaker, in the past, one of the arsenals in government's toolbox to jumpstart the economy is to increase the spending of capital projects. It is highly unlikely that this strategy will yield positive results if there is a downturn in our economy in the near future.

"During the pre-session budget briefing, the economists informed us that inflation and supply chain issues are artificially increasing the cost of construction due to the current volume. Recently, a department tasked with building affordable housing indicated that it would need \$50 million for existing projects. Mr. Speaker, that's \$50 million for existing projects, and yields zero new affordable housing. Mr. Speaker, \$50 million, zero more housing. That is inflation. That is supply chain issues. Mr. Speaker, the majority of the problem is called for affordability and affordable housing, \$50 million and we get nothing. That is very concerning.

"The Constitution of the State of Hawai'i provides that, 'notwithstanding any other provision to the contrary, the legislature shall establish a general fund expenditure ceiling which shall limit the rate of growth of general fund appropriations... to the estimated rate of growth of the State's economy as provided by law.' If we exceed the expenditure ceiling, we have to make a declaration of the appropriation, and we have to pass that measure by two-thirds vote.

"Last year, Mr. Speaker, for example, we exceeded the ceiling for 2023 by \$1 billion or 10%. The budget submitted by the administration, if adopted in whole, will cause the expenditure ceiling to exceed by approximately \$230.9 million in FY24 and will be within the budget and expenditure ceiling in FY25.

"Mr. Speaker, everything isn't doom and gloom. On a positive note, budget reserves are strong and we can accomplish a lot if we're strategic. Even though we are going to exceed the budget ceiling in 2023, because of the appropriation, what we did was one time infusion for recurring needs such as, this is what we did, \$200 million provided for infrastructure for classrooms and early learning for pre-kindergarten, \$256 million for repair and maintenance backlog for schools, \$500 million to strengthen our emergency budget relief, and \$600 million to the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands for their backlog. All these initiatives, Mr. Speaker, will not happen overnight and will happen over time.

"Mr. Speaker, this budget proposes a continuing effort to fix major problems in the state while we still have incredible opportunity to invest. The budget submitted by the administration in December indicates that the general fund deferred maintenance backlog is \$1.2 billion."

Representative Sayama rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Yamashita continued, stating:

"It's long past time that we tackle this neglected ongoing problem. The budget proposes to set aside \$1 billion for an estimated backlog of deferred maintenance identified by state agencies and done over five years. Deferred maintenance in the state facilities is not our only infrastructure issue.

"The state's natural resources are also in need of healing. In need of their own repair, maintenance, and long-term support. To that end, this budget sets aside \$376 million to the Department of Land and Natural Resources for parks, ocean resources, aquatics, forestry, and wildlife. The goal is not

to spend the money right away, but to strategically invest and take care of these projects to ensure that the state gets the best value.

"Although this budget does not include initiatives identified in the February 13th and March 10th requests to the Legislature, there are recurring needs that we need to address before *sine die*. All this comes down to a matter of balance of recurring and non-recurring costs. And we must have a sustainable plan that includes a budget that can withstand economic shock, and that we do not make decisions that will hurt people.

"House Bill 300, HD 1, is only the first step, Mr. Speaker. We still have a lot of work to do before we can develop a sustainable budget for all our needs. It is going to be a very, very long next two months as we work through this. I urge everyone to support this measure. Thank you."

Representative Nishimoto rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. The Finance chair giving a 20-minute speech, now I've seen it all. Let me start by thanking you, Mr. Speaker, and the members of this body for the opportunity to work on CIP. It's a job I do not take lightly, it's a responsibility I do not take lightly, and I thank you for that responsibility.

"I want to thank the Finance chair for his guidance. He did CIP for a long time and he's been a guiding force throughout this process for me and I really want to thank him for that. I'd be remiss if I didn't thank my staff. Heath Williams, our CIP specialist in Finance, who has made my job infinitely easier. And my staff, my CIP specialist and my staff, and I hope the LG is listening, she's the irreplaceable Taylor Date. Taylor, thank you for your work.

"Like the Finance chair was saying, this is kind of a unique year. We had Governor Ige's budget in January, and we've slowly gotten Governor Green's governor's messages trickle in. In fact, some have trickled in this week. So, the CIP budget is kind of a mishmash of different administration's budgets. But one overarching factor that we did use as our guiding principle was health and welfare. So, if it had to do with health and welfare projects in our communities, it was more likely to get funded. And the second guiding principle is, I believe that our members, they know the word on the street, they got their ear to what's going on in their communities, and we took their requests very seriously. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support of the budget, but with some macroeconomic reservations and some concerns, therefore, with reservations, sir. First, before I give my reservations on the macroeconomic level, I want to thank the chair for his comments and his feet on the ground, reality. It was not a spinmeister at all in that budget. I appreciate the comment about saying the glamor of spending is great. That's a memorable statement.

"Admitting that, in effect, we got bailed out, Mr. Speaker, by \$2.6 billion. I mean, that's where this glut has come from. That has saved us a lot of time and a lot of trouble. So, with the surplus, we go into, and this is where my concern is. It's not that, you guys have a great team, you guys have done a great job, my concern is what's going out there in terms of the unknown. These are the macroeconomics that I'm concerned with.

"One of the biggest things is, guys, you know what happened with the bank of Silicon Valley, you know what happened then with the Signature Bank, and then you know what happened with the bank Suisse. And there's rumors of Deutsche Bank and other things. And Moody's just recently downgraded the banking industry from stable to negative. That's the banking system of our country, colleagues. Stable to negative, our banking system.

"My point is, look, if we've got a budget that is \$20 billion. I appreciate the speaker, the historic growth that it is experienced, if we've got an environment that is bigger than who we are in our little Hawai'i economy, we may be spending too much too quickly, Mr. Speaker.

"My point is, and I think the Finance chair did say, we have to be cautious. We have to remember that these things that are going on beyond us, we have no control. And the biggest important thing I haven't even mentioned is the recession that some people are saying, particularly the Moody's, that we're

going to go into recession later on in this year. So, if we get a recession, we get a bank failure or more failures where confidence is lacking, Mr. Speaker, we could be in trouble.

"So, I commend the Finance chair. I commend the budget, it's a good budget. But it's assuming that everything out there is stable and everything is going to be, well, we went down 2% from the Council on Revenue, we only got hit by \$1.2 billion. But it could be worse, Mr. Speaker. The point is, the signs of the times are let's be cautious. The signs of the banking industry is, hey, guys, let's kind of hold our powder until we really know where we are. So, I hope as the chair of the Finance Committee, we will be constrained in our funding and we will be able to get through this as we did with COVID and other challenges that we've had to this body. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Quinlan rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. Mr. Speaker, in this budget there is money for our new comprehensive statewide reservation system for our state parks, our trails, and our public resources. And this is so important, Mr. Speaker. There are some things that we need to accomplish, that we must accomplish with this system.

"And first and foremost, we have to set expectations for the visitor. We have to make sure that the visitor knows how to be culturally sensitive and how to *mālama* the *'āina*. Another component of this, Mr. Speaker, is that we have to crack down on illegal commercial activity at our state parks and at our public resources, as well as some unscrupulous operators, while also making sure that everyone pays their fair share when they use these public resources. And third, Mr. Speaker, we have to raise the sufficient dollar revenue to take care of these resources to protect them for future generations. *Mahalo*."

Representative Garcia rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise with reservations. I agree with about 70% of the state budget that's being proposed. But the reality is, government is getting richer and the people are getting poorer. There's lots of good in this budget, but there's also lots of wasteful spending in this budget. We have lots of big issues to focus on here in Hawai'i. But instead, climate change meets one of the biggest priorities. And once again, there are bigger issues to focus on than pandering to the globalist elites. Thank you."

Representative Holt rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. First, I'd like to thank the Finance chair and all of the staff and everybody who contributed to crafting this budget. I know how hard you guys worked, the long hours you guys put it in, and I definitely appreciate all of the work. Mr. Speaker, thanks to your leadership and the leadership of the majority leader, this year we crafted a majority package which kind of serves as our roadmap, which focuses on many different areas, including the earned income tax credit.

"We're well aware of the high cost of living we all face here in paradise. And in a time where these costs are skyrocketing more than ever, the price of goods and services have been going up daily, we here in the House hope to provide some financial relief to Hawai'i's working families. And with House Bill 954, which is included in part of our budget, we aim to increase the earned income tax credit for our working families.

"Mr. Speaker, prior to our actions as a legislature at the end of last session, where we made the EITC permanent and refundable, the state EITC was nonrefundable, which meant families did not reap the full benefits of this credit. We changed that, and building on that momentum this year, we have carved out funds to increase the amount and further assist our struggling families.

"This bill is a lifeline to working families in these tough economic times. It gives low- to moderate-income taxpayers a tax cut and puts money back in the pockets of the lowest income people who owe little to nothing in taxes. The earned income tax credit provides larger benefit to taxpayers with children in their households and ensures that the people who need the most help receive the most benefit. It also helps local people who are struggling to afford the rising cost of housing, food, health care, and transportation that we all face every day.

"This bill helps working families keep more of what they earn. And by lifting up lowest income families who need the most help, we will lift up all communities and the State of Hawai'i out of our economic insecurity. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. And first of all, also *mahalo* to the Finance chair, vice chair, the CIP chair, and all of the staff. The House draft of the budget includes \$300 million to fund a low-interest loan program within the Hawai'i Green Infrastructure Authority for low- and moderate-income families at or below 140% area median income for the purchase and installation of residential renewable energy systems like solar-plus-storage systems.

"With 44% of Hawai'i's families classified as asset limited, income constrained, employed, or ALICE families, this will increase access to affordable energy within these underserved communities, increase resilience, lower electric bills, create green jobs, and keep dollars in Hawai'i's local economy and reduce the state's dependence on imported fossil fuels. This program will bring more equity to Hawai'i's renewable energy transition, making rooftop solar-plus-storage systems attainable for more households. Hawai'i's ALICE families stand to benefit the most from the long-term savings and lower utility bills associated with renewable energy systems.

"And this funding will open up new pathways to make this financially possible for all of Hawai'i's working families. The funding included in the House draft of the budget will capitalize this program and enable it to be self-sustaining and to help people for many years to come."

Representative Marten rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, in strong support. I also wanted to thank the Finance chair and the Majority Caucus for not forgetting our most vulnerable population. This budget includes in it a pilot program for child and adolescent crisis outreach team, both on O'ahu and on a neighbor island, that will promote safety for children where they are in their homes, their schools, community settings, by responding immediately when a crisis arises. And also, to continue to provide services for eight weeks to stabilize the situation and help the family or caregivers as well as the child transition to long-term help.

"This program will allow more children to stay in their homes, whether it be a birth family, resource caregivers, or other guardians, rather than be transferred to age-appropriate acute psychiatric hospital beds or other out-of-home placements, which are both in short supply and are much more expensive. Similar programs have been tested on the mainland and they have been found to be cost effective and also to help set kids on a path where they won't need these kinds of services as adults. Thank you very much."

Representative Hashimoto rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Strong support. As we all know, housing is a big crisis in our state, and I think it's been the buzzword this legislative session. And I think this budget does include \$150 million into investments, into housing. And I think this is the first step of making sure that we keep the pipeline of creating affordable housing all throughout Hawai'i going.

"It's going to be incredibly difficult over these next couple of years with rising interest rates to make projects pencil out. But I believe the state remains committed in making sure that we do our part to ensure that houses are being built that are actually affordable to our communities. \$75 million will go into the Rental Housing Revolving Fund, which will subsidize 60% AMI and below housing. And we also have a \$75 million infusion into the Dwelling Unit Revolving Fund, which will help for sale construction, it can help to purchase infrastructure and develop infrastructure, purchase land to develop future affordable housing.

"So, I think this is just the first step. We have bills in the majority package that continues to move. I think this number is just the initial investment that we show that we can remain committed as the bills continue to move. I expect that this number will increase as we get closer to the end of session. But just know that we know that this is an issue. We know that everyone in this chamber wants housing to be built and become affordable for all people

of Hawai‘i, and I believe that this is a great first step. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. I'd like to thank the Finance chair and his team for crafting a budget that would help some. And so, for that I say thank you. But there are some matters that do not help the state. In my district of Ewa Beach and Waipahu, I have some of the poorest of the poor in the state. And it's those people that I'm trying to advocate to have their taxes decreased and have the wages of the elite in Hawai‘i decrease.

"It should be noted that the governor makes \$184,000, it's in this bill, that's the budget. The lieutenant governor makes \$183,000 every year. Department directors make \$175,000 every single year, and that's what we're voting on. And I'm voting no on this measure because I believe that the constituents in my district shouldn't be paying such high taxes on such high salaries for people that should be public servants.

"This bill also gives at least \$130 million to the University of Hawai‘i. So why should hotel room service attendants, janitors, security guards, waitresses, cashiers, truck drivers, and tree trimmers, why should they be paying taxes on a public university? There's many private universities in Hawai‘i to include Chaminade University, Inspire University, Hawai‘i Pacific University, and the World Medicine Institute. These universities are supplied by the private sector, and they're equipping our next generation to be mobilized, to be economy improvers, to be people that help our society, and it doesn't require tax dollars. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Still in support with reservations. Mr. Speaker, I failed to mention, one of the very, very important things that were mentioned in the committee report is the reference to performance-based budgeting, which in the long run is how we give money and then we accomplish goals. And Mr. Speaker, we've tried to do that for many, many years. And I really commend the chair for thinking about it, hopefully implementing it, and making sure that we do give money to a department, in effect, the goals and the accomplishments are with that and measurable. Thank you."

Representative Pierick rose to respond, stating:

"In opposition. I just also wanted to note that according to the Tax Foundation, we're ranked 43 when it comes to taxes. So, I think that's another note to make that our budget of \$22 billion is too high."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 300, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET," passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 1 no, with Representatives Garcia and Ward voting aye with reservations, with Representative Pierick voting no, and with Representatives Kobayashi, Kong, and Perruso being excused.

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No vote, brief comment. Mr. Speaker, this gives the *kūpuna* retirement system a heavy blow, if you will. Many of the *kūpuna* who have saved and tried to get a retirement other than the meek Social Security, they've bought a house and they rent it out. And this says, look, if you live in a house that you own and then you get a rental, we're not going to give you the tax deduction. I think this is a blow to them. And I think it's going to be a difficult thing for the *kūpuna* to stomach. We promised in this session that we're going to lower the cost of living. Well, this will end up raising the cost of living, particularly if we realize that 60% of all the people are renters in the State of Hawai'i. And this obviously will be something that probably will increase their rent. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, a no vote. Thank you."

Representative Alcos rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Ward be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 924, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Economic Development, with Representative Matsumoto voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, Pierick, and Ward voting no, and with Representative Perruso being excused.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No, please. When I went door to door throughout Ewa Beach and Waipahu, many of my constituents asked me to do what I can to reduce the cost of electricity. This bill would increase the cost of electricity. So, for those reasons, I vote no."

Representative Kapela rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, no vote, brief comment. In keeping with what I just noted earlier about we made a promise to lower the cost of living, this clearly is going to raise the cost of living because it's going to cause the interconnection prices to be raised because, and for some reason, HECO and the interconnection contract does not resolve this when they're actually doing the contract, the bidding, the RFPs, *et cetera*.

"I'm not sure why this should come to us to tell them to do this. It's when HECO gets a subcontractor to put stuff into the grid, that interconnection cost should have been part of that contract. So, I think this is rather ridiculous. And now when it's the price of electricity that's already through the roof, I think this is going to make it worse. Thank you."

Representative Tam rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Alcos rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 839, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RENEWABLE ENERGY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives Alcos and Tam voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Garcia, Kapela, Pierick, and Ward voting no, and with Representative Perruso being excused.

Representative Lowen, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1262) recommending that S.B. No. 422, SD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 422, SD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE ENVIRONMENTAL ADVISORY COUNCIL," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Perruso being excused.

Representative Lowen, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1263) recommending that S.B. No. 419, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 419, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CARBON SEQUESTRATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representative Perruso being excused.

Representative Lowen, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1264) recommending that S.B. No. 973, SD 2, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 973, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representative Perruso being excused.

Representatives Lowen and Gates, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection and the Committee on Agriculture & Food Systems, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1265) recommending that S.B. No. 817, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Economic Development.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and S.B. No. 817, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE ENTERPRISE ZONES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Economic Development, with Representative Perruso being excused.

Representatives Belatti and Tamas, for the Committee on Health & Homelessness and the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1266) recommending that S.B. No. 1, SD 2 pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that S.B. No. 1, SD 2 pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Quinlan rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations, Mr. Speaker. This is a very difficult vote for me. I am a Christian and my religion has a lot of things to say about measures like this. But, Mr. Speaker, I believe so strongly in the separation of church and state, as did our founding fathers, as do many members of this body. Mr. Speaker, I cannot, and I will not legislate on the basis of my religion. Thank you."

Representative Amato rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I stand in strong support of SCR 1226, request permission to speak briefly. Health care is a human right and standing up

for fundamental rights, in this case to protect and expand health care access for all people of any gender and specifically reaffirming society's protections at the state level, is one of the most important jobs that any of us can do in this sacred hall.

"As a mother of three young women, I support all of SB 1, SD 2, even the controversial age of consent component. I support access to safe and legal abortion for any person in need. I vigorously oppose all efforts to restrict abortion access in any form.

"Let us not forget how last November, Dr. Caitlin Bernard was charged with a crime by a Republican attorney general in Indiana for her compassionate act of giving abortion medication to a 10-year-old who was vigorously raped in Ohio. We must make Hawai'i a safe haven for all people from anywhere without fear of cross-state prosecution, and we must also protect all of our health care providers. Further, if federal funds for clinics or procedures disappear, we must make laws to compensate and protect these institutions. And we must expand access to all islands, not just O'ahu and Maui.

"Such deeply personal and difficult decisions can only be made by a person and their physician. No one has the right to make this decision for someone else.

"The central premise of *Roe v. Wade* was that a person has the right to terminate a pregnancy before viability and also even after viability if an abortion is necessary to preserve her life or her health. The legal basis of the recent *Dobbs v. Jackson* decision, dominated by Republican-appointed judges, is highly debated and with good reason. The due process clause of the 14th Amendment to the United States Constitution provides a right to privacy. The Constitution therefore protects a pregnant person's liberty to choose to have an abortion without excessive government knowledge or restriction. We have a sworn duty to uphold that liberty.

"Thomas Jefferson referred to the First Amendment as creating a wall of separation between church and state. He was very clear. As legislators, we are obligated to have a clean and well-defined barrier between religion and law.

"In conclusion, I urge support of SB 1 and laws based on sound science and compassion, respect for any person's reproductive rights, and not religious rhetoric in this sacred hall. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

At 12:44 p.m., Representative Matsumoto requested a recess and the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:45 p.m.

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Souza rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Garcia rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. First of all, just to clarify what separation of church and state was, our Founding Fathers, in our founding documents, said that these rights are given to us by our creator, among which are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

"First and foremost, this bill is not needed, here's why. If this bill does not pass, abortion access is not impacted whatsoever here in Hawai'i. This bill is simply virtue signaling. Second of all, it's a clear attack on parental rights. Who in their right mind, Mr. Speaker, thinks that it's okay to allow a 14-year-old child to get medical surgical procedures without telling their parents?

"Currently, you can't be 14 and buy cigarettes, buy alcohol, get a tattoo or a piercing. But for an abortion, to kill a child in the womb, it's okay? This is ridiculous. It's an attack on parental rights. The phrase was mentioned, health care. This is not health care. Health care is bringing life, saving life. This is ending life, it's not health care. No vote."

Representative Kong rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Lamosao rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Alcos rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No vote. This bill, I understand that it's trying to protect kids' rights. But what about parents' rights? I'm a parent as well, I have kids. I would like to know, and my community would like to know what's happening to their *keikis* and to their kids and their family in school. This would stricken a lot. It wouldn't allow our parents to find out. I would be totally hurt if I didn't know what would happen to my child, if she's going through this trauma in her early years, I would like to be there for her to support her through this trauma, especially at this age. Who else is better than the parent? Who else is better? Is that counselor better? Is the teacher better? Is the doctor better? It should be the parents to raise their kids. And we taking a lot of the laws away from the parents and not allowing our parents to get involved with our *keikis*. And for that reason, I'm a no vote. Thank you."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support, Mr. Speaker. SB 1, SD 2 codifies what has been the law of the land here in Hawai'i for decades regarding parental consent. I'd like to note the American Academy of Pediatrics, which said, legislation mandating parental involvement does not achieve the intended benefit of promoting family communication, but it does increase the risk of harm to the adolescent by delaying access to appropriate medical care. Minors should not be compelled or required to involve their parents in their decision to obtain abortions, although they should be encouraged to discuss their pregnancies with their parents and other responsible adults.

"Mr. Speaker, I'm in support of the three health care providers that provide abortion services in addition to a variety of other reproductive health services for the community that I represent. I stand in strong support."

Representative Kitagawa rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Garcia rose to respond, stating:

"Second time, still in opposition. One other point I wanted to mention, the age of consent here in Hawai'i is 16 years old. Any intercourse below 16 years old would be considered statutory rape. If this bill passes, we're allowing and aiding in statutory rape. May God have mercy on all our souls."

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No, please. I'm going to be sharing several points. The first is the context between separation of church and state. That was a letter written by Thomas Jefferson to a Protestant minister. The Protestant minister had a concern saying, Mr. Jefferson, will there be favoritism for one Protestant denomination over another? He says, no, there's a wall or a separation between church and state, meaning we're not going to favor one over the other. But the liberty to still practice your faith and have that really fuse the legislator, is still fine. The last part is commentary.

"The next point is, where do we get law? I believe we get law from God. He defines what is moral law, and the Ten Commandments we get, thou shalt not kill. If we were to degrade law to just our subjective input, it becomes rather fluid with our culture.

"Is life precious? According to the psalmist in Psalm 139, verse 13-16, it says, for you, this is David talking to God, you formed my inward parts, you knitted me together in my mother's womb. I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made. Wonderful are your works, my soul knows it very well. My frame was not hidden from you, when I was being made in secret, intricately woven in the depths of the earth. Your eyes saw my unformed substance, in your book were written, every one of them, the days that were formed for me, when as yet there was none of them. God knows ahead of time who we are while we're still in the womb and what's going to happen after birth.

"Speaking again of what God's plan is for that life, it says in Ephesians 2:10, this is Paul talking to the church in Ephesus, for we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do. So, we see that God has a perspective on life. It is precious.

"Let's go back to the Ten Commandments. We're not supposed to murder. Leviticus 24, God is explaining to the children of Israel the moral law. He says, whoever takes a human life shall surely be put to death. So, God's implementing capital punishment for murder.

"Let's find out what things God hates. In Proverbs 6, it says, there are six things that the Lord hates, seven that are an abomination to him. Haughty eyes, a lying tongue, and hands that shed innocent blood. A baby that's in the womb is innocent. He or she has committed no crimes. So, for us to shed that innocent blood, it's not good. The heart starts to beat at about five and a half to six weeks old in the womb. That baby has blood. We're not supposed to shed that innocent blood.

"Jesus said, you shall not murder, in Matthew 19, verse 18. James wrote, do not murder, children are a blessing. It says in Psalm 127, verses 3 through 5, behold, children are a heritage from the Lord, the fruit of the womb, a reward. Like arrows in the hand of a warrior, are the children of one's youth. Blessed is the man who fills his quiver with them. He shall not be put to shame when he speaks with his enemies in the gate.

"Now, what about the life of the child? Is it determined by social factors? If the family doesn't want it, does the life become not as valuable? What if there's not enough funding to support the child? Do we kill the baby in the womb because we can't afford the baby? What if the baby isn't healthy enough? Do we kill the baby because we determine that that health level isn't where we want it to be? Or is life precious even if it has special needs? In the beginning of Exodus, God said, who made the deaf, the mute, the seeing, or the blind? Have not I? God makes people. And if they have a special need, they are still precious and they should not be aborted. I propose we choose life.

"It says in Deuteronomy 30, verse 19, I call heaven and earth to witness against you today, that I have set before you life and death, blessings and a curse. Therefore, choose life, that you and your offspring may live. Thank you."

Representative Onishi rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. Mr. Speaker, as a Buddhist, as the father of three daughters, as the grandfather of four granddaughters, I fully believe in a woman's right to choose about her body and what she wants to do. This is the way that we were brought up as Buddhists. Every person should be held accountable for their own actions, not somebody telling them what they can or cannot do. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tam rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I just want to have the words of the representative from Haleiwa inserted into the Journal as if they're my own, as well as the representative from Hilo inserted into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support, and I'd like to adopt the words of the representative from Hilo, minus the part about being a father and grandfather," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Kahaloa rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Same request, including the grandparent part," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Alcos rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, my position is I'm opposed, for the second time. This is not an adult we're talking about. This is kids what we talking about. Till today, I still make mistakes. Our kids still make more mistakes than us. That's a part of life that we live. That's the guidance that we need to give to them. We're taking away that right. This is *keikis* that we talking about. They're under 18 years old. That's our kids. What age you going to come out next? Twelve, ten, five?

"We need to hold our accountability to our parents. If we could stay home and take care of our kids, that would be so awesome, instead of somebody else raising our kids. But we don't have that opportunity now. But it is our kids to make that decisions and believing in them to make that choice at this

young age. And for fly that bird out of the coop and let them make the right choices at that time, as a parent, Mr. Speaker, I am very concerned. Even when they go to college. Now they are older in life, some of them. I still concerned and they still my kids. But at the age of 18 to 14? I oppose this bill, Mr. Speaker, because of that. Thank you."

Representative Souza rose to respond, stating:

"Still no vote, second time. Can you please enter the words of the representative from Kalihi into the record as my own, specifically in regards to parental consent. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ganaden rose to respond, stating:

"In support, Mr. Speaker, second time. There have been many Bible verses shared today. I'll share one, a favorite, Matthew 5:29. And if thy right eye offend thee, pluck it out, and cast it from thee, for it is profitable that one of thy members should perish, and not that thy whole body should be cast into hell."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. I am fully aware that we are supposed to save our comments for tomorrow. But as a young woman who has had an abortion, it is so hard to sit on this floor and listen to people trying to take away your right to choose what you do with your body. That you can become or do anything you choose in this life.

"I appreciate the parents on this floor who lead with integrity and who choose to love their children. My question is, what about the parents who are not there for their kids? What about the children who don't have parents in their lives that can lead, support, and honor them? What about the children who have parents who do not respect or sexually abuse their children? Because those children exist. And that is why I am in strong support of this bill. And I will always fight for my right and for every woman's right or every person who has a uterus to choose what they do with their body. And I look forward to further debating this tomorrow."

Representative Morikawa rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. And I have been there and I've done that, and I would like the words of the previous speaker to be inserted in the Journal as if they were my own. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Kila rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, can I cast a vote with reservation and a brief comment. As much as I also have personal beliefs to support some kinds of measures, I have to go and support what my district is asking. But I think what has been brought up today on the floor is very valid. I think about sometimes the folks that don't have homes and think about the kids that are looking for parents. And I think some of the concerns were shared were valid. But at this time, I need to register a vote with reservations, please."

At 12:59 p.m., Representative Belatti requested a recess and the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:00 p.m.

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and S.B. No. 1, SD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH CARE," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading, with Representatives Kila, Kitagawa, Lamosao, and Quinlan voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, Kong, Matsumoto, Pierick, Souza, and Ward voting no, and with Representative Perruso being excused.

We have so much Polynesian Cultural Center and other culture centers, as he said. And it shouldn't be worried about the finance, the money. I think it can be private funded, it can be funded many different ways. But it's long overdue and we definitely need a Hawaiian culture center. Thank you."

Representative Tam rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. I appreciate the comments regarding cultural centers around the state. But it's also important to note that the many cultural centers that we have around the state, such as the Japanese cultural centers, are all privately funded, and the only time they ever come for government money is in the form of grant money. The original bill asks for the Hawaiian cultural center to be fully funded by taxpayer dollars. And OHA was asking for \$60 million for a pilot program. Your committee decided to turn it into a study to ensure that that money would be spent wisely if we would go forward with a cultural center. Thank you."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I want to thank the chair of the Committee on Culture, Arts, & International Affairs. As a member, I am very supportive of this measure. I think that we definitely need a Hawaiian cultural center in our state and in all of our communities. I have a Native Hawaiian cultural center in Ka'u that community members have been trying to build for the past 30 years. They've applied for grants-in-aid and have finally gotten some funding. And my fear is that if we have just one Native Hawaiian cultural center, that it will be based in Honolulu. I think that we have to find ways to make sure that all of our communities, especially those in rural communities or our neighbor islands, they also have access. Thank you."

Representative Holt rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Still in opposition. I'd just like to remind the body, we're still not fully funding OHA's pro-rata share of the ceded lands which were stolen. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, still in opposition. I would like to make a historical note, if I may. For the last 40 to 50 years, we've talked about, hey, we got to get a host cultural center. We want to do as well as the Polynesian Cultural Center. We've got this in other Pacific islands.

"But the funny thing is that the funds have not been there. This bill goes back to where we were decades ago saying, hey, yeah, we got to have a culture center, which is good. But if there's not the money, Mr. Speaker, we're just talking as we have for the last few decades. And if there's any part of this community that needs a boost in the culture, it's the Hawaiian community.

"Which, I'm not going to go on the Department of Home Lands and 100 years, 28,000 on the waitlist, but the Hawaiians have been at the back of the line for so many years. And this bill shows that there's not a priority for the host culture to have a priority for a cultural center, which is sorely needed. So, Mr. Speaker, this is a mini step, but it's actually a step backwards as we go forward. Thank you."

Even the name of it is not very inspiring, destination management sounds like a very dull, bureaucratic, officious kind of a statement.

"The point is, Mr. Speaker, we're punishing what otherwise the Hawai'i Tourism Authority did a number of years ago when we reached 10 million visitors, we said, oh my God, that's too much. Well, those who put their foot on the accelerator know how to pull it back. Yet now we're rearranging all of this for the sake of what? So, we can tell people in our district, well, we're going to manage tourism.

"Well, The HTA now has a manage tourism plan. Why don't we let them execute it? Why are we changing all of this now in the middle of the stream? They've done a good job. We are rewarding their merit with, we're damning them with faint praise, quite frankly, Mr. Speaker.

"For those reasons, I think we need to look at this in a little bit more serious matter, and this is rather a flip reaction to what, well, we've had too many complaints in our neighborhood, we have too many things that are going on. Well, that's fine. But the ones who did the success are the ones who can manage it successfully. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I think this bill needs a lot more contemplation. Thank you."

Representative Quinlan rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support, Mr. Speaker. And may I first say how hurt I am to hear my colleague describe the Office of Destination Management as boring and dull. It's the furthest thing from it, and I personally am extremely excited. Thank you."

Representative Kahaloa rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Request a ruling on a potential conflict of interest. My fiancé works for the Hawai'i Tourism Authority."

The Chair addressed Representative Kahaloa, stating:

"The Chair's ruling is that this measure applies to a class of people. There is no conflict. This ruling remains in effect through *sine die* unless circumstances change."

Representative Pierick rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and S.B. No. 285, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WASTEWATER SYSTEMS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representative Cochran being excused.

Representatives Lowen and Ichiyama, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection and the Committee on Water & Land, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1323) recommending that S.B. No. 426, SD 2, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that S.B. No. 426, SD 2, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No, please. So, this measure, I believe, describes or there are resources available to people who want to transfer their cesspools or are being required by the state to transition their cesspools. But the reimbursements are only up to \$20,000, and many cesspool conversions require \$50,000. That's a standing balance of \$30,000 that the homeowner would need to have. A lot of my constituents and constituents from around different districts have called my office asking me to vote no. So, to honor their preference, I'm voting no."

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support and a brief comment. The cost of cesspool conversion varies, depending, so to make a statement that \$50,000 is the amount across the board is pretty off base, that would be a really high end, first of all.

"Second of all, we actually amended this bill in committee to add a provision that Department of Health can grant exemptions based on demonstration of financial need or inability to pay for the conversion for up to five years at a time. So, to me, the effect of this bill would be to, along with the other measures that we're considering this session, really put a sense of urgency on accomplishing these conversions. But also, this bill would really shift the focus to those who can afford to do the conversions and live in the priority areas that have the most cesspools that are causing the most consequences to the environment and to the health of our water systems."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I want to thank the chair. With reservations. My reservation is very much lightened because of what she said. Those who have a hardship, who need time, who need to borrow money, I think it gives an opportunity for that.

"In Hawai'i Kai, I have a number of farmers who have cesspools. They are in a bit of a strait because their leases are only like less than two years away. Because of that, Mr. Speaker, this bill is rather pressing and important.

"But at the same time, Mr. Speaker, we, as the State of Hawai'i, have to take some of the responsibility. We knew about these 88,000 cesspools decades ago. And right now, we're saying, okay, let's hurry up and enforce it, rather than having done it in a systematic, smooth way within the last 10 or 20 years. Can you imagine that these have been possibly leaching into water and other very sanitary places that we should have no sewage related to or near in any shape or form.

"For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I think this needs to be done and hopefully there's enough money for enough people not on a wait list that says, well, you're not part of the first 200 to do it, like I heard the city and county has something for scholarships, but if you're not on the list high up, you're not going to get it. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, we got to get rid of 88,000 cesspools, but we have to do it systematically. Thank you."

Representative Lowen rose to respond, stating:

"Just very quickly, I really appreciate having the representative from Hawai'i Kai on my committee. But I would just say, according to the UH cesspool prioritization tool that the provisions of this bill are based on, there are no cesspools in Hawai'i Kai that fall under that. And I think the cesspools being referred to are gang cesspools or large capacity cesspools which have been illegal under the federal law from the EPA since 2005."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, the good representative from the Big Island is correct except for one thing. The fact of the matter is, they have been categorized as large capacity cesspools. They don't agree with it, but I think that's the conundrum that we're faced with in Hawai'i Kai. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and S.B. No. 426, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CESSPOOLS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representative Ward voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Garcia and Pierick voting no, and with Representative Cochran being excused.

Representatives Lowen and Ichiyama, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection and the Committee on Water & Land, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1324) recommending that S.B. No. 777, SD 2, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and S.B. No. 777, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CESSPOOLS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representative Cochran being excused.

Representatives Lowen and Ichiyama, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection and the Committee on Water & Land, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1325) recommending that S.B. No. 428, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and S.B. No. 428, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CESSPOOLS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representative Cochran being excused.

Representatives Lowen and Ichiyama, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection and the Committee on Water & Land, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1326) recommending that S.B. No. 781, SD 2, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committees was adopted and S.B. No. 781, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RENEWABLE ENERGY," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representative Cochran being excused.

Representatives Lowen and Ichiyama, for the Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection and the Committee on Water & Land, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1327) recommending that S.B. No. 458, SD 2, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committees be adopted, and that S.B. No. 458, SD 2, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations and a brief comment. I wanted to thank the chair of EPP for her amendments to this measure. I think that it's a really important conversation. We need to look at how the impacted communities are being brought into the conversation around royalties on energy projects on ceded or stolen lands, and this measure gives us an opportunity to have that conversation."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations. I think that this bill is interesting. There's a portion of it that's really fantastic, where 20% of the funding from the royalties would be going back to OHA for public trust revenue, and I think that that's wonderful.

"Currently, 30% of the money goes to the county, 70% goes to the general fund. That 30% that goes to the county, most of it stays in the southern half of Hawai'i Island, with families and areas that are so rural, so remote, that even lack access to running water. So, to watch that money from the county be taken away and put in other spaces makes me a little sad, specifically because it's my community that would be greatly even further impacted. And what would happen with this bill is that they would only be getting 10% of that funding. So, the county would only be getting 10% and then the rest of the money would be going to OHA. I'm hoping that in the next committee they'll be able to look at the possibility of that 20% coming from the general fund instead of coming specifically from the county. Thank you."

Representative Kahaloa rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representative Perruso be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Onishi rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Hussey-Burdick rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representative Kapela be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committees was adopted and S.B. No. 458, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GEOTHERMAL ROYALTIES," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representatives Garcia, Hussey-Burdick, Kahaloa,

Kapela, Onishi, Perruso, and Ward voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Cochran being excused.

SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Morikawa, seconded by Representative Garcia and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering a certain Senate Bill for Third Reading by consent calendar. (Representative Cochran was excused.)

THIRD READING

S.B. No. 1, SD 2:

Representative Nakamura moved that S.B. No. 1, SD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

At this time, Representative Matsumoto offered Floor Amendment No. 4, amending S.B. No. 1, SD 2 as follows:

SECTION 1. Senate Bill No. 1, SD2, is amended by amending section 14, page 43, by reinserting the language of the current statute to read as follows:

""Medical care and services"" means the diagnosis, examination, and administration of medication in the treatment of venereal diseases, pregnancy, and family planning services. ~~[It shall not include surgery or any treatment to induce abortion.]~~ It shall not include surgery or any treatment to induce abortion.""

Representative Matsumoto moved that Floor Amendment No. 4 be adopted, seconded by Representative Garcia.

Representative Matsumoto rose to speak in support of the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I stand in support of the floor amendment. This is the first floor amendment that I have ever offered in my 11 sessions here at the Legislature. Very simply, what this amendment aims to do is revert back to our current law in relation to a minor by leaving the definition of medical care and services, as it says in the HRS 577, 'the diagnosis, examination, and administration of medication in the treatment of venereal diseases, pregnancy, and family planning services. It shall not include surgery or any treatment to induce abortion.' The part we want to keep is 'it shall not include surgery.'

"This is a reasonable amendment. It leaves every other section of this bill alone and essentially is just reverting back to our current law where minors cannot obtain a surgical abortion without parental consent.

"The parental consent issue is the most important one for me. I have two children, a son and a daughter, and I can't imagine them having a surgical procedure without me knowing. How do I help to care for my child physically as well as mentally and emotionally if I am to be left out of the equation?

"I know there are scenarios where children are left in heartbreaking and horrible situations where parents are not part of the equation, or even worse, where they are part of the problem. However, we already have statutes in place to deal with these types of issues, and if it isn't enough, we can work to strengthen those specific areas, not take away all parents' abilities to be involved in their children's lives in this area.

"In little ways, year after year, we have slowly chipped away at parental rights and parents' ability to raise their children. Again, this amendment keeps one sentence that this bill has struck out of our current law and leaves everything else. It is a reasonable amendment, and I ask this body for your support. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in opposition to the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. Mr. Speaker, in opposition for two reasons. First, this floor amendment is fatally flawed, as it does not comport with our drafting requirements. Secondly, Mr. Speaker, and I as the mother of two daughters, understanding the concerns of the good representative from Mililani, puts forward to this body that this amendment

completely undercuts the passage of Senate Bill 1, which seeks to modernize our statutes and protect the rights and private health care choices best made between a patient and their health care provider that have been in existence in our state for over 50 years. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion that Floor Amendment No. 4, amending S.B. No. 1, SD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH CARE," be adopted, was put to vote by the Chair and upon a voice vote, failed to carry, with Representative Cochran being excused.

Representative Pierick rose, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I make a motion that we do a hand count vote."

At 1:16 p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:22 p.m.

At this time, Representative Garcia offered Floor Amendment No. 5, amending S.B. No. 1, SD 2 as follows:

SECTION 1. Senate Bill No. 1, SD2, is amended by amending section 14, page 43, by adding an amended definition as follows:

""Minor"" shall be any person from the age of ~~[fourteen]~~ sixteen to seventeen inclusive."

Representative Garcia moved that Floor Amendment No. 5 be adopted, seconded by Representative Matsumoto.

Representative Garcia rose to speak in support of the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This floor amendment is pretty simple. It just knocks out one word in SB 1, Senate Draft 2, the word 'fourteen' and replaces it with the word 'sixteen' to be in alignment with our current law of consent in Hawai'i for sexual intercourse. So once again, a 14-year-old having an abortion with no parental consent is just absolutely insane, so we're going to change that to 16."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in opposition to the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. Mr. Speaker, this floor amendment is unworkable and inconsistent with our age of consent law in chapter 707-730 and 732. Fourteen has been long the age of minority for health care decisions and changing it would impact many other decisions that are currently being made. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion that Floor Amendment No. 5, amending S.B. No. 1, SD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH CARE," be adopted, was put to vote by the Chair and upon a voice vote, failed to carry, with Representatives Cochran and Matayoshi being excused.

At this time, Representative Pierick requested a hand count vote.

At this time, the Chair stated:

"Alright members, a division has been requested. Pursuant to Rule 54.1, one-fifth of the membership must vote in the affirmative for a vote by division, and you can signify this by raising your right hand. So, all those in favor of a hand vote, please raise your right hand."

At this time, the Chair called for a show of hands to allow for a hand count vote, and upon a show of hands, the request was denied.

(Main Motion)

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. Before I begin my remarks, may request that I can insert written comments, and may I also insert, as part of my written remarks, a letter from the community in support of Senate Bill 1, Senate Draft 2 that was provided to all members of this body from 34 signatories, including the Lieutenant Governor, Sylvia Luke.

"Senate Bill 1, Senate Draft 2 does three critically important things at a time when access to reproductive health care and reproductive health care itself is under attack by politicians who should not, should not, be interfering

in the private health care decisions of patients and their health care providers.

"First, this measure codifies and ensures the current rights and practices that have existed here in our state for nearly 50 years under Hawai'i's historic 1970 law legalizing abortion. Our state constitutional right to privacy that guarantees the fundamental right of privacy, which includes an individual's right to make their own health care decision regardless of age, and U.S. Supreme Court case law, beginning with *Griswold v. Connecticut*, *Eisenstadt v. Baird*, and *Roe v. Wade* and its progeny that ensure the right to reproductive health care for all.

"Second, this measure modernizes our statutes to align with medical care, medical standards of care, and protects the private health care choices best made between a patient and their health care provider.

"Third, Senate Bill 1, Senate Draft 2 protects Hawai'i's health care providers and patients from the efforts of other states who wish to impose criminal and civil liability in connection with reproductive health care services that have long been lawful in this state. Mr. Speaker, for all of these reasons, I stand in strong, unwavering support of Senate Bill 1, Senate Draft 2. Thank you."

Representative Belatti's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, I stand in strong support of Senate Bill 1, Senate Draft 2. This measure is entirely consistent with our state's Constitution, which *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization*, 142 S.Ct. 2228 (2022), does not affect. Our State Constitution enshrines a broader right to privacy in Article I, Section 6 that encompasses a right to an abortion and has long been a fundamental right in our state.

"Nowhere is this made clearer than in the committee reports of the 1978 Constitutional Convention of Hawai'i where it was stated that "[b]y amending the Constitution to include a separate and distinct privacy right, it is the intent of your Committee [of the Whole] to insure that privacy is treated as a fundamental right for purposes of constitutional analysis. Privacy as used in this sense concerns the possible abuses in the use of highly personal and intimate information in the hands of government or private parties. . . . More importantly, *this privacy concept encompasses the notion that in certain highly personal and intimate matters, the individual should be afforded freedom of choice* absent a compelling state interest. This right is similar to the privacy right discussed in cases such as *Griswold v. Connecticut*, 381 U.S. 479 (1965), *Eisenstadt v. Baird*, 405 U.S. 113 (1973), *Roe v. Wade*, 410 U.S. 113 (1973), etc. . . . By inserting clear and specific language regarding this right in to the Constitution, your Committee intends to alleviate any possible confusion over the source of the right and the existence of it.' *Committee of the Whole Report No. 15*, in *Proceedings of the Constitutional Convention of the Hawai'i of 1978*, at 1024 (*emphasis added*).

"Following *Dobbs*, it is even more important for our state statutes to clearly protect and advance this right to privacy for individuals, and to shield our residents, health care providers, and others within our borders from potential efforts by other states and third parties to penalize reproductive health care lawfully provided or obtained in our state.

"This measure is not intended to create additional administrative burden for covered entities like health plans and providers. It should not force them to document or extract communications related to treatment, payment, or health care operations concerning reproductive health care decisions.

"Senate Bill 1, Senate Draft 2 is primarily aimed at ensuring that third parties seeking information for use in restricting or otherwise deterring the provision of reproductive health care services, and thereby infringing on an individual's right to privacy, have limited ability to do so in Hawai'i. These third parties should not be weaponizing medical records against the patients who need reproductive health care services or the health care providers who have the professional authority to provide these services

"Finally, Senate Bill 1, Senate Draft 2 reflects the collective action and values of the people of Hawai'i. This was made evident in the rallies, walks, and community conversations that happened in the months after the *Dobbs* decision and leading up to this very day. This collective action is especially apparent in the joint letter to all members of this House included here and signed by the Lieutenant Governor, Hawai'i County Councilmember of

District 2, and 36 community organizations spanning a diverse group of community leaders, business, non-profits, and other organizations.

"For all of the reasons set forth above, I stand in strong support of Senate Bill 1, Senate Draft 2."

Re: A Letter from the Community in Support of S.B. 1, S.D. 2 (Relating to Healthcare)

Dear Speaker Saiki and Members of the House of Representatives:

From each of the undersigned, aloha kākou.

Hawai'i has a proud history of advancing social justice issues and fighting for the basic human rights of all people, including a long and deeply held support for reproductive healthcare rights. Among that history, Hawai'i was one of the first states in the country to legalize abortion in 1970, three years ahead of the *Roe v. Wade* decision and led by a bi-partisan effort.

After the fall of *Roe*, over a dozen states across the contiguous U.S. immediately moved to restrict access and criminalize those needing and providing basic healthcare. While these states may be an ocean away, the chilling effect of their laws is already creeping through our community. Patients are unsure as to whether they have the most basic of rights; the right of autonomy over their own bodies and the right to control their own futures. Providers, who already face a labor and resource shortage, are being forced to risk their livelihood and face harassment and legal uncertainty just to provide basic reproductive healthcare. While the state of the law in Hawai'i is not as dire as some of our sister states, we still face an unacceptable level of uncertainty for our patients and exposure for our practitioners.

Furthermore, access to safe and legal abortion care is not only an issue of bodily autonomy and basic human rights, but also an economic issue. The World Health Organization has determined that restricting abortion access is linked to negative effects on pregnant persons' education levels, their participation in the labor market, and their subsequent ability to contribute positively to economic growth. Communities that have full access to healthcare, including abortion care, are healthier and more productive. It is also important to acknowledge that the communities already facing the biggest challenges to economic growth, including Indigenous, Black, and Latino communities, people with low incomes, LGBTQ+ people, immigrants, and people living in rural areas, are the very same demographics most severely impacted by restricted access, thereby further depressing their ability to join the workforce and break the poverty cycle.

We, a diverse group of community leaders, businesses, unions, non-profits, and other organizations, stand together in asking the Hawai'i State legislature to pass Senate Bill 1 to strengthen our current laws, broaden access to abortion care for all persons, and shield our healthcare providers from the draconian and gross over reach of other states. Ensuring that our workforce has access to safe, legal, high-quality healthcare will only further the well-being and health of all communities in Hawai'i, and standing for our medical providers sends a powerful message to those who would seek to persecute them for providing basic but critical care. Access to abortion is a human right, basic healthcare, and a workplace

issue. This is an opportunity for Hawai'i to be an example - once again - to the rest of the country in upholding *Roe* era access and expanding protections for our medical providers.

The undersigned humbly ask our legislators to stand for our providers and protect our access, not only today, but for all future generations.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. There was over 3,000 abortions in Hawai'i in 2020. That's 3,000 innocent deaths, 3,000 the sheddings of innocent bloods, according to my faith tradition, 3,000 murder, because there was undue the end of life in the mother's womb. As somebody who's received a doctorate degree in counseling, I've walked with women who've grieved after having had an abortion. They're sad that they've done it, they've regretted it, they wish it never happened.

"Life begins at the heartbeat, which is five and a half weeks to six weeks. When we end a child's life, that's not good. There's a lot of noes that come from this caucus, but there is a yes. And the yes is forgiveness. God does offer forgiveness for those who murder their child. And I'm encouraging people to vote against the murderization of children."

Representative Todd rose to a point of order, stating:

"Point of order, Mr. Speaker. Murder is a legal term and should not be thrown around so loosely, perhaps?"

Representative Pierick continued, stating:

"Point of order, the representative from I believe it's Maui is infringing upon my freedom of speech."

At 1:28 p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:31 p.m.

Representative Pierick continued, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. I'm standing on my First Amendment right to freely speak, to freely express my religious views, and that view is that life begins at conception and that anything that would terminate the child's life, according to the Ten Commandments, is to kill the child, which in an other basic English term is murder. Thank you."

The Chair addressed Representative Pierick, stating:

"Alright members, please refrain from implying a motive and intent with respect to this legislation."

Representative Pierick rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in opposition. Abortion has intent, so we cannot discuss abortion unless it's somehow acted upon us by a third party that we have no consent on. So, I have to convey that there is intent behind abortion, and that's why I'm speaking against it, because I'm against the intent behind killing life."

Representative Souza rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, yes with reservations. I voted no yesterday on the floor during second reading for this measure and in the Judiciary Committee, but I did not feel comfortable voting that way because a woman has a right to choose and it is a personal decision which is separate from religious beliefs and individual beliefs.

"I've always fought for what I know to be right morally, under the law, and in defense of the Constitution. And even though the Supreme Court's Dobbs decision reversed course and reserved the issue of abortion for the states, the spirit of the Roe decision lives on, and therein lies an inherent right to privacy.

"Hence, I respect the perspectives and admire the tenacity of the representative from Ka'u and the representative from Kaua'i when they shared their *mana'o* yesterday, and value their bravery and vulnerability to draw from their lived experiences.

"I have constituents on both sides of the coin when it comes to this issue, and this is the proper way to vote, to represent the voices of all of my constituents and not just the more vocal conservative community members. The representative from Nanakuli made that point clear yesterday in this chamber, that the decision belongs to our community members, and I will add, the spectrum of voices and perspectives.

"I appreciate the viewpoints of my colleagues and respect the diversity of thought and opinions that each of you share as we collaborate in this building and share our *mana'o* on this floor. We all come from different backgrounds and faiths, and no member shall be persecuted if their vote does not succumb to the religious perspectives of another member.

"As a strong Catholic, I spent my formative years at Maryknoll Grade School from K through sixth grade. And as the representative from Makiki could attest to, the school's motto is *Noblesse Oblige*, to whom much is given, much is expected. This means to me that you lead through action, and in turn, those actions will bring glory to God.

"I should not have to feel like less of a Catholic or a Christian on this floor, or feel less worthy of God's favor because I do not subscribe to the sermons that have been prevalent throughout this session. Legislating from the pulpit is contrary to the separation of church and state and has been so prevalent that even the good representative from Kalihi, one of the brilliant legal minds among us here in the House, has recently begun to rebut statements made on this floor with Bible verses instead of the usual course of action with law, data, and policy perspectives.

"But in following in the same vein, I will leave you with this from James 4:12. There is only one lawgiver and judge, the one who is able to save and destroy. But you, who are you to judge your neighbor? Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Quinlan rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representative Souza be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Garcia rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In opposition. This bill is not needed. And I know this is a very emotional bill, there's people on both sides, and for decades in this country, those who are pro-life, those who are pro-choice, and the debate has gone on for a long time. But this bill is not needed because like I said yesterday, if this bill were not to pass, abortion access will not be impacted whatsoever.

"So, people are saying, we're attacking women's rights. If the bill fails, women's rights are still there. They can still have abortions in Hawai'i. So, we can debate the morality of abortion and I'm pretty sure you all know where I stand on it.

"But in this speech, I want to focus on the non-partisan problem of this bill, which is parental consent. I believe that the vast majority of parents in our state agree that a 14-year-old child, a 14-year-old child, should not be allowed to make decisions to have medical surgeries with no parental consent. Like I said yesterday, 14-year-olds need parental consent for a school fieldtrip, to get a flu shot, to get a tattoo or a piercing, but not for a surgical decision which will forever impact the life of that young girl.

"It's horrifying to see the amount of bills this session being pushed through these halls stripping parents of their basic and fundamental rights over their children. Mr. Speaker, Hawai'i's *keiki* does not belong to government. They belong to their parents and their families. And how dare government step in the way of parental rights. Lastly, I must say our state's motto, *ua mau ke ea o ka 'āina i ka pono o Hawai'i*, the life of this land is perpetuated in righteousness, and the passage of this bill is unrighteousness. So, God help us. Thank you."

Representative Lamosao rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representative Souza be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. I'd like to remind the body that parental rights are not absolute. There are important reasons why minors' autonomy should be protected for their health and safety. I think that as a teacher, I've had the experience of working with parents who did not adequately care for their children. And it's been, honestly, a process working through having to protect children from abusive parents that has, frankly, shaped my life.

"And I think that this issue before us reminds us that ideally every child would grow up in a supportive home with open lines of communication

where parents help their children make these decisions, respecting their autonomy as people. But that's not the reality of every child who grows up, they don't necessarily grow up with the safety they deserve. And this bill is for those teens. Families are sacred, but they are not immune to violence and abuse of all forms, and government coercion cannot create this safety.

"As the New Jersey Supreme Court found when it held the state's parental notice law unconstitutional, a law cannot transform a household with poor lines of communication into a paradigm of the perfect American family. All of the major medical associations support the minors' right to choose for themselves, because mandating parental involvement in unsafe situations puts teens' health at risk and does not create healthier families. Thank you."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support. Though member speech is a protected right, the public must be protected from misinformation. I believe we have a duty to rectify when misinformation is being spread in our tenuous and shared democracy.

"Yesterday on second reading and today, the issue of parental consent has gotten much attention. As the Health chair noted, HRS 707-730 and 732 have been the law for decades. The age of consent in Hawai'i is 16 years old. At this age, any person may legally consent to sexual activity with another person who has also reached the age of consent.

"Importantly, Mr. Speaker, there is an age gap provision to avoid the common practice of criminalizing teenage sexual activity. Persons at least 14 years old can consent to activity with a person who is less than five years older than them. Persons under 14 cannot consent to any sexual activity under any circumstances. Consent to STD and HIV testing begins at 14. By practice, prenatal care also begins at 14.

"Mr. Speaker, not passing this bill to protect pregnant people and their hard working, well-educated health care providers to care for them in our communities may lead to an increase in infant and mother mortality. This morning, the CDC produced a report noting that maternal death rates surged by nearly 40% during the second year of the pandemic, widening disparities for women of color and those living in poverty throughout the United States.

"Because there are people in our communities that are against this measure, it should be said that there is something counterintuitive about passing laws that protect abortion. Mr. Speaker, guided by faith in humanity and in support of human life, I vote yes."

Representative Kitagawa rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Alcos rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I oppose this bill. First of all, colleagues, I just want to apologize if I hurt anyone in this room yesterday and even today. I'm not here to hurt anybody, I'm here because of the bill and the word is in this bill because my word, our word, means a lot and this is the law that we're making, I'm not attacking anybody who's writing the bill.

"So, I oppose this bill as a father, and also fathers of mine in my community. When my daughter is at a young age or my son, they got a nightmare, they run into your room, you give them one hug, maybe you sleep with them. As they get older, during the longer years, they fall in love with boyfriends and they get crushed and they get hurt. And we turn back to them and we want to hug them, we want to love them, we want to cry with them. And those are crucial moments in their life, where we be there as parents for our *keikis*.

"Now, this bill, not allowing, I not saying not allowing, the *keiki* has the right not to speak to the parent because the *keiki* is scared, she is scared. I can't imagine how scared she must be because she don't want to look at the dad's eyes because she's afraid of how he might respond. But we cannot push that aside.

"I understand that some families don't have a dad. I understand that's why sometimes we get grandmothers, aunts and uncles, someone that we grew up close with. Adults to able to counsel, to speak, to love, to share, and to cry with them, to hold them. To hold them as long as it can, maybe might take months, maybe might take years. But taking that away and making a

young child to live her life not knowing that she could count on her parents or her dad, without giving them that option, I mean, I'm sorry, the option is there. But she is scared. And I want to be there and other parents like me want to be there for them.

"And if someone get raped, what we tell them in adults is seek counseling, is seek help, is speak and tell. But they're not going to speak and tell to one little kid. They going speak and tell and get help from one adult, someone who's professional, someone who can able to give love and share and care and someone who went through it and someone with experience.

"Mr. Speaker, all I'm saying is that these are our kids. And this bill is shoving something surgically inside of them. And I can't think about, it breaks my heart. And I'm not here to hurt anyone, like I said. It breaks my heart that I have to see, not just my kid, but other kids cannot turn to their *kūpuna*, to their family, to the loved one, to that support. Mr. Speaker, I'm protecting the parents as well I'm protecting our *keikis* with the love and with the support that we hopefully we can give them. Thank you."

Representative La Chica rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in strong support. This bill does not make it illegal for children to communicate with their parents about their health care decisions, should they feel that they are in a supportive and safe environment. This bill protects everyone else who do not have the same supportive home environment and where this does not exist.

"Mr. Speaker, women do not have a responsibility to have children. Women do not assume this responsibility just by deciding to have sex. They certainly should not be mandated to have children just by virtue of being pregnant. Mr. Speaker, I believe that the right to life means protecting a woman's right to her life, an individual's right to choose what to do with that life and with their body and with their health care choices. It means being able to protect a woman's right to decide when to start a family. I believe that that right belongs to a woman alone and it should not be made by any single politician.

"I thank the Senate for sending this bill over and I'm proud to be standing with the majority who are standing up for women's reproductive rights. And I'm proud to be a resident of this state that's setting an example for the rest of the nation. *Mahalo*."

Representative Marten rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I stand in strong support. In 1970 when the members of this same body made our state the first in the nation to legalize abortion, I imagine it was a very difficult process. They were truly leaders when it came to valuing the lives, health, rights, and choices of women. They responded to the calls of my mother's generation, a generation where women became sterile or died due to unsafe illegal abortions. Because of their work, women in my generation and those younger have never known that type of suffering.

"Now, 53 years later, because of efforts by mainland political and judicial bodies to intrude in our state, we find the need to safeguard these existing rights, as well as to codify into law protections for our health care workers who provide abortion services that are legal in our state. We will not let these outside influences intrude, just as we respect women enough to restrain ourselves from intruding in their most private and difficult health care choices.

"These are choices that a woman or a girl may make for many reasons. And if there are some in this body who are trying to decide in their own moral judgment what they think is an okay reason for a woman to make that choice, if there are any at all, I want to share an image that I saw on a sign of a rally last year here where a young woman had a sign that had a chart that said, reasons women choose to have abortions, a pie chart. The biggest portion of the chart said, none of your darn business, and then the smaller sliver of that chart said, also none of your darn business. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Perruso rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm slightly more collected now, so I wanted to add a little bit of data and evidence to our conversation. A national survey of more than 1,500 unmarried minors having abortions in states without

parental involvement laws showed that 61% of pregnant teens discuss the decision to have an abortion with at least one of their parents. And a majority of teens who did not talk to a parent turned to another trusted adult.

"The younger the teen, the more likely they were to have voluntarily discussed the abortion with a parent. In fact, 90% of minors under 15 involved a parent in their decision to have an abortion. For teens who do not confide with a parent, they tend to have good reasons for doing so, which I briefly alluded to earlier, such as a fear that their disclosure will exacerbate an already volatile or unsafe situation.

"One study showed that 22% of teens who did not tell a parent about their abortion decision feared that if they told their parents, they would be kicked out of the house. Just under 10% feared that they would be physically abused because their parents had done so before. Of those who did not tell a parent, 12% did not live with either parent, and 14% had parents who abuse drugs or alcohol.

"So, again, Mr. Speaker, I would like to reiterate the importance of this measure to protect our young people and the decisions that they have the autonomy and authority to make about their bodies."

Representative Tam rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I just want to have the words of the representative from Wahiawa inserted into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Tam continued, stating:

"And some more brief remarks. First, I want to thank the Health and Judiciary chairs for their work on this bill. Mr. Speaker, it's important to note that not all minors have supportive parents with whom they are able to discuss a pregnancy with, and unfortunately in some cases it is the trusted adult that is responsible for the pregnancy. Allowing young women to have autonomy over their bodies and to make their own choice is essential. It can even be lifesaving.

"Mr. Speaker, I also strongly believe in the separation of church and state. But some members of this party seem to only be able to find a biblical justification to vote down this bill. So, if you're persuaded by the Bible, I recite Matthew 7:1, which says, judge not, lest ye be judged.

"Frankly, with all due respect, no man can ever understand this choice, and we cannot judge it. Women are aware of their circumstances, their wants, and their medical needs, and they are fully capable of making this choice. And it is one that no legislative body has a right to infringe upon.

"Hawai'i has a long and proud history of supporting the rights of women. We were the first state in the union to legalize abortion in 1973, years before the federal *Roe v. Wade* decision. When the law was passed, personal experiences and stories were shared about how rich girls went to Japan and poor girls bled out in Chinatown. Abortion is and has always been a socio-economic issue. And the political agenda has never been about the sanctity of life, but to create barriers and maintain the status quo of keeping women in their place and perpetuating cycles of discrimination and poverty. When the law passed, the Hawai'i Legislature listened to their stories. They listened to the doctors, and most importantly, they listened to the women.

"Like I said, we have a long and proud history of not only supporting and upholding women's rights but championing them. In these times where so many women's rights are being violated, we must continue to champion the strength and liberties of women. This bill champions that, and it continues us in the direction that we've been walking forward for 53 years, and we will never take a single step backwards. Thank you."

Representative Garrett rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in strong support of the measure before us. As a husband and proud father of two beautiful daughters, this is by far the most consequential vote I'll be casting this legislative session. I don't know how long I'll be a member of this body, but I'm very grateful that here as a freshman, I'm in a position to ensure that all women in Hawai'i can continue to have unfettered access to reproductive health care.

"My yes vote today also means I stand in solidarity with all the dedicated health care professionals in our community who, with the passage of this

bill, can continue to focus on providing lifesaving care without worrying about governmental intrusion into the intimate private health care decisions of their patients. So, Mr. Speaker, for these reasons and many more, I stand in strong support of SB 1, SD 2. Thank you very much."

Representative Alcos rose to respond, stating:

"Second time, Mr. Speaker. I opposed to this bill. Again, family, mens, women, please stand up to supporting your family, your *keikis*. And youth, please depend on your parents as much as you can, because even though sometimes your house going be really hard to deal with, but your family is the best thing that you can count on and they're always going to be there a majority of the time. So, and that's for a majority of the family, not all family, Mr. Speaker, I'm talking about, but majority of family. Family is important and that's what we should lean on. Thank you."

Representative Belatti rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support second time and I promise this is my last time. Mr. Speaker, in rebuttal to the representative from Kapolei, District 42. In researching and looking at this issue, I want to call upon the voice from a past, another representative, also Saiki, but this time Patricia Saiki, who in 1970 on this very floor said, 'I am fairly certain that we would not be deliberating this bill here today, if we had not received tremendous support from the people of this State—support from a wide variety of organizations representing a clear cross-section of the entire community.'

"This same representative, this strong Republican woman with clarity of purpose, shared in 2018 her story as to why she was in favor of the abortion bill at that time. And it has to do with the very reasons why we are passing this bill, to provide protections for our health care providers.

"Representative Saiki then, in a 2018 oral history interview, spoke about how she, as the wife of an OB-GYN, would be awakened at 2:00 a.m. in the morning by her husband, who's received a phone call from a patient who went to an illegal abortionist and is now losing blood and is going to die without his help. You know that something's got to be done. Patricia Saiki said, 'he would wake me up and we would go to his office. We couldn't put on the lights because then we would signal that something was going on. The police would come. So we would then use flashlights, and I was the lamp holder. In other words, I held the lamp over the patient while my husband then cleaned out the situation to save her life and save her from the ramifications of the illegal abortionist.'

"Mr. Speaker, without this law, our health care providers are in criminal and civil jeopardy. We know that because we have seen actions by other state actors and members of other states already trying to take action against providers in other states. This bill is critical. Representative Patricia Saiki knew it then and we know it now. And I stand proudly with this body to pass this measure. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Garcia rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong opposition. First and foremost, Congresswoman Saiki did a lot for this state and this country. And unlike some caucuses in this building, we are a big tent with differing perspectives.

"What was mentioned was, I keep hearing separation of church and state. For some reason some people think, Mr. Speaker, that that means you cannot vote on something based upon your personal religious convictions. That's not in any way what that means. Separation of church and state is simply this, the government shall never compel the church what to do, and the church shall never compel the government what to do.

"I keep hearing government overreach into someone's right to choose. What about government overreach in parental rights? And it seems like it's fun to quote scripture today on the floor, so let me just read from Matthew 18:6, but whoever causes one of these little ones who believe in me to sin, it would be better for him to have a great millstone fastened around his neck and to be drowned into the depths of the sea."

Representative Ichiyama rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in strong support, permission to insert written comments into the Journal. I also just wanted to share with my

colleagues that there was a recent poll done in February, statewide, of Hawai'i voters, and that 84% believe that it is important for lawmakers, for us, to ensure that current rights, including the right to access abortion and reproductive health care, are protected.

"An additional 79% agree that all people, regardless of age, should make their own reproductive health care decisions, including abortion. And then finally, Mr. Speaker, 70% overwhelmingly disagreed with the Supreme Court's decision to overturn almost 50 years of precedent in *Roe v. Wade*. Mr. Speaker, I think that's very clear, very resounding, and that's why, in addition to many other reasons, I'm in support of this measure. Thank you."

Representative Ichiyama's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you Mr. Speaker for the opportunity to submit additional written comments in support of SB 1, SD 2, Relating to Health Care. I am in support of this measure because it will (1) expand access to reproductive health care and (2) protect our health care providers from out-of-state litigation.

"First, this bill expands access to reproductive health care by allowing trained and qualified physician assistants to provide medical and aspiration abortion care in the first trimester. We all know the physician shortage on the neighbor islands, and in 2021 we expanded our law to allow qualified APRNs to also provide abortion care. Numerous studies have demonstrated that abortions performed by physician assistants are as safe and effective as those provided by physicians. Advance practice clinicians will help provide safe abortion access to everyone who needs it, regardless of where they choose to live or receive care.

"Second, the protections in SB 1, SD 2 codify and expand upon Gov. David Ige's 2022 Executive Order to protect our health care providers from out-of-state litigation. At the beginning of this year, the Guttmacher Institute estimated that 24 states have banned abortions or are likely to do so. Approximately 14 states have no clinics providing abortion services. Given Hawai'i's tourist, military and university student populations, it is very possible that a non-resident may seek reproductive health care services from our local providers that would otherwise be prohibited in their home state. Last year, we saw attempts by other states to pass legislation that would allow private citizens to sue any person who helps someone to obtain an abortion, even outside of their state boundaries. We need to protect our health care professionals who are abiding by Hawai'i law and providing much needed medical services.

"For all of these reasons, I am in support of SB 1, SD 2."

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support and I'd like to adopt the words of the representatives from Makiki and Moanalua," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Amato rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I stand in strong support of SB 1, SD 2, and request that my comments from yesterday's floor session, March 16th, be inserted to the Journal and I here also add further comment," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Amato continued, stating:

"Because of the recent Dobbs ruling, many states have banned or severely restricted access to abortion and now restrict human rights and reproductive freedoms through criminal penalty. This includes not only desperate patients seeking help, but also medical providers.

"Indiana has sued doctors helping rape victims. Missouri has paralleled Texas' gun legislation tactics by allowing anyone to sue someone providing aid to a patient. This means a mother, a father, a friend, even a doctor. Criminalizing medical care is simply unacceptable. This is a clear case where we as state legislators must stand up and protect the rights of our citizens, including our dedicated, hardworking healthcare providers.

"We've heard a lot of talk about constitutional protections and yes, some of it from me. I am again compelled to point out that the due process clause of the 14th Amendment to the Constitution provides a right to privacy. Further, Article 1, Section 6 of the Hawai'i Constitution states, 'the right of the people to privacy is recognized and shall not be infringed without the

showing of a compelling state interest. The legislature shall take affirmative steps to implement this right.'

"We are all sworn to follow this and take those steps today. Both Federal and State Constitution wisely prevents overreach in matters of privacy and therefore protects a pregnant person's liberty to choose to have an abortion without excessive government knowledge and the subsequent restriction.

"I am a mother of three young women. I value my right to privacy. I value your right to privacy. I live in Kihei, Hawai'i, not Beijing nor Moscow. I am proud to live in a country where human rights, like privacy and health care, are respected and supported. A state where medical professionals are protected and a society where our Constitution is understood and upheld with noble actions from many of my honorable colleagues.

"We must support our people, not criminalize those who need help. I stand in support of our Hawai'i Constitution, which I have sworn to uphold. I stand in support of people in desperate need. I stand in support of our noble medical practitioners. I stand in support of SB 1 and of human rights. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Onishi rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Can I get a ruling on a potential conflict of interest? My daughter is a registered nurse," and the Chair ruled, "no conflict."

Representative Onishi continued to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you. I stand in strong support, and I'd like to have the words from the representative from Makiki added as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I support this bill. I'd like to first thank the Health chair and Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs chair for overseeing this bill in the House. I'd like to recognize our representative from Salt Lake for spending a lot of time during the interim working with all of the women organizations to help craft this bill. I'd also like to thank our Republican members for agreeing and supporting 95% of this effort to modernize the abortion laws in Hawai'i.

"On this issue of parental consent, a couple of months ago, it probably was last month that I met with OB-GYNs who have the task of performing abortions in our state. And they said that, in alignment with statistics shared by our representative from Wahiawa, that most of the girls who come in have a parent, one or two parents, with them when they come in to do the abortion.

"But there are situations, Mr. Speaker, where this is not the case. Where a family member is the cause of the need for the abortion, and it is a very difficult situation to be in. I struggle myself as a parent with a daughter, and it was my daughter who convinced me when she was in college that, mom, not everyone has the kind of relationship that we have, one that is based on trust and open communications. That she had friends that did not have this type of relationship, that they cannot speak to a parent who may be abusive or not in their lives.

"So, I think on this one issue of parental consent, I'm in strong support of this measure and I believe that all women and all of our young women have the right to choose what to do with their bodies. And I just want to acknowledge all of the work that went into creating this bill before us. Thank you."

Representative Evslin rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. In addition to the right to privacy and legal protection for medical providers, as my colleagues have spoken about well, while all women in Hawai'i do have a right to an abortion, on the outer islands, that right is often hard to practice. On the island of Kaua'i, surgical abortions are non-existent and medication abortions are hard to come by. So, people who can afford to can fly to O'ahu, spend a week on O'ahu, go into a hotel room and receive abortion services. Those who cannot afford to are left behind. And I have heard many, many

stories from friends and constituents on Kaua'i. And in this bill by expanding access to ensure that physician assistants can perform certain types of abortions, including medication abortions, is critical for the outer islands, especially Kaua'i, to ensure that those who need those services can receive those services. Thank you."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support. I have said a lot. I still feel the impact of yesterday. I think that what people may not understand, if you've never had to go through something like this, is that it's such an emotional decision. Regardless of what anyone chooses, it is deeply emotional and you carry it for the rest of your life. It also changes every single aspect of your life.

"I wouldn't be sitting in this chair if it wasn't for Planned Parenthood, and I know that. And I would like to thank every single member that stood up today to support a woman or a pregnant person's right to choose what they do with their body. I would also like to thank the many, many individuals across the state who have advocated for this issue. And to anyone who is experiencing this choice, know that whatever choice you choose, you are brave and you are loved."

Representative Morikawa rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I wasn't going to stand up today, but I have to. I'm in strong support of this. I'm just thankful that way back when, when I made my mistake, abortion was legal and I was able to get it on Kaua'i, which was absolutely amazing. I was a straight-A student. I had aspirations to go to college to become a social worker, perhaps a psychologist, although I ended up being an accountant. But for sure, I would not be here today if I didn't have that choice. Mr. Speaker, it was my body, it was my future, it was my right, and it was my choice. Thank you."

Representative Kahaloa rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. Thank you for everyone who shared their words today, their feelings on this bill, and I'm just excited to be here as we make this decision and vote today. It's really important, it is a difficult choice, but the merits of this bill are great because it offers choice, and that's why this bill is important. We're not telling people what they can or cannot do, we're allowing that choice reign. And that it is a personal decision like the representative from Ka'u has mentioned. It's personal, it's difficult, it's emotional. But we are allowing women to have the flexibility of that choice. And I'm honored that we get to vote today to honor choice and allow choice to be had for any woman that has had to make a choice in their life. So, thank you."

At this time, the Chair stated:

"Before taking the vote, the Chair would just like to thank all of the members for your civility and perspective this afternoon."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 1, SD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH CARE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 43 ayes to 7 noes, with Representatives Kitagawa, Lamosao, Quinlan, and Souza voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, Kila, Kong, Matsumoto, Pierick, and Ward voting no, and with Representative Cochran being excused.

"Having said that, Mr. Speaker, very important announcement I have is that when we were in recess, the one year of the Ukrainian war took place. But today the announcement is that Mr. Putin has been charged by the International Court in Hague for, and I read specifically, war crimes. And it's with that warrant for his arrest that was issued in The Hague, Mr. Speaker, I say that in the sense that there may be something shifting in that particular situation. But I want to remind people, if you're war weary, we still have the Ukrainian flags. Mr. Speaker, thank you for giving the lapel, are there any of these left that are still there? We still have some flags in our office if you're there. So, please don't weary in your well doing for that.

"Having said that, Mr. Speaker, remember Zelensky and his support for what is otherwise freedom for the people of Europe and America. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I know a little bit unusual announcement, but it's important for what Mr. Putin is getting from the world court today. Thank you."

We are seeing, with the advocacy from the Women's Prison Project as well as other organizations, what best practices looks like, and we hope that in future years this can be applied to the men as well."

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. No vote, brief comment. This bill competes with the Citizens decision of the U.S. Supreme Court, if not competing with it, overturns it basically. My concern is that we're playing at the state level with the First Amendment, the most sacred of all, the freedom of speech amendment or the amendment of the freedom of speech.

"I'm not sure that we have all the legal and jurisprudence behind all of this. According to our discussion in the caucus, the AG didn't even show up to say anything about this. Can a state constitution overrule a U.S. Supreme Court? Maybe some lawyers on the floor here will give insight into that. But I don't believe that the states have that right. And look, I'm not for the United decision, I think there's too much money in politics. But this way of going about it, I'm not convinced is the way. So, let's see as it plays out. But for now, I am a no. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Alcos rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 917, SD 3, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO THE HAWAII STATE CONSTITUTION REGARDING THE FREEDOM OF SPEECH," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Finance, with Representatives Alcos and Matsumoto voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Garcia, Pierick, and Ward voting no, and with Representatives Cochran, Gates, and Lowen being excused.

"Mr. Speaker, I am in opposition, given the implications of giving the counties another superpower to overcome their debt limits. Mr. Speaker, we have home rule, but we also have limitations as to the amount of debt that the state can get into, the amount of debt that counties can get into. And it says it's for infrastructure, but it says it's for other things also. I would bring to the attention of the body that, thanks to David Shapiro in his Sunday article, he mentioned that the city council members are going to now be from their \$68,000 salary, given a \$185,000 salary."

Representative Nakamura rose to a point of order, stating:

"Point of order. Sticking to the subject matter at hand, which is SB 1295."

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"And SB 1295, madam Majority Leader, is an acceptable expense by which this debt limitation can pay for. Let me add one more before you rule me out of order.

"The speaker, or in this case, Tommy Waters, is now paid, I can't believe the amount, it's from \$76,968 to \$194,992. Mr. Speaker, the point is, we're allowing the counties to go more in debt. We already know the nation is probably problematically in debt. We have a governing amount that we can go in debt as a state. But this one says this, like Enron, it goes off the books. The counties can increase their debt, but it doesn't count towards their debt ceiling. Mr. Speaker, that's cooking the books, that's unfair, I think this is giving the noose to the counties for which they are not going to make good use of.

"For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I think we have to watch this very, very closely. Because indebtedness after COVID is kind of the way to go. And we know the nation is trillions of dollars in debt. I think the state in its balanced budget is wise, but this opens the gap for the counties. Not a good policy. Thank you."

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Pierick rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Alcos rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

But it's an indictment on our economy, Mr. Speaker. And that's what grieves me.

"Even without this bill, the majority of students in our public schools qualify for a free lunch. Parents don't earn enough money because of the small size of our economy to feed their kids. I've said many times it's comparable to somebody who's got eight kids, three can be fed fully, two are on rations, the other three are on some government subsidy.

"I hold us responsible because we are supposed to be, quote, diversifying the economy, getting higher paying jobs. I don't see too much legislation to that effect, Mr. Speaker.

"For those reasons, this is a good bill, but it's an indictment that we're not diversifying our economy. We're not getting enough money into our families to be able to afford school lunches. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I'm for it, but with reservations, but I'm voting fully on top of it. But it grieves me to see this. As we know, there are so many ALICE families that are in this predicament, and likely they are mostly right here. And one last statistic, 63% of the Hawaiian community are ALICE families. And that's something that we have to focus on in the future. Thank you."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. I recently got to visit students at Naalehu Elementary School. And from kindergarten all the way through fifth grade, their number one request was that they all were able to have not just school lunches, but larger school lunches as well. I think that hunger shouldn't be a barrier to education. Thank you."

But at the same time, why should taxpayers be paying for campaign signs, campaign commercials, and things like that? So, I'll be voting no."

"I think we've dented and injured democracy yesterday by what you did. And again, you didn't do it to me, you did it to the system that we have with the freedom of speech and democratic processes in this marketplace of ideas. Thank you very much for hearing my grievance."

Representative Tarnas, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1617) recommending that S.B. No. 372, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 372, SD 1, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No, please. I think that there is definitely good intent and this measure would do a lot of good. At the same time, I recommend the police reform themselves or have their own rules that guide them versus us having oversight over each of the county's police departments."

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support, Mr. Speaker. We actually got testimony in support in the Judiciary Committee from the Honolulu Police Department. This is considered best practices around the world. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 372, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GOVERNMENT SERVICES RELATING TO THE LAW," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading, with Representatives Garcia and Pierick voting no.

Representative Tarnas, for the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1618) recommending that S.B. No. 926, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 926, SD 1, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Souza rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No vote please, Mr. Speaker. I appreciate what this measure is trying to accomplish. And in my district of Kapolei, where we have lots of pedestrians exercising and walking throughout our community, this would be a welcome measure. But the goal is to make our streets safer for pedestrians and drivers alike, and this bill contravenes that effort. The measure's purpose is to allow pedestrians to act contrary to the statewide traffic code when a reasonably careful pedestrian would determine that there is no immediate danger of a collision with a moving vehicle.

"The Department of Transportation and Honolulu Police Department submitted testimony in opposition in the Judiciary Committee, and I agree with their viewpoints. This measure will create more liability for drivers who, of course, are still required to use due care in making sure they do not hit pedestrians who are acting contrary to the traffic code. The traffic code is in place for a reason, and I cannot support this measure. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, no vote and a comment, please. This bill legalizes, decriminalizes jaywalking. All of us jaywalk, but this makes it now an acceptable behavior. The difficulty is, recall just last week many of us were out there with the Safe Streets rally. That was to not only give condolences, but sympathy with the mother of the young McKinley High School student who lost her life walking in a marked crosswalk and hit by a truck, a pickup truck that didn't even stop.

"The point is, Mr. Speaker, this goes backwards, it goes contrary to safety. It's something that I think is now, with the right of way of cars and then having someone as a jaywalker is to endanger them. And if you're in the crosswalk and they can't see you like they did on Kapiolani Boulevard with the McKinley student, how are they going to see you if you're jaywalking? That is a jeopardy of our population.

"The City & County of Honolulu has developed a vision zero action plan to eliminate traffic deaths and serious injuries. At the rally, it was mentioned that one third of the traffic deaths are in crosswalks and with bicycles. That is exceptionally unfortunate because if you're not safe in a crosswalk, how can you be safe when you're jaywalking?

"And, Mr. Speaker, there are unfortunately now I think a growing subculture in the DTS in the counties, as well as in the DOT of the state, that rumble strips, slowing bumper, the speed bumps, *et cetera*, is becoming more acceptable. And I was told by one mayor that we could actually get

them in our districts within two weeks. And if there's anything that's serious in my district, it's speeding. And Senator Lee and I will have a town hall meeting on traffic mitigation. And the members in that particular area of Hawai'i Kai are very concerned because they leave Kalama Valley, go down the hill to Hawai'i Kai, and there's just fear and trembling at Kamiloiki Elementary School.

"The point is, Mr. Speaker, if we allow the legalization of this, we're jeopardizing and making the people less safe, of which now we are schizophrenically saying, we want safe streets, at the same time we want to let loose of everybody to run across the street as a jaywalker. That doesn't make sense. It's a bad policy and this is a bad bill. Thank you."

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I hadn't planned on saying anything on this bill, it really wasn't on my radar, it was on the agenda. But if anyone searches the origin of the term 'jaywalking' and looks up where that came from, the idea of jaywalking was kind of a creation of the automobile industry to criminalize pedestrians. And when there started to be more cars, there was more interaction of pedestrians and vehicles, and that led to safety issues.

"And instead of putting the burden of responsibility for that on drivers, the burden was placed on pedestrians. And there are safety concerns, clearly. We have cities and roads, entire communities, half of our nation completely built around the automobile. But I would argue that hasn't led to better outcomes on so many fronts.

"And I think the idea of decriminalizing jaywalking is saying we are allowing our city streets to be a place for human beings and not just for cars. And the outcome of that in the long term is to make them safer and more pleasant, and more accessible. It's healthier communities and fewer miles driven and all kinds of positive outcomes. So, there needs to be a lot more work done to improve the design of our streets to make them safe, in addition to things like this. But I think being a pedestrian shouldn't be criminal."

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support and I'd like the words of the representative from Kailua-Kona entered into the record as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Strong support, can I have the words of the representative from Kailua-Kona entered into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Alcos rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Ward be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, again, still in opposition. I appreciate the position of pedestrians' rights. But when there's a three-ton vehicle that's on the other side of that particular individual, whether you weigh 100 or 200 lbs., there's no contest. So having pedestrians' rights to freely move wherever they want to move I think is missing the whole point of what safety is.

"If people didn't think this was an issue, we wouldn't have the crime and all the other things that are going on, what people are saying that we are soft on whatever we say in terms of regulations. And to go to the point of saying that this is best for pedestrians when we've killed so many of them in crosswalks, we're going to now.

"And this is the bottom line. We're going to be responsible when these people start dying in jaywalking. Because we're going to allow it and say it's going to encourage it. When things get legal, they get encouraged to change your behavior. And if you want to change your behavior to endanger people,

that's not our job. Our first job as elected officials is the safety and the security of our population. And that's what we said when we did the constitutional oath. Giving jaywalking another opportunity to be free to cross anytime, anywhere, I think is just nonsensical. Thank you."

Representative Hussey-Burdick rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I just want to clarify for the record that this bill does not allow jaywalkers or pedestrians to cross the street at any time, any place, anywhere with a 300 lb. vehicle in the road. This bill only allows them to act against the statewide traffic code when a reasonably careful pedestrian would determine that there is no immediate danger of a collision with a moving vehicle, which is something that I might venture to say every single one of us in this room has done at some point in our life. It just makes it so it's not criminalized and it doesn't ruin people's lives because of that. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 926, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PEDESTRIANS," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading, with Representative Matsumoto voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, Souza, and Ward voting no.

Currently, the law says that you have to be alive to vote and you can't be a felon to vote. I don't believe it's a good idea to allow felons or dead people to vote, because on the voting day, that's when it's most important, versus the day that they mail it in. So, I will be voting no."

Representative Quinlan rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support, Mr. Speaker. It strikes me, Mr. Speaker, that if our members of the military can vote while they are overseas, why can't we vote from the kingdom of heaven? Thank you."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"To clarify the remarks of the representative from District 39, those who have a felony conviction on their record and who are no longer on probation may absolutely vote in the State of Hawai'i. This bill does make some technical clarifications, but it kind of standardizes what we already know to be true. That if you vote, you put it in the mail, you expect your vote to be cast. Thank you."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Alcos rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. "The primary industrial method for generating 95% of hydrogen is the in steam methane reforming method, where methane is reacted with steam to produce hydrogen. Methane use and loss are real concerns. To act responsibly, we must in advance ask, where does the reaction energy come from and how much methane can escape the process? I remind you that methane accounts for 30% of global greenhouse effect and is 80 times more potent than carbon dioxide.

"Let me be very clear here. Globally, 95% of all hydrogen is produced by the methane SMR process. We must act with knowledge and forethought, not simply assume hydrogen is a clean fuel. We must be cautious about details. And as a body, we must understand the science as well as the economics, so that we do not do more harm than good. And as do most of you, I support clean energy. Let us just make sure that we understand what clean energy really means and act accordingly. Thank you."

And I would only end with saying that let's keep the solidarity up and with the saying, *slava Ukraini*. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tam's written remarks are as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support.

"Our neighborhoods are comprised of *kūpuna*, *keiki*, and working families. Unfortunately, they are negatively impacted by the noise created by loud, modified mufflers. These mufflers create unnecessary and harmful noise pollution that have detrimental effects on the health of our communities.

"The European Environmental Agency reports that noise ranks second only to air pollution as the environmental exposure most harmful to public health.

"A Harvard publication states that research has shown that, 'noise pollution not only drives hearing loss, tinnitus, and hypersensitivity to sound, but can cause or exacerbate cardiovascular disease; type 2 diabetes; sleep disturbances; stress; mental health and cognition problems, including memory impairment and attention deficits; childhood learning delays; and low birth weight.'

"As someone that represents a dense neighborhood, my office receives calls and complaints on a weekly and sometimes daily basis by people whose lives are constantly disrupted by traffic noise. Noise pollution is a top priority for my constituents and many citizens.

"In 1977, the Legislature recognized that loud mufflers were a problem and therefore passed Act 79, that became Hawai'i Revised Statutes 291-24.5, which states, 'No person shall use on a public highway, sell, alter or install a muffler which will noticeably increase the noise emitted by a motor vehicle above that emitted by the vehicle as equipped from the factory.' The law further states that "any violation of this section shall constitute a violation and shall be enforceable by police officers.'

"When this law passed, many residents breathed a sigh of relief, but were disappointed as it became obvious that the law was difficult to enforce. SB 587 would assist us to enforce our current existing laws and thereby increase the quality of life for so many of our residents. Therefore, it is essential for us to pass Senate Bill 587."

Representative Gates rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 587, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading, with Representative Garcia voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Ganaden, Gates, Holt, Kila, Lamosao, Poepoe, and Souza voting no, and with Representatives Ichiyama, Ilagan, Sayama, and Woodson being excused.

"Mr. Speaker, I rise on 926, jaywalking. In opposition, of course, as I have consistently been in the past speaking on this. I just want to recall for the members that we had a safe streets rally here about a week or so, 10 days ago. And we all said, hey, we've got to make our streets safer. The McKinley High School student who died being in the crosswalk, the car didn't pay any attention, the truck, *et cetera*.

"So, what we've got here, Mr. Speaker, is safe streets on the one hand, then we've got jaywalking on the other hand. Here's the bottom line. One third of all the fatalities are in the crosswalks or bicycles. The problem is, many people in the crosswalks think that this is their right, which legally it is their right. What we are doing with this bill is saying, hey, you're a jaywalker, you have a right now to go anywhere you want. And the point is, we're having people with the right who are arrogantly crossing the street. Now we're going to allow these same people with a, quote, a jaywalking right, and we're going to say that this is going to have safe streets. Are we talking out of both sides of our mouth, Mr. Speaker? I think so with this bill. Thank you."

Representative Matayoshi rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Reservations, brief comment. Mr. Speaker, I am concerned about this bill. It seems to be placing the burden on the drivers still, when pedestrians are choosing to disregard the statewide traffic code. I don't necessarily have an issue with them doing it using reason and their own judgment when doing this, but if there is an accident, I feel like we're placing too much of a burden on the drivers."

Representative Chun rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kila rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, In opposition. I appreciate the intent of the measure and I understand that historically jaywalking may be rooted in some form of issue of targeting folks. But the way that this bill is written and what it can ensue, I cannot support. I think about the roadways that exist here in Hawai'i that are not similar to Downtown, urban Honolulu.

"In District 44, our main roadway is considered a highway that folks often traverse. But in the sense when we have dilapidated roads, we do not have proper lighting as well in some of these roads, I echo the previous speaker that I feel too much burden may be placed upon the driver, when we already exercise caution with many drivers on top of the road and dealing with folks

who cannot use fair judgment in regards to crossing a road. So, for those reasons, I'm in opposition."

Representative Souza rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No vote, Mr. Speaker, and I echo the sentiment of the previous two speakers and would also like to reiterate that the traffic code is in place for a reason. And although I can understand the freedom of walking concept and the convenience that this bill would offer pedestrians, I have to vote no on this measure. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and S.B. If we legalize these test strips, we have a chance of least keeping some people alive, Mr. Speaker. And that's what this bill is all about. If we have this in Longs and CVS, because it's immediately effective upon approval, we will save some lives. This is a very serious, a very good

bill, and something that I hope the 18- to 45-year-olds will be very, very cognizant of. Thank you."

Representative Kahaloa rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support and may I adopt the words from the representative from Hawai'i Kai," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Lamosao rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Same request," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Instead of posting a possible starting wage, or various wages for possible categories of said position, because of so many variables, it is very difficult for a business to do so. Hiring or even firing, is time consuming.

"So that is why the interview process is so important. And since all potential prospects are individuals and individually unique 'hand cuffing' a business in this hiring process can have devastating effects on the success of said business.

"Is the posted wage too low to attract good employees, or too high that it discourages possible good employees that have untapped skills and talent? This is just a sample of the possible problems this bill creates.

"Also, competition and/or competitors can use this information against said business. Exposing the possible vulnerability of a business, to outright 'steal' a prospective employee is at stake.

"Like I mentioned, just too many variables and possible unforeseen consequences may occur, so I stand in opposition. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Pierick rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. The rub here, Mr. Speaker, is that this particular bill says that we shall override where the placement of the buildings are that we gave to OHA in lieu of the \$200 million that we owed them.

"I want to bring to the members' attention that there may be a thousand, maybe a few hundred, whose view may be blocked by this particular Kaka'ako Makai by OHA. But I would remind the members that there are 250,000 Hawaiians in Hawai'i and there are over 250,000 Hawaiians on the mainland. So, it's a few hundred or a thousand versus 500,000 people of which OHA was created for their, they are the benefactors of OHA.

"So, if we don't allow them to build, we are in effect denying, as we did, and I know it's controversial, but I'm going to equate this to the Mauna Kea. It's not about whether you build or not, it's whether you can tell the Hawaiians what to do and what not to do, Mr. Speaker."

At 1:15 p.m., Representative Nakamura requested a recess and the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 1:20 p.m.

Representative Tarnas rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you. Speaking in support of Senate Bill 1417. I just want to bring the attention of the members back to the purpose of the bill, which is actually to do what any good planner would suggest to their client, and that is that the Hawai'i Community Development Authority must consider the impacts of climate change, sea level rise, and climate resilient development in the design and siting of buildings. HCDA has four different community development districts. These are the two that would actually, are close enough to the coast that it would have potential impacts from sea level rise and climate change. And so, this is not so restrictive other than it is good advice to HCDA as they make their plans for use of these areas. And as a planner, like I say, this is good advice that any good planner would give to their client. So, I think that it's a measure that deserves support from the members. Thanks very much."

Representative Alcos rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Ward be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. After the conversation here on the floor after second reading, I attempted to get some clarification from the Hawai'i Community Development Authority in their testimony in the Judiciary Committee. They noted that, of course if we were to pass this, they would just develop implementation rules. Also, we asked if there was any objection from the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, they did not offer testimony on this measure. I think that the discussion brought up by the gentleman from District 18 is separate from the ideals encapsulated in this measure. Thank you."

Representative Tam rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Tarnas be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Souza rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Same request. And I will add as well that if we don't take this into consideration and what this bill purports, then I don't know what the alternative would be, that we just don't consider climate impact on these two development areas out of the four and we end up with more problems in the long run with erosion and all the different issues that we're currently experiencing on our shoreline properties right now. So, thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you. Same request, I'd like to ask for the words of the Judiciary Chair and previous speakers be entered into the Journal as my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

"In opposition. I'd like to have all the words of representative from Hawai'i Kai added to the Journal as if they were my own."

Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Because I think we've seen people wanting to do special purpose revenue bonds despite us last year putting a five-year moratorium through Act 182 to stop SPRBs and other things up until 2028.

"We only have \$360 million a year to put towards private activities, and I think our commitment here is that all of it should go to affordable housing. I think some of us were very much interested in the GM 3 that came down asking for \$200 million to go to other things other than affordable housing. So, I think this is a very, very important and timely resolution to reaffirm this House's commitment to affordable housing and to show that we are committed to making sure the pipeline continues and that all \$360 million of our private activity bond cap goes to affordable housing. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

"In strong support. May the words of the Housing chair be entered into the Journal as my own. And I just want to thank and acknowledge the Housing chair for his strong advocacy on this point, that without this resolution and the clear intention of this House, if we don't do this, then we are going to see much less affordable housing built in our state. So, thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Quinlan rose to speak in support of both measures, stating:

We should not only rely on the Budget and Finance to do the screening, but we ourselves, the Legislature, should screen more carefully as to which special purpose revenue bonds get approved. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose in support of both measures and asked that the remarks of Representative Kobayashi be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The problem with these unlicensed illegal care homes is that they pay no taxes for their illegal business. There is no criminal background checks for these people that run these illegal businesses. A murderer or a rapist could be running these illegal care homes. Their patients are *kūpuna* and disabled. They also do not have liability insurance, which is required by the state for all licensed community care homes. There are no annual or unannounced visits by either the Department of Health or the Department of Human Services, which is required for the legal certified and licensed care homes.

"These illegal care homes charge private pay clients between \$6,000 to \$15,000 a month. Once these *kūpuna* and disabled run out of money, they're kicked out of these illegal care homes. These patients then qualify for Medicaid and go to an approved Medicaid care home.

"This bill is the right thing to do. We need to close these illegal care homes, we need to tax them, we need to protect our *kūpuna* and our disabled. This bill will do it. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Souza rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support, Mr. Speaker. May the words from the representative from Kalihi be inserted into the Journal as my own. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Same request," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1378, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO UNLICENSED CARE HOMES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Nishimoto being excused.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm trying to fathom in which way this bill would make electricity more expensive. This is an energy efficiency measure that establishes efficiency standards to add to our existing state level efficiency standards for certain appliances. One of them has some additional upfront costs. The other, I think, three on the list have no additional upfront costs, so it's immediate savings for the consumer. It reduces their electric bills by reducing electricity use, and it reduces that burden overall on the whole system, which is good for all ratepayers.

"It's a win-win that was broadly supported even by appliance producers. There's been a lot of work put in to figure out which appliances are the appropriate ones to tackle first. And yeah, it will not increase electricity bills in any way or rates. Thanks."

Representative Marten rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support, may I have words of the representative from Kona entered into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Souza rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support, same request. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Strong support, same request," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. I strongly support our University of Hawai'i students and their mental health and wellness, and therefore I strongly support this measure. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Strong support, and I'd like the words of the representative from Kapolei entered into the Journal as if they were my own. I'd also like to add that students on Hawai'i Island can't access mental healthcare and I think that this is a really great step into providing that," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

I just wanted to share that this is a measure that would regulate e-cigarettes, as they remain to be the only tobacco product unregulated in the state. This measure would subject e-cigarettes to the current regulations that apply to cigarettes and other tobacco products. This includes taxation, the restriction of online sales, and requiring permitting and licensing.

"Five years ago, the U.S. Surgeon General declared e-cigarette use among youth as an epidemic. In 2022, national e-cigarette use among high school students was 14.1%. Here in Hawai'i, it is 31%. For U.S. middle schoolers, it was 3.3%, while in Hawai'i, it is 18%. So, we know the statistics, we've heard from our youth, we've seen the stories. Now is the time for us, this is our only remaining bill to regulate e-cigarettes. And I hope my colleagues join me in supporting this measure. *Mahalo*."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 975, SD 2, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Todd being excused.

"This would be a working group with all the various stakeholders that play one part or another in serving this community and in interacting as part of the community, whether they be resource caregivers or birth families or nonprofits. And I just think that this is a great investment in helping us reform Child Welfare Services and use their expanded budget well. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 295, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE CHILD WELFARE SERVICES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Todd being excused.

Representative Souza rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations. I strongly support the intent of this bill, however, I do have some concerns as to its implementation. In its execution, it may be difficult to have such a stringent policy in place across the board for all of our law enforcement agencies. In Judiciary and its most recent testimony to the Finance Committee, HPD stated that it currently has policies and procedures in place that either meet or exceed those proposed in the bill, including reasonableness in its use of force, a duty to intervene with regard to unlawful use of force, and use of force training and reporting.

"The requirement in this bill that a law enforcement officer intercede when present and observing another law enforcement officer using force that is clearly beyond that which is necessary, as determined by an objectively reasonable law enforcement officer under the circumstances, taking into account the possibility that other law enforcement officers may have additional information regarding the threat posed by a subject, could present a gray area. Many instances of perceptions of excessive force could go either way, and hence it has oftentimes been left to the courts to determine if excessive force were used in each circumstance that rose to a litigious level.

"I caution that a mistake of fact scenario could lead to unintended outcomes due to the duty to intercede, as the objectively reasonable officer may not have all the facts necessary to make a proper split-second decision as to whether to intervene, and in some instances could create more chaos by intervening where it is not necessary or could even present more danger.

"I will also note that SHOPO is in strong opposition to this bill, stating in their testimony that this bill continues to add unnecessary scrutiny and burden on our police officers when multi layers of safeguards are already in place that hold each and every county police officer accountable for their individual actions and omissions, both administratively and criminally. For these reasons, I am hesitant to give my full support to this measure as written due to the logistical burdens. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 151, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LAW ENFORCEMENT REFORM," passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives

Matsumoto and Souza voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, and Ward voting no, and with Representative Todd being excused.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2104) recommending that S.B. No. 821, SD 1, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 821, SD 1, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Souza rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. There have been several good fireworks bills introduced this session, but those bills were piecemeal approaches to combating illegal fireworks and would likely remain fruitless in its execution if we do not have a strategic plan in place to combat the fireworks issue comprehensively, engaging all stakeholders and enforcement agencies.

"One of the top complaints I received from my constituents in Kapolei and Makakilo pertains to illegal fireworks. They are tired of fireworks laws that are on the books but do little to deter people from obtaining illegal fireworks and creating havoc in our communities with their loud booms at all hours of the day. Illegal fireworks continue to be a nuisance for our community members, and I strongly support this attempt to establish an illegal fireworks taskforce for the peace and enjoyment of our communities. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 821, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FIREWORKS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Todd being excused.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2106) recommending that S.B. No. 1490, SD 1, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1490, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE EMPLOYEES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Todd being excused.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2117) recommending that S.B. No. 1286, SD 1, HD 2 pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 1286, SD 1, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Hussey-Burdick rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1286, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Hussey-Burdick voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Todd being excused.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2118) recommending that S.B. No. 44, SD 2, HD 2, as amended in HD 3, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 44, SD 2, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE WATER CODE PENALTIES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Garcia voting no, and with Representative Todd being excused.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2119) recommending that S.B. No. 1064, SD 2, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 1064, SD 2, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Souza rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. I think this is a good dam bill that fortunately rises to the level of a damn good bill, and I'd be damned if I didn't stand up and speak on this particular measure. Thank you to the senator from Maui for introducing this measure and highlighting the importance of dam safety legislation.

"For those of us on this floor who, as a 1L at Richardson, took first semester Civil Procedure with Professor Yamamoto, we read the Buffalo Creek Disaster, the harrowing true story of the coal slurry impoundment dam in Logan County, West Virginia, bursting and unleashing 132 million gallons of black wastewater, ravaging through 16 coal towns, killing 125 men, women, and children, injuring over 1,000 people, and leaving 4,000 people homeless.

"The Buffalo Mining Company operated the dam under the parent company Pittston Coal. For our class purpose, the Buffalo Creek Disaster was a lesson in piercing the corporate veil and allowed Pittston Coal to be sued as stockholders as a parent company. My takeaway was that dams are dangerous. Without proper maintenance, it can wreak havoc, which in that instance, Pittston Coal tried to argue that the bursting was an 'Act of God.' But in reality, the situation was simply preventable.

"In 2006, a dam privately owned by a local businessman broke on Kaua'i, killing seven people. The Ka Loko Dam disaster unleashed an estimated 400 million gallons on the community nearby. Dams are dangerous if not upkeep. Therefore, I wholeheartedly support this grant program in this bill. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1064, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DAM AND APPURTENANCE SAFETY," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Todd being excused.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2120) recommending that S.B. No. 1332, SD 1, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1332, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Todd being excused.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2121) recommending that S.B. No. 1296, SD 2, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 1296, SD 2, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No, please. So, this measure would expand the government by creating more government. And so, I'm not in support of that. I believe that we should decrease the government and decrease the state budget and decrease taxes."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1296, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DESIGNATED ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Pierick voting no, and with Representative Todd being excused.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2122) recommending that S.B. No. 419, SD 1, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1520, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAII PACIFIC HYDROGEN HUB," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Amato voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Todd being excused.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2126) recommending that S.B. No. 458, SD 2, HD 2, as amended in HD 3, pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 458, SD 2, HD 3 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Souza rose to disclose a potential conflict of interest, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, request for a ruling on a potential conflict. My brother is an OHA trustee, and this bill would provide a percentage of geothermal royalties to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs."

The Chair addressed Representative Souza, stating:

"No conflict, ruling stands till *sine die*, unless your circumstances changes."

Representative Poepoe rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 458, SD 2, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GEOTHERMAL ROYALTIES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 41 ayes to 9 noes, with Representative Poepoe voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Alcos, Ganaden, Garcia, Kahaloa, Kapela, Kila, Matsumoto, Pierick, and Ward voting no, and with Representative Todd being excused.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2127) recommending that S.B. No. 504, SD 1, HD 2, as amended in HD 3, pass Third Reading.

"Thank you again, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. This is important legislation that will help halt PFAS, harmful forever chemicals. I would like to point out that there is still so much to learn about PFAS and the Environmental Protection Agency has a strategic roadmap in place to protect the environment and people from PFAS that was implemented in October 2021.

"EPA's three main goals related to PFAS are research, restrict, and remediate. Research to increase understanding, restrict to proactively prevent PFAS from entering air, land, and water at levels that can adversely impact human health and the environment, and remediate, broadening and accelerating the cleanup of PFAS contamination to protect human health and ecological systems. This bill will help with preventative measures and restrict PFAS from continuing its harmful effects in line with the current work of the EPA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 504, SD 1, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION," passed Third Reading by a vote of 44 ayes to 6 noes, with Representative Matsumoto voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Aiu, Garcia, Kila, Kong, Lamosao, and Pierick voting no, and with Representative Todd being excused.

Solutions have been presented from banning vacation rentals or limiting the sale of property to residents only, but none of those solutions will get us close to solving this crisis. I appreciate the introducer for presenting a bold solution such as this one to get our families into housing and I support this pilot project as it has shown promise."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 865, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOUSING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 3 noes, with Representative Hussey-Burdick voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Cochran, Kapela, and Perruso voting no, and with Representative Todd being excused.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2132) recommending that S.B. No. 898, SD 2, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 898, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO KUPUNA HOUSING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Pierick voting no, and with Representative Todd being excused.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2134) recommending that S.B. No. 1596, SD 1, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1596, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SCHOOL CAMPUSES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Pierick voting no, and with Representative Todd being excused.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2136) recommending that S.B. No. 1136, SD 1, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1136, SD 1, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO STATE PARKS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Todd being excused.

Representative Souza rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you again, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. Thank you to the senator from Moloka'i for introducing this important legislation for residents there. My roots are in Moloka'i and I have *'ohana* that still lives there. We have to make commuting to and from Moloka'i more accessible for its residents. And lowering passenger tickets and encouraging airlines to enter the market at Moloka'i Airport will help with that. Thank you."

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No, please. So, this measure would help an airline company get to and fro from Moloka'i. I think that's a good thing that we have airfare for our residents. At the same time, if a business is struggling, I don't believe it's the taxpayer's role to bail out that company. Whether it's a car company, a small business, or an airline, I don't think the tax dollars should be funding the

economy by bailing out a business. I think the business should improve their operation to stay afloat or to stay in flight. So, I'll be voting no."

Representative Souza rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, again rising in strong support. I would like to note that the representative from Hoopili is misstating the purpose and intent of the bill. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 784, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AIRLINES," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Pierick voting no, and with Representative Todd being excused.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2140) recommending that S.B. No. 941, SD 2, HD 1 pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 764, SD 1, HD 3, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AFFORDABLE HOUSING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Kapela and Perruso voting no, and with Representative Todd being excused.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2143) recommending that S.B. No. 725, SD 2, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 725, SD 2, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Garrett rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. As many of you know, before joining this body, I had the privilege of serving as the deputy director of the Department of Human Resources Development in the prior administration. One of my proudest accomplishments during my tenure at DHRD was successfully transitioning thousands of state employees to telework during the early phases of the pandemic.

"Through the governor's stay at home orders, telework allowed us to keep government operating while keeping our employees safe during the course of the public health emergency. Although I oppose this bill for reasons I'll get into shortly, I want to make it very clear that I'm a strong proponent of telework. Among other things, it helps employees achieve work-life balance and protects our planet by keeping cars off the road. I'm convinced that telework is here to stay. It's a very powerful recruitment and retention tool and something that public employers, like the State of Hawai'i, must offer to stay competitive with the private sector.

"Mr. Speaker, from my experience, telework is predicated on two things, communication and trust. Managers have to be clear in communicating their expectations and have to trust that their employees are responsible enough to complete their tasks without constant supervision. Conversely, employees have to understand that working from home or a remote site is a privilege, not a right, and that those who violate that should expect to have that privilege revoked.

"My objections pertain primarily to the poorly defined telework monitoring system that's included in this bill. In your Committee on Finance, it was shared with us that such a system can cost upwards of \$1 million per department, yet it's not exactly clear what it would accomplish for such an exorbitant amount.

"Mr. Speaker, I opined in your Committee on Finance that this bill is a solution in search of a problem, and my feelings have not changed. If there are productivity issues with employees who are teleworking, rather than implementing a costly system that would potentially violate the privacy of state employees, the easy no-cost solution, as in free, is to simply bring them back to the office.

"There's also the important issue of respecting the collective bargaining process. As the DHRD deputy, I sat through numerous negotiation sessions, and in my opinion, modifying work conditions by utilizing this type of system must be negotiated by the employer and the exclusive representative of each of the various bargaining units.

"Lastly, Mr. Speaker, it's no secret that the executive branch continues to have challenges filling thousands of vacant positions. Despite the challenges that COVID presented, I personally regret that we weren't able to make more progress on this front while I was there. But as we emerge out of the pandemic, I believe DHRD must remain singularly focused on recruiting qualified candidates to fill those vacancies. Tasking them with procuring and implementing a telework monitoring system, as outlined in this bill, is an unnecessary distraction from their core mission. So, for these reasons, Mr. Speaker, I oppose this bill and encourage my colleagues to do the same. Thank you."

Representative Hussey-Burdick rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Amato rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Garrett be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ganaden rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Garrett be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Marten rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Garrett be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Aiu rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Garrett be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Matayoshi rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I agree with the previous speaker that telework is an important aspect that we need to start looking into. This bill, when it came over to us from the Senate, did have a lot of issues, I thought. But the House's position, I think, is much smaller. And what it's meant to do is convince the more traditional managers in the state government, and some of the people here in this building too, that telework is an effective policy that does not lead to a decrease in productivity.

"While I can appreciate the state's current telework policy, and I think it's a good one, it does leave a lot of options open and discretion open to various departments and various managers. In order to convince the managers and certain department heads that teleworking is an effective policy, because I do agree that it can be a powerful recruitment tool for state government, I think we need more data. And that's what this bill aims to do.

"One of the things that this bill aims to do is to require a report to the State Legislature of various aspects, and some of those are aspects such as how many positions a department feels that can telework effectively, and how many of those positions are teleworking effectively. It's holding certain departments accountable for actually implementing this teleworking policy.

"Another thing that the House put in is training generally for all managers throughout the state to allow them to more effectively manage teleworking employees. Now, teleworking has been around for a while, that's why it's called telework not internet work, but I think the older school managers are not used to managing employees that don't have their butts in their seats where they can't walk by their desk at any time to kind of look over their shoulder. And while I think my generation and then the younger generations agree that that's not necessary, I think certain older managers have a mindset that butts in seats is how you manage. We want to move away from that. And I think the only way we can convince them to move away from this is

to give them data. And again, that's what this bill manages to do, and to manage and train these managers to effectively manage the productivity of teleworking employees.

"This bill originally was meant to implement this telework monitoring program on all departments. We've pared it down to a kind of a pilot program of three departments that are willing and kind of eager to implement a telework policy. And I think that by showing the teleworking policy can work effectively on a wider scale from these three departments and getting the data to back this up, we can convince other departments to follow suit, other managers to follow suit, and spread the teleworking policy implementation throughout the state. And again, I do agree that it would be a great recruitment tool to fill all these vacancies. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kahaloa rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Garrett be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Lamosao rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Garrett be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Kila rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Garrett be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Souza rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Chun rose in opposition to the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Garrett be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 725, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TELEWORKING," passed Third Reading by a vote of 33 ayes to 17 noes, with Representatives Hussey-Burdick and Souza voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Aiu, Alcos, Amato, Chun, Evslin, Garcia, Garrett, Gates, Holt, Kahaloa, Kapela, Kila, La Chica, Lamosao, Martinez, Poepoe, and Takenouchi voting no, and with Representative Todd being excused.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2144) recommending that S.B. No. 1522, SD 2, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 1522, SD 2, HD 2 pass Third Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Souza rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. I am not sure if this is the best way to go about pivoting from a focus on strictly marketing Hawai'i and a strong emphasis on tourism to managing tourism in a different way. But this is what we have on the table before us, and we should see if this route will produce better results and a greater tolerance for tourism from our resident's perspective.

"I do take issue with the tourism liaison officer position that this bill will establish within the Office of the Governor. For consistency purposes, the name of this position should be destination management liaison officer, because if the agency has a stale name, as the representative from Hawai'i Kai has already pointed to on previous occasion, so too shall this newly formed position. Some of the functions of this position should be best left to the executive director of destination management, and some functions could probably be designated to current policy folks already on the fifth floor. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in strong opposition. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm going to quote our good friend Paul Brewbaker from UHERO, UHERO is the UH research office that does a lot of the economic development, and many of those members are part of our Council on Revenues, the guys who know what's happening in the area. The point is, Brewbaker argues that, as I will, that this bill will not improve tourism in Hawai'i.

"HTA has accomplished its initial task of marketing our state with flying colors. Yet, as I've spoken many times on the floor, it has been now us to punish them for succeeding. That's taking merit and turning it on its head, Mr. Speaker. As conditions and sentiments change, so has their focus. The HTA has begun an aggressive pivot to existing island-specific destination management, repeat, destination management, not marketing and getting more visitors beyond the \$10 million mark.

"So, has the HTA in need of change? Of course, it does. As Mr. Brewbaker says, the governance model is one of those, and its cost-cutting impact is another one. But should we be playing with the biggest economic variable that keeps Hawai'i alive, Mr. Speaker? It's military spending and tourism, yet we're playing around with it. We're mucking around with something that is very vital to the very existence of each of our districts. As HTA President John De Fries said last week, this measure is like throwing out the baby and keeping the bathwater. That's direct from the Finance Committee testimony.

"Mr. Speaker, the bottom line is, in the initial UHERO position, is that we've got to get our history straight. According to Mr. Brewbaker, HTA was established as a destination management organization, not just a destination marketing organization. So, management is already part of its history, of its origins, of its purpose. And another key point I want to mention from Mr. Brewbaker is that, under De Fries, the new director, HTA produced a destination management action plan for each island to 'rebuild, redefine and reset and tourism's direction.' Basically, the essence of what this bill is by throwing the baby out and keeping the bath. And that's over a three-year period, which has already begun. HTA calls it a regenerative model of tourism, regenerative meaning to bring life back to it in a controllable way.

"Mr. Brewbaker continues by saying, SB 1522, Mr. Speaker, the bill before us on this floor, it proposes to 'dissolve' the Hawai'i Tourism Authority and create a new tourism agency because some state lawmakers claim that the HTA has 'failed to effectively execute its duties to manage the tourism marketing plan for the State.' The bill cites evidence of 'mismanagement' by the HTA in the failed award of the \$34 million U.S. marketing contract. It demonstrates HTA's noncompliance with the Hawai'i public procurement code. Which to my way of thinking is a mistake, by the way that DBEDT flubbed the marketing, not HTA, that was a DBEDT fault.

"Continuing with Mr. Brewbaker, he said, if passed, this bill, SB 1522, SD 2, would establish an Office of Tourism and Destination Management within DBEDT for administrative purposes. It would be governed by a nine-member unpaid board of directors appointed by the governor.

"Mr. Speaker, what does government do well? It often does very poorly in business, and it politicizes, because it puts it under the governor to appoint the people and under DBEDT to run it, of which has done a very, very difficult job of where we are now because of the way that one particular gentleman who has retired couldn't get the contract straight between two competing entities.

"The point is, when politicians get involved in economics, economics go south. Not only does Mr. Brewbaker chime in on this, so does the Honolulu Advertiser that he cites. He says the Honolulu Star-Advertiser editors opine that creating a new agency while tourism is moving in a new direction is not a good idea. A better idea is to fix HTA.

"Mr. Speaker, I think that's what we need to do, put our heads together and fix it instead of, again, using Mr. De Fries—"

Representative Pierick rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"So, the editors of the Honolulu Advertiser said it's a better idea to fix the Hawai'i Tourism Authority. Fix it means put your heads together, find out what's going right, what's going wrong, rather than, again, keeping the water and throwing the baby out.

"The bottom line, I think, Mr. Speaker, is summarized somewhat by this quote from Mr. Brewbaker. Instead of rushing into a decision that holds little promise of success, what is needed is a cool-headed look at how Hawai'i can craft a new tourism governance system that will actually work. Hawai'i is not alone in trying to fix its destination governance system, other destinations are doing the same, and some, especially in Europe, have a head start on us. We can benefit from studying other destinations such as Europe

and how they're doing. There was a bill, HB 1381, at the Legislature that proposes to do just that, but it didn't get a hearing and, thus, died during the session. Repealing HTA without an improved replacement is unwise.

"I repeat, Mr. Speaker, repealing HTA without an improved replacement is unwise. Unwise does not impute motive, but it does say it's a bad policy which is in this bill. Mr. Speaker, let's keep HTA alive and keep the baby alive with it. Thank you."

Representative Quinlan rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support. Ten million visitors a year, Mr. Speaker. Depending on where you stand on this issue, that's either a fantastic number or a terrifying one. And we got there in a very short span of time. And it's not just the sheer raw number of visitors, Mr. Speaker. It's that the visitor has changed. The type of vacations that people like to go on has changed. Thanks to social media, Instagram, and its ilk, there are no hidden local places anymore. There is no such thing as privileged local knowledge. There are so many places in all of our communities that were previously reserved only for us and are now inundated day after day by tourists who want to have an authentic vacation. And that's really what it comes down to, right, is having an authentic vacation.

"But, Mr. Speaker, we are not Disneyworld, even if we cost more than Disney World. And we have to make sure that we set expectations for our visitors. Mr. Speaker, destination management is not just a bunch of words thrown together. Destination management is an investment in our local communities. Destination management is the idea that when push comes to shove, we should put the taxpayer first and put people over profits. Mr. Speaker, while I appreciate the comments of my colleague from Hawai'i Kai, I'd just like to close with this. The fault, dear Brutus, lies not in our stars, but in ourselves. Thank you."

Representative Kahaloa rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I left out a couple of very important points. One was when times were in trouble in 2008, when the economy dipped, we cheered HTA. Come on, guys, get more people here, let them spend more money. We don't want you beer budget guys, we want champagne spenders. And it worked. The point is, those are the guys who put their foot on the accelerator, they are the ones who will know how to take it off, Mr. Speaker. That's one point that I failed to mention.

"The second thing is, the unkindest, using the Shakespearean notion, the unkindest cut of all is that the budget is cut 50%. So, if we want to do a good job, whether we're reversing it with this bill or with the old way of doing it, the HTA as it is now, why are we cutting the budget to do something of which we've got to turn a huge ship around and expect it's going to be on a diet budget. Mr. Speaker, it does doesn't make sense.

"So, this bill, I think it's good. We can tell our constituents, hey, we're going to keep cars out of your place, there's going to be less Airbnb. We're getting a nice virtue signaling to those people who vote for us. But in terms of substantive economic intellectual development, I think we're taking a step backwards, Mr. Speaker. So, we get a virtue signal out of this, but in terms of substantive development, this bill will be regretted. Thank you."

Representative Garrett rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kila rose in support of the measure with reservations and asked that the remarks of Representative Quinlan be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1522, SD 2, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT," passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Garrett, Kahaloa, and Kila voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, Matsumoto, Pierick, and Ward voting no, and with Representative Todd being excused.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2146) recommending that S.B. No. 627, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 627, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAMPAIGN FINANCE," passed Third Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Garcia voting no, and with Representative Todd being excused.

Representative Yamashita, for the Committee on Finance, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2147) recommending that S.B. No. 682, SD 1, HD 1, as amended in HD 2, pass Third Reading.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 682, SD 1, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ANIMAL FUR PRODUCTS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 45 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, Kong, Pierick, and Ward voting no, and with Representative Todd being excused.

"In opposition. So, this measure would curtail our Second Amendment rights. At the same time, we've taken an oath of office to defend the Constitution. So, if the Second Amendment says we shall not infringe this, we can't vote yes on this measure, at least I believe I can't vote yes on this measure in good conscience, knowing that I took an oath to defend the Constitution on January 18th. Thank you"

Representative Tarnas rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. Thank you. This measure was carefully crafted in order to make sure that we do comply with the U.S. Supreme Court decision, the *Bruen* case, where we are allowed to set up a reasonable system of regulation for concealed carry weapons. And we crafted this with that in mind so the members here would be able to vote in support of this and also recognize that we are being consistent with the Second Amendment. Thank you very much."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. I'd just like the words of the representative from Waimea inserted into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Tam rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Same request," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you. In strong support."

32nd LEGISLATURE, REGULAR SESSION OF 2023 JOINT HOUSE and SENATE COMMITTEES ON CONFERENCE PROCEDURES

The Senate and the House have agreed to the following special procedures for all 2023 Regular Session Committees on Conference. These Conference procedures shall be effective from 8:00 a.m. on Monday, April 17, 2023, until 11:59 p.m. on Friday, April 28, 2023.

1. Definitions

For purposes of these procedures:

"Chairs" refers to all of the designated chairs and co-chairs of a Conference Committee.

"Conference Committee" refers to the conference of the House Committee and the Senate Committee assigned by their respective chamber to resolve the differences between the House and the Senate over a particular measure.

"Lead chair" refers to the chair of the House Committee or the Senate Committee who is listed first on the Action Sheets, as provided by the respective chamber.

"Lead committee staff" refers to the staff of the lead Chair from the chamber from which the measure in conference originated.

"Managers" refers to all members of the House and Senate assigned to a Conference Committee.

2. Conference Committee Scope and Amendments

The authority of the Conference Committee shall be limited to resolving differences between the Senate and House drafts of a measure.

- a. With the exception of the Executive Budget, the Judiciary Budget, and the Budget of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, a Conference Committee shall not amend a measure by inserting any unrelated or new subject matter.
- b. To assure the integrity of individual measures, the merging of two or more distinct but related measures into one encompassing measure shall not be allowed.

3. Conference Committee Meeting Times and Places

Conference Committee deliberations shall take place only between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 9:00 p.m.

A Conference Committee shall meet in the conference room assigned or reserved, pursuant to the Conference Room Scheduling Procedures and Guidelines and Room Assignment Schedule, as attached.

4. Initial Public-Meeting Notice

The electronic signatures of all chairs shall be obtained before the notice of an initial meeting is posted or distributed. Prior to offering the initial

meeting notice for signatures, the chairs shall consult with one another on the information to be included in the notice.

Chairs shall provide at least 24-hours public notice of the first meeting of the Conference Committee and are strongly encouraged to provide more than 24-hours notice whenever possible. Written notices shall be submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk and the House Sergeant-at-Arms for posting on the Legislature's website and distribution. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.

5. Notice of Subsequent Meetings

- a. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting but the lead chairs of both chambers agree to meet again before 9:00 pm on the same day, the lead chairs of both chambers shall publicly announce at the meeting the time and place at which the Conference Committee will reconvene. A new meeting notice of the reconvening of the Conference Committee on the same day is not required. However, a marked-up copy of the notice indicating the time and place of the subsequent meeting shall be submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk or the House Sergeant-at-Arms as soon as possible for updating individual bill status on the Legislature's website. The lead committee staff shall post a copy of this marked-up notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the subsequent meeting.
- b. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting but the lead chairs of both chambers agree to meet on another day, the lead chairs of both chambers shall publicly announce at the meeting the date(s), time(s), and place of the subsequent meeting(s), and submit written notice to the Senate Chief Clerk or the House Sergeant-at-Arms for posting on the Legislature's website. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.
- c. If agreement is not reached at a duly noticed meeting and the date(s), time(s), and place of future meetings are not publicly announced at that noticed meeting, chairs shall ensure that a written meeting notice, signed electronically by the lead chairs of their respective chamber, is submitted to the Senate Chief Clerk or the House Sergeant-at-Arms for posting on the Legislature's website at least 24 hours in advance of the next meeting of the Conference Committee. The lead committee staff shall post the notice adjacent to the door of the assigned conference room at the time of the meeting.

6. Attendance at Meetings

- a. To convene the initial conference committee meeting only the lead House and Senate chair must be present. All other conference committee managers, especially any co-chair, should attempt to be present.
- b. Once a conference has been opened, reconvening of any subsequent meeting of a conference committee shall require the following:
 - i. For the Senate, the lead chair or a co-chair must be present.
 - ii. For the House, the lead chair must be present.
 - iii. All other conference committee managers, especially any co-chair, should attempt to be present at the convening of and during each meeting.
- c. For decision-making at a meeting, a quorum must be present. "A quorum shall be a majority of the House Committee managers and a majority of the Senate Committee managers and shall include the lead House and Senate chair and majority of the chairs of the Conference Committee for their respective chamber." See Section 9.a of the "Procedures." The lead House and Senate chair of the conference committee must be part of this quorum.
- d. For a fiscal measure, the chair or co-chair representing the House Finance Committee and Senate Ways and Means Committee must be present during decision-making and give their approval.

7. Conference Discussion

Except as authorized by the respective chairs, only the respective chairs may speak during conference. All other managers or other authorized persons shall be recognized by their respective chairs before speaking on any issue.

8. Decorum in Conference Committee Meetings and Courtesy to the Public and to the Managers

- a. Managers shall respect the differing views of other managers and conduct themselves in a courteous manner.
- b. Chairs shall ensure that meetings convene and reconvene at scheduled times. If none of the chairs of one of the Committees are present within 15 minutes of the scheduled meeting time, the chairs of the other Committee shall contact the absent chair.
- c. If none of the absent chairs are present within 30 minutes of the scheduled meeting time, the chairs present shall inform the managers and members of public present that the Conference Committee cannot be convened or reconvened, and that, pursuant to 5c of these Committees on Conference Procedures, a 24-hour advance notice shall be provided for a subsequent meeting of the Conference Committee.

9. Decision-making Meeting

The decision-making meeting of a Conference Committee shall comply with the following open meeting provisions:

- a. A quorum of the Conference Committee shall be present for the decision-making meeting. A quorum shall be a majority of the House Committee managers and a majority of the Senate Committee managers and shall include the lead House and Senate chair and majority of the chairs of the Conference Committee for their respective chamber.
- b. To report a measure out of Conference Committee in amended form, Conference Draft (CD), a majority of the quorum of managers for each respective chamber shall vote in favor of the proposed amendments.
- c. The lead chair (or the lead chair's designee) representing their respective chamber shall call the roll and be the recorder of the quorum and the votes on that measure for that chamber. (Sample attached).
- d. If, after naming a Conference Committee on a measure, the Conference Committee managers representing the chamber from which a measure originated agree to the amendments made by the non-originating chamber, only a quorum of those representing the originating chamber shall vote on the agreement at a duly noticed meeting. For example, if after naming a Conference Committee on a House measure, the House managers of the Conference Committee decide to agree to the amendments in the Senate draft (SD) of the measure, then only the House managers of the Conference Committee shall vote on the measure, returning it to the House in its SD form. For such action, only a quorum of the Conference Committee managers representing the chamber from which the measure originated need to be present. The "Record of Votes of a Conference Committee" sheet detailing the votes of the managers of the originating chamber shall be filed with the appropriate chamber without a Conference Committee Report.

10. Conference Committee Reports

- a. A majority of the House and Senate chairs, respectively, of a Conference Committee shall attest to the action of the Conference Committee by physically signing the Conference Committee Report on behalf of their respective managers; provided that no Conference Committee Report concerning a measure with fiscal implications shall be reported out of a Conference Committee without the physical signature of the chair (or the chair's designee) of each fiscal committee to which the measure is referred. The "Record of Votes of a Conference Committee" sheet detailing the votes of the managers of the Conference Committee shall be attached to the report as a part thereof.
- b. All House measures reported out of Conference Committee shall be filed with the House Chief Clerk, and likewise all Senate measures shall be filed with the Senate Chief Clerk. A document filed in the originating chamber shall be deemed simultaneously filed in the other chamber. Only the original Conference Committee Report, with the attached Record of Votes, and the Conference Draft of the measure shall be required for filing.

- c. If the Conference Committee votes to report the measure out, the Committee must file a Conference Committee Report and Conference Draft with the appropriate chamber's Chief Clerk.

11. Decision-making Deadlines

On the deadline nights for Final Decking of both non-fiscal and fiscal bills:

- a. Conference Committees shall conclude their negotiations by **6:00 p.m.** to allow adequate time for final preparation of the bills and Conference Committee Reports.
- b. To provide all chairs with ample opportunity to review and sign the Conference Committee Reports before filing, all Conference Committee Reports shall be available for review and signature by **9:00 p.m.**
- c. All Conference Committee Reports and Conference Drafts of measures shall be filed with the respective Chief Clerk by **11:30 p.m.**

12. Electronic Transfer

Should a Conference Committee for which the vehicle is a Senate bill decide to use a proposal drafted by the House, the House chair shall have the House proposal electronically transferred to the appropriate Senate office so that the Conference Draft can be prepared. The converse shall apply to House bills with proposals drafted by the Senate that the Conference Committee agrees to.

13. Exceptions to these Deadlines and Procedures

Exceptions to these deadlines and other procedures may be made only with the advance written approval of both the Senate President and the House Speaker.

Committees shall make a room reservation with the House Sergeant-at-Arms (for rooms 309, 325, 329) or the Senate Sergeant-at-Arms (rooms for 016, 224, 229) prior to scheduling a conference committee meeting outside of their committee's assigned room or timeslot.

Committees shall not allocate their assigned conference room or timeslot to another committee without first contacting the respective House or Senate Sergeant-at-Arms office.

Representative Garcia rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. Mr. Speaker, this bill will rearrange candidate names on ballots in the name of equity. I firmly believe that this will confuse the voters of Hawai'i and will certainly add doubt and skepticism to the election process. We've been voting for this in this country for the last 247 years, in this state for the last 64 years, and it's always been alphabetical, and it's worked. There's no need to change what's worked for decades. The passage of this bill will only add more technology to our already overly complicated electric voting system. No vote."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 47, HD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ARRANGEMENT OF CANDIDATE NAMES ON BALLOTS," passed Third Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 2 noes, with Representative Matsumoto voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Alcos and Garcia voting no, and with Representatives Pierick and Todd being excused.

Upstairs in the Lieutenant Governor's Office, we have a performance from Professor Jon Osorio and his family, a family of dedicated public servants. We have a panel discussion at 6:00 p.m. in Room 325. And after the event ends, it's Jazz Night right across the street at HiSAM.

"Thank you all for participating. For those of you that didn't, we hope that you can join us next year. There's going to be free pizza delivered to all of your offices. Checked in with Sergeant-at-Arms, you can use your funds to purchase food for anybody who comes by your office and your staff, so don't be stingy. Thanks."

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill No. 921, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to Limitations of Actions."

The purpose of this bill is to extend the deadline to clarify and expressly state that the tolling provision in section 514B-141, Hawaii Revised Statutes, applies to protect the rights of condominium associations to assert legal claims for construction defects against developers until two years after the developer's control of the condominium development is terminated.

This bill is objectionable because it appears to have the unintended consequence of increasing the costs of housing. The bill creates the potential for increased liability which results in the need for additional insurance coverage, which costs are ultimately borne and paid for by the buyers. Our administration is focused on alleviating our critical housing shortage in Hawai'i and we are reluctant to enact any new law that could add costs to housing or delays in construction. While this bill has merit and I commend its sponsors for their work, I am concerned that it will only add costs on future projects, and therefore, have decided to veto this bill.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning Senate Bill No. 921 without my approval.

There are significant opportunities for AI to help solve some of the most pressing challenges facing society, such as improving healthcare, enhancing transportation, and addressing climate change. However, there are also concerns about the potential risks of AI, including its impact on jobs, privacy, security, and fairness.

"In recent years, there has been growing recognition of the need to have informed discussions about the benefits and risks of AI, and the importance of developing policies and regulations to guide its development and deployment. Senate Concurrent Resolution 179 recognizes this need and urges Congress to begin the discussion of the benefits and risks of AI.

"By discussing the potential benefits and risks of AI, policymakers can better understand its implications and develop policies and regulations that promote its responsible use. These discussions may include considerations of issues such as privacy, security, transparency, and accountability.

"Overall, the discussion of the benefits and risks of AI is an important step towards ensuring that AI is developed and deployed in a responsible and ethical manner. Senate Concurrent Resolution 179 highlights the need for such discussions to take place at a national level, and it is an important contribution to the ongoing conversations around AI governance and policy."

It says, whereas, Hawai'i has long been a leader in advancing reproductive rights and advocating for equitable and affordable access to sexual and reproductive health care, *et cetera*. The word equitable is used here. I think that's not a correct term because when we're thinking about the rights of the child, that's not as equally imbalanced with the woman in this case.

"It says in the beginning, reproductive rights. I support contraception. I do not support abortion. The next paragraph says that these rights are consistently threatened. I wonder who's threatening contraception. I know, I support contraception. When they say things like consistently threatened, that kind of gives a rise of like fear or be alarmed. I don't think that the phrase is rightfully used.

"The fourth paragraph says, that whereas, the previous administration made it difficult for insurers to cover abortion care and assembled a Supreme Court whose actions resulted in restricted abortion access. So, it puts the *Roe v. Wade* decision on the fault of the prior administration, presidential administration. I think that 100 senators nationwide voted on the confirmation of our Supreme Court judges that helped the overturning of *Roe v. Wade*. So, I don't think it's fair to blame a prior presidential decision on a judicial decision.

"Also, it says on the second page, top paragraph, that this resolution is in connection to a House Bill that was introduced to help with these insurance measures. Interestingly, that House Bill never even got a hearing. So just a point of record. Thank you."

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Alcos rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kong rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Very much in support. I just want to clarify for anyone who may not understand what reproductive health is. But for anyone who doesn't understand what reproductive health care is, I mean that also covers things like mammograms, it covers cervical exams so that you can check whether or not you have cancer. So I think it's really important that we support reproductive health care in all forms. It's not just abortion care, it's much more."

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support of all of the language used in the resolution. Thank you."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Same request."

Representative Pierick rose to respond, stating:

"In opposition. I have the survey results that I sent out to my constituents asking them the question, at what point do you feel the law should allow abortion? Multiple results or multiple questions. One option was, I do not support abortion, 33 people responded they don't support abortion at all. The other options were at the heart beat you can have an abortion, first trimester, at 12 weeks, once the child is viable as the current Hawai'i Revised Statutes is, the other option was at the end of the second trimester, and then one is up to birth.

"A majority of my constituents selected, I do not support abortion at all, and then a few people selected the other options. I think that's important to note that we're representing our constituents when we give speeches against abortion. I support contraception, I support reproductive health. I don't support, as, to use the words of one of the survey results, 'I don't support murder and neither should you.' That's what my constituents said, and it's my role to represent them in this body."

Representative Alcos rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. Mr. Speaker, this issue been going on for decades already in my community, the noise pollution. I live about a mile and a half away. It starts from 7:00 a.m. in the morning, the noise. And they fire 7,000 rounds or more a day out in that area. The community don't want the noise. I don't think anybody want a rifle range in their community. I think it's long overdue. We do care about the support for our military, but we don't believe that it should be next to a community park, next to the next Hawaiian homes that they're going to build, next to our community, next to our elementary school, and I take my grandkids playing there. And with the lead poisoning that going on into our ocean, I believe that we could find a better location for this firing range. Thank you."

Representative Pierick rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.R. No. 104, HD 1, entitled: "HOUSE RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE RELOCATION OF ALL LIVE FIRE TRAINING AND AVIATION ACTIVITIES AWAY FROM THE PU'ULOA RANGE TRAINING FACILITY," was adopted, with Representative Pierick voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Amato, Ganaden, Hussey-Burdick, and Kong being excused.

ORDER OF THE DAY

SUSPENSION OF RULES

On motion by Representative Morikawa, seconded by Representative Garcia and carried, the rules were suspended for the purpose of considering certain House and Senate Bills for Final Reading by consent calendar. (Representatives Hashem and Ganaden were excused.)

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 1 and S.B. No. 228, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 228, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No, please. So, I think the intent of this bill is excellent. We shouldn't be liars. I think the President of the Senate did well introducing this bill. However, this bill could be misunderstood and misapplied. So, what is truth? If I make a false statement against the state, who's to say that truth is true in that person's eyes?"

"So, let me read the summary of this bill. This bill 'establishes the offense of fraud as a class B felony. Establishes the offense of making a false, fictitious, or fraudulent claim against the State or a county as a class C felony. Establishes the offense of the use of false statements or entries in

matters within the jurisdiction of the executive, legislative, or judicial branches of the State as a class C felony.'

"I think lying is wrong. I think people should always tell the truth. But if my understanding of truth on gender is different than somebody else's truth, are they going to say I'm lying? What if I say elections aren't clean? They say you're lying, you're saying that the state is being falsified because of that statement. I disagree. What if somebody says, well, the chair shouldn't be allowed to defer bills and I say that's wrong and I'm now making a statement that's against the State of Hawai'i and somebody says, that's a false statement, that's a point of disagreement. If I say the government is corrupt and they say you're making a false statement against the government, that's a point of disagreement. If I say the process isn't fair or equitable and somebody challenges that and says you're making a false statement against the state, you should deserve a Class C felony, that's a disagreement.

"All six of our Republican bills didn't pass. And if I say that that's not right because we all went door to door and all of us are trying to represent our constituents and then the system doesn't let the process succeed and I say that system is wrong, and then somebody says, Elijah, you're making a false statement, you deserve a Class C felony. I don't think that's correct. So, I'm voting no against this bill."

Representative Aiu rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, also in opposition. Mr. Speaker, I also have concerns with the use of false statements or entries section of this bill. I think it does open the floodgates to a lot of litigation or a lot of claims in criminal matters based on something that we may not intentionally or otherwise knowingly know it's true that we make these statements. And I do see this as a very chilling effect on otherwise free speech that people would make. Thank you."

Representative Tarnas rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, in support. I just wanted to make it clear that for the fraud sections on this measure, that a person commits the offense of fraud if, with the intent to defraud, the person executes or attempts to execute any scheme or artifice to defraud or for the purpose of obtaining money or property by means of false or fraudulent pretenses, representations, or promises.' So, there has to be a knowing misrepresentation in order for achieving your goal of getting money, for example.

"So, we really modeled this measure after federal statutes, which have been on the books for a long time. So, it's not like we're creating something new. These were modeled after the following federal fraud statutes, the U.S. Code Section 287, which is about false, fictitious, or fraudulent claims. Title 18 of the U.S. Code about false statements and entries. Title 18 of the U.S. Code Section 1341 on mail fraud. The next section, 1343, on wire fraud, and the next section, 1344, on bank fraud.

"So, I think this is something that has been carefully crafted in order to make sure that we have in state law some of these measures that have been in federal law only so that we can actually prosecute some of these cases under state law. So, I think that's the purpose of this measure, and I urge the members to support it. Thank you."

Representative Souza rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Tarnas be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Aiu rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, second time. I just want to turn every member's attention to the third section. Still in opposition. And I have no disagreement about the sections relating to fraud or false claims against the state. My objection is on false statements to either a legislative, judicial, or executive branch that any statements that people make, the government can prosecute felony claims against people making false statements to the government. And so, this has nothing to do with fraud or fictitious claims, it's merely speech that people may or may not know is false or otherwise untrue, that the government could then prosecute individuals for felony claims. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Tarnas rose to respond, stating:

"Second time, in support. I just want to make it clear that in the language of the bill, it says specifically that, you know that this is a false statement that you're making. So, making any false writing or document, knowing that the writing or document contains any material is false, fictitious, or fraudulent statement or entry. This is, you have to be doing this and knowing that you're making a false statement. And that's what one would have to prove in order to successfully prosecute this. And I am speaking in support. Thank you."

Representative Souza rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, second time in strong support. And please once again enter the words from the representative from Hawai'i Island into the record as my own. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. "We're currently facing a nationwide crisis when it comes to the lack of sports officials, and the situation here is dire as well. A huge part of the problem is unruly spectators who think getting on referees and umpires is part of the fan experience that comes with the price of admission. From personal experience, I can share with this body that I've been called many things, but I went into this fully expecting some level of verbal abuse. But unfortunately, there have been recent incidents on the continent where belligerent spectators have crossed the line and physically assaulted sports officials who are simply discharging their duties.

"Mr. Speaker, passing this bill to elevate such assaults on sports officials from a misdemeanor to a Class C felony will serve as a powerful deterrent while sending a strong message that we value the contributions of all sports

officials. After all, Mr. Speaker, if there are no officials, there are no games. So, for these reasons, I support HB 264, SD 1. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 264, SD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CRIMES AGAINST SPORTS OFFICIALS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Ganaden being excused.

H.B. No. 350, HD 2, SD 1:

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, H.B. No. 350, HD 2, SD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHILD ABUSE REPORTING," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Ganaden being excused.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. I believe there's a gender that you're born with, a sex that you're born with, and the idea that you can change your gender on your marriage certificate I think is gender dysphoria, and I don't encourage that."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 485, HD 3, SD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MARRIAGE," passed Final Reading by a vote of 45 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, Matsumoto, Pierick and Ward voting no, and with Representative Ganaden being excused.

H.B. No. 525, HD 2, SD 2:

Representative Nakamura moved that H.B. No. 525, HD 2, SD 2 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Sayama rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. This measure will bring Hawai'i in compliance with the amendments afforded by the 2022 Uniform Commercial Code, which is really critical for local businesses to remain competitive and consumers protected when engaging in interstate commerce.

"In the past few days, there have been several community concerns and communications regarding a portion of this bill pertaining to the term 'controllable electronic records,' a term used to define cryptocurrencies and similar technologies. I just would like to take a moment to address these concerns.

"In this year alone, we've seen numerous scams involving cryptocurrencies, amounting to billions in losses for consumers and investors. Clearly, this industry needs some regulation and protections for consumers. This measure aims to curtail these scams by providing safeguards while allowing for responsible and legitimate digital currency businesses to continue operations. Community requests to expand the term 'controllable electronic records' to 'electronic records' is dangerous, as it is too broad of a term and can be interpreted to apply to private information unrelated to digital currency, which Article 12 of the UCC aims to regulate.

"In short, this bill is good for business and consumers, so I respectfully request the body's support on this measure. Thank you."

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No, please. I've had over 100 emails in opposition to this bill, so as a representative, it's my desire to follow through with their desire to vote no. I think this bill is also being introduced around America. So, I think there's an agenda behind this, and I'm against that agenda."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 525, HD 2, SD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE UNIFORM COMMERCIAL CODE," passed Final Reading by a vote of 43 ayes to 7 noes, with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, Kong, La Chica, Matsumoto, Pierick and Ward voting no, and with Representative Ganaden being excused.

H.B. No. 580, HD 1, SD 1:

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, H.B. No. 580, HD 1, SD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO VICTIM-COUNSELOR PRIVILEGE," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Ganaden being excused.

H.B. No. 581, HD 2, SD 2:

Representative Nakamura moved that H.B. No. 581, HD 2, SD 2 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Lamosao rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support. So, knowing personally how difficult custody disputes can be, especially for families in extremely vulnerable and dangerous situations, our state will now have requirements to ensure evaluators undergo comprehensive training on domestic violence, making this process for families and children a better one. I want to thank the Women's Legislative Caucus, my fellow colleagues in the Legislature, stakeholders, and advocates for all their efforts in supporting the passage of this bill. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 581, HD 2, SD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHILD CUSTODY," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Ganaden being excused.

H.B. No. 615, HD 1, SD 1:

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, H.B. No. 615, HD 1, SD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RESTRICTIONS ON AGRICULTURAL USES AND ACTIVITIES," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Ganaden being excused.

In 2022 it was the Year of the Limu and we learned, and our communities learned, how to bring awareness to the importance of *limu* in our communities and Hawai'i as a whole. Recognizing *limu kala* as the official *limu* of Hawai'i will provide further educational opportunities and help honor *limu kala* as a significant food and medicine that it is, not just for our communities but for Native Hawaiians.

"*Limu* supports healthy oceans, and like growing plants on land, it supports carbon sequestration. If we have more *limu* in our oceans, and our families can also enjoy eating more *limu*, which for generations was very common and our *kūpuna* remember that, and something we don't always get to experience today. *Mahalo* to the Limu Hui, KUA, and all those in our community who supported this measure."

Representative Tam rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Kahaloa be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Kapela rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Kahaloa be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 819, HD 2, SD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LIMU KALA," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Ganaden being excused.

"This bill was a great learning experience for me. It essentially says that the American Sign Language is a distinct, autonomous, fully developed language with its own grammar, its own syntax, its own vocabulary. I did not know this. I thought that the American Sign Language was just an attempt to repeat in English what someone has said. It is an example of how little understood deaf people are.

"They have a community that is quite distinct from ours. And they have a language that is quite distinct from ours. Deaf people have a problem which is much, much greater than that of a blind person. A blind person learns language at the same time as a sighted person, but a deaf person does not understand language at all until probably school age. This puts them at a severe, terrible disadvantage both in their communications, their social interaction, and their livelihood.

"So, I think that recognizing the American Sign Language is one step toward recognizing the difficulties and the special and distinct community that deaf people have. Thank you."

Representative Tam rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Kobayashi be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Souza rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Kobayashi be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

We authorized these measures to be filed with the respective Clerk's offices between 8:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. on Monday, May 1st.

"The waiver of the internal deadline ensured that our chairs had adequate time to review them before filing the measures for final decking. The conference reports and conference drafts for the measures received by 6:00 p.m. on Monday, May 1st, are listed on today's Supplemental Order of the Day. "This floor amendment is offered to recognize the work of the Finance and WAM Committees in terms of changing the funding. So, originally this bill was meant to be funded through the general funds and it will now be funded through the Public Utilities Commission Special Fund."

The motion that Floor Amendment No. 7, amending H.B. No. 933, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TELECOMMUNICATIONS ACCESS FOR INDIVIDUALS WITH PRINT DISABILITIES," be adopted, was put to vote by the Chair and carried.

SECTION 1. House Bill No. 1366, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, section 3, is amended to read as follows:

"SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$100,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 for implementation of the return-to-home pilot program, including all program costs.

The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of human services for the purposes of this Act."

Representative Mizuno moved that Floor Amendment No. 8 be adopted, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Mizuno rose to speak in support of the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, thank you. The floor amendment represents what the Senate conferees and the House conferees agreed upon regarding the appropriation. The appropriation was only for 2023 through fiscal year 2024. We deleted the section that said 2024 to 2025 funding. So, it is a friendly amendment. I ask that all members vote in support of this floor amendment. Thank you."

Representative Pierick rose to speak in support of the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"In support. I support more tax dollars being allocated for sending homeless people back home and decreasing homelessness in Hawai'i."

The motion that Floor Amendment No. 8, amending H.B. No. 1366, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOMELESSNESS," be adopted, was put to vote by the Chair and carried.

At 11:15 a.m., the Chair noted that Floor Amendment No. 8 was adopted.

At this time, the Chair stated:

"Members, please note the 48-hour notice for this measure. Could you please turn to page 7, Conference Committee Report 138."

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 138 and H.B. No. 870, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1:

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 870, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

At this time, Representative Mizuno offered Floor Amendment No. 9, amending H.B. No. 870, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1 as follows:

There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$93,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 to fund the establishment and operation of the neighbor islands blind and visually impaired service pilot program and working group, including the contracting of services to coordinate the convening of the working group and implementation of the pilot program; provided that:

- (1) The department of human services shall include funding for the pilot program in its regular budget request submitted in 2024; and
- (2) Any funds appropriated pursuant to this section shall be in addition to and shall not supplant any portion of the base budget for any state or county agency providing services for blind or visually impaired persons.

The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of human services for the purposes of this Act."

Representative Mizuno moved that Floor Amendment No. 9 be adopted, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Mizuno rose to speak in support of the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. The rationale is again, Senate and House conferees agreed on funding for fiscal years 2023 to 2024. We did not agree on funding for 2024 through 2025. We have taken that language out. It's a friendly floor amendment. I ask all members to vote in support of this. Thank you."

The motion that Floor Amendment No. 9, amending H.B. No. 870, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE

NEIGHBOR ISLANDS BLIND AND VISUALLY IMPAIRED SERVICE PILOT PROGRAM," be adopted, was put to vote by the Chair and carried.

At 11:17 a.m., the Chair noted that Floor Amendment No. 9 was adopted.

At this time, the Chair stated:

"Members, could you please turn to page 8, Conference Committee Report 145."

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 145 and H.B. No. 600, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1:

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 600, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

At this time, Representative Todd offered Floor Amendment No. 10, amending H.B. No. 600, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1 as follows:

SECTION 1. House Bill No. 600, H.D.1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, section 2, is amended by amending page 6, line 14 to page 7, line 2, to read as follows:

"(2) Beginning July 1, 2024, ensure distribution of moneys accrued in the safe routes to school special fund, prioritizing continuity of existing programming;

(3) Beginning July 1, 2024, review project proposals and select priority projects within one mile of any school or place of learning pursuant to sections 286-7.5, 264-142, and 291C-3 to be funded through the safe routes to school program or otherwise be prioritized and implemented by the department;"

SECTION 2. House Bill No. 600, H.D.1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, section 3, is amended as follows:

1. By amending page 10, lines 6 to 17, to read:

"§291C-3 State and county safe routes to school programs; coordinators; grants; reports. (a) There is established, within the department of transportation, a safe routes to school program that shall, among other things, enhance traffic safety around Hawaii's schools, enable and encourage children to walk and bicycle to school, and make bicycling and walking to school a safer and more appealing transportation alternative. Beginning July 1, 2024, the program shall be responsible for developing and publishing goals and performance measures in coordination with the safe routes to school advisory committee and providing technical assistance to counties and community organizations in support of projects and programs that advance state and county goals."

2. By amending page 11, lines 12 to 20, to read:

"(d) The [legislature shall appropriate] department of transportation shall expend funds from the safe routes to school program special fund [to the counties] in coordination with the safe routes to school advisory committee to be used for the implementation of [county] the safe routes to school program plan and projects[-] pursuant to section 291C- (b)(2) and (3). No later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session, each county shall submit to the legislature an annual report on the status and progress of its county safe routes to school program, including an accounting of all grants provided through the program and a timeline for future grant awards."

Representative Todd moved that Floor Amendment No. 10 be adopted, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Todd rose to speak in support of the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Thank you. This is a pretty minor cleanup thing, but it basically allows the newly established safe routes advisory committee time to plan before making recommendations to DOT and also cleans up some programmatic expenditure money to allow the DOT more flexibility to expend funds currently within that program and be more responsive to community needs. Thank you."

The motion that Floor Amendment No. 10, amending H.B. No. 600, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO

SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL," be adopted, was put to vote by the Chair and carried.

At 11:18 a.m., the Chair noted that Floor Amendment No. 10 was adopted.

At this time, the Chair stated:

"Members, please note the 48-hour notice for this measure. Could you please turn to Conference Committee Report 148."

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 148 and H.B. No. 554, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1:

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 554, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

At this time, Representative Perruso offered Floor Amendment No. 11, amending H.B. No. 554, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1 as follows:

SECTION 1. House Bill No. 554, H.D. 2, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, is amended by amending section 3 to read as follows:

"SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the University of Hawaii tuition and fees special fund the sum of \$1,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for the establishment of four full-time equivalent (4.0 FTE) administrative, professional, and technical positions to enable the University of Hawaii to fulfill the requirements of this Act.

The sums appropriated shall be expended by the University of Hawaii for the purposes of this Act."

"Mr. Speaker, this amendment will change the funding for this measure from general funds to the University of Hawai'i tuition and fees special funds."

The motion that Floor Amendment No. 11, amending H.B. No. 554, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAMPUS SAFETY," be adopted, was put to vote by the Chair and carried.

At 11:19 a.m., the Chair noted that Floor Amendment No. 11 was adopted.

"SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the compliance resolution fund established pursuant to section 26-9(o), Hawaii Revised Statutes, the sum of \$500,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 to carry out the special purpose digital currency licensing program established by section 2 of this Act."

SECTION 3. Senate Bill No. 945, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, is amended by renumbering sections 8 and 9 as sections 7 and 8, respectively.

Representative Sayama moved that Floor Amendment No. 12 be adopted, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This amendment reflects the agreement between the House Finance and Senate Ways and Means Committees removing the three FTE positions from Senate Bill No. 945."

The motion that Floor Amendment No. 12, amending S.B. No. 945, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SPECIAL PURPOSE DIGITAL CURRENCY LICENSURE," be adopted, was put to vote by the Chair and carried.

At 11:20 a.m., the Chair noted that Floor Amendment No. 12 was adopted.

At this time, the Chair stated:

"Members, please note the 48-hour notice for this measure.

"Also, members, please note that the remaining conference committee reports listed in this section as reflected on pages 1 through 11 will be deferred one legislative day. We will take up these measures after passage of the state budget."

SECTION 1. House Bill No. 676, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, is amended by deleting Sections 2 and 3.

SECTION 2. House Bill No. 676, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, is amended by adding a new Section 2 to read as follows:

"SECTION 2. Section 205-3.1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

"**§205-3.1 Amendments to district boundaries.** (a) District boundary amendments involving lands in the conservation district, land areas greater than fifteen acres, or lands delineated as important agricultural lands shall be processed by the land use commission pursuant to section 205-4[-], except as otherwise provided in this section.

(b) Any department or agency of the State, and department or agency of the county in which the land is situated, or any person with a property interest in the land sought to be reclassified may petition the appropriate county land use decision-making authority of the county in which the land is situated for a change in the boundary of a district involving lands less than fifteen acres presently in the rural and urban districts and lands less than fifteen acres in the agricultural district that are not designated as important agricultural lands.

(c) District boundary amendments involving land areas of fifteen acres or less, except as provided in subsection (b), shall be determined by the appropriate county land use decision-making authority for the district and shall not require consideration by the land use commission pursuant to section 205-4; provided that ~~[such]~~ the boundary amendments and approved uses are consistent with this chapter. The appropriate county land use decision-making authority may consolidate proceedings to amend state land use district boundaries pursuant to this subsection, with county proceedings to amend the general plan, development plan, zoning of the affected land, or ~~[such]~~ other proceedings. Appropriate ordinances and rules to allow consolidation of ~~[such]~~ proceedings may be developed by the county land use decision-making authority.

(d) An application for a district boundary amendment involving a land area greater than fifteen acres but not greater than one hundred acres, except for lands that are designated as important agricultural lands or lands where the soil is classified by the land study bureau's detailed land classification as overall (master) productivity class A or B, shall be determined by the appropriate county land use decision-making authority for the district and shall not require consideration by the land use commission if, by the date of the application, the county has adopted an ordinance that:

(1) Establishes a procedure for determining the district boundary amendments;

- (2) Requires the county to own and retain ownership of the land area for at least ninety-nine years;
- (3) Requires that one hundred per cent of the land area be used for affordable housing as defined by county ordinance;
- (4) Requires that at least seventy-five per cent of the housing units on the land be set aside for persons and families with incomes at or below one hundred per cent of the area median income;
- (5) Requires the district boundary amendment and approved uses to be consistent with the applicable county general plan or community development plan;
- (6) Requires the county to complete and incorporate mitigation of the impact on county and state resources, including schools and highways; provided that mitigation efforts under this paragraph shall be approved by the appropriate state department;
- (7) Incorporates due process into the procedure for determining district boundary amendments pursuant to paragraph (1) in accordance with all state laws and the public trust doctrine; and
- (8) Requires the appropriate county land use decision-making authority to issue a finding that it has considered all impacts of the proposed amendment that the land use commission would have considered under a petition submitted to the land use commission pursuant to this chapter for a district boundary amendment involving the same or similar land use classifications and land area.

~~(4)~~ (e) The county land use decision-making authority shall serve a copy of the application for a district boundary amendment to the land use commission and the department of business, economic development, and tourism and shall notify the commission and the department of the time and place of the hearing and the proposed amendments scheduled to be heard at the hearing. A change in the state land use district boundaries pursuant to this subsection shall become effective on the day designated by the county land use decision-making authority in its decision. Within sixty days of the effective date of any decision to amend state land use district boundaries by the county land use decision-making authority, the decision and the description and map of the affected property shall be transmitted to the land use commission and the department of business, economic development, and tourism by the county planning director."

SECTION 3. House Bill No. 676, H.D. 1, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, is amended by adding a new Section 3 to read as follows:

"SECTION 3. Section 205-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by amending its title and subsection (a) to read as follows:

"**§205-4 Amendments to district boundaries ~~[involving land areas greater than fifteen acres-]; proceedings before the land use commission.~~** (a) Any department or agency of the State, any department or agency of the county in which the land is situated, or any person with a property interest in the land sought to be reclassified, may petition the land use commission for a change in the boundary of a district. This section applies to all petitions for changes in district boundaries of lands within conservation districts, lands designated or sought to be designated as important agricultural lands, and lands greater than fifteen acres in the agricultural, rural, and urban districts, except as provided in ~~[section]~~ sections 201H-38[-] and 205-3.1(d). The land use commission shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 to implement section 201H-38."

Representative Hashimoto moved that Floor Amendment No. 13 be adopted, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Hashimoto rose to speak in support of the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, during the conference committee, the intent was to add a provision that would have ensured the counties address state impacts if they were given the power to bypass the Land Use Commission, in addition to all other requirements that were already included in the bill, which is for affordable housing. During the drafting, this was added as an additional section and not a subsection, and I can see how there might be confusion and concern with the bill as it stands now with the current language. But I believe this amendment makes clear the legislative intent of the conference

committee of having the counties take on more accountability, not less. It was never the intent to make the process less transparent. And I believe this amendment makes this very, very clear.

"This amendment will now ensure that the counties issue a finding that has considered all impacts that the Land Use Commission would have considered under a petition to the Land Use Commission for a district boundary amendment in addition to the seven other requirements as included in this bill. And I humbly ask for your support."

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"In opposition. I'd like to thank the intent of all those who've introduced this bill and also created amendments to modify the bill. At the same time, I've received 32 emails asking me to vote no. So, to honor the people of Hawai'i, I will vote no."

The motion that Floor Amendment No. 13, amending H.B. No. 676, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DISTRICT BOUNDARY AMENDMENTS," be adopted, was put to vote by the Chair and carried, with Representative Pierick voting no.

"In opposition. It's my understanding that this bill would increase the cost of living in Hawai'i. So, for that reason, I'll be voting no."

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Can I request to insert written comments on HB 192, which is a money saving measure for Hawai'i residents."

Representative Lowen's written remarks are as follows:

"I strongly support HB 192. Prohibiting the sale of certain fluorescent lamps as new manufactured products in the State of Hawai'i will reduce energy use and thus electric bills, reduce greenhouse gas emissions, and avoid hazardous waste being imported into the state and polluting the environment.

"LED lighting has significantly lower lifecycle costs than fluorescent lamps or bulbs, which also contain mercury. Because of the high efficiency of LEDs, consumer electric bills can be reduced up to \$37 million annually

statewide by switching from fluorescents to LEDs. These savings will provide relief for families, small businesses, and communities. Phasing out fluorescent lightbulbs also has the potential to reduce up to 756,000 metric tons of carbon dioxide annually, a significant contribution to combating climate change and minimizing our state's carbon footprint. This reduction in emissions aligns with Hawai'i's commitment to decarbonization and sets a positive example for other states to follow.

"Furthermore, the transition to LED bulbs helps avoid the importation of mercury into the state. Mercury is a hazardous waste found in traditional incandescent and fluorescent bulbs, which eventually ends up in landfills, the air, and the environment since most bulbs are not properly disposed of. By eliminating the use of mercury-containing lighting options, we protect both human health and the environment."

Hawai'i Island's coffee farms form one of the state's most iconic industries. And throughout the world, people appreciate the quality and value, and I am biased so I will say perfection, of Kona and Ka'u coffee.

"This measure protects our coffee industry from commercial exploitation by expanding coffee labeling and advertising requirements to include ready-to-drink beverages and inner wrapping labels given to consumers. This will make truthful representation of the geographic origin of coffee products the law of the land and prevent commercial fraud and deception.

"Coffee farmers have fought for 32 years to make this law take effect. This bill's passage is a testament to their efforts and the historic victory for the preservation of Hawai'i's coffee heritage. So, thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 746, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COFFEE LABELING," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 22 and S.B. No. 516, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1:

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 516, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Nakamura moved to recommit Conf. Com. Rep. No. 22 and the attached proposed conference draft to the Committee on Conference, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Gates rose to speak in support of the motion to recommit, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Again, this is one of the other measures that have duplicative language in regards to HB 1359. And we just want to make

sure that there isn't confusion when implementing these new laws. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and Conf. Com. Rep. No. 22 and S.B. No. 516, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEMP," were recommitted to the Committee on Conference.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 23 and S.B. No. 1378, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 1378, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Mizuno rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Members, I believe you've heard me talk about this bill. This is the stop and close down the unlawful illegal care homes. I mentioned in the past that there are no criminal background checks on these care homes that are operated by the illegal entities and people. These unlicensed care homes do not pay taxes. The Department of Health nor the Department of Human Services have no oversight. They're caring for our *kūpuna* and our disabled, but Department of Health and Human Services do not have the ability to do annual inspections or any unannounced visits, which is vital to ensure these care homes are actually providing proper care for our *kūpuna* and our disabled.

"These illegal care homes do not have liability insurance, these illegal care homes do not have certified nursing assistants or nurses, and they charge significant amounts of money to these patients. Once these patients use up all their money, they spend down everything, these patients are then kicked to the side and dumped to become the state's obligation. The state is now obligated to find a legal Medicaid care home.

"In support of this bill because I want to give you the daunting statistics that I didn't give in my last speech. Currently, in the last 48 months, there were 221 reported unlicensed care homes in the State of Hawai'i. Statistics show that we have closed down 11 unlicensed care homes and assessed \$2.4 million in fines just in the last year. The current investigations are on 89 unlicensed care homes, again either underway or pending. This bill will close down a legal argument that these illegal, unlicensed care homes are only rental units or rooms for rent for our elderly and disabled. We need this bill and I ask all members to support it. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1378, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO UNLICENSED CARE HOMES," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 24 and S.B. No. 798, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 798, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TIME SHARING," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 25 and S.B. No. 691, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1:

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 691, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Really briefly, this measure will reduce the cost of living for people, it is about energy efficiency, which is a win-win, it's adding some appliances to our state appliance efficiency standards. These appliances do not have a higher upfront cost, so savings will start on day one, and it just ceases having Hawai'i be used as a market that's kind of a dumping ground for less efficient appliances that also cannot be sold in certain other states. So, this is a win-win for people in Hawai'i where the cost of electricity is very high."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 691, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EFFICIENCY STANDARDS,"

passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Kong voting no.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1468, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO RIGHT OF ENTRY FOR PROFESSIONAL SURVEYORS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Amato, Hussey-Burdick, and Pierick voting no.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 31 and S.B. No. 478, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 478, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TELECOMMUNICATIONS AND CABLE INDUSTRY INFORMATION REPORTING," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 32 and S.B. No. 1079, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 1079, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. So, this bill would allow for somebody driving a car from 18 years old to 21 years old, if they're driving under the influence of alcohol, if they get pulled over, get a DUI, that DUI can be expunged from their record because they're driving under the legal age of 21. However, this age limit is still adulthood. So, I think adults should be held accountable for their driving habits. If they're endangering people on the public by being drunk, that's not a good thing. And we should be tough on crime to deter crime. So, I'm voting no."

Representative Souza rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support, Mr. Speaker. I just want to clarify that this bill is meant to expunge anything from the record that happened as a first-time offender before 1998. That was 25 years ago. I think that we can have some leniency in that regard, to expunge something so old in reference to a 291E-64. Thank you."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong support. There's a national movement to expunge old records for a variety of issues, including petty misdemeanors and misdemeanors. These records can significantly affect an individual's ability to retain custody of their children, gain housing, and gain employment. So, for that reason, I'm in strong support."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1079, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EXPUNGEMENT," passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes to 2 noes, with Representatives Pierick, and Ward voting no.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 33 and S.B. No. 51, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 51, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAMPAIGN FINANCE," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1493, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LOBBYISTS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 35 and S.B. No. 19, HD 1, CD 1:

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 19, HD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This bill guarantees the vote of eligible voters who cast their ballot and then subsequently die or otherwise become ineligible before Election Day. So, to become ineligible would include having a felony. So, do we want felons or people who are dead voting? I don't think so. We have an election day, I think that's more preferred versus an election week or an election month. So, I'm for election integrity and I'll be voting no."

Representative Tarnas rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support of this measure. This makes it clear that when you cast your ballot, that is when you're mailing your ballot, putting into the drop box, putting it into the mailbox, that is when you cast your ballot. If you are eligible to vote at that time, then your vote will count when Election Day comes around, no matter what happens in between the time you cast your ballot and Election Day. This is a good bill. This just makes it very clear that when you cast your ballot, if you are eligible, then your vote will count. I urge all members to support this. Thank you."

Representative Souza rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Tarnas be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support, Mr. Speaker. To correct it once again here on the floor and for all of those of you who in the public who might be listening, if you have a felony on your record and you are no longer under court supervision, you can vote. You should vote. You're a citizen of the state and your rights are in jeopardy. And this is a democracy, this is how it works. So, once again, to correct the Representative of 39, if you are a former felon or you have a misdemeanor or anything on your record, please vote."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 19, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAST BALLOTS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 44 ayes to 7 noes, with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, Gates, Holt, Lamosao, Pierick, and Quinlan voting no.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 930, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition. Mr. Speaker, to me this is a moral equivalent of a poll tax, a right that you have, but which you have to pay for. The point is, we have a shortage of rental units, an extreme shortage of rental units, and this puts a fee to fill out an application just to qualify to do the rental unit. This puts the people with the bigger wallet rather than the stronger character necessarily ahead of the line. Mr. Speaker, that is unfair. It's like a poll tax, which nobody agrees with. I'm not sure why even the realtors agree with this thing. Thank you."

Representative Hashimoto rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. I just would like to clarify that this is actually capping the application screening fee. So, this is a consumer protection measure to ensure that those who are paying for screening fees to have their application reviewed, that they're actually paying the actual cost and no one's making a profit from this. So, I think this is a very good measure to make sure that consumers are protected."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, also a point of clarification. The point is, there should not be an application fee to do something that you by your right have to do without paying for it. That's the bottom line. We shouldn't have that. Do we have an application to do the things that we have rights for? No. To have an application to get in a line to run a property is unfair and unjust, Mr. Speaker. It gives those with the wallet, even though we have a cap, it will give those with the bigger wallet rather than the, look, the experience of landlords is this. If you get good tenants, doesn't matter if they're poor or rich, as long as they're paying the rent and taking care of your house, that's the key. To have a bigger deposit is no guarantee you're going to get a bigger renter. It's the content of their character, Mr. Speaker, that's the issue. But to have a barrier that you can set a cap on, the point is, you're still going to have to pay to rent a piece of property, of which we have a very, very dearth of. We have such a shortage of rentals, 50,000 to 60,000 units of housing. We have a crisis, and we're adding that on to."

"And you know my feelings about the ALICE families, 50% of our people cannot make enough money to live in Hawai'i. So, this is another one of those that we promised to do the cost-of-living decrease, and here we are increasing the cost of living. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. I just think it's really important to clarify, just for the record, that this measure does not increase the cost of living and does

not make it more difficult for renters to seek a place to live because it actually caps the fee that they would have to pay. So, the process of collecting fees already existed, it's part of the housing market. And what this measure will do is cap the fee so that it's more reasonable. And it would be wonderful to pass a law to eliminate the fees, but this is a step in that direction. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 930, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE RESIDENTIAL LANDLORD-TENANT CODE," passed Final Reading by a vote of 48 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Garcia, Pierick, and Ward voting no.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 781, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Mizuno rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support of this bill. Nelson Mandela stated, there is no keener revelation of a society's soul than the way in which it treats its children. Members, it is our responsibility as a society to safeguard and protect the rights of our *keiki*.

"I'm going to provide the four major points of this bill. First, a minor's mental capacity, the scientific evidence. Studies confirm that a child's brain is not fully developed, in fact, the prefrontal cortex, which is responsible for behavior, speech, reasoning, continues to develop into early adulthood. That's the science.

"I'm going to talk about the United States Supreme Court decisions on a minor's mental capacity. In a U.S. Supreme Court case, *Roper v. Simmons*, the court wrote that children, and I quote, have limited understandings of the criminal justice system. In the Supreme Court case of *Brown v. Florida*, the court wrote, children lack the capacity to exercise mature judgment.

"And finally, *In re Gault*, the Supreme Court's landmark decision on due process rights for children, the court held that the State of Arizona violated the defendant's due process rights under the 14th Amendment, and that constitutional due process rights apply to children as well as adults. Chief Justice Earl Warren stated that even in the case of minors, due process of the law is the primary and indispensable foundation of individual freedom.

"I'm going to talk about point three, this is the data from the National Registry of Exonerations. This shows that nearly 60% of 14- and 15-year-old children who are later exonerated for crimes they did not commit, falsely confessed to the crime when they were interrogated. The national registry also confirms that 86% of children under 14 years of age also later exonerated for crimes they did not commit falsely confessed.

"Point number four, this bill also protects parental rights when a child is being interrogated by law enforcement. The purpose of this bill is to require that when an officer has the custody of a child under 18 years of age for an alleged violation of law, that child shall have contact with legal counsel, a parent, guardian, or legal custodian before the child waives their constitutional rights before interrogation.

"I wanted to thank the representative from Lower Kalihi who worked diligently with me on this bill. In fact, if it wasn't for him, he would have put in a stronger clause relating to parental rights. And I've heard a number of colleagues here passionately speak about if their daughter was going to make a life altering decision, they should be there. The same applies here, Mr. Speaker. This is about parental rights. Let me quote, to make sure I don't make a mistake, page four, lines 10 through 13 provides, 'any officer who has arrested a child under eighteen years of age shall notify the child's parent, guardian, or legal custodian that the child has been arrested and shall provide the location of the child's detainment.'

"I anticipate we might get a few no votes or WR votes on this bill because they think it's soft on crime. It's smart on crime. It's about the Constitution, it's about children's rights. If a child could be making a life altering decision, the parent should be there. So, I'm hoping those advocates on the floor that supported parental rights will support this bill, change their WR to an up vote, change their no vote to a WR.

"Finally, Mr. Speaker, members, I've identified the science, the United States Supreme Court decisions, the high rates of false confessions by our minors, and the important parental rights of this bill. It is our responsibility, as the House of Representatives, to safeguard and protect the rights of our *keiki*. Therefore, I ask all members to vote up on this bill to protect the constitutional due process rights for Hawai'i's *keiki*. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support, Mr. Speaker. May I adopt the words of the representative from District 29," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ganaden continued, stating:

"With brief comment. Mr. Speaker, this mandates that when a child is in the custody of the police, that parents or guardians are notified. The statistics and the law are on our side on this.

"And I just want to note that many of us received a video of a fight involving kids in, it might have been in Ewa or here in myself and the representative from District 29's district in Kalihi, kids fighting. When the police do an investigation, oftentimes they interrogate children, they get the kinds of confessions that they wouldn't get out of adults. This mandates that that process get slowed down and that the law is followed.

"It's not only good law, but it supports public safety. We want officers to get to the bottom of things, to start to work with community, and to start to support the kinds of programs that reduce violence and end violence in our communities. Again, in strong support. Thank you."

Representative Garcia rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. And just to clarify, there was no no votes or WRs on this bill planned by our caucus, at least. But I do want to say thank you to the introducer and for the amendments made on this bill that upholds parental rights, because that has been under constant attack nationwide and here in Hawai'i. So, thank you for partially upholding parental rights. Thank you."

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. May I have the comments from the representatives from Kalihi and from Kalihi Valley entered into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Tam rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support, same request and additional comments. I just want to clarify that there was a reservation vote on this bill when it came to the conference committee time and it was from the representative from Kapolei," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Souza rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representatives Mizuno and Ganaden be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 781, HD 2, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHILDREN," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 51 and H.B. No. 1045, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1045, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 52 and H.B. No. 218, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 218, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PRESCRIPTION DRUGS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 53 and H.B. No. 950, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1:

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 950, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support, very brief. Mr. Speaker, mental illness and addressing severe mental illness and mental health treatment in our community was a top priority identified by this body early on in session. This is the one measure that we have that survives our discussions and it adopts effective amendments to the assisted community treatment law that helps those with the very most serious mental illnesses and/or severe substance abuse concerns who lack decisional authority.

"I know that there are concerns in the community about the due process rights of individuals who have ACT orders imposed upon them. But the amendments in this bill really take into consideration the team that is needed to treat individuals under ACT orders. And it adopts meaningful processes that allow for things like online hearings and telehealth. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, in strong support of this measure."

Representative Marten rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"I request to have the words of the previous speaker entered into the Journal as if they were my own. And also in support, I'd like to make a brief comment. This was shaping up to be a transformational session on assisted community treatment, which is a really important tool to address severe mental illness. Many people with that level end up on our streets and their lives are miserable and unsafe, and they also cause a lot of stress in our communities. However, this is the only bill that survived. Fortunately, it was headed towards the Judiciary where they did recognize the importance. But this is an issue we really need to work on next session again. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd like to adopt the words of the representative from Makiki as if they were my own. This is a majority package bill. And I'm very proud of the work that was put into this bill to strengthen it by bringing together the family court, the attorney general, psychiatrists, and advanced practice nurses who all need to work together to help to address the issue of mental health needs in our community that's related to the huge homeless problem we have. And unless we pass bills like this that get to the heart of the coordination that's needed, we cannot move forward. So, thank you to all who were involved in crafting this bill," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 950, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ASSISTED COMMUNITY TREATMENT ORDERS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes to 1 no, with Representative Amato voting no.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1340, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE PRACTICE OF BEHAVIOR ANALYSIS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 51 ayes.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 59 and S.B. No. 1057, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1:

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 1057, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to 59, which is related to, among other things, the leveraging the hourly wage rate having to be exposed publicly to all employees. Mr. Speaker, all of you know that Hawai'i is probably listed last among friendliness to business. This kind of pushes it further in that particular direction. Both the Chamber of Commerce and the Retail Merchants have said this is not a good bill for both employers and employees, even though I think it was conceived in that it would be better for the employees.

"Mainland companies and the big boys will have a leg up on the small companies, even though I know there is some restrictions here. But the small guys are going to lose on this in a particular way. Someone who is with high qualifications, or someone may be paid less who has high qualifications because they know that those with high qualifications will have less room for negotiations. That is not a good point of view from the employee's point of view.

"It's also meant to make employees well aware of another's pay. Mr. Speaker, as some of you know, I've been in business before, and if an employee is transfixed on their pay, it's probably best not to be in that particular profession. And I know all of the hardworking people on this body, we're not here for the pay. If we are, we're in the wrong business, Mr. Speaker.

"The point is, this has a lot of unintended consequences. The people who run businesses, who represent businesses, say it's not going to help the employees or the employers. But it's a micromanaging, which has a lot of unintended consequences. Because of that, Mr. Speaker, I would say we leave the private sector alone. Thank you."

Representative Lamosao rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. I'd like to thank our ECD Committee chair for supporting this measure. It is humbling to speak today on behalf of women to address the pay disparity we continue to face. The Equal Pay Act was enacted in 1963, and although we've made some improvements since then, women still make significantly less wages relative to the average earnings of men, despite the fact that more women now graduate from college than men. These perpetual pay gaps mean larger financial losses over time, not just for women, but for our families too.

"The National Women's Law Center estimates that the current gap amounts to nearly \$10,000 in median earnings for a year. Imagine what this difference could pay for. This difference could pay for more than six months of childcare, enabling women to continue sustaining employment and ensure financial security for their families. This difference could pay for three months of rent for stable housing. This difference could cover necessities that could alleviate the very real issue of food insecurity here in Hawai'i. This difference is the opportunity for a down payment on a home or a higher education degree.

"The research is clear. Women play a central role in society that has ensured the stability, progress and long-term development, and success of nations. As a legislator, I am committed to work with my colleagues to ensure we are actively preventing wage discrimination. SB 1057 aims to do just that by enhancing pay transparency and prohibiting employers from discriminating between employees regarding pay. And I will continue to commit to supporting policies that address and break down the systematic barriers that continue to prevent women from earning equitable pay. Thank you."

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. I'd like to first have the words of the representative from Waipahu entered into the record as if they were my own. And I would just add that this is a really important equity measure, as she mentioned. And I think that we need to also recognize that we're just part of a larger movement around pay transparency, and I'm glad that Hawai'i is finally participating," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Kapela rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representatives Lamosao and Perruso be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative La Chica rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"May I also add the words of the representative from Waipahu as if they were my own and brief comment. Strong support. In addition to women, let us also remember that we have a graduating class in Hawai'i experiences huge brain drain from our youth that leave the island and never choose to return. And this really assists with job seekers, especially those entering the market for the first time, to be able to determine if this job will be able to support themselves and their families. It also gives them the ability to see what's available and be able to advocate for themselves in being able to have better pay for themselves. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Marten rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support and may I please have the words of the representative from Waipahu entered into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Souza rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support, Mr. Speaker. Same request, thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Amato rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. May I please have the words from the representative from Waipahu entered into the Journal as my own in strong support," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I may change my vote, but I want to say one thing. I am still opposed to it because of the way that it makes too much public exposure of one's strategic plan for hiring employees. I totally agree with every person that just stood up, because we should have equal pay between women and men. But I don't think that's the issue.

"The issue is, we're opening up for transparency competitive things which may be between Chinese companies and our companies and other big companies who can offer more. So, the small guys don't get employees, of which now we have companies dying on the vine because no one will work for them. How many restaurants in my district went out because they can't get employees? So, if we open up all of this, and again, I'm not against equal pay for equal work between the genders.

"The issue is, these are strategic things that entrepreneurs and businesspeople use as competitive edges, and employees who have high qualifications can leverage their employment status by bargaining with employers. If everything is already in print and you're locked into that, some of the high qualified people may say, well look, that's not a big deal, I'm going to go to the mainland and make more money like many people have in the last number of years. We've lost 30,000 people because of low wages. This one probably may even suppress that strategy even worse. The point is, equal pay for equal work, I totally agree with my colleagues, but this is an entrepreneurial issue, it's a business issue, it's just not a gender issue. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. May I have the words of the speaker from Waipahu entered into the Journal as if they were my own. And just very quickly, I hope to change the previous speaker's mind as if you read the bill, this bill does not apply to positions with employers having fewer than 50 employees. Thank you, Mr. Speaker," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1057, SD 2, HD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EMPLOYMENT EARNINGS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, Kong, Pierick, and Ward voting no.

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the motion to recommit, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, again, *mahalo* on behalf of Representative Cynthia Thielen. Thank you."

Layers of government should work together to achieve optimal solutions. But by superseding the counties before they even impose a fee structure, it shows that the state is not only able to name its price, but flat out disregard any costs incurred without consequence, which sets an incredibly poor example. We in a recent Hawai'i Kai Neighborhood Board meeting were told that the stormwater fee would

be equally levied upon all government entities, and suddenly they are given preferential treatment by this bill. Not fair, not transparent."

"In support, thank you. This is one of the most significant bills we're passing out this session. We crafted this bill carefully in order to respond to the decision by the U.S. Supreme Court in the *Bruen* case, which said that all states must develop a system for licensing people to carry weapons concealed on their body. And in the Supreme Court decision, there is also, in addition to the majority decision, there was a concurrence signed by Justice Kavanaugh and Justice Roberts. And in that concurrence, it was clear that we could place reasonable requirements for people and qualifications for people to be able to qualify for getting a license. Each state could also identify sensitive places where one would not be able to carry a concealed weapon.

"And so, we used the latitude given to us by the Supreme Court decisions, majority and the concurrence, to craft this legislation that is consistent with the Second Amendment, protects the rights of those who wish to bear arms, it also protects the public interest and the desire of the public to feel safe in their environment.

"So, we followed through and worked closely with the Attorney General's Office, and I commend them for their hard work on this, looking at what are the best practices throughout the country. And we also worked with the various county police departments, the prosecuting attorneys, the public defenders. So, we really were able to gather information from all these agencies, and we worked with those who are strong advocates for gun safety and those who are strong advocates for the Second Amendment and the rights of those people who wish to use guns and carry them. So, I think this is a very well-balanced and reasonable bill. I encourage all members to support it. Thank you."

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. Mr. Speaker, this bill is unconstitutional. The Second Amendment gives Americans the right to bear arms. These rights should not be infringed. The *Bruen* case points out analogous law from the past, in 1791, when the Bill of Rights was ratified, to say if there was a law at that time when the Second Amendment was ratified, we can let that law analogously carry over into 2023 to be our laws today. So, we ask ourselves, was public parks outlawed to have guns back in 1771? No. Were their safe places as strict as this bill would propose? No. I'm against infringements on our constitutional rights, so I'm voting no."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Marten rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, in strong support. I'd like to note that guns have changed a lot since the Constitution was written. We didn't have automatic weapons, where you could take down a lot of people all at once. And I really appreciate the work that this body has done to try to keep us safe despite what is being forced upon us by the Supreme Court of the United States. Thank you."

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. May the words of our Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs chair and representative from Kailua be entered into the Journal as my own. And I just want to add that I'm very happy that we now have a statewide framework, since many of the counties have been passing ordinances on their own, that now we have a unified approach to concealed carry laws in our state. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Lowen rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support and I'd like to adopt the words of the representatives from Kailua and Kaua'i and also permission to insert written comments in the Journal," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Lowen's written remarks are as follows:

"I strongly support SB 1230. This bill will prohibit firearms in certain sensitive public areas such as schools, hospitals, and theaters, and is a commonsense measure to make public spaces safer. Prohibiting the carry of a firearm while intoxicated, or in a setting where intoxication is likely, dramatically reduces the likelihood of tragic incidents that result from impaired individuals mishandling their weapons, accidental shootings, or impulsive crimes committed under the influence. And of course, proper storage and security for firearms prevents these weapons from unintentionally falling into the wrong hands. These are simple, straightforward measures to reduce the danger posed to the public by the rampant proliferation of firearms in America, which has made our nation a more dangerous and violent place.

"In 2022, gun violence overtook car accidents as the number one cause of death of children and teens in America. I am ashamed that our nation has failed so completely to protect its citizens and its youth, and has put partisan politics ahead of the will of the majority of American citizens who are calling for stronger gun control. Here in Hawai'i, we have always had some of the strongest gun laws in the country, and the lowest rates of gun violence. The passage of this bill will continue to put us at the leading edge of these efforts. Even though much, much more is needed, this bill is a step in the right direction."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 1230, SD 2, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FIREARMS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 41 ayes to 9 noes, with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, Gates, Kila, Kong, Matsumoto, Pierick, Souza, and Ward voting no, and with Representative Quinlan being excused.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 129 and S.B. No. 7, HD 1, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 7, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE SCHOOL FACILITIES AUTHORITY," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes with Representative Quinlan being excused.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 130 and H.B. No. 24, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 24, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WATER COMMON CARRIERS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 47 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Hussey-Burdick, Kapela, and Poepeo voting no, and with Representative Quinlan being excused.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 132 and H.B. No. 1363, HD 3, SD 2, CD 1:

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 1363, HD 3, SD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No, please. This bill would allow the counties to have taxes and those taxes would obviously be something that I don't think most people want. People don't like taxes, I don't like taxes, so I'll be voting no."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, a no vote with a couple of comments. As I've noted a number of times, the Constitution said, okay, states you do the taxation, counties, you do the property tax. Unfortunately, since that beginning, we have ceded TAT taxes to the counties, we've given them GET tax, now we've got another surcharge tax.

"Mr. Speaker, we have promised to lower the cost of living. We are already the highest taxed without these taxes. How are we going to explain to our constituents that we've lowered the cost of living by having these taxes on top of the taxes that that we've already given them?"

"The point is, taxation is gone out of control and we're giving it to the counties. We at the state level may say, well, you know, we didn't do it, we just gave it to the counties, they're the one who's sticking it to you. In the end, the people will wake up and see that taxation is getting out of control and this bill is one push in that direction. Therefore, I'm against it. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1363, HD 3, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," passed Final Reading by a vote of 45 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, Matsumoto, Pierick, and Ward voting no, and with Representative Quinlan being excused.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 135 and H.B. No. 954, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1:

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that H.B. No. 954, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Holt rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. Nearly half of Hawai'i's residents struggle to make ends meet. Caught between rising costs and stagnant wages, families continue to fall behind despite working one or more jobs. What if a public program could give these families more economic

security, improve health and educational attainment, and support upward mobility? There is such a program. It's called the earned income tax credit.

"Mr. Speaker, this is from a report after the 2017 session when we implemented the EITC. And at that time, it was a nonrefundable tax credit. What is the EITC, you ask? It's a powerful tool to help uplift families out of poverty. It encourages work and the economic security needed to support healthy lives, get a good education, and increase future earnings.

"One of the recommendations in this report, Mr. Speaker, was to make the state EITC refundable. And we did that two years ago, making it refundable up to 20% of the federal credit. And this year, we're taking a further step forward and making it refundable up to 40% of the federal credit. Mr. Speaker, that's only one portion of this bill.

"This measure gives relief of over \$125 million, \$42 million for the earned income tax credit, over \$47 million for the child and dependent care tax credit, and \$36 million in the food excise tax credit. These are things that we all campaign on, these are things that we all talked about in our majority package. And to finally be here today to pass out this measure is something that we can all be very proud of.

"This program is important because it provides economic benefits to working families and it rewards work. And for those with children, it benefits them even more. The average EITC for households with children amounted to nearly \$3,200 in 2018, compared to only \$300 for a family without children.

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to thank the majority leader for giving me homework and reading material so I could become the expert on this issue. I'd also like to thank the Finance chair for your hard work in negotiations on this measure, and for all of the members for making this a priority to help working families in Hawai'i. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, support. Because this is all about the ALICE families, may I ask for the previous speaker's comments to be inserted in the Journal as my own. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd like to ask that the words of our Economic Development chair from Palama be entered into the Journal as if they were my own. And I'd like to also add that this is really a component of the majority package that has been expanded. So now, other than as our Economic Development chair said, we are going to be doubling the earned income tax credit. We're going to be almost tripling the child and dependent care, and then doubling the food tax credit. So, all of these measures will bring thousands of dollars of tax relief to our working low-income families in Hawai'i. And I want to thank our Finance chair, our Economic Development chair, and members for helping to craft this bill and to get this through the finish line. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I have long been a supporter of the earned income tax credit, so it's really heartening to see that this is being increased. However, I would like to say as we continue to move into the interim, when we talk about the ALICE families, we are really looking for broader tax relief for those who are asset limited, income constrained. So, when you look at the adjustments that were made for those who are \$40,000 and over, there is that middle class income, that middle class bracket that we need to really start to pay attention to. So again, while I really, truly support the measures in this, I think we need to have a broader conversation about the tax relief to benefit middle class families here in the State of Hawai'i. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. This is a very good step in providing tax relief given the situation that occurred to us outside of our control when the Council on Revenues decreased, by \$1.2 billion, estimated revenues. So, while we would have wanted much more tax relief, our expected income loss of \$1.2 billion was a very severe constraint. I agree that there is much

more work to be done. And hopefully next year we can address some of the other provisions that were not included in this bill. Thank you."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. I'd like the words of our majority leader and our chair of Health inserted into the Journal as if they were my own. This measure is a win for working families, and our working families need more wins. So, I hope that, while we've done such incredible things, I really do hope that we continue to look at passing more tax fairness initiatives in the years to come. Thank you again and thank you to all who worked on this," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. As one former speaker said, let's broaden the discussion. I want to mention something that is very key. In support, in addition, of course. The best welfare check is a good job. The best tax relief is a good job. Mr. Speaker, we have said but we have not acted upon diversifying our economy. I've talked about being the Hollywood of the Pacific, low hanging fruit. Being the sports center of the Pacific, if we build the stadium properly. Being the space tourism of the Pacific, Geneva of the Pacific, *et cetera*. We have to give the ALICE working poor a break, but we have to give them good jobs is the point, Mr. Speaker. We don't have the size of our economy fitting the needs of our family. That's the key to keeping the ALICE families from either going further down the path to homelessness or picking up and moving to the mainland, of which we know is not a good trend. So, we need to diversify the economy when we talk about tax relief. But we're talking about tax relief, which is good, but we got to go beyond that. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Lowen rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Holt be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 954, HD 2, SD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," passed Final Reading by a vote of 50 ayes, with Representative Quinlan being excused.

"In support, thank you. House Bill 91 and the following two bills are three of the many bills that this body has approved that were recommended by the Commission to Improve Standards of Conduct or the Campaign Spending Commission or the Ethics Commission, the Office of Elections, the attorney general, the prosecuting attorneys. All of these bills are to help improve public trust in our institution and in our government.

"After having been rocked by scandals of two of former members of this legislature who were indicted for taking bribes, we were all shocked. We were dismayed. We were offended by that behavior. But we needed to take action. And that's what we've done.

"And I want to thank you, Speaker, I want to thank the members for being courageous and passing a whole body of work, which I think addresses a lot of these major issues by improving our ability to prevent corruption, by making ethics a much more fundamental requirement of government service, by making sure that our elections are carried out with integrity and security, and by making sure that we are able to punish those who transgress and that we have the tools to make sure that we can hold everybody accountable and keep government transparent and do a better job.

"So, I hope all of this body of work will help improve public trust in our institution. I think that we have responded to that public outrage after seeing what happened in the past couple of years. And it's not just those former members of the Legislature, but we had incidents of corruption happening at the county level in every one of the counties. And so, I think we have been responsible in the House, we took the lead. I thank the Speaker for creating the Commission to Improve Standards of Conduct. We took the recommendations from that commission and all the other related bills. We moved them through the House over to the Senate. Not everything passed, but a strong body of work did pass.

"We have a lot to be proud of and I urge the members to support these three measures here that are on the agenda before us right now. And I think we can all feel good that we did our job in addressing these significant issues and helping through all of this work to improve public trust in our institutions. So, I urge members to support this measure. Thank you."

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in strong support of House Bill 907, House Draft 2, Senate Draft 2, which establishes temporary health insurance reimbursements for telephonic telehealth services.

"I want to thank the chair of the Committee on Health and Homelessness and the chair of the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce for their work on moving this measure forward. I also want to thank their Senate counterparts for moving this measure through the Senate as well. And I want to thank the introducer of the measure, the representative from Moloka'i, for prioritizing this issue during the session.

"I also want to thank the major stakeholders for working together to make this bill a reality, including the Hawai'i Medical Service Association, the Hawai'i Psychological Association, the National Association of Social Workers, Hawai'i Island Association for Marriage and Family Therapists, the Hawai'i Substance Abuse Coalition, the Hawai'i Primary Care Association, the American Association of Retired Persons, the American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network, the Hawai'i Parkinson's Association, the Epilepsy Foundation of Hawai'i, and the Alzheimer's Association of Hawai'i.

"One thing the COVID-19 pandemic has taught us is that telehealth is vital to making sure that healthcare delivery continues to keep Hawai'i's people healthy during public health emergencies. Telehealth relies upon technology and strong internet connections, something that is not available to everyone. Specifically, our seniors don't have or are comfortable with using these computer systems. Having broadband access is also a challenge for people living in remote areas of our state. Allowing for telehealth services to be provided via the telephone creates a lifeline for those that do not have the necessary tools for a video telehealth visit. Telephonic telehealth will also address our mental health crisis by ensuring that people who need help can get it over the phone. In many instances, talking to people to address mental health issues is more important than a visual visit.

"As currently drafted, the reimbursement identified in HB 907, HD 2, SD 2, is set to expire in 2025. Should this program be successful, the Legislature should consider extending the sunset date to make sure that we can provide adequate mental health and other health services to Hawai'i's people.

"For these reasons, I stand in support of House Bill 907, House Draft 2, Senate Draft 2. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support of this measure. As one of the themes is going to be, we were really focused on mental health issues. We still have so much more to do. But this, House Bill 907, relating to telehealth, is going to be one of those major bills that are going to come out of this session that really advances us forward in being able to address the mental health needs of our community. What we learned through the pandemic was the importance of telehealth. This measure, worked on by community stakeholders from hospitals to the plans to providers, is going to ensure that more people throughout the State of Hawai'i can access telehealth, but most importantly, mental health services. So, in strong support, Mr. Speaker, thank you."

Representative Gates rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, may I adopt the Health chair's words as if they were my own. This has been a priority for my community of Waianae, being that it is a very rural community. My commute here is about 38 miles and a

lot of health care is centralized in Honolulu. But to provide them with access and the reimbursement for telehealth will bring health care to many of my community members who are struggling with health issues right now. I want to thank the body for moving this measure out. This has been something we've been working on since COVID also. And so, it's really good to see it finally going through. And *mahalo* to the Health chair, Finance chair, and everyone else. *Mahalo*," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Kahalao rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Belatti be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Poepe rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. As the introducer of this measure, I also wanted to add a comment. Thank you to everyone else who spoke on this very important bill. Prior to the pandemic, we were already slowly implementing telehealth, but I think one of the silver linings was that we were forced to expedite implementation of telehealth in our state.

"For my community and the communities I represent, very rural in nature across Maui County, and this measure will allow access to quality health care for those vulnerable populations, including those in those rural and remote areas, especially with the needed mental health services, those with limited incomes, limited transportation, and making these services more reimbursable. This is a game changer for the delivery of health care in my district. And I just want to thank everyone who helped and the advocates on getting this bill passed this session. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 907, HD 2, SD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TELEHEALTH," passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Hashem and Quinlan being excused.

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in strong support. This is a resolution to support unequivocally the Ukrainian people. Mr. Speaker, I want to thank the author of this bill. At the same time, for those of us in this nation, maybe in the state who have become fatigued by the war in Ukraine. Some have said that we've given money and weapons and we're just tired, we don't see any end at the present battle. To those, I would say this, giving weapons now is probably the least we should be fatigued by.

"Because, Mr. Speaker, if Latvia, or Lithuania, or Estonia, the ones that are easy pickings for Putin to invade, then because of NATO's agreement with the United States, we have to not just put weapons, we have to put boots on the ground. Or if they then move into Poland or to Hungary, then we have all of Europe as a, not a blitzkrieg, but just total devastation.

"The point is, Mr. Speaker, we have to stay the course. This reso says that exactly the case. We are for the Ukrainian people, and the things that we do is steady as you go. And inevitably, I believe this is the way the universe is structured, when as will be the case for the right people at the right time. So, for those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I end by saying, *Slava Ukraini*. Thank you."

Vice Speaker Ilagan: "Members, I would like to announce that tomorrow, on May 3rd, is the 5th anniversary of the 2018 historic Kilauea eruption. The first fissure of the eruption opened on May 3rd, 2018, in a residential subdivision called Leilani Estates in Puna. The following day, on May 4th, the island was struck by a magnitude 6.9 earthquake, as magma continued its move to the lower East Rift Zone. Over the next two months, lava covered 13.7 square miles of land, several dozens of feet deep in places. The flows in the lower East Rift Zone destroyed 700 homes, displaced over 2,000 people, covered 30 miles of road, and added an astonishing 875 acres of new land to Hawai'i Island.

"I thank this body for your support in our continued efforts in the recovery and renewal of a vital and prosperous community in Puna. Five years later, as we move forward, we need to remember that my community is still in a process of healing and growth, and many families are still struggling. They still need roads back to their homes, water, restoration of farms, housing, and basic infrastructure.

"I'm very thankful to our body and our partners who continue to support the recovery of my Puna community. I greatly appreciate this body for remembering tomorrow is the 5th anniversary of the 2018 historic Kilauea eruption. Thank you."

"And of course, last but not least, Nandana Kalupahana, our committee clerk, who, of course, is the backbone of the Finance Committee with all his knowledge and all the years of servicing this House of Representatives as the committee clerk. So, I'd like to thank him. There were days where he just worked straight through and took catnaps here and there and when he could, he would go home and do whatever. So, I'd like to thank him.

"Mr. Speaker, we have an aggressive yet cautious, optimistic approach to building this budget. Enormous federal money that helped us all to survive the pandemic has created unintended consequences for all the states. Government has a rare amount of money and a rare amount of resources. If strategically spent well, this can pay dividends for future legislatures.

"This budget focuses on healing and investing in our future. This budget increases Medicaid reimbursement rates to 100% of Medicare rates by providing over \$72 million to our health care industries. This is an increase to the base budget that will benefit lower-income families with more access to health care."

Representative Nakashima rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Yamashita continued, stating:

"Thank you very much. A 2019 report showed that Hawai'i is 42nd among all the states in Medicaid reimbursements rates to doctors and other medical providers. This change will vault us into the top five states of this reimbursement.

"This budget also provides \$100 million to agencies responsible for healing of our natural resources by fixing our parks and beaches, rejuvenating our conservation and preservation lands, supporting our aquatic resources.

"Another base budget adjustment, the addition of \$38.8 million to the Preschool Open Doors program that will allow it to expand public and private preschool early learning opportunities to three-year-olds. In another bill, we provided \$2 million to help 220 childcare providers to get financial and technical assistance they need for accreditation to receive POD and other funding streams. This will in turn make their operations more stable and increase the supply of child care and early learning seats statewide.

"We have invested over \$300 million to increase our inventory of affordable housing and providing various supportive housing services for low and the middle class.

"Those are just four examples of how we have set up the state budget for decades of success.

"Mr. Speaker, this budget strikes a responsible balance between the needs of today and building a strong foundation for tomorrow. As you know, this is a biennium budget, so your Committee on Finance intends to work through the interim to continue discussions with your chairs, the departments, and others involved to continue refining the budgets of all departments, increasing performance analysis to improve outcomes, and also a deeper dive into our tax code.

"Mr. Speaker, I'd also like to insert the comments that I made on House Bill 300, HD 1 on third reading. And also, I'd like to insert further comments into the Journal adding additional highlights and other examples of meeting the needs of building a strong foundation for tomorrow. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Yamashita's written remarks are as follows:

"Mr. Speaker, the 2023 majority package placed a heavy emphasis on health and welfare. The health of our children, and the welfare of our most vulnerable.

"Along with a package of bills that will increase the food / excise tax credit, the earned income tax credit, and the dependent and child care tax credit, providing tens of millions of dollars back to our most vulnerable families, this budget provides:

- \$7 million in FY24 & FY25 for Hawai'i Keiki: Health & Ready to Learn including mental health components;
- \$1 million and 2.0 FTE in FY24 & FY25 for youth suicide awareness and prevention protocol pursuant to Act 270, SLH 2019;
- \$5 million for mental health services for public school students in FY24 and FY25;
- \$15 million in FY24 & \$10 million in FY25 for Behavioral Analysis Services contracted costs;
- \$10 million to replace aging equipment and address soil contamination at multiple schools;
- \$3.3 million in FY24 and \$4,500,000 in FY25 for the Child Wellness Incentive Pilot Program;
- \$1.7 million in both years for physical and mental health services that ensure all students have on-demand, scheduled care, treatment planning, and care management;
- 6.0 perm district educational specialists to support mental health;
- Supports the Safe Spaces Program by providing \$71,016 and 1 FTE; and \$800,000 in FY24 and FY25 for contracted services;
- Enhances child protective services and support for child care by adding:
 - \$14,407,441 in FY24 and \$13,167,756 in FY25 for core program needs;
 - \$2,450,000 per year for enhanced contract services;
 - \$1,809,461 in FY24 for increased operational support; and
 - \$468,894 in FY24 /\$435,816 in FY25 with federal matching funds for salary differentials to retain highly trained employees.

"These priorities, and more, are reflected in the House draft of the budget and the package of bills developed by the House.

"At the same time, the March 2023 Council on Revenues fired a warning shot across our bow. We were forced to pay attention as a seemingly small adjustment in our revenue projection rippled out to cause a \$1.2 billion loss in revenue by the end of the biennium for which we are budgeting. Yet, we were able to craft a final CDI of the budget that retains the fundamental goals of the House majority package.

"In order to show bond rating agencies, who control the state's credit rating, that we are not haphazardly spending our surplus, the House insisted on two things to shore up the structural stability of the budget:

1. Adding an additional \$500 million to our rainy day fund, taking our reserve balance to over \$2 billion; and
2. Setting aside at least \$200 million to fix our decaying infrastructure in schools, university facilities, hospitals, prisons, and numerous other state buildings.

"Mr. Speaker, please recall that, hand in hand with the goal of securing the health and welfare of our children and most vulnerable, is to fix our environment and infrastructure. We currently have a deferred maintenance backlog of over \$1.2 billion in our schools, university facilities, hospitals, prisons, and other facilities statewide that cannot be fixed by bond financing. In the House draft of this budget bill, we proposed an appropriation of \$1 billion that was to be spent over a period of five to ten years to eliminate this backlog. Please keep in mind that last year, we provided the Department of Education (DOE) with \$256 million just to tackle the deferred maintenance issues in their facilities, bringing the total resources available to over \$1.2 billion.

"That \$1 billion has been reduced to \$200 million in this final version of the budget, yet the \$256 million remains available to the DOE for its use. The intent of the \$200 million is to ensure that other agencies get a chance to fix their facilities.

"A budget proviso that was reinstated this year provides the governor a great deal of flexibility in tapping the \$200 million set aside, and some are eyeing that pot of money to spend on recurring expenses. We need to be cautious in the use of this one-time appropriation of money and ensure that we do not cause future shortfalls that could cause cuts to valuable state programs.

"Mr. Speaker, the budget is a complicated document, not easily digestible for any one person. Everyone, including the media, rather than creating and succumbing to sound bites, must do their part to review and analyze requests made by all agencies.

"The work of your Committee on Finance began on January 4, 2023 and continued through governor's messages received in February, March, and April. Mr. Speaker, this was an extraordinary challenge as your committee did not receive details of the majority of this budget until well into February, with nearly half the session completed.

"Much hyperbole has been expressed over the past few days regarding the budget, particularly in the Department of Education.

"The devil is always in the details. Especially in the budget.

"Mr. Speaker, HB 300, CD 1 is a sound budget, yet challenges remain that we will need to address as soon as next year. Our biggest challenge will be the end of federal fiscal relief and funding.

"In the Department of Education and University of Hawai'i, we have seen unprecedented direct federal funding through the upcoming fiscal year 2023 - 2024:

- \$663.8 million for the DOE
- \$264.5 million for UOH; and
- \$24.3 million that can be used for both

"From July 2020 through October 2024, the federal government will give \$952 million to the Department of Education and to the University of Hawai'i to spend.

"From the state's discretionary pot of federal assistance under the American Rescue Plan, Governor Ige and Governor Green have set aside an additional \$50 million to the DOE and \$28 million for UH.

"That's a total of at least \$1.3 billion being spent in DOE and UH. The bulk of it, approximately \$500 million, will be spent between July 2022 and October 2024.

"During the upcoming interim, we will all need to evaluate the programs created and enhanced by the Board of Education and the Department of Education, and the Board of Regents and the University of Hawai'i. Without any more federal support, these programs will have to rely on state funding to continue into the future.

"Let me repeat that: in one year, we will be faced with making choices on several hundreds of millions of dollars' worth of programs that will need state funding to continue.

"Mr. Speaker, the details of the budget are critical to its understanding.

"Members who were here just a few short years ago may recall that the budget conference covered every line item in painstaking detail over several days. Last year, in an effort to streamline the process, the former chair of the Finance Committee and the WAM chair provided major highlights of the budget and left the minutiae of technical changes to the worksheets. Perhaps streamlining the process needs to be revisited.

"Mr. Speaker, details matter, and accuracy matters in our final work product. This process has never been instantaneous. However, simply comparing what may have happened in the budget by comparing grand total amounts across different drafts of the budget only serves to confuse and confound.

"For example, Mr. Speaker, if we compare the budgets as contained in the various governor's messages (GM) and the CD1, we will see that:

"In the Department of Accounting and General Services, there is a \$12 million increase in FY24; yet there is an \$18 million decrease in FY25. There was a \$17 million request in each year of the biennium for insurance payments for state buildings. Last year, the Legislature required the Executive Branch to evaluate alternatives to risk management and how the state insures itself against losses. That study will be due in a few months. In the meantime, it would not be prudent for us to budget, and essentially hand out \$17 million in FY25 to an insurance company.

"Budget details matter, Mr. Speaker.

"In the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism, there is a \$153 million increase between GM and CD1 in FY24; however, there is a \$279 million decrease between GM and CD1 in FY25.

"By prioritizing the funding in FY24, the CD1 provides:

- \$200 million to HCDA for various projects that include reclaimed water irrigation systems, UH West O'ahu infrastructure, Kapalama infrastructure, and Kaka'ako improvements;
- \$100 million for the majority package initiative to provide low-income families with access to the GEMS program for the installation of alternative energy in their homes, thereby reducing electricity costs;
- \$50 million as a deposit into the Dwelling Unit Revolving fund (DURF) in FY24 and FY25; and
- \$100 million for the Rental Housing Revolving Fund (RHRF) and another \$180 million in FY25.

"The \$279 million reduction in FY25 is because the GM requested:

- \$200 million in FY24 and FY25 or \$400 million for the DURF over 2 years; while the CD1 funds \$100 million over the two years;
- \$500 million over two years for the RHRF; while the CD1 provides \$289 million over the same two years; and
- The CD1 reprioritized and modified the funding request and ended up having to greatly reduce the amounts appropriated in FY25 in order to balance the budget.

"The macro budget seems to imply that we made crippling cuts to affordable housing initiatives in the department. Nothing could be further from the truth when all funding for DURF and RHRF in the past 2 years are taken into account.

"Mr. Speaker, the budget details show a prudent, responsible approach to creating a more sustainable budget.

"In the Department of Human Services, between the GM and the CD1, there is \$29 million less in FY24 and \$15 million less in FY25. On the surface, this looks like major reductions in funding for the department.

"What the budget details show us:

- The GM included \$38.8 million in FY24 for expansion of the Preschool Open Doors program to 3-year-olds:
 - Analysis of the request indicated that the department would not be ready to implement the program in the first year, so funding was cut in FY24.
- The GM included \$15 million per year for the Ohana Zones program:
 - Analysis of the request indicated that not all previous similar funding levels had been completely utilized, so funding was only provided in the first year; and
 - The Legislature will, thus, be able to monitor progress and provide additional funding, if warranted.

"In the Department of Education (excluding Libraries, Charter Schools, and School Facilities Authority), between the GM and the CD1, there is \$57 million less in FY24 and \$109.6 million less in FY25. On the surface, this looks like another major reduction in funding.

"However, the support for teachers and efforts toward their retention has never been greater.

- In 2022, the Legislature added \$121 million to the EDN 100 base budget for purposes of salary re-pricing for teachers;
- During the current year, FY23, re-pricing ended up costing \$53 million, leaving \$68 million that could only be used for salary purposes – which is exactly how the funds were reallocated;
- The Governor and HSTA recently negotiated a contract which will require the following amounts:
 - \$89.6 million in FY24;
 - \$122.7 million in FY25;
 - \$166.9 million in FY26; and
 - \$209.9 million in FY27.
- In addition to salary increases, the following were added to the EDN budget:
 - \$2.5 million in FY24 for Career & Technical Education teacher differentials;
 - \$660,000 in FY24 and FY25 for Early Childhood Educator Stipend which will support the recruitment and retention of qualified early learning professionals;
 - 36.00 permanent positions and \$3.9 million in FY24 and 126.00 permanent positions and \$7.6 million in FY25 for early learning classrooms; and
 - \$3.6 million in FY24 for teacher positions and operational support to provide work based learning for students with severe disabilities.

"In the University of Hawai'i, the CD1 is less than the GM by \$34 million in F24 and \$60 million in FY25. On the surface, this looks dramatic and crippling.

"The details of the budget show:

- \$19 million per year was due to not funding the expansion of the Promise Program to the 4-year colleges;
- \$17,526,848 in FY24 COVID-related restorations even though \$10 million of additions by the Department of Budget and Finance were deemed unnecessary; and
- The UH Center on Nursing proposal for program expansion included duplication of funding across the several GMs submitted to the Legislature.

"Historically, there have been major policy differences between the House and Senate in working with the University of Hawai'i. As a result, where we

could, first year funding was included with the expectation that numerous items will be revisited for consideration during the 2024 Regular Session.

"As you can see, Mr. Speaker, details matter. Simply looking at budget totals can and will do a disservice to any cogent analysis of the budget.

"HB 300, CD 1 is a prudent, sound budget that will take care of our long term needs, and at the same time, is flexible enough to give us options should fiscal circumstances change in the coming months.

"I urge my colleagues' support. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, this is a good budget, but I have some reservations regarding an omission, if I may say. I really like teacher housing, I really like the *kauhale*, the affordable housing, the number of things that was just announced about Medicare, that's very, very good leverage, the ability to fix our roads, *et cetera*.

"But there's one thing conspicuously absent, Mr. Speaker, and that's the Hawai'i Tourism Authority funding. This is the biggest driver of our, well it's half of our economy, it's one of the biggest drivers. And more so, Mr. Speaker, this is where the ALICE families live and depend upon. If anything happens to our visitor industry, it's the ALICE families, not people in this room that is going to get hurt, it's those who are right on the edge, the working poor that are going to get hurt.

"So, Mr. Speaker, I would say rather than say that this budget is perfect, I say it's perfect except for its gross omission, which I consider cruel and unusual punishment to leave our biggest industry hanging out on its own, Mr. Speaker. I don't think that's a good policy.

"And I would lastly say, I would urge Governor Green to be alert to possibly shifting funds, which the governor has the power to do, from other departments if it gets to be struggling and numbers go down and occupancy rates go down, that we can throw a lifeline to what otherwise this body and the Senate has denied to the goose that lays the golden eggs, the Hawai'i tourism industry. For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, a good budget but cruel and unusual in its omission of HTA. Thank you."

Representative Quinlan rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support, Mr. Speaker. So, unfortunately, this year the House and the Senate could not reach agreement in the allotted time on a funding and appropriations measure for the tourism authority. But over this past weekend, the administration and both the House and the Senate worked very hard to find other ways to fund the tourism authority.

"And I'm happy to report that with the governor's help and lieutenant governor's help, we have identified other sources of funding so that we can preserve the core functions of the tourism authority, most specifically and most importantly to me, destination management and our cultural support. Because as I've said so often on this floor, the key to the future of tourism in Hawai'i is destination management. Thank you."

Representative Amato rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations. I want to take a moment to thank the Finance chair and the entire committee for their tireless, countless hours of work creating this budget. It is a lot of work. It's quite honestly a job that is often thankless. Thank you to all of the House committee chairs and the vice chairs who have fought and advocated for the needs of their committees. And thank you to the body for your work to support those needs as well. But there are some concerns with the budget, and for that reason, I rise with reservations. Thank you."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in opposition. There are some good things about House Bill 300. But the budget that we are voting on today also contains many, many problems. House Bill 300 continues to harm Hawai'i's public education system. Since 2008, the DOE's budget has increased by roughly 25% to 35% less than the overall state budget. House Bill 300 continues the historic underfunding of our public education system,

appropriating nearly \$65 million less in fiscal year 2024 and nearly \$110 million less in fiscal year 2025 than the governor's budget request.

"This budget cuts the amount of money that our state is spending on the weighted student formula, funding that goes directly to our schools for school level services and programs by basically the exact same amount that we're spending on HSTA's new contract. We have a \$2 billion surplus. It is immoral for us to pit the DOE against teachers by cutting school services to pay for a very modest pay raise for hardworking teachers that deserve so much more. This looks like it may be related to HSTA successfully bargaining a new contract.

"These budget cuts to education will also damage our *keiki*'s learning and may put us in jeopardy of failing to meet federal maintenance of effort and maintenance of equity requirements.

"Additionally, this budget leaves the University of Hawai'i in a precarious financial position. It leaves UH \$1.1 million in deficit for fiscal year 2024, and \$18 million in deficit for fiscal year 2025.

"We're increasing the food excise tax credit, but we did little to support programs that strengthen food security for low-income families. House Bill 300 fails to fund the Double Up Food Bucks food incentive program, a dollar-for-dollar matching program that lets SNAP participants double their purchasing power. This means that the program will get no federal matching funds, so it will be severely restricted and be available to fewer families and at fewer stores.

"Even some of the core human services programs were impacted. Our safe spaces for youth program received no funding or positions. Child welfare funding was also slashed at a time when our state is facing a child welfare crisis. We are allocating \$500 million per year to the rainy day fund, which already has over \$900 million in it. For working families, it's not just raining, it's pouring right now. They need our help today to handle inflation, the rising cost of housing, the soaring cost of child care and health care, and the constantly skyrocketing cost of simply trying to survive here in our island home.

"We are spending \$30 million on prison expansion, \$50 million on a cop city training campus for law enforcement, and \$63 million in capital improvement funds on an artificial reef constructed by the Hawai'i Institute of Marine Biology through the Department of Defense's DARPA program. That's almost \$150 million that we could have spent to support our deteriorating schools, uplifting rural health clinics, and building green infrastructure that promotes genuine climate resilience and so much more.

"Being fiscally responsible means passing a budget that responds to the concerns of Hawai'i's residents. This budget has a few bright spots, and I do celebrate those. But it is sorely lacking in *aloha* for our state. And for those reasons, I'm voting no."

At 11:11 a.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 11:14 a.m.

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition. Regrettably, Mr. Speaker, I have to vote no on this bill. I don't believe this budget represents the will of the House of Representatives and it does not represent the will of our communities, specifically the community I represent. I request we vote this budget down and return to the Legislature prior to the deadline in July to briefly reconvene on a budget that supports the will of the people.

"Mr. Speaker, last week, nearly 200 bills died here at the Legislature. In ordinary jobs, including waiting tables, which is one of the jobs I used to have, you can't just clock out if you don't square your ledger, there's going to be consequences.

"In a year in which we have significant revenues outside of investments from the American recovery plan and other federal programs, this budget includes both cuts to public education and significant overspending on programs with little to no oversight.

"As public safety and the practice of law is my background, I was surprised to see a \$10 million appropriation for an RFP for a new O'ahu Community Correctional Center. The state just concluded a \$10 million RFP last year, which went primarily to Architects Hawai'i and a private prison corporation. They spent most of that money on lobbying the oversight commission.

"The University of Hawai'i and this legislature are speaking now about the overarching goals of the project, which may cost as much as \$1 billion to state taxpayers. Another \$10 million RFP to corporations who do not consider the wishes of the Legislature is an unreasonable ask when we are doing the work for free.

"When the Department of Public Safety split into two last year, creating the Office of Law Enforcement, it was unclear what they wanted. In this budget, there's an allocation for \$45 million for IT work. It was not thoroughly vetted by the House, and it seems like a significant waste of taxpayer dollars for an agency that did not exist last year and has never appeared before the Legislature prior to just a few months ago.

"Mr. Speaker, this budget includes a \$10 million expenditure of state tax dollars directed to the Honolulu Board of Water Supply to dig monitor wells as a result of the Red Hill disaster. Mr. Speaker, the U.S. Navy poisoned our aquifer. There are currently massive experimental filtration units that are pumping water out of the Red Hill shaft. The Moanalua shaft, which represents 24% of Honolulu's drinking water, remains shuttered. There are many unknown questions, and we have to dig, at the cost of \$1 million per well, shafts to find where the plume of toxins has spread throughout the land.

"We have yet to truly get reimbursed from the federal government. And despite pronouncements from the Red Hill Joint Task Force, from the U.S. Navy we have only seen more spills and continued demands that we give state land to the Department of Defense. We have not spoken as a collective despite our community asking us to do so. The state taxpayers have not yet demanded reimbursement through us.

"Mr. Speaker, this budget cuts public education. Based on this budget, there seems to be a desire to starve the Department of Education and force the department to cut teachers, principals, and entire schools. Schools, Mr. Speaker, are the heart of our communities and many of us have strong relationships to them. There seems to be a penalty for increasing teacher pay pursuant to recent contract negotiations.

"Mr. Speaker, it may be the intention outlined in this budget to starve small schools into shuttering. Schools like Linapuni Elementary in Kalihi, which I have the pleasure of representing, which is a site of revival of community, a Title I school that, if anything, deserves more resources, not less.

"At the university level, there are millions that have been depleted from the University of Hawai'i System, although strangely, several GIA projects have been funded in specific sites. I'll reserve comments for later if necessary. Thank you so much. Again, in opposition."

Representative Hussey-Burdick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I respectfully dissent. A budget is a moral document. It's a reflection of what we as a society value enough to fully fund and what we don't. There are a lot of things in this document that I like. Funding for homeless services, infrastructure improvements, and environmental management. But as much as I want to vote yes, I cannot support a budget that treats education as an afterthought while simultaneously exceeding the expenditure ceiling by \$1.6 billion.

"I can understand overspending by that amount if every penny was essential for the health and well-being of our people and the environment. But I cannot support that level of overspending when it includes \$64 million for rental car facility improvements. I certainly cannot support pouring another \$120 million into the Agribusiness Development Corporation, that has been proven to have done almost nothing to implement its statutory mandates over the last 30 years. And I'm disappointed that we chose to prioritize \$33 million to improve the reflecting pool around the Capitol, which looks ugly but really does not have a statewide impact. And yet we

couldn't manage to find any funding for the number one most popular ethics reform measure this year, publicly funded elections.

"Mr. Speaker, my vote is also based on process. I think the fact that we're standing here today with perhaps an unprecedented number of legislators disappointed in the final version of the budget is indicative of a lack of transparency and input from the members. Some municipalities have a completely open process called participatory budgeting, where the taxpayers get to decide which line items to prioritize. Here we have an opaque, chaotic system where even the conferees didn't get to see the final draft of the budget before they voted on it, and very few people had meaningful input along the way.

"Let me be very clear that when I vote against this budget, I'm not voting to kill the appropriation or any of the bills that come after, I'm voting to empower the House to go back to the Senate with a message that we won't settle for less than what our constituents deserve. I'm voting to extend session so that we can do the work of the people properly with a more transparent and inclusive process that prioritizes the needs of the next generation. *Mahalo.*"

Representative Perruso rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in strong opposition. I want to first thank the members of the Finance Committee for your diligent efforts and your late nights and your very hard work. But as chair of the Committee on Higher Education, I cannot support this budget. The University of Hawai'i plays a critical role in Hawai'i's future, but it is the only department or agency where COVID funds were not restored with HB 300, CD 1. It was the House's position to restore those funds, but in the CD 1, in this budget, they are not restored.

"HB 300 would mean a massive budget shortfall for Hawai'i's public university system, leaving it to operate nearly in the red for this first year of tremendous surplus, which is ridiculous, at a time when we pay lip service to the idea of stopping the brain drain and keeping our young people here in Hawai'i. It is our most important tool for keeping our local families intact. As a mother, as an educator, and as a representative of a working-class district, I cannot vote yes on this budget. A budget is meant to reflect our collective values, as my colleagues have mentioned and spoke so eloquently to. It is meant to care for our community and invest in the future that we want to build. This budget does neither of those things. For those reasons, I'm in opposition and reserve further comments."

Representative Ichiyama rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in support. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. As the chair of the Committee on Water & Land, I am in support of House Bill 300 for many reasons, but especially because of the historic funding for the Department of Land and Natural Resources. House Bill 300 appropriates \$25 million in general funds for forestry resource management and development, an additional \$14.7 million in general funds for ecosystem protection and restoration resources, it adds \$1.5 million for the Hawai'i Invasive Species Council, six positions to the Commission on Water Resource Management for Red Hill and for water resources and permitting. It also adds a historic \$50 million for our parks' administration and operations for renovations and improvements, which are sorely needed statewide. And finally, in addition to these and many other adjustments to the department's budget, it adds \$2 million as well as four FTs for our Nā Ala Hele Trail and Access Program.

"Mr. Speaker, I hear the concerns of my colleagues about the funding for the Department of Education and the University of Hawai'i. These departments take the lion's share of our budget every year, and departments like the Department of Land and Natural Resources have struggled to maintain our state parks, beaches, trails, which are used most frequently by our tourist industry and become an attraction for Hawai'i to our benefit, I believe. So, I am grateful for these appropriations in House Bill 300 to support our land and natural resources. Thank you."

Representative Cochran rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I stand here in opposition with comments, but I'd like to preface my comments that my no vote does not in any way diminish the hard work of the committee on both sides of the House and

Senate. The gratitude for all the work that everyone has put into this, this no vote does not diminish it. All the West Maui, House District 14, positive additions into it are greatly appreciated. So, I *mahalo* everyone who got it to the finish line. So, *mahalo*.

"I'm going to share my concerns mainly over the process, which was already mentioned. And so, the process for me, and maybe it comes from stemming having been eight years as a council member working under the Sunshine Law, coming here has really been hard for me to work without sunshine, and it really just doesn't sit well with me deep down, it's just something that I cannot get used to.

"And on top of that, coming in and hearing that there's a 60-day calendar clock that we have to vet thousands of bills under, that already we are under a stress of a time crunch timeline. And in that type of process, things get lost in the shuffle, fall through the cracks, don't get to see the light of day, get its due diligence, due process. And I think this budget is the final product of that, that flaw in the process.

"And so, asking this body here if people here to have that courage to change it, to change the mindset, to change the process of how we do things here. I know this is how it's been done, but for me, it hasn't shaken out quite well for a lot of us. And so, something's got to change because we can't keep doing things the same way, expecting different results. And again, that chute that goes through the process. If we do that, we can bring back the faith, trust, and confidence of the people that got us here, that want us to represent them and their needs, their voice. And I know that's why I'm here.

"So, I just want to say that I have worked on eight other budgets, albeit smaller, for Maui County. There was one other budget that I voted no on, and that was because I knew there was a single item in that budget that was done with corruption. And today, two state legislators, one department director of the county, and another county worker are doing time.

"So, again, this hasn't given me enough information, hasn't been clear in the process. I haven't been able to insert my voice and scrutiny on it. So, I am not comfortable. I do not have confidence in attaching my name to this final product and to this document at this time. So, I thank everybody, again, for all their efforts, time, energy, and effort on this. But I cannot stand here in wholehearted support and attach my name. So, *mahalo* for this time to explain myself."

Representative Souza rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in opposition. And I do echo the sentiments of some of the previous speakers in opposition. And I also thank the Finance chair and the members of the committee for their hard work on this budget. Just briefly, I feel that this budget does not prioritize the needs of the working-class families and *keiki*, especially as a representative for my district, District 43, Makakilo and Kapolei, I can't in good faith endorse this final budget. So, it's a no vote for me. Thank you."

Representative Takayama rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. Mr. Speaker, I am supporting this budget although it does not contain every item I wish it did, nor are all of the appropriation bills that follow containing the items I wish they did. In a few weeks I'll have to be informing residents in Pearl City that their healthy aging classes we're not funded by the state, so they have to pay for them themselves. But I'm going to tell them that we're going to try again next year to get funding for that program.

"We do appropriate in a bill, in a few minutes, that appropriates \$1 million for our Alzheimer's education program. This is something we've been trying to enact for the past four years, and we're successful this year thanks to representative from Nanakuli and the chair of the Finance Committee.

"My point, Mr. Speaker, is that every state budget ever passed by this body has been the product of compromise. Some compromise is good, some compromise is bad. But at the end, if every legislator in this body voted against the state budget because it contained an item they objected to or an item that failed to be included, we would never enact a state budget, Mr. Speaker. For that reason, I ask my colleagues to join me in supporting the budget. Thank you."

Representative Hashimoto rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Strong support. I think when we started out on this legislative session, we had many priorities. I think one of them was for affordable housing, one of the biggest crises that we're facing in our state. And I think this budget delivers for affordable housing and continues the housing pipeline. And I think because of that, it's a critical piece of legislation that we need to push forward.

"We're making \$80 million cash infusion into the rental housing revolving fund, \$100 million in '24 and \$180 million FY25, \$100 million cash infusion into the dwelling unit revolving fund, \$50 million over the biennium. We also are doing \$15 million for Ohana Zones to take care of the most vulnerable population, in addition to another \$5 million for permanent supportive housing, we're going to support those who are 30% area median income and below. We also put in \$15 million for *kauhale* projects this coming year and another \$33 million in the biennium in the year after that, and so there's a tremendous amount of money for homeless housing throughout the biennium.

"We also invested over \$200 million in infrastructure projects all throughout the state for various TOD projects in Kaka'ako, in Kalaehoa. We're tasking HCDA and the University of Hawai'i to continue to make sure that housing is delivered. It's never an easy task, it takes time, but we need to make these investments, and I think HB 300 has delivered on that.

"And I think we need to continue looking forward and look at the wins that we get in the budget to make sure that we solve some of the biggest crises. Because I think this is what is driving up the cost of living. And I think we needed to really focus on housing because if we can get housing costs under control, because housing cost is typically the biggest portion of what you spend in your budget every single month, so if we can bring that cost down, the cost of living in Hawai'i will be that much more manageable.

"So, with that, Mr. Speaker, I think this is a very important piece of legislation, I think we should all be supportive of the strides that we've taken in HB 300. Thank you."

Representative Kila rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, rising in strong support. Mr. Speaker, the accusations on this floor today that the budget is flawed may be true. But to accuse the members of this body by not operating in the sense of transparency and lack of communication is absolutely false. Members on the Finance Committee have worked tirelessly to defend this budget and operate as such.

"Mr. Speaker, there are 51 members here in this House, and if we were to operate as individuals, we would all vote no on this budget. It is a collective idea to move forward in the ideas that we would work on. Mr. Speaker, I'd also like to adopt the words of the Water & Land chair and the Tourism chair as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Kila continued, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, if I came in here every session not getting everything I wanted and I would be upset as such, who am I to contribute to this body? Mr. Speaker, there are great works that have been done by the chairs in this budget to defend as such. We are moving towards supporting the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands and our natural resources. And for that alone, things that have not been funded in previous pasts, means something now more than ever.

"I look to my members on Finance and I speak for myself and the thanks that are giving on this floor seems to be lack of their such. We have worked tirelessly night and day to communicate our needs with the Finance chair, leadership here in the House, and members here in this House. There has never not been a chance for anyone to not engage in the process as such. And every member has had the chance to come before the Finance chair, Finance vice chair, and Finance committee members to talk as such. And I appreciate every single member who has worked with us to work through this budget.

"Do I think it's perfect? Maybe. There are some things that we can work on, but that is the beauty of democracy, that we can continue to come back

every single time to work on it more. Mr. Speaker, and for those reasons alone, I stand in support of this budget."

Representative Woodson rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support with serious reservations. I'm struggling with this conversation admittedly, being emotional. I appreciate the work that has gone into crafting this budget. I know that there were some factors that made it very challenging this year, and it is no small feat to get us to where we are today.

"Having said that, Mr. Speaker, I have serious concerns with the reduction in funds for our Department of Education. We know when we look at the budget, there is \$167 million less than what the governor requested in his operational budget. And it should be known that that budget submittal, which was executively approved, was similar from past governors' requests.

"And so, that means that is a reduction for our Department of Education to the magnitude of over 5%. And that may seem like a small number, Mr. Speaker, but it is virtually impossible to squeeze out efficiencies in our system to the magnitude of 5%, 7%, 8%. Even if you take out all the unnecessary administrative duties, you're not going to be able to cut 7%, 8%.

"So, that means we have to cut people, Mr. Speaker. Now, some may argue that the DOE is bloated, that we overspend on our kids. But we can do a preliminary assessment for ourselves to ask ourselves that question. Are we overspending on our kids? You can look at many different ways. You can take as an example, our NAEP scores.

"NAEP stands for the National Assessment of Educational Progress. It is required by the U.S. ED that each state take this assessment. It's referred to as the nation's report card. And our most recent NAEP scores show the State of Hawai'i, when you look at the continuous data, it shows that we were flat. Which may seem like a bad thing, but compared to the last assessment, which was done pre-COVID, it shows the same numbers. So, that means actually, because we know in the State of Hawai'i, there was a dip in all of our assessment scores. That was true not only in Hawai'i, that was true across the country, and also true across the world. All of our kids suffer from learning loss. So, for our state, we actually dipped and we improved.

"So, you take a look at three significant variables. You take a look at how you spend the money, you take a look at how much is allocated per that system, and you take a look at the desired outcome. We always speak of preparedness, college and career ready. What does that mean? That means we want our kids to be internationally competitive upon exit from high school.

"And so, per our normal budget allocation and how we're spending that money, that suggests to me that actually we are spending the necessary funding to support our kids. But I would actually make the argument that we need to increase that funding. And so I said, Mr. Speaker, it comes back to cutting people."

Representative Marten rose to yield her time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Woodson continued, stating:

"Most of the people in the Department of Education are people. And those people are mostly teachers. I said on this floor before, Mr. Speaker, that each and every one of us in this chamber has been positively impacted by at least one teacher. So, now we're going to grab teachers out of the classroom. What is the impact going to be for that, for the trajectory of that student? Our teachers electrify imaginations, they ignite curiosity, and for many of our kids, the teachers are all they have. They are the ones that tell these *keiki*, you're good enough, you can succeed, you're worthy, keep going. What happens to their trajectory? What happens to their future? What happens to our collective futures? That is the question I have, Mr. Speaker.

"And by the way, Mr. Speaker, we are approaching a mental health crisis in our schools, in our public schools. And we still have a teacher shortage. So, whether the number is 900, 500, 200, we know it's not zero. We need more teachers, not less. We need more support, not less.

"Having said all that, Mr. Speaker, I am grateful for the wisdom of the Finance chair. He did insert a proviso that will afford the governor and the B&F director to hopefully fill those gaps to make the department whole for at least fiscal year 24. I am hopeful that he will do that. It's for these reasons and others, Mr. Speaker, I stand to support but with serious reservations, and I hope that we can fix it. Thank you."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in opposition to House Bill 300, House Draft 1, Senate Draft 1, Conference Draft 1. Before I begin, Mr. Speaker, may I request to insert written comments. It makes me physically sick to my stomach to stand up in opposition to this CD 1, because I haven't voted no on a bill perhaps for over a decade. And as has been expressed by my chairs, this draft does indeed contain many things, many good things that I support. However, as it has been said, this CD 1 fails both on substance and process.

"First on substance. As it has been said time and time again in this chamber, in the hallways, and as we go back to our communities, the budget is the most important bill that we can vote on as legislators. This bill expresses our policies, our priorities, our very values as a community. When the dust settles and we can all carefully examine this budget and the all-important budget worksheets that will not come out for several weeks, I am very concerned, as some of my co-chairs and colleagues have said, that this budget does not adequately fund and it actually seriously underfunds public schools and the University of Hawai'i, arguably the two most important government services that we have here in the State of Hawai'i.

"This underfunding of public education and higher education comes at a time when we have a budget surplus and we are exceeding the budget expenditure ceiling by \$1,063,767,367. I'm going to say this again, this expenditure ceiling is a constitutionally mandated spending cap that is calculated and based upon the personal income taxes that we are collecting from the hardworking residents of this state. And we are exceeding this cap by over \$1 billion while underfunding public education and higher education in the time of a budget surplus. This is absurd.

"This begs the questions, what are we spending our taxpayers' money on, if not public education and higher education? Where is our taxpayer monies going? What is being funded and what is not being funded? These are the important critical questions we should ask. These are the substantive questions that will be answered in the days that come.

"Second, this CD 1 fails on process and is based on a practice far worse than even the gut-and-replace practice that has been determined to be unconstitutional. Section 5 of CD 1 is the linchpin of this bill that creates a \$200 million slush fund for the governor to move \$200 million in general funds from Budget and Finance to 'other state agencies for government operations.'

"Now, we may hear after the fact that this is based on custom and practice, as well as being something that we have done in the past. But members, Mr. Speaker, I have scoured HD 1, I have scoured SD 1, I listened carefully to the deliberations of the conference committee that decided upon this budget. I read thoroughly the press release that announced what was in CD 1, and I could not find this language there. It is widely known that this budget proviso was negotiated after the fact of the voting on this measure.

"Now, this budget proviso may in fact save and provide the opportunity for us to make whole those important departments, like the Department of Education and the University of Hawai'i. And I hope those departments are made whole. But they need to be made whole, and this is now going to become a political football, by this measure. Because in Section 5 of CD 1 it says that, 'the governor shall provide notice to the legislature 14 days prior to the date of transfer and submit a report to the legislature within five days of each use of this authority; provided further that the report shall include the date of transfer, the amount of the transfer, the program ID from which funds were transferred, the program ID to which funds were transferred, the impact to the program ID funds are transferred from, and a detailed explanation of the public purposes served by the transfer of resources.'

"When this budget passes, which I expect that it will, this is now going to become a political football in all of our communities. And I will be the first one to stand up and say, we need to make sure that the Department of Education and the University of Hawai'i is not underfunded."

Representative Kobayashi rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Belatti continued, stating:

"Thank you. And I will wrap up. It's for these reasons, Mr. Speaker, I know that there are good things in this budget, but based on substance and process, I vote no. Thank you."

Representative Belatti's written remarks are as follows:

"In addition to my stated opposition to this year's operating budget encompassed in House Bill 300, Conference Draft 1, I am also opposed to this measure because of unanswered questions surrounding the expenditure ceiling or the spending cap identified in this measure and how it has been calculated.

"During this year's conference period, this constitutionally mandated expenditure ceiling was calculated such that House Bill 300 as voted out by the conference committee would have caused the state general fund expenditure ceiling for fiscal year 2023-2024 to be exceeded by \$1,043,597,367 or 10%. Now, the state operating budget contained in this Conference Draft 1 causes the state general fund expenditure ceiling for fiscal year 2023-2024 to be exceeded by \$1,063,767,367 or 10%.

"There may be a very simple, mathematical explanation for this \$20,170,000 difference, and our fiscal and budgetary leaders in both the legislative and executive branches should explain this discrepancy. However, this discrepancy underscores my greater concerns that lawmakers and the general public need to better understand: (1) how the expenditure ceiling was calculated for this budget; (2) how the expenditure ceiling will be calculated for future budgets and appropriation bills; and (3) what are the implications for exceeding the spending cap both for future budgets and the financial well-being of the state. Understanding these budgetary mechanisms will enable us to make better decisions about how we spend taxpayers' hard-earned monies to most efficiently and effectively provide core government services and provide broader tax relief to our ALICE (asset limited, income constrained, employed) families.

"For these concerns, and my previously stated concerns, I vote in opposition to this measure."

Representative Tam rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise with reservations. I would just like to have the comments from the representative from Kihēi inserted into the Journal as if they're my own. And I want to just make mention that there are things in this budget that are good and that represent our values. But it's very difficult to give a full pledge approval when I believe that this budget also goes against some of the things that we should be against. There are things that are grossly overfunded and there are things that are grossly underfunded. And that is why today I cannot give my full support for this budget. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, second time, with a very brief comment. First, I want to thank the gentleman from the North Shore who assured me that the governor will be considering funding HTA, throwing a lifeline if they run short or the lights go out. And secondly, Mr. Speaker, on a personal note, this has been music to my ears. You guys know I've been here a long time. I've never heard the debate with such passion, such specificity. And this is what democracy is all about.

"So, I want to thank everybody for participating. I expected this when I was a freshman, that every session that we had would be like this. It's finally arised, and I want to thank all of you for that. And thank you, Mr. Speaker, for allowing the motion to continue without anybody saying 'recess.' Thank you, sir."

Representative Souza rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Rising second time in opposition and I would like the words of the representative from Kaimuki inserted into the Journal as my own. Thank you," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Perruso rose to respond, stating:

"Rising for the second time in opposition. And I would first like to echo that request to have those comments entered into the Journal as if they were my own, along with the comments from the chair of Education.

"I want to say that the people who rise in opposition are not asking for a perfect budget. We are asking for a good budget and one that we can be proud of. And this is not a personal issue, no one is critiquing anybody on personal grounds, this is a policy issue. This is our job. We are professionals. That's why we are here, to do the work of our communities.

"I will say that this is not a people's budget. It is a corporate budget, it is a corporation budget, is a developer's budget, it is a builder's budget."

Representative Quinlan rose to a point of order, stating:

"Point of order. Casting aspersions, impugning motive, given the business."

The Chair addressed Representative Perruso, stating:

"Representative, please confine your remarks to House Bill 300."

Representative Perruso continued, stating:

"Then I will reframe that comment to say, it is not a people's budget. How else do we explain to our constituents that in a year where we have an almost \$2 billion surplus, we have decreased spending on public universities and the Department of Education while giving hundreds of millions of dollars to DBEDT. How else do we explain that we have cut funding for the Department of Human Services at a time when so many are in need?"

"How else do we explain that we gave only \$10 million to Housing First, which is a proven, demonstrated program to help people transition out of homelessness, while sneaking in almost 20 times that amount for a first responders campus in my district that nobody wants. How else do we explain that we again have failed to invest meaningfully in a diversified local food system through grants to small farmers when so many are going hungry?"

"In both process and outcome, this budget undermines public confidence in the Legislature. This is something that we should be very attuned to. It's our job to not just maintain public confidence, but to increase public confidence. The rationale behind a budget like this is that even in a year of surplus, we have to save for a rainy day. I can tell you, unequivocally, that for our constituents, for my constituents, it's raining now. And without a budget that prioritizes the working families of Hawai'i, in a year of extraordinary surplus, the storm is going to get worse.

"This is not work that I feel that I can be proud of. And although we all want session to be over, we should not leave until we do our jobs right."

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support of HB 300. There are many concerns being raised on this floor today, and I'd like to say, there are many questions being asked. What are we spending our funding on? Is it addressing the people's budget and the people's needs? I would like to say yes, it does.

"This budget sets \$700 million over the next five years to help working families, ALICE families in Hawai'i. It doubles the earned income tax credit, it doubles the food excise tax credit, and it almost quadruples the child and dependent tax credit. This is all going to benefit working families in Hawai'i.

"The concern that we're not addressing education in this budget. Yes, there are some areas that may be underfunded, but this budget shows \$800 million that will benefit the students throughout the State of Hawai'i. By increasing the HSTA contract, starting teachers will now get \$50,000 as opposed to \$38,000 to survive in Hawai'i. And with a shortage of up to 1,000 teachers, this is going to make a huge difference and this is ultimately going to benefit our students. That's \$600 million alone.

"What this budget also does that is so unique, for the very first time since I've been here, is that it sets aside \$170 million for teacher housing that incorporates preschools for our three- and four-year-olds, \$170 million

spread across our state to help our teachers to be there near the campuses where they live, to have the kinds of preschool services that they need for their kids. And it creates an incredible opportunity to provide additional support for our teachers so that they can be in the classroom and teach our kids. And this budget includes \$38 million for the Preschool Open Doors program that will benefit three-year-olds. It currently benefits four-year-olds.

"The other key piece to this budget that benefits our students is that there's about \$3 or \$4 million in here to help private preschools get accredited by the accreditation agencies so that we can do more to provide three and four-year-olds the education that they need. And this will also help to alleviate the shortage of preschool classes throughout our state.

"So, yes, there's many things in here. When we talk about diversifying our economy, there's \$60 or \$70 million in here to improve our dams and our infrastructure irrigation systems so that we can promote more diversified agriculture throughout our state. And we also have funds in here, \$30 million that will leverage almost \$90 million in federal funds to increase broadband infrastructure throughout the state. And this is going to serve these remote areas and rural areas that are currently not served.

"The Housing chair went through the laundry list of housing programs that will serve low income, moderate, and our working families that many of them are very exciting to me, as a former Housing chair, but that adds up to over \$600 million."

Representative Gates rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Nakamura continued, stating:

"Thank you. So, when we say that this is not the people's budget, I think some of the items that I described, some of the budget line items that are buried in there, actually do so much for the people of the state, our working families. And I'm very proud of this budget.

"I know there are areas that we need to work on, but overall, I'd like to recognize the work of the Finance chair and vice chair and committee in bringing this budget forward. Thank you."

Representative Ilagan rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, coming into opening day, I remember standing in the rotunda. In support of positions that we were focused on, which was affordable housing, delivering mental health services, as well as protecting and preserving our natural resources. In this budget, Mr. Speaker, we have put in monies over the biennium of \$280 million into the rental housing revolving fund that serves families of area median income of 60% and under. We also put in \$100 million for the dwelling unit revolving fund that helps infrastructure for affordable housing.

"And in delivering mental health services, we put in \$3.5 million per year for the Child and Adolescent Crisis Mobile Outreach program that's piloted here on O'ahu."

Representative Belatti rose to a point of order, stating:

"Point of order, just a clarification. That's going to be in a bill."

Representative Ilagan continued, stating:

"These are the majority package, Mr. Speaker, and we have put in monies as well as into the budget to protect, preserve, and manage our natural resources of \$192 million into this budget over the biennium. So, Mr. Speaker, I just want to support strongly this budget because I know our Finance chair did a lot of work, as well as the members in Finance who have worked long hours to make this budget happen.

"I also have an item in this budget that helps out my community, and that is the Pohoiki boat ramp of putting into the CIP to help out reopening the boat ramp that was inundated by lava. So, Mr. Speaker, I just want to stand here in support. Thank you."

Representative Todd rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Nakamura be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Kahaloa rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Nakamura be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Gates rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Nakamura be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Quinlan rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Nakamura be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Aiu rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Nakamura be entered into the Journal as his own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Takenouchi rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Nakamura be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Garcia rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"With reservations, thank you. There's a lot of good in this budget, but there's also a lot, and I mean a lot, of wasteful spending. This budget was alluded to as the people's budget, some think it's not. I think this budget fits some people, but not all people. Once again, like was mentioned, there's a \$2.6 billion surplus, yet here we are exceeding our own spending limits outlined in our own constitution.

"And I hear from some members, Mr. Speaker, across the aisle, that what we need is more spending, that this doesn't go far enough and that that is what's needed to cure inflation. However, we are in this mess of inflation because of government overspending. And so once again, there's lots of good in this budget, but a lot and a lot of wasteful spending. So, for those reasons, with reservations."

Representative Alcos rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, in support. I'd like to adopt the words of Districts 34, 10, 44, 9, and 4," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Alcos continued, stating:

"I want to adopt the words and I want to say that it's a hard decision for a Finance chair. I had the privilege of sitting on Finance, and I haven't come against any bills at that time to stop the Finance or say no to. Having written a letter to my community or to the unions or to come against these Finance chairs or the Finance bills that come in, neither did I even do it in Labor nor in CAI. We passed these bills on the floor or in our committees, and now we're here standing to go against what the bill's, how the money went out. But as a football player, as a football coach, some of the coaches would have to call a play to win the game. And that coach want to win that game. But we may not agree with the play that the coach calls out there and that final destination might be a lose, might be a win, but we don't give up on our team.

"As sitting down as a team player with our committee, with our caucus, if I want to make a difference, if I want to make a change, I will try to find a way to get involved more. To next time write that letter, to next time step up and get people involved, and to say a big word. So, Mr. Speaker, I support this bill. And if I want to make a difference, I need to step up more. Thank you."

Representative Mizuno rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I certainly hear the concerns of our members. My concern was the \$500 million going to the rainy day fund, perhaps could have been used to shore up some of the needs in some of our other programs. But with that said, at the end of the day, I support this bill, and I'll tell you why.

"It was a huge win for early education, about \$38 million going to educate three-year-olds. Preschool Open Doors program, we're expanding that. We already cover four-year-olds. It's a win for education. When our kids go to kindergarten, they're ready to go. By third grade, if they're up to par with their reading level, they're going to do well. If not, the statistics are daunting.

"But it's a win for education and it's a win for the economy. People will ask, this is early education, how is it a win for the economy? Well, many of these kids, three- and four-year-olds, are in the lower-income brackets. And they may be a single-parent household, they may have both parents. But with this bill and with this funding, these single-parent households or dual-parent households can work full time. Because now their three- and four-year-olds will be going to an early Preschool Open Doors program, getting their education while mom and dad work, eventually getting off public assistance and paying their taxes. This is good for the economy.

"I also wanted to say, a win for early education, it's also a win for health care. I'll explain why. I think the chair of Finance did quite well, \$30 million in state general funds, which will draw down \$42.8 million in federal Medicaid funds. Why is that important? It's reimbursement to our doctors, to our nurses, to our healthcare professionals. Why? Hawai'i's got nearly an 800-doctor shortage. We've got a professional healthcare shortage in our state.

"There's an exodus of doctors going to the mainland because they are not reimbursed enough. This will stop that. We're going to keep our doc's nurses here with this bill, which will make Medicaid reimbursement, which was originally 60% of Medicare, now equal, 100% of Medicare. Now, I know Medicare is not the highest reimbursement rate, but it's significantly higher than Medicaid. And before, they were only getting 60% reimbursed of Medicare. This draws it up to 100% of Medicare. It's a win for our doctors, our nurses, it's also a win for Hawai'i's Medicaid population. How is this, what, 100 people, 100,000? How many people? Four hundred sixty-four thousand Hawai'i residents are on Medicaid. Why is this a win for them? Access to health care. Docs not taking Medicaid clients, reimbursement too low. This is a game changer because now it allows access to health care for 464,000 people in the State of Hawai'i on Medicaid.

So, at the end of the day, it's a win. Is it a perfect budget? No. Can we do better? Absolutely. Are we focused on better transparency next year? 100% yes, I agree. But at the end of the day, we did get some wins. So, I wanted to thank all members. I value all their comments, whether it's for or against this bill. At the end of the day, though, I support this budget. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Holt rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. I would just like to thank the Finance chair. We did do a lot of good things in this budget, including over \$125 million in tax relief for our working families with children, between the household and dependent care services tax credit, the earned income tax credit, and the refundable food and excise tax credit, it's much-needed relief to our families. And if I could also have the words of the majority leader inserted into the Journal as if they were my own. Thank you, Mr. Speaker," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. I would like to thank everybody involved with getting this budget this far. At the same time, I'm voting no because I believe there's a lot of issues in our state, and this budget would continue those issues. We are giving a lot of money to the leadership in our state. Let me read to us the salaries. So, for the governor, he will get \$184,000 every year from this budget. Lieutenant governor gets \$183,000. The director of the state gets \$183,000, attorney general, *et cetera*. Second department directors like DAGS, DEBDT, DCCA, *et cetera*, they get \$147,000 every year from this budget. So, we're all voting, some of us yes, some of us no, in favor of these high salaries to our public servants.

"There's some other issues I have with this budget. We are basically funding more of the problem. I believe most of the government is the problem. While a lot of us here have selfless intentions trying to help, I believe a lot of the problems in our state are because of our big budget. A \$22 billion budget I think is too much. A \$2.6 billion surplus is too much.

"The things that are good I think about budgets in general is pro learning, pro transportation, pro Department of Defense, pro police and law enforcement, pro school improvements, pro increasing teacher's pay. But because there's so many things that can be improved in this budget, I vote no."

Representative Nishimoto rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. First of all, I really want to thank all the members for allowing me to be your CIP chair this year. It's a role that I took very seriously, it's a role that I try to do my best and work hard at. But I know it's an important role for our state and for our members. And for that, I'm grateful for you to trust me to do this.

"As I said in my speech for HD 1, the things that we are going to emphasize in CIP was going to be health and safety and education. And the final product that came out, I'm very proud of. We spent \$175 million on state hospitals statewide. And we put \$878 million in public schools and libraries for CIP statewide, and another almost \$400 million for public colleges statewide. And these are all projects that members said that were important to them and were important to their communities. And I think there's a lot in our CIP budget that we can hang our hats on and be proud of. Thank you."

Representative Kitagawa rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. Thank you to everyone who has shared their thoughts on today's budget. And for me, I had the privilege and opportunity, thanks to all of you, to work on grants-in-aid, which is included in today's budget. And through grants-in-aid, we were able to provide \$20 million in capital improvement projects as well as \$20 million in operating costs to support our nonprofits across the state who do excellent work to serve numerous communities and all of our communities as well.

"Just some highlights of things that we did in the grants-in-aid, we supported programs and organizations that support agriculture and to grow and develop our agriculture industry, including farmers. We supported programs that support *keiki* and education, increasing afterschool programming, increasing literacy opportunities. We supported programs that support families. We put a lot of money into diaper banks, into programs that are going to strengthen families, parents, and parental education.

"We supported programs that support victims of domestic violence and sexual abuse. We provided funding for programs that address homelessness and support individuals who are going through homelessness, whether it's youth or whether it's just programing like IHS, HHRC, Project Vision, all of these different programs that support homelessness. We supported programs that increase food security through food hubs, through the food bank. We supported health care, hospitals. We supported mental health initiatives.

"So, this budget provides \$40 million to all of these organizations that work tirelessly every day in our communities to provide this support. So, I am in strong support of today's budget. Thank you very much."

Representative Poepoe rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 300, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET," passed Final Reading by a vote of 41 ayes to 8 noes, with Representatives Amato, Garcia, Poepoe, Tam, Ward, and Woodson voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Belatti, Cochran, Ganaden, Hussey-Burdick, Kapela, Perruso, Pierick, and Souza voting no, and with Representatives Lowen and Martinez being excused.

At 12:13 p.m., the Chair noted that the following bill passed Final Reading:

H.B. No. 300, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1

At 12:13 p.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 12:31 p.m.

At this time, the Chair recognized the Clerk who announced:

"Mr. Speaker, I have been informed by a representative of the President of the Senate that the conference committee report for House Bill No. 300, House Draft 1, Senate Draft 1, Conference Draft 1, was adopted and said House Bill, Relating to the State Budget, passed final reading in the Senate at 11:34 a.m. on this day.

"In addition, I have been informed by the Assistant Clerk of the House that at 12:16 p.m. on this day, House Bill No. 300, House Draft 1, Senate Draft 1, Conference Draft 1, was duly transmitted by the Legislature to the Governor pursuant to Article VII, Section 9 of the Hawai'i State Constitution."

H.B. No. 933, HD 2, SD 1, CD 2:

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, H.B. No. 933, HD 2, SD 1, CD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TELECOMMUNICATIONS ACCESS FOR INDIVIDUALS WITH PRINT DISABILITIES," passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Lowen and Martinez being excused.

H.B. No. 1366, HD 1, SD 2, CD 2:

Representative Nakamura moved that H.B. No. 1366, HD 1, SD 2, CD 2 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Mizuno rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support. There are no throwaway people in our society. I also wanted to say that homelessness is complex, but we have another tool to address this issue. Quick background on why I support this bill. Why do we have homeless? It's a rhetorical question, of course. A number of our people suffer from a mental condition, an addiction, and some suffer from both. It's termed 'dually diagnosed.' We have veterans who place their lives in harm's way to protect our freedoms and return to us with post-traumatic stress disorder. Others have employment but are just not able to maintain a home or rental unit due to the high cost of living in our state. Some of our homeless are domestic violence victims and others were forced into sex or labor trafficking. And finally, some people choose to be homeless, which is their choice. It's not against the law.

"Policies to address homeless, we've got a few. The Housing First program helps chronically homeless. These are the ones with generally a drug addiction and a mental condition dually diagnosed. These are the hardest to provide shelter for. We've passed Ohana Zones. I remember 15 years ago, this was a laughable concept. And I'm not here to pick on any party or any governor. But back then, I remember working with Governor Lingle's administration and they, when we brought up Ohana Zones, they thought this was a joke.

"And yet today, when we look at our state budget, we place \$15 million for fiscal year 2023-2024 to provide homeless individuals with a secure zone, with housing, meals, hygienic centers, and wraparound social services. We've got *kauhale* projects, these are housing villages for the homeless, adding \$15 million for fiscal year 2023-2024 and another \$33 million for fiscal years 24-25. That's \$63 million for homeless projects, counting Ohana Zones.

"And you heard the chair of Housing. They've done a great job, the current chair and the past chair, they've worked to pass and increase measures for increase in affordable housing units and rental housing units. Finally, we have a statewide homeless coordinator and Honolulu has a city homeless coordinator to navigate and coordinate the homeless shelters, housing villages, and service programs for the homeless.

"And today, Mr. Speaker, the Legislature will have the opportunity to make Hawai'i the first state in the nation to have a successful state-supported return to home program. Please note that New York had a program to send their homeless out of state, but it failed because they simply exported their homeless without a support plan. New York's program failed to ensure that these homeless individuals would be received by families on the mainland, a strong support system to help them navigate and get back on their feet. Upon arrival, they did not have the support, that's why their program failed.

"It may seem counterintuitive that I'm against the New York program but I'm advocating for Hawai'i's program. Let me explain. Most importantly, our program will contact the family on the mainland to confirm their acceptance of this family member or loved one into their household. The program will not send a homeless person to any state where they will continue to be homeless. The individual's participation is completely voluntary. And an individual shall participate in the return to home program

only once and shall sign an agreement to this effect, the Department of Human Services to keep such records.

"The program shall assist participants with the necessary preparation for travel, proper ID, access and transportation to the airport, preparations relating to airport security, and ensuring personal hygiene.

"Rhetorical question number two. How do we know this program is going to be a success? Well, looking at testimony on this measure dated March 15, 2023 by former Honolulu Mayor Mufi Hannemann and the president of the Hawai'i Lodging and Tourism Association."

Representative Ganaden rose to yield his time, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Mizuno continued, stating:

"Thank you, representative. Mufi Hannemann provided his testimony in relevant part, again I quote, it was reported that nearly 800 people participated and just 2% have returned to Hawai'i. We believe a major reason for the high level of success of our program was that it required the individual to be met at their destination by a family member or a loved one. He's talking about the return to home program that they initiated.

"Testimony on the bill, also dated March 15, 2023, by Connie Mitchell, the executive director of the Institute for Human Services, probably our top expert on homelessness in the state, provides in relevant part, again I quote Connie Mitchell, the program has by all accounts been a success, and at its peak pre-COVID, was successful in relocating over 100 people each year. In the past eight years, we have helped relocate over 600 people from O'ahu primarily to the mainland U.S. and neighbor islands. Mitchell goes on to say that the cost to our community to support a homeless individual is estimated on the low end at \$35,000.

"I want to reconcile the difference between Mufi Hannemann saying that they reported that nearly 800 people participated and Connie Mitchell had reported 600. Please note, Connie Mitchell's talking about relocated over 600 people from O'ahu. Mufi Hannemann worked on the neighbor islands, so they had an additional 200. That's the difference.

"Mr. Speaker, if this program returns just three homeless to their family on the mainland, it will exceed the entire funding for this program, which is \$100,000. The state homeless coordinator, James Koshiba, probably one of the top experts, if not behind Connie Mitchell, probably the second top expert in the state on homelessness, in a Star-Advertiser article dated May 2, 2023, provided this statement on the return to home program saying, and I quote, this is a valuable resource. I'm glad the Legislature saw fit to put resources into it.

"Mr. Speaker, I was honored to discuss this program with James Koshiba during conference and he confirmed that he would be willing to assist this program, and that's why we put him in the bill to help with the implementation of this program.

"The return to home program will work not only because our top two experts on homelessness, Connie Mitchell and James Koshiba, support this bill, but for these three reasons. It's going to reunite the homeless individual with their family. This is a strong support system which will help them heal, rehabilitate, get them back on their feet, and in time hopefully become self-sufficient again. Also, the program saves Hawai'i's taxpayers a significant amount of money. Finally, the program will protect the finite resources we have for local homeless.

"Finally, Mr. Speaker, I am not under any illusion that Hawai'i's return to home program will end homelessness, as this program is no silver bullet to our homeless situation. But it will be an important part of our state's strategic plan to have a coordinated effort to systematically reduce homelessness. For all of the foregoing reasons, I ask members to vote up on this bill. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Strong support. Mr. Speaker, by way of cost and compassion, this is probably one of the best bills we are passing this session. The former speaker, the author, I'd like to thank him for what he's done. And to know that this is not a fly by night that we're suddenly doing this. During the Abercrombie administration, we had a similar bill. It was a

pilot. but with, again, the author who just spoke as the progenitor of this. The Abercrombie administration, the director of Health, did not believe that this was something they should do, so they never spent it. So, this is the real deal, we're finally putting the money in and making this happen, reuniting families with families. That is compassion. And the cost of it is very, very minimal.

"Lastly, Mr. Speaker, I want to correct one thing from the former speaker, and that was his reference to the Lingle administration not knowing or caring, having forgotten. And I think he was here with me at the time, when Governor Lingle declared a state of emergency due to homelessness. Then former mayor and then Representative Caldwell objected to that. This is a bit of history, Mr. Speaker. My colleague, Cynthia Thielen, said, how heartless are you to object to the state of homelessness by Governor Lingle? So, I wanted to straighten that, for the record. She was compassionate. She was the first one to ever call homelessness a state of emergency. And quite frankly, after the 6,000 to 7,000 every year we count, it is still an emergency and this one will alleviate it to a degree.

"And lastly, on a personal note, Mr. Speaker, tonight I have a beer summit, and the beer summit featured speaker, as you were in the past, Connie Mitchell. She'll be at the Koko Marina Shopping Center at the Greek Marina at 6:00 p.m. If people want to meet what I think is the private tzar--"

The Chair addressed Representative Ward, stating:

"Representative Ward, we're not on announcements. Please confine your remarks."

Representative Ward: "Yeah, I know that this is not something, but she mentioned Connie Mitchell just a bit ago."

Representative Nakamura rose to a point of order, stating:

"Point of order. Please stick to the subject matter."

The Chair addressed Representative Ward, stating:

"Representative Ward, please confine your remarks unless you want me to call for a recess."

Representative Ward continued, stating:

"She is the tzar of the private sector. I want to commend Connie Mitchell. I know. I'm finished. I've confined it and that's all I've got to say. Thank you."

Representative Garcia rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. He did say some things, but I do want to say that with so much locals leaving Hawai'i because they can't afford to live here, it's nice to see the non-locals going home. Thank you."

Representative Alcos rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. I'd like to adopt my words of District 29, Kalihi. Thank you, as my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Pierick rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. I'd like to thank this body for introducing and advancing a measure that will send homeless people away from Hawai'i back to their home on the mainland. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 1366, HD 1, SD 2, CD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HOMELESSNESS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Lowen and Martinez being excused.

H.B. No. 870, HD 2, SD 1, CD 2:

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, H.B. No. 870, HD 2, SD 1, CD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE NEIGHBOR ISLANDS BLIND AND VISUALLY IMPAIRED SERVICE PILOT PROGRAM," passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Lowen and Martinez being excused.

H.B. No. 600, HD 1, SD 2, CD 2:

Representative Nakamura moved that H.B. No. 600, HD 1, SD 2, CD 2 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Holt rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, with reservations. My reservations come from the portion of the measure that add the standing committee chairs to the board. As I stated on Tuesday, if we're going to add members, I believe that we should defer to your wisdom, Mr. Speaker, and let you name them yourself. Thank you."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. Mr. Speaker, last year, according to the Department of Transportation and other state agencies, there were over 100 traffic fatalities involving pedestrians throughout the state. There were issues of people getting hit by cars throughout urban Honolulu. My district has advocated vehemently for improved sidewalks, the ability to move through their community safely and freely. I think it might be kind of surprising, but safe sidewalks means safe communities. As neighbors get to know each other and walk to and from school and work, they have eyes on the street, they get to support better public safety. I want to thank the chair of Transportation for his diligent work in conference. This is one of the bright spots of this year. And I hope that we can get out in time for our press conference at 2:30 p.m. in the Rotunda."

Representative Todd rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, in support. I just wanted to share some of the prior concerns about me being a member of this committee. And I'll do my best to do less work on it, I guess? That's all."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, also in strong support. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I just want to commend the body for bringing this forward and having it, if you will, overwhelm what otherwise was legalizing jaywalking. If we made jaywalking part of safe streets, that would be an oxymoron. I'm really proud that we have not passed jaywalking as legal, but we have, in effect, passed safe streets. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 600, HD 1, SD 2, CD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL," passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representative Holt voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Lowen and Martinez being excused.

H.B. No. 554, HD 2, SD 2, CD 2:

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, H.B. No. 554, HD 2, SD 2, CD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CAMPUS SAFETY," passed Final Reading by a vote of 45 ayes to 4 noes, with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, Kong, and Pierick voting no, and with Representatives Lowen and Martinez being excused.

S.B. No. 945, SD 2, HD 2, CD 2:

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, S.B. No. 945, SD 2, HD 2, CD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SPECIAL PURPOSE DIGITAL CURRENCY LICENSURE," passed Final Reading by a vote of 44 ayes to 5 noes, with Representatives Alcos, Garcia, Kapela, Matsumoto, and Perruso voting no, and with Representatives Lowen and Martinez being excused.

H.B. No. 676, HD 1, SD 2, CD 2:

Representative Nakamura moved that H.B. No. 676, HD 1, SD 2, CD 2 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Nakamura moved to recommit H.B. No. 676, HD 1, SD 2, CD 2 to the Committee on Conference, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in support of the motion to recommit, stating:

"In support. Thank you, my fellow members. I believe the public will appreciate this."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.B. No. 676, HD 1, SD 2, CD 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO DISTRICT BOUNDARY AMENDMENTS," was recommitted to the Committee on Conference, with Representatives Hashem, Lowen, and Martinez being excused.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 74 and H.B. No. 660, HD 1, SD 2, CD 1:

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. And specifically, I am disappointed that the \$65 million that was a part of the previous Senate version for bulkhead repairs is not in this CD 1. The \$6 million for the environmental impact statement for Hakuone is not in here as well. And the \$13 million for Kukaniloko is not in here as well.

"I feel that we wouldn't have to necessarily penny pinch as to what is coming out of the general fund if OHA was realizing the full benefits of the ceded land revenues that's owed to them. And so, going forward, I hope that we can continue to support Hawaiians and our Hawaiian community. And I am in support of this bill, but I think that we could fund OHA better. Thank you."

Representative Tarnas rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, in support. This measure that we're passing right now provides the Office of Hawaiian Affairs everything that they asked for in their original budget, and I think that's a strong position that we should take from the House. So, I urge all members to vote for this. Thank you."

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. I'd like to insert the comments of the representative from Kapolei as if they were my own. And I'd also additionally like to add that as the budget moves through the process, it has become clear to me that many in my community were asking for, were seeking additional support for Kukamiloko, so I am similarly disappointed in the failure to fund that. *Mahalo*," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Souza rose to respond, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Second time in support, and I would like to just address the previous, previous speaker's comment. A lot of times I think that Hawaiians and OHA in particular, they only ask for what they think they can get. And I think that that's been a problem in the past. And so, I understand that that was their original request in the budget initially. But they did see the need as they kept coming back to the Legislature to fund these other things that were included in the Senate version prior to the conference version. So, I do feel that we are shortchanging them in some sense because this has been a need all along. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With reservations, please. Mr. Speaker, clearly, we are low-balling OHA here, \$3 million for 500,000 people, give me a break. I mean, there's 250,000 Hawaiians here and there is even more on the mainland. And we talked about our budget, HB 300 is being short on taking care of people.

"The point is, until they get 20% of the ceded lands, this is going to be a continual short shrifting and otherwise denying OHA what otherwise, by the Constitution, they have been formed, but we've not funded them. And I know they only ask for that amount because they know we are so stingy in terms of giving Hawaiian issue. Now I don't mention the \$600 billion because that's an entirely different issue. In fact, since we've given the \$600, we kind of stop paying attention to a lot of the OHA issue. The point is, \$3 million does not represent the commitment that the people of Hawai'i have for the indigenous people. Thank you."

Representative Kapela rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I'd just like to adopt the words from the first time from the representative from Kapolei," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Holt rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support. I appreciate the work by the Judiciary chair making sure that OHA gets their request. I have expressed to OHA that I don't believe that they should be requesting these funds but that is contingent upon us fully funding their public land trust. We're still millions and millions of dollars short of paying them what they're owed. I look forward to working with the governor and OHA, with the working group that we passed last year, to get a clearer inventory and a more accurate figure on the public land trust revenues given to OHA. Thank you."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. "Mr. Speaker, I wanted to add to the words of the representative from Puna, in strong support. This was actually part of a bill last year that was excised in the very first committee, and I am so grateful that the Majority Caucus decided to champion this particular program and expand it to a neighbor island. This would provide services with specialists for child and adolescent mental health to go out into the community where they have a crisis, whether it's possibly self-harm or harm to others, or just something that their care providers cannot handle, and then also provide ongoing care for up to two months if needed and get them into long-term services.

"It is an investment, but it's something that can prevent much larger costs because you would not need to have these kids end up in emergency room, in a psychiatric ward, in other types of residential living situations, including juvenile detention. And it's an opportunity to keep them in their homes with whoever is providing care for them, be they foster parents or their birth families, and give them a chance to stay there. So, I really appreciate this investment. I hope the pilot is successful and, in a few years, we come back to make it permanent. Thank you."

Representative Nakamura rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Marten be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Kapela rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Marten be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. For those of you who don't know, *pamantasan* is a Filipino word which means higher education. For many Filipinos who are first generation college students, they lack role models, support systems, and university services to help them successfully navigate the higher education

setting. However, they possess the ingredients to excel in education, contribute as professionals in Hawai'i's workforce, and be outstanding leaders.

"As the second largest ethnic group in Hawai'i, it is critical that attention be given to the challenges faced by this population to support efforts of the University of Hawai'i. I am grateful for this body for strengthening the University of Hawai'i and the Pamantasan Council's ability to respond to the growing needs of the second largest ethnic group in the state. Thank you."

Representative Tam rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In strong support. I just want the words from the representative from Waipahu, except for the part where she thanked myself, inserted into the Journal as if they were my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative La Chica rose in support of the measure and asked that the remarks of Representative Lamosao be entered into the Journal as her own, and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. I have low expectations of the Criminal Justice Research Institute after the last several years of essentially inaction by giving us information that we could use to discuss best practices in criminal justice reform. I believe that \$1.3 million is too much to spend on this research, considering that we can get much of this information locally from the Office of the Attorney General and the Department of Public Safety. The Office of the Attorney General did not support this in their testimony before the Judiciary Committee. Nationally, we can get data from the Department of Justice, the MacArthur Foundation, and the Arnold foundation.

"Mr. Speaker, the fundamental questions about whether or not best practices regarding criminal justice work, whether or not things like pretrial reform, bail reform, which we don't even talk about anymore, other issues regarding how to give people better services and drug rehabilitation, whether or not they work, they have been proven in other jurisdictions, and we have that data now. Thank you so much."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 68, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CRIMINAL JUSTICE," passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representative Ganaden voting aye with reservations, and with Representatives Lowen and Martinez being excused.

So, from my understanding, we the taxpayers are building the houses of the homeless. So, the homeless who do not work, they do not try to pay taxes, they're receiving the benefits of the hard workers of Hawai'i paying their taxes. I don't think this is fair, so I'm voting no."

Representative Marten rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In strong support. I just want to say that I think this is very innovative and I really appreciate the work that has gone into this by majority leader and others to provide wraparound services. And that's all, strong support."

Representative Todd rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, in support. I just wanted to note that, like many other government programs, which I'm generally in support of, housing assistance for homelessness specifically is one where we have a direct spend, but it actually saves us money in the long run, due in part to the fact that the longer someone is homeless, the more we incur medical debt and those sorts of things that become very, very expensive.

"I remember in my first year here we actually had someone come in and tell us that a single homeless person once racked up \$1 million worth of emergency room visits in the course of one year. So, if you do keep them housed, you actually, while it's not like the most comfortable thing to talk about, is providing this sort of assistance, particularly to those who may be less active in trying to get out of this situation, it actually can reduce the net spend, which is generally a good thing. Thank you."

Representative Nakamura rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. May the words of the representatives from Lanikai and Hilo be entered into the Journal as my own," and the Chair "so ordered." (By reference only.)

Representative Nakamura continued to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support, thank you. I also wanted to add that, to address homelessness in Hawai'i, we need to look at who's out there on our streets, living in bushes, coming out of emergency rooms and having no place to go.

"This bill was worked on over the interim all of last year. Over 85 nonprofit organizations who are working directly with homeless throughout our state were involved in a series of Zoom meetings, bringing in experts from the mainland, talking to established nonprofit developers here, and

then crafting a bill that addresses the critical piece of those with extremely low incomes that have other needs, including mental health illness, substance abuse issues, people coming out of prison, people aging out of foster care, people with mental and developmental and physical disabilities.

"And this bill is a small attempt, a pilot program, to see how we can successfully house these individuals over the long term, and house them successfully so we don't rack up excessive fees in our institutions, in our state hospital, in our prisons, and in our emergency rooms and hospitals. So, thank you for the opportunity to explain why this bill is so critical if we want to truly address our homelessness problem in Hawai'i."

Representative Ganaden rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"No vote. Mr. Speaker, you and I and everyone else here in this room, we are state workers. We get paid on the 5th and the 20th. That isn't the case for court interpreters who perform a vital and necessary service to our democracy. Court interpreters usually get paid around \$25 an hour. When they came to the Legislature requesting a raise, instead of giving them that raise, we offer them this, which I think is an insult, by putting forward a bill that costs \$20,000 for a study to determine their worth. Presuming this study would look at the cost-of-living allowance in the counties where court interpreters work, I believe that's a waste of money, Mr. Speaker, as we can look up a variety of COLAs using information from the Department of Defense and Housing, our State Tax Office, or nonprofits that create spreadsheets regularly.

"Mr. Speaker, this bill is a disrespect to the hardworking people that help our justice system run and I'm ashamed that it was not given more weight, considering it was a priority of the Filipino Caucus. Because there is a disproportionate impact of the justice system on certain communities, this bill will lead to injustice for immigrants who make up a large part of our workforce. Members of the Chuukese, Marshallese, Tagalog, Ilocano, and Mandarin-speaking communities, many who may in fact be not guilty, who

are facing criminal cases and the possibility of deportation, will continue to have a difficult time before the courts, as essentially, interpreters are doing this work for a pittance of what they deserve.

"I vote no, Mr. Speaker, so as to not normalize the use of fake studies to defray the passage of well-articulated and necessary measures for our communities."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 813, SD 1, HD 2, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COURT INTERPRETERS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 46 ayes to 3 noes, with Representatives Ganaden, Kapela, and Perruso voting no, and with Representatives Lowen and Martinez being excused.

SECTION 1. Senate Bill No. 1417, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by deleting Sections 1, 2, and 3.

SECTION 2. Senate Bill No. 1417, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by inserting a new Section 1 to read as follows:

"SECTION 1. The legislature finds that climate change and sea level rise pose significant, dangerous, and imminent threats to the State's social and economic well-being, public safety, nature and environment, cultural resources, property, infrastructure, and government functions and will likely have a disproportionate impact on low-income and otherwise vulnerable communities. A 2017 report by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration projected that 3.2 feet of global mean sea level rise will occur by 2100 in an intermediate scenario and could occur as early as the 2060s in an extreme scenario.

The climate change adaptation priority guidelines of the Hawaii State Planning Act, codified under chapter 226, Hawaii Revised Statutes, direct the State to prepare for the impacts of climate change. Additionally, section 226-109(8), Hawaii Revised Statutes, requires these guidelines to foster cross-jurisdictional collaboration between county, state, and federal agencies and partnerships between government and private entities and other nongovernmental entities, including nonprofit entities, to address climate change. Also, section 225M-9, Hawaii Revised Statutes, requires the office of planning and sustainable development to work with state agencies to identify existing and planned facilities, including critical infrastructure, that are

vulnerable to sea level rise, flooding impacts, and natural hazards, utilizing projections and map data from the most recent update of the Hawaii sea level rise vulnerability and adaptation report, the state hazard mitigation plan, and other pertinent data and scientific reports to aid in this planning.

The legislature recognizes that it is in the long-term interest of the State to also consider climate resiliency in the development of all communities, which considers strategies to reduce the vulnerability from climate-related shocks, such as hurricanes and drought, and improves the ability to recover from these disasters.

The purpose of this Act is to amend the Hawaii state planning act to require new development to consider the impacts of climate change, sea level rise, and climate-resilient development in the design and siting of buildings."

SECTION 3. Senate Bill No. 1417, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by inserting a new Section 2 to read as follows:

"SECTION 2. Section 226-14, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:

"(b) To achieve the general facility systems objective, it shall be the policy of this State to:

- (1) Accommodate the needs of Hawaii's people through coordination of facility systems and capital improvement priorities in consonance with state and county plans.
- (2) Encourage flexibility in the design and development of facility systems to promote prudent use of resources and accommodate changing public demands and priorities.
- (3) Ensure that required facility systems can be supported within resource capacities and at reasonable cost to the user.
- (4) Pursue alternative methods of financing programs and projects and cost-saving techniques in the planning, construction, and maintenance of facility systems.
- (5) Identify existing and planned state facilities that are vulnerable to sea level rise, flooding impacts, and natural hazards.
- (6) Assess a range of options to mitigate the impacts of sea level rise to existing and planned state facilities.
- (7) Require that new development consider the impacts of climate change, sea level rise, and climate-resilient development in the design and siting of buildings."

SECTION 4. Senate Bill No. 1417, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, is amended by inserting a new Section 3 to read as follows:

"SECTION 3. Section 226-109, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

"**[H]§226-109[H] Climate change adaptation priority guidelines.** Priority guidelines to prepare the State to address the impacts of climate change, including impacts to the areas of agriculture; conservation lands; coastal and nearshore marine areas; natural and cultural resources; education; energy; higher education; health; historic preservation; water resources; the built environment, such as housing, recreation, transportation; and the economy shall:

- (1) Ensure that Hawaii's people are educated, informed, and aware of the impacts climate change may have on their communities;
- (2) Encourage community stewardship groups and local stakeholders to participate in planning and implementation of climate change policies;
- (3) Invest in continued monitoring and research of Hawaii's climate and the impacts of climate change on the State;
- (4) Consider native Hawaiian traditional knowledge and practices in planning for the impacts of climate change;
- (5) Encourage the preservation and restoration of natural landscape features, such as coral reefs, beaches and dunes, forests, streams, floodplains, and wetlands, that have the inherent capacity to avoid, minimize, or mitigate the impacts of climate change;
- (6) Explore adaptation strategies that moderate harm or exploit beneficial opportunities in response to actual or expected climate change impacts to the natural and built environments;

- (7) Promote sector resilience in areas such as water, roads, airports, and public health, by encouraging the identification of climate change threats, assessment of potential consequences, and evaluation of adaptation options;
- (8) Foster cross-jurisdictional collaboration between county, state, and federal agencies and partnerships between government and private entities and other nongovernmental entities, including nonprofit entities;
- (9) Use management and implementation approaches that encourage the continual collection, evaluation, and integration of new information and strategies into new and existing practices, policies, and plans; ~~and~~
- (10) Encourage planning and management of the natural and built environments that effectively integrate climate change policy[-]; ~~and~~
- (11) Require that new development consider the impacts of climate change, sea level rise, and climate-resilient development in the design and siting of buildings."

Representative Ward moved that Floor Amendment No. 14 be adopted, seconded by Representative Garcia.

Representative Ward rose to speak in support of the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in a commonsense context for why I'm doing an amendment on this. First, central to American jurisprudence and to the Constitution, basically the values that we live by and defend, is equal opportunity and equality under the law. Mr. Speaker, that means that we should treat everything equally. And unfortunately, this bill, SB 1417, singles out only the Kaka'ako and the Kalaehoa area that should be aware of sea level rise in the event that it happens.

"Some of you who were here when our good colleague Cynthia Thielen was here, she spoke on this floor saying, beware Waikiki, by 2035 or 2040, she said, we're going to be five feet underwater. Mr. Speaker, this amendment puts equality to any shoreline area to be subject to this, not just what otherwise is a suspected Kaka'ako as being in the crosshairs for OHA's building. But for now, let's open it to all shores in all islands. If you have sea level rise on your island and you have buildings by which, because of the danger of sea level rise, this bill will allow you to have jurisdiction to relocate it.

"Mr. Speaker, this levels the playing field. It's a fair way of looking at sea level rise, not just at Kaka'ako or in the area of Kalaehoa. It says, Hawai'i, we are islands, and we are subject to sea level rise, particularly if you have a building right on the ocean.

"Having said that, Mr. Speaker, I urge people to just use common sense. Everybody is going to be subject to sea level rise whether we like it or not. It's an equal opportunity inundation, and this bill covers that through its amendment. Thank you."

Representative Ichiyama rose to speak in opposition to the proposed floor amendment, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to the floor amendment. Mr. Speaker, I appreciate the introducer of the floor amendment's intentions in wanting to raise awareness of the challenges of sea level rise and climate change across our state. I think that is absolutely an issue that we need to take up. And I have no quarrel with the substance that is being proposed in this floor amendment. What I do find troubling, though, is that this is new language that has never before been considered in this bill, before this body, or before the Senate. And therefore, my concern is that it would potentially violate the Constitution's requirement for a bill to be read three times in both bodies in order for it to pass. And for those reasons, I am opposed to the floor amendment. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to respond, stating:

"How did you know I wanted to respond? Mr. Speaker, again, common sense. What is good for the goose is good for the gander. Every island that has ocean-side buildings, we don't need rocket science to interpret that by saying that, well, we haven't had three readings. Some have argued that even

our budget didn't get three readings. Some have argued that the gut-and-replace never got three readings. So, to say that this is a reason for blocking commonsense sea level, which is inevitably going to be in every island's concern, we can do it in one fell swoop now.

"Again, as I said in the beginning, it's common sense. I mean, just don't point out Kaka'ako because I'm going to say things I'm going to get censored for because it's a hit against the Hawaiians. Kalaehoa takes that away a bit. But if we generically put it to equal opportunity under the law, any place, any building, not just OHA's building, but any building, Waikiki or wherever in Lahaina, those that may be subject to this, they should be included. Again, common sense. Sea level rise is an equal opportunity inundation. Thank you again, Mr. Speaker."

The motion that Floor Amendment No. 14, amending S.B. No. 1417, SD 1, HD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CLIMATE CHANGE," be adopted, was put to vote by the Chair and upon a voice vote, failed to carry, with Representatives Aiu, Gates, Lowen, Martinez, Matayoshi, Nishimoto, Todd, and Yamashita being excused.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and H.B. No. 1022, HD 1, SD 1, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FUNDING ADJUSTMENTS FOR STATE PROGRAMS," passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Lowen and Martinez being excused.

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 196 and S.B. No. 975, SD 2, HD 3, CD 1:

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 975, SD 2, HD 3, CD 1 pass Final Reading, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative La Chica rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"*Mahalo*, Mr. Speaker. Just wanted to say thank you to our House Health chair as well as the Senate Health chair for their hard work on this measure. I also am incredibly grateful to House leadership, to you, Mr. Speaker, and to the Finance and Judiciary chairs for passing this measure and for their support.

"For the first time, we are going to be enacting a statewide tobacco tax on e-cigarette products. For over a decade, vaping products remained unregulated in the state. And it was during this time that we saw an entire new generation get hooked on nicotine. It was also during this time that we saw a lot of our teen advocates grow up and during their support for this measure, they're now in full time jobs as adults.

"But today, they get to see their hard work pay off because we will be passing comprehensive regulations in addition to tobacco tax parity. This would also require vape shops to obtain a tobacco permit and license and also restrict online shipping and sales to only those who are registered. This is a good bill and a good public health bill and I urge the members to support this measure. *Mahalo*."

Representative Belatti rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. In support and just very brief comments. I just want to echo some of the comments of the previous speaker. This bill is 10 years in the making. I do want to acknowledge my Senate counterpart as well as the Senate introducer who has worked so long and hard on this. I also want to thank and acknowledge the newer members of this chamber who really were strong advocates. And so, it's the combination of newer members and advocates who have supported us in the past that really got this over the finish line. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 975, SD 2, HD 3, CD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HEALTH," passed Final Reading by a vote of 49 ayes, with Representatives Lowen and Martinez being excused.

The following message from the Governor (Gov. Msg. No. 1128) was received and announced by the Clerk:

Gov. Msg. No. 1128, transmitting his statement of objections to S.B. No. 921, as follows:

STATEMENT OF OBJECTIONS TO SENATE BILL NO. 921

Honorable Members
 Thirty-Second Legislature
 State of Hawai'i

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill No. 921, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to Limitations of Actions."

The purpose of this bill is to extend the deadline to clarify and expressly state that the tolling provision in section 514B-141, Hawaii Revised Statutes, applies to protect the rights of condominium associations to assert legal claims for construction defects against developers until two years after the developer's control of the condominium development is terminated.

This bill is objectionable because it appears to have the unintended consequence of increasing the costs of housing. The bill creates the potential for increased liability which results in the need for additional insurance coverage, which costs are ultimately borne and paid for by the buyers. Our administration is focused on alleviating our critical housing shortage in Hawai'i and we are reluctant to enact any new law that could add costs to housing or delays in construction. While this bill has merit and I commend its sponsors for their work, I am concerned that it will only add costs on future projects, and therefore, have decided to veto this bill.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning Senate Bill No. 921 without my approval.

Gov. Msg. No. 1128 and S.B. No. 921:

Representative Nakamura moved to override the veto of S.B. No. 921, as contained in Gov. Msg. No. 1128, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Sayama rose to speak in support of the override, stating:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in support. This measure passed overwhelmingly by the House. It aims to protect the condominium association's right of action against a developer when there is found to be structural defects in the construction of the condominium building. Under current law, this right is taken away by the association if the developer retains control of the board for over ten years. SB 921 simply fixes this loophole by clarifying that the condominium association retains their right of action against the developer who has terminated control over the board for two years.

"To be clear, this circumstance affects very few condominiums. However, I believe it is prudent that this body moves to fix this loophole and that we protect the rights of condominium owners, that we hold developers accountable who are responsible for faulty construction.

"I do want to address the concerns that have arisen in the last hearing in Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs as well as in the subsequent days. Concerns that this new policy that fixing this loophole will increase the cost of housing. I'd like to reassure the members that through the four hearings and the 21 written testimonies, that we have received no testimony indicating substantive proof that this policy would substantially increase the cost of housing.

"And so, I think that there are some concerns out there, but even if you do recognize them, those concerns shouldn't overshadow the importance of protecting a condominium owner's and the association's right of action to protect their home, to get justice from developers who had failed to build their homes properly, as promised. And so, for these reasons, Mr. Speaker, I respectfully urge the body to once again support this measure and vote to override this veto. And I would like to affirm that your Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce will work with community stakeholders who have concerns over the interim and address them in the next legislative session. So, again, Mr. Speaker, I rise in support, and I respectfully request the body's support on this override. Thank you."

Representative Ward rose to speak in opposition to the override, stating:

"Mr. Speaker, I speak against the override. Mr. Speaker, we made promises at the beginning of this session. We're going to lower the cost of living, we're going to help out with the housing shortage, and this bill does the exact opposite if we override it. The BIA of which some on this House have just spoken, it is not a credible source. This is the Building Industry Association, who knows what housing is about, they build houses, they finance houses. They are the referees of housing. They're the ones who say, this is going to add to the cost of housing. And why would we, after promising we are going to lower your cost of living, we're going to lower the cost of housing, why would we do this, Mr. Speaker? Governor Green knows what he's doing. The BIA knows what they're doing. But I'm not sure that we on this floor know what we're doing if we override this. Thank you."

Representative Tarnas rose to speak in support of the override, stating:

"In support, thank you. Your Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs heard this measure. On the three committee hearings before the bill came to our committee, we had not heard any concerns about any of this opposition that is now coming up. And so, when our committee had the testimony that was in opposition from the Building Industry Association, I asked them, where were you on the earlier three committees? And they said, well, they hadn't submitted any testimony. I guess they didn't feel like it was an issue, but then it became an issue.

"Among the things that the Building Industry Association say, that it would result in additional costs for development. Well, actually, it seems like the developers would still be liable for any of the problems that are found in construction. But what this does is this allows for the association to find the problems. It gives them a couple of years after the developer gives up control in order to find potential problems that they wouldn't have found otherwise.

"The second issue they brought up was that it would have a chilling effect on development in Hawai'i. Again, I'm not a lawyer, but I'm informed that really, they're under the same legal duties, no matter. And so, it may not, in fact, have a chilling effect, but we'll have to monitor that carefully.

"The third opposition point that they brought up was that the proposed amendment is potentially unconstitutional because it treats developers differently from other parties. Well, actually, it treats all condominium developers the same. We have different statutes of limitations for different crimes, and that isn't an equal protection issue. So, I don't see how this would have any bearing on this civil side as well. So, for all these reasons, I think that this is a good bill, and I would support the override of the governor's veto. So, I urge members to support this effort. Thank you."

At this time the Chair called for a roll call vote and the motion to override the veto of S.B. No. 921, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO LIMITATIONS OF ACTIONS," as contained in Gov. Msg. No. 1128, was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and was approved by the required two-thirds vote of the House pursuant to Section 17 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i on the following show of Ayes and Noes:

Representative Ward: "Mr. Speaker, I want to say a big *mahalo* out to the person who gave us these blue leis, who is wearing blue and is a generous representative. And secondly, I'd like to invite all of you, again, to hear Ms. Connie Mitchell speak on all you want to know about homelessness in the Koko Marina Shopping Center at 6:00 p.m. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

The Chair then recognized Representative Nakamura, the Majority Leader, to deliver closing remarks on behalf of the Majority Caucus:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker and majority members, for the incredible opportunity to serve as majority leader. Thank you for keeping me in Honolulu on weekends, for Speaker's early morning phone calls, and television assignments, interview assignments, and for giving me a stipend for chart paper and markers.

"This session has been a learning curve for many of us in the Majority Caucus. Brand new members, first time committee chairs, new committee chair assignments for veteran members, and new leadership roles. And while we've had our ups and downs and bumps along the way, we have much to be proud of.

"We made a commitment to address homelessness and build more affordable housing on Opening Day, and we delivered. Thank you to Housing Chair Troy Hashimoto, Health Chair Della Au Belatti, Education Chair Justin Woodson, Finance Chair Kyle Yamashita, and CIP Chair Scott Nishimoto for coming through in a big way to provide housing for low, moderate, and working families in Hawai'i.

"We made a commitment to reduce taxes for working families, ALICE families, on Opening Day, and we delivered, and much more. Thank you to Economic Development Chair Daniel Holt, Finance Chair Kyle Yamashita, Vice Chair Kitagawa for working with the Senate and delivering thousands of dollars of targeted tax relief, \$703 million over the next five years for our ALICE families.

"We made a commitment to the environment and to address climate change on Opening Day, and we delivered. Thank you to Water & Land Chair Linda Ichiyama, EEP Chair Nicole Lowen, Tourism Chair Sean Quinlan, and Finance Chair Yamashita for investing in our environment that brings so much joy, solace, and rejuvenation for all of Hawai'i's residents.

"And finally, Mr. Speaker, we made a commitment to the mental health of our residents, and we delivered. And we can do and will do much more. Thank you to Representative Lisa Marten, Health Chair Della Au Belatti, GIA Chair Lisa Kitagawa, Education Chair Justin Woodson for helping deliver critical access to mental health services to those most in need.

"Mr. Speaker, we acknowledge your leadership and thank your incredible staff for helping to move the majority agenda forward. I would also like to acknowledge Vice Speaker Ilagan in building team spirit, in ordering our

brand-new jackets and coat pins, and helping with training along the way. We would not have gotten to know each other and gained all this weight without the efforts of Majority Floor Leader Dee Morikawa, Representatives Kitagawa, Matayoshi, Quinlan, and Chef Todd, and their staff.

"I'd like to give a shout out to CPC Vice Chair Jackson Sayama for stepping up, filling in, and being the voice of Chair Nakashima. You did an incredible job. I'd like to thank my staff, Ben, Phil, Sari, and Angela for helping me down Kuliouou Ridge and for their incredible support this session. I'd like to give a shout out to our squeaky-clean gang in Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs for making good government a big part of this year's agenda. So, thank you to Chair Tarnas and Vice Chair Takayama. And finally, I'd like to thank you, all the members of the Majority Caucus, for your support."

The Chair then recognized Representative Matsumoto, the Minority Leader, to deliver closing remarks on behalf of the Minority Caucus:

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. As we're now at the close of the 2023 Legislative Session, I want to make sure I take the time to thank those who really helped us get to this point. First, I'd like to thank the members of the House Republican Caucus. This year we grew in numbers, and we've had a lot to contribute. As one of my colleagues loves to say, we don't necessarily have the votes, but we have the voice.

"I'd also like to take the time to thank our House Minority Research Office. This session has had a lot of ups and downs, but I truly appreciate the unwavering dedication of our team. To all of the Republican staff, your willingness to come together and collaborate, even in the most difficult times, is truly what this building is all about. And I appreciate all you have done to make sure that positive change gets implemented for our districts and our state. To my office, to Sara, Sam, Malia, Aiden, and to our interns, Hunter, Diego, and Vincent, thank you for helping us all get to this point.

"This is the most cohesive and unified Republican Caucus I've ever seen during my tenure, believe it or not.

"To everyone in the Chief Clerk's Office, IT, Printshop, Public Access Room, LRB, Sergeant-at-Arms, our DAGS team, and all of the wonderful staff here, thank you for your time and energy.

"In my Opening Day speech, I laid out the priorities for our Republican Caucus, including combating the high cost of living, assisting families towards homeownership, supporting the rights of people to make decisions for themselves, implementing government reform, and keeping our communities safe by being tough on crime and creating pathways towards rehabilitation. This session we have taken a few steps in the right direction, but there is still so much more we can do.

"While we've passed some legislation to help high cost of living, like increasing the earned income tax credit and the refundable food excise tax credit, we needed to do more. Our caucus proposed eliminating the general excise tax on food and medical services. If this bill was passed, or even heard, it would have immediately helped the residents of Hawai'i. They wouldn't have to wait for their tax returns to see relief. This is something I hope we can collaborate on during the interim for the next session.

"We worked together and took a lot of steps forward towards increasing transparency in government and passing bills from the Campaign Spending Commission, Ethics Commission, Office of Elections, and others. However, it's still not enough. Our caucus advocated for all of the recommendations of the Commission to Improve Standards of Conduct and took it one step further, proposing a 12-year term limit. Our legislative body has lost the trust of the people, and in order to earn that trust back, government reform is imperative. And next year I know we will work to do even more.

"And finally, I appreciate the work we did on rehabilitation for those in our prison population. However, we needed to do more to address the increase of crime. The people of Hawai'i are looking at us to protect them by the laws that we put into place this legislative session, and we have fallen short. The Legislature is so much more than just passing policy. It's also about how we conduct ourselves to get things done. We are an example to the rest of the state on how to have civil discourse. If we cannot treat one

another with respect and conduct ourselves with decorum in this building, how can we expect this from the people of Hawai'i?"

"I think about all the members of our legislature. I know we can do better, and we have to do better. As we close out the 2023 Legislative Session, I want to say that I am proud of all that we have accomplished. However, our work is never finished. In this interim, we must continue to forge ahead to regain the trust of the people and reestablish our legislative processes to be about the people and good policy. It is our duty to work together for the people of Hawai'i, and I look forward to working with all of you to reach this goal. Thank you."

Speaker Saiki then gave his closing remarks as follows:

"The Chair has some brief closing remarks. First of all, I'd like to just begin with thank yous and acknowledgments. Thank you first to the Senate President and the members of the Senate for working with us throughout this session. Second, thank you to the vice speaker for running 97% of the floor sessions this year and for being our go-to person. Thank you to all of our staff for working so hard throughout this year to make us successful. This includes the Chief Clerk's Office, Sergeant-at-Arms, research offices, our Printshop, our IT office, the Legislative Reference Bureau, all of the staff members in our respective offices, and our custodial staff here at the State Capitol.

"So, members, as you know, this legislative session began on a positive note with the full reopening of the State Capitol, 18 new House members, and cooperation across the aisle, maybe with the exception of Representative Ward. But in just four months, you seized the opportunity to solve some of our most pressing problems. And here are some of your results.

"State park and trail repairs, native forests, plant, animal, and aquatic resource protection, tax relief for ALICE families, technology to implement a statewide green fee, grand jury reform, traffic safety, telehealth, 31 standard of conduct laws, hydrogen, gun control, 'ohana homeless zones, Medicaid physician reimbursement, invasive species control, women's reproductive protection, testing wells for the Board of Water Supply, financing for lower-income household solar and battery storage, child and adolescent crisis mobile treatment, mental health and assisted community treatment, rental housing funding, preschool, university campus security, Hawai'i Tourism Authority reform, Hilo Medical Center renovations. As you know, the list goes on and on and on.

"These achievements reflect your commitment to your community and to our entire state. We have a common goal. All of us want to advance Hawai'i so that all people have opportunity and hope. This legislative session has set a foundation that we can build upon next year. Your work will improve the lives of residents, our environment, and our commitment to the principles of justice and equality. I look forward to continuing our effort throughout the interim and thank you very much for all of your work."

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 300, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to the State Budget."

The purpose of this bill, the General Appropriations Act of 2023, is to adjust and request appropriations for the fiscal biennium 2023-2025 to fund the operations and capital improvement projects of Executive Branch agencies and programs.

While the bill as a whole has merit, the use of general fund moneys must be reprioritized due to: (a) the change in the Council on Revenues' general fund tax revenue projection in May 2023 that necessitates that the State's financial plan be rebalanced through line-item vetoes and reductions to the budget; and (b) the need to maintain healthy financial reserves so that the State can meet its reserve policy requirements. Because of this, the following general fund appropriations were subject to: (a) an assessment of items that require additional planning, public input, and clarity on the use of moneys; and (b) an evaluation of each expending agency's ability and capacity to spend down the moneys efficiently within the authorized appropriation period.

Consequently, I object to the expenditure of the following appropriations for the reasons indicated:

A. For the following thirteen general fund appropriations, I object to their expenditure due to the need for additional planning, public input, or clarity on the use of moneys; or concerns regarding each expending agency's ability and capacity to spend down the moneys efficiently within the authorized appropriation period.

1. The \$5,000,000 appropriation of the total \$28,735,463 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for LNR172 - Forestry - Resource Management and Development, designated in section 3, item A-11, page 7, line 19, of the bill, for operating costs, specifically those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 699, seq. #3000-001, may have been intended to be used for operating and renovation; improvement; acquisitions; motor vehicles; equipment and appurtenances.

2. The \$5,000,000 appropriation of the total \$8,974,146 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for AGR192 - General Administration for Agriculture, designated in section 3, item A-15, page 8,

line 16, of the bill, for operating costs, specifically those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 30, seq. #2100-001, may have been intended to be used for the mitigation and population control of feral animals. I will be allotting funds to the Department of Land and Natural Resources from that department's appropriation in this bill to help with this need because that department has the appropriate staff and capacity to undertake this task.

The \$500,000 appropriation of the total \$4,091,600 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for AGS233 - Central Services - Building Repairs and Alterations, designated in section 3, item K-38, page 49, line 10, of the bill, for operating costs, specifically those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 69, seq. #2100-001, may have been intended to be used for planning for the relocation of the Mapunapuna baseyard.

B. For the following general fund appropriation, I object to the expenditure of \$50,000,000 for the Hawaii Technology Development Corporation, for infrastructure improvements for regional economic development for the First Responder Technology Campus. I understand that planning for the Campus is still in its initial stages. Given that the timing of construction will be subject to the approval of necessary land use entitlements and permits, it would not be fiscally prudent to commit such a large amount to this project without having secured such authorizations. Further, it appears highly unlikely that the contracts and encumbrances for this project can be completed before funding for the project lapses on June 30, 2024. I also object to the expenditure of \$2,000,000 of the \$4,000,000 appropriation for the Hawaii Center for Advanced Transportation Technologies for renewable energy technology, as this program is in its early stages of development, and I will be allotting \$2,000,000 from the remaining balance of this appropriation to support this program.

The \$50,000,000 appropriation of the total \$60,624,444 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for BED143 - Hawaii Technology Development Corporation, designated in section 3, item A-19, page 9, line 4, of the bill, for operating costs, specifically those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 153, seq. #2102-001, may have been intended to be used for infrastructure improvements for regional economic development, and the \$2,000,000 appropriation of the same total appropriation, specifically those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 151, seq. #1002-001, may have been intended for the Hawaii Center for Advanced Transportation Technologies for renewable energy technology, microgrid, and other related programs.

C. For the following general fund appropriation, I object to the expenditure of \$88,800,000 to the Agribusiness Development Corporation for the Wahiawa Irrigation System because this is a major policy decision for the State that requires thorough review and planning that would exceed the one-year timeline of the appropriation. This decision involves more than the preservation of the system for irrigation purposes. It is unclear if sufficient funding is provided for the operation and maintenance of the irrigation system. I understand that a report is being prepared evaluating the cost of repairs and other operating expenses needed to maintain the irrigation system. Further, a clear framework as to the responsibilities of the Agribusiness Development Corporation, the Department of Agriculture, and the Department of Land and Natural Resources with respect to operating and

maintaining the Wahiawa Irrigation System and Lake Wilson needs to be developed. However, I am committed to the development of diversified agriculture in Central Oahu and I will be allotting \$5,000,000 from the remaining balance of this appropriation to support the initial planning and design to improve or further develop the irrigation system.

The \$88,800,000 appropriation of the total \$106,160,761 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for BED170 - Agribusiness Development and Research, designated in section 3, item A-16, page 8, line 23, of the bill, for operating costs, specifically those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 181, seq. #2100-001, may have been intended to be used for water infrastructure, land acquisition, and irrigation system management.

D. For the following general fund appropriation, I object to the expenditure of \$120,000,000 of the \$170,000,000 appropriation to the School Facilities Authority for teacher housing. I support the need to provide housing for our teachers and I will be allotting \$50,000,000 from the remaining balance of this appropriation to support the State's commitment to this endeavor. This funding will assist in the initial phases of providing much-needed teacher housing.

The \$120,000,000 appropriation of the total \$171,761,193 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for EDN450 - School Facilities Authority, designated in section 3, item G-6, page 31, line 33, of the bill, for operating costs, specifically those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 365, seq. #3000-001, may have been intended to be used for teacher housing.

E. For the following general fund appropriation, I object to the expenditure of \$500,000,000 for deposit into the emergency and budget reserve fund for fiscal year 2024-2025. With the deposit of \$500,000,000 into the emergency and budget reserve fund in fiscal year 2023-2024, the State will meet its financial reserve policy requirements for the fiscal biennium 2023-2025. By line item vetoing this amount for fiscal year 2024-2025, the negative impact of reducing funding needed for public services will be mitigated. In addition, I object to the expenditure of \$33,000,000 for the State's matching portion of federal broadband grants for fiscal year 2024-2025. I believe that the \$33,000,000 appropriated in fiscal year 2023-2024 for the State's matching portion of federal broadband grants will be sufficient to meet the federal matching requirements at this time and that state match requirements can be revisited when additional federal funds are secured.

The \$500,000,000 appropriation of the total \$545,351,873 appropriation for fiscal year 2024-2025 funded by general funds for BUF101 - Departmental Administration and Budget Division, designated in section 3, item K-5, page 44, line 31, of the bill, for operating costs, specifically those funds that, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 196, seq. #3001-001, may have been intended to be used for deposit into the emergency and budget reserve fund, and the \$500,000,000 amount in the proviso in part III, page 51, section 4, line 5, of this bill, and the \$33,000,000 appropriation of the same total appropriation, as indicated by the Budget Comparison Worksheet dated May 15, 2023, at page 195 seq. #3000-001, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for the State's matching portion of federal broadband grants.

Specific Items Vetoed

Section 16 of Article III of the State Constitution provides that, "[e]xcept for items appropriated to be expended by the judicial and legislative branches, the governor may veto any specific item or items in any bill which appropriates money for specific purposes by striking out or reducing the same." Because of the foregoing objections, I have taken the following actions pursuant to my appropriation item veto authority:

1. Reduced by \$5,000,000 the total \$28,735,463 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for LNR172 - Forestry - Resource Management and Development, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for operating costs and renovation; improvement; acquisitions; motor vehicles; equipment and appurtenances; designated in section 3, item A-11, page 7, line 19, of the bill, and changed it to \$23,735,463.

2. Reduced by \$5,000,000 the total \$8,974,146 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for AGR192 - General Administration for Agriculture, for operating costs, specifically those funds

that may have been intended to be used for the mitigation and population control of feral animals, designated in section 3, item A-15, page 8, line 16, of the bill, and changed it to \$3,974,146.

3. Reduced by \$88,800,000 the total \$106,160,761 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for BED170 - Agribusiness Development and Research, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for water infrastructure, land acquisition, and irrigation system management, designated in section 3, item A-16, page 8, line 23, of the bill, and changed it to \$17,360,761.

4. Reduced by \$50,000,000 the total \$60,624,444 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for BED143 - Hawaii Technology Development Corporation, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for infrastructure improvements for regional economic development, and the \$2,000,000 appropriation of the same total appropriation for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for the Hawaii Center for Advanced Transportation Technologies for renewable energy technology, microgrid, and other related programs, designated in section 3, item A-19, page 9, line 4, of the bill, and changed it to \$8,624,444.

5. Reduced by \$50,000,000 the total \$100,000,000 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for BED138 - Hawaii Green Infrastructure Authority, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for the solar energy storage loan program, designated in section 3, item A-21, page 9, line 17, of the bill, and changed it to \$50,000,000.

6. Reduced by \$1,500,000 the total \$201,814,260 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for BED150 - Hawaii Community Development Authority, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for East Kapolei infrastructure implementation master plan and programmatic environmental impact statement; the \$18,500,000 appropriation of the same total appropriation for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for Kakaako Street upgrades; the \$42,000,000 appropriation of the same total appropriation for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for Kalaeloa electrical upgrades-districtwide; and the \$61,000,000 appropriation of the same total appropriation, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for the Iwilei-Kapalama TOD infrastructure design and construction, designated in section 3, item A-23, page 9, line 33, of the bill, and changed it to \$78,814,260.

7. Reduced by \$120,000,000 the total \$171,761,193 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for EDN450 - School Facilities Authority, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for teacher housing, designated in section 3, item G-6, page 31, line 33, of the bill, and changed it to \$51,761,193.

8. Reduced by \$25,000,000 the total \$62,545,402 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for LNR806 - Parks Administration and Operation, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for state parks-renovations; improvement; acquisitions; motor vehicles; equipment and appurtenances; designated in section 3, item H-5, page 36, line 8, of the bill, and changed it to \$37,545,402.

9. Reduced by \$60,225,000 the total \$60,690,440 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for LNR801 - Ocean- Based Recreation, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for Boating and Ocean Resources - Renovations, Improvements, Acquisition, Motor Vehicles, Equipment, and Appurtenances, and the Ala Wai Small Boat Harbor Education Center, designated in section 3, item H-6, page 36, line 16, of the bill and changed it to \$465,440.

10. Reduced by \$5,000,000 the total \$61,022,542 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for LAW900 - General Administration, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for plans, design, construction, and equipment for new building, designated in section 3, item I-20, page 39, line 20, of the bill, and changed it to \$56,022,542.

11. Reduced by \$12,000,000 the total \$26,362,784 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for DEF118 - Hawaii Emergency Management Agency, for operating costs, specifically those

funds that may have been intended to be used for plans, design, construction, and equipment for new headquarters for the Hawaii Emergency Management Agency, designated in section 3, item I-30, page 41, line 11, of the bill, and changed it to \$14,362,784.

12. Reduced by \$500,000,000 the total \$545,351,873 appropriation for fiscal year 2024-2025 funded by general funds for BUF101 – Departmental Administration and Budget Division, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for deposit into the emergency and budget reserve fund, and reduced by an additional \$33,000,000 the same total appropriation for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for the State's matching portion of federal broadband grants, designated in section 3, item K-5, page 44, line 31, of the bill, and changed the total appropriation to \$12,351,873 and stricken the \$500,000,000 amount in the proviso in part III, section 4, page 51, line 5, of the bill, and changed it to \$0.

13. Reduced by \$4,000,000 the total \$49,233,054 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for AGS131 - Enterprise Technology Services, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for planning for the relocation of the Data Center, designated in section 3, item K-20, page 46, line 38, of the bill, and changed it to \$45,233,054.

14. Reduced by \$3,000,000 the total \$7,786,554 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for HRD191 - Supporting Services, Human Resources Development, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for information technology support and computer equipment and infrastructure, designated in section 3, item K-24, page 47, line 25, of the bill, and changed it to \$4,786,554.

15. Reduced by \$100,000 the total \$274,977 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for LNR101 - Public Lands Management, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for the Kawehewehe Waikiki Boardwalk, designated in section 3, item K-30, page 48, line 7, of the bill, and changed it to \$174,977.

16. Reduced by \$1,050,000 the total \$15,380,669 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for AGS221 - Public Works - Planning, Design, and Construction, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for proof of concept and master planning, designated in section 3, item K-35, page 48, line 35, of the bill, and changed it to \$14,330,669.

17. Reduced by \$500,000 the total \$4,091,600 appropriation for fiscal year 2023-2024 funded by general funds for AGS233 - Central Services-Building Repairs and Alterations, for operating costs, specifically those funds that may have been intended to be used for planning for the relocation of the Mapunapuna baseyard, designated in section 3, item K-38, page 49, line 10, of the bill, and changed it to \$3,591,600.

For the foregoing reasons, I am returning House Bill No. 300 with the appropriations reduced or stricken as described above.

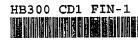

The cost and effort required also would have a chilling effect on the modernization of State IT systems. State agencies already provide language access support for the State's public-facing systems and should be given the discretion to provide cost effective language access, such as providing access by using multilingual staff or written publications.

Using State-purchased works of art for non-State individuals, businesses, or entities does not fulfill the intent of the works of art program and denies the public the opportunity to enjoy works of art in public buildings. It may result in public property being used for a non-public purpose in violation of Section 4 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i.

Further, given that some of the art pieces may have been purchased using tax-exempt bond proceeds, there could be adverse tax consequences to the State if the amount of revenues generated from the loan program are significant when compared to the amount of tax-exempt bond proceeds used to acquire the works of art. Also, this bill would have a negative impact on Hawaii's creative economy as businesses and individuals could rent works of art from the State rather than purchase art pieces from the artists.

This lottery system will continue to allow the DLNR to issue new permits while the DLNR may seek a more balanced approach to prioritizing applications. Additionally, the law already provides that DLNR may refrain from renewing permits to permittees who fail to comply with permit terms and conditions.
