Thursday, March 14, 2024

The House of Representatives of the Thirty-Second Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2024, convened at 12:07 p.m., with Vice Speaker Ilagan presiding.

The invocation was delivered by Representative Sean Quinlan, after which the Roll was called showing all members present with the exception of Representatives Alcos and Martinez, who were excused.

By unanimous consent, reading and approval of the Journal of the House of Representatives of the Thirty-First Day was deferred.

ORDER OF THE DAY

INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS

"In opposition. I support paid family leave, but this bill mandates the private sector to supply paid family leave. The House Minority Caucus introduced a bill that would mandate county and state employers to provide paid family leave, but let the private sector remain free."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2474, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO FAMILY LEAVE," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representative Pierick voting no, and with Representatives Alcos, Martinez, and Quinlan being excused.

Representative Matayoshi, for the Committee on Labor & Government Operations, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1096-24) recommending that S.B. No. 3350, SD 1, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs.

On motion by Representative Nakamura, seconded by Representative Morikawa and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. Representative Belatti, for the Committee on Health & Homelessness, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1098-24) recommending that S.B. No. 3239, SD 2, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 3239, SD 2, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Garcia rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. This bill would establish a working group to forgive medical debt. That's a noble cause, I agree with the intent. However, the medical community and the drug administrations, they sometimes charge

exorbitant prices for their procedures. And so, to expect this private sector medical group to overcharge the people of Hawai'i, and then we're expecting the taxpayers to pay for those bills, I disagree with that. So, I'm voting no."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3239, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MEDICAL DEBT," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representative Garcia voting aye with reservations, with Representative Pierick voting no, and with Representatives Alcos, Martinez, and Quinlan being excused.

Representative Belatti, for the Committee on Health & Homelessness, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1099-24) recommending that S.B. No. 3125, SD 2, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce.

Representative Nakamura moved that the report of the Committee be adopted, and that S.B. No. 3125, SD 2, HD 1 pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, seconded by Representative Morikawa.

Representative Pierick rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. This bill would allow for 14-year-olds to get certain kind of screenings and preventative care, including family planning, which could be like abortion services. I'm not in favor of 14-year-olds making these kinds of decisions without parental consent, and I believe this bill provides that. So, I'm voting no."

Representative Perruso rose to speak in support of the measure, stating:

"In support. The language of this measure actually just extends existing provisions of care for minors to identification of sexually transmitted diseases, which coming from a community that has the dubious distinction of having the highest rate of STDs in the state, I think is really important. And it also provides really important clarification and definitional work that medical providers around the state are already working on. So, this helps them with that codification. So, for those reasons, I support."

Representative Kong rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Garcia rose to speak in opposition to the measure, stating:

"In opposition. Just want to say, we are continuing this trend from this building, attacking parental rights. And I think children, of course, they should seek immediate healthcare services if they are in these situations. But why wouldn't we want parents to know? Why wouldn't we want their parents to know? I'm pretty sure their parents would want to know if their child, ages 14 through 17, is seeking any type of medical care. So, this is just continuing the trend of attacking parents' rights. No vote."

Representative Ward rose and asked that the Clerk record a no vote for him, and the Chair "so ordered."

Representative Matsumoto rose and asked that the Clerk record an aye vote with reservations for her, and the Chair "so ordered."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3125, SD 2, HD 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO MEDICAL CARE FOR MINORS," passed Second Reading and was referred to the Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce, with Representative Matsumoto voting aye with reservations, with Representatives Garcia, Kong, Pierick, and Ward voting no, and with Representatives Alcos, Martinez, and Quinlan being excused.

Representative Woodson, for the Committee on Education, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1100-24) recommending that S.B. No. 3305, as amended in HD 1, pass Second Reading and be referred to the Committee on Judiciary & Hawaiian Affairs.
