Representative Iwamoto rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations, stating:

"Thank you, Madam Speaker. I rise in support of this resolution with reservations and also a little bit of optimism. House Rules gives the Speaker sole authority to decide our committee assignments and who serves as chair of each House committee. And I think you made some great selections. So, thank you very much for those choices.

"I appreciate having received many communications regarding how our House leaders would be working more collaboratively, and inclusively, and would be improving communications between chairs and amongst all members. And I also heard echoes of that sentiment in Majority Caucus Leader Kahaloa's welcoming speech earlier. So, thank you very much for those affirming words. It is my understanding that this cooperation among House members has improved since prior years. Less warring among factions, less tension between parties. I am so grateful for your leadership, Madam Speaker, to make this happen.

"However, with all this progress, you can imagine how surprised I was when I was told that every committee chair has the prerogative to single out

one of our colleagues and never hear any of their bills. I was told this by someone with greater seniority and authority. And again, it's just a prerogative, from my understanding, it's not something that maybe somebody might use.

"This prerogative is not listed in the House Rules, and it seems contrary to our workplace harassment policy, which explicitly prohibits unreasonably interfering with an employee's work performance and ignoring attempts at communication. Learning that a committee chair has unchecked unilateral power to ostracize one of our colleagues was a stab in my heart. It was a stab in the heart of democracy. In was a stab in the heart of the very representational democracy that brought each—"

At 10:42 a.m., Representative Quinlan requested a recess and the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 10:43 p.m.

The Chair addressed Representative Iwamoto, stating:

"Representative Iwamoto, on the resolution before us."

Representative Iwamoto continued, stating:

"Correct. I'm only regarding my remarks regarding committee chairs, which this is the only time."

Speaker Nakamura: "The membership of our committees."

Representative Iwamoto: "Correct, thank you. So again, hearing that there is this prerogative of a committee chair to have this is a stab in the—"

At 10:44 a.m., the Chair declared a recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The House of Representatives reconvened at 10:45 a.m.

The Chair addressed Representative Iwamoto, stating:

"Representative Iwamoto, can you please finalize your comments."

Representative Iwamoto continued, stating:

"Thank you, Madam Speaker, I will. This is the essence and I'll jump to the conclusion. So, Madam Speaker, I beg you not to protect this legacy of lesser men. We must not condone this practice with our silence. If you have not asked your appointed committee chairs to renounce this practice, please allow them to now rise in support of this resolution and affirm their commitment to never exercise this so-called prerogative of the chair, nor marginalize a colleague in this way.

"And I want to conclude by saying, if any member of this House has exercised this prerogative in the past, let it stay in the past. It was a different time, a different culture, under different leadership. We should all have room to evolve, to mature, to deepen our compassion, to deepen our appreciation for democracy. And we all deserve the grace to forgive and be forgiven. To heal one another, to heal ourselves, and heal the public's trust in our legislative process. Thank you very much, Madam Speaker."

The motion was put to vote by the Chair and carried, and H.R. No. 1 was adopted, with Representative Iwamoto voting aye with reservations, and with Representative Woodson being excused.

H.C.R. No. 1, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION RELATING TO RECESS DAYS FOR THE REGULAR SESSION OF 2026," resolving that the dates of the mandatory recess for the Regular Session of 2026 are hereby determined to be the 26th and 27th days of February and the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th days of March, on which dates the Regular Session of 2026 shall be recessed; and that the dates of the recesses other than the dates of the mandatory recess for the Regular Session of 2026 are hereby determined to be the 27th and 29th days of January, the 9th, 11th, and 27th days of March, the 13th and 15th days of April, and the 4th, 5th,

and 7th days of May, on which dates the Regular Session of 2026 shall be recessed, was jointly offered by Representatives Nakamura and Ichiyama.

On motion by Representative Kahaloa, seconded by Representative Garcia and carried, H.C.R. No. 1 was adopted, with Representative Woodson being excused.

H.C.R. No. 2, entitled: "HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE GOVERNOR TO ADDRESS THE LEGISLATURE ASSEMBLED IN JOINT SESSION," resolving that the two Houses of the Legislature assemble in Joint Session in the Chambers of the House of Representatives at 10:00 a.m. on Monday, January 26, 2026, for the purpose of receiving such address or greetings from the Governor of Hawaii as he should be pleased to make, was jointly offered by Representatives Nakamura and Ichiyama.

On motion by Representative Kahaloa, seconded by Representative Garcia and carried, H.C.R. No. 2 was adopted, with Representative Woodson being excused.

At this time, the Speaker delivered her address, stating:

"*Aloha kakahiaka.* Welcome to the Opening Day of the 2026 Legislative Session. Today, we gather with a shared purpose, to do the people's work. With humility, with urgency, and with care. We come from 51 unique districts around the State of Hawai'i and we come with different life experiences. But we are united by a simple obligation, to make life better for the people of Hawai'i.

"Let me begin by introducing our two newest members. Please stand when I call your name. Representing District 18 is Joe Gedeon. Representative Gedeon was born and raised in Hawai'i Kai, with his family's deep roots in the community spanning nearly five decades. He brings insights and experience as a small business owner in marketing and advertising. Rep. Gedeon has a history of volunteer public service and is committed to serving his constituents with care and dedication.

"Representing District 36 is Daisy Hartsfield. Representative Hartsfield is a product of Waipahu Elementary, Intermediate, and High Schools. She brings more than two decades of experience in public service with a career spanning child welfare, public safety, and the justice system. Her work focuses on protecting vulnerable individuals, strengthening families, and ensuring fairness across Hawai'i's social service and justice systems. Please join me in giving them a warm welcome.

"Today I commend the attorney general for announcing yesterday that she will initiate an investigation into the legislator who accepted \$35,000 in funds. This is a positive development and an important step toward maintaining the public trust. The Special Investigation and Prosecutive Division, created and funded by the State Legislature in 2022, is well positioned to handle this matter with the independence and rigor it requires. And I trust it will take appropriate actions in a timely manner.

"Although today marks the beginning of the 2026 session, the work to prepare for this session began soon after we adjourned in May of last year. Over the past eight months, we have collectively laid the groundwork for this session. Here at the Capitol, the House held 31 informational briefings, giving both lawmakers and the public up-to-date information from experts on complex issues. We received updates on upcoming federal funding cuts to critical safety net programs, innovative programs like Operation Hire Hawai'i, and prison reform by strengthening re-entry services statewide. *Mahalo* to our committee chairs who organized these important briefings.

"During the interim, members assisted and advocated for constituents on issues and connecting families to the state services and benefits that can sometimes feel too complicated to access. This has always been an important part of what we do, and I believe that now more than ever, it is a vital service. For many residents, a call to their representative isn't always political, it's personal. It's help with a real problem in real time. So *mahalo* to members for being responsive to your constituents.

"Outside of the Capitol, members went on 68 site visits across our state, visiting schools, jails, prisons, hospitals; snorkeling in bays, hiking on mountaintops, meeting with farmers and small businesses, listening to community groups, and seeing firsthand what is working and what is not.

We all know that there's no substitute for meeting in person, talking face to face with experts, and gaining critical insights in problems affecting the communities we serve. We walk away from these visits with the feeling, I now understand this issue better and I think I can do something about it.

"I know that many of the bills that will be introduced this session are the direct result of conversations held on these site visits. I'd like to give a special shout-out to our Higher Education Chair for visiting all 10 campuses of the University of Hawai'i System and Finance Chair for organizing trips in all four counties. And a shout out to your staff for the incredible logistics involved in these visits.

"Interim is also the time for members to engage with their districts. To listen, to learn, to connect constituents with resources, and bring their interests back to this chamber. Both Majority and Minority Caucus members held listening tours around our state. Many of you held town hall meetings with topics focused on wildfire mitigation, crime, and roadway safety and design. And our tireless, and some would say crazy, Puna representative continued his streak of 12 town halls this interim.

"The Majority Caucus held six lawmaker learn sessions to get expert information on Medicaid and SNAP cuts, immigration resources, and strategies for complex legislation. *Mahalo* to Vice Speaker Ichiyama for working with members to organize these invaluable learning sessions.

"And it is during the interim that we do much of the work on our bills. Researching, drafting, stress-testing ideas, meeting with departments and stakeholders, and working through the details so that when session opens, we are prepared to act. And I know that HMSO is extremely thankful to Rep. Evslin for restraining himself this session and requesting only seven redrafts of his bills.

"Task forces and study groups are usually in full swing during the interim, and last year was no exception. Representative Scot Matayoshi participated in Landlord-Tenant Working Group to modernize our Landlord-Tenant Code and the CPR Task Force. Rep. Greggor Ilagan chaired the SPEED Task Force to reduce regulations, make permitting more efficient, and support collaboration between the state, counties, and the private sector.

"Rep. Sue Keohokapu-Lee Loy, Rep. Mike Lee, and Rep. Tyson Miyake facilitated working groups on building permits, cesspools, and historic preservation. Rep. Jackson Sayama chaired the Paid Family Leave Task Force with both public and private stakeholders.

"As we all know, passing bills doesn't always guarantee full implementation. So, members worked to make sure that bills that they advocated for and we passed last session were implemented. Rep. Mattias Kusch worked with the Department of Law Enforcement to combat agricultural theft in Hāmākua. Rep. David Tarnas attended a blessing for the newly established Women's Court in Kona, whose funding he championed. Rep. Trish La Chica followed up on Act 140 to expand access to school bus and student transportation.

"And what warms my heart are the projects that you undertook this interim to improve your neighborhoods and your communities. Rep. Amy Perruso worked on disaster preparedness, establishing radio communications between 35 Neighborhood Coordinators and formalizing evacuation routes in Wahiawa. Rep. Lisa Kitagawa coordinated the Castle Complex School drive, e-waste recycling drive, and their annual walk-through flu shot event.

"Rep. Jeanne Kapela got a Hawaiian immersion *keiki* and *kūpuna* language school back up and running in Ka'ū. Rep. Kila worked closely with the county and state to convert an emergency-only road in Nānākuli to a full-time 24/7 continuous-use roadway. Rep. Cory Chun supported a neighborhood security watch program in Pearl City and educated his community in emergency preparedness.

"Many of you worked on shoreline, waterway, and neighborhood cleanups, food distribution during the federal government shutdown, and invasive species containment. And some of you attended blessings for new preschool classes, thank you Lieutenant Governor Sylvia Luke, taught civics education to our youth, read to elementary and middle school students, including Representative Garner Shimizu.

"*Mahalo* to all of you for being role models and educating our youth, making our neighborhoods safer and more resilient, rolling up your sleeves and doing the hard work, and giving back in so many ways to the communities you love. That's why I'm so incredibly proud and honored to serve as your Speaker. Your commitment is not just words, it's your actions both in this building and outside of the Capitol that truly speaks of your dedication to public service and lay the important groundwork for this session.

"Unfortunately, our work during the interim was also influenced by decisions of the federal government. As we all know, the federal government was shut down for 43 days, the longest in US history. We found out at the end of September that the federal government would not use USDA contingency funds, as was the practice in all previous shutdowns, to pay SNAP benefits to some 16,000 Hawai'i households.

"By adding a one-time \$250 benefit for Hawai'i SNAP users and expediting the release of funds previously approved to the Hawai'i Foodbank, we provided much relief to families worried about their next meal. I would like to *mahalo* the Governor, the Department of Human Services, and the Senate, for the coordination needed to move quickly. And this would not have been possible without the behind-the-scenes work of our Human Services and Homelessness Chair Lisa Marten and Majority Caucus Leader Kirstin Kahaloa.

"During the interim, we also worked on the implementation of Act 310 that appropriated \$50 million for non-profits that experienced a loss in federal funds. The Act 310 committee focused on food security, healthcare, and community services, and selected 95 awardees out of 143 that applied. Please join me in thanking Rep. Kyle Yamashita for securing this funding and committee members Rep. Daniel Holt and Rep. Jenna Takenouchi for their outstanding work.

"I'm excited that we've laid a strong foundation during the last eight months for our work this session. And I would like to ask my leadership team to please rise and remain standing. Vice Speaker Linda Ichiyama, Majority Leader Sean Quinlan, Majority Caucus Leader Kirstin Kahaloa, Majority Floor Leader Dee Morikawa, Assistant Majority Floor Leader Trish La Chica, Majority Whip Lisa Kitagawa, Majority Whip Amy Perruso, and Majority Whip Tyson Miyake. I could not be Speaker without you and your incredible staff stepping up to help in so many different ways. You have used your talents, your skills, and dedication to this body to address the needs of the House and to prepare for this session. Members, let's give them a round of applause.

"I'd like to give, also, a shout out to my office staff, you are all so amazing, and our legislative staff. Clerk's Office, Sergeant's Office, Majority and Minority Research Offices, Communications, custodial staff, and Legislative Reference Bureau, for supporting all of our efforts during the interim and preparing us for this session. And I have to thank and acknowledge the members of our newly formed Employee Council for stepping up to help build camaraderie, open up lines of communication, and make the House a better place to work.

"Last year, the Majority Caucus crafted our 20-year vision, which was recently updated. I'd like to summarize this vision and ask that we keep it at the forefront as we work through this session.

"By 2045, Hawai'i is a model for the world. A place where families can thrive and stay, *keiki* are safe and flourishing, and *kūpuna* can age with dignity. Native Hawaiian culture and rights are preserved, and the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands waitlist is significantly reduced. Our lands and waters are protected and well-managed, our communities are walkable and connected, housing is affordable, health care is preventable and accessible, and homelessness is dramatically reduced.

"Our economy is diverse and resilient, powered by clean, reliable renewable energy. Our workers receive good benefits and are fairly compensated. We're prepared for disasters, we've partnered with counties to build infrastructure. We're growing food locally for families, schools, hospitals, and prisons. And we trust our government because it is accountable and effective. I believe we made progress towards our vision last session, and I am confident that we will make additional progress this year.

"In closing, I'm optimistic about what we can accomplish if we work together, respect each other, hold each other accountable, and ground our service in compassion. Even with the challenges ahead, an uncertain federal budget, and a possible mild recession, we can all agree that we share the same responsibility. To make life better for the people of Hawai'i. If we keep showing up with humility, with urgency, and with care, we will move the state closer to our 2045 vision. Step by step, bill by bill, and in ways that people can feel in their daily lives. So, let's get it done. *Mahalo piha.*"

The Chair then recognized Representative Matsumoto, the Minority Leader, to deliver remarks on behalf of the Minority Caucus:

"Thank you, Madam Speaker, Vice Speaker Ichiyama, Majority Leader Quinlan, Majority Caucus Leader Kahaloa, colleagues, friends, and members of the public, good morning and *aloha*. Madam Speaker, I want to begin by thanking you for your outreach to all the members of this body.

"I appreciate the willingness of the House leadership to examine the culture of this building and reevaluate how we conduct the people's work. The creation of the House Employee Council is a meaningful step and a clear demonstration of your continued commitment to improving the workplace here at the Capitol.

"Opening day is always memorable, especially when it's your first. And I know we've done this a few times already, but I'd also like to welcome Representative Joe Gedeon, if we can give him a round of applause. Born and raised in Hawai'i Kai and a proud graduate of Kaiser High School, he has a strong sense of purpose and genuine love for his community and an infectious enthusiasm for public service. We are fortunate to have you, and I know you will serve your district well.

"Over the past three years, the House Republican Caucus has made a deliberate effort to listen. Through our O'ahu Listening Tour, town halls across the island, and district-wide surveys, we have heard directly from our constituents. For our Listening Tour this year, we went to five locations over five days. Wai'anae, 'Ewa, Mililani, Moanalua, and Hawai'i Kai. Thousands of residents took the time to respond to our efforts. They shared their struggles, their frustrations, and the hopes for the future of Hawai'i.

"The message that we heard was clear. And what was so interesting to me was across all of those different districts and the different demographics, we heard the same issues. Cost of living, crime, corruption, and government reform. And that has shaped our 2026 caucus package. Legislation built from the voices of the people we represent.

"In addition to all of our public outreach, we partnered with advocates and subject matter experts to convene our caucus's Hawai'i Legislative Advisory Board in order to take the listening even further. We translated community concerns into well-researched, practical solutions. And these discussions became a valuable resource for our members, furthering our dedication to policy centered on everyday issues that really matter to people. I'd like to thank our House Minority Research Office and our caucus staff for the countless hours they devoted to outreach, analysis, and policy development.

"So now, let me present to you the 2026 caucus priorities. So first, cost of living. For decades, this has been the number one issue facing our residents. We have moved the needle a little bit, but there's still much more that needs to be done. We all know that families are struggling to afford gas, groceries, housing, utilities. And we know a recent ALICE report shows that 35% of people in our state are living just one unexpected financial crisis away from losing everything.

"Our caucus is committed to putting money back into the pockets of local families. We are introducing measures to reduce and eliminate taxes, help residents save more quickly for a down payment on a home, working to make it easier for DHHH beneficiaries to get a federally backed mortgage loan, and ensure that the tax relief promised just two years ago is not taken away. People need help now. We as a legislature need to take a critical look at our budgets and our government spending before asking people to give up more of their hard-earned paychecks. We made a promise and we should keep it.

"Second, public safety and crime. Our constituents told us they do not feel safe and they are right to be concerned. In response, we are introducing legislation that establishes strict liability for crimes against our *kūpuna*.

Those who prey on our elders will face serious consequences. We are also advancing legislation to create a specific offense for organized retail theft, allowing prosecutors to hold ringleaders accountable, not just the individuals that they exploit. These smash-and-grab crimes that we see online are creeping into our state, and they have no place here in Hawai'i. In addition, we are introducing a measure so that individuals suffering from severe mental illness can receive help before tragedy occurs. Compassion and safety must go hand in hand.

"Third, government reform and accountability. Trust in government is eroded when there are no real consequences for abuse of power. The Legislature has a constitutional role in checks and balances, and that role must be strengthened, not weakened. Our caucus will advance measures to protect taxpayers, rein in excessive and costly regulations, and impose stronger penalties on public officials who break the law. Accountability should not depend on position or title.

"Additionally, we are also committed to making voting more accessible by increasing the number of voting service centers. No one should have to wait in line for six hours to vote. This way, we ensure that residents can vote when they want, how they want, and with confidence in the system. These priorities reflect the voices of our communities, and they will guide our work this session.

"While these issues are critical, they are only part of the extensive legislative agenda before us. And to improve our state, there must be a willingness to listen, even when we disagree. In fact, you often hear me say this, healthy disagreement and respectful debate make this institution stronger and lead to better outcomes for Hawai'i. In the times of session, when it's hard, we must remember to treat another and the public we serve with dignity and respect, even when the work is difficult.

"I look forward to a productive session and to working with each of you on behalf of the people of Hawai'i. *Mahalo.*"

Speaker Nakamura then introduced special guests in the gallery: U.S. Senator Brian Schatz; Governor Josh Green and Mrs. Jaime Green; Lieutenant Governor Sylvia Luke and Mr. Michael Luke; Honolulu City & County Mayor Rick Blangiardi; Kaua'i County Mayor Derek Kawakami; Maui County Mayor Richard Bissen; and Hawai'i County Mayor Kimo Alameda.

The Chair then recognized Representative Quinlan, the Majority Leader, to deliver remarks on behalf of the Majority Caucus:

"Thank you, Madam Speaker. I'd like to start out today with a little bit about my family history, and don't worry, I'm going somewhere with this. So, for most of the planet, World War II ended in 1945. But that's not true of China. After the capitulation of the Japanese empire, the two sides of the Civil War resumed hostilities. It was the communists versus the nationalists. And the nationalists, my family were nationalists, that was the group that was funded and armed by the United States of America.

"And in 1949, when it became apparent to my family that we were about to lose the war, my two great grandfathers got together and put the rest of my family on a plane and sent them to Hong Kong. At the time, my mother was still in my grandma's belly and my mother born in exile in Hong Kong. And despite my family having lived in China for thousands of years and all that history, my mother never lived a day of her life in China. And I say this to illustrate the point that my family knows what it's like to lose their country.

"And as I stand before all of you here today, I worry in some respects that I'm losing my country. Right now, today, on the mainland, federal immigration officials, enforcement officials in ski masks are going door to door in residential neighborhoods demanding proof of citizenship without judicial warrants. In some cases, they have even detained and arrested U.S. citizens. That is not the America that I grew up in.

"And why are they doing this? Is it because somebody at the federal government perhaps doesn't like the governor of that state or the mayor of that city? This is troubling. What about the Fourth Amendment? What about our protections from unreasonable search and seizure?

"And the powers that be will tell you that this is all part of a greater plan, that we're going to deport and tariff and tax cut our way to universal prosperity. That if billionaires can just pay a little less in taxes, somehow we'll all be better off. And yet, in the past year, we've added \$2 trillion to our federal deficit.

"But don't worry, we have a plan because we are going to annex, invade, purchase, or otherwise acquire Greenland, which has been part of Denmark for over 200 years. Denmark, a NATO ally who came to our aid after September 11 when we invoked Article 5 for the only time in the history of NATO, who lost 43 soldiers in Afghanistan. Now, 43 might not sound like a big number, but it's a big number to a small country like Denmark. It's big number to the mothers and sons and fathers and daughters that those people left behind.

"I'd also like to point out that the members of NATO collectively own trillions of dollars in U.S. sovereign debt. What would happen if they collectively decided that the U.S. wasn't a good financial bet anymore, that there was just too much risk involved, there was too much uncertainty, and they started selling that debt? Our currency would be devalued, and our purchasing power, the purchasing power of every individual American, would go down.

"And I have to say, I'm not very comfortable, I've never been very comfortable talking about these issues. For the vast majority of my career, I've been the one telling everybody else, let's focus on Hawai'i. And I still believe that. Let's not worry too much about what happens on the mainland. Let's not worry too much about what happens in the federal government.

"But Madam Speaker, when the actions of the federal government and what is happening on the mainland start to impact our checkbooks, and our purchasing power, and the value of our currency to this extent, I feel compelled to speak out.

"And what is the answer to this? Things seem kind of grim. What are we to do? And to me, the answer is very, very simple. We have to hold on to our shared values. We have to stick together. *Aloha*, *'ohana*, those are not just words. Those are meaningful concepts that all of us feel. Every one of us in this room, deep in our hearts, I see it every day when I come to work. I see it every day when I walk around my community.

"And through these shared values, we will ensure that no child ever goes hungry in Hawai'i. We will ensure that people have health care, so that when they're sick, they can afford to go to the doctor. We will make sure that we protect working families every day through the work that we do in this building.

"I have every confidence in the House of Representatives, in our Senate, in our governor and our mayors, that if we continue to work together, we will weather this storm and we will come out of it stronger than ever before. *Mahalo*."
