

THIRTY-FOURTH DAY

Monday, March 19, 1990

The Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, convened at 11:35 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by President Stanley Y. Q. Ho, Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Aki and Ikeda.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Third Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Mizuguchi introduced a group of students, seated in the gallery, from the special education class of Aiea Intermediate School accompanied by their teachers: Aimee Hokama and Julie Uejo; educational assistants: Thelma Lum, Lani Timtim and Thurston Goda; and volunteer Koozo Kikuchi. Senator Mizuguchi singled out Dawn Horwath, the Easter Seal Poster Child of 1990, who was in the group.

Senator Chang then introduced the 1990 Narcissus Queen and her Court as follows:

Third Princess Penny Chung, a graduate of Roosevelt High School and the University of Hawaii, where she earned a Bachelors Degree in Communications;

Second Princess Karin Kwock, a graduate of Punahou School and Colorado State University, where she majored in Technical Journalism; and

The Narcissus Queen for 1990, Michelle Wong, a graduate of Punahou School, currently attending the University of Hawaii as a freshman.

The Queen and her court were accompanied by Mr. Ronald Young, general chairman of the Narcissus Pageant and incoming vice president of the Chinese Chamber of Commerce, and Mr. Paul Hayashi, escort.

The young ladies, seated on the floor of the Senate, rose to be recognized and were presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator Chang and Senators McCartney, Holt and Blair presented them with leis.

Senator Crozier, uncle of Queen Michelle, then said:

"Mr. President, I would just like to say a few words about Michelle.

"Michelle is a very special person. She is a part of Makakilo. Michelle and her family have been very supportive of the many endeavors that are taking place there. Her father and I are very close and pals to the end.

"But more specifically about Michelle ... in a letter to the editor the other day, President Simone was suggesting that when the youth of Hawaii look for schools to go to they think about the University of Hawaii. Well, this is not known, but Michelle is quite an outstanding volleyball player and she was offered scholarships to some of the East Coast schools and I think Penn State was one of the schools. But, she chose the University of Hawaii and I think that's quite a statement for the university ... to have

a girl of Michelle's caliber to stay home means quite a bit.

"My family and I are very proud of Michelle and we wish her the best.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

At 11:44 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:46 o'clock a.m.

The President then invited Queen Michelle to the podium and she addressed the members of the Senate and guests as follows:

"Kung Hee Fat Choy! On behalf of the court and myself, I would like to extend my warmest aloha and thank you for the honor and recognition and my best wishes to you all for a very happy and very prosperous new year in the 'Year of the Horse.' Thank you."

At 11:48 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:49 o'clock a.m.
