Wednesday, April 18, 1990

The Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, convened at 11:36 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Chaplain Cary Speaker, Queen's Medical Center, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Chang, McCartney, Menor, Mizuguchi and Yamasaki who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-First Day.

Senator Cobb introduced Miss Vicki Custer, accompanied by Mrs. Betty Becker, aide to Representative Hayes, as follows:

"Mr. President, on behalf of the lessees in the 12th Senatorial District as well as statewide, I'd like to introduce Miss Vicki Custer of the Kahala Towers condominium project on Waialae Avenue. It's a project with 234 condominium units and a owner occupancy rate of 63-1/2 percent. She and members of her association recognize the Legislature is the one hope of being able to buy the land in fee under their units since it's owned by a rather large estate."

Senator Koki, on behalf of Senators George, McCartney and himself, introduced a group of students from Germany and said, "The students are being hosted by Hawaii students from Castle and Kalaheo High Schools. They are here today to tour the Capitol and to attend our legislative session. Accompanying the students are Mrs. Schweer, their German coordinator, and Mrs. Paige Lawes, a parent of one of the student hosts."

FINAL READING

S.B. No. 32:

Senator Blair moved that S.B. No. 32, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Reed.

Senator Cobb rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I recall that we've passed this several times before and each time it has failed to achieve the requisite majority of votes of all votes cast in a general election in order to be incorporated into the State Constitution. In view of that, I hope the wording of the ballot amendment is very clear so that the electorate will not be confused into thinking that we are providing for additional recess days because very often a measure in the past has failed to achieve the requisite majority simply because of the wording in the ballot. I hope that concern is transmitted loudly and clearly to the Lieutenant Governor's Office. Thank you."

Senator Blair also spoke in support of the bill and said:

"Mr. President, this was, as the previous speaker indicated, on the ballot once before. A substantial majority of those who cast a ballot supported it. Unfortunately, there were a very large number of blank ballots which, effectively, are counted as no votes. I am hopeful that won't recur."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 32, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE III, SECTION 10, OF THE HAWAII CONSTITUTION TO CHANGE THE LEGISLATIVE SESSION RECESS REQUIREMENT," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:
