FIRST DAY

Wednesday, January 17, 1990

In accordance with the provisions of Section 10 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, the Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, was called to order at 10:00 o'clock a.m., by the Honorable Richard S.H. Wong, President of the Senate.

At this time, the members of the Senate, guests and audience rose to sing the National Anthem and "Hawaii Pono" led by Messrs. Clayton and Alan Naluai.

The Divine Blessing was then invoked by Kahu Charles Tang, Pastor of Lanakila Church, The Church of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, who was escorted to the dais by Senators A. Kobayashi, B. Kobayashi and Koki.

The President then directed the Senate Clerk to call the roll. The Clerk called the Roll showing all Senators present.

MISCELLANEOUS COMMUNICATION

Misc. Com. No. 1, letter from Assistant Clerk Richard K. Perkins dated January 16, 1990, submitting his letter of resignation as Assistant Clerk of the Senate, was read by the Clerk.

The President accepted the letter of resignation "with appreciation to Mr. Perkins for his fine work in the years that he spent with the Senate," and directed the Clerk to place the communication on file.

SENATE RESOLUTION

S.R. No. 1, electing George Masaji Amimoto as Assistant Clerk of the Senate, was offered by Senators Hagino and George and was read by the Clerk.

On motion by Senator Hagino, seconded by Senator George and carried, S.R. No. 1 was adopted.

The President, thereupon, administered the oath of office to Mr. Amimoto as Assistant Clerk of the Senate.

At this time, the President welcomed and introduced the following guests to the members of the Senate:

The Chair then offered the floor to Senator McCartney who announced the birth of his son Bricen Zenkichi McCartney on Friday, January 12, 1990; birth weight - 7 pounds; birth height - 19-3/4 inches. Senator McCartney also informed the members that his son has been enrolled in the A+ Program.

The President then addressed the members of the Senate and guests as follows:

"Governor Waihee, Lieutenant Governor Cayetano, Congressman Akaka, Chief Justice Lum, distinguished guests, members of the Senate, ladies and gentlemen -- May I extend my warmest greetings and Aloha to all of you.

"Senators, it is my pleasure to introduce a special guest in attendance with us today. Representative Lee Daniels from Illinois, who is the President of the National Conference of State Legislatures, is here with his lovely wife, Pam. President Daniels, Mrs. Daniels, welcome to Hawaii.

"Today marks the beginning of a new legislative session, the first of the 1990s. A new session, a new year, a new decade -- these are all signs of hope and optimism. Many challenges face us, many important issues require our attention. Dealing with these issues will fully occupy us during the course of this legislative session. I am confident that we will meet the challenges before us and at the end of the 1990 session be able to look back on a record of solid accomplishments.

"As President of the Senate, this is my opportunity to present an overview of the major issues that the Legislature will be dealing with during the session. This litany of issues is of course by no means a comprehensive one, but simply my own personal views.

"To begin, I believe that education remains a major area of concern to us -- indeed, to all the people of Hawaii. Our children are the future of Hawaii and we must prepare them academically to be informed and productive citizens, trained to make a living and educated to make a life. Last year, we laid a strong foundation -- with significant increases in funding for education as well as enabling legislation for a system of school-based management.

"Additionally, we strengthened the resources and capabilities of the University of Hawaii system. What we have accomplished so far is only the beginning of what needs to be done.

"I am particularly impressed by the potential of the state's A+ program which is intended to address both the 'latchkey kid' problem as well as provide enhanced educational opportunities for our young people. I commend the administration for developing this very innovative program. The initial pilot project phase of the A+ program is scheduled to begin next month. The Governor is requesting immediate funding of this pilot

project and I urge all members of the Senate to support this bill.

"As the session progresses, we will have the opportunity to review the A+ program in greater depth. We should look into ways to improve and strengthen this program, such as broadening its availability to all children, not just those in public schools. We should look at ways to work with some of the private providers who have established records of experience and expertise. We should take a look at alternative ways to deliver the services such as with a system of vouchers. A comprehensive legislative review of the A+ program during this session is essential.

"I am greatly encouraged by the growing role of the University of Hawaii in international and particularly Pacific area studies and programs. Hawaii's future lies in this outward-facing position. We need to establish a role for ourselves on the world stage. I would urge that we do all that we can to promote continued progress in this direction.

"The hallmarks of a good and just society is how it deals with those who live in its shadows -- the sick, the homeless, the poor, the abused, the afflicted. We need to reaffirm our commitment to bring them out of the shadows and into the light so they can lead productive lives with dignity.

"In my judgment, Hawaii's future economic and social well-being depends on the availability of energy. We must promote greater energy self-sufficiency through indigenous sources such as wind, ocean-thermal, solar and geothermal. We cannot continue our dependence on fossil fuels -- such as oil and its derivatives -- which are globally depleting, pose serious environmental concerns, and are subject to international disruption. Much controversy has recently arisen regarding geothermal energy. Some legitimate concerns have been raised which need to be addressed. However, I believe in geothermal energy. It represents a tremendous potential for Hawaii -- both for energy self-sufficiency and for economic development -- that we should develop.

"Related to the problem of fossil fuel dependency is our growing transportation problem, especially here on Oahu. The population is growing and so are the number of vehicles. Our once-pure air is tainted by emission pollutants and our traffic condition is approaching gridlock. For Honolulu one of the solutions to these problems is a mass transit system. Because of the lead time necessary for building such a system, a legislative decision to proceed and to provide the funding should be made as soon as possible. I think it's time for us to move ahead.

"This session is an opportune time for us to review and reform our state tax laws. By and large, the state's economy is in good shape, the state government's finances are sound, state tax revenues are coming in at a healthy level so this is a good time for us to act. The Tax Review Commission's report provides us with a solid base to begin. We need to look seriously at our tax system -- at the various taxes themselves as well as their respective rates. We need to reexamine the fiscal relationship between the state and the counties and if need be, restructure that relationship. One thing I think we should consider is giving the counties the authority to impose a general excise tax. What I'm looking at is a one-half (1/2) percent tax for the counties' general fund and, as an option, another one-half (1/2) percent tax for the counties' transportation needs -- infrastructure development, repair and maintenance and also mass transit.

"On a more somber note, I am sorry to see the fabric of our society being torn by the scourge of drugs. We need strong action to rid our state of this plague. We have to have strong education and intervention programs to keep our non-drug users from becoming users. We have to help our users to 'kick the habit.' We have to vigorously go after and punish the dealers and distributors whose trade is poisoning the lifeblood of our community. A review of the penalty provisions of our drug laws -- both for dealing and for using -- should be made with an eye for making these penalties tougher.

"On a more specific note, I feel that the legislature may have to reconsider our prior decision to treat marijuana more leniently than other drugs. Perhaps we need to take another look at the marijuana laws and start treating marijuana as seriously as other drugs. Hawaii's marijuana industry is a blight on our state -- it gives Hawaii a bad name, it is a major cause of criminal activity, it fosters disrespect for the law.

"The predominance of substance abuse is contributing to other crime problems in our state. I refer particularly to the problems of violence, especially firearms-related violence. As part of our efforts to lower this threat of violence and to make our community safer, I urge the banning of both handguns and semi-automatic assault weapons. No legitimate purpose exists for the private ownership of such weapons. They contribute to crime, they contribute to violence, they contribute to accidental tragedies. They pose a significant danger to society. They should not be condoned.

"We must rededicate ourselves to protecting Hawaii's unique environmental qualities, we must care for our land and protect our water and air -- to pass these on as a legacy to future generations.

"Members of the Senate, our work is cut out for us. We have a busy agenda to deal with over the next few weeks and months. I hope we will be able to discharge our duties creatively, purposefully and compassionately. Let us enter the new age of the 1990s, this threshold of a new century, with the resolve to make a difference for Hawaii -- to make a more just and humane society, and to provide for our people's economic and social needs. We need to be creative -- look beyond the surface appearance of these issues and into the underlying patterns and paradigms. From there we may gain a clearer perspective of how to deal with the issues facing Hawaii and how to proceed toward the Hawaii of the future that we seek.

"Our task awaits us.

"The time is now.

"Let us begin."

Senator George, Minority Leader of the Senate, then responded as follows:

"At the start of a new session, a new year, a new decade, it's always tempting to get eloquent about new beginnings, new hopes and dreams, that elusive second chance.

"People make resolutions. We resolve to be different. Go on a diet. Stick with a budget. Be charitable. Exercise more. Be nicer to people.

"Politicians make resolutions. To go on a budgetary diet. Be charitable to the counties. Tackle the high hurdles when their constituents say 'Jump!' Give a nice tax cut and rebate to taxpayers. (This may be especially true in even-numbered years.)

"I'd like to think we might make this a real new beginning -- that our resolutions won't end up discarded with the unfulfilled commitments we've made as we passed earlier milestones.

"But hope rarely triumphs over experience.

"I've just dusted off the Senate Journal to refresh my memory about the legislative fanfare opening the decade of the eighties. Remember? You introduced your 10-month old grandson, Joshua, Mr. President. We congratulated ourselves on a short list of past accomplishments.

"Then you set our agenda for the eighties, Mr. President. You put tax reform high on our list, and said we must deal with rebates of our surplus. (It wasn't a big surplus by today's yardstick, but we worried about it.) You noted the problems of small business, expressed crime as a grave concern, and thought Waikiki ought to be cleaned up.

"Your opening day address ten years ago, Mr. President, urged our support of mass transit for Honolulu.

"I don't think I'm unreasonable in suggesting that we shouldn't crow about our accomplishments since that Opening Day ten years ago. Most of that agenda is still before us.

"One exception: I haven't heard much lately about the necessity to fund the Poamoho general aviation airport, high on our 1980 priority list. But it was circumstances that postponed this problem...not us.

"We put names on our new beginnings, from time to time. The Era of the Pacific. The Year of the Child. The Decade of Education. The Age of Reason. The Me Generation. And I've heard that the House majority has decided that this is the Year of the Family.

"At the risk of falling into my own semantic trap, I'd like to propose that we make Responsibility the watchword for the nineties. Performance instead of promises.

"It doesn't take a lofty IQ to predict that we can't make the same speeches indefinitely. Identifying problems, and studying them, isn't solving them. The time is over when we can pass off questions as answers. Unlike the general aviation airport crisis, most of our problems simply aren't going to go away by themselves, and the people who put us here know it.

"The natives are already somewhat more than restless. A majority of Honolulu's Neighborhood Boards have given enthusiastic endorsement to a joint resolution asking for county home rule. These people -- the ones who elected many of us -- take exception to the state's usurpation of what they feel should be responsibilities of local government.

"If we -- if the State -- had a glowing record as problem-solvers, I don't believe the citizens would be so eager to suggest that we ought to turn the problems over to someone else. Perhaps they've remembered Abraham Lincoln's advice that government ought to do only what people can't do for themselves, and that these limited government responsibilities ought to be assigned to the lowest level capable of performing them.

"It's this folk-wisdom that motivates the current effort to decentralize school management after a couple of decades of bragging about the efficiency of our statewide school district.

"Another grass-roots voice reminds us that it's not nice to fool Mother Nature; that this environment is the only one we've got, and we'd better take good care of it. We shouldn't need reminding that we are only the custodians and agents of the people's power.

"The Senate is being given a strong message that Hawaii's citizens are nearing the end of their patience with our indefensible over-taxation.

"You can't tell me that the road to 'Tax Hell' was paved with good intentions. Let's confess; it was greed. The only ones that were surprised to hear the devilish designation were the officials who scrambled to refute the accusation by looking for errors in the arithmetic.

"The strong recommendations of the Tax Commission have been sent to us, and most of the official majority reactions have been either to dodge them, or to throw them back.

"The Commission was created in compliance with our Constitution. Its members were appointed by the Governor, and confirmed by the Senate. The commissioners are experienced and qualified people who spent a lot of time on their assignment, and we owe them -- and the public -- full consideration of their proposals. Our hearings shouldn't be held on someone's watered-down version of what they might have said. I hope either the administration or majority leadership will take responsibility for the introduction of appropriate legislation. I think that's where the package of bills ought to originate.

"But, if the bills aren't forthcoming from the Governor or from you, Mr. President, you can be sure that the minority will have them on the clerk's desk before bill cutoff. That's a promise.

"It ought to be an interesting and lively session. The mistakes are all out there, waiting to be made.

"And the solutions are there, too, if we're willing to forget politics, and partisanship, and personalities and work together to find them. And, while we're at it, how about some sunshine?

"Mr. President, as always, you have our commitment. Let's do it."

Senator Mizuguchi rose to state as follows:

"Mr. President, on behalf of your Senators with longevity in this body, Senator Yamasaki, Senator Cobb, Senator George, yourself and myself, we welcome our

Assistant Clerk back to the Senate. It's nice to see George back in the Senate. Thank you."

Senator Crozier added his greetings, and on a point of personal privilege said:

"Mr. President, I'd like also to welcome George Amimoto back. Some of us served with him in the ConCon, Senators Hagino, Fernandes Salling, Chang and myself, and we would like to welcome him back.

"George was like a father to many of us as we were a lot younger then and we did some things that were not quite kosher. George was also there to guide us. We appreciated that.

"On a more serious note, Mr. President, the Minority Leader yesterday made some comments and I'm sure it's all taken to heart. One of the things she discussed was the Tax Review Commission, and she thought that the Majority should put in a bundle of bills on the recommendations of the Tax Review Commission. As you know, you and I have been talking about taxes for the last three weeks. We are, Senator George, we are putting in bills. There will be 25 different bills to reflect the Tax Review Commission's recommendations coming in from the Senate Majority.

"Thank you very much."

Senator Chang added his greetings as follows:

"Mr. President, on behalf of the youngsters in the Senate, those who served with George Amimoto as fellow staff members, Senator Ann Kobayashi, Senator Russell Blair, Senator Milton Holt and myself, we would like to welcome George back."

At this time, Senator Holt rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege. Senator Crozier alluded to some of the remarks made yesterday by the Minority Leader. I also have something to say.

"During yesterday's opening day ceremonies, the Minority Leader reminded us of the agenda which you had set for the '80s, ten years ago. The Minority Leader also reminded us that our list of accomplishments with regard to this agenda is relatively short and that, 'most of that agenda is still before us.'

"Mr. President, as we try to set the agenda for the '90s, I feel that the Minority Leader's remarks are entirely appropriate. I would like to remind the members of this body, however, that the Senate Minority has had a significant role in contributing to our 'short list' of accomplishments for the '80s.

"As you recall, Mr. President, the leadership of the 1981 and 1982 Senate Majority was comprised of a coalition which included Minority party members in key positions. Senator Mizuguchi and I remember those years very well and I'm sure you do too, Mr. President. Because of this experience, we are well aware of what it feels like to be in the minority and, therefore, can identify closely with the Minority Leader's remarks.

"In short, Mr. President, I hope that the Minority Leader is serious in proposing that we should forget politics, partisanship and personalities and work together to find solutions. Thank you."

The President then made the following announcement:

"Pursuant to the consensus of the Caucus of the Whole, reached at its meeting on August 31, 1989, the Chair makes the following changes to the Senate Committee structure:

1. Senator Blair assumes the chair of Consumer Protection and Commerce Committee, replacing Senator Cobb who remains a member of the committee. Senator Chang replaces Senator Blair as vice chair.

2. Senator Aki replaces Senator McCartney as a member of the Energy and Natural Resources Committee.

3. Senator McCartney replaces Senator Aki as a member of the Government Operations Committee and assumes the chair in place of Senator Blair.

4. Senator Fernandes Salling assumes the vice chair of Housing and Hawaiian Programs Committee, replacing Senator Cobb who remains a member of the committee.

5. Senator Cobb relinquishes his membership on the Judiciary Committee."

THIRD DAY

Friday, January 19, 1990

The Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, convened at 11:35 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Stanley E. Amos, Trinity Missionary Baptist Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Aki and Crozier who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Second Day.

Kobayashi, on behalf of Senator Chang and herself, introduced their 'shadow,' Miss Claire-Ann Niibu, who is part of a Teaming for Tomorrow Career Planning for Girls Program, sponsored by the Girl Scout Council. Senator Kobayashi said, "Claire-Ann is a sophomore at Pearl City High School. Claire-Ann was selected because she is sophomore class president, active in the student council for many years, a member of the speech team, and is active in the Youth Against Hunger Project. This Career Planning Program provides guidance for many of our future leaders of the state and those future leaders are women."

Miss Niibu, who was seated in the gallery, rose to be recognized.

Senator B. Kobayashi, on behalf of Senator Fernandes Salling, introduced Kapaa Elementary School Principal Cliff Bailey and two parents (seated behind Senator Kobayashi). Senator Kobayashi said, "Kapaa Elementary has the distinction of being the largest elementary school in the State of Hawaii with approximately 1,496 students. It also happens to share the same campus with Kapaa Intermediate and High School which has a separate student body of over 1,300 students. This makes Kapaa the largest school site in the state by a good deal and this is all happening in the smallest county in the State of Hawaii."

"They are here to talk about some innovations which will help ease the de-personalization of this huge campus and have presented a proposal that will help break down the large Kapaa Elementary School campus and also instill some teacher innovation and empowerment."

At 9:46 o'clock a.m., on motion by Senator Blair, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair to meet in Joint Session with the House of Representatives, in accordance with H.C.R. No. 1, to receive the Governor's state of the state address.

JOINT SESSION

The Joint Session of the Senate and the House of Representatives was called to order at 10:10 o'clock a.m. by the Honorable Daniel Kihano, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

At this time, the Speaker welcomed and introduced the following distinguished guests to the members of the Fifteenth Legislature:

The First Lady of the State of Hawaii, Mrs. Lynne Waihee, who was presented a lei by Representative Alcon;

Mrs. Jo Ann Kihano;

Congressman Daniel K. Akaka, and Mrs. Millie Akaka;

Lieutenant Governor Benjamin Cayetano and Mrs. Lorraine Cayetano;

Chief Justice Herman Lum; former Governor of Hawaii, William F. Quinn; and Dr. Joshua Agsalud, Administrative Director, Office of the Governor;

Mrs. Mary Waihee, mother of Governor Waihee; and Mrs. Matsue Kobashigawa, mother of Mrs. Lynne Waihee;

Counsul Herman Mulder, Dean of the Consular Corps in Hawaii; Consul General Daniel Droulers of France; and Consul General Masaji Takahashi of Japan;

Rear Admiral William P. Kovalesky, Commander, Fourteenth Coast Guard District; Rear Admiral Edwin Kohn, representing Admiral David Jeremiah, Commander-in-Chief of the Pacific Fleet; Major General Eugene Renzi, representing Admiral Hardisty, Commander-in-Chief of the Pacific; and

Mr. Jeremy Harris, representing Mayor Frank Fasi of the City and County of Honolulu.

The Speaker then appointed Senators Gerald Hagino, Russell Blair and Mary George, and Representatives Emilio Alcon, Tom Okamura and Michael Liu to escort the Honorable John Waihee, Governor of the State of Hawaii, to the rostrum.

The Speaker then invited Lieutenant Governor Benjamin Cayetano to join him at the rostrum and appointed Representatives Okamura and Hemmings to escort Lieutenant Governor Cayetano to the rostrum.

Representative Annelle Amaral, on behalf of the Senate and the House of Representatives, presented a maile'ilima lei to Governor Waihee.

The Speaker then presented the Honorable John Waihee to the members of the Fifteenth Legislature.

The Governor addressed the Joint Session as follows:

"Thank you.

"President Wong, Speaker Kihano, members of the Fifteenth Legislature, honored guests, ladies and gentlemen, Aloha.

"With three years of new agendas, new actions and new partnerships behind us, let me begin by acknowledging you, the first among my partners, the Hawaii State Legislature. We have come a long way since I first appeared before you.

"Today we gather together at the beginning of the last decade of the 20th century. We find ourselves in an era of unprecedented world change. Just when we thought the cold war would never end, walls of totalitarianism came tumbling down and we can see the faint shape of world peace on the horizon. Just when we were defining our role in the Pacific century, scholars, who would have never suggested it at the beginning of the last decade, are talking about the re-emergence of Europe and the potential for a global economic and social renaissance.

"I believe the decade ahead will continue to confound our expectations. The challenges before us share two key characteristics. First, neither the public nor private sector can do it all alone. Second, we begin to do what we dream we can do when we break loose from the old mindsets.

"Like many of you, I am a product of the sixties, facing the nineties knowing it is our time to lead. The sixties come to mind because they were the last time that we as a nation believed we could control and shape our future. It was a time when no problem was too great, when we reached for the moon and we made it, and when, most importantly, we believed in ourselves.

"Well, I do not propose going back to the sixties any more than I suggest we cling to the 80's. It is not time to turn back the clock. It is time to wind it. It is time to

reaffirm our belief in ourselves, and take charge of the 90's. We know we can do it.

"Remember the 1986 television commercial showing a deserted Bishop Street with trash blowing in the wind? The message: if Hawaii did not improve its business climate, that was our future.

"The naysayers said we would never change our business climate. Well, the hard-working people and businesses of Hawaii, supported by an active state government, buried that 'never.'

"We rose from America's 34th worst business climate to 12th best as ranked by Inc. Magazine.

"We extended tax relief to Hawaii's businesses: abolishing the tax on exports, exempting certain business transactions and providing a capital goods excise tax credit. In the aggregate, our businesses received \$55 million in tax relief over the past three years.

"During this administration, approximately 50,300 new jobs were created at an average of 16,700 jobs per year or roughly 50 new jobs every day.

"And we can boast of having the lowest unemployment rate in the nation.

"Are we satisfied? No. These successes have given us new possibilities to support Hawaii's businesses and expand economic opportunities for our people.

"Because we've reduced the number of workers collecting unemployment insurance by 65 percent since 1985, today we can reduce the burden of the unemployment insurance tax on Hawaii's employers, so that they may continue to prosper and grow.

"This session, I will submit to you a proposal to cut business costs for unemployment insurance. Through existing and proposed reductions, we will save employers \$124 million by the end of 1991.

"I also propose that beginning 1991, \$6 million, or 4.8 percent of the business savings, be reinvested in a training fund to help our people meet the skill demands of the future.

"It's time to change a system that collects more money than it needs and sends it to sit in a reserve fund controlled by the federal government. Let's bring the money back home, for the benefit of businesses and workers.

"We have prospered in the last few years because the twin pillars of our economy, tourism and construction, are doing well. These industries need and deserve our continued support, and I ask you for it.

"Likewise, we must continue and strengthen our efforts to diversify our economy to avoid being overly dependent on any single industry and to give our people choice in employment. Again, we need your support to develop new industries for Hawaii's future such as the use of space for peaceful commerce and to promote Hawaii as a good place for new types of industry to do business.

"Hawaii has attracted substantial amounts of capital investment in recent years. While such investments have contributed to our economic growth, they have not contributed as much to the diversification of our economy. Unfortunately, most investment has occurred in the resort and travel industry.

"I am convinced that it will take more than promotion or incentives to change this investment pattern. Stronger action is needed if we are going to gain better control over our economic future. Accordingly, I have asked the Office of State Planning to prepare a policy for consideration by the Land Use Commission that will require creation of one non-tourism related job for every hotel room approved in future resort developments.

"In the meantime, a growing number of community-based enterprises are springing up across the state. They are being developed by entrepreneurs who may not fit the normal business mode. These enterprises share the following characteristics: They are locally based; they are people oriented, interested not only in profits but community concerns; and, they are developed to provide economic independence and real choices.

"One example is the Opelu Project on the Waianae Coast which will develop small-scale, backyard aquaculture. The fish raised will first feed the families who grow them, then meet community produce needs, and will finally be sold on the open market.

"I propose that we (1) support the Opelu Project as a prototype of community-based development; and (2) create a fund in the Department of Business and Economic Development with its own advisory board to provide grants and low interest loans to other community-based enterprises.

"Two years ago you supported us in our goal to secure 61,000 new affordable homes by the year 2000. The plan was to encourage the private sector to develop 41,000 of those units and have the remaining 20,000 built by joint ventures between government and private developers. Obviously, this called for a strong public/private partnership.

"Well, how are we doing? We are ahead of schedule. Judge for yourselves.

"We challenged developers to a goal of 60 percent affordable homes in all new housing development that came before the Land Use Commission for approval, and we were ballyhooed as dreamers. Well, dreams will come true for 20,000 families when they move into the affordable homes approved since we set these new goals. The developers will bury 'never' under foundations, four walls, and the future of our families.

"I'd love to be able to tell you today that I'm ordering the Land Use Commission to move more quickly on classifying new lands for housing on Oahu.

"I can't, because the commission has opened as much land for housing in three years as was opened altogether in the prior ten.

"I can't, because we already called for 60 percent affordable goals. In fact, we made 60 percent affordable, 100 percent acceptable.

"I can't, because every request for new housing on Oahu has been acted upon, and today none are before the commission. There's no bottleneck with the state; there's not even a bottle.

"And to those who said for 20 years, there will never be a second city on Oahu, I say come to Kapolei and see tomorrow being built. The day of delay is over.

"Three years ago, we built 300 homes. This year, there are 4,600 state-supported housing units under construction across Hawaii. From self-help housing in

Milolii, to \$89,000 homes in Waiehu, to senior citizen housing here on Oahu.

"And there is more to come. We are now working with the city to develop new urban rental housing for families and elderly on the city land that now houses the Police Department and the state land that houses the Department of Agriculture. What better place for our seniors to enjoy life than on Young Street.

"We must continue our bold battle on the cost of housing; and so we are requesting \$50 million for the Home Revolving Fund.

"We must accelerate construction of family rental units, elderly housing and projects for the homeless. Thus our housing package includes \$100 million in revenue bonds to finance rental housing construction, \$15 million for the rental assistance program and sizable requests for housing for the disadvantaged and the homeless.

"When it came to education, we made a commitment to our children by negotiating two contracts which will increase a starting teacher's salary by 50 percent, by opening over 100 parent networking centers, and enacting a new school superfund to provide \$800 million over seven years for new school facilities.

"The critics said you can raise teachers' salaries and fix the schools, but you will never change the system. Well, never say 'never' to a united business, labor and school community. They responded with historic school reform.

"Last year I shared a vision of entering the 21st century with a public education system that is second to none. I delineated a ten-year program to achieve it, because education is no passing fad or fancy. It must be the top priority of our decade.

"We envisioned a future in which local school communities would have charge of almost all budgeting, setting of programs and priorities, and increased involvement in staffing. We determined that the sooner schools are in charge of their own affairs, the sooner we would see great progress.

"We envisioned state-established and result-oriented performance standards to measure progress along the way and to hold schools accountable. Setting clear goals is the difference between children who can grow up and compete in this world, and children who can't.

"Today we all have a twin responsibility -- to help public education and to insist on excellence. Hawaii can be proud of the way the Board of Education and the Department of Education have begun to implement this vision. But we have a long way to go and tough decisions to make.

"This legislative session, I call on you to focus on the progress and problems of school/community based management, the pressing need to set performance standards, and actions for the second year of restructuring.

"Our teachers: creative, talented and energetic, they spark the classroom experience. I ask you to consider mechanisms for applying professional standards to ensure quality teaching.

"We must support continued improvements at the University of Hawaii College of Education to help address the teacher shortage, with attention to neighbor island programs where need is greatest.

"We have established our vision of the University of Hawaii as the premier university of the Pacific. President Simone tells me that we are now among the top two percent of the universities in America.

"Your support has given us a university library which, on the basis of its depth, ranks 46th out of 3,500 in America. We are leading the nation with a new School for Hawaiian, Asian and Pacific Studies and a new School of Ocean, Earth Science and Technology.

"We have opportunities for home-grown greatness. Greatness like we see in Jacqueline Chun, a Manoa junior, just named to USA Today's top twenty All-USA Academic Team. Jacqueline has a 3.9 academic average and sings in 25 different languages.

"Our university is becoming a great place to solve Hawaii's problems. As a result of your support for the nursing program, we will double the number of U.H. nursing graduates by 1992. And I applaud our state departments for their partnership with the university in creating the accelerated Master of Social Work program, serving 27 state social workers.

"So does Leo Dean, a state social worker, who wrote Director of Human Services Winona Rubin and said, 'Thank you for the opportunity to further by education, enhance my social work skills, and also in so doing, be able to provide better service to our clients.'

"In addition to our ongoing capital improvement projects throughout the university system, I request special support for students and faculty.

"I ask for funding for a number of programs at the University of Hawaii designed to support minority and disadvantaged students. For example, Operation Kua'ana, which seeks to recruit Hawaiian students in the university system.

"I also propose the creation of the Hawaii Opportunity Program in Education -- Project Hope -- to support members of Hawaiian, Filipino and other groups whose numbers in our island society are not comparably represented on the campuses of the University of Hawaii. Our state will be the poorer if we neglect the opportunity to involve everyone in the educational mainstream that leads to accomplishment.

"To do this, I request the set-aside of \$7 million a year from tuition fees for the next decade to form a \$100 million endowment for a scholarship and support fund for such students.

"And for the faculty I say, let's send them a strong message of encouragement with immediate action on their pay bill.

"Let's continue our university building program. Let's renovate, innovate and educate. The premier university of the Pacific will bind us and build our tomorrow.

"Today, I propose tax reform on top of tax reform. This Legislature has been the first since statehood to pass meaningful tax relief. You've done it for three years in a row. Let's go for four.

"Our tax relief has taken over 32,000 taxpayers off the rolls since 1986. They paid then, but they don't pay now.

"Our tax relief over the last three years took \$380 million from the state treasury and put it in the wallets of Hawaii taxpayers and Hawaii businesses.

"Our tax relief and tax rebate returned almost half a billion dollars to households and businesses over the last three years.

"Our tax relief means that a typical family of four earning between \$40,000 and \$50,000 today is paying 24 percent less than they would have without tax reform.

"Have we given relief? You bet.

"Should we stop now? No way. Not when batting four for four will help our people.

"This year, we propose \$40 million worth of additional tax relief. We will reduce the top rate from ten to nine percent, reduce the number of brackets from eight to four, increase the standard deduction, and make the food tax credit permanent.

"The total tax relief over four years will be \$520 million to taxpayers and businesses. At the same time, our typical family of four would enjoy a total of nine hundred and two dollars in lower taxes, or a reduction of 39 percent from what they would have paid without relief.

"Traffic Gridlock. Bumper to bumper frustration from Lihue to Kona. Now that's a problem skeptics are saying we will never beat.

"Well, let's prove them wrong. We have already started.

"For example: We have constructed the Hanamaulu-Ahukini cutoff road on Kauai, widened Honoapiilani Highway on Maui and made improvements to the Belt Highway on the Big Island.

"On Oahu, H-3 is rapidly being built after years of stalemate. Just last month a number of us walked through the Koolaus in the new exploratory tunnel joining the windward and leeward sides of the highway. I have no doubt that we will complete construction on target by 1994.

"However, we all know that more needs to be done.

"First, the old formula of using state monies to match limited federal funds is just not sufficient. Federal highway funding programs are being held hostage to the deficit problems created by the national fiscal policies of the 80's.

"It's clear, if our people are going to get relief, we need to take control and not let our highway construction needs be dictated by the ambiguities of federal funding levels. So today, I propose that we speed up state highway construction by transferring \$80 million in general and capital improvement funds to the highway special fund. This will allow us to expedite the Haleiwa Bypass Highway, the Haleakala-Pukalani Highway improvements, the Kalaniana'ole corridor and other needed highway construction.

"Second, we have got to move ahead on rapid transit. Building highways alone is simply not enough. We need transportation alternatives to the automobile.

"In 1987, shortly after taking office, I met with members of the city administration, at their request, to discuss the development of rapid transit on Oahu. Since then, our staff from the Department of Transportation has been working with their city counterparts on this issue.

"Now, my friends, we are at a critical juncture. Either we are going to take the bold steps necessary to make

rapid transit a reality or concede victory to those who say it will never be done.

"It does not take a genius to know that the city will not be able to develop and construct a rapid transit system by itself. They must have our support.

"I know that there are those who will immediately say, but can the city answer all my questions? Fine, hold all the necessary hearings and ask them; but let's face it, there are some points that can only be answered in the process of development and those should not be used as excuses for delay.

"Others are concerned about cost, and rightly so. But we need to come to grips with the fact that there are no inexpensive rapid transit solutions. Furthermore, the city is not, on this occasion, asking for funds. They are asking for the authority to raise funds.

"Shortly, I will submit for your consideration an administration measure, jointly developed with the City and County of Honolulu with input from our neighbor island counties, that gives the counties the authority to impose a 1/2 percent excise tax for a period of ten years. The proposed measure will also provide for further legislative review in the 1991 session.

"On Oahu, the proceeds from the 1/2 percent county excise tax will be used to fund rapid transit development and construction.

"Third, our neighbor island counties have not been immune from the problems of traffic congestion and the 1/2 percent county excise tax may be used to meet their transportation needs as well as provide funds for other infrastructure such as sewage disposal, water development and parks.

"We all value the principle that government must be accountable to the people. Let's put that value into action in new ways.

"I have proposed giving the counties new revenues and new taxing power; because if they are spending the people's money, then they ought to be raising it. Last year I became the first governor in the state's history to propose shifting new taxing authority to the counties. I return with a proposal to give the transient accommodations tax -- all revenue and authority -- to the counties.

"If you think that the issue is just money, you are missing the point. The issue is accountability, as basic as the principle of no taxation without representation. You may believe there is a better source of revenue for this reform, and that is grist for the mill. But don't leave the essential principle behind.

"I also propose a phased-in transfer of the mauka portion of Kakaako to the city. The Legislature wisely established the Hawaii Community Development Authority and designated Kakaako for development. We've done our job. We have successful urban renewal. And we've primed the pump. City tax revenues from the area have increased by \$3 million and will double over the next four years. We should move on to our new priority, the waterfront.

"I suppose the two most commonly asked questions between people are: 'How's the job?' and 'How's the family?'. We must change mindsets in the '90s by asking and answering the questions as one. Because, from the standpoint of workforce alone, the betterment of our families is essential to the success of our businesses. Human service is no more the single domain of

government than economic development is purely a function of the private sector.

"The feeling of family must be more than a matter of bloodline. It extends from the fireplace to the workplace, from the living room to the school room.

"That is the family of Hawaii. And the family of Hawaii controls the future of Hawaii.

"This session we propose the following actions for families:

"First, After-School Care. Let me read part of what Linda Mosher, a Kailua mom with two children at Keolu Elementary School, wrote us:

'Fulltime care has become unaffordable for me now. My only other alternative if I remain working, will be for my children to take the city bus home and remain indoors until my arrival. I consider myself a conscientious, caring mother. The stress and conflict I experience just considering this solution is immense. Children become isolated in their own homes, and parents experience daily anxiety as a result of economic pressures.... The A+ program offers parents and children a realistic solution to a need too long ignored. It believe this program could have a long lasting effect on Hawaii's families, especially for our children.'

"For Linda Mosher, February 5, 1990 will be a big day. With your support, the A+ program will begin. Nearly 19,000 students have applied, and we will serve all 170 public elementary schools.

"It will be the first statewide afterschool program in the nation. The need is real and deep. About 44 percent of our A+ children come from families earning less \$30,000 a year. Nearly 27 percent come from single parent families, most of whom are working women. We will offer a high quality program, which compliments the regular school program, with about 87 percent of the site coordinators being principals or teachers who already come from the schools.

"I thank Senate President Wong and House Speaker Kihano for their strong words of support for A+, as do Lieutenant Governor Cayetano and our child care subcabinet. I ask you to consider A+ with an eye to helping all on a permanent basis.

"Second, for families, we ask for your continued support of the nation's first universal health care access program, which is well on its way to full implementation this spring. We want early treatment when people need it, not expensive catastrophic care when it's too late. Public support for entry to the existing, excellent private health care system is what we seek. It's a matter of human dignity and common sense.

"Third, our families need protection from the menace of substance abuse. No family should have to worry about the threat of a drunken driver when they are taking a Sunday drive, nor have their home invaded by drug-crazed criminals.

"In the last three years we created a statewide narcotics task force to focus on drug interdiction. The attorney general led a law enforcement coalition to improve statewide planning in all law enforcement areas. We've enacted an asset forfeiture law, stiffer penalties for drug production and possession, an anti-drug paraphernalia measure, and drug-free school zones. This session, we will ask you for weapon-free school zones.

"We must also end the carnage on the highways. A car is a vehicle, not a weapon. To keep it that way I ask you to support the law enforcement coalition's call for administrative revocation of the licenses of drunk drivers. The time has come to take control of our own lives by taking the steering wheel out of the hands of those who aren't in control of theirs.

"Substance abuse must be fought on the fronts of enforcement, prevention and treatment. Unfortunately, the President's War on Drugs falls short on funding for prevention and treatment. I recommend we fill the gap with a package for front-line action which gives the highest priorities to mothers and babies, to adolescents, and the training of substance abuse counselors.

"Fourth, I stated two years ago that creating dependence is not a compassionate act. You agreed and created 'Project Success.' Our record is one of creating independence, with welfare caseloads down 13 percent over five years. Those aren't just statistics. Those are over four thousand families who now have real hope, and whose lives are made better. We must continue to help people shape productive lives through the new 'Jobs' program.

"Fifth, in cooperation with Aloha United Way, we are breaking down the informational barriers which prevent families from getting the help they need. Soon, statewide and at no charge, people will be able to get information about human services by simply dialing ASK-2000. This is a true breakthrough in public access.

"Sixth, we are accelerating action for Hawaiian families. That means completing construction of 450 houses on Hawaiian Homesteads over the next 12 months and providing infrastructure for 1,300 new lots over the next three years. It means challenging the federal government to a joint commitment for housing. Thus, it pleases me to announce that for the first time in history, the federal government is granting money, \$1.2 million, to the Department of Hawaiian Homes for infrastructure. (Mahalo to Senator Dan Inouye and our Congressional Delegation.)

"We've got a challenging state and federal agenda ahead. There will be measures dealing with such long-standing issues as the extension of homestead leases beyond 99 years and taxation of Hawaiian Home Lands. On the federal level, the state will pursue eligibility for housing, community development and loan programs, and seek compensation and land for illegal executive orders identified in the Federal/State Task Force report. And I have directed the Attorney General to work out the incomplete business started with the cancellation of executive orders on state land exchanges.

"We also will perpetuate Hawaii's history by expanding the state's Historic Preservation Office from a section to a separate division with new funding.

"Finally, as I have said before, we cannot avoid the tough issue of clarifying how much revenue is due to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs from the ceded land trust. While our negotiations are still in progress, I am optimistic that we will be ready to present a proposal to the Legislature this session.

"There are changes we must make; there are values we will not leave behind.

"One such value is captured in the word kama'aina. As kama'aina, we are all stewards of our land.

"Today I propose the following actions to protect our land:

"First, I propose a tougher environmental emergency response law to protect every living thing from the harm of oil or chemical spills. Parties who cause spills must be held responsible for reporting them and the cost of clean-up.

"Second, I propose tougher curbs on land speculation. To us, land is far more than a trading commodity.

"So I propose a use-it-or-lose-it zoning law. When land is approved for development, it ought to be developed. But too often, vacant land with state land use designation and county zoning sits idle as owners speculate. I say no more waiting for one more turn of the wheel of fortune. The Land Use Commission must be given the power to void a boundary amendment if the owner is simply speculating.

"Similarly, it is also time to start calling a golf course a golf course. Thus, we will submit legislation to remove golf course development as a permitted use on agricultural land.

"Third, we launched a bold land-banking program last session, and I ask you today to renew the investment in our natural and historic legacy with an additional pledge of \$20 million.

"Fourth, there are land which are threatened which we must protect.

"It can be captured in a phrase: Save He'eia. The He'eia wetlands are not only a natural treasure but they define us as a community.

"We are not Oahu without He'eia. It tells us where the windward side meets the north shore and where city become country. Simply viewing it is a blessing. If we lose He'eia today, we lose part of ourselves forever.

"Also, with your support, we will take the seven miles of public and private lands from Mahai'ula to Kua Bay in Kona and protect them as well, as a shoreline wilderness park.

"We won't lose it to development. We will save the seven miles -- for the wildlife, for the generations and forever.

"So here we are, beginning a new decade which will end in a new century. We face the challenges unshackled from rusty mindsets, as partners in a shared destiny.

"In the year 2000, there will be new leaders, reflecting back as they toast the turn of time.

"I hope they will say about us:

"We challenged the status quo, tested the system and won.

"We tackled the hard questions, made the tough decisions and took the heat.

"We strengthened our economy and our families, met the housing crisis and reformed our schools, using not so much the strength of government but the values, talent and energy of the people we represent.

"We didn't fear differences ... not in people nor opinions. We welcomed them and we were better for them. We were many and yet one.

"We buried 'never' every time it got between the people of Hawaii and their aspirations.

"My friends, it is time to end talk of rising to the occasion. This is the occasion. Our decade. Our time. Our turn. Let's go."

Senate President Wong then rose and stated:

"Thank you very much, Governor. Thank you for sharing with us some of your thoughts on what issues confront Hawaii at the beginning of the new decade. In particular, I want to thank you for giving us a status account of your past three years in office which was, with some bias, outstanding.

"On a real, more personal note, Governor, I have been here for a long, long time. To some people maybe too long. I have heard a lot of phrases put in state of the state speeches and I must say I like your evaluation of the past three years. I also like your idea that the job has to be done with all the members of the community, including the City and County of Honolulu as well as the Legislature, working together cooperatively, and for that I commend you.

"If there be no further business, I declare this Joint Session adjourned."

At 11:01 o'clock a.m., the President declared the Joint Session adjourned.

ADJOURNMENT

At 11:05 o'clock a.m., on motion by Senator Blair, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Tuesday, January 23, 1990.

ORDER OF THE DAY

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT
and
THIRD READING

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1901 (S.B. No. 2330, S.D. 1):

Senators B. Kobayashi and Yamasaki, for the Committee on Education and the Committee on Ways and Means, presented a joint report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1901) recommending that S.B. No. 2330, S.D. 1, pass Third Reading.

Senator B. Kobayashi moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1901 be adopted and S.B. No. 2330, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Yamasaki.

Senator George rose to speak in favor of the bill, with certain reservations, as follows:

"The four-month test of A+ is described as a 'pilot program.'

"Serious changes in our activities are usually tested out on a small scale. We pick a sample and see how the innovation works, then implement the full-on change on the basis of what we learn from the trial. We may make significant changes on the basis of the small-scale trial. Or, if the pilot shows it isn't effective, we forget that solution and go back to the drawing board.

"It's like working in a laboratory, or with a small control group, before you go public with a new medicine or a new food or any new product.

"A+ presents a real deviation from this process.

"It will put in place statewide a major new program -- variously described as educational or custodial -- which will seriously affect private-sector efforts to handle the problem of after-school child care. I gather it will probably wipe out the useful program undertaken by Maui County.

"I have reservations, Mr. President, about the almost irreversible character of this trial of the A+ project, as well as about the tardy involvement of the Legislature in its implementation.

"I am reminded, Mr. President, of what the Red Queen said to Alice -- 'Sentence first; verdict afterward.'

"In a way, Mr. President, I will vote 'aye' on this bill with my fingers crossed. I want A+ to work -- but wish we had a little more time in the laboratory."

Senator B. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, the A+ program is a pilot program which, undoubtedly, will have some problems. It is however a major breakthrough and will afford statewide participation in an after school care program that is of high quality. It is a program that will put Hawaii in the forefront of the nation in providing an educational-enriched supervisory and care program throughout the state. This first time achievement in the nation will be watched by many individuals.

"We have been heartened by support and inquiries from various states in our nation as well as the Children's Television Network which has indicated that they would be willing to support the A+ program by allowing A+ to use some of their copyrighted TV programs for viewing by the children.

"This program is indeed a pilot and we need to work in several areas when we commence with the September 1990 version. These areas include who is eligible to the program; it includes whether parts of this program should be let out by contract or voucher; it includes an additional set of interactions with private providers, some of whom have either changed their location, have merged with A+, have been displaced to other locations, have discontinued their program, or continued their program with fewer numbers of participants. A note of clarification on this point.

"The Maui County program for parks and recreation will continue. It will continue in an abbreviated form and the Department of Education through the district superintendent on Maui has made efforts to offer sites within DOE schools for the Maui County program. There will be some program sites in DOE schools and some programs on county park property.

"I think this program should be looked upon as an initial attempt to deal with a massive problem that is one part social services and one part educational. It is in fact the hybrid nature of this program that makes it difficult for some people to really understand. It seems, from my perspective, that support for this program has in a sense been more uniform amongst the child care and social services sector than the educational sector. This is, of course, ironic because the responsibility of this program has been placed upon the Department of Education and the Department of Education itself accepted the program somewhat reluctantly, especially at the start. It is now a full partner in the program and sees it as an opportunity to shoulder certain educational and extra-curricular activities, too many of which have been forced upon the Department of Education. The department hopes that in the future the A+ program can be looked upon as an adjunct to that school system. In the meanwhile, however, it is being treated as a supplemental program.

"I would urge that if members have any concerns which have not yet been addressed that we would be very willing to work with you in trying to resolve those concerns. For instance, I had attempted to develop a proposal that would extend A+ to include a very small number of students in a pilot project within a pilot project in a selected number of schools so that those currently not eligible could participate in the A+ program. Attempts to develop that idea could not be developed as quickly as our time schedule currently allows.

"I did receive a very thoughtful review of certain concerns from the YMCA. But neither the YMCA nor any other group presented me with any specific proposals for the modification of the A+ program. These discussions with the YMCA and other organizations will continue.

"For the information of members, the A+ program will allow many other programs to continue in spite of the fact that the A+ program has taken away clients from a large number of programs. There were originally only about four private profit-making programs in the state operating on school grounds. All four of these programs will continue in one form or another.

"I hope that we will be able to resolve more of the issues A+ has raised when we consider the September 1990 program, later on during the session. And, as I

said, I welcome your participation and ideas in developing those.

"As to the bill itself, I should note that there are only two small amendments that have been made. One in which the word 'shall' was changed to 'may' with regard to assessing students with a \$5.00 late-pickup fee. This was an inadvertent mistake which the lieutenant governor's office had originally not caught. They had intended that the program site directors be given the flexibility in assessing this \$5.00 late charge. The other amendment was to include the spending ceiling increase language without which this bill would be a defective bill.

"The bill also takes a particular tack in including \$5.6 million appropriated out of general funds. This \$5.6 million includes approximately \$4 million which would be in effect a state subsidy. The rest of the monies come from the fees and the federal lunch contribution or the snack contribution that the state will receive and eventually put into its general fund.

"We took this approach of appropriating monies from the general fund as opposed to accepting other language which have been presented to us by the lieutenant governor's office which would change a proviso section in the current budget to allow use of excess federal impact funds. The reason for that rests with a very important issue which the Legislature has not yet resolved and that is, what is the power of the Legislature versus the administration in spending millions of dollars of monies which have not yet been appropriated through the formal process of Legislature approval. Specifically, if we had allowed the other version to go through to allow the excess federal impact monies to be used to fund A+, the administration would have had as much as \$11 million to spend for A+. It could decide on its own, whether it spent \$5.6 million or \$5.7 million or even more. By capping the amount the administration is able to fund, we have in the short term addressed the issue of how much the Legislature would allow the administration to fund and, secondly, at least, sends a message to the administration that the Legislature feels that it cannot relinquish entirely to the administration the 'power of the purse.'

"Indeed, as you folks may know, even if the Legislature wanted to relinquish the 'power of the purse' to the administration we could not do that under our constitutional form of government with the separation of powers between three branches. So we have at least sidestepped the issue for now but I'd like to caution members that in the future we may again have to address this issue of standing up to protect the Legislature's 'power of the purse' in light of possibilities of end runs by the administration.

"With that note, I urge members to support this bill and ask that you continue with your attempts to seek solutions to some of the problems that have been uncovered by A+. Thank you."

Senator Chang spoke on the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to express my concern about the continued viability of programs offered by private non-profit organizations; specifically, those programs of the Metropolitan YMCA of Honolulu.

"I have discussed this matter with the chairman of the Ways and Means Committee and the chairman of the Education Committee and have been assured that they are monitoring the situation.

"As you know, Mr. President, the Metropolitan YMCA was a pioneering institution in providing after school

child care. Despite the fact that half of their programs will be terminated by the initiation of the state program, the YMCA has continued to support the establishment of the A+ program, believing that it meets a substantial public need. The YMCA has contributed to the development of policies and procedures for the A+ program because of their substantial experience in this area.

"I would like to commend the YMCA for supporting the program, both in spirit and in deed, despite its effect on their programs and I would like to join the YMCA in supporting the passage of this bill. Thank you."

Senator George then rose to ask if the chairman of the Education Committee would yield to a question. The President posed the question to the chairman, and the chairman having answered in the affirmative, Senator George asked:

"Mr. President, I respect and applaud the chairman's concern for legislative prerogative in this and in other areas. I am wondering how this can be worked into some sort of legislative evaluation of the experience of the pilot project, which will go through the current school year. I understand that a permanent version of the A+ project is, I gather, supposed to begin in September. Where is the opportunity for legislative input, based on the experience and the lessons that we will learn from the pilot, if we will move in September of this year into a permanent one? We won't be meeting again until 1991 unless the chairman has some hope or expectation of asking for the convening of a special session to evaluate the pilot."

Senator B. Kobayashi answered as follows:

"Mr. President, we will have at least two months of experience before we pass the final version of the September program. During that time I think we will learn at least a few things. Specifically and most importantly, in the next several weeks we will learn who will enroll in the A+ program. That by itself is a bit of a mystery. Getting some information about the characteristics of the participants in the A+ program will allow us to look upon which gaps might be filled."

"The procedural aspects of the A+ program in terms of how the registration, how the payments schedules and how the aspects of room cleaning, et cetera, will probably also be sufficiently under our belts so that we could have an evaluation of whether those aspects had been taken care of."

"As you know, there are monies in the A+ program to support extra clerical help in school offices, to support extra custodial services for after school cleaning hours. We have, in addition, however, other problems that we would have to deal with with regard to satisfaction of program, satisfaction of quality of staff used in the program, and those we may or may not have an opportunity to fully evaluate in this short period between now and end of this session."

Senator McCartney also spoke in support of the measure and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak enthusiastically in favor of this bill. First of all, I would like to commend Lieutenant Governor Cayetano for being a bold leader, taking a risk and coming out and putting the program on the table. We would be debating the issue today, were it not for his leadership in taking that risk. I would like to thank him for that."

"Also, I would be remiss if I did not thank my colleague, our Majority Floor Leader, for raising an

important constitutional question. I thank you, Senator Blair, for doing that because we may not be voting on this bill today were it not for you."

"I support the A+ program. I think it's a very good, progressive program that addresses a lot of concerns in the community. It is a historic, landmark piece of legislation. The first of its kind in the nation. We can be proud and should recognize that here today -- that we are making history."

"I agree with the chairman of the Education Committee and echo his concerns about the need to refine the pilot program before it becomes a permanent program. I also echo his concerns about opening up the program, addressing the concerns of private providers, because I do think there is a place for true partnership with private providers and the public in this program."

"I would also like to see something done, if we can address it, on the issue of private school students. I think we are going to be working hard this session to do it."

"The point I want to make, Mr. President, is that I want to see A+ work too. I think we all do. The children and the families that this program is designed to service are going to benefit and will really make good use of it. A+ is something we can all be proud of. Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan added her support to the measure and said:

"Mr. President, one of the unique features of the A+ program is the flexibility that is being built into it, according to the superintendent of education, yesterday, in our hearing in Ways and Means. He said that, in effect, parents, teachers, students and legislators will have a chance to review the program in progress and therefore will have that opportunity to promote and really see it progress and evolve into the kind of program that we need to care for the many kids who right now go home to empty, unsheltered places."

"I am told that there are something like 30,000 latchkey children out there who need this program but 19,000 applied and of that about 85% qualified. There is indeed much that needs to be done to improve the program so as to enable all latchkey students to attend the A+ program, but there is no way to do it unless we begin it and I'm sure that we are on the road to success, at least in meeting the needs of those children enrolled in the A+ program."

"I give my full support to the program and I urge everyone to do likewise. Thank you."

Senator McMurdo also supported the measure and said:

"Mr. President, any help that we can give to prevent latchkey children ending up in dangerous situations or especially in preventing any kind of drug abuse, I think, is worth it. I do feel that with all of the legalities of this issue, one thing we must keep our eye on is the fact that we are trying to protect our children and, I think, first and foremost that is what A+ is designed to do. Thank you."

Senator Holt requested a conflict of interest ruling by the Chair because his three sons may eventually participate in the A+ program. The Chair ruled that Senator Holt was not in conflict.

Senator Tungpalan also requested a conflict ruling by the Chair because her son is enrolled in the A+ program.

The Chair ruled that Senator Tungpalan was not in conflict.

Senator Blair, in support of the measure, said:

"Mr. President, I want to thank you, the speaker of the House and the governor for achieving the compromise with respect to the difference of opinion between myself and the lieutenant governor. Thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1901 was adopted and S.B. No. 2330, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO A PILOT AFTER-SCHOOL PROGRAM IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Koki then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, on the surface the 2.0 rule to participate in sports and other extra-curricular activities may have some merit; however, I have had much complaint about the way it is being implemented.

"Extra-curricular activities, particularly athletics, have always been a good program to occupy the physically strong and active students who may otherwise get into mischief because of too much idle time.

"I am happy that some athletes respond positively by studying harder because of this rule. However, I am also concerned about the students who either cannot or may not be sufficiently motivated to attain this standard. They are the very ones who may benefit most from the teamwork, discipline, and self-esteem that results from a good athletic program. I have seen too many youngsters in the boys' home or prison who could have been helped by some intervention program. In my opinion, athletics may be one of the best types of intervention program going -- not only for students who do poorly, but for those who do well academically. Coaches stress a drug and alcohol-free lifestyle, and keeping out of trouble and gangs.

"I have been assured by the Board of Education curriculum chairman that they will work hard to amend the rule so that athletics can be a benefit to all students, including those who may have problems academically.

"I urge the Board of Education to recognize the temptations many of our youngsters face when they are not doing well in school and have a lot of free time. I am sure they realize that these students will not be tempted to study during their free time.

"With the assurance of the Board's curriculum chairman that the value of sports and extra-curricular activities for the academically poor student will be of great concern, I request the chairman of the Education Committee to withdraw S.B. 2243 to allow the Board of Education to rectify the problem internally. Thank you."

Senator B. Kobayashi responded:

"Mr. President, given the remarks of the previous speaker, I would like to announce that Senate Bill 2243, relating to public schools, more specifically to the 2.0

requirement for participation in extra curricular activities, scheduled on our agenda for Monday, January 29th, 3:00 p.m., will be deleted from the agenda. Thank you."

The Chair then re-referred Senate Bill Nos. 2328 and 2329 as follows:

Senator Solomon then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. Vice President, regarding an editorial that appeared in the Honolulu Star-Bulletin on Friday, January 26, 1990, 'UH doesn't need a mammoth arena,' I wish to thank Senator Bertrand Kobayashi and Representative Jim Shon on their input as to the construction of a larger gym facility. I agree with them that we need to expand the state's overcrowded prisons, drug abuse treatment centers, and homes for the disabled and mentally ill.

"However, Mr. Vice President, I would like to remind you that your Committee on Higher Education has been looking at a long list of CIP projects for years, Mr. Vice President. As a matter of fact, your committee has deliberated over this list for approximately four years. Included are projects such as the School of Architecture, a center for Hawaiian Studies, repairs to the Kennedy Theatre, a new agriculture science building, a center for the study of family, a new student services center and an ocean and earth science facility.

"Mr. Vice President, funding was appropriated for planning and designing of these facilities over the past four years and requests are now before the committee for construction dollars. The committee finds these requests very difficult to take into consideration on a supplemental budget year. The projects, Mr. Vice President, add up to approximately \$20 million which your committee is deliberating on presently.

"Be assured, Mr. Vice President, that your committee is taking all of these into consideration as we look at the recent requests made by President Simone. And also, Mr. Vice President, I would like to add that your committee had a budget hearing last week Thursday and

it was mentioned that perhaps we should seek private contributions to create a giant arena that could be used for sports in the State of Hawaii. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. Vice President, I was once advised by an old retired politician: never attack the news media because you will never win. Today, I am not going to heed his advice.

"As we all know, the news media commands enormous power because they communicate with the public on a daily basis. What concerns me about the media is that it has changed. It has changed from the days of Mr. Walter Cronkite who reported the news, to one that now markets the news. However, what I cannot tolerate is when the news media create the news.

"When I saw full page ads in the 'New York Times' against the geothermal development in Hawaii, I wondered where did the Pele Defense Fund get that kind of money.

"Today, I hold an article that appeared on page 1 of the 'New York Times,' dated January 26, 1990, titled 'Energy Project Imperils a Rain Forest.' There is a picture of the drilling rig with a caption that reads, 'Thirst for Energy Could Imperil Hawaiian Forest. Hawaii has begun using drill platforms to tap into the steam beneath the Kilauea Volcano in a plan to create a huge geothermal power plant. Critics say the plan could imperil the last big tropical rain forest in the United States and produce unwanted development and debt.'

"Who are these critics? One is Russell Ruderman, a biologist. Another is James Jacobi, a federal botanist with the Fish and Wildlife Service; Bill Reich, a Democratic party official in the Puna district and Palikapu Dedman, president of a Hawaiian native group. This article is very big. There is a picture of the drilling rig. There is also a picture of Mr. Dedman.

"Since the article appeared in the prestigious 'New York Times,' I expect that the paper verified the credentials of these critics and the accuracy of the content of the article. As an example, the article reads, 'The company has begun drilling and building roads in an area that Native Hawaiians had used for gathering herbs and conducting religious rituals.' Another statement reads, 'The plant was closed last year after numerous accidents led to some evacuations and health problems.'

"If I were interviewed as a biologist or botanist, I would have also said, 'There is one species of plant which is not native to Hawaii that has been recently introduced intentionally into the Puna rain forest and it is having a severe detrimental effect on our rain forest. That species of plant is called cannabis sativa (or marijuana). Marijuana plants are destroying our rain forest and it is ruining our country.'

"Let us now discuss the issue of geothermal development in Hawaii. There is a need for more electrical power generation in the state because of the large number of people coming to Hawaii to live, and a growing economy. We burn about \$800,000 worth of fuel a day just to generate electricity for the state. The question is, should we build more power plants fueled by fossil fuels, or build power plants run by geothermal energy? That is the question.

"The true environmentalist will say if the choice is nuclear, coal, diesel fuel or geothermal, the best source of energy is geothermal, and the worst is nuclear.

Geothermal development is environmentally desirable and economically advantageous. The State of California has a 29-year history of generating electricity from geothermal resources. Today, 56 geothermal power plants are capable of generating about 2,595,000 kilowatts of electricity in the State of California. It is a proven and a tested technology.

"Some of the advantages are: geothermal energy is produced within our states which contributes to our energy security and decreases our dependency on foreign energy sources, while saving petroleum for higher-priority uses. Geothermal power plants emit only minimum amounts of carbon dioxide per unit of energy produced.

"Why are some of the people objecting to the development of the geothermal resources in Hawaii? Some say that it will pollute the atmosphere. These people don't realize that the amount of sulfur dioxide that goes into the atmosphere from naturally occurring vents on the Island of Hawaii is about 2,400,000 pounds a day. A 25-megawatt plant being proposed by Ormat will produce about 5 pounds of sulfur dioxide a day. The reason for the low number is because the geothermal plants being proposed will bring up the steam to power the turbines, and reinject the fluid back into the ground where it came from.

"We had a problem with the demonstrational HGPA geothermal plant in Pohoiki because we did not reinject the fluid back to where it came from. Instead, the fluid was disposed of on the surface of the land. The decision not to reinject the fluid was primarily to cut the cost of the demonstrational geothermal project by about a million dollars.

"Some caring people object to the clearing of about 300 to 500 acres of rain forest land for roads, drilling sites, power plant and electrical transmission lines. Their argument is that any destruction of any rain forest will contribute to global warming. We know there has been an increase in the atmospheric temperature due primarily to the build-up of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere. Since geothermal plants emit little carbon dioxide per unit of energy produced, it is an answer to the problem of carbon dioxide build-up, rather than the problem.

"What we do with the electrical power generated by geothermal energy will also address some of their concerns regarding the destruction of rain forest lands. The Island of Hawaii is blessed with abundant resources, such as 1) average daily rainfall of about 15 billion gallons of water; 2) because the Island of Hawaii has two snowcapped mountains, we have an agricultural environment capable of growing every known agricultural crop in the world. Unfortunately, most of this valuable agricultural land is not productive because it doesn't have water to grow the crops. This is where the geothermal energy comes into play. We can use that energy to move some of the 15 billion gallons of daily rainfall around the island.

"There is only one process known to man that can eliminate carbon dioxide from the atmosphere, and that process is called photosynthesis. For photosynthesis to occur it needs a living plant. The acres of rain forest land that are being cleared must be compared with about 64,000 acres of new cultivated land that the 500-megawatt electricity will bring into production by the transport of water. That is a lot of carbon dioxide being removed from the atmosphere.

"The geothermal developers have spent millions of dollars doing the environmental impact studies and pleading their cases in the court of law because of contested cases and litigation to stop the project.

"Although I have not mentioned conservation as one of the solutions to the energy problem, it is of the highest, and I repeat, highest priority. I have summarized Hawaii's energy alternative in a chart and have placed it on each Senator's desk.

"To put the record straight, Mr. Vice President, the State of Hawaii can be proud of its accomplishments in alternative energy. It is our hope that the State of Hawaii will be on the cover of 'Time' magazine within two years when we put into operation the first demonstrational 500-kilowatt OTEC plant in Kona.

"The bottom line is this. If the environmental groups, such as the Rain Forest Action Network in San Francisco, who are urging tourists to boycott the State of Hawaii and boycotting the purchase of our agricultural products were serious in their endeavors to solve the problems of global warming, don't point the finger at Hawaii or Brazil, Peru or Malaysia. Because the biggest producers of carbon dioxide in the world is the United States. Don't quote me, but we can be blamed for 40 percent of the total world output.

"We must clean up our act first before pointing our fingers at anyone else.

"Now, I don't know how to end my speech but I want to say that if an article such as this were to appear on the desk of the editors of the Honolulu Advertiser or the Honolulu Star-Bulletin, I am sure the editors would do this (Senator Matsuura crushed his papers and dropped them into the trash container.) because this is bias reporting. Thank you very much."

Senator McMurdo also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. Vice President, yesterday I received from my son the object which I hold in my hand. This object is a symbol of almost a half century of repression of people's rights -- of repression of democracy. This is a piece of the Berlin Wall which my son chipped off to bring home as a Christmas present to my husband and myself. I am very, very happy to have it. This is but a symbol of what is happening over there in the restoration of the people's rights.

"This morning when I arrived at the Capitol, I saw another wall out on the front. It's a wall which has been built by the people who believe in democracy; who believe in initiative. It's a wall which is symbolic of the wall which was started by the supreme court last year when it made its decision to prohibit the people in the state from using the right of initiative for land use. The wall has had layer after layer added to it by special interests who would continue to see that the people do not have this right.

"Last year this honorable body passed unanimously a bill for state initiative which had some prohibitions in it but nothing about prohibiting land use. Last year this honorable body also in its wisdom did not bring a bill which would have prohibited land use out of the committee.

"I would ask every single one of you to walk outside today or tomorrow or Wednesday and look at this wall which the people are asking you to help tear down by restoring the right for land use and the initiative process.

"If there are any of you who would like to come and personally look at this (chip from the Berlin Wall) I will be happy to show it to you. Let's tear down this wall

prohibiting the people the use of the right of democracy. Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"This is the first time I'm doing this so ... well ... here goes. Just to inject a little levity in our chambers today.

"I noticed that during the past week one daily paper covered the introduction of Representative Virginia Isbell's bill relating to the need to have a high profile election to choose our state fish as our presently designated 'humuhumunukunuaapuaa' will have its designation terminated the end of this year.

"I saw several articles relating to this bill, on the front page, the editorial page and even in the Sunday paper. I hope the underlying reason for the articles was the \$101,000 appropriation that is being requested to carry out the objectives of her (Senator Isbell's) measure.

"Well, this past year, as you know, the Legislature undertook a state flower contest without requiring any state funds and we did it because all of you Senators together with the House were so generous in donating \$25.00 each and we were able to have a beautiful contest in the auditorium of our state Capitol. There were no cameras there, no dailies to report on the standing room only audience that witnessed the reception of the winners receiving their awards. It was really unfortunate because there were children who came from Kauai, Maui, the Big Island to receive their prizes and I thought it was really quite memorable. But, I noticed the irony ... here we have a huge coverage on the front page, editorial columns and the Sunday paper for something that is being proposed, and, something that actually did happen and something wonderful, you know, presentation of awards to children who took the initiative to enter the contest, went with very little notice. In fact I don't think many people out there, outside of the Legislature and outside of the families involved with the contest, knew about the project and I just wanted to point out the fact that sometimes noteworthy events really get missed in the paper and I hope that people will look for opportunities to highlight the good things that happen, especially among our students.

"Incidentally, two of the winners came from Farrington High School and Senator Nakasato really lucked out because, of the nine prizes, five went to his district. As you know, we've gotten a lot of bad publicity over the years about some of the schools in his district and this is something really positive and I just wanted to make that note this morning to let everyone know that perhaps we can look forward to more press that will bring out the positive sides in our youth. Thank you."

Senator Cobb, also on a point of personal privilege, said:

"Mr. President, today seems to be a day of indulgence in personal privilege and so I'd like to enlarge the agenda as was said by Captain Bligh in the case of the 'Mutiny on the Bounty.' I note with a good deal of satisfaction that Senators can rise on virtually any point which is a privilege not afforded members of the House of Representatives in which was finally noted in the paper.

"In rising today, I would like to take an opportunity to offer some bi-partisan support to the mayor of the City and County of Honolulu without cost, and that is on a subject that has appeared in several newspapers recently on the question of resign to run. Now having had some personal experience with that, having dealt with a former, and I emphasize the word 'former,' attorney general's

opinion that was 90% political and 100% asinine which said that a certain senator had to resign in order to run. Then having had the benefit of reading the Federalist Papers, which stated very clearly that no other bar to public office could be imposed on any office-seeker, not property, not the number of slaves, not a tally of money, not a poll tax, not anything except age, residency and citizenship. So if the mayor needs some help in this, might I suggest that he contact the former attorney general of the State of Hawaii, Michael Lilly. Might I suggest that he indulge in the reading of the Federalist Papers and, if further advice is needed, I'll be happy to provide it free of cost.

"The point being, Mr. President, when a law is passed to be aimed at one individual it engenders only disrespect for that law and, in the case of resign to run, that law was very clearly passed and aimed at only one individual who happened to be the mayor of the City and County of Honolulu at that time, and who is, again, today. Thank you."

Senator Menor added his remarks and said:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege, as well. I hadn't intended to make these remarks but I felt that I had to briefly comment to Senator Cobb's comments and especially concerns about the 'resign to run' provision in our State Constitution.

"Just for the information of this body I introduced a bill that would propose a constitutional amendment to eliminate the 'resign to run' provision and that bill will be given a hearing by the Judiciary Committee in the near future because of the concerns, the pros and cons, that have been raised by Senator Cobb and other individuals. I would appreciate hearing your thoughts on the matter, if you would like to share them with me, prior to the Judiciary Committee's conducting that particular point in the committee hearing. Thank you."

Senator Blair also added to the previous speaker's remarks and said:

"If I may speak on a point of personal privilege with respect to the remarks previously made concerning the constitutional requirement that an officeholder resign before running for a different office.

"I would like to make it clear that I do not feel the constitutional provision was directed against any person. I don't know who introduced it into the constitutional convention or what their motives were, but it was ratified by the voters of the State of Hawaii. I do not think the voters were concerned about any one individual. I think they wanted to have elected officials fulfill their terms and not use them as a stepping stone. We should recognize that the voters ratified the amendment, even as we deliberate on whether or not we should give them a chance to reconsider their decision."

ADJOURNMENT

At 12:14 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Blair, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Tuesday, January 30, 1990.

TENTH DAY

Tuesday, January 30, 1990

The Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, convened at 11:39 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Ms. Patricia Mumford, Executive Director, Hawaii Council of Churches, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Ninth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Menor introduced Mr. Jesus Salud as follows:

"Mr. President, it gives me great pleasure and is indeed an honor and privilege for me to be able to introduce to this distinguished body Jesus Salud. Jesus, last June, earned the distinguished honor in the boxing profession of winning the Super Bantamweight Championship of the North American Boxing Federation. Through his accomplishments, Jesus Salud has been the pride of Hawaii and the toast of Nanakuli from which he came and the entire Waianae Coast. I'd also like to say, as a Filipino legislator, that Jesus Salud also typifies the fighting spirit that characterizes the Filipino community, so the Filipinos are also very proud of him.

"What makes Jesus Salud's accomplishment so impressive is the fact that not only has he earned this highest distinction in boxing by winning this prestigious championship crown, but in addition to that Jesus Salud has been a tremendous role model for our young people by actively volunteering his time to encourage Hawaii's youth gang members and other young people at-risk to remain in school and to become law-abiding citizens.

"For the information of this distinguished body, Jesus Salud has a non-championship fight that's going to be taking place at the Blaisdell Arena this coming Friday and he will be undertaking, I believe, the first defense of his championship title at Caesar's Place in March, which is also going to be nationally televised on NBC television. And I've also been informed by him, Mr. President, that as the Senator who represents the Nanakuli District, I understand that you volunteered to represent the State Senate at that fight at Caesar's Palace in March.

"At this time, before I make the presentation of the congratulatory Senate Certificate, I'd like to introduce to this distinguished body, Jesus Salud our champion."

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORT

Senator Yamasaki, for the Committee on Ways and Means, presented a report (Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1902) recommending that S.B. No. 1, as amended in S.D. 1, pass Second Reading and be placed on the calendar for Third Reading.

Senator Solomon rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of this legislation. Within the last few days, we have been exposed to a harsh and unrelenting public attack by the attorney general on an employee of the Legislature, the legislative auditor, Newton Sue. The attack on Newton Sue was directed not only on his work for this Legislature but on his personal competence and even on his moral fitness.

"Make no mistake about it, an attack on the legislative auditor is an attack on the Legislature. The auditor, by terms of the Constitution and statute, is an employee of the Legislature - a very important employee, Mr. President. Without a competent and fearless auditor of its own, the Legislature becomes dependent on the Executive Branch for decision making information. An attack by the Executive Branch on the auditor, such as we have just witnessed, strikes at the essence of our cherished system of checks and balances.

"If the auditor is to be raked over the newspapers and television coals by the attorney general or by any member of the Executive Branch for the performance of his duties, we suffer for it. I know Newton Sue is an extremely capable official. He is not slipshod in his work. He does

his research. His reports are not compilations of personal opinions nor is he soft on marijuana usage -- all as implied by the attorney general.

"Our job description includes taking the heat, Mr. President. Mr. Sue's does not. We need his forthright reporting. It cannot be compromised by his having to defend himself from public attack by the Executive Branch.

"I commend the editors of both the Star Bulletin and the Advertiser for their quick recognition of the importance of this issue and their unhesitating response to the attorney general's unfortunate action.

"Mr. President, I urge my colleagues to support this legislation."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1902 was adopted and S.B. No. 1, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS TO PROVIDE FOR THE EXPENSES OF THE LEGISLATURE, THE LEGISLATIVE AUDITOR, THE LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU, AND THE OMBUDSMAN," passed Second Reading and was placed on the calendar for Third Reading on Friday, February 2, 1990.

Senator Tungpalan introduced representatives from Our Lady of Good Counsel School in Pearl City and said:

"This morning it is my distinct honor to introduce to this honorable body representatives from Our Lady of Good Counsel School in Pearl City.

"This year marks the school's 25th anniversary of service to the community, and the memorable event will be celebrated on February 7th with a mass by Bishop Ferrario, followed by an open house and entertainment.

"In 1964 Our Lady of Good Counsel School was the first parochial school to open its doors in the Pearl City community. The construction of the school was a community effort, with members of the parish supporting the school monetarily and providing hands-on labor during its construction.

"The school has undergone continuous expansion during the past 25 years since opening with an enrollment limited to first, second, and third graders. It has since expanded into a full elementary through eighth grade program and now includes preschool, kindergarten, and after school programs as well.

"From its opening the school has been staffed by the Sisters of the Third Order of St. Francis, who have always emphasized 'the spirit of love and service' which enriches the school.

"This morning we have with us Sister William Marie Eleniki who is now in her 10th year as principal of the school. Accompanying her are Mr. John O'Donnell, president of the school board, and representing the student body is his daughter, Tyrena O'Donnell, who is an officer on the student council."

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At 11:50 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:55 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

Senator Matsuura then rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, last Tuesday I mentioned about the 'New York Times' article, front page, a very large article. That same article is now appearing in other major papers. One of my friends passing through Arizona picked up a paper and the same article, same picture and almost identical content, have appeared in the Arizona paper. I don't know how many major newspapers have printed this same article.

"My concern on these kinds of things is that you would think that any major paper, like the 'Arizona Republic' or 'New York Times,' would at least call the Honolulu Advertiser or the Honolulu Star-Bulletin to verify some of the things they're printing. But, evidently, they don't do this kind of verification. They didn't check the background of these critics. Now it's getting worse because the 'Arizona Republic' has changed the headline. The 'Arizona Republic' headline is 'Last Stand for Last Rain Forest.' These guys are in cowboy country so it's like Custer's last stand.

"This is one of the things that I have real concern about. Since they are not calling in to verify their critics, we ought to put something in our newspapers so that we can send them a message through the UPI wire service to let them know, 'Look, don't go too heavy on this one because when you guys check the credibility of some of these critics, it may cause some embarrassment.'

"Talking about the rain forest, as far as I know, there's only one non-native species introduced in this rain forest. And that is the marijuana plant. It has been introduced in great abundance. If any person or any country wants to destroy the United States, you can't attack the United States with an atomic bomb because they're going to get a retaliation they'll never forget. There are ways to destroy this country, and one of them is drugs. Anybody who is masterminding the downfall of the United States can use drugs as one of the options. Because when you introduce drugs, what it does is that it puts these people in a situation where they end up committing some kind of crime, which means that if they are caught they have to be put into prison; and our prisons are all full.

"That is not all. The other problem is that they know that this country can be ruined by high medical costs. AIDS is one disease you can proliferate with drugs. And believe you me, this country is very vulnerable of going bankrupt with high medical costs.

"I cite this scenario primarily to give the news media a little more background as to a major problem of our rain forest. There's a whole bunch of marijuana growing in this rain forest. And I can tell you it's not the geothermal guys who have planted the marijuana in there.

"There was an article in the Star-Bulletin about a geothermal air quality standard trial going on right now in Hilo. When you read that article, although he quotes the expert witness from Lake County, you would think, 'Man, Hawaii is so irresponsible.' When California started its geothermal energy, did they have an air quality standard? Answer is 'no.' When did they establish their first air quality standard? At the 500-megawatt level. Is that standard you have today the same as what you had at 500 megawatts? No, it's more stringent now because

we're producing over 1800 megawatts of electricity in this one area. Today, Hawaii has zero megawatt production. Our air quality standard is being set at the present air quality standard of California at the 1800-megawatt level, which is very stringent.

"All I'm asking is that when you folks write news articles, be fair. At least, tell the other side of the story because it will provide some balance.

"In conclusion, geothermal is still the best way to go.

"Thank you very much, Mr. President."

Senator McCartney also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, last night I had an extensive discussion with one of my constituents about a measure that was introduced by Majority Leader Senator Hagino, the diaper bill.

"My son Bricen wants to commend the Senator for introducing the bill to protect our environment and wrote a little thank you note to him. He has also given one of his 'Luv's' diapers to Senator Hagino to show his support of the bill. Thank you very much, Mr. Majority Leader."

Senator Levin also rose on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, very briefly, in conjunction with Senator Matsuura's comments, I do not rise to defend in any way the 'New York Times' article that Senator Matsuura was referring to; I understand his concerns and objections to that article. But I do want to make sure that the record is clear that the objections that are being raised to geothermal by many residents from my district are to a great extent legitimate and warranted.

"I know that Senator Matsuura did not intend to suggest, and I just want to make clear, that not all those who are protesting are protesting for a reason of drug use. The people in the district are affected by fumes, are affected by noise, are affected by health concerns. Their concerns have been largely ignored and they have become extremely frustrated over the course of geothermal development over the past decade, and it has led us to the point that we are now, where lawsuits are being filed and people are trespassing and arrests are being made, and so on.

"Those legitimate concerns need to be dealt with, need to be looked at. And I hope and I believe that the state, both the administration and this Legislature, are finally recognizing that there are legitimate concerns out there, reflected in the closing of the HGPA well and, hopefully, followed by stringent rules adopted by the Department of Health.

"So I think that Senator Matsuura and I are coming from the same place. I think we are largely in agreement and I just wanted to make clear that there are a lot of legitimate, responsible citizens out there who do have responsible and legitimate concerns about geothermal. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura then remarked:

"Mr. President, to respond to the previous speaker.

"If my message had any accusations saying that the people who are objecting to the geothermal development as people growing the marijuana, that was furthest from the truth. My point was simply, there is a lot of marijuana grown in the rain forest. We should get those

people who are cultivating marijuana in the rain forest and send them back to where they came from."

MISCELLANEOUS COMMUNICATION

Misc. Com. No. 7, letter dated February 2, 1990 from the Chairperson of the Senate Committee on Agriculture, transmitting copies of the "Study of the Animal Quarantine System," prepared by the Interim Task Force of the Senate and House of Representatives was read by the Clerk and was placed on file.

At this time, Senator Matsuura rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak on a point of personal privilege. I don't want to establish any record here on speaking on personal privileges, but today I would like to speak on news articles that came out on Friday and today.

"The Friday article is titled 'Legislators Keep Sealing Holes for Eel's Entry,' and today's title ... 'Slippery Debate. The persistent eel bill has gone down the tube once again.' I feel sorry for the *Anguilla*, primarily because the picture of what people perceive about the *Anguilla* is totally different from what it really is. Today, I want to share some facts with you so that there will be no mistake as to what to say to people if they ask you about the *Anguilla*.

"Fact No. 1. *Anguilla* is a true fish. It is not, and I repeat it is not, an eel. It looks like an eel, but it is a fish with scales, gills, fins, et cetera. 2. *Anguilla* does not have teeth like the moray eel. The *Anguilla* teeth is more like the teeth of the manini. 3. *Anguilla* does not breed in the fresh water stream. It is the exact opposite of salmon. It breeds in the ocean and migrates to the fresh water streams to grow. 4. There are three species of *Anguilla* -- *Anguilla rostrata* which is common in the Eastern U.S. states; *Anguilla anguilla* is the European species; and *Anguilla japonica* is the Asiatic species. 5. The Europeans eat as much, if not more, *Anguilla* than the Asiatics. While we eat the traditional turkey at Thanksgiving dinner, the Germans eat *Anguilla* for their traditional Christmas dinner.

"Fact No. 6. Many studies have been conducted as to what the *Anguilla* feeds on. The conclusion, after studying the contents of the *Anguilla* innards, is that it eats the same things as the trout. 7. There is a huge market for *Anguilla*. Fresh *Anguilla* is expensive. It can cost as much as \$16 a pound. Whichever way it is prepared, European style, Chinese style, Japanese, et cetera, it always 'broke da mouth.'

"No. 8, it took a Norwegian scientist 30 years to figure out where the European and North American *Anguilla* species breed. The conclusion is that they breed in the Sargasso Sea in the Bermuda Triangle. And what this scientist did was to look for the most primitive form of the *Anguilla*, which is the *Leptocephalus*. He found the most immature larvae at the Sargasso Sea.

"No. 9, no one has yet been able to figure out how the microscopic larvae, carried by the ocean current, return to their respective countries. In other words, only the European and North American species go to the Sargasso Sea to breed the immature microscopic larvae then get carried back to their respective countries through the ocean current. Nobody has been able to figure that out. Look at the salmon, they return to the same stream in which they were started from egg, so it's not really a miracle but it does happen.

"To my knowledge, no one knows where the *Anguilla japonica* breeds. They say that they'll run away into our streams and they'll multiply in our streams. Now, if for some reason a major, major, miracle happens and these *Anguilla* can breed in our streams, I can guarantee you that we can remove most of our state taxes because we will make a bunch of money, but don't count on that, it will never breed in our streams.

"Now, since the days of Aristotle (and I have documented proof of this) the *Anguilla* has been subjected to all kinds of treatment to induce breeding. It has been shot with all kinds of reproductive hormones. However, nothing has worked.

"Prior to 1974, live *Anguilla* was allowed to be brought into the state, principally for the restaurant business. No one seems to know, and I've asked a lot of people, why the ban was placed on the *Anguilla*. The only answer I got was that 'it looks like an eel,' which it is not. There is absolutely no documented evidence that there was a problem.

"Salmon is now grown commercially in Hawaii in Kona. It is profitable. But if you look at the salmon morphologically, it looks more vicious than the *Anguilla*.

"What Senator Yamasaki, the senior author of the bill, and I want to do is to allow the importation of *Anguilla rostrata* and *Anguilla japonica* for experimental and other scientific purposes, on such terms as the Board of Agriculture may deem necessary to protect the native biota.

"I'm saying all of these things because they attack the poor fish to the point where they think the poor fish is a real bad fish coming up of toilets, et cetera. That's nonsense! When the Samoan crab was to be imported to Hawaii a long time ago, the cartoon caption showed the Samoan crab coming out of the stream, going into the house, grabbing the baby from the crib and dragging the baby into the stream. That was the cartoon at that time because they didn't want to bring Samoan crabs into Hawaii.

"The *Anguilla* has not reached to that point yet, but it's getting there so I just want the news media to know that the *Anguilla* is a fish. Please put that on the front page with the title, '*Anguilla* Is a Fish -- Not an Eel.'

"Thank you very much."

Senator McMurdo in response to the previous speaker's remarks said:

"The good Senator from the Big Island has told us that it looks like an eel and it has teeth like a manini; that it breeds somewhat like the salmon and it breeds in one area and then swims to the other. But one thing he hasn't told us is what it sounds like. I just wanted to ask the good Senator if it quacks like a duck." (Laughter.)

Senator Matsuura answered:

"I don't know of the fish making any sounds; *Anguilla* doesn't quack like a duck. But I can tell you one thing -- it tastes better than a duck."

Senator George added:

"I am wondering if we have just heard the nomination speech for the next state fish." (Laughter.)

Senator McCartney then said:

"Maybe the good Senator from the Big Island would consider breeding the eel in the geothermal wells. That may be a good place." (Laughter.)

Senator Matsuura responded:

"I want to be very honest with all of you. I want to put into the bill that you can grow *Anguilla* only in the Hilo district, but I don't know how to write that in."

Senator Crozier then said:

"Mr. President, just to come to the defense of Senator Matsuura, not the eel, to his defense. That bill came before the Legislature in 1983 and I was a freshman legislator at the time. Up until then I wasn't sure on how I could use my skills effectively but, when that bill came about, I learned quickly on how I could stop bills. Several of my colleagues and I got together and we learned under fire how we could become better legislators. Maybe other people take quite a while to learn that, but Senator Matsuura's 'unagi' bill has been the vehicle for many legislators to enhance their policy-making skills.

So, even though the bill did not pass, it did help the whole legislative process and we appreciate that."

Senator Solomon rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I would like to speak in support of H.B. 2138, H.D. 1, and comment upon the significance of this positive action.

"The faculty settlement is fair and equitable. It is true that negotiated salary increases for faculty are more than the increases approved for other public employees. I must mention that these increases, although deserved, are also due to the fact that the state's first offer in 1972 was rejected by the union.

"However, the state's funding of the faculty contract is justified by numerous standards of measurement: first, over the past two decades the faculty in Hawaii have received proportionately less than other public employees; second, the state's ability to attract and retain quality faculty is seriously threatened; third, salary inequities exist, most noticeably for two groups, the senior full professors and those at the low end of the salary scale.

"This contract sets a new tone, Mr. President. UHPA and the Board of Regents have persuaded us that the university will now be able to compete for talented individuals and will provide competitive salaries and benefits to bring them here and keep them here.

"This contract settlement indicates the state's and university's recognition of issues important to all faculty. Now we want the faculty, Mr. President, to convince us that the new contract is justified. Mr. President, your chairman on Higher Education is interpreting the new contract agreement to mean accountability on the part of the faculty and administration that there is a commitment of excellence to undergraduate education; a balance among the community colleges, the four-year schools, graduate and research programs; and in governance.

"Excellence is a key to a better future for Hawaii's people and this is what we in the Legislature are interested in supporting.

"The new contract will help improve the quality level of the faculty. Furthermore, approval of the new contract will provide a better environment, decreasing faculty turnover and increasing labor stability.

"To the faculty and the university, may I say that we have done our part -- let's see you do your part by improving the quality of teaching to our students. Let us look forward and seek excellence in teaching. Thank you."

Senator McCartney also supported the bill and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of House Bill 2138 and make a few short remarks, being a former negotiator of the teachers union.

"I really feel that this contract is an investment in Hawaii's future. It will help to improve the quality of our educational system and will do much to attract and retain the best and the brightest professors in our system. I commend both parties on reaching a settlement and I congratulate all of them and urge members to support this measure today. Thank you."

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege to speak in reference to an article that appeared in today's paper, 'B1-B makes first visit here. One of the four B1-B bombers from the 96th Bombardment Wing arrived at Hickam Air Force Base yesterday, the first of the supersonic \$280 million aircraft to visit Hawaii. These B1-Bs based at Dyess Air Force Base, Texas, will be flying missions over the Pacific and making bombing raids on Kahoolawe until Feb. 15.'

"Mr. President, I introduced a bill for consideration last session and have, again, this session on the possibility of setting up some kind of negotiation fund, either in the Department of Land and Natural Resources or whatever agency it should be with, in order that negotiations between the department and the U.S. Navy could be initiated seeking the return of Kahoolawe to the State of Hawaii.

"I just would like to remind this body, Mr. President, that Kahoolawe has, in recorded history, been regarded as one of the state's eight major islands. Legend and tradition speak of its creation. Legend says that the island was created by 'Wakea,' the progenitor of chiefs and priests and the ancestors of all Hawaiians, and 'Papa,' his wife, who was considered symbolic of the female principal. A legendary chant relates the birth of Kahoolawe. Kahoolawe, whose ancient name was 'Kohe Malamalama o Kanaloa,' was said to have been the legendary home of 'Kaumuali'i,' the shark god and the brother of fire goddess Pele.

"In later years Kamehameha the Great stated that he would be willing to make peace with neighboring chief 'Kahikili' if the latter will cede to him Kahoolawe and three other islands. At that time the island was apparently desirable enough to be mentioned in peace treaty negotiations.

"In oral history recordings with kupunas, 'Ke ala i Kahiki,' a point on Kahoolawe, was mentioned often in our Hawaiian history. After the Hawaiians had settled on the island a group of renegade or venturesome Hawaiians left Hawaii using Ke ala i Kahiki Point for navigational

purposes to sail to New Zealand where they settled into the culture of the Maoris.

"It seems, Mr. President, that Kahoolawe played a major role in the early history of Hawaii. It was neither a forgotten island, nor was it held in disrepute. Like the other islands, Kahoolawe retained its own special attributes for which it was known throughout the island chain. Archeological surveys were conducted in 1913 by M. Stokes and again in 1931 by Gilbert McAllister. These early studies revealed evidence of heiaus (places of worship), ko'a (fishing shrines), house foundations, camping sites, burial sites, and various other artifacts.

"The latest archeological investigations have been more thorough and quite fruitful.

"Mr. President, the Navy in a cooperative effort has eliminated four targets in the historical areas because of the archeological findings. Furthermore, Admiral Hayward has pledged his cooperation in removing any targets that may be a threat to historical sites or artifact-rich areas.

"Today, Mr. President, approximately 35 percent of the island has been surveyed and about a hundred archeological sites have been recorded. Of these an estimated 96 sites are likely to be eligible for the National Register of Historic Places based on the following national criteria, and I would submit these criteria, Mr. President, to the Journal for the record.

"Mr. President, I wish to present a brief chronology of efforts to return Kahoolawe to the state.

"In 1971, Senator Mamoru Yamasaki introduced legislation regarding Kahoolawe. In 1971, Mayor Cravalho and Life of the Land filed suit to stop the bombing of Kahoolawe and requested an environmental impact statement for the island, which incidentally, Mr. President, I do have a copy of. It is quite involved.

"In February 1975, Representative Patsy Mink introduced legislation requesting the return of Kahoolawe. In December 1975, President Ford signed a bill, pushed by Senator Inouye, directing the Department of Defense to study the possibility of returning Kahoolawe to the state and the feasibility of removing unexploded ordnance.

"In June 1974, a resolution introduced by Senator Hiram Fong, requesting the Navy to immediately look for alternatives to the bombing of Kahoolawe, was passed.

"In 1976, Charles Maxwell led an occupation of Kahoolawe, which included Walter Ritte, Emmet Aluli and Gail Prejean. The invaders were dubbed 'The Kahoolawe Nine.'

"At the same time, Governor Ariyoshi predicted 'it's only a matter of time before the military stops using Kahoolawe as a bombing target and turn it over to the state.'

"February 18, 1976, state Senators Takitani and Yamasaki again introduced resolutions requesting the President to rescind the executive order giving the Navy authority over Kahoolawe. Only one Senator voted against that, Mr. President, and that was Senator Andy Anderson.

"January 30, 1977, Ritte, Helm, Sawyer, Kauhane and Warrington landed on Kahoolawe, stating the purpose of landing was to stop the bombing and desecration.

"February 3, 1977, forty-six searchers including Marine and Navy ordnance specialists searched Kahoolawe for

what they called the Hawaiian Invaders. Three days later it was declared that the island was most likely free of people and bombing resumed. February 11, 1977, Judge King denied two requests -- one by the Ohana and one by Maui County -- for temporary restraining orders to halt the bombing of Kahoolawe. The Council of Hawaiian Organizations appealed to President Carter to rescind Executive Order 10436 and stop the bombing.

"Mr. President, of the more significant archeological findings are those indicating that the island did, in fact, support a permanent population.

"Senator Inouye has stood as the key congressional representative in seeking the solution to the Kahoolawe issue with support from Congressman Akaka and then Congressman Hefel and Senator Matsunaga. Mayor Cravalho has also steadily maintained interest in this area. Both fought at different levels to make sure headway toward a solution to the problem, Mr. President, would be continued.

"The Navy produced a report, revised in 1977, entitled 'A Report on the Island of Kahoolawe' which detailed their views on the issue. The stated purpose for keeping the land is simple -- protection of the United States and the preparedness to provide that protection. Targets used on Kahoolawe have been designed to give troops an experience as close to combat as possible.

"What kinds of ordnance, Mr. President, are used on that island? Live (service) ordnance and inert (practice) ordnance, bombs as large as 500 pounds (Mark 82) are used. I would like to insert this into the Journal, Mr. President, for the record.

"It has been stated that when reviewing the military presence in the Pacific, it appears that Hawaii, Mr. President, is not the center of the universe around which the protection of the United States revolves. Like Korea, it may be more a political benefit and a comfortable way station than a military necessity. I didn't make these words up, Mr. President. This is documented.

"In August 18, 1976, there was a crisis in North Korea. Pacific support groups were mobilized rapidly but Hawaii was not pivotal during this crisis situation in Korea.

"Mr. President, there has been a growing opposition to the use of Kahoolawe as a military target, according to a survey by the Advertiser. In 1978 it was almost a dead heat as 46% said stop bombing and 45% favored continued military use. In 1980 it was 47% and 41% and in 1988, 52% and 37%.

"Myths, cloud pro-military thinking on Kahoolawe.' This is a viewpoint, Mr. President, that appeared in the Star-Bulletin, 9/8/88. 'Myth -- the bombing and shelling pose no menace to the growing communities on Maui.' Fact is, Mr. President, residents in many areas of Maui frequently complain that the bombing sounds like thunder and certain explosions make the ground shake. Bombs have been found in the waters off Molokini Island and once in the pasture on the slopes of Haleakala.'

"Myth -- there is no military alternative to Kahoolawe.' Alternative training facilities can be made available.

"Another news item, 'Mayor Tavares Presses Navy to Leave Kahoolawe' appeared in the Maui News, Mr. President, in '87.

"Mayor Tavares stated, 'Regardless of the amount of money the Navy puts into the Hawaiian economy, I do believe it is wrong for you to imply that the Navy's

homeporting in Hawaii depends primarily on its having Kahoolawe to bomb.' The island is not a worthless piece of junk; good only for use as a target. And this is what we want Navy officials to recognize and accept as incontrovertible.

"And finally, Mr. President, there have been bills introduced pertaining to Kahoolawe. Senate Bill 304, making appropriations for water resources study for the Island of Kahoolawe, was introduced by Senator Yamasaki. As a result, Mr. President, we were able to discover water resources on that island.

"Another is the aforementioned bill relating to Kahoolawe, a measure introduced by me previously which would establish a negotiation fund within the Department of Land and Natural Resources. That bill is before the body this session again for consideration.

"Senator Mizuguchi introduced a bill making an appropriation for a grants-in-aid to the U.S. Department of Navy for floating structures as an alternative to the use of the Island of Kahoolawe and providing for related actions.

"Mr. President, there is a history here in the Hawaiian Legislature in support of freeing Kahoolawe from military use and I want to thank the supporters. As you know, Mr. President, under reapportionment, I represent Kahoolawe. This is why I am standing here on a point of personal privilege. Perhaps, with the cooperation of our chairman of the Energy and Natural Resources Committee we could give this piece of legislation some consideration and maybe we can work out some kind of reasonable way to insure that these negotiations will be continued. And perhaps, Mr. President, maybe in your lifetime or mine the 'aina' will be returned to the State of Hawaii in honor and in respect to the motto of this great land, 'Ua mau ke ea o ka aina i k pono.' In ending, Mr. President, I close with the remark 'ehuahu kai lele ka moi na wai no 'oe a'e pakele aku?' The sea is raging, the moi leap -- who will save you?

"Thank you very much."

Senator Cobb added:

"Mr. President, I had not planned to speak but the previous remarks have prompted some addition to the remarks from the Senator from the Third District. It seems ironic that with over 50 bases being closed worldwide, that a simple bombing range or target range cannot be given back to its rightful owners. I'm referring, of course, to the President's defense budget where massive closing of bases is taking place not only throughout the continental United States but worldwide. I'm referring to the diminished Soviet threat and the outbreak of peace throughout Europe.

"And least of all, before anyone construe the remarks of the Senator from the Third District to be anti-military, I would like to rise on a point of personal privilege in a positive vein and thank Senator Solomon publicly for her work in changing the military's thinking, the bureaucrats' thinking in Washington as to whose names can go on the Vietnam Veterans Wall in Washington, D.C. Largely because of her efforts, the regulation and the criteria was changed to allow the names of veterans who were wounded in Vietnam but who died outside of Vietnam as a result of their wounds to have their names placed on that wall.

"I want to make this public because it means a great deal to me, as it does, I'm sure, to Senator Solomon. I wanted to take this opportunity to publicly thank and commend her for her efforts and to urge her to continue

her efforts because if the voice of one or two Senators from Hawaii can be heard on such an issue nationally, certainly then, the same persistence may result in the change in status of Kahoolawe. I earnestly hope it does and I do not consider any of her remarks to have been anti-military in the slightest, but rather taken in a very positive vein that if we're going to be having base closings worldwide, why not have an island closing and the return of that island to those to whom it legitimately belongs. Thank you."

ADJOURNMENT

At 12:15 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Blair, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Thursday, February 8, 1990.

RE-REFERRAL OF A SENATE BILL

Senator Solomon rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, there appeared an article in the 'Hawaii Tribune Herald' that says, 'Solomon Calls for Temporary Halt to Hawaii Growth,' and it is referring to a bill that was heard in the Tourism Committee, Senate Bill No. 3008. Mr. President, the article says, 'The measure would appear to not only block new approvals for resorts and other projects along the coast, but put on hold developments that have already received the

necessary land use approvals and permits.' It continues to read, Mr. President, 'A moratorium will do nothing except delay the overall planning and development process and give our island a negative image with the worldwide business community.' Mr. President, this is not what I envisioned.

"The Office of State Planning has put together a West Hawaii regional plan, and it reads, 'The West Hawaii region encompasses 986 square miles or 631,040 acres, about the size of Molokai and Oahu combined. The region consists of land formed by the Kohala Mountains, Mauna Kea, Mauna Loa and Hualalai.' (Which, incidentally, Mr. President, comprises part of my Third Senatorial District.) 'Of the 313 miles of tidal shoreline, the coastline of this youthful island is generally characterized by a low-to-high cliff volcanic coast; only 1.2 miles of prime sandy beach in this Hawaii region.'

"Mr. President, this is the reason why this plan was requested and the reason why this moratorium is necessary. Mr. President, ... this map has been color-coded for my colleagues' benefit. As you can see, all of the orange color-coded areas are lands belonging to the state. WE, the people of this state, are the largest landowners in West Hawaii, not private landowners, Mr. President, but we the people, we are the major landowners of the West Hawaii coastline, including a substantial part of North Kohala.

"Due to these facts, I feel, this bill is very timely. This Legislature has the onus of deciding the fate of our West Hawaii coastline and assure that the impact of development is balanced with what the West Hawaii regional plan has identified as a preferred quality of life. This preferred quality of life, Mr. President, is critical in helping us make the proper planning decisions that affect this coastal region (Senator Solomon holds up documents). Our fiduciary duty, Mr. President, is to make prudent, proper decisions and recommendations.

"In this vision for West Hawaii, a preferred quality of life is identified as including provisions for adequate affordable housing, human services programs, timely and needed public infrastructures, full employment and a need to provide a wide range of jobs that provides job choice and upward mobility, and most importantly, Mr. President, consideration of lifestyle of community values. The qualities that make this region unique need to be maintained and preserved, for these are the aspects that make West Hawaii the quality visitor destination.

"The Housing Finance and Development Corporation estimates that approximately 75 percent of all households or approximately 24,270 households could qualify, now, on that coastline for some form of governmental housing assistance. Using the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development median family income estimated at \$28,800 for 1988 for the purchase of an average priced single family housing unit, it would require an income nearly 150 percent more than the median income in West Hawaii to purchase an average priced single family housing unit. I think, Mr. President, due to these facts, the furtherance of development demands immediate review. We are in a crisis situation.

"For the first half of 1989, the average selling price for a house in Kona was \$175,000, 111 percent higher than the average selling price in Hilo of \$83,000.

"Mr. President, the needed investment in public infrastructure for that area to meet current needs is conservatively estimated to be \$622 million. By comparison, the amount expended in the region between '83 and '87 has been \$24 million or an average of less than \$5 million a year. In other words, Mr. President,

with the existence of statewide infrastructure priorities it is doubtful that West Hawaii as one region of the state would be able to receive the infrastructure monies it requires.

"Even if we were to double the expenditure to \$10 million per year, it would take us 60 years or more to complete the requirement. All the business groups on the Big Island should be elated that this honorable body has the vision to request such a study.

"Mr. President, I want to note that Senator Matsuura, Senator Levin, and the Big Island House delegation have agreed in concept with the intent of this legislation. We have agreed that action is needed immediately to help us resolve our many problems.

"I'm hoping, Mr. President, that this bill in the Senate Committee on Tourism, Recreation and Planning will be given just consideration. I am open-minded, Mr. President, to anything that would help satisfy concerns as expressed in this article. Perhaps then, a new viewpoint will emerge that the proposed moratorium is indeed needed and not potentially damaging.

"In conclusion, this moratorium is only for one year, to give time for OSP (Office of State Planning) to come to the Legislature with their five-year plan and recommendations for legislative and county consideration.

"Thank you very much, Mr. President."

Senator Levin then remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"Mr. President, I simply would like to express my support for my colleague from West Hawaii. There are very few people who care as passionately for their constituents or their district as does she. And I think that the criticisms levelled against her are clearly misplaced and out of line.

"Thank you."

ADJOURNMENT

At 11:52 o'clock a.m., on motion by Senator Blair, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Friday, February 9, 1990.

"Mr. Kinsella is currently in Hawaii to share his talents, expertise and knowledge with the community and to honor us with a public reading of some of his works this evening at 7:30 p.m. at the University of Hawaii, Art Auditorium.

"Mr. Kinsella's novels and short stories are renowned throughout the literary world of fiction for their creativity and vision and are enjoyed by audiences of all ages.

"I've been told, Mr. President, by the movie critic of the Senate, the Senator on my left from the Big Island, that 'Field of Dreams,' in his estimation, was one of the

best movies that he had seen in 1989. And as a word to Mr. Kinsella, if you run out of Shoeless Joes and you have no characters to write about, the Senator on my right, the Senator from Ewa where we would like to place Hawaii's field of dreams, would like to be interviewed for a new novel and he'd like the novel to be called 'Barefoot Mike.'

"But without further ado, Mr. President, I'd like to introduce W.P. Kinsella. Accompanying Mr. Kinsella is his lovely wife Ann."

The honoree, together with his wife Ann, rose to be recognized. The Senate certificate of recognition was presented by Senator Mizuguchi and leis were presented by Senators McMurdo and Crozier.

ADVISE AND CONSENT

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1907 (Gov. Msg. No. 64):

Senator Menor moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 1907 be received and placed on file, seconded by Senator Levin and carried.

Senator Menor then moved that the Senate advise and consent to the nomination of Ronald T.Y. Moon as Associate Justice of the State Supreme Court, for a term of ten years, in accordance with the provisions of Article VI, Section 3, of the Hawaii State Constitution, and in accordance with Gov. Msg. No. 64, seconded by Senator Levin.

Senator Menor rose to speak in support of the nominee as follows:

"Mr. President, I speak in favor of Governor's Message No. 64.

"Mr. President and distinguished members of the Senate, it gives me great pleasure to report to this body that your Committee on Judiciary strongly recommends that the Senate consent to the appointment of Ronald T.Y. Moon to a ten-year term as Associate Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court.

"Your committee has examined Judge Moon's credentials, and finds him eminently qualified to serve on the state's highest court.

"As you know, this Senate has previously considered the qualifications of Judge Moon. In 1982, he was appointed to sit as a judge in the First Circuit Court, after being confirmed by this body. In the eight years that he has served in this capacity, he has established a reputation not only as one of the most respected civil trial judges but as an extremely successful settlement judge in the First Circuit. His ability to settle cases has had, without a doubt, a significant impact on reducing the trial caseload faced by the First Circuit Court. In fact, one of the testifiers at our confirmation hearing indicated that Judge Moon has become a legend in the First Circuit in terms of his ability to bring people together to get them to settle cases.

"During his tenure, Judge Moon has served not only as a trial judge but as arbitration judge for the court annexed arbitration program. Judge Moon was instrumental in developing this program which has been tremendously successful in resolving a large percentage of cases before monies are expended on expensive litigation and the court is further clogged.

"In addition, the voluminous testimony which your committee received in support of Judge Moon's confirmation attests to the high regard in which he is held by the legal community and the community-at-large. In fact, the only negative comments heard at his confirmation hearing consisted of trial attorneys bemoaning the fact that they would be losing him at the trial level. Remarkably, these attorneys represented the interests of both plaintiffs and the defense bar, as well as Judge Moon's adversaries, when he was a practicing attorney. In short, Judge Moon's abilities as a jurist are universally respected.

"Finally, in closing, your committee does want to recommend the confirmation of Judge Moon on principle. (Earlier, we were discussing the topic of baseball as a sport, I want to briefly share with you a story about Judge Moon's previous experience in baseball.) Your committee received testimony from one of his esteemed colleagues who met Judge Moon some fifteen years ago when both were fledgling young attorneys, and both individuals played on the same Wahiawa softball team. Judge Moon played in the outfield. According to the person who testified, Judge Moon was reportedly a very poor outfielder, and the problem that he had was that he had bad habits. It seems that he played with a can of beer in one hand and a cigarette in the other, which kind of impeded his ability to catch the ball. But I think Judge Moon has definitely come a long way. The man is obviously reformed, and I think we should definitely reward him for his efforts by unanimously confirming him to be the new member of our Hawaii State Supreme Court.

"On that note, I strongly recommend that this body approve Governor's Message No. 64 and confirm Judge Moon to the Hawaii Supreme Court. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura also supported the nomination and remarked:

"Mr. President, I am not a critic of lawyers, but I categorize lawyers into three categories. One, those that fall in the category of 'not so good,' second is 'fairly good,' and the third category is 'fantastically good.'

"I've never met Judge Moon, but I have listened and I have heard what he has done for the judicial system. I

love this kind of a person because I am one that greatly support arbitration and mediation and I hear that he is a real champion in this field. I can understand why Senator Menor made such comments about having people to settle. The First Circuit Court is going to lose a good man but I'm glad that he is going to be an asset to the State Supreme Court."

At this time, Senator Menor introduced to the members of the Senate Justice Ronald T.Y. Moon and his wife Stella who were seated in the gallery.

THIRD READING

S.B. No. 3017:

By unanimous consent, action on S.B. No. 3017, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF THE ATTORNEY GENERAL," was deferred until Wednesday, February 14, 1990.

At this time, Senator B. Kobayashi welcomed and introduced Dr. Lynne V. Cheney to the members of the Senate as follows:

"Mr. President, today, we have with us on the floor of the Senate a distinguished representative of our federal government. Dr. Lynne Cheney is chairman of the National Endowment for the Humanities. Dr. Cheney has been chairman since 1968 and directs an independent federal program with a budget of approximately \$157 million to support research, education and public programs in the humanities. Before her confirmation to this post, she taught at various colleges and universities, was a magazine editor, and a widely published author. In addition to her numerous articles she is a co-author with her husband Richard Cheney, the Secretary of Defense, of a history of the U.S. House of Representatives. Her background includes degrees from Colorado College, University of Colorado and a Ph.D. from the University of Wisconsin.

"It is with pleasure that I introduce the chairman of the National Endowment for the Humanities, Dr. Lynne Cheney. Accompanying her is the deputy director of the National Endowment for the Humanities, Dr. Celeste Colgan; the chairman of the Hawaii Committee for the Humanities, George Tanabe; and the executive director of the Hawaii Committee for the Humanities, Annette Lew."

Dr. Cheney rose to be recognized and was presented the Senate certificate of commendation by Senator B. Kobayashi. Senator Crozier presented her with a lei. Dr. Colgan, Mr. Tanabe and Mrs. Lew also rose to be recognized.

The Chair, at this time, invited Dr. Cheney to the rostrum to address the members of the Senate and guests.

Dr. Lynne Cheney addressed the Senate and guests as follows:

"You're very kind. All of you are very kind, given the press of your business, which I know is heavy, to take a few minutes for the humanities, but it is an important few minutes to take. I was joking with Annette Lew and George Tanabe that I spend a lot of my time as chairman of the National Endowment for the Humanities explaining to people what they are. This is somewhat mysterious, sometimes, to people. I know it's mysterious, I got a card not long ago addressed to me at the national endowment for the amenities, and that does reflect some popular confusion. Of course, it also has some truth in it. There's a good deal of pleasure in what we do, pleasure in the study of history and literature and philosophy and foreign languages, opening up other cultures through the study of language.

"You are involved in Hawaii in what I know and what you know to be a crucial effort and that is reforming our schools. And I know that your efforts have been focusing on restructuring education, as well they should, returning control of the schools, for example, to teachers and to parents at the local level. This could not be a more important effort.

"I sometimes think one of the most revealing statistics about American education is one that shows that between 1960 and 1984, while the number of teachers in our schools increased by 57 percent, the number of administrative supervisors in our schools, the number of people, in other words, in administrative headquarters rather than in the classrooms, that number increased by 500 per cent.

"And what you are doing in Hawaii, as are people across the United States ... Chicago is a notable example, is returning control of the schools to the local level. This kind of restructuring could not be more important to your dealing with the structure of education, and I think that in that way lies our best hope for making our schools the kind of schools that our children deserve.

"But let me just ask you, as you pay attention to the structure of education, not to neglect the substance of education, not to neglect what it is that our children study, as well as how it is, the context in which they study it. The content is important too. They need to know math and science and that is so obvious to all of us and I constantly affirm the need to have students come from our schools with the ability to add and subtract and to understand technologically the sophisticated world in which they live. But they need to know literature too. They need to know history. These are the disciplines that lead them to ask questions about virtue and justice. These are the disciplines that help them to understand the nature of their democratic heritage; that help them to understand how it is democracy has flourished, how it is they are nurtured. These subjects are of crucial value too.

"So while you look to the structure of education, while you look to the context of education, I know you will remember as well that the substance of education, the content of education is important, and that the humanities should have a central place in our schools.

"Thank you all very much for making me feel so welcome in Hawaii. We've had lovely weather. One little rainstorm but hardly enough to matter since we've been here. So it's been a great pleasure for me to be in this lovely setting and to meet so many people who are concerned with our schools and working hard to improve them.

"Thank you."

At 11:59 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

I offer the thought, Mr. President, that a good many people are resorting to space heaters in order to ameliorate some of this frigidity, which seems a rather foolish way to save energy as we are all supposed to be doing in this building.

"I don't know exactly what you can do about it, Mr. President, but the staffers on the Minority side have offered the thought that if we can fly to the moon, surely we can do something about the temperature.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

The Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, convened at 11:35 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

"Ms. Kotake mentioned to me that if this body, and in particular Senator Kobayashi, really wants to express appreciation to her for her selection as the 1990 Teacher of the Year then we can appropriate funds for a new ten-classroom building for Mililani High School to accommodate the increase in enrollment in our school. So, Senator Kobayashi, please bear that in mind.

"At this time, it gives me great pleasure to introduce to you Alice Yukiko Kotake, our Teacher of the Year for 1990. She's also here with our esteemed principal of Mililani High School, Mr. Byron Yoshina."

Ms. Kotake, together with Mr. Yoshina, rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator Menor. Senator Hagino presented her with a lei.

TWENTIETH DAY

Thursday, February 15, 1990

The Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, convened at 11:37 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Robert Wasner, Windward Unity Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Nakasato who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Nineteenth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Crozier introduced a group of fifth grade students from Pohekea Elementary School in Ewa Beach and their teacher Ms. Donna Ai, accompanied by Mrs. Crozier.

Senator Matsuura, on behalf of Senate President Wong, welcomed and introduced the delegation from the Association of Pacific Island Legislators (APIL), seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

"Mr. President, we're very honored in having the officers of the Association of Pacific Island Legislators here with us this morning. They are: Senator Herminia Dierking of Guam, president; Congressman Manuel C. Sablan of the Saipan Legislature, vice president; Senator Robert Ruecho from the Island of Yap, secretary; Senator Hiroshi Yamamura of the Marshall Islands, treasurer. The executive secretary of the association is Mr. Joaquin Camacho from Guam.

"Mr. President, Senator Dierking would like to make a presentation of a resolution to you at this time."

All of the officers and the executive secretary of APIL rose to be recognized.

At this time, the Chair invited Senator Dierking to the podium and she presented a resolution to the Chair and members of the Senate as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. President. I think it's always an honor to come and meet all the other colleagues from across the wide water of ours, and we welcome you and lead you to come join us to make these islands a better world for all of us living.

"This is a resolution, S.C. 16 DOD-3, cordially extending the State of Hawaii an invitation to join the Association of Pacific Island Legislators as a full-fledged member. And so, Mr. President, on behalf of the association, I would like to present this resolution to you and hope that you will meet us in Guam in July for full membership and join with us, with those ten entities, that we are in together to make a better world for all of us.

"Thank you very much."

The Chair, on behalf of the Senate, thanked Senator Dierking for the invitation to join the Association of Pacific Island Legislators.

At this time, Senator Hagino welcomed and introduced the student representatives of the Kahuku High School football team, seated on the floor of the Senate, and remarked as follows:

"Mr. President and fellow Senators, the communities on the North Shore of this island can boast of many things ... a beautiful coastline with breathtaking surf, lush scenery, picturesque and historic spots, a hard working dedicated Senator, and the list goes on. And yet, for 17 long years, the community of Kahuku experienced a drought that left everyone hoping and dreaming for an end to that drought.

"The Kahuku High School football team, comprised of nearly 40 courageous and determined young men, managed to fulfill the dream that their school and community shared since 1972. That elusive dream was to win the OIA football championship.

"These remarkable players were asked by Coach Doug Semones, when he first took the helm as head coach, to list their goals and aspirations collectively as a team, and also as individuals. The consensus of their reply was to win the championship and to represent their school playing in the prep bowl. Well, they won, and they played.

"This scrappy team, with their great desire to win, sustained a string of seven wins and one loss to take them to the prep bowl. Although each player deserves to be declared a champion, several individuals executed yeoman performances during the season and were named to the all-star team. They are: Sean Makaiau, defensive back; Shawn Tanuvasa, defensive back; Datsun Nihipali, line backer and punter; Mark Atuaia, running back (who also, by the way, was named the state top offensive player of the year); Henry Crawford, line backer; Sunu Tialino, offensive line; Paka Pula, offensive line; Charles Scott, defensive line; and Itula Mili, wide receiver.

"Our congratulations go to these individuals and the team for their outstanding performances. With us today to represent their teammates are seniors: Shawn Tanuvasa, Sean Makaiau, Henry Crawford, and James Tai Hook.

"Mr. President and fellow Senators, I'm proud and honored to present to you these fine representatives of the Kahuku High School Red Raiders."

The students rose to be recognized and were presented with leis by various Senators.

Senator Hagino continued:

"Also, Mr. President, without the patient, tough, hard driving leadership of a reliable and skillful coaching staff, whatever accomplishments a team makes would not be possible. The dedication and commitment of the following coaches certainly deserve to be acknowledged. They are: Keala Santiago, Pita Olomua, Garth Spurrier, Salesa Maiava, Matt Loo, Fatu Fiso, Wayne Fonoimoana, Telephon'e Amua, Tim Burroughs and Glen Alo.

"We have recognized and praised the achievements of the team and also the coaching staff that led the Red Raiders to the OIA championship. However, we would be remiss if we did not highlight the person behind the men who brought the championship within reach and finally captured it.

"Mr. President, Coach Douglas Semones' selection as the Star Bulletin's OIA East Division Coach of the Year was more than an honor merely bestowed upon him. It was an honor he earned and deserved. Coach Semones first came to Hawaii to watch his high school teammate

Vai Sikahema play in the 1987 Pro Bowl. He decided to stay and took a job as defensive coordinator before taking over as head coach of the Kahuku Red Raiders. Realizing and understanding the strength of character of his team, he set out to motivate and challenge them to the utmost. His dynamic coaching inspired his players on a blazing trail that led to the long-sought championship.

"Although he was a rookie head coach, Doug Semones fought and beat the odds and in the process, managed to capture not only the OIA championship, but also the hearts and respect of his team, his peers, his school, and his community. It is my privilege to present a champion in his own right, Coach Douglas Semones."

Mr. Semones rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and lei.

Senator McCartney, as a Castle High School graduate, extended his congratulations to Coach Semones and the Kahuku High School football team for their accomplishment.

At 11:59 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:05 o'clock p.m.

Senator McCartney rose to introduce to the members of the Senate former Representative John Medeiros who was sitting in the gallery.

Senator Reed rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, this Legislature has spent nearly \$2 million in the past year on computers and phone lines ostensibly to increase public access to and public involvement in the legislative process. But the legislative process is no more open today than it was last year or the year before or the year before that.

"In effect, Hawaii's taxpayers have shelled out \$2 million for equipment that enables them to find out that their input is falling on deaf ears.

"The politicians' show of increasing public access is simply that: a show; a 'shibai.'

"The Save Sandy Beach Initiative Coalition put out a news release yesterday, and this morning a citizen wrote a letter that was published in the Advertiser's editorial pages, both of which hit at the heart of the problem -- controversial bills are held in committee by chairmen who ignore public input. The citizen who wrote the letter referred to our committees as graveyards for bills.

"Last year, I stood before this body and decried the lack of public access. I said that this Legislature would not become truly open and responsive to the people of Hawaii until we abolish what I called the 'All-Powerful Chairman System.' When I repeated that charge at a public meeting on Molokai, our honorable senior senator from Maui correctly pointed out that this system was also in place 35 years ago when the Republicans held power.

"I don't argue with that. I don't apologize for Republicans 35 years ago -- or for that matter for those of today. Regardless of the long history of the system, or the fact that both parties have exploited it, the All-Powerful Chairman System is not healthy. It discourages or even prevents openness.

"When I was first elected 4 years ago, I stood and naively looked out at these faces and attempted in floor debate to change minds. It took but one night of voting for me to understand that minds are not changed in floor debate. Minds are not changed in these chambers because they're made up in caucus, behind closed doors; and the minds, too, are closed. Floor discussion here in the Senate is for constituents, for the record, not for persuasion.

"The public comes to testify before committees every bit as naively as I stood here in my first year attempting to change minds. I feel sadness for members of the public when I watch them earnestly attempt to persuade committee chairmen. The testifiers are not actually being listened to. They are not going to change minds. Their input has no impact. The system is not open because the politicians' minds are closed.

"This past week, Mr. President, the chairman of your Energy and Natural Resources Committee held a hearing on S.B. 2558 that would have provided funds for a referendum so that residents of the Puna District could decide for themselves whether or not to allow construction of a geothermal plant in their community. The chairman of that committee certainly could not be described as 'open' on the issue of geothermal. We all know he is the Senate's most vocal advocate of geothermal development.

"Two Big Island residents went to the trouble and expense of flying to Oahu and securing ground transportation to the Capitol to testify in favor of the referendum bill. Five representatives of the geothermal industry or state agencies in favor of geothermal development testified against the referendum.

"There was no way this pro-geothermal chairman was going to pass out of his committee a bill allowing the people of Puna to say 'no' to a geothermal plant. But he allowed testimony and then announced that he would kill the bill because, as he explained, more people had testified against it than for it. We all know that's a charade.

"Are we to believe that this adamantly pro-geothermal chairman would have passed out the bill if four more Puna residents had shown up to testify? Would the chairman have passed the bill out for a vote by this entire Senate if the testimony had been six to five in favor of allowing Puna residents to make the decision? Of course not.

"My purpose is not to single out any particular chairmen, and I apologize to this chairman if he takes offense by misconstruing my intent. I do so merely to illustrate the reality of the farce.

"And we all know that the chairmen aren't solely to blame. The majority of the Senate expects chairmen to protect them; to shield them from controversial issues. Chairmen are expected to kill bills that most senators did not want to vote on publicly.

"I believe that the people of Hawaii deserve to know where their elected officials stand on every issue. What are we all so afraid of? The worst thing that can happen is that we won't be re-elected. Surely, being out of office is less painful than being in office and afraid to take a stand on an issue.

"Mr. President, I urge you to institute genuine legislative reform. Abolish the All-Powerful Chairman System. Bring the issues of initiative, abortion, leasehold lands, and all other controversial issues out in the open for a vote on the floor of the Senate.

"In closing ... no amount of computers and access lines will serve to open this legislative process until legislators themselves become open.

"The reality is that most legislators have come to identify with their colleagues and, as a result, have forgotten who they serve. They have come to treasure the office rather than the service.

"I know that my remarks today are unwelcome. And I'll be surprised if the defenders of the status quo don't out-do themselves rising on points of personal privilege to counter my blasphemous thoughts. But there is no one familiar with this legislative process who does not hear the truth in my criticism.

"I criticize to encourage reform. On behalf of the people who hired us to represent them, I urge this majority to implement genuine legislative reform in order to create a process that is truly open to the people.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Matsuura responded to the previous speaker's remarks and said:

"Mr. President, since the previous speaker alluded to my committee and my chairmanship I have to say something to answer some of his allegations.

"Let me just say, yes, it is true, I am pro-geothermal. But that doesn't mean that I pass all pro-geothermal bills. At the hearing yesterday, I shelved four pro-geothermal bills. The allegation that I pass pro-geothermal bills and kill anti-geothermal bills is incorrect. I look at the merits of each bill.

"The previous speaker mentioned one specific bill that I held. It is true there were more persons testifying against that measure than those who were for it. Those that were for it were people who represented the rain forest group.

"As the chairman, by my having that bill set for a hearing is an indication of openness because people who are in favor or against the measure had their chance to express their views on that bill. The reason why I held that bill is because the state has made a policy decision to encourage geothermal development (and I'm not going to explain to you all the merits of geothermal because I've already done that). The state has made a policy decision that we must go forward to develop our alternative energy resources to produce electricity.

"This bill would have called for a referendum to stop geothermal development in the Puna district. You must understand what these geothermal developers have gone through. They've already gone through all the permitting system; they have gone through three public hearings; they have gone through four contested cases; they have gone through several legal challenges in the court of law. Is it fair now to have a vote ... a referendum of the residents of Puna district to decide whether to stop the geothermal development?

"If we are going to allow this to happen in Puna, the residents in Waianae may say, 'All right, we've had it.' They have Kahe Point down there producing most of the electricity for the island. They also have the oil refinery that produces all of our gasoline. What will we do if they passed a referendum to shut down PRI and the Kahe generation plant? What about the residents who have transmission lines going through their properties? Pearl City is a good example of it.

"Are we going to let each individual community decide what we want in our community without looking at the total picture? Those are some of the reasons why I held the referendum bill back. I felt that there is a greater need, in terms of meeting the needs of the State of Hawaii. That's one of the reasons why I'm willing to share the energy on the Big Island with the other islands. Individuals who represent the Sierra Club from Maui have come to see me because they don't want the cable to go to their island. That's terrific. If the people of Maui don't want the electricity, produced on our island, to go to Maui, terrific! I can support that! And if the people of Honolulu don't want the geothermal energy, that's all right too! Then, we can justify keeping all of the electrical generation on the Big Island. However, the need is here; the need is on Maui, and I'm willing to stick my neck out to share that geothermal resource with the rest of the islands. We are one family and we have to think as a family.

"Are we going to pass this bill to allow referendum? If the geothermal resource was somewhere else, that's fine. But if you look at the scientific data, the geothermal resources are in the Puna district.

"The people of Puna must realize that we've appropriated funds for new roads for them, a new school, etc. Where do you think the money is coming from? Do you think it's coming from the revenues generated in the Puna district? It's coming from this island, Oahu! This is one of the reasons why I say that we must share our

resources and look at the whole state as one 'ohana.' That's the reason why I held the referendum bill back.

"In regard to the accusation that I have the votes to pass or kill a bill before the hearing, look at the 'unagi' bill. I really don't know if I have enough votes to pass the 'unagi' bill. If you think that I already got five votes you may be wrong. I don't know if I'm going to have four 'samurais' to join with me, let alone one.

"Now, the media ... I noticed all the television cameras in the gallery and I knew something was going to happen. I want the media to present the facts. I want them to report the news. Again, I repeat, don't market the news and above all never create the news.

"Thank you very much, Mr. President."

Senator Crozier added his response:

"Mr. President, before our eloquent Majority Floor Leader responds to the well thought out comments by our Minority Floor Leader, I'd like to get into the act just a bit.

"I appreciate the Minority Floor Leader's comments about the process and about how who are supposed to participate in the process, but I'd like to just take the Minority to task. He did quite a good job of taking us to task. I'm sure many of us are sitting here reflecting. But I would like to challenge them, our Minority or our 'loyal opposition.'

"It is their role to keep us on the edge to make sure that what we're passing through ... to have some kind of comments coming from the other side.

"Mr. President, earlier, I commented that this is the 20th day of this Legislature. Bills are already passing third reading. I think, since the beginning, we heard our Minority Leader give quite good remarks on opening day and then our Minority Leader or the 'loyal opposition' made some remarks on the A+ bill. But, I think, after that or in between that nothing else has been said. Today, we passed some bills on third reading. Our Minority just sat here. Why are you sitting here? It is your job to reflect on what we're trying to pass. Is it good, or is it bad? Please, Minority, participate. We need your input.

"Mahalo, Mr. President."

Senator Blair then added his remarks as follows:

"Mr. President, in response to the remarks of the Minority Floor Leader, I'd like to point out the difference between 'process' and 'product.' I think his remarks denigrate the work that was done during the interim and the changes that we made, by failing to acknowledge the truly remarkable changes that have been made to the legislative process. At this time last year, bills were being heard without copies having been printed and made available to the public and the hearing notices were going out very late. In many cases waivers of the 48-hour notice requirement were occurring, by the scores, on a daily basis.

"This year, anyone who's paying attention at all would notice the dramatic difference. Hearing notices are published, in many instances, a week before the hearing. Some chairmen have taken the time, to summarize the bills on the hearing notices, rather than simply list the titles. There have been no problems with availability of bills. Any fair assessment would find that the process has been very much improved. The public's ability to give input is dramatically improved. In the 16 years that I've

been here, I've not seen a more dramatic turnaround or a better adherence to the principle of openness.

"On the process side, we have much to be proud of; so I can't let those remarks go uncontested. When you consider the examples that the Minority Floor Leader used to support his thesis that the process has not been improved, the fallacy of confusing process with results becomes apparent.

"Reference was made to the bill to restore to the counties the power to zone by initiative, but Senator McCartney scheduled that hearing well in advance and on a Saturday, to maximize the public's input. His committee's hearing went from 9:00 o'clock in the morning to 2:00, or even after 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon, without a break, accepting public testimony for five hours. The bill was reported out of committee. I don't see that that is an intelligent example of the public's input being denied. Perhaps he's anticipating something down. Mr. President, this body's track record on its handling of both the statewide and county level initiative issues has been exemplary. I commend Senator McCartney, in particular, for his recent handling of the county initiative bill. The Minority Floor Leader should join me in that commendation.

"The other example which allegedly proved the thesis that the process has not improved is the death of a bill dealing with Puna. I think the continuing fallacy of the logic is obvious. Had that bill been reported out of the committee, it would not have received many votes on the floor. Are we going to let the minority who are citizens of a particular district make a decision based upon parochial interests, to the detriment of the majority's needs and the good of the entire state? The same logic would have us delegating to individual senators the decision on any project that was located in their district. In which case, Senator McMurdo would decide if a convention center was going to be located in Waikiki. We would not have the convention center in her district, based upon her public statements. We would not have it in anyone's district. Many needed projects would be vetoed by such deference to parochialism.

"I applaud both Senator McCartney's committee and Senator Matsuura's committee for their adherence to an open process and for the wisdom of the decisions. If the Minority Floor Leader confuses his preference as to how a committee should have disposed of a bill with a condemnation of the process, he is committing a logical error.

"However, I grant the Minority Floor Leader his point that chairmen tend to have too much power. I point out, however, that this is partly a product of the decision, made back in 1950, as to the size of this body. National studies suggest that the optimal size of a legislative body is between 100 and 150 members, but the combined membership of our House and the Senate is only 76. A consequence of this is that, while we deal with the same issues that a state like California deals with, and have the same range of issues which are as controversial here, we apportion the workload over far fewer members. We have only 25 members in our Senate. As a consequence, and I'll take for example last Saturday morning, I was scheduled to be at Senator McCartney's hearing on county initiative; at a hearing on changing the native Hawaiian blood quantum; and at a hearing on the A+ program. I managed to make only two out of the three.

"Some people fail to realize that, despite our best efforts, the workload imposed upon us by the community's demands on our time and the constitutional restrictions on the size of the Senate prevent members from attending all of the committee meetings they would like to attend. As a

consequence, members often have to rely on the recommendations of the chairmen. One of the unfortunate consequences of the small size of the Senate is that it tends to result in chairmen having more power than would be optimal. But I don't think that that can be blamed upon a Machiavellian disposition of our chairmen.

"I hope that if the Minority Floor Leader is serious, he will join with me in a bipartisan effort at the next constitutional convention to increase the size of the Senate so that we can have better attendance at committee hearings and so that the membership will be a greater counterweight to the chairman and the problem which he and I perceive to exist for different reasons will no longer trouble either of us.

"Thank you."

Senator B. Kobayashi also rose to remark:

"Mr. President, I'd like to rise on a point of personal privilege.

"In regard to previous comments, I have two areas of comments, one regarding committee hearings and the second concerning the so-called 'all powerful committee chairman system.'

"Committee hearings are only as good as the people who attend and the chairman and legislators who are there. For me, committee hearings are a valuable source of input, and they do have impact on decisions made by me and, I'm sure, by many other chairmen. Committee hearings, however, are not the only opportunity for input. Very often committee hearings serve as the opportunity to further discuss a matter with an interested party whose interest in the issue was not known prior to the committee hearing.

"Of interest is the fact that we all like to listen to new ideas, but being able to craft those new ideas into workable, practical language within the time frame that we have and within the budget we have is sometimes not possible. So when we have very long committee hearings, as we have had of recent to meet our lateral deadline, and are beset with many dozens of issues which require dollars, we listen but we cannot always respond favorably to grant each and every interested party hundreds and thousands and even millions of dollars as they would wish. So, the listening has to be compromised by our abilities to respond favorably and some times that is handicapped by lack of finances.

"On the second topic of the all powerful committee chairmen, I would remind several members of this body and the Minority that some of us do feel that the chairmen are too powerful. I would note, however, that the power of the chairman is ingrained in the tradition and practice of this body and not necessarily in Senate rules. For myself, I have discussed the possibility and urged the Senate President to consider amendments in the Senate rules when we organized a year and a half ago to allow for a majority of the committee to rule on all matters affecting the committee. A one sentence change in our Senate rules could, in effect, allow a majority of the committee members to petition and get from the chairman circulation of committee reports, hearings on bills, and even passage of bills out of committee.

"I would urge that members of the Minority and others who are interested in this sort of change keep up the effort in future years to secure such a change. Eventually, I think, we will get such a change. It did not occur the last time we organized, but hopefully, it will soon."

Senator Cobb added:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege. In doing so, I make it very clear I am no defender of the administration, the Democratic Party as it exists or the establishment as it is known. I think I am the only Senator that has successfully challenged both the Legislature and the incumbent administration in court and prevailed -- once on the subject of sign waving and once on the subject of the question of whether or not an individual has to resign to run. In one case it went to federal court; in the other case it went to the Supreme Court of the State of Hawaii.

"I would start off by pointing out that the newspapers have already done a pretty good job of accountability of legislators by their surveys on such issues as abortion, parental consent, initiative, and a variety of other issues. And in a number of cases, a substantial number of legislators did respond, although not all.

"I was asked today, right here on the floor of the Senate, by a reporter from the Honolulu Star Bulletin whether or not I own a gun. Presumably that is in response to a bill that is now pending on gun ownership. And my response is 'yes, I own several.' I don't own automatic weapons, and for the record, I favor a ban on automatic and assault weapons. I don't see any purpose in them, except for killing. I see no legitimate hunting purpose. But I gave a direct answer to a direct question.

"I would point out also the remarks about minds being made up on the floor are flatly in error. I can recall three bills in my career in the Senate when my remarks on the floor of this Senate made a difference and my colleagues listened. One was on dental hygienists; another was on a psychology bill to allow for HMSA coverage for psychologists; and a third was on prophylactics in vending machines. On the first two bills, I was warned in the caucus I had no more than ten votes in favor of the bill, and I made the decision, take it to the floor and vote it up or down. In each of those two instances, going to the floor with no more than 10 votes, both measures passed by a margin of 15 ayes to 10 noes. That's a change of five votes on the floor, after debate. I cite that experience because I have had it happen to me personally.

"I would further point out that when a recommendation for a change of chairmanship system is made, and I agree with the remarks of the Senator from the Thirteenth District on that issue, those advocating the change have the burden of proof and the burden to be specific. What exactly would we replace it with; would we have a committee of the whole; would we have a discharge petition mechanism; would we have a provision allowing for majority rule within a committee? The idea has some merit but let's get down to specifics so that we can see whether or not it's workable. It's not enough to say 'I want to have something changed.' The obligation is then to say, 'how we want to change it.'

"As for openers, I agree with the remarks very much of the Majority Floor Leader and will point out in addition that there's now a fax machine in the Sergeant-at-Arms office to accommodate public testimony from anywhere in Hawaii, and for that matter anywhere in the world. And I note that the waiver of the 48-hour notice is now not the rule, it is very much the exception. And that in itself is a big change from last year.

"Finally, Mr. President, if someone says that public testimony does not have impact, I can recall well over a dozen bills in my brief career where the testimony of the public changed minds in committee. And I recall last Saturday when I sat through 3-1/2 hours of testimony on

the bill on blood quantum. I went into it completely open-minded. I learned from those who testified and perhaps the time will come in the near future that I'll have an opportunity to share what I learned in committee with my colleagues. That I can bear witness from the bills that I have cited already that floor debate did make a difference; that Senators listened and actually changed their votes even though I was told 'you don't have the votes on the floor.' We may have an opportunity to address that again on a very slippery bill involving eels, and I look forward to it.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator George also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"If I may, Mr. President, if you'll bear with my croaking voice: The Senator to my rear has chosen to take this occasion as an assignment of responsibility on the part of the Minority that we are supposed to have a response because bills are coming up for third reading. I think I could prolong these meetings considerably if there has to be a Minority response to every bill. Obviously, I'd be glad to do that if I felt a useful purpose would be served.

"My understanding is, when I sign a committee report free and clear and when my colleagues to my left have done the same thing, it is hardly necessary for us to rise to the occasion and praise Caesar. I can assure the colleague sitting behind me that if indeed we do not approve of measures which is sponsored by the Majority, we will undertake to be very vocal, indeed, and attempt to bury Caesar, and I hope that his appraisal is correct that floor debate, spirited floor debate, will aid us in killing measures of which we do not approve.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Crozier, in response, stated:

"Mr. President, just to respond to the previous speaker. I do hope that they will begin to really study all the bills that are being passed and do make comments. Because when I came over here, the House was quiet compared to the Senate in floor debates and I looked forward to participating in much of the dialogue that had transpired prior to my arriving. But since I've been here the Senate has been very quiet and I am hoping that the loyal opposition will take us to task so that we will have an opportunity to prove to the people that we know what we are doing; we're trying to do what is best for the people of Hawaii.

"Thank you."

The Chair then made the following observation:

"Members of the Senate, I feel that the discussion this morning was very beneficial. We have difficult decisions that must be made this session. The Chair commends all of the speakers this morning for the decorum and courtesy extended to each other and ask that it continue in future discussions and debates."

ADJOURNMENT

At 12:41 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Blair, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Friday, February 16, 1990.

TWENTY-FIRST DAY

Friday, February 16, 1990

The Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, convened at 11:38 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Brother Stephen V. Hale of St. Stephen's Diocesan Center, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Koki who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twentieth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Tungpalan made the following introduction:

"On behalf of you, Mr. President, and the entire Senate, it is my pleasure to introduce to this honorable body the winners and organizers of our Hawaii State Flower Art Contest.

"In the fall of 1989, the Hawaii State Legislature sponsored the Hawaii State Flower Art Contest, which culminated in December with the submission of 120 top entries statewide. All children in kindergarten through grade 12 were encouraged to participate, and winners in the three divisions were awarded Senate and House certificates, plaques, \$75 savings bonds to the first place winners, and \$50 savings bonds to the second and third place winners. The first place winners have also been awarded scholarships to attend the Honolulu Academy of Arts program this summer. All the money for the awards came from your generous personal donations. Not one penny from our state treasury was used for this contest.

"The contest was designed with three goals in mind: (1) to promote an awareness of Hawaii's state flower, the yellow Hibiscus Brackenridgei; (2) to nurture an appreciation of Hawaii's environment, particularly endemic and endangered flora; and (3) to provide our children with educationally worthwhile opportunity to creatively express themselves.

"This morning we are so pleased to have with us the winners, all of the winners, in each of the three divisions.

"In the elementary division, (as I call your name, please stand to be recognized) we have our first place winner, Miss Hang Van from Lanakila Elementary; the second place winner, Miss Kristine Wong from Iliahi Elementary; and the third place winner, Miss Tania Ishimaru from Waiakeawaena Elementary on the Big Island.

"In the intermediate division, our first place winner was Miss Sheryl Lopez from Dole Intermediate; our second place winner, Mr. Ariel Corpus from Waipahu Intermediate; and our third place winner, Mr. Guillermo Tejada from Kapaa Intermediate.

"And in the high school division, our first place winner was Miss Ruth Manuel from Moanalua High School; our second place winner, Miss Amy Tokuda from Farrington High School; and our third place winner, Miss Cherry DeLeon, also from Farrington High School.

"Seated in the gallery, we have the families of the winners and school principals and supporters who have accompanied our winners today. (All rose to be recognized.)

"At this time we would also like to recognize and thank the organizers and judges who actually made our flower contest a reality. We have, seated next to the students, Mrs. Gladys Brandt. We also have Dr. Alexander Pickens. These two individuals together with Mr. Clarence Lee were the judges of our contest. They had a hard time because we had over 120 beautiful entries, but as you can see from the entries here that won, they did a wonderful job, and we want to express our thanks again to Mrs. Brandt and to Dr. Pickens.

"Organizing this event were these lovely individuals who gave of their free time to do this: Ms. Wendy Liu who is with the state Department of Education, including my staffers with one individual who'll never stand to be recognized but he really deserves a lot of credit and that's my chief aide Hisao Yamashita, together with these staffers who also worked throughout the summer to help me put this together and this was really done through their efforts, we have Ms. Ramona Mullahey and Ms. Roberta Mayor, also with the Department of Education. And we all came to be because the Board of Education and the Department of Education allowed us to do this, so we would like to also recognize Superintendent of Education Charles Toguchi. Also with us in the gallery is Mr. George Ellis, director of the Honolulu Academy of Arts.

"We tried our best to come in under the budget that we had and we fell a few dollars short, but because of Mr. Ellis' help we were able to put together enough money to award the first place winners scholarships to attend his Academy of Arts this summer. So I'd like to pay a special recognition to Mr. Ellis for making that possible. Thank you, Mr. Ellis.

"Mr. President, I would be remiss in not mentioning that the neighbor island winners were able to share with us their time today through the greatness of Aloha Airlines who provided the airfare for a chaperone and for the winners. I'd like to recognize Aloha Airlines and, also, Domino's Pizza for giving six large pizzas. Thank you."

All of the student winners with their respective works of art, the volunteer organizers, representatives from DOE, and judges rose to be recognized.

The Chair recognized and commended Senator Tungpalan for her leadership in making the contest possible.

Senator McMurdo also commended the chairman of the Culture and Arts Committee for her outstanding job and asked the honorable body to give her a round of applause.

Senator Chang then welcomed and introduced a group of fifth grade students and their teacher, Mrs. Shannon Chun, from Maemae Elementary School, who were seated in the gallery.

The Chair then introduced a group of 60 students from Makaha Elementary School with their teachers, Carol Lum and Diane Brown, and parent, Mrs. Perlita Ramirez.

Senator Nakasato, representing the 19th Senatorial District, extended his congratulations to the three, out of the total of nine, winners of the flower art contest who represented the Kalihi District.

Senator Hagino introduced Mr. and Mrs. Russell Wong, parents, and a sister of Miss Kristine Wong, second place elementary division winner of the flower art contest, who were also seated in the gallery.

At 11:54 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

At this time, Senator McCartney, on behalf of Senator Hagino, introduced to the members of the Senate the principals from the DOE Kahuku Complex, seated in the gallery, who are "here with us today to lobby on educational concerns."

Senator Ikeda then rose on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, very often when the Legislature initiates projects we get criticized for them. But we never hear when projects we initiate are successful, and we are very seldom credited for them. I'd like to tell you about one that has been successful, and that is the afternoon contra-flow lane on Kalaniana'ole Highway.

"As you know, it took quite a while for the Department of Transportation to be convinced to even do a pilot project. They fought it all the way. And I have to, at this point, thank my colleagues Senator Yamasaki and Senator Fernandes Salling for their assistance in getting my Senate concurrent resolution passed last year and for providing funding for this project. But it is a success; it's working beautifully. People love it.

"In fact, I'm not sure that Mr. Hirata even realizes what he told the crowd at Hawaii Kai when he held a meeting to assess the project. He told us that the contra-flow lane is working so well that we need to change it. And in essence that's exactly what's going to happen on Monday. It's going to be shortened so that the people moving town-bound will be less impacted by the people going home. The people going home have saved anywhere from 15 to 20 minutes in their commute time, and for once there is enthusiasm rather than resentment and trepidation when the widening of the highway is mentioned. In fact, at the meeting some of the residents said, 'Well, hurry up and do it. What are we waiting for?'

"So this is good news. And I'm sure that even with the modification on Monday that the project will continue to be a success.

"Once again, thank you, to my colleagues for making this possible."

Senator Holt also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege just to clarify some points made in recent news reports.

"It has been mentioned that the cost associated with fixing the new stadium which is contained in the master

plan report, which I just received two days ago, would be approximately \$76 million and to build a new one would be \$180 million. And reference was made that it was up to the Legislature. I just want to clarify that there really is nothing before the Legislature ... nothing before us. I checked with the Ways and Means chairman and he has not received a message from the governor.

"We anticipate we will have a hearing on the master plan which the Legislature funded two years ago, but I think it's a policy decision that the administration is going to have to come to grips with as to whether they want to fix the stadium or build a new one. Thank you."

At 12:30 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Blair, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate stood in recess until 5:00 o'clock p.m.

TWENTY-SECOND DAY

Wednesday, February 21, 1990

The Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, convened at 11:40 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Dr. W. C. Garland of the Hawaii Baptist Convention, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Holt and Mizuguchi who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-First Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator McCartney, on behalf of Senator Hagino and himself, introduced his three "shadows," Kahuku High School seniors: Leilani Kapu, Pua Shelden and Duane Andersen. "The students are studying the intricacies of our state government," he said.

Senator McCartney also introduced Mrs. Jo Patacsil and said, "Jo Patacsil is a very good friend of mine who happens to be a resident of the Heeia wetlands. She has lived there for over 40 years and the property has been in her family for many, many years. This past weekend, she got Representatives Tom and Peters and me to walk through the rain and the mud and the wetlands to see the flooding problems that she is experiencing."

Senator Hagino, on behalf of Senator McCartney and himself, introduced his eight "shadows": Sophia Aiu, Jacob Robertson and Pouli Mangelei from Kahuku High School; Selizon Vidad and Jennifer Castillo from Waialua High School; and Vicki Crabtree, Eun Jung Yi and Donovan Dela Cruz from Leilehua High School. Senator Hagino said, "These bright and energetic students will be following me throughout the day to learn more about the legislative process."

Senator Crozier, on behalf of Senators Yamasaki, Reed and Solomon, introduced his cousin Franklin Delano Roosevelt Crozier as follows:

"Mr. President, I'd like to introduce a young man from the Island of Maui who has excelled in the arena of rodeo. He has won numerous prizes as a cowboy for roping and horseback riding. He has also won couple of trophies in 'double mugging.' His partner used to be Senator Clayton Hee. If any of you don't understand what 'double mugging' is in rodeo, they let the steer out of the chute; it weighs about 700 pounds; one guy rides the horse and lassoes the steer, and the other guy runs from the side and wrestles the steer down.

"Franklin has moved on to polo and has excelled to become one of the finest polo players in the State of Hawaii and he is well-renowned in the community of Huelo, a population of seven people, who all consider him a champion. He has now moved back to the Makawao area. Mr. President, within a month or so he will be going to Africa, train some of the Africans to become polo players so they can participate in the next Olympiad.

"Mr. President, I'd like to introduce my cousin Franklin Delano Roosevelt Crozier."

Mr. Franklin Crozier, who was seated in the gallery, rose to be recognized.

The Senate reconvened at 12:10 o'clock p.m.

At this time, Senator Fernandes Salling introduced to the members of the Senate Mr. David Ishii, the 1990 Hawaiian Open winner, as follows:

"Mr. President, I'd like to thank my fellow colleagues for waiting patiently, but at this time I would like to introduce someone who is no stranger to those of you who are golf lovers of which I see the two most lovers of golf are not present with us here today, and I apologize to David Ishii for that because our Johnny, Johnny Carson, that is, who was going to do the famous swing couldn't make it and so he's surely a 'Johnny come lately' today. That was Senator Milton Holt. I'm swinging for him, so to speak.

"I'm introducing David because he is from the Island of Kauai although he's been living here now on Oahu for many years.

"As a native son of Kauai and Hawaii's foremost international golf professional, he came home to take on the best in the world between February 8th and February 11th of this year in the 25th Hawaiian Open held at Waialae Country Club. From the opening round, David exhibited a poise and a swing (we would like to see that, David) that established him as a contender, and sports fans throughout the 50th State followed him on the course and in the media, pulling for him to be only the second local boy to win this prestigious tournament.

"Entering the final round, David was one stroke off the lead, but at the 72nd hole he was one stroke up, \$180,000 richer, eligible for all the events on the American tour through 1992, and entitled to play in the Masters, the NEC World Series of Golf, the 1991 MONY Tournament of Champions, and the special invitational events on the PGA Tour.

"All Hawaii and all of us here today, David, are so rightfully proud of you and of your golfing achievements and the honor that you have brought to our state. We, the Senators of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, would like to congratulate you on your outstanding and splendid performance in the 1990 Hawaiian Open and wish you continuing good fortune as Hawaii's ambassador of golf.

"And now without further ado, I would like to introduce to this body our champion, David Ishii. David is accompanied by his wife Lorraine and son, 'Little Champ Ishii.'"

Mr. Ishii and his family who were seated on the floor of the Senate rose to be recognized. Senator Fernandes Salling presented him with the congratulatory Senate certificate and Senator Tungpalan presented the lei. Senator Blair presented a lei to Mrs. Ishii.

At 12:15 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:33 o'clock p.m.

Senator Menor, on a point of personal privilege, remarked:

"Mr. President, for information and benefit to all of the Senators in this body, prior to this morning's floor session, your Committee on Judiciary held a public hearing in the auditorium on the four gun control bills that have stimulated a lot of public interest and, as I was made fully aware, phone calls to your offices.

"In order to alleviate you of the additional workload of having to explain to the people who may continue to call your offices as to what your positions are with respect to these gun control bills, I just want to inform this body that as the committee chairman I made a recommendation that we hold all of these bills, and my recommendation received the concurrence of all the Judiciary Committee members who were there.

"Also for the information of this body, the committee received voluminous testimony from over a hundred individuals and organizations, and with the exception of the representatives of the law enforcement community and one or two private citizens, the rest of the testimony submitted, both written and orally, were in opposition to these bills. Thank you."

Senator Wong also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I would like to rise on a point of personal privilege in response to the chairman of Judiciary.

"First of all, I am disappointed that the bills were not passed out of the Judiciary Committee. Secondly, this does represent a setback, as far as I am concerned personally, but we cannot allow our personal feelings to intervene in the structure of the Senate. It is the prerogative of the chairman to withhold a bill. It has been my position and will continue to be my position that once that decision is made that, as president, I would support that decision.

"However, Mr. President, I do feel that progress has been made. This is the first time a bill has gotten so far with 25 signatures. Maybe next year we may have to have 26; but whatever it takes, that measure will be back before the Legislature another time.

"Thank you very much."

Senator Menor responded as follows:

"Mr. President, in response to the previous speaker's remarks, I'd like to say that the previous speaker's efforts in trying to give the issue of gun control and in general the major concerns that have been expressed on the part of the law enforcement community about the serious problem that we have in the State of Hawaii in terms of the illegal use and possession of firearms and the use of firearms in committing serious crimes against innocent victims, that that issue was really given a thorough and comprehensive hearing. In that respect, I think the Senate President's efforts were not for naught.

"I'd also like to point out that another positive result that I think will result from the committee hearing that we held today is the fact that your committee is fully intent upon passing out bills that would significantly toughen penalties with respect to the illegal use and possession of

firearms so that we penalize those individuals, members of the criminal element, who are preying upon innocent victims in society by using firearms in committing crimes against these individuals. And I'd like to point out that one of the bills that was introduced by myself and the Senate President would call for the toughening of penalties with respect to the illegal use of firearms, and it's my intent to try to move legislation out of the committee this session to address that particular concern.

"I really appreciate the Senate President's efforts and we'll do the best we can in the future to try to address the concerns that he, as well as many people in the community, continue to feel about crimes that are committed involving the use of firearms. Thank you."

Senator Blair added:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege. Remarks were made to the effect that it is the prerogative of a chairman to hold a bill. I just want the record to reflect that there is no such rule within the Senate rules. I recognize no such prerogative on the part of any chairman. Thank you."

"It is a personal tribute to the character and sense of high responsibility of George Iranon that he returned to the public service after virtually a lifetime of having already served the public with honor and distinction in law enforcement.

"It is also a personal tribute to George Iranon -- as well as a tribute to our state as a society of opportunity -- that a person who grew up in the small plantation town of Honomu on the Big Island can rise through resourcefulness and hard work to the position of the highest corrections official in Hawaii.

"Mr. President, in bringing about change to the corrections system, we need commitment more than anything else, and George Iranon has been a leader in making that commitment.

"I am confident that he will be able to shoulder the task with great resolve and confidence after this body confirms his appointment as director, as I respectfully urge all senators to do.

"Thank you, Mr. President,"

Senator Solomon also supported the nominee and said:

"Mr. President, I too would like to express my support for this confirmation.

"As the Senator from the Third Senatorial District I think it's an honor to have a man of such credibility and I'm hoping to see some fast improvements in our field of corrections. Thank you,"

Senator Menor added his support and remarked:

"Mr. President, as the vice chairman of the Senate Corrections Committee, I want to echo the previous comments in support of the confirmation of George Iranon. I've known Mr. Iranon now for many years and he has demonstrated himself to be a competent, diligent and hardworking administrator, as well as being a fine and outstanding individual. There's no question in my mind that he will be an outstanding administrator with the Department of Corrections. I urge my colleagues to vote in favor of Mr. Iranon's confirmation to the Department of Corrections,"

Senator A. Kobayashi, in support of the nominee, then said:

"Mr. President, I also would like to add my words of support to the confirmation of Mr. Iranon. I've always had many concerns about the correctional system, especially the women's prison. After talking with Mr. Iranon and watching him work and listening to his philosophy about the whole correctional system, I know that we're going to be moving in a real positive manner,"

THIRD READING

S.B. No. 3236, S.D. 1:

Senator Crozier moved that S.B. No. 3236, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Fernandes Salling.

Senator Crozier rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I stand to speak in favor of the bill before us, S.B. 3236.

"Mr. President, this past summer I was fortunate to be invited by Senator Dan Inouye to participate in the hearings he held throughout the neighbor islands on Hawaiian issues, primarily, on the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act of 1920. As we went around the different islands we heard some basic concerns expressed by the residents of Hawaiian Home Lands and Native Hawaiians in general.

"When they spoke of the Hawaiian Home Lands they talked about issues like leases on the Island of Molokai. The people have been there for a number of years now and their leases are running out. They had 99-year leases and some of them are less than 40 years now. They're

having problems with their leases. They need to get loans; they can't get loans because their lease is running out.

"We also heard about their water problem. There are developments taking place all over the State of Hawaii. However, even though it's in the act that Hawaiian Homes lessees have rights to the waters, they're concerned that by the time they have an opportunity to build on the lands the water allocations would be gone.

"Mr. President, Senate Bill 3236 is a purpose clause or an amendment to the existing law, the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act, and that law is found in our Admissions Act. To become a state, one of the conditions was to form a compact with the federal government to accept the responsibility of taking care of Hawaiian Home Lands. Throughout the years, many people accused the state of not fulfilling its responsibility, but it's definitely true that throughout the years the federal government has been extremely lax in sharing their responsibility. And up until recently, they had the attitude that they just would be the overseer of the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act and it was the state's responsibility to help fund the infrastructure costs of roads, sewers and waters to make these lands available for home sites, farms and ranch lands.

"Up until now the federal government has only given \$1.2 million at Pa he'e he'e Ridge, and they were able to do that on a technicality because this is on the boundaries of the Department of Land and Natural Resources area. They didn't completely give to Hawaiian Home Lands, per se, the Pa he'e he'e Ridge Association found a technicality and then we were able to get funded.

"We heard these concerns over and over again throughout the state, Mr. President, and after it was all done, Senator Inouye called many Hawaiian leaders and also government leaders, the Senate, the House and the governor, and he had a series of meetings. One of his recommendations was to have us put a purpose clause into the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act. I drafted a version and in December and January I went throughout the state communicating with Native Hawaiians mostly on Hawaiian Home Lands. I also sent a series of letters to any Native Hawaiian who had shown interest in what we were trying to do. I sent out 300 letters and had twelve meetings throughout the state trying to explain what we were trying to do. I had a version; we had many comments made about that version. Then after taking into consideration all of the comments, I redrafted it and put it into the legislative process.

"Meanwhile, Senator Inouye and his staff were looking at the same issue, and we had a hearing two weeks ago on this purpose clause. Senator Inouye came before the committee and offered a new draft. The draft before us now, Senate Draft 1, is Senator Daniel Inouye's language. His language and my language are basically the same but his is in a different style. So, I'm asking my colleagues to take a look at the language and support the bill.

"As I went into the community, many individuals asked me, 'Why do we need this new language. We've had the act for 60 years. Is it necessary?' Well, if you want to continue the same way we've been functioning for the last 60 years with no help from the federal government, with a minimum support from the state government, no, we don't need this language. But if we hope to gather more support from the federal government, and I'm talking primarily about the federal government, we need this language. Primarily, this language summarizes what the intent of the Hawaiian Homes Commission was, what we believed it was throughout the years.

"Included in the new language ... I'd like to just read the major phrase that creates the 'hook' into the federal government's treasury that we've never had before ... and it is found on page 5 on line 11: '... the United States and State of Hawaii hereby acknowledge the public trust established under this Act and affirm their fiduciary duty to faithfully administer the provisions of this Act on behalf of the Native Hawaiian beneficiaries of this Act.'

"Up until this time, Mr. President, it has been a one sided operation. The state has had to bear the brunt of putting in the infrastructure for the Hawaiian Home Lands. We are finally tying the federal government, into helping to administer this act, or give money. During Senator Inouye's public hearings in August, I mentioned to the federal government representatives that if they were here only to give us lectures we're not interested, but, if they want to give us money then we want to listen to them. This Senate Draft 1, Senator Inouye's language, says that the federal government does have a public trust fiduciary responsibility. Fiduciary responsibility means money. Of the many issues that was presented to us, this is the final, major concern.

"There were other concerns that were addressed at those hearings and one of the issues was the time frame. Governor Waihee and the Hawaiian Homes Commission introduced a bill through you, Mr. President, to extend the 99-year lease to 199-years, and that bill is moving through the process.

"Also, there is a bill that I introduced that moved out of the Energy Committee to reserve water allocations for Hawaiian Home Lands throughout the state as these allocations are given out, so we always have a reserve for them.

"Much has been done for the Native Hawaiians.

"The bill has a long way to go before it finally passes. If this bill passes today, the Hawaiian Homes Commission will be taking it out to the Native Hawaiians throughout the state so they too can have their input, so when it's finally heard in the House, we can truly have a bill that the Native Hawaiians had an opportunity to dialogue. And the buzz word of the 80s that we just vacated is the word 'empowerment.' So, this document represents empowerment for the Native Hawaiians.

"Mr. President, for the record, may I include Senator Inouye's memo as part of my speech?"

The Chair granted Senator Crozier's request.

On February 16, 1990 I testified before Hawai'i State Senate Committee on Housing and Hawaiian Programs in support of S.B. 3236, to add a Declaration of Policy to the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act of 1920. I understand that this legislation has been reported out of

Committee by Chairman Mike Crozier and may come up for a vote on the floor of the Senate as soon as March 1.

To assist you in understanding the important points about the bill and to answer questions that you may have heard about the proposal I have prepared the attached fact sheet. Also attached is a copy of S.B. 3236, S.D. 1, as approved by Senator Crozier's Committee.

FACT SHEET

CROZIER-INOUE PROPOSAL TO ADD A DECLARATION OF POLICY TO THE HAWAIIAN HOMES COMMISSION ACT OF 1920

The proposed legislation, S.B. 3236, S.D. 1, would add a new Declaration of Policy to the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act of 1920. It would not add or delete any provision within the body of the Act.

In August of 1989 the Senate Select Committee on Indian Affairs held five days of hearings on each of the Islands and received over fifty hours of testimony from homesteaders, government officials, and individuals with expertise in Hawaiian issues. The message consistently received by the Committee was that the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act needs clarification and strengthening. S.B. 3236, S.D. 1, would clarify the intent of the Act. Once this policy is clarified, the second step of strengthening the Act follows.

The addition of a policy clause to the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act of 1920 would provide a basis for Federal funding.

With the exception of \$1.2 million which was appropriated in fiscal year 1989 by the Congress for homelands housing, there has never been any Federal funding for the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act since its inception in 1921. The Federal government has argued that the fiduciary responsibility of fulfilling the Act does not rest with the Federal government but rather with the State, thus there is no Federal obligation to provide funding under the Act. The Crozier-Inouye proposal states that the Federal government has a trust responsibility and fiduciary duty to the Hawaiian people under the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act. If adopted, the Federal government would also be obligated to provide funding and other resources to fulfill the Act.

Declaring that the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act of 1920 creates a 'permanent land base' provides that all lands set aside under the Act will be held in perpetuity.

The concept of a permanent land base does not address the questions of 99-year leases or land exchanges. Since the purpose of the Act is to 'rehabilitate' Native Hawaiians, it has been argued that the lands will be returned to the State when the last Hawaiian is rehabilitated. The Crozier-Inouye proposal clarifies that the lands set aside for beneficiaries will always be held in trust but it is not intended to resolve questions about lease terms or land exchange authorities. These issues will have to be addressed in separate legislation.

The proposed legislation states that the rights of the native citizens of the Kingdom of Hawai'i to seek redress for wrongful activities associated with the overthrow of the Kingdom are not affected by this Act.

The proposed legislation states that the obligation of the United States and the State of Hawai'i to carry out their trust responsibility to descendants of native citizens of the Kingdom of Hawai'i who are not beneficiaries of the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act of 1920 is not affected by this Act.

This proposal affects only the Hawaiian Homes Commissions Act and its beneficiaries. It neither adds nor diminishes any rights of other Hawaiians to receive benefits from the Federal government, nor does it extinguish the ability of Hawaiians to sue the Federal government for reparations.

This proposal states that the policy of the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act is to support self-determination of Native Hawaiians in the administration of the Act.

Many witnesses at the hearings last August testified that they have little or no say in how decisions are made which directly affect the Home Lands. Rather than a landlord-tenant relationship, the beneficiaries should be able to be active participants in decisions that affect their lives. The Crozier-Inouye proposal states that beneficiaries should have this right. If this is agreed to by the State Legislature and the U.S. Congress, then a thorough study would be required to determine what kind of changes would be called for in the administration of the Homelands in order to implement the policy of self-determination.

This proposal does not address sovereignty.

Self-determination is a policy of the United States Government to allow Native American groups to participate in governmental decisions that affect their lives. Sovereignty is recognition by the United States Government of a Native American group's inherent right to govern itself. The two concepts are separate, and Senator Inouye has stated that it is up to the Hawaiian people to seek sovereignty if it is their desire to become sovereign."

Senator Solomon also rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of Senate Bill 3236, S.D. 1. Mr. President, as you know, during the Majority caucus I expressed great concern about this bill and I'm very pleased, at this time, to be able to speak in support because many of my questions were answered.

"Mr. President, this bill is the first step towards the resolution of the many injustices that have been committed against the Hawaiian people since the overthrow of the Hawaiian Kingdom. A congressional act, such as the Hawaiian Homestead Act, was conceived at that time that this would be part of the settlement package between the Hawaiian nation and the United States. Mr. President, may I remind you that the Native Hawaiian people once owned this entire State of Hawaii. The act has given the Hawaiian people 200,000 acres.

"I concur with the enumerated purposes as stated on page 4 of this bill, (1), (2), (3), (4) and (5). There exists an overriding issue, Mr. President, as to the respective responsibility of the state and federal governments to carry out those purposes. I am satisfied that the policy clause, as proposed, makes clear that both the state and the federal governments have fiduciary obligations to the beneficiaries of which the trust was created for, as seen in section (d), page 5.

"Also, Mr. President, I would like to remind this body that we have received a memo from Senator Inouye, dated

February 23, 1990, in which the Senator reconfirms that the addition of a policy clause to the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act of 1920 will provide a basis for federal funding. At this time, Mr. President, I am satisfied that there is no possibility of confusion that this policy clause affirms that the federal government, as well as the state government, has a fiduciary duty to the beneficiaries; that in the 1920 Act, it is conceived that these duties shall be met by means of federal funding in addition to state expenditures.

"Mr. President, I'd like to end my statement of support with a paraphrase that impressed me, as delivered by Jesse Jackson when he was campaigning for president on the Democratic ticket. I paraphrase, 'They always told us that there was a light at the end of the tunnel. And we believed them. And we went on and on. And they told us again that there was a light at the end of the tunnel and we believed them. But they never told us that the light came from a train.'

"I know, Mr. President, that the passage of this hallmark legislation will help the Hawaiian people to achieve that light at the end of the tunnel and insure us that the light isn't coming from a train. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura also supported the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I don't know when the original purpose clause of the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act was written, but if it was written at the same time when Congress set aside 200,000 acres of land for the Hawaiians, the purpose clause should be changed. The reason why I say this is that when the 200,000 acres were set aside for the Hawaiian people, Congress picked the worst, worst land in the State of Hawaii. They took the worst lands and set it aside for the Hawaiians -- Molokai, without that reservoir water, Hoolehua is a desert; Panaewa, I don't think you can grow anything on those lava rocks. The Hawaiians, were really (pardon my expression) shafted. Even the American Indians had a better deal; at least they found oil and gas on their land.

"When I look back at the historical events that took place when the lands were set aside for the Hawaiians, it was not done in fairness to the Hawaiians. I still remember there was one small piece of land that one could have grown a crop. That land was in Waimanalo. When they found out that there was that possibility of growing a crop, Congress took that land away. I believe that this new purpose clause will be of great benefit to the Hawaiian people.

"Thank you very much."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 3236, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAIIAN HOMES COMMISSION ACT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

At 11:59 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:06 o'clock p.m.

At this time, Senator Crozier rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, you being Chinese understand the concept of the 'ying and yang.' We have moments when things are at high points in our life and we have our low points, but normally with bio-rhythms it's supposed to go in cycles, you have one high point or high day, then you wait a few days then you have a low day. But if you chair the Hawaiian Programs Committee these highs and lows come very close together. Three minutes ago I had a high period, now I come crashing down.

"Mr. President, I have before me a letter from the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, the chairman of the Board of Trustees, Uncle Tommy Kaulukukui, and it talks about Senate Bill 1264, otherwise known as the blood quantum bill, and I'd like to read the letter to my colleagues. However, before I read the letter I'd like to make a few comments.

"The bill talks about blood quantum. The bill talks about Section 5(f), from the monies that come out of 5(f) to be used by the general public and also the Native Hawaiians. This bill talks about OHA.

"I was fortunate enough, and I'm so proud to have been a member of the Constitutional Convention of 1978 when we created the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, and the funding mechanism that was to herald OHA's function was the pro rata share of the 5(f) monies or the ceded lands monies. At that time, I tried to convince my colleagues to not make two classes of Hawaiians; let us just make everybody Hawaiian or Native Hawaiian but don't have two classes. My colleagues disagreed with me.

"At that time, they used to call me, (the phrase is not popular anymore but they used to call me and couple of other guys) 'the Panasonic Club.' We were Panasonic because we were just a little ahead of our time. Well, on this issue, Mr. President, they were right. I told my colleagues, 'don't do this; don't make two classes of people because eventually we're gonna have problems out in the Hawaiian community over that issue.' Well, the problems did arrive. Last year, I had this bill before us, and the comments I made about ten years ago, lo and behold, the very fight that I had prophesied took place at my table. Ironically, it's still stuck at my table. This year OHA had a plebiscite where in excess of 20,000 people participated and the overwhelming majority, 80 percent of the people, want to change the blood quantum.

"While this was going on, the governor and OHA were coming to a settlement on the land issue, the revenues taken from the lands, everything happening simultaneously.

"We had a hearing in my committee. As usual, when it comes to the Housing and Hawaiian Programs Committee, it's very emotional and very heated. We passed the bill out with four legislators in favor, three legislators opposing. I want to thank both sides of the issue and the legislators who participated. First, those who supported me so that we could keep the bill moving forward so we could have more dialogue and input from the people. I'd like to also thank the people who voted 'I do not concur.' By doing that, they flagged out some of the serious limitations to this bill and that more consideration should be given.

"The bill went to the Judiciary Committee and when the bill got to the Judiciary Committee certain legal points were brought out. At that time, the Office of Hawaiian Affairs asked for the bill to be deferred until Friday and today is Friday. One of the concerns was the way the language was written. The other concern was because the governor had made a settlement with the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, and we will be addressing that bill sometime in this session. This one may be untimely, or in other words, we started out trying to put a square peg in a square hole, but as things have developed quite fast this session, the peg hasn't changed but the hole has. The hole is now a round hole. So this bill does not fit into the bigger picture of the Hawaiian movement.

"So, Mr. President, with your permission, I'd like to read the letter that was hand delivered to me by the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.

Dear Senators Crozier and Menor:

I am writing this letter on behalf of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) Board of Trustees to express our recommendations regarding S.B. 1264, SD 1:

PROPOSING AMENDMENTS TO ARTICLE XII, SECTION 4, 5, 6, AND ADDING A NEW SECTION TO CHANGE THE DEFINITION OF NATIVE HAWAIIAN

As you know, on Wednesday our Office requested that the Judiciary Committee defer decision-making on S.B. 1264, SD 1 until we had the opportunity to review and research certain questions raised by your committee related to the legal implications and possible consequences of the proposed amendments.

After extended discussion with legal counsel, we are now formally requesting that you hold S.B. 1264.

This decision to defer the single definition of Native Hawaiian without reference to blood quantum is a very difficult recommendation to make. In no way, should this deferral be misunderstood as a weakening of commitment by the Office and Board in our determination to unify the Hawaiian people and to implement the overwhelming will of our beneficiaries as reflected in the recent plebiscite.

Until an Hawaiian entitlement is identified and assured, OHA has decided that the best course at this time is to continue to research issues and questions which have raised by legislators and others. Once completed, final language implementing the will of our people to be one nation will be submitted to the Legislature.

With the support of the State Legislature, we do anticipate re-introducing this definition amendment in the next session.

In conclusion, our Office and Board wish to express their deep appreciation and respect for the care, patience, and dedication which each of you and your committees have demonstrated in the review of S.B. 1264. The issues raised are serious and deserving of both commitment and caution.

"Mr. President, at this time, I ask that Senator Ron Menor take to heart the request of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs that he hold the bill this year, or files the bill, and put this matter to rest so we can get on with many of the other important issues concerning the Hawaiian community.

"I would also like to again thank the committee members who participated and the many individuals who came to the hearings and shared their 'manao' with us because this is another example of the empowerment of the people. If they participate they can have their voices heard. Mahalo nui."

Senator Solomon also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, although I appreciate the remarks of the previous speaker I think it's only fair to clarify my position on the issue, being that I am one of the three that signed 'I do not concur' on the blood quantum issue.

"Mr. President, I feel quite strongly that the blood quantum issue is a matter of interpretation. The issue in my mind is not to create two classes of people. It is dealing with economic issues and political issues imposed on the Hawaiian nation through a congressional act that created the Hawaiian Homes Act. The issues, Mr. President, are land and entitlements -- 'aina' and 'kala' -- land and money.

"Decades after the enactment of the Hawaiian Homes Act, we have a situation where 3,000 persons of 50 percent or more are waiting for land awards. 2,000 part-Hawaiians have been disenfranchised from the 'aina' and program entitlements that we are hoping the Office of Hawaiian Affairs can address in the future.

"Politics is a numbers game. Voting and referendum, they too are numbers games. Of the 200,000 Hawaiians and part-Hawaiians, less than 10 percent are 50 percent or more of Hawaiian blood. Mr. President, I am 50 percent Hawaiian.

"I witnessed the concerns as expressed by those representing the 50 percent or more of Hawaiian ancestry. The issues that were raised through the numerous testimonies were issues dealing with due process. The questions were raised as to whether or not there were proper public hearings on the issue; whether or not the Hawaiian people could understand the questions that were posed through the referendum process. Replies from the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, when questioned about the public hearings was that they had a town hall meeting and it was viewed through Channel 13. My Third Senatorial District consists of many scattered Hawaiian communities throughout East Maui, North and South

Kohala, North and South Hilo and North Kona; unfortunately, they cannot catch Channel 13.

"Mr. President, it has always been my 'manao,' my thoughts on this issue, that if we truly want to get a feeling as to whether or not the blood quantum issue is fair to the Hawaiian people, perhaps we should have a special election involving only those that are 50 percent and more and let them decide as to whether or not they would like to share their entitlements as well as their 'aina,' land, with the rest of the Hawaiian persons less than 50 percent. To date, Mr. President, this has not been done.

"Thank you very much."

Senator Matsuura also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, whenever I rise to talk about the fish, you know what fish I'm talking about. The Senator from Makakilo mentioned about the lows and the highs, but this poor fish has always experienced the low side. But today, I want to publicly thank the Honolulu Advertiser because the fish has finally gotten a high. There is a letter to the editor, editorial section, giving the true facts about this beautiful and delicious fish called Anguilla.

"At this time, I want to publicly thank the Honolulu Advertiser. Thank you."

Senator Cobb then remarked:

"Mr. President, I'd like to rise on a point of personal privilege.

"Since I was one of those who signed the blood quantum measure, 'I do not concur,' I want to state for the record thanking both the chairman as well as the Senator from the Third Senatorial District. When I went into the hearing and I took time out from the initiative hearing to go upstairs and sit for three hours in the hearing, I made it a point of not making any kind of commitment for or against the measure because I wanted to hear what everyone had to say. And during the course of the hearing it became very obvious that not only was the wording on the ballot confusing to many people, but the timing of the election was a special referendum and not during the time of a normal primary or general election.

"The participation rate of those eligible was in all cases less than 50 percent. I felt, after listening to that, it would be incumbent upon us to try and get at least a 50 percent turnout and to do so during the context of a general election so that we would have a more accurate reflection of the feelings of those who would be affected.

"It was a combination of that and the fact that it was disclosed during the course of the hearing that OHA did not have the authority to conduct a formal public hearing, but only a so-called 'town meeting,' and did not have the authority to solicit testimony from those who were going to be affected by their proposal; it caused me to sign 'I do not concur.'

"I hope these kinds of problems are resolved because I think the issue is an important one that should be addressed, but it should be decided by a majority of those who will be impacted and that should be done in the course of a general election and not a special referendum.

"Thank you."

Senator Menor remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to respond to the discussion that is taking place on the blood quantum legislation.

"In response to Senator Crozier's remarks, as he indicated the Senate Judiciary Committee did raise a number of legal issues and concerns about the bill including possible constitutional questions; the fact that the language in the bill, especially with respect to the proposed change to the definition of Native Hawaiian, was broad and quite general and as presently worded it could have had a negative impact on the Hawaiian Homes program. And, also, concern was expressed about the possible impact and relationship of the proposed bill to the ongoing settlement negotiations between the state and Office of Hawaiian Affairs in trying to arrive at an appropriate settlement with respect to all of the Hawaiian people here in the State of Hawaii.

"I appreciate the fact that the Office of Hawaiian Affairs has taken the time to carefully review the legal questions and concerns that we have raised in the context of this legislative body and also in the Judiciary Committee hearings. I agree with their assessment from a legal standpoint and, therefore, in accordance with their request, I will make a recommendation to my committee during our 2:00 o'clock decision-making this afternoon on the blood quantum bill that the bill be held this session."

Senator Reed then said:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"As the third Senator who signed 'I do not concur' on the blood quantum legislation, I'd like to add my voice to the issue.

"I have, as you know, Molokai, Maui and Lanai in my district with a heavy concentration of Native Hawaiians. I have received more phone calls and letters on this issue than any other this year from Native Hawaiians, and their primary point was this: those presently defined as Native Hawaiian have been so miserably served by the federal government and the state government that it makes no sense to dilute this service further at this time by changing the blood quantum. I want to make that point for the record.

"Also, if I may, I'd like to switch subjects for a moment.

"Mr. President, your disappointment, frustration and even anger was apparent when your gun control bills were killed in committee.

"I happen to believe that any gun control measures beyond the relatively stringent controls that are already in place in Hawaii would be counterproductive in that they would produce a community where only the criminals have guns.

"But I share your feelings when I see the possibility of legislation such as the initiative being killed in committee. This all powerful chairman system is a time-honored practice that is not right. It is undemocratic. It is an evasive tactic designed to prevent a public vote by the full Senate.

"As you know, Mr. President, I propose abolishing the system and changing the function of committees. The function of committees should be to screen bills so that the number of bills is reduced without killing issues. For instance, if we have 20 bills on initiative, the function of the committee should be to reduce that to one bill or the smallest number possible to best present the issue for a public vote on the floor.

"The people who pay us to represent them have the right to know where each of us stands on every issue of importance to the people of Hawaii.

"Mr. President, will you yield to a question?"

The Chair responded in the affirmative and Senator Reed asked:

"Mr. President, will you abolish the all powerful chairman system? Will you announce today, now, that all issues must be voted on on the floor of the Senate?"

Senator Crozier interjected:

"With your permission, Mr. President, what rule is the speaker before me referring to? I don't think there is such a rule."

The President responded:

"The question being posed to the Chair is what the Chair would recommend in terms of structure, in terms of committee chairmanship.

"The answer is I will not change my position on placing responsibility with the chairmen, so long as I have the understanding of the majority of the members in this body that pursuant to that granting of authority comes also the idea of responsibility and accountability; that whatever action that particular chairman takes, it is his responsibility to accept the consequences of his decision and he is the one that will be held accountable to the electorate. The final judgement will be with the electorate.

"If I am judged on what has happened in past years, the record has been clear. People have indicated their choices of people to be elected to this august body and the changes have been very slight. Most Senate chairmen have been reelected because I really and firmly believe that they have acted responsibly. We may disagree with what bills they may hold back but I do support and have always supported the right of the chairman to determine the fate of legislation that has been referred to his or her committee. That's my position."

Senator Blair then added:

"Mr. President, rising on a point of personal privilege.

"Listening to the previous remarks by the Minority Floor Leader, I was tempted to jump up and yell, 'Objection, assumes facts not in evidence.' Our judicial system is wise in that, when you make allegations, you have to lay a foundation for them.

"It's important to recognize that there's no foundation for the criticism that the Minority Floor Leader made. He is assuming that a committee chairman will do something unilaterally. He assumes facts not in evidence. That is, (1) that a decision has already been made, or (2) that that decision, when it is made, will not be made with the prior concurrence of the members of the committee.

"I urge Senator Reed check with the chairman before he makes scurrilous remarks on the floor. It might be that both of the chairmen with subject matter jurisdiction will be polling their committee members and not acting arbitrarily as individuals. That they will reflect the decisions of their committees. If that decision makes the Minority Floor Leader unhappy, that is unfortunate; but it is the facts of life in a deliberative body where the work is delegated to the committees.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Reed then responded:

"Mr. President, either I'm not expressing myself well or the Majority Floor Leader is not listening. I have written in my notes that I delivered a few minutes ago the possibility of legislation, such as initiative, being killed in committee. I'm not making scurrilous comments about chairmen holding bills in committee, and I need not even have mentioned initiative. I'm talking about the practice of holding bills in committee and killing them, whether it's initiative or parental consent or whatever the bill is, I'm talking about it hypothetically."

"I'm not standing here criticizing the chairman of the Judiciary Committee or the Energy Committee for holding the initiative bill."

"I understand they're having a press conference this afternoon and I don't know what they are going to do. My reference to initiative was simply an example. So if Senator Blair is going to accuse me of making scurrilous comments, he should at least give me the chance to make them first, please."

Senator McMurdo also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, believe it or not I'm not here to discuss the initiative at this point. That doesn't mean I don't reserve the right to do so at some other time. However, I would like to ask, Mr. President, if you would correct your statement."

"You said, 'he, the chairman.' I would like to remind you that there are any number of women in this august body who are also chairmen ... chairwomen, excuse me."

The Chair responded:

"I thought I covered that very well, but in case it was not let me state again very emphatically, 'Yes, the chairwomen and the chairmen,' will be respected."

Senator Matsuura then said:

"Mr. President, since the Senator from Maui mentioned about powerful chairmen, I just want to clarify the position of the chairmanship."

"I want the Senator to know that both chairmen and other members sat through seven hours of testimonies regarding the initiative measure. At the end, there were only three or four of us left at the podium. I could have at that point taken a vote and the measure could have been killed. However, I deferred decision-making. Many of the members were not there because even my vice chairman had his own committee hearing at the same time. There was a hearing of the Ways and Means Committee and there were many who had other public functions in their district to attend."

"We gave to each member of both committees a complete packet of all the testimonies that were received. We gave the members enough time to read those testimonies so they could make their decision on the testimonies that were presented."

"It is true that we will announce the decision of both committees this afternoon. I have polled my committee members whether or not they would be for initiative or against it. I can speak only for my committee at this point but I don't have the votes to pass that measure to the floor. I have nine members in my committee and for that measure to go on to the floor I must have at least

five members voting in favor of the measure and I don't have it."

"So, in this instance, it's not the chairman that holds the bill in committee, rather it's the members. And I am a member of the committee. Thank you very much."

Senator Holt then said:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege."

"This morning I had a meeting in my office with Representative Cachola, members from DBED, HVB and the Hotel Association to get an update on the status of the negotiations with hotel management and employees of Union Local 5, primarily to see where we are with respect to having a strike contingency plan, if in fact we do have a strike. There was a lot of discussion."

"The Legislature has set aside \$280,000 in DBED's budget for these kinds of changing market conditions or down turns in the economy. They do have a plan ready if there is a strike."

"One thing that did come out of the meeting was that they felt that maybe an offer from the great intervenor, who's out of town, to offer his assistance would be welcome and I'm just asking you, Mr. President, because you're always talking to him, if you can ask him to maybe to send an offer via telephone or something to the parties to keep talking till he gets home. Thank you."

The Chair answered:

"I will certainly take that message to him when he gets home although I'm not sure when he's coming home. I'll certainly pass the message on."

Senator A. Kobayashi, on behalf of the Senate, extended the following good wishes:

"Mr. President, today is the birthday of one our colleagues. This person is sometimes 'the light at the end of the tunnel and sometimes a train roaring down through that tunnel' but we all love her and respect her for all that she does for the people of this state. Happy Birthday, Senator Malama Solomon!"

At 12:35 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Blair, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate stood in recess until 7:00 o'clock p.m.

"Mr. President, speaking in favor of the bill with slight reservations. I believe there has been much discussion about various ways of improving this bill in some slight manner. However, overall, the bill seeks to address a difficult and touchy issue of trying on one hand to get for the consumer the best parts and repairs available, but, on the other hand, not trying to increase prices. The Senate reconvened at 11:00 o'clock a.m.

S.B. No. 2920:

Senator Reed moved to amend S.B. No. 2920 in accordance with Amendment No. 1, seconded by Senator McMurdo.

Senator Crozier then rose on a point of order and stated:

"Mr. President, I request a ruling of the Chair as to whether the amendment to S.B. No. 2920 is in order and proper before the Senate."

At 11:01 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:18 o'clock a.m.

The Chair then ruled as follows:

"Members of the Senate, after consideration, the Chair rules that the amendment is not in order because it is not germane to Senate Bill 2920 which is the bill at hand."

Senator Reed then withdrew his motion to Amendment No. 1 to S.B. No. 2920.

At 11:20 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:21 o'clock a.m.

At this time, Senator McMurdo withdrew her second to the motion to amend S.B. No. 2920.

By unanimous consent, action on S.B. No. 2920, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO COUNTIES," was deferred until Wednesday, March 7, 1990.

S.B. No. 2342:

Senator Reed then moved to amend S.B. No. 2342 in accordance with Amendment No. 2, seconded by Senator McMurdo.

Senator Crozier rose on a point of order and said:

"Mr. President, again I ask for a ruling of the Chair as to whether the amendment before us on S.B. No. 2342 is in order and proper before the Senate."

The Chair then ruled as follows:

"The Chair has been asked for a ruling on Amendment 2 (S.B. No. 2342).

"Members of the Senate, after some consideration, the Chair rules that the amendment is not in order because it is not germane to Senate Bill 2342 which is the bill at hand. The ruling is made in accordance with Senate Rule 3(9), authorizing the President to decide all questions of order, and with Senate Rule 83 which designates Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure as the state's guide of parliamentary law.

"Section 402 of Mason's states that every amendment proposed must be germane in order to be in order. According to Mason's, to determine whether an amendment is germane it has to be 'relevant, appropriate, and in a natural and logical sequence to the subject matter' of the bill to be amended.

"The Chair finds that the amendment does not meet these conditions. Senate Bill 2342 deals with general county housekeeping matters. The amendment provides a specific proposition which is not in keeping with the bill's fundamental purposes.

"I call the members' attention to Stand. Com. Rep. 2422 on Senate Bill 2342 which enumerates the subject matter covered by the bill. The bill does not deal with any other matter.

"Specifically, as enumerated by Stand. Com. Rep. 2422, this bill: (1) provides that the publication of comprehensive ordinance codes of all counties be updated and indexed as provided by ordinance; (2) repeals the requirement that the counties publish the supplements to the codes each year; (3) provides that the head of each county council immediately submit to the county's budget director a schedule of expenditures following the enactment of the operating budget ordinance; (4) repeals the prohibition on the imposition or collection of ad valorem assessments by the counties to replenish the reserve fund; and (5) allows the medical examiner of a county to assist the medical examiner of any other county. Clearly, the bill does not deal with the subject of zoning by initiative.

"It is evident to the Chair that Floor Amendment 2 is not relevant, not appropriate and not in the natural, logical sequence of the subject matter of Senate Bill 2342. It is not germane and therefore is out of order."

Senator Reed responded:

"Mr. President, I disagree and would appeal the ruling of the Chair.

"You quote Mason's Section 402 and I guess the issue here is the definition of 'germane.' I believe that Section 402, number 3, makes it quite clear that this amendment is indeed germane to the bill.

"For your benefit, I will read number 3. According to Mason's:

"To be germane, the amendment is required only to relate to the same subject. It may entirely change the effect ... of the ... motion or measure and still be germane to the subject."

"This amendment that I have proposed does not even change the subject. It is a 'tack on'; it adds to; does not change the subject. It says, 'to be germane, the amendment is required only to relate to the same subject.' The subject of the bill says 'A Bill for an Act Relating to Counties.' Certainly, giving the counties the authority to

... or giving the people of the counties the authority to zone by initiative is germane to the subject of the bill.

"Also, the committee report specifically states, 'The purpose of this bill is to make several housekeeping amendments to the laws pertaining to the counties.' As we all know, the counties already have initiative on the books and have used it in the past. This is simply a housekeeping amendment. It is not the creation of a new law. There has been confusion across our state due to the recent Supreme Court rulings and other opinions that have caused the counties to be confused as to whether they can use the existing statutes to provide for zoning by initiative.

"This is simply housekeeping. It simply clarifies for the counties the legislative intent that indeed zoning by initiative, as presently provided by statute in the counties, is permissible. This is simply a housekeeping measure and is therefore germane to the subject of the bill."

Senator Blair then rose to speak in support of the Chair's ruling and said:

"Mr. President, rising in support of the Chair's ruling. I would like to point out that there's another issue here, perhaps even bigger than the terribly important issue of county zoning by initiative. We have to be careful not to accept the argument that the end justifies the means. We have to operate in accordance with our duly adopted rules.

"Some of us would very much like to see this amendment pass, but if it's allowed to pass we are both violating our rules and accepting a procedure which can be used to bypass the committee hearing process in order to sneak things through the legislative process. Before we accept piggybacking as a legitimate means of legislating, we have to consider all potential uses of it and not simply accept the argument that because we desire the result in this instance that therefore we will accept the process.

"I can recall when piggybacking was accepted procedure and it was usually for ill rather than for good. Because in this instance the result is something which I desire, it should not lull me into complacency and into accepting piggybacking as a proper procedure for a deliberative body.

"Therefore, while I share my colleagues's interest in having this provision added to Chapter 46, I cannot agree that the end justifies the means. I would prefer to follow our rules and wait until a House bill with an appropriate title comes across and hope that the matter can be taken up again by the committees in a less confrontational fashion. Therefore I support the ruling of the Chair."

Senator McMurdo, in support of Amendment 2, remarked:

"Mr. President, words like 'piggybacking' and 'sneak attacks' have no place in this august body today. This is a bill of tremendous interest to the entire State of Hawaii, to all of the public. They have a right to hear this bill discussed on the floor, which is what we're doing now except we're discussing whether or not it is germane. But as far as piggybacking and sneaking, nothing could be further from the truth.

"I might remind the previous speaker that in this case everyone in here has the right to vote either one of these, the fact that it is germane or not or the fact that we have put in an amendment for initiative. You have your vote and you are entitled to use it. And I do take umbrage with the previous speaker's remarks on this."

Senator Cobb also rose to support the Chair's ruling and said:

"Mr. President, I rise in support of the ruling of the Chair and doing so make reference to the fact that several years ago when we did adopt Mason's Manual of Parliamentary Procedure to replace Cushing's, there was considerable discussion in the caucus as to the fact that the advantage of Mason's was that (1) it was more specific than Cushing's; (2) that it covered a much wider variety of areas than Cushing's; (3) that generally its reference was easier; (4) that it was generally more restrictive in terms of prohibiting the practice that now goes on in the U.S. Congress, namely, ad valorem floor amendments that are not germane in any way, shape or form to the bill; and (5) that it made it easier to legislate from the standpoint of clarity in single matter subjects.

"Perhaps some of the speakers who addressed the issue are not really familiar with what happened in piggybacking. Those of us who have been here from the mid-1970s on, unfortunately are familiar with the concept and the practice of piggybacking. And it reached some rather large proportions, such to the extent that the House of Representatives finally adopted an anti-piggybacking rule to prohibit it.

"It's an entirely different matter if a separate measure comes over and is dealt with by a subject matter committee, and if it relates to counties, they take out everything in the bill and then want to establish a Senate position in favor of initiative. I would support that as a supporter of initiative. But I think it would only cloud our future if we were to ignore not only what is stated in Mason's but the history of piggybacking as it's happened in this Legislature.

"Thank you."

Senator Reed responded:

"Mr. President, I was not here in the mid-'70s or whenever it was you were talking about relative to piggybacking, but if piggybacking gets an issue to the floor of the Senate for a public vote, then I'm in favor of it regardless of what you call it. Compared to the present system that allows decisions to be made out of the light of public scrutiny, any procedure that forces public decision-making would be an improvement regardless of what you call it.

"That said, I would like to simply express what I believe is the key question here before my appeal goes to the floor for a vote. And that is, are you going to be loyal to your conscience and your constituents or are you going to be loyal to this fraternity we call the state Senate?

"Friday, I was talking to a senator and asked him, casually, what he was going to do on this issue of initiative, and he said, 'Well, it's a real dilemma for me because while I support initiative, I have to consider whether I'm willing to buck the leadership -- whether I want to put myself at odds with the leadership and thereby risk chairmanship, etc.

"And that to me is a classic illustration of what I have tried to express in more philosophical discussions on this floor in the past, the loyalties of those who comprise this Senate. We have forgotten who we serve. We have forgotten where our loyalties are. The people who comprise the majority of this Senate have become disloyal to their constituents, disloyal to their conscience. Instead, they have become loyal to this fraternity for fear of being exiled to smaller offices or losing their chairmanships. As

long as we have that kind of cowardice, we are going to have bad government. Thank you."

Senator Blair then said:

"Mr. President, a couple of points in support of the Chair's ruling.

"First of all, I don't believe I used the word 'sneaky' in the context of this amendment. I used it in reference to the historical use of piggybacking. If I inadvertently did, I would withdraw it. This amendment violates our rules, but because the issue has been debated in three committees it is not a sneaky amendment.

"I believe that the public expects us to be a deliberative body. If we act as a Committee of the Whole and do not allow bills to be handled in committee, we will become to that extent a less deliberative body.

"Now, I might have a greater willingness to go along with the Minority Floor Leader's approach had there not been an opportunity for the public to be heard on this and it were later in the session. We have other vehicles coming over from the House which can through the committee structure be amended. We do not need to violate our rules.

"I think it is unfortunate that this issue, as it resolved itself in the first half of the legislative session, was a very divisive yes-or-no decision with no real amendments proposed in committee by either side. If I can use a sexist term, a 'macho' approach was adopted by both the proponents and the opponents of the bill.

"I'm hopeful that in the second half, using an appropriate bill and acting as a deliberative body, we will look for common ground and can go through the process one more time. Perhaps we will find some common ground, so that we can have a form of initiative at the county level which will provide the citizens of each county the opportunity to have the final word on these matters, but incorporating some safeguards that caused the opponents concern.

"I hope that the subject matter committees will look beyond 'you win, I lose' or 'I win and you lose.' I think we can meet the legitimate concerns and perhaps everybody can win, certainly the people of Hawaii.

"In conclusion, by supporting the ruling of the Chair we are not kowtowing to some internal power structure, we are abiding by our rules. As one who prides himself on not kowtowing to anybody, not even to defamatory remarks delivered on this floor, whether delivered by a member of the Majority or a member of the Minority, I won't be bullied into voting one way or the other on this issue. Under our rules, I do hope that the committee structure will come into play again in the second half.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

The Chair then responded:

"Members of the Senate, the Chair would just like to make one comment relative to the discussion of the Minority Floor Leader.

"I want to assure you, Mr. Floor Leader, that there's been no discussion about removing people from chairmanships. The Chair accepts the responsibility for this action today. I have talked to my colleagues and I have told them that this is the procedure I would like to follow and the responsibility lies at this podium.

"I want to make it very clear that no chairman in this body has been threatened, not even a hint of being threatened, that should they not support the Chair, this would constitute their not continuing being chairman of their respective committees.

"I say this one more time. It is the Chair's responsibility. The Chair takes this action and I will be held accountable for it."

The Chair then stated:

"Members of the Senate, the matter before this body is, if you sustain the ruling of the Chair you will indicate by saying 'aye,' those that are contrary will vote 'no.'"

The ruling of the Chair was sustained on a voice vote.

can have total jurisdiction over submerged lands and surface water on Kaneohe Bay.

And if it works out in Kaneohe Bay I think there's no reason why it cannot apply to Moanalua Bay or Hanalei Bay on Kauai. Senator Koki rose to speak against the bill and remarked:

"Mr. President, I am speaking against the measure.

"I want to address the A+ program. I have here petitions and letters and have received a lot of phone calls regarding it. I have petitions requesting for more vice principals, for special education staff, for reduced class size, student-teacher ratio, and it really goes on and on.

"To what degree is the state prepared to get into the child care business? We have hardly seen the pilot A+ program get started and already we are going ahead with a permanent program. What is a pilot program for?

"The administration did a tremendous public relations campaign for A+ and built up a solid constituency for it, so that if we, as legislators, spoke out against it, it would seem we were against children.

"The dust is settling and taxpayers are getting a better picture. I took a survey among my constituents, and about two-thirds were either against A+ or had some reservations about taxpayers subsidizing it.

"The longer the state-sponsored program goes on, the more private providers are going to go out of business. Who, then, will provide before-school care, summer care, Christmas and spring break and all the other holidays? Whatever the answer is, the public will demand that the state somehow provide.

"I'm quoting from a newspaper, 'Gary Lee, a parent, said his 6-year-old daughter now attends A+ but has become a latchkey child from 6:30 to 7:30 a.m. because her morning private provider was forced out of business. 'I feel the A+ program was not well thought out,' Lee said.'

"Maui County testified that the 20:1 ratio of students to adults was much too high. After 3 years of experience they have said it should be 12:1. Already, next year, the DOE has said they need to lower the ratio to 15:1. I wouldn't be surprised if the 12:1 is the ultimate goal, as Maui County predicted.

"What started out to be a relatively inexpensive project could conceivably cost \$20-\$30 million in a few years. Let's put that in perspective:

"Last year we dedicated an additional \$45 million to upgrade the schools' physical facilities, and just visiting any of the numerous number of facilities ... and it's a strange thing, I've never had any letters requesting more money for school facilities ... they're in such bad shape and the amounts would be so huge that they're not even asking for it. Thirty million dollars every year could nearly double our commitment to facility improvement.

"We have been struggling with class size. We need more classrooms and school teachers to reduce the ratio. What happened to our plan to reduce class size (grades 2-6) to 20:1? We did it for kindergarten and first grade, but teachers from grades 2 to 6 call me and tell me that they are having 31 students and they have friends that have up to 40 students. It is my impression as they tell me that although the DOE reduced the class size of kindergarten and first grade, they have simply increased the size of grades 2 to 6 to such a great amount that right now they're requesting a 24:1 ratio, which seems small to them but it certainly is still way too high.

"We have situations in which we have 2 to 4 classes meet in a single classroom.

"Thirty million dollars can build 250 to 300 new classrooms every single year.

"I could go on and on and I have been getting calls from teachers vying for funding of one program or another. I have letters and petitions, as I have mentioned before. The educational needs are endless. Unfortunately, the amount of money that we have is not.

"The A+ program is not based on need. We all have wants but we need really to get down to the needs.

"I know mothers who stay home so they can be the child care provider -- they sacrifice the extra income and live in a smaller apartment or do with less. They are being asked to pay for child care of others who go to work, who get the extra income. This is not fair. We can provide for vouchers to private care givers for families in lower income brackets. Where there are no private care givers available, we can look into running a small A+ program where those who can afford to pay, pay the market rate, and those who can't are charged on a sliding scale. Why should we always do things at a loss when we run a program?

"Gerald Yoshikane of Windward Oahu schools said (I'm quoting a paper now; I don't want to take him out of context. He was in favor of the A+ program but here's a part of his quote that I took.): 'The A+ program is going very well, although some parents are not telephoning the schools to say when their children will be absent. Some parents, because of the low cost, don't take this program seriously, and they don't send their children on a regular basis.'

"The A+ program on a large scale is disrupting the educational process.

"If more students sign up, some teachers will be forced to give up their homeroom. This is their 'office.' This is where they keep their materials and equipment and plan for the next day. Can you imagine going to work and you have to bring all your material and equipment to work every day -- and take them home after work? Already one teacher I talked to has had material missing because they sometimes use her room.

"What about the school kids who won't have a homeroom desk where they can keep their text books and supplies? They would have to take them home nearly everyday to make sure they don't get any graffiti done on their textbooks.

"I have talked to several principals and one who is not participating as a site coordinator said she spends at least 5 hours a week in meetings regarding A+. Those that are site coordinators spend twice that time and more. How can they serve their school, teachers and students for educational purposes when their day is interrupted by meetings and other duties taken up by the A+ program?

"This brings me to another point:

"What is the goal of our Department of Education?

"Are we about the business of education? Let's restore our school's physical facilities. Let's spend our resources to really reduce class size -- not to 24:1 which is way too high, but 20:1. Let's compensate school teachers who've advanced themselves by getting advanced degrees and training. Let's spend our money and energy to get SCBM rolling. Let's give our principals more vice principals. Let's have tutorial assistance to all needy students. All of this takes money.

"I have a newspaper article that says the DOE is cutting \$5.3 million from their appropriated budget. The Board of Education itself was unaware of these cuts. \$400,000 was to be cut from 10 of Leeward Oahu's poorest schools that help students overcome low achievement, chronic absenteeism and other ills.

"\$500,000 was cut that was earmarked to buy textbooks? What is our educational system about if we won't buy textbooks? What is the point of budgeting for all these reforms and not having enough money to carry them out properly?

"Some A+ workers have been notified that their pay will be held up for 8 weeks. Can we really afford this multi-million dollar A+ program?

"It's not only the DOE who's to blame for our low SAT scores and literacy problems. We keep tinkering with the system and keep expanding their responsibilities.

"I have had many, many teachers and principals call me complaining of our lack of commitment to real educational reform and needs.

"I would like to quote one teacher who wrote: 'At a time of high rhetoric in favor of education, it is time for the legislature of this state to place resources into the schools equal to the message.'

'The schools do not need more administrators and curriculum writers (who are ignored in reality in the school); the schools do not need more PR to cover up the shortcomings of the department; and the schools do not need virtually free child care after school at the expense of the educational program.'

"I therefore vote against this bill and encourage you also."

Senator B. Kobayashi spoke in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill, but not without some reservation.

"When articles like this appear in the newspapers, this one from the Advertiser this morning, suggesting that the supplemental budget for education has been very severely cut, I do, as the previous speaker has indicated, have some concerns about whether we can really afford this A+ program.

"However, this bill is a vehicle bill with many blanks in it. We have not filled in many of these blanks and, in fact, have not really attempted to as of yet.

"Discussions are proceeding right now on several critical areas and hopefully in the next few weeks these discussions will prove successful. For example, there is currently under discussion, drafted by the DOE, a contract to be used by private providers to afford them the opportunity to participate in the A+ program. Interestingly, the private providers have countered with their own version of a contract. So we now have at least two proposals on deck to allow private providers to get involved in the A+ program. This, I think, is real progress.

"We also have a proposal from the private providers about a sliding fee scale, which goes up far beyond what the department currently suggests is equitable for parents who participate in A+. This sliding scale is also an item which I think deserves very careful consideration and I support a sliding fee scale which will have at least three or more steps to it.

"We also have gotten a lot of comments from people who support or not support A+. Like the previous speaker, I too did a survey of my constituents. As you know, every January I send out a questionnaire to every household in my district and I asked a question this year on A+. The question is 'Do you support the use of tax dollars for the A+ after-school program?' One-half said yes; one-third said no; and one-sixth said not sure or depends.

"On the question of whether they thought parents were paying a fair share, there was almost a 100 percent even break between parents dividing on 'yes, parents pay a fair share' and 'no, parents are paying too little.'

"At any rate, we will be discussing the sliding fee scale later on as this session continues.

"On the crucial point of whether we can afford A+, let me say this. A+ is definitely a supplemental program. If A+ is pitted against the regular DOE program, I think we should all support the regular DOE program. If the House position prevails and they gut the regular DOE educational budget, I think A+ will have to take second

position. However, on the Senate side, we are still developing our budget and until we get that budget through the Senate and into conference, we will not know what our position will be on A+, on the regular school budget and their relative priorities.

"For now, we are seeking means of improving A+ and I believe we are still in support of the regular education budget over the A+ program.

"I would urge that members support A+ and hope that we can come out with a fair and equitable program, one that will not only help a large number of parents and children but also one that will not hurt our regular education budget. Thank you."

Senator McMurdo, also in support of the bill, said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill, only to congratulate the previous speaker on a very firm and fair stand. I think we should let A+ have its chance, unless it does supersede the other educational budget. Thank you."

"Mr. President, I'm rising to speak in favor of this bill which is better known to more people as the Chapter 42 bill. It deals with purchase of services, grants-in-aid and subsidies.

"This bill has taken almost a year to put together and we had a survey of almost 400 individuals, the departments -- Budget and Finance, Department of Health, Department of Human Services, the AG -- the providers, and a great deal of input in restructuring the bill after the first try. This should clear up many of the problems that we have had recently and, although the purchase of services and the grants-in-aid are through many departments, they are extremely important to the Department of Human Services and the Department of Health.

"In the past, we have had problems with contracts being signed for private providers at a reasonable length of time, some as long as five and six months, and the same way with the money that they were to receive for services. This bill should help to straighten that out and to see that we do get the services provided in a more efficient and certainly in a more humane way.

"I urge my fellow Senators to vote 'yes' on this bill. Thank you."

Senator B. Kobayashi also spoke in support of the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the bill and to support the previous speaker.

"Chapter 42 has been a long and difficult process for many organizations, but it has been a process that has essentially worked. There have been, however, many problems with the process including late payments and slow contracting process. This bill will correct those problems. It has been a disgrace that almost every year for the last several years we have entered the legislative session in January with a few contracts not yet signed and with many contracts signed but no payments available to the people providing the services. Over the years, numerous organizations have had to borrow from private financial institutions at market rates in order to have money to meet payroll for their employees. This bill will go a long way in correcting those practices.

"I would urge that, if anything, consideration be made for strengthening some of these provisions. We have departments that have been unusually good in providing Chapter 42 processing, and others which have not.

"I would note that the testimony supporting this bill was overwhelming except for opposition from Budget and Finance and the Attorney General. Some of their objections have been corrected in this draft of the bill.

"But, there were approximately 20 testimonies in support of the bill, including the Department of Health. The Department of Health, as you might know, has been one of the culprits in slow processing and slow payments, so it's good to see them on the right side.

"Thank you very much."

"Our voter registration in the past decade has increased only 10 to 12 percent. There is no need to expend money, especially of the magnitude that we're talking about, to buy these expensive machines.

"Let me enumerate the advantages of our current system: 1) It is mechanical, the machine is - it's hard to damage, easy to fix; 2) it is inexpensive - any major problems, you just throw them away; 3) it is small - you can store them in a space a foot square and 4 inches deep; easy to handle and deliver; 4) the same ballot counter can be used for absentee voters; 5) we have 4,500 machines and can expand the amount with very little cost; and 6) a clear audit trail in ballot cards.

"The disadvantages of electronic voting machines are: 1) it's very large and very heavy; handling and delivery would be a problem; and storage space needed would be unbelievable. We may have to take into account climate and dust control problems. These are large computers, depending on the one you choose, the stacking would be a problem. Your cost of storage would be extremely high. Your breakage, naturally when you handle computers, will be high.

"2) The initial cost. How many machines are we buying? From what I understand, we want to buy 1,500 machines which will give us 5 machines per precinct. We have about 300 precincts.

"In the last general election, in the peak hours, we had a half-hour to one hour waiting lines, and this with 4,500 voting machines.

"Electronic machines do not allow a voter to vote much faster than our present mechanical machine because most of the time is spent reading the ballot. If 4,500 machines are presently inadequate, as demonstrated by our previous election, what will the ultimate cost and the amount of machines be? Can we afford to buy 4,000 to 5,000 electronic machines at \$5,000 a piece?

"3) We are also talking about maintenance cost. They're much more fragile than our present machines. Maintenance, as they get older, will be a problem. As I mentioned, the damage in handling them. Computers are much more prone to operating problems.

"The present system has very insignificant maintenance cost, as I said before.

"4) This system, also, will not work with absentee voting. So we are going to need another system for absentee voting.

"5) If any problems develop we may not have an audit trail.

"The main advantage of the electronic voting system is speed in tallying results. We can speed up our present system by simply buying more ballot counting computers.

"If other counties much larger than ours are doing it with a mechanical ballot system, we can certainly do it too.

"The problem becomes very apparent when voters line up to vote with only about one-third the amount of machines to vote on, particularly if there are going to be changes to the constitution or city charter.

"Let's spend a few thousand dollars more to buy more mechanical voting machines which cost only a little over \$100 each, so voters can go in and out very quickly even when the ballots are laden with amendments to the constitution or city charter. Buy more computer ballot counters so we can get the final tally quicker.

"Let's not throw away millions of dollars for a less efficient and more costly system to be in with the electronic age.

"I've spoken to a company that markets both electronic and ballot voting systems, and they said that over 50 percent of the country are still on the ballot system. Counties on electronic systems are much larger than ours. The person I talked to didn't know why we are considering an electronic system at our current size.

"Thank you."

Senator Menor rose to speak in support of the measure and remarked:

"Mr. President, I'd like to speak in favor of this particular bill.

"In response to the previous speaker's remarks, I'd like to point out that the Judiciary Committee undertook a very careful and exhaustive analysis on this bill and the proposal contained therein for the state to move ahead toward the eventual purchase and implementation of electronic voting machines.

"Last session, when the lieutenant governor indicated that he wanted support of our committee and the entire state Legislature for the phasing in and purchase of electronic voting machines, we indicated to the lieutenant governor, at that time, that we wanted to study the matter more carefully because of the fact that substantial amounts of monies were being requested. But during the interim, your committee along with other legislators did look at the merits of such a system and, based on our review of the effectiveness of systems that have been tried on the mainland and given the consideration that we gave to this piece of legislation during the course of our committee hearings this session, we have come to the conclusion that the benefits to be gained from implementing this system far outweigh the costs that would be involved in setting up the electronic voting machines throughout the State of Hawaii.

"Studies have clearly shown, in terms of those jurisdictions that have tried electronic voting machines, in terms of tabulating and recording votes, that the tabulation process can be done much more quickly, efficiently and effectively than can our current punch-card system.

"Surveys on the mainland of jurisdictions that have tried the electronic voting machine also indicate that such a system is extremely user friendly and they've gotten positive results and feedback from voters in those jurisdictions with respect to the use and voting on the electronic machines.

"In fact, during the last election the lieutenant governor set up pilot projects, demonstration projects, in various precincts; one of which included a precinct in my own district. And subsequent to the demonstration projects, the lieutenant governor conducted a survey of the voters in that area who participated in the projects and what the office found was that there was a tremendous amount of support and an extremely positive feedback in support of electronic voting here in the State of Hawaii.

"So in terms of the receptiveness of the voters of the State of Hawaii to such a system, that receptiveness has been clearly documented.

"I also want to point out, in terms of maintenance and repair, that the trend in mainland jurisdictions now is to move away from the punch-card system and toward the adoption and implementation of the electronic voting system, given the fact that it's been shown that the punch-card system has become, to some extent, obsolete. There's strong indication that companies are going to be

going more to the electronic voting system as opposed to the punch-card system. If we continue to remain with our system which in some future point in time could be obsolete, then I think we may have problems in future elections, in terms of getting timely repair and maintenance of a system that is outdated, where companies that provide voting machines are moving toward electronic voting.

"For all of these reasons, I would strongly recommend to this body that we support this measure. It's a positive step in the right direction. It's going to facilitate and improve the voting process and, in that respect, improve the participation of the electorate in future elections here in the State of Hawaii. Thank you."

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor with reservations. The bill has two sections. The one section having to do with civil liability, I fully agree with. The second section has to do with what has been known as the criminalization of AIDS. In that section, I think it could be stated more explicitly that the transmission must be knowingly done.

"We have had, for instance, a recent case at Kapiolani Medical Center where a mother gave birth but did not know, prior to her going into the hospital, that she had AIDS. There is, of course, a lot of denial in this area and some people, including many hemophiliacs, have purposely delayed or not taken the test to see whether they have AIDS.

"The AIDS problem is one of prevention since there is no cure. And prevention involves the changing of behavior. It is very difficult to change behavior under pressure of criminal sanctions, so I would urge that while we support the bill, changes could be made to explicitly indicate that knowing behavior amongst those extreme individuals or extreme cases be the encompassing feature of this bill. Thank you."

Senator Reed also spoke in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill and to respond to the previous speaker. This bill would require that a mother who transmitted the AIDS virus to her child at birth be held liable, either civilly or criminally."

"Mr. President, I rise in strong support of Senate Bill 2608, S.D.1.

"I urge my colleagues to support this particular legislation because I believe it recognizes that the commission of violent crimes involving the use of firearms in Hawaii presents a serious problem that needs to be addressed. This bill addresses that particular problem, not by penalizing the law-abiding citizens from all walks of life who at present own firearms for legitimate purposes, but by focusing on the real source of the problem by cracking down on those criminals who would illegally use firearms to commit crimes against innocent victims.

"This bill will adopt that approach by toughening penalties with respect to the illegal use and possession of firearms, including the imposition of a mandatory 20-year prison term without possibility of parole for those who illegally use semi-automatic firearms to commit crimes against other people. In this regard, I believe that this piece of legislation sends out a clear message and a clear signal to society that the criminal element who chooses to use firearms illegally to commit crimes that that particular practice is not to be condoned and that those who wish to engage in doing so are going to have to serve time in prison, behind bars, where they belong.

"Accordingly, I strongly urge my fellow colleagues to support this positive piece of legislation and I especially urge my Republican colleagues to support this legislation regarding the illegal use of firearms."

Senator George supported the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I would just like to express my regret in voting for this measure with considerable lack of enthusiasm. I don't think it goes far enough. I don't think the signal that it sends is clear enough. I believe there are others in this chamber who share my opinion, but I doubt that anyone will vote against it."

Senator Reed also rose to speak in support of the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill and to voice my disagreement with the previous speaker. I am also rising to commend the chairman of the Judiciary Committee for doing an excellent job of maintaining a clear focus on this issue.

"Our shared goal is to reduce criminal use of firearms. The means to attain that goal is not to remove firearms from the law-abiding community but rather to strengthen the penalties for the criminal use of firearms, and that is precisely what the actions of the Judiciary Committee chairman will do. Thank you."

Senator Chang also supported the measure and stated:

"Mr. President, while I am voting for this bill and commend the chairman for maintaining a focus in this subject area, I wish to express my concern about Section 3 of the bill which sweeps into prohibition items other than firearms and expands the penalty for those items. If the chairman can see another way of directing this concern, I would appreciate it."

Senator Cobb then added his support of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, while I'm going to be voting for this measure, it might be worthwhile to call to the members' attention, page 5, line 4 of the bill, where it includes both semi-automatic firearms as well as automatic firearms.

"Since the President's embargo on the importation of foreign made automatic weapons has been in effect for about six months, it has still left a gap where domestically manufactured automatic weapons can be purchased and used. That is a loophole that is yet to be closed. I would think, therefore, that the sanction for the use of an automatic weapons in the commission of a crime ought to be more than the use of a semi-automatic weapon because of the destructive and killing capability of a fully automatic weapon. This bill unfortunately, on the cited page, does not make such a distinction, but treats them both the same.

"I would urge in further consideration as the bill moves through the legislative process that such a distinction be considered. Thank you."

This measure that is before us would have banned vending machines selling tobacco altogether, and the committee amended the bill in recognition of the testimony which was to the effect that we have an extremely serious problem with tobacco addiction and we have a situation

in which minors, primarily, get their cigarettes from vending machines. We had evidence in front of us from the State of Hawaii Department of Health Economic Impact Report to the effect that smoking costs the State of Hawaii the sum of \$117 million per year. That was in 1985, which is the latest statistics available.

"A day or two after the hearing, the Secretary of Health and Human Services Mr. Sullivan, at the federal level, talked about the nation expending \$52 billion each year, and the number of lives that are lost each year because of tobacco smoking. And it is clear that the one group in which cigarette smoking is increasing is among minors.

"We have already outlawed the sale of cigarettes to minors. What we are asking to do under this bill is to make the access to those cigarettes more difficult for minors because even though the sale to them is illegal, even though purchase by them is illegal, if a vending machine is out in the public and there is no one supervising, it is a simple matter for a minor to use the machine. It is for this reason that I would ask my colleagues to please consider voting for this bill.

"There are a number of other states which have taken action. A number of jurisdictions in Minnesota have banned the use of cigarette machines altogether. The states of Idaho and Utah have legislation that vending machines must be inaccessible to minors, and we are trying to move along the same line. The Department of Health is very supportive and the 1988 Governors Conference on Health Promotion and Disease Prevention actually originated this bill.

"I ask my colleagues for their consideration. Thank you."

Senator B. Kobayashi also supported the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill. For me, this bill is a clear public health measure. No one who supports public health can really be opposed to this kind of measure which tends to restrict access to cigarettes and tobacco. Cigarette smoking is by far the largest preventable health hazard in the United States. Three years ago this Legislature passed a measure which raised the age of sale of tobacco products from age 15 to age 18. We did this because Hawaii was far behind other states in changing the age of purchase of tobacco.

"This bill is not a total ban on vending machines, but rather a partial ban.

"As the previous speaker had noted, a number of states have this kind of measure. One of the most interesting experiments or surveys done is from the State of Minnesota. In that state a number of jurisdictions have enacted a total ban on cigarette vending machines. They include such 'semi-well-known' places as St. Cloud and Bloomington, Minnesota, the home of the Minnesota Vikings. In addition, about nine different locales in Minnesota have enacted partial bans on cigarette vending machines. Ours will be a partial ban. Some of these locations include Duluth, which has enacted a partial ban on cigarette vending machines. This partial ban in Duluth will become a total ban within three years.

"The attempt here is to say that if we have gone one step in changing the age for allowable purchase of cigarettes from 15 to 18 that we should put some teeth into that ban by making the purchase from vending machines more difficult. An experiment that was done in Minnesota, through the University of Minnesota, had individuals go through three different towns in Minnesota attempting to purchase cigarettes. All of these individuals

were below the age in Minnesota for allowable purchase. They found out that these teenagers were 79 percent successful in purchasing from vending machines, but only 53 percent successful in purchase from over-the-counter sales.

"This ban will not stop cigarette smoking amongst teenagers, but it is not intended to. No one measure can do that. We hope that through this measure we will be joining other locales in Minnesota and in other jurisdictions around the country, including Alaska, Utah, Massachusetts and Maine, which have restricted the sale of cigarettes from vending machines.

"I would urge my colleagues to vote for this bill in support of public health and in support of the notion that cigarette smoking is the number one preventable health hazard in the United States. Thank you."

Senator Reed added his support to the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I'm speaking in favor of this bill.

"I'd like to respond directly to an argument that I hear repeatedly -- that the small businessman who has the cigarette vending machine can't be bothered with policing. My feeling is that if the small businessman doesn't want to take the time to make sure that kids aren't buying cigarettes from the machine, then he should not bother having a machine on his premises. So I urge a 'yes' vote on this bill."

Senator Blair also rose to support the bill and stated:

"Mr. President, earlier today we passed on third reading a very good bill to mandate that health insurance policies provide for mammogram screening. We did so because the members of the Senate are aware of what breast cancer can do and is doing in our community. I hope that we will not be inconsistent in making an effort to mitigate the damage caused by breast cancer but failing to take a very reasonable step to protect our children from the horrors of lung cancer and other respiratory diseases.

"And I hope, for the sake of the children, that this measure will pass."

Senator Cobb rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I have not yet been convinced by the arguments I've heard, particularly when I've heard from so many small business people who say that they don't want to be charged with being the enforcers responsible for determining whether or not a machine is or is not accessible, and they don't want the people from the Department of Health coming around and telling them they either can or cannot have a machine or they'd have to move it or things like that. I think it's a wrong approach.

"If we're serious about prohibiting teenagers from smoking, then we should pass legislation that bans teenagers from smoking. Make it against the law, a step to prohibition. But to put this burden on the small businessman I think is the wrong step. That's why I'm going to be voting 'no.'"

Senator Crozier rose to speak in support of the bill and remarked:

"Mr. President, I am speaking in favor of the bill.

"Mr. President, this morning I went to my neighborhood Food Pantry store and I bought a quart of orange juice. The cashier who was giving me my change opened the drawer and in the drawer he had zigzag paper. Mr. President, I'm sure you're familiar with what zigzag paper is for. It is that stuff to roll 'pakaololo' in. Okay?

"These merchants don't want the responsibility of taking care of kids who might smoke, and they are irresponsible enough to sell products that will condone or support the use of drugs. If we're not going to pass laws to make them do something, they will let greed get in the way.

"Mr. President, how much money do they make from a packet of zigzag paper? Three pennies. But they're willing to do that; they're willing to sell this just to make money. If they cannot police themselves to sell zigzag paper, and cannot police themselves to sell cigarettes to minors, we have to pass some laws.

"Thank you."

Senator Cobb then responded:

"Brief response, Mr. President.

"If we look at our legislative history, when we dealt with the bill on the subject of allowing prophylactics in vending machines we exempted areas where children or teenagers are likely to gather. I think a similar thing would have probably been better addressed as well in this piece of legislation, rather than attempting an outright partial ban for the whole state. In fact, I'm sorry it wasn't. Thank you."

Senator Ikeda rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I think my stand against smoking has been very clear. In fact, I have a personal bias about it. However, I think that this bill goes a bit too far. I certainly don't condone any teenager or anyone smoking, for that matter. But I think that when we place the burden of policing a person's activity on the proprietor of a business, then I think we're going a little too far.

"If we don't want our children to smoke, we should teach them not to smoke, and we should monitor their activities to know that they aren't doing what we don't want them to do.

"For these reasons, Mr. President, I will be voting against this bill."

Senator Blair then added:

"Mr. President, a few additional words in support, if I may.

"I think that responsibility should follow where profit goes. If businesses are going to profit from the sale of carcinogens, they ought to be responsible enough to prevent children from purchasing from their vending machines. Thank you."

Senator Reed added:

"Mr. President, one more, if I may.

"If we are opposed philosophically to the idea of having businessmen police the sale of their products with regard to cigarettes, perhaps we should also suspend that requirement to those who sell alcohol. Obviously, I'm being sarcastic, but we require those who sell alcohol to

restrict their sales based on age, so why are we opposed to imposing a similar requirement on those who sell tobacco?"

Senator B. Kobayashi also responded:

"Mr. President, I think this bill is misunderstood. There's no policing requirement in the bill. It simply states where you can and cannot place a cigarette machine. After the cigarette machine is placed in an appropriate spot where there is the proprietor tenant or agent of the proprietor tenant, there is no policing involved. At that time, after it is placed, its placement would, hopefully, be a discouragement to any minor who would blatantly want to purchase cigarettes. The proprietor can or cannot take on the job of policing, but there is no requirement in the bill that policing take place. Thank you."

Senator Ikeda then remarked:

"Mr. President, rebuttal. As I read this, Mr. President, it says: 'The sale of cigarettes from cigarette vending machines is prohibited, except: ... On premises where there is a tenant or proprietor, or an agent of the tenant or proprietor, who is present on the premises at all times to prevent,' prevent, 'persons under eighteen years of age from purchasing cigarettes while the premises are accessible to persons under eighteen years of age.'

"Now, I don't know how you are going to prevent anybody from using the vending machine except by policing a person's activity."

Senator Levin then added:

"Mr. President, if I may make two additional points. One in partial response to the concerns raised by Senator Cobb.

"The bill does provide that machines in areas where minors are not allowed to go, such as bars and where liquor is sold, there will be no restriction on such vending machines.

"The other point I want to bring to the attention of my colleagues was testimony presented by the Department of Health to the effect that the earlier a child starts using tobacco the less likely it is that he or she will be able to quit. I think that is a compelling argument why we have gone as far as we have already in terms of trying to prevent minors from smoking and why we should go this additional step. Thank you."

Senator George, in support of the measure, said:

"Mr. President, in somewhat belated response to the inquiry the chairman of the committee made because I had expressed a concern, I have a memorandum dated March 7 from Mr. Paty which casts considerable shadow on some of the substance of this particular bill.

"I'm going to vote for the bill, Mr. President, but I would like it to be well known that part of the measure which would affect the transfer of Kawaiui Marsh from the city to the state is in serious doubt because Mr. Paty has told us that actual transfer of fee title would be subject to the following: completion of flood improvements by the city, designed and installed to the satisfaction of Mr. Paty's department; and adequate funding which would have to be appropriated to the department to operate and maintain the improvements to existing flood control facilities.

"So, given the above, the transfer date as it relates to Kawaiui Marsh should not be fixed. So we have here a bill with one unenforceable section. Should, however, these problems be resolved, and I still have hope that they will be, I would certainly hope that the bill would be kept alive and sent over to the House and that a measure of the same intent, but substantially different, would arrive here then between the two vehicles we will be able to sort something out that would get the transfer of the park accomplished. Thank you."

Senator Koki rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, during the recess I had further opportunity to talk to a person that sells electronic voting machines and all other types of voting systems. In further talking to him, and he was a much more knowledgeable person, he reconfirmed everything I've said. He gave me some figures. He said that he sells all types of voting systems, including the electronic voting machine, but he said that he really does not recommend it.

"The electronic voting system is the very last system he would recommend. Because it will not speed up the voting in any significant way, we will have, and I'm quoting, 'lines to the ocean during election day, especially when we have amendments to the constitution or the charter.'

"He said delivery will cost you about, mainland prices, \$75 per machine to deliver it to the site. And each voting machine is a computer so each voting machine you have, he says, is going to cost you \$75 just to deliver it.

"Storage is going to be a big problem for cost and also ware. How are you going to deliver these voting machines to remote areas, especially in the outer islands. He says skilled technicians are going to be needed to maintain them. He cannot imagine why anyone, and I'm quoting, 'would want an electronic voting machine except to make us,' their company, 'a whole bunch of money.'

"Speeding up the tallying of the votes is a function of the amount and type of ballot counter computers that you have.

"A tremendous waste of money, resources and time can be saved by voting 'no' on this bill. Thank you."

Senator George then asked if the chairman of the Ways and Means Committee would yield to an inquiry. The Chair posed the question to the chairman and the chairman having responded affirmatively, Senator George asked:

"Mr. President, it has just been suggested to me that the provisions of this bill provide for a negotiated contract, rather than one let out to bid, and I'm wondering if that is indeed the case?"

Senator Yamasaki answered:

"Mr. President, that subject matter was referred to us from the Judiciary Committee. The Ways and Means Committee only changed the appropriation to \$1. May I have the Judiciary Committee chairman respond to that question, Mr. President?"

Senator George then said:

"In that case, Mr. President, may I redirect my query to the chairman of the Judiciary Committee?"

The Chair then asked if the Judiciary Committee chairman would yield to the question and Senator Menor answered in the affirmative and responded as follows:

"Mr. President, the language in the bill is somewhat general in the sense that it would give the Lieutenant Governor's Office, in conjunction with the Electronic Voting Committee that was established by the Legislature last session, some flexibility in terms of being able to go by way of a negotiated contract or on a bid basis.

"The lieutenant governor indicated to us in the hearings on this bill that as a matter of policy if the Legislature wanted to make the determination through the enactment of this bill as to whether we would want the Electronic Voting Committee to go by way of a negotiated contract or by way of a public bid that's a policy matter to which the Lieutenant Governor's Office and the committee would be deferring.

"The concern I have right now, in general, speaking to the bill is that I think this may be the only vehicle that we have to keep the issue alive.

"Based on the concerns that have been expressed, perhaps, we need to make an educational effort to address some of the concerns that have been raised by this body. And I am hopeful that if this bill moves out of the Senate for further discussion, that this sort of educational process can occur. In fact, as you know, several months ago I asked the members of this body to try to go upstairs to the Lieutenant Governor's Office to look at the display of the various kinds of electronic voting machines the lieutenant governor has been proposing. My understanding is that while some legislators availed themselves of this opportunity, others did not.

"If this bill passes out of this body, I will try to work out an arrangement with the Lieutenant Governor's Office to see if it might be possible for him to once again have the vendors come to Hawaii to display, for demonstration purposes, these voting machines so that this body, as well as other legislators who may have some concerns not only about the cost and whether or not this can be transported conveniently, but also in terms of user friendliness, will be given the opportunity to have the vendors respond and answer some of the questions that have been raised today with respect to this bill.

"In response to the question from the Senator from the 10th District, I believe that the language gives some flexibility to the Lieutenant Governor's Office and the Electronic Voting Committee in the kind of contracting arrangement they enter into with the vendor that is selected."

Senator George then remarked:

"Thank you, Mr. President.

"In that case, I would like to speak in favor of this measure with serious reservations. I think my most serious reservation is the limitation on the number of voting stations there will be with the intended outlays.

"As my colleague to my left has indicated, longer lines may very well negate any advantage in speedier calculation of voting results. I am persuaded that we're moving a little too quickly. I think I would just as soon

wait, but in deference to the chairman of the respective committees I would vote to keep the measure alive."

Senator Koki then added:

"When we talk about getting more machines so that we won't have lines, we're talking about maybe tripling the amount just to get to the present stage that we're at. So you're talking about \$20-30 million. You're not talking about a very small amount to bring it to snuff. And even now, 4,500 machines is short. So we're talking about a huge amount of money to be able to bring up each electronic computer machine up to where we have the proper numbers."

Senator Cobb also spoke against the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak slightly violently opposed to the measure. As the late Senator Everett McKinley Dirksen once said on the floor of the United States Senate, 'a billion here and a billion there, doesn't sound like much but pretty soon it adds up to real money.' And I see that happening in this bill.

"I see something else happening and I'd like to share it with everyone publicly. And that is, this bill cleared the caucus we had on Sunday with very little discussion, very little dissension. But after the remarks on the floor by the Senator from the Ninth District, a re-poll was taken in the caucus and an amazing number of Democratic Senators raised their hands in opposition. Now the plea is being made, let's keep the measure alive because there is no vehicle in the other house. If you've got 12 'no' votes combined with one from the other side to make 13, the bill would die.

"So I think that gives lie to any statement that's made that minds are not changed on the floor of this Senate, because we can publicly commend the Senator from the Ninth District for changing one helluva lot of minds right here on this floor, by the questions, by the arguments, by the articulation of facts that he presented to us, and one of those minds he changed is mine.

"I'm going to be voting 'no' on that because I happen to agree with a number of the concerns that he has raised. It may be premature. I don't think this thing has been thought through properly. And I don't think all of the points that he has raised have been answered adequately. So on behalf of a number of Senators who do change their minds, thank you, Senator Koki.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Koki then added:

"Just a little follow-up, Mr. President.

"People have been expressing also that it may be a little too early that we, eventually, will get into an electronic voting system ... which is not true. This gentleman indicated that they have mechanical balloting systems which are much superior to what we have now that are going to continue to be functional; that over 50 percent of the jurisdictions in the United States are using it. It is much more efficient than what we have now and certainly a lot cheaper. We'll have an audit trail and everything.

"Getting into electronic voting system is not only premature for a state of our size, it probably should never occur because of the availability of other types of mechanical systems. Thank you."

Senator Yamasaki rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I speak in favor of the bill.

"As you will recall, in the testimony that was received by the subject matter committee, the lieutenant governor did indicate that this measure was supported by the advisory committee and this advisory committee was made up of election officials, legislators from both bodies, and also the chair of the Election Advisory Committee.

"Also, they made a special investigative trip to the mainland to see the operation of the electronic voting machine in several jurisdictions and they were satisfied that Hawaii should proceed to have an electronic voting system established.

"For that reason, I ask that support be given to this bill so that the bill can cross over to the House and, also, that some of the concerns expressed by the members of this body can be further reviewed with the House. Thank you."

Senator Blair also supported the measure and said:

"Mr. President, in support of the bill. I would like the record to reflect that electronic voting does create an audit trail. Perhaps it is not of the sort with which the silver-tongued Senator from the Ninth District is familiar. I concur with the remarks of Senator Cobb that the Senator from the Ninth District did a brilliant job in opposition; but, in support of the bill, I believe that there is an audit trail and urge the members to vote 'aye.'"

Senator Hagino also supported the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the bill.

"As one of the previous speakers mentioned, he did talk to an expert and I would really hate to base my opinion on one expert even though he claims that he deals in several voting machines.

"The advisory committee that was referred to did look at several vendors and as the previous speaker also mentioned that the equipment could be heavy and cumbersome and take a lot of space, if they have to be stored, that's true, but that's not the only system that is available.

"We also looked at the possibility of using PCs, personal computers, and that is one option that is available, and that these computers could also be used after the voting. They would not be used just for voting days. They could be used in other state government offices, once the voting is done.

"I would like to read the findings and purpose in this bill, and one of the assumptions made is that: 'The present system is labor-intensive, requiring hundreds of election workers to process and tabulate ballots and an inordinate amount of technical support. It has also become increasingly expensive to print the number of ballots required in each election, and with the rapidly changing technology occurring in the computer industry, the system will become increasingly more difficult and expensive to maintain and operate.'

"Mr. President, as the chairman of the Ways and Means Committee had mentioned the election clerks of each county did participate in this committee and they had recommended unanimously that we switch over to an electronic voting system. Thank you."

Senator McCartney also spoke for the measure and stated:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the bill, but first of all I'd like to commend my colleague from the Ninth District for bringing out some very, very important points. I want to go on record that I do share his concerns.

"I am going to support the chairman on passing the bill over, but if the bill comes back and it contains a significant amount of money that could jeopardize priorities like education, I would have strong reservations in supporting the bill because in my mind education comes first, and not how we elect politicians. So, I will be taking a strong look at the bill in the future, but, I will be supporting the bill on the floor now. Thank you."

Senator Koki then said:

"Mr. President, not to beat it to death, but, each electronic voting machine must have a person that would turn it on and off after you vote. Each machine has to be turned on and off after each person votes.

"Also, the audit trail is not my main contention, I'm just saying that the ballot system is the most credible audit trail. The memory system that has back-up memories ... if the primary system goes off, what's to prevent the back-up? So the computer back-up system of an audit trail is not the most clearest type of audit trail, but that is not my main argument.

"Again, in over 50 percent of the country this is how they do it. They don't know of anyone of our size that would ever want to get into this type of system. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2945, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR A TOTALLY ELECTRONIC VOTING SYSTEM," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

No. 3135, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HAZARD PAY FOR AIRCRAFT EMERGENCY RESCUE DUTIES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

By unanimous consent, Stand Com. Rep. No. 2563 and S.B. No. 3118, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE RENTER'S INCOME TAX CREDIT," were recommitted to the Committee on Ways and Means.

S.B. No. 3103:

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 3103, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO BONDS," was recommitted to the Committee on Ways and Means.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2567 (S.B. No. 2479, S.D. 1):

Senator Yamasaki moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2567 be adopted and S.B. No. 2479, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi.

Senator Ikeda rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, this bill that is before you is part of the work that was done by your interim task force on rabies. After five months of some very detailed deliberation, we concluded with several recommendations and only two made it to the floor of this legislative body and this is one of them.

"Mr. President, this exemption for resident guide dogs for the handicapped is long overdue. There are only eight guide dogs in this state today. And all this would do is give their owners the ability to travel to the mainland United States and back to Hawaii without having to put their dogs into a 120-day quarantine. And this is not without a lot of precautions being taken both before and after they come back to Hawaii.

"Now I know that there are certain veterinarians out there who have been lobbying very, very hard, working overtime, in fact, to kill this bill because they feel that it is a potential threat to the existing quarantine system. They see it as a 'crack in the door' and the beginning of the possible elimination of the 120-day quarantine system. And I want to tell you that I feel that their fears are totally unfounded.

"As noted in the findings and purpose section of this bill these dogs pose no significant risk to the community. They go through a prolonged period of training. During that time, they are under constant surveillance and strict control. Their health records are well documented and before they're even allowed to enter training as a guide dog, their records have to be impeccable and they must have exhibited no history of being exposed to rabies.

"Most of the dogs that reside here in Hawaii with their owners have come from Australia or New Zealand and that is because the guide dogs facilities on the mainland are not willing to allow a Hawaii resident to go to the mainland and pick up a dog because, upon return, it has to remain in quarantine for 120 days. That 120-day period affects the ability of the dog and his owner to perform as trained, and they feel that it's detrimental and unworkable. So our people have to go to Australia in order to get a guide dog which means, then, that the dog costs them \$15,000 or twice the amount if they were able to get one from the mainland United States.

"I would be the last person to propose anything that would pose a threat or even a hint of a threat of rabies coming into this state. I want to point out that one of the members of our task force, Dr. Robert Worth, who is with the Department of Health who has worked with the Center of Disease Control and for whom I have a great respect, has ascertained that the probability of a dog, one of these guide dogs, leaving Hawaii and coming back with rabies, undetected, is about one in one million. Those odds are far better than the odds that we face every day with all of the dogs and cats that are currently entering our

quarantine system even after they have remained there for the 120-day period.

"So, I think that this over-reacting on the part of some in the community is really uncalled for. I urge my colleagues to support these handicapped people in their effort to be able to travel to the United States as we do without the hindrance of having to leave their eyes at home. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura also rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the bill but with some reservations.

"The bill requires that guide dogs leaving Hawaii undergo a serological test and upon return to the State of Hawaii undergo two more tests spaced six months apart. This bill limits, like the previous speaker said, to about eight guide dogs so the probability of any of the dogs getting rabies is very low.

"The only thing I ask is that this exemption not go beyond the guide dogs, the signal dogs, and the service dogs until such time that we develop or perfect the serological testing so that the test can differentiate the antibodies that are resulting from infection or from the vaccine. In other words, until we can really get this test down pat, we should not exempt, in the future, show dogs or any other animal.

"Thank you very much."

Senator George rose to speak against the bill as follows:

"Mr. President, I speak against the bill. I may be the only person in this room and maybe one of the very few people here with reason to do so.

"I have on two occasions two of my children went through a waiting period to see whether or not an animal with whom they had tangled had rabies. That was not in the United States. But it's frightening. I'm sorry; one chance in a million isn't good enough for me.

"People who have called me have been the professionals in the field. They are the vets who understand the disease and its processes. They are not completely satisfied, I believe, with the testing process. I don't know what it is now, but at the time that I stayed up nights waiting for the waiting period they had to dissect the brain of the animal with whom my kids had tangled.

"So, one chance in a million isn't good enough for me. I'm going to vote against the bill."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2479, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE QUARANTINE OF RESIDENT GUIDE DOGS, SIGNAL DOGS, AND SERVICE DOGS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 22. Noes, 3 (George, Menor, Hagino).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2574 (S.B. No. 3107, S.D. 2):

Senator Yamasaki moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2574 be adopted and S.B. No. 3107, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi.

Senator Mizuguchi rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, in speaking in favor of the bill, may I for the record point out to members of the Senate that there is a drafting error on page 6, line 19. The bill inadvertently eliminates the exemption status of the sheriff, first deputy sheriff, and second deputy sheriff. It is not the intent of your committees that reviewed the bill, nor is it the intent of the management team that organized and established the Department of Public Safety to remove the exemption status of these three positions. We will retain this exemption status when this bill moves over to the House. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3107, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2579 (S.B. No. 3096, S.D. 2):

On motion by Senator Yamasaki, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi and carried, Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2579 was adopted and S.B. No. 3096, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO ELDERLY HOUSING," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 25. Noes, none.

S.B. No. 3126, S.D. 1:

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 3126, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INCOME TAX WITHHOLDING," was recommitted to the Committee on Ways and Means.

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2584 (S.B. No. 2978, S.D. 1):

Senator Yamasaki moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2584 be adopted and S.B. No. 2978, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi.

Senator Cobb rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I'm going to be voting for this bill. It reminds me of what a wise man said about the consummate capitalist who ran amuck. Christopher Columbus didn't know where he was going. When he got there, he didn't know where he was. When he returned, he didn't know where he'd been. And he did it all on borrowed money.

"When I look at some of the projects we've been funding, I think it's very similar and if we can celebrate a man who did that 500 years ago, and spend only one dollar doing it, I think it's very appropriate. Thank you."

Senator B. Kobayashi rose to speak against the measure and remarked:

"Mr. President, I'm going to vote 'no' on the bill.

"It would matter to me if Christopher Columbus discovered Hawaii. He did not. As the previous speaker noted, he discovered an island in the Caribbean, and he didn't know that he'd discovered what he had discovered.

"This bill reminds me of the state fish contest bill, except that it's five times more expensive. That is, your

committee heard testimony from the Hawaii Committee for the Humanities suggest that an appropriation of \$500,000, that is half-a-million dollars, over a two-year period would be appropriate for support of this Caribbean quincennial in 1992.

"We don't need \$100,000 for the state fish contest and I don't think we need \$500,000 to commemorate an event that really affects not us but rather the continental U.S. When Christopher Columbus discovered America, Hawaii was already discovered.

"As a note, I see that one of the supporters of this bill represents a coalition of Puerto Rican heritage groups and they support the bill because of their Hispanic origin. I remember going through Europe and having our guide say that Christopher Columbus may or may not have been Italian. Had he been Portuguese that might have been another question. Because as you know, in those days the Portuguese were the best seafaring people in the world. Also, Christopher Columbus was certainly not Puerto Rican.

"So, Christopher Columbus did not discover Hawaii. This bill isn't worth \$500,000; it's not worth five times as much as the state fish contest. And in terms of Christopher Columbus' heritage, I think I'm on safe grounds. Thank you."

Senator McMurdo rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill and I beg to differ with the previous speaker.

"I think that Christopher Columbus has been a part of the American heritage for hundreds of years. I don't know where you took history, but I have not only taken it but I have taught it and it has always been a part of the American history. And I thought that Hawaii was one of the American states. Maybe I've missed something here.

"I would also like to say that Columbus has really been a symbol to the school children of our country as being the discoverer of America.

"Now, what we have done in the last year was to remove Discoverers' Day from the calendar and substituted a very worthy man's day, but I would like to feel that we're not just going to drop Columbus completely. So I would certainly urge all of you to vote in favor of this.

"I believe that the committee chair will be able to clear up the previous speaker's concerns about cost. Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan supported the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of Senate Bill 2978, Senate Draft 1.

"I empathize with the previous speaker from Kahala in that we shouldn't be spending frivolously our state treasury money. In fact, last year we were able to conduct the state flower contest without expending a single cent from our state treasury. Perhaps we could do the same with this measure, if it's given a chance.

"Because this chair feels that \$500,000 was excessive, she did not include an appropriation in the bill. The chair from Ways and Means felt likewise. The measure is going over with hopes that we can celebrate Columbus Day without having to spend \$500,000, and perhaps, as I mentioned, we can do it without expenditure of a single cent.

"Senate Bill 2978 establishes a temporary commission to celebrate the 500th anniversary of the arrival of Christopher Columbus in the new world. It provides for the commission to be of an educational nature. The proposed intent of the commission would be to include the creation of educational programs and forums, incorporating a multi-cultural focus which is unique to Hawaii.

"This commission would honor a man who was a true voyager of his generation. He courageously ventured on to uncharted and unknown seas, thereby increasing our knowledge of the globe and ultimately disputing the existing argument of the time that our world was flat. Like our state voyagers of today, he opened up new avenues of exploration, going where no man had ever gone before.

"In addition, I believe Christopher Columbus provides one of the few positive role models whom our young can turn to today. We should not forget those who paved the way for us. Since we no longer have a holiday to honor this important individual and his accomplishments, it seems even more fitting that on the occasion of the 500th anniversary of his discovery of the new world, we should choose to recognize him for his lasting contributions to the world.

"I urge all of you to support this measure. Thank you."

Senator Solomon, in support of the measure, remarked:

"Mr. President, I'll be voting 'yes' on this bill with reservations.

"At this time, Mr. President, I'd just like to clarify that Christopher Columbus did not discover the new world. There were numerous American tribal peoples who had already settled in the Americas. I just want to clear that for the record. I am hoping that in this celebration this kind of information will be set forth.

"Also, Mr. President, if you remember we celebrated the bicentennial of Captain Cook's discovery of Hawaii. I'm just kind of chuckling about it because this gave an opportunity for the Hawaiian community to set straight that the Polynesian peoples were here for thousands of years before Cook arrived in the islands. I'm hoping that in today's celebration that they bring to light the fact that various Indian tribes throughout the Americas were there thousands of years before Christopher Columbus ever discovered the Americas. Thank you."

Senator Crozier also spoke in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, originally, I was going to vote 'no' but the chair of the committee got hold of my button hole and pulled me to the side and presented her testimony to me. That was quite convincing and it made me reflect.

"Before I continue, Mr. President, I have to have a ruling; I may be in conflict of interest. A few years ago I had an Italian girl stay with our family so I am a father of an Italian and since Christopher Columbus, we think was Italian, am I in conflict?"

The Chair answered: "At this point, no one is in conflict."

Senator Crozier continued:

"Being a father of an Italian girl, I'd like to just, you know ... I started to reflect in the last few minutes, last

15 minutes, and I needed some data and I turned to my colleague to the left who is quite a historian, and all the comments that I make now can be referred to him for accuracy.

"When we look at this commission ... everybody is looking at Christopher Columbus ... I would like to say that this commission is going to celebrate the role of government in the work of our discoverers. Mr. President, you know that Isabella was the Queen of Spain (if you've forgotten that) who financed Christopher Columbus. Also, Galileo. Everyone talks about the great Galileo, how he took the spyglass from the mariners and he went up into his tower in Venice and found the planets and set the whole course of our science in gathering information. It started with Galileo.

"But, Mr. President, most people don't know that Galileo had to eat while he was up in that tower and it was the senators of Venice that paid for his groceries and for his living expenses. Government has always been involved in financing explorers.

"You know, we had the great John Kennedy. If it wasn't for him as a politician convincing the Congress to put someone on the moon, we would have never accomplished that. It's the role of government and we should commemorate Columbus because we continue the tradition of finding new paths, new journeys, new solutions to problems.

"I can almost imagine when Christopher Columbus in that spring of 1492, when he assembled the Nina, the Pinta and the Santa Maria in the harbors of Genoa in Spain, and as they were ready to leave the port to go out into the new world, not even the new world, to go explore, he turned to his people and he said, 'In the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, in the name of Isabella, let's go.' (Laughter.)

"Mr. President, I hope we all support this measure."

Senator Holt then stated:

"Mr. President, I was undecided too on this bill, but based on the remarks of the speaker from Makakilo, I'm going to support this bill."

Senator George added:

"Mr. President, on the contrary, I had been prepared to cast a vote in favor of this measure, but after hearing that we are going to celebrate the role of the politician and in addition to that move Genoa to (laughter) on the map of the old world, I am now prepared to vote 'no' on the measure." (Laughter.)

Senator Tungpalan responded:

"Mr. President, perhaps I can reclaim the good Senator's vote.

"I rise to clarify my previous remarks and to assure the Senator from Kohala, a dear friend of mine, that my statements were to celebrate the occasion of the 500th anniversary of his discovery, not the discovery.

"We were very cognizant that Asian and Pacific peoples have preceded European explorations and I did want to make that statement very clear."

Senator Mizuguchi spoke for the measure and said:

"I'm speaking in favor of this bill, Mr. President. I want to separate myself from the previous speaker. Like the old saying: Mike knows Hawaiian affairs. Mike

knows construction. Mike might know leaseholds. But when it comes to history, Mike he don't know Diddley."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2978, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT ESTABLISHING A COMMISSION TO CELEBRATE THE 500TH ANNIVERSARY OF CHRISTOPHER COLUMBUS' ARRIVAL IN THE NEW WORLD AND MAKING AN APPROPRIATION THEREFOR," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 21. Noes, 4 (Kobayashi, B., George, Ikeda, Reed).

S.B. No. 3100:

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 3100, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM," was recommitted to the Committee on Labor and Employment.

S.B. No. 3155, S.D. 1:

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 3155, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC EMPLOYMENT," was recommitted to the Committee on Labor and Employment.

S.B. No. 3273, S.D. 1:

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 3273, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO UNEMPLOYMENT," was recommitted to the Committee on Labor and Employment.

S.B. No. 2640, S.D. 1:

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 2640, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO WORKING HOURS OF OLDER STUDENTS," was recommitted jointly to the Committee on Labor Employment and the Committee on Education.

S.B. No. 2107, S.D. 1:

Senator Crozier moved that S.B. No. 2107, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Fernandes Salling.

Senator Cobb rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I'm going to be voting 'no' on this measure and I'd like to read four reasons why from a letter and testimony we received from Mr. Joseph C. Leonardo. He says and I quote:

'Let me make it clear I do not own real estate in trust, nevertheless, I am against this bill because I feel all lessees will be negatively affected.

Some of my reasons are:

1. It would give lessors a way to intimidate lessees into accepting over market (take-it-or-leave-it) prices because they do not qualify.

2. A lessor's over market (take-it-or-leave-it) price to lessees who don't qualify could then be used as a floor price against all lessees.

3. All lessees in a tract would also be affected if they didn't have the 50% quota for condemnation because of lessees not qualifying - leaving the door

open again for the lessor to over-charging all lessees with the take-it-or-leave-it price.

4. I have personally experienced a Bishop Estate (take-it-or-leave-it) offer for the land under my home, that provided no value for my leasehold interest. Real estate appraisers explained it this way -- Bishop Estate has tried to charge me hundreds of thousands of dollars for something I already own.

Please do not pass this bill."

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Blair spoke in support of the bill as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill.

"My position on leasehold reform is well known. In fact I second chaired a part of the state court case on the constitutionality of the statute, as an attorney for the lessees. But one thing has bothered me about the way the leasehold law has been implemented. While the law intended for the condemnation power of the state to be used only in those cases where the ultimate owner of the fee title would be purchasing their one and only fee residence. That was part of the policy decision in enacting the law. Yet, people who owned other real property suitable for habitation within the county got around what the Legislature intended and subverted the intent of the leasehold reform law by putting their other residential property into a land trust. Converting it legally and metaphysically, but in no other way, from real property into personal property. As a consequence, they qualify to enjoy the benefits of the state's condemnation power. That is so contrary to the original intent of the leasehold reform law and so unfair to the lessors who are forced to sell their property in circumstances other than what was envisioned by the Legislature in enacting the law, that I introduce this measure.

"What I'm interested in here is equity and that the utilization of the state's condemnation power be only as intended by the leasehold reform law. Thank you."

Senator Cobb responded:

"Mr. President, in direct response.

"If we look at what's happened in the history of leasehold reform as it pertains so far to single family and as it's beginning to involve in the condominium area, as you know and every senator knows, leasehold only covers single family at this time. But if you examine the history of the conversion on leasehold properties, you'll find very clearly that the vast majority are done on a voluntary basis. True, they used the outline of the state law, but they operate under the auspices of it without actually exercising the actual condemnation power of the state.

"That being the case, and the fact that they operate under the auspices of it, utilizing the 50% requirement wherever possible, it puts lessees at a disadvantage to have something like this, particularly when we recognize that there have been very few cases that have actually gone to outright condemnation, trial, decision, and appeal.

"The majority of cases that I'm personally familiar with in East Honolulu have gone the voluntary route, starting in Kahala and going to many areas in other parts of East Honolulu, now to the Windward side of Oahu, as well as on some of the neighbor islands.

"What the previous speaker said would be totally correct if we were exercising a leasehold condemnation as

a condemnation and not as a voluntary consummation of a sale under the auspices of the law. In that respect, there is a major difference and that's one of the difficulties I have with the measure. Thank you."

Senator Blair then responded:

"Mr. President, in support of my earlier comments.

"While some of them may not have occurred under condemnation, they occurred under the threat of the condemnation.

"One of the reasons I am supportive of this bill is because I support an extension, under equitable terms, of the leasehold concept to cooperatives and condominiums.

"And one of the arguments that has been made against an extension of the program to cooperatives and condominiums is that people subvert the intent of the leasehold reform law.

"It strengthens the argument to extend the law if we can assure that the law is applied fairly, equitably and in accordance with the intent of the Legislature. To the extent that we allow the intent of the Legislature to be subverted by legal chicanery, we weaken the case for extending the law. I think those who are supporters of leasehold conversion of cooperatives and condominiums should support this equitable bill.

"Thank you."

At 3:54 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 4:29 o'clock p.m.

Senator B. Kobayashi then spoke for the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I speak in favor of the bill.

"The bill has been amended so that some of the original objections to the bill have been addressed. The language of the bill now reads that you could not participate in the condemnation of leasehold real property if you are a sole legal or beneficiary owner of fee simple lands. That change in the law conforms to the original intent of the original leasehold conversion law. It is in keeping with that original bill's spirit and simply closes a loophole which has been used by several individuals. People who have beneficiary trust interest in a piece of property, but who are not the sole beneficiary owners of that land are in a different category from the individuals addressed in this bill.

"So, for this reason, I'm voting in support of the bill. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 2107, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CONDEMNATION OF LEASEHOLD REAL PROPERTY," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Cobb).

By unanimous consent, action on S.B. No. 2292, S.D. 1, was deferred to the end of the calendar.

S.B. No. 2302, S.D. 1:

On motion by Senator Menor, seconded by Senator Levin and carried, S.B. No. 2302, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO REAPPORTIONMENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Levin).

S.B. No. 2305, S.D. 1:

Senator Menor moved that S.B. No. 2305, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Aki.

Senator Fernandes Salling spoke for the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill, but I think some comments need to be made for the record with respect to what we are doing here.

"The bill basically conforms our constitution to the law that was passed by the United States Supreme Court which now says that the standard to follow in reapportionment is by population, rather than by registered voters. In that sense, that's fine. I have no disagreement with that portion of the bill and the wording of the amendment itself.

"But the bill goes on further to talk about basic island units and this is something that I think we need to comment on to indicate to any court that may be looking at our situation here in Hawaii which, I think all of us can agree, is a lot different from the rest of the United States because we have islands separated by water.

"The courts have said that they will take into account what the states consider an important interest. And if we are to say here today on the floor that this is indeed an important interest, that we feel it's important to preserve our basic island unit which is essentially what is in our Constitution now and we're about to change with language, then I think that would be a step in the right direction. It would be something that the court could maybe rely on, should we want to reapportion and keep within the basic island unit, but in doing so perhaps have a deviation that we may go a little bit beyond what the courts may allow. The fact that we are willing to say as legislators that this is an important state interest that should be protected and should be considered as high a priority as what the Supreme Court has said with respect to the standard of reapportioning by population.

"The bill is restating the question with respect to the basic island unit stating that wherever possible we should try to reapportion, keeping the basic island units intact. The previous language in our Constitution stated very clearly that we would reapportion and there would be no deviation from the basic island units, that we would keep these units intact.

"So clearly, there is a big difference here but, of course, I can understand that it is being done in accordance with what the federal court has stated with respect to population.

"We have urged the Judiciary chair to look at the wording once again to see if he can strengthen it. He is willing to do so and will be discussing it in the House. Perhaps something to the effect that of 'to whatever extent possible we shall preserve the integrity of the basic island units' and have that question posed on the ballot, rather than something weaker such as 'wherever possible, we will try to maintain basic island units.'

"I think many of us here that represent the neighbor islands share these same concerns and, as I stated earlier, the reasons why I feel it's important to make these comments. It's strictly for the record, should the courts decide to look at the intent of the Legislature when passing on a measure such as this. We do consider our basic island units to be an important right that should be elevated to as high a priority as the population standard that they use in apportionment.

"Thank you."

Senator Levin, also in support of the measure, remarked:

"Mr. President, I'd like to echo the comments of the previous speaker. They are the same concerns that I have. The difference we have is that I will choose to vote 'no' on the bill, I suppose more for symbolism than anything else because I too recognize what the Supreme Court has dictated. But I will be voting 'no' on this measure and 'no' on Senate Bill 2302 because I believe in the importance of the basic island units. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 2305, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE IV, SECTIONS 4, 5, AND 6, OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF HAWAII TO CHANGE THE BASIS USED FOR REAPPORTIONMENT," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24. Noes, 1 (Levin).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2625 (S.B. No. 2413, S.D. 2):

Senator Menor moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2625 be adopted and S.B. No. 2413, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Levin.

Senator George spoke against the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I had not expected to lead this one off because it's not a matter with which I've been very closely connected in the past several weeks. However, in spite of very persuasive arguments on the part of those who are supporting this measure, I am not persuaded that it sends anything but the wrong message that 'using drugs is wrong but here's a clean needle.' No matter how you cut it, that's the message that goes down.

"I will be happy to write a check to subsidize the putting of laundry bleach in every shooting gallery in this state if it would help and I think it would help just about as much. That is evidently the sterilizing medium of choice, and a very effective one. But I simply can't agree with passing out free needles.

"Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 2413, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO INFECTIOUS AND COMMUNICABLE DISEASES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

MATTERS DEFERRED FROM EARLIER ON THE CALENDAR

S.B. No. 2890, S.D. 1:

By unanimous consent, S.B. No. 2890, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO OZONE DEPLETION AND GLOBAL WARMING," was recommitted to the Committee on Agriculture.

S.B. No. 2343, S.D. 1:

Senator Blair moved that S.B. No. 2343, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Cobb.

Senator Blair rose to speak in support of the bill as follows:

"Mr. President, I wasn't planning to speak on this bill this morning because I thought I had the votes. That's now apparently in question so I am speaking in support of the measure.

"The bill, although written as a basis of general application, under the facts in our community applies to only one trust. There's no point in beating around the bush. The only impact of this bill will be on the trustees of the Bishop Estate Trust.

"Under the current statutory formula for trustee commission that a legislature in the dim, distant past constructed, when you apply it to the current operations of the Bishop Estate each of the five trustees is entitled to a million and a half dollars a year for performing the services of their office.

"The trustees themselves recognize that this is inappropriate. I don't mean to say that they've stated that publicly, but they decline to accept more than half of that money. I believe on an average they're accepting around a little over \$648,000 and turning back approximately \$900,000. So it's beyond dispute that the statute needs to be changed. Nobody has suggested that

isn't the case, except for some people who would leave it up to the trustees to establish their own salary.

"I polled the members of my own community who are registered OHA voters to ascertain their desires in this matter, because the Bishop Estate Trust serves a class of beneficiaries to which they belong and of which I am not a member. The response was instructive to me. Fifty percent suggested that the bill which set the salary of \$50,000 was their preference. Another 29 percent supported another bill which set the cap at \$94,500. The third bill up for consideration set the cap at \$200,000 and an additional increment of 13 percent felt that bill was appropriate. But when you combine the three groups, 93 percent of the OHA registered voters felt that \$200,000 was an appropriate salary. The remaining 7 percent felt that it was up to the trustees to turn back what they felt they didn't deserve.

"This bill sets that commission at slightly under \$200,000, but essentially at the \$200,000 level. I acknowledge that this is a tremendous drop from \$648,000, but we must recognize the eleemosynary nature of the trust, its charitable purposes, and recognize that there is a public service component to serving as a trustee of a charitable trust. This bill will provide millions of additional dollars for the beneficiaries of the trust.

"There are some who may feel that there need not be a public service component to serving as a trustee of a charitable trust and I suppose that is a point on which reasonable people can disagree. But for myself, I think the law should recognize a public service component. I hope that Senators, even those who would be generous than I, will vote to keep the bill alive so that we may hear from the House of Representatives on what they think as appropriate compensation; because it's clear to everyone that to leave the statute unchanged in light of the extremely large sums that it provides would not be appropriate. I hope that the members will support me on this bill.

"Thank you."

Senator A. Kobayashi rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I will be voting against this bill and it's not that I'm against the cap. I feel that the trustees right now receive too much. So I am not voting against the cap but I am voting against the formula used in this bill.

"We have to realize that the trustees are really like CEOs of private corporations who receive a lot more in compensation and we have to acknowledge the amount of responsibility these men hold. And although I'm in favor of a cap I do not feel that the formula used in this bill is a correct one and, therefore, I'm voting 'no.' Thank you."

Senator Fernandes Salling also supported the measure and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of this bill and I would like to commend the chairman of the Consumer Protection Committee for attempting to provide some kind of reasonable, rational public policy approach to dealing with this very emotional question.

"I see this as a very simple question really. The question before us is, are you in favor of a cap on the trustee's fees, and if you are, this bill should be passed to the House and consideration should then be given to working out how much. And that's really the question

that we have before the body today. So I urge all of the members to consider that when voting on this bill."

Senator Cobb also spoke in support of the bill as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of this measure. In doing so, not only to echo the remarks of the chairman of the Consumer Protection Committee but point out that if the difference between six hundred and nine hundred thousand dollars per trustee were in effect today that money would be going to the Hawaiian children, or should be. And with a Bishop Estate trustee in the House of Representatives, I'm sure that if this bill ever came back it would come back with a considerably different sum. It will be a matter for the conference committee where the exact amount could be worked out.

"But in support of the previous two speakers, I think we have both a legislative and social responsibility to legislate in this area. I'm hopeful the members will recognize that and support it. Thank you."

At this time, Senator Holt requested a conflict of interest ruling from the Chair of his "potential conflict." The Chair ruled that Senator was not in conflict.

Senator Menor also supported the measure and said:

"I just want to state that I rise to speak in favor, with reservations. I share some of the same reservations that the Senator from Manoa had discussed on this bill, but I will be voting in favor of this bill based on assurance that I think we have received from Senator Blair to the effect that he is willing and flexible to be able to work with the House to try to come up with a cap that would be fair and equitable in this particular situation. So, accordingly, I will vote in favor but with reservation."

Senator Chang then rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak against this bill.

"When I served as Judiciary chairman for the Senate this matter came up for consideration and we spent many hours reviewing testimony on both sides of the question. I commend the chairman of the Consumer Protection and Commerce Committee for reviewing what is very much a public matter of public interest and concern and raising the subject for discussion. However, having spent a considerable amount of time in looking at the various arguments, the approach taken in this bill and the amount of compensation provided, in my opinion, does not conform with many of the formulas that we had uncovered when we reviewed this question. For that reason, I'm going to be voting against this bill."

Senator Blair, in support of the measure, then responded:

"Mr. President, at the time that the previous speaker was chairman of the Judiciary Committee the compensation provided by the formula was approximately \$250,000. I want the record to reflect that. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, and S.B. No. 2343, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO CHARITABLE TRUSTS," having been read throughout, failed to pass Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 11. Noes, 14 (Aki, Chang, Crozier, Hagino, Ikeda, Kobayashi, A., Matsuura, Mizuguchi, Nakasato, Solomon, Tungpalan, Yamasaki, Wong, R., Holt).

S.B. No. 2303, S.D. 1:

Senator Blair moved that S.B. No. 2303, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Cobb.

Senator Blair rose to speak in support of the bill as follows:

"Mr. President, as the 'all powerful' chairman of the subject matter committee, I rise to speak in favor of this measure. Before I do, however, I'd like to note a couple of points. There is a typo on page 6. The date 1989 was inadvertently retained from an earlier version of the bill. In order not to the conflict with the effective date of the act, that's going to have to be amended in the House to read 1990; otherwise it will create an ambiguity.

"I'd also like to point out, as some of the members, I understand, have been told that this bill will require existing land owners to divest themselves of real estate within five years, that such is not correct.

"In support of the measure, Mr. President, I would like to read briefly from the testimony that was presented in the subject matter committee by Mr. Gregg Pai of the Governor's Office, and this is a direct quote:

'New golf course developments have reduced the availability and increased the price of land for agriculture, housing and urban development. Hawaii ranked third, nationwide, in 1987 in the proportion of private agricultural lands owned by non-United States residents, while during the same year Honolulu ranked first in the nation among the nation's 53 largest metropolitan areas in terms of the median sales price of a single-family home. Foreign purchases of residential real estate have exacerbated the situation by increasing housing prices, property values, tax assessments, and ultimately tax burdens for residential homeowners. These impacts have been shown to be diffusing out of high-income residential areas and into middle income neighborhoods, and also from residential properties to apartment properties.

'The scale of the current wave of investment is beginning to be such as to cause serious distortions in Hawaii's basic land and housing markets. While there may not be very much that the government can do to affect the larger global forces that propel the world economy, given the reality of these forces and their effect on Hawaii, state policies should very much be concerned about controlling the negative impacts of foreign investment on the well-being of the community, as well as maximizing the benefits that foreign investment can bring to the Hawaiian people. In that regard, to the extent that foreign ownership of critical resources can lead to their utilization in ways that do not reflect the long-term interests of the community, then public actions to protect the larger interests of the community are warranted.'

"To make sure that there's no misunderstanding here, Mr. Pai testified on behalf of the administration. He did not support or oppose the measure, but he did urge caution in adopting it. However, at that time, the bill was a flat prohibition. In light of some requests for caution that your committee heard, the bill was amended to constitute only a 'cooling off' period. That is, Mr. President, things are happening very fast and in order to preserve our option to determine our own future, it is necessary for us to stop things for a while, long enough for us to develop a policy in this area. Frankly, Mr. President, Hawaii does not have a policy, other than laissez faire, with regard to any investments.

"Mr. President, Hawaii is faced with a situation not of its making. The United States is running a trade deficit with a balance in the negative to the tune of tens of billions of dollars every year. As a consequence, the people who end up holding the additional dollars have to reinvest them. It is our good or ill fortune, or some combination, that Hawaii is getting a disproportionate share of that investment. We are going to run out of land in Hawaii, at current rates, long before the U.S. Congress gets around to seriously addressing the trade deficit.

"And so I think its important for us, almost in the sense of self-preservation, to declare a 'cooling off' period, with respect to certain critical lands and begin to establish a public policy.

"The lands subject to the 'cooling off' are conservation or preservation lands, agricultural lands and residential lands including apartment lands. The opportunity would still exist for foreigners to invest in commercial, resort hotel and industrial properties. So the ability of foreign capital to create additional jobs would not be impaired.

"We owe it to future generations to call a halt to circumstances that are overwhelming us, at least long enough to regroup, sift out the good from the bad and adopt a policy that will preserve and protect our ability to determine our future. Mr. President, I would urge that all Senators support this measure and give ourselves and our successors in office an opportunity to make the fine tuning necessary to preserve and protect the Hawaii that we love. Thank you."

Senator McMurdo also rose to speak in support of the bill and said:

"Mr. President, if the trickle down theory has not worked in other forms of economy, it has worked with a vengeance with the foreign investment in this state, it has more than exacerbated our affordable housing problem. If you could see what is happening in Waikiki and Moiliili and in our urban areas, to start with, it is frightening, and people are frightened. Their rents are going up; they don't know where they're going to go. There is no place to go. So we are having really a mass exodus of people who are leaving the Islands -- solid citizens who are moving their families back.

"The hotel people will tell you they cannot get young executives to come in here because there's no place to live that they can afford. We have two-job families that can't find a place to live and they are homeless. And this is a critical, critical situation.

"In my Committee on Human Services I can tell you that this housing situation which has really come about, a lot of it, by this trickle down of expensive real estate is almost like a domino effect. It is really at the root of the tremendous growth of child abuse, spouse abuse, family violence and I would even say drugs because I have realized that many of the young people who see their families homeless feel that if they could push drugs and get some money maybe they can get a place to live.

"I urge you all to look at this bill in terms of the human and social consequences of continuing foreign investment. We have a runaway economy with this and frankly I join those people who are frightened. I feel for this state and we have got to put the brakes on and stand back and take a look at this before we are totally destroyed. Thank you."

Senator McCartney also supported the measure and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the bill and in deliberating this bill in my own mind and in my own heart I had a hard time. It was very, very difficult for me because I can see the pros and cons on both sides of the issue. I think the bottom line is that the lands identified in this bill -- residential, ag and conservation lands are the heart and soul of Hawaii. Those are the lands we need to protect and preserve for our future generations. I think that we need to take a public policy and turn it around in order to protect our citizens.

"When we look at different measures that can take care of foreign investment or speculation altogether, one of the ideas that came up was the issue of anti-speculation tax. I was at the committee meeting where we discussed the matter, and the question was posed to some of the economists there on the issue of a speculation tax, and whether or not that would be a more appropriate vehicle to address this problem. The answer that came back was that a speculation tax may end up hurting the people it was designed to help, that being the middle-income, the poor, because the rich can pass on that cost. It will trickle down back again to the poor and the people who can least afford housing.

"I think this bill is watered down and I think it's good that we look at a cooling off period. We're not saying ban foreign investment forever and we're not saying foreign investment is bad for Hawaii. We're just saying that certain lands that are important to our people need to be protected and preserved, and I think that's a safe policy and I feel very, very comfortable doing that.

"The other thing that really troubles me is that with foreign investment into all of these properties and the increase in the value of these properties, what's going to happen when the economy in these nations fail and they have to start pulling back their investment. What is the impact going to be on our economy when the value of our commodities here begin to fall?

"Finally, on the issue of housing, what I think this bill does is treat housing more like a natural human resource, rather than a commodity. And that's the area I think we should be moving into. So in my mind, I think we're in a battle for Hawaii's future so that our children can make a home here and that many of our friends who live on the mainland can come home and find a place to live. Those are the people that I think we are elected to serve and to fight for, and that's why I'm voting to support this bill.

"Thank you very much, Mr. President."

Senator Chang spoke against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, while I share the concerns of all of the speakers preceding me, I think that this bill makes a scapegoat of the rare or foreign purchase of real estate for whatever purpose and really misses the boat.

"The problems that the previous speakers have been discussing stem, in my mind, from the vast pressures that come not from foreign sources but from our own United States citizens who in departing from their home states, either to seek better opportunity in Hawaii or escape of bad environment back home, are the ones that are raising the prices here in Hawaii. Until we deal with those pressures that are well documented by statistics, maintained both privately and in the public sector, I think all this does is to create an illusion of hope where there is none."

Senator A. Kobayashi also spoke against the bill and stated:

"Mr. President, I understand there is a House bill that's coming over regarding foreign investment and I feel that it's the Senate message that will be going out to the rest of the world, and I really don't like the message that's in this bill.

"First of all, it starts by saying, 'This bill is not intended to discriminate against any ethnic group,' and yet on the very first page of the bill it refers to Japanese investment. And I really don't feel that's a good message.

"Also we have groups of Vietnamese farmers who have come here and rather than go on welfare they buy little plots of land to farm. And do we tell them, 'This is no good.' Do we tell people 'You can invest here but don't live next door to me.' I hate to give out that sort of message.

"I know there's a need out there and there's a problem for housing, but I feel that it's our responsibility to look at it in a more positive way. We should open up more lands for housing, more state lands, so that homes can be affordable. We should make more of the Hawaiian Home Lands affordable and available to the native Hawaiians so that they can live there. We should also provide infrastructure so that developers could develop these lands and provide for more affordable housing. We should also provide for more low-cost rental units.

"So there are other ways to solve this problem and I don't feel that this bill is the way to do it. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Matsuura also spoke against the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I remember many years ago when the State of Hawaii made every effort to go to foreign countries to invite investors to come to Hawaii to invest. The Hawaii-Japan Economic Council was formed to encourage businessmen from Japan to come to Hawaii to invest. Well, they did come.

"If one is going to illustrate the real estate property purchased by foreign companies, it is the resorts. However, you don't see resorts in this bill. What I'm saying is that the message we will give out to these foreign countries is: 'Yes, we want you to invest and create jobs for us, but we don't want you to be our neighbors.' That's the message that you are going to give.

"There are many Canadians who have come to Hawaii as visitors. They like Hawaii so many have purchased a residential unit. They came with good intentions. I feel that we should allow them to be our neighbors.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Blair then responded:

"Mr. President, an issue has been raised, both outside and to some extent within this body, with respect to this being a racially targeted measure. I would like the record to reflect that my own wife is a 'yonsei.' I have nieces and nephews who are citizens of Japan and a sister-in-law, as well. This bill is not designed to inflame prejudice based on ethnicity. In fact, I firmly believe that if there is any degree of alienation from our brothers and sisters who happen to be Japanese, whether national or local, that it is caused by fear of losing control of our community. To the extent that this bill mitigates that fear, it will reduce tensions rather than exacerbate them.

"On another point, the bill does not include hotel and resort properties because the future that we're trying to

preserve is the future of our middle class. I doubt that very many middle class citizens of this state look forward to the day when they can purchase a hotel and refurbish it. There may be some and I wish them well. But I'm more concerned, in this bill with those of our citizens who wonder whether or not their children and their grandchildren will be able to afford to live here.

"Yesterday, I went through the multiple listing service with one of my sisters-in-law. It was very sobering to reflect upon housing prices with those who are very near and dear to you. Hearing them ask themselves, 'Can I afford to stay in Hawaii any longer?' People who were born and raised here and have two incomes still have to look for the smallest home in the farthest corner of the island, and then hope that they can somehow qualify for that mortgage.

"The system is clearly out of balance, Mr. President. We clearly need a cooling off period. There are certainly other remedial measures that we should pursue simultaneously. I think building additional housing in Leeward Oahu is very important. I also considered the possibility of some sort of an extra tax on those who try to turn a quick profit on land and, in fact, a speculation tax bill was sent from my committee to the Ways and Means Committee. That is not before us and as I understand will not be before us.

"I also recognize that there is an impact on the local housing market from people coming from our sister states. However, having sworn to uphold and defend the Constitution, I cannot in good conscience bring to you a bill which would be so patently unconstitutional as to prohibit sales to other citizens of the United States.

"It may be that there are few tools available to us to deal with the size of the crisis that faces us, but that is not an excuse for not using those tools that we do have. I hope the members will recognize that. Thank you."

Senator Cobb then rose to speak in support of the bill and said:

"Mr. President, as the chairman correctly pointed out there are a number of other things that can and should be done, whether you regard them as tools or as devices to lower the cost of housing. Making more land available for development is one. Some form of anti-speculation tax is another. Addressing the abnormally high real estate commissions that we have in the State of Hawaii is another. Our realtors make more in percentages of commissions than realtors in most other states. And there's absolutely no incentive to lower the commission by having a declining scale based on the escalating price of homes. We should also require a percentage of all projects to have affordable housing, whether public or private. That issue has not yet been addressed.

"I think we need to pass this cooling-off period. And I think we also need to shorten the permit process time that it takes in order to initiate construction for housing and to see it to a successful conclusion because I am one who agrees that an average of six years and eight months is too long.

"This bill is not a panacea. It's not going to solve all of the problems, but it is a beginning, and I think we should begin. I would agree with one of the other speakers who said that housing should be regarded as a home, not a commodity.

"Mr. President, we are not going to solve all the problems with this bill, but we can begin, and I think we should today. Thank you."

Senator McMurdo added:

"Mr. President, if we are going to be sending a message to anybody, shouldn't it be to the people of our community that we care whether they have a place to live or not? That we care whether they can afford the rent or not? I think this is the kind of thing that we need to be considering.

"I think we've passed a number of bills, and will this year, which helps our economy and which expands our foreign relations and business relationships with other states and other countries, but I think this really is a hometown bill, a home-state bill.

"What message are we going to send to the people of this community on whether we care whether they have a place to live or not?"

Senator Crozier then asked if the chairman of the Consumer Protection and Commerce Committee would yield to a question. The Chair posed the question to the chairman and Senator Blair having answered in the affirmative, Senator Crozier asked:

"Mr. President, we have this leasehold conversion problem before us year after year and, as you know, many of the lessees are Canadians and foreigners from other countries. If something like this passes, how would that affect them and how would that affect their associations when they try to gather up the 90 percent support to be able to buy the land under them?"

Senator Blair answered:

"Mr. President, the question is somewhat hypothetical and there would need to be additional facts known before it could be answered. But, as I reflect perhaps a little longer on it, it probably wouldn't matter in either case because the bill provides that people who currently own real property in Hawaii would not be affected whether they are aliens or not. Now, presumably any future sales to aliens that didn't go through because of the bill's passage during the six-year period would not be affected by legislation we might pass in the future.

"In closing I am happy to hear that Senator Crozier anticipates the passage of such legislation within six years."

Senator Crozier then continued:

"Mr. President, I am not saying that this legislation is going to pass. I'm saying the problem is going to resolve itself. But I'm disappointed in the answer the chairman gave me. Although it's quite eloquent, it's quite confusing. He said many words, but he didn't answer my question. Thank you."

Senator Blair responded:

"Mr. President, I will take that as a reiteration of the question and will try to respond more directly.

"This bill will have no impact on a bill, should it come to pass within the next six years, to allow lessees to purchase the leased fee interest."

Senator Matsuura also rose to ask if the chairman of Consumer Protection and Commerce Committee would yield to a question. The Chair posed the question and Senator Blair having answered in the affirmative, Senator Matsuura asked:

"Mr. President, I think the Canadians own more residential real estate in Hawaii than any other country.

The question is: Are American citizens allowed to buy residential lots in Canada?"

Senator Blair answered:

"Yes, I appreciate the point that is being raised by the question. Let me answer in this way.

"We had before us a number of bills which would establish reciprocity and the opinion of the Attorney General was that a bill requiring the interpretation and application of the law of other nations and of treaties between United States and foreign countries before a sale could take place would be unconstitutional. In addition we would have to know the law of every jurisdiction, even as changes occurred on a daily basis, in order to comply with reciprocity provisions.

"The bill does not attempt to establish equity in the form of reciprocity. It looks after only the interest of the citizens of the State of Hawaii. Thus, it was not germane to ascertain what any individual country's policies were with respect to sale of real estate to citizens of the United States."

Senator Matsuura then remarked:

"Maybe you answered my question, but I don't think I understood your answer.

"Can an American citizen buy residential real estate property in Canada?"

Senator Blair answered:

"Let me try again, Mr. President.

"It didn't come up because it wasn't pertinent to the decision that we made. That is, whether or not Hawaii citizens can purchase land in other jurisdictions is not our interest. Our interest is in whether we needed to preserve and protect the options for our citizens in this jurisdiction. Of the hundreds of countries in the world some, although probably in a minority, allow United States citizens to purchase land in certain categories and perhaps even in all categories.

"But with respect to any given country, I can't answer your question. I did not do the legal research with respect to Canada or any other jurisdiction."

Senator Matsuura continued:

"In other words, if I went to Canada and went to a real estate company to buy a house, I will not be allowed to buy the house, is that correct?"

Senator Blair answered:

"I don't know whether you would or not."

Senator Matsuura thanked the chair of Consumer Protection and Commerce.

Senator Holt on a point of clarification asked:

"Mr. President, on a point of clarification, maybe in a question to the chairman, 'Does alien mean the federal government?'"

Senator Blair answered:

"Mr. President, the definition of alien does not include the United States Government. That would be beyond our powers under the Constitution. In fact that term does not even include resident aliens. We have in our

community a great number of resident aliens. They would be treated as U.S. citizens, because of their intention to become U.S. citizens. Recognizing that intention they would be provided the opportunity to purchase land."

Senator George interjected:

"Mr. President, perhaps I can offer a side bar on this. Citizens of Hong Kong are allowed to buy in Canada. I was recently there and saw a good many residential developments in which there were a good many Hong Kong people who had moved there, particularly to British Columbia."

Senator Tungpalan also rose to inquire if the chairman of Consumer Protection and Commerce would yield to a question. The Chair posed the question and Senator Blair having answered in the affirmative, Senator Tungpalan asked:

"Mr. President, are the great majority of the sales being conducted among foreigners or are they being conducted between citizens of our state?"

Senator Blair answered:

"The majority are being conducted among citizens of our state or between citizens of our state and citizens of the United States."

Senator B. Kobayashi then rose to speak in support of the bill as follows:

"Mr. President, real estate, as you know, is a unique commodity. It is a finite resource. We have precious little in Hawaii. The sale of real estate, particularly residential real estate to foreigners, depletes that finite resource.

"We have a situation in the United States where 25 to 30 states have some restrictions of real estate sales to foreigners. We would be joining the majority of the rest of our United States if we pass this law. What it will do is decrease the supply of available purchasers and by that means, I believe, decrease the price and make more affordable real estate to our local and U.S. citizens.

"I think that this, however, is a measure which probably should be looked at a bit more for possible amendments. I personally introduced a reciprocity bill to allow purchases by foreigners of Hawaii property when a reciprocal right was available to U.S. citizens in the lands of that foreign individual. I think such a feature still has merit. I would further suggest that this bill perhaps goes a bit too far in categorizing all residential real estate as off-bounds to foreigners. Myself, I would make a distinction between single-family residential and multi-unit residential.

"I think that somewhere along the line certain kinds of residential multi-unit developments are clearly commercial enterprises, not regular residential enterprises. And for that reason, I would think that this bill might, if it passes, be amended in that light. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 2303, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE OWNERSHIP OF REAL ESTATE BY ALIENS," having been read throughout, failed to pass Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 9. Noes, 16 (Aki, Chang, Crozier, George, Hagino, Holt, Kobayashi, A., Koki, Matsuura, Menor,

Mizuguchi, Nakasato, Solomon, Tungpalan, Yamasaki, Wong, R.).

Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2497 (S.B. No. 3128, S.D. 2):

Senator Yamasaki moved that Stand. Com. Rep. No. 2497 be adopted and S.B. No. 3128, S.D. 2, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi.

Senator Cobb rose to speak against the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak against this measure. In doing so I'd like to outline a number of points for the consideration of the members. Starting with the contradiction of the testimony by the Chamber of Commerce, the fact that this is a regressive tax; the fact there is no such thing as a temporary tax; the lack of any kind of voter approval or referendum. Then to get into some of the subjects such as the deficit, the train, the surplus, some of the alternatives that might be available. I realize this may take a little while but I will, in view of the hour, try to be brief and yet to the point.

"Mr. President, I was amazed sitting in the Government Operations Committee to hear the Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii come in to testify in support of the tax increase. I nearly fell off my chair because I remember the campaign two years ago when the chamber and a man from Texas and Maine and other areas said, 'Read my lips; no new taxes.' And here is the chamber testifying in favor not only of the regressive tax increase, a 12-1/2 percent increase to boot. Perhaps, Mr. President, it's a commentary of the business version of the Golden Rule. Only those who have the gold make the rules.

"As soon as I examined the chamber's testimony, I found that three out of four of the members of the chamber who were testifying in favor of this tax monster were either the CEOs or represented firms that were in large part, if not totally, exempt from the general excise tax; namely, an individual who represented a bank, an individual who is the CEO of an energy company, and an individual who is the CEO of a utility. They're exempt from the general excise tax, at least in part. Yes, we have legislation that's being attempted to correct that; and the Senate is moving on it. But point in fact is while they are testifying to impose this tax on the back of the little guy, the rich and the powerful, are exempt from the very tax they seek to impose on the poor people of this state. That point should never, never be forgotten.

"Then, some of the small business people started contacting me. It turns out, Mr. President, the chamber never polled its membership on whether or not they favored this kind of tax increase. Betty Tatum and the National Foundation of Independent Business, Sam Slom and Small Business Hawaii and others are leading a recall or reconsideration motion before the chamber to get over a hundred members of the Chamber of Commerce to have the chamber reconsider its position on this issue. That's grass roots democracy, not the testimony that I saw.

"Furthermore, Mr. President, not only was the membership not even polled, most of them were surprised when they saw the chamber's testimony.

"When I said this is a regressive tax and the testimony that was presented not only to the Ways and Means Committee that I received copies of, on request as a member of the Government Operations Committee, points out that the average taxpayer will be paying between \$250 and \$338 per year, per person, more. It's ironic, Mr. President, because I'm aware that you and the chairman

of the Ways and Means Committee come from the house of labor.

"We have a hotel strike going on right now. We have workers walking the streets of Waikiki and the beaches and in the hotel parking lots and driveways, spilling their guts out seeking economic justice. They've been offered 7 percent a year. The irony is that if they get it, a large portion of that will be eaten up by this tax increase, because they are the ones that are going to have to pay for it. Not the rich, not the powerful, not the people that drive the Rolls and, excuse me, the Mercedes and the Jaguars, but those ... even a 15 year old Mercedes ... those who don't have the fancy cars; those who have to really get out and work for a living; those who can least afford it are going to be the ones asked to pay for this monster. That's why it's so wrong, that's why it's so regressive.

"It's a new concept, Mr. President, that very few people seem to pay attention to. It's called 'DDI' or daily disposable income and a testimony touched upon it directly. It seems that a person who is living near the borderline of crashing financially, doesn't have that much extra daily disposable income to be able to afford this kind of tax increase. And while we from the state can say, 'Yes, but you will all get it back next year in the form of a credit or rebate,' it's a one-time deal. And unless a person files for it they don't even get it back. If they do get it back, they usually go out and spend it on a pair of shoes for the kids or sweater or something else. It's gone in one day. But day after day the regressivity of the excise tax continues to eat away at their daily disposable income.

"Mr. President, we were told this is a temporary tax proposal. So during the hearing I asked the question when was the last time we had a tax that was imposed by government that was sunsetted on time. The room got very quiet. I had to point out that the U.S. income tax was passed in 1914 as a temporary tax. It's still around today. That in the mid-1960's the communities of San Francisco and Oakland and some of the suburbs were asked to pay a 1 percent temporary tax for the Bay Area Rapid Transit System on a temporary basis for ten years, of course. While (1) it's no longer temporary and (2) it's now been increased to 2 percent permanently.

"In short, Mr. President, there is no such thing as a temporary tax.

"And I appreciate the honesty of the County of Maui when they came in. In their testimony before the Ways and Means Committee they said, 'We don't think this should be temporary. We perceive the need to be permanent and we want the tax to be permanent.' That's being up front. What I don't like to see is a charade from any of the counties to say 'We need a temporary tax; we'll sunset it in eight or ten years and then get on with business.' because as I am going to point out, Mr. President, the deficit of a guideway is going to be greater after the construction is finished than it is during the time of capital cost of building.

"In fact, Mr. President, we don't even have the opportunity for a bond issue or referendum approval on this measure. Most cities and states on the mainland, when they want to do a large project, they will float what is called a bond issue. They put it up for voter referendum approval, also design and financing, and if the voters approve, it goes through; if they don't, they go back to the drawing board and try to correct it.

"Ironically, about two months ago I heard the mayor of the City and County of Honolulu speak very eloquently at a neighborhood board meeting in favor of initiative,

referendum and recall. I said, 'How about a little referendum on the biggest CIP project in the state's history, the fixed guideway system.' The answer was very simple. He said, 'Oh, no, that's going to be our money. We don't want to touch it.' Mr. President, a point in fact it's not their money, it's not our money, it's the people's money. And the people have every right to decide by referendum whether or not this thing should go through.

"I alluded to the deficit earlier, Mr. President. At the present time the City and County of Honolulu, just using it as an example, has roughly \$60-\$69 million a year deficit in its bus operating system. When you build a fixed guideway system, you do not subtract that deficit. You add to it a figure at least equal to \$60 million. That means a net of \$120 million. That's for operating. That is going to be more than what the projected capital costs are per year for the ten years.

"The fare box, Mr. President, is simply not going to pay for any kind of guideway system. No fixed guideway system in the United States operates at a profit with a fare box -- none. The closest it ever has come to is the Lindenwold Rail System in New Jersey.

"Now, Mr. President, let's take a look at the train itself. Some of the testimony submitted said that if we build it, there will be a 1.2 percent reduction in cars after it is completed. It also provides some incentives and we can look at the case of San Francisco or Chicago or any other major city with the guideway system. There will not be a significant reduction in the number of cars using the roads. The ridership projections are flawed; they're questionable. In fact, even the advertising itself for this transit system is flawed. It shows a train moving through countryside with no buildings, no cars, no parking lots, no stations, nothing but a train. When in reality, Mr. President, any guideway system to be viable must operate in a high density environment of population and buildings.

"I'm not here to argue against the building of a transit system. What I am saying is that we should be looking at alternative methods of financing and direct citizen participation and input via the process of referendum. It makes no sense to raise taxes when we have a surplus of \$248 million in the state treasury. I ask, is all that money spent? Has it all been committed? Is there going to be any rebate this year or are we going to add to Hawaii's listing, already number one, in the tax hell of Money magazine dated January 1990?

"Mr. President, it would be irresponsible for me to argue against this bill unless I provided some detailed alternatives to consider, and I'd like to do that now. Because, until the Urban Mass Transit Authority is correct in saying that we need a guaranteed source of revenue in order to move forward on the consideration of any funding for any transit system, they have every right to expect that. So as an alternative, Mr. President, shouldn't we consider a progressive vehicle weight and value tax; plus an increase in the gasoline tax and an exemption of alternate fuels; plus a toll system for those who do go downtown such as Singapore has? It seems ironic that nobody wants to get out of their own car. They want the other guy to do it. Yet none of these alternatives have been seriously explored.

"All we are looking at in this bill is a blank amount as a vehicle to impose the most regressive of all taxes, the excise tax, on the backs of those who can least afford it, the working middle income and poor people of Hawaii. Because it's not the rich that are hurt by an excise tax. It's the poor and it's the middle income. And that's why I don't think we should pass this bill. We should be

looking at every possible conceivable other alternative first. Otherwise, all we're doing is serving the interests of the rich and the powerful and those with the gold could then make the rules. Mr. President, I want no part of that.

"I ask my colleagues to vote this bill down. Thank you."

Senator McMurdo spoke against the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I would like to thank the previous speaker for his speech. It gave me the opportunity to sit and reflect on the fact that this is a regressive tax and I feel this is a real dichotomy for me because I am a real strong advocate of mass transit. But I'm not an advocate of this kind of regressive tax. As I reflect on the housing that everyone faces here, this is just another burden on top of the high rent and I will be voting 'no' on this."

Senator Reed also rose to speak against the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I also rise to join those of my colleagues in opposition to this bill.

"Hawaii is already one of the highest taxed states in the nation. The counties do need and deserve a greater share of the tax dollar, but give it to them via the tourist accommodation tax and a half percent of the existing 4 percent excise tax.

"It's important to note that by the time the state pyramids the general excise tax, we're paying closer to 12 percent than 4 percent. A one-half percent tax increase would move our rate closer to a 14 percent sales tax. Contrary to what some would have us believe, nearly 80 percent of the general excise tax in this state is paid by us residents. Thus, very little of \$130 million generated by even a half percent tax increase would be paid for by visitors. We could swallow a tax increase if the state were desperate for funds, but as we all know that is not the case. In fact, the challenge is what to do with the \$215 million tax surplus.

"Increasing taxes to solve a tax surplus dilemma may sound like a novel idea, but I'm sure to the average citizen and to the voter it sounds like a stupid idea. Even the state tax director admits that the tax bill for the average family in Hawaii will jump significantly if this tax increase is approved. And the state further admits that it will indeed, as previous speakers have stated, be a regressive tax. The average family in Hawaii will pay nearly twice the annual tax increase of wealthy families.

"Hawaii is already a tax hell, and this tax increase will turn up the heat. I urge a 'no' vote."

Senator George spoke in support of the bill as follows:

"Mr. President, I think there's been a great deal of discussion of taxation, but what is really on our plate today is a bullet that we gotta bite. What we are deciding is 'go, no-go' on a transit system. I think that there's time to correct the funding. I agree with a good many of the previous speakers that there are other ways, innovative ways of funding it, but if we do not approve a measure today, even if we perceive it as a vehicle subject to change, we're not going to get a transit system.

"The mayor and the governor in an extraordinary show of solidarity, and believe me when I sat at the table with them to see those two shaking hands and 'me-tooing' each other was an experience I'm not going to forget easily, they have been assured that federal funding to the

tune of 30 percent is pretty available. They like our system. We have a linear metropolitan situation that lends itself beautifully to a transit system.

"If we kill the measure and we decide we are not going to allow Honolulu to build the transit system, we are going to end up with more concrete. We have already envisioned what might happen if we have the clogged concrete arteries that go with the proliferation of the automobile. And what alternative do we have? Busses? They too require more roadways.

"I think each one of us in this room, and as a matter of fact all 76 of us in this building, perceive ourselves as transportation experts. It's the one area where every individual has all the answers to all the transit problems. Now the professionals on both the city and county and state levels have gotten together and decided 'Yeh, we need the transit system. We will even in an even numbered year propose that the counties be granted the capability of imposing a half a percent of tax because we want it so much.'

"I've been an ardent and enthusiastic supporter of rapid transit for 20 years. I was elected to the City Council in 1968 and at that time Mayor Blaisdell had already said we're going to have to have a transit system. Unfortunately, after things progressed really very well for a number of years, Mayor Anderson abruptly terminated the city's contention for 85 percent federal funds. Now we have only 30 percent federal funding available to us.

"I believe that if we wait another year, if we decide well, we're going to take some more time and wait another year before we do this, we will lose out. There's very little new-start money available. The administration is enthusiastic about this project, not about new starts. We have the support of the administration; we have the support of our congressional delegation; we have the support of the governor; we have the support of the mayor. The bullet's on our plate; let's bite it and say 'Yes, we need rapid transit.' Give ourselves the rest of this term to decide how we are going to pay for it."

At this time, the Chair thanked Senator George for her work in Washington on behalf of Hawaii.

Senator Koki then rose to ask if the Chair would yield to a question. The Chair having responded in the affirmative, Senator Koki inquired:

"Mr. President, has the House sent over a bill adding one-half percent tax for the financing of this transit?"

The Chair answered: "Yes."

Senator Koki further asked:

"Does that mean that if we pass the bill adding the 1/2 percent tax, then we're locked in? There can be no discussion?"

The Chair answered:

"The House bill will still have to go through the normal procedure of hearings and discussions."

Senator Koki then spoke against the measure and said:

"Okay, thank you, Mr. President.

"I'm going to speak against this bill knowing that we have a vehicle coming in from the House because I'm in favor of mass transit but I'm really opposed to increasing taxes to finance it, as many of my other colleagues have already reiterated.

"I believe we will have a mass transit bill passed this year, but I really don't think that we need to bite the bullet and pass it in the form that would take increase in taxes.

"The administration has been touting that we'll be passing \$40 million worth of tax cuts for the entire state and yet in Honolulu alone we are going to be raising \$90 - \$100 million so that is really a negative tax break. So I want to go down in voting 'no' on this. Thank you."

Senator Yamasaki spoke in support of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, speaking in favor of the bill.

"For the information of this body, I would like to read into the record a letter dated March 6, 1990 that I have received today from the governor of the State of Hawaii and the mayor of the City and County of Honolulu.

'Dear Senator Yamasaki:

We are writing to urge your support for Senate Bill 3128, S.D. 2.

The fixed guideway rapid transit is a vital component in our goal of providing Honolulu with an efficient, balanced, and flexible mass transportation system. Further, there simply are no other practical alternatives in terms of providing sufficient capacity to meet our mass transit requirements into the 21st century.

Our recent discussion in Washington with the Secretary of Transportation and the Urban Mass Transportation Administrator confirmed our beliefs in the merits of Honolulu's rapid transit project and the validity of the findings of the City's study effort. Our meetings with Congressional leaders also indicated an outstanding level of commitment for our project in the Congressional appropriations process. Considering the extreme competition for limited federal "new start" funds, the unabashed enthusiasm and support from Federal officials and Congressional leaders for Honolulu's rapid transit project was most gratifying and encouraging.

The federal support, however, is totally contingent on our ability to provide a dedicated source of funding for the local share. Likewise, assured funding is necessary to enable the City to solicit formal proposals and to conduct meaningful negotiations with transit suppliers. This is why we need 1/2% excise tax surcharge authority for the counties.

Having achieved this momentum and degree of advocacy at the national level, we need to visibly demonstrate our local commitment to improving our mass transportation infrastructure. We, therefore, urge your support and vote for Senate Bill 3128, S.D. 2.'

"Signed by Governor John Waihee and Mayor Frank F. Fasi.

"Also, I would like to have you be reminded of an editorial from the morning paper of today which says: 'Transit, New Tax will Get Train on Track,' and it supports the 1/2 percent excise tax for the transit system. The editorial says, 'the question is not how could we afford to build the mass transit system, but whether we can afford not to. With city and state governments allied, major business and labor support, and a plan in the books to pay for a fixed rail mass transit system on Oahu

it looks like now or never. The Legislature must act accordingly.'

"I know that there have been concerns expressed by the members of this body on the method of funding for the mass transit system. Some have said that some of the revenues ought to come out from the present 4 percent excise tax revenue that we now have.

"I would like to mention that practically every individual Senator in this body has introduced measures that require funding from the general fund of the State of Hawaii. If all of these measures were considered for expenditure, we would not have a cent left out of the surplus. I know everyone of you represent constituents and your constituents have asked you to introduce bills so that they can have some support for programs in their respective communities. I know that you mean well in representing your constituents but if we were to take revenues out of the present 4 percent tax revenue, we would not be able to fund many if not majority of the programs that have been introduced through separate legislations by each one of us.

"I know that this is a subject matter that has to be given serious consideration and we want to use this measure as a vehicle so that we can continue to study and get more information on the rapid transit system and also, the method of funding and how it is going to be spent. The neighbor islands are dependent on this measure and all of the mayors have come to us and the council members have written to us saying that need the kind of revenue measure that we have in Senate Bill 3128.

"The neighbor islands must improve their infrastructures, their roads, their sewer systems, their drainage systems, their water systems which are all important subjects that the constituents have asked the council and the county to please improve your infrastructure before you proceed to build any more developments.

"So, these are the kinds of concerns that have been expressed by the counties and I would like to urge this body to give us an opportunity to help the counties this year and this bill is going to do it. If we fail, we are going to fail the counties. Thank you."

Senator Crozier also supported the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the bill but with grave reservations.

"Mr. President, I don't think there's anybody stronger for mass transit than I am. Anytime I go to a mainland city and there's some sort of fixed guideway system I jump on that vehicle and tour the city. So I believe it can work and we need it here.

"Every morning when I drive in I sit in traffic and what should normally take a half-hour takes me an hour and 25 minutes to get into town. So I know we need mass transit. I am a very strong supporter.

"I also know that the counties need money. I introduced legislation as far back as 1985 giving the counties the hotel room tax. Nobody thought that was a good idea but things evolved and it catches up. So now we're going to give them the hotel room tax. I've also put in legislation to let them have the public service tax. So I believe the counties need the money. But, Mr. President, I have a problem. When we are going to let the counties have a share of the general excise tax, like my colleagues before me have said, this is the most regressive tax that we have.

"What I look forward to is if we have to increase the excise tax it should stay within the state. If we increase this regressive tax, we can give back to the people the monies through the personal income tax, which is a progressive tax. That way it becomes revenue neutral.

"What is the main concern, Mr. President, is the point about how we keep the people from paying more taxes. The Tax Review Commission came before us, they mentioned that when the yen was 144 to a dollar and in case the yen ever went up to 185 to a dollar, we in this state would lose \$61 million in tax revenues. Keep that number in mind, 185. In the last two weeks the yen went up 5; it's now 150. So we're very susceptible to the general excise tax. Could be a lot of damage done there.

"If we're going to have the general excise tax, I'd suggest that we keep it within our realm so we can find a way to keep it revenue neutral.

"My main concern, Mr. President, and let me try to simplify it. We have got to be accountable. The guy who raises the tax has to be accountable -- how you spend it and how it impacts the community. If my son and I'm not trying to say that the county is my child, just to use an example ... when my son comes to me and asks me for money, Mr. President, I never give him my credit card; I give him cash. I think we should find a way that the state should pay for the mass transit through cash, giving the counties the monies, and we keep hold of the taxing power.

"Mayor Fasi made a comment last week that if he gets all of these taxes that he's expecting from the state, he's going to lower the property tax. That's the point I'm trying to make. Why don't we just give him cash to pay for the bills that he has in front of us. Let's not give him our credit card because we'll rue the day when that happens.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Cobb, speaking against the measure, said:

"The Ways and Means chairman has offered a challenge. The ball is in my court. I would now like to return it. He said that we Senators have introduced individual CIP bills, other money bills. Yes, I've introduced CIP bills to address the needs of my district. I've introduced one other appropriation bill, \$50,000 for computers for the Institute of Human Services. If the Ways and Means chairman is willing to trade, I will make this offer public. Take all the money bills that I have introduced and kill them; tear them up; throw them in the wastebasket, and kill this tax along with it. Keep the state excise tax at 4 percent. Don't put it on the back of the poor people as I and my constituents can live without any CIP. We've done it before. We can live without the largess. For if that's the trade-off, if it means giving up the money bills, I'll be the first to volunteer to do it, but in return, kill this bill. Don't impose this tax on the backs of the poor people of the State of Hawaii. It's not worth it. Keep the excise tax at 4 percent. Don't raise it to 4-1/2, and don't give anybody a credit card.

"In addition, Mr. President, I would like to rise on a point of parliamentary inquiry. (The Chair permitted Senator Cobb to state his point.)

"I would like to know for the record not only the amounts of money that are proposed for grants-in-aids to the counties as being transmitted in the budget but also I've noticed numerous other appropriation bills for each of our counties, not only Oahu but each of the neighbor islands. I'd like to ask for a list with dollar amounts and subject matters of all of those bills so that we can sit down

as a body and total up what it is that's actually being proposed. And that not need be answered today, but sometime in the next week or ten days. I'd like to ask for that because I don't have an overall picture of it.

"And I think before we get into accusations about which county is getting more or less or just how much is going to the counties and how much of a burden there is and how much of a draw there is on the surplus of \$248 million, we ought to see the whole picture. So I'd like to make that request just as an individual Senator, Mr. President, and any time even this month would be fine to receive that information."

The Chair responded:

"We shall follow up with your request."

Senator Cobb acknowledged with thanks and stated:

"And the offer to give up my CIP, my money and any other money bill that I've introduced stands now, and the ball is in the other court. Thank you."

Senator Ikeda then rose to speak in support of the measure and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this measure but with some very strong reservations.

"I have to agree with some of my colleagues. I don't feel giving the counties the authority to raise the general excise tax by 1/2 percent is a good idea. However, I have to also agree with my colleague from the Windward side that it's time to bite the bullet.

"We all know that in order to get the federal funds that are available, we need to provide a designated source of revenue. This bill would do just that and it is just one proposal. There should be others.

"What bothers me about this whole thing is the fact that the counties, I feel, in coming up with a financial plan for this mass transit idea should have looked at other things. For example, they have the right to increase property taxes, and yet they have for whatever their reasons, failed to even look at that possibility. Nobody likes to pay more taxes but at least with the property tax it is deductible from both our state and federal taxes, and therefore it has less of an impact than the general excise tax would.

"But I think the bottom line is this, we are either serious about mass transit or we're not. We need that designated source of revenue and for the time being I think that we need to go with this bill. So, in spite of my reservations, I will be voting in favor of it."

Senator McCartney also supported the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the bill and I'd like to echo the remarks of the previous speaker.

"In my mind, I also share the concern of mass transit but I think that is the fundamental issue we are addressing here. We cannot simply build more and more roads to solve our transportation problems. We need to look at solving Oahu and the state's transportation problems over the long term -- 10, 20, 30, 40 years.

"I do also agree with my colleagues about how we are going to pay for this and I think that there's a lot of work that needs to be done on this bill. I think that if we are going to impose a 1/2 percent tax in order to pay for this system, we need to justify to ourselves and to the

taxpayers out there that is the only alternative. I think we are not at that point yet and there's a lot of work and research that's going to need to be done. That's why I'm supporting this bill with blank amounts in it to keep the issue alive.

"I'd just like to digress on one more area, that, we have significant responsibilities as a state. Most important in my mind is education. We talk about a \$250 million surplus, yet we rank 47th, nationally, in per capita expenditure on education. We rank 49th, nationally, on student-teacher ratios. The size of the state budget over the last ten years for education has dropped from 25 percent to 17 percent this year. We have a responsibility to educate our children. That's the foundation of our future and we need to take those concerns and address them seriously.

"And all of those have to come into the mix. Not only cutting taxes but meeting our responsibilities, and there's going to be some tough decisions that we are going to have to make down the road as policy makers. But I am voting to keep this bill alive because I think it's not the appropriate time to say 'yes' or 'no.' I think there's a lot more debate and discussion that needs to go on as to how we are going to pay for this system. But I too would raise reservations about simply raising the excise tax to 4-1/2 percent without doing our homework and we really need to do our homework. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator B. Kobayashi also rose to support the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor.

"My annual survey to the constituents asks this question, 'Do you support the idea of a fixed-rail system?' 53 percent say 'yes;' 32 percent say 'no.'

"It follows with another question, 'If you answered 'yes' above do you support a one percent sales tax increase to finance a rail system?' 44 percent said 'yes;' 40 percent say 'no.' This, I think, is typical.

"Most people want a rail system and I would note that most of my constituency would not be served directly by a rail system. Except for a very small portion of my constituency, essentially one precinct out of ten in Waikiki will be served. Typically, people don't want to pay for a rail system. It's a billion-dollar-plus system, the most costly CIP project that we have ever faced, but somewhere along the line we need to support the idea to get it far enough so that we can make a firm decision.

"In order to get federal money we need, as has been indicated, a dedicated long term financial commitment up front. Without that, we cannot get 30 percent funding from the federal government. It seems to me essential that we work toward getting that 30 percent federal funding. Without that 30 percent, we will either have to pay all of it ourselves or not have a system.

"Hawaii needs a system, I think. As a long time member of OMPO, Oahu Metropolitan Planning Organization, I am familiar with numerous studies that indicate a traffic bottleneck, particularly between downtown and Leeward and Central Oahu. Several years ago a study was done to try to predict the amount of traffic between downtown and the outlying areas by the year 2000. That study indicated that we would probably need eight additional lanes of traffic between downtown and Central-Leeward Oahu. There is nowhere that eight lanes can be fit to provide for that traffic increase by the year 2000. The current projections, of course, now go to 2005 and those would probably indicate even more lanes will be required.

"So, short of a fixed-rail system we do not have any long term solution to our traffic congestion problem. We have to keep this bill alive to allow ourselves at least the opportunity to address the traffic congestion problem.

"Another interesting thing in my survey is where traffic congestion fits in terms of priorities for citizens. I ask the question, 'What are your two highest governmental concerns?' And by far the biggest concern was traffic congestion, and this is for a district that does not have a long commute into town. We do not have to go over the Koolau's; we do not have to go from Central-Leeward Oahu into downtown. For the most part my constituents have a short commute, relatively speaking. The traffic congestion was their number one governmental concern -- even above crime and education.

"And so, I would urge that we try to keep this bill alive, and in doing so that we urge, as other speakers have, to look at every conceivable way of trying to fund a fixed-rail system, while not increasing taxes. If we have to take the House route of selling off development rights, let's look into that. If we have to take the route of increasing other taxes that are less regressive, let's look into that. If we have to look into some sort of greater share of costs between county and state, let's look into that.

"Let's keep this bill alive, at least so that further discussions can allow us the opportunity to solve the traffic congestion problem. Thank you."

Senator McMurdo spoke against the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I am still in a dichotomy on this. I am still going to vote 'no' while at the same time hoping that the bill goes. Well, sometimes these things happen. Yes, I am waffling on this because that's exactly the way I feel, but there's no place here in the Senate to vote 'waffle,' (laughter) so I will have to go down, at the same time hoping that some of these other alternatives can be explored and, in the meantime, perhaps I can come to reconcile this in the event that they cannot. So I hope Senator Yamasaki will understand that. Thank you."

Senator Chang then remarked:

"Mr. President, I had hoped that my pattern had demonstrated the way to my colleague, but obviously she's going to have to watch me just a few more sessions."

Senator Blair rose to speak against the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak against this bill.

"Perhaps it is much ado about nothing, but I can't follow the logic when people stand up and say they're voting for the bill to keep it alive. You've told them that a House bill has already crossed. This bill is already dead, under our crossover rule.

"In light of that, you cannot vote to keep it alive. The House bill having crossed, the Senate bill is dead. Therefore, the only purpose that this vote serves to lock us into a position with which we all say we're extremely uncomfortable. If there is any logic in our voting on this bill, it has been destroyed by those who have stood up and said they're voting for it but have grave reservations about it. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Holt spoke for the measure and remarked:

"Mr. President, speaking in support of the bill and echoing the remarks of the Ways and Means chairman and the Minority Leader, I agree with both of them. I think that it's now or never. Thank you."

Senator Crozier then added:

"Mr. President, I'd like to just thank the Majority Floor Leader for those eloquent remarks and which were not hollow but were directed directly at me, and if it could be possible I'd like the Clerk to strike my remarks about grave reservations, if it is possible. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.B. No. 3128, S.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

TWENTY-SEVENTH DAY

Thursday, March 8, 1990

The Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, convened at 11:37 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Donald R. Asman, Manoa Valley Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Wong who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Twenty-Sixth Day.

The following introductions were made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Menor introduced a group of fourth grade students from Honowai Elementary School in Waipahu and their chaperones, Mrs. Sasaki and Mrs. Nakamatsu, seated in the Senate gallery.

Senator Hagino then made the following introduction:

"Mr. President, in my ten years in the Legislature the presentation that I am about to make excites me the most and I am very thrilled and honored to make this presentation. I think it is fitting that we have students up in the gallery and I hope they are paying attention because the deeds of these people that I am about to introduce are something that will go down in the history of Hawaii as something that really brought Hawaii together in 1976.

"Mr. President and fellow Senators, in the past, the origins of the Hawaiian people were documented merely in the mele and chants handed down from one generation to the next, leaving room for imagination, doubt, and speculation as to how and from where they came.

"Three men -- Herb Kane, Dr. Ben Finney and Tommy Holmes -- were architects of a dream into which they breathed life and thus provided the vehicle to make that dream a reality. With the founding of the Polynesian Voyaging Society, the concept of the Hokule'a, envisioned by these three, would eventually ride the crest of mounting enthusiasm, reaching new heights with each voyage. Little did anyone realize, that the new and tested vessel that was launched as a project to observe the bicentennial celebration of our nation, would one day epitomize the heroism and fortitude of explorers and discoverers of the past and present, who rise to the challenges they are given.

"On this very day, March 8, in 1975 the Hokule'a entered the waters of Hawaii and captured the hearts and imagination of all of us.

"On her maiden voyage which took the Hokule'a and her crew to and from Tahiti in 1976, a native of Micronesia, Mau Pailug, introduced non-instrument navigation to the crew. Using those navigational skills that allowed them to sail East-bound into prevailing winds, they were able to prove that the early Polynesians were purposeful sailors and colonizers, and did not accidentally drift to land and settle there.

"In 1978, a second voyage was attempted but abandoned, when crew member Eddie Aikau, a lifeguard at Waimea Bay, was tragically lost at sea in a brave attempt to swim to land in a valiant effort to seek help for his crewmates when the Hokule'a was swamped in fiercely turbulent waters.

"In 1980, after extensive training with the Micronesian navigator Mau Pailug, an individual named Nainoa Thompson, became the first Hawaiian since ancient times to navigate without instruments. Devastated by the loss of Eddie Aikau, Nainoa was determined to complete a second voyage to Tahiti as a tribute to him because he felt that it would have been Eddie's wish to see the voyage completed.

"The voyage of rediscovery during 1985-87, covered three times the distance of the earlier voyages and retraced major movements of the Polynesian groups and during this voyage, the crew witnessed amazing feats of accurate non-instrument navigation by Nainoa Thompson, similar to those of his mentor Mau on the first voyage, that were comparable to the accomplishments using modern day navigational instruments.

"The achievements of the Hokule'a and her crews are now emblazoned in our history books, having gained scientific, cultural, and educational goals. The gallant crews who endured the pain and adversities and have basked in the jubilation over their accomplishments, are deeply bonded by the fervent and spiritual nature of their experiences, emerging as extraordinary mariners with a profound sense of identity.

"None of these remarkable events that are now part of our heritage would have come to pass, had not a group called the Polynesian Voyaging Society launched this eminent voyaging canoe, the Hokule'a, on this very day, 15 years ago. We wish her a very Happy Birthday or 'Hauoli La Hanau.'

"Mr. President, fellow Senators, it is with extreme pride and gratitude that I present to you today, the president of the Polynesian Voyaging Society, Mr. Myron Thompson, and his son, the esteemed navigator of the Hokule'a, Nainoa Thompson."

The honorees who were seated on the Senate floor rose to be recognized and were presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and leis.

Senator Hagino also recognized and introduced the following Hokule'a crew members who were seated in the gallery: Mrs. Lillian Kruse representing her son John, Scott Sullivan, Kiki Hugo, Jerry Mueller, Harry Ho, Kahu Kealanahele, Buddy McGuire, Gilbert Ane', Nalani Minton, Elisa Yadao and Billy Richards.

Senator Solomon, on behalf of Senator Holt and herself, introduced Mrs. Jacqueline Clibbett Chun as follows:

"Mr. President, it is definitely an honor for us to recognize Jacqueline Chun. Jacqueline is a member of the First All-USA College Academic Team. She is an outstanding undergraduate student at the University of Hawaii, Manoa, majoring in English and Art with a 3.89 GPA.

"Jacqueline Chun is a non-traditional student and is an inspiration to other women who are resuming their education, as well as to her spouse and teenage children.

"The national newspaper, USA Today, sponsors the All-USA College Academic Team, the selection to which is based on 'outstanding blend of scholarship, initiative, creativity, leadership and their willingness to use that talent to benefit others.'

"As I said earlier, Mr. President, Jacqueline Chun in 1990 was one of the twenty students selected nationwide to

the All-USA College Academic Team."

Mrs. Chun, present on the floor of the Senate, rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator Solomon and Senator Holt presented her with a lei.

Senator Chang introduced members of the Hawaii State Commission on the Status of Women as follows:

"Mr. President, this is indeed an auspicious combination of honorees that we have today, esteemed explorers, an outstanding woman. On behalf of Senator Ann Kobayashi, chairman of the Senate Women's Caucus, and as the only male auxiliary member of that caucus, it's my privilege to introduce a group of persons for this honor.

"The Hawaii State Commission on the Status of Women has been instrumental and pivotal in implementing programs in education, counseling, political rights, equal treatment in employment for women, and in creating public awareness and understanding of women as workers, homemakers and community volunteers. The commission has coordinated research planning, programming and action on the opportunities, needs, problems and contributions of women in Hawaii.

"The Governor of Hawaii has proclaimed 1990 as the Year of Hawaii's Women and in recognition thereof and in celebration of the 20th anniversary of the commission, which was originally established on May 15, 1964 and became a permanent statutory body in 1970.

"I'd like to introduce the officers and commissioners that are with us today: La-li Hing, chair; Janice Higashi, secretary; Sharon Yamada, treasurer; Wallette Pellegrino, commissioner from Maui; Lois Evor, commissioner; and Marsha Joyner, commissioner. They are joined by other commissioners, ex-officers, staff and friends in the gallery. May I ask all of them to rise and be recognized."

Senator Levin then recognized and introduced Ms. Carol Pectora, a constituent from the Big Island, who was also seated in the gallery with the women introduced by Senator Chang.

Senator B. Kobayashi rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, yesterday, there appeared an article in the Star Bulletin. The title is 'State Feud Erupts over School Budget Items,' and it states that the school superintendent, the chairman of the Board of Education and the House Finance Committee had traded words. It said among other things that both sides disagree on almost everything, including the total the Finance Committee is recommending in its supplemental budget for the schools.

"Today on our desks is the supplemental budget and it seems to me that there is no disagreement about that because we have the numbers here, starting on page 36.

"The state House operating budget for education is \$17.3 million less than the governor recommended. The governor asked for a total of \$25.5 million for education. The House added \$9 million for education. The House differed from the governor in the use and amount of Federal Impact Aid. The bottom line is the difference of \$17.3 million.

"The House proposal actually decreases state general funds for education by almost \$1.1 million. While adding \$9 million in general funds to education, the House decreased general funds by approximately \$10.1 million due to Federal Impact Aid. If you will look on page 36, EDN 105 and EDN 107, you will see massive increases in federal funds.

"Now, we already have a problem with federal funds being over-estimated. Our Federal Impact Aid monies arrive in bits and pieces throughout the year and cannot be calculated even one year ahead of time. Historically, Federal Impact Aid has been dropping measurably every year. This year we expect large cuts in the Pentagon budget. When that happens, Federal Impact Aid can be expected to drop even more than it has. Federal Impact Aid is a line item in the Pentagon budget and as you can imagine, Federal Impact Aid in the Pentagon's priority is very low compared to weapons systems and personnel.

"Let me give you some figures. In fiscal year 1987-88 Hawaii received approximately \$28 million in Federal

Impact Aid. The next year, in fiscal year 1988-1989, we received approximately \$23.4 million in Federal Impact Aid. This year, in fiscal year 1989-1990, we expect to receive approximately \$20.6 million in Federal Impact Aid. That is a decrease in just two years of approximately \$7.4 million.

"In short, I think we have before us at least an answer to the disagreement between the various sides about how much is in the House budget. It is lower by \$17.3 million.

"And I will remind people in this body that last year when we passed our supplemental budget we passed for the first time in the memory of the budget officer of DOE a budget for fiscal year 1991, next fiscal year, a budget lower than what the governor recommended. Because the House cuts were so large last year, we were not able to cover all of the cuts made by the House with the Senate budget. We were able to increase the governor's recommendations for FY '90 by a few million dollars, but for FY '91, the second year of the fiscal biennium, we did not even meet the governor's recommendations for the education budget. So we are already starting with one foot in the hole, in terms of the education budget. To that, we would have to add to the decreases in the House education recommendations for FY '91.

"That, I think, is the situation we face today. Thank you."

Senator Solomon also rose on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, at this time, I'd like to congratulate all the women students throughout the University of Hawaii system who have come forth publicly on issues such as sexual harassment and the disparity of numbers pertinent to female faculty and administration.

"Be assured, Mr. President, that your Committee on Higher Education will continue to monitor their efforts. I have already contacted Dr. Doris Ching and have asked her to send me a copy of the administration's policy statement relating to sexual harassment and what is the due process procedure available for both male and female students in seeking resolve.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator McCartney also rose on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I'd like to thank the chairman of the Education Committee for clarifying what is actually going on with the budget and want to publicly assure that he has my full support in working towards restoring those funds, and I think that it's going to take the commitment of all of us to do this. If we are going to be able to achieve the goal of creating an educational system second to none, we not only need to restructure our school system and decentralize it but we need to provide the resources in order to give the people in the field the tools to educate our children.

"As I stated yesterday, the percentage of state money going into education has declined significantly over the last ten years. Ten years ago, 25 percent of our state budget went toward education; today, only 17 percent. We rank 47th, nationally, in per capita expenditure on education. We rank 49th, nationally, in terms of having student-teacher ratio or class size. So there's a lot of work that needs to be done.

"I'd like to publicly thank our education chairman for working hard on this. You have my full support and I

hope all of us can support him in the months to come. Thank you."

Senator Cobb, also on a point of personal, said:

"Mr. President, on the same matter, rising on a point of personal privilege.

"If you really want to reform the budget process and insure that the money is spent, get rid of Chapter 37 -- repeal it; trash it; because this is the only state in the nation where the governor has more power than the President of the United States to impound funds. And the budget that we pass is nothing more than a legislative wish list which can be changed, transferred, altered or withheld at will, commencing on the day after we go home.

"That budget, in fact, is not worth the paper it's written on because of the power of the executive to transfer and withhold funds under Chapter 37 of Hawaii Revised Statutes. That is the power that not even the President of the United States has; the Mayor of the City and County of Honolulu doesn't have; that no other executive enjoys that kind of power.

"One of the reasons I've never been interested in serving on the Ways and Means Committee is: ... why should we spend three and a half months dissecting black widow spiders, only to see everything changed at the will of the executive the day after we go home. That's pointless.

"We don't even need to have a budget unless you fundamentally change and reform the budget process that we enact every year, and that you either abolish or fundamentally change Chapter 37 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes. Until then, everything that I see is nothing more than rhetoric. I think it's time for a little reality. I think it's time to put the spending prerogative and the power of the purse strings back where it belongs, right here in the Legislature, along with the accountability that should go with it. Thank you."

Senator B. Kobayashi then said:

"Mr. President, point of personal privilege. I wore my button today that says 'I love school lunch.' Several decades ago, I guess four decades ago, I loved school lunch. I still do.

"Among the items cut is \$2.6 million for school lunches along with \$4.8 million for class size reduction, and \$5 million for repair and maintenance of schools. Those are the three biggest items cut, and all of them I think are priority items. Thank you."

Senator Koki, also on a point of personal privilege, said:

"Mr. President, I agree with Senator Cobb and I think the fastest way of accomplishing that is to elect a Republican governor in 1990. Thank you."

Senator Yamasaki also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I would just like to remind the members of this body that we have three branches of government -- the Judiciary, the Executive and the Legislative. Thank you."

Senator Cobb then responded:

"Mr. President, cognizant of the three branches of government and also cognizant of the remarks of the

Senator from the Ninth District. The withholding power would exist regardless of which party, which label is in office. It's not the individual. It's the authority given now, today, under Chapter 37, Hawaii Revised Statutes. A Republican governor, a Libertarian governor, non-partisan governor or a Democratic governor enjoys that power and the fundamental need is to change it so that you don't have to rely on the personalities or the whims of whoever holds the office. That's the fundamental need.

"I hope that we can find a vehicle in here with the right title so we can amend this issue on the conference table and really change the budget process. Because only once in the entire history of this Legislature have we ever had a budget where it really meant something and that was when Senator Cayetano was the chairman of Ways and Means Committee and we divided the budget into two parts, 'A' and 'B'. 'A' being mandatory to spend, and 'B' being discretionary. And that year we had a two-week extension of the Legislature in order to get that achieved.

"So our whole budget process is flawed and it's not a matter of who sits on the fifth floor. It's a matter of changing the very process and rules of the game by which we play in order to insure that budget decisions that we make here have any kind of meaning whatsoever. At the present time, they don't."

Senator Koki also responded:

"I think the Senator misunderstood my comments. If we have a Republican governor in 1990, by 1991 we will have a repeal of that chapter."

Senator McCartney then stood on a point of personal inquiry and asked:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal inquiry and I'd like to ask the Senator from the Ninth District if he would yield to a question?"

The Chair posed the question to the Senator from the Ninth District and Senator Koki having answered 'no,' Senator McCartney said:

"Mr. President, then in that case, I would just put the question out. I was just going to ask him if he was going to run for governor because I was going to volunteer to work on his campaign committee, but I guess I cannot then."

Senator McMurdo also asked if the Senator from the Ninth District would yield to a question and the Chair having posed the question, the Senator responded:

"I didn't know I was going to get into this kind of trouble." (Laughter.)

Senator McMurdo then asked:

"I just wondered, do you have that in writing or is that going to be in an ad in the paper." (More laughter.)

Senator Koki answered:

"I don't make the ads. Thank you."

The Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, convened at 11:42 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Lieutenant Daniel Roysden, Chaplain, U.S. Navy, Pearl Harbor, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Chang, Koki, Nakasato and Wong who were excused.

"I am sure you all join me in congratulating this extraordinary organization and wish them much success in their exemplary efforts.

"The Waialua High and Intermediate School Drugbusters and Kahuku's 'The Team' are to be commended all year round, but especially during Drug Free Week Hawaii, which is March 18-24 of this year. They are certainly youngsters we can all be proud of, but I am particularly happy to say that they reside in the Seventh Senatorial District.

"Mr. President and fellow Senators, may I present to you today, the president of the Waialua Drugbusters Jo Ann Lagud and vice president Darlene Menor. With them are advisors, Ron Valenciana and Dan Yahata."

The honorees rose to be recognized and were presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and leis.

Senator Crozier rose to speak in support of the nomination and said:

"Mr. President, I speak in favor of the nomination.

"In our committee hearings, we had testimony from many organizations like the State Council of Hawaiian Homes Associations, the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, Alu Like and various individuals all came to speak in favor of Mrs. Drake to be the chair of the Hawaiian Homes Commission. None spoke against her nomination. They all listed her strengths -- her experience as a businesswoman in the Waianae Coast and as a bureaucrat for many years in the police department and the city administration. They talked about her long record of government service. They also talked about her many other endeavors in the community as a volunteer and as someone who has been committed to the Hawaiian people. I totally agree with them.

"Mr. President, I would like to share my own experience with Mrs. Drake so that my colleagues can appreciate the dynamic power of this individual.

"The first time Mrs. Drake made an impression on me was in 1980. I was sitting down at Pokai Bay with my family and friends and we were picnicking. This is when

OHA was going to have their first election. Mrs. Drake walked along the coastline and she was getting signatures for people to sign up for the Office of Hawaiian Affairs so they could vote. I was very impressed with her. I was impressed with her because she was doing the work of the 'makaai nana' (common people). Many of us look to her as a leader, but to become a leader you gotta do the leg work, and she was out there doing the legwork. She didn't know who I was but I was very impressed with this lady.

"I'm also impressed with her strength as a 'kupuna.' She does have that strength that many of the Hawaiians always talk about -- the sensitivity, the compassion, the patience to listen to people, to appreciate their concerns, and then vocalize what she thought.

"I'd like to share with my colleagues and cite an example that took place in one of my committee hearings, to show how she is able to coalesce Hawaiians so that they come to one mind. (I hope you can last for the longest time; I don't know but you're doing so good so far.) A gentleman asked me to introduce a bill and I introduced the bill by request. At the hearing, Mrs. Drake -- Mama Drake as she is commonly known on the Waianae Coast -- said, 'Senator, this bill is counter-productive to my mission. My mission is to make homes available for Hawaiians, Native Hawaiians. This kind of legislation is disruptive; it takes away from my primary mission.'

"After she got through testifying, the person who asked me to introduce the bill came to the table and asked to have the bill recommitted. His remarks were: 'Senator, I agree with Mrs. Drake. This bill is not necessary. We have to build homes. Please recommit the bill.' or something to that effect.

"That is the kind of ability this woman has -- to make people understand. Even though they have an agenda that they think is very important, she can convince them that there are greater concerns; that we must all pull together and make the Hawaiian Homes Commission an entity that can deliver 450 homes in the next two years and, hopefully, another 2,000 in the short years to come.

"I ask my colleagues to advise and consent to the nomination of Hoaliku Drake. Thank you very much."

Senator Solomon also spoke in support of the nomination and said:

"Mr. President, the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands has always been noted by the community and in the Legislature, to be an office for the purpose of planning. I know with the appointment of Mrs. Drake as the chairman, that the reputation will change and DHHL will be known here in the Legislature and the community as the 'office of doing.'

"Mr. President, it gives me great pleasure to recommend to this body my support for her nomination. Thank you."

Senator Holt also supported the nomination and remarked:

"Mr. President, it's going to take a lot of work and experienced leadership to produce the kind of homes that the housing chairman spoke to on Hawaiian Homes Land in the next several years. I think that Mrs. Drake, knowing her from experience and her past record, is the special kind of individual we are going to need to get those homes produced shortly. Thank you."

Senator Aki then remarked:

"Hoaliku Drake comes from an area that is growing and has a large Hawaiian homestead population. She also comes to us with a great deal of experience in city government, having served as director of the Office of Human Resources. Senator Crozier mentioned her business background of many years. She knows her people in our area and, frankly, I think Hoaliku was enjoying life as I saw her these past few years in her business enterprise. Mrs. Drake giving up all of that and getting into state government at this time shows that she is the type of person who really wants to contribute to our community. I am confident that Hoaliku will do a good job. She has the demeanor, experience and wisdom to do a good job.

"I too ask my fellow Senators to support her nomination."

Senator Tungpalan also supported the nomination and said:

"Mr. President, having worked with Mrs. Drake's son and her family for a number of years, I want to add my comment that you couldn't have come up with a better person.

"As a member of the Hawaiian community I look forward to many years of support to you, so please do call on us."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 21. Noes, none. Excused, 4 (Chang, Koki, Nakasato, Wong, R.).

At this time, Senator Crozier recognized and introduced Mrs. Hoaliku Drake, the newly-confirmed chair of the Hawaiian Homes Commission, who was seated in the gallery. Mrs. Drake was presented a lei by her daughter-in-law Bunny.

The Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, convened at 11:35 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

'Whereas, in recognition of his many important contributions to our community, Dr. Gibson was one of the first recipients of the Jefferson Award given to volunteer service; he has also received the Hawaii Bar Association Award for his efforts on behalf of Hawaii's senior citizens; and

'Whereas, at the golden age of 92, he remains a vital and active member of our community, serving on the Waimanalo community's Education Task Force (the Waimanalo Neighborhood Board and these are positions that he's held for many, many years); and

'Be It Resolved that the Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, acknowledge Dr. Gibson's valuable service for the past forty years and hereby extend its sincere appreciation and mahalo for his tireless efforts and long-standing community service to the people of Hawaii and the Pacific.'

"Ladies and gentlemen, members of the Senate, I'd like to present to you an inspiration to all of us, Dr. Robert E. Gibson, and his wife Ida. We thank you very much, Dr. Gibson, for being here today. It is really a special moment for me and for all of us."

Dr. Gibson and his wife Ida rose to be recognized and were presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and leis.

Senator McCartney also introduced Dr. and Mrs. Leonard Mason, seated in the gallery, who accompanied the Gibsons to the Senate.

Senator Cobb then added:

"Mr. President, if people in the audience or on the floor ever wondered where the term 'grey panther' came from, they need look no further than Doc Gibson. Doc, it's a pleasure having you here with us. Thank you."

At 11:46 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:49 o'clock a.m.

Senator Tungpalan rose to speak on a point of personal as follows:

"President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

"In today's Star-Bulletin is an article about 'Lawmakers' dilemma: How to pay for A+,' and Hildegaard Verploegen quotes me as saying, 'Most people who can afford to, I'm sorry to say, send their kids to private school. If they're making \$60,000 to \$70,000 a year and they're not sending their kids to private school, something is wrong. There are a lot of individuals who cannot do anything but give their kids a public education.' Frankly, I don't remember the exact statement made during the hearing, but I'm clear about my intentions.

"Mr. President, I have always been a strong advocate of public education. Furthermore, I've always believed that actions speak louder than words. I believe in public education to the extent that two of my children attend public schools in my district. Obviously, the quote was taken out of context. It wasn't a question in my mind as to whether or not people support public education, but the

fact that we must make the A+ program accessible to as many children as possible.

"I hope that, in the future, if reporters choose to quote from legislators, they will seek further input before including part of their statements and taking it out of context. Thank you."

Senator Koki also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I would like to comment on the previous speaker's remark.

"I can vouch for her being misinterpreted (by the newspaper). I stand sort of on the opposite side of her on the A+ program, and I believe we both have good reasons, but I'd just like to say that her integrity in the area, in my mind, is unquestioned. I'd like to also say that I understand what the Senator from the 22nd District meant and I hope no one misinterprets her comments."

Senator Reed also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, in this morning's Advertiser, there's a front page article that I'm sure most of the members of the Senate have read. It relates to initiative and the most recent Advertiser/Channel 2 poll.

"The headline says, 'On Oahu, 57% favor initiative on state laws,' with a sub-headline, 'They want it to include votes on zoning, land use.' The lead reads as follows:

'More than half of a sample of Oahu adults told the Hawaii Poll they would like to see voters given the right to make state laws through the initiative process.

'And an equal share -- 57 percent -- said county initiative laws should be expanded to include zoning and other land-use decisions.'

"When you look at the statistics, it shows that 11 percent are either undecided or simply refused to participate in the poll. So it's safe to say that approximately two-thirds of the people of this state favor initiative and that includes zoning by initiative.

"On page A-4, the Senator who is the chairman of your Government Operations Committee says that he will not revive the initiative zoning bill '... because we must protect the integrity of the legislative process.'

"I find this interesting for a variety of reasons. One is that it brings us once again face to face with what I believe is the key issue facing this Legislature, and, that is, to whom are we loyal? What's more important -- the integrity of the legislative process, the rules of the club, or the will of the people? Are we public servants or are we club members?

"When the process can be used to deny the public will, then it's time to change the process. Blind loyalty to the integrity of the legislative process at the expense of the people who we've elected and paid to serve is one symptom of a disease permeating this body. I'm not a doctor, but I suspect it's something akin to amnesia. Most of us have forgotten whom we serve."

Senator McCartney also rose on a point of personal privilege and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege and I'd like to thank the Minority Floor Leader for making the previous points.

"First of all, I think it's easy to throw stones and hard to build a house, and I think the comments made were taken completely out of context. The decision that I made as chairman does serve the public interest. I believe it's not good public policy or a good legislative policy to take a bill that has nothing to do with initiative when initiative that has died on both sides, in both houses, gut a bill, stick back in that issue. I think the public doesn't like it when we play games with legislative vehicles.

"That is what I have chosen to do as a freshman ... that I'm not going to be the kind of legislator that is going to play games with the legislative process to stick issues into the bills that have not legitimately passed. I think that's a very consistent position that I will choose to take throughout my career.

"I've discussed the matter with the three neighborhood boards in my district. They are pro-initiative boards and they felt that was an important position to take and they concurred with me.

"There's no question in my mind that many of us are supporters of initiative. We feel initiative is a home rule issue and that if we give the counties the ability to zone lands, they should also have the authority and autonomy to make those zoning decisions.

"How I characterize the attempt of what some people want to do with zoning by initiative is like a football game. When the score is 7 to 0 and Hawaii beats BYU, BYU comes back and says, 'Hey, we're gonna play a 5th quarter now and the score is 0-0.' That doesn't serve the process and we were elected to be consistent and not play games with the process. That is not the kind of legislator that I'm going to be, playing games with the legislative process.

"I feel comfortable about the decision. I think the public supports me and I hope my colleagues will support me.

"I thank the Minority Floor Leader for bringing up those points but I think they were taken out of context. Thank you."

Senator McCartney then requested the Chair for approval to insert into the record his formal statement on land use initiative dated March 19, 1990, and the Chair granted his request. The statement is as follows:

"STATEMENT ON LAND USE INITIATIVE

March 19, 1990

As the Chairman of the Senate Government Operations Committee, I have been confronted with the dilemma of amending a House bill with no relation to initiative by inserting language that will provide for land use initiative; i.e. S.B. 2290.

Also, as the Chairman of the Government Operations Committee, I will not amend a House bill and insert land use initiative language into it. In this case, my position is that we must protect the integrity of the legislative process. The ends do not justify the means, and I will not entertain attempts to circumvent the decision made in both houses to keep the initiative issue alive this session.

As you know, I am a supporter of and advocate for allowing the citizens of each county to exercise the right to make land use decisions through initiative. I am a co-sponsor of S.B. 2290 and also passed this bill out of my committee. First and foremost, I believe this is a home rule issue and that the counties should be given

the authority and autonomy to determine how the land under their jurisdiction is to be zoned.

In my mind the issue of initiative was considered fairly by both houses of the legislature. It died in committee based upon philosophical objections. It is not my intent to revive the issue this session by slipping initiative or any other issue through the back door. I believe this would be poor public and legislative policy that should not be allowed no matter how strongly one feels on the issue. This would be similar to two teams playing a football game and one team losing the game 7-0 and then having the losing team demand to play a fifth quarter with the score 0-0.

The bottom line is that this issue will continue to be debated and discussed next session through the proper legislative process and procedures. It is my hope that my colleagues and the public will understand and concur with this decision."

Senator Ikeda also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I would just like to commend my colleague, the chairman of the Committee on Government Operations, for his stand. I know it wasn't an easy one. I too support initiative, but I commend him for having the guts to stand up for what he believes in, and to me that's very important. He deserves our credit and our support. I certainly support him. Thank you."

Wednesday, March 21, 1990

The Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, convened at 11:37 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Khalil Fong, Baha'i Faith, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Mizuguchi and Nakasato who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Fifth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator McCartney introduced his infant son Brice Zenkichi Olakoa McCartney, who was carried by Senator Crozier on the floor of the Senate.

Senator McCartney also introduced his wife Darlene and mother-in-law Mrs. Myrtle Yoshioka who were seated in the gallery.

Senator B. Kobayashi introduced participants of the American-Arab Affairs Council as follows:

"Mr. President, we have with us today two individuals who are participating in a major conference being held here in Honolulu this Friday. They are participants in a conference sponsored by the American-Arab Affairs Council and the University of Hawaii with cooperation from the Pacific-Asian Affairs Council.

"The conference entitled 'Middle East Peace, Economic and Political Opportunities for the United States, the Arab World and Japan,' has a number of illustrious participants. Participants will include two former U.S. Senators, Adlai Stevenson Jr. and George McGovern. There was to have been participation from Frank Carlucci, former U.S. Secretary of Defense. Unfortunately, Mr. Carlucci has been ill quite recently. In addition to that there are participants from Japan and the Middle East.

"On the floor today, we have one of the participants and speakers at that conference, the president of the American-Arab Council, Mr. George Maife. With him is another participant who is well known to us, Professor Yasuo Kuroda of the Political Science Department, U.H. Manoa."

The gentlemen rose to be recognized.

Senator A. Kobayashi then recognized and introduced Mr. Dennis Toyomura as follows:

"Mr. President, it's a great honor for me today to introduce to this body Dennis Toyomura. Mr. Toyomura is the first president of the Hawaii Council of the American Institute of Architects. He's a Honolulu-born architect and principal partner in a firm for over 25 years. He has also been vested as a Fellow in the College of the American Institute of Architects, becoming the tenth active AIA Fellow in Hawaii.

"Mr. Toyomura has been a member of the State Board of Registration of Professional Engineers, Architects, Surveyors and Landscape Architects, the National Council of Architectural Registration Board, the National Council of Engineering Examiners and the Hawaii Society of the American Institute of Architects. Mr. Toyomura has also

served as: director of the Research Corporation of the University of Hawaii; commissioner on the Hawaii State Foundation on Culture and the Arts; member of the Governor's Committee on Economic Future; trustee of the First Presbyterian Church of Honolulu; director of the Construction Industry Legislative Organization; and director of the Lyon Arboretum Association.

"At this time, may I present Dennis Toyomura. Thank you very much for all your achievements."

Mr. Toyomura rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and lei by Senator A. Kobayashi.

At 11:45 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

Senator Ikeda rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, yesterday's Star Bulletin has an article with a by-line stating 'State officials are wavering on relaxing the quarantine rules,' and it quotes the Director of Health Dr. John Lewin as saying, 'the World Health Organization is worried about a possible relaxation of Hawaii's animal quarantine law, which, Lewin said, is already the most liberal among rabies-free areas.'

"I'd like to set the record straight, Mr. President. Hawaii does not have the most liberal quarantine regulations in rabies-free areas. There are many other counties that have a similar four-month quarantine, including Sweden, and there are others that have longer quarantine periods, as well.

"It goes on to say that 'People who have no interest in the blind -- such as pet owners and commercial animal breeders -- could use the new law as a wedge to further open Hawaii's quarantine system, Lewin said.' That, Mr. President, is debatable.

"Your Senate Committee took great precaution in spelling out in the findings and purpose clause of the bill which we sent over to the House exactly why resident guide and signal dogs are an exception and should be excepted. And people who would like to prevent this legislation from going through because of the fact that they feel that it will open a greater wedge are continuing to use this 'red herring' as a means of trying to scuttle the bill.

"The article goes on to say that 'In gaining the freedom to travel to the mainland, the blind may lose their right to travel to Australia, New Zealand, England and other rabies-free areas, he added.' This is totally untrue.

"At the present time, with the exception of Sweden, our guide dogs are currently subject to quarantine whenever they enter any of these specified rabies-free countries. So we are not jeopardizing something that we already have.

"Mr. President, I hope that the members of the House Committees hearing this bill this evening will not be swayed by this misinformation and the confusion it has caused. And I hope that the resulting confusion and misinformation does not result in these people losing their right to travel to the U.S. mainland with their guide dogs. Thank you."

"Mr. President, as chairman of the ocean resources committee I shall look into the bill about these akule fishermen because I certainly don't want Willie to be living with my colleague from the Makakilo District. Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I find it again necessary to clarify my statements as quoted in the Star-Bulletin on March 20, 1990, as they were again taken out of context. It was quite disturbing to see the very thing that I took opposition to glaring on the editorial page in the quotable section.

"Mr. President, I am now and I have always been a strong advocate of our public school system. My sons, David and Jonathan, both attend public schools. However, like many others, I believe our public schools do have areas of concern which we in state government must address.

"I have received much input from concerned parents, teachers and students regarding our schools and have attempted to create a more positive school system. Teachers and students desire smaller, more manageable teacher-student ratios; students have a right to a safe school environment; and administrators have continuously expressed the need for stronger laws authorizing them to exercise more control over problems such as smoking on our campuses.

"I realize that we in the Legislature have spent many hours attempting to make these improvements to the quality of our schools. However, we are aware that there are further efforts that must be made to enhance our schools.

"Once again, I would like to reiterate my position as a strong advocate of excellence in our public schools.

"I was very thankful that Mr. John Symonds of the Star-Bulletin has allowed me the courtesy of expounding on these views and I will be expressing them further in the Star-Bulletin.

"Thank you."

Senator B. Kobayashi, also on a point of personal privilege, said:

"Mr. President, may I have it as a matter of record that it is my understanding that the Senate, in this session so far, has not accepted a single 48-hour waiver request."

The Chair interjected that the Senator from the 13th District was correct.

THIRTY-EIGHTH DAY

Friday, March 23, 1990

The Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, convened at 11:38 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Father James McFadder, Sacred Hearts Parish, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Ikeda who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Seventh Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Crozier introduced a group of 100 fifth grade students from Iroquois Elementary School and their teachers: Millie Kim, Geni Ebisutani, Rose Allen and Susan Miyamoto, who were seated in the gallery, and said:

"Mr. President, what is so special about these young individuals is that they are truly the ambassadors of Hawaii. Almost 90 percent of the students will, eventually, be moving back to the mainland or will move to a foreign country as their parents who are in the Navy complete their tour of duty in Hawaii and are reassigned elsewhere. The experiences that they have gained in Hawaii will be the message that they will take with them.

"I challenge everyone of them to, at least, become a surfer so they can say to those people in Kansas and Nebraska, 'I did surf in Hawaii.'"

Senator Yamasaki, on behalf of Senators Solomon, Reed and himself, introduced a group of 36 Key Club members from Baldwin High School, Maui, and their advisors, Barbara Huntley and Nelson Okamura, who were seated in the gallery.

Senator Chang introduced Ms. Catherine Parrish as follows:

"Mr. President, it's my privilege and honor this morning to introduce Catherine Parrish for her work as the managing director of the Hunger Project, United States.

"As managing director of the Hunger Project, United States, since 1984, Catherine has been a successful leader of leaders in communities across America. She has catalyzed volunteer leadership for raising the issue of ending hunger high on the political and economic agenda, a critical step in the strategy to end hunger in the world by the end of this decade.

"The spirit of volunteerism is nurtured and empowered wherever Catherine reaches. She gives shelter and puts food in the mouths of the hungry in San Francisco, New York, Chicago, Washington, D.C., Los Angeles, Cleveland and Southern Florida.

"We are getting together today to commend and congratulate Catherine Parrish and the Hunger Project on their commitment and dedication to eradicating for all future generations one of the world's most devastating problems.

"May I, at this time, introduce Catherine A. Parrish, managing director of the Hunger Project. Accompanying her are David Moncreif, Hawaii's Hunger Project

director; Kathleen Kook, advisor in the national office; and Chris Belnap, Hunger Project volunteer in Hawaii."

Ms. Parrish and her accompanying delegation from the Hunger Project rose to be recognized and were presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and leis.

Senator Chang also introduced Dale Hoffman and other friends and volunteers from the Hunger Project community in Hawaii who were seated in the gallery.

Senator McMurdo then introduced the 1990 Cherry Blossom Festival queen and her court as follows:

"Mr. President, usually Senator Chang does this introduction, and I've envied him for six years, but, today, it's my turn.

"In 1949, a group of young Americans of Japanese ancestry formed the Honolulu Japanese Chamber of Commerce to promote ethnic harmony through cultural activities and community service and to provide leadership training. In 1953, the Honolulu Japanese Junior Chamber of Commerce founded the Cherry Blossom Festival to promote and perpetuate Japanese culture, heritage, and traditions in Hawaii.

"Now, 38 years later, the Cherry Blossom Festival has continued without interruption to become one of the largest ethnic festivals in Hawaii and an integral part of the rich cultural heritage in our state. It exemplifies and helps to promote and perpetuate a respect for hard work and honesty; a belief in helping others, and an appreciation of the contribution of the Japanese people and their culture to Hawaii. It has also contributed to the enhancement of friendship and camaraderie among the various ethnic and cultural groups in our state and between the people of Japan and the people of Hawaii.

"The highlight of the Cherry Blossom Festival is the selection of the Cherry Blossom Festival Pageant queen and her court, who will act as ambassadors of goodwill for the Japanese community during their one-year reign. The fourteen contestants spent months preparing for this year's Queen Pageant and were judged on appearance, poise, voice, diction, and personality.

"Mr. President, I have the great pleasure and honor of presenting the queen, her princess and her three attendants, this morning, to you.

"Queen Lani Aiko Sakamoto -- 1982 graduate of Konawaena High School; 1989 graduate of University of Hawaii at Manoa with a degree in economics.

"Princess Liane Chizuko Fukumitsu, also holds the title of Miss Congeniality -- 1983 graduate of Grace Bible Christian School; proprietor of 'Fine Things,' a shop in Ward Warehouse.

"Attendant Candace Naomi Inouye, also holds the title of Miss Popularity -- 1985 graduate of Kaiser High School; flight attendant for Hawaiian Air Lines.

Attendant Anne Michiko Kinau Furukawa -- 1984 graduate of Castle High School; secondary education teacher; part-time employee of Japan Travel Bureau.

"Attendant Ardis Harumi Uehara -- 1984 graduate of Aiea High School; graduate student at the University of Hawaii; an assistant manager at the Hilton Hawaiian Village.

"The queen and her court are escorted today by Mr. Carlton Saito who is the general manager for the 38th Cherry Blossom Festival."

All of the young ladies rose to be recognized and were presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator McMurdo and Senators Aki, B. Kobayashi, Mizuguchi, Yamasaki and McCartney presented the leis.

Senator Hagino then introduced his student shadow, Kelly Miyashiro, as follows:

"Mr. President, Kelly is an 8th grade honor student at Aiea Intermediate School. She is a member of the Central District Honors Band and the Central District Gifted and Talented Band. She plays the clarinet.

"At this time, I'd like Kelly and her proud mother, my committee clerk Lois, stand to be recognized."

At this time, the President invited Cherry Blossom Queen Lani Sakamoto to the podium to address the members of the Senate.

Queen Lani addressed the members of the Senate as follows:

"Good morning! On behalf of the 38th Cherry Blossom Festival Committee and court, we would like to extend to you our warmest appreciation for inviting us here today. You all are a part of our everyday life that seems so intangible at times that it makes this visit so much more special.

The Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, convened at 11:36 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Alan Mark of Kilohana United Methodist Church, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Fernandes Salling and George who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Eighth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Tungpalan introduced "three of my favorite people -- my mother and my two sons, Jonathan and David," who were seated in the gallery.

Senator Aki introduced "a very distinguished visitor from our island nation of Guam, Mr. Ernie A. Sid," who was also seated in the gallery to observe the Senate in action.

Senator Cobb then introduced Joy Hancock and Stacey Sonoda, Kalani High School freshmen and district youth legislators, seated in the gallery among the participants of the YMCA Youth Legislature.

Senator Chang then introduced the youth officers of the YMCA Youth Legislature, who were seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

"Mr. President, Senator Cobb's introduction served as prelude to my introduction of several dozens of young people who, for the last several days, have been using the Senate and House chambers and conference rooms to deliberate the very kinds of issues that we've been pondering over for the last several weeks. These young people are YMCA members from Honolulu, Kauai, Maui, Kona and Waiakea Settlements.

"With us this morning are the officers of the YMCA Youth Legislature program. It's my honor to present: Youth Governor Kyle Chock, senior at St. Louis High (I might add that Kyle is the grandnephew of the Mr. George Freitas, former director of taxation); Senate President Deanne Waterhouse, junior at Punahou School; Senate Attorney Zack Smith, senior at Punahou; Senate Clerk Cathy Ohta, junior at Kaimuki High; Senate Sergeant-At-Arms Brian Watanabe, senior at Punahou; and Senate Chaplain Mitchell Osako, senior at Damien High School."

The youth officers rose to be recognized and were presented the congratulatory Senate certificate by Senator Chang and various Senators presented them leis.

At this time, the Chair invited Youth Governor Kyle Chock to the podium and he presented a plaque to the President as follows:

"On behalf of the YMCA's 41st Youth Legislature, I'd like to present Senate President Richard Wong with a plaque of appreciation and a resolution thanking him for what he has done for us. Thank you."

The President, on behalf of the Senate, accepted the plaque and resolution with thanks.

Senator Chang then added to the introduction:

"Mr. President, the officers of the Youth Legislature are joined by their senators from the various YMCA branches and ten advisors from the YMCA of Honolulu. May I ask all of the members of the Senate of the Youth Legislature, their advisors and officers to rise at this time and be recognized."

The Chair, at this time, extended his appreciation to Senator Chang for his part in putting together the YMCA Youth Legislature program.

Senator Chang also introduced Dr. Richard Kekuni Blaisdell, seated on the Senate floor, as follows:

"Mr. President, I would like to introduce our other honoree, this morning

"Richard Kekuni Blaisdell, M.D., a Professor of Medicine at the University of Hawaii School of Medicine, has served as an inspiration for Native Hawaiians and young people alike. An active voice for Native Hawaiians, Dr. Blaisdell serves as the acting director of the University's Hawaiian Studies Center and continues to educate young Native Hawaiians by instilling pride and cultural awareness in them.

"Dr. Blaisdell is also the founder of E Ola Mau, a Native Hawaiian health professional organization dedicated to establish health programs for the Hawaiian community. In 1988, Dr. Blaisdell played an integral part in influencing the drafting and passage of the Native Hawaiian Health Care Act of 1988.

"In 1965, Dr. Blaisdell was appointed to serve as the first acting chairman of the then newly-established John A. Burns School of Medicine.

"In recognition of his numerous contributions to the community, on November 12, 1989, Dr. Blaisdell was awarded the Hawaii Medical Association's 1989 Physician of the Year Award for Community Service.

"May I introduce, at this time, Dr. Richard Kekuni Blaisdell.

"Dr. Blaisdell, on behalf of Senator Bertram Kobayashi and Senator Ron Menor, former participants in the YMCA Youth Legislature program, we commend a new generation for your tutelage. Thank you for coming this morning."

Dr. Blaisdell rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and lei.

At 11:53 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 11:55 o'clock a.m.

"The book sale is such a large undertaking today that the books sold during any one year represent the equivalent weight of 35 elephants. Unfortunately, these '35 elephants' are presently being stored in a make-shift, portable classroom at Kaimuki Intermediate School. The weight of the books is so great that they have caused the walls to separate from parts of the ceiling and caused other damage to the floor structure of the portable classroom.

"This resolution will assist the Friends of the Library in getting better accommodations for their book storage. Thank you."

FORTIETH DAY

Wednesday, March 28, 1990

The Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, convened at 11:40 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Commander James Boyd, Chaplain, Naval Station, Pearl Harbor, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Koki who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Thirty-Ninth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Blair recognized a group of his constituents from the Banyan Tree Plaza who were seated in the gallery and said:

"Mr. President, it appeared that I was going to go through my entire first term in the Senate without making an introduction, but I finally have the opportunity. I am very pleased today to introduce some of my constituents from the Banyan Tree Plaza who are here today to express their apparent concern about the fact that we have not as yet passed lease conversion legislation sufficient to take care of their concern so they are here today to lobby."

Senator Solomon, on behalf of Senators Matsuura, Yamasaki, Levin, Reed and herself, introduced a group of Upward Bound students from Maui and Hilo Community Colleges, accompanied by their academic advisors: Brian McKinnon, director, and Noni Higgins, counselor. Senator Solomon said, "Our Upward Bound students are participating in a federally-funded college prep program and the purpose of their trip is to learn about government and to visit post-secondary educational institutions on the Island of Oahu."

Senator Matsuura, on behalf of Senators Solomon, Levin and himself, introduced students: Vincent Agliam, Leithton Ah Nee, Rodney Bohol, Ben Hatori, Austin Maluo and David Taylor from the Big Island Hawaiian Wilderness Program and their leaders, Bud Pomaika'i Cook and Keikialoha Kekipi, as follows:

"The Hawaiian Wilderness Program, which is a part of the Hawaii Island YWCA, completed a very successful inaugural year of operation for the Youth-at-Risk Program. This program was conducted in cooperation with the Family and Probation Services of the state Judiciary and state Department of Education. The program for youngsters, ages 14 to 17, currently has 40 students.

"Like Father Flannagan said of his boys in Boys' Town, 'There is no bad boy.' The Hawaiian Wilderness Program is demonstrating that, given the proper guidance and motivation, anyone can become responsible citizens, and an alternative learning environment will challenge students to gain academic achievement and increase learning. Some of us, like the Senator from Makakilo and myself, have had this kind of experience when we were of that age.

"The six students who are here before us earned this honor to represent their fellow students because they worked for it by winning positive points for their dedication and diligence in a variety of community service projects."

The young men and their leaders who were seated on the floor of the Senate rose to be recognized and were presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and leis.

Senator Nakasato, on behalf of Senators McCartney, Koki and himself, introduced representatives of the United Okinawan Association as follows:

"Mr. President, I am very honored to make this very special presentation.

"This year, we are celebrating the 90th anniversary of the coming of the first Okinawan immigrants to Hawaii. This year long celebration of the Okinawans, spearheaded by the United Okinawan Association is filled with many events. On January 7th of this year we reenacted the arrival of the first immigrants coming over from Okinawa. We built a replica of our old ship and we marched from the pier all the way to the Capitol.

"On June 6th we will open the Hawaii Okinawan Center which is in Senator Menor's district. The center is a huge undertaking of the Okinawan community in Hawaii together with the Okinawans from Okinawa. I think it was something like \$8 million that the community raised and we put up this center ourselves.

"On August 23, the World 'Uchinanchu' Festival will be held in Naha, Okinawa. On September 1st, the annual Okinawa Festival will be held at Kapiolani Park. The year long festivities will close with 'okage sama de' at the Hawaii Okinawan Center.

"All told, we'll be having 27 different activities this year, which will be fun-filled and very educational for all of us. All Senators and everyone here are invited to the festivities."

Senator Nakasato then yielded the floor to Senator McCartney who read portions of the Senate certificate to the United Okinawan Association and stated as follows:

"Whereas, the immigrants from Okinawa to the State of Hawaii arrived on the S.S. City of China at Honolulu Harbor on January 8, 1900; and

"Whereas, the industrious and hardworking Okinawans prospered and established homes, businesses and communities that reflect their rich cultural and great contributions to Hawaii's multi-cultural, multi-ethnic society."

"Mr. President, to just digress on a personal note, if I may.

"Mr. President, as time goes on, I think as we grow older, we appreciate more and more what our forefathers have done for us. My grandfather came here from Okinawa's small island called Ikeshima in 1906 to work on the plantations in Senator Solomon's district in Kohala. He quickly found that plantations didn't pay much so he became a fisherman.

"I have learned over the years of the contributions that people like my grandfather and many of his friends and relatives have made to the state. I'm really proud and honored to say that I'm Okinawan, and I'd like to thank the gentlemen who are here today for working so hard to make this 90th celebration such an important day in Hawaii's history."

"Thank you very much."

Senator Nakasato then introduced the five honorees who were seated on the floor of the Senate: Mr. Akira Sakima, former state representative and past president of the United Okinawan Association (UOA); Mr. Albert Teruya of Times Supermarkets, chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Hawaii Okinawan Center; Mr. Stanley Takamine, vice president of the Commission to Celebrate the 90th Anniversary of the Okinawans, accompanied by two of his grandchildren; Mr. Edward Kuba, past president of UOA, chairman of the fund raising for the Hawaii Okinawan Center, who is also a member of the University of Hawaii Board of Regents; and Mr. John Tasato, current president of UOA and chairman of the Okinawa 90th Anniversary Celebration Commission."

All of the honorees rose to be recognized and were presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and leis.

Senator Aki then added:

"I would like to acknowledge Stan Takamine because he worked in my office for one session many years ago. And I would like to extend congratulations to the Okinawan community for their foresight in building the Okinawan Center. I think they chose a very excellent location, right in Central Leeward Oahu, which is in the middle of our island. I hope Senators would take the time to visit the center. It's bigger than the Blaisdell Center."

Senator Chang also added:

"Mr. President, as the Senator representing the district that includes the Liliha Times Supermarket, as a connoisseur of 'awamori' and, as the Senator that represents one of the largest concentrations of 'Uchinanchus' in the State of Hawaii, I'd like to bid our visitors 'Hai sai gusuyo.'"

No. 50, entitled: "SENATE RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO DEVELOP AND IMPLEMENT A STRATEGY TO INCREASE THE ROLE OF HAWAII'S PUBLIC SCHOOLS IN PROVIDING PRENATAL CARE EDUCATION," was adopted on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23. Noes, 1 (Solomon). Excused, 1 (Koki).

Senator Solomon rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, as you know there appeared an article in the Star Bulletin, 'UH campus astir over social issues. Sexual harassment is a major cause for the unrest.' The article reads, Mr. President, 'Using the veil of secrecy, protestors have directed their anger primarily at sexual harassment and discrimination issues -- topics that have generated considerable controversy at the university' of Hawaii.

"It goes on to read, Mr. President, that '...some students and faculty members say the anonymous protests underscore a lack of confidence students have in the UH procedures for dealing with sexual harassment and discrimination.

"People should have the guts to stand up for their opinions, but unfortunately there is a great deal of fear instilled by the system," making students reluctant to speak up ...

'With the controversy raging on, the University of Hawaii President Albert Simone repeatedly has said the university will not tolerate sexual harassment and discrimination.'

"Mr. President, I find this ironic. In fact, your Committee on Higher Education, last Thursday, had a hearing in which we considered various resolutions that have been introduced, by myself as the chairman and other colleagues here in the Senate, dealing with issues on sexual harassment, on equal employment opportunity/affirmative action, and on what is the university's plan to increase recruitment of qualified women and minorities for faculty positions. Mr. President, I find this intolerable.

"What is sexual harassment. Mr. President? I quote from a testimony by the ASUH Academic Affairs Committee:

'Sexual harassment, by legal definition, is a form of sexual discrimination -- when someone uses words or actions of sexual nature that creates an offensive environment or makes compliance a condition of your education or employment. Courts have ruled that sexual harassment is a form of sexual discrimination and thereby a violation of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, a violation of the educational amendment of 1972 and other federal and state laws.

'People often assume that the only form of sexual harassment is physical assault. But harassment of sexual nature takes on many non-physical forms like stares or glances, or sexually oriented remarks. Even repeated unwelcome requests can be considered sexual harassment when the totality of the circumstances is investigated.

'Sexual harassment at the university has been amplified in the academic environment. The harasser, often a professor, has the power of grades, evaluations, recommendations, and sometimes employment over a student. The professor is often an older male and the student a younger female.

'The University of Hawaii under its present administration has traditionally had difficulty in dealing with sexual harassment because of the gross imbalance of power. Faculty often have tenure, a practice unheard of in the business world. This guarantees them a job, except for gross misconduct and sexual harassment is rarely considered that.

'The university if also hampered by its own sexual harassment complaint process. A process that is designed more to protect the privacy of the harasser

and the reputation of the university than it is with protecting the interest of students.'

"Mr. President, your Committee on Higher Education has purposely looked into these matters and we are going to be sending three resolutions for this body's consideration for adoption.

"But, Mr. President, it goes on. We're not only talking about sexual harassment. We're talking about sexual harassment/discrimination and how it affects minorities and people of color. I first had a problem with the words 'people of color,' Mr. President. I had to ask, 'What is that? What is the meaning of 'people of color?' I was educated today -- people of color are minorities.

"We, in fact, with the support of the Women's Coalition, sponsored this Senate resolution asking the University of Hawaii -- how ridiculous, Mr. President, how ridiculous -- asking the University of Hawaii to develop and implement short and long term plans to increase the recruitment of qualified women and minorities for faculty positions.

"Women represent 54.3 percent and minorities represent 76.1 percent of the student body of the university. However, they represent only 16.7 percent and 26 percent, respectively, of the tenured faculty.

"Mr. President, I'm emotional about this because I cannot believe that the administration of the university can condone such a situation.

"Here is a testimony from one of the female faculty at the university who has been there for many, many years. She says she is a kamaaina.

'I am a product of the public school system in Hawaii. I grew up on a major sugar plantation in what is still considered the "country." The nearest high school was some distance away in another community and transportation was a problem. Most of my classmates dropped out of school at the 9th grade, took jobs on the plantation, or got married. Perhaps only one percent went on to high school and college. I was one of the lucky ones.

'As a university undergraduate, my professors were haoles from the United States or Europe, except for my Hawaiian language professor and one of my accounting profs. I still remember the stir that was created on campus when the Sociology Department hired its first non-haole instructor. Some of us students made a special point of stopping at his office to congratulate him on his appointment. We were pretty young and new to this issue, but I had already experienced a similar situation when the plantation where I lived hired its first non-haole to head the survey department in the early 1930s. That, too, caused many tongues to wag. It made a lasting impression on me.

'Our community has long been dominated by the plantation mentality: male haoles hire non-haole workers. Our university still reflects this ethnic/economic imbalance. The world has moved on, but we are falling behind.

'What we need is a president who is totally committed to equal opportunity for all ethnic groups and for both sexes, one who is willing to stop looking over his shoulder for cues from his bosses. The world is changing, let's be part of that change and get out of the "old boy" system that is part of the backwaters of history. Plantations and the plantation mentality are part of the past -- gone -- so let's move the university on to a big new world where at least half of the new

hires are women in tenure track positions and where at least half of them are women of color.'

"Another testimony, Mr. President, that I'd like to share with this honorable body is from the president, himself, Dr. Al Simone. He says 'approximately one year ago I appointed a task force on sexual harassment. The task force has been meeting regularly and is expected to forward its recommendations to me by the end of this month.'

"He goes to say, Mr. President, that he 'believes that it is essential that the process for implementing these policies be educational and participatory given the importance and controversial nature of sexual harassment.'

"Mr. President, these should be dealt with immediately. Do we need a resolution to instruct the president to come up with a plan of action? A plan of action, Mr. President, on issues that are in direct violation of the Constitution of the United States as well as the Constitution of the State of Hawaii? Let's think about this. This is what sitting here in the chamber represents -- people's rights. I find this deplorable.

"Mr. President, I have a petition that was submitted to your Committee on Higher Education by students against discrimination:

'Madam Chairman, we have collected over a thousand signatures of support from students as well as faculty and community persons.' It goes on to say, 'while women constitute the majority of the student body, they are definitely in the minority on the faculty. Information from the journal "Academe" for 1988 shows that there are 378 male full professors compared to only 35 women full professors. The men outnumber the women in this rank more than 10 to 1.'

"The second problem, Mr. President, is one of race. 'Something is seriously wrong when people of color represent 76.1 percent of the student body, but only 26 percent of the tenured faculty. (The under-representation of minorities, of course, Mr. President, is no new statistic to everyone sitting here in this chamber). The under-representation of Hawaiians - 1.5 percent and Filipinos - 1 percent, in tenured faculty is particularly appalling.

'We need more people of color to be our teachers. Many local students who are not as vocal in classes as some other students can be helped by these teachers. This is often seen as an academic problem, rather than a culture/ethnic characteristic.

'In conclusion, the significant under-representation of women and people of color in tenure and tenure-track positions at the University of Hawaii has a negative impact on the accessibility of education for women students and students of color. Therefore, we are asking your support and your colleagues support for the passage of this resolution.'

"Actually, Mr. President, there should not be a need for a resolution. The president of the University should be already implementing this kind of a program expeditiously.

"'Ua mau ke ea o ka aina i kaponu' -- The life of the land is perpetuated in righteousness. Is this what we call righteousness?

"I conclude, Mr. President, that if Dr. Simone does not come up with any kind of resolution for these issues by June 1, he should be removed as the president of our university. Get somebody in there who understands what

this great country is about; what democracy is about; what equality is about. That's how strong I feel about this, Mr. President, and as your chairman of the Committee on Higher Education, I make this recommendation for all my colleagues to think about.

"This is the kind of person that we have running the university, and it hurts me. It hurts me deep down inside when people have to come to this body and beg us to resolve issues on discrimination and sexual harassment. This is an administration problem. The people of Hawaii have pledged their hard-earned tax dollars for a university which stands for equal opportunity.

"Thank you very much, Mr. President."

Senator Cobb, also on a point of personal privilege, said:

"Mr. President, rising on the same point of personal privilege as the chairman of the Higher Education Committee.

"I was the introducer of one of those resolutions. One individual has had a grievance before the university system, unresolved for a period of eight years. That individual has had two favorable rulings. Various federal agencies finding that there was discrimination practiced against him. That individual has further suffered discrimination with a member of his family who works at another part of the university system.

"Recently, there was an article in the paper that said the chancellor of the community colleges was quoted as saying that the state had appealed the federal decision in favor of Mr. Beresowsky. That, Mr. President, is simply not true because this individual's lawyer personally called the federal Office of Equal Opportunity and the federal Veterans Affairs Office in San Francisco to determine whether or not such an appeal had been taken, and was told 'no.' In fact, that there would be no appeal from that finding. There had not even been a request for a hearing before an administrative law judge. Furthermore, had there been an appeal taken, he and his attorney would both had to have been notified.

"I'm also aggrieved by the fact that a qualified individual, female of a minority group, by the name of Maivan Lam has been passed over in a selection process. She had a number of people there testifying in support for a position at the hearing.

"I am hopeful, Mr. President, that the chairman of the Higher Education Committee will bring forth a resolution and in even stronger form. And I would say to this body and to the university administration, a solution is very simple. You're either part of the solution or you're part of the problem. And if they don't get off the dime and resolve these cases, they are part of the problem. Thank you."

FORTY-FIRST DAY

Thursday, March 29, 1990

The Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, convened at 11:35 o'clock a.m. with the President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Doctor Christopher Eng, United Church of Christ, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Aki and Holt who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fortieth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator McCartney, on behalf of Senator Hagino and himself, introduced student "shadows," Tina Kanahele, Sesika Pulotu and Barbra Ferre, from Kahuku High School who were seated in the gallery.

Senator McCartney, on behalf of Senate President Wong, also introduced representatives of the Hawaii Census Bureau as follows:

"Mr. President, it gives me great pleasure to recognize and introduce some representatives from the Hawaii Census Bureau and to talk about the important event that's going to occur in our life here in Hawaii and nationally, the National Census Day on April 1st.

"The Senate certificate that we present to them today outlines the importance of our national census and says:

'1990 marks the 20th National Census. The genesis of the national census is rooted in the democratic traditions of our country. Article I, Section 2, of the United States Constitution mandates the undertaking of the census every ten years. The intent being to monitor the population changes of the states so that membership in the United States House of Representatives can be equitably allocated. Moreover, billions of federal dollars for a wide range of programs will be distributed to local governments based on population, age, ethnic composition, income and other census statistics. It is important for Hawaii residents to participate fully and accurately in the census to secure the most benefits for our state. An actual count is also important because census data are used for a variety of research purposes -- including scientific, economic, demographic, sociological, political and business.'

"Mr. President, I would like to introduce the two representatives here with us on the floor of the Senate. First, Lisa Naito, a former colleague of ours who served in the House of Representatives, is the master district manager for the Hawaii Census Bureau. Second, Bernard Matano who is the Waipahu district census manager."

Ms. Naito and Mr. Matano rose to be recognized and were presented Senate certificates of recognition and leis.

Senator Koki then introduced Mrs. Romalda B. Spalding as follows:

"Mr. President, this morning I am honored to introduce a very special lady. It would take many pages and many hours to enumerate her credits and accomplishments.

"She has dedicated herself to excellence in education. She is internationally recognized by other educators for her unique, effective method of teaching phonics at all age levels. She developed her system in the 1940s following extensive work under the direction of the late Dr. Samuel T. Orton, noted New York neurologist and language learning authority. The Spalding Method has been found 100 percent effective in teaching reading.

"Mr. President, on behalf of the Hawaii State Senate I'm delighted to present a certificate to Mrs. Romalda B. Spalding. The certificate reads:

'To acknowledge her dedication to excellence in education as teacher, teacher of teachers, consultant, business woman and language arts educator/author;

'To recognize the success in developing the unique, effective method of teaching phonics at all age levels -- "Unified Phonics." The Spalding Method of teaching children the English language with all its richness and variety is captured in her book, "The Writing Road to Reading" which she co-authored with her husband.

'To commend her for the many special honors she has received, for her long and distinguished career and for her efforts to improving the reading and writing abilities of all young people.'

"Mr. President, I would like to introduce to this body, Mrs. Romalda B. Spalding. Mrs. Spalding is accompanied by officers of the Spalding Education Foundation: president Lynn Gumaer, vice president Betty Lou Miura, and secretary-treasurer Sandra Myhre."

Mrs. Spalding, seated on the Senate floor, rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and lei. The officers of the foundation also rose to be recognized and were presented leis.

Senator Chang then introduced Mr. Henry F. Rice who was also seated on the floor of the Senate as follows:

"Mr. President, on behalf of Senators Hagino and Menor, both directors of West Oahu YMCA, and Senator Bertrand Kobayashi, a director of Kaimuki YMCA, I'm proud to introduce Mr. Henry F. Rice this morning.

"Mr. Rice celebrated his retirement from the Bank of Hawaii in January 1990. He began his career with the bank in 1965 as a management trainee. In 1980, he was appointed senior vice president and manager of Bank of Hawaii's Corporate Bank Division before moving on in 1983 to serve as manager of the General Banking Group. In 1985, he was appointed as senior vice president in charge of the bank's Private Financial Services Group, which includes the management of the Pacific Islands Division.

"Henry R. Rice is also an active member of such community organizations as the Hawaii Hotel Association, the Hawaii Visitors Bureau, the Strong Foundation, and is presently chairman of the Board of Directors of the Honolulu YMCA. In the past, he has also played an active role in the Hawaii 4-H Foundation and the Bishop Museum.

"The Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii recognizes and congratulates Henry F. Rice on the celebration of his retirement and wishes him a long and happy retirement and continued success in all his future endeavors."

Mr. Rice rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and lei.

Senator Chang also introduced: Mr. Don Anderson, executive director of the Metropolitan YMCA of Honolulu; Mr. Dye, former executive director of the YMCA; Mrs. Nora Kurosu from the YMCA; and Mrs. Dolly Ching, executive vice president of the Bank of Hawaii, all of whom were seated in the Senate gallery to share the observance of Mr. Rice.

Senator Tungpalan, on the introduction of Mrs. Romaldo Spalding, said:

"Mr. President, I want to say a few words about our honoree Mrs. Spalding. I'm a former pupil of St. Anthony's High School where the Spalding Method was used throughout my years there. I'm sorry to say that many of the schools have forgotten the use of phonics. It really should be reintroduced in our public schools because of the fine methods utilized. I was a person who had some learning problems and were it not for Spalding I don't think I'd have gotten on the road of success as I have. Thank you very much, Mrs. Spalding, for that."

At 11:48 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

Senator Reed rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, when organizations testify before your Senate committees, we tend to take them at face value -- we assume they're being honest about their backgrounds and credentials. We rarely take the time to check references to see if credentials boasted by organizations are valid. We rarely try to find out if a supposedly

objective, scientific organization has any conflict of interest.

"Well, it turns out that more caution may be advisable. It turns out that this Legislature has been sleazed.

"Last year, the Pacific Whale Foundation (PWF) was instrumental in killing bills that would have restricted or banned parasails and jet skis. The Maui-based PWF testified in your committee hearings that there is insufficient evidence to conclude that parasails and jet skis have a negative impact on whales and their calves.

"I'd like to share with you a Pacific Whale Foundation statement before this body:

'Our position with respect to the operation of thrillcraft and parasails is based solely on a consideration of the scientific data concerning the distribution and behavior of humpback whales'

"It turns out, that's a lie.

"On the very day that the PWF was here at the Capitol to testify last year providing their 'unbiased, scientific opinion' that parasails and jet skis need not be banned, foundation employees were at that very moment on Maui booking parasail and jet ski rides.

"What I have here is an invoice or a voucher from a company called Air, Land and Sea, an ocean activities booking company. There are several activity desk phone numbers listed on that invoice, but the office number printed on the invoice is 874-1000. If you had called 874-1000 last year to book a ride on a jet ski or parasail, the person answering the phone would have greeted you with 'Pacific Whale Foundation.'

"I have here documents showing that Greg Kaufman, who is the president and founder of the PWF, bought into Air, Land and Sea in 1985. And within a couple of years after that became the sole owner of Air, Land and Sea.

"Air, Land and Sea was purchased by Kaufman for the purpose of booking people on his whale-watch boats, and for selling tickets for rides on parasails and jet skis.

"The PWF representatives testifying before your committees posed as objective scientists. They claimed their opposition to a thrillcraft ban was based 'solely on a consideration of the scientific data' The chairman of your Energy and Natural Resources Committee, last year, listened to the testimony of an internationally respected whale researcher, Mark Ferrari, and then listened to the PWF. Your chairman offered what was a legitimate expression of confusion. He said, 'Here we have the Ferraris saying that jet skis and parasails are detrimental to whales and their calves, and the PWF saying the opposite. So what are we to do? Nothing. The conflicting testimony caused confusion and inaction.

"The reality is that the PWF has a clear conflict of interest -- they have made money off parasails and jet skis and they are major players in the whale-watch business. They therefore had a special interest in the defeat of any legislation that would restrict thrillcraft operations and have a potential negative impact on their whale-watch enterprise.

"Unfortunately, Mr. President, this one example is but the tip of the iceberg. The PWF is one of a half-dozen organizations in Hawaii with state and federal government permits to research whales. Without this permit, the average person or for-profit whale watch entity must stay at least a 100 yards away from a whale. A key benefit of

the permit, therefore, is that it allows researchers to get much closer to whales.

"My research provides documented evidence that the PWF has systematically and recklessly exploited their research permit to exploit for profit the very whales they pretend to be researching and protecting.

"One of the conditions of the PWF research permit is that it not be used for commercial purposes. In other words, researchers cannot legally make money off their permit. But that is precisely what Kaufman and the PWF are all about.

"This two-page advertisement appeared this month in Japan in a magazine called 'Marine Diving.' It's a very fancy, expensive, well-written ad. It's all in Japanese; I've had it translated. The headline says, 'Come swim with the Whales.' For 225,000 yen, approximately \$1500, Japanese tourists are being encouraged to come to Hawaii and swim with the whales. The photo that's on the top of the first page of the ad shows somebody with snorkel gear an arm's length away from a whale under the water. And this is what Japanese tourists are being encouraged to come to Hawaii to do under the guise of research. This ad makes it unmistakably clear that PWF is using its permitted access to whales to make money at the whale's expense. The ad goes on to say that for your 225,000 yen you can have an adventure vacation of your lifetime, come listen to the whales singing.

"Pressed, the PWF claims this is a part of their research intern program. Former PWF employees, however, say these lay people -- these tourists who have paid to swim with the whales -- are not trained to do any research at all. According to one previous researcher, this program is simply an 'adventure holiday' for tourists and one more money-making scam for the PWF.

"The same researcher said that the research activity of the PWF is 'a smokescreen to fool the public.' She said the research data is collected but never assimilated. She said she left the PWF when she discovered that 'its commercial interests overwhelmed its scientific interest.'

"The PWF further exploits its research permit by regularly selling its whale access privilege to filmmakers. One example is a 1989 agreement between the PWF and a Japanese filmmaker, Mitsuaki Iwago of NHK, the Japanese public TV station. The agreement, unbeknownst to the National Marine Fisheries, allowed Iwago to rent the PWF's research permit for \$300 a day. PWF employees took Iwago on excursions for the sole purpose of getting up-close footage of whales for his TV documentary -- a clear violation of the terms of PWF's permit.

"Incidentally, Kaufman allowed his permit to be used in this fashion for several weeks in exchange for the daily fee plus a commitment from Iwago to help PWF get a foothold in the whale-watch business in Japan -- further rewards not in keeping with the terms of his federal permit.

"Actually, the examples that I shared with you are but the latest in a long string of sleazy maneuvers by Kaufman and the PWF.

"When Kaufman first applied for the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) permit, he told the agency that he had a college degree. But when an employee of NMFS checked on it, that they had learned that he had never received a degree from that college. When confronted, Kaufman admitted that he had falsified his application and reportedly said, 'I never dreamed you'd check up on it.'

"Kaufman has also claimed to have received a doctorate degree from the University of New Zealand. This is also false.

"In 1982, Maui News reporter Gary Kubota revealed that the PWF was falsely telling the public that it was exempt from federal taxes and that donations to it were tax deductible. When confronted, Kaufman said the erroneous statement was 'unintentional.'

"This pledge sheet for a PWF 'Whalewatch to Save the Whales' has this 'unintentional' tax deduction notice in bold letters both on the front and on the instruction sheet attached to it. 'Pledges Are Tax Deductible,' it says on both sheets -- unintentionally in bold. (Incidentally this pledge sheet was copied virtually verbatim from a Greenpeace 'Walk for the Whales' pledge sheet. Kaufman plagiarized the entire Greenpeace pledge sheet and its instructions and then rushed to have his fundraiser a week before Greenpeace's effort.)

"In this May 13, 1980 letter, signed by Greg Kaufman, he wrote to Greenpeace International soliciting financial help. In this letter he claims to be the scientific advisor for the Greenpeace Hawaii office. But the person who was president of Greenpeace Hawaii at the time says Kaufman was never a scientific advisor to the organization and in fact has never been involved in Greenpeace Hawaii at all.

"While holders of a whale research permit are not supposed to make money off the permit, Kaufman has for years used his permit to get close to whales and then profit from the photographs and video footage obtained from such close proximity. This price sheet distributed in Maui hotels in the early 1980s reveals that Kaufman charges as much as \$385 for one photo of a breaching whale.

"Employees of the National Marine Fisheries Service and others have told me that Kaufman has been seen harassing whales for up to an hour and a half trying to obtain the perfect photo for sale. When a photo of a breaching whale with the West Maui mountains, for instance, in the background ends up for sale for \$385, and Kaufman is subsequently questioned by the National Marine Fisheries about exploiting his research permit, he claims he wasn't flying his research flag at the moment when he happened to get the photo. According to a NMFS source, Kaufman, typically, says, and this was provided to me by a National Marine Fisheries person, typically he says, 'We had just finished our research for the day, taken our research flag down and were about to come ashore when all of a sudden this whale breached right in front of us and I happened to get the photo. I was just lucky that day.'

"Also of interest is the PWF's Adopt-a-Whale fundraising program. This is a promotional piece put out by PWF that says, 'How would you like to add a 80,000 pound member to your family? You can, through the PWF's Adopt-a-Whale program! For a minimum \$50 donation, PWF will name a humpback whale after you, a friend, or your favorite name. In return for your donation, you will receive a handsome adoption certificate complete with a photograph of your whale, suitable for framing and a map of its last location and an informative letter about your whale'

"According to PWF former employees, what the foundation failed to tell anybody was that dozens and dozens and dozens of people 'adopted' the same whale over and over again. I'm told that, originally, the plan was just to have one person adopt one whale, but when

the foundation began getting hard up for money they began 'adopting' the same whale over and over again.

"In this letter to a potential donor, dated June 5, 1981, Kaufman claims that 'Of the monies that are donated to the foundation, over 95% of the funds are used directly in "saving" whales.' To the contrary, former PWF employees and bookkeepers for the foundation tell me that is not true. Former employees maintain that very little of the money from such donations goes into 'saving' whales or whale research.

"This June 12, 1988 letter to the National Marine Fisheries was written by a person who had worked for Kaufman and PWF as a senior research assistant for two years, until April of 1987. In this letter the researcher writes: 'Mr. Kaufman claims to have conducted research for over 11 years in Hawaii. However, he has yet to publish any of his Hawaiian data. His "research" appears to be a front for soliciting money from the public.'

"This researcher (and several other PWF employees I've talked to) also charged Kaufman with harassing the very whales he is supposed to be protecting. She relates in her letter one incident in 1987 when Kaufman returned from a day on his research boat with a Japanese film crew and informed the office staff that he had twice run his boat over a whale. She said, 'Kaufman jokingly suggested it would be easy to recognize this particular whale in the future due to the propeller nicks.'

"This researcher further writes that Kaufman 'discourages his researchers from publishing data which conflict with his whalewatch and business interests despite the fact that such data would be of direct use to the National Marine Fisheries in helping protect the whales and their habitat through whalewatching regulations.'

"Along the same lines, this researcher said Kaufman refused to publish study results showing that a jet ski operator near Maalea Bay was having a detrimental effect on whales and calves. She wrote, 'Mr. Kaufman informed us that he was not interested in publishing these data as it was a conflict of interest with his whale-watching business and with his role in instigating that the jet ski operation be installed in this particular locale.'

"The writer also made a charge that I heard from numerous people in this investigation that Kaufman insists that Americans going to work for PWF in Australia -- and Australians coming to work for PWF here -- lie to immigration officials, claiming to be visitors rather than workers. Other sources confirm that these immigration violations continue to this very day with Australian citizens working for and being compensated by PWF without a green card -- without a work-permit visa.

"In this letter dated March 4, 1988, another former researcher for the PWF took the extraordinary step of speaking out against his former employer. This letter is long and I'll just hit on a few of the main points. This researcher writes that there are many reasons that Kaufman should not be granted a research permit for marine mammals, including (1) 'The lack of scientific direction from Kaufman;' (2) 'The fact that not one publication in a respected peer-reviewed scientific journal has resulted from Mr. Kaufman's many years of research in Hawaii;' (3) 'Employees have been discouraged from analyzing data and writing papers by Kaufman;' (4) 'The fact that Kaufman presented false resight information to the "Adopt-a-Whale" parents' (5) 'That myself and other Australians were told by Mr. Kaufman to enter the United States on a holiday visa and to say to U.S. immigration officials we were holidaying in Hawaii when in fact we were working and being paid'

"Alarming, I am receiving mounting evidence of harassment of whales by the PWF. In citing his reasons in opposition to the PWF holding a permit, this researcher writes, 'Mr. Kaufman's attitude toward whales, research and other marine mammal scientists, employees, and the public lead me to believe he is not a fit person to hold a marine mammal research permit. I have seen Mr. Kaufman drive a boat around whales in such a way that I can come to no conclusion other than he is goading the animals. He has shown to me his method of causing an animal to bring its tail out of the water, which is to accelerate quickly up behind the whale in the hope of forcing the whale into diving. I have seen Mr. Kaufman drive around whales in such a way as to make the animal do something spectacular for a photograph such as a breach or tail slap.'

"One last letter from a person who also has extensive and impressive credentials in the area of humpback whale research who worked as a senior research associate for the PWF during the 1986-87 whale season. In this letter, this person writes that the PWF engages in 'research techniques which blatantly violate permit restrictions and unduly compromise the study subject' -- the whale.

"This researcher, too, charges that Kaufman's 'research techniques' harass and endanger the whales. He further corroborates the statements of others charging that Kaufman abuses his whale research permit by using it to take tourists and filmmakers right into the middle of whale pods. The researcher writes, '... the research permit states that photography should not influence or control the conduct of the research. This is basically impossible to comply with if working on a documentary with a highly paid film crew wanting those dramatic shots of whales under the boat or plane, etc. One such sequence was on a TV special about PWF during which the commentator mentioned how the whale actually hit the boat.'

"He continues, 'The fact that PWF is heavily involved in both aspects of whale watching provides ample opportunity for conflicts of interest to arise. This point was made painfully clear to me by Mr. Kaufman who told me that if the data I was analyzing suggested (as it appeared to) that there was a higher incidence of mother/calf pods in the northern end of Maalea Bay that I could not publish it because of his concerns about increased regulations on his whale watch boat which leaves from this region.'

"Mr. President, this researcher concludes his letter with the following: 'Finally, I had to address these issues when I realized that PWF's testimony helped to influence the National Marine Fisheries into recommending against the Hawaiian Humpback Whale Sanctuary. This is especially disturbing now that the conflicts of interest have become so obvious.' He adds, 'My criticism should be respected as firsthand accounts of a former agent under the permit in question.'

"Mr. President, I have spoken with more than 40 people in my looking into the PWF. Researcher after researcher agrees that Kaufman and the PWF are totally untrustworthy because of their financial interest in whale-watching, rather than in the whales themselves. But no researcher put it quite as well as one who is internationally known and respected for his whale research. He said that Kaufman and his chief researcher, Paul Forestell, are what he called the Jim and Tammy Baker of whale conservation. He said, 'What Jim and Tammy Baker are to religion, Kaufman and Forestell are to humpback whales. They claim to do research, they claim to be conservationists ... but they're not really concerned about the environment. They're mainly

concerned about making a lot of money, and building an empire.'

"By that yardstick, Mr. Kaufman has indeed succeeded. The PWF today has seven whale-watch boats that take tourists out on the water in search of whales. These boats are part of the for-profit side of the PWF, called Pacific Whale Foundation Cruise Co. The names are obviously very similar, and for obvious reasons. Kaufman wants tourists and others to believe that the money they pay to ride on one of his boats contributes to whale research.

"As this photo of a PWF Cruise Co. sign makes clear, Kaufman claims that any money you pay to go on the whale-watch goes into 'whale conservation and research.' That's simply not true. The money paid for whale-watches with the PWF Cruise Co. goes directly into the for-profit side.

"A former PWF bookkeeper told me the only time money from the for-profit side of Kaufman's enterprise would go into the non-profit side was when Kaufman wanted to keep his income from being taxable. For instance, this bookkeeper told me that if a tourist paid \$45 for a snorkeling outing, Kaufman would arbitrarily choose some amount, say \$10, to list as a donation to the PWF simply as a means of avoiding paying taxes on the entire amount.

"Many of us in this Legislature have been lobbied by the parasail operators. They want desperately to put as much distance as possible between themselves and the jet skis. Three Maui parasail operators had difficulty this year finding someone to conduct a study that would conclude that parasails do not bother whales. Finally, they offered \$24,000 for any research group, any organization, to do the study. Guess who came forward to take the job. Yep ... the PWF. Kaufman gets the \$24,000 from the parasail operators plus the free use of a parasail boat from January 3rd through April 30th of this year. A good businessman, Kaufman manages to get paid at both ends: the people he's taking out on the parasail boats he's using free of charge are the tourist who pay him 225,000 yen to swim with the whales.

"What's particularly repulsive is that Kaufman knows that parasails and jet skis are detrimental to whales. In this June 19, 1988 tape of 'NBC News, Sunday Today,' Kaufman was interviewed and states emphatically that thrillcraft have driven whales away from Maui shores. In this tape, Kaufman says, and I quote him, 'In the last five to six years, mothers and calves have been driven off-shore by jet skis and parasails' He adds that in Maui waters there are fewer mothers and calves, and bluntly states that they've been displaced by the noisy thrillcraft. He says, 'Studies clearly indicate that sound is affecting the whales.' He concludes this interview by asking and answering an interesting question: 'Is 15 minutes of excitement on a parasail or a jet ski worth the extinction of another animal from the face of this earth? I don't think so.'

"Why would Kaufman make such statements on national television in 1988 and totally contradict himself a year later in testimony against restrictions on jet skis and parasails? The only explanation I can accept is that he tells the truth when he knows his comments will have national exposure, and then lies here at home, willing to misrepresent studies and contradict other researchers to protect his financial interests.

"I talked to Greg Kaufman yesterday, Mr. President, and he typically denied everything -- including any involvement with the PWF ad in the Japanese magazine. He concluded our conversation by saying, 'Don't worry,

I'm going to come forth with my sources and they will impeach all of your sources.'

"Last night, I received a letter from The Cousteau Society -- one of my sources that Greg Kaufman evidently considers impeachable. This is a letter from Jean-Michel Cousteau. I would like, with your indulgence, to read part of this. It says:

'Dear Senator Reed,

I have been quoted as stating that it is a "proven fact" that thrillcraft harm whales. Paul Forestell of Pacific Whale Foundation has disagreed, countering that there is "no scientific evidence" of direct harm. I believe our difference of opinion has severe environmental consequences.

The gathering of scientific evidence is a slow, expensive process. The scientific method demands rigor and we thus abide by its findings. I realize that there is no published scientific data to prove that any craft are harmful to humpbacks in Maui or elsewhere. Such studies are worthy of funding, especially as our interest in these marine mammals increases and as the number of boats, thrillcraft and whalewatchers increases.

But when seeking answers to environmental questions, waiting for scientific evidence can be a smokescreen behind which questionable practices and behaviors continue while damage is done.

What is needed in Maui is a different view of determining harm. In our legal system, we assume an individual innocent until proven guilty. If that were to be our position in Maui, then it would be up to the whales or their advocates to prove that they are harmed by human behavior. That would, of course, become most possible after harm was done and data collected. This seems to be a comfortable position for Pacific Whale Foundation.

But humpback whales are an endangered species, here in Maui to mate and give birth, the most vulnerable point in a cycle of life, death, and perpetuation of a unique life form. To harm them to the point of being sure could make it too late to reverse the damage.

We must begin to assume guilt until innocence is proved, to assume the toxic dump, or plant, or intruder is guilty of environmental harm until proven innocent. The burden of proof must rest on the intruder, not on the voiceless victims.

Where is the middle ground? Perhaps we can begin to rely on a more ancient wisdom -- intelligent observation. Let us turn to scientists who are willing to share their observations -- such as Mark and Debbie Ferrari and others have done -- in order to help us determine risks and make timely decisions.

I consider it a proven fact that based on such observations, whales are being adversely affected by boats and thrillcraft, having to spend additional energy avoiding such craft. For an endangered species with a newborn calf, we can take a risk on the side of protection while we wait for scientific evidence.

My father and I have seen so much abundance disappear over the past 40 years. We stubbornly and optimistically believe that the seas are resilient and will rebound if we can discipline ourselves, if we can more gently wait to act until we are more sure of the consequences. I am equally sure that all in nature that cannot speak for itself in this debate, including the humpback whales of Maui, will suffer if we insist on

waiting until we are utterly sure of the damage inflicted.

Because humpbacks are a migratory species, the burden of responsibility for what happens to them in Maui becomes a concern of more than local interests. They are a cosmopolitan species, one which becomes an international responsibility, symbolic of global connections.'

And Mr. Cousteau concludes,

'Exactly because there is no scientific evidence that the whales are not harmed, I cannot accept Paul Forestall's comments as anything but self-serving. I urge you to carefully consider what is at risk here from the broadest long-term view.'

"Mr. President, as is probably apparent by now, I have accumulated far more information than I can take our time to share.

"So in conclusion, let me say that I am convinced, and share with other members of this Senate my conclusion that the PWF is not to be believed. As a research organization, it has absolutely no credibility in the international research community -- nor in my mind. In fact, my investigation of Kaufman and Forestall and the PWF has convinced me that they will do anything and say anything -- even support a position that is harmful to whales -- in order to support their exploitation of whales for their personal profit.

"Mr. President, I have written to the director of the National Marine Fisheries and to the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR). I'm asking both agencies to rescind the PWF's research permits. I believe evidence of abuses and violations of those permits on the part of PWF is abundant and undeniable. And I submit that the incidents to which I've referred are but the tip of the iceberg.

"I will also provide to the National Marine Fisheries and the DLNR a complete list of the scientists, researchers, and former PWF employees who are willing to corroborate and add to every allegation that I've made this morning.

"Further, I'm asking the Internal Revenue Service to audit both the non-profit and for-profit sides of the PWF.

"At the very least, Mr. President, I hope that this has cleared up any confusion that has existed in this Senate over why the PWF would oppose laws keeping whale-watch vessels away from whales, why the PWF would claim that jet skis and parasails do not bother whales and their calves, and why the PWF would lead the effort to kill bills restricting parasails and jet skis. Now we know why."

Senator Matsuura then remarked:

"Mr. President, just to comment on the previous speaker's remarks.

"The Senator from Maui can be assured that your Committee on Energy and Natural Resources will look into the matter that was just discussed. This is the first time that I'm hearing all of this. I'm sure that previous employees of the Pacific Whale Foundation have provided the Senator from Maui with enough information to warrant some kind of hearing to clarify his concerns. If the allegations are correct, I will make sure that their privileges as a foundation be denied. Thank you very much."

The Chair then made the following observation:

"Members of the Senate, the Chair would like to ask the chairman of the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources to gather the testimony presented by the Pacific Whale Foundation and to see if, in fact, the testimony presented to the committee has any credibility. That report should be brought to the President's office and we will act accordingly."

Senator McMurdo then added:

"Mr. President, I would just like to commend the Senator from Maui for the work that he did on gathering the information and this proof on the Pacific Whale Foundation. It appears to me to be proof at this point and I have no reason to doubt it. I would like to thank him, on behalf of the Senate."

The President then stated:

"Members of the Senate, I want to make it very clear that this is not a witch hunt. I think we must ascertain here that people who testify before standing committees of the Legislature are being truthful. That's the basic bottom line."

ADJOURNMENT

At 12:30 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Blair, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Friday, March 30, 1990.

FORTY-SECOND DAY

Friday, March 30, 1990

The Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, convened at 11:40 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Sister Marie Rosso, M.M., Maryknoll Sisters, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senators Fernandes Salling, George, Hagino and Nakasato who were excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-First Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Solomon introduced Mr. David Fuentes as follows:

"Mr. President, it gives me great pleasure this morning to introduce not only a good friend but a former colleague from my hometown, Kohala. The Senate certificate congratulating David Fuentes reads:

'David Fuentes is a teacher at Kohala High School with an exemplary record of accomplishments, and has played a vital role in revitalizing the spirit of the Kohala community by coordinating the annual Kohala Open Market for over 15 years. He has consistently and unselfishly volunteered his time and talents to help those in need. David Fuentes, on having his students recognized for numerous district, state and national Future Farmer of America awards, has himself been recognized by his peers and the Future Farmers of America as an outstanding educator. In his commitment to excellence in education, he has developed outstanding programs and partnerships and has helped many students, both the under-achieving and the talented, aspire to higher levels.

'David Fuentes most recently developed a state-wide fruit fly eradication awareness training program to educate students and the public about the benefits of fruit fly eradication to Hawaii's economy. He is said by students, parents, colleagues and others to be a valuable, respected, good friend and a leader in his own community and the state.'

"At this time, Mr. President, I would like my colleagues to give recognition to Mr. David Fuentes who is seated on the floor of the Senate.

"Of course, as the saying goes, Mr. President, behind a great man or a great woman there's always someone who has been an inspiration and motivation and, at this time, I'd like to recognize his 'mama,' Mrs. Rosario Fuentes, who flew in from Kauai especially to be with her son today.

"Seated in the gallery, and a surprise to David, his ohana -- brother Basilio Jr.; sisters, Nancy Fuller and Victoria Fuller; and niece Jocelin Perry.

"Aloha and welcome to the Senate."

Mr. David Fuentes rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and lei by Senator Solomon. Senator Holt presented a lei to Mrs. Rosario Fuentes.

Senator McCartney then added:

"Mr. President, I would like to echo the comments of Senator Solomon on behalf of David Fuentes.

"David is a personal friend of mine. I had the opportunity to work with him as a negotiator with HSTA. He was very instrumental in also getting the supplemental pay for agriculture teachers.

"And we thank him for working very, very hard on behalf of the children of this state because I know he is a genuine and a strong supporter of public education who has committed himself to that life and we commend him. Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan, on behalf of Senators Mizuguchi, Menor and herself, introduced the Pearl City High School Chargers Girls' Soccer Team, the OIA champions, as follows:

"Mr. President, under the guidance of athletic director Roy Ichinose, head coach Archie Chung, and assistant coaches, Al Watanabe, Frank Baumholtz and Gordon Matsuoka, the 1989-1990 Pearl City High School Chargers Girls' Soccer Team garnered an impressive, undefeated 12-0 winning record, thereby attaining the OIA Western Division championship and went on to defeat Kaiser High School by a score of 4 to 0 on February 24 to win the state championship.

"Through their winning record, this team exemplifies the rewarding benefits of hard work, perseverance, teamwork and good sportsmanship.

"Seated on the floor with us this morning are team captains, Dawn Baumholtz, Elaina Malak and Leilani Keopuhiwa, and senior team members, Kimberly Sparlin, Cheryl Chung and Jeanna Choo. Also, principal Gerald Suyama, head coach Archie Chung, assistant coaches Al Watanabe and Frank Baumholtz.

"Seated in the gallery are other team members: Lianne Abe, Nicole Arakawa, Renee Dennison, Jill Enomoto, Kris Ann Kanemoto, Laura Kuioka, Shelby-Rae Lee, Dayle Liu, Shelly Matsuoka, Joy Morisawa, Stacy Nakagawa, Erin Nakamura, Heather Ojiri, Kristin Ota, Jerlene Shimizu, Sheri Shimodoi, Sara Tanita, Noreen Tokita, and Amoreena Young. Accompanying them are team manager Roxanne Yonashiro and parents of the girls.

"Thank you girls for making Pearl City number one in soccer. Aloha."

Senator Crozier, on behalf of Senator Aki, then introduced representatives of the Na Koa Soccer Team as follows:

"Mr. President, I think it's quite opportune that I introduce these handsome young men who are one of the finest soccer players on the Island of Oahu. The group we have before us, the Na Koa Soccer Team, is just not an average group of young men that got together and played soccer. They have accomplished quite a feat. (I helped bring AYSO to Makakilo, and right now the AYSO program is 7,000 kids strong. My daughter played for AYSO in Pearl City.)

"The Na Koa Soccer Team started playing soccer in the Honolulu AYSO and they've been together for many years. Although soccer is one of the most popular sports in many European and South American countries, it is a relatively new sport in the United States and Hawaii. Last year, the team was invited to participate in the

prestigious Watford International Festival of Football in Watford, England. For these young men to be invited to England and compete in an international tournament, proves that they are playing at a very high standard. They won the under-19 division by defeating the United States all-star team and were honored with a team cup and medal for each of the 17 players on the team.

"At this time I would like to introduce five representatives of the team: Clinton Freitas from Roosevelt High School; Tirtha Dhkhawa from McKinley High School; Curtis Yoshioka from Punahou School; Kanale Delacruz from Roosevelt High School; and Ross Egloria from Kamehameha High School. They are accompanied by their coach, Shaina Caporoz, daughter of Senator Aki's secretary, Angie."

The young gentlemen and their coach rose to be recognized and were presented leis by various Senators.

Senator Crozier also recognized and introduced assistant coach Kiki Delacruz and team mothers, Mrs. Carol Nishimura and Mrs. Leatrice Egloria, who were seated in the gallery.

Senator Ikeda then introduced Miss Seema Ahmed, Miss MeiLon Kavanagh and Mrs. Carol Chun as follows:

"Mr. President, it gives me great pleasure this morning to introduce to you three outstanding people.

"Seema Ahmed has just been chosen Hawaii's Young Woman of the Year. This contest, Mr. President, is one where a person has to be well-rounded. In other words, beauty, brains, personality and scholarship. So it is a very difficult and tremendous honor to attain.

"Seema is a senior at University of Hawaii Lab School, which is also my alma mater. She is an honor student as well as an accomplished singer and an actress. She is looking forward to a career in international relations. Mr. President and members of this honorable body, it gives me great pleasure to introduce to you Hawaii's Young Woman of the Year Seema Ahmed.

"Her proud parents, Dr. and Mrs. Saleem Ahmed are sitting in the gallery. I might add, Mr. President, that Dr. Ahmed is working on the 'neem' tree which is a natural pesticide and we're trying to give him some assistance in that area.

"Also with us this morning is the first runner-up in the Hawaii's Young Woman of the Year contest, MeiLon Kavanagh. She's a senior at Radford High School, is an honor student and active participant in academic clubs as well as a dancer who's looking forward to a career in engineering.

"Accompanying the young ladies is Mrs. Carol Chun who is the executive vice president and state chairman of this event. She represents Hawaii's Junior Miss Incorporated which is celebrating its 31st year of service to the community. They are the sponsors of this annual event, and we would like to congratulate them on their 31 years of service. Thank you."

Miss Ahmed, Miss Kavanagh and Mrs. Chun, seated on the floor of the Senate, rose to be recognized and were presented leis by Senators Holt, McCartney and Crozier.

Senator Solomon then recognized and introduced Dr. Donald Duckworth of the Bishop Museum and members of the StarLab staff as follows:

"Mr. President, in celebration of education here in the State of Hawaii, we have, today, for us to witness a

taxpayer's expenditure of \$150,000, appropriated last session, so that 'the life of the StarLab Planetarium,' under Bishop Museum, could travel the islands to reach our students and the general public.

"StarLab is a portable planetarium program which is administered by the Bishop Museum Planetarium. As an example of StarLab's impact in the State of Hawaii, we took a look at the heavy but typical week of March 12-17 in the life of StarLab. During this week, three StarLabs were being used on our four islands by two planetarium staff members and three of the five DOE teachers who have been assigned to the StarLab pilot project and trained by staff of Bishop Museum Planetarium.

"On Hawaii, Janet Luh of DOE gave programs to 240 public school children; then visiting planetarium staffer Peter Michaud took the StarLab, Pony Express style, to do two nights of public programs in Hilo. He then moved it to Kamuela to do two more nights of public shows, and a day of private school shows at Parker School. Total Big Island audience: 320 students, 445 general public.

"On Sunday night, Peter Michaud brought the StarLab back to Oahu, where he made an airport baggage area hand off to DOE teacher Joanne Masui. She began a round of Honolulu and Windward district schools visits in the following week.

"On Oahu, DOE teacher Hiroji Mende taught a solid week of school programs in the Central and Leeward school districts to a total of roughly 600 public school students in grades 4-6. And he will do the same for several more weeks.

"On Kauai, DOE teacher Anne Tanioka gave 148 public school students programs in the first part of the week, and then handed the StarLab to planetarium staffer Ray Fabre', who did programs for 220 private school students and 270 general public visitors. Ray then moved the whole 'kit and kaboodle' to Maui, where he did shows in a shopping mall for another 90 members of the general public before handing off to DOE teacher Roy Nakasone for use on Maui, Molokai and Lanai for the next few weeks of school programs.

"The grand total for the week: 2,093 people took part in exciting, educational experiences in portable planetariums operated out of the Bishop Museum Planetarium.

"While the DOE StarLab program was assigned staff only on January 22nd, the program is already fully booked through the end of the school year. At this point, the various StarLab programs have reached over 11,000 people on all islands except Molokai. We will be there on the week of April 23rd.

"So, my colleagues, isn't that worth it -- a dollar per person, \$11,000. And this is thanks and mahalo nui to all of your support for this great creative project. The StarLab will be on the Senate floor today with planetarium staff presenting programs. Everyone is invited.

"Mr. President, I would like to recognize and introduce Dr. W. Donald Duckworth, president and director of Bishop Museum, accompanied by his wife Sandi, and staff members: Ken Miller, Planetarium chairman; Mr. Peter Michaud, production assistant; Ray Fabre', Planetarium education specialist; Susan Kodani, assistant director of public programs; Ann Klaus, education chairman; and Melissa Lyman, public relations chairman."

Dr. and Mrs. Duckworth and members of his staff rose to be recognized.

Senator Holt introduced a group of visitors from Wasilla, Alaska, who were seated in the gallery: "family friends," Mrs. Penny Herdon and daughter Kelly, and Mr. Donovan McRoberts.

At 12:03 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:10 o'clock p.m.

Senator Levin, in recognition of Doctors' Day, made the following introduction and remarked:

"Mr. President, today is Doctors' Day, and we in the Legislature have particular reasons to honor and to be thankful for these dedicated professionals who are servicing Hawaii so well. In conjunction with Doctors' Day, the Hawaii Medical Association is providing a free medical checkup this afternoon between 1:30 and 4:30 p.m. in the auditorium. All members and staffers are urged to take advantage of this opportunity.

"This is the second year that the screening has been provided. Last year's screening may have saved the lives of at least two individuals that I know of; one who discovered that he had high blood pressure and another who found out that he had a cholesterol problem even though he was young, thin, athletic, chip. So the life that you save may be your own, and I hope that you will accept this free service. Also, please encourage your staff to participate and take part and give them time off to do so.

"The Hawaii Medical Association has also shown its concern for the health and welfare of the members of this Senate through its recent donation of a weigh-in scale which has been placed in the caucus room. I know that I speak for my colleagues expressing thanks to the members of HMA for this much appreciated gift.

"The doctors are not in the gallery today. They are preparing for this afternoon, but, in the gallery, we do have the two main officers of the Medical Auxiliary: Ms. Maureen Lau, president of the City and County of Honolulu Medical Auxiliary, and Ms. Susan Wong, state president of the Medical Auxiliary."

"The Peer Education Program (PEP), jointly funded by the Departments of Health and Education, utilizes peer education techniques to increase student awareness regarding these issues. The 16 peer educators are trained in teaching about decision making, refusal skills, communication, and values clarification. Over the past two years they have reached out to approximately 1,000 students through this program.

"The Student Assistance Program offers support groups in building trust, coping with chemically impaired families, being aware of and confronting chemical use, and making a commitment to remaining drug free.

"The community action group, comprised of representatives of area businesses, education, athletics, church, community, and service organizations, works toward increasing public awareness of problems and supports efforts to rectify these problems.

"The Positive Program has had such a 'positive' impact upon the community that Pearl City High School has been nominated for federal recognition as a drug free school.

"Today, we'd like to recognize four peer educators -- student participants in the PEP -- Ray de la Cruz, Robyn Uyehara, Celicia Elderkin and Valencia Wiggins. Also on the floor are Hazel Shintani and Sharon Oie, counselors and group co-facilitators for the Student Assistance Program.

The honorees rose to be recognized and were presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and leis by various Senators.

Senator Tungpalan also recognized and introduced a group of teachers and students who were seated in the gallery: teacher Sandra Cruze, the Drug Free Schools coordinator for Pearl City High School, and PEP teachers, Kathy Tanaka and Joanne Ing, and their 11th graders from Pearl City High School.

Senator Matsuura then introduced Mr. Chuck Furuya as follows:

"Mr. President, it gives me great pleasure and honor to introduce Chuck Furuya, Master Sommelier.

"In 1989, at the age of 35, Chuck Furuya became the world's youngest person to earn the title of 'Master Sommelier' from the British Court of Master Sommeliers, an elite international organization dedicated to perpetuating the high standards and traditions of wine.

"This prestigious title of 'Master Sommelier' is the most coveted achievement among wine stewards and Chuck Furuya is one of two masters in the state and one of only twelve masters in the United States.

"I didn't realize how difficult it was to become a master sommelier. There are less than 50 in the whole world that have ever passed the exam to attain the title of 'Master Sommelier.'

"Chuck has just returned from having examined candidates who underwent the test to attain this title, and out of eight only one passed. In this entire world, there are only about 30 active sommeliers still alive and working.

"Mr. President, there is a slight conflict in making this introduction because Chuck is my nephew. He is the son of my sister.

"Mr. President, it gives me great, great pleasure to introduce Master Sommelier Chuck Furuya."

I'm sure you're aware of the recent media coverage, both via television and newspapers, -- that I would rather be a witch than a wimp, Mr. President, when it comes to dealing with issues on sexual harassment, discrimination, and issues that deal with equal employment opportunity/affirmative action at the University of Hawaii.

"Mr. President, the reason for the necessity of S.C.R. 149 and S.R. 135 is that there appears to be a conflict of interest in reference to the Equal Employment Opportunity and Affirmative Action Office at the University of Hawaii due to the many roles that this office plays, acting as counselor, investigator and respondent. Mr. President, I think it mandatory that the Legislative Auditor study the issue and come up with some recommendations as to how we can protect the integrity of the due process procedure as it relates to the administration.

"In reference to S.R. 138, Mr. President, on sexual harassment and discrimination, as you well know, this is a festering problem at the University of Hawaii and all the resolutions purport to do is to request that these issues be resolved as soon as possible.

"In reference to the other resolution, Mr. President, it is to resolve the problems regarding the recruitment of female faculty members and people of color. Mr. President, I feel I don't have to elaborate on this because I think the resolution presents the facts and I'm sure my colleagues will be in support of the resolution. Thank you.

Senator A. Kobayashi also spoke in support of the resolutions and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in support of the remarks made by the Senator from Kohala. I especially want to commend her for the leadership and effort she has contributed to examining and promoting the role of women and minorities at the University of Hawaii.

"The resolutions concerning the University of Hawaii before us today seek to reinvigorate the university's expressed commitment to equal employment opportunity and affirmative action by recruiting and promoting qualified women and minorities for faculty positions. Further, these resolutions promote the establishment of effective policies to address the problems of sexual harassment and discrimination so that all persons at the University of Hawaii may work and study in a respectable, tolerant, and supportive environment.

"The mission of the university is to provide a meeting place for the free and open expression and evaluation of ideas in a climate of respect, safety, equal opportunity, and diversity. This mission is jeopardized:

when all persons in the university community do not enjoy effective protection and redress from incidents of sexual harassment and discrimination,

when all qualified persons, especially women and minorities, are not sought out, are not recruited, and are not promoted for faculty positions at the university, and

when the Equal Employment Opportunity/Affirmative Action Office cannot properly perform its duties because it must serve as counselor, investigator, and respondent -- roles impossible for a single office to be able to perform with credibility and without any appearance of impropriety.

"These resolutions continue the efforts of the Senate Women's Caucus:

to promote equal opportunity and affirmative action in education and employment,

to promote the family and the need for child care programs, and

to promote improved opportunities for all citizens.

"I urge your support for these resolutions. Thank you."

Senator Holt rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, during the last few days much has been reported by the news media regarding the bill which increases the salary of the stadium manager. As the introducer of this bill, I would like to state for the record, the purpose and intent of this measure.

"To begin, there are two major reasons for this bill. The first and primary reason is to correct an inequity in the salary of the stadium manager which has existed since 1982. As you may recall, Mr. President, the salary of the stadium manager was equal to that of a department head from 1975 to 1982. In 1982, however, Act 129, the Executive Pay Bill, downgraded the salary of this position to that of a first deputy. Since that time, subsequent legislation for executive salary adjustments in 1986 and again in 1989 has continued to maintain this distinction while the duties and responsibilities of this position and the use of the Aloha Stadium have increased significantly. This is also the reason why the original Senate bill contained a provision for the establishment of an additional deputy stadium manager position.

"The second reason for this bill, Mr. President, is the additional responsibilities that will accrue to the stadium manager's position under Senate Bill 3233, 'Relating to Sports.' As you know, this bill which is supported by the administration, would create a 'Hawaii Sports Authority' which would be generally responsible for sports promotion activities and the management, operation and development of all state sports facilities, except for those which are under the control of the University and the Department of Education. There is no question in my mind that the passage of this bill will immediately and significantly increase the job duties of the stadium manager. In this light, Mr. President, the proposed change in title and increase in the stadium manager's salary could best be described as niggardly.

"I am somewhat surprised, Mr. President, that the administration has been silent until now when the bill has passed three readings in each house, to voice their objections. I am also surprised that the administration seems to have abandoned their original position as reflected in their testimony in support of this bill. For the record, Mr. President, I would like to read that testimony at this time. This is on Senate Bill 2969 before the Tourism Committee on February 6th -- comments:

"The authority under current statutes appoints a manager and a deputy. The stadium manager has full power to administer the affairs of the stadium and the related facilities and reports directly to the authority. This bill restores the salary of the stadium manager to the level of a department head. From 1975 to 1981, the salary of the stadium manager was clearly established at the level of a department head. However, in Act 129 in the 1982 executive pay bill, the salary of the manager, beginning July 1, 1982, was downgraded to the level of first deputy. Subsequent legislation in 1986 and 1989 for executive pay

adjustments have continued to remain the salary level at the first deputy level.

'We believe that the original intent of the legislation passed in 1975 was overlooked when Act 129 was passed. We have checked the minutes of the authority meetings and find that there are no records to indicate that the authority requested or concurred with the change.

'Your favorable consideration at this time to restore the salary of the manager to the director's level is timely in light of the continued increase in use and schedule of activities of the stadium. Use of the stadium has significantly increased since it opened its door in 1976. Originally conceived to stage baseball and football, the stadium now has surely become a multi-purpose facility which holds swap meets, motor events, concerts, etc. In the process, the stadium has become self-sufficient in terms of generating enough revenues to cover its operations. The future of the stadium as a stage to feature even more events continues to be bright. The increase in activity has also increased the administrative workload.

'The facility is also aging and the need to properly maintain it is evident, as we all know. We are requesting the authorization to hire an additional deputy to divide the workload in two -- one deputy to focus on the operations and the other to handle promotions, marketing and planning for future sports facilities. There is an increasing need to evaluate the financial wealth of potential promoters requesting use of the stadium.'

"And the recommendation, Mr. President, in that testimony to your committee: 'We strongly recommend' (not, we recommend; we strongly recommend) 'the passage of Senate Bill 2969.'

"As you can see, Mr. President, the administration at one time recognized the merits of the bill and voiced their support. Due to the adverse publicity regarding this matter, however, it appears that the administration has seen fit to reverse their former position. If this is the case, Mr. President, I would strongly recommend that this Legislature continue its support for this bill based on its merits and submit it to the governor for approval. To do otherwise would mean that we have succumbed to the same external influence and pressure.

"I had hoped, Mr. President, that the administration would have notified this body of their apparent concerns rather than try to influence us through the news media. And I am speaking of the April 4th article in the Advertiser where the governor is quoted as saying, 'We did not initiate it and we're not supporting it.' In fact, there is also a caricature of you and the Speaker, Mr. President -- it makes you look pretty tall, actually.

"Please correct me if I am wrong, Mr. President, but is it not the Senate's procedure to fully and openly, and with public input, (Let me say that no one testified against this bill, not in the Senate, not in the House.) debate the merits of any legislation in committee and on this floor? Isn't that our procedure?"

The Chair responded: "Yes, it is."

Senator Holt continued:

"If this is so, Mr. President, then it would appear that the administration is attempting to adversely influence this process through the media. Rather than circumvent the established process, I believe that it is incumbent on the administration to veto this measure rather than to try and

avoid it. In other words, Mr. President, the ball is now on the administration's playing field and the question is whether the administration will carry the ball, or punt on first down.

"This is important, Mr. President, because we need to know, all of us here, if the rules, the players, and the playing field will be the same the next time around.

"Thank you."

ADJOURNMENT

At 12:04 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Blair, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate adjourned until 11:30 o'clock a.m., Friday, April 6, 1990.

Friday, April 6, 1990

The Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, convened at 12:00 o'clock noon with the Vice President in the Chair.

"Mr. President, I'd like to offer a very brief update on the Pacific Whale Foundation, and the reason I do so is because your Committee on Energy and Natural Resources is considering a hearing where we would ask Pacific Whale Foundation's founder, Greg Kaufman, to come and answer questions that would be offered by this body. Therefore, we need to know the character of the person we plan to question.

"When I spoke to this body last week, I prefaced my remarks by saying that I had spoken to Greg Kaufman the day before and had spent an hour or so on the phone with him going over each of the allegations before I went public with them. In this week's Lahaina News on the front page, which I obtained yesterday, Kaufman denies all the allegations and, tellingly, denies ever having spoken with me.

"The article says, 'Kaufman said Reed did not call him before making his charges last week on the State Senate floor.... Kaufman says, Reed never bothered to even call me.'

"What Kaufman doesn't know is that I taped the conversation. So this is an hour of conversation between me and Greg Kaufman which he says didn't happen. He just says"

Senator Blair interjected and requested a brief recess.

At 12:18 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:19 o'clock p.m.

Senator Reed then continued:

"Mr. President, in this state, if two people are having a phone conversation, one person can tape, legally, without telling the other person that he is taping. If you are a third party, if, for instance, Senator Blair had been listening in on my conversation with Greg Kaufman and unbeknownst to me and Kaufman, he taped, that would have been illegal. But for one party in a two-party conversation to tape is perfectly legal.

"So, what I have here is an hour-long, legally taped conversation with Greg Kaufman which he says did not exist. Therefore, I think that we now have an even better indication of the character of the man who is denying all the allegations that I offered to this body last week.

"Thank you, Mr. President, and thank you, Senator Blair."

Senator Blair also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I'm happy for the sake of the previous speaker that Hawaii is a 'one-party consent' state. However, I wonder if this is a common practice of the

Senator and whether or not he is the Richard Nixon of the State Senate. Are all of his telephone conversations with all of his colleagues, since he first arrived here four years ago, are also on tape? Will he yield to that question?"

The Chair posed the question to Senator Reed and he responded:

"Mr. President, it's a very good question. I can only say that I have taped only important conversations." (Laughter.)

Senator Blair then said:

"Mr. President, I'm very relieved to hear that."

Because the interest on special purpose revenue bonds are exempt from federal and state taxation, the bonds would bring about lower interest costs on long-term financing for Kapiolani and Pali Momi, which is a much needed facility serving Aiea and neighboring communities.

"The authorization and issuance of these bonds would promote the state's interest in reducing the rate of increase of medical costs. Through these bonds, there would be savings of some \$2 to \$2.5 million per year over the life of the bonds. These are significant cost savings which would otherwise have to be borne through patient charges.

"Because the bonds would help to control medical costs, I urge support for this bill."

"Mr. President, I had planned on voting against this bill, but the good Senator, chairman of the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources, has assured me that my objections will be worked out in conference. So, I will be voting 'yes.' Thank you."

Senator Aki, also in support of the measure, stated as follows:

"Mr. President, I speak in support of H.B. 3149. This issue has been a long standing one and has become complicated and very controversial. It pits environmental issues against economic issues.

"I share the ecological concern, as do most of the residents of Kauai, and agree that an environmental impact statement (EIS) is necessary. But I also see this visitor attraction as an integral part of what the Island of Kauai has to offer in the way of visitor amenities. Without this important industry, the unspoiled natural beauty of the Na Pali Coast will not be accessible for the vast majority of our visitors.

"H.B. 3149 allows boaters to continue their present level of operation. At the moment there are approximately 15 permittees, down considerably from 40 or more two years ago. I also will strongly urge the Department of Transportation to not issue any more permits until an EIS and carrying capacity study are done on the estuary.

"I received letters and phone calls that the boating issue on the North Shore of Kauai is vital to maintaining the tourist industry on the island. This is a special, unique activity to that part of the island, along with its beautiful scenery. I have also received testimonies from many individuals, including Wai Ola, in opposition to this bill.

"However, while I am concerned with the environmental matter, I believe that there should be a way to allow this activity to continue at the present level in harmony with the environment.

"To this effect, efforts were made to effectuate a compromise. The following points were discussed:

1. Na Pali Zodiac (Clancy Greff) will immediately cease operations from Tunnels Beach (makua) at

Haena, and relocate all operations out of the S.M.A. permitted boat yard at the Hanalei River.

2. The Ad Hoc Committee recommendations as to numbers and carrying capacities will be followed by all interested parties, effective immediately.

3. All permitted boat companies will immediately begin putting 4 percent of their gross revenues into an account that will pay for the modification of the existing environmental assessment to an Environmental Impact Study by Wilson, Okamoto and Associates.

4. There will be a maximum agreed to time limit to complete the EIS that it will not take longer than two years from the date of this understanding.

5. This 4 percent gross revenue fee from the boaters will, after paying for the EIS, then be used for any environmental modification as may be necessary to assure maximum compliance with existing environmental laws and concerns that are scientific and actually detectable and can be mitigated. This fund will be used for park acquisition on the North Shore.

6. The commercial tour boat operators agree that the passenger number will not exceed the current operating numbers, plus the inclusion of Captain Zodiac's permitted carrying capacities.

"I am of the opinion that the County of Kauai is treating the North Shore boating industry unfairly by requiring them to develop an EIS while not giving them the opportunity to continue to operate, and generate sufficient cash flow to sponsor an EIS. The EIS is expected to cost at least \$150,000 and possibly more; with no assurance that it will be acceptable to the county or any groups or individuals.

"Mr. President, I have considered the concern of both sides on this issue and have come to the decision that H.B. 3149 is the best way at the present time to untangle this long standing controversial issue. I urge all members to vote in favor of this bill."

Senator Cobb rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I'm going to be voting against this bill even though the amounts are blank, and I think it's appropriate to share with the members exactly why because I do not necessarily disagree with the desire of flexibility in a conference committee environment by having a bill with blank amounts. But in no case do I see any attempt at consideration of alternatives in a serious vein anywhere in this bill. In fact, the entire bill is structured with blank amounts for an increase in the general excise tax, presumably from 4 to 4-1/2 percent that I recognize very clearly that it's to be a matter to be discussed and hammered out in a conference committee environment.

"Mr. President, we've been hearing from a number of people on the subject of an excise tax increase, and I'm sorry to say that, at least to date, there has not been serious consideration of viable alternatives in the Senate.

"During the first debate on the first crossover on this particular measure, a statement was read on the floor from a member of our congressional delegation saying

that it was necessary to have the excise tax increase as the source of guaranteed funding. Since that time, Mr. President, United States Congresswoman Patricia Saiki has stated publicly, and her aide has confirmed, that UMTA will recognize other sources of funding other than an excise tax as long as that is a dedicated and guaranteed source of funding.

"In fact, Mr. President, we missed our chance. You've missed your chance. We could have funded this with a lottery and with bingo, among other things ... too bad. That would have been a viable, dedicated source, however controversial.

"Earmarking a portion or all of the tourist tax revenues would be a viable, dedicated source. Granting the counties some of the exemptions they've been seeking for years would also be viable, dedicated sources recognized and approved by UMTA.

"I, for one, Mr. President, disagree with the scare tactics that are being used by some property management companies in their lobbying against the excise tax increase. I don't think it's a function of property management, but rather of greed. When we receive a bulletin that says, 'Rent increase is going to be passed on due to the tax increase.' And on March 21st we received a notice from Johnson Property Management, Inc. stating exactly that.

"The message behind this, Mr. President, is a disturbing one. Not only does an excise tax fall most heavily on those who can least afford it, but they are the ones that are going to be asked to pay for this increase. Mr. President, if one property management company is saying this in writing, you can bet your sweet petootie that at least a hundred are planning to do it, even though they are not going to say it publicly.

"Already today, rents in Honolulu are in the \$700 to \$900 range for a studio or one-bedroom apartment, and in the thousand-dollar-plus range for two bedrooms. In short, an inordinate amount of money is being spent by our citizenry just for basic shelter. This kind of measure is not going to help the situation one bit.

"I note that in the first crossover, the Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii had testified in favor of the excise tax increase. But since that time, Mr. President, both the Chamber of Commerce Government Affairs Council and the Tax Committee of the Hawaii Chamber of Commerce have come out in opposition to the tax increase. So has the Maui Chamber of Commerce. And rather than read their entire statement, I would merely like to ask consent and insert it into the record. (The Chair, so ordered.) (Attachment "A")

"In addition, Mr. President, Mr. Lowell Kalapa on March 6, 1990 presented a paper to the Hawaii Business Roundtable called 'A Probe of Mass Transit Financing - A Presentation to the Hawaii Business Roundtable' on the subject, 'Is a tax increase necessary?'" He concluded, in a document of over ten pages, that it was not. That if the present taxing system continued we would have by fiscal year 1996 a one billion dollar surplus. I would like to read just a portion of that because it is a long document and ask consent to insert the rest of it into the record. (The Chair, so ordered.) (Attachment "B")

"He addresses the question of biting the bullet:

'... it should be pointed out that the claim is being made to wit that the state is helping to build mass transit, but note that not one dime of state tax revenue is going toward the construction of the system. It appears that the state has overlooked the fact that the

same people who will pay for the 0.5% increase are those who pay current state taxes.

'If nothing else, the proposal to increase the general excise tax rates reflects the' (same) 'lack of good budgeting practice by the state. If the mass transit system and traffic congestion problem is of top priority to the state, then it ought to put its money where its mouth is.

'We are being told that "the time has come to bite the bullet" and to get on with mass transit. Flush with cash, the state has gone on a spending spree, funding every and any program or project. This is the direct opposite of what we had to do during the Seventies when cash was tight and we bit the bullet and counted the pennies to make do with what we had.

'Given the tremendous money machine the state now sits upon, it is once more a time to bite the bullet and get some priorities in our spending. It must be realized that the capacity of the taxpayer is limited and to use those tax dollars wisely. If mass transit is a wise use of those tax dollars, then we need to bite the spending bullet in other lesser priority areas and channel the available cash toward this project.

'Hawaii has already been recognized as a high tax state. Each year we provide this or that proposal to provide tax incentives to attract business to Hawaii. These proposals would not be necessary if Hawaii enjoyed an overall tax climate that was attractive to all businesses both existing and potential.

'To endorse a tax increase of this magnitude is a condoning of our state's spending practices and the belief that the taxpayer, both individuals and businesses, have not been squeezed enough. Yes, it is time to bite the bullet, but in this case it is the bullet of spending. Rather than being the starship drifting aimlessly through space, we need to turn up our booster rockets and direct our state into the future with the rocket fuel that we already have.'

"Mr. President, if I had seen in this bill or in writing a serious analysis of alternative financing of this project with the City and County of Honolulu, as well as for the infrastructure improvements of the neighbor islands, I might not feel as strongly as I do, but everything in this bill and in its attendant digest is geared only toward an increase in the excise tax, the primary difference being in this bill for now, the amounts are blank.

"The irony, Mr. President, is, I recall, that the committee from which this came, just a few days ago, filed a bill relating to an anti-speculation tax, at least partially on the grounds that such a bill was anti-business. Mr. President, this tax increase is much more anti-business. If we're looking to attract business to Hawaii, passing a tax increase is not the way to do it.

"If we are serious about helping those people who are on low and moderate income, passing a tax increase is not the way to do it.

"Unfortunately, to date we've yet to see a compilation of alternative financing in writing presented to this Senate. Everything has been in the direction of an excise tax -- nothing else, despite the fact that both Mr. Kalapa and others in this body, as well as in the community, have presented concrete proposals for alternative methods of financing where we do not have to raise our taxes.

"Apparently, Mr. President, it strikes me that the legacy of this session, if we would have passed this tax increase, would be as follows. At a year when we have a

surplus of between \$250 million and \$300 million, and in a year when we are talking about only a token rebate to the taxpayers of Hawaii of approximately \$1, we would be at the same time passing a tax increase. That, Mr. President, is not the kind of legacy I think our taxpayers or our citizens deserve.

"For those reasons, I'm going to be voting 'no.'"

"Mr. President, I would like to request that the Small Business Hawaii publication on the Honolulu Fixed Rail Transit, The Expectation Versus the Reality, also be inserted into the Journal. (The Chair, so ordered.) (Attachment "C")

"Thank you."

Senator Tungpalan rose to support the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this measure.

"As a Senator from the Leeward district, I fully recognize that a fixed guideway rapid transit system is probably the best alternative to meet our transit needs, especially on the Leeward side where 33,600 needed new homes will be built by the year 2010, resulting in a population increase of 132,800.

"I am definitely in favor of a Honolulu Rapid Transit System and extend my gratitude to the chairs of the Government Operations, Transportation and, especially, the Ways and Means, Committees for the current bill before us.

"The bill before us is really a shell. As a child, I enjoyed playing the shell game as I sought the penny that was under one particular shell. Likewise, the chairs overseeing this measure are also looking for money to fund this transit project.

"This morning, I heard Mayor Fasi say during a radio program that we currently give a \$50 million subsidy to finance our bus system and with the current labor settlement another \$6.5 million will be needed.

"I believe the subsidies are needed as it keeps the bus fare low and affordable -- thereby increasing the capacity on our roads and highways.

"Since the citizens of Oahu will be needing to pay \$56.5 million yearly to subsidize the buses, it is my hope that a mass transit could be developed through private funding by giving the mass transit developer the development rights around the transit station. That developer could build shops, park-and-ride lots, child care centers, medical offices and other needed facilities in the adjoining areas.

"In an effort to draw people to this center, the mass transit developer would keep fares low. Mass transit would be a 'loss leader' to draw people into the shops.

"In closing, I hope those involved with making mass transit a reality, including our City and County leaders, will seriously consider private funding coupled with development rights. In so doing, I think they would have picked the right shell! Thank you."

Senator Reed spoke against the bill and remarked:

"Mr. President, I will be voting 'no' on this bill. While I agree with the previous speaker that Honolulu certainly needs mass transit, I do not believe those who are telling us that we must increase the general excise tax

in order to fund mass transit. We're being told by both the governor and the mayor and others 'no excise tax increase, no mass transit.' I simply do not believe it.

"There are other ways that this could be funded that would be acceptable to the federal government and it is irresponsible for the governor and the mayor to be pushing this general excise tax increase without considering those alternatives. I say, 'Yes mass transit, no tax increase.'"

Senator Yamasaki rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, House Bill 2949, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, relating to taxation, which contains provisions of Senate Bill 3128, S.D. 2, permits each county, except the County of Kalawao, to establish a general excise tax and use tax surcharge of blank percent.

"It provides that the general excise and use tax surcharge shall be established by ordinance adopted before 'a blank' date which shall take effect on January 1, 1991 and remain in effect for ten years, until December 31, year 2000.

"It requires the City and County of Honolulu to use the surcharges for the purposes of financing design and construction costs relating to the development of a fixed guideway mass transit system.

"It also requires the counties of Hawaii, Kauai and Maui to use the surcharges for public transportation systems, including mass transit, sewage, water development, and parks, including park operation, maintenance, and infrastructure.

"The bill further requires the City and County of Honolulu to submit to the Legislature for review, twenty days before the 1991 Regular Session, a plan for a fixed guideway mass transit system. And, if no plan is submitted to the Legislature or the Legislature disapproves the plan by the adoption of a concurrent resolution during the 1991 Regular Session, then the provisions of the Act shall be in effect only until December 31, 1991.

"Mr. President, on March 28, 1990, we have received for our review a copy of an Alternatives Analysis/Draft Environmental Statement for the Honolulu Rapid Transit Development Project which was prepared pursuant to the National Environmental Policy Act, 42 U.S. Code, 4332 (2) C, and Chapter 343, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

"The statement was approved on March 19, 1990, by Louis F. Murray Jr., Western Area director for Urban Mass Transportation Administration and for the City and County of Honolulu by Joseph M. Magaldi Jr., deputy director, Department of Transportation Services.

"This document includes an Executive Summary, Chapter 1, including Purpose and Need; Chapter 2, Alternatives Considered; Chapter 3, Affected Environment; Chapter 4, Transportation Impacts; Chapter 5, Environmental Impacts; Chapter 6, Financial Analysis and Evaluation of Alternatives and Appendices.

"The Urban Mass Transportation Administration has approved the documents following an extensive review process and UMTA's approval indicates that the documents have met all federal requirements.

"The Honolulu Rapid Transit program is now in high gear and it is now the Legislature's support that is needed in resolving the capital financing needs by establishing a dedicated source of funding, and it is claimed that this

excise tax increase for mass transit on Oahu, which is the only feasible source, will be our most significant accomplishment of the 1990 session.

"A difficult decision must be made in the affirmative and I urge the members of this body to approve this bill so that it can be discussed further in conference to see if other options can be pursued.

"Mr. President, I would like to submit for the journal the letter received from Governor John Waihee and Mayor Frank Fasi dated March 6, 1990, and, also, a joint letter received from Senator Daniel K. Inouye, Senator Spark Matsunaga and U.S. Representative Daniel Akaka dated March 20, 1990, in support of the bill. (The Chair, so ordered.) (Attachments "1" and "2")

"Thank you."

Senator Matsuura also supported the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I totally agree with the chairman of Ways and Means.

"Let me mention just one thing about the mass transit. Being the chairman of the Energy Committee, I don't know who will be occupying this seat 20 years from now, but that body 20 years from now is going to thank the legislators that are presently sitting on the floor for taking a very bold action in getting mass transit started.

"I believe we have about 40 years left as far as fossil fuel supply is concerned. However, within the next 20 years you will actually see the beginning of the fuel crisis, and fuel is going to be very, very expensive.

"If this island does not have rapid transit in the next seven years, we are going to miss the boat. I believe, future legislators are going to thank us for the cable that's going to bring electricity from the Big Island to this island to run the electric train.

"Unfortunately, we don't have too much time -- maybe seven years at the most to get this mass transit system operating. So I agree with the chairman of Ways and Means that it's time that we stop talking and just do it! Thank you very much."

Senator Blair's remarks in opposition to the measure is as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak against this bill. I am not voting against the proposed rapid transit system, although its impact on traffic congestion has been exaggerated by the proponents so that the reality will probably be a disappointment to the general public.

"I am against this bill because it raises taxes. We don't need to raise taxes. We need to be more prudent in our spending. We can dedicate existing revenues, to meet the federal requirement.

"Life in Hawaii is already too expensive. Our citizens are burdened with outrageous housing costs and inflated prices for virtually every product they buy. They do not need for government to add to that burden by imposing additional taxes."

Senator McMurdo, in support of the measure, said:

"Mr. President, I do want to reiterate that although I am in favor of mass transit, I'm not in favor of the half percent increase in the excise tax. But, I am going to vote 'yes' as a vote of confidence for the chair of the Ways and Means Committee to go into conference and come out with something that is acceptable to all of us."

Senator Menor, also in support of the bill, remarked:

"Mr. President, I want to have Senator McMurdo's comments incorporated as my own. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, H.B. No. 2949, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 21. Noes, 4 (Blair, Cobb, Nakasato, Reed).

H.B. No. 2184, H.D. 1, S.D. 1:

Senator Menor moved that H.B. No. 2184, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi.

Senator Cobb rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Another one, Mr. President, that I will be voting 'no' on.

"Unfortunately, this bill has the net effect of leaving Las Vegas for those who can afford it. I recall taking an airplane flight on a foreign flag carrier recently where gambling was allowed once international waters were reached. All this bill does, in effect, is that if you've got money and can afford to go to Las Vegas, do it, and over 300,000 Hawaii residents each year do exactly that. But for the working stiff who can't afford that or doesn't have the time, resources or the commitment to go off to Las Vegas, that poor individual can't even go on a ship now, even if the ship were to go in international waters.

"A few of the members of this body, and I concur with their sentiments, indicated this reflects a missionary mentality. And I'm sorry to see it come because there are so many loopholes as it exists now. The Queen Mary comes to Honolulu and it has gambling equipment. Once it gets into international waters, you can gamble. And when it puts into port, of course the gambling equipment is locked up. The Maxim Gorky from Murmansk was in Honolulu two and a half years ago with a large contingent of East Germans, Poles and Hungarians. Even though that's a Soviet ship, there's gambling equipment on board, and as soon as they got into international waters they went right back to gambling.

"It's okay for the Queen Mary and the Maxim Gorky, but it's not okay for a locally based ship, even in international waters. I think that's disservice to our own people, Mr. President. For that reason, I'm going to be voting 'no.'"

Senator Menor spoke in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of House Bill 2184, H.D. 1, S.D. 1.

"In response to the previous speaker's remarks that this bill would deprive the little guy being able to participate in gambling activities, I seriously doubt that even if this bill were not to pass and Hawaii cruise ships were to be permitted to conduct gambling operations, that getting a ticket and being able to engage in that kind of gambling activity on a cruise ship would be affordable to the individuals, residents to whom Senator Cobb has referred.

"Basically, I take a somewhat different view of this bill than the previous speaker does, and I think that some

qualifying remarks are needed in light of the previous statements that have been made about this bill.

"Basically, this bill will qualify that under Hawaii law it's going to be illegal for the owner and operator of a ship which operates out of Hawaii to circumvent our state gambling laws by transporting passengers beyond state waters to conduct gambling operations. I believe that this bill is justified as a matter of fundamental fairness. By closing a possible loophole in our gambling laws, under which Hawaii's ships can get around these laws, what this bill is basically saying is that the wealthy owner or operator of the cruise ship must comply with those laws just like everyone else.

"Now, whether or not we agree with our state gambling laws, the fact of the matter is that they are in existence, and the prohibitions against gambling apply to residents and local entrepreneurs alike. So if our gambling laws apply to all of the residents of our state, I do not believe that the Legislature should be tolerating an exemption from those laws for the owner or operator of a cruise ship. In that respect, the enactment of this particular bill will insure that such an exemption will not be made.

"Regarding some concerns that have been expressed that perhaps this bill is creating a more favorable status or an exemption for ships which originate from the mainland and foreign countries, I think that a careful reading of this bill would indicate that such an exception is not being made from the general provisions of this bill. Again, what the bill is intended to do is to prohibit a Hawaii company from conducting gambling activities when the ship leaves port from Hawaii, goes out beyond state/interstate waters to conduct gambling activities and then returns to port to drop off passengers. If a mainland or foreign ship were to engage in this kind of activity, they would also be in violation of the provisions of this bill. Moreover, a mainland or foreign ship could also be subjected to criminal penalties if they conducted gambling activities within state waters just as a local cruise ship would also face those kinds of penalties.

"I also need to clarify subsection 3 of the bill to which a number of concerns have been raised about possible exemption for ships that originate from mainland or foreign countries. It merely clarifies that ships from the mainland or foreign countries that are passing from one point of destination enroute to another point of destination would not be in automatic violation of this bill because they had on board locked down gambling equipment. However, the owners and operators of these ships could still be prosecuted and face the same kinds of criminal penalties as a Hawaii cruise ship if they violated the specific provisions of this bill.

"So based on these clarifying remarks, I strongly encourage my fellow colleagues, irrespective of whatever your views may be on the issue of gambling, to vote in favor of this bill. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, H.B. No. 2184, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO GAMBLING ABOARD SHIPS," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 20. Noes, 5 (Cobb, Fernandes Salling, McMurdo, Nakasato, Solomon).

Please accept this memorandum as our input on the above mentioned subject. The Maui Chamber of Commerce strongly opposes the Chamber of Hawaii's position regarding support for the proposed general excise tax increase.

We believe that this position was made without consultation of the full board and is in opposition of the Tax Committee's positions on tax increases.

We do support mass transit for Oahu, but we believe that there are other revenue sources that could be earmarked for this purpose. Because a small committee of the State chamber endorsed the increase, the Governor's office has used the statement that 'Big Business supports a tax increase.' We have also run into a problem in that the State Chamber has been referred to on the news as the 'Chamber.' and our members have been concerned that we support the tax increase.

We believe that if the small committee of the State Chamber wishes to endorse the tax increase, this should be qualified to the media. The Board of the Maui Chamber of Commerce has stated categorically, that in this instance we strongly oppose the Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii's position, and believe that this position was taken without regard for the majority of members.

IS A TAX INCREASE NECESSARY?: A Probe of Mass Transit Financing
A Presentation to the Hawaii Business Roundtable
by Lowell L. Kalapa, Director
Tax Foundation of Hawaii
March 6, 1990

INTRODUCTION

This presentation accepts as its basis the cost estimates of the consultants to the City & County's Department of Transportation Services (DTS) and although there are a variety of routes under consideration, which in turn drive the actual price tag of the system, it is also accepted that the cost will be in the neighborhood of \$1.4 billion.

We have had the opportunity to review the consultant study on the financing of the mass transit system and have drawn the conclusion, (erroneous or not) that the consultants were only asked to determine how much a Mass Transit Tax (sales tax add-on) rate would be needed to build the system. Thus, the only alternative that has been discussed to date is the proposal to increase the general excise tax rate by 0.5% for a period of ten years.

The 0.5% scenario is based on the assumption that the federal government will participate on a 30% basis or about \$360 million and that bonds will be used to finance the initial construction costs with the tax collections being used to repay the debt service on those bonds.

THE NUMBERS GAME

The issuance of debt is a curious statement made by DTS as it has also stated that if the rate were a full 1%, the collections would permit a pay as you go program providing sufficient revenues and cash flow to allow the City to avoid borrowing. It has been stated that with the 1%, and assuming no federal participation, the tax would have to be in effect for six years and with the 30% federal participation, the tax would have to be imposed for only four years.

The City has stated that under the 0.5% scenario, the City would be able to bank on \$93 million (and growing), for the ten year period. If such is the case and it is assumed that those collections will grow, in ten years the City will realize more than a \$1 billion in cash, enough to build the system.

It has been argued the 0.5% scenario presumes the issuance of debt up front because of the expensive acquisition of capital equipment for the construction of the project. This argument is hardly acceptable as it presumes that construction will go full bore from day one. Further, it is hardly conceivable that there are sufficient resources, i.e., manpower, available to undertake more than \$100 million worth of construction activity in any one year, given the other major capital projects both public and private which are either underway or are about to come on-line. For example, the construction of H-3 will take several more years, the Aloha Tower Development, completion of Kakaako redevelopment, the international arrival facilities at Honolulu International Airport, and the redevelopment of Honolulu's waterfront to name but a few of the public projects.

If it can be accepted that raising the rate to a full percentage point will double the collections, then the 1% rate will generate \$200 million annually. As noted above, the City has stated that a 1% additional rate would allow the avoidance of issuing debt and that if there was no federal participation, the tax would have to be imposed for 6 years for a total tax take of roughly \$1.2 billion. In the alternative, if there is federal participation of 30% or \$360 million, the tax would have to be imposed for only four years for a tax take of \$800 million.

Thus, it appears that the cash price tag for the system is \$1.2 billion. It appears that if the six-year all cash plan were followed and it is accepted that it will take seven years to build the system, the city plans on spending roughly \$200 million a year to construct the system.

Conversely, if there is federal participation, and the cash price is \$1.2 billion, only \$840 million has to be raised by the City for the pay-as-you-go plan. Thus, this seems to be the logic behind the four-year estimate. However, this raises some serious questions as to how much is being financed by debt under the 0.5% scenario currently on the table and whether or not the ten years will be sufficient to cover the mix of cash financing and debt inferred by the consultants.

IS THE MONEY ALREADY THERE?

Unfortunately the mass transit financing proposal was based on past experience that the City has had in dealing with the state administration and the legislature in their requests for financial assistance. Assuming that none was forthcoming for such a massive project such as mass transit, the assumption was made that there was not enough money in the till to assist the City with this project. Therefore an increase in taxes appeared necessary.

Nothing could be further from reality although the legislature and the public is being told that by the state administration. The claim has been made that one should not look at the state surplus and assume that the system can be financed from the surplus dollars or for that matter whether or not UMTA would accept the surplus as the "assured source of revenues."

First, one should examine the adequacy of state revenues to fund on going state programs. The attached pages (designated by color) tell the story that given existing parameters, there is more than enough money in the state treasury to assist in the City in building the mass transit system.

The yellow attachment is the general fund financial plan proposed by the state administration. Estimated revenues and expenditures are outlined for the current and next five fiscal years. The estimates of revenue are prepared by the official revenue estimating body of the state called the Council on Revenues. It should be noted that when compared with the Council's estimates (shown on the white page) used to construct this financial plan, the administration has incorporated the transfer of the Transient Accommodations Tax (TAT) into its tax revenue line beginning with fiscal year 1991. This follows the Governor's endorsement of transferring the tax to the counties.

Please also note that the tax revenue line is also absent the \$90 million from general excise tax revenues which has been earmarked for the school facilities special fund.

Looking at the bottom line, the carryover balance indicates that there should be a cumulative balance by the end of fiscal year 1995 of nearly \$1.8 billion. Note well the number in parentheses of \$120 million for 1990. That amount is a "loan" from the general fund to the Housing Finance Development Corporation (HFDC) for the state's affordable housing program. The money was never appropriated but represents an advance to the HFDC. However, since the money is not in the general fund, it does not show up in the cumulative surplus. If it had not been "borrowed," the surplus at the end of this current fiscal year might have been nearly \$370 million.

The other day, a representative from the HFDC noted that it anticipated that the "loan" would be repaid by sometime in 1994 or 1995 when the revenue bonds have been issued for loans to new home buyers which in turn would be used to pay back the general fund. If that is the case, then by the end of fiscal year 1995, the cumulative surplus could be as high as \$1.9 billion.

A very similar presentation was made to the Tax Review Commission last summer. At that time, the commission gave the Budget Department the benefit of the doubt, believing that the farther out estimates of expenditures were a bit "soft" and rather conservative. The commission searched for a way to give the financial plan a little more credence and in doing so hit upon a very logical answer.

Under the state constitution, general fund expenditures are allowed to grow as fast as the growth in the state's economy which is defined by statute as the growth in the total state personal income. While it was not designed as a constraint, the spending limit is a barometer of how much the state should be spending relative to the health of the economy.

The pink attachment is drawn from the Commission's report and compares what the Budget director presented to the commission and the commission's reconstruction of the financial plan using the state general fund spending limit as the measure of expenditures. Note that the spending limit approach allows the state \$1 billion more in spending than the official Budget Department's estimates, yet at the end of fiscal year 1995 there is still a surplus of nearly \$900 million. It should be noted that both tables include the TAT collections as the administration at that juncture had not bought into the transfer of the tax.

The other (pink) page is also taken from the Commission's report and we would draw your attention to the reference to "Administration Study." During last summer, the administration had a consultant look at the state income tax and general excise tax collections under various economic scenarios. These two taxes were chosen because they make up nearly 80% of the general fund.

The consultants were asked to project collections for these taxes under three scenarios: (1) global recession, (2) decline of the dollar against the yen (which would therefore affect eastbound visitor counts), (3) appreciation of the dollar.

The Commission compared these forecasts against the Council on Revenues' estimates which it had used in reconstruction of the general fund financial plan and found that under the worst case scenario of the dollar rising against the yen, the consultants estimated that collections would be \$439 million less than the Council's over the six-year period from 1990 to 1995. Under the global recession scenario, the Council's estimates are only \$28 million less than the consultant's forecast for the same six-year period. Finally, if the dollar fell against the yen, the state would realize \$941 million more than what the Council is estimating for the same period.

It is interesting to note that the Council is conservative in its outlook by comparison to the consultants whose baseline forecast is \$271 million more than the Council's. What this means is that if the Council's numbers are indeed conservative and barring no major economic disruption, the Tax Review Commission's estimate of cumulative general fund surplus is also understated.

It should be noted that the Council on Revenues at its most recent meeting held in January, increased their forecasts for general fund tax revenues (see blue sheet).

The point to be made here is that absent any major changes in the tax laws and rates, the state should continue to enjoy general fund surpluses. The argument that there is or will be no surplus is an admission that the state administration plans to consistently go over the spending ceiling. If the state adheres to the ceiling, there should be more than sufficient revenues to assist in the funding of the mass transit construction.

THE ALTERNATIVES

Part of the current 4% tax. The foregoing discussion spotlights one alternative, that is for the state to share some of its tax largesse with the counties without having to increase taxes. Certainly, one does not pledge the surplus, but there is a difference in going up one half of one percent than designating that one half of one percent of the current 4% rate should go toward the building of the mass transit system.

Part of 4% for mass transit and TAT for neighbor island counties. In the alternative, the legislature could designate that 10% of all the general excise tax collections be designated for the construction of mass transit. In this scenario, the neighbor island could be given 60% of the TAT collections (the equivalent of three percentage points of the 5% tax) for their infrastructure needs. The remaining 40% would be left in the state treasury as intended originally for the construction of a convention center and visitor promotion.

Exempt hotel rentals from GET and increase TAT rate for counties' use. This is an alternative that was suggested by the Tax Review Commission. In order to make it a clear delineation, the taxing of hotel rentals should be a responsibility of one level of government, it suggested that the whole ball of wax be turned over to the counties with the possibility of setting a ceiling on the rate so that there was no tax increase for the hotels. This would generate more than \$110 million for the City & County alone. Further, unlike the 0.5% proposal, it would be a permanent source of funding for the counties.

Rather than dictating to Honolulu that the money be used for mass transit, the state could then set the carrot in the form of a matching grant, challenging the City to use the money for mass transit by dangling a categorical grant to be matched by own source revenues. It would then be up to the City to designate the assured revenue source needed to convince UMTA of the City's sincerity to build the system.

Increase property tax with state funded tax relief. It has been argued that increasing the property tax is an unacceptable means of financing the mass transit because property taxpayers have been "tapped out" with high property taxes. In truth, the feeling that property taxes are too high stems from the fact that the level of taxes is too high and indeed the state accounts for the bulk of the taxes levied in Hawaii.

Given that the real property tax is already available to the counties, why should it not be used to finance this project?

If the argument is that visitors pay the general excise tax, a recent study shows that only 21.94% of the GET burden is borne by visitors. On the other hand, a greater percentage of the real property tax is exported, that is paid by other persons than residents, than the general excise tax. This is due largely to the fact that the real property tax, like the income tax, remains deductible against the federal income tax while the GET is no longer deductible.

If on the other hand, the complaint is that the poor and elderly on fixed incomes cannot afford big property tax bills, the state can step in to assist these particular taxpayers by providing tax relief based on ability to pay. This concept, called the "circuit breaker" is currently used by nearly thirty states as a means of providing tax relief. This would allow to the City to undertake the political courage of raising property taxes and being accountable for raising the money to build mass transit without unduly burdening those who can least afford the tax increase. The state would be indirectly assisting the county in the financing of the mass transit system but at the same time taking the credit for providing the tax relief to those property taxpayers who cannot afford the higher taxes on their homesteads.

If the argument is that it is not an "assured source of revenues" for UMTA, the Council could, by ordinance, designate the first \$100 million or whatever it takes of property taxes to be paid toward the mass transit project for the ten year period. Thus, the first dollar after that earmarked amount would then go for other city services. An ordinance of that nature, earmarking the first \$100 million of property taxes might just be acceptable to UMTA.

Other possible sources. The 1980 Ernst & Whinney study of alternatives to finance a mass transit system looked at a variety of sources including the real property tax, the fuel tax, the weight tax and the public utility franchise tax as well as new sources such as an automobile ownership tax. These sources should be explored as well.

Another alternative is to examine parking fees and assessment of parking facilities subject to the real property tax. The recent closing of the Richards Street municipal parking lot sent tenants in other municipal lots scrambling for whatever space was available. This is an indicator that the demand exceeds supply of parking and the potential of raising revenue from those who continue to congest city streets exists.

It is ironic to note that the public players in this charade, that is state and county government, contribute the most to traffic congestion by "encouraging" their employees to drive to work. While most private parking fees in the downtown area average between \$90 and \$150 a month, state and county employees are charged between \$30 and \$50 a month for covered parking. Parking at NBC is below \$20 and it is accompanied with a free bus pass to get to and from the municipal building. Public employee parking rates are a potential source of additional funds for the mass transit system.

Finally, the consultant appeared to have overlooked the potential for aligning the routes along a course where the landowner wanted the location of the stations. The potential increase in traffic and therefore dollar sales with the location adjacent to a part of an existing business should be worth something to the landowner. This approach would be in addition to the concession fees which the consultants are counting on for operating revenues.

DON'T BLINK YOU MAY MISS THE MONEY

Although revenue adequacy was discussed earlier, there is another issue which should be considered in the total financial picture of the state and what funds can be made available for mass transit. Unfortunately, what has happened over the past three years and continues even so in the current session is the hiding of general fund revenues so the casual observer will not see it. Such action was discussed earlier with the school facilities special fund which earmarks \$90 million in general excise tax revenues. These funds used to go into the general fund but no longer will, at least for the next six years.

Worthy as that cause may be, what that action did was to set a precedent for lawmakers and spawned even more creative ways to hide general fund revenues. Moving through this year's legislature are measures which mimic that procedure. These include earmarking general excise tax revenues to the tune of: \$80 million for the state highway fund, \$75 million for a waste treatment fund, and \$50 million for a mass transit fund.

In addition, the HFDC wants another \$50 million to borrow from the general fund for its affordable housing program. it should be noted that no interest is due on this "borrowing."

The Foundation discussed the proliferation of special funds into which general funds were being dumped and which will forever be hidden from scrutiny and competition with other programs and projects which are underwritten by general funds. The Foundation's discussion of this proliferation follows:

The 1989 legislature approved a number of bills which establish numerous new special and revolving funds. Nearly all are funded by earmarking of current general fund revenues or by one-time or annual general fund appropriations. Examples include the establishment of a strategic development fund, historic preservation fund, educational facilities improvement special fund, and the water pollution control revolving fund; these four funds alone, will divert \$147 million from general funds or from sources that formerly were general fund receipts in FY 1990.

Other funds established to "shelter" or earmark money include a works of art special fund, state libraries special fund, UH library special fund, and high technology special fund. In all, the legislature created a dozen new special and revolving funds, funds which will be outside of the general fund review process.

Unlike general funds, special fund appropriations do not receive the same degree of review due in part to the enterprise-like nature of special fund programs. These funds are established primarily to collect moneys, such as user fees or taxes, generated from income-producing activities which are then funded from these sources. A drawback of this type of funding is that there is no guarantee the earmarked moneys will be sufficient to fund the activity.

Also, special fund appropriations do not lapse at the end of the fiscal period but will be available for that program in future years. This is in contrast to general funds which, if the money is not expended or encumbered, lapses after a certain period, thus returning the money to the treasury. Should the general fund program again require funding, it would have to compete with all the other priorities for funding. However, in the case of special funds, the money would go back into the fund; since only one program benefits from the special fund, the funds will be readily available because of a lack of competing programs. Finally, the general fund approach forces a reappraisal of priorities to a greater degree. Should one program become obsolete or fail to fulfill its objectives, it would be less likely to receive new or additional funding under the annual review of requests for general funds.

More than three decades ago, the state reduced the number of special funds as a means of bringing all state programs back under legislative review in the biennial budgeting process. it appears that this year's proliferation of special funds is a step back to those days when each fund represented a fiefdom unto its own and a constituency of limited interest.

Finally, it should be remembered that in many cases, these new funds will be underwritten by revenues that were formerly general fund receipts or are a diversion of general funds. To the extent that the state general funds will be reduced by the diverted amounts while continuing to fund ongoing programs will, in the future, create the illusion that revenues from general fund taxes are insufficient to meet the program demands of the fund. This, in turn, will give rationale for any tax increase proposal.

Further, as the amount of revenues to the general fund will be reduced, any excess or cash balance will be reduced by a similar amount. Inasmuch as the constitutional mandated tax refund is contingent upon how much is left in the general fund at the close of the fiscal year, the prospects for any substantial refund will be reduced as a result of carving out new special funds as this year's legislature did.

In the end, the taxpayers of Hawaii will end up footing an ever-growing tab for tax revenues. It appears that the state administration together with the 1989 legislature did not exercise fiscal prudence in the interest of the taxpayer.

The table below enumerates the new special and revolving funds which were created and approved by the 1989 legislature together with the sources of funding for these new funds. While it is clear for some of the measures that the funding source is to be general fund financing, others indicated the collection of fees or charges that either were formerly or would have otherwise been designated for the state general fund. In so carving out these formerly general fund revenues, the legislature is setting precedent of placing the designated programs before all others.

Should overall general fund revenues decline and the demand for current levels of services persist, the convenient alternative will be to raise taxes. If this year's action is the first of many in the proliferation of special funds, the taxpayer should justifiably be concerned.

Unfortunately, the tradition continues with all sorts of new special funds being established. There is a plethora of these measures making their way through this year's legislature. Again, what is important to note is that the general fund is being eroded. What was formerly general fund resources are being tucked away into these special funds. While it is argued that the legislature still has oversight over how these funds are to be spent, they will no longer have those funds available to fund other needs.

It is interesting to note that the state legislature wants to avoid the political heat of having to raise highway user taxes such as the state fuel tax and motor vehicle weight fees and instead is preferring to transfer general excise tax revenues to the highway fund to keep it afloat.

Unfortunately, this action only masks the problem that the earmarked taxes are set at rates insufficient to fund the system. A delay or postponement that this transfer represents merely will make it more difficult in the future when general fund revenues cannot continue to bail out the fund to raise those earmarked tax rates.

We are writing to urge your support for Senate Bill 3128, S.D. 2.

The fixed guideway rapid transit project is a vital component in our goal of providing Honolulu with an efficient, balanced, and flexible mass transportation system. Further, there simply are no other practical alternatives in terms of providing sufficient capacity to meet our mass transit requirements into the 21st century.

Our recent discussions in Washington with the Secretary of Transportation and the Urban Mass Transportation Administrator confirmed our beliefs in the merits of Honolulu's rapid transit project and the validity of the findings of the City's study effort. Our meetings with Congressional leaders also indicated an outstanding level of commitment for our project in the Congressional appropriations process. Considering the extreme competition for limited federal "new start"

funds, the unabashed enthusiasm and support from Federal officials and Congressional leaders for Honolulu's rapid transit project was most gratifying and encouraging.

The federal support, however, is totally contingent on our ability to provide a dedicated source of funding for the local share. Likewise, assured funding is necessary to enable the City to solicit formal proposals and to conduct meaningful negotiations with transit suppliers. This is why we need 1/2% excise tax surcharge authority for the counties.

Having achieved this momentum and degree of advocacy at the national level, we need to visibly demonstrate our local commitment to improving our mass transportation infrastructure. We, therefore, urge your support and vote for Senate Bill 3128, S.D. 2.

Dear Senator:

We understand that you and your colleagues in the Legislature are carefully considering various proposals to provide local funding for the Honolulu Rapid Transit Development Project. We are writing to urge your support for Senate Bill 3128, S.D. 2, which will, among others, provide a dedicated and secure source of funding for construction of the proposed Honolulu Rapid Transit System.

Three weeks ago, Governor Waihee and Mayor Fasi, together with our Hawaii delegation, met with members of Congress responsible for transportation programs and officials of the U.S. Department of Transportation regarding both the technical and financial plan for the Honolulu Rapid Transit Project. After hearing of our plan each member of Congress as well as the Secretary of Transportation applauded the project in terms of the strong local support and technical innovation. In fact, U.S. Department of Transportation officials have begun extolling the Honolulu Project as a mass transit model for other urban cities to follow.

FORTY-NINTH DAY

Thursday, April 12, 1990

The Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, convened at 10:13 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Richard P. Matsumoto, Palolo Kwannon Temple, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Holt who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Forty-Eighth Day.

At this time, Senator Matsuura, representing the Second Senatorial District, rose to say a few words about the late Mayor Bernard Akana of the Big Island as follows:

"Mr. President, Mayor Bernard Akana, by his life, exemplified the character which can be best summarized as: 'Don't worry, be happy.' The Big Island and the State of Hawaii have lost a true politician.

"While his political career was a relatively short one, he left a legacy comparable to none. His political style personified the Aloha spirit in the deepest sense. Anyone meeting him could sense the warmth of the man in his smile and his feeling for that person. It was this warmth, this sincerity, and that friendly smile that made him a winner. Any person who dedicates himself to the people of Hawaii until the last hours of his life deserves a special recognition.

"To the family of the late Mayor Bernard Akana, we extend our deepest sympathy and condolences, but just remember his words, 'Don't worry, be happy.'"

Senator Solomon, representing the Third Senatorial District, added her remarks as follows:

"Mr. President, in support of the previous speaker and on behalf of my family and myself, and the constituency of the Third Senatorial District, I would also like to express our deepest sympathy on the loss of Bernard Akana.

"I, personally, have known Mayor Akana since I was five years old and my family knew the mayor through various civic and Hawaiian organizations in the Hilo district. As the previous speaker noted, the mayor was a very impressionable person. He was warm and he exemplified a local attitude and strength in terms of how we view life on the Big Island. I think his election was an example of that.

"To his wife and to his 'ohana,' on behalf of the legislators of the Big Island, we would like to express our deepest sympathy. Thank you."

Senator Levin, representing the First Senatorial District, also added his condolences and said:

"Mr. President, I would simply like to reiterate the comments made by my colleagues from the Big Island.

"Mayor Akana was a kind, simple, decent, wonderful man, and he will truly be missed. Thank you."

At this time, the members of the Senate and guests rose for a moment of silence, in memory of the late Mayor Bernard Akana.

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Senator Reed on a point of personal privilege said:

"Mr. President, may I be allowed brief additional comments related to Bernard Akana.

"Since Bernard was elected, I have become somewhat familiar with him and would like to share a couple of things that I learned about him because they revealed his humility and his humor. Since all of us within hearing distance at this moment have our heads stuck in the world of politics in one way or another, Bernard's comments on politics should be of interest. The first time I ever heard of Bernard Akana, I was reading a newspaper article about his campaigning. At that time, he was seen simply as an old man sitting in the shopping center mall, talking to people, and a reporter came and talked to him. Bernard was saying all these things that he wanted to do, this long list of things that he would do if he were elected mayor, all of which cost money. And the reporter said, 'So, how are you going to pay for all these things, if you're elected?' Bernard said, 'I don't know.' Immediately, I liked him a lot.

"That kind of candor is something that most political candidates avoid. But Bernard was simply honest. He wasn't afraid to say, 'I don't know.' And he said, 'But, if I get elected, I'll find out. I'll learn the budget process and I'll find out how to get the money to do those things.' I admired Bernard for that kind of humility and candor.

"Bernard had run many times before and was always kind of treated, I think, by the party as somebody who'd never win and probably not treated with much respect. When he came to Maui for a function of Republicans, there were about 500 people there, and by that time we were all quite enamored with the humble man who got elected against all odds. So when he went up to speak, he got a standing ovation from these 500 people and Bernard said, 'Gee, now that I see how many friends I have, I can't believe I lost all those other times.' (Laughter.) That's indicative of a great sense of humor about the nature of politics. I've always realized that the difference between being a loser and kind of suspect and being an honorable person can be one vote. Bernard was aware of that and I really appreciated his humor and his humility. I'll miss him also."

Senator Crozier added his remarks and said:

"Mr. President, Mayor Akana symbolized to Hawaii what Ernest Hemingway's novel, the one we all had to read in high school, 'The Old Man and the Sea' symbolizes for all people around the world.

"In 'The Old Man and the Sea,' the old man throughout his life was, like the Senator said, many times ridiculed because he could never really catch much fish, but he was always out there trying. Finally, he caught his fish. Mayor Akana, in the same way, ran for office, I think it was twelve times. Finally, he got the prize -- he became mayor.

RE-REFERRAL OF SENATE RESOLUTIONS

"Like 'The Old Man and the Sea,' the old man eventually lost his fish. The sharks came and fed on the fish so that when he got back to shore, all he had was the remnant. But the people understood what the battle was and what he had accomplished. So too with Mayor Akana. He got his prize and became mayor, but, unfortunately, he did not have his opportunity to really bring home the trophy.

"We here in Hawaii and across the nation understand the commitment Mayor Akana had made and the struggles he had and achievements that he had almost accomplished.

"Thank you very much, Mr. President."

Senator Crozier rose to speak in support of S.R. No. 225 and S.C.R. No. 243 as follows:

"Mr. President, S.C.R. 243 and S.R. 225, are resolutions urging retailers to refrain from selling 'zig-zag' brand and other cigarette rolling papers.

"Mr. President, what I have before me is a blown-up version of what 'zig-zag' paper looks like. I'm sure half of my colleagues know what 'zig-zag' paper is and the other half does not know. So, to those of you that know what 'zig-zag' is please indulge me while I explain to our colleagues that don't know what 'zig-zag' paper is.

"Mr. President, 'zig-zag' paper or other brands called 'Job,' or '125,' are papers originally used when your great-grandfather came over from China and my great-grandfather came over from New Zealand, and they used this to roll tobacco. But times have changed; times have changed dramatically. Almost nobody uses these papers to roll tobacco. What they do use it for is to roll 'pakalolo' to make cigarette joints or 'pakalolo' joints.

"In these resolutions, I'm asking retailers not to sell this product anymore. The reason we're asking them is that all too often government has to mandate what we should do. I don't appreciate the encroachment of government on people. We let people off the hook. We gotta make people committed to be responsible individuals, and I'd like to comment as to why.

"Mr. President, what this does is to ask retailers to join with our young people, parents, teachers, ministers, community leaders, civic-minded individuals who are in the throes of battle against the most insidious cancer that has crippled our great nation. No one can argue about the many lives that have been lost or ruined because of the 'drug sub-culture' that has permeated throughout our community. Young teenage minds who are in the midst of making the painful transition from childhood to young adult are often irrevocably damaged or warped because the use of drugs at this critical period in their transition often misshapes the values that are being formulated within that young person's personality.

"These resolutions ask the retailers to refrain from selling rolling paper, it does not mandate the merchant from selling it. The reason it only asks them to stop the sale is because too often people expect government to solve every problem that arises. The difficulty with that is every time government denies an activity another stone is added to the basket of limitations that free people must

bear. We don't need another limitation but what we need is to awaken the spirit of good men and women to join in the fight. We need to have the whole community participate in their fight against drugs. We do not want to limit freedom but what we want is to have the 'social conscience' of these good people reawakened. We need to have the merchants realize that their role in the community is not limited to delivering products to the consumer at a reasonable and fair price. Supermarkets, convenience stores, 'Mom and Pop' stores are all part of the fabric of our community. When youngsters go into one of these stores they know they must conduct themselves in a given manner because the authority figure, be it the cashier, manager or owner, will reprimand them or even bar them from the premises.

"When the young person enters the same store and sees the 'zig-zag' or other rolling paper on the shelf, they know that the paper is being used for only one thing. And that is to roll 'pakaololo.' When they see it in a store they assume that the store condones the use of marijuana. If the authority figure in the community is willing to sell the paper, then he or she is willing to support the smoking of dope. The sale of the paper is an implicit message by the store owner that smoking dope is an acceptable activity. Mr. President, we all know that this is not true. However, beliefs and values of youngsters are shaped based on perceptions and not on facts. They are vulnerable to misinterpreting implicit messages that are sent out.

"Mr. President, I have written letters to many owners of stores, be it supermarkets, convenience or small 'Mom and Pop' stores, asking them to stop the sale of these rolling paper. I've had quite a bit of success, Mr. President. Already I've gotten a response from Foodland. Foodland has taken these papers off the shelf. Food Pantry, Mr. President, has also taken these papers off the shelf. ABC Stores have taken these papers off the shelf. Times Supermarkets and Star Supermarkets have taken these papers off the shelves. All of these store, Mr. President, just because that letter and the resolutions were heard.

"Mr. President, I ask my colleagues, people in the gallery, and people across the State of Hawaii, the next time they go to a store just quietly ask the manager ... you don't have to get into a big controversy ... just ask straight to the manager, 'Manager, could you please take this product off the shelf.' You'll be surprised how fast you can get results.

"Mr. President, I won't belabor the point but I'd like to leave with one thought and it's taken from our State Constitution. It is Article I, the Bill of Rights, Section 2, Rights of Individuals: 'All persons are free by nature and are equal in their inherent and inalienable rights. Among these rights are the enjoyment of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness, and the acquiring and possessing of property.' This is the main phrase, right here, Mr. President. 'These rights cannot endure unless the people recognize their corresponding obligations and responsibilities.'

"Mr. President, I ask the merchants, on behalf of all decent people, to awaken their 'social conscience' and recognize their corresponding obligations to join in the 'fight against drugs' by removing 'zig-zag' and other types of rolling paper from their shelves.

"I ask my colleagues to support these resolutions and, also, when you're in the community just quietly ask the merchants that you see selling this, 'Why are you selling it? Can you support the fight against drugs and take it off your shelf?'

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Matsuura also in support of the resolutions said:

"Mr. President, I totally agree with the previous speaker and I want his speech to be incorporated in the Journal as mine, and I congratulate the Senator from Makakilo for taking this step. Thank you."

Senator Solomon, in support of the resolutions, said:

"Mr. President, I'm going to be voting for these resolutions with reservation. I'd like to have that noted.

"Although I agree with the previous speakers in my support of saying 'no' to drugs, I don't know if urging retailers to refrain from selling 'zig-zag' brand and other cigarette rolling paper is really going to aid in that effort.

"As a matter of fact, Mr. President, I'd like to note that I have many persons in my district actually roll their own cigarettes and I feel that they should have that prerogative.

"So, I don't know. I'm kind of caught in a 'Catch 22' situation here. While I understand the intent of the resolutions, picking on just one commodity, philosophically, I find that very difficult. We do have people within the State of Hawaii that still do roll their own cigarettes and enjoy doing that, and I'm just wondering how that would affect them with the passage of these resolutions.

"Because we're simply urging retailers to refrain from selling, I'm going to be supporting these resolutions with reservation. Thank you."

Senator Cobb also spoke in support of the resolutions and said:

"Mr. President, in the State of Wyoming, the definition of a cowboy is someone who can ride a horse at a full gallop, backwards, and roll a cigarette with one hand in the middle of a blizzard. I'm afraid that with measures like this the cowboy is going the way of a dinosaur in the passage of history. But I recognize what the Senator from Makakilo is saying that times do change, and the drug fight is important. But I do share the Senator from Kohala's concern also that people who do want to have the right to roll their own should be able to acquire it through legitimate sources. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, the report of the Committee was adopted and S.C.R. No. 243, entitled: "SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION URGING RETAILERS TO REFRAIN FROM SELLING 'ZIG-ZAG' BRAND AND OTHER CIGARETTE ROLLING PAPERS," was adopted.

The Senate reconvened at 12:44 o'clock p.m.

At this time, the Chair made the following announcement:

"Members of the Senate, the Chair has been informed that the casket of our late United States Senator Spark Matsunaga will be here in the Capitol rotunda at 1:15 p.m., tomorrow. For those that want to pay their respects, it will lie in state until 1:15 p.m. on Wednesday."

Senator Matsuura, in memorium to the late U.S. Senator Spark Matsunaga, remarked:

"Mr. President, it is always difficult to say a few words for a person who has dedicated his life to his country and to the people of Hawaii.

"Most of us have experienced the unique pleasure of breaking bread and drinking the famous Senate bean soup at the Capitol. All of us have heard of the story when Secretary Haig mistook Senator Matsunaga as one of the Japanese diplomats at the reception line at the White House. These stories are a reflection of Sparky's generosity and humble character.

"Everyone in Congress knew of Senator Matsunaga's long working hours. I often wondered what fueled him to work fourteen hours a day. When I heard him speak on alternative energy and the peace institute, it was then that I realized that he had a very noble mission.

"Yes, he had a dream. His dream was the peace institute. To some, it may have been an impossible dream, but to him, it was a dream he knew he must accomplish. He knew that to accomplish that goal, the people of this world cannot go hungry. For this reason, Hawaii is the leader in alternative energy and ocean technology. Part of his dream was to share that technology so everyone in this world would share in the 'fruits of the green and blue revolution.'

"Spark Matsunaga also knew that the peace movement must begin in the Pacific and he knew he could count on

the people of Hawaii's Aloha spirit to be the catalyst to get his dream to come true.

"If we want to honor Senator Sparky Matsunaga, then let us all pick up his torch and strive onward to make his dream a reality. We owe it to him; the people of this world need it; and God demands it. Thank you."

Senator Cobb added his remarks as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise and add some remarks on what the Senator from the Big Island said about the passing of our late United States Senator.

"One of the few times in my life that I ever saw Sparky angry was over the issue of reparations for those who were unjustly imprisoned during World War II. And the anger was directed at the hypocrisy that he saw at the delaying tactics that he witnessed at the lack of willingness of those to redress what was a terrible, moral wrong in our history. Yet, even through that his sense of humor came forward.

"Many people knew Sparky as 'a nice guy.' But on that issue of reparations, he showed persistence, tenacity and the human feelings of anger and frustration in lobbying all of his colleagues and having 72 Senators of the United States co-sponsor the legislation to provide for reparations for Americans of Japanese ancestry.

"He was a man born and tempered in difficult times who rose in war to become a man of peace. Mr. President, it will be impossible to fill his shoes. One could only follow in his footsteps.

"And I would like to ask that in adjourning today, Mr. President, we do so in honor of the memory of our late United States Senator. Thank you."

Senator Blair added his remarks as follows:

"Mr. President, for one man to be a poet and a politician, to be both a warrior and person who will be remembered for his efforts to establish the peace academy, shows remarkable breadth. He will be dearly missed. I therefore request that we adjourn with a rising vote and a moment of silence, in the memory of our dear friend United States Senator Spark M. Matsunaga."

FINAL READING

MATTER DEFERRED FROM MONDAY, APRIL 16, 1990

S.B. No. 3236, S.D. 1, H.D. 1:

Senator Crozier moved that S.B. No. 3236, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Solomon.

Senator Reed rose to speak against the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in opposition to this bill and, in so doing, I would like to share some of the testimony presented by a cross-section of native

Hawaiians two weeks ago when this bill was heard in the House.

"First, is from Marion Kelly who says that this bill '... does not meet the demands of the great majority of those who testified in hearings held by Senator Inouye last August, people who said: "Do not tamper with the Hawaiian Homes Act; instead, put people on their land, as promised 69 years ago. What is needed now is action, not more palapala."'

"The second is from Billie Beamer, past chairman of the Hawaiian Homes Commission. Mrs. Beamer says, among other things, 'This bill is a Trojan horse, and we all learned from history to beware of those who come bearing solicitous gifts which usually house the disguised seeds of devastation and destruction planted by those in quest of more territorial imperatives ... 150,000 acres to be specific. In light of these and many other concerns, this presumptuous bill imposed upon us must be killed. To date more than 12,000 have signed petitions in concurrence.' Incidentally, I'm told that figure is now 20,000.

"The following testimony was presented by Kekuni Blaisdell, speaking on behalf of Ka Pakaukau. 'This bill fails to fulfill the unilateral commitments made by the U.S. and then territorial governments almost 70 years ago. That is, the bill does nothing to ensure prompt placement of eligible Native Hawaiians, now numbering over 20,000 waiting, into homes on improved lots on stolen Hawaiian lands.

'The recurring plea of the dozens of Hawaiians who testified at the Inouye August 1989 hearings was to fulfill these commitments by placing Hawaiians on their lands. This is the plea that is being ignored by this bill.

'If your committees sincerely want to help Hawaiians with respect to Hawaiian Home Lands, you will kill this bill, or at least defer it for discussion by our people.'

"The next to testify, Mr. President, was Roy Benham, a retired teacher at Kamehameha, also past federal administrator, now volunteer member of the Kupuna program and president of the Hawaiian Business and Professional Association. He says, 'I offer no amendments, because, I believe this bill should be deferred or, if you are inclined to, kill it.

'This bill is much too important to the future of Hawaiian programs to be legislated so hurriedly without allowing us time for a thorough review.

'We endorse the call to accelerate the placement of the landless Hawaiians in homes on their land.

'To place only 3400 people on the land in 69 years is criminal negligence. Let's concentrate on correcting that problem first. I ask you to defer this bill.'

"The next person is Healani Doane, Kuhina Nui, Daughters and Sons of the Hawaiian Warriors. She says in part: 'I am 80 years old and have watched over the years the land being plundered and rightful beneficiaries of the public trust ignored.

'I believe so strongly in the priority of need to place the native Hawaiian people on the land that I sit at Safeway Store to collect support signatures to stop this kind of sabotage of the rights and benefits of the native Hawaiian people. Our native Hawaiian people deserve better consideration, attention and treatment. With each signature that I have collected in opposition to Senate Bill 3236, I got the same indignant response,

"quit the politics and put the native Hawaiian people back onto the land."

'You do not have the authority of the native Hawaiian people to dismantle nor change the Act in its present form. Look at this unprecedented gathering of native Hawaiian people and their representatives here this evening. Are you in a better position than we are to know what is best for us native Hawaiians in view of our objection to Senate Bill 3236? With more than 20,000 native Hawaiian applicants still on the wait list hoping to get a chance to some of the benefits of this public trust, I say freeze Senate Bill 3236 and "implement" and not "derogate" is the rightful solution. Thank you.'

"I'd like to also quote a person who says, 'I am Mealii Kalama, lay pastor of Kawaihau Church. I have also been active in the perpetuation of our Hawaiian arts and crafts, particularly the art of quilting. I have presented and displayed our Hawaiian art across the country, including the Smithsonian Museum.

'I appear this evening, my first time in testifying, to ask that passage of Senate Bill 3236 be deferred.

'Let us devote our utmost effort to make good the promise made too many years ago. Why can we not place our people on the land as our uppermost priority now?'

"A former Department of Home Lands commissioner, Hazel Kauahikaua, having served two terms under Billie Beamer and Georgiana Paden says, 'I speak against this bill because its provisions are unnecessary. It should be killed. Due to our efforts the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands increased its revenues by more than 1.5 million annually till today.

'The purpose of the Act is to place people on the land. The duty of the commission is to implement the Act. We fulfilled this purpose with vim, vigor and vitality. We did not have to wait 60 years to have the purpose defined.

'The duty of the governor and the legislature is to see that the act is faithfully executed. Upon your leadership lies the future of this program and that future is not dependent upon a new purpose but is dependent upon a renewed commitment to carry out the original purposes of the Act.'

"To also quote Mililani Trask, representing Ka Lahui Hawai'i, she says, 'While it is true that the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act does not have a purpose clause, it is very clear what the objectives of the Act are. The Federal-State Task Force Report of 1983 identified the primary objectives of the Act. ... These recommendations have not been implemented. The Task Force did not see a need to amend the Act to insert a "Purpose Clause."

'Last summer, Senator Inouye held hearings on each island on this Act. Several hundred people testified, most were homesteaders. What they wanted were homes, water, and infrastructure. No one asked that the bill be amended to include a purpose.

'This bill does not address the current needs of the homesteaders. What it does do is "open the door" for future federal amendments to the Act.'

"She continues, 'We oppose this and believe that Senator Inouye should be made to present his entire legislative package for state review before the state takes any action on this measure. ... This would also give our Hawaiian community the opportunity to see what Inouye's

bill is and to discuss it. The 1990 legislative record indicates that the (Hawaiian) community is sharply divided on this issue."

"Mr. President, for years critics have said that Hawaiians never get together. But this testimony represents a broad cross-section of the statewide Hawaiian community getting together to say, 'Don't pass this bill.' The Hawaiians are criticized for not working together, but when they do, no one listens. What will it take before Hawaiians are listened to?"

"I join with these Hawaiians and 20,000 others who ask that passage of this bill be deferred, at least until the Hawaiian community has had sufficient time to thoroughly debate it. There is no need to rush passage of this bill. But, there is a need to rush to put native Hawaiians back on their land. The federal government, but even more grievously, the state government has been outrageously negligent in its failure to put Hawaiians on their land."

"In the 70 years since the Hawaiian Homes Act was formed, only 3400 native Hawaiians have been placed on the land. That's a shameful 48 people per year. Worse yet, in the past four years, only 127 people have been placed on the land. That's 31 per year."

"The problem is not money. The state doesn't have to pay for the land or the homes. The land is already there, and the native Hawaiian is expected to obtain a loan or find some other way to finance the building of his home. The only expense to the state is to provide the infrastructure. And still the Waihee administration has managed to return only 31 people per year to their land."

"This bill, Mr. President, is simply not necessary. Will it put one native Hawaiian on the land or build one house? No."

"While I do not believe it is the intent of the chairman of your Housing and Hawaiian Affairs Committee, the effect of this bill is to absolve the federal and state governments of their horrible and inexcusable failure to faithfully fulfill the 70-year-old promises of the act."

"The unspoken message inescapably inherent in the passage of this bill is to excuse and justify government's failure to put native Hawaiians on their land by implying that the fault has been the lack of a 'statement of purpose.' If this passes, politicians can say, 'Don't blame us for the miserable record when it comes to putting Hawaiians on their land. We didn't know that was the purpose of the act.'"

"That's total shibai. Government officials have known the purpose of the act for 70 years. The purpose is to put native Hawaiians on their land."

"Government hasn't failed the Hawaiian for lack of a purpose clause. Government has failed the Hawaiian for lack of sincerity, lack of will, lack of aloha."

"Any bill that even inadvertently excuses government's failure to fulfill the promises of the Hawaiian Homes Act is further insult to the Hawaiian people."

"I will be voting 'no.'"

Senator Crozier rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I'd like to speak in favor of this bill."

"I'm quite shocked by some of the comments my colleague has made about what we are trying to do with

this bill. He sat in the committee; he voted 'no' on the committee report, and when it got to voting here on the floor, he voted 'yes.' Now, he's changing again. He makes no comments on the merits or demerits of the language change. He is now suddenly speaking in generalities."

"One of the arguments presented was that the state government has full responsibility for the operation of the Hawaiian Home Lands. Well, that's a major contention. It's been in the courts at least on three different occasions and on three different times they had different opinions. Some say, this is only a state responsibility; the federal government doesn't have to be involved. The next report taken from the Keakaha Paneewa Community Association addressed to the Department of Hawaiian Home Lands, however, the State Supreme Court held that the legislative history of the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act strongly suggests that the federal government is still in trustee capacity of the aboriginal people. Mr. President, this fight has been going on and on and on."

"The Hawaiian Homes Commission Act was under the federal responsibility up until 1959. Many of the things that my colleague talked about were done under the trustee of the federal government. So the federal government has a responsibility."

"What this bill does is put the language into the act. We don't amend any other section of the act. We just put in new language at the very beginning and all of you have written many bills in your time and always you have a purpose clause. This is what we're doing. We're defining why we have this clause. And the main words in the bill (S.D. 1) is on page 5, line 11. Let me read:

'... the United States and the State of Hawaii hereby acknowledge the public trust established under this Act and affirm their fiduciary duty to faithfully administer the provisions of this Act on behalf of the Native Hawaiian beneficiaries of the Act.'

"Mr. President, over and over and over again, people come to my committee and say, 'Put the people on the land. Put the people on the land.' This is not like me going before the Land Use Commission and ask to change the land use designation; go to the City Council and change the zoning, and now the people can go ahead and work the land. That's not how the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act operates. Before you put anyone on the land, the state government has to put in the roads, the sewers, electricity, the water. That takes money. That takes a lot of money. The State of Hawaii cannot shoulder the complete responsibility by itself."

"In the last six years, we have committed over \$125 million to the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act. The federal government has only committed 1.2, and the reason they have committed the 1.2, this is at Paneewa project out in the Waianae area, because the Hawaiian Home Lands is adjacent to the Department of Land and Natural Resources farm lands and they share the same road. That's the only reason the federal government put monies there; not because they wanted to help Hawaiian Home Lands. They have been derelict in their duties ever since statehood, the beginning of the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act."

"We need to have a way to get a commitment from the federal government, and to my colleagues, that's all this does. It does not tamper with the act in any other way except bind the federal government to help develop the infrastructure, help to pay the cost so that we can get the Hawaiian people on the land. We want to do it."

"Mr. President, my colleague commented about a petition. He says it's now up to 20,000 people. You know, when we had the blood quantum bill, one of the testifiers came before me and said that the 14,000 people that voted for the blood quantum, in support, and may I read: 'This is not a mandate to change the constitution. It is the majority of those few voting.' That was 14,000 native Hawaiians and Hawaiians who took a position. If this number of 20,000, and the ad says, clearly, 80 percent of the people that signed the petitions were non-Hawaiians. So if there's 20,000 and only 4,000 Hawaiians took a position. They reject 14,000, but they say this carries more weight. Well, I reject their comment. Why didn't they get Hawaiians and native Hawaiians and see what kind of numbers to prove. Why did they just go down to any Safeway Store and catch anybody coming out and just have them sign the petition?"

"Mr. President, I think I've touched all the bases. I ask my colleagues to join with me and to support this bill. Thank you."

"Mr. President, I have more language I would like to submit into the Journal."

The Chair, so ordered.

Senator Crozier's statement, in addition, is as follows:

"In passing this Act, it is the intention of Hawaii's Legislature that the language of the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act (HHCA) properly and accurately reflect the historical realities and underlying goals of the HHCA as well as the original and continuing role of the federal government. The United States enacted the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act in 1921 and was the sole trustee from 1921 to 1959. The State of Hawaii, now a co-trustee, cannot alone make up for the federal government's actions or inactions during that period or subsequently. The purpose provisions in this Act are expressly contingent upon the federal government's consent and proper assumption of its historical duties both before and after statehood. Accordingly, this Act shall only take effect if, and only if, the Governor of Hawaii approves, the Congress consents, and the President of the United States signs these provisions into law. It is not our intent that the State should bear burdens that are properly the responsibility of the federal government or that can only by joint effort be resolved."

Senator Solomon rose to speak in support of the bill and stated:

"Mr. President, this bill has come a long, long way from when we first started out. The committee has done a tremendous job in trying to address majority of the concerns of the testifiers. I am happy with the amendment, especially on page 3 because I expressed great concern about it."

"It actually starts on page 2, line 23, section (d), which states: 'Nothing in this Act shall be construed to: (1) Affect the rights of the descendants of the indigenous citizens of the Kingdom of Hawaii to seek redress of any wrongful activities associated with the overthrow of the Kingdom of Hawaii; or (2) Alter the obligations of the United States and the State of Hawaii to carry out their public trust responsibilities under section 5 of the Admission Act to native Hawaiians and other descendants of the indigenous citizens of the Kingdom of Hawaii.'"

"Mr. President, I expressed grave misgiving when this bill was first conceived and the reason for that was because of the many issues that were brought up in the testimonies that my colleague from Maui had eloquently expressed. However, Mr. President, at this time, I feel

comfortable with this piece of legislation. I am with the understanding that this is just the beginning; that we will be proceeding with many more hearings after this. I think that the Office of Hawaiian Affairs as well as all of the other Hawaiian organizations can actively participate when given the opportunity to express their feelings on the issues."

"I have to agree with the previous speaker, Mr. President, that the United States has been derelict in their fiduciary duty to the Hawaiian people. There is no doubt about that. But I see this as a vehicle of at least addressing those concerns. When it comes down to the actual dollars and cents and how those monies are going to be spent, I think that is a separate issue that will be forthcoming."

"I see this piece of legislation as a means to urge Congress to come up with a policy as well as to make some decisions as to what exactly is their fiduciary trust obligation to the Hawaiian people of this state. Thank you very much."

Senator Reed, in opposition to the measure, added:

"Mr. President, the testimony from which I took excerpts was presented by experts on the Hawaiian Homes Act and the state's failure to put Hawaiians on their land. They know more than anybody else about this matter, and it amazes me that we continually ignore the experts."

"As to the Housing chairman's remarks relative to my vote change, he knows I was opposed to the bill throughout the hearings. I signed 'I do not concur' on the committee report, and on the day that we were to vote on the bill I was informed by a member of the committee that the critics of the bill had changed their minds; that they had been appeased by the new language and were now supportive. I was unable to locate those critics to learn otherwise. Because of that short notice, accepting as accurate the information I received, I voted along with the majority on the bill. That afternoon, I managed to get hold of the people who came in unison to testify against it and found out that, to the contrary, their concerns were still very much alive, and therefore I continue to support their opposition to this bill. Thank you."

Senator Cobb then rose on a point of parliamentary inquiry and said:

"Throughout the session we've heard discussions relative to Hawaiian Homes and Hawaiian rights. The point I've never seen addressed yet is what is going to be done with the money from the ceded lands and other sources in terms of providing infrastructure needs for Hawaiian Home Lands because if there was ever an identified need of the Hawaiian community it would be for that kind of infrastructure so that we can accelerate the pace of building on Hawaiian Home Lands."

"I agree with some of the previous speakers that 31 to 48 houses a year is a disgrace. That's the equivalent of a small condominium or small apartment every year and we have thousands of acres of land that are supposedly dedicated for this purpose. So when is the rhetoric going to end and the construction going to begin with the earmarking of funds? Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 3236, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE HAWAIIAN HOMES COMMISSION ACT," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 19. Noes, 3 (George, Koki, Reed). Excused, 3 (Ikeda, Nakasato, Wong, R.).

At this time, the Chair interjected:

"Members of the Senate, the Chair would like to ask for your indulgence. I have received a very touching poem to Senator Spark Matsunaga written by one of my constituents. If there be no objections by members of the Senate, I would like to have it included in the Journal."

There being no objections, the poem reads as follows:

"OUR HAWAII STAR
by Pearl Maalea

Sparky you got all and more of what it takes
To represent us from Hawaii in the United States
You got elected and golly how proud we are
A man like you in office is like a shining star
You have proven honesty, sincerity and conviction too
There can never be another to replace you
Oh! They will have other congressmen what is true
With qualifications like yours are very few
That's why Sparky we have a mission to do
I got mine and you got yours too
We started together when I was Pearl Olmsted before
You went shaking hands and came to my door
You wanted to shake my hand and I refused
Cause I was sick of seeing people used
Politicians would shake our hands and kiss our cheeks
Then later lie and look at us like freaks
You said Pearl how can I prove I am true
I am not like that please let me help you
I said my cubs needed a place for their meeting
A room big enough for 200 space sitting
The rents are outrageous and that is cruel
You said Pearl I'll lend you my school
I looked at you and said put that in writing
Sparky you son of a gun it was so inviting
I went to your school sure enough it was true
At last a dream came true for the little guys in blue
I made a promise to you Sparky that beautiful day
That I would get you elected somehow some way
We kept our promise Sparky and went all the day

We showed our appreciation and trust in you
You set an example then for us to follow

Election is near shaking hands the old bout
I don't want to shake hands I'm so hurt I cold shout
Our teenagers in the country have no decent recreation
Only places that will lead them to damnation
So shine Sparky boy Star of Hawaii Nei
No matter how or what you are in our hearts to stay
Maybe Sparky again one day we will meet
And you had better be in that Congressman's seat
With our conviction, determination and sincerity to grow
No chair or handicap is going to make us slow
With faith, understanding and patience too
They would have a hell of a time with me and you
And now my friend Sparky I want to share something
with you that is true

It worked for me and I know it will work for you too
Have you ever heard of Num Myo Ho Ren Ge Kyo?
I joined this religion over 20 years ago

I had 95% malignancy breast cancer
It turned benign on the table yes Sparky you got the answer

So hang in there pal here's a surprise I'm not through
With all of that and age 62 I still dance the hula too
See what Num Myo Ho Ren Ge Kyo can do
Sparky it's most precious to me I wanted to share it with you
Chant every morning every evening facing the east
As much as you want till you feel at peace
Chant when in pain anytime you want to
Then you will see what Num Myo Ho Ren Ge Kyo can do for you
I don't care what people do or say about you
You hang in there man and do what you have to do
They don't understand people like you and me
Our life is justice, peace and unity
Let them talk all they want they are full of envy
That wheelchair's no obstacle you move faster that way
They are full of lies broken promises too
That is why no comparison and we love you
They make the poor homeless and the rich people richer
They take from the poor and that one's the biggest bitcher

Our Honorable Sparky, a man that is true."

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Jitsumyo Uyehara, Shingon Mission of Hawaii, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-Second Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator Menor introduced Davin Kubota, seated in the gallery, from Wheeler Intermediate School, participant of the career shadowing program.

Senator Menor also introduced a group of 4th grade students from Hanalani School in Mililani who were accompanied by Mr. Ronald Babb and Mrs. Kaneshiro.

Senator Chang introduced Ms. Rachel Saiki and Mr. James Cotten, "two exemplary members of the Nuuanu community," as follows:

"Mr. President, our first honoree is Rachel Saiki who has been recognized as a driving force behind Hawaii's labor movement for many years. She played an integral part in organizing the United Retail Workers of America in Hawaii. Serving as a trustee for the union, Rachel was able to bring about equitable improvements by working with John Reinecke and other notable labor leaders. Rachel also worked for 'The Honolulu Record' and the ILWU's 'Voice of Labor.' An active participant in politics, Rachel worked with the late Jack Burns to activate Democratic precinct clubs, raise funds, and later served as a Democratic Party County Committee member.

"Today, even after retirement, Rachel has continued in her community, labor and political activities. She can still be seen walking in peace and labor picket lines, testifying before the Legislature, and volunteering her time to worthy social causes.

"One February 11, 1990, Rachel Saiki was honored by the People's Fund, Incorporated, for her five decades of community service.

"At this time, Mr. President, may I ask our honoree Rachel Saiki to rise and be recognized. She is joined in the gallery today by a friend Eleanor Asao who works for Representative Tom Okamura in the House of Representatives and by her son Carl Saiki. I would like to note that Carl and I were schoolmates at Kawanakoa Intermediate School, and this is particularly relevant because our second honoree comes from that school."

Ms. Rachel Saiki, seated on the floor of the Senate, rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and lei.

Senator Chang continued:

"Mr. President, the 1990 contest for the Hawaii State Spelling Bee Champion title has been awarded to James Cotten, an eighth-grader at Kawanakoa Intermediate School. It took twelve rounds of competition to whittle down the field before James Cotten emerged as the victor in the Spelling Bee.

"To win the title, James Cotten sounded his way through 'ayatollah' and 'langouste.' As the state winner, he receives a free trip to Washington, D.C., and as part of the award, Kawanakoa Intermediate School will get a Macintosh Plus computer and an Image II printer from the Honolulu office of Apple Computer.

"James Cotten is also a student in the Gifted and Talented Program; he is a member of the Quiz Bowl Team, and a student volunteer with the Food Services Program -- a very busy young man, indeed.

"At this time, Mr. President, I would like to recognize the winner of the 1990 Hawaii State Spelling Bee, Mr. James Cotten. He is joined by his parents, Mr. James Cotten Sr. and Katherine Cotten."

The honoree and his parents, seated on the floor of the Senate, rose to be recognized. James was presented with the congratulatory Senate certificate and leis were given to him and his parents.

Senator Crozier added his remarks on Rachel Saiki as follows:

"Mr. President, in the 1940s and I guess early 1950s when Rachel was working for 'The Honolulu Record,' one of her missions was to go to Maui to solicit subscriptions and ads from the different businesses. While she was there she stayed at our house, and that was the time of a lot of labor strife, and my dad had been quite involved in the labor movement. I didn't know why she was there but what made her special to me was that while she was trying to help all the people of Hawaii, she also took the time to sit with all the little Crozier kids to teach us to sing 'How much is the doggie in the window?' I still remember the words, Rachel. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator McMurdo then introduced Mr. Gus Hannemann as follows:

"Mr. President, Gus Hannemann is the oldest son in a family of seven. He came to Hawaii from American Samoa in 1953.

"Gus has diligently worked to promote and perpetuate Samoan culture in Hawaii; and because of Gus' capable leadership and his involvement with the Samoan community in Hawaii, Governor Peter Tali Coleman of American Samoa assigned Gus to coordinate hurricane relief efforts for the Territory of American Samoa when Hurricane Ofa roared through American and Western Samoa on February 4, 1990, causing widespread damage and leaving thousands of families without housing, clothing, food and medications.

"The Samoans in Hawaii met to organize and address the problems in American and Western Samoa and selected Gus as chairman of the Hawaii-Samoa Community Committee for Hurricane Ofa Relief; and in the five-week operation, two civilian volunteer 'Alofa' mercy flights took place. Four containers of clothing were sent via sea transport, and several military flights and one FAA cargo plane carried over 250,000 pounds of food, clothing, linen, medical supplies, ambulances and lumber to the victims of the hurricane.

"Success of this committee was due in large part to the leadership and coordination efforts of Gus Hannemann in obtaining the willing support of four major companies, two airlines, the military, the media, federal and local governments and the people of the State of Hawaii.

"Gus Hannemann is commended for his leadership and accomplishments in bringing relief to the peoples of American and Western Samoa in a time of great need. Malo Tautau."

Mr. Hannemann rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and lei.

Senator McMurdo also recognized a group of family and friends of Gus Hannemann who were seated in the gallery.

At 11:52 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

FIFTY-FOURTH DAY

Friday, April 20, 1990

The Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, convened at 11:40 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Sister Rose Lauren Earl, Director, Natural Family Planning, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Wong who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-Third Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator McCartney, on behalf of Senator Koki and himself, introduced Mr. Ray Sweeney, chairman of the Kaneohe Neighborhood Board, "here today to lobby on limited county home rule issues."

Senator Crozier introduced Massachusetts Governor Mike Dukakis and wife Kitty as follows:

"Mr. President, I have the great honor today to introduce a gentleman that this great state, this liberal state supported wholeheartedly in the last election -- Governor Mike Dukakis who is here with his pretty wife Kitty.

"Mr. President, many of the programs we have here today found their roots in Massachusetts and I would like to mention two of them. Universal health care that we now have was started in Massachusetts. I think ours is more expanded, but the genesis was Massachusetts under Governor Dukakis. Also, our after-school A+ program. That, too, is much more expanded because we are a one school district and can service more people. But that too, the genesis was Massachusetts under Governor Dukakis.

"I first met Governor Mike Dukakis at the Harvard University Kennedy School of Government in 1985. He came to speak to us and he described how he had been governor the first time, and we've all read the story over and over again, and how he made critical mistakes and the people sent him a message just like how they sent Mayor Dante Carpenter a message, and too many of them sent him the message and he got defeated. But he humbled himself; he went back to Harvard University and analyzed his shortcomings, his strong points, and he went back and four years later he got elected. And ever since that -- I'm sure you're still doing it, Governor -- he goes back to the Kennedy School and lectures there for one day. I'm sure Senator Levin had an opportunity to hear him. When he lectured before me, I took notes of the way he structured his government. I know Governor John Waihee did not attend the Kennedy School, but it seems like both of them structured their government in the same manner. I actually still have my notes that I took, Governor, still, right here. Maybe some day I'll have an opportunity to use it. Long time from now ... long time from now. (Laughter.)

"Anyway, I was fortunate enough to be one of the first people to get involved with the Mike Dukakis effort and it was quite a team effort. For the first three and a half months, starting in I guess June or July when we got the message from Massachusetts -- 'Don't pick a leader, just be a nebulous group out there and it will evolve.' So we said, okay. All our different legislators got together and said okay, we won't find a leader; we'll just work together. Talking to me, 'Mike how about you take care

of this.' There was no leader. I ended up being the gopher for you. I enjoyed it. I enjoyed doing it.

"Early on, a former senator who's not here anymore, Senator Patsy Young, joined me in developing the organization and when you go to the House, you'll meet some of the other people. But there are two senators in the body now, Senators Richard Matsuura and Mary Jane McMurdo, who had come on quite early. And we had a fund raiser. The first fund raiser for you was in October of 1987. I gotta tell you the story. We needed to have some kind of image. Jesse Jackson already had his Rainbow Coalition -- 'give hope a chance.' So what we did was, because you're from Boston, because you're from New England; because you were from the area where the Revolution took place, we did a little skit. Senator Patsy Young and I did. We dressed up like revolutionaries. We had a musket and we had the hats and the blue coats and everything. But ever since then that guerilla farce that we created was known as 'Mike's Minuteman and Minutemaid.' You folks should have took that title and something would have happened across the nation. (Laughter.)

"But, anyway, I won't belabor the point. I would like to say that Hawaii is a liberal state. Hawaii truly believes in you. We had the highest hope in you and your platform and what you thought government could do to lift people up. We believed in you so much, even though polls had closed across the nation, even though Bush was declared the winner, Hawaii still supported you. We supported you to the point, excluding the District of Columbia, of giving you the highest percentage of votes. That's how much we thought of you, Governor Dukakis.

"Ladies and gentlemen, I'd like to introduce Governor Mike Dukakis and his pretty wife Kitty."

Governor and Mrs. Dukakis, seated on the floor of the Senate, rose to be recognized and were presented leis.

At this time, the Chair invited Governor Dukakis to the rostrum to address the members of the Senate and guests and his remarks were as follows:

"Thank you all very much, thank you. Thank you, Mr. President.

"In case you are wondering what I'm doing with this contraption on my right hand. It's an injury I sustained trying to get Kitty's dad's car out of the snow several weeks ago. Many of you, I think, had the opportunity to watch him conduct the symphony here at a pops concert and he will be back this fall and when you talk to him, be nice to him. It wasn't his fault. I'm the guy that went sliding down the hill, put out my hands and busted both hands. So that's why I'm walking around with this strange contraption. I did not attempt to take a punch at a unfriendly newspaper columnist or anyone else for that matter, so please be assured that all is well and peaceful.

"I won't presume on your time because I know this is a busy time for you. First, let me say to my good friend Mike Crozier that I probably should have paid more attention to Mike's 'minuteman and minutemaid.' Mike, you've got a talent for image-making, and I hope you will continue to build it and build it and build it. If I ever try again, maybe we'll make you the campaign manager, nationwide. We'll have minuteman and minutemaids all over the place; But I'm very, very grateful to Mike and to so many of you, and to the people of Hawaii for all that they did for Kitty and me. If every state in the nation had the great good judgment of the people of

Hawaii, either we'd be meeting in the East Room or I'd be out here surrounded by secret service people, one or the other.

"But let me also say to you, as somebody who believes deeply in what government and public service are all about, who believes that this nation of ours has a God given opportunity, right now, to take this peace dividend, and it's out there, and to make it work for long neglected domestic needs and investments -- in the education of our kids, in our environment, in economic development in the creation of jobs, in universal health care, Mike. There ought to be more than two states in this nation that have made a commitment to basic health security for all of our citizens. And one of these days, I hope we're going to join the other industrialized nations of the world, with the exception of South Africa, in guaranteeing the people of this country basic health insurance in the year of our Lord 1990, but I'm proud to be in the other state which, by the way, Mike, in fairness, inspired us. We've got a little game going here. I was telling my legislators that Hawaii had already done it and now we have to follow Hawaii. So, if we can keep that up maybe we can make progress, nationally.

"We don't have to spend \$150 billion a year anymore in the defense of Western Europe, ladies and gentlemen. I don't even know who the enemy is. The Russians won't make it through Eastern Poland, let alone to Western Europe. So, there's a peace dividend out there ... this state, my state, all the states in this country had to absorb billions and billions of dollars in federal cuts as we've done, but now's the time to get some of that back.

"And as one governor who rides mass transit regularly, let me simply encourage you to invest in public transportation. I know that's a key issue here and I would simply say to you that I hope that with good, strong federal participation you can do that.

"We are delighted to be here. The one great regret that I have in the campaign other than the fact that I lost was that I was never able to come here during the campaign. I sent my best ambassador and she had a wonderful time, and you were great to Kitty. But, we're just delighted to be here and particularly pleased to be able to say thank you to you and the people of Hawaii.

"Our joy is tampered, obviously, by the grief that we and you and all of us feel with Spark's passing. He was a very special person and a Prince of Peace. As we move now into the history of this country and of the world, I hope and believe that his example and his tireless pursuit of peace is something that can guide us all.

"Thank you for having us. Thank you for having us in this magnificent Capitol. I've got to conclude that Massachusetts and Hawaii have the two most beautiful capitols in the nation. We're just delighted to be here and, again, to say thank you to everybody for all you did for us. I appreciate it."

The Chair thanked the Governor and said, "We hope that your stay in Hawaii will be a memorable one and we wish you well."

Senator Crozier then introduced ACLU chairperson Vanessa Chong and Mr. Bill Wilson, program coordinator, who accompanied Governor and Mrs. Dukakis, and said, "Mr. President, the reason Governor Dukakis is here in Hawaii is because he is going to be the keynote speaker at the ACLU fund raiser on Sunday evening."

Senator Matsuura added his remark:

"Mr. President, I just want to add one comment to Senator Crozier's introduction. I want the good Governor to know that the Senator from Makakilo was so successful that one of the first persons who endorsed Governor Dukakis was Senator Ann Kobayashi. What makes it unusual is that Senator Kobayashi was a Republican. Of course, she is a Democrat today."

Senator Matsuura then introduced Mr. Roy Hallman, director of the Honolulu Boy Choir as follows:

"Mr. President, the Honolulu Boy Choir was formed in 1974, and is one of the state's most outstanding musical institutions where boys from ages 7 to 13 perform contemporary, ethnic, folk, traditional and religious music.

"The dedication of the 175 members of the choir has won them world-wide praise for their professional and delightful performances, performing for auspicious groups such as Bob Hope's Birthday TV Special and the Jim Nabors Christmas TV Special.

"The members of the Honolulu Boy Choir have earned a distinct honor in our society. They are role models for all of our children. The success of the Honolulu Boy Choir is mainly through the efforts of the founder and director, Roy Hallman, and arranger and accompanist, Nyle Hallman. Their untiring efforts have made the Honolulu Boy Choir a legend which cannot be duplicated.

"It gives me great pleasure to introduce Mr. Roy Hallman."

Mr. Hallman rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and lei.

Senator Koki introduced Elmer and Chris Bissett, "personal friends" from Seattle, Washington, accompanied by Aimie Kamimura, Mrs. Donna Koki and son Samuel.

Senator Chang then introduced a group from the East-West Center as follows:

"Mr. President, the East-West Center, located on the campus of the University of Hawaii at Manoa, was established 30 years ago with the intent to create a university that would be the meeting place of intellectuals from the East and the West. The center was the realization of a dream of many notable people, Arthur Dean, Gregg Sinclair, Lyndon Johnson and John A. Burns, to name a few. Because of their vision, the East-West Center became an institution not found in any other place in the world.

"Since its inception, the East-West Center has seen thousands of scholars and students pass through its halls. Many have gone on to achieve greatness. Others were content with a better understanding of different cultures. All benefitted from their experience at the East-West Center.

"We commend and congratulate the East-West Center and join in the celebration of its Thirtieth Anniversary.

"With us today from the East-West Center are the following people: Dr. Lee-Jay Cho, vice president for academic affairs, and director of the Population Institute; Ms. Trudy Wong, president of the Friends of the East-West Center; Mr. Ali Riaz, from Bangladesh, is president of the East-West Center Participants Association and participant in the Institute of Culture and Communication; and Ms. Vicki Shambaugh, secretary/treasurer of the East-West Center Association Executive Board. Thank you for coming today."

The honorees, seated on the floor of the Senate, all rose to be recognized and were presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and leis.

Senator Chang also introduced East-West Center staff members who were seated in the gallery: Gail Awaya, Community Relations and Public Affairs, and Lenora Wee, administrative officer, Population Institute.

Senator Ikeda introduced Christina Nakashima and Jason Kasumoto, student "shadows" from Niu Valley Intermediate School and said, "The two students have really been more than shadows. They have become right arms and they've gotten into the entire conference process and have really helped me, running around and doing all sorts of things that need to be done, and just enjoying this very hectic time."

Senator Ikeda then introduced Mr. Rick Scudder, chairman of the Earth Day Steering Committee and said:

"Mr. President, it gives me great pleasure today, on behalf of the Senate, to call attention to Earth Day 1990 which will be celebrated on Sunday, April 22nd, and I would like to read this certificate that I will be presenting a little later because I think that it says it beautifully.

'Every year, thousands of acres of vital tropical rainforest are stripped away from the earth, leaving behind nothing to replenish the atmosphere. A steady rise in the industrialization of the world increases the pollution in all our environments. Global warming, acid rain, toxic waste, ozone layer destruction, all of these terms have become realities touching too close to home. The fundamental question has been asked by millions of people all over the world, "Can I make a difference?" The answer is "Yes, I can make a difference."

'On April 22, the people of the world will step back and give the Earth a break. This worldwide pause from destruction will allow the Earth to catch its breath and hopefully survive the turmoil humans have brought on it. Programs here in Hawaii will include the "Plant-a-Tree" project and the "Adopt-a-Beach" program. Eco-Fairs, art and film festivals, parades, and displays will all be a part of increasing the general public's awareness of the fragile environment we live in.

'The Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, declares Sunday, April 22, 1990, as Earth Day 1990 in Hawaii in the hopes that all citizens of the state will take advantage of this opportunity to broaden their understanding and knowledge and work together in celebration of the planet Earth. The Senate also extends its sincere appreciation to the Earth Day Steering Committee with the hope that future generations of Hawaii's people will reap the benefits of a cleaner Earth.'

"At this time, Mr. President, it gives me great pleasure to introduce to you Mr. Rick Scudder, chairman of the Earth Day Steering Committee. I would like to personally thank Mr. Scudder for his efforts and point out that the people who have worked so hard to make this celebration a really fantastic one have been very, very modest and rather than standing up and taking credit for it want the attention to be placed on the event itself."

Mr. Scudder rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and lei.

Senator B. Kobayashi then introduced a group from the Educational Assistants Association as follows:

"Mr. President, this year, we are celebrating the 25th anniversary of the Educational Assistants Association in the State of Hawaii. For all the high tech that we have in education, the videos, the computers, education is still a people-related task. Educational assistants provide teachers the capability to reach out and provide personal one-to-one attention to students in the classroom. They do everything from review and reinforce lessons, helping individual problems, doing record keeping, maintaining a positive attitude within the classroom and within the school environment and, of course, helping with lesson preparations and other chores.

"We have with us on the floor, today, three individuals who have been educational assistants in our public school system. I'd like to introduce them. The president of the Educational Assistants Association, Ayako Nakanishi; the secretary, Harriet Okuhara; and the person who does all the work for the two officers, Bernice Gan."

All of the honorees rose to be recognized and were presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and leis.

Senator Fernandes Salling introduced Mr. Tom Whittemore as follows:

"Mr. President, it's my pleasure to present to this body a fellow Kauaian and a friend, Mr. Tom Whittemore. I would like to read our Senate certificate that commends and congratulates Tom on his selection as the State Financial Services Advocate by the Small Business Administration.

'Tom Whittemore has been the vice president and branch manager of the Lihue Branch of First Hawaiian Bank since 1982. Since taking the helm, he has continuously encouraged his loan staff to assist small business owners and potential owners. Because of his aggressive approach to encourage small business enterprises, the Lihue Branch of First Hawaiian Bank has realized a ninety-two percent increase in small business loans.

'To further promote economic growth on Kauai, Tom Whittemore is a member of the Kauai Economic Development Board. He helped to organize and establish the Kauai Products Fair and the Kauai Products Council, an organization of small business manufacturers, owners, and producers of products made on Kauai. He is an active member of the community and has also served as president of the Kauai Rotary Club and is on the Board of Directors of Wilcox Hospital and Foundation, the Kauai Chamber of Commerce, Kauai 200 (or should that say, 2,000) and the Kauai Museum.

'Recently, because of his unrelenting efforts to further public understanding awareness of the importance of small business, Tom Whittemore was selected by the Small Business Administration to be the State's Financial Services Advocate.'

"The Senate, today, would like to commend and congratulate Tom for his long-standing and meaningful contributions to small business, and congratulates him on his selection as the State's Financial Services Advocate.

"Mr. President, I would like to present Mr. Tom Whittemore."

The honoree, accompanied by his father, Fred Whittemore, and also Anthony Guerrero, senior vice president of First Hawaiian Bank, rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and lei.

Senator McMurdo then introduced Sophie Ann Aoki as follows:

"Mr. President, they say that good things come in small packages, and I have a young lady here today who is tiny in stature but a real ball of dynamite. Her name is Sophie Ann Aoki and she served as executive vice president and later president of the Waikiki Improvement Association, and she oversaw many important community programs with all its difficult problems and accomplished many beneficial objectives. Major programs attributable to her leadership are The Waikiki Futures Conference, the restoration of Waikiki Beach, the beautification and maintenance of Waikiki, the annual Block Party, and the formulation of a more active role of the association in legislative matters.

"Other outstanding attributes of Sophie Ann are her ability to encourage cooperation and communication between Waikiki Improvement Association, which is a business organization, and the diverse factions of residents in Waikiki. And I can assure you, Mr. President, that is no small task and she did it beautifully.

"Prior to joining the Waikiki Improvement Association, she was director of programs and development for the Clean Water Fund/Clean Water Action Project in Washington, D.C., and she served as president of Citizens' Campaign Inc., and as an officer or board member in several national environmental and conservation organizations.

"So, it's especially opportune with the advent of Earth Day on Sunday that this Legislature commend Sophie Ann Aoki for her leadership and accomplishments in improving the quality of life for the people of Waikiki and elsewhere."

Sophie Ann Aoki rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and lei. She was accompanied by Christina Kemmer, current president of the Waikiki Improvement Association, and Scotty Bowman, vice president, government affairs.

Senator Chang then added:

"Mr. President, I would just like to note that many long years ago, Sophie Ann Aoki helped preserve the jobs of two Senate staff members, namely, Russell Blair and myself, and not having accomplished that, one wonders whether we might be here today. Thank you very much, Sophie."

Senator Holt then introduced Uncle Puna Titcomb as follows:

"Mr. President, I would be remiss if I did not introduce an individual, who is related to me, accompanying Governor Dukakis today. He is one who served in the public sector as well as the private sector way back with the City Auditoriums as well as being a boxing promoter. He promoted Jesus Salud's fight here in Hawaii. His exploits in this town have been well documented in Sammy Amalu's articles and I just have to tell Governor Dukakis one story.

"One day, some time ago, he was ill and was laid up in the hospital. The family went down to see him and the room was full of flowers ... I mean, you couldn't believe how many flowers he received, and you just couldn't imagine how many friends he had out there. It was not until my uncle Jomo got the bill from the florist that we all realized that he called the florist and ordered the flowers.

"He is a gentleman who's got a heart as big as gold, but, a character in his own right -- my uncle Puna."

Mr. Titcomb rose to be recognized.

The Chair then remarked:

"Members of the Senate, we've had a lot of introductions this morning and I think Governor Dukakis and Kitty have come to visit us at a very opportune time ... he has witnessed a day in the life of Hawaii. Should the Governor decide to seek higher office again, I think he'll receive more votes this time."

"As you know, Mr. President, West Hawaii is a beautiful and diverse region long recognized by residents and visitors alike as a place of having unique qualities which contribute to a distinctive lifestyle. Historically and contemporaneously, the Hawaiian people have referred to this region as Kōna Kaimalino, an area noted for its calm waters, warm climate, a place for people to gather to celebrate life, and an area for spiritual healing. This spiritual feeling is part of the local lifestyle in which the

West Hawaii Regional Plan has referred to as a preferred quality of life.

"However, Mr. President, this region no longer identifies with this philosophical concept. It now is a coastline noted for its rampant development with approvals for the development including over 33,000 hotel/condominium units. Through strenuous community lobbying efforts, a responsive state administration, and a committed political leadership on both Senate and county levels, these unit numbers have been reduced to 17,000. With international, national investments exceeding \$400 million, the coastline, Mr. President, has become noted as a rich man's paradise, with world-class luxury resorts, golf courses, and hotel rooms at \$300 and up. There is land speculation with real estate transactions exceeding in the millions and, nothing, Mr. President, nothing available for the working men and women of this great state of ours. This resolution provides us with a balance.

"Today, Mr. President, the only local presence that is felt on that coastline is of those that are employed by these resorts -- a sad commentary for Hawaii. The public does not enjoy ready accessibility to many of the shoreline areas. The only accessibilities that the public enjoys freely, without having to pass through guard gates, Mr. President, are those at Anaihoomalua and Hapuna Beach Park. However, you are lucky if you can find a clean restroom at Hapuna Beach or maybe Kawaihae Spencer Park which has been closed on numerous occasions due to the outbreak of hepatitis because we have many of the homeless camping in that area.

"The resident population on the Big Island has grown rapidly since 1970 from 63,470 to over 111,800 in 1986. The population growth in the West Hawaii region increased by 156 percent from 1970 to 1986. In 1980, the proportion of residential population in East Hawaii to West Hawaii was 67% to 33%, respectively. County projections for the year 2005 indicate a shift in population from East Hawaii to West Hawaii where resident population would become about equally divided.

"Patterns of population settlement and growth are defined primarily by an area's economic opportunities. West Hawaii has been blessed with increased growth in such industries as alternate energy (OTEC), cold water aquaculture at NELH where abalone, micro algae, lobster, salmon and shellfish are grown, longstanding agriculture commodities as cattle, ornamentals, poultry, fruits and vegetables, construction, especially for large non-residential projects, and the visitor industry which has experienced a dramatic increase in the past few years.

"Of paramount concern is the cumulative effect of fiscal, social and environmental impacts generated by the rapid growth -- how these affect the preferred quality of life of the residents.

"There is a push by the state together with the county to balance rapid economic growth with the need to have quality services/programs and resources in place. It is estimated that \$622 million of public infrastructures are required to support the current expanded population needs.

"The West Hawaii Regional Plan has presented goals which will work toward the vision for West Hawaii. The vision includes the need to:

1. Plan and maximize benefits for Hawaii's people.
2. Optimize the use of state owned land.
3. Promote a diversified economic base which maximizes job choice and opportunities.

4. Ensure access to and adequacy of health, education, job training, and human service programs.

5. Ensure provision and adequacy of affordable housing.

6. Minimize adverse impact of new development on local lifestyle, historic and cultural resources and community values.

7. Provide a wide range of outdoor recreational opportunities.

8. Protect scenic areas, natural landmarks, open space and viewsheds.

9. Protect state investments at the Natural Energy Laboratory of Hawaii, the Hawaii Ocean Science and Technology Park, Keahole Airport, Kawaihae Harbor and the Mauna Kea observatories.

"The implementation of activities to achieve these goals is a formidable task, requiring superb coordination of public and private concerns.

"This resolution proposes a study of the feasibility of establishing a new public body corporate to serve as a public instrumentality of the state for the purpose of supervising, undertaking, directing and coordinating the implementation of the West Hawaii Regional Plan together with private enterprises and various components of government agencies.

"This corporate could be likened to the Hawaii Community Development Authority and the Aloha Tower Development Corporation.

"I am saddened by the fact that this resolution can only request for a feasibility study, Mr. President. I'm hoping that next session we will have a bill or a piece of legislation which will enable the state and county to gain control of that coastline area. Because, Mr. President, the State of Hawaii, is the major land owner on that coastline.

"I urge all of my colleagues to support this resolution. Thank you."

FIFTY-SIXTH DAY

Tuesday, April 24, 1990

The Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, convened at 11:40 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by the Reverend Larry Kositzin, Seventh-Day Adventist Church, Kailua, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present with the exception of Senator Yamasaki who was excused.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-Fifth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator McMurdo introduced Mr. Frank Delima as follows:

"Mr. President, today, we are honoring a young man who really needs no introduction to any of us here. He is a young man who was raised in Pauoa Valley and attended Cathedral Grade School, continued his education at Damien Memorial High and Chaminade University. He graduated with a bachelor's degree in sociology and at St. Patrick Theologate in California with a master's degree in divinity.

"At one time, he thought he wanted to become a clergyman, but he chose instead to be a comic artist in Hawaii in 1974, and he has really ministered to the youth of Hawaii through his visitations annually, since 1981, first to the schools on the neighbor islands and, currently, to every elementary and intermediate school of Hawaii.

"Frank Delima has served on the Board of Adult Friends for Youth and was selected as one of the 1989 honorees for contributing significantly to youth and volunteerism. His efforts have resulted in the creation of a network of community volunteers who are working to prevent, reduce and mitigate the problem of juvenile delinquency.

"His big goal for the youth of Hawaii is to bring parents and children together by way of a yearly concert 'celebration,' focusing on good parenting, guidance, communication and loving. Frank Delima has enriched the lives of all he has touched not only with his philanthropic work, but on stage with zany antics and his universally satirical but always kind humor.

"The Senate expresses to Frank Delima its admiration for his accomplishments and contributions to the Adult Friends for Youth program and also expresses a heartfelt mahalo for his work with the youth of Hawaii.

"Thank you, Frank, for making us laugh."

Mr. Delima, seated on the floor of the Senate, rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and lei.

Senator McMurdo then introduced Captain Gerald E. Mittendorff as follows:

"Mr. President, this is a man who originally was a farm boy from Virginia. He has served as a fighter pilot during two tours of duty in Vietnam and subsequently served as head of pilot training. His name is Captain Gerald E. Mittendorff and he was brought to Hawaii by

the United States Navy two years ago to serve as the United States Navy's project director for Kaho'olawe.

"In 1978, the United States Navy and the State of Hawaii entered into a memorandum of understanding concerning Kaho'olawe and its conservation. And in 1980 the United States Navy and the Protect Kaho'olawe Ohana signed a consent decree recognizing the use of the island as a target range and permitting limited visitation rights to the Ohana.

"During Captain Mittendorff's tenure as project director he has developed a working rapport with the Protect Kaho'olawe Ohana, gaining access to the island for the Ohana. He continued coordination of the Navy's cooperation with Department of Land and Natural Resources and the Native Hawaiian Plant Society's efforts to revegetate the island to prevent further soil erosion. He continued the rehabilitation of a 300,000-gallon cistern since the island has no source of fresh water, and has planted over 50,000 trees and 25,000 native plants.

"He also initiated the use of radio collars on feral goats which significantly enhanced the efficacy of the goat-elimination program thereby reducing the erosion of the island and preventing damage to important cultural sites. Kaho'olawe is believed to be the only island or area ever to be effectively eradicated of feral goats.

"The actions of Captain Mittendorff have helped bring together to resolve and to alleviate the environmental programs on Kaho'olawe and to preserve the archaeological sites.

"The Senate expresses its gratitude and appreciation to Captain Gerald Mittendorff, commends him for his success, and extends to him a heartfelt mahalo for a job well done."

Captain Mittendorff, seated on the floor of the Senate, rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and lei.

Senator George then introduced Ms. Patti Pitts with a group of home-schooled students from the Windward Support Group who were seated in the gallery.

Senator Chang welcomed Mr. Frank Delima with the following remark:

"Mr. President, I represent Pauoa Valley and is related to Mr. Delima on another occasion. I was the newspaper boy along the slopes of Punchbowl, including Madeira and Azores Streets, and came to know very early the nuances of the Portuguese culture. Welcome again."

Senator Chang, in honor of the 200-year bicentennial of the arrival of the Chinese in Hawaii, made the following introduction:

"Mr. President, more than 200 years ago, the first Chinese reached Hawaii. Following them, subsequent groups of courageous pioneers left their homes in China to seek a better future in Hawaii. They struggled through difficult times as they established new beginnings. Welcomed by the Hawaiians, warmed by the aloha spirit of this land, and stimulated by the great cultural diversity brought by other immigrants, these Chinese settlers did find a far better life. In turn, they enriched the community of which they had become an integral part.

"In honor of the 200-year bicentennial of the arrival of Chinese in Hawaii, the governor appointed a commission

to commemorate this illustrious history through the celebratory year of 1989. The commission hosted more than 60 cultural events in the Hawaiian community, ranging from art and film exhibitions, to the annual Narcissus Festival, to programs of dance, choral works and presentations on Chinese musical instruments. The commission successfully entertained, educated and enthralled the Hawaiian community in commemorating the contributions of the Chinese in Hawaii.

"With us today are several important figures that served on the commission. First, the honorary chairman, Senator Hiram Fong. I'd like to mention here that if it were not for Senator Fong, many of us would not be in this chamber today. Senator Fong led the successful fight to have 25 senators serve in the Legislature, rather than 15 as advocated by chairman Heen. As I have indicated, Senator Fong successfully argued that 25 would be a more representative number.

"Also with us today are Dr. Rosie Chang, who served as vice chairman of the Governor's Commission, and Dr. Doris M. Ching, English secretary of the commission. I think it's also significant, Mr. President, that the two women who served as officers of the commission hold highly advanced degrees -- another indicator of the progress that this gender is making in our society. Last but not least, and through an inadvertent error she was seated in the gallery rather than the floor of the chamber where she belongs, is Bea Chun who served loyally and ably in the office of the commission.

"Accompanying the officers and Bea Chun is Dr. Chang's husband, also seated in the gallery.

The honorees rose to be recognized and were presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and lei.

Senator Chang continued:

"Mr. President, the Senate member who worked most closely with the commission is also being honored today: Glenda Young has been a highly dedicated and selfless volunteer for Queen's Medical Center, working with critically injured patients in the Trauma/Surgical Intensive Care Unit. Her extraordinary efforts in assisting victims of traumatic injuries reveal a rare conscientiousness coupled with deep compassion and concern that has gained the respect and admiration of the medical center's staff.

"Glenda's contributions have resulted in her being selected as Queen's nominee for the prestigious 1990 Thomas Jefferson Awards. Her work has also been profiled in the local media.

"The Senate wishes to recognize and congratulate Glenda Young at this time for her unparalleled efforts as a volunteer for the center and wishes her continued success in all her future endeavors.

"It is my honor to introduce Glenda Young. With her today are Lindsey Carrey, director of patient relations for Queen's Medical Center, and Maura Okamoto, director of volunteer services for the center."

The honoree rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and lei.

Senator Ikeda introduced Mr. Stafford Morse as follows:

"Mr. President, it gives me great pleasure this morning to introduce to this honorable body one of the work horses and distinguished member of the Hawaii Kai community.

"Stafford Morse was born on Molokai but is a long time resident of Hawaii Kai who has been an active member of the Hawaii Kai Neighborhood Board. In fact, he served six terms on Neighborhood Board #1, is chairman of the Parks and Recreation Subcommittee of the Hawaii Kai Communities Council, and is a member of the Koko Isle Association Board.

"Stafford has been a staunch advocate for the protection and enjoyment of our surrounding natural environment. As president of the Hawaii Kai Marina Association, a commander with 37 years of service in the Coast Guard Reserve, he is sailing coach for Kaiser High School, and as a sea scout leader, he has always made himself available to anyone in the community who needed assistance.

"Stafford is also one of our first marine patrol volunteers and has been a great asset in controlling the activity in Maunalua Bay, especially with the advent of jet skis and the problems that we have faced. He has served the community for so many years, very quietly, in his own way, never been recognized for all of the things that he's done for us. I want him to stand up today and be recognized for all of his achievements, congratulate him and thank him for his efforts."

Mr. Morse rose to be recognized and was presented the Senate certificate of recognition and lei.

Senator McCartney then said:

"Mr. President, may I be allowed to make a few remarks on some of our honorees.

"First of all, I'd like to thank Mr. Delima for coming. Many of us enjoy his humor and his entertainment, but I really would like to commend him for his commitment to the youth of Hawaii. It really shows that he is giving much more back to our community than what he has received. We are thankful to have someone like him to influence our youth and we thank him for being here today.

"Also, I would like to thank Captain Mittendorff, on behalf of the Government Operations Committee. He was our gracious host when we had the opportunity to visit Kaho'olawe. I was very, very impressed with his work and commitment to restore the island and to restore the vegetation and protecting the archaeological sites. It's our hope that some day the island is returned to the people of Hawaii.

"Captain Mittendorff is becoming a part of the island and the thing I noticed when I was there was that the island had grown upon him and he had grown upon the island. I think we are blessed by having such a person like him to be a caretaker of the island. I thank him for the time that he gave us when we visited the island in November.

"Senator Fong. I think, Senator Fong is a constituent of mine. I would like to share one quick story with him and with the members of the Senate.

"My father moved to Kahaluu in the early 50s and at that time Kahaluu was under the threat of a noxious industry. I believe they wanted to put a deep draft harbor and Campbell Industrial Park there. My father and some of the other community leaders were very concerned about this kind of activity and fought very hard to preserve and protect the rural character of Windward Oahu. My father remembers very warmly how Senator Fong joined the group and, as a landowner in that area, signed a petition which helped to protect and preserve Windward Oahu. He feels in his heart that if it wasn't

for Senator Fong's help Windward Oahu would not be the community it is today. That is the reason why my mom and dad are still Republicans today. They became Republicans and they joined the Republican Party to help Senator Fong. That's a fond story that I will always remember of our family. Thank you for coming today, too.

"Thank you, Mr. President, for allowing me to share."

Senator Matsuura also rose to remark:

"Mr. President, I would also like to make a few comments.

"I don't think that Senator Fong remembers me, but, back in the early 60s when I was in India working to help in the Green Revolution, one of my jobs was to introduce new crops and to improve crops so that the children of India would have high protein foods to eat. I remember that the crops that were assigned to me were the green legume crops. The yield was very, very low, and the only solution that I could see to solve the protein problem of India was to grow soybeans. Unfortunately, soybeans, they told me, was a 'political' crop and no U.S. sponsored AID technician could work on soybeans. So I had a problem.

"Fortunately, I knew the Senator's brother Harold who was a good friend of mine. I wrote a letter to Harold to see if he could talk to his brother to release soybeans as a 'political' crop. And, Senator, you did it! The people of India, the children of India should really thank you because soybean has played a very great part in the Green Revolution of India. Thank you very much, Senator Fong."

Senator McMurdo then introduced Ms. Millie Fujinaga and said:

"Mr. President, I would be remiss if I did not recognize a lady who keeps Frank Delima on the straight and narrow path and gets him to places on time and that sort of thing. I would like to ask Millie Fujinaga, manager of Frank DeLima, to please stand up and be recognized."

When I was at a party recently with a group of entertainment type people, I was praising the 'Society of Seven' and telling them about this singer. And someone mentioned that the singer did not speak English, which surprised me, and I mentioned this to the reporter and mentioned it with a sense of surprise. I never said it in a derogatory manner. I never mentioned the man's race or where he came from because it didn't make any difference to me.

"I've known the members of the 'Society of Seven' for many years. I've known Tony Ruivivar and Ben Sagum since they first decided to live here in Hawaii. I used to attend their birthday parties and even took their wives shopping and went apartment hunting.

"In making this apology, the reporter infers that I was stereotyping, which is far from the truth. And I feel the reporter should once again apologize publicly in his paper with the same large headline because I did not stereotype. And I certainly gave him no reason to make any kind of racial slur.

"Thank you."

Wednesday, April 25, 1990

The Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, convened at 11:47 o'clock a.m. with the Vice President in the Chair.

The Divine Blessing was invoked by Chaplain Michael E. Reynolds, Colonel, WESTCOM, Fort Shafter, after which the Roll was called showing all Senators present.

The President announced that he had read and approved the Journal of the Fifty-Sixth Day.

The following introductions were then made to the members of the Senate:

Senator George introduced a group of 4th grade students (50) from Punahou School, who were seated in the gallery, accompanied by teachers, Mrs. Bendix and Mrs. Comcovich, and parents. Senator George recognized her grandson, Connor Lowrey, seated with the 4th graders.

Senator Crozier introduced Reverend John Hammond of Christ Temple Community Church of Oahu in Makakilo who was also seated in the gallery.

Senator A. Kobayashi introduced Ms. Coreene Zablan, who was seated on the floor of the Senate, as follows:

"Mr. President, this week is Secretaries Week and with us today is Coreene Zablan, the 1990 Secretary of the Year of the Oahu Chapter of Professional Secretaries International. Coreene defines the criteria for a top professional secretary as 'common sense, integrity, efficiency and responsibility' and by her own work performance she exemplifies all these qualities.

"In recognition of her professionalism, her high standards, and her commitment to education and self improvement, her peers and colleagues in the Oahu Chapter of Professional Secretaries International have named her Secretary of the Year for 1990. I present Coreene Zablan."

Ms. Zablan rose to be recognized and was presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and lei.

Senator A. Kobayashi also introduced "other outstanding secretaries," who were seated in the gallery, that are members of the Oahu Chapter of Professional Secretaries International: Karen Shishido, Barbara Vandine, Aulani Admad, Gladys Rodenhurst, Gert Quon, Daryl-Jean Shimizu, Nam Snow and Lourita Hookano.

Senator Crozier added his comments to the introduction:

"Mr. President, I knew Coreene Zablan when she was a PBX operator. She's really come a long way. I extend my congratulations to her and wish her success in her endeavors. Aloha!"

Senator Tungpalan, on behalf of Senators Mizuguchi, Menor and herself, introduced students Blythe Matsuda, Jonni Cho and Jason Paikai of Pearl City High School as follows:

"Mr. President, it's my great pleasure this morning to introduce three Pearl City High School students who are worthy of recognition for their recent heroic actions.

"On February 20, 1990, a potential bus accident was averted through the quick thinking and heroic actions of Pearl City High School sophomore Blythe Matsuda and freshmen Jonni Cho and Jason Paikai.

"On the morning of the 20th, as the school bus transporting Pearl City High School students approached Momilani Elementary, the bus driver suffered a heart attack and these three brave youths worked swiftly to ensure the safety of the 35 to 40 students. Blythe ran to the front of the bus and turned off the ignition, while Jonni put on the emergency brake to stop the bus from rolling backward and Jason, who was sitting in the back of the bus, calmly opened the emergency door, quieted the students and saw that each left safely from the bus. Although none of these students have driver's licenses, their actions were effective in saving the lives of all the passengers aboard the bus.

"This morning we'd like to commend these three youths for their courageous and heroic actions in averting a potentially dangerous bus accident and acknowledge their quick thinking and the responsible manner in which they responded to the crisis.

"On the floor are Blythe Matsuda, Jonni Cho and Jason Paikai. Accompanying them is Pearl City High School Vice Principal Kazu Agena."

The students rose to be recognized and were presented the Senate certificate of recognition and leis.

Senator Holt, on behalf of Senators Solomon and himself, introduced the 1990 University of Hawaii Men's Volleyball Team as follows:

"Mr. President, we have a group of outstanding young men here on the floor of the Senate. I would like to read the certificate which honors the 1990 University of Hawaii Men's Volleyball Team.

"Whereas, the organizational problems associated with the recent divisional separation of the league seriously dampened one of the greatest seasonal performances in UH men's volleyball history; and

"Whereas, seniors Carlos Briceno, Damien Hardy, Lyman Lacro, Adam Lockwood, Poncho Maluo, Brian Poppinga and Gary VanSickle deserved a sweeter ending to their collegiate careers; and

"Whereas, head coach Alan Rosehill and assistant coach Tony Crabbe, along with Brad Stewart, Larson Viliamu, Robert Mape, Barry Magaoay, Kelsy Kaaa and Mark Presho are expected to give their many

friends and supporters countless moments of excitement, drama and great pride in the years to come; now, therefore,

'Be it resolved by the Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, that the Senate recognizes, commends and above all, thanks the players and coaches of the 1990 University of Hawaii Men's Volleyball Team for sharing their talent, dedication and achievement with the people of Hawaii.'

All of the honorees, accompanied by head coach Alan Rosehill and wife Melanie, rose to be recognized and were presented the congratulatory Senate certificate and leis.

Senator Solomon, on behalf of the Senate President, welcomed and introduced Keahi Allen, daughter of the late Napua Stevens, and said:

"Mr. President, I would like to present a Senate certificate to the Keahi Allen in memory and honor of her mother Napua Stevens.

"Mr. President, the Hawaiians have a cherished song, 'E'kolu mea nui Maka honua' which says to us and tells us that the three most important things in life are faith, hope and charity. I feel, Mr. President, that Aunt Napua Stevens exemplified this. She had faith in her Hawaiian culture and lived this throughout her life. She had hope, through her commitment to the Hawaiian culture, that this would be passed on to the future. And she was a very charitable person because of her graciousness and her willingness to help all of us in the State of Hawaii.

"On behalf of the President of the Senate, I would like to present the certificate in memory of Napua Stevens and extend our deepest condolences to her family."

"In addition to his career as a judge, Judge Soong also has a broad background in public service and the law; first as a police officer and a sheriff, later as deputy director of the Hawaii State Tax Department and thereafter as an assistant United States attorney for Hawaii.

"Judge Soong has also demonstrated a strong commitment to the community, and particularly to our youth through his involvement in the Kainalu Pop Warner Program. And your committee was also informed by one of the trial judges who testified at our hearing that Judge Soong is also an accomplished athlete, especially in the game of golf where he's managed to use his negotiating skills to extract a few points from his fellow golfers, even before teeing off, to achieve a swift and sudden victory.

"Your committee also conducted its own inquiries into Judge Soong's background and found nothing that would prevent him from being an able circuit court judge. And concerning his confirmation hearing, I'd like to inform the Senate that Judge Soong commented to me that he found the confirmation process to be a very positive experience and, for a district court judge, that it wasn't such a bad experience after all. So I hope that Judge Soong can, perhaps, communicate that message strongly to the House and more specifically my counterpart, the chairman of the House Judiciary Committee.

"In any event, in closing, I commend Judge Soong for his outstanding service in the district court and I look forward to his tenure as a circuit court judge and, in that respect, I recommend to this body Judge Soong's confirmation as a circuit court judge. Thank you."

FINAL READING

S.B. No. 3109, S.D. 1, H.D. 1:

Senator Blair moved that S.B. No. 3109, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Reed.

Senator Ikeda rose to speak in favor of the bill as follows:

"Mr. President, this bill has been very complex and deals with a number of different components. As you know, I initially decided to hold H.B. 2897, H.D. 1, dubbed the superfund bill, and this bill contains the same provisions. I am sure that many are wondering why I have now changed my mind.

"Since this legislation was first heard, the parties involved have had many opportunities to discuss their differences and have made several attempts to reach a consensus. Unfortunately, all attempts have failed.

"The major disagreement centers on the pre-enforcement provisions in the bill which would permit the Department of Health to order cleanup without an appeal process. The order is reviewed only if the cleanup is completed or if someone is in violation of the order. Violation, of course, triggers the penalty provision of a fine of \$25,000 per day.

"It was this provision, above all others, which troubled me because it granted the Department of Health broad powers which had the potential for abuse and I didn't feel comfortable giving the department such authority. I felt that power used indiscriminately could wreak havoc in certain situations.

"I also took the time to review the federal laws which are in place and initially felt that there was adequate protection available through existing law.

"The House then passed this bill, piggybacking the superfund portion onto it. I also noted that this bill passed the House with only one dissenting vote and the chairman of the Planning, Energy and Environmental Protection Committee was quoted in the newspaper saying that 'he took the action because he believes the contending parties ... are close to agreement on the bill.' I took him at his word and again permitted the parties to get together to work on producing an acceptable draft.

"That attempt was also unsuccessful, but it also gave me more time to continue my research on the subject. I was troubled by the point that Dr. Lewin made in that very same news article and I quote, 'The alternative is to leave it' (meaning cleanup) 'to the discretion of industry as to whether a spill needs to be cleaned up or not. Should a pipeline explode or pollutants leak into a wetland or into drinking water supplies, we would have some serious legal difficulties,' Lewin said.

"In reviewing the different drafts and differences that the Department of Health and the industry have on this bill, I concluded that agreement was possible in most areas of concern. However, the major difference, which centers on the question of pre-enforcement powers, is a basic philosophical difference which will never be resolved between the parties.

"In a letter to me dated April 20, Dr. Lewin wrote:

'As you know, we have had discussions over the last several weeks with representatives of various groups interested in the bill. Representatives of industrial and agricultural groups felt strongly that there should be pre-enforcement review of Department actions. We have considered their position. We also have analyzed the experience of the federal government in using its Superfund Act which precludes pre-enforcement review. We feel more strongly than ever that to provide pre-enforcement review of Department actions would cripple our ability to use the bill effectively.'

"I have also since learned that there is no provision in the federal Comprehensive Environmental Response Compensation and Liability Act, more commonly known

as CERCLA, to delegate responsibility for local implementation of the law to individual states. This is in contrast to other federal environmental statutes such as the Clean Water Act or the Clean Air Act which have such provisions. Furthermore, there is no local federal authority for implementation of CERCLA. Emergency response to an environmental release of a hazardous material must be mobilized from EPA's Region 9 Office in San Francisco.

"Under the circumstances, Mr. President, I have therefore concluded that if we are to err on this issue, let it be on the side of protecting the environment.

"Also, Mr. President, there is no doubt in my mind that this legislation will have to be worked on during the interim. Much of the confusion could have been avoided if the Department of Health had adopted rules and regulations on the initial law. This needs to be done, and I feel that they were derelict in their duty and ask that they take immediate steps to remedy this situation.

"I want to thank Representative Andrews and Representative Shon for passing this draft to the Senate. Their actions gave me the time I needed to study this issue and reach the right decision, which is to pass this measure. I, therefore, urge you all to vote in favor of this bill. Thank you."

"Mr. President, this morning's Advertiser lead story was entitled 'The last days of Kalapana.' Unfortunately, I think that's an accurate headline and we truly are experiencing a human tragedy in the Puna area on the Big Island.

"I want to rise to thank Senator Yamasaki, his Ways and Means staff, and all the members of the budget conference. Because of their sensitivity and their compassion, they have been able to find some funds to try to start dealing with this terrible tragedy that is occurring. I know that the people in this community who are experiencing this unfortunate situation are going to be very grateful, indeed, for this effort on their behalf. Thank you."

Senator Cobb also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, two items. First of all, I understand a copy of a rebuttal to a letter I wrote, dated April 23rd, on the subject of proposed rapid transit funding was delivered to Senators today. Unfortunately, the author of

that particular letter didn't bother delivering a copy to my office, so if any Senator has an extra copy or doesn't have time to read it we'd certainly like to request it because a response will be forthcoming.

"Second, Mr. President, I note in this morning's Honolulu Advertiser an article with the title 'Waihee eases rail-tax pain.' It's a banner headline, and contained in that story were a number of statements which I would like to address briefly on the floor today.

"First of all, I am personally gratified the governor now admits that the excise tax is regressive. That's a major step. But, I note there were no specific figures or details, either in the story or in the proposal by our chief executive. He did say that it was 'a wash,' in terms of the cost, if the increased tax credit had come forward. My point is, Mr. President, it is simply not 'a wash' and I would like to detail why.

"It is not an offset but rather an increase in the tax burden for small businesses, who buy from other business, and who sell. There is an increase in the excise tax for all those who sell on commission, particularly those who cannot pass on the increase in the tax in their selling price. And, Mr. President, there is an increase for those taxpayers who cannot figure out how to claim the tax credit on a very complicated tax form, which is a substantial number of people. In addition, Mr. President, this would result in a bigger loss of the daily disposable income available to each taxpayer, many of whom are living on the borderline of poverty right now.

"Unfortunately, to date, there has been no serious consideration of other alternatives. We keep hearing words to the effect that we should increase the excise tax, increase the tax credit. In that way, the tourist would end up paying more of the freight.

"Mr. President, I think we ought to be a bit more direct. If we want to increase the tax burden on tourists, then we should go about increasing the tourist tax from 9 percent to 10 percent or whatever it takes to fund the transit system, if that's the goal.

"In addition, Mr. President, the city's EIS has acknowledged that this proposed tax increase is not temporary; it is permanent. They use the word 'perpetual' and I never cease to admire government bureaucrats and other who can dream up fancy words such as, 'revenue adjustment for a tax increase' or 'perpetual' for what is permanent. This is going to be a permanent tax increase.

"Frankly, Mr. President, I expected more in a way of a white knight on a white horse coming forward. I was not surprised with the Advertiser editorial that said the top need is to save the transit tax. But I agree with what the Speaker said, Mr. President, 'A tax increase is a tax, is a tax,' just like 'a rose by any other color is a rose, is a rose.' Thank you."

Senator Koki, also on a point of personal, rose to state:

"Mr. President, a survey shows that voters favor land use initiative. I believe they favor initiative because they do not trust the planning and approval process that we have. The Board of Land and Natural Resources and Roger Evans, administrator of conservation and environmental affairs is a good case in point of this mistrust of our planning and approval process. I'm speaking of a residential development on Mt. Olomana requested by Mr. and Mrs. Fazendin.

"Please allow me to acquaint you with the history of this case.

"On March 20, 1987, the Fazendin's applied to develop a residential dwelling upon conservation land on Mt. Olomana. July 10 of 1987, the meeting of the Board of Land and Natural Resources gave conditional approval. It stated that 'any construction, alteration, moving, demolition and repair of any building or other improvements of land within the conservation district authorized by the board shall be subject to the building and grading codes of the respective counties provided thereof prior to the commencement of any construction. Four copies of each of the final location map, plans, specifications shall be submitted to the chairperson.'

"One year goes by, he does not submit any further plans so that they may get a closer look at it, and, so, he is sent a letter stating that the approval is now null and void.

"On October 11, 1988, the Fazendin's again apply for residential development on that conservation use property. On March 14 of 1989, a letter was sent out by the Department of Land and Natural Resources to Mr. Fazendin. It says, 'We wish to inform you that your conservation district use application for single-family residential use and for after-the-fact approval of an existing driveway, extensive clearing, grading and excavation work at Kailua was approved on February 14, 1989, subject to the following'

"Mr. President, during the interim the owners, without approval or permit, built a 350-foot driveway, a large concrete slab for a garage, with extensive grading and clearing and excavation work, and put in utilities.

"It says regarding the violations, 'Unless landscaping and construction plans for existing driveway, utilities, clearing and grading for the proposed improvements are approved by this board at its next Oahu meeting, subsequent to applicant's submittal of such plans, the applicant shall dismantle and remove the existing driveway above the 250-foot elevation such that the property is both returned to its original state and landscaped to prevent further erosion, according to a grading, landscaping and construction plan to be submitted to the department for approval within 60 days. The applicant shall restore and supplement the natural grade destroyed at the ridge line of the property, according to a grading line to be submitted within 90 days. Applicant shall restore and supplement the natural vegetation destroyed at the ridge line of the property, according to a landscaping plan to be submitted within 90 days. The presently existing upper driveway and garage building pad shall be demolished and removed from the property. A single family dwelling for which authorization is hereby given is to be located so that the highest part of the roof is below the crest of the ridge line between the two properties.'

"On April 28, 1989, they sent another letter to Mr. Fazendin. 'We are writing to acknowledge receiving certain plans and other materials. Thank you for your cooperation. However, the materials you have submitted are not yet sufficient to comply with the terms and conditions of your conservation district use application.' (He still hasn't corrected the driveway problem.) 'Unless landscaping and construction plans are approved by this board, you shall dismantle the existing driveway above the 250-foot elevation. The conservation district use application that you submitted which the board approved specified a combination of concrete slab and modified pier and post foundation.' (In other words, a pole house type of concept rather than a concrete slab.)

"The plans you submitted show no sign of the pier and post foundation. The board approved a modified pier

and post foundation as you proposed, subject to the final plan review. Your conformance to that pier and post concept and to our board approval is especially important, given the high slope characteristics and unstable soil conditions in the subject area and given the exceptionally high weight characteristics of the building described in the plan you submitted.' (In other words, 2-foot thick walls, reinforced concrete throughout, slab on grade foundation, etc.)

"Soils are described by the United States Department of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service 'as very sticky and very plastic with a high-shrink-swell potential. Such soils are characterized as having low sheer strength and are said to have the following characteristics: high-shrink-swell potential, low sheer strength, slope as much as 70 percent, susceptible to sliding where slopes are more than 15 percent.' The proposed site is much more than 15 percent.

"You are especially reminded in your statement that the exteriors will be finished in the natural color so as to blend with the environment. We respectfully request your cooperation with both the letter of the law and the spirit of the law."

"Mr. President, on March 26, 1989, the board met to review the plans that he had submitted and they noted that the conservation district use application which he submitted show no sign of the pier and post foundation. As stated in the application, '... such a pier and post foundation or a pole house would minimize disturbance of natural ground contours. Your conformance to that pier and post concept and to our board approval is especially important given the high slope characteristic and unstable soil conditions.'

"They go on and reiterate throughout the hearing about the pier and post concept. The plans fail to place the proposed house so that the highest point of the roof is below the crest of the ridge line. Mr. President, it's very important on Mt. Olomana at this ridge line that the proposed location of the dwelling would make it a part of the skyline. It would protrude beyond the ridge, and so they are telling him that the roof can be no higher than the ridge line. 'Staffers inspected the site personally and notes the existence of attractive alternatives available.' In other words, they're telling him to move the house.

"The decision on the May 26, 1989 meeting unanimously voted to reject this proposed development. Mr. Fazendin then received a letter stating that his request has been disapproved specifically on the following items: the site of the house lot; the style and three-story nature of the house. The house is going to be three stories high, 35 feet in height, made of 2-foot thick walls of concrete and a stucco finish, not-at-all conforming to the spirit and intent of the law.

"The board deferred action on requiring you to remove the existing driveway from the 250-foot elevation. You are reminded that you need to comply with the above conditions within 90 days. Applicant shall restore and supplement the natural grade destroyed at the ridge line of the property' where he has illegally started excavation. 'Applicant shall restore and supplement the natural vegetation destroyed at the ridge line of the property. ... You are reminded that the 90 days has expired and the landscaping plan you submitted was rejected along with other plans submitted, putting you in technical violation of these conditions.' Fines can be up to \$500 a day.

"The single family dwelling for which authorization hereby is given is to be located so that the highest point of the roof is below the crest of the ridge line ... That was June 23, 1989. In between that time, he goes and

reapplies again with essentially the same plans that were rejected a year ago. The staff report indicates that the original plans were rejected by the board at the meeting on May 26, 1989. 'The applicant's current request is for the board to review and approve the "Landscape Development Plan" submitted on January 22, 1990,' showing the original site for the residential use, and his original plans, rejected by the board on May 26, 1989.

"There is also indication that he has illegally graded into another piece of property that he does not own.

"The board approved a "modified pier and post foundation," as you proposed, subject to the final plan review. Your conformance to that pier and post concept, and to our Board approval, including the location of the house, is especially important given the high slope characteristics and unstable soil conditions in the subject area, and given the exceptionally high weight characteristics of the building described in the plans you submitted.' He's continuously submitting the same plans throughout even though it's being rejected.

"The plans submitted fail to place the proposed house so that the highest point of the roof is below the crest of the ridge line."

"Mr. President, the final conclusion of the staff report during this meeting is that 'the plans submitted do conflict with the objectives of the subzone and the plans are inconsistent with public health, safety and welfare of the public. Deadlines for compliance with board sanctions have passed as early May 25, 1989.' Therefore, the staff recommends the following: 'The Board denies this current request for plan approval. Enforcement of sanctions is to be turned over immediately to the Department of Attorney General.'

"Mr. President, that's the brief history of the project.

"In spite of the recommendations of Mr. Evans' staff that the board not only deny the request but enforce sanctions which were placed by the previous board decision to have Mr. Fazendin remove the illegal driveway from above the 250-foot elevation; remove the illegal garage pad poured right on the crest of the ridge line on Mt. Olomana; restore natural grade caused by illegal excavation of building site; and restore natural vegetation removed illegally by illegal grading and construction, Mr. Evans ignored the staff recommendation and proceeded to present testimony to the board that, in the words of community observers, seemed as if Mr. Evans was an agent for Mr. Fazendin rather than an agent of the state, whose board is charged with, in the words of the Attorney General, 'the authority and responsibility to ensure that all development within the conservation district is compatible with locality; that the natural beauty and open space shall be preserved or improved upon; and that all building shall harmonize with physical and environmental conditions.'

"The outcome, Mr. President, of the board decision, in spite of the staff recommendations, was to allow the house to be built on the proposed site which was rejected by the board a year ago. The board decision specifically denied the location because they wanted the roof line to be no higher than the crest of the ridge line. At the proposed site, the floor of the house will be at the crest of the ridge line so the roof will protrude above the ridge and be a part of the skyline.

"The board decision would allow a massive concrete structure 35 feet in height which was earlier rejected because it was conspicuous and obtrusive and run counter to the spirit of allowable structures in the conservation district.

"The board decision allowed a slab on grade foundation. In earlier discussions and recommendations, the board was insistent on a post and pier foundation because a slab on grade foundation required extensive excavation, and the severe slope and soil conditions with low shear strength would possibly present a dangerous, unstable soil condition.

"Allow an illegal driveway which has a slope of 25 percent with one run of 130 feet with a slope of 38 percent. Both slope figures are in excess of City and County allowable percent slope of 20 percent, or nearly double the allowable slope in some areas. Allow an illegal garage slab to remain but rejected plans for the proposed garage. The garage roof would be the highest point of the structure were it permitted to be built.

"I am willing to venture that after the home is built the owners will come back and apply for a garage because the slab is already there and it would be unreasonable to have a house but not a garage.

"Upon the decision of the board, Councilman Felix filed a contested hearing petition."

Senator Blair interjected:

"Point of parliamentary inquiry, Mr. President.

"Mr. President, when members rise on a point of personal privilege, is it a requirement that the subject of their remarks have some relationship to proceedings of the Senate?"

The Chair answered:

"No. The Chair has been very liberal in its interpretation of"

Senator Koki continued:

"Thank you, Mr. President.

"Upon the decision of the board, Councilman Felix filed a contested hearing petition. He did this within the 10-day requirement. However, a little known rule may be used to deny the hearing. The rule is that a verbal notice must be given on the day of the hearing. Mr. President, nearly a dozen community members were present to lodge a verbal protest.

"The amount of time allowed the Fazendins to correct violations and in the end not requiring them to comply seems hypocritical in contrast to deny a contested hearing on a technicality.

"Mr. President, an agency of the government should not be able to 'willy-nilly' interpret its own rules. They make a decision one year and the opposite the next. This case has been followed on television and the newspaper. There has been considerable community interest in this development. To seemingly violate their own rules and to ignore their own staff recommendations to reject the application, and to do the opposite by approving it is one of the reasons why the public does not trust our planning and approval process.

"Mr. President, we need to restore that trust. I urge you to direct the appropriate committee to see to it that Councilman Felix's contested hearing petition be heard and the recommendations of the staff planners be followed since they are the experts on whom the board depends to make their decisions.

"Mr. President, I also ask you to instruct the appropriate committee to look into the conduct and behavior of Mr. Roger Evans who presented testimony that was in contradiction to his staff's recommendations; that he acted, in the words of community observers, as an agent for the Fazendins rather than as the administrator of the Office of Conservation and Environmental Affairs; that he also appeared unfamiliar with his staff's report in his presentation to the Board of Land and Natural Resources when, in fact, he should have been very familiar with it; and that the action of the board be investigated. They were familiar with the project and its problems, given its long history, and they still made a decision that seems totally inappropriate, given the facts of the case and its prior decision to reject a similar building plan.

"Thank you."

At this time, Senator McMurdo introduced Councilman Neil Abercrombie, former member of the Senate and former congressman, who was seated in the gallery.

Senator Crozier rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I would like to also refer to the headlines of this morning's newspaper, 'Waihee eases rail-tax pain.' In the article, I quote: 'In an 11th-hour effort to make an excise tax increase more palatable to state lawmakers, Gov. John Waihee late yesterday proposed offsetting the increase with tax credits or other measures. ... Waihee said his proposed relief could be added to legislation for some \$40 million in income tax relief he had proposed earlier, and is now before the Legislature. Waihee said all of those reforms, with the approval of the additional excise tax, could result in "a wash" -- no net increase in taxes, he said.'

"Mr. President, I applaud Governor Waihee for coming up with the proposal. I know where he got the proposal from, Mr. President. He got it from this very body. Many of us in this Senate chamber have been talking about if we have to have a general excise tax increase, we should use the personal income tax relief so that we could get as close as possible to revenue neutral as we can.

"I would like to quote a very astute senator who said on March 7th, the 26th session day, and I'll just read the part that's very important. That Senator said, 'If we increase this regressive tax, we can give back to the people the monies through the personal income tax, which is a progressive tax. That way it would become revenue neutral.'

"Mr. President, I'm that astute ... (Chair: 'I thought I was the guy.') No, that was me. (Laughter.)

"Mr. President, I talked with other Senators along the way, like Senator Kobayashi, and we talked quite a bit about finding ways to make this palatable to the people. This is the way it can happen.

"Right now the city needs \$93 million in capital costs for the mass transit system. The excise tax of half percent from across-the-state would bring in \$125 million in revenues. Mr. President, of that, \$44 million will come from the residents and \$81 million from other sources. If we can give the \$44 million back to the residents, we still have \$81 million from the military, the tourists, the construction industry, and what have you. We can make mass transit a reality.

"The people in my area want mass transit. The people in the Leeward side of the island and Mililani Town, because we have to use H-1 and it takes an hour and a

half to get to town when, normally, it should only take around 35 minutes. We've put up with that for years and years, and as Kapolei, as West Loch and as many other developments coming in our area continue to grow, we are going to need mass transit.

"Some of my colleagues who represent other parts of the island may not have the same degree or passion for mass transit. I would suggest to them that they understand ... the students that will graduate from the different schools throughout this island, when it's their time to buy a home, they will be coming to live on the Leeward side of the island. They will be coming and they will be joining the traffic that we now have to fight and contend with. So, as they ponder the question, I would like for them to not look at today and tomorrow, but look ten years down the line when their constituents' children become the next generation that have to be in the traffic. We need mass transit.

"Mr. President, in 1983 through 1985, I worked in Waikiki and I was fortunate enough that I had to catch the bus. I had to. People would tell me when they see me on the bus, and I was a Representative, at the time, they'd say, 'Oh, Representative, I'm so impressed to see you riding on the bus. You're just like us guys. You wanna be one of us.' And I told them straight up, 'Look, I'm not here because I want to be here. This is all I can afford.' So, I'd be on the bus, and I'd come here then I'd be working down in Waikiki. I had to transfer at Aala Park and there would be mornings when when 8 or 9 busses coming out of Kalihi would pass us by because those busses were jam-packed with people living in Kalihi getting to Waikiki.

"There is a need right now in the inner city to create a mass transit system so that we can relieve the pressures.

"I applaud Governor Waihee for coming down at this point and time. We need his strength to send a message both to my colleagues in this house and the colleagues on the other side. It's important to understand that often those ideas that the governor eventually expounds starts here. The representatives of the people come up with ideas and we debate these ideas and as the ideas develop or progress, eventually the executive branch takes hold of the idea and runs with it. A good example of that, Mr. President, is, a few years ago I was trying to push for a public safety department, and the whole executive branch came down on me and said, 'Representative Crozier, no, we don't want that.' Now, what do we have? They only wanted the Department of Corrections. That's what we got. What do we have today? We have a Department of Public Safety.

"It's important that my colleagues understand that once the governor gets involved, he believes that there is community support to a position. I ask my colleagues to take his words seriously, ponder the thought, and, hopefully, you can support getting a mass transit system and, if necessary, we have to have a general excise tax increase. Thank you."

Senator Matsuura also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I just want to make a few comments in response to the previous speakers.

"I support the rapid transit system, and if the Senator from Makakilo were to pass a few words from the Journal, I would have said all the nice things about his being the astute and star wars Senator in this body.

"I want to remind the body that when he spoke about the 90 cents bag of ties, the tie that he is wearing today is worth more than 90 cents, I can assure you of that.

"On a more serious note, in regards to the comments made by the Windward Senator, I would like to assure him that being the chairman of the land use and natural resources committee, I will look into some of the concerns that he has expressed on the floor today. I would like to request the Senator to let me have copies of whatever he has presented. It seems like quite a voluminous document, but I will look into the matter and report back to you, Mr. President."

Senator Reed also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, I would offer a friendly urging of caution to those Senate sages who would rush in to claim credit for the governor's proposal. I feel that the people of Hawaii will end up concluding that the proposal to increase our taxes and then give us back a tax credit is nothing more than 'voodoo economics.' We need rapid transit but we do not need a tax increase."

Senator Cobb then rose on a point of parliamentary privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I want to make clear that I'm not objecting to the governor presenting his proposal. In fact, I appreciate it because it lays something out on the table, and it's something to respond to. And I appreciate the Senator from Makakilo raising the points he did about mass transit because, ladies and gentlemen, believe it or not, this is about the first time we have had any serious discussion of transit proposals on the floor of this Senate in this entire session. Everyone has always assumed that rapid transit is a 'given.'

"Tomorrow, with your permission Mr. President, I'm going to present a brief slide show on the floor of the Senate, raising some questions not only about mass transit but why we find ourselves in the situation we do today because of a series of monopolies involving a bus, involving prohibition of airport shuttle, involving prohibition of jitneys in Honolulu that used to be very popular before 1940. I think all of these things ought to be looked at as a part of the transit picture.

"So I appreciate the concerns that my colleagues have on the subject of rapid transit, and I appreciate very much the fact that now we're finally beginning to debate the details of the issue which we have not done so far this session. It's always been an assumed, a given.

"Now, I think, Mr. President, it's time to take a serious, if belated look at some of the details and I look forward to doing that. Thank you."

Senator Holt also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I'm a supporter of mass transit and I support the governor's proposal.

"According to the news reports we're going to go ahead with the new arena at \$32 million. I'd just like to strongly urge the Ways and Means chairman that if we're going to go ahead with that proposal that we seriously consider amending that definition so we can have the mass transit run right next to the arena like Boston Garden. Thank you."

At 12:40 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Blair, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate stood in recess until 10:00 o'clock p.m.

At 12:10 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:14 o'clock p.m. with the President in the Chair.

Senator George then rose on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, last night, your conference committee achieved an agreement on transfer of the TAT to the counties. I don't want to derail that. I'm interested and I think it's a step in the right direction toward giving more autonomy, more say on the part of the counties in their own destinies, and I like the idea that there's to be no direction as to how this money can be spent.

"However, driving home, I began to wonder about the repetition of the same formula that we used last year in the wording of grants-in-aid to the counties. I think the numbers are familiar to you all. The formula, I believe, was a sort of a mingled chime. It included some aspects of the State Association of Counties' proposal for sharing the wealth, so to speak. By repeating that, we hear numbers like the 44 percent and so on.

"I want to translate that into what it means per capita to the people who live in each of the four counties. And I think you'll be as astonished as I was to hear what happened.

"Beginning with the littlest county, Kauai County, the resident population of Kauai is, according to the numbers I have, 49,300. Per capita, under the TAT transfer to the counties that we have just agreed on, the residents of Kauai will receive, per capita, \$1,724.65 per person; for a family of four, \$6,898.60. That's the annual manna that's going to fall on the residents of Kauai.

"Hawaii and Maui are sort of in the middle of the spectrum and we can get back to that later, if anybody wants to.

"City and County of Honolulu residents get \$101.40, annually, per person; family of four then, \$405.60. It's pretty easy to figure out the difference between \$100 and \$1700. The residents of Kauai get 17 times as much per capita. I don't want to put down those wonderful residents of Kauai, but all that this means to me is, are we factoring in the necessary ingredients of equity when we leave the discretion to the counties to spend the TAT money in anyway they want?

"I don't know whether we should factor it in by visitors, whether we should factor it in based on de facto residents, that is, the comers and the goers as well as the residents including the military. But it just seems to me that I can't make an appropriate tie between the percentages and the amounts received and the TAT transfer to the counties.

"As I say, I don't want to derail it. It's a step in the right direction, but I think we ought to think about it awfully hard. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Yamasaki then said:

"Mr. President, the statements made by the previous speaker is premature because the conference draft of the bill is not before us at this time."

Senator George responded:

"Mr. President, as I said, I don't want to derail what's going on and I rose as a matter of personal privilege rather than addressing the matter of the bill, and I just want to make sure that all of us in this chamber think about it while the matter is still under deliberation, before it's set in stone. It was very difficult to decide whether I should do this now or whether I should stand up and be irate about it on Monday, and I cast my own vote in favor of bringing it to the members' attention today. Thank you."

APPOINTMENT OF CONFEREES

H.B. No. 1718, S.D. 2:

In accordance with the disagreement of the House to the amendments proposed by the Senate to H.B. No. 1718 and the request for a conference on the subject matter thereof, the President appointed Senators Yamasaki, Kobayashi, A., co-chairmen, Koki as managers on the part of the Senate at such conference.

Senator Solomon then rose on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, there is an article in today's paper by Peter Rosegg, Advertiser editorial writer. It says, 'Who's a witch? Who's a wimp? And is this any way to run a university?' Well, Mr. President, I must admit I have no problem with the article. I thought it was reasonable, except that in the cartoon I would have hoped that they would put me in my Ph.D. gown as they did with the president, but I guess I can live with that."

"But, Mr. President, we have our own cartoon in this Senate chamber and we'd like to offer this as a counter. This is not your average 'dog and pony' show. I think, Mr. President, this is what this article is trying to turn our philosophical differences that I have with the president into."

"I would like to make one remark, Mr. President, on the article and this is the 5th paragraph which says, 'It's hard to find anyone to speak for the record, but privately some senators have said that they are reluctant to attend Solomon's hearings when they fear there is going to be a dust-up. It's not unusual for her to be the only senator present.' Mr. President, I'd like to publicly apologize to my colleagues if anyone feels this way. I think that your committee hearings on higher education have been fair. I think that as chairman, the committee has always tried to keep the questions and answers to the bill and resolutions we are considering. It was not the intent of the chairman at any point to either make her fellow committee members uncomfortable in my questioning or because of my philosophical differences with the president."

"Furthermore, Mr. President, I have been a proud member of this Senate for over eight years and I have never ever felt that any senator here couldn't face any kind of challenge that was presented to them at any kind of committee hearing or shy away from any kind of issue that may create dust in this legislative body."

"So, Mr. President, these are my remarks for today. Thank you very much."

Senator Tungpalan also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, it appears that a case of mistaken identity may have occurred. There have been many occasions where people have mistaken me for the previous speaker. I guess it's because Hawaiians may look alike. (Laughter.)"

"Mr. President, when several of us reviewed that cartoon, it appeared that it looked more like me than the previous speaker. (Laughter.) I have known Malama for over 25 years and I don't recall ever seeing her in high heels (laughter) so I do want to let the cartoonist know that I am the Senator from Pearl City and Senator Malama Solomon is the one from Kohala, so when you're drawing us, please get it straight. Thank you."

Senator Cobb also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, yesterday, I indicated a desire to present a series of slides on the question of transit and raise some issues that I don't think have been debated yet"

on the floor of the Senate or have really been a subject of discussion between the two houses. And you indicated a reluctance to allow a slide show so I'd like to invite you on May 10th to the Ilikai Hotel where a certain computer company will be presenting a show on ... not your average 'dog and pony' show, but this would be the lead slide and a rather interesting presentation.

"Since then several senators have remarked this would be the start of a technological revolution in the Senate, and I think that would be a healthy thing. We'd start off with slides and it wouldn't be very long until we get to VCRs and three-dimensional showings. And I think it would add to the educational benefit that we would derive as senators, so after the session I would like to take you to lunch to explain some of those benefits and do a little lobbying on behalf of technology.

"Be that as it may, Mr. President, the question of mass transit is before us and will be, presumably, next week, and I would like to raise some questions about that and explain a little historical background as to why Honolulu is faced with an all-or-nothing choice right now, and perhaps some of the alternatives that we can take in the meantime. And I'll be as brief as possible.

"For the wonderful folks that brought us Aloha Stadium, we were promised high patronage and low maintenance costs. Instead, we got low patronage, except for football games, and astronomical maintenance costs. We now have before us rust transit, promised with the same forecast of large use, reasonable maintenance costs and to be done on budget, on time.

"I'd like to make three basic points, Mr. President, that is that even with rail transit, congestion will get worse. The second is that the few cars the transit will remove from the road may not be worth the enormous cost to do so. And the third is that the city and state administrations should be looking also at other alternatives, not at the expense of rail transit but as an addition, as an alternative even as a stop-gap during the period of construction.

"In fact, Gordon Lum, the executive director of the Oahu Metropolitan Planning Organization, will tell you that even with rail transit, traffic congestion will be worse than it is today. Even our city managing director admits that fact but says that it would be even worse without rail. Maybe so, maybe not.

"This is not a local situation; it is a national situation. The Urban Mass Transportation Administration admits that rail does not make an appreciable contribution to a reduction in congestion.

"We now have a definitive study from the federal government on the eight rail systems that it has substantially funded recently. For those of you that might have been to these cities, you know that traffic congestion is no better there today since they built rail. In fact, in most of them, it is worse. In Sacramento, Miami and Buffalo, they have less ridership today for their bus and rail systems combined than they used to have for their bus system alone, even before they built rail and spent all that money.

"Let's take a look at how this can be. First of all, according to the 1980 census for Honolulu, only 12% of commuters used The Bus. We had little growth in transit over the last decade and so we've had a 22% increase in drivers, therefore, cars are causing the primary congestion in the last few years.

"If we were to build rail overnight, we would get a 4% reduction in the number of drivers and therefore cars, on

the road, if we used the city's forecast of a 40% increase in transit. It would mean an increase of 15,000 transit riders. Because these new riders are typically split between former car drivers and former car passengers, and we would have a reduction of 7,500 drivers. But it takes time to build the system. If you allow only 5 years to build the complete system, you'd still have a significant 8% increase in commuters.

"This would mean another 30,000 people commuting to work. Even with a 50% increase in transit ridership, which is beyond the city's wildest dreams, it would still give us 10,000 more cars on the road, an increase of 3%. However, we will have taken 19,000 people off the road, half of whom would be drivers, so let's remember the number of 10,000 drivers, 10,000 cars off the road and look at the cost. Please remember the figure 10,000.

"If we look at the cost of getting these 10,000 cars off the road, the rail construction cost, depending on what numbers will be used, will be approximately \$1.4 billion with the federal share of about \$400 million at most, which will leave us with a balance to be financed locally of \$1 billion.

"The city is using interest rates of 8% in their calculations and if we finance the \$1 billion at 8%, we have an interest cost annually of \$80 million. If we add the \$80 million to the minimum operating loss of \$25 million of the rail system, this new system would cost us at least \$105 million annually.

"If we divide that \$105 million by the 10,000 cars we've taken off the road, we finish up with a cost per car removed of \$10,500 annually, each and every year. That is an optimistic viewpoint. That is, if the city's ridership and cost projections are correct.

"However, in the last 13 years, for each of the major transit systems built, the actual ridership achievement has only been 38% of what was projected. The only exception to this is the Tijuana Trolley in San Diego, and the only reason that is anywhere near its projected ridership is because the vast majority of the riders are tourists, not commuting transit workers.

"If we look at the capital costs, forecast versus actual, again in the government study named the Pickrell Report, we note that the city of Washington, D.C., was \$3.3 billion over budget. Of all of the systems built in the last 13 years, there have been an average of 50% over budget. If Honolulu's rail system is 50% over budget, it means an unexpected increase of \$700 million.

"Some might think that these would be arguments for not building a rail system and that we should increase the buses. But we should note that we have increased by 20% the number of buses in the last seven years, while the number of passengers are actually down. During this same period the subsidy has risen from \$29 million to \$51 million. Given the trend, locally and nationally, of a decline in transit ridership, it is obvious that just to maintain the existing ridership, we will have to look forward to even more massive increases in subsidies for conventional public transit unless we do things differently.

"Let's take a different viewpoint. Consider that a commuter driving in from the suburbs to downtown only has two options at the moment -- driving in alone for an additional \$125 per month over what a car already costs, or the \$15 bus pass. There should be a middle ground, a premium priced vehicle for a better quality ride costing less than a car and more than The Bus. This is what people call a marketing niche. There should be something there in the range of \$80.

"In a 1980 survey of non-bus users, surprisingly few have had their cars used after they get to work. What they said was, if they were going to be a passenger in another vehicle, they wanted something that was fast, convenient and provided door-to-door service. That same survey was verified again in 1989. The reason we don't have such services today is that it is illegal. It is either explicitly illegal or the institutional barriers are so great as to constitute an insurmountable barrier.

"If they were not illegal to provide these kinds of services, we would have such things as a Super Shuttle, as exists in San Francisco and a number of other cities. This would provide door-to-door service which is the most important ingredient in mass transit alternatives.

"Two months ago, the Wall Street Journal commented on the growth of Super Shuttle and its competitors. It talked about the fact that while Super Shuttle can take you from the airport to your office, and can pick you up at home and take you to the airport, it is illegal for that same carrier to take you from the home to the office. It is the taking away of such barriers that would be critically important.

"It is why, in this state and city, we need to allow taxis to operate 15-passenger vans. We need to allow open entry to all 15-passenger vehicles, even if we have to provide an initial subsidy so that business people are encouraged to get into this as a business.

"What has been hidden from us is the explicit policy of the U.S. Department of Transportation to encourage paratransit services. In fact, they even go beyond just encouraging to require that the public sector involve the private sector in the provision of transit.

"Paratransit is described by the federal government as those forms of transportation between an exclusive taxi ride and a conventional bus or train. It is the shared ride taxi, where many people might share one vehicle, as they do in Washington, D.C. It is the jitney, which until it was banned in Honolulu in 1940, was the fastest growing segment of transportation not only in Honolulu but in each of the neighbor islands. It is the subscription bus that I described earlier that you precontract for door-to-door services from your home to your work place. It includes such things as van pools and the Super Shuttle, for example.

"As further examples, in the City of San Francisco they now have operating jitneys that operates the full length of Mission Street. While the jitney is required to charge 20% more than the bus, the bus loses tremendous amounts of money, but the jitneys are profitable.

"The reason we go back to the past, Mr. President, is because we can learn from history. The Rosecrans Jitney Service which was one of five jitney bus companies that was banned in Honolulu in 1940, merely because they interfered with the revenue of the then monopoly bus company.

"If we had paratransit vehicles for Honolulu, we might have the legislative shuttle during the session, particularly after we've lost over 300 parking places adjacent to the Capitol, and note, Mr. President, I said legislative 'shuttle,' not 'shuffle.' It would be so much easier for everyone to get from downtown to the Capitol, given our current parking situation. We could have the subscription buses; we could have an Ala Moana and Waikiki shuttle; we could talk about operating our visitor facilities, and I think it's a shame that we should pack our visitors in buses like sardines when they have no other reasonable way to get to the Ala Moana Center.

"Our tour buses could be enlisted as subscription buses. Many of our tour buses are going out for tours at the same time that half of our city bus fleet is coming back into the garage to sit idle for the rest of the day. We might even have a Waikiki to downtown shuttle, if some entrepreneur thought it worthwhile to risk money and try out such a service. Of course, we need an airport shuttle. We have a limited airport to Waikiki shuttle, but why discriminate against the local residents.

"Why can't we have a super shuttle like they have in San Francisco? And why should we limit our airport contract transportation services to one taxi company for pick-up? That is a monopoly.

"What are the reasons that we should be concerned about rail? Mr. President, this is a very permanent fixture. It's not something you can change your mind about later.

"I think if we're going to have to solve our transportation problems, we need to have the carrot of door-to-door transit so that the people will actually ride it and a small stick of such ideas as alternate road taxing, of normally priced parking for state and city workers, and of no mandated parking requirements for buildings. Such parking policies only encourage people to bring their cars to work.

"The most important point is, for these various alternatives, they are all inexpensive to test. There is no test with rail.

"We must all understand that congestion will get worse even with rail. That rail is not an effective option in ridding us of traffic congestion. There are many other options to try.

"In closing, Mr. President, I'd like to say that the cities on the mainland that have all experimented with rail have all experienced larger than expected deficits in all but one case, lower than anticipated ridership, and it was after the BART system in San Francisco was built that the Bay Area began looking at the paratransit alternatives of shuttles and jitneys because they recognized that BART was not fulfilling the total need of the citizens of its community. That's sort of putting the cart before the horse or maybe after the horse, and I think we should be doing it to where we examine our paratransit alternatives with the same degree of priority that we are now attending to with mass transit.

"Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Crozier also rose on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I thank the previous speaker on the historical lesson he just shared with us.

"I've heard many of those comments before, but in the same vein I'd like to share with the members of this body that in 1980 or in 1978 to '79 the Democratic mayor of this city had already begun the process to create a mass transit system for the City of Honolulu. At that time the federal government was ready to fund 80% of the cost of the mass transit. Then the next mayor scuttled the whole deal. Now we're in the 1990s and again the people of Hawaii or the people of Honolulu want mass transit. We no longer can get 80% funding from the federal government. It's now down to 30%.

"I ask my colleagues to crank that into their decision making because if we lose this opportunity, we may eventually have to pay for mass transit all by ourselves.

"Thank you, sir."

Senator McMurdo then rose to ask if the Senator from the 12th Senatorial District would yield to a question. The Chair posed the question to the Senator and Senator Cobb having answered in the affirmative, Senator McMurdo inquired:

"I wonder if you have any information on BART since the earthquake because at the time when the bridge was closed BART ridership went up considerably. I was wondering if, in your research, you have anything on that, whether the percentage stayed up after the Bay Bridge was repaired or not?"

Senator Cobb answered:

"Mr. President, I don't have the definitive figures. All I have are second and third-hand reports and I would certainly defer to any further elaboration from the Senate Transportation chairman. The initial reports that I have, again with the qualification that they are second-hand, is that the ridership went up for a period of approximately 60 days, and until such time as one of the bridges that had been closed was reopened. At the same time, paratransit ridership went up even more significantly and has stayed at that higher level since then because people have adopted more favorably to paratransit."

At 12:46 o'clock p.m., on motion by Senator Blair, seconded by Senator Reed and carried, the Senate stood in recess until 10:00 o'clock p.m.

Senator Yamasaki moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 67 be adopted and H.B. No. 2500, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1,

having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator A. Kobayashi.

Senator Reed rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I'll be voting for the budget with reservations. We keep hearing, 'We do have a budget surplus; we don't have a budget surplus.' The cavalier attitude that has become commonplace in annually exceeding the expenditure ceiling contributes to this confusion. This irresponsible spending, fueled by government's failure to prioritize, will eventually cause economic problems and tax increases. Therefore, I want to express my reservations."

Senator Cobb also supported the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I'll be voting for the budget with reservations and rather than detail all of the reservations, I would merely like to cite the imbalance of appropriations for Oahu contained not only in this but in a pattern from last year's budget, Act 316-89, and I would ask those figures inserted into the Journal." (Attachment "A")

Senator B. Kobayashi also rose to speak in support of the bill as follows:

"Mr. President, I'd like to speak in favor of the budget.

"As you know, education has had a fairly rough negotiation between the House and the Senate. Overall, I think, the education budget is a good budget. We all, of course, hoped that we could have done better, but I think that we have several items in the budget that are worthy of note.

"First of all, we have a class size improvement for grade 2. This lowers the ratio for grade 2 to 20 to 1 on what's called the resource allotment basis, which means that if, as in many cases, we do not have the classroom space to provide for a separate classroom or we cannot recruit teachers, that the resources would go to that school anyway, and that school would have the choice of using these resources in whatever manner the school deems desirable to reduce the effects of class size even though they might not have a separate classroom with a separate teacher.

"On this note, I would like to point out to members that, outside of the education budget, in the higher education budget there is a very significant item of \$1.5 million for the College of Education. The College of Education currently resides in facilities some of which predate World War II. The college lab school and the associated facilities of the College of Education are in dire need of improvement. This improvement is necessary in order that more teachers be produced.

"We can have all the classroom space we want, and we're currently short of classroom space, but without teachers, largely being produced in this state by U.H. Manoa, all the classrooms within the DOE system are useless.

"This appropriation of \$1.5 million will go a long way in speeding up the process of getting a new College of Education facility to help produce more teachers in the coming years. The current shortage of teachers is statewide and nationwide. We do not expect that this problem will be solved immediately but one year head start is certainly a great godsend.

"In addition to that, we have improvements for vice principals which are key to innovation and change in the classroom. We have a small educational innovation project which affects largely the Honolulu district middle school project, Castle High School, Campbell High School and several other neighbor island schools including Kapaa Elementary School, Hoonanau and Konawaena.

"In addition to that, there are two measures affecting improvements in social studies -- one having to do with Pacific and Asian studies and another one allowing for the upgrade of curriculum for the social studies area, generally.

"These are some of the highlights of the education budget and I think we have a good start in trying to develop an educational system that we eventually will be able to call second to none.

"Thank you."

Senator McCartney also supported the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I would like to commend our Ways and Means chairman for doing an excellent job in putting together this package.

"Also, I would like to refer to the education part of the budget. It's a budget that I think we can all be proud of. Mr. President, we not only need to decentralize our schools and make our schools the focal point of the community, giving local communities more flexibility and autonomy, but we need to provide additional resources to make sure that those schools can meet and identify their needs. I think this budget keeps us on the course and the path that we set last year on education that provides an additional \$21.3 million.

"We'll have to come back next year and work hard again, but at least this budget keeps us on track and I'd like to thank the Ways and Means Committee and the chairman for their hard work. It's a budget that I think we can all be proud of and support. Thank you."

Senator Blair rose to speak against the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I'll try to be brief.

"First of all, we must keep in mind what time sharing is. It's a prepaid vacation. It's a way to get the most bodies into our state with the least economic benefit to the state. But, for better or for worse, time sharing is with us.

"What this bill does is it says to the time sharers, 'you didn't pay your taxes for a long, long time, but we're going to forgive you and say you only have to pay your taxes in the future.' I wish that they would allow me the same prerogative, but I've always paid my taxes. If I ever failed to pay I couldn't count on such leniency.

"Another interesting thing about time sharing is they don't pay the general 5% transient accommodations tax. They should, but they don't. I think a lot of members of this body are probably not aware of that.

"Finally, Mr. President, I think we should keep in mind that this is going to generate losses to the state probably in the range of about \$6 million. Not losses in the sense that we ever collected it, but losses in the sense that we're saying, 'even though you owe it to us, we're not going to collect it from you.'

"The Department of Taxation testified against this bill.

"Finally, Mr. President, I think it's really interesting to note that our own taxpayers are going to get a dollar back from us. These people are going to get millions of dollars divided amongst a much, much smaller population. I think our priorities are badly misplaced. I'm aggrieved that under these circumstances we would treat these individuals who did not pay their taxes so much better than we treat our own citizens who do. I hope my colleagues would join me in voting 'no.'"

Senator Crozier rose to speak in favor of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, last year, the Legislature requested an audit to be done of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs by our auditors and the auditors did an excellent job. They came back with suggested recommendations so that we can make the Office of Hawaiian Affairs a more responsive body to both the Legislature and, also, to its constituents.

"The law that we are implementing here is, first, to have an executive type budget presented to us from the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. That will take care of the fiduciary responsibilities that the Office of Hawaiian Affairs has to present to the Legislature and to the state.

"The other aspect of this bill, which I think is as meaningful, is from now on the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, before they finalize their budget, they must take the budget to their constituents just as we in this Legislature present our budget to our constituents, and the different councils throughout the state have to present their budgets to their constituents, so too must the Office of Hawaiian Affairs do the same.

"Up until now, it's been often that the Office of Hawaiian Affairs has been often accused of acting as a state agency, and in some respects that's quite accurate because as they presented their budget for the Legislature, there's minimum contact with their constituents. With this bill passing, they now have to go back and act not as an agency, but as a policy-making body. I think the democracy that we have in our state government will also transcend into the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.

"You know, the trustees of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs like the legislators, like council people, have often been accused of shortcomings. We get it all the time. Most of our constituents like individual legislators but they cannot stand the rest of us guys. And the council is the same way. The people from the district will like their councilperson, but they don't like the council in general. And that's the same with the Office of Hawaiian Affairs. They have the same problem. The people that voted for individual members of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs like those individuals but they resent the whole body. I think that's reflective on politics in general, not directed only to the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, but it seems like because the Office of Hawaiian Affairs represents a smaller group of people, the pressure is more intense and sometimes more critical. Hopefully, with this bill passing, with their having more dialogue with the community, some of that can be alleviated.

I also want to thank Senators Blair, Tungpalan and Ikeda, for two years ago going with me to Maui to go out on the water with the whales. Senator Ikeda did it even with the forewarning that she gets seasick even in the bathtub and, sure enough, the ladies and I fed the fish our breakfast. Senator Blair survived and made it through the day. They joined with me in seeing from the whales' perspective what the parasails and jet skis do, and that personal first-hand knowledge stayed with them and they also have been helpful in the passage of this legislation.

"And, probably most importantly, I'd like to thank the Senator of your Tourism Committee who took into account the special nature of the waters and the whale/calf habitat off the south and west shores of Maui and endured the intense lobbying of the parasailors and the jet skiers, to persevere and come through with a bill that is very definitely a positive step. Thank you."

Senator McCartney also supported the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I would like to thank the chairman of the Tourism Committee for taking a tough stand on protecting Hawaii's waters for Hawaii's people. I think this bill is very good public policy. It's a step in the right direction. It says that operating a commercial vehicle, recreational vehicle on public property, I think is a privilege rather than a right, and I think we took some steps to make sure that Hawaii's waters are treated as natural resources and protected and preserved for future generations to enjoy. This bill will ban all commercial activities on Sundays, starting January 1, 1991, and ban all commercial thrillcraft activities on weekends and holidays effective upon the approval of the bill.

"Again, I thank the chairman of the Tourism Committee for taking a tough stand and for helping to protect Hawaii's waters. Thank you."

Senator Ikeda also spoke in support of the bill as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this measure and in doing so echo the comments of the previous speaker. I am pleased, on behalf of the people who live around Maunaloa Bay, who swim in Maunaloa Bay and who use the bay on weekends and enjoy it as a natural resource, pleased to thank the chairman of the Tourism Committee for his very tough stand on this. It's a long time in coming and I welcome it with a sigh of relief."

And at that time, if you took a look at the education budget request from the Governor's Office, that request for general education was missing \$17 million -- money which would have gone to fund A+. What I am wondering now, through the course of the conference committee negotiations, etc., whether our general education program is going to suffer as a result of A+?"

Senator B. Kobayashi responded:

"Mr. President, I think not. The record should be very clear that it was the House proposal that in effect substituted the A+ money for the general education monies. It was never the Senate proposal. That House proposal has been substantially changed in the budget conference.

"As I recall, the House originally came over with an overall add-on to the education budget in the range of \$9 million. That \$9 million has been increased to approximately \$21 million. And so the compromise, if you will, as agreed to in the budget conference has substantially eliminated the deficit that the House originally used to fund A+. Thank you."

"Mr. President, I rise to speak against this bill. It was a difficult decision. What convinces me that it ought not to pass is the language on page 9 of the bill which allows affordable housing units to be built outside of Kakaako.

"If we recall when the Hawaii Community Development Authority for Kakaako was first established, we will recall that what we had was a vision of a community much like Makiki, perhaps better planned, which would provide housing for our residents who were working in downtown and in Waikiki. They could easily commute to their jobs and home again. What we have accomplished after many years and tens of millions of dollars is the opposite.

"I recognize that this is not entirely the state's fault. Market forces have, to some extent, overwhelmed us when you have \$400 a square foot values, it's very difficult to build any but the most expensive housing.

"I also recognize that the proponents of this measure are attempting to accomplish a good objective. That is, by going outside of this high priced district they will build more units with the dollars available. Certainly more units is desirable.

"However, there is also an undercurrent here. The units are being moved out in order to protect property values for the land owners so that they can continue to build expensive condos for that is a very lucrative and attractive market. I'm not willing to give up the dream that Kakaako can, to some extent, fulfill the needs of our citizens for reasonably priced housing. I don't mind that building affordable housing units in Kakaako may impair the property values. I think that might be very desirable from the community's sense.

"Therefore, while I can understand the motivation of the proponents in trying to build the greatest number of units with the funds available, I can't give up on the dream of Kakaako. I can't bring myself to say that all we worked for over these years is being buried as this bill would. Perhaps it's not realistic, but I'm not able to give up the dream that started us on this road. I say we should go ahead and build the affordable housing units,

though they be fewer in number, in Kakaako. If we are so fortunate as to impair property values and make other units in Kakaako more affordable to our citizens, that would be wonderful. But I don't want to see Kakaako turn into what it's becoming, which is a community for the rich to the exclusion of our own citizens.

"Although I do not condemn those who support this bill, I can't go along with it and I have to vote 'no.' Thank you."

"Mr. President, I had prepared some remarks in anticipation that someone might be speaking against the bill and inasmuch as those remarks are already prepared, I may as well go ahead.

"Mr. President, I'd just like to point out that this is one of several bills before the Senate that has to do with what we call 'the maturing global economy.' As one report, 'Hawaii Is an East-West Bridge and the East-West Center' states:

'In the Asia-Pacific region, economic relations can no longer be characterized in traditional north/south terms. The dynamic partnership in trade and investment is clearly emerging. By any measure, the explosion of intra-regional trade and investment in the 1980s is exceptional and the trend of interdependence promises to continue into the 1990s and beyond. The need for greater economic cooperation at the multi-lateral regional and bilateral efforts in the Pacific is clear and crucial to the future of Asia-Pacific economic relations. In addition to the traditional multi-national forum of the general agreement on trade and tariff, the countries in the region have been examining other possible bilateral agreements to increase economic consultation and cooperation. Recent examples include the U.S./Canada Free Trade Agreement, the closer economic relations agreement between Australia and New Zealand, and advancement in economic cooperation between the ASEAN nations.'

"In short, Mr. President, the increase in economic interdependence and structural change in the region has necessitated improved economic cooperation. Pacific economic cooperation is becoming an important and integral component in regional trade and investment relations.

"One of our corporate heads, Mr. David Heenan, has written an article in the 'Journal of Business Strategy' where he points out that for years other countries' political heavyweights have lobbied effectively with their own organizations. Putting in a good word for their major industries is simply good global politics. However, in the United States and in Hawaii, there has been some distance between the public and private sectors. One reason for the distance between business and government is that collective neglect of the importance of world

markets. Historically, leaders in both sectors have been preoccupied with the domestic economy to the exclusion of foreign opportunities.

"What this bill does, Mr. President, is to recognize what we have already acknowledged in another bill. Five minutes ago we approved House Bill No. 1144, relating to small business incubators. In the committee report we found that a global economy has matured, wherein goods, products and services from all over the world are gathered, assembled, processed and distributed throughout a competitive trans-national network. We found that Hawaii is the forefront of several leading high technology and innovative research areas and provided for a series of small business incubators to service development centers to move basic research to the stages of applied research technology transfer, commercial utilization and market development.

"What this bill would do is to provide partnership between government and business in Hawaii in striving to expand the knowledge intensive and the technology intensive industries that would drive our economic future in the future. The problem, Mr. President, is that Hawaii in not being taken seriously as a place to do business. Hawaii does have the resources to be the world's leading Pacific information center, but in order to increase Hawaii's role we need to make available Pacific area news and financial information, and we need to transmit an image of a place where serious business, study, training and research takes place. Both of these goals can be accomplished through the creation of Hawaii based world class news show focusing on the Pacific region and distributed to mainland public broadcasting stations. This show will promote international literacy among Hawaii's people, highlight the international expertise available in Hawaii, provide valuable experience to the communications industry in Hawaii, and broaden Hawaii's image in the world.

"Mr. President, I would like to compliment the chairman of the Culture and Arts Committee for managing such a leading edge measure and I trust that she will continue her efforts in the future. Thank you."

Senator Blair spoke against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I'd planned merely to vote 'no.' I do not like to disagree with my esteemed colleague from Nuuanu. But, as he's spoken on the matter, I should clarify why I will be voting 'no.'

"For the record, I'm not sure what the previous remarks had to do with this bill. Rather than engaging in international trade, what the bill does is create a half-hour, weekly, news program. Although now it's been described as transmitting an image. I'm not clear whether it's going to be to transmit an image or whether it will, in fact, be a news program. It may be that the two are not mutually exclusive. But in any event, it proposes to spend a million dollars and go above our general fund expenditure ceiling in order to accomplish this objective.

"My problem, Mr. President, is that it's not clear to me that the State of Hawaii should get into the news business. It is not appropriate for a government to be in charge of creating news programs. If we have image problems, I'm sure there are other ways to go about correcting them. My concept of the news media is that it is independent of government. To me, this is an undue co-mingling of government and the news media. I find it objectionable and, I will be voting 'no.'"

Senator Tungpalan spoke in support of the bill as follows:

"Mr. President, Hawaii has a potential to become a leader in the Pacific in international information: a center to which East and West might come for information, training, study and research. An increase in the availability of news and financial information relating to the Pacific region would promote Hawaii's image as a vital center.

"Toward this end, this bill proposes the creation of a weekly half-hour news show to be based in Hawaii and to focus on Pacific region issues. This show would highlight Hawaii's availability of international expertise and expand Hawaii's image in the world, while increasing knowledge of international issues among Hawaii's community and providing valuable working experience for the local communications industry.

"H.B. 2273 in its current form appropriates a quarter of a million, not a million, a quarter of a million in general funds, but mind you, each dollar must be matched by the private sector.

"Hawaii has long talked of being a leader in the Pacific and this bill will be a strong, positive step in working toward this goal and projecting a positive image of Hawaii.

"I urge all of my colleagues to support this bill. Thank you."

Senator Fernandes Salling spoke in support of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of S.B. 1148, C.D. 1.

"Mr. President, the bill that is before us will provide for administrative revocation of a driver's license for those who are determined to have been driving under the influence of alcohol.

"In speaking on behalf of the bill, I would like to express my appreciation to my Senate colleagues who have shown me their understanding and trust on this matter. While there may have been considerable pressure on all of you on this bill, many of you came to me to offer your support and suggestions for the continuance of the Senate position. It is clear that this bill is a product of the Senate point of view on this very important issue and reflects its tradition and values. In part, my involvement in this bill has again reminded me of the role the Senate plays in our legislative process and the responsibility we have in formulating legislation.

"For the past two years, DUI administrative revocation has been discussed in these halls and has been a point of contention between the House and Senate, as well as a variety of special interest groups. It has come to the forefront of our priorities because of the increasing problems we have faced with those who would senselessly drive while under the influence of alcohol. But in my eight years in the Legislature, I cannot remember any legislation which has been driven to the forefront by an outpouring of emotional outrage and by those who seek to play on it.

"Perhaps, Mr. President, that is why so many DUI license revocation bills that have come up for consideration in the past two years have been one-dimensional. They have only had the single-minded purpose of taking away the license of those who are suspected of DUI offenses. And these bills have all weighed heavily toward a presumption of guilt. These bills often included only an abbreviated legal process where the citizen has the right to challenge the findings of a policeman or hearing officer.

"In reviewing these bills, Mr. President, the Senate adopted a different approach. By its history and nature, the Senate is, and always will be, a more deliberative body. Our responsibility is not merely to respond to this crisis, but to balance our interest in law enforcement and our desire to protect the rights of individuals.

"In this bill, there were more than enough advocates for the interest of law enforcement. And if we were merely to go by those who speak the loudest, then of course, the bill before us would be one-dimensional. But as interested as the Senate was in providing an expeditious process for DUI license revocation, we also felt it was vital to include strong provisions that would offer an individual the right to challenge findings which may result in the loss of his driver's license. The desire for 'due process' procedures to dispute findings is not an unreasonable burden. As you know, Mr. President, in our nation's and state's history, we have been proud of legal principals such as the opportunity to be heard before a determination of guilt and the presumption of innocence.

"In the Hawaii State Constitution, statutes and common law, we have gone farther in offering protections and rights to individuals. And yet, when it came to DUI license revocation, we seemed to have let the emotional outrage of this issue turn our heads away from offering

the kind of maximum due process protection that is part of our legal tradition. For example, the House position on this matter would have only provided a driver suspected of DUI with a 15-day temporary permit that would expire even if the hearing on his culpability had not been held within that time.

"Is it fair that a person would lose his driver's license without having the right to present his case refuting the evidence against him? For any other legal issue that would result in such a sentencing and loss, we would have been asking about how the individual is protected, but on this issue, there seemed to be an emotional clamor to have a license revocation process that was a rush to judgment with a presumption of guilt rather than innocence.

"And yet, it is not difficult to imagine that if we did adopt the House bill with its minimal due process procedures, there will be a case in the future in which the loss of a driver's license will seem so unfair, that the very newspapers who have editorially supported such a bill, would be asking how the Legislature could have allowed this to happen.

"It was the Senate's position to be more deliberate in its contemplation of this matter; to make certain that a bill come out that was multi-dimensional and balanced all the various interests and objectives we had. To this end, we resisted the suggestions of those, such as the attorney general, who urged the Senate to adopt any statute of 33 other states who have license revocation. That is too cavalier an approach for such a serious matter. Instead, in conference committee, the Senate offered the compromise measure to the House that is before us which attempted to offer the best possible features of the various bills introduced on this.

"As a result, the bill before us accomplishes three major objectives of the Senate. No. 1, it provides an administrative review and hearing to be completed within 30 days so that the process is expeditious. This 30-day limit is followed in most states. No. 2, it requires that a person may have a temporary permit until a hearing has determined his guilt or innocence. If the state requires more time and asks for a continuance, the temporary permit will also continue. We believe that this will be the exception and most cases will be decided within the 30 days. And No. 3, should the state lose on the merits of the case, it will be prevented from bringing the driver to criminal proceedings. Fairness dictates that the state should be prevented from getting two bites of an apple. Besides, if the state cannot prove its case at an administrative proceeding with a lower burden of proof of a 'preponderance of the evidence,' it is unlikely that it will prevail in a criminal court where the standard is 'beyond a reasonable doubt.'

"Mr. President, let me also say that for persons found guilty of drunk driving, the bill deals very harshly with them. The penalties range from a 3-month revocation for a first timer to a lifetime ban for a multiple offender. It is a bill that will be an effective deterrent against DUI violations.

"In closing, let me at least mention one concern that I have about the bill which allows the state to have a continuance if they are not able to go forward with their case in 30 days. The Senate's position was to complete the hearing process in 30 days so that the revocation process was 'expeditious.' The law enforcement community wanted to be able to have the continuance to make certain that they could adequately prosecute anyone. And to balance this, we have allowed for the temporary permit to run until the hearing is finally held.

"What concerns me is that the continuance will be used to let cases drag on. Two Sundays ago, the Sunday paper included a front page story about a criminal DUI case that had gone on for years. I found it disturbing that for all the talk about being tough on DUI cases there was no urgency in this matter.

"Mr. President, once this bill is law nothing would fuel the emotional outrage of this community more than the failure to administer this law properly and quickly. As I said before, the use of a continuance beyond 30 days is the unique exception, and let the law enforcement community know that we will be watching this.

"We have provided in this bill an appropriation for a study that will monitor various aspects of the administration of this law, including the use of the continuance. And this study is our way of signaling our prosecutors that we will not tolerate any lengthy delays in the hearing process.

"Once again, I would like to thank all of my fellow colleagues for their trust and understanding, and urge them to vote in favor of this bill."

Senator Cobb also spoke in support of the bill and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the bill and in so doing commend the chairman of the Senate Transportation Committee for her good work on it and willingness to accept ideas, suggestions and compromises, and yet to maintain not only the principle and integrity of the Senate position but to even expand upon it and prove it in a conference committee environment.

"There is one note of concern that I shared with the chairman but I think should be shared with all members of the Senate, and, that is, information that came from the Police Department that when a blood test is to be administered there's only one site on this island where that can presently be done, at Pawaa. So if an individual is detained and then arrested in a remote site, that individual needs to be as quickly as possible transported to Pawaa for a blood test before the 3-hour minimum under the health regulations expires. And I think it would be incumbent upon the law enforcement community, not only of this island but of each of the neighbor islands, to establish blood testing sites in remote areas so that an individual can be determined by the ultimate test, which is a blood test, whether or not that person is sober and should be discharged, or is legally intoxicated and should be held over. And to not have a blood testing site in Waianae or in Laie or in Kona or in some other remote location would be a disservice both to the law enforcement community as well as to the individual driver who is detained. Thank you."

"I won't go into any more details, but it's an over \$2 million expenditure and I want to thank the chair of the Ways and Means and the staff of Ways and Means for working out a way that we could have this bill passed today."

It's my hope that this bill would be a template, an example for other impacted areas and impacted communities around the state where they can develop their own master plans, and I'd just like to urge my colleagues to support the bill. Thank you."

"It appears then, sometimes, I am the bearer of bad tidings trying to provide warnings to my colleagues about the cost of things, whether it's a train or voting system or something else. In this case, I think we should all bear in mind that in the 1988 election there were at least three precincts in East Honolulu where the electricity went out completely from about 3:00 to 3:30 in the afternoon. People were voting by flashlight and by candlelight.

"When I went up to the Lieutenant Governor's Office and then to the Judiciary conference room to look at the demonstration of these voting machines, not all of the models had backup battery power. In fact, the easier to use model based on an IBM screen did not have such power. When I inquired about the cost of battery backup, I was informed, it would be at least \$2,000 per unit. But I think it is absolutely essential that any unit selected for use in Hawaii have a backup battery power system because if it doesn't and what happened in East Honolulu in 1988 as well as in other years and there is a loss of

electrical power, our voters will be disenfranchised and the election results could be askewed or invalidated.

"So while it's a little more expensive to have battery backup in each case, I think it is essential that every system that is looked at and reviewed for contract by the state have that kind of battery backup power as an absolute minimum requirement. Otherwise, we would be doing our people a tremendous disservice by incorporating the convenience of electronic voting only to have the power go out because of the unreliability of either the electric company or an accident on the road which would knock out a telephone line and a power line at the same time.

"With that caveat, Mr. President, I would support this measure but ask us to be mindful of the importance of backup capabilities for such a system. Thank you."

Senator Reed rose to speak against the bill as follows:

"Mr. President, this year's supplemental budget exceeds the constitutional expenditure ceiling by \$382 million for fiscal year '90 and a \$157 million for fiscal year '91; add to that approximately another \$100 million for all these other money bills that also exceed the expenditure ceiling.

"The ceiling mechanism was enacted in 1978 to place a check on state spending. It's a reasonable formula, one that allows for expenditures to rise in relation to the growth in state personal income. Yet, year after year we continue to ignore it. We follow the requisite language of the Constitution and tell the taxpayers we're doing it. We're also supposed to tell them why. But all we say is that the money is deemed necessary for a public purpose.

"Taxpayers are getting \$1 back. One dollar from the surplus the administration pegged at about \$250 million at the start of this session. Why? Because the Legislature hurried up and found ways to spend it, leaving \$1 for the taxpayer.

"This continual crash into the expenditure ceiling represents the failure of this Legislature to set priorities. We are the beneficiaries of the money making machine -- our present tax system. And we've done little to stem the flow of that machine. Our income tax relief package this year falls far short of what was recommended by our own Tax Review Commission.

"Few taxpayers in the state, each of us included, have the luxury of behaving as the Legislature does. As individuals, if we run out of money, we have to tighten our belts. So should government. It's time legislators started mentally connecting all this money to the workers of Hawaii who are over-taxed to the hilt to provide it for us.

"Something must be done to make legislators realize that this is real money we are spending. I have a hunch that if each of us had to consider spending our own money, many of the projects in this budget would not be funded. The expenditure ceiling is intended to force legislators to prioritize. This \$1 tax credit is an admission of this Legislature's failure to do so.

"I also think that the taxpayers of the state should consider it actionable, and respond at the polls.

"You read about the folks who found a quarter of a million dollars in their checking account by mistake and allegedly went out and spent it? This behavior of the Legislature, the policy making body of the state, is no less irresponsible.

"I'm voting 'no.'"

Senator Blair also rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I'm not happy to have to agree with my colleague from across the aisle but I unfortunately do. We're being far too generous with General Motors and the tobacco industry, time share owners who don't pay their taxes and I think we should be less generous with them and more generous with our own citizens. Therefore, I will be voting 'no.'"

"Mr. President, I kind of lost track here, but the speaker who preceded me in talking about this particular bill announced the intention of voting against this, as I remember, but for a very different reason than one I advocate. I'm going to vote against this bill because the original intention was to restore the mauka portion of the Kakaako project to the city, which is where I think it belongs. I voted fairly consistently against anything to do with the Kakaako district since it first arose as a dream as the earlier speaker said in this body, and I will continue to vote against it. I vote against the current issue."

Senator Chang rose to speak in support of the bill as follows:

"Mr. President, in brief response to one of the earlier speakers, when the speaker talked about how this legislation deviates from the so-called plan.

"As most of us know, in planning, these plans are constantly shifting in response to changing needs in the community. When the legislation was first enacted almost a decade ago, circumstances were very much different. While this legislation does not take us in a contrary direction, I'm sure that it has and does alter some of the original thoughts inasmuch as circumstances have changed.

"In response to another point about the Hawaiian dream not being achieved, I'd like to just note that all of the people who have purchased housing units in the area that I know are local people who are buying into what they consider it to be their last home investment. And for them, including people who have come out of Hawaii's public housing projects, they are achieving very much what they consider to be their Hawaiian dream. Thank you."

Senator Crozier also rose to speak in support of the bill and remarked:

"Mr. President, allowing the monies to be used outside the district for affordable homes will not only help in a one-to-one trade but, at the hearing, some people said it may be as much as four-to-one. So we would be helping four families to find homes elsewhere on Oahu instead of

just in the Kakaako area, and some even alluded to the fact that it may go up to eight homes outside the area.

"I think housing is a major crisis in Hawaii. I think we need to wrestle with the problem and if this can contribute to the solution, I'm all for it. Thank you very much."

Senator Cobb rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I've been convinced by the arguments I've heard on the floor. I will be voting 'no.'"

"In addition, I would point out in response, perhaps elaboration of the remarks of the Majority Floor Leader of the Senate speaking as an individual Senator, that the whole premise of Kakaako was largely founded on affordable housing.

"As I recall the discussions in this Legislature when the idea was first sold to us, he and I were both members of the House. It was to provide an affordable and convenient and mixed use criteria of housing near the downtown area. With this bill, that concept is going completely out the window. If anything, if we were to be serious about housing, we should be requiring that at least 50% of all units built in this state, both public and private, should be affordable, and affordable should be defined as under \$100,000 or where at least 25% of our residents can qualify for such housing.

"What I see happening in Kakaako is what's happening in Kaimuki and Kahala and in too many areas of this state where projects are being built and the minimum cost is half a million dollars and up, and housing is no longer for homes. It's being used as a commodity for speculation. The fact that it's happening in Kakaako is an indictment on our entire housing situation and our lack of willingness to act decisively.

"I don't think this kind of legislation has any place at all before us. Thank you."

Senator Holt spoke in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, speaking in support of the bill and understanding the concerns of the previous speakers.

"If you look at page 2 of the Conference Committee report, item 3, we 'Amended section 5 by establishing a prioritization of locations for the development of reserved housing within and outside' (not just outside, within and outside) 'of the Kakaako District. This amendment is intended to promote and encourage the development of reserved housing within Kakaako and in areas immediately surrounding the District and discourage development in outlying areas.' We have not abandoned what people have claimed to be the Hawaiian dream.

"On page 9 of the bill we list the priorities. We compromised with the House on this position. I believe it's a good bill and I urge everyone to support it. Thank you."

"Mr. President, I won't reiterate what I said this morning but I do need to make a correction. I misstated the position of the Department of Taxation. I was confusing their testimony on House Draft 1. I thought it was their testimony on House Draft 2. Notwithstanding the fact that they have reached that agreement, I still think the fundamental policy decision is incorrect and will be voting 'no.'"

Senator B. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the bill and remarked:

"Mr. President, this bill is definitely a half a loaf bill, but it does allow the state to collect future obligations from time share units. It does, indeed, forgive past obligations but we presently have litigation that would suggest that without this bill the state will be unable to collect future obligations. So we're at least getting future revenues with this bill. Thank you."

Senator Cobb rose to ask if the previous speaker would yield to a question and the Chair posed the question to Senator B. Kobayashi and Senator B. Kobayashi responded:

"Mr. President, I will, but this is not my bill."

Senator Cobb interjected:

"No, but since you spoke in favor of it, I'd just would like to rise on a point of parliamentary inquiry, and ask whether or not under the existing law time share operators pay the transient accommodations tax?"

The Chair responded:

"If you need an answer, the answer is 'no.'"

Senator Cobb then rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Thank you, Mr. President. Then I rise to speak against the bill.

"When the Senator from the 16th District was in the House, we spent long hours negotiating the subject of whether or not time sharing should be classified as a resort use or non-resort use, and the decision arrived at over a very difficult conference committee extending for a period of two years was that time sharing is definitely a resort use, that it has no place in residential neighborhoods and that its allowance in the county was strictly resort.

"I find it, therefore, incongruous that time sharing owners do not pay the transient accommodations tax since it is used virtually exclusively for tourists' transient accommodations. And I think if you reflect in the Archives and the deliberations that took place in 1979, 1980, 1981 and 1982, that element of legislative intent would be crystal clear.

"So the bill, in effect, falls short in two areas. One that it fails to clarify that time sharing is a transient use, subject to the transient accommodations tax; and two, the forgiveness of tax for those involved in time sharing -- neither of which I think is right or should be supported. And I will join the Majority Floor Leader in opposing this legislation."

Senator Blair, speaking against the measure, said:

"Mr. President, the suggestion was made that there is some sort of a case before the courts which has suggested that there would be a problem with the prospect of application of the statute. I'm not aware that any court has ruled on this issue, or whether there is anything in the record that indicates how the court would rule on the issue. But in any event, there's no difficulty with passing a law that would clarify matters prospectively and that's a separate and independent question on whether or not we forgive anything in the past."

The reason I'm aggrieved is that we have only provided a \$1 rebate to the taxpayers of Hawaii, at the same time that we now have on track and moving a massive tax increase in order to finance a fixed guideway system. And this bill, which would have provided \$40 million in tax relief, in tax reform has in effect been killed for this session. I don't think that's the right way to approach it.

"And the reason that I say that is that I think our taxpayers have suffered more than enough, not only in past years but certainly during the course of the legislation that we passed this session. And I'm hopeful that we can either redress this now or in the session to come because, otherwise, the taxpayer will have ended up forfeiting what little tax reform was offered, only to pay for a train, and the first down payment is going to be made this year but the real payment will begin in approximately two years when the excise tax kicks in. Thank you."

At 12:26 o'clock a.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 12:35 o'clock a.m.

The Chair then made the following observation:

"Members of the Senate, the Chair would like to take this opportunity to thank the workers in the Senate for putting on the dinner this evening and I think we ought to give them a round of applause.

"Secondly, as I usually do every year, I want to apologize for the extension and also to express appreciation for the patience of the Senators who have been sitting around here since 9:00 o'clock while things were being hammered out."

Senator George rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, in our earlier observations on this particular measure which has to do with the TAT, I made some remarks about the discrepancies in the per capita benefits rained on the recipients. I was about to start my remarks on this by saying when I make a mistake I make a beaut, but then I decided that perhaps that this good Adlai Stevenson quote ought to be reserved for greater goofs.

"I would, however, like to say that while the TAT distributions to the counties are full of inequities and there are considerable discrepancies among the various counties, the figures that I gave on the floor were not accurate. I do have the accurate figures. I'll be happy to share the numbers with anyone who wants to see them. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Blair rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, until Oahu is treated fairly, which I define as receiving the money raised on this island, I cannot support the measure. Thank you."

Senator Holt spoke in support of the measure and remarked:

"Mr. President, I listened with great interest to the previous speakers, not only today but previously, as they discussed the distribution of the transient accommodations tax (TAT) to the counties. As chairman of the subject matter committee to which TAT legislation is normally referred, I would like to say a few words to place this matter in proper perspective.

"Since the 1987 legislative session when I became chairman of the Tourism, Recreation and Planning Committee, I have introduced legislation to distribute revenues from the transient accommodations tax to the counties. During this time, I've also held hearings on a number of other bills with the same or similar purpose. As a result, I have learned that the greatest area of

disagreement has always been the formula for the distribution of revenues.

"More specifically, Mr. President, the administration, the industry, and the counties have never arrived at a consensus regarding the distribution of the TAT revenues. Their positions on this issue, however, have been amazingly consistent over the years. The administration, for example, has always been opposed to earmarking, while the industry, on the other hand, was supportive provided the funds are earmarked for the convention center and tourism marketing and promotion. The counties, on the other hand, have never agreed on an acceptable formula. They have, instead, always shifted the focus of attention to individual county needs, rather than a fair and equitable distribution.

"The main reason for this, Mr. President, is the fact that total county needs and the demands of the tourism industry for dedicated funding have always exceeded the sum of TAT revenues. It is, therefore, fairly evident that a distribution of the TAT is also in essence a distribution of the shortfall between total projected revenues and needs. Faced with this situation, it is fairly obvious that some or all of the counties may not be completely satisfied with their formula share of revenues.

"At the present time, however, I am convinced that there is no alternative formula that is more fair, more equitable or more reasonable than that which was agreed to by the House and Senate conferees. I would like to point out, Mr. President, that the conference committee was aware of this fact and reflected their concern in Conference Committee Report No. 207. At this time I would like to read a portion of that report for the record:

'Since your Committee intends this measure to be an equitable plan to distribute funds, your Committee notes that the Legislature may re-examine this TAT sharing mechanism if the county uses its present real property taxing powers to selectively impose a heavier burden on one industry over other industries who are currently paying the nonresidential real property tax rate.'

I would also like to point out that Conference Committee report also reaffirms the Legislature's commitment for the funding of the convention center authority and for tourism marketing and promotion.

"It is clear to me, Mr. President, that the Conference Committee has more than adequately addressed the concerns of those who disagree with the formula for the distribution of the TAT revenues as reflected in this bill. I'm therefore voting in favor of this measure and urge all my colleagues to do so. Thank you."

Senator Yamasaki also rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I would like to point out that back in 1978 the State Plan was passed and made into law. In the State Plan provisions, the emphasis of the state was to redirect the growth of the state to the neighbor islands, rather than to concentrate entirely on this City and County of Honolulu. As a result, over the years, the state has supported the growth and economic activity of the neighbor islands. And for these reasons we have seen a tremendous growth in the neighbor islands, in all of the counties of Hawaii, Maui and Kauai, and including Molokai. Therefore, the allocation of transient accommodations tax revenues has been based on this criteria.

"In the 1989 session, we did make some changes to the allocation which we thought was a fair one. The Hawaii

State Association of Counties brought some recommendations before us and to other committees. After reviewing the recommendations of the Hawaii State Association of Counties, we added to the County of Hawaii and also to the County of Kauai additional revenues so that it would be equitable to support the needs of these two counties. Therefore, we have continued to support the neighbor island counties by continuing with the same formula that we established in 1989.

"I would like to ask all of you to continue to support the economic growth of this State of Hawaii, to the neighbor islands, as reflected by the allocation of TAT revenues in this bill. Thank you."

Senator Blair spoke against the measure and remarked:

"Mr. President, I appreciate the remarks of the previous speakers and there is some logic to what they said. However, the difference between this measure and previous decisions made on an annual basis to give additional support to the neighbor islands is that this bill carves these allocations in stone. Once these percentages are enacted it will be very difficult to change them. It's not ad hoc decision making with respect to the special needs of the neighbor islands. Therefore, if we're going to make a permanent allocation amongst the counties, we have to have a reasonable basis. I don't think a reasonable basis has been stated which justifies the permanency of this allocation. Thank you."

Senator McCartney rose to speak in support of the bill and stated:

"Mr. President, I would like to echo the 'positive' about this bill. I think it's a very positive measure that we are sharing revenue with the counties and that we are sharing the hotel room tax with the counties. I believe that it is a positive position and we need to focus in on that.

"It's healthy that we are looking at the 90s as the years of decentralization or the years of home rule. This is the first step in the right direction and I think that the 90s are going to be years and the decade of decentralization.

"There are other measures in the future that we can look at, like transferring the public service tax, by giving general excise tax credits to the counties, which will balance these formulas out. When we add those things on, people are going to start complaining about all these formulas again and say that other counties aren't getting money. Rather than complain about the formula, we should be proud and happy that we are giving the counties a source of revenue. Then, come back next year and look at some measures that can provide resources to the counties.

"In that light, Mr. President, I ask my colleagues to support the measure."

Senator George rose on a point of inquiry as follows:

"Mr. President, I have some curiosity and I suppose I rise to ask you a question about it.

"On Monday, we passed H.B. 1576, providing for a \$1 tax credit, the last bill on our agenda. Tonight, we have before us and clocking Conference Committee Report 167 for Senate Bill 2376, with a \$60 credit. How are we going to handle two bills with the same title and the same subject matter, Mr. President?"

The Chair responded:

"I would hope that when the bill reaches the governor's desk that he will make an intelligent choice. (Laughter.)

"Senator George, thank you for your inquiry. I don't mean to belabor the point. I think it was a serious inquiry but I'm at a quandary as to whether to recall the bill. Rather than do that I'd just as soon ask the governor to veto one of the measures."

Senator George interjected:

"Mr. President, couldn't we have \$61?" (Laughter.)

The Chair answered:

"We might. The governor might change his mind."

Senator Cobb then rose on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, on Friday, we're going to be voting on the train and the tax.

"Earlier this year, several of us wanted to put a stop to the move out of the State Capitol for the reason of asbestos. And since I just received this communication from DAGS, I'd like to share with you and members of

the Senate just how the best laid plans of mice and men can go astray.

"When the asbestos removal was touted before this Legislature last year, we were told that it would be a two-year move; we'd be out and back by 1992. Prediction: that would not come true. Now comes the reality. We will be moving out of the State Capitol in May of 1991, after the 1991 session, and will not return until the beginning of May 1994. And the move back will not be completed until November 1994. So what was two years has now become three; what was 1990 to 1992 has now become 1991 to 1994, and the only other question I have is what is going to be the cost overrun of this project from what it was initially budgeted.

"We'll have further discussion on this Friday evening, Mr. President, but I wanted to share with you and all of the members just the reality of what was planned on, what was voted on is not even going to happen; it's going to be worse. Thank you."

At this time, Senator Blair recognized Governor Waihee, seated in the gallery, as follows:

"Mr. President, I thought that the administration had run for cover, but I note that we have in the gallery our foremost citizen, Governor John David Waihee III. If he will please stand to be recognized."

FINAL READING

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 164 (S.B. No. 1719, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator Yamasaki moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 164 be adopted and S.B. No. 1719, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Fernandes Salling.

Senator McMurdo rose to speak in support of the bill as follows:

"Mr. President, at crossover time when the mass transit funding issue was raised, I admitted to a real dichotomy. I wanted mass transit for our state but I am extremely opposed to even the possibility of a raise in the general excise tax, even a half percent, as I feel that this type of tax is grossly unfair to the middle and lower income people and could impose a tremendous burden on them. However, tonight, I no longer face the dichotomy because there are two bills and now I am voting for this bill, Mr. President, because it authorizes the mass transit. But I still oppose S.B. 3128 because of the half percent rise possibility. Thank you."

Senator Cobb rose to speak against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I'll yield to any other Senator that wants to discuss this before addressing my remarks."

Chair responded: "No, proceed."

Senator Cobb continued:

"In addressing the remarks, Mr. President, since I'm going to be voting 'no' on this as well as the tax, rather than separate the debate since the two bills are linked, I will address both simultaneously. I'll also try to confine my remarks to be as brief as possible despite the numerous reasons and objections. I want to make it very clear that there will be no filibuster. I intend to conclude my remarks, hopefully, within 20 minutes to half an hour at the longest. If there are other points that are raised I will reserve the right to address them. But I'm going to be voting 'no' on the bill for transportation involving the train simply because it is so inextricably linked to a tax increase.

"The previous speaker spoke in favor of mass transit. Mr. President, the city is presently conducting hearings on the subject of mass transit and there is a great deal of confusion within our own community as to what is meant by mass transit. The federal government defines mass transit as any form of transportation that moves more than one person in a vehicle from point A to point B.

"Last night, Neighborhood Board No. 2 which stretches from Kuliouou to Kalaniki voted 8 to 3 in favor of mass transit and against -- I repeat, against -- a fixed guideway system. They very clearly recognize there is a difference between mass transit or rapid transit on one hand and the train on the other. And they recognize that mass transit can include such things as jitneys, alternative buses, shuttle services, 15- and 25-passenger taxicabs, and a variety of other alternatives that are not being presented

by the city planners. In addition, on Monday night Hawaii Kai Neighborhood Board No. 1, according to a spokesman of that board, unanimously rejected the fixed guideway system and voted instead in favor of mass transit as I've just outlined.

"Mr. President, the first flaw in the premise of a mass transit alternative is found on page 2 of the committee report in the second full paragraph where it says, and I quote:

'Mass transportation or, more specifically, the transportation of individuals by bus or fixed rail rapid transit is a very viable means of reducing the number of motor vehicles on our highways.'

That statement, Mr. President, is patently false because all of the proponents of mass transit admit that if a train is built the number of vehicles will not be reduced. At best, the rate of increase will be lessened and some say lessened very little.

"Recently, Mr. President, not meaning to sound like Henry Block, I circulated a memorandum on 18 reasons to vote 'no' on the rail tax. I trust some people read it. But I'd like to elaborate on just a couple of points within that memorandum, and then quote what is likely to be called the 'doomsday scenario' from the Pacific Business News on the subject of a train.

"Again, addressing both issues, I think everyone acknowledges that an increase in the general excise tax is clearly regressive and it will hurt those who can least afford to pay it. It will reduce the daily disposable income of the poorest of our people and, in fact, all of our people.

"Recently, Ah Quon McElrath was quoted in the April 26, 1990 Honolulu Star-Bulletin where she said and I quote: 'The state tax credits take up 4 pages in the instruction book. For the working poor, just to go through 4 pages of explanation is difficult. It is questionable whether tax credits are a viable tool.' I would think, Mr. President, that Ah Quon McElrath having fought for and represented the poor for many years would know best of all of us the negative impact not only of this tax but the fact that tax credits simply don't wash because people simply don't take advantage of it in sufficient numbers.

"Next, Mr. President, I would like to point out there is utterly no incentive or penalty of any kind for the failure of the city or private sector to come up with private financing. In fact, it's been reported that the city managing director has already attempted to come up with such financing and has not been successful. Given the absence of any incentive or penalty, what makes us think he will be successful in the future. Given the language of this bill, all the big-money people have to do is say no and the little people end up paying the freight.

"I pointed out where this bill is designed to take two bites out of the same apple, namely, us, not only this year but the exquisite timing of the bill provides that the county councils must by October 1, 1992, increase the tax, which is terrific because that's right in the middle of the next election campaign. So for those of us who are not running this year, we get the second end of the double whammy in 1992. I guess they call that equal time.

"This year, Mr. President, the only thing the taxpayers have to look forward to is now an amended \$60 rebate. We have the failure of any kind of tax reform, we have a 12-1/2 percent increase in the excise tax.

"When we get into the funding of this measure, despite all of the rhetoric and all the mechanisms, the certification and the process of delay, this legislation and its accompanying tax bill is still nothing more than a convoluted, camouflaged tax increase two years down the road. There's really no long-term commitment for state financing since the \$53 million a year is designed to terminate when, and I emphasize when and not if, the tax increase goes into effect. And unfortunately, all of the alternatives including bond financing, private sector incentives or requirements, and all of the recommendations of Lowell Kalapa of the Tax Foundation of Hawaii have been ignored.

"Passage of this tax increase will move Hawaii nearer or to the top of the list as the most heavily taxed state in the nation. This will reinforce our image as a tax hell. This tax increase is certainly not pro-business. And I've received literally hundreds of calls, letters and faxed messages from small business men and constituents opposing this increase. No amount of public relations and advertising campaigns by the administration or anyone else can erase the negative reality of the tax increase we're going to pass tonight. In fact, many of our small business people including travel agents, insurance agents, salespersons on commissions and others will not be able to pass on the tax increase. It will come, instead, directly out of their own pockets.

"To date, Mr. President, no one -- I emphasize no one -- has been able to cite an example of where a temporary tax was ever sunsetted on time by government. BART in San Francisco was started with a 'temporary tax' which is now permanent. Even the United States income tax of 1914 was passed originally as a temporary tax and it's never been repealed. In short, government seems to take a very long view of what is a 'temporary tax.' The pressure for this tax increase to be permanent, Mr. President, will continue if and when such areas as Hawaii Kai, Mililani, Ewa Beach, Kapolei, Kailua and Kaneohe demand any extension of the rail system to serve their needs. And that very clearly is a likelihood that we should be able to see down the road. And the tax, I might add, is to cover only the basic portion of the guideway system as presently proposed, which does not serve any of the areas I just mentioned.

"It is highly likely that the fixed guideway will have cost over-runs of about 50 percent, and there is no penalty in this legislation to prevent any such over-run. Almost every major guideway system built in the United States has had a cost over-run with the average being almost 50 percent. If we compute that average to the cost of this system, that will add \$700 million to the Honolulu project for a total initial cost of \$2.1 billion. I was provided a table of ten cities and I would like to list the names of the cities and cite the over-runs. In the last 15 years, according to the United States Department of Transportation, the following cities built a guideway system: Washington, Atlanta, Baltimore, Miami in two increments, Buffalo, Pittsburgh, Portland, Sacramento and Detroit. The average cost over-run of those cities was 43 percent.

"Please note, Mr. President and members of the Senate, operating and maintenance costs are not covered by this proposed tax increase. Yet, the city has not specifically spelled out how such costs of over \$100 million, yearly, will be covered.

"In addition, Mr. President, most ridership projections from the same list of cities have been flawed. In fact, the average ridership of those cities has only been 38 percent of projections, and there have been three independent studies conducted of the projected Honolulu ridership that arrived at exactly the same percentage of 38 percent. The

annual operating costs are usually understated in the initial estimate by guideway proponents. Again, the same cities averaged 83 percent higher costs for operating and maintenance than was forecast at the time of appropriation and UMTA approval.

"Mr. President, what I'm saying is not that we shouldn't build a train, but that we should exhaust every conceivable, practical alternative before doing so. Most of the needed para-transit alternatives have not been implemented or required in this proposed legislation before or during construction of the train system. Examples are the restoration of private jitney service in Honolulu which was abolished over public protest in 1940; an airport shuttle service which should end the present taxi monopoly; shuttle service to and from such areas as downtown, Ala Moana, Waikiki and the University of Hawaii; 15- and 25-passenger taxicabs, plus subscription bus service to provide point-to-point service. At the present time, our commuters have only two real choices -- their cars or a bus. They should be provided mid-cost alternative choices as provided for by the United States Department of Transportation.

"Recently, Mr. President, in the Pacific Business News appeared what we can reasonably call a 'doomsday scenario,' or a commentary on the fixed-rail system that would lead to a 'fiscal black hole.' As a prediction, I would like to quote from this scenario.

"While the Legislature is considering a bill to raise the excise tax and thus fund rail transit, its passage would be the first step on a slippery slope that would lead to the same fiscal black hole created by other new rail systems. First will come the shock of the construction cost over-runs. The U.S. Department of Transportation recently released its own study of the performance of the eight federally aided rail systems built in the last 15 years. The systems projected versus actual capital costs show the average cost over-runs of 43 percent. If our rail system follows suit, and the indications are it will be further than that, it will mean at least an extra \$484 million in capital costs. The federal government does not share in cost over-runs, so this will have to be funded locally.

"With the opening of the rail system will come the shock that riders are not showing up as projected. The other systems that were built only achieved 38 percent of their forecast. There have been three other rail ridership projections made for Honolulu besides the City and County's. There are those made by UCLA's Gordon & Wilson, by Robert Brennecke in his 1987 Hawaii Department of Transportation study, and the Department of Transportation's own internal study made by Flannery & McLoid. These three ridership forecasts average only 38 percent of the city's projections. Our city officials will tell you that the Urban Mass Transit Administration considers the city's ridership figures to be conservative. They do not tell you that UMTA also approved the ridership projections for the eight cities that achieved only 38 percent of their forecasts.

"After the ridership shock, we will be faced with the operating cost shock. The actual operating cost for the other cities was, as stated before, 83 percent higher than projected. And before the dust is settled comes the devastating after-shock. The Honolulu rail system, as elsewhere, will have virtually no effect on traffic congestion. With that will come the dawning realization that some individuals will have had the benefit of a construction project while the rest of us are now stuck with paying the bills.

'In the end as elsewhere will come the scrambling for funds to cover the unexpected transit deficit. Sometimes the scrambling is not fast enough. The fiscal crisis in Buffalo resulted in a complete shutdown of the transit system just last month. The state is not immune because it will be a city and county system. In crises elsewhere, the city involved has called on the county or state for help and because of political necessity that help is given. Buffalo restarted its transit system only because the county imposed a real estate sales tax to cover the deficit.'

"Mr. President, we can continue to ignore the rail critics and refuse to consider the validity of their charges. If we do, it will be the ultimate triumph of hope over experience.

'Painting a picture black is not easy or pleasant, but when we have the experience of virtually all of the systems on the Mainland built within the last 15 years to look at, I am frankly amazed that no safeguard to prevent a cost over-run has been built into this legislation. I'm surprised that there has been no detailed addressing of the para-transit alternatives or of the operating and maintenance costs that we know are going to exceed \$100 million a year. None of that is addressed in this legislation. We're passing this on the slogan, on the faith, on the premise that mass transit will solve the problem.'

"The experience has proven precisely the opposite that unless you implement all of the transit alternatives and control your costs very carefully, you do not solve a problem, Mr. President, you only create another one.

"Mr. President, it is for all of these reasons that I will be voting 'no' and I hope not to come back next year or the year after and say, why didn't we listen in 1990, because the first cost over-run that hits us in the face should cause all of us to stop and think how much more are we going to ask of the taxpayers of Hawaii, how deep are we going to consider their pockets, and how long are we going to continue to tax them for a fiscal black hole.

"Thank you."

Senator Blair also spoke against the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I'll limit my remarks to Senate Bill 1719, C.D. 1, and speak very briefly on only two things about the bill. I am speaking in opposition to it.

"First of all, on page 5, lines 20 and 21, we provide that development agreements will be approved after 60 days, if not disapproved by the Legislature. I believe that this abdicates our proper role as an appropriating body.

"Secondly, at the top of page 6 we provide, or at least we purport to provide, that future legislatures will take certain actions. That is not something which we cannot in fact do. My objection is that where we have a role and responsibility we abdicate it, and where we don't we pretend that we do.

"For those two reasons, I will be voting against S.B. 1719, C.D. 1."

At 7:52 o'clock p.m., the Senate stood in recess subject to the call of the Chair.

The Senate reconvened at 7:57 o'clock p.m.

Senator Matsuura spoke in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I just want to say a few words in favor of mass transit.

"Although I don't live on this island, I think anyone who lives on this island must realize that we do have a problem. I was going to Mililani the other day and I was surprised that even at 6:30 in the morning the cars were all bumper-to-bumper. So you do have a problem on this island and I think that it's time that we took action to resolve this problem.

"Several years ago the federal government would have paid 80 percent of the cost; now it's down to 30 percent. If we wait any longer there will not be any federal subsidy. The reason I say that we gotta take action now is primarily because I think that we have forty years supply of oil. It's not going to take too long before the price of oil is going to start moving up rapidly. It just takes the Arab nations to get together and you are going to see the doubling of the oil price. We have already moved in the direction of making methanol in anticipation of the pending crisis yet to come. We will be putting up a methanol demonstration plant in Maui. But that's only a minor solution to a major problem. I have a computerized rationing program in my file cabinet because I know the shortage is going to hit in the near future.

"I'm not refuting the Senator from Palolo in terms of construction and operational over-runs and extension of the tax period. There is a great possibility that it is going to happen. However, one thing is for sure. If we don't act now, we are going to get bigger problems. We do have a problem now and we have to address the problem now. I'd rather take the chance of cost over-runs and just do it. I am against making more studies and more studies and the problems get bigger and bigger. It's time that we just do it and I think this bill will initiate action. Thank you."

Senator McCartney also rose to speak in support of the bill and remarked:

"Mr. President, I'd like to say that it's easy to continue to throw stones and throw stones and it's hard to build a house, and I choose to build a house, that is, to build the mass transit system.

"I believe we have to paint a positive picture and the bill that we have in front of us does paint a positive picture. It gives us the opportunity and ability to build a mass transit system without any tax. And that's why I'm supporting this bill because it does give us that opportunity. It does commit state funds to pay for the system and it does put together a comprehensive plan. The people of Hawaii deserve that chance and we need to take that risk.

"Mr. President, we need to look at the long-term future. We cannot build more and more roads and put more and more cars on those roads. If we look at our transportation problem statewide, island-wide, for the next 10, 20, 30 years from now we're going to have a problem and we have to have vision, we have to have foresight and make some tough decisions. I'm not happy with the tax, but, Mr. President, our mass transit system is important. It's important for our state and that's why I think this package is a comprehensive package and it doesn't say that we're going to tax the people. It only sets up the possibility for the counties to levy the tax if private funding is not available.

"I feel comfortable with this bill and I think that my colleagues should support it because we need to look at the long-term future to relieve our traffic problems. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator Crozier also supported the bill and stated:

"Mr. President, already we have the Friday afternoon gridlocks right here in the heart of Honolulu. More accidents are being caused because people are frustrated and some of them are already disoriented because they're trapped in traffic for so many hours.

"Mr. President, the 1990s is the decade to build mass transit because if we do not build mass transit, this is also the decade of growth. We need to keep up with the growth that's going to take place. We need to make sure that the Friday afternoon gridlocks do not become work-day or work-afternoon gridlocks, then work-morning gridlocks. We have to do something now, Mr. President.

"We can try and create with smoke and mirrors an image that we can get away from solving the mass transit by not having to pay for it. I'm sorry to inform my colleagues that that is impossible. There is no free lunch. We have to pay for what we want. I support mass transit and I ask my colleagues to do also. Thank you."

Senator George also rose to speak in support of the bill as follows:

"Mr. President, rapid transit has no more ardent supporter in this chamber than I. Since I was first elected to the Honolulu City Council in 1968, I can't tell you how many thousands and thousands and thousands of pages I've read analyzing rapid transit in all the various permutations that it's gone through since it was first proposed, and that predates my service on the council.

"I have some arguments (as I think is well known) with the way in which it is proposed to be funded, but I think I have to keep my eye on the main problem which is the no-build alternative. Everytime I think of the number of lanes of cement, concrete that we're going to have to lay on this little island in order to accommodate the increasing traffic that is bound to come as our numbers increase, I think we're going to ruin where we live.

"I think we have to build rapid transit and the sooner we get with it, the better off we are."

Senator B. Kobayashi also supported the measure and said:

"Mr. President, the previous speaker mentioned the number of lanes of cement. I'm speaking in favor of the bill, because the number of lanes of cement as calculated in the HALI 2,000 Study was approximately six lanes of cement from Pearl Harbor into downtown Honolulu. In addition to those six lanes of cement, that study also calculated that we might have to double-deck four lanes of highway on parts of Nimitz and four more lanes of highway in parts of Kakaako.

"Everyone knows we don't have the land for six lanes of cement between Pearl Harbor and downtown Honolulu, even if we had the money and even if we had the patience to bear the construction burdens and delays that go along with six lanes added to our highway system.

"In addition to all these, the HALI 2,000 Study suggested, among other things, that there might be a tunnel somehow under Pearl Harbor connecting Leeward Oahu, the growth area of Kapolei, with downtown Honolulu. That, of course, is somewhat imaginative but I

would think, logistically, considering the military importance of Pearl Harbor, a fairly far-fetched idea.

"In all, the HALI 2,000 alternative painted a very bleak picture of what might be expected if we went the highway alternative, building the lanes of cement referred by the previous speaker. The no-build alternative is just as bad.

"The situation that we face is one of changing human behavior. If we could change our lifestyles and hence our behavior patterns by carpooling, by giving up our personal automobiles, by somehow rearranging our schedules, many of these highway alternatives may be possible. Changing human behavior, of course, is an arduous and a very, very difficult task. I'm not sure that a legislature is a good place to talk about changing human behavior because we would have to literally coerce individuals by force of law to somehow change their behavior. That, I think, would run anathema to what many of us feel is possible and desirable.

"On another point, a prior speaker mentioned that the rail transit will only lessen the rate of increase of traffic congestion. Mr. President, if rail transit can lessen the rate of increase, it would have done its job. I don't think anyone in this room or in any other body who has studied rail transit and highway transit expect that traffic congestion will be lessened from today's level unless perhaps by some extraordinary means the population of Honolulu is lessened from today's level. So if rail transit does indeed lessen the rate of increase of traffic, it would have done a good job.

"In all, I would say this is a tough bill to vote upon, but we don't have any other real, solid alternatives before us. That no-build option is not an option, I think. It is simply hiding our heads in the sand. The highway option is probably impossible if only for lack of land, cost, the sheer difficulty of building six additional lanes from Pearl Harbor into downtown, and of course, as we know after you get into downtown you have that other problem of getting from the main feeder highways of Pali, H-1, through the side streets into some sort of parking arrangement.

"So, we have an alternative before us which is difficult, which is fraught with a great many uncertainties, but it is at least a hope and an opportunity which I think we should steal ourselves to take, because if we don't take this opportunity, the alternatives are likely to be much, much worse. Thank you."

Senator Ikeda also supported the measure and remarked:

"Mr. President, it was not my intention to do so but having listened to the argument, I feel that I should.

"It appears to me, Mr. President, when the proposal for mass transit first came before us I had some reservations about it. If you will recall, I said that we needed to bite the bullet because it was now or never. My reservations stemmed from the fact that we didn't have, as far as I was concerned, enough information to make an informed judgment on the matter and yet we were ready to commit a tax to pay for it because we needed a dedicated source of revenue in order to secure federal funds.

"I feel a lot more comfortable with this measure before us today and that's because it gives us the time to take a look at what will evolve and then make a decision. And as one who will be running in '92, I guess I am one of those who'll bite the apple the second time and at risk for that very reason, but I think we are here to do what we

feel is right and as some of the previous speakers have indicated I too feel that we have reached the point where there is no other alternative.

"The things that have been mentioned as possible alternatives, most have been tried and all of them utilize roads and gasoline and, therefore, will not remove the congestion that we now face, nor improve the situation.

"Therefore, it seems to me only prudent that we move along these lines. We, at least, will get this plan into motion. We will have an opportunity to look at the proposals. We will find out whether or not there is interest in the private sector and commitment of monies, and if at that point we then find that it's falling through and that we can't afford it, then I'm afraid we're going to have to take another bold step and say so. But at this point I see no other alternative, and I am very mindful of the fact that while we have a traffic congestion, a horrendous one out in my area, and that this proposed guideway will not go out there, I still feel that it's very indicative to me that any time we have a problem and a massive traffic jam elsewhere it does impact on our side as well. There is a domino effect that is clearly felt. And so if we can relieve some of the gridlock that we are now facing on the opposite end of the island, it will certainly help to alleviate the problems on our side of the island.

"We are a community; we are a state; we need to do something to relieve and find a solution to a problem. I see no other at this point but to try what is before us. And that's one reason why I will be voting in favor of this bill."

Senator Tungpalan also supported the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I was looking over my old notes. As I spoke on this the second time around about the bill at that time being a shell and am very happy with how it was worked on and presented finally to this body.

"My feelings about the bill not only emanate from the fact that I am a Senator from the Leeward District and, of course, I, daily, have to commute and see the problems that we are faced with. The projected 132,800 people who will be residing in the Leeward Oahu district in the next 20 years also moves me to rise to speak about this measure.

"I do not believe that we've really comprehensively, or at least some of the previous speakers have really comprehensively looked at what we've done this year. My hat is off to the Transportation chairs and the various chairs who addressed the total problem and that was when we voted on and passed the establishment of satellite centers in three major districts here on Oahu in addition to two neighbor islands, and when we also improved telecommunications centers in the same districts here. All these measures will also mitigate the flow into Honolulu.

"I think we can also consider that ... you know, we've really tried to improve the way our H-1 works from the Leeward Oahu district into town by putting in shoulder lanes and reducing the number or carpool riders to just two occupants as opposed to three. This has increased the capacity on the other lanes immeasurably and I'm very thankful that Mr. Hirata is in the audience and I can also extend my mahalo to him. We certainly hear a lot of support of those measures and we are indeed looking forward to mitigation of traffic with the establishment of these other measures that we passed. So I look at this as just one of the many approaches that we are taking to reduce traffic and I think when you look at the total picture, perhaps it will do wonders in reducing traffic, especially for our Leeward residents.

"I want to thank all of you for supporting this measure and allowing us to have this opportunity to vote on it. I do hope that those of you who right now are 'kanalua' on the measure would vote 'yes' because I can assure you that it cannot do anything but help our people. Thank you."

Senator Cobb, speaking against the measure, then responded:

"Very briefly, Mr. President. I just wanted to address a couple of items.

"In the suggestions that I made it is not a 'no build' alternative. It is not a 'highway only' alternation, and it's definitely not more buses. I think we've almost reached the saturation point of buses.

"But when we mentioned on the floor of this Senate that we needed to change human behavior, ladies and gentlemen, a train alone will not change human behavior. Costs, changes in configuration, parking, and real monetary incentives will be needed to help change human behavior.

"The tragedy of this bill today, Mr. President, is that we are not providing in detail any mid-cost alternatives for our commuters to take, whether it is in the form of jitneys, syncompated buses, 25- or 15-passenger taxis or other items, even as a stop gap, even as an incentive. We continue to keep monopolies in place and then tell our commuters you only have a choice of a train, bus or your own car. Yet we have a monopoly at the airport; we have a monopoly on the bus system, and we simply refuse to allow for private enterprise alternatives to give our own commuters the basic choices they need in form of alternatives. That's all I'm saying we should be looking, plus the cost over-runs and financing that I alluded to earlier. Thank you."

Senator Ikeda, speaking in support of the bill, then said:

"A brief rebuttal, Mr. President.

"I think it's time that we moved ahead into the 21st century. As I said earlier, the alternatives that we have discussed have been tried and all of the alternatives discussed still use gasoline and still require roads. If we really want to go backwards, then probably the best way to do it is to go back to the horse-and-buggy or walk or take a bicycle. But I don't think that that's going to solve our problems. If we're going to move ahead into the 21st century, then let's do it and let's vote for this bill."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 164 was adopted and S.B. No. 1719, S.D. 1, H.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator Reed rose to speak in opposition to the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I voted for the rapid transit measure that we just passed. I rise to speak against the tax increase and the method of paying for it.

"Mr. President, this bill will allow a general excise tax increase in 1992. The excise tax hits hardest at those least able to afford it.

"To vote for a tax increase two years down the road out of fear of not being re-elected is political cowardice. To pretend it's not a tax increase is dishonest. A tax increase delayed is still a tax increase.

"Hawaii is already recognized nationally as a tax hell. This tax increase will simply turn up the heat. I'm voting 'no.'"

Senator Blair, at this time, interjected:

"Mr. President, I just raise a caveat that Section 11 does not seem to fit under the title of the bill. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 165 was adopted and S.B. No. 3128, S.D. 2, H.D. 2, C.D. 2, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAXATION," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

No. 2376, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TAX CREDITS," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Conf. Com. Rep. No. 213 (H.B. No. 1718, S.D. 2, C.D. 1):

Senator A. Kobayashi moved that Conf. Com. Rep. No. 213 be adopted and H.B. No. 1718, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, having been read throughout, pass Final Reading, seconded by Senator Yamasaki.

Senator Reed rose to speak against the measure as follows:

"Mr. President, I oppose this pay raise for judges because it includes a 27% pay raise for a judiciary employee who has been prosecuted, tried and found guilty on 13 counts of ticket fixing.

"Tom 'Fat Boy' Okuda has been convicted of crimes committed in his role as deputy courts administrator. It is outrageous that he is still in that position, still on the public payroll.

"I oppose this pay raise because the judges have failed to force the chief justice to do the right thing by removing Okuda and his influence from the judiciary.

"The Legislature has a history of giving Okuda whatever he wants -- including the passage of legislation making Okuda the only deputy administrator in the state with civil service protection. To now give Okuda a 27% pay raise and a \$21,000 retroactive bonus is absurd.

"The judiciary claims to want to avoid even the appearance of impropriety. But for the judges to lobby for a pay raise bill that includes a raise and a bonus for a person convicted of abusing the judiciary to give breaks to cronies is clearly improper.

"For the Legislature to go along with this is to remain a part of and encourage the good old boy system that still dominates all three branches of government in Hawaii. I'm voting 'no.'"

Senator Crozier rose to speak in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, first of all, I'd like to congratulate the Conference Committee chairs for the hard work that they did to finally bring this bill to fruition. Mr. President, I remember a few years ago in 1985 when a pay bill did not survive and I always felt the burden of how many individuals' lives and families were impacted because they did not get their pay raise.

"I'm glad that both the Senate and the House stuck to their guns and worked out some kind of compromise because these judges deserve the pay raise. Their families need to be educated. Their children need to have the opportunities the rest of us do. These judges have given up lucrative practices so that they can serve the public. I salute the chairs of the Conference Committee and I hope my colleagues support the measure. Mahalo."

Senator A. Kobayashi rose to speak in support of the bill as follows:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of this bill. I would like to add that this bill gives pay raises to positions and not people.

"Last Friday, Mr. President, was the deadline for decking bills for the adjournment on Monday and that decking deadline passed and no judicial pay raise bill was decked. After four years, while our hotel workers, teachers, U.H. faculty, all public employees were receiving pay raises, for four years the judges did not get a pay raise. Then the session was extended and Monday was another decking deadline, and Monday passed and still no judicial pay raise.

"Now, what would we have gained by remaining in a deadlocked position with the House. How many years would it take before this deadlock is broken and the judges are able to get a pay raise.

"Finally, on Tuesday the House and Senate met and Representative Wayne Metcalf was very eager to talk and we were eager to talk and we hammered out what I think is a very good solution, a really good House-Senate solution.

"This solution, Mr. President, No. 1, gives us the confirmation on the retention of circuit court judges which has been discussed since I was a staffer here. And No. 2, a very comprehensive study which will settle once and for all the question of confirmation of district court judges, and this study will be finished and the findings given to the Legislature before the 1991 session and the House has agreed to settle once and for all this question of confirmation of district court judges.

"But best of all, Mr. President, the judges receive their very well deserved pay raise, and I urge all of you to vote 'yes.' Thank you."

Senator Cobb also spoke in support of the measure and said:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the measure.

"Recently, I was advised by some media channels to loosen up the conversation so I'd like to say publicly, Mr. President, I'm glad that if you're going to pass the train bill you don't leave the judges waiting back at the station. It might make it a little hazardous for any legislator to get a traffic ticket of any kind because the last thing in the world you'd want to have is some unhappy jurist. But I'm convinced the judges do need a pay raise. In fact, two judges that I've spoken with personally, off the record, not as a matter of lobbying but by seeking their opinions had indicated they may have to give up their seats because they had children in college or other heavy expenses to bear and they have not kept up with the cost of living. And we provide, as a matter of law, that once a person becomes judge, that's the only state income or any type of income that they're allowed. Divestment is required. Other state employment and other state income is barred, and in support of what the previous speaker said any raise goes to the position, not to the individual. And there are so many individuals here deserving of this.

"Yes, I would like to see confirmation of district court judges. I stood by that and I still stand by it. I support not only the women of the Senate but the Senate position that says we should have a confirmation right on district court judges because they impact on so many people's lives, far more so than the circuit court or the supreme court and the intermediate court of appeals. If you're looking for the impact on the daily lives of our people, it's at the district court level. But that issue has been resolved and I think the compromise reached is a fair one and I think the judges are deserving of the pay raise on the merits and that's how I'll be voting. Thank you, Mr. President."

Senator McMurdo also rose to speak in support of the bill as follows:

"Mr. President, I think it's an excellent compromise. I too was absolutely opposed to it and it came to be at a deadlock state. I would really like to especially thank Senator Ann Kobayashi who I think really spearheaded this drive to arrive at this compromise. That's why I will be voting up on it and I urge everybody else to do so."

Senator McCartney also rose to support the measure and remarked:

"Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the bill and echo the previous statements. I would also like to personally commend the Majority Policy Leader for being a good negotiator, working out a bill that's good for the people of Hawaii and working out a bill that will attract and retain the best and the brightest to serve on the bench. I thank her very much, publicly, for working that out. Thank you, Mr. President."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, Conf. Com. Rep. No. 213 was adopted and H.B. No. 1718, S.D. 2, C.D. 1, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO THE JUDICIARY," having been read throughout, passed Final Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Senator George then delivered her end of session remarks as follows:

"Mr. President, here we are again.

"You may remember, Mr. President, that on the opening day of this session I paid some attention to your remarks of a decade earlier. As you probably guessed, I browsed once again through the ten-year-old Journal hoping for equal inspiration in closing comments.

"I was astonished to be reminded, Mr. President, of the impressive list of problems we solved in that distant session. Excerpting from your valedictory statement, here's the 'creditable record of accomplishments':

Our fiscally responsible budget provided funds for land banking, for the accelerated repair and maintenance of state facilities, for water resources, for the Aloha Tower Complex, for the HVB. We came up with a pensioners' bonus, a compromise for funding OHA, a housing program. We strengthened our criminal laws.

"I almost forgot -- we also funded (again) a reliever airport.

"I'm always surprised at the durability of the problems we file as solved. So many of the decade-old list of issues we felt we'd handled keep turning up. And I wonder how many of this session's accomplishments will turn up as priority problems in a future session, saying 'Gotcha!'

"We all need reminding occasionally that politics works as a continuum rather than a list of jobs to be accomplished.

"However ephemeral the solutions, we have enjoyed working on them -- even the ones where the minority approach hasn't prevailed.

"As always, Mr. President, the loyal minority worked hard, was stretched fearsomely thin, but left footprints, sometimes anonymously, throughout the session.

"We offer our help after adjournment, especially in finding ways to avoid the pandemonium of trying to close out our sessions.

"Ten years ago, Mr. President, we concluded our accomplishments on the 66th day. At least we've improved by a pair of days -- but there HAS to be a better way to get that gavel down.

"Thank you."

The President then addressed the members of the Senate with the following closing remarks:

"Members of the Senate, I wasn't going to say anything but since the opportunity has been afforded me to make a few remarks, I will take that opportunity.

"The hour is late. Very soon this 1990 legislative session will draw to a close and pass into history.

"Over the last four months, I believe we have set a solid record of accomplishments. I would like to take some time to mention just a few:

- We established a funding mechanism for the proposed Honolulu Mass Transit System. As a proponent for mass transit for many years, I am especially gratified by the work of the Legislature and the commitment to this project.
- We have provided for a quick administrative procedure for revoking the licenses of drunk drivers. Much credit should be given to our Transportation Committee chairman after two arduous years of commitment to this legislation. Hopefully, this will help to save lives and make our streets safer.
- We provided for the continuation of the state's innovative A+ program which is a model for the nation. Additionally, we gave strong support for education, both at the lower and higher levels.
- We approved pay raises for judges which will, hopefully, help attract and retain the best qualified people for our courts and thus improving the quality of justice for our people.
- We gave tax relief to the people - a \$60 tax rebate as well as increasing the tax credit to \$55.
- We addressed the problem of the homeless in our community with over \$9 million for various programs including some \$6 million for homeless shelters. I think that, if anything else, has been our major accomplishment.

The list is long and I can continue on in much greater detail. However, in the interest of brevity, I will stop now and just say to all of you, my fellow Senators, mahalo for your contributions to the work of this legislative session. Each and every one of you played an important role, even being the 'devil's advocate,' in the shaping of the work product of this legislative session and I want to acknowledge your service to this body, to your constituents and to all the people of Hawaii.

"There were a lot of compromises, a lot of give-and-take. I don't think any of us will leave here completely satisfied. Still, I think the bills that we finally passed make up a good package, a solid package that we can all take pride in and credit for.

"As we prepare to adjourn, I know that many of you will soon be out on the campaign trail -- either seeking re-election back to the Senate or perhaps seeking higher office. My best wishes to all of you!

"Before we adjourn, I would like to acknowledge our hard-working Senate staff. They are the ones who work behind the scene to keep the legislative process moving forward while we politicians either bask in the limelight or try to stay away from controversy. To the staff, mahalo to you all!

"In closing, my fellow Senators, I would like to thank you again for bestowing on me the honor of serving as your president for this 15th Legislature. I take this opportunity to particularly thank Senator Aki for presiding in the sessions during my absence. I look forward to working together with you again next year. Until then, mahalo and aloha!"

Senator Cobb on a point of inquiry stated:

"Mr. President, this has been an extraordinary year in many respects but also a year touched by sadness in the passing of two good friends and servants of Hawaii, and, as we adjourn sine die, I would like to request that we do so in honor of the late Bernard Akana and Spark M. Matsunaga."

The Chair so ordered.

Senator Blair moved that the Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 1990, adjourn Sine Die, on a moment of silence in memory of the late United States Senator Spark M. Matsunaga and Hawaii County Mayor Bernard Akana, seconded by Senator Reed and carried.

However, House Bill No. 2088, which was also passed during the Regular Session of 1990, will amend the same statutes. Since on April 23, 1990, I approved House Bill No. 2088 as Act 34, there is no necessity to also approve this bill.

The purpose of Senate Bill No. 2964 is to protect contest officials from physical assault and thereby to

promote hiring and retention of qualified officials. Contest officials are those who officiate at publicly exhibited contests and include umpires, referees, judges, and linespersons, among others.

While the purpose of the bill is laudable, as passed by the Legislature it provides no additional protection to contest officials than that which is already afforded to them under existing statutes. In the bill as originally introduced, assault on a contest official would have been expressly included in the definition of the offense of assault in the second degree, which is a class C felony under Section 707-711, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

However, the bill as passed will define the new offense of 'assault of athletic contest official' to be identical to the existing offense of assault in the third degree, except for the definition of 'contest official.' The new offense will be classified as a misdemeanor, which is the classification of the existing offense of assault in the third degree. Consequently, a person who causes bodily injury to a contest official is already subject to prosecution for assault in the third degree under Section 707-712, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and this bill will do nothing more than duplicate existing law.

The purpose of this bill is to amend the definitions of the terms 'hotel,' 'lodging or tenement house,' 'group home,' 'group residence,' 'group living arrangement,' and 'rooming house' in chapter 445, Hawaii Revised Statutes ('HRS'), for purposes of county business licenses. The committee reports indicate that the changes are intended to exclude single room occupancy units, which are occupied primarily by the elderly, from the definition of 'hotel' in section 445-90, HRS. However, the bill does not achieve this intended goal and creates ambiguities that would make it difficult to administer and enforce.

Section 445-94, HRS, requires that applicants for county business licenses for lodging or tenement houses, group homes, group residences, group living arrangements, hotels, boarding houses, and restaurants first obtain a sanitation certificate from the Department of Health, and, for initial licenses, clearance from the county assuring that the structure complies with building and zoning codes, before the license may be issued. The term 'hotel' is presently defined in section 445-90 as 'any building or portion thereof or buildings containing more than nine rooming units, in which space is let by the owner or operator to six or more unrelated persons.' Currently, many buildings containing single room occupancy units fit this definition, since they contain more than nine rooming units and are rented to six or more unrelated persons. The units do not include kitchens.

This bill would redefine the term 'hotel' to mean 'any building or portion thereof containing lodging or dwelling units, or both, in which fifty per cent or more of the units are lodging units.' The bill does not define the terms 'lodging unit' and 'dwelling unit.' However, using the definitions contained in the Land Use Ordinance of the City and County of Honolulu, a 'lodging unit' would be a room or connecting rooms without a kitchen, while a 'dwelling unit' would consist of a room or connecting rooms constituting an independent living unit, including a kitchen. Thus, reading this bill in conjunction with those definitions, many buildings with single room occupancy units would still be classified as hotels since they contain 'fifty per cent or more' units without kitchens.

In addition, this bill would blur the distinctions between hotels and other types of living facilities. Along with amending the definition of the term 'hotel,' it would amend the definition of the terms 'lodging or tenement house,' 'group home,' 'group residence,' 'group living arrangement,' and 'rooming house' to delete the upper limit of nine rooming units, so that those living arrangements would be defined as 'any building or portion thereof in which space is let by the owner or operator to three or more unrelated persons.' Therefore, this broad new definition would also include facilities otherwise classified as hotels in which space is rented to three or more unrelated people. And the other types of facilities could also be considered 'hotels' if fifty percent or more of their units lacked kitchens.

Finally, this bill's broad definition of living facilities other than hotels would cover buildings that are not currently included, such as apartment buildings.

One purpose of Senate Bill No. 2833 is to provide a procedure for the Real Estate Commission to intervene in the removal of a member of a board of directors of a condominium apartment owners association when the board member intentionally fails to comply with certain provisions of chapter 514A, Hawaii Revised Statutes. This provision of the bill would create an unacceptable administrative burden on the Real Estate Commission.

Many of the requirements of chapter 514A which are on the list that the Commission must enforce pursuant to this bill are not within the jurisdiction of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs' Regulated Industries Complaints Office. Since the Commission could not tap the investigative resources of the Regulated Industries Complaints Office in analyzing these cases, these investigations would need to be conducted by the Commission itself. The Commission does not have any investigators nor sufficient staff to process complaints of this nature. With over 2,000 condominium projects representing over 100,000 apartment owners, this bill would have a tremendous impact on the limited resources of the Commission.

Currently, problems concerning boards of directors are handled informally through an advice and education process. This has worked well because most failures to follow the law are not intentional, but are a result of lack of knowledge of the law. The bill's focus on intentional failures to follow the law misses the real problem of fostering compliance with chapter 514A. The resources of the Commission are spent better on education and mediation programs.

Existing law contains a procedure for removal of members of boards of directors, and it has been successfully used by at least five condominium projects during the past year. Apartment owners also have the opportunity to use the Neighborhood Justice Center and arbitration proceedings to protect their rights without involving the Commission or the Regulated Industries Complaints Office.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill No. 2273, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Making an Appropriation for Hawaii Public Television.'

The purpose of House Bill No. 2273 is to appropriate funds to support the creation of a weekly half-hour news show produced for Hawaii public television focusing on issues and events in the Pacific Region. Specifically, the bill appropriates \$250,000 to be paid into the Public Broadcasting Revolving Fund and authorizes the use of \$500,000 from the revolving fund to be used for the creation of the weekly news program, provided that the sum appropriated or authorized shall be matched on a dollar-for dollar basis through a special fund-raising effort by the Hawaii Public Broadcasting Authority.

The amount of money appropriated to the Hawaii Public Broadcasting Authority is not sufficient to undertake the project as originally conceived and as specified by the bill. The bill, as originally introduced, called for an appropriation of \$1 million in matching funds to help generate additional private funding to meet a \$2.7 million projected cost of producing the program.

Additionally, the provision of the bill requiring reversion of \$500,000 to the general fund if that sum is not matched by private fund-raising efforts poses a potential significant loss of future private contributions to the Hawaii Public Broadcasting Authority. It is entirely conceivable that private donors will be hesitant to contribute to Hawaii public television if there is a possibility of their donations being diverted for anything other than use by the Hawaii Public Broadcasting Authority.

Moreover, this bill poses a potential threat to the HPBA's broadcast licenses issued by the Federal Communications Commission. Those licenses are held by HPBA, not the State of Hawaii, and it is the HPBA who is responsible for broadcast policy decisions, including programming decisions. This bill, in effect, forces HPBA to accept State funds and to do the specific programming required by the bill, upon pain of losing funds now held in HPBA's revolving fund. If HPBA were free to reject the conditional funds, this problem would not exist. Whether this bill creates the sort of relinquishment of control over programming decisions that would result in the Federal Communication Commission taking action against HPBA is, in the opinion of HPBA's legal counsel for FCC matters, an open question.

The purpose of Senate Bill No. 33 is to amend section 1-17, Hawaii Revised Statutes, by clarifying that the words in the Hawaii Revised Statutes which reference masculine and feminine gender shall infer a gender neutral meaning.

Section 1-17, which is part of the chapter that states general rules of statutory interpretation that are applicable to the Hawaii Revised Statutes, presently provides that words in the 'masculine gender signify both the masculine and feminine gender.' This bill will amend section 1-17 to state that words in 'either gender signify both the masculine and feminine gender.'

Before the Legislature implemented its current policy to use gender neutral references in statutes, statutes were often drafted with masculine gender references even when there was no intent to limit the application of the statutes

to only males. Consequently, a general rule of statutory interpretation regarding masculine gender references was needed to avoid interpretations of the statutes that limited application only to males. On the other hand, when statutes were drafted to use only feminine gender references, those statutes were intended to apply only to females and not to males. Therefore, a general rule of statutory interpretation making feminine gender references now also signify the masculine gender may cause confusion as to the applications of those statutes.

Although this bill was intended to be a mere housekeeping measure, I believe that there may be some unintended consequences of having all existing feminine gender references now also signify the masculine gender. Review of the specific statutes should be made and, if necessary, amendments to those specific statutes should be proposed to eliminate references that are unnecessarily gender specific.

Initially, it appears that this bill shortens the time for preparation of the above documents by ten days. However, because the program memoranda, which presently are submitted on the day the Legislature convenes, discuss and summarize the major program changes and budget items contained in the budget or supplemental budget, they cannot be prepared until after the budget or supplemental budget is finalized. The practical effect of House Bill No. 2069, then, is to shorten the time for budget preparation by thirty days. This drastic reduction in the time that can be spent for budget formulation in the executive departments, for in-depth review of the budget requests, and for decision-making on the budget or supplemental budget as a whole would result in an erosion of the quality of the program and financial plan, the budget, the supplemental budget, and the program memoranda.

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill No. 2169, entitled 'A Bill for an Act Relating to Intoxicating Liquor.'

The purpose of Senate Bill No. 2169 is to require any public place where intoxicating liquor, beer, or wine is sold at retail to post a sign that reads: 'Drinking alcoholic beverages during pregnancy can cause birth defects.'

According to a study conducted by the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism, ninety-six percent of the women who had given birth during a three-month period in a given study area were aware of the dangers of liquor consumption during pregnancy. However, fifty-nine percent of these women reported that they had consumed alcohol during their pregnancy. The mere posting of a warning sign, therefore, would have only a miniscule effect on the prevention of alcohol consumption by pregnant women.

On the other hand, there are other more desirable measures that would achieve the purpose of the bill. First, federal law already requires alcoholic beverage manufacturers to print a statement on their products informing pregnant women of the dangers of alcohol consumption. Second, House Bill No. 2280, which was also passed by the Legislature and which I intend to approve, establishes, among other things, a three-year maternal care incentives project to encourage early prenatal care and a three-year demonstration project for comprehensive perinatal care in needy areas. From a policy standpoint, early prenatal care and health education are more effective than display of signs in the prevention of alcohol consumption by pregnant women.

The purpose of this bill is to uniformly require one year of predoctoral internship in an organized health service training program and one year of post-doctoral experience as a minimum requirement for licensure as a psychologist from graduates of both regionally accredited institutions and training programs approved by the American Psychology Association.

Although requiring an organized internship and post-doctoral experience prior to licensure for independent practice as a psychologist will help to assure better trained applicants for licensure, the limitation of internships to only predoctoral internships may result in the denial of licensure of well-trained individuals who take only post-doctoral internships. In addition, the bill exempts from the amended minimum requirements for licensure set out in the bill only persons who commenced training before January 1, 1990, in a training program approved by the American Psychology Association if those persons receive a doctoral degree before January 1, 1994 and apply for licensure by June 30, 1994. The bill does not delay application of the amended licensure requirements to persons who are presently enrolled in, or graduated from, regionally accredited institutions. The immediate application of the amended requirements may create hardship for these persons whose training and experience met the present legal requirements.

The purpose of Senate Bill No. 2435 is to amend section 431:10C-305(b), Hawaii Revised Statutes, concerning the payment of no-fault benefits. The present law provides that if an individual is entitled to receive both workers' compensation and no-fault benefits, the aggregate payment of these benefits shall not exceed eighty percent of the person's monthly earnings. The bill adds a further limitation on aggregate benefits where the person's employer provides both the workers' compensation and no-fault coverages. In such a case, the aggregate benefits will not exceed the person's net monthly earnings. The net monthly earnings are defined as monthly earnings, less federal and state taxes and FICA.

In certain situations, the provisions of this bill could result in an injured worker receiving weekly workers' compensation benefits less than the sixty-six and two-

thirds percent of the worker's average weekly wage, which is the amount provided in the workers' compensation law. This situation could occur because the bill uses the net monthly earnings as the maximum aggregate workers' compensation and no-fault benefit receivable by an individual. This amount will vary for each individual claimant depending upon the person's wages and the number of tax exemptions claimed. Under this bill, there will be circumstances where a person who receives an injury that is compensable under the workers' compensation law will receive less benefits simply because the injury is also covered under the employer's no-fault insurance coverage. This penalizes injured workers for circumstances entirely beyond the worker's control and undermines the integrity of the workers' compensation law.

The purpose of Senate Bill No. 3399 is to restrict the permissible volume level at which vehicle sound amplification systems may be operated. Senate Bill No. 3399 provides that any sound amplification emanating from a motor vehicle which can be heard from a distance of sixty feet or more is a violation. It further provides that if such sound is being made with the intent of causing serious inconvenience or substantial harm or if a person fails to reduce the noise level after a warning from the police, the person shall be guilty of a petty misdemeanor.

The existing City and County of Honolulu Ordinance No. 90-26 is more stringent than Senate Bill No. 3399, because if sound may be heard from thirty feet from the source, it is a violation. Section 46-17, Hawaii Revised Statutes, provides that, for the regulation of certain public nuisances, such as noise, 'in any case of conflict between the statute or rule and ordinance, the law which affords the most protection to the public shall apply.' However, this bill provides that state law shall preempt county ordinances 'unless those ordinances' penalty provisions as a whole are greater than those contained in this Act.' Under Ordinance No. 90-26, intentionally causing serious inconvenience or substantial harm is not penalized more severely as a petty misdemeanor.

Consequently, it may be contended that the penalties under Ordinance No. 90-26 'as a whole' are not 'greater than those contained in' this bill. The uncertainty about the preemptive effect of this bill could allow both the state law and the city ordinance to be challenged as to applicability. An accused violator charged under one law could contend that the other law controls, effectively rendering both the state law and the city ordinance to be unenforceable.

It is inadvisable at this time to cancel the transfer of the Department of Transportation's marine patrol to the Department of Public Safety and to preclude the Director of Public Safety from considering the Department of Land and Natural Resources personnel in the director's transfer recommendations. The Department of Public Safety was established to consolidate all public safety functions and employees of state government to ensure better organization and coordination of public safety functions, allow for standardized training, and establish a 'career ladder' for public safety employees. A study of only the public safety functions pertaining to ocean-related activities without consideration of other public safety

functions appears to be contrary to the purpose of the establishment of the Department of Public Safety.

The purpose of this bill is to replace preferential tax rates given to domestic (Hawaii) insurance companies with a single insurance premium tax rate for all domestic and foreign (non-Hawaii) insurers. The existing preferential tax rates have been challenged in court on the ground of being discriminatory against foreign insurance companies. This bill is an attempt to eliminate possible legal infirmities in the existing tax. However, the credit system contained in this bill results in unacceptably high

revenue losses to the State and leaves the tax open to possible legal challenge.

The bill repeals facially discriminatory tax rates and substitutes therefor a credit structure based upon employee-related expenses incurred by an insurer in Hawaii. Under the bill, domestic insurers are projected to pay the same (or even less) tax as they now pay because the credit system will offset the bill's increased tax rates. Foreign insurers will pay less than they do now, because the credit is equally available to them.

The revenue loss to the State in the first few years alone of the bill's operation is projected at approximately 6 to 10 million dollars a year. Because little is known about compensation packages and the number of employees in the insurance industry, the long-term extent of revenue losses under the bill's credit system is unpredictable. More study is needed before implementing such a system.

Moreover, because most domestic insurance companies do not maintain as large an employee base in Hawaii as do domestic insurers, the bill's taxing scheme appears to be even more favorable to domestic insurance companies than the existing tax and, therefore, open to challenges of discrimination. The bill thus substitutes one possibly illegal tax for another at substantial cost to the State.

By allowing the combination of the medical or rehabilitative expenses of two or more accidents, the medical-rehabilitative limit or 'tort threshold' could be more easily exceeded, which would result in more cases proceeding to litigation. The increase in the potential for litigation activity could consequently result in increased insurance premiums, which would be contrary to one of the purposes behind the No-Fault Law.

Additionally, the bill is technically defective. On page 1, lines 4 and 11, references are made to section '432:10C-_' and 'section 432:10C-308,' Hawaii Revised Statutes. The general subject matter of chapter 432, Hawaii Revised Statutes, relates to mutual and fraternal benefit societies, not no-fault insurance, and there is no article 10C in chapter 432. Consequently, the statutory references in this bill will result in some confusion.

The purposes of Senate Bill No. 2794 are to establish a blue ribbon panel within the Department of Health to examine the financial and economic dynamics of the health care industry in Hawaii and to appropriate funds to supplement institutional health care reimbursements for inpatient care under the State's medical care payments law.

While the bill as a whole is meritorious in its intent, I object to section 5 of this bill, which appropriates \$2,750,000 to be distributed to all medicaid participating institutional providers of medical care which meet ascertained criteria.

My concerns regarding section 5 are threefold.

First, there is no evidence that a shortfall in institutional health care reimbursements exists. The Department of Health and Department of Human Services indicate that no comprehensive financial audit has ever been conducted to substantiate this premise. The Department of Human Services has authorized its fiscal agent for the medicaid program (Hawaii Medical Services Association) to conduct a comprehensive independent audit on the medical facilities to ascertain if a shortfall exists and, in time, the extent of the shortfall. The Department of Human Services indicates that the audit should be completed in approximately eighteen months.

Second, the State is not legally obligated to cover any perceived shortfall between medicaid rates and the costs of services rendered by the medical institutions. Presently, medicaid reimbursements are determined by the Department of Human Services utilizing federal guidelines. Federal guidelines stipulate that the State's prospective payment system of determining medicaid reimbursements cannot exceed medicare upper limits. The Department of Human Services indicates that its present reimbursement levels for all hospitals are at the highest level allowed according to federal guidelines. It appears that the general fund match for medicaid is equitable and the State has met its funding obligations.

Third, it appears that the amount appropriated will have minimal impact on the cost of medicaid care provided in the State. The Department of Human Services indicates that up to forty medical institutions may qualify for the grant. If each institution receives an equal share, the amount of the grant for each medical facility would be approximately \$69,000 for fiscal year 1990-1991. Thus, it would appear that the grant would have minimal impact on offsetting hospital costs and thus would probably not have any impact on maintaining current rates.

This bill must be vetoed for several reasons. First, this bill discriminates in favor of cigarettes by taxing them at a flat tax rate, whereas all other tobacco products are taxed at a percentage of their wholesale price. In *Bacchus v. Dias*, 468 U.S. 263 (1984), discriminatory treatment of alcoholic beverages resulted in protracted litigation and suspension of liquor tax revenues. This bill poses the same risks of litigation and revenue suspension which should be avoided.

Second, the definition of 'cigarettes' does not adequately distinguish between cigarettes and other rolled tobacco products, such as cigars. This bill will unnecessarily confuse both the sellers and consumers alike as to what is subject to the flat cigarette tax and what is not. The new definition would also encourage manufacturers and other sellers to modify the packaging and marketing of their expensive cigar products to come within the definition of cigarettes for purposes of paying the lower cigarette tax.

Finally, the potential loss of tax revenues resulting from the passage of this bill is substantial. The Department of

Taxation estimates a potential loss of revenues of \$83.5 million over the next ten years.

The following Rules shall be the Rules of the Senate of the Fifteenth Legislature of the State of Hawaii.

PART I. ORGANIZATION, OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

Rule 1. Organization

When the Senate convenes, the President or the Vice-President, in the absence of the President, shall call the Senate to order and appoint a Committee of three whose duty it shall be to immediately examine the credentials of the members-elect of the Senate. If from the Committee report, it shall appear that a majority of the credentials are in order, the Senate shall proceed to organize and shall appoint a Committee of three to wait upon a justice of the Supreme Court, an Intermediate Appellate Court judge or a Circuit Court judge to administer the oath of office required by the Constitution. Such proceedings need not be on the day of convening in the Senate. In the absence of the President or Vice-President the Senate may elect a temporary Presiding Officer by a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

Rule 2. Officers and Employees

(1) The officers of the Senate shall consist of a: President, Vice-President, Clerk, Assistant Clerk and Sergeant-at-Arms, each of whom shall be elected by a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(2) The President and Vice-President shall hold their respective offices in accordance with Title 3, Hawaii Revised Statutes. Other officers and employees shall hold their respective offices and positions at the pleasure of the Senate, but a majority vote of the members of the Senate shall be required to terminate the office held by any officer of the Senate.

(3) The Senate, by a majority vote, may authorize positions from time to time as may be deemed necessary.

Rule 3. The President

It shall be the duty of the President:

- (1) To open the meetings of the Senate by taking the Chair and calling for the invocation.
- (2) When a quorum is present, to call for the reading of the Journal of the preceding day.
- (3) To maintain order in the Senate Chamber and to require proper decorum on the part of the members.
- (4) To announce the business before the Senate in the order prescribed by the Rules.
- (5) To receive and submit all matters properly brought before the Senate by the members, to call for votes upon the same and announce the results.
- (6) To receive all communications and present them to the Senate and to refer all bills and other matters to the appropriate standing committees.
- (7) To appoint all committees unless otherwise determined by the Senate.
- (8) To authenticate by signature, all acts and doings of the Senate which require authentication.
- (9) To make known rules of order when so requested and, subject to an appeal to the Senate, to decide all questions of order.
- (10) To issue warrants, when so directed by the Senate, to carry into effect its orders in the arrest of offenders, the summoning of witnesses, or other orders of the Senate.
- (11) To decide and announce the result of any vote taken.
- (12) To do and perform such other duties as are required by law or by these rules or such as may properly pertain to such office.
- (13) To clear the Senate Chamber of all persons, except its members and designated persons if there is a disturbance or disorderly conduct, or on motion duly adopted.
- (14) To control and have direction of the rooms, desks, passages, stairways, corridors, balconies, in and about the building set apart for the use of the Senate and all public property of the Senate. The President shall see that all officers of the Senate perform their respective duties, and may assign places to visitors and reporters. The President may admit

stenographers or other reporters, wishing to take down the debates, and assign them such places to effect their object as shall not interfere with the convenience of the Senate.

(15) To establish final dates for action on legislation, including, though not limited to the final date for introducing bills, the dates for the mandatory recess pursuant to Article III, Section 12, of the Constitution, the final date for third reading of Senate Bills, the final date for third reading of House Bills, the final date for approving Conference Committee agreements and drafts of bills, the final date for final reading of the General Appropriations Bill, and the final date for final reading of the Supplemental Appropriations Bill. The President shall coordinate the date for introducing bills and may coordinate with the Speaker of the House to establish the other final dates.

(16) To promulgate an administrative and financial manual of guides, the purpose of which is to establish uniformity in administrative practices and to ensure compliance with Senate Policies.

(17) To mediate and resolve differences between two or more standing committees on the same bill.

Rule 4. The Vice-President

In the absence of the President, the Vice-President shall exercise all the duties and powers of the President.

Rule 5. President Pro Tempore

(1) In case the President and Vice-President shall be absent at the hour to which the Senate had adjourned, the member of the majority party having the longest tenure in the Senate shall preside until a President pro tempore be chosen. If two or more members are equally qualified to preside, the eldest qualified member shall preside.

(2) The President pro tempore shall be invested with all of the powers and shall perform all the duties of the President. Whenever the President pro tempore is required to sign a bill or other instrument, the Clerk shall attach to such bill or other instrument a certificate stating that such President pro tempore was duly elected and is authorized to so sign.

Rule 6. The Clerk

It shall be the duty of the Clerk:

(1) To have charge of all records of the Senate and be responsible for the same. At no time shall the Clerk permit original documents to be withdrawn from the Clerk's keeping unless ordered by the Senate.

(2) To make a concise and complete memorandum of all petitions, motions, resolutions, amendments and other matters brought before the Senate. Such memoranda shall state the nature of the matter and the name of the introducer, and the date and day of the session on which the Senate considered the matter. The memoranda, together with other matters ordered to be placed therein, shall constitute the Journal, a copy of which shall be made available for inspection to any member upon request as soon as practicable. The Journal of each day shall be read the following day, immediately after the invocation. When such Journal is approved by vote of the Senate, it shall be entered by the Clerk in a book entitled "Journal of the Senate. Session of ____." (Giving the Year).

(3) Unless otherwise directed by the Senate, to read all bills, resolutions and other matters (if so required) to the Senate.

(4) To forward at once all letters, messages, communications and other matters to the proper parties.

(5) To immediately deliver to the Chairman of the appropriate committee all petitions, resolutions, bills or other matters duly referred to such committee.

(6) To see that all bills and resolutions are properly engrossed and are correct and true as finally acted upon by the Senate.

(7) To draw such drafts on the state general fund for expenses of the session as shall be authorized by the Senate and approved by the Committee on Legislative Management.

(8) To pay all bills and accounts as shall be approved by the Committee on Legislative Management, or ordered by the Senate, and no others.

(9) To be responsible for the acquisition and distribution of all of the property of the Senate.

(10) To note all questions of order with the decision thereon and collect the same and append them to the Senate Journal at the close of the session.

(11) To perform all other clerical duties and functions pertaining to the Office of the Clerk and as the Senate from time to time shall direct. The Clerk shall post the order of business in writing in a conspicuous place each day.

Rule 7. Assistant Clerk

The Assistant Clerk shall assist the Clerk in the performance of all duties and attend to such other duties as may be required when so directed by the President. In the absence of the Clerk, the Assistant Clerk shall perform all duties of the Clerk.

Rule 8. Invocation

Each day's sitting of the Senate shall open with an invocation.

Rule 9. Sergeant-at-Arms

It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to attend the Senate on every day of meeting; to maintain order among those present as spectators; to give notice to the Presiding Officer of the attendance of any person with communications or otherwise; to supervise the distribution of incidentals which require distribution among the members; to supervise, subject to the control of the President, the Senate Messengers; to attend upon committees if so requested; to serve all orders to process directed by the President or Senate; to make all required arrests of members or other persons, and to retain the same in custody; to have the charge and responsibility for the postal requirements of the Senate; and generally to execute all of the requirements of the President of the Senate.

Rule 10. Responsibility of Officers and Employees

The employees shall perform such duties as may be assigned by the President or prescribed by the Senate.

All officers and employees of the Senate shall be directly answerable to the President, and shall obey and perform all the President's orders and directions, subject to revision by the Senate. If required by the President, any officer or employee shall give a bond for the faithful performance of duties.

An oath of office shall be administered to each officer.

Rule 11. Pay of Members, Officers and Employees

(1) Each member of the Senate, upon being elected or appointed to office, shall receive as compensation such salary as prescribed pursuant to Article III, Section 9, of the State Constitution.

(2) The officers, except the President and Vice-President, and the employees shall receive compensation as the Senate shall fix.

PART II. COMMITTEES**Rule 12. Committees: Types and Composition**

(1) Standing Committees: The membership of each Standing Committee and the respective Chairman and Vice-Chairman thereof shall be appointed by the President, subject to action by the Senate. The majority and minority parties shall be represented on all Standing Committees on such basis as prescribed by the Senate; provided that such basis be at least that of proportional representation. The nomination of the minority party members to all Standing Committees shall be made by the minority party.

(2) Special Committees shall consist of not less than three members each, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and shall be appointed by the President from time to time as occasion requires, to serve until discharged or finally reporting the specific matter referred. The Senate may establish investigative committees pursuant to chapter 21, Hawaii Revised Statutes; such committees shall have such powers and be bound by such conditions as may be provided by law or by these Rules.

(3) Conference Committees shall consist of not less than three members each, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and shall be appointed by the President from time to time as occasion requires, to serve until discharged or finally reporting the matter referred.

(4) The Committee of the Whole Senate.

Rule 13. Committee Chairman and Vice-Chairman

The first person named on the Committee shall be Chairman; the second member named shall be Vice-Chairman. The Chairman shall call meetings and preside.

Rule 14. Committees: Control and Excuse from Membership

Committees shall be under the control of and subject to the orders of the Senate, and shall faithfully carry out such orders. Any member may be excused from serving on any committee at the time of appointment, if such member is a member of four other committees.

Rule 15. Standing Committees

Standing Committees shall be appointed for each major subject matter area at the opening of the session, or as soon thereafter as possible, to serve during the Fourteenth Legislature. The major subject matter areas and the Standing Committees therefor shall be as follows:

EDUCATION AND CULTURE

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to promote intellectual development and cultural enrichment of the community. The Standing Committees for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (1) Committee on Culture, Arts and Historic Preservation, whose scope shall be those programs relating to culture, arts and historic site development and protection.
- (2) Committee on Education, whose scope shall be those programs relating to lower education, continuing education and public libraries.
- (3) Committee on Higher Education, whose scope shall be those programs relating to the University of Hawaii and the community colleges.

HEALTH

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to improve the physical and mental health of the people. The Standing Committee for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (4) Committee on Health, whose scope shall be those programs relating to general health, maternal and child care, communicable diseases, dental health, medical and hospital services, mental health, mental retardation and hospitals.

HUMAN AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to ensure adequate income, housing and employment for individuals and families, to encourage the development and growth of industry, to promote improved employment conditions for government employees and to promote, enhance and conserve energy and energy-related natural resources. The Standing Committees for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (5) Committee on Agriculture, whose scope shall be those programs relating to agriculture; environmental quality control and protection; and environmental health.
- (6) Committee on Business Development and Pacific Relations, whose scope shall be those programs relating to industrial and product promotion, new industry development, capital formation, financial and technical assistance to business, telecommunications and the development and promotion of Hawaii's relations with the Pacific Region.
- (7) Committee on Energy and Natural Resources, whose scope shall be those programs relating to energy development, conservation and utilization; marine and ocean resources development; the utilization of land and water resources; and the regulation of public utilities and carriers under the jurisdiction of the Public Utilities Commission.
- (8) Committee on Housing and Hawaiian Programs, whose scope shall be those programs relating to housing, Hawaiian Homes, the Office of Hawaiian Affairs and issues relating to the Hawaiian community.
- (9) Committee on Human Services, whose scope shall be those programs relating to financial assistance, to the promotion and general well-being of Hawaii's youth and elderly population, vocational rehabilitation and social welfare services.
- (10) Committee on Labor and Employment, whose scope shall be those programs relating to employment opportunities, labor-management relations, and to those programs relating to public employment concerning employee pay and benefits, employee recruitment, classification and training, career development, employee performance, employment conditions, standards of conduct for public employees and collective bargaining.
- (11) Committee on Tourism, Recreation and Planning, whose scope shall be those programs relating to tourism, outdoor recreation, state parks, recreational boating, Aloha Stadium, and state planning.

HUMAN RIGHTS AND JUSTICE

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to safeguard individual and property rights, protect consumers from fraudulent and deceptive practices, promote public safety and improve the conduct of business affairs. The Standing Committees for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (12) Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, whose scope shall be those programs relating to the protection of the consuming public, business and trade regulation, regulation of financial institutions, insurance regulation and professional and occupational regulation.
- (13) Committee on Corrections, whose scope shall be those programs relating to adult and juvenile corrections and the functions and activities contained within the Correctional Master Plan, public safety, the construction of correctional facilities and the management of such programs. The scope shall also include programs relating to parole, adult and juvenile community correctional services, half-way houses, rehabilitation, and other pertinent matters.
- (14) Committee on Judiciary, whose scope shall be those programs relating to courts, crime prevention and control, criminal code revisions, the rules of the Senate, judicial and legal questions, constitutional matters, programs of the Attorney General and of the Judiciary, individual rights and civil liberties, Public Defender and other pertinent matters referred to it by the Senate. In the event of a contest, it shall investigate and report upon the certificates of election of members. The committee shall consider all petitions and other matters relating to elections and returns referred to it by the Senate and report thereon.

GOVERNMENT OPERATIONS AND INTERGOVERNMENTAL RELATIONS

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to promote government efficiency and effective cooperation and coordination among the various levels of government. The Standing Committee for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (15) Committee on Government Operations, whose scope shall be those programs relating to government personal property management, archives, government communications, relations among the federal, state and county governments, matters of primary concern to particular counties, military and civil defense, and the promotion of efficiency and economy in government.

TRANSPORTATION

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to facilitate the physical movement of people and goods into and from the State and from place to place within the State. The Standing Committee for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (16) Committee on Transportation, whose scope shall be those programs relating to air, water and surface transportation.

LEGISLATIVE SUPPORT

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to provide to the legislature effective support for the accomplishment of legislative objectives and to promote understanding of the legislative process. The Standing Committee for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (17) Committee on Legislative Management, whose scope shall be those programs relating to the establishment and operations of legislative support agencies, such as the Office of the Legislative Auditor, the Ombudsman and the Legislative Reference Bureau.

FINANCIAL PLANNING AND MANAGEMENT

This major subject matter area covers those programs which are intended to produce the efficient, effective, economical and equitable acquisition and utilization of financial resources. The Standing Committee for this major subject matter area shall be:

- (18) Committee on Ways and Means, whose scope shall be those programs relating to overall state financing policies, including taxation and other revenues and cash and debt management and statewide implementation of planning, programming, budgeting and evaluation.

Rule 16. Standing Committees: General Responsibility

It shall be the duty of each Standing Committee to conduct systematic review of those portions of the state budget, program and financial plans, and variance reports dealing with, and to consider all laws, bills, resolutions, petitions, reports and other matters relating to, those programs over which the committee has responsibility.

It shall examine such portions of the Executive Budget, the General Appropriations Bill and the Supplemental Appropriations Bill relating to the programs over which it has responsibility, and it shall recommend the programs and the levels of program expenditure to be included in the General Appropriations Bill or Supplemental Appropriations Bill. The level of expenditure, in the aggregate, for any program area shall be consistent with the expenditure allocation established for that program area by the Standing Committee on Ways and Means, which shall make the final recommendation to the Senate.

On other bills referred to it by the President, the committee shall determine objectives, make program recommendations and, where appropriate, make expenditure recommendations. On bills that have been referred by the President to more than one committee, subsequent referral committees shall make no substantive change without prior written notice of such change to the first referral committee and consultation and coordination with that committee, via its chairman, prior to the transmittal of the amended bill and committee report to the Clerk of the Senate for floor action. For those bills which require appropriations, the committee shall make expenditure recommendations consistent with the expenditure allocations established for the bills by the Standing Committee on Ways and Means, which shall make the final recommendation to the Senate, after consultation and coordination with the chairman of the subject matter committee.

It shall also be the duty of each Standing Committee to review the implementation of those programs over which the committee has responsibility. In its review, it shall determine the extent to which program objectives are being accomplished and legislative policies executed, recommend the study of program issues and the conduct of program analysis. It shall recommend amendments to appropriation acts and such policies as may be appropriate to improve the planning, programming, budgeting, implementation and evaluation of programs to the Standing Committee on Ways and Means, which shall make the final recommendation to the Senate.

Rule 17. Committee on Ways and Means: Special Responsibility

It shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means, in considering the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill, to determine for each fiscal year of the biennium the appropriate level of total expenditures and the level of expenditures for program areas. The committee shall inform each Standing Committee of the allocations made to each program area over which the Standing Committee is responsible for budget and program review. The Committee on Ways and Means shall receive the program expenditure recommendations of the Standing Committee and shall review the recommendations to determine that, in the aggregate, the expenditure recommendations are consistent with the allocations made to the program area. In determining the allocation to be made to a program area and in reviewing the recommendations of the Standing Committee, the Committee on Ways and Means shall invite the participation of the chairman of the Standing Committee responsible for the program area. After review of the recommendations of the Standing Committees, the Committee on Ways and Means shall be responsible for preparing the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill in a form appropriate for consideration by the Senate.

To the extent practicable, the Committee on Ways and Means shall arrange to make available to members of the Senate information regarding the contents of the General Appropriations Bill or the Supplemental Appropriations Bill during the 48-hour period prior to the passage of such bills on third and final reading.

In all other bills requiring appropriations, it shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means to inform the Standing Committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates of the amount and type of financial resources available, and it shall review the expenditure recommendation of the Standing Committee to determine that the recommendation is consistent with the resources available.

In determining the amount and type of resources available for a bill requiring an appropriation and in reviewing the expenditure recommendation of the Standing Committee, the Committee on Ways and Means shall invite the participation of the chairman of the Standing Committee responsible for the program area to which the appropriation relates.

Rule 18. Committee on Legislative Management: Special Responsibility

The Committee on Legislative Management shall:

- (1) Make recommendations to the President on the procedures and manner in which the administrative and personnel operations of the Senate should be conducted.
- (2) Make recommendations on the expenses to be included in the appropriations bills providing for the expenses of the Legislature and procedures to ensure that the expenses of the Senate are in accordance with the appropriation acts providing therefor.

For administrative purposes, the committee may authorize the chairman to perform such duties on its behalf as it may deem appropriate.

Rule 19. Meetings of Committees

Meetings, including decision-making sessions, of Standing Committees shall be public provided that meetings in executive session may be allowed in such exceptional circumstances when committee discussion could unfairly damage the reputation of individuals or where there is a legal question concerning a bill. Notice of such meetings and decision-making sessions shall be publicly posted at least 48 hours prior to such meetings provided that the notice may be waived with the approval of the President upon good cause shown.

No committee shall sit during the time when the Senate is actually in session without first securing the approval of the President, except Conference Committees which may sit at any time.

As practicable, committees shall schedule their meetings at times and at places as are convenient for attendance by the general public, and in coordination with other committees of the House or Senate, shall endeavor to hold joint meetings and public hearings on matters of mutual interest.

The meetings of the Conference Committee shall be conducted as agreed upon by the members of the Conference Committee. Conference Committee meetings and decision-making sessions shall be public. Public notice of Conference Committee meetings shall be given to the extent practicable.

Rule 20. Committee Reports

- (1) The Standing Committees shall report from time to time upon all matters referred to them.
- (2) Special Committees shall report upon matters referred to them within the time permitted in the appointment of the Special Committee unless further time is given by vote of the Senate.
- (3) A Conference Committee shall not report upon the matter referred unless a majority of the members appointed by the President have concurred in the report.

Rule 21. Committees: Factfinding and Content of Reports

(1) Whenever any matter shall be referred to a committee it shall be the duty of the committee to make diligent inquiry into all of the facts and circumstances connected with the matter. If necessary, witnesses shall be summoned or subpoenaed, and everything shall be done to bring all facts pertaining to the matter before the Senate in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 21 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes. The President may exercise such powers authorized under Chapter 21, relating to the issuance of subpoenas, and the President, committee chairmen and other duly delegated

members of the Senate may exercise such powers authorized under Chapter 21 aforesaid, relating to the administering of oaths, and the compelling of witnesses who have been subpoenaed to testify. All committee meetings held on matters referred to it by the Senate shall be open to the public unless otherwise ordered by the Senate or otherwise provided by these Rules.

(2) The report of the committee shall state findings of fact and conclusions based thereon, together with a distinct recommendation as to the disposal of that matter.

(3) A report upon a bill shall state clearly the amendments, if any, proposed. If a substitute bill for one or more referred to the committee shall be reported, such substitute bill shall agree with the subject of the bill or bills returned to the Senate.

(4) Whenever a committee fails to agree, the majority shall report and it shall be the report of the committee. The minority may report or simply write upon the report of the majority the words "I (or we) do not concur," signing the same. The final vote of each member of a committee upon any matter referred to it shall be recorded in the records of the committee.

Rule 22. Committee of the Whole

(1) The Senate from time to time may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole. Whenever any matter shall be referred to such committee upon the adoption of a motion to that effect, the President shall call some member to take the Chair (unless the Senate shall nominate a chairman), which being done, the Senate then shall be in committee.

(2) The Clerk of the Senate shall act as Clerk of the Committee of the Whole without extra compensation, and shall make a careful record of the proceedings, which shall be filed as one of the records of the Senate.

(3) The committee, on motion, may rise and ask leave to sit at any future time.

(4) When a bill shall be referred to the Committee of the Whole, the bill shall be first read throughout by the Clerk, and then again read and debated by sections, leaving the preamble to be the last but all amendments, noting the page and line, shall be duly entered by the Clerk on a separate paper, as the same shall be agreed to by the committee, and so reported. When a bill is ordered into Committee of the Whole, such order may dispense with the reading of the whole bill before considering it section by section.

(5) In Committee of the Whole, the rules of procedure in the Senate shall be observed except that any member may speak more than once on the same subject, but no person shall speak a second or further time until others desiring to speak shall have had an opportunity, nor shall the motion for the previous question be allowed. A time limit for debate may be fixed by vote.

PART III. SESSIONS; ATTENDANCE; NOMINATIONS

Rule 23. Meetings

(1) The Senate shall meet for the transaction of public business every day, except Saturdays, Sundays, legal holidays and such other days as the Senate shall designate by motion or resolution duly adopted and entered in the Journal.

(2) The regular hour of meetings of the Senate is established at eleven-thirty o'clock a.m. but the hour of meeting, recess and adjournment for any day may be such as the Senate, by motion, shall decide from time to time.

Rule 24. Attendance

No member shall be absent from the sessions of the Senate unless given leave by the President or unless the member is sick and unable to attend.

Rule 25. Extension of Session

Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, two-thirds of the House of Representatives concurring, may petition the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to extend any session of the Legislature. The petition shall read:

"To the President of the Senate and the
Speaker of the House of Representatives

Your petitioners, members of the Senate and of the House of Representatives of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawaii, respectfully request an extension of _____ days of the _____ session of _____ of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawaii."

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, the President and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly issue a proclamation extending the session for the number of days sought in the petition.

Rule 26. Recessed Session

Any session of the Legislature may be recessed by concurrent resolution adopted by a majority of the members to which each house is entitled. Each regular session shall be recessed pursuant to Article III, Section 10, of the Constitution for not less than five days at some period between the twentieth and fortieth days of the regular session.

Rule 27. Special Sessions

(1) Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, two-thirds of the House of Representatives concurring, may petition the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to call a special session of the Legislature. The petition shall read:

"To the President of the Senate and the
Speaker of the House of Representatives

Your petitioners, members of the Senate and of the House of Representatives of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawaii, respectfully request that a special session of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawaii be convened at _____."

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which each house is entitled, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly issue a proclamation convening the Legislature in special session at the time and place sought in the petition.

(2) Two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled may petition the President of the Senate to call a special session of the Senate for the purpose of carrying out the Senate's responsibilities established by Article VI, Section 3, of the Constitution. The petition shall read:

"To the President of the Senate

Your petitioners, members of the Senate of the _____ Legislature of the State of Hawaii, respectfully request that a special session of the Senate of the State of Hawaii be convened at _____."

The petition shall be in writing, above the signatures of the members.

When the President of the Senate receives such a petition, and it is properly signed by two-thirds of the members to which the Senate is entitled, the President of the Senate shall issue a proclamation convening the Senate in special session at the time and place sought in the petition.

Rule 28. Adjournments

Meetings may be adjourned at any time. Unless otherwise specified in the motion, every adjournment shall be considered as being to the established hour of meeting on the following business day; but no adjournment shall be for more than three days, or sine die, without the consent of the House of Representatives.

Rule 29. Motion to Adjourn

A motion to adjourn is always in order, and shall be decided without debate. One motion to adjourn shall not follow another without intervening business.

A motion to adjourn without naming any time shall always be held as an adjournment to the regular hour of meeting of the next business day.

Rule 30. Quorum

For the transaction of business, a majority of the number of members to which the Senate is entitled shall constitute a quorum, of which quorum a majority vote shall suffice, but the final passage of a bill shall require the vote of the majority of the members of the Senate. A smaller number than a quorum may adjourn from day to day and compel the attendance of absent members. For the purpose of compelling the attendance of absent members, a majority of the members present, by resolution, may direct the Sergeant-at-Arms to place the members who are absent under arrest and to return them to the Senate. Any warrant pursuant to such a resolution shall be issued in the name of the Senate and shall be signed by the member then presiding. For the purpose of ascertaining whether there is a quorum present, the President shall count the members present.

Rule 31. Executive Session

(1) If the Senate considers it necessary to act confidentially upon any communication from the Governor or upon any nomination or other matter, it may go into executive session.

(2) When any member desires to make known any matter to the Senate which the member deems should be confidential and private, the member shall communicate that desire to the President who shall decide whether the Senate shall go into executive session. The Senate may decide whether the matter communicated shall be kept secret.

Rule 32. Clearing of the Senate

(1) When acting upon confidential business in executive session, the Senate Chambers shall be cleared of all persons except the members of the Senate and such other persons as the presiding officer with the consent of the Senate shall deem necessary.

(2) The members, officers and employees shall keep the secrets of the Senate and any other person whose presence is permitted in executive session shall be sworn to secrecy.

(3) All confidential communications made to the Senate, and remarks, votes and proceedings thereon, shall be kept strictly secret by the members, officers and employees, as well as by such other persons as have been detained or permitted to attend upon the consideration of such matters, until the Senate, by resolution, takes off such seal of secrecy, or unless such matter be later considered in open session.

Rule 33. Nominations; Appointments

(1) When nominations, except those of justices and judges, shall be made by the Governor to the Senate, unless otherwise ordered, they shall be referred to appropriate Standing Committees, within 5 legislative days of receipt of such nominations from the Governor. The final question on every nomination shall be "Will the Senate advise and consent to this nomination?" which question shall not be put sooner than twenty-four hours from the time when the nomination is received, nor on the day in which it may be reported by a committee, unless by unanimous consent. Public hearings shall be held for all nominees prior to confirmation.

(2) The fact of a nomination, or its rejection or confirmation, need not be kept secret, but when the Senate or any committee thereof shall deem it necessary for good cause, all remarks, proceedings and votes thereon shall be kept secret.

(3) Consent to the appointment of justices and judges shall be pursuant to Article VI, Section 3, of the State Constitution.

Rule 34. Meeting at Place Other than Capitol

Whenever, for any reason, the Governor shall convene the Senate at any place other than the Capitol, it shall attend together with all of its officers at the time and place ordered.

PART IV. ORDER OF BUSINESS

Rule 35. Order of Business: General

After invocation, roll call and the reading of the Journal, the President shall call for business in the following order:

- (1) Messages from the Governor.
- (2) Reports and communications from the state officers.
- (3) Communications, bills, resolutions and other matters from the House of Representatives.
- (4) Concurrent and senate resolutions and introduction of bills.
- (5) Reports of Conference and Joint Committees.
- (6) Reports of Committee on Legislative Management.
- (7) Reports of other Standing Committees.
- (8) Unfinished business, upon which the Senate was engaged at the time of its last adjournment.
- (9) The Order of the Day.
- (10) Petitions, memorials and miscellaneous communications.
- (11) Any miscellaneous business on the President's table.

Rule 36. Order of Business: Special

The Senate, by previous motion, may direct that any matter named shall be made a special order of business and that such special order shall take precedence of all business after the fourth order, or that it shall take any other position lower down on the calendar.

Rule 37. Order of Business: Committee Reports and Gubernatorial Messages

Reports from Conference or Joint Committees, and from the Committee on Legislative Management, shall be in order at all times after the second order of business, and, upon motion, messages from the Governor or from the House of Representatives may be received at any time. Without unanimous consent, however, such messages or reports shall not be in order for discussion when received, but shall be placed on the calendar as unfinished business.

Rule 38. Order of Business: Order of the Day

After the first seven orders of business (set forth in Rule 35), it shall be in order, pending consideration thereof, to move that the Senate proceed to dispose of the unfinished business or to the Order of the Day. If such motion be decided in the affirmative, such consideration shall immediately be taken up.

Rule 39. Order of Business: Unfinished Business

The unfinished business in which the Senate was engaged at the time of the last adjournment shall have the preference in the Order of the Day. Until the former is disposed of, no motion for any other business shall be received without special leave of the Senate.

Rule 40. Order of Business: Questions on Priority

All questions relating to the priority of business to be acted upon shall be decided without debate.

PART V. BILLS; RESOLUTIONS

Rule 41. Bills: Introduction

Any bill may be introduced on the report of the committee or by any member, except appropriation bills subject to the next paragraph and except short form bills which may only be introduced by the majority party leader or the minority party leader after appropriate consultation with committee chairmen and other members of the Senate.

The Executive Budget, Judiciary Budget, Legislative Budget, General Appropriations Bill, Supplemental Appropriations Bill, Office of Hawaiian Affairs Budget, and bills for criminal injuries compensation, for claims against the State and for funding of collective bargaining agreements may be introduced only by the majority party leader or the minority party leader after appropriate consultation with committee chairmen and other members of the Senate. Each member may introduce only one bill appropriating money for capital improvements projects in the member's district. The majority party leader and the minority party leader shall develop a policy governing individual member's introduction of bills intended to appropriate money or to authorize the issuance of state bonds.

All bills shall be introduced under the order of resolutions.

Bills which shall carry over from a regular session in an odd-numbered year to the next regular session shall retain the numbers assigned to them. The Clerk shall keep a record of the status of all bills in possession of the Senate at the end of the odd-numbered year session and shall publish the record of the status of all such bills prior to the convening of the next regular session.

Every bill introduced or reported out of any committee, which amends an existing section or subsection of the Hawaii Revised Statutes or Sessions Laws of Hawaii, shall set forth the section or subsection in full, and the matter to be deleted shall be enclosed in brackets and any new matter added to the section or subsection shall be underscored. However, a Supplemental Appropriations Bill need not conform to this rule or an amending bill where the intent and effect of an amending bill can be clearly identified and understood without repeating the entire section or subsection, in which case only the paragraphs, subparagraphs, clauses or items to be amended need be set forth as the President may allow. The President may allow additional exceptions to this rule.

No floor amendment to a bill shall be voted upon unless a copy of such amendment shall have been presented to the Clerk who shall prepare and distribute copies of the amendment to each member of the Senate present.

Rule 42. Bills: Referral to Committee

(1) Upon introduction all bills shall be numbered by the Clerk in numerical sequence, shall bear an identification as a Senate Bill, and, unless they are short form bills, shall pass first reading.

(2) Each such bill shall be referred by the President to one or more appropriate Standing Committees for consideration.

(3) Each Standing Committee shall consider the bills referred to it as expeditiously as may be possible.

(4) Bills introduced in short form.

(a) If a majority of the committee to which a short form bill has been referred determines that such bill should receive the further consideration of the same committee or another committee in the same or in an amended form, it shall report that fact to the Senate, together with its recommendation that either: (1) the bill pass first reading by title and be referred again to the same or another committee for further consideration, or (2) the bill in an amended form pass first reading by title and be referred again to the same or another committee for further consideration.

(b) The form of the committee report, upon reporting such a bill to the Senate recommending its passage on first reading without amendment and for referral again to a committee for further consideration shall be substantially as follows:

Your Committee on _____, to which was referred S.B. No. ____ entitled _____ begs leave to report that your Committee has considered such Bill and recommends that it pass First Reading by title and be referred to the Committee on _____ for further consideration.

(c) The form of the committee report, upon reporting such a bill to the Senate recommending passage on first reading in an amended form and for referral again to a committee for further consideration shall be substantially as follows:

Your Committee on _____, to which was referred S.B. No. ____ entitled _____ begs leave to report that your Committee has considered such Bill and is in accord with the intent and purpose of S.B. No. ____, S.D. 1, and be recommitted to the Committee on _____ for further consideration.

Rule 43. Bills: Required Readings

No bill shall pass the Senate unless it shall have passed three readings in the Senate on separate days. The President shall give notice in each instance whether it be the first, second or third reading.

Rule 44. Bills: First Reading

(1) The first reading of a bill shall be for information. If opposition be made to it, the question shall be: "Shall this bill be rejected?" which question may be debated. But no one shall speak more than once upon such question, except the introducer of the bill, who may close the debate.

(2) If the question to reject be negative, the bill shall go to its second reading without question.

Rule 45. Bills: Second Reading

A bill upon its second reading, may be read by its title only. It then shall be subject to a motion to commit. If it is not referred to a Standing Committee, or to a Special Committee, but is ordered to be considered in Committee of the Whole, a day for such consideration shall be determined by the chairman of such committee. When the bill shall be reported from committee it shall take its place in the order of business for future consideration.

Rule 46. Bills: Third Reading

(1) No bill shall pass third or final reading in the Senate unless printed copies of the bill in the form to be passed have been made available to the members of the Senate for at least 48 hours. Form to be passed means the form in which a bill is to be (a) passed on third reading in the Senate, (b) concurred to by the Senate after amendments have been made by the House, or (c) passed by the Senate after a Conference Committee has agreed upon it.

(2) A bill on its third or final reading may be read by its title only, and the President then shall ask the Senate: "Shall this bill pass its third reading?" or "Shall this bill pass its final reading?" as the case may be. Upon the final passage of any bill, the Ayes and Noes shall be called. Such passage shall require the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members of the Senate and the Ayes and Noes shall be entered on the Journal.

Rule 47. Bills: Property of Senate

All bills introduced in the Senate shall be deemed the property of the Senate and under its control unless they shall become law, however subject to the right of the House of Representatives to amend or to refuse to agree with the bills.

Any bill pending at the final adjournment of a regular session in an odd-numbered year shall carry over with the same status to the next regular session; provided that if such bill shall have passed third reading in the Senate in an odd-numbered session, it shall pass at least one reading in the Senate in the next regular session upon its return to the Senate from the House.

Rule 48. Bills: Recall from Committee

Twenty days after a bill has been referred to a committee, the same may be recalled from such committee by the affirmative vote of one-third of the members of the Senate.

Rule 49. Matters Tabled

When a bill or resolution or other matter has been laid upon the table, it shall not thereafter be taken from the table and be considered or restored to a place upon the calendar of the Senate without the consent of a majority.

Rule 50. Bills: Amendments

All amendments proposed to any bill shall be in writing, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, and shall be sent to the Clerk's desk to be filed with the bill.

Rule 51. Bills: Certification

When a bill is passed it shall be certified by the Clerk who shall note the day of its passage at the bottom of the last page of the bill.

Rule 52. Bills: Received from House of Representatives

Whenever a bill which has finally passed the House of Representatives shall be certified to the Senate for its action, such bill shall be read three times before final passage, in accordance with the provision of the rules for the passage of bills introduced in the Senate.

Rule 53. Bills: Transmittal to House of Representatives

When a bill originating in the Senate shall have passed its third reading, or when a bill originating in the House which has been received from the House shall have been amended, or when a carry-over bill from an odd-numbered year originating in the House passes its third reading in the Senate in an even-numbered year session, such bill or such amended bill shall immediately be certified by the President and Clerk and sent to the House of Representatives for its consideration.

Rule 54. Bills: Correction of Errors

When a bill has passed both the Senate and the House of Representatives and an error in it is discovered prior to its having received the approval of the Governor, the bill may be returned by Concurrent Resolution to the House last considering the bill for proper correction.

Rule 55. Bills: Order of Consideration

(1) The Clerk shall send bills that have passed first reading to be printed immediately. When they have been printed and circulated to the members of the Senate, the President shall refer them to the various committees. When the committees have considered them and reported on them, the committees shall return them to the Clerk, and the Clerk shall place them in the Second Reading File. The Senate shall consider them in the order in which they appear in the Second Reading File.

(2) The Clerk shall arrange bills that have passed second reading in the order of their passage on second reading, regardless of the date of their reference to committee or the date of the committee report on them. The Clerk shall place them on the Third Reading File in the order in which they passed second reading and the Senate shall consider them on third reading in that same order. However, if the third reading of a bill is set for some particular date, that bill shall be removed from the Third Reading File.

Rule 56. Bills: Special Order of Consideration

All bills and other matters set for consideration on particular dates, shall be arranged in the order of the several votes making such assignments. A list shall be made of such special orders, and when the time for consideration arrives, such bills and other matters shall be considered in the order of assignment. If an adjournment shall be had before all of such special orders are disposed of, the remainder shall go over and come under the head of unfinished business on the following day, unless otherwise ordered.

PART VI. RESOLUTIONS; MOTIONS**Rule 57. Resolutions and Motions: Form**

All resolutions shall be typewritten, dated and signed by the introducer, otherwise they shall not be considered. The Senate shall not introduce any congratulatory, commemorative or memorial resolution but shall express the sentiment contained in such resolutions by means of a suitable certificate. Motions and amendments may be verbal but shall be reduced to writing if requested by the President, and shall be read from the desk if so ordered.

Rule 58. Motions: Second Required

No motion shall be received and considered by the Senate until the motion shall be seconded.

Rule 59. Motions: Disposition

After a motion is stated or read by the President, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Senate, and shall be disposed of by vote of the Senate; however, it may be withdrawn by the movant at any time before an amendment has been adopted or before the decision on the motion if not amended.

Rule 60. Motions Applicable to Pending Matters

Whenever any bill or resolution or other matter shall be under discussion, the only motions relative thereto shall be:

- (1) To lay upon the table,
- (2) To postpone to a certain time,
- (3) To postpone indefinitely,
- (4) To commit, and
- (5) To amend,

which motions shall have precedence in the order named.

The first two motions shall be decided without debate and shall be put as soon as made.

When any of the motions shall be decided in the negative, they shall not be revived the same day relative to the main question under discussion. If all are negative as aforesaid, the only remaining question shall be as to the adoption of the bill, resolution or other main question.

Rule 61. Matters Postponed Indefinitely

When a question is postponed indefinitely, the question shall not be acted upon again during the session in which it was introduced.

Rule 62. Motion for Previous Question

The object of the motion for the previous question is to cut off debate. It shall always be in order. It shall require a three-fifths vote to carry it.

Whenever the motion shall be carried, the author of the resolution or introducer of the bill under discussion shall be permitted to close the debate, after which the main question, subject to Rule 60, shall be put. The author or introducer may delegate to another such right to close.

Rule 63. Motion for Reconsideration

(1) When a motion has been once made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall not be in order for any member who voted in the minority to move for a reconsideration thereof; but any member who voted with the majority may move to reconsider it on the same or the succeeding day of session, or, with the consent of the Senate, on any subsequent day and such motion shall take precedence of all other questions, except a motion to adjourn.

(2) When a motion for reconsideration has been decided by vote, that vote shall not be reconsidered.

(3) When a bill or resolution or other matter upon which a vote has been taken shall have gone out of the possession of the Senate, and shall have been transmitted to the House of Representatives, a motion to reconsider shall be deemed to include a request to the House to return the same. If not complied with by the House, then the vote on the motion to reconsider shall be set aside. If such motion shall pass, the Clerk shall promptly communicate to the House the request for return of the matter to be reconsidered.

PART VII. PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS**Rule 64. Petitions, Memorials, and Miscellaneous Communications**

(1) Any person may petition the Senate. Petitions and other memorials, except as provided in Rule 57, shall be in writing, signed by the petitioners.

(2) All petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the Senate or to the President and members shall be presented to the Senate by the Clerk.

(3) A brief statement of the contents of such petitions, memorials or other papers shall be made orally by the Clerk.

(4) Every such petition, memorial or other paper shall be ordered filed or referred to a committee, as of course, by the President, unless such action is objected to by a member at the time such petition, memorial or other paper is presented.

(5) No such petition, memorial or other paper shall be debated on the day it is presented, except with the consent of the Senate.

PART VIII. ORDER; DEBATE; VOTING**Rule 65. Questions of Order**

(1) A question of order may be raised at any stage of the proceedings, except during the calling of the roll when the Ayes and Noes are called for. Unless submitted to the Senate, such questions shall be decided without debate by the presiding officer, subject to an appeal to the Senate. Laying such appeal on the table shall be held as sustaining the ruling of the presiding officer.

(2) Any question of order may be submitted to the Senate for its decision.

Rule 66. Debate: General Limitation

No member shall speak more than twice, unless such member be the movant of the matter pending, in which case such member shall not be permitted to speak in reply until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule 67. Voting: Methods

There shall be five methods of ascertaining the decision of the Senate upon any matter.

(1) First, by voice or raising of hands; Second, by rising; Third, by ballot; Fourth, by call of the roll of the members and a record of the Clerk of the vote of each; and Fifth, by unanimous consent.

(2) Whenever the Senate is ready to vote on any question, the President shall rise, and after stating the question, shall request all those in favor of the affirmative of the question to vote "Aye." The President then shall call upon all voting in the negative of the question to vote "No." The President then shall announce the result to the Senate.

(3) If any member shall doubt the result, as announced, the President again shall state the question and call upon the members to vote by rising in their places, and they shall remain standing until counted, and the result again shall be announced.

(4) The method of voting by ballot shall be as customary. The President shall appoint one or more tellers, or direct the Messengers to collect the ballots, which shall be counted by the Clerk, and otherwise prescribed by these rules, on motion, the Senate may vote upon any question by ballot.

(5) Whenever one-fifth of the members present shall request, the Clerk shall call the roll of the members of the Senate. Each member, when called, shall vote in a clear loud voice, "Aye," if voting in the affirmative, or "No," if voting in the negative. The Clerk shall record each vote and such record shall become a part of the Journal of the Senate. The President shall announce the results as above set forth.

(6) With the unanimous consent of the Senate, the President may direct the Clerk to record an "Aye" vote for each member of the Senate. If there is no objection, the Clerk shall so record the vote. If there is objection, the President shall ask for the names of the members voting "No" and order the Clerk to record no votes for them.

Rule 68. Voting: Rights of Members

(1) No member, on any account, shall refrain from voting unless excused by the President. A member may vote "Kanalua" the first time the member's name is called by the Clerk on any vote, but if the member votes "Kanalua" on the next call of the member's name, the member's vote shall be recorded as "Aye."

(2) The President may excuse a member who has a monetary interest in the question, or whose right to a seat in the Senate will be affected by the question, or whose official conduct is involved in the question. If a member thinks there may be a personal interest in the question, the member shall rise and disclose the interest to the President. The President then shall rule whether the member has a conflict of interest. If so, the member shall be excused from voting.

(3) Whenever the Ayes and Noes are called, no one, without unanimous consent, shall be permitted to explain a vote.

(4) After the announcement by the President of the result, no one shall be allowed to vote or to change a vote.

PART IX. DECORUM; DISCLOSURES; PUNISHMENT

Rule 69. Punishment of Members

The Senate may punish a member for misconduct, disorderly behavior or neglect of duty by censure, or upon a two-thirds vote of all the members of the Senate, by suspension or expulsion of such member.

The President may appoint a Special Committee to investigate, hear and report upon the conduct of any member charged by the Senate for misconduct, disorderly behavior or neglect of duty. Any member so charged by the Senate shall be informed in writing of the specific charge or charges made against the member and have opportunity to present evidence and be heard in the member's own defense. Following its investigation and hearing the Special Committee shall file its report with the President setting forth its findings and recommendations.

In the event the committee recommends censure, suspension or expulsion, the President shall present the report of the committee to the Senate for its consideration and decision. The Senate, by a majority vote, may censure a member or, upon a two-thirds vote of all the members of the Senate, suspend or expel a member.

Rule 70. Decorum: Transgression of Rules

If any member transgresses the rules of the Senate, the President, or any member, may call such member to order, and, when so called to order, immediately shall sit down. The President then shall decide the question of order without debate, subject to an appeal to the Senate.

The President may call for the sense of the Senate on any question of order.

Rule 71. Decorum: Address

When any member is about to speak, such member shall rise from the member's seat and address all remarks to the President. While speaking, the member shall confine all remarks to the question under debate, shall refer to other Senators by title only (e.g., "Senator from the ____ District"; "The Chairman of the Committee on ____"; "The Majority Leader,") and not by name and shall avoid personalities.

Rule 72. Decorum: Person Called to Order While Speaking

Whenever any person shall be called to order while speaking, such person shall be deemed to be in possession of the floor when the question of order is decided and may proceed with the matter under discussion.

Rule 73. Decorum: Presence in Senate

No person shall sit at the desk of the President or Clerk, except by permission of the President, nor shall any person, other than a member, officer or permitted employee or person, sit in the main Senate floor area during any of the sessions of the Senate.

Rule 74. Decorum: Conduct in Session

When the President is putting any question or addressing the Senate, no one shall walk out of the room or across the floor. When a member is speaking, no one shall entertain a private discourse, nor shall anyone pass between the member speaking and the Chair.

Rule 75. Decorum: Disorderly Conduct in Session

If, during any session of the Senate, any member should behave in a disorderly manner the President shall order the member to be seated and preserve the peace. If such member then shall persist in disorderly conduct, the President shall order the Sergeant-at-Arms to remove the member from the Senate and the member shall not be permitted to take a seat during the remainder of that day's session, except upon satisfactory pledge given to the Senate for future good behavior.

For the punishment of any person not a member, the provisions of Section 18, Article III, of the Constitution shall govern.

Rule 76. Decorum: Recording of Debate Called to Order

If any Senator is called to order for words spoken in debate, upon the member's demand or on that of any other Senator, the words objected to shall be taken down in writing and noted by the Clerk, and, if required, shall be read for the information of the Senate.

Rule 77. Decorum: Smoking

No member or other officer shall smoke within the Senate Chamber during any of the meetings of the Senate unless authorized by the President.

Rule 78. Decorum: Solicitation Prohibited

An officer or employee of the Senate shall not solicit subscriptions, for any purpose, from any other officer or employee thereof, nor from any Senator. Nor shall any person be permitted to solicit or receive subscriptions or contributions for any purpose on the floor or in the lobby of the Senate or in any Senate office.

Rule 79. Disclosures

Each member shall file with the Ethics Commission of the State of Hawaii, a disclosure of the member's private financial interests, as prescribed by law. Each member shall file with the Ethics Commission any change in such financial interests.

If a legislative matter which affects a member's interests arises before the member has made a disclosure to the Ethics Commission, the member shall disclose orally such interest to the Senate before voting. The member then shall immediately make the written disclosure required by law and the Rules of the Senate.

Any member who has filed a disclosure as required by this Rule need not make a further oral disclosure on the Senate floor of any interest so filed.

Rule 80. Violating Confidence

If any matter covered in Rule 32 or 33 shall be disclosed by any Senator, the Senator shall be liable to censure, or, by a two-thirds vote, to suspension or expulsion from the Senate. If an officer or other person authorized to hear such matter shall disclose the matter, such officer shall be dismissed and such other person shall be liable to punishment for contempt comparable to the punishment provided for by Section 18, Article III, of the Constitution and in the manner as therein prescribed.

PART X. QUESTIONS TO STATE OFFICERS**Rule 81. Questions to State Officers**

Any member of the Senate may ask any question of any state officer relating to the officer's respective department reducing such questions to writing, over the member's signature, reading the same before the Senate, and furnishing the officer with a copy of such written question. Any officer questioned shall reply to such question upon the following day, unless the Senate shall grant a definite extension of time for replying.

**PART XI. AMENDMENT, SUSPENSION AND
INTERPRETATION OF RULES****Rule 82. Amendments; Suspension**

(1) No rule of the Senate shall be amended or rescinded nor shall any new rule be adopted, without one day's notice of such change. Any such action shall require a majority vote of the members of the Senate.

(2) Any rule may be suspended for a particular purpose with the unanimous consent of the Senate.

Rule 83. Parliamentary Procedure

Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedures, 1989 edition, where not inconsistent with the Rules and practices of the Senate, shall govern.
