Thursday, January 16, 1992

MISCELLANEOUS COMMUNICATIONS

The following communications (Misc. Com. Nos. 1 and 2) were read by the Clerk and were placed on file:

No. 1, from the County of Kauai, Department of Water, dated November 18, 1991, transmitting the Department's "Proposed CIP Projects - Request for State Aid 1992 Session," with a certified copy of Resolution 2, adopted on October 24, 1991, relating to the Department's legislative budget, FY 1992-1993.

Misc. Com. No. 2, letter from the City and County of Honolulu, Department of Parks and Recreation, dated December 13, 1991, regarding H.R. No. 148 (1991), on the selection of a site and an assessment of the cost to construct a skateboard rink in the North Shore area of Oahu.

At this time, Senator Crozier rose to speak on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, I may be meandering for a bit so just bear with me.

"I have a book in front of me and it's titled 'The Boston at Hawaii.' It was written by Lucien Young, a lieutenant, and are observations and impressions of a naval officer during the 14-month stay on the islands on a man-of-war. It was published in 1893.

"Mr. President, today is the 99th anniversary of the disembarking of the U.S. Marines onto Hawaiian soil in preparation for the overthrow of Queen Liliuokalani. The overthrow took place the next day. And as Congress debated in the later years ... in the 1898s ... should they receive the republic into the United States, they had to rely on books, newspaper articles, letters and 'what-have-you' ... they did not have CNN news like we had during Desert Storm ... not even Dan Rather or radios so the message took a long time to get anywhere so they relied on people like Lt. Lucien Young for information.

"I just want to touch on just a few points as we get ready to think about Queen Liliuokalani and the overthrow -- the 99th anniversary which takes place tomorrow. Some of the comments he made about King Kalakaua and also Queen Liliuokalani, understanding that the Civil War was about 24 years old, the South was still reeling from the carpetbaggers and the anger that they had against the Northerners and how they had placed Blacks into power in the South. One of the observations of Lucien Young who tries to continually say that he is impartial but he alludes that Kalakaua, and I quote: 'Kalakaua's only a high chief and no way related to the extinct royal family and was reputed to be the illegitimate son of a Negro cobbler who had immigrated to the islands from Boston.' You know, it's just a stage to get Congress to understand that they were dealing with second class individuals; not necessarily citizens but individuals.

"He goes on to talk about how in 1887 when they rewrote the Constitution and were able to give more power to those individuals in Hawaii who were American citizens, let me quote: 'Instead of the nobles being appointed by the crown, they were chosen by a special electorate composed of citizens possessed of an annual income of at least \$600 or an unencumbered property to the value of \$3,000,' which practically gave the whites the choice of one-half of the legislature. Can you understand why the Native Hawaiian community was quite upset when they lost all of their power and influence?

"Well, the book goes on and maybe tomorrow afternoon, if I feel driven, I will take more of your time but I would just like to remind my colleagues and you, Mr. President, that 4:00 o'clock today will be the 100th anniversary when the troops marched off the boat, down King Street, right across in front of the palace, and Queen Liliuokalani stood on the balcony to watch a battalion of artillery, companies of blue jackets and she saw their presence. The Americans had been involved in manipulating the Hawaiian Government for over 20 years ... this was not something new. They treated Hawaii as like how we treat some of our South American countries today ... the 'banana republics.'

"Anytime we wanted something done, we just unloaded our troops and marched around and intimidated the Queen. So, today is a day of reflection, Mr. President. Even more so tomorrow when the actual anniversary of the overthrow took place.

"I would just like to say that I am introducing legislation to have some kind of recognition next year of the 100th anniversary of the overthrow of Queen Liliuokalani. Mr. President, I am here wrestling with the term. What do we call the overthrow? How do we title it? Do we call it a celebration? I don't think so. I don't think the Hawaiian people would like to celebrate the overthrow. Do you know that half of the people in Hawaii were not born here? Half of the population, the residents, were not born here so half of those people have no idea who Queen Liliuokalani was unless they walked by the statue. The other half, I daresay 47 percent, know that Queen Liliuokalani was overthrown. Lucky if 3 percent know why she was overthrown. So as the Native Hawaiians and Hawaiians strike up for sovereignty, how can they get anywhere without support of all of the people of Hawaii.

"Mr. President, I think next year should be the year of educating the residents of Hawaii to understand why the Hawaiian people are presenting their claims. I am putting a bill in to do just that, sir, so that we can have some kind of a way to react to the Native Hawaiians', I think, legitimate claim for more self-determination or, if you want to use the word, sovereignty."

Senator Matsuura also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and stated:

"Mr. President, this is in continuation of the previous speaker's remarks.

"I think what happened a hundred years ago is a reflection of a wrongful decision and act. The decision that took place after the overthrow was even worse because what Congress did was take the worst land in Hawaii at that time and gave it to the Hawaiian people. Look at the Hawaiian home land on Molokai. Right now that land on Molokai appears productive, primarily because of the reservoirs and the water lines that have been put in. Look at the Hawaiian home land in Panaewa, the lava lands, any land that couldn't grow a single crop was given to the Hawaiian people. I agree with the previous speaker in that there was a great injustice that occurred many years ago. Thank you."

Senator Cobb also rose to speak on a point of personal privilege and said:

"Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege on an entirely different subject.

"The reason for my rising is not to say '1 told you so' but to offer some observations and, perhaps, solutions to the fact that we are here when we really don't need to be.

"Back in 1990, I introduced Senate Bill 2461, relating to the State Capitol, which declared that it is not necessary to remove undisturbed asbestos, declaring inappropriate the plans to evacuate the Capitol, cancelling the move, and in effect saying encapsulate it rather than to remove it.

"And as I look at the price tag of this move and all of the other ancillary things that are being done, the price tag today is, at a minimum, twice the dollar amount that it cost us to build the original State Capitol in the first place. It was built for a cost of \$32 million. The price tag is now \$64 million for this move and, I understand, DAGS is still coming in for more money.

"I received one of these little 'just say no' flyers not to regalize the State Capitol and the \$64 million figure here is already obsolete, it will be more. This Majority Caucus took a position similar to mine last year but by then the horse had left, the barn door was closed, and the move was on the way.

"I would just like to quote from the bill and then raise what I think may be a possible solution. The bill itself stated that 'efforts to remove asbestos insulation may actually do more harm than good. As a recent symposium at Harvard University pointed out that asbestos removal creates a higher concentration of the deadly airborne fibers because contaminate procedures are seldom efficient enough to keep the fibers from escaping. In fact, the federal Environmental Protection Agency encourages school districts to keep intact asbestos in place. Inspecting it every six months to determine if it is in good condition and recommending repair, removal or enclosure only if it is damaged or disturbed.' It then goes on to say 'the state should not succumb to fiber-phobia and remove all asbestos when removal could be at best expensive, unnecessary and at worst could result in conditions more hazardous for employees upon their return.'

"The point that I was trying to make then and repeat now is that if you encapsulate asbestos even in an air conditioning system, as long as it remains undisturbed, it is a safer procedure and far less expensive and time consuming than going through the complete removal because the fibers once disturbed and removed are so finite and so small as to be virtually undetectable; as to be virtually impossible to filter out; and that the fibers themselves will remain for years in an enclosed area even after a so-called total removal has taken place. In fact, an editorial in the September 19, 1989 Honolulu Star-Bulletin pointed this out and used the actual phrase 'fiber-phobia.'

"Mr. President, I have learned through years of experience to question and oppose projects that seem to start off on an innocent basis yet have a life of their own. One example is the stadium, another example is the fixed I predicted on the floor of the Senate two guideway. years ago the guideway will cost at least double what the original amount that we voted on. This project has a life all its own and I will be discussing that in further detail later in the session. I use that only as an example that this move in the Capitol, originally, when the bill was presented for hearing we were told would be between two and three years. Then it became three to four years; now it's at least five years. The Legislature will be lucky, I predict, to be back in the Capitol by the end of this century. We may make it by 2001. But it is not just a point to criticize, Mr. President, because a lot of what's being made as a partisan issue was not the case in 1990. Some who are complaining now were silent then. But I think some positive solutions need to be considered. First is a complete review of all the money to be spent and to cut out anything that is not absolutely necessary in this

move and I would include in that cameras to monitor movements to and from the bathrooms. I don't understand any rationale or logic for that and yet it's an extremely expensive device to put in. Second is to encapsulate rather than remove asbestos, thus, enabling us to move back in approximately two years or less.

"Mr. President, I can understand and sympathize with many of the criticisms that are being made but rather than take a negative approach I think it's incumbent upon us to be as positive as we can to recognize that there are other ways in dealing with an asbestos problem, to cut the amount of money that is being spent, and to move back as quickly as possible. And in that vain, I urge the relevant committees to seriously consider it because I think five to seven years or longer is simply too long. \$64 to \$80 million is simply too much and the inconvenience that we would ask our public to go through during this time period is too unbearable. Thank you."

The Chair responded:

"Members of the Senate, just one comment from the Chair. I just want Senators, individually, to examine how they voted on the appropriations for the Capitol renovation when it was before this body. I think after that we can go on and we can offer suggestions.

"But, I do want to remind members of this body to reexamine their positions taken when the appropriation measures were first proposed."

Senator Blair also rose on a point of personal privilege as follows:

"Mr. President, on a point of personal privilege on the point that you just raised. I'm wondering if the inference is that you're recommending that we vote against the budget if we dislike one item in the budget?

The Chair answered:

"I think, basically, that's an individual decision one has to make but what I have heard so far has been sort of negative and I think contrary to the decision of this body at the time of approving the appropriations to have the Capitol work done after years of delay and vacillation. We made a decision, and the Capitol renovation project is proceeding on the basis of that decision.

"In answer to your question, directly, I think that it's up to each and every individual to decide for himself or herself if he or she feels that aggrieved by the action taken then by all means vote 'no' on the budget ... if that is his or her inclination. That is my answer, Senator."
